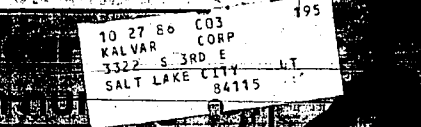
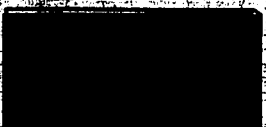
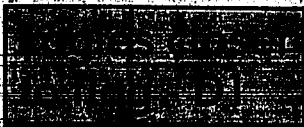

## Primed with vodka, Poles battle fallout with black humor

WARSAW, Poland — With nowhere else to hide, Poles are taking refuge from the radioactive fallout that has dusted their country more severely than most in the standard of Polish remedies, black humor and a touch of vodka.

The authorities have not, in fact, advised against drinking tap water, but some Western embassies have. And in a nation that thrives on rumors and tends to put more faith in some foreign governments than its own that's good enough.

Thus primed, radiation humorists have made a small contribution to regulation noted that the Soviet Union has finally achieved its long-sought goal of a nuclear-free zone in Europe, at least as the window.

## 'Human error' led to disaster

Water reservoirs near the crippled Soviet nuclear power plant at Chernobyl are contaminated and the region remains too radioactive for evacuated residents to return, a top Soviet Communist Party official said Friday night.

Those comments were carried in Moscow by the government-run news agency, Tass, which made no reference to the details he gave in the television interview. Those details have not been available in the Soviet Union.

Yeltsin said water reservoirs around the city of Chernobyl were contaminated, but did not elaborate on how the local population was dealing with that.

The plant is near the junction of two rivers, the Pripyat and the Dnieper, which feed into other rivers and reservoirs that may be connected to the water supply for Kiev, a city of 2.4 million in the Soviet Union's winter wheat-growing heartland.



## Tight secrecy at Chernobyl, stirs doubts on arms checks

LONDON — The Soviet Union's secrecy about the Chernobyl nuclear accident has some Western officials wondering whether Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev's promise of on-site verification of any new arms control agreement is anything more than a paper pledge.

Analysis credit of the Soviet Union has been damaged. "If they hold back information on a civilian accident, what kind of confidence can we have on any verification of a military agreement?"

An American diplomat in London, familiar with the new series of U.S.-Soviet arms control negotiations that resumes in Geneva next week, spoke of the "paranormal" amount of information made available by the Soviets on the Chernobyl accident and said it had serious implications for verification of arms control pacts.

# Shepard: NASA had 'ho-hum' attitude

WASHINGTON (AP) — A "ho-hum" attitude that has plagued NASA in recent years may have contributed to the loss of the space shuttle Challenger and its seven crew members, a former astronaut Alan S. Shepard said Friday.

"It's very difficult to prevent something like that. It's an attitude that creeps in, which causes error in judgment, which causes lack of motivation and which causes a lack of direction. It's a very subtle thing," said Shepard, who was the first American in space.

But Shepard predicted that the space agency will "get its act together" and make the next 25 years in space more exciting than the first 25 — including construction

of a space station and increased space travel by ordinary citizens.

Shepard recalled the first 25 years of U.S. manned space flight, which began May 5, 1961, when he climbed into the tiny Mercury capsule called Freedom 7 and was lifted by a Redstone rocket on a 15-minute ride into space.

He noted that public interest in the space program was keen during the early years, but turned to criticism after the Jan. 27, 1967, launch pad fire that killed three astronauts: NASA rebuilt confidence in the program and two years later put a man on the moon, but after that Americans' interest in space exploration waned, he said.

"It was becoming sort of ho-hum. There was a complacency here, and I think that is basically where we are," he said. That attitude was manifested by the Challenger accident Jan. 28, he told a National Press Club audience.

The accident investigation has revealed communications problems within the space agency and between NASA and shuttle contractors, and has resulted in criticism of NASA's management.

"Nobody deliberately made a bad decision. Surely, very quickly, we'll find the piece of hardware that failed," Shepard said.

Shepard said NASA's system of management is "basically correct," although it may have become too bureaucratic.

