Marcos aid cutoff clears first House hurdle

WASHINGTON — A House panel voted unanimously Thursday to halt direct U.S. aid to the government of President Ferdinand Marcos of the Philippines and to channel future humanitarian assistance and economic aid through the Roman Catholic church and other private groups.

In voting 9-0 in favor of the legislation, members of the subcommittee on Asian and Pacific Affairs brushed aside objections from Reagan administration officials who wanted the panel to wait until presidential emissary Philip Habib returns from Manila to report on his findings.

Stressing their bipartisan support, four Republicans joined five Democrats in favor of the bill.

Solarz said he hopes the legislation "sends a signal to the ruling elite and establishment of the Philippines that the United States has withdrawn its support from a government which had lost its legitimacy and which no longer enjoys the confidence of its own people."

Solarz said he had been assured by an intermediary earlier in the day that the legislation has the support of presidential opposition candidate Corazon Aquino, who has charged that fraud by Marcos and his supporters deprived her of victory in the Feb. 7 election.

Cleanup starts in West

Rain, snow taper off across region

Water surged over a crumbling levee in northern California and flooded hundreds of homes Thursday as Westeners began the arduous task of cleaning up from nine days of deadly, wild storms.

With the rain easing, state police set up convoys to escort motorists from Nevada to California along a highway closed by rockslides.

And officials began tallying the damage wrought by mud, avalanches, floods and wind that roared through scores of communities, killed 17 people in five states and Canada and forced more than 12,000 people to flee their homes.

In Napa County alone, officials reported more than 550 homes in damage, including 250 homes destroyed and 2,500 damaged.

"These figures will probably go up," said Bob Sorenson, deputy county administrator, adding that 20 percent of the famous wine region's vineyards were damaged by debris and by water that washed away grapevines.

To the north, Butte County reported damage of \$13 million.

Thousands of people were without electricity or gas for heat on Thursday, but meteorologists said the worst was over.

"The light at the end of the tunnel is glowing rather brightly today," said Bill Alder at the weather bureau in Salt Lake City.

"One more shot this afternoon and evening, maybe a quarter to half an inch out of it, then a super-gorgeous weekend."

'Engineering assessment' held warning

WASHINGTON — The Morton Thiokol official who approved the launch of space shuttle Challenger couched his recommendation in an "engineering assessment" that listed an array of possible booster seal problems caused by cold launch pad temperatures.

Despite the caveats, Joe C. Kilminster predicted the launch of Challenger "will not be significantly different" from that of Discovery on Jan. 24, 1985, which lifted off a day late because of freezing weather.

NASA made the document public as veteran shuttle pilot Richard H. Truly took over as boss of the embattled shuttle program, saying "We've overcome very difficult times before," and promising that the cause of the Challenger tragedy will be found and fixed.

On Capitol Hill, Sen. Ernest Hollings said acting NASA administrator William Graham had misled questioners and should quit.

Hollings and other senators tried but failed to interview the Morton Thiokol engineer who said he protested the launch decision but was overruled.

Morton Thiokol's launch approval, headed "MTI Assessment of Temperature Concern," was telefaxed to launch headquarters at the Kennedy Space Center and to the Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama at 11:45 p.m. EST the night before the Challenger launch.

Morton Thiokol makes the booster rockets that propel shuttles into orbit. The Challenger's right hand booster and the possible leakage of one of its "O ring" seals are the key suspects in the tragedy that destroyed the shuttle and killed its crew.

Kilminster listed problems that could result from the cold, they added: "MTI recommends STS-51L launch proceed on 28 January 1986." The document, released by NASA Thursday, does not

reflect the arguments among Morton Thiokol's engineers over the launch approval.

He said "calculations" show that the Challenger's O rings will be 20 degrees colder than those of the Discovery flight and they would not be as resilient. But he said that temperature data were "not conclusive" that the rings would allow gasses to escape.

"More gas may pass primary O ring before the primary seal seats," in comparison with the 1985 flight, Kilminster said. The rings on that earlier flight showed some erosion and Kilminster said the rings could take three times that much damage without problems.

"If the primary seal does not seat, the secondary seal will seat," he said. Since the tragedy, however, experts have said they feared the secondary rings — the last line of defense — would become ineffective because the booster

Reagan follows hard line

ST. GEORGE'S, Grenada — Under a blazing Caribbean sun, President Reagan on Thursday retraced the steps of American invasion forces that ousted a radical Marxist government from this tiny island 27 months ago and vowed the United States also "must help these struggling for freedom in Nicaragua."

Reagan flew here to honor the 19 servicemen killed in three days of fighting that forced Cuban troops from Grenada and led to formation of a democratically elected government.

He laid a green wreath with a purple ribbon at the foot of a memorial to the 19, then stepped back and stood silent for a moment.

In a speech later to a cheering, flag-waving crowd, Reagan likened events in Nicaragua to those that prompted him to order the invasion of Grenada and declared he won't be satisfied "until all the people of the Americas have joined us in the warm sunshine of liberty and justice."

He was introduced as "our own national hero, our own rescuer" by Prime Minister Herbert Blaize, who declared a national holiday in honor of the visit. Blaize said Reagan had sent forces here at the urging of Caribbean leaders to "dig Grenada out of the stinking Communist hole."

The audience estimated at more than 20,000 roared approval when Reagan immediately after the speech, spoke on a stage emblazoned with a large green and yellow sign saying "Grenada Welcomes President Reagan." Small girls, dressed in red, white and blue costumes danced with floral wreaths above their heads to welcome him to the outdoor cricket park.

Reagan flew to Andrews Air Force Base outside Washington and returned by helicopter to the White House, arriving at about 7:30 p.m. MST.

While making no overt threats against Nicaragua, Reagan's statements — particularly coming on the site of the last open use of U.S. military forces — could hardly be construed as comforting to the leftist government 1,500 miles to the west.

Administration officials have said repeatedly they have no plans to invade Nicaragua.

After 5th try, House sends increase in sales tax to Senate

BOISE — On its fifth try, the Idaho House finally mustered enough votes Thursday afternoon to pass legislation permanently increasing Idaho's sales tax by 1 cent.

If the Senate goes along, effective March 1, the Idaho sales tax rate would be 5 percent.

Democrats, who had held the balance of the tax increase, arguing again that it was of power in the House on the issue by siding not enough to properly fund state government. The Democrats, who stalled career, finally lost out after a 90-minute Thursday morning in the Revenue and Taxation Committee on bringing up their own tax proposals, by Thursday afternoon were asking the Republicans to delay the vote.

Republicans, as the tax passed. Earlier votes on the issue, which started Feb. 4, indicated a steady erosion of opposition. The first vote went against sales tax, 60-24. Succeeding votes were 51-32, 49-35 and 46-38 on Wednesday.

After a meeting with Democrats, and then a closed-door party caucus Thursday morning, Republican leaders in the House said they felt they had enough votes to pass the sales tax increase, even if Democrats refused to go along.

The Revenue and Taxation Committee was summoned to a hurry-up meeting, and quickly approved legislation prepared by Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul.

He's drafted most of the sales tax bills which have been rejected in the House, and said Thursday the latest one, House Bill 674, differs little from the others.

It permanently raises the state sales tax to 5 percent. Of the new revenue, \$12.2 million goes into a budget reserve account, to be used only if future budgets get out of balance.

It also puts an extra \$5 million into the Permanent Building Fund, the account that funds state construction.

Neibaur said he was advised by the State Tax Commission that if action on the sales tax increase is finished by Monday afternoon, it can go into effect by March 1, which is a week from Saturday.

Democrats, meanwhile, said they want at least \$10 million to \$20 million more than the Republicans appear ready to support.

The Revenue and Taxation panel continued to pump out tax bills, including one sponsored by Rep. John Sessions, D-Driggs.

In essence, it would set the state budget at a certain level, and serve notice to lawmakers that if they want to spend more than that, they would have to pass a tax increase to pay for it.

Retaining Senate control is a GOP priority, Bush declares

BOISE (AP) — One of the Republican Party's top priorities this year must be retaining control of the U.S. Senate, Vice President George Bush said here Thursday night.

That means re-electing Republican senators such as Steve Symms, Bush told about 900 party faithful attending the annual Boise Lincoln Day gathering here.

"I have absolute confidence that what will be re-elected," Bush said of Symms, who faces a challenge from Democratic Gov. John Evans.

After the five announced candidates for the GOP nomination in Idaho's 2nd District were introduced, Bush called it a "we the people" primary, and said he hopes the party will get together in the fall and win a seat now held by Democrat Richard Stallings.

The vice president, noting the party's smashing victory in the 1984 election, said historically the party in power suffers a decline in the first off-year election.

"This year, I have a very confident feeling that we will be stronger," Bush said.

Bush hammered away at familiar themes: controlling the Democrats and cutting spending, and revitalizing the private economy to create new jobs.

He also said Republicans have a good opportunity this election to win a number of governor posts now held by Democrats, because so many Democrats are up for re-election.

Bush said Republicans are proud to be for voluntary silent prayer in the schools. And he said this country needs a "strong intelligence community" to keep up in world affairs.

Bush and his wife, on a campaign swing that started Tuesday, arrived in Boise Thursday afternoon and commented before he, Gov. David Leroy and other state and local officials.

The vice president waved briefly at a small crowd gathered at the Boise Airport, but made no public comment before he and the other officials sped off in a motorcade.

The annual GOP gathering in

Boise dates back to 1912, and is billed as the "oldest" continuous Republican Lincoln Day gathering.

Sponsors said they expected about 900 to attend, at \$35 per plate.

Leroy praised the Ronald Reagan administration for trying to return decision-making to the states.

And regarding his election race against Democrat Cecil Andrus, Leroy said, "Neither the politics nor the politicians of the past will do in the governor's chair."

After leaving Boise this morning,

Bush plans to attend GOP fundraisers in Salt Lake City and Arizona before ending the swing Saturday in Colorado.

But Bush planned a busy schedule in Boise. About 125 people were expected at a fund-raiser, featuring Bush, for Leroy, who is expected to be the Republicans' candidate for governor.

Hosts at that event were Senate Republican Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, and his wife, Vicki. Tickets were \$250 each or \$400 per couple.

But Hollings noted that at least one Morton Thiokol engineer, Allan McDonald, opposed the decision to launch even after his company had given its formal approval.

Truly relieves shuttle boss Jesse W. Moore, who had the final word on all launch decisions — including Challenger's — and who heads NASA's internal investigation into the accident. Moore is taking over as director of the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

Court upholds death sentence

The Idaho Supreme Court has reaffirmed the conviction and death sentence of Gene Francis Stuart, the first person ever convicted under Idaho's torture murder law, while attorneys have challenged in 7th District Court the conviction and death penalty of murderer Richard Leavitt.

In the Leavitt case, defense attorney Tom Paekker filed motions for a new trial with the 7th District Court, citing the need to present new evidence and raising questions about comments made by one of the jurors about the case. Both issues were raised during last fall's trial and were rejected by Judge H. Reynold George.

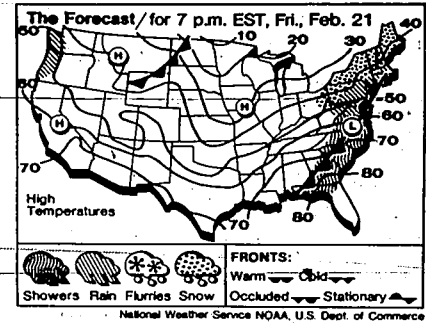
On the warmer end of the scale, Mullian and near-Idaho reached 52 degrees.

casing bulges when the "rocket" is ignited.

"Truly promised—the accident-investigation would be thorough and fixes would be made.

"If nobody does it, I will," he said. "I wouldn't be sitting here, taking this job, if I didn't believe that."

On Thursday, workers built a time when shuttle flights have been grounded pending the outcome of the investigation into the Jan. 28 explosion and destruction of Challenger and its crew of seven.

Not long after Graham made the announcement there was a call for his resignation by Hollings.

Hollings later told reporters that in a Senate hearing on Tuesday, he asked Graham whether there was any evidence that Morton Thiokol opposed the launch of Challenger. Hollings quoted Graham as replying, "No sir, the evidence is the other way."

Sacramento-San Joaquin Delta, but state spokesman Larry Hinds said later in the day that the water already had begun receding.

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Magic Valley shelter operators oppose new class of homes

BOISE — Saying it would discriminate against their clients, two Magic Valley shelter operators testified Thursday against a bill that would set up a special class of homes for disabled people.

Under Senate Bill 1357, shelter homes housing 15 or less developmentally disabled people and agreeing to carry out training and education for residents would be placed in a special grouping and receive additional government dollars.

The Senate Health and Welfare Committee



held a second day of hearings on the bill Thursday, but did not vote whether or not to accept it. The committee is expected to vote next week.

Proponents of the bill say it will result in

better service to people who have a chance to move out of shelter homes and into their own homes or apartments.

They say the change would further the state's goal of making the disabled self-sufficient members of society.

Rulon Gilbert, owner and administrator of the Purple Sage Manor shelter home in Twin Falls, said people at the 25-person Purple Sage Manor receive the kind of special treatment sponsors of the bill say is best delivered in 15-person homes.

He said four of his clients have full-time jobs in the Twin Falls area, three have jobs but require supervision, and 13 are in

sheltered employment set up specifically for the disabled.

In addition, he said, three receive counseling for mental and behavioral problems, three are in living skills development programs, and two have been trained to clean their own laundry.

On the average, about one person per year moves out into the community to live more independently, while about four per year are moved back to homes where there is more supervision or care.

Gilbert said his home functions as the smaller homes are supposed to, despite the fact it has 10 more residents than what is

supposed to be the ideal size.

"I feel a little bit like the bumblebee, who no engineer said could fly; but no one told the bumblebee," he said.

Paul May, a 17-person shelter home operator in Rupert, said the creation of a law establishing special funding for 15-person homes would be unfair.

The law would discriminate against people not living in smaller facilities because the funds would not be available for extra services, he said.

There is no reason larger shelter homes cannot offer training and educational services to their clients, he said.

