Battle reports vary from Honduras

U.S. official says invaders can't get out

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras — A U.S. Embassy spokesman said Thursday that about 1,500 Nicaraguan troops remained trapped in Honduras by U.S.-backed Nicaraguan rebels and that some have been taken prisoner.

But a spokesman for the rebels who earlier claimed his forces had surrounded the Nicaraguan troops said Thursday he could not confirm that either rebels or the troops were in Honduras.

"We don't know anything," Dennis Perez, a spokesman for the Nicaraguan Democratic Force, the largest rebel group, told The Associated Press. "All the information we have on the matter comes from the government of Honduras and the government of the United States."

There was no independent confirmation of the fighting. Journalists have been kept 17 miles from the scene of the reported fighting in Honduras.

"There are still Nicaraguan troops in Honduran territory," U.S. Embassy spokesman Arthur Skop said. "I do not know if some Sandinista soldiers have managed to return to Nicaragua."

He said some Nicaraguan soldiers had been taken prisoner, but he said he did not know how many. It was not clear whether Skop was referring to two young men the

Honduran military presented at a news conference Wednesday. The Honduran officials said the two men, who appeared frightened, were Sandinistas who were captured Monday inside Honduras. Reporters were not allowed to question the prisoners.

On the Nicaraguan side of the border, a resident of Ocoatl, 19 miles from the border and about 30

miles from the area in Honduras where fighting has been reported, said peasants were coming into town from the mountains, fleeing heavy fighting. The resident spoke on condition of anonymity for security reasons.

The Nicaraguan government says there has been heavy fighting in that area of Nicaragua during the past 10 days.

Hondurans display dead Sandinistas

CAPIRE, Honduras — The Honduran army displayed the bodies of five men it said were Nicaraguan soldiers and dozens of Soviet-style weapons Thursday at this dusty camp about six miles north of the Nicaraguan border.

About 70 reporters, photographers and cameramen were taken to the camp in two Chinook helicopters flown by

Americans, in an attempt by the Hondurans to prove their contention that up to 1,500 Nicaraguan soldiers invaded their country last weekend.

Nicaragua has denied its troops entered Honduras, but has said its soldiers are engaged in a battle with rebels near the border. Lt. Col. Danilo Carbajal Molina said fighting was continuing about six to 10 miles northeast of his camp, but was confined mostly to sporadic encounters.

Another spokesman for the Nicaraguan Democratic Force, Frank Arena, claimed Wednesday in Tegucigalpa that the Contras had surrounded invading Nicaraguan troops. "Everything is under control. The invaders are going to return to Nicaragua," he said.

Senate gives its OK to a Contra aid plan

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday revived President Reagan's plan to send \$100 million to aid Nicaragua's Contra rebels on a narrow 53-47 vote, but imposed a three-month delay in lethal aid to give negotiations a last chance.

Following the roll call vote attaching the conditions, the Senate approved the president's aid program on a pro forma voice vote. That sent the measure back to House, which a week ago rejected 222-210 the plan to put military pressure on the leftist Sandinista regime in Nicaragua.

Idaho senators Jim McClure and Steve Symms joined other Republican senators in voting to approve the aid package.

Only 11 Democrats joined 42 Republicans in voting for the aid resolution while 36 Democrats joined by 11 Republicans voted against it.

The Senate wrote into the legislation promises made by Reagan not to provide the Contras offensive weapons for 90 days in order to give negotiations a chance.

Fleet will depart; exercises finished

Mission a success, claims Weinberger

WASHINGTON — The ships and planes of the 6th Fleet withdrew from the Gulf of Sidra off Libya's coast Thursday as President Reagan and other officials declared the United States had accomplished its mission of defending freedom of the seas.

"The exercise is over," Reagan announced in early afternoon as he stopped in New Orleans for a speech en route to a California vacation.

"We have completed our exercise in the Gulf of Sidra and it was in every way a successful operation," Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger told reporters at the Pentagon.

"This exercise has demonstrated once again what it set out to do, which is our right and the right of all nations to operate in international waters. If Libya's radical claims and aggression against our forces were to go unanswered, no peaceful nation could safely rely on freedom of the seas anywhere."

The withdrawal came four days after the 6th Fleet began operations in the Gulf of Sidra and two days after Libyan forces gave up further military challenge to the 30-ship battle group led by three aircraft carriers carrying about 250 planes.

The firing of surface-to-air missiles at American planes on Monday touched off U.S. attacks on the missile site and on Libyan patrol boats. At least two of the vessels were reported sunk.

No American casualties were reported, and Weinberger said the United States had no estimate of Libyan losses.

Libyan strongman Moammar Khadafi acted rationally for a

Reagan lauds Senate, calls invasion 'slap in face'

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — President Reagan said Thursday night that Senate approval of his \$100 million aid request for Contra rebels would reassure Nicaragua's "threatened neighbors."

Reagan, who had lobbied by long-distance for Senate support of the aid request, received the news of the Senate's 53-47 vote in support of his proposal as he arrived here on an Easter vacation.

"The Senate's action is sure to send a profoundly reassuring signal to the freedom fighters in Nicaragua and to Nicaragua's threatened neighbors. It helps to demonstrate that it is indeed possible to forge a sustained and responsible bipartisan policy for promoting democracy and stability in our hemisphere," the president said in a statement.

Reagan expressed hope for the measure's success in the House, where it was defeated a week ago, 222-210.

"I urge the members of the House who

were not with us last week to cast a positive vote for freedom and for the national security interests of the United States," he said.

Before arriving in California, Reagan stopped in New Orleans to help raise money for Louisiana Republicans hoping to send their first senator to Washington since the Reconstruction Era. But, he left behind some key lieutenants to press for the aid bill.

The president quoted a House member, whom he did not name, as saying after the aid proposal was defeated last week, "I hope

the Sandinistas take it as a sign of peace and friendship."

"The Nicaraguan communists took the House vote as a sign all right," Reagan said. "They invaded the territory of Honduras with about 1,500 heavily armed troops, and they fled about it."

"This military drive demonstrates the nature of the Nicaraguan regime. This Sandinista offensive is a slap in the face to everyone who voted against aid to the freedom fighters thinking it to be a vote for reconciliation."

Stivers maneuvers to block attempt to fund mining suit

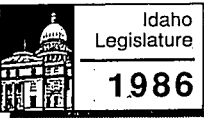

BOISE — Exercising the power of his office, House Speaker Tom Stivers, R-Twin Falls, helped to block funding Thursday that would help the state of Idaho seek a larger settlement from the Bunker Hill mining company to repair environmental damage in the once-busy Silver Valley in northern Idaho.

Though he says he was not pressured to do so by mining industry representatives, Stivers said he did recently talk to a Silver Valley mining executive who urged him not to let the state continue its litigation.

"He reminded me what would happen if it (the bill) passed... The silver industry is about to shut down if they continue that litigation over the years," said Stivers.

He said the continued operation of the silver industry was more important to the state than the settlement of the state's case for a larger sum.



House floor, Stivers blocked funding for Attorney General Jim Jones to pursue a larger settlement or court decision on behalf of the state to pay for a clean-up near the silver mining districts of Wallace and Kellogg.

The speaker of the house assigns bills to committee action.

Most spending bills move directly to the House floor after leaving the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee. The Ways and Means Committee is sometimes called the "graveyard" or "speaker's" committee and is comprised of chairman Rep. Roy Brackett, R-Twin Falls, and the three top Democratic and Republican leaders in the House.

The bill died on two successive tie votes in an impromptu meeting of the committee, held in Republican leadership offices during the House lunch hour on Thursday.

With Stivers standing near the doorway of the committee room, Republicans and Democrats on the committee split their votes twice and then adjourned, leaving the bill

J.R. Simplot doesn't hide his secrets from his audience. More than 200 people, from longtime business leaders to young farmers, heard the Simplot prescription for success — strength, spirit and smarts — during a Thursday luncheon at the Canyon Springs Inn.

He weaves the ingredients in and out of the story as he goes. Simplot's agribusiness empire began with a gamble written on the back of an envelope, a contract to supply dried onions. He signed it on spirit, and then learned the hard way the onions.

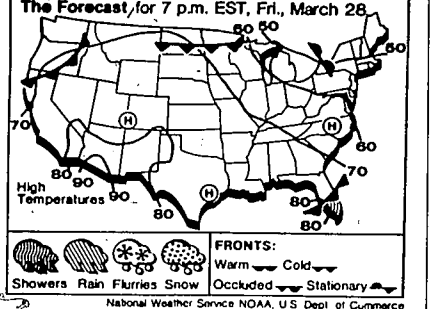

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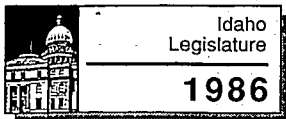
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School aid up to House

Republican strength carries measure through Senate, 24-18

BOISE (AP) — A compromise \$314 million 1987 state allocation for public schools, backed by Republicans with pride and blasted by Democrats as irresponsible, cleared the Idaho Senate Thursday amid warnings that it signaled massive local property tax hikes.



The 24-18 Senate vote, which saw only four members of the GOP supermajority join the minority in opposing the bill, left to the House the final legislative votes on the two major spending bills standing between lawmakers and final adjournment of the 1986 session — the public school budget and \$96.7 million in general state tax support for higher education.

But as action on the remaining pieces of legislation seemed to bog down, legislative leaders were becoming less confident the session could be wrapped up without recovering Friday.

Education officials have labeled both bills as woefully inadequate to meet the mounting financial needs of Idaho's overall education structure, but each was pushed through the Senate by its Republican majority and was expected to win similar approval in the House.

Education, Senate Republican President Pro Tem James Blisch of Boise said, "is the top priority of the Legislature. It's the top priority of the Republican Party, and I for one am proud

to vote for this."

But Democratic Sen. Gall Bray of Boise charged the spending level marked only "the continual erosion and emphasis for our most important program — education. . . . It is the youth of this state who will suffer."

The bills mirrored the budget-setting pattern of this session that effectively freezes most state agency spending next year at 1986 levels despite the infusion of \$36 million in new revenue from a temporary penny hike in the sales tax. But even with that conservative approach, analysts have determined that the 1987 spending commitments have already exceeded estimated revenue, leaving the new budget with from \$2 million to \$4 million in red ink.

The public school budget was some \$1.5 million below the revised request of Democrat Gov. John Evans and over \$6 million less than Public

Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans said was needed to halt deterioration of the statewide educational system.

Schools Chief Evans said as a result local districts may be forced to make up the difference by seeking voter approval of what might become the largest property tax hike in history.

The public education support package, hashed out in a closed-door Senate Republican caucus on Wednesday, added \$1.5 million to the original support plan drafted by legislative budget writers, and it increased the state commitment to basic school operations from \$302 million this year to \$306 million.

Under the plan, the basic state support for school operations will be increased from \$302 million this year to \$306 million in 1987.

The remaining \$8 million will be given to the 116 districts as one-time money for books and classroom materials. In an attempt to ease controversy between small and large districts, half the additional money will be disbursed through the basic distribution formula that recognizes the disparity between districts and tries to compensate for reduced local support in smaller, generally poorer districts. The other half will be disbursed a per-student basis, benefiting the larger, generally wealthier districts.

Resolution asks extension to comply with stamp rules

BOISE (AP) — A nonbinding resolution urging the federal government to give Idaho a year's extension to comply with a mandate that state sales taxes be repealed for food stamp purchases has cleared the Idaho Legislature.

The proposal gained final approval Thursday in the Senate on a 24-2 vote in what lawmakers hope will give the state some breathing room before it has to take the \$1.2 million revenue loss the exemption would cause.

Committee to investigate ways of handling the mandate, overwhelmingly passed the House last weekend.

Congress, in the 1985 Farm Bill, ordered all the states to cease sales tax collections on food stamp purchases by Oct. 1 or face elimination of 60¢ benefits, which reach over 61,000 of the state's 1 million residents. But the bill also offered the possibility of a year-long extension for states before they had to comply.

The limited opposition to the proposal was led by Sen. Walt Yarbrough, R-Grand View.

"I think this is more federal blackmail," Yarbrough said. "I don't think a study will do any good and I vote 'No.'"

He argued that the state was not taxing food stamps but food and has a right to decide how and when to exact taxes from its citizens.

Special shelter home funds safeguarded by House action

BOISE — After three days of wrangling, political maneuvering, and floor debate, the House passed a bill to protect funding for specialized shelter homes by a wide 52-29 margin on Thursday.

The bill, on its way to the governor, will preserve court-challenged funding for shelter homes smaller than 15 beds that offer residents training.

Rep. Donna Scott, R-Twin Falls, made a final play to kill the bill, moving that it be "held" indefinitely without further consideration. But Scott's motion was challenged by Rep. Larry Harris, R-Boise, and she withdrew it because it was in violation of House rules.

Scott and fellow conservatives from the House Health and Welfare

Committee had squared off with committee chairman Rep. Chris Hooper, R-Boise, and Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, in an effort to kill or weaken the bill.

Scott and Rep. JoAn Wood, R-Higley, wanted to see the bill deleted or amended to do away with requirements that the mentally ill and the mentally retarded be segregated in shelter homes. They also said the state couldn't afford the funding and objected to a section of the bill that restricts special funds to homes with 15 or fewer residents.

"I don't see the money there," Wood said. She also said the Department of Health and Welfare had tried to create the specialized shelter homes without legislative approval.

"I have a confusion in my mind as to the validity of what the Depart-

ment of Health and Welfare has done," she said.

