Buhl principals win contracts

BUHL — A crowd of more than 500 Buhl parents, teachers and students stood and cheered Thursday night when the Buhl School Board voted to reissue contracts to two of its principals.

The action followed a 45-minute executive session by the board and reversed the board's 3-2 vote on Tuesday not to renew the contracts of Buhl High School Principal Dale Thornberry and Poppelwell Elementary Principal Lawrence LaRue.

Voting Tuesday not to reissue contracts were members Grant Atkinson, David Ross and Leonard Crismon. Voting in favor of the principals were Lila Bell and Howard Hopkins.

Although the three board members gave no reason for their move, speculation centered around the board's displeasure at the pair's outspoken support of teachers and against any moves to reduce the teaching staff to save money.

Hopkins was not present Thursday, but the other four board members voted unanimously to renew the contracts.

Thursday night's reversal, however, did little to clear up the controversy over the original firing of the two community-supported principals.

"They owe the constituents an answer," said Buhl resident David Munroe after the meeting Thursday night. "Nobody fires and rehires people in a 24-hour period without a reason. They backed down, but why?"

Although Thursday night's meeting was originally called to answer questions, Bell told the audience they were advised by their attorney not to make any public statement or answer questions. Board members said they would answer questions at their March board meeting.

Instead, Bell told the audience the board would accept public comments that would be used to re-evaluate the contracts of LaRue and Thornberry.

What followed was an hour-long pep rally in support of the two principals.

Because of the overflow crowd, the meeting was moved from the 350-seat auditorium in Buhl Junior High to the gym.

"I've worked for this district 21 years, and not one of the administrators I've ever worked with

Idaho teacher accepts space mission offer

BOISE — Second-grade teacher Barbara Morgan of McCall has accepted NASA's offer to become the new focus of the agency's teacher-in-space program, agreeing to fly aboard the space shuttle when missions resume.

"We have the opportunity to teach an entire generation a very important lesson," Mrs. Morgan read from a prepared statement at a Boise news conference Thursday.

She said millions of students had come to identify with the space shuttle program since the explosion that killed Concord, N.H., high school teacher Christa McAuliffe and six other crew members on the space shuttle Challenger Jan. 28. "They need to see that challenges are meant to be met and overcome," and I want to be a part of that," Mrs. Morgan said.

Acting NASA administrator William Graham announced in Washington earlier in the day that the agency's teacher-in-space program would go forward, and that Mrs. Morgan would be offered the opportunity to take over for Mrs. McAuliffe.

Mrs. Morgan, 31, was Mrs. McAuliffe's backup and trained with her for several months. "She was a good teacher for me," Mrs. Morgan said.

She said she was excited about the prospect of flying aboard a space shuttle, and that she trusted NASA

to discover and correct the problem that led to last month's disaster.

"If there's one thing I learned about NASA it's that they don't see problems as problems," she said. "They see them as challenges and opportunities."

Her husband, Clay Morgan Jr., said he also was impressed with the professionalism and sense of mission

'Black puff of smoke' draws shuttle probers

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — The presidential commission investigating the Challenger explosion reviewed videotape and still pictures Thursday of a "black puff of smoke" between the right rocket booster and fuel tank as the space shuttle left the pad, officials said.

The smoke indicates the shuttle might have been in trouble from the moment of launch, officials said.

The NASA task force working with the investigating commission is trying to determine the exact time, origin, dimensions and other characteristics of the smoke," said a statement from Chuck Noffsinger, a NASA spokesman at Kennedy Space Center.

The study is placing special emphasis on the operation of the shuttle's solid-fuel rocket boosters, its external tank and facilities at launch pad 39B, the renovated pad used for the first time in the shuttle program for the Challenger launch on Jan. 28, Hollnhead said.

The investigative panel, which flew to the scene of the shuttle disaster for two days of closed-door sessions, was shown the videotape and photos for the first time Thurs-

day, said NASA spokesman Hugh Harris.

Jim Mizell, another NASA spokesman, said the smoke was first visible 1.4 seconds after the boosters were ignited at 9:38 a.m. MST. The puff appeared normal until 7.2 seconds into the flight when Challenger exploded into an orange-and-white fireball, killing its seven-member crew.

"All I can say is that it's the smoke there, and it's unusual," said Mizell, a former NASA engineer. "It appears to be on the back side of the SRB (booster). It's very difficult to tell exactly where. I don't think it came from the main engines," which ignite 6.6 seconds before the boosters power the shuttle off the pad.

Hollnhead said the film shows the black smoke appearing in an area between the right booster and the external tank when it left the pad. It was about one-quarter of the way up the booster, he said. The commission is to study the film further, but it made no statement on what it saw.

Commission Chairman William P. Rogers said in a statement read to reporters that Thursday's meetings at Kennedy Space Center "were detailed and thorough and were a benefit to the commission."

Tylenol maker, FDA issue warning

WHITE PLAINS, N.Y. — More cyanide-laced Tylenol capsules were found in the same county where a woman was poisoned last weekend, and the manufacturer and the FDA warned consumers nationwide Thursday not to use the painkiller because of the findings.

A bottle with tainted capsules reported Thursday in Westchester County was among those removed from store shelves after the death prompted thousands of stores nationwide to stop selling Tylenol, recalling the 1982 deaths of seven Chicago-area residents after taking cyanide-laced Tylenol.

A third contaminated bottle was found in the

county and although a Food and Drug Administration official initially said it contained a trace of cyanide, FDA Commissioner Frank E. Young later said it could be an "industrial contaminant" that was not proven to be cyanide and was probably not harmful.

Four states on Thursday banned the sale of Tylenol capsules. Tylenol in other forms was not affected by either the state bans or the warnings from the FDA and Johnson & Johnson.

Five capsules in a bottle of Extra-Strength Tylenol pulled from a Woolworth's store in Bronxville, a few blocks from the A&P where the first poisoned bottle had been purchased, were found to contain cyanide, said FDA Commissioner Frank E. Young.

George Gerstenberg, the director of the FDA's Brooklyn office, said a trace of cyanide had been found in a third bottle, which was taken from an A&P in Shrub Oak, about 27 miles north of Bronxville.

But Young described what was found as "a blip. We think it's an industrial contaminant. It's such a small trace that it wouldn't have done anything anyway. It's just so small we don't know what it is."

Further tests will be conducted at the FDA laboratory, he said.

The five capsules poisoned with cyanide showed evidence of tampering — the logo printed on the capsule halves was misaligned, and the bottles had been turned over to the

Marcos moving closer to being named winner

MANILA, Philippines — President Ferdinand Marcos moved closer Thursday to being named the winner in last week's disputed election as the Philippine National Assembly, which his ruling party controls by a two-thirds majority, began its official tally showing Marcos leading opposition candidate Corason Aquino.

With close to half the vote counted, Marcos was ahead by a 53 percent to 46 percent edge. The Assembly is expected to announce a Marcos victory as early as today.

As the assembly moved toward its expected announcement, op-

position presidential candidate Corason Aquino called on Marcos to step down, from the official figures from Friday's election, and let people select a president through a "wider political exercise." She did not elaborate but opposition sources indicated that this would be based on rallies and street demonstrations modeled after those of her campaign.

Her surprise proposal came as bishops of the country's powerful Catholic church met to debate whether the church should support civil disobedience in any street campaign and whether the church should reject Marcos' claim to victory.

Firing 'un-American,' Iacocca declares

HIGHLAND PARK, Mich. — Lee Iacocca said Thursday his ouster as head of the government advisory commission on the Statue of Liberty "borders on being un-American."

He said further he was fired because he fought commercialization of the project.

"In the end, a beautiful project gets hurt. I don't get hurt," Iacocca, chairman of Chrysler Corp., said at a news conference at company headquarters.

Iacocca said he was not certain why Interior Secretary Donald Hodel fired him Wednesday night from the job he has held for four years. But he said he believed it was related to a National Park Service endorsement of a luxury hotel and conference center for Ellis Island, which also is being restored.

He said the plan by the park service, a unit of the Interior Department, would denigrate the historic nature of the island, where immigrants were processed after they arrived in the United States.

The hotel project would be "financed by tax shelters for the rich," Iacocca said. "That's not part of the deal we made with the American people's action 'borders on being un-American,'" Iacocca said. "A lot of people have worked hard for four years on behalf of this project and so have I, and I don't appreciate being disenfranchised on somebody's whim."

Iacocca remains head of the

private foundation that has raised \$23 million for the project.

Hodel "pleaded with me to quit and offered me fancy titles and honorary letters. If I get out of his way," Iacocca said, describing a Monday meeting with the Interior Secretary.

"The suddenness of this episode shocked me," Iacocca said, adding that he had been unable to reach President Reagan.

Hodel held an impromptu sidewalk news conference to respond to Iacocca's remarks.

"If you watched Lee today, it's apparent he's very headstrong, and it may be he's made up his mind what he wants to happen on Ellis Island," Hodel said. "But the American people deserve an unfettered look."

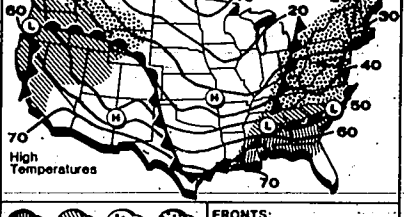

Local-option taxing powers receive House approval, 48-34

BOISE — Once again, the Idaho House of Representatives has approved legislation granting local-option taxing authority.

The question is whether the bills can clear the Senate.

The House voted 48-34 Thursday for a bill granting counties power to impose up to 1 percent in local-option income taxes. Later, a bill allowing up to 1 percent in local sales taxes won 51-27 approval.

But a third measure, allowing local taxing districts to vote whether they wanted to remove a restriction on property taxes, was defeated 42-37.

The House has approved such local-option taxing bills before, only to have it stalled in the Senate Local Government and Taxation



Committee, headed by Sen. Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls.

Watkins has stated publicly that he would rather undergo a public flogging than allow any tax increase this session.

Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise, who sponsored the local option bills, said he's optimistic Watkins will allow full and complete debate on the measures this year.

endorses "at least one of the measures," Hooper said. Also, since Watkins is a congressional candidate, he might allow the bills to be considered, he said.

But as of Thursday afternoon, Hooper said, Watkins has 25 House-passed bills in his committee and 15 Senate measures.

On the first vote, passing the local-option income tax, Hooper said, "Decisions are better made closer to home. We need to give a tool to the people in local government. And I think we should give them this tool."

Opponents, led by Rep. Myron Jones, R-Malad, objected to the provision allowing 55 percent of the voters to approve. He tried to amend the bill to make the requirement at least 60 percent. But that effort was swamped on a 61-21 vote.

Peavey says loan plan won't work

BOISE — Sen. John Peavey said at a Thursday-Democrat-press conference that Lt. Gov. David Leroy's plan to exempt farm loans from income taxation relies on the failed "trickle-down" concept and will not work.

Leroy's plan, which is being carried to the House by Republican leadership, would allow bankers and individuals to loan farmers up to \$300,000 without having to pay state income taxes on the interest income.

But Peavey said there are few individuals who loan large amounts of money to farmers, and any tax benefits offered by the proposed bill would help bankers.

At the same conference, the Blaine County rancher and his Democratic colleague, Sen. Dwight Horsch of Aberdeen, said their package of farm bills offered better relief to farmers than did Leroy's.

Peavey said he doubts the tax savings restorer Leroy's bill on a \$300,000 loan would exceed \$50 and he didn't think that would be enough to drop interest rates or free up more operating money for farmers.

Idaho Bankers Association lobbyist Bernie Jensen said Thursday afternoon that his organization has not yet looked at Leroy's bill and he could not say what effect it would have.

There is a striking similarity between Leroy's proposed bill and the substantial corporate tax breaks given to corporations 5 years ago at the behest of President Ronald Reagan, Peavey said.

At the time, Reagan predicted that corporations would plow their tax savings back into production and stimulate economic growth.

Peavey said time has proven that large corporations merely invested in each other's stock and the shift in tax policy moved wealth away from basic industries and into banking and the defense industries.

"Unfortunately, that has proven to have been an absolute failure for rural Idaho," he said. "It's time to look at those corporate tax breaks... we've all voted for it, not just Republicans," said Peavey.

The group of bills Peavey is pushing includes a plan to put \$3 million in state funds into an interest-free buy-down program in concert with federally guaranteed reduced-interest-rate loans from banks.

Peavey said the Senate Democrats are eyeing quarterly collection of corporate income taxes as a possible source of cash for the farm bill. "What we are proposing is real and substantial relief to the farmer... the lieutenant governor's approach is help for the banks and a teeny one for the farmer," Peavey said.

More sales tax bills popping up in House

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House may have a variety of sales tax bills to choose from, in its efforts to balance the state budget.

So far, the House has killed every attempt to raise the sales tax enough to cover a \$20 million deficit in the current budget.

On Thursday, the Revenue and Taxation Committee approved yet another approach. The panel voted approving and introduction of a new version of a recent sales tax increase, legislation that was defeated in a floor vote last week.

Rep. Mack Neibaur's newest proposal raises the sales tax from 4 to 5 percent starting March 1, but channels much of the new revenue into a budget reserve account.

The panel also has a bill sponsored by Rep. Stan Hawkins, R-Ucon, raising the sales tax by one-half cent. The committee debated a bill by Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, only for the next 16 months. It, House Bill 538 was killed and a session was instructed to draw up a new one.

Rep. Linden Balemam, R-Idaho Falls, majority caucus chairman, said after a GOP caucus Thursday that his party is negotiating agreement on a bill to ease the state's budget problems.

In Revenue and Taxation testimony, Rep. L. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, said neither of the sales tax increase bills raises enough revenue.

They have destroyed the whole idea of voter input into the process. It's about time to get someone who will listen to what the people want," said Black.

Anderson was part of a move earlier this week to amend the bill to place licensing in the hands of county sheriffs.

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Change would exempt hay guards

BOISE — Amendments to allow farmers to use dogs to keep deer and elk out of haystacks will be added to a bill aimed at helping the Department of Fish and Game protect the owners of game-chasing dogs.

As proposed, House Bill 462 would help state conservation officers prosecute people whose dogs harass deer and elk.

But members of the House Resources Conservation Committee say dogs help protect haystacks and crops, and farmers should be allowed

to continue to use their dogs to scare off game.

Assistant Director of Fish and Game Ken Norrie told the committee Thursday that in the five northern counties of Idaho, 218 incidents of dogs running big game were reported last year.

He said 70 deer and two elk were killed and F&G officers estimated that 218 was at most 20 percent of the actual number of game-chasing incidents.

"The family pet, when it teams up with a pack of other pets, becomes quite a chaser," Norrie said. A loophole in the existing law requires that F&G officers who catch a

dog have to be able to prove who owns it before they can prosecute.

The changes suggested would close the loophole by requiring that officers merely establish who is looking after or harboring the dog, without proving legal ownership.

Rep. Wall Little, R-New Plymouth, said many landowners use dogs to keep deer and elk out of their haystacks and the law should allow it.

The committee voted to allow the bill to be amended to protect farmers using dogs to protect their haystacks from marauding game animals.

Robbins seeks milk rules change

BOISE — Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, will go to bat on the floor of the House of Representatives for a bill to increase the non-fat solids standards for milk in Idaho.

Proposed by the Idaho Dairymen's Association, House Bill 554 would likely require that milk processors would have to add dried non-fat milk to low-fat milk to bring it up to the proposed non-fat solids standards. Dairymen's lobbyist Vicki Patterson Nielsen said the additives will

not raise the calories in milk, but will boost the flavor and nutrient value of milk.

Nampa dairyman Dale Pine told the House Agricultural Affairs Committee Wednesday that the new standards will slightly increase the cost of milk.

He said the amount of non-fat dry milk that will have to be added at processing plants will be determined by the season of the year and the breed of milk cows being milked.

Whole milk will likely never need the dry milk boost, he said, while low-fat products will.

The committee unanimously voted to send the bill to the full House with a "do-pass" recommendation, and Robbins volunteered to present the bill on the floor.

The committee also voted to hold further hearings on a bill to make the state Animal Damage Control Board responsible for livestock harassment by animals that have been designated as "threatened" or endangered species.

Idaho Woolgrowers Association lobbyist Stan Boyd told the committee that the proposed bill will save time.

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Senators hear views on system to track farm produce liens

BOISE — Fundamental changes in the agricultural commodities markets may be under way in the Idaho Legislature.

Mopping up in the wake of the 1985 Farm Bill, the Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee held 2 hours of hearings Thursday on what sort of system there should be to help bankers, farmers, and commodity buyers keep track of liens on farm produce.

Buyers say the current system is unfair to them and often results in their paying twice for the same shipment.

They say they buy produce subject to security interests, or liens, and that if the seller (or producer) fails to pay the lender

who made the producer's operating loan, the lender can then go after the buyer to collect the unpaid debt.

Bankers currently file lien notices with the county clerks when they loan producers money so that buyers can look to see what the outstanding debts are against the produce they are buying.

The 1985 Farm Bill dictates that by Dec. 22, 1986, all lien records be centralized statewide or that a "pre-notification" system be established so that bankers would send notice of their outstanding debts to all potential buyers.

If the Legislature does neither, all sales after that date would be "clear title," meaning that commodity buyers would be free from the claims of unpaid bankers if producers defaulted on loan repayments.

