Violence, cheating mar Filipinos' voting

MANILA, Philippines — Four people were killed stealing ballot boxes, the government said, and a military alert was extended when millions of Filipinos voted Friday for a president — Ferdinand E. Marcos — earlier for 20 years, or Corason Aquino, widow of his assassinated rival.

Agency, said communist rebels ambushed an army tank escorting election officials carrying ballot boxes on a road in northern Mindanao, 300 miles south of Manila. The agency report said four attackers were killed and several wounded when the tank returned fire. There were no other casualties, the report said.

Suicide at Jerome 'shock' to students

JEROME — Jerome High School officials say they are at a loss to explain the latest suicide of a Jerome High School student. "It's been a shock to the student body and to everyone of the teachers," said Roy Parton, Jerome High School counselor, Thursday. "There was no indication whatsoever."

"It doesn't fit the pattern," Parton said. "It was very rare that people contemplating suicide give no indication, he said, but it does happen. Last week Parton said the school had been conducting counseling sessions for students following a rash of suicide attempts in Jerome between October and December. As a result of these, the school wanted to establish a peer counseling group in April, after a training session in February.

Senate overrides Evans' budget vetoes

BOISE — Trying to avoid what he feared could be "serious disruption" of government services, Democratic Gov. John Evans vetoed nearly \$1.5 billion in 1986 budget cuts Thursday only to see the Republican-dominated Senate move quickly to override him.

Challenger probe focuses on boosters



Tip of Challenger's fuel tank is lifted off U.S.S. Preserver

WASHINGTON — NASA told a presidential panel Thursday that an errant flame near Challenger's right boosters first appeared 59.9 seconds after liftoff and "moved quite a bit" in the final instants before an explosion destroyed the space shuttle and killed its crew. Space agency officials also said NASA has no reason to suspect that sub-freezing launch-day temperatures affected the boosters or in any other way contributed to last Tuesday's tragedy.

Moore told the panel that according to data received at Mission Control, "The vehicle appeared to be performing normally until the explosion." But suddenly, nearly 74 seconds into the flight, he said, "all telemetry stopped and we observed the breakdown" of the shuttle from the ground. No matter what the cause, another official said NASA has no "practical" emergency procedure that could have saved the "live man," even when crew so long as the shuttle's twin solid-rocket boosters were burning.

new budget, a three-judge federal panel announced it would rule today on a lawsuit challenging the constitutionality of the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing law. "Twelve members of Congress have introduced sharp bills to bring back the sun," Deshaie said. ## Quake hits Yellowstone area

WEST YELLOWSTONE, Mont. (AP) — An earthquake measuring slightly more than 3.8 on the Richter scale rattled West Yellowstone on Wednesday morning.

The quake occurred at 7:36 a.m., according to seismologist Mike Stickey at the Earthquake Studies Center at Montana Tech in Butte.

It was followed by a tremor with a 3.2 magnitude one minute later and another measuring 3.0 at 8:25 a.m.

Since the magnitude and frequency decreased like that, it would say that the second and third quakes were aftershocks from the first, Stickey said.

He estimated that the quakes originated five miles east of town along a north-northwest fault line.

That is the same fault along which a swarm of quakes occurred from early October to the third week in December last year.

## Hofmann bail argued in court

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A rare documents dealer charged with murder nearly four months after two people were killed in separate bombings is entitled to a bail hearing, defense lawyers argued Thursday.

Mark W. Hofmann, 31, seriously injured when a bomb exploded in his car, was charged Tuesday with murder in the Oct. 15 killings. Authorities had said since the bombings that he was their chief suspect.

Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney Gerry O'Ella said it was common practice for prosecutors to request that a person charged with a capital offense not be granted bail pending trial.

Defense lawyer Brad Rich said the hearing was held to determine whether the state's evidence was sufficient enough to persuade the judge to order Hofmann held.

Fifth Circuit Court Judge Paul Grant said he would consider the arguments, and a court clerk said a decision was not expected until Friday.

## Strikers, backers arrested

AUSTIN, Minn. (AP) — More than two dozen striking meatpackers and their supporters were arrested Thursday after the National Guard briefly blocked access to the Hormel flagship plant, site of a bitter 5½-month-old walkout.

The Guard troops briefly blocked access to the Co. A, Hormel & Co. plant as about 20 striking meatpackers rallied outside. The strikers attempted to make citizen's arrests of a city police officer and at least two Guardsmen.

The demonstration came a day after Hormel officials and union leaders held their first meeting in three weeks, but reported no progress.

About 1,500 members of Local P-9 of the United Food and Commercial Workers union went on strike Aug. 17 in a dispute over wages. Hormel began hiring replacement workers and reopened the plant Jan. 13.

## Ortega denounces germ tests

HAVANA, Cuba (AP) — Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega said Thursday he has received information that the United States has been testing bacteriological weapons in southern Honduras for possible use across the border in Nicaragua.

Ortega claimed the testing began when the Reagan administration determined that anti-government Contra rebels were unable to make headway against the Sandinista Army.

U.S. State Department spokesman Deborah Cavin said in Washington that the department would have no comment on Ortega's charges.

## Child deaths shock neighbors

SCHENECTADY, N.Y. (AP) — Neighbors expressed shock Thursday over the suspicion that a woman killed her eight natural children and a foster child since 1979, and the minister who performed one of the funerals said he was convinced there was no foul play.

Mary Beth Tinning, 43, was arraigned Wednesday on a second-degree murder charge in connection with the Dec. 20 suffocation of her 9½-month-old daughter, Tami Lynne. The infant was smothered with a pillow, police said.

Mrs. Tinning was being held without bond at the Oneida County Jail in Utica. She is to return to court Tuesday.

## U.S. deplors jet interception

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The United States on Thursday deplored Israeli interception of a Libyan civilian plane but vetoed a Security Council resolution that would have condemned the Israeli action.

Ten of the 15 Council members supported the resolution and four U.S.-allies — Britain, France, Denmark and Australia — abstained in the vote that came after three days of protracted and often heated debate on a Syrian-Libyan complaint.

## Crew seeks bodies on ranch

STRATTON, Colo. (AP) — Fifteen workers dug with shovels and backhoes Thursday for more human remains where two skeletons were uncovered this week at a ranch once owned by a man charged in a 1983 slaying.

A third set of remains found Thursday afternoon was being tested to see if they are human, said Kit Carson County Sheriff Sharon Heinz.

"It's just so crumbled you can't really tell," Heinz said.

Heinz, the official spokeswoman for the investigation, has said "more than four" bodies may be found at the former ranch of Thomas R. McCormick, 52, of Aurora, but has declined to comment further on the case.

McCormick was charged Tuesday with first-degree murder after the body of Hubert Donato, a 60-year-old Caldwell, Idaho, trucker missing since 1983, was unearthed last week in a shallow grave 100 miles west of the ranch.

Risch accused the governor of trying to gain political advantage through a specific reaction. He chose to veto, but Democrats claimed Evans' actions reflected sensitivity to the plight of Idaho's less fortunate citizens who need government help.

Republicans remained mum during the nearly 90 minutes of debate as Democrats unsuccessfully used facts, figures and persuasion to sway them. Then all 28 voted again and again to override the veto, joined twice by Democrat Dwight Horsch of Aberdeen. Horsch said he broke ranks on the Tax Commission and Veterans Services overrides only to prove to the Republicans that he did not support slashing programs with a direct effect on people.

"There are thousands of people in this state who will be suffering and losing their specific reactions to conditions," said Sen. Norma Dobler, D-Moscow, in trying to stop the GOP juggernaut.

"This is a futile exercise," admitted Sen. Bert Marley, D-Pocatello. "You're not going to beat the drum of sympathy because you're obviously marching to a different drummer."

Evans had asked lawmakers to support a total exemption from cuts in Developmental Disabilities — Services and Community Mental Health programs and ease the reductions for the others. Following that plan, the net effect of the governor's action would have been a \$5.5 million 1986 budget cut instead of the \$7.6 million sent to his desk.

Risch suggested that if major problems arise because of the cuts imposed on the 11 programs, emergency petitions for additional money could be submitted to lawmakers for review just as they are during less critical financial times.

The Republican plan, rushed through the House and Senate last week against solid Democratic opposition, was based on Evans' original proposal for a 2½ percent across-the-board spending cut that would save nearly \$60 million. But GOP leaders exempted a number of other programs and limited cuts for more so they had to impose 4.5 percent reductions on the rest.

It was those decisions that Evans questioned.

"I have to give them credit; they were trying their level best," Evans said, but their failure to adequately research the impact of the proposed reductions led to "rather arbitrary cuts."

While many of the spending reductions in the bill exceeded his original recommendation, Evans said he believed most of those agencies could get by on the reduced allotments for the final five months of the budget year although he urged any agencies feeling otherwise to petition legislative budget writers for additional money.

But with federal funds being reduced under the Gramm-Rudman-Hollings, the additional curtailment in state spending meant "many of our most vulnerable citizens, including the blind, disabled and the elderly, would be left without needed services."

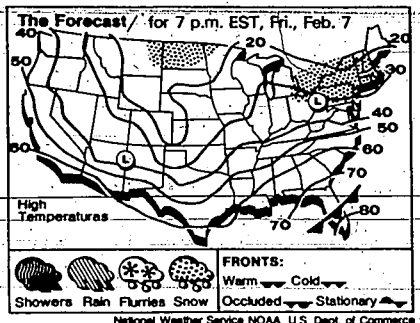
Nevada — Fair and continued cold tonight. Mostly sunny west and partly cloudy east with a chance of flurries Saturday. Lows tonight zero to 10.

entation that was so slow-paced that commission chairman William Rogers urged witnesses to focus their testimony on the more relevant and critical areas.

The day-long session, at the National Academy of Sciences, took place as NASA crews picked up the tank of Challenger's external fuel tank and examined some readings that indicated that parts of both boosters may now have been located on the Atlantic floor off Cape Canaveral.

Rogers said at the end of the day that the panel would resume its meetings today in private, but promised that all of the information collected would be made public eventually.

From the outset, commission members began with questions about the suspect right booster rocket and the unusually cold temperatures that preceded the launch.

Most of NASA's deputy administrator in charge of shuttle operations, said experts are "enhancing all of our photography" and "we're concentrating a lot of that photography on the right-hand solid-rocket booster."

