Body of missing Acequia girl recovered from canal waters

ACEQUIA — The body of a 14-year-old girl, who had a fear of water and could not swim, was found at 4:45 a.m. Thursday in the main canal that forms the south boundary of Acequia, Minidoka County Sheriff Ray Jarvis reported.

The girl, KaDawn Bair, daughter of Curtis and Georgia Bair of Acequia, was reported missing about 9 p.m. Tuesday, when she failed to return home from visiting friends. Jarvis said the body was found in the Main Line Canal, about one-half mile below the bridge where the girl's damaged bicycle was located Tuesday night.

"The body was in about 2 1/2 feet of water," Jarvis said. "I do want to point out that if we hadn't shut the water down, we might never have found her."

About 150 law enforcement officers, reserves and search and rescue crews gathered at the canal early Thursday morning after water was shut off and the level dropped about four feet. Normally the water

is eight to 10 feet deep and extremely swift. The sheriff said no one can say for sure what happened, but it appears the wheel of her bicycle dropped off the edge of the pavement as she reached the bridge. This apparently threw the bicycle out of control and it crashed into the low railing on the bridge, throwing the girl over the railing and into the water.

Jarvis said there were no signs of injury or foul play and the body was fully clothed. He said the girl probably drowned immediately.

Minidoka County Coroner John Fisher said there would be no inquest or autopsy and ruled the cause of death as accidental drowning.

Frank Gillette, flying an ultralight, slow-moving aircraft, spotted the body just as officers were getting divers ready to sweep the canal bottom. Jarvis and a farmer who lives nearby, Pat Berry, went into the water and brought the body to shore.

Jarvis theorized the body traveled only half a mile because it washed into an area where the canal makes

a bend and creates still water. He said the body washed under the railroad tracks, in what is known as the chutes, and into some rapids before the bend. Normally, he said, the water travels four to five miles an hour and searchers were fortunate to locate it so quickly. Even with the water slowed down and the level lowered, Jarvis said the water was very murky.

Leonard Scheer, manager of the Minidoka Irrigation District, said there were no problems resulting from cutting the flow in the canal, and irrigation deliveries were back to normal Thursday afternoon. He said the wide and deep canal carries the main flow of the North Side Canal system. Jarvis asked the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation to shut down the water Wednesday to facilitate a search of the canal, after a night-long investigation indicated the child had probably not been abducted and could have been thrown into the water.

Officers and volunteers from Jerome and Cassia counties assisted in recovering the child's body.

Court selects counsel to decide Deaver case

WASHINGTON — A federal court named Whitney North Seymour Jr. on Thursday as independent counsel to decide whether there are grounds to prosecute former White House aide Michael K. Deaver for violation of conflict-of-interest laws.

Seymour, former U.S. attorney in New York City from 1970-73 and a partner in the firm of Brown & Seymour in New York, said his job was to "let the chips fall where they may." He was selected a week after the Justice Department sent its recommendations on the Deaver case to the federal court.

Deaver has steadfastly maintained he has violated no laws. He has emphatically denied that he has traded on his influence with President Reagan and his wife Nancy in his activities as a lobbyist for other nations, including Canada.

During an appearance earlier this month before a House panel in a closed session, Deaver said he was a victim of politically-motivated accusations and called for an impartial

In a two-page order, the court directed Seymour to investigate Deaver's role as a lobbyist for the

government of Canada, specifically whether he represented the Ottawa government during an Oct. 25, 1985, meeting with Drew Lewis, Reagan's special envoy to Canada on the acid rain question.

Lewis ultimately recommended a \$5 billion joint effort between the United States and Canada to combat acid rain.

The court also directed Seymour to determine whether Deaver's lobbying on behalf of a business in Puerto Rico and the government of Canada "or any related matters developed in the course of the independent counsel's investigation violated the Ethics in Government Act or any other federal law.

The special court directed Seymour to investigate whether Deaver "with the intent to influence communicated with (then-national security adviser) Robert C. McFarlane" last summer in connection with proposed changes to the tax code that gives tax credit to American businesses investing in Puerto Rico.

Soviet experiments at plant may have triggered disaster

PHILADELPHIA — Soviet experiments with power plant equipment appear to have played a role in triggering the explosion at the Chernobyl nuclear reactor, a top U.S. nuclear official said Thursday.

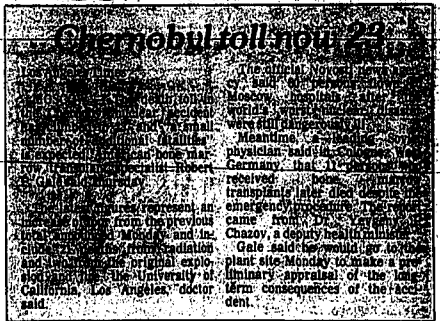
Harold R. Denton, director of the Office of Nuclear Reactor Regulation, said he based his conclusion on "hall talk" picked up at a meeting of the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna.

However, Victor Glinisky, a former member of the U.S. Nuclear Regulatory Commission, said the experiments might have entailed the production of plutonium, a nuclear weapons material.

"It would certainly be ironic if Soviet experiments unrelated to power generation could be the cause of a downturn in the approval of nuclear power," he said.

Both men commented during a symposium at the annual meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

Soviet officials have acknowledged that experiments were being conducted on Chernobyl's No. 4 reactor when it exploded April 25. However, they have not described the experiments in detail or said whether they were involved in causing the accident.

Denton said the experiments were a chief topic of conversation during the international agency's meeting last week. "I've tried to refrain from speculating about what the initial cause was," said Denton. "But based on the hall talk in Vienna, it appears that experiments were somehow involved."

He said the exact nature of the experiments is still unclear.

"It could have been core physics experiments," he said. "It could

have been an experiment with the computer control system for control rod handling. It could have been an experiment involving the fuel-handling machine. There's been a vacuum of information other than that the word 'experiment' does creep up a lot in informal conversations. Glinisky, who is now a consultant, emphasized that he has no direct information about the experiments. But he noted rumors suggesting that the plant was being used to make plutonium as well as nuclear power.

'Odontalgia' wins 8th-grader spelling title

WASHINGTON — Jon Pennington, a 14-year-old eighth-grader from Shreveport, La., won the National Spelling Bee Thursday when he correctly spelled "kaolin" and "odontalgia."

In so doing, young Jon outdistanced Kenneth A. Larson, 13, a seventh-grader from Tequesta, Fla., competing for the third time who was stumped on "kaolin," misspelling it as "chayoline."

Jon, who wore a striped shirt and white pants and United Gays, broke into a broad grin when he spelled "kaolin" and applauded him.

"All I can say is it's great," he told reporters after the final round, in which he misspelled his first two words but spelled the next six correctly.

Under the rules for the final round, when one contestant misspells a word, the other contestant must spell that word correctly and another word to win.

When Kenneth missed on "kaolin," Jon was asked to spell that word and then "odontalgia."

He said he knew that last word — the one that put him over the top — and his first thought when he pronounced it the word was "Oh, gosh, he's spelled it."

Asked by a reporter to spell how he feels, he spelled "Tired."

Asked what the key to his success was, he said, "It's just something I'm good at." Asked whether he knew all the words he had Thursday, Jon said, "I'm not a very good guesser, but I knew how to spell most of them."

CIA officer urged Pastora to quit Contras, rival leaders say

WASHINGTON — Nicaraguan rebel leader Eden Pastora quit the Contra war effort after six of his top lieutenants left his command to join a rival U.S.-backed umbrella group at the urging of a man known to them as a CIA officer, according to officials of rival Contra factions.

Rebel officers said a man identified only by the cover name of "Armando" had previously known to them as a CIA contact

offered Pastora's commanders military aid if they would join the U.S.-sponsored United Nicaraguan Opposition. The rebels were told that the military aid would come through UNO but not where it would originate.

The desertions by all but one of his top commanders led Pastora to quit the Contras allegiance. Boscon Matamoros, a Contra spokesman, said UNO's military supplies came from "international sources" but he would not elaborate.

Asked about a CIA role in Pastora's downfall, CIA spokeswoman Kathy Pherson

has also secretly funneled several million dollars to the rebels for political projects this past year, U.S. officials say.

Rebel officials said UNO's Costa Rican-based forces recently received five shipments of arms that were used to entice Pastora's poorly supplied troops to switch allegiances. Boscon Matamoros, a Contra spokesman, said UNO's military supplies came from "international sources" but he would not elaborate.

Asked about a CIA role in Pastora's downfall, CIA spokeswoman Kathy Pherson

In Miami on Thursday, the three directors of UNO — FDN chief Adolfo Calero, Arturo Cruz and Alfonso Robelo — announced a series of reforms aimed at settling their internal differences and responding to allegations of financial mismanagement.

The Miami meeting of the UNO directors took place under U.S. pressure for the Contra movement to present a more unified front before Congress next month considers President Reagan request to give them \$100 million in mostly military aid.

In Washington, White House deputy press secretary Edward Djerejian said, "We are

aware of the changes occurring within UNO and view them as an extremely positive step in broadening the leadership of the resistance, strengthening civilian control and improving coordination of military activities."

Asked whether the United States had engineered the move, he said, "That's their own call."

Pastora, now seeking political asylum, is being detained by Costa Rican authorities. In a telephone interview from jail, he declined to discuss the alleged CIA role in his ouster.

Silence on incident erodes public trust

There is a certain logic in the decision last week by Twin Falls Public Safety Director Tim Qualls to reprimand a city police officer for reporting what the officer thought was an error in expense accounts by two other policemen.

But effectively, the policy means the punishment of the reporting officer, Det. Howard Elliott for doing the right thing. He reported a potential problem to the agency involved. Should he be reprimanded for not going to Qualls?

A city policy requires reporting of such incidents within a department's chain of command. Elliott reported the expense account problems to the U.S. Marshall's Office in a federal drug case. Cmdr. Patrick Bermingham and Det. Don Walden, witnesses in the case, were suspended when the irregularities were confirmed.

Sound public policy, in our view, should not discourage the reporting by employees of potential problems involving the expenditure of public funds. Inside "whistleblowing" is an important way in which the public interest is often served.

The city policy, in our view, encourages just the opposite approach. It allows public officials — the public safety director and the city manager in this case — to decide to what extent to pursue an allegation and what to do about whatever is found.

It allows these actions without any public mention of the incident, effectively allowing incidents to be swept under the rug.

In this case, the city was treating the matter as an "internal investigation;" no report of it would likely have come to light were it not for sources who were willing to tell The Times-News what was going on and for the sniffing of our reporter, Bonnie Baird Jones, who covers law enforcement agencies.

Public agencies obviously need procedures which protect employees from unwarranted charges and complaints. But it seems to us that the tilt should be in favor of disclosure, not of secrecy.

The city or the department, in our view, should have made a statement about this case, outlining the facts and the action taken. It should have done so voluntarily. In our view, it should not have reprimanded the officer who reported the incident.

Public trust in public agencies — particularly law enforcement agencies — is critical. That trust is eroded when internal rules and regulations are allowed to override an action which many would say was the right one.

Quality is the first choice

The ultimate goal is to expand this "gross" national product into a bigger and bigger pie without regard to resources, environment, or the lifestyles or economies of others. It appears to be based on inverted pyramidal thinking and inflation.

When I got out into the real world, I, as Columbus did before me, discovered the world to be round; as in what goes around comes around.

I learned more real economics in 15 minutes observing the cycles in the forest of seed, seedling, young tree, mature tree, snag and decay than I could ever learn in the hallways of the linear mind.

