Presidents of colleges seek funds

BOISE — Idaho's college and university presidents, seeing an opportunity to use their institutions to help rebuild the state's beleaguered economy, have asked the state Board of Education to approve fiscal 1987 spending requests 23 percent higher than the current budget.

"Last year the buzzwords were cooperative programs, and this year the buzzwords seem to be economic development," Richard Gibb, president of the University of Idaho, told the state Board's Finance Committee meeting in Boise Thursday.

Gibb and his colleagues at Boise State University, Idaho State University and Lewis-Clark State College made their budget pitches to the committee for the spending year that begins next July 1. The committee will present its recommendations to the full Board membership at its meeting in Pocatello Sept. 12-13. The Board then will recommend budgets to the Legislature when it convenes in January.

The Finance Committee heard requests from the four state-supported institutions, as well as the College of Southern Idaho, North Idaho College, the statewide public road-casting system and other agencies funded by appropriations to the Board of Education.

In all, the committee was asked to recommend fiscal 1987 spending of nearly \$227 million, an increase of almost \$28.2 or 21.6 percent from the state general fund.

The great bulk of that increase, or more than \$19.8 million, was requested by the four-year universities, which expect no increase in funding from other sources.

Among the fiscal 1987 budget requests presented Thursday were:

- Boise State: \$36.9 million, up \$6 million or 16.6 percent from the current spending year.
- Idaho State: \$30.7 million, up \$4.5 million or 17.4 percent.

• University of Idaho: \$53.7 million, up \$7.8 million or 17 percent.

• Lewis-Clark: \$7.1 million, up \$1.4 million or 24.9 percent.

• Vocational Education: \$21.5 million, up \$2.2 million or about 12 percent.

• Agricultural Research and Extension: \$17.2 million, up \$2.6 million or 17.8 percent.

• CSI: \$7.5 million, a state-funding increase of \$708,900 of nearly 25 percent.

• NIC: \$8.8 million, a state-funding increase of \$736,000 or nearly 25 percent. However, the Coeur d'Alene school expects to receive \$165,200 less from other funding sources during fiscal 1987.

But Charles McQuillen, executive director of the Board, said the political reality was that the 1986 Legislature was unlikely to approve any more than about \$7 million in additional funding for the schools. A 6-percent across-the-board raise for university employees which the Board instructed the institutions to include in their requests was little more than political window dressing, he said, and was almost certain to be rejected.

"By the time we pare it down, you pare it down, the governor pares it down and the Legislature pares it down, we really are nowhere even close to the real needs of education in Idaho," Lewis-Clark President Lee Vickers said.

Still, the university presidents spent Thursday afternoon trying to convince the Finance Committee, chaired by Robert Montgomery, Boise, that increased funding to the schools would pay long-term dividends for the entire state.

Together, the schools proposed allocating almost \$1.76 million during the next spending year for economic development projects. Those included research projects, resource facilities and community outreach programs to extend technological and other training to areas not directly served by the institution.

Money prime key to growth

TWIN FALLS — "Does Twin Falls have the drive to attract business and industry?"

What a question to ask future leaders from the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce! The obvious answer is a thundering "Yes!" Or is it?

Marc Peperzak, president of Aurora Capital Corp., isn't so sure. Although he advocates economic development, Peperzak says the community's answer — particularly the Magic Valley's "old money" — may not be the easy, obvious one.

"I don't know that you've got a majority of people who are really interested in growth," he told business executives in Leadership Twin Falls, a chamber program to train future community leaders.

Some economic soul-searching may reveal a community that is more anxious to hold on to its money than to take the spreading risks of an entrepreneur, Peperzak said.

"We haven't been willing as a community to invest in the infrastructures that are necessary to attract growth," he said.

The public continues to defeat civic and education projects that would spark growth, apparently to avoid higher tax bills. City hall and other governments place administrative roadblocks in the way of development, he said.

And, although a few private investors are quite active, most of the community's money either is sitting on the sidelines in bank accounts or being

sent out of the area, Peperzak said. "It isn't a lack of capital. It's prying that capital away from where it is into productive resources," he said.

Part of the problem with raising money is that the innovative entrepreneurs who made their successes in the Magic Valley years ago now are resting on their bank accounts, Peperzak said. Often neither they nor their successors want to take the risks that fuel growth, he suggested.

There are some sparks plug in the community, one of which is the chamber's economic development thrust. It has gained statewide notice, but also hasn't been the success that chamber leaders have hoped.

The Magic Valley community and its business leaders must work to attract new development and new jobs, Peperzak said.

One way to perk up interest is aggressive

State may support attack on spurge

TWIN FALLS — The State of Idaho may take legal action in the next few days to resume use of herbicides for killing leafy spurge in the Sawtooth National Forest, Attorney General Jim Jones said Thursday.

Fearing proliferation of the noxious weed into farm crops downstream, state officials now want to reinstate the U.S. Forest Service's chemical campaign on at least 500 acres along the South Fork of the Boise River, where leafy spurge has invaded.

Intermountain Region Forester Stan Tixier earlier this week

ordered chemical weed control programs on six southern Idaho forests suspended at the request of the Idaho Natural Resources Legal Foundation Inc.

The Boise-based environmental group formally asked the agency to abide by a federal court decision requiring "a worst case analysis" of the chemical effects of the herbicides on people and on plant life.

Tixier's suspension "will continue until the Forest Service completes an administrative review," Sawtooth Forest spokesman said.

Leafy spurge is a prolific weed that crowds out other plant life.

Botha won't follow 'road ... to suicide'

DURBAN, South Africa — President P.W. Botha rejected the one man, one vote principle for South Africa on Thursday and told his party he would not lead the white minority "on a road to abdication and suicide."

Botha said equal voting rights for all racial groups, including the 21 million blacks who have no vote at all, "would lead to domination of one over the others, and it would lead to chaos."

"I am not prepared to lead white South Africans and other minority groups on a road to abdication and suicide," he said. "Destiny will be South Africa and our influence and this country will drift into factional strife, chaos and poverty."

He indicated no impending change in the "pass laws" that restrict

where blacks can live and work.

The president dashed speculation that he might free Nelson Mandela, 67, leader of the outlawed African National Congress guerrilla group, who has been in prison for 21 years after being convicted of plotting sabotage.

Botha repeated the offer he made in February to release Mandela if he renounced violence, which Mandela refuses to do, and quoted portions of the charges from Mandela's trial that described his purported plans for "violent insurrection and rebellion."

Before Botha spoke, officials and news media reported that police shot and killed four blacks and a 16-year-old boy was killed by a hand grenade thrown into the home of a

mixed-race politician. More than 600 people have died in a year of violence against white rule, all but a few of them black.

Also before the speech, the government announced 10 p.m. to 4 a.m. curfews in some riot-torn black regions around Johannesburg and in the eastern Cape Province.

Botha addressed the convention of his ruling National Party, which has been in office since 1948 and devised the apartheid system of race discrimination that reserves the best of everything for South Africa's 5 million whites.

But after less speculation that the much-heralded speech, which was televised internationally, would announce reforms in response to the year of riot and boycott.

On "influx control," which restricts rural blacks from migrating to white cities where the

Memories fresh of 2,000 missing from World War II

WASHINGTON — He exists only in snapshots and the memories of aging relatives. His last known words were whispered to a buddy through the walls of a Japanese cell-block. No one is certain how he died or where he was buried.

Harry Young, a B-29 tail gunner shot down over Japan in 1945, was one of 2,000 U.S. servicemen from World War II whose remains have never been found or are buried in graves marked "unknown." Many of them were lost at sea.

Forty years after the end of the conflict, the loved ones of the missing are still wondering what happened to their sons. "I don't know what happened to my son," said the mother of a missing pilot. "I don't know what happened to my son," said the mother of a missing pilot.

Six "damage assessment" teams were to start work at daylight Friday, Tom Creaghan, state director of emergency operations, said in Baton Rouge.

"We have experienced pockets of damage, mostly from wind. We don't know the full extent until we actually get out in the field," he said.

"We were tremendously lucky," said Pete Picou, Civil Defense director for Cameron Parish, said in Lake Charles, about 35 miles west of Pecan Point, where the eye of the storm came ashore at 9:10 a.m. MST.

By mid-afternoon, the highest winds were 75 mph in squalls along the coast as the storm swept inland and began dissipating. Forecasters were early in calling it a "dying hurricane," and later downgraded it to a tropical storm.

By late Thursday, its highest sustained winds were 45 mph.

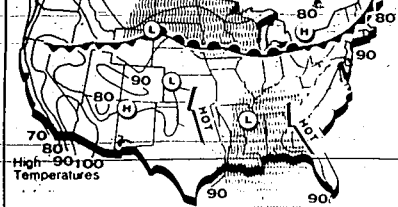

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Botha speech given welcome but U.S. airs disappointment

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration publicly welcomed a speech by South African President P.W. Botha on apartheid Thursday. But privately there was disappointment that it failed to signal a rapid dismantling of segregationist laws.

A top-level administration official, asked if it was fair to characterize the U.S. reaction to the speech as "disappointed," replied, "Yes."

The official had hoped that Botha would signal major changes in apartheid, and announce an end to the state of emergency, giving Reagan some new arguments for opposing economic sanctions.

But even the White House seemed to strain to find something positive in Botha's speech. The cable news service said, "Botha's speech is a step in the right direction."

But in an NBC interview, McFarlane said he thought the South African government should release imprisoned black leader Nelson Mandela. And he told Cable News Network he was disappointed that state of emergency had not been lifted.

McFarlane met last week in Vienna with South African foreign minister, R.F. Botha, at which time he gave a preview of some of the changes South Africa was considering.

But McFarlane said he interpreted Botha's speech as calling for negotiations on "a new constitutional structure." He said it also recognizes the principle of participation for all South Africans in their government.

McFarlane spoke to reporters in Santa Barbara, Calif., where President Reagan is recovering from his recent cancer surgery. He said Reagan had approved the statement.

Sen. Lowell P. Weicker, R-Conn., a co-sponsor of sanctions legislation in the Senate, said the speech was "a vacuum attempt to take the world's eye off the issue of apartheid."

"I would hope that the Senate's response would be quick passage of the sanctions bill and if needs be, an override of a presidential veto," Weicker said in a statement.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., asserted that Botha "dashed all real hope" that the South African government is ready to change its racist ways. Instead of prompt action on genuine reform, we heard the hard-line rhetoric of defiance, confrontation and delay.

"It's now all the more important for Congress to pass the Anti-Apartheid Act as soon as possible — and for President Reagan to sign it into law. The United States has waited too long to stand up for its ideals," Kennedy said.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., said in a statement, "This is an embarrassment for the defenders of 'constructive engagement' — referring to the Reagan administration's term for its policy of seeking to prod South Africa toward reform without resorting to sanctions."

But Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., an opponent of sanctions, applauded Botha's speech, saying: "Reading between the lines, it is clear South Africa is committed to ending apartheid. Common citizenship among races obviously means blacks will in time enjoy equal rights."

Rep. Stephen J. Solarz, D-N.Y., a sponsor of the House-passed sanctions bill, said the Botha speech "will undoubtedly be rejected by virtually the entire recognized and legitimate black leadership of South Africa" for not even meeting their minimal expectations.

"To call it too little too late would be to do it wrong. It is clearly not entitled," he said in a statement in Kenya and released by his Washington office. "The reaffirmation of the government's commitment to the 'homelands policy' coupled with its refusal to unconditionally release Nelson Mandela means that it is business as usual, rather than the dawn of a new era in South Africa."

The White House and State Department called on Pretoria earlier in the week to take steps to give "political rights" to the black majority. The common interpretation of political rights is one-man, one-vote.

Obey decision but give service, schools advised

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary William J. Bennett told school officials Thursday they must continue serving poor parochial school students while complying with a Supreme Court decision aimed at keeping church and state separate.

The 5-4 majority said the so-called "shared time" programs eroded the Constitution's requirement of separation of church and state.

The court on July 1 struck down programs in New York City and Grand Rapids, Mich., in which public school teachers were conducting classes in religiously affiliated private schools.

Bennett, who has called the ruling "terrible and 'badly reasoned,'" told administrators in a letter Thursday that education agencies "must make every diligent effort to comply with the court's decision as soon as possible."

Thousands tour Elvis' mansion

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Thousands of fans toured Elvis Presley's mansion and visited his grave Thursday, paying tribute to the "king of rock 'n' roll" with poems, flowers and photographs before the eighth anniversary of his death.


A week of tributes and events dedicated to Presley, who died Aug. 16, 1977, was centered on a memorial service and candlelight march late Thursday. The event was expected to attract 10,000 or more fans, said officials of Graceland Enterprises Inc., which operates the mansion as a tourist attraction.

The services were begun 1982.