The explosion occurred just after the Jan. 28 flight was 37 seconds old, and 100,000 feet above the ground. Rogers said there was no practical reason to save the crew during the first two minutes of flight, before the booster rockets burn out and separate from the shuttle. Thus, commander Richard Scobee probably could not have steered Challenger to safety even if the plume was detected.

Questioned closely by several members of the panel, Aldrich said he had "no concern" on launch day about the impact of the temperatures on the shuttle.

# Degree requirement targeted

**BOISE** — The House Education Committee will hear discussion today of a bill that would do away with requirements that the state superintendent of public instruction hold a college degree and a school administrator's certificate.

The bill is being proposed by Rep. Robert Forrey, R-Nampa, who announced last summer that he was considering running for the office until he discovered his lack of a college degree shut him out.

Idaho law now requires that the chief of the Department of Education be a graduate of a college or university approved by the Board of Education; hold a valid Idaho administrator's certificate; and be actively engaged in educational work in the state public schools or state educational institutions.

"We have an un-elected board of people picking our candidates," said Forrey, referring to the state Board

of Education and its requirement that candidates hold a degree from a board-approved school.

"Voters should not be restricted from choosing whomever they want to run the state's school system," Forrey said. Both the Republican and Democratic-national-party platforms include statements that encourage an open political process, he added.

The existing law's requirement that a candidate also hold an administrator's certificate narrows the field to an "elite" group of people with master's degrees, Forrey said.

Educators have "created a fourth branch of government... you can't

break into that unless you are one of them," Forrey said. "It's almost as if they have said 'This is our office'."

The conservative Canyon County lawmaker told the committee he no longer has any interest in running for superintendent of public instruction. "I will not be a candidate for this office," he said at a Thursday morning meeting of the committee.

Other elected officials, such as Governor, are not restricted by any qualifications other than age and residency.

Candidates for state treasurer do not even have to prove they can count to 10, he said.

Forrey said a strong administrator who was not an educator could run the state's school system well by delegating responsibility for the details. "He hires the detail people," Forrey said.

Opponents to the measure are expected to testify today, when the committee may vote whether or not to recommend passage of the bill.

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# Dairymen push tougher standards

**BOISE** — Looking to improve the taste and nutritional value of milk, the Idaho Dairymen's Association is pushing a bill in the House to increase the "minimum" standards for milk.

The bill was approved by the House Agricultural Affairs committee Thursday and calls for increases in the non-fat solid content of milk.

IDA lobbyist Vicki Patterson Nielsen said Thursday that the proposed changes will increase calcium and protein levels in milk by 21 percent and the iron level by 27 percent.

In California, where the higher standards are already in effect, the dry milk stirred into milk at processing plants improved the taste, Nielsen said. "They did consumer tests; people liked the taste better," she said.

She said that the IDA is joining the dairymen of Oregon and Washington to try to get all three states to increase the minimum milk standards simultaneously. The move will improve the nutritional value of milk, and help sell more milk, she said.

The committee also voted Thursday to send to the House floor a bill to stiffen the fines for switching tags

from cattle that have been vaccinated against brucellosis to cattle that have not been vaccinated. House Bill 514 will increase the fines for tag switching from a maximum of \$100 to a maximum of \$2,000.

The bill also adds new language to the law that makes it illegal to put vaccination tags in the ears of unvaccinated cattle. This change will make it easier for Department of Agriculture officials to catch tag switchers, since they will no longer have to actually catch someone in the act of switching tags.

Brucellosis is a disease that causes cattle to have miscarriages.

## Board to check emergency rules

**BOISE (AP)** — The Idaho Board of Education will hold a special meeting next week to review its rules for declaring a financial emergency for the state's higher education system.

Executive Director Charles McQuillen said board members would meet in closed session for a short time on Wednesday to consider changes in the financial emergency rules and to review litigation that has resulted from those rules in the past.

The regulations go into effect after the board declares a financial emergency. Once they are in effect any higher education employees, including tenured professors, can be laid off with 30-days notice.

"We heard about the holdback last summer. We asked the institutions to give us some idea of what it would mean if it was temporary. We also asked for what it would mean if it were a permanent reduction

in the budget base," McQuillen said. "The indication was a permanent reduction would require a declaration of financial exigency."

## Coeur d'Alene patrols continue

**COEUR D'ALENE, Idaho (AP)** — City police have maintained normal operations even though they have been without liability insurance for five weeks, said Chief Frank Freme.

City and police officials refused to follow the lead of Sandpoint, which pulled its police patrols off the streets for a day last month during an insurance crisis. Sandpoint officials also closed City Hall, city parks and properties to the public.

Coeur d'Alene's \$88 insurance cost \$111,423 for all municipal coverages except police liability. City Attorney Dana Wetzel said individual officers are insured against suits but the city isn't.

## 'After 5 p.m.' work comes with the job

Twin Falls County Clerk Richard Pence, who makes about \$21,000 a year from the taxpayers as an elected county official, should not be allowed to charge the city of Twin Falls for what he says is "personal time" in helping with city elections.

Indeed, the tone of Pence's explanation about why he is entitled to the money seems inappropriate to us. He says he "doesn't owe the city anything" and "I don't have to do city work on county time."

We agree with Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney who says "I'm of the opinion that he (Pence) is on a salary like the rest of us."

We are also concerned with Pence's method of billing the city; he asked for a check to be made out to him personally and then sent to his home.

Since these bills were incurred in what looks to us like Pence's official capacities, we think they should have been submitted through the county's normal billing channels. The city, if it decides to pay, can then make out the check to the county, which can then pay Pence. The check should not be sent to his home address.

State law in the duties of election clerks is admittedly vague, says Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yursa. In Idaho law, a county clerk is not the same as the city clerk and is under no obligation to conduct county elections. Still, Yursa says "the county bills the city for costs" and that they generally cooperate on election days.

That, in our view, is how things ought to work. Pence may consider himself an employee solely of the county. Maybe he is. But would he then like his salary reduced by the proportion city residents contribute to county revenue?

A proposal before the Legislature would help clear up some of this by clarifying the functions of city and county clerks.

In the meantime, Twin Falls County does not need two election clerks. In our view, Pence ought to be willing to work for both, even if it includes some weekend and "after 5 p.m." time. That comes with the territory, we think, of holding an elected office which pays \$21,000 a year.

They are, after all, many people in this community who would gladly take the job.

# House foes prepare drinking age battle



**BOISE (AP)** — Legislation that would make 21 the legal drinking age in Idaho next October has been sent to the House floor for a vote in the Idaho Legislature.

But opponents of provisions expanding drinking hours and allowing sale of liquor by the drink on Sundays say they hope to muster enough votes to amend those sections out of the bill.



The House State Affairs Committee went through a series of close votes on Thursday, then sent the bill to the floor for action.

The vote was 11-9 to give the proposal "do-pass" endorsement, with at least one lawmaker who voted it out of committee planning to amend it.

The bill that survived three days of committee hearings and debate was one sponsored by Rep. Dean Haagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene. It

raises Idaho's legal drinking age from 19 to 21, and also allows legal drinking an extra hour at night. It gives counties the option of allowing Sunday liquor-by-the-drink sales.

A competing bill, sponsored by Rep. Dean Sorenson, R-Boise, was ordered held indefinitely, which usually is a killing motion. The vote was 12-8.

Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, led an effort to hold the Haagenson bill, but lost a 10-10 tie

vote. The committee then voted 12-8 against sending the Haagenson bill to the House floor for an amendment.

Finally, 11 committee members voted to send the bill to the House floor. One of them, Rep. Lyman Gene Winchester, R-Kuna, said it was his intent to put the bill up for amendment, and take out the provisions extending the drinking hours and allowing Sunday liquor sales.

Voting to send the bill to the House floor were Republicans Pam Bengson, Lydia Justice Edwards, Robert Fry, Haagenson, Larry Harris, Janet Hay, Hilde Kellogg, Mike Strasser, Winchester and Walt Little. Democrat Carl Braun also voted to send the bill to the floor for a vote.

Ms. McDermott also urged the committee to amend the Haagenson bill, to make 21 the legal age for everything except voting, holding

public office and driving.

"When we draw a line, and make a policy that, until someone attains this age, they are not responsible for their actions," the policy should be extended to everything, she said.

That would mean people could not sign contracts, buy cars, get married or enter into any other agreement until reaching the age 21, she said.

Committee members were warned that if Idaho does not go along with a federal law and raise the legal drinking age to 21, it will lose \$15 million in federal highway funds this year and \$9 million in the next budget.

## Symms 'neutral' in 2nd District race

**BOISE (AP)** — Sen. Steve Symms, and most of them are good friends of H-Idaho, says he isn't endorsing anyone in the crowded field for the Republican nomination in Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

"I could support many of those candidates with a lot of enthusiasm, but I want them, and their supporters, to back Steve Symms, so Symms — in a telephone interview — in staying out of that primary," he said.

## Panel considers tougher waste bill

**BOISE (AP)** — Although not perfect, a proposed new state law on the transportation of hazardous waste and materials is "the best we could hope for," says Attorney General Jim Jones.

Jones was among witnesses testifying Thursday afternoon before a legislative hearing of the House Environmental Affairs and Transportation committees.

The legislators are considering a bill which Jones and other sponsors say will make it easier for the state to enforce regulations on the transportation of hazardous

substances.

"We need to ensure the health and safety of motorists and that we will have safe transportation of hazardous substances," said Jones.

Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, said the hearing was to gather information only, and the Transportation Committee is scheduled to act on the legislation at a meeting on Monday.

The legislation removes the current need to obtain a \$20 permit for

each trip, but imposes a new \$50 permit for a single trip or \$100 for an annual permit.

The money goes into a new account which is to pay for the training, equipping and operating expense for Idaho State Police officers. They are to be trained in regulations covering hazardous substances.

The bill allows civil fines from \$300 to \$10,000 for violations, and fines up to \$10,000 and up to one year in jail for criminal convictions.

## Orofino pen site favored

**OROFINO (AP)** — Site selection for a new maximum-security state prison is at least seven months away, provided funding is approved, but Corrections Director Al Murphy said Orofino appears to have an economic edge over other potential locations.

"Orofino looks very favorable as far as economics," Murphy told about 150 people at a public meeting this week.

Murphy said preliminary figures indicate the state could save between \$1 million and \$1.5 million by building a new prison at Orofino because of facilities already in place in association with the Northern Idaho Correctional Institution. However, he said a decision on where to put a penitentiary to help ease overcrowding in Idaho's prison system probably would not come until August or September.

