House passes trade restraint bill

WASHINGTON — The House passed legislation Thursday (ending the major import restraints. Despite President Reagan's warning that burgeoning protectionism at home will launch new trade wars overseas. The 285-113 vote in favor of a 450-page measure, that Reagan designated as "energy and rankly political" set in an election-year battle with the Republican-dominated Senate. Fifty-nine House Republicans voted for the bill, while only four Democrats voted against it.

Just a short time before the vote, Reagan told the American Retail Federation that "economic growth in America and around the world would be hampered if the independence of our markets is threatened by the passage of an A-1 candidate for the president to retaliate — primarily with goods and tariffs — against countries that are independent of international trade. Commerce officials are engaged in unfair trading practices against U.S. sales abroad. That would remove much of the discretion and

negotiating flexibility the president now has on trade cases. Although the Reagan administration and members of Congress agree that something must be done to ease America's huge trade deficit with other nations — it has nearly \$150 billion last year — there have been fierce arguments on how best to get the job done. Several hours after the vote, Speaker (Rep.) Carl Albert (R-Idaho) said the bill "is a major step in the right direction. It is a bill that would help to bring about a balance of trade with other nations. The House of Representatives has passed the bill to help the American people.

Reagan has favored working quietly with U.S. allies and trading partners to coax a wider opening in world markets for U.S. products and services, while many lawmakers have insisted that only retaliatory measures will work. Smack in the middle of the debate are a wide array of lobbyists for business, farm-

ers, labor unions and others, with their own conflicting views. "Dozens of House Republicans have come under pressure over the loss of jobs in their districts — layoffs often attributed to foreign trade competition. The measure approved Thursday goes to the Senate, where it faces a mixed reception. "The vote came after a three-day debate on the measure, which sponsors said was needed to counter the record trade deficit last year and resulting layoffs. It calls for retaliation against unfair trade practices by foreign competitors and would require import curbs for threatened industries. The measure also contains provisions

to roll back Japanese trade surpluses in the U.S. market at a rate of 10 percent a year. Critics claimed that would bring retaliation against U.S. farm exports. "If you think farmers have it hard today, just wait until they see what it would be like under protectionist trade law that we have in this country," said House Minority Leader Robert H. Michel, R-Ind. "This isn't a protectionist bill. Majority Leader (Jim Wright, D-Texas) said. "It is an anti-protectionist bill." He called it a remedy for "the trade cancer" that is eating at the vital organs of the economy. The measure also contains provisions

Siege worried man in Burley

Grandchildren were hostages

BURLEY — The grandfather and several other area relatives of two Cobleville, Wyo., youngsters who survived the bombing of six elementary school there last Friday say they are worried about the whereabouts of the children. The youngsters were held hostage in the school. Wounding community where his son and daughter-in-law reside. The report said that many were injured in the homemade bomb explosion in the school he knew his grandson and granddaughter attended. David Young and his wife, Doris, formerly of Cokeville, own the grade school in the town of 250 persons last Friday with guns and explosives. They took the children and faculty hostage and demanded \$300 million in ransom. Both died when the bomb Mrs. Young was holding exploded and her husband then shot himself in the chest. "Whitby says his son, Michael, and daughter-in-law, Sharon Whitby have been frequent visitors to Burley and are known in this area, although they did not attend school or live in Burley.

"We knew the grandchildren were in that school," Whitby said. "I tried for five or six hours to get a call through to Cokeville, but the lines were all busy. Finally one of Mike's sisters (a daughter of the Burley man who lives in Utah, was able to reach them and they called me. Another Burley area relative, Norma Moyle, said she tried for 12 hours to get a call through to the school. She said Thursday that latest word from the family is that the kids are all still alive in custody of the "bitch" and that the other children in the community live back in school a few hours each day. "Whitby said after six hours he usually learned that the children were burned in the hospital and were not severely injured. "It was good news. We are all thankful. It could have been a lot worse," he added. Sharon Whitby told The Times-News by telephone this week that she believes the couple who took over the elementary school last Friday, holding the children and staff hostage, never intended that the parents would see their children again. She said there were chains in the room and a much larger bomb.

White House faces test over Contadora

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration soon may be put to the test on whether it can accept a Central American peace agreement that allows the leftist Sandinista government to stay in power in Nicaragua. A peace agreement is tentatively scheduled to be signed June 6 by the five Central American countries of Nicaragua, El Salvador, Guatemala, Costa Rica and Honduras. A major aim of the accord is to stop U.S. aid to the Contra guerrillas in exchange for internal reforms and improved international behavior by the Sandinistas. Nicaraguans have said it would sign but expectations are running high that it will. The administration is seriously divided on how to respond, with one faction — at the State

Habit backer — A5 Analysis Department — favoring a peace accord, and the other — based at the Pentagon — insisting the agreement would be so flawed U.S. troops eventually would have to intervene to enforce it. The administration has always said it supports the 2-year-old attempt by the so-called Contadora group of nations to forge a peace accord. At the same time, it has made clear it also wants the Sandinistas replaced by a democratic government. But officials have always known it is doubtful they could achieve both aims through Contadora. The Sandinistas are exact partners with the

often Central American nations, and no one expects them to sign a document that would condemn their jobs. The U.S. strategy has been to create and support the anti-government Contra insurgency, whose aim has been to create enough havoc to force the Sandinistas to negotiate directly with the Contras on a new and democratic government. But the Contras have fallen far short of what Washington hoped they would achieve, and in the meantime the Contadora negotiations are nearing completion. Both opponents and proponents of an accord are in agreement that once it is signed, Congress would refuse to vote any more aid to the Contras — at least until the agreement had a chance to work. Reagan still has an annual request of \$100 million

Those are among the chants, but whether everyone will show up is the biggest question facing "Hands Across America," the coast-to-coast linkup sponsored by USA for Africa, which hopes to raise \$100 million for the homeless and the hungry. "This won't be strictly a palm Sunday, with penguin wings possibly getting into the act too, along with a host of other activities attracted by the year's biggest photo opportunity. Organizers were at work Thursday to close some of the remaining gaps in the line. Although

it appeared there would be gaps in California, New Mexico, Arizona and Texas, USA for Africa president Ken Krage said Thursday that he hadn't entirely given up on a coast-to-coast linkup of nearly 6 million people. "The organization's toll-free telephones have been swamped, Krage said in New York. "We've been talking people. 'Just come to the line.' " Indiana was still looking for 120,000 people on Thursday to complete its 640,000-hands line, which extends 323 miles. Miriam Alexander, national spokeswoman for Hands Across America, said Wednesday that at least 2 million people had signed up, pledging \$10 each to the cause. Symms most active of Idahoans on speechmaking circuit

BOISE (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms, who this year is busy making speeches in a re-election bid, spent a lot of time making speeches for money.

Personal financial disclosure reports were filed with the secretary of state's office here on Thursday.

They showed Symms, who is running for his second U.S. Senate seat against Democrat John Evans this

year, last year made about \$43,000 giving about 30 speeches.

In addition to his Senate salary of \$75,100, 1985, Senate rules allowed Symms to keep 30 percent more from speeches, or \$22,530, Symms said he donated the rest, \$20,770, to charity.

Sen. James McClure came in just under the limit. He reported receiving \$22,100, \$430 under the limit, giving

17 speeches for up to \$2,000 each.

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, reported getting \$1,000 from the American Mining Congress for an October speech. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, did not report any speech income for 1985.

Mel Richardson, one of five candidates for the Republican 2nd District congressional nomination, filed his personal disclosure report.

It showed his main source of income in 1985 was \$36,444 from KID Radio, Inc., Idaho Falls, with 1986 income to date of \$112,221.

Symms also reported other sources of income, such as a net gain of \$10,110 in commodities transactions, dealing in such markets as soybeans, cattle and silver futures.

Symms listed \$10,331 in directors fees, consulting fees and partnership

income from the family-owned Craig Ranches, Inc., in Canyon County. He showed gross rent of \$14,907 from property at Caldwell and about \$1,000 income from bank interest, stock dividends and a capital gain.

McClure reported minor amounts of income from various bank accounts and rent from Lewis County property.

Richardson reported a small amount of income from Utah Power and Light stock; rental income from two condominiums and other property and a capital gain of under \$2,500.

Craig reported holding stock valued at between \$50,000 and

\$100,000 in the family-owned Craig Ranches, Inc., in Midvale.

Among campaign finance reports filed at the secretary of state's office was one from the Senate of President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise. Risch reported he has received contributions this year and in 1985 of \$11,904.

Democrat Larry La Rocco, Boise, who is running against Risch, reported \$10,032, giving the two candidates both in excess of the primary, nearly \$22,000 between them.

Shawn de Loyola, a Democrat running for the state treasurer nomination, listed contributions of \$5,280 and a cash balance of \$256.

Philip Habib, Reagan's special Central American envoy who has embraced the Contadora approach, pledged in an April 11 letter that the United States would cut off aid when the peace agreement is signed.

This has angered conservatives, one of whom, Rep. Jack Kemp, R-N.Y., asked Reagan to fire Habib.

"We must never give in until the people of Nicaragua can live in the full sunlight of freedom and democracy."

Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., chairman of the House Intelligence Committee who opposes aid to the Contras, said at a news conference that the issue that has always delayed a negotiated settlement in Central America is whether the Sandinistas should be allowed to remain in power or "Stay Uncle" as Reagan once said.

Hamilton said an overall settlement becomes possible that will address everyone's needs if the administration will agree to cease its efforts to drive the Sandinistas from power. He said the Contra insurgency has clearly failed and it is time for the administration to take the chance that the Sandinistas will live up to their commitments.

While the agreement commits the Sandinistas to free and fair elections as part of a process of national reconciliation, nobody in the administration or the Congress believes the Sandinistas would allow elections so free that they risked being voted out of power.

Hofmann faces trial for murder

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon documents dealer Mark Hofmann was ordered Thursday to stand trial for a pair of pipe-bomb murders and on charges that he defrauded his church and others by selling them forged historical documents.

Fifth Circuit Judge Paul Grant ruled there was sufficient evidence against Hofmann to bind him over to district court for trial on two counts of first-degree murder and 20 counts of theft by deception and bomb making.

Even if it doesn't specifically endorse it.

Best of this year's plunges in oil prices, economists do not expect the Consumer Price Index used to determine cost-of-living increases to rise above 2 percent.

In fact, figures released Wednesday showing the price index at a minus 2.3 percent annual rate so far this year make it virtually certain that no cost-of-living increases will be given next January unless the law

is changed.

Of the first four months of 1986, consumer prices increased only in January, yielding the sharpest three-month price nosedive in 37 years.

A 1972 law provides for cost-of-living adjustments in Social Security retirement benefits whenever the inflation rate is 3 percent or more.

If inflation falls below 3 percent, the increase is delayed until it does rise above that level — even if it takes several years to do so.

For the increases to be awarded, the Consumer Price Index must rise by at least 3 percent from September 1985 to September 1986.

Social Security beneficiaries have received a raise every year since the law was enacted — 3.1 percent this year — although in 1982, Congress had to vote to waive the trigger when inflation dipped below 3 percent.

In this election year, the same action is widely anticipated on Capitol Hill.

outside the classroom door than the one she employed in the room.

"It looks like I wanted to chain the children inside. We were told later that if the larger explosive had gone off they would probably all have been killed," she added.

Mrs. Whitby said the whole town is still feeling the shock from the incident and it will probably remain for some time to come.

