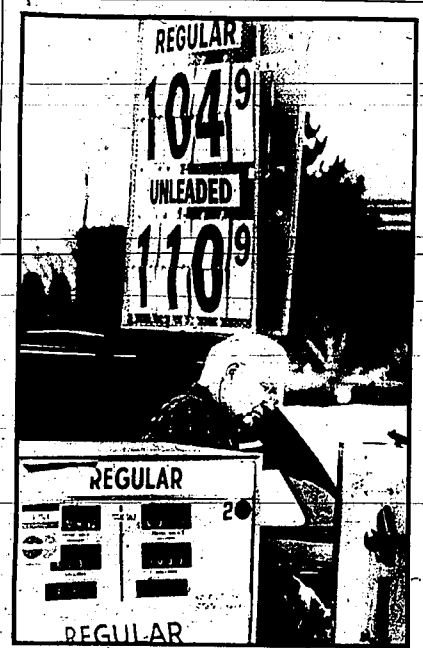

At Twin Falls stations Prices fluctuate in new gas war

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls gas stations are in the middle of a price war, with prices fluctuating according to the strategy of station managers.

"Prices can change each day," said Jim Lynch of Mr. Gas. "I changed my price twice today."

Mr. Gas opened Thursday with \$1.17 per gallon for regular gas, then lowered it to \$1.05. But when other stations raised their prices, Mr. Gas followed.

"There's a kind of cat-and-mouse game," said Lynch. "In the heat of a gas war, we do a lot of sign-watching-and-follow-the-market trends."

Gordon Thomas of Sam Thomas Chevron, operating with regular gas at \$1.17 Thursday afternoon, was not surprised at the fast-changing prices and felt it would continue.

"I'm not surprised at all," he said. "I'm sure prices will be lowered again, depending on the gas war."

Thomas also felt that more stations were entering the gas war to remain competitive.

"Most of them (the other stations) know what's going on, and in typical fashion they'll react to what's happening — they have to," he said.

Lynch felt that the major cause of the price war was new gas stations.

"When a new station comes in, they do what I call 'fixing their muscles,'" he said. "They'll come in with a low price and if we don't match that then we lose our business to them. Then, when the stations realize that they can't make any money at the low price, somebody goes back up and the rest of us follow."

Lynch said that a few recent new stations had caused the present gas war but declined to mention any names. "I don't want to get in any more trouble than I already am," he said.

While Lynch said that prices could be lowered again in the next few days, Gary Wignall of Phillips 66 on Kimberly Road felt that war made prices too unpredictable.

"Predicting what might happen is like trying to predict the price of beans. It's just changes all the time," he said.

Wignall agreed that a low price makes it most impossible for a station to make any money.

"I'm going broke," he joked. "It's impossible to stay at a low price very long; you just can't pay your customers to do business with you."

Some stations have refused to enter the pricing war, instead deciding to depend on steady customers rather than customers looking for a cheaper price.

"I'm staying at \$1.21," said Jerry Gassen, owner of Jerry's 66. "Business has been good; but if I change my prices over and over, I might lose my customers."

Despite a recent slump, Donald Christian of Don's Service felt that changing his price would not affect his business.

"Business is terrible," he said. "But I don't foresee any price change."

Cutter finds fuselage section

Investigators focus on films of Challenger's rocket boosters

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — A Coast Guard cutter on Thursday found a large piece of debris believed to be the fuselage of the space shuttle Challenger.

The ship said parts of the cockpit appear to be floating on the Atlantic Ocean.

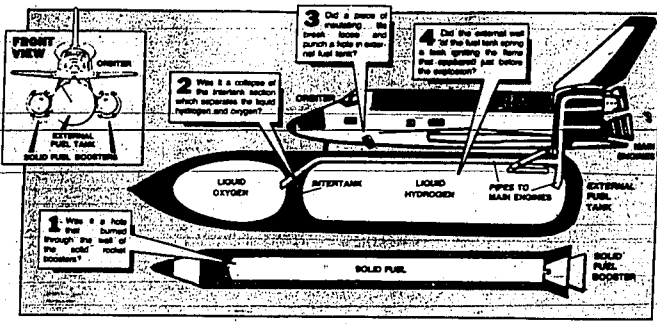
The fuselage is the central body portion of the shuttle. A Coast Guard spokesman reported, "They said it looked like everything they had to get it up there on the cutter, so it must be fairly large."

With the first major find aboard, the cutter Dallas returned quickly to port.

NASA divers were on the scene and prepared to go down 140 feet where sonar indicated a substantial piece of the Challenger lay.

An investigating board spent the day checking TV tapes of the liftoff taken from different angles and NBC said the focus was on one of the solid rocket boosters.

Reporter Jay Barbee said a frame-by-frame study of the film seen by the public seemed to indicate that a splice between two of the booster's four segments sprang a leak and "served like a blowtorch and burned through the tank — a 6,000 degree blow torch."



—A source, speaking on condition he not be identified, told The Associated Press that "this is one piece of evidence — they're looking at it, but there is nothing conclusive."

Earlier, NASA had expanded its search for shuttle debris, dispatching six Navy ships to probe the Dallas reported finding "a large missile graveyard of the world."

Crews recovered thousands of pounds of debris, including one of the shuttle's control panels.

Experts were also examining a piece of bone which was washed up on a beach and was found by a private citizen.

At a news conference Thursday evening, Lt. Cmdr. Jim Simpson of the Coast Guard said the cutter Dallas reported finding "a large piece" and that there appeared to be parts of the cockpit on the surface.

Asked whether there was any sign of the bodies of the seven astronauts who died in Challenger when it exploded on Tuesday, NASA spokesman Hugh Harris said, "No."

Simpson would not give the location of the sighting, but said it was far offshore.

"They had multiple sonar hits in it," he said.

NASA may not use kids' money for new shuttle

Adults looking for some way to remember the seven who died aboard the shuttle on Tuesday, are setting up scholarship funds to train teachers and a trust fund to care for the children of the astronauts.

Students in Bath, N.Y., are collecting pennies for a new shuttle.

Space—Rebuild The Spirit" program started Wednesday, and officials there received calls from schools in California, Virginia and Pennsylvania asking to be included.

"We were thinking what can we do to uplift the spirits," Miss Gregory said Thursday.

In Gillette, Wyo., Missy McPhillips, 9, and her brother, John, 10, had suggested that the nation's school children each contribute \$1 to NASA to replace the shuttle.

Their mother, Karen McPhillips, said Thursday that some children felt better after making a donation. One classmate of Missy's who was extremely upset by the accident contributed \$5, "and she was real excited. There could be a change," she said. "Maybe all these kids throughout the United States will feel better if they can contribute to this fund."

It will take a lot of dollars.

Richard P. MacLeod, executive director of the United States Space Foundation in Colorado Springs, Colo., said the ill-fated Challenger cost \$1.6 billion, although a later challenge, Atlantis, cost \$1.6 billion.

Last resort lending program in deep

WASHINGTON — The government's \$2-billion last resort lending program for farmers is in serious jeopardy because of increased losses, and some 37,000 borrowers owing nearly \$5 billion are likely to fall, congressional investigators said Thursday.

Brian E. Crowley, a senior investigator for Congress' General Accounting Office, said a study of Farm Credit Administration loans found the available program had a debt-to-asset ratio of 33 percent, a level defined as indicating "extreme financial problems."

Some 20 percent of the borrowers studied

believed to be a representative sample of the system's 270,000 customers — actually had ratios of more than 100 percent, meaning they owed more than they had in assets," Crowley said.

Despite the poor financial conditions, FmHA has continued to make loans to some of those farmers, who have little chance of ever repaying them, he added.

In the first six months of 1985, the agency issued \$28 million in new loans to borrowers who already were technically insolvent, the GAO's report showed. Another \$1.2 billion went to farmers in extreme distress, it found.

"The financial condition of FmHA's loan portfolio and its borrowers is not a very pretty

picture," Crowley told the Senate Agriculture Committee.

He said some 37,000 of the agency's borrowers had made no payments on their debt in at least three years, and that FmHA judged their survival chances as slim. A disproportionate share of the long-delinquent loans are in FmHA's economic disaster relief program, and the bulk of those loans are in southern states, he noted.

"In these difficult times, FmHA is faced with the dilemma of providing credit to high-risk farmers while at the same time protecting the government's, and ultimately the taxpayer's, financial interests," Crowley said. "The principal issue is... where do you draw the line?"

Judge considers Creech execution stay

BOISE — U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan began reviewing the request for a stay of execution from condemned murderer Thomas Eugene Creech on Thursday as the former convict stood just three days from his sentence of death by lethal injection.

Ryan returned to Boise late Thursday and immediately went to work on the petition, but Creech's attorney Ruff Kehne said he had been advised the judge would not decide before this morning whether to stop the execution that has been set for 12:05 a.m. MST Monday.

Kehne said if the petition was rejected, as it has been twice already by state courts, he will

seek an emergency stay from Judge Blaine Anderson, the resident judge in Boise for the 8th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

The emergency stay would provide time for a special panel of the entire appellate court in San Francisco to consider the request, Kehne said.

"I'm geared and ready for it," he said. "I've talked to them, and they're ready for us."

If the appeal is denied by both Ryan and the Court of Appeals, Kehne said he will appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court. All Creech's alternatives in the state courts were exhausted Tuesday when 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse and the Idaho Supreme Court denied motions for a stay.

Newhouse on Jan. 10 signed a death warrant

for Creech after a long legal battle over whether the 35-year-old "OId" native could withdraw his guilty plea in the 1981 murder of David Jensen, a 23-year-old prison inmate who was clubbed to death with a sock filled with batteries. Creech claimed he acted in self-defense and pleaded guilty only because of threats to his family from both inside and outside the prison.

There have been no executions in Idaho since Raymond Snowden was hanged in Oct. 18, 1957, and none ever conducted by lethal injection. Creech's execution was scheduled to take place in a 14-by-60-foot mobile home at the Idaho State Penitentiary that has been designated the prison's "death house."

GOP legislators send budget-cutting measure to governor

BOISE — Facing no other politically viable alternative, the Legislature's Republican majority Thursday passed around a package of \$74.6 million in 1986 budget cuts to pass what leaders called the first step toward erasing Idaho's \$27-million deficit.

"We're all in this together," said House Republican Leader Jack Kennovick, R-Boise, as the House followed the Senate's lead in sending the measure to the Governor, John Evans. "If you don't have it, you can't spend it."



leaders called "government in the dark" because the budget-cutting package was developed in closed-door GOP caucuses to fuel suspicion and "tear" over its ramifications.

Senate Democratic Caucus Chairman John Peavey called the plan nothing more than "mismanagement" fiscal irresponsibility, although it followed closely in many areas the spending-cut proposal forwarded by Evans last month and called for only about \$800,000 more in total cuts than the governor had recommended.

The governor has also raised questions

about it, suggesting that in some areas it may cut too deeply.

"A line-item veto, of course, is most possible," Evans said in an interview following passage of the bill. "My initial reaction is... it may be too severe."

Still, the minority managed to attract one handful of Republicans as the bill passed the Senate on a 26-16 vote and then less than three hours later cleared the House on a 59-24 vote.

Republican Sens. Danc Watkins of Idaho Falls and Herb Carlson of Eagle joined the Senate Democrats against the bill while the House Democrats were joined only by

Republicans Thomas Boyd of Moscow, Robert Fry of Horseshoe Bend, Larry Harris and Kathleen Gurnsey of Boise, Dean Hagenson of Coeur d'Alene, Hilde Kellogg of Post Falls and James Lucas of Moscow.

"Clearly we have a philosophical difference on how we spend money," Senate President Pro Tem James Risen, R-Boise, said. "The two parties will always have a philosophical difference on the way we spend money. Although no one likes it, it's a step toward solving this problem and it's a responsible step."

Evans, who was still at home recuperating

Antone says farmers are losers in proposed tax overhaul

Drafts letter to congressmen

BOISE — Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, says farmers will be hard hit by proposed changes in federal tax laws.

Antone, chairman of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee, has drafted a letter to be sent to congressmen working on the bill and has ushered a formal memorial to Idaho's U.S. Senate delegation through his committee.

A memorial in a statement of opinion which, if supported by the Legislature, is sent to Congress to influence decisions there.

The proposed repeal of investment tax credits would be a hardship for the farming, mining, and lumbering industries in Idaho, Antone's memo-



rial says.

Investment tax credits give tax breaks to those investing in new machinery, among other things.

Antone's memorial also says the repeal of income-averaging rules will hurt the basic commodity marketers in Idaho because those industries are known for wide swings in price and profitability.

Income averaging allows taxpayers to average their income over

a period of years, so that when their income swings from year to year, they can pay taxes on an income somewhere between their highest and lowest.

The final portion of the tax code changes Antone mentions is the replacement of the accelerated cost recovery system. Antone's memorial says the change "upsets all of the plans and commitments which were

devised under the accelerated cost recovery system," and which were just beginning to have an effect to improve our resource-based economic components.

Accelerated cost recovery is a means of depreciating the cost of buildings and machinery more quickly, to gain larger investment tax breaks sooner.

In a separate letter, Antone

outlined the effects of tax law changes specifically on agriculture.

"Some of the proposals in the Tax Reform Act seem to be aimed at farmers," Antone's letter says.

"The most damaging feature of the bill, however, is the elimination of income-averaging. Prices for farm products, particularly fresh vegetables, fluctuate greatly from year to year," Antone wrote.

Farmers have some hope of staying in business in a bid year, if they have been able to average their taxes and save money in good years, Antone says. Without income averaging, bid years will be worse.

Other legislators signing the letter with Antone included Rep. Ward Chaburn, R-Albion, and Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

Robbins wants district tax tied to population

BOISE — Farmers and other large landowners may be taxed only for real estate improvements on the tax rolls of ambulance districts if the Idaho Legislature adopts a bill proposed by Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich.

County commissioners in Idaho can form ambulance service districts by ordinance, and Robbins said, he wants to protect large landowners from having to carry the bulk of the tax load for ambulance service.

Ambulance service people, not property, he said Thursday after the House Revenue and Taxation Committee voted to give further consideration to the bill.

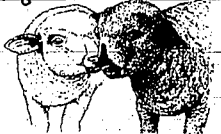
By exempting unimproved property from those tax rolls, a board of county commissioners could base ambulance funding on population, more than on land ownership.

Robbins said that in Lincoln County, his home county, the ambulance service is perennially short of funds because it is paid for out of the general funds of the county.