As I have travelled throughout this country, I observed that in this quest for a bigger and bigger pie to split via the creation of goods (or should they be called "bads") and services, the quality of life has actually deteriorated. The one thing of value I learned in college economics was that you can't have guns and butter, and that appears to hold true for quantity and quality as well.

I do not believe in created needs or steroid economics. Because I attack the proponents of those concepts, I am accused of economic naivety. Rather, I am a man who, having observed the inevitable short comings and consequences of — that economic philosophy, has recognized that in order to live a quality life, one must balance his

needs and consumption with the world around him. I call this "stable state economics."

As growth is a part of life I adjust to it, but I don't force the issue. I accept economics as the responsible use of the resources around me and recognize the rights of other life forces who draw their economics from that same land, air, and water. Economics is not just a matter of money management.

That I be called a country bumpkin by those fast talking city slickers with their rip and run economics is fine with me. It's not the first time in history we've heard their story of the "good life" to come and probably won't be the last. I've been to Los Angeles, Houston, Tampa, Denver, Phoenix, Boulder and Boise. No thanks, I'll choose quality over quantity any day.

With Cherle Peperack's own words I rest my case, "In the Magic Valley we found a quality of life not available in areas of high financial return."

Out there in the real world, graduates, change is the rule

BOSTON — My colleague wants me to tell the graduates what it is like in the real world.

I am to deliver the last lecture at this women's college, their last 20 minutes of required listening. Tell them, insists this alumna as we wait for the procession to begin, tell them what it's like.

I barely have a chance to ask this woman what warning she would have me pass on. What alarms should I sound: Beware of tennis elbow, meringues, children, middle-aged bulge?

She says, just tell the women that life will be round, not flat. It will slip out of the line to find her seat under the sun.

I don't, forgive me, follow her advice. I am not yet of an age to regale a younger generation with tales of how I walked four miles in the snow to my first job or how cold a world it is out there. I don't feel compelled to dampen their beginning, this commencing.

with a wet blanket. More to the point, I am not sure that the high expectations of the young are so dangerous to their future health. I don't think that adults must provide them with an antidote of bad news, even an antidote responsibly labeled "reality." For some reason, we are compelled to talk about the lows of life, as if they were "real." No one ever warns the young against life's highs.

Yet I know my colleague's instinct is a natural one, and well-meant. She is not bitter, surely not a failure in her adult life. She just wants to inoculate those starting out against the pain of future disappointment. It

is a protective instinct that seems especially keen now among women.

The older women, like the parents and teachers flanking the newest batch of graduates before me, see young women who believe that all doors will be open to them. Discrimination is a subject they studied in history, something that happened to their mothers. They are sure they will be treated as individuals and equals. Treated that way by bosses, by husbands, by the "real world."

But the veterans are not so sure. From their vantage point, the barriers haven't been removed, just lifted higher. The entryways are clearer, but the doors to the corner offices could use a good shove. They predict for the graduates, marriages that may be less than partnerships, and children with needs. Some of these veterans fear that without proper warning the young will hit the first wall with a dull and deflated thud. I understand that fear. But I don't think

you can protect young people from disappointment and the peculiar way, dependent on cynicism so thick that they may not even try. If 22-year-olds of either sex calculated perfectly the risks of life, the odds of success and failure, the likelihood of losses along the way, many would refuse to leave school and home.

All the country conventions, are based on the careful calculation of past performances. But lives of promise and progress come from the "irrational" conviction that you can beat the odds, make the future different.

The energy that the young need to fuel their dreams, that peculiar way, depends on their ability to deny what experience teaches, especially the experience of their elders. This generation of middle-aged women who have traveled so far from their own mothers' lives should know that. What about the expectations that hang

like fragile lassels on the caps of these woken graduates? The problem of past generations was that women expected too much, but that they settled for so little. For centuries, they taught daughters more about compromise than about victory. I prefer great expectations, despite all the risks of great disappointment.

Am I the Pollyanna of the commencement season, a victim of too much "Pomp and Circumstance"? Some friends who teach tell me grimly that the female students have little sense of connection, less sense that they are a part of a movement of women. But they do assume equal rights, maybe too early, but fully. It is much harder to take away something that is already "yours." That's what it's like out here in the "real world": changing.

Robertson spurs evangelical Christians into political arena

Evangelical Christians — spurred by the prospective presidential candidacy of televangelist Paul Martin G. Robertson — are flexing their political muscles against Republican Party regulars in states as diverse as Michigan, Iowa, New Mexico and Tennessee.

Robertson's success this week in recruiting precinct delegate candidates in the first round of Martin G.'s campaign complicated presidential nominating system, in which he upstaged efforts by Vice President Bush and Rep. Jack Kemp. R-N.Y., is the clearest demonstration so far of the growing influence of the Christian movement.

The breadth of Robertson's political appeal has yet to be tested, and questions remain over whether any television evangelist can reach beyond a narrow slice of the electorate. But at least in pockets around the country, evangelical voters have emerged as key players in Republican Party politics.

In Indiana, which has boasted one of the strongest Republican parties in the nation, Christian-backed candidates decisively defeated party-endorsed candidates in two congressional district primaries this month. In one, Don Lynch, assistant pastor of the

Independent Nazarene Church, won the Republican nomination without a headquarters and with only \$4,000 in campaign funds.

In Iowa, a key state in the presidential nomination process, evangelical Christians have taken over the party apparatus in Des Moines and in nearby counties.

In many respects, the Republican Party is an ideal target for evangelical Christians. Polls indicate that white, born-again, Christians represent about 20 percent of the total electorate and have moved overwhelmingly toward the Republican Party.

Because of party rules, a small but highly motivated group of activists can exercise significant influence. In Michigan, for example, the winner of the Aug. 5 primary could be the candidate who persuaded 3,000 to 4,000 people to run for Republican precinct delegate. What this means is that mobilizing just 0.1 percent of the electorate could translate into a victory in the first test of

prospective Republican presidential candidates.

In some cases, the Christian mobilization process, as seen in Minnesota, a bitter disagreement over tactics has split the influential Christian-Republican movement, sharply reducing the chances that the Christian-backed gubernatorial candidate, Mike Menning, can win the party endorsement.

Robertson has encouraged much of the Christian political activity. Defying the rule of thumb that prospective presidential candidates should avoid taking sides in primary contests, he has been endorsing candidates and helping them raise money.

In terms of presidential politics, the most important developments have been in Michigan and Iowa. In Iowa's Polk County, the largest and most influential in the state, and neighboring Dallas County, the moderate-conservative wing of the Republican Party was overwhelmed by an outpouring of Christians in precinct caucuses.

In an interview later Smith said: "They (the Christian conservatives) have as much right to be there as I have, that's the process. It's the exclusionary part of the pro-

cess of which produced more than 50 of the delegates attending Iowa's 4th District Republican convention."

All the county conventions, Christian organizers passed out sheets of papers headlined: "How To Participate In A Political Party." Among the guidelines were: "To a degree, keep your position on issues to yourself... Come across as being interested in economic issues... Hide your strength... Don't flaunt your Christianity, this is predominantly friendship evangelism."

The power of the Iowa Christian movement was most apparent when Mary Louise Smith, chairman from 1974 to 1978 of the Republican National Committee — the highest party office in the country — was barely elected from her precinct to be a delegate to the Polk County convention.

The six people attending the precinct caucus split 3-3 for five ballots, until finally the conservative-Christian faction gave in and allowed her to go to the convention. In an interview later Smith said: "They (the Christian conservatives) have as much right to be there as I have, that's the process. It's the exclusionary part of the pro-

cess that I object to. It's almost a kind of unreasonable imposition of their views on the system; moral and religious views on the political system, and a lack of willingness to discuss these issues on the floor, just shutting others out."

In Indiana, John Swezey, chairman of the powerful Martin County Republican organization, said, after his candidate lost to Lynch in the 2nd District congressional caucus, "My intent is to dig or push the Republican Party so far to the right that we lose the center, then they are dooming themselves to failure, because they will lose the election. Our party is a centrist party."

Republican strategists generally agree that evangelical and fundamentalist Christians are a key element of the GOP coalition, and are critical to the long-range Republican goal of gaining majority status. Many, however, fear that divisive battles over such controversial questions as abortion, tax credits to religious schools and pornography regulations could harm the party.

Fighter pilot, sub specialist picks to lead Air Force, Navy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan asked the Senate on Thursday to confirm his choice of a combat-tested fighter pilot and a former submarine commander to assume leadership of the Air Force and Navy.

The nominations of Gen. Larry D. Welch and Adm. Carlisle A. H. Trost were not expected to face any difficulty in the Senate. Welch now commands the Strategic Air Command and Trost directs the Atlantic Fleet.

Although colleagues consider both to be independent-minded men who prefer to work out of the limelight, the paths they have taken to the top of their respective services are a study in contrast.

Trost, 58, finished No. 1 in his class at the Naval Academy while Welch, 52, started out as an enlisted man with the Kansas National Guard and did not receive his bachelor's degree until 1971.

They will be joining a Joint Chiefs of Staff facing significant change. The House and Senate both have passed bills to overhaul the structure of the joint chiefs, generally giving the chairman more authority over the service chiefs.

Trost, of Valley Forge, Ill., spent a year at Washington University in St. Louis before deciding on a Navy career. He switched to the U.S. Naval Academy and graduated in 1953. He later studied political science and international relations at the University of Freiburg in West Germany.

Although Welch now heads the part of the Air Force responsible for the nation's land-based nuclear missiles and strategic bombers, he is best known within the service as a "fighter jock" and key player in the development of advanced fighter planes and tactics.

Welch, of Guymon, Okla., left the National Guard in 1953 to enter the aviation cadet program, from which he graduated in 1955 with his pilot wings and a commission as a second lieutenant. He later flew 137 combat missions in F-4 Phantom fighters in Vietnam. He then drew the first of several Washington assignments, first as director of fighter-air superiority studies and later as chief of the fighter division of the service's studies and analysis branch.

Welch subsequently moved through a number of command positions with the Tactical Air Command before becoming vice chief of staff for the Air Force in 1984. He assumed his current post in August 1985.

Welch will replace Gen. Charles A. Gabriel, who will complete his maximum four-year term as Air Force chief of staff on June 30.

Trost began his career on a destroyer after graduating from the Naval Academy, but entered the Navy's Submarine School in New London, Conn., a year later and from

that point on stayed with the fleet service. By the early 1960's, he had been elevated from nuclear-powered attack submarines to nuclear-powered missile subs and gained his first command in 1968 aboard the USS Sam Rayburn.

Trost later served as executive assistant and aide to then-Navy Secretary John W. Warner before assuming command of Submarine Group Five in San Diego in 1973. He went on to become deputy commander of the U.S. Pacific Fleet and commander of the 7th Fleet in Japan. He also served four years as director of program planning, giving him an intimate knowledge of the Navy's budget process.

Trost, who has been commander-in-chief of the Atlantic Fleet since October, will replace Adm. James D. Watkins, who also relies on June 30 after four years as chief of naval operations.

McNamara, ex-negotiators deplore move to dump SALT

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara and two onetime U.S. negotiators said Thursday that an unratified nuclear arms deal would result from President Reagan's decision to disregard a key provision of the 1979 SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union.

McNamara told a news conference he had no doubt the Soviets have violated the agreement, but he said Reagan's decision to keep adding cruise missiles to B-52 bombers under the United States surpasses the treaty ceiling "is totally inappropriate."

"Without SALT, the entire structure of offensive arms limitation which has been laid down over a period of 20 years by four presidents — Johnson, Nixon, Ford and Carter — will be destroyed," he declared.

