Sales tax increase in effect April 1

BOISE — The first of next month, Idahoans will start paying 5 percent state sales tax, a 1-cent increase. Gov. John Evans on Thursday announced that he's letting the Legislature's sales tax bill become law without his signature. The legislation was pushed through by the Republican majorities in the House and Senate without a single Democrat vote in favor. Even though the measure says the state's sales tax will drop back to 4 percent on July 1, 1987, many legislative leaders have been predicting that the increase will be permanent, because the state cannot get along without the extra revenue.



On a \$10,000 new car purchase, the extra 1 percent in sales tax means an extra \$100. On a \$100 grocery purchase, it would cost an extra \$1 in sales tax. The legislation provides \$36.1 million in new revenue for the state budget starting July 1. With that decision made, Majority Leader Jack Kenneville told House members Thursday afternoon the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee is preparing numerous budget bills. Many will be given members this afternoon so they can take them home during the weekend recess for study, said Kenneville. The last \$5 million in additional sales tax revenue will be collected in June of 1987, but will not be transmitted to the state until July. The legislation provides a \$5 million carryover into the 1987-88 budget. In a letter to House Speaker Tom Silvers, Evans said even though the legislation has several serious deficiencies, he will let it become law because it generates revenue close to his executive budget recommendations. Evans also told Silvers that Idaho's tax base should be broadened, "rather than next year under federal budget cuts."

Simply increasing tax rates on those who already shoulder most of the burden. Since 1981, he said, the Legislature has granted credits, exemptions and other tax breaks that together total \$60 million per year. "Rather than simply increasing tax rates, the average taxpayer would be better served by the elimination or revision of some of those tax breaks, which have led to the steady erosion of Idaho's tax base over the years," Evans said. The governor also voiced concern that the bill does nothing to help Idaho cities and counties any of the proceeds from the additional sales tax. Evans said local units of government stand to lose at least \$18 million base should be broadened, "rather than next year under federal budget cuts."

The governor said he decided not to veto the bill. "It took over two months for the Legislature to agree upon this tax bill and I do not appear that agreement could be reached on an improved tax bill during this session," he said. Evans told Silvers that the Legislature must make a good look at permanent sources of revenue for state programs. "In addition, we cannot ignore the fact that cuts in federal assistance... should be at least partially offset by increased state support," the governor said. "By providing only a temporary solution to our revenue problems, this bill virtually guarantees a repeat during the next legislative session of this year's agonizing and divisive deliberations on the budget," the governor said.

First budget loses

WASHINGTON — The Republican chairman of the Senate Budget Committee proposed a fiscal 1987 spending plan Thursday that would sharply pare President Reagan's money spending request, virtually freeze domestic spending and call for \$16 billion in tax increases. "I think it goes without saying a lot of people at the White House won't like it," said Sen. Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., the committee chairman, as he unveiled the package for panel members. Across the Capitol, Republicans sat on the sidelines as the Democratic majority in the House voted down the budget Reagan submitted to Congress on Feb. 5. The package has attracted virtually no support, but Republicans blasted Democratic leaders for playing politics by forcing an up-or-down vote on the administration plan without presenting an alternative. "The vote to reject Reagan's budget was 312-12. "This is all a farce today, a sham," said House Republican Leader Robert Michel of Illinois, urging House members to simply vote "present" when the budget came up for a vote later in the day. Nonetheless, there were 74 Republicans joining 238 Democrats in voting against the president's budget. There also were 77 Republicans and one Democrat voting "present." Democrats said they wanted to air the inequities of administration policies and head-off charges that they had not considered the president's proposals. "After the vote, Rep. William H. Gray III, D-Pa., chairman of the House Budget Committee, said, "I hope the president will get a message" — that his "distorted priorities" cannot even get support from his own party. Domenici, meanwhile, said he proposed his own budget after bipartisan talks on a spending plan for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1 snagged over the issue of millitary spending. White House spokesman Albert R. Brashear said the White House would have no comment on Domenici's proposal until analysts have a chance to study it. Domenici's plan would: • See BUDGET on Page A2

Cosmonauts off to orbiting lab

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union launched two veteran cosmonauts Thursday on the first manned space mission since the Challenger disaster at Cape Canaveral, sending them to work aboard a new orbiting lab. State television broke with custom and provided live coverage of the Soyuz T-15 blasting off from the Baikonur Cosmodrome in Soviet central Asia at 3:33 p.m. (5:33 a.m. MST). U.S. television

networks also broadcast the launch. The first live coverage of an all-Soviet mission showed the red and white craft streaking into slightly overcast skies above the space center in Kazakhstan. It carried commander Leonid Kizim and engineer Vladimir Solovov to a rendezvous with the new orbiting station named Mir, which means "peace" in Russian. Press, the official news agency, said the docking would occur in two days. The Mir was launched unmanned from Baikonur on Feb. 20. Reporting the docking date was as unusual as televising the launch when it happened. Soviet officials have not explained the departure from customary practice. Soviet television was quick to show film of the Jan. 28 Challenger explosion — which took the lives of two astronauts — and said: • See LAUNCH on Page A2

Divers recover flight recorders

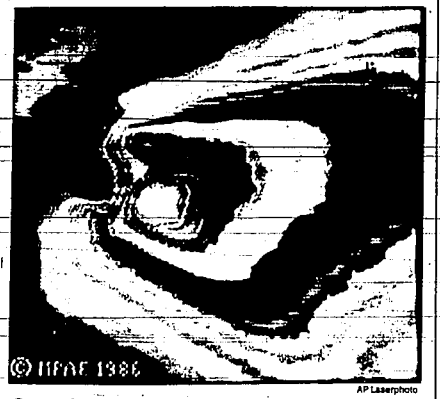

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Divers have recovered all four flight recorders and some of the five computers aboard the shuttle Challenger, and they may provide valuable data about the space disaster, sources said Thursday night. Although submerged in salt water for six weeks, the instruments may be able to tell investigators about the moments before and after Challenger exploded 73 seconds into its flight Jan. 28, killing the crew of seven. The sources close to the investigation, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the recorders and computers were brought ashore Wednesday night along with more remains of the crew, parts of the flight deck, two unused space suits and other debris. The recovered monitors could provide information on such things as temperatures, acceleration and structural stresses. They were being kept in a cool-water tank until they could be cleaned and dried under controlled temperature and humidity conditions at a NASA tape-recorder facility.

The computers, which were in complete control of the spacecraft during liftoff, may provide data on how the shuttle reacted during the thousandth of a second after the explosion occurred. An Atlantic storm kept most of Challenger's recovery fleet in port Thursday. The USS Preserver, which docked Wednesday night with the new debris, headed for the search site again Thursday, but turned back after winds gusting up to 40 mph churned the seas into 10-foot swells. The adverse conditions also stalled planning for recovering a 400- to 500-pound chunk which some officials say could be the segment of the right booster rocket believed responsible for the explosion. The chunk was located Wednesday 32 miles northeast of Cape Canaveral. Sources who speak on condition of anonymity said the Preserver Wednesday night brought in more body parts, sections of the flight deck where four of the astronauts sat, astronauts' personal effects in a locker, two spacesuits which were aboard for an emergency space walk and other debris.

Comet dust batters Giotto probe

DARMSTADT, West Germany — The European spacecraft Giotto hurtled into a wall of dust in outer space Friday, knocking out its signal to Earth as it beamed back the closest pictures ever taken of Halley's comet. After the 25-minute blackout, Giotto began transmitting data again, but there were no more pictures, said Peter Wenzel head of the European Space Agency's solar and alphergetic division. "Some equipment is operating. We are receiving some data. We think we have not lost the spacecraft," he said. Giotto had been travelling at 150,000 miles per hour, when it hit a "wall of dust, the size of grains of sand," Wenzel said. The craft's own monitors told mission controllers it was being bombarded by dust particles at 120 impacts per second during the two minutes of the flight before the signal was lost, Wenzel said. Until then, Giotto was sending pictures every four seconds as it approached Halley's nucleus. The signal from the craft was lost when it was 415 miles from the nucleus, at 1:10 a.m. (5:10 p.m. MST), said • See COMET on Page A2

Sweeping overhaul measure would reduce income taxes

WASHINGTON — Senate Finance Committee Chairman Bob Packwood on Thursday introduced — with President Reagan's support — a bill that would produce the most-sweeping changes in the federal tax system in more than 30 years, reducing individual income taxes by an average 8.4 percent. The legislation would raise consumer taxes on alcohol, tobacco and gasoline and shift to corporations a tax burden of between \$10 billion and \$15 billion over the next five years. How the excise tax increases would affect the total tax picture of individuals and businesses is a matter of speculation. Packwood, unveiling the new plan at a news conference, said it would make the tax system more fair, ensure that rich individuals and profitable companies pay a share of tax, and increase incentives for investment in job-creating activities. As for simplification, the Oregon Republican could promise only that "it is no more complicated than the present tax code." "The president is on board. He supports this bill. I am delighted," Packwood said. The committee will start work on the legislation next week; Packwood said he hopes the bill will be completed by May 1 and ready for Reagan to sign by Aug. 15. Most changes would take effect next Jan.

The bill includes the provisions that Reagan has said are essential to any "tax reform." It would cut tax rates significantly for individuals and corporations, raise the standard deduction, boost the personal exemption to \$2,000 for almost all taxpayers, restrict deductions for some state and local taxes and interest, and increase investment and saving incentives. It also would retain the tax-free status of most-employee fringe benefits. The bill — like the one proposed by Reagan and the version passed by the House last December — would free more than 6 million low-income people from the income tax altogether. According to staff estimates, Packwood's

bill would cut income taxes for those in the \$10,000-to-\$20,000 income class by 23 percent, compared with 2.8 percent under the House bill and 16.3 percent under Reagan's plan. At the \$20,000-to-\$40,000 level, the cuts would average 9.3 percent in the House and Senate bills and 6.3 percent under Reagan's. Those with incomes over \$200,000 would get a 5.9 percent cut under Packwood, 6 percent under the House bill and 13.6 percent under Reagan's bill. But the consumer tax increases included in Packwood's bill could reduce the size of the income tax reductions for many individuals, as could the provision denying businesses a deduction for excise taxes and tariffs they pay — companies likely would raise prices to offset the loss of that deduc-

tion. Overall, according to staff members, the bill would cut individual income taxes by \$184 billion over the next five years; raise excise taxes by \$13 billion; and raise corporate income taxes \$10 billion plus an additional \$62 billion because of the loss of the deduction for excise taxes and tariffs. The measure would raise the personal income tax exemption, now \$1,080 for 1986, to \$2,000 for all except those who make more than \$100,000 a year. The standard deductions would be raised significantly, although a figure has not been set. The 14 individual tax brackets (15 for single people) would be squeezed into three; the present rates ranging from 11 percent to 50 percent would be cut to 15 percent, 25 percent and 35 percent.

Roger Bonnet, the space agency's director of scientific programs. Two second later, according to the flight plan, Giotto would have reached its closest point to the comet, at a distance of 353 miles.

Before the signal died, the last pictures displayed on monitors at the mission control center showed the comet's nucleus as a potato-shaped lobe surrounded by gas and dust, space agency officials said.

Although Giotto got closer than any other spacecraft, officials couldn't immediately confirm it made the targeted 353 miles from the nucleus because they weren't getting signals at the time.

Horst Keller, the West German professor who participated in designing the craft's multi-color camera, said Giotto was less than 620 miles away from the nucleus when the last photograph was received.

Despite the blackout, European Space Agency officials at mission control center in Darmstadt said they were satisfied with the performance.

The pictures indicated Halley's nucleus is made up of hard interior and an outer cocoon of dust, Keller said. Taken together, the nucleus and the dust cocoon were about 1.9 miles long and perhaps 3.1 miles wide, he said.

If late storms create hazardous highway conditions, the report will resume until the situation improves. The statewide report number is 336-6600.

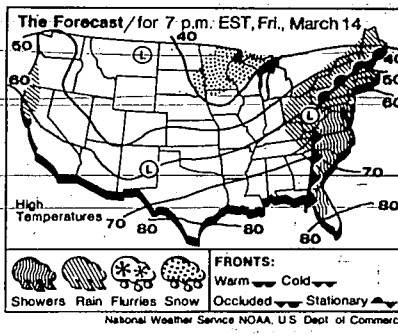
This winter, an average of 300 calls per day were made to the statewide recording. The six regional recordings were called almost 200 times daily.

Centennial celebration taxing districts founder in committee

BOISE — Members of the House Revenue and Taxation Committee Thursday rejected a bill proposed by Sen. Lynn Tomlinaga, R-Paul, that would have allowed Idahoans to set up taxing districts to raise money for Idaho's centennial celebration in 1990.

If the bill were made law, a two-thirds majority of the voters in a district could put on a maximum property tax levy of 5 mills, raising about \$5 per year on a \$100,000 home.

