Ambulance service 'crashes'

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services went out of business at noon Thursday, only a year-and-a-half after it drove a competitor out of business.

Magic Valley Regional Medical Center will take over operation of the ambulance service temporarily at the direction of the Twin Falls County commissioners.

During the next 30 days, the commissioners will need to make provisions for a permanent ambulance service for the county.

In the meantime, the hospital has hired 18 of the defunct ambulance service's 29 employees to provide emergency service, says hospital administrator Bill Burns.

Three ambulances have been rented through the state Emergency Medical Services Bureau, from the Idaho Falls Fire Department.

The ambulance firm will continue to take emergency calls at its dispatch center in the hospital annex today. Saturday, the hospital will take over that service.

However, the telephone number will not change. Parsons dialing the Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services number will be connected to the hospital's ambulance-dispatching service through the main switchboard.

The ambulance service's major owner, Dennis Brodigan, says he has been talking to Burns for several

Ambulances still rolling

Who do I call to get an ambulance? Dial the same number you always have: 734-3500. It is listed under "ambulance" in the Yellow Pages and "Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services" in the regular directory. Or dial the operator on police.

Former employees of Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services will respond, but they will now be working for the hospital. The hospital has not hired as many workers as the ambulance service had, but it will be increasing the hours of some part-time workers.

months about the possibility of the hospital buying his business. Wednesday at 9 a.m., he told Burns that he no longer could afford to operate the business, and Burns agreed to have the hospital buy Brodigan's inventory of soft goods.

After the meeting, the hospital began a frantic 24 hours of checking legalities, getting insurance, finding vehicles and radios to rent, and setting up the new system. Burns said Thursday. The three ambulances from Idaho Falls arrived at 9 p.m. Wednesday, and hospital personnel spent much of Thursday refitting them with the appropriate equipment and radios.

Brodigan originally set 7 a.m. Thursday as the time he would shut down. But he agreed to wait until noon when it became evident the hospital was not prepared to take over the service any earlier.

The hospital still is looking for a fourth vehicle, but the state emergency agency has agreed to provide another ambulance in an emergency. However, that ambulance will have to come from Boise.

Brodigan says the county really needs five ambulances, since he has had that many out on calls at once this month. DeLoe says that Burns says the hospital will apply to become the permanent provider of ambulance services in Twin Falls County.

"We stand ready to operate over the long haul," Burns says. "We will present our proposal along with a qualified medical staff here. We just want to ensure the level of quality (of emergency services) available to the Magic Valley continues."

Brodigan says he approached the hospital to buy his inventory because hospitals are better suited than private industry or municipalities to run an emergency service.

The hospital has a broad financial base to absorb the costs of the service, and it already is open 24 hours a day, seven days a week, he says. The hospital will be able to

National cry rocks Poland

Walesa: Poverty without union

WARSAW, Poland — Police stepped up security in major cities Thursday and used tear gas and clubs to break up Solidarity supporters in Wrocław in a show of force on the eve of nationwide protests called by the banned union's underground.

In the Baltic port of Gdansk, Lech Walesa's hometown, police sources said an unofficial state of emergency was in effect.

Earlier, Walesa demanded reinstatement of the Solidarity union's right to represent Polish workers.

Walesa released the text of the speech he planned to read at the monument in Gdansk because he anticipated police would never give him a chance to speak.

He compared Poland's present Communist rulers to 18th-century capitalists who trampled on workers' rights, and warned Poland will sink into irredeemable poverty unless Solidarity is revived.

Walesa urged the government to separate Communist politics from economic policy, permit the

establishment of more "strong and independent" groups like Solidarity and ease up on ideology enough to allow more competition within state-owned sectors of the economy.

"Without Solidarity we shall have long years of political and economic stagnation, and something far worse than this — material poverty and no hope for the future," Walesa said in a prepared speech.

Witnesses in Wrocław said police fired tear gas grenades and swung clubs to disperse 1,000-2,000 Solidarity supporters listening to an announcement in the city's market, apparently related to the protest call. There were no reports of injuries.

The violence in Wrocław was the first outbreak reported in protests called by Solidarity to mourn those killed three days after martial law was imposed on Oct. 13, 1981, and the victims of bloody riots 13 years ago.

A convoy of police trucks with blue dome lights flashing drove slowly through Warsaw Thursday night, part of a show of force the Communist regime evidently was relying on to intimidate would-be protesters.

McClure jockeying for top Senate job

BOISE — Sen. James McClure said Thursday he is putting the finishing touches on letters to his 54 Republican colleagues seeking advice for the Idahoan entering the race for Senate majority leader.

McClure, the Senate's third-ranking Republican, said he is "leaning toward" announcing his candidacy when Congress reconvenes in January. But he said a final decision would not be made until he receives feedback from other GOP senators.

The personal letters are aimed at determining "if this is a viable candidacy," he said. "Some people will say 'Yes,' and I hope others would be candid enough to advise me against it if that is how they feel."

Four other senators — Alaska's Bob Dole of Kansas, Richard Lugar of Illinois and Pete Domenici of New Mexico — also are considered likely candidates to succeed the retiring Howard Baker of Tennessee as majority leader.

McClure, chairman of the Senate Republican Conference, said Stevens has "made no bones" about his interest in the post and Dole began active campaigning about two weeks ago. Domenici is also running, while Lugar has not yet made a formal commitment, he said in an interview at his Boise Senate office.

McClure, who is expected to have little trouble winning re-election to the Senate next fall, said the nearly completed set of letters "outline what I think a Senate majority leader should be in very broad terms."

The Republicans — Reps. Robert Forrey and Michael Strassner of Nampa and Lyman Winchester of Kuna, along with Sen. Atwell Parry of Melba — pledged their strong opposition to a budget recommended Wed-

nesday night by the Democratic governor that would boost state expenses next year by 23 percent.

"What bothers me about this budget message is its socialistic flavor," Forrey said at a news conference.

Marines engage Druze fighters, need help from battleship

BEIRUT, Lebanon — The battleship USS New Jersey fired its 5-inch guns Thursday at Druze Moslem positions in Lebanon, joining a Marine bombardment intended to halt new attacks on U.S. peace-keeping troops at Beirut airport.

The New Jersey, which blasted Syrian anti-aircraft positions in the mountains east of Beirut with its mammoth 16-inch guns Wednesday, trained its smaller cannons on Moslem militias after the 1,200 Marines came under fire at dusk.

With shells landing within 50 yards of the U.S. ambassador's residence in Beirut, Syria announced there would be no change in its hardline stance on the Lebanon crisis.

Earlier Thursday, the Marines shot at a taxi carrying a two-man U.S. television crew from Washington, N.C., that tried to enter the base by the wrong entrance.

Joseph Corcoran, an anchorman from WITN-TV, was treated for cuts in the shoulder from glass shards and metal fragments. The Lebanese taxi driver, Mustafa Mahmoud Najjar, was shot in the head and left arm.

Corcoran had just arrived on an overnight ship

from Cyprus and was going to the base to tape Christmas messages from Marines. He also had taken holiday greetings from relatives at home for the American troops.

In other violence, unidentified gunmen shot and killed a French soldier near the home of the French ambassador, a spokesman for the 2,000-member French peace-keeping force in Lebanon said.

It was the third French soldier killed in three days, bringing to 80 the number of Frenchmen to die since their deployment in Lebanon in September 1982.

Later, French peacekeepers suffered three more wounded when a bomb went off as a convoy drove in the port area of Beirut.

As the 45-minute battle raged around Beirut airport, the Marines went into their bunkers on maximum condition-1 alert. No Marine casualties were reported.

The exchange began with small arms fire and large-caliber rounds aimed at the Marine compound from areas controlled by Druze Moslem militias.

Marine spokesman Capt. Wayne Jones said M-60 tanks then bombarded the nearby Druze town of Shouifat — a no-man's land between militia forces

and joint Lebanese army-Marine positions near Beirut Airport.

The militias hit back with anti-aircraft guns and rocket fire and the Marines responded with 81-mm mortars and artillery, Jones said.

As the fighting escalated, the New Jersey's guns were called in. "The New Jersey is firing in support of us with 5-inch guns only," said Jones.

The roar of the battleship's guns, firing 40 rounds, could be heard for 25 minutes, but sporadic rocket and small-arms fire by anti-government forces harassed the Marines until early evening.

At some points, a shell landed every four seconds on Lebanese army troops stationed south of the Marines. Private Christian Phalange radio reported shells also fell on a wide area of Christian Beirut and the suburbs.

A spokesman at the U.S. ambassador's residence on the same suburbs aloped reported seven or eight explosions, some only 50 yards from the envoy's walled compound. The ambassador, Reginald Bartholomew, was not home at the time.

Amid the fighting, U.S. Middle East envoy Donald Rumsfeld left Damascus after apparently futile talks and flew to Israel where he met with David Kimche, director-general of the Foreign Ministry.

Terrorism touches Pentagon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Tighter security measures are being imposed at the Pentagon — the world's largest office building — as a precaution against an increased threat of terrorism, a spokesman said Thursday.

"Almost a day doesn't go by here where there isn't a bomb of some kind," spokesman Michael Burch said. "Threats to the Pentagon are not infrequent."

Burch declined to go into details about the "overt precautions" to be taken in the next several weeks to add protection to the sprawling 49-year-old building across the Potomac River from most government offices. Security personnel also declined to comment.

"There's an increased threat of terrorism, not only in the world, but in Washington, D.C.," Burch told reporters. "We find it prudent to take additional precautions here."

Meese defends remarks

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Presidential counselor Edwin Meese, whose remarks about hunger in America sparked controversy, Thursday defended President Reagan's compassion and said "let's be fair" to a misunderstood Ebenezer Scrooge.

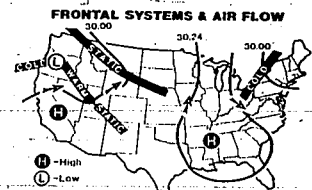
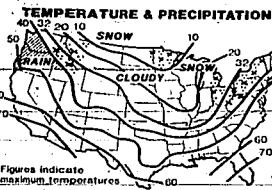
Meese also told a National Press Club audience he has "no doubt there are some, there may be many" hungry people in America.

The hunger issue was raised by Meese's comments during an interview last week in which he had seen no authoritative data to show there are hungry children. He also suggested some people get in soup lines "because the food is free and that's easier than paying for it."

In response, House Speaker Thomas O'Neill said last week, "There's always a Scrooge during the holiday season."

Meese explained Thursday: "The question I raised in the interview and that we want to find out the facts about (is) if there are hungry people — and I have no doubt that there are some, there may be many — we don't know the extent of that."

The extended forecast for the Magic Valley and southern Idaho calls for

Highs will be in the 20s to mid-30s; lows will be from 15 to 25 in the west, to zero to 15 above in the east.

On Thursday, patchy, dense fog and low clouds plagued many valley locations during the morning and early afternoon, but conditions then improved at most reporting stations. Light snow occurred in the afternoon at Salmon and Malad, with partly cloudy to cloudy skies prevailing elsewhere.

Gusty winds were reported in the central Snake River Valley. Mountain Home, Twin Falls and Burley recorded winds of 10 to 24 mph throughout the day. Elsewhere, lighter winds were the rule.

Afternoon temperatures varied from the low 40s in the western valleys to the low and mid-20s in the central mountains. The steepest warmest reading was 47 degrees at Weiser, after a morning low of 9 at Stanley.

Elsewhere in the nation on Thursday, the warmest temperature reported was 82 degrees at West Palm Beach, Fla., and the coldest was 14 below zero at Cut Bank, Mont.

handle clerical and switchboard duties with its regular staff, and could later use nursing personnel for some ambulance duties, Brodigan said Thursday, at a joint news conference with hospital officials.

"That is a change from Brodigan's opinion when he started service in October 1981. He said then that an ambulance service could best be run as a free enterprise.

"A compeller to county Coroner Cloyce Edwards' Magic Valley Ambulance Service would improve service, he said. At the time, Edwards' service was under fire for allegedly being slow to respond to call and responding with unlicensed vehicles and personnel.

"Brodigan knew at that time, he says, that only one of the ambulance services in Twin Falls would survive. However, he thought that the remaining business could provide better service and make a profit.

In August of 1982, Brodigan purchased Edwards' business, but he says now that he could not make a profit even as the only ambulance service in the county.

"It's time for government to do it. We've proved private enterprise cannot do it and make a profit," he said Thursday.

Brodigan's major financial backer, Arizona dentist Charles R. Griffen, said Thursday that the business was being run on receiving the same county subsidy service to local dentists that Edwards was receiving when they bought him out.

"We expected support from the

county to receive this level of service, and they didn't help us," he said.

Edwards received \$8,700 a year for providing ambulance service to indigents.

"That would not have been enough to save us, but it would have been a help," Brodigan said. Twenty percent to 25 percent of the ambulance's bills were not paid because they went to indigents and other persons who did not pay, he says.

Brodigan estimates the company has about \$100,000 in the "red," but has \$100,000 accounts receivable.

"There's a real good chance that we won't owe anyone a dime," he says.

Brodigan says he will remain in Twin Falls for about four months to collect unpaid money for his company's services and settle the company's debts. The company considered filing for bankruptcy, but no longer thinks that will be necessary, he says.

The company also was hurt when it lost about \$60,000 while it waited for more than two months for the commissioners to grant it a license to compete with Edwards in 1981; Brodigan says.

The \$60,000 includes the costs of running an office before being allowed to do business, in addition to the legal costs to fight the commissioners, he says.

Still, the company was beginning to make some money to defray start-up costs until this fall. In October, the city Police Department stopped a practice of dispatching ambulance calls, Brodigan says.

Since then, he has spent at least

\$2,000 to man a switchboard 24 hours a day. That was merely a "half-hearted" measure, he says, since he could see the company could no longer stay in business. To do a good job, the company would have needed to spend \$5,000 a month, Brodigan claims.

Brodigan did not participate in the high overhead costs he encountered, either, he says. Although he raised his rates from \$75 a run, plus \$1.50 a mile, to \$95 a run, plus \$3.50 a mile, he had trouble meeting his personnel costs. He says the service was averaging five calls a day.