Pulled from Neibaur's desk, sales tax bill passes House

BOISE — For some reason, when his second sales tax bill failed on the House floor Wednesday, Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, didn't throw his last copy of the bill in the trash can.

So, when House Republican leaders came to him later and asked him to resurrect it, Neibaur dug through his desk and found the bill he introduced earlier in the session as "something I cooked up in my back yard."

It passed the House 50-34 Thursday afternoon.

Neibaur changed the bill little between the second and final debates over it.

Angry over the failure of House Republicans to support it Wednesday, Neibaur went on the record saying he wasn't going to support temporary increases in the sales tax.

But then House leaders, casting about for some measure the Republican caucus could support, came to Neibaur and asked him to give the bill one more try.

What assured its passage was that the House Republican leadership failed to win support for their temporary tax increase plans and relented in their opposition to the permanent tax increase, bringing on board their votes and those of their soldiers.

"What they wanted, they couldn't get; their suggestion wasn't going anywhere," Neibaur said late

Thursday afternoon.

The tight-fisted beet farmer says he doesn't think his push for a sales tax increase will hurt him next fall.

"In re-election it's not going to bother me; I still feel it was the responsible thing to do, especially when 75 percent of it goes for education."

Neibaur said he has not yet decided whether he will run for re-election.

The bill, now headed for the Senate, increases sales taxes 1 cent beginning March 1.

Of the \$75 million Neibaur expects the tax increase to raise, \$19.5 million would be used to balance this year's budget.

Of the remainder, \$12.2 million would be placed in reserve to protect the state against future budget deficits; \$5 million will be spent on maintaining state buildings; \$10.7 million will go back to the counties and cities; and \$27.6 million will be applied to next year's budget.

The bill, now headed for the Senate, increases sales taxes 1 cent beginning March 1.

School sub-district bill gains nod

BOISE — Members of the Senate Education Committee gave preliminary approval Thursday morning to a bill they said will either encourage consolidation or de-consolidation of Idaho school districts.

By allowing the formation of sub-districts within school districts, Senate Bill 1351 would allow one section of a school district to levy taxes on itself for building projects, without the help of the district.

The bill is backed by North Idaho school trustees who have a consolidated district in which two towns will not support a third town's efforts to build new buildings.

In last year's discussions of consolidation of the Murlough, Hansen, and Kimberly school districts, the option to raise separate tax levies for building or improving elementary schools in the three towns was an issue.

Senators on the committee were divided on whether the bill would pave the way to more consolidation of school districts or break apart those districts that have already consolidated.

Sen. Jerry Thorr, R-Nampa, said it will allow voters within consolidated districts to look after the schools they want to look after and will encourage districts to consolidate.

But Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, said that once a section of a school district separates itself and begins to levy its own set of taxes, it

will polarize districts.

Twigg said students in poorer parts of school districts would be penalized if their section of a district was not able to pay for improvements to schools, while another section was able to pass levies to pay for better facilities.

Sen. Laird Koh, R-Kimberly, opposed the bill. He said the measure could have some standards built into it to only permit the formation of subdistricts in circumstances such as those in the northern Idaho districts where large distances separate consolidated districts.

Water rights amendments possible

BOISE — In order to make clear what was implied in last year's Swan Falls water rights dispute agreement, the Senate Resources and Conservation Committee is considering amendments to the legislation governing the agreement.

An amendment drafted by a summer study committee will make it clear that water in the Snake River

and its tributaries upstream from the Milner Dam near Burley will not be limited by the requirements placed on so-called "trust water" below the Milner Dam.

Under the agreement, use of "trust water" (electrical power water rights in excess of minimum flow levels) is governed by certain rules that limit use to those projects that are deemed beneficial to the people of the state of Idaho.

Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, who introduced the bill to the com-

mittee, said the Swan Falls agreement intended to leave waters above the Milner Dam alone and the amended version of the agreement will make that clear.

The amendment, Crapo said, was approved by representatives of Idaho Power Company, the governor's office, the attorney general, and the Department of Water Resources, all of whom were involved in the original dispute.

The bill will be amended to clean up technical problems before it is introduced to the full Senate.

Senate gets textbook plan

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House has passed 82-2 a bill requiring that at least two members of the state textbook selection committee be neither teachers, school administrators or trustees.

The measure allows local school boards to appoint a textbook adoption committee to select textbooks and instructional materials used in their respective schools.

Expect tough times to remain with us

If it's lousy now, look what the future has in store. The gloomy farm economic picture was underlined by the director of the state's Agricultural Department in a talk Wednesday at the Twin Falls Rotary.

Although attempting to be upbeat about the strengths of Idaho's agriculture, reading between the lines, the list of challenges cited by Dick Rush bode for more hard times in the future. Consider the implications of these factors:

The outlook for increased national consumption of ag commodities is nil. We have little population growth and we already overconsume, so we need to turn to the export market for growth.

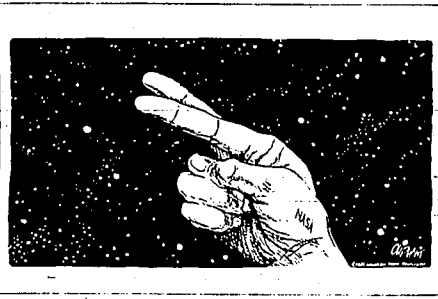
Growth markets are in the Third World nations, but in the last 10 years the internal production of crops in these nations has risen 33 percent, and these nations are carrying more proportionate debt than our farmers, particularly with the drop in their oil revenues.

Farmland prices have fallen the greatest amount since the Depression. Combined with low commodity prices that are cutting profits, farmers have a shrinking equity base to collateralize loans. Bankers with mounting bad-debt portfolios are moving funds to more secure investments.

And Uncle Sam, our guarantor of last resort, is battling Gramm-Rudman and will knock \$4 billion off of last year's \$20 billion in price supports in this year's budget. The farm bill allows beans, among other things, to be grown on idled lands to compound problems.

Don't look to the state to pick up where the feds leave off. Gov. John Evans is running a \$20 million budget shortfall so, expect cutbacks in the ag department budget.

If there's a bright side to this economic picture, dropping oil prices are lowering the inflation rate, which is dropping interest rates, lowering our cost of production and the cost of floating the federal budget deficit, which has increased employment and output in the industrial sectors, making the out-of-town job market rosier when we hit the street.



Missed chances to open up process

It is unfortunate the issue of openness in government received so little support recently in the Senate State Affairs Committee.

Three bills that would have made government and information about its dealings more accessible to the public were held in committee, although there was little or no testimony in opposition.

One bill would have allowed voters to register by mail, making it easier for citizens to exercise the right of the ballot. Another would have extended the campaign reporting, or "sunshine," law to county races in counties having populations of 10,000 or more. A third would have required all primary election candidates—not just the losers, to report promptly on campaign contributions and expenditures.

Essentially, we once again missed an opportunity to write openness into public policy. These bills were dismissed by the Republican majority on the committee as inconsequential, and did not receive the attention they deserved.

I believe the actual process of government is the basis of our free system, and there is little more importance than the ability of the public to know and understand

issues and actions affecting their lives. Two years ago, Idaho cities with populations of more than 16,000 were brought under the sunshine law, and it only makes sense that the same should apply to counties, where very significant races are taking place more often.

In the case of primary campaign reporting, it is only right that the public should know well in advance of the general election who helped the winning primary candidates progress to the general election. This is of particular interest this year, with so many statewide elections being contested on both sides in the primary. The public needs to know the governmental process is their process. Without them, it grinds forward without clear direction and often with vested strains. To open that process so they might enrich it should be of importance to the Idaho Legislature.

Nicaraguan policy is neither just, wise

The following policy statement on U.S. Policy in Central America was drafted and signed by members and friends of the Magic Valley Chapter of The Fellowship of Reconciliation.

The statement is being sent to our representatives, with urgent concern about the critical issue of massive funding proposed to the Contras in Nicaragua. The present foreign policy of the United States toward Nicaragua is leading our nation toward deeper military involvement in that region. The administration views the Nicaraguan government as a communist dictatorship in which the human rights of the people have been stripped away. Based on our own experience in and study of Nicaragua and information from people presently working there, our view is quite different.

The United States support for the Contras amounts to a war against common citizens who are following the dictates of their consciences. The Sandinista government is the result of its support from the people, including Christian-base communities. The better that we are saving these people from communism by supporting the Contras is a horrific error of judgment.

Our current policy of supporting the overthrowing the right of Nicaraguans to make their own choices, a right which we fought a revolution to win for ourselves.

We protest this policy because of its unacceptable compromise of our own standards of decency, and its untenable cost. We protest when the president, who has said that we cannot support terrorists of any kind, will ask for as much as \$100 million for the Contra terrorists. We protest giving between \$5,000 and \$10,000 dollars a piece to Contra killers, when Idahoans are losing their farms, when senior citizens are paying higher Medicare costs and losing Medicaid benefits, when the women and children of the United States are simply being dropped through the safety net.

Fellowship of Reconciliation

We want to balance the budget. We don't want to raise taxes, but our president is asking us to take money away from hard-working Idahoans to support terrorists in a country most Americans have never even heard of. It is simply not in our best interests, strategically or ethically. We support the Contadora process of negotiating political solutions to political problems in a region for which recognizing the autonomy of the countries involved. The only lasting solutions will be maintained and must be worked out by the participating peoples of Central and South America, who, like ourselves, seek self-determination.

Our support of the Contras is undermining negotiations; we are funding military adventures, and the expense and cost to life and property in the region and here at home. Yet we have not been willing to give the negotiation process our support. We submit that our policy needs to change drastically.

We need to extract ourselves from our military East-West power orientation, and put ourselves strongly on the side of negotiation and regional autonomy. Our current policy is neither just, nor wise. We believe it puts us on a course toward more volatile and dangerous military involvements. It is not in the interest of our nation as a whole, and it is not consonant with our principles. We call upon those who affirm with Jefferson in the Declaration of Independence that all nations have a right to determine their own form of government and destiny that we honor that right with our actions. We call on those who hold and seek office to make their views known, and we call on the responsibility of an informed electorate to continue to hold up this critical issue of our policy in Central America.

Speak out against Star Wars

Do you grudgingly approve of Star Wars? I wonder if most Magic Valley citizens are in support of this controversial project which President Reagan wishes us to call Strategic Defense Initiative, or SDI.

Most ordinary lay persons, not being scientists, know that they are not qualified to pass judgment on the system, but may grudgingly agree to it, supposing that the administration knows what it is doing.

There can be no better information on the subject, if not to the physicists of our leading universities? Did you know that it's 200 members of the faculties in the science departments of the 14 top ranking universities in our nation have signed and endorsed a petition opposing SDI? This includes a dozen Nobel prize winners and 1,680 graduate students. These are the experts!

The petition calls the plan for a space-based missile shield "ill conceived and dangerous." Thirty-two of the 45 physics instructors at the University of Chicago signed the petition to Washington opposing Star Wars.

Strong building code needed

I have always been concerned for my personal safety and that of people I care about. I wear a seat belt when I travel and encourage others to do so. When it was demonstrated that cigarettes cause cancer, I quit smoking, and I discourage others from smoking in my presence, for their sake as well as my own.

Now it appears that I must carry a wary eye on the Twin Falls City Council as another source of danger to my health and well being. By their systematic dismantling of the Building Inspection Department, they are endangering my health and safety, along with all others who may occupy public (and private) buildings within the Twin Falls city limits. Building codes are established to make life, as safe as possible, the structures we occupy. Most codes were written in response to a specific

failure: structural inadequacy, electrical malfunction, etc., which more than likely resulted in physical harm or even death to a building's occupants.

Contrary to what Mayor Vollmer, Councilman Miller and former fireman Peterson would have us believe, the codes were not written and enacted to harass small businessmen. They are there to protect the people who work and shop in the various structures.

Mr. Peterson maintains that people can find their way out of a building in the event of a fire. He feels quite certain that he would not panic and neither would his customers, so emergency lighting should not be necessary in his establishment. Perhaps he has never heard of the "Cocoon" Grove fire.

Mr. Miller feels that fire walls are not necessary at intervals within a warehouse because the contents are not apt to burn. I suggest that he have a talk with the fire departments and the owners of the buildings at Main and Overland in Burley and at Main and Broadway in Buhl.

Mr. Vollmer thinks that building codes are so restrictive that businesses will not locate in Twin Falls if they have to comply. Ask any reputable insurance agent about the fact that insurance rates for big businesses in an area after there have been a couple of large fires. Ask also about a break on rates if a business upgrades itself to code and installs a sprinkling system.

I realize that Mr. Peterson is no longer a member of the council, but the attacks on the inspection department began with his administration. I had hoped that they would abate after his election defeat, but evidently the current council continues to try to pull the inspection department's teeth.

Their latest move is to remove Building Inspection Supervisor Wayne Pea and replace him with Fire Division Commander Phil Clough. Mr. Pea's transgression was to insist on following code requirements on a remodeling job at Morrison Tire. The council, in its wisdom, thought fire doors were an unnecessary expense for a fire shop to have to install. I wonder how secure Morrison Tire's neighbors feel in the event of a fire?

I have no argument with Mr. Clough. He has fire safety training but not in structural integrity or fire codes, and there are no one to adequately inspect a building except as to whether or not it complies with fire codes only. Whether the building is constructed to withstand snow loads or high winds, whether its electrical system is adequately grounded and grounded (i.e., safe) materials are questions Mr. Clough cannot answer. He is, I am certain, a conscientious city employee, endeavoring to perform the tasks assigned to him by the City Council. His job may, however, be in jeopardy since at least four other members of the inspection department have had their positions eliminated (no one gets fired) by the council since Mr. Peterson, Mr. Vollmer and Mr. Miller have begun their vendetta against the inspection department. The fire chief, the fire marshal, the electrical inspector and the building inspection supervisor positions have all been eliminated.

Buildings such as Hennessy Cold Storage and Morrison Tire have been allowed to ignore parts of the code, and local bars and taverns can escape inspection for fire and building violations, all with council approval.

If it is going to take a major fire, with loss of life, before the council, and the public, realize that the codes are necessary, even vital to the safety of all of us, I hope and trust the council's track record so far, I have little faith. VIOLA SCOTT Twin Falls

Deputies rescue 2 women trapped by snow near Stanley

STANLEY (AP) — Two women who were trapped in five feet of snow by an avalanche for four days were in stable condition Thursday as the threat of more snow slides loomed over the area.