"But it comes back down to people. It comes right back to the complacency... it does creep in there,"

even with a fine organization, it creeps in there and it's unfortunate it takes an accident like this to bring it out."

Over the next 25 years, Shepard predicted NASA will build a permanent space station for scientific research, and ordinary citizens will be able to buy tickets for a ride into space.


"That's definitely in the cards," he said. "Folks just can't wait to get up there. They'll be the same folks who couldn't wait to buy the tickets on the Concord when it first came out. Sure it was expensive, but they did it."

Scientific experimentation and commercial ventures will increase over the next quarter of a century, but while colonization in space is likely in the future it's more than 25 years away, he said.

# Porn-panel member criticizes report

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Attorney General's Commission on Pornography has missed a "critical opportunity" to crack down on the porn industry in the United States, a conservative member of the panel said Friday.

In an interview, James C. Dobson said he is disappointed by the commission's unwillingness to confront the pornography industry with every means permitted by the Constitution.

The 11-member commission, which

held its final meeting this week, is assembling a report urging Attorney General Edwin Meese III to direct an aggressive assault on the business of hard-core pornographic films, magazines and other types of stations.

He said he was especially concerned because the commission is moving toward categorizing much material as soft-core pornography, which Dobson said the final report will fall short in several of the most critical areas, including cable television and book publishing.

On Friday afternoon as the four-day commission meeting moved toward adjournment, Dobson said that while he will endorse the panel's conclusions, he will also write a section containing his dissenting views.

# Attorney cites conspiracy

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — The prosecutor who won eight convictions of sanctuary movement members said Friday the defendants were politically motivated and expected the aliens they smuggled into the United States to criticize the country.

A Presbyterian minister, two Roman Catholic priests, a nun and four church layworkers were convicted Thursday on charges related to smuggling Salvadorans and Guatemalans into the United States. Three defendants were acquitted of all charges.

This was a national conspiracy, the likes of which the Immigration and Naturalization Service and the Department of Justice have never seen before in an alien-smuggling conspiracy," said Donald M. Reno Jr., special assistant U.S. attorney who prosecuted the six-month trial.

"I'm not saying that was a pretext for getting in the underground railroad, but their modus operandi," Reno said.

# Supporters of tax bill lining up

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chairman Bob Packwood said Friday he thinks he has lined up a majority of the Senate Finance Committee behind a bill that would produce the biggest change in the federal income tax in a generation while keeping most of the deduction for state and local taxes.

The proposal would cut taxes for 6 million lower-income people from the income-tax rolls altogether, Packwood, R-Ore., told reporters. "It would shift about \$10 billion of the tax burden from individuals to corporations over the next five years — less than the plan originally proposed by President Reagan or the substitute passed by the House last December."

The proposal would cut the 50 percent top individual tax rate to 27 percent and raise the \$1,080-per-person exemption to \$2,000 for all but the wealthiest taxpayers.

On the other hand, it would repeal the deduction permitted for state and local sales taxes paid, wipe out any tax advantage for individual capital gains and restrict tax-deferred Individual Retirement Accounts only to workers not covered by a company pension plan.

In fact, the committee has yet to take a public vote on many of the toughest issues in the package — the "third one" offered by Packwood. These include taking away IRA tax deductions for millions of mainly middle-income people, ending the traditional tax break for capital gains and allowing the deduction only of those medical expenses that exceed 10 percent of adjusted gross income (the current non-deductible floor is 5 percent).

Packwood said the committee will begin considering the new plan in public sessions on Monday. He set no timetable for completing committee action.

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### Police battles follow strike

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police battled black demonstrators in the wake of a day-long general strike by millions of South Africans opposed to apartheid, and authorities said five blacks were killed, including two policemen. Also Friday, police released black Anglican Bishop Sigisbert Ndwandwe from custody an hour before fellow Bishop Desmond Tutu planned to lead a march on the police station in the white town where Ndwandwe was being held.

The strike was called to denounce apartheid. South Africa's official policy of race segregation, and to demand that May 1 — May Day — be declared a public holiday.