The committee is considering a bill to set up a central filing system run by the secretary of state, but took no action on the bill Thursday.

At Thursday's hearings, bankers said pre-notification would create a blizzard of paperwork and would likely result in higher

interest rates and reduced availability of loans to higher-risk farmers.

Idaho Cattle Association lobbyist Tom Hovenden says that either the centralized filing system or the pre-notification program will be paperwork monsters.

In a letter to Agricultural Affairs Chairman Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, Hovenden said the best option would be for the Legislature to do neither and let the "clear title" option take over.

But Hovenden said the plan might mean a tightening of farm credit.

Blair Hawkes, president of the Ireland Bank of Malad, said central filing is the best option.

Griff McAlliff, president of the Idaho Feed and Grain Association, said his group

opposes central lien filing.

The proposed bill does not address the liability of the secretary of state's office for mistaken information given to purchasers searching for liens, McAlliff said, and the mechanics of keeping and publishing a list of liens would make for an inaccurate system.

"Central protection will give everyone the protection necessary... the buyer will have to do his homework," said Steve Meikle, chairman of Valley Bank of Idaho Falls.

Centralized filing of liens will give producers, lenders, and buyers all the protections they want, Meikle said.

Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, said he felt the bank ought to be forced to do as much homework as the buyers by making closer inspection of loan customers.

Unions seek reconsideration of ruling on right-to-work law

BOISE (AP) — Idaho labor unions have asked the Idaho Supreme Court to reconsider its ruling on the state's new right-to-work law, contending the court misunderstood legal challenges to the law.

The action, filed with the Supreme Court late Wednesday afternoon, called for implementation of the right-to-work law for at least 14 days, a labor attorney contended. It will be longer if the Supreme Court decides to reconsider its Jan. 29 ruling striking down an injunction issued by a district judge last year.

But the state's top legal officer, Attorney General Jim Jones, disputed that. Jones said Thursday as far as he is concerned, the right-to-work laws in effect, and has been signed by the state supreme court ruling that overturned district court.

"The Supreme Court said specifically that it is in effect, and should remain in effect until the voters have a chance to act on it,"

said Jones.

"It is the law of the state and became so when the decision was issued," he said.

"Statements by others to the contrary are merely wishful thinking."

The Idaho Legislature one year ago enacted a right-to-work law over the veto of Democratic Gov. John Evans. It bans union agreements or other contracts requiring the payment of dues as a condition of employment. Idaho was the 21st state to adopt right-to-work.

Unions filed a lawsuit and won an injunction against implementation. Since then, the unions have forced a general election referendum this

fall, but both sides have been arguing since the Jan. 29 ruling whether the new law is in effect.

A group of Pottlatch Corp. employees at Lewiston on Tuesday announced they planned to quit paying dues to the International Woodworkers of America, citing the new law as authorizing the action.

State Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, attorney for the labor unions, filed the rehearing request. She said in an interview later that judgments don't go into effect until a petition for rehearing is settled.

After filing the request for rehearing Wednesday afternoon, the unions

have 14 days to file additional written legal arguments to back it up.

After that, the Supreme Court can simply deny the request and stand on its original ruling, or open the case for reconsideration.

Jones said until the rehearing request is settled, the ruling still can be challenged, but he said there is no question that the new law is in effect.

The rehearing request listed six grounds for reconsideration.

It claimed the 3-1 decision was decided on issues not covered by briefs, and that the court reached erroneous conclusions.

The unions also claimed that the

Supreme Court made factual assumptions in its ruling which were incorrect and the court ruled on the constitutionality of a section of Idaho law but neither side questioned its legality.

A key part of the ruling held that the Idaho Legislature is to be the sole judge when an emergency exists, justifying a law going into effect immediately upon passage. Right-to-work was passed on an emergency basis.

Unions claimed in the rehearing bid that they didn't dispute that the Legislature can declare an emergency.

Appropriation delayed

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers have delayed work on a 1987 state appropriation for higher education after being confronted with a proposed accounting maneuver that critics suggest might inflate actual state support for Idaho's four colleges.

The delay at least until next week in the panel's campaign to try to spur a final legislative decision on higher taxes for 1987 was sought by Rep. Robert Geddes, R-Preston, on Thursday so more information could be gathered on his proposal.

The committee had been prepared to draft a reduced \$85.5 million allocation for the schools — part of its strategy to force House and Senate members to take a stand on

significantly reduced 1987 spending levels for education in the face of an impasse over higher taxes needed to authorize budget increases.

Geddes called for including in the same bill not only the direct state financing for the three universities and the Lewis-Clark State College but other higher-education-related programs like medical, veterinary and dental training along with agricultural and forestry research.

He contended the move would give the public a better idea of exactly how much the state actually is spending on higher education and allow administrators more flexibility in meeting various spending demands.

Limit on 'good time' passes Senate

BOISE (AP) — Legislation curtailing the amount of a sentence reduction prison inmates can earn for good behavior has been approved by the Idaho Senate.

Although far short of the total abolition of so-called good-time recommended by a special legislative committee, the bill was passed by the Senate unanimously Thursday and forwarded to the House.

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White House tries to keep away from flap at Iacocca firing

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — The White House played the part in Interior Secretary Donald P. Hodel's decision to fire Chrysler Chairman Lee Iacocca from an advisory commission on the restoration of the Statue of Liberty, President Reagan's chief spokesman said Thursday.

"There was no direction given either way. It was a matter handled by the Interior Department," said Deputy Press Secretary Larry Speakes, who accompanied Reagan to California for a three-day mid-winter holiday.

"It was his decision — Hodel's," Speakes said.

The spokesman also denied a report in the Washington Post that Chief of Staff Donald R. Reagan played a key role in Iacocca's firing, that Reagan harbored some ill will towards Iacocca.

Reagan was informed of Hodel's decision during his flight to California on Wednesday, Speakes said. The spokesman said that Cabinet secretary Alford King called the president's plane to inform him of Hodel's decision.

Speakes said Reagan was in Florida on Wednesday and "had nothing to do with it yesterday." The president said nothing, he knew about it, he didn't have to say anything, ... It's Hodel's deal.

Asked about a Washington Post report that there was ill feeling between Iacocca and Reagan, Speakes said, "That's bad reporting on the part of the Post, I'm sorry."

He kept his car from Treasury for some period of time, but it's not because he doesn't like Iacocca that he wouldn't drive his car," Speakes said.

"I don't know what their relationship is, but certainly Reagan had nothing to do with this," Speakes insisted.

The spokesman also denied that Iacocca played any part in the matter and denied the Department on how to restore monuments, and that firing Iacocca would impair a possible run for the presidency on the part of the Chrysler chairman.

"Iacocca gets on TV more than (Vice President George) Bush gets on TV," Speakes quipped. Bush is a likely contender for the presidency in 1988.

"I don't know of any bad blood, but whatever their (Reagan's and Iacocca's) relationship is, it had nothing to do with Iacocca and the commission," Speakes said.

"It is apparently a legal counsel decision made by the commission itself."

Hodel said Wednesday that he told Iacocca he no longer could serve as both chairman of the commission, which advises the Interior Department on how to restore monuments, and chairman of a private foundation that has raised money to finance the refurbishing.

Speakes said the White House had no indication that Iacocca was removed from his commission post because he had not performed his duties correctly.

The spokesman said the issue that a person might not be able to serve on two commissions first came up on Jan. 29, and had been brought up by a "counsel" on Iacocca's own commission.

"On Jan. 29th, his counsel said that two members with dual membership could not be members of both commissions without potential of conflict of interest. Secretary Hodel agreed with that logic," Speakes said.

The audit is still in progress, but Rep. Bruce Vento, chairman of the subcommittee, said it had nothing to do with conflict-of-interest allegations raised by Hodel.

The firing, he said, "is more symbolic act on the part of Hodel. It's a question of politics and personality more than substance."

"I don't make much of this," said William Fugazy, a friend of Iacocca's and a foundation officer. "Most of the money for the statue is already raised."

The advisory panel from which Iacocca was fired "means nothing," he said. "There's really no change. All they did was embarrass him. He raised the money, and he controls it."

Iacocca was fired, Fugazy said, because "he disapproves of our plans for Ellis Island." He's sentimental about it, and he wants to make it a beautiful spot in American history, not a commercial venture."

Iacocca has talked of creating an "ethnic Williamsburg" on Ellis Island, referring to the colonial village restoration in Virginia.

The island's main building through which an estimated 17 million immigrants passed between 1882 and 1954, is being restored and will be open to visitors. But the fate of the rest of the island is uncertain.

A private developer's proposal for a conference center, in which the exteriors of 35 historic buildings would be preserved and their interiors used, won a Park Service competition.

Although Iacocca "was really shaken up" by the plan, he did not oppose it, Fugazy said. Instead, "he just said, 'Let's not jump into this. Talk to me July 5.'"

Some of the money raised has really only been pledged, he said, and grass roots groups in particular might renege if the restoration effort were derailed.

"We need a constant flow of money," he said. "You really can't say the statue is paid for yet."

Hank Nielsen, spokesman for the foundation, said the effort had survived bad publicity in the past.

Critics have charged that corporations were given too large a role in fund raising, and some corporate sponsors have used the statue's likeness in their own commercial advertising. Liberty's head is depicted, for instance, on American Airlines' placemats.

Successor sees no problems

LAKE GENEVA, Wis. (AP) — The man named to replace Lee Iacocca as chairman of the government's advisory commission on restoring the Statue of Liberty said Thursday he does not expect the change to cause any major disruptions in the panel's work.

"I'm looking forward to a successful conclusion to this program with no major disruptions due to Lee's departure," Armen Avedisian said.

Avedisian, a 59-year-old retired construction executive from Hinsdale, Ill., now serves as chairman of the board of the Citizens National Bank of Lake Geneva.

He noted that Iacocca, chairman of the Chrysler Corp., will continue as head of the private Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation raising money for the restoration of the statue and immigrant landing grounds in New York harbor. Avedisian said the commission is advisory in nature, and not involved in collecting or disbursing funds.

Avedisian said he had the highest respect for Iacocca, and will continue to work with him.

Interior Secretary Donald P. Hodel said his concerns about a conflict of interest that prompted his dismissal of Iacocca on Wednesday were intensified by Iacocca's own efforts to get two other members to choose between positions on the commission and the foundation.

Avedisian said it "was strictly a case of Hodel wanting to rule out any possible conflict of interest by not having the same persons serving on the foundation who serve on the commission."

Iacocca, however, described the conflict-of-interest allegations as "off the wall."

"I resent any inference on his part of conflict of interest. The truth is that the secretary is in conflict with his own charter. This is a grab for four years' worth of contributions by the American people," Iacocca said.

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Statue of Liberty party still on for July

NEW YORK (AP) — The Statue of Liberty, which in the past century has been damaged by protesters, buffeted by hurricanes and corroded by acid rain, is also expected to survive squabbling among those charged with reading the lady for her birthday celebration July 4.

Officials engaged in restoring the statue agreed Thursday that Lee Iacocca's ouster as head of a national advisory panel would affect neither the restoration effort nor Iacocca's control over it.

They said Miss Liberty's four-day 100th birthday party — "a piece of American history, not just a show," according to a spokesman for the producer — would go off as planned.

When Iacocca was fired Wednesday by Interior Secretary Donald Hodel, most of the repair work on the statue already had been completed and the original fund-raising goal of \$230 million surpassed.

About \$66 million was needed for the statue. The rest of the new target sum, \$262 million, will go to restore the Ellis Island immigration station.

Although dismissed from the advisory panel, Iacocca remained in charge of the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island Foundation, the private, non-profit group that has raised the money and done the work.

Texas house fire traps 7 children

EL CAMPO, Texas (AP) — Fire swept through a small frame house early Thursday, trapping and killing seven children left with no way to escape because the back door and windows were nailed shut, authorities said.

Firefighters found the bodies of five children in the front room and two in the back room of the three-room house, which was quickly gutted by the fire.

Police Chief J.C. Elliott said firefighters arrived about 12:30 a.m., too late to save any of the children, aged 2 months to 8 years old.

FAA grounds pilots of damaged jet

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Aviation Administration on Thursday grounded two American Airlines pilots involved in an incident in which a jetliner struck landing lights during an approach at Harlingen, Tex., and crews flew the aircraft three more times before the damage was discovered.

The FAA said the operating certificates of the two pilots, including the captain, who was a 20-year

veteran at American, were revoked immediately. The agency said the pilots operating the Boeing 727 with 132 people aboard acted "in a careless manner" and failed to officially report the incident.

American Airlines spokesman John Hotard said the airline would have no comment pending completion of its investigation into the incident except to confirm the FAA's action.

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Retired Monsanto workers lose lawsuit, face loss of homes

NITRO, W.Va. (AP) — Six retired workers who lost a chemical poisoning suit against Monsanto Corp. are finding out just how high the stakes are when you sue a corporate giant and lose.

"They've taken my health; they might as well take my house and my money too," says plaintiff Gene Thomas. In his eyes, that is exactly what Monsanto is doing.

A judge approved Monsanto's liens against the six men's homes last month. Monsanto said that while it won't try to take possession of the homes until the case is settled, it has an obligation to recover some of the money it spent defending itself against claims that workers were poisoned on the job.

While one plaintiff won a partial claim, the six who blamed highly

toxic dioxin for their health problems lost. The chemical was produced for years as a byproduct of the production of herbicides at the company's Nitro plant.

U.S. District Judge John Copenhaver ruled in December, after the jury's decision, that the company was entitled to \$300,000 as partial reimbursement for its legal fees.

Monsanto spokesman Larry O'Neill said the liens are "to ensure payment of a small portion of our legal costs."

The workers' lawyer, Stewart Calwell, sees another motive. With suits by more than 100 other workers pending, the liens send a message that "if you sue Monsanto, it'll be the ruin of you," he said.

Admittedly, O'Neill said, taking a man's home is "an emotional issue." However, he said, "we are responsible to recover what we can for our stockholders."

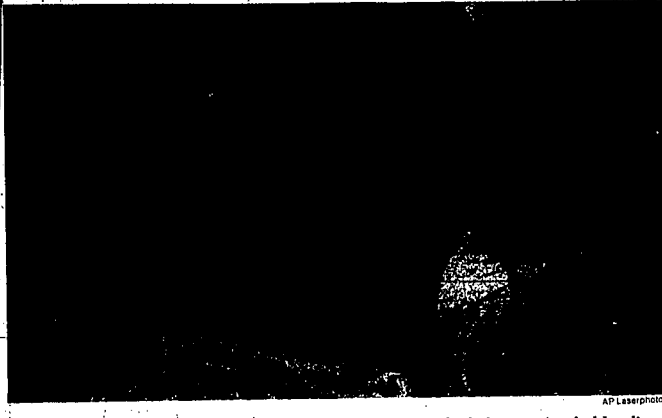
Monsanto spent in the 16-month trial. Calwell said that he spent \$3 million and that Monsanto, which brought in a host of lawyers, public relations men, stenographers and expert witnesses, easily topped that.

The six plaintiffs and more than 100 other workers broke out in mysterious rashes after a cauldron containing dioxin exploded in 1949.

rash that plaintiffs' witnesses saw is a sign of chemical poisoning. He says the rashes were followed by skin abscesses, blood poisoning and damaged lungs. Monsanto says Hurley suffers only from old age and the effects of cigarette smoking.

In its April 1985 ruling, the Charleston jury agreed with the plaintiffs that dioxin had caused their health problems and that Monsanto was negligent in its handling of the chemical. And it said that evidence showed dioxin causes permanent health problems, not temporary ones as Monsanto contended.

But the jury said it could not rule in favor of Thomas, Hurley and the other four workers because they failed to show that the company "willfully" and "recklessly" exposed them to dioxin hazards.

"Plaintiffs do undertake some financial risks when they undertake litigation," O'Neill said. "We hope plaintiffs' attorneys make it clear that they take some risk."

Laos OKs excavation of aircraft

WASHINGTON (AP) — Laos will permit a U.S. team of experts to enter the country next week and excavate the site of an Air Force plane which crashed during the Vietnam War, the Pentagon announced Thursday.

The 11-member team will go into Laos on Monday and remain for about two weeks at the site in Savannakhet province in southern Laos.

The AC-130 plane, with a crew of 14, crashed March 29, 1972.

The excavation will be the second performed by Laos within the past year and the third done by the Pentagon in Southeast Asia in that time. Last November, a U.S. team was permitted to dig at a B-52 crash site near Hanoi.

More than a decade after the end of the Vietnam War, the Pentagon lists 2,441 persons as still unaccounted for, including 556 in Laos. Most have long since been declared dead, but the U.S. government is pressing for a full accounting and says it cannot rule out the possibility that some prisoners are still being held.

Both Laos and Vietnam, where the Pentagon lists 1,797 persons as missing, have repeatedly denied that they hold any prisoners.

Many of the missing were pilots or crewmen, lost when their planes were shot down or crashed in the thick jungle.

The U.S. team will excavate the crash site jointly with a team from Laos, the Pentagon said. The American group will be led by Lt. Col. Joe Harvey, commander of the Joint Casualty Resolution Center in Hawaii, the main office for identifying remains of U.S. servicemen from the Vietnam War.

When Laos permitted a U.S. team to excavate a crash site last February, the remains of 13 Americans were recovered.

