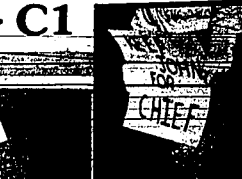

## U.S. ready to counter terrorists with force

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday the United States was on the "end of the road" in applying economic pressure on Libya and would consider using force, if necessary, to counter terrorism.

Libyan leader Col. Moammar Khadafi, meanwhile, ridiculed President Reagan as a "useless actor" and attacked the United States as "stinking" and "rotten," saying he will do whatever he can to end the U.S. military presence in the Mediterranean.

American campaign to isolate Libya economically. With rising emotion, he suggested the Europeans, who have been dragging their feet, should look at the photographs of the mayhem at the Rome and Vienna airports after terrorists struck at the check-in counters of El Al, the Israeli airline, and other carriers.

Reagan this week acted to halt virtually all American economic activity with Libya and ordered a freeze on all of the North African country's assets in the United States and in bank branches overseas.

## Nation's farm population plunges in '85

WASHINGTON — The nation's farm population, after remaining relatively stable in 1984, dropped 7 percent in 1985.

That was the sharpest annual decline in a decade, the government said Thursday. Part of the loss in farm population was blamed on the financial crunch suffered by farmers during recent years, in which thousands of families have been put in jeopardy by huge debts and declining assets.

During the 1970s annual farm population losses averaged 2.9 percent, including a drop of about 7 percent from 1975 to 1976, a period when the U.S. farm economy was on the upswing with record exports and rising land values.

At the Census Bureau, Diana DeAre called the apparent 7 percent decline in the farm population last year "the most significant change" so far in 1985.

But USDA's Calvin L. Beale, head of population studies in the department's Economic Research Service, said the figures should not be taken at face value.

In 1983, he said in an interview, the census survey showed an increase in the farm population. Then in 1984 the survey showed a decline of 33,000 people, which "struck me as unrealistically low."

"I think there has been a real and actual decline in the farm population, but in my opinion it's not 7 percent from '84 to '85, and only half of 1 percent from '85 to '86," Beale said.

The report, released by the Census Bureau and the Agriculture Department, did not include the farm population estimate for 1985, but census officials provided that figure upon request.

According to the report, the estimated 1984 U.S. farm population of 5,754,000 was down 33,000 from 1983. But that was "not statistically significant," the report said.

## Secretary charges treaty violations

WASHINGTON — Defense Secretary Casper W. Weinberger said Thursday the Soviet Union had deployed an additional 18 intercontinental ballistic missiles in "clear violation" of the 1979 Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty.

He said in a speech that only a sustained American weapons buildup would persuade the Soviets to reach an agreement with the United States reducing nuclear weapons. "Peace through strength is not a motto, it's a fact of life," Weinberger said as he defended the administration's defense spending program against congressional efforts to impose restraints in order to reduce budget deficits.

administration for concluding the 1979 treaty, saying it had accepted the "Soviet approach" and permitted the Kremlin to embark on virtually the same weapons buildup it would have undertaken without the accord.

The fourth round of U.S.-Soviet negotiations in Geneva is due to resume next Thursday. The outlook for progress is clouded by disagreement over the U.S. "Star Wars" anti-missile research program.

On the table is a U.S. proposal for sweeping weapons reductions. The Soviets have not responded during the year-end recess, and American negotiators will not offer another when the talks open, said a U.S. official who demanded anonymity. "As far as we're concerned, it's their nickel," he said.

President Reagan is determined not to yield on Star Wars — known officially as the Strategic Defense Initiative — he has told agency heads. The Soviets have not agreed to reductions if the United States proceeded with a space-based defense system.

At the same, though, U.S. officials said some of the loans the administration seeks to market are "so bad we'll be lucky if we get to cents on the dollar."

In the past month, he said, the Soviet Union had increased from 27 to 45 the number of mobile SS-25 missiles that were deployed. He said the Soviet action was fresh evidence of the need for an arms control agreement.

## First Federal New office will rise

TWIN FALLS — First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Twin Falls plans to build a three-story headquarters in downtown Twin Falls during 1986, replacing its 30-year-old main office.

The savings institution also will install a satellite office in the Magic Valley Mall this year, First Federal President Jim Dadds said Thursday.

The new \$1.7 million headquarters will sit on a parking lot and adjacent properties at Shoshone Street North and 4th Avenue North, three blocks from the center of town. Among the businesses now leasing from First Federal at the site is the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, which has been seeking a new office.

"We started acquiring that property about six or seven years ago with the idea of eventually building on it," Dadds said. "We hope to start construction in the spring."

First Federal's board of directors approved the project earlier this week. Dadds and other officials now are interviewing architects and drawing up plans.

First Federal has run out of space in its current offices, located a block and a half away, at 235 2nd St. N., Dadds said.

The new main office will triple the size of the existing headquarters, using three floors. Most customer services most likely will be at ground level, and mortgage lending operations are planned for the second floor. The top story will be reserved for expansion and may contain a meeting room, which might be offered for use by community groups, Dadds said.

Also planned are two drive-in lanes and an automatic teller machine. The buildings will have a modern look, but exact designs have not yet been developed, he said.

Construction costs are estimated at about \$1.5 million, and furnishings and landscaping will add another \$200,000, Dadds estimated.

Coming off its best year in earnings, the association will be able to fund the project entirely with available cash. "We improved our net worth dramatically," he said. First Federal currently has assets of close to \$200 million, Dadds said.

First Federal officials plan to move into the new offices by the end of the year. The existing headquarters will be sold. It was built by the savings institution in 1955.

The new location will give First Federal much more visibility and better access, Dadds said. "We need to get on to Shoshone Street, and it will be the first business building visible coming down Shoshone Street into the downtown district from the north east," he said.

"We're happy that it's an opportunity for us to show a little confidence in the downtown area," Dadds said. Major retailers such as J.C. Penney and The Bon are moving to new stores in the Magic Valley Mall under construction at the north end of the city.

While it is building downtown, First Federal also will be placing a small branch at the mall. The branch will be located in prime space at the mall's main intersection, Dadds said.

The satellite office will offer retail services, such as checking and savings accounts, as well as consumer lending. It will not be staffed for mortgage lending, Dadds said.

The Magic Valley Mall branch will become the sixth in First Federal's system. The savings and loan currently operates branches at Buhl, Rupert, Burley, Ketchum and at Falls Avenue on Blue Lakes Boulevard North in Twin Falls.

## White House suggests selling federal loans to raise money

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration, striving to meet deficit reduction targets, wants to put some government loans — good ones as well as bad ones — on the auction block.

Government-held loans for urban and farm housing for small businesses and for students from low-income families are among those being considered for sale to the highest bidder, U.S. officials said Thursday. But one senior agency executive, who spoke only on the condition of anonymity,

said some of the loans the administration seeks to market are "so bad we'll be lucky if we get to cents on the dollar."

Senior budget director David Stockman, scoffed at the notion of selling off part of the nation's \$250-billion loan portfolio, when it was proposed last spring by Sens. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., and Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J.

But the current budget chief, James C. Miller III, has told agency heads to scrutinize loan programs under their jurisdiction to see which loans might be sold. Miller is under the gun to come up with at

least \$50 billion in proposed deficit-reduction measures as he puts the finishing touches on the president's fiscal 1987 budget, expected to be submitted to Congress on Feb. 3.

The cuts are required under the new federal budget-balancing law.

A three-judge federal panel was scheduled to hear arguments on Friday in a lawsuit brought by 12 members of Congress challenging the constitutionality of that act.

An administration budget official, who talked on the condition that he not be identified by name, said the administration's 1987 budget will propose that a modest amount of federally held loans be sold off,

potentially producing \$1 billion or \$2 billion in added revenues for 1987 alone.

Among the "paper" that might be sold off would be "several hundred million dollars" in loans held by the Small Business Administration and by other agencies the administration is proposing to eliminate, said the official.

Loans for rural housing might also be candidates, he said.

One loan portfolio that would be up for sale is a collection agency of investments. It would be a \$75-billion in outstanding guaranteed student loans, according to Bruce

Carnes, deputy under secretary of education.

However, Carnes said that a number of smaller student loan programs — including \$5 billion in direct loans to disadvantaged students and \$2.7 billion in loans to colleges for housing, are likely candidates for sale.

The loan sale government is selling off the loan at a considerable amount below the face value, nevertheless it makes up a lot of money that it might not otherwise collect. That's usually the philosophy," Carnes said.

However, he said that despite the nearly 12 percent default rate in the guaranteed student loan program, it should not be a target for a sell-off.



# Task force proposes shifting medical bills to state program

BOISE — A governor's task force headed by former Blaine County prosecutor Keith Roark will soon propose a bill to the Idaho Legislature to shift responsibility for the medical bills of Idaho's needy from the counties to a new state program.

Task force members say the plan's major advantages are that it would allow for some new federal dollars to support Idaho's medically indigent people and that it would release counties from processing and challenging unpaid medical bill claims.

Roark said Thursday the plan would not cost counties more than they are paying now.

Right now, the Gem State's 44 counties are responsible for picking up the medical bills of needy people who are not eligible for Medicaid.

The rules governing who can apply for help from the counties have been repeatedly challenged in court and have been called bad law by the Idaho Supreme Court.

To protect themselves, Idaho's counties have banded together to create a catastrophic insurance fund to protect them from unexpected, large medical bills.

That self-insurance fund is fed by a portion of the state's income tax collections, called revenue sharing funds, and from local property tax collections.

"The current program, in a word, is idiotic," Roark said after the task force had voted to send its report and proposed bill to Gov. John Evans to begin working for its passage.

Roark said the most important change the program would make would be a reduction in responsibility for counties. Counties would be charged a per-capita fee of about \$7.13 per resident to help fund the program.

He said that would likely add up to less than the amount they currently set aside in their budgets for medical indigent costs.

Roark said the bill does away with the catastrophic medical bill program the counties now rely on, and counties that opted not to join the statewide program would have to run a catastrophic insurance program on their own.

"That is not intended to be a coercive device by any means," Roark said.

The plan would also make the process of

indigency claims less adversarial, he said. Because current state guidelines are sketchy, different counties have vastly different rules for eligibility and counties spend a lot of money on legal defense when they challenge claims, he said.

The bill Roark's task force will present to Gov. Evans later this month proposes to allow counties not to participate if they do not want to turn their medically indigent to the Department of Health and Welfare.

Because the statewide plan would use federally approved rules to decide who would be eligible for assistance, the state would be eligible for federal funds.

Roark said the program would not cost counties or taxpayers any more than the current system, but Idaho Association of Counties Executive Director J. Chuck Holden disagreed after the Thursday law meeting.

"It's not cost neutral. It's cost or not.

neutral for the counties; it's not cost-neutral for the taxpayer," Holden said.

The cost of the new federal support for the state's medical indigent program would be borne by taxpayers, Holden said. In addition, he said, those federal funds will likely be lost in congressional budget cutting.

The Association of Counties has not yet taken a stand on the proposed bill, he said.

Alan Wasserman, a Coeur d'Alene Legal Aid lawyer, said the recent round of federal budget cuts exempted Medicaid from cuts and will help it in the future.

"It's the most responsible approach to the problem for the time being," Wasserman said.

Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Doelo, chair of the Senate Health and Welfare Committee and a member of the task force, said Thursday he had not had enough time to Holden disagree after the Thursday law meeting.

## Guaranteed funding level for health districts sought

BOISE — South Central District Health Department Director Gerald Hurst appeared before the Senate Health and Welfare Committee here Thursday to ask legislators to approve a guaranteed funding level for health districts.

Hurst, chairman of the statewide directors group, introduced three proposed bills to the committee, two of which would clean up technicalities in the health code. The third would lock the state into matching every dollar of county support for the health districts with 67 cents of state money.

The committee voted to have all three printed, which means it will now consider them in a hearing. Hurst said that until 1976, state law set state matching funds at 67 cents for every dollar of county funds. But that ratio was inadvertently dropped from the code during a revision, leaving health districts without a guaranteed funding level.

Hurst said the Health District office in Twin Falls has been given more responsibility in recent years,

but has had to cut three full-time positions because money was not available.

The health districts currently get about 60 cents from the state for every dollar that comes from the counties, Hurst said. State support for the health districts comprises about 20 percent of the total health district budget. Federal funds, donations, and fees for services make up the rest.

Sen. E. Lee Staker, R-Idaho Falls, voted against the rest of the committee, opposing having the bill printed. "This bill is not gonna pass. Since it's not gonna pass, why bother with the state expense to have it printed?" he asked.

Hurst said he split the funding bill from the housekeeping bills to avoid having them shot down with the funding measure.

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, said he does not yet know if the bill will vote for the funding bill.

Among other duties, Idaho's health districts run medical clinics for the needy, oversee the dairy inspection program, and administer vaccination programs.

## Smaller legislature, budget sessions win committee nod

BOISE (AP) — If two bills approved by a legislative committee on Thursday become law, the Idaho Legislature would have to lose at least 21 members and could discuss only budget matters every other year.

The House State Affairs Committee on Thursday voted to print and introduce two bills prepared by Rep. Dean Haugenson, R-Coeur d'Alene.

One would limit future legislatures to 90 to 95 members in the Senate, and a House twice the size of the Senate.

Due to a lawsuit over reapportionment, the current Idaho Legislature is the largest ever, with 42 members in the Senate and 84 in the House. Before the 1985 session, the Legislature was made up of 35 senators and 70 house members, or 105 total.

Haugenson's bill could eliminate up to 36 legislative positions.

Haugenson's other proposal would have sessions in even-numbered years limited to budget matters only, and limited to 20 days.

There is no limit now on the subject matter which can be discussed at legislative sessions, or how long they can run.

Sessions of more than 60 days have become commonplace in recent years.

Haugenson's bill also provides that Idaho counties could be divided as necessary to make legislative districts as equal in population as possible.

The measure also bans the "floating" districts used in the current plan to balance population variations.

"These are not good government," said Haugenson. "It is difficult for people to understand them."

"I think the care and feeding of 105 state legislators is enough for the state to bear."

There was no debate on the bill limiting the number of legislators. Some opposition surfaced to the 20-day session bill, but it was approved for printing on a 3-6 count.

Haugenson said there's no reason for the Legislature to hold a second session every term to rehab bills defeated in the first session. "We get into enough mischief meeting every two years," he said.

He also noted that halting 20-day sessions every other year would allow more people to serve. "Not everyone can afford to leave their businesses and serve at least 80 days every year," he said.

Rep. James Stinebaugh, D-Sandpoint, said he'd vote for a bill returning the Legislature to meeting only once every two years, a system used until 1969.

He said Haugenson's proposal would mean most of the legislators would sit around in the budget session, with nothing to do, while the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee worked on budgets.

"Everybody has his own idea of what is important legislation," Stinebaugh said.

## Rush requests money to aid struggling farmers

BOISE (AP) — State Agriculture Director Dick Rush, citing the mounting financial problems facing the state's number one industry, is pressing legislative budget writers to approve \$200,000 in additional revenue for programs aimed at helping Idaho producers.

The department has faced countless grasshoppers, disgruntled farmers, increasing farm foreclosures and other problems.

Rush told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee Thursday. "We're facing a host of agricultural problems in the state, and we have to respond as best we can."

At the top of his list, Rush, with the support of Gov. John Evans,

urged approval of \$60,000 to help underwrite continued operations of the Family Farm Hotline and the Farm Foreclosure Review Board.

Operating now on a volunteer basis, and to intensify work on expanding markets for Idaho's farm products.

In addition, he called for \$200,000 to finance a management education program in conjunction with the University of Idaho and state vocational education officials to help farmers survive the depressed rural economy.

Rush emphasized the importance of the foreclosure-review board, which has already received requests from 15 producers for applications to have the panel review and possibly

mediate their problems with creditors.