If the service could be broken out of general funding and supported by a separate taxing district, it would likely be better funded and would not be a burden on the county's general account, he said.

With his proposed bill in place, Robbins said, families served by the county ambulance service would be equally taxed.

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Tractors restricted at night

BOISE — It won't be legal to move farm machinery from field to field by road at night until the Legislature passes a bill introduced by Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

Noh said Thursday he was amazed to discover last summer that state law prohibits farmers from moving equipment from field to field on the roads after dark.

After a motorist collided with a tractor last summer, the motorist was given a ticket for inattentive driving and the farmer was issued a

ticket for being on the road illegally, he said.

Noh said the little-used provision of Idaho law might open farmers' eyes to lawsuits and make it difficult for them to insure their equipment.

To make what is common practice legal, Noh introduced his bill (Senate Bill 1304) to the Senate Transportation Committee, which has agreed to take a look at the problem.

"It's intended to allow farmers engaged in necessary and legitimate practices of farming to be on the highway at night," said Noh.

The recent discovery of the problem has caused concern and

uneasiness in the farm community, he added.

As written, the bill would require farm machinery to be equipped with headlights, taillights, and other markers that will let motorists know how wide and tall the machinery is.

Twin Falls County Sheriff Jim Munn said Thursday the prohibition against night driving now on the books is something that his officers have overlooked because Twin Falls and the surrounding towns are farming communities.

He said a swather and motorist collided this summer and both were issued tickets.

Student aid would be cut by federal act

MOSCOW (AP) — The Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction act could cost the University of Idaho a substantial portion of the federal financial aid it distributes, says UT's financial aid director.

The university will lose about \$193,000 during the 1986-87 school year "just because of the Gramm-Rudman language," says Daniel Davenport, who recently returned from Washington, D.C.

The school will lose another \$62,000 in federal Pell grants because the legislation doesn't allow any program to borrow on future revenue, Davenport said. The Pell grant program has relied on that sort of borrowing for several years.

The school could face a 35 percent reduction, or about \$3.2 million, in 1987-88, he said.

The UI currently receives about \$9.1 million in financial aid.

Davenport said the university does not know how many students would be affected.

"We serve about 3,500 students, so you can see it would be a large number," Students in the upper end of the low income bracket, those with parents earning \$15,000 or \$16,000 annually, will be affected most, he said.

Law to reduce farm liability costs

BOISE — Changing farm equipment insurance practices have prompted proposed changes in the state's insurance laws.

Until recently, farmers could buy liability insurance for trucks and other machinery that gave them coverage only during the months when the equipment was in use.

Other kinds of comprehensive damage insurance was generally bought to cover machinery year-round.

But in the last year, insurance companies have begun refusing to sell harvest season liability policies, and Rep. Richard Adams, D-Grangeville, has written a bill to change that.

He told the House Transportation and Defense Committee Thursday that insurance companies now want a full-year liability policy (and the accompanying premiums) because in recent court cases where a piece of machinery was involved in a wreck out of its insurance season, insurance companies were forced to

pay liability costs anyhow.

Adams said his bill will allow farmers to register their vehicles only for the seasons when they will be used. By matching insurance seasons to registration dates, Adams said farmers and insurance companies will be able to agree again on part-year liability coverage.

He said he has talked with insurance companies and they have agreed the bill offers them protection against being sued for coverage not included in policies they sell.

Student may join education board

BOISE (AP) — Even the sponsor admits the idea won't be universally popular. But a legislative committee here has given preliminary approval to legislation adding a student to the Idaho Board of Education.

Rep. Brent Brocksome, R-Boise, proposed the bill, calling it a "consumer issue." It proposes adding a student to the eight-member board which directs education policy for the state.

Brocksome's bill calls for a student to be appointed to a single two-year term.

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Fantus has message for our legislators

Some of our legislators are too busy packing committees and debating proposals to determine the Fundamentalists' purity of what your kids get to read in school.

Nonetheless, it would have been nice to have had a few in the audience this week at the Annual Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Banquet.

What they would have heard was a sobering, realistic talk by a representative of a national consulting firm, Fantus of Chicago, Ill., telling local business leaders how important the quality of education is as a way of attracting industry.

Twin Falls, and much of Idaho, is being hurt in this regard, said Fantus vice president Phillip Phillips, by large class sizes, poor funding for education and low teacher salaries.

The poor pay scales in the area — some 40 percent below the national average — may look like a plus to a business coming in, but they will soon cut the other direction.

If people can't earn enough here to raise their standard of living, if they can't get a decent education for their children, why would they want to come?

Some legislators seem to think that our "quality of life" is so high that it will attract them. And besides, they strongly imply, they don't want any of those "outsiders" anyway.

That kind of attitude will keep us all in the Dark Ages here, which is apparently what some of our so-called "leaders" want: ill-educated people earning less.

Once again, an outsider — this one a business consultant who ought to know — has told us, in effect, what some of our legislators refuse to acknowledge: that we're in danger of becoming a land of illiterate, poor serfs out here in the farm country.

Preventing that means investment and, yes, money. It is our will whether we're willing to spend it or not.

The consultants can tell us what the problem is, but only we can solve it.

Commitment to space will continue

The tragedy of the Challenger explosion is immense.

It has us in its grip like a bad dream. But, like a bad dream, our grief will run its course and we will move on. This is a tragedy, not a disaster.

Those of us who have faced the physical risk of space, and those who have faced the emotional risk of having us there, know those risks, prepare for them as they are required, and then grasp the chance to move on with all our being. The crew members of the beautiful spaceship Challenger were no different; it must always be remembered that all of us who accepted risk,

whether we lived or died as part of the experience, were exactly where we wanted to be at the moment before triumph or tragedy.

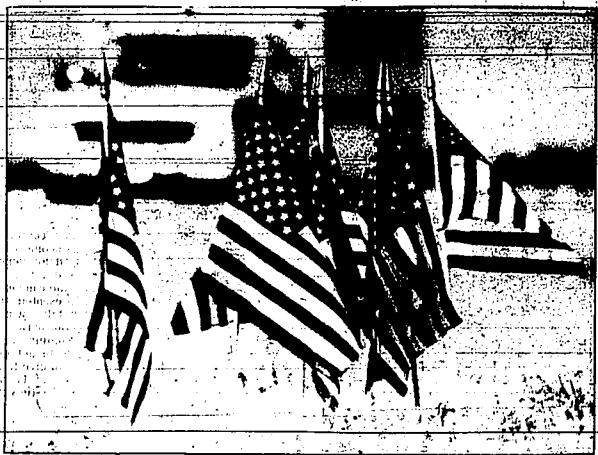
In the earlier Apollo program, in which I took part, the spacecraft and its launch vehicle were designed to allow a survivable separation of the crew module from the rocket. That did not mean that every conceivable failure could be survived, as we saw so tragically in 1967, but we were prepared to deal with a situation that allowed at least a few seconds' warning.

In sharp contrast to Apollo, the early years in the design and development of the space shuttle were played out in a far more constrained fiscal environment (about \$5.5 billion for the shuttle, compared with about \$2 billion for Apollo).

Design and testing of multiple engineering concepts were not possible for very long before commitments had to be services that are must proceed. The Apollo concept of having a full team of NASA engineers shadowing the design, development and production efforts of contractors had to be significantly curtailed. Finally, the extraordinary generosity of less programs had to be scaled down in favor of less expensive computer modeling of launch systems.

There were many of us "old Apollo heads" who, on detailed exposure in 1973 to the near-final concepts for the space shuttle, who felt that the new program was underfunded by a factor of three or four. The politically sensitive but historically naive Nixon administration had forced the abandonment of NASA's original post-Apollo plan for a space station served by both fully-reusable launch vehicle and a shuttle orbiter. The remaining vestige of this plan, the orbiter, was itself an extraordinary technical challenge. It would require more than just state-of-the-art engineering to take a spacecraft as big as a DC-9 into orbit, make good use of it in the harsh environment of space, fly it on return through hypersonic speed ranges never before explored by aircraft, land it on a standard airport runway, and then recycle it for reuse within a few weeks.

Those of us who were skeptical about NASA's ability to succeed in this endeavor were wrong. We were wrong, for two reasons. We were part of one reason. We had no warning of the other. First, we underestimated, as so many have, the unexcelled motivation and heart of the NASA

family—Space and space flight generate a belief in hundreds of thousands of Americans that working on the exploration of this new ocean is the most important endeavor of their lives. The nation's and humankind's return on this investment in "faith" is as incalculable as it is unparalleled in pennies.

We could not know then that President Jimmy Carter would be persuaded in 1974 that the space shuttle was essential to the verification of the SALT II treaty, in which he, if not the Senate, believed so strongly. I was serving in the Senate at that time, and it became clear to me, and to others, that the day of reckoning had come for the early understanding of the shuttle program. The necessary delays of critical development milestones in order to pay for the solutions to unexpected problems (something that can be avoided only by large budget reserves for contingencies) had created a fence of future critical milestones that only large doses of additional funds could break through. Thus the president put his office behind the necessary supplemental appropriations that finally resulted in the successful test flights of the shuttle Columbia.

Buried in all these political and fiscal considerations is the fact that NASA made a decision in the early 1970s to not attempt to develop a means to separate the shuttle orbiter or the crew while the solid rocket boosters were burning. After ignition, the shuttle crews are com-

mitted to ride them for more than two minutes until they are burned out and jettisoned. This difficult management decision has been justified through 24 successful launches of the space shuttle. It also appears that a capability to abort while the solid rockets were burning would have made no difference in the outcome of the Challenger accident.

This is the type of retrospective analysis that will be part of NASA's and the nation's look at Challenger's last flight. In the larger view of history, however, it is incidental to the commitment made by Mike, Dick, Judy, Ron, Ellison, Greg and Christa. As thousands of American explorers and pioneers before them, had they believed in what they were doing, their commitment will continue to be our commitment. This belief and commitment can be no less than it was as we built a continental nation, as we became a seafaring power, as we "slipped the surly bonds of Earth" and as we face the continuing challenge to freedom in space.

Teachers willing to take some risks to improve education

Idaho public services are in serious financial trouble. County services are cut back, city and county street conditions deteriorate unchecked from lack of funds. City police and fire departments get by because police and fire personnel continue to do good jobs in understaffing and with less than average salaries.

School classrooms are overcrowded. Brand new classrooms sit vacant because teachers cannot be hired to teach in them. School supplies are restricted or nonexistent. Newly-hired teachers are just out of college or have very little experience because districts can't afford to hire experienced personnel. Classroom texts are outdated or there aren't enough to go around.

Teachers are leaving local school districts for greener pastures where pay is better (\$9 in Twin Falls this year alone). The Twin Falls High School newspaper reports that nine to 11 valedictorians in the class of 1985

are attending college elsewhere other than in Idaho because of the deterioration of programs in Idaho. The reason for this is due to under-funding.

All of these deficiencies would be corrected with improved funding. Several "realistic" state legislators have developed a cure for Idaho's financial woes. That cure is the "Idaho Economic Recovery Act of 1986." These legislators realize that we can no longer rely upon our resource-based industries as a source of state revenue.

New, people-oriented industries must be attracted into Idaho which do not rely upon the resource base. We need service and communication industries in Idaho as we step out of the industrial age and into the information age.

Those kinds of industries are attracted by the very services that are most in trouble in Idaho: public services, city and county services, higher education, public schools. People-oriented industries realize that good public services are an investment, an asset.

The Idaho Economic Recovery Act would invest in the services that all Idahoans want. An event has been planned to show that there is support for the Economic Recovery Act. Today, supporters of investing in public services are rallying in Boise to impress upon the Legislature that Idaho's public sector is in a distressing financial situation. Idahoans from all sectors of the private and public sectors are expected to rally their support.

Parents' school pattern support for the efforts of the rally. Several PTA/PTO organizations in Twin Falls have been approached and the response has been promiss-

ing. Parent organizations have signed petitions encouraging tax increases to solve the funding problem. There are people who say that the rally is ill-advised. Some say that we should talk to our legislators individually.

For the past 10 years, we have been doing just that. The Legislature continues to provide Band-Aid remedies. The Legislature needs to be impressed with the fact that the disease cannot be cured with quick-fix remedies. A major overhaul of the tax system is what is needed. The Economic Recovery Act will do that.

There are some who say that the timing for the rally is bad. After waiting for a decade for the Legislature to deal with the situation, it about time.

There are some who say that the rally will create "ill will." I'm sure that the colonials at the Boston Tea Party didn't worry about causing "ill will" with King George before

they made their point. Parents should be more concerned with overworked classrooms and a deteriorating education system than possible "ill will."

Certainly the major concern of Idaho government is its public schools. That's why teachers are spearheading the rally. Teachers are closest to the problems of inadequate funding of schools.

Certainly there are risks in our stand. Whenever you take a risk you risk disappointment, your risk being rebuffed, your risk being ridiculed.

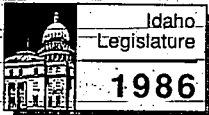

House committee considers ways to overhaul tax system

BOISE (AP) — Witnesses are telling a legislative committee that the time has come for a major overhaul of Idaho's taxing system, and lawmakers may have a variety of changes to consider.



The House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Thursday voted to print and introduce four new tax bills, although all of them appear to face an uncertain future when they return to the panel for consideration.

"Our tax system needs a major overhaul," said Rep. Don Loveland, R-Boise. "We need to rewrite the entire act."

The Legislature needs to have the courage necessary to make some changes," added Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich.

Revenue and Taxation has been the chief place where the Legislature looked for ways to erase a deficit of \$27.1 million in the current budget and to come up with about \$10 million extra to finance even a maintenance budget next year.

Approved for printing and introduction on Thursday were:

- Legislation sponsored by Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, and Rep. Tim Tucker, D-Port Hill, imposing two new tax brackets for state income tax returns. Idaho income taxes now stop at 7 1/2 percent. Brown said the state can raise \$23 million by increasing the maximum rate to 10 percent.
- A bill allowing voters in a taxing district to decide whether they want to remove a limit on property taxes that resulted from the 1 percent property tax initiative in 1978. It would require 55 percent approval to remove the cap.
- A bill allowing local-option personal income taxes on a countywide basis, if 55 percent of the voters approve.
- Legislation extending the sales

tax to most services now exempt. Rep. Dean Haugenon, R-Coeur d'Alene, said he personally felt that is a better way to go than raising the basic sales tax rate.