Sherrita Renne, 19, and Lydia Benham, 18, both of Boise, were found Wednesday wrapped in a blanket under five feet of snow 25 miles west of Stanley, a Custer County sheriff's dispatcher said.

They were resting in good condition in Steel Memorial Hospital in Salmon on Thursday, nursing supervisor Kathy Sunberg said.

She said the women's relatives and Dr. David Earl had prohibited the women from talking to the press.

The women suffered some hypothermia and minimal frostbite,

said Marie Osburn, the nurse who was on duty at the Stanley Emergency Clinic, where the women initially were taken.

"They were in pretty good shape considering their experience," she said. "They were well protected by the amount of snow covering them."

"They were really fortunate they were found," said Boise County Chief Deputy Sheriff Dick Comstock, whose department also participated in the search. "They're out alive and they probably learned a lesson."

Meanwhile, the National Weather Service said an avalanche warning was in effect through sundown for areas near Halsey, Stanley and Fairfield. The weather service is advising back country travelers to avoid

slopes on all exposures.

Comstock said Renne and Benham left Stanley on Saturday bound for Challis. He said they drove around a barricade that had been placed 23 miles east of Stanley to prevent motorists from continuing on the slide-prone highway, which was closed at 9 a.m. Saturday.

"They got the car to somewhere around milepost 2100 and started walking," Comstock said. "A guy was supposed to be coming up from Stanley in a snowmobile to get them."

Comstock said the snowmobiler was forced to turn around because of the snow slides. The department was called because co-workers worried when they did not show up for work on Monday, he said.

The Boise County Sheriff's Department was aided by searchers from Custer County.

The search began Tuesday afternoon and continued until Wednesday night when the two women, who were several miles from their car, heard a Sno-Cat driven by a Custer County deputy.

"One of them heard the cat and poked her head up through the snow," the Custer County dispatcher said.

"The car, which the women left Saturday, has not been found yet, the dispatcher said.

Rod Chaney, district maintenance engineer for the state Department of Transportation, said that as soon as the road was closed Saturday

morning, the department checked around the clock operations to restore power around the community of Kilgore near the Montana border.

In the southeastern corner of the state, the city of Preston lost its culinary water line to an early morning multiblast, and the 3,000 residents were asked to curtail use while an emergency reserve tank provided water for the most critical needs.

Near Weston, a creek washed away sections of the Union Pacific Railroad, resulting in disrupting rail traffic on the Ogden, Utah-Pocatello line.

Officials said three roads were also washed out.

Elsewhere around the state, heavy snows and rains coupled with high winds and slides disrupted power, broke water lines and washed out sections of rail and road systems.

In sparsely populated Clark County, where more than 16 inches of snow has fallen just this week, crews tried to keep key roads open, but Road and Bridge Foreman Ed Russell said wind and snow closed roads right behind the plows. Utah Power and Light crews continued

Seattle joins in coalition challenging urban aid block

WASHINGTON (AP) — A coalition of Democratic members of Congress and cities filed a federal court suit Thursday challenging the constitutionality of President Reagan's decision to defer spending some \$7 billion in urban aid.

"The Constitution gives control of spending to Congress because it is the branch of government closest to the people. The administration's proposed deferrals show why," said Rep. Bruce B. Morrison, D-Conn.

He was joined in the suit by Reps. Mike Lowry, D-Wash., Charles E. Schumer, D-N.Y., and Barbara Baker, D-Calif.

Also joining the suit against Samuel R. Pierce Jr., secretary of Housing and Urban Development, and James C. Miller III, director of the Office of Management and Budget, were the city of Seattle, the National League of Cities, the U.S. Conference of Mayors and the Upper Chapel Neighborhood Improvement Association of New Haven, Conn.

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court here. Morrison and the others are being represented by the same lawyers who represented another group of congressmen who successfully challenged the automatic spending cut provisions of the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction law. That case has been

appealed to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The city of New Haven, Conn., filed a similar lawsuit Wednesday, and asked the court to hear its case at the same time as the one filed by Morrison.

The programs affected by the president's decision to defer spending include public housing, Urban Development Action Grants and Community Development Block Grants.

"This (the deferred spending) seems to me to be guerrilla warfare on the part of the White House in dismantling the federal government," Schumer said. He said the president's decision already has put a stop to several urban renewal projects in Brooklyn, which he represents.

Congress granted the president the authority to defer spending from one fiscal year into the next in the 1974 Budget Control and Impoundment Act.

But the suit argues that the permission to the president was contingent on the right of either house of Congress to overturn the deferral, a procedure known as a "one-house veto."

The congressmen and municipal groups argued the U.S. Supreme Court, in a 1983 decision dealing with congressional oversight of regulations issued by federal agencies, ruled the one-house veto unconstitutional.

attorney Charles A. Brown, representing the Lewiston Morning Tribune, objected to a motion by Boyer's attorney, Public Defender Kent J. Merica, to close the hearing.

Brown asked Perry to declare on constitutional an Idaho law requiring Perry to close the hearing at the request of the defense attorney. He said the law takes away the magistrate's discretion in the matter.

It not that, Brown asked the judge to delay the hearing and set a time to hear arguments on the law to allow the public access to the tape of the preliminary hearing.

Merica objected to Brown's presence at the hearing and said he had no right to be participating in the criminal proceedings.

Blob of gas may be big new planet

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Astronomers in Oregon have observed what could be a huge planet orbiting around a star 36 light years from Earth.

If supported by later evidence, the finding could help confirm what astronomers long have believed, but never have been able to prove: that solar systems exist elsewhere in this galaxy.

The first clear evidence for planets outside our solar system emerged in 1916, when University of Arizona astronomers announced finding a gaseous "brown dwarf" orbiting around a star called Van Biesbroeck B.

James C. Kopp, a University of Oregon astronomy professor who led the team of Oregon astronomers, describes the object the team observed as similar to the Arizona discovery: a huge "blob of gas" at least twice the size of Jupiter and perhaps bigger.

"If this really is a planetlike body, it's an enormous body," Kemp said. "It's something like 10 times the size of Jupiter."

Using 21- and 32-inch telescopes at the University of Oregon's Pine Mountain Observatory near Bend, Kemp's group measured the amount of polarized light coming from Arcturus, the fourth-brightest star in the heavens. One of the main sources of polarized light is reflection, as in the glare off of water on a sunny day or the sunlight reflected from a planet.

A special polarimeter attached to the telescopes found that the amount of polarized light from Arcturus varied over a 30-day period.

After ruling out pulsation of the star as the cause, the group was left with two possibilities: a planet with a 30-day orbit around the star, or polarized light variations caused by a sunspot-like "starspot" as the star itself rotates every 30 days.

Closed hearing appeal likely

LEWISTON (AP) — A judge closed a preliminary hearing in the case of a youth charged with murder, and a newspaper said it would appeal the decision at least to the Idaho Supreme Court.

Magistrate Darrel R. Perry ruled Wednesday that Wayne E. Boyer, 15,

should be bound over to Second District Court to face the second-degree murder charge. Boyer is scheduled to appear on Wednesday to enter a plea for his part in the death of Anna E. Christensen, 72, who police believe died of suffocation at her home.

Attorney Charles A. Brown, representing the Lewiston Morning Tribune, objected to a motion by Boyer's attorney, Public Defender Kent J. Merica, to close the hearing.

Brown asked Perry to declare on constitutional an Idaho law requiring Perry to close the hearing at the request of the defense attorney. He said the law takes away the magistrate's discretion in the matter.

Prison term left stand

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A judge has refused to reduce the 20-year prison term he imposed on a Coeur d'Alene man who admitted killing a woman whose body was found in a lake.

"Any time somebody is guilty of murder ... society mandates a heavy sentence," said Judge Gary Haman in response to Donald Bietichert's request for a lower sentence.

Bietichert, who is serving time in a minimum security area of the penitentiary in Boise, was not pres-

ent for the Wednesday hearing.

His attorney, Tony Sanchez, argued that Bietichert has made rapid progress, from successfully completing alcohol abuse counseling to working in the prison bakery.

This problem is not one of violence but alcohol, Sanchez said.

Bietichert, 40, pleaded guilty in January 1965 to second-degree murder in the slaying of 50-year-old Idalene Tondreau, whose partially clothed body was found in Fernan Lake.

It not that, Brown asked the judge to delay the hearing and set a time to hear arguments on the law to allow the public access to the tape of the preliminary hearing.

Merica objected to Brown's presence at the hearing and said he had no right to be participating in the criminal proceedings.

Cut in dairy support reversed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Staring at the grim realities of Gramm-Rudman deficit cuts, a House subcommittee Thursday blinked — and approved legislation that would undo a required cut in the nation's dairy price supports.

In the first such official action by Congress since the deficit-reduction law was passed late last year, the House Agriculture dairy subcommittee voted to force the Reagan administration to back off from a planned March 1 cut in dairy support levels and to make the savings through increased revenues instead.

The administration had announced the price-support cut on Feb. 12 as part of a plan to achieve a total of \$1.3 billion in savings required in the current fiscal year. Other department programs, including subsidies for cotton and grain farmers, are due for similar cuts as part of a 4.3 percent across-the-board reduction.

Terror link sought in slaying

GLENDALE, Calif. (AP) — The slain bureau chief of an anti-Marcos newspaper had predicted "a lot of killings" of opponents of the Philippine president, and FBI agents investigated on Thursday if his shooting was an act of terrorism.

Oscar Salvaterra, 41, was killed Wednesday by a gunman who entered his home in Glendale, a Los Angeles suburb, and shot him several times, one day after he received a letter threatening his life at the offices of the Philippine News.

"He had an obsession against injustice . . . and you could see where that would lead him," said Tim Dayton, who was an aide to former Gov. Edmund G. Brown Jr. and spent "hundreds of hours" talking to Salvaterra.

U.S. Rep. Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., said in Washington that he thought there was "a very strong presumption here that the government of the Philippines was behind this assassination."

Document release denounced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Intelligence Committee chairman on Thursday denounced a White House plan to release a secret document on Nicaraguan government lobbying as an "outrageous" attempt to portray any opponent of aid to Nicaraguan rebels as "a stooge of communism."

Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., said the decision jeopardized sensitive intelligence sources in a "transparent political tactic" intended to gain support for President Reagan's plan to send the Contras \$100 million in lethal and non-lethal aid.

Sen. Patrick J. Leahy, D-Vt., the panel's vice chairman, later backed Durenberger's criticism.

Meanwhile, Rep. Dave McCurdy, D-Okla., a key moderate on the House intelligence committee, said the White House appeared "more concerned about politics than policy" in its determination to resume military aid to the Contras. He said a greater emphasis is needed on diplomacy.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary William J. Bennett gave the states a report card Thursday on test scores, dropout rates and other measures that he cited as proof America's schools are on the rebound.

He said rising college entrance test scores, and slightly lower school dropout rates, show that "the excellence movement has clearly helped our poor, and minority populations."

In releasing the Education Department's third annual chart of state education rankings, Bennett was following a tradition that his predecessor, T.H. Bell, started to the dismay of some state school superintendents.

Most of the data on the chart, including scores on the Scholastic Aptitude Test and American College Testing Program exam, has been released previously.

Bennett acknowledged it is "a conservation-causing" exercise. "When you have this kind of chart, some people are going to come off looking better than others. It's inevitable," he told a news conference.

The chart indicated the District of Columbia, Louisiana and Alabama have the worst dropout rates, while Minnesota, Nebraska and North Dakota have the best graduation rates.

The chart showed improvements in college admission scores in 35 states since 1982.

"The news is good — our schools are improving again, our children are learning more," Bennett said.

The report listed Idaho with an average SAT or ACT score of 18.8 for

the Class of 1985, with 55.2 percent of seniors taking the test. Idaho tied for 14th among 28 states where the ACT is prevalent.

Idaho's graduation rate was 75.8 percent, ranking 20th among the 50 states and District of Columbia.

He said states with higher test scores also tended to have lower dropout rates. "It's excellence a threat to the poor and minorities? The answer is no," he said.

Bennett said Iowa, New Hampshire and Wisconsin had the best SAT or ACT scores. But he also commended the District of Columbia, South Carolina, Utah, Alabama and Kentucky for registering "the greatest test score improvement since 1982."

He lauded New Hampshire, Vermont, Nebraska and Iowa as states with average expenditures but above-average test scores. And he described Illinois, South Dakota, California, Delaware, Maine and Virginia as states with large concentrations of poor students and above-average scores.

The graduation rate is calculated by dividing the number of graduating seniors by the number of freshmen four years earlier. It does not include those who obtain high school equivalency diplomas.

The national high school graduation rate was 70.9 percent in 1984, up from 69.7 in 1982. The best rates

were in Minnesota, 89.3 percent, and Nebraska and North Dakota, both 86.3 percent.

New Hampshire, Oregon and Vermont led in SAT scores in the 22 states where more students take that test; Iowa, Wisconsin and Minnesota set the pace in the 28 states where the ACT is dominant.

At the back of the SAT pack were South Carolina, North Carolina and Georgia, while Mississippi, Louisiana, Arkansas and West Virginia pulled up at the rear on ACT scores.

Criticism of the chart rolled in, as it has in the past two years.

John Weiss, executive director of FairTest, a Boston-based group that is critical of standardized tests, said the chart "violates professional guidelines for proper test use and warps school curricula."

Jane Cromer, spokeswoman for the District of Columbia public schools, said, "Everytime I get this report I just go berserk because it says one out of every two kids don't graduate and that's not true."

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World Briefly

Soviets orbit 'Peace' station

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union sent up a space station named Peace on Thursday to serve as a permanently manned base for the next generation in space. It has docking ports for six spacecraft and private cabins for cosmonauts.

It was launched without a crew and will not be manned until tests are completed, the official Tass news agency said, without revealing how long the test program would take.

The new station, named Mir, the Russian word for peace — joins the Salyut-7 space lab in orbit. The last team to work aboard the Salyut-7, which was launched in 1982, returned to Earth in November when one of the three cosmonauts fell ill.

