Deficit a bit lower

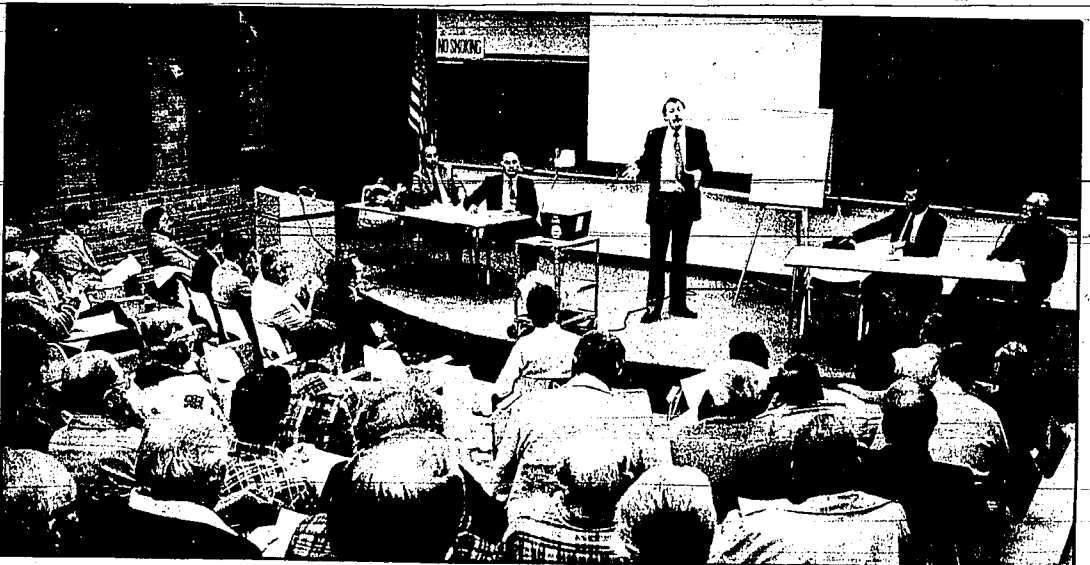
WASHINGTON — The federal government ran up a \$175.3 billion budget deficit in fiscal year 1984, down from the all-time record set last year but still the second-largest flood of red ink in U.S. history, the Treasury Department announced Thursday.

The deficit total for the fiscal year which ended on Sept. 30 was \$1 billion higher than the Reagan administration had predicted in August but was down considerably from what both the administration and private economists had feared at the beginning of the year.

The \$175.3 billion deficit was 10 percent below the \$195.3 billion record set in 1983, the year that Ronald Reagan had pledged while campaigning in 1980 that he would balance the government's books.

The final deficit figure would have been even higher but the government actually ran a rare surplus of \$16.8 billion last month, brought about because September government checks such as Social Security were mailed in late August because of the Labor Day holiday.

The 1984 report showed that the fastest growing category in the federal budget is interest payments on the national debt, which increased by 19.4 percent last year. The \$153.8 billion in interest paid on the \$1.6 trillion debt is the third-biggest spending category.

Officials explain legal package on Swan Falls

TWIN FALLS — The Swan Falls agreement signed Wednesday by state officials will not take effect unless the state Legislature and Water Board approves a six-step legal package explained at public meeting in Twin Falls Thursday evening.

Frank Sherman, a state Department of Water Resources hydrologist, said that the agreement calls for the legal package to be adopted in a road map for the resolution of the (Swan Falls) problem, and in part by the Water Board — no later than May 15, 1985.

can sit down and say yes, the controversy has finally been resolved," Sherman said. But if the legal package is rejected by the Legislature, then the agreement would not take effect, Sherman cautioned. Sherman teamed up with state Water Board members and key negotiators in the Swan Falls agreement to explain the complicated legal document to an audience of about 60 people.

The agreement not only protects the rights of current water users but also sends a message to the rest of the nation "that Idaho has its house fully in order."

"We are telling the world that the (Snake River) water is now fully appropriated and can't be claimed by any other entity." He said that the agreement will also allow future development "to proceed ahead in a responsible fashion" by "bringing Idaho's water code into the 21st century."

The agreement calls for new development below Millner Dam to be carefully regulated to maintain a 3000 cubic feet per second minimum

stream flow at the Murphy gauge near Swan Falls. Sherman said this new regulation will cause the Water Resources Department to change the way it views new water right applications for land development. In the past, the agency has reviewed these applications in terms of how much new farmland they would irrigate. If the agreement takes effect, a water rights consumptive impact on the Snake River flow at Murphy would be a key concern, he said. "As an agency, our main concern will be what is the consumptive use of a water right — because consumption will be what places limitations on future development," Sherman said.

Chemicals befouling sources of U.S. drinking water

WASHINGTON — Chemical contamination of underground water wells has closed more than 1,000 water supplies, affects every state in the nation and, over the long run, threatens the water supplies of half the nation's population, a new study said Thursday.

The report by the congressional Office of Technology Assessment said the problem, a

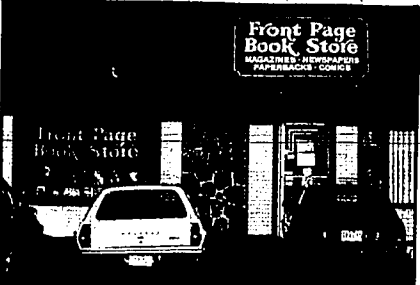
hidden and gradual pollution that seldom makes headlines, is bad and getting worse because state and federal laws and programs do not adequately protect underground water supplies. Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., who released the report, said he believes groundwater contamination "will be the principal environmental concern for the rest of this decade."

tionable issue," he said. "The nation doesn't know much about it. Its effects are less obvious than those of acid rain. It is not reflected in willing trees or dead fish."

But, Durenberger added, "it is a matter of human health. We are dealing with a resource that supplies drinking water to one-half of this nation's population." The OTA report adds to a growing file of studies indicating that groundwater pollution is fast becoming one of the most important pollution threats facing the United States.

Early this month, the House Government Operations Committee released a study concluding that groundwater is among the most vulnerable to contamination of all natural resources, and that "significant portions of it are being damaged and its usefulness destroyed" by man-made pollution. Rep. Mike Synar, D-Okla., chairman of the Government Operations environment subcommittee, said that the solution to a coming water crisis "may be more elusive and expensive than the energy crisis."

Store manager charged with distributing obscene items



The Front Page Book Store is under fire from authorities

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls police charged the manager of a local bookstore Thursday with two counts of distributing obscene material in what may be only the first step in a battle against hard-core pornography in Twin Falls. Mayor Emery Petersen says he and area religious leaders have wanted to stop the bookstore's distribution of what they say is pornographic material for about six months. But they have been unsuccessful, most recently, because they lacked the unanimous support of the City Council.

Farnsworth was not arrested Thursday, but a summons in her name was accepted by her attorney, William Hofffield, shortly after the complaint was filed. Hofffield says his client has no previous complaints and plans to fight the charge. He disagrees with the contention that Farnsworth has violated the state code. Farnsworth declined to comment on the charges. City officials say they do not know who owns Front Page Bookstore. Petersen says he expects a suit to be filed against the city and that the city could be in litigation for years. He says he is prepared to fight and plans to have other Twin Falls businesses investigated to see if they too distribute hard-core pornography. Small convenience stores that distribute X-rated movies along with other tapes will be targets, he says. The city will not prosecute businesses that sell magazines such as Playboy, Penthouse or Hustler, however, he says. Those magazines do not qualify as obscene under Idaho law, he says.

To be considered obscene, material must in some way depict "ultimate sexual acts," according to the code. Petersen says that he was aware that Front Page Bookstore was distributing material that may have qualified as obscene when it was located on Main Street several years ago. But it was not until this year when the store moved to larger quarters on Blue Lakes Boulevard are being advertised that he received several complaints, he says. Initially, most of the complaints came from members of the LDS Church, says Petersen. But before he took action against the bookstore he wanted to determine if he had the support of other religious leaders in the community, he says. "Absolutely everyone I contacted was supportive, but I didn't contact everyone (who is a religious leader)," he says. He formed a committee composed of Gil Myers of the First Baptist Church; Robert Van Nest of the First Presbyterian Church; Jim Tubbs of the

**Embassy required barrier**  
 WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate report says the Sept. 20 terrorist bombing at the U.S. Embassy in Beirut was successful because officials failed to erect a vehicle barrier, the Washington Post reported today's editions.  
 The report, scheduled for release today, said the embassy was vulnerable because of a "tragically simple mistake" — lack of a moveable barrier to prevent a vehicle moving through without clearance.  
 The barrier could have been either swinging steel gates, positioned steel jacks or automobiles, according to the Post account of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee inquiry.  
 Committee investigators were unable to determine why this was not done or whether anyone in the embassy had specifically raised the missing barrier as a special problem.

**Aquino's widow leads march**  
 MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The widow of opposition leader Benigno Aquino led a march by 6,000 people Thursday to demand that President Ferdinand R. Marcos resign.  
 The marchers protested the findings of a panel that failed to implicate Marcos in Aquino's assassination.  
 The chief attorney for the investigatory panel said Marcos should appoint a special court to try the case of 26 men who were named as conspirators because a "big cloud of suspicion" hangs over the police and court system.

**'Blessing' given to estimates**  
 NEW YORK (AP) — A retired general testified Thursday that Gen. William C. Westmoreland gave his "blessing" to the official national estimate of enemy troop strength in the Vietnam War, and did not interfere with the figures.  
 Maj. Gen. Godding, a witness in Westmoreland's \$100 million libel suit against CBS, told the jury he asked the general for instructions shortly before going to a key meeting where the estimate was to be debated with other agencies.  
 Westmoreland is suing the network over a 1982 documentary "A Vietnam Deception," that he said falsely accused him of concealing truthful intelligence reports from President Lyndon B. Johnson and the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

**More arms due in Nicaragua**  
 WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department said Thursday that Nicaragua is receiving a shipment of Soviet bloc weaponry, adding to what the department described as the "overwhelming" military superiority Nicaragua already has in Central America.  
 Department spokesman John Hughes was unable to specify what is contained in the shipment, but he said it does not include advanced aircraft.

**Workers 'foreclose' on Block**  
 KNOXVILLE, Ill. (AP) — A manure-spreader served as a symbol of President Reagan's farm policies for Midwest farmers who gathered Thursday near U.S. Agriculture Secretary John Block's farm to "foreclose" on Republican programs.  
 "You fill it (the spreader) up with horse dung and spread it all over the country," said Alan Libbra, a southwestern Illinois dairy farmer and chairman of the Illinois Public Action Council, one of several groups participating in the protest.  
 The protesters — nearly 200 farmers and labor-union members from Illinois, Iowa and Minnesota — held a mock auction of Reagan and Block's farm policies at the Knox County Fairgrounds. Libbra served as auctioneer.

**Poles arrest more suspects**  
 WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The government announced the arrest of two more people Thursday in the abduction of a missing Roman Catholic priest and said it will charge against an Interior Ministry official held in the case.  
 The Interior Ministry official, said to be a Warsaw policeman, was arrested Wednesday. The official Polish news agency PAP announced Thursday night that two unidentified accomplices who "cooperated with him" had also been arrested.  
 Poland's Roman Catholic primate said he feared the Rev. Jerzy Popieluszko, an outspoken supporter of the outlawed "Solidarity" labor union, may have been murdered. The primate, Cardinal Jozef Glemp, demanded a full explanation of Popieluszko's disappearance from Communist authorities.

**Workers inhale 'hot' air**  
 IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Six workers at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory inhaled radioactive air, but the level of radioactive exposure was not considered dangerous, officials said Thursday.  
 "It's not significant in terms of health effects on the employees, but it is significant to us that it happened," said Terry Smith, spokesman for EG&G, an INEL operating contractor for the U.S. Department of Energy.  
 The incident happened about 6 p.m. Wednesday at the Power Burst Facility while the six men were removing a small valve from a steam sample line.

**Explosives trigger uproar**  
 LONDON (AP) — Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher said Thursday that urgent discussions have begun with the French government over the discovery of explosives at the French ambassador's home — allegedly planted by one of President-Francois Mitterrand's security men.  
 Scotland Yard said the French security man hid a half-pound of explosives under bushes near a tent on the grounds of Ambassador Emmanuel de Mangerie's residence in an attempt to test British security.

 First Christian Church; Don Watson of the Twin Falls West Stake of the LDS church; and two Twin Falls residents who had contacted him.  
 The group began meeting in the spring, including meetings with the city attorney and manager, to discuss ways to prevent the distribution of obscene materials, Petersen says.  
 The group studied Garden City's unsuccessful battles against adult bookstores and successful efforts in other states, Petersen says.  
 Eventually, city attorney Fritz Wondrich sent a letter to Farnsworth advising her to review her materials to see if they were in violation of anti-obscenity laws and to stop selling them if they were. They warned they would send a person she would not recognize to purchase the material.  
 On two occasions, the city sent police officer J.M. Robinson to the store to purchase a total of nine magazines.  
 "We tried to work with Mr. Hofffield. We tried to work with Mrs. Farnsworth," says Petersen. But he says when the bookstore continued to distribute materials alleged to be obscene, he asked for the council's help.  
 He approached council members

individually and then the matter was brought up at a closed council meeting before Oct. 12.  
 Then, the council was split, on whether to take legal action concerning the bookstore, Petersen says.  
 He then asked area church leaders to write letters to "showcase" or "opposed hard-core pornography."  
 Among those who responded were Ritchie Weers of the Eastside Baptist Church, Aaron Knapp of the Church of the Nazarene, Sheldon Sigel of the Christian Center, Stanley Snow of the LDS West Stake, Doug Tollerud of the Salvation Army, Tubbs and Van Nest.  
 "The collective effort of pornography in many communities is very extensive in regard to emotional and physical consequences, contributing to violent sex crimes, child abuse, sexual and other, and a host of other related human injustices," wrote Knapp.  
 There was some disagreement about whether one of the pastors, Police Chief Tim Qualla, Wondrich or Petersen should sign the complaint. It was signed Thursday morning by Qualla.  
 Idaho Code prohibits display or distribution of obscene material. Conviction of a misdemeanor is punishable by a \$300 fine and six months in the county jail.

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While refusing to endorse any specific amount of new wilderness acreage, Heller said he agreed that the state needs a strong economy and that such strength rests in development of its resources. But he also said Idaho's pristine and scenic wild lands must be preserved as well.



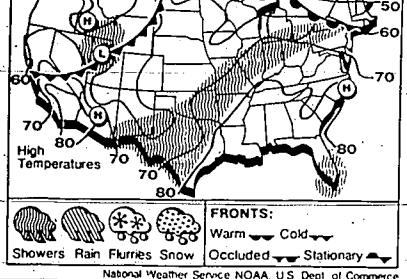

# Even Democrats evaluate Mondale's chances as slim

WASHINGTON — With Election Day fast approaching, Democratic officials are hailing Walter F. Mondale's improved chances in the urban Northeast, but it is hard to find any party professionals who think Mondale can or will upset President Reagan.

As polls showed Mondale either stuck or slipping slightly, some Democrats expressed renewed concern that Reagan could pick up some close congressional races.

But Rep. Robert Torricelli of New Jersey, a former Mondale aide who conceded "Reagan has a considerable lead" in his state, said he sensed a "disproportionate number of Reagan supporters who seem to want the Democrats to control Congress."

Interviews with Democrats found some optimism about Mondale's chances in New York, Pennsylvania, Massachusetts and tiny Rhode Island, but elsewhere the outlook was bleak — even as his crowds grew larger and more enthusiastic along the campaign trail.

Mondale was heading back to California, Oregon and Washington for the weekend, pursuing indications that the presidential vote is weakening in the Far West where Democratic crowds have been especially energetic.

But party activists were pessimistic about Ohio and Michigan, and in the South, an Alabama official described Mondale as "damaged goods" among whites who are backing Al LaPierre, executive director of the Alabama Democratic Party, said of Mondale's prospects, "It's frightening. We've got to do some

serious reassessing after November."

On Thursday, Mondale was in Ohio where Sen. Howard Metzenbaum sounded a note of obligatory optimism. "The momentum is going in our direction," he said in defiance of polling to the contrary. "Are we going to win? I don't know. I think we've got a shot."

Many Democrats had hoped that strong debate performances by Mondale would cut into Reagan's lead. But Reagan's second debate, showing was strong also, and apparently shored up his support.

A survey by Louis Harris said Reagan had stretched his lead to 14 points. A Harris survey a week earlier had the president in the lead by 9 points. A Washington Post-ABC poll said Reagan had a 12-point lead among 1,000 registered voters contacted after the second presidential debate.

Mondale's pollster, Peter Hart, said his recent poll result are similar, and he conceded that there has been a "remarkable consistency in Reagan's numbers over the last five months. Our challenge remains to convert some of those weak Reagan voters, and we have less time."

Mondale, invoking the stunning 1948 upset by Harry S. Truman, has said, "I'm not going to comment on any polls between now and the election."

Campaign professionals say Reagan lead is out of reach in many states and in the areas where there is movement toward Mondale, he still lags significantly.

Two political consultants who between them represent candidates in every section of the country said in separate interviews that Mondale is hurting several of their clients.

One consultant, who insisted on anonymity, was asked if there was any state in which he'd like to have Mondale campaign for one of his clients.

"I think maybe... maybe, the only place that can... oh, God, I wish I could say yes," was the reply.

Democratic Rep. Robert Edgar of Pennsylvania is locked in a tight battle for re-election and aide Anita Dunn said, "We need between 50,000 and 60,000 split tickets to win." She said Mondale is doing well statewide, with most estimates putting the president about 5 points ahead. She said Mondale's strength in the state was a response to continuing economic problems in a state that was one of the hardest hit in the 1982 recession.

Massachusetts was the only state to buck a Republican landslide and support Democratic nominee George McGovern in 1972, and Jim Dorsey, press secretary to Gov. Michael Dukakis, said there are "definite signs of movement here for Mondale-Ferraro."

But state party officials, who spoke only on condition they not be identified, said their polling data says Reagan is maintaining a 10- to 12-point lead and there has been no movement toward the Democratic ticket.

The race for New York's 36 electoral votes is regarded as extremely close in a state which has large numbers of black, Hispanic and Jewish voters — all groups in which Mondale should win by varying margins.

In addition, New York is Ms. Ferraro's home state and Mondale also will benefit from strong backing by Gov. Mario Cuomo.

There is suspicion that the Mondale campaign considers Texas to be out of reach.

## Man with archery gear arrested for Ferraro threat

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A man who threatened to shoot Geraldine Ferraro was arrested by federal agents Thursday shortly before the Democratic vice presidential nominee arrived at the computer company where he worked.