The board, created last fall by Evans, holds its second meeting next week in Boise. But department officials say it will probably be the end of January before it begins looking at its first great cases.

"When you get to the point where the bank can't talk to the borrower, it becomes very expensive for both the lender and the farmer for a foreclosure to proceed," Rush said.

At that point, why not take another month to review the situation?

He said banking officials are supporting the board, which has the power to order a halt to any individ-

ual foreclosure but only recommend alternatives, because their returns are running at only about 30 percent on foreclosures over the past year.

The agriculture director also made the expected request of lawmakers for approval of nearly \$70,000 to pay off the state's share of last summer's massive grasshopper spraying program.

But Sen. David Little, R-Emmett, co-chairman of the committee, raised questions about the \$12.5 million in mostly federal funds spent to combat grasshoppers on nearly 6.5 million acres of Idaho range and farmland.

In all to many cases, he said, the \$1.90 an acre spent on average in the

spraying program was significantly more than the land brings in. Most of the range sprayed is leased to ranchers for less than a dollar an acre and at times only a few cents an acre.

"Grasshoppers are cyclical," Little said. "They come and go. What we should do is just protect the valuable cropland and leave the rest."

## Committee approves slots bill

BOISE (AP) — Idaho once had legalized gambling, including slot machines. But it's illegal now even to possess the machines.

A state legislator wants a new law allowing Idaho residents to possess non-working slot machines for historical purposes. And Rep. Lydia Justice Edwards, R-Donnelly, says current state law means even the machine on display at the State Historical Museum in Boise is illegal.

The House State Affairs Committee Thursday voted to print and introduce her proposal.

Mrs. Edwards said she tried a similar bill last year, at the urging of a local antique dealer. She said it was doing fine until House Speaker Tom Stivers sent it to a committee.

Traditionally used as a burying ground for legislation the speaker does not want passed.

Despite having been called the man who stole every in western water law, the adjudication of the entire Snake River system is not being properly supported by the state, Idaho Water Resources Director Ken Dunn contends.

"Idaho is a leader in starting up new programs and a leader in not funding them," Dunn told the legislative budget-writing committee Thursday in arguing the panel to override Gov. John Evans' budget recommendations and significantly increase financing for the adjudication program.

Evans, putting together an extremely austere budget for 1987, limited the state's general revenue commitment to the water rights settlement to just over \$76,000, an increase of only \$235,000 from the base level authorized this year.

But Dunn told the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee that at least \$1.2 million in general state tax receipts will be needed in the year that begins July 1 to keep the settlement on schedule.

To get the process started, lawmakers last winter authorized

\$700,000 in general revenues for some hydrological studies and preliminary planning for the adjudication.

James H. Morris of Lewiston, vice president of the Potlatch Corp. Western Wood Products Division, said "GMA" the wage and benefit education agreement reached with the International Woodworkers of America in November, his company can continue to operate.

"Bill in the long run, Morris said, competitive economies will force more efficiency, which will reduce total employment.

Potlatch also agreed to build a new sawmill at Lewiston as part of the new agreement. Morris said that could be done one or two years from now.

## Forest industry still weak

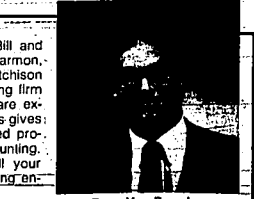
BOISE (AP) — The forest products industry is not likely to spur economic recovery in Idaho, business leaders say.

However, most were less pessimistic than Joe Hinson, executive director of the Idaho Forest Industries Council, who said lumber prices have to go up "or we're looking at some major dislocations in the industry."

No major changes were predicted for the industry this year or next in hearings Wednesday afternoon before the Legislature's Revenue Projections Committee.

### Signing for sites is a worthy project

A new study by the Idaho Travel Council has identified nearly 30 historic and scenic sites in the Magic Valley which have potential for more developed as tourist attractions and might be better visited with more strategically-located signing.

The list is comprehensive and arrives none too soon. Idaho's resource-based economy is, to put it mildly, ailing. Tourism, if it is handled properly, could be a sizable replacement part in the state's economic machine.

Promoting tourism through better signing won support in the last session of the Idaho Legislature with an aggressive push of Sen. Larrey Anderson, R-Twin Falls, who operates a campground in Jerome County.

This year, more legislation may be needed to get local highway districts to add signing for tourists to follow once they leave Interstate and other major highways.

The need for this is obvious and we think the Legislature should give it careful consideration. What good will it do otherwise to have signs along the Interstate if people can't find the attractions once they get off?

On this point, we recall a letter last fall from some California tourists who tried to follow the signs to locate Balanced Rock, one of the more interesting geologic features in our valley. You should try it some day.

Even finding "Twin Falls" from Blue Lakes Boulevard North isn't easy. The best way, we're told, is to go to Shoshone Falls, then as you're coming out, turn left at the sign that says "Twin Falls," and which points in the opposite direction from the city. Got that?

Some narrow interests may list others for their own economic reasons, but the list, published Thursday in The Times-News, looks pretty complete to us. From what we can tell, the Travel Council has done a good initial job identifying potential sites in the valley for inclusion.

So has Anderson, who has seen the need for this project and followed through on bringing it about.

These 500-plus law makers and policy makers are the ones who want the big bucks spent on the industries in their states. These are the people your editorials should be directed against, not the military.

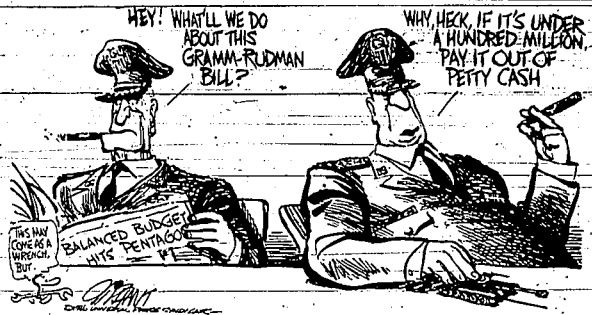

The military is the instrument used to implement policies developed by the president who is the commander-in-chief. Weapons development from military specifications is also controlled by civilian scientists and technicians.

As for your comments on the quote, "disgraceful, bloated pension system." I don't believe you spoke for the majority of Americans. The average military pensioner only collects his/her pension of an average of about eight years. Don't think that's an excessive average for a lifetime of service.

### Story on elevator misleading

The article on "Grain Storage Business Profitable" Wednesday is grossly misleading.

The stipend concrete grain terminal elevator pictured in the article represents a construction cost of \$4 to \$5 per bushel contingent upon site development costs, etc. A 63 cents per bushel per month storage charge represents 35 cents per bushel per year. At an interest rate of 12 percent for the construction loan, the interest cost per bushel of storage is .48 cents to .60 cents per year. Based on the construction cost of grain storage and handling facility illustrated, the owner is being charged 24 cents per bushel if this facility were committed to storage.

The operating cost of the facility illustrated by your article is a significant item not addressed. I do not wish to seem to imply that some grain storage is not profitable. The storage structure construction cost of farm level facilities is, in general, profitable to the farmer under the government loan program. There are few new commercial grain storage facilities constructed that are cost effective applied to the government grain storage program.

Your printed article brushed upon the subject of ground pile grain storage. It is true the storage fees accumulate quickly, applied to

ground storage. However, ground pile storage spoilage also accumulates quickly. Based upon our observations of recent ground pile storage programs we suspect this receipt-of-storage fees, overall, will experience more grain value lost to spoilage than he will experience in storage fees.

We would suggest that a closer look at the commercial grain business under the government storage program will identify a quite different picture than implied by your article Wednesday.

## Idaho's right-to-work law is really civil rights legislation

As an AFL-CIO union president, and a member of a minority, I find it strange that some of those who preach the loudest against discrimination nonetheless support firing an individual from his job solely because he chooses not to join or pay dues to a labor union.

In my opinion, there is no moral distinction in firing someone because he is or is not a member of a certain race, creed, religion, sex, religion, or political party — and firing someone just because he is or is not a member of a union. Discrimination is discrimination, and it's wrong.

That's why Idaho's right-to-work law is, in fact, a civil rights law. It forbids discrimination against individuals who choose not to join or pay dues to the union and guarantees equal access to employment regardless of union membership status. Before our right-to-work law passed, if a Jewish worker might work hard to overcome

racial or religious discrimination, only to be discriminated against and fired just because he or she chose not to join a union. That's a wrong the right-to-work law makes right.

I support the right to work for another reason, because voluntary unionism rewards union officials such as myself who aren't afraid to put in a little work and use persuasion to earn the voluntary support of employees. If a union has a good product to sell, as I believe mine does, it won't need the power to force people to join. It concerns me when most of my fellow union officials oppose right-to-work and demand compulsory membership. That falsely suggests that union membership is something workers would reject unless forced to accept it as a

condition of employment. It also suggests that union officials have no confidence in their ability to persuade people to join voluntarily.

In the private sector unions, the postal workers union is covered by federal labor law that already has our by-law language. My union members are members because they voluntarily chose to be, and I'm proud that membership grew 10 percent after I was elected to the union. I'd like to thank my efforts to recruit voluntary members played some part in that increase. But, if postal workers were forced to join the union, what incentive would I have to work hard to earn their enthusiastic and voluntary support? Obviously, none, and I'd resent it if compulsory membership meant the union official who sat behind his desk all day had just as much membership in his local by force as I could earn in mine by persuasion. With no reward for hard work, I'd probably stop

flustling too. That's not good for the union or the worker.

Here's proof: Idaho's work force is about 18 percent union, but a higher percentage of workers is voluntarily unionized in the three right-to-work states on our border. From my experience, I believe that's because union officials work to offer a better product when they must earn voluntary support. While this local area experienced problems this year, still we have continued to maintain 90-90 percent of the work force even without a perfect product and most important, without compulsory union membership. Also, annual pay is up to \$2,600 higher in neighboring right-to-work states than in Idaho, according to AFL-CIO studies, and 80 percent of all right-to-work states nationally have higher per capita income.

I believe most Idahoans agree that individuals should have a right to employment regardless of race, creed, color, sex, or religion, because discrimination based on such characteristics is immoral.

I also believe an individual should have a right to employment regardless of union membership or non-membership — without being forced to join or pay dues under threat of firing — because discrimination based on affiliation with a private organization is just as immoral.

In addition to guaranteeing basic civil rights and equal access to employment, I believe healthier, stronger, more responsible unions will result when workers are free to choose and will only join if union leaders have a worthy product to sell.

Freedom of choice works for everyone. Under the right-to-work law, it will work for every union in Idaho.

Computers, of course, have made the mass-mailing personal letter more efficient and more subtle — your name can appear in the body of the letter. "So Charles, \_\_\_\_\_ That doesn't convince anyone, of course, even advertisements do that nowadays. But the advantage of a letter composed on a word processor and printed out for each recipient

is that it seems like a typed, individualized letter. Seems, The multi-copy or word-processor letter by necessity of generation must be so impersonal that it sounds more like an entire family filled out an application for a janitor's job and mistakenly sent it to you. They are updated resumes in paragraph form. Or family advertisements. Or miniature, non-historical histories of a family. And just printing.

I returned a family Christmas letter, or good friend, dedicated letter writer, or doesn't fool, because it doesn't have a specific person in mind as recipient. 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# Defendants to stand trial in molesting case

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Seven former teachers accused of molesting preschool children at a pre-school were ordered to stand trial Thursday, ending a preliminary hearing that lasted 18 months and cost \$4 million.

The defendants, former teachers at the McMartin Pre-School in suburban Manhattan Beach, will be tried on a total of 134 counts of rape, sodomy and other abuse, and a single conspiracy count. Deputy District Attorney Carl Rubin.

The defendants, two of whom have been jailed for nearly two years on the charges, showed no reaction as Municipal Judge Aviva K. Bobb ruled they must stand trial. The seven, including three members of the family that founded the now closed school, are to be arraigned Jan. 23 in Superior Court.

"This is the most unfair, unjust

and dishonest court and you don't have a chance of justice in California," Virginia McMartin, the 78-year-old founder of the school, told reporters after Ms. Bobb's decision.

"She (Ms. Bobb) was against us from the beginning," said Ms. McMartin, who was ordered to stand trial on the conspiracy charge.

During the hearing, children testified to rape, sodomy and other abuses over several years, starting in 1978. They said they were stripped and photographed during "naked movie star games," then terrorized into silence by threats against their parents, relatives, animal mutilations and rituals involving people dressed in satanic costumes.

Bones of dead animals were found in a vacant lot beside the school yard, but authorities established no link to the school.

# Postal Service rescinds rate hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — After discovering a miscalculation, the Postal Service on Thursday rescinded a just-approved Jan. 18 postage rate increases for certain newspapers and nonprofit organizations.

A resolution approved in a telephone vote by the postal board said some second-class newspaper rates approved Tuesday "were technically incorrect."

David P. Harris, a board secretary, explained that a calculation error would have resulted in charging newspapers

about \$5 million more than was necessary to cover a shortage.

The postal governors said they would address the rate change at their meeting during the first week of February.

A rate increase was made necessary by a reduction of taxpayer subsidies for newspaper delivery and mailing of library, church and charitable mail.

Newspapers affected by the change include those delivered in the county where they are published, farm, limited circulation and classroom publications.

# Halley's Comet contains water

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. scientists using a modified military transport plane to get the jump on comet exploration spacecraft from Europe, the Soviet Union and Japan, have confirmed a long-held belief that Halley's Comet contains water, NASA announced Thursday.

"This is the first ever definite identification of water in comets," although previous discoveries have found "some components of water, which led to the common belief that comets are 'dirty snowballs,'" said astrophysicist Mike Mumma, head of the planetary systems branch of Goddard Space Flight Center in Greenbelt, Md.

away, releasing gases and a particles that reflect the sun's light thus giving the comet its brightness.

"The airborne spectrometer broke down the light caused by the sun's reflection on the water vapor into a pattern of infrared 'spectral lines,'" Recknagel said. "The coma of Halley's Comet was found to have 10 such lines when observed on Dec. 21 and Dec. 23 from the flying laboratory at 41,000 feet, he said.

Observations made with the spectrometer at lower elevations would not be able to detect the water because of interference from earth-generated water vapor, he said.

Water vapor from the coma, or halo, of the comet was detected last month by a 36-inch telescope outfitted with a spectrometer, an infrared prismlike instrument developed at the University of Arizona. The instrument made the discovery while airborne in NASA's flying laboratory, a modified C-141 military aircraft, said Goddard public affairs officer Chuck Recknagel.

"This is really a very exciting time for us. It represents the culmination of 10 years of theoretical and experimental work," Mumma said in a telephone interview. He and scientist Harold Weaver of Johns Hopkins University developed the theory that comets, molecules such as water, can best be detected by measuring their infrared fluorescent spectrum stimulated by sunlight.

Mumma said the discovery now will help scientists identify other properties that make up comets.

Comets warm as they approach the sun and cool off as they go

NASA had reported last month the probability of 12 tons of water per second steaming off Halley's Comet based on observations made by the Pioneer-Venus spacecraft as it orbited Venus 150 million miles from the comet.

"That was not a direct detection of water. It was atomic hydrogen which could be produced from destruction of water molecule," Mumma said Thursday.

"Nobody has ever identified the parent molecule."

But previous scientific observations have identified other water components, he noted.

Pioneer-Venus was the only U.S. spacecraft in the neighborhood of the comet because it cut forced cancellation of flights to observe the comet close up. The cuts, especially since the Soviets and Japanese, as well as the European Space Agency, sent their own space probes for comet observation.

# Reagan to ask for budgeting revamp

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, who has been frustrated by the government's budget-writing process since his inauguration five years ago, will ask Congress in his State of the Union address to put its economic house in order, administration officials said Thursday.