Tass said both the Mir and the Salyut-7 were functioning normally.

China launches new satellite

PEKING (AP) — China's second telecommunications and broadcasting satellite, launched on Feb. 1, was accurately placed into permanent orbit over the equator Thursday, official news reports said.

Instruments aboard the satellite were working normally, the reports said.

China launched its first communications satellite into orbit over the Pacific in April 1984. The latest launch is the 10th since China's first blast-off in 1970.

Israeli force battles guerrillas

SRIFA, Lebanon (AP) — Guerrillas in this Shiite Moslem village fired on Israel's raiding force Thursday and the Israelis pounded a cluster of houses with shellfire in response.

Israeli helicopter gunships strafed nearby olive groves.

Israel's military command said one of its soldiers and eight guerrillas were killed. State-owned Beirut radio said that 20 Israelis were killed or wounded, but there was no confirmation.

It was the first major battle with Shiite guerrillas since the Israelis swept north on Monday to search for two soldiers captured during a guerrilla ambush in Israel's border "security zone."

Timur Goksel, spokesman for the 5,700-man U.N. Interim Force in Lebanon, the peacekeeping contingent known as UNIFIL, said there were casualties among Srifa's population of 2,500 people.

Few allies of Marcos pull away

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Some traditional allies of President Ferdinand Marcos appeared to put distance between themselves and his government Thursday, as European ambassadors indicated they might boycott his inauguration and several foreign envoys met with Corason Aquino.

Mrs. Aquino, Marcos' opponent in the disputed Feb. 7 election, met diplomats — including 12 ambassadors — from 14 European countries and Japan. She told them she was determined — to assume the presidency of the Philippines at the "earliest possible time."

None of the ambassadors specifically endorsed Mrs. Aquino's claim that she won the election but was cheated out of victory. She had asked them not to recognize Marcos' government.

The election has been widely criticized here and abroad as fraudulent.

Ambassador Wieger Hellema of The Netherlands, acting as spokesman for envoys of the 12 European Common Market nations, was asked about reported plans for ambassadors from the trade bloc not to attend the Marcos inauguration, scheduled for Tuesday. "That is under consideration in the capitals" because of the fraud allegations, he said.

Asked if any of the countries were considering withdrawing recognition of Marcos' government, he said there had been "no word on that."

Botha won't meet with Tutu, clergy

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha refused to meet with black Anglican Bishop Desmond Tutu and other leading anti-apartheid activists Thursday about the turmoil in the nation's black townships.

It was Tutu's second unsuccessful attempt in a year to meet with Botha about the uprising against white rule. The 1984 Nobel Peace laureate tried to arrange a private meeting last summer.

Violence was reported in several communities. Police said a hut was set afire in Chesterville near Durban, burning two men to death.

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Inmate overflow to other jails at record high

TWIN FALLS — A record number of Twin Falls County inmates will be housed out of the county Thursday in an effort to keep a lid on the population in the jail, Sheriff Jim Munn said.

A total of 28 inmates was housed in the main jail on the fourth floor of the Courthouse last Thursday, Munn said. A record 21 inmates will be held in jails in Blaine, Cassia, Minidoka and Gooding counties. The out-of-county jail count reached as high as 18 last week, he added.

What helped boost the jail population Thursday was the regularly scheduled sentencing in 5th District Magistrate Court of people convicted of misdemeanors. At least eight people had been sentenced to serve time in jail.

Those sentenced to short terms will be released this weekend from the main jail and inmates from other county jails will be returned to Twin Falls, he added.

The sheriff also said he and his jail staff are attempting to restrict the population of the 74-year-old jail to a maximum of 30 inmates, which Twin Falls County officials

agreed to Jan. 11 as part of a settlement reached in a lawsuit over the jail. The county agreed it would begin restricting the population April 1. But Munn said he is attempting to "follow that limit now in order to develop a policy to manage the effects of the restriction, which he earlier predicted would result in the county having to board at least a 10-12 more inmates out of the county."

Before the court agreement or lawsuit, the county already had boarded inmates in other counties because the jail often became crowded due to segregation requirements.

Even before the court order, Munn had said that he had attempted to reduce the population by boarding prisoners elsewhere because he found there were fewer security problems.

A few months ago, he asked Court staff to provide his office with as much notice as possible about when inmates would be required in court, because some inmates were being kept in out-of-county jails, Munn said. The policy helped the planning process, he said.

"Every day is different," Munn added. Twin Falls County pays from \$20 to \$24 a

day per inmate to board them in other counties. As part of the population restriction, the county agreed to remove bunks in some cells to ensure the county wouldn't exceed the Population Limit.

Munn said the removal of the bunks will be started after some other projects the county agreed to install have been completed.

Attorney Greg Fuller filed the lawsuit Oct. 22 on behalf of two inmates who claimed the old jail didn't meet constitutional standards. The inmates had requested, among other things, that the jail population be reduced.

Delegation to air U.S. 93 concerns before state board

TWIN FALLS — A delegation of Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce members and other community business leaders is being mobilized for a March 12 meeting in Boise with the Idaho Transportation Board to air their views on improvements to U.S. Highway 93.

State Sen. Laird Noh, R. Kimberly, Thursday advised Mike Dolton, Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce executive vice president, that discussion of the highway was on the agenda for the regular March 12 meeting of the three-man Idaho Transportation Board.

Dolton said he is not sure how many or just who will be going. The improvement of U.S. 93 between Twin Falls and Jackpot, Nev., has been a long-standing priority project for the chamber, Dolton said, and the organization plans to take advantage of the opportunity to meet with the state officials.

A study and report recently released by the Idaho Department of Transportation on traffic fatalities last year on U.S. Highway 93 south of

Twin Falls has rekindled efforts for upgrading the highway.

The report said state highway officials feel traffic on the road does not warrant four-lanes. Local support for a four-lane road into Nevada has long been urged by Twin Falls business leaders. The Department of Transportation's study was made a result of the large number of fatal and injury accidents on the road in the past year.

In the report, the department said there were 10 fatalities last year, but a dozen persons were killed during 1985 while traveling between Twin Falls and Jackpot. Bill Miller of Boise, highway safety director of the department, said Wednesday that the error in a department news release is embarrassing, but the statistics reviewed in the study included all of the fatalities and the accident reports of each would not change survey results.

"We reviewed all of the accidents, both fatal and injury classifications," Miller said. "We have given a lot of thought to how we could improve safety factors and reduce accidents."

Miller said he has suggested the possibility of a roadblock system by Idaho State Police.

About \$26,000 given to county for needy

TWIN FALLS — About \$26,000 in federal funds will be distributed to service agencies in Twin Falls County to provide emergency food and shelter to the needy.

The grant was announced this week by the Federal Emergency Management Agency, which heads the board administering the Emergency Food and Shelter National Board Program. The program, which is mandated by Congress, will distribute a total of \$70 million in fiscal year 1986 to community agencies in high-need areas to boost their food and shelter services, according to a news release from FEMA.

The United Way of Magic Valley will be the local administrator of funds. Sandy Thomas, executive director of the United Way, said applications for the funds will be available soon to non-profit agencies.

A citizens committee will review the applications and allot the money, Thomas said. Twin Falls County Commission Chairman Alan Covey, ministers and representatives of the American Red Cross and United Way are members of the committee.

BLM officials ready defense against land swap

TWIN FALLS — Burley and Shoshone city officials plan to continue their struggle to keep U.S. Bureau of Land Management district offices and jobs intact.

"We haven't given up yet," said Burley Mayor Ken Fronk. "Economically Burley is the only place they should locate," he added.

BLM and U.S. Forest Service officials Wednesday announced the possibility of closed offices and lost jobs if a land exchange bill now before Congress is approved.

Both Shoshone Mayor Tim Ridinger and City Councilman Jerry Baltazor said the loss of the BLM District Office there and the jobs associated with it would have a significant impact on their city because of its small size.

"We're going to try to stop it, but the wheel's already in motion," Ridinger said. "It's a pretty big wheel and we're pretty small."

Under the proposal submitted to Congress Wednesday, Burley and Shoshone could lose a combined total of 62 jobs in federal plans for a land exchange between the BLM and Forest Service.

Who the exchange plans would consolidate the Shoshone and Burley Districts of the BLM into a single office in Twin Falls. Existing district offices in both cities would be reduced to resource area offices. Shoshone would lose 28 jobs in the move and Burley would lose 34.

"While Twin Falls would gain nine jobs, it would lose the supervisor's office for the Sawtooth National Forest, which would be moved to Challis. The interchange proposal would divide the northern portion of the Sawtooth National Forest between the Boise and Challis National Forests.

"In the interchange the Forest Service would take control of roughly all BLM lands north of Highway 20, while the BLM would assume responsibility for Forest Service Lands south of

the highway, down to the border with Utah and Nevada.

While the interchange is intended to improve management and reduce costs for the two agencies, Fronk said that is not true in Burley's case.

"In Burley they already own the ground where the District Office is and they had plans to build a new building," Fronk said.

"In Twin Falls they will be living in rented facilities," he added.

Between the costs of rent and moving relocating personnel, Fronk said he can't see where all the savings will be.

Fronk added that the move may also be convenient for land users in the area. A survey of land users' location by zip code found that the geographic center for the user group was in the nearby town of Minidoka, Fronk said.

"They haven't given us any good reasons as to why it's not a good choice," Fronk said in reference to the possibility of locating a joint district office in Burley.

Ridinger said that if the BLM abandons its Shoshone District Office it will be leaving a beautiful building behind. "They put a lot of money into it," Ridinger said of the current office, located at the southern edge of town.

"The District Office is already here, the facilities are here and as for Twin Falls being more centrally located, there's only 20 miles between the two," Ridinger said.

The swap proposal, however, did not take the town by surprise, Ridinger said, as was the possibility of losing the District Office. "We've brought up by the BLM last year," he said.

While the lost jobs would hurt the community, Ridinger noted that a number of BLM personnel working at the District Office do not live in Shoshone.

If the proposed exchange takes place in Idaho, roughly 3.8 million acres of land will change hands between the two agencies. Twin Forest Service will gain 1,769,000 acres in proposed swap.

Flooding potential seen diminishing

GOODING — The Big Wood River and several creeks that posed flood threats and overran their banks in some areas Monday were all said to be contained on Thursday.

Gooding County Civil Defense Director Bill Bunn said cooler temperatures Wednesday night and Thursday helped conditions greatly.

"If it stays cool and we don't get a lot more moisture, we should be in the good shape for awhile," Bunn said after an inspection of the streams Thursday afternoon.

He will continue to check the Big Wood River and the creeks that have been flooding, but he doesn't expect any further problems, if current weather conditions hold.

Heavy rain and melting snow above the drainages created flooding change hands between the two agencies. Twin Forest Service will gain 1,769,000 acres in proposed swap.

Petitions filed for recall of Shoshone councilman

SHOSHONE — Petitions asking for the recall of Shoshone City Councilman Jerry Baltazor were filed Wednesday.

City Clerk Bob Bolan said Thursday that the petitions, containing 129 names were filed close to 5 p.m. Wednesday. The petitions list "failure to respond to the wishes of his constituents" as the reason for the recall effort.

Local backer Leigh Kelley said last week he and other area residents are upset with an attempt to remove veteran Police Chief John Shaffer from the position and with

Baltazor's backing of that effort. "We were happy with the way things were," Kelley said, but he added he was not sure exactly how things had been in the Police Department. Shaffer was retained as police chief, but abruptly resigned the position of the chief.

Petitioners are also concerned that Baltazor has a conflict of interest in serving as city police commissioner because he is a law officer with the Idaho Fish and Game Department.

Baltazor said Saturday there does not need to be a conflict and feels his council job is a "personal one," a way of contributing to the city, and he does not let

one position influence the other. "We appointed Jerry as police commissioner because he has the most experience in that field of anyone on the council," there is no conflict; he is just volunteering to use his expertise to help the city.

Baltazor said his concern for the city police force has been to implement training procedures and a written policy manual to assure professional operations and reduce the city's legal liability exposure.

The police manual, outlining operations and training requirements, was prepared by Baltazor at the City Council's request.

Bolan said 103 "qualified electors" must sign the recall petition, a figure that represents 20 percent of the voters registered in last November's city election. By state law Bolan has 10 days to check the names and certify that at least 103 of them are properly registered city voters.

If the petition is complete, a special election on whether to remove Baltazor from office must be called 30 to 40 days after the petition signatures are certified. Bolan said persons who have signed the petition do have the right to have their names removed from the form if they notify him in writing before the election is called.

State law requires a majority of the people voting in the special election must vote for the recall, and the vote in favor of recall must "equal or exceed" the number of votes Baltazor received when he was elected. Baltazor received 217 votes in the council election two years ago.

Bolan said the cost of the election — which he estimates will exceed \$400 for supplies, ballots, election officials, judges and official notice publications — will have to be paid from an already tight city budget.

"We budgeted for the city election in November, but not for two elections this year," Bolan said.

"If we could set up a road block on occasion and stop all drivers, it might be somewhat impressive for those who have been drinking or need to stop for a break," Miller said.

The survey findings showed the accident rate as being normal for that type of road despite the 12 fatalities. Six of these deaths occurred in a single accident, the report pointed out.

There have been improvements made on that stretch of highway over the past 20 years, but since travelers between Magic Valley and Nevada, California and other southern points use the route, motorists say the improvement are not keeping pace with

needs.

The chamber's transportation committee has sent letters to legislators, the governor, Department of Transportation, and other sources of possible assistance.

"Our contention is that this 'blood alley' should be widened to four lanes," said Dolton. "It's not only important for safety reasons, but is an important economic factor for our area. It serves all business connections in important markets in California and other states to the south. It serves the tourism industry, our state's third-largest source of revenue."

Dolton, a former Oregon State Police officer, also took exception to the survey conclusion that most accidents could be traced to driver

condition.

He said there is a driver error made in every accident but this does not excuse the condition of the road, which in this case is unforgiving of any driver mistake.

