## U.S. marks 209th Celebrations cross nation

Revelers celebrated America's 209th birthday Thursday with outdoor Independence Day parties from the Washington Monument to a rain-soaked Texas hoe-down to the beaches of Under-dry California.

The nation also revelled in having the 39 hostages of TWA Flight 847 at home, and for many of them the Fourth of July was a day for homespun pursuits — town parades, backyard picnics and quiet times with family.

But in California, winds whipped brush fires over tens of thousands of acres, prompting officials to postpone some fireworks displays and to urge that Independence Day celebrations feature only professional fireworks.

Crowds gathered early at the Mall between the Washington Monument and the Capitol in Washington, D.C., with 200,000 people flocking to the area by afternoon for a concert featuring performers ranging from Mr. T to Leonard Bernstein.

President Reagan's message to the nation asked citizens to "pray for God's blessing and his help in safeguarding the precious legacy of the Declaration of Independence."

Rock concert enthusiasts began camping out on the Mall on Wednesday, staking out good spots for the musical bill of fare that included the Beach Boys, who have been a fixture at Washington's Independence Day fetes in recent years, along with Joe Ely, Jimmy Page, the Four Tops, the Oak Ridge Boys and Christopher Cross.

The Beach Boys performed earlier for a crowd of about 1 million people in Philadelphia, where the Declaration of Independence was signed on July 4, 1776. "It's pretty cool and awesome," said Bob Widman, 11, watching the dancing crowd that stretched for seven blocks from the Philadelphia Art Museum to Logan Circle. "I've never been to anything so big."

About 250,000 fans packed the banks of the Charles River near Boston's Esplanade for a Boston Pops concert to be capped by Tchaikovsky's "1812 Overture," punctuated with church bells and cannon, followed by fireworks.

The USS Constitution, the U.S. Navy's oldest commissioned warship, left its Boston harbor berth for its annual "Circumnavigation Cruise," which included a 21-gun salute. Among the 400 guests aboard were Secretary of the Navy John F. Lehman Jr. and former CBS-TV news anchorman Walter Cronkite.

It rained on Willie Nelson's picnic at an outdoor Austin, Texas, amphitheater, where one-half inch of rain fell Thursday, sending cars and people sliding around in the muck.

Miss America Sharelene Wells led a parade through Provo, Utah, where 200,000 spectators lined the streets.

For Cesar Bohadillo, 22, born in Guatemala, the day had "a special feeling of independence." He was one of 501 new U.S. citizens who were sworn at Seattle in a special Fourth of July ceremony.

## Celebrating with a bang Fireworks shine in Twin Falls skies

In terms of lighting up the sky, the almost-full moon finished a distant second Thursday night.

The pale white moonshine was simply no match for the greens, blues, violets, pinks, oranges and reds that painted the night sky over Twin Falls.

The Twin Falls fireworks show, sponsored for the second year by Idaho Frozen Foods, paid tribute Thursday night to America's Independence Day with a loud and showy salute over the College of Southern Idaho.

And the large number of people who braved the crowds and traffic jams to see the

display were entertained, amazed, and in the end, enthusiastic about the show.

Although it only lasted about 45 minutes, the display, with its aerial bombs, spreading pinwheels, shooting rockets and loud noises, produced more than enough "ooh's" and "ah's" to last until the Fourth of July, 1986.

The finale was particularly spectacular, with about 20 shells representing all the colors in the rainbow and numerous shapes and sizes lighting up the night sky in a kaleidoscope of color and noise.

Even the exit after the show was relatively pleasurable — at least more so than last year, when cars were trapped in traffic for an hour in some instances.

## Yankee Fork blaze rages uncontrolled

A blaze raging in central Idaho's Challis National Forest jumped fire lines Thursday and swept across 1,200 additional acres of timberland. U.S. Forest Service spokesman said.

Jim James said the fire, aided by low humidity, high temperatures and erratic winds, jumped the areas of cleared ground during the early morning darkness, thwarting weary firefighters' hope of containing the blaze.

"It's one of those things. Mother Nature just seems to do what she wants to," he said. "I guess it's just who's got the most stamina, man or nature, as to who's going to win this thing."

James said he expected officials to postpone the projected containment deadline of Saturday night.

Meanwhile, a lightning-sparked fire in the Williams Lake area of the Salmon National Forest also burst past firefighters, blackening at least 300 more acres on Thursday, to reach a total of more than 1,130, officials said.

Salmon spokesman Al Wood said firefighters had abandoned hopes of containing the fire by 6 p.m. Thursday and were working toward a new goal of 8 p.m. Friday.

"They're working on it now, closing the line up. I don't know if they'll market, though," Wood said.

Gusty winds later Thursday afternoon helped flames leap across another control line on the north side of the blaze, he said. There was no immediate estimate of additional acreage burned.

More than 1,200 firefighters were battling the two fires, which have

destroyed some 4,100 acres of timber in the two forests since Sunday, spokesmen said.

Earlier Thursday, James had said the Challis fire had not expanded during the night. But he said that when he said that, he had not received the latest reports. By Thursday evening, the man-caused blaze was reported to have blackened some 3,000 acres.

"It burned actively all night and most of the morning here," he said. "It jumped a lot of lines into new territory."

Despite the fire's surge, several summer cabins along Rankin Creek and the southern portion of the Yankee Fork drainage remained unharmed. Residents were evacuated from the cabins Wednesday as the fire moved near.

"As of now they're still holding the line on those private property holdings," said James.

James said firefighters had deployed water-dropping helicopters, tanker airplanes loaded with chemical fire retardant, bulldozers and pumper trucks to battle the blaze.

Winds up to 30 mph Thursday afternoon sent heavy smoke from the fire rolling into the town of Challis, about 25 miles to the northeast, spokesman Gordon Reid said. Smoke also was making it difficult for fire bosses to accurately estimate the extent of the blaze.

The weather seemed to be conspiring against tired crews, with wind temperatures near 100 degrees and virtually no moisture in the air leaving the prospects bleak for quick containment, Reid said.

"It doesn't look good for the next two days," he said.

## Uncontrolled fires blacken 10 states

Forest and range fires, many man-made, raged out of control over tens of thousands of acres in 10 Western states Thursday as the hot Fourth of July brought a new wave of fireworks-sparked blazes to tinder-dry land.

The largest fire — 58,000 acres — crept into California's coastal Santa Barbara County from neighboring Ojai.

Firefighters from as far away as Michigan and Arkansas were being flown in to handle the blaze, which has cost more than \$1 million to fight and forced the evacuation of up to 5,000 people since it began Monday.

But the worst damage was done by the earlier-sparked arson blaze in Southern California that destroyed 126 homes. One of them killed three people, including an unidentified woman found dead in a bathtub late Wednesday, and burned 65 homes in the Baldwin Hills area of Los Angeles on Tuesday.

Thousands of firefighters battled blazes Thursday across Arizona, New Mexico, California, Idaho, Montana, Nebraska, Nevada, Oregon, Washington and Wyoming.

In Montana, a forestry official said the fire danger was close to the highest on record. Los Angeles had three straight days of record high temperatures surpassing 100 degrees.

And in Nebraska, smoke from a fire was visible 30 miles away.

California officials asked people to attend professional fireworks displays and to turn in anyone using fireworks recklessly.

The Bureau of Fire Department canceled Thursday's Starlight Bowl fireworks show because of 100-degree temperatures, low humidity and high wind.

The 58,000-acre fire in the Los Padres National Forest, was 45 percent contained but was licking the outskirts of Carpinteria, a beach town 12 miles east of Santa Barbara.

"We don't expect to corral it until it's burned 125,000 acres," said Chuck Shipp, a U.S. Forest Service public information officer.

South of that fire, two blazes converged on Santa Paula, a city of 20,000 people — a 350-acre blaze at Black Mountain-southeast of the city and a 25-acre fire to the north, said Dana DeLiana of the Ventura County Fire Department. A few scattered ranches were evacuated in the hilly area and part of Highway 150 was closed, she said.

In San Diego County, Marines and the California Department of Fire

## Former hostages savor Independence Day quietly at home

For the former hostages of TWA Flight 847, the Fourth of July was a day for quiet cookouts with family and friends, a Mass celebrated at a hometown church and a well-tossed baseball to open the Chicago Cubs game. It was a day to savor independence.

"Independence day has a whole new meaning," said Robert Peel Jr., 33, of Hutchinson, Kan., who was released Sunday. Thursday was set aside for the traditional picnic with family and friends.

Many of the 39 men held hostage for 17 days after the hijacking of the jumbo jet to Beirut,

Lebanon, said they just wanted to get back to normal life.

Pilot John L. Testrake, whose cool but emphatic voice was heard on broadcasts at the beginning of the siege, celebrated his liberation by getting a haircut. He had wanted one after feeling "like a woolly bear" in captivity. His son, John, said the family would spend a quiet day after his father's hero's welcome on Wednesday.

"Of course we're recognizing Independence Day and all that, but we're not throwing any wadding," the pilot's son said.

The youngest of the hostages, James W. Hoskins, 22, of Indianapolis, said he wanted to

drive around his hometown to see the welcoming signs and yellow ribbons hung on his behalf.

"It's just amazing. I'm going to jump in the car ... and take off and take a look at everything," Hoskins said. "It chokes me up when I think about it."

More than 500 people gathered at St. Patrick's Church in St. Charles, Ill., to hear the Rev. Thomas Dempsey, 49, celebrate his first Mass since he was taken hostage June 14. The Mass, which included Dempsey's first sermon since the hijacking, was followed by a motorcade through St. Charles, a city of about 17,000 people 40 miles west of Chicago.

"It is fitting that we are meeting in Lincoln Park on July Fourth to celebrate the most precious gift we can have, the priceless gift of freedom," Dempsey said in a 10-minute sermon that was interrupted repeatedly by applause.

George Lazansky, 53, of Algonquin, Ill., spent the holiday along with thousands of other baseball fans — at Wrigley Field, home of his favorite team, the Chicago Cubs.

Because the hijackers took his Cubs cap, the Cubs organization asked him to throw out the first ball at the Cubs' game against the San Francisco Giants; and Lazansky accepted. The Cubs also gave Lazansky a new cap and

gave his family 16 box seat tickets for the game. The Giants were at Wrigley.

After receiving a standing ovation from the capacity crowd, Lazansky said he wanted to "deepest thanks to those people in the United States who prayed for our return."

"There are still seven Americans there being held against their will," Lazansky said. "Please continue to pray for them as you have for us."

Ken and Lorraine Anderson of Fox River Grove, Ill., planned a cookout with family, Kurt Carlson, 38, of Rockford, Ill., was geared up to watch that river city's Independence

**Stores sell all watermelons**  
 LOS ANGELES (AP) — State officials ordered all watermelons off store shelves Thursday after more than 30 people fell ill in California and Oregon and traces of a pesticide were found in some watermelons.  
 Fifteen to 17 people became ill after eating striped watermelons in the Portland, Ore., area, and another 17 illnesses were reported in California by people eating green watermelons, health officials said.  
 The illness, which induced symptoms including nausea, vomiting, diarrhea and muscle twitches, was not considered life-threatening, and was contained with exposure to some pesticides, said Dr. Larry Foster of the Oregon Health Division.