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New study raises 'caution flag' about safety of pesticide aldicarb

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — A new study raises a "caution flag" about the safety of the pesticide aldicarb, which sickened hundreds this summer when improperly used on California watermelons, scientists said Thursday.

Researchers at the University of Wisconsin-Madison found that the widely used pesticide can affect immune systems of laboratory mice at doses now considered safe in drinking water.

But they said they could draw no conclusions from the study whether levels of aldicarb that have been found in water in some areas of Wisconsin, New York, Florida and other states are hazardous to health.

"At this time we do not have any hard evidence there is a health risk from ingestion of aldicarb in very low concentrations," said the chief scientist of the UW's bacteriology department, told a news conference. "We do have a caution flag."

"He said the researchers regard their work as preliminary."

"At this point we have probably 10 questions and every answer we have," Hinsdill said.

Aldicarb, produced by mixing aldicarb oxime and methyl isocyanate.

Union Carbide scientists said they remained confident that aldicarb is safe when used properly and poses no health hazard in the extremely small concentrations in which it shows up in water.

Mertyl Isocyanate leaked last December at a Union Carbide plant at Bhopal, India, killing more than 2,000 people. A leak of aldicarb oxime Sunday at the company's Institute, W.Va., plant sent 135 people to the hospital with eye and respiratory irritations. Two people remained hospitalized Thursday.

Jeffrey Charles, a Union Carbide toxicologist from Research Triangle Park, N.C., said if aldicarb harms the immune systems of mammals, it would have showed up in the form of increased mortality and illnesses in countless laboratory animals involv-

ed in previous studies. "But Hinsdill said virtually all conventional experiments on the safety of chemicals have a basic flaw: they test only one chemical at a time on animals that are otherwise fed and housed under ideal conditions that do not reflect interactions and stresses that occur in the nonlaboratory environment."

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Removal of PCBs costs near million

WASHINGTON (AP) — The General Services Administration said Thursday it will cost \$982,000 to remove potentially hazardous PCB chemicals from 33 electrical transformers serving the White House complex and three other federal office centers in Washington.

The White House announced last week that the two electrical transformers in the executive office complex had leaked PCBs.

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Cycle of indecision grips South Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa—The sheer magnitude of anti-apartheid protests here and the viciousness of black revolt, which have become almost a way of life, tend to obscure the more immediate concern.

South Africa has leaped into world attention with a primeval scream. Millions of people who once knew of the country only as a region of gold, wildlife and apartheid might now believe that it is descending into hell.

They open their newspapers, turn on the television set and are confronted by horrifying accounts of a South Africa that is in the process of self-immolation: riots, killings, political funerals, mass arrests, a state of emergency, warnings of gloom and doom. Mob rule, police oppression and human misery are presented as the omens of revolution in yet another banana republic.

Heroes and villains spring from the news pages like lava from the bowels of an African volcano. Bishop Desmond Tutu, President Pieter W. Botha, Long imprisoned black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela, Chief Minister Mangosuthu Buthe, the police, the army, the oppressed millions in their segregated townships and homelands.

The clamor stirs even the humdrum world of foreign relations. Governments, socialist and conservative, are prodded into action by outraged popular opinion.

Fifteen countries the United States and European Community nations included have recalled temporarily, and in some cases permanently, their ambassadors or heads of missions. Their excuses are various, their concerns the same: No longer can they afford to associate with a government that is unwilling or unable to respond to the political demands of its greater population.

But why the clamor now, when apartheid is less evident in the streets and buildings of South Africa than it has ever been in the 37 years of white National Party rule?

The oppression, though racially motivated, is no worse than it is in many countries of Africa. The unrest has not yet spread beyond the bounds of the black townships — and even then not all are in uproar.

In cities like Johannesburg, Cape Town and Durban there are scores of restaurants and hotels where the races are not only colorfully mingle. There are multiracial theaters.



playgrounds, schools and universities; members of all races join in sports and public debates. Membership in political parties is no longer restricted to a single race. People of different races can marry or share sex without prosecution. Even though the law still prohibits blacks from living in white cities and towns, the authorities have turned a blind eye to several suburbs that have quietly become multiracial. It is likely that, pretty soon, these suburbs will receive legal sanction.

Township blacks are still denied land-ownership rights and are prohibited from forming a shop. Laws of influx control prohibit them from either living or traveling freely, but leaders in the government have already indicated that these laws are about to be either scrapped or "softened."

Not all townships are squalid and uncomfortable ghettos. For example, Soweto, the huge black township outside Johannesburg, is probably better off than are many cities of the Third World. The township also boasts several sumptuous residences that wouldn't be out of place in Beverly Hills.

These are facts, but they don't tell the full story. Just as the accounts of violence and insecurity are only part of the picture. For the issue

at stake is no longer apartheid itself but the retention or relinquishment of power.

In this context no amount of social reform alone can satisfy the demands of blacks for a share in governing the country. So the issue now is political power.

President Botha and his lieutenants recognize that should no longer practice as a doctrine. On one side are the apartheid purists who believe that it is the only way to maintain white supremacy; on the other side are the reformists, like Botha, who are dismantling apartheid, but only where it was tied to the very people whom it was designed to protect: the whites.

The major problem has always been how to give political representation to the 40-black majority, yet still retain power in the hands of whites.

Contained and undirected as it is, the current unrest is still far from threatening the seat of power. Until that happens, or until the violence subsides, the country seems caught in a cycle of indecision: revolt because of political rights denied, and a denial of rights because of revolt.

We can't get growth without investment

A growing gap between Idaho's population and its employment opportunities will hamstring the state's efforts to hold its coming generation of workers, primarily 18-to-24-year-olds, who will thus be forced to find employment elsewhere.

That conclusion, from a state Department of Commerce administrator David Porter, highlights a serious problem Idaho faces in the years ahead: how to compensate in a resource-rich state for a decline in the value of those resources?

Porter's view is to look beyond world commodity production — which he says is rampant — to develop new markets for secondary products. But perhaps even more difficult is getting Idaho people to think in long-range terms and plan for the changes.

Porter, a native of Rexburg, is critical of his home state's abilities in this regard. He says he is "flabbergasted" at "the number of times people in Idaho vote against their own interests."

To improve its position, the state, he says, should also focus on widening its efforts to help already-existing companies expand. For that, he says, the new Department of Commerce is an excellent vehicle, but one which will fall short unless it is adequately funded.

Porter is no pie-in-sky spendthrift. He knows that revitalization depends on people having investment income; the state, he says, does far too little to encourage entrepreneurial activity.

He doesn't say it directly, but he leaves the clear implication that, if these problems aren't addressed, the state will continue to stagnate, its growth eroded by weakness in markets for its resources.

In the end, he says, it comes down to questions of leadership, an appropriate subject for the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce's Leadership seminar, which has been meeting monthly for nearly a year.

How, he implies, can Idahoans identify the qualities they want to keep in the state, and preserve them, while encouraging growth, entrepreneurial activity and broad thinking?

Porter has no monopoly on such questions, nor on the broad range of answers available. But he is doing a good deal of the critical thinking necessary for the answers to be found.

One lesson of his talk is that Idaho cannot have development on the cheap. Failure to adequately fund important components like agricultural research, development promotion through the new Commerce Department and regressive funding on key educational programs will all cost us dearly in the long run.

Porter knows that, and so do many Idahoans, both in and out of the political process. But translating that knowledge into policies and programs which work is another matter. And that is what economic leadership is all about.

A1-Ateen is a group sponsored by Al-Anon that is for teenagers who have an alcoholic parent or

parents, sibling or friend. In A1-Ateen teenagers can come together and learn about the disease of alcoholism, find they are not alone in their emotional pain, and share their feelings with peers who understand. A1-Ateen gives them the tools to cope with their emotional pain and to feel better about themselves regardless of the home situation.

Even though A1-Ateen is not available in the schools, it is available in Twin Falls on Monday nights at 8 p.m. at the Presbyterian Church. For further information can be obtained by calling 733-8300.

I hope one day the public and the schools will become aware of the need to help children of alcoholics and do something about it.

Proper use of American force requires sense, judgment

The New Right has indulged in some heavy Reagan-bashing recently, and the administration's response to international terrorism.

It asserts that our failure to take reprisals for (and perhaps pre-empt) specific acts of anti-American terrorism, such as the hijacking of TWA Flight 847 and the killing of U.S. military personnel in El Salvador and West Germany, signals a great national weakness. That, in turn, undermines the image of American resolve and destroys the credibility of our capacity to use force.

By extension, pernicious American inaction contaminates other national interests — principally our relations with the Soviet Union. The New Right argues that our refusal to react forcefully to terrorist acts will be interpreted in Moscow as a sign of in-

creasing softness in America's hard-line policies, an intolerable outcome.

That line of reasoning contains some fundamental errors about international politics, errors having to do with the way the United States is perceived by those meant to be influenced by a show of force, and with the utility of force to achieve certain political ends.

Americans who believe that the international community (including the Soviet Union) views the United States as a bashful, reluctant protagonist, unwilling to use

military force to protect its interests, are taking little note of the history of the past 40 years. I just wrote the anniversary of the Hiroshima atomic bombing was clearly marked. The United States remains the only nation to have used nuclear weapons against an enemy.

Since 1945 the United States has fought in two major conflicts, Korea and Vietnam. In them, millions of Chinese, North Koreans, and Vietnamese lives were lost or wounded. The United States has employed force to advance its interests about 250 times since 1945, in various lesser diplomatic crises.

In the fall of 1983 the United States successfully intervened in Grenada to protect U.S. citizens and ultimately to re-establish a democratic government. In 1985 the United States will appropriate \$30 billion for

defense, representing an increase of more than 50 percent in annual defense spending since 1980. Few observers, including Mikhail S. Gorbachev and his colleagues in the Kremlin, are likely to be entirely unimpressed by that record.

It is true that Secretary of Defense Caspar W. Weinberger has called for strong restrictions on the use of U.S. military force. Every administration must act responsibly on military matters. Force cannot be exercised lightly and when it is used it must be employed effectively. Force must work.

Preventing and punishing terrorism are among the most difficult purposes for military force to achieve, particularly when harm to innocent bystanders is not acceptable.

The course of action that the administra-

tion has chosen in the face of terrorism is responsible, though difficult. While critics insist that it shows weakness, a survey of most our adversaries and allies finds great concern (if not outright fear) about American power and our capacity to use it.

Force will be neither upset nor overjoyed by that general perception. As long as we determine with sense, judgment and understanding when and where we must exercise force — whether for preventing acts of terrorism or protecting vital U.S. interests — that international perception is to our advantage.

I'd like her to believe in heroes, especially a new American hero, a hero that has a high degree of justice and patriotism and a thirst for excitement associated with him.

A Coleco Industries spokesman described the Rambo doll that way, and I had to admit it sounded good. Justice is an important ideal around my house; Barbie and Baby Dear and those squishy little frecks from the Cabbage Patch just don't make it on that score.

I hadn't planned to go see Sly Stallone in Vietnam, revisionism about those dark days not being my thing, but Coleco's announcement let me no choice. If you've got a job like mine you can't afford to ignore cultural trends as they gather, and obviously something powerful was rumbling around Mythermia.

I was worried about Rambo. Why did

"First Blood: Part II" earned the third-largest opening gross (span the introductory movie history? Why did Americans love it when President Reagan boasted during the lensest days at Beirut airport that now he'd know just what to do next time, by golly?

Reading the reviews only increased my anxiety. Just when it seemed a stake had been driven through the black heart of macho, up came Rambo, shooting and slashing his way through the jungle. Up he came, a man-machine single-handedly rescuing a tiger-cageful of POWs from Charlie and Ivan, wasting the chicken-hearts in the Army bureaucracy to boot: I'm coming after you, Murdock. Up he came, an inchoate Natty Bumppo wandering through Vietnam, our new frontier, armed like Leatherstocking

with a knife (what a knife! a bow and napalm arrows. Whose first blood wouldn't curdle?)

That they planned to turn this stupefyingly violent, proliferate moron into an icon drove me nuts. Anyone who lived through the last two decades understands that absolute violence corrupts absolutely, and I hardly need to remind you that we've already wasted by Goxels, Transformers, Masters of the Universe and Tobit — turned into terminal killer couch-potatoes by the Sly doll.

Then I went to see the movie — twice. I can't believe it. I cheered me right up. I saw a 5 p.m. show on a Thursday — the sparse audience gave me a good, healthy laugh. Nothing too astonishing there — they probably actually fought in the war; I figured, and the Vietnam vets I know have excellent radar. I went again on Saturday night — and the teen-agers laughed.

Rambo: He develops isn't a hero — he's a parody. People go to see him for kicks.

Rambo is so dumb he's already a joke. Beneath the oily pretorsals, beneath the sweaty sweatband rippling from the hem of a slipin' man's gown, beneath the slack, jawed sullen gaze is our funny valentine.

