Cuts to hurt farms

WASHINGTON — Spending cuts under the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law will mean reductions in most Agriculture Department programs, including how much farmers will get in federal price-support benefits, officials said Thursday.

Some employee cutbacks also will occur, possibly resulting in reductions in federal meat and poultry inspection, and conservation services to farmers.

The law calls for a 4.3 percent domestic spending reduction in many government programs for fiscal 1986, which began last Oct. 1.

Department budget officials said food stamps and child-feeding programs are exempt but that other USDA functions will bear a total reduction of more than \$1.26 billion.

For example, said Robert E. Sherman, the department's deputy budget director, when farmers go to their local USDA offices to collect crop price support loans or apply for target price "deficiency" payments, they'll have 4.3 percent deducted from what they otherwise would get.

In effect, Sherman said in an interview, the 1986 wheat price support of \$2.40 per bushel will be shaved to \$2.30. The deficiency payments, which make up the difference between market prices and the target, also would be trimmed.

Although the law applies to the current fiscal year, Sherman said its curb on USDA spending will affect the entire 1986 crop year, meaning corn and other commodities harvested next fall.

The 1986 corn loan — the amount farmers can borrow from USDA by using their crop as collateral — would be effectively reduced to \$1.84 per bushel from \$1.92.

The 1986 crop loan rates were announced earlier this week by Agriculture Secretary John R. Block as part of his decisions to carry out the new Food Security Act of 1985, the farm bill passed by Congress and signed by President Reagan just before Christmas.

Block, hoping to make U.S. commodities more competitive in the world market, reduced the 1986 wheat loan rate to \$2.40 from \$3.30 per bushel last year, and corn to \$1.92 per bushel from \$2.55 in 1985.

Soviet offer promoted as arms talks resume

GENEVA — The chief Soviet negotiator said Thursday that the first order of business in the new round of arms talks is dealing with a Kremlin proposal intended to rid Europe of nuclear missiles.

After a 10-week break the U.S.-Soviet arms negotiations resumed Thursday one day after Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev put forth a plan for eliminating nuclear weapons in several stages by the year 2000.

Washington welcomed Gorbachev's proposals — but cautiously. The Reagan administration expressed concern because he linked arms reduction to scrapping the Strategic Defense Initiative, the U.S. research project on space-based defense commonly called "Star Wars."

The opening space at the Soviet Mission began on an optimistic note. Chief U.S. negotiator Max M. Kampelman said his team was "anx-

Star Wars has been a major sticking point in the talks since this series began last March. Three rounds have produced no sign of progress on the issue.

Karpov told reporters before the U.S. delegation arrived. "The Star Wars program is very dangerous and we feel that banning of that program is very important for reducing arms. First of all nuclear arms."

"I blame the United States, not me," for the superpower disagreement on Star Wars, he said. The Soviet Union claims the plan is offensive, not defensive, and will extend the arms race to space.

The United States says it is committed to the Strategic Defense Initiative and does not intend to scrap it. The Reagan administration contends that a defense system in space would make the world more secure.

Karpov said the "direct task" of the negotiators is to deal with the first stage of Gorbachev's proposals. The plan calls for 50 percent

Gorbachev's proposal timed to garner maximum impact

MOSCOW — The new Kremlin proposal to end the threat of nuclear war in 15 years was timed and presented by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev to gain maximum impact.

Moscow's official press quickly followed up by asserting on Thursday that the next move was up to the United States.

The three-stage plan repackaged Kremlin arms reduction proposals, offered a step-by-step timetable and reiterated that the United States must abandon "Star Wars" research before arms cuts can start.

In presenting it, Gorbachev again showed his flair for offering proposals in public to achieve the

But Gorbachev preferred to go public with the Soviet proposals. Since becoming Soviet leader in March, Gorbachev has worked hard on public relations. He has used television, the official Tass news agency and trips abroad to announce and promote the Kremlin's new course.

He has put his personal stamp on arms control statements in an effort to convince the West, especially Western Europe, that the Soviet Union is ready for serious negotiations and willing to present initiatives.

Last year Gorbachev announced a unilateral moratorium on nuclear tests. He contended the Soviet Union was willing to take the first step even if the American side was un-

Federal asbestos charge hits state

Three state governments, including Idaho, two school organizations, a railroad and several other defendants in 10 cities were charged by the Justice Department on Thursday with mishandling asbestos, a cancer-causing material in the renovation or demolition of buildings.

Asbestos fibers, when breathed, can cause lung cancer and other potentially fatal diseases, some of which don't show up for 20 to 40

years after exposure, according to the Environmental Protection Agency.

The defendants include the states of Idaho, Washington and Florida, school organizations in New Jersey and Iowa, the Consolidated Rail Corp., other building owners and contractors who tore down or restored buildings containing asbestos.

Attorney General Edwin Meese III said the 11 cases were developed jointly by the Justice Department and the EPA as part of an initiative

to reduce asbestos pollution nationally.

The Justice Department said it expects to file more cases on the issue in the months ahead.

Courtney M. Price, assistant EPA administrator for enforcement, said she hopes the action will deter others from ignoring asbestos standards. "We have strong indications that many small business owners, and some individuals who may not think of themselves as business people, don't know or don't want to

know or don't want to know about asbestos. We're going to educate them."

Many moons found around Uranus

PASADENA, Calif. — The Voyager 2 spacecraft has discovered six more moons orbiting Uranus, bringing the total to 12, and NASA said Thursday the planet may have 30 moons altogether, more than any planet in the solar system.

Scientists on the Voyager imaging team found the moons in long-exposure images returned by the spacecraft over the past two weeks, said a statement issued by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration's Jet Propulsion Laboratory.

The six moons range from 20 miles to 30 miles in diameter, far smaller than the planet's five major moons, which measure from about 310 miles to 1,010 miles across, said Ellis Miner, deputy Voyager project scientist.

Because the six newly discovered satellites are outside the nine characteristic rings known to orbit Uranus, none of them is a so-called shepherd moon — whose gravitational forces herd the nine known Uranian rings into their narrow shapes, Miner said.

He said scientists still expect to find 18 shepherd moons — one on

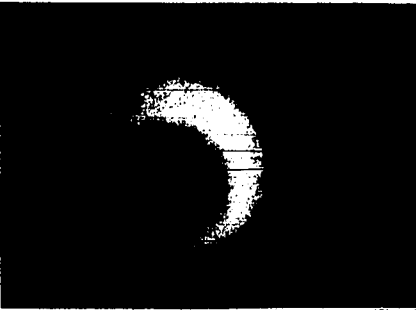


Photo gives clues to Uranus' atmospheric structure

each side of each ring — which would bring to 30 the number of Uranian moons.

That will mean that Uranus has more moons than any of the other planets, Miner said. That theory will be bolstered if Saturn now holds the solar system record, with 20 moons, followed by Jupiter with 16, he said.

Miner said the fact that all six of the newly found moons "are clustered right around the same distance from the planet is intriguing. It possibly implies they are a result of a larger satellite that broke up."

Subway shooter has eight major counts thrown out

NEW YORK — A judge threw out attempted murder and assault charges against subway gunman Bernhard Goetz on Thursday, saying the grand jury that indicted him was improperly instructed on his right to self defense. The judge recommended the case be presented to another grand jury.

Three counts of criminal possession of a weapon and one count of reckless endangerment were retained against Goetz, who said he shot four youths on a subway train more than a year ago when he believed they were about to rob him.

The four counts of attempted murder and four counts of assault were dropped by Judge Stephen Bernhardt Goetz on Thursday, saying the grand jury that indicted Goetz about the "defense of justification," or self-defense, according to court papers released by Manhat-

tan District Attorney Robert Morgenthau.

Crane also said the charges should be dropped due to possible

perjury on the part of two of Goetz's victims.

"Hopefully, it means that the system will abandon the concept of prosecuting victims," Goetz said in an interview with WNBC-TV.

Goetz also was "gratified" and "satisfied" by the development, said Mark Baker, one of his lawyers.

Goetz "would like to go back to his quiet life and back to his employment" and hopes "this nightmare will end for him," said Barry Slotnick, another of his lawyers.

"The court has accepted our contention that Goetz was severely prejudiced by the erroneous instructions on the law of self-defense," Baker said. "If the district attorney resubmits the charges and properly instructs the grand jury on the laws of justification and self-defense, we are confident the defendant will be completely vindicated."

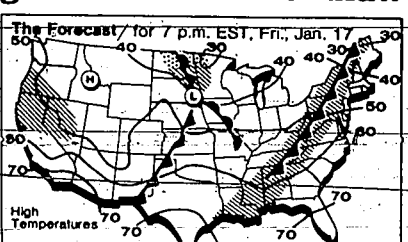

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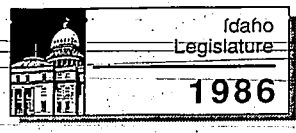
Koontz pinch-hits for an absent Scott

Lands chief urges investing fee income

BOISE — Present sacrifices for future gains may be hard to sell to Legislature facing a \$28 million deficit, but Idaho Department of Lands Director Stan Hamilton offered one such option to the Senate Education Committee Thursday.
In order to increase revenues for Idaho's public schools, Hamilton suggested that the state not give directly to the schools the yearly \$1 million income from grazing-fee, mineral-leases, and rental fees collected from the 2.5-million-acre endowment for schools.
Instead of spending those funds every year, he said, they could be plowed back into the endowment fund to increase the size of the interest-earning accounts.
The committee did not vote on Hamilton's suggestions, but only heard them as part of his report on the doings of his department.
With the increase in the size of those accounts would come a slow increase in the interest earned from those accounts. That would exceed the \$1 million per year that is now spent and not recoverable, Hamilton said.

By investing the \$1 million income, the interest-earning accounts would produce \$1 million in annual investment income within 10 years. If interest rates stay near 10 percent, he estimated.
"I sure won't change it enough," said Hale. More than two dozen votes for a proposal would have to materialize for a bill to make it to the floor, the committee chairman said.
Early results in the GOP survey in the House indicated that 31 of 47 responding representatives would favor elimination of the college as a way to help balance the 1987 budget.
Hale said a bill may go to the State Affairs Committee instead of Education, but he will support it in the Education Committee or on the floor of the House.

"By investing the money and only spending the interest, the state would distribute \$32.5 million in 25 years with the same conditions," said Hamilton.
Other options Hamilton outlined that might help the Department of Lands produce more income to support public schools and other land-grant-supported programs were: induce the federal government to give more land to the state's endowment; lengthen lease terms on public lands to encourage development; stop selling down lands; press for higher rents from people on state lands; lease more recreational lands; allow the department to project more revenues back into improvement projects; and buy land to add to the state's land endowment when possible.

Temporary lifting of prison cap near

BOISE (AP) — With part of the renovation at the state correctional facility in Orofino completed, the state Board of Corrections today moved to end, at least temporarily, the population cap of 1,300 inmates in Idaho prison system.
Corrections Director Al Murphy said the additional 48 beds at the Orofino facility and the guards to cover them will be ready by mid-February so that within three weeks processing need inmates into the prison system the cap can be lifted next Friday.
But Murphy conceded that the reopening of the system will only be temporary and that the problem with prison overcrowding will begin hitting the state a year from now.
"The problem is not now," he told the board. "This time next year, if we have 1,410 inmates (as estimated), there's no relief. It's two or three years before we get more room, and that's assuming that we get an appropriation."
The inmate population today stood at the maximum of 1,300 under the cap adopted last fall by the board as a federal judge continues to monitor conditions within the prison system. Murphy said there were also 18 convicted felons sentenced to prison but currently being held in county jails around the state pending room for them in prison. "The rated capacity of the entire system is just over 1,600."
With the inmate population growing at about a dozen a month, Murphy said using the additional bed space at Orofino would wipe out the current backlog of prisoners in county jails and provide enough space for

new inmates until late June when another 160 beds are expected to be available when additional remodeling at Orofino and at the facility at Cottonwood is expected to be completed.
But he pointed out that the new bed space, becoming available in June is "minimum security and the system has very few inmates that can be classified for that limited custody level."
"Even if those beds can be filled, Murphy said there is no prospect for any new inmate space until the proposed maximum security-prison is built, and that will not be for 1989 by bringing state lawmakers authorize the money for construction.
By that time, Murphy said, the state can expect to have an inmate population of nearly 1,900 in a system designed for under 1,200 prisoners. A likely new cap to be imposed a year from now would likely be at 1,350 inmates, he said, making overcrowding even worse than it has been and also forcing up to 300 additional inmates to be held in county jails because no space is available in the prison system.
Although some officials have called for moving first-offenders and other nonviolent inmates to lower security facilities so more space is available at the main prison, Murphy said the state through a number of programs has already effectively eliminated those kinds of good-risk prisoners from long-term incarceration.
"They don't exist in Idaho," he said. "We're already dealing with people on the state who that other states have in prisons."

Hale sees debate on LCSC elimination coming

BOISE — With the suggestion that Lewis-Clark State College be eliminated appearing on a recent House Republican caucus survey, Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley, said he expects to see the question debated in the House Education Committee this year.
Hale, chairman of the Education Committee, said Wednesday he thinks House Speaker Tom Sivers' desire to see the school eliminated was the reason behind the speaker's recent decision to move two moderate Republicans off the House Education Committee and replace them with two conservative Republicans.
Sivers said he rearranged the committee to rid of Idaho Education Association influence.

Either way, that move may not have been enough to ensure that any bill is voted out of committee for debate by the full House of Representatives.
"He didn't change it enough," said Hale. More than two dozen votes for a proposal would have to materialize for a bill to make it to the floor, the committee chairman said.
Early results in the GOP survey in the House indicated that 31 of 47 responding representatives would favor elimination of the college as a way to help balance the 1987 budget.

Rep. Robert Ery, R-Horseshoe Bend, one of the moderate Republicans bumped off the Education Committee by Sivers, said he has heard nothing this year of a new bill to do away with Lewis-Clark.
"I don't think the solution is to pick one institution and knock it off," said Ery.
Rep. Hide Kellogg, R-Post Falls, another northern Idaho opponent of the measure, said the bill is a "sensational-type thing" and the voters' been surprised to see a bill debated again this year.

