Gun lobbies hail House measure's passage

WASHINGTON — The House voted overwhelmingly Thursday to weaken the gun control law passed in the aftermath of the assassinations of Robert F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr., but retained a ban on interstate handgun sales.

The vote came after hundreds of uniformed policemen roamed the Capitol as lobbyists.

The key vote was 286-136 and the House followed with a 292-130 tally to formally send the legislation to the Senate.

Representatives Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and Larry Craig, R-Idaho, both voted against the amendment to continue the ban on interstate handgun sales.

The Senate, which passed a bill last year to allow interstate handgun sales and ease other controls, can accept the House bill or insist on a House-Senate conference.

For weeks, the legislation produced high drama, climaxing with police from 21 states arriving in uniform to confront the experienced lobbying teams from the National Rifle Association and allied groups.

In the end, both sides can claim

victory on the bill sponsored by Rep. Harold L. Volkmer, D-Mo. — but the gun lobby more so.

NRA chief lobbyist Wayne LaPierre pointed to the bill's lifting of an interstate sales ban for rifles and shotguns and federal guarantees that all lawfully held weapons can be transported — if unloaded and inaccessible — across state lines.

The NRA also approves, he said, of provisions that would make it more difficult to prosecute unintentional gun law violations, allow dealers to transfer guns from inventories to their private collections, and force the government to return seized

weapons after an acquittal.

Handgun control groups and police organizations can point to the interstate sales ban, adopted by a 283-181 vote on an amendment that reversed a previous defeat on the issue, and a unanimously adopted prohibition on future possession or transfer of machine guns. Both measures were proposed by Rep. William J. Hughes, D-N.J., who championed the gun control forces' cause on the House floor.

The Volkmer bill was adopted with 128 Democratic and 158 Republican votes, while 118 Democrats and 18 Republicans were opposed.

Members of the Idaho congressional delegation say they are pleased over Thursday's House action on firearms legislation.

House approval of the legislation marks "a positive step in a long effort to reform this nation's firearm laws," said Sen. James McClure.

He doesn't like, but overall, the bill reflects "federal law enforcement away from honest law-abiding firearms owners and dealers toward those criminals who use firearms to commit crime."

Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, called passage of the bill "one of the

most satisfying legislative achievements of my first term."

"Responsible gun ownership is a right, not a crime, and it should be treated as such. A person who commits a crime while using a firearm should be punished, not law-abiding sportsmen. The passage of this legislation heralds that position," Stallings said.

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, called it "long overdue relief for America's law-abiding gun owners and sportsmen."

"It also is a rejection of the liberal idea that limiting legal gun ownership

House debates Contra package

WASHINGTON — President Reagan charged House Democratic leaders Thursday with trying to kill his \$100 million package of aid to Nicaragua and probes by delaying tactics that could endanger the lives of rebel soldiers.

Democrats, however, stuck by their proposal to link the rebel aid package to a supplemental appropriations bill that has drawn substantial opposition in Congress and would face a possible presidential veto, if passed.

The House Rules Committee made that final in a voice vote late Thursday afternoon, issuing a complicated order of battle for the floor debate which links the two pieces of legislation and provides for votes on compromise alternatives to the Reagan Contra aid plan.

"This is clearly an effort to kill our proposal by delaying tactics — tactics that could jeopardize the lives of the freedom fighters and prevent the delivery of defensive weapons necessary to protect themselves from Sandinista attacks," Reagan told 16 House Democrats in a White House meeting.

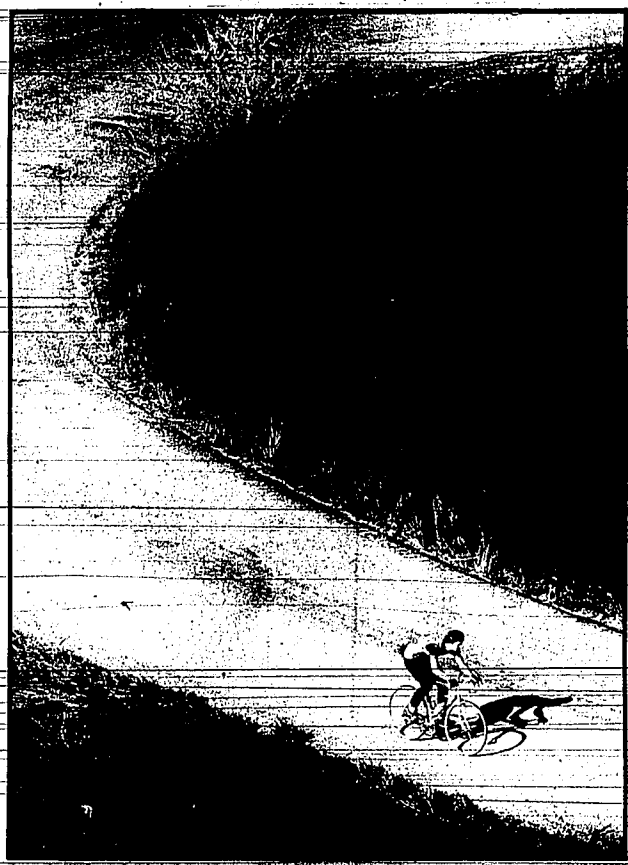
Most of the Democrats who met with Reagan opposed his aid package when it was rejected on its first outing on March 29. One of them, Lee Aspin of Wisconsin, said afterward that he was reconsidering. Another, Carroll Hubbard of Kentucky, said his mind had not been changed, but he believed a compromise version of the aid proposal would be approved.

Aspin said the procedure to be considered by the Rules Committee called for taking separate votes on the aid package and the supplemental appropriation bill in the House, but then combining them and sending them to the Senate.

"This does not satisfy the president," Speaker said. "It locks it to the supplemental if the supplemental passes."

"I think that the whole issue is

Allied commander says Libya guilty; carrier leaves port

WASHINGTON — The supreme allied commander in Europe said there is indisputable evidence that the bombing of a West Berlin nightclub can be linked to a worldwide network of terrorists set up by Libyan leader Moammar Khadafy, and said U.S. officials were already warning soldiers at nightspots in the city when the blast occurred.

"I can't tell you how we get it, but the evidence is there," U.S. Army Gen. Bernard Rogers said in a speech.

Meanwhile, the Navy sent a second aircraft carrier to sea in the Mediterranean Thursday, but sources said the Pentagon had yet to order a military strike against Libya in retaliation for recent terrorist attacks.

Should such orders be issued, however, the Navy is in position to form a two-carrier battle group that would include 16 combat ships and

more than 160 airplanes, the sources said. It would take about two days to move such a battle group to the Libyan coast, said the sources who discussed the situation only on the ground they "not be identified publicly."

Rogers' remarks came Wednesday night during a question-and-answer session after a speech at a private school in suburban Atlanta.

Rogers said U.S. officials were in the process of warning soldiers at off-duty gathering places in West Berlin when the blast occurred at the La Belle club.

"We were about 15 minutes too late," he said.

Rogers also said France's recent expulsion of two Libyan diplomats may have prevented a terrorist attack on U.S. Ambassador to France Joe Rodgers, but other U.S. officials

TRIPOLI, Libya — Col. 'Max' saves the day

One-eyed robot discourages suicide threat

DALLAS — Max, the police department's latest crimefighter, earned a B-plus on his first active duty assignment by ending a tense four-hour standoff, police officials said Thursday.

But Max won't be celebrating, he's a one-eyed robot.

The mechanical crimefighter, rolling up on roadworn tracks and shattering the front door of an apartment, convinced a 27-year-old man threatening suicide to come out and surrender Wednesday after a four-hour standoff, police said.

"We had some problems with the camera," said tactical Capt. Dwight Walker. "It came on and

then went out. But basically, Max did what we wanted him to do."

In fact, Walker said, Max went beyond the call of duty.

"We purchased him (for about \$38,000) primarily for bomb disposing," Walker said. "But we immediately saw he could do other things."

The battery-operated machine, which resembles a cross between a baseball pitching machine and a riding lawnmower, is made by Morfix in England, Walker said. Houston, Los Angeles and New York are among the police departments using the robot.

The metal-frame body includes an automatic shotgun, a speaker, a remote video camera and a water cannon capable of blowing off a door knob.

But Max does have some limitations.

"He can climb stairs, but he's got to have room to maneuver," Walker said. "There's going to be places where he can't get. Another limit is he's not wireless remote. Max's mobility is only as good as his controller."

"It's a little unusual. It's something you don't see everyday."

The man who barricaded himself in his apartment certainly hadn't.

Police decided to use Max when they were told that the man, who took his phone off the hook and didn't respond to bullhorn calls, had bobby-trapped the front door with a high-powered rifle.

White House sure of access to Philippine bases in future

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration said Thursday that despite the change of governments in the Philippines, the United States will maintain access to a number of important U.S. military bases there, even after the present lease agreement runs out in five years.

There are no good alternatives in the Western Pacific for relocating the bases, top State Department and Pentagon officials told a Senate subcommittee.

"There are no substitutes. We just don't see any," said Navy Secretary John Lehman.

The facilities, Subic Bay Naval Station and Clark Air Base, are the largest American military bases outside the United States.

The U.S. lease on the bases runs

out in 1991, and Corason Aquino, the new Philippine president, has promised to review the situation then. But she has not pledged that her government will continue the leases.

In Manila Thursday, Mrs. Aquino said she plans to ask Filipino voters to decide whether the United States should be allowed to keep the bases after 1991.

The Philippine News Agency quoted Mrs. Aquino as saying in an interview with Japanese journalists that she will call a referendum on the future of the bases after negotiating the renewal of a military treaty with the United States.

Despite her refusal to promise continued American access, the United States expects to work out

a new agreement, Gaston J. Sigur Jr., assistant secretary of state for East Asian and Pacific Affairs, told the Senate Armed Services subcommittee.

"We believe that the prospects for continued, unimpeded access to Subic and Clark are very good," he said. Sigur said his confidence was based on the strong support among the Filipino people for the American presence and also the fact that the bases are a major source of employment and foreign currency.

"In light of this widespread support and because there are no other attractive locations, we have no plans to relocate our facilities from the Philippines," he said.

Reward for Dallas raised to \$1,500

BOISE (AP) — More than \$1,500 had been deposited in a reward fund for tips leading to the arrest of escaped killer Claude Dallas, said Jodi Rupe, daughter of William Pogue, an Idaho Fish and Game officer who was killed by Dallas of 1981.

Law enforcement officers in Ada County and Humboldt County, Nev.

reported no new leads Thursday in their search for Dallas, who escaped March 30 from the Idaho State Penitentiary after cutting a hole in each of two fences surrounding the prison's administration building.

He was serving a 30-year prison sentence for the deaths of Pogue and Fish and Game Officer Conley Elms.

Sheriff's deputies had concentrated their search for Dallas in northern Nevada, where he was captured in 1982 after a 16-month search by police.

Dallas killed Pogue and Elms at his camp in Owyhee County after they went there to question him about reports of poaching.

Murder defendant shot by father

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The father of a slain teen-ager pulled a gun and opened fire during a pretrial hearing Thursday, wounding the man charged with killing his daughter, police said.

Jack Spiegelman, 47, pointed the gun into the courtroom, then fired a hollowed-out compartment, said police Inspector Manuel Barretta. He said he did not know if the book passed through courtroom metal detectors.

Spiegelman, an accountant, was booked on suspicion of armed and dangerous murder and carrying a concealed firearm. No ball had been set, Barretta said.

Killings of elderly shake Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) — Four elderly black women were slain in an Atlanta neighborhood, and a legislator who organized searches for victims of the city's child slayings five years ago said Thursday that volunteers will canvass the community for leads.

Police said they have no leads in the slayings, which are being investigated by a task force because of the similarities in the deaths over the past five weeks. The body of the fourth victim was found Wednesday.

Some residents of the neighborhood are considering arming themselves, said another state lawmaker.

Nicaragua plans treaty comment

MATAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega said Thursday his government will comment a few days on a Central American peace treaty drafted by the Contadora group, but said the only way to peace is dialogue with the United States.

Peace talks by 13 Latin American foreign ministers collapsed Monday, and Nicaragua's Central American neighbors blamed the leftist government for rejecting the proposed agreements.

The ministers of El Salvador, Costa Rica and Honduras said Nicaragua had refused to accept a June 6 deadline for signing the regional peace treaty.

Sunshine mine faces ultimatum

KELLOGG (AP) — The Sunshine Mine will cease production next Thursday unless its 400 union workers agree to a 35-percent wage and benefits reduction by 5 p.m. on Wednesday, company officials said.

