Rainfall records float off

February wettest on NWA's books

KIMBERLY — The weather has been more than unusual in the month of February.

It has set at least three records.

William Galkin of the National Weather Service at Kimberly said the month has been the wettest on record. The 3.95 inches of precipitation recorded for the month as of Thursday makes this an all-time-record wet February by more than an inch, Galkin said. The previous record was about 2.5 inches, but he was unable to recall the year.

The month started out with snow showers in the mountains and rain showers in lower elevations. These increased to downpours of rain, sometimes mixed with snow. Magic Valley-area ski resorts received several feet of snow in some of the season's heaviest storms.

In the past few days record warm temperatures have occurred. While Galkin said he hasn't heard any complaints about the high temperatures, they are unseasonal.

On Monday a high of 68 degrees came close to the warmest February day on record — 70 degrees reached Feb. 26, 1950. But the Monday reading did set an all-time record for Feb. 24, Tuesday, when the mercury climbed to 65 degrees for Twin Falls and Kimberly, a new Feb. 25 record high was set. The previous highs for those dates were 65 degrees on Feb. 24, 1981, and 62 degrees for Feb. 25, 1950 and 1954.

Galkin said it looks as though the same mild weather will continue at least for the next several days. The 30-day forecast, he said, is for above-normal amounts of precipitation and above-normal temperatures.

Senate approves plan to erase Idaho deficit

BOISE (Idaho AP) — With supporters claiming it was time the state broke the "umbilical cord" of revenue to local government, the Idaho Senate Thursday passed an alternative tax package that would erase the current deficit and augment an austere 1987 revenue forecast.

"While I don't like this bill very much, I think it's about the best thing we can come up with," Sen. Walt Yarbrough, R-Grand View, said. "There are certain obligations that have to be met."

The proposal, approved on a 23-18 vote late in the day, called for an 18-month penny increase in the state sales tax to wipe out the \$20 million deficit and finance an estimated \$605 million 1987 budget.

In addition, it provided cities and counties with local option sales and income taxing powers, upon a 55-percent vote of the people at a general election, but in return it



repealed the two-year-old state revenue sharing program that has pumped \$15 million a year into local coffers. That repeal would take effect in mid-1987.

Calling passage of the bill "an historical occasion," Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, one of its drafters, said it would put Idaho on the "leading edge, looking to the future, toward taking care... of the needs of the people without unduly burdening them."

Sen. Ron Belletsbacher of Grangeville was the lone Democrat to support the package while Democrat Vern Lannen of Pinehurst, after debating against the plan, missed the vote.

Prior to its final approval, the Senate voted to strip from the package proposals adopted earlier to limit the grocery sales tax credit on the income tax to families with incomes under \$22,000 a year and another revamping the resort cities local option sales tax.

The plan had to overcome vigorous objections from local officials, who while supporting local option taxing authority feared dramatic financial consequences from the loss of state revenue sharing. City and county officials warned that the temporary state sales tax hike effectively preempted the ability of local government to use that tax for its own purposes.

But Sen. Rod Beck, R-Boise, another drafter of the package, contended it puts "the responsibility where the responsibility should lie... with the local units of government that are the money."

Critics of the plan, led by Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls, warned that

Aquino orders records held, begins release of prisoners

MANILA, Philippines — President Corason Aquino's Cabinet officers took over their posts Thursday and she ordered all departments to check their records because of reports that some documents had been destroyed by supporters of the deposed Ferdinand E. Marcos.

The new government said hundreds of political prisoners held by the fallen Marcos regime probably would be freed next week.

Thirty-nine prisoners were ordered set free Thursday.

A spokeswoman for Task Force Detainees, a human rights group,

said that as of Friday morning Manila time, 16 prisoners had been released from military detention, including 10 in Manila, three in Iloilo and three in Davao.

The process was slowed by medical clearances and the fact that each release had to be signed by several people in different locations, officials reported.

Former Sen. Raul Manglapus returned to his homeland Friday from the United States, where he had spent 14 years opposing Marcos' government. Manglapus had left the Philippines the day before Marcos declared martial law in 1972.

"So, I'm back, and as I was saying

before I was so rudely interrupted by Ferdinand Marcos, we are going to be the greatest democracy in the world," Manglapus said at a news conference at Manila International airport. He praised Mrs. Aquino as a "goddess of democracy," and President Reagan for help in persuading Marcos to leave.

Officials said more than 500 people were still asserted political charges when Ferdinand E. Marcos ended 20 years of rule in the Philippines and fled the country Wednesday.

Under tight guard, Marcos studies next step

HONOLULU — An exhausted and frail Ferdinand Marcos spent Thursday cloistered under heavy guard at an Air Force base considering his next move on U.S. soil while officials tried to coordinate protection for the 60-member Philippine president and his 10-member entourage.

The Marcos party reportedly wanted to leave the officers' quarters at Hickam Air Force Base, where they have been sequestered since their arrival from Guam on Wednesday,

but was told the U.S. Secret Service cannot ensure their protection without police assistance.

Marcos wanted to stay in Hawaii but his wife, Imelda, wanted the group to continue on to New York, an unidentified official close to the party told a member of the United Filipino Council of Hawaii, said council President Francisco Ulgate.

At a news briefing in Washington, presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said Reagan had authorized Secret Service bodyguards for Mar-

cos for "a limited time" after he leaves Hickam. Under the president's directive, Marcos will be afforded protection as a distinguished foreign visitor, said Secret Service spokeswoman Jane Verzeris in Washington.

Members of the Marcos entourage, including his immediate family, a personal physician, former Military Chief of Staff Gen. Fabian Ver, have left the single-story beige structure since their arrival, said Chief Master Sgt. George Jounou.

Dairy bill pullback sets off House fight

WASHINGTON — The House erupted into partisan bickering Thursday after Democratic leaders withdrew a dairy bill from consideration and Republicans accused them of trying to squeeze political gain out of a disruption of the milk industry.

The development all but killed any chance that Congress could pass a package of changes that would change in the two-month-old farm act before weekend deadlines that affect milk price supports and crop programs.

Farm-state senators, however, continued efforts to put together a package of changes that would be acceptable to the Reagan administration and at the same time blunt rural complaints that the new agriculture policy will hurt farm income.

The most immediate deadline concerned the dairy program. Dairy interests sought legislation that would increase the fees paid by all dairy farmers as a way of meeting the cost-saving requirements of the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law,

rather than a price-support cut scheduled for Saturday to take effect.

"It will be a terrible mess if we don't do something," said Rep. James Jeffords, R-Vt., taking the House floor to complain that the bill was pulled from the schedule for "purely political reasons."

Rep. Steve Gunderson, R-Wis., added that Democrats had withheld consideration of the bill "so they can run around the country and say Gramm-Rudman and sequestering is a bad idea."

"Let's understand who's responsible for the effects," Gunderson said.

But House Majority Whip Thomas Foley, D-Wash., denied the charges and said the bill was withheld only to allow leaders time to formulate a policy on under what circumstances changes in deficit-reduction moves would be allowed.

Foley attempted to turn around the criticism, saying the Reagan administration had been threatening to veto the dairy measure anyway, so the House couldn't be held responsible for any consequences.

Rogers assails 'flawed' NASA process

WASHINGTON — The chairman of the presidential Challenger commission bluntly denounced NASA Thursday for a "clearly flawed" decision-making process, after hearing of a second instance in which the space agency brushed aside contractor fears for the safety of the shuttle and crew.

Summarizing three days of hearings at which several witnesses complained that their concerns were not passed to the agency's top officials, Chairman William Rogers lectured four senior NASA officials: "You eliminate the element of good judgment and common sense."

Rogers said he was speaking for the white panel and said the process "should require people to take stands, and you should have a record on it."

His statement came on the heels of testimony by the official who decided to launch Challenger that he rejected an unsafe-to-fly warning from the spaceplane's manufacturer, because "It was not an objection to launch."

Arnold Aldrich, the No. 2 man in the shuttle program, said he rejected an objection on the morning of the Jan. 28 liftoff by Rockwell International.

"I would think it was more than reasonable that if someone would call me, I left every opportunity for that to happen" in the time

between the 9 a.m. objection and the 11 a.m. launch. No such call would have been made. I was trying to have a decision-making process with key people involved, it

ought to be clear where they stand," said Rogers, as he closed out the second phase of public testimony.

"You will remember that I did say at one point that we thought the decision-making process may be flawed," he added. "I think I'm speaking for the whole commission when I say we think it is flawed."

He told the four senior launch officials that the process "was clearly flawed because the recommendations that were made were either not fully understood by you, or not conveyed to you."

Rogers said Thursday's hearing was the last public session planned on the decision process, although the panel will continue its work in private. The next public hearing will not come for a week at least, he said.

The commissioners will meet today with Richard Truly, the newly appointed head of the shuttle program, then split into task forces to look into the process by which the shuttle was designed and certified for flight.

"We're going to look into things that have puzzled us," said a source close to the commission. "We are going to look into how they test the hardware. That may be equally flawed."

The commission, appointed by President Reagan on Feb. 3, was to report its findings by increasing vocal in his testimony about gaps

McClure protects stockpile

WASHINGTON (AP) — Warning that the United States remains "dangerously dependent" on foreign raw materials, Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has introduced legislation protecting the nation's strategic stockpile from sale to balance the federal budget.

"It should not be used to provide each administration with a slush fund of valuable minerals and materials," he said Thursday. "It should be used for its true purpose: To provide the country with the strategic materials needed in national emergency."

McClure said current law prohibits selling material from the National Defense Stockpile for economic or budgetary reasons and requires that a three-year supply of critical materials be kept on hand.

Nixon papers to go public

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government cleared the way Thursday for making public 40 million pages of Richard Nixon's White House papers and 4,000 hours of taped conversations which have been impounded since Nixon resigned as president on Aug. 9, 1974.

Jill Merrill, spokeswoman for the National Archives, said tapes and documents already screened by archivists could be released this spring unless new barriers are erected.

"We have two million pages ready to go," she said, and more would be systematically made public as archivists finish processing the files, weeding out materials whose release could affect national security and purely personal materials, such as recorded conversations between Nixon and members of his family.

Officials deny POW coverup

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon officials strongly denied Thursday that the government is covering up the existence of live American prisoners in Southeast Asia, but they acknowledged there is a national perception that the truth is being suppressed and the belief won't go away.

"Allegations of a cover-up are absurd and insulting," Richard L. Armitage, an assistant secretary of defense, told the Senate Veterans Affairs Committee.

Air Force Lt. General Leonard Perrotto, director of the Defense Intelligence Agency, agreed with Armitage that the government is doing all it can to find out what happened to the 2,441 Americans who are still unaccounted for more than a decade after the end of the Vietnam war.

But "there is a perception out there of a cover-up," he acknowledged.

Idaho to receive \$9 million

BOISE (AP) — Idaho will receive almost \$9 million next week in a settlement between Exxon Corp. and the U.S. Department of Energy, state Attorney General Jim Jones said.

The money represents part of a refund by Exxon for overcharges on domestically produced crude oil in the 1970s, Jones said Thursday.

Under terms of the court decision ordering the refund, the Idaho Department of Water Resources will use the money to fund a number of its current energy conservation programs, the attorney general said.

With several years of accumulated interest, the balance currently is nearly \$2.1 billion, Jones said. Idaho will receive about \$8.7 million.

TV suicide memento pulled

MANKATO, Minn. (AP) — A sheriff ordered an apparent remembrance for two youths who killed themselves pulled off the community access cable TV station after receiving a report that a copycat suicide pact had been formed by other teen-agers.

Some angry residents contended that Blue Earth County Sheriff Steve LaFoy violated the First Amendment rights by asking the station to stop broadcasting when the Valentine's Day message was scheduled to run.

Mayor Herbert Mpeol said Wednesday that rumors had circulated in the south-central Minnesota city of 30,000 people "that there's going to be a suicide on the 11th of each month. We've heard it again and again."

Senate approves telecasts

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate approved telecasts of its debates on a trial basis Thursday, voting to make more than a million of floor action available to viewers across the nation.

Under the plan, approved 67-21, television broadcasts from the Senate chamber will start June 1. The experiment ends July 15, but that deadline is preceded by a 12-day congressional recess during which there will be nothing to see.

"This is a giant step toward helping our people understand the proceedings of this body," Minority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., said. "The Senate can rejoice at entering the modern age at last."

Idaho's senators, James McClure and Steve Symms, both voted for the measure.

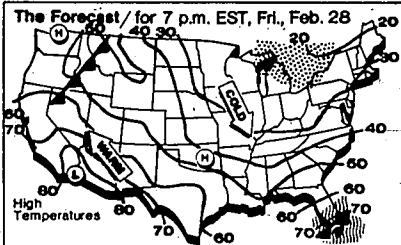
Synopsis:

The idea of a temporary tax to solve the immediate problem was only an illusion.

"There's nothing more permanent than a temporary tax increase," Watkins said. "It'll be a dollar to the hole in a donut that this time around this tax will be made permanent."

The plan's prospects in the House remained clouded, although some leaders in both parties indicated frustration. House Democratic Leader James Stouffer of Sandpoint said,

"In another 10 days, 12 days, you're really going to see a lot of frustration." House Democratic Leader James Stouffer of Sandpoint said.

But Senate Democratic Leader Kermit Kiebert of Hope predicted the temporary tax would not produce the amount of revenue being predicted because consumers will postpone major retail purchases until after the tax expires. In addition, he argued that the economy will not rebound as many Republicans had predicted and expiration of the tax will leave the state \$20 million to \$30 million short of needed revenue in 1988, even after the revenue sharing expense is ended.

The package, which won the support of all the Senate's GOP leaders, was offered as an alternative to a House-passed permanent increase in the state sales tax, and during a rare tax drafting session the Senate rejected a series of Democratic tax proposals the minority called "tax reform rather than necessarily raising taxes."

The alternative to the earlier House-passed permanent penny increase in the sales tax was put together in a rare floor drafting session that saw the Senate narrowly endorse one of a series of Democratic tax proposals that would have reduced the credit to \$20 for families with incomes under \$22,000 from claiming the \$15 per person grocery sales tax credit on their state income-tax returns. That plan, saving \$3 million in future tax credits, raised the credit to \$20 for families with incomes under \$12,000 and reduced it to \$10 for those with incomes between \$16,000 and the cap.

