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Toll in Colombian eruption may top 20,000

BOGOTA, Colombia — A volcano that had been rumbling to life for months erupted, melting its snowcap and hurling down torrents of mud that buried four sleeping towns in an Andes mountain valley Thursday.

Early estimates of the dead reached 20,000 and hundreds of bodies were being brought to a soccer stadium not far from the devastated zone.

Blazing volcanic ash cascaded into the valleys Wednesday night. A few hours later the mud avalanche crushed through the towns, which had a combined population of 70,000.

If the death toll equals the estimates, or climbs beyond them, the eruption of the Nevado del Ruiz volcano will rank as one of this century's great natural disasters.

The Languilla River became a rushing wall of mud that destroyed at least 85 percent of Armero, a coffee-farming town of 30,000 people 30 miles from the volcano and 105 miles northwest of Bogota.

"ARMERO doesn't exist anymore," Red Cross rescue worker Fernando Duque said in an interview from the scene on Tuesday radio. "There's only a big layer of mud where Armero used to be," Associated Press photographer Carlos Gonzalez said Thursday night.

The three other towns are on the

river between the volcano and Armero.

President Belisario Betancur flew over the mud sea of Armero in a helicopter and said in a broadcast later: "The situation is very grave. I appeal for the solidarity of all Colombians. . . We don't yet know the full scope of the tragedy."

Hundreds of bodies were being taken to a soccer stadium in the

village of Guayabal, four miles from Armero, Gonzalez said.

"The bodies were torn apart, covered with mud and some of the hands looked as if they had been frozen in a clawlike fashion," he said.

Caracol radio said the ash fall was so heavy at 1 p.m. Thursday that "it looked like nighttime."

The ash included tiny pieces of lava, indicating that there had been a huge explosion, said Prof. Ruben Dario Linares, a volcanist at Colombia's National University in Bogota. He said there were no signs yet that molten lava had started to flow.

A Civil Defense spokesman, Maj. Hugo Ardila, told a midday news conference in Bogota that about 10,000 people had been found alive in Armero up to that time. They climbed trees, clung to roofs above the mud, and huddled behind a sturdy concrete cemetery wall that didn't fall.

One of them, Edilberto Nieto, told IRON radio: "We heard a frightening noise and then a blast of wind hit us and we saw fire falling from the sky. It was horrible, so horrible! My wife was killed. My mother was killed. My little girl who would have been four years old tomorrow died. One of my sisters was killed and one of my nephews."

Marina Franco de Huez told the radio: "The ash rain increased and the whole world began to scream. I woke up my daughter and we ran out to one of the streets around the cemetery. More than half of the population was buried under a tor-

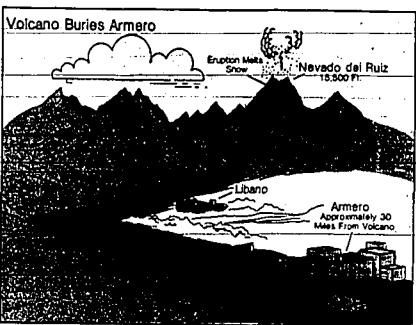
rent of mud that came with a horrible noise. It dragged houses, cattle, tree stumps and gigantic rocks. The church was buried, the school, the theater."

The Defense Ministry said the military had installed temporary hospitals in the villages of Leicrida and Mariquilla, near Armero, where there were thousands of people with injuries.

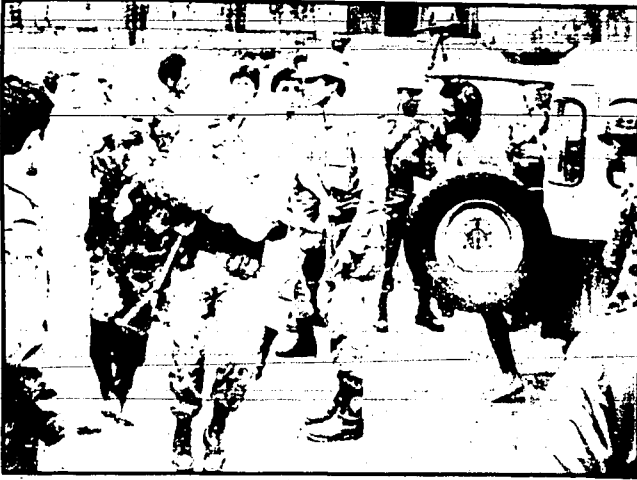
"Ambulances and rescue workers had trouble reaching the town because the avalanche destroyed the highway and five bridges leading to it," Caracol said, quoting Civil Defense workers.

"Some of the bodies had been under mud for six hours when we dug them out. We weren't even able to tell if they were men or women. They were just a mass of gray." Du-

Relief agency has dead to mourn

LOS ANGELES — Disaster relief agencies, still recovering from the enormous task of supplying aid to Mexican earthquake victims, began marshaling assistance Thursday for Colombians who saw their families, farms and homes washed away by volcanic mud and overflowing rivers.

One of those agencies, World Vision International, which is still aiding the stricken in Mexico and Ethiopia, had its own dead to mourn. Several Colombian staff members of

the organization and 178 children, ages 5 to 15, died at a day-school in the destroyed town of Armero. Americans sponsors' contributions of \$18 a month paid for the children's food and education.

World Vision in Monrovia, Calif., a religious charity that has channeled millions of dollars into relief programs in 80 countries, has scheduled airlifts of tents, blankets and medical supplies out of Miami and New York this weekend. "But this disaster was more personal for World Vision's staff than

most," said spokesman Brian Bird. "We do believe we've lost everybody in our Armero project," named Colegio Emery, in the heart of Armero, Bird said.

Two World Vision employees flew over the area Thursday, and radioed that "Armero no longer exists," Bird added. "You can't even see where there was a town."

World Vision maintains six other child-care centers in the area. "We don't know whether we've lost lives there, but it doesn't appear to be as devastated as Armero," Bird said.

Bacteria release wins OK

WASHINGTON — The Environmental Protection Agency granted a permit Thursday for the first experimental launching of man-made living organisms into the general environment — bacteria designed to protect plants against frost.

EPA granted an experimental pesticide use permit to Advanced Genetele Sciences Inc. of Oakland, Calif., for spraying the bacteria of one strain on 2-foot field in the Salinas Valley sometime in December or January.

A prominent critic of the whole field of genetic engineering responded with a lawsuit, trying to duplicate many strains in stopping the identical experiment by another sponsor. The critic, Jeremy Rifkin, contends that EPA has not adequately studied the concern that the experiment could affect rainfall. Jack Moore, assistant EPA administrator for pesticides, told a news conference: "The plausibility of any risk ecologically, or any other type, is extremely remote. It is not concerned with about potential harm to humans. Moore replied, 'I don't see any. The two bacteria being used are natural bacteria that are out there in huge numbers.'"

Reagan focuses on people-to-people

WASHINGTON — President Reagan said Thursday night that he will go to next week's Geneva summit on a mission of peace and will propose "the broadest people-to-people exchanges in the history of American-Soviet relations."

From the President, in a television address from the Oval Office, held out little hope for progress on the overriding issue of arms control and played down the importance of any "short-term agreements" that may be signed at the two-day summit, which begins Tuesday.

Reagan, who departs Saturday for Geneva, said he intends to engage Soviet leader

Mikhail S. Gorbachev in "what I hope will be a dialogue for peace that endures beyond my presidency."

Although the president recently said the meeting might produce a signal to spur the Geneva arms negotiators toward an agreement, there was no mention of that or any other sign of optimism on arms control in his final speech before leaving for the summit.

Gorbachev has made arms control his highest priority on the summit agenda, but has said no progress in that area is possible as long as Reagan pursues his Strategic Defense Initiative, commonly known as "Star Wars," to develop a space-based defense system against nuclear missiles.

For his part, Reagan has repeatedly insisted

that he will not abandon the program, although he mentioned it only once — and then by inference — in his speech.

Reagan said he has no higher priority than to finally "realize the dream" of ending "the dangerous competition in nuclear arms" and said he was pleased the Soviets have expressed an interest in reducing offensive weapons by 50 percent. That proposal produced an American counteroffer of reducing comparable nuclear systems by 50 percent, but it included cutting the Soviets have rejected.

"If we both reduce the weapons of war, there would be no losers, only winners," Reagan declared. "And the whole world would benefit if we could both abandon these weapons altogether and move to non-nuclear

defensive systems that threaten no one."

But the president offered nothing new on arms control and devoted much of his speech to his ambitious plans for expanding people-to-people contacts — indicating, perhaps, that the most substantive agreement expected from the summit may be in that area.

The United States and the Soviet Union reportedly already have completed a cultural exchange agreement to be signed at the summit. It would be the first cultural accord since 1979, when the United States suspended exchanges because of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan.

"We are proposing the broadest people-to-people exchanges in the history of American-

President signs measure averting federal default

WASHINGTON — The government narrowly averted default as President Reagan signed interim legislation Thursday night raising federal borrowing authority — to the national debt limit — to \$1.9 trillion.

The White House released a brief statement shortly after 6:30 p.m. MST saying that the president had signed the measure. Earlier in the day, with no debate and only about two dozen members present, the House, on a voice vote, approved the legislation that postpones a credit crunch through Dec. 6 by raising the government's \$1.824 trillion line of

credit by \$80 billion. The Senate passed it on a voice vote Wednesday night.

The action temporarily cleaned up the government's latest fiscal mess and cleared the decks for the president's meeting next week in Geneva with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, I-Kan., said the stopgap bill would "relieve the president of any burden while he was at the summit."

Without action, the government would have been in default. The president had ordered federal agencies to stop issuing new checks starting Friday if Congress had not increased the debt limit.

Reagan also signed the continuing ap-

propriations resolution, keeping in place the authority for government agencies to spend money although most appropriations bills have not been passed. The measure is another piece of the patchwork to keep the government functioning in the next month, since this bill has an expiration date of Dec. 12.

Attached to the legislation is an extension until Dec. 15 of the 16-cent-a-pack federal tax on cigarettes. Congress has not completed action on pending legislation making the 16-cent tax permanent and without the extension the tax would have dropped to 8 cents per pack after midnight Thursday.

The temporary bill also would extend until Dec. 14 a government program of aid to

workers and companies hurt by competition from imports, a limit on the size of federal Medicare reimbursements to doctors and hospitals, and the method of calculating benefits for unemployed railroad workers. Those programs also were expiring Thursday.

Wasting no time, the Treasury Department announced that it would borrow a total of \$61 billion to replenish the government's depleted coffers in a series of seven securities auctions beginning today.

Today alone, the government will raise \$22 billion in new cash in order to cover government pay checks and a \$16 billion interest payment that is coming due that day.

EPA gives survey of groundwater 'high priority'

BOISE — The possible contamination of groundwater by agricultural pesticides is a "high-priority" for the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, according to Bill Mullen, head of the agency's groundwater group for Idaho, Washington and Oregon.

Speaking to the Pacific Aerial Applicators Recertification Conference in Boise Tuesday and Wednesday, Mullen outlined the agency's upcoming national survey of agricultural

pesticides in the United States.

"The impacts of pesticides on groundwater is something we don't really have a very good handle on," Mullen told the Times-News in an interview Tuesday. "We really need to get our act together on agricultural chemicals."

Mullen told the spray group that the agency hopes pesticide users, particularly commercial applicators like the aerial sprayers, would consider information on sensitive groundwater areas and on leaching compounds to guide their recommendations for using pesticides. The national pesticide survey will be the

first of its kind to be done, Mullen said. The \$5 to \$6 million, two-year study will analyze water samples from over 1,500 wells, looking for 30 to 60 different pesticides found to have a high potential for leaching into groundwater. It will also look for "surrogates" of those chemicals — compounds formed by their decay.

If a given compound is found in a well, its presence will be confirmed by using at least two different analytical methods to make sure the positive result was not just produced by the test method selected.

The program will also attempt to identify the types and quantities of different pesticides being used in the U.S., as well as mapping the areas for the use of specific pesticides at the county level.

A pilot program in Washington state has been working on this mapping at the county level. Aside from national data about total sales of pesticides, very little is known about the use of specific pesticides in specific locations, or application rates.

Coupled with gathering this information

 There was no late, accurate count of the number of bodies recovered.
 "The Defense minister said 21 of the most seriously injured people pulled from the mud in Armero arrived on a military plane in Bogota Thursday night."
 "The mass of mud is up to five yards high in some areas. Some people were able to escape and climb over walls that weren't covered by the avalanche and were rescued with the help of ropes and hoses," said Paul Ramirez, a reporter for Todefear who was among the first on the scene.
 "Rescue workers are talking about 20,000 dead," Red Cross director Astolfo Franco said at Caracol. "It is an immense tragedy."
 "Eighty-five percent of the town is

destroyed, and we estimate there are 15,000 deaths," Gov. Eduardo Alzate of Tolima state, which includes Armero, told Caracol.
 "The last great eruption, with casualties and damage of the magnitude that appeared to be emerging in the Andes was in 1902 at Mount Pelee on the Caribbean island of Martinique. It killed 38,000 people, 29,000 of them in the town of Saint-Pierre."
 Heavy rains began about the time the 15,000-foot mountain erupted, gorging the river with more water, the radio said.
 Fernando Rivera, a crop-dusting pilot who flew over the devastated area, said the mud avalanche also destroyed the villages of Santuario, Carmelo and Pindallo, which had a total population of about 20,000.
 He said on Caracol that the mud

buried farmhouses for 25 miles along the river.
 "Some survivors were clinging to trees they had climbed, some were on roofs that weren't reached by the mud, and even some (were) in a cemetery that had a cement wall around it and that the mud did not knock down," Rivera said.
 "There's nothing but a sea of mud in Armero. All you can see are the roofs of the houses in parts of the town."
 The town's tallest building is the Catholic cathedral, whose steeple rises about three stories. Most buildings are of one story, with a few of two stories, and nearly all are made of concrete blocks.
 Other towns along the Langunilla were closer to the volcano, but apparently were spared because they sit on hills.