The announcement of the latest excavation follows a preliminary visit to the site by a U.S. team last month. American officials then sought a full-scale excavation.

Walker jury taking shape

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The only FBI agent ever charged with espionage faced a pool of 216 prospective jurors Thursday as the search began for the panel that will judge him in a second trial.

The jury in the first trial of Richard W. Miller, 49, deadlocked last November after a four-month trial that focused on Miller's sexual relationship with a confessed Soviet spy, Svetlana Ogorodnikov.

Miller is charged with passing classified documents to Mrs. Ogorodnikov for the Soviet Union in exchange for a promise of \$65,000 in cash and gold.

The fired agent insists he's innocent and swears that his involvement with the woman was part of a maverick plan to infiltrate the Soviet KGB and prove himself a hero to the FBI.

Miller was arrested in October 1984 and has been in custody ever since.

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Weinberger: Shuttle hiatus may slow, not end, 'Star Wars'

NEW YORK (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger said Thursday the loss of the space shuttle Challenger could set back research on "Star Wars," but the tragedy should not block pursuit of the anti-missile defense system.

Weinberger, in an interview with Associated Press editors, also played down the increasing number of Libyan jet fighters flying missions near the U.S. fleet in the Mediterranean and said increased amounts of economic aid would be needed to improve conditions lest Haiti become fertile ground for terrorism or "another Cuba." He also defended the Pentagon's fiscal 1987 budget request as a realistic proposal based on military need.

Weinberger, as his aides had done last week, said the explosion that destroyed the space shuttle and killed seven crew members on Jan. 28 could have an impact on defense projects. He suggested, however, that defense programs could withstand a six-month delay in shuttle operations. If delays stretch to a year or more, he continued, then the Pentagon might have to turn to alternatives "for launching" needed weapons, communications and spy satellites. Weinberger was not specific on what such alternatives might be, beyond noting the Defense

Department still has some older Titan boosters that can be used for missions. Congress has also authorized the Pentagon to develop larger unmanned rockets that can boost the same size payload into orbit as the shut-

tle, but the first of those is not scheduled for use before 1988.

Weinberger also agreed that some Star Wars experiments would undoubtedly be delayed by the shuttle's loss.

Asked whether the nation could accept an intricate space defense system like Star Wars in view of the accident that destroyed the shuttle, Weinberger replied: "I think we should stop working on it because we had a terrible tragedy on the shuttle. . . . There is no way you can have a risk-free environment. . . ."

The defense secretary added that research was proceeding with the idea of building a "many-layered system" that could catch incoming nuclear missiles at different stages of their flight.

Turning to the budget, Weinberger defended the administration's decision to seek an 11.9 percent increase for the Pentagon in fiscal 1987 while proposing drastic cuts in domestic programs.

The secretary said his responsibility was to state the "actual needs" for defense regardless of congressional suggestions that the Pentagon proposal "doesn't stand a realistic chance of approval without the reductions. He added that he remained convinced the Pentagon's budget could be funded and the deli-

cit reduced without a tax increase. "I don't think increasing taxes is a solution to anything," he said.

Weinberger declined to discuss possible U.S. ship and warplane movements off Libya's coast. The carriers Coral Sea and Saratoga earlier this week launched the second exercise in three weeks off the Libyan coast. Weinberger said the Libyans had stepped up the number of jets they were dispatching toward the American fleet over the past two days, but that would not deter the carriers from operating in international waters.

Turning to the Caribbean, Weinberger said the biggest problem facing Haiti following the decision of its president-to-be last week was the country's overwhelming poverty. The United States intends to monitor the situation inside Haiti closely, Weinberger said, and there will be a real need for an infusion of U.S. economic aid to help ensure a democratic government is established.

Weinberger also defended a recent decision by the Navy to lift a suspension of the General Dynamics Corp. that was prompted by a federal fraud indictment. In lifting the suspension, the Navy agreed that it would not suspend the company from receiving contracts based on any future indictments that could be

traced to wrongdoing in the past, because the firm had made sufficient internal management improvements.

Weinberger denied that promise amounted to any type of "immunity," adding he thought the agree-

ment was quite proper. Later, addressing the English-Speaking Union and the British-American Chamber of Commerce, Weinberger said he was convinced that the money was there to fund the defense increase.

Intelsat signs deal in support of NASA

WASHINGTON (AP) — Expressing "steadfast support" for NASA's space shuttle, Intelsat on Thursday signed a \$180 million contract for three satellite launches from the shuttle, the first commercial business NASA has signed since Challenger exploded.

NASA said at the signing ceremony it is too early to tell if it could meet the July 15, 1987, and Feb. 2, 1988, launch dates specified in the contract.

Intelsat may cancel the two, firm-date contracts without penalty if launch is delayed for more than nine months.

The third launch is scheduled on a standby basis. With Intelsat asking to have its Intelsat VI satellite placed in orbit sometime around June 1991.

Capl. Chet Lee, director of NASA's customer services division, said Intelsat may be given priority among commercial launch customers once the space agency begins rescheduling launches postponed while the Challenger disaster is investigated.

Lee said no commercial customers have asked to be let out of launch contracts since the disaster that killed seven members of the Challenger crew. "I have had no indication of any of our commercial customers wanting to drop out," he said.

The Intelsat VI is a 33,000-pound device that takes up 60 to 70 percent of the shuttle's payload area. The agreement "reaffirms Intelsat's steadfast support of the United States' launch program as

well as our confidence in NASA's technical expertise and the reliability in the shuttle delivery system," said Jose L. Alegretti, acting director general of the 110-nation communications satellite consortium.

Intelsat has used NASA for 37 of its 39 launches, starting with Early Bird in 1965. Arianespace, the European space agency, has handled the others and will get a contract for launch of one more of the five Intelsat VI spacecraft.

Lee expressed NASA's "deep appreciation for your expression of confidence." Intelsat, which will have spent \$1.2 billion with NASA, is the U.S. space agency's biggest clients as well as one of its most valuable clients in the battle for launch business with Arianespace.

Cambodian survivor becomes U.S. citizen

NEW YORK (AP) — Dith Pran, whose ordeal in the Khmer Rouge work camps of Cambodia inspired the film "The Killing Fields," was sworn in Thursday as a U.S. citizen, a move he says will help his mission of bringing peace to his native land.

"I'm glad I made it. My dream came true," he said to the judges, immigration officials, news media and 336 other new citizens gathered in U.S. District Court in Brooklyn. "Everybody likes to find freedom. I have found it. I'm very grateful to the people of United States of America."

Dith then said a phrase in his native Khmer, which he translated as "Long live freedom." The court-

room resounded with applause.

After Cambodia fell to the communist Khmer Rouge in 1975, Dith spent years in labor camps, slaving 14 hours a day for a spoonful of rice. Any knowledge of politics would have guaranteed death, so Dith pretended he had been a taxi driver before the war, instead of translator and factotum for then-New York Times correspondent Sydney Schanberg.

"I make myself a quiet man, like a Buddhist monk," he said later.

Today, Dith, 42, lives a quiet, American-style life in a rambling Victorian house in Brooklyn. Two of his four children are in college, his wife works at a bank.

Airline flights may resume

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States and the Soviet Union, in a step toward reconciliation, formally agreed Thursday to resume direct commercial flights between the two countries after a four-year lapse.

While terms of the agreement were not divulged, a U.S. official told The Associated Press that the American carrier, Pan American World Airways, would receive half the revenue taken in by Aeroflot if the Soviet line carried more than 42,500 passengers a year.

The official, who insisted on anonymity, called the arrangement "a balancing mechanism."

The two sides suspended negotiations last October because they were unable to agree on ways to assure a "fair share" of the market. Before air travel was suspended in 1980, Aeroflot was getting about 80 percent of the revenue.

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Songs saved sanity

Freed dissident jokes about health

JERUSALEM (AP) — Freed Soviet dissident Anatoly Shecharansky joked with reporters Thursday about his health and said he kept sane during a protracted period of solitary confinement by singing Jewish songs.

The 38-year-old human rights activist had been confined in Soviet prisons and labor camps since 1977. A physician examined him Thursday and said his only medical problems were a small heart lesion and a hand tremor.

Shecharansky, who was freed Monday in Berlin as part of an East-West prisoner exchange, later told a news conference that the Soviets took him to a hospital Dec. 25 in preparation for his release and gave him vitamins and good food.

"It's an old Soviet custom that when they produce goods for export they put them in good covering (packaging)," he said.

Shecharansky said the best way to help other Soviet Jews emigrate is "to demonstrate to the Soviet authorities that it's in their own best interest." "There now exists a real opportunity because of the policy of the president of the United States for real detente," he told the reporters gathered at a plush hotel.

Asked if he felt grateful to Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev for his release, Shecharansky paused, then said, "Frankly speaking, no." "On the other hand, I think it is important to make Gorbachev know that if this step is the beginning of a long process of improving emigration and human rights, such a policy will give the Soviet Union new opportunities."

Shecharansky had been accused of spying for the CIA and was convicted in 1978. Both he and the United States denied the charges.

Prime Minister Shimon Peres said in an interview that it was "too early to say" if Shecharansky's release signaled a relaxation of the Kremlin's emigration restrictions.

"I don't think the release in itself heralds a significant change," he said.

Shecharansky, who sat with his wife, Avital, at his side, spoke

somberly of his years in prisons and labor camps, including more than 400 days in solitary confinement in a tiny, unheated cell.

Asked how he kept sane during that period, the activist said he "surprised the prison guard because in the first days in the cell I sang. In the regular prison singing was forbidden." He said he sang Jewish songs.

Dr. Mervyn Gottesman, a cardiologist and physician to former Prime Minister Menachem Begin, said Shecharansky did not require any immediate medical treatment, but he recommended rest and light exercise.

Gottesman and a team of doctors examined Shecharansky for three hours Thursday. Gottesman quoted Shecharansky as saying he weighed 165 pounds when he went into prison in 1977 and just 75 pounds after a 1985 hunger strike that lasted about 100 days.

The dissident said he conducted hunger strikes twice to protest prison officials' refusal to allow him visits and mail. Gottesman said Shecharansky reported he was force-fed during the strikes with a rich fluid of eggs and milk pumped

into his body through a tube.

The force-feeding caused Shecharansky's heart to race and gave him severe headaches, Gottesman said.

The doctor said Shecharansky was well fed over the past two months and gained 22 pounds, putting him at normal weight for his 5-foot height.

Shecharansky "went into prison in 1977 in prime physical condition. I think his prime condition gave him the basis to survive," Gottesman said.

Asked about the activist's mental health, Gottesman said, "We are dealing with a man of great psychological strength."

Shecharansky, asked about reports that South Africa might free jailed black nationalist leader Nelson Mandela as part of the deal for his own release, said such a connection could be harmful to other Soviet dissidents.

"We were never calling for violence," he said. Mandela, convicted in 1964 of plotting sabotage in a guerrilla war to establish black majority rule in South Africa.

Soviet flights to Washington and

New York are to begin on April 27, with American flights to the Soviet Union starting two days later. A maximum of four flights a week will be permitted.

Pan Am stopped offering the service in 1978 because of insufficient revenue. Aeroflot was reduced to two flights a week by former President Jimmy Carter later early 1980. He imposed the sanction after the Soviets sent more than 100,000 troops into Afghanistan to support the Kabul government in its fight against anti-Marxist rebels.

The new agreement is part of a broadening of cultural and business exchanges that were spurred by Reagan's summit meeting last November in Geneva with Mikhail S. Gorbachev, the Soviet leader.

Rights report criticizes Philippines

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, in its annual report on human rights in 164 countries, said Thursday it found evidence of serious violations in the Philippines — both by government forces and by communist-led guerrillas.

It said violations included killings, torture and abduction of innocent people.

The report, written before the current controversial election in the Philippines, said there were signs of progress and that some of the charges against the government

were "not reliable."

Richard Schifter, assistant secretary of state for human rights, told a news conference he believed the Philippines had a strong democratic background and for that reason, "we believe there's greater hope than perhaps in other countries."

The report also criticized, to varying degrees, the 1985 human rights performance in more than a dozen other countries, including Iran, Cambodia, Afghanistan and Arab territories occupied by Israel.

And despite major efforts by the United States to get new Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to loosen restrictions on emigration and religious practice, the Soviet Union got a near-zero grade for 1985. The report said, "Soviet performance in the realm of human rights falls to meet even the most elementary of accepted international standards."

The 1,440-page report compiled by the State Department was sent to Capitol Hill in compliance with a law designed to help Congress decide on aid levels and other U.S. foreign policies toward countries with poor human rights performance.

Legislators question exercises in Honduras

TAMARA ARMY BASE, Honduras (AP) — Officials from several U.S. states are traveling to this Central American country to find out why U.S. National Guardsmen are taking part in war games conducted with Honduras.

Politicians from Oregon and Mississippi have arrived in recent days, and more are due from Arkansas and Michigan.

Oregon state Sen. Jeannette Hanby, a Republican, said she sees the

maneuvers as a form of pressure on the government of Nicaragua, which borders Honduras.

"I don't believe in military intervention in a country that has had a popular election, has elected a president and wants their own sovereignty," Ms. Hanby said, referring to Nicaragua.

Oregon state Rep. Bill Markham, a Republican, disagreed.

"If the Guard were ever nationalized (sent to war), heaven forbid,

they would be better prepared if they train in the terrain, language and customs of where they may be sent," said Markham as he watched guardsmen and Honduran airborne soldiers storm a hill while firing automatic weapons.

This week, about 950 National Guardsmen are in Honduras, a country that U.S.-supported rebels use as a base of operations for their efforts to overthrow Nicaragua's Sandinista government.

French ask Liberia to admit Haiti's Duvalier

TALLOIRES, France (AP) — Deposed Haitian dictator Jean-Claude Duvalier on Thursday officially requested that France give him and his family refugee status and asylum, according to a copy of a telegram distributed to reporters.

Hans Rissenner, of the luxury Hotel de l'Abbaye in this eastern town on the French Alps, where Duvalier has been staying since he fled Haiti on Feb. 7, gave reporters copies of the telegram.

Duvalier, 34, sent the telegram to the prefect of the Haute Savoie department, the local county where Talloires is located.

The French government has said Duvalier could only stay in the country temporarily, while seeking permanent asylum elsewhere.

In the telegram, Duvalier asked to be registered with the Office for the Protection of Refugees, along with all the members of his family. The telegram noted that Duvalier's

lawyer had expressed his wishes to the French Foreign Ministry on Wednesday and was sending appropriate documents.

A spokesman for Liberian President Samuel Doe said Thursday his country had not offered Duvalier asylum but would consider any formal request made by him.

The French Foreign Ministry spokesman said Ambassador Jean Thomas would meet with Liberian authorities in Monrovia.

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Haitians face fear of Tonton Macoutes

PORT-AU-PRINCE, Haiti (AP) — The Duvaliers are gone, but they left behind one of the new government's biggest problems: the Tonton Macoutes, a private army twice as big as the armed forces that tortured and killed at will for three decades.

Francois "Papa Doc" Duvalier created the personal gang of thugs in 1958. They wore civilian clothes with soft felt hats and mirrored sunglasses and roamed the island, killing and maiming in his interest, their own interests, or for no apparent reason at all.

The people of Haiti gave the dictator's band of enforcers the name Tonton Macoute — Uncle Bogeyman in Creole — and the Macoutes lived up to it.

They had killed an estimated 50,000 people by the time "Papa Doc" died in 1971 and passed the island to his 19-year-old son, Jean-Claude "Baby Doc" Duvalier. Jean-Claude fled his impoverished Caribbean nation a week ago, ending the family dynasty.

Hatred of the Macoutes is so intense that mobs chased some of them down in the streets during the first days after the portly president-for-life departed.

Justice Minister Gerard Gourgue said 30 or 40 members of the militia, which Jean-Claude had decked out in blue uniforms in an attempt at respectability, were killed in Port-au-Prince and

four or five in each of several other cities. Mobs stoned the Macoutes to death and hacked them with machetes. Witnesses reported at least one torn apart by his attackers, and an angry crowd even killed a Macoute's dog.

But there were up to 15,000 of them before Duvalier left, twice the strength of the army, navy and air force combined.

The provisional government issued a decree that disbanded the Macoutes, now called the Volunteers for National Security, and ordered them to turn in their weapons. It is assumed that many have not done so.

Gourgue, who led the Haitian Human Rights League before being joining the six-man national government council, also confirmed that Rosalie "Madame Max" Adolphe, leader of the Macoutes, had been arrested.

Mrs. Adolphe, 72, also has served as mayor of Port-au-Prince and a member of the National Assembly.

Guards at her luxurious white villa in the Petionville hills above this squalid city of 1 million people said that, on the night Duvalier left, soldiers took her to the Desallines military barracks.

Gourgue would not confirm she was held there, but when asked about it, he replied with a smile: "I've heard that rumor too."

Will she be tried? "Not yet," he said.

Edner Laguerre, chief of the "Madame Max," told a reporter she called her servants together to tell them Duvalier was leaving and warned them that the Macoutes were in danger and much blood would be shed.

Col. Prosper Avril, a member of the governing council, told reporters Tonton Macoutes would become regular citizens and would be welcome in the army if they met enlistment standards. He added quickly that only youths aged 18 to 21 could enlist and most Macoutes were older than that.

