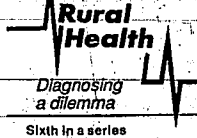

Volunteers are often first to provide aid

Carbon dioxide in atmosphere could dry soil, endanger crops

WASHINGTON — The increasing amount of carbon dioxide in the air — which many fear threatens a greenhouse-type overheating of the Earth — may also endanger crops by drying out the soil in major agricultural areas, a new study indicates. Mathematical models suggested that soil conditions could begin to resemble the dust bowl of the 1930s when heat and drought ruined millions of acres of farms and drove Americans from the land.

The report was written by a team of scientists from the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration's Geophysical Fluid Dynamics Laboratory at Princeton University. Carbon dioxide is a so-called "greenhouse gas" that traps heat in the atmosphere. The level of carbon dioxide in the atmosphere has increased over the years as industrialization has increased. This concentration has increased from 280 parts per million in 1750 to 350 parts per million in 1980. Scientists began to speculate that the increase in carbon dioxide could be a harbinger of a "dust bowl" in the 1930s that DDT conditions in the atmosphere could trigger a significant reduction in soil

American air strikes at Libya make shift in power possible

TRIPOLI, Libya — Despite Libyan claims that last week's American air raids were a failure, the strikes have jolted Col. Muammar Khadafy's regime and raised the possibility of a change in power. Western and Arab analysts generally believe Khadafy still holds the reins as "first among equals" in the collective leadership of military officers who have been with him since his coup deposed King Idris on Sept. 1, 1969. But some of the analysts also believe that others are playing a more active role in policy, including Khadafy's deputy Abdel-Salam Jalloud.

Analysis Other leaders mentioned are Abu Bakr Younis Jabber, commander of the army; Khweld al-Hamed, No. 2 in the army; and Mustafa Karroubi, inspector general of the armed forces. Khadafy's Libya is not an open society, and the leadership is not readily accessible to outsiders. Opinions among Western diplomats and Arab observers who do have contacts with the Libyan leadership are divided about whether power shifts could be part of Khadafy's strategy or whether changes have been forced upon him.

"There is some evidence that Khadafy's position has been diminished in the collective leadership, but it still seems that he is the major leader," said one Western diplomat, who spoke on condition he not be identified. The commander of the U.S. 8th Air Force, Gen. William H. Sullivan, III, all agreed that the American strike stunned the Libyans by its intensity and an additional blow was the lack of tangible Arab support for the Khadafy regime. Their raids dramatized the weakness of the country's 73,000-strong military forces and, according to Arab and Western observers, has led to grumbling in the ranks over fatalities. They were reported missing late Tuesday after taking Clinger's speedboat for a ride on American Falls Reservoir just before a severe thunderstorm struck the area.

Murphy scores view of crime

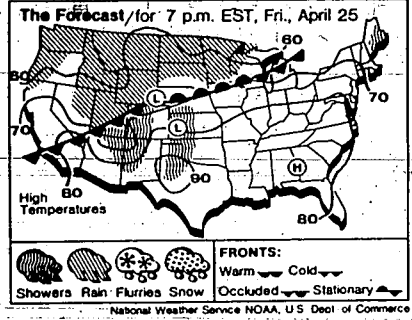
IDAHO FALLS (AP) - Idaho not only needs a new prison for its over-populated security facilities, but Idahoans and all Americans need to have a perspective on crime, he said. "A dirty, violent, viciousness that is victimizing all of society." That was the message of Al Murphy, state director of corrections, in an address Wednesday to the Idaho Falls Rotary Club. "Americans must settle for nothing less than an justice that is my streets, my children, my schools, my parks are clean. It wasn't known whether he was responding to the Habib letter, but Slattery said it nevertheless provided another key element for a compromise. "I think it creates a historic opportunity for us to end the Contra war," Slattery said in an interview Thursday. "I hope that everybody seizes the opportunity." "This is the first time Mr. Habib has set forth the precise conditions upon which the United States would terminate aid to the Contras," he said. "It certainly makes very clear that if the Nicaraguans sign (the Contadora agreement) U.S. aid to the Contras will terminate. The Nicaraguans have said they will sign the Contadora agreement, and they are still saying that. They are saying they will sign as soon as aid terminates." "I think this unties the Gordian knot," Slattery said.

Continued from Page A1 "The military is jealous of the security forces and afraid of them," said another Western diplomat, also refusing to be identified. One Arab observer, speaking on condition he not be named, said the poor performance of the air defenses led to complaints within the military that the regular army had been short-changed. "Khadafi had been favoring the security forces," the observer was quoted as saying. "Khadafi likes to play off one group against another. In the past, the Revolutionary Guards were up and the army was down. Now the army expects to get more." The practical uncertainties may explain why Khadafi did not appear before the more than 200 Western reporters who rushed to Tripoli during the confrontation with the United States. Instead, Khadafi has granted interviews to small, select groups, including Soviet journalists and a Yugoslav television station. Gen. Gabszewski, who has contacts with Libyan officials said Khadafi was not prepared to answer probing questions during a time of uncertainty. In an unsettled political atmosphere and with a lack of information, Tripoli is awash with rumors. Is Khadafi in control? Has he been effectively replaced by a Junta? Other rumors speak of arrests and executions and dissent in the military ranks. True or not, the rumors have heightened tension among the population of this seaside capital, where Roman gateways, Turkish mosques and Italian-style arches reflect the country's varied cultural past.

Continued from Page A1 and other gases result in a similar warming, the result could be the same, he said. The widely accepted theory is that carbon dioxide in the atmosphere acts as a one-way screen. Sunlight passes through it easily, warming the Earth and oceans. But the gas absorbs the infrared radiation that the planet reflects into space, preventing the escape of some heat. The result is a warming of the surface of the planet in the so-called greenhouse effect, with carbon dioxide in the air acting much like the greenhouse glass to trap warmth around plants. Indeed, scientists have measured a slight warming of the average temperature of the planet over the last century or so. If continued, the National Research Council has said, the result could be melting of some of the polar ice with a resulting rise in sea levels, earlier spring snowmelt and later first snowfalls, and a drier summer soils in the Northern Hemisphere.

Midwest fruit crop hit hard by freeze

HOLLAND, Ohio (AP) - Bob MacQueen made the rounds of his 200-acre apple orchard on Thursday and saw firsthand the effects of the record-breaking freeze this week that destroyed much of the region's fruit crop. "The heart's killed. It's dead," MacQueen said, putting his loss at \$250,000 to \$300,000. "This was a real record. In '56 was the last time it was that severe." Throughout the Ohio Valley, temperatures in the teens and 20s Tuesday night and Wednesday (frustrated even the most ambitious efforts by growers to save apple, pear, peach, grape and cherry crops. Richard Funt of the Ohio Extension Service said Wednesday that the damage statewide could reach \$20 million to \$25 million. Officials in Michigan, Kentucky, West Virginia and Indiana were still counting the losses there. MacQueen estimated that the freeze killed half the buds on his trees, but other farmers fared worse. Some central and southern Ohio growers lost 90 percent of their crop, despite the use of smoke pots and helicopters to try to raise temperatures, said Jim Utzinger, horticulturist for the Ohio Cooperative Extension Service. "They can only gain about three or four degrees," he said. "But the temperature went to 23, and we generally think the cutoff point's 28 or 27." As far as the price of apples is concerned, the smaller crop in the Midwest this year will likely be offset by a larger "crop" from Washington, the largest apple-producing state, said Blake Gerber, executive director of the Ohio Fruit Growers Society. "I think the cherry, grape and peach crop in the state survived." "In eastern Kentucky, temperatures dipped to as low as 16 degrees Wednesday morning, said John Strang, Extension horticulturist at the University of Kentucky College of Agriculture. "We don't expect any crop in areas like that," he said, but added that he could not estimate the amount of damage to the region. In West Virginia, Agriculture Commissioner Gus Douglass said he expected the damage to be spotty. Indiana officials also were still assessing the loss Thursday. He was right. Western grovers spared the worst of the cold because of warmer breezes off the lake, where the water temperature is 45 degrees.

Arriving at an accident scene at 3 in the morning and seeing your neighbor or future son-in-law lying beside the road bleeding, or responding to a heart attack and learning it's your best friend can be a heavy emotional drain. "In a small community, whenever you respond you have to know the person," Wells said. "And, yes, there are times you have to step back and let someone else handle it." As a result, burn-out is high in some areas, such as in Buhl, where that town's team must respond to 240 calls a year. And you're only working with a limited pool of people," said state health planner Schultz. The people inside the system are aware of the drawbacks. When Wells first heard of the plan five years ago, he thought it was "a stupid, preposterous thing I'd ever heard of." "I thought, no way this will work. It's going to take too much time," said Wells, the president of Castletown's QRU. The team has logged 899 hours of collective, on-the-job response time. That time is in addition to the 70 hours each member must have in ongoing training for certification every two years. Despite the time, Wells joined anyway, as did the owner of the grocery store, the owner of the gas station, a teacher's aide, the wife of the bank president, two married couples, and several farmers.

County officials receive preventive tips

Boise attorney's talk targets liability

BOISE (AP) — Idaho county officials have been cautioned against making any promises or obligations not required by law.

Sasser conducted a seminar here Thursday, sponsored by the Idaho Association of Counties, on how governmental agencies can cut their risk and exposure to lawsuits.

Even though this country has moved into an era of massive judgments in lawsuit against government agencies and officials, that shouldn't lead officials to be afraid to do anything, Sasser said.

"If you act reasonably under the circumstances, odds are that you will not be held liable," he said. "You don't have to do nothing."

Many of Idaho's counties have joined a new organization, called the Idaho Counties Risk Management Pool.

The pool provides liability insurance coverage up to \$500,000, with a deductible ranging from \$500 to \$2,500. Above that amount, insurance coverage is provided through other policies.

Holden said other counties are expected to join the pool as their liability insurance policies come up for renewal, and he expects 35 or 36 of the 44 counties to be members by the end of the year.

The association held an earlier training session at Moscow, and plans April 30-May 1 meetings at Pocatello, aimed at helping officials limit their exposure to lawsuits.

Officials need to be aware of those risks, said Sasser. "It is a serious problem or we wouldn't be here," he said.

Sasser urged officials not to allow "defacto" or informal policies to spring up, that could lead to huge judgments in lawsuits.

Houston police official testified about an informal "throwdown" policy followed by 60 percent of that city's police officers.

Sasser said the officer testified that policemen carried stolen or confiscated firearms with them, and when someone was shot by mistake, the officers threw the stolen firearm down and claimed the victim shot first.

In response to a question, Sasser told the officials that public agencies almost always have an obligation to provide a defense for an official or employee named in a civil lawsuit.

The agency is obligated by Idaho law to provide the defense, he said, unless the employee was acting outside the responsibility and scope of his or her employment, or took action with malice intent.

That's almost impossible to determine without conducting a defense to the civil lawsuit, he said.

"Don't make promises you don't have to make," Sasser said, and "don't adopt policies for things already covered by statute."

Copper spills accident

PRIST RIVER (AP) — A representative of a Priest River manufacturing firm says recent spills of copper concentrations into the city's sewer system were accidental and measures are being taken to prevent further discharges.

Priest River officials asked their attorney one week ago to investigate Advanced Input Devices' release of toxic chemicals into the system. City workers said they discovered high concentrations of copper in the sewer system and traced the chemicals to the company.

City sewage plant operator Dan Peterson said samples taken twice last month revealed copper concentrations of about 10 and 50 times the allowable limits.

Priest River has asked the Environmental Protection Agency to review the matter. Plant manager Dean Horlacher said a broken valve and a crack in a tank caused the problem twice last month.

"We're concerned that it happened and we're taking some very necessary steps to prevent it from happening again," he said Wednesday.

Artist closes contested work

BOISE (AP) — A controversial art exhibit has been removed from the Boise State University campus by an artist who contends university officials are engaging in censorship.

Photographs, drawings and paintings focusing on a woman's humiliation and recovery from child abuse were moved Wednesday from a hallway in the BSU Student Union Building to the Boise YWCA after school officials removed two drawings depicting nudes.

David Taylor, Boise State vice president for student affairs, said the works were "not appropriate" for a public hallway. But artist Paris Almond said the school's decision had "disembodied" her exhibit.

"I think it's insulting to other artists, and it's insulting to the victims, too," Almond said. "It says we have to be ashamed of being victims."

Murphy sets panel task of escape study

BOISE (AP) — A special panel will review the prison escape of Claude Dallas and determine if any prison employees should be held accountable. Corrections Director Al Murphy said.

"If anyone needs to be held culpable, then that's what will happen," Murphy told members of the Idaho Press Club in Boise Thursday.

The panel, to convene late next week, will be composed of Nevada Corrections Director George Summer, Paul Morris of Emmett, Deputy Attorney General Bob Gates, and Don Linford, who has served on the Correctional Industries Board.

A member of the Permanent Building Fund Council also may be named to the panel, he said.

Murphy said 90 percent of the responsibility in Dallas's escape is attributable to an inadequate prison facility that wasn't designed for high-risk prisoners, and 10 percent to personnel.

Dallas was serving a 30-year prison sentence for the shooting deaths of Fish and Game officers at least some of the motorists sentenced under the new law will not be able to pay for the new mandatory treatment.

"If you bring goggles to Claude Dallas, you're putting yourself in danger (as an accomplice)," he said.

Dallas' mystique as a mountain man is overrated, Murphy said. "He's charismatic. He learned to ride a horse and he can rope. He likes the outdoors and he's mild-mannered," Murphy said, explaining why so many people are willing to help Dallas. "And, he beat a murder rap."

Murphy said he thinks Dallas eventually will be caught, and likely will be housed in prison in a state that has a maximum-security facility. "Kansas sounds nice," he quipped.

Meanwhile, Murphy said he received Thursday a report on the main prison south of Boise. He hadn't read the report thoroughly, but said a summary indicated that bringing the facility up to maximum-security standards is as practical as "sailing a sieve across the Atlantic."

To compound problems, the prison population is growing faster than anticipated. The prison population stands at 1,370; projections had put the population at 1,330 nine months from now.

Murphy said officials will decide criteria for selecting a prison site sometime in May.

About 30 cities have expressed interest in having a prison facility there.

Tougher drunk driving law feared as potential H & W budget trouble

BOISE (AP) — With a freeze in state support and prospects for massive cuts in federal aid undermining their financial outlook, Idaho Health and Welfare officials say a tougher drunken driving sentencing law passed this winter could aggravate budget problems even more.