Scott and Wood lost a key ally Thursday when Rep. Gene Winchester, R-Kuna, told the House he had taken a day to consider the bill and was convinced it would not mean a significant increase in state spending on shelter homes.

Winchester said there was no argument that the bill would put developmentally disabled adults in smaller homes, which were better and that the separation of mentally ill and developmentally disabled adults would mean better care.

Winchester, who had rescued Wood from a procedural bind in debate on the bill earlier in the week, did not urge members to vote one way or another on the bill, but cleared up some of the financial questions slowing passage of the bill, Scott and Wood said.

Pro-lottery PAC organized

BOISE (AP) — A bipartisan political action committee has been formed to raise money and organize a petition effort to put the lottery question before Idaho voters this fall, and sponsors say they're hoping for 100,000 signatures — triple the requirement.

Sen. Vernon Lannen, D-Pinehurst, and Rep. Walter Little, R-New Plymouth, on Thursday announced formation of Idahoans For the Right to Vote on Lotteries. It will work to gather nearly 33,000 signatures to force an initiative vote on state lotteries at the next general election.

A bipartisan group of more than 20 state legislators earlier this month announced the initiative drive, after the House twice voted on a Senate-passed resolution on lotteries.

Lannen and Little said the group filed Wednesday with the secretary of state's office for official status as a political action committee. Boise businessman Mike Fitzgerald, owner

of the Lock, Stock and Barrel restaurant, is treasurer.

"A statewide fund-raising effort will be necessary to make the initiative a success," said Lannen. He estimated it will cost \$3,000 to \$5,000 to print petitions, mail them and carry out other activities.

State officials' pay issue decided

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho House has decided that the salary for the state superintendent of public instruction should be the same as that for the state treasurer, auditor and secretary of state.

The Senate earlier passed legislation boosting the governor's pay by \$5,000 per year to \$55,000, attorney general from \$42,000 to \$48,000 and the part-time lieutenant governor's position by \$1,000 to \$15,000.

The legislation also decreed \$45,000 per year for the state superintendent of public instruction, and \$43,000 each for the auditor, treasurer and secretary of state. All four positions now receive \$37,500 per year.

But after a debate that seemed to

center on the people who currently hold those positions, the House voted to amend the legislation, raising the auditor, treasurer and secretary of state to \$42,000 per year more than originally recommended.

The measure is last possibility for pay increases for the state offices until 1990. Pay scales cannot be increased during an official's term. All seven state offices are on this fall's general election ballot.

The Senate approved the pay raise bill Wednesday on a 32-9 vote but will have to take it up again to approve the House amendments, once it clears the entire House.

Rep. Mike Strasser, R-Nampa, told House members that traditionally, pay for the secretary of

state, auditor, treasurer and state superintendent had been the same.

He tried to get the House to cut the superintendent's pay by \$2,000, but failed on a 33-29 vote. Then the House agreed to raise the other officials to the level proposed for the state superintendent.

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Simplot has ideas well worth hearing

"Tie onto what you can get ahold of. It'll be worth more tomorrow." That, in his own irrefragable way, is how J.R. Simplot, Idaho's most famous and most successful businessman, sees the economic times ahead.

It is a refreshing vision in a time singularly devoid of optimism in Idaho. The Legislature is ending a hunkered-down, mean-spirited session, failing to either help economic development or improve education. Can't, can't, can't has been its continual cry.

Nonsense, says J.R. Despite his advancing years, he is vigorous and energetic. He pounds the air with his words and throws 256K memory discs like cow chips out into the audience at the Twin Falls Bank & Trust and CSI seminar on agricultural economic development.

Mostly, he is himself: an American original entrepreneur, irreverent, folksy, philosophical. "I'm just a farmer who got a little lucky," he avers. Sure, J.R.

Nonetheless, he has a message. It is this: free enterprise capitalism is the greatest engine ever discovered for improving the lot of mankind. Given its natural course, it will outperform all others. "They've all been tried," he said. "They don't work." If the United States would permit it, he said, a billion people from all over the world would come to this country for the opportunities it offers. Tomorrow, with its doors of high technology, will be even brighter, what he calls an emerging "utopia" for coming generations.

"The only way we can get out of debt," he said referring to the deficit, "is to let the people make money. Let them run the democracy, not from Washington, D.C., but from places like Twin Falls, Idaho." Pretty good advice.

Times haven't been all that good in the Magic Valley. Simplot's message was that there are brighter days ahead for those of courage and the willingness to risk. It is a message we all need to hear. Thanks, J.R.

'Silent prayer amendment' dangerous

It isn't easy to make silence controversial, but that's just what backers of a so-called "silent prayer amendment" to the U.S. Constitution have done.

Their proposal, likely to come to the Senate floor in early April, is both dangerous and unnecessary.

The constitutional amendment, which has already passed by a 12-0 vote in the Senate Judiciary Committee because it appears so harmless, says:

"Nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit individual or group silent prayer or reflection in public schools. Neither the United States nor any State shall require any person to participate in such prayer or reflection, nor shall they encourage any particular form of silent prayer or reflection."

Introduced by Sens. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, and Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz., the "silent prayer amendment" is a serious threat to the traditional American value of separation of church and state. It goes far beyond merely providing a neutral moment of silence in which the right of students who wish to pray silently is protected.

Let's take a look at the "moment of silence" as envisioned by supporters of the amendment. They aren't calling for a moment of silence, in which students may or may not pray. They want a silent, devotional exercise.

The committee report on the amendment says state and local authorities would have the discretion to "structure a devotional exercise consistent with this amendment."

A "devotional exercise" in the public schools is very different from a neutral moment of silence. Adopting an amendment that provides for prayers that are non-vocal does little to guarantee that they will be voluntary and nonintrusive.

The proposed amendment would prevent students from distributing prayer cards or other religious materials during the "devotional exercise;" nor would it limit either the number or duration of "devotional exercises" to be scheduled during the school day.

The committee report says that "minority-religion students" would be allowed to leave the classroom during the moment of silence. If a "moment of silence" is truly neutral, why is there a need for any student to feel uncomfortable?

Walter Dellinger, Professor of Law at Duke University, points out another problem with the amendment. It would, he argues, for the first time in American history, invite the federal government to require school districts to receive federal funds to provide a certain type of silent prayer.

The committee report describes as "trivial" the right of every student to pray at will in his or her state or local authorities are allowed to "structure a devotional exercise," the

same silent prayer becomes meaningful. Apparently, to proponents of the amendment, government sponsorship is the difference between a silent prayer to God that is trivial and one that is significant.

The amendment not only poses a real danger to First Amendment rights, it is unnecessary for the overall purpose is to protect those of silent laws. While the 1985 Supreme Court decision in

Wallace v. Jaffree did overturn an Alabama law giving a preferred status to prayer during a moment of silence in public schools, it did not overturn a neutral moment of silence law in Alabama. In the Jaffree decision, the Supreme Court ruled a 1981 law — which added "or voluntary prayer" to a moment of silence law — was unconstitutional because it had no legal protection against abuse, and merely created the impression that prayer was an option favored by the state.

The crucial distinction in the case was drawn by Chief Justice Rehnquist's appointee, Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, who said: "Nothing in the United States Constitution as interpreted by this Court or in the laws of the State of Alabama prohibits public school students from voluntarily praying at any time before, during or after the school day. . . . If a legislature expresses a plausible secular purpose for a moment of silence statute in either the text or the legislative history, or if the statute disclaims an intent to encourage prayer over alternatives during a moment of silence, then courts should generally defer to the state intent."

Supporters of government-sponsored "devotional exercises" claim that the public schools do not allow room for religion. Public schools, of course, are not churches, and their responsibilities should not be confused. But, in fact, there are more than adequate opportunities in place now for public schools to both accommodate students' religious beliefs and to acknowledge the role of religion in society.

The school day is open with a moment of silence for meditation, prayer or reflection. Students may pray aloud at any time during the school day when unsupervised conversation is allowed, such as during lunch period or in between classes.

Under the 1984 Equal Access Act, student-led religious clubs may meet on school grounds on the same basis as any other non-curricular clubs such as the chess or bridge clubs.

Students may learn about the role religion has played in American history, study comparative religion or study the literary and historical elements of the Bible.

The "silent prayer amendment" would add nothing positive to the already existing right of students to pray in school. It would instead create a divisive government-sponsored prayer which would be "more silent" but by no means "silent." The true significance of the proposed amendment, as stated in a remarkable — and little-noticed — passage in the Senate Judiciary's own committee report, would be the "dismantling of the unbridgeable wall of separation" between church and state. Yet it is only by maintaining that wall of separation that this country has come to be the most religious — and the most free — of nations.

AMA tips its hat to reality, technology with code change

BOSTON — On the obligatory page this morning, someone died of "natural causes." This doesn't happen as often as it used to.

Today we are likely to diagnose the cause of death in a more clinical fashion. We list the fatal illness — cancer, heart disease, stroke — as if these were unnatural accidents that happened to the human body as it crossed an intersection of life.

The shift in death notices has followed the shift in scene. For 80 percent of us, the death bed is now a hospital bed. The sophisticated medical facilities that prolong life, it turns out, can also prolong death.

Once a patient becomes a patient, once that patient has left home for the custody of the institution, it becomes harder and harder to stop treatment, to die "naturally."

This is what happened to Paul Brophy and Nancy Ellen Jobs. Brophy has been in a coma, a "persistent vegetative state," for three years. Jobs has been in one for six

years. Neither of these two are terminally ill in the classic meaning of that phrase, nor can they be brought back to consciousness. Each has been kept from fate, from dying of starvation, by means of a feeding tube that leads into the stomach.

The families of both these people-turned-patients have asked the respective institutions to stop feeding and have had their requests refused. Now the Brophy case has gone before the Supreme Judicial Court of Massachusetts and the Jobs case is on trial in the New Jersey Superior Court.

At issue in both of these cases is whether "pulling the tube" is the same as "pulling

the plug." Should society regard the artificial respiration?

Eleven years ago, the New Jersey court ruled that Karen Ann Quinlan could be removed from a respirator. For ten years afterwards, she was fed and she survived. It took a decade for Quinlan to die. It took a decade for the national spotlight to shift from turning off the respirator to turning off the food and water.

There is, and there should be, something different, something primal in our feelings about nourishment. When we think of food, we don't think of cold steel machines; we think of milk and bread. We have been deeply reluctant to deny nourishment to those who cannot feed themselves and reluctant to stand by while they starve to death.

But slowly, carefully, we have come to realize that there is a difference between killing and letting death come.

Two weeks ago, the American Medical

Association articulated what may be the new consensus of opinion in the country. The revised code of ethics will allow doctors to withhold medical treatment — including food and water — from patients who are terminally ill or in an irreversible coma.

It may not make an immediate difference, but the AMA has, at last, tipped its hat to reality and technology.

There are some 10,000 patients in comas in this country. More than two of them, like Brophy and Jobs, once expressed the desire to die rather than survive in such a state. More than two families have seen their spouse, parent or child vegetate and believe that death is kinder.

As late as 1950, a majority of Americans still died at home. They often died as disease or age sapped them of the energy to eat and drink. It was considered "natural."

Today we live longer and our images of death have changed. In our worst fantasies, we end our lives trapped by technology,

tethered to plugs and tubes, unable to hear or see, to speak or to feel the balance, to help patients as people regain some control over their lives, especially the end of their lives. This will raise much thornier questions in the years ahead.

The AMA guidelines don't tell doctors what to do when Elizabeth Bouvier, the articulate and very much alive cerebral palsy patient in California, wants to stop her medical treatment. These court decisions won't tell us what to do when the elderly in nursing homes want to stop eating. We may look back on coma cases as the easy ones.

But today in Massachusetts and in New Jersey, two people are lying in irreversible comas. It is time for the Brophy family, time for the Jobs family, to be allowed to bury their dead.

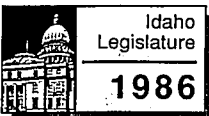
One says our act was justified because of threats; then he fumbled around trying to think of other reasons and again said, "Threats." That could work both ways.

Senate reverses Wednesday vote, kills search warrant bill

BOISE (AP) — Amid warnings that critical constitutional protections would be seriously eroded, the Idaho Senate has reversed its decision of a day earlier and narrowly rejected legislation allowing use of evidence seized in technically improper police searches.



After voting 22-19 to void its original 21-20 vote in favor of the House-passed bill, the Senate voted 21-20 against it on Thursday after what amounted to a rerun of earlier debate on the proposition.

The bill, handled by Sen. Ann Rydahl, R-Idaho Falls, would guarantee through law the so-called "good faith" exemption to court rules that require evidence seized through an improper search or under a flawed search warrant to be excluded from use in criminal prosecution.

But Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, a former prosecutor, argued that the bill was intended to end what he claimed has been the all-too-frequent incidents in which obviously guilty defendants have been released because of technical flaws in handling the investigation against them.

One of the major supporters of the later opening time and Sunday sales was northern Idaho's multimillionaire businessman Duane Hagadone, who pushed for the legislation to enhance operations of his huge Coeur d'Alene convention center that is now under construction.

Legal Sunday liquor sales bill to governor

BOISE (AP) — Legislation giving county officials the authority to extend tavern hours to 2 a.m. and allow liquor-by-the-drink sales on Sunday has been sent to Gov. John Evans.

The bill won final legislative approval in the Senate on a 26-13 vote Thursday, clearing the way for the first legal Sunday liquor sales in Idaho since Prohibition.