In exchange for temporary cuts tied to the price of silver, workers will be granted continued operation of the nation's largest silver mine at its annual rate of 47 million ounces — provided the metal stays above \$5.

The shutdown would last until the mine can generate a sufficient rate of return to shareholders, General Manager Robert H. Peterson said Thursday.

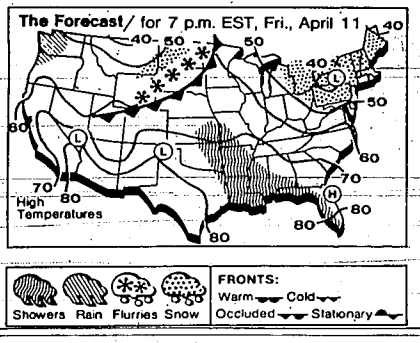

Nuclear test blast goes without hitch

Soviets react — A5

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A nuclear blast designed to test the survivability of America's space and military hardware was detonated beneath the Nevada desert Thursday after two days of protests and weather delays.

It was the ninth nuclear weapons test announced by the United States since the Soviet Union declared a unilateral test moratorium Aug. 6. Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said the test demonstrated contempt for world opinion and cast doubt on the Reagan administration's reliability in arms control.

Rep. Ed Markey, D-Mass., criticized the test, saying, "This may be one small boom in the desert, but it's a big bomb for arms control." Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., said the administration had squandered a chance for a comprehensive test-ban treaty.

U.S. officials say the tests are necessary for America to catch up with the Soviets in nuclear weapons technology.

The test, code-named *Mighty Oak*, went off without incident, said DOE spokesman Jack Campbell. It was conducted 1,300 feet underground in a tunnel honed in Rainier Mesa, 93 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

The test, less than 20 kilotons, was believed to have an explosive punch of about 1,300 tons of TNT, making it among the smaller blasts at the sprawling test site. Officials said it was designed to determine the ability of U.S. space and military hardware to survive a nuclear blast.

The test had sparked three days of protests at the Nevada Test Site, a 1,350-square mile expanse of desert and mountains. Authorities arrested 112 demonstrators.

SALT observance receives support from 52 senators

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bipartisan group of 52 senators urged President Reagan on Thursday to maintain the unratified SALT II arms control treaty, even if it means scrapping two nuclear submarines next month.

"We believe that discarding the SALT limits will endanger U.S. and NATO security by allowing the Soviets to add thousands of new warheads to their arsenal," said a letter to Reagan signed by 38 Democrats and 14 Republicans.

But "informed administration sources said" that Reagan's advisers are urging him to break through the treaty limits on long-range missiles when a new Trident II missile submarine, the USS Nevada, begins sea trials about May 20.

The president's chief option for staying within the missile limit is to dismantle two existing Poseidon submarines.

The Trident has 24 missile launchers, the Poseidon 16.

In an action not directly related, the administration conducted a nuclear test in the Nevada desert Thursday in what amounted to an emphatic rejection of a proposal by Moscow to join in a nuclear test moratorium.

Reagan said at his news conference Wednesday night that he had not made up his mind on SALT II.

Indiana AIDS victim goes back to school

KOKOMO, Ind. (AP) — Teen-age AIDS victim Ryan White returned to school Thursday after a judge threw out a temporary order barring his attendance, and some parents promptly took their children out of class in protest.

The ruling by Clinton Circuit Judge Jack R. O'Neill was the latest move in the legal battle that has kept the 14-year-old Kokomo youth out of classes all but one day of this school year.

Ryan, who contracted acquired immunodeficiency syndrome through blood treatments for hemophilia, has been barred from classes since last summer.

Parents of Ryan's classmates at the Western Middle School had obtained the temporary injunction on Feb. 21, the one day Ryan attended classes after a local health officer said he posed no threat to his classmates.

On Thursday, Ryan was whisked away from the court hearing I took to school. Asked if he

was ready to finish the school year after monitoring classes until now through a telephone link, the boy said, "Yeah, I guess."

Parents opposed to Ryan's return responded by pulling their children from classes immediately. Their attorney, David Russell, described his clients as "angry and frustrated" and said they would appeal O'Neill's ruling.

Western Middle School Principal Ron Colby said about 27 of the school's 364 pupils were taken home by their parents after it was announced Ryan would return to classes.

Ryan's mother, Jeanne White, said at least 15 pupils were in the school office waiting to be picked up by their parents when she brought her son to school.

"They're very cordial," Mrs. White said of the other parents. "These parents have fought hard but like I've fought hard I understand their concerns."

Judge clears Amy Carter

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — Amy Carter and 13 other college students were cleared Thursday of trespassing charges for a sit-in at a local IBM office to protest the company's business dealings in South Africa.

District Judge Francis R. Darigan allowed the students' innocent pleas to remain in effect and placed their cases "on file" for one year, after which their records would be erased if they remain in good standing with the law.

The students, 13 from Brown Uni-

versity and one from the University of Rhode Island, said they were willing to have their cases go to trial to prove their March 19 protest was legitimate and justified.

The students were charged with willful trespass, a misdemeanor, when they refused to leave the company's Providence offices during a half-hour protest. The students had said they would remain at the International Business Machines Corp. building until they were arrested or the company stopped doing business in the racially segregated country.

Iacocca supports stiff oil import tax

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chrysler chairman Lee Iacocca said Thursday the Reagan administration's free market approach to declining oil prices is leaving the country vulnerable to a new energy crisis and he recommended a stiff oil tax to force Americans to conserve fuel.

"Some of the people who legged oil

prices up in the '70s, I think are rigging them down in the '80s in order to give this cartel back into shape," Iacocca told the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

And when that happens, watch out," he added "because oil prices are going through the roof again."

Tax overhaul on shelf

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate, showing little enthusiasm for overhauling the federal income tax this year, declared by a 72-24 vote Thursday that the whole subject should be put aside until Congress and President Reagan agree on a new budget.

Finance Committee Chairman Bob Packwood, R-Ore., called the non-binding resolution demeaning and indicated it would not deter the panel from its efforts to write a tax bill. He accused Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, and other sponsors of the resolution of using "every dilatory tactic they can find to avoid considering the tax bill."

Symms, a member of the committee, said, "There simply is not time

to address the major issue of tax reform while we still have the budget question in the air." He has made no effort to hide his displeasure with the tax bill being developed by the panel.

Some senators, including Symms, want to delay the tax bill because they fear it might be used to raise taxes as part of the deficit-reduction effort. Others, including Sen. Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn., another sponsor of the resolution, want to keep the tax bill in reserve in case it is needed for deficit reduction.

Thirteen of the 20 Finance Committee members, including Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., voted for the resolution, as did Dole's deputy, Sen. Alan Simpson, R-Wyo.

Stamp blocks debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Defense Department is stamping out—and more—of its weapons programs "secret" to frustrate the Soviets, but critics say the trend is stifling debate on how the Pentagon spends money.

About \$2.5 billion out of a proposed fiscal year 1987 defense budget of \$24.3 billion will go for classified intelligence programs for which no explanation is given beyond briefings to senior members of Congress.

In fiscal 1981, the year before President Reagan took office, the classified military budget was \$4.6 billion out of \$18 billion in total defense.

Pentagon and congressional officials declined to estimate the cost of "black programs," which include a variety of "stealth" bombers,

fighters, helicopters, cruise missiles and other hardware under development.

The most widely publicized of them is the Advanced Technology Bomber, which will use stealth technology to hide from enemy radar.

Robbins, Richardson emerge in 2nd race

The campaign for the Republican nomination for who will be the Second District Congressional candidate to oppose Democrat Richard Stallings takes an interesting turn this weekend with a straw poll among GOP officials.

Winners-and-losers-will all try to make the best of the results. If newcomer Connie Hansen does poorly, she may be tempted to ignore the numbers and prope herself as a candidate of the "people." If Idaho Falls radio executive Mel Richardson finishes first, he can claim the "candidate-to-beat" status.

Our own guess is that dark horse Rep. Gary Robbins, an articulate legislator from Dietrich, is gaining ground among the voters and perhaps among party insiders.

Robbins has taken a populist approach to the campaign, working out of his pickup truck and visiting many small towns. He has a personable style and a no-nonsense feel for the issues to which many can relate. This week, he led a test straw vote among Twin Falls County Republicans. Richardson was second; Connie, fourth; Jerome County's Dan Adamson, a distant sixth and last.

Robbins hasn't endeared himself to some GOP regulars with his outside-the-party candidacy and his ruffled feathers last week when he said LDS Church members dominated much of the GOP party structure.

But he has gained respect for his moderate, independent positions as a legislator. He has been a strong proponent for farmers, economic development and education funding.

A race between Robbins and Richardson would give Second District Republicans two worthy opponents from which to pick.

Neither is as far right as Connie, or two other legislators running for the nomination, Rep. J.F. Chadband or Sen. Bane Watkins, who are scrapping with Connie over the remains of George Hansen's "hard corps" vote.

As for Connie, she has been careful not to say much about George's problems. Thursday, the Justice Department responded to George's request for a new trial, and if the request is denied as expected, George could be on his way to jail by the time of the May 27 primary. That can't help Connie any.

Connie has repeatedly tried to separate herself from George's conviction, but we suspect voters will see through that.

After all, Connie's name was on the Glenns Ferry bank account with her husband's; maybe she can tell us where the \$840,000 came from. It was Connie who solicited help from Dallas silver magnate Nelson Bunker Hunt in securing a Dallas bank loan, and it was Connie who defaulted on the loan, thus forcing Hunt to make it good. If this isn't being involved with George's troubles, we don't know what is.

In our view, either Robbins or Richardson would be credible candidates for the GOP in the Second Congressional District. We don't need an Imelda Marcos.

It's a tough way to come of age now

BOSTON — They are waiting for acceptance. Or for rejection.

Somewhere in an unfamiliar room in a distant town, a committee of strangers is passing judgment on these high school seniors. It's a ceremony of spring rather than the Cherry Blossom festival, or more accurately, the Boston Marathon.

Next week, the last batch of college admission letters will be in the mail and so will the answers. Yes or no. In or out. Acceptable. Unacceptable.

The seniors have gone through this jittery process the way their parents' generation went through it. It is a gauntlet they run together and separately. At 17 and 18, they are classmates and competitors.

"Getting Into College," I wrote last fall, bears all the markings of a tribal rite of passage. There are the required number of tests, ritual markings, grueling tasks for the young to perform.

They must go through the interviews and applications, the SATs and achievement tests, the endless questions from adults: Where do you want to go? At the end, they will leave their parents and childhood for the campuses of young adulthood.

But a friend insists that the pattern is not as universal as that. There are differences for the members of our modern American tribe.

In a so-called primitive culture, he says, the point of any rite of passage is to make sure that every child makes it. The whole society foos for their success. In that so-called primitive culture, the rite of passage seals a life-long bond between

the young people as they become the adults. In our tribe, though, success is not a sure thing. We don't let everybody in. Our tribe doesn't just welcome the young; we also weed them out. One of the tests of "success" in America may be the ability to beat out others.

I find this an uncomfortable notion, not the stuff of high school memories. But there is truth in it. Every culture devises the admissions tests into adulthood that must fit its adult values. So, for many young people, "Getting Into College," especially the colleges labeled competitive, may be a fitting initiation.

The adult world is, after all, built on the shifting grounds of friendship and competition. The double message of this society and economy are to get along and get ahead. We want our children to fit in and to stand out. We rarely address the conflict between these goals.

It is common in everyday life to work with our competitors and to compete with co-workers. Even ball players are, at the same time, team players and free agents.

Some of the most awkward encounters of adult life come when a success gap opens between friends. It is a rare person who has neither apologized for nor bragged about his own

achievement. If an equally rare person who hasn't felt a distance grow when a friend was promoted out of the coffee klatch or the neighborhood. Only the sainted among us have never taken out their rulers and measured their lives against their friends, even their best friends.

This tension between friendship and competition, between team play and the star slot, runs all the way through our tribe. Every child's life includes a host of admissions committees in which we are judged against peers, friends.

The teachers who grade us on a sliding scale, the coaches who pick us out of the pack, the boy or girl who chooses us over another for love.

These acceptances that come next week by mail are not some final, or even-critical, judgment. Those of us who have been through other seasons know that. But they come at a vulnerable moment, at the edge of adulthood, when the young are just about to become full-fledged owners of their own lives.

The letters come delivering tickets that lead in a hundred different directions.