The panel rejected one proposal from Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise. Hooper suggested allowing local option sales taxes of up to 1 percent if voters in a city or county approved.

Committee members objected to allowing one city in a county to impose local-option sales taxes, which might not be followed by other cities in the same area. The bill was returned to Hooper, who said he would change the proposal to eliminate cities.

Tucker told committee members Idaho's top income tax rate has not been changed for generations. "It's basically a flat tax after the first \$15,000 of taxable income," he said.

Hooper presented three local-option taxing bills, winning approval for introduction.

He told committee members the House needs to act quickly on tax change bills to give the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee more time to study them.

Latest day-care bill fails 8-7

BOISE (AP) — After three hours of debate, a House committee has rejected a "compromise" day-care licensing legislation designed to end a year-long stalemate over the issue.

The House Health and Welfare Committee voted 8-7 late Thursday against a bill sponsored by Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise. It would have given the seven district health departments authority to prepare their own regulations on day care.

More than 20 witnesses testified and all but a couple of them opposed the Bengson bill. Opponents fell into three categories. Some people thought the bill wasn't strong enough; others testified they don't want any mandatory statewide regulations.

A third contingent argued the bill

was unclear, some of them contending that as written, it might even require to regulate children dropped off at church to attend Sunday school.

The action left committee Chairman Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise, pessimistic that the Idaho Legislature would end a long-running deadlock that has left the state as the only one without mandatory day care licensing.

"The chances are awful slim," said Hooper. "There are some on the committee who've never are going to please because they don't want any day-care licensing."

He identified them as Republicans Golden Limford, Joan Wood, Jeff Stoker, Donna Scott and Liz Allan.

The rest of the committee favored the Bengson bill 7-3. Hooper said,

with some of those who voted against it "hoping for stronger regulations."

Rep. Brent Brocksome, R-Boise, voted against the Bengson bill, along with Democrats George Johnson of Lewiston and Jeanne Givens of Coeur d'Alene.

Mrs. Givens has another bill prepared which she may try to get printed and introduced at the next Health and Welfare meeting, which probably will be Tuesday.

It carries out recommendations from a statewide task force, that the state Department of Health and Welfare be given licensing authority.

Similar legislation has been introduced in the Senate, but Health and Welfare Committee Chairman Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, plans no action until the House acts.

Stallings starts year with \$25,000

BOISE (AP) — Last year was not an election year for Rep. Richard Stallings, the Rexburg Democrat who ousted veteran Republican incumbent George Hansen in Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

But Stallings still raised \$83,000 in campaign contributions in 1985 and spent \$56,608.

Stallings' campaign finance report, filed with the secretary of

state's office here on Wednesday, showed no outstanding debts at the end of the year and a balance of \$25,000.

Stallings is expected to announce for a second term and so far, there have been no announced Democrat opponents.

Stallings said he received contributions from more than 60 individuals, totaling \$29,726. Political party committees and political action committees contributed \$24,799.

Among 530 contributors to Stallings was Ralph Harding, Washington, D.C., who won the 2nd District congressional seat in 1969 and 1974, before losing to Hansen in 1984.

Joseph Parkinson, president of Microf Technology, a Boise computer chip company, contributed a total of \$800 to Stallings during 1985.

The Latah County Democratic Central Committee, Moscow, which is not even in Stallings' congressional district, contributed \$502.

The Airline Pilots Association political action committee gave Stallings \$1,000 on Nov. 25 as did a

political action committee for engineers and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

The National Association of Retired Federal Employees contributed \$2,000 to Stallings during 1985, and the National Education Association contributed \$4,000 on Dec. 12 for a total of \$5,000 for the year.

Stallings' campaign organization contributed \$5,000 toward an Idaho Democratic Party drive to identify voters and operate phone banks.

Governor withdraws nomination

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Gov. John Evans, faced with legislative pressure against confirmation of political independents to state boards and commissions, has withdrawn a nomination to the Advisory Board for Aeronautics and Public Transportation.

Evans notified Senate Transportation Committee Chairman Reed Budge, R-Soda Springs, in a one-sentence letter that he was withdrawing the nomination of William Lane, a Pocatello air charter operator, because of his declaration as a political independent.

Amid the controversy, Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, has prepared legislation to ensure the right of independents to serve, and Pat Costello, spokesman for the governor, said the advisory board position will remain open for a while to give lawmakers a chance to pass that bill.

Budge's objections to independent nominees have blocked other confirmation proceedings as well, including that of Bayview marina operator Richard Hansen to the Fish and Game Commission, and prompted an attorney-general's opinion on at least part of the issue.

Costello said Evans was not withdrawing Hansen's nomination because Hansen, having been made aware of the requirement, has filed a declaration as a Republican.

Shooting rampage kills 3, wounds 4

OKLAHOMA CITY (AP) — A trucking company employee went on a shooting rampage in a neighborhood and then at work Thursday, killing three people and wounding four others, including a little girl and a man he locked in a car trunk, before surrendering, police said.

Cyril Wayne Ellis then went to suburban Del City, called police from the home of a relative's friend and said he was tired of running, said Oklahoma City police Capt. M.T. Berry. Del City police found him sitting on the porch at the white frame house.

The shootings occurred in less than an hour, and over the distance of about three miles on the eastern side of the city.

Ellis, 24, of Oklahoma City, was booked into the Oklahoma City Jail on two complaints of murder and one of assault with a deadly weapon, Berry said. He added that additional complaints would likely be filed.

Ellis later was taken to a hospital because of fainting spells and reports from other inmates that he was hitting his head against walls, Berry said. Ellis was treated for hyperventilation and returned to the jail, said Detective Ken Smith.

Police say they know of no motive.

and have not determined a connection between the man and the victims, except that four were co-workers at Consolidated Freightways.

"He went crazy," said Mark Schreiner, a co-worker. "He pointed the gun at me and told me to back up and I did. He then turned around and pointed the gun at another worker and shot him."

No weapon has been recovered, said Smith.

Police learned of the first shooting at 6:45 a.m.

"He apparently shot him and locked him in the trunk of the car," Berry said. The man was taken to Oklahoma Memorial Hospital, where officials said a shooting victim in his 30s was in critical condition and undergoing surgery.

Six minutes later, authorities were called to a house a few blocks away where they found a woman's body and a wounded girl in the yard, Berry said.

The child, who Berry said was between 9 and 12 years old, was hospitalized in critical condition at Children's Memorial Hospital, officials said.

Presbyterian Hospital spokeswoman Denise Wadsworth said Gordon Moore, 38, was in good condition with gunshot wounds to his face, shoulder and ribcage. The condition of the fourth person wounded was not available.

Fiedler to marry

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Bobbi Fiedler said Thursday that she plans to marry her top aide and co-defendant in a California indictment charging they tried to fix a campaign rival to quit the U.S. Senate race.

"It's a decision we made some time ago," Ms. Fiedler, 48, said of her plans to marry Paul Clarke, 39, her executive assistant.

The Republican congresswoman said her indictment in Los Angeles last week had no bearing on her decision to reveal her longstanding marriage plans.

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IRS recalls 1985, starts earlier in 1986

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Internal Revenue Service, making an all-out effort to avoid a repetition of the tax-handling delays of last year, has processed more than four times as many returns as at this time in 1985.

During the first 24 days of the year, 2.17 million individual returns were received at the 10 IRS regional service centers; compared with 2.77 million during the same period last year. The agency processed 282,000 returns through Jan. 24, compared with 87,000 last year.

"All 10 service centers report no significant processing problems so far," IRS spokesman Larry Batdorf said Thursday. "We are very happy with the processing operation so far and we expect to have a good filing season."

Problems with a new computer system caused delays in the processing of returns last year and forced millions of people to wait for as much as four or five months for their tax refunds. To avoid a repetition this year, the IRS has expanded its computer capacity, its processing staff and employee training.

Already this year, the IRS has certified 37,000 returns, compared with 6,000 at this time in 1985.

Batdorf said the agency is not concerned that the number of returns filed so far this year is considerably below last year's pace. The number filed during the first three weeks of January has ranged over the past six years from 1.8 million to

2.9 million.

"We feel 2.17 million is just fine," Batdorf said. "January has never represented statistically what will happen over a filing season."

Some tax authorities and members of Congress have expressed concern that the widely publicized processing problems of 1985 will encourage some people to stop filing returns, gambling that the IRS is hit with such a blizzard of paper that they would not be missed.

More than 104 million individual returns plus almost 1 billion information documents — such as W-2 forms that list a worker's wages and withheld taxes — are expected to be filed this year.

Kissinger may take on Gov. Cuomo

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) — Former Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger said Thursday he is considering requests from Republican leaders to oppose Gov. Mario Cuomo's re-election bid this year.

"Republican leaders have urged me to run for governor," Kissinger said in a statement issued by his New York City office. "I had not previously considered standing for elective office, but I am complimented by their request and I feel I owe them a consideration of their views."

There was no immediate comment from Cuomo, often mentioned as a possible 1988 Democratic presidential candidate.

"I'm not sure he'll want to comment on this," said Martin Steadman, Cuomo's press secretary.

Talks between Kissinger, 62, and New York GOP officials have been going on for several weeks, said state Assembly Minority Leader Clarence Rappleyea.

"Henry Kissinger would be a formidable candidate who could win," said state Senate Majority Leader Warren Anderson.

Chris Vick, Kissinger's executive assistant, said she did not know when her boss might make a decision about the November election.

Political advisers to the 53-year-old Cuomo said that while Kissinger had some obvious strengths, he could be vulnerable.

Cops take shots at handgun bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — A host of police groups representing chiefs and cop on the beat implored the House of Representatives Thursday to defeat Senate-passed legislation easing gun controls, saying Congress' failure to do so would be "adding to the carnage" on the streets.

Insisting that the Senate bill allowing resumption of interstate sales of guns would increase the availability of handguns, the organizations urged House members to oppose the legislation "in the name of sanity."

They urged opposition to efforts by Rep. Harold Volkmer, D-Mo., chief sponsor of the House version, to bring the legislation to the floor by a rarely successful discharge petition. The petition needs 218 signatures, and currently has 102, the groups said.

The Senate bill, sponsored by James A. McClure, R-Idaho, passed 79-15 last July 10 after heavy lobbying by the National Rifle Association and allied gun groups.

"The far right gun lobby knows it's in trouble with law enforcement over this issue," said Richard A. Boyd, president of the 173,000-member Fraternal Order of Police.

Asked to identify the "far right gun lobby," he said, "I consider the NRA and the Gun Owners of America the people over the edge on this."

NRA spokesman Dave Warner responded that the Fraternal Order of Police formerly supported the bill and added, "I don't know why he (Boyd) is saying things about the NRA he didn't say two years ago."

"We are trying to protect the rights of our members and all gun owners and that is the main reason for the bill," Warner added. "The 1968 gun control act has been used to harass and entrap law-abiding gun owners and gun dealers."

Larry Pratt, executive director of the Gun Owners of America, responded, "It's a pity when someone has to speak in such an irresponsible way."

Reagan to speak Tuesday

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, who postponed his State of the Union address because of the space shuttle explosion that killed seven astronauts, will give his speech to a joint session of Congress at 6 p.m. MST Tuesday, the White House announced Thursday.

The address had been planned for 7 p.m. MST last Tuesday and was postponed for a week, but the time for the half-hour speech was not set immediately.

The rescheduling of the speech for the same time would have collided with NBC-TV's heavily promoted miniseries on Peter the Great, which is set to begin at 7 p.m. MST Tuesday.

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Right-to-work backers gear for referendum

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Freedom to Work Committee turned its attention to its next battle Thursday, after a Wednesday Idaho Supreme Court opinion upholding the Legislature's authority to enact a constitutional right-to-work law.

The favorable decision will give voters a chance to see how that law works before they go to the polls in November to vote on a right-to-work referendum, said committee

Co-chairman Terry McKnight, in Twin Falls on a five-stop swing through the state.

However, Co-chairman Louise Koontz warned that the immediate results will be in the form of workers' freedom to choose whether or not to join a union, rather than in the form of new jobs.

"We don't expect that any firm which desires to locate in a right-to-work state will gamble on Idaho until it sees in November that the law will stay in effect permanently," she said.

The committee is hoping that hotly con-

tested races in the 1986 election will help their cause. While they will be competing for attention and contributions with those races, they may benefit by a heavy voter turnout, committee leaders said.

"Only a small percentage of the voters are undecided on right-to-work," said Executive Director Gary Glenn. "What scares me to death is that the people who support right-to-work will not go out and vote. In our job it is just as important to get people out to vote as to convince them what to vote."

The committee expects to be out-spent in

the referendum battle by 2 or 3-1 by the AFL-CIO, Glenn said. The committee would still like to spend \$500,000-\$750,000 in campaign, he said. "Even though that may not match union spending, the committee has the advantage of starting the campaign with the support of more voters, he said."

The new right-to-work law prohibits union membership or payment of union dues as a condition of employment, Idaho was the 21st state to enact such a law, but it has been delayed for a year by legal battles.

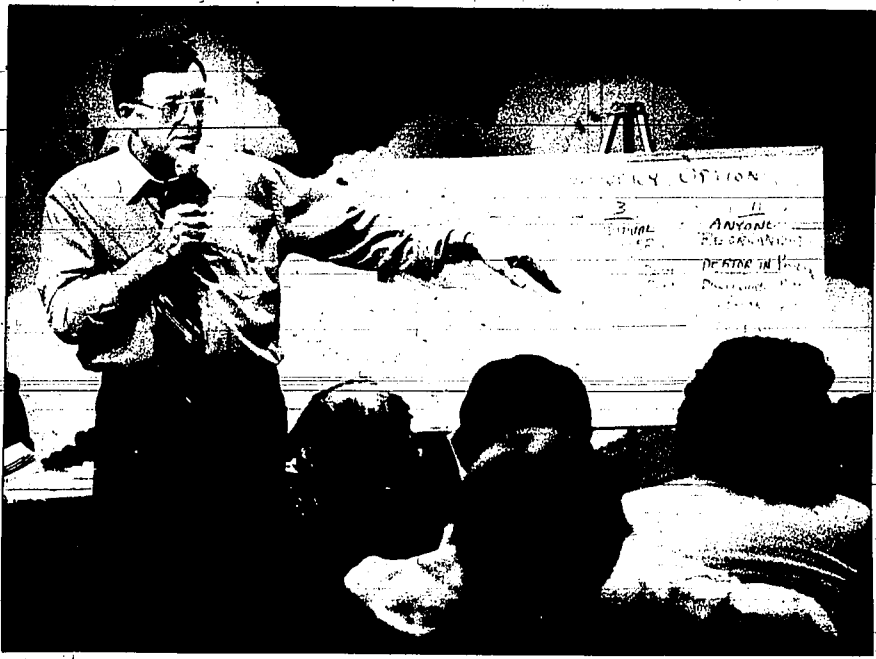
The law will not affect contracts entered

into before Wednesday until they expire or are extended, Freedom to Work Committee leaders said.