The officials, speaking on condition they not be identified, said Reagan will use the Jan. 28 speech to present his vision not just for 1986 but for the closing years of the century and spell out what he believes still needs to be done.

Completing work on an overhaul of the income tax system, which the president proposed in last year's State of the Union address, will be a top priority, the sources said.

But they said Reagan also wants to let Congress that the complex budget-writing process it adopted more than a decade ago must be redrawn if the government is to keep its promise of balancing the budget by 1991.

One administration official described the current process as "a shambles" and said Reagan is tired

of trying to work within its constraints.

The president has tried unsuccessfully to win approval of a constitutional amendment to prohibit the government from spending more than it takes in and a measure that would give the president the power to veto individual spending items in appropriations bills without having to veto the entire bill.

The source said the White House budget office and top Reagan aides are searching for new ideas for overhauling the existing system.

Under it, the president submits a plan, Congress rewrites its general guidelines and committees then draft authorization and appropriations bills for specific programs that may not fall within the guidelines.

Not all the appropriations bills get through both houses before the end of the fiscal year or even before the close of the session, forcing adoption of emergency spending measures to keep the departments and agencies running until the next year.

But changing the system is a particularly delicate issue, one source noted, because the congressional budget process is regarded as a legislative matter, and lawmakers may resent White House interference in what they consider their internal affair.

The source noted that then-President Nixon kept out of the congressional debates on the Budget Reform Act, in which Congress adopted what was intended to create a systematic approach to federal spending. But another senior official familiar with Reagan's thinking said this president is inclined to raise the issue.

"The budget process is in acute need of change," the official said.

For all the energy and time and involvement of top government people, the result is \$200 billion deficits. You have to change the process if you're going to change the deficits."

The official added that passage of the Gramm-Bludman budget balancing plan at the close of the last session of Congress was only "a first step" toward gaining control of spending.

The measure provides that if Congress doesn't meet the deficit reduction goals set by the legislation, the president will be required to withhold the necessary funds to

meet the spending targets.

Reagan has never made a secret of his own frustration at the way the budget process works.

He had been in Washington less than a year when he was forced to delay a Thanksgiving holiday at his ranch in California to direct the shutdown of government services because he had refused to sign a stopgap spending bill he regarded as too expensive.

"The fact that this country has gone on now for a year without a budget and two months into the second (fiscal) year without a budget, that is no way to run a railroad, and it's even less of a way to run a country," an exasperated Reagan told reporters.

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# Study: Farm runoff pollutes rivers, lakes

WASHINGTON (AP) — A study released Thursday said nearly 10 percent of America's river miles and 20 percent of its lake waters have been spotted or are being seriously threatened by runoff pollution coming mainly from farms.

The national study of what is known as non-point source pollution said agriculture was the primary source of these water quality problems, far ahead of other contributors such as urban areas, mining and hydroelectric projects.

Non-point pollution, where off-farms runoff carries fertilizers and pesticides into rivers and lakes, has gained increased attention as the nation has made strides in the last decade against water pollution from identifiable sources such as sewage plants and factories.

The study, involving surveys in every state except Rhode Island and called the first virtually nationwide look at non-point source pollution, was done by the Agency for State and Interstate Water Pollution Control Administrators in conjunction with the Environmental Protection Agency.

Officials said it affirms the key role of fertilizers and pesticides in polluting rivers and lakes and gives a benchmark by which to measure the success or failure of increased efforts to combat non-point pollution.

The study involved assessments of waterways. Officials consider the most susceptible to diffuse sources of contaminants: 404,000 of the nation's 1.8 million river miles; 15.4

million of its 39.4 million acres of lakes; and 19,000 of its 32,000 square miles of estuaries.

Of the assessed rivers, 117,000 miles were found to be moderately to severely impaired by non-point pollution, with another 48,000 miles under distinct threat. The study said agriculture was responsible for 64 percent of the pollution, followed by mining at 19 percent.

Agriculture was cited as being responsible for 57 percent of the contamination of the lake acreage studied. Hydroelectric projects, which produce sediment and habitat alteration, were blamed for 13 percent.

The study said that 4.4 million lake acres were found to be impaired to varying degrees, with another 2.7 million under threat of impairment that could lead to their being declared unfit for use as drinking water sources and recreation activities.

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# Assassinate Khadafy, suggests Metzzenbaum

CLEVELAND (AP) — Sen. Howard M. Metzzenbaum, a liberal Democrat who has criticized covert activities by the U.S. government, suggested in an interview published Thursday that Libyan leader Col. Muammar Khadafy be assassinated if he is behind recent terrorist attacks.

"A singular action may be justified," Metzzenbaum said in an interview with the Plain Dealer of Cleveland. Metzzenbaum also mentioned assassination in an interview Wednesday with WKYC-TV in Cleveland.

"And maybe we're at that point in the world when Khadafy has to be eliminated," he told talk show host Dick Feagler.

"You mean, literally?" Feagler asked.

"Literally, literally, why not?" Metzzenbaum said. "If he's a party to killing innocent Americans, innocent people from all over the world without any compunction whatsoever; then why need we have such compunction about seeing to it that he personally be assassinated?"

"So we assassinate him?" Feagler asked.

"It would not be the first time," Metzzenbaum answered.

"I was quoted in the newspaper interview that he had qualms about approving an assassination when he had objected to such activities in the past."

"Frankly, I have difficulty with him thinking on it," said Metzzenbaum.

Metzzenbaum's press secretary, Drew Von Bergen, said Thursday

that Metzzenbaum stood by his remarks but would have no further comment. He offered no explanation for how Metzzenbaum proposed carrying out such an action.

Metzzenbaum said he was raising the possibility of a direct strike at Khadafy himself only because he is certain that the Libyan leader is directly involved in the terrorist attacks.

White House spokesman Edward Djerejian, asked by a reporter to comment on Metzzenbaum's statements, said, "Assassination is simply not a policy option of the United States government and indeed, as you well know, is against the law."

# Afghans' release imminent

NEW YORK (AP) — The Immigration and Naturalization Service agreed Thursday to release 32 Afghan refugees who were held in a federal detention center for as long as 18 months as illegal immigrants, an INS official said.

"What we decided was that this was an appropriate time when they are paroled," said J. Scott Blackman,

assistant district director of the INS, in a telephone interview.

The release, prompted by Sens. Daniel Patrick Moynihan and Alfonse D'Amato and Rep. Gary Ackerman, would end a lengthy struggle marked by legal fights, a hunger strike, a protest march and growing political pressure on the INS.

# Congressmen tour squatter camp, pledge to obtain help

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — U.S. Congressmen toured garbage-strewn streets of a squatter camp Thursday and said millions of Americans were urging "Free South Africa."

In Durban, two explosions rocked an electric station, burning five white people.

They said the blasts came about 30 minutes apart Thursday night in the Antverslerville mixed-race suburb, starting a small fire and blacking out hundreds of homes. Two white policemen and three white utility workers were burned, and Addington Hospital officials said one of the injured was in critical condition.

"They were the sixth and seventh explosions in the Durban area in a power station in two days."

In Johannesburg, black activist Winnie Mandela left the Supreme Court after a judge said he would rule next week on her attempt to overturn an order barring her from her home in the black township of Soweto outside the city. Her lawyers said she would go into hiding until the ruling.

In an unusual move, officials allowed South African media to publish a speech by exiled guerrilla

leader Oliver Tambo, who called the white-minority government the heir of Adolf Hitler and vowed to achieve a majority rule whatever the cost.

The leader of the outlawed African National Congress spoke in Lusaka, Zambia, the movement's headquarters, to mark its 24th anniversary. South African law prohibits quoting ANC leaders.

The six congressmen were escorted through the 10-year-old camp by the Rev. Allan Boesak, a mixed-race foe of apartheid who is president of the World Alliance of Reformed Churches.

Residents described shootings and maimings in government attempts to evict them from Crossroads. Rep. Peter Kostmayer, D-Pa., said the delegation would seek U.S. aid for the squatter camp.

Elliott Dyakophu told the Americans: "The government is still pointing guns at us, harmless as we are."

About 100,000 people now live in the dreary sea of tin and plastic shanties. It has become a symbol of

the struggle between authorities trying to restrict black movement into areas reserved for whites, and blacks who seek work and are determined to escape the tribal homelands.

The government last year stopped sending police to tear down the shanties. Residents put them up again as soon as police left. It is still trying to get the residents to move to Khayelitsha, a new black township about six miles away.

After leaving Crossroads the Americans joined a prayer meeting in Boesak's Dutch Reformed Church in suburbia-Bellville.

"I bring you greetings of millions of Americans — black, white and yellow — who are saying 'Free South Africa,'" said Walter Fauntroy, a non-voting delegate to the House of Representatives from Washington, D.C.

Rep. William Gray, D-Pa., who leads the delegation, said: "When I see you and I see Crossroads, I see my own history. But yet 40 years later I now chair the House Budget Committee of the United States of America."

Both Fauntroy and Gray are black.

# Libya

## Khadafy pledges he'll push U.S. out of region

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — Moammar Khadafy told a news conference Thursday the United States is "a striking, rotten crusader" that threatens Mediterranean security and he will work to end its military presence in the region.

The radical Libyan leader also said he would increase his support for activists who want American military bases out of Europe, but gave no specifics.

He said in an interview later with Western journalists that a continued hard line by Washington might push him closer to the Soviet Union, which already is his main arms supplier.

Khadafy, 43, said the Rome and Vienna airport massacres — by Palestinian terrorists — had seriously hurt the Palestinians' image, and their cause would be better served by focusing their struggle for a homeland in Israel.

He told the news conference economic sanctions ordered by President Reagan will not affect his North African nation. He called the U.S. position "stupid and emotional" and "looked down upon by the international community."

Khadafy spoke in Arabic to the news conference at his barracks of offices in Tripoli. His remarks were translated simultaneously into English for approximately three dozen foreign reporters attending.

The U.S. and Israeli governments accuse Libya of harboring the Abu Nidal Palestinian terrorist group, which they blame for the Rome and Vienna massacres Dec. 27 in which 19 people were killed, including five Americans, two Israelis and four of the terrorists. Khadafy denies involvement.

He was asked during the interview what he conducted in English how the conflict with the United

States might affect his relations with Moscow. He reiterated opposition to any foreign military base on Libyan soil, but added: "Maybe the Libyan people will decide one day because of these American threats to be more close in cooperation with the Soviet Union."

Asked if he meant that Libya, which he has turned into a fundamentalist Islamic nation, might turn toward communism, Khadafy replied: "Yes, this is a possibility if the threats continue."

He said Libya had not yet decided on a response to the U.S. sanctions, which include an end to all American economic dealings with Libya and freezing its assets in the United States. Reagan also ordered the approximately 7,500 Americans living here to leave or face penalties.

The United States appealed to 196 nations to join the sanctions, but has done so.

# Moslem nations condemn American sanctions

FEZ, Morocco (AP) — Libya on Thursday scored another diplomatic success, pushing through the Islamic Conference Organization a tough resolution that condemns the U.S. sanctions against Libya and calls on Moslem countries to counter the American measures.

The resolution, passed in a regular session, called on all Moslem nations "to take the necessary actions deemed appropriate to counter these oppressive American measures."

On Tuesday, the conference unanimously passed a declaration regarding the member organization's solidarity with Libya in the face of threats by "international imperialism" and the "Zionist entity."

"That resolution, approved by Arab countries with close ties to America — including Egypt, Saudi Arabia and Kuwait — did not specifically mention the United States. 'Zionist entity' is Moslem parlance for Israel."

Thursday's resolution specifically named the United States and calls upon Washington "to rein in these oppressive economic measures."

It also reaffirmed the conference's unqualified solidarity with Libya against actions it said "bringings upon the sovereignty and independence of the Jamahiriya (Libya) and also seek to undermine its economic and development plans."

Libya's foreign minister, Ali Ab-dussattam Treiki, said he was

satisfied with the resolution, which resulted from his diplomatic efforts since the conference began Monday.

Asked if he thought it would result in any concrete action against the United States, Treiki said, "Normally, the conference countries should react (to resolution) practically with economic sanctions."

Treiki said Libya wants the Moslem world to boycott American goods and said he would ask Arab countries to withdraw their money from the United States.

He said Arab foreign ministers would meet in Tunis, Tunisia, next week and discuss the "modality of their response to the U.S. moves against Libya. Arab sources said the session probably would start Monday at Arab League headquarters in Tunis."

# Kremlin issues stiff warning

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin on Thursday warned Washington to "seriously weigh the dangerous consequences" of what it called a "hostile campaign against Libya."

The official statement, issued through the Tass news agency, repeated allegations that the United States is preparing a military invasion of Libya and is "in every way pushing Israel — its strategic ally — toward an attack on that country."

Tass said the Soviet leadership expects the United States to "seriously weigh the dangerous consequences

to which a continuation of its policy Thursday warned Washington to "seriously weigh the dangerous consequences" of what it called a "hostile campaign against Libya."

The Tass statement said Moscow "condemns the hostile anti-Libyan campaign launched by the U.S.A. and Israel, the economic sanctions and demonstrative military preparations against the sovereignty of Libya."

Tass said terrorism "deserves every condemnation" and U.S. "policy toward Libya represents 'state terrorism'."

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# Aquino vows to fight violent Communists

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Corazon Aquino has expressed willingness to let nonviolent Communists into the government if she becomes president, but she vowed Thursday to use "every available resource of the republic" against any who continue the rebellion.

A campaign news release quoted her as saying she would fight anyone who seeks the overthrow of the democratic government and the dismantling of our cherished democratic institutions, our sacred values, and our fundamental belief in God.

The statement, released by Mrs. Aquino's Manila office while she campaigned in the northern Philippines, was her strongest on the issue.

President Ferdinand E. Marcos, her opponent in the Feb. 7 presidential election, has called Mrs. Aquino a Communist sympathizer and has accused her late husband of being a founder of the communist New People's Army.

Benigno Aquino, the president's chief political foe, was assassinated in August 1983 as a military guard escorted him from a commercial airliner that brought him home from voluntary exile in the United States.

The stir about the communist issue arose when Mrs. Aquino said last week that she would welcome Communists into the government if they would renounce violence.

"In the statement Thursday she said: 'Let it be clear once and for all that I will not hesitate to fight them with every available resource of the republic should they refuse to lay down their arms.'"

She added that rebels who "mend their ways will be embraced again into the mainstream of society."

The hope of the Communist rebellion has grown and Marcos has come under pressure from the United States, his chief ally, to reorganize the army to deal with it more effectively.

# Coffee region target

JUAYUA, El Salvador (AP) — Leftist rebels brought their "war of economic sabotage" to the normally peaceful heart of El Salvador's coffee-growing region Thursday, destroying a processing plant and tons of coffee.

The midnight assault began soon after midnight and lasted about three hours. Employees of the Buenaventura processing plant half a mile south of Juayua said the attackers blew the machinery apart with explosives and burned 5,000 sacks of coffee worth about \$1 million.

They also attacked a bank and another processing plant and

destroyed at least six buildings in this town 48 miles west of San Salvador in Sonsonate Province, which previously had been free of guerrilla activity.

Another band of guerrillas destroyed a coffee plant Wednesday night near Nejapa, about 10 miles north of the capital, and burned about 1,000 sacks of beans.

Each sack holds 100 pounds of coffee, which provides more than half of the Central American country's export earnings.

**Boycott blasted**

AMSTERDAM, Netherlands (AP) — A spokesman for Royal Dutch Shell on Thursday denounced the call by U.S. labor leaders for a boycott of its American subsidiary, and denied its South African operation mistreats its workers.

Spokesman Eric Steneker was responding to a call earlier in the day by AFL-CIO leaders for a consumer boycott of Shell Oil Co. and for Royal Dutch Shell to withdraw its investments from South Africa.