"Today in Idaho's struggling economy we have one bright light and that is the bright light of the liquor and convention industry," said Sen. Kermit Kiebert, D-Hope. "We need not take a day (of business) away from these people."

The bill is what Kiebert called the "conservative version" of a measure passed by the Senate earlier in the session that would have extended tavern hours to 2 a.m. and allowed Sunday sales statewide, with the provision that cities and counties could take action to restrict liquor sales hours.

Although the bill was backed by Attorney General Jim Jones, critics pointed out that state appellate Judge Jesse Walters, while declining to speak for the entire judiciary, said the bill was not needed since the state Supreme Court had already upheld the principle of the "good faith" exemption under Idaho law. Walters also said the bill included only one of the four safeguards the federal courts have required for application of the exemption.

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Sen. Reed Budge, R-Soda Springs, an ardent critic of any legislation liberalizing the state's liquor laws, cited Hagadone's lobbying in opposing the bill, but he also said this year has seen a spate of similar legislation that he claimed runs counter to attempts to encourage a responsible approach to alcohol use.

"I have never, since I've served in this body, seen such a flood of liquor legislation," Budge said. "We're trying to take care of this social problem we have in our communities and our state and here we are encouraging it."

Biennial sessions receive panel's OK

BOISE (AP) — Since 1963, the Idaho Legislature has met in annual sessions.

A resolution to return Idaho to the once-every-two-years system of legislative sessions moved a step closer to passage Thursday when the House State Affairs Committee voted to pass approval.

The resolution, which already has cleared the Senate, proposes a constitutional amendment. If the entire House approves it, the question will be put before voters in the next general election.

Rep. Dean Haagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, said if the Legislature met only in odd-numbered years, it would save at least \$500,000 per year.

He also said other types of Idaho residents, who can't afford to serve three months every year, might be able to serve in the Legislature if it met only once every two years.

Rep. Jack Kennevik, R-Boise, noted that neighboring Oregon holds biennial sessions, with the result that they often continue several months and special sessions are frequent.

If Idaho went to biennial sessions, but the Legislature met for six months, farmers, ranchers and others types of citizens wouldn't be able to serve, he said. "I think we'd be making a mistake," he said.

Haagenson said only "a lack of

"discipline" would allow a legislature already has a hard time appropriating up to 18 months in advance.

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Deregulation hearing set for Tuesday

BOISE (AP) — The House State Affairs has scheduled a hearing on a controversial bill deregulating the telephone industry.

But the decision, reached Thursday morning as the Legislature worked to wind up the 1986 session and adjourn, called for a hearing next Tuesday — after the current session is expected to end.

The Senate last week passed a bill deregulating the telephone industry. Since then, House members reentered heavy lobbying on both sides of the issue.

Members of State Affairs said Thursday they received so much material that it's impossible to make a quick decision on the Senate-passed bill.

At the same time as the action setting a hearing that probably won't take place, the committee approved a resolution calling for an interim study on the proposal.

Committee Chairman Rep. Walter Little, R-New Plymouth, said consumer groups, industry spokesmen and others have asked for an interim study committee, so they can present information on the deregulation proposal.

"I think we should use the Senate bill as a guide, as a basis for an interim study," said Rep. Vard Chaburn, R-Albion.

"This is a far-reaching bill, one with many ramifications. It should be studied first," said Chaburn.

Man held in poison death

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — A community college employee was being held for investigation of murder in the death of a woman who drank cyanide-contaminated water from an office cooler, police said Thursday.

Lewis Allen Harry Jr., 32, of Phoenix was being held in the Maricopa County Jail in Phoenix in lieu of \$1.37 million bail for investigation of one of first-degree murder and three of attempted murder, Officer Roger Clay said.

Harry was arrested Tuesday, one day after Julie Williams, 46, of Mesa, collapsed after drinking water from the cooler at TransAmerica Title Insurance Co., Clay said. Harry's wife also works at the company.

Ms. Williams died at St. Luke's Hospital on Wednesday night, Clay said, adding that the cause of death remained unknown.

Army overpaid moving firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — An Intensive Army investigation has now found nearly \$4.7 million in overpayments for shipment of servicemen's household goods, and has resulted in partial suspensions of nine firms that arranged the moves.

The new totals were reached after the Army discovered 12 additional cases of overpayments totaling \$334,000 and suspended three more companies from some of their Pentagon business, according to Col. George Kalne, spokesman for the Military Traffic Management Command.

Kalne said the total of excessive payments will continue to rise as more billings are entered into his unit's computers.

PUSH boycott nation-wide

CHICAGO (AP) — A six-month Operation PUSH boycott of a CBS-owned station, sparked by the demotion of a black anchorman, has been extended to CBS stations nationwide, a spokesman for the civil rights organization said Thursday.

Negotiations were continuing with local station WBBM-TV over Operation PUSH's proposal to call off its boycott in exchange for demands contained in an eight-page "covenant," said Walter Perkins, PUSH spokesman.

That proposal, delivered to WBBM in January, asks that the CBS-owned station agree, among other things, to adhere to strict minority hiring and promotion quotas and donate more than \$11 million to black charities.

Passengers leap off jet wings

BOSTON (AP) — Federal inspectors investigated claims Thursday that newly trained stewardesses botched the evacuation of a smoke-filled TWA jet, prompting two passengers to escape by jumping off the parked plane's wings.

The passengers apparently panicked when smoke entered the cabin as the plane taxied into Logan International Airport at 11:45 p.m. Wednesday, TWA spokesman Daniel Dennitz said.

The smoke was caused by a fan that broke in an overheated air conditioner, he said.

Rain helps bring fires under control

Rain helped control forest fires that have destroyed more than 7,000 acres in Kentucky and Ohio, but officials in several other states warned residents Thursday that dry conditions could spark blazes.

Light rain along the eastern Kentucky woodlands that began late Wednesday helped squelch the 105 fires that had scorched 5,500 acres.

"It was enough to knock the fires down for a day, at least," said Townley Bergmann, special projects chief in the state Forestry Division.

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American airports tighten up security

Fear of a terrorist attack in reprisal for Libya's pounding by the U.S. Navy this week has brought tighter security to several airports in the United States.

At some terminals, however, officials say heightened vigilance began last year, following the hijacking of a TWA jet over the Mediterranean in the summer and the terrorist attacks in December in airports in Rome and Vienna.

"We haven't done anything in-con-

nection to this last incident," security Capt. Jerry Kennedy said Thursday at Stapleton International Airport in Denver. He said security was stepped up after the December attacks.

"We had a lot of training here in terms of bringing in FAA agents on the level of possibilities, films and in-service training on terrorists and hijacking response. We upgraded our armaments a little bit here in terms of more shotguns and training in that area," Kennedy said.

Extra security officers were in evidence at Los Angeles and San Francisco airports, and Maryland state police at Baltimore-Washington International Airport said they have advised troopers to be especially alert for baggage left unattended or any other suspicious activity.

"We not only have our two eyes open, we've got our hands working, too," said Thomas DiMaria, public safety coordinator at Greater Buffalo (N.Y.) International Airport.

"If a person working here forgets

his ID, we're not letting him in," DiMaria said.

A security alert was declared Wednesday at Chicago's three airports, and extra uniformed personnel were deployed at Los Angeles International Airport.

However, James Nachstein, chief inspector for the Port Authority police in New York, said security at Kennedy, La Guardia and Newark airports has not been increased. "We feel that we've done what is required," he said.

High waves slow shuttle debris search

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The Challenger salvage fleet returned to sea Thursday, but high waves and murky water again hampered the search for additional shuttle debris.

Bad weather had stymied the operation for six straight days in the 400-square-mile recovery zone which extends roughly 15 to 50 miles northeast of Cape Canaveral. Most of the ships stayed in port during that period, but the Navy decided to send them out Thursday when winds abated.

Some of the ships reported by radio that several debris marker buoys had been shifted by the high winds and waves.

The USS Preserver, whose responsibility is recovering parts of the crew cabin and astronaut remains, dropped divers overboard, but they reported they could not immediately locate the cabin wreckage. They said visibility at the bottom, 100 feet down, was less than one foot.

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Board denies 8th Sirhan parole bid

SOLEDAAD, Calif. (AP) — Sirhan appeared to fill with tears as he listened to the board's statement, which called for him to undergo in-patient psychiatric testing and therapy and to be transferred to a state medical facility at Vacaville, Calif., for 2 1/2 hours. After Sirhan's ruling was announced, his eyes

Man held in poison death

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — A community college employee was being held for investigation of murder in the death of a woman who drank cyanide-contaminated water from an office cooler, police said Thursday.

Lewis Allen Harry Jr., 32, of Phoenix was being held in the Maricopa County Jail in Phoenix in lieu of \$1.37 million bail for investigation of one count of first-degree murder and three of attempted murder, Officer Roger Clay said.

Harry was arrested Tuesday, one day after Julie Williams, 46, of Mesa, collapsed after drinking water from the cooler at TransAmerica Title Insurance Co., Clay said. Harry's wife also works at the company.

Ms. Williams died at St. Luke's Hospital on Wednesday night, Clay said, adding that the cause of death remained unknown.

Army overpaid moving firms

WASHINGTON (AP) — An intensive Army investigation has now found nearly \$47 million in overpayments for shipment of servicemen's household goods, and has resulted in partial suspensions of nine firms that arranged the moves.

The new totals were reached after the Army discovered 121 additional cases of overpayments totaling \$34,000 and suspended three more companies from some of their Pentagon business, according to Col. George Kaine, spokesman for the Military Traffic Management Command.

Kaine said the total of excessive payments will continue to rise as more billings are entered into his unit's computers.

PUSH boycott nation-wide

CHICAGO (AP) — A six-month Operation PUSH boycott of a CBS-owned station, sparked by the demon of a black anchor-man, has been extended to CBS stations nationwide, a spokesman for the civil rights organization said Thursday.

Negotiations were continuing with local station WBBM-TV over Operation PUSH's proposal to call off its boycott in exchange for demands contained in an eight-page "covenant," said Walter Perkins, PUSH spokesman.

That proposal, delivered to WBBM in January, asks that the CBS-owned station agree, among other things, to adhere to strict minority hiring and promotion quotas and donate more than \$11 million to black charities.

Passengers leap off jet wings

BOSTON (AP) — Federal inspectors investigated claims Thursday that newly trained stewardesses botched the evacuation of a smoke-filled TWA jet, prompting two passengers to escape by jumping off the parked plane's wings.

The passengers apparently panicked when smoke entered the cabin as the plane taxied into Logan International Airport at 11:45 p.m. Wednesday, TWA spokesman Daniel Denzitz said.

The smoke was caused by a fan that broke in an overheated air conditioner, he said.

American airports tighten up security

Fear of a terrorist attack in reprisal for Libya's pounding by the U.S. Navy this week has brought tighter security to several airports in the United States.

At some terminals, however, officials say heightened vigilance began last year, following the hijacking of a TWA jet over the Mediterranean in the summer and the terrorist attacks in December in airports in Rome and Vienna.

"We haven't done anything in connection to this last incident," security Capt. Jerry Kennedy said Thursday at Stapleton International Airport in Denver. He said security was stepped up after the December attacks.

High waves slow shuttle debris search

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — The Challenger salvage fleet returned to sea Thursday, but high waves and murky water again hampered the search for additional shuttle debris.

Bad weather had stymied the operation for six straight days in the 400-square-mile recovery zone which extends roughly 15 to 50 miles northeast of Cape Canaveral. Most of the ships stayed in port during that period, but the Navy decided to send them out Thursday when winds abated.

Some of the ships reported by radio that several debris marker buoys had been shifted by the high winds and waves.

The USS Preserver, whose responsibility is recovering parts of the crew cabin and astronaut remains, dropped divers overboard, but they reported they could not immediately locate the cabin wreckage. They said visibility at the bottom, 100 feet down, was less than one foot.

Extra security officers were in evidence at Los Angeles and San Francisco airports, and Maryland In-Service International Airport said they have advised troopers to be especially alert for baggage left unattended or any other suspicious activity.

"We not only have our two eyes open, we've got our hands working, too," said Thomas DiMaria, public safety coordinator at Greater Buffalo (N.Y.) International Airport. "If a person working here forgets his ID, we're not letting him in," DiMaria said.

Board denies 8th Sirhan parole bid

SOLEADAD, Calif. (AP) — Sirhan appeared to fill with tears as he listened to the board's statement, and the three-member panel deliberated for 2½ hours. After Sirhan's last hearing, a different board took

just three minutes to reject his bid. Chairman Albert M. Leddy said it had been "a difficult decision," stressing the board wanted to treat Sirhan the same as any other prisoner.

"We wished (also) to assure the safety of the people of California," Leddy said.

Dow keeps climbing

Profit taking brings prices back from peak

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market chalked up another advance to record highs Thursday, although prices retraced from their midsession peaks as some traders took profits before a long holiday weekend.

Analysts said continuing declines in interest rates encouraged buyers in a busy session.

The Dow Jones average of 330 industrials, up almost 30 points at its best levels of the day, settled for an 11.02 gain at 1,821.72. For the four-day trading week, the average rose 53.16 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange reached 178.10 million shares, up from 161.45 million Wednesday.

In the last hour of trading, however, sellers took charge, apparently wishing to reduce their exposure over a three-day weekend. The markets will be closed for Good Friday.

Bank and other financial issues were strong in response to the latest interest-rate declines.

Chico Corp. rose 1/4 to 63 1/4; Manufacturers Hanover 1/4 to 50 1/4; First Wachovia 1 to 43 1/4; Mellon Bank Corp. 1/4 to 7 1/4; and J.P. Morgan 1/4 to 7 1/4.