But while they used the full-scale debate of the state's tax structure to force at least standing votes what they called "tax reform rather than necessarily raising taxes," Democrats lost their bids for increased income tax on incomes over \$10,000 and forced legislative review of some \$200 million in special interest exemptions from the sales tax.

The Senate also adopted a requirement that the special interest cities local option tax be charged on all retail items subject to the state sales tax rather than only selected items as allowed now.

The alternative tax package, generated by a group of young Senate Republicans in over 13 hours of closed-door GOP caucuses in the past week, won its initial approval on a 24-16 standing vote that saw four Democrats join 20 Republicans behind it.

The Democrats, who have been

criticized for failing to come forth with their own solution to the budget crisis, were not unanimous in their support of or opposition to any of the proposals except for the cap on the grocery sales tax credit.

Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, one of the drafters of the plan, conceded that there could be problems for local governments making the transition from state revenue sharing to local tax collections, and he said if they surface lawmakers would have to continue some kind of state aid to cities and counties until those problems were worked out.

He pointed out that if all counties adopted either the maximum 1 percent sales or income taxes authorized, they would raise in excess of \$50 million a year, more than three times the amount local government gets from revenue sharing.

Critics of the plan, claiming it would destroy uniformity in the state's tax structure and penalize

the most rural areas of Idaho, argued that if revenue sharing was dropped, the state should also repeal many of the mandated duties it has thrust on local officials over the years, and several senators said they were working on legislation to do just that. Others warned that the plan would only force massive increases in local property taxes.

In comparison to the original House-passed permanent penny increase, the revamped Senate Republican tax alternative would provide some additional money in 1987 for state programs, particularly education.

The Senate alternative, even though the sales tax increase would only be temporary, would provide about \$605 million in 1987 spending after the 1986 deficit is erased. That would provide about \$313 million for public schools, the level recommended by the governor over two months ago.

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The Democrats, who have been

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Senate to hear shelter-home proposal

BOISE — Despite opposition from Magle Valley shelter-home operators and others, the Senate Health and Welfare Committee Thursday voted to send a bill to the full Senate that would create a special class of shelter-homes.

If it passes, Senate Bill 1357 will allow the Department of Health and Welfare to give extra money to shelter homes, housing 15 or fewer people, to be spent on training and educational programs.

Magle Valley shelter home operators said the measure discriminates against them because their homes hold more than 15 people and still offer education and training, but the bill would run any extra money for their inhabitants.

Committee Chairman Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, broke a 4-4 tie,

voting to send the measure to the full Senate, but he told the committee he would not support the measure on the floor. He said he only wanted to see the bill get a hearing by the Senate.

The committee capped two public hearings on the bill with a Thursday report from Legislative Budget Office analyst Ray Stark, who told them the cost of setting up the special shelter homes would not increase the budget of the shelter home program in the short run.

Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho Falls,

said he would vote for the measure on the word of Department of Health and Welfare officials, who said it would not be a budget issue. "If it's a budget issue, then I guess I'm going to rare back and say, 'This is the end,'" he said.

Crapo said he also decided to vote for the measure because the Department of Health and Welfare should be able to give extra money to the special shelter homes so long as the cost of the total shelter home system does not increase.

The special homes are already in existence, but the department's decision to establish them has been challenged and rejected in court by opponents to the special homes, who say they should have been set up by law, not by agency decision.

"I don't believe the department tried to go beyond the statute," Crapo said, "but they ought to err on the side of being well within the statute."

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, made an effort to hold the bill in committee because, he said, the department would not be allowed to run programs without getting approval from the Legislature. He was joined in the move to hold the bill by Sen. Darrel McRobert, R-Twin Falls.

Anderson said he likes the idea behind the bill but not the way the department of Health and Welfare implemented it.

Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, said the courts have already slapped the hands of H&W and by not passing the bill the committee would be punishing the disabled people who are served at the shelter homes.

If the Legislature wants to punish someone for implementing the program without legislative approval, he said, they should fire the director of the department or the program director, "not take it out on the people who benefit from the program."

Panel backs change in state's unitary tax

BOISE — Idaho corporations with operations outside the state will not be taxed as heavily on their out-of-state and foreign income if the Legislature adopts tax-law amendments unanimously supported by the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Thursday.

Called the unitary tax, the law that large corporations and business boosters would like to amend requires Idaho corporations to submit reports on foreign income and to pay taxes on some part of their non-Idaho income.

The proposed revision of Idaho's unitary tax law would allow the state to tax only 15 percent of a corporation's foreign dividend income — and none of their other income from sources outside the boundaries of the United States.

Committee chairman Steve Antone, R-Rupert, said Thursday there has been increased interest in rewriting the unitary tax because President Reagan has proposed federal legislation to do away with unitary taxes nationwide, in hopes of encouraging foreign investment in the United States.

"I don't think it's a save-all," Antone said. Not all corporations now in Idaho will get a tax break under the revised law, he said, but it might serve as an added incentive to bring new business to the state.

Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, who was a member of the Revenue and Taxation Committee subcommittee that studied unitary tax reform, said the bill will not go into effect until January 1988 so that state officials will be able to determine how much tax revenue the bill will cost the state.

Corporate lobbyists who pushed for the bill promised to give the state plenty of information on their international income and taxes for the next two years so that the state can be sure what the tax loss will be, he said.

If the repeal brings new corporations to Idaho, Robbins said, it will be worth the lost unitary tax revenue.

"I think we should encourage people or make it a climate so they could come or would be interested in coming here," Brackett said.

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Hansen bid made official

BOISE (AP) — Connie Hansen officially entered the crowded GOP primary race for her husband's old seat in Congress on Thursday, discounting arguments that it would split the Republican vote and hurt the party's chances of defeating Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings.

"I don't believe there's a legitimate cause for that concern or else I would not be in the race," she said during a news conference in Boise. "I think that's maybe a desperation statement."

Hansen reiterated her claim to be the Republican candidate with the most experience in congressional politics and the broadest base of support in the field of five other would-be Stallings challengers.

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Competition issue needs more study

Buried in the discussion of how to make county hospitals more competitive are several points we think the Legislature should consider as it debates a bill that would allow county hospitals to become private, non-profit corporations.

The proposal, being carried by Rep. Donna Scott, R-Twin Falls, is being pushed this year by Magic Valley Regional Medical Center director John Bingham and attorney Kent Taylor, a former member of the MVRMC Board.

It has the support of the Idaho Hospital Association, but is being opposed, not surprisingly, by the already-private Twin Falls Clinic, as well as some doctors.

What's at stake here, of course, is money. Medical economics has become big business in America; doctors, hospitals, clinics and support services are all scrambling to protect or expand their pieces of the medical revenue pie in an environment in which federal rules have changed.

County hospitals have been particularly affected, mostly adversely. We are told that dire consequences lie ahead if county hospitals are not allowed to "restructure" into more competitive entities.

There is some truth to these arguments. Clearly, county hospitals will have to become more competitive. But transferring the hospital to a board which is further removed from the public is not, in our view, necessarily the best answer.

Competitiveness is a laudable goal, but in our view, it is not the only one. The proposal now before the Legislature has not adequately addressed either the alternatives to privatization, nor the essential ingredient of public input to any decision.

Essentially, it would allow sale of a public facility without letting the people of the county decide. That, in our view, is a fatal flaw in the bill and one which should prompt its defeat.

Testifying before the House State Affairs Committee, Taylor said, "We don't think that a referendum is an appropriate vehicle because of the complexity of the health care industry." That logic, in our view, flies in the face of the democratic process.

State law now requires a referendum of the people before a county hospital can be sold or otherwise transferred. We do not think that provision should be circumvented to allow creation of a "privatized" entity.

If this is truly a statewide issue, and not just an MVRMC bill carried by a Twin Falls legislator, we think the Legislature should help counties explore the issue thoroughly. An interim study committee on county hospitals seems to us to be an appropriate vehicle for fact gathering.

The proposal, as it is now drafted, seems to reflect solely an MVRMC need. It would be better, we think, to defeat this measure and study the issue from a statewide perspective more carefully.

Drug could derail collision on abortion

There are no abortion clinics to picket or bomb when the procedure is chemical. It is an alarming prospect for pro-lifers.

But that doesn't mean that RU-486 would be unequivocally cheered by pro-choice supporters. A safe and painless abortion would benefit patients, yet only a hard-core few are comfortable with the notion of using abortion for birth control. RU-486 would surely increase that use. Pro-choice people have tried to keep the line between birth control and abortion clear. This chemical by its very nature mixes the usage.

Pro-choice people also believe in just that, choices, making them. At their best, clinics and counselors encourage women to make decisions, to take responsibility. Abortion ought not to be traumatic, but should be serious. Yet, a woman can take RU-486 without knowing whether she is pregnant and therefore without knowing whether she is getting an abortion. The moral questions would be easy, perhaps too easy, to avoid.

There is an irony in all this. In 1972, the Supreme Court ruled that abortion was a private matter. Since then it has been a most public domain. Through the years, abortion opponents are locked into the trenches of permanent conflict. In public-opinion polls, the ambidextrous Americans hold their ground with both hands.

Yet in the distance, a new invention of medical technology may simply and irrevocably remove the whole controversy. Abortion may become as private in fact as it is in law, as private as taking a pill in your own home.

This new technology could derail the collision. RU-486 works in the first six weeks, before doctors perform surgical abortions, and when the support of the public is much greater. There are no "silent screams" at two or four or six weeks.

BOSTON — Ever since Roe took on Wade before the Supreme Court, abortion has been a great debate for the ambidextrous.

Americans have argued the issue with two hands. At times it has arrived at a stalemate. To put it succinctly, they don't really like abortion, and they don't want it outlawed. The basic public-opinion polls on this haven't changed in several years, although a huge percentage of Americans collected from both sides are uncomfortable with their own position. We seem stuck in an endless ideological mud sea.

But while we are spinning our wheels in one place, there is a new technology heading down the road that pushes the old arguments in a ditch. RU-486, a drug developed in France and being tested there and in California, may do more to close down abortion clinics than all the pro-lifers have done, but not in the way they expect. It may make early abortions a totally private matter.

The French doctor who discovered RU-486 — named for the drug company Roussel Uclaf and its own molecular structure — calls it a "contraceptive," something between a contraceptive and an abortifacient. What it does is to prevent the cells in the lining of the uterus from getting progesterone. Without progesterone the wall of the uterus breaks down just the way it does for menstruation.

RU-486 can prevent a fertilized egg from implanting in the uterus, making the drug more like birth control. It can also ensure that an implanted egg sloughs off, making it more like a chemical abortion. A woman could use it either

Stivers blasts 'gross mismanagement'

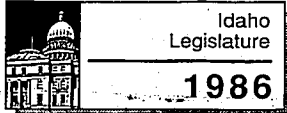
BOISE (AP) — House Speaker Tom Stivers alleges a state agency is guilty of "gross mismanagement" because it spent \$450,000 to buy a Boise office building, only to find out the roof leaks, extensive renovation is needed and much of the structure is tied up in long-term leases and can't be used by the state.

Stivers Thursday called on the attorney general's office to "initiate, at once, a full investigation as to civil and criminal negligence" in connection with the Department of Employment's purchase of a three-story building.

The discussion covered the Talbot Building, 210 Main Street in Boise. The ground floor is leased by Sunset Sporting Goods and Al's Restaurant.

Officials in the administration of Gov. John Evans disputed Stivers' allegations.

Stivers alleged the agency violated state law



buildings across the state, the Legislature had spent only on construction of the state headquarters building.

Stivers said he became aware that the state paid \$450,000 for a building appraised last year at \$348,900.

McDonald said the plan was to use the Talbot Building while work continued at state headquarters, and eventually the structure would be used to house other divisions of his agency now renting office space.

McDonald and Martin Peterson, the governor's budget director, said the state Board of Examiners gave specific approval to the project last year.

The officials said the Legislature has very little direct control of the Idaho Department of Employment's \$125 million budget.

Committee pulls back AIDS proposal

BOISE (AP) — Concerned over language some members considered overly broad and ambiguous, the House Judiciary, Rules and Administration Committee has decided to rework a bill making it a felony to purposely spread the deadly disease AIDS.

The bill would set a punishment of up to five years in prison and a fine of up to \$5,000 for anyone who "knowingly and willfully engages in any activity which would cause another to become infected" with AIDS.

The measure was sponsored by Rep. Dean Sorenson, R-Boise, a physician, and backed by Dr. Fritz Dixon, chief of the state Bureau of Preventive Medicine.

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Disagreement bogs down trucker-tax revision

BOISE — Attempts to rewrite the state tax on trucker highway use bogged down Thursday after opponents and proponents failed to agree on basic statistics, such as the number of trucks using Gem State highways.

This year's proposed revision of the weight-and-usage-based tax has been debated in a number of hearings this winter, and tempers in the Senate Transportation Committee were thin after the last round of testimony.

The committee voted unanimously

to delay further consideration of the bill until next Thursday at the latest.

The Idaho Motor Transport Association (IMTA) and the Western Highways Institute and Department of Transportation were instructed to try to bring to the Thursday committee meeting a set of statistics about highway use on which everyone could agree.

Debate on the bill began after Boise State University accounting professor Herbert Jensen told the committee that in a study commissioned by the Union Pacific Railroad, he determined that the proposed overhaul of the truck tax

would mean \$5.6 million less for the state's highway maintenance and patrol accounts if it were adopted.

Jensen also said the bill would shift most of the truck tax burden from out-of-state commercial truckers onto the shoulders of in-state commercial truckers.

But IMTA lobbyist Bill Roden challenged the study, saying it is based on faulty statistics. Roden said there were 23,620 carriers in the state last year, not 15,022 as Jensen's study said.

Roden also said there were 354,000 trucks registered in the state, not 192,000, as Jensen's study said.

Roden said his figures indicate the

bill would not mean a loss in state highway money.

At that point, Sen. Phil Batt, R-Wilder, told the committee he wants to vote on the bill, but can't do it until opponents and proponents agree on basic statistics.

Calling their testimony a "confusing array of statistics," he said the hearings on the bill are a waste of the committee's time and an insult to the intelligence of committee members.

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, said after the meeting that similar legislation ran into the same difficulty last year and did not pass.

