Reagan says summit 'constructive'

Arms control deadlock remains

GENEVA — President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, sealing their summit with a toast of champagne, said Thursday their meeting marked a "new start" toward improved relations. But they returned home without agreement on how to end their deadlock on arms control.

Reagan, capping an 18-hour work day, returned to Washington at mid-evening and reported to Congress that he left Geneva with "a better perspective." And of Gorbachev, he said, "I feel he did, too."

He said the summit was "so constructive, in fact, that I look forward to welcoming Mr. Gorbachev to the United States" for a second summit next year. "And I have accepted his invitation" for a third meeting in Moscow in 1987.

That was probably the main accomplishment of the summit, Reagan said. "I can't claim we had a meeting of the minds on such fundamentals as ideology or national purpose," but he did claim "a measure of progress" during arms discussions — chiefly an agreement to step up detailed negotiations.

Reagan stopped in Brussels to brief leaders of the western democracies were "strongly supportive," a NATO official said.

Gorbachev, summarizing the summit before briefing Warsaw Pact leaders in Prague, told reporters he and Reagan looked at one another "straight in the eye" during a series of talks — but could not win an agreement to trade nuclear bomb outbacks for an end to the American "Star Wars" program.

"All restraint will be blown to the winds" in nuclear competition unless the United States pulls back from its anti-missile defense efforts, the Soviet general secretary said.

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, back from the summit, told a joint session of Congress on Thursday night he had a "constructive meeting" with Mikhail Gorbachev and that together the two made a "measure of progress" on arms control.

But the president said, "I can't claim we had a meeting of the minds" generally, and his description of the arms understandings included only the modest provisions carried in a joint statement issued from Geneva.

"While we still have a long way to go, we're at least heading in the right direction," Reagan told the nationally televised session. "I gained a better perspective; I feel he did, too."

Back home after the first U.S.-Soviet summit meeting in six years,

Reagan declared that he, as well as everyone, was "impatient for results" in the drive to improve superpower relations. But he quickly cautioned that "goodwill and good hopes do not always yield lasting results. Quick fixes don't fix big problems."

"We don't want a phony peace or a frail peace," the president said. "We did not go in pursuit of some kind of illusory detente. We can't be satisfied with 'cosmetic' improvements that won't stand the test of time. We want real peace."

The speech capped an 18-hour working day for Reagan that included a long trans-Atlantic flight across six time zones. Even so, the 74-year-old president looked anything

but tired as he strode into the House of Representatives chamber to a prolonged standing ovation from the members of Congress.

The cheers rose again when House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill formally introduced the president. And Reagan was interrupted for applause about 15 times during his speech, including once when he saluted his wife, Nancy, who stood to acknowledge the cheers.

In the president summed up his trip this way: "A new realism spawned the summit," the summit itself was a good start; and now our byword must be: Steady as we go."

Reagan's report to the nation followed a summit that produced agreements to meet again next year in Washington and the year after in Moscow, and accords on issues such as a cultural exchange and establishment of new diplomatic fa-

Farm credit rescue foes renew stand

Administration welcomes some reorganization moves

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration on Thursday renewed its opposition to an immediate federal bailout of the Farm Credit System, but welcomed parts of a House bill to reorganize the nation's largest farm lender.

Officials of the Treasury and Agriculture departments reaffirmed the administration's position that changes in FCS must be carried out before any federal rescue money can be considered.

"The system does not now need the government's financial support in any fashion," said Charles Sethness, an assistant treasury secretary.

He told the House Agriculture subcommittee on credit that federal assistance to the FCS now "is the wrong approach, at the wrong time, leading to a possible wrong result."

Donald Wilkinson, governor of the Farm Credit Administration, which oversees the farmer-owned lending system, embraced the legislation even though financial aid provisions do not guarantee the up to \$6 billion that FCS officials have said is necessary to keep it afloat over the next three years.

Their remarks came during hearings on legislation introduced Wednesday by farm-state lawmakers to prop up the faltering FCS, a network of 37 cooperatively owned banks which holds about a third of the nation's \$214 billion agricultural debt.

Drawing objections from Sethness and Frank Naylor, an undersecretary of agriculture, was a provision for a backup line of federal credit for the FCS. Any amount of money could be provided at the discretion of the Treasury secretary if it was found necessary to protect the financial stability of the farm lending system.

When the bill was first unveiled, it provided for up to \$2 billion in federal aid. However, that was changed before it was introduced to provide the administration with complete discretion to determine the amounts of aid.

Although Naylor recommended the committee approve the legislation without the financial assistance provision, he made it clear that the administration's opposition to an immediate FCS bailout does not foreclose such aid later if it is deemed necessary to avert a collapse of the lending system.

But several committee members pounced on the administration officials for not providing a clearer statement on if, when or how much federal assistance might be provided.

The legislation would revamp the system's organization, providing the Farm Credit Administration with greater regulatory powers and removing it from day-to-day management decisions of the FCS.

It also would establish a new Farm Credit Capital Corporation to act as a "warehouse" for bad loans and acquired properties. The new company within the FCS would provide a central pool of financing for quick aid to struggling system institutions.

Bill to raise sales tax due

Funds would balance books

TWIN FALLS — Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Idaho, says he will carry a 1-cent sales tax increase bill to the Idaho Legislature this winter.

In an interview with the Times-News Thursday, Neibaur said his bill would raise enough money to balance the state's books and take care of court-mandated improvement of Idaho's prisons.

Increased education funding is not built into the bill as it is in the Idaho Economic Recovery Act, a tax increase and reform bill being promoted by a bipartisan group of Idaho Legislators. "Other than the prison thing, there's one other area we need to address and that's public employee salaries," he said.

Although the bill does not specify that he saw tax dollars will go to prisons, he said the prison improvements are impossible to avoid and state employees have gone without significant raises in recent years. "Education spending is not a priority, he said. "It's hard to get support for more money for education when people feel the efficiencies aren't there."

Neibaur says the tax increases asked for in the Idaho Economic Recovery Act are excessive. "That's too much money. I'm looking for something that will blunt that and

give people something else to vote for," he said.

His 1-cent sales tax increase would raise about \$60 million, Neibaur said, most of which he would earmark for specific funds, leaving only \$16 million for the Legislature to spend as it sees fit.

The first \$15 million would be used to pay off this year's revenue shortfall, which Gov. John Evans has reacted to by ordering a holdback on state spending.

Another \$7 million would be added to the state's Permanent Building Fund. • See NEIBAUR on Page A2

Old TB hospital passed up again

BOISE — Despite mounting concern over possible court action to ease overcrowding in the state prison system, the state Board of Corrections has rejected a relatively inexpensive plan to add up to 200 inmate beds to the system by remodeling the old state tuberculosis hospital in Gooding.

"Considering the state of the building, we wouldn't be doing much that meets true needs," the board said. Board Chairman Bob Anderson of Post Falls said Thursday after the plan was rejected.

The board immediately met with Gov. John Evans to press its request for the money to construct a new maximum security facility, costing possibly as much as \$15 million.

The move by the board came as Evans continued work on his budget message for the 1986 spending year that security analysts has said will be marked by revenue short of the amount needed just to maintain state operations at their current levels. Evans has already indicated he will not seek a major tax increase from lawmakers this winter, claiming it simply be impossible to meet all the pressing needs of the state.

The Gooding facility has been the focus of several private investor proposals for conversion to a minimum-security-for-profit prison serving all the Western states. But since none of them has been finalized yet, Murphy proposed that the state consider spending about \$15 million to remodel the abandoned hospital into a maximum security prison.

The board, which voted earlier this fall to cap the prison system population at 1,300, turned down the proposal as members agreed that the prison system's most pressing need is for additional space to house maximum-security and close-custody inmates.

Wheat growers told farm credit could vanish

BOISE — The vice president of the Spokane Farm Credit Bank warned Idaho wheat growers Thursday that farm operating credit could all but disappear if the federal government does not provide assistance to the struggling Farm Credit system soon.

Not only would interest rates go up on the money the Spokane bank

buys to lend producers thereby forcing interest rates to producers up at least another half percentage point, but without assistance the system faces the possible refusal of investors to supply money at any interest rate, Al Haslebacher told the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association.

"We need a backup line of credit from the Treasury to restore the confidence of the investors and the borrowers," Haslebacher said.

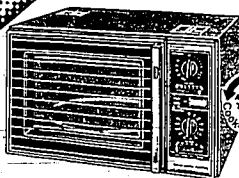
He urged producers at their annual convention to pressure members of Congress to endorse some kind of financial assistance package for the nationwide credit system before the year ends.

"Without assistance we're approaching the point where it isn't a question of the interest rates going up, but whether the market will

even take our securities," he said.

While expressing no specific preference for the kind of assistance package that should be passed, Haslebacher said the Spokane district is concerned about some provisions of a recently introduced \$3 billion bailout measure that would give the Farm Credit Administration total discretion over the movement of capital in the nationwide system.

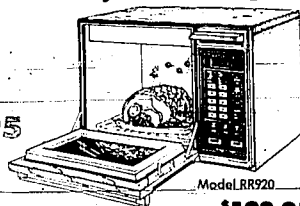

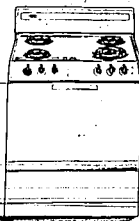

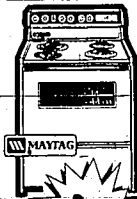

Reagan, Gorbachev discover talking useful

BHUSSEL—President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev went into and emerged from their Geneva summit without achieving any measurable progress toward ending, or even slowing, the nuclear arms race.

But while they remain at loggerheads over U.S. determination to search for a futuristic system to defend against nuclear attack, both men demonstrated that they found talking useful. People who understand each other are presumed to be less likely to make some dreadful miscalculation.

That alone offers some encouragement to an anxious world.

But even before the day was out, the cold rhetoric of the dispute was pouring forth again.

The two leaders ended the session friendly

and smiling, but neither had budged from their positions on "Star Wars," as the president's program is most commonly called.

"There was no give on that at all" from Reagan's side, said Secretary of State George P. Shultz. And as for the Soviets' outspoken opposition to the program, he told reporters, "I would say their position did not change."

That was a comfort to the headline conservatives among Reagan's entourage. They were unenthusiastic about his going to the summit in the first place and fearful despite Reagan's repeated insistence he would not bargain away his dream of a strategic shield.

"The president did well," said defense

undersecretary Fred Ikle, one of those sent to Geneva to represent the way in the administration's personnel by his boss, Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger.

In Washington, Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger—author of a leaked letter urging the president not to give ground on arms control issues—issued a statement saying it was significant that Star Wars "will continue unabated."

And White House adviser Patrick J. Buchanan, the conservative ideologue who represents the president's longtime supporters from the political right, flashed a thumbs-up sign as the summit ended.

The longstanding U.S. and Soviet differences were concealed by the news blackout at the summit, but Gorbachev went on the offensive immediately afterward, saying, "All restraint will be blown to the winds" in nuclear rivalry until the United States pulls back from Star Wars.

And Reagan, when told Gorbachev had predicted the president eventually would change his mind about Star Wars, fired back: "By that time he will have changed his mind."

Progress toward some agreement on the issue was not really expected, however, and if the two leaders continue to talk to each other, the future summits on which they did agree may produce more positive results.

Some officials were optimistic that human rights issues, which they said Reagan raised privately with Gorbachev, would yield some long-range benefits, although neither man said so publicly.

If, in coming weeks, the Soviets permit more Jews to emigrate or some liberalization of their treatment of dissidents, the Reagan administration may conclude that its efforts, while quiet, produced some results.

One senior American official, briefing

reporters on condition he not be identified, predicted human rights concerns would be treated with "greater seriousness and prospect of success" as a result of the summit.

But he provided no details or reason for holding that view.

Nor were there any strong signals that efforts to resolve inflammatory regional disputes, particularly in Afghanistan and Central America were given more than lip service.

But one official said the Soviets appear willing and perhaps even want some peaceful resolution of the war in Afghanistan, where 100,000 Soviet troops are fighting to prop up a Communist regime.

If, as Shultz said, their airing of differences provided something on which to build, it would be a mistake to judge the summit solely on the basis of tangible, publicly stated agreements.

Afghan issue accommodation hintee

GENEVA—A broad hint of future Soviet accommodation on Afghanistan and a hint of movement on nuclear and space arms were identified by U.S. officials Thursday as important and substantive features of the first U.S.-Soviet summit in six years.

The central accomplishments of the meetings of President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev, from all indications, were to restart the top-level dialogue between the two superpowers, to begin a personal relationship between the two leaders and to return to positive aspects of U.S.-Soviet bilateral ties for the first time since the 1970s.