## ISU makes push in pharmacy study

**POCATELLO (AP)** — Idaho State University would like the Western Interstate Commission for Higher Education to designate the Pocatello school the region's center for graduate and undergraduate pharmacy study, ISU President Richard Bowen said.

Bowen said he would make the proposal at a conference beginning today in Portland, Ore., with WICHE representatives, educators and policy makers.

The meeting was called to review a WICHE study that concludes a regional pharmacy program may reduce the impact of an expected nationwide shortage of practicing pharmacists.

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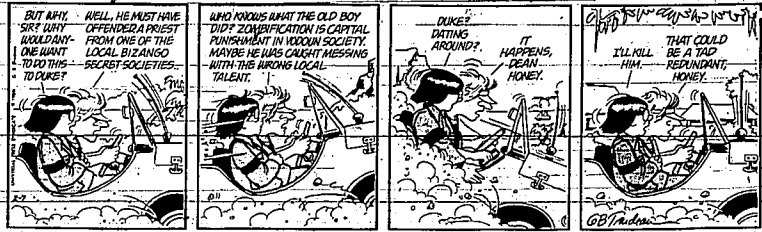
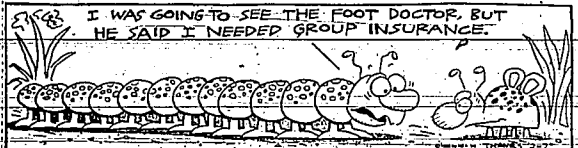

## Navy medical care under fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Navy had failed to correct health care problems when a high-ranking officer was assuring Congress the system was improving, Sen. Pete Wilson asserted Thursday. Wilson, R-Calif., released an internal military document, which he said contradicted with an assessment of Navy health care given to a Senate subcommittee during a public hearing. In the document, the Navy inspector general concluded last October that "very little progress has been made to correct the deficiencies" identified in a 1984 review.

Wilson said he was demanding an explanation from Navy Secretary John Lehman, but said he had not yet received an answer.

## President celebrates 75 years

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan celebrated his 75th birthday with prayer and merriment Thursday, saying he is "a little amazed" at the events of his lifetime and still feels young despite a year of health problems and international crises.

The president began his day attending the National Prayer Breakfast at a Washington hotel, where he bowed his head in prayers led by the Rev. Billy Graham and others and listened as Vice President George Bush read greetings from world leaders.

Back at the White House, at an Oval Office ceremony at which he signed his 100th report, Reagan reminded reporters that indeed he was 75, but added, "Remember, that's only 24 Celsius."

## Stalin's NIST outfoxed FDR

NEW YORK (AP) — Josef Stalin claimed that he used a secret understanding of English to his advantage during World War II conferences with Franklin D. Roosevelt and Winston Churchill, Roosevelt's son says.

In an article in Parade magazine, Elliott Roosevelt also said that Stalin told him in a post-war interview that he believed the president had been poisoned by members of the British prime minister's "gang."

He wrote that Stalin told him in late 1946 that his mother, Eleanor Roosevelt, was barred from the Soviet Union because she had refused to allow Soviet diplomats to see FDR's body after his death in 1945.

## Coal pile buries mine workers

FAIRVIEW, W.Va. (AP) — A large pile of coal collapsed at a mining complex Thursday, killing five workers who were buried, authorities said.

Rescue crews dug frantically through the coal at the Consolidation Coal Co. but did not find the last of the bodies until more than an hour after the 9 a.m. MIST accident.

The three Consolidation employees and two outside contractors were standing atop a pile of coal in a loading bin inspecting a conveyor system at the Loweridge preparation plant when the pile collapsed beneath them, said company spokesman Paul Kvederis.

## Harvester recalls school buses

CHICAGO (AP) — International Harvester Co. will recall 55,800 school buses and 78,800 medium-duty trucks to correct a defect that could make a driver unable to steer, a company official said Thursday.

Only medium-duty trucks and school buses manufactured between 1978 and May 1985, with front-axle capacitities of 5,000, 6,000, 7,500 or 8,000 pounds are affected, said Bill Greenhill, Harvester's manager of external communications.

# Yarbrough, other Order members draw sentences of 40 to 100 years

SEATTLE (AP) — Five members of the neo-Nazi group The Order convicted of racketeering were sentenced Thursday to prison terms ranging from 40 to 100 years, and one said "blood will flow" as others in the white-supremacist sect try to establish an Aryan homeland.

Bruce Carroll Pierce, 31, Randolph George Ducey, 35, Gary Lee Yarbrough, 30, Andrew Virgil Barnhill, 29, and Richard Harold Kemp, 23, were sentenced to the maximum terms by U.S. District Judge Walter McGovern.

McGovern presided at a 3½-month trial that ended Dec. 30 with racketeering convictions for 10 members of the militant sect. The

remaining five defendants were to be sentenced Friday.

The defendants also were convicted of separate offenses that included armed-car robberies, transporting stolen money across state lines, and illegal weapons possession.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Gene Wilson, who headed the government lawsuit, said he hoped the sentences would send a message that activities by groups such as The Order would not be tolerated.

Pierce and Ducey each received consecutive 20-year sentences on five separate counts for a total of 100 years. Ducey was sentenced to a concurrent term of 55 years.

Yarbrough was sentenced to 60

years, to be served concurrently with a 20-year term he already is serving for illegal weapons possession.

Barnhill was sentenced to 40 years plus a concurrent 30 years, and Kemp was sentenced to 60 years.

Defense lawyers said they would appeal. Each defendant must serve at least 10 years in prison to become eligible for parole.

"It wasn't racial hatred that inspired me, but love of my own kind," Yarbrough said at the sentencing, calling the trial a "gross injustice."

"These men are no more guilty than were their forefathers who participated in the Boston Tea Party," he said.

## Garn backs fund for Challenger

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, who last year rode the space shuttle into orbit, called on Americans Thursday to show their interest in the continuation of the manned-space program by contributing to a fund to replace the shuttle Challenger.

## Crop money clears Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate gave final congressional approval Thursday to an emergency bill to fund the Commodity Credit Corporation — one day after the agency ran out of money to make loans and subsidy payments to farmers.

The Senate action, on a voice vote, sends the legislation to the White House.

Earlier in the day, also on a voice vote, the House approved the measure that would provide just enough money to keep the CCC in business until Congress returns from a 10-day recess that begins this weekend.

The CCC, an arm of the Agriculture Department, is the agency responsible for carrying out price- and income-support programs. It makes loans to farmers who produce major commodities like grains and milk, and buys up surpluses. It also makes subsidy payments to eligible farmers.

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## VA slashes home lending guarantees

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Veterans Administration said Thursday it is imposing restrictions on its home-loan guarantee program that will sharply curtail the size and availability of insured mortgages for military veterans.

The changes are being taken to comply with spending restrictions under the Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget act, and officials said the limits could also mean VA loans will be denied to thousands of qualifying veterans this year.

- With its new restrictions, the VA will:
- Place a \$90,000 limit on the size of home loans that the agency will insure.
  - Allow no VA-backed refinancing of existing VA-insured loans.
  - Prevent second-time use of the VA home loan program. Veterans who have a VA-backed loan, or who previously did, will not be allowed to use the program again, even if they have paid off their VA mortgage in full.
- "These proposals will have a devastating effect on the mortgage market and on the veteran home buyer," said Warren Lasko, executive vice president of the Mortgage Bankers Association.

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# Kennedy praises Sakharov, meets Gorbachev

MOSCOW (AP) — Sen. Edward M. Kennedy praised Andrei Sakharov at a meeting of the disident's former scientific colleagues Thursday, then met with Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

### Throng cheers visit by pope

MANGALORE, India (AP) — Pope John Paul II, abandoning his bulletproof van for an open jeep, drove through a cheering crowd of 400,000 people Thursday in the most exuberant welcome of his Indian tour.

Later he prayed for the more than 2,000 people who died in the 1984 gas leak at Bhopal's Union Carbide pesticide plant, calling them victims of "man's efforts to make progress."

The weary, sunburned pontiff also prayed for rain in southern drought-stricken Karnataka state, where eight months ago a Hindu swami prayed in vain for a downpour.

Almost the entire population of Mangalore, a largely Christian city on the Arabian Sea, turned out to greet John Paul along with Christians from throughout south India.

### Canada to defend its dollar

OTTAWA (AP) — Finance Minister Michael Wilson promised, in a formal statement to Parliament Thursday, to keep up aggressive interventions in foreign exchange markets to defend the Canadian dollar.

The Canadian currency fell below 70 cents for the first time this week and sank almost to 69 cents before rebounding sharply Wednesday in response to heavy Bank of Canada buying in the market.

Also Thursday, the Bank of Canada raised its trend-setting bank rate to 14.75 percent from 14.50 percent last week. In response, all six major Canadian banks bumped their prime rates; the interest charged to the best industrial customers, to 12.25 percent, up from 11.5 percent and the highest rate in more than a year.

### Duvalier expected to leave

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The news of President Jean-Claude Duvalier's search for asylum in Europe spread through the capital, which had erupted rumors of his flight last week with joy, turned to riot, and the opposition said Thursday he might be gone in days.

The 34-year-old president-for-life called U.S. Ambassador Clayton McKeanaway Jr. to the National Palace in the afternoon. Jeffrey Lite, director of the U.S. Information Agency here, said such a summons "is not unusual," but did not elaborate and gave no details of the meeting.

Gregoire Eugene, 60-year-old leader of the Social-Christian Party, one of the two legally registered opposition groups, predicted that Duvalier would flee before Sunday, the first day of Carnival.

He added that the Roman Catholic Church would play a major role in preventing looting and rioting if Duvalier goes.

### Nuclear foes block base gates

MOLESWORTH, England (AP) — Hundreds of anti-nuclear protesters blocked the four main gates of a U.S. cruise missile base under construction in central England Thursday, but the Ministry of Defense said there was no disruption of work.

The nine-hour protest was generally peaceful but five people were arrested on charges of causing criminal damage to the fence around the site in Molesworth, about 60 miles north of London, the ministry said.

The demonstration, marking the first anniversary of the expulsion of 200 protesters from the site, was held in snow flurries and temperatures around 28 degrees Fahrenheit. Organizers said three people suffering from exposure were taken to a hospital.