To staff the five ambulances full-time, he needed to pay eight technicians to be on call each day, in addition to two full-time emergency medical technicians, Brodigan says. He also was paying \$3,500 a month to lease the three newest ambulances.

"Magic Valley Regional Medical Center will be paying only \$1,000 a month to rent three ambulances from the state. However, that is only a temporary measure.

If the hospital is named as the permanent ambulance service, it will have to rent or buy other vehicles, Burns says. However, at that time, the hospital might be able to use some of the personnel already at the hospital to cut its costs, he says.

year 1985 represents a "tax-and-spend" big-government philosophy.

"There are a number of requests in the governor's message that tend to lead us away from the free enterprise system," Forry said.

The proposal to create a state Commerce Department was an example of what Forry viewed as Evans' attempt "to control the free enterprise system."

"He's using state government to try to undermine the self-reliance and independence of the individual citizen," Forry says.

Evans was traveling in northern Idaho Thursday and could not be reached to comment on the conservatives' charges, a staff aide said.

Winchester said the budget — which would boost state general fund spending by more than \$100 million over the current year's \$455 million level — was a product of "job protection and politics" by Evans and state administrators.

Winchester, a leader of the Idaho Conservative Political Action Committee, said a "Republican-Democratic-liberal coalition" controls the Legislature. But, he said, "we (conservative lawmakers) have sufficient public support" to halt the governor's budget plans.

The Kuna representative said he was most upset by Evans' plan to boost state spending for the public schools by about \$56 million, to \$272 million, during fiscal 1985.

He complained about the "incessant drumbeat for more money for education."

"We're here to say that the government educational empire... should not have any more money," Winchester said. "Better salaries do not mean better education. There's no evidence to support that."

"The education system 'is a regulated government monopoly,'" Winchester said. "All the money you put in there, you won't change a thing. What we need is competition."

Winchester said parents who send their children to private schools or teach them at home should be reimbursed for taxes they pay to support the public education system.

The reimbursements could be made in the form of "vouchers" or tuition-tax credits, he said.

The voucher system would increase private education and put pressure on the public system to improve, he said.

He said he expected an initiative drive would be started to establish a voucher system if the 1984 Legislature does not take action first.

11th execution called trend

JACKSON, Ga. (UPI) — John Eldon Smith, 50, "a very gentle man" whose wife convinced him he could be a hit man for the Mafia, died in Georgia's new electric chair Thursday.

"Hey, there ain't no point in pulling it so tight," he said, and, with a mischievous killer's grin, he told the guards strapping him into the chair.

Smith's execution — the second in two days in the South — marked the increasing pace of executions in the United States.

Of the 11 men put to death since the

Supreme Court lifted its death penalty ban in 1976, five have been executed this year. There are more than 1,250 others awaiting execution on the nation's death rows.

Smith was convicted of the 1974 shotgun murder of Ronald Atkins and his wife, Juanita. His case was taken twice to both the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals and the Supreme Court within 24 hours of his death.

"In Calhoun, Ga., Otis 'Rocky' Atkins, a brother of the victim, told reporters that 'we're not happy to see John Eldon Smith dead. We're happy to see that our justice system

has carried out the law."

But he said "if there was fairness in our system, there would be no alternative but to ... get Rebecca Smith and execute her for the murders. We are quite bitter she has gotten off as lightly as she has. She is the most evil person I have ever dealt with in my life. She manipulated him, brainwashed him, convinced him to do this for her."

Smith, a former New Jersey insurance salesman, sought no communication in his last hours with his wife, who is serving a life term for the murders.

WPPSS rescue pitched to group

SEATTLE (UPI) — Ratepayers in the Northwest should realize a settlement that pays bondholders of two terminated nuclear plants about 35 cents on the dollar will cost them less in the long run than no settlement, the chairman of a special governors' panel said Thursday.

Charles Luce, retired Consolidated Edison president and

former administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration, gave that view in a meeting with executive board members of the Washington Public Power Supply System.

Matter seen falling into black hole

PASADENA, Calif. (UPI) — The center of the Milky Way galaxy appears to be drawing in gases and other matter from as far away as 60 trillion miles and may be a black hole, a Caltech scientist said Thursday.

Dr. K.Y. Lo, assistant professor of

radio astronomy, said a paper on radiowave observations of the Milky Way's center was published Thursday in Nature magazine with a picture believed to be the first ever made of matter falling into a black hole.

A black hole is extremely dense matter with gravity so strong even light cannot escape and it draws in cosmic matter from its environment — in this case up to 10 light years or about 60 trillion miles.

The center of the Milky Way is about 26,000 light-years from Earth, so the phenomena observed by Lo and his colleague, research fellow Mark Claussen, occurred 30,000 years ago.

The importance of black holes, he said, is that they may explain "great bursts of energy known to occur in the universe, such as quasars, that scientists have not been able to account for."

The picture indicating existence of the black hole was made using the Very Large Array radio telescope in Socorro, N.M., in 1982. Lo said it has taken since then to analyze it and make a computer image.

"The picture being published itself doesn't say anything or show anything of the hole," Lo said. "What it shows is ionized gas, intricate streams of gas."

Gifted students steal computers

Blaine highway should follow rails

The Idaho Transportation Board was wise to purchase the abandoned Union Pacific Railroad right-of-way that parallels Idaho 75 in the Wood River Valley running north to Ketchum. Opposition to a proposed four-lane highway through the scenic valley has mounted over the years to protect the rustic Western environment that is integral to the quality of life and tourism of the area. But the most recent opposition to the state's plan to use the old rail bed for future highway expansion centers more on economic protectionism for the communities of Halley and Bellevue. Merchants in these towns fear the drop in business that may follow the rerouting of the thoroughfare.

Despite those concerns, the state must keep its eye to the future, as it is currently doing. Congestion of Idaho 75 will continue to mount, and at some point, using the existing rail bed will have the least environmental and community impact on the valley, while addressing a need that can't be ignored. Tourism provides the lion's share of the economic base of the valley. Both Bellevue and Halley can attribute their economic prosperity to this phenomenon.

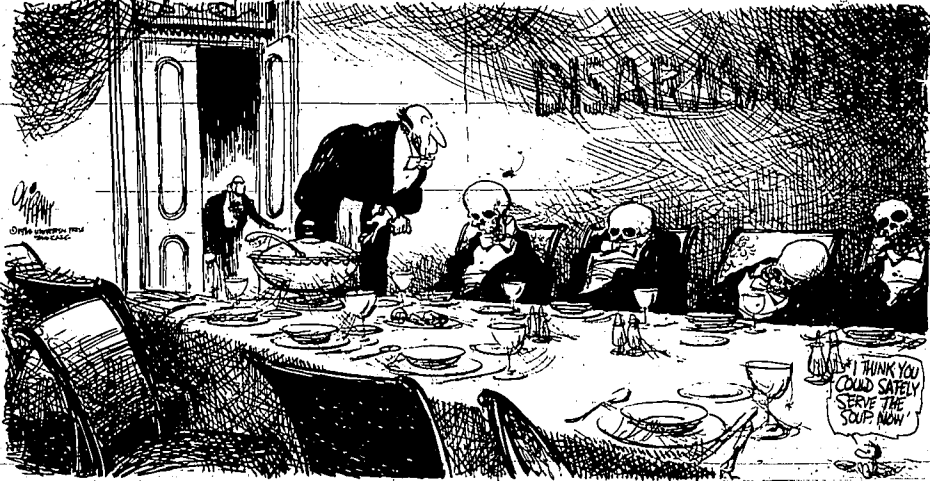
Providing modern transportation for the tourism industry, while enhancing the desirability of Halley and Bellevue as "bedroom communities" through easy access, will ensure the future economic well being of the valley.

In our view, stifling the transportation system is short-sighted protectionism for the very few.

The real issue must and will center on maintaining the environmental quality of the valley. By using an existing rail bed, which requires no condemnation of homes and property, and with careful landscaping and adequate funds to do the job right, Blaine County can improve its situation rather than mar it.

Dense highway traffic running through the center of small towns is not desirable. Neither is bumper-to-bumper traffic on a snowy night.

Further growth is inevitable, and with it will come further demands on transportation. It is better, in our opinion, to plan that growth for quality rather than simply allowing it to happen to us.



Gender gap is actually a caretaker gap

BOSTON—They came together, half-a-hundred women on a cold Sunday morning in a Boston suburb. Some were from the peace movement and some were from the equal rights movement. But they were meeting to bridge what one called "the agenda gap."

Ever since the women's vote emerged as a political reality, they had read that women differ from men on three distinct issues: "peace," "women's rights," and "fairness." At times, women's rights activists and peace activists had also diverged on the issues: ERA here and nuclear disarmament there. But this morning they were emphasizing what they shared.

Some of those attracted to the first of a planned series of such events across the country were well-known, like freeze leader Randy Foreberg, Rep. Pat Schroeder (D-Colo.), and nuclear alarm-sounder Dr. Helen Caldicott. Some were less known. But they all had a sense of how the "gender gap" issues overlapped.

Pat Schroeder described the connection between women's rights and peace with a single example. "The most frightening part of 'The Day After,'" she said to the group, "was the panel after." Once again, the nuclear experts assembled for TV were all male.

It was parallel, another woman agreed, to the single-sex population of nuclear disarmament talks. Women were on the outside protesting; men on the inside negotiating.

The link between peace and equality was clear to

these women: If women are not taken seriously because they are women, they won't be taken seriously in the pursuit of either equal rights or arms control. They would remain outsiders.

The third link to the "fairness" issue was equally clear. It must be understood, one woman reiterated slowly, that there is a relationship between a military budget that is going up and a social services budget that is going down, between the "masculinization" of the defense budget and the feminization of poverty. The others agreed.

As an observer, I found myself thinking about the underpinnings of this emerging female political coalition. It was notable to me that most of the women present were social workers, doctors, psychologists, teachers, clergy. It is this secret of the gender gap: that many women's personal and professional lives overlap, forming a constituency of caretakers.

Today, the same woman who traditionally places a greater value on peace may have added a non-traditional skepticism about male judgments. As a mother she may be a human services provider to her family. As a worker she may be a teacher, nurse, social worker. Every aspect of her personal

and professional life may conspire to give her a different outlook on current politics. The same woman who is a working mother with updated demands and expectations may go to a job with a budget that has been cut by the Reagan administration. There, she may engage daily with clients, patients, children, the elderly, whose lives have also been affected by the cuts in social programs.

With such a profile, it's not surprising that issues of peace, equity and fairness overlap. In polls, the same women who worry that Reagan will get us into another war also believe that the Republicans are less concerned with the poor, and also believe that Congress would be better off with more women. It's no surprise that the women most alienated from this administration, according to a New York Times poll, are single working mothers.

We don't know yet whether the amorphous "opinions" of women will crystallize into a voting bloc. We don't even know whether this Sunday meeting of the minds will become a movement. But it is becoming easier to sense the emotional glue of the gender gap. At the center of many women's lives, personal and professional, is a value of taking care of families, of each other, of the weak, of the future, or all of the above.

In real life, the gender gap isn't a series of separate-issue debates. It is a merger of women's self-interest and mutual interest. Call it, if you want, the caretaking gap.

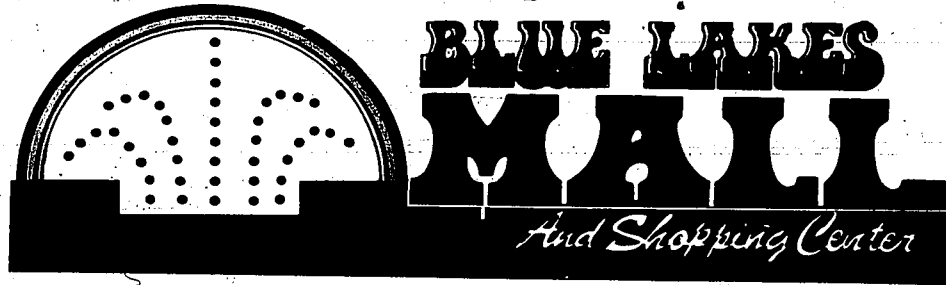

Study: Chains OK for contact lenses

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Contact lens buyers can cut their cost by one-third, without losing quality, by buying from chain outlets instead of from individual doctors or opticians, a federal study said Thursday.

The Federal Trade Commission study was assailed as unfounded by the American Optometric Association, but Pearle-Vision Centers, a major commercial lens fitter, called it "a major contribution to accurate consumer information."

The study questioned "claims that (state) restrictions on contact lens fittings (by) opticians and optometrists" are needed to protect the public from low-quality care.

FTC Commissioner Patricia Bailey said, in a statement she hopes the report helps obtain deregulation and assists "the some 20 million Americans who wear contact lenses in their search for high quality at affordable prices."

The bureau of consumer protection and economics bureaus conducted the two-year study. "A Comparative Analysis of Cosmetic Contact Lens Fittings by Ophthalmologists, Optometrists and Opticians."

It found no significant difference in the quality of fittings by commercial optometrists in chain stores, other optometrists, opticians or ophthalmologists. But it found a big difference in cost.

It said a survey of about 500 contact lens wearers in 18 cities found the average price for lenses, including

examination, ranging from \$119 to \$183 for hard lenses, and from \$150 to \$234 for soft lenses. Ophthalmologists were most expensive and commercial optometrists were the least expensive.

Dr. Timothy Kime, head of the American Optometric Association, said, "The report's conclusions suggest that cheap vision care is just as good as more comprehensive care. Our analysis shows that this has no basis."

"Moreover," Kime said, "it is unrealistic to expect that a survey of this nature could produce reliable results."

The FTC, defending the report, said it examined people who had contact lenses up to three years. Each was checked by a doctor for specific eye conditions.

Robert Hagman, president of the Opticians Association of America, praised the study for telling potential contact lens wearers they can "shop around for the service that fits (their) needs and pocketbook."

"Opticians who fit contact lenses provide the competition needed in any marketplace to make prices affordable," Hagman said.

Ophthalmologists — are — medical doctors who specialize in treating eye diseases and who may prescribe drugs, perform surgery and sell contact lenses. Optometrists also are doctors, trained to detect eye diseases. They may also examine eyes and prescribe and sell eyewear.

