Reagan stung anew by hopeful rivals

The Rev. Jesses Jackson said Sunday that Reagan administration policies on Africa have left the United States "a pitiful ... glant," and Gary Hart used the Pacific Ocean as a backdrop to castigate the Republican president's environmental record. Walter F. Mondale — now just 300 delegates shy of 10c 1,937 delegates needed to claim the Democratic presidential normalion — spent most of the law preparing for a Sunday right television call-in-show in New Jersey, where he criticized Hart and Reagan administration policies.

Jackson is heading to Mexico on Monday for meetings with regional leaders to discuss peace prospects for Central America but took time out Sunday for what he billed as a major address on

African policy.

"Our foreign policy guarantees us so few friends, so many enemies... Right now, when there is a real crisis in the Persian Gulf, we are impotent," the black candidate told a rally and parade in Newartk. No one respects us. No one tishens to us and just what we feared most is happening — the oil resources of the Mideast are threatened by war.

"We have become a pitful boastful, bragging, glant unable to intervene even in our own intercests."

Milky Way object has experts baffled

NEW YORK — A heavenly beacon rotating like a lighthouse is the most powerful star in the Milky Way and may be a kind of nearby miniature quasar that will help scientists unravel the violent-forces of the distant universe, an astronomer said Sunday. The star, known only as SS-43, is "completely unique in a galaxy of 100 billion stars," said Bruce Margon of the University of Washington, "It is perhaps the most tunusual-object-in-the Milky Way."

The star was discovered, catalogued and forgotten 15 years ago. Then, in 1978, Margon and other astronomers found it was one of the few stars in the earth's own galaxy—the Milky Way—to emit radio waves and X-rays.

Since then, astronomers have made one bizarre observation after another, and Margon-said-that-studying-this enigmatic star has grown into a cottage industry for scientists around the world

Recently, they used radio astronomy to add convincing evidence to the leading theory about what SS-433 looks like.

They now believe the star is a flat, rotating disc that shoots out two needle-thin beams of gas. Close up, it might look something like a glowing dinner-plate with a fire hose nozigomboth sides, each: spewing out highly pressurized streams of hydrogen and helium.

The gas in these beams moves incredibly fast—about a quarter of the speed of light. The amount of kinetic, or moving, energy in these kinetic, or moving, energy in these seeds of light.

At least 10 die in Tulsa

TULSA, Okla. — A record deluge om a foot of overnight rain washed from a foot of overnight rain washed up to 6 feet deep through thousands of homes in this oil city Sunday, sending house trailers and cars floating down streams and killing at least 10 people.

Scores of others were injured and thousands were left without power in the metropolitan-region of about 470,000 people where up to 13 inches of rain fell.

Heavy thunderstorms bearing tornadoes continued to pound the area Sunday afternoon, but no addi-tional damage or injuries were re-

Idonal damage or Injuries were reported.

Mayor Terry Young warned resihens in low-lying areas to "be prepared to move to a place of safety"
because of thunderstorms buildings to
he west of Tuisa. Residents were
also advised to stay off city stream
because of the possibility of more
flooding from late storms.
Young declared a state of
emergency and activated National
Guardsmen as 2,100 families were
driven from their homes.

Utahns battle rising waters as runoff bursts through dike



Fastest growing cities in Texas, Florida

WASHINGTON (AP) — Nine of the nation's 10 fastest growing cities are in Texas or Florida with Midland. Texas, at the top of the list, according to a study of population changes.

The report prepared by Dun & Bradstreet Com. in

population changes.
The report prepared by Dun & Bradstreet Corp. in New York reports that Midland jumped 29.7 percent to 107,193 people between the 1900 census and 1900.
Both the Dun & Bradstreet estimates for 1903, and a Census Bureau report last month on population growth

between 1900 and 1962, confirm continued population increases in the South and West and losses in many northern cities.

Other views Subminimum wages

Youth unemployment is so high these days that the National Conference of Black Mayors has suggested an experiment with the subminimum wage. The group says it believes all workers should get the minimum wage, but the teen problem has reached such proportions that it-may require unusual measures. The mayors are besieged day in and day out with teenagers who want to work and can't find it, so they are willing to try a subminimum wage to see if it can do any good.