Loan-subsidy bill stalled

BOISE (AP) — Legislation designed to subsidize Idaho farmers by declaring farm operating loans non-taxable has been sidetracked by the House.

The measure, a proposal from Lt. Gov. David Leroy, would have allowed banks to escape income taxes on the first \$300,000 in operating loans they make to farmers in a year.

But opponents argued there was no idea how much the measure would cost the state, and bankers would be the chief beneficiaries of the legislation, not farmers.

Sponsors Rep. Robert Geddes, R-Preston, and Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, allowed the bill to be put up for amendment, after receiving a lot of comment against it.

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Part of 95 closes

GRANGEVILLE (AP) — A section of U.S. 95 near here will be closed for a week to 10 days so that road crews can move a large pile of mud blocking the highway near White Bird Summit.

Motorists will use a detour route over the nearby White Bird Hill road until road crews have cleared the mud on U.S. 95, officials said.

The mud blocked the highway, the main road between Northern and Southern Idaho.

Panel OKs farm-rental bill

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Judiciary Committee approved a proposal Thursday to allow farm families to remain on property acquired by the federal government through foreclosure. The proposal, sponsored by Sen. Edward Kennedy, D-Mass., would permit farmers to rent their house and an adjoining 10 acres for up to five years after their land was lost through foreclosure of a Farmers Home Administration or Small Business Administration loan. The measure, approved 15-0 by the committee, now goes to the Senate floor.

Study backs Reagan claim

WASHINGTON (AP) — Soviet soldiers may be equipped with less sophisticated weapons than U.S. forces, but their arms are often more plentiful and easier to maintain, a congressional study says. The report appeared to buttress the assertion made Wednesday night by President Reagan, in a speech urging Congress to endorse his \$320 billion military request, that "innovation is our advantage." The Kremlin may get a bigger bang for its buck, however. "Soviet technology has been demoralized in the West, but the Soviets produce some very respectable weapon systems, often at less cost than ours," said the study released Wednesday by the General Accounting Office, Congress' investigative arm. "The Soviets . . . prefer modest technological advances, low cost and weapons in quantity," said the GAO study on "Weapons Acquisition."

IRS processing speeds up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Almost 16 percent more individual income-tax returns were processed last week than during the same period a year ago, the Internal Revenue Service said Thursday. So far this year, 26.6 million returns have been filed, compared with 27.8 million at this time in 1985. But the IRS has processed almost 16 percent more returns: 9.27 million compared with 8 million last year. The IRS is not concerned that the number of filings is behind last year's pace, said spokesman Scott Wolfe. "We are not concerned about anything at this point because all the reports are good," he said. He pointed out that the number of returns filed last week was ahead of the same week in 1985.

Reagan wants 'bad' bill alive

WASHINGTON (AP) — Raising taxes on imported oil would cost the average family up to \$365 a year, penalize the poor, hurt key allies and damage the nation's trade balance, the Reagan administration told Congress on Thursday. But the proposal should be kept alive in case it is needed to finance President Reagan's plan for overhauling the income tax system, J. Roger Mentz, acting assistant secretary of the treasury for tax policy, told the Senate Finance subcommittee on energy taxation. After describing the oil tax as extremely regressive and estimating that for most families it would wipe out any benefit from the tax-revision plan, Mentz said, "The president has not ruled it out. We suggest you keep it on the table."

Anti-snuff legislation signed

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan signed into law Thursday a bill requiring health warnings on snuff and chewing tobacco packages and banning radio and television advertising about the products. The measure, aimed at curbing the growing popularity of smokeless tobacco among children and teen-agers, was approved by Congress after the National Institutes of Health said there was "convincing evidence" linking snuff and chewing tobacco with increased risk of oral cancer. The warnings also must be displayed in printed advertisements about the products.

Hinckley asks out

WASHINGTON (AP) — John W. Hinckley Jr., who shot and wounded President Reagan in March, 1981, asked a federal judge to permit him to leave St. Elizabeths mental hospital for one day a month and spend it in the city. Hinckley also asked U.S. Judge Barrington D. Parker to move him from the maximum security ward to which he has been confined the past 21 consecutive months to a less restrictive ward at the hospital.

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Study identifies kids likely to use drugs

BOSTON (AP) — Abuse of drugs, alcohol and cigarettes is strongly influenced by personality and friendship patterns identifiable in adolescence, and can be predicted and prevented, according to a 12-year study released Thursday. Other factors, including role models, peer pressure and the availability of drugs, also influence decisions to drink, smoke and take illegal drugs, said the author of the study, Gene M. Smith, a psychologist at Massachusetts General Hospital and an associate professor at Harvard Medical School. But personality and friendship patterns that begin to develop early in childhood can strongly influence later decisions regarding drug use, said Smith.

"I believe, therefore, that early education by parents, teachers and other role models, such as athletes, stars and musicians, can play a very important role in deglamorizing these substances, particularly cocaine, the use of which is becoming a horrendous problem," Smith said. Smith's research, conducted between 1969 and 1981, concludes that adolescents who go on to drink, smoke and take drugs as teen-agers and young adults are usually impulsive, pessimistic, unambitious and have poor study habits. They also admit a willingness to lie, cheat and hurt others. Those youngsters who shun alcohol, cigarettes and drugs through their early 20s tend to be law-abiding, self-sufficient and ambitious. They also like school and feel valued by their peers, teachers and other people. "Personality is a significant piece of the puzzle as to what leads to substance abuse," said Smith. "We are dealing here with probabilities, not certainties," he said of the study's conclusions. Smith studied 900 predominantly white, middle-class junior high school students in the Boston area. The adolescents were asked 400 questions about themselves and then were rated by their peers on 20 personality traits. Smith studied most of the same group in the early 1970s and again in 1981, investigating the extent of the participants' alcohol, cigarette and drug use. He found that heavy users in high school continued on that path through their 20s, and adolescent non-users stayed non-users. In the drug category, the study measured the use of marijuana, hashish, cocaine, stimulants, sedatives, LSD, PCP (phenycyclidine, sometimes called "angel dust") and heroin.

in the information flow to officials making critical launch decisions, seemed particularly surprised by the Rockwell testimony. "If the decision-making process is such that the prime contractor thinks he objected and says — 'I feel this is unsafe to launch and you say 'that was not our understanding,' that shows a serious deficiency in the process," Rogers said. Rockwell's testimony about its concerns that ice could damage the Challenger made it the second major contractor to express reservations about the cold before the launch, which cost the lives of seven astronauts and destroyed one of four shuttles in America's fleet. Earlier in the week, engineers from Morton Thiokol, which manufactures the shuttle's booster rockets, said they argued against the launch because they feared booster safety seals would not work properly after a night in sub-freezing weather. Aldrich — on Thursday echoed statements by other top NASA launch officials: "Until the events following (flight) 51L (the Challenger disaster), I was not aware of temperature concerns with solid rocket booster seams or seals."

William Lucas, director of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center, who followed Aldrich to the witness table, said he had never considered the seals a "threat to the safety of flight." The final witness this week was NASA engineer Ben Powers, who told the commission he supported the Morton Thiokol engineers who opposed the launch for fear that cold weather would weaken booster rocket safety seals. "I fully supported the Thiokol engineering position," he said, adding that he passed his concern along to his supervisor at the Marshall Space Flight Center. Powers was the only NASA witness to date to express support for the Morton Thiokol engineers. The commission was shown pictures Thursday, made from a camera angle it had not seen before, that showed black smoke pouring out of the side of the right booster near where it was attached to the shuttle's fuel tank. A plume of flame photographed shooting from that area after it had not been seen before. The capture later in the 73-second flight is the leading suspect in the explosion.

Rockwell's concern was not with the booster, but with ice on the launch pad. In previous flights, the Hirof has caused ice to fall from the shuttle's external tank or from the launch tower, damaging the tiles which protect the shuttle from burning up on re-entry. An inspection team that went to the pad three times on launch morning — the last time 40 minutes before Hirof — told the launch control center that ice would pose no danger. Two men on the team told the commission that post-launch films showed that to be the case.

Thus, the commission's attention to the handling of the Rockwell objection revealed its concern over decision-making in the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, rather than another effort to find the physical cause of the disaster.

Rocco A. Petrone, a long-time NASA launch official who is now president of Rockwell's space division, said he was in the company's Downey, Calif., headquarters when he learned about the ice on launch morning.

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White House drops document release

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reagan administration officials said Thursday they have shelved plans to release a classified document outlining an alleged Nicaraguan government "disinformation" campaign, but the switch did not end the controversy over the paper's earlier use in a White House spying drive.

Officials said the administration reversed itself because of criticism from Capitol Hill that it was using intelligence information for partisan political gain in its bid to win \$100 million in aid for Contra rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist government.

Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., Senate Intelligence Committee chairman who last week denounced administration plans to release the document, called the reversal "a very wise decision."

But Democrats said the White House suggestion that opposition to Contra aid was being manipulated by the Nicaraguan government never should have been made in the first place.

"It's stur and run," Rep. David Bonior, D-

Mich., a House deputy whip, said of CIA Director William J. Casey's distribution of the document last week to some members of Congress.

"It makes public vague accusations but withholds the evidence supporting those accusations. It makes suspect every individual who opposes the Contra-war but denies those who are affected a chance to respond," Bonior said.

Rep. Richard A. Gephardt, D-Mo., said the White House claim of a "disinformation campaign... is an insult both to our intelligence and our patriotism. If there is a lack of information, it is in the White House."

But Rep. Robert Dornan, R-Calif., one of the congressmen shown the document, again denounced the alleged "disinformation program hatched in Havana and the Kremlin... disinformation that involves everything from using the Phil Donahue show to encouraging naive nuns and priests and ministers... to sit in the offices of congressmen... to have a perfectly orchestrated campaign of propaganda down to what slogans should be used on the signs."

One administration official, insisting on anonymity, said the intercepted-Sandinista document was being withheld because an intelligence source would be jeopardized if it were released in full and because a "sanitized" version would appear so weak that the press would "scold at it."

The official said that in the document Sandinista leaders asked the prospects for Congress resuming military aid to the Contras and suggest drawing attention to the rebels' human rights abuses.

Meanwhile, Alvaro Baldizon, a defector from the Nicaraguan Interior Ministry, said that since 1981, the Sandinista government has used special military units dressed up as Contras to commit atrocities that could then be blamed on the U.S.-backed rebels.

In another development Thursday, the administration's Central America policy got a boost from a well-heeled conservative group, which launched a \$2 million campaign on behalf of the Contra rebels.

Military exercises announced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said Thursday it will conduct large-scale military exercises in Honduras next week and Deputy Defense Secretary William H. Taft IV will leave Friday for a week of consultations with government officials in the region.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said the first exercise would start Monday under the code name Cabanas 86. It will feature the construction of a "dirt" airstrip 20 miles from the Nicaraguan border; airborne drops of U.S. paratroopers; and maneuvers by Special Operations Forces, Sims said.

About 2,000 U.S. forces and about 500 Honduran soldiers will participate in the exercise, which will extend through June 30, he said.

The spokesman also announced that a second exercise, part of the annual Big Pine series, would begin March 15 under the code name Ahuas Tara 86.

This exercise will be concentrated near the Palmerola air base — where the headquarters for U.S. military units in Honduras is located — and this year will focus on a test of joint "command, control and communication" systems, Sims said.

Ahuas Tara 86 will extend through April 20 and will involve a total of about 2,000 Americans before it is completed, the spokesman continued.

Reagan seeks to sell Saudis new missiles

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan is preparing to ask Congress to approve the sale of \$351 million in missiles to Saudi Arabia, congressional sources said Thursday.

The request is likely to touch off another fight with Israel's supporters when it reaches Capitol Hill next week.

Initially, Reagan was considering a \$1.1 billion deal, but trimmed the package at the suggestion of Republican leaders who told the president a sale of such magnitude might be blocked, two well-placed sources told The Associated Press.

The package initially included \$450 million in electronic equipment for U.S.-built F-15 and F-5 fighter planes and \$250 million in Black Hawk combat helicopters. The Saudis also wanted U.S. tanks and more F-15 jets but — aware of congressional opposition — decided instead to buy all-weather Tornado fighters from Britain and West Germany.

Republican leaders urged Reagan to trim the request to Sidewinder and Stinger missiles on the theory the deal might squeak through, the sources said. The president could then come back later and ask for more weapons for the Arab kingdom.

Flight threatened

NEW YORK (AP) — A woman armed with a knife made threats aboard a Trans World Airlines jet Thursday as it was flying from Miami to New York, and she was arrested shortly after the plane landed, authorities said.

No one was injured in the incident aboard TWA Flight 348, said Mark Marchese, a spokesman for the Port Authority police.

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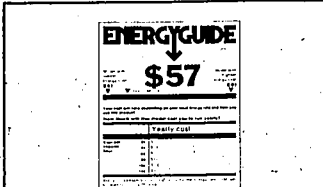

Battle over mutiny continues in Egypt

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Witnesses said soldiers fired tank cannon and automatic weapons at mutinous paramilitary forces near the Great Pyramids on Thursday and the battle continued into the night.

Officials had reported the rebellion over.

Rioting broke out Tuesday night when paramilitary conscripts began rumors that their three-year tour of duty had been extended by one year. They rampaged through the streets setting fire to hotels, nightclubs and shops, and stormed a mosque where Islamic fundamentalists are jailed.

President Hosni Mubarak's chief political adviser, Osama el-Baz, told reporters 36 people were killed and 321 injured in the riots.

He said 32 conscripts, two soldiers and two civilians were killed, and most of the wounded were conscripts.

In Washington, a State Department spokesman said all Americans known to be near the fighting had been accounted for and none had been harmed.

El-Baz said Thursday morning that the Egyptian army, mobilized Wednesday to put down the mutiny, had disarmed the Central Security Force conscripts and the state was "very safe, secure and solid."

He refused to reveal how many security men mutinied, but preliminary estimates from sources close to

the government indicated involvement by 8,000 men in Cairo, where about one-fourth of the 120,000-man force is posted.

Witnesses reported seeing army troops firing machine guns, automatic weapons and tank cannon around noon Thursday at a Central Security Force camp near the Pyramids, where the mutiny began. There was no word of any casualties.

The barrage lasted less than an hour, but officers ordered reporters out of the area and threatened them with arrest if they returned.