Among savings and loan and mortgage stocks, H.F. Ammons gained 1/4 to 67; Great Western Financial 1/4 to 43 1/4; and Federal National Mortgage 1/4 to 53 1/4.

With one session left in the first quarter of 1986, the Dow Jones industrials sport a gain of more than 275 points since New Year's. The stock market and many other exchanges are closed today for Good Friday.

Retailing issues also had a good day, with Sears Roebuck up 1 1/2 to 50 1/4; J.C. Penney up 12 to 63 1/4; F.W. Woolworth up 1 1/4 to 7 1/4; and K mart up 1/4 to 43 1/4.

Many analysts think the decline of oil prices and interest rates will provide a strong stimulus to consumer spending in the months ahead.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, advancing issues outnumbered declines by more than 2 to 1. The exchange's composite index added 109 to 137.63.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 210.63 million shares.

In the credit markets Thursday, prices of long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, rose about \$20 for every \$1,000 in face value. Declining interest rates have been cited as a primary force behind the dramatic rise in stock prices since last fall.

While some of that cash will be used to reduce debt and increase savings, some of it is bound to be used for those long-delayed purchases, including appliances, automobiles and vacations.

Donald Straszheim, Merrill Lynch chief economist, estimates that if half the 15 million mortgages written during those five years were refinanced, the additional cash at lower rates would be about \$10 billion a year.

Large as it is, and powerful as it is in the marketplace, that sum still can be viewed as relatively small.

Small, then, when matched against an anticipated \$152 billion increase in personal income for 1986. And smaller still beside a \$500 billion rise in household equity holdings in the past year.

Economy expands strength, brings spenders into markets

NEW YORK — At a time when many analysts thought consumers were about to run out of energy, the economy has turned on the afterburners.

Oil prices and interest rates have fallen, stocks have surged, and wages and salaries — which make up 60 percent of personal income — have risen in "real" terms, that is, with little or no deduction for inflation.

All this is happy news, but there is one catch, in fact, that some people think the next blow to the economy is bound to come from euphoria, and the smugness and complacency that accompanies it.

But euphoria has a strength of its own, and is bringing spenders into the marketplace who are as surprised to be there as sellers are to see them. It is a factor in house, car, appliance, vacation and other sales.

Behind the confidence are forecasts from individuals and institutions that customarily look at the economy in shades of black, white and gray, but who are now predicting the economic expansion into 1987 and beyond.

"Merrill Lynch's forecast for example, shows growth in total production of goods and services, commonly referred to as gross national product, reaching an annual rate of more than 3.7 percent in the second half of 1987.

Its published forecast doesn't go beyond that, but it might be noted that the 3.7 percent forecast for that period is the highest in any year before then. That is, the forecast is for stronger growth in 1987 than in 1986.

During much of this time the prime interest rate is forecast to remain at about 9 percent. But then, in the second half of 1987, according to ML, it is likely to fall to 8.7 percent and then to 8.5 percent.

The forecast of Edward Guay, CIGNA Corp. chief economist, is equally optimistic. "Continued world growth, a long domestic economic expansion and declining inflation are all ahead of us," he says. "With good monetary management, inflation could be zero by 1989."

Confidence at such levels sifts down and seasons the consumer market. And so do world events. The spiciest ingredient has been declining oil prices, but various other factors, some unexpected, have also added to the flavor.

The dollar, for example, is declining at the same time the economies of Europe and Japan are likely to pick up. For the first time in many years, U.S. exporters are now likely to find an eager and profitable outlet.

Another boost to morale is coming from the homeowner sector. Millions of people who purchased homes during the past five years were under fire because of interest rates and had little money left for buying discretionary items.

That pressure is now being released by falling rates. In many instances, homeowners who refinance at lower rates find themselves with \$100 or more — considerably more in some instances — to spend on heretofore forbidden items.

From 1981 through 1985, fixed-rate mortgages averaged about \$60,000 at 12.5 percent. At 10 percent, which is available on long-term, fixed-rate loans in many areas of the country, the payments would be lowered roughly \$125 a month.

While some of that cash will be used to reduce debt and increase savings, some of it is bound to be used for those long-delayed purchases, including appliances, automobiles and vacations.

U.S. trade deficit plummets along with drop in oil prices

WASHINGTON — The United States trade deficit fell to \$12.5 billion Thursday, a dramatic 24 percent improvement over the January total — as the country's oil bill declined sharply, the government said Thursday.

Analysts said the turn-around offered hope that the darkest days for U.S. trade are coming to an end, but they cautioned against reading too much into one month's numbers.

At the White House, presidential spokesman Larry Speakes hailed the new report as signaling "the start of a fairly steady decline in the trade deficit."

Speakes said the drop in the value of the dollar "is just now showing up in the trade figures and should help in the trade picture at least through 1986."

The Commerce Department report said the February deficit was down from a record \$16.5 billion imbalance in January.

Last month, imports fell 9.7 percent to \$30.2 billion while exports rose 4.3 percent to \$17.7 billion, their highest level since June 1985.

The dollar, which has fallen in value on foreign exchange markets by 30 percent since July 12 months ago, is expected to lower the cost of American goods, thus helping boost exports, while dampening Americans' desire for imported goods.

Analysts have said it takes a year to 18 months for these favorable effects to show up, but they said the February report may offer a glimmer that the dollar's decline is finally having an impact.

While the dollar's decline may have helped, the biggest reason for the February improvement was a 23 percent plunge in petroleum imports, reflecting a big drop in demand and to a lesser extent fall in western oil prices.

The U.S. trade deficit with Japan was \$4.3 billion in February, still one-third of the total deficit. The United States ran up a \$1.9 billion deficit with Western Europe, a similar \$1.9 billion deficit with Canada and a \$1 billion deficit with Taiwan.

The rise in imports last month included a 6.9 percent increase in sales of American manufactured products, which totaled \$12.2 billion. American agricultural exports, however, fell 3.6 percent, to \$2.4 billion, with corn sales down 27 percent.

Total imports of foreign cars dropped by 9.2 percent to \$3.3 billion last month with imports of all manufactured goods declining by 5.4 percent to \$22.2 billion.

David Berson, economist at Wharton Econometrics, predicted oil prices probably will rise in the April-June period as refiners take advantage of low prices. But he said a lower oil import bill along with a lower dollar will contribute to a gradually improving trade deficit during the second half of the year.

Berson, an economist at Data Resources Inc., another forecasting firm, also cautioned against expecting the trade deficit to improve rapidly. He predicted the deficit for all of 1986 will hit \$15 billion, up from last year's record \$14.8 billion.

"It is going to take a long time to dig ourselves out of this hole, but the worst is over," he said. "We expect the deficit will be improving over the course of the year, but it will be a slow improvement because we're starting out from such a bad point."

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The number of barrels of petroleum imported last month dipped to a daily average of 10.5 million barrels, 13 percent lower than the January rate. The price fell to \$24.39 per barrel, \$2.29 below the January average and the lowest price since November 1979.

The drop in volume was attributed to a desire on the part of refiners to deplete stocks while waiting for the price to fall further.

Commerce chief rips lawmakers on funding

TWIN FALLS — The nation of Korea has been pestering Idaho for more than a year to forge some trade ties with a sister-state relationship.

The Idaho Department of Commerce will have to stall that approach for another year, as well as other potential contacts, says agency Director David O. Porter.

Porter is blasting the Idaho Legislature for "partisan meanness" in failing to pay for adequate basic programs in his nine-month-old department.

"This policy of partisan meanness is costing people jobs," Porter said Thursday in an interview. The Republican majority in the Legislature refuses to shove aside politics to adequately fund a department of commerce while a Democratic governor is in office, he said.

"I believe that lack of effort is encouraged by the leadership and is encouraged by what I think is mean partisanship, and it offends me deeply," Porter said.

Porter praises Burley for improvements

BURLEY — The Director of the Idaho Department of Commerce was in Burley Thursday with praise for city facility improvements and some thoughts on revitalizing downtown.

Director David O. Porter told city officials he had a "good feeling" about Magic Valley area development. There is a "nice nucleus developing" for business with the types of improvements to water service, sewage service and truck transportation systems Burley has been undertaking, he said.

City officials said they were concerned, however, about several downtown businesses that have closed, leaving empty storefronts.

Porter recommended that members of the Burley Area Development Committee and the Downtown Action Committee send representatives to shopping centers where progress has been made and solicit ideas for the Burley area.

The fight for business between Rexburg and Idaho Falls is not unlike that between Twin Falls and Burley, Porter said. Although he was not aware of what tactics Rexburg business and community leaders have been using, he suggested that Burley officials contact them.

The problems in Burley are about the same as those in other Magic Valley communities, Porter said.

including salaries and operating expenses.

The result, Porter says, will be no significant international trade development, almost no business recruiting effort and very little aid for current Idaho businesses.

Idaho currently spends 17 cents per resident for general economic development, he says. Montana spends \$1.99 per capita, Utah spends more than \$3 and Oregon spends \$5.25. Those states are the competition, Porter says.

Idaho also is the only state in the nation which has a lower economic development budget than in 1981. Its 1987 allocation will be 54 percent of 1981 levels, Porter says.

One economic staff member, economic development specialist Shiri Boyce, has resigned to manage the Boise Area Economic Development Council with a budget likely to be \$150,000.

Overall, the low funding and cuts in federal money will cut in half the number of general economic development positions, agency figures show.

While other states are investing more money to boost their economies, Idaho is barely adding anything, Porter says. The general fund's contribution to the

state money set aside solely to promote tourism.

More than \$100,000 of the \$342,900 from Idaho's general fund also must be used to match federal grants, according to department figures.

Strapped highway districts to revert some roads to gravel

TWIN FALLS — The convenience of driving on paved roads is being sacrificed this spring in a number of highway districts for a more old-fashioned method.

Limited funding and one of the worst spring highway break-up situations in years have combined to force some rural highways and roads to revert to gravel surfaces.

On light budgets and facing unknown patching and paving costs, highway district officials say it is impossible to maintain some of the older rural road surfaces. Maintaining gravel will be easier, less costly and will eliminate further development of potholes and break-up.

Managers of both the Twin Falls and Buhl highway districts say this spring's conditions are about the worst they have encountered.

Buhl District Manager Harold Miller said Wednesday about five miles of what were paved rural roads in his district will be torn up to make way for gravel surfaces.

"It's the worst conditions I have seen in 24 years. That's how long I have been working here," Miller said. "We have already ripped up one mile of pavement, and we are doing another today. There are three other mile sections that are scheduled for the same treatment."

Miller said the damage in the Buhl district is scattered over the 135 miles of road he supervises and doesn't involve any specific location. In an area where a full mile is particularly bad, pavement will be scraped away and the driving surface will revert to a gravel roadbed.

"Nobody wants a gravel road in front of their home, but you have to do what you have to do," Miller said.

Both Burney and Miller say they are concerned about high patching costs cutting into planned construction, but they will be going ahead with projects already scheduled for this season.

Most highway district officials contacted credited the unusually heavy rains of February and the depths of frost with causing the problem. Miller said frost was going out when the rain hit, creating a soft spot between the frost and the road surface, resulting in crumbling asphalt. Most districts reported a gradual run-off and less flooding than in some years except during the February rains.

Ruben Kraus, manager of the Minidoka County Highway District, said break-up damage is about normal there and funding is adequate to meet patching costs. He said gravel roads in the district suffered the most this spring with lots of soft spots.

Director manager, said Polk Street in Kimberly is in poor shape and will soon be a gravel street. The highway district maintains Polk Street since it is half in the city and half in the country.

"I don't see any other way out," Burney said. "We will patch and resurface the bad areas of our main roads — those heavily used arterials — and tear up the worst sections on the other roads and start over."

Burney said there are a number of other one-mile sections where this will be done in the Twin Falls district this year. Both Burney and Miller said the plan is to keep major roads paved and gravel those getting lighter use until such time as there is money available to repave them. Burney said this could be a long time, based on current funding conditions.

Weekend gas prices stay low

TWIN FALLS — It should be a happy Easter holiday for motorists in the Magic Valley and in most of the nation.

Service station operators and wholesale outlets say prices should stay about the same through the weekend. But if the price moves, it will be down.

A survey of local gasoline prices Thursday showed regular or unleaded gasoline could be purchased for as little as 76.9¢ at one self-service outlet. The highest figure found was 89.9 cents per gallon on regular and unleaded fuels with full service.

Self-service stations were selling regular gasoline at rates from 76.9 cents per gallon up to 77 cents and 79.9 cents.

Gary Wignall of United Oil, where regular and unleaded products were on sale for 76.9 cents per gallon, said that price has held the past two days, but it could change at any time.

The Mr. Gas stations in Twin Falls are pricing gasoline at 77.9 on both regular and unleaded, a rate that also has not changed for two days.

At the Fearless Ferris Stinker Stations, where prices were 77 cents per gallon on the self-service regular and unleaded, managers said prices could change at any time, and normally work crews have only a few minutes notice of change.

Full service prices of 88.9 and 89.9 were listed by major oil company outlets and at least one manager of a Chevron station said he has hopes that prices would drop by today to a more competitive level.

Diesel fuel was selling at a low of 97.9 cents per gallon in Twin Falls and super unleaded at 82.9 cents.

Prices in Twin Falls were well below those listed by American Automobile Association offices in Boise, based on a nationwide survey last week.

The AAA said travelers in the Gem State would pay an overall average of \$1.14 per gallon, compared to a national average of \$1.02. The average figure represents an 8 cents per gallon drop over last year's Easter weekend average prices.