Fundamentalists target tree

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Hundreds of Bible-toting Christian fundamentalists urged President Reagan Thursday to leave the national Christmas tree dark until seven of their number are freed from a Nebraska jail.

Led by the wives and children of the seven, the demonstrators demanded Reagan order a Justice Department investigation of the case and urged him not to light the tree on the Mall Thursday night.

"President Reagan should not light the Christmas tree this evening... not until the light of freedom is burning across the land," said Gregg Dixon, pastor of Independent Baptist Temple of Indianapolis.

The demonstrators, chanting "Free the Nebraska Seven," protested the jailing on contempt-of-court charges of seven fundamentalist fathers from the Faith Christian School of Louisville, Neb. The school has been in a long legal dispute with Nebraska state authorities over its refusal to seek a teaching certificate for its teacher.

Reagan arranged to flip a switch in the White House Thursday evening, as he does every December, to light the giant Christmas tree on the grassy ellipse nearby.

The Nebraska dispute has led to previous confrontations between state authorities and church members and their supporters.

EPA unveils its national strategy on dioxin

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Environmental Protection Agency established a national policy Thursday for investigating and cleaning up sites contaminated with dioxin — one of the most "potentially dangerous chemicals to pollute the environment."

Noting dioxin is "associated in the public's mind with Agent Orange, Love Canal and Times Beach," EPA Deputy Administrator Alvin Alm

said the new policy includes identifying and ranking such sites by degree of danger. An environmental group protested that the plan called for too much research and not enough actual cleanup.

Dioxin is an unwanted byproduct in the manufacture of herbicides and in the incineration of some types of municipal waste. It is considered one of the most hazardous man-made substances

and is known to cause cancer, reproductive failure, reduced effectiveness of the immune system and other problems in laboratory animals.

The new EPA policy is the agency's first comprehensive effort to deal "with one of the most perplexing and potentially dangerous chemicals ever to pollute the environment," said Alm, the EPA's No. 2 official.

Tough plan posed to hike drinking age

WASHINGTON — A Republican congressman said Thursday there is precedent for a proposal to deny federal highway money to states with a legal drinking age under 21, and President Reagan should embrace the plan — not discourage it.

Rep. John Porter of Illinois criticized what he called Reagan's

"out-of-hand rejection" of the recommendation endorsed by the Presidential Commission on Drunk Driving.

Porter is the author of legislation introduced in April to cut off highway funds to states that do not raise their legal drinking age to 21 by Jan. 1, 1985. The presidential commission's report Tuesday also recommended such a fund cutoff, along with tougher sentences for drunken drivers.

Reagan has said he supports raising the drinking age to 21, but White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Tuesday, "We think it should be a state action." He said Reagan would take the recommendation for federal action "under advisement."

Porter cited the national speed limit of 55 miles per hour as a precedent for using the threat of cutting off federal money as a means to force the states to act.

"I would urge the president to embrace the report of his own commission," Porter told a news conference in his Washington office. "I think the president has received some very bad advice."

Porter said only raising the drinking age to 21 in all states would discourage young people from driving

to neighboring states to drink.

He said the border between Illinois, which has a drinking age of 21, and Wisconsin, where 19-year-olds may drink legally, is an area where many young people are killed or seriously injured due to drunken driving.

"We call that area 'Blood Border,'" he said.

"The establishment of a minimum drinking age has traditionally been considered within the scope of the state's police powers and as a result the federal government has not intervened in this area," Porter said. "My legislation conforms to this 200-year tradition by allowing the states to establish their own drinking age, yet providing a strong economic incentive for states to adhere to a minimum drinking age of 21."

Nuclear peace sought

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Canadian Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau took his campaign for East-West detente to the Oval Office Thursday, where President Reagan wished him Godspeed but did not discuss Trudeau's nuclear summit proposal in depth.

A senior American official said the two leaders spoke generally about world peace and the nature of communism, but "there was no discussion in detail of the peace initiative" Trudeau has carried to more than 30 world leaders, including Chinese Premier Zhao Ziyang.

Trudeau now has met with the leaders of four of the five nuclear nations — the United States, Great Britain, France and China — and has been invited to Moscow to talk about ways of reducing East-West tensions.

The official said Trudeau's proposal for a nuclear nation summit was not raised during their one-hour Oval Office meeting. Neither leader mentioned it in their statements afterwards.

But Trudeau's "broad thrust of engaging in dialogue with the East bloc was supported" by Reagan, the administration official said.

Blizzards smash Plains area

Blizzard-like conditions and deadly cold marched through the northern Plains Thursday, whipping snow into blinding whiteouts and forcing even snowplows off roads a week before the official start of winter.

"You read about the Olympics, the fights, motorcycle races, the Indi-

anapolis 500, all those wild and crazy things, but for pure daring and courage nothing can come close to 100,000 citizens of Duluth (Minn.) driving in a snowstorm," said Bob Cary, managing editor of the Ely Echo in nearby Ely, Minn.

Duluth got 2 inches of new snow Wednesday to top off a record 63.9 inches so far this season.

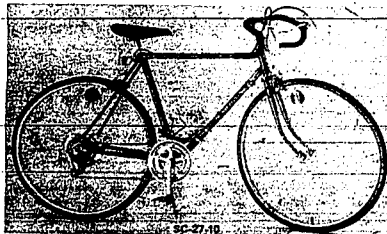

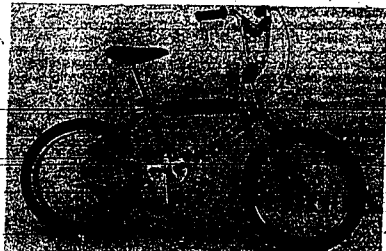

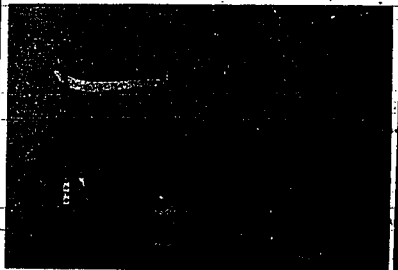

East-West troop reduction talks fizzle

VIENNA, Austria — Decade-long troop reduction talks — the last East-West military negotiations — were effectively suspended Thursday after the Soviet bloc's refusal to set a date for returning to the table.

A NATO spokesman at the 31st annual of the Mutual and Balanced Force Reduction talks said he had "urgent hope" the Warsaw Pact would return.

In Moscow, the official news agency

Tass reported, "The case for the resumption of the talks will be agreed upon later through diplomatic channels."

An East bloc spokesman, however, indicated the members of the communist bloc might not be willing to resume the talks in their current form.

The breakdown in the MBFR talks came after Moscow ended separate U.S.-Soviet talks in Geneva on strategic and medium-range nuclear missiles and followed months of warnings that the new deployment of U.S. missiles in Europe would "nega-

tively affect" the Vienna negotiations. The MBFR talks, the longest-running East-West negotiations, began in October 1973 in the height of détente. Little progress was made toward the goal of reducing conventional forces in Europe to 500,000 on each side.

The stumbling blocks in the talks were agreeing on what current troops levels are and how to verify any agreement.

"The Western side has proposed that ... we begin our next round of discussions on Jan. 26, 1984," Dutch

Ambassador Willem de Vos van Steenwijk, speaking for NATO, told a news conference after the final plenary session at the former Imperial Hofburg Palace.

"The East has proposed that we agree on the date for resuming our talks later through diplomatic channels, without any indication of when this would take place," he said. "We hope that the East will soon make a specific proposal."

Van Steenwijk said the West was ready to resume the negotiations Jan. 26 or any other date.

American nuns shot during thwarted jailbreak

LIMA, Peru — Eight convicts and an American nun took hostage in an attempted jailbreak were shot to death in a barrage of gunfire by officers of police, authorities said Thursday. Another American nun was wounded.

Police said the convicts shot back at officers but a nun who survived charged the inmates were armed only with knives.

Authorities identified the dead nun as Irish-born Joan Mary Sawyer of Boston, a naturalized U.S. citizen and

a sister of the Saint Columban Order. She died when an ambulance stolen by the convicts crashed into a bus moments after the jailbreak late Wednesday.

Peruvian President Fernando Belaunde Terry called the jailbreak a "real act of cowardice which has no name" and ordered an investigation.

The incident began when 10 criminals took five women hostages — three of them American missionaries — at the overcrowded Lirrigancho Jail in northeast Lima.

The five, including a Peruvian social worker who also was injured, were seized in the prison chapel

where they were giving religious instruction and rehabilitation classes.

The convicts then stole the ambulance and tried to break for freedom.

Witnesses said more than 50 police officers and marksmen who lay in wait opened fire on the ambulance, which careened into the bus. Police continued shooting and claimed the convicts fired back.

The shootout ended when the two surviving convicts gave up.

But a missionary who escaped unhurt, Sister Helen Conway, 47, also of Boston, said the convicts were armed only with knives.

"The prisoners did not have guns,"

she said, adding that after the shooting police piled up the dead and wounded "together as if they were animals. It was horrible the way they treated them."

One nun, Teresa Paterek, 33, of Braintree, Mass., of the Marista Sister Mission, was wounded by a gunshot in the right elbow, but was not believed to be seriously injured.

A fourth American woman, Ingerbol Zwirckel, a social worker who has lived in Peru for 20 years and worked on a popular Peruvian television program, was not hurt. She was reportedly in the jail to organize a Christmas art show for the inmates.

Salvador soldiers die

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (UPI) — A force of 3,000 leftist rebels seized a strategic volcano Thursday from government troops in northeastern El Salvador, killing 40 soldiers and wounding 25 in a fierce two-day battle, army sources said.

Military sources said fighting spread to the outskirts of Ciudad Barrios, a city of 5,000 on the western edge of Cerro Cacaualque, a 4,900-foot volcano that overlooks Francisco de Gótera, the Morazan province capital.

Civilians said Ciudad Barrios was "under siege" and that residents were trapped by the fighting. The residents said air force A-7 warjets bombed suspected rebel positions outside the city.

U.S. military advisers said Thursday the army had laid recapturing the city was captured on the volcano, where the army also has a major communications installation that was damaged earlier this year.

The rebel radio claimed U.S.-supplied A-7 warjets flew daylong sorties dropping 120 bombs in "the biggest deployment of the air force" in the war.

Guerrilla radio broadcasts claimed

100 soldiers were killed, 65 wounded and nine captured in the two-day battle for the volcano that ended a two-month lull in fighting in El Salvador's civil war.

An army source said the bodies of 40 soldiers were brought Wednesday to San Francisco Gotera and another 25 wounded soldiers arrived at the Morazan garrison on Cerro Cacaualque.

Military sources said they feared guerrillas could use it as a base to shell San Francisco Gotera.

Rebel Radio Venceremos said a 120mm howitzer capable of hitting the city was captured on the volcano.

Officials review documents critical of dump

BOISE (UPI) — Government officials began reviewing Thursday documents describing a Bruneau hazardous waste dump because discrepancies in engineering records have raised fears about groundwater contamination.

Environmental Protection Agency

spokesman Steve Provant confirmed a site that is partially filled with waste has a six-inch bottom rather than the five- to 13-foot thickness earlier believed.

He also said engineering drawings he reviewed Thursday show there is a brass valve leading from the floor of

the abandoned missile site to the ground below.

He said possible corrosion of the equipment could allow waste to be carried into the ground.

But Provant said he could not determine whether the findings pose a threat to groundwater supplies

without further investigation.

"Right now, it's just a question mark," he said. "I don't want to say there's any real need for alarm, but it's just a question we can't answer. But it should be a matter of concern until we find out."

Consultant says prison unusable

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho officials have been advised by a corrections consultant from Georgia to close a medium-security prison at Cottonwood within five years.

State Corrections Director Al Murphy said he was told by Allan Ault of Atlanta earlier this week that North Idaho Correctional Institute is unsafe due to several problems, including its wooden construction and antiquated electrical wiring.

The state-hired consultant, who said the state must find a new location for the prison as soon as possible, is expected to file a final report next week, Murphy said.

Ault, who officials said has coordinated the design and remodeling of prisons worldwide, believes the northern Idaho prison is unsafe for long-term occupation by inmates, Murphy added.

The prison, formerly used as a military radar station — houses about 140 medium- and minimum-security convicts, officials said.

Firm wants to drill for oil

IDAHO FALLS (UPI) — Targhee National Forest officials say they expect to spend seven months next year evaluating an application from a Colorado company for permission to drill a test oil well.

"We anticipate an application for a permit to drill by the first of the year," said John Preuss, minerals chief for the forest. He said the permit probably would be for land in the Palleades district, east of Idaho Falls near the Wyoming border.

The forest's annual list of planned environmental assessments for 1984 includes a seven-month period for review of an application by Anschutz Corp. of Denver.

However, a spokesman for the minerals firm said executives have not yet decided whether to begin full-scale exploration in the Idaho section of the Overthrust Belt.

"We did a lot of seismic work in the area this summer," said Randy Foutch, Anschutz' Rocky Mountain manager. "It was quite extensive and we are in the throes of evaluating all that now."

Loss endangering food for the poor

BOISE (UPI) — Idaho Hunger Action Council officials say the loss of a \$50,000 federal grant will cripple efforts to maintain a distribution system for surplus and salvaged food, particularly for commodities donated by private citizens.

"The situation in Idaho is really desperate," office manager Sheila Ison said Thursday. "There is no system of distribution in Idaho. That is what we were trying to develop, but we can't even get a grant for that."

Ison said President Reagan will announce this weekend a program for citizens to donate food for the needy during the holiday season, but only small, isolated food banks exist in Idaho to distribute the items.

County issues order in ambulance shutdown

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County commissioners have ordered Magic Valley Regional Medical Center to provide emergency ambulance service on a temporary basis — in the absence of Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services, a private company that went out of business Thursday.

In an emergency resolution signed Wednesday, the commissioners cited a "clear and present emergency, necessitating immediate expenditure of public money to safeguard the life and health of Twin Falls County inhabitants."

The commissioners have ordered the hospital to provide the service from noon Thursday until a permanent solution is found.

They also have issued a call for written proposals on how ambulance service should best be provided in the future. These must be delivered to the commissioners no later than 5 p.m. on Jan. 16.