### Aquino fires chief

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino fired the Manila police chief Friday for failing to contain violent protests by supporters of deposed President Ferdinand E. Marcos, and promised national elections would be held by next March. Mrs. Aquino dismissed police chief Gen. Narciso Cabrera one day after thousands of Marcos loyalists battled riot police in downtown Manila in the worst street violence since she took office Feb. 25. At least 34 people were injured and 77 were arrested. The president asked Brig. Gen. Alfredo Lim to temporarily assume Cabrera's post. Lim heads one of four districts in the Metropolitan Manila police department, which covers several cities. Cabrera headed another district that covered most of Manila. He had been in office since 1981 and frequently ordered anti-riot police to break up protests against then-President Marcos. Cabrera could not be reached for comment Friday. An official at Manila police headquarters said Cabrera would be assigned to another police post.

## Expo 86 opens to thousands

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — Expo 86 opened in a light rain Friday with thousands of visitors, including a few dozen who were stranded on a monorail just long enough to contemplate the fair's transportation theme. There were exhibits from 47 countries, and food, music and dance from the ends of the earth. Thousands of people, including a few who lined up overnight, waited for the gates to open Friday morning. Robot Expo Ernie and musicians, actors, jugglers and mimes entertained them.

But many people said they were hoping to see Britain's Prince Charles and Princess Diana, who planned to tour the fair Friday and over the next few days. The crowd spilled through the gates at 8:30 a.m. but people were not allowed to disperse until 9:45 a.m. Officials plan to follow the same procedure throughout the 5½-month fair to prevent crowding at the gates. Expo Chairman Jim Pattison said Friday he never felt better. "What

could be a better Canadian story?" Other than the rain, the only glitch Friday occurred when one of the 10 blue and gray monorail trains stalled, stranding dozens of passengers between stations. But the computer problem was fixed four minutes later. Expo duty officer Mark Germyn said, adding that officials were "still working the bugs out." The Expo idea began eight years ago, when Vancouver decided to stage an exposition to celebrate its centennial.

## PUC staffer states case against firm

### Idaho Power Co. knew plant wasn't needed, Miller claims

TWIN FALLS — Public Utilities Commission staff member Stephanie Miller took the stand Friday on the final day of hearings in Twin Falls, defending her position that one-third of Idaho Power Company's investment in the Valmy-II power plant be disallowed.

Coupled with her recommendations on company investments in the Boardman Plant, a coal-fired plant located in eastern Oregon, Miller's recommendations would trim \$13 million from Idaho Power's \$84.2 million rate-hike request.

In her prepared testimony, Miller said she based her recommendation on the time period that the company should have known the plant was no longer needed. By 1982, Miller said, "Idaho Power became aware its forecasted loads were declining and that there would be significant surplus power available in the Northwest." By December of 1982, she added, the company had committed about two-thirds of the funds for the Valmy II plant.

The 250-megawatt coal-fired power plant was completed in 1985. Although Miller's position is less extreme than that taken by the attorney general's expert witnesses, it is still not popular with Idaho officials. In the week, witnesses from the attorney general's office suggested that ratepayers should not be saddled with any of the costs from Valmy II because it is not "used and useful" for Idaho.

"I think that it was a hell of a good decision," said IPC Rate Manager Larry Crowley. In defense of the plant, "it's going to carry us into the next century with a good mix of thermal power and hydropower," he added.

While IPC officials have admitted that the Valmy II plant is not currently running at full capacity, Crowley and others have defended it by noting that utilities never build a plant with the expectation that it will be fully utilized when it comes into operation.

Unlike other controversial rate cases around the country, where the

dispute is over nuclear power and cost overruns, Crowley said the Valmy-II plant was completed ahead of schedule and below cost.

But while the plant was efficiently built, the essential problem for Idaho Power is convincing regulators that the plant is used and useful in a period of energy surplus. "The core of the dispute between IPC and its critics is the meaning of the PUC permit it was granted in 1979 to construct the Valmy II plant."