Justice Stephen Blaine, who dissented from the majority opinion released Wednesday, said there was a serious question as to whether an emergency actually existed that required the Legislature to enact the right-to-work law before a referendum vote.

"There's not one day goes by without someone asking me for work," McKnight responded. "If people can't put food on the table that's an emergency."

Farmers gaining an edge with lenders



Charles Bellman tells local farmers and ranchers the advantages and disadvantages of different bankruptcy options

TWIN FALLS — Times have changed for farmers in financial trouble, said Charles Bellman, a featured speaker Thursday at a Borrower Rights and Information Seminar.

"The lender is in the same boat we were in 3 or 4 years ago," Bellman said. "Now he's trying to protect himself."

With lenders beginning to feel financial problems as well, he explained, farmers have room to bargain and deal with lenders and work out a way of staying in business, instead of going into foreclosure.

With the current deflation of both land prices and equipment prices "he's (the lender) thinking he can make more money having you in business than he can foreclosing," Bellman said.

Bellman and his wife Lois were featured speakers at the morning session of the Borrower Rights and Information Seminar being held at the Canyon Springs Inn through today. It is sponsored by the Southern Idaho Family Farm Hotline, in co-operation with the College of Southern Idaho's Agriculture Department.

Topics in the morning session included a general overview of farm lenders and their attitudes, protective strategies before foreclosure and types of liens, and a discussion on handling stress.

In the afternoon session, bankruptcy laws and methods of defending against repossession and foreclosure were discussed.

The morning session was attended by about 60 farmers, many of them from outside Magic Valley, said seminar organizer Dick Parrot.

The Bellmans are no new-

comers to the complex financial and personal problems surrounding the farm crisis.

In 1981, the Production Credit Association filed 27 adversary proceedings against Bellman and his 4,800-acre South Dakota farm. Bellman and his wife conserved — moving into their living room, cutting off the rest of the house with a blanket and using their fireplace for cooking and heating.

They managed to avoid foreclosure, and they also began working with troubled farmers, putting together a packet of basic information to help farmers understand financing and loan problems, as well as the legal options available to them. They also began advising farmers over the phone.

Since they began in 1982, Lois Bellman said they have offered advice to over 7,000 farmers from 47 states.

Things have not always been smooth since 1982. Finding itself unable to dissolve Bellman's 1981 Chapter 11 reorganization plan through its adversary proceedings, the Production Credit Association changed its tactics. In 1983 Bellman was indicted on 21 counts of converting mortgage property belonging to the PCA.

He was convicted on six of those counts, for selling grain to buy cattle feed — a move Bellman defended as necessary to keep the cattle, part of the PCA's mortgage property — alive.

After exhausting their opportunities for appeal, Bellman was sent to federal prison for 18 months. Federal attorneys repeatedly told him during the trial "they were going to make an example of you," Bellman said.

Blaine may try school override

HAILEY — Preliminary plans for putting another school district override before voters were discussed Wednesday by the Blaine County School Board, although no specific dollar amount for the override was set.

Board members expect to hold an election in March or April. This will be the eighth time school officials have asked voters to fund a large portion of the district's budget since Idaho's 1 percent initiative was passed in 1979.

Blaine County residents have supported each of the past seven overrides, which have ranged from \$425,000 to last year's levy of \$1.6 million dollars. The levy, which generates funds from property taxes, is used for operation expenses such as teacher salaries, supplies, utilities and books.

Board Vice Chairman David Griffith said the board should expect "only 20 to 25 percent" of next year's budget to come from state aid.

State funds amounted to just 17 percent of the district's budget during the 1984-85 school year.

In addition to the limits on property taxes imposed by the 1 percent initiative, the state's equalization formula, which governs the distribution of funds to Idaho school districts, is responsible for the continued shortfall in funds from the state. Superintendent David Noonan said.

Council will extend sewage service to golf course

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls City Council has decided to extend sewage collection service to the Municipal Golf Course in hopes of promoting growth in the area, even though the project may prove a temporary inconvenience to golfers.

The extension of sewage lines to the southwest corner of the city, on the far side of Rock Creek, has been planned for more than a decade. However, the city has hesitated to proceed with the "unusually expensive" extension until Monday, when the council decided not to pay for a new septic system at the golf course.

"The septic system would have cost \$25,000, while the extension will cost \$56,000. Much of that cost will be for blasting rock in an area where soil depth is less than a foot in places."

"I'd rather make an investment than an expenditure," said Councilman Rick Carr.

The \$25,000 from golf fees that would have been used for the septic system will be used for the collection line. The city will attempt to collect the rest of the money from existing home and business owners and developers in the area who want to use the city system.

Councilman Jack Miller was confident that development in the area would follow the sewage collection line. It would serve about 400 acres, said City Engineer Gary Young.

City workers are preparing contract documents now, but the golfing season will still open before the new sewage collection line is in place. Chemical facilities may have to be used until the new line is in place at the end of May, or the city may be able to bring in a septic tank for temporary use, Young said.

The old septic tank was removed when construction began last fall on a new golf clubhouse.

In other council business this week, members agreed to join with Boise, Pocatello, Nampa and Caldwell in an organized battle against what they consider to be unfair Idaho Power charges.

The group's first step would be a study of the impact of a proposed 27-percent rate increase on municipal services and the street lighting program. Twin Falls would pay 30 to 35 percent of the cost of the study, which could amount to as much as \$21,000.

During the last 12 months, the city has paid Idaho Power \$412,331, excluding power consumed by the private operation of the city sewage treatment plant. The increase would add \$112,000 to the bill over the next 12 months.

Cities are also concerned about a street lighting program that "municipal officials believe allows Idaho Power to recover capital costs within 10 years but does not reduce the rate paid by cities after capital costs have been covered."

Also this week, J-U-B Engineers presented the final version of a report on the city's future that marked the culmination of a \$27,000 study commissioned by the council last year.

The report has suggestions ranging from ways to prodding a predicted sluggish growth rate for active lobbying for a local sales tax option.

Monday, however, J-U-B Vice President Bill Block limited his comments to praise for city management. "During the research and analysis phase, it became evident that Twin Falls is clearly a leader among Northwest cities in terms of fiscal management, infrastructure management and innovation," he said.

Shoshone Falls print sale to benefit library

TWIN FALLS — Some 350 limited edition prints and 1,000 additional prints of "Shoshone Falls on the Snake River," a nationally acclaimed painting of the local attraction, will be offered for sale this spring by the Twin Falls Public Library.

Plans for the project galloped after the library received a stock donation worth more than \$5,000 from Mary Jane Kinney to cover printing costs. Kinney, a former member of the Twin Falls Public Library Board and Idaho Library Board, has asked that donations from the sale of the prints be used as seed money for a library foundation, said Librarian Arlan Call.

A committee formed to organize the print sales of Thomas Moran's painting has picked Syms York Co. of Boise to do the printing, and the company's bid should be accepted at the next Library Board meeting, board members said.

The project will go to press in February to allow the first regular and first limited edition print to be sold at the annual Junior Club Art Auction in May.

Both editions will have an image

size of 10 1/2 by 30 inches, said Library Board Chairman David Mead. The limited edition will be numbered, but on a better stock paper and will be debossed — a reverse embossing process.

Prices have not yet been set, Mead said.

The print committee would also like to offer a smaller version of the print, perhaps on a postcard or note cards, but that project will likely depend on a donation to cover the extra printing costs, Call said.

The original painting covers a 6-by-11 1/2-foot canvas in blues, greens and grays of lavenders. The painting suggests the power of the falls, with dark rocks, foaming water, a stormy sky and a heavy mist rising from the river.

Moran is likely the most respected artist ever to have painted the Shoshone Falls. In his lifetime, he came to be called "Thomas 'Yellowstone' Moran because of his penchant for painting that area and other dramatic Western landscapes. Today he is known as the 'dean of Western American painting."

Moran's 1900 rendition of the falls now hangs in the Gilcrease Museum in Tulsa, Okla.

Attorney rules out 2 in flap

KETCHUM — The mayor and one City Council member have personal conflicts that should disqualify them from participating in deciding which of Blaine County's two newspapers will publish Ketchum's legal notices, an attorney told the council Friday.

Attorney Roger Crist, hired by either the city or the newspaper, said because the city's attorney also has a conflict, said Mayor Jerry Seiffert and Councilman Tom Held "should not participate" in discussions on the decision to choose either the Wood River Journal or Mountain Express as the city's official newspaper.

Crist said that although courts traditionally have defined conflicts as a public official's financial interest in a decision, in these decisions they now often define conflicts as "personal" relationships.

Courts now view a conflict as "a personal interest where a public official could be seen to favor a personal friend, a favor," Crist said.

Seiffert served as first president of the Express Corp., the parent

company of the Mountain Express when it formed in the early 1970s. He now has a live-in relationship with the paper's editor, Pam Morris.

Held has a partnership with Journal investor John Scherer in an organized battle against what they consider to be unfair Idaho Power charges.

The mayor led the council into a discussion of getting outside advice, saying as a corporation it needs a separate legal opinion. If Seiffert votes on the matter, he would not vote on the issue, however, Seiffert said he would not vote.

Seiffert did not attend Friday's meeting, deciding to stay out of the matter entirely, said City Administrator Jim Phillips. Held also has maintained he does not have a legal conflict and has participated in all the discussions. He led the attack against Seiffert's involvement.

And after Crist's decision, he balked at saying he would withdraw from the discussions. The council considers the matter during its meeting on Feb. 3 at 7 p.m.

Wendell plan leads to commercial zone

WENDELL — As part of the new Wendell city comprehensive plan, an industrial area on the east side of Wendell and a few residential blocks have been designated a commercial zone.

The 10-page plan, approved this month by the City Council, is based on the suggestions of about 30 local residents who met several times last year to discuss city goals and policies. It was written by Art Rathburn, a professional city planner from Twin Falls. Until now, Wendell has had zoning but no plan for city maintenance and land development.

The first part of the new plan deals with city services, including fire-suppression and prevention, law enforcement, water service, waste water system, streets and roads, animal control and weed control.

One new policy is that the city will encourage and support the organization of a Neighborhood Watch Network throughout the city. Also, improvement of the city water system is one of several listed as a high priority.

The second part of the plan defines the present situation, goals and objectives of land use. It lays out policies for residential, commercial, agricultural-transitional and industrial zones.

For example, the city's goal for industry is "to develop city services and designate ample land as permitting industrial land use to encourage the increased development of clean, nonpolluting industrial enterprises in the Wendell area."

Describing the present situation, the plan says, "The City of Wendell is lacking sufficient industrial enterprises to employ the local work force."

Keith Hosack, the city building inspector, fire chief and fire marshal, said Wednesday the new plan is "not earth-shattering" and offers no major changes for the city.

"It's a pretty basic plan," he said. "No one thing stands out. Some of the objectives have already been met. It's much more detailed than what they used to have."

In 1974, the original zoning map was made and the city land use plan was one contained in one short paragraph. From then until about 1980, the city had a planning and zoning commission which finally dissolved, said Hosack, due to lack of interest.

"Now we'd like to get another one started," he said.

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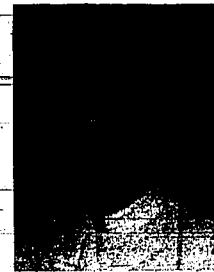

Use care if asbestos must be disturbed in home

WASHINGTON (AP) — While government agencies are launching an effort to eliminate the deadly hazard of asbestos in the future, many consumers daily confront this dangerous product in their homes.

Widely used in insulation because it doesn't burn, asbestos remained relatively common until the 1970s.

In many homes it can be found in flooring, patching compounds, textured paint, ceilings, walls and pipes, floor gaskets, stoves and furnaces, roofing, siding and other locations, according to government experts.

Government sources said Thursday that the Labor Department plans to order a 10-fold decrease in the amount of asbestos fibers that construction workers and automotive mechanics can be exposed to on the job.

The Environmental Protection Agency announced that it wants to ban asbestos entirely, saying it wants to cleanse the environment of all products containing the known carcinogen over the next decade.

And the Consumer Product Safety Commission is contemplating hearings to study the danger of asbestos in products it regulates.

While the EPA expects to take about a year to complete the hearings and reviews necessary before its proposed ban becomes law, OSHA is hoping to impose its "job-place reduction" in six to eight weeks.

OSHA spokesman Chris Winston said, "But even then, asbestos remains in wide use in many American homes, a situation that causes concern among people worried about inhaling the fibers, and other exposures to the product."

The microscopic fibers, when inhaled, have been identified as a source of lung, chest and stomach cancers.

Because of growing concern about asbestos in recent years, the Consumer Product Safety Commission and the EPA published a set of guidelines for dealing with asbestos at home.

Warnings on asbestos were compiled in the booklet "Asbestos in the Home," available from the Consumer Information Center, Dept. 136P, Pueblo, Colo., 81009.

To begin with, the agencies cautioned that in general, if asbestos is sealed, it is probably best left alone. Disturbing it is only likely to release the tiny fibers into the air causing contamination.

And they went on to warn homeowners who want to have the product removed are best advised to hire a professional contractor experienced in dealing with asbestos.

If the product is loose in the home, the booklet warns against dusting, sweeping or vacuuming it.

Such actions will only stir up the tiny fibers, making them airborne and creating a bigger danger. The fibers are so small they cannot be seen, and they can pass through vacuum cleaner filters and get right back into the air through the machine's exhaust.

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Parents join hundreds at service for teacher

FRAMINGHAM, Mass. (AP) — Christa McAuliffe's parents joined 1,500 people Thursday at a memorial service for the spunky, homespun girl who overcame childhood illnesses to reach for the stars.

In their first public appearance since witnessing the death of their daughter and six others when the shuttle Challenger exploded on Tuesday, Edward and Grace Corrigan sat in the front row of a hushed and crowded auditorium. Two of their children, Stephen and Betsy, who now live in California, also attended.

The parents wept as they sang a hymn, "Let There Be Peace On Earth," and departed silently after the service at Framingham State College, which is near their home and from which their daughter was graduated.

