Group warns troops Of bombings

BEIRUT, Lebanon — Moslem extremists Thursday claimed responsibility for a devastating bomb explosion outside a French base and threatened U.S. and French troops with "a real earthquake" unless they leave Lebanon within 10 days.

There were conflicting reports on the death toll in the explosion Wednesday in Beirut, with official reports ranging from 12 to 15 dead and unofficial estimates running as high as 27.

The National News Agency said civil defense workers ended their search for victims of the bomb in which the National News Agency said 149 people were wounded. Unofficial reports quoting Lebanese authorities said 80 were wounded.

A truck carrying an estimated ton of dynamite was driven down a street behind the French base near the Museum Crossing in the heart of Beirut, abandoned near a French roadblock, and detonated moments after the driver fled in a passing Volvo.

The blast, just after nightfall, leveled three three-story buildings and blew a crater 10-feet deep and 30-feet wide in the road. One of the buildings housed offices of the Christian Phalange Party and the other two were residential dwellings.

State law termed weak Miners to pay for pollution

BOISE — Golden Reef Joint Venture Co. has agreed to pay the state a \$25,000 penalty for stream damage in what is believed to be the largest settlement for such a case.

Attorney General Jim Jones said Thursday Jones told the state Land Board the company also has agreed to a number of measures aimed at reclaiming Mule and Monumental creeks, two Salmon River tributaries near the River of No Return Wilderness.

But Jones said the case has pointed out problems with the state Surface Mining and Clean Water acts, and his office will try to strengthen the statutes during the upcoming legislative session.

"This is probably the best the state can get considering the frailties of the statutes," Idaho Environment Division Director Lee Stokes told the board during a special morning session.

The board voted unanimously to accept the settlement, which also must be approved by the state Health and Welfare Board.

The Golden Reef settlement addresses both a compliance order issued by the state Health and Welfare Board and a lawsuit filed by the attorney general's office, said Deputy Attorney General Pat Koles.

The company — comprised of Copper Lake of Idaho Inc. and Oro Silver Mines of Arizona — was accused of violating state law in October, when a pile of dirt extracted from a tailing pond washed down a hillside into Mule Creek in a remote area east of McCall, Koles said.

The waterway also suffered from "severe siltation problems" caused in 1979 and 1980 by the pre-

vious owners, a partnership that included Boise machine shop owner Fred Yanke, Koles said.

The penalty Golden Reef agreed to includes \$20,000 in damages and the maximum \$5,000 civil penalty allowed under state law, Jones said.

"The amounts of damages exceed any other for similar problems at any time in the past," Koles said.

Under the settlement, Golden Reef also has agreed to close operations from April to June when high spring runoff makes water quality problems more likely, Koles said.

The firm also said it will establish a testing laboratory at its operation to monitor water quality and will transport state officials to the site by helicopter at least twice a month, or "on very short notice so we can check and make sure they are being honest," Koles said.

Jones said one of the most significant concessions in the settlement was an agreement by the company to waive some of its rights so the state can immediately file a lawsuit in case of future environmental problems.

Current statutes are flawed because of provisions that allow mining operators to appear before the Lands or Health and Welfare Board for hearings and other procedures, which could delay action and cause problems in an emergency, Koles said.

Idaho Conservation League Director Pat Ford said he was disappointed state officials did not pursue their lawsuit and attempt to shut the mining operation until reclamation efforts were undertaken.

He said the case showed the need for stronger environmental laws.

"We'll look over the flaws and find a remedy so the state can be in a better position of taking action when a violation occurs," Jones said.

FCC: Market place working Agency won't regulate children's TV shows

WASHINGTON — The Federal Communications Commission Thursday decided against mandatory requirements for increased children's television programming, saying the marketplace is adequately dealing with the issue.

Commissioner Henry Rivera, who cast the only dissenting vote in the seven-member commission's decision, said the new policy "writes the epi-gram on the FCC's involvement in children's television."

The decision against imposing the requirements marks a "rejection of efforts to require broadcast stations to meet quotas in providing specialized programming for children. But the FCC said it reaffirmed the obligation of all commercial broadcast stations to serve the special needs of children."

Chairman Mark Fowler, speaking for the majority, said, "I don't think that mandatory standards work." He said that under the new policy announced after 13 years of efforts to

set rules for children's television, broadcasters still must provide programs for children.

Fowler argued that "the marketplace is beginning to work very well in seeking out and meeting the needs of children."

"The broadcaster still must demonstrate at (license) renewal time that he has met the needs of children," the chairman said. "Thoughtful parenting sometimes involves saying 'I'm going to pull the plug.'"

But Rivera said: "This is a sad day for the children of this country. For almost a decade, the FCC has maintained a Children's Television Policy Statement" requiring commercial broadcasters to make a special effort to meet the unique needs of children."

Edward Fritts, president of the National Association of Broadcasters, in approved of the decision, saying "the FCC's federal-mandated programming" puts government "in the role of editor, a most dangerous precedent."

But Peggy Charren, head of Action for Children's Television, was critical.

White House projects years of growth

WASHINGTON — The administration said Thursday the nation can have six years of "solid" economic growth with moderate inflation and declining unemployment and interest rates — if it follows the right policies.

That scenario was spelled out in a page of numbers released by officials — a set of economic assumptions the administration has agreed will be the basis of the fiscal 1985 budget it sends to Congress early next year.

Martin Feldstein, chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers, made clear to reporters the "it" is critical. He summed the figures up as "six solid years — if the appropriate policies are adopted."

Foremost among those policies, he told a group of reporters, is to reduce the federal budget deficit over the next several years. The fairly optimistic projections are all based on this being achieved.

The figures were put together by Feldstein.

Treasury Secretary Donald Regan and budget director David Stockman, Feldstein said President Regan approved the basic concept behind the numbers and that they were based on deficits being reduced.

"That was an agreed strategy," Feldstein said. But he made clear that administration decisions on how to accomplish this have not been made, particularly with respect to taxes. When the decisions have been made, it still will be up to Congress to follow through.

Efforts to start significant deficit-reducing actions have been bogged down in what some call a "fiscal stalemate" involving the conflicting demands of defense and domestic spending and unwillingness to raise taxes in an election year.

"These calculations all depend on end to the fiscal stalemate," Feldstein told reporters.

The basic projections are: ECONOMIC GROWTH: The gross national product, adjusted for inflation, would grow 4.5 percent from the fourth quarter of 1983 to the fourth quarter of 1984. It would thereafter grow 4 percent a year until 1989 when, with the economy approaching its temporary capacity, growth would fall to 3.7 percent.

INFLATION: As measured broadly throughout the GNP, inflation would rise from an estimated 4 percent for the current quarter to 5 percent for 1984 (fourth quarter to fourth quarter) and then decline each year by an average 0.3 percent, reaching 3.5 percent in 1989.

UNEMPLOYMENT: From 8.4 percent in November, the jobless rate would decline to a 7.5 percent average for 1984 (7.7 percent in the final quarter of that year) and would gradually fall to 5.7 percent in 1989.

INTEREST: From their recent 9 percent range, rates on 91-day Treasury bills would decline to an average 8.5 percent in 1984 and decline to 5 percent in 1989.

Bitter weather blamed for more deaths



Chicago, like the Magic Valley, is frozen in sub-zero weather

BOISE (UPI) — Bitter weather strengthened its grip Thursday on Idaho, with record sub-zero temperatures striking many towns for the second straight day.

Police said icy driving conditions were to blame for a three-fatality accident near Marsing.

In the Magic Valley, many streets and rural roads remained ice-covered and slick, but officers reported there were no serious accidents.

However, police said the cold temperatures brought the usual number of stalled vehicles, several along major highways. And plumbers were popular with many residents needing help — "shaw out frozen water pipes."

And officers were bracing for a busy holiday weekend if the heavy snow predicted for Christmas arrives.

The Idaho State Police office in Twin Falls was continuing to urge those planning to travel over the holidays to check road and weather conditions before leaving home.