Former arms-control negotiators Paul Warnke and Gerard Smith echoed McNamara's apprehension.

"The decision is inconsistent with our national security," said Warnke, who was involved in negotiating the unratified SALT II pact in 1979 under President Carter.

He predicted the Soviets would add more than 6,000 ballistic missile warheads to their long-range SS-16 rockets and deploy new SS-20 strategic missiles without retiring older SS-17s, SS-18s and SS-19s.

"What we are facing now is Soviet actions that in a relatively short period of time and with no massive expense will add probably at least twice as many ICBM warheads as they have at the present time," Warnke added. "I submit that is inconsistent with the security of the United States and the president's

decision should be considered."

Smith said Reagan had made "an ideological decision" reflecting pressures from people who don't like arms control. "The former negotiator in the Nixon administration said Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger was 'restless' with the relatively equal U.S. and Soviet nuclear strength "and wants to move towards superiority."

The president's decision leaves Congress as "the sole protector" of the weapons-limitation process, Smith said. He suggested Congress should try to restrain the president by acting on his military budget requests "at a more moderate pace."

President says he will veto trade bill, cites likely harm to economy

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan told a business audience Thursday he will veto a "kamikaze" trade bill passed by the House if it reaches his desk, claiming the measure could send the jobs of Americans "down in flames."

In a speech to the National Association of Manufacturers, Reagan claimed his administration had made major strides in opening overseas markets to U.S. goods without having "to hide behind trade barriers."

"Given a level playing field, Americans can outproduce and out-compete anyone, anywhere on earth. That's why it's the policy of this administration to open markets

abroad, not close them at home," the president said.

Reagan's audience sat silently through most of his speech, interrupting him with applause only once.

Many of the association's members represent industries that have been devastated by the widening U.S. trade deficit and whose officials have supported the kind of legislation approved by the House.

"At the very least, the bill indicates the depth of frustration felt by Congress and by the people — and our leaders in the administration should take note," Richard Hecker, chairman of E.I. Du Pont de Nemours & Co., said in separate remarks to the manufacturers.

The House-passed bill would force the president to retaliate against countries that engage in unfair trading practices and would require steps to lower by 10 percent a year the trade surpluses that some countries, including Japan, West Ger-

many and Taiwan, have with the United States.

But Reagan, an opponent of the measure all along, stepped up his verbal attack on it, telling the manufacturers: "This reactionary legislation would force American consumers to pay billions of higher prices, throw millions of Americans out of work and strangle our economy as foreign markets slam shut in retaliation."

And, assailing the House for political motivations, he declared: "The Democratic leadership may think this is clever politics in an election year, but the American people see this for what it is — kamikaze legislation that could take their jobs down in flames."

Rep. Tony Coelho, D-Calif., chairman of the Democratic Congressional Campaign Committee, shot back at Reagan's remarks, saying: "His claim that our competitors would retaliate against U.S. products is bogus and inconsistent."

NASA to replace lost giant satellite

WASHINGTON (AP) — A replacement was ordered by NASA Thursday for the giant, part-secret \$250 million satellite lost in the space shuttle Challenger explosion.

The space agency announced plans to buy a Tracking and Data Relay Satellite and parts for a backup spacecraft from TRW in Redondo Beach, Calif. The value of the contract will be negotiated with the firm, NASA said, with delivery scheduled in September 1991.

The TRRS, the largest and most advanced communications satellite in the world, was in the Challenger cargo bay when it exploded on liftoff on Jan. 28. An underwater search continues to find parts of the satellite.

No tampering with capsules, FDA says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Food and Drug Administration said Thursday that tests of all 2,897 Anacin capsules pulled from Austin, Texas, drugstore shelves have been completed and were "uniformly negative—no tampering, no poisoning."

FDA Commissioner Frank Young made the announcement a day after the agency was informed that a 24-year-old chemistry student was found dead in Austin of cyanide poisoning.

Traces of the poison were in a bottle of Maximum Strength Anacin-3 bought from a Walgreen's store and found in the medicine cabinet of Kenneth Wayne Farries, a University of Texas senior who died May 21, Austin police said.

"We have no evidence that this is anything other than a local, isolated incident," said Young. "However, to be on the safe side... we removed all Maximum Strength Anacin-3 capsules from the shelves of the 10 Walgreen drug stores in Austin area for analysis in our Dallas lab."

Britain condemns attack on trawlers

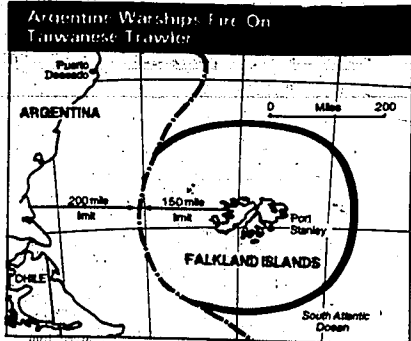
LONDON (AP) — Britain said Thursday that Argentina was trying to "pursue a sovereignty claim by force" in attacking three Taiwanese trawlers between its coast and the disputed Falkland Islands.

Argentina claims the British-ruled islands 300 miles off its coast and invaded them in April 1982. A British task force took the Falklands back 74 days later.

A Foreign Office statement said Britain warned Argentina earlier this week to stop harassing fishing trawlers. Britain indicated it might take further action, but a Foreign Office spokesman would not elaborate.

The Argentine government said the cutter Prefecto Barbier fired on the trawlers, one of which was set ablaze, because they were found operating Wednesday within the 200-mile fishing limit the South American country claims.

All three trawlers were outside the 150-mile "exclusion zone" Britain has declared around the Falklands, which Argentina calls the Malvinas. The Taiwan Fishery



Association said the fishing vessels demand compensation. A Taiwan fisheries official in the another Taiwanese trawler were more than 220 miles off the Falklands said one of 22 crewmen on wrecked by fire from the Argentine coast.

"Argentine authorities have acted in legitimate exercise of their power to police, in line with recognized international practice regarding the capture of trespassing ships. The government... laments the unwanted consequences of the incident, above all the unfortunate loss of human life, and trusts that foreign ships' respect for Argentina's norms and jurisdiction will in the future prevent a reiteration of such episodes."

Allies oppose scrapping SALT

HALIFAX, Nova Scotia (AP) — Some of the United States' closest allies, including Britain and Canada, on Thursday tried to dissuade the Reagan administration from scrapping the SALT II arms accord, officials at a NATO meeting said.

The split in the alliance's approach to SALT II emerged in the opening session of a North Atlantic Treaty Organization foreign ministers' meeting in this Canadian provincial capital.

The two-day meeting also was to focus on prospects for a breakthrough in the Geneva arms control talks and ways of responding to state-sponsored terrorism.

U.S. interested in test deal

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration said Thursday that although a Kremlin agreement to let American scientists monitor Soviet nuclear tests is a private pact, it wants to hear more about the plan when the scientists return home.

Under an agreement signed in Moscow by Soviet officials and Adrian W. DeWind, chairman of the Natural Resource Defense Council, a U.S. environmental group, American scientists would staff three seismic stations in the Soviet Union to monitor underground nuclear tests.

Installation of the stations is to start next month. In return, Soviet scientists would set up similar stations on private land in California to monitor U.S. tests in Nevada.

Nicaraguans' travel limited

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States has told Nicaragua that its diplomats cannot travel to the Los Angeles and San Francisco areas without obtaining U.S. permission, State Department officials said Thursday.

The move, effective May 17, was in retaliation for travel restrictions the Nicaraguan Sandinista government placed earlier on American diplomats in the Central American country, the officials said.

"United States reciprocal travel restrictions were imposed as part of an ongoing review of our embassy's relationship with the Sandinista regime," said State Department spokeswoman Sondra McCarthy. "It does not indicate a change in emphasis or of policy."

S. Africa seeks wide powers

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The South African government on Thursday declared it faces a revolutionary onslaught and needs sweeping new powers to maintain security, including the right to detain people without trial for 90 days.

"It is grossly unfair to compare South Africa's position with that of any other Western country," Deputy Information Minister Louis Nel said in a statement.

"The government says that the African National Congress, the main guerrilla organization fighting to end white rule, is communist-inspired."

Soon after Nel's statement, extremist white supporters of the neo-fascist Afrikaner Resistance Movement burst into a hall where Nel was addressing a governing National Party rally and disrupted the evening meeting with heckling, stamping and jeering.

Geldof blasts Africa session

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Rock star Bob Geldof blasted the U.N. General Assembly's special session on Africa as a farce Thursday, saying it lacked the spontaneity and generosity of his Live Aid and Sport Aid events.

While U.N. delegates haggled over a Plan of Action to overcome Africa's grave economic crisis, the jeans-clad Geldof appeared at a news conference here to pass scathing judgement on the session, which opened Tuesday and is to end Saturday.

"I don't think very much has been going on," Geldof said. "I think that to allocate — after 10 years of trying to get a special session on Africa — four days to deal with a continent in crisis is a farce unto itself."

U.S. envoy objects to new Berlin border order

BERLIN (AP) — The U.S. ambassador to West Germany met with a top Soviet envoy to criticize a new rule requiring diplomats traveling between East and West Berlin to present passports, but did not make a formal protest, sources said.

East German officials said they would stick to the rule.

U.S. Ambassador Richard Burt met at his West Berlin residence with the Soviet ambassador to East Germany, Vyacheslav I. Kochemasov, to discuss the policy, but did not deliver a formal protest to the Soviet Union, said the sources who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Before the rule took effect Monday, East Berlin-based diplomats only had to present identity cards when traveling between East Berlin and West Berlin.

East Germany has said it instituted the passport checks to thwart terrorism, but Western officials have said they fear the move is an attempt to force recognition of the Berlin Wall as an international border. The West says the wall is only a demarcation line.

"The Allies have never recognized measures by the GDR (East Germany), to hamper movement among the sectors of the city," said the sources.

Asked whether Burt delivered a formal protest

to the Soviet Union, the sources said: "We're not saying it's a protest. We're saying he raised the issue with him (Kochemasov)."

The sources said Burt spoke on behalf of the United States, France and Britain. The three countries take turns dealing with the Soviets concerning Berlin, and this month the job fell to the United States.

Thomas Homan, a spokesman for the U.S. diplomatic mission in West Berlin, said details of the meeting would probably be relayed to NATO countries and the spring meeting of the alliance's foreign ministers in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

French ignore report of payment for hostages

PARIS (AP) — Officials refused comment Thursday on a report that France has agreed to pay \$1 billion to Iran for the release of French hostages in Lebanon.

But the government makes no secret that the sum is the center of its dispute with Iran.

The report Wednesday night by CBS television followed signs that France is pursuing many courses to gain the release of the nine Frenchmen, including efforts to improve relations with Iran and Syria.

On May 23, Prime Minister Jacques Chirac's office gave a television station snapshots and short notes from four of the station's employees

who are among the hostages. Officials refused to say how they obtained the documents.

But a day earlier, Chirac talked by telephone with Syrian President Hafez Assad; and Iranian Vice Premier Ali Reza Moayeri ended a four-day visit to Paris. Moayeri was the highest ranking Iranian to visit Paris since the 1979 Iranian revolution that brought Islamic fundamentalist Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to power.

CBS News quoted unidentified sources as saying France had agreed to pay \$1 billion to Iran for the release of the hostages and a much lesser sum directly to the kidnapers. A Foreign

Ministry spokesman said later: "We don't comment on any reports concerning (the hostages)."

On Tuesday, Foreign Minister Jean-Bernard Raimond said efforts to free the hostages "appear to be progressing, in particular since contacts last week" with Iranian officials.

