## Judge orders maximum term for parents of Hazelton child

JEROME — A Hazelton couple whose 11-month-old child died last year of a combination of malnutrition and bronchial pneumonia was ordered Thursday to spend six months in the Jerome County Jail.

Gary and Rosemarie Staten, ages 31 and 30, were sentenced by Magistrate Judge Nathan Higer of Burley to the maximum jail term on the misdemeanor charge of injury to a child.

Higer said he would not impose a fine or court costs and placed the jail sentences for the two on a

work-release basis so they can continue their jobs. The baby, Tanya Lynne Staten, died Feb. 3, 1985. Higer said the two are to appear May 1 at the Jerome County Sheriff's Department and will begin serving the sentences, unless delayed by appeal. Their attorney, David Swanson of Boise, said he and his clients have not determined if an appeal of the sentence will be filed, but he said the decision would be made prior to May 1.

Jerome County Prosecutor Mark Gause drew fire from officers and citizens, who launched a recall attempt in February for his action in reducing a felony involuntary man-

slaughter charge against the couple to a misdemeanor. Gause said after the sentencing that he was surprised by the judge's action. Gause had recommended probation for both the mother and father of the victim and had asked that they be required to obtain psychiatric help and that officials make regular checks on the couple's home and care of their five other children.

Although he was surprised by the judge's action, Gause said, he would not have done anything differently in his handling of the case. Chief Deputy Sheriff Larry Webb

## Angry terrorists strike for revenge

Terrorists struck back at the United States and its friends on three continents Thursday, in an explosion of vengeful fury ignited by the American bombing of Libya. Terrorists killed three kidnap victims in Lebanon, tried to blow up an El Al jetliner in London and tossed firebombs at a U.S. Marine compound in Tunisia.

In city after city around the world, angry crowds swirled around U.S. embassies and screamed their hatred for "U.S.A. Aggressor."

Bomb-disposal squads scurried around European capitals in response to threats. American embassy staff members were preparing to be airlifted out of Sudan. In Libya itself, nervous Westerners looked desperately for ways out of the country.

And in Moscow, in a possibly ominous development, the Soviet Union summoned foreign ambassadors and formally asserted its right to free passage through the sea and air that might signal Kremlin intentions to maneuver additional naval vessels or other military equipment in the tense Mediterranean.

In Lebanon, retaliation for the U.S. raid was swift and bloody. The bodies of three kidnap victims identified as writer Alec Collett, 64, and teachers Leigh Douglas, 34, and Philip F. Bennett, 40, all officers were dumped on a highway, each shot once in the head.

A note found nearby claimed they

were U.S. and British spies and had been "executed" by "Arab commando cells" in reprisal for the attack on Libya. Collett was kidnaped 13 months ago and the Douglas and Padfield last month. Arab anger has been directed at the British government because it allowed the United States to mount the attack on Libya from a U.S. air base in Britain.

Soon after the bodies were found, a British television cameraman, John McCarthy, 29, was abducted by gunmen in Beirut. Eighteen kidnaped foreigners, including six Americans, are missing in Lebanon. In London Thursday, an alert security guard felled what could have been a terrorist mass murderer. The El Al airline guard at

## Senators ease power relicensing

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted 83-14 Thursday to make it easier for private power companies to keep their hydroelectric dams, ending one of the longest public-vs.-private power disputes a long way toward resolution.

Conceding that similar action is likely in the House, public power advocates said their losing fight was important to fend off other attacks by private companies on some of their privileges. The bill approved after three days of debate requires the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to issue licenses to holders of current 50-year hydroelectric licenses if they choose to apply for renewal and no challenger has presented a better plan.

This removes what the federal courts have interpreted as a relicensing preference for state and municipal agencies if the competing plans are judged equal.

## Imbibes poisoned drink Comedy turns tragedy as student dies on TV

AMHERST, Mass. — A 17-year-old boy drank cyanide-laced Kool-Aid on live, closed-circuit television and died on the floor of the Hampshire College studio while his brother and friends laughed and urged him to quit joking, students said Thursday.

When Andrew L. Herrmann refused to quit his "act" on the comedy show, students carried him to a hall. Security guards later found he was dead.

"Everyone thought it was a joke. No one realized he had actually done it," said Philip Jackson, student producer of the student broadcast. "We've had some rather extreme things on the show. One time a group of Arabs came on and hijacked it. Everyone just thought he was fooling."

Herrmann's older brother, Stephen, a Hampshire student who served as co-host of the program, said, "I thought, like everyone else, that it was just an act."

"I had intuitive feelings that something was going wrong, but I didn't register. If I fit so well into the entire speech," he said. "He said he

would die for his views about the administration of this campus. It was joking. But what he did was serious."

Herrmann described his younger brother as a highly intelligent young man who was bored with high school and had "other problems." He said Andrew had planned to attend Hampshire College next year and had been accepted.

Lt. David Jankowski said police were notified of the death by Hampshire County Medical Examiner Donald Abel after the teen-ager was pronounced dead on arrival at Cooley Dickinson Hospital in Northampton shortly after 11 p.m. Wednesday.

Tests were conducted Thursday by a pathologist to determine the cause of death, Jankowski said, but what we feel at this time the youth ingested and drank the liquid knowing it was lethal."

Police refused to comment on the suicide reports by Jackson and other students involved in the production, which was broadcast live to dormitories at the 1,200-student liberal arts college.

## Costa Rica bomb blast injures 3

SAN JOSE, Costa Rica — A bomb exploded Thursday night in front of the U.S. Consulate, shattering windows and injuring three passersby with flying glass, authorities said.

Police said three people, including a woman, were injured and detained in connection with the 8-p.m. MST explosion in downtown San Jose, the capital.

"The U.S. Embassy, which is located on the opposite corner of the intersection where the explosion occurred, was not damaged," U.S. Ambassador Lewis A. Tambs, who appeared in front of the explosion, called it a terrorist act.

James Tull, deputy chief of the embassy, told AP Radio by telephone to Washington that a device of some kind went off in the middle of a downtown commercial street in San Jose between the building that houses the American consulate and the Consulate building.

"There was glass damage on both sides of the street, but aside from glass damage there was no damage whatsoever to the consulate," Tambs said. "The police tell us that there were three passersby that have been taken to the hospital with injuries."

## Reagan defends air attack on Libya

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration on Thursday defended its bombing raid on Libya as "absolutely the right thing to do" in a long term fight against terrorism and said it would go ahead if the attack leads to the overthrow of Moammar Khadafy.

Reacting to a new spew of international violence, President Reagan called the slaying of three British hostages in Lebanon a "tragedy" that demonstrates that "terrorism is something that we have to deal with once and for all, all of us together."

Secretary of State George P. Shultz stopped short of saying the United States hoped the attack would lead to the ouster of Khadafy as leader of the North African country, but said such a result would be "all to the good."

At a late-afternoon session with reporters in his office, Shultz said one of the messages intended by the U.S. attack was to demonstrate that the Praetorian guards that surround Khadafy and intimidate people are not invulnerable. "So they were a target."

"There is considerable disidence" within the Libyan military over Khadafy, "and what he's doing," Shultz said.

Asked if the U.S. warplanes had tried to kill Khadafy, the secretary of state said, "We didn't have a strategy of saying that we wanted to go after Khadafy personally."

However, National Security Council officials drafted a statement — withheld when it was learned that Khadafy had survived the raid — describing his death as "fortuitous." The Washington Post reported in Friday's edition.

But Shultz made clear that the Reagan administration hoped to capitalize on internal opposition to Khadafy.

Asked if the United States was attempting to foment a coup, Shultz replied: "If a coup takes place, that's all to the good. We know that there are lots of people in Libya who think Libya would be better off if Khadafy were not there. And there are lots of people not in Libya who think that."

Another administration official, speaking on condition he not be identified, said, "We know that several army units in the first couple of days (after the attack) rebelled." The official said some of the soldiers marched on Tripoli and that some units of the air force loyal to Khadafy "went after that column and dispersed them."

"They had a battle, that's for sure," he added. "There are still reports of fighting between regular forces and the people's militia (Khadafy's personal militia)."

"A note found by the bodies on a mountain highway outside Beirut claimed one of the three British hostages had been a CIA agent, and said the killings were in retaliation for the British-supported U.S. attack on Libya.

## Twin Falls, Burley join scramble for prison

TWIN FALLS — The cities of Twin Falls and Burley have joined the state's list of 23 towns scrambling to attract a new maximum security prison.

"Our overall objective is to land the prison in the area," said Mike Dolton, executive vice president of the Greater Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, Thursday. "If Gooding had the project locked in, we wouldn't be trying." The old Idaho tuberculosis hospital in Gooding, proposed by that community as a prison site, may not meet all the specifications outlined by Idaho Department of Cor-

rection officials, Dolton said he found out this week.

Twin Falls needs to put in a bid for the prison to ensure that if a new state prison is not built in Gooding, it is built in a Magic Valley town, he said. The chamber will continue to support Gooding's proposal, but will offer a Twin Falls site as "a back-up," he said.

Dolton said he believes the state will be asked to build the prison more than 15 miles from a town with 10,000 people or more. Gooding is 34 miles from Twin Falls. He also believes the state is looking for a site with 30 acres. The state earlier had more than 30 acres of the old tuberculosis

hospital grounds, leaving just 6.6 acres remaining in the parcel.

Chamber members are still brainstorming and are not ready to discuss specific Twin Falls sites for a prison, Dolton said. However, he said members are considering the possibility of using public land, such as Twin Falls County or U.S. Bureau of Land Management acreage, and negotiating a lifetime lease with the state.

Several sites being discussed include a public school land near Twin Falls and Jerome, with sewage and water service already available, he said. The Twin Falls Chamber has been working with Jerome officials, he said. A prison built in or near Twin Falls would

boost the town's economy by creating possibly 200 jobs, he said. The county might also be able to contract security services with the state, rather than building a new jail, he said.

If the prison is built in Gooding, Twin Falls will still feel the benefits as the regional trade center, Dolton said.

"Twin Falls or whoever gets it will complete the area," said Burley City Clerk Bud Brinegar Thursday. "But self, we'd like to see it in Cassia County. We're like all the other cities looking for anything and everything to help our economy." Burley officials began to think seriously about the prison when the state allocated \$9

million this year to start construction on a facility to relieve overcrowding and lax security at the state prison near Boise. They were further encouraged when other cities being considered appeared to lack some of the essential qualities the state is seeking, Brinegar said.

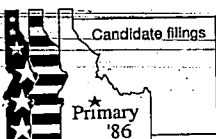
Burley officials are considering a privately owned site just northwest of town in the Burley Industrial Area. The sewage capacity needed is available, and the town has plenty of power, he said. A new well is being dug. "We've got the land, the employment, the housing, the schools and the commercial (support) available," Brinegar said. County commissioners John Adams said he

BOISE (AP) — C. L. "Butch" Otter of Caldwell filed Thursday for the Republican nomination for governor and said his top objective is economic development.

Otter, an executive with the J.R. Simplot Co., and son-in-law of Idaho industrialist Jack Simplot, said everywhere he goes in the state people tell him of the need to develop business for existing industry, bring new industry to Idaho and to expand the tax base to support education and other necessary services.



Otter, a former state representative from Canyon County, said he has visited about two-thirds of Idaho's 44 counties and plans to cover them all before the May 27 primary.

The list of candidates for the primary election grew by nearly 70 Thursday, with the filing deadline at 5 p.m. Today, by the close of business Thursday evening, there were 230 candidates filed.

Eric Fieldstad, Boise, filed his petitions for the Republican state auditor nomination. He will be opposed by Blingham County Commissioner Richard Williams, Shelley, Ron Rock, Boise city treasurer, joined the race for the Democratic state treasurer nomination.

Idaho Falls businessman Rep. J. F. Chaddband became the fourth Republican to file for the party's 2nd Congressional district nomination. Chaddband said his top priority is to revitalize the state economy and create new jobs for Idaho citizens.

Filing earlier were Connie Hansen, wife of George Hansen; Dan Adamson of Jerome and Sen. Dane Watkins, R-Idaho Falls. Idaho Falls broadcaster Mel Robinson and Shelley filed today just before the deadline, giving 2nd District Republicans five candidates from which to select.

A sixth potential candidate in that race, Rep. Gary Robbins, R-Dietrich, instead filed for re-election

Pocatello, filed for the Democrat nomination for the seat now held by Mark Duffin, R-American Falls.

Among other challengers were four Coeur d'Alene Democrats filing for seats now held by Republicans, Tom Giovannelli, Marvin Vandenberg, Alex Bedini and Leo Ray.

Boise Republicans Sen. Ludwig and Kathryn Yost both filed for the seat being vacated by Rep. Larry Harris, R-Boise. Ralph Steele, Idaho Falls, filed for the GOP nomination for the seat being given up by Rep. Marilyn Stanger, R-Idaho Falls.