Analysis

There was little disagreement among U.S. experts with Reagan's statement Thursday that "the real report card on Geneva will not come in for months or even years."

In general, little in the way of shifts in substantive positions was discernible in the two days of meetings, which included intense person-to-person discussion between the two leaders with only interpreters present.

Nevertheless, some members of the U.S. diplomatic team were surprised by the change in the tone and, to some degree, the substance of Gorbachev's discussion of Afghanistan. The Soviet occupation of that country in the last days of 1979 was a major factor behind the hardening of U.S. position toward Moscow and the demise of 1979's detente.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Afghanistan "was treated at some length" as part of "a really a very good discussion on the regional issues" dividing Moscow and Washington. Another senior official who sat in on the talks, but who spoke to White House reporters on a not-for-attribution basis, gave his personal opinion that some progress might be made toward settling the Afghan issue and said the question might be handled "more intensively and less visibly" in the future.

The most notable development, according to U.S. sources, was Gorbachev's emotional tone about the Afghan war. In which the Soviets have engaged about 118,000 troops, and his expressed desire to work quietly to find a way out.

One official said Gorbachev did not mention U.S. support for the Afghan insurgents or the involvement of Pakistan, which has been among the most persistent themes in Soviet public statements on the Afghan issue.

Gorbachev did not make known any new Soviet efforts to find a way out of Afghanistan, but the tenor of this discussion -- and the seemingly significant omissions -- prompted speculation about shifts to come.

The major hang-up on arms control, as expected, was the strong Soviet opposition to Reagan's Strategic Defense Initiative (SDI). Gorbachev condemned it as "weapons in space" and Reagan responded by calling it "a shield in space," according to an official.

In a private talk in his villa's poolhouse Tuesday afternoon, Reagan reportedly handed Gorbachev a proposal for a four-point, joint "guidelines" to be issued as a spur to the nuclear and space negotiators. Point three, which dealt with SDI, may well have been the reason that the Soviets did not accept it.

As proposed to Gorbachev, point three made it explicit that programs of strategic antimissile defense could be pursued within the confines permitted by the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty, and that the two nations would work

cooperatively on the relationship between strategic offense and strategic defense.

The Soviets not only rejected this, according to U.S. sources, but sought to the end to obtain wording in the final joint statement calling for a stoppage of work, including research, on SDI.

The U.S. delegation would not agree to this, and left open the possibility that there would be no joint statement -- but only separate statements by the two sides -- if the Soviets insisted.

The argument was not settled until 4:15 a.m. Geneva time on Thursday, according to officials involved.

The fact that the Soviets seemed anxious to have a joint statement by the two leaders -- and in general to make the summit appear a success -- was attributed by U.S. sources to Gorbachev's desire for a good start with the United States to shore up his position on the eve of the Communist Party Congress.

It seemed important to him as well, those officials said, to begin on the right footing with the first American president he has ever met.

Discussing children is discussing peace

The circus surrounding the First Ladies' teas at the Geneva summit reached its illogical conclusion Wednesday with an offhand, offensive remark by White House chief of staff Donald Regan.

Women, said Regan, don't understand "(missile) throw-weights or what is happening in Afghanistan or what is happening in human rights." The fairest sex, he contended, cares about "human interest stuff," presumably kids, cookie recipes and the price of fur coats.

Regan is no doubt now wishing fervently he had not made the most ridiculous remark from a Washington official since Earl Butz was run out of town.

We suspect he got an earful, too, from the little lady who calls -- or used to call -- him a friend. Regan forgot, evidently, Nancy Reagan's recent housecleaning which installed him, her ally, at the helm of the White House -- staff and swept out the undesirables whose loyalty to the president was questioned by Mrs. Reagan.

The worst part about Regan's observation is that its underlying message is not far from the one that has been sent by the international press corps. The "tea parties" between Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Gorbachev have been filled with mind-boggling inanities about wardrobes and menus.

One news account had the First Ladies responding to questions about whether their meetings were "frivolous" or whether they're competing in a "style war." The women were annoyed by the questions, the report said.

Instead of merely showing annoyance, it would be better if Mrs. Reagan were capable of answering such patronizing questions with intelligence or wit.

Unfortunately, she is reserved and ineffective in public. If Mrs. Gorbachev had met with women like Roslynn Carter or Geraldine Ferraro or Jeanne Kirkpatrick, the "tea parties" would probably have taken a different tone.

Nevertheless, no one, including Regan, should construe from this week's meetings between the First Ladies that women don't understand the finer points of peacemaking.

Despite the belief among some members of the government and press that "woman talk" is frivolous, women have shown throughout history a profound respect for life and peace.

Whether it's at a tea party in Geneva or over coffee in the kitchen, discussions about the children are really discussions about peace.

What was agreed upon during Geneva sessions

GENEVA—At the close of their three-day summit-conference, President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev issued a joint statement summarizing their meetings and also announced the official agreement of their governments on five relatively minor issues.

Joint Statement

Reagan and Gorbachev said that, while "serious differences remain on a number of critical issues," some greater understanding of each side's view was achieved by the two leaders.

The two decided that they would meet again in the future, first in the United States, then in the Soviet Union. No dates were set.

They reaffirmed previous promises that neither country wants war with each other and that neither country will "seek to achieve military superiority" over the other. They said their representatives would accelerate their negotiations on arms control in Geneva, and the leaders repeated previous pledges that they did not want "an arms race in space."

General Exchanges

An agreement was signed providing for cultural exchanges in the fields of art, theater, sports, film, architecture, music, law, journalism, medicine, museums, radio and television.

Travel to each country would be encouraged by the other. Each country agreed to send 10 individual performers and 10 major performing arts groups to the other on visits.

People-to-People Agreement

Similar to the general exchanges agreement, this would provide exchanges of professors and students and would encourage the teaching of Russian in American schools and of English in Soviet schools. In addition, the agreement provides for joint cancer research, joint development of education computer programs, and increased television coverage by each country of sports events in the other.

Exchange of Consulates

The two governments agreed to open new consulates in Kiev and New York. The Soviet Union said, however, that this would not take effect until negotiations are completed to allow the Soviet airline Aeroflot to fly to the United States.

North Pacific Air Safety Agreement

This agreement, signed by the United States, the Soviet Union, and Japan, is to prevent a recurrence of the incident in which a Soviet plane shot down a Korean Air Lines 747 that had strayed over Soviet territory. The agreement provides for a new communication link between Anchorage, Alaska, and Khabarovsk in the Soviet Union for use whenever a civil aircraft is in trouble in the area. Under the agreement, the Soviet Union said it would inform Japan or the United States when an unidentified aircraft that could be lost lies over Soviet territory.

Magnetic Fusion

Reagan and Gorbachev agreed that their countries would join in encouraging international cooperation in the development of magnetic fusion. Scientists say that the process, if developed, would provide the world in the 21st century with a source of energy that could never be exhausted.

Polite applause, no standing ovation after Geneva closes

WASHINGTON—The decision of President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to hold future summits won praise on Capitol Hill Thursday but legislators said they were disappointed at the apparent lack of progress in Geneva toward limiting nuclear arsenals.

However, Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said he saw a positive sign of change in the atmosphere of hostility between the world's two superpowers.

"The chemistry is very different now, and that is very significant," Lugar said.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill, D-Mass., said he was "more than delighted" that the two leaders had promised to meet again in the future.

"As long as we're sitting around the table, there is a possibility we can strike a point of agreement," O'Neill told reporters, adding that the mere fact of talking indicates an agreement that there is not going to be a war."

Later, in a formal statement on behalf of the House Democratic leadership, O'Neill said the summit had begun the job of reducing tensions, that the two leaders' endorsement of the principle of significant nuclear arms reductions was encouraging, and that the announced expansion of cultural exchanges is a first step "towards what we hope is an extensive expansion of people-to-people contacts."

But O'Neill said the House leaders had hoped for "more substantial progress in arms control, human rights and regional conflicts."

"We assume and hope that at the very

least both superpowers will continue to adhere to the SALT II and the ABM treaties," O'Neill said.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole called the summit "a hopeful beginning to a process of dialogue and negotiations which we hope will become more comprehensive and bring more concrete progress in the future."

"In particular," said the Kansas Republican in a statement, "the decision to hold future summits, including the one in Washington next summer, is a welcome development."

Rep. Bill Richardson, D-N.M., termed the meetings "a success, but not a great success; a hit, but not a home run."

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., told the House, "Overall, the world must regard the summit with polite applause, but not a standing ovation."

And Sen. Joseph Biden, D-Del., said that if he were to rate the summit on a scale of good, bad or indifferent he would choose "indifferent."

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., co-chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee, said the agreement "is a good one."

Leahy added that if progress was in fact made on arms control and not announced publicly, that will be obvious in the actions of the U.S. and Soviet delegations at the next round of the arms control talks.

"If it continues to move at the pace of a dinosaur mutation, as it has in the past, then the summit did not accomplish anything on arms control and that would be a disappointment," Leahy said.

House Majority Leader Jim Wright, D-Texas, said he was encouraged by "the fact that each apparently listened long enough to hear what the other was saying."

Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., called the summit "an important step toward reducing tensions between the two superpowers."

But he added: "It is apparent that critical issues on the agenda remain unresolved."

Rep. Barbara Mikulski, D-Md., said she was encouraged at the signs of "personal rapport" between Reagan and Gorbachev and said that reduces war tensions. But she added she felt "great disappointment" in the fact that Gorbachev "absolutely denied that human rights was a legitimate part of the agenda."

Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., was more critical, saying "nothing was accomplished in either arms control or human rights, the two most critical issues between our countries."

A spokesman for the Union of Concerned Scientists, which supports arms control, expressed deep disappointment.

Grand jury hears evidence in bombings

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Federal officials cleared a "fourth-floor hallway-of-the-downtown-courthouse" where a federal grand jury reportedly was hearing evidence on two fatal October bombings Thursday.

U.S. Attorney Brent D. Ward instructed security guards to keep people out of the hall, then slipped into a room. Guards said they had been told to prevent anyone from listening outside the door.

Federal officials would not confirm or deny that the grand jury was investigating Mark W. Hofmann, whom authorities have called the chief suspect in the bombings, or the bombings themselves. But associates of Hofmann reportedly were subpoenaed to appear before

the grand jury Thursday.

Hofmann, 31, has not been charged in the murders of Steven F. Christensen, 30, and Kathy Sheets, 50, who died in separate bomb explosions Oct. 15.

Hofmann and an associate, Shannon Patrick Flynn, have been charged with an "unrelated" federal weapons violation stemming from the discovery of an unregistered Uzi machine gun at Flynn's home.

On Wednesday, authorities said they found metal shavings and other possible evidence at a home which Hofmann, a dealer in rare documents, intended to buy in Emigration Canyon.

Hofmann, who was injured when a bomb went off in his car, took a lie

detector test that proved he was telling the truth when he denied involvement in the bombings. On the day earlier, his attorney said this week.

A drill, drill bit, metal shavings and other materials were seized from the Emigration Canyon home and sent to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms Laboratory in San Francisco.

"We're not overlooking any possibility... but the stuff found there can be found on any workbench," said Salt Lake County Sheriff Pete Hayward.

However, The Salt Lake Tribune quoted unidentified investigators as saying the home may have been where the bombs were made, and

the "Deseret News" quoted an investigator as saying, "We found what we've been looking for all along."

Flynn and two other Hofmann associates, Brent Metcalfe and Lynn Jacobs, also reportedly have passed lie detector tests, the Tribune said.

Jacobs said in an interview Wednesday he believed Hofmann was innocent.

He said Hofmann told him last Saturday that he believed he had been hit by a car as he lay in the street after the bomb went off in his car.

"Mark said that he was coming from the McCune mansion and that despite what we heard, that his hands were empty," Jacobs said.

Watkins goes after unitary tax

BOISE (AP) — State Sen. Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls, says he plans to introduce legislation next year to repeal Idaho's unitary tax system.

Watkins said Thursday the tax, a state system for levying taxes on corporations which operate in several states, is stopping economic growth in the state.

He said the tax often is cited by potential investors as a reason why they do not come into the state.

Reagan farm policies scored

BOISE (AP) — Citing the rising exodus of producers from agriculture amid the current depression in market prices, a top wheat industry official is warning that the Reagan administration drive to lower government supports to make American commodities more competitive internationally will only accelerate the trend.

"Today's wheat prices are already putting farmers out of business at a record pace," Erv Friebe told the Idaho State Wheat Growers Association Thursday. "Farmers cannot live with a lower price." Friebe, a Nebraska farmer, is vice president of U.S. Wheat Associates.