Charles Spósito, a teacher at Framingham South High who was among 11,000 applicants to become the first teacher in space, told the gathering: "Christa McAuliffe is infinite because she is in our hearts."

"When trying out for the program, Christa said, 'What are we doing here?' and before I could answer she said, 'We're reaching for the stars.' Christa reached for the stars ... Her wisdom said, 'I teach for the stars and become a starholder ... and-know you too have become infinite,' he said.

The Rev. John Culloty cited McAuliffe's quest for life and said, "She would not want us to dwell on her tragic death too long."

After the service, students released seven black balloons into the chilly blue sky, one for each of the crew members.

"May our spirits soar with her spirit," said Culloty, college chaplain.

Gov. Michael S. Dukakis, who sat with the Corrigan during the hour-long service, likened McAuliffe's death to the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

"Another child of Massachusetts, another person with the ability to inspire, has been taken from us," Dukakis said. "She was a hero, as President Reagan said. All the people on the mission were heroes."

McAuliffe's parents and her four brothers and sisters had arrived home Wednesday from Florida. Her

husband and two children are expected to attend a memorial service for her Friday in Houston.

McAuliffe, a teacher at Concord, N.H., High School, was born Sharon Christa Corrigan on Sept. 2, 1948, a first child. At the time, her parents lived in a cold-water, \$23-a-month apartment in a Boston housing project toward a college business degree.

The family was poor, and matters worsened when Christa developed severe asthma and infant diarrhea. She almost died at six months, but was saved by a new antibiotic.

She spent the rest of her youth fighting against illness and winning. Friends and family remember her as a happy, ambitious child who waited and talked nearly and was so vibrant it was hard to find a babysitter with enough energy to watch her.

"She was never much interested in sleeping," her father once recalled.

When Christa was 4, the Corrigan were able to move to a comfortable ranch-style house in Framingham, and McAuliffe entered Marian High, where she was a popular student with a knack for softball. She played the piano and was active in Girl Scouts.

Her mother remembered that McAuliffe did well in school, even though all subjects didn't come easily.

McAuliffe once said that her youth was deeply affected by the space program.

"I remember the excitement in my home when the first satellites were launched," she said. "My parents were amazed and I was caught up in their wonder."

After high school graduation in 1966, McAuliffe enrolled at Framingham State.

It was there that she took "The Woman Frontiers," a class that focused on pioneer American women and their diaries of life on the frontier. From that point on, McAuliffe kept her own journal, a factor that helped convince NASA she was the right candidate for the space mission.

In 1970, Christa Corrigan married Steven McAuliffe, her high school sweetheart, and moved to Washington, where he attended Georgetown University law school and she taught school and worked as a waitress.

The couple moved to New Hampshire in 1977, after the birth of their son, Scott.

In 1978, she gave birth to a daughter, Caroline.

"We wish we could comfort all of you, as you have comforted each of us. To the families of the other crewmembers, we send our love and share their sorrow."

McAuliffe and his two children, Scott, 9, and Caroline, 6, have been in seclusion since the explosion Tuesday. The senior partner in McAuliffe's firm, Christopher Gallagher, said McAuliffe drafted the statement with two other members of the firm who are with him in Florida.

McAuliffe said he would have no further statements for the time being.

Marlin Marietta Aerospace, the contractor that built external tank No. 26, refused to discuss its history, but NASA officials said it was subjected to the same tests as tanks that had been used on 24 previous shuttle launches.

Engineers designed the tank to be tough, but number 26 was not as tough as some of the first tanks built for the shuttle.

After the first seven tanks, including one which never was used, NASA ordered the tanks to be lightened. Engineers removed some internal struts, baffles and supports.

The space agency also decided not to paint the tanks, as was done early in the program.

The redesign saved 10,000 pounds, including 1,000 pounds of paint. This enabled the shuttle to carry more weight, but some engineers worry that it might also have reduced the safety of the tanks.

"I think that trying to design this lightweight structure may have been what did us in," said Dave Pendley, a retired NASA safety engineer.

The tank can withstand any penetration force that it would encounter during a typical launch. Tiles from the orbiter skin or small pieces of metal would be unlikely to penetrate the external skin of the tank, even at the high speeds of a shuttle launch.

Even if the external skin was pierced, the volatile oxygen and hydrogen would still be protected by the internal, individual pressure tanks.

For an explosion to result, somehow both the internal tanks would have to be ruptured. This is considered unlikely.

Husband expresses thanks

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — The husband and children of Christa McAuliffe expressed thanks on Thursday for the wave of sympathy which followed her death aboard the space shuttle Challenger.

"My children and I are very aware of the tremendous outpouring of grief and support across America," Steven McAuliffe said in a statement delivered by a partner in McAuliffe's Concord law firm.

"We wish to thank you all and hope you can understand our need for these private moments."

"We have all lost Christa. We thank you for respecting our privacy and for sharing our grief."

Slow motion films may direct probes toward Tank No. 26

SPACE CENTER—Houston (AP) — External tank No. 26 was built, tested, shipped and installed just like all the earlier ones, but it exploded after only 73 seconds of flight and pierced the space shuttle Challenger and its crew of seven.

Slow-motion films of Challenger's launch last Tuesday show the explosion rising near the top of the tank and growing as a violent white bloom until the entire tank and spacecraft are fragmented in a cloud of heat and pressure.

The explosion was the result of one of the most powerful chemical combinations known — pure oxygen and hydrogen.

It is this energy, released in what chemists call "controlled explosion," that makes the shuttles go. Each shuttle launch burns more than 1.5 million pounds of oxygen and hydrogen. The chemicals are sparked by an igniter to react in a carefully directed way and produce 1.1 million pounds of thrusting energy to drive the shuttle into space.

On Challenger, the explosion was not controlled. Tons of super-cold hydrogen and oxygen somehow mixed and became a powerful bomb.

It was the job of the external tank to both provide these chemicals in the gigantic gulps required by Challenger's engines, and at the same time prevent any out-of-control mixing.

The 15-story-tall external tank is the least-graceful looking part of the whole space shuttle stack. It's covered with orange foam, and stands on the pad like some silo that a farmer refused to paint.

The gleaming white spacecraft was attached to the tank at three points and the tank actually bore the weight of the spacecraft.

In turn, the tank was attached to two solid-rocket boosters which were anchored to the launch pad and supported the whole structure.

The tank, loaded with its rocket propellant, was the heavy weight of the four shuttle components at more than 800 tons. It is the only one of the components that was not reused. About 8 1/2 minutes into a normal flight, the empty tank is dumped into the ocean.

The tank is made of aluminum, is covered with an orange insulation. Inside, there are two separate tanks, one for the hydrogen and

Slow motion films of Challenger's launch show deep red flame propagating along the side of the external tank and then moving up toward the explosion point. Chemists say this flame could not have come from the combustion of pure oxygen-hydrogen, but would have been fueled by some other chemical mix.

"Pure oxygen and hydrogen burn with an almost colorless flame," said Edward Lewis, a chemistry professor at Rice University.

Some engineers have speculated that the red flame could have come from the solid rocket boosters, perhaps from a break in the side of one of those rockets. The flame, which would be much hotter than the 1,800-degree resistance of the external tank surface, could have blasted at plumbing or valves, perhaps causing a rapid pressure rise and a rupture that would have allowed an explosive oxygen-hydrogen mix.

It will take a careful analysis of temperature and pressure computer data to learn the source and heat value of this flame. Such readings are not normally collected and displayed in Mission Control during a launch, but are recorded and stored.

Marcos says Aquino triumph will see 'peaceful transition'

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Ferdinand E. Marcos on Thursday predicted a "peaceful and successful transition" of power to Corazon Aquino if she defeats him in the Feb. 7 special presidential election.

Asked during an open forum at a Rotary Club luncheon if he would hand over power to Mrs. Aquino if she wins the election, Marcos said the idea of losing "has never entered my mind."

He then added, "I assure you that whatever happens, I will perform my duty as president of the Republic of the Philippines, which includes a peaceful and successful transition."

About 50,000 people packed a school campus to hear Mrs. Aquino, and thousands lined the route of her motorcade in Calapan on Mindoro island, Marcos drew 4,000 people when he visited the area Jan. 18.

But in Puerto Princesa, Palawan, where 10,000 people greeted Mrs. Aquino in the town plaza, Marcos' loyalists hung banners over some roads.

"A vote for Cory is a vote for Communism," said one streamer. Cory is Mrs. Aquino's nickname. Another said, "Cory loves Communism."

Government propaganda, playing on Filipinos' fear of communism, portrays Mrs. Aquino as a communist candidate.

A political novice, Mrs. Aquino has drawn the support of a broad spectrum of politicians, including some leftists, but is from a wealthy landowning family and is outspoken against communism.

Elsewhere, unknown gunmen shot to death two local leaders allied with Marcos, bringing to 16 the number of people killed in pre-election violence in a month.

Marcos also announced the appointment of two little-known lawyers, including one who is an assistant solicitor general in the Marcos administration, as new members of the Commission on Elections.

The commission has been widely accused of being subservient to Marcos.

U.S. Ambassador Stephen Bosworth had said that filling the two vacant seats on the nine-member commission with qualified individuals would significantly build Filipino and foreign confidence in the fairness of the electoral process.

Before announcing the selection of Ramon Lavosa and Ruben Agapalo for

the election commission, Marcos said: "I understand some of my friends in the U.S. Embassy said that I have not complied with my promise to appoint two more members."

Marcos said Lavosa, who will be the executive director of the commission, was recommended by the private watchdog group National Movement for Free Elections (NAMFRELE), while Agapalo, of the solicitor-general's office, was recommended by civic groups.

Marcos' opponents have accused him of planning fraud in the ballot counting.

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Libya willing to ease tensions

TUNIS, Tunisia (AP) — Libya said Thursday it is willing to help fight terrorism and meet with the United States about easing friction that has led to boycott and talk of war.

Foreign Minister Ali Abdussalam Treki said the United States should take the first step, he suggested withdrawing the Sixth Fleet, which Libya's coast — but Col. Moammar Khadafy's government was ready to

talk even without that.

"Despite (the maneuvers), Libya is willing to sit down without any pre-conditions," he said in an interview with The Associated Press.

Treki is here for a meeting of Arab League foreign ministers, from whom he seeks backing for measures to challenge U.S. economic sanctions.

His comments came two days after Premier Bettino Craxi of Italy reported getting a message from Khadafy that he said offered help in

stopping Arab terrorist operations in Europe if the United States would pledge not to take military action against Libya.

Craxi said the message was relayed by Prime Minister Carmelo Mifsud-Bonnici of Malta, who has close relations with Khadafy. The Maltese leader has acted as an intermediary between Libya and Italy since the Dec. 27 terrorist attacks at Rome and Vienna airports, in which 20 people were killed and nearly 120 wounded.

Oilmen beat deadline out of Tripoli

TRIPOLI, Libya (AP) — About 100 American oilmen, engineers and executives left here for Europe Thursday, two days ahead of the deadline President Reagan set for all U.S. citizens to leave Libya.

An estimated 1,500 Americans were living in Libya when Reagan issued the order after the Dec. 27 terrorist attacks at the Rome and Vienna airports. An unknown

as possible, Libyan officials usually do not stamp the passports of weeks.

Some of the executives leaving Tripoli Thursday included Howard Washburn of the Oasis Oil Co. and Ronald Cooner, manager of the Western Geophysical Corp. of Houston, Texas. 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Tribal region evicts blacks

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Thousands of homeless blacks, victims of a twist in South Africa's apartheid policy, sat along a coastal road Thursday on piles of belongings, guarding their few goats and chickens.

The squatters were kicked out of Ciskei, an impoverished tribal homeland that critics of this white-ruled nation's racial policies say had been intended as a dumping ground for blacks.

Usually it is the government that evicts black squatters, moving them away from the fringes of white areas. Now Ciskei, a creation of apartheid that has been nominally independent since Dec. 4, 1981, is trucking squatters from a miserable beach encampment on its territory and dumping them across the border into South Africa proper.

Witnesses said South African officials were providing food and water, and a limited number of tents.

Yemeni president says land stronger

ADEN, South Yemen (AP) — The new interim president told the Supreme People's Council on Thursday that recent bloody fighting among rival Marxist factions had left the country "better equipped" to confront any external danger, the official media said.

"The people, the strugglers of the party along with the military establishment have undertaken their duty and wiped out the coup conspiracy," interim President Helder Abu Bakr al-Atias was quoted as telling the council.

The new government under al-Atias said its forces had routed all troops loyal to ousted President Ali Nasser Mohammed, who was considered a more moderate Marxist than the new leaders of this Soviet-backed Arab nation.

Trenkle said he remains confident that his 18-0 Eagles can win at least one of the games here.

"I just can't imagine any team able to stand up to the pressure that we can exert for one game, let alone two games back-to-back," Trenkle said, who seventh-ranked Eagles are tied for first place in the northern division at 3-0. "I feel that our team is in superb condition and has the depth to go hard for 40 minutes of every game. Other teams are trying to beat us with six or seven players which can work for 20 or 30 minutes, but we're capable of always having a fresh couple of players in the lineup and that's going to tell in a hard-fought, close game."

North Idaho, 15-4 and winless in

two Region 18 games, has two returning starters and the sixth man off last year's strong team. The most prominent are 6-foot-11 Sven Meyer and 6-6 John Nilles. The sixth man is Paul Bryant, a 6-3 guard.

Bulldogs finally crack AP A-3 rankings

met — and beaten — by College of Southern Idaho freshman Joey Johnson Wednesday afternoon, who topped it on his first tentative test jump and bent it on his third try.