As much as \$3 million could be added to the state's continuing liabilities in the new budget year because of a law requiring motorists convicted of drunken driving to undergo alcoholism treatment if an evaluator recommends it.

Spokeswoman Linda High told the state Health and Welfare Board on Thursday that the actual impact of the bill was still unclear, but she said department officials believe there is no question that at least some of the motorists sentenced under the new law will not be able to pay for the new mandatory treatment.

Whether the Department of Health and Welfare or some other government agency will have to pick up the tab is unknown right now, she said, as is the way judges across the state will handle the new law.

"The bill is sort of iffy right now because no one knows if the courts are going to follow through with it," Mrs. High said, adding that it has come under some criticism because of its perceived intrusion into judicial discretion in the sentencing process.

Under the current law, those convicted of drunken driving must undergo an evaluation after which a recommendation on alcoholism treatment, but it is up to the judge whether treatment is mandated as part of the sentence.

Department officials said at best, government at some level will be forced to pay \$1 million to cover treatment mandated under the new law for those unable to afford it and, at worse \$3 million. The state currently contracts with private firms to provide the treatment that judges have been mandating.

The prospect for the additional drain on its limited resources came as department budget chief Steve Kato outlined the impact of the Legislature's 1987 budget for the agency, that was frozen at the current level.

The action means that the companies involved now must post either a bond or cash deposit. If the International Trade Commission upholds its preliminary finding, the deposit will become a fixed duty on the products involved.

People pool shrinks in Idaho's economy

News stories sometimes seem unconnected to each other, much less to events of months ago. But it should not be difficult this spring to see some of the impacts of what the Legislature has done in state funding.

Consider the following, all of which have recently been reported in The Times-News:

• At the College of Southern Idaho, summer programs are being drastically reduced; there's no money.

• At the state Department of Corrections, prison guard turnover is higher than normal. The reason? Idaho pay scales are well behind the nine-state average for the West.

• At the state School for the Deaf and Blind in Gooding, employees have gone public with their complaints about a wage freeze. The sluggish economy is prompting many to look for jobs elsewhere.

• In Boise, dozens of teachers showed up for a hiring seminar by a school district in Washington state. Teachers all across Idaho are looking into employment in other states as their districts struggle with finding resources to pay them.

Some of this erosion is normal. After all, people change jobs frequently in America and a desire to better one's economic condition is hardly unknown to workers in general.

But this situation is different. We are witnessing nothing less than the erosion of Idaho's human "infrastructure," that reservoir of bright, talented and hard working people in many professions who help make this state what it is.

And what is the response of some of our legislators to this trend? In a word, "Goodbye."

One legislator tells a recruiter, "Don't bring them here," referring to efforts to bring bright young people into the state. Another tells Idaho citizens who were born in other places that, in effect, they have no right to comment on Idaho, its problems or its potential.

Despite this kind of narrowness, many Idahoans know that bringing our state back from this point has to go beyond telling people to take a hike.

Here's the question: What are we going to do about both the economic problems and those elected officials who don't think they can be solved?



First step: Put terrorism in perspective

FRANKFURT, West Germany — Here in the air-travel hub of Europe it is hard to fathom America's near-panic over terrorism.

Only 23 Americans were killed by terrorists overseas last year; 9,819 were shot to death back home the year before.

Yet the same Congress that has just weakened controls on handguns is now so focused on terrorism that it is considering a bill that would eviscerate the War Powers Act, sanction assassination and trammel the legislative branch's power to limit presidential use of military force.

If this seems illogical and excessive, it may be because terrorism seems illogical and its methods excessive. Yet there is logic in the terrorists' choice of weapon.

Lacking traditional power, they are conducting psychological warfare. They have tapped the primal fear of being jumped in the dark, and/or no apparent reason other than, in this case, being an American.

And so the issue now has become the U.S. government's responsibility to guarantee life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness wherever an American citizen goes. Washington has taken up this mandate, never mind the political and economic costs to its friends.

All of the weights and counterweights of alliances, the global economy, the balance of peace are now reduced to the silliness of (television tips steering Americans to "safe" destinations for a summer vacation.

However insignificant in terms of real odds, terrorism does more than make us afraid to travel. It ends our illusions of safety as surely as World War I ended Britain's sense that the established world would go on forever.

Terrorism has a grip on the nation's imagination because it disturbs our sense of America's place in the order of things.

With World War II we supposedly accepted that two broad oceans can no longer keep foreign conflicts at bay. Not true. Despite our engagement with the outside world, nuclear weapons remain an abstraction, and forces and bases abroad mean that threats are still "over there."

For terrorism to have such an effect in our culture, it needs our media. The picture of tourists' bodies strewn around the Rome airport lounge has become a standard adjunct to media reports, feeding the distortion and exaggerated fear of terrorism.

Our leaders have played into the terrorists' hands, too. Jimmy Carter ensured that the Iran hostage crisis would become "America held hostage" by restricting most of his presidential campaign to the White House Rose Garden.

During the ordeal of hijacked TWA Flight 847 last year, Ronald Reagan wisely tried to go about his business, but he was thwarted by television's compelling grasp on national attention.

Now unable to "beat" em, he has "joined" em and taken the lead in hyping both the threat and military remedies that he must know cannot work.

The president is unmatched in reading the public mood, and his rhetoric demonstrates that the U.S. view of and response to terrorism is far more about domestic attitudes than foreign policy.

Thus we should not be surprised that the European allies cannot understand what the fuss is

about, while we cannot accept European advice to measure the practical effect on terrorism of our government's lashing out.

Terrorism has pierced the veil that we drape between ourselves and knowledge of Third World turmoil. To begin doing something about terrorism requires moving beyond self-preoccupation to clear analysis of what we face as a nation.

This must include seeing that we cannot make the outside world go away, as so much of Reagan's foreign policy has tried to do. It must include seeing that America's inescapable duty to lead in Middle East peace-making — a trust obvious to everyone beyond the White House fence. It must include knowledge that power can back politics in countering terrorism, but cannot replace it.

Most important, the president must level with the American people. However unfair, the United States is a target of terrorism — less, though, than some other countries — and will continue to be.

It is not to "blame America first" to see that our power, posture and position in many parts of the Third World make us a target for the "poor man's atom bomb."

We may or may not choose to deal with how we are viewed and why we are attacked. But we cannot avoid the knowledge that terrorists will win if, through inflated rhetoric, we multiply their role a thousandfold.

To be serious about putting terrorism in its place, the president must begin by putting it in perspective.

Womb for rent rapidly removing motherhood from nature

BOSTON — In a few years, you can bet on it (Baby Girl) who is going to be the parents and ask, "Where did I come from?" This question won't bring on the normal, scaled-down, blushing nursery lecture about sex. Oh, what a different tale these parents have to tell.

Baby Girl Who (as in "Who" does this baby belong to?) was conceived last August. The egg and sperm of a couple from New York got together in a petri dish in Cleveland. What came from this union was an embryo. The embryo was implanted into the womb of a woman from Detroit.

The genes of the first woman and her husband were nourished and carried in the uterus of the second woman who was paid \$10,000 for fetus care. Then, on April 13, in Ann Arbor, Baby Who was delivered into the arms of the couple from New York.

This is a story complex enough to make the average parent long for the simple delivery system of the stork. In the origin of this member of the species, the birds and

the bees had less to do with reproduction than doctors and lawyers. For the very first time, the word "mother" was not defined in the delivery room, but in the court room.

Baby Who was the product of one woman's genes and another woman's womb. She had, in effect, a genetic mother and a gestational mother. These two women were not in conflict, indeed they were in cahoots. The genetic mother was fertile but had no uterus. The gestational mother had a womb for rent.

Nevertheless they all went to court to clear up the question of parenthood before delivery. There, a Detroit judge ruled that the genetic mother and father would be the REAL parents of the baby in the other

mother's womb.

Is this beginning to sound like something out of Gilbert and Sullivan? "Brave New World"? Does it remind you of Margaret Atwood's "The Handmaid's Tale"?

Slowly, one step at a time, we have been separating reproduction from sexual intercourse. Artificial insemination, in vitro fertilization, surrogate motherhood. Now, in logical sequence, we have the surrogate motherhood of an in vitro fertilization. It requires a tiny leap, more of a hop, to imagine a future embryo created from sperm donor and egg donor, implanted into a second woman, all for adoption by a third.

Who is the mother in that case? The one who provided the genes, the one who supplied the womb, or the one who set the whole project in motion to raise the child? We have never before had so many motherhood options. More to the point, we have never before said that a woman who just gave birth to a baby is NOT its mother.

I am uncomfortable enough with a

technology that reduces the pregnant woman to the status of a commercial vessel carrying genes to term for her employer. I am more uncomfortable when the courts take the motherhood title away. If the egg donor is the "real" mother, then she might even win the right to protect her embryo if the vessel was smoking, or eating improperly, or resisting medical treatment.

The situation is even more unerving from the point of view of the baby, who has come from the egg and out of the womb. For two or three days, Baby Girl Who was in a legal limbo while the physicians did tests to confirm that the baby was the offspring of the genetic parents. She was born a motherless child.

"It's intolerable to have a newborn baby and not know who its parents are," says medical-ethics lawyer George Annas of Boston University. "If the question is what's best for the child, I would argue for the gestational mother. You know who that is. There is never any question in anyone's

mind."

The presumption that the woman who carried the baby is the mother is common law in most states. It should be everywhere. The genetic parents can always adopt the baby. It may sound odd to adopt your own genetic offspring — what if the woman decided to keep Baby Who? — but it is the lesser risk.

All of these quandries, like the babies themselves, are born as we attempt an end run around nature. We don't accept limits, even the limits of fertility. Men and women who cannot conceive or carry children, expect science to figure out a way for them to have babies, even their "own" babies. Science is most obliging.

By now, we are so far removed from nature that we need a law to determine motherhood. We need that we find ourselves arguing about the definition of the very first word in any baby's vocabulary: "Mama."

FBI: Reports of eight major crimes rise 4 percent in 1985

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a three-year decline, major crimes reported to police rose 4 percent in 1985 compared to the previous year, the FBI reported Thursday.

The FBI's index of eight major crimes showed that murders nationwide rose 1 percent, forcible rape climbed 4 percent, robbery rose by 3 percent and the number of aggravated assaults rose by 6 percent. Violent crime overall was up 5 percent while property crimes rose 4 percent.

Nationally, burglary was up 2 percent, larceny-theft 5 percent, motor vehicle theft up 6 percent and arson, 3 percent.

Authorities said drugs and less concern over crime after several years of declines may have contributed to the reversal, after declines in 1982, 1983 and 1984.

"I think as crime started to decrease a certain amount of apathy started taking over," said Jerald Vaughn, executive director of the International Association of Chiefs of Police. "People just didn't seem as concerned about the preventive measures that might have assisted in crime being reduced."

The "volume of drugs available in our society, and crime related to drug trafficking" also played a role in the increase, said Vaughn.

After reaching all-time highs in 1980 and 1981, the number of major offenses reported to the nation's 15,000 law enforcement agencies fell 12 percent from 1983 through 1984.

But in 1985, crime levels rose 8 percent in the South, 5 percent in the West, while rising only 2 percent in the Northeast and exhibiting no change in the Midwest.

The FBI's uniform crime reporting section said population shifts to the Sunbelt states had played a role in the increase in crime, along with early release programs for prisoners in many states.

There were increases in construction site thefts and more property

crimes such as shoplifting and theft at businesses, all reflecting regional population shifts, said the FBI.

There were increases in crime in 1985 in suburban counties totaling 6 percent, in rural locations with a 2 percent rise and in all cities except those with populations of more than 1 million. The range of increases for cities was 3 to 8 percent.

Law enforcement officials say only about one-third of all crimes are reported to authorities.

The Justice Department's Bureau

of Justice Statistics, which measures total crime, said that preliminary figures show that crime overall fell by 3 percent in 1985. The decline was from 35.5 million offenses, to 34.5 million crimes; but the agency said this was not a statistically significant change.

Violent crime, according to the preliminary figures, showed that violent crime was down 3 percent, personal theft was down 5 percent and household crime was down 2 percent.

Senate buries program

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday refused to revive the federal revenue sharing program and turned back two attempts to boost spending on child health programs as it continued to look for domestic spending cuts.

Meanwhile, renewed talk of oil and gasoline taxes and a leadership call for revising the budget's economic estimates underscored the difficulty lawmakers are having meeting the \$144 billion deficit limit set for fiscal 1987, the new budget year which begins Oct. 1.

The lawmakers voted 54-41 to table in effect kill an amendment proposed by Sens. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, D-N.Y., and John Heinz, R-Pa., to maintain revenue sharing for the next three years at \$4.6 billion a year.

The vote left in the budget \$1.8 billion next year to share with local governments, and none after that.

"This is a program that benefits middle America," said Sen. James Sasser, D-Tenn. "There will be no change but for local governments to increase property and sales taxes," he said.

But Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., argued that the Senate had to make choices. "There are literally dozens of federal programs that are higher in priority, to this senator, than this one," he said.


Budget Committee Chairman Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., said the budget included \$105 billion in other grants to state and local governments. Although revenue sharing was politically popular because local government can use the money for police, fire and other basic services, "I think we ought to decide that we can't afford it," he said.

After killing the revenue sharing amendment, the Senate, by a 56-40 vote, did the same to a proposal by Sens. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, and Paul Sarbanes, D-Md., to add \$200 billion to child health programs over the next three years.

Metzenbaum said his amendment would simply have restored the programs to the 1981 levels. The amendment would have increased spending on the Women, Infants and Children program, maternal and child health, immunization, and money for county health clinics.

Sen. Dale Bumpers, D-Ark., then proposed taking \$25 million out of the foreign aid budget for domestic child immunization programs in the next three years.

Prosecutor to study alleged perjury case

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special prosecutor was named Thursday to decide whether a former assistant attorney general should be indicted for lying to Congress during the Environmental Protection Agency scandal.

A three-judge panel of the U.S. Court of Appeals, following up on a preliminary inquiry by the Justice Department, appointed Washington lawyer James C. McKay to investigate Theodore Olson, former assistant attorney general for legal counsel in the Justice Department.

But the scope of the probe will be narrow; the House Judiciary Committee had recommended a wide-ranging investigation of a dozen current and former Reagan administration officials in connection with hundreds of documents the executive branch withheld from Congress in 1982 and 1983. Lawmakers were in-

vestigating alleged mismanagement in the EPA at the time.