Democrat Donivan "Don" Johnson, St. Anthony, filed for the seat now held by Rep. Cyril Burt, R-St. Anthony. Robin Kinsey, Jerome, Republican, filed for the seat now held by Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Jerome.

Bert Remaley, Kimberly, and Celia Gould Folsing, Tuhl, both filed for the GOP nomination for the seat being surrendered by House Speaker Tom Stivers, Twin Falls.

Jack L. Wasden, Twin Falls, filed for the Republican nomination for the seat now held by Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly.

Wippel decides against making race

BOISE (AP) — Though supporters of Mary Wippel have been circulating a petition to place her name on the ballot in legislative District 15, the veteran Boise teacher has decided not to run.

"While I feel I would make valuable contributions as a legislator, I believe I will make an even greater contribution by continuing my work uninterrupted as a teacher," Wippel said.

She wrote to House Speaker T.W. "Tom" Stivers during the recent legislative session that she was leaving Idaho because of the Legislature's lack of support for education. Stivers wrote a one-word answer: "Goodbye!"

Aid needy with Exxon money, advocate says

BOISE (AP) — Consumer advocate John Lance says saving a few dollars on heating bills may be the difference in how well a lot of elderly people eat — or whether they can afford to eat at all.

"There are a lot of people out there living under conditions that most people do not realize exist," said Lance, at a hearing here Thursday.

Lance was among witnesses testifying before a five-member board which will decide how Idaho is to spend a \$8.5 million windfall.

The money comes from a federal court judgment against Exxon Corp. for overcharging oil prices. Idaho's share of the national award is \$8.5 million.

Under terms of the judgment, the money can be spent only on five existing energy conservation and aid programs.

Thursday's hearing will help decide how the money should be allocated.

Lance, speaking for the Western Idaho Community Action Program, urged priority for the weatheriza-

tion program. It provides money to improve insulation and otherwise cut energy costs for low-income families.

Lance said there are at least three reasons to pump some of the extra money into weatherization. It will help people save heating costs and it will create many jobs and the weatherization work, he said.

"It also will lower energy costs to the low-income people who need it most," he said.

With many elderly people living on inadequate fixed incomes, he said, an extra \$20, \$30 or \$40 per month cut from energy bills will increase the money available for food.

"With discretionary money at a premium, there is a lot of interest in how this money will be allocated," he said.

State Sen. Terry Sverdsten, R-Cataldo, suggested giving most of it to education. One of the five eligible conservation programs consists of matching grants to schools, hospitals and similar facilities for energy conservation projects.

American Falls sets override vote

AMERICAN FALLS (AP) — The American Falls School Board has decided to ask district patrons to vote May 8 on whether to approve a supplemental override levy of \$197,500.

However, school officials say even with the levy, there still will be ma-

job cuts to meet expected costs increases for operations.

Meantime, teacher salary negotiations were still under way Thursday, making it impossible for school directors to estimate the piece of the district's fiscal pie destined for pay and benefits.

### Ways of 'Wild West' still with region

Many Americans lament the passing of the Wild West. But there are indications every so often that may not be the case. The Wild West may only be hiding, emerging periodically to remind people that it's still with us.

Several recent events would seem to support that idea. First there was the departure of Claude Dallas from the Idaho State Prison on a self-granted termination of his sentence. He hasn't been seen since and it's entirely possible that when he is, the scene may be straight out of those tales of shootouts of yesteryear.

Then there was the case of the two *Perce* brothers who are strongly suspected of slaying an airman from Mountain Home Air Force Base near Cascade. Their subsequent journey down the Pacific coast, believed to be a roundabout route to their home grounds, was interrupted by a confrontation with police in Yuma, Ariz., which left one officer and one suspect dead. The hunt for the surviving fugitive brother continues.

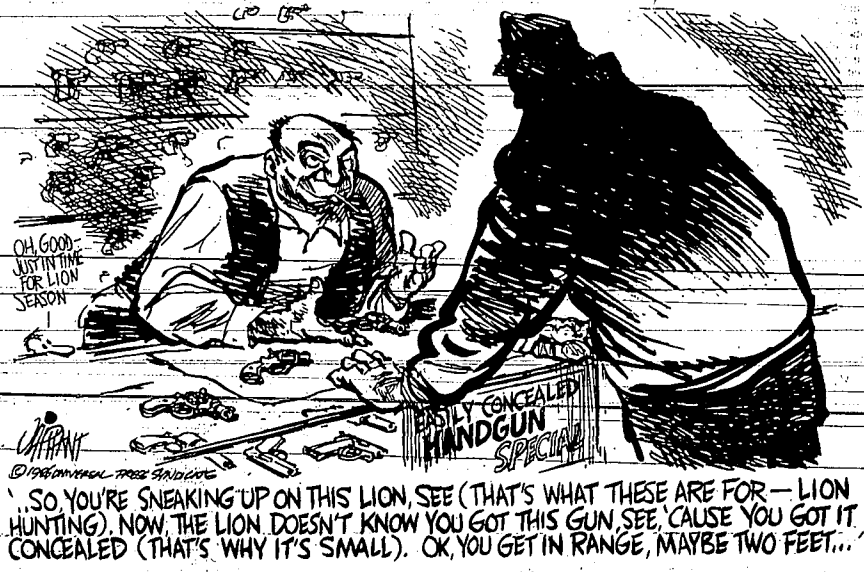
And every so often natural phenomena enter the picture. Severe storms, earthquakes, and volcanic eruptions — Mt. St. Helens cut loose again on Wednesday — offer periodic reminders that the West is still largely untamed beneath all of its magnificent scenery.

To a great extent, the Wild West of the second half of the 19th Century was the invention of a number of literary types intended to sell books and magazines. True, there were in those days rough men subsisting in a rough country, and there still are in this region which prizes individual independence above most other attributes.

But with the passage of a century and the application of a veneer of civilization, a lot of the wilder aspects of the West would seem to have vanished. But now and then, the emergence of some law-breaking adventurers and the reports of their misdeeds serves as a reminder that a lot of the rougher ways of the West haven't disappeared entirely.

Come to think of it, some of those rough-hewn edges might make it easier for them to deal with storms, fires and floods.

Even with its earthy ways and occasional adventures, we'd venture that most Westerners — on the whole, a law-abiding although independent citizenry — wouldn't have the region otherwise.



### Latest gun bill not a bad piece of work

WASHINGTON — Now, look. The gun control bill that passed the House last week is being denounced everywhere as a perilous and reckless "weakening" of the 1968 law.

Let me voice a dissenting view. The bill, in my judgment, is not that bad a piece of work.

In most of its provisions, the House bill parallels the McClellan-Volkmer bill that sailed through the Senate last summer on a vote of 78-15. The measure passed the House on April 10 by a vote of 292-130. When you have a combined vote in the two chambers of 371-145, you have an impressively lopsided display. It is difficult to believe that such majorities were achieved because members were scared to death of the National Rifle Association.

This is constructive legislation. The 1968 act, you may recall, was passed in a wave of emotionalism set in motion by the assassinations of Robert F. Kennedy and Martin Luther King Jr. It contained some useful provisions, but the act was predicated upon some implicit assumptions — for example, that gun dealers are a menace to society and that gun owners generally are a bunch of potential felons.

The federal government set out to enforce the 1968 act in that spirit. Gun dealers were subjected to bureaucratic harassment. Gun collectors in some instances saw their collections effectively confiscated. Tons of paperwork were generated. And while law-abiding gun owners chafed under needless restrictions, criminals continued along their criminal ways.

Last week's bill will put matters in better balance. It no longer will be unlawful for hunters to transport rifles and shotguns across state lines. That makes sense. Gun dealers will be sub-

ject to only one unannounced inspection a year but that provision will prevent a local prosecutor from getting a warrant on showing of probable cause. The interstate sale of handguns would be prohibited. The bill bans all future sales and possession of machine guns. The measure contains tough provisions covering use of a firearm in commission of a crime: a mandatory five years for a first offense, 10 years for a second. Significantly, the bill adds drug offenses to the list of violent crimes.

Under this bill, it still will be possible for persons to buy silencers and automatic weapons but only after careful checking, fingerprinting, and a delay of two to four months. This procedure effectively limits such purchasers to bona fide collectors and hobbyists. An entirely separate piece of legislation, intended to prohibit the sale or possession of "cop-killers" armor-piercing bullets, has passed both houses by overwhelming votes. It will go to the White House after a conference committee resolves minor differences.

All in all, it is hard to see how gun laws have been greatly "weakened" by these legislative efforts. For my own part, I wish the final bill had provided a mandatory two-week waiting period on the sale of concealable handguns. At one time the NRA itself supported a waiting period. Such

a delay, said the NRA, "could help in reducing crimes of passion and in preventing people with criminal records or dangerous mental illness from acquiring guns." The NRA was right then, and it is wrong now in opposing so modest a provision.

The bill also could have been much improved by imposing lighter regulations on the sale of ammunition. Sen. Pat Moynihan of New York is exactly right in saying that "the best handgun control is ammunition control," but if dealers had to preserve records of every sale of bullets, and to check on the eligibility of every purchaser, the bureaucratic hand would be too heavy.

It seems to me that we come down to a few intractable realities. The United States of America is the most gun-happy nation in the world. No one has any good idea of how many handguns are kicking around; there are millions of them, and no laws yet have been devised that would prevent criminals from acquiring them. Proposals for gun registration are pure folly. It is unbelievably naive to suppose that criminals would obey them.

There are those areas in which we must do the best we can. There is no perfect solution. The object of legislation should be to contain the terrible misfortunes that go with widespread ownership of guns, and to punish criminal misuse of weapons. Nothing in the House bill will detract from these purposes. If the Senate will concur promptly in the House bill, we can put this fight behind us and go on to more important things.

## Bay of Pigs offers nation lessons in dealing with terrorism

WASHINGTON — By curious historical happenstance, American attacks against Libya came exactly 25 years after the United States sent a doomed, ragging fleet of hulking World War II merchant vessels toward its destiny at the Bay of Pigs in Cuba.

That analogy bears examination today not because the air strikes over Libya parallel the disastrous U.S.-sponsored military action against Cuba or because history ever literally repeats itself. Of course, they do not. The Bay of Pigs episode remains pertinent because it continues to offer lessons for American policy-makers grappling with similar questions involving uses of force and how best to deal with leaders of small states such as Cuba, Libya and Nicaragua that the United States deems intolerable menaces.

Here are some of those lessons that seem relevant to events in the Middle East and in Central America.

On use of force, in his briefing at the White House after the Libyan attacks, Secretary of State George P. Shultz made a major policy

point when he said, "What is clear tonight is that the United States will take military action under certain circumstances. That's established. That's very important."

So it is.

From a military standpoint, the central lesson of the Bay of Pigs is that, once American prestige is committed to a military engagement, the United States should never permit failure for lack of adequate force. The Bay of Pigs invasion stands as the classic case of too little and too late and of the consequences of failure.

In this sense, the U.S. action against Libya demonstrates that this lesson has been learned. Sufficient force was committed to achieve the approved military mission.

At the same time, as the long Vietnam experience made tragically clear to all

Americans, willingness to employ massive power does not alone assure success and, in fact, can lead to even more division at home and embittering defeat abroad.

Here, a Shultz phrase appears significant in establishing future policy guidelines. That is his pledge that the United States will take military action "under certain circumstances."

It appears to be telling the world that the United States will respond to terrorism, as the president says, whenever and wherever acts of terror are committed against Americans. As long as the case against the terrorists is made convincingly and clearly, the great majority of Americans will surely back use of force against them.

On covert operations. In the aftermath of the attacks on Libya, the question of administration policy in Central America looms larger as Congress and the American people debate Reagan requests for more aid for counterrevolutionaries in Nicaragua. Here, the lessons of the Bay of Pigs are more pointed and timely.

Of all the disasters that befall the brave men of Cuban Brigade 2506 at the Bay of Pigs in mid-April 1961, none was greater than the nature of the operation chosen to achieve a desired American foreign-policy goal. The Bay of Pigs was, or should have been, proof of the ineffectiveness of large-scale covert military operations in the post-World War II era.

Belief that America could escape responsibility for forming a secret invading army and putting it ashore with a U.S.-drawn invasion plan was a historic blunder. There's no reason to believe that another large-scale covert military force as the contrast, direct descendants of the Bay of Pigs force, will fare better today. If anything, the same reasons exist for predicting its failure.

On the role of diplomacy. The greatest failure at the Bay of Pigs was not understanding the internal forces that produced a Fidel Castro — or, now, a Moammar Khadafi in Libya or Daniel Ortega in Nicaragua.

In all of these cases, the administration in power misread those forces and misunderstood the appeal of leaders and regimes that the United States found repugnant. It was assumed, for instance, that the people of Cuba would join the invaders in overthrowing Castro, the presumably hated communist leader. They did not. To them, Castro was a hero. He continues to be so regarded by many of them.