"I just came home from (a nearby town) and Mike was already home," she recalled of the day of the explosion. "He told me the two children were in the school and were being held hostage. I hadn't heard about it and could hardly believe what he was saying. You don't expect anything like this to happen to you, and especially not in a small town like this," she said.

"We have two babies and I rushed them to a friend's house. Just as I was leaving there, I heard screams and yelling and I knew it (the bomb) had exploded," she said.

Cokeville has no hospital, so the injured and frightened children were taken to a hospital in Montpelier, 30 miles away. Ambulances from three surrounding towns were standing by when the explosion occurred.

"Some of the parents, like us, took children in our own cars," she added.

The Whitby children suffered burns, but were less seriously burned than 60-year-old Andy who was treated for burns of the face, ears and arm and released later the same day. Amy came home Monday with a severe burn on the back of the neck and other burns about the face, hands and the back of her legs.

"But she's going to be all right. They both are," said the much-relieved mother.

Mrs. Whitby said she, like many other parents in Cokeville, believe the psychological effects on their children are still to come. Parents and school administrators are concerned about what kinds of fears and inhibitions their children may develop, she said.

Youths put into state custody

CALDWELL (AP) — The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare was seeking temporary foster homes for 11 students at a remote Owyhee County school for troubled boys Thursday night after a district judge issued an order placing them in state custody, authorities said.

Third District Judge Edward Lodge issued the order after the Rev. Don Elliott, executive director of Deliverance Ranch Academy, left the Indian Meadows school with his charges about 7 a.m. Thursday, Owyhee County Prosecutor Clayton Andersen said.

The boys were at the Health and Welfare office in Caldwell Thursday

night, and their parents were being contacted. The state planned to turn the youths over to their parents as soon as possible, said Perry Ackerman, Health and Welfare's special services coordinator for child care licensing and adult protection.

Dale Stilwell, an impartial observer assigned to oversee operations at the hospital Church-affiliated boarding school, reported to Andersen and Owyhee County Sheriff Tim Nettleton Thursday morning that Elliott and the boys had packed food and bedrolls and left, Andersen said.

Elliott would not tell Stilwell where they were going, but said they would

return in three days, the prosecutor said.

Lodge issued a temporary restraining order against Elliott taking the boys out of Idaho. Nettleton served Elliott with the order in Burns, Ore., about 10 a.m., and he returned with the boys to Caldwell on his own, Andersen said.

No charges would be filed, he said.

Court says Texas firm part of suit

BOISE (AP) — Texas-based Gulf Resources Corp. must be part of an Idaho lawsuit filed against a former Gulf subsidiary, seeking damages and cleanup costs because of a century of pollution by the Bunker Hill mining complex, a federal judge here has ruled.

U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan on Thursday dismissed Gulf Resources' attempt to get out of a lawsuit filed by the state under the Superfund Act.

The state is seeking cleanup costs and up to \$50 million damages for what it describes as substantial environmental damage caused by the Bunker Hill mining, smelting and refining operation at Kellogg.

Gulf Resources purchased Bunker Hill in 1963 and operated the lead-silver-zinc mine until 1982. The complex was sold to a group of Idaho investors, but has never reopened.

Prosecutor probes low gas price

REXBURG (AP) — Only weeks after pressure from Attorney General Jim Jones drove gasoline prices begin falling across Idaho, the Madison County Prosecutor's office has reopened an investigation into the possibility that prices are unlawfully low.

The renewed inquiry was prompted by complaints from several gasoline dealers in the county that some their competitors are violating the state Unfair Sales Act that requires retailers to sell products at a percent to 8 percent above the wholesale cost plus transportation

An earlier investigation found no evidence to substantiate the allegation, the letters said.

But letters sent to four dealers said complaints have surfaced about their pricing practices, and the company's were given until next week to submit copies of their invoices from gasoline suppliers along with certified statements of transportation costs.

The dealers involved were Horkley Oil, Maverick Country Store, V-1 Oil and Circle K.

"If you do not comply, we will ask the Idaho Attorney General's Office

to conduct a full-scale investigation," the letters said.

Horkley Oil owner Jim Horkley said he and the other dealers are considering legal action of their own in response.

"If I need to sell gas at 72.9 cents, I'm going to do it to stay competitive within the law," Horkley said. "A thousand and one things are involved in making gas business go."

Dealing with House disappointment

No endorsement given in Scott-Black race

In House seat 23A, Twin Falls County, we are disappointed with Rep. Donna Scott, who we think has done a less-than-adequate job in representing Twin Falls County constituents.

In her past campaigns, Scott claimed how independent she would be. But her votes have fallen down the line with House Speaker T.W. Silvers, despite the sometimes-opposite interests of her constituents. Examples:

• Scott carried bills to limit CSI funding while a broad, state-wide pork barrel bill was going through. How can CSI, which serves the entire Magic Valley as well as Twin Falls County, be benefited from that?

• She has sponsored legislation to make the political selection process less open, not more, by restricting selection to delegates at conventions and dropping the open primary system. This was a Republican Party "boss" bill which ignored both the people and (yes, there are some) Democrats.

• On economic development, she has a "hunker down" attitude, saying that private enterprise alone can revitalize Idaho's economy and that no improvements can be made in state support for education and attracting new industry until that happens.

She has followed the narrow, private agenda of an out-of-state group, The American Legislative Exchange Council, which would dismantle state and local government.

Scott is a hard worker; from time to time, she has been a good listener. Perhaps she will be again. But that doesn't seem to be how she is responding to her constituency today.

Unfortunately, her opponent in this contest does not offer as strong an alternative as we would like.

Day-care businessman Ronald Black began as a one-issue candidate against Scott's lack of support for state-wide day care licensing. He has since broadened his attack, but he hasn't seemed to catch hold with the voters and his command of the issues seems weak.

The race, in our view, is one in which neither candidate seems to represent the broad objectives shared by Magic Valley citizens. We can't endorse either.

Support goes to Kinsey in flatorial seat quest

How the tunes have changed. Now that election time is upon us, local incumbent legislators are rapidly proclaiming how "pro-education and moderate" they are.

But in the case of Rep. Jerry Callen of Jerome, the new tolerance for a moderate perspective has a hollow ring. In the last legislative session, Callen sponsored numerous bills, virtually all of which would set Idaho education back.

He claims to represent the entire eight-county Magic Valley in his flatorial seat. But in fact, his voting record in his first term shows that his primary constituency has been ideological, special interest groups which want to dismantle public education and fundamentalist groups which want to restrict what our children read and think.

When Callen first ran for the Legislature, we supported him, believing he would be a responsible conservative who would listen to views different from his own. We and many others have been disappointed. This is a seat in which a change is needed.

Callen's opponent in the primary election is Jerome pharmacist Robin Kinsey whose roots in this valley go back more than 100 years. Kinsey is an articulate moderate on educational issues. He is a strong believer in an educated citizenry and he would support adequate funding for public instruction.

On economic development, he has an imaginative idea to help stimulate Idaho's local economy by giving a 5 percent bid differential to Idaho companies on public projects.

Most importantly, he has no ideological agenda.

He says he will "keep an open door and an open mind to discuss any and all issues with any and all people of District 25 — not just those I know already agree with me."

The flatorial seat is to represent the entire Magic Valley.

We think Robin Kinsey would do a better job in accomplishing that objective than Callen and we support his selection in the Republican primary.

Taxing district not answer for hospital

As a property taxpayer in Gooding County I am very concerned about the proposed hospital taxing district.

I will agree that there is a limited need for our county hospital to remain in operation, but should not be given an open checkbook. Using the figures put out by district supporters, property taxpayers will pay an additional subsidy of \$150,000 for the operation of the hospital. This will add about \$90 to my tax bill, based on last year's property evaluation as the county assessor has not issued the new values.

I do not feel that the Gooding Memorial Hospital can justify or afford all of the equipment needed for medical treatment today. Many of the requests that would use the hospital will require treatment elsewhere with or without a local hospital.

Due to a recent injury, I was recently sent to Twin Falls for physical therapy treatment because the program in Gooding was filled since it has many open beds.

If the hospital has approximately 70 employees, it should already be able to adjust quickly to meet the varying needs of the people in the community. If it cannot do this, I question whether a taxing district can justify it.

As I view the hospital, it should maintain an emergency room, basic equipment to stabilize patients for transfer, the helicopter port, x-ray and possibly some of the basic lab work, beds for five to a maximum of 10 patients and provide physical therapy treatment as needed.

This would make the hospital more of an emergency clinic and a place for limited care to fill our county's needs.

I feel that there is nothing wrong with continuing the practice of bringing in some specialists that are needed by the community as long as it remains cost effective to the hospital and the patients.

I do not feel that the taxing district is the answer as I envision subsequent yearly increases becoming necessary to subsidize its operation. Currently the supporters even admit that more money is needed for the long term.

Open letter to Rep. Robert J. Mrazek, D-N.Y.:

The official, however, did suggest that Habib may have been legitimate, verifiable peace treaty, despite the setting of a tentative June 8 date.

Four of the United States' closest friends in the region, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras and Costa Rica, are "hanging together on this and being very tough," the official said, expressing confidence there would be "no treaty if it didn't contain the four things we wanted."

The four announced elements include removal of all Soviet bloc and Cuban military personnel from Nicaragua and an end to Nicaraguan military cooperation with communist countries, reduction of Nicaragua's own military forces, free elections and an end to Nicaraguan support of leftist guerrillas in El Salvador or elsewhere.

Presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said Thursday the administration would "bomby" with "U.S. objectives is agreed upon but at the same time "the United States would insist — and let me underscore insist — upon verification, effective verification."

In a letter he gave to White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan on Thursday, Kemp told Regan that Habib is promoting an agreement that would be quickly violated by

Nicaragua's leftist government while resulting in a sell-out of the U.S.-backed Contra rebels.

"I remember your firm statement to me that you would never abandon the Contras," said Kemp, a New York Republican considered a likely candidate for the GOP presidential nomination in 1988.

"Now some within our own State Department, with misplaced faith in the omnipotence of diplomacy, would have us walk away from the democratic resistance for the sake of promises of an unenforceable treaty," Kemp said.

Both the White House and State Department quickly came to Habib's defense, and the senior White House official insisted the envoy was representing the president when he "was trying to get a deal" leading to peace in the troubled Central American region.

Navy bomber crash kills 3

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — A Navy jet bomber crashed into a field Thursday, killing the two crewmen aboard and a woman whose station wagon was hit by the flaming wreckage as it skidded across a road, officials said.

The A-6E Intruder went down about a mile from a runway at the Oceana Naval Air Station as it began a flight to Puerto Rico to join the aircraft carrier USS John F. Kennedy, said Cmdr. Jolene Keefe of the Atlantic Fleet Naval Air Force in Norfolk.

The Navy identified the crewmen as Lt. James P. Hoban, 26, of Riverside, N.J., the pilot, and Lt. Michael F. Wilson, 27, of Medford Lakes, N.J., the navigator.

Nation

Shuttle need stressed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's new space chief said Thursday he expects President Reagan to find the money to replace the space shuttle Challenger and said if he falls to, America's science and its economy will suffer dire consequences.

"We need a fourth orbiter right away, as soon as we can build it," said James C. Fletcher in his first interview as the new administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration. "A three-orbiter fleet is just a very marginal kind of fleet. If something should happen to that third orbiter we would really be in deep yogurt."