**Traore seizes power in Guinea**  
 ABIDJAN, Ivory Coast (AP) — A former prime minister, Col. Diarra Traore, seized power in the West African country of Guinea late Thursday, according to a radio broadcast monitored in neighboring Ivory Coast.  
 Radio Conakry, reporting from the capital of Guinea, said Traore had ousted the government of Lansana Conté.  
 Conté seized power in a coup last year shortly after the death of long-time Guinea ruler Ahmed Sekou Toure.  
 Conakry Radio broadcast a brief message from Traore saying he had taken power. It made no mention of any fighting and gave no other details.

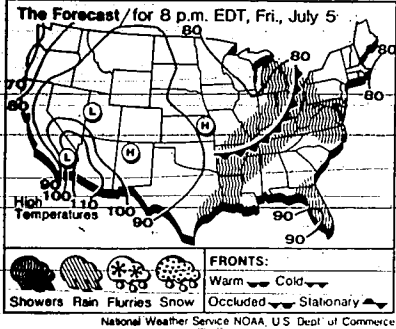
**Explosion caused jet to crash**  
 NEW DELHI, India (AP) — News agencies reported Thursday that Indian investigators believe an explosion in the cargo container caused an Air-India jet to crash into the Atlantic last month, killing 353 people.  
 Meanwhile, in London, the British company that owns a submersible robot said it had "almost certainly" located the wreckage of the lost Air-India jet 100 miles southwest of Ireland.  
 The Press Trust of India and the United News of India, two private news agencies, both reported that the jet was downed by an explosion. Their reports appeared one day after a government team returned from Ireland after investigating the June 23 crash.

**Agca claims he lied about plot**  
 ROME (AP) — Mehmet Ali Agca, who is serving a life sentence for the 1981 shooting of Pope John Paul II, testified Thursday that he lied to investigators about details of an alleged conspiracy to kill the pontiff.  
 The state's case against four Turks and three Bulgarians on charges of complicity in the papal shooting is primarily based on Agca's statements to investigators.  
 Agca said Thursday he lied to interrogators during the pre-trial investigation in 1982 when he said he met Sergel Ivanov Anonov at the Bulgarian's Rome apartment.

Albion's celebration included an old-fashioned melodrama produced and performed by local players, a parade, entertainment by the Albion Community Chorus, and a street dance.  
 Other popular forms of Independence Day entertainment among communities throughout the Magic Valley included community barbecues and traditional competitions, like sack races in the city park.  
 And of course, the traditional fireworks displays lit up the skies and bid farewell to another Fourth of July, with shows held in Gooding, Bliss, Wendell, Shoshone, and Glemys Ferry.

 Forestry fought a blaze near Camp Pendleton that destroyed two homes and avocado orchards. The blaze was near a Navy munitions dump, but did not threaten it, said Marine Capt. Jerry Brockert, state forestry spokeswoman. Army Southworth said 8,400 acres were charred by the blaze, not 15,000 as indicated earlier by state officials.  
 Numerous other fires burned across California, including a 1,600-acre blaze in Yosemite National park that was about three-fourths contained Thursday, park dispatch center Darlene Hales said. It started Sunday with an unattended campfire.  
 Elsewhere, weary firefighters from dozens of Nebraska towns fought fires that have covered 30,000 acres, 200 acres of grassland, crops and forests in northwest and north-central part of the state since Wednesday, authorities said. They apparently were started by lightning. One fire, in the Pine Ridge area of northwest Nebraska, had covered 30,000 acres; in Dawes County, smoke from a fire in pine forests was visible 30 miles away.  
 A range fire set by fireworks in south-central Washington was reported under control Thursday after having burned an estimated 32,000 acres of grassland and at least three dwellings near Goldendale.  
 Near Casper, Wyo., two fires burned out of control Thursday on Casper Mountain, threatening a bald eagle habitat and prompting authorities to restrict travel in the area. Roughly 800 acres of lodgepole pine had been charred by the fires. Several homeowners were advised to leave.  
 In Montana, Helena National Forest fire management officer said that by Friday the fire danger would be the worst on record in the forest, according to a scale that measures such things as temperature, wind and soil moisture. Two fires had burned around 2,000 acres in remote areas, and nearly 600 firefighters were aided by two strings of pack mules, along with the usual bulldozers and shovels.  
 Firefighters had extinguished all but a few hot spots of an 8,200-acre fire that had been burning southwest of Tucson, Ariz., in the Baboquivari Mountains since last week, a state official said. Fire information officer Bob Celaya said it was believed caused by people.

 Five "Navy men" held hostage aboard the jet had a picnic in Norfolk, Va., with other members of their underwater construction unit and their families.  
 Former hostage Richard Herzberg spent the day in New York City with his wife, Sue Ellen, said his mother, Norma Herzberg of Norfolk.  
 "They're just going to have a good time and see the town-for-the-day," Mrs. Herzberg said.  
 "It's a happy day all around," she said. "Thank God we're Americans. I'd like to get out and wave the flag... My heart aches for the parents of the ones who are still there (held hostage in Lebanon) today."

# Moon released from prison

NEW YORK (AP) — The Rev. Sun Myung Moon, founder of the Unification Church, was released to a halfway house program Thursday after serving 11 months of his 18-month federal prison sentence for tax evasion.

Moon, 65, whose imprisonment was assailed by some religious leaders, will fulfill his church duties by day but must report each night until mid-August to the Oxford Project halfway house in the borough of Brooklyn, officials said.

The Korean, industrialist and evangelist spent Thursday at his estate in Irvington, N.Y., providing "religious reflections" to his wife, his 12 children and church leaders, said Joy Garratt, a spokeswoman.

Moon was imprisoned at the medical

security camp of the Federal Correctional Institution in Danbury, Conn., in July 1984 after exhausting appeals of his 1982 tax evasion conviction. He did not speak to reporters outside the prison when he was released at 8 a.m.

"He seemed pleased" to be free, said prison spokesman Jeff Garbow. "His family seemed pleased."

Mose Durst, president of the Unification Church, said at a news conference that the prison sentence was "an offering to God" and that Moon had "washed floors and served joyfully."

Moon spent his term assigned to the prison kitchen, and also did duty cleaning toilets. He won awards for the cleanliness of his cell, Durst said.

Moon was sentenced to 18 months

for failing to report \$162,000 in income on his federal tax returns, but received time off for good behavior. He has maintained his innocence, arguing the money was church money and accusing the government of religious persecution.

The U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear his case in May 1984, and Moon was jailed on July 20. His imprisonment prompted outcry from an interdenominational group called the Coalition for Religious Freedom.

Several ministers from the group joined Durst on Thursday, including its president, Don Sills, of Washington, D.C. "Today there are over 8,000 cases of litigation against the church, and Reverend Moon's case is one of them," Sills said. "We've come together to protest what is taking place."

# Spelunker jokes about cave ordeal

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP) — A spelunker who was trapped for 54 hours perched on a four-inch ledge in a dark, flooded cave before rescuers arrived joked Thursday that "part of my suntan was scraped off."

Roman Lazowski, 24, of Gary, who was rescued Wednesday night, said he was awake the entire time and that survival training he took as a Marine helped him mentally.

Lazowski said he played mind games to keep his spirits up. "I did in-depth analysis of the New York and Indiana basketball draft picks," Lazowski

joked.

The Indiana University student was listed in-fair-condition Thursday at Bloomington Hospital, where he was being treated for hypothermia — low body temperature — and multiple bruises and cuts. He wore only swimming trunks and tennis shoes during his ordeal.

Lazowski was trapped Monday in Donitson Cave at Spring Mill State Park by rapidly rising waters and searchers were unable to determine if he was alive until they heard him Wednesday morning. Rescuers spoke

with him for 10 hours but they said rapid currents made it too risky to reach him until Wednesday night.

He and a friend, Michael Hall, 25, entered the cave Monday morning to explore it, although it is not open to the public except for guided tours.

Hall, who was swept out of the cave Monday afternoon by a current of water, was taken to Dunn Memorial Hospital with bruises and cuts. He was released Wednesday and was with Lazowski as he held a news conference in his hospital room.

# Cheese probe flawed by staff delay

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Two outside medical consultants say the county's response to an outbreak of disease linked to contaminated Mexican-style cheese was "flawed by delays and bureaucratic timidity."

For example, they found that staff workers investigating the rare outbreak were reluctant to notify upper management because of worries that the premature release of information would lead to news media misstatements.

"I believe it is not appropriate to let such a concern preclude timely and

complete disclosure to management, particularly since withholding of such information inhibits the decision-making process as to resource allocations and external communications," said Robert C. Gates, the county's Health Services director.

The two epidemiologists who conducted the audit were Dr. Walter F. Schlemmer, an assistant professor of microbiology, and preventive medicine at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia, and Dr. Alexander D. Langmuir, a consultant to the World Health Organization and

various health departments.

But their review said that the Health Services Department's acute communicable disease unit followed sound procedures in tracking down the contaminated cheese as the likely cause of the outbreak.

The audit was requested by the Board of Supervisors, who voiced concern that too much time elapsed after health officials detected the listeriosis outbreak before they had linked the source of the bacteria to cheeses made by Jalisco Mexican Products Inc. of Artesia.

# Officials relax prisoner rules in time for 4th

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Inmates at two prisons got privileges restored Thursday in time for July Fourth barbecues and picnics as state officials relaxed the rule on new uniforms that sparked two days of violence.

But convicts at the two prisons hit hardest by the rioting spent Independence Day locked in cells as the cleanup began.

The annual picnicking and festivities were allowed at the Morgan County and Bledsoe regional correctional facilities in an effort to bring prison schedules back to normal for the inmates, said John Parish, a spokesman for Gov. Lamar Alexander.

"It wasn't exactly taking away privileges as punishment. But the restoring of privileges was more of an impediment to restore order," he said.

# Whites deny charge of activist slayings

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The white government on Thursday rejected accusations of involvement in the slayings of black activists last week, which an anti-apartheid group called political assassinations.

Police headquarters also reported eight more deaths in continuing black unrest, including five blacks shot dead while allegedly attacking the homes of black policemen.

Leaders of the United Democratic Front, the nation's largest anti-

apartheid movement, told a news conference Thursday they believed pro-government death squads killed Matthew Goniwe and three other blacks from the town of Cradock, 150 miles north of Port Elizabeth.

The four stabbed and burned bodies were found near Goniwe's burned-out car after the men disappeared last Thursday.

Goniwe, a 38-year-old teacher, was in the forefront of a confrontation between blacks and the government in Cradock last year.

# Bishop says he will shun the Vatican

PEKING (AP) — Roman Catholic Bishop Ignatius "King" of Shanghai, paroled from prison after serving 30 years for treason, has promised he will have no contacts with the Vatican, a Chinese official said Thursday.