But on May 19, Raimond denied a report that Paris was negotiating ransom payments and the delivery of arms to Iran to obtain the hostages' freedom.

The Le Monde newspaper wrote Friday that "CBS without doubt is confusing here the negotiations... between Paris and Tehran on the reimbursement by France of a \$1 billion loan" to the Atomic Energy Commissariat.

Congressmen to accompany Bonner home

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two congressmen received permission Thursday from the Soviet Union to accompany dissident Yelena Bonner to Moscow, aides to the lawmakers said.

But Mrs. Bonner's son-in-law, Efram Yankelevich, said his wife, Tatiana, has been denied a visa to go with her mother to Moscow.

Mrs. Bonner, wife of physicist and human rights activist Andrei Sakharov, had asked Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., to go with her to

the Soviet capital. Mrs. Bonner came to Massachusetts in December for medical treatment and left Saturday for Europe. She is scheduled to return to the Soviet Union on Monday.

Frank asked Rep. Dan Lungren, R-Calif., to join him in the trip.

"Barney got a visa to accompany Mrs. Bonner. He received the visa, as did Mr. Lungren, this morning

from the Soviet consulate in Washington," said Douglas Cahn, Frank's top Washington aide.

Climb survivor, 16, regaining memory

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — A 16-year-old girl who survived the Mount Hood climbing tragedy that killed nine people, is regaining her memory and says the group was too weak to hike to safety, one of her doctors said.

Brinton Clark of Portland smiled and waved to photographers Wednesday, as she was moved from

Emanuel Hospital to a nearby rehabilitation center. She declined to speak to reporters.

Miss Clark was one of two people who survived three nights in a snow cave on the 11,235-foot mountain after the climbing group from Oregon Episcopal School became stranded two weeks ago by a severe storm. Seven students and two

teachers died.

Dr. William Long, head of the hospital trauma program, said Wednesday that Miss Clark had been unwilling to discuss the climbing accident with anyone but the hospital psychiatrist.

He said her memory had improved and she remembers some of her experience in the snow cave.

Long said the girl told the psychiatrist that "the option of them walking off the mountain together was never there. By the time they built the ice cave, they were all too weak."

Miss Clark's spirits are good, Long said, and she began seeing friends from school last Friday. She probably will be discharged from the rehabilitation center in two or three weeks, he said.

"She and her family felt that going home would be premature," Long said. "She was not ready to sever the sort of umbilical cord of the hospital.... It was her decision."

Long said Miss Clark was unable to feed herself or move freely without the aid of a walker.

Another of Miss Clark's doctors, Patrick Radecki, said the girl was experiencing a lack of endurance and general weakness in the hands, but he said there is "a very good chance" she will regain normal use of her hands.

Long said Miss Clark wanted to make herself available to the parents of the youngsters killed in the tragedy and intended to talk about it to the news media. He said she also expressed an interest in talking with the other survivor, 16-year-old Giles Thompson of Longview, Wash.

Thompson was responding Wednesday to antibiotics being used to treat a bacterial infection in his chest. Thompson remained in serious but stable condition, at Providence Medical Center.

Dr. Craig Wood, a specialist in infectious diseases, said Thompson's temperature had returned to near normal and his white cell count had improved. The infection resulted from open-heart surgery performed to warm Thompson's blood shortly

after he was found in the cave May 15.

It will be several days before doctors know if surgery is needed to treat the infection, Wood said. Thompson's lower legs were amputated last week to remove gangrenous tissue that threatened his life.

Thompson, who was alert and responding to doctors' questions Wednesday, was doing well considering what he had been through, Wood said.

Meanwhile, officials of Oregon Episcopal School have decided to re-evaluate a program that requires students to climb Mount Hood.

Mariann Koop, spokeswoman for the school, said there would be investigations of the disaster by insurance companies and rescue groups, but that the school's probe would be slightly different.

"Its purpose is to go beyond the facts, to evaluate the future of wilderness education at the school," she said.

In previous statements, the school's board of trustees had said it was committed to the four-year wilderness program, which is called Basecamp.

Students who do not take the course are allowed an alternative of community service, but nearly every Oregon Episcopal student opts to participate in the course and the climb.

Other climbs scheduled for this spring have been canceled by the school.

City prepares fight against zoning ruling

TWIN FALLS — The city of Twin Falls will fight to keep its comprehensive land use plan intact, despite a recent 5th District Court decision ruling it invalid, says City Attorney Shane Bengoechea.

The city has called in a consulting attorney, Michael Moore of Boise, who specializes in municipal issues, to help the city decide what legal steps to take next, Bengoechea says.

"I don't want to leave a stone unturned; we can't afford to miss one little thing," he says.

Most likely, the first step will be re-enacting the comprehensive zoning plan under a section of Idaho code that allows emergency adoption of rules. If there is an "imminent peril to the public health, safety or welfare."

The law would then give the city as many as 180 days to post notices, hold public hearings and publish plans for a normal adoption of either the former comprehensive zoning plan or a new one.

Deputy Attorney General Warren Felton has advised the city that the emergency zoning provisions would be appropriate, Bengoechea says. The city has requested a written opinion.

comprehensive plan is not among the solutions being considered by the city.

"We're not really interested in enforcing the old plan," Bengoechea says. "We've been enforcing a new code that is more liberal than the old code. Enforcing the old one would be regressive."

City officials say they also plan to continue their fight to keep professional offices off a section of Addison Avenue zoned for residential use — the issue that originally brought problems with the zoning law to the court's attention.

State Rep. Jeff Stoker, R-Twin Falls, and other homeowners on Addison Avenue filed suit against the city after the City Council ruled that homes on a section of Addison just west of Blue Lakes Boulevard should not be converted to offices. Stoker opened a law office at 733 Addison Ave. anyway, saying that city zoning codes were invalid.

One possibility to close Stoker's office may be returning to allegations that it violates the Uniform Building Code, Bengoechea says. The city has alleged that his office has insufficient floor support and has ceiling and floor assemblies that do not meet fire safety standards.

A week ago Hurlbutt ruled that the city's comprehensive land use plan is invalid. He said that the city had bungled the procedures for adopting zoning codes so badly that it became impossible for residents to determine what laws were discussed and passed. Both the spirit and the letter of the law were violated, he said.

"The city's position that slight errors in the adoption process will not invalidate ordinances is well-founded," Hurlbutt wrote in a 22-page decision. "However, after construing the law as liberally as the law will allow, the court is incapable of identifying what was debated before the public, what was adopted by the city, and whether that which is being currently enforced was ever adopted at all. The adoption process involved one defect after another."

Private card club wins P&Z permit

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission gave final approval Thursday, in a 4-3 vote, for a special use permit allowing a private card club on Falls Avenue, across from the College of Southern Idaho.

It was the fourth time the card players had come before city boards to argue that a building for private groups of duplicate bridge players was an appropriate use of residential property.

The approval came despite comments from Councilman Jim Vickers, liaison to the commission, who questioned whether the planned landscaping was adequate for a facility that was being considered a country club for zoning purposes.

City code restricts residential development to only a few, mostly outdoor, uses other than homes, so the City Council agreed to stretch code provisions that allow country clubs in residential neighborhoods to include card clubs.

That decision overturned a previous decision by the commission that a card club lacked the acres of greenery associated with country clubs and could not be considered one.

The final plans for the card clubhouse call for about 10 percent of the property to be landscaped with trees and bushes but without grass, to keep maintenance costs low. A colored-rock or cedar-chip covering will be used instead in landscaped areas, said card player Stephen Feldman.

Plans show a 15-foot-wide band of landscaping along Falls Avenue, with eight trees and bushes. The plans include 23 trees and bushes, on about 41,000 square feet of land.

About half of the land, behind the clubhouse, would be left unchanged except to mow down weeds. Five junipers, or possibly Austrian pines, are planned to shield the back of the property from adjoining homes.

"I don't see them spending much on landscaping," Vickers said. "I can't see five or six shrubs lined up

in a weed patch. If you are going to develop it, let's do it right."

The commission had voted to grant a special use permit at its regular Tuesday evening meeting, but said that final approval would depend on whether landscaping, site and building plans furnished Thursday appeared to fit in with the neighborhood.

"We're concerned with the fact that in a residential area with \$70,000 to \$100,000 homes, it's a metal building," said Mike Glenn Tuesday. Glenn owns a home behind the card club property. "Allowing a metal building in a residential area opens a can of worms."

Plans presented Thursday showed four windows and a wood-product front on the metal structure. Other sides would be covered with horizontal metal siding, having a wood-grain texture.

The clubhouse will be constructed by Harold Bulcher of Jerome. He plans to open the building three afternoons and two evenings a week for private bridge clubs.

His investment in the club will subsidize his hobby, but he is not likely to break even on the venture, he said at an earlier meeting. Now area bridge clubs are dependent on churches, with changing schedules and poor lighting. The clubs do not play for money or prizes.

The commission's decision Thursday is final, unless the Glenns or other neighbors appeal once again to the City Council.

Ironically, even though the council overturned the commission's original decision and supported a loose interpretation of the code, some on the council did not appear inclined to support approval of a special use permit for a card club on Falls Avenue.

Councilman Erik Andersen said that although he thought card clubs should be allowed in some residential neighborhoods, the area across from CSI is probably not one of them.

Voting in favor of the special use permits were: Tom Moore, Henri Le Moyne, Joan Brawley and Gary Custer. Opposing were Greg Ruddell, Gary Karnes and Glenn Arrington.

Andrus: Proud of service under Carter

TWIN FALLS — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Cecil Andrus said Thursday he has no more regrets about his service in the Carter administration than he is of having served in the Korean War.

Speaking to a Thursday noon meeting of the Twin Falls Optimists club that was liberally spiced with conservative questioners, Andrus said he was secretary of the Department of Interior was the line of service to the country, not something he was brought up to believe in. "When the president asked you to do something, you did it," he said.

To a questioner who said he doesn't remember Andrus' term as governor and only associates Andrus with former president Jimmy Carter's administration, which he said was a bad one, Andrus replied, "If you want to hold Jimmy Carter's administration against me as an individual, that's your business."

Andrus said that American Falls wheat sold for \$4.40 a bushel while Carter was president and the same wheat now brings \$2.70 a bushel. He also said that as interior secretary, he brought a \$18 million check to Idaho for the American Falls Dam and helped draft and pass the rangeland improvement bill that set in motion reseeded of over-grazed areas. He said that if Idaho needs someone to go to bat for them in Washington, he knows the system.

Another questioner asked Andrus if his recent criticisms of legislative leadership were not also implied criticisms of fellow Democrat, Gov. John Evans. Andrus said Evans was unable to push his plans through because legislative leadership refused to meet or cooperate with him.

"John Evans was a threat because he was running for the U.S. Senate," Andrus said, charging that Republican legislative leaders made a decision to block any possible success Evans could use to his political advantage.

Andrus said he has been to Washington and doesn't want to go back and won't be a threat to Republicans.

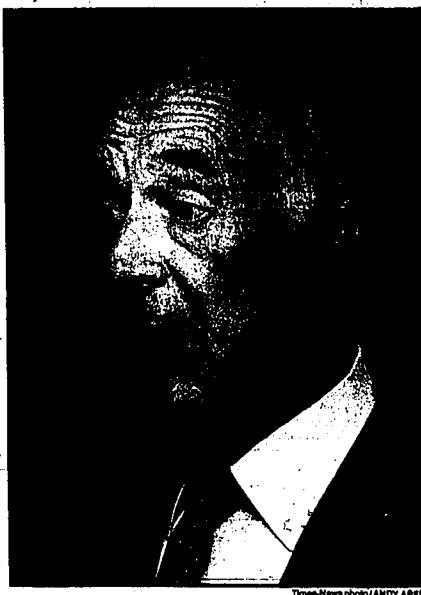
Andrus went on to say that his opponent David Leroy was in a position to change the direction of last winter's legislative session and did not. "He has held the highest Republican office in the state for several years. If he will have influence next year, why didn't he have influence this year? He's had plenty of opportunity to display that leadership," Andrus said.