Americans may dig vicarious violence, but they aren't stupid and they don't want their heroes invented for them by a gaggle of movie-marketing goons.

I further have my doubts about the Rambo doll because I think you mess, even 10 years later, with Vietnam at your peril. No one could predict that the Vietnam veteran would become one of the most powerful figures of our generation, but it's happened. If you don't I count the number of public figures who have falsified their Vietnam service to their resumes and been busted for it. The other fakes.

The question remains whether people who lived through Vietnam and who must compare Coleco's target market will spend

money on a "toy" that makes a joke of one of our larger national griefs, a toy that confuses thirst for justice with lust for murder, a toy that's so extravagantly racist and so exploitatively patriotic that it's a little like war and all the dying it entails, a little like that dubious: Going to a dopey movie is one thing, endorsing a lie entirely another.

I asked someone who spent his time 15 years ago flying reconnaissance missions in Thailand and North Vietnam. He doubts there are any POWs left alive — I saw them go down, time after time, into the jungle — no chutes, no flares, no beacons," he said. He's proud he served; he got "kind of a stupid kick" out of Rambo.

So will he buy a doll for his kids? Should I buy one?

"Are you crazy?" he said. "I wouldn't dream of betraying those guys that way."

CBO warns of continuing deep red ink

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Congressional Budget Office, less optimistic than the Reagan administration about the strength of the economy, said Thursday that federal deficits will remain far above the level Congress expected when it approved a fiscal 1988 spending plan.

But CBO Director Rudolph G. Penner said the budget still represents "dramatic progress in attacking the deficit."

The CBO, in a report to the Senate and House Budget committees, estimated the deficit for the year beginning Oct. 1 would be \$175 billion. New red ink would decline to \$163 billion in fiscal 1987 and \$143 billion in 1988, it said.

When Congress passed its budget Aug. 1, it assumed deficits of \$172 billion in fiscal 1986, \$155 billion in 1987 and \$113 billion in 1988. The administration, working to update its estimate, expects about \$125 billion in red ink by 1988, officials have said.

The deficit for the current fiscal year is

estimated at \$210 billion, and would grow to \$243 billion by 1988 without the changes outlined in the budget, the CBO said.

In its forecast, the CBO also estimated:

- Annual inflation will be 3.7 percent this year, rise to 4.5 percent next year but then drop to 4.4 percent in 1987 and 4.2 percent in 1988.
- The average civilian unemployment rate will gradually decline from 7.2 percent this year to 7.0 percent next year, 6.8 percent in 1987 and 6.6 percent in 1988.
- Interest rates, as measured by the annual average of three-month Treasury bills, would drop slightly, from 7.6 percent this year to 7.4 percent next year, leveling off at 7.2 percent after that.

The administration and Congress started this year with the goal of cutting deficits below \$100 million a year by fiscal 1988. The CBO report indicated the balance sheet will fall far short of that goal even if Congress obeys the spending guidelines in its budget.

Penner said that while his deficit estimates were higher than those of the budget or the ad-

ministration, he "can't help but be upbeat" about Congress' action, which he called "a major change in spending policy."

"As recently as last February... (we) were worried about policies taking us to \$300 billion (deficits)," Penner said, referring to a February 1984 CBO report.

Still, he said, if Congress backs off the spending cuts or if the economy falters, things could get worse. "They don't allow for any margin of safety" in the budget, he said.


Penner said the CBO deficit estimates were higher because the agency does not share the administration's expectation that the economy will "boom." Most private economists also have called the administration's growth estimates too optimistic.

Slower growth reduces expected tax revenues while increased interest rates, still at historically high levels, push up the government's borrowing costs.

The CBO forecast that the economy, as measured by the gross national product, would rebound in the second half of calendar 1985.

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Abolition of hiring goals hit

WASHINGTON (AP) — Civil rights and labor groups Thursday sharply criticized a Reagan administration draft proposal to abolish requirements that businesses with government contracts set numerical goals for hiring women and minorities.

The draft proposal circulated on Capitol Hill and among civil rights groups, as well as within the administration, would repeal much of Executive Order 11426, signed by President Lyndon B. Johnson in 1965.

Government spokesmen said the draft revision of the order, which had gone virtually undisturbed through the administrations of Richard M. Nixon, Gerald R. Ford and Jimmy Carter, was prepared for President Reagan's consideration.

At a news briefing in Santa Barbara, Calif., White House spokesman Larry Speakes said the proposal had not yet been taken up by the Cabinet Council on Domestic Policy, and "therefore, it has no standing whatsoever as administration policy."

Speakes said Reagan had indicated many times that he "opposes discrimination in all forms," including the practices of government contractors. But at the same time, the spokesman said, Reagan "opposes numerical quotas as a means for achieving equality."

Speakes, who is with the vacationing president, said the matter will be discussed by the Cabinet council, but that he did not know whether revisions in the existing executive order would result from those meetings.

The regulations affect up to 73,000 private firms that employ an estimated 35 million workers.

A draft version of the new order, obtained by The Associated Press from non-governmental sources, said that under its provisions, a government contractor would no longer be required "to utilize any numerical quota, goal or ratio" to remedy discrimination based on race, sex, religion or national origin.

"Nor shall any government contractor or subcontractor be determined to have violated this order due to a failure to adopt or attain any statistical measures," the three-page document said.

It said that compliance with general equal employment opportunity objectives would be judged by a firm's "demonstrated non-discriminatory treatment of its employees and potential employees, irrespective of the number of minorities and women recruited, trained, hired or promoted."

Judge rules documents may be used

BALTIMORE (AP) — A bag of classified Navy documents that John A. Walker Jr. admitted leaving along a roadside may be used in his espionage trial, a judge ruled Thursday.

But he disallowed some statements made by Walker after his arrest.

U.S. District Judge Alexander Harvey II said it was legal for FBI agents to seize the paper grocery bag without a search warrant because Walker had abandoned it, without identification marks and with trash piled atop the inch-thick stack of 120 documents taped in a white plastic bag.

A lawyer for Walker, Thomas Mason, confirmed at the pretrial hearing that the retired Navy communications expert had dropped the bag along the road at Footesville, northwest of Washington, D.C., on May 19 and returned twice to see if the transfer had gone according to plans and if his "contact" had left a "delivery."

Mason argued that Walker retained ownership of the bag and that the FBI's seizure of the property was an invasion of privacy.

But Harvey said that when Walker left the documents in a trash bag 12 feet from the edge of a rural road, he "could hardly have a reasonable expectation of privacy."

Inspection of fleet started by airline

TOKYO (AP) — Japan Air Lines began a government-ordered inspection of the world's largest fleet of Boeing 747s on Thursday after the Transport Ministry said a failure in the jumbo jet's tail section may have caused it to crash, killing 520 people.

Only four people survived the crash Monday on a remote mountain ridge. It was the world's worst single-plane air disaster.

The 747SR, specially designed for high-volume, short distance routes, lost part of its vertical stabilizer, then veered off course and crashed. The stabilizer and other parts of the plane's tail section were found in the sea, about 90 miles from the crash site, on the route the aircraft had followed before the pilot lost his way and reported he was losing control of the plane.

"The circumstances seem to indicate that the damage to the vertical stabilizer and the rudders might be the starting point of the accident," the Transport Ministry said.

In Washington, the Federal Aviation Administration was awaiting more information on the accident before deciding whether to order inspections of 747s operated by U.S. airlines, a spokesman said.

"If the early inspections of the Japanese aircraft show a pattern of problems that could lead to something similar, then we would want to take a look at ours," spokesman Fred Farrar said.

An FAA statement Thursday noted that no U.S. carriers use 747SRs.

JAL said about 250 bodies had been

recovered from Flight 123, which had taken off from Tokyo bound for Osaka. Tetsuo Ishihara, a spokesman for Gunma state police, said 95 had been identified by relatives.

Six Americans were among the 22 foreigners killed.

Hundreds of workers wearing surgical masks continued the search for bodies at the crash site on 5,400-foot Mt. Osutaka, 70 miles northeast of Tokyo.

Helicopters were taking bodies to Fukuoka, 25 miles from the crash site, for identification. Kyodo News Service said a few of the 2,000 relatives and friends, assembled at Fukuoka at JAL's expense to help identify victims, were allowed to visit the crash site Thursday, in keeping with Japanese custom.

Tomiko Yoshizawa, a JAL spokeswoman, said maintenance workers began tail inspections at Tokyo International Airport with the first 747 the airline bought from Boeing Commercial Airplane Co. in 1970. She said the plane, which has 53,000 flight hours, had just arrived from Hong Kong.

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Boat sinks 2 hours short of setting crossing mark

LONDON (AP) — The British powerboat Virgin Atlantic Challenger hit an underwater object and capsized Thursday night off southwest England, less than two hours away from achieving the fastest surface crossing of the Atlantic.

All nine crewmen, including Richard Branson, millionaire owner of Virgin Records and Virgin Atlantic Airlines, climbed aboard two life rafts and were picked up by the British cargo ship Geesby, voyage spokesman Alan Hughes said in London.

"We will build another boat and try again," Branson, 34, said after the crewmen were taken by Royal Navy helicopter to the Scilly Isles, which had been their destination.

"We won't be beaten. Although none of us wants to go again, none of us will give up that easily," he told a news conference.

Skipper Ted Telesman said the crew heard a bang and then the boat slowed. "We definitely hit something, but we don't know what," he said.

Pope declares martyr

KINSHASA, Zaïre (AP) — Pope John Paul II on Thursday proclaimed a 25-year-old nun as black Africa's first woman martyr of the Roman Catholic Church, and publicly forgave the soldier who killed her for resisting his rape attempt.

The pope, on the eighth day of his 12-day African tour, beatified Sister Anuarite Nengapeta before Zaïre President Mobutu Sese Seko and 60,000 people at an outdoor Mass.

Beatification is an important step toward sainthood.

Mary Clementine Anuarite, as blessed, a martyr of the faith among you.

Diverting from his prepared text, the pope referred to Anuarite's convicted killer, former Col. Pierre Opende Olombe, who had asked in vain to meet the pope to express remorse.

"I-myself, in the name of the whole church, forgive (him) with all my heart," John Paul said.

Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro said Olombe "got what he wanted" — papal absolution for his crime. He added, "The Holy Father forgave not only Olombe, but all the other soldiers who may have been involved" in Anuarite's murder.

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Blaine hospital board warily views merger

HAYLEY — If it was opportunity that knocked on the door of the Blaine County Medical Center Wednesday night, it was fear and distrust — though cordial — that greeted it.

After a proposal by Sun Valley's Moritz Community Hospital to take over the administration of the medical center was presented, several of the BCMC board members said they were concerned the Hayley-based hospital might relinquish its independence to Sun Valley if it accepted the offer.

"You crossed yourself by saying you work for us but your boss is in Sun Valley. That leaves Blaine County Medical Center in second place," said board member Del Winslow — while questioning Mark

Christensen, the Moritz controller who the Sun Valley board proposes to administer the Hayley hospital.

"I can't buy that and neither can the people in the south county," Winslow said.

Although Winslow was more open about her distrust of the Sun Valley proposal, others gave a similar concern.

"They asked Christensen and Moritz Director Al Stevenson where their allegiance would lie with them or with Moritz. They wanted to know if the Moritz board

could assure the loyalty of the two administrators to the Blaine County facility if a conflict arose between the two hospitals.

"It appears to me there would be a conflict of interest when they are charged with running their hospital and a conflict comes up," said Kendall Kinghorn, chairman of the BCMC board.

Kinghorn said he was concerned with the proposed management contract being with the Moritz board and not with Stevenson and Christensen.

The two Sun Valley administrators told the board there was no hidden agenda within the proposal. Under the three-year contract, Moritz would replace Christensen and he would be a full-time administrator in Hayley, Stevenson said.

Christensen's services would be used at Moritz, but Stevenson would also lend his expertise to the Hayley hospital, he said.

The proposal calls for each board to retain control over its hospital while the two make proposals for sharing services to each board.

Christensen said the two would work to build the trust between the two hospitals that would eventually lead to their consolidation.

"In our format, you aren't going to do anything you don't want to do, and Moritz isn't going to do anything they don't want to do," Stevenson said.

"Moritz isn't going to tell your board what to do," he said.

Stevenson said the Moritz board realizes the burden will be on him and Christensen to perform under the contract.

At the end of the three years, or sooner because the contract has a 90-day escape clause, he said the county board can fire them if they haven't performed adequately.

The county board did agree with the Sun Valley people on one point: the two hospitals will find it increasingly difficult to operate separately in a market that is becoming more and more competitive.

Kinghorn and BCMC board member Terry Hogue said they support the eventual consolidation of the two hospitals at a centralized location to the county's population.