Opponents of the idea—including the toward and black Mayor Harold Washington of Chicago—say it is likely to create more problems than it solves. They say that adults who work for minimum wage to support families will suffer if employers have the choice of hiring teenagers at lower prices. They also say that under a proposal before Congress, there's no guarantee the Teenagers litred at subminimum wages will be the ones who most need the chance to work.

President Reagan has suggested a teenage sub-fininimum wage of \$2.50 an hour — compared to the minimum of \$3.35 — for the summer months. He predicts it would create 400,000 jobs, and he says there would be penalties for firms that fire an older worker

would be penalties for firms that fire an older worker to save money on a youngster.

Many people will ask what's wrong with that. Won't the Reagan proposal protect older workers, and shouldn't we be willing to try almost anything to cope with 22 percent teen unemployment (48.5 percent for blacks)?

Maybe. But before we try to answer those questions, we should ask whether employers have responded to other wage incentives. There are already two good ones on the books. The Fair Labor Standards-Act allows firms to pay students subminimum wages, but only 4 perent of the eligible firms participate. There is also a generous tax credit for employers who hire disadvantaged youth, but Congress's General Accounting Office says only 3.7 percent of the eligible employers in the nation take advantage of that provision.



Why don't employers use what they alpeady have to save money and create new jobs?

Baltimore's experience with Blue Chip-in suggests that employers will use the tax breaks if they understand the benefits, so it seems that education about existing programs should be the first order of business. But it is conceivable that employers would respond to an added incentive. If we ever test the idea with a subminimum wage, we should do it with more caution than Mr. Reagan proposed. We should try a pllot project in a few designated areas, and it ought to be targeted to the disadvantaged youth who need help most.

That way we might learn something about the subminimum wage, and might also avoid rushing headlong into what could be a very big mistake.

Financial reports offer vague picture

BOISE — Congressional financial disclosure reports are sort of like watching a baseball game through a hole in the fence.

You get a glimpse, but not the whole picture. All congressional office-holders, candidates, top appointed of licials and some employees of the House and Senate have to make amutal reports on their financial status. The reports cover stock market holdings, land and real estate — and even the amount of outstanding debt on the property.

I daho's congressional candidates and office-holders filed their reports last week. And they show some political figures are well off, although their assets are more in land than hard cash.

Take Fred Craner, the Fost Falls logging contractor who decided at the last minute to take on Republican Rep. Larry Craig in the 1st District congressional race. He shows assets worth more than 22 million — but dish't list his habilities or loans on the property.

Craner showed gross income of \$227, 421 from logging last year, although that doesn't show his profit after operating expenses.

Craner listed 480 acres of land and a house on the HooDoo Loop at \$450,000; 80 acres with 1,400 feet of lakefroit at Twin Lakes, walked at \$280,000 and a home on the Spokane River valued at \$280,000.

Craner provided exact figures. But the Ethics in

Government Act requires only broad categories. So a candidate has to estimate a property at \$5,000 to \$15,000; \$15,000 to \$50,000; \$50,000 to \$250,000 and over \$250,000. 

'Throwing stars' have police, school worried

IDAHO FALLS — They may look menacing, especially on TV when they're puncturing tires. But show they're puncturing tires. But show they are basic leenage fools of annoyance, and they have police and school of licials in Idaho Falls concerned. "I don't hink they're a deadly threat," says local martial arts instructor Earnie Robinson, contending BB guns and pocket knives are just as dangerous.

Bis guns and pocket kinves are just as dangerous.

But the hazard comes from teenagers sharpening the six or eight edged projectlles — available mainly through mail order add in martial arts magazines — and then throwing them recklessly.
"It's similar to a BB gun."

Robinson says. "Kids see shows like 'The Master,' where guys are doing things with them that aren't really possible. I don't think it's something you'll be able to kill someone with. But it can put out an eye." The stars, part of the "Britial art known as Ninjilsu, have police and school officials worried enough. "They're coming to attention," says Idaho Falls Police Detective Dennis Nizzi, "not because they're being thrown in a threatening manner, but because they're being thrown in a careless manner. Parents are concerned that a child's going to get injured by carelessness." No complaints have come from the sections, and most shurtkens are being thrown around after school, he said. But school is where they're bought, sold and traded.