For the first time, inseparable friends opening those envelopes may feel the chill of distance. For the first time, a class of mates may really understand how our world tries to subdivide their future.

So this spring rite of passage also tests friendship against competition in the raw form of the adult world. It's one way we come of age, a hard way, in this modern tribe.

Insurance propoganda didn't go down

The so-called "insurance crisis" is really an insurance scandal. Fortunately, the Idaho Legislature did not pass the insurance company "reforms" which would have destroyed the rights and duties of victims, juries and the judicial system itself.

One of the key reasons the insurance industry has filled the magazines, television and newspapers with propoganda that "jury awards" are ruining them, is simply to brainwash potential jurors.

Plaintiffs' attorneys are not allowed to tell the jury that the defendant has insurance. What better way to get into the jury room than carry on a national media blitz which tells each and every juror how to vote?

The insurance company tactics are as subtle as a machine gun and the effect of this propoganda is not being lost on those of us responsible for representing injured people.

In case someone out there believes the insurance companies, let me provide a few hard facts about the insurance scandal:

1. "The property and casualty industry today is in a stronger capital and surplus position than it has ever been in." (National Underwriter, Nov. 8, 1985.)

2. "The industry's fourth quarter profits were up an incredible 881 percent over 1984." (U.S. Today, Jan. 14, 1986.)

3. "In 1985, the property and casualty industry's net worth rose by \$7.5 billion. Who else can lose money and watch their net worth in-

crease?" (Source: A. M. Best Review and Preview, 1986.)

4. "The principal organ of the insurance industry, Insurance Services Offices of the National Association of Independent Insurers," 1985 — "A Critical View," Italy stated that, "the property casualty industry must accept major responsibility for its current financial condition."

Insurance carriers can cancel policies, spend the premium dollars for national television programs, magazine articles and lobbying efforts throughout the United States for one principal reason; they are the only major industry in the United States which is exempt from the federal antitrust laws.

They can quit insuring virtually everyone, blame it on the juries, and lawyers and although that is a flat lie, get away with it.

State insurance regulators do not have the inclination or the funding to investigate the insurance industry, although this year the Idaho Legislature passed a law demanding that the insurance carriers report profits and losses in the state of Idaho and thereby provide justification for their outrageous acts.

The profit and loss statements showing actual claims against Idaho businesses and residents and the amounts paid out, should prove very in-

teresting. For the 10 years ending in 1983, the insurance industry reported a profit of \$7.2 billion and paid a tax of two percent on their profits, or \$1.3 billion (Source: U.S. General Accounting Office.) Yes, indeed, they simply must cancel more policies and raise more premiums.

Fortunately, the people are fighting back. The Coalition for Consumer Justice, speaking for some 35 million Americans, has launched an attack on the insurance industry. The insurers have had it their own way for many years, setting doctors, lawyers, and business proprietors at the throats of lawyers and juries, at the same time picking the pockets of the American consumers.

Most older Americans remember that during and after the Great Depression, the big winners were the insurance companies.

Finally, if you really think that "big jury awards" are forcing up premiums, take a look at the cold, hard statistics about earnings and assets. Yes, it would be a great pity if the insurance industry's profits for 1986 were not up an additional 800 percent!

That surely does justify depriving innocent victims of their right to just compensation for their injuries. In 1985, the Idaho Legislature did not swallow the insurance company propoganda, and hopefully, the Idaho people they represent won't either.

Producers can't set prices

I write this letter in response to the National Cattlemen's Association suing of the USDA. Instead of suing the USDA, why not sue the federal government for continuing to let cattle be imported into the United States duty free? Our cattle numbers are at a 23-year low and we are receiving poverty level prices.

According to a national marketing publication the "whole herd buyout" program is expected to involve \$20,000 to \$100 million head. This figure represents only a two percent increase in total slaughter. We are currently seven percent below last year's total federal inspected slaughter in the country.

If the participating total head count reaches 1.5 million, we are still below last year's 1.5 million.

The cattle involved are of hamburger quality, so why does this affect the choice beef market? The answer is psychology.

Marketing is 60 percent psychology.

The "herd buyout" program gives the trade a convenient excuse to drop the price. The trade is conditioning producers to accept less for their product.

The ideal of spreading the "herd buyout"

program over 18 months just gives the trade two weeks ago, March 30, The Times-News published an article stating beef prices in the supermarket were going to increase dramatically. This sounds like conditioning of the consumer!

As long as producers (farmers and ranchers) continue to use the old marketing system, they are never going to receive above poverty level prices. The trade developed its system for its own benefit. It was designed to make a profit for everyone in the food chain except the producer.

I can't depict the trade as something evil and sinister when their very existence is the result of producers' inability to price their production. Producers have to get together and put a price on their production. And this is only possible through collective bargaining.

Collective bargaining is a tool. It should be practiced and used. Blocking production together and moving it into the market place in an orderly fashion will move prices up. Giving the trade what they want, when they want it, and in sufficient volume will command a higher price.

Producers make their commodities more

valuable because the trade will only have to make one phone call to get needed production. And when the trade does the calling, the first thing they ask is, how much do you have, and what will it cost me?

Libyan 'killer' passed border

BERLIN (AP) — A Libyan wanted by police was allowed to pass into West Berlin a few days before terrorists bombed a nightclub popular with American soldiers, a high-ranking security official said Thursday.

He said police belatedly discovered after the Libyan returned to East Berlin, before the bombing, that there was an outstanding arrest warrant for him in West Germany.

The man was traveling with a Libyan diplomat who is suspected of involvement in the bombing, the source said, and the diplomat was turned back because of an invalid passport.

The Hamburg newspaper, Bild, quoted security sources it did not name as saying the man who passed through was a "killer commando" for the Libyan leader Muammar al-Khaddafi and was wanted for attempted murder.

Although the security official would not describe the arrest warrant for the Libyan, he confirmed other elements in the Bild report: A U.S. Army sergeant and a Turkish woman were killed in the bombing early last Saturday at the La Belle discotheque and 230 people were wounded, 64 of them Americans.

The security official, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said West Berlin police carried out a spot check of two Libyans seeking to enter the western sector from the East a few days before the bombing.

He said Elamin Abdullah Elamin, who is assigned to the Libyan Embassy in East Berlin, capital of communist East Germany, was refused entry because his passport was invalid.

A West Berlin Interior Ministry spokesman last Saturday at the Elamin was suspected of directing the disco bombing, but not of planting the bomb.

World

Soviets brand U.S. testing 'criminal'

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet commentators on Thursday denounced a U.S. underground nuclear test, saying Washington had failed the test of world-responsibility and denigrated "criminal contempt" for calls for disarmament.

There was no immediate announcement on whether the Soviet

Union planned to resume its nuclear testing program.

Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev announced last month that the unilateral eight-month Soviet testing moratorium, which expired March 21, was "knowledgeable" as long as the United States refrained from further tests. But it was testing continued, Gorbachev said.

The Soviets would have to resume their program.

The latest test and the United States' refusal to hold a special summit on nuclear test bans "can be seen as the U.S. crossing of the clear-red-line," which "attests not to the present administration's respect for its moral and political weakness," Tass said.

Briefly

Weinberger: Summit is doubtful

CANBERRA, Australia (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger on Thursday accused the Soviet Union of arms control "posturing" and said this indicated the Kremlin was not serious about negotiating major weapons reductions.

Weinberger also played down Australia's refusal to allow U.S. research for a space-based missile defense system, saying it was "absolutely all right" for the United States if its allies don't take part in the Strategic Defense Initiative, commonly known as "Star Wars."

The defense secretary, in a broadcast interview, said recent Soviet actions suggest the Kremlin is not serious about negotiations for arms control or holding another summit between President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev.

Floods ravage Brazilian homes

RIO — DE — JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — Tropical rainstorms have flooded the homes of 121,000 people in the northeastern states of Maranhao and Ceara, officials said Thursday.

Francisco Albuquerque of the Maranhao Interior Department said by telephone that heavy rainfall since late February had driven at least 81,000 people from their homes and overflowing rivers had blocked roads and bridges.

In neighboring Ceara, Ines Prata of the state Interior Department said by telephone that about 40,000 people were homeless.

Moscow cracks down on drugs

MOSCOW (AP) — Moscow authorities have ordered a city-wide program to combat drug addiction in what is believed to be the first such effort in the Soviet Union, a newspaper reported Thursday.

The report in the daily Moskovskaya Pravda indicated that the Soviet capital and possibly other parts of the country have a problem that usually is presented here as a phenomenon of capitalist societies.

The Communist Party committee governing Moscow reprimanded city agencies for past mistakes and ordered them to track down drug addicts, the newspaper reported.

Rich English woman kidnapped

DUBLIN, Ireland (AP) — Masked men kidnapped Jennifer Guinness, a member of one of Europe's richest families, from her cliff-top mansion, and are demanding millions in ransom, police said Thursday.

Police Superintendent Frank Harbin said Mrs. Guinness, whose husband is a distant cousin of the Guinness brewery family, pleaded with the three kidnapers not to take her daughter and they left the young woman behind, bound hand and foot.

Authorities threw up roadblocks, launched a massive search in the Irish Republic and informed police across the border in Northern Ireland. Forty-five detectives, supported by hundreds of uniformed police, were assigned to the hunt.

Whites sit in boycotted classes

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The only two whites attending a black medical school sat alone Thursday in classes boycotted by the other 1,078 students, who do not want them there.

"All of the other undergraduates are not attending in protest," said Vivienne Martin, spokeswoman for the Medical University of Southern Africa, the only medical school in South Africa established specifically for blacks.

She said most were staying in their dormitories.

Aquino plans vote on bases


MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corazon Aquino said Thursday she plans to ask Filipino voters to decide whether the United States should be allowed to keep its two biggest foreign military bases in the Philippines after 1991.

The Philippine News Agency quoted Mrs. Aquino as saying in an interview with Japanese journalists that she will call a referendum on the future of the bases after negotiating the renewal of a military treaty with the United States, the agency said.

Mrs. Aquino has pledged to honor the treaty setting the terms for the presence of Clark Air Base, Subic Bay Naval Base and six smaller U.S. installations until 1991.

She did not say when negotiation on the treaty would begin. Mrs. Aquino's statements to the Japanese reporters also were reported by state-run television and were confirmed by the journalists.

Vietnamese return bodies of 21 MIAs

HANOI, Vietnam (AP) — Twenty-one caskets containing what are believed to be the remains of American soldiers missing in the Vietnam War were loaded into a U.S. cargo plane Thursday and flown to Hawaii.

Uniformed U.S. soldiers saluted as the aluminum caskets were placed in a C-141 plane at Hanoi's Noi Bai International Airport. A U.S. flag, folded into a triangle, lay atop each casket.

The Vietnamese also handed over 18 identification tags and a small stack of identification cards of U.S. soldiers missing in action, officials said. Most of the tags and cards belonged with the 21 sets of remains.

Hanoi also provided unspecified documents on three other soldiers missing in action.

The United States, in turn, gave back two sets of remains and a portion of a group of 24 remains handed over by the Vietnamese last August. The two sets turned out not to be those of U.S. soldiers missing in action.

It was the fourth exchange since March 1985, if the U.S. Army laboratory in Honolulu identifies the 21 sets as those of U.S. soldiers. It would bring to 56 the total number of Americans whose remains have been sent home in the past year.

The U.S. Defense Department has listed 1,792 U.S. soldiers and civilians as missing in Vietnam.

Smith brothers weave violent trail to Yuma

YUMA, Ariz. (AP) — Heavily armed police searched junkyards and abandoned vehicles Thursday for a man who fled from a bus depot where his older brother and a police officer died in a shootout, authorities said.

Edward Neil Smith wanted in three states, fled on foot after his brother, Donald, 30, and Officer Gary Maas died in the exchange of gunfire late Wednesday, said Officer John Jung of the Yuma Police Department.

Yuma police initially said the Smiths were twins, but Texas authorities said Edward Smith was a year younger than Donald.

The brothers were raised in the Dallas area, officials there said.

At the depot, Maas, 28, approached two men later identified as

Donald and Edward Smith, and returned fire when the two fired on him, Jung said.

In Spokane, Wash., police Detective Lt. Gary Johnson said the brothers were sought for questioning in the robbery of a retired couple and of a supermarket.

In Cascade, Idaho, Valley County Sheriff M. Blair Shephard said the brothers were sought for questioning in the death of a 29-year-old airman who was found fatally shot in a car-stolen from the Spokane couple.

Investigators believe Mark Eugene Patterson, whose body was found Tuesday by passers-by, was shot after he stopped to help at what he thought was an accident.