Larry Charon, 36, of San Jose, was charged with threatening Ms. Ferraro's life. A sheriff's officer found bows and razor-tipped arrows in the trunk of Charon's car, said Secret Service Agent Kent Barnes.

Charon is a maintenance man at Apple Computer Co. in the Santa Clara County community of Cupertino.

Charon was arraigned Thursday in San Francisco before U.S. Magistrate Frederick Woolfite, who set bail at \$10,000.

Apple security officers stopped Charon when he arrived at work Thursday and he was questioned by Barnes and by a San Jose policeman and a Santa Clara County sheriff's officer.

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## State's vote on sales tax could be close

Both sides in the initiative petition drive to repeal the Idaho sales tax on groceries have indicated the possibility that the balloting could be close on that issue.

On the sales tax proposition, state Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, acknowledged that it would be easy for voters to support it since it suggests their taxes will go down.

But Antone warned that the loss of

\$20 million in state and local revenues should the proposition pass coupled with the tax revenue shortfall already being predicted and increasing budget demands will only force state lawmakers to raise other taxes.

In the long run, he said, consumers could actually be worse off than they are now.

But Liz Merrill of Idaho Fair Share said during a mini-debate on the issue before the Idaho Press Club Thursday that there are other alternatives to a basic tax increase that lawmakers could use to make up

the revenues lost on repeal of the sales tax on groceries.


Among them are a number of corporate tax breaks as well as expanding the sales tax to cover what she called nonessential services like architects.

Also on Thursday, President Reagan's Idaho campaign chairman, Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa, issued a challenge to Utah Republicans, predicting Idaho's vote for the president would be larger. Idaho was second only to Utah in the vote margin for Reagan four years ago.

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### What taxman giveth he can taketh away

What the government giveth, the government taketh away. This coming year, the slight of hand will result in an even bigger bite out of most of our paychecks. Income taxes will be reduced. That's the good news. The bad news is that Social Security taxes will go up even more, thus wiping out the gains. For a \$25,000 one-earner family of four, income taxes will go down \$51, but Social Security taxes up \$87.50. For a single person earning \$20,000, income taxes go down \$47, but Social Security taxes up \$70. The income tax reduction is the tail end of the changes passed in 1981 to diminish the effects of "indexing," by which many taxpayers were losing ground as they went up the income ladder. The Social Security increases are to help fund even higher benefit payments scheduled to go into effect Jan. 1. Now a few foolish politicians say America's older people don't need higher benefits. They say these things at their political peril.

Maybe they do. Maybe they don't. Set that question aside. From the biggest federal programs like Social Security and defense, right down to something like teacher pay in Twin Falls, Idaho, the real question is: who is going to pay for it? We can continue deficit spending, pushing off onto our children and their children the responsibility of fiscal management. Or we can ask today's workers to pay for today's retired.

Or we can — perish the thought — cut at least the rate at which benefits are being phased into the system. But which politicians do you know, from either party, who have the courage to do that?

For what they're worth, we have a couple of radical suggestions.

One, we'd let anyone who wants to out of Social Security entirely, requiring only that they put their money into IRAs. The result would be an enormous infusion of investment resources into the American economy.

Two, we'd hold Social Security benefits at their present level indefinitely until the system is taking in as much as it is paying out. Then, we'd require it to be on a pay-as-you-go basis annually. Sure, there'd be less for retirees. But what they would have would be worth more in real dollars.

Now we doubt such suggestions will make much headway, human nature and the each-for-himself current mentality being what it is. But somewhere in the future, we will all have to pay a price for what now passes for economic appeasement of the electorate.

## Reagan philosophy appeals to young

BOSTON — Have you been up nights wondering what it was exactly that Reagan put into the time capsule? Have you been unable to sleep because you so desperately want to hear what Reagan was going to say about young people before he was cut off?

Well, I have. The debate closed on a cliffhanger. In the rambling, bedtime story that doubled as Reagan's closing statement Sunday night, we the people were offered a picture of the man cruising down the Pacific Coast Highway pondering a letter that he would write to be opened in a hundred years. But he never did get around to saying what he wrote. Was he afraid he'd kill the suspense? Then we were told about the wonderful experience he had this campaign season meeting young America. But what did he think of young America? The great communicator was disconnected by the moderator.

I don't think we will ever know what was in the letter, or for that matter, whether there really was a letter. The bulk of investigative reporters in America are too busy trying to locate criminal records of Geraldine Ferraro's great-grandparents to worry about this sort of trivia. However I was greatly relieved the next day when Reagan finished his thoughts about the young. Stand back! Here they are: "Your generation is something special." On first hearing, this comment may sound ambiguous. It reminds me of my father's taunting remarks to the star-struck parents of newborns: "Now THERE's a baby!" Even Abby Hoffman thinks this generation of young is something special. When asked about college students of the Eighties, the Sixties' activist said, "They have designer brains."

But, in all fairness, the candidate who has run his campaign like a pep rally for USA High has gotten the bulk of cheers from the 18- to 24-year-olds.

There are as many theories about the affinity between Reagan and the young as there are theorists. One correspondent from Cambridge, Mass., maintains that her generation just plain loves "winners."

Another regular writer from California says that Reagan is a grandfather figure (this writer is a psychologist of course) and that every generation of young allies with grandpa. I would add an alternative theory to the current list. I am convinced that it's the Reagan philosophy of individualism that is most appealing to the newly emancipated. They are the target audience for a Republican message which insists that anyone can make it on his or her own, indeed must make it on his or her own.

The entire child-raising ethic of the country is geared to produce independence in our children. We treat them as unique, nurture their "special," encourage their individualism. We impudently throw our own anxious understanding that sooner or later they have to stand on their own two feet.

By the time they reach voting age, the young, according to our developmental timetables, have begun to strike out on their own. They are more likely to live alone, less likely to be a member of a

functioning family than at any other time in their lives. They are at the peak of unbridled interest and investment in themselves, in their own separate futures.

Anybody who deals with young people witnesses the single-minded concentration, the self-centering process, the worship of the Great Can-Do Spirit. Many of these young are not interested in caution signs or bleak prognostications of the future. They want to feel in control of their lives. It is a necessary, energizing tool of youth to believe you can make it on your own.

I also think that these new adults are often the least willing to see the government as a necessary helper because they do not want to see themselves as needing help. Adulthood is still raw, memories of childhood dependency too strong. They are not yet caretakers of aging parents or their own babies. They are not mindful of the uncertainties of life.

Call it youthful selfishness, if you will, but selfishness, self-interest, independence and individualism are all on a continuum. The optimism of Reagan comes over like the effusive encouragement of a loving grandparent, and never mind Ronald. Mondale's alarming but not the national debt and the arms race must sound like the warnings of parents when they hand over the car keys.

There is one other thing that many of the young share with this particular elder: They are both unencumbered by facts and un tethered by history. What if there were a time capsule buried with memorabilia from this election? What message would the Reagan Youth campaign of 1984 leave for their descendants? Ten thousand balloons.

## By age 73, the human internal clock is ticking slower

Can one male 73-year-old offer some comments about another such who is about to be elected to a second term as president of the United States?

We're not all alike, we 73-year-olds, in physical stamina, mental ability and by a lot of other measures. But one 73er, perhaps, has a better feel for "quality" and for his prospects than do younger voters, as the majority of you out there are.

My wife's quick summation of the second presidential debate was simple. Walter Mondale, she said, was "dull," and Ronald Reagan was "dumb." Mondale surely was dull, however well informed he was on many a topic. President Reagan, however, was, to me, not dumb but — well, 73 years old.

Lou Cannon, the Reagan biographer, wrote in The Washington Post that "he has near the president find no sign that he is the old fire

in the belly. . . . That I can understand. It's not a matter of being "dumb." It's not of understanding this or that complex subject in any detail. It's a matter of limited physical energy, despite various forms of exercise; it's a matter of limited mental energy, despite continued use of one's brain.

For over half a century this journalist has been writing stories on a typewriter, putting down sentences that form in the mind as one thinks through a subject or explains a thought. It becomes reflexive to the point of

being almost effortless. So, I am sure, it has been with Reagan, his speed making, his decision making, his feeling and in recent years the combination of them before television cameras.

At some point in life, however, you begin to realize that it doesn't come as easily as it used to. Reagan still can do it off the TelePrompTer just about perfectly, and he can still come up with those effective one-liners, just as he did in the second debate in turning the age issue on his rival. But if he's left on his own for 90 minutes but there behind the podium, no matter what the preparation, his internal clock slowdown begins to show. And not just tangled syntax or never completed sentences. We 73-year-olds simply don't think as fast as we used to; it's more of an effort when we try. It doesn't make any difference, really, if I call one grandchild by the name of another.

But it could make a difference if a president can't remember — say, during a crisis — exactly what it was that his hostile number in Moscow was thinking in his last message. Sure, aides are all about in order to help remind. But to fathom the other fellow's remark, to think it through, to progress logically, to understand not just one's own preconceived notion of the other side but what truly is most likely to be going through their minds, this takes both physical and mental energy, especially at 73 — and 74 and 75 and 76 and 77 and at nearly 78, as Reagan would be at the end of a second term.

The slowing down of a human being is called senility — "mental and physical deterioration with old age," my dictionary says. We 73-year-olds don't care for the word; it reminds us too much of friends who have slipped into various forms of mental vacuity.

So we try to exercise our brains as well as our bodies. Being president requires that, but the protective cocoon of the White House is always there to shield or hide or minimize tell-tale signs.

Modern medicine has done marvels for millions of us 73ers. So, too, it currently is controlling the 56-year-old Mondale's otherwise possibly dangerous high blood pressure, just as it controls mine. But the human body does wear down, including a president's. Woodrow Wilson and Franklin Roosevelt were victims of the office's demands; Wilson died at 67 and FDR at only 63, although today's medicine likely could have extended both their lives.

## Voter registration campaigns discourage close reflection

This year's register-and-vote campaigns have added millions of people to the rolls, including previously registered but indifferent citizens. But is a much larger and more active electorate necessarily good for democracy in America?

The Democrats claim that between 3 million and 4 million new Democratic voters will participate in November. The Republicans, who have spent an estimated \$10 million on their own registration drive, claim they have recruited as many, if not more, new Republican voters.

The Republican drive has been distinguished not only by ample money, but also by intense dedication and considerable sophistication. (For example, the Republicans have registered only those citizens who "are quality" by expressing support for the Great Communicator.)

The Democrats have relied heavily on liberal organizations such as the NAACP and the National Organization for Women to increase the ranks of Democratic voters. Jesse Jackson has promoted and unified the

diverse Democratic efforts. In speeches across America, he has told his audiences that, by voting Democratic, they will demonstrate their preference for "the human race" over "the nuclear race," that they will "give peace a chance" and "give Reagan the ranch."

Of course, Jackson is a minister. But when it comes to claiming divine sanction for electoral action, even Jackson has not been as blatant as the fundamentalist Christian ministers serving as spiritual precinct captains for Ronald Reagan and the Republican Party.

Thousands of these ministers, including Moral Majority leader Jerry Falwell, have joined the American Coalition for Traditional Values (ACTV).

The coalition was formally inaugurated at a June 11 White House reception attended by Vice President George Bush and his boss, who previously had lauded the coalition for its "potential to speak to the millions of committed Christians."

So far, ACTV has been speaking to them through an aggressive register-and-vote campaign.

The fundamentalist ministers recognize that their followers are fearful of groups — whose culture backgrounds, economic situations or styles of life are different from their own.

The ministers also recognize that their followers are confronted by ordinary human problems in their: "Christian communities" and "traditional families."

Yet, the ministers urge their followers not to seek genuine self-knowledge — that would smack of "secular humanism" — but to attack the "immoral" forces represented by the Democratic Party.

The sermons and speeches of the New Right ministers have been reinforced by

publications that present the November elections in apocalyptic terms.

Gary Jarmin, ACTV's field director and legislative director for Christian Voice, said in August that church groups and broadcast preachers already had ordered 1.5 million copies of the Voice's "Presidential Biblical Scoreboard."

The introductory editorial of the "Scoreboard" warns readers, "If you fail to vote conscientiously for godly rule, evil will continue to increase in our nation. . . ."

The editorial goes on to declare, "By using our 'Scoreboard' and voting for candidates who support Judeo-Christian values, you will be doing your Christian duty in helping to reclaim America for God."

While the political parties have depended on register-and-vote campaigns to recruit supporters, image-conscious corporations have used such campaigns to show consumers that the corporations care about the nation's welfare.

For example, the three major television networks occasionally pause to urge their

viewers to do their civic duty. The popular Music Television (MTV) cable service, two-thirds of whose audience is over 18, has aired a series of register-and-vote spots featuring rock stars.

Like the campaigns of Jesse Jackson, the fundamentalist ministers and the major networks, the MTV campaign involves ingeniously in the service of cynicism. The ingeniously lies in transforming apathetic citizens into aroused voters. The right emotion — resentment, fear, narcissism — and people will start signing registration forms and pulling voting levers.

None of these campaigns has encouraged Americans to raise important political matters, including the role of voting in democratic society; in fact, the campaigns have discouraged reflection. It might inhibit citizens from voting for the illusion of their choice.

We have two candidates that the Citizens Action Committee considered endorsing for Jerome County Prosecuting Attorney Marlene Weed and David Thompson. The Citizens Action Committee contacted both Marlene Weed and David Thompson for help with problems Jerome citizens have been having with billing practices of the Jerome City Water Department. The Jerome City Water Department is able to manipulate water consumption figures so that water users will have to pay higher water bills all year around than if there was a flat fee for sewer charges as in other cities around us. A city does not give money back to its citizens unless it overcharged its citizens to begin with.

In the course of seven months, I saved \$40 by demanding that the public works director show me in the Jerome City Ordinance where he had the legal right to charge me for water I did not use. When he said he could not do this because I wasn't there, he returned every last cent he overcharged me and stopped overbilling me the rest of the summer.

Marlene Weed was first contacted by the Citizens Action Committee to help us encourage the City of Jerome to have its audit ordinance personally delivered to her by office and all the evidence we have on file. We thought Ms. Weed would be interested in seeing that the water department followed its city ordinance as she is a city water user. She did not contact me in any way or return our material.

After waiting two weeks, we contacted David Thompson for help. He spent two hours with us and made two trips to Boise. He checked out the state statutes and talked with State Attorney Jim Jones. Jim Jones apparently has the legal right to investigate the billing practices of the Jerome City Water Department but not to demand resources. So the bottom line is "Justice is for those who can afford it."

Citizens of Jerome, you have an important choice to make on Nov. 6 for Jerome's next prosecuting attorney. You can vote for Marlene Weed who has been running a high visibility campaign and is reported to be friendly. She smiles, talks with citizens and shakes hands. But that is all she does.

You can vote for David Thompson, who has shown beyond a shadow of a doubt that he cares about the citizens of Jerome and is definitely interested in helping us see that the laws of our land are followed by all citizens. The choice is yours on Nov. 6 to put a person in office who will go to bat for us or one who is friendly and smiles and shakes hands a lot.

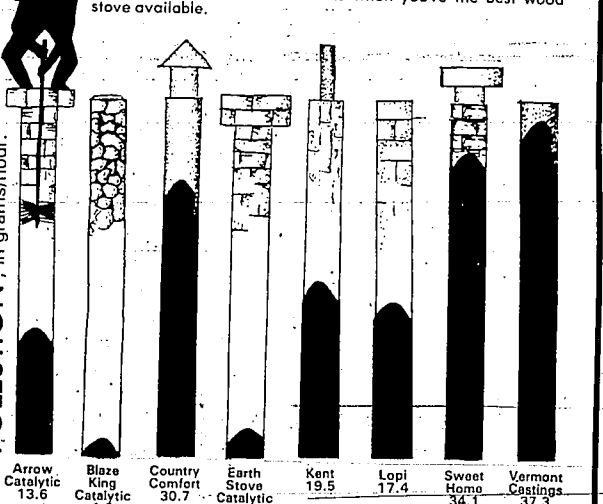

**D.C. protestors arrested**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Twenty-one people, including the Rev. Daniel Berrigan, were arrested Thursday when they blocked the northwest gate of the White House by kneeling in prayer and denouncing President Reagan's policies.

Organizers for the Community for Creative Nonviolence said the arrests brought to 101 the number of demonstrators taken into custody outside the White House during almost daily protests this month. They said 27 people were arrested there Wednesday.

Singing hymns and folk songs, reciting Scripture and the Lord's Prayer, the demonstrators Thursday stood in front of the high iron gates of the White House, then sat on the driveway and finally knelt on the pavement.

**Hepatitis clue discovered**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal researchers have identified the virus that causes the principal form of hepatitis transmitted through blood transfusions, and they say the findings should lead to an effective screening test to identify contaminated blood supplies.

Scientists from the Food and Drug Administration and the National Institutes of Health said the agent, or closely related group of agents, that causes this type of hepatitis is an elusive retrovirus.

In a report to be published Friday in *The Lancet*, a British medical journal, researchers say they found evidence of the virus, or viruses, causing what is called non-A, non-B hepatitis in four human serum specimens and two samples of plasma-derived blood products.

**Industrial blast near Chicago**

ELK GROVE VILLAGE, Ill. (AP) — An explosion and fire at an industrial park in this northwest Chicago suburb on Thursday injured three people and forced the evacuation of a nearby apartment complex, officials said.

Because the businesses — a graphics company, a photo equipment company, and Chromotech Scientific Corp. — had chemicals at the site, police evacuated residents of a nearby apartment complex as a precautionary measure, *Lantern* said.

Police said they did not immediately know what caused the explosion.

**Shultz tough on terrorism**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States must be willing to use military force to combat terrorism even though it could mean "the loss of life of some innocent people," Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday night.

"A great nation with global responsibilities cannot afford to be hamstrung by confusion and indecisiveness," Shultz said. "Fighting terrorism will not be a clean or pleasant contest, but we have no choice but to play it."

"We must reach a consensus in this country that our responses should go beyond passive defense to consider means of active prevention, pre-emption and retaliation," Shultz said in a speech prepared for delivery at the Park Avenue Synagogue in New York City.

**Yale students sue over strike**

NEW HAVEN, Conn. (AP) — Yale students filed a \$10 million lawsuit against the university on Thursday, claiming it has failed to deliver services for which they have paid since white-collar workers went on strike a month ago.

The suit says that since the strike by 1,600 clerical and technical workers began, Yale has failed to provide full access to libraries, research labs and other university facilities, as well as clerical and custodial services.

**Pessimism on Kennedy expressed**

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla. (AP) — David Kennedy had only a "superficial chance" of overcoming the drug addiction that destroyed him, according to a counselor who talked to the troubled 28-year-old the day before he died of an overdose.