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# Former Beatle McCartney to be cited during award rites

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Former Beatle Paul McCartney will be honored with the special Award of Merit during the 13th annual presentation of the American Music Awards, a spokesman for the show said Thursday.

McCartney will accept the award by a satellite connection from London during the television broadcast of the show Jan. 27, said publicist Paul Shefrin.

The Award of Merit winner is selected by a blue-ribbon panel, unlike the other American Music Award winners, who are selected by polling music buyers, Shefrin said.

The merit award recognizes "outstanding contributions over a long period time to the musical entertainment of the American public."

The inscription on the award will state that for more than two decades McCartney has "been responsible for enormous changes in the sound and content of music."

NEW YORK (AP) — Well before he announced he would run for the congressional seat being vacated by House Speaker Thomas "Tip" O'Neill, Joseph Kennedy II was already sounding much like a candidate.

Kennedy, 33, the oldest son of the late Sen. Robert Kennedy and his wife, Ethel, rattled off a political wish list of things he'd like to change in an interview last fall. The interview is to be published in this Sunday's Parade magazine.

Deregulating the oil and gas industries, helping farmers, conserving energy and improving the situation in Central America were high on his list.

Asked why he didn't run for office, if he was so intent on changing public policy, Kennedy said, "At

some point, I just fight." He announced Dec. 4 that he would run for O'Neill's seat. Among his rivals for the Democratic nomination is another third-generation politician, James Roosevelt Jr.

### Caroline, spouse set to acquire apartment

ST. MORITZ, Switzerland (AP) — Princess Caroline of Monaco and her husband appear to be getting ready to buy a new winter residence in the Swiss Alps — a three-room apartment in a tiny village near here.

Authorities have granted Caroline's husband, Stef. Casiraghi, permission to buy the apartment in the village of Madulain, said Markus-Willy of the Upper Engadine real estate register office.

Blick, a Swiss mass-circulation daily, said Casiraghi made the purchase because his parents' apartment in Celerina, also near St. Moritz, will be too small if Caroline has a second baby. German and French media have reported that she is pregnant.

They are scheduled to tour western and northern India, visiting river, canal and agricultural projects and villages.

### Kenya representative to UN agency retires

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — The daughter of Kenya's first president, Jomo Kenyatta, has retired as Kenya's permanent representative to the United Nations Environment Program, The Kenya Times reported Thursday.

Margaret Kenyatta, 58, was Kenya's first permanent representative to the Nairobi-based UNEP and held the job for 10 years. She was appointed by her father, who died in 1978.

Miss Kenyatta is a former mayor of Nairobi. Last July, she served as chairman of the U.N. Decade for Women Conference, which brought 3,000 delegates from around the world to Nairobi.

# Lone family doctor in Lewiston delivers infants

LEWISTON (AP) — C. Stamey English is the last family doctor to deliver babies in the Lewiston-Clarkston area.

The others say they quit because of the cost of insuring themselves against malpractice lawsuits.

"I enjoy it so much that I haven't considered quitting (obstetrics)," said Dr. C. Stamey English. "I actually lose money by continuing, but I do enjoy doing it. I hate to give it up. I don't intend to give it up unless I'm forced to."

English, whose office is in Lewiston, said he is losing money on delivering babies because the fees do not cover the cost of insurance.

He and Dr. Gary Davis, a Lewiston obstetrician and gynecologist, both

said it is a "shame" insurance rates have forced others to drop such a personally rewarding practice.

"All family physicians with the exception of one have quit from a combination of the rising cost of insurance and the anxiety of the risk involved because of the large settlements juries are awarding in lawsuits."

Spokesmen at hospitals in Pullman and Moscow report no physicians in those areas have stopped delivering babies, although it has been discussed by doctors.

Tri-State Memorial Hospital at Clarkston dismantled its obstetrics department in 1983, but administrator Dave Farlowe said it was not because of insured costs.

Davis said obstetrics has the highest insurance rates of any specialty field in medicine. Rates in Idaho for obstetricians have more than doubled this past year. For those physicians who have not been sued, the rates have gone from less than \$12,000 annually to about \$30,000, he said.

"In Florida and New York it is over \$100,000 a year," Davis said. Davis said he assumes because the family doctors are no longer delivering babies that will mean more work for the area's obstetricians.

Dr. Larry D. Harries, one of the

last Lewiston family doctors to give up his obstetrics practice, delivered his last baby this past weekend.

Harries said his decision resulted from a combination of the rising cost of insurance and the anxiety of the risk involved because of the large settlements juries are awarding in lawsuits.

"Last year my malpractice rates

went up 100 percent," Harries said. "I'm a family practitioner, so my rates are not as high as some of the other specialties."

"Everybody expects a perfect baby, and people can't seem to accept that on occasion there are not going to be perfect babies," Harries said.

"Medicine is not an exact science.

It's still 'somewhat of an art,' he said. "We can't guarantee a good outcome. Some children are not born normal."

Harries said he would be the first to acknowledge that if a physician makes an error, the child and family should be compensated. But he said some limit should be placed on the compensation.

### First Indian woman starts job as mayor

BROWNING, Mont. (AP) — Julene Kennerly has been sworn in as mayor, apparently becoming the first American Indian woman to head a U.S. city.

Kennerly defeated incumbent Steve Barcus last fall for the non-partisan, part-time position. He administered the oath of office Wednesday.

Kennerly is an enrolled member of the Blackfeet Tribe. With 1,226 people, Browning is the largest community on the Blackfeet Reservation.

She said she will try to rejuvenate the downtown area, get home mail delivery for the elderly and handicapped and try to break down "the old stereotype that Browning is a bad place and you don't go there of fear for your life."

The Women's Political Caucus and the national Congress of American Indians, both based in Washington, D.C., said they know of no other Indian woman who has been elected mayor.

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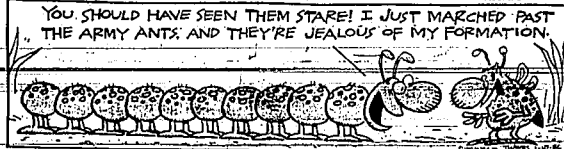
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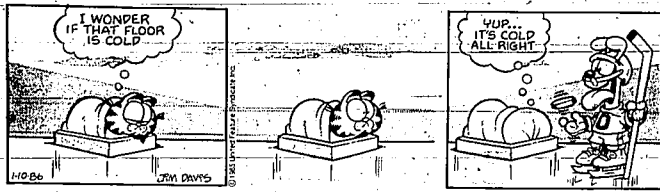

## Shoshone chief reinstated

### Council supports Shaffer

SHOSHONE — Shoshone's new mayor expects this week's controversy over the appointment of a police chief to lead to smoother city operations.

"We have a chief and things are going fine. We expect to continue to improve operations in the police department," Mayor Tim Rüdinger said Thursday, following a two-day effort to appoint a chief and get his new administration off the ground. Rüdinger attempted to replace John Shaffer as police chief at the annual organization meeting of the City Council Tuesday, but the nomination of Assistant Chief Dennis Peyman was not approved by the council.

Police chief is a political appointment made each January, and Rüdinger said he felt a change in the position was needed so he exercised his right as mayor to make a new appointment.

"I did not fire John (Shaffer)," he said, responding to the comments by some Shoshone residents that he was trying to oust the chief from the city police department.

"My proposal was for John to stay on the force at the same wage, but not as chief."

The move to change police chiefs generated heated public discussion and prompted the informal resignation of new Councilman Robert J. Casey, who had been in office only two hours at the regular council meeting Tuesday.

After a marathon session that lasted until 2 a.m., did not get the issue of the police chief resolved, the council recessed until Wednesday evening.

More than 60 adults and a group of area teens turned out to express support for Shaffer at Wednesday's meeting.

Rüdinger said the council felt, in view of public support for Shaffer, a compromise vote was in order.

"The council did not approve my appointment, so I let them vote on their own nominee to solve the problem and get it behind us," Rüdinger said.

The council's vote was unanimous to confirm Shaffer, a 15-year veteran of the police department.

Despite the controversy, Rüdinger said he has enjoyed his first three days in office.

"We have good leadership in the city and will work for improvement."

He said his administration would not "look back, or dwell on this one issue" because that would upset the overall goals of working for an improved economic climate and beneficial change in the city.

"The bill would not result in more strikes in Idaho, said Callen. Instead, it would limit contract talks to money issues, more easily argued on basis of fact."

"The only thing the fact-finder will have to do is open the books and see how much money you got," he said.

Callen said the proposal is not anti-teacher, but is a step to limit union power.

Lentz said the bill would negate years of collective bargaining in the more than 100 school districts of Idaho.

"Callen's bill wants to remove teachers from any discussion of what their working conditions will be," he said.

The bills are contradictory to the current status of collective bargaining and the IEA will resist it, Lentz added.

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## Drug appeal stalled

### Appeals court defers vaccine ruling to state

SAN FRANCISCO — A federal appeals court has deferred a ruling on a \$1.13 million judgment for a Burley infant paralyzed in 1979 by a pertussis (whooping cough) vaccine, and asked the Idaho Supreme Court to set standards for judging the vaccine.

Twin Falls attorney Ken Pedersen, who represents Susan and David Toner and their son, Kevin, said Thursday that he has not yet seen a copy of the order from the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco.

Pedersen did say the new development was more a delay to the lawsuit than a disappointment. The suit is filed against the vaccine manufacturer, Lederle Laboratories of Pearl River, N.Y.

David Toner added, "We hate this delay. We'd like to get the whole thing behind us. It's a long process."

The federal circuit court ruled on Tuesday that the case depends on questions of state law that an Idaho court should resolve.

The three-judge panel asked the Idaho Supreme Court to rule on whether the maker of an "unavoidably unsafe" medicine who warns customers of the dangers is protected from damages under state law, whether the vaccine was "unavoidably unsafe" and whether its manufacturer could be liable for failing to develop a different type of vaccine.

If the state court refuses to answer "the questions," the federal court would rule on the matter according to its interpretation of Idaho law.

Because the case is the first of its kind in Idaho, new law could be created by the court's opinion, Pedersen said. The ruling also could affect whether the Toners, who operate a dairy, receive their judgment.

The Toners filed a \$5 million lawsuit against Lederle when their month-old Kevin was paralyzed permanently from the waist down after being vaccinated in February 1979 with Tri-Immunol, which is used for immunizing children against diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus.

After a 10-day trial in Boise awarded the Toners \$1.13 million in damages, one of the largest personal injury judgments in state history, the company then appealed to the federal circuit court.

Toner said some good has come out of the lengthy litigation — the exposure of the cost and risk of production of the manufacture of vaccines. Making others aware always was in their mind when they filed the lawsuit, he added.

BOISE — With a more conservative crew serving on the Idaho Representatives Education Committee this year, Jerry Callen, R-Jerome, expects better results on two of his bills that failed there last year.

## P & Z, council to join heads to iron out plan for Ketchum's zoning

KETCHUM — The Ketchum City Council has scheduled a joint meeting with the Planning and Zoning Commission to discuss possible changes in city policy that will affect key issues now before the city.

The council scheduled the 7 p.m. Jan. 20 meeting after Mayor Jerry Selfert swore in two new council members on Monday. The planning board also has three new members who the council appointed late last year, and the council wants to discuss new policies before either board makes decisions on some issue.

The council plans a second meeting on Jan. 22 if the boards fail to finish the talks.

The council placed three issues on its agenda: a zone of impact with Blaine County, recommended changes in the allowed uses within the city's tourist zoning districts and the rezoning of property at the base of Bald Mountain in the city.

Blaine County Planning Administrator Ed Nigbor recently contacted the city to begin discussions on the zone of impact, required under the state's Local Planning Act. An impact agreement would set policies for development within the city's jurisdiction, but on land adjacent to the city borders.

Monday, the council said it wants those discussions to begin with the

planning commission before coming to the governing body.

City Planner Garth McClure stressed that the city's comprehensive plan calls for a northern boundary for the zone of impact one mile north of Adams Gulch Road and a southern boundary one mile south of the bridge crossing the Big Wood River on Highway 75.

Late last year, the planning commission recommended that the city zone low-density property at the base of Bald Mountain to high-density uses to allow the development of more tourist-oriented services near the Sun Valley ski area's busiest ski lift.

Daon-Development Corp., the firm that had plans to build a hotel on the site rejected by the city more than a year ago, owns most of the land included in the rezoning. After the council indicated in November it would reject the rezoning request, Daon withdrew its application.

City voters, however, elected two supporters of the rezoning from the planning board to the council last November, and Daon recently renewed its application. The former planning commissioners, Larry Young and Susanna Orb, joined the council Monday, replacing two opponents of large-scale development in the Warm Springs tourist district.

Jack Corcock and Tim Crawford, the planning and zoning commission will discuss Daon's latest rezoning request after this month.

### Bank & Trust credit promotion plan collects \$8,415 in donations for area school needs

TWIN FALLS — Seven Twin Falls County school districts will chalk up \$8,415 in donations during the next year from auto loans and credit cards sold by a Twin Falls bank.

Curtis H. Eaton, president of Twin Falls Bank & Trust Co., announced the contributions on Thursday, delivering on a promise made at the opening of the bank's "Lending Hand" program.

The three-month promotion pledged 1 percent of the interest on new consumer loans and \$5 from fees on each new credit card to the local schools. It lasted from Oct. 1 to Jan. 1.

The money will be given to the schools in two installments, said Lance Clow, the bank's marketing director.

This month, the Twin Falls, Kimberly, Filer, Buhl, Maltaus, Castleford and Hansen school districts each will receive a check for \$750, part of the first \$5,250 raised during the program.

On Jan. 1, 1987, the bank will split the remaining \$3,165 proportionately among the districts. The shares will be based on the number of students enrolled in each district on Sept. 30.

The Twin Falls School District

most likely will get more than half of the final donation because of its large student population, Clow said.

Twin Falls School Superintendent Carl Snow said the district will use the windfall cash to add some equipment, such as a computer, or another expense not covered in the district's operating budget. The bank had asked that the money be used to directly benefit students.

"We appreciate their support, while applauding their innovative program," Snow said.

Buhl Superintendent Gus Spiropoulos said the money is needed.

"During these difficult economic times and with financial constraints being felt by public schools throughout Idaho, we feel very fortunate that Twin Falls Bank & Trust has taken a leadership role to assist our school districts," he said.

The bank also used the Lending Hand promotion to publicize a state tax credit for donations to any Idaho schools. Taxpayers can take half of their contributions directly off their state taxes. The maximum credit is \$50.

Eaton did not say whether the bank would repeat Lending Hand in 1986, but said the bank will continue to support local schools. "We

are very proud of the direct and indirect benefits of the program," Eaton said.

Twin Falls Bank & Trust actually is paying out much of the money before it receives payments from customers. Due to a companion promotion, many of the first interest payments on loans won't arrive until later this winter. Credit card fees also are not billed immediately.

New consumer loans contributed an estimated 80 percent of the fund, Clow said. Consumer loans include loans made to individual customers for personal reasons, auto purchases or home improvements.

Although it attracted a number of new loans and credit card accounts, the Lending Hand fund may have been limited somewhat by competition from other promotions going on at the same time, Clow said.

During October, auto manufacturers dropped interest rates for financing new cars, steering some loan business to auto agencies instead of to area banks, he said.

Nevertheless, the promotion brought new money into the bank as well as to the schools, Clow said.

# New type of (Super)man endures job/parent stress silently

DALLAS — Let us now consider again what might likely be the sociological question of the 1980s: What happens to our happy dual-career yuppie couple — the couple of the decade — when they become dual-career yuppie parents?

We've already met Superwoman, the young woman torn between the expectations of her mother's generation and her own, the woman who wants it all and thinks she has to do it all, perfectly. Through Superwoman, we've become acquainted with the Superwoman syndrome, the tale of pressure, depression and frazzlement that these Superwomen — overachieving, frantically fit, fanatically perfectionist careerists, wives and mothers — frequently tell.