Opponents of the bill said citizens could lobby their county commissioners for money from county budgets and objected to the bill because they said there are laws already on the book that permit the same thing.

"This is something that is not an emergency," said Rep. Phil Chalkers, R-Boise.

He said that unlike police and fire services, which

are universally used, a historic district tax could force one-third of the voters in a district to pay for something they are not interested in and did not vote for.

Tomlinaga said he introduced the bill this year because Idaho cities will need time to prepare for the centennial that is four years off.

The bill as proposed would have required that any centennial commission funded by the levy be shut down, and with it the levy, on July 1, 1992.

Citizens interested in historical celebrations in Jerome County, Ketchum, Lewiston, and Idaho Falls have expressed interest in and support of the bill, said Tomlinaga.

Rep. Robert Forrey, R-Nampa, said that if supporters of a historical district lobbied their county board of commissioners, they could probably get historical commission funds built into the county budget for a few years.

Tomlinaga said he may try another version of the bill later this year.

Amendment by Senate looks likely for sales tax exemption on gasohol

BOISE — Although the extension of the sales tax exemption for gasohol won approval from the Senate Transportation Committee Thursday, the bill renewing the extension may well be amended before the Senate takes final action on it.

The gasohol industry in Idaho has enjoyed the tax break for five years and is seeking to have it extended through 1992.

Proponents of the bill said that if gasohol production increases, a new market for Idaho grain will develop and stimulate the farm economy.

But committee members apparently had second thoughts about the measure.

Immediately after the committee voted, 8-1, to recommend that the Senate pass the bill, chairman Sen. Reed Budge, R-Soda Springs, and other members of the committee said the proposed extension was too long for their liking.

Sen. Phil Ball, R-Idaho, said Thursday evening he plans to get together with Republicans and Democrats on Thursday to try and draft amendments they can all agree on.

He said he will propose amendments from the floor of the Senate if

he can drum up support for them. He said amendments might shorten the time the tax break will be offered or phase out the tax break gradually.

Sen. Jerry Thorne, R-Nampa, cast the lone vote against the measure. He said after the meeting there is no guarantee ethanol producers will buy their barley in Idaho, and he said the exemption lasts too long.

The 4-cent-per-gallon tax exemption takes money out of the coffers of the state and local highway managers.

Proponents of the bill, including Rep. Steve Antone, R-Rupert, say the tax exemption will encourage growth in the farm-product-based

production of ethanol, which is added to gasoline to make gasohol.

Melvin Aisager, vice president for corporate development at the J.N. Simplot Corp., said Simplot is getting ready to build a \$30 million ethanol plant that would use a species of waxy barley to produce alcohol and several co-products, including an edible bran and a soluble fiber to be added to food.

Aisager said that once the plant is built, it will likely buy \$25 million worth of the waxy barley each year.

He said the crop could adapt to dryland and irrigated farming and might put about 100,000 acres of Idaho farmland to work.

Decisions on prison put off day

BOISE (AP) — With the pot for financing state construction projects swelled by \$15 million from the just-passed sales tax increase, legislative budget writers turned their attention on Thursday to the need for a new state prison.

But the committee, echoing the concern of the Permanent Building Fund Advisory Council over inadequate information on the prison, put off any decision on that project and others for at least one day.

Instead, it directed Legislative Auditor Bruce Balderston to gather as much outside information as possible on the classification of inmates currently in the state system and exactly what kind of new facility will be needed to ease overcrowding.

Rep. Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, a member of the council and co-chairman of the budget-setting panel, said the council has been concerned that the only information it has gotten on the need for a new 300-inmate to 500-inmate maximum-security prison has come from Corrections Director Al Murphy.

While Public Workers Director Brian Chase said there is no doubt the state will need at least a 100-inmate maximum-security facility, which would cost about \$8 million, he said "the real issue is whether you need 300 or 500 beds."

Chase suggested that only a detailed study of classification of inmates would provide that information. A 500-inmate facility could cost as much as \$23 million.

"There's a credibility issue here," he said, and if nothing more, the independent study would confirm Murphy's assessment. Murphy has said Idaho, with no true maximum security-prison space, has one of the highest rates of maximum security classified inmates in the nation because the judicial system has already used various programs to limit the number of good-risk felons actually behind bars.

Earlier, the committee continued drafting the 1987 operating budget for state agencies, voting to provide the second phase of the judicial pay raise approved last year as well as the money needed to maintain up-to-date law library facilities.

But the conservative members maintained their campaign to hold 1987 spending to a bare minimum, and that drive prompted the complete elimination of one investment officer from the state treasurer's staff.

Party-line vote plows under foreclosure moratorium bill

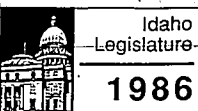
BOISE — Sen. John Peavey, D-Carey, got nowhere Thursday when he carried Gov. John Evans' farm mortgage foreclosure moratorium bill to the Senate Agricultural Affairs Committee.

On a party-line vote, the committee rejected the bill, 6-3, killing one of the five parts of a Democratic package of bills to help farmers.

The bill would have given the governor the power to declare the state's agricultural economy in a state of emergency.

Following that declaration, farmers could petition the court for a one-year continuance in any foreclosure as long as they continued to make interest payments, pay taxes and insurance premiums, and submit to mediation by a foreclosure review board Gov. John Evans hopes to establish.

The problem is more serious than we think it is," Peavey told the committee. He said there may be as many as 30 percent of Idaho's farmers who cannot land borrowing loans this year.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, said the bill does not define well enough the conditions under which the governor can declare a state of emergency. Arguments over the word "massive" would fuel lawsuits, Noh said.

Peavey said the bill requires that farmers be selling their crops for less than their cost of production before the governor could declare a state of emergency.

"It just prevents that run on the market... what you have out there and what I have out there won't be worth a hoot," because of foreclosures on neighboring farms, said Sen. Dwight Horsch, D-Abereen.

"I know what the problem is out there," said Sen. Vearl Crystal, R-Lewisville. "I'm in the process of liquidating my herd... There's very little we can do on the state level; I think this is just legislative meddling in financial affairs."

Sen. Lynn Tomlinaga, R-Paul, said he did not think the bill would help farmers avoid losing their farms.

House passes budget reserve

BOISE (AP) — By the narrowest of margins, the Idaho House has approved a proposed constitutional amendment setting up a budget reserve account.

A Democrat objected that it was "ridiculous to be creating a 'savings account' that could get up to \$24 million per year when the state can't properly fund programs. But the House voted 56-28 for the proposal and sent it on to the Senate.

The tally couldn't have been tighter. It takes 56 votes to pass proposed constitutional amendments.

The first count was 55-27, which would have meant a loss by a single vote. But House Speaker Tom Silvers noted that Rep. Gold- en Linford, R-Rexburg, wasn't recorded as voting on the issue, and made Linford declare his intentions.

Linford voted yes, just enough to pass the issue. Rep. Paul Keeton, D-Lewislaton, later added his vote, which was no.

All Democrats voted against, except for Rep. Larry Echolfawk, D-Pocottello. Republicans voted 55-12 for the proposal.

The state already has a budget reserve account. But sponsor Rep. Gary Montgomery, R-Boise, told House members it's too easy to spend the money.

Good intentions carry day

BOISE (AP) — Members of a House committee called a tax proposal from a Moscow state legislator "lousy tax policy," but they voted for it anyway because of its good intentions.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Thursday voted approval for legislation sponsored by Rep. James Lucas, R-Moscow, imposing a special surcharge on corporations to fund college and university research.

If enacted into law, the Lucas legislation would tax corporations an extra 1 1/2 percent on income over \$50,000. Lucas estimated that would make about \$5 million per year available for research and development, which he contended is vital to Idaho's future.

"It's lousy tax policy and a bad spending policy, but I'm going to vote for it," said Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise.

Gilbert 'elated' at dismissal

BOISE (AP) — Federal prosecutors' request to drop four misdemeanor civil rights charges against avowed white supremacist Keith Gilbert caught his court-appointed attorney off guard, but left the Post Falls man "elated."

"I was totally surprised," defense attorney Kim Lindquist, Weiser, said Thursday.

"I was certainly ready for a fight, but I went into this thing innocent and I came out innocent," Gilbert said in a telephone interview from the Idaho State Penitentiary, where he is serving a nine-year sentence for welfare fraud and state tax evasion.

A five-day trial was scheduled to begin Thursday on charges that Gilbert, 45, violated the civil rights of black families in Kootenai County during the early 1980s.

But U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan late Wednesday threw out four counts included in an indictment handed down by a federal grand jury in December.

Stallings restores INEL funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, has claimed victory on bills restoring more than \$8 million for test facilities at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory and authorizing study of adding the Henrys Fork of the Snake River to the federal Wild and Scenic Rivers system.

Funds for the Argonne National Laboratory West facility at the INEL were cut from the Department of Energy's fiscal 1987 budget earlier this week by the House Science and Technology Subcommittee on Energy Research and Production.

"I'm delighted that this major raid on the operating funds for the Argonne test facilities at the INEL was headed off," Stallings said Thursday.

Liquor sale on Sunday zips past

BOISE (AP) — Legislation authorizing Sunday sales of liquor by the drink and extending closing hours to 2 a.m. has quietly cleared the Idaho Senate.

The bill was sent to the House Thursday on a 26-16 vote after less than five minutes of floor discussion and no debate against it.

"This is necessary for our hospitality industry," Sen. Vern Lannen, D-Pinehurst, sponsor of the bill, said. "Right now, they're closed 52 days a year. Our economy is in tough straits, and we need to give these people the flexibility to operate."

Coupled with the one-hour extension in closing times and Sunday sales was a provision giving counties the authority to impose by local ordinance more stringent restrictions on liquor sales than state law provides. Cities already have that authority.

The issue has already been before the House several times without success, but in each instance it has been coupled with a controversial bill raising Idaho's legal drinking age from 19 to 21 as mandated by the federal government under penalty of lost highway funds. Opponents of the more liberal state liquor sales regulations have combined with critics of "federal blackmail" on the drinking-age issue to doom the proposal.

Prospects for passage could be different with the drinking age controversy removed.

Among those voting for the bill were Republicans Larry Anderson of Twin Falls, Darrel McRoberts of Twin Falls, Laird Noh of Kimberly, Lynn Tomingna of Paul, and John Peavoy of Carey. Republicans opposing the bill included Denton Darrington of Deelo.

Hansen wants probe of Justice Department attorneys

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Former Idaho Rep. George Hansen says he may call for an investigation of the Justice Department and federal attorneys over alleged acts of political chicanery and cover-ups.

Hansen, who was convicted on four counts of filing false financial disclosure statements under the Ethics in Government Act, awaits a federal court hearing at which date will be set for him to begin his five-to-15 month prison sentence.

"Three times in the past 25 years I've been turned into the target," Hansen said Thursday in a telephone interview from his Washington, D.C., office. "And three times the Justice Department has bungled or covered up the crime while turning me into the target."



2 charter lines kept on flying

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two charter airlines continued to carry thousands of U.S. servicemen for months in 1984, although FAA inspectors had urged that the carriers be grounded for safety violations, congressional investigators revealed Thursday.

The finding prompted Rep. Charles Bennett, D-Pa., a ranking member of the House Armed Services Committee, to suggest that servicemen refuse to board aircraft they believe to be unsafe — and send him a collect telegram if their protest causes trouble.

The Pentagon last year spent \$453 million on contracts with scores of airlines — both large and small — to transport its personnel around the world, according to General Accounting Office investigators.

In its report, the GAO focused on safety violations dating back to early 1984 at two airlines — Air Resorts, a small charter operator based in Carlsbad, Calif., and South Pacific Island Airways, based in Honolulu.

Conable to head World Bank

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has selected former Rep. Barber Conable, a New York Republican, to succeed A.W. Clausen as president of the World Bank, the White House said Thursday.

Conable, former senior Republican on the House Ways and Means Committee, is a professor of government at the University of Rochester.

Clausen's term expires in July.

Earlier, Federal Reserve Board Chairman Paul Volcker rejected an administration offer to head the 149-nation international lending organization.

The name of Labor Secretary William Brock had been mentioned in some quarters as a possible successor to Clausen.

Even in advance of the formal announcement, Conable's appointment was hailed by members of Congress and diplomats.

The appointment comes at a time when the Reagan administration is seeking to expand the role of the bank to help ease the debt crisis of Latin American nations.

Amtrak continues fund fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ending federal subsidies to Amtrak likely would kill the passenger railroad line because states and local agencies are less able than ever to assume the financial burden, Amtrak's president said Thursday.

While Reagan administration officials say the line might survive without new federal dollars, Amtrak President Graham Claytor Jr. told a House Appropriations transportation subcommittee that — like last year — the proposal to end those subsidies has Amtrak fighting for its survival.