The counselor's comments were included in an 18-page "scene investigation" report of the April 25 death by the Palm Beach Medical Examiner's office.

The report was released Wednesday by the Palm Beach County State Attorney's Office under threat of a contempt of court charge in a battle between news organizations and prosecutors.

The day before Kennedy's body was found slumped between two beds in his \$250-a-day suite at the Brazillian Court Hotel, he spoke with Cal Scheidegger, a counselor at the Minneapolis drug-abuse center where Kennedy had been undergoing treatment just before coming to Palm Beach for the Easter holiday.

During that April 24 phone conversation, Kennedy "admitted to having had up to nine or 10 drinks in combination with extensive cocaine use," according to a written statement by William A. Miller, forensic investigator for the medical examiner's office.

Kennedy "had at least one overdose in the past" in Lake Tahoe, Nev., Miller noted. Kennedy was having seizures and "was hospitalized for this O.D. at an unknown institution."

# Witness: Ex-Viet boss Ky led network of crime gangs

NEW YORK (AP) — A hooded witness testified before a presidential commission Thursday that he was told former Vietnamese Prime Minister Nguyen Cao Ky headed a web-of anti-Communist gangs that rob, extort and sell marijuana in the United States.



NGUYEN CAO KY Denies allegation

Ky, contacted in California by The Associated Press, immediately denied the allegation. "My first reaction is shock. It is ridiculous," he said.

The unidentified witness, testifying before the President's Commission on Organized Crime, said he himself was a member of one of the gangs, and had been told by his own superior that Ky led the operation.

In the Vietnamese community in America, he said, "everyone knows" that Ky heads the organization. Below Ky, according to the witness, 15 main leaders oversee a nationwide membership of about 1,000, organized in cells of 30 or 40 members. Much of the leadership consists of former generals in the Vietnamese army, he said.

The testimony came on the third day of the commission's hearings into the rise of Asian-American organized crime groups.

The witness testified under oath. The terms of his testimony were not

staff said Vietnamese criminal extortion groups had become active in 13 states — California, Texas, Washington, Colorado, Alabama, Florida, Massachusetts, New York, Pennsylvania, Oregon, Louisiana, Virginia and Hawaii.

The hooded witness said Ky's organization consisted of four major gangs: the Black Eagles in San Francisco, the Fishermen in Houston, the Eagles Seven in Chicago, and the Frogmen in Los Angeles and Orange County.

That last gang consisted mostly of former South Vietnamese soldiers who had been trained in jungle warfare, he said.

The commission staff distributed a letter from the Frogmen in which a Southern California store owner is requested "to pay seven thousand dollars ... for three years protection period." The letter identifies the Frogmen as an arm of the "Vietnam People Front Army."

But law enforcement authorities who specialize in Vietnamese organized crime seemed neither surprised nor persuaded by the witness' testimony.

"All of us can say we know of the information (presented by the witness) but to confirm that would be relatively difficult," police Capt. Donald Saviers of Westminster, Calif., told the commission.

"I have several disagreements with that witness," said officer Robert Casey of Houston. "For one, I've never heard of the Fishermen gang."

The witness, a man in his 20s, said he joined the organization because of its stated purpose — to fight communism. He referred to the criminal enterprise as the organization's "black side."

"You don't really know what happens to the money?" asked commission director James Harmon. "No," the man replied.

Immediately disclosed, although the commission has congressional authority to subpoena witnesses and grant them immunity from prosecution.

Asked why the witness might have lied, Ky said: "I don't know. I frankly don't know. You know, in my pestifer, there are people who don't like me."

Earlier in the day, the commission

## Diseases increasing among day-care kids

ATLANTA (AP) — Gastrointestinal illness is increasing among children in day care centers, including the appearance of an untreatable disease never seen in humans before 1976, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

The CDC said cryptosporidiosis, a parasitic disease that often causes prolonged diarrhea, has been seen this year in two Atlanta area day care centers (11 children ill); a Philadelphia center (14 children); an Ann Arbor, Mich., center (21 children); a San Carlos, Calif., center (six children and three parents), and two Albuquerque, N.M., centers (12 children and one household member).

Cryptosporidiosis has been recognized to cause diarrhea in animals, but was first recognized in a human eight years ago.

"We're concerned that we've found something new," said Georgia state epidemiologist Dr. Keith Sikes. "That doesn't mean it hasn't existed for some time, but now we're more able to recognize it."

The disease has joined the list of those that can cause similar illnesses in populations of young children, said Dr. George Healy, a CDC researcher.

"It's another element in the problem of diarrhea in day care centers," he said.

The Atlanta-based CDC said it is unknown exactly how cryptosporidiosis is transmitted in day care centers, and no treatment is available. In most children, the disease runs its course in 10 to 14 days, Healy said.

Scientists believe that contact with children's diapers — either by the children or others handling them — plays a part in its transmission, he added.

A few of the children affected this year had "moderately severe" diarrhea, but none was hospitalized, the CDC said in its Morbidity and Mortality Weekly Report. Doctors, parents and day-care workers should be aware of the risk of the disease, the agency said.

The disease can be much more severe in patients with weakened immune systems, such as victims of acquired immune deficiency syndrome, the CDC said. Researchers first found the current increase in human cryptosporidiosis cases in AIDS patients.

## Panels broaden reviews of CIA manual

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional oversight committee staffs are broadening their inquiries into the CIA's Nicaraguan rebel manual to examine what the spy agency knew about alleged political killings carried out by U.S.-backed forces, Capitol Hill sources said Thursday.

Initial reviews by the staffs of the House and Senate intelligence committees focused on who authorized production of the CIA manual, which advocates "selective use of violence" to "neutralize" officials of Nicaragua's leftist government.

But staff investigators for both committees are also looking into whether the rebels have, in fact, executed Nicaraguan officials and said sources, who spoke only on condition they not be identified.

Announcing the investigations, White House spokesman Larry Speakes declared that "the administration has not advocated or condoned political assassination or any other attacks on civilians." Speakes also cited a Dec. 4, 1981 presidential executive order prohibiting U.S. participation in assassinations.

Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., intelligence committee chairman, has ordered a full committee meeting on the manual as soon as the CIA completes its internal review.

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## Speaker gives curt message

### Communism the 'real threat'

TWIN FALLS—Tomas Schuman came to Twin Falls prepared to wrap a crowd in fear and hatred.

He succeeded. And the crowd, for the most part, loved it.

Schuman says he is a former agent of the KGB, leaving the country to warn citizens of the evils of communism and how it is infiltrating the United States. He bills his talks as "How the Communists Use the Free World Press."

For more than two hours he in turn cajoled, pleaded, joked with and insulted the crowd of about 150, at times using language so offensive that it had his sponsors apologizing the next day.

But he never lost command of the crowd. It was under his control from the first words he spoke.

With a knowing look at the crowd—many of them members of the John Birch Society, which sponsored the talk through Tax Reform Immediately—and a twinkle in his eye, he began: "My dear oppressed American masses."

A dramatic pause, and he continued with a look that intimated he was sharing a private joke with the crowd: "Or should I say, my dear ultra-right wing fanatics?"

The crowd laughed, and Schuman said that is what their own liberal media calls them. But what, he questioned, could they expect from a media that labeled its own president, Ronald Reagan, an "imperialist" and "aggressor."

"The dim-wits of the mass media" are duped by the KGB, he said.

"The media lies to you," he said in a voice still heavily accented 14 years after he defected. "All these years they called this a democracy. Even the president believes it."

"You," he said, raising his voice and jabbing his finger at the audience, "are not living in a democracy. Democracy means power to the people. Do any people have power?"

If "you bunch of lazy people sitting on your fat bottoms" would read the Constitution, you would find that it is a republic, he said. But he followed the insult with praise for the Constitution as the "best document created by mankind" that brought a burst of applause.

People come to America from Nicaragua, Cuba, Russia and Vietnam, not because it is a democracy, but because they have a chance to "practice capitalism, not sit on their fat bottoms like you, receiving checks from bureaucrats."

He threw in a few rhetorical remarks to reassure the crowd. Immigrant children make it to the top of "your lousy public schools" by ignoring sex ed, he intoned. "In America you have eight types of making sex. Do you want that garbage in your schools?"

Public schools filled with teachers who cannot spell or point to Nicaragua on the map? help the media to demoralize America, he said.

So why does he read about the dangers of war in the newspaper when the "real threat is Communism."

Socialism is just an alternate form of government your children are taught in school," he said.

He condemned the shooting of a truck driver in a strike a few years ago and said he hated the Soviet government for killing people, but followed remarks about former protesters against the Vietnam War who now occupy important positions in business, media and schools by saying:

"You cannot shoot them. Oh, no that is unAmerican," he said with mock horror. "No matter what they are doing you cannot even fire them."

Violence is the answer in Central America he said. "Now it is too late to negotiate. I would like the whole area and shoot the hell out of them. But you don't have the guts to do it."

Early in his speech he had said, "Russia is coming. (It can't be stopped) by that schmuck Mondale, a

where like Geraldine Ferraro or even an actor like Reagan."

But at the end of his speech he said there are ways that citizens can fight the infiltration of Communism in the United States, he said.

He issued a special warning against letting children listen to Michael Jackson or emulating his dancing "like the sex act" or "a paralytic."

## Forum addresses dilemma of weed-controlling pesticides

TWIN FALLS—Noxious weeds are costing the farmers of Idaho millions of dollars each year, but it is worth the cost to consumers and the environment to use potentially dangerous pesticides to control the plant pests?

That question was addressed Wednesday in Twin Falls at a forum sponsored by the State of the Rockies, an educational organization based in Missoula, Mont, and the Institute of the American West, a division of the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities.

Steve Dewey, a University of Idaho weed specialist from Twin Falls, said weeds are an epidemic on Idaho farms and ranges. The

well-publicized rabbit and grasshopper infestations "were nothing compared to weeds," he told an audience of more than 50 people at the College of Southern Idaho.

Most of the weeds that plague Idaho are foreign and grew from relatively small patches to invade millions of acres of land over the years.

Losses caused by weeds in Twin Falls and Jerome Counties in 1982 totaled \$4.3 million in wheat production, \$2 million in potatoes and \$1.3 million in barley. Yet, "that just isn't a news worthy item," Dewey said.

At a time when Canadian Thistle was new to the state, the Idaho Legislature turned down a request for \$200 to eradicate the weed from the state. Today, there is extensive infestation by the plant, he said.

Jesse Wilson, an agriculture consultant from American Falls, said the family farmer needs all the tools he can make a profit. If the family farm falls into corporate hands, it will mean an increase in food costs for consumers who now spend only 17 percent of their paychecks on groceries.

Since the mid 1950's, safety requirements for pesticides have become more stringent, said Dewey, who was a licensed applicator at the age of 16. The Environmental Protection Agency guidelines for safety testing are extensive, he said.

For example, the EPA requires several tests on different kinds of animals to determine, among other things, at what level the pesticide is toxic and over what period of time it can have a deadly effect, Dewey said.

Dr. Charles Scott, a private toxicology consultant from Boise, said using animals to test pesticides is flawed, "because symptoms aren't always visible. A rat that's been exposed to a pesticide can't say whether it has a severe headache, Scott said.

There is no battery of tests that can prove beyond a doubt the safety of a chemical, he said.

Scott said federal requirements may not always provide adequate protection from exposure to dangerous chemicals.

To make his point, he extensively discussed the Buena Vista case, where residents of the Twin Falls suburb claimed they were being exposed to dangerous chemicals from a nearby warehouse. Federal requirements stated it was okay for a healthy worker to be

exposed for eight hours at the warehouse. But those living near the warehouse were exposed for more than eight hours each day. Some of the people were not healthy workers, either, but children, older people and pregnant women.

A man has the right to store chemicals, but the fumes from the chemicals can't trespass on the air of others, Scott said. At Buena Vista, traces of chemicals were found in the urine, lawns and air supplies of the nearby residents.

Luan Scott-Bergin, a member of the Northwest Coalition for Alternatives to Pesticides of Eugene, Ore., said she had reservations about the EPA testing requirements for pesticides. Most of the

Teaching handicapped and "special" children takes more stubbornness than patience, she says. Handicapped children are often stubborn and Roper says a teacher must "be stubborn back" before children will break down and become interested in learning.

## For combined high school Consolidation funds at issue

HANSEN — Board members are considering funding for the new high school under discussion by the Hansen, Kimberly and Murtaugh school consolidation board.

Rep. Roy Brackett told the consolidation board Wednesday night he would, if asked, introduce a bill to extend the time limit under which the districts would receive their combined current funding from five to 10 years.

Under existing state law, state support for consolidated districts remains at pre-consolidation levels for five years after a merger of districts.

"The districts would like \$1.2 million to build a new high school for the consolidation district, but Brackett says the Legislature will be more likely to approve continued funding at existing levels than an outright appropriation.

Brackett says the consolidation of the districts will save the state about \$225,000 annually in educational

support funds and the district would be able to apply the additional funds to a building project.

"It would be good business" for the state to offer extended funding as an incentive to the districts to consolidate, Brackett says.

The extended funding will serve as a better "carrot" says Brackett.

"The consolidation board met to discuss funding sources for the proposed consolidation district with Brackett, Rep. Donna Scott, and Kathleen Noh, representing Sen. Laird Noh.

Kimberly superintendent Richard Bauscher said the board is considering a high school to house 500 students. The total enrollment at the districts is about 400 currently, Bauscher says.

Bauscher says the board told legislators they would be willing to consider fund-matching proposals with the state.

Draft legislation for introduction to the Legislature will be discussed at the next consolidation board meeting on Nov. 29 in Kimberly, Bauscher said.

Scott says she told the board the Legislature might approve money for districts studying consolidation if legislation were worded to ensure the funds would be repaid to the state in the event consolidation were never approved.

Scott said she also told the board she would request an attorney general's opinion concerning existing state laws that does not clearly state whether bonded indebtedness must be voted on in the same referendum in which consolidation is considered.

Scott says she urged the board to generate a list of what sorts of legislative action they would like to support their deliberations. Scott says she also urged the board to travel to Boise to talk to legislators directly about the needs of a consolidated district.

Scott cited former board member Dr. James Wright's efforts in the last Legislature and said his talks with legislators were effective in garnering added support for consolidation districts.

## Blaine County voters hear candidates explain themselves

### Sheriff's race opponents Haynes, Drexler exchange barbs

### Would-be commissioners consider environmental questions

HAILLEY — Blaine County sheriff candidates exchanged barbs at a Wednesday night candidate forum in Haily.

Charges of being unprofessional and discriminating against a woman employee are untrue, Blaine County Sheriff Dennis Haynes said.

"Naturally, I don't feel the charges are true," Haynes, a Republican, told a large audience. He said voters can ask his deputies about the truth of the charges against him brought by Ketchum Police Chief Cal Nevland and his wife Wanda.

However, Haynes' opponent, Democrat Orville Drexler, said he will "bring back some dignity to the office" if elected.

Drexler spent 16 years as the county's sheriff before Haynes beat him in 1980. Telling about how he first became a part of the sheriff's office. In 1961 and looking directly at Haynes, Drexler said "any cripple can become sheriff. That's my office and I want it back," Drexler declared.

Haynes bid for re-election was hurt two weeks ago when Cal Nevland said he was supporting Drexler for professional and personal reasons and because Haynes is professional irresponsible.

Nevland said he was supporting Drexler because he was a better person and a better sheriff.

Haynes denied the chief's charges and also those of Wanda Nevland that he refused her request to attend a police training school and to be a patrol deputy because she was a woman.

HAILLEY — Because of extensive work on the Big Wood River to protect riverside property from spring floods in the last two years, Blaine County voters are concerned about the policy their commissioners will develop for the river.

In a candidates forum Wednesday night, most voters who questioned the four candidates vying for two seats on the Board of Commissioners were in some way concerned about how they would deal with environmental issues.

Along with the possible return of mining to the valley, Tom Blanchard, the Democrat challenger to incumbent Robert Gardner for the four-year south county seat, fielded a number of questions from supporters and

opponents of a strict river alteration policy, because of his stand to not protect his own property from a flooding Big Wood River.

Blanchard said some county commissioners have the attitude that people have to change the environment to "make it look better" and to "fight the river" to protect private property.

He said he disagrees with that attitude and the county's leadership "needs an attitude that reflects the quality of life we have here."

Blanchard refused to take steps to prevent flooding on his own property on Lower Broadford Road west of Bellevue this spring.

At the forum, he was accused by one of his neighbors of allowing another neighbor's topsoil to wash away because of his actions.

# Murder suspect out on bond

**JACKPOT** — Doug Roberts, a 49-year-old Nevada highway department foreman from Jackpot who was convicted of second-degree murder earlier this year, has been released on bond pending an appeal to the conviction.

Officials in the district attorney's office in Elko said Roberts' appeal has not yet been filed with the Nevada Supreme Court; but the district attorney's office was put on notice that such an appeal is pending. District Attorney Jim Wilson is currently on vacation.

Charles Woodbury, an Elko attorney who represented Roberts during the trial, said he is not representing him in the appeal. However, he said the basis of the appeal would be instructions to the jury involving a voluntary manslaughter conviction.

He said he asked for voluntary manslaughter, because Roberts and the murder victim, Rance Luddy, 38, of Jackpot, had together as man and wife for seven years.

The court instructed the jury that killing of an unlawful wife or husband in a fit of passion could be voluntary manslaughter, but only if the two were legally married.

"We felt otherwise and argued otherwise," Woodbury said in explaining what he understood would be the basis of the appeal.

He said it is standard practice in Nevada for anyone convicted of a crime to be released on bond if an appeal is made in process.

Luddy's body was found last March 7 in a mobile home owned by Charles Jofanston. She was dead of a single gunshot wound. Luddy was employed at Cactus Pete's Casino at the time of her death.

The trial and conviction of Roberts look place last August.

**BOISE** — A ruling that favored a Nevada, gambling casino accused of serving excessive alcohol to a driver later involved in a fatal collision has been reversed by the Idaho Court of Appeals.

The appellate judges on Thursday sent back to 5th District Court a ruling that had absolved Cactus Pete's casino of liability in the deaths of a Twin Falls couple.

Mustie and Marlof Braun were killed on U.S. 93 between Twin Falls and Jackpot in the crash of their car and a vehicle driven by Clovras Rader.

The Brauns' survivors charged Cactus Pete's was responsible for the deaths because the casino continued serving Rader drinks after he was obviously drunk.

The panel of appellate judges ruled the district court erred in the weight it gave Nevada law when deciding the Braun family's case against Cactus Pete's.

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# Early-morning electrical fire damages tavern near Buhl

**BUHL** — An early-morning electrical fire that damaged the Our Place Tavern northeast of Buhl brought firemen from Buhl and Castleford to the scene Thursday.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Harold Jensen said county officers were notified of the blaze at 9:30 a.m. and firemen who lives near the bar called Buhl police.

