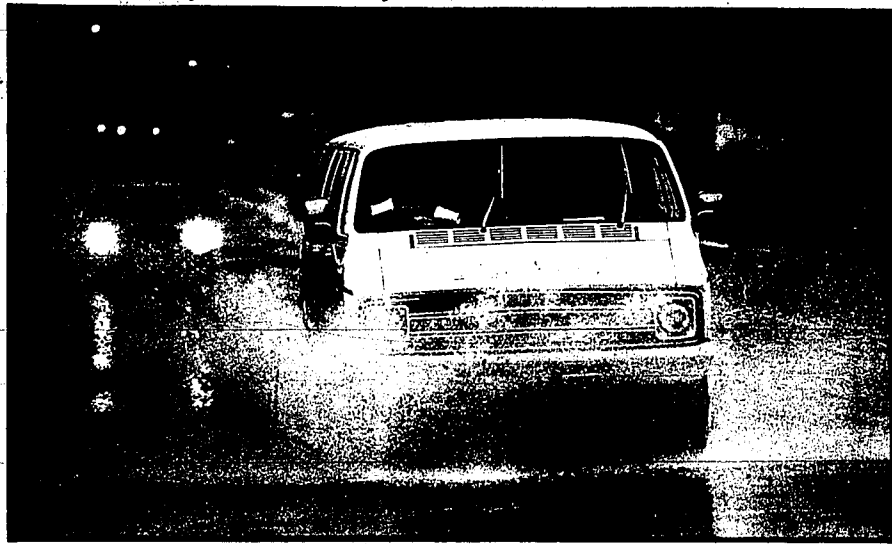

Wind-whipped snow, avalanches close roads

TWIN FALLS — Snow on the high roads and rain on the low roads resulted in some closures Monday in the Magic Valley.

Boise transportation officials, Highway district workers, using a rotary snowblower, freed the stranded motorists by Saturday afternoon.

The state Department of Transportation closed about 10 miles of Highway 75 over Galena Summit Monday morning because of blowing snow and avalanches that covered the roads, said Jack Morris, assistant maintenance engineer in Shoshone.

The Ketchum Ranger District, of the Sawtooth National Forest, disclosed backcountry trips Monday because the avalanche hazard was high.

About 4 feet of snow had fallen since Friday in the Galena Summit area, Morris added. The new, wet snow top of old snow caused slides up to 10-foot deep on the highway above Galena Lodge, located about 20 miles north of Ketchum. Blinding snow also prohibited road cleanup, he added.

In the valleys, meanwhile, steady rain caused washed-out roads and worries among highway crews.

When the road reopens "just depends on the weather that's added."

A swollen Clover Creek did put "a foot of water in the yard of Archie Walker, whose property is about 1 mile east of the reservoir, northwest of Bliss. There appeared to be little property damage at least as of Monday afternoon, said Walker, a founder of the Walker substance abuse treatment center in Gooding.

Engineers look over photos, wreckage

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Engineers examined photos and debris retrieved from the ocean floor Monday to determine if a submarine has located parts of the right-hand booster rocket implicated in the explosion of space shuttle Challenger.

Challenger's fuel tank, holding nearly 500,000 gallons of liquid hydrogen and liquid oxygen, exploded at 73 seconds, eight miles high. All seven crew members were killed.

Officials said the photographs and videotapes were brought back to the Kennedy Space Center for initial study and then were flown to the Marshall Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala., which oversees NASA's shuttle engine work. The photos are being compared with pictures of the rocket taken before the Jan. 28 launching. The Shuttle-Crew was taking additional photos Monday.

Proposed 3-year override may be dead

BOISE — A proposal to allow school district patrons to opt for 3-year override levies may be dead for the fifth year in a row Monday.

Opposed by Republicans, who said it would be unconstitutional, and by a Democrat who said it would lock taxes into districts where economies could boom or bust, the measure was neither approved nor rejected by the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee.

Sen. Gail Bray, a Boise Democrat who supported the bill, said after the meeting that opponents of the bill were afraid of giving local control to the voters.