Conservation funding could pay off 25-to-1

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Legislature will be given an offer to cut taxes — many of them — in exchange for conservation funding.
Department of Water Resource spokesmen said Thursday the Legislature will be asked to approve \$117,200 in state funding, to match a \$3.7 million energy conservation grant.
And besides the more than 25-to-1 return, investments in energy conservation provide long-range rewards, says DWIR spokesman Wayne Haas.
Haas told Water Resource Board members Thursday that since the federal government started making energy conservation grants in 1979,

public institutions have received about \$6 million. Another \$1 million in loans and grants have gone to individuals, farmers and businessmen.
Combined, the projects are saving \$1.6 million per year in energy costs, he said.
"It will be a good investment for Idaho," Haas said, of the \$117,200 request. "I think it is very important that we get this money. It will bring a tremendous return to the state."
Perhaps in an effort to generate legislative support for the spending request, the department prepared a chart showing how much of the energy conservation money has gone to each legislative district.

Request for local taxing authority renewed before House committee

BOISE (AP) — As they have in many recent legislative sessions, Idaho's cities and counties have asked the Legislature for more authority to raise local revenue.
But after an appearance before the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Thursday, Association of Idaho Cities spokesman Jim Weatherby says he has more hope than he has been in the past.
"That's because cities and counties face the loss of massive amounts of federal funding this fall."
And one witness testified that if counties don't get more money, they will have to raise property taxes an average of 15 percent "just to hold their own."
"Nobody in this room wants to see that happen," said Ralph Wheeler, American Falls, legislative chairman of the Idaho Association of Counties.
"That's why we are asking you for an increase in revenue sharing," Revenue and Taxation Committee members voted to print and introduce the proposals, although that didn't necessarily mean approval. Committee Chairman Steve Antonio, R-Rupert, is being assigned all tax bills to subcommittees for study.
"We've certainly got a lot of work," noted Rep. James Lucas, R-Moscow.
And in an unusual move, a member of the Idaho Senate asked the House committee to introduce a bill, hinting that she came to the House because there's little use in trying to introduce the bill through the comparable Senate committee, Local Government and Taxation.
Sen. Gail Ray, D-Boise, called that panel "Local Good Government

Weatherby got some criticism from committee members for bringing up three different subjects in the same bill.
But Weatherby said the cities and counties believe that a variety of needs need to be met, and it would do no good to address one area of need and not the others.
"We need to address all these problems at the same time," he said. "At a minimum, we need to look at replacing lost revenue-sharing money."
Rep. Myron Jones, R-Malden, asked whether removing property tax limits might trigger another taxpayer rebellion, such as the one that spawned the 1 percent property tax initiative in 1978.
"That could happen," said Weatherby. But he said locally elected officials should be the ones determining local tax needs.
Wheeler, a former state legislator, said counties have current budgets of about \$10 million, not counting highway agencies.

School box issue wasn't handled well

Public school students who break the rules should be disciplined. Unruly students who disrupt classrooms should be removed from the classrooms. But no child, in the year 1988, should be confined in a wooden box as punishment.

An irate parent Tuesday night brought to light a form of discipline used at O'Leary Junior High School and demanded that it be stopped. It seems a wooden box is used to confine and isolate students who are being disciplined.

No doubt, the intention was good. Disciplining students is no easy matter. Most traditional forms are ineffective, particularly with habitual problem students. Physical punishment is used in some school districts, mainly at the elementary level, and is probably the form of punishment most likely to bring about the desired effect. But we believe that physical punishment is too risky a matter to be put into the hands of school administrators.

Psychological punishment can be just as dangerous.

We understand that the technique is used, with some success, in dealing with special education students who have trouble controlling their emotions. So, theoretically, it might be effective in disciplining problem students or, at least, isolating them from other students. Locking them in a closet would probably work even better.

The problem is, where does one draw the line? We don't know what the psychological effects would be on a student of extended confinement in a box, even if the child were not already claustrophobic. We suspect that neither do school administrators. Because of this, we question the wisdom of employing the device — unless the parents of the students have no objections. In this case, parents were not consulted.

Discipline begins at home. Unfortunately, some parents are either unable, or unwilling, to instill any sense of discipline in their children. These are generally the students who cause problems at school. Obviously, something must be done to deal with the problem.

But there must be better solutions than confinement in a box.

Finally, there's the matter of how the Twin Falls School Board handled the subject when it was presented to it. The board went into closed session to discuss it as "personnel matters," contrary to Idaho law. The law is specific on what can be discussed in closed session, and that subject apparently does not qualify. Using that rationale, virtually any complaint regarding school activities could be discussed privately.

Public bodies must realize that they cannot duck into closed session simply to avoid public discussion of controversial subjects.

Divided highway the answer

The traffic hazards of U.S. 93 between Twin Falls and Jackpot defy easy solutions. Yet the accident demands decisive action and the reality is that only a fully developed, divided interstate highway system will solve the problem. This road is, after all, a major interstate and international roadway.

The quick-fixes suggested by your editorial and by others are helpful in the short run, but won't

fly as a full solution.

Asking casinos to monitor the state of intoxication of customers is impractical. Too many unknown factors complicate the process. Which customers are driving and which are passengers? How do you know if a customer is "in the road" after his last drink? Will they get a meal before leaving and thereby lower the alcohol content of their blood? Will the customer decide to spend the night and get a fresh start in the morning? How many people serve drinks to any one customer? How many casinos does a customer visit for a drink? Obviously the casinos cannot effectively control either the drinking or the driving habits of their customers.

You also suggested that a bus route can be set up for casino customers. Yet more than two decades ago, the casinos ran customer buses only to discontinue the runs because of customer dislike.

If the casinos did not exist, this road would still be a major north-south highway with heavy truck and tourist traffic. The most recent rash of accidents included collisions of vehicles going in opposing directions on icy surfaces — a situation solved only by a divided highway.

The project will be costly — but what dollar value can you put on human lives and suffering? I have been close to both — my brother died in a traffic accident on that road and my husband was permanently injured in another accident on the same road.

S. Yemen fighting escalates

SANA, North Yemen (AP) — Troops and armed tribal warriors loyal to rival factions of South Yemen's Marxist government battled throughout that country Thursday, according to radio and diplomatic reports, and one source said the nation seemed headed toward full-fledged civil war.

The warring groups agreed to meet in the Soviet Embassy in South Yemen to negotiate a cease-fire, but the outcome of the talks was not known, according to sources based in North Yemen who spoke on condition of anonymity.

"The two sides are using tanks, artillery and jets in what appears to be escalating into a full-scale civil war," said one diplomatic source in Sana'a who is in close contact with South Yemeni developments.

The Soviet Union has a heavy stake in South Yemen, its closest ally on the Arabian Peninsula. The Soviets maintain important naval bases in the impoverished country and can station up to 10,000 troops there under a friendship and cooperation treaty signed in 1979.

Three radio stations seized

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Leftist guerrillas briefly seized three radio stations and forced them to broadcast anti-government messages Thursday, just before Sen. Edward M. Kennedy arrived for a visit with President Alan Garcia.

Four men and a woman armed with submachine guns and pistols took over the three stations at 15-minute intervals, but no one was hurt, the official news agency Andina reported.

The guerrillas identified themselves as members of the Tupac Amaru Revolutionary Movement, named for the leader of an 18th century Indian uprising. Andina said they left a bomb at Radio Oriente, five blocks from the government palace, but police defused it.

Kennedy got a warm welcome from Garcia, in contrast with fighting demonstrations in Lima earlier in Chile, where officials refused to see him because of his opposition to the military government.

MIA delegation leaves today

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A U.S. senator bound for Hanoi said Thursday that the "bottom line" for Americans is resolving the missing-in-action issue that has exacerbated relations with their former enemy since the Vietnam War ended.

The congressional delegation led by Sen. Frank Murkowski flies to Hanoi on Friday, the first such group to visit Vietnam since North Vietnamese troops captured Saigon in April 1975.

Murkowski, an Alaska Republican who is chairman of the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee, said he and his fellow congressmen are on a humanitarian mission, not a political one.

World Bank doubles lending

WASHINGTON (AP) — The World Bank, biggest source of aid to poor countries, more than doubled its lending for the last six months of 1985 and is heading for a record year, Senior Vice President Mosen A. Qureshi said Thursday.

The target for the year ending June 30 is \$12 billion to \$13.5 billion. The previous record for the year ending June 30, 1984, was \$7.9 billion. For the following year, the target is down to \$4.1 billion, lent to 42 countries.

For the last six months of 1985, the bank's commitments — always slow at that period — were \$2.9 billion, compared with \$1.1 billion in the last six months of 1984.

Actual disbursements were down, however, to \$1.28 billion from \$4.5 billion. The bank has been under pressure from many of the 149 governments that own it, including the United States, to speed up its disbursements.

Students forced into class

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Witnesses said armed police in a South African school on Friday forced students to attend class and perhaps signaling a tougher attitude toward boycotts that "authorities see as a catalyst of anti-apartheid protest and violence.

The action at Rylands High School near Cape Town was the first time in 16 months of unrest that police and soldiers acted to make sure classes were held. Students, teachers and other witnesses said the officers stood in the classroom doorways and patrolled the halls.

Boycotts have been most common in black schools since the protest of white-minority rule, in which about 1,000 people have been killed, began in September 1984.

Waite keeping 'low profile'

LONDON (AP) — Anglican church envoy Terry Waite said Thursday he was still working for the release of Americans held hostage in Lebanon but has no immediate plans to return to Beirut to resume direct negotiations with their kidnappers.

"I am keeping a low profile at this time," Waite told The Associated Press. "I am actively working on the problem, and I remain cautiously optimistic."

Waite made three trips to Beirut late last year after four American hostages wrote a letter to Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie, spiritual head of the Church of England, appealing for his help in gaining their freedom.

Waite had met with the Americans' kidnappers, who are thought to be Shiite Muslim extremists. He last left Beirut on Christmas Eve, saying his mission had suffered a setback.

Rabin: Soviets watch Israeli ships for Libya

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin said Thursday that three Soviet ships steaming off the coast are there to pass information to Libya about the movements of Israeli ships and planes.

The Soviets have shown "great sensitivity" about Israel's intentions since the Palestinian terrorist attacks on the Rome and Vienna airports and set up a "warning screen" with the ships, Rabin said.

Israel and the United States have accused Libya of harboring the terrorist group they blame for the Dec. 27 airport massacres in which 19 people died, including five Americans, two Israelis and four of the terrorists. Libyan leader Moammar Khadafi has predicted military action by both countries.

"Russian naval boats offshore (are able) to detect a group of ships that might go out from Israel," Rabin told a group of American reporters at the Defense Ministry. He did not say whether the Soviet presence was inhibiting Israeli plans.

He said two destroyers and an intelligence-gathering vessel were standing 30 to 80 miles off Israel in international Mediterranean waters. He also said Soviet planes operate from bases in the Red Sea, including the U.S. 6th Fleet and Israel's actions in the Mediterranean.

"No doubt they are more active now," said Rabin, referring to Soviet aerial reconnaissance that normally shadows U.S. naval activity.

The Soviet vessels provide "a screen of maritime tanker flights and ships that might go out of Israel to the west," he said, with the apparent purpose of notifying Libya. The Soviet Union has openly supported Libya in its dispute with the United States and is Khadafi's main arms supplier.

Of Israeli intentions, Rabin said "Sometimes we get a target," but Israel does not have a policy of "automatic reprisals" for each act of terror.

"It is easier for us politically to hit them," Rabin said, referring to a domestic consensus for military strikes at terrorists, "but this is a prolonged war against terror which includes both defensive and offensive measures. There is no short cut to cure this problem."

He indicated Israel had no plans to attack Libya. One of the reasons appeared to be an inability to locate Abu Nidal, the Palestinian blamed for the Rome and Vienna attacks.

Abu Nidal, whose real name is Sabry al-Banna, operated from Iraq and was believed to be in Libya, but his current whereabouts is not known.

"I'm not sure we know for sure where he is now," Rabin said. The defense minister said Israel's Oct. 1 bombing of the Palestine Liberation Organization headquarters in Tunis had scattered Palestinian guerrillas, making it more difficult for them to act, and put host countries on notice that they were not immune to attack.

5 killed in Philippine election violence

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Blood dripped from the hand of President Ferdinand E. Marcos during a campaign rally Thursday and he was treated on-stage by a nurse and doctor. Reports said five people had been killed in the first known violence of the presidential campaign.

The dead included two leaders of the campaign for Corason Aquino, who is opposing Marcos in the Feb. 7 election. The slayings of the campaign leaders and three aides occurred in Mrs. Aquino's home province of Tarlac and in adjacent Pangasinan, north of Manila, on Wednesday and Saturday, said the opposition and military reports.

Marcos, campaigning in Pangasinan province 100 miles northwest of Manila, did not mention the killings in speeches in Urdaneta and Dagupan.

During his appearance in Dagupan, he raised both hands and looked at them. An adhesive bandage had peeled off one hand and blood was seen trickling down. As he sat on the stage, a doctor and a nurse came up, dabbed his hand with cotton and put on a new bandage.

"He must have scratched himself coming in," the nurse told a reporter as she left the stage. As in previous rallies, Marcos was carried on the shoulders of aides through a crowd estimated

by reporters at more than 10,000.

Marcos, 68, who has long denied rumors he is ill, was visibly tired but delivered a 75-minute speech attacking Mrs. Aquino as a Communist sympathizer. He has been seen wearing plaster strips on the back of both hands for months, but the presidential palace has not said why.

Mrs. Aquino, campaigning in the central Philippines, said in a radio interview in Davao that she held Marcos responsible for the killing Wednesday of Jejomar de Jesus.

"I blame Marcos for the slaying of de Jesus," said Mrs. Aquino. She apparently was not aware of the earlier killing of Jesus Miranda.

Capitol Rotunda's King bust unveiled

WASHINGTON (AP) — Martin Luther King Jr. was enshrined as a national hero Thursday in the Capitol Rotunda as his widow unveiled a brooding, bigger-than-life sculpture of the civil rights leader and urged his countrymen to "turn America into an oasis of freedom and justice."

Coretta Scott King pulled a black shroud from the towering bronze bust and looked up silently for a moment at the likeness of her husband's face. Then she turned, smiling broadly, and joined the applause that echoed thunderously inside the Capitol dome.

Mrs. King noted that her husband's bust is the first African-American to be installed in the pantheon of national heroes in the Capitol, an honor rendered nearly 18 years after King was slain in Memphis, Tenn., on April 4, 1968.

Surrounded by her four grown children, several of King's former civil rights associates and members of Congress, Mrs. King said that "my hope is that we'll be reminded of both the dream and the reality of her husband's goals of social justice and racial harmony."