Utility to continue controversial ads

BOISE (AP) — Despite some negative reaction. Idaho Power Co. will confinue its anti-subordination advertisements this summer, spokesman Jim Taney says.

"We are fully aware of some people reacting negatively to our advertising, particularly in the Magic Valley rural areas where there seems to be a lot of misunderstanding about who would benefit from subordination and who would get burit," said Taney, who is the company's director of public information.

The issue of subordinating Idaho Power's water rights — putify them second to the water rights of other users — has been a bone of contention in the Idaho E-gislature for the past two sessions.

The subordination question came to the forefront in late 1862, when the stale Supreme

Court ruled that Idaho Power's Snake River water rights at Swan Falls Dam take priority over the rights of other users upstream. Some lawmakers and water users contend the ruling will frever future development along the Snake River.

Snake River.

But attempts to reverse the effects of the ruling
by subordinating Idaho Power's water rights
have consistently failed in the state Legislature.
Idaho Power has likened subcridination to
taking someone's property without paying for it,
and says subordination would lead to rate in-

and says successions.

"When Idaho Power talks about land developers benefiting from subordination, it is not talking about people who presently use water. It is talking about future developers who would take

more water from the river and force rate increases for everyone else, "Taney said.
"We realize this is a complicated issue that is not easily addressed in brief advertisements. But we think we have a responsibility to tell our customers through every medium available about the inevitable consequences of taking more water from the river that fuels their hydroelectric system," Taney said. "After ail, they're the ones who would have to pay the costs of subordination."

The utility has offered to sign a contract with the state to drug 5,000 of those defendants. In exchange for offsmissing those defendants, the utility would be protected from any allegations that it is not doing all it can to defend its water rights.







Kidnapping threat arouses concern

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — More guards wereposted at the American University as foreign
teachers and U.S. Embassy workers were warned
about a kidnapping threat from a fundamentalist
Moslem Shiltes group, sources said Sunday.

In eastern Tebanon, three Israeli soldiers were
killed and two were wounded in an ambush of their
vehicle near the Syrian-Lebanese border. The
Israeli milliary command in Tel Aviv said the
killers fired machine guns and tut-propelled grenades as the partor approached the village of
Kamed Fi-Loz. The deaths brought to 14 the number
of Isaeli soldiers killed in Lebanon this year.

A United Nations official in Tel Aviv reported that
a Lebanese civilian, car was destroyed by an
explosion near an Israeli army position at Harts; 13*
miles southeast of Tyre. The official, a spokesman

for the U.N. peacekeeping force in southern Lebanon, gave no further details. Sources who declined to be identified said it was believed the car was carrying a bomb and the two occupants were killed in the blast.

was carrying a Donn and use two exceptions was carrying a bonn and use two exceptions. In other violence in Lebanon Sunday, six people were wounded by rockets and shells in Beirut and four were wounded in a shootout after a soccer match in southern Lebanon.

The threat to American University faculty members came from an Irania-abilited group called Hezbollath, or Party of God, and was relayed by the U.S. Embassy, according to university sources who asked not to be identified.

One said the communique from the embassy indicated the kidnap operation was to be carried out by guerrillas, some with explosives wrapped

around themselves, and "in case these elements are hit by fire, they and the people they have kidnapped will be killed by the explosion."

He said the embassy advised the university that as many as 100 Hezbollah members might be involved in the kidnap plot and that 20 were believed to be "from the university" — presumably students and employees.

About 50 Americans and other Westerners are imployed at the university.

U.S. Embassy spokesman John Stewart said, "I can confirm that there was an intelligence report that there was some sort of threat" against American University teachers "and other Ameri-cans."



Mears, the 1970 winner who finished second and third the past two years, was left without a challenge after detending champion from Sneva's carsuffered a broken u-joint with 32 laps left in the \$2.5 million race. Mears, part of the elite Roger Penske racing team, broke the race record set by Mark Donohue in 1972, averaging 163.621 mph and covering the 500 miles in 3 bours, 3 minutes, 21 seconds. 
