Reagan escalates trade war

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, escalating an agricultural trade war with Europe, imposed standby restrictions Thursday on imported white wine, beer, cheese, chocolates and various other products from the continent to retaliate against new quotas on U.S. food sales in Spain and Portugal.

The action could result in higher prices to U.S. consumers later this year on some of the most popular European imports.

However, administration officials said the action was written in a way to have no immediate economic im-

act while strengthening the U.S. bargaining hand.

But the restrictions could take hold as soon as once U.S. exporters feel the bite of the new European restrictions, said presidential spokesman Larry Speakes.

"We're trying to make the European Community feel the pain on us, we'll come back with a similar action on them," Speakes said in announcing the new action.

The move raised the possibility of new European countermeasures against U.S. products, including transatlantic trade confrontations.

The new, toughened trade stance

came as the administration sought to pass support for a Democratic-sponsored trade bill before the House that it considers protectionist.

In a separate action, administration officials said they were preparing retaliatory action against Brazil to protest that nation's refusal to open its markets to U.S. computers and other electronic devices.

A trade task force was given until June 25 to come up with a list of possible options — including tariffs or quotas on Brazilian goods imported into this country — to use against Brazil.

In the European case, the new

quotas and tariffs were in retaliation for restrictions that were placed on U.S. farm products such as soybeans and grain when Spain and Portugal joined the European Community earlier this year.

Specifically, Reagan imposed new quotas on candy, large blocks of chocolate, white wine, apple and pear juices, ale, porter and beer — but initially set the quotas at 20 percent above the 1985 level of imports.

"We have been assured by the EC that their quotas will have no immediate impact on our trade, as long as that remains the case, our quotas will be similarly non-restrictive," Speakes said.

"However, should the EC's retaliative restrictions begin to restrict U.S. exports, the U.S. quotas will be adjusted in a way comparable to the effect of the present may substitute tariff increases for the quotas," he added.

The new quotas are in protest of restrictions on grains and soybeans imposed by Portugal, which the administration considers illegal.

In addition, higher tariffs were announced on a number of European commodities — including wine, edam and gouda cheeses, fruit and frozen vegetables, olives, and brandy — to protest actions Spain in raising tariffs on U.S. grain.

American, Soviet doctors see higher Chernobyl death toll

MOSCOW — American and Soviet doctors, alarmed by the world's worst nuclear accident, said Thursday that more than 200,000 people who lived in the area around the destroyed reactor are at risk of radiation exposure.

Dr. Robert F. Gale of the United States said the process of treatment for nuclear accidents is "our limited ability to respond to nuclear accidents."

The doctors told a news conference that no one from Pripyat, which adjoins the Ukrainian reactor, destroyed by an explosion and fire April 26, is from Chernobyl, 11 miles away, is among the 200,000 at risk.

The official death toll so far is nine.

They said they could not predict the long-term effects of radiation exposure on the 200,000 people who lived in the two nuclear accidents.

World. Officials of the International Atomic Energy Agency have described the accident as the worst in history.

House passes spending plan for 1987

WASHINGTON — The House ignored President Reagan's protests Thursday and approved a \$94 billion fiscal 1987 spending plan that slashes his Pentagon budget and joins the Senate in embracing higher taxes.

By a nearly party-line 245-179 vote, the House agreed to the plan drawn up by Democratic leaders. The Senate on May 2 adopted its version of the budget blueprint for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1.

Reagan called the package "a breach of faith with our common duty to protect this nation."

In a letter sent to House Republican Leader Robert H. Michel of Illinois before the final vote, the president complained:

"This radical anti-defense budget would tear down much of what we have built, together, these past five years and return us to that era of the 1970s when the national defense was neglected and our country paid world-wide and dearly for that neglect."

However, during the budget debate, Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee, said: "The president must realize that he will not get his way on defense and foreign aid without bar-

terrupting in a balanced approach (to deficit reduction) which includes revenues."

The plan adopted by the House would:

- Set Pentagon spending authority at \$285 billion, compared with \$301 billion in the Senate-passed budget plan and \$320 billion requested by Reagan.
- Add \$7.3 billion in unspecified higher taxes to the \$5.9 billion in minor tax increases Reagan has recommended. The Senate package assumes the same level of revenues but applies the increase to help finance Pentagon spending. The House would set aside \$4.7 billion of the increase for reducing the deficit.

Senators propose plan to save IRA tax break

WASHINGTON — Tax deductions for Individual Retirement Accounts would be saved by altering the way federal taxes are adjusted to offset inflation, under a plan proposed Thursday by five senators.

The tax-overhaul plan approved by the Senate Finance Committee would eliminate tax deductions for IRAs, except for workers not covered by company pension plans.

"Individual Retirement Accounts have made it possible for families of modest means to plan for their future. It has been an effective program, especially for working, middle-class Americans," said Sen. Alfonse M. D'Amato, R-N.Y., the plan's author.

Sen. Christopher J. Dodd, D-Conn., a co-sponsor, said some critics have wrongly labeled IRAs a tax break for the well-to-do.

"The Individual Retirement Account is of most importance to the middle or moderate income taxpayer. IRS (Internal Revenue Service) data show that 61 percent of all taxpayers who contributed to IRAs in 1983 had adjusted gross incomes of under \$40,000," Dodd said.

Sen. Larry Pressler, R-S.D., said he was joining D'Amato and Dodd because repeal of the IRA deduction was the one portion of the overhaul bill people in his state were complaining about. Sens. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., and Frank Lautenberg, R-N.J., also are co-sponsoring the amendment.

D'Amato will offer when the tax bill is debated on the Senate floor, probably next month.

The IRA deduction costs in the neighborhood of \$50 billion a year, tax experts say.

Under indexing tax rates, the standard deduction and the personal exemption are adjusted by the government each year to make sure taxpayers aren't pushed into higher brackets just because of inflation.

D'Amato said his plan would suspend or modify indexing for as long as it took to recover the revenue needed to continue allowing IRA deductions.

He said he would decide on specifics of the suspension or modification after the Joint Committee on Taxation completes a study of how much money various indexing options would save.

Storms, tornadoes hammer Midwest

A line of strong thunderstorms marched across the Midwest on Thursday, producing tornadoes in Missouri, Indiana, Illinois, Ohio and Kentucky, while snow fell in the northern Rockies.

One person was killed in Missouri while dozens were left homeless and scores of buildings were destroyed or damaged and power and telephone lines were down.

Heavy rains that began Wednesday triggered flood warnings for rivers in Oklahoma, Arkansas and Missouri, and floods over some farm land and rural roads worsened.

Trees were downed near Shoals, Ind., 35 miles southwest of Bloomington, when thunderstorms hit the area Thursday. A tornado that touched down near the northern Illinois town of Dixon destroyed two barns and a rooftop, and slightly injured a farmer.

In western and northern Kentucky, heavy rains prompted a flash-flood watch, as more than an inch of rain has fallen there in 24 hours. Leitchfield, Ky.

Lawmakers assails committee

BOISE (AP) — Four pro right-to-work lawmakers are blasting organized labor's "Idahoans Against Unions" committee for what they claimed were "direct and subtle" deception in its campaign to convince voters to reject the state's ban on compulsory union membership.

But in leveling the charge on Thursday, Sen. Rod Beck, R-Boise, cited a recent study by the state Division of Administration which Beck said determined a union has "little influence" on employee benefits.

In light of that, Beck said labor leaders were deceiving the public when they claimed that the right-to-work law would result in lower wages and benefits for Idaho workers, specifically quoting the study as saying, "The existence of a union appears to have little influence on the eventual design of employee benefit plans."

Nuclear plant lines shorted

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Three high-voltage power lines to the Palo Verde nuclear plant short-circuited after saboteurs threw metal-weighted rocks onto the three, utility officials said Thursday.

The short-circuits came just before the planned resumption of tests of the plant's Unit 2 reactor. The tests, leading up to the reactor's commercial operation, were delayed 24 to 48 hours, said Arizona Nuclear Power project spokesman Dan Canady.

The Unit 1 reactor, already in commercial operation, was shut down for scheduled maintenance at the end of the incident.

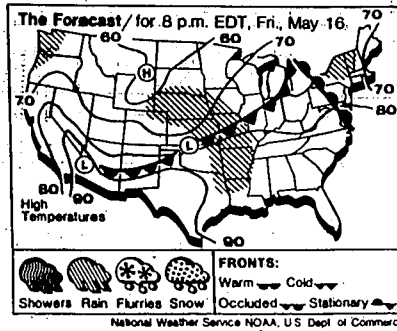

detectors and snow probes scoured the 11,235-foot mountain searching for the eight hikers last seen huddled in a snow cave Tuesday without food and water.

About 100 people took part in the search Wednesday after the weather cleared, but the party was reduced to 30 on Thursday because of the treacherous terrain on the mountain's 10,000-foot level, said Williams.

After covering that level, searchers returned to the 8,100-foot level to go back over part of the area covered Wednesday.

The nearly frozen bodies of two girls and a boy were found Wednesday, and frantic measures to revive them failed. Two other members of the church school climbing party are hiked off the mountain Tuesday to get help.

The group had climbed to within 14 feet of the summit Monday, but a sudden blizzard forced them to turn back. Wind-chill temperatures on the mountain Tuesday fell to 60 degrees below zero.

Doctors at a Portland hospital worked through the day Wednesday in an unsuccessful attempt to revive

the three teenagers found at the 7,500-foot level of the mountain, which is 50 miles east of Portland. They were identified as Eric Sandvik, Erin O'Leary and Alison Litzberger. All were 15 years old and from Portland.

Fifteen students and three adults had begun climbing the mountain level — begun climbing the mountain level — Monday in the annual sophomore class wilderness outing. Five students were not feeling well and turned back at various times early in the hike, said school spokeswoman Mariann Koop.

The two adults who remained with the group are the Rev. Thomas Goman, 42, a math and religion teacher described as an expert climber, and Marlon Horswell, 39, dean of students.

The teen-agers found Thursday are Gies Thompson, 16, Longview, Wash.; Richard Heeder, 15, Portland; Pat McGinness, 15, Portland; Tana Amy, 15, Portland; Briton Clark, 15, Portland; and Susan McClave, 17, Portland.

The first group of searchers found a bamboo mountain-climbing marker with a flag at the 10,400-foot level of the mountain. Another marker was discovered 100 feet down

the slope.

Searchers said the markers were left by Ralph Sumner, 30, a professional mountaineer who led the group up the mountain Monday. He and Holly Schulz, 37, came off the mountain Tuesday.

Low wind and only a few high clouds over the mountain provided good conditions for Thursday's search, an sheriff's deputy said. Temperatures on the mountain were in the 20s.

Authorities had expected any survivors to dig their way out of the snow when noisy helicopters passed overhead.

"They should have punched their way out (of the snow cave)," said Clackamas County Sheriff's Lt. Don Vickars. "That's what the general opinion is."

The teen-age climbers were all students at the Oregon Episcopal School. The two adults were faculty members at the school, deputy said.

The Rev. Roy Coulter, dean of the Cathedral of St. John at the school, said family members were bracing for the worst.

"It's one of those situations when in every hour that passes, there is less hope for survival," Coulter said.

Man arrested in film scam

ROME (AP) — A 24-year-old Frenchman has been arrested on charges he duped two U.S. television networks by selling them videotape that purportedly showed the burning Chernobyl nuclear plant, police said Thursday.

Instead, the ABC and NBC networks showed footage Monday night of a burning cement factory in Trieste, Italy. On Wednesday night, the networks told viewers they had found out the tape was a hoax and apologized.

The suspect, Thomas Gareng, was picked up overnight and charged with fraud, police said.

Italy's state-run RAI television network, which also showed the film after it was made available through Eurovision, was the first to call the footage a fake.

Firefighters douse hot spots

HAMPSTEAD, N.C. (AP) — Firefighters ventured into the 44-mile perimeter of a smoldering fire Thursday to douse hot spots, while state officials assessed the damage to wildlife in a game reserve destroyed by the blaze.

"We're now working inside the fire lines to put out 'burning material,'" said Donald Kass, a spokesman for the state forest service. "At some points they're working 100 feet or so inside the fire lines."

"The flashy work is over," Kass said. "Now begins the drudgery."

U.S. Marines on Thursday replaced exhausted volunteers who have battled the 75,000-acre blaze for 10 days.

transplants on radiation victims.

Hammer arranged for Gale and his colleagues to come to Moscow.

Gale said in the news conference that seven people died of radiation sickness in addition to the two killed in the accident itself, as Gorbachev reported Wednesday night.

Gale said 239 people were hospitalized with various degrees of radiation exposure and the number could increase.