"I don't foresee any significant possibility that any significant part of the Amtrak system will be maintained by state and local entities and commuter agencies," Claytor said.

U.S. cool to test ban

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration reacted coolly Thursday to a proposal by Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev that the United States join Moscow in an indefinite moratorium on nuclear testing and negotiate a permanent test-ban that includes on-site verification.

While House spokesman Larry Speakes said the U.S. position on nuclear testing has not changed, "Nuclear weapons remain for the foreseeable future an important element of our deterrent force," he said. "The Soviets have made rapid gains in the balance of that and it is necessary for us and our allies to conduct tests in the near future."

Speakes' comment reflected a change in administration emphasis from insisting on adequate verification for a test ban to stressing the need to continue testing as a vital part of the nation's nuclear deterrent.

Richardson, Adamson underline differences

TWIN FALLS — Second Congressional District candidate Moll Richardson stressed his popularity, while candidate Dennis Adamson stressed his knowledge of the issues at a Wednesday night meeting of the Twin Falls County Republican Central Committee.

"The real difference (between us) is who can win in November," said Richardson, an Idaho Falls broadcaster, after the meeting.

Falls of the eastern Idaho area — including one done by Ricks College students and a poll by the Bonneville Republican women's newsletter — show him to be strongly by leading the pack of six GOP candidates, he said after the meeting.

A strong candidate will be needed to beat Democratic incumbent Richard Stallings, who has the support of some Republicans who believe he is just another conservative, Richardson said.

He accused Stallings of having the "Frank Church syndrome," and voting liberally much of the year, but switching to a more conservative position for the six months before elections.

If a Republican does not win the upcoming election, Idaho voters will continue to send Stallings back to Washington for many years to come, Richardson said.

"Richardson talks nice, he talks smooth, but he doesn't talk the issues," said Adamson.

"The last major issue (in the race) is who can beat Stallings," he said. "The state is in terrible trouble." He called agriculture the top Idaho problem-requiring congressional leadership.

Richardson told Republicans that the government must get out of farming, but do it gradually so farmers would have a chance to get back on their feet. "A free, fair world market is the only answer in the long run," he said.

He also said that he sees hope for Idaho farmers in using farm products to make ethanol for mixing with gasoline.

Adamson, a Jerome County attorney and farmer, said he also supported the program, but that it could hardly be considered an answer to farmer's troubles. Promoting ethanol is ill-timed now that crude oil prices are falling, and even if profitable, would affect only a fraction of the number of farmers in trouble, he said.

He also criticized Richardson's call for free and fair trade. The nation needs reciprocal trade to require that countries match their exports to the United States with American imports, he said.

The short-term answer to farming difficulties is not subsidies, but price-support loans, he said.

Adamson and Richardson also disagreed on the propriety of a \$4 million payment written into an appropriation measure by U.S. Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, for the owners of three parcels of land on which the government wanted to build a road when they were refused the price they asked.

Although he admires the senator, McClure was wrong to arrange the payment, Adamson said. A senator must avoid "the very appearance of unethical action," he said. "When he stepped in, there grew the appearance of impropriety."

McClure could have worked in other ways if he thought investors were not being paid fairly, he said. The action will not tarnish McClure's reputation in a state where he is well liked but "it cost the political process clout," he said.

Richardson said he had not looked at the matter closely, but "if Sen. McClure did it, it must have some merit," he said.

Campbell indicted on drug charge

BOISE — A federal grand jury returned a three-count felony indictment Wednesday against Mitchell Campbell of Twin Falls, who is already serving a sentence on drug and tax violation convictions.

U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth said the indictment charged the 37-year-old Campbell with distribution of cocaine and codeine Feb. 21 and possessing a firearm after a felony conviction.

At the time of his arrest in Twin Falls, Campbell was out on a federal bond pending his appeal of convictions for selling cocaine and tax violations. He was sentenced in December 1985 in U.S. District Court to serve three years in state prison on those convictions.

U.S. District Judge Harold L. Ryan issued an order March 5 withdrawing the appeal bond because of the new charges. As a result, Campbell was ordered to begin serving his sentence.

No other information was available in the indictment about the charges. Ellsworth said he could make no comment about the grand jury processing, which is closed to the public.

Campbell will be arraigned on the new charges in U.S. District Court. An arraignment date has not yet been scheduled.

Ellsworth said the federal government has the option of prosecuting drug cases, which are both federal and state offenses.

A federal grand jury performs a function similar to a preliminary hearing on the state court level — determining if there is probable cause, Ellsworth said.

Campbell was arrested Feb. 21 at his residence at 173 Larkspur Drive by Twin Falls police and state and federal agents. He was accused of making deliveries of an unspecified amount of cocaine and Emperin with codeine to an individual at K-Mart Feb. 21. Weapons were found at his Larkspur Drive residence, claimed county officials at a bond hearing on the charges.

Before his first arrest in March 1985 on the prior drug charges, Campbell housed foster children referred by the state Department of Health and Welfare. He also had been active in an anti-drug program.

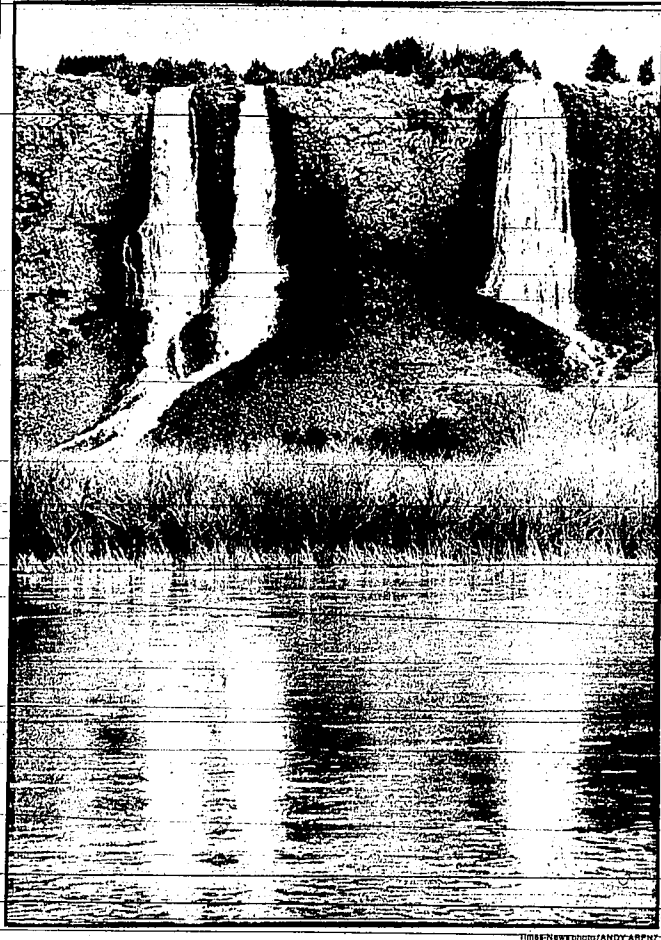

Dam releases to be slowed

TWIN FALLS — Over this coming weekend the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation will begin temporarily reducing releases from the American Falls dam to drawdown the Snake River in the Thousand Springs area.

The drawdown is a "yearly thing," says Denny Davis of the Bureau of Reclamation's office in Burley.

Davis, who works in water operations, said the bureau usually tries to coordinate the drawdown with the U.S. Geological Survey so scientists with that agency can conduct their annual spring measurements of flows from the Thousand Springs area into the river.

Davis said that flows will be down Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday to give the USGS time to conduct its measurements.

River flows in the Thousand Springs area should begin coming back up by next Thursday, he added.

The low flows will also help spring construction at the Minidoka Dam, in preparation for the upcoming irrigation season, according to a press release from the bureau.

Aside from the drawdown, flows are expected to be relatively high this spring in the Snake River because of high precipitation levels in the river's upper reaches.

According to bureau figures, precipitation was 329 percent of normal for February at the Jackson Lake Dam.

Overall, however, water levels are not as extreme.

Levels are 132 percent of normal for the tributaries to the North Fork of the Snake River — more commonly referred to as the Henry's Fork, Davis said. At Arnie Dam, levels are 146 percent of normal, he added.

Other portions of the system, such as the reservoir at Island Park Dam, are only 89 percent of normal, Davis said.

In spite of the above-normal precipitation levels in some areas, Davis said, "We've got lots of space" for flood control. "We're not at a critical situation."

Water flows, like these, will be measured in the Thousand Springs area next week.

Industrial park plan seems to falter

Hailey City Council pessimistic about meeting grant deadline

HAILEY — After two years of hard work and effort by the Hailey City Council and developer David Manookian, it appears a proposed light industrial park will not materialize.

The deadline for fulfilling grant requirements comes up March 31, and the council says the project is likely to fail.

However, Manookian has been unable to come up with enough signed leases from business tenants. The project would provide the required number of jobs.

Scott Bybee, of J-U-B Engineers, said the state has spent \$28,282 to date for legal fees, planning and design phases of the project. That money will not come from city funds, but has been paid for by the state.

Last September, bids were opened for construction of the water and sewer systems and a 2,500 gpm well.

"Myself or the council haven't had any contact with him (Manookian) in the last two months," said Mayor Paschal Drake. "It doesn't look too promising."

Manookian did not attend the council meeting Monday to present a progress report on his efforts at obtaining signed leases for the proposed park. He also failed to appear before the council at its February meeting.

The Times-News has been unable to contact Manookian this week for comment.

Mayor Paschal Drake said he received a request from Jan Blikenstaff, administrator of the Idaho Community Block Grant Program, to submit a formal letter stating the council will not seek another extension for the community block grant.

The project began two years ago after the city obtained a \$331,000 economic development grant to create a light industrial park at the south end of town. Developers had hoped it would bring at least 30 new jobs to Hailey.

The council has already taken steps to find other funds for repair of the Indian Springs water system, which was originally included in the community block grant for the industrial park.

When the \$331,000 grant was awarded, about \$75,000 was earmarked for street improvements in the city's low to moderate income areas. However, after the city faced problems with a decreased water supply at the city's primary water source, Indian Springs, the council decided to divert the grant's street funds to solve the water dilemma.

In February, the council applied for another state grant aimed at directly correcting the water flow problems, rather than depending upon Manookian to complete his project.

City Engineer Bruce Butler told the council he estimated the cost of repairing the water system will be \$90,000. The city would con-

tribute one-third of the total amount in hopes of obtaining the grant money.

He said 63 applicants have filed preliminary paperwork for grants, of which only seven to 10 grants will be awarded.

"The competition is real stiff," Butler said. "An on-site investigation of the springs has not been possible yet due to snow cover and muddy conditions, but Butler said he had "some ideas" as to what was causing the reduced water flow and incorporated the costs into his \$90,000 price estimate.

Former city engineer Scott Bybee had originally estimated the cost of alleviating the problem at \$10,000 to \$20,000.

Several possible causes for the decreased water flow have been offered: roots may be growing in water lines, shifting ground from a 1983 earthquake may be causing water to circumvent pipes, or old water lines which had been left underground may be capturing the water and draining it elsewhere.

Whatever the cause, city officials are on the alert.

Drake said the city could "get by" through the summer with alternate day sprinkling, since crews will be unable to get into the springs until the ground dries up next fall.

"If this grant doesn't go through, we'll be in a position where we'll have no alternative," said Butler, indicating the city could use its own crews to handle the problem.

Injury claim rejected

TWIN FALLS — A 5th District Court jury ruled Wednesday for the defendants in a lawsuit filed by a woman who claimed she fell in the parking lot of Smith's Food King store in Buhl about three years ago.

Stella All, no age or address available, filed a \$250,000 lawsuit May 19, 1983, against Smith's Management Corp. and Shelby's Park Center, which owns the property on which the store is located.

All claimed she fell in a pothole in the parking lot while walking with an armful of groceries, sustaining injuries to her knees and arms, particularly her right wrist and elbow.

Smith's Management and Shelby's Park Center, she claimed, were negligent because they failed to properly maintain the parking lot, which was pitted with holes.

The trial was the second one in the case.

Fifth District Court Judge Daniel Meehl had ruled against All's claim earlier in a trial Aug. 14, 1984.

All appealed to the Idaho Supreme Court, which later overturned Meehl's ruling. The Idaho Supreme Court returned the case to District Court for further proceedings.

The second trial started Tuesday. The jury began deliberations about 5 p.m. Wednesday. After about three hours the panel returned and found no negligence on the part of the defendants.

Rezoning hearing delayed

JEROME — The Jerome County Commissioners Thursday postponed a public hearing on rezoning land for a new cheese plant because of technical flaws in notifying nearby residents.

The Mountain Empire Dairywomen's Association of Thornton, Colo. has asked for industrial zoning to allow the construction of a large cheese factory in an area in southcentral Jerome County.