Similar is too much of the planning against Castro's Cuba centered on military rather than diplomatic actions, on launching strikes and invasions rather than on developing policies that could change underlying conditions and attitudes that had made Cuba fertile ground for communism.

Of concern now is whether U.S. policy-makers will avoid the same kinds of mistakes in dealing with another problem of the age: terrorism.

# Pentagon traces events, discloses damage from Libya raid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. military operation that culminated with aerial raids on Libya this week began 6½ hours before the first bombs fell, involved more than 100 strike and support aircraft and succeeded in damaging all five designated targets, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The bombing runs were mounted during the dead of night at altitudes

of less than 500 feet and speeds in excess of 575 miles per hour, said spokesman Robert Sims.

"This was a near-flawless professional operation under extremely difficult circumstances, in the middle of the night, long distances from bases," Sims said. "It was rather extraordinary and I don't think we've had anything like it in U.S. military annals, frankly."

The mission was not without its problems, however.

Sims disclosed that five of the 18 Air Force F-111 bombers and two of 14 Navy A-6 attack jets were forced to abort their bombing runs either because of equipment problems or because of other unexplained reasons.

"The pilots were directed in advance to abort if they knew that any system was not working properly be-

fore they reached their assigned target area," he said.

Sims also agreed that damage to a residential section of Tripoli could have been caused by an errant bomb from the one F-111 bomber that failed to return from the mission. And he said that at least one target — the Sidi Bilal training base for Libyan commandos near Tripoli — was not damaged as extensively as the other four.

Sims offered no explanation for that latter result.

The spokesman, in releasing an official Pentagon chronology of the mission, discounted suggestions the United States had as a goal of the raid the assassination of Libyan leader Moammar Khadafi.

He released video footage shot by one of the F-111 bombers that attacked the Al Aziziyah barracks, the main command center for terrorist operations next to which Khadafi maintains a tent residence. The footage shows the bomber clearly setting its sights on the barracks building and not the nearby tents.

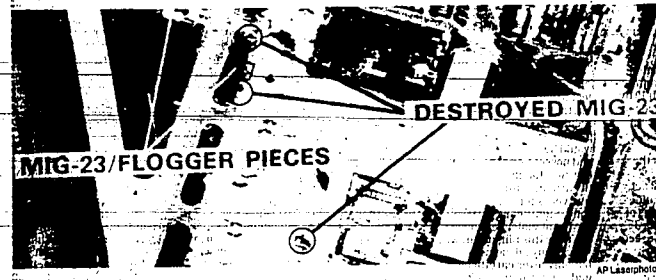
"We did not know where he (Khadafi) was," Sims said. "The purpose of the attack was to hit the nerve center of terrorist training located in the barracks there and that's what we did."

At 5:08 p.m. MST, the fifth and final target, the Tripoli airport, was attacked by the remaining five F-111's. That run was completed by 5:11 p.m. and at 5:13 p.m., all the Navy planes reported they were back over water.

Two minutes later, at 5:15 p.m., search-and-rescue forces were alerted an Air Force plane might be missing.

## Soviets press UN to end Libya crisis

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union reasserted its right to sea and air passage near Libya and asked the U.N. secretary-general Thursday to use "all the means at your disposal" to end the Libyan crisis.

The Kremlin did not spell out what it wanted the secretary-general to do.

Nor was it clear why the Soviets made a point of saying they would continue to exercise their right to "innocent passage" in international waters and air space around Libya. The assertion was made in a statement read to foreign diplomats called to the Foreign Ministry late Wednesday.

The appeal to U.N. Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar was contained in a letter from Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze. The official news agency Tass distributed an English translation.

The U.N. Security Council on Thursday debated for the third day a Libyan complaint against the United States for its air raid on targets in Tripoli and Benghazi.

Perez de Cuellar's spokesman, Francois Giuliani, said the secretary-general was waiting to see what action the Security Council might take before responding publicly to the Soviet letter.

So far, the Soviets' only concrete public response to the U.S. attack has been cancellation of next month's meeting between Shevardnadze and Secretary of State George P. Shultz, at which they were to plan the next superpower summit.

## Man critical after surgery

JIDDA, Saudi Arabia (AP) — An employee of the U.S. Embassy in Sudan, who was shot in the head while leaving work, was reported in stable but critical condition Thursday after undergoing brain surgery here.

William Calkins, a communications specialist, was brought to Saudi Arabia after being shot Tuesday while driving out of the embassy compound in Khartoum, Sudan's capital.

The shooting occurred hours after the U.S. air raid on Libya.

One bullet pierced Calkins' brain, leaving his right side paralyzed, according to sources at King Fahd Military Hospital in this city on the Red Sea, where Calkins was flown immediately after the shooting.

Sources at the hospital said the bullet was removed during surgery. These sources said Calkins arrived at the hospital with part of his brain exposed.

**Reagan doesn't read 'fiction'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan quipped Thursday that he didn't think he'd read the new book by David Stockman, his former budget chief, because "I don't have too much time for fiction."

Stockman's book, excerpts of which were published this week in Newsweek magazine, portrays the president as an uncertain conservative led through decisions by pragmatic politicians.

Stockman's book describes Reagan as "a consensus politician, not an ideologue," whose closest aides "knew nothing about the true substance of domestic governance... They were illiterate when it came to the essential equation of policy."

Reagan, at a photo session before the start of a meeting with Australian Prime Minister Robert Hawke, was asked what he thought of Stockman.

"Haven't read his book," the president replied. "I'm not sure that I want to..."

**Dole offers anti-terror bill**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole proposed legislation Thursday permitting a president to order military action — possibly including the assassination of a response to terrorist acts without prior consultation with Congress.

The bill would provide an effective waiver of the War Powers Act in cases involving terrorism directed against Americans overseas. It thus placed Dole, R-Kan., at odds with many senior Democrats and some Republicans who said earlier this week that President Reagan should have consulted more extensively with Congress before ordering the air raids in Libya.

The War Powers Act, passed in 1973, requires a president to consult with Congress before placing U.S. forces in dangerous situations.

**Challenger debris on shore**

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — A Navy salvage ship on Thursday brought to port parts of a wing, landing gear and fuselage from the destroyed space shuttle, including a piece with "Challenger" stenciled in black on it, officials said.

The shuttle, destroyed after liftoff Jan. 28, had its name written across both sides of the forward fuselage and on the crew compartment, and on its right tail. Experts were examining the recovered material to identify how it fits into the mosaic of wreckage being assembled in a hangar.

"We don't know precisely what this debris consists of until the experts get a chance to look at it," said Lt. Cmdr. Deborah Burnette, adding that there were no reports of further recovery of remains of the seven astronauts killed in the disaster.

Strong Atlantic currents slowed the work of the search flotilla and Navy and Coast Guard divers for a second straight day.

**Vehicle's tests questioned**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional critics of the Army's Bradley Fighting Vehicle released new documents Thursday suggesting the service had set up the latest round of tests to hide defects in the tank-like troop carriers.

"The Army put water cans inside the weapon rather than ammunition boxes that might explode during tests," with live ammunition, said Rep. Charles Bennett, D-Fla.

"I can't understand how anyone could do this, knowing that the vehicle would not be configured this way in combat, knowing that infantrymen would ride in the Bradley with an ammo box there instead of water," Bennett told a news conference.

But an Army spokesman, Lt. Col. Craig McNab, said the water can was where it was supposed to be because the Bradley had been redesigned since earlier tests.

**Saudi arms deal called signal**

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reagan administration officials said Thursday that selling defense missiles to Saudi Arabia is a vital signal to Iran that the United States will not tolerate any broadening of the Iran-Iraq war.

Sixty-three senators have signed a resolution disapproving the proposed \$354 million sale of some 2,600 missiles.

Appearing before a Senate Foreign Relations Committee, which votes on the issue next week, Assistant Secretary of State Richard Murphy acknowledged there is no immediate military need for the missiles; although he said there will be by the time the first shipment is made in 1989.

**Marcos' money earns Pulitzer award**

NEW YORK (AP) — The Miami Herald, The Philadelphia Inquirer, and The New York Times each won two Pulitzer Prizes on Thursday, and the San Jose (Calif.) Mercury News was honored for exposing transfers of wealth by deposed Philippine President Ferdinand Marcos.

The Denver Post won the public service award for a report that revealed that most missing children are involved in custody disputes or are runaway. The report "helped mitigate national fears stirred by exaggerated statistics," the Pulitzer jury said.

The Pulitzer, for investigative reporting was won by Jeffrey A. Marx and Michael M. York of the Lexington (Ky.) Herald-Leader for a series exposing cash payoffs to University of Kentucky basketball players.

The Pulitzer for national reporting was split by The Dallas Morning News and The Philadelphia Inquirer. Knight-Ridder Newspapers Inc. won seven awards Thursday, including those won by the Inquirer and The Miami Herald. The two that went to the Inquirer were that newspaper's ninth and 10th awards since 1975. Other Knight-Ridder winners were the Herald-Leader, the San Jose (Calif.) Mercury News and the St. Paul (Minn.) Pioneer Press and Dispatch.

"Lonesome Dove," Larry McMurtry's sweeping novel of the American West, won the Pulitzer for fiction. There was no drama award given for the 13th year since the Prizes were established in 1917.

"I've always been stimulated by the American West," McMurtry said Thursday. "I grew up in it. I traveled across it very extensively. And my imagination is affected by the American West, by the landscape and the conditions that this creates for the people that live on the landscape."

New York Daily News columnist Jimmy Breslin won the Pulitzer for commentary that "consistently championed ordinary citizens," the Pulitzer board said.

The Times won Pulitzers for explanatory journalism and music criticism; and a Times reporter and a former Times fictioner split the award for general non-fiction. The Times awards raised its number of Pulitzers to 56, more than three times as many as any other newspaper.

Times reporter Joseph Lelyveld won for his book "Move Your Shadow: South Africa Black and White" and J. Anthony Lukas, the former Times reporter, won for "Common Ground: A Turbulent Decade in the Lives of Three American Families."

The Times' Donal J. Henahan was cited for his music criticism.

Miami Herald photographers Carol Guzy and Michel DuCille won for their photographs "of devastation caused by the eruption of Nevado del Ruiz volcano in Colombia."

The Mercury News series on Marcos and his associates, by Lewis Simons, Pete Carey and Katherine Ellison, "had a direct impact on subsequent political developments in the Philippines, and in the United States," the jury said.

The series also won a George Polk award for international reporting. Breslin also won a Polk award for his reports on allegations of police torture.

The Dallas Morning News' Craig Flournoy and George Hoarig received the national Pulitzer for their report on subsidizing housing. The reporters uncovered patterns of racial discrimination and segregation in public housing across the United States and spurred significant reforms, the Pulitzer jury said.

The Inquirer's Arthur Howe was cited for "his enterprising and indefatigable reporting on massive deficiencies in Internal Revenue Service processing of tax returns — reporting that eventually inspired major changes in IRS procedures and prompted the agency to make a public apology to U.S. taxpayers."

The prize for specialized reporting was won by Andrew Schneider and Mary Pat Flaherty of The Pittsburgh Press for their investigation of problems in the nation's organ transplantation system.

The prize for feature writing was awarded to John Camp of the St. Paul (Minn.) Pioneer Press and Dispatch for a series on how the American farm family was dealing with the worst agricultural crisis since the Depression.

Jack Fuller of the Chicago Tribune won the Pulitzer for editorial reporting for his discussion of constitutional issues, and Jules Feiffer of the New York Village Voice won the award for editorial cartooning.

Tom Gralish of the Philadelphia Inquirer won the feature photography award for his pictures of the city's homeless.

In the arts categories, the Pulitzer for biography was awarded to "Louise Bogan: A Portrait," by Elizabeth Frank. The history prize went to "The Heavens and the Earth: A Political History of the Space Age," by Walter A. McDougall.

"The Flying Change," by Henry Taylor, won the poetry award, while "Wind Quilts IV," by George Perle won for music.

Each winning entry received \$1,000, except for the public service category, which carries a gold medal.

**San Francisco recalls day of 1906 earthquake**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Eight-year-old Sai Raphael was jolted from his bed at 5:12 a.m. on April 18, 1906, and his parents and 10 brothers dashed into the street to find friends and neighbors reeling from the "Great Quake."

"Hundreds of people were out there as if in a daze, not knowing what to do or where to go," Raphael recalled in an interview.

The quake struck 80 years ago today, destroying much of San Francisco. It would be several months before San Francisco would return to normal.

Unreinforced masonry buildings collapsed, and water and sewer lines broke all over the city. More than 2,000 people died, some 2,800 homes were destroyed and more than 225,000 of San Francisco's 400,000 residents were left homeless as fires raged through the rubble. Damage reached \$400 million.