 Soviet relations," Reagan said, "changes in sports and culture, in the media, education and the arts. Such changes can build in our societies thousands of coalitions for cooperation and peace."
 "Governments can only do so much, he said, and "once they get the ball rolling, they should step out of the way and let people get together to share, enjoy, help, listen and learn from each other, especially young people."
 Reagan said he would propose to Gorbachev that the two nations exchange many citizens from fraternal, religious, educational and cultural groups and would suggest the exchange each year of thousands of college undergraduates and even younger students who would live with host families and attend schools or summer camps.
 He also suggested that the two nations compete in sports, launch joint space ventures and establish joint medical research projects. And he said he would encourage more appearances in each other's mass media by representatives of both countries.

 about water, the EPA's program will be mapping sensitive groundwater areas across the nation at the county level.
 "The overall goals of the program, outlined by Mullen in his presentation to the group Wednesday, are to characterize pesticide use across the country, track their occurrence in groundwater, estimate human exposure, and summarize the health effects of a given exposure level."
 "While the agency has been active in documenting the occurrence of contaminants in the past, very little information has been available on the specific health effects of a given exposure level, according to Mullen.
 Groundwater supplies just over 50 percent of the U.S. drinking water supplies and over 80 percent of drinking water in the Pacific Northwest. In Idaho, over 90 percent of the public drinking water supplies come from groundwater supplies, according to Mullen.
 The threat of groundwater contamination in the Pacific Northwest has been a great concern to Mullen, because of the region's dependence on groundwater and

because most aquifers in the region are "shallow" — close to the surface — and highly susceptible to contamination from agricultural pesticides, as well as other sources of pollution.
 Groundwater supplies are the key to future development in the region, according to Mullen, and he pointed out that Seattle and Portland have recently begun to put in wells to tap groundwater for their public water supplies because surface waters such as lakes and rivers are fully allocated.
 "While some feel that there is currently no problem and thus no need for increased regulation, cleanup of groundwater can be extremely expensive or even impossible, Mullen said.
 "It's kind of like that Fram Oil filter commercial," Mullen said, "where the mechanic holds up an oil filter and says 'You can pay me now, or you can pay me later.'"
 "Protecting groundwater is going to cost money," he said, "but not just to clean it up."
 "Just to pinpoint a plume of contamination can cost several hundred

thousand dollars," Mullen said.
 "Once its study is complete, the agency's task will be to develop effective regulations "without causing major problems for an agricultural industry that's already got severe economic problems," Mullen said.
 The EPA is promoting state studies and the development of state programs with a series of grants. An EPA grant is currently helping Idaho's development of a comprehensive groundwater management plan for the Snake River Basin.
 While the federal government has given states the lead, Mullen predicts they will have to come up with comprehensive, well-thought-out programs to keep control of the issue, given the current mood in Congress.
 "Congress is concerned enough to change the role of the federal government if they feel it's important," Mullen said. "If the states don't collectively get their acts together, the Congress will do something."
 Both the House and the Senate are considering a comprehensive groundwater protection bill.

 tiny nucleus around which dew turns into ice crystals.
 In the atmosphere, according to scientists Rifkin has consulted, this protein promotes the formation of rain from clouds.
 About 0.1 percent of the naturally occurring bacteria do not make the protein. What Advanced Genetic Sciences has done in greenhouse tests is delete part of the gene that directs the cell to make the protein, thus inactivating the gene. It hopes this strain, applied to a new blossom, will colonize the blossom before the dominant strain can get started — at least for a few weeks — and avoid frost damage down to 22 or 23 degrees.
 Though Rifkin protested that such a "deleted-gene mutant" is not found in nature, Tom Dwyer, president of the company, said the natural form of the "ice-minus" bacterium with an inactive gene and the deleted-gene form are "essentially identical."
 Rifkin also said the "genetically mutated Pseudomonas-syringae would compete with its wild counterpart," perhaps finding an ecological niche to survive permanently.

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

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McClure says time expiring on trade

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the unexpected boost the nation's textile industry has gotten from the U.S. Senate, Idaho Sen. James McClure says time is running out for President Reagan to get moving on solutions to America's trade problems before Congress enacts protectionist legislation over his veto.

"I'm getting awfully tired with no movement at all with respect to trade policy," McClure said Thursday in a telephone news conference from Washington.

While he was among the few non-copper-state Republicans to support the protectionist legislation on the textile industry last Tuesday, McClure said his vote against the president was an attempt to jolt the administration to action.

He said he will support the expected presidential veto of the textile bill but quickly added that his patience and that of other anti-protectionist senators is wearing thin.

"Certainly, the administration is gradually getting the notion that a trade policy is needed other than, 'Let the chips fall where they may,'" McClure said. "That isn't going to be tolerated in the Congress much longer."

On other issues, McClure said he believed the upcoming U.S.-Soviet summit can be considered a success even if it fails to produce any concrete agreements between the two superpowers since it will have given Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev a chance to size each other up and lay the ground work for future accommodations.

He expressed disappointment over the congressional action to extend the federal debt ceiling for another month, fearing the delay will take some steam out of the drive for adoption of a budget-balancing proposal. But he conceded the move was necessary so Reagan does not have to worry about that issue while attending the summit.

The senator also said he doubted that Congress can resolve differences over financing federal water projects, including three in Idaho, before the end of this year, although he expressed his continued support for those programs and the federal money committed to them. The dispute centers over the extent localities should contribute to the overall project cost.

Agreeing with many of his colleagues who opposed the textile measure, McClure said consideration must be given to potential retaliation from nations who are currently big purchasers of U.S. goods like farm commodities, and it is because of that prospect that a Reagan veto will be sustained right now.

But without some movement to reduce barriers to U.S. goods, erected by nations like Japan and curtail subsidies provided many foreign industries by their governments, Reagan could be only months away from losing that kind of confrontation on Capitol Hill, the senator said.

"Something like that is not likely to happen in the next three or four or five weeks," McClure said, but once Congress gets back in high gear next year, probably by late February or early March, the fuse could be lit.

Up to now, Congress has been dealing with protectionist legislation on almost an industry by industry basis, but McClure said the problem of imports is too large for that to continue much longer.

Firms increase reward

POCATELLO (AP) — Two businesses have raised the bounty belts and heater lines sometime late Tuesday or early Wednesday for vandals who sliced hoses and bells on 39 of the Pocatello School District's buses, cancelling more than 13,000 students an classes on Wednesday.

Superintendent Rulon Ellis said the reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the culprits was raised to \$300 on Thursday when \$100 each was added to the pot by KSEI radio and Martin Furniture in Pocatello. The school district offered a \$100 reward on Wednesday.

Ellis estimated the damage at \$1,200 to \$1,500. The buses were repaired and classes resumed on Thursday.

Use money to pay heating bills, group asks

BOISE (AP) — A Boise group is asking the Health and Welfare Department to stop diverting federal funds earmarked for energy assistance to other programs, but state officials say that would hurt crippled and abused children.

Heat for People, an umbrella group representing about 2,000 Idahoans, will take their plea to the Idaho Legislature, said group spokeswoman Ulahwti, who goes by only the single name.

Ulahwti said the state diverts \$1.2 million from the \$12.8 million in federal funds earmarked for energy assistance to needy Idahoans. The money is administered by the state Health and Welfare Department.

High said the agency can divert up to 10 percent of that money to other programs. Since the money became available in 1981, the department has used 10 percent of the money for programs aiding crippled and abused children.

Ms. High said if the \$1.2 million weren't diverted, the state would lose 30 workers who keep tabs on child abuse cases. Money used to finance major operations for needy children, such as repair of cleft palate and heart surgery, would be lost.

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PUC leaving Oregon alone

BOISE (AP) — Idaho utility regulators say they have no jurisdiction over service provided by Continental Telephone of the West in its Oregon exchanges near the Idaho border.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission on Wednesday rejected a request from Continental that it retain rate-setting authority over 583 of the company's customers in three eastern Oregon service areas.

The PUC for some time had been able to serve Continental's customers on both sides of the border by responding to complaints and setting local rates that Continental presented to Oregon regulators for concurrence.

"We have lost that ability due to the extreme changes that have occurred since the divestiture of AT&T," the commission said in a press release.

Even if it wanted to continue the practice of regulating Continental's business in eastern Oregon, "we find that we are without the jurisdiction to do so" under Idaho law, the PUC said.

Teen pregnancy laws could bring change

Our Sunday report on teen pregnancy in the Magic Valley has prompted some interesting observations which suggest the depth of the problem, both nationally and in the Magic Valley.

One telephone caller expressed outrage at the statements of the young women who have decided to keep their babies, despite obvious inability to financially provide for them.

To that person, the young women involved seemed to be repeating a pattern of what she called "welfare-child-welfare-child" which would burden both community social services and the general taxpayer.

Another observation—to be made about the articles is the lack of comment from the boy-fathers involved. The pregnant teen-age girls were, perhaps surprisingly, willing to discuss their decisions to keep their children. But, as is often the case, the article focused on the mothers, not the fathers.

Many young men have a narrow view about what is still known as "knocking someone up"—the problem is the girls' to solve; the boy is just—"sowing-wild oats."

Responsibility for teen pregnancy is not just the girl's, nor should the decision on whether she should "keep" her baby be made without consultation with parents or responsible counselors.

Often, as the one caller suggests, the social costs of such a decision are substantial and fall on all citizens.

But where are we to draw the line in a free society? Certainly, forced sterilization as applied in some other countries is not the answer.

The solution, it seems to us, is through education. A new Wisconsin law, for example, places the financial burden of a minor having children on (get this) the parents of both the mother and father.

The law has other provisions, such as the allocation of \$1 million in state funds for pregnancy counseling, requiring consent of a girl before a hospital or clinic will tell her parents of an abortion, and (get this) repeal of restrictions on the advertising and sale of contraceptives.

Time will tell if any of this will work. If it does, other states could follow with serious efforts to improve education for teens about pregnancy.

The law says, in effect, that all of us—parents, young people, have a responsibility for our acts.

That is something which, tragically, doesn't come through in the comments of many who just bring a baby into the world with little idea of how it will be cared for.



Bears have value beyond detriments

A University of California (Davis) professor darkened the Idaho sheep industry's good intentions during his speech this week at the Idaho Wool Growers Association convention at Burley.

Walter F. Howard called for a "detractive" for wild animals in his remarks Monday.

Howard wants wildlife officials to re-convert Eastern Idaho into a free-fire zone for stockmen who face losses from grizzly bears.

Perhaps life in a California university ivory tower has twisted Howard's sense of values.

He views domestic sheep as sacred animals which must be protected from the harshness of Idaho's wild country at all costs. Since a fat lamb is only worth about \$70, grizzlies must be worthless indeed.

My ancestors were among the original Eastern Idaho settlers who came into the upper Snake River country behind their herds more than 100 years ago.

In those days, there were few ranchers and a lot of what were then thought of as "the great white bears."

Grizzlies and other predators killed domestic sheep, cattle, horses and men. Therefore, we killed the bears, the lions, the wolves, the foxes, the birds of prey and the coyotes. We called them varmints and we killed them out of the necessity of survival in a wilderness.

Most other wild animals were good to eat or carried for what could be sold at a profit after trapping expenses were deducted. Therefore, we killed the elk, the deer, moose, wild sheep and goats, the beaver, bison, mink, marten and otter. We called them critters, and we killed without regard for seasons, limits or conservation.

The Harrops and other pioneer families killed to make Idaho safe for sheep too stupid to survive without a herder and outdoorsmen so green that we have to train rescue crews for the fall lost-hunter searches that annually accompany

our big game hunting seasons.

We did our job so well that very little of Eastern Idaho's wildlife was left by the early 1900s. If it was in the mountains and moved, it was probably a cow, a ewe or a horse.

Since those days, we've come to realize that wildlife has a value beyond its economic benefit or detriment to stockmen.

A mountain with elk or deer represents a quality recreational experience for Idahoans who want to follow in the footprints of pioneers for a day or two each year.

A mountain with grizzlies or wolves becomes shrouded in the unknown, the half-fearred, the fascinating pulse of wilderness that many of us yearn for, now that it is nearly gone.

One pocket of wildlife remains and less damaged by the pioneers: just across the Montana boundary was Yellowstone Park, where much of the nation's wildlife heritage was preserved.

That pocket served as a reservoir against the time when American ranchers and other outdoorsmen would regain their senses.

And now, the conservation ethic we began to develop at the turn of the century has come of age. Just as some of the bears have begun to venture out of the park.

In recent years, an age-old feud has cooled; cattlemen and sheepmen have begun talking to one another, and I've met some grizzly-troubled sheepmen from eastern Idaho who don't want to kill bears. They just want to raise sheep.