"We have much work yet to do," she said.

The dedication of King's bust came four days before the first of a federal holiday is held on Monday in observance of his birth 57 years ago. King actually was born on Jan. 15.

Among those attending the dedication were Sen. Charles McC. Mathias, R-Md., and former Rep. Jonathan Bingham, D-N.Y., co-sponsors of the legislation authorizing a King statue in the halls of Congress, which approved their resolution in December 1982.

Mathias said it was fitting that the memorial to King be placed alongside statues of Washington, Jefferson and Lincoln in the Rotunda, but he added:

"When you see a lunch counter with black and white Americans eating together, then you see his monument. When you see black and white children playing together in a school yard, then you see his monument."

"When you see a bus in Birmingham or a voting booth in Selma, then you see his monument. When you see black Americans and white Americans working together for a better life for all Americans, then you see his monument."

"When you see an act of peaceful protest anywhere in the world today, then you see his monument. And when you see any act of injustice done or any act of injustice thwarted, then you see his monument."

FEC ponders getting tough on PAC rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Election Commission, in a tough interpretation of federal campaign spending rules, signaled Thursday that it may clamp down on use of political action committee money by potential presidential candidates.

Hopeful "testing the waters" for presidential races could not accept any money from such multi-candidate committees for travel or political activity related to their presidential aspirations, under a recommendation from the FEC's legal staff. The staff opinion also would restrict multi-candidate PAC spending for some state steering committees pledged to unannounced candidates.

The six-member commission expects to vote on the staff recommendation next week, and on Thursday appeared in agreement with most of it.

The opinion was a response to questions raised by former Sen. Howard Baker of Tennessee, one of several people eyeing the 1988 GOP presidential nomination.

But any commission decision — which would be the first elaboration of the FEC's July 1, 1983, limitations on testing-the-waters spending — is expected to be closely scrutinized by other PACs.

Several potential presidential candidates have multi-candidate PACs, formed to help elect state and congressional candidates. They generally deny the purpose is to promote a presidential candidacy, but the presidential hopes and are benefiting because they travel the country at PAC expense to help local candidates.

"All these PACs have residual benefits," said Baker's spokesman, David Spear.

Under the staff opinion, such PACs could contribute only the maximum allowable \$5,000 in the early phase for such things as: trips to state or local political functions where the individual mentions his or her possible presidential candidacy during speeches; hospitality receptions or private meetings where the individual's potential candidacy is a focus; and trips to political events by stand-ins who discuss the individual's potential candidacy.

Hostages released

YPSILANTI, Mich. (AP) — Two armed inmates who held three people hostage at knifepoint in a maximum-security prison for about 30 hours released their captives unharmed Thursday and surrendered, authorities said.

The two inmates, who took the hostages at 10:45 a.m. Wednesday, received assurances that they would be transferred from the Huron Valley Men's Facility to federal prisons, said Marvin May, a spokesman for the state Department of Corrections. He would not identify the federal prisons.

The prisoners also were granted interviews with Deputy Corrections Director Dan Bolden, but their demand to meet with the news media was denied.

Weinberger pushes caution

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has an appropriate force in the Mediterranean and could retaliate militarily against terrorist attacks, but it must continue to avoid an "indiscriminate response," Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said Thursday.

Speaking at his first Pentagon news conference in four months, Weinberger repeated assertions by President Reagan that this country has "a good idea as to where some terrorist bases are."

Statements Wednesday by Libyan leader Muammar Kadhafi about his willingness to support Palestinian terrorists merely confirm "what we've been saying right along," he said.

Weinberger added, however, he had no idea whether there is widespread public support for a military strike against Libya and that even if there were, "I think we have a responsibility to take the actions that are effective in deterring future terrorism."

"The important point is to have some clear idea that if any attack seems to be indicated on (terrorist bases) that these are indeed bases that have spawned terrorism that is directed against us. The indiscriminate response is not what anybody is calling for," he said.

A military strike is appropriate "where we could get at them without causing collateral damage; and as you know, collateral damage is the euphemism for how many women and children you kill in your attempt."

But when the occasion is there, the response can be appropriately made, we are capable of doing it and we will do it."

Reagan has accused Libya of supporting the Palestinian terrorist group Black September, which was responsible for the Dec. 27 attacks on the airports in Rome and Vienna that killed 19 people, five of them Americans. The president has imposed economic sanctions on Libya, and Kadhafi has ordered his forces on military alert with claims the United States is planning a military strike.

Weinberger appeared to dismiss such plans Thursday with his discussion of when military force is appropriately used.

Rodeo bulls stage night on the town

TULSA, Okla. (AP) — A dozen bulls sold at auction booted through downtown Tulsa, breaking into a state office building and scaring police officers who joined cowboys to round them up.

One bull smashed a glass door at the state office building across from the Tulsa Convention Center, where performances in the International Finals Rodeo begin Thursday night.

"He even left his calling card out there," said Norma West, an administrative officer with the Department of Human Services.

The bulls fled a loading dock through an open gate Wednesday night, officials said.

The bulls, which had been sold to a Texas contractor at a livestock auction preceding the rodeo, were frightened by their foray into city streets Thursday night, said David Bailey, manager of livestock sales for the rodeo.

Rate of AIDS increase slowed down in 1985

ATLANTA (AP) — More new AIDS cases were reported last year than in 1984, but the rate of increase was not as great as in previous years, the national Centers for Disease Control said Thursday.

The CDC also said cases of the deadly disease have been found to develop as long as seven years after infection with the AIDS virus and that it is possible the disease could remain dormant even longer before surfacing.

The death toll from AIDS continues to rise; the disease has now killed 4,361 people, or 51 percent of its victims in the United States. Since reporting began in 1981, 16,458 cases of acquired immune deficiency syndrome have been reported in this country. Sixty-five percent have occurred among homosexual or bisexual men, with another 8 percent occurring in gay or bisexual men who used injectable drugs; 17 percent occurred in other users of injectable drugs; 2 percent occurred in recipients of blood transfusions or blood products; 1 percent occurred in hemophiliacs; and 1 percent occurred in sexual partners of people with AIDS or at high risk of developing it.

Last year, 8,406 cases were reported, up 84 percent from the year before. But that increase was less than the 115 percent jump from 1983 to 1984 and the 184 percent jump from 1982 to 1983.

Regarded as an apostle

Church founder, 93, dies

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — Herbert W. Armstrong, who used radio, television and magazines to spread the word of his 80,000-member Worldwide Church of God, died Thursday after a life as stormy as his evangelistic fervor. He was 93.

Armstrong died at his Pasadena home, said Earl Reese, who works in the church's legal office.

"At this point I don't really know if there was a specific cause of death," said Reese. "He was 93 years old and had lived a very long and full life."

Armstrong, founder and first pastor general of the church, was regarded by his followers as an apostle of Jesus Christ.

The church received strong financial support that made it a powerful evangelistic organization. The Plain Truth and Quest magazines and hundreds of "The Ambassador Hour" taped television shows are part of the Pasadena-based church's legacy, along with Ambassador College in Pasadena, Church publications and several languages, and the television shows are seen widely in syndication.

The church's television spokesman for many years was Armstrong's son and heir-apparent, Garner Ted Armstrong, until the two had a falling out in 1978. The younger Armstrong has conducted an independent ministry since then.

Joseph K. Tkach, director of church administration for the past six years, was designated earlier this week to follow Armstrong as head of the Pasadena-based church.

Tkach, 59, was appointed deputy pastor general of the church and its affiliated organizations, church attorney Ralph K. Helge said Tuesday.

"I am in a very physically weakened state, enduring severe pain and with virtually no strength whatsoever," Armstrong wrote in a letter announcing his choice to church members.

In recent months, attorneys for the church held court orders requiring the elder Armstrong to give deposition in a libel suit brought by a former church member. The attorneys argued that the church patriarch was physically unable to comply.

In 1978, the elder Armstrong accused his son of trying to put him aside, take over the church and move Ambassador College to Big Sandy, Texas, while turning the Pasadena campus into church headquarters.

Herbert Armstrong was hospitalized from a near-fatal heart attack at the time.

When Garner Ted Armstrong responded by publicly denouncing what he called the church's lavish expenses, Herbert Armstrong punished his son from the church facilities and disowned, or excommunicated, him.

The church's spending practices came under review by the state attorney general's office in 1979, when several former church members joined Garner Ted Armstrong in his allegations that Herbert Armstrong and then-treasurer Stanley Rader had spent \$70 million of church dollars on personal expenses.

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Special room to reunite couple

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — A couple who faced eviction from a nursing home because they wanted to share a bed will instead be permitted to remain there in a private room, officials said.

Gena Willis, 67, and his 86-year-old wife, Marie, had disturbed other people at the Community Nursing Home because they wanted to sleep in the Willis' bed in the room he shared with three other men.

"We'll get them moved in as soon as we can, probably over the weekend," Dillie Myrick, the nursing home administrator, said Thursday.

"It sounds like a mighty good solution to me," said Nathaniel Johnson, the Willis' son.

The home will turn an employee break room into a private bedroom for the couple, said Mendal Kemp of the state Health Care Commission.

"We'll get along fine without the break room," said Blanche Reed, director of nursing at the home.

Three weeks ago, the Willis were asked to find a new home.

Nurses said Willis was calling for his wife in the night, and she joined him in his bed. The home also said the couple violated Health Care Commission regulations by disrupting the health and safety of others.

They moved to the home after their doctor said they could not live at home in Raymond without attendants.

Caroline is the eldest child of Prince Rainier and the late Princess Grace, the former American movie star Grace Kelly who died after a September 1982 automobile accident.

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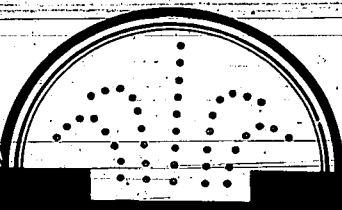
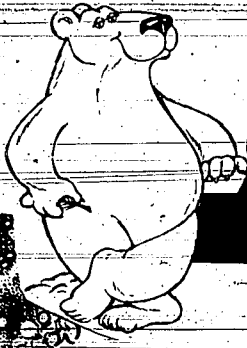
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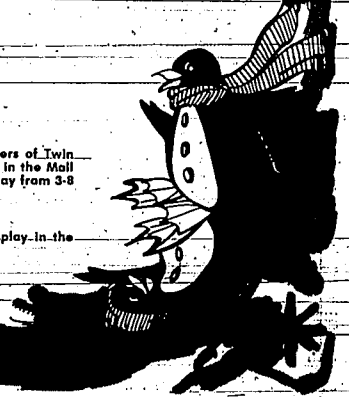
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Storm front brings troublesome rain in valley, snow in hills

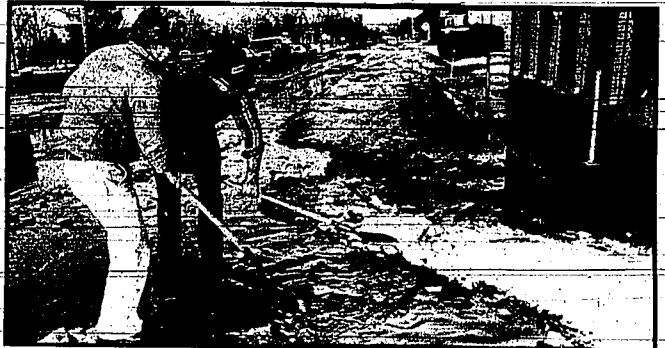

McClure warns deficit plan will hurt

TWIN FALLS — "The process won't be pleasant, but everyone will have to endure budget cuts. If the Gramm-Rudman legislation is expected to work, said Sen. James McClure on Thursday during a Twin Falls-Kiwanis Club meeting and an interview at the meeting.

"If you think we can come to our targets in 1987 without your interests being touched, think again," McClure said. "As a matter of fact, we have got to cut across the board."

The bill, which would gradually reduce the annual federal deficit from the current \$212 billion to zero in five years, is not perfect, McClure said. His first choice would have been to a constitutional amendment requiring a balanced budget. Because the House would not support that amendment, the Gramm-Rudman bill was substituted, McClure said.

"We won't know until a year from now what the exact effects of Gramm-Rudman are. I ask you to do one thing. Don't just let the members of special interest groups respond ... Take some time to make up your own mind and let me know."

"The one thing I regret is that Congress voted to set aside certain things," he said. The result is that more than 60 percent of the federal government's budget is partially or wholly exempt from the cuts.

The legislation's priorities are not right, McClure said. "The Social Security cost-of-living increases exempted," McClure said. "How can we ask the disabled veteran, those on welfare in real need, those on military pensions, to forego increases if even upper-in-

come Social Security recipients receive increases, he asked.

Many of the programs exempt from the cuts are social welfare ones such as Medicaid, Food Stamps and Child Nutrition. Not exempted from cuts are land management departments such as the Bureau of Land Management and Department of Agriculture, which more directly affect the West.

"It's not unusual that resource management should be trimmed," McClure said. Delaying such

management may be wrong, but it is easy for do since effects are not seen immediately, he said.

State and local governments will also be hard hit by the legislation, which would end several federal programs over the next five years, including federal revenue sharing, community development block grants, highway programs and the municipal wastewater treatment plant development. In the first year, Idaho would receive \$9 million less in federal money.

Those cuts will not be popular, but the federal government's obligation is not to support local projects, McClure said. However, he has long been a supporter of revenue sharing, which comes to cities with no strings attached. He would rather see that program retained than categorical grants, he said.

McClure would not stop at domestic cuts, he said. Unlike President Reagan, McClure said, he believes that if taxes are not raised, cuts are not made in military spend-

ing and entitlement programs like Social Security are not touched. Congress is left with too few areas to make too many cuts.

Congress needs to review all budget areas before deciding which should be cut, he said.

Cuts included under Gramm-Rudman as it stands now will touch special interests of everyone in the room, he told Kiwanians Thursday. But in the past Congress has found helping every special interest too easy to do, he said.

"We won't know until a year from now what the exact effects of Gramm-Rudman are," he said. "I ask you to do one thing. Don't just let the members of special interest groups respond ... Take some time to make up your own mind and let me know where cuts should be made."

The total award included \$5,000 to obtain a

new water supply and \$85,000 for emotional distress and inconvenience.

Following the trial, Hill's attorney, Jeff Stoker of Twin Falls, and the company's lawyer, William Parsons of Burley, asked Judge Meehl for a new trial, but for different reasons. Stoker said in his request that he wanted a new trial because he believed there was sufficient evidence to ask a jury for punitive damages. Those are damages meant to punish a party for wrongdoing. See SUGAR on Page B2

countering charges that expanding the amount of wilderness in Idaho would "lock up" valuable resources.