But the Justice Department decided that a preliminary inquiry was justified if only three department officials, and the department subsequently told the court that further investigation was warranted only of Olson, said Terry Eastland, spokesman for Attorney General Edwin Meese.

Rep. Peter W. Rodino Jr., chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, said that in seeking a counsel with limited jurisdiction, Meese "has disregarded overwhelming evidence of other possible wrongdoing raised by the committee report and appears to have made judgments that are beyond his authority under the statute."

"I deny that the charges are valid or have any substance to them," Olson said in an interview from his private law office in Washington.

5 killed in drinking binge; 2 friends charged

LEXINGTON, Ky. (AP) — Five people were fatally stabbed, shot or run over after spending the afternoon drinking, and two friends who allegedly robbed them were charged with one of the murders Thursday.

The victims — two women and three men — were found within a few miles of one another on Lexington's east side and within a few hours. The men were found either in or near a burning car that belonged to one of them, police said.

Two women were charged Thursday with public intoxication and one count of murder.

Additional murder charges were expected, Lt. John Bizzack said at an afternoon news conference. He

said there were no other suspects, and police believe the pair had killed all five people.

Lafonda Fay Foster, 22, and Tina

Marlo Hickey Powell, 27, both of Lexington, pleaded innocent Thursday to the intoxication charge. Arraignment was scheduled Friday.

Finance panel debates taxes

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Finance Committee went behind closed doors Thursday to discuss whether to continue its efforts to overhaul the federal income tax, including a new proposal by Chairman Bob Packwood that would allow no itemized deductions.

The latest plan, prepared for Packwood by the staff of the Joint Committee on Taxation, also would repeal preferential tax treatment of Individual Retirement Accounts and capital gains and result in a maximum individual tax rate of 25 percent.

Apparently a majority of the members want to continue to write a bill, Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J., told reporters. Bradley's leader in the Senate for a new tax system, said he sensed "a turn toward... basically putting everything on the table on the loophole side."

Astronauts' remains released

WASHINGTON (AP) — The remains of the seven astronauts killed in the Challenger accident will be flown from Kennedy Space Center to Dover Air Force Base in Delaware next Tuesday, the space agency announced Thursday.

"At Dover, the remains will be prepared in accordance with the wishes of the individual families," said the brief announcement.

It said no formal ceremony is planned to mark the flight, although a military honor guard and escorts from the astronauts' offices will be present when the remains are loaded aboard an Air Force C-141 aircraft for the flight to Dover, site of a large mortuary.

The seven astronauts were killed on Jan. 28, when the shuttle Challenger exploded less than 74 seconds into its flight.

Protesters defend lab animals

The Associated Press

Hundreds of people marched peacefully on campuses and at laboratories across the nation Thursday to protest using animals for "gruesome" experiments, while researchers defended the practice as beneficial to humans.

At least 79 people, most of them in California, were arrested for blocking access to research centers on what was proclaimed National Laboratory Animals Day.

Protesters targeted facilities in California, Arizona, New York, Nevada, Pennsylvania, Florida, Washington state, Michigan and Minnesota.

In Los Angeles, 48 of 100 demonstrators were arrested for blocking a driveway at UCLA, where protesters carried signs that read "Animal Auschwitz."

"We object to the use of all mammals," said Margo Tanenbaum, spokesperson for Last Chance for Animals, one of the groups belonging to the sponsoring April 24 Coalition.

Reagan selects medal winners

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan announced Thursday he will present the nation's highest civilian award to Dr. Albert Sabin, discoverer of the oral polio vaccine, retired Gen. Matthew Ridgway and actress Helen Hayes.

In all, seven people will receive the Presidential Medal of Freedom at a White House ceremony on May 12.

Others who will be cited are journalist Vermont Royster, Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz.; Earl H. "Red" Blank, former head football coach at Dartmouth and the U.S. Military Academy; and Walter H. Annenberg, former ambassador to Britain and a friend of the president.

Empire parachutist arrested

NEW YORK (AP) — Two men parachuted Thursday from the 86th floor of the Empire State Building and floated gently onto Fifth Avenue, where one halted a cab and rode away while the other was snared in a traffic light pole.

"It was quite frightening," said Michael McCarthy, 25, of London, who was arrested after he disentangled himself from the light pole. "I mean, it's not a normal thing to do."

The stunt had never before been pulled at the 102-story, 1,472-foot building, according to security chief Sal Rinaldi.

Judge upholds Bouvia's drugs

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A judge ordered doctors Thursday to stop reducing morphine doses for quadriplegic Elizabeth Bouvia, a bedridden cerebral palsy victim who has said she wants a painless death.

Superior Court Judge Jack Newman granted Ms. Bouvia's attorneys a temporary restraining order, citing an appeals court decision that said she has the right to be comfortable.

China spy conviction affirmed

ALEXANDRIA, Va. (AP) — A federal judge on Thursday upheld the conviction of Larry Wu-Tai Chin, who committed suicide after being found guilty last Feb. 7 of spying for China throughout his 30-year career with the CIA.

U.S. District Court Judge Robert Mehrige, in issuing the opinion, cited a letter Chin wrote to his wife before killing himself, saying he had decided not to appeal the conviction and felt "extremely tranquil."

Hofmann trial delayed by a knee injury

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A preliminary hearing on murder charges against documents dealer Mark Hofmann was delayed for 10 days Thursday because the defendant broke a kneecap.

Fifth Circuit Court Judge Paul Grant ordered the hearing to reconvene May 5 at 2 p.m. after defense attorney Ronald Yenglich said pain medication would prevent Hofmann from participating.

Hofmann underwent surgery to repair the kneecap later Thursday and was listed in satisfactory condition, a spokesman at LDS Hospital said.

Hofmann, 31, broke the kneecap of his already-injured right leg when he fell at his home Wednesday, said co-defense attorney Bradley Rich.

Hofmann was on crutches because of injuries suffered in an Oct. 16 bomb blast. Rich said Hofmann was using the crutches when he apparently slipped.

Yenglich said he met with Hofmann Thursday at the Salt Lake

Clinic, where the defendant underwent a second examination following the accident.

"Mark appeared to be in pain. He felt the medication for pain prevention was affecting him, making him nauseous. He was having difficulty concentrating on anything other than the pain in his leg," Yenglich told the judge.

Hofmann's preliminary hearing was to have entered its eighth day Thursday following a one-day recess. But Grant emerged from his chambers Thursday morning to tell the crowded courtroom of Hofmann's injury.

Grant will decide after the hearing whether to order Hofmann to stand trial on two counts of first-degree murder for the Oct. 15 bombing deaths of two people and 30 counts of fraud, theft and bomb making.

Earlier, prosecutors had said they expected to conclude their case on Friday or Monday.


Hofmann, free on \$120,000 bond, is

accused in the deaths of Steven Christensen, 31, and Kathleen Sheets, 50. Prosecutors contend Hofmann turned to murder to prevent exposure of an alleged scheme to sell fraudulent historical documents to the Mormon Church and other collectors.

Police have theorized that Hofmann accidentally set off the pipe bomb which exploded in his parked car in downtown Salt Lake City, blowing him into the street and severely damaging his right leg.

His attorneys have said Hofmann eventually will have to undergo reconstructive surgery on his right knee because of the blast injury.

Miller spy trial on hold as judge takes counsel

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A judge interrupted the testimony of an admitted Soviet spy Thursday and sent jurors in the FBI espionage trial home while he conferred with attorneys to resolve undisclosed developments in the case.

U.S. District Judge David Kenyon dismissed jurors in the Richard W. Miller trial until today, then said he would meet privately with the witness, Svetlana Ogorodnikov, and her attorneys.

After the meeting, the judge and attorneys refused to reveal the reason for the delay.

"There's no way we can tell anyone anything today," the judge said.

"We've had some developments and they will have to be addressed," Kenyon told jurors earlier. "There's

just no way we can proceed today without resolving some of the issues that were raised by these developments."

The interruption came during a brief recess after Mrs. Ogorodnikov said she was tired and wanted a break. She was testifying for the defense, which was trying to show that the relationship between her and Miller, the only FBI agent ever tried on espionage charges, was not unique.

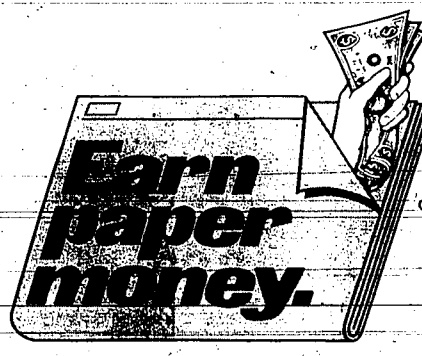

Pentagon mum on report targets missed

'Extraordinary restrictions' on pilots

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon refused Thursday to discuss a published report that Air Force bombers failed to hit some of their military targets during last week's raids over Libya.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said he could not address claims the Pentagon had targeted five buildings inside the Al Aziziyah barracks compound in Tripoli but struck only three.

Sims also said the Pentagon was aware that "Libyans had shown off what it claimed were pieces of a downed U.S. jet. He said the U.S. officials would examine U.S. network film footage to see if the wreckage could be part of the missing F-111, and refused comment on the Libyan claims in the meantime.

The Pentagon has described the Aziziyah barracks as the nerve center of Libya's terrorist network. The New York Times quoted unidentified Pentagon officials and military experts Thursday as saying two buildings had been hit there because several F-111 bombers aborted their mission.

Sims had disclosed last week that five of the 18 F-111 bombers sent on the April 14 raid failed to drop any bombs—either because of mechanical troubles or other unspecified problems.

"It was not a case of the pilots missing their targets," the paper quoted one Pentagon official as saying. "They did not have the full number of aircraft assigned to the target."

Sims, refused to say Thursday whether targeted buildings had been missed during the strike.

"But if there are cases where specific targets were not attacked, I would attribute it to those extraordinary restrictions which were placed on the pilots," he said.

"They had to have all systems up and operating perfectly or the aircraft would abort the mission and return to base, assuring no collateral (civilian) damage. Additionally, the pilots had to have positive target identification before dropping their ordnance. But I really don't have much more in specifics that I can give you."

The spokesman told reporters that Libya had taken steps to hide the extent of damage caused to military targets.

"What has happened in the case of the military bases where our attacks were directed is that the Libyans have made significant efforts, and did immediately, to clean up the damage, change things so that it would appear other than it was immediately after the attack," he said.

Libyan officials have tightly controlled the movement of reporters inside Tripoli, allowing them to visit only certain areas of the city.

Sims also refused to address additional questions about whether U.S. bombs were responsible for damage that was caused to a civilian area near the French embassy. Pentagon sources have said they are studying the possibility that errant bombs from the one F-111 that was lost during the raid might be responsible.

"We know there has been civilian damage, which we regret whatever its cause," he said.

Soviet party urges speedup in constructing apartments

MOSCOW (AP) — The Communist Party has pledged to "alleviate" by the year 2000 the chronic housing shortage that forces one in every five Soviet families to live in communal apartments, the party newspaper Pravda said Thursday.

In a resolution adopted April 17, the party's policy-making Central Committee promised to provide separate quarters for "practically every family" by the turn of the century, Pravda reported.

Communist party leaders have grown impatient with a housing construction system that is troubled by frequent delays and shortfalls, the resolution said.

Lack of housing has plagued the country since before the 1917 revolution. The problem intensified in the last two decades when dwellings erected during Joseph Stalin's post-World War II building campaign aged and fell into disrepair.

The party has promised several times to tackle the housing shortage. In 1961, the late Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev pledged that all housing needs would be met by 1980. When the party in October issued its program for the future, it also contained such a promise.

The central committee resolution mentions some new measures for increasing and improving housing construction, but it is generally vague on how it intends to solve the problem.

Pass law end hailed, criticized

JOHANNESBURG—South Africa (AP)—President P.W. Botha said Thursday that lifting pass laws for blacks means "a new era of freedom" for this troubled land, but critics claim a tough new security law negates the gains.

Leaders of the United Democratic Front, the coalition against apartheid, said the proposed security law will give the law and order minister "almost dictatorial powers" and urged blacks to form self-defense committees.

Botha said in a full-page advertisement published in several major newspapers that his government had confounded its detractors by delivering on a pledge to abolish the pass laws.

The hated regulations, officially called influx control, have been cornerstones of apartheid. They severely restrict where blacks can travel, live and work.

Botha's new policy will allow blacks to live wherever they can find an approved site, but residential areas still will be segregated. Rural blacks still may not be able to move to the cities because little housing is available in urban black areas.

"The pass laws have gone," Botha said. "The prisons are emptied of the victims of this unhappy system. No South African will ever suffer the indignity of arrest for a pass offense again."

"The new South Africa will be a land where all decent people can sleep with their doors open. A land where we can look each other in the eye without fear or hatred."

"And it will come about. Not because I say so, but because my government and I have the power to make it happen."

Black leaders welcomed abolition of the pass laws, but say the government has not indicated it will address their demand for a share of political power. The apartheid, race policy has maintained supremacy for whites. At least 5 million whites and denied rights to the 24 million blacks for generations.

Murphy Morobe, spokesman for the United Democratic Front, said those prating the initiative "must remember that these repealed laws have already broken up families, led to the deaths of thousands of blacks and cost untold misery to millions of disenfranchised Africans."

S. Africans launch own naval vessel

JOHANNESBURG—South Africa (AP)—South Africa left of an international arms embargo, on Thursday launched the first warship designed and built entirely in the country.

Defense Minister Gen. Magnus Malan said construction of the supply ship Drakensburg demonstrated that South Africa had neutralized the effects of the embargo.

"The successes achieved by local expertise and manufacturing capabilities to defeat this type of boycott so utterly effectively by far exceeds any successes our enemies may believe they have achieved," he said during the launching ceremony at a Durban shipyard.

The 12,500-ton Drakensburg slid into the harbor after Ellze Botha, wife of President P.W. Botha, broke a bottle of champagne on the ship's bow.

Built at a cost of about \$38 million, the Drakensburg is intended to provide fuel and other supplies to warships on extended duty in the Cape of Good Hope sea routes. One of its special features, Malan said, is equipment to convert 18,200 gallons of seawater a day into drinking water.

Bomb damages London airline office

LONDON (AP) — A pre-dawn bomb blast damaged a British Airways office and other stores on London's busiest shopping street Thursday, spraying glass into the street and igniting a fire. One passer-by was treated for shock.

American Airlines and American Express both have counters in the office, but Scotland Yard spokesman Philip Powell said British Airways appeared to be the target.