The mercury fell to 43 degrees below zero Thursday in Stanley — one degree colder than Wednesday. Fairfield was next on the sub-zero list, with 38-below weather.

usually the warm spot of the valley, recorded a minus-seven.

Idaho Falls' reading dipped to 24 below, while Pocatello was chilled with a 23-below reading. At Malad, the cold fell to 21 below.

Grangeville residents suffered at minus-20; Lewiston shivered with 13 below; and Boise's temperature dropped to 8 below overnight.

"At the temperatures we've gotten from around the state today are below zero," a National Weather Service spokesman at Boise said. "That's unusual."

The cold snap, with its accompanying ice packs on Idaho highways, was blamed for three more traffic deaths Wednesday — in addition to the deaths of four people in a two-vehicle crash Monday south of Hollister.

Idaho State Police troopers said three people in a southbound compact car were killed when a northbound semi-truck slid on ice-covered U.S. 95 and crashed broadside into the smaller vehicle.

AIDS-stricken child gets home MIAMI (UPI) — "Pumpkin," the abandoned infant stricken with AIDS, has found a new home but is too sick to leave the hospital in time for Christmas, health officials said Thursday.

The 15-month-old girl, who is not expected to live more than three years, has been at Jackson Memorial Hospital for the five months. News reports of Pumpkin's plight triggered an outpouring of sympathy.

Florida's Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services examined hundreds of adoption and foster home offers before selecting an unidentified Miami couple as Pumpkin's foster parents.

Police issue Walea summons WARSAW, Poland (UPI) — Nobel Peace Prize winner Lech Walea has been summoned to police headquarters to explain a secret meeting he held with leaders of the banned Solidarity union, Walea's wife said Thursday.

Diana Walea said in a telephone interview from their apartment in Gdansk Walea was ordered to appear before the police next Thursday. Walea was not available for comment about the new summons.

Agency OKs GM-Toyota pact WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Federal Trade Commission, divided by concern about creating an antitrust monopoly, tentatively approved a landmark deal Thursday for General Motors and Toyota to jointly build a new line of cars.

Volting 3-2, the FTC's commissioners provisionally accepted a consent agreement that was signed earlier in the day by the two auto giants and that imposes restrictions on their venture.

Reaction to the FTC's decision from GM's major U.S. competitors was swift and negative, with Chrysler, Ford and American Motors Corp. denouncing the proposed venture as a threat to competition in the auto industry.

Court upholds strict DUI law SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — California's drunken driving law, one of the strictest in the nation, was unanimously upheld Thursday by the state Supreme Court.

The justices ruled the 1981 law making it illegal to drive if the alcohol level in a person's blood reached one percent of one percent of the total amount of about three marts — was constitutionally sound.

The court dismissed arguments by attorney Perry Olsen that the law denied drinkers due process because they cannot know when they have reached the legal maximum. He said that determination could be made only with testing devices not readily available to the drinking population.

Olsen also argued that the law inhibits a drinker's constitutional right to travel.

But the court favored state Attorney General John Van de Kamp's arguments that 10 percent limit is a rational response to a major social problem — an annual average of 2,500 deaths and 68,000 injuries in California in auto accidents involving drinking drivers.

Third guilty verdict in killings LOS ANGELES (UPI) — A third defendant was convicted of murder and robbery charges Thursday in a coffee shop massacre that killed four of 11 persons who were herded into a meal, looking at a restaurant in December 1980.

Franklin Freeman Jr., 23, was convicted of four counts of murder and 18 other felonies, including attempted murder, armed robbery and conspiracy. Some of the charges involved a robbery at a Taco Bell restaurant a few hours after the coffee shop slaughter.

After the court clerk read the first verdict, Freeman's sister, Tammy, screamed "No! No! He didn't do it! Let him go!" She was dragged kicking out the courtroom by three bailiffs and two family members.

Freeman, arrested exactly three years earlier, was also convicted of special circumstances that make him eligible for the death penalty.

Continued from Page A1 The Islamic Jihad (Holy War), a group linked by Western intelligence sources to Iran, said in a telephone call to a French news agency's office in Beirut that its members carried out the bombing.

"We adopt responsibility for the attack against the French base, and we warn that if the French and American forces do not leave Lebanon in 10 days, they will face a real earthquake," the caller said.

The same group claimed responsibility for suicide truck bombings that killed 241 Marines and 58 French paratroopers Oct. 23 at their bases in Beirut.

In Paris, French Defense Minister Charles Hernu blamed the attack on groups opposed to the French naval escort for Greek ships evacuating Palestine Liberation Organization chief Yasser Arafat and his fighters from Tripoli on Tuesday.

"This attack came, and not by chance, at the moment when France undertook humanitarian actions following the evacuation of Palestinians on ships and under the protection of our navy," Hernu said in a television interview.

Arafat stopped off in Cairo Thursday on his way to Yemen, and met Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak in an emotional reconciliation that ended a six-year rift but drew angry protests from Israel and some Palestinian leaders.

With a pistol on his hip, Yasser Arafat greeted and kissed Egyptian President Hosni Mubarak Thursday in a reconciliation that ended a six-year rift but angered Israel and some of the guerrilla chief's closest allies.

The United States supported the Arafat-Mubarak meeting and Egyptian officials said Jordan was ready to lift an economic boycott that has kept Cairo isolated in the Arab world since it signed a peace treaty with Israel in 1979.

The Palestine Liberation Organization chief, making Egypt his first stop since his ouster from Lebanon by Syrian-backed rebels, declared Egypt "the true bulwark of the Palestinian people" and expressed hope he and Mubarak would press together in Jerusalem.

Israel charged the reconciliation was a blow to peace in the Middle East and ordered its ambassadors in Cairo and Washington to protest the meeting as a violation of its 1979 peace treaty with Egypt. Israeli state-run media said.

In Washington, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger said about 15 nations had rejected American appeals to join the "united" states, France, Italy and Britain in the multinational peace-keeping force in Lebanon.

"I think probably we may have run out of nations by now. I think the interests of the free world would be served if more countries contributed to the force, he said.

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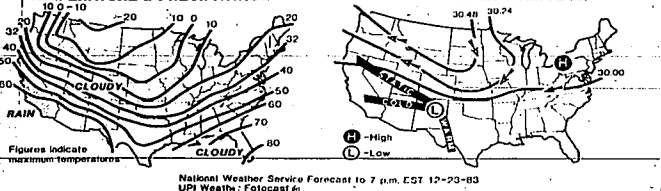
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Today's weather



Extreme cold with snow storm watch

Twin Falls, Burley-Rupert, Jerome-Gooding areas: Continued extremely cold today and tomorrow, with heavy snow for Saturday due to heavy snow. Highs today of zero to five, and lows tonight and Saturday of 10 to below zero.

A winter storm watch will be in effect for Saturday, with an increasing chance of snow tonight. Continued very cold. Highs today of zero to 10 below. Lows tonight to 10 below zero.

Traveler's advisories are out for northeastern Nevada and northern Utah this morning due to slippery roads and snow. Occasional snow through the day is expected, with winds up to 15 mph tonight. Lows in the teens to low 20s.

Highs 25 to 35 today, increasing to 35 to 40 Saturday. There will be increasing snow today over Utah, with heavy amounts in the mountains tonight and Saturday. Snow warning: Lows to 25 tonight; highs 15 to 30 today and 25 to 40 Saturday.

Synopsis: A winter storm watch was issued Thursday for all of southern Idaho and the central mountains, with heavy snow expected on Saturday.

A strong low-pressure system is expected to develop over the eastern Pacific Ocean, west of the mouth of the Columbia River. The wind circulation around the low-pressure system will draw extremely moist air over the bitterly cold air already gripping the state.

Fewer, more intense cold falls in the lower valleys and more than eight inches in the higher elevations. The present weather pattern is expected to continue today, with the approaching storm front bringing

changes on Saturday. Minimum temperatures set some records Thursday morning, including Boise and Pocatello. Highs were in the 20s and 30s, respectively. Other lows around the state included a minus-18 at Lewiston and minus-12 at Burley. The Kimberly weather station reported a minus-8, for a record on that date. At 10 p.m. Thursday, Halley was reporting 29 below.