Later Thursday, a senior White House official, speaking on condition he not be identified, said he expects Reagan to restore the fleet to four shuttles. But he said before a final commitment is made, White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan wants further word on how much money would be needed beyond that already appropriated by Congress.

"Chances are — yes, we will go for a fourth orbiter," the White House official said, "but in the meantime, we have a lot of questions to ask that have been asked, and we have answers that are due."

Mourners remember climbers

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — More than 1,500 mourners crowded an Episcopal church and a nearby building Thursday to remember seven teen-agers and two adults who died last week in Mount Hood's worst climbing accident.

"With gentle hearts, let us say goodbye to our friends," the Rev. Malcolm H. Manson, headmaster of Oregon Episcopal School, said at the memorial service.

The climbers died when a storm engulfed the 11,235-foot peak. They were on an outing sponsored by the school as part of a program to teach, among other things, respect for the wilderness.

Four members of the climbing party survived. Two hiked off the mountain seeking help for their companions, and two others were found alive May 15, four days after the ordeal began, in a snow cave high on the mountain.

The Trinity Episcopal Church congregation included most of the school's 372 students and 110 faculty and staff members, the families of the dead and survivors, members of the rescue party, and others. At least 500 people watched on closed-circuit television at the nearby Northwest Service Center, and a Portland television station, carried the 1 1/2-hour service live.

Brinton Clark of Portland, one of the two 16-year-olds who survived in the snow cave, watched the service with her, psychologist in her Emanuel Hospital room, a hospital spokeswoman said.

Giles Thompson of Longview, Wash., whose legs were amputated below the knees, remained in serious condition at Providence Medical Center and was unable to watch the service.

New airline baggage rule brought out

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Transportation Department proposed new rules Thursday aimed at making it easier for airlines to control the flow of carry-on luggage, but backed off from a proposal that would have limited the number and size of bags on board.

Secretary Elizabeth Dole said the regulation, which must still go through a formal rulemaking procedure, would "prevent the abuses" currently widespread among airlines, of people taking too many bags into jetliner cabins.

Under the proposed regulation announced Thursday, airlines must establish a "check-in" area outside the aircraft — probably near the boarding gate — and assign ground personnel to assure that carry-on baggage is limited to the amount that can be safely put away in the cabin.

The specific requirements may be "tailored" to fit different aircraft with different storage capacity, as well as different airlines and travel conditions, the FAA said. Each airline's program must be approved by the agency.

U.S. expels pair of Nicaraguans

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department has ordered the expulsion of two Nicaraguan diplomats following Sandinista arrests last month ago that four American envoys in Managua had engaged in spy activities, it was announced Thursday.

The Nicaraguan Embassy denounced as "manifestly unjust" the expulsions of William Vigil, a political counselor, and Miriam Hooker, a first secretary.

A Nicaraguan Embassy spokeswoman, Sarah Porta, said Vigil and Ms. Hooker plan to return to Managua today, which is the deadline the State Department set for their departure.

Late frost nips fruit harvests

TWIN FALLS — Magic Valley fruit growers are anticipating a bleak season and it could mean consumers will see higher prices for canning peaches and apples this fall.

Early budding of trees due to unseasonal high temperatures in March, followed by frost during April and early May, have wiped out apricot production and cut some other fruits 30, 40 or even 50 percent, say crop specialists and growers.

Operators of canyon orchards, always more protected and usually enjoying a few degrees higher temperatures, expect to have some fruit.

Many of the fruit growers and home gardeners above the Snake River Canyon are either wiped out or expect very limited crops, says Bill Hazen, Twin Falls County agricultural agent.

William Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly said the unusual weather pattern began to November and December with extremely cold weather, followed by near-normal conditions in January for both temperatures and precipitation. The dormant season for fruit ended in February, when temperatures averaged a degree above normal and precipitation totaled 3.9 inches, which was 3.25 inches above average.

"Then in March we had some very warm weather. It averaged out at 6.6 degrees above normal for the month, and the trees started budding," Galkin said.

April was 1.8 degrees below normal, with some heavy frosts. The Twin Falls temperature dropped to 24 degrees on April 30, Galkin said, and there were two readings of 26-28 degrees after that.

Hazen said there is normally some damage in this area to apricots, an early fruit, but this year the crop is considered a total loss.

"We were pretty concerned in March when we had all of those nice warm days and the trees began budding. We knew this could very well happen, and it did," Hazen said.

Another major problem, Hazen said, is with apples. Home gardeners with a few trees are not apt to have any apples and commercial growers may have some spotty production, he explained.

"Any apple trees that are not well protected probably have heavy damage. We always have to thin them out some, but I was at a place a few days ago where the only apples on the trees were on branches back under the eaves of the house," he said. "When it gets down to 24 and 25 degrees, it takes a lot of protection."

Hazen said that with only about 1,500 acres of commercial orchards in Twin Falls County, most of the fruit fresh sold in this area is shipped in from Washington, Oregon, Utah, or from Idaho's Boise Valley.

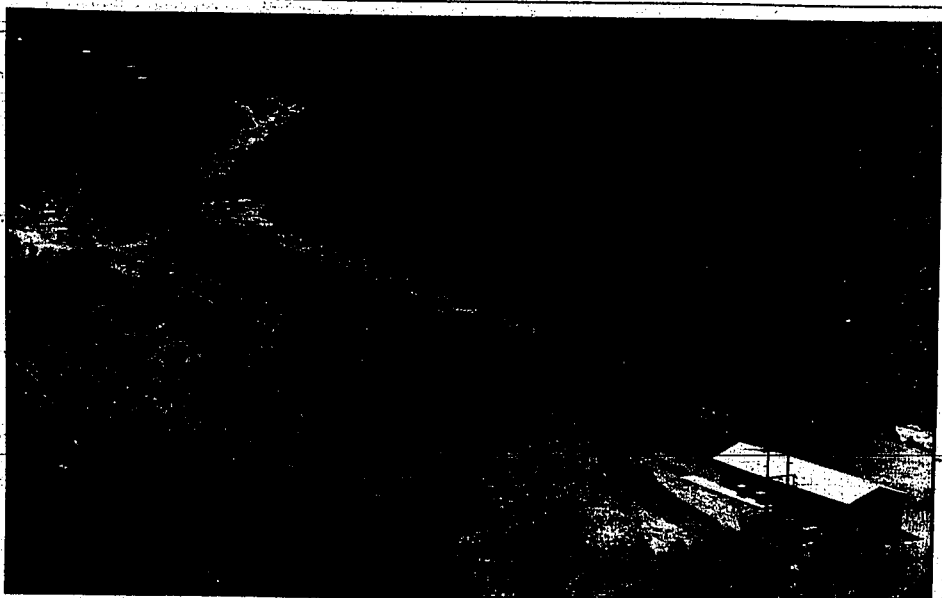
"I'm not sure about Utah, but western Idaho and parts of Washington had at least some damage. Some areas of Washington apparently escaped, but at any rate it looks like the fruit situation will be a little tight here and prices will probably run higher than in the past few years," he said.

Hazen said the past two years have been excellent for fruit production in Magic Valley, but this may be the year the trees get a rest.

Jason Kelley, whose parents own Kelley Orchards in Snake River Canyon, said his family will have no apricots and some loss in cherries, peaches and apples. On the Kelleys' newer orchard, two miles from Clear Lakes Bridge, he estimated 50 percent loss in peaches and 30-40 percent damage to cherry trees. He said the damage is spotty; one orchard or part of an orchard may have almost total damage, while another has had light frost effects.

Fears should be a little more plentiful, he said, as the fruit is somewhat more hardy and was not at such a critical stage when the frost hit.

Galkin said he took advantage of the unusually warm March to plant spinach, beets and lettuce. He has already been able to harvest some of the vegetables.

Lax hydropower rules spawn damage to the environment

Federal, state officials say FERC role should be strengthened

TWIN FALLS — Small hydropower projects can cause substantial environmental damage. In the Magic Valley, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency has taken action against two projects built in the Filer area by Bonneville Pacific, a Salt Lake City firm.

The problem is not the hydro plants themselves, but the impacts associated with their construction. "Having seen these things a few times, I've come to the conclusion that the hydropower plants are not causing the problems," said Warren McFall of the EPA in Boise. "It's the access roads to the site that's causing the problems," he added. "It's devastating what they have done."

The two problem areas in the Magic Valley are both small hydro projects. One is located on Cedar

Draw and the other at Pigeon Cove, on the Snake River north of Filer.

The EPA is also taking action against Bonneville Pacific for the damages created by the construction of a small hydro plant at the Felt Dam on the Teton River in eastern Idaho.

In all cases, the construction of access roads dumped tons of sediments and rocks into nearby streams and rivers. Not only were stream beds altered, but streamside vegetation and trees which are considered critical for wildlife — were destroyed.

But while the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission regulates small hydropower plants and issues permits for their construction, McFall said, "The agency hadn't been notified of the road impacts" on any of the three projects it is now taking action against.

Holes in FERC's environmental monitoring are

also seen as problems by other state and federal agencies.

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Idaho Fish and Game Department have been involved in cleanup efforts on one or more of the projects. Officials at those agencies said they had no idea that construction from any of the projects would cause such substantial damage.

While officials of the EPA, F&G and the Corps of Engineers say Bonneville Pacific has been extremely cooperative, they say they would prefer to monitor projects to prevent environmental problems rather than prosecute companies for cleanup and rehabilitation.

"It didn't have to occur," said Al Van Vooren of the construction damages. Van Vooren is with the Idaho F&G in Boise.

FERC spokeswoman Sharon Hyland said the agency will see HYDRO on Page B2

Recovery of damaged areas may take decades

TWIN FALLS — In April 1984, contractors building an access road for the construction of a small hydropower plant at Pigeon Cove overloaded their explosive charges. The mistake dumped 19,000 cubic yards of rock and soil into the Snake River.

The mass of rock and soil destroyed streamside vegetation and created a "jetty," which partially blocked the river, altering its course.

In 1985, a contractor building an access road to a small hydropower project on Cedar Draw, not far

from Pigeon Cove, filled in 22,000 cubic feet of wetlands and dumped rock and sediment into Cedar Creek.

Neither action was legal. Bonneville Pacific, the Salt Lake City company responsible for both projects, is now in the midst of cleanup and rehabilitation efforts required by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency and the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers.

"We feel lousy about it," said Bonneville Pacific President Ray Hixson. While the contractors and engineers hired by Bonneville were directly responsible for the damages, Hixson said, "We're the

developer, and we had a turnkey contract."

"Mistakes were made, but we're responsible. We haven't made excuses," Hixson added.

Within two hours of the accident at Pigeon Cove, Hixson said, the company had called federal and state agencies to tell them of the problem.

Later this fall, EPA officials say, the company will begin to remove the rock and sediment from the river.

The company is also starting rehabilitation work at Cedar Draw under the direction of the Corps of Engineers. The COE regulates construction on

Porter: State should support development of economy

TWIN FALLS — "Leaving it to private industry" leaves out some economic development.

That problem now is retarding Idaho's economy, David Porter, outgoing administrator of the Idaho Department of Commerce, said Thursday in Twin Falls.