The average figures include all available grades of fuels. The same AAA survey showed regular at 97 cents per gallon average at Idaho's self-service pumps. The survey found

that at least 27 service stations will be open at a 24 hour basis across southern Idaho for the holiday weekend.

The national average on diesel was listed in the AAA report at \$1.10 per gallon while premium full service prices held a national average of \$1.26 per gallon.

Nationally, the AAA survey showed the highest price of gasoline was listed in the AAA report at \$1.10 per gallon while premium full service prices held a national average of \$1.26 per gallon in Missouri.

AAA calls the current pricing rate the lowest retail gasoline sales prices in recent history — a drop of 23.6 cents per gallon since last Christmas. This has put current prices at the 1979 levels, the report shows.

Lower world market prices for crude oil, based on decisions made early in 1986 but oil-producing countries were credited by AAA for the current bargains at gasoline pumps, and launched Chaburn on three decades of legislative service.

Chaburn got credit for his long work hours from Rep. Don Loveland, R-Boise, who asked House members, "Did you ever get into that parking garage ahead of Vard Chaburn?"

Chaburn said at a reception later that one expects to hear such praise "when you're in a box in front of the pulpit."

At a reception in honor of the rancher and his wife, Chaburn was given a silver belt buckle and his wife received a silver necklace.

He said he was stacking hay 30 years ago on the day three friends from Burley came to his ranch to ask him to run for the Legislature.

While one took Chaburn's place stacking hay, he took his time talking to the other two about the Legislature, he said.

To test the waters, he took his nominating petition to a neighbor across the road, who said, "By God, I'd do just as well as you as anybody else," and launched Chaburn on three decades of legislative service.

Family sues city, police chief

BOISE (AP) — A Twin Falls County family is suing the city of Kimberly and Police Chief James Campbell for more than \$1.9 million over a 1983 accident involving a man they contend should have been arrested for drunken driving.

Joseph and Joan M. Allen and Monica Andersen Cook claim in the suit filed Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Boise that Cook was seriously injured and deprived of her constitutional rights when she was hit by a pickup truck that allegedly veered off a road.

Cook, 19, is Allen's stepdaughter and Mrs. Allen's daughter.

They contend Campbell and the city purposely conspired to cover up the fact that the police chief had stopped Larry on suspicion of driving drunk just moments before the accident, but allowed him to continue driving.

The family asked \$18,000 for medical expenses, compensation for lost past and future income to be set at a jury trial, at least \$100,000 in general damages and at least \$1.5 million in punitive damages.

Fire destroys solar drying shed

KIMBERLY — A Thursday morning fire destroyed a solar drying shed at the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Snake River Conservation Research Center near Kimberly.

Kimberly Fire Chief Dale Vawvser said the fire department was called to the scene about 10:30 a.m. and had the fire controlled in about half an hour. Crews remained at the scene for a while since the fire was brought under control mopping up

hot spots. Vawvser said the fire was started by some burning weeds near the shed. The weeds were being burned as part of some yardwork being done at the research center.

Sparks from the burning weeds apparently ignited some corrugated pipe lying next to the building, Vawvser says. Once the pipe was ignited, the fire rapidly spread to the fiberglass drying shed.

"Once it caught it really went

up," Vawvser said of the building. The loss is estimated at \$4,000. There was also some damage to a metal building adjoining the solar drying shed.

Dr. David Carter, research leader at the center said the building was built about five years ago and was used for drying plants and plant materials.

"We lost a few soil samples but nothing of any critical value," Carter said.

department is increasing \$7,000, about 2.1 percent.

Gov. John Evans had requested \$765,800, which included a \$250,000 allocation to bring expertise from the state universities more to economic development. It failed, and another bill at \$500,000 also was downed.

With the \$342,500 available, "we were able to take on two major projects that don't require very much money — and do them — and deny every other thing," Porter says.

Idaho Senate Pro Tem Jim Risch,

R-Boise, rejected Porter's claim that partisan politics is involved in department funding.

"We only have a limited amount of money," he says. "If there was additional money going to that agency, it would have to come out of education. All we ask is that they do the best job they can with the money they have."

House Speaker Tom Stivers, R-Twin Falls, could not be contacted for comment.

In a press release, lieutenant governor candidate C.L. "Butch" Otter Thursday attacked Porter for "political sniping" and called for

"unified support by all Idahoans... for a strong economic development program in the state."

But Porter says he sees the Legislature as the main roadblock to any significant attempt by state government to help the economy. Its leaders are operating on the concept that, "if we cut taxes and don't have any services, businesses are going to flock to us," he says.

The Magic Valley Agricultural Institute paid the costs for Porter to attend and speak at its Agricultural Economic Development Day because budget cutbacks have eliminated travel for the rest of the fiscal year.

said. The region has been hit harder than some other parts of the state because it is dependent on agriculture, he said.

Porter commended Burley officials for making use of local water for recreation and industry. Many other areas have under-used such recreation possibilities, Porter said.

He also praised Burley officials for the planning and work currently being done to update water and sewage systems.

He said that although this summer brings more opportunity for business relocation to Idaho, most of the state is "not prepared for this opportunity."

The present infrastructures, or physical facilities, of most Idaho cities are not developed enough to handle increased growth, he said. In particular, most towns' water and sewage systems cannot cope with either an increase in industry or population.

Burley Mayor Ken Frink said that if there was a major fire in Burley now the city would be in "trouble" because water systems are not developed enough to cover major problems.

However, construction of a new

well, pump station, water storage tank and water and sewage extensions will solve these problems as well as prepare the city for future development, he said.

The new tank will hold 520,000 gallons of water, compared to the 100,000 gallons presently held by the original tank on 16th Street. Improved underground storage and booster facilities will tie the system together and improve water access to customers.

Drilling began on a new well at 14th Street this month in the first stage of the project scheduled to be finished next year, city officials said. Money for the \$1.3 million project was provided through an Idaho Community Development Block Grant, the Economic Development Association and Burley contributions.

In addition, a truck access road which has been in the works for several years should be ready for construction to begin in about a year, said city officials. The route is along the site of an industrial area the city

is planning to develop along the Snake River west of Overland Avenue.

Burley Industries such as Ore-Ida, Del Monte, Boise Cascade and Coors will be able to use the route as soon as it is finished. Ore-Ida estimates that it can save between \$20,000 and \$30,000 a year in freight costs because the new road would permit trucks with two trailers direct access to the plant.

"You're doing a great job," Porter said after a tour of the city with Frink and other city officials. He was in town to speak at a Region IV Development Association meeting.

"I took us 15 days just to fill the washway, and right now we are putting in pipe and siphons for the surfacing work," Kraus said.

Some roads are still too wet and soft for patching, Kraus said, but spring work is pretty much on schedule.

Members of the Twin Falls Highway District Board of Directors took a pothole tour Thursday to get an idea of upcoming cost and works to do. Areas slated for a return to gravel, Burney said patching has already begun with the district using its own recycling machine. He explained that the drop in oil prices has been a help, but at this point he has not been able to get a quote on asphalt charges. Contractors are watching oil prices a little longer before committing themselves, he said.

Neal Thomas of the Cassia County Highway District said conditions there are not as bad as they have been in the past three or four years, but still are worse than the average spring conditions. Thomas said he is hoping it won't be necessary to rip up any pavement and substitute gravel this year in the Cassia area and thinks the district can get by without so serious a move.

At the state level, Jon Schierman, division of highways maintenance superintendent for the Shoshone district, said asphalt mix plants that the state does business with have not yet opened. As a result, patching on state routes is not under way.

He said broken roadways and potholes are being cleaned out in preparation for patching as soon as the plant mix is available. Interest routes are generally in good shape, he said, except for a few small holes in some areas.

"We have plenty of other potholes," Schierman said. "The Burley area is the worst. I would say the rest are about average."

He said State Highways 77, 81 and 24 in Cassia and Mindokoa counties are some of the worst areas for break-up damage, although Highway 20 west of State 76 to Carey is in serious trouble. Once material is available, Schierman said, crews can probably clean up the problem areas in about two weeks.

New test may aid treatment of weak bone

CHICAGO (AP) — A new test could help predict a woman's susceptibility to osteoporosis and determine how best to treat the bone-weakening malady that ranks third as a cause of death among women over 50, doctors say.

Osteoporosis, a deterioration of bone that can lead to life-threatening pelvic fractures and spinal deformities, is most often triggered by the onset of menopause, usually between the ages of 47 and 50.

Menopause greatly reduces the ovaries' production of the hormone estrogen, which stimulates production of the calcium needed to maintain healthy bones.

What the new test promises is a simple method of determining a woman's susceptibility to osteoporosis by simulating menopause before its actual onset and measuring the effects on calcium levels.

That knowledge would enable doctors to determine whether estrogen therapy is required and how aggressive that treatment should be. The test could be available in five, or six years if research involving human subjects proves successful, said Gary Hodgen, who developed the test with Dr. Rafat Abassi and reported on it in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

"A woman can lose much of the calcium in her skeleton within two or three years of menopause and begin experiencing fractures within three or four years," he said.

"Estrogen-replacement therapy can't put back the minerals once they're lost, and that's why we need to know who needs to be treated and how before the loss begins," added Hodgen, scientific director of the Jones Institute for Reproductive Medicine at the Eastern Virginia Medical School in Norfolk, Va.

Osteoporosis most commonly afflicts Caucasian women 50 and older, particularly those of Scandinavian ancestry. It is rare among black women due to their greater bone density.

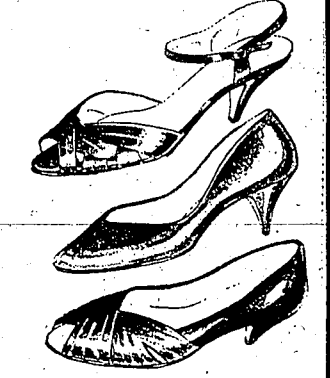

Israeli jets strike Palestinian bases

SIDON, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli warplanes bombed Palestinian bases near this southern port Thursday less than two hours after a rocket exploded in the schoolyard of an Israeli border town.

Police said at least 10 people were killed and 22 wounded in the air raid on the Ein el-Hilweh and Mieh-Mieh Palestinian refugee camps and the nearby hilltop village of Siroubieh.

It was the second Israeli air strike in Lebanon this year. Israeli jets hit guerrilla bases in Lebanon 13 times last year.

The Sidon camps are strongholds of Yasser Arafat's Fatah guerrillas, the main fighting group in his Palestine Liberation Organization.

Israel's military command said three students and a teacher were slightly injured by the Soviet-made Katyusha rocket guerrillas fired into the frontier town of Kiyat Shimon.

They were the first Israeli casualties of rocket fire from south Lebanon since Israel invaded its northern neighbor in 1982 in an effort to drive out Palestinian fighters.

The raid was clearly intended to warn the Palestinians, who have been building up forces in the area,

to expect similar retaliation if cross-border attacks continue. Many Arafat loyalists have been returning to the Sidon area.

Bombs badly damaged a one-story building near Mieh-Mieh that was believed to be a Fatah headquarters. Police said seven civilians, including some Lebanese, were killed by a bomb that fell 100 yards away.

One bomb exploded in a street near the sprawling Ein el-Hilweh camp, ripping off the front of a five-story building and gouging a crater 60 feet wide and 30 feet deep.

Four jets streaked in from the Mediterranean at 11:07 a.m., bombing and rocketing the target areas. Guerrillas threw up a curtain of fire with machine guns and SA-7 shoulder-fired missiles, but the Israeli command said all aircraft returned safely.

Shultz reports from Greece

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz said Thursday that U.S.-Greek relations have taken "a real turn for the better" and talks will be held to resolve a dispute over U.S. military installations well before the base agreement expires in 1988.

Shultz and Greek Prime Minister Andreas Papandreu concurred after nearly three hours of discussions that no settlement of the base issue was achieved at their meeting.

"But we did agree that a discussion of the question would take place in time to permit the orderly resolution of the question well prior to December 1988," Shultz said with Papandreu at his side.

Shultz said that he did not expect an answer during his visit and his expectations were fulfilled.

Nevertheless, Shultz said at a news conference "I believe there has been a real turn for the better."

French fighter hits school; 22 killed

BANGUI, Central African Republic (AP) — A French fighter plane crashed into a school Thursday, killing 22 people — many of them children — and touching off a violent anti-French demonstration in this former colony, officials said.

Thirty people were injured when the jet crashed into the school in a heavily populated Moslem neighborhood. The fighter jet's pilot ejected safely.

France, which maintains an air base in Bangui, announced it would pay compensation to victims' families.

As rescue workers searched the debris of the Koranic school for any trapped survivors, security forces moved to try to quell angry crowds.

Melbourne police station hit by car bomb; 21 hurt

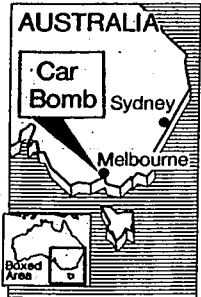
MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — A car bomb exploded Thursday in front of police headquarters, injuring 11 police officers and 10 passersby, officials said.

Police said five smaller blasts followed within minutes, apparently caused by detonators or exploding tanks of gasoline from parked cars.

Witnesses said the blasts occurred about 1 p.m., damaging parked cars and shattering windows of nearby buildings. Glass and bits of metal flew in all directions, causing many of the injuries.

One woman police officer suffered burns over 80 percent of her body. At least two other officers suffered serious injuries.