Sun Valley's selling point is saving money. See HOSPITALS on Page A8

Range fire burns unchecked

Man-caused blaze rapidly consumes more than 10,000 acres

THREE CREEK — A fast moving range fire spread over 10,000 acres of public and private land between Roseworth and Three Creek Thursday afternoon and evening.

Bureau of Land Management officials in the Boise District reported the fire was man-caused and started about 1 p.m. on the House Creek Road that leads from Roseworth to the Three Creek Road. Within a few minutes it had jumped the road, burning along both sides.

Fire Dispatcher Pat Shanafelt of Boise said there were no indications late Thursday night when it could be controlled.

"It has turned into a pretty ugly situation out there now. The fire is burning into the breaks area toward Brown's Bench and is in rough terrain. If it continues into that area it is going to be mostly hand work," he said. "We are just hoping that by midnight it will cool down and give us a little moisture to help slow it down."

Shanafelt said there were 108 firefighters on the fire Thursday night from the Burley, Shoshone and Boise districts. They were using 15 engines, three bulldozers, three large water tenders and five smaller pump-pumper units as well as a helicopter supported by the main power. An aerial reconnaissance fixed wing plane was overhead directing fire crews and equipment.

Reports from the scene at 10 p.m.

The fire was moving on two fronts, heading south on the Three Creek and House Creek roads around Signal Butte. It was also burning west of Salmon Dam in the Mount-John Springs region.

The Twin Falls County sheriff's office dispatched officers to the scene about 6 p.m. to assist with traffic because the fire was jumping the roads in the area. Officers and reserves were expected to remain at the scene throughout the night.

At one point livestock belonging to Gerald Tewes appeared to be threatened and officers said Tewes was at the scene assisting fire fighting efforts. Shanafelt said there are numerous fences, private grazing land and some remote ranches in the area that could be in danger.

Last unresolved clause in contract upsets teachers at TFEA meeting

TWIN FALLS — About 40 Twin Falls public school teachers met last night to discuss the last unresolved clause in the 1984-85 teachers contract at a meeting Thursday night, said one of the teachers.

The school board's proposed clause would limit both actions against teachers for union activity and "concerted actions" by teachers. Teachers expressed "overwhelming sentiment" that they felt the clause would severely limit their constitutional rights and that the school board was not willing to compromise as the teachers did earlier, said Ray Grubbs, president of the Twin Falls Education Association.

The informational and advisory meeting was called by the TFEA executive board and held for one and a half hours at the First United Methodist Church. The executive board

and other union officials met to discuss the meeting and sort the advice afterwards in their downtown office, but reported no decision about the clause had been reached.

"Everyone had a chance to say what they thought," Grubbs said. "But no vote was taken. It wasn't a ratification meeting."

The teachers discussed their feelings about the impact of the clause on their constitutional rights after the Idaho Education Association's assistant executive director Chuck Lentz relayed the IEA's lawyer's interpretation of the clause.

"There was a very strong reaction," Grubbs said. "They feel their rights are being slowly taken away." He added, "They feel the (school) board does not understand the teachers. Low morale is due to no settlement, to argue the possibility of depriving their rights throughout the whole negotiation process."

The teachers said they were also upset with the district not accep-

ting a compromise on language on strike settlement while the TFEA made major concessions on other items that the factfinder decided in their favor," Grubbs said. "They feel they are slowly being stripped of their civil rights."

Grubbs reported that the executive committee is still studying the teacher comments and is willing to generalize the opinions to the majority of public school teachers.

"It was productive," he said. "They want protections. Fewer than we hoped came, but those that did reflect most of the district."

Lentz told the teachers the clause has two interpretations: the TFEA's and the school board's, Grubbs said. Grubbs said that the board said it was willing to define "concerted activity" in negotiation minutes, although he wasn't sure what the definition would be. He added that he believed the board said it would define it based on findings of the U.S. Labor Relations Board.

Council adopts 43.8% increase on Kimberly sewer system charges

KIMBERLY — New sewer charges, showing a 43.8 percent increase for residences and businesses in Kimberly, were adopted this week by the Kimberly City Council.

Council members also approved a 10 percent increase in water rates within the city. The water increase will be \$1 per month on a flat fee basis to all water users.

City Clerk Edythe Widmer said the city of Kimberly, which transports its sewage via an interceptor pipeline to the Twin Falls City Treatment facility for disposal, must make up a \$16,254 deficit that Twin Falls says it owes because ac-

tual volume exceeded estimates last year.

Next year, Kimberly residents and businesses must collectively provide \$9,113 per month to cover treatment costs. This compares to \$5,636 per month the city was billed this year by the city of Twin Falls.

Widmer said the city began transporting sewage from Kimberly to the large Twin Falls treatment plant in the Snake River Canyon in 1976. At that time, the cost was \$330 per month. In the nearly 10 years since, the charges have multiplied about eight times, she said, although there are no new businesses in Kimberly and very little residential growth.

At the council meeting Tuesday,

Kimberly officials also approved an expenditure of about \$600 for an 18-day test to determine just how much sewage Kimberly is sending into the Twin Falls plant and how the figures compare with what Kimberly is being charged.

Mayor Ron Jones explained a meeting was held last week with Twin Falls city officials to discuss the sewer fees. It was decided at that time that flow measurements will be taken every day during the 18-day period. One will be taken by a Twin Falls city technician, he said, and another by J-U-B engineers for a comparison. Flow calculations by Kimberly and Twin Falls in the past have shown a wide discrepancy over the past year.

Vasquez to run for council

TWIN FALLS — Ernest Vasquez announced Thursday he would make a second attempt at election to the Twin Falls City Council in November.

Vasquez, 50, came in sixth out of seven candidates running for the council in 1983 and was not elected. "This time he thinks he will have a better chance, however."

"You have to pay your dues," Vasquez says. "I want to show people I'm still trying — that I'm serious about this. They get to know you better, know your views on issues (in the second election)."

Vasquez has criticized the council in the past, and in 1984 he served as chairman of the Citizens' Committee Against Consolidation of the city police and fire departments. Firefighters collected enough signatures to put an initiative on the ballot to halt consolidation. Voters passed the initiative, but the council voted to continue consolidation anyway.

"I would listen to the people and be responsive to the wishes of the people," Vasquez says. "I, as a citizen, resent being told by elected officials — who I elected — what is good or not good for me, when I voted at the polls against consolidation."

"I have been critical of the council's disregard for the wishes of the people, period," he says. "They have lately been more receptive, but you have to remember this — it's an election year."

He continues to believe that consolidation of police and fire

money available in the budget and then "mobilize people to volunteer their time, money, resources, shovels, picks — get kids, Boy Scouts, whomever," he says.

If Jerome could build a wading pool with volunteer effort, Twin Falls should be able to find help from its people, also, he says.

"It would give people the feeling that they personally built it," he says. "I have confidence in the people here."

Vasquez, who manages the Douglas Hotel on Shoshone Street, says working-class people are not represented on the council now. He would be attuned to the needs of those people, he says, but he also emphasizes that he is also interested in promoting business interests.

He would like to have all parking meters removed from downtown. "If Bull can do it, so can Twin Falls," he says.

The City Council needs to work to attract "good, clean businesses like electronic firms," he says. "There are a lot of firms that would like to come to Idaho if we reduced the state income tax. He lists low taxes and "a nice place to live" as incentives.

"I agree very much with what the Chamber of Commerce is doing," he says. "The proposal for an Evel Knievel memorial, which was ridiculed, was a sound idea — one that should be pursued. I think tourism will be the number one money maker in years to come."

Vasquez has lived in Twin Falls since 1979. Until recently, he served as chairman of the South Central Community Action Agency. He was a member of the board for five years.

Boise's phone bank had a different manager than the operation in Twin Falls.

The negative publicity from Boise, however, is disturbing to Jim Eubanks who is managing Judent's phone bank in Twin Falls.

Christensen said he estimates the arrangement could save from \$85,000 to \$100,000 in the 1987 year of the contract.

Much of the savings would come from Moritz replacing the management contract now held by Holy Cross Health Management Services.

When questioned by the board about experience, Stevenson replied, "It's good to have experience, but it's even better to have results."

Moritz is asking for \$50,000 a year, \$25,000 to \$40,000 less than what it estimates the county is paying Holy Cross each year.

The Blaine County Board of Commissioners has a request, however, for tax support. Stevenson says Moritz is financially sound and is not using tax money for operations.

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Leroy threatens to force spending cuts

BOISE — Democratic Gov. John Evans must act immediately to cut state spending or "there could be a budget crisis by the end of the year," Lt. Gov. David Leroy contended here Thursday.

Leroy told a Boise news conference he's prodding the governor to order an immediate budget cutback. If Evans does not, Leroy said he will ask the two Republican members of the Board of Examiners to take the action on their own.

"At a later Idaho Falls news conference, Leroy said Idaho's apparent financial problems should be handled by the governor, not through the expensive process of a special legislative session.

"In any business, the chief executive officer, faced with a revenue shortfall, would simply cut back on spending to make expenses match with revenue," Leroy said. "That's what the governor should do. It's high time he got back to the business of running the state and did his constitutional duty to balance the budget."

"We need to act now, and we should have acted yesterday," Leroy said in Boise. He estimates the state will be at least \$12 million in the red by the end of its budget year next July. If action is taken now to impose spending limitations, it will be less painful than if huge cuts have to be made later in the budget year, he

Leroy said. Evans was in Twin Falls for a meeting but budget director Marty Peterson said Leroy has not asked the governor directly to order a spending holdback.

"I don't see anything new in this," said Peterson. "I think he (Leroy) is trying to get some headlines."

Evans met with budget officials here and his legislative leaders. The governor said he would not impose future spending holdbacks or

cuts without support from legislative leaders.

Peterson said in those meetings in the last two months, Republican leaders have shown little support for a holdback.

House Speaker Tom Silvers, in a recent Boise news conference, said he felt there was no need to take budget action now, a few weeks into the state budget year. Silvers said the state budget could just as easily show a \$30 million surplus as an \$8 million deficit.

Leroy sidestepped questions why he's demanding a holdback when leaders of his own party, even the two GOP members of the Board of Examiners, have not done so. He also refused to discuss suggestions the Legislature should take the blame for any budget deficit this year.

Instead, Leroy contended the need is so apparent that the governor is shirking his duty by not ordering a holdback.

"It's time for the governor to come home and get down to business as required by the Constitution," Leroy said.

He said with 1,200 jobs lost in the Lewiston area because of timber mill shutdowns, and with at least 500 more lost in the electronics industry, Idaho will lose at least \$3.5 million per year in tax revenue. That does not even consider extra state spending for unemployment benefits, he said.

He denied that he was issuing an ultimatum to the governor, or making a threat.

He has a statutory duty and obligation to keep the budget in balance. If he fails to act, I will ask the Board of Examiners to call a special session.

He said he was "utterly sincere" in trying to get Evans to impose a holdback, although Peterson said Leroy has not presented that request to the governor.

"We've been constantly keeping the members of the Board of Examiners (Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and Attorney General Jim Jones) updated on the situation," said Peterson.

He said on Wednesday, his staff met with the staffs of both officials to discuss the budget. "We asked if they were uncomfortable with our desire to get another month of revenue behind us" before considering any changes — in state spending, Peterson said.

"They indicated they were not uncomfortable," he said. The state's budget year started July 1, about six weeks ago. Officials have been predicting a deficit of at least \$8 million, because Idaho's declining economy apparently will generate less tax revenue than estimated when the budget was set.

Leroy said he was asking the governor next week when Evans is out of the state, but said he had no intention of using the situation to call a Board of Examiners meeting. "It's tempting to do it," he said.

Court asks judge's response to petition

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has asked Administrative Judge John Maynard of Lewiston to respond to a petition filed with the high court in April by Donna Crooks, Nez Perce County auditor-district court clerk.

The petition was intended in July and asks the high court to restrain Maynard from enforcing his order forbidding Ms. Crooks' former assistant, Brenda Holmes, from working in the district court office.

The petition also asks that Maynard be restrained from forbidding any other assistant Ms. Crooks hires without the consent of a district judge from working in the office, and that he be stopped from interfering with Ms. Crooks' job.

The order, signed Wednesday by Chief Justice Charles R. Donaldson, states that the supreme court wants to be informed about Maynard's position on the subject before ruling on the petition.

the petition, said Tony Hohler, an associate in the Boise law firm of Tway and Tway.

The court gave Maynard 14 days to file a written response to the petition, which was filed in April by Ms. Crooks' attorney, William H. Tway.

Hohler also said Donaldson signed an order dismissing another petition filed by Ms. Crooks requesting a hearing on the contempt of court charges filed by Maynard against Ms. Crooks and Ms. Holmes in April.

"Maynard has since retracted the contempt charges," Hohler said.