After morning clouds much of the state Thursday morning, sunshine was reported during the afternoon hours, but temperatures remained frigid.

Woods have been relatively light during the cold, but even a light 10 mph wind combined with a minus-7 reading at Burley brought the chill factor to about 32 degrees below.

The warmest temperature in Idaho on Thursday was 12 degrees at Emmett. Stanley had the lowest, 43 below, followed by Elk City, with a minus-42.

The long-range forecast, for Saturday through Monday, is for periods of heavy snow and moderating temperatures in southern Idaho.

Elsewhere in the nation on Thursday, the high reading was 84 degrees at Palm Beach, Fla., and the coldest was 43 degrees below at West Yellowstone and Butte, both in Montana.

No major Idaho highways were closed Thursday, authorities said, but snow and ice persisted on most surfaces, and driving conditions were described as extremely hazardous.

The Salmon River was backed up by an ice jam about 30 miles north of Salmon near the Montana border, and authorities were advising farmers and other property owners in the area to prepare for flooding.

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Optimism expressed for Latin America

WASHINGTON — Special envoy Richard Stone, reporting on his latest trip to Central America, told President Reagan Thursday there are encouraging signs that pressure is building for a regional dialogue, a White House aide said.

During a 20-minute Oval Office meeting, Stone gave a cautiously optimistic assessment of the situation in Central America, despite continued

strife in El Salvador and Washington's skeptical view of developments in Nicaragua.

"I wouldn't go so far as to characterize his attitude as upbeat," one senior administration official said, "but he certainly sees more opportunity for dialogue there than he did when he began his mission."

Reagan bore down on foreign policy matters, preoccupying his administration before the Christmas weekend and his departure Tuesday for California, where he and Mrs.

Reagan will ring in the new year. The president also met with Middle East envoy Donald Rumsfeld and U.N. Ambassador Jeane Kirkpatrick Thursday. Others involved in the talks included Vice President George Bush, national security adviser Robert McFarlane and Secretary of State George Shultz.

Stone reported on a trip that included stops in Venezuela and Colombia — both members of the Contadora Group now working to promote peace negotiations — and discussions

with Nicaraguan rebels.

Afterward, Reagan reaffirmed support for the Contadora process and, in an unusual move, his confidence in Stone. Reagan praised Stone for "extraordinary service" in working "to help bring democratization and an end of fighting to all the countries of the region."

"I want to reiterate my support and commitment to his delicate but crucial mission," Reagan said in a statement. "As my personal representative, he speaks for me in our efforts to advance peace and democracy in this nearby area."

White House spokesman Robert Sims said Reagan wanted to show "everyone in the region" that Stone is his personal emissary and speaks for him.

Reagan said Stone will return to Central America early next year. "And I join with all in wishing him the greatest success in his mission," the president added.

Chilling temperatures sting nation

Bomb-chilling temperatures from the Pacific Northwest to the Mexican border Thursday capped the coldest streak of December weather in more than 10 years. Winter officially arrived with subzero temperatures in the lowest of the 20th Century, in parts of Nebraska.

Wisdom, Mont., was the nation's coldest spot Thursday, with a basement-level temperature of minus 51.

The frigid weather has been blamed for at least 90 deaths in the past week.

One victim was a 57-year-old man in Cowker City, Kan., whose body was found "completely frozen."

"He had his keys out and gloves off," Mitchell County Sheriff Gary Reiter said Thursday. "He was apparently trying to get into the trailer and slipped and fell and couldn't get up. He was completely frozen when he was found." It was 15 below zero when his body was found Wednesday.

A Greyhound bus overturned on a curving, ice-packed highway near Fredericktown in southeast Missouri Thursday, sending 43 people to hospitals. Rescue workers who extricated

injured passengers pinned in their seats also had to guard them against exposure in the minus-16-degree temperatures.

The National Weather Service said the frigid temperatures, especially across the Central Plains, marked the fifth consecutive day of sub-zero weather and the coldest stretch of December weather in more than fifty years.

"It looks like it's going to be a cold, cold winter," said Fred Ostby, the National Weather Service director of Severe Storms and Forecasters.

Lynching controversy still argued

ATLANTA (UPI) — The state of Georgia refused Thursday to pardon Leo M. Frank, the Jewish businessman whose 1915 conviction for the murder of little Mary Phagan prompted an anti-Semitic mob to drag him from prison and hang him from an oak tree.

"If a corpse 70 years molding can cry," Leo Frank's weeping today, said Nathan Perlmutter, national director of the Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith. "Not for himself — death is immutable — but for justice, freshly lynched; and not by Klansmen, but by bureaucratic insensitivity."

Mobley Howell, chairman of the state Board of Pardons and Poles, said in a statement that "Seventy years has passed since the crime was committed, and it is almost impossible to reconstruct the events of the day."

"After an exhaustive review and many hours of deliberation, it is impossible to decide conclusively the guilt or innocence of Leo M. Frank."

Frank was convicted and sentenced to die for beating and strangling Mary Phagan on Memorial Day, 1915, when she went to pick up her \$1.20 salary at the National Pencil Co., which Frank managed. Her body was found in the basement.

Gov. John Slaton commuted Frank's death sentence to life in prison in June 1915. Several weeks later, a mob took Frank from the Milledgeville prison, drove him to a field north of Marietta and hanged him.

The lynching, one of the ugliest acts in the history of the nation's history, stirred the emotions of the country, rekindling the Ku Klux Klan and sparking the formation of the Anti-Defamation League of B'Nai B'rith.

Record yields in wheat crop

WASHINGTON (UPI) — America's 1983 wheat harvest, with record yields partly offsetting a massive average cutback, was 2.43 billion bushels, nearly 1 percent larger than projected and 14 percent less than last year's record, the government reported Thursday.

Harvested acreage was off 22 percent from 1982, but the decline was partially offset by a record yield averaging 39.4 bushels per acre, up 3.8 bushels from a record set in 1982.

When the harvest was completed, the Agriculture Department slightly raised its estimate of the crop above the October projection of 2.41 billion bushels.

Looking ahead to the 1984 crop, the department said farmers have seeded 64.6 million acres of winter wheat this fall for harvest next spring and summer. That is a 4 percent increase from the 1983 level but less than some projections that had predicted record seedings.

The total was 2 percent less than a record 66.5 million acres seeded in 1982.

State burdened by soup-kitchen food

BOISE (UPI) — While soup kitchens in many parts of the country are trying to obtain as much donated food as possible, 8,000 cases of government-purchased canned goods are collecting dust in an Idaho warehouse.

Officials at the Economic Opportunity Office at Boise said the agency is having trouble finding soup kitchens to take the donated food. In fact, they said, Idaho probably has no bona fide soup kitchens.

They said they have been unable to locate any "congregate feeding sites" as defined by the U.S. Agriculture Department, that could qualify to receive the food.

The department will not permit any

other outlets to distribute the canned goods it turned over to the state office in September and October, said office spokeswoman Jennie Hursh.

If no soup kitchens are found to receive the food for use during the Christmas holidays, it will be turned over to the Idaho Education Department early next year for distribution to charitable institutions, she said.

Hursh said Idaho has no soup kitchens — a fixture in big cities — because needy people are spread out over a large area.

"It's not conceivable to have someone drive 20 miles for a free meal," Hursh said. "They'd spend more in gas than it would be worth."

Youths face death ... again

HOMEDALE (UPI) — Three Boise youths were rescued from the frigid Snake River Thursday where they were stranded during a hunting trip in the second life-threatening situation the trio has faced this year.

Joe Hemmert, 16, was listed in good condition at Caldwell Memorial Hospital, where he was transported by helicopter after spending two hours standing waist-deep in the 35-degree waters.

The victim was "stiff and covered with ice" when he was pulled from the river near the Homedale bridge Thursday morning after authorities made several aborted attempts to reach him, Owyhee County deputy Gary Aman said.