The 83-year-old prelate, arrested in 1955 and replaced in 1960 by a state-approved bishop of China's Patriotic Catholic Church, is in good health and is living at the bishop's residence in Shanghai, officials said.

Roman Catholicism is now banned in China.

According to Amnesty International, the London-based human rights organization, King spent many years in solitary confinement and served time in Shanghai's main prison and at a labor camp in Anhui province.

# Smokers charge cigarette factory

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Thousands of smokers nearly broke down the gates of the nation's only cigarette factory Thursday, seeking relief when it resumed production after a 13-day shutdown prompted by government price controls.

However, cigarette dealers who still are on strike because the government has refused an increase in their commission, were there to prevent the cigarettes from getting out.

Flatflights broke out between the dealers and factory workers who tried to bring out supplies. Police stepped in to break them up.

### Smith, Munroe lead our legislator picks

The selection Tuesday of candidates to replace state Rep. Lawrence Knigge, who has resigned, highlights the role of the precinct-committee person, an elected post few of us know much about. There are some 42 in Twin Falls County, elected by precinct and party during the primary elections.

Tuesday evening, those officials will pick three candidates from which Gov. John Evans will select a replacement for Knigge, a five-term representative from Filer who ran unopposed in 1984. This time, at least six candidates have announced.

Although the election is confined to the precinct committee persons, you can still have a say in the process by calling the county clerk to learn your precinct committee person, then expressing your preference to that person directly.

Now to the candidates. Knigge earned a reputation as a progressive member of the Twin Falls delegation, particularly on education issues. We think his successor should have a similar bent.

With that in mind, our two top choices are either attorney and former magistrate judge Paul T. Smith or Buhl automobile dealer David Munroe.

Smith was our choice last year in his primary challenge of incumbent Noy Brackett. Although he lost, Smith ran a vigorous campaign and took thoughtful, intelligent positions on the issues affecting the valley. In our view, he would be a superior legislator.

Munroe has been active in civic affairs for years and presently serves on the Board of the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. Like Smith, he has been an outspoken advocate for quality education in Idaho.

None of the other four candidates, in our view, have the breadth of these two, although each would bring a particular perspective to the job. But for the third spot, we like either Douglas Jones, Filer, or Allen Cummins, Murtaugh.

Jones is energetic and affable, and would be particularly knowledgeable on farming issues, in which he is actively engaged.

Cummins is chairman of the Murtaugh School Board and active in civic affairs in that community.

Another candidate is Cella Folklinga, Buhl, who has taken on various party and campaign titles, but in our view, would be too conservative on key issues.

The sixth candidate is Lee Barnes, a dentist who was active in the consumer issue a couple of years ago to allow denturists to make false teeth.

Our choices are for Smith and Munroe, and in the number three spot, either Cummins or Jones. But whatever your preferences, find out who your committee person is and express them.

### Soviets also face the risks of terrorism

As Americans were preoccupied with the TWA hostage crisis, there were, behind the fast-paced news from Beirut, lingering questions about the Soviets: Were they involved? How would they react if an Aeroflot plane were targeted?

Intelligence experts see no evidence of direct Soviet participation in either the planning or the execution of the actual hijacking. The last proved instances of KGB murder plots go back three decades, and the targets were Soviet political exiles rather than foreigners.

Yet, even if Moscow did not mastermind the TWA disaster, it is hardly in a position to claim complete innocence. The Politburo has never shied away from supporting terrorist nations and groups such as Libya and the Palestine Liberation Organization.

While there is no proof of Soviet links to the radical Hezbollah, whose members are thought to have initiated the hijacking, the Soviet Union's firm support of Amal and its Syrian sponsors is on the record.

Without the Soviet Union's patronage of Dornaus, Nabih Berri's Amal would not have become a state within the state of Lebanon. If Berri and his associates are flying high today, the Soviet Union cannot deny responsibility.

The Soviet media did not condone the air piracy in Beirut, but, as in the hostage nightmare in Tehran, the principal propaganda fire was directed against alleged U.S. plans of massive retaliation.

The Soviet Union, like the United States, is no stranger to hijacking and terrorism. There was an attempt by a disgruntled military officer to assassinate Leonid I. Brezhnev. An explosion in the Moscow subway resulted in the deaths of several passengers. And there was the celebrated airliner hijacking in Thiblis, the capital of Soviet Georgia, one and a half years ago, when a group of

alienated intellectuals from prominent families attempted to commandeer a flight in order to escape to Turkey.

Outside Soviet borders, the Kremlin's expansionist general's hate, and Soviet military personnel, advisers and technicians are vulnerable to terrorist attacks. In Afghanistan — including the capital, Kabul — the Soviets are no safer than Americans are in Beirut.

It is a myth that the Kremlin's heavy-handed posture serves as an insurmountable barrier against terrorism. But it is a fact that while individual Soviets, including high-ranking ones, become targets, the government remains unscathed.

The Tbilisi hijacking shows why. The government's priority was to stop the escape rather than to protect innocent lives. Accordingly, Soviet crews are instructed not to cooperate with hijackers. The crews are also armed.

The Tbilisi hijacking started almost like the TWA Athens incident. The Georgians had an airport employee as an accomplice. She helped them smuggle handguns and grenades aboard the plane. In the air, the hijackers made a flight attendant knock-in a pilot at the cockpit door. The door opened, and the shooting started. A crew member and a hijacker were dead instantly. The pilot managed to lock the door and land the plane back in Thiblis. One of the hijackers committed suicide. Others were captured hours later by a special anti-terrorist squad that stormed the airliner. More people were killed in the crossfire.

No attempt was made to negotiate. The hijackers were faced with a choice of unconditional surrender or being taken by force. There was no publicity while the tragedy was in progress. Only after it was all over, and the accused were interrogated and indicted, did Georgian newspapers and TV cover the case extensively.

The outcome: Three crew members, two passengers and three hijackers were dead. Three more hijackers and a priest (who was not among them but allegedly masterminded the operation) were sentenced to death. Their relatives were fired from their jobs and expelled from the Communist Party.

Conversely, Eduard A. Shevardnadze, the Georgian party chief who was in charge of dealing with the incident, was promoted Monday to full membership of the ruling party Politburo and was named Soviet foreign minister.

The message from Thiblis was clear: Escape through hijacking is doomed to failure, and the authorities will show no mercy to those involved. The U.S. government cannot and should not act with similar ruthlessness and contempt for the public's right to know. But that right surely does not mean that everything should be known immediately and completely. Otherwise America could neither fight wars nor protect privacy.

And the commendable preoccupation with the fate of innocent victims of terror must not be allowed to turn into hedonistic neglect of the responsibilities of a great state. No number of missiles and aircraft carriers can substitute for an occasional act of brutal resolve. Most regrettable — except that all the alternatives are worse. Being a superpower is not a piece of cake. The Soviets appreciate that. Do we?

## Because we are strong, terrorism chips at shadow of power

WASHINGTON — It is urgent to develop a more effective American policy against terrorism. Americans in particular are increasingly the victims of this ugly phenomenon.

From the hostages in Iran five years ago to the most recent ordeal in Beirut, a lengthening shadow has been cast over the U.S. presence abroad.

Why are we so often the targets? Surely not because we are weak. Since World War II, our nuclear and conventional forces have been largely successful in deterring outright aggression.

Paradoxically, precisely because we are strong, the terrorists and their allies seek to chip away at our morale, our domestic order and our international prestige — the shadow of our power, as Dean Acheson put it.

Precisely because we are democratic, because we believe in individual rights, the terrorist method is to pit our reverence for innocent life against our natural instinct to defend ourselves.

And it is precisely because we believe in an international order, in which necessary

change can take place peacefully, that terrorists find their natural allies among those who wish to remake the world forcibly in their own totalitarian image.

Why have we been unable to act more effectively against terrorism? Three important fallacies cloud our thinking.

First is the fallacy that terrorism lives on its own organic resources, independent of state aid. We must be able to discriminate, of course, among the acts of deranged individuals, obscure groups possessed by violent political doctrines and the full-fledged agents of government.

Yet difficult as this may be, one thing is easy to discern: terrorism's success breeds growing support. Libya, Iran and Syria

employ terror because they believe it works.

The Soviet Union, sometimes through East Germany and Bulgaria, bears a heavy responsibility. All of these states want political change by force; they want to turn the balance of power against the democracies.

State-sponsored terrorism is but one element along a spectrum of violence intended to transfer the international order. If we forget this, then we are bound to miss the larger issue — the difference between democratic and totalitarian regimes with respect to international change.

Second comes the moral fallacy that somehow counterterrorism action, which may risk innocent lives, "dirties" our hands. This fallacy condemns us to paralysis and puts the terrorist and his victims — and the United States is a victim — on the same moral plane.

The use of force may miscarry. Military operations do go awry. But the alternative to risking a few precious lives today may be to risk many more no less precious lives tomorrow, as terrorists and the governments that support them become convinced that we lack

the moral strength to defend our values.

This fallacy has just about crippled our debate over terrorism. We see senior U.S. officials threatening preemption when we have yet to succeed at retaliation, and setting forth conditions for the use of our military forces so ideal that they have rarely been met even in wartime. All this talk only increases the pressure for ill-considered action in the hope of recovering a self-damaged sense of virility.

The third fallacy is the fear that concerted action against terrorism, if it costs some lives, somehow sacrifices more important issues. A case in point: the fear that a full expose of the plot to kill the pope may complicate efforts to reduce tensions with the U.S.S.R. Another case in point: our curious silence about the Syrian role in terrorism after our departure from Lebanon. Obviously, we must be prudent in dealing with such states sponsoring terrorism, but prudence can never be an excuse to avoid the truth.

We must deter terrorism by lowering the rewards and raising the penalties for those who encourage it. This includes both improv-

ed intelligence and more effective defensive measures. CIA Director William Casey has correctly emphasized improved human sources of intelligence.

The most important initiative, however, is to rally concern to a multilateral action: political, economic, diplomatic and military.

It works. Libya's Moammar Khadafy was forced onto the defensive in 1981-82 by such measures until nearly everyone resumed business as usual. But we are under no obligation to adhere to a multilateral suicide pact if international action is not forthcoming. Then we must act alone.

In the final analysis, our character as a free people is being tested. Are we too irresolute, too concerned with the ebb and flow of public opinion, too "short of breath" as the Syrians have taunted following the Marine withdrawal? I think not.

## A summer reading list on rural poverty, places of the heart

BOSTON — Every summer, I find myself compelled — probably by some natural homing instinct — in the general direction of the best-seller lists. Although I manage to resist the impulse to read most of what takes its place there, I find great pleasure in just reading the lists.

This year, for example, they have given me a great idea for a composite blockbuster that I hope to see in the stores for the summer of '86.

It is a novel starring five members of the Yale Class of 1961 whose bodies begin mysteriously wasting away while they are on a submarine being chased by the Soviets. My nonfiction composite is an autobiography of the daughter of a movie star who overcame her childhood misery by a passion for excellence, and rose to head a major American automobile company while making foolish choices in men.