He would not be specific about who was hospitalized, citing the confidential doctor-patient relationship, but said they were at or near the Chernobyl accident and included firefighters, plant workers and doctors.

The seven who died were among 35 patients diagnosed as most severely injured, the doctor said.

Bone marrow transplants have been performed on 19 of the patients over 13 days by the team of specialists, Gale said. Three American doctors, including Gale, and an Israeli are working with the Soviets.

Such transplants are considered the only effective treatment for severe exposure to radiation.

According to Gale, doctors decided some of the 35 most seriously injured patients did not need transplants and others suffered so much damage to internal organs that transplants were pointless.

"Predictably, our efforts have not been successful in all cases," he said, "but 28 of these 35 individuals are alive. Although we know that additional deaths are unavoidable, we hope that a substantial number of these patients will survive."

Gale said the Soviet and American doctors have agreed to conduct a study of the disaster and publish their findings jointly in medical journals.

"It will take us many months to

fully evaluate these patients," he said, "and probably years to evaluate the medical consequences of the Chernobyl accident."

"The resources required to deal with a large number of patients at a single instance in time can rapidly exceed anybody's capacity and it's therefore necessary to marshal drugs and additional specialists," Gale said.

"Huge supplies" of drugs and equipment have been flown to Moscow with Hammer's help, the doctor told reporters.

Report shows Symms sets state mark for contributions

BOISE (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, has received contributions totaling almost \$1.9 million for his re-election campaign, more than twice the amount collected by his Democratic challenger, Gov. John Evans, according to campaign financial disclosure reports filed Thursday.

That makes Symms Idaho's all-time leader in political fund raising, surpassing both the \$1.7 million he collected during his 1980 Senate campaign and the \$1.8 million taken in by former Sen. Frank Church, who Symms defeated.

But the reports submitted to the Federal Election Commission and the Idaho secretary of state's office showed Evans all but equaled Symms in contributions during the most recent reporting period, April 1 through May 7. Thursday was the deadline for submitting the reports before Idaho's May 27 primary.

A report also was received Thursday from Connie Hansen, the wife of former Rep. George Hansen who is seeking the Republican nomination in Idaho's 2nd Congressional District.

Overall, the Evans campaign has received more than \$236,000, including contributions in 1985, spokeswoman Jean McNeil said.

The governor took in almost \$174,200 during the latest reporting period, while Symms collected almost \$178,800. That brought Evans' total contributions for the year to about \$384,800, and Symms' to about \$395,700, according to their reports.

Evans got more than \$135,800 of his donations during the past month from individuals, including some \$63,700 in contributions under \$200.

Another \$38,300 came from political action committees, including \$10,000 from Citizens Organized PAC of Los Angeles, and \$5,000 each from the Delaware Valley PAC of Sacramento, Calif., the National Education Association, and the Mid-Manhattan PAC. That brought PAC contributions for the year

to about \$90,700.

The Evans campaign reported spending almost \$231,200 during the latest period, and \$421,200 for the year. The report showed no outstanding debts and more than \$247,100 cash on hand.

Symms got about \$121,200 from individuals during the latest period, including almost \$41,400 in small contributions. He far outpaced Evans in donations from political action committees, bringing in almost \$57,400 from 53 PACs during the latest period and about \$218,600 for the year through May 7.

Among the larger PAC contributors on the new report were the American Family PAC of Columbus, Ga., \$2,850; Build PAC of the National Association of Home Builders, \$4,700; Bear, Stearns & Co. PAC, \$5,000; and the National Restaurant Association PAC, \$5,000.

The Symms campaign reported spending almost \$220,000 during the most recent reporting period, and almost \$616,800 for the year. His report showed no outstanding debts and more than \$1.1 million cash on hand.

Symms has said his bill for the entire campaign could reach \$3 million, and Evans has set a goal to raise \$2 million for his bid to unseat the first-term incumbent.

In her bid for the right to represent the GOP against Democratic Rep. Richard Stidings in November, Mrs. Hansen reported receiving about \$7,200 in individual donations from April 1 through May 7, all but \$1,500 in small contributions. That brought her contributions for the year to about \$14,300. Mrs. Hansen also reported loaning her own campaign \$8,400, accounting for almost all of her committee's outstanding debt.

The Hansen campaign reported spending \$14,800 during the latest period and \$19,900 for the year. It had about \$2,800 cash on hand at the end of the period.

Evans sees jump in tourism growth

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The plunge of major events in Sun Valley, the opening of a massive convention center complex in Coeur d'Alene and overseas base prompted Idaho Gov. John Evans to predict growth in 1986 state tourism revenues will be double original estimates.

"Total spending at tourism-related businesses could increase as much as 10 percent," the governor said at the annual Idaho State Travel Conference Thursday. "That would be a welcome boost to our economy."

State officials had already been expecting about a 5 percent increase in tourism revenue this year because of major events in Sun Valley, the opening of a massive convention center complex in Coeur d'Alene and fallout from visitors passing through Idaho en route to Expo '86 in Vancouver, British Columbia.

They figured the economy would see another \$55 million to \$60 million from tourists this year.

But since that projection was made, gasoline prices have dropped and, if a third, terrorist activity has escalated in Europe and the value of the dollar overseas has fallen, making international trips more expensive than they have been in the past.

Those factors, the governor said, could spell a revenue increase of \$100 million to \$120 million instead.

To foster that growth in future years, Evans told industry officials that they need to increase promotion of the state in face the mounting competition from other states for tourism dollars and to focus on services, facilities and attractions in the various regions of Idaho.

"Local chambers of commerce and other community groups should work with businesses to help them expand and remain attractive," he said. "If each of Idaho's 4 million visitors spent just one more day in Idaho, they would spend nearly half a billion dollars more each year."

Teachers, board ratify pact

BOISE (AP) — Boise School District teachers will get raises ranging from 2 to 7 percent under a contract for the 1986-87 school year that teachers and the School Board have ratified.

The contract, ratified Wednesday by the Boise Education Association and Boise School Board, links some benefits to the outcome of Tuesday's election on a \$1.89 million supplemental property-tax levy.

Under the contract, all of the more than 1,200 Boise School District teachers will get at least a 2 percent raise regardless of whether the school levy passes, BEA and district officials said.

If the supplemental levy passes, the district will contribute 3 percent of each teacher's salary into his or her retirement fund, said Ed Davis, assistant superintendent for administration.

The contract calls for a beginning teacher with a bachelor's degree and no experience to earn \$12,836 a year, \$252, or 2 percent, more than last year.

Accord struck at Mackay

MACKAY (AP) — Mackay teachers and school board members ironed-out their differences over insurance and salary issues to ratify a new contract this week, ending a nearly year-long battle over the agreement.

The district board agreed to a \$2,268 salary increase in exchange for a cap on insurance benefits.

The agreement, ratified Tuesday by a majority of the Mackay Education Association and unanimously by the school board, provides for the salary hike to be shared among the district's 22 certified teachers based on their placement on the salary schedule, said MEA president Trudy Bischoff.

The increase hikes the starting base pay by \$67.

Salary negotiations for the 1986-87 school year will begin after June budget hearings, and Bischoff said prospects for more raises aren't too rosy, based on the Legislature's allotment for education.

Sen. Anderson has earned another shot

Two years ago, before Larry Anderson was elected to the Idaho Senate, we supported one of his two opponents. To us, Anderson seemed erratic in his views and too closely tied to his former boss, Rep. George Hansen, with whom he had written an anti-IRS book.

But Anderson has grown in the Senate position. He has distanced himself from the Far Right rhetoric and, in this past session of the Legislature, has carved out some decidedly more practical positions.

He has taken a leadership role in two critical areas: tourism development and local-option tax funding.

He has shown himself, in the past session, to be a hard-working and thoughtful individual.

While we do not agree with him in every regard, we think Anderson merits re-nomination this spring in the Republican primary over his two opponents, Gordon Hollifield of Jerome and George Anthony of Filer.

Hollifield served in the House for a decade with little distinction. He was defeated in the last primary over the subordination issue and in part because of his close association with Idaho Power Company. Returning him to the Legislature, in our view, would be a mistake.

Anthony has previously run for election as a Democrat, and a liberal one at that. His presence as a Republican in this primary strikes us as flip-flop opportunism.

Anderson has not endeared himself to big business interests like Idaho Power Company or the Association of Idaho Taxpayers with his support for a local-option tax, but it is an idea which has a great deal of merit.

Idaho legislative leaders talk a lot about "local control," but what they really mean is control of the local units of government by themselves. Anderson has been courageous in breaking away from that line and in supporting local communities' rights to fund their own services.

Anderson has also taken the lead in getting Idaho off the dime in developing tourism. As a campground manager, he has had direct experience with this subject and he has been an articulate spokesman for this emerging state industry.

This past year, he sponsored legislation to improve Idaho's tourist-attraction road signs, a practical step in getting highway travelers off the interstates and into our communities.

Anderson has stepped into other issues, too, despite considerable risk. He proposed a compromise on day care legislation, despite opposition and petty turf protection from several directions.

These efforts reflect well on him. We think he has earned another shot at the floral seat and we endorse him for the Republican nomination in the May 27 primary.

with the heavy taxation of salary income, the many writeoffs, and complexity and the inconsistencies in the existing tax laws.

Idaho's Legislature has usually adopted federal income tax changes as part of the state income tax law, but not always. It is not required to do so and it is not a foregone conclusion that federal tax reform will be adopted by the Legislature.

It may be that rather than producing the same amount of revenue, adoption of the federal tax reform at the state level would mean a large revenue loss... So the Legislature may be inclined to adopt federal tax reform, but modify it to reduce a potential loss of revenue.

For example, a key part of the 1981 federal income tax change was a 25 percent rate cut for individuals. That change was not adopted by the Idaho Legislature. State rates remained unchanged, but various writeoffs and deductions were adopted.

The same interest groups that have been lob-

bing Congress to keep various provisions in the Federal code will be present in the Idaho capital in January.

It may be that rather than producing the same amount of revenue, adoption of the federal tax reform at the state level would mean a large revenue loss. The legislators are going to be faced with revenue needs for public schools and higher education. They will have to consider making up Gramm-Rudman-Hollings cuts in social services.

So the Legislature may be inclined to adopt federal tax reform, but modify it to reduce a potential loss of revenue. Some of the issues that are likely to be considered include:

1. The personal exemption. A key federal reform provision raises it from \$1,040 to \$2,000. This change produces much of the "reform" in the reform bills. If adopted by the state, it means a large revenue loss. Can this loss be made up by lightening other provisions in the law?
 2. Tax rates. The U.S. House version of tax reform has three tax rates and the Senate version only two. Idaho has more rates, but most income is taxed at the top rate, 7.5 percent. This rate is reached at only \$5,000 in taxable income for a single person or \$10,000 for a couple.
 3. Corporate taxes. If Idaho follows the basic thrust of federal proposals, it would reduce the corporate tax rate and repeal such provisions as the investment tax credit. Most Idaho businesses would come out ahead. There could be disagreement over many provisions.
- Federal tax reform could help the Idaho economy. It could also help the Legislature meet state revenue needs, depending on how federal tax changes are applied to the state tax code.

Panel OKs cash for shuttle alterations



WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee on Thursday approved spending \$526 million this year to restore space shuttles to flight, a sum that does not include replacing the lost Challenger.

The money would pay for improved booster rockets, engines and brakes as well as the costs of recovering debris and the remains of the seven who died when Challenger exploded on liftoff Jan. 28.

The engineering changes are not likely to include a way for crews to escape emergencies like the one that blew up the Challenger, officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration said. Studies are underway to see what escape procedures are possible.

The Senate committee, on a voice vote, approved the \$526 million as part of a \$3.6 billion spending bill.

Before the vote, NASA administrator James Fletcher had told a subcommittee that the cost of flying the shuttle again would be \$526 million. Sen. Jake Garn, R-Utah, who proposed the lesser amount, said he did not believe NASA could spend the entire \$526 million during the current fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30.

Estimates are that a new orbiter will cost \$1.9 billion, plus \$450 million for spare parts.

Fletcher and other NASA officials later met with President Reagan and advisers from the National Security Council. White House spokesman Larry Speakes told reporters the president asked for more information on the budgetary impact of building a new orbiter and a

fleet of one-use launch vehicles, but gave the officials no deadline to provide the information.

An NSC arm, the Senior Interagency Group on Space, decided recently to find savings in NASA and other agencies to restore the space program rather than asking Congress for new appropriations at a time of budget cutting. The president is said to be committed to a balance of orbiters and expendable launch vehicles.