Residents said the shooting resumed after a lull and continued into the night. One quoted people who worked near the mutineers' camp as saying the army was tracking down the rebels, some of whom had fled into the desert.

Residents of the north Cairo neighborhood of Shubra said troops and mutineers also exchanged fire overnight.

The Central Security Force is under the direction of the Interior Ministry. Some of its duties are similar to those of police and many Egyptians refer to the conscripts as police.

Felix Daum, a 20-year-old law student from Vienna, Austria, said after arriving home by air Thursday that he had traveled from Luxor to Cairo by train.

"At Gizeh station we saw burning barrels," he said.

Policies irk No.2 Soviet

MOSCOW (AP) — The Kremlin's No. 2 man unleashed a stinging attack Thursday at the Communist Party Congress on what he called "impermissible" Brezhnev-era policies that petrified party ranks and created regional power cliques.

Yegor K. Ligachev, the Party's chief of ideology, echoed many of the points made by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, who opened the 27th congress Tuesday with a conservative summary of party policy and a call for economic reforms.

Also Thursday, in a rare news conference by a Politburo member, Gaidar A. Aliev warned that Gorbachev's anti-corruption drive would be stepped up after the congress.

Acquittal of 3 nears in pope trial

ROME (AP) — The prosecutor recommended Thursday that three Bulgarians be acquitted because he could not prove they conspired in the shooting of Pope John Paul II. He said he was not given time to complete his case.

Antonio Marini appeared to suggest in his lengthy summation, however, that the jury exercise its right to ignore his recommendation. Italian law requires prosecutors to be "obligated" to seek acquittals.

Three Bulgarians and four Turks were charged in the conspiracy case. The panel of two judges and six citizen jurors is not bound by the recommendation and all defendants in custody will be held until a verdict is delivered, probably late next month.

Italian jurors reach their decisions by majority vote. Acquittal would cast doubt on the alleged Bulgarian and Soviet connection in the assassination attempt carried out May 13, 1981.

evidence is insufficient. Acquittal on that basis stops short of complete absolution, with the possibility of future prosecution left open.

At the last minute, Marini tried to have the nine-month-long trial reopened so he could call more witnesses. Judge Severino Santapichi denied his request and the prosecutor, clearly angry, said he was "obligated" to seek acquittals.

The package has already been signed by the nine other Common Market member states, but Italy and Greece had abstained from the signing, saying they would not do so until Denmark was ready to do so.

Danes OK Common Market reforms

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — Danes solidly approved a disputed package of Common Market reforms in a national referendum Thursday that cleared the way for their enactment by the European Economic Community.

"We have a truly clear decision," Conservative Prime Minister Poul Schuster said after completion of the national tally showed 56.2 percent for the measures and 43.8 percent against.

Danish parliamentary opponents of the package had claimed it would infringe on Danish sovereignty, dilute Danish environmental protection and job safety regulations, which are among the tightest in Europe.

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Bomb downed jet

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A judicial inquiry concluded a bomb planted by terrorists blew up an Air-India Jumbo jet last June, killing all 329 people aboard, the Press Trust of India said Thursday.

The news agency quoted the final judicial report as saying: "A terrorist bomb concealed in the piece of baggage" exploded in the forward cargo hold of the Boeing 747 off the Irish coast June 23, 1985.

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Towns vie for work crews' help

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley communities plan a summer of painting, planting, refurbishments and improvements that have gone undone too long because they lacked the money to pay for more than routine maintenance.

This summer the South-Central Private Industry Council, in partnership with Region IV Development Association, will sponsor community improvement work crews in the Magic Valley.

Each crew of four youths and an adult trainer will be assigned to a community for eight weeks to help spruce it up. All wages will be paid with federal money via the Job Training Partnership Act. All communities need to do come up with the supplies and the equipment for the projects.

Benefits of the program are double. They provide job experience for youths ages 14-21 who are living at or below the poverty level, says Rob Lundgren, a coordinator for the council. And it provides a small economic boost by helping communities make improvements in a year of tight budgets, he says.

Fifteen communities and groups have met deadlines for applications to the program. They also found money in their own budgets for supplies or they found residents, civic groups or merchants to donate money, equipment or supplies.

Enough money is available to assign crews to at least 11 communities, Lundgren says. The decision on which communities will get the crews will not be made until

next month. Following are the projects the Private Industry Council is considering:

• **Oakley** — The Oakley Vigilantes and the city of Oakley plan a joint project to refurbish the rodeo grounds. Existing bleachers would be repaired and new ones would be built. An office, more lighting and a pasture or lawn would be added to the grounds. In addition, a work crew would repair the Oakley swimming pool and do some maintenance work at the Howell's Opera House.

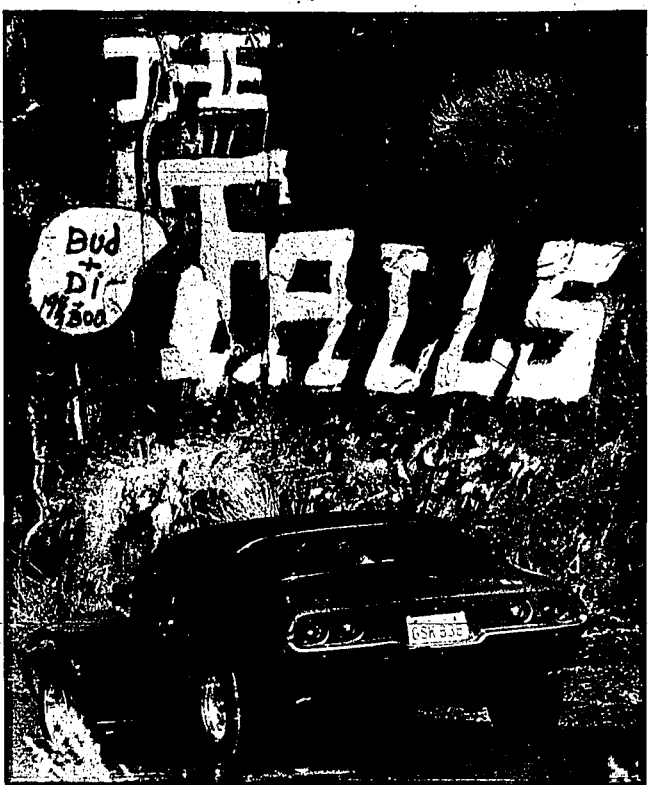
The Vigilantes, six businesses and 56 people have already committed cash, materials and labor to help the work crews with the project.

• **Gooding** — The city of Gooding also has a full roster of helpers lined up. Merchants, the Future Farmers of America, 4-H Clubs, the Chamber of Commerce, garden clubs, Rotary Club, The Lions Club and the Gooding Basque Association will donate equipment, materials or labor, their application says.

They want the crew to work on the new downtown parking area and make improvements at three city parks. The Reading Park needs a covered bench area, landscaping work and paths added. The old municipal swimming pool in the East-Side Park needs to be filled and converted to a picnic area, and repairs are needed at the West-Side Park.

• **Gooding County** — The Fair and Rodeo Board is proposing that corral repairs and expansions be made. In addition, a chute for loading livestock, 528 feet of fencing, and benches.

Recall move begins

JEROME — The initial petition needed for the recall of Jerome County Prosecutor Francis Mark Gause was filed Thursday afternoon and accepted by County Clerk Cheryl Watts.

Watts said the petition contained the necessary 20 signatures of registered county voters. A second petition, seeking 20 percent of the registered voters at the time of last November's general election, can now be circulated.

Jerry Auten, a resident of Jerome County, began the recall move on Tuesday, seeking to remove Gause from office.

Auten said Thursday afternoon that he would like individuals who support his plan to meet at noon Saturday in front of the Jerome County Courthouse.

"I would like to see everyone there who would be willing to take a petition and circulate it for signatures," Auten said. "Of course, we will have petitions at that time for anyone willing to sign them."

The recall move was prompted by a 5th-District-Court-session-Tuesday in which Gause withdrew a felony charge of involuntary manslaughter against a Hazelton couple in connection with the death of their 11-month old daughter. Gause asked instead that they be charged with the misdemeanor of injury to a child.

The baby died a year ago of what medical authorities said was pneumonia brought on by malnutrition. The girl weighed only 10 pounds at the time of death, the same weight a healthy baby of her age would have. The petitions must be filed within 60 days and will need between 1,700-1,800 signatures of registered voters, Watts said.

Gause could resign from office within the next five days, but he said he has no intention of doing that.

The petitions prepared for recall circulation state the cause as "inability to perform the duties of his elected office; failure to prepare and adequately prosecute criminal cases; failure to provide competent legal advice, resulting in additional and excessive waste of Jerome County taxpayers' money; a glaring incompetent legal protection to the citizens of Jerome County."

Auten, who said he has been on call for District Court jury duty since Jan. 1, said he has seen Gause reduce County taxpayers' money as a result of the two-month period and has heard numerous complaints about his ability as a prosecutor.

Graffiti removal at Shoshone Falls sought

TWIN FALLS — Tourists at Shoshone Falls take home memories of water crashing 212 feet to the river below, rainbows rising among the mist and, in recent years, gaudy declarations of teen-age love and school class names spray-painted across the Snake River Canyon's dark walls.

This summer Twin Falls city officials are hoping to put an end to the vandals' handiwork at the entrance to the park. They are asking the South-Central Private Industry Council to assign one of 11 summer youth work crews to the project. The council will be sending groups of four youths and one adult to Magic Valley towns to tackle community

improvement projects.

No other project in Twin Falls would be more visible or have more public support than this one, says Community Development Director Lamar Orton. The city receives frequent complaints about the defacement of the rocks, he says.

"Most distressing to the city are the complaints from tourists who come to Twin Falls to view our famous natural wonder and are shocked to find the area marred by graffiti," he wrote in an application to the Private Industry Council.

"The complaints don't stop at the city. Many local people have called and said they expect an adversarial relationship, a beautiful tourist attraction marred with all of the nonsensical multi-colored spray paint-

ing," Chamber Executive Vice President Michael Bolton wrote in a letter of support for the project.

Tourists have made special trips back to the chamber office after visiting the falls to complain about the graffiti on the canyon walls and rocks in the area, he says.

The city has been concerned about the vandals, but city crews have been too busy with heavy summer workloads to tackle a cleanup effort, and the city has not had enough money to hire extra workers, Orton says.

City workers are not yet sure how the rocks can best be cleaned. Painters have advised the city that initially paint removal and high-pressure sprays should be tried, Or-

ton says. It that is unsuccessful, sand-blasting may be necessary.

If community improvement work crews are assigned to Twin Falls to remove the graffiti, the city will make sure that it is doing more than providing clean slates for more painting.

The city will review its codes and make any changes needed to assure "vigorous enforcement" of vandalism laws, Orton says.

Removal of the graffiti is the first priority for a work force if assigned to Twin Falls, but any extra time would be spent helping the Jaycees build a boat dock at the Shoshone Falls park and painting park buildings. The crew could also clean up the Rock Creek Canyon Parkway, according to the city's application to the Private Industry Council.

Leaders workshop peers inside media mechanisms

TWIN FALLS — You watch it on the television screen. You read it in the daily paper. You hear it crackle out of a radio speaker.

The NEWS constantly surrounds us. But the way it gets to the press and broadcasters — and what they do with it — is far less obvious.

Can the public gain access to newspaper columns or broadcast air time? How can businesses, organizations or the "man-on-the-street" become newsmakers instead of bystanders? Will the reporting be fair or slanted?

Fifteen future leaders from Twin Falls got a look into the workings of the media Thursday in a day-long seminar with newspaper broadcast editors, public relations specialists and business executives who deal with the media. The seminar is part of Twin Falls Leadership, a program sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

The local media's door is unlocked, the experts said, so you often have to open it yourself.

The key involves finding out what reporters want to know and delivering enough information to print or broadcast media, said Ed Waldapfel, public affairs officer for Sawtooth National Forest.

Such details as copy lists, fact sheets, straight talk and a cool head often will make the message easier for time-strapped reporters to handle, he and other public relations specialists said. At the same time, potential newsmakers also must be ready

to answer questions, said Sue Sumner, community relations director for Magic Valley Regional Medical Center.

"Be prepared to answer anything about your business in the next six months," she said.

Reporters will ask many questions, Mike Sullivan, city editor for the Times-News, agreed. "They're not trying to trip you up or give you a trick question to embarrass you," he said.

"They're trying to get a complete story."

The air time or the amount of space the story gets also varies day-to-day, said Jerry Marcantonio, news director for radio station KLIX in Twin Falls.

"Some days the world is coming to an end and other days you might lead with a story that couldn't make the news."

"Why can't we get a little more good news to lighten up the lifestyle of Twin Falls?" asked Ray Velle, farms manager for Aurora Capital Corp.

Why, the leaders suggested, are the most immediate effect on media audiences often are so-called "bad news" such as job losses and disasters, Sullivan said.

"Slant" reporters, "slant" stories, asked Chris Valance, coordinator for the Downtown Business Improvement District of Twin Falls.

The reporter sometimes will highlight different items from what the newsmaker intends, again because it is the newest or

most important development, the editors said. In some instances, that may be viewed by a newsmaker as damaging.

"Just because it (a story) hurts doesn't mean it was meant to be slanted," said Doug Maughan, KMYT news director.

Some people avoid commenting again on tough issues if they disagree, he said. However, newsmakers concerned about their images should not shy away from uncomfortable news, Maughan said. Not answering questions also leaves impressions.

"And you need to come across as an open, honest individual," he said.

Robert Wright, vice president and general manager for Idaho Frozen Foods Corp., told the participants to approach news reporters with an even hand. If you expect an adversarial relationship, it usually becomes a self-fulfilling prophecy," he suggested.

Wright also said newsmakers can keep control and clarity when dealing with the media by having in mind what they can and cannot release.

Access depends on what is put across and how it is presented, the leaders heard. In sessions throughout the day, the group also questioned reporters on stories written; about the session, selected stories to publish or broadcast, and, in one exercise, wrote headlines using the same standards as newspaper editors.

The seminar was part of Leadership Twin Falls '86, a series of workshops sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce to groom future community leaders.