Senate Bill 1270 would allow school district patrons to pass override levies for 2 and 3 years.

Currently, those levies may only cover 1 year. Similar proposals have died in the House and Senate every year since 1982.

Having failed to draw enough

votes to kill or approve it, the bill has been laid in legislative purgatory.

If the Democrats and Senate Education Committee members on the committee who support it can pull together a majority, they can force the bill back onto the agenda for further discussion.

Under existing law, a simple majority is needed for 1-year overrides and the bill as written would have required simple majority approval for multi-year tax levies.

What may have saved the bill from its final resting place is that a motion by Sen. Rachel Gilbert, R-Boise, to hold the bill in committee, or kill it, failed as well.

Magie Valley committee members

members of the Senate Education Committee, where the bill originated, tried a number of ways to keep the bill alive and may have succeeded.

A motion by Sen. Ron Bettelespacher, D-Grangeville, to send the measure out of the Senate, Local Government and Taxation Committee to the Senate floor failed.

So did a subsequent motion by Sen. Lynn Tominga, R-Paul, to amend the bill to require two-thirds of school district patrons to approve override levies raising taxes for more than a year.

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Magie Valley committee members

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, and Tominga, split their votes on the measure.

Anderson said the measure is "political dynamite" because voters will see it as a property tax increase, and he says voters are dead set against any property tax increase.

Tominga said after Monday's 2½-hour committee hearing that he will press for amendments to the bill to make it more acceptable to those, like Anderson, who said it was unconstitutional for a simple majority to approve a multi-year tax levy.

Sen. Vern Lannen, D-Pinehurst, the lone Democrat opposing the bill, said that it would be possible for a 3-year override to be approved during economic good times, only to burden voters a year later when the economy slumped.

Anderson said there was no working in the bill to allow voters to repeal a multi-year override if the economy changed for the worst.

The legislation's statement of intent says the bill was designed to provide an efficient way to settle the water adjudication and to assure that state laws and procedures provide a fair and impartial forum for the adjudication of all water rights.

Teacher certification fees may hit \$35

BOISE — The fees teachers pay every five years to keep their teaching certificates will increase from \$30 to \$35 dollars if the Legislature adopts a bill headed for the Senate floor.

The Senate Education Committee Monday gave its stamp of approval to a plan brought by the Department of Education that will bring in an additional \$75,000 annually.

The committee also approved and sent to the floor the second draft of a bill that will allow school district patrons to oust school board members.

In addition to raising regular re-certification fees, the certification fee bill would create a new \$15 fee for teachers who earn a new degree or

higher-level certificate before their five-year certificate runs out.

Deputy Superintendent of Public Instruction Gus Hein told the committee that the extra money is needed to pay the four Department of Education employees who make the certification reviews.

The fee money also pays for the work of the Professional Standards Commission, which reviews teacher performance in disputed cases.

Hein said the certification staff processes about 5,000 applications per year and also reviews teacher assignments to see if teachers are teaching their certified areas of expertise.

He said the average certificate review takes 10 minutes to ascertain that a teacher has earned six additional credits since the last certification.

If a teacher is from out of state or is applying

for a higher-level endorsement, the review takes longer, he said.

Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, will introduce the bill on the Senate floor.

At the same meeting the committee unanimously, and without discussion, supported the final revised version of the department's bill to set up a system for ousting school board members.

The bill requires school patrons to take a number of steps before a recall election can be called.

Hein said the department wanted to design a bill that would prevent school trustees from being recalled for unpopular decisions on a single issue.

Sen. Bruce Sweeney, D-Lewiston, will introduce the bill on the Senate floor.

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Iacocca has right to express his anger

Lee Iacocca, chairman of the Chrysler Corp., has never been one to hide his light under a bushel or take kindly to criticism.

This past week, after four years of work on the Statue of Liberty-Ellis Island restoration project, Iacocca was dismissed from his post as chairman of a citizen's commission advising the Secretary of the Interior on this work. He doesn't like the rebuff one bit, and his response has been heated enough to light Lady Liberty's torch all the way from Detroit.