NASA controller Thomas Newman told the senators the \$526 million includes \$43 million to pay salvage and investigative costs arising from the Challenger accident; \$46 million to maintain a steady supply of spare parts; and \$537 million for corrective actions. That includes \$250 million to redesign the solid-fuel rocket booster system, which is believed to be the cause of the Challenger accident, \$125 million for changes on the space shuttle main engine and \$85 million for changes in the orbiter's steering, braking and other systems.

Newman said the money to make changes on the engines, brakes and other systems will "further increase the safety margin" of the shuttle.

Fletcher and Newman testified before the Housing and Urban Development-Independent agencies subcommittee of the Senate Appropriations Committee.

While Fletcher and Newman concentrated on the engines, brakes and other systems before the space science and applications subcommittee of the House Science and Technology Committee about resuming the manned space program, which was put on hold

with the shuttle explosion.

Arnold Aldrich, manager of the shuttle system, said a special study is being made of means for the crew to escape should problems develop in the first two minutes of flight, but that prospects of achieving that goal are slim.

The shuttle boosters are spent and discarded from the shuttle a little more than two minutes following liftoff. A leak in Challenger's right booster rocket is thought to have doomed that ship.

NASA is working toward a first-flight date of July 15, 1987, Aldrich said, and its cargo will be a \$250 million tracking and data relay satellite identical to the one that was destroyed with the Challenger. One such satellite, which provides ground communication with the shuttle and satellite-to-satellite communications, is in orbit and covers half the Earth. A second is needed for global coverage.

Richard Truhy, the new head of the shuttle program, assured the congressmen that "there is no safety risk to that (July 1987) schedule." If one develops, he said, the first flight will be delayed.

"We essentially are recertifying every critical item in the system," Truhy said. "We have a mountain of work to do and the work has already started."

Aldrich said a team of 75 people, headed by John Thomas of NASA's Marshall Space Flight Center in Alabama, is working on a variety of fixes for the boosters.

Bonner's 6-month visit nears end

BOSTON (AP) — Yelena Bonner announced Thursday she will leave the United States on May 24 to return to the Soviet Union and life in exile with her husband, fellow dissident Andrei Sakharov.

She spoke at a news conference held by doctors at Massachusetts General Hospital to talk about her recovery from heart and leg operations.

Mrs. Bonner, 63, said she would leave for Europe, and go from there to Moscow on June 2, ending her six-month journey to the West for medical treatment.

Cardiologist Adolph Hutter told reporters to limit their questions to medical matters because the hospital fears the Soviet Union will turn Mrs. Bonner away for making controversial statements.

Inventor Hurst found dead

REDLANDS, Calif. (AP) — George Hurst, inventor of the widely used "Jaws of life" rescue device and four-speed transmission pioneer, has been found dead in his garage, authorities said Thursday.

The body of Hurst, 59, was found Tuesday in his car in the garage of his home, said David Hammock, deputy coroner with the San Bernardino County Coroners Office.

The inventor, who had no known health problems, was last seen alive Monday morning and had been dead a few hours when his body was found, Hammock said. It may take several weeks to determine the cause of the death, he said.

Weinberger blocks Fiat pact

WASHINGTON (AP) — Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger has invoked national security concerns to block indefinitely the award of a Pentagon contract to the Fiat-Alilis Co. because of its partial ownership by Libya, his chief spokesman said Thursday.

"We have security concerns about the Libyan participation in that company's ownership and until those are satisfied, we will not go forward with the contract on the basis of national security," said the spokesman, Robert Sims.

The Associated Press, quoting Pentagon sources, reported earlier this week that Weinberger had intervened to block the award of a \$7.9 million contract for combat bulldozers to Fiat-Alilis, a subsidiary of Fiat SpA of Italy. At the time, Sims confirmed the contract had not been awarded but refused to discuss Weinberger's decision.

Walters issues vote warning

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to the United Nations said Thursday he is warning countries getting American aid that they can expect less money if they vote against the United States in the General Assembly.

Vernon Walters, appearing before the Senate Appropriations' foreign operations subcommittee, was reacting to a report, made public earlier in the day, which showed that most countries which receive assistance from the United States vote regularly against this country, providing fresh testimony to the few dividends wrought by foreign aid dollars.

Walters, noting the annual State Department report to Congress on U.N. voting trends, said a number of countries have presumed it is safe to denounce the United States in public so long as they apologize in private.

"I refuse to accept that," Walters testified. But the ambassador conceded that it was a mark of a democracy that a range of opinion was tolerated.

Gulf monitoring stepped up

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. Navy is not attempting to escort every American merchant ship sailing in the Persian Gulf region, but it has stepped up its monitoring of their movements and advised commercial shipping lines to maintain radio contact, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, also said that by the Defense Department's count, Iran has boarded or seized 90 commercial ships since April 1985 to search for war material that might be bound for Iraq. Iranian warships have also approached and queried at least 40 other ships sailing in the area about their nationality and cargo.

FmHA chief says program nearly broke

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Farmers Home Administration has only enough money left in its direct farm operating loan program for about another 10 days, the head of the agency said Thursday.

Vance L. Clark, FmHA administrator, said some states have exhausted their allocations, while others have money left. In all, he said in an interview, the agency has about \$139 million that has not been formally obligated as loans to farmers.

But most of that is carried in the states as unused funds, while the FmHA's actual national reserve is down to less than \$50 million.

Clark said the FmHA plans to concentrate on loan guarantees to see farmers through the remainder of the spring season and will not seek additional funds for direct operating loans.

"We think we can do it," Clark replied when asked whether the guarantees will take care of the demand.

The FmHA, an Agriculture Department agency, is often called the farmer's lender of last resort. Traditionally, farmers cannot qualify for loans unless they have been turned down by banks and other commercial lenders.

All told, including rural housing, farm ownership and other programs as well as farm operating loans, the agency serves about 220,000 borrowers. About 13 percent of the nation's \$212 billion in farm debt is held by the agency.

White House sees Soviet proposal as hopeful sign, but nothing new

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration said the Soviet Union's formal proposal Thursday to limit medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe appears to contain nothing new, but expressed hope that it means the Soviets are getting serious about arms control.

"Our initial scan and advice from our delegation indicates there are not any new and startling approaches in the Soviet proposal," White House spokesman Larry Speakes said.

However, he suggested there was potential significance to the Soviets putting their proposals on paper and said the United States would study them carefully.

Meanwhile, former U.S. negotiator Paul Warnke urged the Reagan administration to treat the offer seriously and ask the British and French governments for their views.

"Basically, it's a European issue," he said.

"I would get in touch with them first and say it appears there's an opportunity to eliminate Soviet SS20 missiles from Europe," Warnke said.

"This means there is less of a nuclear threat than Europe has seen in 25 years."

The Soviets offered the draft treaty at the negotiating table in Geneva, where talks on curbing nuclear weapons resumed last week. While details are still sketchy, it apparently formalizes part of the ambitious disarmament plan announced by Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev in January.


In it he called for elimination of intermediate-range nuclear missiles in Europe as part of a three-stage disarmament process to be completed by the year 2000.

The Senate also confirmed Paul H. Nitze, a special adviser to the administration on the arms talks, as an ambassador at large.

Disaster fund dry

WASHINGTON (AP) — The agency that coordinates federal disaster assistance is nearly out of money and probably won't be able to help in any new emergency, officials said Thursday.

"Unless the supplemental appropriation is provided to FEMA in the next few days, the federal government will be unable to provide essential assistance in presidentially declared disasters or emergencies," Federal Emergency Management Agency Director Julius W. Becton Jr., said in a letter to congressmen who oversee his agency.

Gorbachev tells 2 Americans he's willing to meet Reagan

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev told two American visitors Thursday that he still wants to meet with President Reagan as long as Washington shows willingness to reach an arms control accord, Soviet media reported.

The reports said Gorbachev restated Soviet conditions for another summit during a Kremlin meeting with industrialist Armand Hammer and Dr. Robert Gale, a bone marrow specialist who has been treating victims of the April 26 Chernobyl nuclear accident.

The national television news program Vremya showed the opening minutes of the meeting and the official news agency Tass issued a report on the talks, which covered the nuclear accident in the northern Ukraine and the state of U.S.-Soviet relations.

Also participating in the meeting was former U.S. Ambassador Anatoly F. Dobrynin, now a Communist

Party Central Committee secretary overseeing international relations.

Gorbachev and Reagan agreed during their November summit in Geneva to meet again this year in Washington.

But Soviet officials, including Gorbachev, since have said there is little reason to meet unless some agreement on disarmament can be reached.

Hammer, chairman of Occidental Petroleum, raised the summit subject at Thursday's meeting, Tass said.

The news agency said, "Mikhail Gorbachev confirmed his consent in principle to a new meeting and repeated that two simple things are needed for its holding: the readiness for it bringing a tangible practical result if only in one or two matters agitating the whole world, and an appropriate political atmosphere."

The report did not specify what "tangible practical result" was nec-

essary, but the phrase commonly is used to refer to arms control agreements.

"As to the atmosphere, it worsened still more as a result of a vicious anti-Soviet campaign launched by Washington in connection with the accident in Chernobyl," Tass quoted Gorbachev as saying.

Western governments had complained that Moscow was slow in releasing information about the nuclear accident.

Vremya's announcer described the Kremlin meeting as "warm and friendly."

Gale gave a news conference earlier Thursday, in which he described the injuries suffered by Chernobyl workers and said the death toll from the accident likely will increase from nine.

Hammer, who has longstanding ties with the Soviets, arranged for Gale to visit and treat the nuclear accident victims.

Hostages under death threat

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — A telephone caller claiming to represent a group holding U.S. and French hostages said Thursday the captives will "pay the price" if pressure is put on Syria to obtain their release.

He said some of the hostages already had been killed.

There was no way to authenticate the anonymous call, which also could be a warning to Syria against trying to free the kidnap victims, believed held by the extremist Shiite Muslim group Islamic Jihad.

A March 10 statement by the

organization, whose name means Islamic Holy War, said other factions had used its name falsely and all future announcements would be typewritten and accompanied by photographs of hostages.

Islamic Jihad has claimed to hold five American and four French hostages and says it killed one from each group, but no bodies have been found.

Meanwhile, students at schools throughout west Beirut stayed out of classes Thursday in support of a week-long campaign by the

American University of Beirut demanding the release of kidnapped teachers and students.

Thursday's caller, who spoke in Arabic, said the United States, France and two Arab countries were involved in pressuring Syrian President Hafez Assad to get the hostages freed.

"We warn whoever (meddles) in this affair of the American hostages, although we harbor respect and admiration for President Hafez Assad," he told a Western news agency office in Muslim west Beirut.

Korea clashes erupt

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — Students demonstrated against the government Thursday on at least 30 campuses nationwide, and on at least four Seoul campuses they battled police with gasoline bombs and stones, witnesses said.

Many of the protests were held to commemorate the anniversary of the bloody May 18-27, 1980, uprising in the southern city of Kwangju. There were no immediate reports of arrests or injuries.

Student sources and news reports said 12 demonstrations took place in the Seoul area.

At Yonsei University near downtown Seoul, about 500 stu-

dents were chanting "Down with imperialism!" and other anti-government slogans when 500 riot police in full battle gear entered the campus.

Witnesses said students hurled more than 150 gasoline bombs during the hour-long clash. A strong smell of tear gas permeated the area.

At Korea University, about 400 students battled riot police at the campus gate for two hours before withdrawing to a barricaded library. Students also burned effigies wearing military reserve uniforms and other materials they said symbolized the United States.

Animals arrive

KUALA LUMPUR, Malaysia (AP) — Australia has sent Malaysia's National Zoo two orangutans and two pairs of capybara, a large South American rodent, a zoo official said Thursday.

National Zoo director Jeffery Lee told reporters that the animals arrived from the Adelaide Zoo Wednesday as part of an animal exchange program involving zoos all over the world.

He said the Malaysian zoo has not decided what animal to send in exchange to Australia.

Cooling off of tensions Israel goal

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Prime Minister Shimon Peres, reacting to a warning from U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz, said Thursday that Israel was doing its best to defuse tensions with Syria.

Peres told reporters that Israel regards as primarily defensive Syria's construction of new tank and gun emplacements in eastern Lebanon, and that the action is unnecessary.

He later told a Labor Party convention, "We have no intention of attacking Syria and Syria has no chance of defeating Israel."

"Israel has no interest or justification in initiating a war against any neighboring or non-neighboring state," said Defense Minister Yitzhak Rabin.

Shultz said Wednesday in Washington, "We don't believe a war between Israel and Syria would serve either party's interests, and we have continued to do it."

Responding to Shultz, Peres told reporters at the convention, "We are doing our best to defuse" the tension.