The Jerome County Commis-

sioners were scheduled to hold the public hearing on the dairy cooperative's request. However, commissioner Pam Smith said that the required notices to residents within a half-mile of the site reportedly had not been sent and forcing the cancellation of the hearing.

County officials must now reschedule the hearing and notify the public of a new hearing date. The hearing is expected to take place sometime in early April, Smith said.

Soviets may assemble space station

SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — The two modules already in orbit, the Salyut 7 space station launched in 1982, and the Cosmos 1686, launched last fall. These two units already are united and are in an orbit just four miles above the Mir orbit, he said. Oberg said the modules will be in an excellent position soon for them to all be joined.

“What they’ll do then is still uncertain,” said Oberg. “There is probably a lot of valuable equipment aboard the Salyut that they might like to re-use.”

A link-up end-to-end of the three modules is dynamically “lifty,” he said, and there may be some other configuration planned. Each of the three modules, he said, weigh about 20 tons. The Mir has six docking ports.

Soviet officials announced earlier that another unmanned module launch was planned, and Oberg said he expects it while the cosmonaut crew is on board the Mir.

“There is known to be another module in preparation for launch in the spring,” said Oberg. “They have announced that because there are Western European instruments on board.”

The Soviets have prepared a craft called the Salyut HEXE (for High Energy X-ray Experiment), he said.

Despite a new openness about the Russian space program, Oberg said there are still puzzling omissions from the Soviet announcements.

For instance, he said they have not described the purpose of the Cosmos 1686 module. He said the unit could contain a small factory for the manufacture of electronic crystals.

Production of such crystals in the weightlessness of space is important to Soviet technology because the USSR lacks the high technology to produce quality crystals on the ground in great quantity.

Marcos put millions into Swiss accounts

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A government commission has discovered that ousted President Ferdinand E. Marcos hid \$800 million in a Swiss bank account, a major step toward locating up to \$10 billion he allegedly spirited out of the Philippines, an official said Thursday.

President Corason Aquino, meanwhile, ordered Philippine banks to freeze all assets held by Marcos, his wife, Imelda, and 31 of his associates.

Ramon Diaz of the new Commission on Good Government announced discovery of the Swiss bank account Thursday but refused to provide details or say how the commission learned of its existence.

Commission head Jovito Salonga has estimated that Mar-

cos and his associates illegally diverted \$5 billion to \$10 billion in national assets to overseas accounts and investments.

Raul Daza, also a commission official, told a news conference that the Aquino government is “optimistic and hopeful” it will regain any wealth Marcos invested illegally in the United States “in line with pronouncements previously made by the United States that they will cooperate with the Philippine government.”

Salonga began a 10-day visit to the United States on Wednesday. He plans to collect evidence of Marcos’ holdings, consult U.S. legal experts on ways to regain the funds and meet with State Department officials, Daza said.

Police fire on funeral procession

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police fired birdshot and tear gas into a black funeral procession Thursday, police officers dropped the coffins, and the mourners fled in panic, witnesses said.

Townpeople said the police opened fire at the funeral for four riot victims in Khuma black township at Hillfontein after mourners ignored orders to restrict it to immediate relatives and carry the caskets by hearse. At least five people were reported wounded.

A white attorney added to the controversy over a report of police shooting into black crowds on Tuesday by issuing a statement saying he saw the officers open fire without provocation or warning.

According to the witnesses at the Khuma funeral, police fired the birdshot and tear gas when police officers hoisted the four coffins onto their shoulders.

Police said the rule against carrying coffins on foot was intended to avert a potentially riotous funeral procession. A police account continued using force but mentioned no tear gas, not birdshot.

Some mass funerals have led to riots during the 18 months of violence against apartheid, the race laws that guarantee privilege for South Africa’s 5 million whites and deny rights to the 24 million blacks. Almost 1,300 people have been killed since September 1984, nearly all of them black.

An employee at Tshepong Hospital said it admitted three people and treated two others described to hospital personnel as victims of police action at the funeral in Khuma township.

The coffins were carried to the cemetery by hearse later without further incident, police said. They reported several fire bombings in the same area during which riot squads fired birdshot, slightly wounding three blacks.

Police shot the four blacks dead last month when youths went on a rampage during a protest demanding lower school fees, setting fire to a liquor store and a black policeman’s home.

Swiss to vote on UN entry

BERN, Switzerland (AP) — Neutral Switzerland, host of many United Nations activities, votes Sunday on whether it should join the world organization.

The referendum is a must under the nation’s unique system of direct democracy and is without precedent in the history of the U.N. system.

The vote follows weeks of intense debate, and the odds are the Swiss will reject U.N. membership.

Foreign Minister Pierre Aubert, a Social Democrat, and his six colleagues in the Federal Council, or Cabinet, toured the country campaigning for their proposal that Switzerland should join at long last.

They have strong support from Parliament and most media, but three recent polls suggest the proposal is headed for defeat. The latest listed 48 percent against, 34 percent in favor and 18 percent undecided.

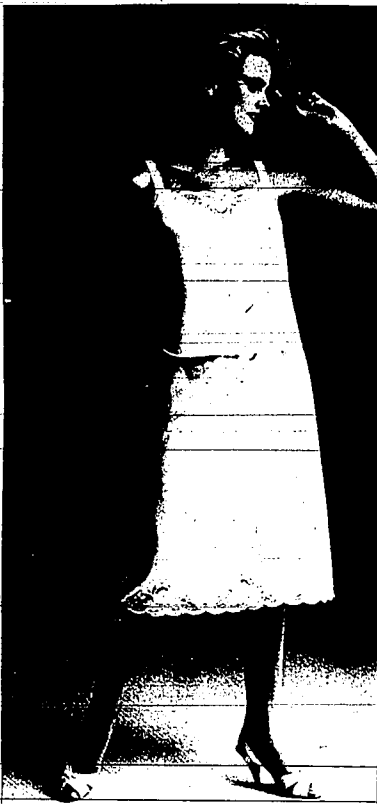
Deep-rooted popular suspicion has made the government treat the issue with extreme caution.

Sixteen years ago, it issued a report that membership would be “useful” but follow-up action was put off repeatedly for fear of a negative vote.

The government has printed 4.5 million leaflets telling the 4.1 million eligible voters that as the 160th U.N. member, Switzerland would be in a better position to defend its interests.

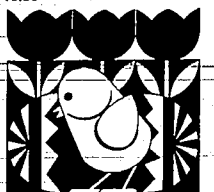

Little effect from sales drop

Dow index continues rise

NEW YORK — The stock market pushed ahead Thursday, establishing new highs for several major indicators in another busy session on Wall Street.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial shares rose 30 points in the early going, closed with an 8.28 gain at 1,173.71. That surpassed the previous closing peak of 1,146.05 reached on Tuesday.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 171.49 million shares, against Wednesday's total of 210.25 million, which was the second largest ever.

Before the market opened, the Commerce Department reported that retail sales dropped 0.1 percent in February, following a revised decline of 0.2 percent the month before. The figures provided new evidence that economic growth remains sluggish.

Many Wall Streeters had been expecting a bigger drop, and that expectation had helped drive interest rates lower in the credit markets

earlier in the week. So the news helped push rates higher in spots. But the stock market, after a brief negative reaction to that sequence of events, quickly regained its balance.

Analysts say stocks have benefited to a dramatic extent from falling interest rates, because lower rates have diminished the relative appeal of almost-bearish investments.

Stock traders, it is widely believed, are not particularly concerned about the present state of business activity, but rather are looking for circumstances that would permit interest rates to keep coming down.

K mart gained 1/2 to 42 1/2 in active trading. The company reported higher earnings from continuing operations for its latest quarter.

Tobacco stocks rose sharply in the wake of an appeals court ruling that cigarette makers need not make intricate corporate strategy documents public in connection with product-liability cases. Philip Morris climbed 1 1/2 to 118 1/2, and R.J. Reynolds Industries gained 2 1/2 to 41 1/2.

Philip Morris is a component of the Dow Jones Industrial average.

Other issues contributing to the Dow's advance included International Business Machines, up 1/4 at 150 3/4; Procter & Gamble, up 1/4 at 73 1/2; and General Motors, up 1/4 at 79 1/2.

U.S. Steel added 1/4 to 23 1/2. The company said in its annual report that it will take a \$250 million charge against its first-quarter earnings, reflecting lower values for oil and gas inventories at its Marathon Oil subsidiary.

Western Union dropped 3/4 to 7. On Wednesday the company proposed a recapitalization plan that would increase the amount of stock outstanding.

Advancing issues slightly outnumbered declines in the overall tally on the Big Board. The exchange's composite index gained 31 to 124.48.

Nationwide, improving in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 201.83 million shares.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market gained 66 to 370.35.

U.S. accuses Japan of 'dumping' chips

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Commerce Department, in a ruling that could have a major impact on U.S.-Japan trade relations, Thursday accused Japan of "dumping" sophisticated semiconductor memory chips in U.S. markets in violation of U.S. trade laws.

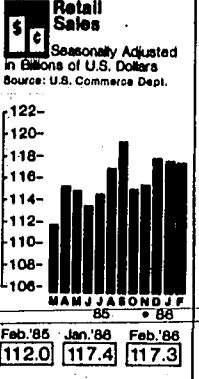
The agency, in a preliminary ruling, said Japanese electronics companies have been marketing the computer chips — a major component in personal computers and other consumer electronic devices — at costs below their cost of production.

The ruling automatically triggers stiff tariffs on imports from Japan of 256-kilobyte Dynamic-Random Access Memory (DRAM) chips.

The decision came on a complaint against Japanese computer-chip manufacturers lodged by the Reagan administration.

It came two days after the agency issued a similar ruling on a complaint brought by U.S. semiconductor manufacturers on another type of computer chip. Thursday's ruling, however, covers the basic computer circuit that is used in most home computers. U.S. semiconductor manufacturers have charged that Japanese companies have deliberately cut prices on the devices to drive off domestic competition.

"We take a very serious view of unfair trade," said Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige. "Today's preliminary finding indicates unfair trade practices by several Japanese companies. The purpose of our dumping law is to stop this kind of activity."

Car sales slip, incentive magic fades

DETROIT (AP) — Domestic automakers on Thursday reported a 4 percent sales decline in early March compared with a year ago, and analysts pointed to waning consumer interest in cut-rate financing deals.

"There's a lack of significantly attractive financing incentives. The 9.9 rate really isn't working," said Jean-Claude Gruet, automotive industry analyst at Salomon Bros. Inc. in New York.

General Motors Corp. sales were up 1.3 percent in the March 1-10 period compared with a year ago.

Ford Motor Co. sales were down 10.9 percent and Chrysler Corp.'s were down 11.6 percent.

However, Ford and Chrysler's market shares were unusually high a year ago, at GM's expense. In the latest period, GM got back some, but not all, of the share.

Ford's share was 25.6 vs. 27.6 a year ago; Chrysler's was 13.5 vs. 14.7, and GM's was 56.5 vs. 53.5 a year ago.

The prevailing sales bait for consumers since late February has been a 9.9 percent interest rate on loans financed through the Big Three's in-house credit companies. Rates are below 8 percent on subcompact car lines, and regional dealer organizations in some cases have knocked a few points off Detroit's rates. Chrysler also is offering a choice of rebates.

"What I think they're doing is testing the sensitivity of various financing programs," said Gruet, who predicted more generous sales incentives toward the end of March. "Since fall, the interest rates have become less attractive, even though the costs of funds have become less expensive."

Among the small producers, American Honda Motor Co. Inc. posted a 16.3 percent decline in sales of U.S.-made cars compared with the year-ago March 1-10 period.

The seasonally adjusted annual selling rate for the March 1-10 period was 1.7 million, well below the automakers' production capacity and building pressure on Detroit to cut production or improve sales. GM has made selected production cutbacks.

CSI survey of area will help focus its ag courses on farm situation

TWIN FALLS — The College of Southern Idaho is surveying more than 3,000 Magic Valley farmers and ranchers to help focus its agriculture courses more closely toward changing conditions on the farm.

On Tuesday, CSI mailed out 3,000 surveys and will distribute another 1,000 to agri-businesses for distribution to customers, said Rick Parker, who heads the college's Agricultural Department.

"We're trying to find out what we can do or what direction we can take," he said.

The eight-county survey will sketch a profile of Magic Valley farming and will sample some farmers' opinions. Deadline for returns is March 31. The results of the survey will be available in about 2 1/2 months, Parker said.

The survey will help CSI officials revamp the agriculture curriculum for both general students and adult, continuing education students.

"What is the farmer going to need if he's going to stay in business? If there's a farmer who's not going to stay in business, will he want to retrain?" Parker asks.

It could change the vocational school's offerings. "I've had some people come to me and say, 'What we really need is some business courses,'" he said. "They know how to be producers."