The former governor said he has nothing against Leroy, and added that Leroy is the only non-Democrat in his family "and that was after he became a lawyer and moved to Ada County."

Contacted in Boise Thursday, Leroy said he became a Republican in 1964, when he was a senior in high school, and has been involved in the party ever since. He said he has one brother who is a Democrat, but that his mother was an officer of the Nez Perce County Republican Women's Club before she died.

Twin Falls Republican Party Chairman Mark Stubbs grilled Andrus on his stand against the right-to-work law, saying that Andrus could not be pushing for economic development very hard if corporate relocation firms cite the law as a determining factor in decisions to move businesses.

Andrus said that neither Hewlett-Packard in Boise nor Stouffers Foods Corporation, which nearly moved to Twin Falls, felt a right-to-work law

School levy vote set again

Castleford planning to drop some sports

CASCADE — The Castleford School Board is planning to eliminate some sports and extracurricular programs and to cut back on maintenance at the new high school to make up for lost funds following the defeat last week of a \$75,000 override levy.

However, the board also decided Tuesday to give school patrons one more chance to approve a supplemental levy and set another election June 24. This time, board members will divide the \$75,000 override into parts and let taxpayers select which portions of the override they are willing to fund.

About 30 people attended a special school board meeting Tuesday to review a 1987 budget proposal by Superintendent Ron Erickson. Because of the levy defeat, the budget was reduced to reflect an anticipated \$61,517 shortfall in state funds and the need to pay for asbestos removal and other required repairs, he said.

"I have gone back through it, and I have eliminated \$75,000," said Erickson. The board must approve a balanced budget by June 15, he said. Some cutbacks may be restored, depending on the outcome of the levy election. The board will meet again next week to decide how the "line item" override proposal will be drawn up.

Track and wrestling were cut from the athletic program, and basketball and volleyball schedules were reduced to save on transportation costs. Other proposed cutbacks include eliminating the positions of one custodian and a part-time secretary, cutting back on maintenance at the new high school and delaying the start-up of a special education program in the high school. There will be no increase in salaries for teachers or for the superintendent.

The proposed budget also cuts out the activities program. Principal Julius Domowitz said losing this program means there will be no Future Homemakers of America or Future Farmers of America, badminton, awards assemblies or graduation exercises.

Both parents and school officials expressed concern over the loss of the sports and activities programs.

"Cutting out athletics is the kiss of death," Erickson said. "We will lose a unifying factor in our school. It can do damage that we can not recover from."

He said Castleford will lose its ability to participate in athletic conferences.

"There is no guarantee that they will take us back," he said.

Sun Valley opposes proposed taxing district for hospital

SUN-VALLEY — A resolution opposing the creation of a hospital taxing district for the Blaine County Medical Center was passed by the Sun Valley City Council Thursday.

Worked out with members of Board of Trustees for Moritz Community Hospital in Sun Valley during the last two days, the resolution offers two alternatives to include Moritz in a taxing district if one is created.

The council will present its resolution to the Blaine County Board of Commissioners

before it meets today to discuss setting an election on the district proposed by the county hospital's board of trustees. The board takes up the matter at 2:30 p.m. in the county courthouse in Halley.

Sun Valley council members said they oppose the creation of the proposed district because it gives no incentive to manage a hospital responsibly, and, as Mayor Ruth Lieder said, because it would penalize Moritz for operating in a "fiscally responsible manner."

They also opposed the proposed county-wide district, which must go to vote because it would be unfair for north county

residents to help pay for a hospital they don't use, especially Sun Valley residents who support Moritz through property taxes. However, the resolution includes two alternatives for the makeup of hospital taxing districts if the commissioners decide to set an election to settle the issue through the county voters.

As its first alternative, the council said it wants the commissioners to create two taxing districts separating the north county area from the south county and providing support for each hospital separately.

The second alternative would allow for one district that would support both hospitals

and with the tax money distributed "equally to each ... to promote the best quality health care in the entire district."

The second alternative also would limit any authority the taxing district would have over each hospital. By statute when the district is created, the board of trustees would be formed to oversee the administration of tax money.

Sun Valley wants the new board of trustees' authority to be limited only to overseeing the tax-collected funds taken by the district. At the same time, each hospital's existing trustees would stay intact to administer the use of other revenues and oversee the normal operations of the

hospitals. Sun Valley also will ask that when the new board of trustees is formed that they represent specific geographical areas of the county to assure the north county proper representation. Trustees of the county hospital had originally proposed only a south county district to support the hospital but opted for a county-wide district at the insistence of the Blaine County Board of Commissioners.

The commission's plan for a district covering a portion of the county would be unfair to taxpayers within it, have the authority to change the boundaries of the district.

Sex 'gameplayer' to be sentenced

TWIN FALLS — A former Twin Falls woman will be sentenced July 28 for her participation in "sex games" with children two years ago.

Barbara Montague, 35, also known as Barbara Abbott, pleaded guilty in April to a felony charge of lewd conduct with a minor boy. The incidents took place between June 1, 1984, and July 31, 1984, during games called "Truth or Dare."

At a hearing last week, 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl released Montague on her own recognizance and allowed her to leave in Redding, Calif., until the sentencing. The release carried the stipulation that Montague be accepted in a counseling program in Redding, where she has a job, said her attorney Mike Powers.

Montague also agreed to contact her attorney every two weeks and have no contact with the victim.

Montague originally had been charged with three counts of lewd conduct, which carries a maximum sentence of life imprisonment, for alleged molesting of another boy and a girl under the age of 15 years during the "sex games." In a plea arrangement, however, two of the lewd conduct charges and an insufficient-fund check charge were dropped against the woman, according to court records.

Montague's former live-in companion, 25-year-old Dennis Eugene Abbott, had been sentenced to life imprisonment May 13 for his participation in the sex games with the children.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt retried jurisdiction in the case for four months and ordered Abbott to a sex offenders program at the state rehabilitation center in Cottonwood. At the end of that period, Abbott will be returned to court to determine whether he will be released on probation or ordered to serve the remainder of his sentence.

Abbott also had been charged with three counts of lewd conduct. But as with Montague, two charges had been dropped in a plea negotiation. Abbott ended up pleading guilty to a charge of fondling a minor girl and forcing her to have sexual contact with other children during the sex games.

Survey set on courses

Ketchum P&Z tables planned hotel project

KETCHUM — Saying the developer should again look closely at the concerns of residential neighbors, the Ketchum Planning and Zoning Commission for the second time this month tabled plans for a new hotel at the southern entrance to town.

Despite developer Joe Koening's changes to the original plan that the commission and neighboring property owners said they liked, the commission still objected to the height of the proposed three-story, 51-unit building and its effect on the views from nearby residential lots.

The commission will meet at noon on Friday to reconsider the plan that meets all the city's requirements for the tourist zone. The plan, however, has come under attack from neighbors because the high-density tourist zone abuts a low-density residential zone, an unusual occurrence in the city.

The commission asked Koening to reconsider the following items:

• Dropping the height of the building from 35 feet, the maximum height the city allows.

Several property owners behind the site, located on the east side of Idaho 75 and south of the highway's crossing of Trail Creek, have com-

plained the hotel will block their views of the mountains to the west including Bald Mountain.

Koening has said he needs the height to provide enough rooms to make the project profitable and to create the design he wants: a pitched-roof, alpine scheme.

• Provide a white landscape plan that will include a buffer to the homes and lots behind the hotel.

• Review the traffic circulation with the city's fire chief and to reconsider the storage area for garbage cans.

Since Koening first presented the plan earlier this month, the commission has played the role of peacemaker by trying to relieve the concerns of the neighbors and the desires of Koening.

"Somebody's got to make a move here," said Commission Member Frank Kemp after both sides seemed unwilling to make any further concession at Tuesday's meeting.

Following the commission's first review of the project two weeks ago, Koening made several changes in the exterior design to alleviate the concerns of the neighbors. Parking and traffic patterns received the most attention in the revisions.

There are no minimum number of sports required for participation by a school in IHSAA activities, although the conference bylaws require that its member schools play every sport — boys' and girls' basketball and volleyball and once in football.

The school's track team is coached by Hal Jardine, the athletic director at Castelford High. David Schmidt coaches the wrestling team.

In addition to boys' and girls' basketball and volleyball, the school also has a football program. Castelford won the state A-4 boys' basketball championship last winter, the first in the school's history.

Castelford is losing its football and boys' basketball coach, Dick Schurke, because of a reduction in force.

Some members of the audience offered suggestions for more cuts in other areas, such as the office and the library.

"We'll lose our kids without athletics," said a parent. "Sometimes athletics is all that's keeping a kid in school."

However, board members said they must choose between activities and classes.

"I hate to see us cut activities," said Trustee Judy Heath, "but if at all possible I don't think we should cut their vocational programs."

"The vocational programs are basic life skills," said Chairman Jon Wells.

Erickson said the business education, home economics and vocational-agriculture program could be dropped, but all of the equipment

bought for these programs with special funds would have to go back into the state treasury and the programs were started up, again, he said.

The high school physical education program is required for graduation and was left in the budget, Erickson said he tried to leave in everything needed to keep the high school's accreditation.

At the elementary school, the physical education program was cut as was one aide position, Erickson said the size of some of the classes in the elementary school would increase as a result.

The loss of a full-time custodian and student workers may result in some maintenance problems, he said. He said the custodian will take care of the grounds, the halls and restrooms and snow removal only.

"I hate to see that with this new high school building, but I chose that option rather than cut too many instructional programs," he said.

And, he expressed regret for not being able to find a special education program.

"We will not be able to provide for secondary special education students next year," said Erickson, "and we have kids who need this program."

To reduce transportation costs, buses will be used only for bringing students to and from school and will not be used for field trips, he said.

The new budget provides no money for any equipment repairs. However,

some repairs were written into the budget, because they must be done this year, include removing asbestos and reinsulating the boiler and pipes in the elementary building, rewiring the vo-ag building to bring it up to code and adding an emergency exit to the special education room.

"If you don't want this budget, there are some other alternatives," Erickson told the board. "But for everything you put back in, you will have to take something out so it balances."

Another alternative is to eliminate an elementary teacher and combine the fourth and fifth grades, but this option would be very detrimental, said Erickson.

"These options have more long-term impact on the goals of this school than those I have taken out," he said. "If you choose one of these alternatives, you are looking at a severe impact on our educational program."

Bird lifts Celtics to 2-0 advantage

BOSTON — Larry Bird celebrated his third consecutive regular-season Most Valuable Player award with a blue-ribbon playoff performance against the Houston Rockets Thursday night.

Bird scored 31 points on 12-for-19 shooting, including three-for-five from a three-point range, as the Celtics took a 2-0 lead in the NBA championship series. Once again, Boston put the game out of reach in the third quarter en route to winning its 40th consecutive home game since Dec. 6.

"When he plays, the world looks at him," Boston Coach K.C. Jones said. "He's the epitome of what great ballplayers are about."

"No one is going to cover him with one man," Houston Coach Bill Fitch said. "He keeps getting better and better. When it starts, when he gets his rhythm, when he gets it going, he's in a world of his own."