"The granting of a certificate approved the company's decision to embark on construction of the two generating units," Miller said in her prepared testimony. "It did not pre-judge company decisions that would be made during the construction period."

"I do disagree with the company position that obtaining a certificate in 1979 made it somehow immune from questions concerning its decisions whether to continue with the plant in spite of declining forecasted demand and increasing surplus," Miller said.

The IPC contends that the commission approved the plant and recognized it as a needed addition to the utility. Later decisions by the commission, according to Idaho Power's testimony, on the North Fork, Kanaka Rapids and other hydropower projects, "generally agree that the company would need additional resources over and above Valmy II."

Unfortunately for the power forecasts which were considered valid in 1979, the PUC also issued several orders which had a major impact on the state's power supply. As outlined by Miller in her testimony, in 1980, the PUC began requiring utilities to buy power from private generators and cogenerators, and also adopted a weatherization program for the state — as well as other energy-saving measures.

Despite falling demands and the surge of cogenerated power suddenly available in the state, Miller said the company "has not shown it ever considered postponing or canceling the plant."

IPC is planning a detailed rebuttal on the Valmy II plant at the next set of rate hearings, scheduled to begin in Boise on May 12.

## A prescription of caring provides a loving remedy

### 100 years later, public health nurses are still hard at work

TWIN FALLS — Dorothy Alexander looks into the eyes of the young and spots their problems.

She travels 10,000 miles a year to test the eyes of school children, along with taking care of the sick and teaching wellness. That is her job — to care for the people of Lincoln County the way a public health nurse cared for her when she was a little girl.

"I've always been interested in it," said Alexander, who will retire in September after serving 30 years as Lincoln County's only public health nurse. "I've always wanted to be a nurse, ever since I choked my brother on a bottle of dirt while we were playing doctor."

But the bottle of dirt may not have done as much to stir her interest in public health nursing as a black-and-white, cross-eyed kitten.

The kitten turned out to be a life-preserver, a present from one of Shoshone's pioneer public health nurses, Siella McFall.

"I had pneumonia for a month and four days. I'd had smallpox that went into pneumonia. And she gave me this little kitten, so I'd roll around on the bed chasing it, and cough up," Alexander explained as she sat in her cubbyhole of an office in the Lincoln County Courthouse.

It may have been an offbeat remedy, but it worked. And Alexander's admiration for the woman who took very good care of her still shows in her eyes more than 50 years later.

In celebration of the 100th year of public health nursing, and in conjunction with National Nurses Week, May 5-7, public health nurses are stepping into the spotlight to let people know they are still out there, and they still care.

"We're out there dealing with problems that no one else gives a rip about," said Cheryl Juntunen, physical health director for the South Central

Health District. "We're dealing with the poor" and the people who can't afford care.

Juntunen is in charge of the 15 public health nurses who cover the Magic Valley. They do everything from give vaccinations to try to harness an outbreak of measles or other diseases.

A large portion of their time is spent teaching, or coordinating services for parents with crippled children, or reassuring young mothers who are unfamiliar with child-rearing.

"The baby is just not quite right, and what do you do? Or they have a problem feeding the child. A lot of people call their local health nurse," Juntunen said. She added that nurses who work with the maternal and infant-care program become "the community grandmother."

"Historically, public health nurses cared for the sick and the poor, Juntunen said. But after World War II, their scope and direction changed to more of a focus on preventative medicine, she said.

"In World War II they needed women in industry to fill the jobs, and that meant they needed women who were well," Juntunen said. "They found that through maternal and infant care, it paid to take good care of people because there was less of a cost later, both in financial and human terms."

The programs public health nurses run have never received large chunks of money. But they have done a lot with the little they have received. For every \$1 spent on prenatal care to prevent birth defects, up to \$11 is saved by taxpayers and parents, according to figures released by the Office of Maternal and Child Health Services. And that was just in the area of savings.

But Juntunen is not satisfied.

"We've got to invest more up front, to prevent disease and sickness. But the problem is, when you've only got \$10, you don't spend it on vaccinations when you have a child that's critically ill," she said.