Dolton said that in a recent negotiation with an industry that would provide 400 jobs in Twin Falls, U.S. \$3 from Twin Falls into Nevada came up as a negative factor. The firm, he said, would have 52 trucks on the highway carrying products to California and other areas. The condition of that road is a big concern in considering Twin Falls as a plant site, Dolton added.

He suggested that the state consider that there will always be a jackpot with casinos, bars and other attractions. With that condition will go some drunk drivers on a highway where there is no avenue of escape for the motorists who, are usually the victims of accidents.

Last September, just after four persons had died in three traffic accidents, Dick Burwell, chairman of the chamber of commerce transportation committee, called for an aggressive effort to achieve improvements on the road. He suggested warning signs telling travelers they had reached a dangerous section of highway, asking drivers to turn on their lights and urging that they be prepared to take evasive action while driving.

Matt Smith, a member of the chamber committee, wrote Dolton in November, just before the six Pocatello area people died in a single accident. Smith said there is tremendous business potential for Twin Falls should a freeway be built between this city and Wells, Nev. Smith pointed out that Twin Falls is the major service and supply center for Jackpot and noted plans by Sierra Pacific Resources to build an energy park near Wells with a potential for 1,250 jobs.

A freeway runs to Elko, Smith said, but if a similar road would connect with Twin Falls the economic impact would be tremendous.

Freed prisoner loses fiancée

BONN, West Germany (AP) — Jaroslav Jaworsky spent eight years in jail for trying to slip his fiancée out of Communist Czechoslovakia. When he was freed in an East-West prisoner-exchange, this week, he found out she had married someone else.

Jaworsky, 38, walked to freedom on the Glienicke bridge in Berlin Tuesday along with Soviet dissident Anatoly Shcharansky and two other East Bloc prisoners in exchange for five Communist spies imprisoned in the West.

But the woman he went to jail for has married a Soviet and met in Stockholm, Jaworsky's father, Jiri, told The Associated Press Thursday.

"She was allowed to emigrate because of the marriage," the father said in a telephone interview from his home in Heilbronn, north of Stuttgart.

He said his son "was considering getting in touch" with her. He did not say when Jaroslav first found out about the marriage.

The younger Jaworsky was in Stuttgart Thursday and could not be reached for comment.

The Jaworsky family, natives of Prague, had been given permission to emigrate in 1977. The father, a former Czechoslovak tennis champion, played at Wimbledon, went to work in West Germany as a tennis trainer.

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Rematch: N. Idaho in town

TWIN FALLS — One of the College of Southern Idaho's all-time best teams winds up its home season with a bang this weekend — hosting a North Idaho Cardinal team that has to rank as one of that school's all-time best as well.

This is not a collision of nationally ranked team, although it will certainly be. Since CSI invaded Coeur d'Alene last month, the thinking has been that if CSI is indeed the fifth-best junior college team in the nation as the latest rankings show, North Idaho shouldn't be much worse than sixth.

This two-game series has the storied "Hollywood script."

The main thrust is this. Although CSI is 26-7 and 7-1 in the northern division of Region 18, the Golden Eagles still really haven't won anything. A sweep or split of this

series would give them a berth in the regional finals in Utah. A double loss at the Cardinals' hands would mean they're in virtually a must-win position when they wind up the season at Ricks in Rexburg next week.

On the other hand, North Idaho, because CSI pinned a one-point loss on them in Coeur d'Alene to blenheim an otherwise — and up to now — home-team win scenario among the

top three, has the added incentive of knowing it probably will have to beat CSI twice to realize hopes of getting this team to region. A split would let North Idaho even up the season series with CSI and the Cardinals then would be pulling for the Eagles to rap Ricks once or twice.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. — Coach Lefty Driesell has tried to convince his Maryland-basketball team that it's better than the 1985 crew that won 25 games. This year's club might have proven him right after a 77-72 upset victory over top-ranked North Carolina on Thursday night.

"You look at our schedule," Driesell said. "We've played the toughest schedule in the country and I think it's paid off for us."

Len Bias, one of the few players left from the 1985 team, scored on a jump hook with 1:31 left, and Keith Gatlin clinched the victory with four points in the final seven seconds.

"If Lenny Bias isn't the player of the world, I don't know who is," Driesell said. "He made every kind of shot there is, he blocked shots and he got rebounds."

North Carolina was playing its first game in a week, but Coach Dean Smith said that had no effect on the outcome. He congratulated Maryland and said he had no complaints about his own team.

North Carolina dropped to 25-2, in falling to 9-2 in the ACC. The Tar Heels relinquished first place in the league to second-ranked Duke.

Joe Wolf broke the 69-69 regulation deadlock with a free throw, but Maryland took a 71-70 edge on Tom Jones' drive with 3:25 left to play.

Wolf came back with a layup on a pass from Steve Hale, but Bias tossed in his jump hook to put the Tar Heels in command 73-72 with 1:51 left.

Following a timeout, Brad Daugherty intercepted Gatlin's inbound pass. But as Kenny Smith drove to the basket, Bias blocked his shot and came down with the rebound with 15 seconds left to play.

Gatlin was fouled and sank both ends of the one-and-one, giving Maryland a 75-72 edge. He then sealed the victory with a layup with six seconds left.

Buhl drops its A-2 lidlifter

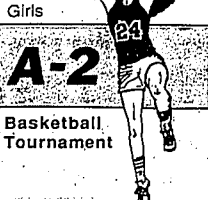

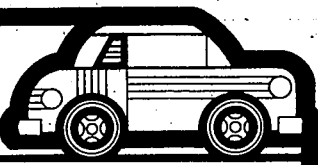

Planning the winning trump finesse is easy in today's doubled spade game. The next step may not come quite so easily.

The heart lead was ruffed in dummy, and a trump to South's jack won as expected. (East's double was a penalty double; he could have bid four no trump for a takeout.) What next for South?

If dummy's seven club winners entice South into attempting to split trumps 3-2, he is in for a bad time. West discards to bring bad news, and now there is no hope. South can ruff a second heart in dummy, but regardless of how he continues, South's maximum is only eight tricks.

South makes his game if he retains trump control. After the trump finesse wins, he should lead a low trump, surrendering a trick to East. (East's penalty double almost surely guarantees the trump stack.) East can take his two high diamonds, but that is all. East forces dummy to ruff, but South enters his hand in clubs to draw the trumps. Hand dummy's remaining clubs bring the total to 10 tricks.

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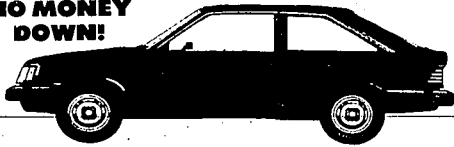

Painter's piano piece strikes magazine note

TWIN FALLS — A lifetime of drawing and painting has culminated in two exciting events of recognition for Pam Shropshire.

Her three hand-painted ornaments were chosen, with others from around the world, to adorn a Christmas tree on display for two weeks in December at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington, D.C., and a photograph of a medium-grand piano she completely refinished and painted for a friend appeared in the January-February issue of "The Decorative Painter," along with an explanatory article.

This was the first time anything had been submitted to the magazine from the Magic Valley chapter of the National Society of Toile and Decorative Painters, and, Shropshire says, to have it accepted was an honor. "The Decorative Painter" has a circulation of about 35,000 in the United States, Canada, Mexico, Europe, the Middle East, Central America and the Orient.

Refurbishing the old piano is compatible with the purpose of the magazine, she adds, which is to promote decorative painting as an art, not only a hobby.

Painting and decorating "raw furniture" is not new to Shropshire, but she says this piece was a project bigger than anything she had yet undertaken.

It started with a request from a painting student of her's, Kathleen Hayden, to repair and repaint a piano bench, shopworn from years of use by her mother's students. It turned out so well that Hayden asked the artist to tackle the piano too.

The idea took her breath away, Shropshire says, but "I love challenges," so she agreed.

The piano needed a lot of work. There were chips, gouges and nicks every place but on the lid. The completed job, which entailed cleaning,

repairing, stripping, sanding, painting and finishing, matches perfectly with the lid in a way which the artist and Hayden say they can only describe as amazing.

It took close to three months, and, says Shropshire, she became a fixture at the Hayden household.

Both women laugh, remembering the period of close proximity. "We had water problems, kids, phones and pet sitters to line up. One time the dog crawled under the piano with me and we held paws while I continued working," says Shropshire.

She couldn't explain to the Haydens how she was going to go about the job, Shropshire says; her ideas changed each day, and Hayden admits each member of her family went through periods of apprehension.

"My husband asked if I was 'sure about this,'" she says, and she told him it would be fine. "Just trust me." "My daughter worried it wouldn't be finished before her wedding; it was" ... and Shropshire remembers 16-year-old John asking, "Have you ever painted a piano before?"

When she said she hadn't, "there was actually a look of terror on his face," she chuckles.

But, she says, "I knew it could so beautiful again. It was sort of a love affair, working on this piano, and I was sad when it was over."

The colors were adapted to other furniture in the house, but the design is her own, and "it was great to have it in the magazine."

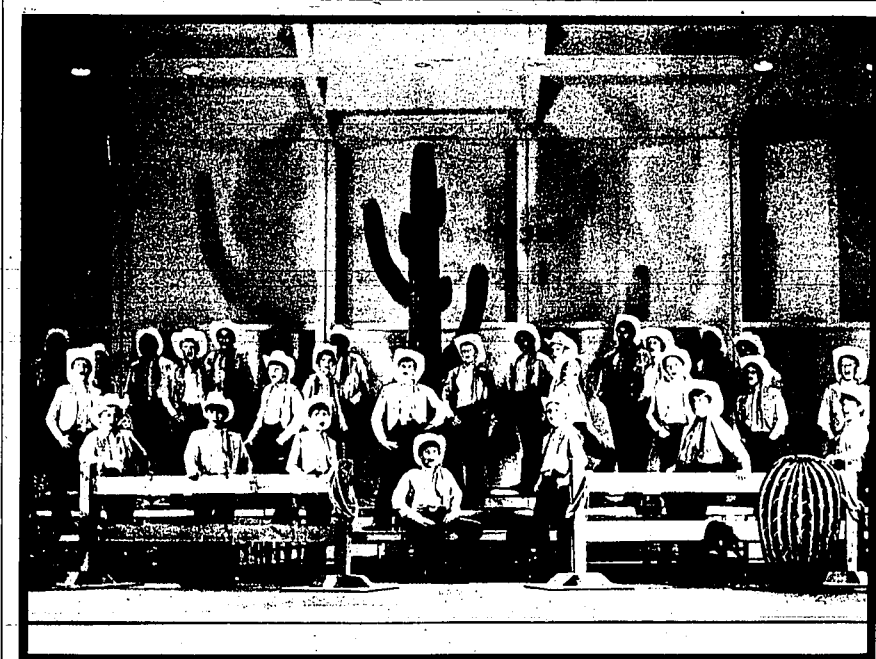
It was the U.S. Department of Horticulture that asked members of the National Society of Toile and Decorative Painters to make ornaments to deck the tree at the Smithsonian.

The Society, in turn, sent painting surfaces suitable to their theme "Art of the Heart -- Heart of the Art" -- to those who applied and completed job, which entailed cleaning,

ed albums and been featured in television specials. In 1987, the group is scheduled to tour China, Japan, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Singapore.

The boys in the touring chorus are chosen from a group of 100 who form the Training and Townesinger choruses. Ranging in age from eight to 15, the boys are required to earn top grades in school as well as excel at singing.

Tickets are available at the Music Center, Warner Music, Welch Music and Ann's Hallmark in Twin Falls, and Sav-Mor Drug in Buhl. Cost is \$5 adults, \$3 students and senior citizens.

Signed Twain book discovered in closet

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — A book written and autographed by Mark Twain, which contains a story about a slave family's sale, has been discovered in a closet by a descendant of one of the slaves and donated to the University of Maryland.

With Twain's signature and inscribed note to the subject of his story, the 1875 "Sketches, New and Old," is likely worth several thousand dollars.

But Leon Condol, 98, the great-grandson of a slave who was separated from his mother by the sale and reunited by hap-

pendance during the Civil War, said he didn't consider selling the book and thinks the university "can take good care of it."

Condol found the book in the back of a closet at his Washington home when an antique dealer helped him and his wife moved out a few weeks ago to enter a nursing home. He donated it to the university last week.

Twain wrote about Mary Cord in a sketch entitled, "A True Story Word for Word as I Heard It." It appeared in Atlantic Monthly in 1874.

Anti-drug rock concert plan irks neighborhood

PASADENA, Calif. (AP) — City directors have approved negotiations with a firm that wants the Rose Bowl for an 11-hour anti-drug rock concert sponsored by first lady Nancy Reagan, but neighbors of the stadium are upset.

A circulated list of stars slated for the concert "That Counts" included Madonna, the Pointer Sisters, Aretha Franklin, Mr. Mister, the Beach Boys, Sheena Easton and George Michael of Wham!

The vote late Tuesday by the Board of Directors, which serves as this suburb's city council, opened the way for Global Media Ltd. to bargain for the 105,000-seat open stadium. The vote was 5-0, with one abstention and one member absent.

Rock concerts have not been held in the Rose Bowl since 1982 when the noise and traffic from a day-long concert resulted in a storm of protest from residents, who kept the

Rose Bowl out of the 1984 final Victory Tour concerts by the Jacksons. The concert scheduled for April 26 will be broadcast to 150 countries, with pleas for donations to the Nancy Reagan Drug Abuse Fund and other drug awareness programs.

But Rose Bowl neighbors from the Arroyo Seco section of the city objected to the potential noise and crowds and questioned the short notice the public received about the hearing for the concert.

The concert had been discussed earlier this month and in January at closed meetings of the board's enterprise committee. Promoters told that committee they did not want public discussion of the concert until late February, when a announcement about the event by Mrs. Reagan was scheduled.

"I understand the promoters wanted this to be kept under wraps until Nancy Reagan had a chance to

make an announcement. It also seems this under-wraps approach was a convenient way to keep the event from coming under public scrutiny," said resident Cordie Ennis.

"Maybe she ought to invite these bands to play in her front yard," Rose Bowl neighbor Idelle Cowles said. Mrs. Reagan, Global Media Ltd., based in Marina Del Rey, has said it will not comment on the concert during the development stage. The company

was formed by Live Aid co-producers Hal Uplinger and Tony Verma, who received credit for helping to turn last summer's Anglo-American concert that raised \$82 million to fight hunger.