Areas such as agricultural mechanics and farm production could be revised. Courses also may be added in the continuing education courses for adults next year, Parker said.

The 36-item survey checks on the types of farms in the area, equipment use and maintenance, farmers' goals in their operations, valuable courses and some general financing patterns. Completed questionnaires do not identify the person who responded, Parkersaid.

State and national surveys have sampled farmers on their financial situations, but they do not focus sharply on the eight Magic Valley counties, he said.

CSI currently offers programs in farm management, agricultural mechanics, farm crops, agribusiness, — fisheries — technology, — animal — science, general agriculture and agriculture with equine emphasis.

Showdown time for CSI, Arizona Western

At 7-1, 290, Reyes makes big impression in scouting report

TWIN FALLS — When Arizona Western comes out on the floor to warm up for tonight's bi-regional showdown with College of Southern Idaho, the most prominent figure will be center Antonio Reyes.

Coach Jim Amick put his Matadors through a shoot-around session at the CSI gymnasium, low keying the entire situation and letting the curious locals take a look at what their Eagles will be facing in this, the last step before the national finals in Hutchinson, Kans., next week.

Obviously, the veteran Amick was enjoying the situation.

"People hear about his (Reyes') size and they immediately identify it with some big, fat kid," Amick said. "This guy doesn't have an ounce of fat on him."

Reyes — another Arizona-Western starter — 6-4 Calixto Arroyo, were recruited out of Mexico by Reyes, who considers the northern part of that country part of his territory because "Yuma is right on the border. They don't have high school teams and leagues like we do but they play a lot of town-team type basketball. I go down there every summer for a couple of weeks to see their tournaments," Amick said.

The others Amick is expecting to start tonight include 5'7" whippet Roosevelt Arnold, leading scorer and off-guard 6-2 Paul Bryant and 6-6 Juan Lozano.

The roster also includes players ranging up to 6-9. Amick brings the Matadors to town with no preconceived notions about CSI or what plan of attack he may try.

"I don't scout. Really, I don't call around. The only thing I know about CSI is what our regional director said about them after watching them last weekend (in regionals in St. George)."

"If I scouted, it might just confuse me and I'd just end up worrying too much," said the veteran coach who currently is in his second turn at the Arizona Western helm. He coached there from 1970-74 and then joined the West Virginia University staff for eight years, returning to Yuma in 1978.

"At this point in the season a team can't change much and get things done overnight," he explained. "You go with the things you've done all season. All the teams do basically the same things by this time of year. They change up defenses, have a couple of different presses and a couple of offense they try against different defenses thrown at them."

Amick similarly doubts whether a hostile crowd of 3,500 will affect his troops' play in any way.

"We generally get the best crowds in our league — not as big as they seem to get here — but our guys are used to playing in front of a lot of noisy people," he said.



Eagles seek last bit of polish in dry-run offensive drills

Eagles again rely on speed against tall foes

TWIN FALLS — The battle lines are drawn. The College of Southern Idaho (32-1) squares off against Arizona Western (27-3) at 8 p.m. today in front of a packed house in the CSI gymnasium.

While this technically is part of the national junior college tournament, the winner will join 16 other regional and bi-regional finalists in Hutchinson, Kans., to decide the national champion beginning Tuesday.

Tonight's winner will advance to a 3:30 p.m. (CST) Tuesday meeting with Cophal-Lincoln (31-2) in Hutchinson. It doesn't get any easier from there.

With most of the tournament bracket now filled (tonight will fill the other three spots) the winner of this bi-regional faces a tough run.

Barring upsets and an adherence to the final rankings, this is what the CSI-Arizona Western champion would face in a march toward next Saturday's finals in Kansas.

Tuesday, Cophal-Lincoln at 32-2; Wednesday, Moberly, Mo., 32-2; Thursday is an off day; Friday, Vincennes, Ind., 29-4 (three of those losses on forfeits for using an ineligible player before Christmas) and then San Jacinto, the nation's top-ranked team which currently is running 33-0.

The lower bracket currently has San Jacinto undefeated and two teams with two losses. The rest of those teams run from six to 12 defeats, including San Jac's opening opponent, Madison Area Tech, Wis., which comes in at 18-12.

CSI Coach Fred Trenkle pretty

well reflected the pre-game strategies discussed by his Arizona-Western counterpart, Jim Amick.

"I've called around and talked to some people. This game is exactly like about 12 or 15 other big ones we've had this year," he said. "They've got the size advantage and we apparently have an edge in overall quickness."

"If we have the advantage in overall quickness that we usually do, we should be all right. But if their big inside people have good mobility, they probably have the advantage. Either way, I expect it to be a war. Both of these teams are too close to getting to a pre-season goal to get less than all-out."

The matchups of the game again fall where they usually do — at center and at guard.

At Monday's practice when Trenkle was reacquainting his team with Arizona Western's usual starters, he gave 7-1, 290-pound Antonio Reyes until last.

When those statistics were revealed, CSI center Erick Newman immediately turned to 6-7 Jeff Rekeeweg and said "Jeff, you've got a problem." But the rest of the team was chanting "Er-lick, Er-lick, Er-lick."

Trenkle joined in the chant, meaning the 6-7 Newman, for the 14th time this year — will be guarding someone at least 5 inches taller than him.

"Our game plan is the same. We're going to get after them for 30 minutes, try to do the things offensively we've done all year and hope that that is enough to get us there," Trenkle concluded.

Burley clouts top-ranked St. Maries

Budge stars coming off bench

BOISE — Going to a state tournament is, after all, a reward.

"I tell them I like to see a lot of smiles on their faces," said Burley High Coach Steve Jensen after his unranked Bobcats stunned St. Maries 48-33 in the first round of the Idaho Class A-2 boys' basketball tournament here Thursday. "You get here, you play a great team — I tell them just to go out and have fun."

The win put Burley into an 8-05 semifinal contest tonight at the Boise State University Pavilion against Bishop Kelly, a 57-46 winner over Snake River. Marsh Valley, a 70-62 winner over Wallace, and Rigby, which beat Emmett 52-47 in the other games Thursday, will collide at 4:45 in the other semifinal.

Smiles abounded among the District 4 champions and their partisans on Thursday. The only hint of drudgery was on the other bench, where St. Maries Coach Jim Asher was at a loss to explain his team's performance.

"We've been here eight years in a row, and we've never won it. I don't know — maybe we should stay home for five years and get hungry."

The Lumberjacks, ranked No. 1 in the Associated Press A-2 prep poll for the last three weeks of the

regular season, did not look the part Thursday despite a monumental size advantage on the Bobcats.

"We knew they were a run-and-gun team and we knew they didn't have much size, but we knew they were in the state tournament for a reason," Asher said. "They wanted it and

they worked awfully hard to get it."

The Axers shot just 33 percent for the game, including 22 percent in the second half. But they lost the game on defense.

"We've played both man (to-man) and zone this season, but we're predominantly a zone team," said Asher. "We knew Burley would be tough against the zone because of their outside shooting, but that's no excuse. We've played small, quick teams before. We just stood around too much."

Scott Melling, Burley's 5-foot-11 senior forward who scored 21 points and took two steals from the Lumberjacks, had a different explanation.

"After the first half, I think we knew we could beat them. If we were patient and hit the open person."

Melling's teammate Shane Newcomb, who wound up with 16 points, provided the first clue with 1 minute and 10 seconds gone in the game when he lofted a 20-foot three-point goal over the Axers' 2-1 zone defense to give the Cats a 5-4 lead. Kraig Felt went back-door for a rebound and a putback a few seconds later, and by the quarter's end the Bobcats had three three-pointers and led 8-5 in rebounding against a team that goes 6-7, 6-6 and 6-2 across the front.

St. Maries owned a 17-16 lead at the end of the first period, but by then the Axers were in a man defense — and looking uncomfor-

table with it.

The Lumberjacks stayed in the game on the work of 6-5 junior guard Rod Hill, who scored nine of his 21 points, and pulled six of his game-high 10 rebounds in the second quarter. The Axers enjoyed a 34-30 lead at halftime thanks to Tory Reid's 23-foot, three-point goal two seconds shy of the buzzer.

They expanded that to six points on Gerry Dotis' basket with 2:40 elapsed in the third period, but the turning point in the game may have come the next time down the floor.

St. Maries took five successive shots at the basket, missed four of them and ended up losing the ball out of bounds. A few seconds later, Melling cut the deficit to four points and then tied it with an eight-foot jump shot with 3:19 remaining in the period.

"They cooled off a little in the second half, and that helped us get back in," said Jensen. "But we played better defense in the second half too."

"We had a lot of chances inside, but they just didn't go down," said Asher. "I thought the officials let it get a little rough inside, though. I saw a lot of things that I thought should have been called."

After Melling's game-tying basket, Burley rolled off the next five points uncontested and led 43-38 by the end of the quarter. St. Maries twice got the deficit down to three

points, but no further.

"We made a couple of offensive adjustments at halftime, but I think the key was that we just played better," said Jensen. "Anytime you can score like that against a team like this one, you have a good chance to win. The kids have done a good job."

Aside from Melling, the man of the hour for Burley had to be 5-11 junior forward David Budge. Budge, suffering from a back injury, came off the bench when Felt was whistled for his third foul with three seconds remaining in the first quarter. He scored two points to put Burley ahead in the second quarter and claimed two crucial defensive rebounds before halftime, ending the game with 15 points — including 7-for-10 from the free throw line — and nine rebounds.

"He came in and filled in well," said Jensen. "He picked up us when we needed it."

For the game, the Lumberjacks outboarded the Bobcats 46-34, but the most telling statistics were turnovers — 20 for St. Maries, 10 for Burley — and shooting percentage: 50 percent from the floor and 62 percent from the free throw line for the Bobcats in the second half.

Nevada will protect lone eagle pair

Representatives of the Bureau of Land Management, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Nevada Department of Wildlife will outline possibilities for protecting the birds.

In 1985, the pair tried to nest in the Salmon Falls Creek canyon but the attempt was unsuccessful due to human activities in the area. The eagles have returned this year and another nesting effort is expected.

If young are successfully raised this year, it will be the first such occurrence ever recorded in Nevada. It appears that Nevada may soon make a contribution to the comeback of bald eagles in the lower 48 states.

NCAA regionals

Duke struggles to beat Mississippi Valley

GREENSBORO, N.C. (AP) — It was lack of preparation and not first-game nerves that caused top-seeded Duke to struggle to an 85-78 victory over Mississippi Valley State in the opening game of the NCAA East Regional basketball tournament, according to Blue Devils Coach Mike Krzyzewski.

"I don't think I have had anything to do with anything unless that's their team nickname," Krzyzewski said after Johnny Dawkins scored 27 points, including 20 in the second half, to lead a Duke comeback against the Delta Devils Saturday night. East is faced with a routine play against today's spade game. If he responds to South's singleton ace to lead a trump, and it's East's turn to shine. What happens if he plays a routine 10?

South wins his queen, and East is marked with the king of trumps. Whether South plays his ace or sticks a second club to dummy doesn't matter. Both plays win and South picks up the trumps without losing a trick.

East should hop up with his king on the first trump lead from dummy. This alert play gives South a second option in the play of trumps. If East truly started with a singleton trump king (and why not?), then West still has the 10-5-4. In this case, South must finesse to dummy's nine on the second trump lead. East would enjoy the setting trick, winning with the trump 10.

Better to leave the enemy with a losing option than with no chance to find a losing play.

East is faced with a routine play against today's spade game. If he responds routinely, the game makes. If he makes an enlightened play, he has a good chance to beat the game.

The defenders cash three quick hearts and East exits with a diamond to South's singleton ace. South crosses to dummy's club king to lead a trump, and it's East's turn to shine. What happens if he plays a routine 10?

South wins his queen, and East is nines on the second trump. Whether South plays his ace or tricks a second club to dummy doesn't matter. Both plays win and South picks up the trumps without losing a trick.

East should top up with his king and then lead from the king. This alert play gives South a second option in the play of trumps. East truly started with a singleton trump king (and why not?), then West still has the 10-5-4. In this case, South must finesse to dummy.

West's line on the second trump leads East to West's ace, and East wins the trick, winning with the trump 10.

Better to leave the enemy with a losing option than with no chance to find a losing play.

'Brigadoon' rhapsodizes innocence

TWIN FALLS — The villagers inhabiting mythical "Brigadoon" will pour out song and dance at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Center at 8:15 p.m. tonight, Saturday, and March 20-22, with a matinee performance at 2 p.m. on Sunday.

This year's performance by the Magic Valley Dilettantes holds the tried-and-true. By choosing "Brigadoon," a musical that has pleased audiences since 1947, and bringing aboard veteran director Fred Shelbe of Lewiston, the group is playing with a marked deck that should be a certain winner for audiences.