Andrus has wanted to see materials available. Andrus said, "and can do it without an adverse effect on wilderness." Not all land proposed for wilderness is suitable for timber production, "the one-time logger and interior secretary said.

As a native Idahoan who has chosen to stay in the state and enjoy his hunting and fishing, Andrus said he is concerned "with maintaining good wildlife habitat, which is not incompatible with growth."

Those qualities of Idaho that Andrus enjoys can help attract new business, he said. "We have a good people who do quality work," Andrus said, maintaining the governor can be a salesman for new and light industry coming into the state.

Another key element in attracting new business, Andrus said, is education, and one of his concerns is adequate funding for education. "Over-rides are not fair," he said, referring to local elections to approve extra taxes to fund education. "It breeds inequities in school systems statewide."

Andrus favors a "broad-based tax," but declined to discuss specific proposals for "alternately" funding state programs without increasing taxes. "It would be counter-productive to tell them what to do as a candidate," he said. "I don't want credit; I just want it resolved."

He was also reluctant, in an interview with The Times-News, to discuss areas in which Leroy might be vulnerable during the upcoming gubernatorial campaign. "I've never run a negative campaign in my life,"

to have affected mostly junior high and high school students in localized areas, he said.

Doctors in the area have not reported an increase in activity among other groups.

Bur Becker said certain groups of people were at higher risk. It turns out that the one virus is influenza A, high-risk patients include people with cancer, respiratory or cardiac problems or diabetes patients, she said. Influenza causes headaches, fever and "sometimes severe complications," she said. "In patients, could lead to pneumonia, and in some cases, death, she said.

to punish the company for alleged long-term negligence. At the first trial, it didn't allow the jury to rule on punitive damages.

Parsons cited in his motion for a new trial several grounds, including a claim that the evidence didn't justify the excessive award of \$85,000 to Hill.

Parsons also claimed there was a misapprehension by the court of the Statute of Limitations and errors in the admission of some exhibits and some jury instructions.

Parsons asked that the jury award which totaled \$93,000 after costs of the litigation and interest were added — be set aside and a new trial granted.

A hearing on the motions for a new trial was held on Dec. 9.

In his opinion, Mechi stated that a new trial should be granted only on the issue of damages. Without evidence of real physical injury, damages can't be collected for emotional distress — unless the case involves intentional injury by the company. But there was no evidence of intentional injury.

The jury, Mechi added, wasn't properly instructed on the issues of emotional distress and damages.

Parsons said a new jury will be selected for the new trial. He added that he was partly pleased with the judge's ruling.

Stoker, who now is serving as a representative in the State Legislature, couldn't be reached for comment.

No date has been set for the second trial.

Keeping diary may help fight stress

SALT LAKE CITY, Utah (AP) — If you're under a lot of stress, a diary may help you cope with the problem, says Dr. Glen M. Leonard, a historian and director of the Museum of Church History and Art in Salt Lake City.

"Diaries can be therapeutic, a way for people to unload their problems and get them out of their minds," he explains. "In the past 100 years, with the advent of psychology, you find more people keeping diaries as a type of therapy. They put their thoughts on paper, which helps them discover what's troubling them."

A lot of teen-agers, travelers and people with a historical or genealogical interest keep diaries. Their reasons vary, says Leonard. "Some people keep a diary to unload their problems, and others keep a diary with the idea that someday it's going to be published and the world will know them. But I think most diaries are kept as a historical record, an aid to memory, to help you remember the events that are

important to you. Then you can go back to it in a few years and see what you were doing and feeling."

"A diary keeper for the past 25 years, Leonard has found many reasons for riling down his feelings. "Basically, I enjoy it. It's a release to sit down and just talk to myself through my writing," he says. "Another reason is, it's an aid to memory. Sometimes I go back to a diary to verify a date or event."

"Diaries also provide a good historical record for your children, grandchildren and historians. And they let you see how you've changed over the years, which all of us do."

How does a person go about keeping a diary? It doesn't need to be hard work, Leonard says.

"Computers make diary-keeping much easier these days," he says. "It's much quicker to type a daily or weekly entry on a computer

than to write it out in longhand. Some people tape-record their diary entries. In fact, some business people dictate a journal entry, then have a secretary transcribe it for them."

"The important thing to remember is to get your thoughts on paper, not just trivial details like what the weather is that day. The National Weather Bureau keeps track of that."

A diary can be a way to explore your feelings about political situations or world events, elections, and happenings in your own life or in your community, Leonard points out.

"When people write about these events, they're usually revealing more about themselves than they are about the event they're describing," he adds.

After deciding what to write about, the writer needs to make sure that what he or she is writing about will last.

The chances are that the teacher will not remember you because you have changed a great deal since you were a student.

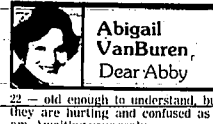
I have had at least 10,000 students in my classes in the four or five old schoolteachers a break.

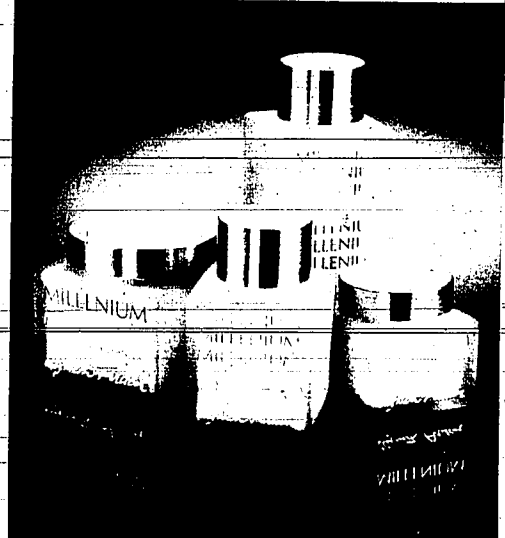

Record number tries arbitration

NEW YORK (AP) — Tim Raines of the Montreal Expos said Thursday he is closer to signing a contract than he was at the same time last year, when he went on to win the largest salary ever awarded in an arbitration hearing.

Raines is among a record 159 players who filed this year to go to salary arbitration, a process which allows an impartial judge to pick between what the club offers and what a player asks. All but four of those players filed on the final day, beating the midnight Wednesday deadline.

"I feel the same as I did last year," Raines said in a telephone interview from his Miami area home.

"No matter what goes on, I think anyone likes to go to arbitration."

"I'd like to sign a long-term contract, but I don't think the Expos

are coming to agreement with the terms we want," Raines said.

Last February, Raines won a 1985 salary of \$1.2 million. The club had offered \$1 million.

Raines reportedly is asking for a five-year contract similar to the \$8.6 million deal that Itelkey Henderson signed with the New York Yankees in December, 1984.

The Expos have said they would not meet such a demand.

The 26-year-old Raines was among several top-name players on the long list. Others included 1985 Cy Young winner Dwight Gooden of the New York Mets, American League Cy Young winner Bert Babin of the Kansas City Royals, AL Most Valuable Player Don Mattingly of the New York Yankees and AL batting champion Wade Boggs of the Boston Red Sox. Boggs went to ar-

bitration last year, winning a \$1 million salary, the highest ever in the American League.

John Tudor, who had a 21-8 record for the St. Louis Cardinals, also filed as did Fernando Valenzuela of the Los Angeles Dodgers.

Last year, a record 99 players filed for arbitration, but only 13 actually went to hearings. Clubs are allowed to negotiate with players until the hearing dates, which will be determined in about a week. This year's hearings will be held between Feb. 3-20. All salary awards are for one year.

Players must have two full years of major league service to file; in 1986, the length of service goes to three years.

Week 2 and it's getting late for BSU, Vandal cagers

Two Big Sky Conference basketball teams in a rut and another on cloud nine will see if their fortunes continue in the second weekend of the league's basketball season, which starts tonight.

Boise State will visit Idaho Saturday for a contest between two ballclubs burned badly on the road in their first two conference games. Tonight, Idaho State will carry its 2-0 Big Sky mark into Boxer Mountain to see if it can handle Montana State with the same ease with which it disposed of the Broncos and Vandals at home last week. The Bengals will move on to Missoula, Mont., Saturday night to take on Montana.

Boise State, now 5-9 for the season, and Idaho, now 6-9, had a rough time in Pocatello and in Ogden, Utah, last weekend. The Broncos were blown out by 24 points by Idaho State and only a late-game offensive surge kept Idaho from being embarrassed in Pocatello as well. Both teams lost to Weber State, but played better.

"We had a lot of problems against Idaho State, and some of them we corrected the next night against Weber," says BSU Coach Bobby Dye. "Really, it looked like two different



winning streak."

Idaho's great strength heretofore — its shooting touch — failed last weekend. The Vandals, who before the start of the conference season had been the only Big Sky team to average better than 50 percent in field goal percentage, hit only 40 percent against Weber State and 38 percent against Idaho State. Idaho ranks sixth in the Big Sky in both scoring defense and scoring offense, and fifth in rebounding, even though sophomores guard Ken Luckett is fifth in the Big Sky in scoring with a 17.7-point average, and senior forward Tom Stalick ranks third in rebounding with 7.6 boards per game.

Dye says the Vandals aren't exactly a different team without junior guard Jif Spears. Idaho's leading scorer a year ago who is being reshirted because of a foot injury. But Idaho is at a different offensive team, he says.

"They have any number of people who can score, and that makes it difficult. Their center (JC transfer Brian Coleman) is off to a good start, and Stalick is having a fine year on the boards and can score 15 to 17 points a night for them. Our junior point guard, Chris Garey, is playing well and (senior guard Matt) Haskins has always had good games against us."

For Boise State's part, the Broncos are coming off what Dye says was his team's best defensive effort of the season against Weber State. The Broncos limited the Wildcats to just eight field goals and outrebounded Weber as well, although they lost 45-38.

"We responded to what happened to us very well," says Dye. "I think that's the important thing."

BSU is ranked third in the conference in scoring defense, giving up an average of 64.8 points a game, but the Broncos are struggling in other areas. They rank dead last in the Big Sky in scoring offense, seventh in field goal shooting and seventh in rebounding. Boise State has two scorers in double figures, senior forward Kelvin Rawlins (11.2) and freshman point guard Chris Childs (11.0). Childs ranks second in the Big Sky in steals, while Rawlins in the No. 4 rebounder with a 7.3-board average.

Playoff time is 8:30 p.m. MST in the Kibbie Dome.

In Bozeman tonight, Idaho State will see if last weekend was a fluke.

"Not only are the Bengals tied with Weber State and Northern Arizona for the lead at 8-9, but was the Bengals' season on this year. Idaho State leads the league in defense (59.4 points) and ranks fourth in rebounding. And at 9-5, ISU

is off to its best start in five years.

"I'm very appreciative and I feel very humble about leading the league," says first-year Bengal Coach Jim Boutin. "But I'm also realistic. We opened with two teams we can legitimately compete against and we had them at home, which in the Big Sky Conference is worth 10 to 15 points."

The Bengals' who haven't won at Montana State since 1983 or at Montana since 1977, haven't been a good road team since Jim Killingsworth's Big Sky championship team of 1976-77. But Boutin thinks these Bengals can play on the road.

"I was convinced a long time ago that if you play good defense you can win on the road," Boutin says. "Last week on Monday (Portland) and Saturday (Idaho) we did not play well offensively, but our defense kept us in those games. When the jump shot isn't dropping, you can stay in the game on defense."

Idaho State will encounter two very different types of teams this weekend. Montana State, which ranks second in the conference in scoring offense and last in defense, practices the run-and-gun style that was the Bengals' strength this year. Montana led by All-American candidate Larry Kristowick, wins with defense and power.

"We'll have problems defensively matching up with Idaho State," says Montana State Coach Stu Starnes, whose ballclub is 4-9 for the season and winless in two Big Sky games. "We need to have players until the occasion and we'll need help containing (ISU junior forward Don) Holston, who is one of the premier players in the Big Sky Conference. We have trouble at home with Rob Harden and at Northern Arizona with Andy Hurd, two of the other premier players in the league, and Holston presents the same kind of problems."

Gooding ranks fourth in the Big Sky in scoring with an 18.2-point average, while teammate Dave Danforth, a 6-8 junior center, is averaging 11.3 points and is eighth in the Big Sky in rebounding.

"I look for a very physical game," says Montana Coach Mike Montgomery, whose team is 11-5 for the season and 1-1 in the Big Sky. "Idaho State concedes nothing to you. It takes a lot of courage to get a shot off inside. They're playing aggressively and they're winning a lot of ballgames. Nothing much was expected of them this season, so they're playing hard and having a lot of fun."

Game time is 7:30 p.m., both nights.

Intangibles lead Maxwell club to give Bell trophy to Payton

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Chicago Bears running back Walter Payton was awarded the Maxwell Club's 1985 Bert Bell Trophy as the National Football League's Player of the Year Thursday not only for his outstanding running ability but for his leadership.

I've accomplished and the notoriety that has come from it, and I don't have any regrets about it. That's the way life is," Payton said in a telephone hookup from Chicago.

Maxwell Club President Francis Bagnell said "intangibles" led the club to choose Payton for the 27th annual award, named for a former NFL commissioner.

"He is truly the heart of that team and leads by example, giving his best every single time he steps on the field," Bagnell said.

Payton confessed, however, he felt overlooked at one time in his career.

"Coming up during those lean years when I was having pretty good years and the team wasn't doing that well, a lot of times I felt left out or slighted. But as I've gotten older and as I've matured, those things don't tend to bother me."

The 34-year-old Payton was the unanimous choice in a field that included running backs Marcus Allen of the Los Angeles Raiders, Roger Craig of the San Francisco 49ers and Eric Dickerson of the Los Angeles Rams.

Payton, the all-time leading rusher in NFL history, helped the Bears win the National Conference championship and earn their first Super Bowl appearance Jan. 26 against the New England Patriots.

Payton, who has been banging his body against NFL defenses since he was drafted by the Bears on the first round out of Jackson State in 1975, attributes his longevity to two related factors.

"Basically it's two things and one can't exist without the other. First, there is mind concentration and the discipline and the way that you think. Then there is keeping that desire inside you and working diligently for it. And that includes conditioning in the off-season."