Hemmert and his two friends, David Carnahan, 17, and Ron Steiner,

16, were hunting on a Snake River island when Hemmert launched their boat to retrieve a duck he had shot.

Carnahan said he and Steiner heard cries of help soon after, but foggy weather prevented them from spotting Hemmert.

Hemmert floated downstream and nearly reached a second island, but his foot became entangled in brush and he was unable to break free, authorities said.

Misfortune struck the same three teens and a fourth friend, Mark Porter, this summer as they were fishing at Horsethief Reservoir near Cascade.

The anglers were caught in a lightning storm when a thunderbolt struck and killed Porter.



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Police fired for drug use

LEWISTON (UPI) — Lewiston Police Chief Rod Frederiksen has acknowledged three officers were fired during the past 18 months due to illegal drug use.

The previously undisclosed dismissals came up during a City Council discussion Tuesday on employment turnover rates in the Police Department.

Frederiksen said no charges were brought against the employees — whose names were kept confidential by the chief and council members. He said enough evidence was collected to justify dismissal.

'Slain' U.S. priests' reportedly still alive

A spokesman for Indian rebels in Nicaragua said Thursday that a missing American bishop and priest are alive and leading 3,000 Indians fleeing the Nicaraguan regime, which he claimed sent planes that bombed the refugees.

The Nicaraguan government at the same time backtracked on its charge that U.S.-funded rebels killed Bishop Salvador Schaefer, 63, of Campbellsville, Wis., and Wendelin Shater, 64, a priest from Jackson, Mich., both of the Capuchin missionary order.

A spokesman for the Miskitu, an Indian rebel group fighting the Marxist-led Sandinista regime, said in Tegucigalpa, Honduras, that a task force of rebel troops were escorting the clergymen and the Indians.

The American priests and the Nicaraguan deacons are alive and are being protected by our people and our troops," the spokesman said.

He placed their numbers at 3,000 and said they were less than 10 miles from the frontier.

In Washington, the State Department said the U.S. ambassador in Nicaragua and Honduras have not been able to obtain any first-hand confirmation of the reports about the missing clergymen.

The State Department said U.S. representatives plan to be at the border to assist any refugees who cross.

The Marxist regime charged Wednesday the rebels kidnaped the clergymen along with two deacons and hundreds of inhabitants of Francia-Sipre, 240 miles northeast of Managua in Zelaya province near the Honduran border.

Security up at holy sites


AMERICAN (UPI) - Israel has tightened security at holy sites because of fears of terrorist attacks amid an expected 50 percent increase in pilgrims for this year's Christmas season, officials said Thursday.

All police operations have been cancelled and hundreds of extra security personnel will guard holy sites and religious dignitaries during the holidays, a police spokesman said.

There is apprehension over terrorist attacks aimed at destroying the joyousness of the holiday, the spokesman said. There will be searches and roadblocks, but it is impossible to guard everything.

Five police units have been created in Magen Savaim, Bethlehem, for body searches by security guards using metal detectors, and only cars with special stickers are allowed into the Jewish town that is the Biblical birthplace of Jesus Christ.

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Troubled geothermal plant may yet produce

MALTA — The moribund Raft River geothermal energy project may be transformed into a commercial power plant and crop-processing center by the New York-based Hydra-Co.

Hydra-Co., a subsidiary of Niagara Mohawk, a large New York state electrical utility, bought the \$45 million federal project for \$750,000 in September.

The \$750,000 asking price included 16 on-site buildings, an experimental power plant, three geothermal production wells, two injection wells, seven monitoring wells and 560 acres of land.

Ed Muolo, a Hydra-Co. vice president, said this week that his company is not interested in building more demonstration projects, but rather, in financing a commercially viable project.

Muolo says his company intends to use commercially available technology to produce electricity from the site's 285-degree geothermal water. The electricity will be sold to the best market, wherever that is, he says.

After the water has been harnessed for electricity, Muolo says it probably will be channeled into some type of food-processing plant, to be built at the project site, near Malta.

In its November newsletter, the state Department of Employment reported that Hydra-Co. planned to build a plant to process dried onions. Initially, the plant would ship in onions from the Treasure Valley area, but eventually, company officials hope that area farmers would provide the onions, the newsletter said.

But Muolo says that onion processing is just one of the firm's processing options, and that a final decision will not be made until sometime "in the first quarter of '84."

Muolo says it is likely to be several years before any commercial operations are started.

The plant originally was developed by the Department of Energy to test state-of-the-art geothermal technology — to generate electric-

ity, heat greenhouses, distill alcohol fuel and warm fish and prawn ponds.

But the most publicized part of the project involved the construction of a five-megawatt geothermal power plant, which attempted to produce electricity from the 285-degree water.

Most commercial geothermal technologies use at least 350-degree water, so the Raft River system had to develop experimental technology involving heat-transfer systems to use the lower-temperature water.

However, the cost of the electricity proved to be as much as 15 times more expensive than the price charged by area utilities.

Some critics of the project labeled it a "boondoggle," but Muolo says that it did develop a great deal of useful research data.

"They did a pretty commendable job, and their final report contained extensive research and a lot of expertise," he says.

Muolo notes that the 285-degree water is "at the lower limits of what can be developed," but he says power generation at the site can be made commercially attractive if the proper technology is used.

Hydra-Co. has employed the Boise-based Geoenery Inc. to do preliminary studies at the site and to make feasibility recommendations.

In addition to geothermal technology, Hydra-Co. also is involved in developing hydroelectric and waste-energy projects, Muolo says.

Generosity brings joy to tiny fighter

TWIN FALLS — Candy canes in his belt and a present in his arms, Santa Claus made an early stop Thursday at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center to see little Emily Anderson.

The package was almost as big as the 18-pound child, who has spent much of the past four months in hospitals for treatment of cancer and other related illnesses.

"Can Santa help you open it?" the whiskered visitor asked, offering the package.

Still a bit dazed by his approach, Emily nodded "yes."

When the wrapper fell away, one of the stars of the Christmas season had come out to play — Annette Tansy, one of the Cabbage Patch Kids.

Moments later, Emily sat with her arm around her new red-haired friend, a laugh breaking over her face.

Santa had delivered the gift. But a Jerome family's generosity and the desire of a Twin Falls high-school student gave the 23-month-old child a special gift to help her spend Christmas in the hospital.

Michelle Coop, 16, had entered a local drawing

to win one of the scarce dolls. She had told her mother, Carol, "I'd give mine to Emily."

She didn't win, but she did think that Emily should have a doll.

So, Michelle issued an appeal — through Wednesday's Times-News — for someone to donate a doll to the young child, who was stricken with cancer of the kidney this fall.

The next morning, at a few minutes after 6, the Coop family awoke to a ringing phone. Don Jebb of Jerome was on the line. Jebb and his wife, Kathy, had purchased a Cabbage Patch doll weeks earlier for their 3-month-old daughter, Lindsey, and they wanted to give it to Emily.

"I guess we felt that Emily probably would appreciate the doll more than Lindsey would," Jebb said. "We've been blessed with two kids who are well, and seeing as how it's Christmas-time, we felt it was just the right thing to do."

The Jebbs also have a 2-year-old daughter, Melanie.

Mr. Jebb's voice is familiar to many Magic Valley radio listeners as the morning newscaster and operations manager for Twin Falls radio station KEEF.

But the Coop phone didn't stop ringing. By late Thursday, 18 donors had offered dolls.

"The part that we feel is the most interesting and the most touching is the people who were the most anxious (to donate) were people who had purchased them for their own children," says Carol Coop, who answered many of the inquiries.

Sherry Anderson, Emily's mother, was amazed by the response.

"This will be a reminder to keep in years to come of people's generosity and Christmas spirit," she said Thursday, her daughter playing on the bed nearby.

For them and for Emily, Thursday was a bright spot in difficult — almost tragic — times. Emily underwent surgery to remove a life-threatening kidney tumor in early October, and she has been taking radiation and chemotherapy treatments ever since.