Victims of the Macoutes included Roman Catholic priests, political opponents of the Duvaliers, union leaders, students and reporters. Even well-known members of the ruling elite and the Duvalier family were eliminated or disappeared.

Violence abated somewhat under Jean-Claude Duvalier, but such organizations as Amnesty International and a human-rights commission of the Organization of American States reported arbitrary arrests, beatings and killings by Macoutes as recently as 1983.

Sylvia Claude, founder of the Christian Democratic Party, was beaten and given electric shocks and deported to Colombia after trying to run against "Madame Max" in the February 1979 legislative elections.

Saudi Shepherdess gets best of wolf

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia (AP) — A Bedouin shepherdess stabbed to death a wolf that tried to eat her, the newspaper Okaz reported Thursday.

Okaz said the wolf surprised shepherdess Umm Rajnan as she was tending her flock near the desert village of al-Ha'it about 125 miles from the city of Medina.

As the wolf began attacking her sheep, Umm Rajnan slipped into her

and got a big knife, the newspaper said. The wolf jumped at her but she stabbed it repeatedly until it fell dead at her feet, Okaz said.

The 45-year-old shepherdess was treated for minor injuries, the newspaper added.

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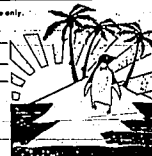
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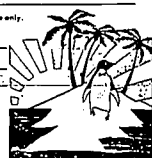
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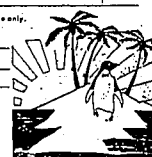

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Area teachers blast Callen's contract plan

JEROME — The Jerome Education Association Thursday blasted Rep. Jerry Callen's proposal to limit teacher contract negotiations as a "personal vendetta against teachers."

"As a legislator, Mr. Callen wants to impose on all school districts of the state what he was unable to impose in 1980 in his own district," said Ron McBride, who served as chief spokesman for Jerome teachers in 1980, when Callen served on the Jerome School Board.

Callen, R-Jerome, sponsored a bill that would narrow the scope of teacher negotiations to cover salary and insurance only. The House Education Committee sent the bill to the House floor by a 10-8 vote this week.

The proposed bill also contains an emergency clause that would erase terms in current contracts not specifically related to salary, such as teacher evaluations, class size or the textbook selection process.

"His bill would wipe out the gains made by the board and teachers in Jerome and elsewhere. It represents a personal vendetta against teachers," McBride charged in a press release issued on Thursday.

Callen could not be reached for comment Thursday.

While Callen was a School Board member and one of the board's negotiators in 1980, he tried to limit talks to just salary and insurance. "Contract talks dragged on interminably because of Mr. Callen's negative and arrogant attitude toward Jerome teachers," McBride said.

After 8 months of bitter wrangling, the effort failed and both sides agreed to include the grievance procedure—and teacher-leaves—in negotiation talks.

Callen was later defeated in School Board elections. He attributed his loss to teachers—who worked to unseat him.

Roy Parton, JEA president, said Callen, as a state representative, has never talked to him about ways to improve the negotiation law.

"If he had conferred with us, we could have suggested several ways to help," Parton said in a prepared press release.

He said teachers back proposals to provide reasonable time frames for bargaining and neutral binding arbitration as a final step to pressure the parties to come to agreement.

"I believe a state elected official accepts—a special responsibility—to represent all people, not simply his own biases," Parton said.

Evans: Head tax bill is 'regressive'

TWIN FALLS — Gov. John Evans Thursday called a proposed \$10 head tax to be used to build a new maximum security prison the "most regressive tax" available, and he said he opposed it.

The governor, in Twin Falls for a noon luncheon speech to the Kiwanis Club, also said the proposal to pass a 1-cent sales tax for only 4 months made the state look "foolish," because it was a "disjointed" effort to solve the state's budget problems.

That measure for only a short-term 1-cent tax, advanced by leaders of the Republican-controlled Legislature, failed Wednesday.

Evans said such short-term solutions to long-range problems caused uncertainty among the business community.

The proposed \$10 head tax was approved on Wednesday by the House Revenue and Taxation Committee to be sent to the full House. The bill would require an extra \$10 tax on every state tax return, starting in 1987 and extending through 1993.

Over the 7-year period, sponsor Sen. Roger Fairchild, R-Fruitland, said that would generate \$24.5

million to meet state construction needs.

But Evans said the tax would require people who do not pay income taxes, such as senior citizens, to file a tax form and pay \$10 or \$20.

"I am not in favor of this proposal," Evans said. "This is a most regressive tax."

The governor, still sporting a cast from a broken foot suffered in a fall last month, also made a brief pitch for his vision of Idaho's future. Evans is running for the U.S. Senate seat currently held by Republican Sen. Steve Symms.

Evans said the state's stagnant economy will only grow if home-grown entrepreneurs are encouraged to invest in the state.

It was not realistic, he said, to expect large manufacturing firms such as General Motors to relocate in Idaho.

"We need to look toward our own community and grow internally," he told more than 75 local businessmen. Evans cited Jack Simplot as one of the best examples of home-grown entrepreneurs re-investing in Idaho.

But before Idaho can grow, Evans said, the state "must have a stable tax structure," one that will attract businesses and support essentials, such as education.

Richardson stresses business expertise

TWIN FALLS — Veteran Idaho Falls broadcaster and GOP congressional candidate Mel Richardson said he knows how to listen and talk to people and will be able to articulate their message as 2nd District representative.

"His communication skills are some of the attributes he hopes to transmit to the Republicans of the district to win the nomination over an already full slate of candidates," he added.

Richardson, 57, visited Twin Falls Thursday for the annual Twin Falls County Republican Lincoln Day Banquet. And he had much to say about his campaign.

His 33 years as a radio and television broadcaster and manager give

him the edge, he said, over the other announced candidates, who include former Jerome County prosecutor Dan Adamson; state Rep. J.F. Chubbard, R-Idaho Falls; state Sen. Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls; and state Rep. Gary Robbins; R-Dietrich. All are vying for the GOP nomination and the opportunity to challenge Rep. Richard Stallings, the Rexburg Democrat who defeated 7-term Republican George Hansen in 1984.

More people are waiting in the wings as potential candidates, such as Connie Hansen, the wife of Hansen.

If Mrs. Hansen does run, she may be carried to victory partly on the shoulders of the George Hansen "hard-core," Richardson said.

Whether Hansen's legal problems will stick to Mrs. Hansen in a race

against Stallings "remains to be seen," he added.

George Hansen's problems include four felony convictions related to failure to file financial information with Congress. The convictions are being appealed.

Richardson wasn't surprised at the intense interest in the Republican primary race. He was the third to announce his candidacy and did so despite a potentially crowded field — because a poll he initiated showed him ahead in eastern Idaho. His first fund-raiser last week supported his decision because it generated \$8,000, Richardson added.

He also concedes he may be better known in the eastern part of the district, as a result, he will focus more of his campaign efforts in the Magic Valley and Boise area, he ad-

ded. What separates him from the crowd, he said, is his business experience as manager of KID-AM and FM radio in Idaho Falls. 4 years as mayor of Ammon and his knowledge of national issues.

He knows what it's like to work in a federally regulated business, that is broadening Richardson's appeal. As Ammon mayor, he was able to listen to the needs of his constituents and translate them into action, Richardson said.

His solid on national issues comes from 9 years of doing public affairs programs for television and radio, where he interviewed prominent experts on subjects ranging from "Star Wars" to South Africa.

His admitted lack of experience on a farm or in the Legislature is not

Homicide charges may be far in future

JEROME — Two shootings in Jerome last October that have been termed homicide deaths by the county coroner and police investigators are back in the investigation stage and any complaint in the case may be a long way in the future, according to Jerome County Prosecutor Mark Gause.

Sgt. Lonny Meadows of the Jerome Police Department, who headed the investigation of the shooting of John and Pauline Slater Oct. 10, released information just over 2 weeks ago saying charges were being filed in the case and a warrant would be issued naming a suspect.

Meadows said his department was ready to file a charge, and that all information had been given to the prosecutor, who was preparing the necessary probable cause statement and warrant. Meadows said then that the complaint might be filed that day.

Investigating officers agreed there was sufficient evidence to charge a probable cause for a first-degree murder charge in connection with the death of John Slater, Meadows said.

Gause said Thursday his office has not filed the charges because

he is continuing the investigation and is now looking into an entirely different phase of the case. He declined to elaborate on the new direction of the investigation, but said he expects it to take a considerable amount of time to resolve matters.

Pauline Slater, a 68-year-old terminal cancer victim, was shot in the head while she lay in her bed. Her husband, John Slater, 61, was shot in the back of the head as he sat on the living room couch. Officers said the shots were not contact shots with the gun against the head — and the bullet traveled in a downward path. This evidence would make a self-inflicted wound highly unlikely, investigators said. Other evidence also pointed to homicide, officers had said.

After Meadows said charges would be filed, followed by the delay in filing, 5th District Magistrate Joe Raderick issued a statement critical of what he termed a premature announcement of anticipated charges.

Meadows said Thursday that the blame is falling in his lap, but he does not intend to take full blame. He said he is aware of the additional matters Gause is looking into and has no argument

'Economic tools' can boost area businesses — Herring

WENDELL — Sell your products and services to the federal government. Have on-the-job training partially paid through a new government training act. Get loan guarantees from the government with low down payments, low interest rates and long terms.

Joe Herring, executive director of the Region IV Development Association, said these are ways economic development is being stimulated for farmers and small businesses in eight Magic Valley counties.

Herring spoke Wednesday to the Wendell Chamber of Commerce explaining how he helps local economic development, which he defined as the creation and retention of jobs and the expansion of the local tax base.

"One of the things small businesses need most drastically is affordable financing," Herring said, explaining that his association, through the Small Business Administration, helps arrange loans guaranteed up to 90 percent.

Herring said his association also helps cities get grants to improve

their sewer, water and road systems. "One project currently being worked on, he said, is a proposed industrial park in Gooding valued at \$750,000.

Herring said many "economic development tools" are available to the public, and his association helps the public learn about and use these tools.

One such tool, he said, is the Idaho Procurement Outreach Program to assist businesses in applying for contracts to sell goods and services to the \$168 billion federal market.

Chamber Vice President Darwin Yoder commented that Wendell merchants have the potential to make successful bids.

"We've got a lot of things we could be selling to the government if we only knew about it," he said.

The procurement program, said Herring, identifies federal market opportunities, helps small businesses get on bid lists, prepares bids and other paperwork, explains federal contracts, gets product purchase histories, finds out specifications and standards of bids and provides information on sub-contracting opportunities.

Herring said cities and individuals who want grants, loans, employee training programs or information about selling to the government may telephone him at 734-6586 or visit his office at 1300 Kimberly Road in Twin Falls.

The Region IV Development Association helps connect the public with a variety of helpful government programs, Herring said. It is a council made up of representatives of the eight counties in Region IV. Some of the council members are elected officials, including Gooding Mayor Gene Heller and Gooding County Commissioner Ron Honors.

Other council members, including Gavino Cavazos of Wendell, are representatives of the private sector. In other chamber business, Dec Collins, a custom farmer in Wendell, was honored for his many small years as "Santa's helper" in organizing local Christmas programs. Chamber President Jack Hyder presented a certificate of appreciation to Collins. Also, the chamber voted to donate \$75 to the Wendell American Legion Auxiliary for a child recovery program.

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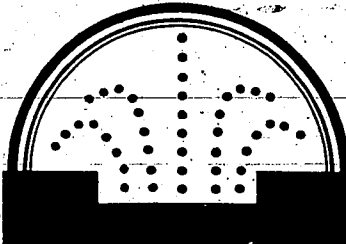

Leads Jerome County farm organization
Eden woman bucks bureau tradition

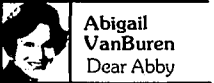
EDEDN — Linda Montgomery, recently elected to her second, two-year term as president of Jerome County Farm Bureau, did not set out to become the first and only woman in Idaho to be president of a county Farm Bureau — an organization, by its nature, traditionally more oriented to men.
Montgomery said she got involved because she wanted to take a more active part in the organization and to encourage more women to become involved in developing state policy.
She was elected to the position, she said, because she can do the job and not because she is a woman.
She had been "hanging around for 15 years, and the members know I didn't run just because I wore a skirt," but because she believes that farming needs to be a "family partnership," she said.
Montgomery points with pride to some of the accomplishments of the Jerome Farm Bureau during the past two years, one of which is a steadily increasing membership, up from 375

members to 443. Jerome is one of only two counties in the state organization to increase its membership.
A first for the county organization is the printing and distribution of a coloring book entitled, "Let's Talk Safely." The children's book about farm safety is distributed at no charge and is already in its second printing.
The coloring book project grew out of a request by a couple of Valley School teachers, who asked for some safety material to present to their classes, Montgomery said.
Another Farm Bureau-sponsored project now in its second year, is the Child School-Idaho program. This program provides identification tags for children to wear at a "cost only" charge.
The School-Idaho program is being supplemented this year with a Child Registry Handbook, also to be offered at a "cost only" charge.
Montgomery said these are not money-making projects, but are service projects designed to better educate and protect children.
The Farm Bureau also supports a finger-printing program, now in its fourth year. Mont-

gomery said all the child protection programs are done in cooperation with the sheriff's department.
In addition to her Farm Bureau duties, Montgomery coordinates the volunteer program at Valley Schools and organizes and publishes the monthly school newsletter which goes out to 1,200 boxholders in the area.
Montgomery said farming is an area where family involvement is necessary if it is to be a successful operation, and she spends a lot of energy promoting this concept.
She said that she and her husband, Carl, chairman of Jerome County Commissioners, could not attend the required meetings and activities for these offices if their children did not contribute to the "family support system," as she calls the chores the children do.
Montgomery said Ken, 13, and Mary Lynn, 9, also benefit from the same "family support system," because she and her husband are both avid supporters of whatever activities in which the children become involved.
She said she met her husband at a Farm Bureau party, and she often tells people with a smile that her Farm Bureau membership "came with the marriage license."

Small lie 25 years ago does not ruin marriage

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Mixed reaction to Japan's car export ruling

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration responded with mixed signals Thursday to Japan's one-year extension of its voluntary auto-export quotas, while the chairman of a House trade subcommittee said the decision could lead to higher prices for both domestic cars and imports.

"Japan will make up the difference by bringing in higher priced cars," said Rep. Sam Gibbons, D-Fla. "U.S. manufacturers will jack up their prices. And the U.S. consumer will get shafted."

President Reagan's special trade representative, Clayton K. Yeutter, denounced Japan's decision to extend the self-imposed quotas through March 31, 1987, saying "export restraints are not the answer" toward easing this nation's \$47.6 billion trade deficit with Japan.

"The United States did not ask Japan (to take the action). This was their decision alone," Yeutter added. "The only real answer is for Japan to open its markets further to U.S. products."

But President Reagan's spokesman, Larry Speakes, refused to make any comment on the Japanese move, claiming it was strictly an internal Japanese decision.

The administration sought publicly to put distance between itself and the Japanese decision, officials privately suggested the move could help ease protectionist pressures aimed at Japan on Capitol Hill, if only slightly.

Most lawmakers active in trade issues praised the decision, as did the U.S. auto industry.

"It means that they are getting the message from many of us in the United States that they can't continue the invasion of Japanese products into this country and, in turn, block our American-produced goods out of their markets," said Sen. Donald W. Riegle, D-Mich.

Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Ind., author of a letter signed by 11 colleagues urging Japan to extend the quotas, said he welcomed the move and felt that the quotas should be extended "until such time that there is an increase in U.S. exports to Japan" in certain areas.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., chairman of the Senate International Trade Subcommittee, said the decision signaled "a recognition on the part of the Japanese that trade is a give-and-take proposition."

Gibbons, chairman of the trade subcommittee of the House Ways and Means Committee, said the

move probably made sense from a political point of view. "I think the smart thing from Japan's decision to limit car shipments to the United States for a sixth year was announced late Wednesday in Tokyo. The present restraints are scheduled to expire on March 31. Under the plan, Japan would limit auto shipments to 2.3 million from April 1 through March 31, 1987, the same as the current level."

Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia called the Japanese action "a step in the right direction" toward easing the trade imbalance between the two countries, "despite the fact that the

Reagan administration did nothing to address this problem."

Japan's decision to limit car shipments to the United States for a sixth year was announced late Wednesday in Tokyo. The present restraints are scheduled to expire on March 31. Under the plan, Japan would limit auto shipments to 2.3 million from April 1 through March 31, 1987, the same as the current level.

Japanese officials said the step was taken in hopes of lessening trade friction with the United States. Even though the decision appeared to guarantee no surge of imports

Dow closes at new peak

NEW YORK — After meaning for much of the day, stock prices charged higher late Thursday.

They were boosted by buying programs and optimism that the stock market's historic rally still has plenty of steam.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose 15.14 to 1,645.97, breaking the record close of 1,629.93 set in the previous session.

It was the Dow's biggest gain in eight sessions and marked the sixth new high this month for the well-known market index.

For much of the day, stocks were little affected by a rally in the credit markets, which was sparked by weak January retail sales figures — regarded as a sign of weaker than expected economic growth — and low energy oil prices, which improve the outlook for inflation.