Farm bill action cuts sugar imports

WASHINGTON — The federal government Thursday changed its quota system for sugar imports, completing action ordered by Congress in the 1985 Farm Bill.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture stretched its 1986 imports — now estimated at 1.7 million tons — over 13 months instead of 10 months, an aide to Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said.

The action effectively reduces 1986 sugar imports 23 percent by cutting the amount allowed into the country every month. In the Farm Bill, Congress ordered adjustments to prevent the government from having to

buy excess sugar stocks under its price support program.

The change technically affects the prices which sugar beet growers can obtain for their crops. They are paid partially according to the market prices.

However, the latest development should have little effect on national sugar prices, because the market anticipated the change, said Colburn Aker, executive director for the Sugar Information Bureau, which represents the domestic industry. "I think it is just another signal that the administration tends to follow the Farm Bill," he said.

Allan Lipman, president of Amalgamated Sugar Co., praised the USDA's announcement as "of

benefit to the growers as well as the company."

Similar quota adjustments were made for the 1985 quota year, which was extended two months, Symms' aide Rusty Butler said.

In other Senate updates, legislators have removed a commodity taxprovisions' money and permit fees for dairy farmers from the main measure designed to patch up the 1985 Farm Bill.

Negotiators also have included haying and grazing as permitted activities on land drawing federal deficiency payments, Butler said.

The so-called farm bill is likely to move to the floor of the Senate quickly, he said.

Motel development planned

BURLEY — An ambitious, \$6 million plan to buy and refurbish the Ponderosa Inn in Burley is scheduled, if the developer, can secure financial backing.

Former California investor Jeff Mannix said he hopes to "breathe new life into a grand old ship" by acquiring a \$1 million state block grant along with investor money from around the Magic Valley.

The Ponderosa, a one-otel convention center built in 1962 that closed in November 1981, is owned by Massachusetts General Life Insurance Company, based in Louisville, Ky.

If money is secured, and that is the big question, Mannix said he wants to begin breaking ground in April and reopen the combination motel-convention center-truck stop on July 4.

"We're purchasing a property that's structurally sound. I'm looking at all the plans on the wall behind me, but I think we can do it."

he said during a phone interview from his Ketchum office on Thursday. Mannix, 43, owns Equivest Real Estate Group, which specializes in hotel and motel properties.

Announcement of a possible sale floated around — Burley — for weeks, but nothing concrete surfaced until Wednesday, catching city officials by surprise.

Burley Mayor Ken Frank said he didn't know anything about the proposal until he read it in the South Idaho Press on Wednesday.

"It sounds good, but at this point, it has a lot of the same sound effects of a previous plan of about six months or a year ago," he said. "It's a tremendous thing that someone's interested, but I'm not starting to count chickens."

The grand design calls for enlarging the property's nine-hole golf course so that expanded rooms overlook the course directly. A health club, an olympic-size pool and a country-western style saloon also are included in the plans.

Mannix said he wants to raise 20 percent of the cost of the project

the current rooms, and add 100 new rooms for a total of 261 rooms.

The facility will have four eating areas, from a 100-seat, continental cafe, to a truck stop, a coffee shop and a more formal 170-seat restaurant with waiters.

"I'm not sure this area will go for waiters, but I want to try it," he said. "Waiters are not usually seen outside of large cities, but they're a more formal way of serving."

The grand design also calls for a 40-space RV parking area — a little something for every sojourner.

"This is going to be a full-service facility for any kind of traveler, from the truck stop, to small economy rooms to suites that are 800 square feet, with bars and hot tubs," Mannix said. "I think it's a unique concept."

Motel and hotel chains are branching out, offering economy to moderately priced accommodations, but not in the same complex, he said. Room rates at the Ponderosa would range from \$11.60 to \$120 a night.

Heroin samples prove lethal

RUPERT — Minidoka County Sheriff Ray Jarvis issued a warning Thursday to heroin users in the area, but it was not a threat of arrest — it was a warning that could save their lives. He said he received a call from chemists at a state laboratory where heroin samples were sent for analysis earlier this week, saying the samples were 85- to 95-percent pure heroin and probably lethal to a user. County and city officers confiscated several grams of heroin when they arrested Rodney Wayne Beeler, 31, at his home in Rupert late Tuesday. Beeler is charged with possession of a controlled substance — heroin — with intent to deliver. "That range of purity is extremely dangerous," Jarvis said. "This is the first time we have ever sent in samples and had the lab call with this kind of a report," the sheriff said. "Our main concern at this point is to stop anyone from using the heroin."

Richfield finds holes in insurance

RICHFIELD — The Richfield City Council has learned the liability insurance they thought was intact may not be in force.

Mayor Charles Buttcane told council members last week that errors and omissions coverage is not offered by the city's general insurer, USF&G. Without this clause, the council members are not protected by their general coverage if they are individually named in a lawsuit. Buttcane said the city may be

without the coverage for six weeks to 90 days. The city has sent seven applications to private companies but has received no replies, he said, and the statewide city pool insurance system is not in place yet.

Buttcane said the city must settle an amount equal to 10 percent of the state grant which was awarded to the city for implementation of phase 1 of the city sewer treatment plant renovation.

Richfield was awarded the \$7.125 grant to aid in the planning of the project to determine the most cost-effective method of upgrading the system.

The money for the grant comes from the State Water Pollution Control Fund. State regulations require that 10 percent of the grant be in escrow until a general accounting can be conducted.

The council will be sending out letters to residents requesting payment on delinquent water accounts. If payment is not made, the city may look at the possibility of taking the cases to small claims court.

The council discussed dissatisfaction with the local television cable system and the possibility of lowering rates if contracted services are not provided.

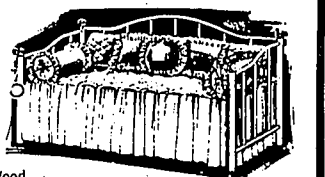

"For whom?" he asked. "We've won everything we can until the regional tournament starts. It's a big weekend for Ricks because it needs one or two wins. We're already cinched for the No. 1 seed."

And so there you have the minor irony of a Ricks-CSI season-ending series having little or no real savor for the Golden Eagles faithful.

But, Trenkle warns, don't expect his Eagles to dawdle when they go to Rexburg.

"We're going up there to win two," said Trenkle, whose ballclub clinched the championship of the northern division of the region by

beating North Idaho twice last weekend. "Anyone who doesn't play hard, won't play long," he said.

So the urgency factor of the series will come into play at 5:15 p.m. each day when the CSI women take on Ricks. They currently are tied in the race for the second spot from the northern division in the regional finals slated in Coeur d'Alene next weekend. If they spill, they play sudden death next week. A team that can manage a sweep will go.

The site of the men's tournament was determined Wednesday night when defending regional and National Junior College Athletic Association champion Dixie won a playoff over Utah Tech. The Rebels will host regionals March 7-8 in St. George, Utah. CSI will meet Snow at 7 p.m. Saturday in St. George, the Badgers having knocked off Utah Tech 62-59 in a playoff Thursday night.

"We respect Ricks," said Trenkle. "They have good people. They always play well at home. They gave us an idea of how good they could be

in the first half of the second game at our place (when Ricks hit probably 80 percent and mounted a 17-point lead about 15 minutes into the game). But I think we showed them something, too. If you're going to play CSI, you're going to play the full 40 minutes. Ricks' lead had faded to two by halftime and we're going to Rexburg to play 40 minutes hard. If they can handle that, then they'll deserve to win and go to regionals."

Since that meeting in Twin Falls, Ricks' depth — as opposed to CSI's depth and pressure — is suspect for

the series. But not the Vikings' height. They have 6-foot-9 Jeff Schofield, who ranks as one of the best centers in the school's history. He is another in a long series of "challengers" for CSI's defensive ace, Erick Newman.

Schofield scored well against CSI the first time around along with Robert Tersigni. The Jekyll-Hyde performance of the two-game set was turned in by 5-10 guard Gerald Riddick. Ricks' second leading scorer, who wasn't a factor the first night but scored 27 points the second. Gordon Bean, 6-7, was somewhat similar, scoring best the second game.

Ricks' ball-handling is accomplished by 6-11 sophomore Larry Perry. "I expect we'll see some different looks both offensively and defensive from Coach (Gary) Gardner. TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Bruins survived to fight another day — but didn't breathe easy until the final 36 seconds doing it.

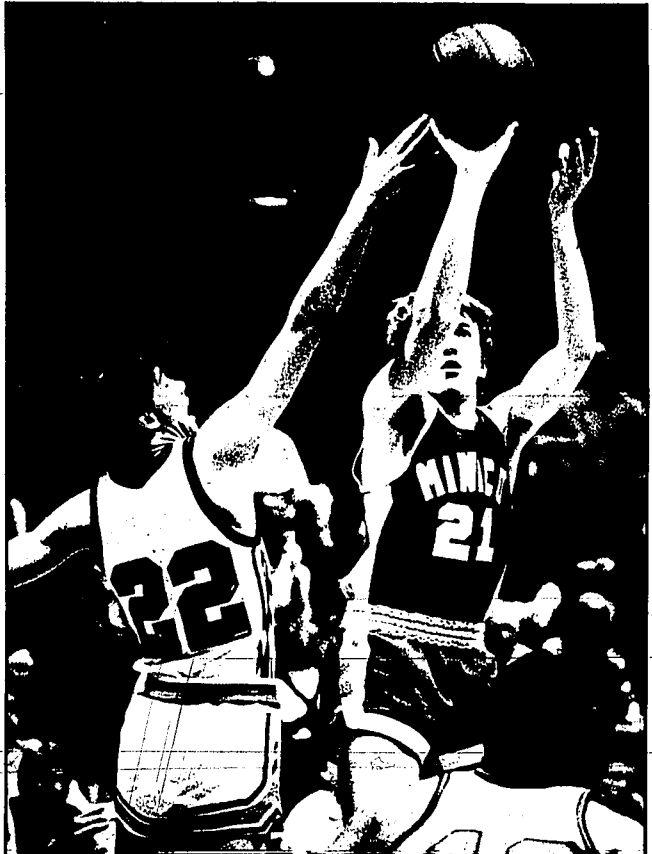

For three quarters and three minutes the young Spartans hung solidly in the game and in fact held a three-point lead at 45-42 with just over five minutes to play. But the Bruins, getting five-for-six free throw shooting from Clark and two field goals from Dave Fulton, who also officially headed Thursday and had been appointed to the Coast Guard Academy.

Minico stayed at 45 for nearly the next four minutes before Dan Poulton's three-point play cut the deficit to 51-48. But after that, Twin Falls provided all the scoring, John and Dave Fulton and Tom Prater each picking up two charities.

Road games make Big Sky title race tough to figure out

Only two teams, Montana and Northern Arizona, have a shot at being the No. 1 seed in next month's Big Sky Conference postseason basketball tournament.

But if you think it's easy figuring out which will win the league's regular-season race and the right to host the 1987 conference championships, you've got another thing coming.

The tournament is scheduled for March 6-8 at the Lawlor Events Center in Reno, Nev.

Montana leads the conference with a record of 9-4, 19-8 overall, while Northern Arizona is second at 8-4 and 18-7. Montana has only to beat in-state rival Montana State and hope the Lumberjacks lose one of their two remaining games against Idaho and Boise State to become the top seed. NAU would get the nod if it wins both games while the Grizzlies fall to the Bobcats.

But it's not as simple as that. Both teams are on the road for the regular season's final weekend, and Big Sky teams have won only 10 of 50 games away from home this season against league opponents. Between them, the Grizzlies and Lumberjacks are 14-0 at home, but 3-8 on the road.

What's more, Montana hasn't beaten Montana State in Bozeman since 1983 and trails the 21-game series dating back to 1903, 123-98.

For Northern Arizona, the trip to Moscow will bring back memories of how the Axers needed an overtime period to upend Idaho 72-70 at Flagstaff earlier this season. NAU, 1-4 on the road in the league, also has swept a two-game season series with Boise State since 1980.

If the Grizzlies lose and Northern Arizona wins one of its two games, the tournament's top seed would be determined by the two teams' head-to-head competition with the team that finishes third. If both split with that team, the tie-breaker procedure would be extended to games against the fourth-place team, etc.

The top seed is more important than usual in the tournament because Idaho State is on NCAA probation and will not be allowed to



participate. That means that the No. 1 seed will get a first-round bye into the tournament semifinals.

Other conference games on the final week of the regular season include Nevada-Reno at Boise State on Friday, and Idaho State at Weber State and Nevada-Reno at Idaho on Saturday.

The weekend's games are significant for Boise State and Idaho only in that they will determine which finishes seventh and which finishes last in the final conference standings. The teams are tied with 4-8 conference records.

Weber has the inside track at nailing down the third-place position this week with a spot in the top half of the tournament seedings. The Wildcats, 7-6 in the Big Sky, 17-9 overall, will be out for revenge in their season finale, hoping to get back to Idaho state for an earlier one-point loss at Pocatello.

Tournament host Nevada-Reno, 6-6 in the league and 12-13 for the season, faces a two-game road trip after winning just one of five Big Sky games away from home this season.

Besides all the other advantages, beating Montana State would give Montana coach Mike Montgomery his fourth-straight 20-victory season — more than any other coach in the Big Sky's 22-year history.

If Grizzly forward Larry Krystkowiak can notch 31 points against the Bobcats, he'll move up to third on the Big Sky's all-time scoring list. The 6-foot-6 senior currently has 1,897 points, putting him just behind Boise State's Steve Connor and ahead of Montana's Michael Ray Richardson.

Natural gas explosion roars through Brewers' clubhouse

CHANDLER, Ariz. (AP) — A natural gas explosion sent a big ball of flame through the Milwaukee Brewers' new spring training clubhouse Thursday, injuring 10 people including the manager George Bamberger and General Manager Harry Dalton.

Bamberger, Dalton and others were hurt trying to douse the burning clothes of third base Coach Tony Muser and Jeff Sutton, a plumber.

Sutton and Muser were seriously burned. "It was trying to get the fire out, and get people out of there as fast as I could because you never knew if there would be another explosion," said Dalton, who was released from a hospital after emergency treatment.

Tom Skibosh, the Brewers' public relations director, ran to where he heard the explosion.

"When I opened the door, Muser was on fire," Skibosh said. "George jumped on me, and (bullpen Coach Larry) Haney jumped on him."