Like most Americans whose ancestors entered the United States through Ellis Island, Iacocca has a special feeling for the national monument and gladly accepted an appointment in May 1982, to head the restoration commission. When it became clear that this advisory commission was prohibited by law from raising funds from the public for the project, a separate foundation was set up for that purpose. At the request of William Clark, who was then secretary of the Interior, Iacocca also took on the chairmanship of the foundation.

Now — and the timing of this decision is unclear — the present secretary, Donald Hodel, has decided that there is a conflict of interest in Iacocca's holding both posts, and without asking the chairman to choose between the two, has fired him from the more prestigious position.

What is this conflict, anyway? What's so improper about giving the man who has raised \$233 million for the project some say in how that money is spent? Secretary Hodel says that the potential conflict was brought to his attention when two other people who served on both bodies were told by the commission's counsel that such a conflict exists, but Iacocca says he disagrees with this view. The commission charter, in fact, specifically requires at least one cross membership, and Iacocca clearly wants to fill that role.

There are undoubtedly plenty of reasons why people in Washington want Iacocca out of the limelight, but "conflict of interest" is not high on that list.

He's irascible and has been known to rub people the wrong way. He strongly disagrees with a proposal to allow commercial development on Ellis Island, and has run into opposition in the Interior Department on that matter. And it is rumored that he harbors political ambitions that would not be popular with potential opponents.

In spite of all this, though, the Reagan administration chose him for both the commission and the foundation jobs and kept him in these positions for years. To kick him out now, just as his work is coming to fruition, is shabby treatment. Iacocca has a right to be angry on both counts.

Aid money can help let Filipinos know where U.S. stands

Let's say that you are a member of Congress. Let's say further that you wish to influence, through your voice and vote, the conduct of American foreign policy in a "responsible and constructive" way. Let's also specify, for the sake of argument, that you believe that the Philippines are extremely important to American strategic and political interests in the Pacific, but you have also come to the conclusion that Ferdinand Marcos has just won the election there through wholesale robbery.

What do you do next? This is the dilemma that responsible members of Congress are likely to face in the next few weeks as they are asked to vote on military and economic aid appropriations amid an atmosphere of rising tension in the Philippines. But in the world of Congress, decisions of this sort are not made in a vacuum. What the Congress does depends in part on what the administration pushes and how hard it pushes. And in the final analysis the outcome of the drama now unfolding in the Philippines will be decided in Manila, not Washington.

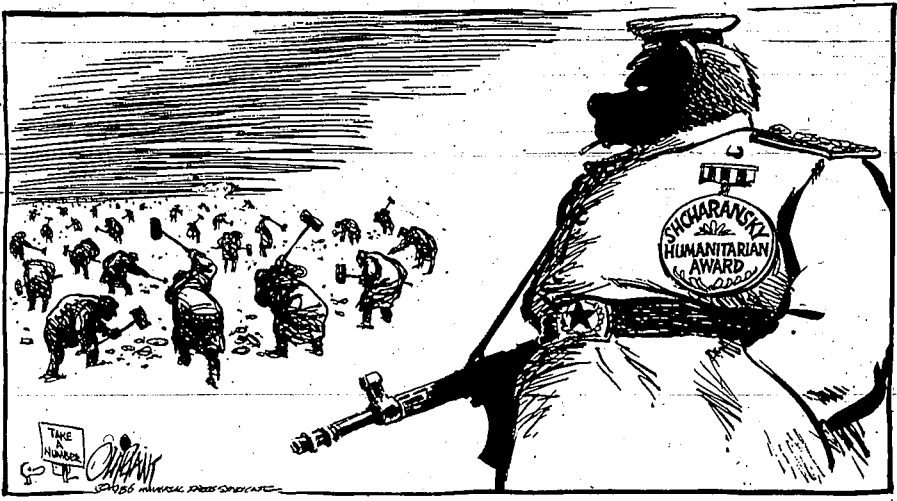
Of course, if you give in to easy symbolism, it is not difficult to decide how to vote. An ideological conservative can say

Richard C. Holbrooke that Marcos "may be a S.O.B., but he's our S.O.B.," and vote for the whole aid package that the administration is obligated to seek under the revision of the military base agreement with the Philippines. This amount, \$224.5 million in economic and military aid, is what the U.S. government committed itself to request "on a best-faith effort" from Congress in exchange for continued use of our bases in the Philippines. Or, if you are more liberal, you may be tempted to vote against all or most of the aid appropriation to demonstrate to the people of the Philippines that Congress is not supporting Marcos, even if the administration still is.