Although falling interest rates have kept the stock market at fever pitch, gains have been tempered by profit taking among traders who believe the market may be "overbought" and due for a downward correction, analysts said.

But analysts said that late in the session when there was no apparent strong down trend, buying programs and short covering triggered a late buying spree.

Stock covering is stock buying by traders who had borrowed the stock earlier in the hope that its value would drop and they could sell it at a profit.

Phillips Petroleum fell 1/4 to 9 1/2 to lead the list of most active issues on the New York Stock Ex-

change, as 2.91 million shares changed hands.

General Motors was up 1/4 to 79 1/2 and Ford rose 1/2 to 74, in heavy trading, while Chrysler shrugged off early losses to finish 1/2 higher at 53 1/2. The Japanese government said it would continue restricting auto exports to the United States during 1986 to prevent renewal of protectionist sentiments in this country.

Johnson & Johnson was up 1/4 to 51 1/2 in active trading. The stock had fallen the past two sessions.

AT&T was unchanged at 21 1/2 after a New York woman died from cyanide poisoning after taking the company's Extra Strength Tylenol capsules, but authorities have said the death was an isolated incident.

Among actively traded blue chips, Texaco was down 1/4 to 28; Eastman Kodak rose 2 1/2 to 52; AT&T was unchanged at 21 1/2; and Sears rose 1 1/2 to 42.

FDIC head sees bank woes continuing

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) — At least as many banks will fail this year as the 120 that collapsed in 1985, and the troubled agricultural economy and increased complexity of banking will be to blame, said the chairman of the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.

L. William Seidman, who took over at the FDIC in October, also said Wednesday that potential cuts stemming from federal budget deficit-cutting efforts would only make matters worse.

If the FDIC had to trim personnel, he said, the agency could not move as quickly to solve problems at troubled banks and head off possible runs on banks by customers.

"About the worst thing, next to nuclear war, is to have a financial panic," Seidman said. "Now, it would be a worldwide panic."

The 120 bank failures reported by the FDIA during 1985 was the most since 1933, and Seidman said he expects about the same number in 1986. Last month, a 1986 outlook was on the

FDIC list of problem banks.

Last year, Kansas, Nebraska and Oklahoma had the most failures with 13 each.

Seidman said he expects bank failures in 1986 to hit hardest in the same areas as in 1985 — blighted farm communities, areas that produce energy sources and over-built areas.

He said the complexities of the banking industry can cause problems even for big institutions.

"Banking is a tough business today," Seidman said. "Even if we didn't have problems in the economy, we'd still be seeing a high number of failures."

Seidman made the comments to reporters during a break from a seminar with regional FDIC employees. He said the FDIC has been forced to add employees as failures have increased and has opened consolidation centers to handle the load, he said.

Seidman, who was dean of Arizona State University's business school before heading the

FDIC, said "rural" bankers concerned that the FDIC would rather close banks than help solve their problems don't need to worry.

"It costs us too much to close a bank," Seidman said. "We try to keep every institution that's viable alive."

Seidman, who will map out the FDIC's goals for federal lawmakers next month, said he probably will ask Congress to allow the agency to charge risk-based premiums, figuring in factors that make a bank more likely to fail.

Risk-based premiums would allow the agency to operate more like a free-market insurer, and also force bankers to pay more attention to factors that put them in danger.

Currently the \$16 billion-plus FDIC bank insurance pool is maintained by an annual premium for all members of one-twelfth of 1 percent of their assets.

"There's great theoretical support for it," said Seidman. "But when you get down to who's going to pay more and who's going to pay less, then you get down to the big task."

Fed explains to children in comic book 'Light touch to heavy economic tale'

NEW YORK (AP) — "Once, long ago, in the middle of a very big ocean, there was a very small island called Mazama," a tale for children about money, inflation, lending and other weighty economic topics as told by the most powerful central bank in the industrial world.

In a 22-page comic book, the Federal Reserve describes how the make-believe island moves from a simple, barter-based economy to a modern one.

The text is geared to children in the fourth and fifth grades and is intended to help them learn about coins, currency, checking and banking, the Fed said Monday.

Natives of Mazama discover the disadvantages of bartering in Part I of "Once Upon A Dime."

Dr. Millicent Diligent and Captain Sharky put their marriage plans on hold while they try to trade fish and medical expertise for flowers for their wedding.

The florist doesn't need a vaccination or fish but would like a new mosquito net. They attempt to trade their wares with the netmaker

but he would prefer coconut milk. Dr. Diligent and Captain Sharky despair of ever obtaining the flowers.

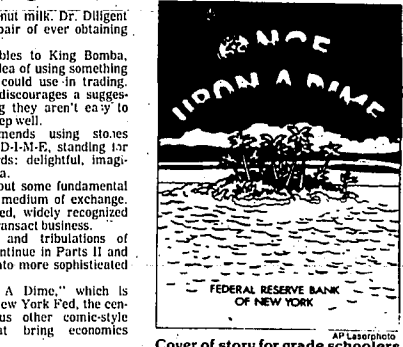

Prairie will face Firth at 9 a.m. and Ririe will take on Grangeville at 10:40 a.m. in the day's loser-out games.

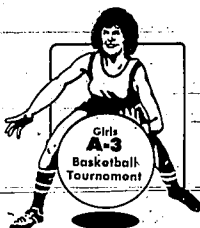
Kimberly's domination was nearly complete in the second half and it forced 18 Grangeville turnovers and off-rebounded the District 2 champs by more than two-to-one.

Bruins travel to Skyline

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Bruins hit the road for the last time in the regular season Friday night, traveling to Idaho Falls to meet the Skyline Grizzlies.

The Bruins, who wind up on the homecourt next weekend against Idaho Falls and Bonnevill, still have a chance to get to the 500 mark for the 20-game season. They currently stand 7-10 and must win their last three to get there, however.

The Grizzlies defeated the Bruins 76-67 in their first meeting and Coach John Astorgua believes his

troops will have to play well to win this one on the road.

"I like the makeup of the Skyline team," Astorgua said. "They have pretty good average height and they play nine or 10 players every night. They all play hard and they all run the floor well."

The Grizzlies are three-point conscious and used that weapon nine times in the first battle in Twin Falls.

"That's one thing we have to do," Astorgua said. "We have to get out

and contest the three-pointer but at the same time make sure they don't fake the shot and take it to the hole. All their guards do that pretty well. And they dish off well if the defense checks off to help."

The Bruins won two of three outings last week and performed well enough in all three to let Astorgua believe "our backline is playing pretty consistently. Now we need to get a little better scoring consistency off our guard line to be a pretty solid team."

Power council alters anadromous smolt escapement plan

BOISE: Idaho (AP) — The Northwest Power Planning Council on Thursday adopted a compromise to a controversial plan aimed at increasing the survival rate of young salmon and steelhead migrating down the Columbia River system to the Pacific Ocean.

The Council's staff had recommended increasing the 1986 goal for anadromous smolt survival over each of the eight S. Corp. Engineers dams on the "mainstem" of the Columbia and Snake rivers from 90 percent to 92 percent.

But utilities had blasted the proposal, arguing that the \$9 million in additional lost hydropower revenues that would cause was too high a price to pay for the amount of fish the plan would save.

The Council, after a morning of presentations and discussion on the staff recommendation, agreed there was not enough evidence indicating that the plan would provide "significant biological improvement" in salmon and steelhead populations for the loss of hydropower capability proposed.

If no significant biological improvement is indicated, the Council is required under the Northwest Power Act to adopt proposals with the lowest cost to utility ratepayers, spokeswoman Dudley Mahar said.

However, the eight-member panel did adopt a staff recommendation to extend until Aug. 15 the period during which water can be spilled over dams in an attempt to allow the downstream passage of 80 percent of the smolt runs.

Edward Sheets, Council executive director, said that was a big step toward replenishing populations decimated by hydroelectric dams. It was particularly important for summer and fall runs in the Snake River, which Sheets said have been threatened by heavy downstream losses for a number of years.

Ms. Mahar said the Council rejected the staff recommendation on a tie vote, with representatives from Montana and Oregon opposing

the plan and those from Idaho and Washington favoring it. The alternative motion maintaining the current 90-percent survival goal but extending the spill period into the crucial summer runs was adopted unanimously, she said.

The Council also ordered the Corps to consult with Indian tribes and fishery agencies in the states involved to develop the details of the "spilling" passage plan, Ms. Mahar said.

She said the Bonneville Power Administration also was required under Thursday's order to fund an evaluation of the impact of increasing smolt survival, a study of the number of fish passing through the dams each day, and another on smolt mortality in reservoirs along the Columbia system to use as a standard for comparison.

The 90-percent survival goal for 1985 was expected to cost utilities about \$12 million in lost hydropower revenue. However, Sheets said an unexpectedly poor water year meant

the smolt survival program actually cost power companies about \$27 million last year.

Boosting the survival goal to 92 percent would have cost an estimated \$20.5 million in 1985, but the additional cost of the plan adopted by the Council would be "significantly less," Ms. Mahar said.

The Corps currently spills water over dams for fish passage only when power in excess of the minimum needed to meet firm regional needs is being generated but has not been purchased.

Under the portion of the staff proposal adopted by the Council, the Corps would be required to spill water whenever necessary until Aug. 15, even if there is a demand for excess power, to ensure that 80 percent of the smolt runs are allowed to pass.

Ms. Mahar said officials expect all runs to have passed through the system by Aug. 1.

The proposed change was the result of complaints from Indian

tribes and state fishery agencies that the 90-percent-per-dam survival goal was inadequate. The Council set up an advisory committee last August to study the issue and conducted a series of public hearings throughout the region.

The current survival standard was set by the NPPC as an interim measure until permanent mechanical improvements for fish passage can be made at the dams. The permanent improvements were targeted for completion by 1989, but the Bonneville Power Administration and the Corps of Engineers are behind on their construction schedule, officials said.

Sheets said an average of 15 percent of salmon and steelhead smolts migrating downstream now are killed at each dam. That means only 16 young fish make it through Bonneville Dam, the final obstacle on their journey to the sea.

Permanent fish-passage structures including collector dams, sluiceway bypasses and submersible

screens — are in place at Bonneville, John Day, McNary, Little Goose and Lower Granite dams, Sheets said. However, he said improvements still need to be made at the Dalles, Iccle Creek and Lower Monumental dams.

Sheets said the Corps of Engineers generally was doing a good job in meeting and even in some cases exceeding the 90-percent survival goal already set by the Council. There have been some problems at the Bonneville Dam's second powerhouse, with a mortality rate sometimes reaching 38 percent. But Sheets said the dam has been closed down intermittently to help reach a goal of 85-percent "passage efficiency."

Probably fewer than 1 million additional smolts could be saved in 1986 by increasing the interim survival goal, Sheets said. However, he said that could mean a much greater increase in anadromous fish populations over a period of years.

Team spokesman Tim Cloodjeaux said seven players were involved in the deal.

Going along with Hassey to the Yankees are minor leaguers Matt Winters, an outfielder; Eric Schmidt, a right-handed pitcher; and Chris Alvarez, a third baseman-catcher.

Coming to Chicago with Allen are catcher Scott Bradley, who was up and down with the Yankees four times last year, minor-league outfielder Glen Braxton, and an undisclosed amount of cash, Cloodjeaux said.

Faust in demand in Akron

AKRON, Ohio (AP) — At least three radio stations and two TV stations are reportedly vying for services of University of Akron football coach Gerry Faust to host a weekly talk show.

Faust, who has been absorbed with recruiting, said in an Akron Beacon Journal interview published Thursday he was unaware that all of the stations were after him, but would face the issue after the recruiting war is over.

The former Notre Dame coach said he "definitely" would do some type of local show, probably one on TV and one on radio. He also would like to set up a regional cable TV program, but said he hasn't pursued it.

"I think it's important to have a radio and TV show for exposure for the athletes, the program, the university and the city," he said.

Broadcasting executives estimate that Faust could earn \$10,000 to \$15,000 from the shows.

NAIA loss record threatened

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Freshman Terry Dale is planning to present Harris-Stowe State College a Valentine's Day gift, and Ted Savage hopes the athlete's classmates show up to help the school break its 43-game losing streak.

DAYTONA BEACH, Fla. (AP) — Bill Elliott and Dale Earnhardt each earned a victory Thursday in the 7-Eleven Twin-125-mile qualifying races at Daytona International Speedway but that didn't answer the key question: Is Elliott as dominant in 1986 as he was in 1985?

The qualifiers determined positions three through 30 in Sunday's \$1.4 million Daytona 500.

Elliott, the colossus of NASCAR stock car racing in 1985 in his intimidating Ford Thunderbird, took a page from last year's script in playing an apparent game of cat-and-mouse in the first race.

Triple champion card set

NEW YORK (AP) — Heavyweight Pinklon Thomas and lightweight Hector "Macho" Camacho will be among three champions who will defend their World Boxing Council titles March 22 at Las Vegas, Nev., promoters Butch Lewis and Don King announced Thursday.

Thomas, from Pontiac, Mich., with a 26-0-1 record, including 21 knockouts, will face Canada's Trevor Berbick, 30-4-1, with 23 knockouts, in what is being billed as the first in the heavyweight World Series to eventually get the world title unified.

The unbeaten Camacho, a native of Puerto Rico who lives in New York, has a 28-0 record and 16 knockouts. He will meet Mexican champion Sergio Zambrano of Mexico City, 27-1-1, with 21 knockouts.

Foster out for 10 days

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Phoenix Suns guard Rod Foster will be sidelined for at least 10 days after suffering a sprained left ankle and possible ligament damage in his left knee, the National Basketball Association club announced Thursday.

Foster, a three-year pro from UCLA, injured his leg when he fell heavily to the floor late in Wednesday night's 126-106 loss here to the Los Angeles Lakers.

The Suns also said forward Larry Nance will undergo another series of tests Friday in a renewed effort to determine the cause of sharp pain in his right hand.

State fires cage coach

STILLWATER, Okla. (AP) — Oklahoma State University will not renew the contract of men's basketball Coach Paul Hansen after this season, Athletic Director Myron Roderick said Thursday.

Roderick said Hansen was offered a job as assistant athletic director but turned it down to remain in coaching.

Hansen is in his seventh season as the Oklahoma State coach.

"This is one of the toughest things I've ever had to do because Paul Hansen is a friend of mine," Roderick said in a statement released by the sports information office. "We just feel the best thing for the basketball program at Oklahoma State is to make a change."

Tennessee opens investigation

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — University of Tennessee President Edward J. Boling, saying the school is "greatly distressed" by reports of alleged violations of collegiate athletic rules regarding extra benefits, said Thursday the university has begun interviewing former Volunteer athletes about the allegations.

Boling said he has appointed a four-person committee of university officials to interview people mentioned in recent news stories reporting alleged violations of NCAA rules.

The committee also will review information telephoned in by the public, he said during a news conference at the school.

World's best vaulters collide tonight

NEW YORK (AP) — The ballyhooed pole vault showdown among Sergei Bubka of the Soviet Union and Americans Billy Olson and Joe Dial will take place Friday night in the Wanamaker Milehouse Games at Madison Square Garden.

Each competitor is saying that he can vault higher than the world indoor best.

Olson, 27, owns the mark of 19 feet, 5 1/2 inches, set last Saturday. His magnificent soar came only hours after Bubka, the world outdoor record holder at 19-8 1/4, had improved the indoor best to 19-5 and a week after Dial had established the standard at 19-4 1/4.

Earlier this season, Olson improved the best in each of his first three meets, and Bubka set the mark once, making a total of seven world bests over 19 feet in six weeks. Prior to this season, the world best over 19-0 had been set only five times, beginning Feb. 4, 1983, when Olson went 19-7 1/4.

"I think this will be the greatest, pole vault we've ever had," meet director Howard Schmetz said.

"I thought we were going to have a great duel between Billy Olson and Joe Dial," Schmetz said before learning that the Soviet Union would permit Bubka to compete.

Then, Schmetz said, "I think the addition of Bubka puts the meet over the top."

To help the competitors over the top, the pole vault area, called by Olson "the most unsafe place on the circuit, indoors or outdoors," has been improved. Schmetz said the pit has been lengthened and widened, providing the vaulters with more safety.

Olson never has beaten Bubka in five meetings, while Dial has beaten the Soviet once, when Bubka failed to clear 18-0 in a 1984 indoor meet at Cleveland.

"This is the first time I feel capable of beating him ... honestly," Olson said.

"He's probably capable of jumping higher," Olson said of Bubka's best of 19-5. "But so am I."

Dial also believes he is capable of improving the pole vault best — and beating Bubka again.

"I think the record will be broken two times Friday night," said Dial, 23, who holds the American outdoor record of 19-2 1/4. "I'm sure that Bubka will break it. But I plan to come out on top either way."

"I'm not worried if they stick the bar up to 19-6 or 19-8 or even 20 feet."

I have confidence I can make it. I'm sure they have confidence, too; but I'm not coming up there to lose."

Dial said that if he beats Bubka, "I'll know I'll have done something, because I think he's the best athlete in the world — in any sport."

"Whoever wins Friday night is the best in the world," Dial added. "I want that to be me."

Bubka, 22, who owns the two best jumps in history — 19-8 1/4 and 19-6 1/4, outdoors last summer — predicts he eventually will jump 20-0.

"In the last two years, as methods have improved ... it is possible to go higher and higher," he said. "... The progression of broken records now is only natural."