Symms, Stallings stress loans

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho farmers still face a "credit crunch" that must be resolved so they can get operating loans for spring planting, says Sen. Steve Symms.

And Rep. Richard Stallings said any reports or claims that there are no problems this spring with farm operating loans "is just ludicrous. From what I hear from my own constituents, that claim is only inaccurate, but it is irresponsible."

Symms on Wednesday joined Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole in sponsoring a resolution asking Farm Credit System lenders to take all possible steps to assist borrowers facing financial difficulties.

Symms said the proposal would establish a policy that institutions would resort to foreclosure only if the benefits from doing so exceeded the cost of making concessions in restructuring the loan.

On Thursday, Symms cosponsored an amendment to a budget resolution, designed to modify the federal government's dairy cow buy-out, to stabilize cattle prices.

Stallings said he was concerned about federal delays in adopting rules defining "family farm," as it applies to emergency disaster loans.

The federal Farmers Home Administration wants to disqualify farms grossing over \$500,000 per year from the loans, Stallings said.

Based on testimony at a hearing, Stallings said he's considering legislation to remove the "family farm" requirement for participation in the emergency disaster loan program.

New Hansen trial under fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal prosecutors have asked U.S. District Judge Joyce Hens Green to dismiss a request by former Rep. George V. Hansen for a new trial in his 1984 felony conviction for filing false financial disclosure statements with Congress.

Hansen, sentenced by Green to serve five to 15 months in prison after being convicted by a jury, cited "new evidence" in asking for a new trial on March 24, the day Green was to tell him when he would have to surrender to authorities to begin serving his term.

The Idaho Republican also asked that his sentence be reduced, which also is opposed by the government.

In papers filed with Green to meet a Thursday deadline for motions on the Hansen request, Justice

Department attorneys Reid H. Wengarten and James M. Cole say Hansen was informed by House officials that he had to disclose liabilities he transferred to his wife's name, although Hansen had argued that he had been advised otherwise.

"Simply stated, the defendant's newly-discovered evidence puts the lie to part of his defense, namely, that the Ethics Committee acquiesced in his decision not to report transactions in his wife's name," the government wrote.

"The evidence now proffered by the defendant reveals that, to the contrary, the committee disapproved of the defendant's decision and so advised him, in clear, unambiguous terms," the prosecutors said. "This evidence, had it been before the jury, doubtless would have reinforced the government's evidence that the defendant fraudulently failed to disclose transactions on his EIGA (Ethics in Government Act) forms that were placed in his wife's name after his correspondence with the Ethics Committee in 1978."

A federal jury here convicted Hansen, 54, in April 1984 of failing to record \$25,000 in profits and loans including transactions involving Texas financier Nelson Hunter Hunt — on financial reports to the House as required under the 1978 Ethics in Government Act.

Man charged in store scare

BOISE (AP) — The U.S. Justice Department says a 24-year-old Idaho Falls man has been indicted by a federal grand jury on a charge that he telephoned a television station with a threat that jars of peanut butter had been poisoned in two Idaho Falls stores.

John Scott Wilson, who is serving up to 10 years at the Idaho State Penitentiary, was named in a grand jury indictment disclosed Thursday.

Maurice Ellsworth, U.S. attorney for Idaho, said Wilson is charged with calling Idaho Falls television station KIFI on March 21-22 with a threat that jars of Skippy peanut butter had been poisoned in local Safeway and Albertson's stores.

No tainted jars were found.

Schools chief seeks a 3rd term

Jones livestock feedlot prepares for closing

EDEN — The last cycle of cattle now is putting on pounds at one of the Magic Valley's largest and most prominent feedlots.

Jones Land and Feed Yard Co. will close its livestock feeding business late this spring, when 9,000 cattle now being fattened are taken to the slaughterhouse, family members said.

The company will continue its farming operations, which grow potatoes, barley and hay on 600 acres of ground near Eden and Hazelton, said Calvin Jones, farms manager.

The diversified company, which is owned

by the family of Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones, was established by Henry C. Jones almost half a century ago. In that time Henry Jones, now 78, has built the cattle operations into one of the 10 biggest feeding operations in Idaho.

"It just looked like this was an appropriate time to get out of the feedlot business," said Jim Jones, who owns a 20 percent share of the company.

"When you're not making any money and you haven't got quite some time — and in fact have been losing it — due to the roller coaster of the marketplace — I think you finally just decide the time has come to cut the losses," he said.

The Interstate Production Credit Association also had decided not to fund the feeding

business, making it more difficult to continue the operation, Calvin Jones said. "We haven't got the finances to go with cattle," he said.

The family will attempt to lease or sell the feedlot, which is located west of Eden, he said.

The feedlot is one of the 10 biggest operations in the state, sources estimate. It also has been an important outlet for close to 300 farmers producing hay and grain in the Magic Valley. The feedlot consumed tens of thousands of tons of feed yearly.

"Everybody around here sells him (Henry Jones) something," said John Okelberry, a Hazleton area farmer who marketed hay and other crops to the company.

Jones also has a reputation for buying

locally and for dealing straight, he said.

"He always paid top price, whenever he bought," Okelberry said. "If you (were) selling him barley at a price and the price went up after he bought yours, he'd pay you the new price — the high price — for the barley he already bought from you."

Livestock sale yards, local businesses and truckers also will be affected.

"It will probably affect 5 percent of my business," said Roger Wagner, manager of Wagner Transportation Co. in Twin Falls. But many times, it also provided the profitable 5 percent — back-hauling cattle with what might have been an empty truck, he said.

Bob Ohlenschelen, Jerome County agricultural extension agent, said the loss of

the cattle business will be felt. But it also may have been the wisest step for Henry Jones, who has survived many up-and-down cycles.

"In a diversified operation like that, what you have to do is evaluate each of the enterprises, and to stay in business, you have to eliminate the losers and, quite honestly, the cattle business is a loser the way things are currently," Ohlenschelen said.

Even while looking forward to liquidating the remaining herd, Calvin Jones had a word of marketing advice for his farmer friends: "One thing I would like to see some of these guys do is go to a three-string sale of hay, so they can ship them," he said.

Henry Jones could not be contacted for comment.

Incumbents react to CAPI targeting

TWIN FALLS — Local Republican incumbents singled out by a group of Twin Falls business and public leaders for defeat in the May 27 primary election say the activities of Citizens for a Progressive Idaho (CAPI), are politics as usual and don't worry them much.

Aurora Capital Corp. President Marc Peperzak, a spokesman for CAPI, said Rep. Donna Scott, R-Twin Falls, is a target for defeat by the group because of her vote to freeze College of Southern Idaho funding at last year's level and because of her failure to work for more education spending.

"Bottom line, the voter chooses whom they wish to represent their views. If they don't like what I've done, then run against me and beat me," Scott said.

She said that since she has been home from the Legislature, she has heard support for her "realistic approach." "I was sent there to use taxpayers' dollars effectively," she said.

The group's makeup, which includes education, business, media, legal and political leaders, does not give her pause, she said. "They are citizens and they are voters... I see nothing wrong with it."

But Scott said College of Southern Idaho President Gerald Meyerhofer and Twin Falls School District Superintendent Carl Snow, both of whom are involved with the group, may have to work with her next year if she survives her primary challenge from Ron Black, a self-described moderate who has criticized her votes on day-care, licensing and education funding.

Scott said the involvement of Twin

Falls Times-News Managing Editor Stephen Hartgen in CAPI may not help the group's effectiveness.

"When he comes from the state of Maine and says 'we think' and tells us what a bunch of damn dummies we are... he is not 'we,' and people are getting tired of it."

Scott was referring to the personal pronoun "we" used in Times-News editorials to indicate the opinion expressed is that of the paper's editorial board. Hartgen is a native of the state of Maine and writes most of the editorials for the editorial board.

Scott said the charge that her voting record has not encouraged business growth in Idaho will bounce off her. "I run pro business and I sure as heck wish they'd look at that," she said.

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, who is also targeted for removal by CAPI-backed candidates, said he isn't worried about the group and doubts it will be able to find six candidates to run. "I doubt they are going to find six people crazy enough to take the job, it is too much work and not enough money," Anderson said.

He said CAPI has lumped together incumbents who are not similar. "They are trying to lump people together as if there is some sort of homogeneous Magic Valley coalition, it doesn't make any sense."

He said the group's emphasis on eliminating legislators it finds not to be progressive doesn't apply to him. "I authored the only progressive tax reform bill to get out of the Senate this year," he said. Anderson worked with a number of other young senators this year on a local option tax bill that passed the Senate and got shot down in the House.

Tax support for library up for vote

Without Hansen woman's efforts, library wouldn't exist

HANSEN — Hansen-area residents will vote June 10 on whether to form a taxing district to support the Hansen Library.

If the taxing district isn't formed, "We're afraid we won't have a library," Librarian Donna Egeler said.

The finances of the 18-year-old library are such that Frances Harris, the woman who established the library in her house, again is helping to financially support the facility.

A public hearing on the proposed taxing district was held Wednesday in the offices of the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners. No one opposed the idea and an election on the proposal was tentatively scheduled in June.

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman told

members of the library board. "This shows you are progressive when you can do this for yourselves."

The proposed district will use the same boundaries as the Hansen School District.

If the taxing district is approved, the commissioners will appoint a board of trustees to determine the budget of the library, Egeler said. Based on the budget, a levy will be set on property taxes collected to support the library, she said.

The anticipated 1987 budget of the library would be \$5,400 to permit reasonable expansion, Harris reported. Minus Harris' rent — or donations as she calls it — for the apartment at the library, about \$1,000, will have to be collected by taxes.

According to the county auditor's office, the library district is estimated to increase tax

by 58 cents for every \$10,000 in market value of property, Harris said.

Board member Elmo Farrar said, "It's such a small amount for the good it does."

"So far we've been supported," Egeler added. "Particularly when we show it's (a library district) not that expensive."

The present board of the library, located on Maple Avenue, had decided that a taxing district was the only way to keep the library open because it lost its other funding.

The city of Hansen, for years had provided about \$4,000 annually from its general fund and revenue sharing. Because of financial restrictions, the City Council voted to provide only \$1,500 from revenue sharing and \$100 from its general fund in fiscal year 1985.

Harris, who resides in the house containing the library, added the library by paying about

\$1,000 annually for the use of the building.

Denturist seeks GOP nomination

TWIN FALLS — Buhl denturist Leonard Buhl, Wednesday, will be the second Republican to seek the party's nomination for the Magic Valley Territory district seat vacated by Rep. Jeff Stoker, R-Twin Falls.

Barnes will face Jerome's legal secretary Kay Cramer, who announced her candidacy Tuesday.

"I have no great crusade, I'm not going up there to solve the world's problems," Barnes said. "I'm moderate who can work with Democrats and Republicans; that's important."

On education funding and day-care licensing, Barnes took more liberal stands than did Cramer.

He said the Idaho Legislature should have dedicated to Idaho schools all the revenues from the recently adopted sales tax increases, said Barnes.

He also said Idaho day-care centers should be licensed statewide by the Bureau of Occupational Licensing, and licensing fees should support the licensing program. Barbers, denturists, and other professions are licensed the same way and the bureau could handle the licensing of day-care centers, he said.

Day-care licensing should include checking into the backgrounds of day-care workers and inspections of day-care centers, he said.

Cramer said Tuesday she favored locally controlled day-care licensing and would support increasing funding for schools to up-date math and science curriculum.

The House Education Committee, as well as the Agricultural Affairs and Health and Welfare committees, would be choice assignments for him if he is elected, said Barnes.

The 52-year-old denturist said living in Buhl will be an advantage to him if he is elected to represent the eight-county frontier district from Fairfield and Ketchum through Dietrich and Shoshone to Twin Falls. "I think I can communicate with the

people very nicely... there's more to the Magic Valley, than just Twin Falls," he said.

Born in Crossville, Tenn., in 1933, Barnes moved to Idaho in 1945 with his family and finished high school in Boise. He moved to Twin Falls in 1955 and has lived on a small ranch north of town.

Voters may remember his involvement in the 1982 initiative to allow denturists to practice their trade directly with clients instead of having to work through dentists.

Barnes said he caught the political bug during that experience and has wanted to serve in the Legislature since. When Stoker stepped down, he decided to run.

"I would love to be in the debate up there; I believe we need a moderate representative up there," he said.

Barnes was an unsuccessful candidate in last summer's Republican Party poll to choose a successor to former state representative Lawrence Kaligae.