Now it is time to meet Superman and listen to his version of the story: the Super-Superman Syndrome.

"Many men feel they've made a lot of changes," says Lucia Gilbert, associate professor of educational psychology at the University of Texas and author of a book on the subject. "They're intimately involved in parenting. They support their spouses' ambitions. And they're not getting any recognition for any of it."

In a sense, they are trying to do it all, just like Superwoman. They're afraid to ask society to change — to ask for child care, different benefits, paternity leave. They're putting up a good front and trying to do it all, just like Superwoman.

Superman, a term Gilbert coined but does not use, is like, are among a small but growing percentage of fathers.

Often torn between their responsibilities at home and at work, inundated with pressures and accorded little understanding either in the workplace or in society, Supermen face stresses that correspond closely to the Superwoman Syndrome.

Like its counterpart, the Superman Syn-

drome tends to manifest itself in what Gilbert, who has studied dual-career families for 10 years, calls role overload and time demands. "These men stretch themselves too thin, in too many directions."

"And other people aren't all sympathetic," says Gilbert, author of "Men in Future Prospects." "It's because Supermen look like they have everything. The family has two incomes. They have wives and children."

In some senses, it's easier for women to expand their roles. They have, into the work place — man for men to. Men have more narrowly defined roles. These days, we're all expected to live up to what's been a male standard. We can all move toward that — but who wants to move toward a traditionally female standard?

"Society doesn't help at all because it's so hard for societal change to occur, but role-sharing, dual-career marriages are getting

easier. More people are doing it, so these men don't feel so strange. And more women want these kinds of marriages. There have been small changes."

Stacy Gilbert has found that the Super-Superman Syndrome is likely to occur only in what she's labeled role-sharing relationships — marriages in which both partners make a real effort to share responsibilities in and out of the home — which account for only 30 percent of marriages.

Gilbert does not mince words about the other 70 percent of the husbands she studied.

Some 40 percent of families fall into her traditional dual-career category. "The wife is in a career full time," says Gilbert, "but the husband's salary is much greater. She does all the home and family work. He's proud of her, and he tells other people he doesn't know how she does it all. She does it all because he won't do any of it. She's Superwoman."

"The other 30 percent of my sample is an interesting group of men. We call them par-

ticipant fathers. They say they want to be very involved with the children — but they view anything to do with the home as women's work. They help with some of the parenting, but they won't do housework."

"Intellectually, these men have equality. But emotionally, they believe that men have a different entitlement than women. My term for these men is armchair liberals."

No matter which general pattern a dual-career marriage assumes, the arrival of children can easily change the shape of the marriage, says Gilbert. "That's when the man's support of his wife's career involvement becomes really important. It's so easy at that time for the man simply to free himself up for his own professional work, and the woman feels so guilty and torn anyway, and she doesn't have any role models. It's easy for her to feel she should do everything, and it's easy for him to let her."

## First 10,000 cases of AIDS exceed price of \$6.3 billion

CHICAGO (AP) — The cost of the nation's first 10,000 cases of AIDS will come to more than \$6.3 billion in hospital fees and lost income, says a study thought to be the first to estimate the economic impact of the deadly disease.

Researchers were not trying to put a dollar figure on a life, which seems kind of heartless, but (to show) that this is as less than everybody shares," said public health specialist Ann M. Hardy of the national Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta.

"It's not just these health-care costs that are imposed, but we're losing people's lives," she said. "Ms. Hardy, who led the study, said in a telephone interview.

More than 90 percent of AIDS patients are between 20 and 49, she said.

"The first 10,000 patients with AIDS will lose approximately \$387 years of work and \$169 million in potential earnings due to disability," said the report in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

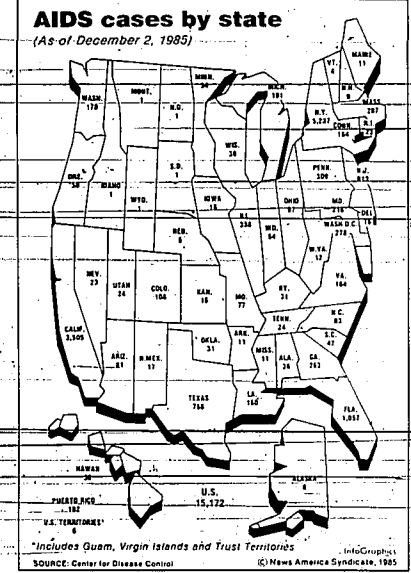
Lost earnings due to early death were calculated at \$4.2 billion. All lost-income estimates were determined using 1980 data.

The first 10,000 cases of acquired immune-deficiency syndrome had been reported to the CDC by last Monday. By Monday, the total had risen to 16,138, with 4,220 deaths.

"We estimated that approximately \$147,000 is being expended for the hospital care of each patient with AIDS," researchers said.

The nation's first 10,000 AIDS patients will spend a total of about 1.6 million days in the hospital, costing about \$1.47 billion, by the time their earnings run their course, the researchers said.

Estimated hospital costs may be high, they said, because data on



total time spent in hospitals came only from New York, where AIDS patients may spend more time in hospitals.

Still, the hospitalization estimate is good enough to be

compared with totals for other ailments — \$1.6 billion for lung cancer and \$2.7 billion for motor-vehicle injuries in 1980, the latest year for which good data are available, Ms. Hardy said.

national publicity surrounding actor Rock Hudson's death from AIDS and controversies over school attendance by young victims, said Gilbert-Clark, executive director of the American Association of Blood Banks.

"Now," he declared at a news conference. "We are having a serious blood shortage across the country."

The situation, "is not fire-breathing" at this point, but elective surgery is being postponed in many areas of the nation and inventories of blood for possible emergencies have been greatly

reduced, Clark said. He said he could give no national shortage estimate, but he did say local shortages were being reported at 1 percent to 18 percent below-normal levels. Many blood centers operate on a basis of having just enough to take care of transfusion needs at that time, he said.

Dr. Eugene Berkman, president of the blood bank association, said that in case of a national emergency, "if we needed 50,000 to 100,000 units of blood, this just would not be available."

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## Women raise wine glasses to a new profession: vinters

The traditional little old winemaker is giving way in the United States to a new breed of women vinters — persons who combine stamina with enthusiasm, creativity and a good memory for taste and smell.

The rising popularity of American wine has created a skilled labor shortage in the industry, according to an article in the January issue of Harper's Bazaar, and women are snapping up jobs as oenologists in major wineries on both coasts.

The oenology department of the University of California at Davis admitted its first female in the 1960s. Now, 20 percent of the graduating students are women who often take entry-level jobs as lab assistants and "cellar rats," hoping to become assistant or chief winemaker at \$25,000 to \$60,000 a year.

Until recent times, the only women to gain control of wine production did so as a surviving widow or daughter.

# Idaho Justices to decide liability

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court is being asked to decide whether a probation officer can be held liable for the actions of a three-convicted drunken driver who while under the influence of alcohol destroyed the career of an honor law student.

Mark H. Manweiler, attorney for plaintiff Maud Sterling, told justices Thursday that the court's decision will clear up questions surrounding the 1971 Torts Claims Act, which Manweiler termed "ripe for clarification."

An issue is whether a probation officer working under the Board of Corrections has immunity from liability for actions a probationer might commit while under the state's supervision.

Fourth District Judge W.E. Smith dismissed the Board of Corrections as a defendant in a lawsuit, contending that probation officer Ron Housley couldn't be held accountable for the actions of probationer Greg Bloom, 47, Housley no longer works for the state.

Although Bloom had three prior convictions for driving under the influence, Housley didn't prevent Bloom from working in a bar, which violated his probation agreement, Manweiler said.

The case stems from an accident in Ada County in June 1984. Ms. Sterling, who was a honor student at the University of Idaho Law School, was critically injured when Bloom drove a car into the path of her motorcycle, Manweiler said.

The accident left Ms. Sterling, 28, with a severe head injury that required insertion of a steel plate into a side of her head, said Manweiler, who was in law school with Ms. Sterling when she was injured.

Manweiler said it took Ms. Sterling, who never fully recovered, six years to finish law school instead of the usual three or four. She also will undergo tests to determine if her IQ was lowered from the accident, he said.

Bloom finally was sentenced to prison for his fourth DUI conviction, which resulted from the accident, Manweiler said. Bloom was released from prison in March 1984.

Also named as defendants in the suit were Bloom, Dale Miller, who owned the vehicle Bloom was driving; Elbert Sirum, owner of the Seven Mile Lounge, where Bloom worked; and the owner of another bar where Bloom allegedly had been drinking prior to the accident.

The case will come to trial once the Idaho Supreme Court decides whether the Board of Corrections will be enlisted as a defendant.

J. Nick Crawford, attorney representing the state, told justices that the probation officer couldn't be held accountable. He contended that under the state's 1971 Torts Claims Act, a state employee couldn't be held liable unless there's an equivalent position in the private sector for which a lawsuit could be filed.

A probation officer essentially carries out responsibilities reserved only for law enforcement officers, which is a "fundamental, distinct function of government," Crawford said.

# City retains former officer

MOSCOW (AP) — Former Moscow Police Cpl. Steven Barnes, who was acquitted on an attempted grand theft charge last month, has reached an agreement with city officials for a permanent job in the public works division.

Mayor Gary Scott said Barnes and city officials reached a mutual agreement allowing Barnes to continue working for the city, but in the public works division instead of the police department.

He has been working with the city street department since Sept. 5 but was given the opportunity to return to the police force when he was found innocent of trying to steal a small utility trailer from a sporting goods store in June.

He turned down that opportunity because he said the tension was too great between himself and department administrators.

Barnes said he was "very happy" with the agreement with the city but said his first love always will be police work.

## ISU's Caccia sets retirement

POCATELLO, Idaho (AP) - I.J. "Babe" Caccia, a fixture in Idaho State University sports for 38 years, has announced his resignation as ISU's director of athletics, effective Wednesday.

"The retirement has been expected anytime for the past three years. Caccia had originally planned to leave ISU in 1982 but was asked by the school to remain at the athletic department in light of some personnel and financial storms were weathered."

ISU President Richard Bowen said a search for Caccia's replacement was completed immediately. School officials said his decision, announced Thursday, had been anticipated.

Caccia, 68, began his involvement in ISU athletics before World War II. The school was known as the University of Idaho's Southern Branch. He coached football, baseball, wrestling and track before taking over as athletic director in 1959.

"There have been a lot of valleys and a lot of peaks," Caccia said of his years at the Pocatello school. "The 1950s at Idaho State is an era that will be surpassed by very few colleges because of the success of the whole program - football, basketball, boxing and track and field. And winning the national (Division I-AA) football championship in 1981 was very important. It's something that's hard to come by."

Caccia is the winningest coach in school history in both football and baseball. From 1952 to 1965, his football teams were 80-38-2. He coached unbeaten teams in 1952 and 1957.

Caccia coached five Rocky Mountain Conference championship football teams, the last in 1969. The 1962 team won the title in ISU's first year in the league, and his 1963 team won the Big Sky Conference title in the league's first year.

Caccia was baseball coach from 1957-74. He posted a 152-116 record and his 1962 team, which was 28-5, won the Big Sky Conference title in school history.

Caccia's lifelong involvement in athletics began in Pocatello, where he was born in 1917.

He was a multi-sports star at Pocatello High School, where he was a letterman in 1936 after being an all-state center in football. He also had two unbeaten seasons as a wrestler.

He attended the University of Idaho's Southern Branch, where he was a starting center and linebacker. At the University of Idaho, he lettered in football twice, was the Pacific Coast Conference's 1940 wrestling champion and led the baseball team in hitting in 1940.

## ISU hosts Vandals, Broncos in Big Sky loop home openers

POCATELLO - Three of the teams picked to occupy the lower third of the Big Sky Conference freshman standings - including one that isn't even eligible for the title - will begin their conference schedules here and in Ogden, Utah, tonight still wondering what kinds of ballclubs they are.

Idaho State, 7-5 and on NCAA probation, will host Boise State, 5-7, at 7:30 p.m. in the Mindome, while 6-6 Idaho will take on powerful Weber State on the road at the same hour.

The Vandals will come to town Saturday, while BSU will move on to Ogden.

The pre-season of the Bengals, Broncos and Vandals has been distinguished by few high points save for Idaho State's surprising emergence as an effective defensive team under first-year Coach Jim Boutin. All three ballclubs have had trouble winning on the road, Boise State's shooters are struggling and Idaho has had its problems with re-



bounding and defense.

But all three coaches are optimistic about the 14-game league season, which will culminate in the Big Sky tournament in Reno, Nev., the second weekend in March.

"We're making progress," says Boise State Coach Bobby Dye. "I think we played our best ballgame of the season last Saturday (a 68-56 victory over Eastern Washington). We've had some inconsistencies and we haven't shot the ball real well, but we seem to be playing better. We've played eight, nine, 10 kids in

pre-season, and no one has really taken us out."

The most consistent Broncos so far have been senior forward Kelvin Rawlins, who is averaging 11.6 points and 7.3 rebounds a game, and freshman guard Chris Childs, who is averaging 11.0 points a game. Childs leads the league in steals and ranks 10th in assists.

"He's made a lot of progress," says Dye of his point guard. "I thought the Eastern Washington game (in which Childs scored 20 points) was the first game that he did not look like a freshman."

The Broncos rank dead last in the Big Sky in scoring offense, last in rebounding and seventh in field goal shooting, but they're only giving up 65.8 a game.

"Still, that's a full four points more than the Bengals, who've underperformed," Coach Wayne Ballard was not noted for attention to defense.

"I think defensively, the two teams have quite similar styles, similar philosophies," says Dye, whose ballclub beat Idaho State 58-56 at the Reid Dairy Classic in Boise

last month. "Idaho State has come a lot faster than a lot of people thought they would, and they're going to be awfully tough to beat in the Mindome."

Even Boutin concedes surprise at ISU's start. The Bengals were picked to finish last in the conference this season by both the coaches and the media.

"The players are now confident with the progress we've made," says Boutin. "They had to be convinced and now they are. We're excited about playing in the Big Sky Conference part of our schedule and we want to prove we can win in the league."

ISU is giving up just 61 points a game, ranks fourth in the conference in rebounding and leads the Big Sky in steals, but still hasn't found much of an offense other than junior forward Don Holston, who ranks fifth in the Big Sky in scoring with a 17.5 average.

Dye will be in the unusual position of having played more games in the Mindome than Boutin - Idaho State played its pre-season schedule in

Reed Gymnasium as an economy on the offensive boards."

But like Boutin, Dye has never won in the Mindome.

"This is the third game we've played down there since I've been here, and they've both been very hard losses. We need this one to get over the hump," he said.

Meanwhile in Ogden, third-year Idaho Coach Bill Trumbo will test his Vandals against the hottest team in the Big Sky, former UCLA Coach Larry Farmer, has his Wildcat side in scoring offense (79.0 points a game) rebounding and free throw shooting, ranks second in field-goal shooting and fourth in scoring defense.

"The biggest thing in Weber's success this year has been rebounding on the offensive boards," says Trumbo. "He's Farmer's has good quick athletes, and they react well. They're getting players shooting from some depth, and a lot of times the ball comes out deep. If we're going to have a chance to compete,

we've got to keep them from getting too many opportunities."

The Vandals' high point in pre-season has been an ability to shoot the ball. Idaho ranks first in the conference in that department with an average of 51 percent. But the Vandals are just sixth in scoring offense, sixth in scoring defense and sixth in rebounding.

"I'm real pleased with where we are right now," says Trumbo. "We've started to come along, identify the things we do well and we're playing to our strengths. We haven't been hurt with injuries and we've played with consistency."