But while we await the publication of these sure-fire best-sellers, I would like to offer you again (as a public service) on my own eclectic, unfocused, entirely eccentric summer reading list. It consists of what this one reader has enjoyed over the past 12 months. First, a novel for those who like to have

your psychological jitters in black and white. Don DeLillo's "White Noise" captures something about modern character and modern dread in a book about a professor, a famous Hitler scholar at a university, whose town experiences an "airborne toxic event." Shades of Bhopal, but with a sort of black humor.

DeLillo's sense of place is fluid and psychological. Several of the other novels that make this list are much more rooted. The first of these, "The Beans of Egypt, Maine," is set in the poverty pocket of rural America, among people who live behind the junkyards.

The book, a first by Carolyn Chute, has become a poverty-chic sensation. The author is no Alice Walker, but she does give another

group of invisible people their voice.

Ann Beattie's world is Vermont among the people, "one crowd still playing possum. In the '60s they don't know whether 'Love Always' — the title of the book — is a promise or just an expression. I have always wanted to shake Beattie characters out of their lethargy.

But there is momentum and energizing humor in this story: The catalyst of the aging hippdiddle is a 14-year-old soap-opera star who represents the younger generation, a girl so unemotional that she regards friendship as a dated idea.

"The Finishing School" is not exactly a place. It's about a meeting ground for an adolescent girl and a woman she finds dramatic and enchanting. This friendship, delicately described by Gill Godwin, another regular on this list, is the framework for a mystery about adulthood, adoration and betrayal.

Erica Jong's new book is neither "delicate" nor a "mystery." By fiat, her novels all carry the word "delicate" in their titles. This one, perhaps "farcical" is more accurate. This reader actually began flipping through the

dirty part of "Parachutes and Kisses" to get to the plot. But if you are hooked on Isadora Wing, this book is a beach-blanket catch-up.

The only family drama that makes this list as opposed to the Other List is the foreign wonder-tale of Isabel Allende's "The House of the Spirits." I began reading it because she is the niece of the former leader of Chile and finished it because she tells a fine yarn, evoking South American politics and mystery in lives of the patrone, his mystic wife and their children.

In the nonfiction world, I would tout two books: One is Jerry Kagan's book "The Nature of the Child," which makes sense out of the morass of child-psychology literature. It isn't a reading, but then figuring out what makes one child different from another isn't a reading. The key is not only the experience of the child but, more interestingly, the way her she interprets that experience.

Kagan's book is probably a good introduction to the second book, what I regard as the Big Sociology Book of the year, "Habits of the Heart." It was written by an academic gang of five (but it's readable anyway) who asked adult Americans how they interpret the expe-

riences of their own lives. The questions they raise have to do with individualism and community.

This was a bumper-crop year for short-story lovers. Grace Paley's "Later the Same Day" is everything that her fans could hope for. Mavis Gallant's collection, "Home Truths," digs into the Canadian soil for stories about bilingual and bi-cultural life. The newcomer in the short-story group is Lorrie Moore, whose "Self-Help" is a collection of titles patterned on "how to" books: how to be the other woman, how to talk to your mother, how to be a writer. By some miracle she avoids gimmickery, and many of the pieces are quite moving.

My sole entry in the novella category is the hip "Bright Lights, Big City." It's the 1980s version of the classic lost-and-young-writer-in-New-York genre. Jay McInerney writes as if he's on speed; he has a deft touch, very funny. It's the sort of writing that makes reviewers say, "We'll be hearing more from him."

Florence hits snag

## Opposition slows meat plant plans

TWIN FALLS — Pat Florence is considering about a half a dozen sites for a proposed rendering plant, although he still believes his original choice 12 miles south of Twin Falls is the best.

Florence, who operates Independent Meat Co. in Twin Falls, began searching for new sites after a Twin Falls County Planning and Zoning meeting June 13.

Florence, his brother John Francis, and William Loughmiller had applied to the county to build on 40 acres owned by Loughmiller in an agricultural zone. The proposed plant would employ about 12 people, process 60,000 pounds of meat waste per day from Independent Meat and other companies, and produce tallow and meat by-products.

At the end of the meeting, however, Florence withdrew the application because of the unexpectedly large amount of opposition to the plan, including a petition with more than 280 names.

Florence said Monday that he is considering other sites, some zoned industrial, in the Magic Valley. He refused to disclose the locations because of price negotiations.

He did confirm that he had looked at a site near Bliss. It wasn't a front-runner because of its distance from the meat packing company.

The former site of Bilco's Magic Valley meat packing company near Gooding was not a contender either, Florence added.

The Bilco building was for sale, but he and his brother were not interested in the entire complex, which included a rendering and meat packing

plant, Florence said. "Although it would appear to be the logical site, it's a lot more than what we're looking for," he said.

At the zoning meeting, Florence said he had proposed the rendering plant because Independent Meat Co. was becoming large enough to make one feasible. The meat company now sends its waste to Boise, the nearest rendering plant.

Along with the location hunting, the preliminary work on the design of the proposed plant is continuing, Florence said. The design can't be finalized until they know where they are going to build the plant, he added.

Florence said he didn't know when decision would be made on a site, but they likely would begin construction by this fall.

Despite shopping around, Florence said he still considers the Loughmiller property the best for its proximity, availability of water and power and low potential for flooding.

Since the zoning meeting, Florence has talked with some of the closest neighbors and opponents of the proposed plant.

"Several at least expressed willingness to talk about it," Florence said.

From their initial discussions, he found the neighbors had an odor problem, traffic, and an industrial venture near their property.

Florence said he explained the plant would be odorless and pollution free.

The original site is "not completely out of the question," he added.

If none of the other sites pan out, he again will consider the original location. In that event, he will campaign more heavily to change the minds of opponents.

100 years changes procedure

## Grazing management improves yields

TWIN FALLS — Grazing in the South Hills has changed substantially over its 100 year history. While spring in the Magic Valley at the turn of the century found herders racing over snowfields to get their animals to pasture, grazing in the South Hills is now managed by the Forest Service through a permit system. The core of the Forest Service's grazing program is a system of rotation which allows range areas to rest and rejuvenate.

Careful management has brought both higher yields for the livestock industry and better conditions on the National Forest. By the 1950s, overgrazing had reduced some sections of the South Hills to "just dirt," according to John Caywood, range conservationist for the Forest Service. "Now," he added, "it looks pretty good."

For cattlemen and sheepherders looking good means more cattle or sheep per acre than was possible under the old unregulated system. The goats, however, did not come without costs for grazers. Many had to rest their herd sites back when management first began.

A case in point is the Oakley Valley cattle allotment. In 1956 the Forest Service and local ranchers using the Oakley Valley allotment began to look into both better management programs and range improvement projects. The first move for better management was a volun-

tary 38 percent reduction by cattlemen using the area. Coupled with the drop in herd sizes was a series of range improvement projects such as springs, cattle guards, and fences.

By 1970, range conditions had improved so much that the 38 percent reduction was dropped. In 1981, the number of cattle grazing in the area increased by 10 percent.

"The key to the whole thing is management," said Ed Waldapfel, information officer for Sawtooth National Forest.

"Grazers just don't go in willy-nilly," Waldapfel said. "They go in at a certain time and they go off at a certain time."

Grazing permits now operate on what Caywood described as "deferred rest rotation." Where cattle or sheep used to come into a pasture once a year, now they stay all season long, the Forest Service, now rotates grazers through different sites, giving the grass and forage time to recover.

Cattle allotments, Caywood explained, are usually divided into two units. Cattle are run in one unit during the first half of the grazing season and then moved off into the other unit for the second half.

Sensitive areas, however, are still divided even further, according to Caywood. Some allotments are divided into as many as 9 units, he said, with the animals spending only a few weeks grazing each section.

On sites used for sheep grazing, Caywood said

they have at least three units. Two of those are used during the grazing season, he explained, and one is given a "rest" for the entire year.

Throughout the Sawtooth National Forest there is a total of 18 grazing allotments parcelled out between 35 permittees, according to District Ranger Jerry Davis.

Grazing permits are only granted to established farmers and ranchers that have land of their own. Public range areas are used to "round out" their year-long forage supply.

Permittees pay for grazing privileges on the basis of animal units-months-of-use, according to Davis. An animal unit is defined as 30 days of grazing for an animal. With cattle, a cow and her calf are counted as one head.

Cost for ranchers is under \$1.50 per animal with sheep slightly less expensive than cattle. In 1980 the cost was \$2.50 per animal for cattle.

Fifty percent of the money collected in range fees returns to the Forest Service in the Range Betterment Fund. Money from the RBF is used for the construction of fences, water troughs, and other facilities. While the Forest Service also has some funds earmarked for wildlife and watershed improvements, money from the RBF can also be used for projects in these areas.

Controlled burns have also become an important tool for the Forest Service's range programs. While improved fire control has checked runaway fires, it has created other problems for range areas with troublesome or non-productive plants.

## Hansen home for sale to pay \$40,000 deed

POCATELLO (AP) — A newspaper notice says a Sept. 6 foreclosure sale has been scheduled for the Pocatello home of former Idaho Rep. George Hansen and his wife, Corrie.

A legal notice was published in Tuesday's Idaho State Journal by American Land Title Co. of Pocatello, saying the Hansens' Fairway Estates home would be sold because the couple owes \$40,000 on a deed of trust, plus 20 percent interest for each day the loan was not repaid after July 1, 1984.

The Hansens secured the deed of trust from Western Capital Associates, a partnership of investors involving J.R. Simplot Co. officials, on May 23, 1984. Among the investors in Western Capital is Don J. Simplot, a Simplot vice president and son of Idaho's wealthiest citizen, J.R. Simplot.

A portion of the loan was used to repay a \$7,000 deed of trust with American Land Title. A deed of reconveyance of that loan was filed on May 24, 1983.

Hansen, who now works for a

Washington consulting firm, could not be reached for comment. However, he has reportedly said the foreclosure is a mistake which his attorneys are working to correct.

The seven-term congressman convicted last year on four counts of filing false campaign disclosure statements, has a history of financial problems.

He listed debts of between \$400,000 and \$700,000 in 1981, the last year in which he filed a financial disclosure statement as a member of Congress.

The Hansens borrowed \$100,000 against their Pocatello printing business, the Pocatello Copycat, in December of 1982. The loan, from Hargburg businessman John Bagley, was repaid in March 1983.

In 1981, Hansen listed loans of between \$135,000 and \$380,000 on eight banks in Idaho and the Washington, D.C. area.

Hansen has not filed a financial disclosure form since 1981 because of the charges against him. He is free while appealing his conviction on those charges.

## Hagerman residents zero in on the city's lack of prosecutor

HAGERMAN — Tickets written by Hagerman's law enforcement officer are being successfully challenged in court because the city has no prosecutor.

At the Hagerman City Council meeting Tuesday, Sheriff's Deputy Steve Lawanson, who works mostly in Hagerman, said a reckless driving charge was recently dismissed in court because the city had no representation. A charge against a city resident raising sheep — to the objection of her neighbors — also was challenged and had to be dismissed.

Lawanson said the Gooding County prosecutor cannot enforce city codes unless he is hired by the city for that service.