But in view of present political realities, Carl Schwensen, executive vice president of the National Association of Wheat Growers, said the package of farm programs being crafted on Capitol Hill right now will do little to resolve critical export problems.

"Our problems eclipse what this farm bill can do," he told the association's 25th annual convention. "We're in nearly desperate times right now."

Forest plans facing appeals

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Appeals have been filed on long-range management plans for two Idaho national forests, officials say.

A California man and an Idaho anti-wilderness group have filed appeals against the Targhee National Forest plan. In addition, seven environmental groups and an individual have jointly filed an appeal against the Caribou National Forest plan.

Neither appeal stops any federal actions, but both require a response from the Forest Service Intermountain Region office in Ogden, Utah. The responses have to be made in 30 days and those who appealed have 20 days for rebuttal, said Karl Hauser, appeals coordinator for the regional office.

Cities, counties to seek funds

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Replacing \$19 million that will be lost when federal revenue-sharing ends is the first priority for Idaho's cities and counties in the 1986 Legislature.

While there are differences in the legislative agendas of the Association of Idaho Cities and the Idaho Association of Counties, both plan to seek more money from state revenue sharing and permission for local option sales taxes.

The cities' group is going to ask the Legislature to repeal the 5 percent ceiling on annual budget increases, which was imposed by the 1 Percent Initiative. The counties have a broader array of sources to tap for replacement revenue.

Those legislative wish lists were outlined for 102 eastern Idaho city and county officials at a dinner meeting here.

Jones thinks legal age for drinking will be 21

BOISE (AP) — Attorney General Jim Jones predicts the next session of the Idaho Legislature will raise the state's legal drinking age from 19 to 21, under the threat of a loss of federal funds.

And Jones told the Idaho Press Club on Thursday that a South Dakota lawsuit which Idaho has joined over the legal drinking age will go nowhere.

"The Legislature has battled over the drinking age in recent sessions, but has wound up doing nothing. Next year, the state faces a federal mandate to raise the drinking age or face the possibility of losing federal highway funds."

"You couldn't make a good case for it in any event," said Jones, noting that studies show if the drinking age is raised, traffic deaths drop among 19 and 20-year-olds.

"If you can raise the drinking age and save a few lives, then you probably have done something good for the state," Jones said.

Amusement park planned

BOISE (AP) — A couple is proposing a 20-acre amusement park west of Boise they say would employ 300 people and attract 1,500 visitors a day.

Richard and Lana Albertson said they will ask the Ada County Commission on Wednesday for permission to build Grundl's U.S.A. on the outskirts of Boise.

The venture would include a large building off Interstate 84 that houses an indoor pool with slides and spas; a video arcade; a 40-lane bowling center; batting cages; a skating rink; miniature golf and food courts.

Outdoor facilities, which would be used about 100 days per year, would include swimming pools and a serpentine slide.

The Ada County Zoning Commission rejected the project Oct. 24, saying the area first must be rezoned from its present agricultural zone. The Albertsons, contending no rezoning was necessary, are appealing to the county commissioners.

Evans backs fast

BOISE (AP) — Gov. John Evans signed a proclamation on Thursday urging all Idahoans to take part in this weekend's National Day of Fasting to End Hunger.

President Reagan and Congress have declared Sunday as a national day of fasting, with all citizens encouraged to miss at least one meal and contribute the money saved to world hunger organizations.

'Tea Summit' hinted at regular visits

GENEVA (AP) — The first hint that Soviet-American summits could become an annual affair came in the summit between Nancy Reagan and Raisa Gorbachev, not from their husbands.

After the Soviet and American first ladies met for the first time Tuesday over almond tea and cookies, Mrs. Reagan casually mentioned the possibility of return visits to Moscow and Washington.

"She asked me to come to Moscow. I asked her to come to America," Mrs. Reagan said. "We both said that we hoped we would be able to go to each other's countries."

Two days later, it appears the first ladies' hopes will come true.

At the final joint ceremony on Thursday, President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev confirmed that they intend to hold two more summits, one in the United States and

the second in the Soviet Union in the coming years.

While Reagan and Gorbachev tried to grapple with Star Wars, human rights and regional issues like Afghanistan, the two women discussed their busy schedules, big city living, their respective countries — and most importantly, they said, their husbands' desire for a better understanding.

Admittedly, Mrs. Reagan and Mrs. Gorbachev left a high political issues to their husbands. But they both stressed that they had serious things to discuss and their meetings weren't just frivolous tea parties.

Throughout the days of summitry, the 64-year-old Mrs. Reagan appeared gentle and reserved while Mrs. Gorbachev, 53, was talkative and seemed sure of herself.

Mrs. Reagan kept her public statements to a minimum, but Mrs. Gorbachev delivered im-

prompt remarks at virtually every stop on her crowded itinerary, which included a tour of Geneva and the offices of the United Nations.

Her machine-gun fire of questions and off-the-cuff remarks continually caught her hosts off guard. At a local university, she launched into a conversation with the rector about the relationship between philosophy and physics. Mrs. Gorbachev has a doctorate in philosophy from Moscow University.

Mrs. Reagan, meanwhile, has a certain smoothness that may trace partly to her Hollywood background. That was demonstrated when she gave a slick news conference about the results of her first tea with Mrs. Gorbachev.

One concrete result of the summit appeared to be the opening of communications and some solid groundwork for continued contacts between the leaders of the world's two most powerful nations, as well as their wives.

Culture, consulates, research among accords

GENEVA (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union signed new cultural accords Thursday to foster "greater understanding among our peoples" by allowing an exchange of Russian and American scholars, performing artists, businessmen and athletes.

The cultural agreement replaces a pact allowed to lapse six years ago in retaliation for the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, and is one of five accords reached during the first summit of U.S. and Soviet leaders in six years.

As President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev watched, the accords were signed by Secretary of State George Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze.

A joint statement released by the

two leaders said "they believe there should be greater understanding among our peoples and that to this end they will encourage greater travel and people-to-people contact."

The two nations agreed to create a joint scholarship program for students in natural science, social sciences, humanities and technology, and to promote Russian language studies in the United States and study of the English language in the Soviet Union.

A parallel agreement provides for "general exchanges" to promote understanding of "aspects of each country's life and society." Among those to be included in the exchanges are arts groups, professors, print and broadcast journalists, and library exhibits, as well as gov-

ernment officials at the federal, state and local levels.

The chief negotiator of the cultural agreement, Raymond Benson, said the program would make possible exchange visits of groups like the Bolshoi, Beach Boys and New York Philharmonic.

Another of the accords is aimed at preventing future accidents: an agreement between the two countries, along with Japan, to promote safety on air routes in the North Pacific.

A fourth accord opens a new U.S. consulate in Kiev and a Soviet consulate in New York, and authorized the two governments to conclude negotiations to resume commercial air travel between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The last agreement is designed to foster research on the sun as energy, through transfers of technology and "basic knowledge."

Hard-liners relieved

WASHINGTON (AP) — Conservative advocates of a hard line toward the Soviet Union expressed relief on Thursday that the Geneva summit ended without an arms control agreement that might have cut President Reagan's "Star Wars" program.

"The good news is, it could have been worse," said Howard Phillips, chairman of the Conservative Caucus.

"My concerns are with what hasn't been said," Phillips added. "Whether the president will be able to have had these meetings with Gorbachev to extricate himself from what seems to be unilateral American adherence to the SALT II treaty."

Phillips said he believed "it was a mistake" for Reagan to meet with Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev.

"I kind of feel the left got what they want, meetings and a lot of show," Phillips said. "The substance is just not there," said Richard Viguere, conservative fund-raiser. "Star Wars goes on."

John T. Dolan, chairman of the National Conservative Political Action Committee, said the summit, which he had opposed, ended as "a great boon for Reagan."

Dolan said the president "ought to be applauded for not worshipping at the shrine of an agreement — unenforceable, unverifiable — for its own sake."

Mikhail Tsypkin, a Soviet emigre who is an analyst at the conservative Heritage Foundation, said the failure to reach an agreement limiting the president's missile defense system "scalled the Soviet bluff."

Police fire on black crowds

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police opened fire Thursday at a crowd of tens of thousands of black protesters outside Pretoria, witnesses said. A newspaper reported at least six people were killed and hundreds injured.

Police headquarters confirmed two deaths but made no mention of violence at the gathering estimated by reporters to number more than 50,000 in Mamelodi, a sprawling black township north of Pretoria, the country's administrative capital.

It apparently was one of the biggest confrontations in 15 months of violence against apartheid, the legal system by which 5 million white rules 24 million voiceless blacks.

The Mamelodi protesters were demanding lower rents, an end to restrictions on funerals and the departure of soldiers and extra police from Mamelodi.

Moslem fire pins down envoy

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Terry Waite, the archbishop of Canterbury's envoy who is trying to free American hostages in Lebanon, was pinned down by gunfire between battling Moslem militias Thursday.

But in a message for the hostages' families, he said he was still optimistic about the kidnapped Americans' chances for freedom. He urged their relatives to be brave.

"Have courage. Keep calm. We're making progress," Waite said in an interview in The Associated Press office as fighting raged in the streets below.

But he cautioned, "We've a long way to go yet." Police and hospital officials said at least five people were killed and 32 wounded in the fighting between the Shiite Moslem Amal militia and the Islamic Druse sect's Progressive Socialist Party.

Cosmonaut ill, mission ends

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet control center cut a space mission short and brought three men back to earth from the orbiting Salyut-7 laboratory Thursday because the commander fell ill and needed hospitalization.

It was the first time a space flight was known to have been shortened by a crew member's illness either in the Soviet Union or the United States.

The official news agency Tass issued the first word of mission commander Vladimir Vasyutin's illness Thursday afternoon, more than an hour after he and his companions made a "soft-landing" in the Soyuz T-14 capsule on the steppes of Central Asia.

Naval-craft trade fire in gulf

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — Coast guard boats exchanged fire Thursday with Nicaraguan launches that entered Salvadoran waters in the Gulf of Fonseca and tried to capture three fishing boats, the army press office said Thursday.

It said one of the Nicaraguan craft appeared to have been damaged in the battle, which took place Wednesday.

Salvador, Nicaragua and Honduras share the Pacific gulf. The army statement said the Nicaraguan vessels had stopped the Salvadoran fishing boats when the coast guard boats arrived on the scene.

Swedish heart recipient dies

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — Swedish businessman Leif Stenberg, the first person outside the United States to receive a permanent artificial heart, died Thursday of respiratory and vascular failure, doctors said.

Stenberg, 53, was the world's fourth recipient of a permanent American-made Jarvik 7 heart. For many of the 229 days he lived with it, he had appeared to be recovering more quickly than other recipients.

Dr. Bjørn Semb, the Norwegian surgeon who implanted the heart April 7 at Stockholm's Karolinska Hospital, said Stenberg's case still gave "grounds for a certain optimism" about such devices.

Report links crash, explosion

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — India's director of air safety said an explosion in the cargo hold apparently caused the crash of an Air-India Jumbo jet last June in which all 329 people aboard were killed, according to his report obtained Thursday.

The report by Hoshair Singh Khola said the conclusion was based on analysis of the cockpit voice recorder and the air control tower tapes at Shannon, Ireland.

"It appears that an explosion occurred on board the aircraft" at 07:14:01 Greenwich Mean Time on June 23, Khola said in the 78-page report.

A copy of the report was made available to The Associated Press by a source who requested anonymity. The Shannon airport tower recorded

"abnormal sounds" when the plane's voice recorder and flight data recorder stopped functioning at 07:14:01 GMT, the report said.

A source close to the investigation added that the sounds came from about 50 feet from the cockpit microphone, indicating an explosion in the front-cargo hold.

The source, who spoke on condition he not be identified, said 13 holes measuring 5 inches to 7 inches were found in the wreckage of the cargo compartment. The wreckage is currently under examination at the Bhabha Atomic Research Center near Bombay.

Khola's report said it appeared that some objects flew out of the front-cargo-hold and hit the right wing and stabilizer.

The floor of the compartment was "badly smashed and mangled" and a portion of its door was broken off, it said.

Damage to the rear cargo hold "is not consistent with impact damage" and suggests that this section broke up in the air due to "internal over-pressure," the report said.

"The aft portion of the aircraft had separated from the forward portion of the aircraft perung before" the plane hit the sea, it said.

The Boeing 747 plunged into the Atlantic Ocean off the Irish coast June 23 on a flight from Canada to Bombay in western India.