Both petitions were filed April 26, following a confrontation between Ms. Crooks and Maynard. The two sparred after Ms. Crooks refused to make Ms. Holmes leave the district court office. Both women were cited with contempt of court and jailed for 1 1/2 days before being released by the Supreme Court pending review of the petitions.

Inmate says mental illness ignored

BOISE (AP) — Idaho State Penitentiary inmate Michael Shoe dealt with his problem by keeping himself in a "strip cell" where he is denied clothing and other necessities.

Shoe asked for \$750,000 damages plus a court order that he must receive a proper mental examination and a course of treatment.

Shoe, sentenced to five years in 1981 on Clearwater County grand theft and parole violation charges, filed a U.S. District Court lawsuit at Boise.

He said prison officials have ignored a court order last fall to provide proper mental health treatment for inmates and instead have

receives a copy of the lawsuit. Shoe contended that when he was sentenced by former district judge Andrew Schwam last year, the judge declared Shoe was mentally ill and must receive treatment.

Instead, he alleged, when he violated prison rules by eating too many pieces of cake, he was sent to close confinement and has remained there since.

He alleged he's locked up 23 hours per day, kept naked most of the time and denied necessities such as soap, shampoo, toothpaste and toothbrush.

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Cascade drops Pocatello stop

POCATELLO (AP) — Cascade Airways, which has served Pocatello since 1960, plans to discontinue flights here Aug. 25, the airline's local manager Bruce Elin said.

The pullout, which also will affect Idaho Falls, will cost at least five jobs in Pocatello, Elin said.

The cutback is linked to a proposed takeover of the Spokane-based commuter service by Horizon Airlines. Terms of the sale have not been made public and are subject to U.S. Department of Transportation approval.

Company officials announced two weeks ago they had reached an agreement with Horizon to sell the financially-troubled airline.

Elin said a similar pullout is planned for Idaho Falls, but he had few details.

"The termination is regionwide," he said. A cutback in commuter service for Boise is planned later this month, he added.

The pullout will leave Horizon Air and SkyWest Airlines as the only providers of commuter service to Pocatello.

City Manager Charles Moss said the announcement came as no surprise. "However, I am disappointed, but perhaps SkyWest and Horizon might be able to take up some of the slack caused by the pullout," he said.

Secretary dedication speaker

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — John E. Herrington, secretary of the Department of Energy, will be among featured speakers here Monday in dedication ceremonies for a new DOE Operations Office building.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, also will take part in the dedication.

The DOE and its related agencies, the Atomic Energy Commission and the Energy Research and Development Administration, have been in an older building for the last 33 years.

The new building will consolidate DOE activities in Idaho Falls and will be closer to operating contractors.

The 280 by 180 foot building, located on 4.6 acres of land, will house about 250 people. It was constructed by Greenhoot and Daggett, an Oregon firm.

Meyer chain opens first store

GARDEN CITY (AP) — The Oregon-based Fred Meyer retail chain has opened its first store in Idaho.

The 160,000-square-foot food and department store in Garden City, adjacent to Boise, represents a \$10 million investment, as does a Fred Meyer store being built in Nampa, company officials said.

The Garden City store that opened on Wednesday is expected to provide 250 permanent jobs.

Other stores operating under the Fred Meyer name in Idaho are former Grand Central stores that the Oregon company bought last summer and renamed in December.

Evans vows hope for Potlatch

LEWISTON (AP) — Gov. John Evans told the Clearwater-Potlatch Regional Task Force there's some hope the Potlatch Corp. will resume operations at its sawmills at Lewiston and Jaype.

Evans based that optimism on his meeting two weeks ago with James R. Morris, Potlatch vice-president for Western Woods Products Division. At the time, the governor wanted the timber company to clarify if the layoff of some 650 employees was "indefinite."

Potlatch officials used that term when they announced the Lewiston sawmill and Jaype plywood closures. An estimated 400 more loggers, employed by Potlatch contractors, also lost their jobs.

Evans wanted the terminology of the closures nailed down because a permanent layoff would have triggered additional federal dislocated worker assistance funds.

Evans told the regional economic brain trust Wednesday that Morris, who was out of town on vacation this week, stood by the indefinite description.

Factories hint at slow growth

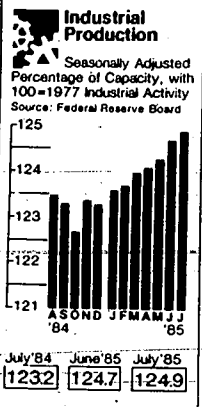

WASHINGTON — Output of the nation's factories, mines and utilities edged up a modest 0.2 percent in July, continuing the listless performance exhibited for most of the past year.

The Federal Reserve Board said Thursday that the July gain left industrial production just 1.4 percent higher than it was a year ago. By comparison, industrial production grew 12.2 percent in the 12 months ending in July 1984 as the country pulled out of the steep recession.

"Since that time, the nation's industries, battered by foreign competition, have found it difficult to make further production gains."

This weakness in the manufacturing sector has affected overall growth. The gross national product grew at a barely discernible 1 percent annual rate during the first six months of the year.



story of manufacturing weakness as a result of the high dollar and imports."

However, she said Wharton was not forecasting a recession, expecting growth to pick up somewhat in the second half — although not at the pace seen by the administration.

John Albertine, president of the American Business Conference, a coalition of high-growth companies, forecast growth would climb to between 3.5 percent and 4 percent in the final half of the year with the rebound spurred by the interest rate declines that have occurred so far this year.

"The recovery continues to inch along, stubbornly refusing to give in to rumors of a recession," he said.

Economists noted that news so far this month has given little support to the administration's more optimistic forecasts of second-half growth. Unemployment in July remained stagnant for the sixth straight month—and retail sales posted only a modest increase after two months of sharp declines.

The government also reported Thursday that Americans look on \$6.8 billion more in installment debt than they paid off in June. The increase was the smallest monthly gain this year.

Analysts said it could be an indication that consumers have started to look on their purchases of big-ticket items because of the high

burden of debt they are already carrying.

The report on industrial production showed the 0.2 percent July gain followed a revised 0.3 percent June increase, which had originally been reported as a lower 0.1 percent gain.

The changes left the index at 124.9 percent of its 1977 base of 100.

Manufacturers enjoyed the biggest increase in activity during the month, a 0.3 percent increase, which followed identical 0.2 percent gains in May and June.

Output at the nation's mines rose a tiny 0.1 percent in July following a 0.3 percent June advance.

However, utilities buffered their second straight big drop in output, a 0.9 percent decline which followed a 0.7 percent June decrease. Analysts attributed the declines to less growth in electricity demand than normal during the summer.

By industry segment, both manufacturers of durable goods, items expected to last three or more years, and nondurable manufacturers saw output rise 0.3 percent in July.

Autos were assembled at an annual rate of 1.1 million units, up from the 900-million-unit pace of June.

Production of business equipment fell 0.3 percent in July, the second consecutive monthly decline, while output at defense and space industries was off 0.3 percent following a 0.9 percent June increase.

The Reagan administration is confidently predicting that the economy will rebound to a growth rate of 5 percent in the second half of this year, but private economists say the report on industrial production and other economic statistics say far for July don't support that optimism.

Priscilla Luce, an economist at Wharton Economics, said the weak gains in industrial production

should continue for another 12 months.

"We don't expect to see a whole lot of strength in the industrial sector until at least this time next year," she said. "It will be the same

Rate hike may unplug bulletin boards

BOISE (AP) — A proposal by Mountain Bell to raise rates for computer bulletin boards may prove terminal for some of the services.

Computer operators use the bulletin boards to exchange information about computers and activities. Users tap their computers into the bulletin boards through telephones.

Mountain Bell is considering charging computer bulletin boards the same rate as businesses because some of the boards take advertising, said Eileen Dingeldin, assistant manager of Mountain Bell's business office in Boise.

Ms. Dingeldin said the residential

rate for phone service in downtown Boise is \$11.62 per month, compared with a business rate of \$29.40.

Even though most of the bulletin boards in the Boise Valley are run by system operators as hobbies and do not carry paid advertisements, Mountain Bell is considering applying the charge to all computer bulletin boards, she said.

Lois and Chuck Keyes, who run Gem State Data, take some paid advertising on their bulletin board but say they have made only about \$47 since it was established in April.

"I'm real disgruntled about it (the proposed rate increase) — I think it's Ma Bell's trick to get more

money," Keyes said. "I think it's a rotten, dirty trick on amateurs."

Ms. Dingeldin said no decision had been made yet, but one was expected this week. However, several bulletin board operators said they had been contacted and told they would be charged a business rate rather than a residential rate.

Ruth Evans, a system operator for the Caldwell Commodore Users' bulletin board, said a Mountain Bell employee told her the bulletin board's telephone line would be charged the business rate.

Ms. Evans said she and her brother cannot afford the higher rates. She said her bulletin board, like most others in the area, does

not include paid advertisements. She said the operators make no money from the bulletin board.

Ms. Dingeldin said Mountain Bell was considering an extra fee for all bulletin boards because it is hard to determine which boards take paid advertisements.

She said a tariff passed by the Public Utilities Commission allows the telephone company to charge customers a higher rate for business use. She said she was unaware of any other state that charges bulletin boards or computer users business rates.

Ms. Evans said she and her brother may take the matter to the Public Utilities Commission.

Retired executive dies

DALLAS (AP) — Harold R. Lilley, retired chief executive officer of Frito-Lay Inc. and a former PepsiCo Inc. board member, has died at the age of 72.

Lilley, who lived in Mill Spring, N.C., since his retirement in 1978, died Tuesday of a heart attack while speaking at a luncheon at Frito-Lay, spokeswoman said.

He was chairman of Frito-Lay from 1964 until his retirement in 1978. During that period, the company's sales rose from \$300 million to

more than \$1 billion. Under his leadership, Frito-Lay became one of the nation's largest packaged foods producers, today with \$2.5 billion in annual sales, 27,000 employees and 40 manufacturing plants.

A native of Luberton, N.C., Lilley formed a food company in Washington in 1946 after he got out of the Army. He sold the company to H.W. Lay & Co. in 1956 and when Lay merged with the Frito Co., Lilley became vice president of the new company's southeastern operations.

AT&T looking at layoffs

Booking country's big stars

Music background helps Nate Greene

The road from Sonora, in northern California, where Nate Greene was raised, to Jackpot, Nev., where he is now responsible for booking entertainment for Cactus Pete's Resort Casino, has been filled with a whole lot of music.

Greene, who started playing piano at the age of three, went on to become an accomplished classical pianist.

"I took lessons for 17 years. It's funny how a person can practice all those years and still be as bad as I am," he jokes.

Greene, who now lives in a customized Silver Eagle bus, is similar to the touring buses used by major recording artists, says the bus he now calls home once belonged to rodeo great Larry Mahan.

"I have a beautiful home overlooking Lake Tahoe," he says. "When I'm there, sometimes I still sleep on the bus."

"I started out working for Harvey's in Lake Tahoe and at the High Sierra," he recalls. "I then met Freddy Powers, a well-known songwriter and entertainer, and he

convinced me to get out of the casino business and come to work for him," he says.

"I did, as his road manager. I remember my first management decision was to put together the 'Over the Rainbow Album' with Willie Nelson. Nothing like going right to the top," he laughs.

Powers then went to work with Merle Haggard. "I did go out on the road with them; I was with Merle a couple of years," Greene says.

When Powers wasn't touring, Greene spent much of his time on Willie Nelson's golf course in Austin, Texas.

Greene, who says he enjoyed his association with Merle Haggard and Freddie Powers, adds that no body takes care of his people like Powers does.

"You're off a lot of time, but you make a lot of money." Cactus Pete's Gala Room was one of the stops for Greene during his days with the artists. It was also during that time that Powers decided to take life a little more easy and relax at his Mount Shasta resort.

"Merle stopped touring on Oct. 31 of last year, and I went to work for

'Yellow Ribbon' songwriter travels 1,900 miles to fill in

BURLEY—Jonny Carver didn't have much time to prepare for his performance at the Cassia County Fair's Country Western Jamboree Wednesday night.

Carver, who filled in at the last minute for hospitalized singer Lorrie Morgan, said, "I had no performances scheduled until Saturday in Birmingham, Ala. But a friend called me Monday night and asked me to take the Burley date. I had to locate my band, gather up the instruments, charter a bus and be on the road Monday night," he said.

"So I guess I knew I would take the date in Burley at 9 p.m.," Dean Draper, secretary/manager for the fair, added. "We are really proud and delighted that Jonny could make it. Coming 1,900 miles for one show says a heck of a lot for him."

Carver, who was reared in Jackson, Miss., is best known for two songs that went to the No. 1 spot on the country and pop charts. "The Yellow Ribbon" around the Old Oak Tree" and "Afternoon Delight."

Yellow Ribbon is documented in the Guinness Book of World Records as one of the two most-recorded songs in the history of music, the other song being "Yesterday" by the Beatles.