The 90-degree temperatures in 57-year-old Boston Garden — that is not air conditioned — were reminis-

cent of another steamy night two years ago when the Los Angeles Lakers willed in the beat and lost to the Celtics in the final series.

But the atmosphere was no hotter than Bird's shooting hand, as he had the sellout crowd of 14,890 chanting "MVP, MVP" with each long-range basket.

"He's the best I've ever seen play," Houston's leading scorer, Akpeke Olujuwo, said. "He can shoot from everywhere."

"Larry Bird gets my vote as the best total player of all time," Jones added.

The victory allowed the Celtics to maintain their homecourt advantage in the best-of-seven series, although the next three games are scheduled for Houston's Summit on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday.

"We wanted to come out strong tonight," Kevin McHale, who followed Bird with 25 points, said. "We came out really fired up. Last year, the series was lost right here in the second game. We're thinking Game 3. If we get it, we know it will be hard for them to come back."

Last season, when the Celtics lost for only the second time in what is now 18 finals appearances, the loss to the Lakers in Game 2 and fell 4-2 in the series.

If Boston can win the next two, it will have its 16th title in 18 trips to the finals. With that sweep, the Celtics also would have the best regular-season-playoff record in NBA history. The 1971-72 Los Angeles Lakers were 69-13 in the regular season and 12-3 in the playoffs for the all-time best overall record of 81-18. The Celtics, 67-15 this season, would finish 15-1 with a sweep for a combined 82-15.

The Rockets had cut a 10-point halftime deficit to 64-56 early in the third quarter before Bird completed an 11-1 streak with a three-pointer and a long two-point jumper for a 75-57 margin. Boston outscored the Rockets 34-19 in the third quarter for a 94-69 lead. The Celtics continued to expand on that advantage for most of the rest of the game, leading by as many as 27 points in the fourth quarter.

Dennis Johnson added 18 for the



the Rockets' 19-year history, the first four of which the team was located in San Diego.

Only four teams in NBA history came back from a 2-0 deficit to win a playoff series. Two of those comebacks came in the finals, with Boston beating the Lakers in seven games in 1969 and Portland rallying to win four straight against Philadelphia in 1977.

The Celtics started the game by hitting five of their first six shots, including a three-pointer by Bird that gave them an 11-4 lead.

Sun Valley opposes proposed taxing district for hospital

SUN VALLEY — A resolution opposing the creation of a hospital taxing district for the Blaine County Medical Center was passed by the Sun Valley City Council Thursday.

Worked out with members of Board of Trustees for Mottet Community Hospital in Sun Valley during the last two days, the resolution also offers two alternatives to include Mottet in a taxing district if one is created.

The council will present its resolution to the Blaine County Board of Commissioners

before it meets today to discuss setting an election on the district proposed by the county-hospital's board of trustees. The board takes up the matter at 2:30 p.m. in the county courthouse in Halley.

Sun Valley council members said they oppose the creation of the proposed district because it gives no incentive to manage a hospital responsibly, and as Mayor Ruth Bledsoe said, because it would penalize Mottet for operating in a "fiscally responsible manner."

They also opposed the proposed county-wide district, which must go to a vote, because it would be unfair for north county

residents to help pay for a hospital they don't use, especially Sun Valley residents who support Mottet through property taxes. However, the resolution includes two alternatives for the making of hospital taxing districts if the commissioners decide to set an election to settle the issue through the county voters.

As its first alternative, the council said it wants the commissioners to create two taxing districts separating the north county area from the south county and providing support for each hospital separately.

The second alternative would allow for one district that, would support both hospitals

and with the tax money distributed "equally to each . . . to promote the best quality health care in the district." The second alternative also would limit any authority the taxing district would have over each hospital. By statute when the new district is created a new board of trustees would be formed to oversee the administration of tax money.

They want the new board of trustees' authority to be limited only to overseeing the tax-collected funds taken by the district. At the same time, each hospital's existing trustees would stay intact to administer the use of other revenues and oversee the normal operations of the

hospitals. Sun Valley also will ask that when the new board of trustees is formed that they represent specific geographical areas of the county to assure the north county proper representation.

The trustees of the county hospital had originally proposed only a south county district to support the hospital but opted for a county-wide district at the insistence of the Blaine County Board of Commissioners. The commissioners, who said a district covering only a portion of the county would be unfair to taxpayers within it, have the authority to change the boundaries of the district.

Sex 'gameplayer' to be sentenced

TWIN FALLS — A former Twin Falls woman will be sentenced July 28 for her participation in "sex games" with children two years ago. Barbara Montague, 35, also known as Barbara Abbott, pleaded guilty April to a felony charge of lewd conduct with a minor boy. The incidents took place between June 1, 1984, and July 31, 1984, during games called "Truth or Dare."

Montague also agreed to contact her attorney every two weeks and have no contact with the victim. Montague originally had been charged with three counts of lewd conduct, which carries a maximum sentence of life imprisonment; for alleged molesting of another boy and a girl under the age of 16 years during the "sex games." In a plea arrangement, however, two of the lewd conduct charges and an incest charge and check charge were dropped against the woman, according to court records.

Montague's former live-in companion, 25-year-old Dennis Eugene Abbott, had been sentenced to life imprisonment May 13 for his participation in the sex games with the children. Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurbutt retained jurisdiction in the case for four months and ordered Abbott to a sex offenders program at the state rehabilitation center in Cottonwood. At the end of that period, Abbott will be returned to court to determine whether he will be released on probation or ordered to serve the remainder of his sentence.

Although the other schools in the conference all have track programs, only one other — Oakley — offers a wrestling program.

bought for these programs with special funds would have to go back to the state. New equipment would have to be repurchased when the programs were started up again, he said.

some repairs were written into the budget because they must be done this year, include removing asbestos and re-insulating the boiler and pipes in the elementary building, rewiring the vo-ag building to bring it up to code and adding an emergency exit to the special education room.

The high school physical education program is required for graduation and was left in the budget, Erickson said he tried to leave in everything needed to keep the high school's accreditation.

"If you don't want this budget, there are some other alternatives," Erickson said to the board. "But for everything you put back in, you will have to take something out, so it balances."

Dropping Castleford from the MVC would require the approval of the District 4 High School Activities Association and the Idaho High School Activities Association, as well as the other schools in the conference. There are no minimum number of sports required for participation by a school in IHSAA activities, although the conference bylaws require that its member schools play every other school in the league at least twice in boys' and girls' basketball and volleyball and once in football.

Another alternative is to eliminate an elementary teacher and combine the fourth and fifth grades, but this option would be very detrimental, said Erickson.

The school's track team is coached by Hal Jardine, the athletic director at Castleford High. David Schmidt coaches the wrestling team.

"These options have more long-term impact on the goals of this school than those I have taken out," he said. "If you choose one of these alternatives, you are looking at a severe impact on our educational program."

In addition to boys' and girls' basketball and volleyball, the school also has a football program. Castleford won the state A-4 boys' basketball championship last winter, the first in the school's history.

"To reduce transportation costs, buses will be used only to bring students to and from school and will not be used for field trips, he said. The new budget provides no money for any equipment repairs. However,

"We'll lose our kids without athletics," said a parent. "Sometimes athletics is all that's keeping a kid in school."

And, he expressed regret for not being able to fund a special education program.

"I hate to see that with all the money we have in the state," said Trustee Judy Heath, "but if at all possible I don't think we should cut their vocational programs."

"The vocational programs are basic life skills," said Chairman Jon Wells.

Erickson said the business education, economics and vocational agriculture program could be dropped, but all of the equipment

Bird lifts Celtics to 2-0 advantage

BOSTON — Larry Bird celebrated his third consecutive regular-season Most Valuable Player award with a blue-ribbon playoff performance against the Houston Rockets Thursday night.

Bird scored 31 points on 12-for-19 shooting, including three-for-five from three-point range, as the Celtics took a 2-0 lead in the NBA championship series. Once again, Boston put the game out of reach in the third quarter en route to winning its 40th consecutive home game since Dec. 6.

"When he plays, the world looks and listens," Boston Coach K.C. Jones said. "He's the epitome of what great ballplayers are about."

"No one is going to cover him with one man," Houston Coach Bill Fitch said. "He keeps getting better and better. When it starts, when he gets his rhythm, when he gets it going, he's in a world of his own."

The 90-degree temperatures in 57-year-old Boston Garden — that is not air conditioned — were reminis-

cent of another steamy night two years ago when the Los Angeles Lakers willed in the heat and lost to the Celtics in the final series.

But the atmosphere was no hotter than Bird's shooting hand, as he had the loudest crowd of 14,890 chanting "MVP, MVP" with each long-range basket.

"He's the best I've ever seen play," Houston's leading scorer, Akeme Olajuwon, said. "He can shoot from everywhere." "Larry Bird gets my vote as the best total player of all time," Jones added.

The victory allowed the Celtics to maintain their homecourt advantage in the best-of-seven series, although the next three games are scheduled for Houston's Summit on Sunday, Tuesday and Thursday. "We wanted to come out strong tonight," Kevin McHale, who followed Bird with 25 points, said. "We came out really fired up. Last year, the series was lost right here in the second game. We're thinking Game 3. If we get it, we know it will be hard for them to come back."

Last season, when the Celtics lost for only the second time in what is now 18 finals appearances, the loss to the Lakers in Game 2 and fell 4-2 in the series.

If Boston can win the next two, it will have its 16th title in 18 trips to the finals. With that sweep, the Celtics also would have the best regular-season-playoff record in NBA history. The 1971-72 Los Angeles Lakers were 69-13 in the regular season and 12-3 in the playoffs for the all-time best overall record of 81-16. The Celtics, 67-15 this season, would finish 15-1 with a sweep for a combined 82-16.

The Rockets had cut a 10-point halftime deficit to 64-56 early in the third quarter before Bird completed an 11-1 streak with a three-pointer and a long two-point jumper for a 75-57 margin. Boston outscored the Rockets 34-19 in the third quarter for a 94-69 lead. The Celtics continued to expand on that advantage for most of the rest of the game, leading by as many as 27 points in the fourth quarter.

Dennis Johnson added 18 for the



Celtics. Olajuwon, who scored 33 points for Houston in its 112-100 loss in Game 1, paced the Rockets with 21.

Ralph Sampson, who had only two points in the opener, came back with 18 for Houston despite sustaining a cut under his left eye that required stitches in the second quarter.

The Rockets and Celtics met once before in the finals, in 1981, with Boston winning 4-2. It was the only trip to the championship series in

the Rockets' 19-year history, the first four of which the team was located in San Diego.

Only four teams in NBA history came back from a 2-0 deficit to win a playoff series. Two of those comebacks came in the finals, with Boston beating the Lakers in seven games in 1969 and Portland rallying to win four straight against Philadelphia in 1977.

The Celtics started the game by hitting five of their first six shots, including a three-pointer by Bird that gave them an 11-1 lead.

HOUSTON (AP) — Houston's 112-100 victory over Boston in Game 2 of the NBA Finals Thursday night was the first time since 1977 that a team has won a game after losing the first two of a best-of-seven series.

BOSTON (AP) — Larry Bird scored 31 points and led the Boston Celtics to a 94-69 victory over the Houston Rockets in Game 2 of the NBA Finals Thursday night.

Bird's 31 points, including 11 three-pointers, were the most in a game since he scored 30 in Game 1. He also had 10 rebounds and six assists. Houston's Akeme Olajuwon scored 33 points, but the Rockets were unable to overcome a 10-point deficit at halftime.