Police cordoned off the block and evacuated the buildings, fearing another explosion. Army bomb squad members searching the street later found gelignite, a



gelatin dynamite, and detonators, a senior police constable said.

No more Monday Night Football? It could happen in 1987. It won't happen this year — the NFL's contract with the three networks is heading into its final

season. But the folks who run the NFL are aware that weekly prime-time games could be an endangered species.

ABC now is run by Capital Cities, a company which is known for cutting costs by eliminating massive expenditures. Earlier this week, Cap Cities jettisoned its announcing lineup, cutting loose Joe Namath after one year — and writing off his \$550,000 salary as a buyout — reassigning O.

J. Simpson to college football and bringing in Al Michaels to handle play-by-play, with Frank Gifford be-

ing offered the analyst's spot. Though Monday Night Football's ratings soared last season, few advertisers are willing to spend prime-time rates every week for sports. Estimates of ABC Sports' losses last year have been as high as \$50 million — a big chunk of it attributable to its NFL package.

"Professional football is not making money for all three networks," says ABC spokesman Irv Brodsky. "But we are still very interested in it, though the (next) contract has to be equitable from both sides."

Dennis Swanson (the new head of ABC Sports) has gone on record that we lost money on the NFL. But we are not looking to get out of Monday Night Football. He's just said we need reasonable contract negotiations.

These negotiations traditionally begin several months after the Super Bowl and probably will start next spring.

One-shot deals such as the NCAA championship basketball game — or even the World Series, which can run from four to seven nights — remain attractive to advertisers, who are drawn to them because it does not involve a long-term commitment. But a 16-week series — with some Thursday, Friday and Sunday night games thrown in — is not so desirable any more.

"Not many advertisers are willing to spend the big money for (NFL) games unless they're getting the Cowboys, Bears, Raiders and the New York teams," says a network source. "ABC figures it can make more money from regular programming than from the NFL. So Monday Night Football might die if the advertisers continue to show they don't want to put out the money every week."

Many sponsors have signed up for the 1986 season because Monday Night Football is such a visible

event and it attracts the right group of viewers — particularly upwardly mobile males. But that doesn't

mean ABC is looking at a profit — or even the break-even figure — for its NFL coverage, even with the surge in ratings.

"We've found the market reasonable and our clients have completed arrangements for the coming year," says Steve Laff, executive vice president of Backer and Spielvogel, an advertising firm which handles Miller Beer and NCR, among other major sports advertisers. "But we must remember that the ratings are only one component of demand."

"I'm sure they'd love to be able to raise their rates. The ratings have been better but the absolute dollars available is not necessarily (better)."

If ABC is thinking about bowing out on Monday nights, CBS or NBC is not likely to pick up the Monday night games. Both of these networks have strong enough entertainment (See MONDAY on Page C2

Coaches say Duke's No. 1; bet Louisville

DALLAS — Duke enters the NCAA Final Four with the No. 1 ranking but many basketball coaches feel Louisville may leave with national championship.

"I rank the teams in this order — Louisville, Kansas, Duke, Syracuse Coach Jim Boeheim said Thursday. "Don't even count LSU. But Duke's going to win. They've done it all year."

They don't match up defensively and they don't scare you. They just beat you."

Duke, 36-2 and riding a 20-game winning streak, plays second-ranked Kansas, 35-3, winner of 16 straight, in Saturday's second game of the NCAA semifinals at the Reunion Arena.

Seventh-ranked Louisville, 30-7, winner of 15 straight, faces unranked Louisiana State in the opener, which has a 1:30 p.m. MST start. The final will be played Monday night.

"If I had to pick, I'd probably pick Louisville and Kansas, then Louisville," said Georgetown Coach John Thompson, whose Hoyas, led by Patrick Ewing, made it to the Final Four three times in four years, winning the title in 1984.

But Duke's great. They have the chemistry and play with experience offensively and defensively. Teams play to prevent themselves from losing. They say "we know we should beat these guys." Every pass, every basket, they're extra careful. LSU is not in that situation. They're not worried about preventing losing."

Thompson, the president of National Association of Basketball Coaches who are holding their convention here, added: "As in the case of Villanova (last year's upset champion over top-ranked Georgetown), Cinderella comes out only one night. Anyone can win it. I'm here to enjoy the game this time."

Bill Friedler, coach of Big Ten champion Michigan, agreed with



Thompson that any team can win the title, but said he was leaning toward Louisville because "they're playing extremely well and (Coach) Danny Crum has experience in the Final Four."

C.M. Newton, the Vanderbilt coach whose team lost two Southeastern Conference games to LSU this season, said, "I'm surprised they're here and I think that they're surprised they're here. But any team that can beat Purdue, Memphis State and Georgia Tech to get here has to be good."

Georgia's Hugh Durham, another SEC coach, said he would be rooting for LSU, but "Louisville might be the team right now."

Villanova Coach Rollie Massimino, one of three Big East teams in the Final Four last year and the only unranked one, said, "Kansas can beat Duke and Louisville will win it all."

Five Louisville players have been averaging double figures this season, led by 6-foot-7 Billy Thompson and 6-5 guard Mill Wagner, both seniors, with 14.8 points.

Pervis Ellison, a 6-9 freshman center, is next with 12.3 points and tops the Metro Conference champion Cardinals in rebounding with 7.9, a fraction ahead of Thompson.

According to the NCAA computer, Louisville has played the toughest nonconference schedule in the nation, twice losing to Kansas.

"There's no telling how good LSU

Scandal shakes straight-laced world of Soviet gymnastics

MOSCOW — Soviet gymnasts regularly win medals in international competition, but a published letter from one sports official says the world of Soviet gymnastics is tainted with scandal.

The official daily Sovetskaya Rossiya, a leading proponent of Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's current campaign for more openness in Soviet life, printed a letter this week from Viktor Silin that listed irregularities in the training of Soviet gymnasts.

Silin, a secretary of the National Gymnastics Federation, wrote that

ex-world champion Dmitri Belozherchev was drunk when he crashed a car last fall, breaking his leg and thus missing November's world championships in Montreal. Despite Belozherchev's drunkenness and violation of training rules, national gymnastics coach Yuri Titov, himself a silver medalist in the 1956 and 1960 Olympics, tried to keep Belozherchev on the team and refused to debate this and other decisions, Silin's letter said.

Silin's other complaints included an accusation that trainers and a doctor with the women's gymnastics team stole caviar and other food rations for the gymnasts and ate them themselves.

The letter was the latest of several reports in the past year about crime, drinking and lack of discipline among Soviet sportsmen and women.

Last month, Sovetskaya Rossiya published a story about three teenage swimmers who were prosecuted for packing a pistol and stealing electronics equipment from colleagues and friends.

The recent reports have criticized trainers and others for spoiling talented youths entrusted to them and have suggested that lack of discipline often results when young stars enjoy privileges they are supposed to repay by winning competitions.

Silin wrote that a trainer's indulgence led to the auto accident involving Belozherchev, who became the youngest world champion in history when he won the world gymnastics title at age 17 in 1984.

The champion gymnast asked to borrow his trainer's car, Silin wrote. Breaking rules laid down by the Soviet Sports Committee, the trainer agreed to lend the car and Belozherchev and three other gymnasts set off for Moscow, the letter said.

Belozherchev was at the wheel when, on the way back, he crashed the car, breaking his leg. Two other gymnasts in the car suffered fractures, Silin said.

Silin complained that the three other gymnasts involved were immediately barred from the national squad but Belozherchev was not.

At a recent meeting of the gymnastics federation, Silin said everybody questioned this move but could not discuss it formally because Titov had already made clear he wanted Belozherchev on the squad.

The letter said Belozherchev was later removed from the national team by a ruling of the Soviet Sports Committee. But Silin complained that there had still been no public discussion of "this most crass violation of discipline."

Another scandal evoked by Silin involved a trainer identified as V.

Safonov. The letter charged Safonov was a known drunkard who once got so intoxicated at an international competition in the Latvian capital of Riga that he could barely find train tickets he kept for other coaches.

Yet Silin said Safonov was later entrusted with the organization of unspecified competitions and then named to head an investigation into the stealing of gymnasts' food by trainers on the women's squad. Silin said he and others had confirmed the thefts in earlier inquiries.

"Since there are no active measures being taken about these facts, I decided to make them public through the newspaper."

Basketball: The beat goes on, and on, and on, and on, and on, . . .

Basketball happens to be my favorite spectator sport.

It's too bad we get so much of it. Do you remember what you were doing last July? Flunking, swimming, playing softball? The National Basketball Association was opening its rookie training camps. Do remember what you were doing on Oct. 21? Watching Monday Night Football, raking leaves? Idaho's high schools were opening girls' basketball practice.

Now consider that the NBA season still has more than two months to run and that the high school basketball season, unofficial-

ly, ended only last Monday with the Magle Valley All-Star Games. Officially, it's been just 13 days since the last high school boys' basketball tournament game was played. By rough estimate, The Times-News sports pages have reported on in excess of

10,000 basketball games — professional, college and high school — in the last seven months.

That tidal wave of bouncing basketballs is just a blur to most sports fans. From junior high school through the NBA, basketball has a season followed by a series of mini-seasons, consisting of sub-district, district, regional, state, divisional, conference or national playoffs. Winning the conference championship is increasingly irrelevant in basketball, since there's always a post-season tournament to follow that includes nearly everyone who shows up with five matching uniforms.

By the time of next Monday's NCAA basketball final, not one sports fan in 250 will be able to tell you how the Final Two teams got there. By the time of the NBA championship series in June, not one sports fan in 25,000 will care. Basketball is a game that generates a lot of fervid excitement, but not much casual interest. There's not much audience out there for the Cavaliers vs. Pacers or Colorado State vs. New Mexico. By contrast, there are many people who will tune into a Bills-Colts game on Monday Night Football or read an Indians-Majors box score.

It's time for a basketball freeze. Seasons need to be shortened, and completed between Thanksgiving and St. Patrick's Day in Idaho, that would mean playing the girls' and boys' high school seasons at the same time, either as doubleheaders — already a widespread practice among Class A-4 schools — or on different nights of the week. District and state tournaments could be played simultaneously at different sites, and they could be seeded, and scheduled to lend more weight to the regular-season performances of the teams (See CRUMP on Page C2

New York, which already had five players sidelined for the season because of injuries, suffered another setback when guard Rory Sparrow broke his left ankle in a collision with Derek Harper less than five minutes into the game. He will be in a cast for six weeks.

"I want to get out of this building before the epidemic spreads to us," Motta said. When former Maverick Pat Cummings, one of the Knicks lost for the season, approached Motta, the coach said jokingly, "Stay away from me."

involved. They could also be shortened and reformed on the district and sub-district level. When only one or two teams from a seven-night school tournament are going to advance anyway, it makes very little sense to play until every team but one has two losses.

On the college level, it should be obvious by now that the 64-team NCAA tournament has long since passed its saturation point and that the NIT is an anachronism. Who cares who the 65th-best team in the country is?

On the professional level, enduring

four levels of eliminations through eight weeks is doing nothing for the NBA except putting its championship series up against the PGA. If the NBA expands again, it will be bumping up against Wimbledon — and over just in time to start training camp. The regular season in the NBA now serves no purpose except to eliminate the Golden State Warriors from the playoffs.

The reason for basketball ad nauseum, of course, is to generate additional revenue for the teams involved. In some cases and in the short term, it accomplishes that — but at the price of overexposing the

sport to such an extent that it only serves to confuse the fans it needs to attract.

So, quick — tell me who won the South-Central Idaho Conference championship in 1983, or the NBA Central Division title last year? Who was the Pac-10 champion in 1983? Who was the Big Sky Conference regular season champion this year? Don't know? Don't know! Wherever you are, whenever you go, there's more basketball just around the corner.

programming for that night and aren't likely to make a switch.

The NFL is aware that the networks won't be offering anywhere near the kind of coverage in rights fees that they have in the past. Each NFL team draws nearly \$65 million a season from the current deal and, even with that, 25 percent of the league's teams apparently lost money in 1985.

In fact, it is possible that no increase at all will be offered, particularly if ABC bows out or insists on bidding for Sunday afternoon games instead.

"All three networks have had sales problems, but it is not limited to the NFL or even to sports," says Val Pinbeck, the NFL's director of broadcasting. "Generally, sales follow ratings and we've had a very strong increase in ratings last year."

I think we'll see a more positive trend in sales.

While the NFL's TV situation no longer is ideal, it sure is better than that of the USFL. ESPN is planning to televise one prime-time game a week in its league's first fall season, but certainly not in competition with NFL games. Ironically, if the USFL stays in business into 1987, it could wind up with the only prime-time pro football on TV. On cable, of course.

BOBBY WOLFF

Dear Mr. Wolff: In my duplicate encounters, I note that more people are opening very light hands these days. Do you recommend opening all hands that contain 11 HCP or more?

ANSWER: There are some hands I would open with as little as nine or 10 HCP. However, I would limit these to two-suited distributional hands. I do not recommend opening flat hands (no distributional values) with less than 12 HCP, even at duplicate bridge.

Dear Mr. Wolff: Partner opens one heart in third chair and I make a two-over-one takeout in diamonds. Isn't partner required to bid again?

ANSWER: No, he is not. When you have passed originally, you cannot force partner to bid again unless you make a jump shift. If partner's opening has improved your initial point count (you have a heart fit), you can invite game via a three-heart jump (11-12 points).

Dear Mr. Wolff: At rubber bridge, declarer picked up a card in dummy as if to play it and then put it back and selected another. The objections and the arguments started at that point. What do the laws say?