The daily newspaper Hadashot reported from Washington that Syrian President Hafez Assad had sent a message to President Reagan saying he had no intention of attacking Israel and the fortifications were for defensive purposes only.

Peres revealed earlier that Israel had conveyed to Syria through the United States its concern about Syria's construction of gun and tank emplacements. He said Israel was awaiting the results of the U.S. mediation.

The daily Davar newspaper, which is closely affiliated with Peres' Labor Party, said the prime minister was seeking a meeting with Reagan in Washington during a proposed trip to the United States.

For child abuse victims, a room of their own

Interview area affords privacy

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Prosecutor's Office is seeking \$5,000 in donations to furnish an interview room especially for young victims of abuse.

Space already has been provided by The Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital. What's needed is video

equipment, toys, art supplies and furniture.

Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said Wednesday at a news conference that she turned to the public for help because there was no room to fi-

nance the project in the budgets of the county and other agencies. There also was no room for the room at the county building where her office is located.

Besides its appeal to the public, the prosecutor's office will solicit help from businesses and service organizations.

The end result of Baxter's efforts will look like a play room. That's intentional, because it's an environment to which children can relate and that will ease the trauma of those already traumatized by neglect or sexual abuse, she said.

Now most of her interviews of

suspected, abused children take place at police stations.

"It can scare them to the point that they think they have done something wrong," Baxter said.

But the playroom trappings will serve another purpose.

"Dolls, a doll house and art supplies will help the children tell the story of their abuse, she said. It will encourage open communication and honest reporting to facilitate investigation and prosecution.

"They can draw pictures or use toys such as a doll house to show where and how things happened."

The room also will be equipped for

videotaping of interviews. New law regarding sexual abuse cases allows admission of hearsay statements of children in some circumstances, Baxter said. She hopes the law extends to use of videotaped interviews.

"This spares the child the trauma of having to appear in front of a room full of strangers, as well as the defendant," she added. "If we can spare a child the trauma of the courtroom and cross-examination, we will have made a significant step toward the protection of these children."

Before attempting to use any

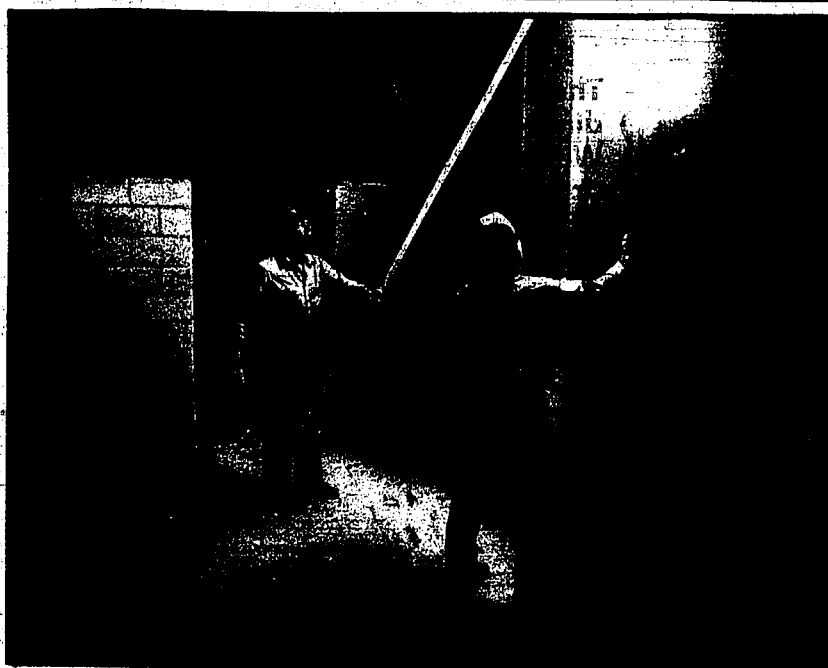
videotapes, however, her office must be sure they are of sufficient technical and professional quality to meet the "inevitable challenges from zealous defense attorneys and cautious judges," she added.

Once the room is ready, it probably will be used frequently.

Baxter reported last month that the number of complaints of child sexual abuse in Twin Falls County tripled during the first four months this year, compared to the same period last year. Statewide statistics show a similar trend.

Wanted: Helping hands for seniors

TWIN FALLS — The old KMVT studios are bare-walled and cluttered with piles of old fixtures and insulation this week. Work has begun in earnest.

The Twin Falls Senior Citizens Federation has been issued a special-use permit, plans have been approved by all parties involved and a contractor has been hired to turn the old studios at the corner of Elizabeth Boulevard and Eastland Drive into a new Senior Citizen Center.

The group's next need is for volunteer help, says Director Thelma Ross.

The building was estimated to need \$150,000 worth of repairs when the city accepted the building from KMVT. However, a community block grant of \$41,412 and \$25,000 from the sale of the old center will not cover costs of all the changes desired without relying on volunteers, even when added to the Senior Citizens Federation building fund. The fund had a balance of about \$30,000 when the project began last year.

Armstrong and Co. Inc. has been awarded the construction contract for the firm's costs plus

10 percent, says Gale Kleinkopf, the City Council senior liaison. The company will provide some builders and a supervisor to oversee volunteer help.

Navy Seabees from Boise have already started the remodeling project by tearing out extra walls. And senior citizens have been working on the interior.

The center is seeking community groups willing to donate an evening or a Saturday to studying walls, putting up sheet rock, painting or tearing out portions of the roof, Ross says.

Seniors are hoping that the building will be habitable by mid-July, when the old center on 4th Avenue is scheduled to be turned over to its new owners, Lawrence and Evelyn Dunthorn. However, the Dunthorns may allow the seniors some additional time, Kleinkopf said.

The first phase of construction will include remodeling the main portion of the old building — that used by KMVT as studios.

Plans call for the two studios to be converted into dining areas. One will serve as the main dining hall and the other will be used for overflow and activities such as cards and bingo, Ross says. Also on the main floor will be an office, restrooms and a huge kitchen to

prepare the 42,000 meals served at the center and to the homebound each year.

A 110-foot ramp will be built from the rear entrance to the basement, plans show. The basement will also have a lounge, but most of the area will be used for a recreation hall with pool tables.

When the construction is completed and a new roof is up, the seniors will be ready to let a contractor pave parking areas, says Board Chairman Paul Smith.

Later plans call for converting the older section of the building, formerly the KJLX Radio Station, to a craft shop and a store for senior handicrafts.

That area will require more work to meet safety and building codes, according to a city staff report.

The Planning and Zoning Commission has issued the seniors a special use permit for the center in a residential neighborhood contingent on full compliance with the city's building code in all occupied areas.

The commission is also requiring that parking be paved and an irrigation lateral on Elizabeth Boulevard be piped within a year and

Incumbent hopeful bucks IEA actions

TWIN FALLS — Running for a second time against an opponent endorsed by the Idaho Education Association, 54-year-old Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Jerome, said he doesn't like being tagged with an anti-teacher label.

"I don't like to get that tag, but it is something I have strong feelings about and someone has to carry the load on it," the one-term incumbent from the eight-county Magic Valley, District 25A said Wednesday. The IEA wants to take over Idaho's schools, Callen said, and he has carried bills to stymie them both years of his first term.

This year, his bill to limit teacher contract negotiations to salary and fringe benefits and to set a time limit on talks was voted down. Last year, Callen introduced a bill to eliminate collective bargaining for teachers altogether. That measure was killed as well.

Callen has been criticized as anti-teacher as a result. He said he is a friend of education and teachers, but is an opponent of the teachers union. "It's not a vendetta. If they don't like Jerry Callen, vote him out, that's the American way," Callen said.

A cattle-feeder and farmer from a pioneer Jerome County family, Callen is one of the most conservative members of the House. He faces opposition from a moderate Republican in his hometown.

This year, his bill to limit the IEA's endorsement of Jerome pharmacist Robin Kinsey will have much impact, but teachers could get out in force to work for Kinsey, which could have an effect.

Aside from his failed negotiations bill, he said he is proud of his bill to put two parents on the 13-member state Textbook Selection Committee, which was made law. "I hope people don't take it as a fighting religious move. It isn't, parents should get involved," he said.

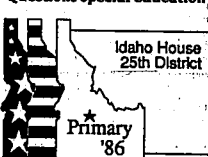
He doesn't know any school district using the book, Callen said, but there are objectionable health course books that have been approved by the state committee for use in schools. If the committee rejects enough books, maybe a message will get back to book publishers, he said.

Callen also is proud that he sponsored in the House a Senate bill to set up a system for retaining school trustees. He said he is not out to get trustees, but a federal judge said a system needed to be on the books, and he likes the plan sent over to the House by the Senate.

When it came to school funding, Callen said he voted against the temporary penny sales tax increase that passed the Legislature this year because it would give teachers a raise while others are hurting. "The funding is probably adequate now for the way our economy is," he said.

State employees have had their pay frozen for the past three years and "If we're asking them to bite the bullet, maybe education ought to, too," he said.

"I was reluctant to raise taxes just to raise the salaries of teachers," he said. "If it was to buy books or computers, I would be willing to spend more."

Callen said schools are top-heavy with administrators and are not getting their money's worth out of special education programs for slow and fast learners.

If the special services budgets were dumped into the general school budgets, more teachers could be hired and average classroom sizes could be cut from 30 students to 19, Callen said, and specially trained teachers would not be needed for fast and slow learners. "A teacher with 19 would have time to work with slow ones and work with fast ones; if their class load was cut in half, they would be able to," he said.

"I think we took a wrong turn here about 15 years ago when we set up this special education program. I question whether we need all this stuff," he said.

Callen said he isn't concerned about charges emanating from the Twin Falls group called Citizens for a Progressive Idaho, which said he was not pro-business. He has a good pro-business voting record, he said, and he voted against the formation of the Department of Commerce because he didn't want another bureaucracy formed. "I don't believe they've brought one business to Idaho," he said.

Buhl swimming pool will impose user fees

BUHL — After a long tradition of free public use of Buhl's Eastland Park facilities, the Buhl City Council has established swimming pool user fees for the first time.

Monsanto loses products liability case

BOISE — The Idaho Court of Appeals this week upheld a decision ordering the Monsanto Co. to pay about \$3,000 in attorney fees and costs to a Buhl business because of Monsanto's "unreasonable and frivolous" action in a 1981 products liability case.

The case began when Paul and Kathleen Borchard of Gooding filed an \$11,500 lawsuit in 5th District Court against Monsanto. The couple claimed they purchased a defective

herbicide manufactured by Monsanto from Wefco Inc., a farm supply business in Buhl.

As a result of the defective product, their barley crop was of a lesser quality, they alleged.

The couple also accused Monsanto and Wefco of breaching the product's warranty, according to a case history.

Under the Idaho Product Liabilities Act, sellers of products are not liable if they sold products in the same container in which they had received it, stated a May 9 ruling from the Idaho Court of Appeals.

Such was the case with Wefco. Yet Monsanto refused to pay for a period of months to pay for, as required in the act — Wefco's defense against the claim, the ruling stated.

Wefco countersued Monsanto in 1982, seeking to absolve itself of a liability, and to have Monsanto pay it any defense costs or judgment against it related to the claim over the herbicide.

About a year later, Monsanto proposed to Wefco an agreement in which it would pay defense costs for Wefco, but not assume any of Wefco's liability for certain damages.

The record showed no response from Wefco to the proposal.

The Borchards later dropped their warranty claim against Wefco. The District Court, however, ordered the couple to pay Wefco \$5,950 for costs and attorney fees.

After the Borchards objected to the judgment against them, the lower court ordered Wefco to divide its defense expenses between the Borchards and Monsanto.

In the meantime, the District Court had granted a judgment to Wefco and against Monsanto for

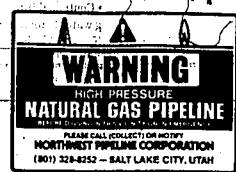
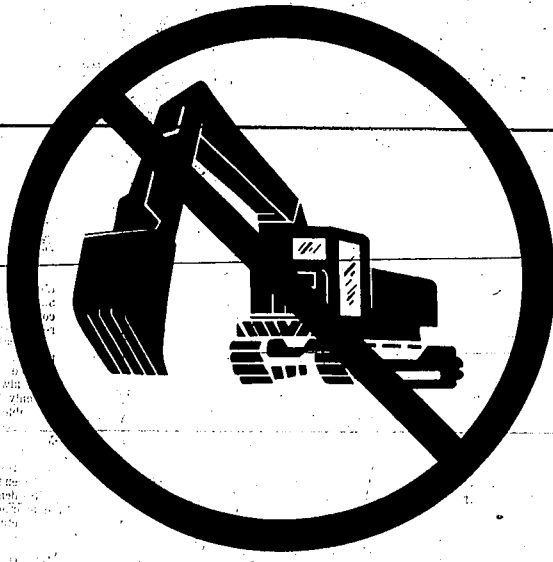

CSI's Whaley, Johnson start out hot

ODESSA, Tex. — Halfmiler DeVoe Whaley and high jumper Joey Johnson passed the first hurdle toward a possible national track championship but College of Southern Idaho's heptathlete, Jennifer Whelan, appeared to have fallen out of her favorite's role.