"Brigadoon," by Alan J. Lerner and Frederick Loewe, hit Broadway in March, 1947, where it won the "Best Musical of the Year" award presented for the first time by the Drama Critics Circle.

Despite controversy about whether or not Lerner plagiarized the German story "Gemsblausen" by Wilhelm Fredrick, "Brigadoon" has had clear sailing on television and movie screens, and on stages throughout the country.

Pure fantasy, "Brigadoon" concerns the young American, Tommy Albright, and his friend Jeff Douglass, who stumble onto the Scottish Highlands village of Brigadoon.

There, Tommy meets Fiona MacLaren and is soon entranced with her, but he discovers her date of birth in the family Bible and cannot fathom the mystery of her old age until Fiona takes him to the old schoolteacher, Mr. Lundie.

Lundie tells him the story of the minister who had wanted to keep Brigadoon safe from the evil world and had brought about the miracle that would let the town come to life for only one day in every hundred years. In that way, it could never be alive long enough to be contaminated by the outside world.

Tommy also learns that a stranger may live in Brigadoon,

but that no one who lives there may leave the town or the magic spell will be broken and the town will vanish forever.

Dan Mink, Jerome, and David Lay of Twin Falls play the parts of the young Americans, while Art Frantz of Twin Falls takes the role of Mr. Lundie. Karen Abou-bakr, Twin Falls, portrays the gentle Miss Fiona.

The flirtatious Meg Brockie is portrayed by Cathleen Flores, Kimberly, and Sanna Zimmerman, Jerome, and Harold Shetler, Buhl, play the young lovers, Jean and Charlie. Mike Winterholler, Jerome, is Jean's rejected lover who threatens the existence of Brigadoon by attempting to leave the village and break the spell.

Director Fred Shelbe, who is full-time artistic director of the Lewiston Civic Theater, has more than earned his battle stripes with Dilettantes' productions. Shelbe was choreographer for the Dilettantes' first CSI musical, "My Fair Lady," as well as "Guys and Dolls" and "Music Man." He directed and choreographed "Hello Dolly," "Fiddler on the Roof," "Man of La Mancha," "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," "Anything Goes" and "Annie!"

Shelbe thinks this year's production of "Brigadoon" will be an audience-pleaser. "The show moves quickly with no lengthy changes," he says, adding, "We have a very strong cast and I'm really happy with it. 'Brigadoon' is a good ensemble show with a lot of movement and dance."

The director points out that the cast of 55, chosen in early December, has had time to congeal into a good performing unit. He adds, "There are some really good moments in the show." Admission is \$6 adults, \$4 senior citizens and children 12 and under. All seats are reserved and are on sale at the Blue Lakes Mall by the fountain from noon to 6 p.m. except Sunday when the box office closes at 5 p.m. Reservations by Visa or MasterCard can be made by calling 733-3171.

Actor ages into Mr. Lundie role

TWIN FALLS — Faithful followers of Dilettantes' productions may feel a touch of déjà vu when the character Mr. Lundie appears onstage at CSI's Fine Arts Auditorium tonight.

Yet, there's nothing illusory about it — Art Frantz played that role during the Dilettantes' 1980-81 season, and has again found himself as the wizened schoolteacher who explains the mystery of "Brigadoon."

A charter member of the Dilettantes, Frantz says he's "old enough to play the role now," and adds that he had forgotten all but one line after so many years. "Some of the lines were actually strange for me," he says.

Frantz, who has practiced dentistry in Twin Falls since 1958 and whose father was local postmaster for 14 years, has been in all but two Dilettantes productions.

"I got into it on a fluke," he says, explaining that

he read in the newspaper about tryouts being held for "Carousel," which was being directed by Burt Sweet. Frantz had known Sweet in high school. He showed up to watch the auditions and, instead, found himself snatched up for a role. Shortly after, the Magic Valley Dilettantes formed from that group.

Frantz has acted with that organization in the old O'Leary Junior High School building, the Filer High School, and played opposite Mary Walker in the premiere CSI show, "My Fair Lady."

"Art has been in practically every show I've done down here," says director Fred Shelbe of the Lewiston Civic Theater. Shelbe is currently involved in his 10th Dilettante production.

"I like working with Art," he says. "I have a lot of respect for him as an actor. He's very easy for me to direct because he works hard on a part. He really puts it out!"

Frantz's favorite role was the lead in "Man of La Mancha," but he likes the Lundie character, too. "Last time, I played him as about 80 years old," says the 65-year-old Frantz. "This time he's 55."

Hemingway: Ad executive writes it best

Portrait photographers capture top state honors

LOS ANGELES (AP) — More than 2,600 literary gladiators tried to go 10 rounds on clean, white paper in the Ninth International Imitation Hemingway Competition—but in the end, only one emerged to rise again, undefeated.

The judges gathered Monday at Harry's Bar, The One in Century City, Not Florence, Not Venice.

When they finished their work, they laughed and drank and found that the one-page Hemingway lampoon by Mark Silber, 23, of New York, was good and true.

Silber parodied Hemingway's story about a dying writer, "The Snows of Kilimanjaro." His entry was "The Snooze of Kilimanjaro," about a dying poet who discovers a cryptic lemonade stand atop "Papa's" favorite peak.

"Drinking heavily near a type writer" was the secret of success for Silber, who plays the game of life in the advertising arena.

There are other ways to write imitation Hemingway prose, but they are difficult, especially in Manhattan.

"It's very hard to get in any big game hunting here in New York," Silber said in a telephone interview. "That would have helped, but we don't do much of that here. You don't shoot too many elephants on 60th street and we don't bag many lions."

His prize in the contest sponsored by Harry's Bar in Century City for writing the best page of Hemingway parody will be a trip to Harry's Bar, The One in Florence, Italy.

"It was great fun," author Ray Brabury said of Silber's essay.

"I'll give Collier a run for his money next year," claimed Maloney, who ranked third place in the recent competition, behind Collier's first and Critchfield's second.

Maloney, owner of Pomerelle Portraits in Rupert, has been a photographer only two years. Coats is also new to the profession, while Critchfield and Collier, 32 and 30 respectively, are anything but oldtimers.

Critchfield, the president of Professional Photographers of Idaho, had a studio in Burley before he moved to Twin Falls a couple of years ago. He and Collier combined

Sun Valley, Ketchum shows feature array of art works

SUN VALLEY — Art continues to thrive in the Wood River Valley, with numerous exhibits open for viewing by member galleries of the Ketchum Sun Valley Gallery Association.

Grant funds museum's Bison latifrons exhibit

POCATELLO — A major exhibit, "Bison latifrons," will open at the Idaho Museum of Natural History on the Idaho State University campus because of an \$18,000 grant from the US West Foundation.

Museum director Wallace Steffan says he approached the foundation late last fall concerning the grant and received the check Feb. 19. He points out that the check will cover all direct costs of the project, and

that it is the first time the foundation has taken a direct interest in the Idaho museum.

"Bison latifrons is the scientific name of the giant bison that roamed Idaho during the Ice Age," Steffan says. He notes that the "Bison latifrons" exhibit represents the museum's nationally-ranked vertebrate paleontology collection, and that the IMNH collection of the bison is the largest and most complete in the world.

The bison display will be used as a centerpiece for the planned "Pleistocene Mammals" exhibit. The exhibit will display the bison flanked by the sabertooth cat and the giant sloth. Many other interesting and unique mammals from Idaho's Ice Age past will be included, the director says.

Though the elaborate exhibit will be in construction stages for several years, Steffan says that the public may begin viewing it next week.

Yellowstone humanities courses set

BOISE — The Association for the Humanities in Idaho has approved a grant to give Idaho educators an opportunity to attend courses in Yellowstone.

A grant totaling \$1450 has been awarded to the Yellowstone Institute as partial funding for several humanities courses which will take place in June, July and August. A general goal of the project is to make a variety of short humanities courses available to all Idaho residents. A specific goal is to offer tuition scholarships for the benefit of Idaho educators.

Courses include "The Folklore of Bears" (June 9-10), "Early Exploration in Yellowstone" (June 28-29), "The First People of Yellowstone" (July 5-6), "Aesthetics in the Natural Environment" (July 25-28), "Advanced Yellowstone Aesthetics" (July 29-31), "Artists in Yellowstone" (August 1-2), "The Ways of the Mountain Men" (August 4-6), "Star Trails West" (August 10-12), and "Women and the Natural World" (August 30-31).

Most courses headquarter in northeastern Yellowstone. Rustic cabins overlooking the expansive Lamar Valley will house participants at a site called the "Buffalo Ranch" which the Park Service used as part of its bison recovery efforts in the early 1990s. "Artists in Yellowstone" meets at Mammoth Hot Springs, and the two "Aesthetics" courses are centered around a backcountry campsite on Yellowstone Lake.

1st Daughter tells it (almost) like it was

LOS ANGELES — For a long time Patti Davis pretended she wasn't the president's daughter.

She dropped the name Reagan and used her mother's maiden name. She wrote songs, lived with a rock star, tried to become an actress and evaded political issues.

All that's changed. Meet the new Patti Davis, author of a thinly disguised autobiography—that may set teeth on edge at the White House. Called "Home Front" (Crown, \$15.95), the book may well be the first backstairs roman a clef by a presidential offspring.

Patti Davis has turned her back on Hollywood. She's stopped struggling to crack the movie business, has settled into a happy marriage and has undergone psychoanalysis. Plus, she no longer cares if people recognize her as a Reagan.

"I don't know if it was a conscious

decision or a gradual acceptance of this as part of my life," she said. "I told myself, 'You're not going to get away from this. So you might as well accept or deal with it and try to do something with it.'"

"I realized these things that happened to me were interesting," Ms. Davis said in an interview. "and I thought maybe I can take them and make something creative and entertaining out of them."

Her book, written with the help of novelist Maureen Strange Foster, is the story of Beth Canfield whose father, a radio and TV pitchman, becomes governor of California, then president of the United States. The

interior monologue chronicles Beth's resentment of "politics" and her 1960s style rebellion which is manifested by sexual experimentation, a brush with drugs and involvement in the anti-Vietnam War movement.

Some of this, Davis said, was invented. For instance, she was too young to be involved in Vietnam protests in college but researched the issue for her novel.

"I don't think this book is any more autobiographical than any

other first novel," she said. "You draw on what you know. But what you know is a little more conspicuous than what other people know."

"I see nothing they (her parents) wouldn't like in it," she said. "I think it's a very honest portrayal of a family in the late '60s and early '70s. Except for their visibility, they're not very different from other families at that time."

At the heart of the book is Davis' fear and loathing of politics, which she swallows up her father and their family life.

Talk shows cancel Davis appearances

WASHINGTON — First Daughter Patti Davis, on a national tour to promote her novel, "Home Front," was dropped hours before scheduled appearances on talk shows hosted by Joan Rivers and Merv Griffin, spokesmen for the shows confirmed Tuesday.

The last-minute cancellations sparked speculation that the Reagans had pressured the two stars not to interview Davis, but the White House Tuesday denied any involvement.

"We tried to do some digging into what was behind it but we couldn't get too many answers," Nancy Kahan, associate publisher of Crown Publishers, said Tuesday.

"We did hear from someone on the coast that Nancy Reagan had made a call to Joan Rivers, but there was no way we could verify it," she said. "We understood that Joan said it was too late to cancel the show and that she suggested doing the interview but not mentioning the book. The response was 'Don't do the interview.'"

Nancy Reagan's press secretary, Elaine Crispin, said no such call was made. "It wasn't Mrs. Reagan, this office or anyone I know of from the White House," Crispin said. "We had nothing at all to do with Patti's book tour, or with the cancellations."

Spokesmen for both shows said the stars had read and disapproved of the book, which is the story of a rebellious young girl whose father moves from the California statehouse to the White House.

Davis did appear on the Donahue show last week. A spokeswoman confirmed that Phil Donahue had said later that "an effort was made to discourage us from doing the show," but that the pressure did not come from the Reagans or anyone in the government.

Crispin said Rivers has attended a state dinner at the White House and also entertained in the first lady's honor at the Republican National Convention in Dallas.

She also said the friendship with Griffin "goes back a long time. They share a birthdate, but I don't see any connection in this."

Both President and Mrs. Reagan have read the book and called it an "interesting novel, interesting fiction," but White House insiders have described them as "hurt" by it.