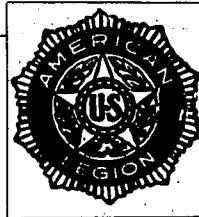

Fryar, others subject of NFL probe

BOSTON (AP) — A spokesman for the National Football League acknowledged Thursday the league was investigating allegations that New England Patriots wide receiver Irving Fryar and other members of the team bet on football games last season "in the same fashion as we routinely review rumors of this type."

The New York Times reported Friday that Sherwood Blount, an agent recently retained by Fryar, said Thursday that Fryar has denied published reports that he placed bets on NFL games. Blount said

Fryar "informed us that there is no truth to the allegations. We stand by our client and we will do everything we can to help him with this matter."

Blount also said Fryar would make no public comment.

The Boston Globe reported Warren Welch, director of NFL security, had confirmed Wednesday that an investigation was under way.

Welch was unavailable for comment Thursday. He told the Globe that "we never comment one way or another about

any ongoing investigation."

But Joe Browne, public-relations spokesman for the league, confirmed Thursday the report was being checked out.

"We are looking into the matter in the same fashion as we routinely review rumors of this type," he said. "We will have no further comment until the review is complete."

The Globe said it was not certain whether any of the alleged betting occurred on any Patriots games or on the Super Bowl, which New England lost to Chicago 46-10.

South's primary thrust was aimed at bringing in dummy's club suit. Not a hopeless plan, but better had it been deferred while other possibilities were explored.

South won the first spade and passed the club. South and West continued with a third spade to clear the suit. When West discarded on the second club led toward dummy, the game was gone. Dummy's ace won and the diamond ace was attacked, but the defense scored three spades, a diamond and a club for one down.

It is true that today's club suit was the most attractive one for South to develop. However, there was no need to do it immediately.

After winning the first spade, South should play the top three hearts. When this suit splits to provide four tricks, the sure way to take nine tricks is to develop two sure winners in diamonds, leaving the club suit for another day. West's diamond ace is isolated while South still has a spade stopper, and instead of one down, South scores his game and rubber.



South's primary thrust was aimed at bringing in dummy's club suit. Not a hopeless plan, but bettered; it had been deferred while other possibilities were explored.

South won the first spade and passed the club six. East winning with his king. This was a clever play by East which gave South some false hopes, but the game was already destined for defeat.

East returned a spade, which South ducked to West, but West continued with a third spade to clear the suit. When West discarded on the second club led toward dummy, the game was gone. Dummy's ace won and the diamond ace was attacked, but the defense scored three spades, a diamond and a club for one down.

It is true that today's club suit was the most attractive one for South to develop. However, there was no need to do it immediately. After winning the first spade, South should play the top three hearts. When this suit splits to provide four tricks, the sure way to nine tricks is to develop two sure winners in diamonds, leaving the club suit for another day. West's diamond ace is disclosed while South still has a spade stopper, and instead of one down, South scores his game and rubber.

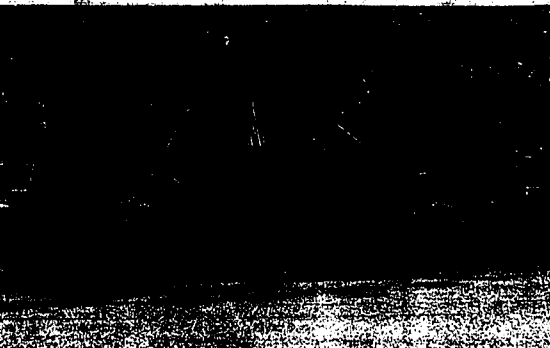

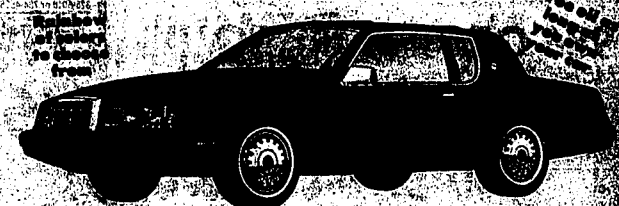

Idaho bands sing out at jamboree in park

Country music picks up Western Days theme

TWIN FALLS — The air temperature won't be all that sizzling at noontime Sunday when four of Idaho's best country western bands pick up a first-time jam for Twin Falls Western Days Jamboree and Bar-B-Que in City Park.

Straight Arrow, outrageous KEPP radio personality, will be on hand as master of ceremonies during six hours of music by Muzzle and Billy Braun, the Michael Wendling Band, Pinto Bennett's Famous Motel Cowboy Band and the Mores Creek String Band.

For Muzzle Braun, the jamboree session climaxes the better part of a week of performances in Twin Falls. He will have just wrapped up evening shows, May 28-31, at the Sandpiper with fellow musician and singer, Joel Kasserman of Moscow.

— Besides Kasserman, Braun will be joined by his brother Billy for the Western Days Jamboree. It will be the first time in many years that Muzzle and Billy have appeared together in Twin Falls.

In addition, Muzzle's four sons, Cody, Willie, Gary and Micky, will join the older trio to show what a third generation of Brauns can do with music and song.

Muzzle, whose parents were the late Musty and Becky Braun — both well-known musicians — is a Twin Falls native who began entertaining professionally in the late 1960s with brothers Gary and Billy. With one or both of his brothers, he has recorded the albums "Old Cowboy Blues," "Heart of Idaho" and "Born 100 Years Too Late."

His newest album, "Muzzle," on his own Idaho Records label, features his talents as well as those of his brothers and a dozen other Idaho artists. Songs from that album to be heard Sunday will include "The Roy Rogers original," "Beyond the Hills of Idaho," as well as "The Girl From The Canyon" and "In The Arms Of The Wild Wild West."

Describing his own music, Muzzle says, "It's country music — and country music seems to fit in any region."

Michael Wendling is a home-grown product of Twin Falls who now calls Hagerman home. Music has always been a part of his life. He and his banjo became favorites at Twin Falls High School assemblies in the mid-60s before he graduated from there and became a professional musician.

One of Wendling's early exposures came in the late '60s during an impromptu performance at a party in Sun Valley when he entertained a clutch of the Kennedy clan, John Glenn, Jim Whitaker, Andy Williams and other notables.

Since then, he has performed with a number of top groups and individuals including Fleetwood Mac, the Nitty Gritty Dirt Band and Doc Watson.

In 1968, he toured Alaska with the USO. From 1969 to 1971 he served in the armed forces, then returned to Idaho and recorded the album "Springtime in the White Clouds" with the foursome, Whitewater.

Currently president of Sheepeater Records, Wendling has participated in 11 albums, including the latest, "Blame It On The Band."

The Michael Wendling Band is composed of Wendling and Garin Yost, Twin Falls; Bruce Alkire, Gardena; Kenny Saunders, Emmett; and Larry Bond, Mountain Home.

Pinto Bennett, Mountain Home, appears to be riding a musical stallion to the big time. An April 16 edition of USA TODAY says this of Bennett: "Regional favorite Bennett sings with all the heart of an early Ray Price, has a country swing band of major-league quality, and writes songs like a music master."

That comment came in regard to Bennett's latest record album, "Famous Cowboy Motel Songs," produced by Sheepeater Records. Those who haven't heard his album and, not knowing what to expect Sunday, should profit from this

description by cowboy sage Baxter Black: "Eleven p.m., elbow deep in barflies, beer drying on yer lap, shirttail out, nine dollars and sixteen cents left in yer shirt-pocket, and hope in yer heart. If you've been there, this collection of songs is for you."

Bennett was Tarwater's rhythm guitarist, and since that group split in 1976, he has developed his abilities as songwriter, singer and musician. Others in his band are Sam Rothwell and Mark Webb, Boise; and K.W. Turnbow and Boyd Wilson, Jackson, Wyo.

In contrast to the other professionals appearing at the Western Days Jamboree, the Mores Creek String Band is comprised of six Idaho City men who make their livings outside of music, but play for the love of it.

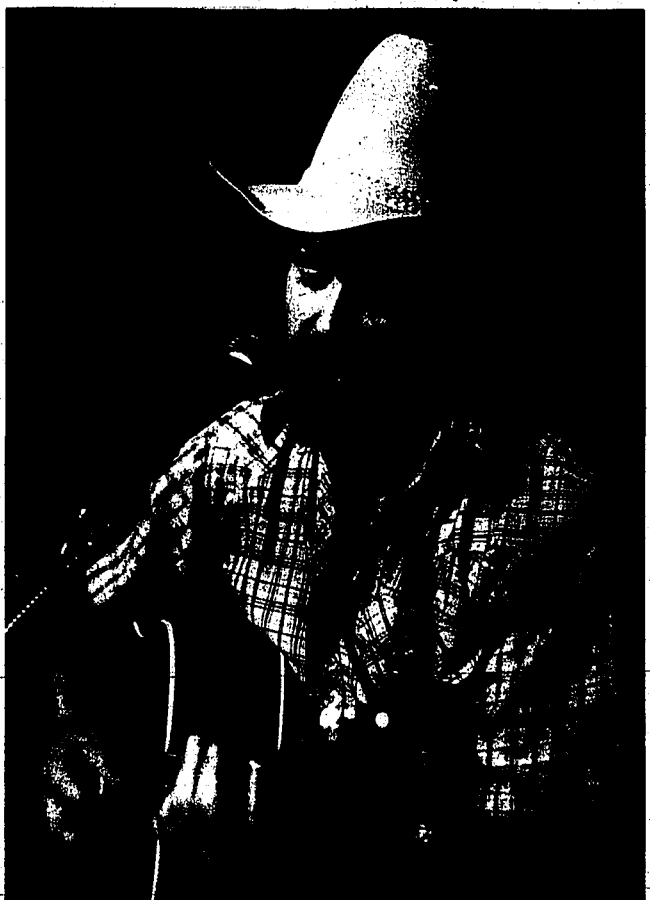
The band plays most frequently for private parties, annually at an Idaho City pub's St. Patrick's Day celebration, at a Boisean's "practice wakes" and at the Northern Rockies Folk Festival. It also plays for swing dances, melodramas, political fundraisers and folk festivals throughout the Northwest.

John Thompson sets the band's spirited quality with his guitar and original songs, and has gained notoriety for his satirical rewriting of "Tennessee Stud" to his own "Idaho Stud."

Jack Hoffman, on banjo and lap steel guitar, is a former member of Tarwater who now records with Pinto Bennett, while David Daley adds premium old-style fiddling to the group's repertoire.

Gary Shue uses his mandolin as the band's rhythm machine. John Cochrane plays a custom-designed five-string viola and Ron "Whitcha" Penska is the group's bass player.

In addition to music from noon to 6 p.m. Sunday, there will be 16 artists displaying "Art in the Park" and a variety of foods will be sold by 10 local organizations.

City shows off machinery at mall

Five-ring circus keeps action lively

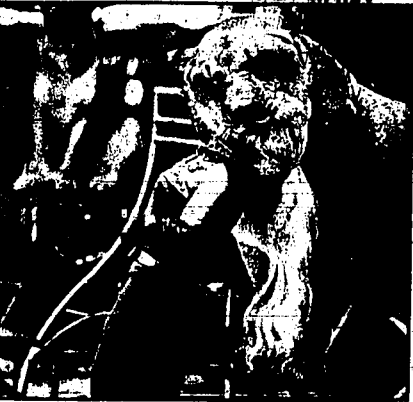
TWIN FALLS — The circus is coming to town.

Carson & Barnes, a circus billing itself as "The Biggest Big Top on Earth," will be performing two shows at the Twin Falls County Fairgrounds in Filer on Thursday.

The five-ring circus features 25 elephants; over 200 animals, including a white rhino and a "tiger" — a creature that is half lion and half tiger; approximately 95 performers — including trapeze artists, animal tamers, jugglers, tight wire walkers, unicyclists, clowns and a band — all under a big top a city-block long that holds 3,500 people.