He said Statehouse politics have been too partisan in recent years and Republicans need to work better

Tri-county rodeo coordination gets under way

committee, brainstormed the idea some three years ago. Since then, representatives of the three counties have been drafting and redrafting a plan they now believe will benefit the counties, as well as rodeo fans and contestants.

Meeting in Jerome Wednesday night, committee members who represent fair boards in the three counties approved a logo and launched what she said are the initial steps for putting the

tri-county system into operation in August.

Shannon Barnes, executive secretary of the Jerome County Fair Board and Mini Three secretary, said activation of the proposal has been waiting a sponsor. This year, Commercial Tire Co. undertook that role, and is backing the program with a sponsorship fund of \$5,000.

Once the plan is proven, the committee will apply for a state tourism grant to help continue it.

Other local sponsorship also will be solicited.

Osborne said the plan calls for

coordinating rodeos in the three communities on a time frame that will bring top Professional Rodeo Cowboy Association performers to the area for all three shows. The PRCA cowboys will be able to stay in one area and easily travel to the three counties for competition.

Leading off the introduction of the program will be the Jerome County Fair and Rodeo Aug. 11-13, followed by the Cassia and Gooding events during the next three days.

Southern Idaho and Police Officers Standards Training academy in Boise.

Edwards worked with his father, Clover Edwards, who was Twin Falls County coroner and owner of the local ambulance service for a number of years. Calvin Edwards served as deputy county coroner for 12 years and also owned the ambulance service for a time.

"I am running for Twin Falls County coroner because it is a very important position in the county and it is vital that the coroner have the qualifications, education and experience to act in that capacity when called upon to do so," Edwards said.

"The coroner has the responsibility of determining death when no physician is in attendance. The coroner investigates all accidental deaths, homicides and suicides, conducts inquests and makes summons for autopsies and acts for the

sheriff if the sheriff is unavailable."

Edwards said the coroner, although paid only \$200 a month as a part-time worker, must have a broad medical background and training as well as law enforcement training and experience.

Edwards had been a city police officer until recently, requesting assignment to the Fire Department under the cross-trained Public Safety Officer program in Twin Falls.

He said his qualifications also include an associate degree in mobile intensive care plus medicine, and a bachelor's degree in business administration. He said he has an upper-division degree in health.

"I am not over-qualified for the position of coroner," he said. "I am just a qualified candidate with a desire to serve the community in an elective position which I consider to be very important."

\$200 a month rent so the facility will remain open. Its \$4,000 budget. When the library first was founded in 1975, she made similar donations until the city began providing the funds.

After the board began investigating the possibility of a taxing district last October, signatures were collected and people surveyed on their feelings about a district. No one objected so the process was continued, she added.

To aid the campaign for the taxing district, Harris wrote a series of articles for the Kimberly newspaper about the library.

Prior to the establishment of the library, Hansen had no library. Residents would use the bookmobile from

Twin Falls or the high school library, Harris said. But those were inconvenient.

So she provided room in a house she had moved to Hansen especially for the establishment of a library. She moved in the back and side of the house, partly in what was the garage.

When the library was started the community pitched in with books and furnishings. Now the 624-square-foot library contains 5,750 books, microfiche and microfilm readers, typewriters and other equipment.

In 1985, 3,661 books were checked out, which amounts to about 70 books a week, Egeler said. In addition, more than 280 books were added last year.

"We could do with more space. (But) we are pretty well equipped," Egeler added.

Harris reported that the library's contents had been appraised at \$50,900.

To Harris, the library is worth information, she said. "It provides children easy access to books and a place to spend after-school hours. For adults, there is the benefit of using the facility as a place to extend their education."

"Hansen Library, despite its small size, receives a surprising wealth of information material," ranging from government pamphlets to local newspapers, she added.

The facility also is a "repository for local history," Harris reported. "Many historical pictures and oral history tapes are on file there. I sincerely hope that if a library district is created here, Hansen taxpayers will get more than their money's worth."

Kimberly keeps gravel road

KIMBERLY — After an hour's discussion with Polk Street residents, the Kimberly City Council has decided to put gravel on Polk Street, due to a lack of funds to pave the road.

The road has been a gravel road for the past 35 years but with the damaged condition of the street, an increase of traffic and concerns that the 25 mph speed limit was not being enforced, council members discussed plans to possibly pave the street.

More than 15 Polk Street residents expressed concern that the gravel causes several problems, including dust. In the past, residents have also found gravel in the yards that had been thrown aside by the traffic. Most residents felt that leaving the road a gravel one was fine as long as the speed limit was enforced.

Police Commissioner Sterling Crothers said he would discuss the problem with Police Chief Jim Campbell but felt that patrolling the area too much might leave more dangerous areas neglected.

Residents suggested that residents living on Polk could pay \$2 more a month on their water bill to pay for any other improvements that might be needed. Residents said they had no objection to pay the extra \$2, but no plans were adopted to add the money to water bills.

Public Works Supervisor Ken Stroy suggested lowering the speed limit to 15 mph, but the council felt that if the 25 mph limit were enforced that would solve the problem.

Stroy did receive permission from the council to spend \$7,000 for 1,000 yards of gravel for use on streets and alleys in town.

The council voted to drop its suit against Campbell & Company — an Idaho after the trucking firm's owner, Bruce Campbell, filed a April 14

Green, Kratzert share opening Masters lead

AUGUSTA, Ga. (AP) — Ken Green, who out of a two-year non-winning streak, scored describes himself as "kind of a laid-back sort" and was tied at 70 with Tom Kite, "guy," and Bill Kratzert shot a under-par 68 on Thursday to tie for the opening-round lead in the 58th Masters golf tournament.

"Putting didn't for both them on a day that the Augusta-National Golf-Club course was raked by a gusty, shifting wind. "What can I say? So I made a few putts, four or five no-brainers," said Green after holing out four times from 35 to 70 feet to share the lead in the first of the year's four major tests of golfing greatness. "It was a difficult day to play," Kratzert said. "Fortunately, I putted as well as anyone can putt."

Gary Koch, who battled back from a string of three consecutive bogeys, and T.C. Chen, the slender Taiwanese who almost won the U.S. Open last year, each were a single shot off the lead at 69. Tom Watson, once the outstanding player in the game but now trying to fight his way

who four-putted from the fringe on the 16th. Ken Green, 27, who twice has lost his tour playing rights due to lack of performance, had no such problems with his putter. He simply pulled the eyes out of it. He made a 40-footer on the first hole and on the fourth, he holed from 70 feet — "your basic tap-in," he said.

He made a 50-footer on the 16th. On the 18th, he skulled a 6-iron second shot along the ground to the back of the green and then rapped in a 35-foot putt. "I'm not saying I will hold up, or I won't hold up, but I've got to start hitting the ball better," said Green, whose only victory on the pro tour came last year.

He prefaced his post-round remarks with: "I keep reading that a lot of unknowns are winning golf tournaments."

"I am not a quiet clone. I do have color." And he proceeded to prove it with a string

of one-liners that included an evaluation of his caddy, his sister, Shelley: "Doesn't have a clue about golf."

But then, neither did Kratzert's caddy. After firing his regular tour caddy on Wednesday, Kratzert pressed into service a friend from home, Chuck Hoffus, an electronics salesman from Fort Wayne, Ind.

"He kept asking me, 'OK to stand there, Bill? I'm not in anybody's way, am I?'" said Kratzert, winner of four titles in an 11-year career. Those who didn't putt well on the fast, undulating greens had more than their share of problems.

Bernhard Langer of West Germany, the defending title-holder, three-putted twice on the way to a 74. "I felt I played pretty good to get such a terrible score out of it. It was all because of my putter," he said. Jack Nicklaus, the Golden Bear, who counts five Masters titles among his record collection of 17 major championships, thumped himself on the head and made

gestures of puzzlement on the way to a 74. Johnny Miller, once golf's Golden Boy, couldn't keep a putt on the slick surface of the 12th green, and merely shook his head as the ball went in the water. He, too, was two over par at 74.

Calvin Peete, the only two-time winner on the tour this season, took a 75. So did Andy Bean.

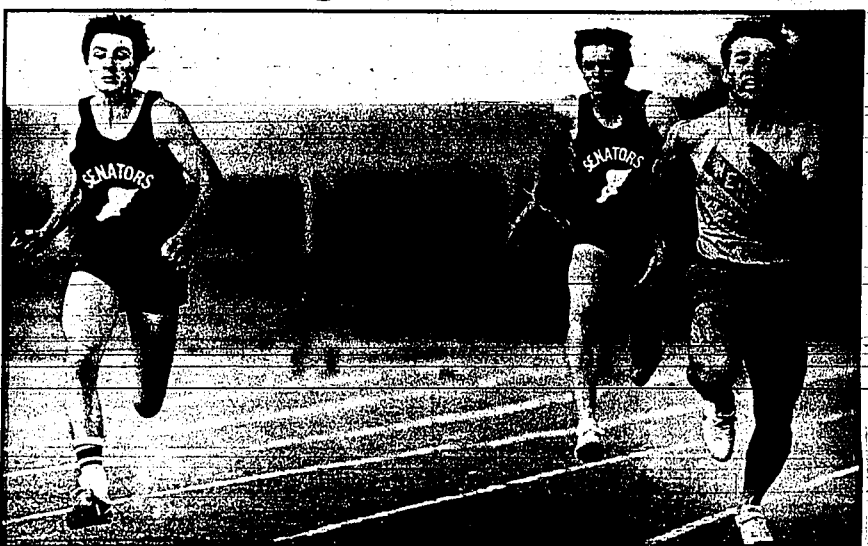
Gooding Coach Jolene Toone was part of the judging panel that disqualified the crucial sixth-place point in the 3,200-meter run.

"I'm extremely excited," Bart-

kowski said. "I feel like a rookie again. The challenge of trying to help the Rams go to the Super Bowl is really exhilarating." The 35-year-old Bartkowski was given a tryout by the Rams last week, and Coach John Robinson said afterward, "I liked what I saw," adding "I would say the position would be competitive."

Bartkowski becomes the latest in a line of veteran, "name" quarterbacks who've joined the Rams — with little success in the past.

NFL plans to take its product abroad

LONDON (AP) — The National Football League is embarking on a series of games around the world, with the first stop a return visit to London this summer. For the time being, at least, the games will involve the league's traditionally U.S.-based teams. But NFL officials would not rule out the long-term possibility of franchises in Europe and Japan.

At a news conference to promote the preseason game between the Chicago Bears and the Dallas Cowboys in Wembley Stadium Aug. 3, Joe Rhea, the NFL's director of administration, said the league wants to promote itself outside North America. "The league's long-range planning committee and the clubs both approved the concept of staging a series of games over the next several years here in Europe, in Japan," Rhea said. The game between the defending Super Bowl champion Bears and the Cowboys, nicknamed "America's Team" for their success over the last decade, is "our first step," Rhea said. "We are very interested to see how we'll do." Tex Schramm, the Cowboy's president and a member of the NFL Competition Committee, said that to talk about international franchises at present was "probably jumping too far ahead."

"I'm involved in our sport and I'm proud of it, and we think it would be great if it became a world sport, where there was a team that was England playing a team from the United States," Schramm said. "It 1983.

South won the first spade and took a winning club finesse (so he thought). He couldn't wait for more of a good thing, so he finessed again. This time East took his king and re- turned a spade, attacking South's last entry. West won, South having refused this trick in hopes of a third spade lead, but West was on his toes. West switched the attack to the red suits and the unhappy result was down two. (Has West continued with offer club, dummy would have un- locked the blocked-club-ace.)

Had West started with K-x in clubs, the second club finesse would have assured 11 tricks instead of 10. However, since the second finesse risked 830 points (830 for game and rubber plus 200 for down two) for a possible gain of 30 points, the finesse was a sorry bet.

After the club queen wins, South should continue with the jack but should rise with dummy's ace when West plays low. A third club lead would wreck East's plan, and South's club suit is ready to be run while South still has the ace of spades.

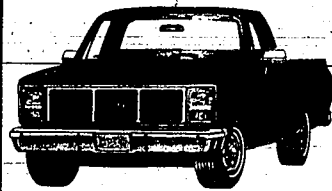

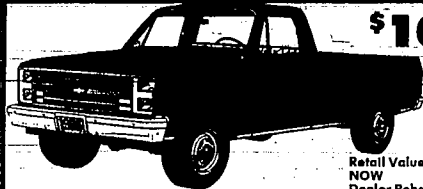

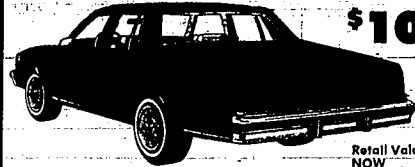

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Over 100 theme-related events will honor transportation and communications, the theme of EXPO 86, from opening day May 2 with Prince Charles and Princess Diana to closing ceremonies on Oct. 13.