Mayor Merle Owsley said that during his two years in office, the lack of a prosecutor has not been a problem until now. He said in the past defendants had not challenged city codes on these grounds.

Councilwoman Gloria Jazewick said there is no point in having a set of city codes if there is no enforcement.

"It's just ridiculous," she said.

Councilman Rolly Zollinger agreed, saying, "We might as well throw the code book away."

The council decided to meet with City Attorney Cecil Hobday to arrange for him or Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson to represent Hagerman in court. Lawanson suggested that Hobday handle civil cases and Nelson take the criminal ones so neither attorney would be overloaded.

Meanwhile, the deputy said he will write all his citations

on county tickets. They will be enforced, but all fines will be collected by the county.

In other business: City Clerk Rhonda Wickham said the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare has approved engineering construction plans for the Hagerman sewer system.

City sewage will be treated, filtered and channeled into the Snake River west of Hagerman. Sewer ponds built by the city several years ago have been unable to hold the second half.

Owsley said there are eight "prime contractors" set to bid on the sewer project. On July 8 at 10 a.m., they will tour the new sewer route with city officials to discuss details of the construction. On July 16, bids will be opened and the council will select one of the contractors. The project is funded by a \$50,000 state grant recently won by

Hagerman.

A letter from Hobday advised the council to not repay liquor tax money mistakenly given the city by Gooding County. Last month, the county prosecutor said the city must repay the \$3,751. He suggested the county would pursue "friendly lawsuit" so the city could legally regain the money by taxing city residents.

But the city does not have to "roll over and play dead," Owsley said.

Cecil Hobday says fight-em, so that's what we're going to do," he said, adding that, "somebody else was pushing the (county) commissioners, so that's why the commission let us on (to repay the money)."

Armlin Sutterlin requested a water permit for his future home outside city limits on the east side of East Avenue.



At 54, Astronaut Don Lind defies NASA's age barrier

## In NASA since 1966, Lind finally flew in 1985

SUN VALLEY — "There is no emotion that can possibly record what it's like to look down and see the earth," said astronaut Don Lind.

A NASA astronaut since 1966, Lind got his chance to fly in space at age 54. He flew on a five-day space shuttle mission that began April 29.

Lind, in Sun Valley this week to speak to the Utah Bankers Association convention, said space was what he expected it to be on an "intellectual" level, thanks to his training and background in physics.

"But there was an emotional content that was hard to explain," he said.

As a mission specialist, Lind was busy working on experiments and tasks and did not have time to sit back and actually observe the view. When he did, he was at a loss for words.

With a bachelor's degree in physics from the University of Utah and a doctorate in high

energy nuclear physics from University of California at Berkeley, Lind began his work at the NASA Goddard Space Flight Center as a space physicist in 1964.

He was involved in experiments to determine the nature and properties of low-energy particles with the Earth's magnetosphere and interplanetary space. Prior to that, Lind worked at the Lawrence Radiation Laboratory in Berkeley, doing research on a type of basic high energy particle interaction.

Lind also is a commander in the U.S. Naval

Reserve, having served four years active duty and logging 3,900 hours of flight time in jet aircraft.

This background aided his selection as an astronaut.

Lind served as backup science-pilot for both Skylab 3 and Skylab 4, and as a member of the rescue crew for the Skylab missions, but he did not get a chance to go into space at that time.

Lind said NASA is "absolutely a different world" now than it was at the height of the Apollo missions.

"The sense of history in the Apollo program is now approximated in the space shuttle program, both within NASA and as perceived by the public," he said.

Lind's space shuttle mission came only 17 days after Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, flew in space. Lind said this was the shortest period of time between two missions, but the crews at NASA made everything run as smooth as clockwork.

Lind sees the future in the space program optimistically.

# Greynhawk plan stirs Ketchum controversy

**KETCHUM**—The Greynhawk project continues to raise the hackles of some members of the Ketchum City Council and the representatives of the project's developer, Daon Development Corp.

At Monday's council meeting, Councilman Jack Corroek became irritated over Daon's insistence for assurances that conditions placed on the preliminary plat to subdivide its property in the city's Warm Springs district would not change when the council reviews the plat for final approval.

At the same time, Daon's attorney, Evan Robertson, said the developers were suspicious the city would try to change those conditions between the preliminary and final approval stages. Robertson and Daon representative Dick Fenton asked the council to give extra assurances that the plat was acceptable.

Robertson and Fenton refused to accept Corroek's and City-Attorney Jim Phillips' position that preliminary plat conditions are binding on the city and developer and that the council cannot attach additional, discretionary conditions to the final plat.

Robertson said he and his client are uncomfortable without the extra assurances from the council.

"Call it paranoia," Robertson said.

He cited a memorandum written by a member of the city's staff that said extra conditions should be placed on the plat.

City planner Linda Haavik, who said she wrote the memo, said it referred to Daon's plan to create condominiums in the Greynhawk Inn, which the council approved recently, and not to the subdivision of the land. Haavik said the memo must have been misread.

"Daon representatives, however, may have other reasons for their paranoia."

Late last year, the council rejected their plans to build a hotel on the more than 50 acres Daon owns at the base of Bald Mountain, Sun Valley's main ski mountain. The rejection came four years after the Canadian development company first revealed its plans for the project.

The council's decision on the nearly 300-unit hotel, however, isn't binding until it adopts its findings of fact that justify its decision.

Two weeks ago, Daon gave its rebuttal to those findings when Robertson outlined the developer's theory that the council "consciously or unconsciously" con-

spired to lead Daon through the four-year process when it knew the project would be denied.

Robertson argued Daon felt like "a bride left at the altar" after having relied on the decisions and guidance from the city staff and the council in shaping its project.

Since the council's rejection of the hotel project, Daon has moved ahead with plans to build the 40-unit inn and to subdivide the land. The council has given preliminary approval to the inn and is nearing preliminary approval to the subdivision.

Besides asking for the extra assurances on the subdivision conditions, Daon also asked the council to set a bond amount on improvements to the subdivision needed before the final plat is approved.

The city requires a developer to cover the cost of curbs, gutters and other improvements that the city asks in the subdivision if the developer does not or cannot finish the work.

Normally, the bond is approved by the city if the improvement amount to be bonded before the subdivision begins season ends at the onset of winter. The bond is set at 150 percent of the cost of improvements.

Daon, however, asked for the council to set the bond now because, Fenton said, it would be easier to put in the

improvements when the company builds the Greynhawk Inn. If Daon doesn't build the Inn this year, then the city could put in the improvements later, he said.

"Why are we always breaking from procedure?" Corroek asked. When the council approved the preliminary plat to condominiumize the Inn two weeks ago, it went against its policy of doing so before the project is started.

Corroek asked Fenton if the reason Daon is asking for the break from procedure is because Daon never intends to build the Inn. Rather, he asked, isn't the company merely waiting until November's city elections to see if the make-up of the council changes in favor of Daon's original hotel proposal?

The seats of the three council members opposed to the original hotel, those of Corroek, Tim Crawford and Sue Wolford, are open for the election, and Greynhawk is being touted as the election's biggest issue.

Daon is arguing with Fenton and Robertson for some time. Corroek went along with their notion and moved to table the preliminary plat of the subdivision for two weeks until a bond amount can be set, even though Daon wanted approval subject to the setting of the amount.

# It's not the same as pig calling Iron worker takes top hollerin' honors

**JACKPOT**—In case you haven't heard, the Seventh Annual States Hollerin' contest took place in Jackpot Nevada yesterday and the results are in. First place went to Clark Warren, an iron worker from Reno, Nevada. It was Clark's first try at such contests.

Second place went to John Horton, a self-proclaimed mountain man from nearby Jarbidge. In addition to hollerin', Horton was authentically costumed in buckskins with a kil-fox

pellet hanging from his belt. Horton also carried and fired a musket.

Warren, by contrast, wore more contemporary garb, but sported "long blond hair" according to contest organizer Carl Hayden.

Last year's champion, Margaret Halvorsen of Lake City, Iowa, could place no better than fourth. Halvorsen has won Iowa's hog-calling contest nine consecutive years.

Hayden said that he had heard something of a multi-faceted vocal talent since hog calling is "completely different" from hollerin'.

Third place went to Janet Ward, a bartender at Cactus Pete's casino in

Jackpot. Ward did not learn to holler at the casino, but in Crescent Valley, Nev., where she lived for a while with her children in a hilltop house. Ward said hollerin' became a habit when she used to call her children home for supper from a neighbor's house a mile and a half away.

There's a lot more to hollerin' than just raising your voice, and according to Hayden, "it takes a lot of practice."

Hollerin', he explained, is "a throw back to the old days before telephone and shortwave radios." The purpose is to communicate through vocal in-

tonations. Messages, Hayden said, were sometimes relayed from neighbor to neighbor through hollerin' from one end of the county to another.

On a good day with the right cloud cover, Hayden said, a good hollerer could send a message three miles.

News about Jackpot's hollerin' contest is apparently making the rounds. Hayden said he hears from people all the time who want to participate.

"Most," he said with some disappointment, "have no qualification whatsoever to participate."

# Boise crew battles thousands of fires

**BOISE (AP)**—With heat and tinder-dry foliage creating one of the most severe wildfire situations in recent memory in the West, the Boise Interagency Fire Center has become the nationwide hub for crews and equipment battling literally thousands of blazes.

Jack Wilson, Bureau of Land Management director for the center, said for the week that ended on July 3 alone his office had counted 885 fires burning a total of 125,000 acres in the West.

For the season to date, 70,485 fires had been reported to Wilson's office. They had consumed nearly 1.4 million acres. That compares to the entire 1984 total of 54,502 fires which burned about 1.3 million acres.

BIFC, which provides logistical and manpower support to firefighting efforts throughout the United States and Canada, is staffed by fire management specialists from the BLM, Forest Service, National Park Service, Bureau of Indian Affairs and the Fish and Wildlife Service.

Wilson said the rash of large fires in southern California during the past week has been the biggest strain on BIFC's resources. By Thursday, the fires had destroyed 137 homes and other buildings, killed at least three people and caused an estimated \$30 million to \$35 million in property loss.

Two other people were killed in southern California in a plane crash that ignited a 750-acre blaze, Wilson said.

# Feds seek public comment on plan to improve rangeland conditions

The U.S. departments of Agriculture and the Interior are seeking public comments on the draft report on the experimental range stewardship program.

The report, issued June 26, describes program operations and plans in experimental stewardship areas as well as program alternatives for the future.

The experimental stewardship program (ESP), conducted jointly by the Department of Interior's Bureau of Land Management and USDA's Forest Service, provides incentives to federal grazing permittees for improving the condition of grazing lands. Sixteen project areas covering

more than 12 million acres of federal, state, and private lands in nine Western states were developed under the program.

The first ESP project was initiated in January 1973, with the authorization of the Challis area central Idaho. The Challis area encompasses the BLM Challis Planning Unit, parts of the Challis National Forest and the Sawtooth National Recreation area plus intermingled lands of the Idaho Department of Lands.