The Vandals are redshirting their returning top scorer, Ulf Spears, but sophomore guard Ken Luckett ranks fourth in the conference in scoring (18.3). Teammate Tom Stallck, a 6-8 junior forward, is averaging 10.3 points per game and ranks fourth in the league in rebounding.

"Luckett and Stallck have really done a job for us," says Trumbo. "They've played hard and they've played with great consistency."

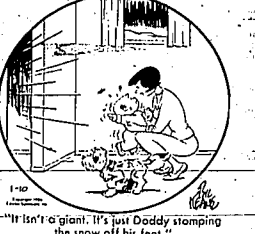

It doesn't take too much luck to win one of two finesses; one should expect success 75 percent of the time. Even better is a plan that depends upon no finesses. Your luck can be bad even with the odds in your favor.

South took his club ace, drew trumps and tried a heart-finesse. West won and continued clubs. South ruffing the third round. The only chance left was in diamonds and when that finesse lost also, the defenders collected one down (two diamonds, one club and one heart). South makes his game if he forces the defense to help. He ducks the first club and wins the continuation. The ace and queen of trumps are cashed, and dummy's last club is ruffed. A heart is led to dummy's ace, and a diamond is led to South's nine and West's queen.

Consider West's plight: If he leads a club, South enjoys a ruff and discard, and one of his losers disappears. If West leads diamonds, South's king becomes a winner, eliminating the need for a heart finesse. And finally, if West leads hearts, South gets a free finesse and his vulnerable game to go with it. Odds of 3-1 in your favor are not bad. Sure things are even better.

## Art professors uncork 'Recent Vintage'

CSI brews heady mix of ceramics, drawings, paintings, photography and sculpture

TWIN FALLS — "Recent Vintage," an exhibition of artworks by the College of Southern Idaho art faculty, will be on display at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery from Jan. 14 through Feb. 20.

Faculty artists Michael Green, LaVar Steel, Wesley Wada, Bill West and Michael Youngman will be present during an opening reception from 7 to 9:30 p.m. Jan. 14 at the museum.

"We want the students to see we're not a bunch of deadbeats," Green quips about the exhibit, which will feature ceramics, drawing, painting, photography, and sculpture.

For his part, Green will exhibit paintings and drawings that deal with recurrent images from earlier works. The drawings combine pastel and oil pastel with acrylic and watercolor.

"These works are what I know and what I don't know about painting," he says. "The images are derived from a series of previous collages, and within this show they are recycled."

"Yet, each painting is a new beginning. Once a painting is begun, I wish to bring out possibilities for personal discovery. Experiment and discovery are important to my aesthetic. The works in this exhibit represent new possibilities discovered during the act of painting."

The professor of art says that color has always excited him the most. "Color is also the most elusive thing an artist can deal with," he says. "You can't isolate it. It establishes its identity by the other colors around it."

Green adds that the subject matter of painting is basically the elements that are there: color, lines, surface and subtle shifts.

Steel will display ceramic sculptures from his "Great Basin Series," which explores cloud, rock, mountain and canyon themes.

"In the 'Great Basin Series,' I recall and reflect certain periods of time and specific locations that have nurtured and validated my life as an artist," he says, adding, "Three of the five series are complete, rocks, chains and mountains. Two additional series are in progress — canyons and cities."

Steel says that each landscape monolith is a particular moment of mortality, sliced from Mother Earth — studied, analyzed, catalogued, and filed for future recall.

"On the vibrant nature of his work," he says, "Thus a bit of Mother Earth (Our Experience) moves up to meet Father Sky (Our Objective) and on to the Eternities."

Ceramic vessels and sculptures will be displayed by West. The vessel-like camels, rhinoceroses and dinosaurs are themes he has been exploring in recent years. Pointing out that rhinos are near-extinction and that dinosaurs are monuments of extinction and death, West says, "All species are just experiments. Nobody has a lock on it."

Calling himself "a traditional object maker, a fossil among artists," West says, "With clay, I make vessels and vessel-like sculptures. With paint, I make representations of people. With students, I might talk about anything... given enough time."

Concerning his camel vessels, he explains, "The camel form is a metaphor for the potter. A vessel himself, the camel is a beast of burden. Moving things from one place to another is all a potter really does. The camel does not hurry. He seems to have all the time he needs."

Youngman, who works with acrylic, pen and ink, pencil and charcoal, will exhibit paintings and drawings which interpret the psychological aspects of the human figure.

He explains his exhibited works simply: "These are visions from a fevered brain, altered by emotion, disguised as reality and compelled by a form of disease."

Wada, who has been professor of photography and design at the art department for eight years, will exhibit works from his recent "Ciphers" series — photomontages which combine multiple exposed prints, technical ink drawing, and hand coloring.

Viewing is free to the public. Herrett hours are: Tuesday, 9:30 a.m. to 4 p.m.; Wednesday-Friday, 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.; Saturday, 1 p.m. to 4:30 p.m.

First offering in U.S.-Soviet cultural exchange program

## 'Ann' enchants Muscovites

MOSCOW (AP) — Muscovites are enchanted by the inaugural visitor in the new U.S.-Soviet cultural exchange program — a singing and dancing personification of Raggedy Ann, the rag doll beloved by generations of American children.

The first American theater troupe to visit the Soviet Union since 1973 is doing eight sold-out performances of a musical based on the Raggedy Ann tales.

The official premiere of "Bag Dolly" is Wednesday night at the Children's Musical Theater, a large, modern complex in Moscow's Lenin Hills, but the second public performance was Tuesday afternoon.

About 1,000 Soviet adults and children packed the hall for the Broadway-style musical, a form of the art that is rare here.

The crowd gave a three-minute standing ovation to Ivy Austin, who plays the red-haired doll, after she sang the title song in Russian. She also received loud applause for translating occasional words into Russian with dramatic intakes.

A narrator gave the audience an oral synopsis in

Russian before each of the two acts.

"We just loved it, loved it!" Tamara Derevyanshchikova, "I am only unhappy that I don't speak English. I've never seen a musical before, but I can say that I really like this kind of theater."

Her 12-year-old son, Alyosha, said he wanted to see "lots and lots more" American shows.

A seven-year-old boy named Volodya stood in line for autographs. "I love this American theater," he said. "I especially liked the dolls."

Members of the 40-person troupe caused a sensation at intermission when they passed out letters from school children in the Albany, N.Y., area and were surrounded by Soviet youngsters eager for American pennies.

"Rag Dolly" is a production of Albany's Empire State Institute for the Performing Arts. No other troupe has staged it.

# Dire Straits sweeps list of nominees for Grammy Awards

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — The British band Dire Straits and its leader, Mark Knopfer, led the nominees Thursday for the 28th annual Grammy Awards, while the charity anthem "We Are the World" received six nominations and Phil Collins, Tina Turner and Sting had five each.

Dire Straits, whose "Brothers in Arms" album features no-nonsense musical craftsmanship, was nominated for record of the year, best rock album of the year and best rock performance by a duo or group for "Money for Nothing." Knopfer received eight nominations in all.

"The band is delighted," was the only comment from Dire Straits' manager Ed Bicknell in London.

"We Are the World," which brought together 45 artists in contributions to feed the world's hungry, received top album and record nominations, a song of the year nod for writers Lionel Richie and Michael Jackson, best performance by a pop duo or group, best recording for children as performed by a group called Children of the World, and a nomination for best short-form video.

"The Grammy nomination is an opportunity for this song, by nomination and possible perfor-

mance on the Grammys show next month, to keep this issue alive," said promoter Ken Kragen, who organized "We Are the World" for the group of 45 top pop artists who recorded the song. "The message of this song is the most important message of our time."

Knopfer also received multiple nominations — classical music producer Robert E. Woods, with seven, and producer David Foster, who received six. Atlanta Symphony conductor Robert Shaw had five nominations — former Eagle Don Henley and band leader Jue Lewis each received four.

Other nominees included Whitney Houston for best album, Jollan Lennon, son of slain ex-Beatle John Lennon, for best new artist, and Steve Wonder for best male pop performance for "Part-Time Lover."

Cyndi Lauper was nominated for best rock solo performance on "What a Thrill!" and veteran San Francisco rockers Starship for "We Built This City," a best rock vocal performance by duo or group nominee.

Madonna was nominated for best female pop performance for "Crazy for You." John Fogerty, onetime leader of Creedence Clearwater Revival, capped a comeback year with a male rock performance

nomination for his album "Centerfield."

Knopfer's nominations included work with Dire Straits and Chet Atkins. He was nominated with Sting for writing song of the year, "Money for Nothing," a working man's view of the music industry.

Knopfer's nominations also include his work both as a producer and a musician on "Brothers in Arms" and "Money for Nothing," which also was nominated for best rock performance by a duo or group. He also was nominated for best engineered recording for the Dire Straits album, best producer, and best country instrumental with Chet Atkins for "Cosmic Square Dance."

Collins, a versatile musician whose looks were once compared to the huge Patch Kildoll, had several hits from his slick, synthesizer and drum machine-laced "No Jacket Required" album.

Collins, who recently returned to the studio for drummer duties with the long-lived British group Genesis, was nominated for album of the year, pop male vocal of the year, best short form video, best pop performance by a duo or group for his "Easy Lover" single with Phillip Bailey, and producer of the year. Sting, who launched a solo career

with his jazz-influenced "The Dream of the Blue Turtles" LP, was nominated for best album, best jazz instrumental for the title track, best song along with Knopfer for "Money for Nothing," best video of more than 30 minutes for an appearance with his old group The Police, and best engineered recording for "The Dream of the Blue Turtles."

Miss Turner, who won three Grammys in 1985 to cap a smashing comeback year, was nominated for best pop female vocals for "Don't Need Another Hero," best rock solo performance for "One of the Living," best rock performance by a duo or group for "It's Only Love," with Jaxxon Adams, and two best nominations.

Record of the year was Dire Straits' "Money for Nothing." Huey Lewis and the News' "The Power of Love," Bruce Springsteen's "Born in the U.S.A.," and USA for Africa's "We Are the World."

Nominated for song of the year were "Boys of Summer," "Everytime You Go Away," "I Want to Know What Love Is," "Money for Nothing" and "We Are the World."

## Hard Rock Cafe spreads to Dallas turf

DALLAS — Under the guise of selling hamburgers, nostalgia and pecan pie, Isaac Burton Tigrett is peddling much more. The 37-year-old Tennessee-born creator of The Hard Rock Cafe — the restaurant behind those ubiquitous white shirts with the yellow circle in front — is selling cool.

And he is moving to Dallas to do here what he did in London, New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco and 22 other cities. Create a be-seen-in-Dallas cafe.

"I've been a celebrity baby sitter for 14 years," says the bearded Tigrett, who plans to remodel the Wrecking Bar, a curio shop of artifacts rescued from demolished buildings, for his Dallas cafe.

Slipping champagne at a restaurant a few miles north of the site of his Dallas venture, Tigrett embodies the brand of High Trendiness that fills the pages of magazines and the kind of attitude, facial structure, strut and wardrobe that are the images of MTV.

Sitting on his right is his girlfriend of nine years, Maureen Starkey. Ringo's ex, mother of three and grandmother of one. She is very thin and quiet, smoking and occasionally joining the conversation. On one hand she wears an Etting of two monsters biting human hands. She

says Tigrett gave it to her and the title is, "She won't bite the hand that feeds you." She will move here with him, she says.

Across the table from Tigrett is his publicity agent, Bobby Zarem, an English-accented pop culture agent who promotes the likes of "We Are the World" and "We Are the World's" partner, Dan Aykroyd. Next to him is Mike Powers, a restaurant owner and one of Tigrett's investors.

"I have the most publicized restaurants in the United States today," Tigrett says. At the New York opening, "there were 450 photographers."

Tigrett also may have the most merchandised restaurants in the world, selling official Hard Rock T-shirts, sweat shirts, teddy bears, jackets in leather and canvas, polo shirts, clocks, belts, towels, pins, key chains, coloring books and badges at each Hard Rock location. A Hard Rock spokesman said the paraphernalia with the familiar logo are sold officially only at the restaurants.

Tigrett says the merchandise is a natural offshoot of the popularity of his concept. Though he gives no total figures, he says merchandise sales at the New York Hard Rock once reached \$20,000 in one day.

The promotions do not end with the merchandising. The Hard Rock, which each month has a special presentation for its rock 'n' roll-filled

walls from the likes of Eric Clapton, Pete Townshend, Led Zepplin or Eddie Van Halen, has more People clippings to its credit than Charles and Di.

The Hard Rock formula — banana splits, char-broiled burgers, club sandwiches, ribs, pecan pie, \$1 million worth of rock 'n' roll mementos, a steady flow of clientele including Eric, Madonna, Diana Ross, Matt Dillon, George Segal and Candice Bergen, and the front end of a black 1960 Cadillac over the front door — keeps lines forming around the block.

In March, Tigrett gets possession of the Wrecking Bar. There he and 10 local backers will invest \$3 million in renovations and improvements. In October, Tigrett plans to open the Dallas Hard Rock, hoping eventually to come close to the record of 7 million customers at the London location since its June 1971 opening. The Dallas spot will have 350 seats, "American food and the latest things going," he says.

Tigrett, whose "New York" cafe has tallied \$7 million in sales in its almost two years, says "People don't give a damn about New York anymore. It's about the South, it's about Dallas. I want Dallas for my American home. It's a place where a man's character is more in judgment than his pocketbook."

Born in Jackson, Tenn., Tigrett comes from entrepreneurial lineage.

# His career spans nine decades, but Burns refuses to slow down

The raspy voice. The cigar tilted at a rakish angle. That horrible hairpiece. A career that now spans nine decades. These characteristics can only suggest one person: George Burns.

Next week, America's hardest-working senior-citizen stars in his annual TV special — and what a special it is: "Kraft Salutes George Burns' 90th Birthday Special," airing Friday, Jan. 17, on CBS, promises to be no cheesy affair. The production, to be taped before a black-tie audience at the Beverly Theatre in Los Angeles on Jan. 11, contains a montage of nostalgia pieces from Burns' career blended with special performances and birthday messages.

Performers scheduled to appear include Diahann Carroll, Billy Crystal, John Denver, John Forsythe, Ann-Margaret and Walter Matthau. In addition, celebrities such as Milton Berle, Red Buttons, Johnny Carson, Carol Channing, Chevy Chase, Phyllis Diller, Bob Hope, Jack Lemmon, Kenny Rogers, Frank Sinatra, Jimmy Stewart and Danny Thomas will make cameo appearances and offer greetings. President Reagan will also offer greetings.

Burns, the ninth of 12 children, was born Nathan Birnbaum on New York's Lower East Side in 1896. His father died when he was just 7, and he started earning money by shining shoes, selling newspapers and running errands. He also began his career that year, organizing "The PeeWee Quartet," a group of children that sang for pennies on city streets. Burns quit school in the fourth grade and by 14 he had become a trick roller skater, dance teacher and

vaudeville entertainer, adopting his famous cigar as a prop.

He remained in vaudeville, constantly changing his act for the next 13 years, until he met up with Grace Allen. The two became a team on stage and off for 41 years. In addition to a long and happy marriage, they enjoyed a colorful career which spanned all realms of show business including vaudeville, motion pictures, radio, television and production. Miss Allen died of a heart attack in 1964, and to overcome his loss, Burns continued working — adding nightclubs, concert halls, film, records and books.

Today, 25 years after most people retire, he continues the fast-paced life of an entertainer. He recently signed another five-year performing contract with Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas. Says Burns: "They wanted me to sign for ten years, but I wasn't sure Caesar's Palace would be around that long!"

In addition to working, Burns' daily routine includes a martini and at least 15 cigars. "At my age," he quips, "most of my friends are shocked I still get out of bed every morning. But I'll never retire. Besides, I can't make money staying in bed. I've tried."