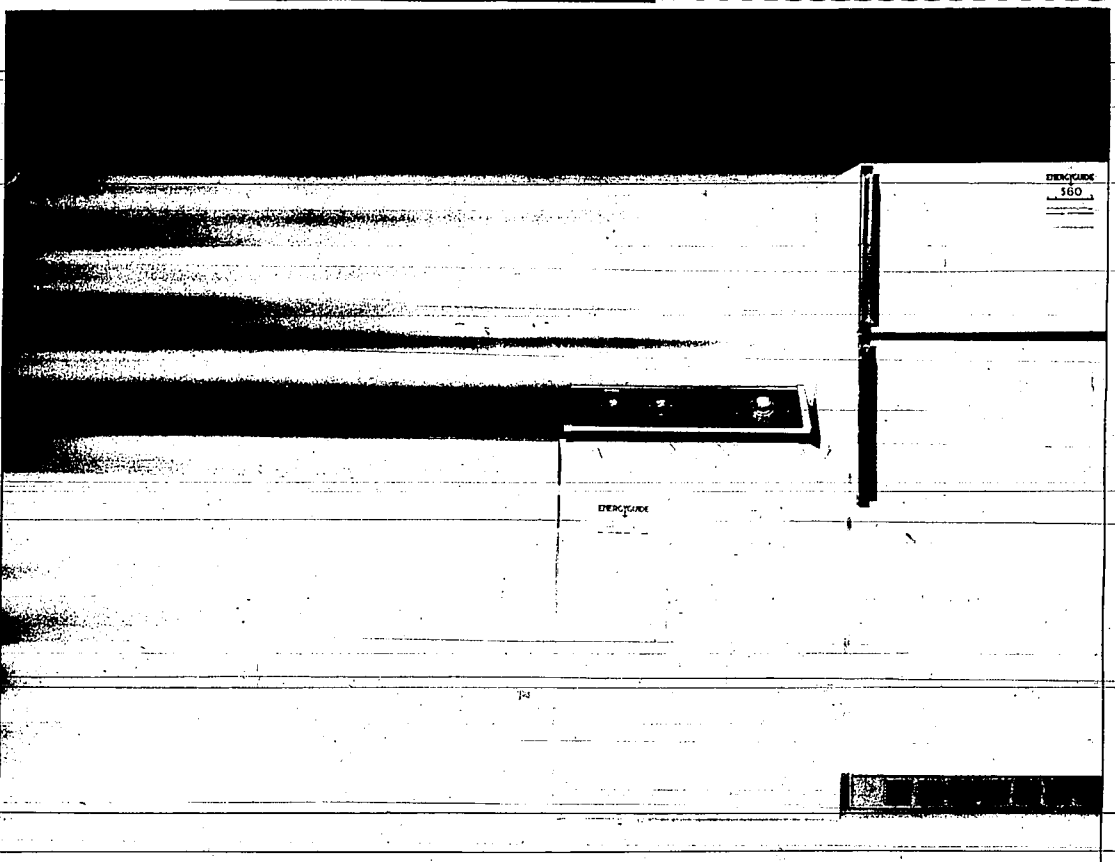
Davis has not seen her parents since starting the tour although she came to Washington last Friday night to appear on the Larry King radio and television show. A spokeswoman said Davis, who stayed at the Sheraton Grand Hotel on Capitol Hill and left early Saturday morning, told King that she does not drop in on her parents unexpectedly.

Rivers was promoting Davis' scheduled Thursday appearance on earlier "Tonight" shows last week. Davis flew to Los Angeles from the East Coast to keep her date, but she was informed two hours before she was scheduled to appear that she need not show up.

Prints at the competition are given points by a panel of judges. The four men entered five prints apiece.

The highest overall point-getter was Collier, who also won four of the six "Judge's Choice" awards.

"When a print is to be judged, the name of the portrait is announced and there is a brief pause before the print is shown. That gives the judge a chance to think about the name and anticipate the print that will be seen," said Maloney.

The four men took pains to name their prints creatively.

Collier's top print was titled, "Jesse's Alley." It is a portrait of a boy in an alley with his motorcycle in the background.

Critchfield's best scorer was a bride and groom at the bottom of a sloping hill with a temple in the background, entitled "Sealed With a Kiss." It received 91 points, the top-scoring entry.

Top print for Maloney was a mother and babe dressed in white against a white background. He named it "Joint Admiration."

Coats' best print was a closeup portrait of a young girl entitled "Sam."

'Highlander': A Scottish stew gone sour in the mishmash

HOLLYWOOD — Can a movie be bad when it contains a moment in which "Greystoke's" Christopher Lambert, a Frenchman playing a Highlander, has to explain to Sean Connery, a Scot playing someone named Juan Sanchez Villalobos Ramirez, what haggis is?

The title of a sturdy cast and dazzling production design, "Highlander" is a little, aching way. The last time we had

anything that even came close to "Highlander" was the edited version of "Bordertown: The Heroic."

What you have to imagine here is a mishmash: elements plucked from Frank Frazetta, "The Keep," "Terminator," "Kidnapped," "The Hunter," "Mad Max," "Lost Horizon," "Excalibur" and Gloriana Morra. About the only character left un-plundered is Nurse Jane Fussy Wuzzy.

They have let director Russell Mulcahy, who made his name in sleek music videos with "Razorbak" an earlier action feature, have his head on this. Or have

everyone else's: The movie's key point is that the world still has in it a straggle band of immortals — the 245-year-old Connery-Ramirez is one, and to his discomfite, Lambert, born circa 1500, is discovering from mentor Connery that he is another. A quarrelsome lot, they are forever twacking at each other, although no one can die in combat, unless he is decapitated.

So, over the decades, heads have rolled. And eyes. We are whipped back and forth in time, between Lambert in bearskins, jilts and braids and Lambert today as a New

York antiques dealer. It is an edgy existence, no matter what century, because a seven-foot-tall archdemon warrior — Kurgan ("The Bride's" Clancy Brown), is liable to come shrieking around almost any corner, whether at Bloomingdale's or on a Bonnie Brae.

Mulcahy's visual style involves blue-white lightning bolts, a tidal wave's worth of water and exploding glass for a 10-mile radius each time one of these duels takes place. And "Queen" on the sound-track. Very MTV.

No cast in the world could surmount this.

The most you can hope for is a straight face and the glimmer of a sense of humor, which Lambert, Connery, Brown, Roxanne Hart and Beatie Edney (as Lambert's present, and past loves) struggle to hang onto.

Remember the name Gregory Widon, who came up with the original story, as well as part of the rewrite, with Peter Bellwood and Larry Ferguson. Remember their names, and never, never let any of them near Hollywood. Look what they have been able to do with only a Outfit board and a Reader's Encyclopedia.

Spirits collide with trauma of Vietnam veteran in 'House'

HOUSE (R). Ingenious, unexpectedly ambitious haunted-house horror-comedy with surprisingly serious undertones. William Katt impresses as a light park coming to terms with a wartime trauma while beset with things that go bump in the night. With George Wendt, Richard Moll, Kay Lenz.

THE COLOR PURPLE (PG-13). This time out, director Steven Spielberg has chosen to put an antic disposition on and his almost every decision has been disastrous: He has prettified Alice Walker's novel, made comic scenes slapstick, and has tipped over the book's crucial relationship. But whatever the faults of the director's artistic choices, he has collected a near-perfect cast. Whoopi Goldberg's compelling, incoherent Celie, Margaret Avery's electrifying, changeable Shug Avery and Oprah Winfrey's indomitable, unforgettable Sofia.

THE DELTA FORCE (R). Standard hijack-hostage adventure with Chuck Norris and Lee Marvin coming to the rescue of prisoners taken by Arab terrorists and held in Beirut. With Martin Balsam, Joey Bishop, Kim Delaney, Robert Forster, Laine Kazan, George Kennedy, Hanna Schygulla, Susan Strasberg, B. Svenson, Robert Vaughn, Shelley Long.

DOWN AND OUT IN BEVERLY HILLS (R). Co-writer-director-

tor-producer Paul Mazursky's deft and affectionate pinning of some butterflies in his own very colorful, preposterously rich Whitman family (Richard Dreyfuss, Bette Midler) hard-at-work at the meaning-of-life or for jokes. Their lives are changed when Black Blake, an African man who declines to end it all in their pool, but stays to affect every member of the family. If the film makers had not pulled the rug out from under the Nolte character, the picture would have a sturdier closing, but there is enormous fun to be had and two especially fine performances by Nolte and Dreyfuss to anchor the work.

MURPHY'S ROMANCE (R). A contemporary Western romance of a June-November courtship comedy that is also a moral fable about making the right choices; bright and earthy in his own right, as a smooth, Sally Field and James Garner. Martin Ritt — blends them — can'tilly. Garner's super-relaxed style, his maverick affability, plays wonderfully against Field, who gives what is undoubtedly her sexiest performance. It seems like we are getting the real Ritt here, the real Field and Garner — and, even if we are not, they are a delightful group to spend an evening with: warm, funny, the salt of the earth.

OUT OF AFRICA (PG). Because we are in a well-defined, faintly magical, perfectly appointed past where a level of intelligence is prized, in this film, what is its problem? Casting, mostly, and a sense of

place: Meryl Streep, as Isak Dinesen, may convince us utterly that she is in love with Africa, but our views of it are a little too stately to really feel the place. And Robert Redford's Denis Finch Hutton is a real cipher. Streep can pretty nearly do anything in the film — except that she cannot provide all the heat in a love affair when Redford is not giving much to his role.

QUICKSILVER (PG). Tom Donnelly's movie about a bicycle messenger who loses his nerve and (finding it again in the city's underbelly) — as part of a gutsy community of bicycle messengers — is high on speed and low on logic. Dodging around with such faltering audacity between celebrating the drop-out and celebrating success, it winds up celebrating nothing much at all — except, perhaps, its own energy, gloss, and intellect.

YOUNGBLOOD (R). If you could somehow mate the lovely welder from "Flashdance" with the indefatigable Young Mr. Baboon from "Rocky," the result would be "Youngblood" (Rob Lowe); the handsome hockey prodigy of "Youngblood," a movie that could be just as accurately titled "Flashdance on Ice." It is another cliched coming-of-age film that seems more intent on scoring at the box-office than showing us the thrills — and spills — of athletic endeavor.

PG-13 Rating Introduced

A new rating category is in place as of July 1. This category is inserted between the current PG and R ratings. It is designated as "PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for attendance of children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children."

The revised five-category system of the voluntary film industry rating program is now as follows:

- General Audiences, all ages admitted.
- Parental Guidance suggested. Some material may be unsuitable for children.
- PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children.
- Restricted. Under-17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian.
- R: No one under 17 admitted. All films rated after July 1 will be given ratings under the new five-category system.

'Pretty in Pink' shoos 'House' from top spot

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The teenage romance movie "Pretty in Pink" evicted haunted "House" from the box-office week-end top spot, with "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" held on to third place.

The movies registered lower takes overall in a weekend marked by bad weather across most of the nation, with only "The Color Purple" in fourth place, showing a small increase in box-office gross.

It may have been helped by Saturday's Directors Guild of America award ceremony, which named "Purple" director Steven Spielberg.

"Pretty in Pink," the Paramount release starring Molly Ringwald, Harry Dean Stanton and Andrew McCarthy, was down 19 percent, but it still managed to gross \$4.91 million at 987 theaters, with a per-screen average of \$4,984.

"House," whose claim on first place was box-office weakness, claimed distributor New World supplied inflated figures, was in second place this week with a 43-percent fall in business.

"House" earned \$3.66 million last weekend, averaging \$2,546 per screen, just above half the \$6.4 million it claimed for the previous weekend.

Frazer's "Down and Out in Beverly Hills" took in \$3.64 million at 1,084 theaters, pushing its six-week gross to \$39.4 million.

There were no changes in the next four positions.

"The Color Purple," a Warner Bros. release with 11 Academy Award nominations and a credit boosted to total gross to \$69.2 million after 12 weeks with a weekend take of \$3.63 million at 1,096 theaters, a 2 percent increase over the previous weekend.

Woody Allen's "Hannah and Her Sisters" and "The Orion" release has grossed \$13.4 million after five weeks in limited release.

Peking audiences see 'A Great Wall'

PEKING (AP) — "A Great Wall," the first American feature film shot in China, a light-hearted movie about the reunion of a Chinese-American family with their Chinese relatives, has premiered in Peking, Produced by American filmmaker Shirley Sun, and was shot two years ago in Peking as a joint venture between W and S productions and the state-run Nanhai Film Co., it will open in the United States in June.

lected \$2.4 million at 1,040 theaters during its weekend debut.

Obscure actress lands lead role in sizzling 'If Tomorrow Comes'

This week, a nameless face and the king of bus-terminal literature meet as CBS broadcasts the miniseries version of Sidney Sheldon's best-selling novel "If Tomorrow Comes."

The starring role of Tracy Whitney—a neo-gothic heroine whose unjust imprisonment transforms her from a naive bank teller to a conniving, international jewel thief, is played by Madolyn Smith.

Madolyn who? Viewers have seen Madolyn Smith plenty of times before, although the name hasn't punctuated America's morning chatter yet. The 28-year-old actress's film credits include "All of Me," with Steve Martin and Lily Tomlin; "2010," where she appeared as Roy Scheider's wife; and the miniseries "Sadat," in which she played the wife of the Egyptian leader.