"Yellow Ribbon" has been recorded more than 3,000 times. The song has become somewhat of a patriotic symbol as yellow ribbons have been used to welcome returning hostages in two instances, the Iranian hostage situation and again when the crew and passengers were released from a hijacked TWA jetliner.

"I think that it is good that someone has a song that means that someone is being freed or released

from a hostage-type situation. Up to date, there is no other song that says that. I'm proud of the fact that people use the ribbons in such a patriotic way," he said.

Carver still spends several months a year on the road, having returned from Florida, and is scheduled to perform in Texas and Colorado in the next two weeks. He also has a November date set in Jackpot.

Although Carver has recorded his share of hits, he's also suffered through a loser.

"I did record a song about a real live cockroach that lived in Houston and moved to Nashville in somebody's suitcase. It turns out that he is a honky-tonk roach. I have recorded 38 records, and 37 have made the national billboard chart. Guess which one didn't," Carver laughed.

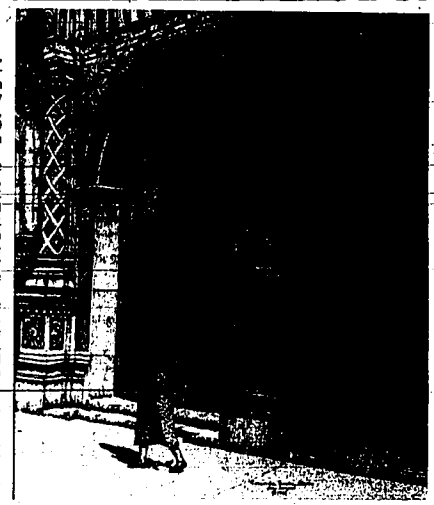

from her garden or wild flowers from forested areas. "I'm always working with basically light and dark," she says. "Still life has all the components others have. I don't like to do the same thing all the time. I get bored. I really enjoy looking at everything. There are so many things that are interesting."

Several recent works are the result of a trip to Mexico that she and her husband took last November. One particularly intriguing work hanging in her local exhibit, entitled "Concordia Church," is a pen and ink drawing taken from a composite of two photographs shot while in Mexico.

"In the drawing, a Mexican woman is walking in front of one closed and one open door of the building. When I took the photo, another tourist was entering the door," Sargent says, adding, "That wasn't the effect I wanted, so I took the Mexican woman from out of another photograph."

A native of Nebraska who grew up in the Burley area, the artist says she gets a lot of inspiration living in Idaho. "The Idaho landscape and the whole feeling to this area is good. I like open spaces. We've got so much that is fascinating," she says, pointing out the diversity of Idaho's geography from the City of Rocks to the mountains, lakes and other natural features.

"But, probably more important than locale, is Sargent's positive attitude. 'I'm looking forward to entering more juried shows,' she says. 'I enjoy the competition whether I win or not. You do need to develop a fairly thick skin to exhibit. Nobody likes rejection, but you can take it for what it's worth and learn from it.'

Also a plus for Sargent is a sort of kinetic energy that allows her to make up for the slow times while bringing up children and being a farm wife. Besides belonging to the Idaho Watercolor Society and the Art Guild of Magic Valley, Sargent, along with Chet Nenzel of Kimberly, is currently a co-superintendent of the art department of the Twin Falls County Fair. She has paintings in many private collections and in the Pocatello Regional Medical Center collection.

Moreover, Sargent has recently had works accepted into juried shows in Boise, Wenatchee, W.S., Spokane, Wash., Southport, W.A., and Rochester, N.Y.

Yet, even considering that number of juried shows accepting her work, the artist hasn't entered any of them haphazardly. She checks publications listing shows, first, then sends for guidelines before making a move.

"There are different shows for different things," she says, adding, "It's important that your work corresponds with what they want in the show."

John and Yoko TV movie depicts pair's love

LONDON - Mark McGann, the actor who portrays the late John Lennon in the TV movie, "Imagine: The Story of John and Yoko," says the film will demonstrate how much in love the slain ex-Beatle and his wife were.

The three-hour movie for NBC, to be aired in late November, begins in 1966 when the couple met at a London art gallery and ends on Dec. 8, 1980, the day Lennon was killed in front of his Manhattan apartment

house, the Dakota.

Like Lennon, the 24-year-old McGann is from Liverpool. His co-star is Japanese-American actress Kim Miyori. They recently discussed the project at the Hard Rock Cafe, and posed in their costumes, looking eerily like the famed Lennon and Ono.

McGann said he got to play the bespectacled Beatle after the producers' initial choice, an actor whose stage name is Mark Lindsay, turned out to have the same real name as Lennon's assassin, Mark Chapman.

"I'm a great believer in fate," McGann said of the chain of events that got him the role.

McGann described himself as a great Lennon fan and said he and his three brothers used to play tennis rackets, pretending they were guitars, and imitate the Beatles.

"I always used to get John's part," McGann said. "I think it's because my nose is bent."

McGann played the celebrated Liverpoolian previously in a stage musical called "Lennon" at Liverpool's Everyman Theater.

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KMVT turnabout: CBS in, NBC out

TWIN FALLS — CBS is stepping in front of the NBC peacock on KMVT's programming schedule.

The Twin Falls television station will take on CBS as its primary network, beginning Sept. 9, after featuring NBC programs for the past eight years, general manager Lee Wagner has announced.

"CBS is the No. 1 new product and also they are No. 1 in prime-time and No. 1 in full programming," he said. "We want to align ourselves with that No. 1 status."

KMVT, which serves the eight counties in the Magic Valley, is affiliated with all three major networks.

Since 1977, the station has led its programming schedule with NBC national news, prime-time programs and late-night slots. It has carried some CBS programs regularly during daytime hours and has preempted other programs to carry ABC specials, such as the coverage of the World Series and the Olympics.

"What happens now is that we will carry CBS programs primarily," said Wagner. KMVT viewers will be watching Dan Rather instead of Tom Brokaw on the evening news, and Johnny Carson's Tonight show will give way to the CBS late-night movie.

"There will be some exceptions to the new programming schedule," Wagner said. "For instance, KMVT will continue to air the popular Today show on weekday mornings, passing up the CBS Morning News."

NBC will become the station's secondary network with a few regular programs, and ABC will continue to furnish special programming, he said.

KMVT executives were willing to sign with CBS for a 20 percent smaller network contract — if the networks pay local outlets for carrying their programs — to grab a bigger share of the television audience.

"Of course, we're making the assumption that we're going to get

higher levels of viewing, which translates to higher advertising revenue," Wagner said. Bigger audience ratings normally boost advertising rates because the commercials aired reach more viewers.

However, Wagner said KMVT does not intend to change its advertising rates immediately, waiting instead for audience figures.

The network switch is part of a wider campaign aimed at boosting KMVT's ratings and revenue.

The Twin Falls station also has been attempting to build audience by expanding its local news coverage and by updating technical equipment.

KMVT also will begin installing new studios in its recently purchased building late this week or early next week, Wagner said. The station is moving to the former Sierra Life Insurance Co. building at 1100 Blue Lakes Blvd. North in Twin Falls from current quarters at Elizabeth Boulevard and Eastland Drive.

"Remodeling should be completed by December," Wagner said.

Previous programming improvements apparently are having some effect. Without revealing specific figures, Wagner said KMVT's revenues have risen 20 to 25 percent in the past year. The gains, however, come at a price. Expenses are up from 33 to 40 percent, giving the station lower earnings than in previous years.

The station and its parent company, Root Communications Co. of Daytona Beach, Fla., are investing for the long term, he said.

"We feel... (KMVT) is going to continue to be a very strong business property for many years in the future. We're doing things now from an expansion side to make sure that happens," he said.

Root Communications also owns four radio stations in Florida and is shopping for another television acquisition, Wagner said.

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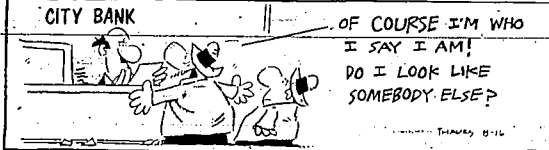
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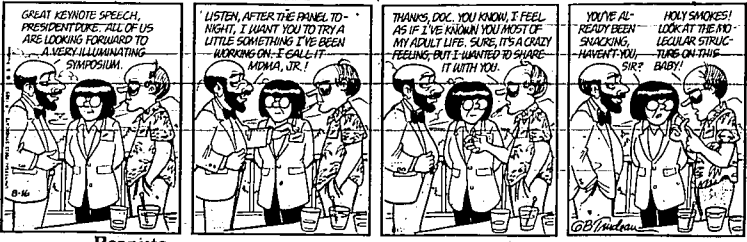

'Summer Rental': chuckles, few roars

John Candy doesn't have to do much to make me laugh, so I enjoyed "Summer Rental," an easygoing comedy directed by Carl Reiner.

There's something old-fashioned about the movie: a kind of flatness and leisurely pace and understatement that recalls TV shows of the 1950s such as "Ozzie and Harriet" and "Leave It to Beaver." How much of this is intentional and how much is the result of slipshod editing is anybody's guess. The gags in "Summer Rental" are consistently amusing, but rarely does a sequence build to the point where it is laugh-out-loud funny. It is a film made up of chuckles.

Candy plays a harried air traffic controller, Jack Chester, who is forced by his bosses to take a month-long vacation after a ty on his radar screen nearly sends him into a panic. So he packs up his family affectionate family and flies off to Florida to cool out at the beach.

But the same gremlins that assure Jack can pull in only religious broadcasts on his car radio follow him to the beach. He moves the family into an ideal, spacious beachfront mansion, only to find late that night that it is not the fly-blown hovel he actually rented. He and the family stand in line forever at a seafood restaurant, their eyes fixed on the tank of live lobsters—they hope to devour, only to be pushed out of the way by a rich local sailing hero, Al Pellet (Richard Crenna), when they are about to be seated. Pellet orders the last lobsters in the house, of course.

And Jack finds out simultaneously that his daughter, Jennifer (Kerri Green), is quite ready to wear a bikini and that the house next door at the beach is inhabited by a legion of lifeguards.

Add to this a sunburn so bad that Mrs. Chester suggests Jack's nose could be picked up on a satellite photo; a next-door neighbor who never turns off his power saw; a pet dog that seems intent on taking his master's place in the Chester scheme of things.

At his best, Candy here recalls Oliver Hardy in his long-suffering cheerfulness that ends in an explosion of exasperation. Candy does one bit of physical comedy, carrying his little daughter and a huge, leaky ice chest across a crowded beach.

Real ordinary 'Real Genius' looks like a remake

Hollywood is a confusing place this summer. You can hardly tell the goonies from the geeks, the explorers from the nerds. The movie lites alone are enough to drive you crazy. So many sound alike, you're bound to get mixed up.

Consider this: The high school protagonists of a movie called "Weird Science" create a gorgeous wonder-woman who promises to fulfill their every fantasy. At the same time, the main characters of a new picture entitled "Real Genius" are brainy college students duped into perfecting a killer laser beam for the Pentagon.

After a while, you start to wonder if you're smarter than you. Or which movie is better than the other. Finally, they begin to form a giant mutant hamster races and Madame

Curie look-alike contests. The movie works well when it sticks to dormitory hijinks. The engaging thing about Knight is that he is the antithesis of the baby Einstein stereotype. Handsome, athletic and prank-oriented, Knight would be more at home in "Animal House" than the physics lab. He has a deadpan delivery and is capable of a meanly funny riposte. Kilmer's a riot.

But just when the comedy begins to cook, Coolidge switches the focus from her star to the dull story line involving the devious Professor Hathaway, sleazily well-played by William Atherton. Hathaway has this furtive deal with the military to use his students' brainpower to perfect a killer laser beam. When the students find out, they scurry to sabotage the government's plans. It is an old set-up, carried out in a tired fashion.

Still, "Real Genius" has some things to recommend it, foremost of which is a hilarious performance by Val Kilmer as the hunky genius of Pacific Tech, a technological college on the west coast. Kilmer, who scored as the rock singer in "Top Secret," plays Chris Knight, a Tech senior and one of the "top ten minds in the country." Knight's job is to introduce his teenage roommate, and the audience, to Tech's wacky world, a place where students hold

Cartoon future, past returns as 'The Jetsons' give encore

NEW YORK — Almost a quarter-century after the all-American space-age family lost its prime-time ticket to ride, "The Jetsons" TV series is back with new episodes and a cast that hasn't aged a day.

That's the beauty of being a cartoon. The characters never get old; their colors just fade away.

In 1962, Hanna-Barbera Productions followed its prime-time Neanderthal family, "The Flintstones," with a 21st century version called "The Jetsons." ABC canceled the series after one season, although the programs have been rerun so often on all three networks Saturday mornings that the episodes seem limitless.