Whaley posted a 1:53.71 to lead all qualifiers into the semifinal 800-meter heats today while Johnson cleared all three jumps before the field for Saturday's finals were established at nine high jumpers.

In all, CSI lost only its men's 1600-meter relay.

Julie Mori set a school record of 134-10 for

the second-best throw in the women's discus. However, that only moves her to the finals and the distance will not accompany her.

Julie Cupp went 35-11 and Jessica Toliver 36-1/2 for 10th- and seventh-best qualifying in the women's triple jump and the CSI women's 4-by-100 relay became one of six to advance to the finals.

Whelan, who went into the heptathlon with the nation's best point total, opened strong with her best time ever in the 100-meter hurdles. But she slipped to a career low at 5-1/4 in the high jump and that affected her the rest of the day.

She dropped four feet off her best to 25-11 in the shot, six tenths off in the 200 to 26:89 and ended the day with 2,572 points. The leader sits with 2,857.

In the men's division, Benny Hicks ran a 47.53 for fifth in his 400 qualifying heat and will advance to the semifinals. Cliff Hudson went 49-1/4 to gain Saturday's triple-jump finals.

"Overall we're very pleased with our showing. Jennifer is very disappointed but that's just one of those things that happens to athletes," Coach Rick Neill said. "I think we still have a good shot at titles with DeVoe and Joey and I think some of the others can place

pretty well in their events. DeVoe just coasted to his win and Joey made all three of his jumps at 6-9, 6-10 and 6-11 with ease. He appeared to have four or five inches to spare over the bar each jump."

Region III sends its best to track today

TWIN FALLS — The Highland Rams have made a habit of winning on the Twin-Falls track for the past couple of years, and there's little reason to believe it won't happen again today in the inaugural Region III Class A-1 track and field championships.

But the addition of Mountain Home and the reduction in the way this one will be scored should bring things closer together in the final team standings.

While the winner will get trophies to put in the display cases, the major point for this meet is qualifying for the state finals in Boise next weekend.

The meet, featuring Pocatello, Highland, Minico, Twin Falls and Mountain Home, will begin with preliminaries and some field finals at 1 p.m. The field finals will continue through staggered starts the rest of the afternoon and the running finals are slated to begin at 5 p.m. at Brul Stadium.

"I would suppose that Highland should be favored, but I don't think it would be a major surprise if someone might beat them in one of the divisions. I think it could be that close if everyone performs close to the expected," said Twin Falls Coach Jerry Kleinkopf.

The girls' division goes off in a rash of question marks. One is the condition of Highland hurdler Katie VanOrden, who missed last week's Twin Falls Classic with what was described as a possible season-ending ankle sprain. She is entered in Friday's meet by Coach Ned Bell but that doesn't tell her condition.

Bell also has penciled in Jamie Gonzales in the 400 and 800 meters — a nearly impossible double due to the order of events. Since Gonzales would be a contender from 100 to through 800 yards, the option remains Highland's right up to the moment of reporting to the clerk of the course.

Twin Falls' major question mark is junior Eva Talamantes, who is coming off a leg injury. A medical decision might not be available until this morning. If Talamantes does not run, it will be on a race-by-race basis.

She'll run the 200 preliminary in a state-qualifying 26.3-second time, Kleinkopf hopes. If she accomplishes that, she won't run the final. Then she'll go in the 800 relay, being scratched from the 100. From there it will be the 400 and then, perhaps, the mile relay.

"We'll check after each race and when Eva says she's had enough, that will be it," said Kleinkopf. "That's probably she's able to run at all."

The Bruin staff also was shaken when distance ace Jenny Hannah turned up ill Tuesday night. But apparently it was flu of the 24-hour variety and she'll go, probably in the 3200 and 800.

The vagaries of the season have resulted in only one of the expected top 100 meters candidates in that event, perhaps leaving it open for Mountain Home's Jenny Jaquet, a possible four-event winner. But Jaquet will have to be quick-starting Yolanda Frazier of Pocatello, who also rates as a top 200 contender.

Jaquet should be a formidable foe for VanOrden in the 100 hurdles and should win the high jump — unless teammate Charlene Fischer beats her. Jaquet will be the only girl Dana Cowan of Twin Falls in the long jump. Cowan has been sick each of the past three meet days and her long jumping has dwindled from the mid-17-foot range to the low 16s.

The 800 should be a battle, all things considered. If Gonzales is there along with Hannah and Minico's Oralia Casiano. If Gonzales goes the 600 route, she'll be looking at Idalia Casiano of Minico. Hannah is favored in the 3200 and the 1600 is up for grabs.

In the other field events, Stephanie Hall of Highland is the shot put favorite and the discus is too inconsistent to call.

In the relay events, Twin Falls is moving in a couple of spots to improve but they will remain dependent on the availability of Talamantes. Minico and Highland have consistently been better at 800 and 1600 meters while Twin Falls has been solid in the medleys.

In the boys' division, Mountain Home's Maury Toy is the favorite in the 100- and 200- and triple-jump — if basis.

The right-handed Sparma pitched for the Tigers on Sept. 17, 1968, the night the Tigers won the American League pennant en route to a World Series championship victory against the St. Louis Cardinals.

Make parks beer-free, former pitcher urges

NEW YORK (AP) — Major sporting events have become excuses for getting drunk, and teams cannot solve the problem without "tough love" legislation, former Yankee pitcher Ryne Duren testified Thursday.

"I really have come to think that the real national pastime has become the beer, both on getting drunk, and the sporting event that the people are witnessing is simply a place to act that out," Duren said at a hearing before two state New York Assembly committees.

The hearing was held to discuss two pending bills: one prohibiting the sale of alcoholic beverages at all athletic events and one requiring an alcohol-free zone at sporting events with 250 or more spectators. The alcohol-free zone would comprise 25 percent of the stadium or arena.

Duren, who pitched in the major leagues from 1957 to 1965 and was with the Yankees from 1958 to 1961, is a recovering alcoholic and has been involved in programs to combat the disease since 1968. He pointed out that professional sports is financially tied to the alcohol industry.

"Twenty-three out of 26 of the big league (baseball) clubs that I'm aware of, and probably the same percentage holds true for the other sports, derive their major amount of dollar-revenue from the sale of the television and radio rights and advertising rights within the ballparks or the stadiums from the alcohol industry," he said.

Changing this relationship might be best done by the legislature, he said.

"I think that by showing no more tolerance for this problem in the stadiums, this may be an excellent beginning for correcting the problem," he said.

Several other witnesses, admitting that fan rowdiness is a problem, disagreed that legislation is the solution.

Trading cases try Wall Street

NEW YORK (AP) — One of Wall Street's most valued possessions — its integrity — is being tested by the government's latest charges of illegal insider trading in the financial community.

In an environment where confidential information worth millions of dollars is exchanged daily, investment firms cultivate relationships with clients based largely on the trust that such data will be handled discreetly and legally.

But the Street's reputation is under pressure after Securities and Exchange Commission allegations of illicit insider trading by an investment banker at Drexel Burnham Lambert Inc. and, in a separate case, the investment firm First Boston Corp.

Although the circumstances in each case are wholly distinct, their coming within days of each other has forced Wall Street to again review its controls aimed at discouraging illegal trading of securities based on "inside information," information on a publicly owned company not yet available to the public.

If nothing else, the charges likely will prompt Wall Street's top executives to reassure skittish clients that all is being done to prevent such information from being abused.

"Everyone will have to have more extensive discussions with clients about their security measures," said Daniel J. Good, merger chief with E.F. Hutton & Co. "They (clients) have every right to be very careful with whom they're dealing, and to find out how that information will be handled."

The charges also could sow additional seeds of distrust among individual investors, who fre-

quently complain of being the last to know about important developments affecting their stocks.

Wall Street observers agreed that no firm's internal controls are fool-proof.

"Regardless of how good the internal procedures are, if there's somebody who wants to override them, it can be done," said Perrin Long, a securities industry analyst for Lipper Analytical Services Inc.

Long also said that while the latest charges "create near-term credibility problems" for Wall Street, "over the longer term, I don't think it will have a serious impact — unless this is just the tip of the iceberg."

On May 5, the SEC charged First Boston with illegally profiting when its stock traders sold shares based on inside information received by the firm's corporate finance arm.

First Boston agreed to give up profits of \$132,330 and pay a fine of \$264,720 to settle the charges without admitting or denying guilt. The firm's marketing director, James W. Hood, said First Boston discovered the error itself and made a full disclosure to the SEC.

The firm also agreed to revise its controls involving its "Chinese wall," a Wall Street term for the barrier that is supposed to stand between a firm's investment banking department, which is privy to inside information — and its stock traders.

Wall Street was jolted again on Monday when Francis B. Levine, a managing director in Drexel Burnham Lambert's securities, mergers and acquisitions department, was charged by the SEC with earning at least \$12.6 million through illicit insider trading over five years — the largest such alleged scheme ever uncovered by the agency.

Levine also was arrested and charged by the Justice Department with obstruction of justice for allegedly trying to block the SEC's investigation. He was freed on \$5 million bond. Drexel Burnham and two other firms that previously employed Levine during the period were not charged.

Martin Flumenbaum, Levine's lawyer, said his client "contests the charges made against him and will dispute them in court."

Investment executives were quick to note that Levine's alleged activities involved an individual who, according to the SEC, operated through the Bahamian unit of a Swiss bank and took other steps to circumvent the internal controls of his employers.

"This matter with Levine has absolutely zero to do with the issue of controls," said David Kay, co-director of Drexel Burnham's mergers and acquisitions team. "You cannot control someone with a criminal intent who is in a position of highest trust."

Many Wall Street firms have elaborate precautions to guard against data being abused or falling into the wrong hands.

At Hutton, for instance, Good said dealmakers have electronic door locks to their offices, corporate clients are given code names, employee stock trading is monitored, and strategists are trained — not to discuss sensitive information in elevators, restaurants and taxis.

Stocks fall as interest rises

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices fell sharply Thursday in selling attributed to rising open-market interest rates and uncertainty over the progress of the economy.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials tumbled 33.90 to 1,774.68, for its seventh largest point loss ever and its biggest since it took a record 41.91-point drop on April 30.

"Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 131.57 million shares, against 132.14 million Wednesday.

In the economic news, the Federal Reserve reported that industrial production rose 0.2 percent in April after falling in the two preceding months.

But Wall Streeters questioned whether that represented any convincing evidence that economic growth was picking up significantly. The Fed said that the increase stemmed primarily from higher out-

put of cars and trucks, and that most other sectors of the manufacturing economy were little changed.

In the blue-chip sector, International Business Machines dropped 2 1/4% to 145 1/4%, McDonald's 1 1/4% to 103 1/4%, Merck 1/4% to 18 1/4%, Kodak 2 to 57, and Minnesota Mining & Manufacturing 1 1/4% to 100 1/4%.

Exxon fell 1 1/4% to 58 1/4%, which posted a strong earnings gain in the first quarter, said it didn't expect to match that feat in coming quarters.

Money-center bank stocks also took a beating. Citicorp lost 1 1/4% to 56 1/4%; Chase Manhattan 1/4% to 40 1/4%; J.P. Morgan 1 1/4% to 82 1/4%; and Manufacturers Hanover 1 1/4% to 57 1/4%.

Uncoupled led the active list, down 1 1/2% in trading that included a 23.35 million-share block, the second-largest trade by number of shares in Big Board history. Mesa Petroleum said it sold the block.

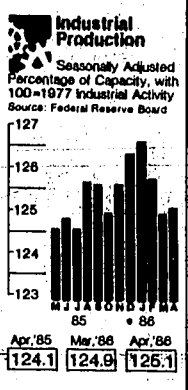
In the plus column, Zenith Laboratories climbed 2 1/4% to 30 1/4%. The company voted a 100 percent stock dividend, which is the practical equivalent of a 2-for-1 split.







Museum director digs Mayan tool-making

Woods brings back information from site

TWIN FALLS — That the Herrett Museum has become a cultural mainstay on the College of Southern Idaho Campus is a tribute to its founder, the late Norman Herrett, as well as to the staff of dedicated individuals who have made it tick since.