### Level of violence declining

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Louis le Grange, law and order minister, said Thursday more than 3,400 "unrest incidents" were recorded in the past six months across the country, but he said the level of violence was declining.

Meanwhile, a gold mine west of Johannesburg reported six miners were killed and 99 injured in a battle between rival tribal groups, and a black woman died when her house was set ablaze in a black township.

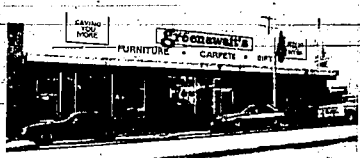
A watchdog group said police had evicted some black families in the remote Moutse district who had agreed to leave land rezoned last year for whites.

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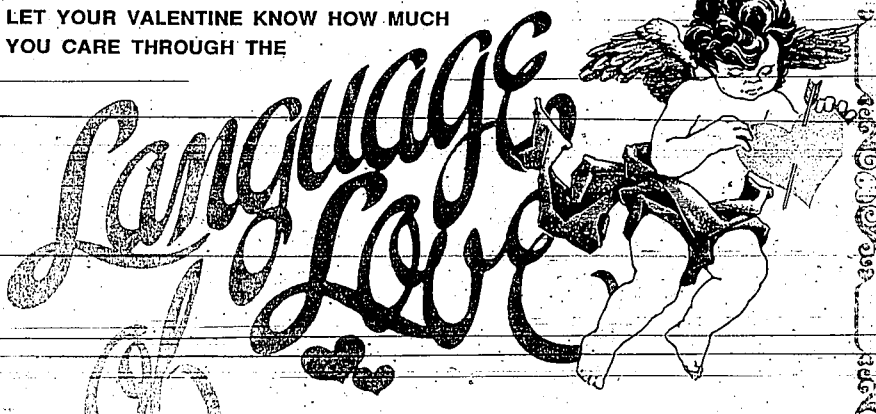

## County clerk's bill not owed — city attorney

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls City Attorney Shane Bengoechea said Thursday that the city should not pay County Clerk-Dick Pence personally for work he billed the city for in connection with the Nov. 5 city election.

He also has questions about two other bills submitted in connection with the election, but said at least some expenses appear to be legally payable to the county. In addition, the city may want to consider paying a bill personally to a county maintenance worker and municipal monies which may be paid to them or officially come into their possession.

city has no legal responsibility for the bill, he said.

The charges on all three bills are "payable and collectible," Pence maintains. The charges include \$150 payable to Pence at his home address for work he did after 5 p.m. election night and on a weekend before the election.

Bengoechea wrote in a memo prepared for the City Council Thursday that the Idaho Constitution requires "strict accountability" of county officers for "all fees which may be collected by them and for all public any fees collected by the county clerk, when operating in his capacity as a county official, should render any monies paid to him

Pence's work on the election was clearly related to his duties as county clerk, Bengoechea said. Idaho adds charges county clerks with regulating elections and making sure that election laws are followed.

The fact that Pence worked after 5 p.m. has no bearing on the matter, he said, since the law does not limit his responsibilities by hours worked. The county pays Pence a flat salary, rather than by the hour worked.

The constitution "seems to delineate that any fees collected by the county clerk, when operating in his capacity as a county official, should render any monies paid to him

payable to the county treasury, whether or not he worked after the close of the county business day," Bengoechea wrote.

Bengoechea also questioned labor expenses of \$150 payable to county maintenance worker Larry Haycock and \$120 payable to the county for unspecified labor expenses of two men.

Had the city been aware that it would have been charged for the labor, it could have used city employees for the work, Bengoechea said. And if the county clerk or a county employee wished to charge the city as private individuals, it was their obligation to arrange a contract with the city.

First, he said, the city had no contract with Haycock. It has no legal obligation to pay him for the work billed, Bengoechea said. However, the council may opt to pay him in the interest of fairness. If the county normally pays him overtime for work he does in county elections, Bengoechea said.

Pence said he had not arranged contracts for the work billed. He questioned similar charges before during his 8 years in office. The bill for the 1985 city election was brought to the attention of other city officials by City Finance Director Rich

## Jones: Revise water ruling

TWIN FALLS — Attorney General Jim Jones has suggested some key revisions for the Idaho Department of Water Resources' allocation rules for trust water from the Swan Falls Agreement.

The DWR's rules, in Jones' opinion, have too broad a definition of trust water flows. They also incorrectly place the burden of proof on applicants for trust water in some instances, he said.

"A review of the Swan Falls agreement indicates that the parties did not intend groundwaters or surface waters tributary to the Snake River above Milner Dam to be included within the definition of trust water flows," Jones said.

Norm T. Smith, administrator with the DWR in Boise, said some modifications currently before the Legislature will bring the rules in line with the points raised by Jones.

"While the intent of the original agreement may have been to keep water above Milner out of trust water allocations," Jones said.

"We can't read that into the existing legislation." Once the Legislature makes its changes, Young said. "Once and for all it will be done in both the regulations and the statutes" what the term "trust waters" includes.

Jones also questioned some provisions of the law which would require applicants for trust water to bear the burden of proving that diversions are in the public interest.

"It was the intent of the parties that a person protesting an application for trust waters should have the burden of proving that it was against the public interest to grant the application," Jones said.

"While it was our desire to tighten up the allocation formula for waters freed up by the settlement agreement, we did not intend for new appropriators to face major new hurdles in attempting to put water to beneficial use."

Jones said his office had always brought these concerns to the DWR's attention. With the department nearing the end of its comment period, Jones said his office felt it should get its comments in as soon as possible.

"We intend to be as responsive as we can to the attorney general's comments," Young said of the DWR.

The department hopes to have its allocation rules to the Legislature before the close of this year's session.

## Plant at crux of sewer crisis

KIMBERLY — A potato plant owner in Kimberly was asked Thursday by the Kimberly City Council to find an alternative to the city sewer system, to save Kimberly from a financial crisis and the Twin Falls wastewater treatment plant from damage and overwork.

In an emergency meeting Thursday afternoon, city officials advised Kenneth Mulberry, owner of Russett Valley Produce 447 Highway 30 E., a fresh pack potato plant, that silt from his operation is apparently the reason for a long-standing problem.

Kimberly's sewage is piped to Twin Falls for treatment, under a contract that currently calls for fees

of 12 cents per pound of suspended solids, the city said.

Kimberly City Council members Mulberry and John Miller from Russett Valley Produce and Twin Falls City Engineer Gary Young and treatment plant operator, Dick Harvey, convened for meeting in a joint effort to find a solution.

Jack Wright, Kimberly City Council president, offered city assistance, saying the industry is important to Kimberly and there "has to be a solution short of shutting down the plant."

For the past year, he said, Kimberly and Twin Falls have been taking samples from the system, under the belief that there was a break in the transport line or city system, or that irrigation water was washing into the system.

Tests and samples, he said, traced the problem to the Russett Valley

## Burley drops discount on utility payments

BURLEY — A yearly audit report revealed the city cannot afford to reinstate a 10 percent discount on early payment of city utility bills, accountant Ed Evans told the Burley City Council Monday.

Last summer the council discontinued its practice of deducting 10 percent of the amount due on bills paid within 10 days — a move that has angered many local residents.

Evans said the cost of reinstating the policy would be \$250,000-350,000 and that the electric account reserve fund is "already lower than it should be."

He said cold weather had kept the demand for city-owned power high this winter.

"The city would have a deficit if demand were like last year," said Evans, referring to the early onset

of winter this year and a colder-than-average December.

In other business, the council accepted proposals by Recreation Director Ron Ploger to increase the price of swimming lessons by \$2 and to close the pool on Sundays because of low use.

"Attendance (on Sunday) is less than one-half the recommended number," he said.

Ploger also recommended that a previous proposal by Burley resident Alan Hunter to run concessions at the river park this summer be denied. "The city may go into the concession business itself in 1987," said Ploger.

"The council voted to apply for federal funds to be used to build railroad traffic areas at four locations in the city. Railroad crossings at Occidental, Normal, Oakley and Highland will receive the traffic areas should the application be granted."

## Lawmakers divide on creationism vote

BOISE — The Magic Valley delegation split its votes 6-6 Thursday when the House of Representatives rejected a bill that would have required the teaching of creationism side-by-side with evolution.

Evolution is the theory of 19th century English naturalist Charles Darwin that traces the development of man and other animals from simpler ancestors. Creationists say man and other creatures were created by God as they now exist and did not develop from earlier forms.

Opponents of the bill said teaching creationism would bring religion into the schools, where it doesn't belong.

Supporters said creationism is not necessarily religious, or they said it was and a little religion would be good for school children.

## Teacher shies from evolution topic

TWIN FALLS — On the opposite side of Magic Valley, in a classroom far removed from Jerome, a Valley High School science teacher refuses to devote much time to the teaching of evolution, because he does not believe in it.

Dale Hammond, a 33-year-old graduate of Twin Falls High School and the University of Idaho, believes as adamantly that the Biblical version of creation should be taught in public schools as his counterpart in Jerome, 30-year-old Dick Jordan, opposes it.

Jordan spoke out last week against a proposed bill to force the teaching of creation in public schools along with the theory of evolution.

chemistry, to biology and computer sciences, said that if his school board allows him, he will teach the creation theory in class because he does not view God and the Bible as religious or a religion.

"Religion is man-made," Hammond said Thursday. "Who said God is a religion, or that the Bible is a religion?"

He did, however, say that religion belongs in the home, not in public schools. "I agree 100 percent that public schools are not the proper place for religion. It should be taught in home, but a lot of parents don't teach it, and kids aren't getting it at home," he said.

Hammond, who has been a teacher since 1977, said he would teach the creation theory by using the first book of Genesis. He defined the theory of creation as the world being formed instantaneously by God, although he later believes that man has gone through changes since creation, a theory of evolution.

However, Hammond said he differs from creationists who believe that Earth is only 10,000 years old. "I can't agree with that, science doesn't support that," he said.

Ken Story, Kimberly public works director, said samples taken by the equipment showed 13,277 pounds of solids going into the system from the plant in a 5-day test period. He said that on some peak days the cost runs as high as \$311 per day for handling the plant's effluent on the basis of a 12-cent-per-pound charge. The plant is now paying about \$600 per month under the existing assessment method.

Story said he could see only two alternatives. One would be to build settling ponds nearby and pipe the plant's waste there or to install a clarifier system.

Mulberry told the group that settling ponds that "close to Kimberly" would be a "good idea" because of the smell from potato particles standing in water.