I have heard both these positions argued vehemently in recent days. No doubt, each approach offers some satisfaction. People are driven more by ideology or self-indulgence than by concern with the practical consequences of their acts. But legislative acts have real as well as symbolic consequences. Legislators must try to gauge the effect of their vote not only on constituents back home, but in this case the effect in the Philippines, too. Here the dilemma is acute.

With a wrecked economy and a growing communist guerrilla threat, the Philippines has become the sick man of East Asia, a marked contrast to its non-communist neighbors. As long as Marcos remains in power, the chances of the economy recovering and the tide being turned against the communists are slim. Not that his departure solves these problems: When Marcos finally does leave, which given his failing health and other pressures seems likely to happen in the not-too-distant future, his successors will face a formidable set of problems. So how should you vote? Cut the aid substantially and perhaps contribute to more chaos? Or vote for the aid and perhaps prolong an increasingly ineffective and corrupt government's days in power? In this case as in many similar legislative dilemmas, a compromise may be the best way to proceed. My suggestion is to authorize the full amount requested, but with two important provisos: None of it should go to the Ministry of Human Settlements, which was created by, and solely for, the agrarianization of Imelda Marcos and is a personal political machine. Much of the American economic support money in recent years has been channeled through her ministry. Even if some of it has gone for socially useful projects such as

rural schools, the fact remains that she uses the money to enhance her personal political position. ...the outcome of the drama ... will be decided in Manila, not Washington. If Congress wants to make some cuts in the aid request, it should set aside in a special escrow account in whatever amount is trimmed, to be released to the Philippine government whenever it is reconstituted in the majority of the Philippine people. The certification for the release of these funds could be done upon the recommendation of the president and the concurrent majority vote of both houses of Congress. These suggestions carry some risks. But Marcos has not shown an ability for using our aid to turn around either the economy or the insurgency; therefore it should be withheld until it can be used effectively — and as a way of telling the Philippine people know where America stands. Freeze on Philippine-aid urged

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Carl Levin, D-Mich., urged the White House Monday to freeze all economic and military aid to the Philippines until Ferdinand Marcos steps down as president. Levin, who returned Sunday with two other Senate Democrats from a fact-finding tour of the Philippines, denounced Marcos as "a dictator who has tried to murder democracy in the Philippines."

He predicted the Philippine leader will be out of office in "a matter of months" and said the United States should not allow Marcos to enter this country "if we can help it."

Steelworkers hit can makers

BAL HARBOUR, Fla. (AP)— United Steelworkers set up picket lines Monday against the nation's four largest can makers after rejecting offers of \$400 year-end bonuses in places of wage hikes.

The strike by about 13,300 workers at about 75 plants across the country began minutes after USW local presidents voted here 57-38 to turn down an industry pattern-setting contract offer by National Can Corp., the third largest of the four companies with about 2,200 Steelworkers on its payroll.

The three other companies struck by the union are Continental Inc., with 6,000 Steelworkers on its payroll; American Can Co., with 4,500 union members, and Crown Cork & Seal Co., with 600 USW members.

O'Neill: Defense must be cut

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. said Monday that President Reagan must realize that administration plans for a continued military buildup will be scuttled unless there is a tax increase.

"By next summer, the president will be facing the prospect of the end of his defense buildup or the end of his stand against increased revenues," O'Neill, D-Mass., told the AFL-CIO executive council meeting in Bal Harbour, Fla. A text of O'Neill's remarks was made available by the speaker's office here.

Eastland hospitalized for illness

GREENWOOD, Miss. (AP) — Former Sen. James O. Eastland, the segregationist who served 37 years in office and also was president pro tempore of the Senate, has been hospitalized in critical condition.