Press Association, Britain's domestic news agency, said it received calls from the Scottish National Liberation Army, which is campaigning for an independent Scotland, and the Angry Brigade, an anarchist group that said it planted the bomb "in retaliation for Britain's involvement in the American 'bombing of Libya.'"

A Scotland Yard spokesman said, "We are checking all of them out. There are no clear indications yet of who is responsible."

Cmdr. George-Churchill-Coleman, head of Scotland Yard's anti-terrorist branch, refused to describe the bomb in detail, saying only that it was "fairly big" and caused "fairly considerable" damage. News reports said it was hidden among bags of garbage outside the airline office.

Oxford Street was closed for seven hours while police searched for possible additional bombs. Victoria Station, the busiest in London, also

was evacuated briefly Thursday morning because of a bomb scare that turned out to be a hoax, police said.

When police reopened Oxford Street around noon, crowds thronged in, saying they weren't afraid of another bomb. Across the street from the British Airways office, London's second-largest department store, Selfridge's, was filled with shoppers.

Inside the bombed office, charred walls and twisted rubble could be seen.

Powell advised Britons to be vigilant. Oxford Street is popular among tourists, and business officials expressed fear the blast would further hurt tourism, already falling off as Americans wary of terrorist attacks cancel trips to Europe.

"People will hear the name Oxford Street and they'll stay home," said John Healey, an American travel agent. "I think it will hurt."

U.S., Thais plan exercise

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Thailand and the United States will conduct a joint exercise next month aimed at ensuring readiness against attacks from other countries, officials said Thursday.

About 700 Thai and 20 U.S. officials will participate in the exercise on May 19 in the coastal province of Chonburi, said Vice Adm. Yongyuth Supakalm, chief of the Logistics Department in the Thai armed forces.

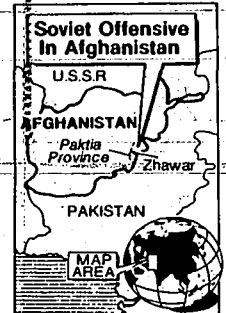
The exercise, called "Logex 29," will be conducted for the third time since 1983.

Participants include the armed forces, police, civil authorities, Thailand's national airline, communications and land transport organizations and port authorities.

Yongyuth said Thailand considers its main external threat to be the Vietnamese occupying neighboring Cambodia.

Soviet air raids rip into rebels

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Afghan rebel commanders said Thursday that Soviet and Afghan warplanes were killing and maiming hundreds of their men in constant air raids on rebel positions in southeastern Afghanistan.

A senior commander called it the heaviest aerial bombardment in the seven-year "Moslem" insurgency against the communist Afghan government and said it was the first use of large-scale night raids in that area.

Rahim Wardak said about 10,000 troops were advancing behind the air cover, with tank and artillery support, against makeshift rebel positions in Pakhtia province near the Pakistani border. Insurgent leaders acknowledged Wednesday that Soviet commandos had captured and destroyed the main rebel base at Zhawar.

"This is the worst fighting we've ever seen. The air attacks are terrible," Wardak, a top commander of the National Islamic Front of Afghanistan, told The Associated Press.

Wardak, who returned from Pakhtia on Thursday, said Soviet and Afghan Su-22 jet bombers and MiG-21 and MiG-23 fighter-bombers were dropping 500-pound bombs on rebels who had dug in for defense.

Another guerrilla commander just back from Pakhtia, who insisted on anonymity, said he had seen attacking squadrons of up to 30 planes.

They said rocket and artillery fire also took a heavy toll.

An estimated 115,000 Soviet troops are in Afghanistan helping fight the Moslem insurgency. The first units entered the country in December 1979 and installed President Babrak Karmal after the previous communist regime was ousted.

Karmal's government seldom allows Western journalists to see the country, so battle reports cannot be confirmed independently.

Anti-terror net draws tighter

THE HAGUE, Netherlands (AP) — Cabinet ministers from European Common Market countries agreed Thursday to step up their exchange of terrorism information with the United States and other non-member nations in an effort to close the net on international terrorists.

The agreement reflected recognition that nations must work together to effectively fight terrorism, said a statement issued by the ministers from eight of the 12 Common Market nations.

U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese, FBI Director William Webster and Robert Oakley, director of the State Department's counterterrorism office, also met with some of the ministers, including British Home Secretary Douglas Hurd.

Hurd told a news conference that the U.S. officials "suggested in a very courteous and understanding way that it would be valuable if there was a procedure which doesn't now exist for contacts between the (Common Market) ... and the United States administration."

"And it has been agreed that there should be contacts between the Trevi group and third countries and obviously pre-empting among these is the United States," Hurd said. "So I think we've met the American interest in this matter and I welcome that."

The Trevi group is a reference to Common Market members who held a meeting on anti-terrorism last year in Rome.

Thursday's meeting was the second of Common Market-nations this week to respond to increased terrorist attacks in Europe, including

the April 2 bombing of a TWA jetliner over Greece, the April 5 bombing of a West Berlin discotheque and the April 17 attempt to smuggle a bomb aboard an El Al jetliner in London.

A total of six people, including five Americans, were killed in the two bombings. West Germany and the United States have said the disco bombing was ordered by Libya.

On Monday, foreign ministers of the Common Market nations agreed to order reductions in the staff of Libyan embassies in their capitals and impose other diplomatic sanctions against the North African country.

West German Interior Minister Friedrich Zimmermann said the Common Market ministers agreed Thursday to exchange such information as names of suspicious individuals, data about suspicious and stolen passports and security measures relating to air traffic.

"The ministers also agreed to exchange intelligence on non-terrorist crimes such as arms trafficking, international fraud, slave trade, drug smuggling, kidnapping, extortion and soccer hooliganism."

The ministers' statement said that in view of recent terrorist acts "both inside and outside Europe, combating terrorism calls for increased vigilance and determination within the framework of European cooperation."

Hurd was asked if the agreement was prompted by recent Libyan threats to attack Western Europe in retaliation for the U.S. air raids on Libyan cities April 15.

"I would not deny that," Hurd

said, but he added that the decision was aimed at all terrorist groups, not just at those believed linked to Libya.

Cuban rancor ends Geneva session

GENEVA (AP) — Debate in the annual Geneva Conference on Disarmament ended on a note of rancor Thursday when Cuba compared the United States to Nazi Germany because of its air strikes on Libya.

U.S. chief delegate Donald Lovitz said the Cuban was making a "preposterous rehearsal of history."

"We must admit ... that the conference this year has not achieved any substantive progress in solving problems of disarmament," said Viktor Issraelyan, the Soviet ambassador to the United Nations.

Pneumonia claims Duchess of Windsor

People

PARIS (AP) — The Duchess of Windsor, the American divorcee who became a queen to a king than his crown, died Thursday of pneumonia at her home in Paris. She was 89.

The romance between King Edward VIII and Wallis Warfield Simpson, which Winston Churchill called "one of the greatest love stories of history," roused the wrath of England and rocked the British Empire.

Edward gave up the throne for her after a reign of 325 days and they were married in France in 1937.

Although the duchess was unwelcome in England and rarely returned, the royal family said she will be buried at Windsor Castle beside Edward, who died in 1972.

Buckingham Palace said a funeral will be held at the castle Tuesday and will be private, "in accordance with the wishes of the duke and duchess."

When he had made his decision to abdicate, Edward told his subjects around the world in a moving radio address on Dec. 11, 1936:

"I have found it impossible to carry the heavy burden of responsibility and to discharge my duties as King as I would wish to do without the help and support of the woman I love."

The duchess had been bedridden for several years and died at 11 a.m. in the three-story mansion in the Bois de Boulogne where she and the duke set up house in the late 1940s. Her body remained there late Thursday afternoon.

A statement from the office of Dr. Jean Thiri, her personal physician, said she died of pneumonia, "a complication which occurs often in elderly people." Thiri visited her Tuesday evening and Thursday morning because she had developed a slight fever and was not eating regularly, the statement said.

She died half an hour after the doctor's last visit, with nurses and her butler in attendance.

American journalist H.L. Mencken described the love affair between Edward and Mrs. Simpson, who obtained her second divorce to marry him, as "the greatest since the origin of civilization." She called its outcome "monstrous."

The liaison was kept secret for two years. It became public after Edward succeeded to the throne in January, 1936, on the death of his father, King George V, and divided the government, the royal household and the empire.

"It was to lead in five short years to a terrible conclusion of which I had not the slightest intimation," the duchess wrote in her autobiography, "The Heart Has Its Reasons."

Large crowds, for and against the affair, gathered outside Buck-

ingham Palace. Prime Minister Stanley Baldwin threatened to resign and the Church of England was outraged.

The prime ministers of South Africa, Canada and Australia, then crown dominions, threatened to secede.

Baldwin finally gave the 41-year-old bachelor king a choice: Mrs. Simpson or the throne. He chose the former, abdicated and they began a life of exile.

Mrs. Simpson, who was 39, had slipped out of England a week earlier. She wept bitterly as she listened to Edward's radio broadcast at the home of a friend in Cannes, on the French Riviera.

"I found myself whispering, as to another self, that nothing so incredible, so monstrous, could possibly have happened," she wrote in her autobiography.

Edward left England for Austria the night of Dec. 11, after the radio address. Mrs. Simpson remained in Cannes awaiting her divorce from American-born shipping magnate

Ernest Simpson, which became final May 3, 1937.

They were reunited in the Chateau de Candé, near Tours in central France, and were married there June 3.

A civil ceremony was conducted first, then a religious one by the Rev. Robert Anderson Jardine, an Anglican clergyman who defied the Church of England's ban on marrying divorced people. The couple said

they "would always remember with gratitude his Christian act."

King George VI, who ascended the throne nine days after the marriage, named his brother Duke of Windsor, a title that automatically applied to Mrs. Simpson.

Baldwin, the prime minister, barred any children from inheriting the title and forbade designating the duchess "Her Royal Highness," lest she be considered one of the royal family. The duke and duchess had no children.

Edward's relations with his family were exacerbated by a visit he and the duchess made to Nazi Germany in 1937, during which they were feted by Adolf Hitler.

When World War II began, he volunteered for service and was sent to France as a major general acting as liaison between British and French headquarters. He was governor of the Bahamas from 1940-45.

The duchess was born Bessie Wallis Warfield in Blue Ridge Summit, Pa., on June 19, 1896, to a prominent Baltimore family.

She married navy pilot Earl Spencer when she was 20, and dropped the name Bessie because it was "a name given to cows."

Wallis pronounced herself "completely, totally and helplessly in love," but Spencer was an alcoholic and the marriage crumbled. They were divorced in 1927.

After brief whirls with American and English diplomats, and English and Italian naval officers, the future duchess met her second husband in a Warrenton, Va., hotel where she was awaiting her divorce decree.

Hart injects delay charge into judicial race

GOODING — The handling of court cases in the 5th District Judge Ronald Bruce of Rupert has become an issue in Bruce's campaign for re-election, with the primary election challenge by Magistrate Judge Wayne Haas of Shoshone, criticizing Bruce's performance.

— Both judges were invited to speak to the Magic Valley Peace Officers Association here Tuesday night, but were asked not to debate. Hart, telling officers that he and Bruce are "entirely different people."

because he was asked by people in the Mini-Cassia area to do so.

Wednesday, in an interview with the Times-News, Hart was asked to elaborate on that comment and said: "These people (who asked him to seek the office) are frustrated with a delay in processing cases in

that area and with sentences that have been handed down in criminal cases here."

He said that in a case he heard in Minidoka County involving an assault on a law enforcement officer, he sentenced the man involved to four months in the county jail on each of two counts listed in the complaint. Hart said an appeal to that sentence by the defendant has been pending before Bruce since Sept. 11, 1985.

Bruce responded Thursday that it would be improper for him to discuss a case on which he is yet to rule, such as the appeal mentioned by Hart.

Hart said he believes people in the

district want a change in handling of court cases in the Minidoka County area and that a change is needed.

Tuesday night Bruce simply outlined his experience and training to the peace officers, saying he has spent 10 years on the bench. He was a magistrate judge in Rupert prior to being appointed in 1981 to the district judge position, and is facing his second election to the office. He said he also worked in the Idaho attorney general's office.

In 1982 he was re-elected in a contest with Don Chisholm, Rupert city attorney, and received 53.8 percent of the vote.

Hart reminded officers Tuesday night that the election of judges in

the 5th Judicial District is on a district-wide basis and that residents of all eight Magic Valley counties vote for all judges.

Hart passed out campaign brochures and material and said he has been firm in matters of drug traffic in his Magistrate Court and would continue that policy if elected to the district post.

He said he has two policies for drug convictions — to get the criminals out of circulation by means of prison sentences and to issue strong statements to let them know drug trafficking will not be tolerated.

Hart noted that in one Jerome County drug case he sentenced the

convicted person to eight years in the state penitentiary. In Minidoka County, he said, a man convicted on three counts of delivery of heroin was given a three-year state prison sentence by Judge Bruce.

But Fred Abrams, a retired Idaho State prison official and a member of the Magic Valley Peace Officers Association, told Hart that in his 18 years in working with state penitentiary inmates he has never seen anyone cured of drug habits or addiction while serving a prison sentence. He said the courts, law enforcement and others involved need to work together to provide treatment and rehabilitation if drug traf-

State approves county request for federal grant

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Department of Water Resources has recommended for approval a \$2,950 federal grant to Twin Falls County for an energy-conservation study of two county buildings.

The county commissioners will decide early next month which energy-saving project recommended in the study they want to implement at the Courthouse and nearby Theron Ward Judicial Building.

The grant will pay half of the costs of the study, already conducted by J-U-B Engineers, Commissioner Marvin Hempleman said.

The county will receive \$1,950 for the study of the Courthouse and \$1,000 for the Judicial Building review, said Wayne Haas of the DWR.

The state department makes its recommendation on Idaho grant applications to the U.S. Department of Energy, Haas said. While the DOE has the final say, the state agency's have been "pretty automatic," he added.

In the study, the engineering firm

recommended five energy-saving measures.

The commissioners' priority, however, may be installing storm windows on the county buildings, Hempleman said. It was for that purpose that the county board set aside last fall about \$260,000 in federal revenue sharing funds.

According to the study, it will cost \$78,300 to install the storm windows. But the county will save \$4,903 a year in heating costs. In 15 years, the windows will pay for themselves through energy savings.