"We are systematically underinvesting in activities that will lead to new business in Idaho," he said. An adequate state program for Idaho now would cost \$5 million —

\$3 million for business development and another \$1½ million for tourism promotion, he told business people enrolled in the Leadership Twin Falls Program sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

Porter, who announced his resignation earlier this week to become dean of a university business school, has criticized the state Legislature for refusing to fund an economic development thrust in his department.

Although essential to the state's economic development, private in-

dustry often is either unable or unwilling to take on some business-boosting efforts, Porter said. "The cost may be too high or the rewards too few, he says.

For instance, successful industrial recruiting offers limited benefits to a wide range of businesses and to the community at large. But, generally, no one business reaps big enough rewards to spend large amounts of time and money in attracting newcomers, Porter said.

"If we leave that (project) to individual businesses, it's not going to

TFEA, district prepare for contract talks

TWIN FALLS — The opening round of contract talks between Twin Falls teachers and the Twin Falls School District will begin May 27, officials announced this week.

"I think we're going to have quick negotiations this year," said Superintendent Carl Snow. "We're going to do everything we can to cooperate."

Nick Nicholson, a speech and debate teacher at Twin Falls High School, will lead the negotiations for teachers. Also on the teacher's

negotiating team will be Claudia Creek, a TFHS English teacher, and Bill White, a teacher at O'Leary Junior High.

Nicholson, who was the chief negotiator for teachers six years ago, said Thursday that he looks forward to contract talks.

"The possibility exists to finish this in one to two sessions," Nicholson said. "I think it's time to get on with the business of education. That's what we're here for."

Teachers are entering the second year of a two-year contract that was approved in 1980, 717,142, 1985 override that includes \$243,707 for increments for teachers.

Nicholson said that while last year's talks produced a bitter division within the community, "I think it was something we had to go through."

Although the contract was ratified by teachers and the board last fall, there are four items up for negotiations this year — base salary, insurance, extra-duty pay and dues deduction.

Snow said teachers are guaranteed an increase in increment pay because of the May 13 override election. By a 66-percent margin, voters approved a \$680,717 tax levy override that includes \$243,707 for increments for teachers.

State officials tour potential prison sites in Wendell vicinity

WENDELL — State officials declined to predict Wendell's chances of being selected as a site for a new prison in the area. Thursday, saying only that the city is competing with 24 other Idaho towns for the maximum security facility.

"You have one-twenty-fifth of a chance of being selected," Department of Corrections official Evans told Wendell leaders.

In July, he said, the Department of Corrections and the Permanent Building Fund

Advisory Council will "weigh all the pluses and minuses" of each city for cost efficiency and then make a decision on where to build a new maximum security prison.

The good points of Wendell, Evans said, is its location between Interstate 84 and its proximity to Boise and Twin Falls.

"And the townspeople seem to want it," he said. "To me, that means a whole bunch."

A drawback of Wendell, Evans said, is that it is farther from Boise than Mountain Home and other cities vying for the prison.

Mayor Otto Lemke, city council member

Lloyd Little and Matt Bunn, chamber of commerce representatives Darwin Yoder and Gabby Cavazos along with county deputy Dale Bunn all expressed welcome for the prison facility in Wendell.

At the mayor's invitation, Evans and Norman Noonan, an architect for the Idaho Division of Public Works, attended a special meeting Thursday and described the proposed facility in detail. They stressed the safety and security it would provide for the public as well as the 500 prisoners.

"It dispels the image of Jimmy Cayney

standing on a rock wall with a machine gun," Noonan said.

The proposed concept of the prison, he said, calls for holding prisoners in well-divided sections so, when not in individual cells, groups would be limited to 16. Built of steel and web within concrete blocks, the modern facility is designed to be "cost efficient and versatile," he said.

After construction of the \$25-30 million prison, the facility would provide 180 to 230 jobs, Noonan said. About 120 of those would be uniformed officers, he said, while the rest would include secretaries, maintenance per-

sonnel, janitors, food service employees and accountants.

Evans estimated the annual payroll of this "clean industry" to be \$5 million.

The state officials toured the 120 acres of land Wendell has offered to donate as a prison site. Evans described the site as "a little scary" because of the excessive rock and lava heaves.

"We're liable to get into a whole bunch of trouble leveling that out," he said.

Accompanied by a local realtor, they also viewed other potential prison sites of at least 25 acres available in the Wendell area.

Senior programs receive grants

TWIN FALLS — Two volunteer senior citizen programs received federal grants for another year. Sen. Jim McClure's office in Washington announced on Thursday.

The Foster Grandparents Program received \$93,780 through June 30, 1987, and the Retired Senior Volunteer Program received \$33,262 for the same period.

The RSVP program has 620 volunteers in the eight-county Magic Valley region, said the program's director, Sherry Garey. Volunteers last year contributed more than \$50,000 work hours, worth more than \$2,000, with various public and health care agencies, Garey said.

"These people are doing things that are meaningful and benefit the

community," Garey said. "They're giving back to the community much more than they receive in payment."

The grants defray mileage costs for the volunteers, she said. Although Gramm-Rudman budget cutting imposed a 4.3-percent cut on the federal budget, Garey said the ACTION agency in Washington, which oversees the program, absorbed most of the cuts in administration.

It is the sixth year that RSVP and the eighth year that Foster Grandparents Program have received federal grants.

"Foster Grandparents program has 400 people who help tutor more than 400 school children.

For possible reforms, Van Vooren suggested that FERC conduct periodic construction inspections to make sure work is completed as planned and not causing substantial environmental damage. It might also be possible, he said, to require a developer or contractor to hire an environmental engineer to monitor construction at the site and avoid potential problems.

During the past few months, Van Vooren said, changes in staffing and organization at FERC have brought some improvements. With the creation of a new regional office in Portland, the agency has added staff with biological and environmental expertise. FERC's staff has been dominated by engineers, he said.

"Since the change, 'Some real positive things have happened,'" Van Vooren said. "They're (FERC officials) starting to call us," reporting problems that the Fish and Game Department was not aware of.

"It's much better to hear it from them than from the general public," Van Vooren said.

BOISE (AP) — Idaho utility regulators have again approved rate schedule for Atlanta Power Co., but also ordered the small electric company to help clear up customer confusion over its rates and charges.

The Idaho Public Utilities Commission scheduled a July 12 hearing in the small mountain community of Atlanta to hear testimony on the safety of Atlanta Power's operations.

However, the PUC said it would not take testimony on the reasonableness of the company's revenue requirement, as that issue "is not ripe for determination because of the limited available historical operating data."

Atlanta Power began supplying electricity to the approximately 50 residents of Atlanta last October. Although the commission originally approved the utility's rates in January, it said the PUC's consumer assistance division had received a number of questions on how to interpret the rates and charges.

wetland areas and is also responsible for enforcement on projects or activities which damage those areas.

But while the company is voluntarily working with the Corps at Cedar Draw, Hixson said the company has some questions about their impacts.

"We honestly don't feel we did anything wrong at Cedar Draw," Hixson said. "But rather than fight it, we just as soon correct it."

The Corps has a different perspective on the problem.

"We aren't quite sure how they could have been unaware that they needed a permit," said Dean Hilliard, the Corps' regional office in Walla Walla, Wash. "They apparently interpreted on their own what a wetland was, without asking us."

The Corps is working with the company to formulate a consent decree which will start repabbling work to reduce the impacts of the filled-in wetland area. Hilliard said they may also fine the company for the damages.

Damages at the two sites will probably be completely cleared up

within 10 to 20 years, said Al Van Vooren of the Idaho Fish and Game Department in Boise.

"At Cedar Draw the stream will adjust to the sediment dumped into it and change its course a little bit," Van Vooren said. Plants and shrubs destroyed will also recover, but wetland areas "will never come back," Van Vooren explained.

"At Cedar Draw, the Corps and Pigeon Cove, Van Vooren said, with the river adjusting. Some of the useable fish habitat lost in the project will also come back, he added.

"You have to put the whole thing in perspective," Van Vooren said of the damages from the two projects. "In the overall context, it's not the worst," he said, especially when compared to the damage that has occurred to state waters from mining and logging operations.

But while most of the damage will be healed in a decade or two, "the overall context, it's no reason for complacency."

"The frustrating thing about it is that there shouldn't be any impacts at all," Van Vooren said. "These projects should be developed so there aren't any impacts."

cy has no plans to change its permitting process for the construction of small hydro projects. Calling the damage which occurred from some projects in Idaho extreme, Hixson said: "It is what is brought to our attention, we would do something about it."

"There should be minimal impacts to the area," Hyland said.

Federal and state officials, however, say they would like to see FERC take a stronger role in the issue.

"I see that the FERC followup has been very marginal," said Van Vooren. "We just can't make it part of our (FERC's) program." Until recently, he said, the department had only one staff member to monitor fisheries in all of south-central Idaho.

"We were very upset" with the damage Bonneville Pile was causing at Pigeon Cove, Van Vooren said. "We detected problems early on, but they just continued to do it," he added.

Porter said.

A leader must bring together parties to get development done. "Our biggest problem in Idaho is that we have no project leader," he told the business people.

In many states, the Department of Commerce fills that role on a statewide basis and offers technical advice as well, Porter indicated. Idaho has yet to "develop an infrastructure" — the basic stuff — for an economic development thrust, he said.

The future of economic development in Twin Falls also brought comment at the day-long session for community leaders.

Gary Wright, director of consumer services for Idaho Frozen Foods Corp., said he sees Twin Falls as the progress center for southern Idaho in the future. Some of that progress may come at the expense of smaller communities, he said. Twin Falls and surrounding areas should continue to build on their natural resource bases to grow in the future, Wright said.

David Cooper, who chairs the chamber's industrial development committee, said Twin Falls people must overcome "negativism" and start finding ways to grow. "We've got to watch for opportunities and encourage investment," he said.

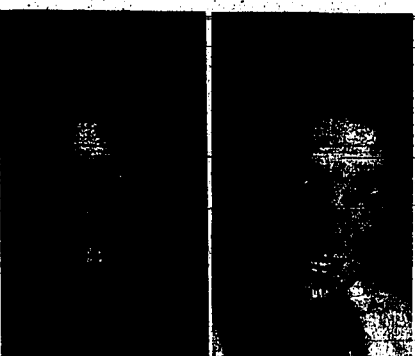
I prefer heavy. I meet a better class of men this way. I would like to

Assaults not tied to Syria

ROME (AP) — Italy's interior minister said Thursday that Syria provides more than moral support to terrorists, but that Italian authorities have no evidence Syria was behind the Rome and Vienna airport massacres.

"It is certain that Syria provides hospitality and immunity to certain groups, to certain people who then go around the world mounting attacks," Interior Minister Oscar Luigi Scalfaro told Italian reporters. "This represents more than moral support."

But he added that there has been "absolutely no proof" to implicate the Syrian government in the Dec. 27, 1985 airport attacks in which 20 people died.

Scalfaro was commenting on a New York Times report quoting U.S. officials as saying the Central Intelligence Agency has learned from Italian authorities that the terrorist who survived the Rome attack has implicated Syria in his mission.

The Times quoted unidentified U.S. officials as saying the terrorist, Mohammed Sarham, told Italian magistrates Syrian agents had trained him and accompanied him on his journey from the Bekaa Valley region of Lebanon to Damascus, the Syrian capital. From there they went to Rome via Belgrade, Yugoslavia, the Times quoted the American officials as saying.

Domenico Sica, the prosecutor who is heading the state's investigation into the Rome airport attack, and another magistrate, Rosario Priore, said today there has been no new development in the investigation.