While Bubka, Olson and Dial have commanded much of the premeet attention, the rest of the pole vault field will be very formidable.

It includes 1984 Olympic champion Pierre Quinon of France, ranked second in the world behind Bubka; his countryman, Philippe Sivilton; Bubka's older brother, Vasily, rank ed fifth in the world, and Americans Brad Pursley, Dave Volz, Dave Kenworthy and Doug Lytle.

The hoopla surrounding the pole vault has overshadowed the rest of 3,000 gold medalist Maricica Poica of Romania.

The Wanamaker Mile will feature Eamonn Coghlan's bid for a record seventh victory. A triumph would put him one ahead of the great Glen Cunningham, with whom he shares the meet record of six victories.

However, Coghlan has been slowed by an intestinal virus this season and is winless in three major races — two at a mile and one at two miles.

His opposition will include fellow Irishmen Marcus O'Sullivan and Ray Flynn, American record holder Steve Scott, Sydney Marie, Jim Spivey, Mark Fricker and Somalia's Abdi Bile. O'Sullivan entered Coghlan's five-year, 15-race indoor mile winning streak last month and beat him again last week.

The other leading women entrants include triple Olympic gold medalist Valerie Brisco-Hooks in the 200, hurdler Stephanie Lightower, 400-meter runner Diane Dixon, Jaroslava Buncikova of Czechoslovakia in the 800, high jumper Tamara Bykova of the Soviet Union, and milers Lynn Williams of Canada and Olympic gold medalist Maricica Poica of Romania.

TBS invests heavily in 'Goodwill Games'

Turner Broadcasting is sinking tons of money into this summer's Goodwill Games, an international meeting of what TBS hopes is the elite of world athletics. Preparations for that 18-sport event already are in gear.

Two track meets serve as the testing grounds for equipment and personnel TBS will utilize in Moscow, June 20. The Vitalis-U.S. International meet will be held last week at the Byrne-Meadowlans Arena; the outdoor Bruce Jenner Meet will be staged in May in San Jose, Calif.

"In effect, every amateur event we have done or will do this year is leading to the Goodwill Games," says Joe Westbrook, who will produce track and field and boxing in Moscow. "It's a chance for our people to get familiar with the competitors, find the interesting stories and their background and be able to identify them and help the viewers identify with them."

"It's absolutely necessary to get such an early start. We don't want a runner to just be another guy in short pants to our people or to the viewer."

"We also need to involve our people will be in Moscow and we'll go to Moscow soon to scout locations: where to place the cameras, get an idea on the logistics of moving people around."

TBS has promoted the Goodwill Games as the first major competition in various sports between Americans and Soviets since the 1976 Summer Olympics in Montreal. Westbrook knows that the sports he'll produce will be the main focal points.

"I hope we are the showpieces, as in any international games," he claims. "We hope to have all the great track and field athletes in the world. We've already gotten commitments from many of them."

"Boxing will be a much different kind of experience. It's a much simpler sport to do. There isn't a lot of things going on at once. Just two men in a confined area. But you still have to make it interesting, even if it's not a good fight."

"In most cases, the boxers won't be known. Everybody knows Carl Lewis but we're going to have to

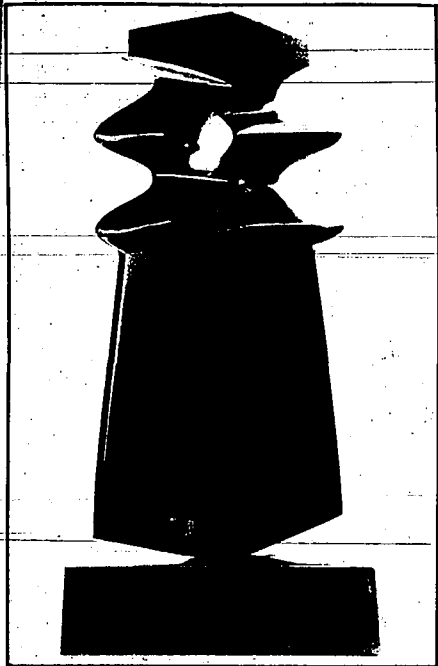

KETCHUM — Valentine's Day promises to be a sweet one for visual arts in the Wood River Valley when the Sun Valley Gallery Association opens its major winter show.

As an added treat, the public can meet exhibiting artists in 5-8 p.m. ceremonies at participating galleries.

Ketchum's Dan Jacob's Gallery features John Dawson, best known for his illustrations in National Geographic, Time-Life Books, Reader's Digest, Science and many more.

free-flowing abstractions were applied to unprimed canvas. The paint was directly absorbed into the canvas, and at times a bleeding effect occurred.

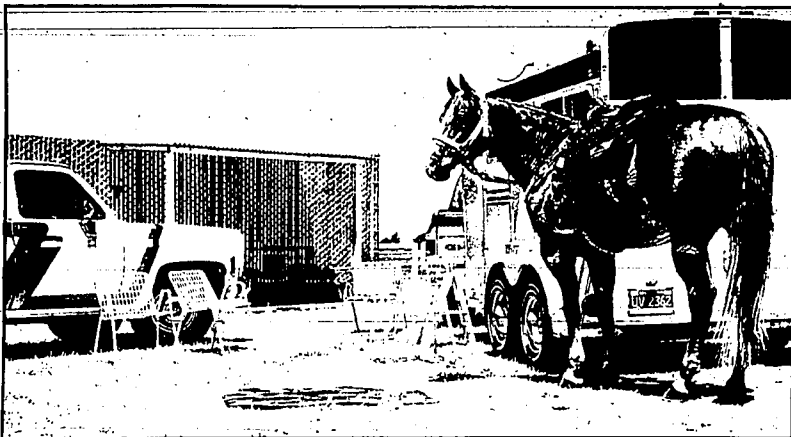
Ehrenberg uses this technique, but adds paper to parts of the canvas. Her landscapes allow the viewer the freedom of self-interpretation.

'Li'l Ugliers': Beauty's in beholder's eye

JACKPOT — When woodcut artist Gary Stone sets up his exhibit at Cactus Pete's Granite Range Hotel lobby Saturday, he'll be accompanied by a mob of little people.

"Li'l Ugliers" is what he calls the small-scale sculpture caricatures. Fun is what he claims to be having with them.

Originally used as a reprieve from the intense concentration of creating woodcuts, "Li'l Ugliers" have become a part of Stone's artistic repertoire.

"Working on these complements my woodcut work," the artist says. "My brain can go on hold."

According to Stone, the process evolved partly by accident, partly from a need to relax. In the midst of forming a woodcut portrait of Twin

Falls businessman Marc Peperzak, Stone found himself at a creative impasse. "I was having trouble getting Marc just right," he says. "So I made a bust of him out of Sculptee (packaged sculpting clay) and took it to his wife. She advised me on changes, then, when I got the bust home, I could paint Marc. It was like having him pose for me live."

"Now, I'm having a ball with it! Fun's the word," Stone says, pointing to a "Li'l-Ugly" figure of Jackpot publicist Carl Hayden. "They're like telling someone a good joke."

Among his earlier "Li'l Ugliers" are Miss Piggy cranking a slot machine, a golfer, an Indian and a self-portrait of Stone steelhead-fishing. Currently, the artist is busy creating an entire army of the figurines, representing individuals in sundry activities.

Using a tinfoil base for a sort of skeleton, the artist then molds the Sculptee with his self-created tools, bakes the miniature in his oven and finally hand-paints them. "It takes me about eight hours to do one," he says. "Once I start, it's like a good book — I can't put it down."

While spending eight hours to construct anything might seem like

work to most, it's merely the blink of an eye to Stone, who typically spends chunks of eternity designing his particular brand of woodcuts.

"It was in 1974 when Stone devised his unique method of wood-carved printing. He was watching a friend sandblast a coffee table when the vision struck of a new way of doing base-relief.

Experimenting, he developed a process similar to the way tombstones are inscribed: He would cut a picture into a rubber template, place the template on a table top, then sandblast. The result was a base-relief picture etched into the surface of the wood. Then using his considerable talent with paints, Stone added color.

From there, it was a simple matter of graduating from coffee tables to wall hangings, and from scenes to portraits of individuals with components of their lives slotted around them in permanent orbit.

In 1975, Jackpot's Carl Hayden spotted some of Stone's work hanging in the airport in Twin Falls. From that chance encounter, Stone became the first artist to exhibit at Cactus Pete's. Now, coming full circle, he'll be there with something old, something new. His exhibit will run through Monday.

much more than represent a vision of Idaho," he said. "They provide an opportunity to the rest of the world to understand in a new way who we, the people of Idaho, really are."

The international exhibit, scheduled for stops in Pakistan, Jordan, Syria, Tunisia and others, yet to be announced, will consist of about 90 folk art objects selected from 150 in the larger exhibit now touring the region.

Education secretary passes radio station's rock quiz

WASHINGTON — Education Secretary William Bennett, the self-proclaimed "Cabinet expert on rock 'n' roll," got a pop quiz Thursday at the College of Musical Knowledge — and passed.

Two disc jockeys at radio station WCLY offered an on-the-air challenge to Bennett to defend his claim after they saw him quoted in Thursday's editions of USA Today.

Bennett, alerted by a secretary, called disc jockeys Jeff Baker and David Burd back. "You play it and I name it," he told them.

What ensued, however, was a line of questioning reminiscent of Kay Kyser's popular 1940s radio show, the "College of Musical Knowledge."

His prize for winning: "Lunch anywhere you want to go."

Bennett didn't attempt an answer to the first question — the names of the five original members of the Rolling Stones — and asked for something

older.

On the next question, which asked who wrote "Locomotion," he got half credit for knowing that Little Eva recorded the song. But he did not know that Carole King wrote it.

Next, asked for one Pat Boone hit, Bennett named two: "April Love" and "Ain't That a Shame." The DJs gave Bennett 1 1/2 points.

Still a half-point short of a free lunch, Bennett was asked for two songs by Gary "U.S." Bonds. Bennett got "New Orleans," but missed on "School Is Out," even after the disc jockeys prompted him by hinting, "Think education, sir."

His teachers awarded him the half-point and Bennett asked for another question, pleading, "I'm warming up."

The question: Who recorded "The Book of Love?" Bennett correctly answered "The Monotones" and his questions pronounced:

"He's hot. Wee-wee him lunch."

Bennett picked Malcom Blanche — French for "white house."

Cray images: The computer as camera

LOS ANGELES — Mick Jagger dances and sings through a Southwestern adobe house in the music video, "Hard Woman," while a whimsical duo made of line images swirl about him.

The house was created by a computer and detailed right down to the wood grain in the doorposts. The line figures who act out the song are also the computer's designs.

In the movie "2010," the same computer created the multicolored, surging clouds of the planet Jupiter. Art mimicked life in Images drawn from the detailed pictures of Jupiter whorls sent back to Earth by the Voyager spacecraft.

These effects are some of the creations of Digital Productions, the brainchild of filmmaker John Whitney Jr. and Gary Demos, who manage a team of 80 computer image specialists, filmmakers and technicians and the world's most powerful computer, a Cray X-MP that can make 1 billion computations a second.

Digital Productions won an Academy Award for science and engineering in 1985 for the "2010" clouds of Jupiter and for computer simulation of outer space dogfights in "The Last Starfighter."

Of the six Cray X-MPs employed, the computer operated by Digital is the only one not being used

by the government or the defense industry, Whitney said.

The \$12 million Cray has 3,400 circuit boards containing 200,000 microchips, with 87 miles of wire connecting the circuits. The cylindrical computer is about 6 1/2 feet tall and five feet in diameter, but weighs almost six tons because of the copper tubing snaking through the system to carry coolant for the circuit boards.

An average home computer has about four circuit boards and 80 microchips.

The Cray is backed up by six other computers to provide the details and fluid motion to images that include the AT&T logo, the CBS Morning News logo (with a grid peeling away from the golden letters) and a series of commercials for Rockwell Inc.

So far, Digital Productions has been producing its fanciful and detailed images for commercials, corporate logos and scenes from movies.

Whitney said his top son will have the power to "pull" together any image, though creating a lifelike human face capable of showing the full range of emotions, still eludes the computer.

"The computer ultimately will be able to show itself as a camera," he said in a recent interview.

"It will mean there's no subject matter that can't be put into the computer and there's no story that could not be told and there's no fan-

tasy that can't be put onto the screen with a degree of truthfulness that would be awesome."

The key to such sharper images are the polygons, or many-sided figures, that are combined to make the larger image. Whitney and Demos' first program, developed before they created Digital, was 50,000 polygons per image.

At Digital, they have stepped up the polygons from 400,000 to 1.5 million polygons per image.

Each point of a polygon is coded into the computer. That information is used to build the model of an object, such as a face, that can be manipulated.

The more information that can be delivered in the shortest amount of time will produce the sharpest and most believable image, hence the practical aspects of filmmaking.

Unrestrained moviemaking is part of Whitney's life. The son of abstract filmmaker John Whitney Sr. and artist Jacqueline Blum, he made a point of avoiding college to learn the practical aspects of filmmaking.

Whitney first became interested in computer graphics using electronic, rather than mechanical, methods to project images in 1972 when he saw the technique employed in a film produced by the University of Utah.

Digital Productions was founded in 1981 by Whitney and Demos, who had worked together at Information International, Inc.

Racial complaint nets BYU director scolding

PROVO (AP) — A student director was given a verbal reprimand after another student complained she was denied a role in the musical "West Side Story" because she is black, a Brigham Young University spokesman said Thursday.

"The decision she made is one that is not supported by university policy," spokesman Brent Harker said of director Tracy Hainsworth. "We don't endorse casting or hiring on any other decisions based on race."

On Wednesday, Michelle Harris said she was told that although she was qualified for the dancing role, she didn't get the part because Ms. Hainsworth felt audiences would react negatively.

"The point is, Tracy made a bad decision," Harker said. "She was reprimanded verbally and told to resolve the situation."

Ms. Hainsworth, who is from Salt Lake City, then offered Miss Harris the job of production assistant, which she accepted.

"She had some difficulties with that and failed to show up," Dr. Harold Oaks, chairman of the BYU Theater and Cinematic Arts Department, said the director pointed out this was a student production on racial matters. "He had perceived an audience here in Utah would be bigoted," he said.

Ms. Hainsworth said Miss Harris was denied the role because "she didn't have the talent." She said

Miss Harris has "an adequate voice" and "adequate dancing ability." She did not have what was looking for, and neither did 118 other people.

Miss Harris also had "an attitude problem," Ms. Hainsworth said. "She was extremely hard to work with" and unable to work with the other actors in the production.

However, Miss Harris said the director "told me the reason I was not (cast in the role) was because I was black."

Miss Harris said she does not believe the community is intentionally prejudiced toward blacks, who make up less than 1 percent of the 26,000 student body at the Mormon Church-run school.

"I'm not mad at BYU," said Miss Harris, a Mormon, "but I think the whole thing was unfair."

She said she was denied opportunities while attending a predominantly white school in Philadelphia and that was a major factor in her decision to attend BYU.

BYU came to school to get away from it. BYU was the last place I expected to find a racial problem," she said.

Harker said it was important to point out this was a student production, of which there are some 90 a year.

He said major productions at BYU have included black cast members and that in one, the role of Pinocchio was played by a black.

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Small women's presses publish innovative, non-mainstream works

SAN FRANCISCO — If the urge to read a radical feminist analysis of sadomasochism suddenly strikes, don't look to major publishing houses for help.

Chances are, they won't have what you want. With such odd and whimsical names as Frog in the Well, Shameless Hussey, Spinster's Ink and Bookkeeper Press, probably would have something on the topic, and even more.

"We're taking risks, some bigger, houses aren't willing to take," said Ruth Gottstein, publisher of Volcano Press Inc. "There are books that are important and necessary that will never be best sellers. That's where we come in."

Most independent publishers agree there is no real center for small presses, but the San Francisco Bay area — the birthplace of the Free Speech Movement in the 1960s and home of one of the nation's largest homosexual populations — has long been a breeding ground for progressive ideas.

Small Press Magazine in New York estimates there are 15,000 small presses in the United States, while Dustbooks in Paradise, Calif., which publishes a yearly directory, puts the number at 3,094. There is no figure for women's presses.

Susan Hester, who single-handedly runs Frog in the Well in San Francisco, said the presses started to grow in the late 1960s and early 1970s because mainstream houses weren't publishing what women wanted to read.

"We decided we needed literature of our own. The mainstream houses were not publishing what you would call the fringe of the women's movement stuff that maybe wasn't popular," Hester said.

Several well-known writers have had their start with small women's presses, including Rita Mae Brown, author of "Rubyfruit Jungle," and Ntozake Shange, who wrote "for colored girls who have considered suicide when the rainbow is enuf," which became a successful Broadway play. It was first published by Shameless Hussey in Berkeley.

However, mainstream success for such authors is still more the exception than the rule, said Carol Seajay, founder of Old Wives Tales, San Francisco's only women's bookstore and publisher of "Feminist Bookstore News" magazine.

Women's publishing houses and bookstores are still a very grassroots kind of movement. Seajay said, while arguing the estimated \$9 million grossed by the 50 women's bookstores across the country last year "proves very clearly that there's a market for these books."