He averaged 4.8 yards per carry while gaining 1,551 yards on 324 attempts, including nine touchdowns. He also caught 49 passes for 487 yards and two scores.

"It was interesting to note that in the history of the Bert Bell award, no player has been among the finalists for consideration more than Walter Payton. His consistency and durability are truly amazing attributes," Bagnell said.

Payton said he will continue playing as long as he feels he is able to contribute.

"I don't want to be one to linger around just for being there. In other words, I want to be able to carry my own weight," he said.

Payton said he felt no bitterness about being a perennial runner-up until this year.

"I look back over my career and the things that

In the build-up to the Jan. 26 Super Bowl, national newspapers have begun carrying regular game reports, plus player and team profiles.

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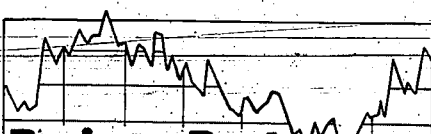

Credit center site chosen

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — AT&T will locate a \$6 million credit management center in suburban Salt Lake City that could employ 700 people within two years, company officials say.

The new center will be located in a 91,500-square-foot building at 5925 College Drive in the 22nd Office Park in Murray. AT&T officials said.

It is one of five centers the company wants to establish across the country to keep track of long-distance billing.

The Murray center will handle 16 million residence and business accounts in 11 states: Utah, Washington, Oregon, California, Nevada, Arizona, Montana, Idaho, Wyoming, New Mexico and Colorado.

Of the 700 employees AT&T expects to hire by 1988, half will be hired by mid-1987, said Steven Simmons, an AT&T division manager.

Iomega plans second plant

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Iomega Corp. plans to build its second Utah manufacturing plant somewhere in the greater Salt Lake area, adding up to 500 jobs to the state's economy.

The Roy-based computer company was lobbied heavily by state economic development officials and legislators to remain within the state where it has grown from a startup company to a major supplier of data storage for desk-top computers.

Company president Gabriel P. Fusco said a vigorous effort by lawmakers and state officials was instrumental in the decision to build the new plant in Utah.

The new research and manufacturing center is scheduled to open sometime during the third quarter of 1986, producing cartridges and Iomega's Bernoulli Box subsystem. Fusco said a major service facility also is planned.

Ford recalls 42,000 vans

DETRIT (AP) — Ford Motor Co. is recalling 42,000 1986-model Aerostar minivans for inspection of structural welds in the under-bodies, the automaker said Thursday.

The welds will have reinforcements installed, because field reports have shown that some standard welds may separate, reducing steering response, Ford said.

No accidents or injuries have been reported because of the defect, said John King, senior engineering manager of Ford Parts and Service Division.

About 30,000 of the vehicles are owned by individual consumers, while another 12,000 are in dealer stock, Ford said.

The reinforcements will be installed at no cost to customers, and the company will provide loan vehicles to customers whose Aerostars have to be kept overnight, the automaker said.

Of the vehicles affected, all 1986 models built through Dec. 5, 38,800 are in the United States, 2,900 in Canada and 200 in other places, Ford said.

M-K to build auto terminal

BOISE (AP) — Morrison-Knudsen Co. has been awarded a contract for the initial construction of a terminal for imported automobiles at the Los Angeles Harbor.

The City Harbor Commissioners chose the M-K Construction Division for the \$10 million project, which will involve demolition of several buildings, construction of a 4,000-foot-of-railroad-track, and reconstruction of the wharf. The terminal is designed to accept the transfer of import cars from cargo ships and is scheduled for completion late this year.

Utah in running for mint

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Salt Lake City area is one of 11 sites throughout the West chosen as candidates for a new satellite currency printing facility of the Bureau of Engraving and Printing, officials say.

A statement from Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, said the senator has tried to persuade federal officials to locate the mint in Utah "because of the solid employment opportunities it will offer."

The facility will be used to produce postage stamps, U.S. currency, federal securities and other documents.

Lowan heads Farm Bureau

ATLANTA (AP) — Iowa hog farmer Dean Kleckner was elected Thursday to head the nation's largest farm organization and said American farmers must "sell to the world" to overcome their worst economic slump since the Great Depression.

Kleckner, who succeeds Bob Delano as president of the 3.4 million-member American Farm Bureau Federation, pledged to continue the bureau's efforts to improve farm income.

The 380 voting delegates at the bureau's 67th annual meeting elected Kleckner from a field of seven candidates, including South Carolinian Harry Bell, who was picked for the vice presidency. Delano, a Virginia farmer, had been president of the bureau for six years.

At a news conference following his victory, Kleckner said the United States has to do a better job of selling its agricultural products overseas.

"Sell, sell, sell. That's got to be our motto from now on," said the 53-year-old resident of Rudd,

Iowa. "There's a segment in American agriculture now that says we can't compete because our costs are too high, that the rest of the world is subsidizing. That is simply not true. We've got to sell to the world."

The election of officers came on the final day of a five-day meeting that focused on economic issues such as tax reform, exports and farm credit.

Calling credit one of the real needs of agriculture today, Kleckner said he would support efforts to hold a national farm credit conference to assist private banks holding excess farm debts. Rural bank failures were highest last year than any time since the Depression in the 1930s, he noted.

"There's no lack of money," he advised farmers. "You've just got to be able to prove you can pay it back."

Kleckner, who headed the Iowa Farm Bureau for 10 years, runs a 600-acre farm that produces hogs, soybeans and corn.

"Everything we do should be geared toward improving net farm income," he said.

Bell, who operates a 1,400-acre farm near Ward, S.C., said he was "looking forward to his vice-presidential duties and expects to travel widely representing the Farm Bureau."

One by one, the delegates approved 200 resolutions that will govern the group's 1986 policies, covering issues ranging from abortion to national defense.

A key resolution approved Wednesday calls for a review of U.S. grain standards.

A bureau grain specialist, Dean Brown, said the resolution was a response to complaints from overseas buyers about "dirty" American grain.

He said two grain studies already are planned: one by an industry group and the other by the U.S. Office of Technology Assessment. Brown said the goal is to find solutions acceptable to the entire industry and to make changes voluntarily rather than by legislative action.

Airline, computer issues lead advance

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market closed with a rush of buying Thursday to post its second straight gain.

Airline and computer stocks turned in stand-out performances in a fairly active session.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials jumped 14.34 to 1,541.63, bringing its gain for the past two sessions to 22.59 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange reached 130.6 million shares, against 122.42 million Wednesday.

Analysts said some pleasant surprises among the first of the current crop of quarterly earnings reports had perked up investors' spirits.

They also said the market, and transportation stocks in particular, benefited from notable price declines in petroleum futures markets.

The latest gains came without much support from the credit markets, where prices and interest rates were mixed. Views of the future interest rate have been changing rapidly and often in the past several days.

Computer stocks were strong for the second straight day. Digital Equipment, which reported better-than-expected quarterly earnings on Wednesday, climbed 4 1/2 to 146.

International Business Machines, which is expected to issue an upbeat earnings report today, rose 3/8 to 156.

Among the airlines, which would stand to benefit from lower fuel prices, AMR picked up 2 1/4 to 44 1/2, UAL 3/8 to 52, and Delta Air Lines 2 1/4 to 90.

In the energy sector, by contrast, Exxon dropped 1 1/2 to 52 1/2; Amoco 1/4 to 61 1/2; Chevron 3/4 to 35 1/2; and Mobil 1/4 to 30 3/4.

ASA gained 1/4 to 40 1/2, and Homestake Mining 3/4 to 26 1/2 in the precious metals group. The price of gold reached an 18-month high in world markets Thursday, rising \$7.50 an ounce to \$356.60 on the Commodity Exchange in New York.

Revised-issued in secondary stocks helped carry the NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market up 1.02 to 7 new closing high of 330.01, surpassing the previous peak reached on Jan. 7.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, advances outnumbered declines by nearly 3 to 2. The exchange's composite index added 30 to 120.02.

Factory-built homes turning up all over

With increasing frequency, homes going up in new housing developments around the country are being built in factories in components.

Then they are assembled, erected on-site — and once completed, they look like any conventionally made house.

But since you, a potential buyer, do not have the chance to inspect the material and workmanship that go into a factory-built house, how can you be assured you are getting a house that is well made?

The factory method of home construction is becoming more and more the conventional way to build a house. By the end of the century, fully one-quarter of new homes in the United States will be built in factories and assembled on-site, says the National Association of Home Builders.

In a recent year, 13 percent or 154,000 of the 1,143,000 homes constructed in the U.S. were factory built.

This trend makes you, an everyday home buyer, extremely dependent on the integrity of the builder, says Charles E. Peck, chairman of the Ryland Corp., a major producer of pre-built homes. Unless you are well informed about the building business and you have the



time to watch every stage of construction, you're basically in the hands of the builder.

Reducing the cost of a house by as much as 10 percent through factory methods is one benefit of plant production; Peck states but just as much a factor is the scarcity of skilled labor in the construction trades outside the big metropolitan centers. Homes that require little finishing on-site are a logical part of this scenario. Factory construction methods help assure precision in carrying out design details.

In the home construction business, a factory-built or manufactured home refers to three types of dwellings:

- Panelized homes are made of pre-built panels usually measuring 8 feet high, 3 to 4 inches thick, and 20 to 30 feet long. Panelized homes are the most prevalent type of manufacture.

tured homes, accounting for 74,000 of 154,000 factory-built homes.

• Modular houses account for 5 percent completed when they leave the factory. Most of the time, they consist of two halves, which are joined at the site.

• Precut houses are built on site from lumber cut to size at the factory and shipped in unassembled packages.

• Conventionally built homes are frequently referred to as stick-built homes in the trade.

If you're a consumer considering the purchase of a manufactured home, follow these guidelines offered by the National Association of Homebuilders:

- 1) Make certain the company you deal with has a clearly defined policy of service and guarantees.
- 2) In the event of structural defects, be sure your builder is backed by recognized firms such as Homeowner's Warranty Co. to compensate you.
- 3) While the makers of factory-built homes often offer mortgage financing and home insurance in their packages, you are not obligated to accept the offers. You are free to shop around for the best deal.
- 4) Panelized homes range in price

from \$50,000 to about \$200,000 including land. Often land is the most expensive single part.

- 5) Do not buy a house from a catalog. Reputable home manufacturers always have models on-site so you can see how a particular house is designed and inspect the quality of workmanship and materials.
- 6) Most factory-built homes are put down on developed tracts of land that already include paved roads, utilities, schools and swimming pools — giving the appearance of having come up overnight.

But the houses actually are the final version of a series of cost-conscious factors. As Peck observes, "Factory methods of building homes allow a contractor to make homes in greater numbers and to a predetermined standard."

In contrast to a conventionally built home, a beam meant to be 144 inches long comes out exactly that length and not a quarter of an inch longer or shorter. And nails are precisely where they should be.

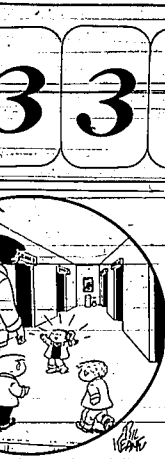

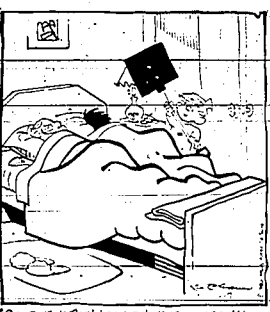

South won his heart ace and immediately started diamonds. East discarded on the second round, and all hopes were gone. South's maximum was now seven tricks and the game fell two short.

Any novice can count nine winners if diamonds break 3-2. Not as apparent are the extra chances that North had.

Four of the winners are within reach, not only when the suit is 3-2 but also when East holds a singleton eight or nine. South should begin the suit by leading his 10, intending to let it ride.

West tells to cover. West says "No" to his jack, dummy's ace wins and South now leads a second diamond to his own six. If West wins, a finesse to dummy's seven brings in the suit. If West ducks, king and another diamond establish the suit with the heart king providing the vital entry.

ANSWER: Two hearts-A shade too strong for the simple raise to two spades.

Winterfest Ski resort throws flurry of fun

KETCHUM — Ice sculptures, an ethnic food fair, dancing and cross-country racing are among the events scheduled to make the second annual Winterfest enjoyable for everyone. The Sun Valley/Ketchum Chamber of Commerce is sponsoring this event, which runs Jan. 24-26, in hopes it will attract Idaho residents to view the ice sculptures and promote interest in the resort cities, said chamber director Wendy Jaquet.

To kick off the festivities, an in-town cross-country ski race will be held Jan. 24 at 7 p.m. This "fun" race will begin at Gemini Art on Main Street and circle the block up Fifth Street and leadville, to Sixth Street down to Main and back to Gemini Art.

A \$5 entry fee can be paid at the race and awards will be given to top finishers.

Over 20 contractors have signed up to design and construct ice sculptures throughout Ketchum and Sun Valley. Last year's Winterfest saw only seven ice sculptures, but with a greater lead time to formulate plans and enthusiasm generated by Sun Valley's 50th anniversary, Jaquet said the number has tripled this year.

Awards of \$250, \$150 and \$100 will be given for first-, second- and third-place prizes in each of the

commercial and non-profit categories. Both first-place winners will receive a trophy, and a perpetual trophy will be given to the Ketchum City Hall.

Awards will be given on Jan. 24 at 8 p.m. at Lincingway Elementary School following the ethnic food fair. The food fair begins at 6 p.m., with a \$1 admission charge for adults and no charge for children. Tickets for Italian, Chinese, Greek, Spanish and American foods and sweets can be purchased for 25 cents each and no entrance will cost more than \$1. Proceeds from the fair will go toward the purchase of equipment for the school.

During the food fair, a swing dance performance will be presented by the Idaho High Country Western Singers.

Later that evening, the big-band sound can be danced to in the Lighthouse Room of the Sun Valley Inn. Gil-Hogbustros Swing of Swing Band from Boise will perform from 9 p.m. to 12:30 a.m. for a \$5 admission charge.

In addition, a slide series on South American climbing will be presented by Cerro Torre Patagonia at 7 p.m. at the Mollie Scott Clinic in Sun Valley.

On Saturday, people can spend the day viewing ice sculptures, taking in the Idaho Folk Art Exhibit at the Sun Valley Center Gallery or watch top Intermountain junior ski racers compete on Bald Mountain.