The county commissioners initiated the energy study because of the heating bills for the two buildings. The county paid, for example, a \$1,809 gas bill for the month of November, and part of the \$2,233 electric bill for that same month included the cost of operating the heating system.

The engineers also recommended insulating interior walls in the county buildings at a total cost of \$52,464. This improvement would result in a total annual savings of \$4,487, and the insulation would pay for itself in about 13 years.

Another recommendation was a heating recovery system costing

Evans details school laws

Critical change: tax base increase

TWIN FALLS — State Superintendent of Instruction Jerry Evans Thursday guided area school administrators through peaks and valleys in new school laws passed by the 1986 Legislature.

During a three-hour briefing session at O'Leary Junior High School, school officials at times either groaned or laughed at the impact of some of the laws.

"Every year, I say it can't get worse, but this was the most difficult session we've ever worked with in my 11 years," Evans said.

Under the new laws, school board trustees for the first time are subject to recall, but it will take a ruling by a magistrate judge before a single vote is cast.

Other new laws affecting school districts include a broader taxing authority, a requirement that parents be placed on local textbook selection committees and a requirement that schools and teachers keep a detailed list of all books and instructional materials used in the class.

Evans said the most important change comes from the property tax revenue bill. The change allows school districts to apply a 5-percent increase in current-year tax rates to current-year market value, which was never allowed before.

Evans said the new law allows districts to expand their tax bases.

"Before, as the districts grew, they were not getting any new money," Evans said.

He said there were pluses and drawbacks to the new bill. The plus is that the bill produces revenue that schools were not authorized to collect before.

The drawback is that it has "created a real guessing game" for schools trying to estimate current

CSI anticipates an OK on geothermal grant

TWIN FALLS — The geothermal wells at the College of Southern Idaho may soon be flowing with federal money that will, in turn, save local taxpayers money.

CSI applied for almost \$80,000 in federal matching grants from the U.S. Department of Energy to drill pipes at the Fine Arts Building and at the Physical Education Building so that water from the geothermal wells could be used.

The Idaho Department of Water Resources announced this week that it has approved CSI's grant request and sent it along to the DOE.

Wayne Haas, of the state Bureau of Energy Resources, said on Wed-

nesday that the DOE should approve the grant no later than next week.

"We anticipate no problems," Haas said. "Once it gets past the state, DOE usually approves."

CSI was one of 67 public and non-profit schools, hospitals and local government entities to receive a recommendation of approval by the state.

Haas said the energy-saving measures are expected to save more than \$109,000 per year at present rates.

Haas said projects were selected on the basis of energy savings and a payback period.

"The best ones receive funding, and CSI made the ranking," Haas said.

Adamson takes public pulse on walk

TWIN FALLS — Congressional candidate Dan Adamson walked into Twin Falls Thursday with a slight limp, caused by a blister on his left little toe, but he said the limp is no reflection on his campaign.

Since April 3, when he stepped off the Fremont County Courthouse steps in St. Anthony to begin his 320-mile hike across the 2nd Congressional District to Boise, he has shaken hands with hundreds of people each day and has been seen by thousands of passing motorists, he said Wednesday. The gimmick is working for him, said Adamson.

But on Tuesday, a water blister "the size of a tennis ball" welled up on his toe, making it painful to walk and forcing Adamson to trade in his heavy hiking boots for a pair of jogging shoes.

Adamson made his way down Main Street in Twin Falls Wednesday afternoon, stopping to shake hands with shoppers while marching-band music blared from car-top speakers on a station wagon ahead of him. Close behind came a motortome plastered with campaign signs and behind it a string of seven cars with bumper-stickers on them and their lights on.

There were no large crowds in town, so Adamson made his way through in about 20 minutes and then paused on Addison Avenue West to take some aspirin and rest for an interview.

Adamson said he is mostly listening to people he meets and what he is hearing is that agriculture is bad off and so is business, and people want some change.

"All they know is that business is bad," he said. They blame the state and the federal government.

"They are absolutely not happy with the new federal farm bill; they've yet to find anyone it is helping," Adamson said. Complaints about the dairy herd buyout program are most prevalent, followed closely by complaints about a program to allow dry-land wheat farmers to turn some acreage back to grasslands. He said a number of Rockland-area farmers applied and not one was accepted into the program.

Well reconstruction required

TWIN FALLS — The state Board of Health and Welfare Thursday approved a consent decree requiring Meander Point homeowners to reconstruct their well and monitor water quality.

The well was improperly constructed in a pit below ground, said Steve Stokes, administrator for the Division of Environment of the Department of Health and Welfare. Because the well head is below ground, there is the potential for surface water to contaminate the drinking supply, he said.

"It got by my eyes, but I didn't know," Stokes said. "They did not supply engineering reports."

The department has not charged the homeowners with having a contaminated drinking supply. However, it has maintained that subdivision officials have not provided for routine monitoring of bacteria content or a chemical analysis required every three years.

Homeowners are required to reconstruct the well by June 1, begin monitoring water quality and provide the department with engineering plans.

The subdivision was built in the 1970s, just west of Twin Falls on the rim of the Snake River Canyon.

Missing Kimberly woman found, listed in fair condition

TWIN FALLS — A young Kimberly woman who was the object of an area-wide search since she disappeared from her home Tuesday morning was located Thursday in the South Hills.

Twin Falls County Sheriff James Munn said the woman, Deena Windsor, 22, was conscious when found, but was cold, dehydrated and scared.

Her car was spotted by Terry Butler of Kimberly, piloting a search plane. Munn said her car was high-centered on a back road near Langdon Flats, south of the Shoshone Basin Road out of Rogerson, and the battery was dead when he reached the scene.

She was taken by Munn to Nat-Soo-Pah, where he met an ambulance that took the woman to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center for medical attention and treatment. Hospital officials listed her in fair condition Thursday night. Munn said he did not know how long she had been in the hills, as she was in no condition to be questioned. He said her mother and brothers own property in the area on Cottonwood Creek where she was found.

Munn said Windsor would be questioned and doctors were continuing to examine her late Thursday evening.

Her brother, Dan Kinsey, was one of the persons in a search plane that circled the area until Munn and

other ground searchers reached her car. Her husband Bill, a Twin Falls fireman, was in his own vehicle as part of the ground search. He was contacted by officers and brought to the hospital shortly after his wife was taken to the emergency room.

Jensen said the search plane flown by Butler located the car about 2 p.m. Thursday.

After a missing persons report was issued Wednesday, Mrs. Windsor was reported seen driving south about 2 p.m. That was the last time she was seen. It was not known whether she had been in her car where it was found since Wednesday afternoon, or if she had been somewhere else between the time she was seen leaving Twin Falls and the time the car was spotted from the air.

Girl critical after cycle accident

CASTLEFORD — A three-wheel motorcycle overturned in a private driveway near Castleford Thursday afternoon, critically injuring the 12-year-old driver.

Jennifer Jordan, 12, daughter of Melan Edson, was taken to Saint Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise Thursday afternoon for treatment of head injuries. Her companion and passenger, Kristy Edson, 11, was taken to St. Joseph's Demar Lot of Castleford, escaped with minor injuries.

without a law clerk, except for short periods of time and in summer months.

"In fact, until recently, I didn't have a secretary and have been typing up some of my own orders," Bruce said. "This is a poor excuse, I know, but it has created some delays for me."

Bruce said he could have demanded the services of a law clerk, but since Mindokka was somewhat more impoverished than other counties and an additional salary for a clerk might require a higher tax levy, he chose not to make that demand.

"If (Hart) is elected, I guess my advice to him would be to throw economics to the wind and ask for a law clerk in order not to be frustrated by delays in case handling," Bruce added.

"Last year I tried to hire a well-qualified, young woman candidate as

my clerk. The county allowed me only \$800 per month for salary and when she learned this, she turned the offer down. She could not afford to work for that amount," Bruce said.

"In Cassia County I believe the law clerk is paid \$1,500 a month about the minimum acceptable salary," Bruce said.

"There are some delays in cases in Mindokka County. I would be wrong to say there are not a few. But I believe and I can honestly say the Supreme Court has upheld all but about four or five of my judgments in appeals over the past 10 years. Some of the very good judges of the state may have several in a single year. That's not to say they are not good judges. They are, but circumstances of the cases' appealed result in reversals," he said.

market values.

Evans told the group that there is no one to go to the county to find the market value for 1986, as the rolls are not closed until September. School officials must estimate how much they will receive and tax accordingly, he said.

The law narrowly defines what a trustee may be recalled for — willful neglect or failure to perform a duty imposed by law; acting in an arbitrary and capricious manner; committing an unlawful act, either as a board member or a citizen; or violating the oath of office.

"To initiate a recall, residents must submit in writing specific charges that fall under those categories. The district must then respond within 15 days and prepare a 200-word synopsis of the charges that go to magistrate court.

A magistrate court judge will then conduct a hearing, which can include lawyers representing both sides and witnesses. If the judge rules there is sufficient evidence for a recall, the initiator of the petition must then get 20 percent of votes cast in the last trustee election.

The resulting law was patterned after a similar law in the state of Washington, Evans said.

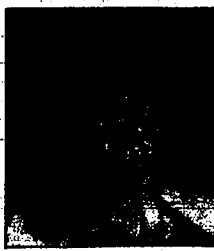

Winning woman jockey modest about her racing achievements

OPA-LOCKA, Fla. (AP) — Florida's winningest woman jockey has put her thoroughbred racing career "in the barn" for a while as she awaits a visit from the stork this summer.

"I'll be back," guarantees Mary Russ, described by experts as one of the best women riders in the country.

Tall for a jockey at 5-foot-4, she exercises diligently to keep her weight around 110 pounds. For most of her five-year professional career, she's ridden 700-800 mounts a year, mostly at South Florida's three tracks: Calder, Hialeah and Gulfstream. However, she's also left her mark at major tracks around the country, such as Aqueduct, Belmont and Saratoga.

"I have no idea how many races I've won, but I imagine it's over 500," she says matter-of-factly.

She's reticent about her achievements, but records show that last year she was the first woman ever to ride in a stakes race at Keeneland and Omaha. She won both aboard Harry N. Bill.

In 1982, with one year's experience, she won the Grade I Widener Handicap at Hialeah aboard Lord Barnley. Prior to that, she was the leading rider at Calder's Tropical meet. Russ has also been in the winner's circle for the Gulfstream Handicap.

If she isn't already, she's pretty close to being one of the leading women jockeys in the country, says Frank Alexander, a Miami race trainer.

Unlike most jockeys who begin their careers at an

early age, Russ didn't get her first ride until she was 26.

"I never had a pet as a kid, not even a dog," she recalls of her childhood in Tampa. At 15, she became "horse crazy" when she took care of a girlfriend's horse and learned to ride.

At 19, she went to work for Hobeau Farm in Ocala doing stable work and "breaking babies," the term used for the initial training of a thoroughbred. After two years there, she switched to the Red Oak Farms, also in Ocala.

Admittedly, Russ gave no thought to being a jockey in those years.

"I was a chunky kid and weighed about 125," she says, "too big to be a jockey."

At 22, she went to Calder looking for work. As a free-lancer, she galloped horses and performed odd jobs around the track's "back side." A year later, she decided to be a jockey, but kept her goal a secret.

"I dieted, which wasn't easy because I also worked in a deli and I'm a good eater," she adds with a smile. She also started riding bulls at Davie at night.

A broken collarbone and a collapsed lung, however, ended her bull-riding. Medical bills left her broke, but her weight was down to 100 pounds. Frustrated, Russ prepared to leave Calder, but trainer Manny Tortora gave her a riding contract.

Her first race was in November 1980. She was up on a mare in a six-furlong dash.

"I just hung on," she says with a laugh. "I probably beat only one horse."

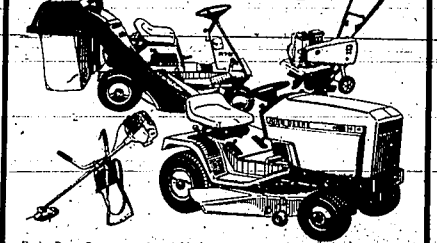

Judge rejects USFL lawsuit

Decides that antitrust intent proof required

NEW YORK — A federal judge on Thursday let stand, for now, the National Football League's television contracts with ABC, NBC and CBS, rejecting the United States Football League's claim that the NFL is illegally limited to one network deal at a time.

U.S. District Judge Peter K. Leisure ruled that the USFL, which seeks to nullify the NFL-network deals as part of a \$1.32 billion antitrust case, must first prove that the NFL contracts have the "intent or effect" of preventing competing leagues from getting their own network contracts.

Leisure, who is sitting at the trial of the USFL suit, presiding May

12, issued three related decisions in which he threw out many of the USFL charges against the NFL but said other allegations raise issues that must be decided by a jury.

In the rulings, Leisure: • Dismisses claims that the NFL tried to restrain the demise of the All American Football Conference, which formed in 1959, and the American Football League, which merged into the NFL in 1970. But he said the USFL can present arguments that the older league pressured CBS into not granting a contract to the World Football League, which closed in 1975.

disparagement as evidence of anticompetitive efforts directed against the new league in other areas.

Both sides said they considered the ruling a victory.

"My reaction is very positive," said USFL Commissioner Harry Usher. "I really regard it as a major victory. In a case that was considered as having no merit way back when, he's now saying it can go to a jury."

NFL spokesman Joe Browne said the league was "gratified" by the rulings on TV contracts, stadiums, game officials and "irrelevant NFL history."

"We are prepared to begin defense of this suit," he added.

Most of the attention in the case centers on the television contracts. Television deals have increasingly become the economic engine that drives big-league sports, and there is general agreement that without network television a new league would be hard-pressed to reach the stature of its rivals.

NFL draft approaches; subplots abound

NEW YORK — There are enough story lines in Tuesday's National Football League draft to fill a season of *Dynasty*.

- Will Bo bypass the Bucs for baseball?
- Will Byars be bypassed because of his break?
- Will the NFL provide a home for the 57 prospective draftees who tested positive on their first pro football drug exam?
- Will the annual round-robin session begin at 6 a.m. EST Tuesday at the Marriott Marquis Hotel in the heart of Times Square and will continue for 12 rounds and approximately 19 hours. The draft will be televised live by ESPN cable.

But the real action will be at 28 sites around the country that approximate battlefields command bunkers where generals and coaches and general managers make life-or-death (career threatening) decisions based on information from intelligence staffs no less diligent than the CIA in separating fact from rumor.