City staff estimated Pasadena will earn about \$226,000 by leasing the Rose Bowl for the concert. The board instructed the staff Tuesday to negotiate with the promoters for additional funds to be earmarked for drug abuse programs in Pasadena.

judged the ones to go to Washington, D.C.

Shropshire's ornaments, done on heart-shaped surfaces, were selected and remain in the permanent collection of the Smithsonian, in the Museum of American History, where, she says, art that portrays "Americana" is retained.

Invitations for a private showing of the trees were received and, Shropshire says, she was disappointed not to be able to get away to attend at that time.

Then, with the holidays approaching, "We had no plans whatsoever to go back east for Christmas," although her husband's family lives in Delaware. Her mother-in-law was persistent however, and a friend reminded her she would be able to see her ornaments.

"I had forgotten all about it. I

The Shropshires made the trip, and "it was so thrilling to be there and to know something of mine is permanently in the Smithsonian."

Shropshire has painted in "folk-art" form for the past ten years. There is "so much love" in this style, she says. There are doves and hearts, and things in sets of three — as the sprays of roses on the piano lid — which "deplete the Trinity."

The artist radiates intensity and excitement about this "valuable craft" (decorative paintings) which, she says, is "such a large part of art that to use just the word 'tole' is confining; it's becoming obsolete."

Surrounded by practical and ornamental pieces she has painted; Shropshire explains each culture has its own specific style of decorative art, which the Society is revitalizing and promoting. Among others, she

Decorative painting is "a learned skill that takes a great deal of time and patience," she says, and to perfect her own style and skill, Shropshire continues to travel to classes.

She teaches privately in Buhl, at her home in Twin Falls, at the College of Southern Idaho and has instructed in Boise "a couple of times."

The artist loves what she does. "I eat, breathe and sleep painting, and it's a standing joke that if it stands still long enough I'll paint it."

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Herrett Museum given Peruvian weavings

TWIN FALLS — A recent donation of Peruvian textile fragments to the Herrett Museum is now available for viewing by appointment.

The collection of 209 fragments, showing the weaving techniques from various Peruvian cultures, were donated by Jeanne Bryan, formerly of Idaho Falls.

"Textiles were very valuable to the Peruvians," Phyllis Morgret, curator of collections, says. "They were the first things hidden from the Spanish. Textiles, to them, were far more valuable than gold."

Morgret says the swatches in the museum's collection were woven between 200 B.C. and A.D. 1550. "The swatches are an excellent sampling of the over 200 weaving techniques developed in Peru," she says, adding, "Whether they were weaving exquisitely designed gauzes from hand-spun cotton yarn less than 1 millimeter thick, or cotton armor from yarn 6 millimeters thick, the Peruvians excelled."

Explaining how the soft material survived to this day, Morgret attributes the durability to the cotton, which has an acid content just right for preservation. However, she says that present-day pot hunters find the woven fabrics, then cut them into fragments in an attempt to make greater profits.

As Morgret explains it, some of the techniques represented in the collection are plain weave, a simple "over one yarn, under one yarn," a complicated method with a variety of number of yarns; and embroidery,

a decorative yarn added by hand with a needle to the loom-woven foundation cloth.

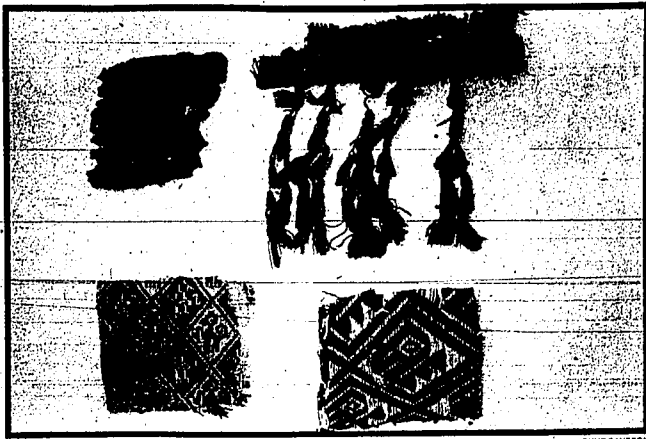
Also represented is double cloth, two pieces of cloth woven at the same time by two women with some of the yarns from each cloth crossing over to the other cloth as needed for the chosen design, and supplementary decorative yarns, extra yarns woven into the cloth at the horizontal welt or vertical warp selvages (a selvage being the finished edge of a cloth that prevents it from unraveling).

Morgret says that when needed for the design—the yarns—were woven into the cloth; or, when not needed, they were left to float on the back. "Most cultures wove textiles with two selvages on the welt edges only, using fringe or tassels to finish the warp edges. The Peruvians perfected their weaving to such a degree that they wove selvages on all four edges."

Before the arrival of the Europeans and the development of machinery, the Peruvians had developed back-strap loom weaving to an extent that was seldom equaled in the Old or New Worlds, Morgret explains. She says the Incas, in Inca, had their own weaving ability on techniques they learned from their predecessors and contemporaries — the Nazca, Chimu and Chanéay cultures.

"Prior to these cultures, the Peruvians had developed hand embroidery abilities of the Paracas people (1,000-100 B.C.) excelled all other weavers of the world," she says, adding, "Their embroidery expertise was never again equaled in Peru."

Morgret says that the most common weaving materials in Peru were cotton and the hair of the camelid animals, the llama, alpaca, and vicuña. Cotton was grown in shades of white or brown. Because of the lack of mordants (a substance used to fix a color when dyeing) it was difficult for the Peruvians to dye cotton. The one exception was blue. Blues were made by

using leaves of various shrubs; reds and blacks from the cochineal insect and yellows from the bark of the false pepper tree. She says that resist dye was accomplished by placing beeswax on the finished foundation cloth in the desired design and then the rest of the cloth was dyed a different color. "When the cloth was dry," she

says, "the wax was removed, leaving a design in the original color." Morgret says the Herrett is the only museum in Idaho that has pre-Columbian artifacts, including the swatches. She points out that the swatches won't be on public display, but says that scholars and interested parties can view them by appointment.

Miller manuscript sets sale record

NEW YORK (AP) — The manuscript of Henry Miller's "Tropic of Cancer" sold at auction Friday for \$165,000, a record for a modern manuscript sold in the United States, said a spokesman for Sotheby's auction house.

John Fleming, a New York book dealer, bought the 926-page, mostly typewritten manuscript on behalf of an unidentified party planning to put it on deposit in the Morgan Library in Manhattan, said Matthew Weizman, the spokesman.

"Tropic of Cancer" was written in Paris in 1932-33 and published there in 1934, causing a sensation because of its uninhibited descriptions of the author's sex life and free use of obscene words.

The book was banned as obscene in the United States.

British tune in the meanest mouth in London

LONDON (AP) — When Brian Hayes begins his daily show, true English ladies and gentlemen may instinctively turn off their radios.

But dozens of other listeners jam the studio switchboard, eager to cross swords with the meanest mouth in London.

In New York or Los Angeles, where the abusive talk show has been elevated to something of an art form, Hayes may sound relatively tame. Indeed, he would never stoop to outright insult.

However, in England, where modesty and fine manners are still regarded as the social norm, Hayes' hectoring, argumentative style is often regarded as thoroughly rude.

The British Broadcasting Corp., which once refused him a job, still wouldn't have him even though his three hours a day of chat and inter-

views on London Broadcasting Corp., an independent station, attracts up to half a million listeners.

"It's not something that could ever happen at the BBC. We don't believe in being rude to our listeners," said John Stanley, a BBC news anchor.

Don't bother telephoning Hayes to talk about the weather. He only wants callers who can set off a blistering row. Whatever you feel about the argument, his tirades on food, abortion, communism or fluoridated water, Hayes can be relied on to disagree.

The moment he senses the caller wavering, he cuts off him or her. "But let me finish," the caller bleats. "Sorry Trevor, you obviously don't know what you're talking about. Next. Hello, Anne in Kensington..."

No delicate social deflection here. "Oh, hm, yes, you're probably right or not on the other hand..." Hayes is happiest when he has pushed his victim into a corner. He sometimes even hangs up without so much as a thank you.

But Hayes isn't even British. He was born in Australia, which to some English minds explains everything.

Hayes himself doesn't think a true Englishman could have pulled off his kind of show. Anne de Courcy, author of a guide to modern British manners, tends to agree. "We're a small and overcrowded country and I think this is what produces our traditional reserve. In argument becomes a form of trespass into a person's privacy," she said in an interview.

Hayes runs his show like a pretty tough ringmaster. "I know I would never dare to cut him," said Clancy Sigal, an American media reviewer

living in London.

Hayes said in an interview, he was looking for a format which "was not necessarily part of the perceived national character."

That character, he says, consisted of "a kind of false gentility" for which he blames the BBC. "They had always given the impression that those who speak in public speak in a certain way, have to have a certain accent to be understood, have to be terribly responsible, not to be extreme, and that was of course all phony."

Ten years ago British radio was dull, Hayes said. "They didn't know how to run phone-in programs, the idea that these programs were supposed to be about argument, about discussion."

His aim was "to stake up argument, to push the caller into a corner or allow yourself to be pushed into a corner."

At first there were howls of outrage. Members of Parliament complained that Hayes was rude and arrogant. He was accused of being a closet left-winger and a closet right-winger. There were threats, he said, to withdraw advertising.

Hayes is routinely described in the press as the rudest man on radio. Naturally, he disagrees.

"I don't think I'm rude," he said. "It depends on your interpretation of the word rude." However, he does not mind being called aggressive.

Outside the studio he is an affable, unpretentious 46-year-old who lives with his wife and son in a south London suburb, and studiously avoids the celebrity circuit.

Opinions are divided on whether

the Hayes show represents a change in the Englishman's capacity for argument.

Media critic Paul Johnson believes it is part of a tradition of tough interviewing rooted in Question Time, when cabinet ministers have to face a grilling from members of Parliament and be ready with detailed answers to unexpected questions.

However, Anne de Courcy thinks Hayes represents a change of national character. "Contact, especially in the workplace, has become slightly less face-to-face," she said. "But it is more instant, more immediate, because it is done by telephone or computer."

Klinghoffer film planned

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Producer Tamara Asseyev has acquired the movie rights to the story of Marilyn and Leon Klinghoffer and the terrorist hijacking of the cruise ship Achille Lauro.

Asseyev, who is under exclusive contract to New World Television, will develop the movie, "Sledge at Sea," for NBC.

The Klinghoffers were vacationing aboard the Italian cruise ship when it was seized by terrorists in October 1985. Klinghoffer was the only passenger killed. Mrs. Klinghoffer recently died of cancer.

"We are committed to presenting an accurate and sensitive account, done with dignity and taste, of this ordinary man who was victimized by foreign terrorists," said Asseyev. She co-produced "Norma Rae" and has produced other theatrical films.

CSI seeks grant for anthropology

TWIN FALLS — When the board and staff of the Association for the Humanities in Idaho meet today in Boise, one of their considerations will be a \$500 grant to the Herrett Museum on the College of Southern Idaho Campus.

According to Herrett director Jim Woods, if the proposed grant meets approval it will go toward the First Annual Don Crabtree Memorial Lecture in Anthropology to be conducted at the Herrett Museum on the campus. The late Don Crabtree was a noted anthropologist from the Magic Valley who taught flintknapping techniques to scholars throughout the world.

Woods says that the grant would go toward bringing Thomas Hester of the University of Texas to Twin Falls to lecture on anthropology.

Results of the association's decision concerning the grant will be announced by Monday.

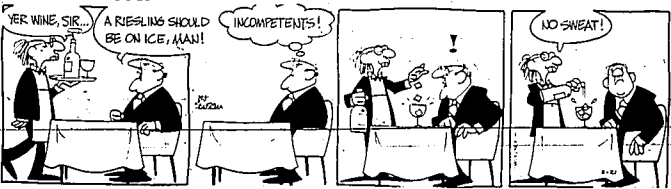

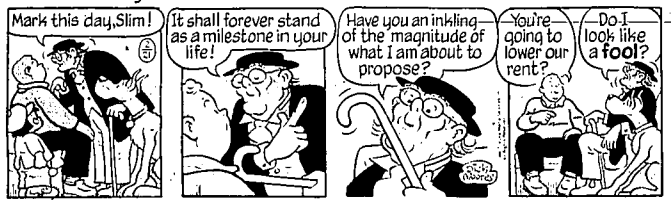

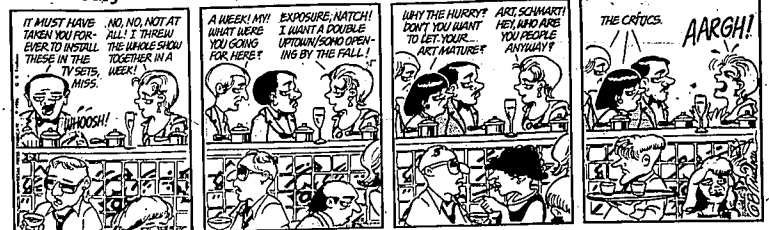

Heavy histrionics weaken 'Delta Force'

Hollywood rewrites recent history once again with "The Delta Force," a slam-bang re-creation of last year's TWA hijacking-and-hostage nightmare. From the initial skyjacking in Athens, to the murder of a U.S. Navy diver, to the calming touch of a heroic stewardess, "The Delta Force" seems to follow the ugly adventure of Flight 87 movie by movie.

That is, until Chuck Norris shows up and kicks the terrorists' tails from Lebanon to the Walling Wall.

As Major Scott McCoy, a member of the elite military team known as the Delta Force, Norris gives Islamic fanatics a piece of America's mind when he and his men are ordered to rescue airline-passengers from the local Jihad. "Let's not screw this one up," McCoy says, paraphrasing Rambo, to his commanding officer (Lee Marvin) as Delta Force departs for Lebanon, referring to Delta Force's aborted rescue of

America's Iranian hostages a few years earlier. That disaster, re-created in the movie's opening scene, prompted McCoy to retire from active duty. But when news of the latest skyjacking reaches him on his horse farm, he immediately heads for the airport.