"At night it was such a sight to see all the flames burning over our beloved city," Raphael said. "It's just something you never forget."

The survivors and students of the disaster look back 80 years with a mixture of fear, awe, courage and pride. And they celebrate.

They will participate in the annual painting of Lotta's fountain, the only fire hydrant in the city that was still service after the quake. They will also take a ferry cruise around San Francisco Bay, in a tribute to vessels that transported homeless San Franciscans to Oakland and other communities.

A traditional fireman's ball will be held Saturday in the City Hall rotunda, which collapsed in the quake.

The quake struck along the sensitive San Andreas Fault line, and measured 8.3 on the Richter scale.

Dennis J. Sullivan, 88, remembers the quake "shook the hell out of us," but said his family of seven was lucky. They only had to move out of their home and into an emergency camp for a week.

"The people were different then, (there was) more of a comradeship," he said. "There was no crime, everyone knew each other and everyone was in the same boat."

"Everybody had their stoves out on the sidewalk. It was unbelievable," he said. "That went on for over a month."

City Archivist Gladys Hansen knows the grim side of the story as well. Her research helped to raise the official earthquake death toll from 700 to 2,010. The lower figure may have been the result of confusion at the time and a loss of records, said Ms. Hansen.

# Oil talks stuck over production levels

GENEVA (AP) — Unable to reach agreement but unwilling to give up, OPEC oil ministers broke off a third day of talks Thursday and asked their technical advisers to suggest ways of ending the oil price slump.

In a replay of the cartel's lengthy and fruitless deliberations last month, the ministers were stuck on the tricky question of whether and how to reimpose controls on their oil production, according to officials from several delegations.

The cartel's unrestrained oil output has contributed to a glut of world supplies that has led to the recent collapse of prices. Other factors include reduced world consumption, through conservation and fuel-switching, along with the development of new major sources, such as Mexico, Alaska, and the North Sea.

Ministers from the 13 members of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries were so sharply divided that they could not even

agree on the outlook for oil demand this summer, sources said.

The ministers had little to say to reporters as they drifted, mostly glum-faced, out of the Geneva hotel where they began their deliberations Tuesday. The atmosphere in many of the delegations was decidedly downbeat.

"They don't even have an agenda," said one Arab delegate, speaking on condition he not be identified.

James Audu, a cartel spokesman, told reporters the ministers had asked their technical advisers to study the entire range of questions related to oil demand and supply, and ways to push up prices. The advisers met Thursday evening and were to report back to the full ministerial conference on Friday.

Elwan Lukman, the oil minister of Nigeria, confirmed that the advisers had been asked to

start from scratch with proposals to break the OPEC deadlock.

"They have a free hand" to make whatever recommendations they wish, Lukman said.

The oil market seemed to be in a holding pattern, as OPEC's stalemate, which it had widely anticipated, continued.

On the New York Mercantile Exchange, May contracts for the main U.S. crude rose 40 cents a 42-gallon barrel to close at \$11.83. The price had fallen \$1.27 a barrel on Wednesday.

Prices in the European market also were little changed.

Joseph Stanislaw, who follows OPEC and oil markets for the consulting firm of Cambridge Energy Research Associates, said Thursday that he saw little chance of OPEC agreeing this week on a comprehensive strategy for combating the oil price slump.

# Botha says Athens halts death squad

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha said Thursday that a dozen black South Africans — trained as assassins by Libya — had been arrested and prevented from boarding a jetliner in Athens, Greece, for southern Africa.

Botha told Parliament in Cape Town that the 12, previously reported to be Libyans, belonged to a small band of South African Moslems who "have committed themselves ... to terror and violence."

Nine of the 12 turned away from the flight to Zimbabwe were from Cape Town, the heart of South Africa's Moslem community, and were travelling on South African passports, Botha said.

## Children called 'special targets'

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — white-minority regime, said a report issued by the Lawyers Committee for Human Rights, based in New York.

The other three carried passports from black African nations and were members of the outlawed African National Congress and the Pan Africanist Congress, he added. He did not say what happened to the 12 terrorists after they were turned back in Athens.

In the black homeland of Transkei, a bomb exploded Thursday morning in a government office building in the capital of Umtata, wounding four people and shattering windows.

# Svetlana due to reappear before long

CHICAGO (AP) — Josef Stalin's daughter Svetlana Alliluyeva has returned to the United States, which she criticized when she defected back to the Soviet Union after 17 years in the West.

Her whereabouts Thursday remained a mystery. But her ex-husband, William Wesley Peters, said in Scottsdale, Ariz., she was expected to surface shortly.

Miss Alliluyeva, 60, arrived at Chicago's O'Hare Airport on Wednesday on a flight from Zurich, said Charles Macberry, spokeswoman for the U.S. Customs Service at the airport.

Ms. Mayberry said she had no information on any connecting flights Miss Alliluyeva may have taken, or where she was.

Her former husband "is not at liberty to give out information as to the whereabouts of his ex-wife and he expects that she will make this information available shortly," said Terence Teames, secretary to Peters, the chief architect at Tallent West, an architectural institute.

Miss Alliluyeva and Peters, Olga's father, were married in 1970 and divorced in 1973, two years after their daughter was born.

Miss Alliluyeva's departure from the Soviet Union came one day after her American-born daughter, Olga Peters, left to return to the Quakerboarding school she had attended in England before the move to Moscow.

"Olga, who had never been in the Soviet Union before 1964, said Wednesday that her "reunion" with English teachers and schoolmates that her mother regretted interrupting her education and taking her off to the Soviet Union.

Miss Alliluyeva, who defected in India in 1967 and spent most of the next 17 years in the United States.

## Long-time Lionel collector hooks up deal for company

DETROIT (AP) — A real estate developer who has long collected toy trains has announced plans to buy the Lionel Train division of Kenner Parker Toys Inc. Terms of the deal between Richard P. Kughn, of Detroit, and the Beverly, Mass., company weren't released in a joint announcement Tuesday, they said they expected the deal to be completed within weeks.

"I often thought, 'Gee wouldn't it be great to own the company and I can just walk in and pick anything off the shelf and put it on my layout,'" said the 56-year-old Kughn. "Now that I own the company, I can't do that. I have to pay for it."

He said his boyhood collection has grown to thousands of pieces worth about a million dollars in all, Kughn said.

Lionel trains are manufactured by about 300

workers in Mount Clemens, 20 miles north of Detroit.

The company was founded in 1900 when Joshua Lionel Cowen, a 20-year-old inventor, concealed a small electric motor and a battery under a model wooden flat car and sent it traveling around a small circle of brass track.

The company was sold by the Lionel family in 1970 and since then has passed through several hands.

Lionel's model trains, once considered kid stuff, have become collectibles, with some individual pieces valued in the thousands of dollars.

Model trains compete with a variety of high-tech toys, but Kughn said the Lionel is here to stay.

"The interest in training, if you will, whether it be real trains or toy trains, is something I think is going to remain as a piece of Americana," he said.

## German architect wins top prize

NEW YORK (AP) — Gottfried Boehm of West Germany, a father, son and husband of architects who has tried over four decades to connect the old and the new in his own designs, was named winner Thursday of the 1986 Pritzker Prize for architecture.

Boehm, 66, the eighth winner of the world's top architecture award, received a check for \$100,000.

Boehm is "as little known in the United States as he is well known in Europe," said Brendan Gill, secretary of the Pritzker jury.

Most of the town halls, churches, theaters, museums and public hous-

ing he has designed are in Germany.

In a brief acceptance speech, Boehm complained that new highways and building complexes have disrupted and divided the world's cities.

"Our cities do not need just new buildings, but buildings that help make connections," Boehm said. "What we need is a city in which all its parts connect."

He said Manhattan, Paris and Rome are places where "all buildings have something in scale and material and structure to go together." In many newer cities and towns, he said, "we have mostly

separated parts."

The Pritzker jury cited Boehm's recognition of "the nourishment that traditional ways and means, handed down from one generation to the next, provide in architecture."

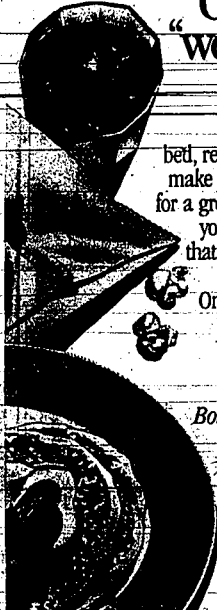
"The elements of his work which suggest the past also bear witness to his ready acceptance of the latest and best in our contemporary technology," the jury said.

Boehm lives and works in Cologne, He began his practice in 1947 working for his father, who was known for church designs. In 1948 he married an architect, and three of the couple's four sons are architects.

## 'Wanderer' still on his road home

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — An American known as "The Wanderer," who tramped across the Bering Strait to Soviet territory and was sent home again is apparently still wandering.

After Soviet military officials sent John Weymouth, 33, back to Alaska by helicopter, he was booked aboard a United Airlines flight to his hometown of San Francisco Wednesday night, but he never boarded the plane at Anchorage.

His mother, Estelle Barrett, sister of newspaper columnist Herb Caen, was waiting for him at San Francisco International Airport with other relatives.

"He was booked and made a positive reservation," said Lynn Hales, duty manager at San Francisco International Airport. "But he never got on the plane at Anchorage."

Hales said he called United Airlines personnel in Anchorage and they told him Weymouth "never been checked in."

Alaska state troopers searched the airport but could find no sign of the Anchorage airport.

Weymouth was dubbed "The Wanderer" by people he met as he walked across the mostly roadless tracts of western Alaska. "People said he generally kept to himself, working odd jobs to earn enough money to keep moving on."

"I have his mother 20 feet away from me. I don't know where he is," Hales said late Wednesday.

Weymouth, carrying a backpack and sleeping bag, walked across 3 miles of rugged and broken pack ice of the Bering Strait on April 12 from the Alaskan island of Little Diomedede to the Soviet Big Diomedede Island.

## 2 hydropower plant projects surface in area

TWIN FALLS — Although the Idaho Public Utility Commission's new rates for area engineers and businessmen as too low for many small hydropower projects, at least two projects have emerged in the Magic Valley since the new levels were announced.

Bonneville Pacific, a Utah-based company, has approached Idaho Power for a sales contract on a small hydropower project on the Low-Line Canal near Kimberly. The 2,900-kilowatt project is less than half the size of an existing project on the canal, located

about 4.4 miles east of the proposed plant, says Dean Anderson, with the Bonneville Pacific office in Salt Lake City.

Anderson said the company began "re-juvenating" its plans for a site after the PUC came out with new rates for cogenerated power. The firm is expecting to have its exemption approved by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission "at any time," he added.

"That's one plant we feel we'll be able to do at the new rates," Anderson said. The PUC rate levels offer an average price of 1.7 cents per kilowatt hour for plants coming on line this year and an average of 4.7 cents per kilowatt hour for plants coming on line in 1987.

Anderson said the new plant planned for the Low Line would depend on water from the Twin Falls Canal Company. The plant would operate only when water runs in the canal, he explained, and would be subject to irrigation needs.

The new PUC rates, however, set a level of 5.29 cents per kilowatt hour (higher than the average rate) for electricity available from June to September — a plus for facilities associated with canal companies because canals usually have their highest flow during that time.

In other cogeneration activities in the Magic Valley, a group known as the Salmon Falls Creek Associates have petitioned the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission for

a preliminary permit to do feasibility studies for a possible small hydropower plant at the Salmon Falls Dam.

The group is composed of doctors and lawyers from Idaho, Utah, and Nevada, according to Jordan Walker, a consulting engineer with Great Western Power and Light in Mant, Utah. Great Western is performing the consulting work on the project.

According to information from the group, the plant would use the Salmon Falls Canal Company's dam and run water through a 1,000-foot penstock to a 4,702-kilowatt generating unit.

Walker said the group has not yet talked to local officials of canal company representatives about the project. If studies show

that the project is feasible, however, he said they will make an appointment to talk with canal company officials.

"The bottom line is that nobody wants to become involved with a project that's going to have a negative cash flow," Walker said. If the plant is feasible, Walker said, it could give an added source of income to the canal company.

Walker cautioned, however, that their permit request is only for permission to study the site. The process for getting approval for actual construction "is an extremely long one," he said.

"The preliminary permit doesn't give us the authority to do anything (construction). We still have an awful lot of gates to go through," he said.

## TFEA status surveyed

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls Education Association is testing itself to see if anyone cares. On Thursday, a four-member evaluation team from the Idaho Education Association and the National Education Association concluded interviews with more than 50 community leaders.

The group talked to Twin Falls City Council members, local businessmen, school board members, principals, teachers, and news media people to determine whether the association is on the road to extinction or rejuvenation.