Bamberger called it a terrible explosion. "This ball of fire came right through the door just like it went right through me and knocked me out of my chair," Bamberger said.

"Everybody was knocked to the floor... Larry Haney was on the floor next to me, both arms on fire. The workman was in the doorway going out of my office, and he's completely on fire with his hair and his back and everything."

Bamberger said, "Harry Dalton, the general manager, was trying to beat that out and I jumped on him. We got the fire out anyway, and I got him out of the building," Bamberger said.

Muser, 38 and Sutton, 22, were flown by helicopter to the Maricopa County Burn Unit in nearby Phoenix.

Muser suffered second-degree and third-degree burns over 50 percent of his body and was listed in serious but stable condition at the Phoenix burn unit. Sutton suffered burns over 10 percent of his body, primarily on his hands and face, said hospital spokeswoman Mary Helen Valenzuela.

Pitching coach Herman Starrette, 47, was taken to the Chandler Community Hospital with first- and second-degree burns. A hospital spokeswoman said Starrette was in the hospital's intensive care unit, and was also listed in serious but stable condition.

"Horrible. It was just horrible," said rookie pitcher Chuck Crim. "I was sitting in my locker. I heard an explosion, and I saw a big ball of flame coming down the hall. It's going to be scary to go back in there."

The explosion, which occurred shortly before 9 a.m. MST, blew a 4-foot hole in the clubhouse roof, witnesses said.

"Six-point-five on the Richter Scale," was how pitcher Ray Burris described it to Chicago radio station WBBM. "I felt like the building was going to come apart."

Ex-Cy Young winner Hoyt checks himself into drug treatment center

YUMA, Ariz. (AP) — Former Cy Young Award winner Lamarr Hoyt has voluntarily entered a treatment facility for evaluation of a possible substance abuse problem, the San Diego Padres announced Thursday.

Hoyt, 31, missed Thursday's spring training session after arriving with other pitchers and catchers earlier this week.

Hoyt, who won the Cy Young in 1983 with the American League Chicago White Sox while compiling a 24-10 record, came to the Padres in a trade on Dec. 6, 1984, as part of a six-player deal.

In his first season with San Diego, Hoyt was 16-8 with a 3.47 earned run average and during one stretch last

season, he had an 11-game win streak.

In a brief statement read by club spokesman Mike Swanson, the Padres said:

"Lamarr Hoyt has voluntarily checked into a facility for evaluation of a possible substance abuse problem. We expect him to be ready to return to the team before the end of spring training."

The Padres finish spring training April 6 and open the regular season April 7 against the Dodgers in Los Angeles.

Swanson prefaced the statement by saying that he would answer no questions about Hoyt's status or where the pitcher was undergoing

the evaluation. Hoyt was the starting pitcher, got the victory and was the Most Valuable Player in the 1985 All-Star Game in which he pitched three innings of the NL's 6-1 victory.

During the latter part of the 1985 season, Hoyt was bothered by a sore right shoulder. He missed four starts before returning to the rotation on Sept. 10.

Known as one of the best control pitchers in baseball, Hoyt allowed only 20 walks, two of them intentional, during the 210 1/3 innings pitched last season. Hoyt has been in the major leagues for 8 1/2 years and is signed with the Padres through the 1993 season.

Knox's putter gives him lead in Honda Classic

CORAL SPRINGS, Fla. (AP) — Kenny Knox one-putted 12 times, including eight holes in a row, on the way to a windblown 66 that staked him to the first-round lead Thursday in the \$500,000 Honda Classic golf tournament.

Bradley 71 Indiana St. 51

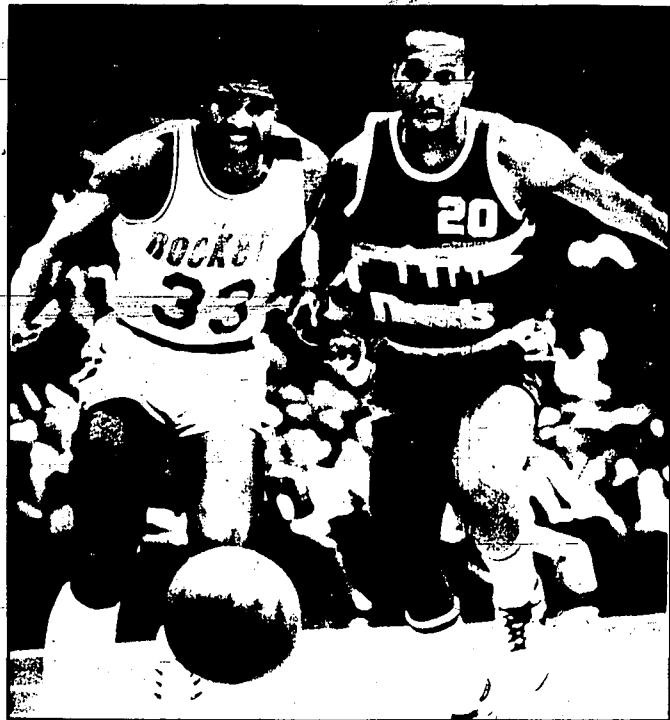
PEORIA, Ill. — Sophomore Hershey Hawkins scored 13 points and grabbed nine rebounds as No. 11 Bradley

Bull market passes milestone

NEW YORK (AP) — Stocks swept past another bull-market milestone Thursday, staging a powerful advance that carried the Dow Jones industrial average to its first close above 1,700.

Analysts said impressive declines in interest rates helped the market break through that barrier in the fifth business session on record at the New York Stock Exchange.

Dow Jones' average of 30 blue chips closed with a 17.09-point gain at 1,713.99, just three weeks off its all-time high of 1,800.

Most other market measures also reached new peaks. Volume on the New York Stock Exchange reached 181.74 million shares, up from 158.02 million Wednesday.

Several times earlier in the week, the Dow Jones Industrials pushed past 1,700 briefly in midsession, only to fall back.

The pattern was repeated in Thursday morning's trading. But in the day passed, the market advanced again with renewed strength.

Analysts said the bulls were heartened by a continuing rally in the credit markets, where yields on government bonds already stood at seven-year lows. Prices of long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, gained \$10 to \$15 for every \$1,000 in face value in Thursday's activity.

The stock market achieved its latest feat without the leadership of its usual standard-bearer, International Business Machines. IBM fell 2% to 155 1/2 as analysts at leading brokerage firms lowered their rating of the stock.

In response to those reductions, the company said recent price cuts on some of its products "will have some negative effect on our first-quarter revenue."

Energy stocks also were under pressure, adding to the losses they have suffered only at the hands of declining oil prices. Exxon dropped 1% to 52 1/2; Amoco 1% to 50 1/2; Chevron 1% to 36 1/2, and Atlantic Richfield 1% to 53 1/2.

But just about every other major stock group led in the advance, with financial, retailing and auto issues among the standouts.

BankAmerica, recipient of a bid by former American Express executive Sanford Weill to become chief executive, climbed 2 to 17 1/2. Among other bank issues, Citicorp gained 2 1/2 to 53 1/2; Chase Manhattan 3% to 42 1/2; Bankers Trust New York 2% to 39 1/2, and J.P. Morgan 2 1/2 to 71 1/2.

In the mortgage and savings and loan sector, Federal National Mortgage rose 1 1/2 to 32 1/2; H.F. Ahmanson 2 1/2 to 64 1/2; Great Western Financial 1 1/2 to 43 1/2, and Far West Financial 1 1/2 to 47 1/2.

K mart paced the leading

retailers, up 1 1/2 to 39 1/2, with a boost from takeover rumors that were denied late in the day.

General Motors gained 1 1/2 to 79 1/2; Ford Motor 1 1/2 to 72 1/2, and Chrysler 1 1/2 to 57 1/2.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, nearly three issues rose in price for every one that declined. The exchange's composite index jumped 1.48 to 130.55.

Film fest debuts

SUN VALLEY — America's first ski resort has embarked upon a new adventure by holding the first Sun Valley Film Festival, presented by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities in conjunction with the Sun Valley Co.

Featured films are "Cowgirls," "The Highly Exalted," "Brazil," "The Orkly Kid," "Louie Blute," "Restless Natives," "The Return of Ruben Blades," "The Plague Dogs," "My Beautiful Laundrette" and "The Great Wall is a Great Wall." Also, Joseph Hanwright will present "The Art of Commercial Filmmaking."

The screenings will be held at the Sun Valley Opera House. Three movies — "Cowgirls," "The Highly Exalted" and "Brazil" — were shown Thursday.

"Cowgirls" told the stories of four spirited women carrying on the family traditions in Oregon. The film wended around the women's true grit and their shared love of the land and the rhythms of ranch life.

"The Highly Exalted" documented the activities of contemporary cowboys, following one of the last horse-drawn chuckwagons in America, while "Brazil," followed the character Sam Lowry, the son of a late government minister and a beautiful, plastic surgery freak. "Brazil" previously won the Los Angeles Film Critics' Best Picture of the Year award.

'Arsenic' serves murder with grin

TWIN FALLS — Comedy-coated murder will be cooking March 6, 7 and 8 when the College of Southern Idaho drama department presents "Arsenic and Old Lace" in CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium.

One of the biggest Broadway hits of the 1940s, "Arsenic and Old Lace" is a fast-paced, light-hearted treatment of murder exemplifying the black humor of the time. It has proven to be a prime vehicle for a variety of stage and screen villains, including Boris Karloff and Raymond Massey.

In the movie version, Cary Grant played the role of Mortimer Brewster, the nephew of two very strange but lovable aunts who have the habit of serving elderly wine laced with a combination of arsenic, strychnine and cyanide to unsuspecting, lonely old gentlemen who come to inquire about a room the spinsters advertise for rent.

That the ladies are disarmingly sentimental about their victims, remembering all their names, and are blissfully unaware that what they are doing is immoral, twists the script from one of horror to witty comedy.

More outlandish even is their other nephew, Teddy, who fancies himself to be Theodore Roosevelt, and who thinks the corpses are yellow fever victims from Panama. They must be buried quickly to avoid contagion, so Teddy buries them in the cellar — the Panama Canal to him — then he and the two aunts hold proper Christian burial services for the victims.

However, the old maids' innocent antics are "discovered" by Mortimer, who comes to "tell" them that he has married. While at the aunts' mansion, Mortimer discovers their 12th victim in the window seat. At first he thinks the eccentric Teddy is responsible, but the aunts, proud of their own accomplishments, tell him different. He sets out to get them committed to an insane asylum.

Then, the plot thickens. Mortimer's older brother, Jonathan — a cold-blooded killer who likewise boasts of 12 dead victims — stealthily arrives at the mansion with his cohort Dr. Einstein, a plastic surgeon of sorts. Jonathan has eluded the police because Dr. Einstein has given him three different faces in five years. Unfortunately, the last time he operated, Dr. Einstein had recently seen a horror movie and was drunk when he operated; the result being that Jonathan has ended up with Boris Karloff's face.

From that point, the play becomes madcap, spiraling into intrigue, hilarity and good, murderous fun. The police, of course, get involved; Mortimer faces death at the hands of Jonathan, and the play eventually ends on an upbeat note.

CSI director Tony Mannen calls it a script that has "stood up through the ages." Mannen points out that it is the first script he has ever seen that he's followed the original directors blocking. "Of course, when it didn't work for us, we changed it," he says.

Born in Chicago Heights, Ill., Sher holds bachelor's and master's degrees from Illinois State University and a master's of fine arts degree from Idaho State University, where she was a teaching assistant from 1981 to 1983. Currently, she is ceramics director at Sunnega Masonry in Pocatello.

The artist says she is stimulated by situations involving elements of high contrast. "My work is representative of this preoccupation with contrast," she says, referring to the absurd images she chooses for their contrast in form, texture and color.

"These images, being personal archetypes for contrast, have been juxtaposed with archaic, mythological or experiential familiarities in an attempt to draw them into the realm of human relatability," she adds. "My art is a visual presentation recreating the tension and humor of daily life."

Willard, on the other hand, has been working with a process that he calls "transformation."

rather than sculptural, and are designed to be installed on walls. The latest works combine geometric drawings and the use of colors.

Currently the curator-of-education at the Boise Gallery of Art, Willard holds a bachelor's degree from the Cranbrook Academy of Art in Bloomfield Hills, Mich., and a master's of fine arts degree from the Tyler School of Art in Philadelphia. Willard was a recipient of a Fulbright-Hays Scholarship in 1976 to do further glass studies in Stourbridge, England.

"As a medium for artistic expression," glass is a fascinating material to work with," he says, adding, "Its intrinsic and inherent beauty can, however, often overshadow any attempt to achieve any significant message if not carefully controlled."

Willard says he concentrates on a purely pictorial space. "The glass laminates that I construct consequently seem quite opposite to all previously accepted traditional glass objects."

"He calls any piece in its final stage "a unique experience," and says that many of the elements and materials he uses change in the firing process. "The metals oxidize; colors inherent in the enamels take on a new character; I anticipate some of the transformation, and sometimes I am surprised," he says.

Willard points out that a successfully finished piece must capture his personal expression truthfully. "My work, I feel, has always centered around a conceptual orientation toward primitive art," he says.

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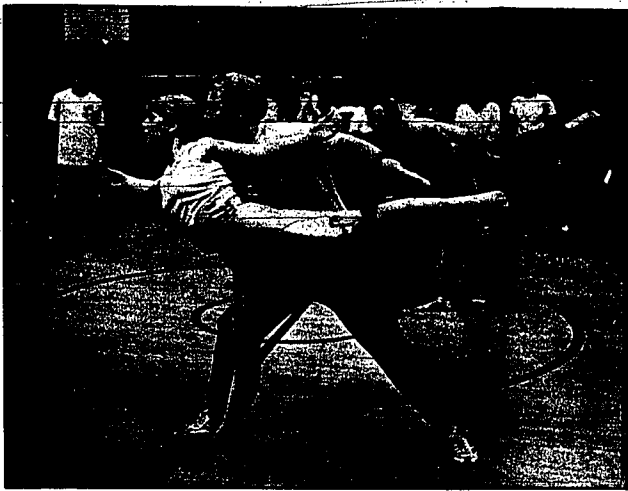

'Down and Out in Beverly Hills' hilariously spoofs the ultra rich

DOWN AND OUT IN BEVERLY HILLS (R) — Co-writer-director-producer Paul Verhoeven's deadpan and affectionate pinning of some butterflies in his own yard, the preposterously rich Whitman family (Richard Dreyfuss, Bette Midler) hard at work at the meaning of life after taxes. Their lives are changed by Nick Nolte as a scrupulous bum who decides to end it all in their pool but stays to affect every member of the family. If the film makers had not pulled the rug out from under the Nolte character, the picture would have a sturdier closing, but there is enormous fun to be had and two especially fine performances, by Nolte and Dreyfuss, to anchor the work.