According to the report, the most significant accomplishment of the ESP was the change in attitude from confrontation between federal land management agencies and land users

to one of communication, cooperation and coordination in managing rangelands. This increased cooperation has led to better range management through improved livestock grazing and other multiple uses.

The ESP was authorized by the Public Rangelands Improvement Act of 1978, which also mandated the secretaries of Agriculture and the Interior to "report to the Congress the results of such experimental program" no later than December 31, 1985. The draft report and resulting public comments will serve as the basis for the secretaries' report to Congress.

# Fall victim identified

**KING HILL (AP)**—A 13-year-old Bellevue, Wash., boy who died Wednesday night after falling from a cliff was identified Thursday.

Gregory Owens Jones fell 70 to 75 feet down a cliff while participating in a wilderness survival class while hiking in the King Hill Creek area, about 18 miles east of Mountain Home in Elmore county, said Joe Levitch, a paramedic with the Southwest Backcountry Medical Rescue Team. A dispatcher with the Elmore County Sheriff's office confirmed the boy's identity.

Jones was with a group of six other boys and two guides from the School of Urban and Wilderness Survival in Redmond, Wash., at the time of the accident, said Detective Nick Schilz of the Elmore County Sheriff's Department.

He was declared dead at the scene about a half hour after the fall from head and internal injuries, Levitch said. The boy was taken by helicopter to St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, where an autopsy was scheduled for Thursday, a spokeswoman for the Ada County coroner's office said.

# Jerome council votes to adopt water plan

**JEROME**—To "be safe rather than sorry," the Jerome City Council voted Tuesday to implement a system of odd- and even-numbered watering days for city residents during July, August and September.

Although the new well and storage facilities have been working well, council members justified the hot days to clean-up dry weeds which have become a fire hazard on private property.

Jim Auclair, fire chief, says he issues warning tickets before regular citations are issued.

Police Chief Darryl Cameron's request for a commitment in next year's budget to hire a resource officer to work in the schools was denied by the council.

A one-year grant is available for hiring a resource officer with the stipulation the city, county and school district agree to carry on the cost of maintaining the officer next year.

Capps voiced the council's reluctance to obligate themselves for future budgets.

The council also denied a request by Mario Dalry to include a proposal in the city budget for equipment to handle hazardous materials.

Dairy says by buying individual pieces instead of a kil, the cost can be cut by half.

His proposal outlined a plan to purchase a vehicle and a few pieces of basic emergency equipment in the first year, with additional equipment added the second and third years.

Although he would feel better knowing the city and county had a unit to respond to hazardous waste accidents, Capps says the city cannot afford to take on any new programs at this time.

Council approved the inclusion of a new radar for the police department into the new year's budget.

# Heat defeats spray efforts

Winds slackened and the mercury rose Thursday, curtailing efforts to spray a diminishing store of pesticide on southeast Idaho's grasshoppers.

"The heat is too high now...they went up at 5 a.m. and came down by 8:30 a.m.," said Anita McGrady, spokeswoman for Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service in Twin Falls.

"The reason was there wasn't enough wind to get a good dispersion. And once the heat started rising they could see they were going to waste more of the pesticide than was going to use. Now every ounce is precious."

She estimated the acreage sprayed Thursday roughly equaled that covered Wednesday.

## Women find success in macho cop world

The woman police officer is proving herself in the macho world of cops and that some studies indicate she may make a better officer than her male counterpart.

The first woman was named Jo the Chicago police force in 1893, according to an article in the July issue of Cosmopolitan, but women have been assigned the same jobs as men only since 1972, when federal legislation banned sex discrimination.

Women today make up only 5 percent of the nation's police officers. They take the same training as men, fill the same jobs, accept the same risks. This is a big departure from the pre-1972 days when women worked mainly in plain clothes, undercover, in administrative jobs or only on

cases involving juveniles and women. Women make good cops. A recent evaluation indicated that female officers made fewer arrests and issued fewer traffic citations than their male colleagues, but more of their colleagues ended in conviction. They made fewer unnecessary arrests.

Height and weight standards that discriminated against women no longer apply.

Women score lower than men in tests of physical prowess, but equal opportunity laws make it hard to reject women on the basis of poor performance unless the skills involved are job-related.

My chances of getting killed on the job are only slightly greater than the average citizen's," said Sgt. Mary Wamsley of the Lakewood, Colo., police department.

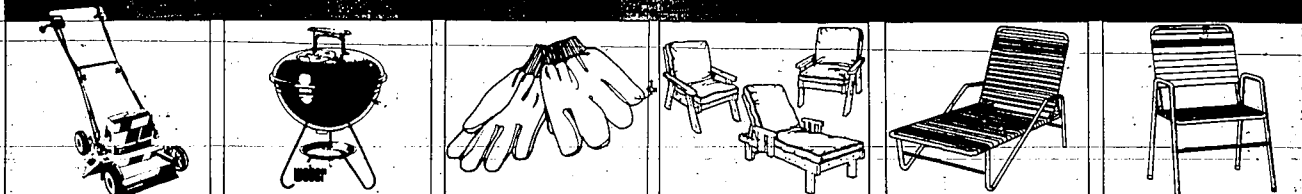
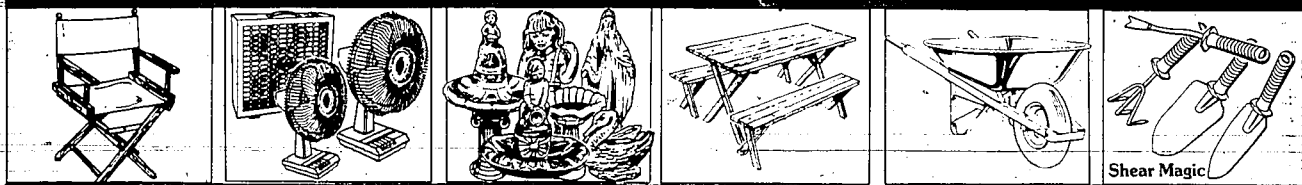
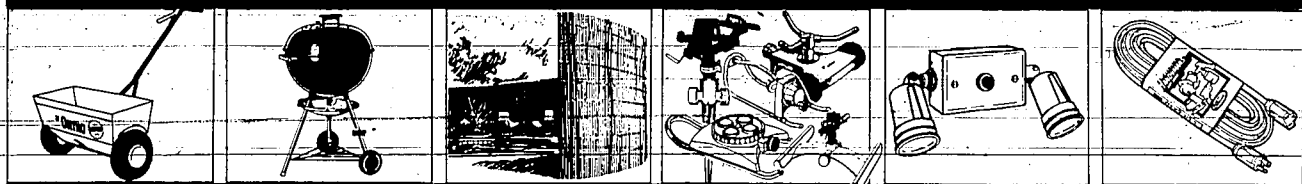

## Youth troupe syncopates 'Snow White'

**TWIN FALLS**—In their third production since forming as a youth stage troupe, the Junior Musical Playhouse Company will present "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs" at O'Leary Junior High Auditorium July 9, 10, 11, 12 and 13 at 7:30 p.m. Also slated is a matinee on the 13th at 2:30 p.m. during which one child will be admitted free when accompanied by a grandparent.

With lyrics by Eisa Raed and music by Michael Valenti, the musical is not to be confused with the time-worn Disney version in that a completely new set of songs offers a transfusion of fresh singing during the play. There will be no "Hi Ho, Hi Ho," in this ver-

sion. The play has a rich heritage dating back to the early 19th century. Two German brothers, Jacob and Wilhelm Grimm, remembering the stories they had listened to, wide-eyed, as orphans at their guardian aunt's house in Hesse, decided not only to write these down but to comb the neighboring towns—villages, hamlets and remote country cottages for old storytellers who were still recounting tales that had been handed down orally in their families for generations.

"Snowdrop" was one of the immensely popular fairy tales that the Brothers Grimm made famous on paper. Then, in 1934, Walt Disney took what many considered financial suicide by making the first full-length car-

toon out of the fairy tale. Renaming it "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," Disney finished the ambitious movie in 1937 and what had been called "Disney's Folly" turned into "Disney's Masterpiece." It is now recognized as one of the most popular and beloved movies ever made.

The more recent version to be performed by the JUMP Company was first performed in 1978. Featured songs in this version are "I'm Alive," "The Voodoo Song," "The Name Song," "Look At Me," "Eat An Egg For Breakfast," "I'm Real Glad," "I Never Had A Friend Before" and "A Promise Kept."

According to publicity worker Deiores Evans, the play follows the traditional tale of Snow White and her adventures with the

dwarfs and her wicked, vanity-consumed stepmother. In addition, she notes that, "The dialogue is poetic and fun."

Besides the music, another difference the audience will have to get used to is a renaming of the dwarfs to Scrubber, Blubber, Flubber, Scotty, Mosquito, Peplio and Fred, Evans points out, adding, "The music is up-to-date with a syncopated beat. It's appealing to this generation, but it's not hard rock. It is delightful and catchy."

Appearing in the role of Snow White will be Maureen Evans. Rose Anna Boyle and Jenny Tucker trade off playing the queen, while Angela Hutchings will play the witch, John Mauldin is the prince, Jason Houser is the mirror and Steve Maricle is the woodsman. The dwarfs are Kirk Black, Krista Black,

Nicole Brunyer, Tavia Gilbert, Joshua Houser, Lorgel Juntunen, Denton Whitney and Nathan Robinson.

Appearing as animals and trees of the forest will be Tonya Farmer, Sara Robinson, Angela Robinson, Katie Wright, Kim Wright, Joshua Wilson, Michael Wilson, Shanda Tolman and Donna Siplon.

Margaret Nelwirth is the director, Kathy LaGrone the choral director, Bobbie Jo Shimer the orchestra director and Beverly Hackney and Jeanne Wilson are choreographers.

## Geldof guiding force for Live Aid concert

**LONDON**— "Don't talk to me like that," Live Aid concert organizer Bob Geldof shouted into the phone. He was behind a closed door, but his side of the conversation could be heard throughout rock promoter Harvey Goldsmith's suite of offices here.

"If you want to continue this conversation, you ought to stop trying to give me that crap," Geldof continued. "How can you demand to speak for starving people? Are you starving? We both know you're not."

Half an hour later, Geldof hung up, but only after agreeing to talk further with the caller, who represents a political activist group here. The caller was demanding to be involved in the mammoth benefit concert scheduled for July 12 in London and Philadelphia. It was just one of dozens of calls that Geldof routinely handles every day.

The sidewalks along Oxford Street, the city's busiest commercial avenue, were filled at 5 p.m. with shoppers and office workers headed home. But Geldof was still in the middle of one of his typical 18-hour days in behalf of his Live Aid "responsibilities."

The concerts—whose unprecedented talent lineup includes Paul McCartney, Bob Dylan, David Bowie, Mick Jagger and Tina Turner—will be televised around the world as part of a campaign to raise upwards of \$10 million for African famine victims. It shapes up as perhaps the most celebrated pop gathering ever. Behind the glamour of that event, however, are thousands of hours of planning. While no single person could be responsible for such a major undertaking, Live Aid carries Geldof's stamp to a remarkable degree.