"I would rather get clear off the system," he told the group. "If I have to pay 13 cents per pound for solids, I can't stay in business."

Mulberry, who said he realizes the problem and wants to correct it, said he does not favor ponds and would rather find an area where he can spray the effluent and water into open ground. Such an operation would be approved by the Environmental Protection Agency, he said. He added he has purchased cattle lots nearby and if he can obtain a cattle right-of-way use, a pipe, may be able to pipe the material there.

He said his business has 65 employees and a payroll of \$350,000-\$500,000 a year.

"The reason I purchased the plant 5 years ago was that I could get onto the sewer system," he said. "I was told at that time that it could never cost more than \$1,200 a month."

Story said that if Russel Valley paid the full cost of its own treatment it could run as high as \$30,000 for a full, 30-day operation.

"It isn't that we want money or that Kimberly wants money,"

Young said. "We simply can't handle that amount of dirt in our system. We can't live with it, even if you could pay the cost," Young said.

He also explained that residential and other business users in Kimberly are having to pay a share of the plant's costs, which is not fair. Kimberly Residential users pay \$11.50 per month for sewer service and Young said Twin Falls residential fees are about \$5 per month.

City Clerk Edythe Widmer said Kimberly has a balance owed of about \$18,000 and has just received a bill in excess of \$10,000 for the past month. She said the city can't pay the full bill now.

Although Story and Harville said they are confident samples already taken give an accurate accounting, Mulberry said he had not been advised of the situation until Thursday and would like to cut his plant off of the sewer system for about 2 weeks to see what difference would be made.

Thompson, who has only recently begun working for the city.

The city does owe some reimbursement to the county for election expenses, Bengeochea said. The law provides that "reasonable" charges should be paid and names such expenses as poll lists, poll books and proclamations. Labor expenses are not directly addressed.

The religion they wanted taught Callen said, would include five ideas shared by all the world's major religions: belief in a creator, a code of behavior for happy living, moral responsibility for one's actions, belief in a life after death, and belief in judgement after death.

"I think there's a lot of children out there that are not exposed to any religious teachings," said Callen.

Callen was not the only one shut out of debate. Rep. Donna Scott, R-Twin Falls, said she was angry that State Speaker Tom Silvers, R-Twin Falls, clamped down on debate before she and several others had their chance to speak about the bill.

Scott said she intended to challenge the cost of it, something no one dwelled on in Thursday's debate.

The sponsor of the bill, Rep. Preston Brimhall, R-Idaho Falls, said the cost to the state of adding creationism to school curricula

would be \$10,000. Scott says she would have argued the cost would be much higher.

She may join a push today to bring the bill back to the floor of the House for reconsideration in order to give everyone a chance to speak their mind.

Scott said Thursday she would have opposed the bill even if the cost estimate were accurate.

"I'd like to teach my children those things - I don't expect the public school system to teach my children religion."

But Rep. Vard Chaburn, R-Idaho Falls, said the bill would not have the same effect on the schools. The ex-school teacher said creationism should be taught side-by-side with evolutionary theory. "It has just as much right as the teaching of anything else," he said.

Chaburn said that when he taught school there were scripture readings and prayers every morning. "That exposure to those kids didn't hurt them," he said.

Arguments that teaching creationism would bring religion into the schools didn't pull any weight with Rep. Noy Brackett, R-Twin Falls, either. "I felt that was a smokescreen," Brackett said.

"We actually don't know whether evolution or creationism, which one is right. I'd like to see them taught both," said Brackett.

Silvers said he would prefer that students learn the theory of creation at home or in church. He also said he doesn't approve of the Legislature telling schools what to teach.

"There is nothing to prohibit the school board from saying it should be done," he said.

Also voting against the bill were Reps. Steve Antone, R-Rupert; Douglas Jones, R-Filer; and Jeff Stoker, R-Twin Falls.

Voting for the bill were Reps. Ernest Hale, R-Burley; Waldo Martens, R-Jerome; and Mack Nelbaur, R-Paul.

quired part of the science curriculum, said Richard Kay, science adviser for the state Department of Education.

Hammond does not believe it is a 1st Amendment question of separation of church and state "because the Declaration of Independence and the Constitution mention God," he said.

But the controversy over the creation theory is not just that it is religion, but that it is not a science.

An Arkansas district court judge ruled in 1983 in an opinion striking down an Arkansas law requiring the teaching of creation, that it was most definitely a religion.

"The argument advanced by defendants that teaching the existence of God is not religious unless the teaching seeks a commitment, is contrary to common understanding and contradicts settled case law," wrote Judge William Overton.

Overton also ruled that the creation theory did not meet the test of science. "A theory that is by its own terms dogmatic, absolutist and never subject to revision is not a scientific theory," Overton wrote.

A biology textbook published by the Creation Research Society, Grand Rapids, Mich., contended that "both God and the Bible are beyond the proper methods of study of scientists."

The main issue for the Creation Research Society and Hammond is whether scientists have also become dogmatic in their beliefs.

"My main beef is that evolution is taught as an absolute, and it's just a theory," said Hammond.

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# Ditka: Good riddance, Buddy Ryan

CHICAGO — Mike Ditka, coach of the Super Bowl champion Chicago Bears, says he's glad to see the last of Buddy Ryan and accuses his former defensive coordinator of playing favorites and hogging credit for the Bears' success.

"I'm not happy he's gone; I'm elated," Ditka said in an interview with The Associated Press.

"Never again in history will an assistant coach get as much credit as Buddy did," said Ditka. "I handled it well. It will be interesting to see how he handles it now that he's the head coach."

Ryan, who put together the vaunted '46' defense that helped Chicago to an 18-1 record this season, left the Bears shortly after their 46-10 Super Bowl victory over New England to become head coach of the Philadelphia Eagles.

"I should be so lucky to have a Buddy Ryan around," he said. "I'd like to have somebody around to take care of me."

But Ryan said the Bears have such a weak schedule next season, they have a good shot at another NFL title. Among their games is one at Soldier Field with the Eagles, 7-9 last season.

Ryan came to the Bears in 1979 with head coach Neil Armstrong. He was kept on by the late George Halas, when Halas fired Armstrong after the 1981 season and hired Ditka.

"By most accounts, Ditka and Ryan never hit it off well, in part because of differing philosophies on defense and handling players."

Ditka said Ryan had a "buddy-buddy system" and played favorites. "I believe in playing the best 11 players," said Ditka. "I don't believe in having favorite players. I want challenges, not preconceived situations. I want everybody to have a chance to play."

But he said he heckled Ryan even when they disagreed.

"I even sat back at what happened at Platteville," said Ditka, referring to the time Ryan called rookie defensive tackle William "The Refrigerator" Perry "a wasted draft choice." Perry was inserted

JEROME — A state bid and a second place finish in the District 4 Class A-1 girls' basketball tournament boiled down to containment and retainment — in that order Thursday night.

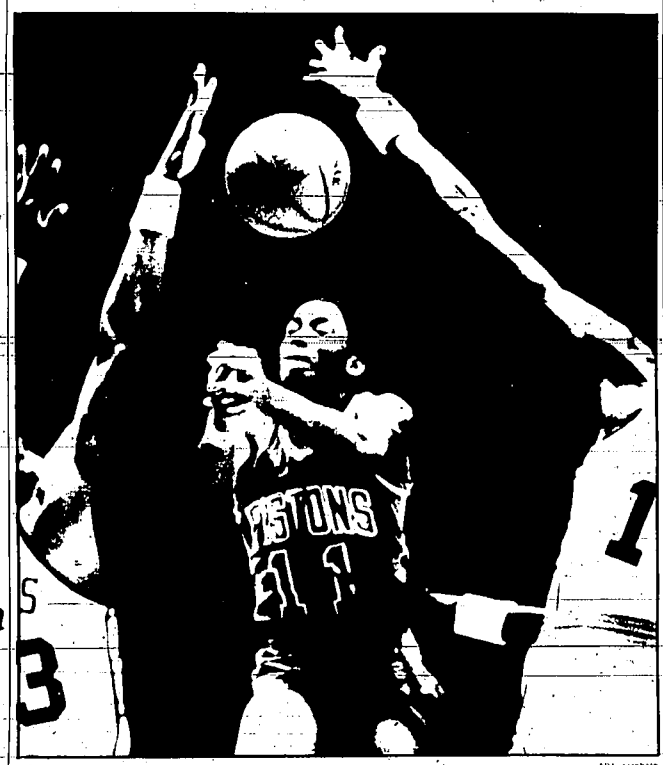

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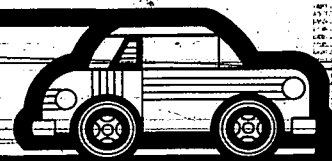

## Peter Duchin rekindles ski resort memories

SUN VALLEY. — As Sun Valley Company celebrates its 50th anniversary this year, history is renewed as a new breed, on rare times and events which have made Sun Valley what it is today.

The history and tradition it represents are really what makes Sun Valley a unique ski resort.

The nostalgia of Sun Valley's early days is being rekindled with weekly big-band-sound-entertainment and highlighted with performances by the Peter Duchin Orchestra from New York.

The grand finale of Sun Valley's 50th Ski Birthday week-long celebration will be tonight with a giant costume ball held in the Limelight Room of the Sun Valley Inn. Tickets are \$50 per person for the cocktail party and dance. The Peter Duchin Orchestra will perform to an expected crowd of 1,000 people outdoors in apris ski attire from the 1930s through the 1980s.

The 47-year-old Duchin, whose godfather was Sun Valley founder Averell Harriman, is the band leader for one of the most sought-after bands on the East Coast. He continues the legacy he inherited from his father, Eddie, and is one of the best-known popular band leaders in the country, performing at White House functions, debutante balls and large corporate and society gatherings.

"I'm thrilled to be a part of it (Sun Valley's 50th birthday)," said Duchin in an interview Thursday. He was invited by Sun Valley to give three performances during the week-long festivities.

"Sun Valley is a great place for those who like to ski and see older skiers — Otto Lange and Jackrab-bit Johansen," he said. "Skiing used to be an elitist sport," Duchin reflected, adding it is important to remember skiing's history.

Duchin spent much time in the Sun Valley area when he was growing up, and said he has many fond memories of the resort.

"It used to be an Alpine village. It used to be a place where people like Clark Gable could come and not be pestered by people."