"There will be a little heat, but maybe we need it," said TFEA President Ray Grubbs. "If we're not meeting the needs of the community and teachers and we need to change, then we need to know that."

The three-day scrutinizing process was requested by TFEA party because of a drop in membership this year, members said. Membership dropped from 195 last year to 157 in October. Just over half of the district's 315 teachers joined.

The evaluation was conducted by two state IEA people, Helen Little with the NEA in California, and Terry Hart, IEA's Region IV director in Twin Falls.

Gilbert said he did not know if the results would be made public.

"I think the fact that the association is willing to open itself up to criticism is a mark of maturity," Gilbert said.

Only two other such evaluations have been requested by education groups in the state, Gilbert said. One was completed for teachers in Emmett, and Coeur d'Alene teachers requested one last year.

The evaluation comes as Twin Falls teachers prepare to begin contract negotiations with the School Board in May.

TEFA representatives said last week that contract talks could be concluded in one night if the board chooses, since there are only four issues on the bargaining table and the Legislature left districts little money to maneuver with.

## Bargain hunters cull Weed Bureau auction

TWIN FALLS — Adding machines selling for \$2.50 each at a Twin Falls County auction of Thursday were a bargain Arnold Pruett of Boise couldn't ignore.

"So he bought 15 of them. Even if the machines don't work or are out-of-date, they still were a good buy to Pruett, who said he will get his money's worth tinkering with them.

The auction was held at the office of the now-defunct Twin Falls County Weed Bureau, a victim of budgetary belt-tightening, and much of its equipment was sold. Trucks, spray rigs and pumps from the

bureau's weed-spraying operation were cleared out, along with other county odds-and-ends, such as the adding machines, floor cleaners, desks, exit signs, patrol cars, minus kitchens and insignias; also were on the list.

The auction drew a large crowd, many bundled against the cold and sipping steaming hot drinks. Several milled about, poking under car hoods, inspecting tires or glancing at old toiles on the auction block.

"We're not selling anything the county can use," County Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said. In fact, a set of glass doors intended for sale were withdrawn at the last minute because county officials contemplated installing them in another county building.

But there was more for sale, including air conditioners, trucks, a tractor, motorcycles and even kitchen sinks. Two sheriff's patrol cars, minus kitchens and insignias; also were on the list.

Alumni of the old O'Leary Junior High School, located next to the County Courthouse until the county purchased and demolished it, might have recognized their old wire gymnasium lockers, pieces from the sprinkler system, fire extinguishers and even some chairs from the auditorium.

"I probably sat in a few of those chairs," Hempleman said.

Some items were more popular than others. The four-wheel-drive spray rigs went

fast and for thousands of dollars.

But it took time and encouragement from Wall Auctioneers to sell a microfilm reader and printer. One auctioneer started with a \$100 bid and ended with, "Who'll give \$10 for that rascol?"

Artist Gary Stone finally purchased the device with the intention of donating it to a local library.

Auction proceeds, the total of which was not available at presstime, will be placed in the county's general fund, Hempleman added.

Through the day, the pace of the auctioning was as brisk as the weather. And, for those who came late or didn't raise their hand in time, it was going, going, gone.

## GOP caucus draws teachers

TWIN FALLS — Despite their organization's traditional alignment with the Democratic Party, a few members of the Idaho Education Association (IEA) met for a Republican teachers caucus at the IEA's annual delegate assembly in Boise last weekend.

IEA president Joyce Raasch said Wednesday that about 22 teachers from northern and southern Idaho and from Boise met with Rep. Pam Bengson, a Boise Republican, to discuss getting involved in the Republican Party in Idaho.

That meeting was the first time there has been a Republican teachers caucus in addition to the minority and women's caucuses at the annual meeting of IEA delegates, Raasch said. There haven't been Democratic caucuses, she said, but for some reason the Democratic Party has been easier for teachers to get involved with.

"For too long, usually they have just identified with one party and this is a way to encourage the rank-and-file members to become involved," said Bengson. "Basically, the people that were there identified with the Republican Party and wanted to know how to get involved," Bengson said. She said she was there to offer open arms to teachers wanting to get into Republican politics.

Raasch said teachers need to get more politically active in general. "This definitely is a bi-partisan organization. Since every education

decision is political, we need to get involved," she said.

"The whole idea of it was to urge the Republican teachers to get involved in their local party politics," said Raasch, who has been involved in Republican campaigns of members of her family.

She said she was surprised by a recent poll of IEA members that indicated one-third were Democrats, one-third Republicans, and one-third independents. She was surprised because the population of the state is about 60 percent Republican and 40 percent Democratic.

"Republican teachers have not been as active in Republican politics, so you haven't been as aware of it and as a result, many of the Republican politicians have not been as aware of educational issues," said Raasch.

## Jerome school levy upped; election set

JEROME — With one board member casting a negative vote, the Jerome School Board upped its proposed supplemental levy figure by \$10,000 Thursday night and set the levy election for May 8.

The special meeting was called for Thursday after several patrons of the district said the \$195,000 proposed supplemental funding announced Monday night was too skimpy and would still leave the district in need in many areas.

One of the objections voiced last Monday was to the plan to make the high school athletic director's job part-time to save expenses. The board announced Athletic Director Jon Jund will teach three hours per day in the classroom in addition to serving as head of the athletic department.

Thursday night, as well as in the Monday session,

several athletic fans argued the move will rob Jerome of its outstanding athletic program and winning sports teams. Board member Ken Baumgartner, who favored funding the athletic director salary, argued against the \$10,000 increase, holding out for \$30,000.

The total \$205,000 proposed levy, if approved by voters, will give the district an opportunity to improve equipment and material for extra-curricular activities from the seventh through the senior year district has to have the supplemental funding of at least \$195,000 for the coming year. He and several trustees said adding salaries or a single salary could defeat the levy request.

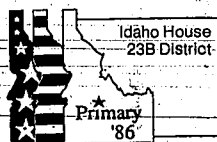
Board members again made it clear that they are not cutting Jund's salary or eliminating his position and that they are not dropping any programs or any other personnel.

## Elk winter range closure lifted

**FAIRFIELD** — The Sawtooth National Forest has announced that it has lifted the elk winter range closure north of Fairfield as of April 15. Much of the snow has melted and the elk are no longer restricted to the lower elevations on the South Fork of the Boise and its tributaries, so the Idaho Department of Fish and Game has ended its feeding program for the season, according to a news release from the U.S. Forest Service. Visitors to the areas are asked to remember that many of the elk are not in good condition after the long winter and that harassment could further weaken them.

Rodriguez was summoned into court on a complaint signed by a 29-year-old Twin Falls woman, charging him with "procurement for prostitution." The woman told police that Rodriguez took her to Burley and on the way told her he wanted to work as a prostitute to make money to pay for her two children. She told police the man slapped her when she objected, so she agreed to work for him in order to avoid further disagreement. He then turned the vehicle around and came back to Twin Falls, telling her he wanted her to get dressed up and "go to work." She said she did not know where he was taking her. The woman and her nine-year-old son, who was with them, jumped out of the car when it slowed down on Kimberly Road. She ran to a nearby business and asked employees to call the police. The woman, reportedly the mother of three children, told police that Rodriguez suggested that

he marry her and that she work as a prostitute to support them.

## Resort calls off car give-away

**FAIRFIELD** — Skiers who entered a contest to win new car last winter at the Solder Mountain ski area can stop waiting for notification that they have won. Adverse weather conditions and the resulting reduction in skiers at the resort have forced owners to abandon the car give-away.

Dean Sangrey, who managed the resort last winter, said there were several weekends of business missed this past season due to road and snow conditions, and the season ended for Solder Mountain unusually early. As a result, the owner, Dr. Wallace Wheeler of Idaho, Calif., decided it was not possible to purchase a car for the contest.

Those who participated have lost no more than the chance to win, since the entry in the contest required only an official registration blank available at the resort. Sawtooth National Forest Service officials in Fairfield said there is no violation of the special use permit or other regulations because of abandonment of the contest.

Sangrey said it was the owner's decision to drop the contest when the revenue level failed to meet expectations. The car give-away was a promotional effort to bring additional business to the resort.

## Craters monument drive opens

**ARCO** — The seven-mile loop drive through Craters of the Moon National Monument is now open to travel in both directions. With the exception of one spur road that remains closed because of heavy snowpack, access is now open to all of the major features within the monument.

In many locations, trails are still partially covered by snow. The entrances of some of the caves or lava tubes are still blocked by snow drifts and all visitors should use extreme caution in exploring any areas away from the main road.

Superintendent Bob Scott also said that it would be at least two more weeks before all of the snow melts and the monument is completely open. Only a few sites in the campground are now open and no facilities or services are available. The opening of more sites and water lines will not occur until sometime in May.

# Firewood cutting time nears

**TWIN FALLS** — While the season for firewood-stoves and fireplaces may be rapidly drawing to a close, the season for firewood cutting will soon be getting underway.

Firewood cutting permits for the Burley- and Twin Falls Ranger districts will go on sale May 19. Permits will allow individuals to cut up to 10 cords of wood on the Sawtooth National Forest. Cutting areas are expected to open Memorial Day weekend, weather and road conditions permitting.

Permit sales for the northern part of the forest will begin around the first part of June. The start of actual cutting in the north will depend on

when the roads are dry enough to prevent damage from loaded trucks. The minimum price for a permit this year will be \$20. This basic permit will allow individuals to cut up to 10 cords of wood on the Burley- and Twin Falls Ranger districts, and on the Sawtooth National Recreation Area south of Galena summit.

Additional wood, up to a maximum of 10 cords, will cost \$10 per cord, according to John Robetsek, Sawtooth Forest lumber management officer. On other areas of the forest, such as the Fairfield Ranger District and

the SNRA north of Galena summit, Robetsek said that a basic permit will allow firewood cutters to cut four cords of wood. Additional cords in those areas will cost \$5 per cord, up to a maximum of 10 cords.

The fees are higher than last year's, a move which the Forest Service believes is necessary to make the firewood program cost effective. According to the Forest Service, the supply of accessible firewood has also decreased, which has added additional costs to the program, such as new access routes.

# Oakley Scouts plant 3,500 trees

**TWIN FALLS** — Last Saturday a group of Boy Scouts from Oakley and members of the Twin Falls Fish and Wildlife Conservation Corps joined forces with ranchers from the Oakley area to plant 3,500 trees along four miles of Beaverdam Creek in the South Hills of the Sawtooth National Forest.

The project was a continuation of the Corps' efforts last year when more than 3,700 trees were planted along eight miles of the stream. The project was conceived by rancher Ray C. Bedke, president of the Wild Rose Grazing Association which grazes cattle in the area. According to a news release from the Sawtooth National Forest, Bedke started the private-sector involvement is needed to improve range conditions on public land.

Prior to settlement, most Sawtooth Idaho streams flowed through meadow-like areas bordered by cottonwood, willows and other trees. Overgrazing, however, took

its toll, turning many once-clear streams with productive fisheries into sediment-laden streams.

But over the past few years the general public, ranchers, and the Forest Service have all become interested in improving the condition of public rangeland — particularly streamside, or riparian areas.

In addition to providing a substantial share of wildlife forage, riparian areas are especially important to fish and wildlife.

He said Stoker and Folsking "couldn't possibly be part of the answer," he said. "I think that because Stoker is a member of the Legislature that is part of the problem and Folsking is no different from Silvers. Silvers endorsed Folsking when he announced he would run again."

Remaley said he will support statewide day-care licensing, increased education funding, tax reform, and state action to develop new markets for commodities. "Education is underfunded and Idaho voters will support increased taxes for higher teacher salaries as an investment — in the future," Remaley said. "Sometimes we have to sacrifice a little today so that tomorrow we'll have a better economy," he said.

All four of Remaley's children are teachers and two are married to teachers. Remaley has bachelor's degrees in education and divinity. "Let's put our emphasis on programs, on teaching, using the money

we have to obtain the very best teachers possible," he said. "I think that salaries have to be raised, I think when we raise salaries, we can require better-trained teachers."

He said he did not mean to say Idaho teachers are not already well-trained. "The best teaching situation is one-on-one," he said. "The Legislature's decision this winter to spend \$3 million on college and state teacher trainings was a bad one," he said. "It's nice to have nice buildings, but I feel the program is much more important," he said.

To increase pay for teachers, Remaley said, the new pay scale should be permanent and sales tax exemptions and loop-bones ought to be eliminated. He did not say specifically which exemptions should be closed.

Remaley said he would be open to suggestions that the sales tax be broadened to include services or to proposals that taxes be added on liquor and cigarettes. "On other issues recently before the Idaho legislature, Remaley said: • Day care licensing ought to be administered statewide, not town-by-town, he said. • He opposes a state-sponsored

lottery on moral grounds, but would like to allow citizens to approve or disapprove a lottery if he was convinced they wanted one.