But major houses and chain bookstores believe "America is this homogenous, middle-

class suburban reality and they seem to think it's white male most of the time," she said. "So that's what they order for, and because that's what they order for, that's the kind of clientele they create."

Despite problems selling books published through small women's presses, she said, these houses are necessary because they do exciting and daring projects, and publish more first-time authors than the larger, more traditional companies.

Seajay cited several different kinds of books, including works on lesbian nuns, ethnic and minority women.

"When trying to make social change, some people work within the major establishment," she said. "But if you're an extremely impatient person, it's probably not the best place for you."

"In the time it would take a woman to gain a powerful position in a New York publishing house or chain bookstore, she could found her own bookstore and be running a \$500,000 business, or establish her own publishing company."

Although they usually are owned and operated by women for women, each women's press has its own distinct style and emphasis. Gottstein, who bought Volcano Press in 1981, said she focuses on women's health and social issues. She said Volcano has begun to publish in Spanish and has a workbook for men called, "Learning to Live Without Violence."

Cunningham's ballet enters Paris Opera's permanent repertory

from its original 90 minutes, is vintage Cunningham.

PARIS — Six dancers clad in pale gray skintight leotards stand immobile behind a thin, gray veil. In slow, studded moves they lift their legs and stretch their arms.

With the roll of a distant drum and the honk of a fog-horn, the dancers embark on individual journeys around the stage. Some leap, some skip. And predictably, since Merce Cunningham was the first choreographer to dare to have dancers walk onto the stage, others simply amble into position.

This shorter, livelier version of a plotless ballet created by the 69-year-old Cunningham especially for modern dancers has entered the permanent repertory of the classic Paris Opera Ballet Company.

The revised "Un Jour ou Deux" ("One Day or Two"), composed and first performed in 1973, made its world premiere in Paris last week at a star-studded gala that also featured a Rudolf Nureyev's "Washington Square." The 60-minute ballet, pared down

Set to atonal, arrhythmic sounds composed by John Cage and with sets designed by Jasper Johns, the work features 24 dancers of the Paris Opera ballet company in a stream of seemingly disconnected solos, duets, trio and quintets adapted especially for them.

"Can you imagine anything more difficult than maintaining your own rhythm for one whole hour without the support of music?" said Jacqueline Lesschaeye, author of a recent book on Cunningham. "It's amazing the dancers don't crash in to each other."

"Un Jour ou Deux" was originally created for Cunningham's New York-based company and has rarely been performed by classical ballet troupes.

It has not been seen in France since 1973 when it was featured at the Opera as part of the city's Autumn Festival. Six dancers of the current Paris Opera troupe, including two soloists, took part in that performance.

Boulez conducts music games in sports arena

LOS ANGELES — Normally Collins Court at the University of California, Los Angeles hosts basketball games. Tuesday night, thanks to the support of the Los Angeles Philharmonic and the invasion of some stellar players from France, it became the temporary site of some ultra-elaborate quasi-electronic musical games.

This certainly was not your average, ordinary, obligatory thing for the experimental black sheep of the UCLA music department. This was Big Stuff. This was Big Time, maybe even the Big-

gest of its admittedly rarefied kind. This was the U.S. debut of the Ensemble InterContemporain of Paris, the performing arm of the much vaunted IRCAM. That, in case you have been buried in Glazunov glaze and Glass spaghetti for the past decade, is Pierre Boulez's multimillion-dollar educational toy: the Institute for Research and Coordination of Acoustics and Music.

IRCAM is very serious. Very adventurous, in an emphatically anti-minimalist way. Very precise and demanding. Very popular as a state-of-the-art model of high-tech avant-garde chic.

Having forewarned an ongoing, time-consuming commitment to the re-creation of Mozart, Wagner, Berg and other fossils, Boulez — an enfant-terrible who celebrates his 61st birthday this year — has built himself an empire where he can break, once and for almost-all, the sound barriers of conventional instruments.

He has found his own un-Philharmonic milieu in which he can write his own rules.

The new rules were very much in evidence in the basketball stadium. A small stage in the middle of the court served as home for the primary ensemble.

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Book probes bear nature

"The Sacred Paw: The Bear in Nature, Myth and Literature," by Paul Shepard and Barry Sanders (Viking; \$17.95) is a synthesis of our multiplicity of connections to the natural history. Paul Shepard, professor of human ecology at Pitzer College in Claremont, Calif., has long written of our relations to wildlife and nature, including his books, "Nature and Madness" and "Thinking Animals." Sanders, a professor of English at Pitzer, offers literary counterpoint. Together, they have come up with a surprisingly coherent and readable assemblage. If the vast quantities of ursine paraphernalia sold in recent years is any guide, there is perhaps a genuinely interested and receptive audience for this species of enlightenment. Literate, scholarly, but far from detached.

Talking Heads, the New York-based rock group whose best-known tunes include "Life During Wartime" and "Burning Down the House," is among the dozen best and most influential American bands of the post-punk era. Yet there is a coldness to leader David Byrne's anxious, art-conscious tales of human foibles and obsession that limits one's ability to feel passionate about the group — or relate to the singer-songwriter.

In "Talking Heads," Bill Flanagan (Vantage; \$6.95, paperback) moves impressively behind that shield to talk to people who knew Byrne during his brief stay at the Rhode Island School of Design and his early years in New York City, and Flanagan emerges with a picture of calculation and drive that explains some of Byrne's artistic stance. Except for bassist Tina Weymouth's occasional challenge of Byrne's authority, however, there isn't much dramatic tension or structure to Flanagan's story, and the failure to discuss more thoroughly the band's music (and ultimate importance) leaves the simply curious reader wondering why anyone should care about this band in the first place.

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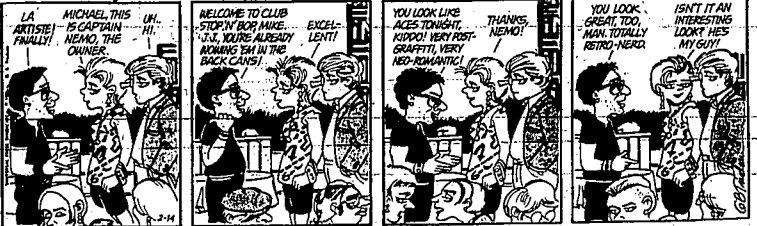

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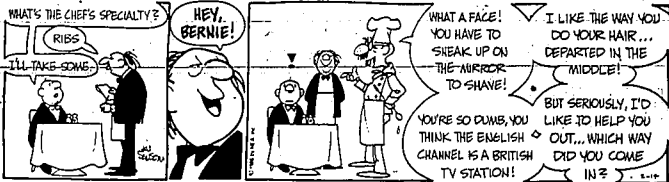

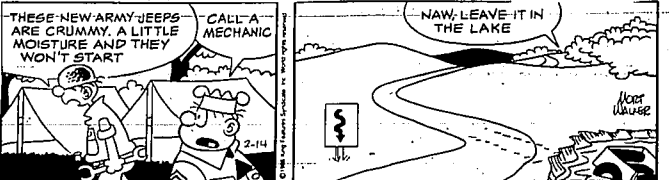

British nominate best films

LONDON (AP) — Milos Forman's "Amadeus" and David Lean's "A Passage to India," two 1984 Oscar heavyweights, each received nine nominations Tuesday for 1985 awards from the British Academy of Film and Television Arts.

Both will compete in the Best Film category alongside Robert Zemeckis's "Back to the Future," Peter Weir's "Witness," and Woody Allen's "The Purple Rose of Cairo."

The winner will be announced March 16.

Dame Peggy Ascroft, who won last year's Best Supporting Actress Oscar for "A Passage to India," is up for Best Actress with Kelly McGillis in "Witness," Mia Farrow in "The Purple Rose of Cairo," and Alexandra Pigg in "Letter to Brezhnev."

F. Murray Abraham, who won an Oscar for playing court composer Salieri in "Amadeus," will compete for Best Actor against Victor Banerjee in "A Passage to India," William Hurt in "Kiss of the Spider Woman," and Harrison Ford in "Witness."

Both Ford and Hurt received 1985 Oscar nominations last week for their performances.

"The Color Purple" and "Out of Africa," two widely-nominated films in America, are ineligible in Britain because they have not yet been released here.

Anjelica Huston, considered an Oscar frontrunner for her supporting role in "Patriot Games," was similarly nominated by the British academy, along with Tracy Ullman in "Pleasant," Judi Dench in "Wetherby," and Rosanna Arquette in "Desperately Seeking Susan."

Supporting Actor nominations went to Denholm Elliott in "Defense of the Realm," James Fox in "A Passage to India," Sir John Gielgud in "Pleasant," and Saeed Jaffrey in "My Beautiful Laundrette."

Nominations for Best Foreign Film went to Francesco Rosi's "Carmen," Li Wayne Wang's "Dim Sum," Luc Besson's "Subway," and Istvan Szabo's "Colony Red."

"A Chorus Line," Sir Richard Attenborough's critically denounced film of the long-running Broadway musical, received two nominations — for Best Editing and Best Sound.

Beverly Hills comedy tops at box office

HOLLYWOOD — "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" had its second rich weekend in a row with a gross of \$6.2 million, while top Oscar nominee "The Color Purple" and "Out of Africa" saw little benefit from the added prestige.

"Down and Out," a zany comedy about a bum joining a wealthy household, now has grossed \$13.8 million for Disney's Touchstone Films in its two weeks of release. It had a per-screen average of \$7,490 on 816 screens. The movie will be shown on more than 1,000 screens for the President's Day three-day weekend.

Paul Mazursky-directed film features Nick Nolte as the bum and Richard Dreyfuss and Bette Midler as the Beverly Hills homeowners.

"Down and Out" was followed by "The Color Purple" with \$5.3 million, "Murphy's Romance" with \$3.6 million, and "Out of Africa" moved up one notch to fourth place with \$3.5 million.

"The Color Purple" and "Out of Africa" each had 11 Academy Award nominations, and "Purple" was shown on 546 more screens this week while "Africa" had 105. But while the weekend gross for both increased, the per-screen average for "Purple" dropped from \$7,521 last weekend to \$4,806 this weekend. That statistic remained nearly static for "Out of Africa," with a \$3,310 average last weekend, compared with a \$3,220 average for the past weekend.


Two films began on the top 10 list this week.

"X," a thriller about a Hollywood special-effects man caught in a real-life drama, had a fifth-place debut with a gross of \$3.2 million. The movie's title is an abbreviation for special effects.

Woody Allen's "Hannah and Her Sisters," about the complex relationships between a hypochondriac, his ex-wife, her current husband and her two sisters, was No. 10 with \$1.2 million, but was shown on only 94 screens and had a per-screen average of \$23,441.

The hockey action film "Youngblood" dropped from fourth to sixth place, while "Iron Eagle," an action tale of a teen-ager and jet fighter planes, collected a third week dive from first place, landing in seventh this week.

"Best of Times," a movie about two former high school football players trying to recede to a flop game 12 years later, was No. 8 with \$1.6 million. "Jewel of the Nile" was ninth with \$1.5 million, followed by "Hannah and Her Sisters."

Zadora is finding her way in song

NEW YORK — Her life reads like the plot of a bad Hollywood movie. Fade in: Nuns help little girl overcome shyness by sending her to drama school. Little mop-top is discovered in school play, and lands part on Broadway. Spends youth on stage-in-ingenue-parts-but-no-big breaks come her way. Marries millionaire more than twice her age, stars in two trashy films and records several awful rock albums. Becomes Hollywood joke. Quietly records album of standards and gains critics' kudos. Fade-out as she heads to Carnegie Hall.

Call it "Butterfly II" or maybe "Revenge of The Lonely Lady." Better yet, "The Pia Zadora Story."

The acclaim "is twice as sweet now because my career has gone from black to white," Pia Zadora says as she sits in her Fifth Avenue apartment here. "But a lot of it is also shock. People who never thought I could do anything are now saying, 'Oh, she can sing.' It makes the effort even more powerful. It's great, but I'm used to being slapped in the face. I really am."

The turning point in Zadora's quest for professional respectability came late last year when she recorded an album called "Pia and Phil (The London Philharmonic Orchestra, That Is)." It was an album of standards by composers such as Harold Arlen, George Gershwin and Irving Berlin, and she received good reviews. But was the voice manipulated in the studio? Was it dubbed? Was it really her?

To prove that she could belt out tunes just like Judy and Liza and Ethel, she performed at theaters in Chicago and Los Angeles, and she got more good reviews, including a rave from Los Angeles Times jazz critic Leonard Feather.

Suddenly, it was time for a Pia Zadora reconsideration.

So a tour with a 42-piece orchestra is planned that will take her to class joints such as the Opera House in Boston, the Kennedy Center in Washington, D.C., and Carnegie Hall in New York.

"The difficult thing is that I don't have a reputation" in music, the 29-year-old actress says. "That's why I'm going to prove to the people who will know this is Pia Zadora and she sings. Most people now think 'Pia Zadora in concert? What does she do?' That's why I'm doing interviews and singing live on all the 'Good Morning' shows in Canada so people are aware of what I can do."

Sitting pretty on a white, plush couch, she anticipates questions of her starlet years. She calls her previous two films "Butterfly," which was produced by her brother, and "The Lonely Lady," based on Harold Robbins' trash classic — as "lousy movies."

Cannon Group on quest for respectability

LOS ANGELES — The Cannon Group is moving its corporate headquarters from cramped offices in a Hollywood high-rise to a gleaming new building on the edge of Beverly Hills.

Once scorned as invading schlockmeisters of B-movies, Cannon, which received two Oscar nominations for "Runaway Train," is at last gaining a little respectability.

Manahem Golan and Yoram Globus, the two Israeli cousins who run the movie company, have long sought equal standing with the industry's established film companies and have embarked on a number of projects they hope will accomplish this goal.

With a string of box office hits behind them, including "Death Wish III" and "Breakin'," Cannon is trying to eradicate its reputation for flesh and violence by doing quality projects with quality stars. However, Cannon will not entirely give up semi-exploitation movies.

The company has signed Dustin Hoffman to star in "LaBrava," based on an Elmore Leonard novel. Hoffman reportedly will receive \$6.3 million and 22.5 percent of the gross revenues. Julie Andrews is starring in Cannon's "Duet for One," now filming in England.

Cannon has paid Sylvester Stallone \$12 million for starring in and rewriting "Cobra 2." The company has also signed him for "Over the Top" at an undisclosed but no doubt similar fee.

John Travolta has signed for an untitled project and the company plans to do "Superman IV" with Christopher Reeve.

Nominations for the 58th Academy Awards include Juno Temple for best actor and Eric Roberts for supporting actor in

"Runaway Train." Voight won a Golden Globe award for best actor.

On Feb. 14, Cannon has its biggest release, a 1,700 U.S.-Canadian theaters for "The Delta Force," an action-adventure about the rescue of a hijacked plane by a special fighting force. The cast includes Lee Marvin, Chuck Norris, George Kennedy, Shelley Long, Robert Vaughn and Susan Strassberg. It was directed by Golan.

All this is heady stuff for the two producers-who-made-"Death Wish III," "Dolemite," "Invasion of Blood Farmers" and "Space Vampires." Their biggest moneymaker so far has been "Breakin'," the break-dancing movie that cost \$1.2 million and grossed \$60 million worldwide.

"We have never worked for a reputation. If they call us schlockmeisters, that's their problem, not mine," said Golan in an interview.

Golan, 56, was born in Tiberias. He devoured American movies as a boy and became Israel's foremost play director. He studied film at City College of New York and worked in Hollywood under the quackie maestro, Roger Corman.

Returning home in 1963, he formed Noah Films with Globus. Their enterprise prospered with four of their films receiving nominations for foreign-language film Oscars.

In 1979, the cousins co-founded Hollywood. They bought the faltering Cannon Group and set up shop on Sunset Boulevard.

As the new boys in town, they discovered how hard it was to talk to the major actors and directors. "We were foreigners, and we had a reputation for making low-budget, semi-exploitation films. But we did not stop at that. We learned the business, particularly how not to lose money," Golan said.

Cannon operates with a staff of 200, minuscule by Hollywood stan-

dards. Golan and Globus pay themselves \$350,000 a year each, compared to \$2 million for Disney's Michael Eisner and \$3 million for 20th Century Fox's Barry Diller.

One of their early mistakes was releasing movies through established companies. "We were weak, and we figured it would be a big thing if MGM released our pictures," said Golan. "We fell in a trap. ... We had to wait until we were brave enough to form our own distribution company. We should have done it from the start."

Cannon does everything in-house, except develop the film. "We have

to send out for that," Golan said. "Everything else is done here. We don't hire outside producers; we do it all ourselves."

Globus, 42, appears the more thoughtful partner, lean-faced with smiling eyes and a well-trimmed beard. He attended business school and served two years with the Israel Defense Force before joining his cousin in forming Noah Films. He has earned a reputation for daring and innovative film contracts, such as the recent \$12 million deal with Stallone.

Cannon's competitors claim the company is adding to the in-

dustry's cost problems by overpaying superstars. Globus disagrees.

"Cannon is unique in the industry today," he said. "It is the only company left that is running as a movie business. Except perhaps for Warner Bros., all of the companies are money vehicles for big institutions. Listen to them and you hear money talk, not movie talk."