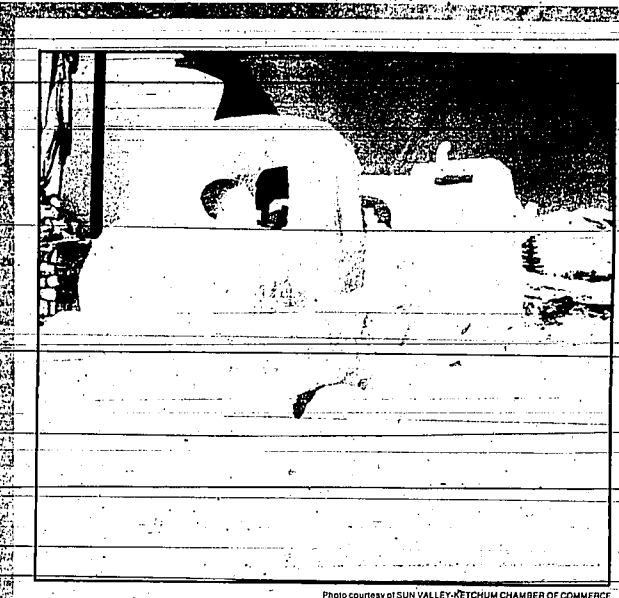

KMVT-TV moves to new location

TWIN FALLS — KMVT-TV's weekend newscasts will disappear from local television screens this Saturday and Sunday. The station also may broadcast an minute or so of dead air occasionally, officials say.

KMVT is packing up its electronic equipment and moving across town to its new, \$2.5 million studios this weekend, said General Manager Lee Wagner.

The station will stay on the air the entire weekend, but viewers may notice minor changes in service because of the move, he said.

Normal weekend newscasts have been canceled because electronic equipment will not be available.

There will be no Saturday or Sunday newscasts, but our regular newscasts should resume on Monday, said Penny Main, KMVT community affairs director.

KMVT's normal schedule of net work programs will not be affected. Those broadcasts will be controlled from the station's transmitter in Jerome, instead of local studios.

The temporary arrangements could cause other short interruptions in service, Wagner said. "The only noticeable change may be during commercial breaks," he said. Technical problems in filling them precisely with local commercials could cause brief periods with nothing on the air, he said.

KMVT purchased the former Sierra Life Insurance Co. headquarters at 1100 Blue Lakes Blvd. North to enlarge its operations. The station also is donating its current studios at Elizabeth Boulevard and Eastland Drive to the city for use as a senior citizens center.

Folk art of Idaho shows common roots

Exhibit includes old, current examples

KETCHUM — In a world structured by rapidly changing technologies and mass-produced goods, finding a thriving folk art that represents a community's traditions seems difficult.

The Idaho Commission on the Arts, however, took on the task in the summer of 1983 when three folklorists combed the state to document as many living folklorists as possible.

From that search comes a traveling show of the works of past and present folk-artists of Idaho now on exhibit at the Sun Valley Center Gallery in Ketchum, the eighth visit, on a two-year, 10-city tour of the state. The exhibit runs through Feb. 26 before moving to Idaho Falls.

The exhibit includes traditional works by Idaho's native Indian tribes as well as the work of white settlers. For both people, the work reflects the economies and values that make up their culture. The exhibit, "Folk Art of Idaho: We Came To Where We Were Supposed To Be," also includes current artists who carry on the traditions.

The exhibit's title comes from an oral history account of the Shoshone-Palutle tribes' original encounter with Idaho after having come from the south and west of their traditional home, says State Folklorist Steve Siporin in the introduction to a 100-page book covering the artwork in the exhibit.

In telling the story of the tribes first reaching Idaho, one man said: "We traveled until we came to where we were supposed to be."

Because Idaho is among the last areas settled by Western pioneers and youngest states, Siporin says, the Shoshone statement applies to the white settlers as well as their Native American predecessors.

"We still remember that we came from elsewhere, but we belong here now," Siporin writes.

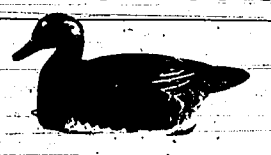
More than anything else, folk art reflects the cultural values of a community because its source comes from within the community.

Through folk art, "the vital act of cultural transmission takes place," Siporin says. "Passed between talented individuals and nurtured within communities, such traditions continue; they are the models and the methods passed between generations."

"Since folk art is performed for, used by or consumed by members of the community, it must reflect that community's values and aesthetic tastes. The community defines what is appropriate and beautiful as well as what is not," Siporin writes.

The three folklorists who searched the state in 1983 found folk communities throughout Idaho, each with a common bond — geography, religion, occupation and ethnic backgrounds — that holds them together.

They found the folk communities among the

Shoshone and Palutle tribes of the Duck Valley Indian Reservation in southern Idaho, the packtrails in the Owyhee country, the loggers and sawmill workers of central Idaho and the Mormon communities of southeastern Idaho.

All have in common "an individual vision shared by a group" that passes from one generation to the next either through a master-apprentice or parent-child relationship.

The Arts Commission divided the exhibit into four areas of peoples' lives where folk traditions and folk art emerge:

- "Beauty at Home," a section that includes Shoshone-Palutle baskets, and the braided rugs and quilts of later settlers.
- "Working the Land" includes saddles, horseshair bridles and branding irons.
- "The Whimsy and Recreation" and "Ceremony and Celebration" sections include whittled tools and chairs, tied fishing flies and Palutles'.

Choreographer under fire for 'A Chorus Line'

LOS-ANGELES — The life of gypsies, those fine-tuned chorus dancers, requires unending hope in the face of life's disappointments. No one knows that better than the gypsy-turned-choreographer Jeffrey Hornaday.

"Flashdance" made him the hottest choreographer in movies. Now he is being hailed — and jeered — for his dances in the film version of "A Chorus Line," Broadway's longest running show.

Reviews have been surprisingly harsh—Sheila Benson in the Los Angeles Times lamented the loss of Michael Bennett's "crisp, elegant" choreography "for the stamp of Jeffrey Hornaday, who perpetrated the 'Flashdance' crudities."

On the morning the Benson review appeared, Hornaday was interviewed at his hill-hugging house above the Sunset Strip. Surrounded by banks of sound mixers and synthesizers in his music room, he seemed undismayed by the bad reviews.

"I'm hurt," he said. But he added cheerfully: "What really matters is the validity of the New York dancers. I was anxious to see how the gypsies would respond to the film, and we invited everyone from the dance companies and studios and choruses."

"I expected a reserved audience, because New Yorkers are that way. But they responded with cheers and applause. It was like the crowd at a football game!"

Jeffrey Hornaday at 29 has managed to retain his boyish op-

timism despite the show biz slings and arrows. Inspired by the movie "Cabaret," he started dancing in his home "San Jose, Calif.," and arrived in Hollywood at the nadir of his career early in the '70s.

"I was assisting the choreographer for a lounge show in Las Vegas on Christmas Eve," he recalled. "The only time we had access to the stage was after the previous show was over, and we rehearsed until 6 in the morning."

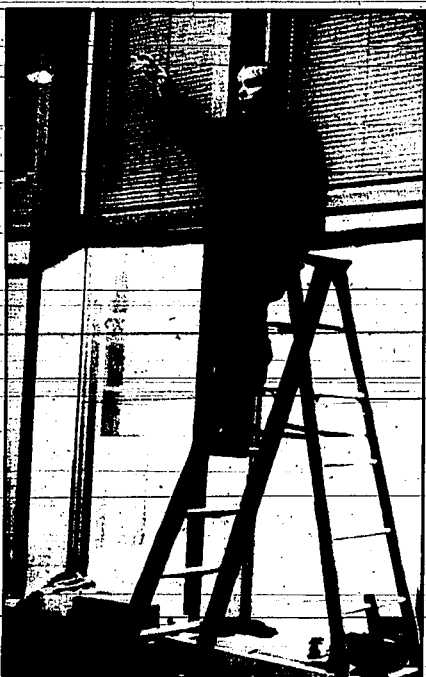
"I remember walking through the casino on Christmas morning and seeing the little old ladies feeding quarters into the slot machines—from paper bags—thought to myself, '... This is show business!'"

He spent a few years in Mexico, directing rock videos with visits to Hollywood to dance in TV specials and films such as "The Best Little Whorehouse in Texas." His break came when he devised the numbers for "Flashdance."

"But even after I did the movie, I had to take a job in the chorus for a Sheena Easton TV special," he said with a smile.

Videos with Paul McCartney and Michael Jackson helped Hornaday escape from the chorus forever, and he became a logical candidate to reshape the "Chorus Line" numbers for the predominantly young movie audience.

"It was an intimidating assignment," he said in an interview, "because I was working so much in the shadow of the original. I decided not to listen to the recording of the original music, which would make me self-conscious. Instead, I worked with an ac-

complished pianist and an excellent drummer, and together we reinvented the score."

Hornaday also felt that the 10-year-old score needed refurbishing, and two new songs were added. Among them was "Surprise, Surprise," which started out at 2 1/2 minutes and grew to almost eight minutes. The number is the hit of the movie and epitomizes Hornaday's aesthetic style.

"Choreography is an evolving form, and it often reflects what is happening in the country," he said. "People in general have more physical awareness today. It's reflected in aerobics and jogging and health habits that allow us to embrace our own physicality."

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Japanese print craft may be dying

TOKYO — The prints that depicted the "floating world" of pleasure-seeking society, featuring geisha with their lovers and haunting fireflies, are vanishing as Japanese absorb Western culture and alter their living patterns.

Ukiyo-e, the traditional woodblock prints popular in 17th and 18th century Japan with their scenes of Edo, the old Tokyo, faces a decline that could herald the extinction of its craftsman.

Saburo Shimmi has made woodblock prints for 55 years, but has no one to succeed him in his studio. "Almost no one wants to become a pre-empting craftsman because it takes at least 10 years to master the skills," he said. "After that, financially stable and rewarding jobs are hard to find."

Shimmi, a short, graying man, 73 with salt-and-pepper hair, rolls ukiyo prints off inked woodblocks in a large tatami-mat room in his Tokyo home.

"I entered this work at the age of 18 when my artisan-uncle asked me if I was interested in learning printing skills from him," he recalled in an interview.

He had at least seven apprentices before World War II, but all died in battle. The only one after the war never completed his training. Shimmi's son, his last hope to take over his studio, eventually chose a different career, after serving as an apprentice for 10 years.

Developed from ancient Japanese brush paintings, ukiyo-e influenced such Western impressionist painters as Claude Monet, Vincent Van Gogh and Edvard Munch.

Among the most famous works are Hokusai's 36 views of Mt. Fuji including the well-known Fuji

framed by a "huge wave," and Utamaro's portraits of celebrated beauties.

At the height of its popularity, ukiyo prints sold widely as low-priced decorations, souvenir portraits of actors or cheap gifts for courtesans. Painters, engravers and printers cooperated in a three-step process to mass-produce such prints.

Ukiyo experts say the craft began its decline in the late 19th century as Japanese started adopting Western culture and technology, including such art techniques as photography and machine printing.

Daiwa Shinagawa, publisher of a directory of traditional woodblock craftsmen, estimates that about 40 carvers and 100 printers still carry on the ukiyo tradition, about one-fourth the number 10 years ago.

Ukiyo prints are not only traditional ukiyo but other designs, such as adaptations from paintings, or prints with modern themes.

The quality of their techniques is deteriorating, said Shinagawa, who claims only one-tenth truly understand the art form and produce master works.

"Without systematic government support, the craft will die out completely by the next century," he said.

Niyonaka Torii, whose family has preserved the Torii style of ukiyo-e painting for nine generations, still paints about six billboards a month for kabuki performances, the type of work that helped her family survive as the only existing school of ukiyo-e.

Mrs. Torii, 47, the present master of the Torii style, said the art won't support the number of artists it once did, although her originals sell in one gallery in

Tokyo for \$225 alongside reproductions of old ukiyo masters which sell for about \$50.

"There used to be many theaters to stage kabuki plays where young painters who acquired skills under my late father found jobs easily," Mrs. Torii said. Only six playhouses in Japan now show kabuki performances.

Foreign appreciation of ukiyo-e, however, is increasing, according to reports. Ukiyo-e was not something that Japanese

regarded," said Mrs. Torii. "I've heard that traders in olden days would wrap valuable vases in ukiyo-e and ship them overseas. When the gifts were unwrapped, the wrapping paper impressed foreigners with the vases."

When Shimmi demonstrated his woodblock printing skills at the Boston Museum of Fine Arts in 1980, one American was so impressed she returned every day to see him.

"Foreigners seem more interested in ukiyo-e than Japanese," he said.

Nelson was drug user, former wife claimed

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Rick Nelson had a "severe" drug problem and "constantly" takes cocaine, Quaaludes and many other drugs, the singer's former wife said in divorce papers filed Thursday.

The documents, filed by Kristin Harmon, Nelson's attorney during divorce proceedings, also contend the singer and former television star often "lived parties" at his home where drugs were taken.

The issue of Nelson and drugs surfaced in a Washington Post report Wednesday. The Post quoted federal investigators as saying the New Year's Eve airplane crash that killed Nelson, his fiancée and five others may have resulted from a cabin fire ignited by "free-basing" cocaine.

Nelson's friends and manager stated that the singer's former fiancée used and specifically that the cocaine is mixed with solvents to purify the drug, which is allowed to dry and then smoked.

"It is all totally 100 percent false," Barbara Reinecke, the Nelson family's attorney, said Thursday. "It's somebody's malicious attempt to blacken his image."

In Texas, as Nelson and his band traveled from Alabama to a concert in Dallas. The pilot and co-pilot survived.

Autopsies determined that Nelson, in his 27-year-old fiancée, Helen Blair, four band members and a sound man died of smoke inhalation and burns.

The Post quoted unidentified sources as saying preliminary reports indicate Nelson's body contained a measurable level of cocaine not absorbed into his system when he died.

The National Transportation Safety Board has not received any victims' toxicological reports, which would indicate the presence of drugs of alcohol, said NTSB spokesman Ira Furman.

Stumpius, who cut the singer's hair monthly for the last year, called the free-basing reports "a bunch of crap."

Another friend, Lynn Upton, wife of former Nelson band member Pat Upton, said she and her husband never saw Nelson use drugs.

Nelson's manager, Greg McDonald, vehemently denied the Post story, saying Nelson and his fiancée were asleep when the fire broke out.

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Northern Mexicans dance to many drummers

MONTREY, Mexico (AP) — A crowd of young music-fans at the plush video bar Heaven watches Bruce Springsteen strut his stuff with the hit song, "Born in the U.S.A."