The Twin Falls Mutual fire truck from Buhl responded to the fire call with a dozen men. Castleford's equipment and two men joined a short time later, according to Buhl Fire

Chief Mark Grimes.

Grimes estimated damages to the bar at \$25,000. The tavern, a frame building about 40 by 70 feet, is located at Black Bear Corner on U.S. Highway northwest of Buhl.

Jensen, who investigated the fire scene later Thursday, reported fire began in an electrical service panel at the rear of a storage area.

"It started in the storage room on the southeast of the building. The cause was apparently electrical but we aren't sure if the fire began in the main electrical panel, which is outside of the building or in a sub-panel located on the inside wall," he said.

Grimes said the roof of the

southeast corner of the building collapsed and there was extensive damage to a compressor room as well as smoke and water damage throughout the building.

Grimes said firemen and equipment were at the scene for about an hour before extinguishing the flames.

"The reason it took us that long is because the fire spread into an enclosed area — sort of an attic — between the old ceiling and a new lower ceiling. We had a hard time getting to it," the fire chief said.

Grimes said the business is owned by Orvill and Kelley Fairchild who live near the tavern.

The EPA's job of protecting the environment was further burdened by underfunding, especially throughout the Reagan administration.

She also noted that a major lab that tested 300 pesticides was found to have falsified the results.

As a result of many factors, a large number of pesticides on the market have not been tested adequately or at all for effects to livers, nerves or genes or whether they are carcinogenic or may damage the environment.

Even those chemicals that are

tested and show dangerous-toxic levels may be placed on the market, because their profitability outweighs the risks, she said.

Scott-Bergin urged people to get involved by seeking a job on county weed control boards or by finding out what pesticides are sprayed in nearby farms.

"We have the right to know what chemicals are being used on us." At the very least, people can closely watch the chemicals they used in their own homes and gardens, she said.

Haynes said he did not remember ever saying he would not allow a woman to work as a patrol deputy as Nevada charges in a sexual discrimination suit she filed this week with the Idaho Human Rights Commission.

Haynes laid Nevada out from his office on Sept. 1.

Haynes said he has always encouraged his deputies, men and women, to improve themselves through additional training.

Despite the differences between him and Cal Nevada, Haynes said, he believes the sheriff's office and Ketchum Police Department can still work together on a professional level.

"The biggest shortcoming of the sheriff's office when he took over from Drexler was the poor attitudes of the deputies, Haynes said in re-

sponse to a question.

"But, I'm happy to say that those officers that were working for Orville have changed their attitudes since I became sheriff," Haynes said.

Haynes took credit for many improvements to the jail and sheriff's office in his four years in office.

However, Drexler said many of the improvements were already planned when Haynes was elected.

He disputed Haynes' claim that he, not Drexler, was responsible for a training addition to the sheriff's office, computers and an emergency generator for the jail.

"I had that generator spoken for before I left the building," Drexler said. "The only problem is I was prematurely ejected."

Drexler also criticized increases in the sheriff's budget since Haynes took

office.

He said a lower crime rate in the county makes any expansion of the sheriff's budget unnecessary. He said he would be conservative in putting a budget together.

The size of the budget and the number of deputies he will have to cope with the crime rate, he said.

Drexler also criticized Haynes for such things as using sheriff's cars in parades. He said there are a number of areas where money can be saved if watched closely.

According to County Clerk Marie Ivie, the budget for the sheriff's office and jail went from \$335,476 in 1981, when Drexler last put a budget together, to \$447,056 for the 1985 fiscal year.

"Is this going to be your policy if you are a commissioner: to let people be washed out?" Carl Johnson asked.

Blanchard answered that if the landowner had not channeled the river in previous years and had not removed the streamside vegetation, the damage probably would not have occurred.

Gardner, a Republican, said he supports the work of a County Stream Committee and said its policies would balance the county's policies, which he said have varied from situation to situation in the past.

The committee, which includes members from a number of interest groups in the county, has spent two years hammering out goals and policies to develop a uniform policy for controlling the rages of the river.

Barbara Dargatz, a Democrat who is opposing incumbent Rupert House for the county's central district seat

on the board, joined Blanchard in saying the protection of the river was important.

House said he would make river policy based on the guidelines the commission adopts from the Stream Committee's recommendations. However, he was not specific about any policies.

In the past, House, a conservative Republican, has criticized the Stream Committee and once recommended its abolition.

House is a former miner who is anxiously awaiting the return to Blaine County of mining, the industry that first attracted settlers to the Wood River Valley.

# Remington gets Evans' ultimatum

**BOISE (AP)** — Gov. John Evans said Thursday that ouster proceedings will begin unless suspended Corrections Board member Kent Remington voluntarily resigns.

"I have no choice but to seek his resignation," Evans said, explaining that state code mandates such action when a law has been broken.

An attorney general's report released this week contended that Remington violated state law by entering into a contractual agreement with Prison Industries, while a member of the board that supervises the Department of Corrections.

But Remington, a St. Anthony agri-businessman, said Thursday he wants to think the matter through before deciding whether to resign. He'll decide by Monday, then will telephone the governor with his decision.

"If I refuse to resign, then the governor will have to fire me," Remington said, following a private meeting with the governor.

Remington also criticized the news media for what he said were attempts to portray him as a criminal.

Remington refuses to resign, Evans will have to send him a letter seeking his resignation. Remington will have up to 10 days to respond to the complaints against him.

If Remington still doesn't resign, a hearing will be held to decide whether he will serve the remainder of his term, which expires at the end of the year.

A voluntary resignation is in the best interest of Remington's family, the Department of Corrections and state government, Evans said.

The governor said the situation has been personally difficult for him.

"I've been to his house. I know his family," Evans said. "As a friend, I advised him the best course of action would be to resign."

Remington, appointed to the Corrections Board by Evans in 1983, succeeding the late Robert Fanning of Idaho Falls, acknowledged the technical violation of the law. But, "I haven't done anything wrong," he said.

# Youths taken from camp

**CALDWELL (AP)** — Authorities have removed six juveniles from a mountain camp that welfare officials say lacked running water and any communication with the outside world.

State investigators also found no medical care available to youngsters at Indian Meadows Camp 26 miles southeast of Jordan Valley, Ore., said Dale Yonney of the Idaho Health and Welfare Department.

But a Boise attorney who is president of the camp said it provided a useful service and was a religiously oriented operation.

Robert Aldridge said the action by state officials violates constitutional guarantees of separation of church and state. He also said the state action violates constitutional rights to freedom-of-speech and religion.

# Hospitals fail in attempt to merge

**WALLACE (AP)** — Two hospital districts in the Silver-Valley have failed to clear hurdles in a proposed consolidation effort and acknowledge that they are losing patients to larger cities at a time when their own hospitals are not even half full.

The East Shoshone Hospital District in Silverton has proposed a merger with the West Shoshone Hospital District in Kellogg, but stipulated that the Kellogg hospital would have to close.

# Closing of TF schools criticized

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — Closure of Twin Falls schools is the type of action a fledgling teachers' association was formed to fight, says the group's spokeswoman.

"When teachers become more concerned with (a) union's bargaining power, they forget what they are paid for — to teach," Diana Robertson, of Independent Educators of Idaho said in a news release.

In announcing formation of her group during the summer, the Idaho Falls teacher said Independent Educators of Idaho would be an alternative to the "trade-union mentality" of the Idaho Education Association.

The IEA is the negotiating organization for teachers across the state, including Twin Falls, where schools were closed for three days because of deadlocked contract talks.

Ms. Robertson said Independent Educators of Idaho operates "to see that children are not used as pawns" at the bargaining table.

Many teachers have joined IEA only for its substantial insurance benefits, Ms. Robertson said at the time her organization was formed. Independent Educators of Idaho also planned to offer insurance, she said.

# Travel group fights back

**IDAHO FALLS (AP)** — The chairman of the Idaho Travel Council and the newly appointed state travel director have tried to head off a lawmaker's attempt to dissolve the council's ties with state government.

Rep. J.E. Chabband, R-Idaho Falls, last week proposed to the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce that ITC and local chambers join in an independent, statewide organization to promote tourism and industrial growth, rather than establish a new state Department of Commerce.

Chabband also proposed putting the ITC's shelter agency, the Division of Economic and Community Affairs, "back in the private sector where it belongs."

The proposals provoked a flurry of dissent Tuesday.

"Our main concern now is that this thing not gain a lot of momentum," said ITC Chairman Dennis Sessions, a Driggs hotelier.

"At least we wanted to serve notice that he's in for a fight," said Ralph McFullen, state travel director.

## Rail line to drop branch

**OROFINO (AP)** — The short-line Camas Prairie Railroad Co. is preparing to file a notice that it intends to discontinue serving a nine-mile branch line in Clearwater County.

The notice will be presented to the Interstate Commerce Commission within about one week, the company said.

Camas Prairie Railroad officials said the service isn't profitable. Potlatch Corp. is the only business along the route, the company said.

Burlington Northern Railroad owns the Camas Prairie Railroad Co., which extends into eastern Washington.

Potlatch officials said they have no objections to the termination. Logs that once were shipped on the railroad line are now transported by truck, they said.

"Our only reaction is one of nostalgia," said John Barclay, a spokesman for the northern Idaho wood-products company.

He said Potlatch used the railroad when it was constructed in 1926-27, and for decades afterward.

## ISU frat honors Magnuson

**POCATELLO (AP)** — An Idaho State University business fraternity has selected northern Idaho mining magnate Harry Magnuson as its 1984 Businessman of the Year.

Magnuson attended the University of Idaho Southern Branch, now ISU, during World War II. He later earned a bachelor's degree at the University of Idaho, and a master's degree at Harvard University.

Magnuson's business interests include partnership in an accounting firm with offices in Kellogg and Wallace.

The Alpha Kappa Psi fraternity will honor Magnuson at a Nov. 15 dinner in Pocatello. The scheduled speakers are former Interior Secretary and Idaho Gov. Cecil Andrus, and Bernard Coughlin, president of Gonzaga University, Spokane, Wash.

## Program accreditation goal

**MOSCOW (AP)** — The University of Idaho will seek accreditation for its undergraduate business and master-of-business administration programs.

The school has submitted a letter of intent to the American Assembly of Collegiate Schools of Business, said Dean Raymond Dacey. The UI must also prepare a self study this academic year, and the following year the AACSB will send an accrediting team, he added.

A year ago, the UI went through a trial exercise in which it wrote a self study and hired a consultant to review its business program. On that basis, Dacey said the UI faces a number of problems in gaining accreditation.

Both Idaho State University and Boise State University have accredited undergraduate business programs. ISU has the only accredited graduate program now, but BSU expects to have an accredited MBA program in February.

## Braniff headed for hangar?

**DALLAS (AP)** — The decision by Braniff Inc. to suspend service to half its cities, ground two-thirds of its 30 airplanes and lay off hundreds of employees could be the prelude to its final chapter, industry analysts said Thursday.

"We tried, we tried," Braniff executives Jay Pritzker and Patrick Foley said in a letter read to employees Wednesday.

The airline, which emerged from bankruptcy protection less than eight months ago with high hopes of regaining its former success, will attempt to survive with 10 airplanes and a new operating plan, serving 10 cities of Nov. 5.

But Wall Street analysts said Braniff's hopes could be short-lived if travelers and travel agents abandon the resurrected carrier.

Foley, vice chairman of Braniff, said the company had more than \$90 million in losses in its first five months of service — "far more than original projections."

# Stocks slip as interest rises

**NEW YORK** — Stock prices slipped into a moderate decline Thursday as interest rates turned upward in the credit markets.

Computer and technology stocks suffered some of the session's most notable losses.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks, up 3.42 Wednesday, dropped 5.41 to 1,211.07.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange totaled 92.7 million shares, against 91.62 million the day before.

Interest rates had declined substantially in recent days, reducing the competitive appeal of bonds, bank certificates — of deposit — and other interest-bearing investments in comparison to stocks.

But they headed in the other direction Thursday as Henry Kaufman, the Salomon Brothers economist, labeled the recent drop only "a pleasant interlude" before rates encounter renewed upward pressure.

Rates on short-term Treasury bills jumped 18 to 25 basis points, or hundredths of a percentage point. Prices of long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, fell more than \$10 for every \$1,000 in face value.

Among the computer and technology issues, International Business Machines fell 1 1/2 to 25; Texas Instruments 4 1/2 to 126 1/2; Digital Equipment 1 1/2 to 102 1/2; Data

General 2 1/2 to 52 1/2; Hewlett-Packard 1 1/2 to 37 1/2; and National Semiconductor 1 1/2 to 11 1/2.

General Mills tumbled 3 1/2 to 54 1/2. Late Wednesday the company said it expected to show a 15 percent earnings decline for the fiscal quarter that ends Nov. 25.

Caltec, which came in with sharply lower quarterly profits, dropped 1 1/2 to 14 1/2.

Mobil led the active list, up 1 1/2 to 31, on takeover speculation that it was apparently heightened by an article in Fortune magazine.

The company said it saw no sign that its stock was being bought by anyone with the intention of making a bid for control.

Other energy issues were mixed. Exxon rose 3/4 to 42 1/2 and Chevron 1/4 to 33 1/2, but Phillips Petroleum lost 3/4 to 39 1/2, and Standard Oil of Indiana was unchanged at 56 1/2.

Advancing issues outnumbered declines by more than 3 to 2 in the daily tally on the Big Board, and the exchange's composite index dropped .47 to 95.93.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, came to 112.26 million shares.

Standard & Poor's Index of Industrials fell 1.05 to 187.06, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down .89 to 166.31.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market dropped 1.83 to 249.00. All the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 210.40, down 0.10.

# Home resales continue slump for fifth month

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Resales of single-family homes dipped 1.1 percent in September, marking the fifth consecutive monthly decline, a real estate trade group said Thursday.

The National Association of Realtors said resales of previously owned single-family homes dropped to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 2.67 million units last month.

Sales had declined 2.5 percent in August and 6.5 percent in July. Since hitting a peak rate of 3.09 million units in April, sales have fallen almost 14 percent.

"Although continued high mortgage interest rates clearly are dampening housing activity, the slowing rate of decline in home resales last month underscores the strong underlying demand for housing," said Frank Katusak, vice president of the association's research division.

He predicted that resales would hit bottom at a rate of 2.25 million units by the end of next year before beginning to recover in 1986.

"The potential for a strong housing market is present," but high interest rates are dampening sales of both new and existing homes," Katusak said. "If interest rates fall to more affordable levels, as they are expected to by late next year, home sales are likely to increase."

The Federal Home Loan Bank board reported that in early September fixed-rate mortgages were averaging 14.91 percent, a slight improvement from the month before.

The median price of a home in September was \$72,000, the real estate trade group found in its survey. This was down 1.5 percent from August level, but it was 3.9 percent higher than the \$69,900 median price recorded in September 1983. The median price means that half the homes sold for more and half for less.

The September decline in sales was concentrated in the West, where the rate dropped by 11.5 percent, and the Northeast, where sales were off 3.9 percent. Sales activity rose 6.2 percent in the South and 1.4 percent in the Midwest.

Dear Mr. Wolff: My partner asked me to play "Invitational Stayman" I agreed after a short briefing. Can you review the high points for me?

New Vista, Carthageville, Mo. ANSWER: Invitational Stayman is a form of non-forcing Stayman played by some pairs after specific agreement. The agreement is aimed at differentiating between weak hands and those of moderate strength (6-8 HCP).

Dear Mr. Wolff: We play five-card majors. If one of us opens one of a major, is it permissible for responder to offer a jump raise with 13-16 points and only three trumps?

One Short, Saginaw, Mich. ANSWER: The jump raise by an unpassed hand should be based on four-card support. A good trump suit is vital to successful slam auctions.

Dear Mr. Wolff: Declarer picks up a card in dummy but, before placing it at the middle of the table, he changes his mind and plays another card. Can declarer be forced to play the first card touched?

Second Thoughts, Erie, Pa. ANSWER: The law reads, "A card must be played if it is a card in dummy deliberately touched by declarer except for the purpose of arranging dummy's cards or of reaching a card above or below the card or cards touched."

It plays to play slams with a pessimistic outlook. Prepare yourself for losing fines, choosing a plan that will overcome such adversities.

South wins the club ace and draws' trumps. East discarding a diamond on the second round. With no problems in either minor suit, should South try the heart finesse? If he does, East wins the king and South loses the slam. East exits safely with a heart and the slam goes one down.

A better plan is to cash three diamonds before leading a low heart, dummy can cover, ducking the trick to East. East must now lead a club or a heart, either way sacrificing the vital trick. If West plays his heart nine, however, the duck to East becomes impossible and South is headed for a sure one down.

The best plan works against alert West as well as sleepy ones. Instead of ace king of trumps, ruff a low club from dummy. The high diamonds are cashed, ending in dummy, and the club queen is led. When East covers, South discards instead of ruffing. East must now lead a heart for a free finesse or offer a ruff and discard.

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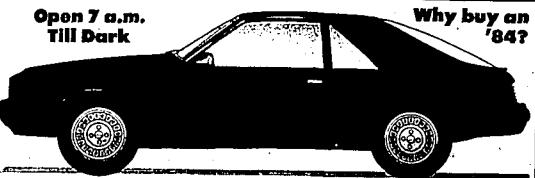
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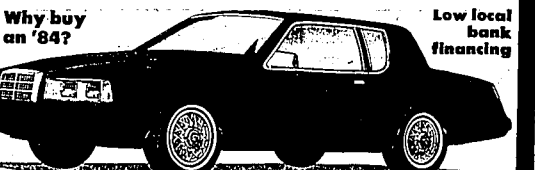
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# Burley invades Jerome in A-2 playoff showdown tonight

**JEROME** — This is how football seasons should end.

The Burley Bobcats and Jerome Tigers, both 6-2 overall, meet tonight at 8 for the championship of the South Central Idaho Conference and, more importantly, a berth in the state A-2 playoffs (which begin next week).

Burley, 2-1 in league, will be seeking its second straight postseason trip, while the Jerome Tigers, 3-0 in the conference, are trying to reach the playoffs for the third time in Coach Jon Jund's four-year tenure. "This is proba-

bly the biggest ballgame we've had at this school in 10 years," Jund said.

The teams have little to complain about, enhancing tonight's confrontation. Injuries aren't a problem; moreover, both seem to be approaching an emotional crest. "We probably had the best week of practices we've had in the four years I've been at Jerome," Jund said. Burley Coach John Billez observed, "(The players) haven't been really, really fired up, but we don't really want to. We want to peak on Friday night."