The resolution resulted from a Wednesday

Ambulance crisis: chronology of events

1987: Cloyd Edwards establishes Magic Valley Ambulance Service. It continues as the sole ambulance service for 14 years. A county ordinance says ambulance services may be licensed on the basis of "need."

July 1981: Dennis Brodigan, a former employee of the State Emergency Medical Services Bureau, who moved to Idaho from Arizona in 1974, announces plans to start a competing ambulance company. He says it will provide better service at a lower price.

September 1981: The state charges Edwards' ambulance service with using unlicensed ambulances and sending un-

certified personnel — including Edwards — to provide emergency care. Edwards calls the investigation a "witch hunt" and accuses Brodigan of instigating it.

October 1981: After two months of controversy, Brodigan receives his operating license from the county commissioners. His company, Twin Falls Emergency Medical Services, goes into business.

January 1982: The county commissioners change the ordinance on ambulance licensing, to eliminate the section allowing regulation on the basis of need, and to facilitate competition. Talk of a buy-out of

Edwards by Brodigan has come to nothing.

May 1982: Magic Valley Regional Medical Center drops its "rotational-call" system between the two services for routine patient transfers, saying Brodigan's service is better.

August 1982: Brodigan buys out Edwards. No interruption in service.

July 1983: Brodigan tells hospital he is having financial difficulties. Hospital audits his books and recommends he move dispatching office into the hospital annex.

December 1983: Brodigan says he cannot afford to remain in business.

meeting between the commissioners, hospital administrator Bill Burns, hospital finance officer Jeff Taylor and Dennis Brodigan, the owner of defunct ambulance service. It was made under the authority of a state

law that authorizes county commissioners to provide ambulance service when it is lacking. State law, in general, grants counties broad powers to determine how ambulance service will be provided. These include using any

funds available to set up a county service, instituting a special ambulance fund, setting fees and levying a special ambulance tax.

It was logical the county should work through Magic Valley Regional Medical

Center, a county hospital, which has available facilities and personnel, Commissioner Judy Felton said Thursday.

The commissioners know little other than "heresy," before 10:30 a.m. Wednesday, that Brodigan was having severe business difficulties, said Commissioner Marvin Hempleman.

There has never been complaints about the quality of the service, said commission Chairman Anne Cover.

Cover said the county had no duty or authority to monitor Brodigan's business.

But county Coroner Cloyd Edwards, who once operated a competing service, says he had suspected that Brodigan was having trouble for a long time.

Edwards said Thursday that he has yet to decide whether he will submit a proposal to start an ambulance service again. "But I've got a lot of things I'd like to say," and he said he would hold a press conference today.

Until Jan. 16, the commissioners say there is no telling what direction the county will go.

Retired military officer tagged to tackle troubled hospital

GOODING — Dr. Diane E. Cutright of Gooding has been appointed administrator of the Gooding County Memorial Hospital.

Cutright was appointed at a hospital board meeting Thursday night. He was chosen from three finalists.

Acting administrator and board Chairman Monty Baker said, "We feel he is the best-qualified candidate."

The appointment follows the resignation of Ed Myers in November to accept a similar

position in the state of Washington.

The new administrator is a retired Army medical officer who served, from 1968 to 1973, as a director of the United States Army Institute of Dental Research at Walter Reed Medical Center and, from 1974 to 1980, as director of the United States Army Residency Training Program and continuing-education courses.

Cutright will begin his duties Jan. 1, with contract terms and salary yet to be negotiated.

However, board member Jodi Faulkner said the salary will not be more than the

\$33,400 that Myers earned.

Baker described Cutright as a good speaker and excellent public-relations man.

At Walter Reed, Cutright says he handled more than a \$1 million budget, oversaw research and patient research, directed a \$700,000 contract program and supervised a staff of 110.

He is a native of Idaho, who attended Billis schools through the 10th grade.

He earned his Ph.D. in 1965 from Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., and he received a health-care administration certificate in 1974 from the University of

Chicago.

Cutright and his wife returned to Gooding in 1980. He has been serving as a medical consultant for a variety of firms, including Johnson and Johnson Inc.

His other professional experiences includes teaching positions at Georgetown University and George Washington University, also in Washington, D.C., and working as consultant to the United States surgeon general, on research and oral pathology.

One of the first problems facing the new administrator will be the hospital's financial difficulties.

The problem was underscored Thursday by the presentation of the November financial statement. "Patient days are down, costs are up, and that tells the story," Baker told the board.

The report showed the hospital was operating at less than 90 percent of patient capacity, with a per-patient day income of \$267 and a per-patient day expense of \$304.

"We cannot continue operating a business at a loss," board member Rod Spackman said.

Baker said the board will have to consider raising room rates or cutting staff, or both, once the Cutright takes over.

Lawmakers discuss state budget woes

TWIN FALLS — What Rep. Tom Slivers jokingly refers to as the "annual dog and pony show" unfolded Thursday afternoon at the Turf Club, as Twin Falls-area legislators briefed several hundred Chamber of Commerce members on the upcoming legislative session.

There was a buffet-style meal of fried chicken and ham, a few good-natured jokes at radio personality James Koutrik and ample doses of pre-session political rhetoric.

Slivers, R-Twin Falls, led off by reaffirming his opposition to the state budget proposed Wednesday by Gov. John Evans. "Diverting funds from tax-

payers to the treasury isn't the best way to improve the economy," he said.

Evans has proposed a \$105 million increase in the budget for fiscal 1985, and he has proposed an average 24 percent increase in teachers' salaries.

Slivers, the speaker of the House, said he is "totally in favor of doing everything we possibly can to improve our educational system," but he cautioned that it can't all be done in January.

"The taxpayers are a little bit bloodied... due to the recession and last year's tax increase," Rep. Donna Scott, R-Twin Falls, said she has

spent much of her time since adjournment of the 1983 Legislature trying to become as knowledgeable as possible about the state's educational system.

Scott, who serves on the House Education Committee, said that during the past six months, she has visited almost all area schools, to find out "who our administrators are and who our students are."

With an "eye" toward a possible Kimberly-Murtaugh-Hansen schools consolidation, Scott predicted that the upcoming session will be a "great time to take hold and really do something, to see some real results of (educational) reform."

Scott was followed by Rep. Noy Bracken, R-Twin Falls, who reported that sometimes, legislators make mistakes. No said that the Legislature erred

1982 election returns tampered in Gooding

GOODING — Someone tampered with the election returns in Gooding County in the 1982 primary, but there is insufficient evidence to bring charges.

That was the report issued Thursday by the state attorney general's office, at the conclusion of an inquiry into the Third District Gooding County commissioner's race.

The suspected irregularities involved the Republican primary. Robert Thackeray of Wendell was declared the winner by two votes over challenger Everett Cox of Wendell, after a canvass and recount. Thackeray received 795 votes, while Cox got 793. A third candidate, Kurt Alert, polled 257 votes.

The irregularities were discovered when officials checked the actual count of the ballots against the figures shown in the precinct tally books. Several days after the election, a review was held in four of the county's 11 precincts.

The Gooding County commissioners declined comment on the background of the case Thursday.

However, at the time of the recount, she had said the number of ballots cast in the Third District commissioner's race did not match evidence reported by the election judges.

"Had the election fraud not been discovered," the attorney general's statement said, "the wrong candidate would have been put in office."

The state held its inquiry into the matter last month. The purpose was to determine if the false number of votes recorded suggested fraud or an innocent mistake, deputy attorney general Mark Haws said Thursday. The investigation also was intended to determine who was responsible for falsifying the vote count.

Haws said there was evidence to show a crime had been committed, but not enough to bring charges. Thirteen persons were subpoenaed for the two-day hearing, and 30 items of evidence were entered.

The Gooding County commissioners were not available Thursday evening for comment.

CSI first college to offer 2-year bank course

TWIN FALLS — The College of Southern Idaho will become the first college in the nation to offer a two-year degree in banking, starting this spring.

The college is also at the forefront of a move to take advantage of local professionals to instruct classes.

"The cost is minimal to the college. The banks pay their own people. It costs them mostly time," Curtis H. Eaton, a vice president of the Twin Falls Bank and Trust, said Thursday,

when the new program was announced at CSI.

Rather than hiring professors, CSI officials say classes will be taught by local bankers, chosen by the area American Institute of Banking.

The institute already is offering classes at the college for academic credit to bank employees. But during the spring semester, the classes will be open to CSI students for the first time.

The result should be a better-educated work force for local banks to choose from, says Mark Lange, of Twin Falls Bank and Trust. The classes

also will provide a chance for present bank employees to improve their skills.

Derogation of banks and other financial institutions means banks are offering new services. And ambitious employees can advance by learning skills needed for the new services, and they can make better career plans, bank officials say. The classes are also a good way for employees to keep up with changing technology, they say.

Idaho State University has agreed to accept CSI's banking and financial-services degree, and it will

expand its program to offer a four-year degree, CSI academic Dean Roy Strawser said Thursday.

Students interested in receiving a two-year banking degree from CSI will be able to choose courses such as "Money and Banking" and "Law and Banking." They also will need to take other college business courses in basic math and economics.

Strawser says he expects 160 students to sign up for the classes next semester, and he expects even more when the program becomes established.

Stivers: Addressing schools legislators' key job

FILER — Education legislation and funding will receive the highest priority this year in the Legislature, as it always does, Speaker of the House Tom Stivers said today. The Idaho Education Association met Wednesday evening.

But that does not mean the teachers will get all — or even a good deal — of what they want, the Twin Falls Republican said at a meeting with area legislators and teachers in Filer.

"Everyone wants a piece of the action this year," he says. "We'll do what we can to get a program carried out, as funds become available."

He also recommended that teachers support proposals "to the fullest extent you can," referring to a legislative committee's recommendation that teachers receive a 10 percent salary increase over the next two years. But the recommendation also calls for a form of merit pay, which the IEA traditionally has opposed.

Earlier in the meeting, IEA state Vice President Connie Hutchison of Twin Falls said the merit-pay

proposal had not worked in the past and was unlikely to work in the future. She also said that the IEA is calling for an additional raise of more than \$1,000 a year for teachers.

However, Stivers said that without an extension of the temporary sales tax approved earlier this year, the governor will not have the additional \$44 million that he has proposed spending on education.

And Stivers said he will not support extension of the 1.5 percent sales tax. The tax was not made as a permanent commitment and should not be treated as such, he said.

by not providing the State Land Board with an additional \$250,000 in funds for the current budget.

If the board had been granted the money, it could have prepared for timber sales that would have brought an additional \$1.5 million into the state treasury, he said.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, cited the death of state mine inspectors as a potentially hot issue to be faced by the upcoming Legislature.

Earlier this week, the State Land Board proposed a moratorium on the issuance of new dredge and placer

permits, until the funding of enforcement programs is beefed up. If the Legislature does not act on this request, Noh predicted "a very strong (public) reaction."

Noh also spoke about a water users' fee that will be proposed during the 1984 session. The fee, which has won the support of the Idaho Water Users Association, would help sort out the state's tangled water-rights claims, he said.

The proposed fee would cost from 2 to 10 cents per acre-foot for most consumptive water users, less for non-consumptive users.

In arranging permanent ambulance service.

They said Thursday that they have solved the immediate crisis. As a result of the proposals, "we hope we have some good (long-range) ideas," Hempleman said.

"We'd like to see a high-quality service, something that meets previous standards," Felton said. But "we don't want to subsidize anybody."

The question of subsidies has surrounded the provision of ambulance service in Twin Falls County for several years.

For 14 years, until 1981, ambulance service had been provided by Edwards, who received \$700 a month from the county for it.

In the summer of 1981, however, Brodigan applied to the commissioners for a license to compete with Edwards.

There was considerable controversy whether to grant it.

Brodigan argued the principles of private enterprise should prevail, and that he could provide a better service at a lower price than Edwards.

But Edwards said there was no room for two companies, and that competition would drive both out of

business.

A general issue — whether competition is appropriate in the ambulance business — also surfaced.

Arguments in favor of free enterprise eventually prevailed. However, attorney Mark Stubbs, representing Edwards, said ambulance service best could be provided in a way similar to any other essential service, by regulated monopoly.

Hempleman said the "no" at the time for the county to discontinue the subsidy. And so when the commissioners granted Brodigan a license in October 1981, they told him he would be on his own.

It followed that when Brodigan bought out Edwards the following summer, the \$700 subsidy was discontinued, the commissioners say.

Brodigan says he and his business partner Charles Griffen, a Tucson dentist, always counted on the county subsidy. And he says when he bought out Edwards, the commissioners promised it to him in "closed-door" negotiations.

He said when he applied for it after he became the sole ambulance company, the county turned him down, "in no uncertain terms," he says.

State plans several highway projects

SHOSHONE—Several construction projects are in the making for the Magic Valley, all aimed at making travel safer for motorists.

Richard Sorensen, a design engineer with the Division of Highways office in Shoshone, said this week that seven miles of U.S. 93, north of its intersection with Idaho 25, are scheduled for reconstruction next summer.

Bids for the project will be opened Dec. 20 in Boise. This summer's project will involve the building of irrigation structures, with the actual road work done during the summer of 1985.

"Overall, we will be building two new traffic lanes just east of the present two-lane highway, but they

will be wider and much safer," Sorensen says.

This stretch of the highway—which carries heavy traffic during the summer and the winter—has had numerous accidents in the past several years, he says. The reconstruction is designed to eliminate dangerous blind spots and curves, Sorensen says.

Presently, there are several no-passing areas because of the hilly terrain. These will be eliminated in the new highway.

The existing seven miles of two-lane road will be abandoned when the project is completed, but only until such time as traffic warrants a four-lane highway, Sorensen says. Then, it could be reconstructed.

Two other area highway improvements also are scheduled for the near future. One involves the permanent

reconstruction of the intersection of U.S. 93 and Pole Line Road, just south of the Ferrine Bridge in Twin Falls. And in conjunction with this, the state will install a of new traffic light at West Addison Avenue and Martin Street in Twin Falls.

Bids for the U.S. 93 and Pole Line Road project will be taken just after the first of the year, Sorensen says.