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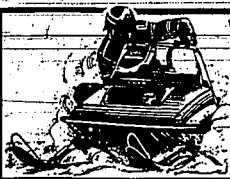
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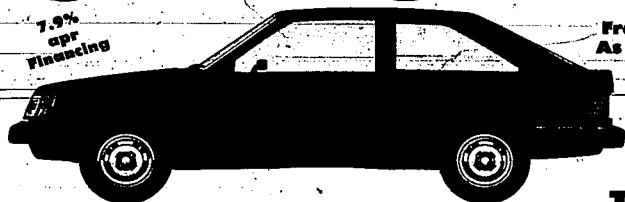
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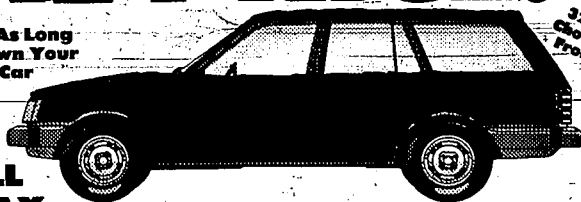
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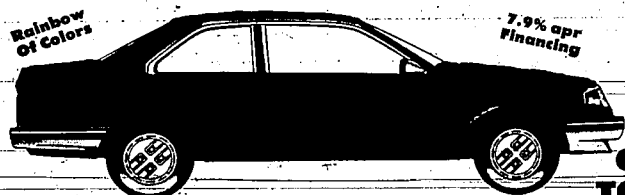
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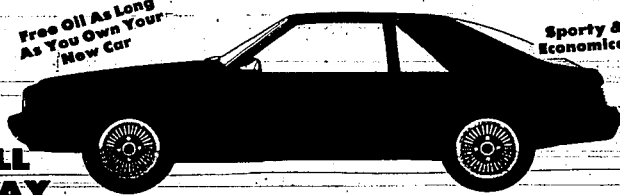
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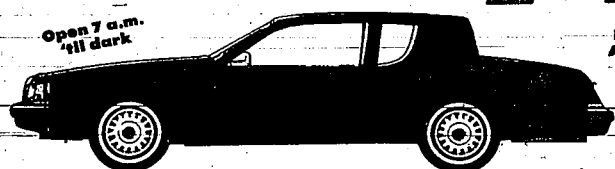
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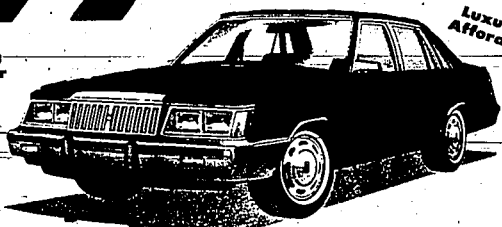
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Film festival puts focus on 50th ski birthday

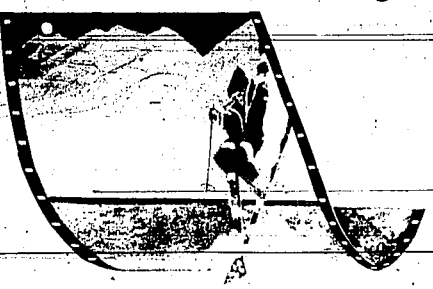

Poets: A sea of Stetsons

SALT LAKE CITY — Salt Lake International Airport was a sea of Stetsons and blue jeans as Utah played host, if only for a few hours, to a gathering of cowboy poets from throughout the West.

The cowboys, representing most of the Western states, the Dakotas and even Arkansas, rendezvoused in Salt Lake City before boarding buses Wednesday evening for Elko, Nev., and the 1986 Cowboy Poetry Gathering.

The festival, brainchild of a group of Western folklorists, made its debut in Elko last year, drawing some 1,300 cowboys from across the country.

It also proved to be a hit, said James Griffith, director of the Southwest Folklore Center at the University of Arizona, who first came up with the idea in 1978.

This year's gathering runs through Saturday and is being sponsored by the Western Folklife Center, Northern Nevada Community College and the National Endowment for the Arts.

"Surprisingly to some of us, it pulled in a lot of media attention," Griffith said. "But that's not the purpose. The whole point of this thing is to give cowboy poets the chance to get together and enjoy each other and to realize how strong and widespread the tradition is they all participate in."

That tradition, says cowboy poet Glenn Ohrlin, a 1985 recipient of the National Endowment for the Arts Heritage Award, includes songs, parodies and poetry — either original or taken down from old "framed" cowboy to cowboy.

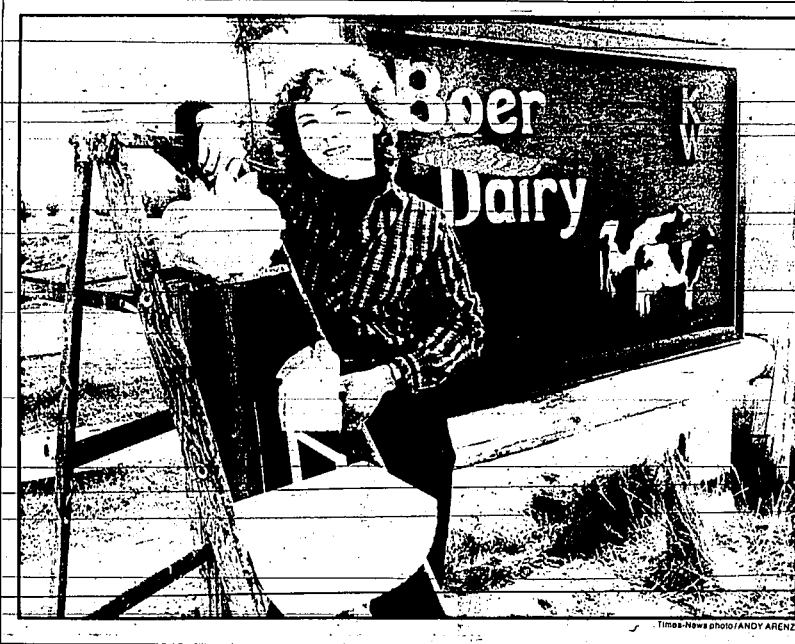
Ohrlin, who describes a cowboy as "anybody who works cattle with a horse and a rope," says most cowboy poetry is humorous, often dealing with accents involving the cowboy, the horse and the cattle.

The verses usually rhyme, and according to Griffith, it's the subject matter that sets cowboy poets apart.

"It's written from the point of view of people who are participants in this cultural tradition. Any kind of chastity aside, sort of death, is treated as one big joke," he said.

Wylie Henderson, a 32-year-old cowboy from Hotchkiss, Colo., has recited his poems on the Johnny Carson show. He satirizes the cowboy getup as worn by a non-

TRIGERMAN — Although Lori Osborne has no formal training in art or shop, she has custom designed and made many wooden signs for local ranchers and business people during the past year.

Among one of the first signs she made was a sign for Osborne Cattle Company, which she and her husband, Lyndert, operate, with his parents, Dwight and Ella Jean Osborne.

Osborne had long wanted to give her own parents a sign for their ranch in Bonner's Ferry, but couldn't decide on a style. While visiting her parents, she saw a wooden sign they had purchased for a friend of theirs.

When she realized the raised letters and mountains on the sign were merely wood pieces cut and fastened onto a piece of plywood, she said, "Anybody can do that," and began collecting ideas for designs.

Upon learning that a sign less than five square feet sold for \$110, Osborne promptly decided making signs might be what she had been looking for — an income that would allow her to work around the needs and activities of her two small children.

cowboy in these lines from one of his works:

"There was genuine pearl snaps on his brightly flowered shirt. He wouldn't have looked tanner if he'd been wearing a skirt. He had on dark slacks and a pair of them designer jeans. He looked like a picture in one of them magazines. There was a filter-tip cigarette a-hanging from his lip. I guessed he probably just wasn't old enough to dip. But I'd have to say one thing as I stared at this stranger. Now, here's what I'd call a real Rexall Ranger."

Henderson, who earns his living breaking coils for ranchers, says cowboys will always be part of American life because the nation is fascinated by them and the romanticism they evoke.

"It's a way of life, it's a culture,"

he said.

"Where do people in Europe and Japan go to see a cowboy? The Western United States. Part of it's due to that romanticism," he said.

However, rancher Wally McTae, of Forsyth, Mont., says cowboys' days could be numbered due to economic conditions in the beef and livestock industries.

McTae says the beef industry is almost as negatively perceived as the tobacco industry. And if that attitude persists, he says, "There's no longer going to be any cowboys."

The author of two books of original cowboy poetry, McTae says half his published poems are sentimental or sad and some deal with environmental themes.

One of his poems, entitled "Eminent Domain," involves his real-life efforts to keep a railroad from placing transmission lines on his land.

her husband to buy a band saw. She began to learn how to work with the saw and, and found a place on the ranch to work, a renovated grain bin without heat, so she wears a snowmobile suit to work in during the winter months.

Osborne takes her saw to shows and fairs to demonstrate her art.

At a show, she says she invariably has someone ask if her husband enjoys making the items she has on display. When they learn she makes everything—lugs—always ask to see her hands to see if she has any fingers missing, she says.

She says a lot of men tell her, "I have a band saw at home, but it doesn't do all that..."

Osborne, transmits her display, and saw in a stock trailer and has a dolly hand truck so she can move the saw around by herself.

In addition to the signs, she also makes items such as pie coolers, baskets, welcome signs, coat racks, hot pads, bread coolers, cutting boards in any shape, door stops, puzzles and animals.

Osborne says she will make any decorative design anyone can conceive, and finds it a challenge to do custom work.

Although she has been contacted and asked to supply wholesale items, she says she finds it much more creative to do the custom designs.

Osborne uses mostly pine and spruce for her designs, but occasionally uses some cedar.

Because Osborne and her parents visit back and forth several times a year, it is a simple matter to keep a good wood supply. She says her parents buy the wood for her in Bonner's Excels because they can buy it when prices are good and store it for her until her parents come to visit or she goes to visit them. That way she doesn't have to pay freight on it.

Osborne says her mother, Jean Plato, is very excited about her success and now spends her free time drawing patterns. She has even built herself a drafting table and pantograph so she can better design and make patterns. Plato also purchased a band saw, to encourage Osborne to stay longer when she comes for a visit.

Although a sign for her parents was in a round-about way responsible for Osborne's venture into this type of art, she has yet to make her parents' sign.

She says her mother has a large cedar stump to put the sign on, but they still can't decide on what name to put on the sign.

Other signs in the area by Osborne can be seen in Hub City Building in Wendell, Wilson-Bates Appliances in Gooding, The Dutchman's Place on Grady Island, Penta Post in Tuttle, The Jewel Kace in Elkhorn, and Vintage Yanties, Pioneer Hall Museum, Boer Dairy, West End Quik Service, Steve Bartlett's Construction and LaVisa's Doll House and Hospital, all in the Jerome area.

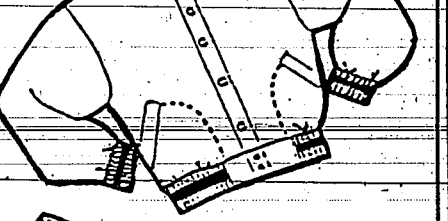
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Lee Greenwood: Capturing the American spirit

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — Lee Greenwood wanted to capture the spirit of America. "To see how the rest of the country felt," when he penned his popular hit "God Bless the U.S.A.," two years ago.

The song did that and more as it became a central theme in President Reagan's re-election and was last October named song of the year by the Country Music Association.

"The spirit of patriotism is strong within me," Greenwood said during a recent headline stint in this city where he once dealt cards and worked Strip lounges. "I wanted to put that spirit to music. I wanted to do something that would uplift the country."

"It seems every time there's a crisis, or a need to rally behind a cause, America turns to its music."

Greenwood had already established his music credentials before his patriotic hit. However, the song solidly entrenched him with his country-music following and opened up a whole new array of fans.

At the National Finals Rodeo in Las Vegas last month, Greenwood's appearance drew a standing ovation from the crowd of 16,000, surpassing the reception given any other Strip headline act appearing at the nine-day event.

The rousing ovation was a heady experience for the 42-year-old father of four who never lost faith in his ability to write and deliver a song.

Born in Los Angeles and raised in central California, Greenwood left his Sacramento home in 1960 to chase a dream. It would take three gigs and two misses, to realize it. His circuitous route to stardom took him to Reno, Las Vegas, Hawaii,

New York, Nashville and a laundry list of stops in between.

Greenwood bypassed a music scholarship at College of the Pacific to form The Apollos, leaving Sacramento the day he graduated from high school for a job in a Reno lounge. The group moved on to Las Vegas for a stint at the Stardust Hotel but in 1963 the dream of finding stardom in the desert evaporated.

For the next 18 years he spent much of his time in Las Vegas and Los Angeles, working as a music arranger, band leader, show tune writer, backup singer, piano bar performer, casino dealer and fried chicken cook.

Working in lounges — at the Tropicana, Desert Inn and Flamingo hotels — fanned his dream of stardom.

"I had that dream," he recalled recently while performing at the Frontier Hotel. "You couldn't help but have it. I watched a lot of people around me, including Seals & Croft and Wayne Newton make it."

Author sunk roots in her reading habit

DENVER — Jean Auel was an obsessive reader. As a young mother of five, she would read for three or four days, letting the dishes and diapers stack up, then clean for three or four days so she could hit the books again.

"But," recalled the best-selling author of "The Clan of the Cave Bear," "Valley of the Horses" and now "The Mammoth Hunters" (Crown, \$19.95), "I never was one who said, 'I'll write a book someday.'"

The crisis hit at 30. "I was supposed to get married and have babies and be fulfilled." But that was not how she felt. What do you do when you have five children, a full-time job, a traditional husband but no "fulfillment"?

You go to school. A full-time key punch operator by day, she became a student of physics, calculus and differential equations at night, a life she led for 12 years.

Somehow, differential equations evolved into business administration. She earned a master's degree at 40, never having gotten a bachelor's degree.

That November nine years ago, she quit her job as credit manager for a plastics corporation. "I did not quit to write a book, just to find some great, wonderful job." She considered opening her own business, marketing, working for someone else. Her mind was open.

But what came to her was an idea about "re-creating" the past. "You can get ideas all the time," she said. "But if you're not in a position to do anything about them, they just slip away."

After the chaotic years of key punching, making daughters' prom dresses and writing research papers, "there was no reason to go to school anymore, no more tests. My kids were almost grown. I had been expending a tremen-

dous amount of energy doing all those things. Then nothing" — except an idea about cave men.

"I wondered if I could write a short story — and it turned out to be kind of fun. But I didn't know what they (cave men) looked like, what they wore. So I did a little research." If she got nothing else from her pursuit of a master's degree, "By golly, you learn how to use a library."

Auel said she remembered reading somewhere that for a period, two different kinds of human beings coexisted on Earth. She consulted that old standby, the Encyclopedia Britannica, "which of course always suffers from being too much or not enough."

She read about Cro-Magnon people in the late Pleistocene epoch. "That gave me the words."

"Here I was discovering dinosaurs, cave lions twice as big as an African lion, woolly mammoths, eight kinds of deer. Once I got turned on to this period, I knew I was going to write a novel."