They want to see their woody critters grow and prosper in the highlands just west of the park.

They want to see elk and deer and goats and bears while they watch their lambs nurse and their ewes graze.

They want the richness of a life wider and freer than those who live in cities—and killing the great bears would make their lives poorer.

Many sheep growers are concerned with the image they've earned as indiscriminate killers of predators and want to escape it.

In several instances, sheep men have exercised deliberate moderation when their sheep were under sustained attack by grizzly bears.

As repayment, they've been forced from their leased federal rangeland because bears were present. In addition, they've had to absorb the losses caused by marauding brauns.

Although we constantly hear of bear-human conflicts, grizzlies are living on the thin edge of extinction in the lower 48 states. Fewer than 1000 live in the American Rocky Mountains. Killing any more of them may plunge the species into an irreversible decline at a time we want to see the species merge and grow stronger.

We can have both bears and sheep if the government will simply pay ranchers for their losses to such endangered predators as grizzlies.

At current prices, the 2,500 head of Idaho sheep killed by bears in 1984 would be worth about \$120,000. That's a drop in the bucket compared with the millions brought in the Yellowstone Park region by tourists who hope to see bears.

Society has already admitted that predators which threaten livestock. It hasn't worked, because those predators often have value far greater than the livestock they eat.

It is time that we asked Congress to preserve both the sheep rancher and the great bears through creative legislation.

Toxics regulations prove you can fight city hall — and win

Something significant happened at the Twin Falls City Council meeting on Nov. 4. In a city known for minimum restriction of business, some new regulations were passed. These were in the form of the ordinance to regulate the location of hazardous materials businesses in the city.

Along with the Pocatello ordinance governing transportation of toxics, these are the first attempts by city governments in Idaho to address the growing problem of toxic materials.

It also demonstrates that, at least in Twin Falls, through effective and persistent citizen action, changes can be made. You can fight city hall, and even more important, you can win.

The Idaho Neighbors Network began its work three years ago because of the storage of pesticides in the Buena Vista neighborhood. With the large amount of neighbors suffering from common symptoms, it became clear that the chemicals needed to be distanced from the people. It also became clear that some type of ordinance was needed to ensure that this bun-

ching together chemicals and people did not happen again.

INN initiated a campaign to achieve both of these objectives. As a result of public pressure, the involvement of various regulatory agencies, and economic factors, the warehouses left the Buena Vista area by late summer of 1993. They moved to their present location because: "A" the city allowed them 429-hour insurance rates due to fire and police liability protection, and "C" to be in compliance with the Uniform Building and Fire Codes.

In the spring of 1993, INN also began working in another area to keep these types of facilities away from residences and to require other safety provisions. A key part of both ordinances proposed by INN was the requirement of a special use permit to provide better notification for neighbors. We felt people had a right to know what was

coming into their neighborhood, and to have some control over its future.

INN also wanted to tie a buffer zone around these toxic facilities to residences instead of zoned residential areas, to have fencing to keep our children and pets from wandering in, and to require a license of some kind to prove the manager had received training in safety handling hazardous materials. Most of these fell by the council wayside—dollars were more important than safety.

Two proposed ordinances were shot down by the council, one in August 1993, the other in April 1995. Progress was made, however, because at the time of the second defeat, several council members acknowledged, for the first time, that there was a need to get a handle on toxic chemicals.

One of this year's council members made it his goal to get the city council to reform the Twin Falls City Citizens Ordinance Committee. The committee was composed of several city staff, Mary McTusky, other citizens, and INN members.

In this proposal came the feature to

create a hazardous use or H-1 zone in the southeast heavy industrial zone. The definitions and quantities were simplified by using those already adopted by the city in the Uniform Building and Fire Codes. However, because the special use permit and tying of buffer zones to residences had twice been turned down by the city, the only protection offered was a 300' setback to zoned residential areas adjacent to the H-1 area.

The central problem facing the committee was this: when a city permits large concentrations of hazardous or highly toxic chemicals to locate in city limits, where can they be put so as to not harm public health and the environment. The problem is in the event of a fire or accident, all know accidents do happen. Local examples include Simpli-Trol, Cenelec, and Lupert/1993.

Therefore, it seemed most sensible to put these materials in an area as sparsely populated and downwind of the city as possible.

INN fully admits the lack of protection for the residents in the affected area was a great fail. We also admit that those folks should have been consulted before the pro-

posal was submitted to planning and zoning, as we had two years ago. Fortunately for them and the city, they did not sit idly by, but raised objections to this oversight. Consequently, the measure was amended to provide a 300 foot buffer in the industrial areas for those existing residences and to require a special use permit.

It is important to note that with the adoption of this ordinance, the Twin Falls City Council finally admitted the need to take action to the potential problems that hazardous materials present. They deserve credit for this. Why it took three years to get this to happen is another question. But the record should read that without a constant effort on the part of Idaho Neighbors Network and other concerned citizens, nothing would have happened.

The law we now have is far from adequate for providing as much protection for citizens as possible, but it is a big beginning.

Canadians delay trade discussions

The first meeting on trade issues between Gov. John Evans and British Columbia Premier William Bennett has been postponed for at least a month as officials at another northern Idaho mill announced Thursday that they have shut down because of rising Canadian lumber imports.

At the same time, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, indicated little optimism that talks with the Canadians like those contemplated by the governor will yield any voluntary action on that government's part to curtail the import of primarily dimension lumber into the U.S.

"It will take action by our government," McClure said of the imports that have been blamed for the depression in Idaho's timber industry that produces mainly dimension lumber.

"Unaware at the time of the last-minute postponement of today's meeting in Coeur d'Alene between Evans and Bennett, McClure said, "The governor has a chance, and I hope he'll take it to make a point with the Canadians that we're dead serious about protecting our industry."

Early in the afternoon, attorneys for the Riley-Creek Lumber Co. of Laclede filed a petition for protection from creditors while the company financially reorganizes under

Chapter 11 of the federal bankruptcy code.

President Mark Brinkmeyer immediately shut down the mill which had a monthly payroll of \$250,000 for a workforce of some 150 and provided an outlet for contract loggers around the Panhandle town of 200. He blamed the bulk of the company's problems on rising imports.

"It's a combination of the Canadian situation and overproduction," Brinkmeyer said. He said the mill began operating in 1981 when there were only 800,000 housing starts nationwide and interest rates were at 18 percent.

He joined McClure in saying that the issue must be addressed by the governments of both nations, "or we don't have a future, and that's not just us. It's all the mills."

Evans and Bennett, cochairmen of the Governors-Premiers Task Force on Trade, had been scheduled to meet Friday to lay the ground work for future task force efforts to ease trade tensions between the two neighbors, particularly on the timber issue.

But Bennett notified the governor's office Thursday that because of the press of other business, he needed more time to prepare for the session, according to Evans spokesman Dave McAlinden. McAlinden said the meeting will now probably take place in mid-December.

Forrey charges IEA meddles in church affairs

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Robert Forrey accused the Idaho Education Association Thursday of improperly interfering in church affairs, suppressing information from its members and refusing to let outsiders view a film in which the group defended attacks by conservatives. Forrey, R-Nampa, and Jim DeVries, a teacher at Cole Christian School in Boise, also accused the some Idaho educators of promoting "secular humanism" — a term they

had difficulty in defining. "I believe the attacks on the association are thinly veiled," said Gayle Moore, IEA spokeswoman. "They are not really anything new." Forrey, a long-standing critic of the IEA, said at a news conference in Boise that he is leading the assault on the IEA because parents feel too intimidated to express their concerns to local school boards. "We're trying to help the teachers," said Forrey, stressing that his

remarks were aimed at the IEA and First Baptist Church. not education in general. The church showed a film produced by D. James Kennedy, a Florida minister, that blasts the National Parent-Teachers Association.

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Evans hears growers' view of wheat woes

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Farmers will have to cut wheat production and the federal government reduce its wheat stockpiles if the United States is to regain its lost export markets, eastern Idaho farmers told Gov. John Evans on Thursday.

About 10 Blackfoot-area farmers briefed Evans on the nation's wheat glut and the problems its caused them prior to his testimony in Portland, Ore., today at an Agricultural Export Commodities Commission meeting.

The governor said the U.S. has lost 25 percent of its wheat export markets in recent years because of the strong dollar. He asked for suggestions to carry to the commission on how to solve the problem.

Bingham County Commissioner Richard Williams said growers need incentives to reduce land in wheat production. Previous programs resulted in farmers tilling marginal ground and using subsidies to buy fertilizer, which resulted in bigger and better yields, Williams said.

"Let's make each individual reduce, not just shift," he said. "Technology has to be used to increase production with less acreage."

Farmer Laverle Stecklein said he wants to see the federal wheat reserves depleted, and farmers selling their wheat on export markets.

Rate hearings early in 1986

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Public Utilities Commission has scheduled hearings for early next year on Utah Power & Light Co.'s proposed 11.2-percent rate hike for its 40,000 eastern Idaho customers.

The commission has set public hearings for Jan. 13 and March 5 in Pocatello on the Salt Lake City-based utility's request for \$14.2 million a year in additional revenue.

IP&L will present its case at the January meeting, with PUC staff and intervenor testimony presented in March, the commission said.

The company said it needs the increase to bring rates in Idaho more closely in line with the cost of providing service.

The proposed increase would mean a 44 to \$10 monthly rate increase for the company's typical residential customer, depending on how much electricity is used.

Penn State heart patient dies

HERSHEY, Pa. (AP) — Anthony Mandia, the first recipient of the Penn State temporary artificial heart, died of an "overwhelming infection" Thursday after 18 days of life on a human-donor heart, authorities said.

Mandia, 44, died at 12:35 p.m. MST from complications linked to an infection along his chest incision, said Carl Andrews, a spokesman for Milton S. Hershey Medical Center.

Mandia's family had visited with him earlier in the day but the hospital did not say if they were with him when he died.

Beatrice agrees to big buyout

CHICAGO (AP) — Beatrice Cos. said Thursday it agreed to be acquired by Kohlberg Kravis Roberts & Co. for \$50 a share, or \$6.1 billion, in what would be the largest leveraged buyout in history.

A partner of Kohlberg Kravis, a privately held New York investment firm, also said that following the acquisition, Donald P. Kelly would become chairman and chief executive of Beatrice, a diversified food and consumer-products concern. Kelly formerly headed Esmark Inc., which Beatrice bought last year for \$2.7 billion.

Beatrice agreed to be acquired after Kohlberg Kravis, which specializes in leveraged buyouts, sweetened its offer to exchange \$43 in cash and \$7 in preferred stock for each Beatrice common share.

Defense bill vote put on hold

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate won't be asked to vote on this year's Pentagon budget bill until after next week's super-power summit in hopes that an arms agreement might mean the defense budget can be cut, Sen. Mark Hatfield said Thursday.

The Oregon Republican, chairman of the Appropriations Committee and a frequent critic of President Reagan's defense buildup, said he would hold the defense bill off the floor until after the Nov. 19-20 summit between Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

"If the administration is going to Geneva to challenge the Soviets to end the arms race," said Hatfield, "it is possible that some of these nuclear and chemical programs won't require funding. Perhaps they will require less funding."

Rajneesh pleads guilty; will leave

PORTLAND (AP) — Indian guru Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh pleaded guilty Thursday to arranging sham marriages to help his foreign disciples remain in the United States illegally, and he agreed to leave the country immediately.

"I never want to return again," he told U.S. District Judge Edward Leavy.

In a plea bargain, Rajneesh was given a suspended 10-year-prison sentence and fined \$300,000 on the two counts of federal immigration violations.

Leavy gave Rajneesh five days to leave the United States. Sources quoted by The Oregonian in a copyrighted story in its early Friday editions said Rajneesh planned to return to his native India.

Rajneesh, 53, pleaded guilty to one count of conspiracy to arrange the sham marriages and one count of lying to the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service.

He also agreed to drop certain lawsuits his sect has filed against the government. The fine includes \$140,000 in prosecution costs.

Rajneesh had pleaded innocent to 35 felony counts against him in an Oct. 23 grand jury indictment charging that he lied to immigration officials and conspired to arrange the fake marriages.

Turner said the guru also would order the dismissal of four civil lawsuits filed by his sect, two against the Immigration and Naturalization Service, one against the State Department and one against U.S. Attorney General Edwin M. Meese and other government officials.

Rajneesh had pleaded innocent to 32 counts of arranging sham marriages, one count of conspiring to arrange fake marriages and two counts of lying to federal authorities about his intent to remain in the United States.

The charges carry maximum penalties totaling 175 years in prison and a \$350,000 fine.

Rajneesh, who had vowed to fight the charges, has been free on \$500,000 bail since Friday, when he pleaded innocent. A Feb. 18 trial date had been set.

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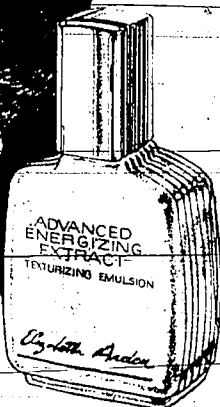
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Workers with AIDS not further curbed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Public Health Service, unveiling new guidelines to prevent the spread of AIDS by food service and other workers, called Thursday for increased awareness of existing sanitary precautions, but said that in general, no new special restrictions are needed.