Eastland, 81, was taken to the intensive care unit of Greenwood-Lefflore County Hospital on Sunday, suffering from "multiple medical problems," said Liz Hare, a hospital spokeswoman. She refused to elaborate.

"He has several health problems that they are treating," said his wife, Elizabeth. "He has improved, he is resting comfortably."

At his retirement, Eastland was senior U.S. senator with 36 continuous years of service and was Mississippi's longest serving member of that body.

Study: Act to force big domestic cuts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's budget-balancing law will require cuts of 25 percent to 50 percent in most domestic federal programs, with even larger cuts possible in certain law enforcement areas, according to a private analysis released Monday.

The study by Management Information Services Inc. and the Center for Defense Information said the impact of the Gramm-Rudman Act would be far more severe than previously believed.

The report, billed as the first full-scale study of the long-range impacts of the law, said deep cuts will occur even if Congress raises taxes and slashes defense spending. "There is little to avoid this if the act remains unchanged," it said.

Management Information Services Inc. is a consulting firm that makes private economic analyses for a wide range of private and governmental clients. The Center for Defense Information is a private nonprofit organization that studies a variety of military issues. Both are based in Washington, D.C.

Greeting stamps stalled

WASHINGTON (AP) — It will be another year before you can say "Happy Birthday" with a postage stamp.

For that matter, you'll have to wait until 1987 to say with a stamp: "Get Well," "Congratulations," "Best Wishes," "Thank You," "Love You, Mom," and "Love You, Dad."

The U.S. Postal Service decided to delay issuing the greeting stamps, meaning that the post office will be able to put off until next year several hundred thousand dollars in printing expenses.

Designs of message stamps will be announced at this year's greeting card trade association show, and the stamps will be issued in May 1987 at the stationery store trade show.

Postal Service officials say they hope gift shops will stock the booklet-of-seven-different-stamps and sell them at face value.

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House doormen see red over green blazer plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — The doormen who stand watch outside the House chamber are seeing red over House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr.'s request that they wear green.

House officials say the green blazers, each costing \$70, are a matter of security for the House and decorum for the doormen, who guide visitors into the House gallery. But like other federal employees, the doormen haven't had a pay raise in a year, and some are grouching about O'Neill's request.

"The speaker did it because the public must be under the control of people who have obvious

authority," O'Neill's spokesman, Chris Matthews, said of the green blazer proposal. "There is no way for the public to know who's in charge outside the chamber."

Asked whether the uniforms for doormen were necessary in view of the normal stalling of uniformed Capitol Hill police officers outside the chamber, and the fact that doormen currently wear plastic security badges, Matthews replied, "He (O'Neill) feels this is necessary."

Asked whether he or O'Neill knew the doormen would have to pay part of the cost of their uniforms, Matthews replied, "I don't think so. I

don't know."

House Doorkeeper Jim Molloy has asked the House Administration Committee to approve \$3,500 to pay for the uniforms.

"For years we thought we should improve the image around here," said Molloy, who told the committee in a letter that the "improvement would help all members and officers of the House and visitors to identify doormen and also enhance the decorum of the House."

But the request also comes at a time when Molloy may have to pare his payroll by about \$500,000.

Tremors shake California

BRAWLEY, Calif. (AP) — A dozen small earthquakes shook the border town of Brawley early Monday, causing no injuries or damage, police said.

The largest tremor registered 3.4 on the Richter scale, said Dennis Meredith — at the seismological lab of the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

It struck at 3:58 a.m. MST and its epicenter was 2 miles southwest of Brawley, near the California-Mexico border.

"We felt the one quake, but it was very small," said Brawley police Officer Becca Grijalva. She said no injuries or damage were reported.

Meredith said most of the earthquakes were too small to be measured. That number of quakes in quick succession — scientists call such an event an earthquake swarm.

Possible rare Lincoln photo found in Coast Guard library

NEW LONDON, Conn. (AP) — An 1864 photograph showing Abraham Lincoln on a boat has been discovered in library files at the U.S. Coast Guard Academy.