This year, the decisions may be harder to make than usual. The draft is deep in running backs and offensive linemen and relatively thin everywhere else.

"It's the kind of draft where you may have to sacrifice position for quality," says Dallas Coach Tom Landry. "If the position we want isn't there when it's our turn to pick, we'll take quality even if it's where we're well stocked."

"I'd say there are six rounds of make-it players plus about 10 more," says Dick Steinberg, director of player development for the New England Patriots. "But at some positions, you can't find much at all. We need a tight end desperately, but there's no tight end worth a first-round pick."

There also is the question of the 57 players who tested positive for illegal substances during drug tests given after the Super Bowl by the NFL: scouting combine. Most of those were for marijuana, but one player — a potential first-rounder — showed traces of cocaine in his urine.

Dan Reeves, coach of the Denver Broncos, says he won't draft any of the players on the list. But most other coaches probably will look at each case individually.

"You have to determine if there's a permanent problem," says Gene Stallings, coach of the St. Louis Cardinals. "Just because a guy made a mistake once doesn't mean he's going to do it again."

The first choice will be exercised by the Tampa Bay Bucs, who say they will take Bo Jackson, the Heisman Trophy winner from Auburn who is considered the best running back prospect since O.J. Simpson in 1969. But Jackson, like John Elway in 1983, has a hole card to use in the negotiations that already have begun — he's considered a top major-league baseball prospect.

The second choice goes to the Atlanta Falcons, who say they will take Tony Cassilas, Oklahoma's can't-miss nose tackle.

Suddenly, New York's Mets are baseball's hottest team

Report cites aid to U.S. industry

Oil import fee receives boost

WASHINGTON — Congressional supporters of imposing a fee on imported oil got new ammunition Thursday with a report saying such a levy would be the best way to reduce U.S. dependence on foreign oil and raise money to help trim budget deficits.

"We cannot overlook the opportunity offered by the rapidly falling oil prices," said Sen. Pete V. Domenici, R-N.M., chairman of the Senate Budget Committee — said that a once-in-a-century chance to simultaneously improve our fiscal condition, put part of the burden of the tax on foreigners and alleviate positively our energy predicament and our dependence."

The non-partisan Congressional Budget Office — in a report ordered by Domenici and Sen. Lawton Chiles, D-Fla., senior Democrat on the Budget Committee — said that of various oil tax options, the import fee would be the best means of reducing U.S. demand for imports and encouraging domestic exploration and production.

"By raising the price of oil imports, an oil import tariff would substitute for all imports: domestic oil production, production of substitutes for oil, conservation of oil and substitution of other fuels for oil," the report said.

"It would therefore lead to the

greatest possible reduction in oil imports... and provide the most assistance to domestic producers." The congressional economists estimated that at roughly the current oil price of \$13 per barrel, "imports would decline by 900,000 barrels per day under a tariff, by 500,000 barrels per day under an excise tax, by 100,000 barrels per day under a motor fuels tax, by 200,000 barrels per day under an energy tax and by

less than 100,000 barrels per day under a combination import tariff-motor fuels tax." "At oil prices of \$22 per barrel, the report said, "1987 U.S. oil imports would decline by roughly 400,000 barrels per day under an oil import tariff, 400 around 300,000 barrels per day under an oil excise tax, by perhaps 100,000 barrels per day under a motor fuels tax, by 100,000 barrels per day under an energy tax and by 100,000 barrels per day under a combination of an import tariff and a motor fuels tax."

Net U.S. imports of oil are about 4.3 million barrels a day. A barrel equals 42 gallons.

The report assumed an import tariff of \$5 per barrel, an excise tax of \$5 per barrel, a motor fuels tax of 12 cents per gallon, an ad valorem (invoice value) energy tax of 5 percent and a combination tax of \$2.50 on imported oil and 6 cents per gallon on motor fuels.

The report also said that at oil prices of \$14-per-barrel, the various tax options could reduce the projected budget deficit, in the next fiscal year from \$8.9 billion for the current \$24 billion for an excise tax. A tariff of \$23 per barrel, the deficit reductions would range from \$8.1 billion to \$22.1 billion.

more than five votes on the 20-member panel in favor of the fee.

Earlier this year, Treasury Secretary James A. Baker III said President Reagan was keeping the door open on consideration of an oil import fee as a way to reduce budget deficits. However, Reagan later slammed the door, saying he would not accept such a levy, or any other general tax increase.

Nonetheless, Domenici and others in Congress continue to push the idea as a way to shrink government red ink. The Senate is now considering a bipartisan budget blueprint drawn up by Domenici's committee that calls for \$18.7 billion in unspecified tax increases.

Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., who has been pushing for an oil import fee since the late 1970s, said the new report was "the freshest indication and the strongest evidence yet that the time for an oil import fee is now."

In addition, legislators from states whose economies are reeling from the effects of declining domestic oil prices continue to push for the fee.

"There are many who say that an oil import fee is dead as an idea, the president's against it, the industry is split," said Sen. J. Bennett Johnston, D-La. "I do not believe those arguments... are going to curtail the evidence yet that the time for the Congress to actually decide on whether we should have an oil import fee."

Long distance rate cut offered

WASHINGTON (AP) — American Telephone & Telegraph Co. on Thursday announced a \$1.5 billion long-distance rate reduction.

The plan would take effect June 1 unless the Federal Communications Commission makes changes.

Under the AT&T proposal, the cost of daytime calls would drop by 11.4 percent. The price of weeknight calls before 11 p.m. (local time) would drop by the same percentage rate. Smaller reductions — 2.7 percent — are planned for calls after 11 p.m. and on weekends until 5 p.m. Sunday.

It was the largest single rate reduction the company has ever sought.

AT&T's chief competitor, MCI Communications, Inc., responded by saying, "We'll have a change by June 1 to remain competitive."

MCI spokesman John Houser said specific details of any MCI price changes would have to await a thorough study of the AT&T proposal.

A spokesman for GTE-Sprint, another long-distance company, said, "Although we need to wait and see what develops at the commission, we expect to continue providing service at less than AT&T's price of service."

Gene Kimmelman, legislative director for the Consumer Federation of America, complained that the reductions are "loading the benefits most toward the business side."

"This is a pretty skewed rate reduction," he said. "That means that the big winner here is the business person who uses long-distance during the day."

"That's flat out wrong," replied Herb Linnen, AT&T's Washington spokesman. "This filing does not favor the business customer over the ordinary residential customer."

Under the new AT&T plan, WATS lines, used by businesses which do a lot of long-distance calling, would cost 12.5 percent less in day and evening hours and 5 percent less late night and on weekends.

Rates for "800-Service" lines that are toll-free for the calling party, are scheduled to drop by 9.8 percent for day and evening service and 2 percent at other times.

However, at the same time, AT&T will raise the flat monthly price charges for WATS and 800 lines.

Also on June 1, the FCC will also order the nation's long distance residential phone users to help pay for the line that runs from each phone to the telephone company's central office.

First Security posts strong first quarter

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — First Security Corp. reports its first-quarter net income of \$7.1 million, its highest quarterly earnings in nearly three years.

Spencer F. Eccles, president of the Salt Lake City based financial services company, said the 1988 first-quarter earnings mark a comparison to only \$2.1 million at the same time last year and \$6.7 million in 1985's fourth quarter.

"Earnings have now increased for four consecutive quarters," he said. "This trend is solid evidence that First Security is slowing regaining its earnings momentum."

Total loans and leases outstanding for the first quarter totaled \$3.7 billion, a 9.5 percent increase over March 31, 1988, company officials said. Meantime, total assets were \$5.3 billion, a 6.7 percent increase over 1985's final quarter.

Commercial loans increased by \$111 million to \$1 billion, or 12.5 percent over the same period last year, and average consumer loans grew by \$145 million to \$259 million, or 18.3 percent more than 1985's fourth quarter.

"First Security's long-standing interstate strategy has been to further expand across state lines through the use of our mortgage loan subsidiaries," Eccles said.

"However, with the recent relaxation of regulations prohibiting interstate banking, it is now possible to expand across state lines through acquisition of commercial banks or bank-holding companies."

With that in mind, Eccles said First Security had "adjusted our interstate expansion strategy. We are selling our mortgage loan subsidiaries."

"The sale of \$2 billion in mortgage servicing contracts was completed this past month and resulted in a net gain of \$32 million."

Mortgage business changes confusing

A relocated executive and family wanted a mortgage with the lowest possible monthly payments, because his company was paying all the up-front costs.

He also expected to be transferred in another five years, so his was a short-term mortgage commitment.

He took out a low-interest adjustable mortgage with four points up front, with his company paid.

A young medical intern had a wife and infant to support on a modest income. His needs were for a low-cost condominium to be purchased for a little down and at least five years of low monthly payments which would then escalate to higher monthly payments as his income grew.

He took a 95 percent mortgage with an initial interest rate below market, but which graduated yearly up to the market rate.

were his monthly payments, but he could handle these burdens with ease.

All you need to do is look out the window of a moving car and you know it's the home buying season. And no matter whether you long ago found and bought the house you want, your curiosity compels you to study the "for sale" signs, note what's on the market and wonder what the terms of a sale would be.

Mortgages come in all shapes and sizes — fully amortizing conventional fixed rate, one-year and three-year adjustable rate as well as some mortgages with artificially low interest rates and a principal that actually increases in the early years (instead of being paid down (negative amortization).

To avoid today's mortgage maze and get the best deal possible, you, a potential buyer, must first roughly calculate what you can afford in monthly payments.

A widely accepted rule of thumb is 28 percent of gross monthly income can be budgeted for housing expenses.

"Get the benefit of a nationwide computer mortgage search," urges Dan Bixler, head of Bixler Real Estate Co. in Katoona, N.V. "But that's not enough. With so many mortgage opportunities available, the trick is to find the one that best fits your needs."

"Use the computerized programs that match buyers and lenders to get the best terms," adds Charlene Geiger, vice president of Empire Financial Corp., also in Katoona. Does it work? "About 10,000 mortgages were handled this year in 1985," she answers.

There are other costs (outside of mortgages) in buying a house, such as attorney fees, home inspections, surveys, taxes, closing fees. And points. Points represent the lender's originator costs amortized for processing the mortgage.

If you ask for the fewest points possible, but be prepared to pay a higher mortgage rate. Or conversely, you can seek higher points and a lower mortgage rate over the years.

Which mortgages are the most popular today? With interest rates way down from their peaks, the long-term fixed-rate mortgage. And the least popular? Short-term adjustable with no limit on how high the rate could go.

"There's little worse than the feeling that you got stuck with a poor mortgage. It lasts too long to be forgotten."

A good affordable mortgage is a lifelong commitment for most of us and it would be wise to spend what you must to get what you want and can live with.

Today, the computer can help us superbly with our search. It can do much of the paperwork required by buyers and can check on a mortgage's progress while sellers do no more than wait on a phone line.

Gone is the "standing in line at the bank" mentality. Here is a machine that actually seems created for our peace of mind in this area, even though we know it wasn't. You still must pay for the mortgage, though. That much the computer leaves to you.

Fear of terrorism invades film sets; precautions taken

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Fear of terrorism abroad has struck Hollywood with U.S. guards protecting a film crew in Greece. Executives warning their staffs to be on guard in foreign trouble spots and television companies canceling plans to work in Europe.

The cast and crew of "Hardboiled II" were surprised when American guards came on their set in Greece last week to provide protection while they filmed a sequel to the 1984 comedy.

There have been no signs of trouble for us," Dimitri Logothetis, one of the film producers based in Los Angeles. "But the day after the bombing (the U.S. attack on Libya), the American embassy sent over a couple of guards."

Greece is one of the places where officials fear terrorists may strike against Americans. Most of the people involved in "Hardboiled II" are U.S. citizens, and Logothetis' production company, First American Film Capitol, is based here.

"Because we're working on location, we're in a high-visibility kind of situation," he said, "so I guess the

embassy figured it was a matter of precaution. And we feel pretty good about it."

Shooting of the film, which began March 25, should end this week.

"Everyone there feels pretty comfortable and safe," he says, "but they're aware of the international situation and there is tension hovering over everybody like a little cloud. We'll be glad to have everyone come home."

"From Beyond" is shooting in Italy — another country targeted in the past by terrorists. Los Angeles-based Empire films must film most of its productions there because the company purchased director Dino De Laurentis' studio outside Rome in January.

"Economically, it's a good place to be," said Tony Angelotti, vice president of marketing and public relations. "And there have been terrorist actions in Italy for many years. Knock on wood they won't strike against movie companies."

Empire has cautioned the cast and crew of "From Beyond," a science-fiction film, about going places known to be popular among

Americans or making themselves conspicuous on the streets.

The television industry has already taken precautions against terrorism.

NBC pulled its "Rage of Angels, Part II" miniseries out of Rome and relocated to New York state. ABC's "Good Morning America" canceled a week-long feature on top European vacation spots and will instead cover popular domestic sites.

Some fear the renewed threat of terrorism may affect the Cannes Film Festival, planned for May 8-19 in France.

"Are we concerned? Yes. Are we doing anything about it? No. We're not going to make any decision until the festival gets closer," said Joel Coler, vice president of international advertising and publicity for 20th Century Fox.

"My decision (to go) won't have anything to do with the fact of what's going on in Europe," said Jack Gordon, president of UA-MGM international motion picture distribution. "There are hot spots all over the world and when you travel for a living, as I do, you have to face that."

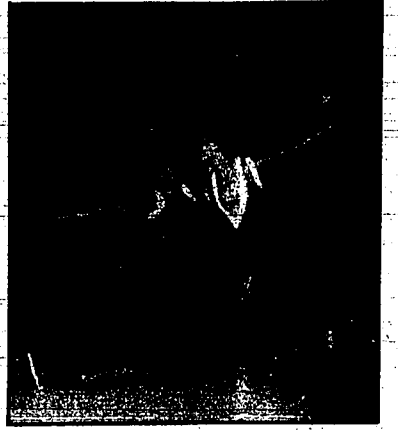

State says 'American Bandstand' studio should be on historic list

HARRISBURG, Pa. (AP) — A state agency wants the Philadelphia building used for the TV show "American Bandstand" listed on the National Register of Historic Places, saying the show was "a major force" in the development and dispersal of rock and roll.

The Historical and Museum Commission completed an application nominating the now-darkened studio for the list. It said the Historic Preservation Board approves, the application will be sent to Washington.

"American Bandstand," a mixture of rock music, dancing and celebrity guests, "is a cultural institution of exceptional importance" in "the development of rock and roll music," the commission's application says.