Duchin went on to add Sun Valley still has its charm, but he remembers the time when it was not commercialized and conde-ized. In 1936 Duchin's father Eddie and his band were much in demand for entertaining high society parties.

Eddie was a great friend of Har-

## Local band's 'sweet swing' snared job at resort in 1937

TWIN FALLS — In the summer of 1937, the new Idaho resort of Sun Valley was looking for a band to replace the original Sun Valley Lodge orchestra that had moved to the Christiana Club in Ketchum.

Bus Vaughn of Twin Falls organized a group of local music makers and took them to Sun Valley to audition. Their "sweet swing" style of music won them the job.

The Vaughn group played during the 1937-summer-season and stayed on through 1938, playing in the Lodge's Duchin Room for resort guests from around the world.

Two of the Vaughn musicians still live in Twin Falls with some vivid memories of their part in the early activities around the nation's first ski resort.

Mel Jensen, who played violin for the Bus Vaughn group, and Helen Saulcy, pianist, were among the original group, as was Leo Logan, formerly of Twin Falls and now living in Boise.

Logan played drums. Two other

members, Sleepy Hunter and Rudy Lavallee, were imported from Portland, Ore. The other member was Paul Wilcox, originally from the Burley-Kupert area and now a resident of California. Vaughn and Wilcox played trombone while Hunter played bass and Lavallee played accordion.

Jensen says after nearly 50 years, he still recalls the two seasons he spent playing in the Duchin Room of the Sun Valley Lodge as a highlight of his early life.

The Bus Vaughn group adapted the "sweet swing" style to the standard popular numbers of the '30s. When recruited by Vaughn for the Sun Valley auditions, Jensen was playing with another Twin Falls group, Will Wright's orchestra.

"I decided the chance to play at Sun Valley sounded good, so I joined Vaughn. We used to play requests from the crowd and if someone would start humming a tune, we would pick it at a few minutes and then come up with the full orchestration," Jensen recalls.

"We learned many Austrian tunes," he said. "The ski instructors

and maire d's nearly all came from Austria to lend an authentic Austrian atmosphere to the resort and many of the patrons who danced to the music were Austrian."

Jensen says he still recalls the melody of one song the orchestra played nearly 50 years ago as a woman sang the words in German.

While playing at the resort in 1937, Jensen and Saulcy saw and came to know film stars and other celebrities who visited Sun Valley. Jensen says some included Claudette Colbert, Melvyn Douglas, Gary Cooper and Norma Shearer, all frequent guests.

Averell Harriman, president of Union Pacific Railroad at the time Sun Valley was developed and later an ambassador to Russia, visited the resort frequently.

"One time I loaned his son my '22 rifle so he could go rabbit hunting near Timmerman Hill," Jensen recalls.

William Jeffers, who followed Harriman as UPRIK president, also became a "speaking acquaintance," Jensen says.

Both Saulcy and Jensen say they

## Lecture probes Idaho novelist, teacher

TWIN FALLS — Idaho novelist Forrester Blake will be the subject of a lecture by Idaho State University doctoral candidate Mary Anderson at 7 p.m., Feb. 10.

The lecture, free to the public, will take place in room 115 at the College of Southern Idaho Shields Building.

Blake, an Idaho State University teacher for 19 years, published five books during his lifetime, the best-known being "Johnny Christmas," a novel concerning a frontiersman from Tennessee. According to Anderson, "Johnny Christmas" was

to have been the first of a trilogy that ended during the Nez Perce conflict in Idaho.

Yet, as things happen in this publishing world, only "Johnny Christmas," set during the Mexican War in the 1830s, and "Wilderness Passage," the second one, set in 1857, can actually be found in print.

"It's too bad," says Anderson, "because the last book was his Idaho book. His title was 'The Long Day' and the story took place when there was conflict between the Nez Perce and the settlers. But, it's lost as far as I can tell."

Because most of Blake's books are

no longer in print, Anderson points out that the author is possibly better known to generations of Idaho students as an encouraging and inspirational teacher than he is as a writer. Yet, her studies of him show that Blake was taken with the writing life.

Anderson, enabled by a grant from the Association for the Humanities in Idaho, studied not only Blake's published books, but three of his unpublished manuscripts which are in Massachusetts.

She says that writing was a passion for Blake and that he had known since he was a boy that he was going to someday be a writer of Westerns. Born in Michigan, Blake moved with his family to Muskogee, Okla., and spent much of his youth roaming around the Southwest, Anderson says.

Blake worked on a cattle drive that originated in New Mexico and, from that, got the inspiration for his first book, "Riding the Midnight Trail," published in 1905 when the author was 23 years old. She says the book was published by Scribner's and edited by one of the most respected editors of the time, Maxwell Perkins.

The researcher points out that Blake's books received good reviews

in publications including the New York Times and the New Yorker. Anderson, who now lives in Berkeley, is a former resident of Idaho where her husband was the district ranger with the U.S. Forest Service. She earned her B.A. in 1948 from the University of California, Berkeley, a master's from Columbia University, and expects to receive a doctorate this year from ISU.

## Old movie theater no longer needed

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Plenty of people can boast they grew up with the movies, but not many can boast better than Ralph Davis.

As a child in Shelley he pumped the pedals on the Virginia, the actor's player piano. In those days, Hollywood sent reels of music to go with the reels of film. "We'd get excited and the music would go faster and faster," he says.

The talkies started before he was 10, and Davis remembers going to the theater at 4 p.m. on Fridays to stoke the reels, barely containing the excitement of finally seeing the serial's next chapter. Upstairs, his father, Francis M. Davis, would be reading the Virginia's projector.

Davis took over the theater in 1946 and ran it for 25 years. At his age, he doubts he'd have the strength or patience to run it today, even with his new equipment.

Whether anyone does is another question. The Virginia, built in

1910 by Davis' father and Tom Shelley, son of town founder Jimm F. Shelley, is up for sale.

It isn't the first small-town theater to fold or face the threat of folding. Idaho may boast being "what America was," but even if that's so, some changes are here to stay.

It took about a year for people to get their own sets, Davis said. Once they did, people started staying home more.

Previously, there might have been 30 copies of a film in the Salt Lake region. Idaho Falls theaters almost always had first dibs on a film, but the Virginia would trail only two or three weeks behind, soon enough to benefit from release publicity.

But as studios felt the pinch, prints grew scarcer, Davis said. The period between new films at the Virginia stretched to two or three months, and the prints became older, scratchier and more brittle. "There were nights I'd cry my eyes out because the film broke so many times."

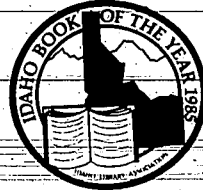
## Idaho book award suggestions due

They adjusted by aiming their films at the "youth market." Concession sales were good, but the kids came to see each other, not the movies.

During the '60s they got rowdier. They slit the seats' upholstery. One night about 15 let starlings loose during the show.

"You'd put new upholstery on the seats and the next day it would be cut," said Davis' wife, Jeanette, who took tickets for years. "We had to police them constantly, and that's no fun."

Since they left in 1971, the Davises haven't kept track of the Virginia's business. Mrs. Davis would prefer to remember the best days.

"It used to be the focal point of the town," she said. "A regular Saturday night was to have a hamburger and catch a movie. Now they go to Island Park on the weekends.

"People were friendlier," she said. "They had time for each other. Everybody works now, and when-

they get home they don't feel like socializing. They care, but they don't have the time."

In a world where \$10 million is considered a reasonable amount to spend making a film, someone's got to pay. Theater chains back their bids with big money, and an individual theater operator can find himself spending 70 percent of his budget renting movies, says Mike Hudson, who runs the Rio Theater in Idaho Falls.

"It's tough for an independent," he said. "Film companies are increasingly trying to take more from the box office."

The Rio is part of the Bozeman-based TOI chain.

"If you run a dog in this theater, you know it," Hudson said. "The Rio depends on two or three big films to carry it through the year, a 'Ghostbusters' or 'Romancing the Stone.' "Out of Africa" proved to be a pleasant surprise this Christmas, the film for people who might see only one movie a year.

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# 'The Color Purple' sparks bitterness among blacks

In the opening scenes of "The Color Purple":  
Celle gives birth. Her father dyes away the baby, only minutes old. He's already raped Celle. Then he gives her away to a man who beats her. And who separates her from her sister, the one person she loves.

"The Color Purple" has touched off bitterness and protest in many corners of the black community — bitterness that shows no sign of diminishing.

In the past seven weeks Steven Spielberg's cinematic treatment of Alice Walker's Pulitzer Prize-winning novel has grossed \$39.2 million and been hailed by critics — and many black moviegoers — as one of the 10 best films of the year. Yet it has also touched a raw nerve in the black community, where many charge that it depicts black men only as violent, insensitive and cruel and perpetuates a stereotype of degraded manhood.

The film was picketed by black men and women when it opened in Los Angeles, has been informally boycotted by many blacks there and in other cities and remains a source of controversy both public and private.

Writing in the New York Daily News, columnist Earl Caldwell said, "The Color Purple" can make you see red. That is especially true if you are a man and you happen to be black. There is not much in the movie you want to see."

Francis Beal, writing in the California newspaper Frontline, said, "A particular discomfort" with "Purple" "is understandable. ... A film which depicts the brutalization of a black woman by all the men in her life ... can easily end up supporting the view that backward social relations within the family are the main problem with black America."

The next issue of Black Film

Review, published in Washington and due out at the end of the month, will include a critical forum from several perspectives on the movie.

This is by no means a moonlit debate. Some black men admire "Purple" and see it, as do many black women, as a story about women surviving personal imprisonment. Other black women agree that it is a step back for the image of black people: But what is being heatedly discussed is the characterization of black men as cruel, unaffectionate, dominating, slap-happy oafs. While few dispute the fact that such men exist, the concern is that the power of the screen and the relative rarity of film characterizations of blacks make the characters seem universal.