## Judge denies appeal in private-road case

### Sorensen ruling will stand — for now

CHALLIS — Seventh District Judge Arnold Beebe is standing firm in his decision that singer Carole King Sorensen's road is private on her Robinson Bar Ranch in the mountains of Custer County.

Beebe recently denied a motion to reconsider his decision handed down in October.

The motion was filed by David H. and Dorothy French and Thurlow H. and Helen B. Schoonen, neighbors of Ms. Sorensen and her husband, Jack Sorensen, through whose ranch the road passes.

Beebe said he denied the Schoonen's and Frenches' request because an appeal of the issue would unnecessarily delay the prescriptive easement suit, which is scheduled to be heard in June.

"This way the whole thing can be done at once," Beebe said. "After

the prescriptive easement case is heard, then they can appeal one or both decisions at that time if they want, eliminating the possibility of two separate appeals."

The Frenches and Schoonen were co-plaintiffs in the quiet title suit brought by Custer County. They want to have Robinson Bar Road declared a public road. Beebe denied that claim, finding that the county legally abandoned the road in 1939 and that title to the road then reverted to adjacent property owners.

The plaintiffs sought to stay proceedings on the prescriptive easement action and instead appeal Beebe's decision on the public road question.

## Lawyer hits insurance industry's 'assault' on tort system

TWIN FALLS — The insurance industry started the fight against the tort system that lawyers are attempting to bludgeon by protecting the rights of people to the courts, said the president of the Association of Trial Lawyers of America.

Belen Perlman of Lexington, Ky., said Friday that the insurance industry has made it its business to lobby the state legislature to the people's right in the courts. "The assault" has been in the form of lobbying for reform of the tort system, involving laws addressing

the collection of compensation for personal injury and property damages.

Perlman was in Twin Falls to address the annual convention of the Idaho Trial Lawyers Association, which continues today. The title of his speech at the meeting, not surprisingly, was "Attack on the People's Justice System."

The association which Perlman leads has been vocal in its disagreement with insurance industry claims that high rates and the unavailability of insurance are the cost of defense in the number of lawsuits, excessive jury awards and the poor financial health of the industry. In Idaho, many cities and counties last

year faced high premiums and capcoll policies by private insurance companies. As a result, a majority of the state's 44 counties formed a self-insurance pool.

In an interview with The Times-News, Perlman said the lawyer's association didn't start the debate over insurance. His remarks echoed past news releases from the association that have contended that the insurance industry does not have a strong case.

"A recent study of state courts by an independent group found that the number of lawsuits had even decreased in some states," Perlman said.

Perlman said he was showing that insurance companies are making money

"hand over fist," Perlman said.

But "hysteria" over high prices and scarcity of insurance has resulted in a few states adopting tort reforms, he said.

"It's not out (the lawyer's) system," Perlman emphasized. "You are talking about the cornerstone of democracy — the people and by the people. They (insurance companies) want to change the battleground to the legislatures, where victims have no lobby for the most part."

"In some states reform proposals have already lined up on the amount of damage judgments and on fees lawyers can collect. A few proposals showed up in Idaho.

With the reforms of the law, the insurance industry wants "justice" to be predictable, Perlman said.

Perlman asked what the rights of people to predict their insurance payments?

He admitted lawyers have a financial stake in the issue. But one doesn't see most plaintiffs' lawyers on "Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous," he said.

Lawyers are averse to protect the justice system, Perlman added. Of course, the system of laws could be improved. For example, people with less than catastrophic injuries have less access to the courts because the costs of pursuing a lawsuit may be more than the

## Weather shines; jobless rate dips

TWIN FALLS — Unemployment in both the Magic Valley and in Idaho dropped slightly during April, as good weather opened up jobs for workers.

The seasonally adjusted rate for Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding counties declined to 5.8 percent, down 2 of a percentage point from March. The statewide rate took a smaller step. It fell .1 of a percentage point to 6.1 percent, the Idaho Department of Employment reported Friday.