An official said it may indicate the president was preparing to flee from Confederate troops.

The photo is believed to have been taken July 11, 1864, on the Potomac River in Washington, academy museum curator Paul Johnson said.

He said it indicates that Lincoln may have been preparing to flee from advancing troops commanded by Confederate Gen. Jubal Early.

"On 11 July 1864, the Confederates almost punched into Washington,

and I believe he was on the cutter as a possible getaway," Johnson said.

The photo shows a tall, thin man wearing a stovepipe hat, but the facial features are indistinct. Seated in the background of the photo are Secretary of State William H. Seward and Capt. John W. White, commanding officer of the cutter Wyanda.

Lloyd Ostendorf of Dayton, Ohio, co-author of "Lincoln in Photographs," said he has examined the picture and believes Lincoln must have moved during the longer exposure time needed for photography of that period, causing his image to blur.

Based on considerable evidence placing Lincoln at the scene the day the picture was taken, Ostendorf told The Day of New London that he is certain of the picture's authenticity.

"I feel confident it is Lincoln," Ostendorf said. "It's extremely exciting."

Ostendorf said there are only 26 other-known-outdoor-photographs of Lincoln. Ostendorf said the Coast Guard picture is the only one in which the president appears on a boat.

"I've determined as near as I can see that Lincoln looked at the photographer and then looked back at Seward and the captain," Ostendorf said.

He said he examined the picture under strong magnification and could detect recognizable features.

Ostendorf, who is writing a new book about Lincoln, said it is not generally known that Lincoln was a boatsman.

"He built his own little scow as a young man," he said.

Johnson said the photograph was discovered by accident.

"It's been in the files since 1922, and we went through them recently because of a woman who is writing a book on the Coast Guard and the Civil War," requested materials, he said. "It just amazed me. To have the Coast Guard tied in with this is really exciting."

Johnson did most of the research that placed Lincoln at the scene.

"I would call it a major historical discovery, especially since it is of our greatest American presidents," said Frank J. Williams of Richmond, R.I., who is president of the Lincoln Group of Boston and the Abraham Lincoln Association.

Reached by telephone in Lincoln's hometown of Springfield, Ill., Williams said, "Clearly there is no other published picture like it known."

"If Lloyd Ostendorf says that the man in the photo is Lincoln, then it's Lincoln," he said.

Texas poodle wins honors for heroism

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A poodle has been inducted into the Texas Pet Hall of Fame as reward for saving a boy's life by jumping in front of a rattlesnake that was poised to strike.

Sean Callahan, 11, of Hunt, was playing with his brother, Erin, and their poodle Leo alongside the Guadalupe River in August, 1984, said John Wood, president of the Texas Veterinary Medical Association.

Wood and William Hoegeneyer, Leo's veterinarian, presented a plaque over the weekend to the dog's owners, Bud and Lane Callahan of Hunt, during the annual TVMA convention.

The boys "were throwing a stick toward the river" and letting Leo retrieve it. Sean was bent over picking up the stick, and I heard him scream," Bud Callahan said.

"There was a rattlesnake sitting there and it was coiled up ready to strike. Leo heard Sean scream and he jumped in between the snake and Sean just as the snake struck," Callahan added.

The six-foot diamondback struck Leo six times in the head, he said.

"Leo jumped in between the two of them, and he stayed there and bit the snake strike him over and over until Sean was able to get out of the way," Callahan said.

Leo recovered and regained the sight of his critically injured left eye.

Baker recognized him as a former presidential chief of staff who was once surrounded constantly by aides, protected by security officers and always in demand by reporters.

"If you built a life pursuing the acquisition of power," he told the congregation, "all of what you have will tumble around you."

Bonner allowed to stay in U.S. for treatment

MOSCOW (AP) — A Soviet journalist said Monday that Yelena Bonner, wife of dissident Andrei Sakharov, will be allowed to stay in the United States for medical treatment beyond the three months originally granted to her.

Victor Louis, who has served as an unofficial conduit for stories the Kremlin wants published in the West, said Mrs. Bonner would be

able to return to the Soviet Union as long as she has a Soviet passport and a medical certificate saying a longer stay was necessary.