Formally attired waiters serve drinks as Madonna, Phill Collins, Sade, Rod Stewart, Santana, Stevie Wonder and the Eurythmics follow Springsteen on a video screen. It's nonstop rock. The crowd loves it, but not everyone understands the lyrics.

American music is popular throughout Mexico, and is even in vogue in Monterrey, a 2 1/2-hour drive from the Texas border at Laredo.

Monterrey music buffs can view three music video programs a day that offer the latest American and British releases. Those with satellite antennas in the wealthy suburbs get nonstop MTV. Radio listeners have an assortment of English-language

rock and record stores are full of the most popular releases.

"We're very close to the United States so the influence is inevitable," said Edgardo Rosendig, a local television cultural commentator.

"These influences are giving us a new music culture. We have to learn to live within this cultural mix."

"We're more Americanized here in the north than people from Mexico City. We have more access to the new records and videos because we can go to the United States."

Yet the bombardment of American music, which began in the 1960s, has not eclipsed the popularity of most styles of music from Mexico and other countries.

Sergeant Peppers, a Monterrey disc jockey, said the popularity of discs in cities near the U.S. border, offer something "for every" music

lover. Disc jockeys spin lively "salsa" or "cumbia" melodies and patrons switch easily from rock to the Latin dances they learned as children.

In other nightclubs, people listen to the wondrous flute and acoustic guitar melodies of South American-inspired folk songs or they watch live bands sing renditions of songs by such popular Mexican and Latin singers as Emmanuel, Juan Gabriel, Jose Jose and Ruben Blades.

The popular national TV program, "Siempre en Domingo," features Latin entertainers singing live on Sundays for 2 1/2 hours.

Mexicans were listening to the Spanish romantic singer Julio Iglesias long before duets with Willie Nelson and Diana Ross helped launch his career in the United States.

And some Mexican bands, including Tazze from Monterrey, Ken

ny Los Electricos from Mexico City and the Clips from Guadalajara, are bringing their own version of rock music to this country.

Still, there is growing concern that the traditional music of the "rancheras" and "corridos" is losing out to the influence of so-called modern music.

At last summer's Symposium on the History of Northern Border Music in Monterrey, one of the first topics discussed was the penetration of American music in the North.

MOMA gets gift

NEW YORK (AP) — The Museum of Modern Art recently announced the gift of 11 masterworks from the estate of the late William A. M. Burden, a collector, philanthropist and longtime member of the museum's board of trustees.

The works range from major paintings by Claude Monet and Georges Seurat through important sculptures by Jean Arp and Constantin Brancusi.

An official said the bequest "is one of the greatest gifts the museum has ever received."

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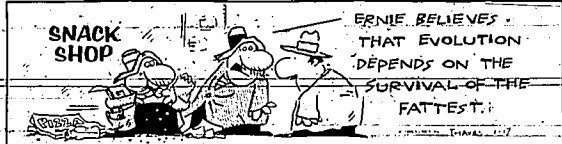
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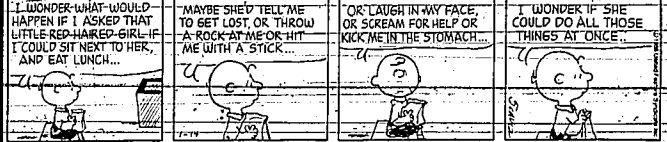
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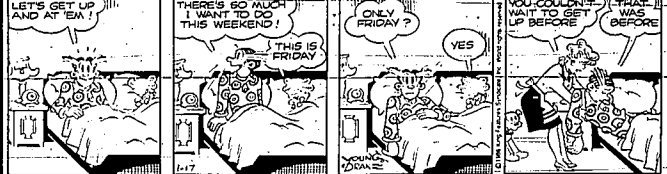

'Black Moon Rising' just campy

Tommy Lee Jones does his best with poor supporting cast

The "Black Moon" in the title of the new action movie, "Black Moon Rising," is an automobile. Not just any automobile, but the futuristic prototype of a "jet car" which, like the P.E.C.'s chargin', runs on hydrogen distilled from water and reaches speeds of 350 miles per hour.

If necessary, it also will leap tall buildings in a single bound.

Alas, the movie itself, which stars Tommy Lee Jones as a professional thief working for the government, is nowhere near as quick and capable as the supervehicle for which it is named. Despite aspirations to be a slick, high-tech thriller, "Black Moon Rising" works in the standard low-budget fashion, piling Jones' character, Quint, against a ring of master criminals led by an idly malcontent mastermind named Ryland (Robert Vaughn).

If this low-budget adventure succeeds at all, it does so as "campy," throwaway entertainment. Director Harley Colless presents his clichés so doggone seriously, you tend to laugh at the picture as much as you laugh with it.

And it does have some funny asides, thanks mostly to the nonchalant machismo displayed by Quint as he tracks down some tax files he swiped from a large corporation at the behest of the attorney general, who wants to use them as evidence in an upcoming trial. In the ensuing commotion, Quint hides the files in the Black Moon while fighting off some hired thugs, and the prototype is stolen before he can retrieve them.

For the most part, the film works in the limited terms of a routine made-for-television movie. The unimaginative editing never lets scenes develop to their fullest, and the pacing splutters as Quint and the hickish Texan owners of the Black Moon plan to penetrate the downtown fortress where Ryland's gang "processes" stolen cars for resale. The picture alternates some vague statement about how stealing for the government is no better than stealing for yourself, but it never scratches the surface of that theme.

The story line gets no more sophisticated than an expanded episode of "Mission: Impossible"; its idea of hip technology and contemporary casting is video voyeurism as Ryland's electronic surveillance seems to ex-

tend everywhere — and the novelty of a female car thief (Linda Hamilton, the heroine from "The Terminator") who leaves skidmarks on Quint's heart. Curiously enough, the major flaw is lack of action. Once the Black Moon is stolen and locked up, it seems to take forever to get the picture back on the fast track. Apparently, the small budget dictated that the special effects be limited to racing through empty city streets at night. And there is not much of that, either.

Except for the cinematic slant at the film's end, from which the picture apparently gets its full name, there is nothing very original to hold our interest.

As Quint Jones ("Coal-Miner's Daughter," "The Executioner's Song") has a humorous attitude and does his charismatic best with what he has to work with, but the supporting casting is weak and uninspired.

Vaughn has played the cold villain so often that every close-up of his reptilian features drew laughs from the audience at a recent screening. In the end, it is difficult to take seriously any film in which Bubba Smith, who plays a federal agent, represents Uncle Sam.

'Rambo' sets records in videocassette sales

NEW YORK (AP) — The videocassette of the film "Rambo: First Blood Part II" has demolished records in the home video business.

On the first day it went on sale, the movie drew orders for 425,000 cassettes priced at \$79.95 each, the tape's marketer, EMI-Thorn, said Tuesday. Those orders had a total wholesale value of \$21.44 million.

No other videocassette costing \$79.95 has ever reached that sales level on its opening day, the company said.

The videocassette of the movie "Ghostbusters" previously held the first-day sales record, with sales of just over 400,000 cassettes, EMI-Thorn said.

Industry officials say opening-day orders provide a key reading on demand for a videocassette.



Hey America! Boy George meets Mr. T

LOS ANGELES — It is at moments like this that one wonders if this is something of a grown person who can count to 11 without taking off his shoes should be doing.

I am sitting in a conference room with about 80 television writers. We are waiting for Boy George. He is late.

Boy George, as everybody knows, is not a network programmer or even a star in a nonfiction series. We are waiting for a press conference to begin in which Boy George will talk about a mainly non-speaking guest appearance he will make in the Feb. 11 episode of "The A-Team."

Some people in the room are excited about this.

Someone in a group of publicists standing behind me is saying excitedly, "He was here. Yeah, he was in the hotel. But then the paparazzi, all over the place, and E.T. (the "Entertainment Tonight" cameras and crew). I don't know where he went. I don't know where he went."

When Boy George arrives it is with an entourage, including members of his band, Culture Club. They are ushered into director's chairs on a stage at the front of the room. They sit in front of a large black enamel backdrop covered with big color pictures of all the NBC stars surrounded by stage and dressing-room lights. The biggest picture is that of Boy George.

He is wearing for this press conference what he will later describe as a French-designer men's dress. His hair is greased and spiked. His lipstick is a very bright red. On his feet are black clog-bottom shoes, which he will also later explain he is wearing in honor of one of his favorite American television shows, "The Munsters."

Are you bored?
Hang on. In about 35 minutes, Mr. T is going to make a surprise appearance. He will be wearing a camouflage outfit, a mass of gold chains, Ray-ban sunglasses and a wrestling champion's belt with a gold buckle big enough to hold a turkey.

Mr. T will tell the reporters how much he likes Boy George ("because he does his own thing, like me"), how much he hates "their questions and that they are basically scum."

The reporters, who have been acting as if this were a presidential press conference, will get angry and ask why he does not like them.

Mr. T will say, "Because I don't light up. This is me. You want light, go out on Hollywood Boulevard and get yourself some wimp."

Boy George, as you might have guessed, will say nothing very important. He will use the word "artist" a lot to refer to himself. He will make sly jokes about his sexuality and strike a campy pose each time he does it.

He did start one answer with, "You have no idea how much America has changed in the last four years." That caught my interest, because after a few unintelligible words, I thought he said something about fascism. He repeated it for me. The word he had actually used was fashion. His point was that Madonna's style of dressing and America's acceptance of it was something a profound and revolutionary thing. I did not get a chance to ask him if he had ever seen James Joplin on a good day.

That was as deep as it got. That does not mean that all of this was not important. At first, I thought it was important because I had cut short an interview I had arranged on my own with one of America's finest TV documentary makers, Bill Couturie, to come to this. We were talking about "Vietnam Requiem," which he made five years ago for ABC. It was one of the pieces that started the revisionist thinking in this country about the need to acknowledge and accept Vietnam veterans as both heroic and, in some cases, troubled. He also made the documentary on the Diebold family. It too appeared on ABC after Henry Winkler championed it all the way to an Oscar.

My first thought on the importance of the Boy George conference was that it showed how TV reporters and the networks set their agenda

and, in effect, decide what our readers should know about TV. In America's social conscience, I was giving you Boy George's footwear.

Statistics say poem is Shakespeare's

A statistical analysis based on every word in the writings of William Shakespeare supports the claim that a recently found love poem attributed to him is genuine.

Thursday, The untitled poem was found late last year by Gary Taylor, a 32-year-old researcher from Topoka, Kan., buried in a book in the Bodleian Library at Oxford University.

The find touched off a lively literary debate over whether Shakespeare actually wrote the poem because of what some scholars consider its poor quality as poetry and other anomalies.

Enter statistics. Ten years ago, two statisticians, Brad Efron of Stanford University and Ron Thisted of the

University of Chicago, analyzed the frequency of word usages in Shakespeare. They published their results in the journal Biometrika in an article titled, "How Many Words Does Shakespeare Know?"

The entire body of Shakespeare's known work contains 884,647 words. Of those, 14,376 different words are used exactly just once; 4,343 are used exactly twice; 2,292 are used exactly three times and so forth. It is possible statistically, based on a frequency distribution of this kind, to predict how many new words should appear in a new work, based on its length. (More about that later.)

After the 350-year-old poem was found, the two put the poem to the test.

The work contains a total of 430 words.

The Muppets may be turning 30, but their humor remains fresh

It is blasphemy! A whole hour retrospective of 30 years of the Muppets—featuring only three tiny scenes: AVECMOH!

That's what Miss Piggy, the self-involved (not to mention self-declared) superstar of the Muppets would snort as her personal review of "The Muppets: A Celebration of 30 Years," airing Tuesday on CBS. But Miss Piggy is only one of the hundreds of puppets created by Jim Henson since he began his professional career on a local Washington, D.C., TV station as a college freshman three decades ago.

This one-hour special documents the meteoric rise of Henson's Muppets, who themselves have become the real superstars, ascending to every medium—from television to movies to records to the spinoff toy industry. "We're bigger than The Beatles," Miss Piggy might snarl.

The special's 30 years worth of clips offer viewers an opportunity to see Henson's No. 1 Muppet, Kermit the Frog (whose voice has always been Henson's), evolve from an embryo-looking tadpole on Henson's first show, "Sam-and-Friends," to today's Muppet palerfamilias. The self-deprecating humor that has become Kermit's trademark is evident from Henson's very first show. Even as viewers watch Henson develop new Muppets over the years, all of their personalities seem to constantly be based on the same type of silly yet gentle humor. It is a far cry from the simplistic humor that dominates Saturday-morning children's television.

As many mothers and fathers can attest, The Muppets appeal to more than just kids. That intergenerational appeal might be one explanation for the Muppets' popularity explosion. After appearances on such shows as "The Jimmy Dean Show" and "The Ed Sullivan Show," Henson's puppets endeared themselves to an entire generation in 1969 when they became (and remain to this day) the residents of PBS's "Sesame Street." Henson's creatures were showcased on "The Muppet Show" from 1977-81. Then came movies of their own ("The Muppet Movie," "The Great Muppet Caper," "The Muppets Take Manhattan") and two current (yet sophisticated) Saturday morning cartoon shows: "Mup-

pet Babies" and "Little Muppet Monsters." Not to mention hit singles, a magazine, books, towels and sheets. Only Kermit for President can be next.

If so, with its plethora of clips, "The Muppets: A Celebration of 30 Years" would be an excellent campaign biography of both Kermit and his followers. And the show is presented much like a political fund-

raiser, its more than 200 tuxedoed and bowgowned Muppets attending a gala dinner. The Muppet all-stars—Kermit, Fozzie Bear, Rolf, Bert, Ernie, and Miss Piggy—are seated at the dais. At the conclusion, Henson, the only human present (if only for that segment) is presented with the mile-long check. With the dynasty he's lovingly created over the last 30 years, Henson can well afford it.

A: Woody and Mia are frequenters of several Chinese restaurants around New York City, and they invariably request a quiet table at the rear of the restaurant in order to remain inconspicuous. Q: I've read numerous references to an actor named Phillip Bosco in which he's always referred to as the world's greatest undiscovered star. Is this an inside joke of some sort?