"I offer no excuses for the kinds of men that Walker wrote about," says television producer and columnist Tony Brown. "They are, for whatever reason, sad examples. But many of us who are male and black are too healthy to pay to be abused by a white man's movie focusing on our failures. And because so few films are produced with black themes, it becomes the only statement on black men." "It is a very dangerous film," says Leroy Clark, a law professor at Catholic University. "The men are raping, committing incest, speaking harshly, separating people from their families or they are incompetent, they can't fix a house or cook a simple meal. That is a lie to history. ... It reinforces the notion of black men as beasts." Says Roscoe Nick, president of the Montgomery County, Maryland, NAACP: "There was not a healthy black male in the movie." "The women of 'Purple' have

# Movie examines what happens when terrorism hits inside U.S.

The U.S. Capitol in flames. Shopping malls firebombed. Airplanes exploding in midair. These are among the more disturbing scenes from "Under Siege," a TV movie that explores what happens when a wave of foreign-inspired terrorist attacks hit the United States. It airs Sunday on NBC (KTVB, Boise and KUTV, Salt Lake City).

The movie stars Hal Holbrook as the beleaguered U.S. president, Peter Strauss, E.G. Marshall, Paul Winfield, Fritz Weaver and Mason Adams play his national security advisers who offer conflicting advice on how to respond. Soap star Thano Donahue plays the chief terrorist Abu Ladeen. The flame deliberately resembles that of Abu Nidal, the terrorist suspected of masterminding the recent Rome and Vienna airport bombings and shooting spree.

Don Ohlmeyer, the film's executive producer, says "Under Siege" does not offer a primer for would-be terrorists.

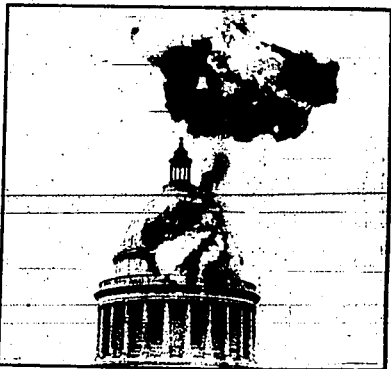
"There's not a single act in this picture that had not actually been perpetrated by terrorists already," he says. "I think what we sometimes lose sight of is that we are one of the few free societies in the world that did not had to deal with organized terrorism. England has dealt with the IRA for over a decade, Italy has dealt with the Red Army brigade, West Germany with the Baader Meinhof Gang."

But can it happen here?

"If you talk to anybody in the government they will tell you that it is a very real possibility that terrorists are coming to this country and that we have to prepare for it," says Woodward, the Washington Post editor who co-authored the script. "We hope it does not happen, but it would be foolhardy not to anticipate it and take some precautionary steps."

After reading a series in The Washington Post about terrorism in the city, Woodward, Christian and co-writer, Richard Maswood, finally contacted the trio to write the screenplay.

Woodward says one of the lessons the viewer should get from the movie is to have patience with the

decision-makers in government. "The urge to retaliate is very, very dangerous because you are playing with people who are crazy or have a philosophy which is 'human life, what's human life?' An 11-year-old girl? No problem. My own life? No problem. You're dealing with a completely different set of values and

# After graduating to prime time, stars retain soft spot for daytime

The prime time soaps have many members in their respective casts who came from daytime. That's not surprising in itself but their allegiances to those days when they brought their passions and problems to the nation's homes during the afternoon hours are still concrete.

"Knots Landing" has two alumni from the daytime soaps — Doug Sheehan and Donna Mills. Doug was a member of the cast of "General Hospital" for a number of seasons, including the period when "GH" was riding the crest of the popularity generated by the Luke-Laura storyline craze. Doug says he learned a great deal about camera technique during his tenure on the daytime soap that has helped him on "Knots."

"When you join a show as I did after it's been on for a few years, you don't have the luxury of learning about your character along with everyone else. You have to plunge right in and that training from the soap days comes in handy."

Richard Dean Anderson, who is currently playing the title role in "MacGyver," also appeared in "General Hospital." Before "MacGyver," Richard played in the prime-time soap "Emerald Point, N.H.," and he felt right at home in the milieu of soap plotting and characterization.

Donna Mills cut her teeth on soap operas in "Love is a Many Splendored Thing" and the lessons she learned as an actress have also been carried over to her present role of Abby in "Knots Landing." Donna confesses that she likes playing a villainess better than the nice girl.

Julie Harris of "Knots Landing" and John Forsythe of "Dynasty" were both New York actors carving out careers on the Broadway stage at the time TV was in its infancy. Both John and Julie did a great many TV dramas during those days but they never got to appear as regulars in daytime soaps.

"The soaps were generally cast with actors who moved over from radio," Forsythe recalled. "We would have loved to do those 15 minute soaps (that's the length they were in the early days) but it was a rather close-knit society of actors who did the soaps. Julie Harris concurs but she managed to do some

Dack Rambo, one of the newest members of the cast of "Dallas" this season, also had his daytime soap experience on "All My Children" and although it was a fairly productive time for the actor, he feels an actor can get trapped in working in daytime. However, that's about the only negative thing Dack said about working in the afternoon dramas.

Emma Samms, who is seen as Fallon in "The Colbys," actually did double duty in daytime and prime time when she was introduced on "Dynasty" as the long-lost Fallon and finished her storyline with Scorpio in the highly rated "General Hospital." Emma found little difference in the work, citing the daytime schedule as far more demanding. As a postscript, the lovely actress added that the clothes in prime time are probably more lavish.

The wardrobe notwithstanding, there is a definite bond between the worlds-of-daytime-and-prime-time soaps.

# 'Trashier' miniseries edges out 'Peter the Great' after round one.

NEW YORK — With returns in from around the nation, Joan Collins' "Sins" edged "Peter the Great," reversing the results from the 12-city overnight ratings and giving the trashier miniseries the opening-night victory in their battle of the blockbusters.

Figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. Tuesday showed that Part I of CBS' "Sins," starring Miss Collins as a sexy, social-climbing, publishing magnate, averaged a 19.7 rating Sunday night and ranked 16th for the week of Jan. 27-Feb. 2. The first installment of NBC's "Peter the Great," a semi-historical epic starring Maximilian Schell, averaged a 19.0 rating and tied for 20th place.

Network researchers said the effect of the miniseries match-up was that ratings were deflated for both the \$26 million, four-part "Peter the Great" and the \$15 million, three-part "Sins."

NBC won the week with its comedies, including two episodes of the No. 1 "Cosby Show." The regular Thursday night episode ranked first with a 36.0 rating. The special Sunday broadcast, which partially blunted the start of "Sins," ranked third with a 27.6.

NBC's "Family Ties" was second, "Cheers" tied for fifth and "Golden Girls" was 10th. ABC had two comedies in the Top 10: "Who's the Boss?" was eighth and "Growing Pains" ninth. The three non-comedies among the most popular 10 programs were ABC's "Dynasty," making a strong comeback in fourth, and CBS' "60 Minutes" and NBC's "Highway to Heaven," which tied for fifth.

Overall, NBC averaged an 18.2 rating for the week to CBS' 16.4 and ABC's 15.8. With 11 weeks left in the 30-week, prime-time season, NBC leads with a 17.9 to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 15.1.

Each national ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

On Monday, "Peter the Great" held the ratings lead, based on Nielsen's overnight sampling of 12 major cities. But on Tuesday the national ratings arrived, showing the stronger support for "Sins."

Overnight ratings available Tuesday for the previous night's head-to-head broadcasts showed "Sins"

winning in seven cities and "Peter the Great" in five. Network analysts expected "Sins" to again prevail when the national results are available. "It won't even be close," said Dave Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research.

"NBC has the stronger affiliates in the overnight markets. In the balance of the country, CBS' affiliates are stronger," said Poltrack. "A lot of it has to do with the strength of the affiliates in the market."

Poltrack said NBC's ploy of putting a special "Cosby" episode against the first half hour of "Sins" hurt the CBS miniseries Sunday and initially helped "Peter the Great." But as the night went on, "Peter the Great" lost ratings, while "Sins" picked up viewers and beat the NBC miniseries in the national ratings for each half-hour they ran against each other.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, said he expects "Sins" to beat "Peter the Great" the rest of the week.

Before NBC scheduled "Cosby" on Sunday, Jaffe had forecast a small edge for "Sins." With "Cosby," Jaffe then projected that "Peter the Great" would be a narrow Sunday night winner.

Poltrack's projection, before the "Cosby" stunt, was that "Sins" would average a 20.8 rating for its three nights, while "Peter the Great" would finish its four-night run with an 18.0. That was his only forecast, he said.

"With 'Cosby,' we expected some multiple sampling," said Poltrack. "Our feeling was the show that held the audience best would win, and we felt 'Sins' would better do that."

In Jaffe's post-mortem, he said: "It was pretty close. ... Sunday night was really made by 'Cosby.' The show might have saved us from a difficult night."

In other ratings highlights, ABC's "American Music Awards" finished 14th out of 67 shows, the debut of ABC's "Disney Sunday Movie" ranked 40th and last month's installment of the NBC News magazine, "American Almanac," was 58th.

"We won the week by two ratings points, even with 'Almanac,'" said Jaffe. The five lowest-rated shows, in descending order, were: CBS' recently canceled "Charlie & Co.," ABC's "Ripley's Believe It or Not," ABC's "Benson," ABC's "The Fall Guy" and ABC's "Life's Most Embarrassing Moments."

# Evening soaps not fading out

NEW YORK (AP) — Reports of the death of the prime-time soap opera appear "greatly" exaggerated. Although the number of sex-driven serials has dipped slightly and next season won't bring any new ones, the current crop appears sturdy.

"They're not dying; they're just declining," said John Sisk, senior vice president of the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency. "They're still powerful TV entertainment, particularly for women 18-49, who are the principal target for many advertisers. For reaching that group, the four soaps have 35 percent higher ratings than the average TV program."

The four serial hits are "Dynasty" on ABC, and "Dallas," "Knots Landing" and "Falcon Crest," all on CBS. Except for "Knots Landing," each has experienced ratings slippage. "Dynasty," which ranked No. 1 last season, is seventh for 1985-86. "Dallas" went from second to sixth. "Falcon Crest," which is bucking the "Miami Vice" phenomenon Friday nights, fell to 19th, while "Knots Landing" remained steady at 14th.

These losses prompted B. Donald Grant, president of CBS Entertainment, to say last month that the serial "has peaked. It's on the way out." CBS doesn't have any serials in development, nor do ABC or NBC, and there hasn't been a successful one introduced since "Falcon Crest" piggy-backed on to "Dallas" on Friday nights in 1981.

ABC's "The Colbys," this season's only new soap entry, is a "Dynasty" clone. It is performing better than ABC's previous shows Thursday but ranks 48th out of 79 series this season.