The Tigers' ascent features a six-game winning streak. Quarterback Shane Jund, wide receiver Todd Amundson and running

back Tracy Black sustain an offense that rarely explodes (a 56-0 annihilation of Wood River, serving as an exception) yet usually suffices. Aside from the Wood River game, Jerome's average margin of victory has been a scant four points.

"The No. 1 thing is how well they throw the football and how well they catch it," Billez said. "They use a lot of different sets and flexions with those sets. I think they'll try to flexion you a little more on offense than Jon has in the past."

Coach Jund added that the offensive line has been a primary source of the Tigers' success. "They're not very big, but they're a

very intelligent group of kids," he said. "They don't make a lot of mistakes."

Defensively, linebackers Brian Martins and Brett Rue impress Billez considerably. "We hope we can control them somehow," he said.

Overall, Billez continued, "We have to be able to pick up their mistakes. If our offensive linemen can do that, we'll be able to move the football."

Moving the football against Burley has been quite a chore. The Bobcats, anchored by four linemen Trent Woodbury, Travis Mabey, Alex Hamilton and Edward Laney, have yielded just 49 points this season. "Probably our whole season has been built around our

defense," Billez admitted.

Like Billez, Coach Jund believes falling stunts will be a key. "They've lived with the blitz and stunting, and they've had great success with them," he said.

Offensively, Jund compares the Bobcats to Twin Falls, which defeated Jerome 21-18 in the season opener. "They run the veer, and they have the added dimension of a good sprint-out quarterback (Alex Aljandrea)," he said. Wide receivers Jay Christensen and Steve Peterson also command Jund's respect, as does the running tandem of Bret Udy (563 yards on 91 carries) and Shane Beck (481 yards, 90 attempts).

## Sutcliffe will try free agency while talking with Cubs

Cy Young winner Rick Sutcliffe probably will go through the free-agent re-entry draft on Nov. 8 even though he intends to continue negotiations with the Chicago Cubs, agent Barry Axelrod said Thursday.

Axelrod said the Cubs, whom Sutcliffe helped lead to the National League East title, were the pitcher's sentimental choice, "but on the other hand, there's a business decision to be made."

Axelrod, interviewed from his Encinitas, Calif., office by telephone, said he had seen Cubs General Manager Dallas Green quoted as saying "no one would outbid the Cubs. But it's hard to set a value on Rick without knowing all the facts, and that (going through the draft) is one way to know how much people are willing to offer."

Sutcliffe, named the NL Cy Young winner Tuesday after a 16-1 record with Chicago, declared for free agency last week. On Thursday, Toronto Blue Jays designated hitter Cliff Johnson and Cincinnati Reds' pitcher Bob Ojwinski filed for free agency, bringing the total number of

players eligible for the draft to 46.

Axelrod and Sutcliffe, likely to be one of the most highly prized free agents along with St. Louis reliever Bruce Sutter, probably will not meet with Green and other Cubs executives until next week.

"I anticipate that I'll talk with Dallas tomorrow (Friday) and set up a meeting early next week," Axelrod said.

"I try not to go into anything with a whole lot of expectations," the agent said. "I do know that our negotiations to this point have been cordial. We react to each other, and it seems like we make progress, shall we say."

Sutcliffe was traded to the Cubs on June 13 from Cleveland, where he had a record of 4-5. Sutcliffe won his last 14 regular-season starts and was the winner of Game One of the Cubs' NL playoffs with San Diego. The Cubs right-hander, however, was the loser in the fifth and final playoff game as the Padres won their first pennant.

"There's no denying the fact that his experiences from June 13 on and not have been better, and Chicago has been wonderful to him — the people, the organization — they've been absolutely marvelous and he couldn't have asked for more," Axelrod said.

## Non-league Eagles may hold key to ISU's playoff hopes

**POCATELLO** — Idaho State University, having rescued itself from the Big Sky Conference wilderness last week with a road victory over Northern Arizona, would seem to have it easy this week.

Eastern Washington (5-1-1) will come to call on the 4-3 Bengals Saturday night for a non-conference game in the ISU Mindome. So why is ISU Coach Jim Koetter gearing up as if he's about to play Boise State again?

"Because we have to win the rest of our games if we're going to be considered for an at-large berth to the NCAA Division I-AA playoffs," says the second-year Idaho State mentor. "And because, if we're fortunate enough to get three spots from the West (in the playoffs), Eastern

Washington could be one of the schools considered. We're treating it like a conference game, like a must-win game for us."

EWU, which just moved up from Division II to I-AA this year in anticipation of winning membership in the Big Sky Conference, has been beating up regularly on Big Sky opponents this season. It started with a 21-16 victory over Big Sky title contender Montana State in September; then after losing to Boise State, the Eagles tied Montana and beat Idaho 32-25.

"We'll play well, with no letdown," says Koetter of Saturday's game. "They have good people in their secondary — they react well. They have good linebackers — I'm impressed with Steve Cole (a 6-foot-3, 200-pound senior). On offense, they throw the ball very well and have a better running game than Northern

Arizona. Quarterback Rick Workman has been playing very well."

But EWU Coach Dick Zornes scoffs at talk about the Eagles making the playoffs.

"I doubt very much if we're in the running for anything," he says. "We're an independent and we're in our first year in I-AA, we've played (Division II) schools like Howard Payne and Angelo State — a playoff position is just not on our agenda."

Zornes says last week's victory over Idaho in Spokane, Wash., was the first time this season that his offense and his defense had played well.

"Offensively, we've some made some big plays this year, but until last week we had no consistency at all," says Zornes. "Defensively, we've played pretty well all season. Until that time, we were lucky we were playing some teams that didn't have

the personnel we had."

Workman, a 6-2, 195-pound junior, ranks 14th in the nation (among I-AA teams) in passing efficiency, having completed 57 percent of his passes for 1,374 yards and 12 touchdowns. Craig Richardson, the Eagles' sophomore wide receiver and kickoff returner, ranks 17th in the country in all-purpose running. Cole has been in on 81 tackles this season, including five sacks, and has recovered six fumbles.

Notwithstanding, Zornes says the Eagles aren't in Idaho State's league — in more ways than one.

"I think they're probably on a par with Boise State (to whom EWU lost 44-17)," he says. "They've got a lot better personnel than we have."

"Perhaps, but a lot of that personnel is limping. ISU lost starting center Todd Price, first-team all-Big Sky Conference a week ago, to a knee injury in the Northern Arizona game.

Reserve light end Troy Kneuckles, a sophomore, underwent knee surgery and is also out for the year. ISU met its weekly quota by losing another inside linebacker — four had already been sidelined — when freshman Jerry Oates hyperextended his knee. Sophomore hyper linebacker Tom Jewell, who injured the ligaments in his hand three weeks ago against Boise State, may be back for Saturday's game, however.

"(Linebacker) Scott MacLean played very well for three quarters (at NAU after Price's injury)," says Koetter. "He handled the snap very well and did a good job on assignments and physical execution. It was his first significant playing time of the season. (Sophomore) Ron (Manu) and (freshman) Mike (Galley) played most of the game at inside linebacker and did very well. Every time something has happened to someone,

## Defensive coach rehired, head coach fired and replaced by Berry in Patriots' shakeup

**FOXBORO, Mass. (AP)** — After a tumultuous 24 hours in which his defensive coordinator lost and regained his job, Ron Meyer was fired Thursday as head coach of the New England Patriots and replaced by Raymond Berry.

"We need a stable situation here," said Patrick Sullivan, general manager of the National Football League team, which has a 5-3 record midway through the season. "There are many issues that came up that led us to the conclusion that we had no alternative."

One of those issues was Meyer's unexpected decision, without consulting Sullivan, to fire defensive coordinator Rod Rust. He did that Wednesday morning, citing philosophical differences over defensive strategy, then informed Sullivan, who was at the NFL meetings in New Orleans.

"I made the move that I felt would make us a better football team and I would do it today," the 43-year-old Meyer, who had a year and a half left on his four-year contract, said at a news conference Thursday.

Sullivan rushed home and met with Meyer. Berry — an assistant coach with the Patriots from 1978 through 1981, was offered the job late Wednesday afternoon and Meyer was informed by Sullivan Thursday morning.

"He said, 'Ron, we've come to a decision.' I said, 'You've got to be kidding me,'" said Meyer, who has

had differences with some of his players the past three years.

He is the second NFL head coach to be fired this season. Sam Rutigliano, a former New England assistant, lost his job Monday with Cleveland.

Meyer, whose 18-15 record was the best winning percentage of any Patriots head coach ever, said he didn't ask for a reason and was given none. Sullivan indicated the decision to fire Rust was a factor.

Rust, who was highly praised by his players before and after his firing, was rehired Thursday.

"One of the first things I wanted to do was go to Rod Rust back," said Berry, who was named to the Pro Football Hall of Fame after a brilliant 13-year career as a receiver with the Baltimore Colts.

Berry, 51, was part of the staff fired when Ron Erhardt lost his job as New England head coach and was replaced by Meyer after the team went 2-14 in 1981. Since then, he's been out of football, working for a Vermont resort and a company that sells such items as caps.

Berry, the Patriots' ninth head coach, said that when Sullivan called him Wednesday morning "I was aware of the fact that (replacing Meyer) was a definite possibility."

"This is not an ideal situation," said Berry, who was given a contract through the 1985 season for his first head coaching job. He added that he didn't plan any changes for Sunday's game with the New York Jets.

The Patriots are in the thick of the race for a playoff position, three games behind Miami and a game behind the Jets in the AFC East.

"I really oppose disruptions in the middle of the season of any variety," Sullivan said.

"Then why did he fire Meyer?"

"Because I oppose disruptions," said Sullivan, who voiced his support for Rust. "There are many, many issues which went into this. It was not a snap judgment."

"I would prefer not to get into this now. I think it would be counterproductive to what we want to do," Sullivan said Meyer's contract gave him the right to hire and fire coaches. But he added that should have been consulted before Meyer fired Rust.

Three weeks ago, Sullivan met with players who complained about Meyer, who has had an uneasy relationship with many veterans since arriving here after six years as head coach at Southern Methodist.

"Ron was upset about that meeting. There's no question about it," said Sullivan.

Meyer and Sullivan denied that the decision to fire Rust was an attempt by Meyer to assert the power that he felt Sullivan undermined by meeting with the players.

Meyer said Thursday he fired Rust "with the understanding of my authority in that area. I regretted that (he felt the move was necessary) and the timing of it but also I greeted the inadequacies which I felt

the defensive players were being prepared to play under."

After last Sunday's 44-24 loss to Miami, New England fell from 10th to 23rd in defensive ratings in the 28-team NFL.

Meyer said his firing "took me by surprise. I'm sure it is did Rod Rust. I told Patrick I know it's a tough decision because I had to make one the day before."

Meyer said he hoped to return to coaching and added "I'm unemployed right now. Yesterday, I was a Reagan fan. Today I'm a Mondale fan."

## College grid powers to form TV coalition

**KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP)** — Major college football powers, with millions of dollars in potential television revenue at stake, will try to form a single coalition in hopes of resolving the chaos stemming from this season's unrestricted TV coverage.

Representatives of the Big Ten, Pac-10, Southeast, Southwest, Big Eight, Atlantic Coast and Western Athletic conferences will meet in Dallas Dec. 12-15. New Dame will represent northern independents, and Florida State southern independents.

"We're trying hard to look to the future and cast aside or ignore the problems we've had in the past," said Tom Hansen, executive director of the Pac-10 Conference, which has been very successful in working together in a cooperative vein."

The panel's goals, according to Hansen, would be to increase network TV income by having one administrative body, work out a fair plan for TV appearances, protect receipts and contracts, and meet all legal requirements.

Television rights fees were cut in half for many schools this year following the Supreme Court decision voiding the NCAA's control of football telecasts.

The court's ruling stemmed from an antitrust suit brought by

the universities of Oklahoma and Georgia, which had sought since 1981 to dissolve the NCAA's centralized controls.

Afterward, an unsuccessful attempt was made to form a TV coalition involving the 63 schools of the College Football Association and the Pac-10 and Big Ten conferences.

The Pac-10 and Big Ten, however, signed a separate agreement with CBS, while the CFA signed a contract with ABC.

The immediate result, said many school administrators, was the loss of millions of dollars in potential TV revenue as well as a glut of college football on television.

"As many as 10 games can be seen every Saturday in metropolitan markets with full cable service, a trend which many believe has hurt ratings and could erode stadium attendance."

A subcommittee composed of Hansen, Notre Dame athletic director Gene Corrigan and Southwest Conference Commissioner Fred Jacoby has met several times to try to work out details of a coalition. Sources said it is generally agreed that neither the NCAA nor the CFA would have a hand in administering such an umbrella group.

# BYU breezes past New Mexico 48-0

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — Quarterback Robbie Bosco threw three touchdown passes and No. 5 ranked Brigham Young solved New Mexico's pass-conscious defense in rolling to a 48-0 Western Athletic Conference football win Thursday night.

BYU, owner of the nation's longest winning streak in major college football, is 9-0 for the year and 5-0 in the WAC. The Cougars' now have won 19 straight games dating back to the first game of the 1983 season. The win also gave BYU a conference record 19 straight victories.

New Mexico, losing its fourth straight game in league play, dropped to 4-4 overall and 1-4 in the WAC.

New Mexico employed up to six defensive backs and at times had only

one down lineman, to try and stop Bosco, who has thrown for more than 2,600 yards and 23 touchdowns this season.

But nothing worked, as Bosco methodically and patiently picked apart the Lobo defense. Bosco completed 19 of 23 passes for 227 yards and connected with wide receiver Glen Kozlowski on TD strikes of 10 and 13 yards.

The Cougars, playing before a national cable audience, also got touchdowns from 9 of 33 and 2 yards by 207-pound fullback Lakel Heimull, a

47-yard punt return TD from Val Sikahema and field goals of 27 yards and 47 yards by Lee Johnson.

New Mexico, riddled by injuries the last four weeks, killed what few scoring opportunities it had with seven turnovers.

The Lobos also lost their second quarterback in three weeks when senior Todd Williamson suffered a broken bone in his throwing hand in the first half.

BYU scored the first time it handled the football, going 70 yards in 13 plays with Bosco and Kozlowski

accounting for the final 7 yards.

With Bosco's passing and Heimull's bullish runs punching holes in the New Mexico defense, the Cougars built the lead to 24-0 at halftime on the first Johnson field goal, Sikahema's punt return and a 2-yard plunge by Heimull.

BYU turned it into a rout with 17 points in the first three minutes of the third quarter.

Heimull went 33 yards on the second play of the quarter, Johnson converted on a field goal after a fumble by New Mexico halfback Willie Furrall and Bosco hit Kozlowski with 12:00 left after Lobo third string quarterback Billy Rucker tumbled on the first play after the BYU kickoff and the Cougars' Kurt Gouveia recovered at the New Mexico 14.

# Westphal loses in arbitration

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — The Phoenix Suns announced Thursday that they have won an arbitration case involving a salary dispute with veteran guard Paul Westphal.

Westphal, a 12-year pro, had taken the National Basketball Association team to arbitration on Aug. 8 claiming his \$83,000 salary this season was guaranteed.

The Suns, however, said the 33-year-old Westphal missed too many games last year due to injuries and needed to play in at least 60 to qualify for the guarantee.

Westphal appeared in 59 games, but said he was healthy enough to play in several other games and was not used by Phoenix Coach John MacLeod.

The case was presented in the NBA league offices in New York to arbitrator Arthur Stark, who finally issued his decision after more than a two-month wait.

Westphal, a 6-foot-4 former Southern Cal star, was waived by the Suns on Oct. 12 after playing sparingly in two preseason games.

MacLeod said the decision to cut him "was based strictly on talent. It had nothing to do with the arbitration. Paul just didn't fit into our plans this year."


Westphal has yet to be picked up by any other NBA team.

"If it hasn't happened by now, it probably isn't going to happen," he said. "You never know, but I can't play my life on hold. If I don't play anywhere, I'll be looking for a job like everybody else."

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# Yankees will keep Berra

NEW YORK (AP) — Yogi Berra will return as manager of the New York Yankees in 1985, team owner George Steinbrenner said Thursday, seemingly quelling speculation that the Yankees would pursue the services of Earl Weaver.

Berra, while celebrating Thursday night at the Metropolitan Opera, said he felt "very great about it."

While Steinbrenner did not comment directly on rumors that he coveted Weaver, the former Baltimore manager, now a television broadcaster, the Yankee owner said:

"The Yankees will not make any changes for '85. Yogi Berra's contract will be honored, and he will be the Yankee manager next year. Yogi did a very creditable job blending all of our fine veteran players with some outstanding young talent."

Berra was hired to replace Billy Martin to start the 1984 season. The Yankees were in sixth place in the American League East, 20 games

behind Detroit, at the All-Star break. But they finished with a 50-29 mark after the break, the best second half in baseball, to move into third with an 87-75 mark, 17 games back of the Tigers and two behind second-place Toronto.

"The fans have been great to me and George has, too, as far as that goes," Berra said in an interview with WABC-TV during an intermission of La Boheme at a special presentation at the Met. "The second half, we had one good season and I just hope it continues into our first half next year."

"We could have played dead. We didn't have to do anything, and we did. They did a great job. We have some good ballplayers. I think if our pitchers stay healthy, we've got a good chance."

"We are hoping to get off to a fast start in '85, something we did not do in '84, so the Tigers don't run away and hide by the Fourth of July," Steinbrenner said in a statement read

to newsmen by Yankee publicist Joe Salety. "We had a great second half in '84... we just have to pick up where we left off."

Normally, teams do not bother to announce that a manager will return, especially if he has another year on his contract, as Berra does. But Steinbrenner has changed managers 11 times since he bought the club in 1973.

"It's past season, 10 clubs — Seattle, Oakland, Milwaukee, Cincinnati, San — Francisco, Montreal, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Boston and California — have changed managers, and Steinbrenner made a tongue-in-cheek reference to the high turnover.

"It's actually getting so you can't even mix news anymore when you make a change," Steinbrenner said. "I just can't understand all these teams changing managers the way they do. The lack of stability is alarming."



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# Detroit tests Celts in opener

The Detroit Pistons, who hope to challenge for the Central Division championship this season despite a revamped starting lineup, play host to the defending champion Boston Celtics Friday to highlight the six-game opening-night slate for the National Basketball Association's 39th season.

The Pistons have only two players — Bill Laimbeer at center and Isiah Thomas at point guard — starting in the same positions they did last season, when they made the playoffs for the first time since 1977. A third All-Star, Kelly Tripucka, is moving over from forward to guard to take the place of John Long, an unsigned free agent.