The widening of the intersection, which was done recently, was only a temporary improvement. The permanent improvement will include traffic dividers and left-turn lanes for traffic going both east and west from U.S. 93.

Sorensen says the project also will include widening the road for about a quarter-mile in each direction from the intersection.

Although the Twin Falls Highway District is not involved in the state

improvement, district manager Floyd Dayley says the highway district also has some improvements scheduled for Pole Line Road.

The district will widen a curve east of U.S. 93, where Pole Line and Eastland Drive meet. Right of way is being acquired and the work is planned for this summer, Dayley says.

Sorensen says the state also is planning to upgrade the North Five Points intersection in Twin Falls. Plans call for a fully traffic-activated signal system, which would be controlled by the traffic flow, rather than the current timed signal system.

"There is one lane (on East Addison) that sort of disappears after the driver gets past the intersection," Sorensen says. "We will remedy this along with the new signal system."

Comprehensive plan still in limbo

SHOSHONE—Questions concerning Shoshone's comprehensive plan still remain to be answered. The Shoshone City Council met recently with Lincoln County com-

mission Chairman Doug Hansen to discuss the proposed plan and the "impact zone" for the city.

At that time, council members indicated that the plan would not be adopted until the question of zoning jurisdiction in the impact area is resolved.

At issue is who will administer the impact area, which lies outside city limits, and whether county zoning laws will continue to apply to the area once it is included in the city's zone of influence.

The impact zone boundaries, as de-

fined in the proposed comprehensive plan, extend up to one mile east of town, three-quarters mile north and a half-mile south and west.

Hansen was unable to give specific answers to the questions, so the matter was taken under advisement.

Once a comprehensive plan is adopted, it will serve as a guide for the preparation of city zoning laws.

The plan was presented at a sparsely attended public hearing in October, following two years of study by Shoshone's Planning and Zoning Commission.

Appeals court reduces prison term of rapist

TWIN FALLS—The state Court of Appeals has taken five years off the 30-year prison sentence of a Mexican national convicted of raping an elderly Twin Falls woman in the summer of 1982. Despite the ruling, defense attorney Mike Powers of Twin Falls says the sentence still is steep.

In a decision last week, the appeals court justices said that the modified sentence of Jose Gonzalez Martinez would meet the concerns of Fifth District Court Judge Daniel Meehl, who imposed the original punishment.

According to court records, the 25-year-old Martinez admitted breaking into the home of the woman, who was in her 70s, and raping her. During the court proceedings, Martinez required an interpreter because he could not speak, understand or read English. Martinez, who had no serious criminal record before the incident, was not an American citizen. He had lived in the area about four months prior to his arrest.

Upon conviction, Meehl sentenced Martinez to 30 years in prison, but he did not "fix" the length of the sentence, which means Martinez could be eligible for parole at an earlier date. Powers appealed in November 1982.

Powers said this week he may ask for a further sentence reduction when Martinez is brought from prison to Twin Falls for re-sentencing, which will be held to comply with the appeals court ruling.

Highway district lacks money for rebuilding

BLISS — "Our annual budget just isn't enough," said Bliss highway district Commissioner Jim Brizendine.

With a budget under \$100,000 a year, the district barely manages to keep some roads patched, but can't build any new roads or make improvements," said Brizendine at the recent Bliss highway district meeting.

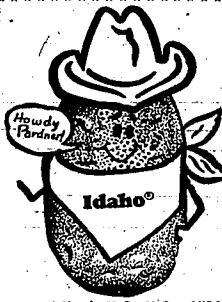
He said employee wages take approximately one-third of the budget. Bliss has two full-time employees and one part-time. According to the commissioners, the employees are the lowest paid highway district workers in Gooding County.

"Our budget money is up about 15 percent over the last 10 years, but inflation has hit some items 50 to 300 percent," says Brizendine. "Fuel, for instance, is up from 20 cents a gallon to about \$1, a 500 percent increase." Asphalt patching material this year alone took over \$20,000.

Chairman Fred Hainline said a large portion of the highway district gets no tax money for maintenance. "What money we do get is distributed on a per capita basis," says Hainline. "But Bliss is a sparsely populated area."

Highway Commissioner Ron Stroud said he had talked to Gooding County commissioners about the problem and getting some help but that no help is forthcoming.

In other business, the highway commissioners announced the reelection of Ron Stroud to the highway district commission for a four-year term.

Bruins stomp Minico

TWIN FALLS — Combining the powers of mind and body, the Twin Falls Bruins girls gained their first Gen. State Conference victory Thursday night by defeating the Minico Spartans, 57-37.

The Bruins helped themselves mightily with a pair of 12-2 binges — one in each half — both curtailing serious Minico rallies.

What truly distinguished Twin Falls' performance throughout, Coach Paul Stover believed, was increased intelligence.

"This is the first time we played with any kind of mental control at all," he said. "We moved the ball better on offense and got everybody involved in the offensive scheme of things. Defensively, everybody was in the right position at the right time. It was just more of a team effort."

The first time that effort was evident occurred in the second quarter. Minico, after leading at the outset, had fallen behind 14-6 but surged back to within 14-10 with 6:30 left in the half on Melanie Bennett's 12-foot jumper.

Then the Bruins took off on their first 12-2 streak, lasting almost exactly three minutes. Karie Willey, who notched a game-high 16 points, began the romp by scoring underneath at 6:18. Seconds later she intercepted a Spartan pass and fed Alma Hernandez, who relayed to Malin Miller for another basket.

Twin Falls continued its rampage as Tricia Swartling scored and Hernandez canned two free throws and passed to Miller for another bucket. It ended with Marcie Snow's 10-footer at 3:12 which gave the Bruins a 26-12 cushion.

Such resilience especially pleased Stover.

"To this point, whenever anybody put any kind of pressure on us, we'd fold in a very game," Stover said. "We held together really well tonight."

The Bruins had to hold together again in the final period, which they entered holding an eight-point lead. Tina O'Donnell scored the Spartans with 11 points, brought them to within six, 36-30, by following in a missed shot at 7:23. Twin Falls scored three consecutive baskets, but Monica Vela and O'Donnell responded with hoops for Minico, making the difference 42-34 with less than five

minutes remaining.

Twin Falls responded with its second "burst," aided by two baskets apiece from Hernandez and Willey and one each by Heidi Hansen and Miller. Miller's, a breakaway layin following a steal, came with 2:15 to go and gave the Bruins a 54-36 bulge.

Minico Coach Carol Bradshaw lamented her team's numerous turnovers and its inability to find players like O'Donnell underneath enough. "We didn't move the ball quickly enough to get it inside," she said.

Kuhn suspends drug users for 1984 season

NEW YORK (UPI) — Baseball commissioner Bowie Kuhn, showing no leniency, suspending players Willie Wilson, Willie Alkens, Jerry Martin and Steve Howe for one year Thursday for their use of illegal drugs.

Howe's suspension will be reviewed at the end of one year, as to continuation or termination, the commissioner said. The suspension of the other three players will be reviewed on May 15, 1984, with the possibility of reinstatement at that time. None of the players will be permitted to play in any games during the period of their suspensions.

"As a sport, we have been very fortunate. The problems of illegal drugs have not been epidemic," said Kuhn. "Nonetheless, we have recognized our players are models for young people and must behave accordingly. We accordingly have a program in 1981 to require each club to have its own employee assistance program. We also adopted rules clearly prohibiting the possession and use of illegal drugs while at the same time extending treatment and rehabilitation to players voluntarily coming forward. This has always been our primary objective.

From Kansas City, Mo., Royals' general manager John Schuerholz said he's glad the whole affair is behind his club.

"This afternoon we were informed by the commissioner's office of Commissioner Kuhn's decision," said Schuerholz. "We know the commissioner has given this decision a great deal of thought over a long period of time. We do not plan any further discipline. Having been handed this decision, we can now look forward to the 1984 season with clarity and plan accordingly."

Baseball reporter Joseph Duroso of the New York Times was allowed to interview Kuhn for further comment.

"About the severity of the decision," Kuhn said, "this was two different situations. In the Howe case, that is clearly a year we are dealing with and could be longer, depending on a review at that time. In the Kansas City case, the decision is pending for a review by somebody other than me on May 15."

"Yes, we have notified the Players Association. We've talked to Don Fehr and Mark Belanger. They came in and gave us their views and we don't know how the Players Association will react. If it goes to arbitration, we could be overruled."

"I think there's a message in today's decision: we take the drug problem seriously. We are going to do what is reasonably necessary to protect our game."

Although Howe has never been convicted of any wrongdoing with respect to drugs, he has repeatedly broken his probation. Howe was fined \$54,000 by the Dodgers last year, with Kuhn's blessing, following a one-month mid-season hospitalization for excessive drinking.

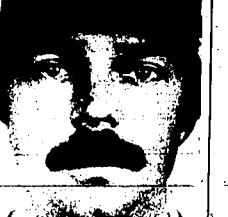
He was suspended for the first time when he arrived late for a game at Dodger Stadium and suspended a third time when he missed the team plane to Atlanta for a crucial series against the Braves late in September.

The Dodgers announced Wednesday they would keep Howe regardless of Kuhn's ruling.

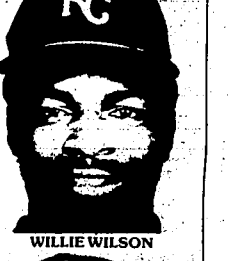

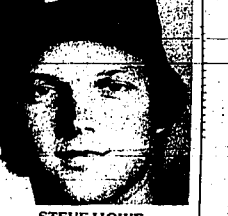

Bel and Howe's agent, Tony Attanasio, contended that because Howe has not been convicted of drug charges and his drug involvement is the result of an emotional "illness" he should not be punished.

Fehr, counsel for the Major League Players Association, was extremely disappointed with the verdict.

It doesn't seem to serve any beneficial purpose, and appears to be directly inconsistent with what the judge in Kansas City had to say."

Two rookies start in all-AFC backfield

NEW YORK (UPI) — Curt Warner of Seattle and Earl Campbell of Houston, the American Football Conference's two top rushers this season, will join Miami freshman quarterback Dan Marino in the AFC backfield against the NFC in the Pro Bowl at Honolulu on Jan. 29.

Warner, a former Penn State All America, gained 1,333 yards on the ground in annexing the rushing title in his first year at the Pro Bowl, a veteran of the 1,000 yard club, totaled 1,206 as AFC runner-up.

Marino, the AFC's No. 1 rated passer who has led the Dolphins to an 11-4 record and the AFC Eastern Division championship, will be the first rookie to start as quarterback since the Pro Bowl began in 1950.

The only other rookie to make the AFC team is Baltimore guard Chris Hinton.

The Los Angeles Raiders, AFC West champion, and Miami accounted for one third of the conference's 40-man team announced Thursday. The Raiders contributed seven players and Miami six for the annual NFL All-Star game.

The starting offensive line consists of Miami center Dwight Stephenson,

The starting linebacker unit is made up of Cleveland's Chip Banks, Los Angeles' Rod Martin and Pittsburgh's Jack Lambert — who will be appearing in his ninth Pro Bowl.

The secondary features cornerback Lester Hayes of Los Angeles and Gary Green of Kansas City, and safeties Deron Cherry of Kansas City and Kenny Easley of Seattle.

New England's Rich Camarillo is the punter, Pittsburgh's Gary Anderson is the kicker and Los Angeles' Gregg Pruitt the kick returner.

Four of San Diego will be the backup quarterback, with Wes Chandler of San Diego and Mark Duper of

Miami the backup wide receivers. Other offensive reserve players are tackle Brian Holloway of New England; guard Ed Newman of Miami; center Mike Westling of Pittsburgh; tight end Kellen Winslow of San Diego and running backs Tony Collins of New England and Joe Cribbs of Buffalo.

USFL to challenge NFL for TV, fans' favor in fall season

NEW YORK (UPI) — Donald Trump, owner of the New Jersey Generals, envisions the United States Football League switching to the fall season in about two to three years to compete head-to-head against the National Football League.

Speaking at a New York Post sponsored forum of New York City sports entrepreneurs last week, Trump said he would like to see the league compete head-to-head against the NFL. Trump told an audience of about 800 businessmen that ticket sales for USFL teams were skyrocketing and NFL owners were beginning to become concerned.

"USFL ticket sales are going through the roof," said Trump. "The Generals will have at least 40,000 ticket sales this year. We could have 50,000 and if we have a good team we'll probably fill the stadium."

"I believe that over the next two or three



years the USFL — after it becomes competitive and we're taking a lot of NFL players — will switch seasons. I see this league going from the spring and summer into the fall and winter and competing directly against the NFL. I'll be able to challenge the Giants and the Jets and everyone else. The league is becoming very popular.

"Leon Hess (owner of the Jets) is right now very concerned as are all NFL owners. They

are being forced to sign second-string quarterbacks for \$700,000 or \$800,000 when they were getting ready to sign them for \$150,000."

Trump, who said he hoped to have former Jets coach Walt Michaels signed as the Generals' head coach by Friday, indicated he had signed several NFL players to contracts for next season, but he refused to divulge their names.

"We have personally signed a lot of players who have not yet been announced because we don't feel that we want to announce it during the middle of their seasons since many of them are going to NFL playoffs," he said.

Trump admitted, however, that he had his sights set on signing quarterback Brian Sipe of the Cleveland Browns and linebacker Lawrence Taylor of the New York Giants in the near future.

"We have been seeking the services of Brian Sipe. He was the MVP two years ago, his contract is up and we think he's probably the best quarterback available," Trump said. "That doesn't mean we're going to sign Brian Sipe but I feel we're very close to it. Within a period of time, Lawrence Taylor has a contract that will expire and I say that upon the expiration of his contract Lawrence Taylor, probably the best player in football, will be playing for the Generals."

Trump said the USFL was looking to expand its television coverage and would like to drop ESPN, the cable sports network that carried most of the league's games last season.

"ESPN is a contract we frankly would not like to go on with," said Trump. "We unfortunately have to go on with the USFL. Their revenues are

not very large. Our focus is on ABC and local television, which very much wants to broadcast the games."

"We have an extremely good relationship with ABC. We did much better than anyone anticipated. Our championship game was one of the biggest winners of the summer."