The report ruled out collision with another plane, missile attack, fire, lightning, over-velocity, metal-fatigue as possible causes of the crash.

Sudan minister claims city safe

KHARTOUM, Sudan (AP) — Prime Minister el-Gazouly Dafallaah on Thursday denied a State Department claim that Khartoum had become unsafe for Americans, the official Sudan News Agency reported.

The warning, issued Wednesday, urged Americans to avoid Khartoum because of the presence there of "known terrorists," most of whom were Libyans. Department spokesman Charles E. Redman said Thursday that some U.S. Embassy staffers and their families were being brought home.

BLM considers eliminating Shoshone office

TWIN FALLS — Even if the proposed land swap between the Bureau of Land Management and the U.S. Forest Service is not approved by Congress, Shoshone may still lose its district BLM office under reorganization plans being considered by the agency's state office in Boise.

Ervin Goley, manager for the Shoshone District's Monument Resource Area, said the agency is considering about four dif-

ferent reorganization proposals involving plans to minimize economic impacts for towns losing a district office by leaving area offices in those locations.

"It is possible that Shoshone may lose the district office," said BLM spokeswoman Trudie Olson. If the land swap between the two agencies is called off, Olson said "as an agency alone, we still have some cost saving opportunities."

One measure being considered by the state BLM office is consolidation of the Shoshone and Burley District Offices into a single district office in Twin Falls.

That alternative would mean lost jobs for both smaller towns. Olson said the agency

is considering the elimination of its national forest land in the exchange.

While nine out of the 10 public comments received by the two agencies were opposed to the exchange, the two federal agencies are still moving ahead with the idea and a legislative package has been presented to Congress.

More than 34-million acres would change hands nationwide in the exchange plans proposed this summer, with the Forest Service gaining a net 2.3 million acres.

White public opposition to the swap has been intense. Olson said "we're going ahead

with it. There are some pretty legitimate reasons for it."

While the agency has considered the public comments, "the other thing we have to look at is cutting costs." Cutting costs in Idaho may mean cutting both staff and offices, according to Olson.

Both the Burley and Shoshone districts, however, may be headed for change even without the interchange proposal. Since the departure of Chuck Haskler to the state office on November 1, John Iaso has been appointed acting manager for 120 days.

MVRMC OKs refinancing of bond debt

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley Regional Medical Center Board voted unanimously Thursday to issue \$29 million in new bonds to pay for a \$26 million bond debt issued in 1981 and covering a 27-year period.

The refinancing plan gives the hospital flexibility to enter joint ventures with doctors, or sell the hospital to a non-profit company, finance officials said.

The 8 a.m. meeting of the Hospital Board was followed by a 9 a.m. meeting by the Twin Falls County Commissioners, who also approved the refinancing.

At noon in Boise, the Idaho Health Facilities Authority, a state agency which allows health facilities to issue tax-exempt bonds, gave final approval to the plan.

Neli Glass, executive director of the IHFA, said the authority was "satisfied" that MVRMC's finances allowed it to repay the bond.

The refinancing means little actual savings to the hospital, said Carlton Dugas, vice president of health care finance with Merrill Lynch.

Actual savings will be \$325,000, or \$1,000 a year. However, when the amount is adjusted for inflation, the real savings are expected to be about \$100,000.

"The hospital is doing a little better than breaking even," Dugas told board members. "Basically, the refinancing is not costing you anything."

MVRMC began investigating the refinancing plan last August, with the assumption that market rates would mean considerable interest savings to the hospital.

However, the rate of the insurance was higher than expected, and fluctuating market rates changed,

reducing potential savings, MVRMC Administrator John Bingham said.

Still, the hospital went ahead with the refinancing because Bingham said a new bond would eliminate the restrictive covenants in the 1981 bond. The new bonds allow the hospital to expand its markets, transfer assets to affiliate corporations, and basically enter into joint ventures.

Another change over the 1981 bonds allows the hospital to be sold "if desired," said Kurt Kaufman, an attorney with Sherman and Howard, a Denver law firm acting as bond counsel.

However, under the new bonds, MVRMC would have to be sold to a non-profit corporation, and only if the sale would not affect the tax exemption of the bonds, Kaufman said.

If the hospital were sold to a for-profit corporation, MVRMC would have to repay the bonds immediately.

The principal bond issue is \$29,950,000, of which \$28,447,100 will go into an escrow account to pay off the old \$26 million bond. MVRMC also is transferring \$2.99 million from its 1981 debt service reserve fund to set up a new debt service fund.

The rest of the money is taken up in costs of issuing the new bonds. The cost of the issue is \$1,236,000, including a \$892,392 insurance premium paid to AMBAC, the municipal bond insurer. AMBAC insurance is necessary to raise the bond's rating to AAA, making the sale of the bonds easier to potential investors.

Underwriting costs of the bond handler, Merrill Lynch, are \$684,316.

When MVRMC makes the final payment on the bonds on Dec. 1, 2013, the hospital will have paid a total of \$27,324,876 in principal and interest over 27 years.

Stabbing victim files claim alleging jail was unsafe

TWIN FALLS — A Buhl man stabbed Oct. 13 in the Twin Falls County Jail Thursday filed a \$1-million claim against the county, alleging the jail was unsafe.

The notice of claim was filed with the county by Mike Lapray, 39, a former Twin Falls County sheriff's deputy.

This is the second time in a month the county has been hit with a claim over alleged inadequacies at the 7½-year-old jail, which is located in the County Courthouse.

A lawsuit was filed Oct. 22 in 5th District Court by attorney Greg Fuller on behalf of two men who claimed the jail was overcrowded and violated their constitutional protection against cruel and unusual punishment. Ted Matney, a former jail inmate, and Michael Goodson, still being held in jail, have asked the court to close the jail and order the county to build a new one.

In the most recent claim, Lapray is seeking \$1 million in damages for the county's alleged violation of his constitutional rights and for negligence that resulted in his injuries. Lapray also is being represented by Fuller.

Under the law, the county has 90 days to deny or pay the claim. If the claim is denied, Lapray may file a civil action with the courts.

Twin Falls County Commissioner Judy Felton and Sheriff Jim Munn had no comment on Lapray's claim. County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said early Thursday afternoon that she hadn't yet read the claim.

Felton did say the claim was turned over to the county's insurance company, which is usual procedure with claims against the county. The company, however, had denied coverage on the Matney-Goodson suit; Felton said. As a result, the county has to pay the costs of defending the suit and any damages. Baxter said previously.

In the claim, Lapray says he was arrested Oct. 13 in Buhl on an aggravated battery charge in connection with a quarrel with his wife. The charge later was dropped.

While in the jail, Lapray says, he told Munn and Jail Administrator Jim Hopkins that he wanted to be placed in a cell by himself, because as a former deputy he feared for his safety. Hopkins, Lapray claims, told him there were too many people in jail that day and they had no choice but to place him in a dormitory-type cell.

Testimonies heard in murder trial

TWIN FALLS — Occurrences following the stabbing of Walter Parks April 20 unfolded Thursday as the murder trial of his wife continued in 5th District Court.

Deanna Kay Parks, 38, is on trial on a charge of second-degree murder for the stabbing death of her 62-year-old husband.

The prosecution opened its case Thursday with testimony of a passerby, who called police to the house at 535½ Main Ave. W.; from the responding police officers and detectives; doctors who treated Parks; and the pathologist who examined his body.

Defense attorney Jim Meservy objected Thursday to the medical

witnesses and to the alleged murder weapon — a butcher knife — being placed into evidence by the prosecution.

Meservy said he already agreed to the fact that Mrs. Parks had stabbed her husband and his case would be one of self-defense. The doctor's testimony and the knife would "inflamm" and prejudice the jury, Meservy argued.

Judge Daniel Meehl overruled the objections, but warned Twin Falls County Prosecutor Jeff Hosking not to ask inflammatory questions.

The doctors testified Parks had about a 1-inch-wide knife wound on his chest and his heart had been punctured.

Police Detective Garry Corder testified that Mrs. Parks told him she and her husband had been arguing over the money they would divide when they separated.

Corder read Mrs. Parks' written statement in which she said: "I thought he would hit me or much worse. I only remember stabbing him once."

Other officers testified that Mrs. Parks stated she hadn't meant to stab her husband and showed concern for his condition. Mrs. Parks kept repeating, "You've got to help me wake him up," one of the officers testified.

Humane society says shelter releases dogs for research

POCATELLO (AP) — Bannock County Humane Society members say the animal shelter here is releasing dogs to be used in medical experiments, but city officials deny the claim.

Jo Anderson, Humane Society Investigator, said she has uncovered evidence which reveals at least six dogs have been used for "testing and experiments" at Idaho State University's animal research facility and at a local veterinarian's office.

Ms. Anderson said the evidence would be presented to the Pocatello City Council.

Earlier this week, the Humane Society also charged that the animal shelter's gas chamber was in a "serious state of disrepair" and called for an immediate end to its use.

City Manager Charles Moss said he has talked with Dick Moldenhauer, the city's animal control officer, about the allegations.

Moss said that based on Moldenhauer's statement, there is no impropriety or misuse of the animals.

Ms. Anderson claims using any animal for a medical experiment or test procedure violates city code and the Animal Welfare Act of 1970.

"Dick has been very careful on how he disposes of any animal," Moss said. "He has checked with the city's legal counsel on a number of occasions to ensure proper, legal methods were being followed whenever an animal was taken from the shelter."

City ordinance says any impounded animal which is unclaimed after three days may be sold or otherwise disposed of. The code also states that no animal may be sold to a research facility for use in research, unless the animal's owner requests in writing that the animal be sold for such purpose.

Moldenhauer also denied Ms. Anderson's allegations over the use of dogs for experimental purposes. He said four dogs were given to the Eastern Idaho Veterinary Medicine Association at the request of Linda Merry, a local veterinarian.

Moldenhauer's statement, that animals were for an animal eye surgery seminar held in Pocatello last week.

"The animals used by ISU and the veterinarian's office were scheduled for euthanasia anyway," said Moldenhauer. "There was nothing improper."

Merry said two of the animals were used for the seminar. The dogs were under a "general anesthetic."

She said once the surgery was completed, all four animals were euthanized.

"The two animals used at ISU were to conduct tests on an 'alternative' euthanasia method," Moldenhauer said he was considering for the animal shelter.

However, the alternative method was found "not to be the best one for use by a public facility," according to Edwin House, chairman of ISU's biology department.

At present, the animal shelter uses a gas chamber, located at the upper level of Ross Park, to dispose of animals. The chamber uses carbon monoxide gas.

Moldenhauer said because his facility and staff are not licensed to administer so-called injection drugs, the gas chamber is the only method available.

FBI agent describes Order founder Mathews' violent last-ditch stand

SEATTLE — Order founder Robert Mathews' violent last-ditch stand against FBI agents by shooting through a ceiling in his waterfront hideout and continuing firing as the house burned to the ground, an FBI agent testified Thursday.

James Jay, head of the FBI's Seattle SWAT team, told of Mathews' final, violent hours on Whidbey Island on Dec. 7 as agents surrounded him and tried to capture him.

The testimony came during the house racker's trial of 10 alleged members of the white supremacist group Mathews founded and led until his death.

The defendants and 13 others allegedly ran a 14-year crime campaign that included two murders, more than \$4 million in robberies, arson and counterfeiting. Prosecutors claim their Nazi-like goal was to establish an Aryan homeland without Jews, racial minorities and "white traitors."

Jay said he and agents surrounded Mathews' house north of Seattle early in the morning of Dec. 7. It was not until the afternoon of Dec. 8, after negotiations with Mathews produced no results, that Jay and four other agents entered the ground floor of the two-story house.

"We were told to ascertain the condition of Mathews. The command post didn't know whether he was alive or dead," Jay said.

Tear gas had been fired into the house earlier and Jay said he told one of the agents to go outside and get a gas mask for a dog handler who was having trouble breathing.

At that point, "we received automatic weapons fire from upstairs, coming through the ceiling and then zigzag across the floor and through the walls," Jay said.

Mathews, who was on the second floor, fired 20 to 30 shots striking

within a foot of agents below; he said. Jay said he directed agents to fire short bursts in return through the ceiling in an attempt to get Mathews to move away.

When agents tried to open the door to the stairs, Mathews fired another six or seven shots and the agents fled the house at about 2:30 p.m., Jay said.

A few hours later, a helicopter turned a floodlight on the house and illumination flares were fired into the structure. "The house caught fire from the intensely hot white phosphorus flares, but Mathews appeared at an upstairs window and began firing at the helicopter," Jay said.