Actually, there only were 24, and Hanna-Barbera is adding 41 more for a syndicated run of 65 — five a week for 13 weeks — that will start next month.

The target audience is simple: Baby Boomer & Son.

"So many adults have said, 'Hey, I was raised on that family,' that there's a market for the show with their children," said Joseph B. Barbera, president of Hanna-Barbera Productions.

Syndicated animation series such as "The Jetsons" are making strong programming inroads. For years, cartoons have dominated Saturday morning with a collection of carefree, mindless superheroes. Now, more animated projects are being produced for kids as weekday afternoon alternatives to soap operas, game shows and sitcoms.

One popular series is the syndicated "He-Man and the Masters of the Universe," which essentially is a 30-minute product endorsement for

ABC rerun aids slow rating rise

NEW YORK (AP) — A rerun of the "Moonlighting" movie pilot ranked No. 1 last week helping ABC to some relief from its summer doldrums with the network's best finish in 10 weeks.

Actually, ABC tied for second with CBS, but that's an improvement since ABC had been third every week since June 2.

According to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co., NBC won again, its 12th consecutive prime-time victory, with reruns of the top-ranked "Cosby Show" and No. 2 "Miami Vice" leading the way. NBC's "Family Ties" tied "Moonlighting" for third.

NBC introduced two new series last week, and the interpretation of their ratings illustrate how the performances of news and entertainment shows are evaluated differently by the networks.

"American Almanac" news magazine ranked 43rd for the week and "Smokey Robinson's Motown Revue" was 44th, yet Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, said he was pleased with the "Almanac" numbers and disappointed with the "Motown Revue" results.

"American Almanac" following a dozen failed NBC magazines in 15 years, averaged a 10.1 rating and an 18 share, beating the debut performances of the network's last two news magazines in 1983, "Monitor" and "First Camera."

"Almanac" was second in its Tuesday night time slot, outdriving CBS' movie "The Wall," while finishing well behind "Moonlighting," which averaged an 18.3 rating, the same number it had when it was first broadcast last March.

For its five-week series run last spring, "Moonlighting" averaged a 13.2 rating. ABC considers the critically praised series an important building block in its efforts to climb out of the ratings cellar this season.

During the regular season that ended last April, ABC finished third for the first time in a decade and only had one series, the top-ranked "Dynasty," as a regular Top Ten performer. "Dynasty" averaged a 25.0 rating for the season.

As an example of how poorly prime-time series do in reruns, last week's "Dynasty" rerun finished 62nd out of 67 shows and had a 6.8 rating and 12 percent share of the audience. Jaffe said he knew of only one show, CBS' "Kojak," with an episode that finished first and last during the same season.

The rating measures the average percentage of the nation's 84.9 million TV homes tuned to a network during a given minute of prime time. The share measures the percentage of the sets in use that are tuned to a particular network broadcast.

those miniature action toys.

The rise of commercial tie-in programs and other original animation series reflects the rapid growth of independent stations and cable services and their increasing need for original product — human or otherwise. At the National Association of TV Program Executives convention last January, close to 100 animated specials and series were pitched to station owners.

"Animation is much cheaper to produce than live action-adventure," said Stan Moger, head of SFM Entertainment, which distributes the "Jayce" series.

One way to reduce costs is to farm out material to the burgeoning

animation houses in Taiwan, Korea and Japan. "Animation is the most international art form," said Kevin O'Donnell, the production supervisor for "Jayce."

Barbera said a half-hour animated series for the networks can cost as much as \$250,000 per episode. "Syndication, merchandising and longevity are where we get the money back," he said.

"The Jetsons" certainly has stood the test of time. The original cast of George Jetson, his wife, Jane, and their two children, Judy and Elroy, is returning. So are the voices behind the faces, including George O'Hanlon as George, Daws Butler as Elroy and Don Messick as Astro the dog.

Jackson puts up big bucks for rights to Beatles music

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Pop star Michael Jackson has purchased publishing rights to the Beatles' music catalog for more than \$50 million, it was reported Wednesday.

The collection of 200 John Lennon-Paul McCartney tunes was acquired in London during the weekend by representatives of Jackson, who finalized a deal with ATV Music, according to Variety, the entertainment trade newspaper.

Norman Winter, a spokesman for Jackson, would neither confirm nor deny the report and referred

calls to the entertainer's attorney, John Branca. Branca's representative said the attorney was in a meeting and would return the call later.

The deal, according to Variety, was completed after six months of negotiation.

The agreement reportedly covers all Lennon-McCartney written songs, except for four: "Love Me Do" and "I Wanna Be Like You," which are controlled by McCartney's MPL Communications, and "Please Please Me" and "Ask Me Why," owned by Dick James Music Ltd.

Although the Beatles' songs are the crown jewel of the ATV collection, the publishing concern has the right to about 5,000 songs, including hits by Little Richard, the Pointer Sisters, and The Pretenders.

First-ever commercial use of a Beatles song — "Help" — was approved earlier this year by ATV, which allows the Ford Motor Company to use it for its Lincoln Mercury advertising campaign at a reported cost of \$100,000 for one-year rights.

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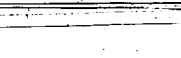
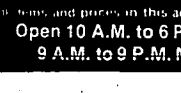
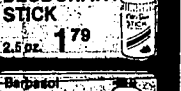
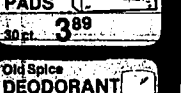
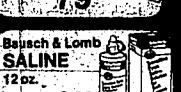
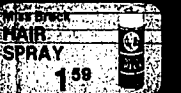
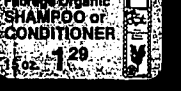
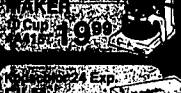
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Stock wins 1st go-round at Cassia

Putting on an impressive show to open Thursday evening's action was rodeo producer Mickey Young from Jerome. Young rode "Sorrel Top" in bareback to a mark of 79 to grab first-place honors; on the night Kimberly's son, Mark McKinlay, rode directly on the spurs of Young, with a 72 aboard "Rio Blanco." Another Jerome cowboy, Rick Miller, took the third slot after riding "Whistling Dixie" to a 71-point score.

Placing best for Twin Falls was Bob Monroe, who climbed into third place by finishing his steer-riding run in 6.4 seconds. Richard Morgan of Las Vegas east-

Hacker's hero finds fortune in frustration

Golf Digest's worst player gains acclaim for klutziness

DAWSON, Pa. — Angelo Spagnolo, the hero of hopeless hackers, wants to play golf in the worst way. And he usually does.

The grocery store manager butchered the Tournament of Players Club course with a 257, the worst score in *Golf Digest* magazine's recent Worst Avid Golfer tournament.

"Still, it's a game he loves. Just because you can't play 'bad' doesn't mean you can't have fun," Spagnolo said.

"I don't remember the 250 bad shots I had during that round. I remember the seven that were good. Otherwise, it's too nightmarish. Everything is relative. One man's ceiling is another man's floor."

Spagnolo has become a celebrity in the lovable-loser mold, sort of a Charlie Brown in double knits. He's in such demand, he's hired an agent, and his awful play has been chronicled by newspapers here and abroad and network television.

"It's funny that something so good can come out of something so bad," Spagnolo said.

But the question remains: How can anybody be that horrible without trying to mess up? Watching Spagnolo in action, however, is witnessing a true klutz with a club.

During a recent round, his first drive flew right at an impossible angle across a road. On the second hole, he ducked hook his drive to the left, finding an unplayable lie behind a tree.

"People have told me that it's hard to believe anyone could be so bad. But it kind of makes me bristle when people think I'm sandbagging," said the pudgy, bespectacled father of two.

"I want to play good. I give it every ounce I got. Why try to do anything but the worst I can be?" "Someday, I want to be able to say I've been able to master the game and play competitively. I'm not a person who gives up easily."

Fortunately, Spagnolo's mild demeanor keeps him from throwing clubs or cursing in frustration.

"You have to have a sense of humor," he said. "I don't let a bad shot affect me for more than a couple of seconds."

Spagnolo began golfing seven years ago and has played at least once a week since 1983. His futilely has made him the patron saint of any duffer who ever botched a drive, shanked an iron or skulled a wedge.

"Ninety-eight percent of the golfers can identify with him. Not everybody can be a Jack Nicklaus or Tom Watson," quid Chuck Kelley, a friend who nominated Spagnolo for the Worst Avid Golfer tournament.

"I've never seen anybody that bad. Nobody else even comes close. He's horrendous. It's pitiful," he said.

"What keeps him coming back? He knows he can't get worse. I think he's a masochist. I think he loves abuse," Kelley said. "But really, he would give one of his arms and legs to break 100. Deep down inside, he'd do anything to beat some of these guys."

At his home course, Linden Hall, about 40 miles south of Pittsburgh, Spagnolo carries a 56 handicap. His best score ever was 111 His previous worst was 163.

"He does everything wrong," said Bill Rouzzi, owner of a driving range where Spagnolo practices. "He tries like hell when he comes here. He just can't seem to back it."

Rouzzi also said players like Spagnolo are golf's bread-and-butter.

"If golf courses or ranges had to depend on scratch golfers, they'd never make a living. It's the hackers and high handicappers who keep us in business," Rouzzi said.

Spagnolo was among 627 duffers nominated for the gruesome tournament in the "June 18" Worst Avid Golfer tournament, co-sponsored by the Professional Golfers Association.

His dreadful 257 would make an impressive bowling score. In golf, it's the pits. In 18 holes, he tied the PGA's 72-hole record set by Mike Soutar 30 years ago.

The seven-hour round included one approach shot that ricocheted off a tree and landed under the accelerator of a golf cart parked behind Spagnolo.

His Waterloo came on the 17th hole, a 132-yard par 3 with a green surrounded by water. Spagnolo sent 27 balls into the drink and cracked his wedge. Finally, he reached the green by putting up a cart path, thereafter named Angelo's Alley.

PGA Commissioner Deane Beman's score on the hole was 66.

"I wanted to play it the way it was designed to be played. I didn't want to make a joke out of the game. I embarrassed myself. It was a gross disaster. But I think it demonstrated some sportsmanship," Spagnolo said.

For being the worst, Spagnolo was given an ugly, green-checked sports coat — a spot on the revered green Masters jacket.

NEW ORLEANS — Defense lawyers who earlier refused to ask for a mistrial for former Tulane basketball star John "Hot Rod" Williams, changed their minds Thursday, asked for a mistrial and got it.

Judge Alvin Oser scheduled a new trial on sports bribery charges against Williams to start on Sept. 9. Assistant District Attorney Bruce Whittaker said he would appeal the mistrial order.

Defense lawyer Michael Green, who earlier lost a bid to have charges against Williams dismissed, said he asked for the mistrial because of repeated violations of court orders by the prosecution.

He said Williams had been deprived of due process and a fair trial when prosecutors did not produce evidence that might have served to discredit state witnesses or prove Williams innocent.

In the past 24 hours, Green said, he had acquired a picture of star prosecution witness Gary Kranz posing with a mound of cocaine.

"The withholding of crucial pieces of evidence has caused my client to be deprived of his right to a fair trial," Green said.

"It hurts me to say that the office of any prosecutor would take a course of action that would force me to ask for a mistrial," he said.

Whittaker objected to a mistrial, saying that he and Green differed on their definitions of what evidence might prove to be exculpatory.

"We are talking about a photo of a state witness using cocaine — a witness who admitted on the stand that he used cocaine," Whittaker said. "That evidence does nothing to prove Williams innocent."

Oser continued his gag order on everyone involved in the trial, so neither Williams nor the lawyers would comment.

Juror John Warrick said that during the two days he and the rest of the jury were locked up and out of touch with the trial, the speculation was that some sort of plea bargaining was going on.

"The defense was way ahead," he said. "They were winning on points." While Williams' legal troubles mounted this spring, the National

Basketball Association's Cleveland Cavaliers drafted Williams in the second round, despite the commissioner's warning that Williams might be a risky choice.

Jim Ilavack, a lawyer for the Cavaliers, said he didn't know whether his team would be able to sign Williams.

"I have no idea, nor do I have any comment," he said.

After declaring a mistrial and dismissing the jury, Oser said he had only two alternatives: once misconduct was discovered on the part of the prosecutors, grant a mistrial or call a recess in this case.

"That's the only avenue under our law to give him a fair trial," he said. He said he could not grant Green's earlier request to dismiss all charges.

"I just don't have that vehicle at the trial level," he said. Such issues, he said, are decided by appellate courts, not at the trial level.

"I have never in my 26 years in the judicial system seen one like this," he said, referring to a mistrial on the basis of prosecutorial misconduct.

Work, style mark Ueberroth's leadership skills

NEW YORK — Peter Ueberroth is either incredibly smart or incredibly lucky. Perhaps, he is a little of both.