Dr. James O. Mason, acting assistant secretary for health in the Health and Human Services Department, said the guidelines "represent no change in the basic message about AIDS that the Public Health Service has been conveying

all along — that AIDS is a blood-borne, sexually transmitted disease that is not spread by casual contact."

"Don't misunderstand me — AIDS is frightening. And we are in the midst of an epidemic of fear," added Mason, who also is director of the Centers for Disease Control.

In general, the guidelines say AIDS patients can remain in virtually any occupation without special restriction, as long as their cases do not include symptoms such as open sores that would be grounds for

removing them whether they had AIDS or not.

"Symptomatic sick people should not be in the workplace, but there's no reason to single out the AIDS patient," Mason told a news conference. "If a person is not symptomatic, there's no reason they shouldn't be in the workplace."

In response to a question, Mason said the only exception might be surgeons, dentists and related health-care professionals who actually work inside the body. Their status remains under study, he said,

and further guidelines will be issued.

The guidelines say there is no need for broad screening programs to detect carriers of the AIDS virus because acquired immune deficiency syndrome, though deadly, is difficult to transmit, especially in the workplace.

Routine precautions against the spread of infectious diseases should be followed, the guidelines said. Some occupations, such as barbers and hairdressers, education programs on disease control should be required by local authorities as a condition of licensing, the guidelines said.

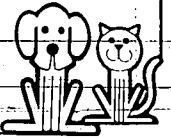
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Reagan makes case for rebels

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan told Congress Thursday that continued U.S. aid for rebels fighting the leftist government of Nicaragua is needed to "prevent the consolidation of a totalitarian state allied with Cuba and the Soviet bloc in Central America."

Reagan said recent events "clearly show the need for continued support for the Nicaraguan democratic resistance."

Trade charges urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan's top trade advisers are recommending that the president initiate a major unfair trading complaint against Japan for "dumping" low-cost computer parts in the United States, administration sources said Thursday.

The proposed move, if carried out by the president, would mark the first time the administration has moved to limit imports since the president's "free trade, fair trade" speech in September.

Thus far, all actions taken by the administration have been aimed at opening foreign markets to U.S.

goods, rather than restricting imports.

The recommendation, proposed by the Cabinet-level "strike force" on trade created by Reagan in September, came a day after the Republican-controlled Senate voted 60-39 to limit textile imports, primarily from Asian countries. The Democratic-ruled House has passed similar legislation.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said Thursday that the bill, which the administration has criticized as protectionist, was "almost certain candidate for a veto."

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Quake hits Alaska

PALMER, Alaska (AP) — A moderate earthquake rocked portions of sparsely populated southwestern Alaska on Thursday, but there were no reports of damage or injuries, the Alaska Tsunami Warning Center reported.

The tremor, which occurred at 1:18 p.m. MST, was centered offshore about 580 miles southwest of Anchorage, measured 5.7 on the Richter scale, said Dennis Traturyk.

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Yurchenko scorns queries on KGB

Botha asks panel to accept blacks

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha asked a panel that advises Parliament on Thursday to search for ways to accept black members.

"Reform means new adaptations," Botha told the 60-member President's Council in Cape Town. "New circumstances call for a new approach."

Although the government says it is reforming apartheid, critics argue

that changes in the system have been insufficient to meet black demands and end 15 months of riots.

Police, meanwhile, said violence flared anew in seven black areas killing one black and injuring two whites. And the government reported that unemployment among whites, Asians and people of mixed ancestry rose more than 130 percent in the past year.

"The government is committed to

the principle of a united South Africa, joint citizenship and franchise for all within the structures chosen for South Africans by South Africans," Botha said.

The council, with 41 whites, 13 people of mixed race and six Asians, is supposed to settle differences among the three segregated chambers of Parliament — one for whites, another for Asians and a colored, or mixed-race chamber.

MOSCOW (AP) — Vitaly Yurchenko, denying he defected and scorning questions about his connection to the KGB, made his first public appearance in the Soviet Union Thursday and insisted he was kidnapped and drugged by the CIA.

Flanked by Soviet officials, Yurchenko appeared at a news conference in a Foreign Ministry auditorium packed with Western reporters and Soviet journalists.

Yurchenko left the United States on Nov. 6 in a surprise ending to what the State Department said was a defection three months earlier by one of the KGB's senior spies.

The Soviets frequently broke into laughter as Yurchenko derided the CIA, its director William Casey and some of the Western correspondents who asked questions.

The news conference was reminiscent of an appearance last year by Oleg Bitov, a Soviet journalist who defected to Britain, lived there for a year and then suddenly appeared before reporters in Moscow saying he had been abducted and drugged by British spies.

Yurchenko read a prepared statement in which he repeated most of what he told a news conference at the Soviet Embassy in

Washington last week, when he announced that he would return to Moscow.

He said he was abducted Aug. 1 on the steps of St. Peter's Basilica in Rome and taken to Washington, where he was first kept in a hospital and then in a CIA "safe house" in the suburb of Fredericksburg, Va.

Yurchenko, flatly denying that he defected, said CIA agents gave him drugs and tried to convince him he was a traitor to his homeland.

But Yurchenko would not say directly whether he worked for the KGB secret police and intelligence agency.

Icelander wins title in pageant

LONDON (AP) — Miss Iceland, Holmfríour Karlsdottir, was chosen Miss World Thursday night before a cheering audience in Royal Albert Hall. The runners-up were Miss United Kingdom and Miss U.S.A., Brenda Denton of Hobbs, N.M.

Miss Karlsdottir, a blonde, 22-year-old kindergarten teacher, was awarded a \$7,000 prize and a work contract worth \$15,000 in a competition entered by young women from 78 countries.

The new Miss World broke into delighted smiles as she was crowned, flanked by Mandy Adee Shires, 19, a model from the United Kingdom, and Miss Denton, a 22-year-old computer student at Texas Tech University, chosen as second runner-up.

"I can't believe it, really," said Miss Karlsdottir, the first woman from Iceland to win the world title.

"I'll have to leave my nursery children for a year... and I just hope they'll miss me," she said, speaking in English. "I will do my best. I love to travel."

Apology said to end crisis

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Ariel Sharon gave Prime Minister Shimon Peres an apology of sorts late Thursday for criticizing his policies, thus ending a crisis that nearly brought down the coalition government, other Cabinet ministers reported.

The prime minister said Wednesday he intended to fire the outspoken Sharon, who is trade and industry minister. Sharon accused him of conducting secret peace negotiations with Jordan and Palestinians, and following policies that would "cost a great deal of blood."

"The affair is over since Sharon addressed all the points raised by the prime minister," Education Minister Yitzhak Navon of Peres' Labor Party said on Israel television. "As far as we're concerned, there is regret or an admission that he either had not meant it or retracted the position he took."

Navon added, however, that if Sharon attacked Peres in the future, "there'll be a dismissal notice, and that's that."

Intermediary says talks progressing

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The archbishop of Canterbury's troubleshooter said Thursday he was in contact with the kidnapers who are holding at least four Americans hostage. But he warned that if anything goes wrong, he and the hostages might be killed.

"They're taking a risk, obviously, in meeting me, just as much as I'm taking a risk meeting them. A wrong move and people could lose their lives, including myself," said Terry Waite.

Waite, 46, stressed that his efforts to free the Americans have "reached a critical and dangerous stage... I have been in touch (with the kidnapers). Progress has been made and we are moving forward."

He would not identify the kidnapers, who are believed to be Shiite Moslem fundamentalists.

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Trade center team launches fund campaign

TWIN FALLS — The brain trust behind an agricultural trade center at the College of Southern Idaho is starting to seek support and seed money for the project from private industry and from legislators.

Magic Valley Agricultural Institute, a small group of businessmen and educators chartered last month, opened a campaign Thursday to circulate its plan among area agribusinesses, influential legislators and the public.

"We need to get a feeling of where we're at," said Marc Peperzak, a founder of the institute.

The group already has won some backing. CSI President Jerry Meyerhoefer said Thursday the college most likely could find room for a small center by next spring. A new addition to CSI's administrative building should free up other space on campus, he said.

Within the past few days, Lt. Gov. David Leroy also has pledged political support for an agricultural trade center. Leroy, currently campaigning for governor, did not mention any location, but he did discuss the CSI proposal at a meeting of the institute's board on Tuesday.

The Magic Valley institute said Thursday it will ask for volunteer time, general sponsorship and, eventually, for contributions to

put the center on its feet.

The members first will contact commodity groups, state and federal legislators and private business interests personally, and then widen the campaign to the general public, they said.

Neither a budget nor a timetable for putting the center into operation has yet been set. CSI Development Director Joan Edwards said the possibility of a federal grant for international trade education also exists.

However, it is not the main thrust of the funding. "I think it has to be private sector-oriented to begin with," Peperzak said. A proposal for an agricultural trade information center last year relied on obtaining a federal grant. However, the project fell

apart when the Idaho World Trade Association based in Twin Falls, could not raise required matching money soon enough to meet a federal deadline for a grant application.

The currently proposed Idaho Agricultural Trade Center would offer not only information, but also a place to sell Idaho commodities and agriculturally related technology.

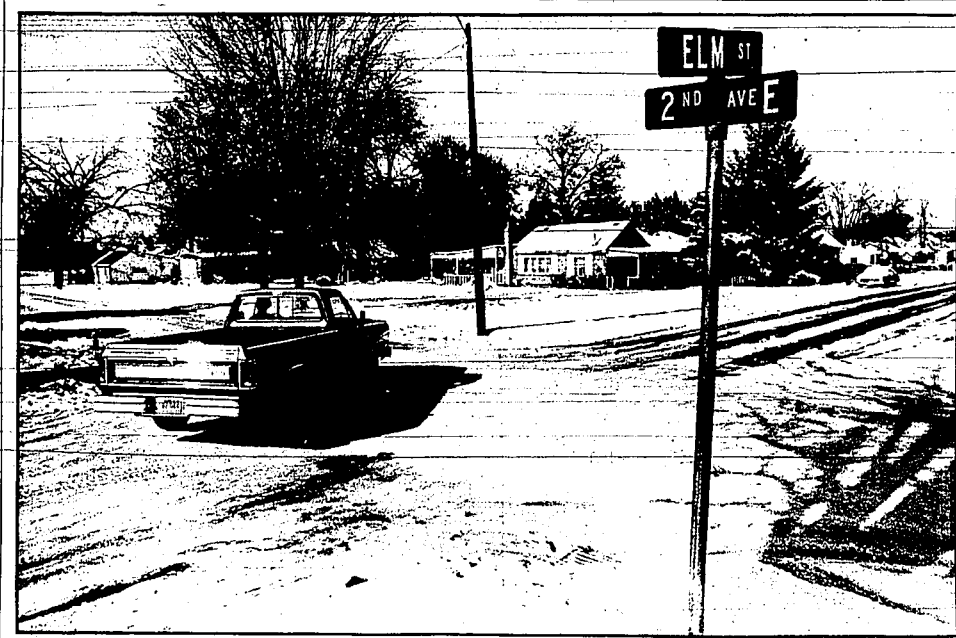
It would provide information, a show place for products and a meeting place for Idaho suppliers and foreign traders to forge deals, the organizers say. Government trade missions can attract interest, but rarely can actually negotiate a sale, they say.

The trade center also could become a

tourist attraction and an education facility. It could eventually present seminars and courses on international trade.

The trade center is the first project fielded by the Magic Valley Agricultural Institute, which was founded to develop agribusiness in south-central Idaho.

Founders include: Peperzak, who is president of Aurora Capital Corp. of Twin Falls; retired Kimberly farmer C. L. "Foggie" Fisher; Curtis H. Eaton, president of Twin Falls Bank & Trust Co.; C. Barney Carlson, vice president and manager of Idaho First National Bank's downtown office in Twin Falls; and Mike Glenn, director of the Vocational Division at CSI.

Injury-accident renews call for stop sign

TWIN FALLS — A Wednesday morning accident at the uncontrolled intersection of Elm Street and Second Avenue East has renewed the interest of nearby residents for the installation of a stop sign.

The city of Twin Falls is ahead of the game, however, with a soon-to-be completed study of the intersection that was initiated this summer by complaining residents.

An 8-year-old boy was injured Wednesday when the car his mother was driving collided with a vehicle driven by Charles Mattice, 58, of Twin Falls. Ralph Hopkins of Twin Falls was reported in good condition Thursday at Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

His mother, 28-year-old Maria Hopkins, and another passenger, Steve Hopkins, 11, suffered minor injuries. Mattice wasn't injured.

Police report that Mrs. Hopkins failed to yield at the intersection.

James Arthurs of 170 Elm St. said Thursday that the city should do something about the intersection. "It wasn't unusual for cars to wind up in the front yards of the people residing near the intersection, he said.

He estimated at least 15 accidents took place this year at the intersection. He feared for his children and property and for those of his neighbors.

He hopes the city will take action before someone is killed in an accident, Arthurs said.

The city already has its eye on the intersection and should be ready within

the month with recommendations about what needs to be done, if anything.

City Engineer Gary Young said two people who resided in the area requested some traffic control there last summer. As a result, the city initiated a study of the area. It found six accidents were reported there in 1985, a drastic jump from one reported accident in 1983 and 1984. Usually, five accidents per year is considered high.

His office will review the accident reports from police to determine if they were related to the uncontrolled intersection.

A traffic count of the area was recently completed, Young said. The study wasn't implemented until October because the required traffic counters weren't available until then.