As agents returned fire, Mathews moved to a corner of the house and began shooting at them, he said.

Divers recover submerged car

Living together trend seems to be on decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — After skyrocketing for more than a decade, the number of unmarried couples living together in America has headed downward, the Census Bureau reported Wednesday.

As of last March, there were 1,983,000 unmarried couples in the United States, according to the new study.

"The numerical change is a slight drop but not something we consider statistically significant. It certainly did not increase, however, as it had been doing dramatically since the 1970s," said Steve Rawlings of

the Census Bureau's population division.

From 523,000 in 1970, the number of unmarried couples living together jumped to 1,589,000 in 1980 and peaked at 1,988,000 in 1984, according to Census statistics.

The growth in 1984 was only marginal before this year's decline, Rawlings noted.

"I think it's probably a result of the aging of that group that's most likely to live in that way. That age group of 18 to 24 is shrinking, and the people who had been living together are getting older and getting married," said Cheryl Russell.

Heart attacks more likely when waking, says research

BOSTON (AP) — People are three times more likely to suffer heart attacks at 9 a.m. than at 11 p.m., probably because the stress of waking up somehow triggers changes in the body that cause the attacks, researchers report.

The findings could improve understanding of what makes lethal blood clots lodge in the heart's arteries and provide clues for preventing them, said Dr. James E. Muller.

"This represents a big new area to research," he said.

The study found that heart attacks are more common between 6 a.m. and noon than at any other time of day. The incidence reaches a peak at 9 a.m. and then declines to a low point at 11 p.m.

The researchers theorize that the important factor is whether the person wakes up, not the time of day, so that those who work night shifts might have the highest risk of heart attacks in the evening.

The study, conducted by researchers at Boston's Brigham and Women's Hospital and Harvard Medical School, was based on an analysis of 2,999 heart attack victims. It was published in Thursday's New England Journal of Medicine.

Usually a heart attack — what doctors call a myocardial infarction — occurs when a blood clot blocks an artery "that feeds the heart." The heart muscle is starved of oxygen, and some of it dies.

Idaho's title hopes await challenge of BSU

After 13 weeks of football action in the Big Sky Conference, the league's championship and berms in the Division I-AA national playoff will be decided Saturday at Moscow.

Idaho hosts Boise State, and if the Vandals win, they capture the Big Sky title and a spot in the playoffs that have been won by Big Sky teams three times in the last five years.

If Boise State wins, the Broncos will hand the championship to Nevada-Reno and might even capture an at-large playoff berth with

an 8-3 overall record.

Montana travels to Flagstaff for a Big Sky game against Northern Arizona in a battle of tail-enders.

Montana State has wrapped up its regular season and Nevada-Reno, sitting on a 10-1 record and tied for second in the Division I-AA poll, already has a first-round bye in the playoffs and will not see if it goes as the league champion.

Weber State, with a wide-open offense that now ranks as the best in the nation in I-AA at 516 yards per game, winds up the season against Pacific at Stockton, Calif. The Wildcats, 6-4 heading into the final game, produced 800 yards and 667 yards total offense in two of its last three games.

Also critical to the playoff picture

is Idaho State's season-ending non-conference game at Pocatello against Eastern Washington.

The Eagles, 7-2, are ranked 11th and could win the western at-large spot in the playoffs even if Boise State beats Idaho, with an impressive showing at Pocatello. ISU, meanwhile, could wind up with a winning season at 6-6 if it defeats Eastern Washington.

Tailback Merrill Iloge also needs only nine yards rushing to break his school record set last year at 900 yards.

Boise State, with a five-game winning streak, can't win the Big Sky crown. The best the Broncos could

do would be a 6-1 Big Sky title with Nevada-Reno, and that would hand the crown to the Wolf Pack after an early-season victory over BSU.

Idaho, meanwhile, would win the crown in a tie with UNR, because it handed Reno its only loss of the season.

Boise State has a special incentive this weekend. For one thing, the Broncos haven't beaten a bitter-in-state rival, Idaho, for the last three years. For another, Boise was embarrassed at home, 37-0 by Idaho last season in a game in which the score could have been far worse.

Boise State was crippled by injuries in that game. But several injured players appear ready for the showdown game.

Leading the way is all-conference defensive tackle Markus Koch, a 6-5, 270-pounder who was kept out of Saturday's game against Cal Poly by a pinched nerve in his neck.

Another down lineman, Mike Johnson, also is expected to start despite an injured ankle.

Idaho had last week off to prepare for the game. Expected to return to action after injuries are offensive guard Tom Cable, cornerback Mike Johnson, running backs Todd Hoinness and Steve Jackson and quarterback Scott Linehan.

"We both played good, solid golf," said Wadkins. "Our biggest problem was trying to keep our momentum, keep our patience because Paul was so slow. Five and 50 minutes was a long time to be out there."

"Except for No. 12 (which both bogeyed), we didn't make any mistakes. And that's what you have to do on this course," said Wadkins, who with Kite finished an embarrassing 12th, 22 shots back, in last year's World Cup at Rome.

Wadkins shot a 68, four under par and good for a tie for the lead in the individual competition. Kite had a 70.

Defending champion Spain was the only other team in the 31-nation competition to break par. Jose-Manuel Canizares had a 70 and Manuel Pinerio 73, giving them a team total of 143.

Argentina and Australia were next at 144.

The Eagles, the last team on the course, were tied with the United States and Canada for the lead going to the par-5 18th hole.

College basketball hits TV heights

If you think there was a glut of college football on the tube each Saturday this fall, you ain't seen nothing yet.

The college basketball season begins in earnest Friday night with the Big Apple NIT. Naturally, it will be on television. Mizlou is producing the early-round games for syndication and for Commerce Satellite Network; the semifinals and finals will be on USA.

In fact, college hoops action will be televised virtually every night of the season — and that doesn't include the NBC and CBS telecasts on weekends.

"We don't have a problem with exposures during the week on cable," says Kevin O'Malley, CBS's executive producer of college basketball. "The most difficult thing for us is when we put a conference team in our network games and, at the same time, the conference's regional packages go up against us. College basketball is a little overex-

posed on Saturday. There are a lot of choices for the fan, but it can make the acetaminol base of our game tougher. Advertisers are aware of the fragmented audiences."

Still, the networks and cable outlets have plugged head-first into the market of available games.

Three-wire-telcable networks playing basketball this year, with 32 major conferences.

CBS, which has the NCAA Tournament rights, will do 28 regular-season games, with six doubleheaders. The network gets started Nov. 30 with the Tip-Off Classic, featuring Georgia Tech and Michigan All of CBS's telecasts will be on weekends, including several which will be teamed with National Basketball Association games on Sunday afternoons.

"The college and NBA basketball telecasts complement each other better than a mix of basketball with boxing and/or golf, where there's no real tie-in," says O'Malley.

NBC will have either 25 or 26 exposures, beginning with DePaul Georgetown on Dec. 21. Like CBS,

NBC has placed a heavy emphasis on intersectional games.

"The schedule is important and we have a great one," says George Pinkel, NBC's coordinating producer for college basketball. "Our feeling has always been to try to capture the total picture of college basketball."

"We want to get the action and the flavor of the games, but still the most important thing is what happens on the court. The other things — the fans, cheerleaders, coaches — are pluses to be used with a great deal of discretion."

The heaviest schedules of college basketball are those at ESPN and Madison Square Garden Network. ESPN will do 116 contests, starting with the Great Alaska Shootout next Friday night, and concluding with early-round NCAA tournament action. ESPN will average about six games a week and will devote most Tuesday and Thursday nights to the sport.

MSG, which will carry 62 games — Big East, Big Ten, Big Eight, Metro, SEC, SWC, MAAC — is in a different

position from ESPN. Because of its coverage of New York Rangers and New Jersey Devils hockey and New York Knicks basketball, MSG can't devote a particular night to college basketball. But it will do the ECAC Holiday Festival, plus six doubleheaders from the Garden and five from the Meadowlands Arena.

"Last year, we did 27 games," says MSG spokeswoman Karen Metzky. "The biggest additions are the conferences, the SWC and SEC games."

ALNSA, 26 of 27 games will be carried after New Year's Day. Wednesday are reserved for Big East games, while the SEC will be shown on Thursdays. USA also has five Notre Dame games, plus the semifinals and finals of the NIT.

The Big East is the big winner in the television derby. The nation's most televised conference, 69 of the 72 regular-season contests will be shown. Big East games will appear on NBC, CBS, USA, ESPN, MSG and dozens of over-the-air stations, plus several other cable companies.

Nebraska defense ready for Oklahoma

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — Saturday's game between second-ranked Nebraska and No. 5 Oklahoma has been billed by many as a test of how well Oklahoma's defense will be able to stop Nebraska's great rushing offense.

Sooner linebacker Brian Bosworth, for one, does not see it that way.

"I look at it like they're facing the number one defensive team in the nation," Bosworth said. "Rolling over people like Kansas and Iowa State — they're not showing me anything until they come into our pit and do it."

Whatever the point of view, the game could decide the Big Eight Conference champion. Nebraska, 9-1 overall and 6-0 in the league, would win the outright and go to the Orange Bowl with a victory. A loss reportedly would send the Cornhuskers to the Fiesta Bowl.

Oklahoma, 7-1 and 5-0, must win to set up a showdown with Oklahoma State next week for the conference title. If Oklahoma beats Nebraska

and loses to Oklahoma State, the Sooners probably would go to the Gator Bowl with Oklahoma State going to the Orange Bowl.

Bowl bids can officially be extended Saturday.

The Cornhuskers boast the nation's best ground game, averaging 395 yards per game, and ranked second in total offense. Oklahoma counters with the defense, ranked second nationally against the rush and ranked first in total defense. The Sooners have given up an average of 65 yards per game on the ground.

Both teams are outstanding on the other side of the ball as well. Nebraska ranks third in the country in rushing defense and third in total defense, while Oklahoma is third in rushing offense and seventh in total defense.

Bosworth, who had 19 tackles against Nebraska a year ago, said it is impractical to think about actually stopping the Cornhuskers.

"What you try to do is slow them down," he said. "We're just looking

to keep them in the same situations as last year — second and long, third and long."

Both teams enter the game with great momentum. Oklahoma has run up big numbers in winning four straight since a loss to Miami, Fla., on Oct. 19, while Nebraska hasn't lost since its season opener against Florida State.

Nebraska Coach Tom Osborne, 4-9 against the Sooners, said Oklahoma seems to have had two seasons of offense — one before quarterback Jamelle Holloway took over for injured Troy Aikman and one after.

"For the last four or five games, they have been very productive," Osborne said. "Right now they are playing as well offensively as anybody in the country."

"I'm sincere in saying this is as good a football team as Oklahoma has had."

Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer returned the compliment, saying Nebraska's offense appeared as potent as ever. He said the one ingre-

dent keeping it from being an offensive unit is the passing ability of the quarterbacks.

"Through the years, their quarterbacks have always been 59, 56 or 57 percent passers, and this year they're 39 and I think 36 percent," Switzer said.

Switzer said he considers Nebraska fullback Doug DuBoise the best in the conference along with Oklahoma State's Thurman Thomas. But he said the defensive coaches are concerned about stopping Husker fullback Tom Rathman, who has averaged 7.7 yards per carry.

"Nebraska has always been a great fullback trap team, now with the fullback pop off their option play. That is a definite threat, and a big-play man at that position," Switzer said.

"This is something we didn't have to contend with last year as much."

Kickoff is scheduled for 2:30 p.m. CST, with the game being televised nationally by ABC.

But Bills running back coach Elijah Pitts said he "hasn't had a minute's problem with him (Cribbs). He comes to work every day, he pays attention and makes very, very mental errors."

Refrigerator's notoriety irritates defensive coach of Bears

As the Chicago Bears trotted up the ramp in "The Stadium" last Sunday after demolishing the Dallas Cowboys 44-0, a CBS production assistant immediately pulled aside two players for immediate on-air interviews.

One was Walter Payton. The other, of course, was William Perry, aka The Refrigerator.

Perry earned his TV appearance by running once for a yard and incurring a 10-yard "illegal use of the hands" penalty when he tried to pick up Payton and carry him into the end zone.

The Perry hype continues — the NBC station in New York, of all places, devoted a portion of its Tuesday night broadcast to Perry taping a hamburger commercial. "The Refrigerator makes his first commercial, tape at 11," blared the station's prime-time promos.

Which doesn't particularly sit well with crusty Buddy Ryan, the Bears' defensive coordinator.

"There are others who are playing better and are more deserving," Ryan says. "Perry didn't grade out too well last week — he was better the previous week."