A: That's considered by many to be an accurate assessment. A professional actor for over 25 years, Bosco has continually garnered awards and raves, both on and off Broadway, in such productions as "Come Back, Little Sheba," "Heartbreak House" and "The Caline Mutiny." Though his film credits include "The Pope of Greenwich Village," "Trading Places" and "Heaven Help Us," stardom has somehow eluded him. Happily, Bosco has now been given his first starring screen role and billing in "Flanagan," co-starring Geraldine Page. It's about a 53-year-old New York cabbie who's an aspiring Shakespearean actor; it's a success story of self-realization. Bosco says of previous raves and early critical response for his emulating "Philly" delights me to see the good acceptance as far as I'm concerned. It's long overdue!

CLAY FEET: One of the biggest macho stars in movieland has his secret fears just like the rest of us. I hear he's scared to death of heights, would rather not attend meetings in offices on high floors, and doesn't love elevators.

Q: I keep wondering if Roger Moore will star in another James Bond movie. My friend says he will, but I say he won't. — H.V.

A: You are right. Or, at least, it seems that way. Roger told me just a while ago that he's finally had it with the part. He says his decision is definite, positive, and irrevocable. Roger is 56, and has starred as Bond in seven flicks over 12 years. Critics remarked that in the last flick, "A View to a Kill," Moore looked obviously too old as 007. Anyway, Moore (who recently underwent painful knee surgery) says he's eager to take on other film assignments. Now we'll have to find out who the "new" James Bond will be. I'll keep you posted.

DOMESTIC STAR: A legendary screen team (who were also real-life lovers) each projected an image of extreme forcefulness. Ironically, in their bizarre private relationship,

Q: I've followed Kristy McNichol's career since she was a little girl — growing up on "Family" on TV. Will she ever do another series? — F.C.

A: That would be hard to say, but she has none planned at the present time that we know of. But you'll soon be able to enjoy the talented Ms. McNichol in a new motion picture, "Dream Lover." She portrays a young girl frightened by repeated nightmare fantasies — and turns in what previewers are calling her best performance yet.

Q: I was awed by the full-scale Chinatown set constructed for the movie "Year of the Dragon," a definite tribute to Hollywood realism. Is this the first time such an ambitious true-to-life set has been re-created for a movie? — L.N.

A: Producer Sam Goldwyn commissioned a replica of Times Square of equal magnitude for his screen version of the musical "Guys and Dolls." Critics then carped that the "Guys and Dolls" set was far too fanciful, and didn't resemble the original Times Square closely enough! Conversely, some movie reviewers have criticized the "Year of the Dragon" set as being too slavishly literal a facsimile of New York's Chinatown (right down to the last spot mark and crack in the sidewalk).

Q: I remember the brouhaha when actress Sylvia Miles deliberately dumped a dish of pasta on drama critic John Simon's head at a bash because she didn't relish the things he'd written about her. Are Miles' party manners still so impulsive? — D.K.

A: Sylvia Miles is still worth watching. I ran into her at a recent

shindig, and noted that she positioned herself at a table in a section adjacent to the buffet spread. This way, whenever she craved added nourishment she didn't have to walk over to the buffet like everyone else. Sylvia had only to swivel around in her chair, reach behind her and choose.

Q: While rummaging through a memorabilia shop, I came across a lobby card for a 1930s movie titled "The Gamblers," starring Errol Flynn, Edward G. Robinson, Bette Davis and Basil Rathbone. Since I've never heard of this film, can you please advise me of any plans to show it on TV or the late show? — T.N.

A: Don't hold your breath. That movie was announced by Warner Bros. as being among its forthcoming product for the year 1938, but it never came to fruition; hang onto your lobby card, because it's a genuine collector's item! Incidentally, several other projects officially announced for that same year by this studio were Kay Francis and Mirlam Hopkins in "The Sisters" (which ultimately starred Bette Davis and Anita Louise); Bette Davis in "Valley of the Giants" (replaced by Claire Trevor); and Paul Muni in "Panama Canal," which was scratched altogether.

Q: You can rave all you like about Don Johnson of "Miami Vice" but for money, the sexiest leading man on TV is Jeff Wincott, the star of the detective series "Night Heat." Does Jeff have the same sense of humor off-camera that he displays while performing? — E.K.

A: In spades. Every now and then, to alleviate the inevitable strain

that comes with late night filming, Jeff cuts up on the set; sometimes (but not always) to the amusement of all the cast and crew. Recently, he was slated to make his entrance in a highly dramatic fight scene set in a bar. As cameras rolled, Jeff barged through the door wearing a red fright wig, pin curlers, and electrical tape "eyebrows." The cast cracked up, but the director of that particular episode was most definitely not amused.

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Sunday-movie strategy brings CBS second straight ratings win

NEW YORK — CBS, trailing NBC by 2½ ratings points after six nights, rallied to win the weekly ratings race when its new "Sunday Night Movie" made a spectacular debut, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

After checking Saturday night's Nielsen results, researchers at both CBS and NBC figured NBC would win the week by close to a full ratings point, but the powerful performance of "Rockabye," starring Valerie Bertinelli, fooled the experts and gave CBS successive weekly wins for the first time this season.

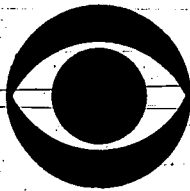
CBS finished the week of Jan. 6-12 with an average rating of 18.0, while NBC, led by another record-setting performance from the No. 1 "Cosby Show," had a 17.9. ABC, with only "Who's the Boss?" in the Top 10, averaged a 14.0.

A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.

After 16 weeks of the 30-week prime-time season, NBC leads with a 17.6 rating to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 15.2.

CBS, with third-rated "Murder, She Wrote" gaining its highest audience ever and "60 Minutes" taking the fifth spot, averaged a 25.9 rating for the four hours of prime time Sunday, marking the second best ratings night this season. Ogly Game 7 of the World Series did better. "Rockabye" ranked fourth for the week with a 25.3 rating, the third best movie performance this season.

"It was a very good start to their new strategy," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice-president for research projects, referring to replacing "Crazy Like A Fox" and "Trapper John, M.D." with CBS' third night of



prime-time movies. "The battle is really joined for the second half of the season."

"A lot of things fell into place, and the main thing was Sunday," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director. "We knew we would do well, but we did better than imagined in winning by almost 12 ratings points." Eisenberg also predicted a very close ratings competition in the winter and spring.

"Rockabye," about a mother's search for her kidnapped child, benefited from CBS' popular lead-in programs and the other networks' repeat films. Part 1 of NBC's "Fatal Vision" ranked 61st and ABC's "Diamonds Are Forever" was 41st out of 68 shows.

"The Cosby Show" was the week's runaway leader again with a 36.9 rating, the highest regular series result since a 1980 "Dallas" episode. NBC's "Family Ties" was second, followed by "Murder, She Wrote" and "Rockabye." "60 Minutes" and NBC's "Cheers" tied for fifth and NBC's two Miami series, "Miami Vice" and "Golden Girls," tied for seventh. Then came ABC's "Who's the Boss?" and NBC's "Highway to Heaven."

CBS' "Dallas," last season's No. 2 show, was 11th and "Dynasty," the top-ranked show for 1984-85, fell to 17th, apparently hurt by NBC's new "Blackie's Magic," which had its first Wednesday outing and ranked 19th.

Brandon Stoddard, president of ABC-Entertainment, said recently that "Dynasty" had become mired in a lackluster storyline, and the show's producers were working on correcting the problem. The "Dynasty" spinoff, "The Colbys," dropped to 52nd, its worst performance so far.

"Crazy Like A Fox," replaced by the "CBS Sunday Night Movie," begins its Wednesday run against "Dynasty" and "Blackie's Magic" this week. CBS' other major Wednesday hopeful, "Mary," ranked 43rd, one week after it had cracked the Top 20 when it opposed college football bowl games on ABC and NBC.

"We still would like to see better numbers from 'Mary,'" said Eisenberg. "This Wednesday will be the first normal night for all three networks, and we're interested in how 'Crazy Like A Fox' does against 'Blackie's Magic.' That's the key."

Last week, ABC's new Friday night series, "He's the Mayor," had a poor debut, ranking 59th.

The bottom five programs, in descending order, included ABC's "Ripley's Believe It or Not," in 64th, ABC's "Lady Blue," CBS' "Bugs Bunny: An American Hero," ABC's "The Fall Guy" and ABC's "Shadow Chasers."

In the evening news competition, the "CBS Evening News" was first with a 14.4 rating. The "NBC Nightly News" averaged a 12.5. ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 12.3.

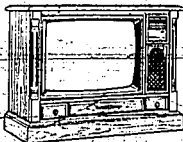

George Burns, famous friends gather to mark his 90th birthday

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — He's not quite 90, but comedian George Burns celebrated his birthday ahead of time with a little help from his show business friends, including Ronald Reagan.

Seated in a Wilshire Theatre box surrounded by a gaggle of glamour girls, Burns smiled broadly last week as a parade of celebrities praised him amid affectionate barbs during "The George Burns 90th Birthday Special," to be broadcast Friday night on CBS.

"OK, so I'm 90, but I'm still here," he said at the show's climax. "After hearing all those compliments, I'm beginning to wonder."

Jack Lemmon, Carol Channing, Milton Berle, Red Buttons, Bob Hope and Rich Little were among the stars represented by film clips. The onstage entertainers were Ann-Margret, Diahann Carroll, Billy Crystal, John Denver, Walter Matthau and emcee John Forsythe.

Burns was introduced in a message from his former Beverly Hills neighbor, President Reagan. Reagan cited Burns' beginnings with the Peewee Quartet at the age of 7 and added: "Eighty-three years of sustained popularity — it's unheard of, especially in a business that makes politics seem secure."

In his stand-up routine, Burns remarked: "People keep asking me when am I going to retire. Retire? I'm going to star in show business until I'm the only one left. I can't retire. Who would support my mother and father?"

TELETHON CONTINUES

Donna Reed remembered for her roles — and as a troublemaker

LOS ANGELES — During 45 years as an actress, Donna Reed played many roles, from hooker to homemaker. But in life she remained the same: an intelligent, outspoken woman who practiced the Protestant work ethic she had learned on the farm in Denison, Iowa.

Miss Reed died Tuesday of pancreatic cancer at age 64.

Today's generation knows her as the loving wife of Jimmy Stewart in Frank Capra's much-repeated "It's a Wonderful Life" and as J.R. Ewing's mother for a season, at least, on television's "Dallas."

Their parents remember her as the ever-sympathetic Donna Stone, wife of a pediatrician and mother of a growing family in the "The Donna Reed Show," which enthralled Americans from 1958 to 1966.

Before that, she was a film actress, mostly in the role of an understanding wife, although she won the supporting-actress Oscar in 1953 as the prostitute Alma in "From Here to Eternity."

Noted for her portrayals of the middle-American woman, Miss Reed surprised her fans by becoming one of the earliest opponents of the Vietnam War. In 1967, she took a strong role in a group called Another Mother for Peace.

She commented: "I love my country, but I feel it got off the track. This is my way of helping it find its way back."

Despite her serenely beautiful looks, Donna Reed earned a reputation as a troublemaker from the beginning of her career within the Hollywood studio system. She complained to her boss, Louis B. Mayer at MGM, about being cast as Mickey Rooney's sweetheart in Andy Hardy movies.

Her complaints only got her exiled with loan-outs to Paramount for films co-starring with Alan Ladd. She had no better luck at Columbia until she was cast as the prostitute in "From Here to Eternity."

The director, Fred Zinnemann, had hoped to cast Julie Harris in the role and agreed to Miss Reed only when Columbia boss Harry Cohn intervened.

After winning an Oscar for her performance, Miss Reed infuriated Cohn by refusing low-budget movies. He relegated her to Westerns.

She finally won her release and

achieved her biggest fame with "The Donna Reed Show."

Miss Reed was an early advocate of women's rights. She enraged directors by calling most of them incompetents who "hated women, which is why they make their female characters as unpleasant as possible."

Discussing her later activism against the Vietnam War and nuclear power plants, she remarked: "I'm not really a leader of causes. Some people think that I have been active in women's lib. I haven't. But perhaps I have contributed to the

movement by urging women to speak out on matters that concern them."

Her last role saw her cast in CBS-TV's immensely popular prime-time soap opera "Dallas" in the role vacated by the ailing Barbara Bel Geddes. When Miss Bel Geddes recovered from her heart ailment, the show's producers returned her to the role and summarily dumped Donna Reed.

Characteristically, Miss Reed sued for the money she felt was due her — and won.

NBC sees prospects for its own 24-hour news channel dimming

NEW YORK — NBC's plans to start its own 24-hour cable news operation seem to have been dashed by limited subscriber support, the president of NBC News said last week.

"I don't want to preclude the possibility and I don't want to mislead anybody, either," Lawrence K. Grossman said in an interview. "But the odds are against us at this point."

Last summer, when NBC announced its desire to compete against Ted Turner's Cable News Network, NBC said it would need a minimum of 13 million subscribers to go ahead with the venture. NBC imposed a Jan. 31 deadline for the necessary sign-ups. Grossman said it now was unlikely that NBC would get them in time.

Grossman said NBC is considering other options to get into the cable news business, but he would not disclose specifics. Last month, NBC's negotiations with Turner to purchase half of CNN broke down when Turner would not relinquish editorial control, which was an NBC condition.

"We hope to be in (cable) one way or another," said Grossman. "It's clear that cable news is here to stay. If you want to run a leading news organization, it's an important field to be in. The costs of gathering news are enormous and escalating, and we're always looking for more outlets to better amortize our costs."

Grossman said NBC had received commitments, mainly verbal, from cable systems totalling significantly more than 2 million subscribers. Some cable operators had welcomed a second-all-news service as a means of keeping a lid on CNN's charges.

NBC's 13 million subscriber target reflects the minimum audience needed for ratings services to calculate viewership. Any NBC cable news operation would be supported by advertising and by fees from cable systems. Advertisers, seeking to know the reach of their product messages, likely would only sign up if ratings were available.

Grossman said that NBC would not extend its Jan. 31 deadline nor lower its self-imposed minimum for subscriber commitments. "We have to keep to a business plan," he said, adding that failed cable services, including another 24-hour news ser-

vice, Satellite News Channel, suffered from over-extending themselves.

Prospects for NBC's cable venture grew dimmer when Tele-Communications Inc. the nation's largest cable operator with nearly 4 million subscribers, declined to commit to NBC and remained with CNN. Grossman said TCI asked for a


reduced rate, but NBC's position was that there not be any discounts or preferential deals.

Late last month, General Electric announced it would pay \$5.28 billion to acquire RCA, NBC's parent company. Grossman said that the pending purchase did not have any bearing on NBC's cable plans or negotiations.


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
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