Auel read indiscriminately, from Time-Life coffee-table books to textbooks on microscopic studies of stone tools. "I kept seeing the people. Everybody else was seeing tools, seeing animals, but I kept seeing people."

Auel saw Ayla, a cave woman who has made her liberated way through three novels (700,000 words, says Auel) and the "challenging terrain of Ice Age Europe that millions of Jean Auel readers have come to treasure," declares the latest book's flap.

Followers of Ayla will want to know that in "Mammoth," the third of six projected "Earth's Children" novels, she leaves the valley-riding Whitney the horse with her lover Jondalar, meets the Mammoth Hunters who look like her, becomes attracted to an ivory-maker named Rance, finds herself in a life-threatening mammoth hunt.

Gossett's a great Lizard of Oz in 'Enemy Mine'

ENEMY MINE (PG-13). For two thirds of the way, it is a likable science-fiction parable about two combatants — a human and an extraterrestrial, "Drac" — who crash land on a desolate offworld and, after skirmishes, become friends. Then, we get another crash-zooze, effects-happy, big-bang climax. But while it is good, director Wolfgang Petersen spins another moving male-bonding story (like "Das Boot") and, as the Drac — a sort of Lizard of Oz, a cross between E.T., Gandhi, Tonto and Stevie Wonder —

AN OCEAN LINE (PG-13). The film of the musical is here at last, and on its trip has gone from champagne to Champagne. In this stately and fairly staid representation, directed by Richard Attenborough, what pokes through is how thin the material really is. If you were one of that legion who saw "Chorus Line" more than once in the theater, the film is enough to make you doubt.

IRON EAGLE (PG-13). Luddicrous action-adventure movie that would-

have us believe that an 18-year-old could talk a retired Air Force colonel into joining him on a flying mission to rescue his jet-pilot-father-father. With Jason Gedrick, Louis Gossett Jr.

THE JEWEL OF THE NILE (PG). This sequel to last year's marvelously tongue-in-cheek adventure comedy "Romancing the Stone" really feels the place. And Robert Redford's Denis Finch-Hatton is a real cipher. OUT OF AFRICA (PG). Because we are in a well-defined, faintly magical, perfectly appointed past where a level of intelligence is prized in this film — what is its problem? Casting, mostly, and a sense of place. Meryl Streep, as Isak Dinesen, may convince us utterly that she is in love with Africa, but our views of it are a little too stately to really feel the place. And Robert Redford's Denis Finch-Hatton is a real cipher. everything Russian, and centering around a match between Rocky and a blond Soviet giant pumped with steroids, the film — flip-flops at the last second, allowing hope for change in individuals of the two countries, while saying in its other 98 percent that the Soviets are simplistic animals worthy only of our contempt.

WHITE NIGHTS (PG-13). Despite the presence of Gregory Hines and, in particular, Mikhail Baryshnikov, this cooked-up, sassy story of two dancers, each yearning to escape from Russia — is cold, trapped and claustrophobic, managing to do wrong to two cultures and the talents of both men. Only Baryshnikov's yearning dance of freedom and passion, to a song by Russian dissident poet Vysotsky, is worthy of his talents.

Impressionist works on loan from U.S.S.R.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Forty works from the Soviet Union's famed collection of impressionist and post-impressionist paintings from the Hermitage Museum in Leningrad — and the Pushkin Museum in Moscow will be on view at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art July 2-Aug. 26. The exhibition will be composed of paintings by seven major artists, including Paul Cezanne, Claude Monet, Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Paul Gauguin, Vincent van Gogh, J.M.W. Turner, and Pablo Picasso.

Idahoans complain about film contract

BOISE (AP) — At least three Idaho artists and arts supporters are upset that the Travel Council has chosen a California company to produce a film promoting travel in Idaho.

The Travel Council, by a 3-2 vote, earlier this month selected Bishop Hansell of San Francisco. He will produce a film of 15 to 17 minutes at a cost of \$50,000 to \$70,000, said Carl Wolfe, information officer for the council.

Two Boise film companies, Echo Films and Rickers Michels Film Production, were among four finalists invited to make a presentation before the Travel Council. Wolfe said the council picked what it felt was the best company.

Idaho is competing with states with much bigger tourism budgets, Wolfe said. "We must really put our best foot forward," he said.

Jack Williams, veteran nature photographer living in Sun Valley, disagreed. "There's no need for this to go out of state," said Williams. "To really show the heart and soul of the state, you have to live here."

Ketchum Mayor Jerry Seiffert said he was surprised by the decision to award the contract out of state. He said it might be understandable if Idaho didn't have people with the ability to make such a film, but that isn't the case.

"We have some of the best there are," he said.

Gail Severn, Images Gallery, Ketchum, said local professionals are perfectly capable of producing the film.

The Idaho Travel Council is supported by tax money collected through a 2 percent tax on hotel and motel rooms and campground spaces.

'My Chauffeur' in driver's seat

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "My Chauffeur" hit the top of the movie box office winners during the Super Bowl weekend, making its debut at No. 1 on a gross of \$4.8 million.

The test-oriented Crown International movie outsold the previous leader, "Iron Eagle," which tumbled past "The Color Purple" and landed in third place.

"The Color Purple" held onto No. 2 with a gross of \$4.4 million, down from the \$5.7 million grossed the weekend before the National Football League's championship game. "Iron Eagle" had \$3.9 million compared to \$6.1 million the previous weekend.

The rest of the field had equally depressed grosses according to figures released Tuesday.

"Out of Africa" (fourth at \$3.2 million), followed by "Jewel of the Nile" with \$2.7 million and "Rocky IV" at \$2.3 million.

"Runaway Train" moved up one notch to "No. 7" on a gross of \$1.7 million at 950 screens while "Spies Like Us" slipped to eighth with \$1.7 million at 1,239 screens.

"Nightmare on Elm Street 2" was off \$3 percent from its previous week's gross, taking in \$1.58 million for the No. 9 spot, edging Columbia's "White Nights," with \$1.55 million.

Gable honored as hometown remembers his 85th birthday

CADIZ, Ohio — Film star Clark Gable has been dead for 25 years. But frankly, my dear, folks in his hometown are prouder of him than ever.

The King of Hollywood, whose last known visit to this eastern Ohio town of 3,000 was in 1931, will be remembered in style Saturday on the 85th anniversary of his birth. Nostalgia buffs and those who knew him when plan to dedicate a monument at the site of Gable's Charleston Street home, which was razed 25 years ago.

Best known for his role as the dashing, fast-talking Rhett Butler who wooed, won and walked out on Vivien Leigh's Scarlett O'Hara in "Gone With the Wind," Gable, say those who keep the local chronicles, wasn't much to look at before he went Hollywood.

"He had those great big ears," said Michael Cope, Harrison County treasurer and one of the founders of the 2-year-old Gable Foundation. "He also had a big gap between his teeth. But he was big and strapping and the ladies loved him."

The monument, to be dedicated

while residents don costumes reminiscent of characters from "Gone With the Wind." is the first step, Cope said.

Eventually, the foundation hopes to supplement the 7-foot granite and bronze monument with a life-size statue and a visitor's center that will also honor another native, Gen.

George Custer of Civil War and Little Bighorn fame.

Although 300 tickets have been sold for Saturday's birthday party, Cope said, some of Gable's more notable friends have sent regrets.

Among them is President Reagan, who Cope said promised to send a message for the ceremonies. Others who declined were "Gone With the Wind" co-stars Butterfly McQueen and Olivia De Havilland, as well as Sir Laurence Olivier and Claudette Colbert.

Ironically, residents are honoring a man who only lived here for a few years.

Born William Clark Gable in 1901 to William and Adeline Gable, 1867 records show Gable's mother died three months after his birth. Later, his family moved to Hopedale, where they lived until Gable turned 17.

It was then that Gable ran away to Akron, Cope said. He returned briefly when his stepmother became ill.

Cope said officials hope the Gable remembrance will promote tourism in this county of 17,000, where declines in the steel and coal industries have left nearly one-fourth of the work force without jobs.

"We have a lot to boast about, with Gable, Custer and other pretty famous Civil War figures that came out of this county," said Cope. "Things are tough here, but we still have our heritage and that's something to be proud of."

Winter Carnival at McCall: Ice sculptures draw funlovers

McCALL — If Man is anything, he's adaptable — a handy trait meaning he can make the best out of the worst.

"Not to be outdone, the residents of McCall have set out to prove that their two decades of Winter Carnival experience makes them the best at turning winter's gloom into extravagant gaiety."

The town begins celebrating its 22nd Annual Winter Carnival today. Says publicity chairman Jane Volk, "The residents of McCall who work so hard to produce this fabulous carnival are dedicated to the philosophy that it should be fun for all concerned. Those of us who do the work and those who come to town, enjoy themselves."

McCall's first winter carnival was held in 1947, and featured dog sled races, some snowmen and a toboggan slide from the top of the Hotel

McCall out onto the lake. Volk says it was held periodically for many years until it became an annual event during the 1960s.

"Since then, the main attractions have always been ice sculptures," she says, adding, "These marvelous works of art are produced by local people, not hired professional artists. The best ice sculptors in town are the druggist, the barber, the architect and a construction worker."

Volk points out that approximately 80 sculptures, some of monumental size, will adorn the small lakeside town for this year's carnival. "The largest sculptures can take up to 700 man hours to construct and are the result of long planning sessions, careful coordinating and cooperation — and terrific parties," she says.

Yet, the ice sculptures, which can be viewed anytime from Jan. 10 to Feb. 9, are only part of the festivities of what is billed as "the most exciting winter event in the Northwestern United States."

Today the traditional Torchlight Parade kicks off the 22nd Annual Winter Carnival with opening ceremonies featuring the Queen and her Court are introduced. Fireworks will be shot over Payette Lake at the end of the opening ceremonies, and a Cabaret Concert will be held at the Shore Lodge.

Saturday will feature a kids' snowman building contest, snowmobile races, cross-country ski races, craft show and sale, Carnival Parade, chili cook-off, square dance, variety show and teen dance.

On Sunday, snowmobile race finals will be held as well as telemark races, slalom and giant slalom on cross-country skis and a guided snowmobile tour. The craft show and sale will continue.

Other events during the carnival will be a beard contest, movies, fashion shows and wine tasting, bingo, cross-country ski poker-run and dinner, Casino Night and a slide presentation by photographer John Baker.

Elko plans Mardi Gras

ELKO, Nev. — Who says you have to go to New Orleans to celebrate Mardi Gras?

Not the folks from Elko who have gotten into the habit of producing their own form of carefree revelry. Called one of the most unique of Nevada's winter cultural events, Elko's Mardi Gras will be held Feb. 8 at the Elko Convention Center. Past chairman Sid Chalmers admits that Elko, originally a railroad and mining town, is hardly the place one would expect to encounter a New Orleans-style Mardi Gras celebration.

Yet, Chalmers, a former resident of Louisiana, explains, "We receive

support and recognition under the New Orleans Mardi Gras from Rex, the King of Mardi Gras, the Governor of Louisiana, the Mayor of New Orleans and the Governor of Nevada."

Chalmers adds, "Over the past four years, Mardi Gras has become the biggest event in Elko." The theme for this year's Mardi Gras will be "Mardi Gras at the Movies." Festivities will include the crowning of the King and Queen of Mardi Gras, a sit-down dinner and costume attire.

Ambitious new NBC miniseries 'Peter the Great' unfolds Sunday

"Peter the Great" (NBC, Sunday-Wednesday) will try to do for Imperial Russia what another blockbuster miniseries, "Shogun," did for medieval Japan.

The eight-hour miniseries is based on Robert Massie's Pulitzer Prize-winning biography of Peter, the Russian czar who opened his sprawling Empire. It's the first totally independent production filmed in the Soviet Union.

The cast includes Maximilian Schell as the mature Peter, Vanessa Redgrave as his ambitious half-sister Sophia, Laurence Olivier as King William of Orange, Omar Sharif as Prince Feodor Romodanovsky, Trevor Howard as Isaac Newton, Hanna Schygulla as Catherine and Lilli Palmer as Peter's mother Natalya.

The miniseries was filmed almost entirely on location in the Soviet Union, Austria and Germany. The cast also features 21 of Russia's finest actors, including Boris Plotnikov as Peter's son Alexis and Natalya Andreichenko as the czar's first wife Eudoxia.

More than seven months of filming in the USSR took place at many of the story's major historic locations, including the medieval city of Suzdal, the monastery at Zagorsk, Moscow and Leningrad (formerly St. Petersburg, the one-time capital of Russia built by Peter).

"Peter was a heroic figure, one who signaled a breathtaking step forward into the modern world," says Schell. "But he was also cruel and responsible for the deaths of thousands. I believe there is still a saying in Russia that St. Petersburg is built on men's bones."

"We're so civilized nowadays, so trained to be polite to one another. It's really hard for us to grasp what barbarous times there were back then," he continues. "This is a world in which one man had utter power over millions. What's hard to convey is the blind acceptance by everyone to this 'normal' state of affairs. For them it's as natural as the sun rising in the morning."

"Peter the Great" marks the third time Sharif has played a Russian. It was the first time, however, that he set foot in the Soviet Union. Sharif's first Russian character was

the title role in "Dr. Zhivago," which was shot mostly in Spain, in 1972's "The Tamarind Seed," which was filmed in Barbados, Sharif played a KGB agent who wanted to defect.

Of his character, Sharif says: "He's the faithful one. His attitude toward Peter never changes.

Without this man, Peter might have had a lot of trouble keeping his throne."

Lopsided score keeps network from setting Super Bowl record

NEW YORK — Super Bowl XX was on a record ratings pace, perhaps even on target for the major milestone of 50 percent of the population, but it lost some second-half viewers and finished as the No. 3-rated football game ever, network researchers said Tuesday.

NBC was this year's beneficiary of America's annual Super Bowl frenzy, and the top-rated network easily won the week and padded its prime-time season margin over CBS, according to figures released by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

For the week of Jan. 20 to Super Sunday, NBC had eight of the Top 10 shows and averaged a 21.2 rating to CBS' 16.0 and ABC's 14.4. The 18th week of the 30-week prime-time season raised NBC's leadership by three-tenths of a point, giving the network a 17.9 to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 14.4.

For CBS to overtake NBC, CBS would have to beat NBC, on average, by 11-12 points a week and "that's unlikely," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

The Chicago Bears' 46-10 Super Bowl shuffle of the New England Patriots Sunday achieved a 48.3 rating, ranking below the 49.1 of San Francisco-Cincinnati in 1982 and the 48.6 of Washington-Miami the following year.