Terry Tyler is one forward starter for the Pistons, while Dan Roundfield, acquired in a trade with Atlanta, is the other. Despite the changes, the Pistons posted an NBA-best 11 preseason record, including a 115-113 decision over the Celtics.

Elsewhere Friday, Atlanta is at New Jersey, Cleveland at Philadelphia, Washington at Chicago, Utah at Seattle and Phoenix at Golden State.

Saturday's openers include a nationally televised afternoon game matching Houston at Dallas, followed at night by Detroit at New York, Philadelphia at Atlanta, New Jersey at Cleveland, Washington at Indiana, Los Angeles Lakers at San Antonio, Portland at Kansas City, Chicago at Milwaukee, Golden State at Denver and the Los Angeles Clippers at Utah.

Detroit will meet a Boston team that also will field a new starting lineup. Guard Gerald Henderson was traded to Seattle and will be replaced by Danny Ainge, while Kevin McHale will probably be at forward instead of Cedric Maxwell, a free agent who did not sign a contract until Thursday.

Last season's Most Valuable Player, Larry Bird, joined center Robert Parish and guard Dennis Johnson as the other starters.

The Celtics, who won eight straight NBA titles from 1959 through 1966, also were the last team to successfully defend a championship in 1955.

"In my mind, it's no mystery, no fluff as to why teams haven't repeated," Coach K.C. Jones said. "Other teams improve through the draft and through

# After \$6 million effort, USFL Maulers call it quits

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The Pittsburgh Maulers officially went out of business Thursday after losing 15 of 18 games and more than \$6 million in their first and only United States Football League season.

"This is not a happy day for us. We were Pittsburgh's answer to Pearl Harbor," said Maulers President Paul Martha.

Although the Maulers have disbanded "effective" immediately, Martha said at a news conference that rumored merger talks between

owner Edward J. DeBartolo and the Philadelphia Stars were continuing.

Because of a gag order instituted by USFL Commissioner Chet Simmons following the league's still-announced realignment last weekend, Martha said he could not discuss any merger details.

Tanenbaum and Stars owner Myso DeBartolo are negotiating a 50-50 ownership of the USFL, champions, who are expected to move to the Baltimore area for the 1985 season.

"If we can work things out, we may join Philadelphia," Martha said. "Mr. DeBartolo has two options, to get out or to remain as a partner in the Stars... but the situation has to be palatable to Mr. DeBartolo to keep him in."

"I've known Ed DeBartolo for a long time and I have nothing but respect for him," Tanenbaum told The Pittsburgh Press. "I can't imagine going into any venture with Mr. DeBartolo in which he would not be on an equal footing. The 'I's haven't all been dotted and the 'S's haven't all been crossed, but the essence of our handshake is intact. The hands have

been shaken." But Martha said he didn't think the agreement was as close to reality as Tanenbaum indicated. "To me, there are more 'I's to be dotted and 'S's to be crossed," he said.

Martha said the USFL's decision at its Amelia Island, Fla., meetings last week to switch to a fall schedule in 1985 "was the end for the Maulers."

Another problem is the \$1.32 billion lawsuit filed by the USFL against the long-established National Football League.

DeBartolo's son, Edward Jr., owns the NFL's San Francisco 49ers. Although the Maulers were not a party to the suit, "in effect, it would be father suing son" if the elder DeBartolo were to purchase a share of the USFL champion Stars, Martha said.

"We thought and we still believe that springtime football in this market could be successful," Martha said at a Civic Arena news conference. "We still feel we were right. We sold 20,000 season tickets and we were accepted by the people and the media of Pittsburgh although from a won-lost standpoint, we were dismal. We were not optimistic about football in the fall."

"We did an in-depth survey of our season ticket holders about what position we should take. We have trouble with our facility (Three Rivers Stadium) in the fall and our fans told us that Pitt Stadium was not an acceptable alternative. We found out that 25 percent of our season tickets and only 50 percent of them told us they would renew for fall

football. Ninety percent told us they would renew for spring football."

The DeBartolo organization "owns two other teams in this market, the (Major Indoor Soccer League) Spirit and the (National Hockey League) Penguins and by playing in the fall, we not only would be competing with the Steelers and Pitt, but with ourselves. We couldn't play fall football and compete with ourselves," Martha said.

"We couldn't operate in the spring of 1985 because we would have been lame duck team... that would not have been acceptable," he added.

The decision leaves the team's front office staff, General Manager George Heckleson and newly named coach Hank Bualough without jobs. Tanenbaum has indicated that Stars General Manager Carl Peterson and Coach Jim Mora will keep their jobs, even if there is a Maulers-Stars merger.

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# Landrum's career best nets Pensacola lead

PENSACOLA, Fla. (AP) — Ralph Landrum converted his career-best round, an 8-under-par 63, into a three-stroke lead Thursday, while Mark O'Meara suffered serious damage to chances of obtaining any of golf's major seasonal honors in the first round of the \$300,000 Pensacola Open.

Landrum, completing his second season on the PGA Tour, scattered nine birdies across his card and one-punted 10 times, including two from 12-to-15 feet to save par in an effort that was two strokes better than any previous competitive round.

"The difference was that I just made a lot of putts," Landrum said. "It was just put luck, one of those days when the hole gets in the way."

But it was water that got in the way for O'Meara, who came into his, the final event official event on the 10-month tour schedule with a chance to

take all three major seasonal honors; Player of the Year, leading money-winner and the Vardon Trophy, for the low-stroke average.

But O'Meara hit into the water three times on the way to a struggling 77 that all but ended his hopes of gaining any of them.

It virtually assured the absent Calvin Peete of the Vardon Trophy. O'Meara would have to shoot three rounds of 63 (equalling the all-time tour record) to catch Peete.

O'Meara, now in danger of missing the cut for the final two rounds Saturday and Sunday, needs a finish of sixth or better to overtake the absent Tom Watson as leading money-winner. And the only way he can go past Watson and South African Denis Pappas in the final Player of the Tour standings is to win the tournament.

# USOC seeks method of sharing spoils

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The distribution of a \$150 million surplus generated by the 1984 Olympic Games in Los Angeles will be among the topics discussed when the United States Olympic Committee's executive board convenes for two days of meetings Friday.

Officials will hold various committee meetings behind closed doors Friday before holding a public session on Saturday when the board will hear a report from USOC Executive Director F. Don Miller.

Miller is expected to report of the status of plans for the 1985 and 1986 National Sports Festivals as well as discuss the financial status of the USOC and plans to distribute the surplus left over from the Summer

Games.

William E. Simon, USOC president, plans to give a review of the Los Angeles Games as well deliver a status report from the executive director selection panel.

"Local officials," meanwhile, are hoping for an opportunity to meet with board members and sell them on the Orlando area as a potential host for national and international sporting events.

The USOC meetings "offer us an excellent opportunity to demonstrate the great interest the folks in this area have for Olympic-style events and the earnest efforts we are putting forth to bring some of those events here," said Chuck Robe, executive director of the Greater Orlando Sports Organizing Committee.

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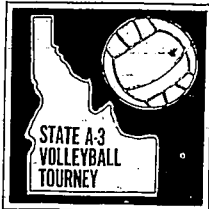
# Gooding-Malad opening game pits A-3 tournament's best

**IDAHO FALLS** — A lot of the suspense of the Idaho Class A-3 high school volleyball tournament will be after the opening match here this afternoon. The two coaches involved in that match aren't particularly happy about that.

"I think it's really unfortunate," says Roslyn Brimhall, coach of defending state champion Malad about her first-round meeting with last year's runner-up, Gooding. "Certainly these are going to be two of the best teams in the tournament, and under the single-elimination format one of them is going to be out of contention for the state championship this afternoon. That's really a pity. Somebody needs to be talked to about it. I tried at the last board of control (of the Idaho High School Activities Association) meeting, but the answer I got was that the bracketing had to be set up in advance, partially so the teams that had the longest distance to travel wouldn't have to play in the early games. I think that's a really poor answer."

Coch Joleen Toone of the District 4 champion Senators agrees. "I talked to (IHSAA executive secretary) Dick Stickle about it, but he said there was nothing he could do," she says. "I have a feeling whoever

wins that match is going to be pretty tough to beat for the championship." That match, pitting the 21-2 Dragons against the 13-6 Senators, is scheduled for 4:30 p.m. at Idaho Falls High School. Shoshone (16-4), the Canyon Conference champion and District 4 runner-up, will face District 3 champion Homedale (9-4) in the 9 p.m. nightcap. In between, District 6 champion Firth will face District 3 runner-up Fruitland at 6 p.m., while District 2 winner Timberline will play

District 6 runner-up Sugar-Salem at 7:30.

The tournament will continue Saturday morning, with the championship game slated for 9 p.m. Saturday night.

Malad beat Gooding twice in last year's state tournament, the last time 15-8. 15-4 for the state title. But the Dragons had a pair of 6-foot hitters last year, but none of the matchup figures to be more even.

"I haven't seen them play, but from what I could see on their roster they've lost three starters from last year," says Toone, whose team beat Shoshone twice for the District 4 championship last week. "They were strong at hitting last year, so I'm assuming that's the case this year too."

Brimhall, who saw the Senators beat Kimberly last week in the district tournament, was impressed.

"We match up pretty well size-wise, but Joleen is running a 6-2 offense this year which is different than she's done in the past. They struggled at times during the Kimberly match, but they fought hard and did the right things to win."

Brimhall, whose victims this year have included defending state A-2 champion Preston, says her team has made a key change since the graduation of her hitter Joleen Daniels, who led the Dragons to back-to-back

state championships.

Malad's primary offensive weapon this season is Lois Dawn, a 5-8 senior hitter with a 25-inch vertical jump.

"We're a little smarter now," says Brimhall. "We have four of our six starters back, but we're not quite as powerful a team as we were a year ago. Some things, though, I think we do a little better."

Toone, whose team started the season slowly, says the Senators will do fine as long as they keep an optimistic attitude.

"Our season was real shaky until the girls gained some confidence in themselves," she says. "It took us some time to learn the 6-2, but when we finally got that together and started working together and communicating, I guess we peaked at the right time."

The key to beating Malad, she says, is avoiding mistakes.

"We played errorless ball at district (against Shoshone) and we spiked real well, which is what we're going to have to do Friday," she says. "And our serving is going to have to be real consistent."

"I did a little research, and I found out that Homedale, Fruitland and McCall-Donnelly took Jurs beating each other during the season," he says. "Then Homedale came back and had a real good district tournament."

"The Trojans were seeded third in their district tourney, but beat No. 2 Fruitland twice after the Grizzlies had upset No. 1-seeded M.D."

"We have a lot of seniors on this team, and I guess that's our strength," says Homedale Coach Larry Koto. "I'm sure our experience helped us at district."

Koto views his ballclub as the underdog in his first-round meeting with Shoshone.

"We played Shoshone in a (Inter-district) playoff a couple of years ago, and they just killed us," he says. "I don't think we're quite in the same class with some of those teams from the Magic Valley."

"The Trojans' strengths are their hitters, seniors Kelly Patterson, Shannon Hash and Lynn Metzler, and senior setter Christie Baustia.

"We're going to have to serve the ball extremely well, keep them out of their offense on serves, block and cover real well," says Koto. "And we're going to have to be aggressive at the net."

Missick says his Indians, led by senior hitter Julie Hubbard and sophomore setter Patty O'Maley, must eliminate mistakes when they face the Trojans.

"From my scouting reports, I understand Homedale is similar to Gooding," he says. "If that's the case, it's going to be important that we work on our serve-and-receive. We team that's healthy and plays consistent volleyball is probably going to win the tournament. We've got to play consistently from start to finish. We had moments at district when we would stand around and watch. We can't do that at state."

An unknown wrinkle in the tournament will be the effect of the Idaho Falls High gym, which is small. The state A-4 tourney will be going on in the gym at the same time.

"It's going to be a lot like playing at Wendell (High School), except that it has windows," says Brimhall. "They tell me they've blocked the windows out, but there's also a problem with the doors. Because of the lighting, you can get a lot of glare from them. In terms of space, I don't think it will be a problem if there's enough room behind the service line. It is going to be noisy in there, though, which could present a problem for teams that communicate a lot."

# Bruins open A-1 quest with Broncos

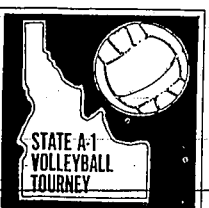

Seven of Anderson's regulars are seniors, five of whom saw extensive playing time last year on a team that went into state with an undefeated record.

"I think the fact that so many of our girls have had the experience of going to state will be an advantage for us," says Anderson, whose team was eliminated in the semifinals in last year's state tournament. "That kind of knowing our first-round opponent will help us."

Unfortunately for the Bruins, they're in the same bracket with Sandpoint, which has won the last two state championships.

"They will definitely have an advantage playing on their home floor," says Anderson of the homesteading Bulldogs, who have lost just once in 23 games this fall.

"They have done so many things well over the past few years, especially on their tipping game and their ability to change directions on sets."

The Bruins, who arrived here late last night after a 563-mile ride from Twin Falls, were scheduled to work out this morning. Walker and her team arrived earlier Thursday after stopping en route from Blackfoot to work out.

"Traveling, eating strange food always has an effect," Walker says. "I hope by stopping along the way we were at least able to work the kinks out."

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# A-2 teams didn't forget Wood River

**SANDPOINT** — Something was missing at the 1983 Idaho Class A-2 high school volleyball tournament.

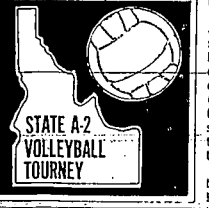
"I haven't seen Wood River play this year, but they've been to state so many times in the past that I have a pretty good idea of what to expect," says Mitch Santos, coach of the Wolverines' first-round opponents from St. Maries. "Wood River, Preston, Madison — they're always at state, year after year, and they're always tough."

The District 4 champion Wolverines, 19-3, and District 1 champ St. Maries, 21-1, will clash in the first round of the tournament at 7 p.m. MDT tonight, a confrontation that will eliminate at least one of the perennial favorites for the state title.

"The single-elimination format doesn't allow the best two teams to make the finals," says Santos, whose team won the state championship two years ago. "The first-round pairings are all determined in advance, and I think that's too bad."

The other tournament first-round games today at Sandpoint High School will pit District 3 champion Vallivue against District 6 runner-up South Fremont at 7 p.m., while defending state champion Preston of the District 5 winner, will meet District 2 champion Orofino at 8:30. In the 10 p.m. nightcap, District 6 champion Madison will collide with District 1 runner-up Post Falls.

The tournament will resume Saturday morning, with the championship

match to be played Saturday night at 9 p.m. MDT.

"We probably have the toughest draw of the tournament in St. Maries," says Wood River Coach David Neumann. "I haven't seen them play, but they're not supposed to be quite as strong as they were last year (in the Lumberjacks finished second in the state tournament to Preston), but I know they've got one strong hitter and one good setter. It's so hard to say when you haven't seen them."

Neumann, who won the state championship in 1977 and again in 1978 when the A-1 and A-2 schools played in the same tournament rates this year's ballclub as perhaps the

best he's coached at Wood River.

"This group plays well together as a team, and we're playing pretty sophisticated offense and defense," he says. St. Maries undoubtedly fits that description. Some of Santos' seniors have played on his varsity for four years.

"We played the toughest schedule draw of that we've played since I've been here," he says. "We played the Spokane teams, played in a tournament over there and went 12-0 in (Intermountain) Conference."

At the Lumberjacks' core is five seniors, all with at least three years' varsity experience: setter Marcella Green, blocker Holly Masterson and hitters Becky Hill, Janni Hagle and Natalie Yarbber. This will be Yarbber's fourth state tournament.

"It's an all-around team," says Santos. "We feel confident especially about our offense; it's going to con-

fuse a lot of people. We've had stronger hitting this year than we did a year ago and we're playing better defense. More important, I think, is that it's a team effort. Our kill percentage is the same among our top five hitters. Like the Chinese showed in the Olympics, it's best to have that kind of balance rather than one or two stars."

The Wolverines arrived last night and worked out shortly thereafter. Neumann is letting his team rest this morning.

"The bus ride certainly can't be a positive aspect, but we think we'll have enough time for the girls to ready to play."

# Castro shows interest in artificial turf

**HAVANA (AP)** — Cuban President Fidel Castro asked questions about artificial turf. Castro's interest in the sport was shown during a meeting with an American amateur baseball official.

"He knew a lot about professional baseball ... and gambling in sports. He said it was important to make sure betting and open stay apart," said Dr. Robert Smith, president of the International Amateur Baseball Association.

"He asked a lot of questions ...

about artificial turf versus natural grass, the domed stadiums, escalating player salaries," Smith said during an interview Wednesday.

Smith, who met with Castro at the presidential offices during the World Amateur Baseball Championships, said Castro had "kind words" for Peter Ueberroth, major league baseball's new commissioner.

But he said Castro did not comment on whether he wanted top Cuban players to play in the United States.

"There was nothing said about that,

although all his questions about professional baseball make me wonder if he had that in the back of his mind," Smith said in an interview.

Although Cuba produces some of the world's best amateur players, only one Cuban player has gone on to the major leagues since the early days of Castro's 25-year-old revolutionary government. That player is Barbaro Garbey of the Detroit Tigers. Suspended from Cuba's national team because of alleged involvement in a betting scandal,

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# Frustrated Idaho and Montana collide

MISSOULA, Mont. — Call it the frustration bowl.

The last time the Universities of Idaho and Montana met for a football game in Dornbluser Stadium — in 1982 — they decided the Big Sky Conference championship. This year they'll probably decide which team finishes at the other end of the standings.

"I'm sure they want to win as much as we do," says Vandal Coach Dennis Erickson. "It's been as frustrating a season for them as it has for us."

Both teams are still looking for their first conference victory. Idaho is 2-5 for the season with three Big Sky losses; Montana is 2-4 with four league setbacks.

"Idaho has all the ingredients of a very explosive football team," says Grizzly Coach Larry Donovan. "They've shown in the past that they have the ability to put a lot of points on the board, and this season is no different. Defensively, they're very scrappy and have played inspiringly

in a couple of games, noticeably against Oregon State. They are hungry for a win just like we are."

There won't be many echoes of that 1982 game, which Montana won 40-16 in a showdown between Idaho quarterback Ken Hobart and Montana's Marty Mornhinweg. Mornhinweg is still around, but it's far from certain he'll see action Saturday. The diminutive senior strained ligaments in his knee in practice a week ago and didn't see action last week against Boise State.

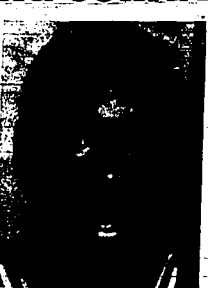
Like Idaho, the Grizzlies have a charge account with Blue Cross. In addition to Mornhinweg, starting tailback Kraig Paulson, starting with a leg injury, along with linebacker Bill Tarrow. Strong safety Terry Shillam has a knee injury and probably won't play Saturday. And that's the short list. Montana has already lost four starters for the season with various injuries.