Quoting one rock historian, the application says the show "was the cement of a generation, setting the dress, dances, pop heroes and modes of behavior."

Larry Tise, the commission's executive director, said the west Philadelphia building also probably was the first in the area built specifically to be a television studio. Its design was copied by other stations in the 1950s, he said.

The building was constructed in 1947 for the radio station WREX-TV. The show began as "Bandstand" on Oct. 13, 1952, with local disc jockey Bob Horn as host. The daily program went national and was renamed "American Bandstand" in 1957 after Dick Clark became host.

The show moved to another site in 1963 and left Philadelphia for California in 1964 when the program was switched to a Saturday time slot. Clark and the show remain on air today, making "Bandstand" the longest-running music variety program in television.

The building's brick exterior now is dotted by graffiti and grass grows between cracks in the sidewalk.

The studio, owned by public television station WHYY, is for sale, Tise said.

He said the move to place the building on the register began while he was watching "American Bandstand's" anniversary special on television with a colleague.

"We started thinking about the importance of American bandstand culturally in terms of social customs, style, speech, habits in

American society," he said Wednesday.

"We looked into it and found that the building was still standing and pretty much unchanged."

Dick Clark, who was contacted by Tise, wrote, "We are all thrilled about wanting to make 'American Bandstand' something special to contemporary American cultural history. It would be an honor to have it listed."

Pennsylvania has more than 1,000 listings in the register, which is maintained by the National Park Service. Placement on the list would not prevent owners of the building from demolishing it, Tise said.

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — The Choral Arts Society of Philadelphia will be making its first European tour in July when it performs in Warsaw, Berlin and London.

The 200-voice symphonic chorus will tour July 12-25 with the 120-member Warsaw National Opera Orchestra. A five-day stop is planned in Warsaw.

On July 23, it will perform "A Sea Symphony" and Beethoven's Ninth Symphony at the Royal Festival Hall in London.

Society singers have sung with the Philadelphia Orchestra and other major orchestras, both in the United States and abroad.

Summer's here early, at least on the radio

HOLLYWOOD — Forget what the calendar says: Summer is here.

There is a wealth of singles on the air that reflect the playful, good time spirit and boundless energy that have been associated with Summer Pop since Chuck Berry, the Beach Boys and beyond.

But guess who is leading the way: Prince.

His new "Parade" album lacks the consistency and focus of his "Dirty Mind" to "Purple Rain" period, but several of the LP's selections ideally fit the light, upbeat atmosphere of the vacation-oriented summer months. One of them, "Kiss," is topping Billboard magazine's national singles chart.

But Prince's contribution does not end with his own records. He also played a part, at least indirectly, in two other current, summer-oriented Top 10 singles.

Using the pseudonym Christopher, Prince wrote the Bangles' "Manic Monday," which is No. 4 this week on the charts. And two ex-members of the Time, the Minnie Riperton band, Prince helped launch a few years back, co-wrote and co-produced Janet Jackson's spunky, "What Have You Done for Me Lately," which is No. 8.

Prince is not the only sign Summer Pop has arrived. Here are nine Summer Pop singles that are current radio favorites.

—The Bangles' "Manic Monday" — The bright, bouncy song is one thing that makes this a candidate for best single of the year: a terrific look at the alarm clock blues and at the start of the working week. Sample line: "Six o'clock already — I was just in the middle of a dream. I was kissin', Valentino ... By a crystal blue Italian stream ... Equally inviting are Susan and Holly's perfectly tailored vocal and the Bangles' Mamas and Papas-inspired harmonies. "The river never" — It was 20 years ago this week that the Mamas and Papas' only No. 1 record entered the Top 40. Its title: "Monday, Monday."

—The single combines an ever-so-cool update of a classic James Brown's guitar-accented funk riff with witty lyrics that suggest a bit more humility in Prince's sexually aggressive posture. "You don't have to be rich to be my girl," he advises. "You don't have to be cool to rule my world." Even the put-downs are tinged with humor: "Act your age,

not your shoe size," he tells one prospective lover. Keep an ear open also for two other Summer Pop jewels from "Parade": "Girls and Boys" and "Mountain."

—Janet Jackson's "What Have You Done for Me Lately" — Michael Jackson's little sister grows up on this sassy, snappy declaration to her self-centered lover that she is not going to be taken for granted any longer. Jackson's partners in both writing and producing the record were former Time members James Harris III and Terry Lewis, and the record carries a lot of the shaggy, dance-floor consciousness of that old group's work.

—Psychedelic Furs' "Pretty in Pink" — The best thing about the success of this title tune from the Holly Ringwald film is that it focuses attention on the Furs, a British band led by Richard Butler. An appealing artistic mix of David Bowie and John Lydon, he is one of the most commanding writers and performers on the contemporary rock scene — though the group's last LP was a disappointment. For the Furs, at their best, and an even stronger version of this song, check out the band's excellent 1983 "Talk Talk Talk" album.

—Bob Seger's "American Storm" — Seger may have written this rousing tune as an anti-drug statement, but it is just as easy to think of it as a warning against any compromise or corruption.

—Erasure's "Who Needs Love Like That?" — Agreed, Yaz-founder Vince Clarke's approach was more soulful when Alison Moyet was handling lead vocals, but the perculator-styled beat is still hard to dismiss.

—Robert Palmer's "Addicted to Love" — Palmer's most appealing Top 40 entry since "Bad Case of Loving You."

—Nu Shooz's "I Can't Wait" — The vitality and charm of Madonna's best records.

—Jesus and Mary Chain's "Just Like Honey" — This would rival "Manic Monday" as the best single of the year. If Warner Bros. ever gets around to releasing it as a single, the track from the group's highly recommended "Psychocandy" album is an odd, but haunting mix of roaring guitar feedback and highly melodic, Phil Spector-inspired romanticism. The melody, by mainstream radio standard, the record was a smash single in England and it is among the most played tracks on college radio.

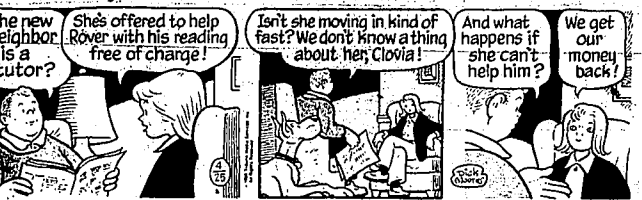

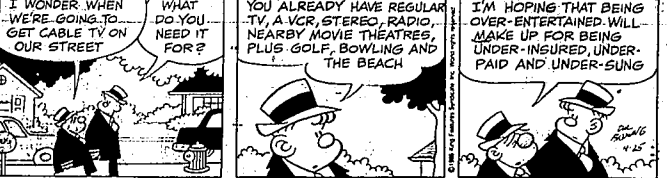

'Legend': Light, unicorns, no wit

HOLLYWOOD — Once upon a time there was a handsome young hermit whose purity of love for a beautiful princess was symbolized by a pair of unicorns who roamed the lush forest where the hermit made his home.

So enchanted was the princess by the unicorns that she touched the magical but fragile horn of one of these blindingly white animals before the hermit could stop her. As the unicorn lay stricken, the Lord of Darkness started unleashing all his terrible powers.

Film maker Ridley Scott says that legends are born of the eternal struggle between the forces of light and darkness. Perhaps so, but it is hard to imagine his "Legend" living up to its name.

Although awesome in its fantasy splendor, "Legend" has even less substance than Scott's last film, "Blade Runner." And whereas that detective thriller of the future offered a truly original vision, the look of "Legend," as gorgeous as it is, seems a distillation of all the illustrations for all the fairy tales ever read to a child.

Scott and his writer William Horstberg offer little to keep most adults involved. (When his hero, played by Tom Hanks, dons a gold fish-scale tunic and picks up a golden sword and shield, can there be any doubt that the Lord of Darkness?)" It's ultimately unbeatable, will eventually be driven into retreat? Nevertheless, "Legend" is the kind of picture grandparents ought to feel comfortable taking their grandchildren to see.

That misty forest Cruise inhabits like a more fully clad Tarzan is alive with an assortment of polly-eared elves, trepachans, pixies ("among them," "The Tin Drum's" David Bennett and the Hollywood veteran Billy Barty). But now it is afflicted by a fearsome frost... and invaded by cadaverous, buzzardlike goblins, minions of the Lord of Darkness (Tim Curry, campaced and hurried to look like a gigantic, satanic bright red lobster). Naturally, Darkness wastes no time imprisoning the princess (newcomer Mia Sara) in his vast, gloomy netherworld castle.

With his gleefully dire pronouncements hyped by a stereophonic resonance, Curry brings the film much-needed fun and vitality. (The film's other strongest asset is Tangerine Dream's shimmering, pulsating score.) As embodiments of pure love, Cruise and Sara are pretty much restricted to seeming sweet and brave. "Legend" is not without whimsical touches, but it surely could have used more humor and invention.

Clearly, tremendous pains were taken in bringing "Legend" to the screen. Although the magical world created by production designer Ashstone Gorton might have been more effective had it been less dense and more stylized. It is a sumptuous, richly colored feast for cinematographer Alex Gordon's camera. What would have become "Legend" most, however, is a measure of the wit, sophistication and in-limacy Cocteau brought to his classic version of "The Beauty and the Beast."

Geraldine Page enchants in 'Bountiful'

THE TRIP TO BOUNTIFUL (PG). Horton Foote's movie adaptation of his famed '50s teleplay: a brilliantly poignant tale of an old woman, trapped in a contented Houston household, who wishes to return home, for one day, to Bountiful, Tex. — and the courageous odyssey she undertakes to do it. Beautifully written, directed and acted, as the woman, Geraldine Page — less ethereal than Lillian Gish in the original, more of a plump, gabby eccentric — gives a magnificent performance. The movie's mixture of tears and laughter is near-Chekhovian; so is the way it sees grief rooted in the passage of time, in barriers to communication, in life itself.

BAND OF THE HAND (R). Five young Miami toughs are sent to a special detention project in the Everglades and come up against one tougher "drill" instructor (Stephen Lang) who wants them to get our MIAs out of Vietnam. Also stars Michael Carmine, Lauren Holly and John Cameron Mitchell. Directed by Paul Michael Glaser.

THE COLOR PURPLE (PG-13). This time out, director Steven Spielberg has chosen to put an antic disposition on and his almost every

decision has been disastrous: He has prettified Alice Walker's novel, made its comic scenes slapstick, and has lipited over the book's crucial relationship. But whatever — the faults of the director's artistic choices, he has collected a near-perfect cast: Whoopi Goldberg's compelling, incandescent Cella, Margaret Avery's electrifying, changeable Shug Avery and Oprah Winfrey's indomitable, unforgettably Sofia.

THE MONEY PIT (PG). Overly elaborate special effects and a less than inspired plot trip up what might have been a funnier comedy about a couple coping with the hazards of trying to remodel a Long Island mansion. With Tom Hanks, Shelley Long, Alexander Godunov, Maureen Stapleton.

MURPHY'S ROMANCE (R). A contemporary Western romance — a June-November courtship comedy that is also a moral fable about making the right choices: bright and earthy and solid, just like its stars, Sally Field and James Garner. Martin Ritt blends them cannily: Garner's super-relaxed style, his maverick affability, plays wondrously against Field, who gives what is undoubtedly her sexiest performance. It seems like we are getting the real Ritt here, the real Field and Garner — and, even if we are not,

they are a delightful group to spend an evening with: warm, funny, the salt of the earth.

OUT OF AFRICA (PG). Because we are in a well-defined, faintly magical, perfectly appointed period where a level of intelligence is prized in this film, what is its problem? Casting, mostly, and a sense of place: Meryl Streep, as Isak Dinesen, may convince us utterly that she is in love with Africa, but our views of it are a little too stately to really feel the place. And Robert Redford's Denis Finch Hatton is a real cipher. Streep can pretty nearly do anything in the film — except that she cannot provide all the heat in a love affair when Redford is not giving much to his role.

POLICE ACADEMY 3: BACK IN TRAINING (PG). No worse than "Police Academy 2," which was awful. Steve Guttenberg and other recruits from the hilarious first film are back to help save the academy from becoming a victim of a budget crunch. (Just think if they fail, there will not be a "Police Academy 4.")

WILDCATS (R). A good-natured but superficial comedy sort of "Bad News Bears Goes to The Geh-

to" — about a spunky female football coach who strives for recognition while taming a delinquent gang of inner-city funksters. Despite a remarkably agile, endearing performance by Goldie Hawn and a lighthearted finale, the film is loaded with so many cardboard figures and ethnic stereotypes that the coach's triumph has the hollow ring of comic melodrama.

Chris Norris has a right to sing the blues, and teach it, too

SAN JUAN CAPISTRANO, Calif. — A jazz critic, interviewed on National Public Radio a few days ago, said he detected a rising interest in the roots of American jazz — early Louis Armstrong and his New Orleans colleagues, the traditional songs and styles that led on to everything else.

You do not have to look far for confirmation. The annual traditional jazz festival in Sacramento, Calif., over Memorial Day weekend will be as usual attract a hundred bands or more, and tens of thousands of visitors. There will be a third annual trad jazz festival in Los Angeles over Labor Day weekend.

And on most Sunday afternoons a standing-room-only crowd gathers at The Depot here to hear Dick Shoshan's Golden Eagle Jazz Band and its remarkable blues-singing vocalist Chris Norris. The band performs at other venues, and will be at the Sacramento and Los Angeles festivals, but The Depot has been its home base since 1977 and Norris has

been singing with the group since 1982.

There may not be a pattern in the lives of blues singers, but if there is one, Norris almost certainly does not fit it.

She is a sensationally fine blues singer, carrying forward the spirit of Bessie Smith and Ma Rainey, who are her idols and the sources of most of her songs. More than half her repertoire was written by women.

She is also an academic, Dr. Chris Norris is, who teaches freshman composition, women's studies and a Great Books curriculum at the University of California, San Diego.

On a recent Sunday, she had to hurry home after the performance at The Depot to prepare her notes for a Monday morning lecture on Plato's "Republic."

Norris' voice is strong but plaintive, deep and dark. The blues notes bend and slide in the way you have to hear and feel but cannot really learn or read from music manuscripts. (You think of Armstrong's remark that if you have to ask what jazz is, you are never going to know.)

The ancient words of loss and betrayal and

loneliness still carry overtones of the urgency and pain in which they were composed, in a different place, in a different world, out of a different kind of life-experience. In the small world of present-day blues singers, Norris is one of the best.