The show comes from Custom's Last Stand, a new business created by Deidre, Mary Hart from "Entertainment Tonight" and Broadway's Cheri Ingram.

The idea came from Ingram, a former dancer with the American Ballet Theatre, who flew west with her own video resume instead of a piece of paper. Cheri was astounded by West Coast versions, amateur stuff without any showbiz touch. Says Ingram, "the video merchandising of a business or a career is far more complex than just assembling and editing footage. We direct, produce and orchestrate the entire tape as if it were a movie."

Watching Cheri at work on their own tapes, the actresses realized a new game just around the corner. Tear up the resume if you're job hunting, auditioning, or promoting new products. Go video.

Of course, that may take a few bucks, but folks like Olympic skaters Randy Gardner and Tai Babonia, "Real People's" Skip Stephenson and commentator Jayne Kennedy saw the light and signed with Hall-Hart-Ingram's Custom's Last Stand to promote themselves.

The girls are on top of a hot merchandising item. Everyone can look wonderful. "We have a product that is entertaining and professionally executed. We can give a celebrity a

# CBS movie beats bowl games, keys network's 3rd ratings win

NEW YORK — CBS' female-appeal movie "Intimate Strangers" bowled over the college-football-competition on NBC and ABC and keyed the second-ranked network to its third weekly ratings victory of the season, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

This year, football-filled New Year's Day fell on Wednesday, normally one of CBS' weakest-nights, providing the network an opportunity to counter-program against the prime-time perennials — the Orange Bowl and Sugar Bowl.

"It was savvy scheduling," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "If CBS had gone with its regular series throughout the night, they wouldn't have won the week." Last year, CBS' theatrical movie "Victor/Victoria" was able to capitalize on the male-favored New Year's bowl games.

"Intimate Strangers," starring Terri Garr as an MIA nurse who escapes from Vietnam after 10 years, pre-empted regular CBS series and was the week's No. 3 show with a 26.4 rating, the fourth best movie performance of the 1985-86 season. Meanwhile, NBC's Orange Bowl, which determined the national championship when Oklahoma beat Penn State, ranked 14th with a 21.3 rating. ABC's Sugar Bowl matching Miami and Tennessee was 61st out of 63 shows with a 6.8 rating.

For the week, CBS had five shows in the Top 10 and averaged an 18.7 rating. NBC had the other five highest ranked programs, including the No. 1 "Cosby Show," and finished with a 17.9. No. 3 ABC didn't have a single program in the Top 25 and averaged a 12.0, the worst regular season performance since ABC had an 11.9 New Year's Week one year ago.

The calendar played havoc with ABC's already weak prime-time schedule. It was the first week without "Monday Night Football," ABC's normally winning Tuesday night lineup was deflated by low viewing on New Year's Eve, and the network's most popular series, "Dynasty," was pre-empted by the Sugar Bowl.

"The Cosby Show" was the most



popular program for the week of Dec. 30-Jan. 5, gaining a 34.9 rating and a 50 share. A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television. A share measures the percentage of homes with their sets on that are tuned in.

NBC's "Family Ties" ranked second with a 31.2 rating, followed by "Intimate Strangers," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," CBS' "60 Minutes" and CBS' "Kate & Allie." NBC's "Cheers" and CBS' "Newhart" tied for seventh, NBC's "Miami Vice" was ninth and NBC's "Golden Girls" finished 10th.

ABC's highest ranking show was "The Defiant Ones," a made-for-TV movie that was 26th.

Exactly midway through the 30-week regular prime-time season, NBC leads with a 17.6 rating to CBS' 16.8 and ABC's 15.3. About the prospects of overtaking NBC, Mike Eisenberg, CBS' director of research, said: "It's going to be difficult."

Jaffe and Eisenberg agreed that CBS improved itself when it decided to make Sunday its third movie night, while moving "Crazy Like A Fox" to Wednesday and temporarily taking "Trapper John, M.D." off the air.

"We feel the movie will get a larger audience than we get now, and we won't lose anything on Wednesday," said Eisenberg. Starting next Wednesday, "Crazy Like A Fox" replaces "Charlie & Company" and "George Burns Comedy Week."

NBC also is tinkering with its Wednesday schedule, replacing "Hell Town" with "Blacks' Magic," starting this week. The new mystery series, starring Hal Linden and Harry Morgan, was introduced Sun-

day night as a two-hour movie and ranked 13th for the week.

"Crazy Like A Fox" and "Blacks' Magic" will be competing against ABC's "Dynasty," last season's top-rated show, but the NBC program this season. The CBS and NBC series both are comedy-mysteries, featuring offbeat father-and-son relationships.

"It will be an interesting competition," said Eisenberg, who noted that NBC has the stronger lead-in with "Highway to Heaven," but "Crazy Like A Fox" has the advantage of audience familiarity.

CBS' Wednesday lead-in, "Mary," had its best outing last week. Also competing against the bowl games, Mary Tyler Moore's new series ranked 15th. "It got a lot of sampling that it otherwise wouldn't have gotten," said Jaffe. "It represents an opportunity for the show to do better."

The bottom five shows, in descending order, were NBC's news magazine, "American Almanac," and CBS' canceled "Stir, Crazy," which tied for 59th, the Sugar Bowl game, ABC's canceled "Our Family Honor" and ABC's "Shadow Chasers."

In the evening news competition, the "CBS Evening News" was first with a 14.0 rating. The "NBC Nightly News" was second with a 10.9. ABC's "World News, Tonight" averaged a 12.1.

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# Husband-wife TV news anchors remain individuals in newsroom

Fan mail, ratings show that viewers like the chemistry

NEEDHAM, Mass. — Chet Curtis and Natalie Jacobson may be husband and wife at home, but when they take their seats behind the news anchor desk at WCVB-TV, their private lives don't even enter the picture.

"When I sit on that set I don't think of Chet and Nat," said Ms. Jacobson. "I don't have time to think of that. I just think about the story I'm telling you."

Added Curtis: "We don't even come to work together, mostly."

The couple, married 10 years ago after meeting at the station, are one of the few husband-wife news anchor teams in the nation.

Nationally, the most well-known couples are on Cable News Network, where Chris Curre and Don Farmer share the prime-time newscasts "Prime News" and "CNN Evening News," and Lois Harter and Dave Walker co-anchor "Take Two" in the afternoon.

The two CNN couples already were married when they joined CNN at its beginning in 1980. One other married couple at CNN, Lou Dobbs of "Moneyline" and sports anchor Debbi Segura, met at the network.

In the highly competitive Boston market, Ms. Jacobson and Curtis have anchored news shows together at WCVB for more than a decade, and for the past 3½ years they have presented the two nightly newscasts.

"Co-anchoring is a very difficult thing," said Ms. Jacobson, 42. "You can't just sit next to that person. For it to work, you have to have some kind of on-air relationship there."

"I don't think you have to be in love with each other to have chemistry on the air; you don't even have to really like the other person," she continued. "Just as long as professionally somehow (you are) clicking as you're talking and thinking together."

Ms. Jacobson and Curtis certainly have more in common than their co-anchors, but Curtis, 46, said that bond could become a handicap.

"There are times when the fact that we are married makes us comfortable with each other . . . and being comfortable could, if you didn't work at it, translate into a lack of energy when you're on the set," he said. "So maybe sometimes we might have to pump ourselves up a little more."

"We have professional disagreements about placement of stories, about what is the lead (story), how long should it be. We don't see eye to eye on that and I don't expect we ever will," Curtis said.

"And we also don't always come to each other's defense just because we're married," added Ms. Jacobson. "We're very much individuals. If Chet has a problem with a colleague or employer or boss, I stay out of it."

Curtis said he doesn't know of any negative reaction from station employees or viewers to WCVB's selection of a married couple as co-anchors.

Several years ago, Curtis said, he and his wife balked when the station considered promoting them as the husband-and-wife news team.

"I don't want people to watch us solely because we're married, (that) we're Mr. and Mrs. News. I want people to watch us because they think the product we present is better than the competition, that we know what we're talking about."

Judging by fan mail and ratings — they are consistently either No. 1 or 2 in the Boston television market — viewers seem to agree with him.

Ms. Jacobson said many people

who write WCVB consider her a role model for professional women.

That interest among female viewers peaked about five years ago when Ms. Jacobson was pregnant with the couple's daughter, Lindsay Dawn. Curtis has two older daughters from a previous marriage.

Ms. Jacobson continued to anchor the news until the day before she gave birth, a decision she says signaled many viewers that "it's OK to be a professional and not to hide the fact you're pregnant. I got tons of letters about that."

Despite their high salaries (it has been reported they jointly make \$1.2 million a year) and high ratings, Ms. Jacobson and Curtis said they make sacrifices because of their fame.

"You give up a lot when you're doing this," said Curtis. "I'm not knocking the job. But there's a price you pay, too, in terms of your private life."

"I just never got off on walking in to a restaurant and having people recognize me," said Ms. Jacobson. "I'd rather come in a side door."



# NBC chairman looks toward '86 with success-spawned optimism

*But Tinker won't let over-confidence drop network down*

HOLLYWOOD — It was the sort of not-so-hard news conference in which NBC Board Chairman Grant Tinker was asked if he had seen "Mary," the new CBS sitcom starring his ex-wife, Mary Tyler Moore. He had, he said, "and I think it's very good." One scribe persisted.

How would Tinker feel if "Mary" did what it has yet to do — beat NBC's "Highway To Heaven" in the first half-hour of the Wednesday night-time slot in which they do battle?

Tinker smiled gamely. "Well, I'd be very happy for her," he said Sunday. "But I'd say to Brandon, 'Do something about that.' (Brandon is NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff.)

Although regarded in some quarters as sort of a modern-day Moses who has led the children of NBC out of the Nielsen desert, Tinker refused to take credit for NBC's improved fortunes.

"We're not that far ahead," he also cautioned during his session here with out-of-town TV writers. All are here for the three networks' biannual displays of new programs, stars and executives.

There was the inevitable question of how General Electric's proposed \$6.28-billion takeover of RCA will affect NBC, which the latter company owns. Tinker repeated what he said last month when the proposal was announced.

"I don't think anything will change," he said, asserting that GE will have the same hands-off policy that he said RCA has had with NBC. Tinker also reiterated that he did not think GE executives would involve themselves with NBC's entertainment and news divisions.

"I would be just struck dumb — or fired, as the case may be — if they were to get any closer to NBC than RCA (executives) have been."

On another front, Tinker again

voiced his support of NBC News new "American Almanac" news-magazine series, which is joining the network's prime-time roster on a weekly basis on March 4, when it starts appearing in a Tuesday night time slot.

Aware that a string of past NBC News series has flopped in prime time, he acknowledged that the ratings so far for "Almanac" as a monthly offering have been low, "but we didn't expect it to go through the roof, and I am very committed to it."

He conceded that if NBC had not enjoyed ratings success this season "it would be harder for us to take the depressing ratings effect of 'Almanac,' which is certain to happen as we begin."

However, he added, NBC "would measure it by a different yardstick" and, even if the program's ratings are low, would leave it on longer than it would an entertainment show with similarly low Niensens.

His support seemed somewhat less solid for NBC's satirical "Saturday Night Live," which, now in its 11th season with producer Lorne

Michaels back at the helm, has drawn fire from critics as a show whose time has come and gone.

Saying that he only has seen two Saturday Night Live episodes this season, Tinker said of the show: "It's OK. It's a hard job to keep a show like that 'fresh and alive' and like to give it the benefit of the doubt for a little while."

Several seasons ago, NBC still was struggling to escape from the Nielsen cellar whence it had plunged during the reign of Fred Silverman. At that time, Tinker, who took over from Silverman in July 1981, brooded aloud then that perhaps he had been too optimistic in thinking that audiences really wanted quality programs.

But now, with NBC enjoying both critical acclaim and good ratings for shows like Bill Cosby's hit sitcom, and others like "Miami Vice," "Family Ties" and "St. Elsewhere," NBC's chief declared his depression a thing of the past.

"I think there's reason," he said, "to be encouraged that if you do something good and stay with it long enough . . . that you will succeed."

Both teams advanced to this game by shutting out semi-final opponents: the Rams doused the Dallas Cowboys 20-0; the Bears took care of the New York Giants 21-0.

But defense isn't all these teams can offer. Chicago's Walter Payton and Los Angeles' Eric Dickerson are possibly the games two best runners. If the survivor of this one has enough healthy players left, it will advance to the Super Bowl Jan. 26.

# India's most popular TV heroine shows fans they can shout back

'Doing a Rajani' is now something for India to cheer

BOMBAY, India — The star of India's most popular television show knew she had hit a national nerve when 500 angry taxi drivers protested outside the network offices demanding an apology for being portrayed as "bad characters."

Now her appearance literally causes riots in the streets. School children ring her doorbell for autographs. Everybody wants her to preside over festivals, banquets or even the opening of new roadside stands selling fresh sugar-cane juice.

"Sugar-cane stands," she says, exasperated. "Imagine." But what can she do? Even Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi is a fan.

Since its first episode in May, the show "Rajani," on the government-owned Doordarshan network, has seized India's 50 million television viewers in a way that even its creators never imagined.

Its star character, a young, feisty and great-looking middle-class housewife named Rajani, has become a new national heroine.

As people cheer in front of their television sets each Sunday morning, Rajani takes on the daily injustices that plague modern Indian life. She has gone after fake astrologers, bribe-demanding cooking-gas delivery men and pickpockets on buses.

In one episode, when a rude taxi driver refuses to take her on a short fare, she goes outraged to the police — immediately prompting the protest of the real-life cabbies.

In another, she discovers that her maid's husband is beating her, and that he is planning to take a second wife. Rajani bullies the husband to his senses.

In a recent episode, when the police refuse to do anything about the noise coming from the loudspeakers at a Hindu wedding, Rajani gets her own loudspeaker and aims it straight at the station. The police give in, and Rajani wins once again.

"This is the first time there is a character voicing the problems of the middle class," says Priya Tendulkar, the 25-year-old actress who

plays Rajani.

The show is in Hindi, but the phrase "doing a Rajani" has entered the Indian lexicon.

During a televised tour of the south Indian state of Kerala, Rajiv Gandhi dispensed with the usual platitudes and actually asked tough questions about the plight of homeless fishermen. "Rajiv Does a Rajani" was the headline, enthused.

But critics complain that the show could use a lot of work. Rajani has no sense of humor, and spends most of each half-hour show haranguing bureaucrats in long soliloquies.

Amrita Malik, the influential television columnist for the Indian Express newspaper, dismisses the acting as "a little crude" and "monotonous."

The success of the show is in fact more a reflection of the expectations of change in Prime Minister Gandhi's new India, and of a growing

consumer-oriented middle class tired of the institutional corruption that seems as entrenched in India as poverty and overpopulation.

"Indians have gotten so used to bureaucrats bullying them, and taking it lying down," says Malik. "Rajani's solutions are too pat, but at least she shows you can shout." Now "Rajani" has consumer advocates rejoicing.

"This was a godsend for us," says Pushpa Motwani, head of the Bombay-based Consumer Guidance Society of India, who immediately after the cooking-gas episode issued a press release supporting the show. Since "Rajani" started, Motwani says her average meeting attendance has gone from 50 people to 200.

Some women see the effect of "Rajani" as even more far-reaching in a country that for the most part still believes that wives should remain props in the background.

"She's providing a catharsis for a number of women who are leading very repressed lives and who are not allowed to voice their opinions," says Meena Kaushik, a sociologist and market researcher who has interviewed women on their attitudes about the show. "I think she's a har-binger of change. Women see her as a Joan of Arc."

As it happens, this "Joan of Arc" is a former Air India flight attendant and restaurant hostess who says she is not at all like Rajani and is tired of the whole thing.