Her pediatrician, Dr. John Trotter, says Emily is making excellent progress.

But side effects from the treatment also are severe. Most of her blonde hair has fallen out; she has lost weight; she suffers from nausea; and her body's natural defenses have been weakened by the medicines, Mrs. Anderson says.

The worst threat came in the past week, when pneumonia set in. For some time on Saturday, she was in the hospital.

Going to troubled dump Trucker fined for paint spill

GRANDVIEW — A truck driver bound for the controversial Envirostate waste dump in Owyhee County has been cited for negligence after his truck spilled a paint-filled drum onto Idaho 78, near Grandview.

The incident, which has been investigated by county, state and federal officials, occurred at about 1 p.m. Tuesday.

The trucker, who was employed by the Idaho Falls-based Grover Trucking Co., was carrying a load of waste epoxy paints from the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory to the dump for disposal.

A dispatcher for the Owyhee County sheriff's office said he did not know the name of the trucker.

The citation issues carries a maximum fine of \$50 and up to 10 days in jail, under an Idaho law that forbids the negligent or willful placing of debris on the highway.

The dispatcher said the driver will have to appear in court at a later date to either contest the citation or accept a court penalty.

According to Pat Stoll, a state environmental official, the driver failed to properly secure the paint barrel to the back of his truck's trailer.

"I just wasn't acceptably fastened," he said Thursday.

But Stoll said that the spill did not involve any hazardous or flammable wastes.

"It was just some pigmented material that gave the appearance of being solidified paint. They just scooped up the material and packed it in a drum that is being held at the dump site."

A second drum fell from the truck earlier Tuesday, as it left Interstate 84 at the Hammett exit, Stoll said. That drum was retrieved by the driver and put back on the truck, leaving behind only small amounts of clear-colored liquid, which appeared to be water, Stoll said.

The paint wastes, packed in 55-gallon drums, were being shipped to the dump site by Mantia, a Chicago-based contractor that has employees working at INEL.

Mantia contracted with Grover Trucking to transport the wastes to the Envirostate dump, Stoll said.

A Mantia spokesman, reached in Chicago on Thursday, said he could not comment about the accident until he had more details.

Stoll says the drums will not be buried at the site until they have been properly repacked.

In recent months, Owyhee County residents have been alarmed by reports that hazardous wastes have been improperly stored at the Envirostate site, and also by allegations of improper shipment of wastes to the site.

Stoll says that the recent publicity about the dump contributed to the attention focused on the paint spill.

"If the incident had happened anywhere else in the state other than Owyhee County, then probably no one would have heard about it," he said.

Commissioner job brings nominations

Magic Valley boosted as land for vacations

BURLEY — The Magieland Regional Travel Committee is proposing a \$103,000 campaign to promote the Magic Valley as a vacation spot during the next five months.

The committee will put a joint request from area chambers of commerce and other groups before the Idaho Travel Committee, which disburses money from the state's 2 percent "bed" tax.

The effort will include professional design work by two public-relations firms, Williamson and Reinhard-Cline of Boise, which is directing the campaign, and Elgin Syferd of Seattle, which is handling the Ketchum-Sun Valley portion.

The marketing work was sealed back earlier this month from an original target amount of \$130,000,

because the state committee is reorganizing its grant periods, so they begin on July 1, says Chairman Carl Boyer.

It is the first time the Magic Valley committee has assembled all of its grant requests into one package.

The group, which is composed of representatives from both chambers of businesses in the Magic Valley, also is conducting out-of-state promotions for major tourist events, such as the Burley Boat Regatta and the Jerome Air Show.

Last year, the Burley Chamber of Commerce calculated that the boating event brought \$150,000 worth of business to area motels and stores, as well as other spending to the region, Boyer says.

City leaders pushing for prison facility

GOODING — Gooding officials indicate they are enthusiastic about a proposed new use for the old state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding.

Earlier this week, Tim Jewell, the chairman of the Gooding Industrial Development Committee, told Gooding City Council members that his group is working with Idaho Department of Corrections officials and area legislators on a proposal that would use the facility as a regional, medium-security medical facility for prison inmates.

Such an operation would serve inmates who need constant medical care, he said.

Jewell said the proposal could involve as many as 13 Western states, although the project is still in the preliminary planning stages.

"We want to assess community support for the program first," he said.

Mayor Gene Heller says city officials have been concerned about what will happen to the building, which is now vacant.

At the council meeting, Heller noted that Gov. John Evans assured Gooding officials in the fall of 1982 that a productive use of the building would be found.

"We will not allow this fine facility to fall into disrepair," Evans said at the time.

Heller said he recently assured the governor that Gooding "is eager" to assist with, or participate in, finding an acceptable use for the building.

There are three buildings on the site. The two older ones were built in 1917 as part of the Gooding College, but they now are owned privately.

The main hospital building was built 15 years ago by the state as a long-term-care tuberculosis treatment center.

The facility was vacated as a hospital approximately 12 years ago, after new means of treatment meant that tuberculosis patients no longer had to be hospitalized or isolated for extended periods.

In recent years, the building served as office space for the state Health and Welfare, and Lands departments. One wing also housed the Walker Center, a private alcohol and drug treatment center.

The Health and Welfare office was moved to Jerome two years ago. Walker Center moved to the Gooding County Memorial Hospital in 1982, and high heating costs forced the Department of Lands to move to a smaller building in Gooding in the fall of 1982.

The service has become a tradition at the church, but it's always exciting to watch the children share God's love with the entire congregation, Rhode says.

At the United Methodist Church in Filer, Christmas stories and carols

from around the world will be read and sung as part of a Christmas Eve service, beginning at 7:30 p.m.

The most interesting one should be a story written by Lorenz Graham about how the Christmas story would be told in Africa, says the Rev. David Upp, the church's pastor. There also will be a story about China.

Children will be asked to bring a favorite gift during this Sunday's service at the First Presbyterian Church in Twin Falls. The Rev. Robert Van Nest says he will ask the children to tell about their gift so that they can become more a part of the service, which will begin at 11 a.m.

Constant vigil

St. Edward's members keep continuous watch in chapel devoted to prayer and meditation

TWIN FALLS — For 24 hours each day over the past year, there has been a quiet demonstration of dedication and faith in a little chapel at St. Edward's Catholic school.

Since the fall of last year, parishioners of the Twin Falls church have been present day and night in the chapel, along with a spiritual representation of Jesus Christ in the form of a water of bread.

This perpetual adoration, as it is called, began last November with an enthusiastic group of church members, says St. Edward's pastor, the Rev. Perry Dodds.

The idea had been proposed in past years, but the timing wasn't right, says George Shannon of Twin Falls, one of the coordinators. Last year, he found some new information on organizing the project. With Dodds' approval, the program got off the ground.

The basis of the undertaking has its roots in a long tradition. To Catholics and some other religions, bread represents the body of Christ. During worship services, parishioners eat a wafer of bread to reflect Christ's own words at the Last Supper, when he offered bread and wine to his apostles — but with a deeper significance, Dodds says.

"Christ gave himself to us, to the apostles, when he said, 'Take and eat, this is my body. Take and drink, this is my blood.' And to all of us, when he said, 'Do this in memory of me.'"

Christians believe that Jesus is truly present, blood and soul, during communion, Dodds says. It is this presence that is not to be left alone in the chapel, with its few seats and peaceful atmosphere. On a simple altar, the fragile-looking white bread is contained in a golden ornament, adorned with figures of holy men and women.

"The chapel is for meditation and contemplation, for prayer and reflection, but of the highest kind," Dodds says. "It is more than a quiet zone, a simple little meditation chapel, but the place on Earth were Jesus dwells, where he stands ready to receive an outpouring of faith and love from his children."

That faith and love is shown by the more than 200 persons who have given an hour each week, for weeks

and months, to the project.

The community makes the project work, Dodds says. Not all Catholic churches have one.

First, you need a place other than the church, which is a busy with weddings, funerals and regular worship services. In some cities, the risk of crime prevents leaving a church open continuously, as is required for perpetual adoration.