• Idaho's local drinking age ought to be raised to 21 because statistics indicate it makes highway safer.

# Universities get their fee increases

MOSCOW — The Idaho Board of Education has suspended its 10 percent cut in intercollegiate athletic funding and authorized the three state universities to increase student fees without board approval.

The action came Thursday after the board's Finance Committee recommended that no intercollegiate athletics fee increases be approved this year.

The plan, as proposed by the board's staff, allows the University

of Idaho, Idaho State University and Boise State University to increase all fees up to a level not to exceed the institutional maintenance fee plus 10 percent, or the request of the institution, whichever is lower.

The board went through considerable parliamentary maneuvering and debate before approving the plan.

University representatives said their budgets were tight and could not be drawn tighter.

UI officials said further cutbacks could mean a loss of Big Sky Conference membership.

"The well from the boosters is dry," said BSU president John Keiser.

UI-president Richard-Gibb said, "None of us likes to recommend a fee increase." The UI has not boosted fees for six years, Gibb said.

Gibb suggested the board consider smaller, annual increases rather than large increases every few years.

Student representatives from UI and BSU objected to the increases. "It's time students were given a

break," said UI student-body president Gino White.

Annette Markham, vice president of the ISU student body, said it would be difficult to convince students that higher fees were needed, but thought it could be done, and the student government supported the decision.

Roberta Fields, finance committee chairwoman, told the board that the cost of education is getting out of hand and some students can't afford their existing fees.

The board approved appropriations of \$666,000 in state funds for

athletic programs at Idaho, Idaho State and Boise State, and \$248,000 at Lewis-Clark State College, which did not ask for fee increases.

No action was taken on the issue of part-time student fees.

Under the board's resolution, BSU had asked for \$17 increases per semester, but could charge an additional \$35. ISU asked for \$41.25 per semester, but could charge \$55.75, while UI had asked for \$23, but could only hike fees by \$15 because of the provision limiting fees to no more than 10 percent of the institutional maintenance fee.

## Trustees decide Jund must teach part-time

JEROME — Jerome High School Athletic Director Jon Jund received lots of compliments in a special Thursday Jerome School Board meeting, but members did not reverse the previously announced plans that will reduce his administrative position to part-time.

With the exception of Trustee Ken Baumgartner, the board members said they have strong objections to including any salary money in a special override levy election that will be put to a vote May 8 in the Jerome School District.

Baumgartner said calls he has received since a Monday night meeting, when the issue of Jund's position was discussed for some three hours, have nearly all been in favor of increasing the special levy to maintain the athletic director position on a full-time basis. The board increased the levy figure by 10,000, but earmarked it strictly for extracurricular program equipment.

The board voted a month ago to place Jund, who is also the school's head football coach, in the classroom for three periods

per day and keep him as athletic director during the remainder of the day.

School board members said nobody in Jerome would argue the fact Jund has done an outstanding job, but he said he has not done it without the help of a lot of other good coaching talent in the high school. Trustees Jim Cobble and Ben Neft said it all comes down to a matter of finances and their constituents have voiced concern about growing expenses and limited budgets.

One Jerome booster committee member asked if the board would fill the position with a full- or part-time director if Jund leaves. Board members said they have not gotten to that situation or time. Another booster drew some sharp comments from Chairman Nancy Churchman and Cobble when he accused the board of trying to "crucify" Jund.

Jund's 1985 football team won the state Class A-2 high school football championship. In his five years as athletic director at Jerome High, the school has also won a state cross country championship, a state tennis championship and three state track championships.

They led 33-23 after the opening 12 minutes and built a 67-45 advantage by halftime. At the end of the third period, they held a 97-76 advantage.

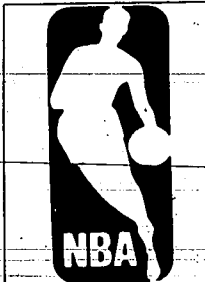
As a measure of the Lakers' dominance, the Spurs had just four individual rebounds in the first half — and zero in the second quarter.

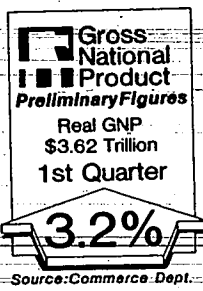

## Low inflation helps U.S. economy rebound

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy, helped by an improved trade performance and the lowest inflation rate in almost two decades, expanded at a healthy annual rate of 3.2 percent from January through March, the government reported Thursday.



Growth in the inflation-adjusted gross national product was four times faster than in October-December period, but economists were split over whether the upturn signified the long-awaited rebound is under way.

The Reagan administration and some private economists said the GNP report showed the first beneficial effects from steep

declines in oil prices and interest rates and a weaker dollar.

Other economists disagreed, arguing that the GNP numbers masked an essentially weak economy that will have trouble reaching the administration's target of 4 percent growth this year.

The Commerce Department said the 3.2 percent growth rate for the GNP, after adjusting for inflation, was the strongest performance since a 3.7 percent rate of increase in the first three months of 1985. Growth slumped to a barely perceptible 0.7 percent rate from October through December.

Before the report was released some economists had worried that growth might well dip below 1 percent in the first quarter. This would have triggered a provision of the

Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget law that would have required Congress to vote on whether to scrap budget cuts for each year so that increased government spending would not further weaken the economy.

The upturn in economic activity came as the rate of inflation posted a dramatic improvement because of falling energy prices.

An inflation index tied to the GNP at \$3.62 trillion hit the first quarter after adjusting for inflation. Before these adjustments, the GNP was expanding at an annual rate of 5.8 percent in the first quarter of the year, compared with a 4.3 percent growth rate in the final three months of 1985.

In a companion report, the government said the corporate after-tax profit rose 4 percent in the first quarter of 1985, down from an earlier estimate of 6 percent.

The GNP report represented the government's first estimate of growth in the January-March quarter. It will be revised in the next two months as more data becomes known. Often in the past, the revisions have substantially altered the initial estimate.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes called the GNP report evidence of "an economy gathering steam on its way toward meeting the administration's 4 percent growth forecast. Last year, the GNP grew a weak 2.2 percent."

Allen Sinai, chief economist for Shearson Lehman Brothers, agreed. "This report is filled with signs of an economy that is perking up," he said. "It is beginning to respond to lower inflation, lower interest rates and the lower dollar."

But Lawrence Chimerine, president of Chase, Econometrics, said the 3.2 percent growth figure "dramatically overstates the underlying strength in the economy." He predicted growth this year will not be much better than last year.

The report showed the GNP growing, after adjusting for inflation, by 3.24 percent at an annual rate in the first quarter. Trade alone contributed \$5.8 billion to the rate of increase as imports, which had been soaring, fell at an annual rate of 3.6 percent while exports, which have been hard hit by the strong dollar, showed an 11.9 percent rate of increase.

Jerry Jasinowski, chief economist for the National Association of Manufacturers, said the trade change resulted from a temporary shift in oil purchases and did not signal a fundamental change in America's appeal for imports for a sustained pickup in demand for U.S. exports.

In addition to the help from trade, other positive factors for GNP growth in the first quarter were consumer spending and residential construction.

The report said personal consumption spending rose at an annual rate of 2.4 billion in the first quarter, although the growth was concentrated in purchases of non-durable goods — those expected to last less than three years.

Spending on durable goods actually fell for the "second" consecutive quarter as auto sales slumped. Residential construction, helped by the steep declines in mortgage rates, shot up at an annual rate of 9.7 percent. But business investment spending fell at an annual rate of 14.4 percent, reflecting the cutback in spending by oil companies in the face of slumping prices.

Another negative factor for overall growth was a big \$32.3 billion decline in the rate of federal buying, reflecting a temporary drop in farm-crop purchases.

Commenting on the disparity between the various positive and negative factors influencing the economy, Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said, "Though we still have some sluggish spots in the economy — the fundamentals — for stepped-up growth and a long-standing expansion are good."

## Stock market keeps on driving to record highs

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market reached record highs Thursday, posting its fourth straight gain, despite some periodic resistance from profit-takers.

Analysts generally were impressed that stock prices kept moving ahead in the face of news that seemed to dampen the chance for further credit by the Federal Reserve.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials rose 7.06 to 1,855.03, bringing its gain over the past four sessions to 64.85 points. Volume on New York Stock Exchange came to 161.40 million shares, against 173.83 million in the

previous session. Analysts said enthusiasm persisted over the performance Wednesday of the stock, bond and oil markets as investors concluded that hostilities between the United States and Libya apparently would not lead to any major financial or economic disruptions.

Stock prices rose sharply as both oil prices and interest rates tumbled.

On Thursday, however, the markets encountered something of an obstacle in the government's report that the gross national product expanded at an annual rate of 3.2 percent, after adjustment for inflation, and seasonal factors, in the first quarter.

That growth, which exceeded most advance estimates on Wall Street, raised some doubts that the Federal Reserve would raise its discount rate in the near future.

BankAmerica climbed 1/4 to 17 1/4. On Wednesday, the company posted its first quarterly profit in a year.

John Blair & Co. jumped 3/4 to 26. MacFadden Holdings, a publishing company, said it expects to make a \$25-a-share offer to acquire Blair.

Digital Equipment, which also came in with substantially higher profits for the quarter, gained 3 1/2 to 177.

Coca-Cola was up 5/8 at 115 1/4. The company has announced higher quarterly earnings and plans for a 3-for-1 stock split.

On the downside, Xerox tumbled 4 1/4 to 61 1/4, on word of lower first-quarter earnings.

Some investors continued to seek out stocks that might benefit from a shift this summer to domestic travel rather than vacations abroad. Wall Street's Co. rose 3/4 to 47 1/4; Ramada Inns 1/4 to 10 1/4.

American Telephone & Telegraph led the active list, up 1/4 at 24 1/4.

## Consider incorporating small business

If you're setting up your first small business, you face at the start a crucial question: Should you or should you not incorporate your fledgling enterprise?

If you're in the planning stages, you and your top advisers (accountant, lawyer, insurance agent) must review thoroughly this decision and its ramifications: Incorporate? Or stay flexible and make that move later, if at all?

You may discover that incorporating is not worth the expense or the effort. In essence, your decision rests on the nature of your enterprise. The kind of business you plan to run will determine:

• The burden: Each state has established its own laws and procedures for incorporating. Some states make the process fairly easy; basically you fill in the papers yourself. Others impose tough requirements.

• The cost: This depends in part on the complexity of the local requirements. The price can range from a few hundred to thousands of dollars. At this early stage in your business, that money may be needed more in other areas.

• The liability involved: Who can be sued, what for and how much.



“One main reason to incorporate is for liability protection. Sylvia Porter, author of 'Small Time Operator,' a manual for small business owners, and a certified public accountant in Laytonville, Calif. “And even that is a really vague area.”

Many small businesses don't expose their owners to any great losses from liability claims; Kamoroff notes, especially home-based businesses. Your homework policy may provide all the coverage you need or, if not, you can buy an endorsement that does provide the coverage.

Study your policy with utmost caution. Your policy might exclude business property in a residence. Many new homeowners policies today, however, do provide \$2,500 in coverage for business property at home, and cover losses of off-premise business property up to \$250.

But if you have employees who are working for you or if you are a professional or if you need liability insurance, you have moved into the realm of commercial insurance needs.

Even if you don't have to run policy, though, you don't have to run policies by general equal, premiums are the same for both types of businesses.

Kamoroff suggests, in fact: “Investigate first the possibility of buying insurance coverage before you decide to incorporate. It's much easier, and probably less expensive.” And when you do buy a policy that provides general comprehensive liability coverage, be sure it is tailored to the size of your business. And be sure, too, that it will cover any legal fees, damages and judgments that stem from a personal injury or product liability claim.

Then, what about incorporating to protect yourself in case of bankruptcy? You don't have to incorporate in the first place. If you have any big creditors, suppliers and the like, bankruptcy could be utterly disastrous to you if you are not incorporated. Your personal assets could be seized by creditors up to the limits set by state law.

If you are personally guaranteed repayment of loans or payment of bills as opposed to the corporation, you may still be personally liable. (This is a financial “jungle.”)

In the early years at least, you'll probably save little on taxes by incorporating. If your business takes toll and you start to rake in profits of \$50,000 to \$75,000 or more, though, you might save on taxes by paying in the corporate rate.

Even if you decide not to incorporate now, you can change your mind at any time during the life of your business in response to changing circumstances. There's no pressure to incorporate.

Make your decision only after proper and informed deliberation. Review every angle with the wisest experts you can find.

This single decision can tip your future for or against you. Be wary. Take it easy. Be on guard!