Overheated tire produced air disaster

MEXICO CITY (AP) — An overheated tire set off a fire and explosion that caused the March 31 crash of a Mexicana airlines Boeing 727 jetliner and the deaths of all 157 people aboard, a government investigating commission announced Thursday.

The commission said its inspections of the worst air disaster in Mexico found "no evidence whatsoever of the presence of an explosive device," according to a statement from the federal Communications and Transportation Department.

Mauricio Conde, a spokesman for the department, said investigators also concluded, through examination of passenger lists and other information, that there were 157 people aboard the plane, not 156 as earlier reported.

The report said the overheating originated in the middle of a wheel on the left side of the landing gear and caused pressure to build up in the surrounding tire, which then exploded. That part of the wheel contains brake mechanisms, the tire mounting and bearings, the report said.

Investigators said the tire explosion ruptured several ducts, principally in the fuel line and in the hydraulic, electric and air conditioning systems, according to the report.

Black riots take 26 lives

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Vast tracts of the Crossroads squatter camp lay in ruins Thursday after four days of raging battles between rival black groups. Estimates of the homeless ranged from 15,000 to 50,000 people, with 26 confirmed dead.

Residents told reporters they feared many more were dead.

U.S. Ambassador Herman Nickel called the scene 12 miles east of Cape Town "a human disaster of major proportions."

Foreign governments, national companies and Cape Town residents mounted a relief operation to feed and clothe those whose shanties were destroyed by roving bands of fighters.

Typhoon toll 71; more feared dead

HONIARA, Solomon Islands (AP) — Typhoon Naimi, the worst storm in history to hit the Solomon Islands, killed at least 71 people and left about 90,000 homeless, and rescue workers said Thursday the toll was expected to go much higher.

"We think hundreds died," said John Selwyn, a National Disaster Committee spokesman, reached by telephone from Sydney, Australia. "The death toll will rise. Reports of more deaths are coming in. It will hit 100 soon."

The town that loves its track

Glenns Ferry's Pilots a long-running hit

GLENN'S FERRY — Bob Belliston, who coached various sports at Glenns Ferry High School for a quarter century before his retirement a few years ago, explains the Pilots' success in track and field by pointing to senior half-miler Sean Black.

"The first of his six brothers came out for track shortly after I got here," he says. "That's 30 years ago. This will be the last Black to graduate."

"In this school, track's a family affair." And an extended family, at that. Glenns Ferry High has just generated its seventh District 4 Class A-3 girls' track championship in eight years and its first boys' district title in nearly a decade, a record rivaled in the recent past only by Yogi Behrens' track dynasty at Wendell during the late 1960s and early 1970s.

"Getting kids to turn out in a school that size is based on success," says Behrens, now retired. "You get the older kids interested and their younger brothers and sisters will follow. They help each other and teach each other, and that sure helps on the coaching."

"My sister was part of the team the year I got there and taught (me)," says senior Carol Williams.

BOISE — The pattern is a familiar one.

The 21 Class A-3 schools of the Magic Valley go into the Idaho High School Track and Field Championships with a plurality of the top qualifiers out of district competition.

And somebody else wins the state championship.

"But maybe not this time."

"Yes, I think we have a shot at it," says Gooding boys' Coach Jeff Jeffries, who will take nine individuals and two relay teams to the state meet, which begins this morning in Bronco Stadium. "Things will have to fall just right for us to do it, but I think we have the potential."

The Senators finished second to



of the Fourth District champion Pilots sees several possible individual state winners among his charges, but he wonders if his seven individuals and one relay team are enough to compete for the team championship.

"Nine is a new record for us," he says. "Last year we took 11, and that was a record."

Glenns Ferry senior Carol Williams has the best A-3 qualifying mark in the state in the shot put (37-5 1/2) and the discus (124-3).

Competition begins this morning at 9 a.m. with the finals in the pole vault, boys' discus, boys' long jump and girls' high jump, while the girls' long jump will be settled at 10:30 a.m. and the girls' shot put at noon. Preliminaries in running events will be the order of the afternoon, while the finals of the 3,200-meter run will cap the day's

activities about 7:30 p.m. Saturday's events start with the finals in the triple jump, the girls' discus, the boys' shot put and the boys' high jump at 9 a.m., with the A-3 running event finals scheduled to start at 10:30 Saturday morning.

No Magic Valley A-3 track team has won a state track title since Yogi Behrens' Wendell girls' team in 1981, and the prospects of this year's Magic Valley contingent are clouded by several factors. On the boys' side, Glenns Ferry and Grangeville have the largest contingents here, although their athletes aren't favored in many individual events. That leaves Gooding, Homedale or Clearwater Valley of Kootenai getting the favorite's nod from many coaches.

In the girls' division, defending champion Sugar-Salem returns with 14 individuals and four relays,

but that awesome potential could be diluted by Kamiah, Declo, Fruitland and Glenns Ferry, which are strong in the areas the Diggers are weakest — the field and distance events.

Two favorites are that two Magic Valley athletes, Declo's Brad Matthews and Wendell's Jay Burke, will have a lot to say about who wins the boys' team championship. Matthews has the best marks going into state in the long jump and the pole vault, and the best time in the 400 meters; he has the second-best district qualifying mark in the state in the triple jump. All of means he could potentially win four firsts, or 40 points.

Burke, with the best qualifying time in the state out of district in the high hurdles, also has a chance to win the high jump and the intermediate hurdles — 30 points.

"So many things can happen with the relays (Gooding has qualified in the quarter mile and the half mile)," says Jeffries. "Ted James has volunteered to run the 800 relay, which is just two events before the (open) 100. That shows you what kind of kid he is; he's risking another state championship. But if he can recover from the relay in time, and I think he can, he could put us in real good shape."

The Senators also have the potential of going 1-2 in the shot put and discus with Swenson and Todd Kimmes.

Hagerman sophomore Frank Temple has the best qualifying mark, along with James, in the 100- and the second-best in the 200, while Glenns Ferry's Mark Carpenter is tops out of district in the boys' discus, with a toss of 150 feet, 1 inch.

Rocket men

After L.A., Houston figures it's T-minus Celtics and counting

HOUSTON — Houston Rockets Twin Tower Ralph Sampson threw up a last-second shot that answered Coach Bill Fitch's prayers and thrust the Rockets into the NBA championship series against the Boston Celtics.

"This proves that some of your prayers are answered and the answer is not always no," Fitch said of Wednesday night's outcome. "It looked like it was going to be one of those nights when you finish second."

Sampson soared over Los Angeles center Kareem Abdul-Jabbar and sank an off-balance 15-footer as time expired to give the Rockets a 114-112 victory over the defending champions in Los Angeles.

The final basket was Houston's first lead of the game and it wrapped up the Western Conference tie and put the Rockets into the title round beginning Monday at Boston.

"That's what basketball is all about," guard Robert Reid said as the Rockets returned home to a banner-waving throng Thursday.

But Olajuwon's anger turned to jubilation following Sampson's game winner.

"I saw it from the dressing room and I was so excited," Olajuwon said.

Reid also played a key role in the shocking finish, hitting a three-point shot with 15 seconds to play that tied the score at 112-112.

When play resumed, Houston's Rodney McCray, unguarded, threw the inbound pass to Sampson, who got off the shot just ahead of the final buzzer.

"I knew where the basket was but I couldn't see it," Sampson said. "I thought it was short. I didn't see it until it hit the rim and bounced in."

The capacity crowd at The Forum, anticipating an overtime period, was stunned along with Lakers Coach Pat Riley.

"You can't beat fate," Riley said.

Olajuwon scored 30 points and had seven rebounds before he was ejected.

Jabbar led the Lakers with 26 points and 13 rebounds.

"I was happy he threw up a bad shot, but what happened just happened," Jabbar said.

The Rockets trailed by nine points at 99-90 with 8:31 to play but they scrapped back into the game when Sampson took charge.

"Since he made that shot, I guess it just wasn't meant to be for us this year," Lakers guard Magic Johnson said. "To be in control the whole way like we were and to see that shot drop, it's hard to swallow."

The Rockets returned home to an adoring crowd at Houston's Intercontinental Airport. They were cheered by Mayor Kathy Whitmire and city officials.

Fitch said the next step in the playoffs won't be any easier.

"We've got to be humble and start thinking about the next four or five days," Fitch said.

But Olajuwon once again had the final word when asked about the Rockets' chances against the Celtics.

"We're unbeatable," he shouted.

Crist, the District 4 Class A-2 champion in the discus and the shot, has the best mark in the form of an event going into this weekend's Idaho High School Track and Field Championships in Boise. Her personal bests are 33 feet, 9 inches in the shot and 124-0 in the discus. Neill

said she is projected as a shot putter, discus thrower and javelin thrower in college.

Bartholomew, the Fourth District A-2 300-meter intermediate hurdles champion, has the fastest time in that event going into state this weekend; his personal best is 39.4 seconds. Canadiens edge Flames, move within a win of Stanley Cup

MONTREAL — Montreal rookie Claude Lemieux buried a goal in the third period Thursday night and dug a deeper hole for the Calgary Flames in the Stanley Cup final.

"It was a matter of luck and a matter of work," Lemieux said after his goal at 11:10 of the final period gave the Canadiens a 1-0 victory and a commanding 3-1 lead in the best-of-7 NHL championship series.

The Canadiens can wrap up their

23rd Cup with a victory in Game 5 in Calgary Saturday night.

Lemieux's big goal came on an interception of a clearing pass by Doug Risebrough in the Calgary zone. The Canadiens' right wing then connected for his 10th goal of the playoffs on a 35-footer that slipped under the legs of Flames goaltender Mike Vernon.

"I anticipated the pass from Risebrough," Lemieux said of winning goal. "The puck came right on my stick. I guess he didn't know I was there. I have to thank Doug for

that."

At first, Lemieux thought he was offside on the play.

"But I didn't hear anything, so I went ahead and shot," Lemieux said.

Until Lemieux blazed home the game-winner, both teams were tentative.

"We didn't want to make too many mistakes," Montreal's Mats Naslund said. "We played a cautious game, but we're used to playing that way in the Adams Division."

The game ended on a sour note

with a bench-clearing brawl that kept the players on the ice and the fans in their seats for at least 10 minutes after the contest.

It was unfortunate that should happen," Montreal Coach Jean Perron said. "But the whole series has been played that way with pileups after the whistle and things like that."

Perron said it was obvious that his team was high for the game.

"Everybody did their share—No body slackened out there," Calgary Coach Bob Johnson

couldn't think of a tougher way to lose in a more important circumstance.

"I expected a low-scoring game," Johnson said. "Montreal plays great defense, especially in their building. But we did a heck of a job defensively, too. We tried to beat them at their own game, but this time we failed."

Lemieux, one of seven key rookies for the Canadiens, provided the offense. Patrick Roy, a 20-year-old rookie goaltender, was the major force on defense for Montreal, but was forced to make only 15 saves in recording his first shutout of the playoffs.

Earlier in the third period, a shot by Montreal's Bob Gainey from the left faceoff circle hit the far goalpost to Vernon's left.