In this case, the chapel in the church's former school building worked out well.

The other difficulty is recruiting enough individuals to staff the project on an unflinching basis. Yet, it has been accomplished.

Adults, teenagers and senior citizens are participating, Shannon says. In case a person becomes ill or goes on vacation, a "captain" is ready to assign another volunteer or fill in the vacancy.

Shannon admits that it's not always easy to get up and go to the chapel.

"But every time I come, it's well worth it."

"It's something of a tribute to Twin Falls," Dodds says.

Pope criticizes kidnapping

VATICAN CITY (UPI) — Pope John Paul II said Monday that the killing of an American bishop in Nicaragua will "cloud" the Christmas season, and he warned that "war threatens the existence of society."

The pope reiterated the willingness of the Roman Catholic Church to act as a mediator in the search for global peace.

John Paul discussed — in an address to the priests of Rome and the Vatican reports that Bishop Salvador Sladek had been kidnapped and killed while with a group of Miskito Indians who were fleeing across the border to Honduras.

"If confirmed, this would be very painful news that clouds with sadness

this evil of Christmas," the pope said. "It is tragic to remind the world of the scriptures that say, 'Strike the shepherd, and the sheep of his flock will be dispersed.'"

The pope called on the assembled priests, including 32 cardinals, to pray with him for Sladek, whom he called a "zealous prelate, a worthy missionary in such a tormented land, a witness to the love of Christ in the midst of humble people who loved their pastor."

"He" was kidnapped yesterday (Wednesday) along with three of his priests, and an indefinite number of other people while he was on a visit to the community of Miskito Indians in his diocese," the pope said.

NCAA scraps free-throw rule

SPRINGFIELD, Mass. (UPI)—The NCAA men's basketball rules committee has unanimously voted to abandon the controversial "last-two-minute free-throw rule," effective immediately, officials said Thursday.

Dr. Edward Steltz, secretary-editor of the 13-member committee, said Thursday that dumping the rule change, only eight months after its adoption, was necessary to preserve "the integrity of the game."

The old rule was restored in time for Thursday night games.

The controversial rule had stated two free throws would be granted for each common foul committed during the last two minutes of regulation and during any overtime periods. If the bonus situation was ineffective.

"Unfortunately, fouling was increasing," said Steltz. "Excessive fouling was prolonging the game to an abnormal degree." He mentioned a recent game between Temple and Villanova in which it took 26 minutes to complete the last two minutes of regulation play.

Malone has sprained ankle

PHILADELPHIA (UPI)—The Philadelphia 76ers will play the first of seven straight road games without center Moses Malone, who suffered a sprained ankle against San Antonio, the club said Thursday.

Malone, the NBA's leading rebounder, and the 76ers' top scorer, injured his right ankle in a collision with Andrew Toney in the fourth quarter but stayed in the game. He finished with 28 points and 14 rebounds in the Sixers' 122-121 victory over the Spurs.

A team spokesman said Malone will not make the trip to Detroit for tonight's game against the Pistons. He will be re-examined Monday before the team departs for Kansas City on the first leg of a six-game road trip.

Richardson may have to wait

EAST RUTHERFORD, N.J. (UPI)—New Jersey Nets executive vice president Lew Schaffel said Thursday guard Michael Ray Richardson won't rejoin the team until he passes his drug test and proves he is ready to play.

Richardson, who was reinstated at urging of the NBA Wednesday, took a physical exam and drug-screening tests Thursday. He had been waived by the Nets Oct. 11 when the team claimed he failed to report to a drug rehabilitation center as ordered by the league.

Schaffel said results of the tests may be back today but probably won't be available until Saturday.

Hatfield gets Arkansas job

FAYETTEVILLE, Ark. (UPI)—Ken Hatfield, formerly football coach at the Air Force Academy, Thursday was named coach at the University of Arkansas. Thursday ended a four-day search that began Sunday with the unexpected resignation of Lou Holtz.

The announcement was made by Arkansas athletic director Frank Broyles after a meeting with university officials. Broyles stated earlier he would wait until after the Jan. 2 bowl games to announce a choice, but said Thursday the "situation was too volatile" to wait that long.

Hatfield was at Fayetteville Tuesday and Wednesday and described his visit as an "information-gathering" effort. At the time he said the job had not been offered and he was not sure he would accept it if it were. Sources said Hatfield was being pressured by Air Force officials to let them know of his intentions.

Hatfield, a native Arkansan, will be returning to the school where he led the nation in punt returns as co-captain of Broyles' 1964 national championship team.

Wenzel wins downhill race

HAUS, Austria (UPI)—Hanni Wenzel of Liechtenstein, the reigning Olympic slalom and giant slalom champion, Thursday stole the limelight from the established speed experts by winning her first ever World Cup downhill race.

But the event was marred by a serious injury to 19-year-old Hungarian Gailia Ajkoc, who was suffering from a fractured skull and a fractured arm after crashing into a barrier during the final training run.

Ajkoc was taken to hospital in Salzburg where she was reported to be still unconscious.

Wenzel, who will not be allowed to defend her Olympic titles at Sarajevo, Yugoslavia, next February because of her semi-professional status, edged West Germany's Irene Epple by 0.33 seconds with a blistering time of 1:44.67 down the demanding 2,700-meter-long icy track.

Epple placed second in 1:45.00 followed by Maria Walliser of Switzerland with 1:45.03.

Dolphins' Marino wins passing efficiency title

NEW YORK (UPI)—Dan Marino of the Miami Dolphins is the first rookie quarterback to win either an AFC or NFC passing efficiency title since the AFL-NFL merger, according to final league statistics released Thursday.

Despite missing the final two games of the season because of a knee injury, Marino won the AFC passing efficiency title by completing 173 of 286 attempts for 2,210 yards and 20 touchdowns. He had only six passes intercepted and finished with a 58.6 completion percentage.

Two other rookies, Eric Dickerson of the Los Angeles Rams and Curt Warner of Seattle, emerged as the NFL's rushing champions. Dickerson set a club record and led all NFL rushers with 1,808 yards and also scored 20 touchdowns. Warner captured the AFC rushing title with 1,449 yards.

Another outstanding-rookie performance was turned in by Ali Haji-Sheikh of the Giants, who made 35 of 42 field goal attempts to break Jim Tynes' former league mark of 34 for the New York Jets in 1976.

Veteran Steve Bartkowski of Atlanta won the NFC pass efficiency

title. Bartkowski threw for 22 touchdowns and had only five passes intercepted while completing 63.4 percent of his passes. Bartkowski's percentage of interceptions (1.2 percent) was the second lowest in history to the 0.6 compiled by Joe Ferguson of Buffalo in 1976.

Lynn Diekey of Green Bay led the NFL in touchdown passes with 32 but he also had the most passes intercepted (29).

Tight end Todd Christensen of the Los Angeles Raiders led the AFC in pass receiving with 92 catches. The NFC pass receiving title ended in a three-way tie between Roy Green of St. Louis, Charlie Brown of Washington and Earnest Gray of the New York Giants. However, Green had more total yardage and more touchdown passes than the other two.

In addition to Brown, three other Redskins' players emerged with individual titles in the NFC. John Riggins scored an NFL record 24 touchdowns, Mark Moseley booted 62 of 63 extra point attempts and 33 of 47 field goal tries for an NFL kick scoring record of 161 points and safety Mark Murphy led the conference in interceptions with nine.

Bradshaw doesn't participate in Steeler workout

PITTSBURGH (UPI)—Curt Stoudt, and Mark Malone split the quarterbacking duties Thursday during the Pittsburgh Steelers' two-hour workout at Three Rivers Stadium in preparation for their New Year's weekend playoff game.

A Steelers spokesman said Terry Bradshaw did not take any snaps or throw a pass during the session. He reappeared in his throwing elbow in his only appearance this season, two weeks ago in a 34-7 victory over the New York Jets.

Local artists try Big Apple

TWIN FALLS — What is it like for two young artists raised in Twin Falls to suddenly transplant themselves into the heart of New York City?