CLUE (PG) — Inspired by the board game, this comedy whodunit is more frenetic than funny, more strained than suspenseful. But whatever the faults of the director's artistic choices, he has collected a near-perfect cast: Whoopi Goldberg's compelling, incandescent Celie, Margaret Avery's electrifying, changeable Shug Avery and Oprah Winfrey's indomitable, unforgettable Sofia.

IRON EAGLE (PG-13) — Ludicrous action-adventure mangle that would have us believe that an 18-year-old could talk a retired Air Force colonel into joining him on a flying mission

KING SOLOMON'S MINES (PG-13) — An allegedly fresh cinematic look at H. Rider Haggard's novel examining greed and mayhem in deepest, darkest Africa. This time, the stars are Richard Chamberlain, Sharon Stone and Herbert Lom. Directed by J. Lee Thompson.

MURPHY'S ROMANCE (R) — A contemporary Western romance — a June-November courtship comedy that is also a moral fable about making the right choices: bright and earthy and solid, just like his stars, Sally Field and James Garner. Martin Ritt blends them cannily; Garner's super-relaxed style, his maverick affability, plays wonderfully against Field, who gives what is undoubtedly her best performance. It seems like we are getting the real Ritt here, the real Field and Garner — and, even if we are not, they are a delightful group to spend an evening with...warm, funny, the salt of the earth.

101 DALMATIANS (G) — This 25-year-old film looks newer, fresher and brighter than many more-recent animated features. The solidly constructed story centers on the search for a batch of stolen Dalmatian puppies that must be rescued before they're turned into fur coats. Cruella DeVil, a redoubtable mixture of evil and comedy dominates the picture, but all the characters are interesting and well-animated. A well-structured film that the entire family can attend.

OUT OF AFRICA (PG) — Because we are in a well-defined, faintly magical, perfectly appointed past where a level of intelligence is prized in this film, what is its problem? Casting, mostly, and a sense of place. Meryl Streep, as Isak Dinesen, may convince us utterly

that she is in love with Africa, but our views of it are a little too stately to really feel the place. And Robert Redford's Denis Finch Hatten is a real cliché: a person can pretty nearly do anything in the film — except that she cannot provide all the heat in a love affair when Redford is not giving much to his role.

Well, two years ago my daughter contacted me. We met, and she is beautiful inside and out. She wanted to meet her father, but I said, "No." She accepted my decision.

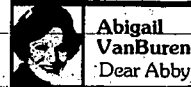
Her father is not the honorable person she had built him up in her mind to be. He's an alcoholic, a gambler and has been in trouble with the law. His life was — and is — a shambles.

Arkin does 'some job' portraying ex-mob associate in CBS movie

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

"A Deadly Business," airing Tuesday, March 4 on CBS, is the story of a mob associate who became an FBI informant reporting on mob connections in the hauling of toxic wastes.

Alan Arkin plays Kaufman; Armand Assante plays Charles Macaluso, Kaufman's former boss who was sent to jail as a result of his testimony; and Michael Learned plays the woman who helps Kaufman come to his courageous decision.

Kaufman said his conscience was pricked when he realized millions of people were being jeopardized by toxic waste. Kaufman's testimony led to the indictment and conviction of principals in the garbage-hauling program and of elected New Jersey state officials. As a result of his testimony, Kaufman became a participant in the Federal Witness Protection Program.

"There are probably 20 contracts on my life," says Kaufman, who spoke from behind a screen to conceal his identity to TV reporters at Los Angeles' Federal Building. He was guarded by several U.S. marshals.

"I'm alive today because of the witness protection program," says Kaufman, 62. "It is not a good life. I'm lonely." Kaufman said he had "good and bad" memories after viewing "A Deadly Business" for the first time.

"I don't know if you've ever had to do what I've done," says Kaufman. "Charles Macaluso was my friend and I looked at him in the courtroom and went through the tortures of the damned, because I had dual feelings."

"You knew what he was doing, you knew what they were doing, you

knew that there are kids that are unborn today, that are dying because of what they've done. When I made my decision, I said I would never stop as long as I'm alive."

Arkin, who gives an Emmy-caliber performance as Kaufman, says he spent "many long hours" talking with the informant in order to prepare for the role.

"Mr. Kaufman flew to my home in L.A. and spent considerable time there on two different, very long occasions," says Arkin. "On the first one, my wife was very, very nervous, and she and my child flew to Texas to stay with her mother. Harold and

I stayed alone. All the doors were securely locked, I can assure you."

Kaufman says he had "no choice" about who would play him, but he notes that Arkin "did some job."

"I don't know how he did it, he even had my walk down — and if you've ever seen me walk, you know what I'm talking about."

today's most liberated, articulate screen actresses, primarily because of the sensible opinions she expresses in her interviews. Any recent verbal observations from Jackie? — G.N.

A. Watch for Bisset on "Women of the World," a series of seven one-hour TV specials celebrating outstanding females and their accomplishments worldwide. Of beauty, she says: "Empty beauty depresses me. Simone Signoret, Anna Magnani, Jeanne Moreau — all super actresses display great eroticism and strength." Discussing filmmaking, Bisset says, "Sometimes, one must realize you are not important in certain situations; check the egos, cut the arguments and get on with your work." On living life: "Learn to accept both sides. There'll be good times and there'll be bad times. A man taught me that early and liberated me enormously. The object of life is not simply to eliminate the bad times."

Q. Has Ann Jillian been comparing herself to the great Bette Davis because both have survived breast cancer surgery? — A.R.

A. That's one of the weirdest personality connections I've heard of in some time. Yes, both Ann and Bette have made it through the kind of surgery you mention. But, as Ann tells me, the resemblance stops there. Jillian is sensitive on this point. She's been criticized for playing a pair of sisters in a TV movie — one good, one bad — as Davis did in her 1964 movie, "Dead Ringer." Some Hollywoodites complained that Jillian was getting a swelled head by taking on Davis' old role.

Ann counters that despite some similarities, her TV movie is much different. She idolizes Davis, Jillian tells me, but isn't about to imitate her in any way, especially concerning patterns of ill health.

Q. I read that Kim Novak is going to do her autobiography. What would she have to say — she left Hollywood years ago? — S.J.

A. You must be joking. True, Novak did decide Hollywood wasn't for her and she moved north to California's Big Sur. But not before the 53-year-old actress had romances with Aly Khan, Rafael Trujillo and Sammy Davis, Jr. She promises to tell all in "Through My Eyes" and that's why Macmillan publishers bid the highest for the story, reportedly over \$400,000.

Q. I was surprised to hear that veteran Hollywood actor Glenn Ford

has gotten involved with a very young woman. Isn't he a bit old? — M.N.

A. He apparently doesn't think so. Ford, who is pushing 70, has fallen in love with Debra Morris, a Hollywood actress who is 25. He was first attracted to Debra, says Glenn, when he saw her on a TV talk show and liked what she had to say. After an introduction was arranged, the romance took off. At least that is how Ford tells it. "She's bringing back the love that has been missing from my life for too long," he says.

ROMANCING THE STAR: Patty Duke, who was so good in "A Time to Triumph" on TV recently as a housewife who became an army helicopter pilot, is flying high on her own. She fell wildly in love with Army Staff Sgt. Michael Pearce, who was technical advisor on the set. They're planning to get married soon, like in April.

Daytime's 'Lady from Davenport' remaining in the thick of things

In Hollywood, looking after American Film Institute business, Patricia Barry (Sally Gleason in "Guiding Light") feels uneasy.

Sally, the former madam, has been accepted now by both sons, Billy Lewis and Kyle Sampson, and their offspring. Does that mean Sally is about to be eased out?

On "Guiding Light" for a year, Patricia Barry had reason to believe she might step into the shoes of matriarch Charita Bauer. Nothing like a madam to rule the roost. Ms. Barry is ready to rule — even though she works both coasts, keeping a Beverly Hills home with husband Phillip Barry Jr., and New York digs for herself.

Those Barry high cheekbones have been a TV staple since the days of "Perry Mason" and "Maverick." The lady from Davenport, Iowa, cut a swathe in Beverly Hills. Howard Hughes was an admirer. "I almost married Howard," Patricia recalls. "But I wanted two children and animals. Howard didn't."

So Patricia ended up marrying Philip Barry Jr., son of the Broadway playwright, and settled in Beverly Hills, and had two children (daughter Miranda is the current associate producer of "American Playhouse"). Husband Phillip became a CBS producer when the network marketed the class dramas. A man known for his subtle rewrites, Barry's touch ranges from "Queen of the Stardust Ballroom," "The Autobiography of Miss Jane Pittman" to "Friendly Fire."

Always in the thick of things, part of a tight-knit group of TV insiders from Martin Manulis to George Schaefer, Patricia spent five years on "Days of Our Lives" as Tom Horton's daughter Addie Olson. Addie gave birth to Steve Olson, then Julie. As Doug Williams' wife, she produced Hope. And she took forever to die, causing a ruckus with the fans. Off in Seattle playing "Twigs," Patricia agreed to do voice-overs as Addie's ghost to placate fans.

Steeped in theatre anecdotes through a celebrated playwright father-in-law and TV beginnings, Barry remembers worrying about being over-the-hill at 35. Since her Iowa mother died at age 99, daughter is just beginning to get her second wind.

"Look how busy Dorothy McGuire is," Patricia points out. "There's

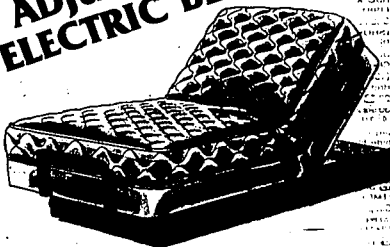

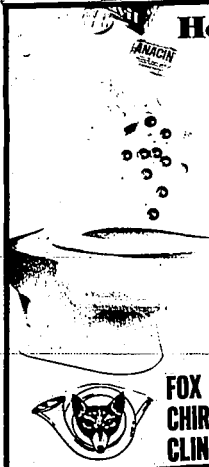

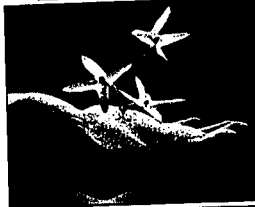

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ABC puts squeeze on contracts

WASHINGTON — Details are a little skimpy, but ABC News management Monday notified the executive producers of its programs that contracts will no longer be offered to a "majority" of employees on the production side who work under them.

According to the News division, directly affected will be about 100 "field producers" (some of whom are listed as "producers," depending on the show they're assigned to) who have previously negotiated contracts with the network on a regular (usually three-year) basis.

As non-union staff employees they will, instead, receive the routine three-to-five percent period raises offered to all other network employees.

Sources outside ABC Monday said the number of production employees affected is "in the hundreds," and that eventually some senior producers will also be taken off contracts.

The decision was reportedly made last week before ABC News president Roone Arledge and his top deputy, David Burke, flew to Moscow to join Peter Jennings and the "World News Tonight" crew, which is broadcasting from the Soviet capital all this week.

One News division source — who asked not to be identified — said Monday that "if you go back a period, about six years ago, very few below executive producer and senior producer were offered contracts. And then for a lot of different reasons, contracts for producers proliferated, by and large for a lot of people who probably wouldn't have had contracts. It just got out of hand."

This source said discussions on such a decision were held last year, before Capital Cities took over ABC, by then ABC President Fred Pierce and the ABC board of directors.

Said this source, "We don't want anybody to be upset or frightened by the decision. Some producers will be retained on contracts."

He said the policy change was not a money-saving device, except that "a lot of administrative work will be dropped. We won't be tracking as many contracts."

CBS miniseries defeats ABC's, but strong NBC lineup still No. 1

NEW YORK — CBS' "Blood and Orchids" outperformed ABC's "Crossings" to win another miniseries battle, but NBC captured another regular series war and ranked first in the A.C. Nielsen Co. prime-time ratings, according to figures released Tuesday.

Despite finishing a poor third in the Sunday movie and miniseries competition with its three-hour film, "The Fifth Missile," NBC won the week with its regular programs, including Top 10 series "The Cosby Show," "Golden Girls" and "Miami Vice."

"CBS beat us by 11 ratings points on Sunday night, and we still won the week, which shows just how strong our regular schedule is," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

For the week of Feb. 17-23, NBC averaged a 17.5 rating, below its season average of 17.9. CBS had a 17.1, about the same as its 22-week average of 17.0. ABC had a 15.4, up from its 15.1 rating for the season thus far.

A national ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Sunday's first installment of "Blood and Orchids" ranked eighth for the week with a 22.9 rating. The two-part film, which starred Kris Kristofferson and Jane Alexander, probed prejudice and corruption among Hawaii's ruling establishment in the 1930s.

The first part of ABC's "Crossings," meanwhile, ranked 26th with a 17.5 rating. The three-night adaptation of Danielle Steel's best-selling novel, about a 1939 ocean liner crossing, featured the romance between Cheryl Ladd as the wife of a French ambassador and Lee Horsley as a business tycoon.

NBC, trying to counterprogram with a movie that would have male appeal, failed with "The Fifth Missile," starring Robert Conrad and David Soul. The movie, about a war game that gets out of hand on a nuclear submarine, ranked 46th out of 68 shows, recording a 14.7 rating.

NBC had forecast the order of finish Sunday night would be "Crossings," "Blood & Orchids" and then "Fifth Missile." Jaffe said CBS' powerful Sunday night lead-ins, "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote,"



are a formidable advantage and that the CBS miniseries may have won because it was a "more important program — about a trial and bigotry — than 'Crossings.'"

This was CBS' second successful "Battle of the Miniseries" during the February sweeps, the period when ratings for local stations are measured and determine ad rates for the next few months. Earlier, "Sins" beat NBC's "Peter the Great," although ratings for both productions were deflated by the head-to-head competition.