Trump said that the USFL was no longer trying to sign college underclassmen, but he felt both professional leagues will be forced by the courts to draft them in the future.

"We're not doing anything with underclassmen, since we signed Herschel Walker, but the courts will determine whether we do anything or not," Trump added. "We entertain the legal picture, and not the big picture. Sometimes the legal picture is totally different and that hurts. I feel the USFL, NFL, for legal reasons, will have to go for underclassmen."

Rockefeller nixes change

CHARLESTON, W.Va. (UPI) — The chairman of the baseball commissioner selection committee said Thursday he would not comment on a statement by West Virginia Gov. Jay Rockefeller that he had been contacted about the commissioner's job.

"I just don't comment on any candidates, or alleged candidates, and I have to underscore alleged," said Allan "Bud" Selig, president and chief executive officer of the Milwaukee Brewers.

The chairman was questioned about Rockefeller's statement at a high school football banquet Tuesday that he was approached by the commissioner search committee. The two-term Democratic governor told the Gilbert High School crowd he told the committee members he was not interested in being considered for the commissioner's position.

Sun Valley's Taylor named to skiing hall of fame

ISHPEMING, Mich. (UPI) — Dorice Taylor of Sun Valley heads a list of five people who have been selected for induction into the National Ski Hall of Fame for their contributions to the advancement of skiing in the United States, it was announced Thursday.

Bill Downs of Helena, Mont., chairman of the selection committee, said the inductees for 1984 are: Graham Anderson of Seattle; Bob Beattie of Aspen, Colo.; Ernest Dion of Lebanon, N.H.; Pete Seibert of Ogden, Utah, and Taylor.

The five will be inducted in ceremonies scheduled for May 1984 in Ishpeming, Down said. Their induction will bring to 248 the number of athletes and sports builders so honored in the last 30 years.

Taylor, 82, has been with Sun Valley through three ownerships, where she gained wide respect for her colorful press releases. In 1971, she became the first woman to win the National Ski Writers Association's top honor. She capped her career in 1980 by authoring the 270-page book, "Sun Valley."

Bengals won't renew Griffin's contract

CINCINNATI (UPI) — The Cincinnati Bengals Thursday parted company with running back Archie Griffin, ending an 8-year relationship with the nation's only two-time Helmsman Trophy winner that never quite reached fulfillment.

Griffin's contract with the Bengals expires following this season and club officials informed him they won't be offering him another contract. Griffin is now free to negotiate with any other NFL team or with the United States Football League.

The former Ohio State star was Cincinnati's second draft choice in 1976. Big in desire but small in size (5-foot-0), Griffin was unable to dart past the bigger, quicker pro defensive players as he had in college.

Griffin, 29, missed this entire season because of injuries, although he is now nearly 100 percent healthy. Griffin recently has been considering a switch to the USFL, but until Thursday it was assumed the Bengals

also would make him a new contract offer.

"We told Archie we don't intend to make him an offer," said Bengals' assistant general manager Mike Brown. "That means he can sign with an NFL team or with a team in the USFL. He's free to negotiate and come to an agreement with another team at any time. We didn't want to bring Archie back next summer and then have to let him go at that time."

"We wanted to give Archie the chance to have as much latitude as possible and not feel he would be limited to the USFL if he wants to continue in football," added Brown. "We wanted to give him the option of staying in the NFL if he so chooses."

Brown said the Bengals feel they will have adequate running back strength without Griffin.

"We're strong at running back," he said. "We have a complement of five running backs now and will probably add to that in the draft."

"Men are wise in proportion, not to their experience, but to their capacity for experience." - George Bernard Shaw.

Take a look at today's West hand and the bidding. If you think that West's lead is automatic, look again. A more-effective-lead-might be available.

West led the top of his solid sequence and South's diamond ace won. A club was led to dummy's king to push a spade through East and East's ace won. East shifted to a trump to West's ace and West led another trump to reduce the spade ruffs in dummy. The idea was good but timing lead. There are South won the trump, cashed the spade king and managed two spade ruffs in dummy. Then he ruffed a club to draw the last trump and the defenders got only a spade, a diamond and a club.

West beats the game if he leads a low trump instead of the enticing diamond queen. Dummy wins and leads a spade, but East hops up quickly with his ace. A second trump is won by West's ace and a third trump lead destroys declarer's plan. Dummy is left with only one trump, the spades cannot be established and the game falls one short.

Should West find the killing timing lead? There are no guarantees, of course, but North's bidding offered clues that South would ruff spades in dummy. And when

Sneed Brothers perform benefit

TWIN FALLS — Country western music that has earned acclaim from Nashville to Las Vegas will be available to Magic Valley music enthusiasts tonight in Twin Falls.

The Sneed Brothers and Suzie, a country western band, will be back on familiar ground when they perform in the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium for a St. Benedict's Hospital Foundation benefit.

In the audience will be the Sneed parents, Don and Iva Sneed of Twin Falls, applauding their sons and daughter-in-law and the three others who play with the Sneed group.

There will also be a number of fans who may recall when the Sneed Brothers played at the Alley in Twin Falls and performed in Jackpot, Nev., earlier in their careers.

The show begins at 8 p.m. and general admission tickets will be available at the door.

Billed as "the world's greatest family show group," the former Twin Falls brothers began their musical career at the age of 9, 9 and 10, says Iva Sneed as she looks at an early photo of the boys and their father.

"They won a talent contest that weekend (the date of one of the photos) and started touring."

Today the family entertainment group, under the leadership of Les Sneed, the oldest brother, travels throughout the world, performing concerts and in night clubs.

The musicians' father Don Sneed, said it all started because of a truck accident in 1953, although he had played numerous musical instruments in bands prior to that time.

"I suffered a back injury and had to have a way to make a living," he said. "The boys were pretty good at various musical instruments, so we formed the Sneed Family Group. We traveled over Washington and a few

other places putting on shows."

Sneed said in 1957 they started work at the Horseshoe Club in Jackpot, Nev., and later played at Cactus Pete's. From 1960 to 1962 the Sneed Family had the reputation of being one of the best stage groups on the Nevada Circuit.

In 1975, Don said he returned to the Twin Falls area, to look for property to buy and the boys began performing at the Alley and for special events.

For a time they separated and played as individuals with other groups.

Les played in bands performing with such major stars as Barbara Mandrell, Donna Fargo, Merle Haggard, Waylon Jennings, Charlie Pride and Wayne Newton.

Don Sneed, Jr., is the top showman of the team and a versatile singer-entertainer. He entertained for two and one half years in the

Carriage House Hotel in Calgary, Canada, before returning to the United States.

Youngest of the family, Danny Sneed, is considered by most country musicians as one of the best steel guitar players ever to come out of the west.

Suzie, Les' wife, adds to the group with her vocal and other musical talent.

Their appearances range from Nashville to Canada, to Las Vegas, and they are in constant demand.

Carl Raids, music director for KLIJ Radio in Twin Falls, recently accompanied Don and Iva Sneed to Wendover, Nev., to catch a Sneed Brothers performance.

"When you talk about the Sneed Brothers, you are talking about the peak of professionalism," Raids said. "I play a lot of their records, but to see them in person is a whole

new experience."

"You could bring in the biggest names in country music like Kenny Rogers, Dottie Ferton, or whoever, and you wouldn't get a better show."

"We saw three shows in Wendover and we didn't dare leave our seats between shows. There was a large crowd waiting to get in during all three of the performances," he added.

There are now seven musicians in the group. Three other musicians have been added to increase the scope of the group's performances.

The performance tonight in the CSI auditorium will provide an hour and a half of favorite country music and entertainment.

Tupperware of Jerome is assisting in bringing the musical group to Twin Falls so most of the ticket sales revenue can go to the remodeling fund at the hospital.

Satellite TV is big business

Hailey firm gets own ZIP code

HAILEY — It may seem a bit odd for a town of just over 2,000 people, but Hailey has added another ZIP code.

The ZIP, 83339, however, is not for general use. It is for the exclusive use of CommTek Publishing Co., a Hailey firm that specializes in magazines to consumers and businesses involved in satellite television.

Although the exclusive zip code was given to the company to relieve the sorting burden of the company's large volume of mail on the Hailey Post Office, it also is a tribute to the amazing growth of the company in the last three years.

CommTek publishes four magazines, one each to owners of home satellite dishes, dealers and manufacturers of satellite equipment, cable television operators and viewers around the world.

The company's largest seller is the consumer-oriented Satellite ORBIT magazine that began publication in November 1982 and, as of this week at less than one year old, has reached a circulation of more than 82,000 in North America.

However, that figure is only part of the story that indicates the success of the magazine.

At present, new subscriptions are coming in at a rate of 8,000 to 10,000 a week and the company's owner and publisher, David Wolford, expects the

magazine's subscribers to triple in 1984.

"We've tripled every year since 1981," Wolford says of the company's growth that has paralleled the growth of the satellite television industry.

Sales of home satellite dishes reached 250,000 this year, says Bruce Kinnaid, executive editor of three of the company's four magazines. In 1984, that number is expected to triple.

By the end of next year, Kinnaid says, there will be up to 1 million home dish owners who are potential customers for Satellite ORBIT.

Wolford expects his company to gross a minimum of \$5 million in 1983; \$15 million in 1984.

That phenomenal growth has crowded the halls of CommTek's two office buildings.

In the last year, the number of the company's employees has more than doubled, possibly tripled — it's hard to keep count anymore — to more than 70 people. If the trend continues, CommTek will become Hailey's largest employer sometime in 1984.

In 1982, Wolford built two three-story COMMTEK on Page E10

Recently, the Carey artist was commissioned by the National Wildlife Federation to do some watercolor stamp designs.

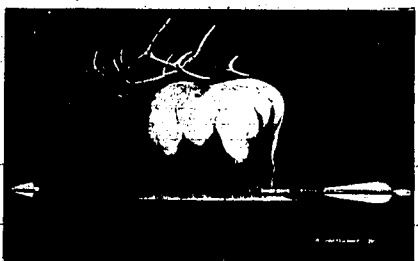
Additionally, the Buzzard Council of America, headquartered in South Bloomington, Minn., has sent Gilbert notification of his acceptance as a member of BCA.

Average computer buyer lacks any hands-on experience

EDITOR'S NOTE: The Times-News wanted to find out just what is available locally in the way of computers. So, it sent a group of writers out into the stores to find out. He came back and reported "It's a jungle." But he also came back with a bit of information that just might be helpful for anyone in the market for one of the electronic wizards.

TWIN FALLS — If you're a first-time home computer buyer and have been checking the local market, your mind is probably agog at the bewildering jungle of brands and models, technical complexity and obscurity of in-store jargon.

You might suffer nightmares of being "bit" by a malware, or worse, suffer the awful "byte" of an angry hexadecimal.

If you're buyer ignorant when entering a computer shop, it appears that you're part of an overwhelming majority. Averaging the estimates of six area retailers — three department stores, one computer-electronics specialty store, two straight-line computer dealers — it appears that nearly 80 percent of customers have never had a "hands-on" experience with a computer.

In fact, one phone spoken time and again by these retailers is that advice, students with classroom experience have become the avant-salesmen of computers.

"A kid will bring his parents in, then stand there and assume the role of a salesman," one store manager says. "Our staff's main job is to act as interpreter between the kid and parent."

Another retailer says that after the youngster shows the parent how the machine operates and what it can do, the adult gets excited about his own uses for it.

Nationwide, the home computer industry has grown by megatons since its beginning in 1975 to the two million that were shipped by manufacturers in 1982. Industry analysts predict six million will be shipped in 1983.

Exploding right along with it is a software market that is growing exponentially to satisfy the burgeoning needs and whims of a hungry public anxious for new gaming packages as well as those that provide programs for education, home and small business budgeting, and informational topics.

The home computer business has a great deal to offer, but also suffers the same serious fault that afflicted the early automobile industry: a legion of products, each with its own standards and capabilities, screaming for the consumer's pocketbook.

And, this is what places the proverbial monkey on the computer buyer's back. When buying, he must ask

himself, "Is this company going to be in business next year? Will I be able to get service and software after making this investment?"

Is this computer manufacturer the only one writing programs for his product, or do other software companies feel secure enough in the manufacturer's survival strength to risk putting out software for his computer?

Most of all — is this the computer that I want, at the price that I can afford, and can it grow with my needs?

So, how do you find answers to these perplexing questions?

One local store manager suggests that a non-knowledgeable buyer might start by purchasing an unbiased buyer's guide. This, in itself, can be somewhat more complex than it sounds considering that at least one book store in Twin Falls has 15 computer magazines in its rack, and three entire wall cases of books devoted to the silicon monster.

A closer look at the rack, however, will show that most of the magazines are devoted to just one or two computers or software packages, and these can be eliminated for the very few ones that generalize in an unbiased way. Likewise, with the books, which run from \$3.50 to \$15.

A new buyer can find one in the lesser price range that will compare many models and brands. Or, for free, "Don't forget" the "local library." The Twin Falls Public Library has several books for beginners.

Better yet, but more time consuming, the College of Southern Idaho has several computer-oriented classes; one is a 15-hour evening course designed to get people over computer anxiety.

Dave Makings, the coordinator of computer-related technology, says about that particular course, "At the end, people can walk into the store and know a little about what they're talking about."

He's quick to point out that he caters to no particular product. "Now, as a discerning buyer, you've read a helpful book or taken a short course. You're no longer terrified by the more moderate terms like RAM and ROM, modem and monitor. You can say, 'Floppy disk' with a straight face."

But, do you really need a home computer? Are you sure you're not just looking for a video game, instead? How do you want the computer to help you? Do you want it for art or

music or entertainment? Is it meant for packaged information, or to hook into a nationwide storehouse of data over the telephone line? Maybe you want to lay out a financial spreadsheet.

Maybe your main desire is home education for the children and adults, with word processing capabilities on the side for that long-awaited novel you're going to write. Or, maybe home or small business book-keeping.

Not just for checkbook balancing, please. If you can't do that with a pencil, you'll never figure out how to use a computer. Since we're talking languages, you're not computer-compatible.

If you're fortunate enough to have friends with computers, go ahead and look at theirs and ask questions — remembering, of course, that most folks don't want to admit that what they have is anything but the best.