ANSWER: The laws are specific: "A card must be played if it is a card in

dummy deliberately touched by declarer except for the purpose of arranging dummy's cards or of reaching a card above or below the cards touched."

Dear Mr. Wolff: Who has the final word after a Blackwood sequence? I was always taught that the Blackwood bidder sets the final contract.

ANSWER: If the Blackwood bidder asks for aces and then sets a contract, his decision should be final. If he continues Blackwood and asks for kings, he indicates an interest in a grand slam. Responder may then continue on to a grand slam if the asker stops at six, provided responder has values not fully disclosed by his prior bids.

Dear Mr. Wolff: RHO opens one spade, I pass and LHO jumps to four spades. Partner doubles and RHO passes. Should I bid something or is partner's double a business double?

ANSWER: Partner's double shows a wealth of high cards and is primarily a business double. (Four no-trump is available for takeout.) You should bid only if you hold enough distributional values to suggest success at a five-level contract.

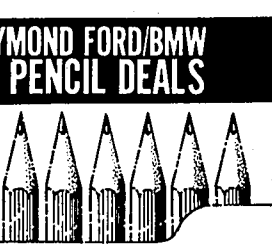

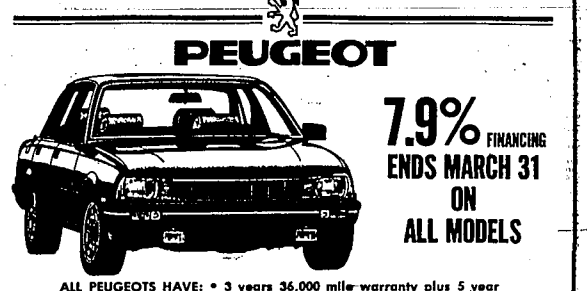

HOLLYWOOD — A rush shipment of 50 promotional copies of the "Hands Across America" theme song went out to about 8,000 radio stations Wednesday, just in time for a national Good Friday morning simulcast of the record.

USA for Africa President Ken Kragen said the Hands Across America organization will attempt to duplicate last year's surprise publicity coup when thousands of stations simulcast the original African famine anthem, "We Are the World," on Good Friday.

The plan is to encourage stations to repeat that simulcast this year and, hot on the heels of that airing, debut this year's American homeless-hungry tune, "Hands Across America."

"We're trying to make it available for all stations in the country to play it," said Hands Across America spokesman Dave Fulton. "EMI America was talking about increasing it (the number of promotional copies of the single) from 7,500 to 10,000 so we could get it to everyone."

At press time, no Magic Valley radio stations reported knowing about the Good Friday simulcast effort.

There are about 9,000 AM and FM radio stations licensed in the United States, but Fulton said the simulcast would be considered a success if the two songs were played back to back on just half of them. "I would love to have 5,000 stations do it," he said.

"Hands Across America" is the theme of the national charity hand-holding event scheduled for May 25, USA for Africa, which raised \$4.5 million last year for African famine victims on the strength of "We Are the World" revenues, hopes to raise \$10 million for America's homeless through pledges for participation in the Memorial Day weekend event and sales of the new record, which has been heard by one handful of celebrities and reporters until now.

Composed by a trio of New York advertising jingle writers, it was

originally performed last January by several dozen celebrities and residents of Taft, a small California town in the San Joaquin Valley. Their hand-and-foot performance on the main street of Taft was videotaped and edited into a music video that was to have aired during half time on NBC's Super Bowl XX telecast on Jan. 26.

But the video was scratched at the last minute after pop star Michael Jackson objected that the new song, which he co-wrote with Lionel Richie. The 27-year-old pop superstar contended that "We Are the World" was a gift from God and ought not to be doppelgängered in favor of the new song.

The Good Friday debut of "Hands Across America" marks something of a compromise in that the original CBS Records all-star version of "We Are the World" will be broadcast before "Hands Across America." Affiliates of the United Stations network plan to carry the simulcast a step further by following both songs with a recording of "America the Beautiful."

In addition, the flip side of the 7-inch single version of "Hands Across America," which EMI America will begin marketing on behalf of USA for Africa in early April, also will feature "We Are the World."

Unlike the Jackson-Richie anthem that was performed by 45 well-known pop stars, there are no name artists on the "Hands Across America" recording. Several members of the group Toto did instrumental tracks and a chorus of studio session singers calling themselves the Voices of America sang the lyrics.

Proceeds from record sales will be funneled into the massive Hands Across America project, which envisions a single line of some 6 to 10 million Americans holding hands from Los Angeles to New York for one hour during the Memorial Day weekend. Handholders are expected to pledge \$10, \$25 or \$35 for the opportunity to stand in the line.

USA for Africa officials will be discussing how many pledges have been made so far.

Even weeds put a gleam in this basket maker's eyes

HAGERMAN — Fern Pothier collects weeds, grasses and pine needles wherever she goes.

She credits her present passion for making baskets to the 17 years she was a 4-H leader while her four children were growing up.

Pothier says the various 4-H projects "opened a lot of windows for me," especially the forestry and weed projects. "I always got more out of the projects than the kids did."

As she talks, she points out a bucket-full of willows in one sunny corner of her home, waiting to be set out. She explains that new willow shoots without any branches are the best for making willow baskets.

One of her treasured possessions is a box filled with birch bark and tundra grass she collected while visiting her son in Alaska.

This year she is going to try raising her own broom straw as well. She raises gourds too, which she uses in some of her "experimenting," working different types of materials into holes punched in the gourds.

For pine needle baskets, she uses needles from the Pondrosa pine or the bull pine from northern Idaho, both native trees of Idaho. For larger baskets, she orders 18-inch pine needles from Georgia.

A rawhide basket made from an Angus cow is another of Pothier's creations.

Because many of the materials she uses in basket making are flat and don't fit into a normal needle's eye, Pothier designed a wider needle that has the

eye crosswise to the needle shaft. She calls it her "cross-eyed needle."

She is learning to work with porcupine quills, which she explains have to be worked wet so they're pliable, the same as with willows or birch bark. So far she's tried embroidery with the quills. A book about porcupine quills lays open beside her favorite chair, which looks out over the Hagerman Valley.

Her "yen to work with natural fibers and natural collections" led her to purchase an acreage in the valley, where materials for basket making are plentiful. She lived in a sheep wagon and cooked for the construction crews while the two-story log house she designed for herself was built.

A spring from the canyon walls feeds the pond surrounding her house and also waters the chickens, cow, sheep and garden. Cattails growing around the pond provided the raw material for her "paper making experiment." She's produced cattail paper with a linen-like texture.

Nine pillowcases stuffed with wool collected from the sheep she raises sit in another corner of her work room waiting to be cleaned, carded and woven into wall hangings.

An oil painting hanging over her piano and a watercolor beside the fireplace are also examples of her multiple talents.

A registered nurse for over 30 years, Pothier says she is now able to do things she enjoys. In fact, she says, "I'm almost glad I'm gully because I am having so much pleasure in my life."

Quilts hang in airport display

BOISE — Quilts have "come off the bed and onto the wall" for the new Art in the Airport display at the Boise Municipal Airport.

The show, organized by the Boise Basin Quilters, will be in place through April 30 at the airport display cases, located upstairs near the security gates.

The show is designed to show quilts in a new light, said Ann Weatherwax, publicity coordinator. "There's more to a quilt than a bed-cover. It can be a beautiful art form. The trend since the '70s has been to bring them off the bed and put them on the wall," she said.

Weatherwax said most of the pieces on display are small and are hung in the cases. "There's nothing functional about them, and they range from the traditional to the contemporary," she said. ICA offers apprenticeship grants to Native Americans

The grants help Idaho's Indian communities develop and preserve their traditional arts. Approximately \$5,800 was awarded for winter/spring apprenticeships, making about \$9,000 available for summer/fall apprenticeships. The two yearly deadlines are to ensure the seasonal availability of some materials.

Current apprenticeships include porcupine quill work, Kootenai canoe building, cornhusk work, and moccasins and glove making.

Mary Brenner can't erase fond TV memories of Mary Richards

"Mary" was the show everyone wanted to like so much. But the old gray Mare ain't what she used to be. Hopes ran high last Dec. 11 when "Mary" debuted. After all, here was our Mary 10 years later. A couple of extra lines around the eyes to be sure, but she was still slim, attractive and vivacious. But something was a bit askew. This Mary didn't smile as much. In fact, she was a little more bitter. This Mary — Brenner — had lost her job at a stylish woman's magazine and the only place she could sign on was as a consumer columnist for a seedy Chicago tabloid.

Mary Brenner isn't Mary Richards, everyone connected with the show said.

Indeed she wasn't.

"Mary" bombed. It got murdered in the ratings by "Highway to Heaven," slipping as low as No. 52 at one point. Some blamed the 7 p.m. (MST) Wednesday night time slot. But that seems more like a bad excuse for what essentially was a poorly written — and not very funny — show.

CBS took "Mary" into the shop in late February for fine-tuning. It returned last week at a new time slot: Tuesday nights at 8 p.m. (MST). Now, it only has to compete against "Moonlighting" — the object of the same kind of devoted following that "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" once had.

Changes may be made, but let's face facts. "Mary" will always suffer in comparison with "The Mary Tyler Moore Show," one of the most beloved sitcoms in TV history. Although it's been off the air since 1977, "Mary Tyler Moore" reruns are being aired nightly across the nation. The gang at WJM-TV is still very much part of our collective pop-culture consciousness.

Face it, Mary Brenner just didn't have the right support group.

Instead of Murray, Rhoda, Mr. Grant, Sue Ann and Georgette, there was a collection of one-joke misfits: Jo Tucker, an acerbic deskmate (Katy Sagal) who chain-smokes and talks tough; Ed Lasalle (John Astin), the obnoxious theater critic (yes, Ted Baxter was obnoxious, too,

but he was funny-obnoxious, not unctuous-obnoxious); and Tully (David Byrd), the legally blind copy editor (a particularly cruel joke that wore thin after episode one).

Then there's Mary's boss, chauvinist editor Frank DeMarco (James Farentino). Frank was a creep from day one, whose main goal seemed to be wanting to bed Mary. Mary, for her part, felled his advances — but only halfheartedly. And sources indicate that when the "new" episodes get underway, she will get closer to her amorous editor. Perhaps then some creative tension will flow.

We're all still rooting for our Mary. And maybe the show will change. Perhaps someone at MTM will twist the plot slightly: You see, there's this new low-power TV station on the outskirts of Chicago that needs a consumer reporter. It will hire Mary away from The Eagle. She'll walk into the studio and there'll be a crotchety but lovable producer, a balding, wisecracking news writer and a vain, egocentric anchorman.

And all will be well with the world again.

Lack of advertising spells doom for CBN's Christian news report

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — "CBN News Tonight," a half-hour nightly newscast launched on the Christian Broadcasting Network two months ago, is being canceled because of a lack of advertising, CBN announced.

The final program will be broadcast Friday at 8 p.m. MST. The time slot will be filled by the third half-hour segment of the Rev. Pat Robertson's "The 700 Club," an interview show that had occupied the slot before the weeknight news program began Jan. 27.

The show, which was billed as presenting news within a Christian framework of values, was canceled



because it failed to attract advertisers, said Michael Little, CBN group vice president of programming.

"As we looked at the upcoming second quarter, advertising support was running at 20 percent or less and not projected to increase in the third quarter," he said. "It is difficult to financially support a broadcast endeavor with that level of reve-

nue."

About 17 of the news department's 43 staffers will lose their jobs, CBN said.

The news department will continue to produce news segments for "The 700 Club" and the "CBN News Update," which is broadcast six times each weekday evening, the network said. The news show's Washington studio will remain a news bureau of the Virginia Beach-based network, CBN said.

CBN, which reaches about 28 million cable subscribers, presents a variety of Western, game shows and situation comedies along with Robertson's program.

Despite poor basketball figures, CBS bounces into tie with NBC

NEW YORK — CBS tied NBC in the ratings last week with a big assist from the miniseries, "If Tomorrow Comes," but no help at all from prime-time college basketball, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

The second and third parts of "If Tomorrow Comes," Sidney Sheldon's story about a glamorous jewel thief, registered among Nielsen's first 15 shows for the week of March 17-23, but the NCAA Tournament regional semifinals broadcasts both ranked in the bottom 15 programs.

"If the basketball had done a bit better, we would have won the week," said Michael Eisenberg, CBS' research director.

For the week, CBS and NBC averaged 16.2 ratings, while ABC had a 14.3. After 25 weeks in the 30-week prime-time season, NBC leads with an average rating of 17.8 to CBS' 16.8 and ABC's 15.0.

A national ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

NBC had four shows in the Top 10, all from its popular Thursday comedy block. "The-Cosby Show" was first with a 36.4 rating and the debut of "All Is Forgiven" finished seventh. "Family Ties" was second and "Cheers" third.

CBS placed three shows in the Top 10: "60 Minutes" in fifth, Part 2 of "If Tomorrow Comes," in sixth, and its Sunday movie, "Dallas: The Early Years," in a tie for ninth with ABC's "Dynasty." ABC also scored with its Tuesday comedies: "Who's

the Boss?," in fourth, and "Growing Pains," in seventh.

The third part of "If Tomorrow Comes" ranked 12th. All three installments, including the first part from the week before, averaged a 22.0 rating, placing the miniseries third behind ABC's "North and South" and CBS' "Cain & Abel" among multi-part productions this season.