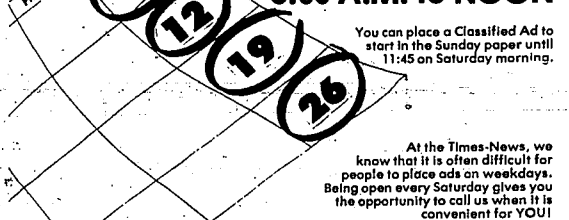

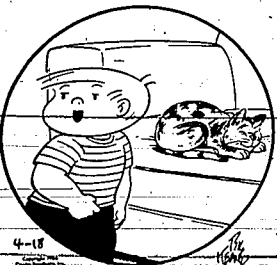

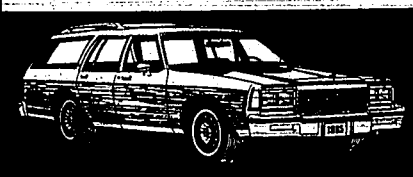

## Indian artist keeps legacy alive

BUHL — Children and adults alike tend to get wide-eyed when the six-foot-six Ken "Rainbow Cougar" Edwards strides into the room, brads falling upon his chest of drum clenched firmly in hand.

Edwards, a member of the Colville Confederated Tribes from Washington State, has been entertaining at schools in the Magic Valley this week and last, telling some of the more than 1,000 stories he says he learned by traveling to 45 Indian reservations throughout the United States.

He will give presentations for adults at The Heart Gallery at 230 N. 11th, Buhl, tonight and tomorrow from 7-9 p.m. This evening's program will focus on Indian prophecies, Bigfoots and myths; Saturday's will cover stories on the medicine peoples. A family presentation Sunday from 1:30-3 p.m. will deal with myths, legends, songs and morality stories. Reservations are required.

Saturday Edwards will give two free presentations at the Buhl Public Library: one for youngsters up to third grade at 1:30 p.m., another for fourth- to seventh-graders at 2:30 p.m.

An artist as well as storyteller, he holds an associate degree from the Institute of American Indian Arts, in Santa Fe, N.M., was selected to exhibit at the First National Indian Art Show in Washington, D.C., and painted the poster for the first Miss Indian USA Pageant.

"I've always wanted to draw and paint things that no one has ever seen," he says. "That is why my style of art is called surrealism. Indian spirits and shamans are my two favorite subjects."

Shamans and spirits also stand high in his storytelling repertoire. Edwards says that everybody is a medicine man or woman, not just Indians. He says it is not a learned trait, but is something all possess naturally.

"It's your own thing. No two medicine men are alike," he says. "Everybody is a medicine man or woman. Some are dreamers, others healers, and some have ESP or telepathy. Some just tap into it better than others."

"You (Whites) killed most of yours. You killed your helpers burned your witches. Nine million women were killed during the Inquisition."

Edwards says he can tell an Indian story on any subject and is one of the most asked for in

any story about "Bigfoots," as he calls the legendary sasquatch.

"So far in my life I've seen two. One was a teenager and one was a little boy," he says. "That's one of the easiest stories to tell because everybody has a conception of Bigfoots."

The storyteller doesn't like the popular conception of sasquatch as either a myth or a beast. "It's not like that. It's real," he says. "We (Indians) know what Bigfoots are because we've lived with them for thousands of years. There's a difference between fur and hair. They have hair. They can talk English. They can talk Indian."

He also dispels the notion that Bigfoots are only eight to ten feet tall. "Those are kids," he says. "Most sightings are by roads or houses. Their (sassaquatch children) parents tell them not to go near human's roads or houses." Then, a broad smile crossing his face, Edwards asks, "So, do you know why they go there?"

As with many of his stories, this one ends with a moral and humor. Obviously, he explains, kids always do the opposite of what their parents want — even Bigfoots kids.

Humor is a mainstay with the storyteller. Asked recently by a young student if he still takes scalps, Edwards answered, "Only on weekends."

## Male dancer leads belly dancing show

TWIN FALLS — The term "belly dancing" conjures up an image of hips swaying to exotic music. And, during the Middle East belly dancing show at the Turf Club Saturday at 7 p.m., the audience will see this movement, along with beautiful arm work and fancy turns, executed by a man named Aziz.

Also performing will be He-Tep-Ta (peaceful earth), a local troupe; the Rasheda troupe from Boise, which will feature a dance with a box construction; and Alfredo, a dancer from Florida.

He-Tep-Ta spokeswoman Connie Jones Olander says Aziz began his career about 15 years ago, after being inspired by a performance he attended in California.

"At the time," Olander says, "there weren't that many male Middle Eastern belly dancers, and I think it was a real challenge for him to overcome that."

She says not all Middle Eastern dance is meant to be performed by a woman. There is the decidedly masculine side of it, also.

"In some parts of the dance — as a matter, I'd love to look just like him, and in other parts of the dance, he's careful to not become feminine," she says.

Aziz resides in Salt Lake City, but travels throughout the United States giving workshops and performances. The He-Tep-Ta troupe goes to Salt Lake once or twice a year to receive instructions from him.

Olander says his performances cause quite a stir among the women

in his audiences. To express appreciation at the end of his presentations, they often put dollar bills in his belt. She says belly dancers like the audience to be part of what's going on. There are other ways to participate, and before the dances begin, they are told how to do so.

"You don't have to just sit there and watch. You can whistle — you can clap — you can make certain Arab sounds. You don't feel so struc-

"Many of our tribal dancers are totally robed, and wear a headdress, and the whole bit. You couldn't have more clothes on if you were in Alaska," she says.

"There are costumes which so totally engulf the dancer, their eyes are all the audience can see. And, of course for some dances, two-piece outfits are worn, along with coins and a veil."

The He-Tep-Ta troupe is careful to present the dances in an artistic way, and there are ways to do the moves, to make them erotic or exotic. "It's sensual," Olander says. "It can be a real sensual kind of dance — a beautiful dance. It depends on who's looking at it, and what they're looking for."

In Middle Eastern dance, tribal and folk dances depict in a traditional way a certain part of the culture. In the more free-form cabaret style, there are always new dances.

"As people travel to the Middle East," she says, "they pick up what is new there, and the people here who travel around the United States develop their own artistic style. So, one-half of it is something that is progressive, and the other half is just sort of a historical set of dances."

She says, although they call themselves belly dancers so people will know what kind of dance will be performed, they dislike the name. The correct, but unfamiliar to most people, names for this dance form are Raks Sharki or Danse Orientale.

They also call it good exercise. Olander says it is physically demanding, and there are certain muscle



# 'The Hitchhiker' takes a cheap ride as rehash of thrillers

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**THE HITCHER (R)**, A cheap, easy rehash of "Duel" and "The Hitchhiker" — along with dabs of "Halloween," "Jackson County Jail" and "Straw Dogs," laced with a lot of dumb-or-calling-grand-guignol: For 90 minutes we watch psychopathic boogymen Ruter Hauer toy with hapless C. Thomas Howell, whose behavior is so brainless it is a

wonder he lasts 10 minutes. Director Robert Harmon gives it some paranoid style, but you wonder if this one will work on anyone except people scared of loud noises and strange thumps. (The dialogue would strangle them.)

**THE MONEY PIT (PG)**, Overly elaborate special-effects-and-a-less-than-inspired plot trip up what might have been a turner comedy about a couple coping with the hazards of trying to remodel a Long

Island mansion. With Tom Hanks, Shelley Long, Alexander Godunov, Maureen Stapleton.

**MURPHY'S ROMANCE (R)**, A contemporary Western romance — a June-November courtship comedy that is also a moral fable about making the right choices: bright and earthy and solid, just like its stars, Sally Field and James Garner. Martin Ritt blends them cannily: Garner's super-relaxed style, his maverick affability, plays wonderfully against Field's more fully engaged, but undeniably her sexiest performance. It seems like we are getting the real Ritt here, the real Field and Garner — and, even if we are not,

they are a delightful group to spend an evening with: warm, funny, the salt of the earth.

**POLICE ACADEMY 3: BACK IN TRAINING (PG)**: No worse than "Police Academy 2," which was awful. Steve Guttenberg and other recruits from the hilarious first film are back to help save the academy from becoming a victim of a budget crunch. (Just think, if they fail, there will not be a "Police Academy 4.")

**QUICKSILVER (PG)**: Tom Donnelly's movie about a busted young stock-options trader (Kevin Bacon) losing his nerve and finding it again in the city's underbelly — as part of

a gusty community of bicycle messengers — is high on speed and low on logic. Dodging around with such address — between celebrating the drop-out and celebrating success, it winds up celebrating nothing much at all; except perhaps its own energy, gloss and kitsch.

**WHITE NIGHTS (PG-13)**: Despite the presence of Gregory Hines and, in particular, Mikhail Baryshnikov, this cooked-up, sudsy story of two dancers — each yearning to escape from Russia, is cold, trapped and claustrophobic, managing to do wrong to two cultures and the talents of both men. Only

Baryshnikov's yearning dance of freedom and slavery, to a song by Russian dissident poet Vysotsky, is worthy of his talents.

**WILDCATS (R)**: A good-natured, but superficial comedy — sort of a "Bad News Bears Goes to the Ghetto" — about a spunky female football coach who strives for recognition while taming a delinquent gang of inner-city funksters. Despite a remarkably agile, endearing performance by Goldie Hawn and a tidy, uplifting finale, the film is loaded with so many cardboard figures and ethnic stereotypes that the coach's triumph has the hollow ring of comic melodrama.

## 'The Money Pit' evicts 'Police Academy 3'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Money Pit," a movie about a yuppie couple and their fixer-upper home, nudged "Police Academy 3" from the No. 1 spot Tuesday in weekend box-office gross that dropped significantly from the previous week.

Universal's "Money Pit," starring Tom Hanks and Shelley Long, earned \$3.6 million at 1,180 theaters across the country to claim the top spot for the first time. During its three weeks out, it has earned \$18.8 million.

"Police Academy 3" earned \$3.5 million for Warner Bros. at 1,715 theaters and boosted its four-week gross to \$30.7 million.

But despite changing places, box-office gross for "The Money Pit" and "Police Academy 3" was down 28 percent and 32 percent, respectively.

Movie attendance traditionally drops during the period between spring break and the end of school.

Two new films, "Band of the Hand" and "Off-Beat," both made the Top 10.

"Band of the Hand" from Tri-Star, debuted with \$2.2 million as it made its appearance at 330 theaters and in the No. 3 spot.

Paramount's "Gung Ho" dropped a notch but hung on to claim fourth place in the box office scramble, earning \$2 million at 1,050 theaters and boosting its four-week average to \$26.5 million, but was down 30 percent from last weekend.

"Off-Beat" from Touchstone features Meg Tilly as a female cop and Judge Reinhold as a New York librarian who meet during an audition for a Police Department show.

It took in \$2 million at the box office during its debut weekend, playing on 1,127 screens.

## CSI theater group reads short stories

TWIN FALLS — Literary drama by Ray Bradbury and Shirley Jackson will jump from the pages when the College of Southern Idaho Readers Theatre presents "Oh! Zone" April 24, 25 and 26 at 8:15 p.m. in the Fine Arts Building, room 119.

Directed by Dr. Fran Tanner, professor of speech and drama at CSI, the program begins with Jackson's short story, "The Lottery," then moves on to the Bradbury short stories "The Veldt" and "The Screaming Woman."

Both Bradbury pieces are classics of the science fiction/mystery genre that only the author of "Fahrenheit 451," "The Martian Chronicles" and "Dandelion Wine" could write with such convincing characterization and plot. Bradbury has also written for the original "Alfred Hitchcock Presents" and this year's revival of "The Twilight Zone" on television.

"He is really good for Readers Theatre," says Tanner, adding that his writing lends to the Imagery Readers Theatre strives for. "We chose these stories because there has been so much emphasis lately on 'The Twilight Zone' and 'Hitchcock,'" she says, adding that the students submitted stories that had to go through an elimination process, ending with the three that will be read during "Oh! Zone."

# Deford's story of his daughter's short life tugs viewers' emotions

Call it the "Death Be Not Proud Syndrome." A child becomes terminally ill — brain cancer, leukemia, AIDS — and his or her parent details the tragedy in a novel.

Johnny Gunther started the cycle with "Death Be Not Proud," his classic 1949 book chronicling the life of his son Johnny Jr., who died, at age 17, of an inoperable brain tumor. "Death Be Not Proud" was turned into a critically hailed 1975 TV movie starring Robby Benson.

In 1982, Mary-Lou Weisman penned "Intensive Care: A Family Love Story," a sweeping saga about the life of her son Peter, who died, at age 15, of muscular dystrophy. Last year, Miss Weisman's book was turned into an NBC movie starring Liza Minnelli.

This week, the circle grows wider. On April 23, Craig T. Nelson and Bonnie Bedelia star in "Alex: The Life of a Child." The ABC movie is based on Frank Deford's best-selling 1982 book about his daughter Alexandra Miller, who died at age 8 of cystic fibrosis. (Deford's tome has since been translated into 16 languages.) Alex is played by Gennie James, best-known for her role as Possum Spalding, Sally Field's 6-year-old daughter in the 1984 film "Places in the Heart."