Heading that staff is director Jim Woods, a Twin Falls native and protégé of Herrett's, who goes great distances to bring information home to locals. In February, Woods left the frigid Northwest for the muggy climate of Central America, where he worked for three weeks sifting through the ruins of the Maya Indians in Colha, Belize.

Woods says that primarily four things motivated him into making the trip. For one, the project director is Dr. Thomas Hester, whom Woods came to know because Hester wrote a chapter for the book "Stone Tool Analysis: Essays in Honor of Don E. Crabtree," which Woods helped edit.

Secondly, the late Crabtree, a world-renowned anthropologist from the Magic Valley and one of Woods' mentors, had traveled to the Colha site in the mid-1970s. "When he came back," Woods says, "he related the experience to me — about how important it was to both Mayan and stone tool studies — and told me if I ever had the chance to go there, take it."

"A while back, the project was opened to Earthwatch, a program where people pay to go on a dig," Woods says, adding that Mary Emery of Twin Falls had called Hester about that, and incidentally mentioned Woods' name, not knowing that Hester was acquainted with the museum director. That conversation and following ones led to an arrangement for Woods' trip, independent of Earthwatch.

Finally, Woods says, "Our children's program next year is going to be on the Maya, and, although I studied the Maya with Norm Herrett, a lot has happened since then. Also, I knew there would be a lot of Maya experts down there with current information we could use for our Maya exhibit here."

The director says that it took him the first week to adjust to the humid climate, snakes and spiders at the Colha site. "But, the scariest of all were the plants. So many of them were so poisonous and some had thorns and thistles that would go right through any boots," he says.

But, even with the hardships, which included packing supplies from the tent camp to the archaeological site a mile away, then carrying them back each night as protection against theft, Woods considers the journey immensely successful and informative.

"The Colha site was used to mass-produce stone tools in the millions which were then exported. We're not sure what came back in exchange," he says, pointing out that so many tools were produced on the site that they were obviously not just for local use.

"The site covers several square miles and is divided into four sections. I only worked on one section, and it was huge."

Woods says on that section alone hundreds of mounds exist that are made up entirely of chert (flint-like stone) chips which were left over from toolmaking. He describes the mounds as about 50 feet across and, when dug out, deep enough for him to stand in and not be able to see the edges of the mounds.

"Being a flintknapper myself, I know you can work for days and not fill a bucket with chips," he says, referring to the sophistication of the Mayan toolmakers.

"I developed a lot of admiration for their toolmakers," he says, noting that the tools were used

for woodworking, farming and clearing the jungles. He explains that one tool, the tranchet adze, had a flake taken out of it with the appearance of an orange peel, and that one flake, therefore, represents a single tool. "Those flakes can be found in the millions," he says.

While in Belize, Woods also visited numerous Mayan temple ruins, other industrial sites and a vault in the capitol building in Belmopan where archaeological treasures are kept. "Looking in the vault was a breathtaking experience! There was incredible pottery, and stone tools beyond what I expected. It's fantastic! Some people probably get the same thrill out of looking at Egyptian things. It evoked an emotion in me that is inexpressible."

Among those items were large clay platters with Mayan motifs that were "not only beautiful to look at but are also full of information," he says, adding that, just as interesting were 50-60 pound abstract forms in flint. "That took an exotic investment in energy."

The museum director feels somewhat dismayed about those items being locked up in a vault. "Some day I would like to take a sabbatical and raise the money to build a museum there," he says. "Those pieces need to be on display. That's what a museum is for."

Woods thinks that the knowledge he gained from the trip will help him pass on updated information locally. And, as a direct spinoff, the Herrett will receive a collection of some 30 to 50 stone tools to add to its Mayan exhibit by mid-summer. He notes that the tools, on loan from Belize, will be only the second such collection in the United States.

TWIN FALLS — "Idaho's Indians — Idaho's Heritage," a discussion of the historical, legal and cultural significance of treaties and other agreements between the U.S. and Indian Nations, will be held in the Shields Building on the College of Southern Idaho Campus at 7 p.m. Tuesday.

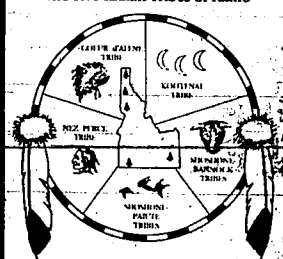
The forum, funded by the five Indian tribes of Idaho and the Association for the Humanities in Idaho, is part of a series of six workshops being held statewide, culminating when all five tribes meet at the Idaho Public Library at 7 p.m. May 29.

The five Idaho tribes are the Shoshone-Paiute Nations, Duck Valley Reservation; Coeur d'Alene Nation, Coeur d'Alene Reservation; Kootenai Nation, Kootenai Mission; Nez Perce Nation, Nez Perce Reservation; and Shoshone-Bannock Nations, Fort Hall Reservation.

Whitney McKinney, chairman of the Shoshone-Paiute Tribes — Tuesday night's host — says, "Many people in Idaho know little about the Indian people of the state and even less about the rich heritage and unusual history of the Idaho tribes."

The discussion could go a long way toward alleviating that, beginning with a slide presentation of the current Shoshone-Paiute Tribes. Afterward, attorney Larry EchoHawk will present the background of the Indian-U.S. rela-

tions from the arrival of the first Europeans.

Tribal spokesman Dr. Alan Marshall explains that, "It was the emperor of Spain in 1532, acting on the advice of his most respected theologian, who first determined how the explorers and then the settlers would deal with the inhabitants of the new world."

"From the emperor's decision to sign peace treaties, an unusual legal and historical relationship was formed," he says, pointing out that this arrangement today sets Indian people apart from the other minority groups around the country.

EchoHawk adds, "The tribes have signed agreements with the

United States government — one nation with another — that are legally recognized in the Constitution as the supreme law of the land. These agreements raise a series of unusual issues which many people know little about."

Herrett Museum Director Jim Woods, who helped arrange the Tuesday night meeting, says the panel discussion will address the Indian's main concerns and how those concerns affect all of us.

"Twin Falls sits between two big reservations; Duck Valley, which is mostly in Oregon, and Fort Hall, says Woods usually, in day-to-day living, we don't deal much with Indian people. But, the future is important. Fishing rights are a concern, but, even bigger is the subject of water rights. Someday, people will have to address it."

Concerning the meeting, McKinney says that panel presentations by Shoshone-Paiute attorney Carolyn Steele, tribal enrollment chairman Arthur Manning and McKinney will explore many of these subjects.

McKinney adds, "We see this as an important step to fill the gap in information, and often in understanding between our different cultures. We invite the curious, those who want to know more, to join us."

Shepard play gains Drama Critics award

NEW YORK (AP) — Sam Shepard's "A Lie of the Mind" was chosen Monday as the best new play in the 1985-86 theater season by the New York Drama Critics Circle.

"Benefactors" by English playwright Michael Frayn was picked as best foreign play, while the critics declined to give an award for best musical, and one each for Emily Mann's "Execution of Justice," A.R. Gurney Jr.'s "The Perfect Party," and "Anteroom."

Two critics were not directed by Miss Wagner. "A Lie of the Mind," the story of a strange marriage and its effect on two families in California and Manhattan, opened at off-Broadway's Promenade Theater on Dec. 5, 1985, and is still running.

 Colha is the earliest documented industrial settlement of the ancient Maya. By the late preclassic period (300 B.C.-A.D. 250), craft specialists were mass-producing such stone tools as axes, axes and hoes, as well as some items specially produced for ceremonial or ritual functions.
 The millions of tools manufactured at Colha during that time may be linked to the development of intensive agriculture - the raised fields and canal systems in northern Belize. Colha tools have been documented at many sites in northern Belize, and it is apparent that the site was a major exporter of tools to Mayan consumers in the region.
 Herrett Museum Director Jim Woods says that Hester's talk is going to be a summary of what's going on at Colha, including what stone tool studies have led to our knowledge of the Maya Indians and what archaeologists learned about Mayan flintknappers from the late Don E. Crabtree.
 Crabtree, a Magic Valley native who most recently lived in Kimberley, became renowned in the field of anthropology after teaching himself flintknapping techniques that exposed how tools were made by ancient man.

Palladium: Art world's answer to Studio 54

NEW YORK — Spring in the city was as capricious as a courtesan by Colette, warm and seductive, biting its sarcasm, drenching as angry tears. A radiant afternoon snapped like a night that made a California visitor feel like a local. The idea of venturing down into the plight of East 14th Street was as attractive as an Arctic swim, especially since the target establishment is the sort of place that keeps its patrons waiting on line for hours unless you report on it renowned as Mick or Bianca or Andy.

Well, the public relations representative had assured the visitor that journalists were welcome and if he would just come around to the stage door. Fine, but first duty dictated a tura past the main entrance. How can you report on it renowned and trendy emporium without looking at the facade?

Jeep it's cold. Is that it? It looks exactly like hundreds of defunct old theaters with its blank rustling marquee and festoons of angry graffiti. This is the famous Palladium that celebrated its first birthday last Wednesday and has become a fabled in song, story and Architectural Record as something more than just the usual inclusive gathering place for people who are famous for being well-known. It is supposed to be the popular temple to the Post-Modernist sensibility, designed by Arata Isozaki — the architect of the Los Angeles Museum of Contemporary Art — and given further cultural cachet through the presence of commissioned works by such art stars as Keith Haring, Jean Michelle Basquiat, Kenny Scharf and Francesco Clemente. It has gained a reputation as a leading example of an integrated art spa where architecture and painting are wedded to design, theater and socializing.

The whole thing is the brainchild of Steve Rubell and Ian Schrager who masterminded the legendary Studio 54 before being sent off to the pokey for tax evasion. The Palladium is their comeback turn.

Better go around back and make sure it's the right place.

"Sure this is it," says the friendly spokeswoman in the alley. "Come on up."

Backstage is the usual musty maze of staircases, bulletin boards and stale air heavy with languorous cigarette smoke and pungent overcooked coffee in cardboard cups. Heaven Warm.

A handsome dark young woman appears wearing a lace dress, cowboy boots and a satin baseball jacket. "Hi, I'm Michelle Suna, director of special programs. Nancy is stuck upstairs in traffic, so let me show you around until she arrives."

Michelle tourguides amiably into the main auditorium where — suddenly — she is like a character in a movie who mouths mutely while haunting music begins a flashback. The camera pans up the vast dome of the theater ceiling with its pocked lunettes, volutes, capitals and you hear echoing snippets of the past lives of a theater once called the Majestic. Beethoven mixes dissonantly with a popular Burlesque ditty the swing of Big Band jazz and the pelvic thump of rock...

... they purposely left a lot of the old detail so it would contrast with the new high-tech look...

Flash Gordon meets Luis Bñuel. The interior is more than 100,000 square feet. Into the center of it Isozaki introduced a three-tiered right-angle structure that looks a little like a Minimalist reduction of a theater. It is crowned by an arch and punctured with square openings suggesting box seats. Steamship-modern staircases lead down past plaster gilt baroque sculpture to a disco dance floor overlain by a Star-Wars array of audiovisual hardware.

Stars show for preview of film on homeless

WASHINGTON (AP) — A group of Hollywood stars, in town for a glitzy preview of a television movie about homeless activist Mitch Snyder, used the occasion Monday to call for a national drive to end hunger and homelessness in America.

"Stars are the way we want them. Until we accept the responsibility, nothing is going to change," said actor Martin Sheen, who plays Snyder in the upcoming "Samaritan: The Mitch Snyder Story."

Sheen and others were attending a sold-out, 1,600-seat Washington premiere of the movie where tickets went for \$50 to \$250 and a handful of patrons paid \$5,000 each.

Earlier in the day, the stars toured the shelter operated by the Community for Creative Non-Violence as homeless men and women were given a special screening of the movie and catered lunch in the basement of the crumbling building.

The movie, being shown on CBS-TV on May 19, was inspired by the 31-day hunger strike Snyder staged at the height of the 1984 presidential election to gain federal money to renovate the aging CCNV shelter.

"This might not be the best way to raise money, but it is going to bring the eyes of the powers that be onto the homeless," said shelter resident Russell Gollit. "These are just normal people who have fallen into homelessness because they can't provide for themselves. We need to be seen and I think this will help."

"We treat this as an opportunity to educate others," said Snyder, who ended another fast over the building last month.

Snyder was flanked by actors Valerie Harper and Dennis Weaver, whose group Love Is Feeding Everyone is splitting the proceeds of the premiere with the CCNV.

Also with Snyder were Ned Beatty; Esther Rolle; Cathryn D'Amico of the "Webster" TV series; musician Didi Conn; actor Stan Shaw; Roxanne Hart, who portrays homeless activist Carol Penhaly in the movie; and Academy award-winning composer David Shire.