"These shows always take time to build audiences," said Sisk. "We forget that 'Dallas' struggled on Saturday and Sunday before it finally clicked on Friday night."

Successful serials, more than any other TV form, get intense viewer loyalty. According to Sisk, in a typical four-week period, only 8 percent of the viewers of a non-serial will watch all four episodes, while 25 percent will be faithful to their soap four weeks in a row.

## Distinctive guests, creative bits make 'Late Night' different breed

NEW YORK — For the uninitiated, "Late Night With David Letterman" is nothing like "Nightline" or "The Tonight Show."

NBC's zany program, which has attained status as some college campuses, successfully combines Letterman's comic genius, creative bits like Stupid Pet and Human Trinks, and a new breed of talk-show

"We're not an interview show; we're a talk show," said producer Barry Sand. "Our approach is that if you've learned anything from our interviews, then we've done a lousy job."

"Traditional talk shows invite celebrities to plug their movies, and we're the only one that brought Hollywood life and their latest cause."

The irreverent Letterman disdains just of that. In the beginning, some guests got upset when Letterman forgot to mention their movie or didn't turn their film clip.

"Some people didn't get what we were doing," said Sand. "They had been on the circuit and had their answers ready. But David wasn't asking them about their life as a cheerleader."

Celebrities who do come on, including frequent guests Susan Saint James and Teri Garr, must be spontaneous and know how to give and never remember. Letterman can't remember names.

Kate and Alice, but she doesn't mind. "Other stars do Stupid Human Trinks. It doesn't hurt their image to show real people under the make-up."

When Robert Mitchell showed up, Letterman played Mitchell's old calypso albums. Old-time fans did some imitations.

Tom Selleck once stuck his head under water and made motorboat sounds. Ted Koppel balanced a quarter on his nose. Bryant Gumbel let Letterman sprain his leg orange. Jane Pauley made her vocal squeaky by talking through helium.

"She didn't want to do it, but David has a way of getting her to do it," Letterman welcomed controversy, like the time he called the Atlanta Braves "party pitcher" Terry Forster "Hub of Gov." Forster considered that being told he was "Hub of Gov." was fat and could have fun on the walk while getting national atten-

In the same crazy vein, don't mind Harmon Killebrew. Day on "Late Night" was a success.

The show's bookers and researchers scour smalltown newspapers for their oft-finds. Sand's mandate is nuttiness, not just cause. "Someone who had root canal given by Martians is out," he said. "But we liked the guy who collected even snowfall he ever made and brought his freezer on the show."

Another favorite was the man who had saved pieces of his favorite meals — 20-year-old topioca pudding, a 10-year-old Big Mac. This segment, however, violated Sand's rule against useful information.

"Now we know that when we air out-bodies will last forever because of all the preservatives," Sand said. "Not all potential guests are articulate or interested in national exposure. Some are too busy. Sand heard about a town with only two citizens: the mayor and the sheriff."

"We wanted them, but they couldn't leave town," he said.

Sand previously was producer for the "Mike Douglas Show," "Daddy Frost Show" and "SCTV," a late-night comedy that featured satirical skits about television.

Sand also produced Letterman's 1980 morning show on NBC. It was a case of right show, wrong light. The morning viewers wanted to know how to pack and make physics.

"Sand said, 'We didn't adhere to the time slot we just kept David's sensibilities and let the clips fall where they may.' This fell. We were canceled after three weeks, but we became famous with a lot of stuff, which became the forerunner for what we now do."

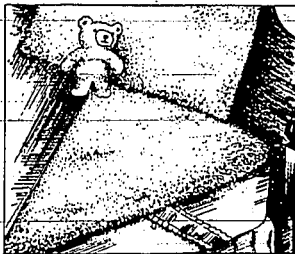

# NBC decides against launching its own cable TV news channel

**HOLLYWOOD** NBC News, rebuffed last year in its bid to buy 50 percent control of Ted Turner's Cable News Network, said last week it will not start its own proposed 24-hour cable news service because of insufficient support from the nation's cable-TV operators.

"But we still want to get into the cable industry," said spokesman Bill McAndrew. He declined to say whether NBC News now will try to reopen negotiations with Turner for an NBC-CNN operation.

There have been rumors that NBC last week quietly contacted Turner representatives about reopening negotiations that ended in November, when the Atlanta-based cable-TV entrepreneur rejected NBC's offer of \$200 million for 50 percent control of CNN.

McAndrew declined to comment on those rumors. There also was a firm "no comment" from Art Sando, a spokesman for Turner Broadcasting System, which owns CNN. The latter company says that it serves 33.5 million homes and 19

foreign countries.

NBC News President Lawrence Grossman was reported out of the country when the announcement was made and unavailable for comment. However, a knowledgeable NBC source said there have been no new talks with Turner, and none are planned.

A key element in Turner's rejection of NBC's offer after two months of negotiations was the network's insistence that NBC News have full editorial control over CNN. Turner balked, saying, "I just couldn't do that to the people of CNN."

That still is Turner's position, Sando said. He was asked about the possibility of sharing editorial control with NBC or another company. "That always was possible," he said, adding that it still is.

Friday was NBC's self-imposed deadline for deciding whether it would attempt to compete with CNN with its own, separate cable-news operation. It had moved that deadline back from Dec. 16 after Turner rejected its offer.

Grossman has estimated that start-up costs for NBC's own cable-news operation probably would total

about \$70 million. He has said the network needed commitments from cable-TV operators for a minimum of 13.5 million subscribers.

Had it gotten that number, it would have started the operation in July. The first indication that the proposal was in trouble came Jan. 6, when Grossman told a news conference here that NBC may not get the subscriber commitments it needs and may look at other alternatives.

NBC News Vice President Timothy J. Russert said last week that "we were able to get an informal commitment for more than half" the subscriber goal.

Despite the setback, he said, NBC News executives "are even" more convinced now that getting into the cable industry is sound, and we're exploring other options. We'll be talking with other (cable) operators in the field."

He declined to say which companies NBC now will be approaching. But he gave an emphatic "yes" when asked if NBC News would insist on full editorial control of any joint cable-news venture that might result.

## CBS to take 'Mary' off air temporarily

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mary Tyler Moore's new comedy, "Mary," and two other series will be taken off the air temporarily while CBS tests three new shows, the network said Tuesday.

"Mary" and "Foley Square," starring Margaret Colin, will have their final Wednesday broadcasts on Feb. 26. The two comedies will return to the air Tuesday, March 25.

"The Equalizer," starring Edward Woodward, will have its last Wednesday telecast March 12. It will also return Tuesday, March 25.

Two other series, "Trapper John, M.D." and "Crazy Like a Fox," will be taken off the air with no return dates scheduled.

"Mary," which made its debut in

December, and the other shows have not done well in the ratings, generally finishing in the middle of the Nielsen list.

The two comedies will return in later time slots, which the network hopes will be better suited to their sophisticated style of humor. "Mary" will appear at 8:30 p.m. and "Foley Square" at 8:30-9 p.m. "The Equalizer" will be telecast at 9-10 p.m.

"Fast Times" and "Tough Cookies," two new half-hour comedies, and "Morningstar-Eveningstar," a one-hour drama, will premiere in March.

In addition, "The CBS Sunday Night Movies" will move to Wednesday beginning March 19.

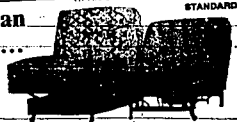

# Average daily TV viewing hits an all-time high, figures show

NEW YORK — Average daily television viewing reached an all-time high in 1985 of seven hours, 10 minutes per household. But the two-minute increase over 1984 was the smallest in a decade, figures from the Television Bureau of Advertising revealed last week.

Television viewing had been increasing annually by at least three minutes a year since 1977, when viewing actually dropped by eight minutes to 6 hours, 10 minutes. The largest increase since then was the 14-minute jump in 1983, when viewing broke the seven-hour barrier at 7:02.

The first half of 1985 was marked by gains by cable television and a loss by free over-the-air television. But in the fourth quarter of 1985, free TV, which includes the network stations at ABC, CBS and NBC, showed viewer increases for the first time since the cable boom of the 1980s began.

"For the full year, over-the-air TV, comprised by network, independent and public TV stations, fell from six hours, 36 minutes of daily household viewing to 6:31, while cable and basic-cable viewing increased, according to the Television Bureau of Advertising report, which was based

on data supplied by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

"Especially significant for over-the-air viewing are developments in the last several months of 1985," Roger Rice, president of the Television Bureau said in a statement.

Rice said that in November and December, over-the-air viewing rose by four minutes to six hours, 58 minutes per household, while pay-cable viewing remained at 25 minutes.

"The major reason the networks turned this around was that the penetration of cable into America has slowed," said Dave Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research. "Cable is not growing at the rate it once did."

Poltrack also noted that pay-cable, which shows mostly recent movies, has been hurt by the growth of the video cassette industry.

According to an A.C. Nielsen Co. report cited by Poltrack, pay-cable was in 30 percent of all TV homes in May 1985 but down to 28 percent in October.

HBO, the largest pay-cable service, and Nielsen have disagreed on subscriber totals for years. Quentin Schaffer, an HBO spokesman, said that HBO's subscriber count was up in October, November and December.

NBC showed the biggest gain among over-the-air networks, improving its rating by 11 percent in November over the year before. But the gain didn't come at the expense of ABC, which improved by 5 percent, or CBS, which increased its rating by 2 percent over the previous November.

"Network viewing is up, and NBC pulled along the network cart," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. Jaffe noted that NBC's biggest increases occurred on Saturday night, where the new "Golden Girls" has become a Top 10 show, and Thursday, with the success of the top-rated "Cosby Show."

"The networks have learned to successfully counterprogram each others' successes," said Poltrack. "When one network has a successful show in a time period, instead of trying to take audiences, the networks are creating shows attracting different audiences."

Poltrack gave the example of CBS' female-appeal Monday lineup, including "Kate & Allie" and "Cagney & Lacey," against ABC's "Monday Night Football."

"The strategy is building the collective audience of network TV," said Poltrack.

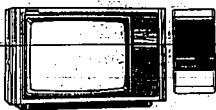

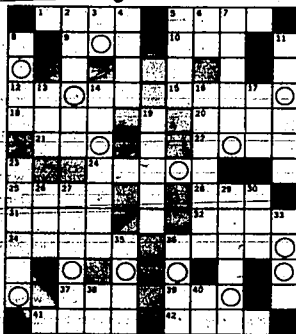