Deford, a well-known sportswriter, claims he wrote "Alex" so that he and his wife Carol "wouldn't forget how she sounded. I knew that if I waited until 1986," he adds, "it would be just as hard to write, but not as good, because I would have forgotten all the little things that made Alex special."

Deford pauses, wiping away a tear. "Alex was not a saint," he says. "With all her flaws and idiosyncrasies, she could be as bitchy as any 5-year-old. There were times she said 'I hate you, Daddy!' But it was the little things — like her love of gaudy jewelry — that made Alex so special. It was the little things that demanded she be kept alive."

The film's executive producer, Leonard Goldberg, agreed Goldberg says he adored the book, and immediately asked his assistant to get him a copy. "I had no idea what the book was about," Goldberg confesses. "I am the No. 1 sports writer at 2 Times-News, Twin Falls, Idaho

cher, and I knew Frank's byline from day, there'll be a cure for cystic fibrosis. I thought this was another one of his sports books."

When Goldberg finished "Alex," he wasn't disappointed. "The book wiped me out emotionally," he recalls, "because it was so positive about life." Goldberg called Deford, and three months later, a deal was made. "I promised Frank," the producer adds, "that I would give Alex the honor she deserved."

And though Deford readily admits he's going to receive criticism for exploiting his daughter, he insists it's an exploitation of which Alex would have approved. "But I'm not exploiting my sorrow," he adds. "I'm just trying to help. Maybe, one

"Then," he adds with a weak smile, "I can finally write a happy chapter."

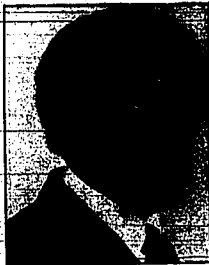

# Duffy set to return to 'Dallas'

AUSTIN, Texas (AP) — Actor Patrick Duffy said last week that sagging ratings for "Dallas" prompted the producers to lure him back to the show a year after his character was presumably killed in a car accident.

But Duffy refused to disclose details of his return to the CBS prime-time soap opera.

"I'm committed to keep it secret because we need the ratings," he said. "I am back and I can't tell you how, when, why and where or what my name will be. I know it, but I can't tell you."

Duffy played Bobby, good-guy brother of nasty J.R. Ewing, on the hit TV show until the end of last

season. On the final show, Bobby was hit by a car and seemed to die in the hospital—when he was taken off a respirator. In this year's shows, he was presumed dead and his grave at Southfork Ranch was occasionally shown.

"I did not ask to come back," Duffy said, adding that ratings problems forced producers to reassess and move back toward the "original character" of the show.

"Dallas," last season's No. 2 show, has slipped to seventh this season. According to A.C. Nielsen Co figures, viewing for the series is off more than 2½ million households.

Duffy spoke at an Austin news conference where he was introduced as

the spokesman for a seat belt campaign.

"I guess as a victim of a traffic accident I'm probably most qualified to talk about things like this. I'm the only person to be brought back from an actual death involving a traffic accident," he said.

He said the seat belt campaign, sponsored by Southwestern Bell, is the only public service ad campaign in which he is involved.

"Any little bit of push that I can lend to it, now that the resurrection has occurred, I intend to give myself fully to it as long as I possibly can."

Pressed for details about his return to "Dallas," he said, "I know all about it and you don't."

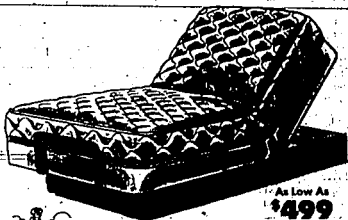

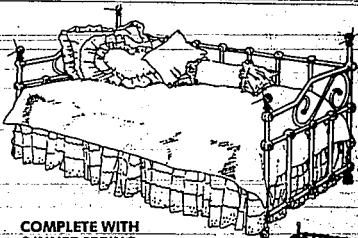

# Viewers 'Return to Mayberry'; performance wins week for NBC

NEW YORK — The hold-Andy Griffith and his down-home gang from Mayberry had on audiences remains powerful nearly 20 years later. Last week's "Return to Mayberry" attracted one-third of America's-TV homes to become the season's top-rated movie and seventh most popular TV film ever.

The surprise blockbuster performance led top-rated NBC to a two-point ratings victory in the next-to-last week of the 30-week prime-time season, according to figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

With "Return to Mayberry" finishing second to "The Cosby Show" for the week of April 7-13, NBC averaged a 17.3 rating to CBS' 15.4 and ABC's 13.6. (A ratings point equals 1 percent of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.)

Season to date, NBC leads with an average prime-time rating of 17.6 to CBS' 16.7 and ABC's 14.9. Next Tuesday, NBC officially will claim its first outright prime-time title in the three decades that Nielsen has been keeping count.

Last week, NBC's "The Cosby Show" ranked first with a 34.6 rating and 53 share (percentage of homes with their sets on), followed by "Return to Mayberry," which had a 33.0 rating and a 49 share, and NBC's "Family Ties," with a 31.0 rating, 47 share.

The rest of the Top-10 included

CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," in fourth, NBC's "Cheers," in fifth and ABC's "Who's the Boss?," in sixth, followed by CBS' "60 Minutes," NBC's "The Golden Girls," ABC's "Dynasty," and, in a tie for 10th, ABC's "Perfect Strangers" and ABC's "Moonlighting."

NBC's forecast was for "Return to Mayberry" to get a 30-share of the tuned-in audience Sunday, but lose to the first part of CBS' "Dream West" miniseries, CBS thought it would be a close competition, but that the return of Sheriff Andy Taylor & Co. would win.

"Nostalgia is in," said David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research.

"Return to Mayberry" overtook another reunion film, NBC's "Perry Mason Returns," as the season's top-rated film. "Mayberry" was well-promoted, added Poltrack. "Griffith did the talk-show bit. There was a lot of newspaper coverage about reuniting characters, and the appeal was broadened by the return of Ron Howard. I expected it to do very well."

Howard, who played Sheriff Taylor's freckle-faced son Opie, has gone on to star in "Happy Days" and become the well-respected movie

director for "Splash," "Cocoon" and the current "Gung Ho."


The original "Andy Griffith Show," which was on CBS, was in the Top 10 each of its eight seasons, finishing its run as the No. 1 program in 1967-68. The series, starring Griffith as sheriff of a small North Carolina town, started CBS' successful run of rural-oriented comedies, including "The Beverly Hillbillies" and "Green Acres."

"The Andy Griffith Show" ended when Griffith decided to leave while it was on top. The next season, two spinoffs, "Gomer Pyle, U.S.M.C." and "Mayberry, R.F.D.," were Top 10 series.

What was particularly surprising about the overwhelming success of "Return to Mayberry" was that CBS' early Sunday shows, "60 Minutes" and "Murder, She Wrote," performed well, but that didn't prevent many viewers from switching later to NBC.

"These people knew the network schedules and had it all set to make the switch," Poltrack said. "That was quite unusual. People today are more dependent on TV guides, TV reviews and TV articles. They read more about TV, know more about it and really get more involved in it."

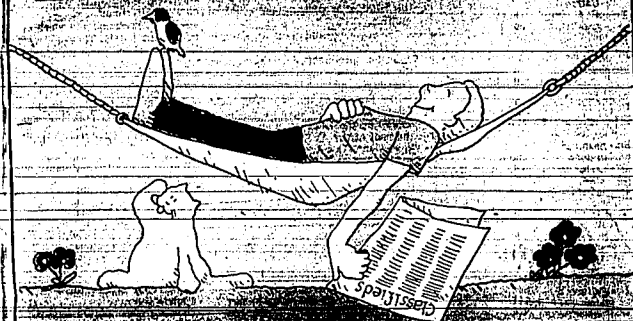

# Television reports from Libya recall wartime radio reporting

NEW YORK — "This is Tripoli"

Reminiscent of Edward R. Murrow's rooftop radio-reporting from London during World War II, television correspondents gave American audiences the live sounds of the U.S. military air strike against Libya during the networks' nightly newscasts last Monday.

"Is there an attack over way in Tripoli?" "CBS Evening News" anchor Dan Rather asked producer Jeffrey Fager. "If so, put your microphone out the window and let us hear it."

"Yes, Dan, we can hear it," Fager said by telephone from his hotel room in Tripoli. "We hear some pops. Here you go."

With the relay of the sound of roaring jets and anti-aircraft fire, the nation was in technological earshot of the latest confrontation between the United States and Libya. On Monday night, viewers weren't see-

ing the action, but they were hearing it.

"Tripoli is under attack," said correspondent Steve Delaney on the "NBC Nightly News." "I can see planes going overhead. There are explosions and a great deal of small arms fire and anti-aircraft fire in the distance."

On ABC's "World News Tonight," correspondent Charles Glass said, "You can feel it and hear the hotel shake." Then he stuck the phone out the window to pick up the crack of gunfire.

"Every now and then we have to revert to radio on TV," Deborah Johnson, producer of foreign news for the "NBC Nightly News," said Tuesday.

In Tripoli, CBS correspondent Allen Pizzev and Fager were shaken awake by the jets, then they went on the roof of the Al Khabir Hotel for a better view. Minutes later, CBS was calling from New York, and the CBS reporters quickly were on the air — live, coast to coast.

NBC's Delaney had an open phone

line to New York since early afternoon Eastern time Monday. "We were concerned about the vagaries of the phone system and possible communications blackouts from Libya," Johnson said.

On Tuesday, ABC, CBS, NBC and Cable News Network were able to send some bombardment-aftermath pictures from Libya TV. U.S. camera crews were escorted to a Libya-selected neighborhood. Independent reporting was limited by Libyan security restrictions.

"The correspondents were confined to their hotels. They got what the Libyans wanted them to," said Carol Olwert, spokeswoman for ABC News.

The day after the attack, the networks were scrambling to get more personnel into Tripoli, but the airport was reported closed and no charter would accept the mission, Olwert said.

With no pictures Monday night, the network anchors made do with maps and other visuals. At one

point, NBC anchor Tom Brokaw asked Pentagon correspondent Fred Francis to use the map behind him to trace the path of the F-111 bombers from England. After untangling his wires, Francis complied.

Tuesday morning, the networks' news-and-information programs all ripped apart their schedules and devoted the full broadcasts to the Libya story. They welcomed an assortment of U.S. government officials, foreign ambassadors and academics specializing in terrorism and Middle Eastern affairs.

At 6:10 a.m. MST, the networks had this head-to-head heavyweight lineup: former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger on ABC's "Good Morning America," former Secretary of State Alexander Haig on NBC's "Today" and two former secretaries of defense, Harold Brown and James R. Schlesinger, on the "CBS Morning News."

On Monday night, the Libya story played havoc with prime-time programming, most notably CBS' lineup, which was slated to run the second part of the "Dream West" miniseries.

When CBS learned that President Reagan's 7 p.m. speech was to be followed by televised briefings by Secretary of State George Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, the network decided to substitute a repeat of the hourlong "Cagney & Lacey" for the two-hour "Dream West."

But CBS in New York, from where programs are fed in the network's stations, didn't have a copy of "Cagney & Lacey." One was found in Los Angeles and sent via satellite to New York just in time for broadcast. Advertisers from "Dream West"

were recruited for "Cagney & Lacey" at a reduced rate.

CBS executives decided against showing "Dream West" from 8 p.m. to 10 p.m. MST because stations would want their local newscasts in the regular time slot, said George Schweitzer, CBS' vice president for communications.

"Dream West's" final three-hour installment, scheduled for Tuesday, will be shown Sunday. CBS

rescheduled the two-hour second part for Tuesday, preceded by a repeat of "The Looney, Looney, Looney Bugs Bunny Movie."

NBC delayed the scheduled 8 p.m. MST start of the live "Country Music Awards" ceremony for 53 minutes. Curt Block, NBC's vice president of communications, said if the Libya coverage had gone past 9, NBC would have taped the entire show and broadcast it another night.

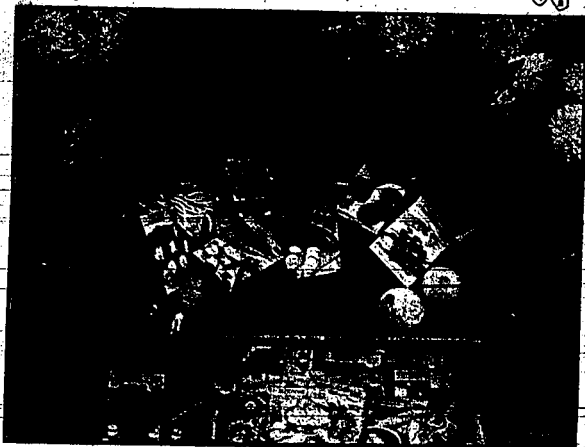