For the Vandals, wide receiver Eric Yarber — who was sidelined for three weeks with a shoulder injury and only returned to fulltime duty in the Van-

dals' loss to Eastern Washington last week — sprained his ankle in that game and will see only limited action Saturday. Five other regulars are out for the season, but outside linebacker Tom Hennessy — who broke his foot — will be back Saturday for the first time in a month. Defensive tackle John Andrews, who sprained his knee in the second game of the season, will probably play. The Idaho coaching staff at one point had considered reshuffling Andrews for the season.

Erickson says his Vandals are "mentally tough" coming off their 32-25 loss to EWU last week.

"We just been through three losses (to EWU, Weber State and Nevada-Reno) and they've all been close," he says. "Our mental state is good, and we're ready to answer whatever is keeping us from winning these close games. This will be our eighth game of the season, and if we're ever going to do it it's got to be now."

However, Glanders assured everyone that Twin Falls would have a golf team this spring. "It is appreciative of the benefit scramble at Munny Sunday."

Host-Professional Don Franklin said those interested should contact the pro shop as soon as possible, although registration will be allowed through 8 a.m. Sunday. Pairings will be made by the committees of the hosting Men's and Ladies' Golf Associations.

## Ballard signs with Bullets

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Greg Ballard, the Washington Bullets' starting small forward for the past five National Basketball Association seasons, has agreed to a multiyear contract, General Manager Bob Ferry has announced.

Ballard, who has not yet signed the pact, was a first-round draft choice of the Bullets in 1977.

Since Ballard is a free agent, league rules prohibit him from practicing until he signs, so he may not be able to work with his teammates until they return from opening the NBA season Friday night at Chicago and Saturday night at Indiana.

"It's a case of how fast of how fast the paperwork can be done," Ferry said.

## TCU coach gets new pact

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — Texas Christian football Coach Jim Wacker, who whipped the beleaguered Horned Frogs into a winning team this year, has been given a new seven-year contract, university officials announced Thursday.

The agreement replaces Wacker's original four-year pact — which had two years remaining — that he signed in December 1982, TCU Chancellor William E. Tucker said.

University officials said a salary increase is included in the new contract, but no monetary terms were disclosed.

Wacker, who joined TCU after coaching at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, has propelled his team from last year's dismal 1-8-2 record to a 5-1 mark this season.

Under Wacker, TCU teams have won as many games in the past 1½ seasons as had Horned Frog squads in the previous six campaigns.

## Judge allows NBA pay cap

NEW YORK (AP) — A federal judge Thursday denied a request by Philadelphia 76ers guard Leon Wood that an injunction be issued barring the National Basketball Association from enforcing its salary cap rules.

Wood, who signed a contract with the 76ers after filing the antitrust suit against the NBA, the 76ers and the NBA Players Association, also sought to ban the NBA's college draft and a rule prohibiting players from incorporating.

U.S. District Court Judge Robert L. Carter's ruling, in effect, threw the suit out of court.

As it applied to Wood, the salary cap rule prohibits teams with large payrolls from signing first-round draft picks for more than \$75,000 in their first season. Wood, who played for Cal State-Fullerton and was on the gold-medal winning Olympic team, was the 10th selection in the first round of the 1984 college draft.

Wood later was able to sign for more than \$75,000 because the 76ers decided not to resign veteran guard Franklin Edwards. Under the salary cap rules formulated by the NBA and the Players Association, Wood is able to earn what Edwards earned last season.

## NCAA raps Florida cagers

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) — The NCAA, which earlier this week notified the University of Florida football program that it had been found guilty of 59 violations of various rules, issued a private reprimand in the men's and women's basketball programs of the Gators Thursday.

The Southeastern Conference school released the contents of a confidential letter from S. David Berst, the NCAA's director of enforcement, under the state's public records law.

The NCAA noted that its Committee on Infractions had found one violation committed in Coach Norm Sloan's men's basketball program and three in the women's program headed by Coach Debbie Yow.

The NCAA said that during the summer of 1980, Sloan transported two prospective student-athletes from a summer camp that was being conducted on Florida's campus to a local residence where he entertained the prospects at an outdoor barbecue.

In April 1984, the letter said, Yow provided prospective student-athlete Bellita Croley local automobile transportation in the Lexington, Ky., area. The NCAA also said Yow contacted Croley on more than three occasions for recruiting purposes at sites other than the young woman's high school, and that the Lady Gators' coach participated in a basketball workout with Croley for a short period of time on one occasion.

## Maxwell, Celts back together

BOSTON (AP) — Veteran forward Cedric Maxwell, who became a free agent while helping the Boston Celtics to a 15th National Basketball Association championship last June, signed a new multiyear contract with the club Thursday on the eve of the opening of the 1984-85 season.

Celtics General Manager Jan Volk announced that an agreement had been reached after extended negotiating sessions with Maxwell and his agent, Ron Grinker.

No terms were announced. However, best guesses were that Maxwell settled for about \$800,000 a year, ending weeks of negotiations punctuated lately by sharp words between Grinker and Celtics President Red Auerbach.

The Celtics, who said that Maxwell would accompany the club to Detroit for the season opener Friday night, also announced that they had got down to the 12-player limit by cutting their No. 1 and 2 draft picks, 6-foot-7 Michael Young of Houston and 6-foot-8 Ronnie Williams of Florida.

## New NCAA rulings cancel Simplot games

POCAHONTO (AP) — The annual Simplot Games, billed as the biggest indoor high school track and field meet in the West, won't be held at the Idaho State University Minidome due to a change in interpretation of NCAA rules.

"We have decided not to continue sponsorship, at least not this year," Fred Zerza, regional manager of public relations for the J.R. Simplot Company, said Tuesday. Simplot has sponsored the meet the last six years with around 1,000 boys and girls participating each year from a six-state area.

In the past, ISU coaches and personnel have run the meet and the school donated use of the Minidome. Simplot covered the rest of the expenses, including T-shirts and trophies.

Under the current NCAA interpretation, however, ISU cannot be involved in it.

ISU men's track Coach Jerry Quiller said that there were four guidelines restricting school participation.

"The tryout rule was one of them — that was the major one," he said. "If you bring kids in on campus and put

something on, it's basically a tryout."

"A secondary one was the state of Idaho itself does not have an indoor track season. We couldn't get the Idaho High School Activities Association in essence to sanction the meet."

"When the university advised us of it, we took a look at continuing sponsorship. We just can't assure the same high quality of meet without Idaho State's professionals being involved. We don't want to sacrifice the quality of the meet," Zerza said.

Zerza said the new rule interpretation would have meant additional expense for Simplot, including \$6,000 to rent the Minidome and pay for security personnel and Minidome workers.

"And we would have had to hire personnel to conduct the meet. We certainly would have had to assume additional administrative costs in receiving entry forms and setting up the meet," he said.

"Should there be a new interpretation of the NCAA ruling next year or in years ahead, we certainly would look at picking up the sponsorship again," he said.

## 'Hemingway' at CSI

### One-man play traces writer's life

TWIN FALLS — Fresh on the heels of critical acclaim for performances throughout the state, the one-man stage play "E. Hemingway" is appearing at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium Nov. 2 at 8 p.m.

Presented by Erv Johnson of Boise, the two-act drama is a series of recollections of the life and times of the most famous literary figure ever to live in Idaho.

Among the remembrances brought out in brief vignettes are Ernest Hemingway's early years in Paris with Gertrude Stein, his marlin fishing days in Cuba in the 1930s, his many lovers and wives, obsessions with bullfighting and boxing and trout fishing and, finally, his last years in Sun Valley during the early 1960s.

Director Ginger Scott says Hemingway had "incredible charisma. You either loved the man or you hated him. There was no in between." E. Hemingway seeks to be an accurate portrayal of the man as he was in real life. "As such," she warns, "his chauvinism may be difficult for women of the 1980s to stomach or understand."

Hemingway was quoted as saying, "There's more written about me than by me." And it is from those writings about the novelist from magazines, newspapers and books that Johnson gleaned information for his play.

Johnson, a native of Kansas who grew up in southwest Idaho, points out that he was inspired in part by recent one-person plays that have featured the lives of such American characters as Abraham Lincoln, Harry Truman and Will Rogers.

The actor owns a public relations

firm in Boise with just four clients. "Enough," he says, "to put bread on the table." The remainder of his time is devoted to writing and polishing his act.

Some of his recent credits include "Tribute" at the Boise Little Theater, "Bedroom Farce" at Main Stage and "The Gin Game" for Stage Coach, Inc.

Johnson says he chose Hemingway for a one-man production because of his own personal admiration for the man and his work, and also because he had a strong Idaho identification.

Remembering when he was a young adult, Johnson says, "I stood in line at a bookstore in Boise to get a copy of 'The Old Man and the Sea.' It's been a life-long love affair."

The actor readily recognizes Hemingway as a major literary figure and a pioneer of a new technique

in fiction writing. But he points out that he is also attracted to the author for his personal, colorful life.

The combination of Hemingway's life and works makes the author "bigger than life," Johnson says, adding that Hemingway's love of bullfighting, his exploits in war and his camaraderie with his crew version of the jet set all serve to make him an admired and interesting character.

For background, the actor notes that he pored through 42 books about or by the novelist, read numerous magazine and newspaper articles and spent untold hours in libraries researching his subject.

Johnson also contacted people who knew Hemingway personally, including Tillie Arnold of Halley, a contemporary of Hemingway's at Sun Valley and wife of Loyd "Pappy" Arnold, the ski resort's first photographer.

A friend of Hemingway's, "Pappy" Arnold wrote a book on their hunting adventures called "High in the Wild with Hemingway."

The play appears in two settings: Cuba in the early 1930s and in Sun Valley near the end of Hemingway's life.

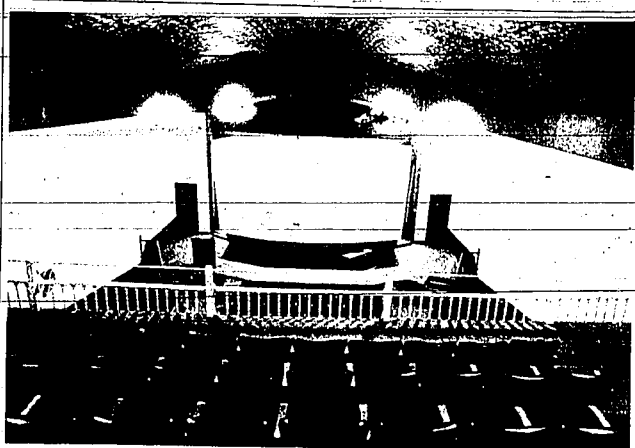
Perhaps accented by his absence, is July 2, 1961, when the novelist took his own life.

"I don't want the audience to dwell on that," says Johnson. "But, we do try to provide insights as to why he took his own life."

"Here was a man of rigor and creative productivity. He simply believed his mental and physical abilities had deteriorated to the point where he didn't want to live any more."

Johnson explains, "So far as

## Renovated Oakley theater recalls early 20th century

OAKLEY — The renovation of the Oakley Valley Theater, begun two years ago, retains the aura of the early 1900s, making one sense the ghosts of yesteryear in the historic landmark.

Kent Severe, President of the Oakley Valley Arts Council says the renovation has been a lot of work and that it continues to be done with visions for the future.

Above the box office in the foyer, etched plate glass, stretching from wall to wall, reminds the visitor this is "Howell's Opera House."

In 1974, the first show, "Fiddler on the Roof," was produced as a fund raiser for the organ in the Oakley Mormon Stake Center, he says, adding, "the show got the organ started and also got the organization of the Oakley Valley Theater started."

Hazel Lake Nelson of Twin Falls and a native of Oakley recalls the name of Severe being connected with the Opera House for many years. In the early '30s, she says, she and Kent's uncle, Forrest Severe, sang in a high-school opera — "Miss Cherry Blossom."

A great deal has occurred since then. The theater group incorporated into the Oakley Valley Arts Council in 1980, with a 10-member board and Severe as president.

The renovation started two years ago, with a majority of the money coming from the proceeds of the productions. The chandeliers were a private contribution, and Mountain Bell donated what was, to them, an outdated intercom system.

## 'Good, bad, dumb' roles once limited female screen stars

TWIN FALLS — In the early days, there really were only three types of women portrayed on film. Good girls. Bad girls. Dumb girls.

With a few exceptions over the years, women characters were limited to being the love interest or another piece of scenery to fill the screen while the male hero caught the crook, saved the day or brought home the

bacon. The women, needless to say, were left to cook the bacon.

In the 1910s, Mary Pickford epitomized the essence of what women were supposed to be, sweet, pure and able to wear millions of curls without toppling over. In reality, Mary helped found, with her husband Douglas Fairbanks, the United Artists company that still is around.

Yet on film, all Mary could do was be a heroine without the heroics. Her husband meanwhile, swashbuckled with all the

trimmings.

If women weren't playing Pickford-type roles, they were playing mothers of heroes, or vamps, which were the sort of female who smoked cigarettes and turned lesser men into fools.

Vamp was short for vampire, implying that women — if not mothers or Pickfordis — would absorb a man's soul and his assets.

Even Rudolph Valentino, who was the Latin version of Clint Eastwood, fell prey to a vamp in "Blood and Sand," but he later returned to

his sweet, pure wife. His character eventually was gored by a bull to pay for his sins.

An exception to the wimpy women rule was Pearl White, who starred in the Perils of Pauline serials. Pauline was kind of a trouble

maker and was in and out of trouble with fair and without special effects.

In the late 1920s, Greta Garbo achieved thrills with just that deep voice and mysterious hauteur. Garbo embodied the other type of women often found in movies. That is, the "I'll do anything for love" woman who

would throw herself under trains or literally die of a broken heart, as Garbo did magnificently in "Camille."

Name me a movie where a man went to such lengths for love. The most men have ever suffered was dangerously falling into the arms of another woman.

The early 1930s was a dry spot for women who either were victims of Bela Lugosi's Dracula or the Brides of Frankenstein. The decade belonged to gangsters and "Little

Born in Boise in 1933, Sorrels spent 14 years as a Utah housewife who ran a hostel for wandering musicians before hitting the road

singing with her five children in tow. That was in the 1960s and she hasn't been home since.

Playing clubs, coffeehouses and universities — all over the U.S., Canada, England and Europe, the storyteller-singer has performed in many major folk music festivals and has taught at the University of Utah and produced festivals there.

"Music is a solitary thing to me, drawn from all the histories I hold in my heart, the pleasures and pains I share with my brothers and sisters on this planet Earth," she says.

Unable to describe her voice, but never at a loss for words, Sorrels says, "I am forever frustrated when I try to pin down my own voice. I

want my songs to be as powerful and useful as Malvina Reynold's songs are. I want my voice to wrench your heart like Billie Holiday's did, or to approach the purity of Bidou Sayou."

"I want to tell stories with music like Piaf did — to catch the very core of life like you would think you'd know me forever by the tone and throb of my song even if you didn't know my language," she says, adding that she wants to celebrate all the unsung lives, one by one, of those who "passed by and disappeared into memories which will fade too. If not celebrated and sung.

# TV doesn't capture novels

**NEW YORK (AP)** — "The Barchester Chronicles," starting Sunday night on public TV's "Masterpiece Theater," is a regrettably uneven adaptation, in a single story, of two 19th-century novels by Anthony Trollope.

was satiric, "The Barchester Chronicles" seems reluctant to exploit that comedic objective. It is not until the third or fourth of seven episodes that the author's biting wit is allowed to flourish.

The 1982 British Broadcasting Corp. production, completed a century after Trollope's death, was drawn from "The Warden" and "Barchester Towers," the first two of six novels set in Barchester, a fictitious cathedral community in the west of England.

Until then, the story relies heavily, sometimes excessively, on the Rev. Septimus Harding's vulnerable goodness for a momentum that is sluggish at best.

Though Trollope's own inclination

Donald Pleasance plays Harding, the honest and gentle warden of Hiram's Hospital, and the series' slow start should not detract from the delightful characterization.

Harding is a man who suffers, his bishop says, from "persistent bouts of Christianity." Rather than challenge John Bold, a successful surgeon and passionate reformer, Harding's limited responsibilities, the meek churchman tends to agree, and resigns.

Harding is defended vehemently by his son-in-law, the Rev. Dr. Granly, archdeacon of Barchester ( Nigel Hawthorne), who sees his own standing in the church threatened, and emotionally by his daughter, Eleanor (Janet Maw), who is in love with Bold (David Gwillim).

Casear" instead of "Big Bertha." When James Cagney put a grapefruit in Mae Clark's face in "The Public Enemy," the act was symbolic that most women in movies were receiving the same fruit in the face because the good roles were going to Paul Muni and Edward G. Robinson.

Portrays of women, however, were becoming more earthy. There were less all-good or all-bad women. The female who most men wouldn't bring home to mother was played with more sympathy, when they weren't playing gun molls that is.

Then there was Mae West. With her hourglass figure and seductive rhetoric, Mae openly invited men to come up and see her sometime without the pretense.

Mae West could be forgiven her manipulative and vampish ways, however, because she wrote most of her own scripts and knew what she wanted both in reality and on film. It is doubtful that even Meryl Streep, wonderful actress that she is, could deliver a line like, "Beulah, peel me a grape."

The rest of the era, like the ones to follow, had bad and good news for women in the movies.

The bad news was the clone-like dancers in those mindless musicals. In "King Kong," Fay Wray was a prop for an ape. Jane was a prop for

Tarzan. She was civilized, but gave it all up for a treehouse.

Jean Harlow, though a talented actress, invented the dumb blonde which has haunted movies throughout the years.

The good news was Katherine Hepburn as the independent Jo in "Little Women," Myrna Loy's sexy and smart Nora in the "Thin Man" movies and Bette Davis. Davis played a variety of strong women who grew out of their own determination.

More bad news — World War II, where women in films were reduced to pin-ups. If they weren't showing their gams, they were playing nuns, such as in "Song of Bernadette" or unstable women such as "The Snake Pit." They weren't playing ordinary women meeting life on its own terms like the males.

Mary Astor was a temptress in "The Maltese Falcon." But Bagey "sent her over" and fixed her wagon for being un ladylike.

In the later 1950s, Marilyn Monroe defined the dumb blonde role, but presented another dimension to the character by adding sensitivity in movies like "The Misfits" and "Bus Stop."

The cultural revolution of the 1960s produced similar effects in movies. Again with exceptions. Elizabeth Taylor was the same old die for love 'female' in "Cleopatra" while Julie Andrews was a Pickford reincarnate

without the curls.