Prime-time basketball ratings were down from last year. The Thursday match-ups of Georgia-Louisiana State and North Carolina-Louisville had a 10.2 rating, compared to last season's 12.0. The Friday games, Duke-DePaul and Kansas-Michigan State, had a 10.6, down from last season's 10.8.

Eisenberg said this season's prime-time games didn't have the major star appeal that Georgetown had with Patrick Ewing and St. John's had with Chris Mullin last season.

ABC's Thursday lineup and NBC's "Hill Street Blues," programs not normally high-ranked, all reached the second 10, in part because of CBS' NCAA basketball competition. ABC's "The Colbys" was 17th, NBC's "Hill Street Blues" was 18th and ABC's "20-20" was 20th.

A regular episode of "Dallas" on CBS ranked 14th, tying it with a regular episode of NBC's "Miami Vice." On Sunday night, the movie

about the early generation of "Dallas" beat the rerun of "Miami Vice's" opening two-hour episode, which ranked 26th.

On Monday, CBS' "Kate & Allie" and "Newhart" were on an hour earlier and took some momentum from NBC's new comedies, "You Again?" and "Valerie," which had been winning the 7 to 8 p.m. MST time slot. "Newhart" was 13th and "Kate & Allie" 16th, while "Valerie" was 28th and "You Again?" 33rd.

"Our comedies didn't hold up well," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Eisenberg said the success of "Kate & Allie" and "Newhart" in the earlier hour showed the strength of the shows and some "probable early tune-in for 'If Tomorrow Comes.'"

CBS new Wednesday comedies, "Fast Times" and "Tough Cookies," which had been performing poorly, picked up some viewers when NBC's "Bop Hope's Command Performance in Sweden" pre-empted the normally high-rated "Highway to Heaven," ABC's competition, "MacGyver," won the time period, ranking 22nd, while "Command Performance" was 25th, "Fast Times" 31st and "Tough Cookies" 45th.

"This is the best those comedies have done this season," Eisenberg said.

Robbins wouldn't disclose the price but the magazine placed it at \$20 million.

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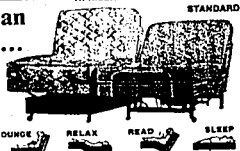
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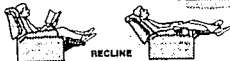

Busy Stephanie Kramer's latest role lets her show all her talents

CULVER CITY, Calif. — Stephanie Kramer has moved easily from the bubble-brained comedy of "We Got It Made" to the gunplay and car chases in "Hunter."

"Literally 48 hours after we finished 'We Got It Made,' I did a pilot for Stephen Cannell and NBC," she said. "It didn't go, and a month later we did the pilot for 'Hunter.' So it worked out wonderfully."

Miss Kramer stars with Fred Dryer in the series about a mismatched pair of detective sergeants occasionally at odds with their superiors. She plays Dee Dee McCall and he is Rick Hunter. Like all shows from Stephen J. Cannell Productions, the drama has an undercurrent of humor.

She said she had no trouble going from comedy to drama. "I like doing both," she said. "The most fun about 'We Got It Made' was the cast. We got along so well. That was like doing a one-act play each week. It's the same working with Fred. He's a great guy. Can you imagine having to go to work every day with some jerk?"

"Hunter" is the fourth series for Miss Kramer. First came "Married: The First Year" in February and March of 1979. In April and May of that year she was Princess Tara in the "Second Empire" segment of "Cliffhangers." She was the suspicious girlfriend in "We Got It Made" in the 1983-84 season.

"Dee Dee McCall is someone who's very much like me," Miss Kramer said, "although I'm not quite as sarcastic and I'm not quite as tough. I don't run around with a gun."

"She's very independent, very assertive in a positive way. And aggressive when she has to be. Her relationship with Hunter is one of mutual respect. They're partners, and they've been through a lot together. They have affection for each other."

The show has never been a big hit, but it has done well enough in the ratings to stay alive. NBC recently moved it from Saturday to Tuesday, where at 8 p.m. MST it is between "The A-Team" and "Stingray." Those shows are also from Cannell.

Miss Kramer was born and raised in Los Angeles, where her father was a violinist, her mother a fashion model. Her father died when she was

12. Her mother is now an artist and sculptor. Her brother, Wes Kramer, is breaking in as a writer.

"This is something I always knew I wanted to do," she said. "When I was about 5, my mother asked me what I wanted to do. I said I wanted to be an actress and a singer. I was fortunate enough to have family support."

She attended the American Academy of Dramatic Arts in Los Angeles and got her early training in the musical theater. From that she moved into television and did guest work on numerous episodic series.

"The thing I don't get much time for is my singing," she said. "My schedule is so demanding. But this hiatus I'm going to do a demo record with Mike Post (who does the music for all of Cannell's shows), and from

that shop a deal. So many people in this business have limited creativity. You're just an actress. You're just a singer. I'm just as much a singer as I am an actress."

Miss Kramer has had several opportunities on "Hunter" to display her singing talent. Dee Dee has gone undercover several times as a singer.

Miss Kramer has never married and said her work has limited her social life.

"It's so demanding on all levels, physically, intellectually, emotionally and spiritually," she said. "It depletes you. My life basically consists of sleeping and getting up and going to work and going home and going to sleep. But I would like someday to get married and have children."

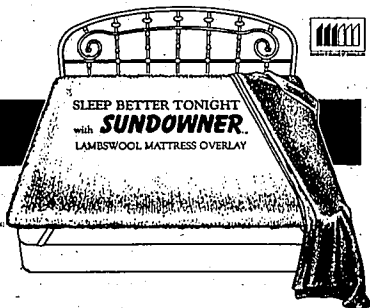

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Dr. Duke expands TV horizons; will host upcoming PBS series

GRAPEVINE, Texas — Dr. James "Red" Duke Jr. stops after a medical meeting to chat about bighorn sheep in the mountains of West Texas, and in almost the same breath discusses heart disease with another doctor.

To many Texans, this is typical behavior for the surgeon and wildlife conservationist they've come to

know from health reports he makes for television stations in and out of the state, including KMVT in Twin Falls.

On April 5, more people will get to know him as he serves as host for PBS' "Bodywatch," an eight-part series of half-hour shows touching on stress, exercise, nutrition and sex.

"The reason I do this other stuff is I'm basically a schoolteacher. I like to teach; I have taught all my life," said Duke, 59, chief of trauma

surgery and professor at the University of Texas Health Science Center at Houston.

A spokeswoman for the show said its executive director, Christopher Gilbert, saw Duke in an interview with NBC Nightly News host Tom Brokaw and, with the show idea already in mind, decided the bespectacled Hillsboro native fit the part.

"His (Gilbert's) concept about health is what you want to make it interesting," she said.

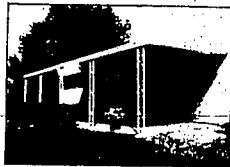

Death may have brought life to struggling 'Hill Street Blues'

NEW YORK — Death and near-death may have brought "Hill Street Blues" back to life, which raises a new set of complications as the NBC series winds down its sixth season.

In episodes last month, when Capt. Frank Furillo (Daniel J. Travanti) barely survived a shooting and Joe Coffey (Ed Marinaro) didn't, the award-winning cop series achieved its highest ratings in two years.

Those ratings reflect more than just the hyped numbers, that TV often extracts with promotable plot twists about birth, death and weddings. Larger audiences also attest to the revitalization of a show that had grown unwieldy and formula-ridden last season.

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said it's still too early to say whether "Hill Street" will return next fall for its seventh season. But he's pleased with the show's changes, particularly the addition of the tacky anti-hero, Lt. Norman Buntz, played by Dennis Franz.

"I think he's sensational," Tartikoff said. "If they can come up with two more characters like that, I think they can really bring the show up."

Executive producer David Milch said several characters were being developed "that I think will be terrific in a 'Hill Street' environment or another environment. The question is where to put them and devote our imaginative attentions."

It's a real Catch-22. What might give "Hill Street" greater vitality, if it gets renewed for 1986-87, would be new characters playing off old favorites. But since standard contracts tie actors to a series only for seven years, the show could fall apart or prove too costly to continue after next season.

"All bets would be off then," Milch said, who noted that Travanti and Veronica Hamel, who plays Joyce

Davenport, Furillo's wife, have said they want to move on to other acting roles. He added that he didn't expect all the current cast to return next season, "but I haven't gotten around to considering that."

What Milch and co-executive producer Jeffrey Lewis are considering is whether any new characters they create would be wasted in a "Hill Street" lame-duck season. The other dynamic, though, is that these new characters in search of a series could find their own spinoff via a "Hill Street" showcase.

One of the new characters, who was introduced two weeks ago, got special attention last Thursday. She's a lesbian cop who becomes the new partner for Lucy Bates (Betty Thomas). Lindsay Crouse plays the role. "We want to do more with women," Milch said.

A further complication for Miss Crouse's character is her availability. Milch noted that Miss Crouse, who is married to playwright David Mamet, is interested in doing theater work.

Nevertheless, dialogue of any sort about the future is a positive sign for this most acclaimed drama series. Last spring, after the dismissal of creator and executive producer Steven Bochco, "Hill Street" was on the critical list.

"I think we did OK," Milch said. "There were some doubts, but you can't let them paralyze you. You have all sorts of ambivalences and uncertainties but you keep them in a room. Sometimes at 3 in the morning, you go up, open the door and wave to them. But then you close the door and go on."

The producers effectively walked a tightrope between change and allegiance to the show's glorious past. They experimented with new storytelling methods. One show occurred entirely at night; another took Furillo and his wife back to his roots. In the riveting Furillo-gets-shot episode, the origins of the Furillo-Davenport relationship were

explored through flashbacks.

Unlike other years when Bochco frowned on publicizing plot twists, Furillo's shooting was heavily promoted. "Bochco felt 'Hill Street' worked on its unpredictability," Tartikoff said, "and if you promoted Furillo getting married or getting shot, people would not have the same sensation."

Another change this season was that "Hill Street" managed to deliver more episodes on time, cutting down on the momentum-killing reruns, often from the year before, that have plagued the series.

The producers went to a seven-day shooting schedule, rather than eight. A result was that some shots were not lit as well, Milch said. But for viewers, it was more important that they have seen just three reruns, when they ordinarily would have faced eight. Plans call for no more repeats until all original episodes run out in April.

Milch also recognizes the importance of Franz injecting new blood and new dynamics as the gum-chewing rules-bender who gets results by the book — his book.

"There had been a real danger of some characters getting too ponderous," Milch said. "We created Buntz because we couldn't bear that. He's utterly 'unreflective.'"

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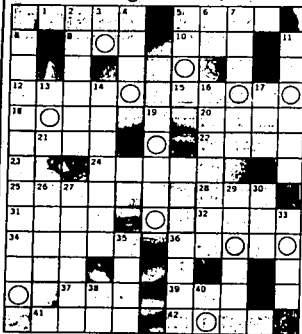

esting, fun and not at all typical. And that's what I think," said Duke.

For 3½ years, Duke has discussed diseases, remedies and preventative on his 90-second Texas Health Reports, which are featured on local evening newscasts broadcast in 26 cities.

Duke brushes off suggestions that he is abandoning his medical profession for TV glitter.

"I don't have any intention of not being a doctor," he said. "I've always wanted to be a doctor. I still want to be a doctor and I always will want to be doctor."

Duke calls himself a "loner" who prefers the backroads and mountains to television lights.

"I love to get stranded in the wild. One time I was left on an ice glacier for a week. It was one of the most important times in my life," he said.

Duke, founder and president of the Texas Bighorn Society, which reintroduced bighorn sheep to Texas and Montana, says he tries to mix his

profession and wilderness interests.

"What I think is very important is application of science and technology to the conservation of wildlife."

Duke says his group is trying to obtain a 23,000-acre ranch south of Alpine in the Davis Mountains which will be used to raise the sheep and serve as a "giant lab to deal with the issues of human invasion."

He also is the 20th president of the Boone and Crockett Club, which was started by President Theodore Roosevelt and was responsible for establishing Yellowstone National Park.

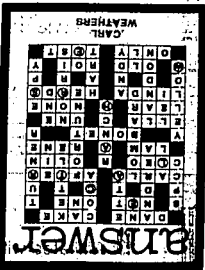
Houston's Hermann Hospital Life Flight Operations, a helicopter paramedic program, is another Duke project. He serves as its director and is trying to drum up support to expand the program statewide.

With so many projects, Duke's life is busy but he says he enjoys the pace.

"It's fun. I have more fun working with all the projects I've done than

99 percent of the people who spend a lot of money trying to have fun," he said.

"But deep down inside, deep in my soul, I'm a surgeon," Duke added. "I'm a real cut-up in the operating room."



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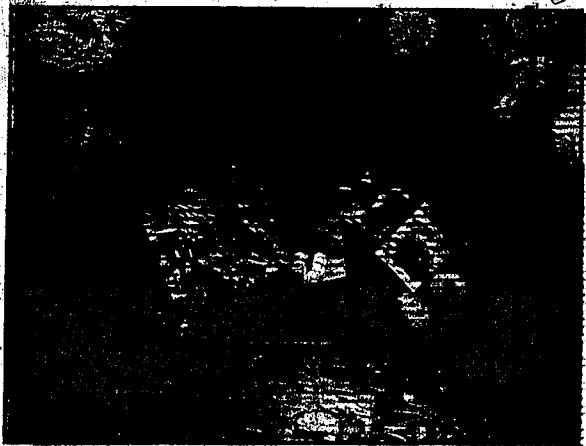
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