The figures for the three-county Magic Valley area reflected some good hiring in construction, farming and retail industries, said Lon McDonald, labor force analyst based at Twin Falls.

"Local job service (of Idaho) placement activity has been strong," he said. The numbers of unemployed workers in the area was 300 fewer than at the same time in March, he said. Locally, 330 workers were off the job and 32,885 held jobs, according to unadjusted estimates.

State Employment Director Scott McDonald (no relation) attributed the slightly better showing in Idaho's rate to good weather, which allowed outside work.

However, a storm may be on the horizon for the employment rate, he said.

After the state's monthly survey was taken, two major silver companies — Hecla Mining and Sunshine Mines — announced shutdowns of mines in Idaho, idling hundreds of workers. Those layoffs will appear in next month's statistics.

"The loss of nearly 750 jobs in April will have an impact on the unemployment rate in the future, but will be most dramatically felt in northern Idaho," said Scott McDonald. Analysts have forecast that the average annual unemployment rate will hit 6.7 percent in 1986.

The rate in the Panhandle continues to rise. See JOBLESS on Page B2

## Airport to receive U.S. cash

WASHINGTON — The Federal Aviation Administration has announced that Friedman Memorial Airport in Hailey, owned by Blaine County, will receive approximately \$360,000 in airport improvement grants.

The money will finance a new crash fire and rescue truck and fund the construction of an aircraft parking apron and a building for snow removal machinery.

Approval of the grants had been expected. Airport Maintenance Supervisor Gary Irvie said Friday, Contracts have already been awarded.

The County-City Airport, outside Sandpoint in Bonners County, will receive as much as \$36,000 to prepare an airport master plan study outlining airport needs in increments for the next five, 10 and 20 years.

Both airports must exact firm bids for the planning and construction to Sept. 30 to qualify for the grants.

The grants were announced by Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, chairman of the Senate Transportation Committee.

"The FAA Airport Improvement Grants are very important to airport safety," Symms said. "This is a good use of the Airport Improvements Trust Fund, which is financed with fees paid by airport users. I am 100-percent behind this effort to save lives."



Vatican study urges priests to counter sects

"We are not condemning anybody, rather we want to analyze why they (the sects) are succeeding, and take action to deal with them," said the Rev. "Almost all the local churches do see the emergence and rapid proliferation of all kinds of 'new' religious or pseudo-religious movements, groups and practices...

### Panel reviews Dallas escape

BOISE (AP) — A "serious-incident-review panel" met at the Idaho State Penitentiary on Friday to examine whether any prison employees should be held accountable for the March 30 escape of convicted killer Claude Dallas.

There was no statement released after the closed meeting. Corrections Director Al Murphy scheduled a press conference for 11:30 a.m. today at the prison to discuss the panel's findings.

The panel was composed of Nevada Corrections Director George Sumner, Paul Morris of Emmett, Deputy Attorney General Bob Gates, and Don Lintford, who has served on the Correctional Industries Board.

Murphy has said that 90 percent of the responsibility for Dallas' escape lies with the inadequate prison facility. However, he said if any prison employee or official was found at fault in the escape, action would be taken.

### McClure discusses 'hoppers

WASHINGTON (AP) — With grasshopper season coming up, Sen. James McClure called federal pest-control officials together in Washington on Friday to review their readiness to combat a possible infestation this summer.

"We're miles ahead of where we were a year ago," McClure said in a statement issued after the meeting. "We now have the experience and the mechanics in place so that if grasshoppers pose a threat, we can handle the problem quickly."

He met with Robert Burford, director of the Bureau of Land Management; Bert Hawkins, director of the Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service; Frank Dunkle, acting U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service director; and other agency officials for an update on plans in case of another grasshopper outbreak in the West.

### Further Envirosafe tests due

BOISE (AP) — Spurred by the results of preliminary tests conducted last fall, state and federal officials hope to begin more complex testing by June on the possibility of wind-blown contaminants escaping from the Envirosafe hazardous waste dump near Grand View.