Highlights of EXPO 86 include the largest assembly of tall ships on the West Coast of the Americas, a mass fly-by of 60 DC-3 aircraft and the largest assembly of operating steam locomotives and vintage rail cars since the Chicago Rail Fair of 1943.

Producer O.B. Philip says, "Each one of these events is a world class, historic occasion. It's on its own right," yet, he points out, that the special events program is only an augmentation to participants' pavilions which will demonstrate the EXPO 86 "World in Motion — World in Touch" theme.

EXPO 86 account executive Marcel Maule says there will be 54 nations represented in Vancouver, giving it the largest number of international participants ever to appear at a specialized world exposition. Though other expositions have been larger — The New York World's Fair in 1964 had 62 international participants, and EXPO 87 in Montreal sported 70 — the recent trend has been toward more streamlined events like those held in Spokane, Wash., 1974, and in Knoxville, Tenn., in 1982, with some 20 countries represented.

In addition to participants' pavilions, EXPO 86 will include a three-part program composed of specialized periods, special events and ceremonial events. The

specialized periods portion will feature five-day to two-week-long time frames in which participants will display, either on- or off-site, ways in which they are meeting the challenge of transportation and communications today.

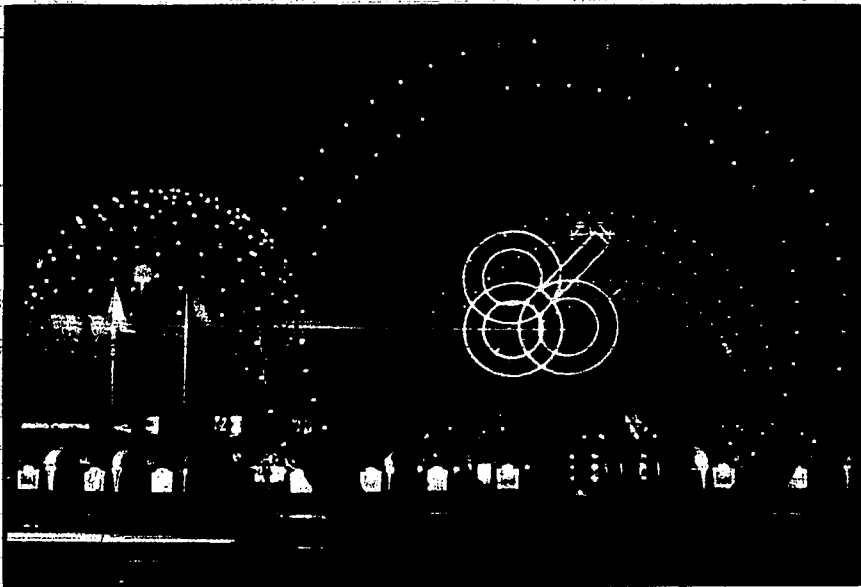
Included on the roster are Polar Transportation and Communications; May 5-11; Aviation; Aug. 1-10; and Modern Rail, Sept. 29-Oct. 5.

Special events, or theme events, fall into two categories: ongoing events which include the Royal Canadian Mounted Police Musical Ride and the Canton Motor Cycle Thrill Team and special events that take place over a week to 10 days. Among the latter are SteamExpo, May 23-25, celebrating the era of steam rail; the DC-3 Alrmada, June 7; the Vintage International Antique Auto Show, July 6-19; and the Tall Ships Assembly, July 18-21, all of which salute transportation's heritage.

Another, the Abbotsford International Airshow, Aug. 8-10, ranges from pioneering biplanes to the leading-edge J.V.X. tilt-rotor vertical take-off aircraft. New transportation technologies will also be exhibited in the Innovative Vehicle Design Competition, July 11-18, featuring designs from many nations.

Ceremonial events will consist of opening and closing day celebrations as well as formal ceremonies held in the Plaza of Nations on each national and special day set aside to honor a particular international, provincial, territorial, state or corporate participant.

More important as a drawing card than the three-part program, however, will be the pavilions. "All our research shows that the number

one attraction for most visitors at world expositions is the international pavilions," says EXPO 86 president Jim Pattison.

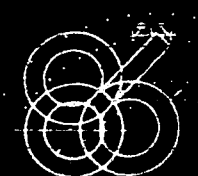
"When we first started planning EXPO 86, we aimed for 70 countries. We've more than doubled that. Visitors to Vancouver can look forward to seeing national pavilions from six continents. Exposition-goers will be dazzled by what they see."

Among those Pattison describes will be the France Pavilion, showing world aviation milestones from the

Montgolfier brothers' first aerial balloon voyage in 1783 to the development of the supersonic Concorde. Japan will sport a 400-meter-long maglev track beside its pavilion, on which visitors will float a centimeter above the rails on a high speed surface transport before traveling inside to a city of tomorrow, complete with port, rail and air facilities.

Hong Kong, Pakistan and the Ivory Coast are all offering a chance to experience the present. The Ivory Coast will also exhibit.

Idaho not represented due to lack of funding

BOISE — Idaho will not be joining neighbors Oregon and Washington as exhibitors this spring and summer when EXPO 86 pulls millions of visitors through its gates.

Ray McMullen, Idaho State Travel Director with the Idaho Travel Council, puts the cost of an EXPO 86 exhibit at \$1.5 million. "We went to the legislature and they said, 'no.' We went to the private sector and found no support," McMullen says.

"We're faced with an educational process to educate people in the importance of the travel industry," McMullen adds. "Now we're getting some private and public interest, but Expo is less than a month away. We needed to make plans in the early '80s but there was no interest then. People don't plan until it's upon them. The same thing happened with Spokane (EXPO 74). There was no interest until the last minute."

"When you have the time, you don't get the support. Then, when it's urgent and you have interest, you can't do a good job. It's a catch-22 situation," McMullen says, pointing out that a quality exhibition can't be set up at the last

minute.

McMullen says that Oregon, Washington and California all received the necessary \$1.5 million from their general funds to set up exhibits. "We get no support from the general fund," he says, adding, "Revenue from tourism makes up the third largest industry in the state."

In Idaho there are 25,000 people employed in tourism," he says, explaining that makes tourism the largest employer in Idaho. McMullen says that tourism generates \$1 billion a year in Idaho, yet, the Idaho Travel Council's only source of funding is "the approximately \$15 million a year that comes from a 2 percent lodging tax."

"The amount for an exhibit is alone — equivalent to our entire statewide program," he says, adding that of the \$1.5 million allocation, 45 percent goes to statewide promotion, 45 percent to a regional and local grant program, and 10 percent to administration.

On the positive side, McMullen says that the ITC grant program is the largest in the U.S., offering grants to non-profit organizations, including local chambers of commerce, to promote tourism. "The grants include billboard advertising

Lodging, RV parking offered near site

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Beginning May 2 an estimated 5.5 million tourists, including many Idahoans, will pour into Vancouver to view EXPO 86.

Whether traveling by air, automobile, camper, trailer, motorhome or a cruise ship via Seattle, one thing is certain — all visitors will need either shelter, or a place to park their motorized shells.

EXPO 86 account executive Marcel Maule says a great deal has been done since planning for the exposition began in 1978 to provide necessary accommodations for visitors. In addition to motels and hotels, Maule points out that back-up programs, including a guest home program and bed-and-breakfast program, are in place. For "recreational vehicles" visitors, the Park-N-Share program has

Maule says even those wishing to stay in Seattle would have little trouble reaching EXPO 86. "There are four buses every day from Seattle, as well as chartered boats and air service," she says.

Perhaps the most innovative program in place during the Expo is the

new Park-N-Share Concept, which has been busy enlisting suitable properties for RV parking throughout the entire township of Surrey, B.C., a large, sparsely populated area southeast of downtown Vancouver.

Under the program, families with property ranging from one-half to 25 acres act as host families to provide suitable hookups for water and electricity. Some offer the use of telephones, bathroom and shower facilities as well.

Marketing director Tim Deremo says that hosts will charge between \$17 and \$19 per day, depending on the services provided and for use of their property as an RV pad.

In addition to Park-N-Share pads, many commercial RV parks exist in the area. Earl Hansen, managing director of the B.C. Motel, Resorts and Travelers' Association, estimates that to percent of Expo's visitors will be pitching tents or camping out in trailers and vans. Hansen says there are nearly 5,000 campsites in the southwestern British Columbia.

Finally, the Canadian Hostelling Association also expects an influx of

visitors to the Expo site itself.

"Visitors can always stay in outlying areas," she says. "The skytrain is operating now with 15 stops in Vancouver and outlying areas. There are so many modes of transportation available that nobody has to drive to the site."

Coast, for example, will have visitors passing through immense, hand-carved doors to find themselves standing on the docks of Africa's West African largest port, fragrant with the scent of coffee and cocoa beans.

The U.S., the Soviet Union and the People's Republic of China will be in on one site. The U.S. pavilion and the Soviet Union will show their space travel technology, while China will offer contrast by recognizing its great rivers and timeless cargo routes.

Not to be outdone at their own exposition, Canada has gone all out with its numerous pavilions. As host province, British Columbia's pavilion is the largest and, perhaps, the most spectacular on site. The \$38 million glass complex covers 11 acres and includes three buildings, a 600-seat theater and the glass-covered Plaza of Nations, which is the heart of the expo site where major ceremonial events take place.

for sites, locations and attractions to get tourists off Interstate to enjoy themselves in our state," he says.

Mike Dutton, executive vice-president for the Greater Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, says the local organization, associated with Magieland Multiregional Summer Promotion, has applied for a grant totaling \$113,000, which includes \$5,000 for an EXPO 86 in Grant. Grant distributions will be decided April 23-24 by a panel appointed by Governor Evans, he says.

McMillen estimates that close to one million people will pass through Idaho because of EXPO 86. "One fortunate thing is our location geographically," he says, adding that an Idaho exhibition would have to use the route people back through Idaho. "If we had a decent advertising budget, we would advertise to bring tourists through Idaho on their way. These are all missed opportunities because we didn't have the money."

Hopefully, the grants will help in the latter part of the season or when tourists are on their way home," he adds.

Claude Richmond, minister of tourism for EXPO 86, says, "We will host the most ambitious variety season the Pacific Northwest has ever seen." Richmond says that as part of the Expo Theatre Live series, Bill Cosby, Bob Newhart, Pete Seeger, Arlo Guthrie, Julio Iglesias, Miles Davis, Joan Rivers and numerous other big-name entertainers have been scheduled for performances during the expo.

Controls on art products called for

WASHINGTON (AP) — A consumer group's crusade for federal controls on the use of potentially hazardous art materials in the classroom is running into resistance from manufacturers who say their voluntary system ensures child safety.

The U.S. Public Interest Research Group, which released a study last week on toxics substances in art supplies used in Washington, D.C., area schools, says companies should not be policing themselves when the

issue is health.

"In order to protect children, art hobbyists and professionals, the government should require comprehensive labeling regarding the hazards of art products, and should ban certain art and craft materials from schools," the study concluded.

It also said art teachers should be trained to use materials safely.

But Ed Flax, president of the Art and Craft Materials Institute in Boston, contends federal intervention would be a waste of taxpayer dollars because manufacturers are successfully regulating themselves.

"If people read the labels and purchase the materials for appropriate age groups, there is no reason not to use them," he said in an interview.

The Washington, D.C., study — similar to other PIRG studies conducted in California, Massachusetts, New York and Oregon — found that at least 47 kinds of hazardous art and craft supplies had been ordered for use by students in a metropolitan area.

The group said children were routinely exposed to rubber cements, clays, glazes, paints and dyes, some of which contain dangerous levels of hexane, toluene, lead and cadmium.

Movie rating standards reset

Stricter on films depicting drug use

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's film-makers and theater owners are instituting tougher standards for movie rating depicting drug use, but allowing raters more flexibility when a film includes sexually-related language.

The new standards, effective immediately, were announced jointly on Wednesday by the Motion Picture Association of America and the National Association of Theater Owners.

Under the new rules, a film depicting use of illegal drugs will automatically get a rating of at least PG-13, and could receive an R or X rating depending on the decision of the ratings board.

Previously, the use of illegal drugs in a film did not require an automatic restriction.