In addition, his office had to wait until school started because summer traffic tended to be erratic.

Crews also checked for any site hazards in the area.

With all the information gathered, Young's office will report to City Manager Tom Courtney with a recommendation about the intersection. The City Council probably will make any final determination.

Normally, the city does an annual review of accident-high intersections in January, Young said.

His office receives about four to five similar complaints a year, he added.

Arthurs had a theory about why there were accidents at the intersection. "From my view of it, people just don't care about looking."

Minimum flow plan supported

But Blaine County residents want more

HAILEY — A minimum stream flow for the Big Wood River in Blaine County sought by the state is not enough, but it should be granted as a first step to preserving the river's value for recreation, the Department of Water Resources was told Wednesday by local residents.

The vast majority of people who spoke at a hearing in Hailey supported the 70-cubic-foot-per-second minimum stream-flow water right sought by the Idaho Water Resources Board as an "absolute" minimum to protect the river's fisheries.

They said, however, the river needs more guaranteed water to protect riverside habitats for other wildlife and to keep the river attractive for recreation, which is important to the local economy.

"There is an awful lot of money coming in here from seasonal visitors," said Ed Nigbor, the county's planning director, who said the county's retail sales and building activity is far above what the local population can support.

"I think these (economic figures) all show that recreation is the economic base of the county," he said.

Nigbor said the Blaine County Board of Commissioners not only supports the 70 cfs sought at the request of the Idaho Department of Fish and Game, but it also wants a more detailed study of the river to determine if a higher stream flow is needed to protect values other than fish populations.

The river's overall attractiveness to tourists, the seclusion it provides and its potential for Streamside development also need protection, he said.

Fish and Game officials and other residents lent their support to the contention that 70 cfs on the 10-mile reach of the river from Ketchum to Bellevue was the absolute minimum needed to protect the stream.

Regional Wildlife Biologist Ted Chu said anything below that amount would threaten the river's fishery and its streamside vegetation, a habitat for a number of birds and small mammals.

"I would say the 70 cfs is an absolute necessity. The scenario of having anything less than that would be a disaster," Chu said.

A conservation officer in the area for 10 years, Chu said the stream provides fishing opportunities and solitude to many local residents as well as the tourists.

The Northern Rockies Chapter of the Sierra Club also called for protection of the stream.

Local club representative Rick Johnson of Hailey called the 70 cfs a "rock bottom minimum." He said

On Addison Avenue

P & Z paves way for more offices

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Planning and Zoning Commission has given its approval to a plan to allow professional offices on more of the residential section of Addison Avenue.

Jeff Stoker, a state representative and Twin Falls attorney, has asked the city to rezone the north side of Addison Avenue to allow professional offices from Harrison Street to the alley between Lincoln Street and Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

Stoker has also requested and been granted a special use permit to establish a professional office at 733 Addison Avenue, which lies on the residential stretch of the thoroughfare.

Most of that section of Addison Avenue is zoned R-2 for single family housing and duplexes. It includes many large, masonry homes built decades ago along the original townsite. If the zoning plan gains the approval of the Twin Falls City Council, professional offices would be allowed in addition to residences on all of Addison

Avenue between Washington Street and Blue Lakes Boulevard. The proposal complies with the city's comprehensive zoning plan, which serves as a blueprint for long-range city development.

"I'm seeking recognition of what Addison is," Stoker said at a Tuesday night commission meeting. "It is a state highway with little appeal for residential neighborhoods."

Commissioner Gary Bond said that if the change is not permitted, residents along the street will not be able to sell their homes.

City staff members said 16 other individuals had joined Stoker in the zoning change request, but only Stoker spoke in favor of the proposal Tuesday.

Lynn Messman of 174 Fillmore St. was the only person to oppose the zoning change. However, when the matter comes before the City Council in the next month, Councilmember Mary McClusky is expected to join those who speak against the change. She owns a home on Fillmore Street, adjacent to one which could be allowed to become an office.

School shortfall sparks crunch in Shoshone

SHOSHONE — The Shoshone School District has implemented a "spending slowdown."

Superintendent Tim Adsit told the school board Monday that the district continues to be in a state of financial emergency and faces a potential shortfall of \$34,000 this fiscal year as a result of a state-ordered holdback in funds.

This shortfall is in addition to the approximately \$35,000 deficit shown by the 1984/85 audit approved by the board Monday.

"The financial status of the district does not

look rosy," Adsit said.

Some proposals for helping to reduce the deficit include reducing the teaching staff by not replacing business teacher Edward Anderson who retired earlier this month, eliminating a library aide position at the high school and using volunteer labor to do some building maintenance during the Christmas break.

However, the question of staff changes was tabled for further study since it does not affect the current year's budget.

The board instructed Adsit to implement a "spending slowdown" by telling district staff to economize in every way possible, turn down

thermostat, use paper carefully, "tighten each program's belt" and use all available supplies before ordering anything new.

"We have to stay within the budget, don't overspend," Trustee Pat O'Malley said.

The board also directed Adsit to place suggestion boxes in the school buildings where district patrons are encouraged to place suggestions for "constructive, cost-savings" ideas.

The suggestion boxes were in place Wednesday.

Trustee Joe Aikins said he "put out some feelers" on the possibility of a mid-winter volunteer project.

Watkins says recovery act disastrous

Claims aiding business will aid state's schools

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Economic Recovery Act is a collection of tax increases that would be an economic disaster act if enacted, says State Sen. Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls.

Watkins, chairman of the Senate committee on taxation and a 2nd District congressional candidate, says he doesn't think tax increases are in the best interests of the state, since the economy is weak.

The Economic Recovery Act is aimed at increasing funding for public schools and state-supported colleges and universities, its sponsors say. "I don't know if we're under-funded... for the schools we

have, I think we do a pretty good job."

The best thing the Legislature can do for the schools is to be more responsive to business, he said. Echoing Lt. Gov. David Leroy's gubernatorial announcement speech, Watkins said the answer to the state's economic problems is "Jobs, Jobs, Jobs."

An all-Republican state of statewide and federal representatives will be helpful for the state's economy, he said. "A Republican government is more apt to get business into Idaho than we have done in the past," Watkins said.

A Republican congressman will be important as well, he said. "We need to get someone back there who wants to go on the road selling

Idaho."

Watkins said his campaign committee has raised about \$30,000 so far. Most of those donations are from individuals, though he said he has received \$5,000 from a realtor's group.

The Watkins campaign sent a fund-raising letter to 500 past contributors and others in the state. Relying on receptions at the homes of supporters to help raise money, he said he will stay away from large-scale, direct-mail drives. "I'm gonna leave the letter-writing to Chad," he said, referring to congressional candidate and state Rep. J.F. Chaband's letter criticizing U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, R-Idaho, for alleged allegiance to actress Jane Fonda. Stallings denied the charge.

Wood stove cooking finds new popularity

Good cooks are rediscovering great-grandma's woodburning cookstove that produces delicious baked goods and helps cut gas and electric bills.

There's a special taste to foods cooked on a woodstove, according to an article in the autumn issue of Country Cooking. And the stoves are easy to use once you learn how to build fires and where to place your pots for best results.

Wood stoves, which date back to the mid-19th century, are best for breads, pies, cobblers and cookies. They don't work well for foods that require precise temperatures because you can't adjust the heat quickly and sometimes you must interrupt cooking to add more fuel.

Woodburning stoves can burn either wood or coal. Coal is longer-burning than even the best hardwood and burns more evenly, so it works especially well for large amounts of food.

Wood is best for quick meals, or

if you don't want the stove to heat up the house. And the good wood, smell and flavor seem to cook right into the food.

Whether you are burning wood or coal, all ranges operate on the same basic principle, as Lynda Moultrie writes in "The Antique Kitchen Range Bible."

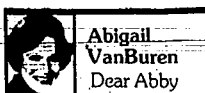
The most important thing to learn is draft and damper control. Keep all dampers and drafts in good working order and learn to regulate them, and your stove will work at top capacity.

It is important to remember that on a wood-coal range the whole range is hot. It is very easy to burn yourself. Keep potholders handy—the glove kind that go up your arm—and never touch pot handles or any part of the range with bare hands.

As a safety precaution, also keep an ABC chemical fire extinguisher nearby. Cast iron cookware is ideal for cookstoves, but any pots and pans without plastic or wood parts can be used. Copper-bottomed pans are not a good choice because the copper will tarnish rapidly.

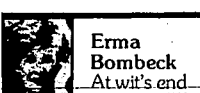
I would promise myself that I would knit until 9 and then I would absolutely get dressed and bring the house up to minimal health standards.

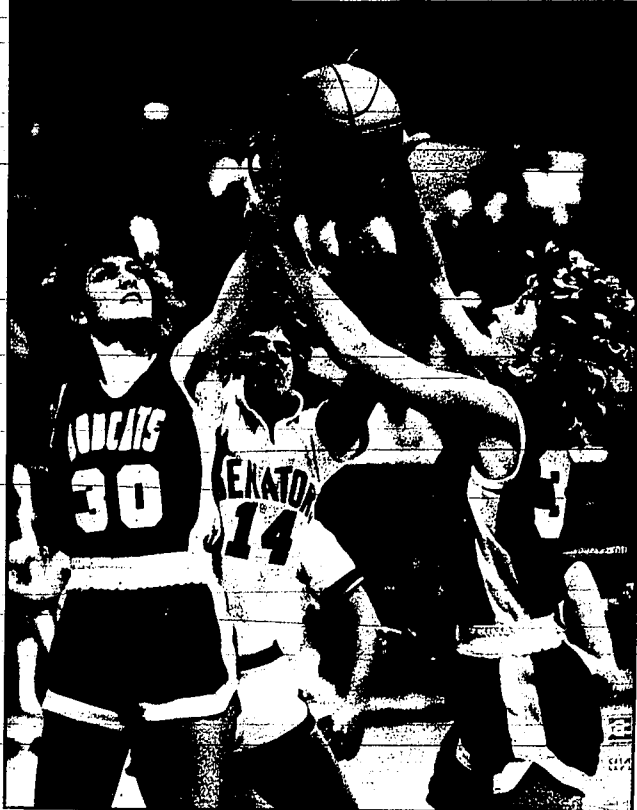

Steelhead fishing redhot on Salmon

SALMON — Steelhead fishing on the Salmon River over the weekend bordered on the redhot for practically all management stretches.

Kent Ball, biologist for the Idaho Department of Fish and Game at the Salmon regional headquarters, said field checks had confirmed the catching of 716 of the ocean-going trout Saturday and Sunday.

The hottest stretch — which also attracted the most fishermen — came through the North Fork check station where 513 anglers fished for 5,760 hours to catch 519 steelhead.

The weekend checks included: White Bird to Rigbins — 26 anglers and 100 hours for four fish or 25 hours per fish.

Rigbins to Vinegar Creek — 102 anglers and 702 hours for 47 fish and 16 hours per fish.

Vinegar Creek to South Fork — 160 anglers and 589 hours for 67 fish and nine hours per fish.

South Fork to Middle Fork — 99 anglers and 524 hours for 69 fish and

eight hours per fish. North Fork check station — 513 anglers and 5,760 hours for 519 fish, 11 hours per fish.

North Fork to Salmon — 52 anglers and 165 hours for 10 fish and 17 hours per fish.

Ball said conservation officers had reports of several wild fish being turned back but noted "there seem to be more of those in the lower river."

He said the number of B (Clearwater) strain fish, traditionally the late-run species, is increasing in the river and "there were a few caught over the weekend. But most of the fish taken were AS."

The largest fish reported by field checkers was a 39-inch male.

Action was good despite cold temperatures both on the bank and in the river. Ball said "the water temperature was 36 degrees on Sunday and I'm sure it's cooled more since then. We're seeing a little slush ice."

Potters try hands at prints for exhibit

TWIN FALLS — "Potters and Prints," a traveling exhibition featuring ceramics and printmaking, is currently featured at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery. Running until Dec. 12, the exhibition features works by Jim Romberg, Jenny Lind, Kirk Mangus, Richard Shaw, Robert Sperry and Akio Takamori.

Produced by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, the exhibit has been shown in Salt Lake City, Chicago, St. Louis, Mo.; Portland, Ore.; Missoula, Mont.; and Aspen, Colo., before arriving at the Herrett.

According to Kristin Poole, director of the Sun Valley Center Gallery, the concept for the exhibition was to illustrate the relationship between the graphic, decorative qualities of the artist's ceramic work and the two-dimensional surface.

"For many of the artists, the project initiated an increased awareness of the qualities unique to printmaking, and offered a new perspective for their ceramic work," she says, explaining, "In a two-dimensional medium, which by its nature lacks the mass, malleability and texture of clay, the artists sought new approaches to expression."

Romberg, director of the ceramics department at the center and one of the featured artists, says the show has enjoyed a fine reception by the public during its travels. "There's been a real curiosity about it," he says. "This is one of the first times that a project like this has been initiated that I know of."

Pointing out that, after the idea was conceived, the artists were then chosen for the exhibit. "Some of them hadn't done prints at a serious level. Some were skeptical about it." Yet Romberg says that the exhibit has been so successful, that the center is on the verge of doing a "Potters and Prints II."

"The mixture of clay and two-dimensional pieces provides contrast and transformation," he says, adding, "One plays off the

other. Some are a fairly direct transformation where the prints are fairly close to the artist's ceramic work." He says the interesting part was, "to take something that didn't already exist in our vocabularies, the flatness and printing process, and work with it. It was like being put down on Mars."