Perry himself said after Sunday's game that he thought he had played well on defense. "I wish people would play more attention to it because that's what I'm supposed to do," he said.

By Ryan, who made Perry a defensive starter at right tackle only after it was "suggested" to him by head coach Mike Ditka, says the 302-pound Refrigerator has a problem.

"He's a rookie," Ryan says. "They make mistakes."

Perry says that when he picked up Payton, he was just trying to protect him and didn't know it was illegal.

to Falcons, who are 2-9 this season going on 2-10 — they face the unbeaten Bears Sunday — and 13-30 in Henning's three years. Earlier this season, he got an often-fatal vote of confidence from owner Rankin Smith, who said he'd at least let his coach finish the season.

Last week, Coach Bill Parcells of the New York Giants, a close friend of Henning's, let it be known that the Atlanta coach has a spot in New York if he ever needs one. The same reports are emanating from Washington, where Henning was an assistant to Joe Gibbs before getting

the Atlanta job.

Some other coaches in trouble: New Orleans' Bum Phillips, who says he'll quit if his team loses another game; Kansas City's John Mackovic; St. Louis' Jim Hanifan, and San Diego's Don Coryell.

Another coach said to have a problem is Philadelphia's Marion Campbell, but he's making it difficult for owner Norman Braman to let him go — the Eagles have won five of their last six games and have a legitimate shot at a playoff berth.

The replacement for Campbell reportedly would be Jim Mora, coach of the Baltimore Stars of the United States Football League.

Another USFL coach, Birmingham's Rolfe Dotsch, is at the top of a lot of NFL lists. Both Mora and

Dotsch are under contract, but USFL sources suggest they might be available under buy-out agreements similar to those that have freed a lot of USFL players to switch leagues.

Two other USFL coaches, Oakland's Charlie Sumner and Portland's Dick Coury, also are prospects. Those teams are defunct, so Sumner and Coury are free agents.

Coury, ironically, had a good shot last year at the Tampa Bay job that went to Leeman Bennett. But the NFL suggested that Coury be left alone so as not to give the USFL fodder for its \$1.2 billion antitrust suit against the established league.

Why the Chicago Bears dominate the NFL: Besides being 11-0, three games

better than any other team, the Bears top the NFC in six categories.

They've scored the most points (323 or 29 per game) and allowed the fewest (127 or 12 per game). They also lead the NFC in offense (372 yards per game), rushing offense (176), total defense (270) and rushing defense (177).

They are eighth passing and eighth against the pass but that figures. They get ahead, so they pass less and force their opponents to pass more.

Why teams need diversified offenses:

Gerard Riggs of Atlanta leads the NFL in carries with 268. James Wilder of Tampa Bay is second with 253. Their teams have a combined record of 3-19.

Wilder's efforts represent 91 percent of his team's carries — other Bucs have carried the ball from scrimmage only 24 times.

The Falcons, by contrast, have 104 other carries, but 43 of those belong to quarterback David Archer.

Geneva gives bull market solid shove

NEW YORK (AP) — Wall Street's bull market got an another show of force Thursday, carrying major stock indexes to new highs in heavy trading.

A wide range of blue-chip issues led the advance, joined by financial issues, benefiting from hopes for lower interest rates.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks jumped 23.05 points to 1,462.77, eclipsing the previous closing high of 1,440.27 set on Monday.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange accelerated to 150.32 million shares from 105.10 million Wednesday.

Analysts said hopes for continued declines in interest rates stirred up enthusiasm for stocks.

They also said the latest news from the summit meeting in Geneva seemed to meet with a warm response on Wall Street.

Thursday's gain put a new stamp of authenticity on a market advance that was greeted with great skepticism in its early stages. Since Sept. 17, the Dow Jones industrial average has gained 164.11 points.

Eastman Kodak rose 1 1/2 to 48 1/2 in active trading. On Wednesday the company projected "solid" gains in sales and earnings for 1986.

Among other blue chip issues, International Business Machines gained 1 1/2 to 140 1/2. General Electric 1/2 to 66 1/2; American Telephone & Telegraph 3/4 to 23 1/2; Westinghouse Electric 1/2 to 45 1/2; and McDonald's 1/2 to 75.

Pharmaceutical stocks showed some notable strength. Merck, which is a component of the Dow Jones industrial average, climbed 3/4 to 124 1/2; Upjohn 3/4 to 132 1/2; SmithKline Beckman 1 1/2 to 74 1/2; and Pfizer 1 1/2 to 51 1/2.

Among financial issues, Great Western Financial rose 1/2 to 29 1/2; and H.F. Ammonsan was up 1/2 to 40 1/2.

One of the few weak spots in the market was the airline group, after

Richard Ferris, chairman of UAL, predicted a renewed industry fare war next year. UAL stock fell 1/2 to 48 1/2, and Delta Air Lines 1/2 to 37 1/2. Thompson Medical gained 1 1/2 to 14 1/2. Directors authorized the company to buy back 1 million of its common shares.

Cleaver, the biggest percentage gainer among NYSE issues, was up 1 1/2 to 7 1/2. The company said it was discussing a possible change in the terms of an agreement that calls for its acquisition by Madison Management Group Inc.

In the day tally on the Big Board, about three issues rose in price for every one that declined. The average's composite index climbed 1.33 to a new high of 116.12.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in

those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 187.7 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrial stocks rose 2.81 to 224.05, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was up 2.42 to 201.41.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market gained 2.26 to 305.21. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 240.77, up 2.04.

THE ACES® BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff: When one counts points, what's the difference between initial evaluation and support evaluation?

Chasing Values, Dayton, Ohio

ANSWER: Initial evaluation is made before the bidding starts. One counts only raw points and distribution. The bidding affects the true value of a hand based upon such factors as a trump fit, useful high cards and useful distribution.

Dear Mr. Wolff: If my partner makes a takeout double of the dealer's preempt of three spades, should I pass for penalties if I think I can win about three tricks?

Progres Winslow, San Bernardino, Calif.

ANSWER: Only if you hold two or three trump tricks in the opened suit. High cards in the other suits will solidify doubler's hand, and provided you have a trump fit, you will usually score more in your game than in playing for penalties.

Dear Mr. Wolff: I held a Yarborough opposite partner's two no trump opening, but I did have a six-card heart suit. Was I justified in bidding three hearts?

W. J. Ballou, Phoenix, Ariz.

ANSWER: The bid of three of a suit over two no trump is considered a

forward move in standard methods. I would bid hearts also, but I would jump to four hearts to silence partner.

Dear Mr. Wolff: If I respond to a promise to an opening of one club, do I promise a five-card suit?

Chasny Sell, Wichita Falls, Texas

ANSWER: Not necessarily. Some have agreed to play that way; however, it is standard practice to treat the spade suit as any other suit. Holding spades and another four-card suit, one should introduce the lower suit unless the high cards are minimal and are concentrated in the spade suit.

Dear Mr. Wolff: Our side has not bid, and the opponents reach three no-trump after both of them have bid their suits. Does partner's double ask for the lead of a specific suit?

Deshler's Choice, Montgomery, Ala.

ANSWER: Yes, it does. If there has been no bidding by your side, the double asks for the lead of dummy's first-bid suit.

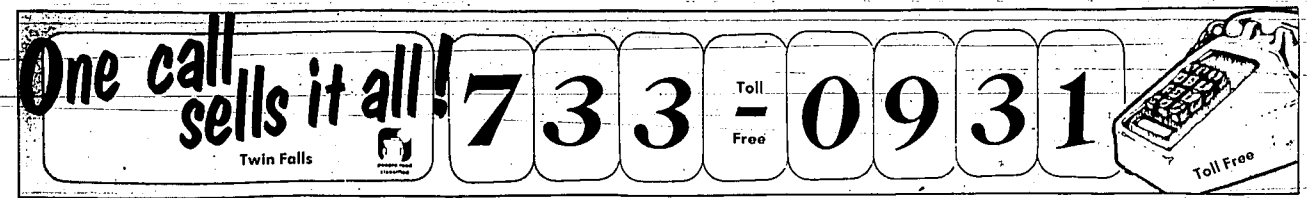

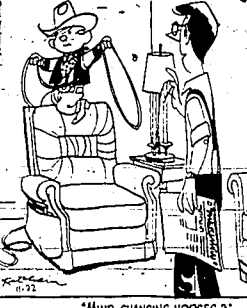

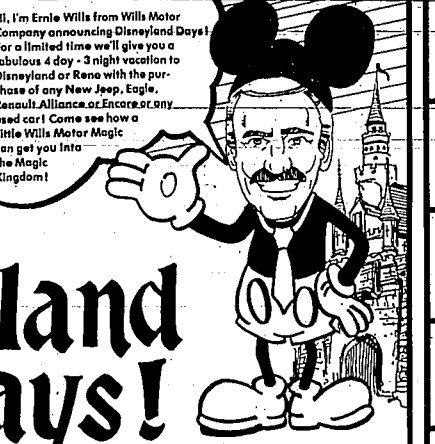

South must remember the bidding to succeed in today's game. First he must finesse East out of his king of hearts. Then, in a sudden reversal, he must give East his king anyway.

East wins his diamond ace and returns the 10 to South's king. Trumps are drawn in two rounds and the heart finesse succeeds. Where does

South go from here? If he leaves the heart suit to try the club finesse (low to dummy's king), "he has not remembered East's opening bid. East wins the ace... the defenders get two more club tricks and the game goes one down.

South succeeds if he continues hearts after the finesse wins. He cashes his heart ace and ruffs his last diamond in dummy. Dummy's remaining heart is led to East's king and instead of ruffing, South discards a club. East, who is stuck with the lead when he cannot use it, must offer a ruff and discard or must break the club suit, either choice giving South his game-going trick.

Patience pays off for outdoors humorist

TWIN FALLS — Patrick McManus, author of "Grasshopper Trap" and other outrageously funny books, packed a crowd into Judi's Books last Friday during his two-hour autograph session.

According to Judi Baxter, who owns the local bookstore, her stock of 100 "Grasshopper Trap" books

fell far short of customer demand for the non-fiction hardcover which has been rated as high as number 11 on the New York Times best seller list.

A native Idahoan popular with Magic Valley readers since his first hardcover, "A Fine & Pleasant Misery," was published in 1978.

McManus is in the midst of a one of those bone-weary, nationwide tours that every successful writer faces

with resignation — and every novice writer hungers for.

Yet, after pounding the keyboard faithfully for three decades, he has reached the point where he can take it all in stride. "A lot of people don't realize it," he says. "But after a writer finishes a book, he has to go out and sell it. It takes a lot of time away from your writing, but you adjust to that."

The author even finds a certain

irony that he has cracked the best seller list with a book that is labeled non-fiction, since that arena is dominated by show business and political personalities. While promoting "Grasshopper Trap," for instance, he recently crossed paths in a television studio with Geraldine Ferraro, who was busy launching her own story.

Viewed objectively, however, it doesn't seem so strange that the

author can compete in a personally-dominated field. Because of his witty shots at outdoor life, critics have been unhesitant about attaching his name to the famous. Often referred to as "the Erna Bombeck of the great outdoors" and "a mix of Benchley, Buchwald and Bombeck," McManus' popularity is no longer regional but has reached a national scale.

When that is brought to his attention, "as well as the financial rewards of having a best seller, the author laughs and refers to the years it has taken to reach his present status. "Divide it all by 30," he says.

McManus says his long apprenticeship began in college while writing for the Washington State University newspaper and as a stringer for the Lewiston Tribune. Then, after graduation, his career continued with the Dally Olympian newspaper in Olympia, Wash. "A few months later I became an editor at the university where I wrote features and articles and worked on a master's degree," he remembers.

Next came 23 years teaching writing of various kinds at Eastern Washington University. That is where he learned to look at the other side of the profession to fully understand what it takes to be a writer.

"The thing I found out, was that no matter how smart the kid is, if he hasn't done a lot of reading he simply doesn't have the feel for the way it's supposed to sound. In reading, you hear rhythms and tones and all kinds of things," he explains.

Of special pride to the former professor is a master's program in creative writing he taught which resulted in several students going on to become professional writers.

The formula McManus uses for success in his students is the same one he recommends to anybody craving to be published. He suggests setting aside two hours a day for writing, "then stop!"

"By stopping," he says, "they have the enthusiasm the next day to get back at it. If they do this

seven days a week for two months they will be writing better than anybody can teach them.

"Then," he continues, "they must look up a publisher, send out what they have written and expect to be rejected."