The ratings board can grant an exception, but only by unanimous vote. In contrast to the ratings board's past majority-rule policy.

The change in sexually-related language restrictions also adds a provision allowing the board, by unanimous vote, to give a film an exception.

Since 1984, the industry has automatically given a rating of PG-13 or stronger to films using what film industry officials term "the harsher sexually-derived words." Most but not one use of such words required an R rating.

The rating of PG-13 indicates that parents are strongly cautioned to give serious thought before allowing a child — of 13 or younger to attend a film.

It is considered more restrictive than the PG rating, meaning parental guidance is suggested for children, or G, which means a film is suitable for all audiences.

A rating of R means a film is restricted because of its adult nature and people aged 17 and younger must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. An X rating means no one under 17 is allowed to attend a film.

'Police Academy 3' edges out 'Money Pit'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Police Academy 3" extended its reign as the top box-office movie to its third week, earning \$5.1 million over the weekend.

The Warner Bros. movie starring Bubba Smith and Steve Guttenberg has a total gross of \$26 million, leading the pack in a lackluster weekend.

Universal's "The Money Pit," about a young couple who buy a decrepit fixer-upper home, earned \$5 million. In two weeks, "The Money Pit" starring Tom Hanks and Shelley Long, has earned \$14.1 million.

It was a long drop to the No. 3 slot where Paramount's "Gung Ho" landed with a take of \$2.9 million at 1,150 theaters. The film has reaped \$23.7 million at the box office in three weeks.

"April Fool's Day," another Paramount release, was close behind with \$2.5 million in grosses at 1,202 theaters, boosting its two-week earnings total to \$7.9 million.

Fifth place went to "The Color Purple" from Warner Bros., which switched places with Paramount's "Pretty in Pink," which was nominated for 11 Academy Awards but failed to win one, brought in \$2.2 million at 1,014 theaters and pushed its 16-week take to \$94.2 million.

"Pretty in Pink," which sold a little over \$1.9 million in tickets at 1,078 theaters, ran its six-week take to \$28.6 million.

Universal's "Out of Africa," winner of seven Oscars, including best picture and best director, collected \$1.88 million at 913 theaters over the weekend to give it a 16-week gross total of \$77.3 million.

The top 10 films were rounded out by Buena Vista's re-release of "Sleeping Beauty" with \$1.66 million; Orion's "Hannah and Her Sisters," with \$1.579 million; and Buena Vista's "Down and Out in Beverly Hills," at \$1.573 million.

Director, producer, writer for stage and screen dies

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif. (AP) — Chester Erskine, a director, producer and writer of films and Broadway shows, has died at the age of 80.

Erskine, who died Monday at the Beverly Hills Medical Center, came to Hollywood in the 1930s as an assistant director to Lewis Milestone on "Rain," the film credited with making a dramatic star of Joan Crawford.

Over the years, Erskine wrote, directed or produced "The Sailor Takes a Wife," "The Egg and I," "All My Sons," "Androcles and the Lion," "Witness to Murder" and "The Wonderful Country."

Erskine studied acting at the Academy of Dramatic Arts and toured the United States in the early 1920s with a Shakespeare company before settling in New York, where he wrote and directed sketches for vaudeville.

His first Broadway success came in 1929 when he adapted, produced and directed an all-black cast in a drama titled "Harlem," for that time an unusually realistic portrayal of life in the New York ghetto.

In 1930, he directed "The Last Mile," the Broadway prison melodrama that launched Spencer Tracy to stardom.

He remained a close friend of Tracy's and was listed as creative consultant on last month's television special devoted to Tracy and the late actor's relationship with actress Katharine Hepburn.

'Monterey Pop' videocassette better than film

"Monterey Pop" (VCR): \$59.95. This celebrated documentary by D.A. Pennebaker about the landmark 1967 rock festival lacks the crackling

tenacity and authority of "Don't Look Back." Pennebaker's earlier look at Bob Dylan on tour. But there is a vitality and cultural expanse to the music (Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, the Who, others) that remain engaging. The bonus is the excellent print, a far sharper edge than as seen in film in theaters. The reason: The program was transferred from the original negative and there is a remixed digital Dolby sound track.

"Metropolitan Opera — Centennial — Gala" (Paramount): \$79.95. The sprawling birthday concert of the Metropolitan Opera — call it a vocal super-circus — began early on Oct. 22, 1883, and ended well after midnight. A historic occasion like this deserves better documentation. (2 stars) — MARTIN BERNHEIMER

Pointless padding bound to leave viewers pleading for John Ford

John Charles Fremont. Somewhere deep in the cerebral cortex, a dim memory stirs; a name vaguely remembered from eighth-grade social studies, buried in the mists of history along with the Gadsden Purchase and the Wilmot Proviso.

But this guy Fremont was a pretty interesting character.

A firm believer in Manifest Destiny, his explorations during the 1840s helped open up the American West. He also participated in the U.S. seizure of California from Mexico. He married teen-ager Jessie Benton, against the wishes of her father, Thomas Hart Benton, who happened to be the most powerful U.S. senator at the time. In 1856, he became the first presidential candidate of the newly formed Republican Party.

Fremont was an integral part of an exciting period, the opening of the American frontier — the 19th-century version of space exploration. In fact, the first Republican candidate for president sounded a lot like the most recent Republican candidate: eternally optimistic, bound by no frontiers, his eyes focused clearly on the future.

His life is, indeed, the stuff out of which a good movie could be made.

Directed by John Ford, with someone rawnored like James Stewart as the intrepid Fremont; Olivia de Havilland to play Jessie; and a curmudgeon like Edward Arnold as Thomas Hart Benton. It would be two hours long.

But this film exists only in one's imagination. Instead, Fremont's life is told in "Dream West," a CBS miniseries that stretches across seven hours and three nights — Sunday, Monday and Tuesday.

Richard Chamberlain, in his annual miniseries spin, is cast as Fremont. Viewers may be pleased to hear Chamberlain speak in his native American accent — a relief after hearing him speaking in a British accent in "Shogun" or an Australian accent in "The Bird Birds," and the odd European accent employed in "Wallenberg."

Here, bearded and dripping buckskin, he does his standard workmanlike job, but he's too old

and too refined to be truly convincing as the youthful, rugged Fremont. The lovely and talented Alice Krige, saddled with a Southern accent that would make magnolias wilt, Jessie Stern, didactic Fritz Weaver's old man Benton.

The usual miniseries cameos abound. In a switch, Rip Torn plays a non-psychopath (he's cast as trapper Kit Carson); Ben Johnson is trapper Jim Bridger; E. Murray Abraham plays Abraham Lincoln; Rene Enriquez is a Mexican general and G.D. Spradlin again is typecast as an SOB general.

But, alas, "Dream West" suffers from terminal miniseries syndrome — there's just too much padding. In

the first two-hour episode, for instance, about 10 minutes is spent in one scene as Carson and Fremont hunt buffalo; later in the episode, we have to endure 15 minutes of a pointless Indian ceremony.

Where is John Ford when we really need him?

lean and mean as the TV character she plays.

Q. Is it true that Peter Fonda dislikes his older sister Jane, and hasn't been on speaking terms with her for years? — B.V.

A. Peter Fonda, the actor-producer, and his sister Jane may have been estranged at one point before the death of their famous actor-father, Henry (their mother was Fonda's second wife, Frances Seymour Brokaw). But the hatchet, if it existed, has long since been buried. Jane tells me she and Peter are planning to make a movie together, titled "Six White Horses." It'll be a comedy described as Shakespeare's "As You Like It" in the days of Annie Oakley.

Q. Anything to the story that Goldie Hawn has broken up with her longtime actor-boyfriend despite the fact that she's carrying his baby? — G.S.

A. I've heard that rumor before, and I don't believe it. For one thing, Goldie and Kurt Russell continue to live together on a Colorado ranch they jointly own. The baby is due July 20, and Goldie tells me she's convinced it'll be a girl. Goldie has always left open the question of marriage to Russell. Motherhood and marriage are not necessarily linked in Goldie's mind.

Q. What's this about Michael Bennett, the principal creator of Broadway's "A Chorus Line," being seriously ill and forced to take an early retirement? — J.L.

A. Bennett has a heart condition serious enough for his doctors to order protracted rest. The order came despite (or perhaps, because of) the fact that the noted director-choreographer had been working slavishly on a new musical called "Chess," conceived and composed by Tim Rice. A May opening in London was planned. But Bennett's withdrawal from the project puts things a bit up in the air. Michael tells me he's itching to get back to work. So, his current theatrical absence doesn't by any stretch mean his career has been checkmated.

Q. Someone told me that the late Donna Reed's house was broken into just after her death and her Oscar award was stolen. Is that true? — M.E.

A. Donna Reed's Oscar — as best supporting actress in 1953's "From Here to Eternity" — has not been stolen. It was found in her home in Twin Falls, Idaho.

stolen by anyone. In fact, the statuette has already been donated to a historical society in Denison, Iowa, Donna's hometown, where it will be placed on permanent display. That's exactly as the late actress wanted it. Ironically, Donna, who most often played wholesome, all-American women, won her acting award for portraying a prostitute.

Q. Neil Simon is probably the richest playwright in history, but with a rocky marital history. Who is he dating these days? — O.P.

A. Simon is indeed extraordinarily rich for a playwright. But his marital history isn't all that rocky. After a long first marriage, which ended with the death of his wife, Simon wed actress Marsha Mason. That union lasted for several years until, for reasons still not clear, she upped and left. Neil has been dating around ever since, usually with more mature, classy types. His longtime steadies of late have included two show-biz unknowns, Ann Bell and DiAnne Linder. Simon says he's playing the field.

Q. All the books and articles about the late Howard Hughes invariably link him to Hollywood leading ladies. Was Hedy Lamarr also one of the beauties he romanced? — J.N.

A. Yes, though Lamarr hasn't really gone public with details of her association with Hughes as have many of the other ladies. Hedy tells friends that Hughes bought a lovely home in California for her during the movies' Golden Era, and recalls him as being a generous, shy gentleman who could be extremely possessive. Often, he'd fly to other cities and countries on business, Hedy relates, and when there he'd phone her at odd hours, inquiring as to where she

was on the grounds, what she was wearing at that moment, and exactly what she was doing. "I'm aware of the reputation he enjoyed fostering as a great lover," she says, "but my own feeling, quite frankly, was that he really was impotent with women."

Q. We haven't seen Rodney Dangerfield in any movies recently. When will his next one come out, and what's it about? — L.N.

A. Rodney much prefers personal comedy appearances to making movies and, as he puts it, "standing around for 14 hours a day." Nonetheless, what's promised as the definitive Dangerfield flick is due this summer. It's "Back to School," with Rodney playing a clothing store tycoon who joins his son on campus. There are 11 writers involved in the script — including Rodney — which is not necessarily a good sign in Hollywood. But, my insiders assure me, Dangerfield is hilarious in this movie and is sure to finally get respect from the critics and the public alike.

Q. Has singer-actress Lainie Kazan been getting so fat that she's being turned down left and right in Hollywood these days? Does she have a medical problem? — M.H.

A. Let's just say that Lainie has made something of a career out of looking super-voluptuous. The 43-year-old actress and singer has appeared in several solid movies over the last few years, often playing someone's less-than-avette Jewish mother as in "My Favorite Year." That's almost exactly her role in her latest flick, "Delta Force," a hitjack action movie co-starring Chuck Norris and Lee Marvin. Lainie deliberately looks full-figured in the movie and she's excellent as the wife of a Jewish-American tourist (well-played by none other than comedian Joey Bishop).

Q. We hear that veteran actor Rod Steiger is quite ill. Just how serious is he? — J.L.

A. Rod has had a number of serious illnesses in his life, including open-heart surgery a few years back. But the latest reports are mystifying. They appeared in one Hollywood trade journal — although the exact nature of the supposed illness wasn't mentioned. A few days later, the report was retracted. Actually, the 59-year-old Steiger can't be in ill (that had shape as he was married to a young girl, Paula, 21, who is a child.

CNN enters black for first time

ATLANTA (AP) — Cable News Network and CNN Headline News have ended a year in the black for the first time, and analysts say the operation has a healthy future.

Turner Broadcasting System Inc. announced last week that its CNN and CNN Headline News units combined for an operating profit of \$18.8 million on revenues of \$126.5 million in 1985.

In 1984, the 24-hour news services had an operating loss of \$15.3 million on revenues of \$88.3 million.

CNN, launched in 1980, faced competition about three years ago from the Satellite News Channel, a project of ABC and the Westinghouse Electric Corp. At the time, said to CNN Executive Vice President Ed

Turner, CNN was about to gain financial stability.