Ask about the honesty of the seller, the service they receive from said seller, and ask what your friends would do if they had it all to do over again — remembering, of course, most folks don't like to admit when they've been skinned.

You're certain, now, that you want a computer for one of the above or any number of other reasons. Where do you buy? All three department heads in the variety stores queried felt they had an advantage on price over the computer stores.

The computer store managers, when asked their advantage over department stores, unanimously echoed, "Because we know what we're talking about."

All the computer stores say they offer financing and the department stores admittedly don't, except one that sends its customers to a nearby finance company. They do take credit cards.

On repairs: One computer store sends, at their expense, faulty units to Boise. The other two have local repair. The department stores carry manufacturer warranties, and one says that if a machine has been purchased within 90 days, he'll just give the customer a new one if the old machine goes awry.

One department head says his store offers no personalized training, while both others claim to exhibit the machine's capabilities. All the computer stores say they offer a demo program in the store as well as on-site training.

Another important matter the consumer must consider is the difficulty



in obtaining software — remember, your computer is nothing more than an expensive electronic rock without it.

Two computer stores say they have no problem procuring all the software their patrons want; one admits to a moderate problem. One department head says, "Yes," when asked if he has procurement troubles, and the other two answer, "No."

All things considered, the novice consumer would probably be wise to visit at least a couple stores of each variety, and ask many questions before emptying his bank account of anywhere from a couple hundred dollars to several thousand.

Some advice given by all dealers queried is to stick with name brands. As one says, concerning off-brands, "Maybe you'll save \$200

off a name-brand, but when the company goes out of business, who fixes it? Are you really saving in the long run?"

Story of Karen Silkwood finally makes it to the big movie screen

BOSTON — The story of Karen Silkwood, the woman, and the making of "Silkwood," the movie, contain all the elements of a Hitchcock thriller — danger, suspense and heroism.

After nearly 10 years, Karen Silkwood's dramatic story finally has been brought to the screen by two obsessive, dedicated, slightly crazed film producers — Buzz Hirsch and Larry Cano. The lengthy, complicated, bizarre movie traveled by Hirsch and Cano during the past decade is littered with lawsuits, veiled threats and production delays that became a catalogue of virtually every conceivable roadblock that a pair of neophyte producers could encounter.

"Silkwood," directed by Mike Nichols, written by Nora Ephron and Alice Arlen, starring Meryl Streep, Kurt Russell and Cher, will finally open.

But the story of "Silkwood" began on Nov. 13, 1974, when Karen Silkwood left a meeting of the Oil, Chemical and Atomic Workers union (OCAW) in Crescent, Okla., with allegedly incriminating documents that would prove her case against her employer, Kerr-McGee.

According to a co-worker, she was driving to meet New York Times reporter David Burnham with files that would prove that Kerr-McGee was a nuclear plant under unsafe working conditions and that they were tampering with X-rays of defective nuclear fuel rods.

Seven minutes after leaving the meeting, Karen Silkwood was found dead in a culvert just off Highway 74. The official story of her death, based on reports of the Highway Patrol, was that Karen Silkwood, under the influence of Quaaludes and alcohol, fell asleep in the wheel.

The unofficial story, based on testimony of automobile crash investigator A.O. Pipkin and the fact that the documents were never found, was that Karen Silkwood was murdered.

On Nov. 20, 1974, Hirsch and Cano, students majoring in film at UCLA, read David Burnham's story about Silkwood's death in the New York Times and decided her life might make an interesting movie.

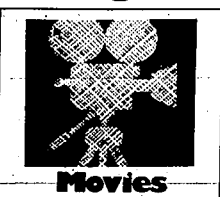
In a recent interview, in their suite at the Ritz and while driving to a discussion with Boston University film students, Hirsch and Cano recounted their frustrating odyssey in bringing "Silkwood" to the screen.

"We were naive when we started," said Cano. "Originally, we just thought that Karen's story would make a terrific movie and that we should make it."

"I think we both knew that it would take a lot of time... a lot of work," added Hirsch. "We were prepared to go out and do whatever was necessary to make it happen." Hirsch added "I have to admit that at the time we weren't sure what to do."

Hirsch and Cano began by studying scientific journals in the UCLA Physical Sciences library. They began piecing together the possible side effects of reactor leaks with the personal story of Karen Silkwood, a most unlikely screen heroine.

"We found this incredible legacy of incompetent nuclear disposal. It was frightening," said Cano. "We thought we had an original idea for a movie. No one else does a first book radiation leaks in a factory. Of course now it's old hat with 'The China Syndrome,' and everyone's consciousness has been raised, so we kind of take it for granted but..."



Hirsch interrupted. "Back in 1974 we didn't know anything about nuclear power. We just knew it was the stuff you made bombs out of. It opened our eyes and made us determined to tell the story of one woman waging a war against the nuclear industry."

During late 1974 and early 1975, Hirsch and Cano followed the normal steps in developing a film. They hired an entertainment lawyer to represent their interests and to acquire the rights to Silkwood's life, and they wrote an outline of their story. In the spring, it was rejected by virtually every producer in Hollywood.

"They wanted entertainment," said Hirsch, "and there were a lot of producers around town who didn't believe people would pay to see an anti-nuclear story. They thought we had a political act to grind."

Cano and Hirsch went back to concentrating on their studies until the summer of 1976. Cano was a UCLA teaching assistant and one of his students, Carlos Anderson, the wealthy owner of the Carlos and Charles restaurant chain, was interested in investing in movies. "He wanted to get out of the grease and wear his sunglasses and finance movies," said Cano. "He decided to bankroll us with seed money. So we were off and running again."

Cano and Hirsch hired another lawyer to work out the arrangements for exclusive rights to Karen Silkwood's story with the Silkwood estate. Then they flew to Karen Silkwood's home town, Nederland, Texas, a small oil town located near Beaumont, to make a consulting deal with Bill Silkwood, Karen's father. It took eight months for Bill Silkwood's lawyer and Hirsch and Cano's lawyer to reach an agreement.

"While they were all tied up we adopted a positive attitude and began doing more research," Cano said. But that wasn't easy either. The Kerr-McGee plant had closed in an economy move (many former employees claim that it was shut down because of the controversy surrounding Silkwood's death) and the employees scattered.

The first person they tracked down was Drew Stephens (played by Kurt Russell in the film), Karen's boyfriend, who was working in a body shop in Oklahoma City in the fall of 1976.

"It took a few days and a few nights of drinking before he warmed up to us," said Cano. "It was very emotional once he began to talk about his love for Karen. But he trusted us and gave us the inside story of Karen's personality. He also cleared the way for us to see Karen's other friends. Drew was the key because everyone respected him."

In late 1976, the Silkwood estate agreed to sign the rights to the story to Cano and Hirsch. Throughout 1977, the two maturing producers traveled to small Oklahoma towns such as Fischer, Guthrie and Seminole gathering film, audio tapes and

transcripts of Kerr-McGee employees who knew Karen Silkwood.

"They were reticent because Kerr-McGee was very powerful and they were afraid of reprisals," Cano said.

"I went to see one of Karen's co-workers," said Hirsch. "She lived in a trailer out near Kingfisher, Okla. I went out to have supper with her and the next night her trailer was broken into. She was so terrified that she left the state. These kinds of things were happening, so people were afraid. It was only after we agreed to keep their names confidential that they began to cooperate."

Simultaneously, the Silkwood estate, having been frustrated in their attempts to get a congressional investigation started, instituted a federal lawsuit.

The suit, charging Kerr-McGee with conspiring with the FBI to cover up the facts surrounding Karen's death and engaging in harassment, is still awaiting a hearing before the U.S. Supreme Court.

The lawyers for Kerr-McGee began interviewing Karen's co-workers, and the first five or six potential witnesses mentioned that they had spoken with Buzz Hirsch.

"I happened to be in Oklahoma City doing research, when the federal marshals knocked on my door," said Hirsch. "They handed me a subpoena."

"They wanted all our documents... tapes, film, transcripts," said Cano. "Our attitude was that Kerr-McGee was on a fishing expedition. They should conduct their own investigation. I looked on it as harassment to thwart our efforts to mount our film."

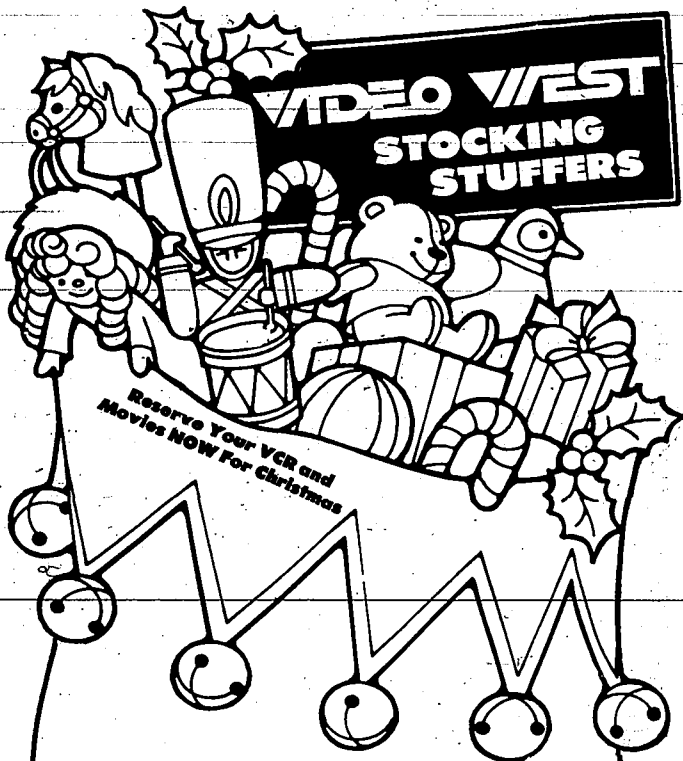
"More importantly," said Hirsch, "We felt a moral obligation to stand by what we promised these people and not reveal their identities, and so I decided to fight the subpoenas and Larry agreed."

They hired Los Angeles First Amendment attorney Steve Grody to handle their case. "We had no money for an expensive court fight," said Hirsch, "but Grody agreed to take the case if we would do all we could to raise funds."

In the meantime, the judge threatened Hirsch with a contempt of court citation if he didn't appear in court. Eventually, the citation was dropped, the appeals court in Oklahoma ruled that filmmakers involved in civil litigation had the same protection under the shield law as journalists, and Cano and Hirsch were free to pursue their project. "If we had agreed to be a subpoena, all of our work would become part of the public domain and anyone could have made the film," said Hirsch.

All the legal problems took a year out of their schedule and almost killed the film. Warner Brothers, a studio that had expressed interest because Jane Fonda wanted to play the lead, backed out of the deal when it was learned that their project was "hopelessly mired in legal controversy" and that's a direct quote from the Los Angeles Times," said Cano. "Even Carlos Anderson had had enough, and he dropped out. It was understandable. He wanted to make a movie, and it looked as if he'd be involved in court proceedings until the cows came home."

Cano and Hirsch were left with a legal battle with Kerr-McGee, and Jane Fonda decided to team up with Michael Douglas for what became "The China Syndrome." "We pleaded with her not to go with fiction, but she did," said Cano. "Meanwhile, we felt an obligation to pay our legal bills."

Satellite dishes a hit with isolated Texans

DRYDEN, Texas — For years, ranchers in isolated West Texas — where radio reception is difficult and television stations are non-existent — have driven hundreds of miles each weekend to watch football on television.

But that is coming quickly to an end. Gleaming white satellite dishes are springing up like mushrooms in the Big Bend area, affording once-lonely cowpokes more television channels than most city dwellers, even those with cable hookups.

"How many channels do the city folks get?" asked a grizzled rancher at Don McElhinney's Phillips 66 station store in Dryden, Phillips 66 families live. "We can get up to 60."

McElhinney's new color-television set — its reception perfect — is the corner piece of his store and his six-foot tall dish is prominently alongside U.S. Highway 90 in the front yard of his old frame house next door.

"I had three or four ranchers come in here last night and watch the New York-Detroit game," McElhinney beamed.

McElhinney figures the money he's saving on the weekend trips makes the satellite dish a good investment.

"I used to go to Sanderson every Sunday. I've got to see my Dallas Cowboys. I'd take a motel room where

they have cable, and sometimes then the reception wasn't that good. At one time we got together here and got a tall antenna, but we only got one channel and that was a sometimes thing."

Until last year, many area ranchers drove 100 miles or more to Del Rio to state their tastes for weekend football.

Three weeks after his dish was installed, McElhinney's television set was the only light still visible in the darkened village hours after he closed his store.

Dryden is located 40 miles west of where Judge Roy Bean, the renowned "Law West of the Pecos" used to dispense liquor and justice at his Jersey Lilly Saloon at Langtry, Texas, and traffic is sparse late at night.

Across the highway at Dryden, Mercedes McElhinney said the owner had booked four different households on one satellite dish, "but (the others) have to watch what he wants to watch." Now five of Dryden's 11 households have satellite reception, he said, and four others have ordered dishes.

McElhinney said his elderly mother was the first in the area to get a satellite dish for about \$5,800 but now the dishes are smaller and less expensive, with the price down to as low as \$1,800, a one-time charge.

"After that it's yours," he said. "They keep getting smaller and coming down in price."

Video boom box lets him get stereo movies

I've got the only video boom box on my block. Except that it's actually part of my stereo system. It's the Sanyo VCR 7900 portable videocassette deck with Beta hi-fi. Now, in a package the same size as a boom box, I can have my movies and my stereo sound, too.

A few months ago, you may remember, a column on Beta hi-fi explained how a video recorder — using its hi-speed, rotating video heads — could record exceptionally high fidelity, stereo sound on the tape. Video machines had been distinctly low-fi, usually mono. This wonderful, stereo hi-fi sound could be recorded with or without the picture, making a movie lover could purchase a Beta hi-fi deck and use it as an audio recorder.

Sanyo seems to have been reading some minds, because along came the 7900, which looks like an audio recorder in drag. It has all the basic video features such as programmable timer and electronic tuning, but it also has manual audio level setting, level indicators and microphone or line level inputs.