Pointing out that rejections are simply a part of the game, McManus says that writers must submit manuscripts because, "You can't judge your own work. You have to keep battering away at it, he says, noting that some of his stories weren't accepted until the eighth time out. "One student came to me after her story sold to Redbook for \$800 and explained that the reason I hadn't seen it before was because she didn't think it was good enough to show me."

On his own success, McManus believes it is because his stories create an element of nostalgia in the reader. "In doing the particular kind of humor I do, you write out of your own experience, but also out of the reader's."

He says he always leaves little vacuums and gaps for the reader to fill in. Citing his character Rancid Crabtree from "Grasshopper Trap," the author says, "Rancid is never described in detail. The reader supplies all the details. That's part of the writing technique."

Another factor involved in his humorous outdoor books, however, is that McManus has a vivid memory of his own childhood at Priest Lake and other country and wilderness settings. Taking his actual experiences, he then transforms them into stories with a comic theme. Pointing out that he had to make up his own entertainment as a child, he grins and says, "The way to make a writer is to let him have an extremely boring childhood."

Yet, followers of McManus aren't likely to believe any of that stuff about boredom — not from such a rich word-crafter. After filling columns for 13 years in Field & Stream, added to three more years with Outdoor Life and four hi books, he has become pure wilderness Americana.

After all, who can better describe a "whiff of skunk trappers," or "a sulk of unsuccessful fishermen?"

TWIN FALLS — Harmony, like that spawned in the 1880s by traveling minstrels, will fill the Fine Arts Auditorium at the College of Southern Idaho when the Magichords present their 20th annual show tonight and Saturday at 8 p.m.

Featured are The Allens Quartet from the Portland, Ore. area. This comedy quartet took its name from one of their acts which in-

cludes the unusual use of barber-shop harmony put to songs about many countries. They are one of the top entertaining quartets of the Society for the Preservation and Encouragement of Barber Shop Quartet Singing in America (S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A.), and were quarterfinalists in international competition in 1979.

For contrast, Buhl High School's new brass ensemble members, Brian Murphy, John Kavel, Carl Kohntopp and Laurel Snow, will trumpet a selection at the show.

According to director Wayne Skeem, the ensemble is unique in that the accompanying instrument, a Clavinova, is a digital keyboard that reproduces in attack and tone a piano, yet has optional percussion and other enhancement characteristics. He says that the group is part of a new ensemble concept he's developing at Buhl High School.

Besides the entire chorus of the Magichords, two spinoff groups, The Common Taters and Chapter 4, will present their own versions of

barbershop harmony. Fred Burkhalter, Morry Sattgast, Ormond Smith and John Crawford form The Common Taters, who in addition to barbershop harmony, complement their act with comedy and the addition of a banjo, guitar, tambourine and washtub bass.

The Magichords are a member of the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A., a group that formed 47 years ago with 26 members. Today the organization has 37,000 members who practice the singing art which was so popular in the days of vaudeville and burlesque.

Since 1964, the S.P.E.B.S.Q.S.A. has donated more than \$5 million to the Institute of Logopedics in Wichita, Kan., under the motto, "We Sing That They Shall Speak." The institute is involved in the rehabilitation and training of speech-handicapped children and adults. Barbershop funds, made mostly from concerts, underlie much of that work.

Admission is \$5 adults, with a senior citizen special tonight only of \$4. Tickets can be purchased from any chorus member or from Sav-Mor Drug in Buhl; Lockhart Co., Burt Hulsh Agency and Coca Cola Co. in Twin Falls; and in Jerome, at B & B Real Estate and Volco Inc. Tickets will also be sold at the door after 7:45 p.m.

"We are extremely gratified that a private foundation has chosen to endow a rural arts council — it is an exceptional tribute to the many individuals who have worked so hard over the past seven years to make the Salmon Arts Council a success."

Last year the council was nationally recognized by being one of the first rural arts agencies to receive an Expansions Arts Grant from the National Endowment for the Arts. That grant enabled the council to provide seven advanced visual arts workshops conducted by outstanding artists from throughout the Northwest, for our talented local artists. We trust that the community will respond to this extraordinary challenge and that the Salmon River Arts Endowment will become a reality.

Neither did a broken collarbone deter Tammy Wynette

JACKPOT — "The show must go on" may be a time-worn phrase but to Tammy Wynette it has real meaning.

In spite of a collarbone broken in a recent fall, the "First Lady of Country Music" took her act onstage at Cactus Pete's to warm those loyal fans who had driven through autumn's ugliest weather to revel in her storied songs.

To the busy songstress who spends 15-20 days a month on national tour, a broken bone and unwelcome snow are more nuisance than adversity. It has only been two decades since she was living in a three-room log house on a Mississippi farm that lacked even an indoor toilet, water pump and stove.

Moreover, by that time, she'd already faced a childhood of hardship. With her widowed mother working in a Birmingham defense plant, she lived with her grandparents where, by age 7, she remembers "hoeing, chopping, plowing and hating every minute of it."

But, according to Wynette, that had benefits, noting that she endured long, back-breaking hours in the cotton fields by daydreaming of singing before thousands of people. On Sundays, she played piano and sang in church—and, by her teens, had formed a trio which performed on local radio.

"I dreamed of being a singer," she says. "But I also wanted to be

a housewife and mother like my girlfriends. I wasn't singled in my goal. When 20 of my best friends got married during our senior year of high school, I mistook infatuation for love and did the same thing. I thought marriage would get me off the farm."

It did. Describing the rent-free, abandoned log house her itinerant husband, two children and herself lived in as one that "not even the poorest sharecropper would have paid for," she explains that she moved out to enroll in beauty school in nearby Tupelo.

"A part of me still thinks getting paid to sing is too good to be true," she says, explaining that she still keeps her beautiful's license current. "Having a license means I can always go back to hairdressing."

That's unlikely — even unimaginable considering that since those hard times, and with the help of current husband, songwriter George Richey, she sits atop the country/western charts. Within three years from the time her first single, "Appl. No. 9" was released, she'd won her first Grammy. Since then, she has twice been named Female Vocalist of the Year by the Country Music Association.

And, besides being an album label of hers, "Stand By Your Man" is also the title of her best-selling autobiography published in hardcover in 1979 and reprinted in paperback in 1980. It also aired as a CBS-TV movie special in 1981.

Springsteen gains two video awards

LOS ANGELES (AP). — Singer Bruce Springsteen won some more glory Wednesday night, taking two awards at the 4th annual American Video Awards, one for best male performer and the other for best pop video for his song "Glory Days."

Sharing the spotlight with "The Boss," was comedian and rocker Eddie Murphy, who won the best urban contemporary video category with his video, "Party All the Time."

The best female performance went to Aimee Mann of the lower-east-Boston quartet, "Il Tuesday," for the video "Voices Carry."

Ricky Scaggs won the best country music video award for "Country Boy" and Sade won in the category of best new artist.

Best performance by a duo or group went to Wham! for the video "Everything She Wants," and the group took a second award in the Best Home Video category for a production titled appropriately, "The Video."

Zbigniew Rybczynski was honored as best video director for his production of "She Went Pop" for the group I Am Slam.

Western art, carved ducks on exhibit

TWIN FALLS — Currently on display at Larson Arts for the month of November are Western paintings by Stanley artist Larry Milligan and carved ducks by Brian Crider of Twin Falls.

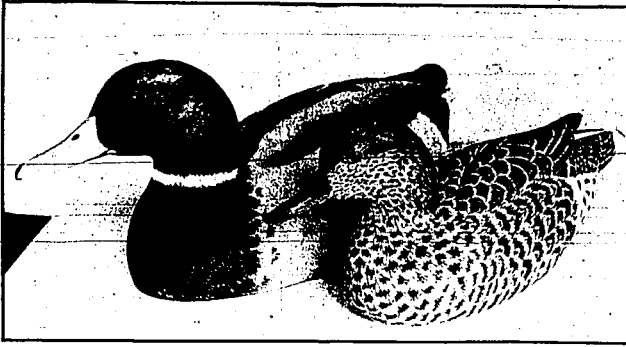
Milligan has been a professional painter and illustrator since 1970 when he left a career in the electronics industry to return to his homeland in Idaho and do what he loves most — create Western paintings.

"My greatest interest in the old West," he says, "is that period from about 1790 through 1880. And, the bulk of my work takes in the fur trade era. Probably that is because that era was both the height of the Indian cultures and of a man's freedom in the Western wilderness."

The artist says he paints and draws every possible type of event that could happen in Western history, including the westward movement, Indian trade, cowboying and anything he can identify with.

"I want very much for the viewer of my work to get a feel of what is going on in the scene. I want them to feel the cold or heat, the crunch of gravel; the cool splash of water and the feel of the wind," he says, adding, "I try to keep a rein on my detail and keep it where it is needed and out of areas where it is not needed and is a hindrance."

Describing his evolution into a more traditional and painterly style, Milligan says that Western art is not

unique in any way except in subject matter. "It is representational, but the styles devoted to its paintings and sculptures are myriad and complex," he says.

Crider, who sells his carved, highly detailed ducks at the Wood Duck Co. in Boise, is displaying his work to raise local interest in the art form. Crider's ducks are made from kiln-dried white tupelo from Louisiana, or from basswood from Michigan.

Starting over four years ago, Crider, a self-professed "duck nut," began duck carving in earnest. A time-consuming process that sometimes takes up to 60 hours, Crider begins with wood blanks, traces a pattern, then roughs it out with a band saw. After shaping the form with a draw knife, he says he uses rotary files and grinders to refine the duck.

After a good deal of finish work, he traces out each feather with a wood burner, then begins a lengthy wash process with acrylic paints. Each duck is hollow and made to float at the proper depth and attitude of a living waterfowl. His works are not guaranteed to quack.

Jack Valenti says cable relief is just a movie studio away

HOLLYWOOD—Are you a cable TV operator concerned about your industry's flattening growth rate? Would you like to "wow" your subscribers with some piped-in pizzazz? Well, for the right price, many Hollywood film studios are standing by, ready and eager to serve you with brand-new programs for the home screen.

Jack Valenti, president of the Motion Picture Association of America and a walking, talking, one-man congressional office for the Hollywood studios, did not say that in so many

words. But his message was clear before members of the new National Academy of Cable Programming here Tuesday. Profits will accrue to those with the best programs, and "programs don't come from the tooth fairy."

Valenti left little doubt where they do come from. "They are created by people who are creative," he said, and then rattled off a price list for Hollywood-produced sitcoms, hourlong dramas and made-for-TV movies.

His keynote address—before the presentation of Awards for Cable Excellence in eight craft categories—came five days after his ap-

pearance before the National Association of Theater Owners in New Orleans, where he acknowledged that movies failed to attract a sufficient audience in 1985 and box-office business was down.

Clearly, the movie and cable businesses both are feeling the chomp of "those little tapeworms," as Valenti called them; videocassette player-records that continue to show strength as an entertainment alternative. What better way to bite back, Valenti's comments implied, than to provide viewers with competitive Hollywood-produced programming via cable?

Citing A.C. Nielsen statistics indicating that viewers in cable-equipped homes tune to the commercial networks and independent stations 75 percent of the time, Valenti admonished cable operators to "band together to try to do something in the arena of programming."

"I don't believe that cable channels' metal skeletons riding in the sky, fiber optics, K-bands... you name it, have any value unless they deliver programs people want to see," he said.

Valenti reserved rare and frequent praise for Shelley Duvall, whose "Farewell to My Love" seen on

Showtime, he credited as "one of the most ingenious programming concepts."

"Farewell to My Love" went on to win one of the few ACE awards—for George Riesenberger's video lighting direction for the "Thumbelina" episode. Duvall herself was a presenter at the event, which will be followed Dec. 3 with the presentation ceremony for the major ACE Awards.

Other craft awards presented Tuesday: Cinematography—Richard Clupka for "The Blood of Others" on Home Box Office; Thomas Bursyn, for the "Murderous Feelings" on an episode of "The Hitchhiker," also on HBO.