Turner Broadcasting weathered that storm by buying out Satellite News for \$25 million and taking it off the air, but the battle cost more than \$100 million.

"With that episode behind us, there has been a sense of moving full speed ahead," said Turner, who is not related to Turner Broadcasting Chairman Ted Turner.

When Ted Turner was trying to raise money last year for his acquisition of MGMUA Entertainment Co., he considered selling a portion of CNN. Potential buyers included NBC, Time Inc. and Gannett Co.

Turner Broadcasting rejected a \$250 million offer for 51 percent of

CNN from NBC because Ted Turner refused to relinquish editorial control and because he believed the offer was too low.

Turner Broadcasting had said CNN was worth at least \$600 million.

CNN, with 18 bureaus around the world, is continuing to grow. It opened new bureaus last year in Nairobi, Frankfurt and New Delhi, and Ed Turner said plans call for new bureaus in Paris and Peking by early 1987.

The company said CNN advertising revenues increased from \$45.8 million in 1984 to \$56.5 million in 1985, while advertising revenues for CNN Headline News climbed from \$5.4 million in 1984 to \$13.7 million in 1985.

Brokaw's newscast joins the rest of NBC's lineup, finishes at top

NEW YORK — NBC won the prime-time ratings last week, which was no surprise, but the "NBC Nightly News" tied the "CBS Evening News," marking its best finish in more than four years.

A.C. Nielsen Co. figures, released Tuesday, showed that both Dan Rather's newscast on CBS and Tom Brokaw's broadcast on NBC each averaged an 11.8 rating for the week of March 31-April 6. Peter Jennings' "World News Tonight" on ABC had a 10.9 rating.

The last time "NBC Nightly News" tied the "CBS Evening News" was a week in February 1982 when both broadcasts had a 13.4 rating.

The three regular anchors were on their newscasts last week, but network researchers said that the "CBS Evening News" rating probably was deflated slightly because it was pre-empted on the West Coast by CBS' live broadcast of the NCAA basketball finals March 31.

In prime time, NBC had five comedies in the Top 10, but almost was overtaken by CBS' blockbuster Sunday lineup—that included the network's three Top 10 programs: "Murder, She Wrote," "60 Minutes" and "Nobody's Child," the critically praised — movie — starring Mario Thomas.

For the four hours of prime-time programming on Sunday, CBS averaged a 25.0 rating to ABC's 14.0 and NBC's 13.3. A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Overall, NBC's "The Cosby Show" ranked first for the week with a 34.3 rating, NBC's "Family Ties" was second with a 31.8 rating and "Murder, She Wrote" and "Nobody's Child" tied for third with a 25.7. Next came NBC's "Cheers" and "60 Minutes," followed by ABC's "Who's the Boss?," NBC's "Night Court," ABC's "Perfect Strangers" and NBC's "Golden Girls."

CBS' broadcast of Louisville's victory over Duke in the NCAA basketball finals ranked 14th with a 20.7 rating, down from last year's record 23.8 when Georgetown was upset by Villanova. Last year's ratings high was attributed to the presence of



Georgetown's star center Patrick Ewing and the fact that the competing schools were in the large TV markets of Philadelphia and Washington.

Last week's second 10 had ABC's "Dynasty" and "Moonlighting," tied for 11th, followed by NBC's "Miami Vice," the Duke-Louisville game, NBC's movie, "Killer in the Mirror," CBS' "Dallas," CBS' "Simon & Simon," CBS' "Knots Landing," NBC's "Highway to Heaven" and ABC's "Hotel."

For the 28th week of the 30-week prime-time season, NBC averaged a 16.7 to CBS' 16.5 and ABC's 14.3. Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.7 to CBS' 16.7 and ABC's 15.0.

New series didn't fare too well last week. In its debut, NBC's "Fathers & Sons" ranked 65th out of 67 shows. The second episode of CBS' "Morningstar-Eveningstar," ranked 60th and the second episode of ABC's "Joe Bash" was 58th. ABC's "Mr. Sunshine," in its second outing, performed more respectably, in 39th.

The best-performing new series

was ABC's "Perfect Strangers," which, in its second outing, held on to most of the audience of its lead, "Who's the Boss?" and ranked ninth.

Last week's five lowest-rated shows were, in descending order: CBS' "Tough Cookies," NBC's "Punky Brewster," "Fathers & Sons," ABC's movie "Diner" and ABC's "The Fall Guy."

The ratings tie allowed the "NBC Evening News" to increase its consecutive streak to 205 first-place finishes, but ratings for the "NBC Nightly News" have been steadily improving over the past year. In the same week in 1985, CBS averaged a 12.6 rating, NBC a 10.8 and ABC a 10.7.

"We've come up a little, they came back a little and, basically, we met in the middle," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, said some of the growth in the "NBC Nightly News" can be attributed to NBC's strong showing in prime time and with "Today" show this season. Several local newscasts leading into "Nightly News" also are doing better, Poltrack said.

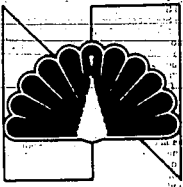

Georgetown's star center Patrick Ewing and the fact that the competing schools were in the large TV markets of Philadelphia and Washington.

Last week's second 10 had ABC's "Dynasty" and "Moonlighting" tied for 11th, followed by NBC's "Miami Vice," the Duke-Louisville game, NBC's movie, "Killer in the Mirror," CBS' "Dallas," CBS' "Simon & Simon," CBS' "Knots Landing," NBC's "Highway to Heaven" and ABC's "Hotel."

For the 28th week of the 30-week prime-time season, NBC averaged a 16.7 to CBS' 16.5 and ABC's 14.3. Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.7 to CBS' 16.7 and ABC's 15.0.

New series didn't fare too well last week. In its debut, NBC's "Fathers & Sons" ranked 65th out of 67 shows. The second episode of CBS' "Morningstar-Eveningstar" ranked 60th and the second episode of ABC's "Joe Bash" was 58th, ABC's "Mr. Sunshine," in its second outing, performed more respectably, in 39th.

The best-performing new series

was ABC's "Perfect Strangers," which, in its second outing, held over to most of the audience of its lead, "Who's the Boss," and ranked ninth.

Last week's five lowest-rated shows were, in descending order: CBS' "Tough Cookies," NBC's "Punky Brewster," "Fathers & Sons," ABC's movie "Diner" and ABC's "The Fall Guy."

The ratings tie allowed the CBS Evening News to increase its consecutive streak to 205 first-place finishes, but ratings for the "NBC Nightly News" have been steadily improving over the past year. For the same week in 1985, CBS averaged a 12.6 rating, NBC a 10.8 and ABC a 10.7.

"We've come up a little, they came back a little and, basically, we met in the middle," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, said some of the growth in the "NBC Nightly News" can be attributed to NBC's strong showing in prime time and with the "Today" show this season. Some local newscasts leading into "NBC Nightly News" also are doing better, Poltrack said.

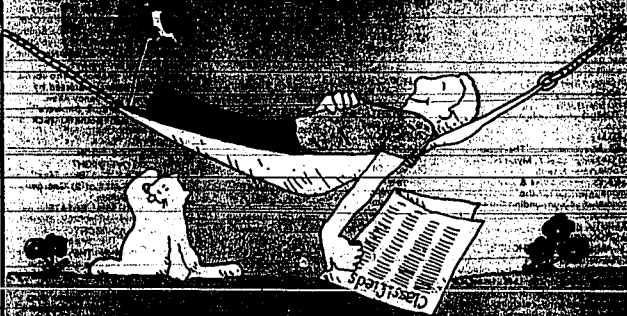

CBN belt-tightening continues

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — The Rev. Pat Robertson, who last week announced layoffs and cutbacks at his Christian Broadcasting Network, blames the church-building boom, falling oil prices and his interest in the presidency for a slump in contributions.

The network said it is selling its three TV stations, canceling its toll-free telephone line and laying off 41 employees because contributions have been lower than expected this year.

Network executives had projected that contributions to CBN would increase 22 percent this year compared with 1985, but the increase has been 7 percent so far, said Benton Miller, a network spokesman. The cutbacks should save about \$24 million, he said.

"This is a tough fiscal decision that we're making, but this decision hasn't resulted in any significant layoffs. It's less than half of a percent of our total employees," Miller said.

Robertson, CBN founder and host of "The 700 Club" talk show, said his interest in seeking the Republican nomination for president in 1988 may have caused contributions to lag.

Robertson has said CBN would have an annual operating budget of about \$230 million this year, and this may have scared away contributors.

"The trouble is when people keep reading a gross figure of \$230 million, they figure that we have so much money we don't need theirs," he said.

"Every national ministry that makes use of television is experienc-

ing some belt-tightening at this particular time," Miller said.

The Rev. Jerry Falwell, whose TV ministry is based in Lynchburg, Va., announced this week that budget constraints will force him to cancel his toll-free number and dismiss 225 employees.

One reason for the slump is that many churches are growing and their members are giving to construction funds rather than TV ministries, Miller said.

Declining oil prices also have hurt contributions because many of the network's major donors work in the oil industry, he said.

By June, CBN will cancel the toll-free number that viewers of "The 700 Club" can call for counseling or to pledge money. That will save about \$5 million annually.

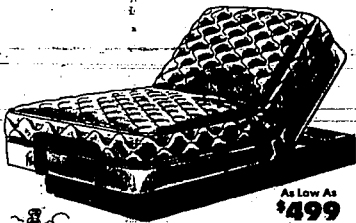

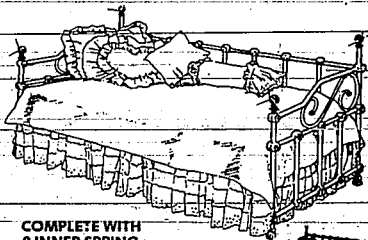

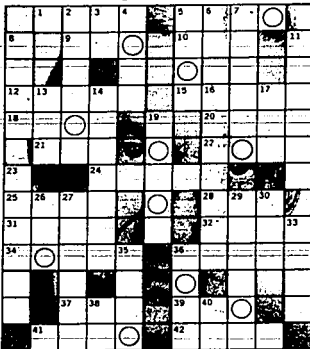

Barrett quits show-biz program

HOLLYWOOD — After only nine months as "senior correspondent" of "Entertainment Tonight," Rona Barrett said Friday that she is quitting the syndicated show-biz news program to "pursue other interests." Her resignation is effective on April 20.

"To oversimplify things, she really wants to go out and do her own show," said Frank Kelly, a senior vice president at Paramount Television, a co-producer of the series and its weekend edition, "Entertainment This Week," which she also is leaving.

Her impending exit, which Kelly described as an amicable parting, had been rumored imminent. In recent weeks, she infrequently appeared on weeknight editions of "Entertainment Tonight." Although she regularly appeared on "Enter-

tainment Tonight," Barrett and Jack Reilly, the program's producer, who joined the show in August, was not available for comment, although in a prepared statement she said this about her resignation:

"Sometimes you have to leave an otherwise wonderful and workable marriage in order to grow. I feel it is time for me to pursue other interests." She will announce her future television plans soon, she added.

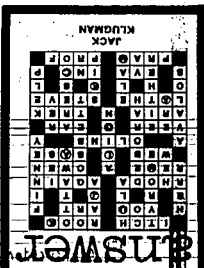
There will not be a shake-up of the format of "Entertainment Tonight" after she leaves, he said; but "we're going to look at the possibility of adding additional people to the show."

In her prepared statement, Barrett said she will continue doing her daily national radio reports on entertainment for the Westwood One-Mutual Broadcasting System.

She also said she has just completed negotiations with Macmillan

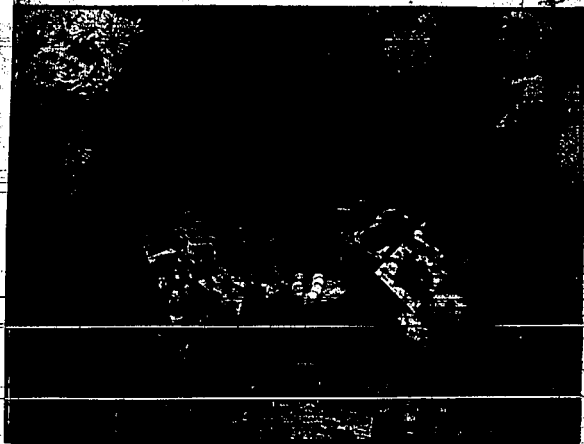