"This is yet another demonstration of people in large numbers taking responsibility and making a difference," said Harper.

"This issue is becoming very fashionable for celebrities, so comes very fashionable so it may help stamp out hunger."

"We've got a growth in awareness and it's just going to keep growing," said Weaver.

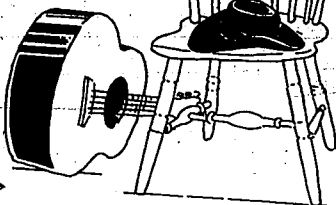

International theater festivals transcend language barriers

If theater's strongest weapon is the word, how can an audience respond to a play in a language it doesn't understand?

It's not an idle question. Chicago and Vancouver are both presenting world theater festivals this spring, with companies coming from as far away as China. How can these troupes make more than eye-contact with American audiences?

Some will perform material that the American audience either knows or is willing to hone up on, like the Suzuki Company of Tokyo's version of "The Trojan Women," opening this week at the Chicago International Theatre Festival.

Both the Halle Municipal Theatre's production of "Ghetto" at the Chicago festival (which is played in Hebrew) and the Peking People's said, but what's in the character's

Theatre production of "Teahouse" at Vancouver's Expo 86 (which is played in Mandarin Chinese) supply program notes. They also supply translated earplugs, so that the listener can tune into an authorized translation from the booth.

Seeing the productions on successive nights—a great help, particularly with "Teahouse," which has a frayed the falling fortunes of a popular Chinese teahouse from 1898 to 1947, the year before the Communist revolution.) Both "Teahouse" and "Ghetto" featured full-hearted performances by actors who knew each other's ways. This wasn't a surprise. We're used to foreign ensembles in business that we field. But it was a surprise that the acting in "Teahouse" had so little of the exotic about it.

One knew that this was the company that had done "Death of a Salesman" under Arthur Miller's direction in Peking. Still, one was expecting something more stylized, more "Chinese." Instead this was a camera-ready picture of a neighborhood restaurant that happened to be in China, but whose atmosphere was universal—the sort of place where the same customers come in every day, trying to cut the same deals.

The opening scene was real and

noisy, with the customers gabbling away and the waitress flying around with a tray of tea. And nothing happened during the course of the play that couldn't have happened in a big-city restaurant. The evening's only frankly theatrical touch was the joker (played by an actor named Tongji Di) who came before the curtain each act to deliver a rhymed spiel in the exact rhythms of a sidewalk rapmaster.

So much for exoticism. Another surprise was the absence of political message. "Teahouse" has one, of course: that this is how it was in China's bad old days, when self-interest and fear ruled everyone's life. But the message is implicit, not stated. Indeed, she's play was prescribed during the Cultural Revolution for being too negative and cynical. (He committed suicide as a result.)

British ballet to tour Israel

LONDON (AP) — The Sadler's Wells Royal Ballet voted Thursday to go ahead with a 10-day tour of Israel, reversing an earlier decision to call off the trip for fear of Arab terrorist attack.

"This has been a victory for common sense and not a victory for terrorism," said Victor Hochhauser, who is organizing the tour by Britain's top dance company with support from the state-financed British council.

On Wednesday, Paul Findlay, assistant director of the company, said the dancers and technical staff will "by a fairly conclusive majority" vote to call off the tour. He said earlier he feared being caught up in terrorist reprisals for the U.S. bombing raid on Libya.

But the next day they met in the northern city of Sheffield and changed their minds by a unanimous vote, Hochhauser said.

"It was explained to them that there was nothing to worry about and they should keep faith with the public," he said.

The company's decision to stay away from Israel had come under sharp criticism.

A pro-Israel member of Parliament, John Carlisle, called it "cowardice." The Board of Deputies of British Jews accused the company of appeasing terrorism. And the London Standard newspaper asked why the dancers were afraid to go to Israel when Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher herself was planning to visit the country in 10 days.

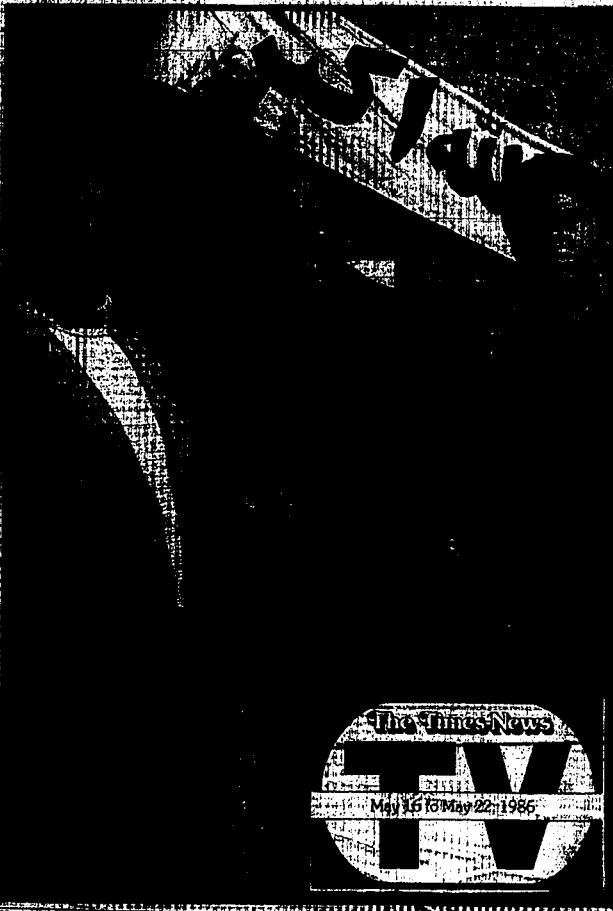

Veteran TV star Richard Crenna brings fervor to a hostage drama

By TONI REINHOLD

From "Our Miss Brooks" to his recent triumph in the TV movie "A Case of Deadly Force," Richard Crenna has brought his special talents to generations of TV viewers and moviegoers.

A diverse, powerful, Emmy Award-winning actor (he won for his masterful performance in "The Rape of Richard Beck"), Crenna began his TV career in the 1950s in "Our Miss Brooks," one of the most popular comedies of the time.

During the next three decades he appeared in "The Real McCoys," "Slattery's People," "All's Fair" and "It Takes Two." His movie credits include "The Flamingo Kid," "Body Heat," "Wall Until Dark" and "The Sand Pebbles." And he made his mark in miniseries such as "Centennial."

This month, he steps into yet another dynamic role in the five-hour, two-part miniseries "On Wings of Eagles," airing May 18 and 19 on NBC.

Based on the best seller of the same title by Ken Follett, Crenna portrays H. Ross Perot, the American multimillionaire who planned the rescue of a pair of his employees from Iran.

"It's the story of two American executives who were captured and held hostage by the Iranian government at the time that Ayatollah Khomeini returned to Iran," explains Crenna.

And seven members of Perot's company volunteered to go over and get them out of jail by whatever means necessary. It's a very exciting five hours. It's got a real-life Rambo and a real 'Rambo' story," says the 58-year-old actor.

Crenna, who also portrayed Colonel Trautman in the highly successful movies "First Blood" and "Rambo," says he has enjoyed the public's response to those films and the new young fans they brought him.

"The response from the younger people is like being in a 'Superman' film," he says. "More important is the older people who have responded to the films."

"The sense of frustration in the world today is epitomized by the impotence we all feel when we get into these situations with hostages on planes and bomb threats and that sort of thing, like the blowing up of the TWA plane outside of Athens."

"I think the 'Rambo' films are a

rather simplified view of a solution to a very complex situation and an audience responds to that. They can sit there and say, 'Wow, wouldn't it be nice if there was a Rambo'...

"Rambo" has become a kind of

catch word for simplified response. I always try to avoid getting into political discussions about the films because they weren't intended to be political. They were intended to be entertainment and I hope they were. I think they were."

Crenna says he read "On Wings of Eagles" before he was offered the miniseries role. "I inquired about the film rights because I wanted to buy this project," he says. "I was literally thinking about the nature of the piece when I was called about playing Perot."

"At this point in my career, I'm playing people I don't resemble at all. I can become a character rather than look like the person. In the case of Perot, I'm playing an attitude."

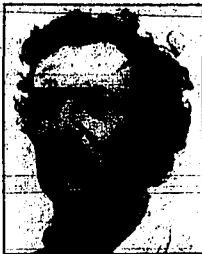

ABC has been working on cutting its budget, after a turnover in management last fall, so the actors are not being flown in. Normally a two-hour trip, this excursion would take at least six hours in the storm.

The cast is in a surprisingly good mood, despite the night before. Shooting on location is a rarity due to soap opera's tight budgets. During the lunch break Robyn Bernard is her consistently friendly self, taking time out from memorizing a revised script to offer an invitation to join her for lunch. She and Kevin will be filming on Pebley Beach that afternoon.

The murderer that only Terry Brock (Robyn) knows is being pursued all the way to Catalina. She and Kevin are having their second honeymoon there, joined by Patrick, Kevin's brother (Guy Mack) as Kevin wants his help in committing Terry to the looney bin. Frisco (Jack Wagner) is also there for reasons unknown at the time, but which should become apparent by air time.

The afternoon's shooting is underway, the winds keep howling and there's a definite nip in the air as Robyn and Kevin stand loaded down with scuba paraphernalia. Guy Mack, who is not in that particular scene, remarks how he likes having doubles as they are always a little slimmer than he, Robyn, a very trim, petite lady, did not have the same luck.

'North & South' gives ABC a win

NEW YORK — "North & South, Book II" placed all five episodes in the Top 10 last week, giving ABC the victory in the war among the networks, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

The show finished its 12-hour run with a 21.3 rating, 33 share, ranking sixth among miniseries this season. The leader was the 12-hour "North & South," which averaged a 26 rating, 38 share last November.

ABC won the week of May 5-11 with a 15.6 rating, NBC, with the top-ranked "Cosby Show" and its follow-up Thursday comedies all reaching the Top 10, averaged a 15.4 rating. CBS, with mostly reruns, placed only "Dallas" in the Top 15 and finished with a 12.4 rating.

Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.2 rating to CBS' 16.4 and ABC's 14.8.

A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television. A share measures the percentage of the TV sets turned on that are tuned to a broadcast.

It was a good week for miniseries. Besides "North & South," NBC's two-part "Deliberate Stranger" concluded last week with an average 20.2 rating, 30 share, placing it eighth among 17 miniseries this season.

"The Cosby Show" ranked first with a 28.3 rating, 49 share, followed by NBC's "Family Ties," Part 4 of "North & South, Book II" and, in a

tie for fourth, Part 6 of "North & South" and NBC's "Cheers." Next came the second part of "The Deliberate Stranger," Part 3 of "North & South," Part 5 of "North & South," NBC's "Night Court" and Part 2 of "North & South."

The "North & South" performance virtually matched ABC's forecast of a 34 share for the six parts, averting any advertiser make-goods, said Marvin Mord, ABC's vice president of marketing and research services. Mord said ABC was confident about the sequel after having sweated out the opening 12 hours of "North & South."

"It was an unusual situation," Mord said. "It was the first time a sequel has followed in the same TV season. If it didn't work, we would have been stuck with 12 hours."

Mord labeled the results "a pretty strong performance," considering the NBC miniseries competition in the first two nights and the other effective programming on the network and pay-cable, including the first broadcast of "Ghostbusters" on HBO.

"The days when miniseries could get 40 shares are behind us," Mord said.

ABC estimated 85 million viewers watched some part of the miniseries.

The book now is closed on "North & South," Mord said, but its author John Jakes, has been signed by ABC to develop an original novel for television, "California Gold," about a generation of characters living in California from the 1870s to World War I.

Venardos joins CBS Evening News

NEW YORK (AP) — The "CBS Evening News," top-rated of the networks' nightly news broadcasts but the only one to lose audience in 1986, has changed executive producers, CBS News announced Friday.

Effective Monday, Lane Venardos, who has held the position for more than two years, becomes executive producer of CBS News' special events unit. Tom Bettag,

senior producer of the "Evening News," becomes the new executive producer of Dan Rather's broadcast.

In his new job, Venardos will report to Joan Richman, vice president of special events.

CBS said coverage of crisis situations is becoming more prevalent and important, necessitating stronger links between CBS' special events reporting and the "Evening News" broadcast.

'North & South' gives ABC a win

NEW YORK — "North & South, Book II" placed all five episodes in the Top 10 last week, giving ABC the victory in the war among the networks, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

The show finished its 12-hour run with a 21.3 rating, 33 share, ranking sixth among miniseries this season. The leader was the 12-hour "North & South," which averaged a 26 rating, 38 share last November.