He notes that the major concerns were still there, but that each artist found something in the new format. "We enjoyed surprises — the doors that were opened."

"Nothing can better explain the concept than Romberg's own work," he says, adding, "See POTTERS on Page D3

Harpichordist featured in concert

TWIN FALLS — The music of Beethoven, Von Suppe and Poulenc will be on tap when the Magic Valley Symphony and featured guest, Stephan Moss, hold concert at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium, Saturday at 8 p.m.

Moss, a harpichordist and the son of Ernest Moss of Twin Falls, was among four valedictorians representing the Twin Falls Senior High School class of 1976. Prior to graduating, Moss played with the symphony as well as the Magic Valley Chamber Orchestra. He also performed a piano solo with the symphony as one of the winners in the 1976 youth soloist additions.

He was a student of the late Teala Bellini and the late Helen Comer, and, in 1980, he earned a bachelor of music degree from the University of Redlands in southern California. He is currently completing work on his doctorate at Claremont Graduate School in Claremont, Calif.

Moss has also taught music theory and harpichord at Scripps College in Claremont, where he is

currently employed as a data systems manager and as a research assistant in the development office.

According to the harpichordist, it would have been the execution for him to have gotten interested in music considering that his father, musician, teaches music in the Twin Falls School District.

"I started out with no particular taste in music," he says. "I heard some harpichord music and asked Dad if he'd build me one. He said, 'You bet!'"

Moss said his father purchased a kit and built the harpichord one weekend. "I'm still playing it now," he says of the 30-pound instrument that he owns, along with another over twice that weight. But, large instruments were always his style. "Up to that point I'd studied piano with Teala Bellini most of the time. She really taught me the principals and the way of looking at music."

Explaining his switch in instruments, Moss says, "I've always been interested in the period from 1600 to 1750. The piano came into being in the 18th century because of the mechanism and taste in dynamic changes in music." He says the harpichord, with a

Nationally known artist Moller dies

RUPERT — Olaf Moller, a moving force in landscape painting, died last Friday in a Boise nursing home at age 84. Moller's career spanned much of the 20th century, and many will remember him as the artist who brought to canvas both Wyoming's Grand Tetons and Idaho's Hagerman Valley.

Over the years, Moller won numerous awards. His painting, "Silver Leaf Poplar," was selected for the 1940 New York World's Fair. He also designed the murals for the Carnegie Public Library in Boise, while his paintings of the Tetons represented the West in the States of the Union Collection at the U.S. Military Academy, West Point, N.Y.

His work has been exhibited in the Lillie Bliss Collection, New York City; Augustana College, Rock Island, Ill.; the Springville Museum of Art, Springville, Utah; the University of Idaho; the Boise Gallery of Art, and in untold private collections.

Born in Copenhagen, Denmark, Moller's family moved to the U.S. while he was still an infant. The fam-

ily traveled west from Brooklyn to Salt Lake City, then to Boise before settling in Rupert. An uncle in Boise first kindled his interest in art. Using scraps of paper and pieces of broken pottery from his uncle's pastel set, Moller sketched his first landscape, and, thereafter, determined to become an artist.

His formal art education came during eight years of study from 1921 to 1929 when he studied at the Academy of Fine Arts in Philadelphia and, during the summers, he attended school at nearby Chester Springs. At the academy, he studied under N.C. Wyeth, the painter.

In 1927, Moller received a scholarship to the Louis Comfort Tiffany Foundation at Oyster Bay, N.Y. It was there that he learned the craft of frame building, a hobby that eventually became an avocation.

During his school years he supported himself with various odd jobs including stagehand, chauffeur and manager of a tea room.

After the stock market crash in 1929, Moller returned to Idaho and set up his studio at the family home

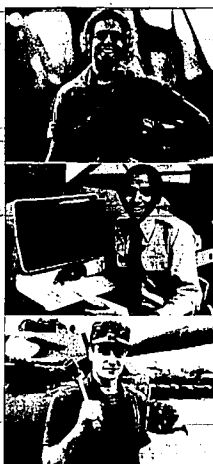

 work, his sculptures functioning in a cubistically fractured space like a swelled picture plane. Plates and vessels, often bearing abstract images, are used in conjunction with ceramic fragments appearing like brushmarks hanging in space.
 An accompanying two-dimensional piece seems to be composed of the residue of that process. The density of ink is a metaphor for the density of clay, while the degrees of opacity suggest the coarseness of Raku pottery and the soft space that surrounds it.

Romberg says there have been paybacks for the artists from working in the two-dimensional. "I've done a fair amount of drawing and, for me, it has been a nice challenge. This hit at an opportune time for me. At the same time, I was investigating some new forms with ceramic, the prints came along. It was really a challenge."

Artist Jenny Lind echoes Romberg's statement. "The crossover seems to have strengthened the direction my work was taking, and I feel it also has helped the

spontaneity of my work. I enjoy the more immediate results from printing, and the process particularly appeals to me because it shares with pottery the mystery and unknowing until the final pull or opening of the kiln."

According to Romberg, all the other artists had either previously exhibited at the Sun Valley Center or were known and respected by its staff. Lind was educated at the University of New Mexico and has spent 17 years working in clay and exhibiting throughout the U.S.

Mangus received his master's of fine arts degree from Washington

State University. He maintains a studio in Pennsylvania, and his work can be found in major galleries in Philadelphia, Chicago and San Francisco.

Sperry, who holds a master's degree from the University of Washington, has served as a professor of art there, has been featured in exhibitions in the Northwest and has placed work in the collections of the Smithsonian.

In contrast, Takamori apprenticed in Japan to a traditional production potter for several years before coming to the U.S. to earn a master's of fine arts degree from New York

State College of Ceramics, Alfred University. His work quickly received critical acclaim and is included in numerous private collections.

Shaw received his master's degree from the University of California, Davis, and currently heads the ceramic/sculpture department at the San Francisco Art Institute. His ceramic sculpture is in collections ranging from Tokyo to the Smithsonian.

between Rupert and Paul, and supported himself during the Depression by conducting painting classes and by making custom frames.
 With his Idaho studio as his base, the artist conducted yearly trips into many sections of the West, including Jackson Hole, one of his favorite areas. Incorporating the Tetons into his paintings, Moller opened the first art gallery in Jackson Hole and maintained a studio/gallery there during the summer for many years.

Idaho's Hagerman Valley was another of Moller's favorites, which he usually depicted in the autumn. He was known to have also enjoyed painting the rich country of America's Northeast.

"He was probably the most prominent artist in this area," says Burley artist John Horejs. Horejs, who owns the Lightworks Gallery with his wife, Elaine, featured Moller's works in a one-man show five years ago. He says that, more recently, he was hoping to have another Moller exhibit.

"I don't know how you can classify his style," says Horejs. "He used real broad brush strokes and he worked real well with light and shadow." Horejs says he knows a lot of people who own Moller's paintings and that, without exception, "they really love the paintings."

He remembers Moller as an elegant man who always wore a suit when working and was soft spoken and warm. "He was sort of an idol," Horejs says.

Twin Falls artist Evanel Henkelman echoes that sentiment. "He was a perfect gentleman and you never heard him say a bad word never," she says. Henkelman remembers that she studied under Moller when she first came to Twin Falls in 1951 and he was teaching in The American Legion-Hunter House. Alludes to his idiosyncrasy of always wearing a suit. "Even when he was set up out in the sagebrush, in the rain."

She attributes the art movement to Magic Valley directly to his influence. "We were so fortunate to have him in Idaho," she says.

'Night' bares Sting's musical creation

HOLLYWOOD — In "Bring on the Night," Sting and a small collection of premier jazz musicians work to form a new band in the outlandish surroundings of a rented French chateau. At the same time, director-documentarian Michael Apted works cannily to catch the event. He puts in a related-interview here, a hilarious bit of cinema verite there, and lets us watch as the small details of a vocal arrangement are tested and fiddled with.

What Apted is attempting, quite shamelessly, is to make us accomplices in this creation, to get to know these musicians individually, to have us begin to worry about the success of their first concert in Paris. And he succeeds.

It is not quite real; these four musicians and two backup vocalists had been put together for the first time three months before, in Barbados, where they recorded Sting's first solo album "The Dream of the Two Turtles," many of whose songs we hear here. The film is actual elegant re-creation of that first searching energy. Its French chateau was chosen by production designer Ferdinando Scarlotti; the clothes are the work of costume designer Colleen Atwood.

"Bring on the Night" works if you know the Sting canon by heart, or if this is your first exposure to his music. You may not feel you know him by the end of the film, but his music is eloquent enough and Apted has combined music and image to let

us imagine we have seen the man himself.

That man emerges as tightly controlled, intelligent and enigmatic; by design. While Trudie Styler, Sting's companion of years, says in a pleased tone that "the band has...lightened him up a lot; he's not reading so many books," to an outsider he is still opaque as flammable as tooth and as cool.

But there is nothing at all cool about his songs or the way he works with this handpicked band. The musicians come out good and clear, especially young, ebullient Branford Marsalis, the boy from a musical family who took up the sax because he noticed that with a saxophone you could get women. Marsalis (a four-year veteran of brother Wynton's jazz group) has, at 25, his wits

about him and his feet firmly on the ground. A long, Insider's look at pop superstardom from close up has left him unimpressed: "I want to hurt. It's not my attitude; not what I put on earth to be."

We meet the other instrumentalists: bass player Darryl Jones, ex of Miles Davis' band, who is still wary that what they form will be called a band; in which every person will have an equal part.

PG-13 Rating Introduced

'Remo Williams' packs adventure

AGNES OF GOD (PG-13), Norman Jewison's film of John Platemore's play about a young nun who gives birth to a child who is then strangled has become, on the screen, a tedious and synthetic science vs. religion debate despite the vibrant presence of Jane Fonda, Anne Bancroft and newcomer Meg Tilly in the little role.

BACK TO THE FUTURE (PG), An interesting premise — a teenager travels back in time and falls into the middle of his parents' romance — that is underdeveloped and over-produced. There are a few nice moments of nostalgia for a sexually upright, unlightened past, but there are not enough bits of lovely inventiveness to pad out the gimmick. The outcome is hollow and materialistic.

COMMANDO (R), With biceps the size of watermelons and shoulders broad enough to bridge a small river, Col. John Matrix (Arnold Schwarzenegger) looks like a Marvel Comics hero sprung to life. He is the incredible Hollywood fit, and a perfect fit for this Slam-bang adventure "Tantony." Full of "spectacular stunts and shoot-outs, it is a gory crowd pleaser, directed with jolting efficiency by low-budget veteran Mark L. Lester. It is also the beneficiary of the spunky presence of Race Dawson Chang.

REMO WILLIAMS (PG-13), Slam-bang action-adventure sent up with bright, funny dialogue and a knockout performance by an unrecognizable Joe Grej as a deceptively frail Korean martial arts master who trains secret agent Fred Williams (in the title role). Based on "The Destroyers" series. With J.A. Preston, Kate Mulgrew.

Dudley: Creative writing has free hand

TWIN FALLS — Of the newly released book "The Art and Craft of Writing" by Delores Olson Dudley, friends, co-teachers and former students say it is difficult to comment without revealing the "multi-faceted person" who was its author.

"The book is Delores," Eleanor Burkhardt, a colleague of Dudley's and a Twin Falls High School teacher, says simply.

Cathy Dudley gives a picture of her mother in a poem, "Legacy," which her mother included in her book. Cathy's dedication of her mother's book elaborates:

Delores Dudley lost her battle with cancer soon after finishing this text. Her unique style of communicating, of loving lives, and of understanding the high-school mind is captured in "The Art and Craft of Writing."

William Studebaker, assistant professor of English at the College of Southern Idaho, says, "It is written by a teacher — a good teacher. I can see her. I can hear her voice. I can feel her coming into the room. She had confidence in herself and in her students."

Connie Woebke, who has been teaching creative writing to seniors at TPIHS for six years, says, "When Delores was writing the book, she was instructing me to teach the class. I have always used her method."

It was when Dudley's illness was in the advanced stage that the publisher gave her the go-ahead on the book, Woebke adds. "Delores said, 'I know that's what the God that I'm supposed to finish it.' She did, and her death soon followed. Enthusiasm radiates from Jeff Summers, a former student of Dudley's and now a senior in pre-med studies at the University of Idaho.

"She was the greatest teacher I ever had and helped me be more confident — that I had some neat ideas in my head worth writing down — that I wasn't just some dumb kid."

Summers says the teacher would read a poem from a well-known writer and let the student go from there, or "she'd give just one word; it stimulated writing."

In her book, Dudley refers to this as "releasing," rather than teaching, the student to write. She starts with lists of "reaction" words, phrases and sentences, sometimes related, sometimes not. She encourages the student not to be concerned with style but to just let the pictures and emotions evoked by the lists result in a "flood of words."

The process proceeds from released writing to exploring techniques to polishing and finishing a "more controlled composition" with the audience in mind.

Studebaker says there is "good statement" in the book of her audience, "the first audience being herself."

"She is building the writer's talent and confidence and trusts everyone has something to say."

Studebaker, who teaches introduction to poetry and the poetry section of creative writing at CSI, has himself had works published. He was in the process of stuffing envelopes with exercises for those who had taken his latest workshop.