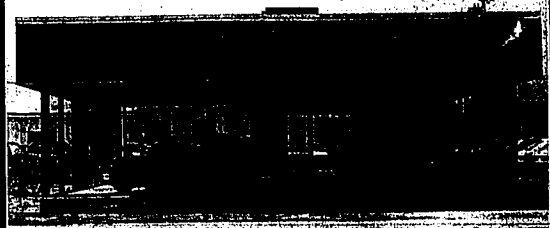

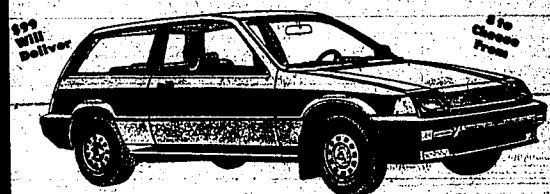

East won the heart lead with his 10 and returned the ace (suit preference to show his side-suit entry in diamonds). South ruffed with his spade queen and West overruffed impulsively with his king. West obediently returned a diamond to East's ace, but another heart lead served little purpose. South ruffed with his 10, drew West's trumps with his ace and jack, and announced he was closing shop on defensive winners.

"If I was prepared to double a heart contract," proclaimed North.

"Why sacrifice when we can beat four spades?" added East.

To beat the game, West should refuse to overruff the second heart. Later, when West wins his spade king, he leads a diamond to East's ace and a third heart lead promotes West's trump nine to the fourth defensive winner.

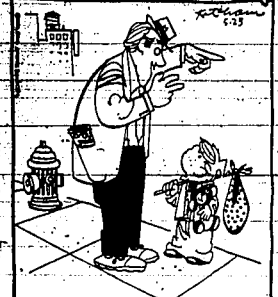

'Famous Potatoes' eyes Idaho poetry

Wyndham points out that most
of the poems in "Famous
Potatoes" deal with images fa-

miliar to anyone who lives in
Idaho — log houses surrounded by
miles of sagebrush, wide open
spaces, the intense solitude of
wilderness, experiences of hunt-
ing, fishing and skiing, and the
weathered inhabitants of small
towns.

2 local men to link with Hands Across America

TWIN FALLS — When Hands
Across America attempts to form a
human chain across the continental
United States on Sunday, at least
two Magic Valley men will form
links.

Vern Latlin of Twin Falls says
that he and a friend, Rich Crothers
of Kimberly, believe it is time that
Americans help Americans, and that
taking part in Hands Across
America is one way of doing that.
The two men will leave for Los

Angeles tomorrow to take part in
the fund-raiser.

Latlin, who is an outside salesman
for Gem Electric and a morning disc
jockey for KTFF, says he first learned
about Hands Across America
from a UPI wire story that was
transmitted to KTFF.

"It sounds like a good idea," he
says, "to help the hungry and
homeless in our own land."

The event, the brainchild of Ken
Kragen, a show business promoter
and USA for Africa founder, will be
an attempt to bring together 5.4
million persons, all holding hands to
form a human chain across 16 states

and the District of Columbia. It
completely successful, the chain will
cross 1,400 miles of desert, three
mountain ranges, ten rivers and will
link about 500 cities.

Hands Across America's carefully
nurtured non-political image has
earned it endorsements from the
governors of all 16 states involved as
well as celebrities including Kenny
Rogers, Woody Allen and Bill Cosby.

Those who are to form the line
have paid \$10 to \$35 to join hands at 3
p.m. Sunday, long enough to sing
three songs: "America the
Beautiful," "We Are the World" and

"Hands Across America." The entire
event will last about 15 minutes.

Kragen says that contributions
from corporations, combined with
pledges and sponsorships, have
already underwritten the venture's
\$12 million cost. He insists that a
coast-to-coast line is as important
as raising the money, even though
millions of dollars more will likely be
pledged regardless of whether the
route is filed or not.

"There are clearly different levels
of success," he says. "But our objec-
tive is to make the line link, because
the symbolic nature of the linking is
very important."

'Poltergeist II': Family is stuck in same old plot

HOLLYWOOD — We are watching "Poltergeist II" and backles are rising. A deadly specter again haunts the Freeling family: the Middle American clan whose misadventures thrilled millions in 1982's "Poltergeist."

Back then, they were confronted with an explosion of wrath from beyond the grave — zooming out of their TV to entrap their children. "wreak" havoc throughout the community and send their house blasting away to the great beyond.

Now, far away, in the desert haven of Grandmother Freeling's home in Phoenix, Ariz., trouble brews again. The floors shake. The windows rattle. The house lifts. An evil old man arrives on the doorstep, with his own private raincloud. Horrible, wormlike beings thrash around in Papa Freeling's stomach. Robbie braces to strangle him. Carol Anne gets obsessed on her plastic phone. At night, ectoplasmic kibitzers cavort on the lawn.

Something has gone horribly wrong — though the Freelings are far away from their "old town, Coquina Verde" and its violated graveyard, far from earthlike producer Steven Spielberg and director Tobe Hooper (replaced here by Brian Gibson).

The hapless Freelings (Jobeth Williams, Craig T. Nelson, Heather O'Rourke and Oliver Robins) are suffering from something worse than the dead: that inexplicable horror. The Inevitable Sequel. Like Sisyphus with his rock — like Rocky and the grads of "Police Academy" — they are condemned to the eternal return. No matter where they go, they keep winding up in the same movie, trapped like rats in the same plot.

It isn't that producer-writers Mark Victor and Michael Grais (co-scenarists on the original "Poltergeist") haven't tried to break it, expand on their original, show new character development. They use some reflexive inside humor — son Robbie asks for a new TV, and Papa Steve continually refuses; the parents lament that they can't collect insurance on a home

destroyed by the Afterlife.

Maybe it's believed that audiences at sequels will get mad if they don't see the same movie — like finding Cheerios in their Wheaties. The jokes are like TV comedy — running gags; they establish familiarity but not depth. (Nelson's Steve at times, might be a later-day Ricky Ricardo, with the ghosts as his Lucy.) And, once the film gathers momentum, its form is identical to the first.

That creates more problems. The feeling you have about "Poltergeist II" is that the earlier film's structure dictates everything. In the original, part of the fun lay in the contrast between banality and terror: the parents' practicality and the grotesque nightmares around them.

The framings of "Poltergeist II" are fairly effective: Jerry Goldsmith contributes another eerie score, and H.R. Giger ("Alien") has dreamed up some loathsome monsters (One of them is listed as "The Old Man in the Hat," a creature, played by Noble Craig — a memorable credit.)

But the second film never has the hardness or urgency of the first. Its best moments, perhaps happily, tend to come from the actors rather than the story or Richard "Edmund" effects: especially newcomers Geraldine Fitzgerald and Julian Beck. Fitzgerald is sweet and maternal as the grandmother, and Beck, in his last performance, is indelibly evil as the wraith-like Rev. Kane — a hypocrite, posturing, unbending malevolence: Kane almost seems a thankless bogeyman role, but Beck is great in it — and if the rest of the movie were up to him, it would freeze your blood instead of curdling your spirits.

Theater owner drops films in ticket price flap

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The biggest movies of the season opened in Oregon last week but Moyer, the owner of the 10th-largest theater chain in the United States and Canada, has not booked any of Paramount's offerings in the past two months, including "Gung Ho," "Fire With Fire" and "Blue City."

Tom Moyer of Portland owns more than 500 screens in Oregon, Washington, California, Nevada and Alaska. Theater goes won't be able to see the top-billed movie "Top Gun," Moyer is the only theater operator.

Bill Spencer, head film buyer in Idaho, Moyer's Portland agent, said the long-standing dispute led Moyer to file a restraint-of-trade lawsuit against Paramount international court because Moyer's trying to resist admission price increases being "They are trying to force us to

raise our admission," Spencer said. Until the federal lawsuit is resolved, he said, Paramount films will not be booked at any Moyer theater. In many communities, including the entire state of Alaska, Moyer is the only theater operator.

Spencer said the dispute involves Paramount's demand for a per capita return on admissions that would make it impossible for Moyer to offer special discount nights and hours in some areas. It also would result in higher admission prices in some communities.

Paramount representatives in Seattle and Los Angeles declined to comment.

'Top Gun' leads pack with 2nd best opening

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Summer got off to an early jump at box offices nationwide as "Top Gun," starring Tom Cruise as a fighter pilot, scores a hit with an \$8.2 million weekend gross, the year's second best opening.

The Paramount release opened in 1,028 theaters for a \$7,970 per-screen average, best so far for 1988.

"With the traditional start of the summer box office season still a week away, this week's top 10 titles pulled in \$22.4 million compared with \$16.5 million a year ago, a 36 percent increase.

"Short Circuit," which began last weekend in the No. 1 spot, was bumped back to second place behind "Top Gun" with a weekend gross of \$4.4 million.

Tri-Star's claimed \$5.3 million gross for the film's opening weekend was challenged — by competing distributors, who said it was closer to \$4.5 million. Tri-Star officials said their number was based partly on estimations, but denied exaggerating.

"Alan Aida's comedy "Sweet Liberty," about an author who sees his historical work turned into a movieand fantasy, opened in the third spot with \$3.2 million.

"No Jo Dancer, Your Life is Calling," comedian Richards' Frost's autobiographical film, was in fourth place after three weeks in distribution and \$12.8 million.

"Fire with Fire," the romance of a schoolgirl and inmate, dropped from third to fifth with \$1.1 million.

"The Money Pit," the Shelley Long-Tom Hanks comedy, fell back one spot to sixth place with a gross of \$1 million. In eight weeks of distribution, the film has picked up nearly \$31 million.

"Police Academy 3: Back in Training," the "Police Academy" sequen-

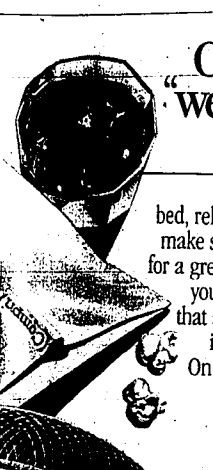
in its ninth week of release; earned \$717,836 over the weekend for a total gross so far of \$40.3 million. It took in \$9 million in 1,788 houses as the year's top opener, ahead of "Top Gun."

Finishing eighth in the box office derby was "No Retreat, No Surrender," a New World release which reaped \$665,877 on 371 screens.

New Line's "Critters," pulled in \$568,398 at 490 houses, and "Blue City," from Paramount, earned \$565,793 in 844 theaters.

'America's lawyer' back at work in TV movie sequel to a sequel

Bearded and bulkier, Raymond Burr returns this week — for the second time this season — as Perry Mason, the most famous lawyer in TV history.

The dour, dogged Mason has never really been out of the public's view-lag-eye. Superstation WTBS, which has been rerunning the series for several years, promotes Mason as "America's lawyer." The first "Mason" reunion movie, "The Return of Perry Mason," which aired in December 1985, was the No. 1 TV movie of 1985 and was the second-most successful television movie of the season (the first was the other major TV series reunion, "Return to Mayberry").

The ratings of "Perry Mason Returns" convinced its producers (who include former network programming executive Fred Silverman) to rush out a sequel and begin work on three additional TV movies. The sequel, "The Case of the Notorious Nun," airs Sunday on NBC.

Returning with Burr from the original series will be Barbara Hale as Della Street, Mason's faithful secretary. William Katt, Hale's son, will reprise his first-sequel role as private investigator Paul Drake Jr. (the late William Hopper, son of gossip columnist Hedda Hopper, played Paul Drake in the original series.)