All the females in the James Bond films forsaked their side when kissed by Sean Connery. Though he was terribly virile, it implied women had the backbone of one of his vodka martinis.

The beach party pictures didn't help because Annette could never make up her mind whether she liked Frankie.

Doris Day was the girl next door who had to have marriage by the end of the film.

Jane Fonda and Meryl Streep have followed in Davis' footsteps with their films about complex women. Diane Keaton offered a neurotic version. But even in "Annie Hall," she was spurred to growth by Woody Allen.

The good news is becoming better for women. Even the last bastion of macho film — the science fiction movie that showed women only screaming — made way for a female hero. For example, in "Alien," Sigourney Weaver offered the monster. What is ahead for the 1990s, only the producers know.

The way from defenseless females to real women in the movies has been slow and could have been speeded up by more female producers, directors and screenwriters. But any improvement is good.

After all, it's been a long way from Theda Bara the vamp to Norma Rae the union organizer.

# Tiny writer's work makes big impression

Alberto Alvaro Rios is a writer of poems and short stories who looks as though nature had scaled him in size to be a jockey. That is a first impression.

The next is that he has enough dynamism to animate a frame half a dozen times as big. If he had indeed become a rider of thoroughbreds, any horse to which he communicated even a portion of his abounding vitality would be a horse on which to put money.

Rios is writing about his own people, although his personal background has an odd twist to it. His name is assertively Spanish, but not his appearance.

The eyes behind his glasses are blue, and his hair is brown, shading toward blond. This is because his Mexican father, a medic stationed in England with the U.S. paratroops, met an English nurse who became Rios's mother.

The couple settled in Nogales, Ariz., where Rios grew up speaking Spanish and thinking of himself as a full-fledged Chicano, the identity he now wears as a writer.

In the border town the English half of him got lost, as did his displaced mother. "It wasn't that the others didn't like her," he says, "it was just that they didn't know what to do with her. The older people called her Agnes, so my brother and I called her Agnes."

"Mama" was a lady down the street who acted the way we thought mamas ought to. She would open a box of Jello and let us eat it out of the box. We thought that was great."

Rios is 32 and an assistant professor of English at Arizona State University, but his erudite pep and enthusiasm make him seem like somebody very young to whom something very exciting has happened.

It is a collection of seductively charming short stories about the Chicano people, viewed not as a political minority with problems, but as sharers in the surprises of living.

Often the characters are children. In the title story, for example, a small Mexican boy is delighted—but bewildered by the baseball bat that his grandmother in the United States sends him for Christmas. Identifying the strange object as a weapon for bagging iguanas for the table, he sets forth as a mighty hunter.

came to her at a Commission on the Arts assessment conference in Coeur d'Alene several years ago.

"Nobody took me seriously then," she says.

"All the writers in the room seemed to be after goals and styles that weren't really in touch with Idaho people—at least the ones who work hard every day," she says, adding, "We're trying to keep away from sweet historical sentimentality that many of our neighbors expect when they find out we write."

Reedy says "we're trying to be ourselves in print. These 'selves' are romantic, angry, mystical, imaginative, provincial, sophisticated—very diverse. We like it that way."

She points out that everyone expects people in a farm/ranch community to be alike and to be interested in the same things.

"It isn't that way at all," Reedy says.

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# Movie guide

**ALL OF ME (PG)** One scene of bathroom humor too explicit for children. Full of funny but somewhat to the left of whoopee. Steve Martin plays a lawyer forced to share half his body with a selfish, prudish and very wealthy client (Lily Tomlin). This lighthearted caper only occasionally lives up to the promise of its premise — usually on those occasions when Martin either is yanked about by the lady within or publicly squabbles with his unwanted detail half.

**IRRECONCILABLE DIFFERENCES (PG)** Some adult situations and language. A keen, funny screenplay coupled with uncontrolled directing. Ryan O'Neal and Sally Long are a fine choice as a couple smart enough to find each other and dim enough to throw away what they had. The film's charm is its willingness to be about something, under its fizzy banter. It may wander off, but it is a warm and notable try. With Drew Barrymore.

**THE KARATE KID (PG)** A few strong words; exceptional family entertainment. Irresistible entertainment, beautifully directed by John Avildsen from Robert Mark Kamen's outstanding script about a high school boy (Ralph Macchio) taught not only how to defend himself but also spiritual values, by a whimsical handyman — Noriyuki (Pat Morita) in the role of a lifetime.

**THE LAST STARFIGHTER (PG)** Suitable family fare. A video game becomes a test for a real war in outer space — and the film becomes

another "Star Wars" installment (with borrowing from "Close Encounters"). Not terrible — but terribly derivative. With Lance Guest, Dan O'Herlihy, Robert Preston, Catherine-Mary Stewart.

**THE NEVERENDING STORY (PG)** Family fare. Is splendidous and spellbinding, a story-within-a-story in which a withdrawn young boy reads about the adventures of a young warrior — also 10 years old — and like all passionate readers gets drawn into the tale. But this time literal, drawn into it: The characters on the other side know of him as well, and only a real leap of faith on his part will save them. This features the most exquisite fairy-tale princess a screen has ever beheld, as well as silky flocked Luckdragons, mountainous flocked Bliers and creatures to inhabit young (and older) imaginations for years to come.

**PLACES IN THE HEART (PG)** Some scenes of violence too intense for very young children. Outstanding family fare. A work of love in which

writer-director Robert Benton wants us to understand the character of a small Texas town where he grew up and the character of Americans at a time when their lives were most severely tried — mid-depression 1935. The film is extraordinary, restorative and deeply American, constructed with the intricacy of a fugue. The look of the film and its every technical

detail is magnificent, and Benton's cast (which includes Sally Field, Ed Harris, Lindsay Crouse and John Malkovich) is the cream of young American performers.

**PURPLE RAIN (R)** Sex, nudity, language. Prince works supremely well in this hot, jagged, garish film that uses an old story, works it over with a blowtorch, and succeeds even

beyond its own audacious dreams. The film is at its sharpest not in its writing, overlaid melodrama but when it's funky-funny, and in its evocation of the backstage lives of musicians.

**TEACHERS (R)** Some strong language, some violence; not suitable for the very young. Although marred by

awkward shifts from the comical to the earnest, this film attempts a serious comment on the apathy and mediocrity that grips so many American high schools. Nick Nolte excels as a weary but dedicated teacher. With Jobeth Williams; Judd Hirsch, Ralph Macchio, Allen Garfield, Lee Grant, Richard Mulligan.

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## Primitivism exhibit aimed at thinkers

**NEW YORK** — This fall the thinking man's blockbuster exhibition is "Primitivism in 20th Century Art," at the Museum of Modern Art to Jan. 15. Its theme will be familiar to anyone with an even rudimentary knowledge of modernism, to wit: From the earliest pioneer painters to present practitioners of ritual performance and video, the avant-garde is laced with the aura and influence of tribal aesthetics.

A face in Picasso's "Les Femmes d'Alger" looks like an African carving. Jackson Pollock admitted that American Indian sand painting hovered in his mind as he executed his gaudy abstractions. Robert Rauschenberg's "Spiral Jetty" can really only be seen from the air, like the giant earth drawings of ancient Peruvian tribes.

Fine. Sure. We know that. Why make a monumental fuss over a giant cliché? Well, apparently the relationship is so obvious it has simply been taken for granted and thus overlooked.

"Dear, there is a dinosaur in the living room."  
 "I know. It's always been there. Ignore it."

According to MOMA's William Rubin, who organized the exhibition with Professor Kirk Varnedoe of New York University, there are but two books on the subject and virtually no substantial exhibition except one held in Munich, West Germany during the 1972 Olympic Games.

Obviously out with a vengeance to correct the record, the curators amassed 150 modern works and blended them with 200 tribal objects to trace the phenomenon as well as its history, beginning with Gauguin through concepts, direct influences, coincidental affinities, creative misinterpretations, ripples and eddies.

Hands down, the most riveting displays are side-by-side comparisons of tribal and modern objects. Here is Max Ernst's 1934 "Bird-Head," a square of bronze bearing a humanoid face standing on little "legs" sprouting an avian head from its brow. Next to it hangs an African mask from the Tuszian of Upper Volta. Same forehead, face and bird but rendered in wood and fiber. Surely the German Surrealist "plundered the African treasure."

Wrong. These juxtapositions are like exercises in brilliant wit. We have to be careful not to mistake style for substance. Ernst, although unabashedly interested in tribal art, never saw the Tuszian mask. Rubin says that such striking coincidences represent "affinity" between modern sensibility and ethnic aesthetics. The correspondence developed, he says, when European artists switched from a "perceptual" way of looking at the world as they had done since the Renaissance to a "conceptual" mode that parallels tribal art with its inventive formal uses of line, plane and volume.

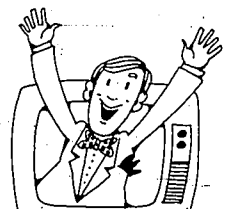
If that rings as a bit of intellectual obtusation, there is a simpler way to put it that is borne out by experience. Many artists in the act of making sculpture and painting find that the unfinished work seems to pass through stages that resemble the unfolding of art history.

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# Real movie theaters: passing into oblivion?

**HOLLYWOOD** — I see movies all the time — it's one of the nicer aspects of my job as a film reporter. But the other night, I went to the movies.

What I mean is, I went to a real movie theater. This was unusual, because I'm part of the group that usually doesn't have to pay to see movies, one of those people who are invited to private screenings of films before they arrive in theaters.

What struck me in my visit to Plitt's Century Plaza Theater in Century City was how much movie theaters had changed — much more than the movies they're showing.

What kind of changes? Well, there were videocassettes on sale in the lobby, and previews advertising them right up there on the screen. If I had wanted to, I could have entered a separate roped-off area and quaffed a beer. For \$2, I could have even bought a genuine collector's item, a reserved ticket to the aborted premiere of "Heaven's Gate" in November 1980.

This was certainly not the Shaker Theater in Cleveland, where I last made it a regular practice to attend a movie theater on a weekly basis, and where the biggest innovation was a weekly bicycle raffle.

For the millions of people who made this summer a kind of box-office heaven for the movie studios, paying between \$4 and \$5.50 for the privilege of going into a theater is no big deal.

The alternative to screenings would seem vastly preferable, I'm sure. This common practice in the film business means that virtually every evening offers a different movie for the industry's (and the film press') perusal.

In recent weeks, for instance, I had my choice of "Give My Regards to Broad Street," "American Dreamer" and "The Razor's Edge," all screened in advance of their theatrical premieres.

One drawback to industry screenings is the sometimes cynical attitude that prevails. Applause (except for the screen credits of people whose friends are in the audience) is rare, and hissing at particularly lame dialogue or situations is common.

I even know one prominent studio executive who won't see most of his own studio's pictures. "I prefer to keep my enthusiasm intact," he said dryly of his non-appearances.

I don't have to attend screenings, either. I could just stroll down to my neighborhood movie house and experience movies with the people for whom they are intended: the paying audience.

The big problem, of course, is that there are very few neighborhood movie houses left, and certainly none in my neighborhood.

The Century City area of Los Angeles is a familiar place only to the lawyers and secretaries who work there. Nearby Westwood doesn't qualify as much of a residential neighborhood, either. Most movie theaters today are actually lots of little theaters squashed together as part of, or in close proximity to, shopping centers and malls. Nobody lives in those places — people go there.

So, if I'm going to go somewhere to really see a movie, it might as well be the Century Plaza, which has big, comfortable seats, a good sound system, and back and forth, nice-sized containers of popcorn and soft drinks, and ushers who still dress in uniforms.

But what, I keep wondering, is a movie theater doing advertising and selling the competition?

Doesn't anyone realize that if a theater owner surrenders in selling a teen-ager a copy of Michael Jackson's "The Making of Thriller" for \$39.95, chances are he or she is going to stay home one night and watch it, instead of going to the movies?

I don't know how much disposable income teen-agers have, but I figure that every \$40 spent on a cassette means that eight fewer movie seats will be filled.

And since when did beer and wine go on sale in theaters? Plays and sporting events, yes, but what good is a drink that can't take back in the theater with you, and knock over so it runs downhill on the sloping floor? What purpose does a floor in a movie theater serve if not to be slicky?

To get some serious answers to these frivolous questions, I went to Ed Plitt, vice president in charge of Plitt Theaters' western division.

"We try to offer the public entertainment, and something they can't get in other theaters," Plitt explained. He sounded patient, as if he were explaining something to an uncomprehending child. "Anytime you can come up with something new and innovative, you're ahead in the game."

The videocassettes are an innovation, having just gone on sale in the last few weeks. "They're not doing so well, to be honest," Plitt said honestly. "But you never know until you try it."

I'll probably keep going to screenings, but I'm going to push myself to visit theaters more often, too.

After all, where else could I buy such things as a "Heaven's Gate" ticket, an heirloom I can pass on to my son, which he in turn can



bequeath to his children. It will remind them that there used to be places called movie theaters, before they sold themselves into oblivion.

It now connects backstage, orchestra pit and the lighting booths in the balcony. The group is in the midst of "digging out" the basement beneath the stage. Originally, it contained four cramped dressing rooms. The plans are for a multi-purpose area, which will have new dressing rooms, restrooms and more adequate storage — a place for the cast and crew to when not on stage and a meeting place for the board.

"This is our current project," says Severe. "We're hoping the rock foundation goes all the way around." Much is finished, and much is to be done, he continues, to combine the old and the new and retain the 60-year-old flavor.

The floor in the entryway was laid in Oakley stone by Kent Hale, who conducts the annual tour of homes and is an officer of "Historic Oakley," Severe says.

The newly-installed chandeliers gleam with graceful, antique-brass arms and lusty-glass shades, which carry out the etched motif.

Severe smiles. Actually, I guess you'd say they have the "old-time, modern-classic look," he says.

The snack bar supercedes three rows of back seats, and its plate glass front and shelving were salvaged from the tower's old post office.

Severe points to a few, hardly noticeable nicks and scratches. He estimates the glass is "probably 50 years old."

The cathedral ceiling of the auditorium has been painted a deep maroon to accentuate the detail of the relief design.

"It was some experience — painting that," Severe says. "I did the whole ceiling myself," and when doing the part over the orchestra pit, "we used five sections of scaffolding with a six-foot extension on the spray-paint gun."

When the kids asked how I did it, I told them I just hung a rope in the middle and "swung back and forth," he laughs.

The new upholstery, in keeping with the decor, is also maroon.

"We'll keep the actual seats," he explains. "They're sort of antique."

The four 20-globe chandeliers, hanging from the lowering ceiling, can be raised and lowered by pulley for repair and cleaning.

From the stage, with its newly carpeted ramp, Severe looks into the orchestra pit.

"We put together a group when it's time," he says, adding, "it seems to me we had 20 players in that little pit. Because of the arrangement — the stage apron, extensions and ramp — forming a continuous performing area, a production can be performed with few curtain calls.

The heavy gilt-edged velvet curtain, from the era of the '20s, will have

to be replaced because it's beyond repair, Severe says.

"The original," he adds, "rolled up from the balcony and had the names of the local merchants on it."

The setting echoes of vaudeville and "You Picked Me When I Picked You In Berry-Pickett Time."

Severe has an assortment of old sheet music "among his souvenirs," and he shows a 1914 commencement program and a large, one-cent Baby Ruth wrapper found when the floor was reinforced.

The old-time mood is carried through with the stage set, still in place, from a show recently put on by the Blackfoot Community Players — "The Curse of the Troubled Heart, or Trapped in the Spider's Web."

Severe says others also use the Opera House. The elementary and junior high and high school use it for their productions. Movies are shown during the week by old carbon-arc projectors and, most recently, "Snoopy" was presented, under the direction of Martha Mead of Twin Falls.

There is one major production put on by the Oakley Valley Arts Council each March — a musical.

"Last year it was 'The Sound of Music,'" and the choice for this year is still to be announced. We'd like to do a drama in the fall," Severe adds, "but haven't been able to get the thing to sell."

Severe lends the orchestra. "I started out doing the whole thing with a little help," he says, but now everyone takes part. Carla Cranney creates the choreography, and there are a number of talented directors, he adds.

The auditorium seats 300 at present, but the group is deep into plans for the tower's old park — the parking area needs to be landscaped — the old pit is to be replaced with one that raises and lowers, and footlights on stage will be replaced by lights around the balconies.

"Anyway," he smiles, "that's our dream."

Severe points and gestures as he explains the future plans of the arts council.

It will have fans, true to the era, on the high ceiling to circulate the air — old railings will continue to be replaced with solid oak — the parking area needs to be landscaped — the old pit is to be replaced with one that raises and lowers, and footlights on stage will be replaced by lights around the balconies.

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# Lemmon has 'Mass Appeal'

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Seated behind a large desk in his Jalem Productions office, Jack Lemmon lighted a small cheroot and apologized for "wearing makeup to an interview."

"It just came back from taping a commercial against Proposition 39 and I haven't had time to wash my face," he explained, referring to a Republican-sponsored initiative on the California ballot. "Imagine putting all that political power into the hands of five judges!"

The man talking was Jack Lemmon, Democrat and concerned citizen. Other aspects of the Lemmon persona include husband, father, golfer, film director and — oh, yes — actor.

His film appearances in recent years have been sparse, partly by his own choosing, partly because of the nature of today's film business. Hollywood no longer makes anticomedies like "Some Like It Hot!" and social comedies like "The Apartment."

So Lemmon waits for films on themes that interest him, such as the dangers of nuclear power ("The China Syndrome") and American intervention in Central America ("Missing").

Lemmon's first film in two years is "Mass Appeal," which will open in New York and Los Angeles this year, nationally in February, when Universal Pictures hopes to be able to advertise Academy nominations.

It's likely that Lemmon will already be in the Oscar running the already he has two supporting actor, 1955, "Mister Roberts," actor, 1973, "Save the Tiger" in "Mass Appeal," he plays a parish priest who is content with his popularity until his values are challenged by an idealistic young candidate for the priesthood.

"The movie is not about religion,"

Lemmon emphasized. "It's about values."

Lemmon tells a good story, and he enjoys reciting how "Mass Appeal" managed to get made.

The Broadway play had been bought for \$750,000 by CBS Films, which had been unable to put together a film deal. Producers Lawrence Turman and David Foster took an option on the property and Lemmon became an eager participant.

"But we couldn't get any interest from the studios," said the actor. "They put everything into an IBM computer and the answer is 'no priests, no rabbis, forget it.'"

The deadline was concerning, his was not a violent end. When you understand this lifetime of hard action and his love affair with guns, this was a totally appropriate action. Using sleeping pills would have been out of character for him."