"Petrifying," is how Mark and Stephanie Gerber describe their first months in the Big Apple.

Referring to the move nearly three years ago, Mark Gerber says he "got used to it in six months — it took Stephanie about a year."

He says they'd go for walks all hours of the day or night to acquaint themselves with the city.

Both Gerbers worked at the Times-News during the summer after their junior year in high school — he in sales and she as an illustrator. They say their entire lives have run in parallel courses leading to their apartment studio on Madison Avenue, one block from the Empire State Building.

Raised a block apart, the two have been friends literally all their lives. "And we still are," Mark says in mock amazement about their marriage that took place January of 1988.

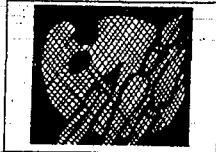
Lenore Parker, Stephanie's mother, says the couple's relationship was based totally on art. According to her, no one ever considered the two as anything but art chums, and it came as a great shock when the artists announced they were going to be married.

The move to New York City was precipitated by their studies at an illustrator's workshop in Tarrytown, New York during the summer of 1979. The workshop was a great confidence builder, they both claim, and it gave them a chance to study with seasoned professionals.

Mark says one of the instructors there was Bob Peak, the illustrator who did the poster work for the movies "Apocalypse Now" and "Every Which Way But Loose."

Returning to Twin Falls, Mark and Stephanie each worked for a short while at separate print shops while they began to assemble a portfolio with the idea of becoming full-time, freelance artists. Instead of working up separate portfolios, they combined what Mark calls her tight style with his looser one.

Stephanie, who's father is retired Morningside School Principal



Clarence Miller, says, "You paint what you're interested in — I'm interested in detail. As an example, she points out the filigree she painted in a self portrait where she appears as Medusa. The same intricate detail also shows itself in many book covers she has illustrated.

Concerning portraits, she talks about her kind of mood, saying, "I thought I liked good," going on to explain that she wanted to paint people in happy states. Illustration, though, helped her to see something else.

"I paint more melancholy," she says. "More surreal. That's my kind of mood."

Her husband says "There's always a constant — One, single message." For his part, he finds painting people more interesting than objects.

"I love to draw — a face or gesture or movement of somebody — to capture a certain mood or attitude. I enjoy people's moods."

He says he's always kept himself back a little bit and watched people.

"He's much more able than I am to spot both sides," Stephanie says.

On her strength, Mark says she excels in fabrics, textures, and still lifes. He points out, for example, a jeweled swastika illustration of hers on the cover of the book, "Goring's Treasure." It's not unusual for Mark to draw a picture and then have Stephanie take over to paint it in her technique, he says.

For their type of work, Mark says they had to be in a metro area with a lot of publishing and advertising. So, in March of 1980, portfolio in hand, they took the plunge and headed for the biggest market of all.

"We went with an open mind," says Stephanie. "We knew we'd always have each other, and always have our families in Idaho."

Mark adds that they looked at it, not

'Endearment' mirrors all of life's tragedies and triumphs

TWIN FALLS — Instead of the usual motherly advice on the eve of her daughter's wedding, Aurora Greer says her daughter she is not special enough to overcome a bad marriage.

From that, it's clear Aurora is not the most lovable mother in the world. A little cold, domineering, proper and ever doing things in good taste.

Her daughter, Emma, on the other hand, is a warm, sensitive and funny woman, who wears T-shirts and

gangly skirts. She is, as one friend put it, a "touchstone."

The relationship between Emma and Emmama is the basis of "Terms of Endearment." And their bond is a wonderful and heart-heating tragic-comedy that is wonderful to behold.

The actors are a priceless ensemble headed by Debra Winger as Emma. The rough-voiced Winger, whose first big film was "Urban Cowboy," plays



the character with magnificent understatement. Her Emma evokes compassion and understanding throughout, even while

she is embarking on a disastrous marriage or illicit love affair, yelling at her children or dealing with a mother whom her husband says "merely holds her in medium esteem."

Winger's big brown eyes are worth a page of dialogue.

As Aurora, veteran actor Shirley MacLaine is every bit the prim Bostonian set down in Houston — especially annoying is her neighbor, the wild astronaut and continually lecherous Garret Breedlove.

MacLaine is fine and her Aurora seethes with an unproper passion that

is dying to emerge.

The one temptation to Aurora, however, is the slightly paunchy, somewhat foul-mouthed, but charming Breedlove, played by Jack Nicholson. Nicholson is in his element as the quirky astronaut who doesn't

want to be tied to earthly affairs so long as he can have a few orbital one-night stands.

Yet, he still reveals a side that needs more than the sexual conquests and booze. This is one of his best roles. As mother and daughter handle their own changes over the years — like Aurora's hitting her 50th birthday

or Emma's affair — their emotions and thoughts are voiced in long-distance telephone conversations that go beyond maternal to the realm of confidence.

Unknowingly, each provides nourishment for the other's growth. Only in Emma's illness, do the two finally come to terms.

Despite scenes that move you to tears, this is not a glossy soap opera. The all-too-human idiosyncrasies of each character keeps "Terms of Endearment" solidly on the ground. The majority of nuances appear in

Arts center enthusiasm high

Activities range from children's workshops to poetry seminars

SUN VALLEY — There is a new enthusiasm at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities these days, much of it due to Director Greer Markle and the new faces he has brought to the organization in recent months.

New himself in 1982, Markle came from Boston where he was director of visual arts for the New England Foundation of the Arts. But he is a westerner, raised in Casper, Wyo., with degrees from the University of Wyoming and the University of Utah.

He says he agreed to take the job with the center because of its potential.

"The center was in a transitional period," Markle explains. "They had been without a director for six months and any effect I might have would certainly be felt."

The number and variety of opportunities at the center today are larger than ever — ranging from adult and children's workshops, fiction and poetry seminars, film festivals, music programs, innovative art exhibits and major western-issues conferences.

In July, Markle brought Kris Poole from Chicago's Lill Street Gallery to run the Sun Valley Center Gallery, which Markle feels is one of the strongest features of

the organization — the showcase for the products of the center.

For some time, the gallery has been the subject of controversy among the board of directors, many of whom felt the gallery should be a money-making, commercial operation.

Recently, says Glenn Janas, founder and ex officio board member of the Center, the organization reaffirmed its original goals that the gallery sell art to provide for some of its revenues but also function as a non-profit exhibition space.

"This is important," Poole explains, "because as a non-profit gallery, we are able to take risks and show the work of artists who have little exposure in commercial galleries where it is economically unsound for owners to invest in experimental art forms."

"We want to take risks — to challenge, not to placate," Markle adds.

Currently, the gallery has an exhibit of five Idaho artists: Boise photographers Michael Cordell and Howard Huff, Moscow mixed media sculptor David Moreland, Hope graphic artist Russell Rosander, and Pocatello ceramicist Gene Suzanne Wepner. The exhibition, on display through Jan. 9, offers a variety of content, style and media, which explore aspects of contemporary lifestyles and relationships.

This is one of a number of exhibits scheduled for the year that focus on regional artists. Others include "Intentions: Northwest Women's Invitational" and "South of the Border: Utah Art."

Later in the year, the gallery will bring artist-sculptor Christo to the area for lectures and film presentations.

Christo most recently received wide public attention when he placed enormous pink shirts around several Florida islands.

While the gallery is flourishing, so are the rest of the center's arts efforts under the direction of Chris Montague. In September as director of programs for the arts arm of the center.

Montague came from Salt Lake where he was director of the Utah Media Center, working with Jacquelyn Schuette of the community arts programs, the two have set up an am-

bitious schedule for the months ahead.

In January, the center is offering a local adventure series, and in February, a foreign film festival. Throughout the winter there will be musical performances by folk singer Rosalie Sorrels, acoustic guitarist Chris Proctor and others.

There are children's classes for youngsters 6 and older in animation, ceramics and photography, and adults classes in writing techniques and marketing; calligraphy; line wood-making, weaving and drawing.