Mrs. Bonner left the Soviet Union on Dec. 2 for eye treatment in Italy and heart treatment in the United States. The 63-year-old physician underwent a heart-bypass operation in January at Massachusetts General Hospital and has been recuperating at the Newton, Mass., home of her daughter.


Her visa was good through Feb. 28, but she said Soviet officials told her when she left that she could have an extension if necessary to recover from surgery.

"To the best of my knowledge, she has been granted this extension," Louis said, adding that such extensions are largely formalities. He did

not specify the length of the extension, but visa extensions generally are for three months.

Mrs. Bonner's son-in-law, Efreim Yankelevich, said earlier this month that the Soviet consulate had told her there was a problem with the extension. He said she was "extremely distressed" because she had medical appointments in March and might need eye surgery.

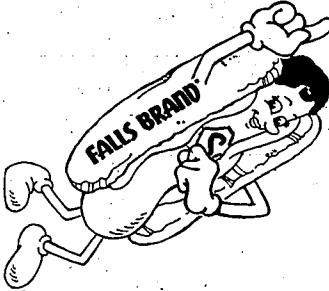

Israelis respond to capture of soldiers

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Israel sent helicopter gunships, tanks and 600 troops on a sweep through south Lebanon villages Monday in a swift response to the capture of two Israeli soldiers by Moslem guerrillas, U.N. sources said.

Timur Goksel, spokesman for the U.N. peacekeeping force in the area, said Israeli gunships strafed suspected guerrilla hideouts in the rugged hill country. He said Israeli soldiers ferried by helicopter storm-

ed at least 15 Shiite Moslem villages searching for the two men, who were captured in Israel's "security zone" a few miles inside Lebanon.

Lebanese security sources said the soldiers were seized at about 1 p.m. Monday. The Israeli assault began about an hour later.

After dark, the sources said, gunships dropped flares to light landing zones, and the Israeli pushed as far as Qaaqaayel, nearly 12 miles north of the buffer zone.

Israel forces spent two hours searching the Qaaqaayel area and then began withdrawing from two assembly points on the outskirts of Haris and Sroubine, about four miles north of the security zone, the Lebanese sources said.

Helicopter gunships were seen airlifting soldiers back to Israel at about 8 p.m., nearly six hours after the drive began, they said.

Goksel said the Israelis had "at least two companies of mechanized

troops pushing on several fronts and landing helicopter-borne troops in several villages."

There was speculation that the guerrilla ambush in which the soldiers were captured was in retaliation for the Israeli interception Feb. 4 of a Libyan aircraft carrying Syrian officials from Tripoli to Damascus.

Israel said at the time it was looking for Palestinian guerrilla leaders. The plane and its passengers were released when no Palestinians were found on board. Both Syria and Palestinian groups vowed revenge for the seizure.

Beirut state radio said the fighting centered around the villages of Deir Nitar and al-Sultanayeh, about seven miles north of the frontier, and Haris and Kafra, three miles farther north.

Army team to dig in Laos

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — A U.S. Army team arrived in southern Laos on Monday to join Laotians in digging for the remains of a helicopter gunship and the 14 American airmen who went down with it in 1972, a U.S. military spokesman said.

The project in the jungle foothills of Savannakhet Province will be the second joint excavation permitted by the communist government.

U.S. officials are "very pleased, very enthused" by the joint operation, said a U.S. Embassy officer with long experience in trying to resolve the fates of Americans missing in action since

the Southeast Asian war ended in 1975.

The 11 U.S. Army experts on the team, most of whom are from the Joint Casualty Resolution Center in Honolulu, flew from Bangkok to Savannakhet in two C-130 transport aircraft, said Lt. Col. Terry McCann, a spokesman for the U.S. Pacific Command.

Trucks and helicopters provided by Laos were waiting at the airport to take the Americans and their equipment to the crash site about 85 miles east of Savannakhet City. The Americans carried generators, water pumps, fuel, digging and other equipment, and tents for shelter, McCann said.