## Her drawings evoke country charm

**SHOSHONE**— From her rural home north of Shoshone, Shirley Nice proudly confesses to having a bit of country in her. A single glance at any of her pen and ink drawings proves it. Currently, the artist has printed one calendar on which she illustrated birds in their wild habitat and another featuring the rural area north of Shoshone where she grew up.

Nice remembers that it was while her husband Ken was serving a

twenty-year hitch in the Navy and she was living in La Grande, Ore., when she began to turn to art. "I got serious eight years ago. Ken was at sea and the kids were in school and it was just time," she says.

And, according to the enthusiastic artist, that moment had been a long time coming. Even as a child, she remembers a fascination with art—but, art her way. "I'd wanted to be an artist since I was tiny," she says, remembering that when she went to school in Gooding, "I got in trouble because I tried to shade. They wanted you to do everything by the

numbers rather than what you were comfortable with.

"And, you just didn't hear about art as a career. It was only in Paris or other exotic places that people were supposed to be able to make a living at art. Here, tennis shoes won out over art supplies," Nice says, adding that after her school years, "We went on to create seven children and my desire to become an artist was put on the back burner."

Self-trained, Nice says she doesn't want a teacher to change her style. "It just comes out of my fingers,"

she says, noting that she's learned a lot of technique by studying instruction books authored by her sister-in-law, Claudia Nice.

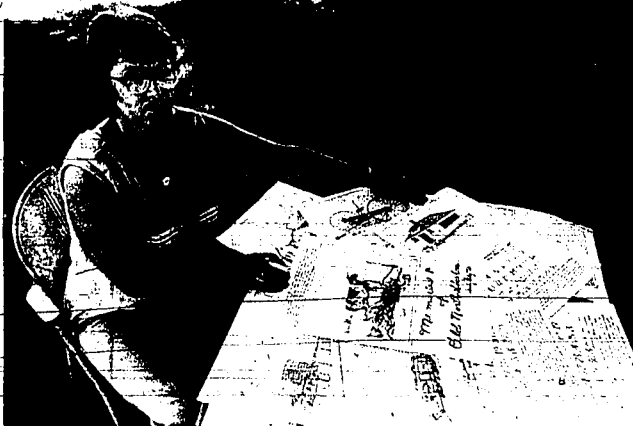
"I don't think art has to be regimented," Nice says, pointing out that she also does acrylic and oil painting on objects as diverse as milk cans, Masonite, blackboards and even TV sets. "You get tired of one of my paintings, you can patch the root with it," she laughs. "I don't believe that a painting on stretched canvas is any more viable than that on a TV. It's a talent. It's something that God gave you that you can share."

If painting on milk cans and Masonite seems a bit bucolic, then Nice's pen and ink drawings take that impression infinitely further. The second calendar she recently illustrated begins in January with "Memories of Old Shoshone," which continues as a theme throughout all 12 months.

"I was gone from here for 30 years. When I came back I saw a drastic change, not gradual like everybody else who stayed here," she says.

In a fascinating pictorial history, her calendar illustrates Braun's Country Store, two horses pulling a haywagon with her father and two small children aboard, printed from memory; an old dairy barn and a "Hoover Wagon," as the old marmos spreaders were called. Especially poignant is the painting—for December which is of her old family home with its rock walls surrounded by snow and bare trees.

# Disney seeks rainbow's end in 'Oz'

LOS ANGELES — It was a Technicolor world of squeaky Munchkins and wicked witches, of an Emerald City somewhere over the rainbow. It was a world that collided with dreams and exploded into one of the most enduring celluloid tales of the century.

Now after 46 years, Dorothy Gale, that fiery-eyed Kansas girl who makes friends with a tin-plated man, a tiny-stuffed scarecrow and a gumball lion, has returned to the nation's screens.

It's not 16-year-old Judy Garland in yet another replay of her adventures on the Yellow Brick Road in "The Wizard of Oz." This time Dorothy is played by the star of the movie named Fairuza Balk in "Return to Oz," Walt Disney Pictures' \$25 million treatment of the L. Frank Baum stories.

The fantasy marks another gamble in the Disney company's attempt to recapture its share of the movie market by trying to snare an audience that's been weaned for generations on the 1939 MGM fantasy.

"Return to Oz" opened June 21 to fair reviews but a dismal box office showing — \$2.2 million at 1,238 theaters. "Cocoon" opened the same

weekend with \$7.9 million at 1,140 theaters.

However, Paul Maslansky, the producer of "Return to Oz," is confident the film will prove a long-lasting classic like its predecessor.

If history can ever repeat itself, the new film might just make it to blockbuster city, because 1939's "The Wizard of Oz" was a financial failure, losing \$1 million on its \$2,777,000 cost.

It also received some bad reviews with critic Otis Ferguson saying: "As for the light fantasy, it weighs like a pound of fruitcake soaking wet."

Not until it was re-released in 1948-49 did "The Wizard of Oz" show a profit. It first appeared on television Nov. 3, 1956, on CBS and was repeated eight times through 1967. NBC telecast "The Wizard of Oz" eight times from 1968-75. CBS has shown it every year since 1976. By mid-June the film had earned \$4.8 million in theaters and \$10 million from television.

Maslansky is a tough-minded 25-year veteran of the film trade, having produced the runaway hit, "Police Academy," the Martin Luther King Jr. TV miniseries and a number of other movies, including "Damnation Alley" and "Hot Stuff." During a recent interview at his Burbank Studio headquarters, he traced the history of "Return to Oz."

When an earlier Disney administration was searching for new filmmakers, Frank Yablans, George Lucas and Steven Spielberg recommended Walter Murch, a highly respected sound and film editor who won an Academy Award for the sound editing of "Apocalypse Now."

Murch, a quiet man, was asked what he'd like to film for Disney. "I'd like to continue the Oz story," he replied.

Continued from Page B1 showed the tension and fatigue of that commitment late last week. For months now, he has been conjuring, debating and pleading with musicians and businessmen to maintain what he sees as the purity of the Live Aid project. He has been called cocky, brash and arrogant. He has no one else has questioned his dedication.

"I don't think for one minute what we're doing is charity," Geldof said, taking a break from the phone calls and strategy sessions with Goldsmith and the promoter's aides. "We're talking about the possible death of 130 million people, which is not an exaggeration."

"If you're talking about one cent going down while the other stand by and watch, I think what we're talking about transcends charity and becomes a responsibility."

Continuing in the same spirit, he said: "Charity is when you give something because of sympathy and a

certain amount of guilt. From my point of view, this has nothing to do with that. It has to do with accepting the fact that a vast amount of humanity is about to die in a world of surplus."

Geldof, 32, has always been known as a talker. Soon after his band, the Boomtown Rats, surfaced in 1977, a British journalist began a Geldof profile by writing: "Geldof can talk a blue streak. Ask a question and you'll get a dissertation. Don't ask a question and you'll probably get a dissertation anyway."

Consequently, many initially dismissed his outspokenness as show-biz bravado. But Geldof's band enjoyed some success, and he starred a few years ago in the film version of Pink Floyd's "The Wall." Yet he hadn't achieved the superstar status that would have guaranteed the Rats

a position in the exclusive Live Aid lineup.

So when Geldof began contacting British rock stars late last year about making a record to benefit famine victims, he didn't have a name like McCartney or Bowie that would virtually assure a major turnout.

# 'Pale Rider' moves on translucent plot

If only "Pale Rider" were the film it could have been. Maybe then it would have marked the rebirth of the American Western. Now we will have to wait for someone else to round 'em up and head 'em out.

If any actor living today personifies the Western hero, or anti-hero, it is Clint Eastwood. He was the steely-eyed gunfighter the TV generation adopted from Rowdy Yates to Josey Wales. Along the trail he righted wrong, wronged right and laid many a good (and evil) man to rest.

Unlike John Wayne, who may be the classic rootin'-tootin' American Western character, Eastwood invented more of an anarchistic enigma. Always the man from nowhere passing through to nowhere else in particular. He was either a "Man With No Name" or a "High Plains Drifter," a man who shot straight and asked questions later.

And then he took the Western, modernized it and gave birth to "Dirty Harry." The rest is movie-box-office history. So, too, is the sad state of the film Western.

Although Eastwood has made some other exciting and entertaining films ("Firefox," "Escape from Alcatraz," "Bronco Billy"), it is the American Western hero where he will historically have the most-lasting cinematic impact.

So how come "Pale Rider," a movie burdened with great hope and expectation as the savior of the film Western, is such a confused, unfulfilling and irritating film?

It is not that America has outgrown the Western. A band of riders charging across a hilly prairie by a wintry panorama is still enough to chill

the blood. Lay to rest those notions that a good Western cannot be made. A good story with good characters and beautiful cinematography is all it takes.

"Pale Rider" only has been mitering of those elements. The story begins in a promising fashion but sputters and breaks down like an over-riden horse. Characters are either ill-conceived, totally intrusive or completely unnecessary. In addition, say-what-should-have-been-left-on-the-cutting-room-floor, including a vapid and embarrassing scene where Preacher (Eastwood) is poorly propositioned by the 14-year-old girl (Sydney Penny) who prayed for someone to come and save her small mining community.

Why Eastwood, who also produced and directed, did not see those large flaws is the question. Why he made the worst Western of his career is the mystery.

A band of men riding fast that streaks over the mountains tearing apart a mining settlement and terrorizing its citizens is a beautiful and powerful opening scene until you realize that only a cow and a small dog bite the dust. But the murder of the dog causes Megan (Penny) to pray for a miracle to save her home while burying her dog. It is a scene contrived enough to cause snickers.

But her prayers, no matter how comical, are answered: A nameless stranger rides across the mountains and into nearby LaHood, Calif., to defend Hull Barret (Michael Moriarty), the girl's stepfather-to-be, from the marauders in a scene out of "Kung Fu" and a late-night public service commercial about playing with matches.

When the stranger accompanies Barret back to the settlement, Megan

is reading a biblical passage with her mother (Carré Spodgrass): "And I looked, and beheld a pale horse; and his name that sat on him was Death, and Hell followed him." Megan looks up, sees the stranger on a light gray-flecked steed and knows he is the answer to her prayers.

The stranger wears a cleric's collar, but also bears the marks of deadly wounds on his flesh. He inspires the prospectors to tough it out against the rich mine owner, Coy LaHood (Richard Dysart), who is trying to drive them from their claims in order to rape the land for nuggets of gold. "Pale Rider" then turns into the classic story of good vs. evil, exploitation vs. nature. The only problem is that the evil, as personified by Coy LaHood, is not really malevolent. LaHood simply does not embody the darker side and proves to be a pathetic nemesis to Preacher. Even Stockburn (John Russell), a chiseled lawman-for-hire who travels with six deputies and obeys the law of the richest, is no match for Preacher. Their doomed paths had crossed before, which is the pivotal element in "Pale Rider," but Stockburn is no match this time around for Preacher and we know it. Nothing can stop this Avenging Angel.