Year-round classes in ceramics continue to be one of the important center programs, along with intensive summer sessions in photography and graphics.

"The problem," says Markie, is to keep a focus for all the activities. "It is important that the center provide for the people of the area," Markie maintains.

"I am not interested in bringing New York artists here to teach New York students. But I would like to have New York artists teaching Boise, Twin Falls and Salt Lake students because it's not happening any place in the region."

In the performing arts area, the center continues to sponsor the Wood River Music Festival during July that brings chamber musicians to the area from around the United States.

The center has brought the American Opera Theater and Boise Symphony to the area. Next year, it is planning an appearance by New York dance company MOMA.

The new spirit in the arts center, however, has been dampened with the recent announcement of the resignation of Richard Hart, director of the Institute of the American West, effective Sept. 1, due to "irreconcilable differences" with the center's board of directors.

Under Hart's direction, the in-

stitute, the humanities' arm of the center, has achieved major regional recognition for its conferences, lecture series and folk arts festivals, all reflecting aspects of western American life.

Both Markie and Hart maintain the institute's programming will not change. And Hart will stay on through the summer to oversee a busy series of events including the conference on Women's history to be held in Park City, Utah, July 11-14.

This is a follow-up to the conference co-sponsored by the institute with the Coalition of Western Women's History at Elkhorn last summer.

Aug. 2, 3 and 4 will bring the Northern Rockies Folk Festival to Halley for the seventh year with an expanded program of concerts, workshops and folk art presentations.

The institute's main project, says Hart, will be its "Parks in the West" conference, Aug. 15-18 in Sun Valley.

"The idea behind the conference is to examine the kinds of values that

have been expressed in the reservation of lands for parks, whether national, state, local or private. What kind of values were meant to be expressed, through their administration, what kind of values are being expressed and what should those values be in the future, given park potential, populations and demography.

"Interestingly," Hart continues, "westerners were the first to ask that western land be set aside."

In October, the institute will participate in a western cowboy poetry festival in Elko, Nev.

"We will be working throughout western states to identify cowboys who carry the tradition of poetry," Hart explained. "Cowboys when they are out riding often sing songs and recite poetry of original works or pieces that have been passed on for years."

The Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities is funded in large part by memberships. For \$35, a member receives the center's newsletter, calendar and a 10 percent discount on classes and gallery purchases.

The center receives additional funding from the National Endowment for the Arts and the Endowment for the Humanities, the Idaho Commission on the Arts, the Idaho Association for the Humanities, private grants, family foundations and Idaho corporations.

Instead of popular music of the 1960s, the setting of the film.

Besides the actors, the credit goes to director James Brooks for avoiding the gloss and concentrating on depth.

The film is a near-perfect slice of life that contains all those familiar moments. There's the excitement of a new marriage and the boredom that sometimes follows the honeymoon. The cruelty of truth, and the loneliness of lost children, betrayal of love that backfires.

Ultimately, "Terms of Endearment" is a mirror of all of life's little and big triumphs and tragedies. The film has a burning spirit — and a vibrant life all its own.

Drown, a Mesclero Apache, says her personal objective in opening the gallery is to give others the appreciation of Indian art and the Indian culture that her mother gave to her.

"I owe everything I am to my mother. If it hadn't been for her," Drown says, "I'd never have the appreciation of art and my heritage that I do. That's very important for all of us." Particularly, she adds, in a land whose current obsession is with invention and mobility.

"Everything the Indian did had meaning," says Drown. An Indian artist must understand that to ade-

quately portray the culture.

"In Indian art, the east is usually yellow or white, signifying the resurrection or rebirth, or the newness of life. The south is green for innocence; the west red as the sun, and the north, black as the evening."

In Drown's own water color paintings, her choice of colors correspond to the legend she is depicting.

In the legend of the two brothers' quest, she portrays the brothers as horses — one black and one shades of blue, symbolizing the lands they discovered.

The father is depicted by a background wash of a variety of pastels, portraying his omnipotence above and beyond all earthly things.

The Heritage Gallery will carry primarily originals, says Horja and Drown, but we also will have lithographs, sandpaintings, Indian rugs, photography and pottery. Custom framing also will be available.

as a matter of life or death, but rather, with an attitude that make their own luck and to be at the right place at the right time.

They didn't live in half way, either. Within two weeks, they had signed a lease on a fourth floor apartment in a 12-story building located at the very heart of the city.

"The Empire State Building was our night light for three months," Mark says. "We had only one lamp and a few lawn chairs my uncle from Connecticut loaned us." It was also opportune, Mark says, that the location of their apartment, where they have drawing boards, is located in the living room walls, is located within 10 to 15 blocks of nearly all their clients. And, considering that book cover illustrating, "Has paid the rent," they didn't do bad having three book publishers within five blocks of their business-residence.

"Their hours are odd, Mark says, and they often work all night before going to bed at 5 or 6 a.m. in the bedroom apartment.

Cramped as it is, Mark has been able to use his father's (Twin Falls architect Henry Gerber) talents by having him design a loft bed room high enough to provide area for their photography darkroom underneath.

In illustrating, photography is part of their work. For instance, the December 11, 1983 edition of "Family Weekly" that came as an insert with

that Sunday's Times-News sported Stephanie's painting of Mark's photograph of their friend and fellow illustrator, Rob Sauber.

The illustration for the cover story entitled "Silent Nights, Empty Days," was definitely melancholy.

"It also brings out Stephanie's frustration about doing illustrations. "Family Weekly isn't anything like the original," she complains. An obvious perfectionist, she feels that a lot of quality is lost from the transition of her painting to a paper cover. Also, she feels that an artist is too-compromised, and too hurried to allow for perfection in an illustration.

In fact, they're trying to slow down from the hectic two-illustrations-a-week pace which, "Leaves no time for ourselves," in an ideal situation where they do only two jobs a month and spend the rest of their time doing art for themselves.

Her idea of success is, "To paint what we're going to paint and sell it." They'd both like to paint more for themselves and commissions and galleries. Ultimately, Stephanie says, "We'd both really like to hang in the Metropolitan Museum as long as we don't have to compromise either our art or ourselves."

Recently, she submitted a painting, of Lisa Gerber, Mark's sister, to a judged show in Pennsylvania and was accepted for the exhibition.

Following his own path, Mark says, "Stephanie's pretty well fulfilled as far as illustration's concerned." But

in his own right, he says he'd like to do a book of color illustrations or a series of classics like Robert Louis Stevenson's "Treasure Island."

Skiers, they both miss the mountains of Idaho.

"Here, if somebody says 'Look at that mountain,' you ask, 'Where? It's hidden behind those foothills?'" Mark jokes about the East. He says that skiers are really proud about being able to make all man-made snow.

But, besides the proximity to markets, the Big Apple does have other attributes according to the two.

"A place like this forces you to go into yourself more," Stephanie says. Mark relates that they actually have more privacy there than in a small town except that the noise is somewhat difficult with garbage trucks at 3 in the morning and a bus stop right outside their apartment.

Ideally, they would like to keep their apartment in the city while having a quieter place an hour or two away, probably in Connecticut. And, of course, to be able to vacation in Idaho.

Neither would place artists on pedestals. They believe that everybody has the desire to communicate — An artist just has the ability and desire to show it.

"We use visual like other people use words or writing or are musicians." They agree that, "Art is nothing more than communication."

Gift-giving thankless task for aunt

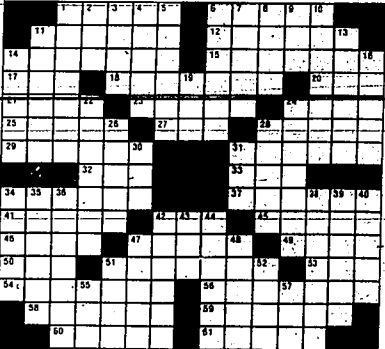

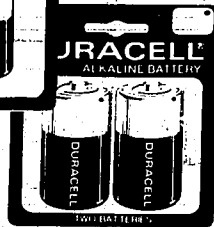