"The Delta Force" is a standard Norris blow-'em-up. Filmed in Israel and directed by Menahem Golan, it moves quickly, predictably and with fairly decent production values. The film revels in its own woodenness, with a script of comic-book dialogue that is only as functional as it needs to be.

Norris sleepwalks through the film with his usual air of knowing nonchalance and ultracompetence; his primary co-star this time around is a killer motorcycle that boasts machine-guns-and-miniature-rockets. And when McCoy dispatches a terrorist with the line, "Sleep tight, sucker," the film makers are keying in on the element of reverence so deeply ingrained in Hollywood's exploitative patriotism.

The supporting performances are solidly unsensational. A cast of veterans appears as the hostages — Joey Bishop and Laine Kazan as one vacationing couple, Martin Balsam and Shelley Winters as another, George Kennedy is a brave, reassuring Catholic priest who insists on being imprisoned with the other passengers who have Jewish-sounding names. "The Delta Force" works as well as it does, though, because of the frightening believability of Robert Forster and David Menahem as the chief hijackers, Abdul and Mustafa.

One surprising and effective casting choice is that of the talented European actress Hanna Schygulla ("The Marriage of Maria Braun") as Ingrid, the sturdy, stow-away-minded blond on Uli Derickson, one of the real-life heroes of flight 847. Schygulla's character is pressed to retrieve passengers from Jewish passengers, and her brave patience even manages to calm a panicky terrorist.

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ENEMY MINE (PG-13). Holocaust film shows in Germany

The film by French producer-director Claude Lanzmann depicts the fate of the estimated 6 million Jews exterminated by the Nazis.

There was almost complete silence from the sell-out crowd of 800 in the West Berlin theater during the first half of the 9½-hour documentary. The rest of the film will be shown Tuesday.

It took him more than 10 years to make the film at concentration camps sites, including Treblinka, Auschwitz, Chelmno and Sobibor, Poland.

He used no film material, choosing to film places where the killing was done and the faces of survivors.

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'Lord of the Flies' still besieges Golding

WASHINGTON — It's question-and-answer time at the Library of Congress reading, and William Golding winces like a man who expects to be slapped. He gingerly directs a finger at a woman in the audience. She does not disappoint. She asks about "Lord of the Flies."

He gathers his bantam frame into a crouch behind the lectern while raising a protective arm to his wispy-white brow.

It's a response more eloquent than words — although Golding, never at a loss for them, manages to express himself further in an interview.

"I think it was Rachmannoff — wasn't it? — who wrote the famous C-sharp minor Prelude, you see," says the Famous English Novelist, neatly rounding every vowel. "Well, they wouldn't let him off the concert stage till he played it. He was sick to the teeth of it. He'd come back for about five encores, hold his hands up like that, but they'd keep on stamping, and he'd have to play the damn thing. Well, I guess that's why he was so nervous."

"I know people are going to talk about it. I know what they're going to ask me about it. And I know what their opinions are going to be — and they're going to give me those opinions. And I will express delighted surprise at a new thought that comes along. It's all, all cut and dried."

He efficiently inhabits a wing chair in the Library of Congress poetry office — an economy-sized Nobel laureate complete with sage beard and wizened face. Reeling from a 10-city tour of Canada, he looks like a man who doesn't suffer fools gladly — but suffers all the same. His wince is ever-ready.

"It's just like the pain barrier in athletics," Golding says, trying to explain why the mere act of giving an interview makes him feel unclean. "You have to go through a period of self-disgust and come out the other end when you realize you're just doing a job like anybody else. But it's a form of literary exhibitionism, you see, and I think exhibitionism of any sort probably leads to certain moments of self-disgust. I can't put it any plainer than that."

Yet in the 31 years since his first novel, "Lord of the Flies," began its inexorable climb to "over 7 million copies in print" — enriching his life and enlarging his fame — he has given so many interviews. It's a fact he might be expected to find deeply troubling.

"I would be deeply troubled by it — this is going to be paradoxical and make nonsense — if I weren't deeply troubled by it. You see? So as long as I keep my deep trouble, I'm okay. Hang on to that pain, it's all you've got."

He laughs a haggard laugh.

At 74, Golding can boast a certifiable classic — the unavoidable, ubiquitous "Flies" ("I have written other books, books I like better") — and a dozen less widely read works, including novels, short stories, book of poetry, a play, two essay collections and, lately, "An Egyptian Journal," a meandering nonfiction account of a meander down the Nile.

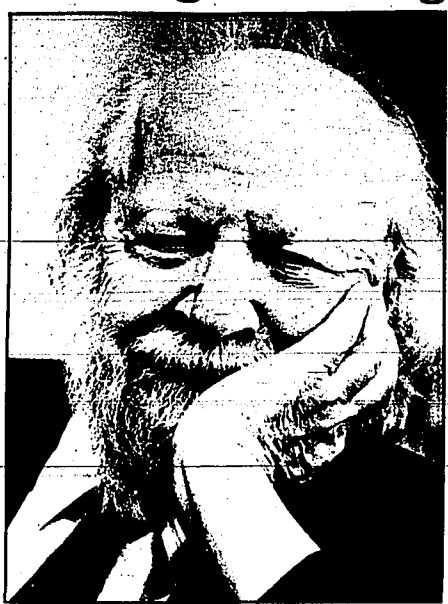
"I shouldn't have done it," he says of his latest book, which came out recently to mixed reviews. "I got myself into a sort of feverish state, and one way and another, so much was going on, I was supposed to be in three places at once and I did this in a state of semnamulism. I look back and think, 'Thank God I'm not there anymore!' I still don't know how I talked myself into it or somebody talked me into it. That's the publishing world for you."

Golding — who sees himself, when it comes to literary critics, as "a Moving Target," the title of his most recent essay collection — undertook the river journey amid a squall of controversy whipped up by the Nobel Prize for Literature he received in 1983.

It began when the Swedish Academy conferred the honor, commending Golding to Swift and Melville, and praising his novels as "not only somber moralities and dark myths about evil and treacherous, destructive forces, (but) also colorful tales of adventure." A renegade academy member, Artur Lundkvist, then created an unprecedented public flap by holding a press conference to denounce the winner as "a little English phenomenon of no special interest... decent but hardly in the Nobel Prize class." At the time Golding laughed off the outburst as "one man screaming in a rage" — but the memory of it still rankles.

"Oh, I see, we're getting around to that one," he says when asked if he ever met the cantankerous Swede. "I thought it would rear its head. No, I didn't meet Mr. Witheroff. It was, I really was so naive. I didn't understand how boringly eternal this phenomenon would be. As I said at the time, everybody knows, for God's sake, that a different committee would have chosen a different writer. This was being human. Because literary judgments are subjective. I said this loud and plain, and everybody goes on — like you, I'm afraid — asking the same bloody boring questions."

Asked how the Nobel has changed his life, Golding gets positively felty. "I wasn't hooted at in the streets," he snaps. "I wasn't debarré from either of my clubs. I saw a large increase in my bank balance and I also found out instantly how many people don't like me. The only thing I can say about all these people — whoever they are that I hear vaguely of — is they're none of them. I won the Nobel Prize, and I have. Occasionally one just feels like taking a

beautiful long running kick at the next person who raises the subject."

Growing up in pastoral Cornwall the son of a schoolmaster-father and suffragette-mother, William Golding was a terror of a tyke. "I was used to being adored for I was an attractive child in an Anglo-Saxon sort of way," he recalls in an autobiographical essay, "Billy-the-Kid," about his brief career as a spoiled brat and bully. "I... enjoyed hurting people."

Much later, after an education that spanned Latin and Greek, Oxford, the Royal Navy and World War II — which taught him "that man produces evil as a bee produces honey" — he would become a close observer of the human species. He was raising a family and making his way as an educator when he produced his first novel at age 43.

His books since have ranged widely and ambitiously over many styles and tones — from the raw Neanderthal narrative of cave dwellers in "The Inheritors" to the epistolary elegance of a young 19th-century

aristocrat in "Rites of Passage." But, while different from one another, all of his novels chip away at the civilized veneer of humanity. Golding embraced his overarching theme, The Fall of Man, from the very beginning — to wit, the stark chronicle in "Lord of the Flies" of English schoolboys marooned on an island.

He is a rigorous moralist who, as Robertson Davies has written, "tackles moral problems head on and wrestles them to the floor."

"Isn't it awful, I suppose so," Golding agrees. "I think anybody who's taken any given art seriously finds himself at some point concerned with moral issues. He can't avoid it. Morality is only a serious look at life. Isn't it? The relationship between people. It sounds terribly dull, and maybe it is. But after all, you must admit that the novel is a fairly painless way of dealing with morals. It's not like preaching unmitigated sermons. Novels persuade to virtue, they don't order to it."

Hasty Pudding Award goes to actor Stallone

CAMBRIDGE, Mass. (AP) — Actor-producer Sylvester Stallone endured protesters, a drink of raw eggs and the embrace of two hefty men in drag Tuesday night before receiving the 1986 Man of the Year award from the Hasty Pudding Theater.

Stallone, star of the movies "Rocky" and "Rambo: First Blood Part II," gulped down the eggs as he was toasted by members of the theater's company, then raised a clenched fist as the audience cheered.

However, after his hairy hug by a couple of cast members in the theater's production "Between the Sheets," Stallone told the gathering, "I'll take the eggs any day."

Before the awards ceremony, about 100 Asian-Americans and Vietnam War veterans picketed in front of the theater, protesting Stallone's depiction of Asians and of war in his movies. The Rambo character was a Vietnam veteran who returns to Southeast Asia seeking American prisoners of war.

Police said there were no arrests, but during a press conference later, three young men were escorted out after they waved a homemade flag with a swastika and shouted that Stallone deserved the "Nazi of the year award." They, too, were not arrested.

Before he received the traditional pudding pot, Stallone was outfitted with a brassiere made of Army camouflage material with fake golden grenades as tassels. Another gag gift included four make-believe books marked "Gandhi I, II, III and IV," a spoof contrasting the pacifist Indian

leader and Stallone's "Rocky" series about a boxer. Before joining his new wife, actress Brigitte Nielsen, 22, in the audience to watch "Between the Sheets," Stallone said, "Now that I've been thoroughly humiliated, words don't come easy to me. The eggs, you know."

"I really appreciate being part of your dream, your sense of humor and your overall theatricality," he said. Hasty Pudding, which began in 1795, is the oldest theatrical group in the country.

"We are protesting the award and, by implication, Stallone's work," said former U.S. Marine Pfc. Paul Atwood, one of the protesters. "We think that rough, tough Rambo would have poked his guts out if he had to face what we did."

Atwood said the protesters also resent the way Stallone's pictures glorify war for youngsters. "We're having a difficult time dissuading them that war is not glorious," he said.

The Theatricals' press release cites the Rambo films as strengthening Stallone's bond "between himself and the American public, introducing yet another solid and unforgettable character to American cinema." Stallone, 39, was scheduled to receive the theatrical group's "pudding pot" for making "a lasting and impressive contribution to the world of entertainment."

Among previous recipients of the award, which was first presented in 1967 to Bob Hope, are James Stewart, Steven Spielberg and Robert DeNiro.

Actress Sally Field received the Woman of the Year award last Tuesday.

'Crossings' seeks to avoid glitz, sees itself as 'mini-Dr. Zhivago'

"Crossings," airing Feb. 23, 24 and 25 on ABC, is the first novel by mega-romance novelist Fanielle Steel to be dramatized for TV.

Set during World War II, "Crossings" depicts the passions that erupt aboard a trans-Atlantic oceanliner between a dashing steel magnate and the wife of a French ambassador. An Aaron Spelling production ("Dynasty," "The Love Boat," et al.), one wonders whether this miniseries will seem more like "The Last Boat."

"Miniseries are often padded, which puts a bad taste in people's mouths," she says. "But I hope the genre continues because there are a lot of advantages: You get more money, more production values and

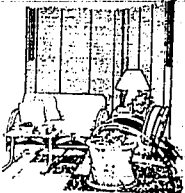

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Nielsen ratings

Lions and tigers and bad ratings, oh my! 'Wizard' hits 30-year low

NEW YORK — NBC, with "The Cosby Show" and five other programs in the Top 10, won the ratings in a week made notable by the weakest performance of "The Wizard of Oz" in its 28 network showings dating back to 1955.

According to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co., NBC averaged an 18.2 rating in prime time during the week of Feb. 10-16. CBS had a 17.3 and ABC a 15.5.

With nine weeks left in the 30-week season, NBC leads with a 17.9 to CBS' 17.0 and ABC's 15.1. CBS would need to win by 2.1 ratings points each week to overtake NBC, a virtual impossibility given the strength of NBC's regular series.

A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.

NBC's blockbuster Thursday lineup paced the victory. "The Cosby Show" ranked first again with a 35.2 rating. An hour episode of "Family Ties" was second with a 30.0 and "Cheers" was fifth with a 23.9. The heavily promoted episode of "Hill Street Blues," in which Capt. Frank Furillo was shot, placed 20th with a 19.6 rating, its best performance in nearly two years.

In the rest of the Top 10, CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" was third, CBS' "60 Minutes" was fourth, ABC's "Dynasty," sixth, ABC's movie, "Mr. Mom," seventh, NBC's "Highway to Heaven," eighth, NBC's "Miami Vice," ninth, and NBC's "Golden Girls," 10th.

Even though "The Wizard of Oz" had its poorest outing, theatrical films performed well last week. For several years now, feature films, which are available on pay-cable and video cassettes first, have suffered TV ratings declines. But last week, ABC's "Mr. Mom" was No. 7, NBC's "An Officer and a Gentleman" No. 16 and CBS' "The Wizard of Oz" 22nd.

Network researchers considered that overall performance an aberration. "We're not likely to see that again," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director.

The biggest surprise may have been "Mr. Mom," which was the highest rated "ABC Sunday Night Movie" of the season, reversing, for one week, the trend of made-for-TV

films beating theatrical releases.