After the announcement of Beta hi-fi last January, it received extensive hype and favorable reviews

in the audio press. Some proponents got so carried away they claimed it would supplant all other forms of recording. Beta hi-fi is no threat to digital recording. You'll get much better sound if you hook the Sanyo up to the Sony PCM-701ES digital processor, doubling the cost. And Beta hi-fi isn't going to replace the finest open reel machines costing more than \$5,000. However, this pleasantly compact Sanyo Beta hi-fi at less than \$1,000 knocks home open-reel machines — for a loop — and waits around virtually all cassette decks.

You can have quite a romantic evening in the 4½ hours of uninterrupted music that you can record on an L-750 videocassette at Beta III. If you're using this slowest speed, use high-grade tape. An L-750HG costs about \$15 and equals three C-90 super quality audio cassettes, so the cost is about the same. Just think, an entire Wagner opera on a single tape. Now if they only had Walkmen and car players.

The sound is good, although the noise reduction system used by Beta hi-fi, which is similar to dbx, is sometimes audible. Distortion is relatively low. You can ideally record TV/FM simulcasts with this system, and movies are now being released with Beta hi-fi soundtracks.

Videotex lets you shop and pay bills from an easy chair

Wouldn't it be nice if you could pay your bills, plan your weekend activities and buy a new pair of jeans all without leaving your easy chair?

Videotex—a combination of telephone, television and computer technologies—will let you do these and a myriad of other tasks from your home.

Videotex is an interactive electronic system in which data is transmitted from a computer network over telephone or cable television lines and is displayed on a subscriber's television or computer terminal screen.

Not only can videotex subscribers get information ranging from airline schedules and shopping lists to stock reports and entertainment guides, but they can also make restaurant reservations and buy show tickets.

While videotex has existed since the early 1970s, it hasn't been widely used in the United States—yet. But as prices drop on both home computers and the little black boxes needed to convert ordinary televisions into videotex terminals, the use of videotex will increase. Several industry observers are predicting that between 30 and 40 percent of U.S. households will have videotex before the end of the decade.

Subscribing to videotex is very much like subscribing to a cable television service—a monthly charge you are obligated to use the service. And videotex is easy to use. You simply sit down in front of your television set and use a small keypad with numbers on it to call up scrolling "pages" (screens) of information. If you're using a computer, images will appear on your terminal and you input your instructions through the keyboard.

By tapping one number on the keypad, you can choose to look at business news, airline schedules or check what's on sale from a variety of merchants. Instructions will appear on each screen, telling you which number to press if you want to move on to the next screen, order merchandise or return to the directory.

The United Kingdom was the first country to offer videotex as a commercial service, and approximately 24,000 subscribers now use that service, mainly for business purposes. Japan, Canada and such European countries as France, Germany and the Netherlands have also implemented videotex systems, with the help of government subsidies.

A number of U.S. companies are now experimenting with videotex through test-market operations and will soon be making videotex's electronic services available. Knight-Ridder Newspapers Inc., the nation's largest newspaper service, is offering videotex services this fall through one of its subsidiary companies, Viewdata Corporation of America, based in Miami Beach, Fla.

Viewdata will be the first U.S. company to provide videotex to consumers and businesses on a non-test

basis. The service, called Viewtron, will serve 200 subscribers with electronic banking, shopping and entertainment guides, says Dr. Norman Morrison, Viewdata's executive vice president.

Videotex lets consumers conveniently shop and bank without having to stand in long lines, Morrison says. He predicts that approximately 45 million homes will be using videotex by the end of the decade.

Industry observers agree a huge, untapped market for videotex exists. John Bradbury, general manager of videotex services for Arlington, Va.-based Systemhouse Inc., says he expects an enormous explosion to occur in the videotex industry within the next few years.

Bradbury predicts that, as the cost of home computer terminals declines and extensive data bases become available, more and more of American homes will be using videotex. "For about \$50, home computer users will have access to numerous electronic services," he says. And videotex has applications for

both consumers and businesses. Besides financial services, travel-related services are a prime example of a videotex application that is already benefiting business. In England and France, videotex is used by many businesses for travel schedules and seating and fare information. One day soon it may be used by purchasing agents to review, specify and add new parts to their inventory.

Until now, Videotex has not been widely used in the United States for a number of reasons. For one thing, no standard way of encoding the graphics information—the pictures of the sofa or bookcase you're contemplating buying—has been developed. Currently about six different encoding methods or protocols are being used worldwide, none of which are compatible with the others.

Shades of McLuhan, Toffler — it's an electronic village

FORESTHILL, Calif. — A housing development called an "electronic village" envisions dramatic changes in the work and living habits of Americans.

The development recalls the prophecies of writer Marshall McLuhan and his "global village" and futurist Alvin Toffler, who foretold communities tied to computers.

Residents of Toffler's electronic village would work out of their homes, abandoning long commutes to work on asphalt highways. Their offices would be as close as computer terminals that would allow them to travel to work along fiber optic freeways at the speed of light.

It is this "telecommuter" that three housing developers had in mind when a few months ago they began to advance Toffler's idea to reality. They said the first of some 360 homes would go up in early 1984 at the 2-square-mile development called Englecrest.

Each will offer computer-stocked "teletop" offices enabling telecommuters to be seconds away from work via a self-contained computer or a terminal linked by telephone and microwave to other computers anywhere in the world.

"You're looking at 700-plus people who could telecommute," said Josh Wilson Jr., one of the Englecrest partners. "Anybody can live here but obviously we're really going to try to attract people who are interested in living in an electronic village."

People who settle at Englecrest would be joining more than 10,000 estimated American salaried telecommuters, said Sarah Edwards, a trainer-consultant who has worked out of her Los Angeles County home for 10 years. The cofounder of the Association of Electronic Cottages, she believes Englecrest is the first telecommuting village of its kind.

The University of Southern California's Center for Future Research predicts that within 10 years, 5 million Americans could be working at home as telecommuters. The study says companies discover savings in office space, transportation and parking, and increased productivity.

"We find that people at home produce more, work longer hours but have fewer distractions," said Gil Gordon, a telecommuting consultant working out of his Monmouth Junction, N.J., home.

The solar-heated homes costing \$140,000 to \$190,000 also will offer computer-run home management systems for controlling temperature, lights, budgets, menus, pantry inventories and guest lists. An entertainment center will include cable television and video games. A computer data link will enable neighbors to have electronic garage sales and electronic bulletin boards.

An educational computer could be tied to computer systems in local schools. A neighborhood center would provide facsimile machines and other office services.

"I'm excited over the concept. I hope it works," said lawyer Paul Aronowitz, who plans to buy a lot.

"I envision spending 80 to 90 percent of my working time at home. I can really see where people will be able to utilize electronics at home to eliminate commutes and have more recreational time. You give up a lot of your life to get to work."

Oliver Sasse, a telephone company executive, estimates he would spend about half of his work time at home, traveling 6 miles to his north Sacramento office only for meetings and seminars.

The village also would be useful for sales people, consultants, accountants, real estate agents, computer programmers, engineers, designers, writers, secretaries and managers taking part in a throwback to the pre-factory cottage industry.

The partners broke ground at the site last spring. Plans call for one-third acre circular lots placed in grapevine fashion along a ridge overlooking the North Fork of the American River. The homes, one for about every four acres, will occupy less than 10 percent of the site.

Developers note that Placer County, touted as the home of California's next Silicon Valley, has an electronic industrial park 30 miles southwest of the site that has each office tenant as Hewlett-Packard Co.

Gordon believes large companies could have up to 15 percent of their work force at home within the next five years and that up to 60 percent of all office jobs eventually could be performed there.

"But I don't think we're ever going to see the end of high-rise office buildings, and we shouldn't," he said.

Telecommuting in many cases may lead to being paid on a piecework basis, a practice long opposed by labor unions. Supervisors would want

assurances that the employee is on the job at the home teletop and not in the family room playing video games.

"We are very visual in our managerial approach," Mrs. Edwards said. "We like to see people. Studies have shown there are great productivity gains in telecommuting if you get the right people, who are suited for it."

Englecrest's Wilson said bosses in Sacramento, San Francisco and other cities will know their employees in a week because messages and reports will show up in the computer.

Phone company executive Sasse, who hopes to live at Englecrest, said his supervisors are "fairly supportive" of his present 15 hours of weekly work at home in the Placer County community of Loomis.

Lawyer Aronowitz believes telecommuting would work best for self-starters who can labor without having someone looking over their shoulders.

"A lot of people would find the lack of structure not conducive to working," he said. "I personally find the peace and quiet of the country extremely conducive to working. It's not as if I need a commute to the office."

The attorney believes he can set aside time for meeting people, possibly with a half-day a week in his firm's office.

"My wife gets tired of seeing me leaving at 7 o'clock in the morning and returning at 7 o'clock at night. At home, I'm more productive. People in your home distract you, but so do people in your office."

The Englecrest development includes plans for a community center that will meet some of the need for human contact to supplement the occasional business trips.

"We don't expect people to hibernate," Wilson said. "They will be able to work out of a home station but knowing they're also going to travel to sales meetings, corporation meetings, board meetings, to meet with clients."

Mrs. Edwards, who has four computers at home, said some people cannot tolerate the isolation of telecommuting and even the most independent workers find they need to meet with colleagues at least every other week.

Working at home also is difficult where family relationships are weak, but it can deepen ties in strong families, she said.

story buildings in Halley to handle his expanded growth. He's already had to move some people out of the buildings to another office building in Halley and he's also readying a building plan to accommodate the employees he expects to hire in the future.

As if four magazines are not enough, Wolford expects to start new magazines next year — and publish at least two books.

Although Wolford attributes a great deal of success of the company to stay on top of the advances in the industry has been a large part of that success.

He, and others in the company, he says, have been able to stay on the "front edge of technology" in the industry and have developed their new products and the contents of each publication to reflect the trends of the industry.

All this has taken some vision, Wolford says.

"It's taken vision on my part, but it also takes vision on (the part of the staff)," he says. "It's their vision, also."

Wolford credits his wife, Kathryn Carmichael, whom he says makes the company work, and Kinnaird as being essential to the growth of the company and the development of its products.

Being on the front edge of the electronic industry is nothing new for Wolford. Before moving to Idaho, he was involved with a California company that developed a "certain" capacitor that was used in the space industry and has enabled greater

schedules in today's computers. He claims the company, U.S. Capacitor, has five pounds of its product on the moon.

After moving to Idaho, Wolford founded Sun Valley Cablevision, sold it and started CommTek in late 1979. The rest is history.

In Kinnaird, once a free lance writer, worked for the Curtis Publishing Co. and has served as senior editor of the Saturday Evening Post and editor and associate publisher of Country Gentleman magazine.

Now, Satellite ORBIT and the other publications are benefiting from Kinnaird's contacts in the magazine industry. One edition of the magazine includes a two-time Pulitzer Prize nominee, the television critic for the Louisville Times, a leading country music writer and a writer for California Living, the Sunday magazine for the San Francisco Examiner.

Kinnaird says the editorial content of his magazines are a cut above the competition. He also says the content stacks up well along side the publishing industry in general.

CommTek's four monthly magazines are:

- "Satellite ORBIT" — Marketed to owners of home television satellite equipment. It includes stories on how to improve service and reception, new services and products, features on sports and stories on people who own satellite equipment.

- "Satellite ORBIT International" — Geared to Europe, Australia and English-speaking areas in Latin America. It also includes program

schedules in foreign languages and the first issue just came off the press last month.

- "Satellite Dealer" — This magazine began publication in September of this year and is marketed to manufacturers and sellers of satellite television equipment.

- "SAT Guide" — This is the original publication of CommTek and began publication in 1980. It is now targeted toward satellite television operators who get their programming from satellites.

The growth of the satellite television industry is being helped along by rapid advancements in technology and the same drop in costs that accompany the rest of the electronics industry.

Equipment that not too long ago would have cost 10,000 goes for more like \$2,500 today, Wolford says.

This drop in cost has made it accessible to more people, but still more are going to be able to bring it into their home, because finance institutions are now willing to give credit for the purchase of satellite television equipment, he says.

More and more, satellite television is becoming competitive with cable television. However, Wolford says satellite service will never compete head on with cable.

While cable is geared to urban areas, satellite is used primarily in rural areas where cable is not available. Wolford says that cable viewers will not forego the convenience of the cable companies' service.

"I think each technology is fulfilling a need for a certain area," he says.

'Mistaken identity' launches recall of Hutton's biography

NEW YORK (UPI) — A "case of mistaken identity" led to an error in a biography of Barbara Hutton that launched one of the biggest recalls in publishing history, the lawyer-author G. David Heymann said Tuesday.

It was recalling nearly 60,000 copies of the much-publicized biography, "Poor Little Rich Girl," because it contained inaccurate information about Dr. Edward Kantor of Beverly Hills, Calif., one of the late heiress' physicians.

"Among others, certain references were made describing Dr. Kantor as having prescribed excessive drugs for Miss Hutton in 1943, which could not have happened as Dr. Kantor was only 14 years old at that time," Random House said in a statement.

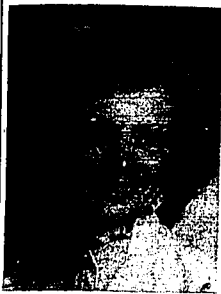

It was the second time the artist has had the satisfaction of seeing one of his paintings on the cover of Idaho Wildlife, as his painting of Wood Ducks graced the cover of an earlier issue in 1981.

Big game, in addition of other forms of wildlife, excites the artist, he says, noting that one of the top wildlife art galleries in southern California is currently negotiating with him to paint big game pieces.
A gallery spokesperson says the

artist's color-remarqed 1982 Idaho Bowhunter Stamp prints are one of the hottest selling pieces of stamp art the gallery has ever handled.

Commissions and work backlog put considerable pressure on any artist, and this is particularly true in a field that is becoming more and more competitive, says Gilbert, who is presently negotiating one commission involving all of the upland gamebirds, ducks and geese native to or found in the state of Idaho.

"Actually I dislike competition, but I must admit the need to compete is a means of constantly upgrading the quality of my work with every piece I do. In this field, one must get better and better or eventually drop by the wayside," says the Carey artist.