In the future, he smiles, he can simply say, "Go buy Delores' book."

"It has 70 percent of what I want for my college and workshop students. It is also very direct and applicable." He says it's easily adapted to any age or education level.

Writing groups would benefit from the text. "The stimulus is all there," says Studebaker. "It is a strong book, but I can be objective."

He explains it would perhaps have been more helpful, for someone studying without benefit of an instructor, if more examples of works by established writers had been included.

He says in the book Dudley compared the work of the student to one of the thousands with which she was familiar. "That's the way she worked." But the average student does not have this reservoir to draw from, he adds.

In one of Studebaker's classes, Dudley submitted a term paper with a copy on the title page of a drawing by M.C. Escher of Holland. It is a circular sketch of a hand drawing an identical hand. Writing, Studebaker says, "is a circular experience."

Dudley uses Escher drawings to illustrate her book. Studebaker says that like Escher, Dudley begins with a concept, moves to another and another until she is back at the first concept. "She takes the artist very seriously."

Dudley taught extension courses for Idaho State University, and some classes at CSI, besides instructing for many years at Twin Falls High School.

Burkhart took one of her classes at

the graduate level. She says the course "just goes a little farther" than that given in the book, and she and Woebke agree with Studebaker that the text would benefit anyone, of any age, who wants to write.

Sue Bower teaches college preparatory and American writing at the "high school" and saw the manuscript before it was published. She says she has been using several ideas from it.

"The ideas for the text were probably forming in the early 1970s, Burkhardt says, and were later incorporated in Dudley's master's thesis. The book evolved from this."

At the time Dudley started teaching creative writing, "there was no book she felt was adequate," says Burkhardt.

Both she and Woebke reflect on portions of the text that are "so like Delores," such as advice against taking oneself too seriously.

"When you find this happening, the author writes, 'throw your pencil to the ceiling, catch it, find a piece of paper, and then write — something ridiculous.' Use the corny, the trite; be verbose, but 'be sure to tear up your paper when you're finished so no one can accuse you of being maudlin, but enjoy.'"

"And," Burkhardt chuckles, "who else but Delores would write a poem about an eggplant?"

Her voice reflecting the memory, she says the staff at the high school was always sharing produce. She remembered the time Dudley walked into her room and asked, "What do you do with an eggplant?"

The vegetable had been given to her by principal Frank Charlton. She began trying lines of verse out on Burkhardt, and "we were having fun. I didn't know she was really serious about putting 'it' into a poem," Burkhardt says.

"About Ethics and the Ethic of Eggplant" is Mindy Dudley Brown's selection from the book as the best reminder of her mother. Brown says the poem "shows her way of looking

at things — in a different light from most people."

Her eyes on Dudley's photograph, she adds, "My mother was always willing to look at the other side. I can never remember her telling anyone they were wrong and she was right. She made friends with everyone."

Cathy Dudley, who Burkhardt says is "a poet in her own right," is living in North Carolina. She consisted with her mother "in the last days, and collaborated in finishing touches and last-minute details." Besides writing the dedication after her mother's death in February of 1984, "she did all the legwork essential to publication."

'Kane and Abel' magnifies flaws of the international best-seller

"Kane and Abel" (airing Nov. 17; Nov. 18; and Nov. 19 on CBS) is a poor excuse for a network miniseries.

CBS and Embassy Television probably thought they were onto a sure thing when they acquired the rights to Jeffrey Archer's 1980 novel. A miniseries based on the book would have a built-in international audience (the paperback edition alone sold more than 4 million copies and has been published in 21 languages) and the tale itself had many juicy dramatic possibilities, featuring a multi-generation saga based on a vendetta held by Polish immigrant Abel Rosnovski against Boston Brahmin William Kane. Here was a chance to cross the business machinations of "Dallas" with the class conflicts of "Upstairs, Downstairs." And, of course, the eventual marriage of Rosnovski's daughter to Kane's son adds a good touch of "Romeo and Juliet" — like love.

But the book has flaws, too, and those flaws are magnified in the long journey from slick best-seller to completed miniseries. Much of the "Kane and Abel" plotting, as translated to the TV screen, is sloppy.

Rosnovski (Peter Strauss), while trying to earn a promotion from waiter to hotel executive, is befriended by a soft-spoken Texas hotel owner, Davis Leroy (Fred Gwynne). Although the hulking Gwynne and the slick-haired, Polish-accented Strauss make the oddest TV couple since Felix and Oscar, we're asked to believe they're developing a tender father-son relationship. It's hardly convincing.

When the 1929 stock crash causes Boston banker Kane (Sam Neill) to foreclose on Leroy's hotel chain, the Texan throws himself out the window. Hotheaded Rosnovski flies to Boston and does everything but challenge Kane to a duel. Even when Kane assures the Pole he voted against the foreclosure and had never met the man, Kane sputters and swears eternal vengeance. Imagine if such a vendetta had been successfully carried out on every banker who foreclosed on someone in 1929!

The meaningless conflict is a good excuse to compare the lifestyles of

two men. While Kane grew up sucking a silver spoon in Boston, young Abel struggled to survive a childhood and adolescence of unending war and tragedy. He finds himself close to death no less than 11 times, and is rescued miraculously at the 11th hour each time. And in what has to be the grossest miniseries scene since Toshiro Mifune urinated on Richard Chamberlain in "Shotgun," Abel,

who has stolen an orange in Constantinople, is put on a line of offenders waiting to have their hands chopped off by a fat Turk. Just as the sword is raised, he's rescued by a Polish diplomat who appears out of nowhere.

Strauss' Polish accent makes him sound something like Dracula, so viewers will have trouble refraining from laughter when Strauss tries to be serious. And New Zealander Sam Neill's Boston accent comes right out of the corn belt. In fact, the lead characters might have been better off had they switched roles. Both actors play their characters from age 14. As a teen, Kane looks years older than his stepfather David Osborne (played by Neill's contemporary David Dukes). And Strauss looks downright idiotic parading around as a 16-year-old wearing a Prince Valiant wig.

A few good performances do help. Veronica Hamel is dynamic as can be as Kane's wife Kate, who sticks with him even though he is a total, stuffy bore.

James O'Sullivan started this season on prime time but wound up on daytime. How all this came to pass sounds like the plot of one of the soaps.

'North and South' carries ABC to rare victory in weekly ratings

NEW YORK — "North and South," with all five of last week's episodes in the Top 10, gave ABC a rare ratings victory and moved the network into a second-place tie with CBS after seven weeks of the season, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

The Sunday finale of the 12-hour miniseries ranked second for the week of Nov. 4-10 with a 29.4 rating, the best performance for any miniseries episode since ABC's "The Thorn Birds" in 1983. The rating still wasn't enough to knock NBC's "The Cosby Show" from its usual top spot. The hit comedy had a 31.9 rating and 46 share.

For the week, ABC, which also won the week-it-broadcast the World Series, averaged a 19.9 rating. CBS and NBC tied for second with 16.5 ratings. Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.8 rating, with ABC and CBS tied at 16.8.

Compared with the first seven weeks of the 1984-85 season, the three-network rating is up from a 48.6 to a 51.4. Network researchers attributed that to more post-season baseball in prime time, "North and South" and better-series programming.

"The viewers don't watch networks, the viewers don't watch cable; they watch programs and there have been very attractive programs on all three networks," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director.

Last week's Top 10 was dominated by "North and South" and TV's biggest stars, including Lucille Ball, Angela Lansbury, "Cosby" and the crew from "60 Minutes."

"The Cosby Show" ranked first, Part 6 of "North and South" was second and NBC's "Family Ties" third. Next came Part 3 of "North and South," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," starring Miss Lansbury, and, in a tie for sixth, CBS' "60 Minutes" and Part 4 of "North and South." The miniseries' second installment was eighth, followed by Miss Ball playing a bag lady in CBS' movie "Stone Pillow" and Part 5 of "North and South."

Overall, the six parts of "North and South," including the opening episode that came before last week's rating period, averaged 26.0 rating.



38 share. ABC said "North and South" ranked 15th among all miniseries with three or more parts and was the highest-rated multi-part since CBS' "Master of the Game" in February 1984. ABC said 100 million people watched some part of the miniseries.

"North and South" was blasted by many television critics, but it ended up getting higher ratings than network researchers, including ABC, had forecast.

"We were quite happy," said Paul Sonkin, ABC's vice president of audience and affiliate research. "People watched the first night and stayed with it. They were interested in the subject matter and perceived

it to be entertaining."

"I have to give ABC an awful lot of credit," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "They put down \$25 million, took the shot and it paid off for them."

"This gives hope to our upcoming miniseries that people are still watching programs of this length," said Eisenberg.

Industry analysts had suggested that multi-part miniseries, in the environment of multi-channel video competition, might be too large a commitment for viewers. "If it's well done and informative, then they'll watch it," said Sonkin. "I don't think the length has anything to do with it."

The sequel, "North and South: Book II," also 12 hours, is scheduled to be broadcast early next year.

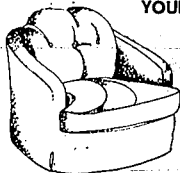
The two miniseries came under the responsibility at ABC of Brandon Stoddard, who was head of ABC's novels for television until he was elevated Tuesday to president of ABC Entertainment, replacing Lewis H. Erlicht.

Last week, ABC also had the lowest-rated show, "Our Family Honor," with a 6.4 rating.

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After debut of 'Saturday Night,' it's apparent 10 years was plenty

NEW YORK — The new "Saturday Night Live" violated the first and only rule for political satire. It didn't make it funny.

If the writing and performances are sharp, taking swipes and even cheap potshots at our institutions can work. But it has to be good enough to overcome viewer concerns about poor taste. Pointed humor that misses just makes the audience uncomfortable.

The most glaring example Saturday was the treatment of Marilyn Monroe's death from the vantage of "National Inquirer Theatre." This version had all the Kennedy brothers plotting her demise before she could tell all. The irreverence was overwhelmed by its offensiveness.

Another satire, the "Reagans meeting the Prince and Princess of Wales, was lost in a morass of weak material.

The new version of "SNL" was unveiled on NBC Saturday with an entirely new cast of comic actors and Lorne Michaels, the returning executive producer who created the original show, the one with Chevy Chase, John Belushi and Gilda Radner, 11 years ago.

Repertory, live comedy may be the most difficult comedy to do well. If it doesn't work, it just sits there. Other kinds of shows can be improved in post-production. Or, in some cases, the star, say a Bill Cosby, can ad-lib his way out of a corner.

But, even accepting that the new "SNL" is a work in progress, there were some glaring weaknesses that may be impossible to overcome. It was a true ensemble in that these nine, mostly anonymous newcomers to TV weren't particularly distinctive. Nobody stood out, except Madonna, the guest host, who proved a personable, talented comedienne.

The writers had some funny ideas, but couldn't sustain them. For example, the piece on the AIDS scare in Hollywood with a homosexual character pretending to be a macho star had promise but fell flat.

The show seemed to strive for more outrageousness and irreverence than it had in recent years. There would be no sacred cows.

It even started out by poking fun at the original Michaels show, which is an intermingling of life and art,

was laden with drug humor. Brandon Tartikoff, maybe the first network entertainment president to get applause on national television, came on and said that NBC wanted to keep the current show clean. His idea of the "honor system" hadn't worked in the past. His new idea was urinalysis for this show, as well as "Miami Vice," "Punky Brewster" and "Meet the Press."

That bit, the filmed segment recreating the Madonna-Sean Penn wedding and some material on the "Weekend Update" news segment provided the bulk of the minimal laughs in the 90-minute first episode. The first 20 minutes were OK, but there was little else. Around midnight, sleep became a marvelous alternative to mediocre comedy.

Dennis Miller was the sole anchor on "Weekend Update." He was cool and collected, appearing like many blow-dried local anchormen, but he lacked charisma.

Among the cast, which appeared to have a bad case of opening-night jitters, Randy Quaid, at 35 the oldest cast member and the one with the most films in his resume, had a confident presence in his sketches.

Terry Sweeney appears to be the only possible break-out performer because of his bizarre characterizations. He played the gay movie star pretending to be straight and he took off the gloves with a nasty, alcoholic Nancy Reagan.

The rest of the cast was nondescript unless you count the hammy, buggy performances from 17-year-old Anthony Michael Hall and Janitra Vance whenever they came on.

Madonna, the singer, did her monologue in a sweat suit and a fur stole. She also stole whatever part of the show was worth stealing. She was the real and only star Saturday night, appearing in almost every skit and even in the commercial breaks on a couple of real ads for her new home video.

Madonna played Marilyn Monroe, a Joan Collins-type actress and even herself in the best bit of the night: home movies of her wedding to reclusive actor Sean Penn. Whenever the camera found members of the Penn family, they hid their faces the way Penn does with paparazzi photographers. Like Madonna, her family wore their undergarments over their clothes.

It appears that the new "SNL" is going to have to rely on strong guests hosts each week. Last season, cast members Billy Crystal and Martin Short could carry the show, even when the writing was off. No performer seems as capable this time.

In his introduction, Tartikoff noted that this was the second decade of "Saturday Night Live." Based on the first show, 10 years would have been enough.

National Geographic moves series to cable

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Geographic Society has moved its "Explorer" adventure television series to Ted Turner's cable-delivered WTBS, on the promise of a better time slot and "several, several millions of dollars" in support. "It's a good deal of money on our part, but we feel it is a good investment," said WTBS President Robert J. Wussler.