Last year, he orchestrated the successful Los Angeles Olympics and became *Time* magazine's Man of the Year for his efforts. Then he moved to a new job as baseball commissioner last month. He has settled an umpires' strike and occupied center stage in achieving a quick end to the players' strike.

What's next? Ueberroth seems to have a sixth sense, a knack for doing the right thing at the right time. He's also willing to take risks, and he invariably lands on his feet.

Brians and luck may have a lot to do with it. People who have dealt with him have their own ideas.

A Olympic workers remember him as a tireless worker, attentive to every detail, and possessing the ability to get things done.

Analysis

"In my view, he's the best possible of a leader," said Amy Quinn, who was his press secretary for the Games. "He's creative, he's interested, he's open-minded and he works very hard. He has a remarkable ability to look and instantly analyze the most complex of situations and come up with creative solutions."

Harry Usher, the United States Football League commissioner, who was vice president of the Los Angeles Olympic Organizing Committee, best remembers Ueberroth's style.

"He instills a tremendous sense of urgency in people. When you talk to him, he places businesslike and important issues in the subject matter. He has the attention to detail. You have to be all the time to have all the answers."

A successful businessman, Ueberroth turned the Olympics into a commercial bonanza, using corporate sponsorship to generate operating funds. He also recruited thousands of citizens as unpaid volunteers, making the Games a money-making operation and reversing a troubling trend which had left recent met cities with huge post-Games deficits.

In October, Ueberroth moved on to baseball. He was on the job for one day when major league umpires went on strike, forcing the playoffs to begin with amateur officials. At first, Ueberroth stayed out of the dispute, following the mutual operant of his predecessors.

But within days, he was mediating and awarding the umpires nearly all they had asked for and guaranteeing regular details for baseball's showcase event, the World Series.

Ueberroth was settled in, said Phillip Phillips, attorney for the umpires' association, when the catalyst in the dispute was brought without.

"He didn't have to be asked. He saw it

As labor negotiations with the players heated up, Ueberroth did not assume the low profile taken by other commissioners. He insisted he could not allow a strike, although legally, he had no power to prevent one. He represented neither the owners nor the players, but baseball's 30 million fans.

In the end, he refused to take credit for ending the players' strike after two days, insisting that Kudo belonged instead to owners' negotiator Lee MacPain and union chief Don Fehr.

Harry Usher recognized his friend's familiar style in the baseball settlement. "I'm not at all surprised that Peter was instrumental in getting the parties together," Usher said. "It's entirely consistent with his history of tireless effort in having people keep their feet to the fire to accomplish the task at hand."

"He has the ability to achieve, to be unafraid, whatever he wants, from around him. In that respect, he is not unlike President Reagan."

NFL gives replay rule another exhibition try

NEW YORK — The National Football League, which last tried instant replay to review officials' decisions in 1978, begins an eight-game experiment with it again this weekend.

But the viewing audience isn't likely to even know it's happening.

The experiment, which begins with Saturday night's game in San Diego between the Chargers and Dallas Cowboys, was approved by NFL owners at their meeting last March in Phoenix, to be used in nationally televised exhibition games. But under no circumstances will it be tried during the 1985 regular season.

The NFL layout is similar to the appeal used by the United States Football League in televised games during its spring season in one respect — it applies only to non-penalties like out-of-bounds and possession plays. And as in the USFL case, when ABC declined to become an official participant in the game, the monitors can only make calls of replays that come up in the natural course of a telecast.

"There is no network involvement at all," says Val Fitchbeck, the NFL's director of broadcasting. But the NFL experiment is unlike the USFL's in that coaches do not appeal calls to an official watching replays.

Under the NFL plan, an official in a booth monitors the game and reports by radio to the umpire on the field any call that may be questionable. If a replay comes up within 20 seconds, the official in the booth

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Activity grade requirement remains 'C'

But some Shoshone students may have teachers waive rule

SHOSHONE — The eligibility standard for extracurricular activities at Shoshone High School will remain a "C" grade average.

The Shoshone school board reviewed its policy of requiring a C standard of academic performance in order for students to participate in athletics and other activities this summer, and voted at its meeting earlier this week to continue the requirement.

The board did adopt some modifications, proposed by special education teacher Janet Todd, concerning "lower-performing students."

Todd suggested that students in the "lower 25 percent-range academically" who are determined by their teachers and their achievement test scores to be working at their individual capacities but still cannot earn a "C" average be exempted from the rule.

Students who feel they qualify for this program must make application for the exemption through a guidance counselor's office.

The board also agreed Monday to implement an eligibility policy of the "plus-and-minus for effort" in the junior-high school for activity participation.

Students in grades seven and eight must satisfy their teachers they are working to their ability before being allowed to participate in sports, but their grades will not be considered.

"People would be amazed that the range of ability in a single classroom can range from third grade to college," Todd told the board.

Ex-Cougar star Fehr shoots 65, takes early lead

GRAND BLANC, Mich. (AP) — It took Richard Fehr, taking advantage of rain-softened greens, shot a 7-under-par 65 Thursday to take a one-stroke lead over Paul Azinger after the first round of the Buick Open at Warwick Hills Golf and Country Club.

Fehr, 29, a former Brigham Young-University golfer, has no card to play on the PGA Tour and the Buick Open is only his seventh Tour event this year. However, a tie for ninth place in the U.S. Open, which was held about 30 miles away at Oakland Hills, helped Fehr earn \$31,569 already. That's more than the 150th man on last year's money list earned, which means Fehr can play the rest of 1985, even without a card.

Fehr, who has spent most of the season playing events in the satellite Tournament Players Series, made his last Tour start at the Sammy Davis tournament in July, where he missed the cut.

Fehr, of Seattle, started his round on the 10th and played the back side in 3-under 33 with birdies on the 12th, 13th and 14th holes. Playing the front nine in 4-under 32, Fehr birdied the 1st, 4th, 6th and 8th holes. He didn't card a single bogey during the round.

Five golfers, Bill Kratzert, Scott Hoch, Greg Twiggis, Gil Morgan and Charlie Bolling, all were two strokes off the lead at 5-under-par 67.

Azinger, 27, the medalist at the PGA qualifying school last fall, needed 35 strokes on the front nine of the 7,014-yard, par-72 layout; then birdied the first four holes on the back side. He added another birdie on the 16th hole for a 31 on the final nine holes.

Azinger's only mistake was a bogey on the 43rd-yard, par-4 second hole where he carded his lone bogey.

The course was softened by an all-night rain and the downpour continued well into the afternoon Thursday. Morning play was halted twice by the rain, backing up starts by nearly two hours.

Because of the soft greens, the golfers were able to fly their shots at the pins without fear that the ball would bounce off the back side, as they did on dry and hardened surfaces last week's PGA Championship at Cherry Hills in Denver. As a result, sub-par scores were common.

Ten golfers were at 4-under 68. They were: Calvin Peete, Larry Wadkins, Dennis Frixler, Gary Hallberg, Bob Lohr, Joey Sindelar, Jack Renner, George Burns, Larry Mize and Mike Nicolette.

Wadkins and Peete both are shooting for their third triumphs of the year. Wadkins already has won the Bob Hope and the Los Angeles Open while Peete won the Phoenix Open and the Tournament Players Championship at Sinderat in the Greater Greensboro earlier this year.

Other 1985 winners entered in the Buick Open include Bob Eastwood, Raymond Floyd, Bill Glasson, Roger Maltbie and Mark McCumber.

Glasson and Maltbie turned in 69s Thursday morning while McCumber shot 70, Eastwood had 71 and Floyd struggled to a 1-over-par 73.

Holdouts dampen NFL training camps

Dan Marino used to be one of 10-year-old Paul Gerber's favorite football players.

Now, no more. "He'd better be back or his fans are going to walk away from him," the youngster said shortly after Marino walked out of the Miami Dolphins' training camp.

"When he comes back, he won't hear much. He'll just hear 'boo.'"

For the second year in row, some of the National Football League's best players have stayed away from training camp. Most prominent among them are Marino and Eric Dickerson, who spent last season setting new standards for passing and rushing.

But there are others of almost equal importance to their teams: Mark Haynes, the New York Giants' All-Pro cornerback; Mike Singletary, the All-Pro middle

linebacker who's the heart of the Chicago Bears defense and two of his teammates, strong safety Todd Bell and outside linebacker Al Harris; guard R.C. Thieleman and defensive end Don Smith of Atlanta; both New York Jets' starting tackles, Marvin Powell and Reggie McNeely; and four of Marino's Miami teammates — tight end Dan Johnson, linebacker Bob Brudzinski, safety Glenn Blackwood and jack-of-all-positions Jim Jensen.

Then there are the Philadelphia Eagles, whose new owner, Norman Braman, says he will not renegotiate existing contracts or pay signing bonuses. That led to holdouts by 11 veterans, four of whom have since signed.

Of the seven who remain, most are starters, including wide receiver Mike Quick, running back Wilbert Montgomery, defensive end Dennis Harrison, guard Dean Miraldo and linebacker Jerry Robinson.

The holdout explosion began two years ago when the United States Football League began bidding for both rookies and established pros, giving players de facto free agency and another byer in addition to the NFL.

That led to promises of renegotiation for Marino and Dickerson, who came out of college just before the boom — tight end Dan Johnson, Marino, for example, is on the third year of a \$2 million, four-year contract in an era when rookie quarterbacks like Doug Flutie and Bernie Kosar are making well over \$1 million a year; Dickerson signed two years ago for \$2.2 million over four years.

For most of the other holdouts, who have played out their options, the USFL's financial problems mean there is no other bidder.

Cornerback Ronnie Lott, for example, got an \$800,000-a-year contract last year by playing the USFL against the San Francisco 49ers. Haynes, a player of similar ability,

wants the same from the Giants without the leverage. Meanwhile, general managers and league officials are sitting back and waiting for the holdouts to come back.

"Last year it was Randy White, Fred Dean and Wesley Walker holding out," says Commissioner Pete Rozelle. "They've been replaced by Marino, Dickerson and Mark Haynes. Some of it has to do with the agents involved — different agents take different postures. But with the money involved, I'm sure they'll come to terms."

But some of the others are sticking it out.

"I'm in a high-risk business," says Dickerson, whose 2,105 yards last year made him only the second NFL back to exceed 2,000 yards in a season.

"The average life of a life of a running back is only 3½ years. I could get hurt at any time.

College grads face huge debts

College costs are escalating this fall at nearly double the rate of inflation, raising prospects of heavier borrowing for students, a growing number of whom already seek counseling in coping with five-figure loans.

Charges for tuition and fees nationwide are rising an average of 8 to 9 percent on four-year campuses, according to a report by the College Board, a nonprofit educational association.

Overall costs, including books, transportation and living expenses, are up 7 percent, with the most expensive campuses now priced at more than \$12,000 a year.

This is the fifth straight year in which college expenses have outpaced the overall rate of inflation, currently 3.7 percent. Such increases are deflected by many campus officials, who say they are simply catching up from previous years of high inflation, when colleges lagged behind.

Such explanations, though partly justified, provide little comfort for students. This is particularly the case for low-income minorities, who are said to be discouraged from enrolling by the threat of indebtedness far beyond any experienced previously by their families.

Even middle-class students express dismay over loans that may claim 15 percent or more of their incomes after they graduate.

"When two students bearing such debt marry," said John R. Silber, president of Boston University, in a speech last week to an audience of U.S. and foreign college administrators, "they bring to each other a negative dowry which may amount to more than \$40,000, putting into question for many years their ability to buy a house."

Such a debt, paid over a standard 10-year period at a subsidized rate of 8 percent, would require monthly payments of \$185.31.

"There's a lot of pressure this year," noted Joseph Seimae, vice president for financial aid at St. John's University in Queens, N.Y., and a recognized authority on the subject. That private Catholic institution is raising tuition 10 percent "this year, to \$4,400.

"Kids are borrowing from their parents," Seimae added, "and parents are borrowing from credit unions."

Tuition and fees at four-year public colleges will average \$1,242 this year, up from \$670 five years ago, and total costs will rise from \$4,900 to \$5,314, according to the College Board.

Tuition and fees on private campuses will average \$3,418 and total expenses will average \$9,659, but some go much higher. The most expensive campuses on the board's list are Bennington College, a small, socially prestigious school in Vermont, which charges \$12,850, and Harvard, which charges \$11,340.

Federal grants to students, though somewhat higher than last year's, have not nearly kept pace with costs. One consequence is heavy borrowing by students and parents alike.

An estimated 36 percent of students from middle-income families now obtain federally guaranteed loans averaging about \$2,200 a year, according to researchers at the American Council on Education, a Washington-based collegiate group.

To help meet costs of undergraduate and graduate study, a student can accumulate as much as \$25,000 in debt under the federal government's Guaranteed Student Loan program.