"Sweeps are for the affiliates, but they really have negative value for the networks," said Jaffe. "Because of the sweeps, we end up programming important events against important events. Alone, these programs could do much better."

Last week's "Cosby Show," which featured Stevie Wonder playing himself, had the show's third highest rating ever, a 36.4. Its Thursday night companion comedy, "Family Ties," ranked second with a 31.3, followed by CBS' Sunday tandem of "Murder, She Wrote" and "60 Minutes."

Rounding out the Top 10, "Golden Girls" was fifth, NBC's "Cheers," sixth, "Miami Vice," seventh, "Blood and Orchids," eighth, ABC's "Dynasty," ninth, and ABC's "Who's the Boss?" 10th.

In other prime-time highlights, CBS' "Dallas" was 15th and ABC's movie, "One Terrific Guy," starring Wayne Rogers as a high school teacher conducting bogus sex research, ranked 18th.

NBC's "St. Elsewhere" had a two-parter that traced the hospital's first 50 years. Its Thursday episode pre-empted "Hill Street Blues" and ranked 34th. Jaffe said it took female viewers from "Knots Landing," which was 21st, but steered some males to ABC's "20/20," which rose to 29th. Wednesday's "St. Elsewhere" placed 47th. For the season, "St. Elsewhere" ranks 51st.

"The Girl Who Spelled Freedom" on ABC's "Disney Sunday Movie" ranked 44th. In the four outings for the weekly "Disney" series, it has averaged a 15.4 rating, 4.2 ratings points better than "Ripley's Believe It or Not" and "MacGyver," the previous shows in the time slot. "Ripley's Believe It or Not," now the sacrificial lamb for "Cosby" on Thursday, finished last. ABC had all five lowest-rated shows. The second episode of the new "Fortune Dane" was 6th, followed by "The Redd Foxx Show," "Benson" and "The Fall Guy."

In the evening news competition, the "CBS Evening News" won with a 13.2 rating. "NBC Nightly News" averaged a 13.1 for its closest finish to CBS in four years. ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 12.7.

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Sunday morning news programs are no longer cozy nor easygoing

NEW YORK — They used to be snooze shows. Now, network television's Sunday morning interview programs are news shows, competing feverishly for newsmakers, making headlines and keeping official Washington in the know.

Insurrection in the volatile Philippines was played out live and in lively fashion last Sunday, principally on NBC's "Meet the Press" and ABC's "This Week with David Brinkley."

"In a way, it's absurd," Brinkley said Monday. "The Philippines is changing — or not changing — its president, and they're doing it on American television."

Former Philippines President Ferdinand Marcos stepped down and left the country Wednesday.

From the beginning, the Philippine election story had been a made-for-TV event. Marcos announced on Brinkley's show Nov. 3 that he would hold elections. In effect, Marcos had two constituencies: the Philippine people and the U.S. government, which is supplying \$220 million in economic and military aid to the Philippines in 1986.

During the campaign, and after the Feb. 7 balloting, Marcos made himself accessible to the U.S. media, particularly TV.

On Sunday, "Meet the Press" had the only TV interview with Marcos. He said that he would not resign and that his military would wipe out the opposition. The NBC interview also was broadcast on Philippine TV. Later Sunday, in a nationally televised speech to his nation, Marcos referred to rebel statements made on "Meet the Press."

NBC got the Marcos interview after an NBC News desk assistant, a graduate student named Mary Foster, called the presidential palace from her home in New York and reached one of Marcos' military aides. Foster, who had made Philippine contacts while working with "NBC Nightly News" in Manila earlier this year, told the aide that the Sunday shows were scheduled to speak with rebel leaders.

"The pitch to Marcos was equal time," Timothy J. Russert, the NBC News vice president in charge of "Meet the Press," said Monday.

NBC, ABC and CBS' "Face the Nation" did have interviews with the two rebel leaders: Juan Ponce Enrile, the former defense minister,

and Lt. Gen. Fldel V. Ramos, former deputy armed forces chief. TV cameras couldn't get inside the rebel command post of Camp Crame, but Enrile and Ramos spoke by telephone, passing their one phone back and forth.

"They understand they need support in the United States if they want to succeed," said Brinkley. The two rebel leaders said on "This Week" that they would allow Marcos to leave the country peacefully.

"This Week" had pictures of nuns and other civilians preventing Marcos' trucks and tanks from moving toward Camp Crame. "It was a tremendous sight. I really was struck by it," Brinkley said.

It wasn't too long ago that Sunday morning's shows were havens from Saturday night's hangovers. "They were sort of easygoing, cozy programs, mainly with Washington people, because they were just a limousine ride away," said Brinkley.

"Topical is the name of the game now on Sunday morning," said Russert, who credits Brinkley's show — with its use of satellites linking newsmakers everywhere — as the catalyst for revolutionizing the stodgy Sunday formats.

"This Week with David Brinkley" was introduced in November 1981. "Meet the Press" and "Face the Nation" have been around for decades.

"There was a time when 'Meet the Press' used to be a slide show with one guest, and the weekend used to be a down time for TV news," said Russert, who was an aide to New York Gov. Mario Cuomo before joining NBC News. "The joke used to be that no matter what news was breaking, the Sunday shows would come on with their two Western governors talking about water. But

no more."

Russert said Washington's policymakers, including the president, religiously watch the Sunday shows. "They're video newsletters for the newsmakers," he said. "They watch one another, and that's how policy sometimes is made."

As of Friday night, all three shows had different subjects scheduled. CBS had an interview with Sen. Edward Kennedy. NBC had a Nicaragua-policy broadcast planned with President Daniel Ortega and Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee. (Eventually, Lugar, who headed the U.S. observer team for the Philippine elections, appeared on all three programs.) ABC's show originally was keyed to the shuttle investigation.

"But late Friday, early Saturday, we realized we had the wrong story," said Brinkley.

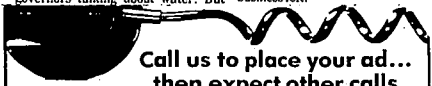
ABC tried for Marcos, couldn't get a definitive yes, so built the broadcast around Enrile and Ramos. Brinkley said ABC and CBS had Philippine, Labor Secretary Blas Ople to express the Marcos position, although Brinkley didn't know Ople actually would appear until "This Week" already was on the air.

Russert said CBS and ABC both saw the Marcos interview arrive on the satellite feed minutes before air time and asked NBC to keep the president available for their questioners. NBC refused.

"We're in the business of reporting news, but we're also in competition," Russert said.

Playing hardball on what used to be a soft news day is just the latest escalation in the network news wars.

"News, both TV and print," said Brinkley, "is the only competitive business left."

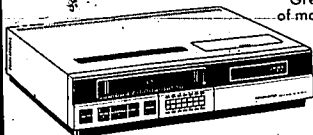

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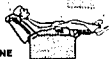

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A new team at ABC is seeking to make prime-time comeback

HOLLYWOOD — Toward the end of April, ABC executives, like those at NBC and CBS, will decide which new and current series, miniseries and TV movies will be on the prime-time roster next fall. Advertisers will get the word shortly thereafter.

For producers and executives alike, it is an annual, high-anxiety, megabuck rite of spring. But this time out, third-place ABC has a new team in the game, a team created before and after Capital Cities' \$3.5 billion takeover of the company Jan. 3.

Its new leader is a newcomer to network television — John B. Sias, 58, a lean, athletic, joke-loving ex-paratrooper. He was named president of the ABC division after 14 years as a top executive at Capital Cities' publishing arm. He has eight prior-years-of broadcasting experience, at Westinghouse and Metromedia. But his dossier lists no network time.

That should not prove a major problem, says Robert Bennett, a colleague of Sias' during the latter's years at Metromedia: "I can tell you that while the rest of us are sleeping, he's up studying. And he's a quick study."

That will stand Sias in good stead, as he has much to study quickly. He faces a variety of important pending items, including contract talks with two major broadcast unions and Hollywood's uncertainty about how he will operate as head of ABC.

But restoration of ABC's prime-time fortunes heads his list of priorities, and that of his respected programming chief Brandon Stoddard. It also is the No. 1 concern of ABC's affiliates, whose network was No. 3 in prime-time ratings last season and will doubtless be there when this season ends.

The head of ABC's affiliates board, Joseph T. Jenkins of KVUE-TV in Austin, Texas, says that affiliates were "quite pleased" when Stoddard was appointed to his new job last November by then-ABC Board Chairman Frederick S. Pierce.

They thought that a good start, he says, and are equally pleased that "they (ABC's new owners) have committed both privately and publicly to the affiliates that Stoddard will have the funds" and time needed to get ABC out of third.

But neither Jenkins nor any other industry officials recently surveyed think this will happen until the season of 1987-88, despite Stoddard's track record of such hit miniseries as "Roots," "Winds of War" and last fall's "North and South."

"I think some progress can be expected next fall, but I would be surprised if the 1986-87 season moved ABC into a strong second," Jenkins says. "I'd be delighted, but I'd also be very surprised."

Sias has not publicly talked about this or other ABC matters yet. As far as reporters are concerned, Sias has been the Lamont Cranston of network executives since taking office. He will not do interviews, saying he is too new on the job and still feeling his way.

(Stoddard also declines to be interviewed, saying he prefers that his programs and schedules speak for themselves.)

One thing is known about Sias and Capital Cities: their reputation for a taut, no-frills operation in which definite goals are set and key executives are then given great autonomy to achieve said goals. Woe be the key executive who falls — or worse, tries to duck the blame.

That Sias is high on Stoddard is without question. But it remains to be seen whether Capital Cities' tight-with-a-buck reputation and Sias' relative inexperience in dealing with Hollywood producers and their red-ink lamentations will prove a major obstacle in ABC's comeback attempt.

"It's true that they (ABC's new bosses) don't know networking, or network-type production, per se," says former ABC Vice Chairman Elton Rule. However, he adds, "I think they're smart enough to know they have to be flexible" in dealing with the Hollywood community, and "they have a hell of a lot of confidence in Brandon."

"I don't expect to see any real changes" in spending for TV movies and miniseries, says one studio executive, who like many interviewed declined to be identified. However, he adds, the Sias-led team, with Cap Cities' philosophy of fiscal austerity, may prove less willing to take a gamble than in ABC's past years.

ABC's costly "North and South," approved by the former management last year, "was a real gamble and it paid off for them in the ratings this season," he says. But Cap Cities' approach "seems to be

more conservative, and those kinds of risks are going to get a harder look by them."

It should be noted that so far the new team has approved what will be TV's lengthiest miniseries — "War and Remembrance," the 30 hour, \$60 million sequel to "Winds of War."

It also has approved the controversial "America," although that miniseries, after deliberations begun before Sias took charge, was cut from 16 hours to 12 hours and its budget reportedly reduced from \$40 million to about \$32 million.

Despite the go-aheads for these high-cost items, one veteran series producer thinks that ABC's rookie chief remains a big question mark in Hollywood: "I haven't heard anybody yet say to me, 'This guy Sias is good, bad or indifferent.'"

What it boils down to, the producer says, is whether Sias will realize that quality costs more, and that frequently there are times when expensive delays or simply more money are necessary to get a better cast, a better script and a better production.

Will he accept this, the producer wonders, "or is there going to be a general concept — and it is already pervasive in our society — that you don't need quality to be successful?"

The question of schlock or quality aside, industry sources say, the real crunch for all producers dealing with ABC's new owners will involve so-called "license fees," the money networks pay for financing a series, miniseries or TV movie.

All three networks have been tightening up on those fees in recent years, citing double-digit costs at a time of single-digit earnings caused by a softening of the economy.

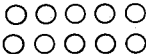
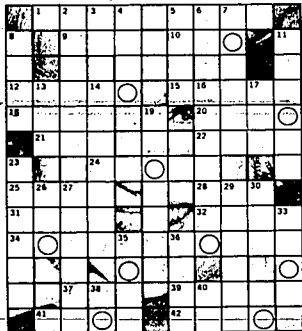
Many producers, contending that networks still somehow manage to make a buck, say producers are losing money until their programs are sold overseas or in syndication.

They say increased production costs have greatly increased their pre-syndication deficits, with the deficit problem far more critical than in those happy years when one could, say, make a sitcom episode for a mere \$100,000 (in contrast, to \$400,000 and up now).

Network business affairs types are known to question such complaints. Who is right depends on whose method of accounting is accepted. That can get mighty complicated with something called the ITC, or

investment tax credit, thrown into the calculating process.

But in the opinion of David Gerber, a longtime producer who now heads MGM's television division, "license fees are already too low. If they (ABC's new management) pay less than what everyone else is paying now, no one will do business with them."

No sounds to that effect have been heard thus far in Hollywood. Nor is there a consensus yet that producers have in fact found it harder to deal with the new bottom-line brigade at Capital Cities-ABC than the brethren at CBS and NBC.

But one industry observer thinks that the Sias-run team will prove the hardest bargainers: "Absolutely. I think they're going to have 90 guys in three-piece suits watching them (the producers)."

Even before Capital Cities' official takeover of ABC, there were other worries, these by ABC employees who feared mass layoffs by the cost-conscious new owners.

An ABC spokesman emphasized that no specific number of staff reductions has been set, nor is there a target date for layoffs. The only overall goal, she said, "is to have the company leaner and more efficient by the end of the year."

"We're basically talking about a handful of people right now," she said.

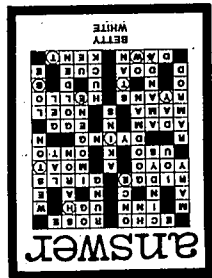
Most of the doomsday speculation on job cuts involves corporate and financial offices, where the Cap Cities-ABC marriage has resulted in a certain amount of duplication. But other areas — news, sports or entertainment among them — also could be involved.

So far, though, there has not been the executive-suite housecleaning at ABC that some had predicted when Cap Cities took charge and Sias began putting his own team into place (a task that ABC says has been largely accomplished).

True, ABC chief Pierce, with the company nearly 30 years, resigned just six days after the takeover and was succeeded by Capital Cities' Sias (Pierce insisted that his exit

was purely voluntary).

But only three Cap Cities executives to date have been brought in by Sias to run key ABC profit centers, he radio division and the ABC-owned television stations division.



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