The program now runs on the Nickelodeon cable channel in a three-hour version and will move to

an 8 p.m. Eastern Time Sunday slot in a two-hour version on Feb. 2.

The show will be repeated on Mondays at 11 p.m. Eastern Time, which is prime time on the West Coast.

"Ted Turner's commitment is bold, it's expensive and it's creative," said Gilbert M. Grosvenor, president of the Geographic.

He said that without Turner's support, the Geographic faced a choice of continuing to absorb losses or taking the program off the air.

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PBS brings kids science

NEW YORK (AP) — What could be more promising than a new educational TV series about children discovering the grandeur and excitement of wildlife and natural science?

That's the idea behind "OWL-TV," a public television weekly series of 10 half-hour programs that premiered last Sunday on most PBS stations.

OWL, an acronym for "outdoor and wildlife," was produced by the Young Naturalist Foundation, a group that aims to stimulate children's interest in science and nature, and the National Audubon Society.

"Steal a phrase from the series, programs are about 'fooling around with science.' Aimed at youngsters aged 7 to 12, the shows are blessedly free of pedantic lectures, and learning is often served up with laughs.

A jolly fellow with a big red bow tie named Dr. Zed leads children each week through some simple experiments: transforming milk into cheese, bending light into the colors of the rainbow, or flipping figures on sheets of paper to create the optical illusion of a motion picture.

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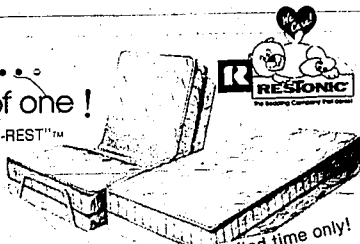

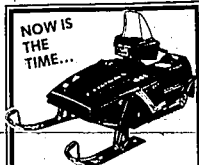

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ABC reshuffles top ranks, names entertainment head

NEW YORK (AP) — American Broadcasting Co. continued shuffling the top ranks of its struggling entertainment operation Tuesday, naming a new executive to oversee the company's programming.

The selection of Brandon Stoddard to replace Lewis H. Erlicht as president of ABC Entertainment came a day after Anthony D. Tomopoulos resigned as president of the ABC broadcast Group.

No replacement was named for Tomopoulos, but ABC Inc. President Frederick S. Pierce said the broadcast Group's operating divisions — entertainment, news and sports — would report directly to him.

Stoddard will not assume any of Tomopoulos's responsibilities, ABC

spokeswoman Julie Hoover said.

Erlicht, 46, was named senior vice president of ABC Entertainment and president of ABC Circle Films. He will report to Stoddard, who had been president of ABC Motion Pictures.

Stoddard, 48, will be responsible for all ABC entertainment programming, including prime time, the other parts of the broadcast day, and "long-form" television programming, including made-for-television movies and mini-series.

He also will oversee development of new programs, talent, advertising and promotion.

Stoddard joined ABC in 1970 as director of daytime programs and became an executive for ABC's TV movies department in 1974. He pro-

bably is best known for his participation in the development of the "ABC-News-for-Television," with such critically acclaimed productions as "Roots," "The Thorn Birds" and "Winds of War."

Stoddard also was responsible for "The Day After" and "Something About Amelia," the two most watched TV movies in television history.

He takes over an entertainment division riddled with low-rated new series and old shows that are losing popularity. The network has been a weekly third in the ratings, except for the weeks it won for the World Series and last week's "North and South" miniseries.

"North and South" came from Stoddard's novels-for-television department.

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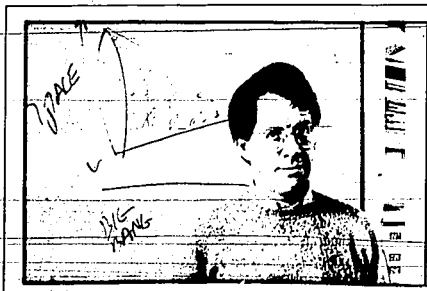

Doctors call NBC's movie on AIDS realistic portrayal

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — The starched white coats caused a chuckle and the bedside manner of the doctors seemed "heavy-handed," but Dr. Paul Volberding of San Francisco General Hospital and other AIDS experts gave a thumbs-up to last week's NBC television movie about a homosexual who is dying of acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

"We have seen examples of all the behaviors shown in the movie," Volberding said of "An Early Frost."

"The film deals realistically with some very serious issues," said Dr. Shirley Fannin of the Los Angeles County Public Health Department.

"The movie will motivate people to overcome their own anxieties about AIDS and get the information to make rational decisions," said Sally Jue, a social worker for the AIDS Project Los Angeles.

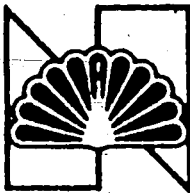
In a curious juxtaposition of the medical community and the film industry, Volberding, Fannin and Jue commented on the movie and answered questions about the disease following a special screening here for the Academy of Television Arts and Sciences. The film is the first network movie about AIDS and one of the first television dramas on the subject.

"Frost" provides basic information about AIDS and its invariably fatal course, but it concentrates on the personal tragedies and human dimensions of the illness. A middle-aged couple (Ben Gazzara and Gena Rowlands) must cope with the twin disclosures that their lawyer son Michael (Aidan Quinn) is gay and has AIDS.

The movie dramatizes the conflicting feelings of hope and despair that patients with AIDS often experience simultaneously. "Frost" also spotlights schisms and reconciliations between Michael, his lover Peter (D.W. Moffett), and his pregnant sister Susan (Sydney Walsh).

"The film shows that the emotional impact of the disease is just as devastating for people with AIDS and those who care about them as the disease itself," Jue said.

Particularly poignant and realistic, according to Volberding, is the friendship that develops in the hospital between Michael and



another patient with AIDS (John Glover), who battles his illness with humor and a steadfast will to live.

After Michael suffers a seizure and loses consciousness at his parents' house, an ambulance is summoned. The crew learns that Michael has AIDS, refuses to transport him and leaves.

"My concern is that the viewer will think that scene was made up," said Volberding, who reviewed the script before production. "It's not. This has happened in San Francisco, where we pride ourselves as a model for the care of patients with AIDS."

Questions from the audience of close to 2,000 focused on the risks of transmission of the disease and potential therapies. The atmosphere was subdued, and many people left early.

Volberding said the Screen Actors Guild decision last month to require actors to be told in advance whether they will be asked to play "open-mouth" kissing scenes was "not a bad policy." Scientists have found the AIDS virus in saliva but do not think the virus is spread readily through saliva.

Volberding said sharing coffee cups or cigarettes and social kissing had "no risk whatsoever" of spreading the disease, but added, "All of us would share some anxiety about prolonged intimate kissing with someone known to be positive for antibodies to the AIDS virus."

There was a contrast between the search for certainty inherent in many of the questions and the

answers from the panel, which were often couched with probabilities and qualifications. "It would be very easy to be dogmatic and say the AIDS virus is not transmitted by kissing," Volberding said. "But the risk of being wrong downstream is to contribute to the spread of the disease."

Indiana city puts stars up on signs

MUNCIE, Ind. (AP) — The city hopes billboards proclaiming that "David Letterman slept here" and "Steven Spielberg had a close encounter here" will generate more business for the community.

Tourism officials said they were unable to reach the celebrities to ask permission to use their names.

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NBC acts like competitor as it appears to court CNN

The back-and-forth between NBC News and Ted Turner's Cable News Network is either a peculiar matting dance or plain competitive jockeying. For the moment it's a standoff, but the sniping continues.

Last week, NBC denied published reports that the company will buy 50 percent of CNN. The report, in the Long Island newspaper Newsday, said NBC will pay between \$260 million and \$250 million "for what is said to be an ironclad agreement for NBC News to have full editorial management control of the cable network."

NBC news president Lawrence K. Grossman denied the report, adding, "There's nothing that's been signed, sealed, delivered or settled."

Turner said that Securities and Exchange Commission regulations prohibited him from commenting.

"Everyone knows NBC is interested in the cable news business and we are moving ahead with our own plans," Grossman said.

In fact, NBC News executives have been talking up the plan, first proposed in August, to launch a 24-hour news channel to compete with Turner's CNN. In the next week or so, NBC hopes to have commitments from enough of the country's top cable system operators to make the idea a reality by June 1986.

"CNN is showing great strength," Grossman told a New York press conference last month, "but there is room for two to play."

Turner has facetiously suggested that NBC ought to try a 24-hour music channel instead. But the threat from NBC is no joke. Ed Turner, CNN's executive vice president, fears that by going up against an operation the size of NBC's, "CNN would be bled to death."

Cable industry executives are divided on what the move would mean to the Turner Broadcasting System. Much hinges on Turner's proposed \$1.5 billion purchase of MGM-UA Entertainment, to be OK'd or dropped by the end of the year. It has been reported that TBS would sell 30 to 40 percent of CNN, which has been valued at \$600 million, to ease the debt it would take on in acquiring MGM-UA. NBC is among those organizations Turner already has offered minority interest in CNN. Grossman confirmed,

but NBC would want "full editorial control" of any cable news venture. Some speculate NBC may be stalling for time, knowing that Turner faces a Dec. 31 deadline.

Grossman gives his cable idea "a 50-50 chance." NBC has told the cable industry it must come up with 13.5 million subscriber homes by Dec. 15 to facilitate a mid-'86 launch. That number would guarantee that the service would be measured by ratings services, and in turn, could be marketed to advertisers. Turner's CNN currently counts 33.5 million households.

NBC aims to muscle into the market on the strength of its affiliates, worldwide bureaus and satellite system. The proposed cable service would be available for affiliates to excerpt for local newscasts and would give NBC News an outlet for stories that overflow the current total of three news hours per day (composed of "Nightly News," "Today" and "NBC News at Sunrise").

"There is an enormous flow of news from affiliates and bureaus which could be well-used on a 24-hour cable channel," Grossman said. "It amortizes our costs and gives our people a greater chance to get stories on the air. Many NBC News

correspondents would be involved." Additionally, a five-minute cut-in each hour would be provided for local news and commercials.

If NBC's idea takes off independent of Turner, a rate war would likely ensue, since NBC plans to undercut CNN's subscriber fees. Turner charges 15 cents per subscriber per month and will raise the rate to 18 cents in 1986 and to 21 cents in 1987, with no further increases until 1989.

NBC intends to ask 12 cents per subscriber per month in the first year, 15 cents in 1988 and 18 cents in 1989. Tom Wolzeln, NBC vice president for editorial production services, who is in charge of the project, said undercutting isn't the aim: "The object is a two-player marketplace."

"If you get into a rate-cutting war with something like NBC, which is considerably larger than an operation like the Cable News Network," CNN's Ed Turner said, "what good is that going to do the cable viewer?"

"You can't do it on the cheap," he continued. "Ted has poured several hundred million dollars down this thing for several years and we're just now making a minor profit."

NBC is prepared to take a loss for

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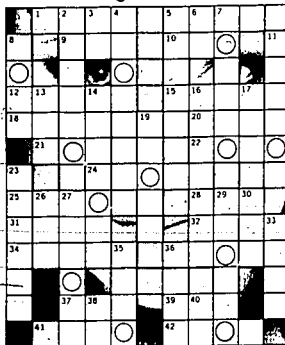
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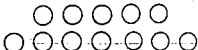

the first three to five years. Start-up costs would run to the "tens of millions," according to Wolzein.

If it's so reasonable, why hasn't it worked before? ABC tried a similar service with Westinghouse and failed with the Satellite News Channel.

"We would be crazy not to have learned from their experience," Grossman said.

"(SNC) made two major mistakes," Wolzein observed.

"First, they went on-air before they had a sufficient number of homes to get a Nielsen rating. Secondly, they tried to do it entirely as an advertiser-supported service. There's no way you can get sufficient ad revenue to keep you going" without subscription fees in addition. In fact, ABC and Group W paid cable systems to switch from CNN to SNC, in hopes that ad revenues would make it profitable. Two years ago, Turner paid the partners \$25 million for SNC and shut it down.

Gene Linder, executive director of programming for American Television Communications Inc., which

counts 2.5 million subscribers, dismissed CNN's worries about being edged out of the business. Ted Turner has "too much of a foothold in the market" and "too strong an advertising base" to be driven out, he said. "It will reduce his advertising income, but he should be doing well on fees."

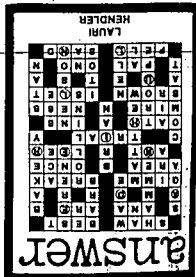
"We've agreed to substantial carriage," said John Malone, of Tele-Communications Inc., which has 5 million subscribers. "There is room for two news services, but it will not be nearly as profitable for either one of them if there are two. It will require a continuing subsidy from cable subscribers."

"Our willingness in no way represents a criticism of the existing service (CNN). If there's any service that would justify redundancy, it would be news," Malone said. On the other hand, he allowed that another SNC-type casualty may be in the wings, "but it's not necessarily the new guy who loses."

Whether it's flirtation or a power play, the zinging is mutual. NBC takes swipes at CNN's program con-

tent, while CNN chides NBC for its low ratings.

"CNN has become a much softer service than when it started," Grossman contended. "What we can provide is a hard-news service that goes beyond headlines. Much of it will be live, and we can pump it out nationally."



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