"We're trying to find out if any of the toxic contaminants taken into the site are leaving the site . . . by wind dispersion," said Environmental Protection Agency spokesman Ron Moczygemba.

The target of the new study is polychlorinated biphenyls, or PCBs, which have been legally buried in ground trenches at the site in relatively low concentrations.

Tests conducted by the state Division of Environment last fall on BLM rangeland near the dump turned up what Moczygemba termed minute levels of PCBs.

### Extraction method unearthed

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Researchers at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory say their studies show microorganisms can be used to extract cobalt from low-grade sulfide ores, potentially freeing the nation from dependence on foreign sources of the strategic mineral.

"We've taken a systematic look at a process that occurs by itself in nature, and are adapting it so that the process can be used by the mining industry," said Paul Wichniacz, head of the EG&G Idaho Inc. biotechnology group at the INEL.

Research on cobalt extraction at the site is funded by the Interior Department's Bureau of Mines as part of the INEL's Strategic and Critical Materials Program. The program is aimed at developing new technologies to lessen U.S. dependence on foreign supplies of materials considered essential to the nation's defense and economy.

BOISE (AP) — With 3½ weeks left until southern Idaho voters select the Republican candidate in their congressional race, one of the five contenders for the nomination completed a 320-mile walk across the state, saying people have had it with government. "It was much more physical than I ever thought," former Jerome County Prosecutor Dan Adamson said as he walked onto the steps of the state Capitol in Boise Friday afternoon. "But other than that thought it was well worth it," said Adamson, who narrowly lost the nomination to George Hansen two years ago. "We talked to a lot of people. They're really discouraged. They've almost given up hope that government will respond. . . . They want a change."

Before finishing the walk that began 29 days earlier in St. Anthony, Adamson ran into some problems with Boise police as he entered the city. The police stopped his entourage, apparently because it did not have the proper permits. Adamson called it a mixup although and Congressman accused the department of complicating the matter, and after a short delay, police allowed him and his supporters to continue to the Capitol. Adamson, his feet blistered and heavily taped, said he lost 15 pounds on the walk, where the first three days were the toughest and one day earlier this week the most frustrating when an elderly woman in Mountain Home yelled at him for holding up traffic.

Meanwhile, Adamson's opponents were also busy on the campaign trail. In Blackfoot, state Sen. Dane Walkins of Idaho Falls supported the phaseout of government involvement in farm programs but that the government and farm leaders must remain committed to expanding exports.

Walkins claimed government policies have misled farmers over the years.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In an effort to counter his Democratic opponent's appeal for Jewish votes and campaign donations, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, has gone to a Jewish friend in the Senate for help in easing fears over a nearly decade-old contact with Libyan strongman Moammar Khadafy. Campaign officials for Idaho Gov. John Evans, the Democrat challenging Symms this year, have mailed 560,000 letters to Jewish households nationwide. They include a 1977 photo of Symms, then a congressman, with Khadafy during a trade visit to Libya. The letter signed by Idaho Democratic Party Chairman Mel Morgan, who is Jewish, also refers to Symms' voting record, contending he has sided against "the best interests of Israel on many key issues. But Symms has taken the counter-offensive. Sen. Rudy Boschwitz, R-Minn., who is Jewish, wrote to pro-Israel political action committees on Symms' behalf in December and again in early April according to the Wall Street Journal report. In the December letter, Boschwitz pointed out Symms' recent praise for Israel. Last month's letter called Symms "a good and growing friend." Boschwitz also said the Khadafy photo "is 10 years old," adding, "I suppose, in retrospect, Steve wishes he hadn't gone and that picture hadn't been taken." Since the Morgan letter and picture was distributed, Symms has been making an effort to appeal to Jewish and Israeli interests, even though there are few Jewish voters in Idaho.

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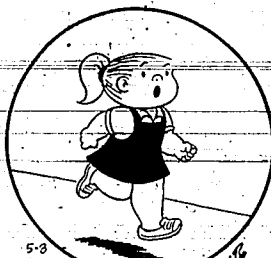