NBC had forecast that its "The Last Days of Frank and Jesse James," starring Kris Kristofferson and Johnny Cash, would easily beat "Thompson's Last Run," a CBS TV movie starring Robert Mitchum, and "Mr. Mom," a comedy starring Michael Keaton. CBS also figured low ratings for "Mr. Mom."

"Thompson's Last Run," a drama, finished 26th and "The Last Days of Frank and Jesse James," a western, was 44th out of 66 shows. "Counter-programming a comedy against two serious films obviously worked for them," Eisenberg said.

"Considering the competition, 'Mr. Mom' was the one women would more likely watch," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Eisenberg was disappointed in the showing of the perennial "Wizard of Oz," which has been a network bulwark, averaging a 26.4 rating in 30 years on CBS and NBC. Last Saturday night, it had an 18.4 rating and only a 29 share (percentage of the sets in use for the time period.) Yet, that performance marked the best movie rating CBS has achieved this season on Saturday, which is the lowest-rated TV night of the week.

"We know Saturday night is a night when people view VCRs (video cassette recorders) instead of wat-

ching network TV," said Eisenberg. "That tends to have a depressing effect, but we believed that the 'Wizard of Oz' is the 'Wizard of Oz' and its magic would sustain its ratings level. We still had faith that it would get a share in the 30s."

Normally, CBS schedules "The Wizard of Oz" in March, but placed it in February, a sweeps month when local station ratings are measured, and determine ad rates for the next few months. With the apparent loss of the prime-time season to NBC, the sweeps have taken on added importance for CBS.

"We're looking to grab some pieces of the apple," Eisenberg said.

The bottom five, in descending order, included the debut of ABC's "Fortune Dane," the action series, starring Carl Weathers, in 62nd, NBC's "Punky Brewster," ABC's "Benson," ABC's movie, "Best Friends," and ABC's "Ripley's Believe It or Not."

In the evening news competition, the "CBS Evening News" was first with a 14.4. The "NBC Nightly News" averaged a 13.0. ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 12.8. In the morning news-and-information race, NBC's "Today" averaged a 5.8. ABC's "Good Morning America" had a 5.2. The "CBS Morning News" had a 3.1.

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Prolific TV writer Ray Bradbury finally gets to create own series

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. — Ray Bradbury, although one of America's most popular and prolific storytellers, has never written for his own television series.

He wrote for "Alfred Hitchcock Presents" and "The Twilight Zone," but he never created a show. Five of his books have been made into movies, and he's written screenplays for several films, including the 1956 version of "Moby Dick."

"Once I was in a room full of smiling faces and I was ready to sign a contract," he said. "Then I got to thinking that as soon as I signed they'd say, 'No, you can't do this and you can't have that.'"

"So I excused myself, got into a cab and came to my office. I phoned them and said I couldn't do it."

Another time an NBC executive told Bradbury he didn't want anything "highfalutin." Bradbury said he looked at the executive and said, "Highfalutin?"

"The man corrected himself and said he wanted something like Franz Kafka," he recalled with delight. "I said Kafka! Now, that's highfalutin!"

Bradbury did allow his book "Martian Chronicles" to be adapted for television. Trashed for television is closer to what happened. Its ethereal stories were treated with a heavy hand. The roles were miscast. The special effects were amateurish. The greatest sin, Bradbury believes, is that it was boring.

But, fear not, Bradbury has reach-

ed the home screen in his own series, and a new batch of stories bows in this Saturday.

"The Ray Bradbury Theater" made its first appearance on Home Box Office last May. The series picked up three of cable's ACE awards and made Time magazine's "10 best list."

Each episode is adapted from a Bradbury short story. Don't worry that he'll run out of stories. Bradbury, 66, has written a short story a week, or its equivalent while doing a book, since the age of 12.

Among those starring in the new shows are Peter O'Toole, Drew Barrymore and Jeff Goldblum.

The O'Toole show, "Banshee," was inspired by Bradbury's visit to director John Huston's Irish home to consult with him on the screenplay

for "Moby Dick." O'Toole plays the director and Charles Martin Smith the young writer.

Goldblum stars as a city dweller who quickly learns his dream-of-a-rural-paradise is not all that he expected. Miss Barrymore plays a 10-year-old girl whose warnings about a woman's cries coming from underground are ignored by her parents.

Bradbury works in the middle of Beverly Hills in an office that looks like it belongs to a kid with an unlimited supply of toys and treasures. It's filled with posters, stuffed animals, Buck Rogers ray guns, spaceships, robots of all sizes, dinosaurs, stacks of comic books, drawings, a Mickey Mouse telephone and a life-sized doll of Bultwinkle the

Similar message from different TV pulpits: Beware of television

HOLLYWOOD — "Audible wallpaper" is how one scholar scornfully once referred to television, a reference to the ceaseless drone of mind-numbing fare that emanates from the ubiquitous tube.

But anyone unconvinced of television's power to influence and change society, for better and for worse, need only tune in to the conversations of a couple of broadcasting pros like Bill Moyers and Ted Turner.

They would hardly be found preaching from the same pulpit, the introspective journalist Moyers and populist cablecaster Turner. But when waxing about the impact of television, as they both did last week on separate occasions here, their words sound surprisingly similar.

Moyers, the newsmen responsible for the long-running "Bill Moyers' Journal" on PBS as well as numerous special reports on CBS, where he now hangs his hat, has again experienced television's impact first-hand.

Shortly after the recent broadcast of his CBS documentary "The Vanishing Family — Crisis in Black America," Moyers read a "frightening" review in a major national newspaper. The reviewer chastised Moyers for presenting such images of despair when "The Cosby Show" each week does such a magnificent job portraying a positive image of black family life.

"Here was this woman (critic) saying that reality is what prime-time television tells us it is," Moyers said the other day. "This is the scariest thing I have read in a long time." He wrote the critic a very pointed letter in which he added the cautionary note that, if what she said were true, "we are likely one day to have a president who is an actor."

Moyers, the senior analyst for "The CBS Evening News," smiled almost imperceptibly as he delivered that last line. But his message is serious: Television shapes the thinking of America like no other element of pop culture.

In the case of "Vanishing Family," a 90-minute "CBS Reports" that aired Jan. 25, the power of television could be seen both in the behavior of the documentary's inner-city subjects and in the broadcast's reception in Washington.

In the Newark ghetto where the special was shot — and where homes with live-in fathers are in the minority — the TV provides the role model for young black men, Moyers said. Rap stardom, not carpentry or plumbing, is the aspiration they aspire.

"If they go don't go to the street, they go to the tube," he said, interviewed at a local college on the day he was to give the keynote speech at a major fund-raising event. "Hollywood illusions and Madison Avenue hustling shape their perceptions."

The flip side of TV's influence was seen in the disproportionately high share of viewers "Vanishing Family" drew in the nation's capital; 20 percent, compared with an average 14 percent nationwide. "It had an impact," Moyers said, and to prove it, he rattled off a list of seven columnists published in the Washington Post who have written about the issue since the documentary aired.

"The audience for documentaries is small, but the audience comes to a documentary to be engaged, not to be entertained. People generally watch television as consumers. They watch public affairs as citizens."

Turner, who owns Cable News Network and Atlanta superstation WTBS, was speaking before the Hollywood Radio & Television Society last week, flanked by many of the most powerful executives in the entertainment business.

The subject was television. "This industry," Turner said, "has more influence on what the people of this country and the world see and hear than any other. There is more responsibility here for the future of the planet than there is even in the school system."

Turner, in the process of buying MGM, has programmed his share of schlock at WTBS. The station beams a steady diet of network reruns and old movies to cable-TV households across America. But the originator of round-the-clock cable news noted

that he also has "in the last four years probably done more documentaries than all the commercial networks put together."

As a purveyor of broadcast journalism, Turner said that he felt it his responsibility to learn a little more about the world. And the medium by which that same kind of knowledge gets to the masses, he implied, is television.

He referred specifically to "The End of Eden," an upcoming two-hour documentary on Africa to air on WTBS. Turner predicts it will have as much impact as "Threads," the BBC-produced film depicting a fictionalized nuclear holocaust. When the latter show aired in January, 1985, it drew a record number of cable-TV viewers. "The End of Eden," if it does indeed surpass "Threads," has the potential to influence the thinking of more than 10 million Americans about the causes of famine in Africa and possible solutions.

Entertainment shows like ABC's off-again, on-again "Amerika," about a Soviet takeover of the United States, likewise have the potential to steer public opinion; negatively, Turner says. "We should not be making programs that make people hate the Soviets," he said.

Turner thinks the broadcast of the "Goodwill Games," a multinational Olympic-style event to be held in Moscow in July, could do just the opposite and could indeed foster goodwill among the TV-viewing citizens of the planet. The two-week-long games will be cablecast live via WTBS and will be syndicated to other television stations worldwide.

Moyers, too, believes there are some striking examples of the positive benefits of television. Some of them just happen to be programs during his years with PBS, where he hosted the award-winning "A Walk Through the 20th Century With Bill Moyers," and programs at CBS, the network to which he returned four years ago.

Moore sitting in a chair.

"After saying no to everyone else, why did he succumb to the offer from HBO?"

"I was around the producers, Larry Wilcox and Mark Massari, and I got to know them and trust them," he said. "They're a buffer between me and the network. They're concerned with quality. I started a year and a half ago and I insisted on writing all the scripts. I can blame only myself. I'm around when they edit the shows. I'm delighted with what

they've done."

Bradbury said he learned early not to be swayed by money. "I found whenever I got a little money something happened to destroy my life," he said. "I got \$500 from Collier's for a story and the next day broke up with my girl."

"In 1953 before I did 'Moby Dick' I was making about \$150 a week from writing. My wife and I were living in a little tract house. I remember seeing Cinerama and having tears because I'd never been able to travel."

"Moby Dick" was the first time he

made any money, he said, but after that he turned down the screen offers and went back to writing stories and books. He said, "You can make a lot of money writing movies, but nobody ever knows who wrote a movie. Can you tell me who wrote 'Casablanca'? I decided to make my own way in books."

Bradbury recently completed his first murder mystery, "Death Is a Lonely Business," and now is working on another one.

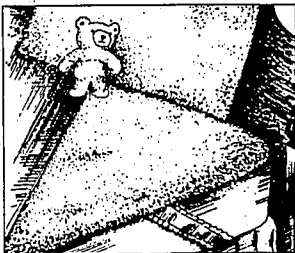

News magazine postponed again

NEW YORK (AP) — The weekly debut of "American Almanac," NBC's long-awaited entry in the prime-time news magazine field, has been postponed again. "We're honor-bound not to go on until we're ready," NBC News President Lawrence K. Grossman said.

NBC, which has gone almost two years without a weekly news magazine to compete with CBS' "60 Minutes" and ABC's "20-20," had scheduled March 4 as the debut of "Almanac" as a regular series. The program, with Roger Mudd as anchor, has been broadcast monthly

since August.

Grossman said he met with the show's executive producer, Ed Foubly, on last week and determined that the program did not have enough strong stories in reserve to start its weekly run. "We didn't want to go on and have to play catch-up," he said.

Grossman said the decision was solely the news division's, and that there was no pressure from NBC Chairman Grant Tinker or NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartkoff.

No new start date was targeted.

"But it won't be too far off," Grossman said. In the meantime, there will be no monthly installments, he said.

Grossman said he was committed to Mudd as anchor and Foubly as executive producer, and that no major changes would be made in the program's 60-member staff.

Some officials within NBC News have been predicting privately that "Almanac," which drew weak ratings in its monthly installments, would never be broadcast during the regular prime-time season that ends April 20.

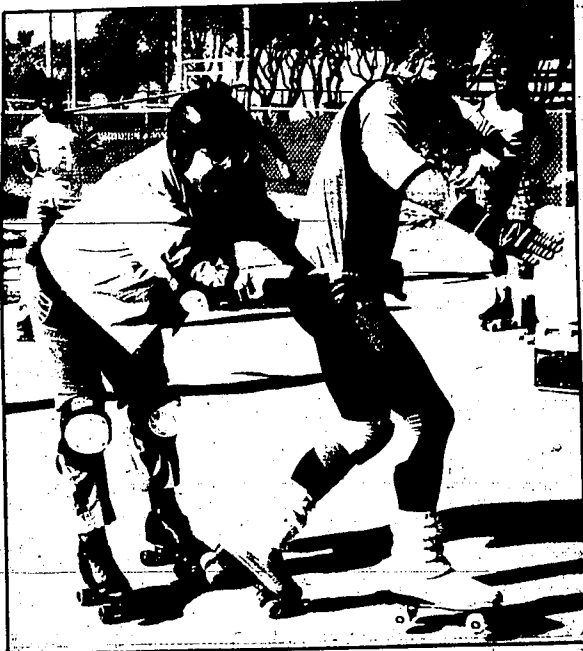

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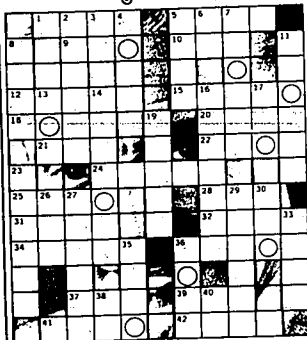

PBS program auction concludes

WASHINGTON — A public TV note: The annual PBS program auction concluded last week as 154 of the nation's public TV licensees chose 26 series for next season's schedule at a cost of about \$39 million.

Reflecting the continuing play-it-safe policy of most member stations, only four new series survived the long bidding process, including "American Masters," an art series

from WNET in New York; "The Day the Universe Changed," a science series from South Carolina Education Television; and "Adventure," which will be produced by the folks who do "Frontline."

The fourth series, "Search for the Mind," a sequel to "The Brain" series, is not scheduled until the 1987-88 season.

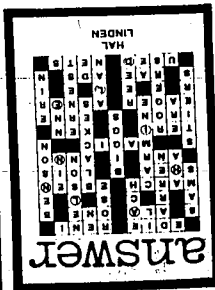
Among the familiar returnees will be "Nova," "Great Performances," "American Playhouse," "Sesame Street," "Wall Street Week," "Frontline" and "The MacNeil-

Lehrer Newslour."

Only two programs now on the PBS schedule failed to be renewed: "Onstage at Wolf Trap" and "Owl TV."

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