VIDEOS

"The Best of John Belushi." Warner, \$24.98. Why waste through the "Saturday Night Live" reruns looking for the best Belushi skits? Here are here: 16 gems from 1975-78. The beefy wild man's skill as an impressionist is evident—his characters include Joe Cocker, Ray Charles, a hip Beethoven and a Samurai swordsman running a sandwich shop. The last skit, "Don't Look Back in Anger," features Belushi as an old man walking through the graveyard, recalling the deaths of his late "SNL" pals; the irony is disturbing, as he boasts of outliving his friends. But this cassette is a reminder of a very funny man. (3 1/2 Stars) — DENNIS HUNT

"Too Smart for Strangers." Disney, \$29.95. Surprise! The folks who brought you Mary Poppins and Mickey Mouse have now turned their attention to kidnapping and child molestation. Seriously. Which is exactly the way these grim subjects are treated—just straight talk about prevention; but it is still entertaining. The costumed cast headed by

Winnie the Pooh sings and dances its way through three basic points: (1) Say "no" to strangers; (2) run away from strangers; and (3) tell a trusted adult about any compromise. The music is hammered home, but the repetition seemed to reach my kids. (4 Stars) — FRED CRAFTS

COMPACT DISCS

"Berlin." Lou Reed. RCA. Compact discs give a second chance to noteworthy albums that did not catch on commercially the first time. With relatively few titles available in CD, a buyer has fewer CD titles to choose from than a traditional album buyer so every "new" CD in the store is something of an occasion. In this imported CD package, Reed's eerie, unsettling tale of addiction, to drugs and more, remains his most gripping and uncompromising album. Rather than a traditional album, this is a somber walk on the dark side. (3 Stars) — ROBERT HILBURN

RECORDS

"Mahvelous!" Billy Crystal. A&M. Beginning last year on "Saturday Night Live," Crystal, until then a merely likable comedian, allowed his more outrageous side to come out, and it is seen all to the good. Here are some of his most memorable characters, including the ingratiatingly smarmy "Fernando" ("You look mah-velous"). Crystal's timing falls him in only one place here: The album has a sketch poking fun at—ouch!—Yul Brynner. But do not worry, Crystal has not gone all the way from nice guy to ghoulishly callous comic: The album

was recorded before Brynner's recent death. (3 1/2 Stars) — TERRY ATKINSON

"The Big Tenor... The Complete Ben Webster on EmArcy." EmArcy. Webster (1909-1973) was a big man with a warm, full tenor sax sound to match both his size and his improvisational stature. This two-record set of 1951-53 sessions finds him leading his own groups, working as a sideman with Johnny "Dus" and Jay McShann, even backing Dinah Washington in a riveting "Trouble in Mind" and the Ravens. There are numerous alternate takes and previously unissued masters. The anthology includes three takes of "Starbird." (3 1/2 Stars) — LEONARD FEATHER

NBC takes its shot at Mussolini, this season's 'fashionable fascist'

Benito Mussolini is this year's fashionable fascist. The square-jawed, shaven-headed Italian Duce was the subject of an HBO movie in September.

Goose-stepping onto home screens this week is NBC's "Mussolini: The Untold Story" (Nov. 24, 25, 26). George C. Scott makes a convincing Mussolini, but the miniseries, like many recent ones, is way too long. There's a lot of padding; the story could be told in a one-night, three-hour movie.

The idea of "the untold story" is an intriguing gimmick, especially when it's applied to a historical figure such as Mussolini, whose life has never been the object of intense scrutiny by Americans.

With such a lure, the viewer breathlessly anticipates the Mussolini minutiae he'll learn. Did Il Duce enjoy having lingune carbonara dumped on his pate? Did he like to call up pizzerias and have them deliver unwanted pizzas to his enemies?

No such luck. The untold story is merely a gimmick. Here, it involves mostly "intimate" scenes around the Mussolini dinner table — in which we see the family, like any good brood, quarreling or singing Christmas songs. Moreover, there are a couple of questionable incidents.

In one, Mussolini responds to

pointed questions from a female reporter by throwing her down on his desk and raping her. Another scene illustrates the classic apologists' defense of Mussolini — that he made the trains of Italy run on time. Here, Mussolini and a gang of blackshirts board a train that's 14 hours late and literally throw the slovenly engineer out of the cabin.

Scott, however, offers a compelling reason to watch the miniseries — if not all three plodding nights, at least some of it. He plays Mussolini

with gusto. Scott says he watched hours of old newsreels and it shows. He has expertly captured Mussolini's mannerisms: the thrust-out jaw, the sneering lip, the strutting, pompous peacock in his beribboned military uniforms. He portrays him as a man who was obsessed with Hitler, ultimately dooming himself by linking himself with the Führer's grandiose plans.

Lee Grant plays Mussolini's wife, Rachele, a patient, long-suffering peasant woman. She's decent, but initially portrayed as comical: She tells her husband not to accept the "job" of dictator because it doesn't offer job security. She later grows stronger and more convincing as she realizes his cause is lost.

More forgettable is Virginia Madsen as Clara Petacci, Mussolini's young mistress. She's vapid, a stereotypical, lovestruck dumb blonde. Miss Madsen must wonder if she's getting typecast. In one of her recent TV movie roles she played Marion Davies, the young mistress of newspaper magnate William Randolph Hearst.

The cast also includes Mary Elizabeth Mastrantonio as Mussolini's daughter, Edda; Gabriel Byrne as his son, Vittorio; Robert Downey as the youngest son, Bruno; and Raul Julia as his son-in-law Count Galeazzo Ciano.

Sterling Silliphant wrote the script with the cooperation of Mussolini's journalist son, Vittorio.

"It should be called "Montecito Estates," says Joseph Bottoms, a native who just joined the cast. "That's where all the rich people are. Just downwind of the town."

Joe ought to know. The Bottoms brothers — Timothy, Samuel, Benjamin and Joe — were all raised on the beach before making good in Hollywood. The brothers can take Montecito, the hideaway for rich movie and rock stars, or leave it.

Joe spends his time aboard a 38-foot ketch with wife Delilla, dogs and a cat, yet he doesn't sound like a beach bum or a rich kid. "Family, church and work are my control centers," he says. "I take all my obligations very seriously. In fact, I'm sorry I didn't do a soap earlier. I'm learning to perform daily, if not always perfectly. Most nightly shows teach you to be a stuntsman. Right now, I feel like a fish out of water. It's so humiliating."

When the new boy goes astray, Marcy Walker, a veteran who plays Eden Capwell, quietly guides Joe back to his cue. So Joe is going to school, determined to get high marks at NBC. "If I do well here, NBC may let me try other things such as directing and producing."

So far it looks like Joe has a steady job, mail coming in from everywhere but California. The natives are looking the other way.

At 31, Bottoms sees the soap as a meal ticket and a stepping stone. "I'm sharpening skills, sharpening my personality," he admits. "It's

personality that makes me a superstar from character roles. Since I won the championship in 1st and 2nd grade, I figure I'm on the right track."

Much of early television's best exists only in viewers' memories

The first film makers thought their one-reelers were perishable as peaches, to be consumed at once rather than preserved. Particularly because the early celluloid film decomposes into a nasty, explosive and inflammable relative of TNT, the studios destroyed prints and negatives of features that seemed to have no further commercial value. Many another print destroyed itself.

Jack Warner once told me ruefully of checking off for destruction a list of films from the vaults — treasures that by the 1960s he dearly wished he had, including a Caruso opera the studio filmed in silent days and intended to show in synchronization with early recordings. It is lost.

The Museum of Modern Art and other institutions in the United States and abroad pioneered in efforts to retrieve the filmed past before it was too late, a work carried on by the American Film Institute. But many an early film, like some of King Vidor's first silent pictures, evidently exist only as tantalizing titles in printed histories.

Television was a little quicker to get after its past, but not much. And television has the severe problem that in its formative days it was live, recorded not at all or at best on black-and-white kinescopes that were to the original images like bad photostats of a painting.

Last year I had a chance to watch a cassette of a black-and-white kinescope of a live, color, musical version of Thornton Wilder's "Our Town," directed by Delbert Mann and broadcast in 1956 with Frank Sinatra as the host-stage manager and Paul Newman and Eva Marie Saint as its young lovers.

The original score was by Sammy Cahn and Jimmy Van Heusen and included "Love and Marriage." It was an RCA effort to promote the sale of color sets, and even in contrasty and faded black and white, it was thrilling to see. The kinescope, I was told, had been metaphorically if not literally retrieved from a wastebasket, about to be discarded as unneeded.

The Museum of Broadcasting in New York, opened in late 1976 under a personal grant from William S. Paley of CBS to locate and preserve television and radio's past (and present), has been compiling lists of shows it dearly wishes it had but can't find.

Just to read the lists is, for those of a certain generation, to be drenched in memory — of the contents but also of those small screens, the maddeningly snowy pre-cable reception and, west of Chicago, those pre-coaxial cable kinescopes that were like peering-through-pieces-of-wet toast.

The museum's first list included the original production of Gian-Carlo Menotti's "Amahl and the Night Visitors" from Christmas, 1951, and luckily a copy of it turned up.

But still missing is, for example, the premiere broadcast of "The Tonight Show" (Sept. 27, 1954), with Steve Allen hosting. Most of the "Tonight" shows from the '50s and '60s have been lost or destroyed, says the museum, including Jack Paar's historic walk-off and Johnny Carson's no less historic debut (Groucho Marx introduced him).

Super Bowl I (Jan. 15, 1967) was videotaped by not one but two networks... and erased. The first televised NFL championship game is missing (Los Angeles Rams) vs. Cleveland Browns, Dec. 23, 1951).

The first televised presidential election coverage (Harry Truman vs. Thomas E. Dewey) in November 1948, can't be found. Neither can the first televised presidential address from the White House (Truman on Sept. 30, 1947).

Ernie Kovacs, the first comedian to make full use of the trickeries of the medium, did his first series, "Three to Get Ready," from a Philadelphia station, WPTZ, in 1950-51. The museum would dearly love to get hold of any portion of it.

The televised version of "The Petrified Forest" (Sept. 20, 1955), with Humphrey Bogart reprising his

film role, is missing, and the museum has only half the original Studio One version of "Twelve Angry Men."

Robert Batscha, president of the museum, said a telecast of the opening of the New York World's Fair on April 20, 1939 (with Gen. David Sarnoff and President Franklin D. Roosevelt on hand), is regarded as the start of commercial TV broadcasting. The event is presumably lost to history, except in stills.

Unavailable as well is a telecast from Oct. 17, 1941, which originated in New York and was carried in Philadelphia, thus becoming the first network show.

The museum has just totted up a supplemental list of missing pleasures. It includes "The Jonathan Winters Show" (Oct. 23, 1956), an early use of videotape, "The Damon Runyon Memorial Fund" (April 9, 1949) has its own distinction — it was the first telethon, hosted by Milton Berle.

"The Storm" (1950-53) was an early series by Rod Serling, of "Twilight Zone" fame. It was produced in Cincinnati. The museum has only one episode of "Nightbeat" from 1955, the famous open-pore interview series conducted by Mike Wallace.

There were several pilot episodes of "All in the Family," done between 1968-71, that the museum would like to get its hands on. And for a program of lasting reverberations, there is the May 4, 1957, "Rock 'n' Roll Show," with Alan Freed hosting for ABC what is thought to be the first network exposure of the music.

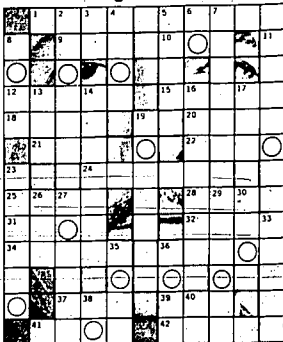

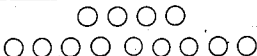

CBS shuffles Wednesday lineup

WASHINGTON — CBS Entertainment is doing its Christmas Shipping early.

The staff of the "George Burns Comedy Week" has received word that with the telecast of the 13th episode on Wednesday, Dec. 25, the anthology series has been cancelled. No replacement was announced.

Wednesday night, which belongs to "Dynasty" and ABC, has been a disaster again this season for CBS.

The network has already announced that two sitcoms, "Mary" and "Foley Square," will replace the long-gone "Str. Crazy" at 8 p.m. on Wednesday, starting Dec. 11.

Two shows remain from the Wednesday lineup that debuted in September — "The Equalizer" at 10 p.m. and "Charlie & Company," the George Burns lead-in at 9 p.m.

CBS still kind of likes "The Equalizer" but don't plan on getting

a holiday card from Filip Wilson. His "Charlie & Company" hasn't done a n better than George in the ratings (they've both been regular members of the Bottom One Third in the weekly numbers all season) and probably will be axed soon.

Mark Harmon, who plays Dr. Robert Caldwell on NBC's "St. Elsewhere," will be written out of the series by having the doctor contract AIDS after an affair with a female AIDS victim.

The episode is tentatively scheduled to air Feb. 5.

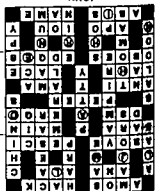
Harmon decided to leave the show, according to his agent, because "his career is taking off." He is featured in a series of commercials for Coors beer and has recently completed two films.