"You can't believe how naked and vulnerable I feel when I'm singing," Norris says. "It's all about love and loss and you can't fake it; you can't pretend it's acting."

She is 32, and the average age of her Sunday afternoon audiences is probably older than that, although she says she finds more young people responding to those old melancholy anthems. A tall and elegant brunette, she suggests the concert stage and not the gin mill, yet the singing is passionate rather than studied.

She is from Tacoma, Washington (not exactly blues country), from an extended Italian family on her mother's side, with a different musical tradition. She studied opera — soprano — for several years from any more. What happens then is Chris Norris her teens into her young 20s and briefly con-

sidered medical school until literature, at the University of Washington, caught her interest.

It was a friend's record collection, well-seasoned with Bessie Smith and Ma Rainey sides, that introduced her to the blues and changed her life, or part of it.

"I'd tried singing big band stuff, and hated it," Norris says. "And I hated the pop stuff, too." There wasn't room for improvisation, and part of the attraction of the blues is the possibility for going free-form.

"No performances are ever quite the same. Once in a while you can even sing yourself into a corner, and have to wiggle your way out."

She learns the old songs from records in the first instance. "The sheet music is almost always wrong," she says. She listens to Ma Rainey's "Ain't No Man Blues" or "Misery Blues" or Bessie Smith's "Young Woman Blues" until the song is part of her, different musical tradition. She studied opera — soprano — for several years from any more. What happens then is Chris Norris singing a Ma Rainey song, which is a

world away from imitating a Rainey record.

"I've learned a lot about lyrics that you can't learn from listening to the words. You listen to the instrument, the reeds especially. Not many singers know how to sing blues notes; I don't know how I hear them, but I do."

The teacher and the blues singer do link arms, metaphorically speaking. There's a recombinative quality to the music that is wonderful," she says.

She is also a fiercely enthusiastic teacher, concerned about the importance of giving a taste of the humanities to a student body preponderantly bound for the sciences. "It's obviously very important to humanize the scientists," she says. Next term, in the Great Books program, she will be covering the interesting territory from Virgil to Dante.

It sounds a far cry from Virgil to Ma Rainey, but it is all heartfelt human experience and, as you might say, Dante and Bessie Smith both knew how bad things could be, and how powerfully they could be expressed.

Sen. Gary Hart takes a hard look at U.S. military machine

Sen. Gary Hart is surrendering his Colorado seat to devote full time to running as a Democrat for President. The track record for books with a candidate's name on the dust jacket says this one would be about him, starting as the freckle-faced boy next door who has some promises to disclose.

Instead, it is a thoroughly professional and troubling dissident's look at a U.S. fighting machine that he and his colleague say is more machine than fight. That is the first surprise. The second is that it is not written down to laymen who are neither armchair generals nor war lovers but written out — using illustrations to make points that do not require a West Point education to follow.

What Hart and William S. Lind see when they look at Europe is the maldistribution of manpower in a U.S. Army that has more people talking on telephones and distributing computerized orders than it has on the front lines. The Army's tank-of-choice, the M-1 Abrams, a doctrine that dates back to a competing design: the Army put the loser into production. The authors see Army strategy based on a doctrine of superior firepower digging in to wear down an opponent, a doctrine that dates back to U.S. Grant and the Civil War. The only potential opponent the Pentagon ever mentions is the Soviet Union, which outnumbered the United States in every category where firepower and attrition count.

And that is the good news because, Hart says, the Army at least is trying to change its doctrine to a nit-

and-run approach that the reformers call "maneuver," which emphasizes fighting in all directions with the hope of confusing an opponent. The Air Force and the Navy, by contrast, like things the way they are. Rather than change, they rig training exercises to show that they are on the right course.

In the Navy's case, that involves handicapping the scores for submarines when they are pretending to be the foe against U.S. surface ships. Without such "handicapping," submarines would sink everything the first day, take all of the fun out of the maneuvers, and demonstrate what the Navy refuses to admit — that the submarine is the capital ship of the fleet now, the most effective weapon, taking the place of the aircraft carrier as the carrier once took the place of the battleship.

The most troubling conclusion is

that a defense system top-heavy should be the most effective that with officers, cluttered with wrong kinds of aircraft, and mesmerized by hardware rather than fighting tactics will have to resort to nuclear weapons early in any serious fighting. Gen. Bernard W. Rogers, chief of military forces of the North Atlantic Treaty Organization is not cited in the book, but his name floats to mind at that point because he has warned us that he could be forced to nuclear weapons early in any fighting in Europe.

"Military reform aims at giving us conventional forces effective enough to get us off the nuclear hook," the authors say.

The book assumes the worst in that its whole premise is that the United States may indeed have to use its enormous defense force some day, and that —

that force middle-rank officers as it has, could do better, in fact, because too many have too much time on their hands and turn into bureaucrats whose first thought is to buck a decision upward instead of making it themselves.



Offbeat, quirky private eye series blends 'shoot-em-up' with poetry

"Spenser: For Hire" began life last fall, airing in one of TV's no-win zones: Fridays against "Miami Vice." But a few months later, ABC moved the series to Tuesdays, the network's strongest night.

Even riding the tails of "Moonlighting," "Spenser" has not been as strong as was hoped for, but the series deserves to be rewarded. It's offbeat, quirky and literate.

Based on the character created by novelist Robert Parker, Spenser is a former Boston cop who is now a sensitive private eye: He jogs, he quotes poetry, he cooks, he has a live-in girlfriend to whom he is faithfully devoted. But he also likes to pound the heavy bag at a seedy gym and is pretty quick with his fists.

Robert Ulrich, beefy and extremely likable, plays Spenser. He is the type of man-whom arbiters of gender redefinition like *Cosmopolitan* trumpet as the "new man" of the '80s: tough and tender, suspended between the extremes of Alida and Rambo. After one TV bomb ("Gavilan") and a couple of unsuccessful movies ("Ice Pirates," "Turk 182"), Ulrich has found a role in which he seems comfortable.

Spenser's charm is his articulateness. Philip Marlowe and Sam Spade would most likely go running for Webster's Unabridged if they could hear him. Spenser's voice-over sounds like an English professor desperately trying for tenure: "The savage in man is never quite eradicated," he said on one episode after escaping death yet again. "Henry David Thoreau said it: I've spent the better part of my life dealing with it."

Spenser's opposite is his buddy Hawk (Avery Brooks), who wouldn't be caught dead reading Keats or cooking pasta primavera. Shaven-

headed, goateed, his eyes usually hidden behind shades, he serves as kind of a hipster guardian angel for Spenser. Hawk is a former Mob strong-arm man who has a longtime "understanding" with Spenser.

Invariably, it is Hawk who turns up to rescue him. One time, Spenser was about to be blown away by a psychopath who had forced him at gunpoint to help him escape. Hawk had hidden himself in the trunk of the car and just as the looney was about to squeeze the trigger — boom — out he pops, with a cocked .44

Magnum. The psychopath became history. The relationship between Hawk and Spenser — even more so than the relationship between Spenser and his schoolteacher girlfriend Susan Silverman (Barbara Stock) — is what helps make the series click.

The plots often veer to standard TV detective fare, but this is transcended by the series' gritty atmosphere — "Spenser" doesn't look like the usual Southern California back lot. Most of the series is shot on location in Boston. Most of the TV year, Spenser and company seemed to be crunching through ice and snow. We see cold puffs when the characters talk. There's lots of authentic Boston atmosphere.

Unlike "Cheers" or "St. Elsewhere," which are also set in Beantown, we get to see the city, usually a Bruins-fan-eye view: Southie, the three-deckers of Dorchester, the twisted streets of the North End.

Most significantly, for a prime-time detective show — for an ABC show, especially — "Spenser: For Hire" has fewer car chases than you'd expect. Boston drivers are the wildest in the country, anyway.

TV movies now more serious than theater films, writer says

LOS ANGELES — Television movies are now more serious than films made for the theaters, at least according to producer-writer Bob Shanks, who has written a book on how to make a TV movie.

"The difference has to do with the audience," Shanks said. "It's a direct crossing of demographics. Theatrical features used to tackle serious subjects, but now they seem mostly to be silly."

Such serious TV movies as "The Burning Bed," which dealt with wife-beating; "Something About Amelia," about incest, and "The Day After," which showed the horrors of nuclear war, attracted large audiences, inspiring the networks to do more serious-issue movies.

"Despite those socially relevant subjects in movies, Shanks believes television has missed the mark in educating the public."

"Television could be put to use to teach us in an entertaining way about our history and culture," he said, "but much of television's time just seems to be squandered. Television has changed so much. When I started at ABC if you had a good drama you put it on the air and worried about the ratings later. Now, it's all ratings, and I don't see it getting any better."

Shanks is the writer of four television films and a former programming executive for ABC. At ABC he created and developed "Good Morning America," "20-20" and "Wide World of Entertainment."

He is the author of "The Cool Fire — How to Make It in Television," a novel called "Love Is Not Enough," and a new book, "The Primal Screen," from W.W. Norton & Co. The newest book leads the would-be screenwriter through all the

steps necessary to turn an idea into a motion picture. He uses as an illustration his own screenplay for the CBS movie "Drop Out Father."

Shanks works out of a second-floor office at the rear of his rented Hollywood home. He operates in partnership with his wife, Ann Shanks, who produces his screenplays. On his desk is a battered Smith-Corona typewriter, a high school graduation gift that he keeps running by cannibalizing other typewriters.

"Ann and I work as a team," he said. "Most of the production duties fall on her shoulders and I'm sort of the grouch in the background. We've done four movies and 30 shows

together." They recently produced a one-woman show on Broadway, "Lillian," based on the works of Lillian Hellman, and starring Zoe Caldwell.

Shanks said his new book came out of his experiences writing and producing TV movies.

"I was at ABC, where I bought movies from other people," he said. "I developed 'Eleanor and Franklin: The White House Years,' 'The Gathering,' 'Breaking Up' and 'Gary White.' For late night I must have done 150 movies."

He left ABC in 1979. His three children were out of school by then and he was eager to strike out on his own.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The National Broadcasting Co. will donate its entire collection of 20,000 1948-1977 television programs to the Library of Congress, the network announced last week.

"It is a distinct honor to have such a prestigious home for some of NBC's earliest television efforts," said Grant A. Tinker, chairman and chief executive officer of the network.

The general public will have continuing access to the programming — everything from "Howdy Doody" to news footage from Vietnam — through the Museum of Broadcasting in New York City.

The collection includes a special production of Thornton Wilder's "Our Town," starring Paul Newman, Frank Sinatra and Eva Marie Saint as well as sports and special events coverage, such as the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II and early space shots.

The Library of Congress will transfer the programs from kinescopes and film to videotape and make the collection available to researchers and scholars.

The presentation is in celebration of NBC's 60th anniversary.

Huxtables, Keatons lead NBC to first prime-time season victory

NEW YORK — Television's favorite fictional families — the Huxtables on "The Cosby Show" and the Keatons on "Family Ties" — helped NBC supplant CBS, the leader the past six seasons, as the nation's No. 1 network, season-ending figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. confirmed Tuesday.

It was NBC's first outright triumph in three decades of Nielsen tallies. NBC tied CBS in prime-time ratings in 1969-70 and 1970-71 and ABC finished first three times in the late 1970s, but the rest belonged to CBS.

For the 20-week season that ended Sunday, NBC's back-to-back Thursday comedies finished one-two, replacing the soapy "Dynasty" and "Dallas" as television's most-watched series. The last time two comedies headed the ratings was 1978-79 with "Laverne & Shirley" and "Three's Company."

The rest of the Top 10 included CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" in third, followed by CBS' "60 Minutes," marking its seventh consecutive season in the first four, and NBC's "Cheers." Next came CBS' "Dallas," which reached the Top 10 for the seventh straight time, ABC's "Dynasty," last season's No. 1 show, NBC's "The Golden Girls," the top-rated new series, NBC's "Miami Vice" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?"

NBC finished the regular 1985-86 season with a 17.5 rating, an increase of 8 percent over last season's 16.2 mark. CBS fell from 16.9 to 16.7. ABC slipped from a 15.4 to 14.9. NBC also led in every age-group demographic, except adults over 55, which CBS still dominated.

At a New York press conference, David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, held high a plastic cup of coffee and toasted NBC. "It was quite an extraordinary accomplishment," he said, noting NBC's gain of 1.3 ratings points over the previous season.

"I've been waiting 6½ years for this," Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said during a satellite hook-up with television writers. Tartikoff's programs were third-rated for the first four seasons of his regime. NBC remains the only network without a weekly prime-time news magazine, and Tartikoff had once said that winning without

There were no major signs of celebrating at NBC, perhaps because the network's triumph has been all-but official for weeks. NBC held a dinner in Burbank, Calif., Monday night for 500 employees. New York staffers will attend a luncheon May 2. NBC did order hundreds of purple rugby-style shirts with the logo: "1985-86: That Championship Season."

Because of NBC's increase in audience, network TV stemmed its ratings decline for the first time since 1976-77. Network viewing, which attracted a 48.5 rating last season, increased 1 percent to 49.1. This means the networks delivered, on average, 1 million more homes.

"We took audiences from the competition, pay-cable and the independents," said Bill Rubens, NBC's vice president for research.

Only two seasons ago, no sitcom cracked the Top 10, prompting some industry analysts to suggest that 30-minute comedies could go the way of two extinct genres, the western and variety show. But comedy's premature obituaries were written in error. "There were five comedies in the Top 10 and 11 in the Top

20. Comedies averaged a 17.6 rating to last season's 15.4. Action-adventure series dropped from 15.9 to 14.7. Every prime-time serial dropped off in the ratings, but, because there were fewer failed new soaps this season than last, the form experienced an overall ratings gain from 19.5 to 19.7.

"The Cosby Show," which led in every age group except adults over 50, averaged a 33.7 rating, the best performance for any series since "Dallas" in 1980-81 and the best for any sitcom since "All in the Family" in 1971-72. On average, 28.9 million homes were tuned to each episode of "Cosby."

NBC developed more new hits than CBS, which didn't have a single new success this season. NBC's comedy-anchored Thursday and Saturday lineups were its winning nights. But the network also made gains by not finishing third on any night. "NBC has good balance," Poltrack said.

NBC also led in made-for-TV movies with 11 of the Top 20. CBS had nine and ABC, which used to dominate with its Sunday movies, had none. ABC did have the No. 1 miniseries, "North and South."