The company's movie budgets average \$5 million as opposed to an industry average of \$15 million. "You may question our stories," said Globus, "but you can't question the production quality. It is always top grade."



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Writers Guild nominates for screenwriting

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Several Academy Award nominees including "Out of Africa," "The Color Purple," and "Back to the Future" were named Friday as candidates for the Writers Guild of America 38th annual achievement awards.

Nominated for "Back to the Future," by Robert Zemeckis and Bob Gale; "Cocoon," screenplay by Tom Benedek, story by David Saperstein; "Mask," by Anna Hamilton Phelan; and "The Purple Rose of Cairo," by Woody Allen.

Nominated for best screenplay based on materials for another medium were "Agnès of God," by John P. Picmeier, based on his play; "The Color Purple," by Menno Meyjes based on the novel by Alice Walker; "Out of Africa," by Kurt Luedtke based on books by Isak Dinesen, Judith Thurman and Errol Trzaski; "Pia's Story," by Richard Condon and Janet Roach, based on the novel by Richard Condon; and "The Trip To Bountiful," by Horton Foote, based on Foote's play.

Academy Award nominees in the same categories that did not include the guild's candidates match "Brazil" and "The Official Story" for best original screenplay, and "Kiss of the Spider Woman" for best adapted screenplay.

"Kiss of the Spider Woman," which was shot in Brazil, did not fit the guild's eligibility standards, said spokesman Randall Jansta.

The guild's 5,000 active members vote for nominees and finalists in both categories. Qualifying scripts are from production companies that have signed contracts with the guild or any of its affiliate organizations.

The Writers Guild awards will be presented during a dinner March 21 at the Beverly Hilton Hotel, four days before the Academy Award presentations.

PBS presents a four-part, adult reintroduction to Twain classic

It sweeps month for the networks, and viewers may overlook a quiet gem of a miniseries: the four-part adaptation of Mark Twain's "Adventures of Huckleberry Finn," airing this month on PBS's "American Playhouse." Part two airs at 9 p.m. Monday on KAID, Boise and KBGL, Pocatello.

Most likely, you read "Huck Finn" in grammar school and probably haven't thought about it in years. Perhaps you happened to catch the cloying Mickey Rooney or Eddie Hodges movie versions or even the Broadway musical "Big River." It's time for an adult reintroduction to Huck Finn. This presentation, adapted by Guy Gallo ("Under the Volcano") and produced by William Perry and Jane Iredale, presents Mark Twain's classic novel, which celebrated its centennial in 1985, without tears.

Twain's novel is a coming-of-age story. Young, free-spirited Huck escapes the wrath of his father and the "civilizing" influence of the puritanical sisters who become his wards, to pursue adventures on and off the Mississippi River.

The "American Playhouse" version is more violent than one remembers—especially the scenes in which Huck is beaten by his alcoholic father. The drama's liberal use of the word "nigger" may be jarring to some sensibilities, but it's a faithful re-creation of Twain's writings and of the dialect of a certain class of people in the United States of the 1840s. But the relationship between Huck and runaway slave Jim is explored more in depth and with more compassion than in previous versions.

Although this is not a big-budget production on a par with the network miniseries, the cinematography is first-rate: wide, panoramic shots of the river (it was shot on the Ohio, rather than the Mississippi), glorious sunsets, dark, brooding scenes of violence.

In the title role, 16-year-old newcomer Patrick Day, a Nashville resident whose previous experience had been limited to TV commercials, is superb. He captures the blend of Huck's innocence and street-smarts — or ill-riversmarts — the east also includes Samm-Art

A. You're a creative guesser, but you're way off base on these talented young screen actresses. Ally Sheedy, whose next movie is "Blue City," was christened Alexandra; while Molly Ringwald (up next in "Pretty in Pink") happens to be that young lady's real name. Anyway, what with "Blue" and "pink," they're certainly a colorful pair!

Q. Brooke Shields is to be one of the many guest stars on a forthcoming "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous" TV special to be filmed abroad. What's she like on these overseas junkets? — Y.W.

A. This program, sub-titled "The 1986 World's Best," is part of a journey by host Robin Leach paralleling the one made by David Niven in the well-known movie "Around the World in 80 Days," only this time it's made in less than 80 hours. Between takes of location filming on safari in Kenya, Leach tells me Brooke kept doing an outrageous put-on of his Cockney accent whenever she thought he wasn't within earshot. Unknown to Brooke,

the camera was still turning, and the hilarious hidden results will be aired as well, a surprise to her when it happens.

Q. We enjoyed the humorous new movie "Murphy's Romance," in which Sally Field (who plays a woman in her early 30s) falls in love with James Garner, who finally admits that he's really 60. Isn't Garner in reality a good deal older than this? — K.H.

A. In point of fact, he's younger. Garner (real name James Baumgarner) was born 58 years ago this April in Norman, Okla., which makes him two years younger than his screen characterization.

Q. I've heard that Yoko Ono isn't crazy about giving autographs when out in public. Is this her usual attitude? — P.K.

A. Hard to say. Recently, Yoko, wearing old jeans and boots, slipped into a Manhattan health food restaurant she favors for a vegetarian lunch. Despite the fact that the staff knows her identity, she wasn't bothered by any of the diners — for the simple reason that none of the guests recognized her. She left as graciously as she'd arrived, slipped into her limo and drove off — in total anonymity.

FAMILY PROBLEMS: The young daughter of a famous family spent some time in the detoxification center at Manhattan's Roosevelt Hospital. I hear her problem was alcohol, not drugs, and that she is fine now.

Q. According to a tabloid, the newly married Steven Spielberg and Amy Irving have become a flamboyant, attention-seeking couple on the New York scene. True? — T.B.

A. That makes colorful reading, but nothing could be further from the facts. I've run into this gifted golden couple at a handful of theaters and restaurants in the Big Apple, and they're invariably among the quietest, most reserved young celebrities I've observed. Not long ago they dined at an "in" Japanese restaurant. Seated at a corner table, they dined unobtrusively, knowledgeably wielding chopsticks, and conversed in subdued tones, with Amy deliberately placed with her back to fellow diners, attempting to remain inconspicuous.

Q. Is it true that Katharine Hepburn hasn't visited Hollywood since the death of Spencer Tracy, her last great love? — G.F.

A. Not quite. Kate lives in New York and rarely has occasion to visit Hollywood, but she has done so since Tracy's death. However, the trips to the West Coast have become even more infrequent since director George Cukor, an oldtime Hepburn chum, passed on. I did catch up with Kate on her most recent Tinseltown swing. She was all business, checking into a big studio to narrate a Public Broadcasting TV documentary. The subject of the piece dictated her trip. The documentary, due in March, traces Tracy's life and career.

Q. A Garbo buff informed our film class that it wasn't unusual for her to write some of her own dialogue in movies she starred in. Isn't this a little hard to swallow? — S.F.

A. Maybe, but at times she did. As one example, in a scene in "Nunobitchka," where Garbo goes into a chic Parisian restaurant and orders "raw beets and carrots," these specific foods were incorporated at her own on-set suggestion because of her personal liking for health foods. However, the waiter's haughty retort, "Madam, this is not a meadow," was the inspiration of Billy Wilder and the other writers involved in that film.

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Two former ABC mainstays help CBS to victory in weekly battle

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Miss Collins, who plays the wicked Alexis on "Dynasty," produced and starred in CBS' "Sins," which won the "Czar Wars" miniseries competition with NBC's "Peter the Great" last week.

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Last season, Miss Wagner played a police psychologist in ABC's series, "Jessie."

"Sins' had a big effect on the week and we had our second best Sunday night of the season," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director.

Since CBS replaced "Crazy Like a Fox" and "Trapper John, M.D." with its Sunday movie in January, CBS has beaten NBC's Sunday movie



three out of four times. "Under Siege," NBC's Sunday film about terrorism in the United States, performed below NBC's expectations and finished 27th out of 62 shows.

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Eisenberg noted that CBS' weekly average rating is one-tenth of a point better than last season's winning average. This season's difference is NBC's powerful performance, at the expense of ABC. For years, CBS has attracted an older, more rural audience, while ABC and NBC have competed for young-adult, urban viewers.

Last week, "The Cosby Show" was forced into a repeat because its originally scheduled episode was broadcast the Sunday before as a lead-in to the start of "Peter the Great." But it didn't really matter. Last week's "Cosby" rerun had a huge 35.4 rating and 51 share — the percentage of sets in use that were tuned in.

WASHINGTON — The financial boffins at NBC are looking into the feasibility of starting a Sunday morning edition of the "Today" show.

It could be 90 minutes or two hours long, according to current projections.

The idea is not new. But the recent success of the weekday version of "Today" and the underperformance of NBC's tired "Meet the Press"

trailing its Sunday morning network public affairs counterparts — has revived the idea.

A relatively cheap Sunday version of "Today" (which costs \$150,000 a day to produce during the week) might become a profit center, as has "CBS Sunday Morning," and a 90-minute program wrapped around "Meet the Press" might help revive the latter, or at least please viewers who watching NBC until it's over and "Today" comes back on the air.

ABC's 'Nightline' reports from South Africa receive top honor

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC News' "Nightline" drew top honors last week in the Alfred I. duPont-Columbia University Awards in Broadcast Journalism for five nights of live reports from South Africa.

The series of shows last March, including interviews with government officials and their adversaries, won the first Gold Baton Award, given to the program judged to have made the greatest contribution to the public's understanding of important issues or news events.

"Masterfully executed and exquisitely produced, it was perhaps the most powerful, certainly the most extraordinary, television of the year," the duPont judges said.

The other two commercial networks, the Public Broadcasting Service and Cable News Network received Silver Batons in ceremonies at Columbia University. Eleven other awards were presented to radio and television stations and other broadcast operations.

Silver Batons went to:
• CBS News for "The CBS Evening

News: Afghanistan: Operation Blackout," a series of reports on rebel efforts in Afghanistan to destroy power lines.

• NBC News for "The Real 'Star Wars' — Defense in Space."

• PBS for "The Brain," a series on that organ.

• WCAU-TV, Philadelphia, for live coverage of the MOVE siege.

• WBYM-TV, Washington, for a three-part investigation into a clinic operated by Dr. Milan-Vuitch which resulted in the clinic's closing.

• WCCO-TV, Minneapolis, for "The Moore Report," a documentary series.

• Nancy Montoya and KGUN-TV, Tucson, Ariz., for outstanding reporting.

• Cable News Network and IMAGO Ltd. for "Iran: In the Name of God."

• Chris-Craft Television Productions and Churchill Films for "Down for the Count • An Inside Look at Boxing."

• KNX radio, Los Angeles, for "Assignment '84-'85," a series of documentaries.

The Trustees' Prize, a \$10,000 prize for best independent production, went to DesertWest News of Flagstaff, Ariz., for a series of radio reports on the sanctuary movement.

Citations went to KWWL-TV, Waterloo, Iowa, for "A Town Meeting: Iowa's Future," a two-hour forum on the farm crisis, and KSMV-TV, Nashville, Tenn., for "Choice Cuts," an investigation into a local meat packer.

The awards come during "the most troublesome period" in broadcasting history, said Osborn Elliot, dean of Columbia's Graduate School of Journalism, which administers the awards.

He cited takeovers and near takeovers of television networks, an increased number of libel suits, fewer television documentaries, less news on radio, suggestions that broadcast coverage feeds terrorism, and "a strong feeling of unease among those who practice the trade of electronic journalism."

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'Hill Street,' 'St. Elsewhere' set for fireworks during sweeps week

HOLLYWOOD — Look for some unusual episodes to turn up on "Hill Street Blues" and "St. Elsewhere," most of them just in-time for the current ratings television "sweeps" period.

Daniel J. Travanti was critically wounded during last week's installment of "Hill Street Blues" (Thursday on NBC), which also featured a flashback revealing how Furillo and public defender Joyce Davenport (Veronica Hamel) first met.

"St. Elsewhere" this week will feature a two-parter showing highlights of St. Eligius Hospital's 50-year history. Drs. Westphal, Craig and Auschlander and Nurse Rosenthal (Ed Flanders, William Daniels, Norman Lloyd and Christina Pickles) all will be seen at various chronological stops along the way in "Time Heals." The episodes will air on NBC Feb. 19, "St. Elsewhere's" regular Wednesday slot, and the following night at the same time, in place of "Hill Street Blues."

And just one day out of the sweeps — on Feb. 27 — Officer Joe Coffey, played by Ed Marinero, will be shot and killed on "Hill Street."

"It's gonna be hard to believe, but this is one instance when it was a delightful coincidence," NBC vice president for current dramatic programs John Litvack said. The coincidence he refers to is the airing of the first three of these out-of-the-ordinary episodes during the month-long sweeps, when viewership is measured to determine local advertising rates.

Networks and producers alike have been known to resort to "stunting" — the use of special guests and exotic locales — to beef up ratings during the sweeps. But Litvack and executive producers Jeffrey Lewis ("Hill Street Blues") and Bruce Paltrow ("St. Elsewhere") all say it is not so this time around.

"It's not like we have Elizabeth Taylor coming into the hospital to have a breast implant," Paltrow, contacted at his home in New York, said of the two-part "St. Elsewhere."

The additional coincidence is that these two-particular-shows — both part of NBC's early-1980s push toward "quality" programming and both produced by MTM Enterprises

— planned flashback episodes at virtually the same time.

The more intriguing plot twist might be the permanent loss of "Hill Street" regular Marinero.

His press agent, Dick Guttman, says Marinero believes the time is right to leave the ensemble mold and move to starring TV and film roles. The actor previously has asked to be let out of his contract "and was declined a number of times," Guttman said. This time, "Hill Street's" producers relented.

Executive producer Jeffrey Lewis would neither confirm nor deny Marinero's contractual request. But he said that "we like having Eddie" in the cast, implying that Marinero is not being ousted against his will.

"What's simply true," Lewis added, "is that to maintain the credibility of a dangerous inner-city precinct where week after week for a number of years our viewers have seen our cops exposed to manifold dangers it makes sense for somebody to finally get killed. Whether we would have done it now, whether it would have been Joe Coffey or some other character, I can't say."

Coffey will be killed under "the most banal circumstance imaginable," Lewis said — namely by being shot by an attacker who pops up "out of nowhere. That's the most essential and truthful story one can tell about how cops live and die."

In Travanti's case, the critical shooting arose out of the producers' desire "to do something good for Danny and Veronica, our stars," Lewis said.

What is "good" for an actor, obviously, is not necessarily a barrel of fun for his character. Originally, to put Furillo and Davenport at the

center of the episode, writers toyed with having them on a train en route to Washington, where Furillo was scheduled to testify. Criminals threatened by his testimony then attacked the train and attempted to kill the couple.

The train idea was dropped, but the local shooting of Furillo accomplished the same thing: "to go all out with a little melodrama" surrounding the two characters, Lewis said. Davenport will maintain a bedside vigil and reminisce about how they first met.

Paltrow said that the "St. Elsewhere" flashback originated last spring. "We started to think about overall concepts for this season and one of them was that the hospital is the star of the show and this hospital has been in the same place for 50 years."

Viewers will get glimpses of St. Eligius Hospital and its staff at its origins in 1935 and again in 1965 (when Craig becomes chief of surgery) and 1975 (when Westphal was happily married with two children).

After the first one-hour script on this theme was written, NBC asked for more, Paltrow said. The resulting two-parter then was scheduled on consecutive nights when it was determined that "Hill Street" was getting further behind in its production schedule with each passing week and that a preemption would help it catch up.

Set dressing and construction presented "staggering" problems, Paltrow said. Hospital beds and rooms had to look 50 years old and wigs had to be made for all the leading men. Paltrow estimates that the two episodes cost an extra \$300,000.

King Videocable presents show for hearing-impaired customers

TWIN FALLS — New television programming for the deaf, hearing impaired and also the hearing is being presented each Saturday morning from 7:30 to 9:30 on King Videocable channel 10.

Silent Network is an award-winning series of programs presented with normal sound, sign language and open captions.

Chris Talkington of King Videocable said the public service programs will continue on his cable service for several months or longer, depending on public response.

He estimated that 10 percent of the 14,000 homes served by his company have someone who is hearing impaired and would benefit from the Silent Network.

It is also broadcast to satellite dish viewers on Satcom 4, Transponder 16.

The network programming includes "Hear Dog," a training series for pets; "Say It with Sign," a sign language teaching program; "Festival," a program for children of all ages; and "Off-Hand," a talk show with Herb Larson, also known as "the deaf Johnny Carson."

Mark Fugitt, a member of the Flying Hands Club at the College of Southern Idaho, was instrumental in bringing Silent Network to the Magic Valley.

"I am a student at CSI intent on learning sign language," said Fugitt, who is not hearing impaired. "The program (Silent Network) is second only to individualized classroom instruction offered by the college."

The Silent Network, said Fugitt,

began in 1979 and has produced more than 500 programs intended for deaf and hearing impaired viewers.

"It is the only programming service in the world offering programs that close the gap between the deaf and the hearing," he said.

Keith Tolzin, superintendent of the Idaho State School for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding, said he is glad Silent Network is being broadcast in this area.

"More than 100 students at his school, plus several hundred other hearing impaired people throughout the Magic Valley, will benefit from it, he said.

The new program, he added, gives the general public, especially family and friends of the hearing impaired, a good opportunity to learn sign language.