Because the country has more homes with television today, the

game did set a record for most households viewing a Super Bowl. Nielsen said 41.5 million homes watched part of the game, and NBC projected that out to 120 million viewers, which would also be a Super Bowl record. Only the final episode of "M-A-S-H" had more total viewers, NBC said.

The 48.3 rating places Super Bowl XX sixth in rating among the all-time most popular TV shows. (A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.) The 3-hour, 51-minute game broadcast had a 70 share of audience that was watching TV during the time period.

NBC Sports President Arthur Watson had fantasized publicly about getting a 50 rating, and the game, boosted by the national popularity of the Bears and a 63.2 rating in the city of Chicago, appear headed for that status.

At 6 p.m. EST, 40 minutes into the game, Super Bowl XX had a 49.8 rating. But, instead of building viewers as often happens in close games, it fell to a 47 rating at 8 o'clock.

"Had the game remained competitive and had it sustained that rating, it clearly would have been the highest-rated Super Bowl," said Dave Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research.

Jaffe said the game was on target for a potential 50 rating.

"We're very pleased that the numbers held up, considering the

score, and it wasn't even as close as the score indicated," Jaffe said. "Again, we see the tremendous draw of the Super Bowl. It's not so much a game as a national event." NBC's post-game show ranked second with a 35.4 rating, followed by NBC's "The Cosby Show," NBC's "Family Ties," ABC's "Dynasty," NBC's "Miami Vice," NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "The Last Precinct," NBC's "Golden Girls" and CBS' "Murder, She Wrote."

NBC's debut of "The Last Precinct," a cop-show farce given the enviable position of following the Super Bowl, ranked eighth among 67 shows. NBC had promoted the program at least eight times during the 61-2 hours of pre-game, Super Bowl and post-game broadcasts.

The 90-minute program started with a 26.4 rating, but showed what Poltrack called "significant tuneout" and fell to a 22.5 in its last half hour, when it was beaten by a rerun of CBS' "Murder, She Wrote."

"The Last Precinct" fared about as well as last year's Super Bowl follow-up, ABC's "MacGruder and Loud," which didn't survive the season. Only NBC's "The A-Team" has become a hit among the prime-time series launched after the Super Bowl.

CBS' strategy of moving its popular "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote" each back two hours to avoid a full-scale Super Bowl confrontation "worked very well," said Poltrack.

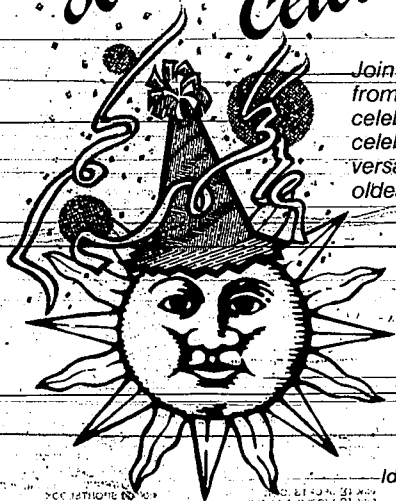

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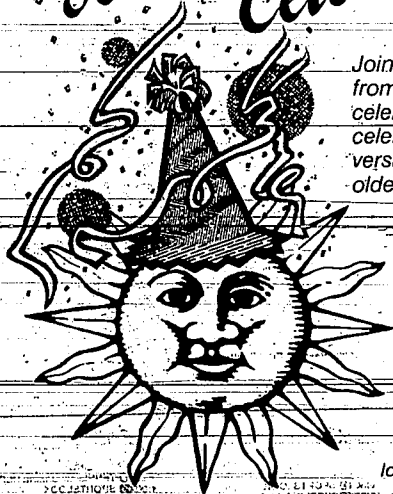

Arledge gives up on sports

NEW YORK (AP) — Roone Arledge surrendered day-to-day control of ABC's sports department last Monday to concentrate on the network's news division.

Arledge, 51, will remain president of ABC News and group president of ABC News and Sports. Dennis Swanson, president of the division that controls the five ABC-owned stations, took over as president of ABC Sports and will report to Arledge.

Arledge has been head of ABC Sports since 1968, and took over ABC News nine years later. He is credited with making ABC a leader in sports, and with turning the network's news operation into a competitive force in the industry.

Arledge said he had considered a diminished role in the sports division since 1984, but had continued, producing the Olympics and Super Bowl, because he felt co-workers were depending on him.

"It would have been a terrible thing to abandon them," he said.

John B. Sias, president of the ABC division and executive vice president of Capital Cities-ABC Inc., said in a statement that Arledge will continue as executive producer of ABC's coverage of the 1988 Winter Olympics in Calgary.

Arledge said he also will produce the network's four-day coverage of the Statue of Liberty's 100th anniversary.

Arledge said up until last week, he had been fully involved in the workings of ABC Sports, "checking the assignment schedule for the Indianapolis 500 announcers, deciding whether this contract or that one should be renewed."

Those decisions now will fall to Swanson, who once worked as a sportscaster for WMAQ radio and television in Chicago, and more recently served as an executive producer for the ABC station in Los Angeles and vice president and general manager of WLS, the ABC station in Chicago.

Arledge joined ABC as a sports producer in 1960 and became vice president of ABC Sports in 1963.

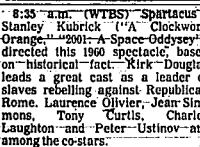

'People's Court' creator returns to Spokane, but he isn't retiring

SPOKANE — John Masterson, creator of the popular television show "The People's Court," is just like his media creations. He's colorful, succinct and made-for-television.

Masterson recently returned to his native Spokane with his second wife, Mary, because Hollywood and New York City, where his production headquarters are located, were not the places in which the couple wishes to spend most of their time.

But Masterson, 73, is not retiring. In fact, he's as busy now as he's been at any time in his eventful career.

His most recent production, "The Booth," was shown on national public television in October. Masterson currently is developing a half-hour comedy series starring Jonathan Winters.

But Masterson will be remembered most throughout the entertainment sector as the creator of "The People's Court." Now in its fifth year, the show is the highest-rated first-run syndicated series in the United States.

The five-day half-hour program presents a genuine small-claims case in which Judge Joseph A. Wapner listens to testimony, weighs evidence and issues a verdict.

Masterson first thought of the courtroom concept in 1958. He turned the idea over to Stu Billet, the show's executive producer, who could not sell the show for six years.

Masterson says Billet finally went to Ralph Edwards, producer of television's "This Is Your Life," and "Truth or Consequences." Edwards saw potential in the series, and he and Billet spent \$150,000 on its pilot.

Masterson says the key to the show is Wapner, a retired California

Superior Court judge who once dated Lana Turner and now has several fan clubs.

"He was a find," Masterson says of Wapner, who was discovered by Billet and Edwards after they auditioned six other retired judges. "He's magnificent. He gives the courtroom some reality. You watch

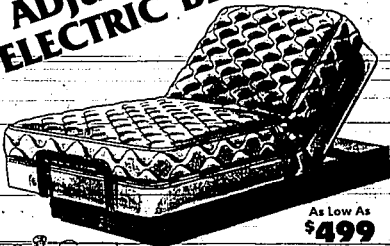
the show; you get the feeling there's no such thing as a little case."

Masterson says he watches the program "a couple of times a week. It's fascinating. Some shows, of course, are better than others."





Spokane's Gonzaga University in 1931. As a sophomore, he joined forces with classmates John Reddy and John Nelson to improve the university's annual play. So began a partnership that later on in Hollywood would become known as The Three Johns.

Masterson, Reddy and Nelson were Gonzaga's big men on campus, where they served as student body president, school newspaper editor and head of student dramatics, respectively.

After graduation in 1935, the three settled in San Francisco, where

Masterson wrote for Transradio Press and promoted the Shrine East-West football game. Nelson worked as a radio announcer and Reddy wrote.

When Nelson was offered a chance in 1941 to announce a radio program called "Breakfast at Sardi's" in Hollywood, Masterson and Reddy moved with him.

The show, which later was called "Breakfast in Hollywood," became a hit, and Masterson says his ideas suddenly became easier to promote.

In 1943, Masterson married a Spokane girl, Kylie Cortesy. By 1945,

he had a son, and along with Reddy and Nelson, two hit radio shows, "Bride and Groom" and "Live Like a Millionaire."

"Bride and Groom" which moved to television and featured live weddings, was television's top-rated daytime program in the early 1950s.

Masterson made an easy transition when television overtook radio. He continued to promote and create new programs with various advertising agencies, while Nelson created programs for NBC-TV, and Reddy wrote for Reader's Digest.

Masterson continued to create programs in Hollywood and New York, where he met his second wife, an actress.

He also wrote poetry, some of which was published by the New York Times. The Times' John Crosby once wrote that Masterson's varied talents proved him "an exuberant genius."

Masterson now is one of the few independent television producers permitted to produce new series in his own facilities.

Masterson says he and his wife now spend most of their time traveling and visiting their children.

But studio doors in Hollywood and New York remain open to Masterson.

"The ideas don't stop," he says.

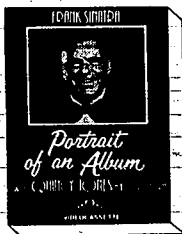

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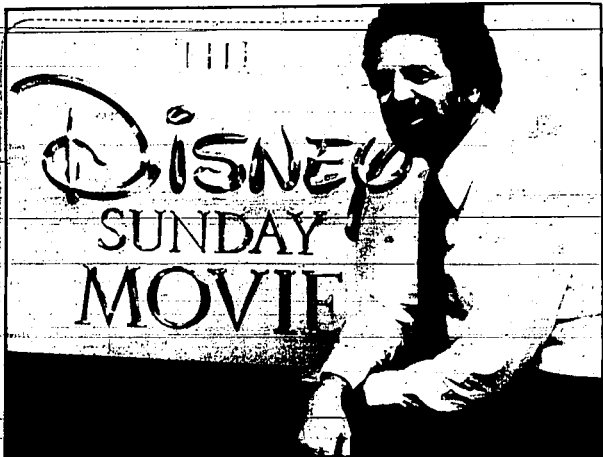
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Rich Frank of Walt Disney Productions says the movies are aimed at young viewers

Disney reappears on network TV with regular ABC Sunday films

LOS ANGELES — Walt Disney is returning to network television after an absence of nearly three years with a series of movies aimed, of course, at the whole family.

The Disney Sunday Movie will premier on ABC Sunday with a lineup that includes 10 two-hour movies and 13 one-hour movies. Some of the one-hour shows may be run back-to-back.

The premiere movie, "Help Wanted: Kids," is a comedy in which Clady Williams and Bill Hudson play a working couple who hire two spoiled kids to be their children.

The boss insists they be family people to support his company image.

"We're aiming primarily for youngsters under 12 years of age as the target audience," said Rich Frank, president for motion pictures and television at Walt Disney Productions. The movies will begin Sunday at 8 p.m. MST.

period in which the Federal Communications Commission requires either informational programming (CBS' "60 Minutes") or children's programming (NBC's "Punky Brewster" and "Silver Spoons").

"We have to walk a fine line to appeal to the whole family," Frank said. "We discarded many ideas because you couldn't tell them from a child's point of view. But because the primary appeal is under 12 doesn't mean everything has to be about children. Children loved "Ghostbusters."

"The Fighting Choice," for example, is about a 16-year-old victim of epilepsy who sues his parents to have a very risky operation that could alleviate his condition. We told the story through the eyes of his younger brother," Frank said.

Disney voluntarily abandoned network television in 1983 to concentrate its energies on launching pay cable's Disney Channel. Now, with more than 2.5 million subscribers and a growth rate faster than any other cable service, the studio has

turned its attention back to commercial TV.

Disney does have another series on television, NBC's "The Golden Girls," but it is under its Touchstone banner because of its adult content.

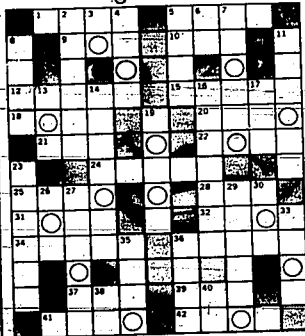
Frank said the full resources of the studio were devoted to "The Disney Sunday Movie" and that studio executives met regularly to discuss ideas.

"It's a huge order from ABC and it's created a lot of problems," said Rich. "It's put a lot of pressure on us. You literally have all the top executives working on this every day. We want this project to happen. We want Disney's re-entry into television to be spectacular."

Michael Eisner, Disney's chairman, remembered a lawyer friend telling his three sons about traveling across America when he was 14. Out of that will come a movie about a man taking his family across country.

Rich said each of the two-hour movies would have a budget of more than \$10 million. See DISNEY on Page 47

than \$3 million and the one-hour shows would cost more than \$1 million. "We haven't decided whether they will go (into reissue) after ABC. Maybe to the Disney Channel," he said.

"There is no guarantee "The Disney Sunday Movie" will go beyond this season, but the studio is already developing scripts for next year. "We're anticipating renewal," said Rich. "We have to do the scripts now, otherwise we couldn't get them done."

Rich said the movies would be a mixture of drama, comedy, adventure and animation. Here are some of the upcoming movies:

• "Young Again," about a 40-year-old man who wishes he was 17 and then has to deal with having his wish granted. It stars Lindsay Wagner, Robert Urich and Jack Gilford.

• "The Girl Who Spelled Freedom," based on a true story about a young Cambodian girl who goes through the pains of assimilation with her new American family. It stars Wayne Rogers and Mary Kay Place.

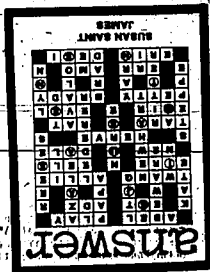
• "The Richest Cat in the World," about a clever cat who inherits \$5 million and is kidnapped by a disinherited relative. The cast is not set.

• "Blue Yonder," about a boy who travels back through time and meets his grandfather, a flying ace in the Lindbergh era. It stars Art Carney, Pete Coyote and Huckleberry Fox.

• "My Town," about the rejuvenation of a Midwestern town by families from large urban cities, as seen by a 12-year-old girl. It stars Glenn Ford and Meredith Salenger.

"I know the idea is right," Rich

said. "If we execute it right it'll be a hit. And I don't think that means beating '60 Minutes.' I'd consider it a success if we did a 21-22 share (percent of audience watching TV in that time period) to start with. I'm confident if we did that we'll be renewed — with applause."



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