Her big break coincided with her high-school graduation. In fact, she was whisked off, still cap-and-gown clad, after commencement exercises (had passed her name), to an appointment with Paramount director Jim Bridges. The result? A featured role in "Urban Cowboy" with Tinseltown's then-hot John Travolta.

Now, in the seven-hour "If Tomorrow Comes," glitz connoisseurs will finally get an opportunity to study—and perhaps commit to memory—the actress's elusive facial features. "Tracy's life," says Miss Smith, "is like the perils of Papipe." And if the miniseries stays true to its literary genre, be prepared to savor megadoses of violence, underworld crime, suicide, Satanism and other standard Sheldon fare.

Is Miss Smith afraid of being compared to that other actress of Sheldon miniseries fame, Jaclyn Smith, who starred in "Rage of Angels"? "I have to admit I haven't seen it, so I can't compare myself to Jackie Smith or say how critically acclaimed the miniseries was. But she was a major star; I'm a fairly reputable actress with maybe a strong following out there somewhere. But the real star going into this is Sidney Sheldon."

Miss Smith prepared for her role in part by reading the novel by Sheldon, an author whose works are

renowned for their sexual-encounter-per-paragraph ratio. "I got through it because I was being offered a job. I had read a few of his novels in college and thoroughly enjoyed them, but now they're not appealing to me."

Miss Smith has always prided herself on the discretion she employs in choosing her parts. When asked about the quality of "If Tomorrow Comes," Miss Smith hesitates tactfully, "If Tomorrow Comes" is my very first piece of pure entertain-

ment. With that kind of genre, it's tricky to answer questions about quality. For me, it's a selfish opportunity. I had high hopes to style it like the '40s caper pictures, with a romantic duo pulling off all kinds of stunts."

And what of Miss Smith's lack of recognizability?

"It's not good for business, but it pleases my actor's sensibility. I can surprise people right and left."

Oddly enough, it helped her land the starring role in the miniseries. "I'm especially pleased that they took a chance with me," she comments. "God knows Jackie Smith can raise projections ratings-wise. But I think they specifically wanted someone who wasn't a big star, someone who wasn't stereotyped, to start fresh."

Assuming that tomorrow will come, what are Miss Smith's future plans? "There's nothing specific at the moment. Because I say no so often, sometimes there are months between jobs. If there's nothing for four to six weeks, then I search out a play to do."

CBS drama's new stablemaster, at 20, is off to a promising start

Whenever the fertile mind of a soap writer comes up with a character described as a stableboy, you can rest assured that this stableboy will bear little or no resemblance to the real thing.

If you've ever been near a riding stable, you'll know exactly what that means. In TV soaps, the stableboy generally looks like he has his hair done by Sassoon and his jeans fashioned by Calvin Klein. And you can be absolutely certain that he will exude more hunk than skunk.

"As the World Turns" has just such a stablemaster (that's what CBS calls the character) played by Jon Hensley, whose good looks and slightly sinister manner (his character always has at least a day's stubble on his face) fits the romantic mold which makes female viewers want to tune in day after day.

Jon's character of Holden Snyder has already captured the attention of fans and the actor is happy that he isn't playing "just another 'leading man' type role.

Twenty-year-old Jon is fairly new to the acting game (about three years) and his only other job in soaps was the part of a henchman in "One Life to Live." His parents weren't too thrilled with his decision to become an actor so he did their bidding and attended New York University as a journalism major. But that didn't pan out, and he returned to his first ambition—acting.

He studied and made rounds. His rugged good looks got him some commercial work and some modeling assignments but he never veered from his goals. After his stint on "One Life to Live," there was some talk about a regular role in the soap but "As the World Turns" came up with an offer and he joined the CBS show.

Jon's parents have a restaurant in New Jersey and some of the diners talk about Jon's new celebrity status, which pleases his folks. However, Jon's younger brother and sister can't get used to Jon as Holden. They find it hard to take Jon seriously when he's on the TV screen. LOS ANGELES (AP) — Lucille Ball, who dominated television comedy for three decades, will star in a new series on ABC in the fall, the president of ABC Entertainment said.

Miss Ball, 74, has not been seen regularly on television since she ended her long reign on CBS in 1974. She has appeared, infrequently in specials, and played a fleshy bag lady in the November TV movie "Stone Pillow."

The new half-hour comedy series is tentatively called "Lucy," but no other details about the show were announced. The co-executive producers will be Aaron Spelling, Douglas Cramer and Gary Morton, Miss Ball's husband.

"Like everyone else in America I

have loved Lucille Ball for as long as I can remember," said Brandon Stoddard, making one of his first programming announcements since being named president of ABC Entertainment. "Like millions of television fans, we welcome her back to network television where she belongs and where she has been sorely missed."

In a statement, Miss Ball said, "I'm so thrilled to be associated with ABC, and with Aaron and Gary by my side I'm looking forward to going back to work."

ABC has fallen into third place in the Nielsen ratings behind NBC and CBS.

Miss Ball made her network debut in "I Love Lucy" on CBS on Oct. 15, 1951. The series, which also starred

her then husband Desi Arnaz, was never below third in the ratings during the six years it was in production.

In 1962 she went solo in "The Lucy Show," and the name was changed to "Here's Lucy" in 1968.

"I Love Lucy" is still telecast in more than 80 countries.

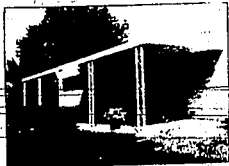

Australians ban daytime liquor ads

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — The government has banned television stations from broadcasting liquor advertisements except during "adult viewing time."

The Australian Broadcasting Tribunal said last week that beginning July 1, advertising for alcoholic beverages will only be allowed between 8:30 p.m. and 5 a.m. daily and from noon to 3 p.m. on school days.

However, it exempted broadcasts of live sporting events on Saturdays and public holidays from the ban, except for Christmas and Good Friday.

Alcoholic beverage ads are already banned from broadcast on Sundays.

The tribunal said the new rules will keep liquor advertisements off the air during times when programs such as "Knight Rider" and "The A-Team" which are popular with children and teenagers are shown.

NBC laughs its way to victory

NEW YORK — With five comedies in the Top 10, including the No. 1 "Cosby Show" and newcomer "Valerie," NBC posted its largest winning margin in the prime time ratings since Super Bowl week, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

The strong performance came five days after NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff declared that NBC would win outright its first prime-time season since Nielsen began compiling national ratings three decades ago.

David Poitrac, CBS' vice president for research, conceded that NBC would win.

For the week of March 3-9, NBC had a 17.6 rating to CBS' 15.2 and ABC's 14.1. The week NBC broadcast the Super Bowl in January, it won by 5.2 points. With six weeks left in the 30-week season, NBC has averaged a 17.8 rating to CBS' 16.9 and ABC's 15.0.

Each national rating equals 859,000 homes with television.

The record-breaking "Cosby Show," which is bound to be NBC's first top-rated series since "Laugh-In" in 1969, had a 36.4 rating. Its companion comedy, "Family Ties," was second with a 33.0. NBC's "Cheers" was fourth, "Golden Girls" sixth and "Valerie," the new sitcom starring Valerie Harper, tied for 10th.

ABC's Tuesday comedies also cracked the Top 10. "Who's the Boss?" was eighth and "Growing Pains" ninth.

The rest of the Top 10 included CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" in third, CBS' "60 Minutes" in fifth, ABC's "Dynasty" in seventh and NBC's "Miami Vice" in 10th.

In contrast to the success of "Valerie" and another NBC comedy newcomer, Jack Klugman's "You Again?," which ranked 18th, CBS introduced two sitcoms that ranked closer to the bottom of the ratings. "Fast Times" was 49th and "Tough Cookies" ranked 55th out of 69 shows.

"You Again?" and "Valerie" were on 7-8 p.m. MST on Monday. "Fast Times" and "Tough Cookies" were on 7-8 on Wednesday. Young audiences dominate the 7 o'clock time periods, but CBS attracts less young viewers than NBC and ABC. CBS hasn't developed a successful 7 o'clock comedy since "Good Times" in 1976.

Research executives were asked how the new CBS and NBC comedies would have fared had they switched networks and time slots with each other. NBC's Gerald Jaffe speculated that NBC would still have the successful comedies and CBS would have the falling ones. CBS' Michael Eisenberg said "Fast Times" and "Tough Cookies" might have done better on NBC.

"I think CBS is going to have a hard time launching kid-oriented comedies on their schedule," said Jaffe. NBC's vice president for research projects, "Right now CBS is the network of last choice for young people."

CBS has an added problem: how to find young viewers with its on-air promotions. No CBS show can be used effectively to publicize youthful shows, the way NBC can utilize "The Cosby Show."

Promos for "Fast Times" and "Tough Cookies" would be wasted in ABC's most popular shows, "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote" — programs enormously popular with viewers over 50.

"It's like a Catch-22," said rating.

Eisenberg, CBS' research director.

Last Wednesday, CBS' comedies competed against NBC's established hit, "Highway to Heaven," and they finished third in the time slot. On Mondays, neither CBS' "Scarecrow & Mrs. King" nor ABC's "Hardcastle & McCormick" have been dominating 7 o'clock, and NBC's comedies, in their first Monday outing, won the time period.

"If you're No. 1, you don't compete with yourself, and that's another advantage," said Eisenberg.

After six days last week, CBS and NBC were second, each with a 13.7 rating to NBC's 18.3. CBS then had another strong Sunday, winning the movie competition again. CBS' "Blind Justice" ranked 20th, the first part of NBC's miniseries, "Dress Gray," was 24th and a repeat of ABC's James Bond movie, "Live and Let Die," finished 25th.

NBC was third for the night, losing poorly in the first two hours of prime time with its kids comedies, "Punky Brewster" and "Silver Spoons," and its anthology duo of "Amazing Stories" and "Alfred Hitchcock Presents."

Steven Spielberg's "Amazing Stories" has been overtaken in family storytelling. Disney ABC's new "Disney Sunday Movie" has become No. 2, behind CBS' combination of "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote."

"We're getting squeezed badly in the time period," said Jaffe.

Last week's bottom five shows, in descending order, were: ABC's "Fortune Dane," ABC's "Benson," ABC's "Ripley's Believe It or Not," ABC's "The Fall Guy" and CBS' "Trapper John, M.D."

In evening news, the "CBS Evening News" was first with a 12.9 rating.

CBN erred in announcing it had obtained rights to air 'Hell Town'

NEW YORK — It was a marriage that appeared to be made in heaven: Robert Blake's television series "Hell Town," in which he plays a former convict turned crusading priest, and cable television's Christian Broadcasting Network.

But, despite CBN's announcement last week that "Hell Town" would debut on its network March 11, the status of the recently canceled NBC series really is in limbo. CBN now plans to begin the series in September.

CBN acknowledged a mistake in announcing the acquisition of a series that still was NBC's exclusive property.

"We deeply regret that CBN is prohibited at this time from showing 'Hell Town,'" Tom Rogeberg, CBN's senior vice president of administration and operations, said in a statement. "Neither we nor the distributor were aware when we reached our agreement to air 'Hell Town' that a previous contract existed between the production company and NBC that prevents the series from airing anywhere besides NBC this broadcast season."

Kay Dangaard, spokeswoman for the distributor, Columbia Pictures Television, said: "We're the most

active studio in the cable business, and have done a lot of business with CBN. This was just an honest mistake in our reading of the contract."

CBN has run on-air promotional since Feb. 22 trumpeting the return of "Hell Town." Earl Weirich, a CBN spokesman, said the network currently planned to run one on-air disclaimer March 11 at 8 p.m. "Hell Town" was introduced by NBC last September to mixed reviews and progressively lower ratings. Its last broadcast was in December, even though NBC still had an original episode that hadn't been broadcast.

"Hell Town" chronicled the exploits of Blake's unorthodox Father Noah "Hardslip" Rivers who used passionate persuasion and, when that didn't work, his fists, to clean up his crime-ridden Los Angeles barrioch parish.

CBN executives believed that "Hell Town" was compatible with its programming mix of religious shows and reruns of old network

series, including "Lassie," "The Flying Nun" and "Father Knows Best." CBN Cable promotes itself as "The Family Entertainer."

"We think 'Hell Town' has some good moral lessons," said Weirich. NBC's license-fee arrangement with Blake's Breezy Productions called for the network to pay about \$850,000 per episode. In return, NBC got the rights to originals and reruns for the full September-to-September TV season.

Although Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said he had no plans to run the repeats, he said NBC was within its financial and legal rights to insist that the contract be upheld. Tartikoff noted that NBC held all the cards, particularly since CBN had announced its acquisition and air date prematurely.

"They have no rights," he said. "You dream about this kind of situation." He said if CBN paid \$850,000, CBN could have "Hell Town" now. "We'd call it clean," Tartikoff said.