The sequel features a bigger cast and a quicker pace. Here, Mason comes to the aid of his old friend Archbishop Corro (William Prince) when the clergyman suspects that Thomas Shea (Arthur Hill) may have embezzled church funds. When Father O'Neil (Timothy Bottoms) begins his investigation into church records, he is murdered. Sister Margaret (Michele Greene) is arrested amid rumors of an affair between her and the priest. The cast also includes David Ogden Stiers ("M*A*S*H"), Tom Bosley ("Happy Days") and Jon Cypher ("Hill Street Blues").

Chances are Mason won't lose this case. The defense attorney lost only one case in the 243 episodes that aired during the show's original run. Originally, a series of novels by Eric Stanley Gardner, then a radio series, "Perry Mason" moved to the tube in

1957 and stayed until 1966. Mason was part-sleuth, a lawyer who, stitched together mysteries with the assistance of Paul Drake, his private investigator, and Della Street, his private secretary. Each episode had a certain sameness. There was a murder, D.A. Hamilton Burger and his investigator, Lt. Tragg, would build what they thought was an airtight case against

the innocent suspect. The suspect goes to Mason for help. Mason and Drake would then sift for clues.

At the trial the full range of courtroom histrionics were displayed — with witnesses cracking under Mason's relentless probing or else witnesses being produced at the last minute by a frantic Paul Drake, which changed the course of the case. D.A. Burger, who lost every case that Mason won, was probably the most frustrated man on TV in the '60s.

Most of the time the action on "Perry Mason" bore little resemblance to reality. But that didn't deter the public from making "Perry Mason" one of TV's most popular shows. It ended its long run on Sept. 4, 1966 with an appropriate episode called "The Case of the Final Fade Out," featuring Author Gardner as the judge.

'Macho' Norris has a bodyguard

Q. Does karate champion and movie hero Chuck Norris really travel with a bodyguard sometimes? That's hard to believe. — G.T.

A. It seems he does. Not long ago, the popular actor, his charming wife and a bodyguard came to dine at an informal restaurant in New York's Greenwich Village. Between bouts of pasta and veal Marsala, Chuck, who has fine manners; was friendly when recognized and approached for autographs by fans. The bodyguard, who was bigger and even burlier than Chuck, faced the entrance door, watchfully eyeing all incoming diners, especially those who came to the table.

formed me that Jack was a familiar figure on West Side streets early each morning, drinking coffee out of a plastic cup, schmoozing and telling stories with the production crew. "He's the most, no-nonsense star to deal with since the King, Clark Gable," observed one chap. "And that's saying plenty."

Q. I heard once that underneath that cool, elegant exterior actress Audrey Hepburn is really a stitch. Is she a frustrated comedienne? — M.H.

A. Underneath Hepburn's coolly elegant exterior is Audrey's equally cool and equally elegant interior. Hepburn by no manner of means can be described as a "stitch." That's not to say that she's without a dry sense of humor. At the Oscar award ceremonies, I casually asked Audrey her opinion of the outrageous get-up Cher wore at the event. Hepburn puffed on a cigarette, jingled a set of expensive chandelier earrings, and commented with a straight face: "I think it's beautiful, but I just wouldn't want to sit behind her — and behind all those feathers." Meow!

Q. It's nice to see screen veterans Kirk Douglas and Burt Lancaster working together again. Do they see a lot of each other socially? — K.F.

A. Contrary to appearances, they don't. In fact, they rarely socialize between movies (their latest together is "Tough Guys"). The two have co-starred, by Kirk's count, in six or seven features, have performed together on TV and on the stage and genuinely like to work with one another. Offscreen is another matter. "Years ago we used to play golf together now and then," Kirk said. But the separate demands of bustling careers have ~~thickened~~ ~~crossed~~ friendship. Nothing personal, mind you. Just the demands of business.

Q. Does Joan Collins actually fantasize that she's the Marlene Dietrich of the 80s? — V.C.

A. Of all the big names in Hollywood, Collins takes herself probably the least seriously. That's not to say that she's not serious about what she does. She definitely is. But she always keeps a sense of humor about herself. After this season's "Dynasty," Collins will star in a four-hour TV movie titled "Monte Carlo." Joan tells me she plays a singer "in the Marlene Dietrich mode" who is also a spy. To further

mix her references, Collins adds that the story, set in the 1940s, is like the classic movie "Casablanca." Here's looking at you, Joan.

Q. Did the line of clothes sold under Brooke Shields' name go out of business for lack of customer interest in her? — C.W.

A. A sportswear line bearing the 20-year-old actress-model's name was formed in late 1984. The deal fell through earlier this year, but not because of customer disinterest or financial considerations. It seems Brooke's zealously overprotective mother, Teri, insisted on designs in colors that the manufacturer felt wouldn't sell. All that Teri will tell me is that Brooke's company is seeking a more cooperative — and dressier — clothing partner next time.

Q. We enjoyed "Fire With Fire," the new movie about a Catholic school student who falls in love with a rebellious young prisoner from a nearby honor detention camp. However, the plot seemed to have some loose ends. Were parts of this movie rewritten at the last minute? — T.E.

A. Let's say there was some reconstruction. What happened behind the camera was that the script (originally titled "Captive Hearts," which seems more appropriate to the story line) contained expository scenes not included in the final version. One illustration: The tale called for Joan Smart, who portrays a friendly nun who befriends the innocent heroine

(played by Virginia Madsen), to be thrown out of the school along with Virginia. This entire episode was dropped from the picture; unwisely, I feel, because it supplied some of the missing motivations you inquired about. Despite such lapses, the movie proves entertaining and most effective.

Q. Has movie director Roman Polanski run afoul of the law again because of an underage model? What's with him? — K.M.

A. One such incident is enough for any man and Roman is no exception. Polanski, who was convicted of having illicit sexual relations with a 13-year-old girl some years ago in California and fled before he was to be sentenced, is having no current trouble with the law. What's happening is this: Polanski, who lives in France from which he can't be extradited, has discovered yet another budding teenager for one of his movies (previous discoveries include Nastassja Kinski). His latest find is 18-year-old English model-turned-actress, Charlotte Lewis. A bubbly, talkative sort, Lewis co-stars with Walter Matthau in Polanski's upcoming flick "Pirates." She's talented in a strictly professional manner, assures the director, and very beautiful.

Q. I've been a fan of Carrie Snodgrass since her Oscar-nominated performance in "Diary of a Mad Housewife," in 1970. However, I hear she's not at all modest about her talent. What's she really like? — B.E.

A. You tell me. The talented actress, who portrays a homicidal killer out for revenge against Charles Bronson, her policeman adversary in the new movie "Murphy's Law," was describing her young co-star, Katherine Wilhoite. Snodgrass said, "She's a doll, and a very intelligent actress. She reminds me of myself."

Q. Is legendary movie producer Hal Wallis, who made such greats as "Casablanca," "Becket" and "True Grit," working on any projects now? — G.R.

A. Unfortunately, no. As of now, Wallis, who is 87 and in poor health, is confined to his home in Palm Springs, Calif.

Duffy's return to 'Dallas' fuels soap-opera assault on Top 10

NEW YORK — Three prime-time soaps, led by Patrick Duffy's return to "Dallas" in a tantalizingly brief shower scene, climbed into the Top 10 last week, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Tuesday.

But NBC, with no serials on its schedule, still won the week of May 12-18 by placing its four Thursday night comedies in the Top 10. The top-ranked "Cosby Show" had a 31.8 rating (percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with TV) and a 54 share (percentage of sets on that are tuned in.)

The much-hyped "Dallas" on CBS was the big serial winner, ranking third with a season-high 24.9 rating and 42 share of the audience watching TV. Last year's cliffhanger, in which Duffy's Bobby Ewing character apparently died after being hit by a car, had a 27.5 rating, 46 share.

Also last week, the series-ending episode of CBS' "Knots Landing" was 10th and the next-to-last installment of ABC's "Dynasty" was ninth.

The other three shows in the Top 10 were on CBS' Sunday night lineup: "60 Minutes," "Murder, She Wrote" and the movie "Stagecoach," which beat the first part of NBC's miniseries, "On Wings of Eagles."

For the week, NBC averaged a 15.3 rating to CBS' 14.5 and ABC's 13.0.

Duffy left "Dallas" after last season, complaining of the grind and welcoming any major movie role offers. Bobby apparently was buried in this season's opener. But last Friday, Bobby — or at least somebody who looked remarkably like him — was in the shower wearing only a smile in the show's final scene.

The character's only words of dialogue were "Good morning," which he spoke to Pam, Bobby's ex-wife. Pam had married another character, Mark Graison, earlier in the show.

The last time "Dallas" had been as high as third in the ratings was the second week of this season last September.

For the 30-week, regular prime-time season that ended April 20, "Dallas" was sixth, "Dynasty" seventh and "Knots Landing" 18th.

However, until these shows

started steaming up for their season finales, they had been declining in the ratings. The last time "Dallas" was in the Top 10 was when it was 10th the week of March 2. The previous time "Dallas" and "Dynasty" both were in the Top 10 was the week of Feb. 23.

Last week's Top 10 programs were: "The Cosby Show," NBC's "Family Ties," "Dallas," NBC's "Cheers," "Stagecoach," "Murder, She Wrote," NBC's "Night Court," "60 Minutes," "Dynasty" and "Knots Landing."

The "Dallas" success also helped its follow-up serial, "Falcon Crest," which was this season's No. 24 show, but jumped into a 12th-place tie last week.

The second 10 shows last week were: ABC's "Moonlighting," and, in a four-way tie for 12th, CBS' "Falcon Crest," ABC's "Hotel," ABC's "Who's the Boss?" and ABC's "Growing Pains." Next came "NBC's 60th Anniversary Celebration," NBC's "Miami Vice," ABC's movie, "Convicted," NBC's "The Golden Girls" and NBC's "On Wings of Eagles," a fact-based account of a daring rescue mission in Iran.

In Nielsen overnight ratings for 12 big cities, "On Wings of Eagles"

beat "Stagecoach," the remake of John Ford's classic Western. But the results were reversed when the more recent national ratings were released Tuesday and "Stagecoach" had a 24.4 rating, 37 share to a 17.0, 28 for "On Wings of Eagles."

"Stagecoach" was helped by its "Murder, She Wrote" lead-in, while "On Wings of Eagles" was hurt by its lead-in, "Fast Copy," which was the lowest-ranked show of the week with 5.1 rating, 10 share. One week ago, following NBC's popular Thursday comedies, "Fast Copy" had a 15.0 rating, 24 share.

Before NBC announced its new fall lineup last week, "Fast Copy," which is a magazine show produced by the entertainment division, not news, had been seriously considered for the Sunday slot opposite CBS' News' "60 Minutes."

The third installment of CBS News' "West 57th" ranked 54th out of 62 shows, but its 16 share was a slight improvement over last week's 14 share.

The bottom five shows last week, in descending order, were: CBS' "Alewolf," in 58th, ABC's "Benson," ABC's "Mr. Sunshine," ABC's Ripley's "Believe It or Not" and "Fast Copy."

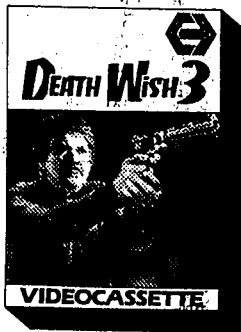

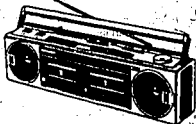

NBC's peacock now going solo

NEW YORK — NBC's peacock, which has shared corporate billing with the letter "N" for several years, is flying solo as the network's new logo. In an unpublishable move, the "N" was unceremoniously dumped.