Six die in Brazilian office fire

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A fire engulfed a 13-story office building in Rio de Janeiro's busy downtown Monday, killing six people, three of whom leaped from a 10th-floor ledge to escape the flames, authorities said.

The other three were burned to death or asphyliated inside the building, according to state police Capt. Lenine Freitas. About 40 people were rushed by ambulance and private cars to Souza — Aguiar Hospital for treatment of burns and injuries, the police said.

Hundreds escaped safely down the stairways and no one was missing, said fire department Maj. Nei Santos.

Film on TV Globo, the nation's biggest commercial network, showed a man and a woman standing at a 10th floor window with smoke billowing out and then jumping, while people in the street screamed.

"They jumped before we arrived," Santos told The Associated Press.

He said firefighters dug a hole in an inside wall on the 11th floor of the concrete and marble-facade building, and rescued 26 people from the flames.

Downward streets were blocked off and firefighters used ladders to reach people stranded in the building, located on busy Almirante Barroso Avenue in the heart of Rio's downtown business district.

Helicopters circled above trying to rescue people who had fled to the building's roof, according to radio and television stations reporting from the scene.

"I was one of the last ones out," said Paulo Saraiva, a Brazilian lawyer who had an office on the fourth floor. "A lot of people got away safely, because the staircase is very wide."

About 200 policemen and 150 firemen took part in the operation.

The fire department said the fire broke out on the ninth floor just after noon, and Santos said the cause of the fire had not been determined.

Black rioting worsens

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Day-long riots raged Monday in a black township that forms a pocket of squalor amidst comfortable white suburbs north of Johannesburg.

Residents said five people were killed, including a black policeman.

Witnesses said the rioting was the worst in the three days of bloodshed in Alexandra township that started Saturday after funerals for two anti-apartheid activists. Some whites watched it from their green lawns on surrounding hills.

Confirmation of the deaths Monday would bring the death toll for the three days to eight.

Police said three people were killed

in Alexandra over the weekend, but did not have complete casualty figures for Monday. They confirmed that a mob burned the black policeman's home, shot him dead and set his body ablaze.

Policemen and town councillors who were seen as collaborators with the white government often have been killed by other blacks and their bodies burned during 17 months of riots against apartheid, the race policy that preserves privilege for South Africa's 5 million whites and denies rights to the 24 million blacks.

More than 1,100 people have been killed since the violence began, nearly all of them black.

Hanoi: China fired shells

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Vietnam's official radio charged Monday that Chinese troops heavily shelled six northern Vietnamese provinces in January and February, killing or wounding 20 people.

The Voice of Vietnam, monitored in Bangkok, claimed that 19,000 artillery and mortar rounds were fired into Quang Ninh, Cao Bang, Lang Son, Hoang Lien Son, Lai Chau and Ha Tuyen provinces from Jan. 11 to Feb. 9.

"It was a serious act," the broadcast said.

Vietnam and China regularly accuse each other of border attacks. The reports cannot be independently verified, but observers believe many are exaggerated.

China staged a brief but bloody incursion into Vietnam in 1979, after Hanoi invaded Peking's ally Cambodia. The Chinese troops withdrew but Peking has warned that it may give its southern neighbor a "second lesson."

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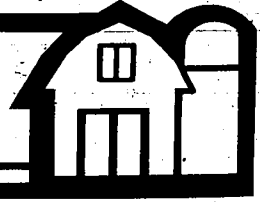

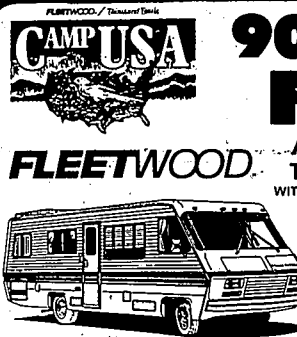

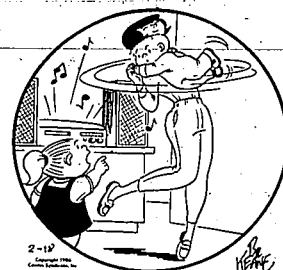