"I really want to opt out," says Priya Tendulkar, talking over tea in her Bombay flat one recent morning. "As an actress, I find it quite static. But it has become so successful that the makers want it to stay exactly the same way. It is suffocating at times."

She is wearing an outfit of tightly fitted pants, or churidars, with a matching tunic, or kurta, and a long, flowing scarf, or dupatta—a traditional but stylish Indian ensemble that is still too modern for Rajani, who always wears saris and often keeps her long hair in a bun.

"If Rajani had been a single woman with short hair, she wouldn't have been as successful," says Tendulkar. "A lot of men and women who write to me say what they like is the cozy family."

In person, Tendulkar is prettier and sweeter than the fuming Rajani, although she does have enough of a sense of personal injustice to complain about the money she says she is currently making, which is the equivalent of \$200 per show.

Like most unmarried Indian women, she lives with her parents—her father is a successful playwright, her mother a former stage actress—and already on this morning, the living room of the modest flat is filling up with members of the extended family: Tendulkar's hairdresser, a few servants here and there and autograph-seekers at the door, Tendulkar ignores the commotion and continues her thoughts.

"Rajani never gets defeated," she says. "I feel at times that she should be confused, and stay like that for a day or two. I wish I could make her cry. She'd be more lifelike then. But I'm trapped in it now."

But the show's producer-director disagrees. "Rajani getting defeated defeats the purpose of the serial," says Basu Chatterji. "She must deliver the goods. That is the wish-fulfillment of the viewers. I'm tired

too, but the nation has taken us up."

Tendulkar had left her Air India job ("I began to feel there was more to life than filling baby bottles and passing out liquor") and had begun acting in Hindi films when Chatterji, who had been inspired by the take-charge style of his own wife and daughter, offered her the part of Rajani that a more successful actress had already turned down. "It didn't sound very exciting to me," says Tendulkar, "although the role was very meaty."

"Rajani" didn't take off until the ninth episode, at the end of June, when Rajani discovered that unless she paid an illegal premium she would have to wait for days to get a new cooking-gas cylinder.

Springing to action, she reported the incident to the police and had the agent arrested. Bombay gas distributors demonstrated in front of the television offices the same day. "It started a movement," says Tendulkar.

The success of Rajani is also the story of the growing influence of television in India. Indians now own about 5 million sets, twice as many as two years ago. Ten million sets are expected by 1987. The government estimates there are 10 viewers per television.

It is only in the past year that the Doordarshan network has branched out from its characteristically deadly documentaries and tried what are called "sponsored programs"—shows like "Rajani" and the popular soap opera "Hum Log" which are brought to the viewers by the makers of laundry detergent, refrigerators and instant coffee.

Rajiv Gandhi himself said recently that he enjoys "Rajani" and that it sets a good example for the Indian consumer. Now the newspapers are reporting incidents of Rajani-style behavior, like women standing up to rude taxi drivers, but most people aren't as successful in the real world. Rajani is viewed more as a superwoman who brings them

courage, not results.

Everybody doesn't love Rajani, of course. Intellectuals complain that her targets are trivial, and that Rajani has yet to take on corrupt politicians, organized crime and the problems of the poor.

Sociologist Meena Kaushik says upper-class women find her loud-mouth style unsophisticated, and that young marrieds dislike the mouse she has for a husband.

"She's bringing out such strong emotions," Kaushik says. "People are not indifferent to her." Neither is the minister for information and broadcasting, who, after the taxi drivers' protest, announced that the government was behind Rajani and planned to continue it.

The government, however, censors the show as it sees fit. In one upcoming episode, Rajani was to have complained that a government commission appointed to study city potholes was "made up of four or five old men who are out of jobs."

That went out. "I had to redub it," Tendulkar says. "It will look very funny."

In the meantime, she keeps trying to tell people that she's Priya Tendulkar, not Rajani. "People are trying to make me into a cult figure," she complains.

When she was in New Delhi for a press conference recently, a mix-up caused her to be half an hour late to meet with reporters: Rajani, late? The woman who is always lecturing people about promptness? The press was snarling when she got there.

"They tried to call me names," she says. "There was chaos. Thirty-five furious journalists. I really couldn't handle it. I thought I was going to cry. They were treating me like I'd committed murder. I thought I shouldn't cry in front of them, so the only thing to do was to get up and go."

The press conference was over as soon as it started, and Tendulkar fled back to her room.

Rajani would have shown them.

# Murdoch to make programs

Shows will have  
'no outer limits'

LOS ANGELES — Publisher Rupert Murdoch told independent television executives recently that his recently acquired studio is "deeply involved" in producing new shows to be offered by a fourth network — and that arrangements should be ready within 60 days.

Murdoch bought 20th-Century-Fox studios and six Metromedia television stations.

"We at Fox at the moment are deeply involved in working to put shape and form on original programs," Murdoch told about 1,000 members of the Association of Independent Television Stations.

"These will be shows with no outer limits. The only rules that we will enforce on these programs is they must have taste, they must be engaging, they must be entertaining and they must be original."

The new network plans to compete with the three established networks by selling first-run, primetime shows to independent stations.

It probably will offer situation comedies, one-hour dramas, television movies or "maybe some form not yet seen," Murdoch said.

The shows would be produced at 20th Century-Fox, Murdoch said, but "we're looking at Fox studios as only one source of material."

"Surely our industry is now capable of marshaling the necessary resources to be much more ambitious."

"It appears to me, as a newcomer that our success is due even more to diversity than to quality," he said. "If we are to meet our obligations of added diversity of choice, doing it with old programs is not enough in itself."

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# Family business, show business remain same thing for Nelsons

LOS ANGELES — At one time, Ozzie and Harriet and David and Ricky all lived together and shared a version of their lives with the TV audience.

The Nelsons played themselves for 14 years on "The Adventures of Ozzie and Harriet," and the boys grew up on the show.

It was there that Ricky discovered his talent for singing and went on to become a teen rock 'n' roll idol and one of the most popular recording stars of all time. He had 53 chart hits in his career.

Even so, he was a pop music has-been before his 25th birthday. Although he was on tour constantly he never topped the commercial success of his early days.

Ricky was making a comeback of sorts as Rick Nelson when he was killed Tuesday at the age of 45. His chartered DC-3 crashed en route to a New Year's Eve date in Dallas.

David Nelson began his directing career on the family show. He directed 13 episodes and later directed shows for "O.K. Crackerby," "Adam-12" and other series.

He is now president and director of Casablanca Productions, which makes TV commercials. He also directed such movies as "Last Plane Out," "Night Scream," "No Drums, No Bugles" and others, said Holly Vega, office coordinator for Casablanca.

David, 49, doesn't act much any more, but he was in a TV movie with his mother in 1976. It was called "Smashup on Interstate 5."

Harriet Nelson, 71, sold her Hollywood home and moved to Laguna Beach after Ozzie died of cancer in 1975. Before their TV careers, Harriet Hilliard was a big-band singer with Ozzie's band.

"They owned that home for many years and Ozzie used to swim two miles in the ocean every day they were there," said Maury Foladare, who was their publicist for 32 years.

Mrs. Nelson also appeared in the miniseries "Once an Eagle" in 1977. Her last appearance was in an episode of ABC's "Glitter," in which granddaughter Tracy Nelson, 22, Rick's eldest child, was a regular.

Tracy stars in the upcoming movie "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," said her agent, Sue Cameron. She plays the daughter of Bette Midler

and Richard DeVine and his brother-in-law with Nick Nolte.

Her brothers, Les, Larry, Eric and Matthew (aka Nelson) have their own rock band, the Nelsons,

which also features two sons of the Lennon Sisters. Rick's youngest son is Sam Hilliard, 11, who is in school.

Their mother is artist Kristen Harmon, daughter of football hero and sportscaster Tom Harmon and former actress Elyse Knox. Actor Mark Harmon is her brother and actress Kelly Harmon is her sister.

Foladare said David had two children by his first marriage and later married a woman with four children.

Foladare said he managed Rick Nelson during his early career as a singer.

"He never carried a dime in his pocket," Foladare said. "If he wanted an ice cream cone I had to buy it. He was a good kid. Success never went to his head."

A television special taped during Nelson's '50s revival show with Fats Domino at the Universal Amphitheater last August was due to appear this month on 143 stations. It was recalled by Nelson's manager, Greg McDonald, and will be re-aired as a tribute for broadcast later this year.

Nelson was also working on a new album, but it now appears that only a single, "You Know What I Mean," will result from that, said arranger Ronnie Haskell.

# British rock musicians honor king of rockabilly Carl Perkins

LONDON — Not anyone could convince ex-Beatle George Harrison to come out of his musical retirement and perform in front of an audience.

But Carl Perkins, the American godfather of rock 'n' roll, has managed the almost-impossible, gathering together Harrison, fellow ex-Beatle Ringo Starr and other British rock stars for a musical celebration that will be broadcast on pay-cable's Cinemax service this month.

The program, "A Rockabilly Session: Carl Perkins and Friends," had its first showing last week and has five more broadcasts scheduled for later in January.

Harrison, Starr, guitar mastermind Eric Clapton and Dave Edmunds were among the musicians who took to the stage at London's Limehouse Studios recently to join their boyhood idol in classic Perkins numbers like "Blue Suede Shoes," "Honey, Don't," "Matchbox" and "Everybody's Trying to be My Baby."

"Nothing in the music business has even come close to this for me," Perkins, now a silver-haired 53, said in an interview. "At times I felt I was going to break down crying."

Perkins was especially moved by Harrison's decision to "come out of his shell" and overcome his stage fright.

"After the show last night it was so beautiful when he put his arms around me and we were crying," and he said it was wonderful," Perkins said.

He proposed the television special, sending a personal video invitation to all three surviving Beatles. Only Paul McCartney was too busy to take part in the joint American-British production, Perkins said.

The Beatles, Clapton and the Rolling Stones have said their musical inspiration came from Perkins. But he credits British artists with saving rockabilly in the 1960s when his own career was on the skids. Perkins defines rockabilly as "blues with a country beat."

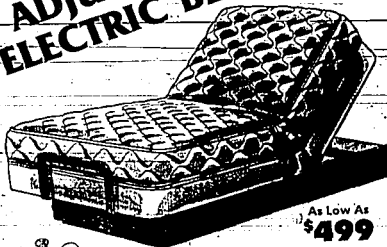
"The Beatles and Stones put it right back in the top of the charts at a time when it was in danger of dying in the United States," he said. "They put a nice suit on rockabilly. They never really strayed from the simplicity of it, they just beautified it."

Perkins' own inspiration came from the Southern black gospel music he heard in the cotton fields of his father's farm in Tiptonville, Tenn.

At the age of seven, he began playing a guitar his father had made from a cigar box, a broomstick and baling wire.

His career took off in 1955 when he was signed by Sam Phillips to Sun Records in Memphis. His recording of "Blue Suede Shoes" reached No. 1, selling more than 2 million copies and becoming the first record ever to hit the rhythm and blues, country, and pop charts all at the same time.

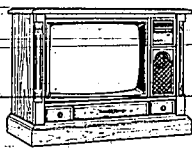

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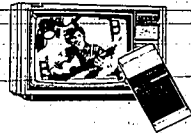
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# 'Today' show's ratings revival brightens mornings for network

HOLLYWOOD — NBC's "Today" has edged out ABC's once-dominant "Good Morning America" in ratings for the last three weeks. "Today" no longer has a program consultant named Frank Magid. The "CBS Morning News" may still be in trouble, but should not be written off as hopeless.

Oh, yes, Jane Pauley, the "Today" co-anchor who gave birth to twins in 1983, is pregnant again. Pauley, married to "Doomesbury" cartoonist Garry Trudeau, is expecting her baby in August.

All this was noted recently by "Today" executive producer Steve Friedman, the lead-off speaker — followed by NBC News President Lawrence E. Grossman — at NBC's biannual meet-the-press sessions with out-of-town TV critics and writers.

Grossman said that NBC's "Almanac" newsmagazine series, aired on a monthly basis since its September debut, will join the network's weekly prime-time schedule in March on Tuesday nights, starting March 4. It will appear in the time slot currently occupied by "Remington Steele," whose fate has not yet been announced by the network.

"Almanac," anchored by Roger Mudd, also will air "single-subject documentaries" on a once-a-month basis when the program seems sufficiently established as a weekly offering. Grossman said: He anticipated that between six to eight such documentaries will have aired in the "Almanac" time period by the end of the year.

Support for "Almanac" has been repeatedly voiced by NBC Board Chairman Grant Tinker. It is the latest prime-time news venture attempted by the network, which has seen at least four other such series end in failure in recent years, among them "First Tuesday," "Weekend" and "First Camera." "Almanac" executive producer, Ed Foughy, jokingly acknowledged that fact Sunday when he said he understood that the producer of a previous NBC News failure, "is now producing 'Good Morning, Savannah.'"

Friedman, whose resurgent "Today" began making its comeback in the morning-show ratings in early 1985, declared that year as the year "we caught 'Good Morning

America." But he sounded a predictable note of caution that the race is far from over.

Although Friedman needed ABC's foot for "Today" this year, in morning competition, as now being somewhat stodgy, he told the visiting press Saturday at the Century Plaza Hotel that "we do not take for granted that we are going

to win in 1986, because if you take things for granted you get taken."

Ergo, he said, "big plans" are afoot for "Today" this year, including voyages outside New York that are akin to the 1985 trips to Rome and five American cities in five days that got the program a lot

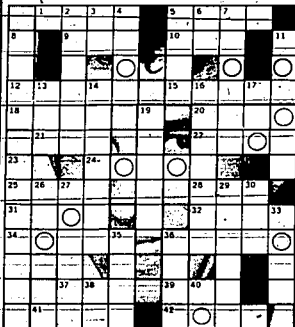

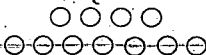

of publicity and helped its rise in the ratings.

The 1986 trips will start with one to New Orleans for the Jan. 26 Super Bowl that NBC is televising. After that, the schedule calls for a February week in Rio de Janeiro (for the carnival) and Buenos Aires, then a five-port Atlantic Coast cruise in May aboard the cruise ship Norway (the cruise will start in Wilmington, N.C., and end in Miami).

(Grossman told reporters that "NBC Nightly News" anchorman Tom Brokaw also will be traveling — to South America this month for a series of reports and then to the Philippines in February to cover the coming presidential election.)

During his Saturday-night chat, Friedman disclosed that program consultant Frank Magid — sometimes sardonically called a TV "news doctor" — no longer is advising NBC on how to boost the "Today" audience. Magid's contract expired last month and "he chose to go somewhere else," Friedman said. He did not elaborate.

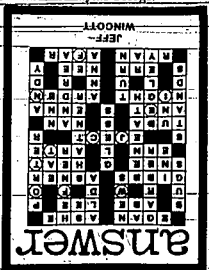
NBC's employment of Magid in 1984 raised eyebrows and caused some unease among staffers at NBC News, which produces "Today," even though top executives at the network said his work only would involve that two-hour program.

Friedman, who professed then not to be worried about Magid's hiring, said Saturday that "a lot of things Frank said (about how to increase the audience of "Today") were right. But they also were common sense."

Magid's employment wasn't "a waste of time or money," the producer added, but "the people who fixed the show, quite frankly, are (co-anchor) Bryant Gumbel, Jane Pauley," and John Palmer and Willard Scott, the show's newscaster and joke-cracking weatherman, respectively.

In discussing the "Today" competition, the feisty Friedman chided CBS News for its varied efforts to pull the "CBS Morning News" out of the third-place spot in morning ratings in which that program has been mired for years.

"If you wanted to, you could write a book on how to destroy a program with what they've done in the last three years," he said. He singled out the five changes in anchor teams that the program has had since 1983, including last year's much-publicized entrance and exit — after nine months — of Phyllis George.



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