"ABC won the week of May 5-11 with a 15.6 rating, NBC, with the top-ranked "Cosby Show" and its follow-up Thursday comedies all reaching the Top 10, averaged a 15.4 rating. CBS, with mostly reruns, placed only "Dallas" in the Top 15 and finished with a 12.4 rating.

Season to date, NBC leads with a 17.2 rating to CBS' 16.4 and ABC's 14.8.

A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television. A share measures the percentage of the TV sets turned on that are tuned to a broadcast.

It was a good week for miniseries. Besides "North & South," NBC's two-part "Deliberate Stranger" concluded last week with an average 20.2 rating, 30 share, placing it eighth among 17 miniseries this season.

"The Cosby Show" ranked first with a 28.3 rating, 49 share, followed by NBC's "Family Ties," Part 4 of "North & South, Book II" and, in a

tie for fourth, Part 6 of "North & South" and NBC's "Cheers." Next came the second part of "The Deliberate Stranger," Part 3 of "North & South," Part 5 of "North & South," NBC's "Night Court" and Part 2 of "North & South."

The "North & South" performance virtually matched ABC's forecast of a 34 share for the six parts, averting any advertiser make-goods, said Marvin Mord, ABC's vice president of marketing and research services. Mord said ABC was confident about the sequel after having sweated out the opening 12 hours of "North & South."

"It was an unusual situation," Mord said. "It was the first time a sequel has followed in the same TV season. If it didn't work, we would have been stuck with 12 hours."

Mord labeled the results "a pretty strong performance," considering the NBC miniseries competition the first two nights and the other effective programming on the network and pay-cable, including the first broadcast of "Ghostbusters" on HBO.

"The days when miniseries could get 40 shares are behind us," Mord said.

ABC estimated 85 million viewers watched some part of the miniseries.

The book now is closed on "North & South," Mord said, but its author John Jakes, has been signed by ABC to develop an original novel for television, "California Gold," about a generation of characters living in California from the 1870s to World War I.

Venardos joins CBS Evening News

NEW YORK (AP) — The "CBS Evening News," top-rated of the networks' nightly news broadcasts but the only one to lose audience in 1986, has changed executive producers, CBS News announced Friday.

Effective Monday, Lane Venardos, who has held the position for more than two years, becomes executive producer of CBS News' special events unit. Tom Bettag,

senior producer of the "Evening News," becomes the new executive producer of Dan Rafter's broadcast.

In his new job, Venardos will report to Joan Richman, vice president of special events.

CBS said coverage of crisis situations is becoming more prevalent and important, necessitating stronger links between CBS' special events reporting and the "Evening News" broadcast.

Travanti bored; will quit the 'Hill' to pursue Broadway stage roles

MADISON, Wis. (AP) — Daniel J. Travanti, star of the award-winning television series "Hill Street Blues," says he wants new acting challenges and will leave the series at the end of next season.

"I am grateful for the role," said Travanti, who has played the stalwart Capt. Frank Furillo since the show debuted in January 1981. "It is regular, predictable work for a lot of money... I have much more to offer: I will be on Broadway and the London stage. Count on it."

Travanti, son of a Kenosha factory worker, said Friday that he had told

the show's producer, MTM Enterprises, that he had grown tired of the part and wants to perform in films and the theater. He said he would leave the series at the end of filming for the 1986-87 season.

Travanti, 46, is a 1961 graduate of the University of Wisconsin, where he was a member of Phi Beta Kappa national honorary society.

He was back on campus Saturday to receive a Distinguished Service Award at Alumni Weekend ceremonies.

Travanti said he was unimpressed with most television programs.

"It's rotten, it's crummy," he said. "'Dynasty' and 'Dallas' are the most popular shows on earth. How do you explain that?"

"I guess we are mediocre creatures," he said. "The rare and wonderful are appreciated by the few. Beethoven, Picasso and 'Hill Street Blues.'"

Travanti said his father spent his life working in the American Motors Co. assembly plant at Kenosha.

"He was a wonderful, darling man," Travanti said. "But I always wanted to be an actor. I wanted something beyond Wisconsin."

CBS, looking for winning combo making major prime time shifts

NEW YORK — CBS, which didn't have a single hit show with children and teen-agers this season, began its quest for the youth vote Wednesday by announcing a 1986-87 schedule that changes programming in the first hour of prime time on six nights of the week.

CBS had no half-hour sitcoms at 8 p.m. Eastern time last September, but will have two next fall — "Kate & Allie," which moves from 9 o'clock, and "Together We Stand," a new series starring Elliott Gould and Dee Wallace Stone as a couple who adopt an Asian-American teenage boy and a black 6-year-old girl.

The only night in which CBS hasn't revamped its leadoff series is Sunday, where the network dominated this year and will stand pat with "60 Minutes," followed by "Murder, She Wrote" and the "CBS Sunday Night Movies."

Next fall, CBS will introduce four half-hour comedies and three one-hour dramas, totalling 5½ new hours. The most recognizable names in new series are Gould and Pam Dawber, who starred in "Mork & Mindy."

Mary Tyler Moore, whose "Mary" series failed as midseason replacement, will be cast in a different series, but it wasn't given an im-



mediate spot on CBS' lineup.

Also returning is Stacy Keach as the hard-boiled private eye on "Mickey Spillane's Mike Hammer." The series stopped production in 1984-85 when Keach was imprisoned in London for smuggling cocaine. CBS ran "Mike Hammer" reruns this spring.

CBS will return 16 shows, but in its effort to rebound from a second-place finish after six consecutive winning campaigns, it will move 10 veteran series to new time slots.

"You need familiar products as building blocks. You can't have too much new product," said David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research. "The track record is not good when you introduce six to seven new hours."

Wounded by NBC's blockbuster performer, "The Cosby Show," "Magnum, P.I." puts up the white flag and shifts to Wednesday, preceded by two new sitcoms, Gould's "Together We Stand" and "Better Days," about a boy from Beverly Hills who moves to Brooklyn to live with his grandfather.

"Tom Selleck is still scoring well in our character analysis research," Poltrack said. "We think 'Magnum' can build audiences when it comes out of the 'Cosby' shadow."

Another move involved "The Twilight Zone," which many considered too scary for children in its 8 p.m. Friday time slot. Next season, it will be on at 10 on Saturday.

The longest-running CBS series to be dropped was "Trapper John, M.D.," which ran for seven seasons. The network also canceled "Alewolf" and "Crazy Like a Fox" after two seasons.

CBS, which didn't have a single hit among its 1985-86 freshman class, canceled "Charlie & Co.," "Stir Crazy" and "George Burns Comedy Week." "The Equalizer" and "The Twilight Zone" are returning, despite low ratings.

Rivers/Carson feud going strong

NEW YORK — The late-night feud between Joan Rivers and Johnny Carson apparently continued Monday as she canceled her scheduled appearance on NBC's "Late Night With David Letterman," a program co-produced by Carson's own production company.

"She's just not feeling funny these days," her agent, Richard Grant, said Monday.

Grant said Miss Rivers spoke to Letterman, and they agreed that she'd come on his program in the fall, which would be after she started her own show, "The Late Show Starring Joan Rivers."

Grant said when the Letterman commitment was made, the subject was going to be Miss Rivers' new book, "Enter Talking," but that was before the announcement of her own show and the consequent controversy.

"We are very sorry that Joan Rivers has canceled her appearance on 'Late Night,' and hope we can reset the booking soon," Barry Sand, producer of Letterman's show, said in a statement.

Miss Rivers still will be sole guest on the syndicated "Donahue" talk show Tuesday morning, Grant said. The difference was that was a talk show, not a comedy show.

Her appearance on NBC's "Today" appeared to be on NBC's "Today"

and ABC's "Good Morning America" on Monday, Miss Rivers talked about "Enter Talking" and the ill feeling with Carson. The rift stems from the announcement last week that she would host her own daily program that would compete, in part, with Carson's "Tonight Show" on NBC.

Miss Rivers said she tried to reach Carson, who gave her her break in TV, before the announcement of her show. But Carson hung up on her, Miss Rivers said.

Carson reportedly was miffed that Miss Rivers had not alerted him about the new job before he found about it from the press. "Johnny just feels it's a rather shabby way of

doing business," said Richard Mahoney, Carson's spokesman.

Since 1983, Miss Rivers has been the only substitute host of "The Tonight Show." She said her ratings were higher than Carson's, when, in fact, original Carson episodes, excluding repeats, had higher ratings than Miss Rivers' appearances.

Miss Rivers had two weeks remaining on her contract that lapsed July 17, but NBC will replace her for those two summertime slots.

On "Today," Rivers said she decided to jump to the new program, on the fledgling Fox Broadcasting Network, because Carson had a contract for two years and she was given just one.

ABC risks little by canning old series; comedies top 9 new efforts

NEW YORK → ABC, third in the prime-time ratings the past two seasons, announced Monday nine new series for the 1985-86 season, ranging from Lucille Ball's return to weekly comedy to re-creations of recent history from ABC News.

The new programs include four comedies, two dramas and the news division's "Our World," which will give ABC News two-thirds of the Thursday night lineup. "The Colbys," a soap opera, will be in between "Our World" and ABC's long-running news magazine "20/20."

In attempting to rebound from the ratings cellar, ABC cut several veteran series, including "The Love Boat" after nine seasons, "Benson" after seven seasons, and "Different Strokes" after eight, the first seven on NBC.

Other canceled series include "The Fall Guy," "Harcastle & McCormick," "Our Family Honor," "Lady Blue," "The Insiders," "Hollywood Beat" and "Ripley's Believe It or Not."

Two of ABC's midseason replacements, the comedy "Perfect Strangers," and "The Disney Sunday Movie," will return next season. All other substitute series were dropped, including "The Red Fox Show," "He's the Mayor," "Mr. Sunshine," "Joe Bash," "Fortune Dane" and "Shadow Chasers."

ABC made changes on every night of the week except Sunday, where "Disney" and the "ABC Sunday Night Movie" remain. On Monday, "MacGyver" will move from its Wednesday slot and lead into "Monday Night Football."

New shows appear every other night, particularly on Friday and Saturday — ABC's weakest nights. On Saturday, Miss Ball and Oscar-winner Ellen Burstyn star in their own sitcoms.

Miss Ball, who will be 75 in August, returns to series TV in the comedy "Life With Lucy." She'll be reunited with her old co-star Gale Gordon from "The Lucy Show" that was on CBS from 1962-74. They'll be partners in a hardware business, while, on the home front, Miss Ball lives with her children and grandchildren.

Miss Burstyn also stars in a multi-generational comedy in "The Ellen Burstyn Show," she plays a college professor who shares a Baltimore brownstone with her mother, divorced daughter and grandson.

ABC's other Saturday shows are "Cold Steel and Neon," a drama starring Robert Desiderio as a widowed detective juggling his career and raising his two young children, and "Spenser: For Hire," a low-rated but back for a second season.

On Friday, ABC will have four comedies — the returning

"Webster" and "Mr. Belvedere" — and the new "The Last Electric Knight" and "Sledge Hammer." "The Last Electric Knight" stars Gil Gerard as a detective who becomes guardian to a karate expert (Ernie Reyes Jr.) "Sledge Hammer" starring David Rasche in a spoof of movie macho men.

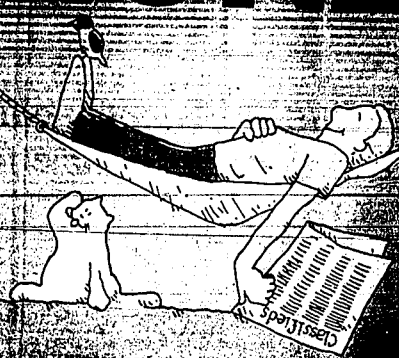
The final Friday hour will have "Starman," featuring Robert Hays as an alien who returns to Earth to raise the orphaned son he fathered 14 years earlier.

Tuesday night, which ABC dominated last season, returns the popular "Who's the Boss?," "Growing Pains" and "Moonlighting," followed by the new drama, "Our Kind of Town," about a professional couple played by Shelley Hack and Tom Mason.

"Perfect Strangers" begins Wednesday night and leads into the comedy "Head of the Class," starring Howard Hesseman ("WKRP in Cincinnati") as a teacher of gifted students who know little about real life. Next comes ABC's high-rated "Dynasty" and "Hotel."

"Our World" is the new program which Capital Cities, the new owners of ABC, asked ABC News to create to run against NBC's top-ranked "The Cosby Show." A news program is cheaper to produce than entertainment series, and it might appeal to viewers not regularly watching "The Cosby Show."