And that is really what "Pale Rider" should have been all about: an Avenging Angel in cowboy duds seeking justice for himself and the righteous in the land of Godorrah. That is the part that comes closest to working.

But Eastwood, working with the flawed script by Michael Butler and

Dennis Shryack, burdens the story with silly elements, strong allusions to a Western classic ("Shane"), a touch of James Bond (Richard Kiel as a monsterman) and a smirking teenage girl (Penny) whose presence lubricates the movie.

It is as if Sam Peckinpah tried his hardest to make a violent Western for the whole family. "Pale Rider" is that confused. Call it "Kung Fu" meets "Shane."

# Threat of an All-Star boycott fades

**NEW YORK** — When the major league baseball players' executive board meets July 15 to set a date for a possible strike, one action seems to be unlikely — a boycott of the next day's All-Star game.

"The fans get hurt, and how many more times are they going to keep coming back to the parks after a strike?" Tim Landrum of the St. Louis Cardinals said when asked about the boycott in a survey conducted by The Associated Press. "We can't boycott."



Other players strongly backed Landrum's opinion in the AP survey. Of the 516 members of the Major League Players Association who responded, all but seven said they opposed a boycott. Another 199 had no comment.

The players' union and team owners have been negotiating since last November on a new contract to replace the Basic Agreement that expired Dec. 31. Players with all 26 teams have overwhelmingly voted to give union leaders strike authorization.

During the 1981 strike, the only one in baseball history, the All-Star Game

was played about a month late as the first event following settlement of the strike. That's the only time in its 53-year history that the game has been delayed.

The traditional aspect, in fact, seemed to be on the minds of many of the players who responded.

Many of the players questioned expressed the attitude of Atlanta's Dale Murphy, a perennial all-star and two-time National League most valuable player.

"Baseball is one of the few sports where the All-Star Game is really a big deal," said Murphy. "I wouldn't want to take that away from them

(the fans)."

Ron Killee of the Chicago White Sox opposed a boycott, preferring to face the labor issue after the game. "Reach an agreement or strike," he said.

The most emphatic sentiment in favor of a boycott came from Baltimore's Joe Judge, who said the players must "get something done and get it done quick."

"Boycott the game," Nolan said. "Let's start getting serious and stop all the lip service before we fiddle the whole season away."

Milwaukee pitcher Danny Darwin agreed, saying, "There simply has to

be a point where this stuff stops."

But while most players agreed that pressure was needed in the talks which have gone virtually nowhere, nearly all disagreed with the tactic endorsed by Nolan and Darwin.

"There is no real leverage to boycotting the All-Star Game," said Gary Pettit of California.

"The date of a labor action isn't important," Gary Matthews of the Chicago Cubs said. "But if we have to, I'd rather have it until after the All-Star Game because it belongs to the fans."

"The All-Star Game is mainly for us," said Ozzie Virgil of Philadelphia.

## It'll be Lloyd, Navratilova at Wimbledon

**WIMBLEDON, England** — The seeding committee of the Wimbledon tennis championships must be very pleased with itself. For the first time in the history of the world's premier grass court tournament, they have guaranteed the top-seeded player will win the women's singles championship.

Pessimists, of course, can argue that for the first time the top-seeded player is guaranteed to lose.

For on Saturday, Martina Navratilova, the No. 1 seed, will meet Chris Evert Lloyd, the No. 1 seed.

"Navratilova and Lloyd set up another chapter in the longest-running show in tennis history Thursday, meaning it is the most anticipated showdown in the Wimbledon final with contrasting semifinal victories.

Pressed by the inspired play of eighth-seeded Zina Garrison, Navratilova fought back every challenge to emerge a 6-4, 7-6 winner. Lloyd was never tested in her 6-2, 6-0 romp over Kathy Riordan.

That justified the work of the seeding committee, which couldn't decide who would win the singles crown.

Lloyd is ranked No. 1 on the Women's Tennis Association's computer ranking, which is usually based on computer rankings. Moreover, Lloyd has won the last two Grand Slam tournaments, the Australian Open in December and last month's French Open, when she defeated Navratilova in the title match.

But Navratilova had been ranked No. 1 for the last two years until after her loss at Paris.

And even more important as far as traditionalists on the seeding committee are concerned, Navratilova has won the women's crown here the last three years, defeating Lloyd in last year's final.

The twin victories Lloyd set up the 68th meeting of their careers, the longest rivalry in the sport, and the fifth time they have clashed for the championship at the All England Lawn Tennis and Croquet Club.

But Navratilova and Lloyd's semifinals will pit third-seeded Jimmy Connors, seeking his third crown on these famed grass courts, against newly naturalized American Kevin Curran,

while No. 5 Anders Jarryd faces the hard-servicing, 17-year-old Boris Becker of West Germany.

Curran, a South African expatriate who stunned defending champion John McEnroe in Wednesday's quarterfinals, also upset Connors here two years ago, while Becker, with McEnroe out, has become the favorite of London's bookmakers. The men's final will be staged at Centre Court on Sunday.

Garrison, first black American to reach the women's semifinals of this prestigious event since Althea Gibson won the title in 1958 for the second successive year, gave Navratilova all she could handle. The 21-year-old Houston native used her speed to reach almost every ball and then responded with an astonishing array of shots.

Garrison began the match by holding her own service at 15, then fighting back from a 15-30 deficit to break Navratilova. Navratilova found her every move blunted by Garrison, who also reached the semifinals of the Australian Open in 1983 and upset Lloyd to win a tournament at Amelia Island, Fla., earlier this year.

"After I broke her for the first time, I thought I had a very good chance, and knew that being in the semifinals could bring out all her small court games," said the eighth-seeded Garrison. "I tried to keep the pressure on her and hopefully I would be able to stay in there."

Navratilova, who has lost her last two Grand Slam events but has won this title five times in her career, ripped the next five games, breaking a 4-2 lead and the match appeared headed for a rout.

But it was to be far from that, as Garrison, who has never beaten Navratilova, broke her opponent again in the eighth game and held serve in the ninth to pull to 4-5.

But Navratilova, although losing two of the first three points, wrapped up the opening set with a service winner.

The fight has just begun. The two women traded service breaks in the third and fourth games of the second set, the third set ending to seven times before Garrison succumbed. Then, fighting for every point, they battled until the

## Baseball hopes teetotaling grandstands will bring fans back

**MINNEAPOLIS** — From Atlanta to Chicago, from Minneapolis to Pittsburgh, measures to combat beer-inspired fan rowdiness are sprouting up in the nation's major league ballparks faster than Kentucky bluegrass grows.

"There were so many complaints about rowdiness, drunkenness that families weren't going to the games anymore," says Wally Welpe, an administrative assistant in the baseball commissioner's office in New York.

So far, the Seattle Mariners, Min-

nesota Twins, Atlanta Braves, Chicago Cubs and Pittsburgh Pirates have developed no-alcohol family sections and officials in both leagues say more probably will be started in the 1986 season.

In addition to the family sections, five clubs — the Twins, Chicago White

Sox, Milwaukee Brewers, New York Yankees and the New York Mets — offer both low-alcohol and regular beer. In Detroit, only low-alcohol beer is served at Tigers' games.

The California Angels and Los Angeles Dodgers sell beer only from concession stands and the White Sox, Dodgers, Yankees and Mets all stop selling beer after the seventh inning.

Carl Pohlad, owner of the Minnesota Twins and a strong advocate of family sections in ballparks, is pleased with the section that opened this season at the Hubert H. Humphrey Metrodome in Minneapolis, site of the 1985 All-Star Game.

"I decided that if I'm ever going to

have anything to say about baseball, I'm going to have a section where no drinking is permitted," Pohlad said.

"And if anybody got rowdy or out of line, they'd simply be kicked out."

"For owners like Pohlad, family sections may mean larger profits, better security and a better image. Some of the inspiration comes from disturbances that broke out in Detroit last year after the Tigers won the World Series.

"What happened at Detroit is totally inexcusable," Pohlad said. But while team officials readily acknowledge that they see family sections as a way to boost security, Gary Fine, a sociology professor at the

University of Minnesota, said family sections may create more security headaches.

"If you're segregating the orderly seats, you're also segregating the disorderly people," Fine says. "Now, all the people who drink are going to be together. There's a potential not to be orderly."

Still, Pohlad feels upbeat about the idea.

"We know what type of people make up our attendance," he says. "We have a high percentage of fans. We encourage that, because our future attendance comes from the young people. Baseball is a family game.... But all around, we very

seldom have whole sections with people getting drunk."

Jerry Bell, director of the Metropolitan Sports Stadium Commission in Minneapolis, said the family section concept has responded to a desire by fans.

"I think it's been pretty successful," he said. "It's a family section where, hopefully, the language is a little better."

"I think families should be able to get together and not worry about the police getting rowdy," says Doug DeLahunta, a Maplewood, Minn., resident who attended a recent Twins game at the Metrodome. "It seems like a good idea."

Nieto's hit, his second of the night, came off Los Angeles reliever Ken Howell, 4-4.

Andujar, 14-3, is the winningest pitcher in the major leagues. He fired an eighth-inning hit for his eighth complete game, striking out five and walking five.

It was the Cardinals' 14th victory in 18 games and their eighth straight at home.

Andy Van Slyke opened the eighth by trying out against Howell, the Dodgers' third pitcher. But Pendleton beat out an infield single and stole his

second base of the night preceding Nieto's hit.

Los Angeles, after missing an excellent scoring opportunity in the sixth inning, came up with a run that produced a 2-2 tie in the seventh.

Steve Sax greeted Andujar with an infield single to third base and scored easily when Terry Whitfield, who had entered the game an inning earlier, hit a double to right-center.

## AL: M's top .500 plateau

SEATTLE (AP) — Seattle right-hander Mike Moore celebrated his independence from his slider with a four-hit, 7-1 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers Thursday night.

The Mariners staked Moore to a seven-run lead and he responded with his third complete game of the season.

"He had his really good fastball and his slider was right on target," Seattle catcher Bob Kearney said. "But his slider simply isn't there. He's in love with it, though. I think all four hits were off that slider."

Since I came back from the injury, I simply haven't been able to throw the same game," said Moore, referring to strained thigh muscle that sidelined him for 16 days last month.

"It's not the injury that changed my pitching. I just haven't gotten back into the rhythm I'm used to. But as long as I have my hand on it, I will get with that and the fastball in and away."

In his three starts since he came off the disabled list, Moore has given up just four earned runs in 23 1/3 innings.

"Of course, all our scoring helped tonight," Moore said. "I feel a little nonchalant with that lead. I felt very comfortable and when that's happening I can just go out and throw strikes."

Dave Henderson had four RBIs, including a three-run homer, as Seattle won for the 14th time in its last 19 games. The Mariners' 39-38, passed the .500 mark for the first time since April 22, when they were 7-6.

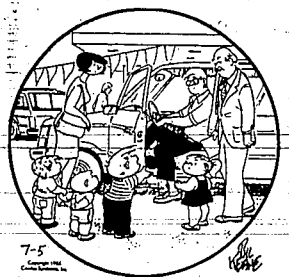