The new symbol has six feathers instead of 11 and the bird's head now faces to the viewers' right, rather than left, said Bud Rukeyser, NBC's executive vice president for corporate communications.

The deposed "N," controversial in itself when it was unveiled in the 1970s and eventually uncovered as the same symbol as Nebraska public television, will move into logo retirement, joining the Olympic rings that were incorporated into ABC's visual identity before the 1984 Olympics.

In an interview Monday, Rukeyser referred to the former NBC symbol as "the proud N."

NBC's new logo actually was unveiled May 12 during the broad-



cast of "NBC's 60th Anniversary Celebration." It now is NBC's regular symbol on the air and official network stationery. Rukeyser said old letterheads still may be used by NBC staffers. The proud "N" is not entirely in disfavor, he noted.

In full-color glory, the new peacock also will be engraved next month into NBC's corporate headquarters in New York, welcoming all visitors.

"A logo is not meant to be changed frequently," Rukeyser said. "This new logo, we anticipate, will be our new logo indefinitely."

Rukeyser said former NBC President Fred Silverman had wanted to

get rid of the "N," but he himself was ousted in 1981 before a full logo change could be made. As the third-place network, NBC had more serious problems than its logo-identity crisis.

"It was a combination of NBC doing well and our 60th anniversary, so it seemed like a good time to straighten this thing out," Rukeyser said.

During Silverman's tenure, the peacock, which had been NBC parent company RCA's symbol for color TV, was combined with the "N." (In a settlement, NBC had paid Nebraska public TV for rights to the "N.")

"But it really was a design nightmare," Rukeyser said.

Rukeyser said the rounded peacock and the hard-edged "N" caused visual design conflicts and that the detail of 11 feathers, when reduced in size, caused it to become unrecognizable as a peacock. Now, the six feathers reduce better and they all will have different colors, one for each of NBC's six broadcast divisions.

'Cosby Show' helps raise sit-com from dead, as new lineups show

NEW YORK — Almost singlehandedly, without a six-shooter or a screeching tire, Bill Cosby has changed the face of prime time, raising its comedy consciousness and reducing its violent streak.

Two years ago, Cosby said he was returning to prime time because television's mayhem level had become dangerous to his family's health. TV, he said, had degenerated into a barrage of cars, guns, hookers and pimps, and he wanted to offer a positive alternative.

Success breeds change, and the network's 1985-87 schedules seem to reflect more of Cosby's attitude and approach to programming. Sitcoms are up, shoot-'em-ups are down.

Led by "The Cosby Show," which is so popular that even its repeats, if compiled separately, would be TV's No. 2-ranked series, situation comedies averaged a 17.6 rating in 1985-86, up from 13 in the previous campaign.

Action-adventure, meanwhile, fell from 15.9 to 10 (percent of the nation's 85.9 million TV homes.) So it's no surprise that sitcoms, pronounced lead the season before Cosby arrived when he made the Top 10, will dominate the fall.

ABC will has 10 comedies, CBS six and NBC 13 for a total of 29, nine more than before 1985-86. There are sitcoms every night, including three nights when they'll go head-to-head on two networks.

On Monday, ABC's "ALF," starring a wise-cracking, furry extraterrestrial, will compete with CBS' "Late & Early" ABC and CBS have opposing comedies on Wednesday, including ABC's "Perfect Strangers" against CBS' new "Together We Stand."

On Saturday, NBC's "Facts of Life" is scheduled against Lucille Ball's "Life With Lucy" on ABC. Then, NBC's "27" goes against The Ellen Burstyn Show.

Clearly, the networks think home is where the laughs are. Next season, you'll see several variations of Cosby's nuclear-family theme.

In "Together We Stand," Elliott Gould and Dee Wallace Stone will be parents to a color-coded collection of racial and adopted kids: a blonde, red-haired boy, black girl, Brazilian boy. Alf, the alien next

door, will live in semi-harmony with Ma, Pa, the two kids, but not the family cat, which Alf eyes for his next meal.

With comedy on the rise, the bottom has fallen out of the hard-action market. Each network will introduce only one bullet-riddled series.

NBC has "Crime Story," which is about crime-stoppers battling Chicago's Mob in the 1960s. ABC's hard-action entry is "Cold Steel and Neon," in which a sensitive detective juggles dangerous police work with raising two teen-agers. CBS has "Downtown," about a cop saddled with four parolees.

After screening the "Downtown" pilot for ad agency types, CBS said the violence in future episodes would be toned down.

Even that noted male chauvinist "Mike Hammer" will show a softer side next season, CBS said.

As will ABC's "MacGyver," a Mr. Wizard-inspired daredevil who uses everyday items to extricate himself from sticky situations. "We're going to rely more on the emotional side," said ABC Entertainment President Brandon Stoddard. "But he'll also be stopping World War III with a ham on rye."

Most incoming dramas are softer, examining professions and people that don't wear badges. They include a female surgeon (CBS' "Kay O'Brien, Surgeon"), an alien who returns to Earth to raise his orphaned son (ABC's "Starman") and a country lawyer (NBC's "Matlock.")

"Our House," a family drama that NBC Entertainment President Brandon Tartikoff describes as a cross between "Highway to Heaven" and "The Cosby Show," stars Wilford Brimley as a grandfather who opens his home to his widowed daughter-in-law and her three kids.

"Our House" will be launched after — guess what? — "The Cosby Show" before it moves to a regular Sunday spot.

And there's more "Cosby" impact: It boosted another news program into prime time. Since ABC failed miserably against "Cosby" with entertainment shows, the network opted for news in the time period. ABC feels that "Our World," which will recreate recent historical events, will be a dignified, intelligent and cheaper way to get beaten.

ABC's Thursday lineup next season will have "Our World," "The Colbys" and the news magazine, "20/20."

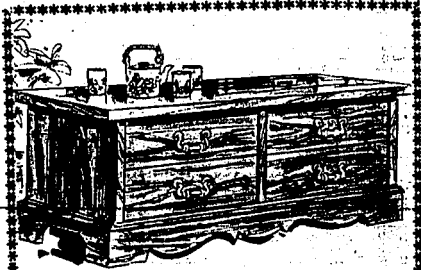

Soviet evening news show tries to keep pace with modern times

MOSCOW — The Kremlin is trying to spruce up its TV image by slowly changing "Vremya," the evening program that is considered the primary news source for 80 percent of the nation's 240 million television viewers.

"Vremya," which means "time," recently has experimented with modern graphics, live reporting from abroad and other Western techniques.

The Communist Party daily Pravda pronounced the effort a qualified success this week, but complained that the program's foreign and sports coverage is still dull.

There are two short daily bulletins and a twice-daily analysis program on Soviet television. But "Vremya" is the only show in town at 9 p.m.

Broadcast from Moscow in four live versions and five taped versions for nine Soviet time zones, it pre-empted both national channels and all local ones.

Officially the most-watched broadcast, "Vremya" carries the authority of the Kremlin. When Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev wanted to address the nation on the Chernobyl nuclear accident, his speech opened "Vremya."

"Vremya" issues the first reports

on Politburo meetings and other major events. When a Soviet leader dies, senior anchorman Igor Kirillov appears to inform the public.

There is no precise estimate of the program's audience and some non-conformist intellectuals make a point of not watching. But Gosteleradio, the state TV and radio committee, says 80 percent of all TV viewers use "Vremya" as their primary information source.

The main format is an announcer reading from a script. The program is more formal than Western news shows, despite attempts to improve the presentation since Alexander Aksyonov took over last December as head of Gosteleradio.

Leonid Lipovetsky, the show's assistant editor for international news, says the Kremlin doesn't pass on every item.

But "Vremya," like all Soviet news outlets, is closely controlled by the party. Every staffer works for Gosteleradio, whose chairman holds a minister's rank and serves on the party Central Committee.

The extent of state control was demonstrated by the Chernobyl accident, which wasn't reported on "Vremya" for three days. The first film coverage was delayed for eight days.

"Vremya" is invariably introduced by a shot of a clock ticking away

the last 30 or 40 seconds until 9 p.m. That is followed by the new logo — a stylized globe, glowing red star, a white line like an orbiting satellite and the word "Vremya."

There are always two announcers, a man and a woman, rotating among a staff of about 10. When there is important news, producers choose Kirillov or one of the other senior men.

"Good evening," the woman says. "Hello, comrades," says the man.

The order in which stories are presented has nothing to do with Western notions of news value.

If there are party or government events, they top the program. Otherwise, the first item is about an economic success in the Soviet Union. Under Gorbachev, such news is often preceded by the logo "Speedup in Action."

The program includes shots of factories and farms, and regular viewers sometimes wonder if they haven't seen that voracious grain combine or that busy assembly line before.

Lipovetsky acknowledged in an interview that "it's more exciting to watch a fire than see how the corn is growing." But he defended the Soviet approach and said Western news has too much tragedy, political scandal and disaster.

NBC reporter Linda Ellerbee's non-fiction book may be filmed

HOLLYWOOD — NBC News correspondent Linda Ellerbee came to Hollywood this week to promote her first book, "And So It Goes," a sardonic, light-hearted account of her years in TV news. She left with a deal to write her first movie and, maybe her first Broadway musical.

Film producer Bernie Brillstein says he and actress Marsha Mason have optioned "And So It Goes" as the basis for a film and a musical, with Ellerbee to write the film script. "I think eventually the book would make a great Broadway musical," he added.

Ellerbee, who appears regularly on NBC's "Today" show and co-anchors the short-lived "NBC News Overnight," struck her deal Wed-

nesday afternoon and announced it that night on NBC's "Tonight Show," where the Texas-born reporter was among the guests interviewed by Johnny Carson.

"I've described the book as the adventures of a sane person in an insane business," she said Thursday here before flying to Houston for more interviews about her book.

Brillstein, executive producer of such film comedies as the megahit "Ghostbusters" and "The Blues Brothers" and "Spies Like Us," said his company, the Brillstein Co., would co-produce Ellerbee's film with Mason's company, Come Lately Productions.

He said it has not been decided yet if Mason would star in the proposed film, which he said probably would be made for theatrical release.

"Linda probably would punch me

for this, but I'd love to call it 'Twinkles,'" he said. He referred to her book's nickname for certain "pretty, pearl-wearing, vacant-headed paper dolls" who occasionally are found working as local TV anchors.

Ellerbee, a former Associated Press reporter who has been with NBC News for nearly 11 years and is known for her wry, irreverent on-air manner, said that she did not know when she would find time to adapt her book for film.

Right now, she said, she is only thinking of finishing her book-promotion tour, then returning to work at NBC in New York, where she contributes a regularly weekly "Today Show" segment called "T.G.I.F." — Thank God It's Friday.

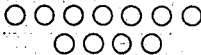
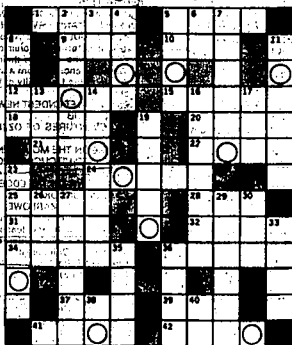

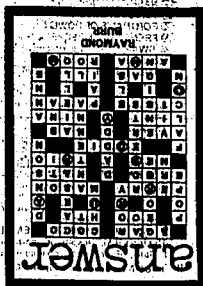