This is the first time Carson & Barnes has toured this area, said promoter Roger Swain. The 50-year-old circus performs primarily in the midwestern and southern United States, but Swain said that the Magic Valley is ripe for a circus.

"These people have never seen a big circus," he said. "They will get a chance to see a big circus, and for us, in some ways, performing in a small town has more satisfaction than performing in a big city."

Swain said that several circuses Valley but none have the size or have performed in the Magic quality of Carson & Barnes. Other

circuses have played in the Magic Valley using the Carson & Barnes' name, Swain said, but "This is the circus that people in this area have been hearing about but didn't see."

Carson & Barnes is coordinated out of Hugo, Okla., and will be performing in Elko, Nev., before coming to the Magic Valley and continuing on to Pocatello. The circus books its performing dates one year in advance and tours 231 cities during a 245-day tour, beginning Easter weekend and ending in November. One of the highlights of the tour is a two-day stop in Milwaukee. "It's a festival that we always try to attend," said Swain. "It gives us a chance to see what other circuses are like and where we stand."

HOLLYWOOD — The hopped-up, gaseous "Cobra" identifies the twisted, scourge-of-the-planet villains right off: television newsmen, and presumably those who watch them; newspapers, and presumably those who read them; wimps in glasses who believe it due process; bureaucratic police officials, so paralyzed by regulations that they cannot function at all; and judges, who consistently undo the work of dedicated one-man arsenals like Marion Cobretti, aka Sylvester Stallone.

Review

There are others: a whole secret society of scum that meets to grunt and chant and clank enormous double-headed hatchets together, led by as close a match for Arnold Schwarzenegger as casting could provide.

They emerge from swampy bunkers as though from primordial ooze, to mount their motorcycles, flaunt their tattoos, slip their stockings down over their faces and terrorize the entire city of Los Angeles. But they are no match for Stallone.

uh, Cobretti. . . uh, Gaboon Viper. He blows them away with his submachine gun, hurls daggers into them, sets them afire, fobs grenades at them and impales them on vast smelting-pot hooks. Scum are easy. It is those bleeding hearts you gotta watch out for.

Since the first "Rocky," innocent eons ago, Stallone has been prancing down each of his scripts, whittling at them like soap bars ("Cobra" is based on Paula Gosling's novel, "Fair Game"). He has already done away with characterization, logic, coherent story, motivation, background and more than six speaking parts. Now he is zeroing in on dialogue.

True, there is the patented Stallone-speak, in which characters actually you are only talking Cannon tell ya they gotta say what they feel. And they do. However, this is not dialogue; it is twaddle.

For his part, director George P.

Cosmatos ("Rambo: First Blood, Part II") has eliminated modulation, subtly suspense. He has kept car chases, arty camera angles, broad-scoped mayhem and a detailed enough weaponry demonstration to bring tears to "survivalists" eyes. What emerges is a lurid, ludicrous, exhausting, enervating bloody mess thundering at you in vast close-up.

Its story is appropriately minimalist: Topmodel spots Night Slasher; Night Slasher stalks Night Slasher; Night Slasher stalks Night Slasher.

Only kidding. No one could sell a story like that. OK, there are 872 Night Slashers; they cut up everybody; they all get theirs. Now you are talking motion picture. (No, Stallone-speak, in which characters actually you are only talking Cannon tell ya they gotta say what they feel. And they do. However, this is not dialogue; it is twaddle.)

Because "Cobra" prizes guns over people, it is long on weaponry and

short on relationships. As a top model, Brigitte Nielsen — whose role is mostly screaming and running — must struggle with her growing passion for Stallone, unaided by the script. However, we know, although it registers not so much as a chemical trace, that they are actually married. And we can assume they have both studied the art of acting together in front of the same bathroom mirror.

Any clues as to why Stallone's surly, sunglasses one-man hit squad does what he does have been suppressed. "Stallone included a number of extraordinary weapons for the street-tough, big-city detective he portrays," confides the press kit, "knowing that they would provide insight into the nature of his character." They do, presumably, if you understand a man better when you know that his JATI 9-millimeter

submachine gun weighs a mere 3.6 pounds empty and is only 14.8 inches long.

A man's gotta do what a wimp won't, one supposes. And lordy, how Stallone's world is choked with wimps. And undesirable. Like the marijuana-smoking, hairnet-wearing Latino who takes his parking space. Boy, does Stallone show him. Rips his sleazy undershirt. Tosses away his joint. Sneers right at him. And it works. Next time they meet, that boy just moves his ol' car like that.

But you cannot call "Cobra" racist. Stallone's faithful detective sidekick (Reni Santoni), whose tweed cap is his characterization, is Latino too. It is just a certain element . . . well, you know. "Cobra's" pretentious emptiness, its dumbness, its two-faced morality make it a movie that begs to be laughed off.

'The Garden of Eden': Latest Hemingway novel is weak

DENVER (AP) — Ernest Hemingway's latest posthumous novel, "The Garden of Eden," with its theme of bisexuality, is evidence that the lode of unpublished Hemingway works is about played out. It is the 10th posthumous Hemingway book, and Charles Scribner's Sons, the publisher, describes it as the "last unpublished major work" by the Nobel Prize-winning author who committed suicide a quarter-century ago.

Like the two other posthumous works of fiction by Hemingway — "Islands in the Stream" in 1970 and "The Nick Adams Stories" in 1972 — "The Garden of Eden" will raise questions about the propriety of editing unfinished literary work without an author's cooperation. The \$18.95 book is to be released this week.

"I'd like to think that if Hemingway had lived he would have made the same sorts of decisions that ultimately were made," said Scribner's Tom Jenks, who edited the 1,500-page Hemingway manuscript down to 247 pages and 30 chapters.

"The Garden of Eden" is more cohesive than "Islands in the Stream," but lacks that novel's complexity and depth, and it does not have the clarity of "The Nick Adams Stories." Add to that a tentative handling of bisexuality and a plodding narrative, and the novel emerges as the least impressive of the three posthumous works of fiction.

It was written between 1946 and 1961 — the year Hemingway put the barrel of a shotgun in his mouth, pulled the trigger with his toe and committed suicide at the age of 61.

He was 47 years old, married to

Mary, his fourth wife, and living in Cuba when he wrote "The Garden of Eden." He was also alcoholic and struggling with his writing. His last great novel, "For Whom the Bell Tolls," had been published seven years earlier, and his major work of the 1940s, "Across the River and Into the Trees," would not be well-received when it finally was published in 1950.

"The Garden of Eden" describes a love triangle involving David Bourne, a successful American writer, his wife of three weeks, Catherine, and a woman they meet during their honeymoon along the southern coasts of France and Spain in the 1920s.

David at first humors Catherine's fantasies about transferring sexual identities. She crops her hair so that it is like his; they dye their hair the same silvery color. When they make love, she sometimes calls him Catherine and he doesn't object. Later, she takes to dressing manly and becomes domineering.

Tension grows as Catherine continues to explore her confused sexual identity, and things become even more complicated after she invites beautiful young Marita, another tourist, to join them at their hotel

at Naples. Marita insinuates herself into the Bourne's sexual life. At the same time, Catherine begins displaying signs of mental illness. She is by turns irritable and charming, jealous of David and Marita's growing intimacy and violently critical of David's stories about hunting in Africa 20 years earlier with his father.

For David, the stories become more real than the sexual triangle that dominates his life at Naples. Eventually, the growing sexual tension destroys their Mediterranean life; and the denouement is all Catherine's doing.

Hemingway has discarded the dependable themes in this novel that made "The Sun Also Rises," "A Farewell to Arms" and "For Whom the Bell Tolls" so powerful: strong masculine characters and values.

'Fantasticks' gets reprieve

NEW YORK (AP) — The world's longest running musical will continue running despite plans to drop the curtain for the last time June 8.

"I've got to extend the run," producer Lore Noto said Tuesday, explaining that he was beset by theatergoers and petitions from cast members of current Broadway shows to keep the musical running.

"The pressure has just been too severe on me."

Earlier this month, the producer announced the musical would end its 26-year on June 8 after 10,864 performances.

The closing notice prompted a flurry at the box office. The show was completely sold out for the remaining weeks of the run. People began camping all day in front of the theater in order to purchase uncollected tickets, Noto said.

The producer said it was his decision alone to keep the show running, although he had mentioned the possibility to the show's creators, Tom Jones and Harvey Schmidt, last week.

"He's the producer. These decisions are his decisions to make," said Jones, who wrote the book and lyrics. "Whether the show will run any longer or just fizzle out, who knows."

The musical opened May 3, 1960, at the 153-seat Sullivan Street Theater in Greenwich Village at a cost of \$16,500. The latest figures from Robins and Associates, the show's accounting firm, indicate the show has paid its backers a 9,642 percent return on their investment.

The musical, best known for the song "Try To Remember," is based on an obscure Rostand play called "Les Romanesques." The story is a "Romeo and Juliet" send-up in which parents invent a feud in order to bring their children together.

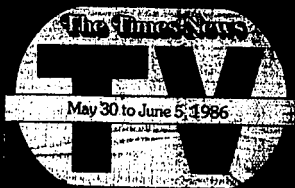

Documentary uses old footage, acted scenes to recall Roosevelt

There's really no hook, no round-number anniversary to make us start thinking about Theodore Roosevelt: It's the 128th anniversary of his birth, the 38th of the Roughriders charge up San Juan Hill, the 67th of his death. Nonetheless, "The Indomitable Teddy Roosevelt" (airing Sunday, June 1, on ABC) is a fascinating, compelling documentary concerning the 38th President of the United States.

The two-hour documentary incorporates archival footage and classic newsreels as well as a 1927 silent film about the Roughriders. Actors are used to fill in the gaps where no filmed record existed, like Roosevelt reading ghost stories to his children or Roosevelt's therapeutic trip out West after the death of his first wife. Among the actors are Roosevelt's great-great-grandson, Theodore Roosevelt V, who plays Quentin, his youngest son. The documentary is narrated by George C. Scott and accompanied by a rousing John Philip Sousa score.

The portrait of Roosevelt that emerges is of a man who would feel comfortable in the 1930s. If T.R. was a young man today, he'd probably be one of those boorish Yuppies appearing in Michelob commercials. He was president at 42, a physical-fitness buff, a tireless, ambitious man of action. He charged up San Juan Hill with his handpicked regiment the Roughriders and he spearheaded construction of the Panama Canal. Despite his militaristic tendencies, he won the Nobel Peace Prize for his negotiations ending the Russo-Japanese War of 1905. He was a staunch conservationist who championed preservation of the environment and a liberal "progressive" who opposed child labor, favored women's suffrage and cut down big-business trusts.

"He was not only president, he was the most entertaining man in America and the people loved him," says narrator Scott, summing up the documentary's reverential tone.

The decision to run this two-hour documentary in prime time culminates a seven-year quest by producer Harrison Engle, who began working on it in 1979. "I thought when the story was relevant," says Engle. "There was a lot of talk then

about the absence of heroes. Before Ronald Reagan, the country was in a funk. And while America may have heroes today, the broad themes T.R. raised—like conservation, women's rights and America as a world power are still central.

Engle draws parallels between the two Republican chief executives: "Ronald Reagan may not be known for his trust-busting or wanting to preserve the national parks," he says. "But both T.R. and Reagan

were beloved by the people, conveyed a goodness of spirit, and had lots of enthusiasm and energy."

The material in the documentary was speed-controlled and computer-enhanced with state-of-the-art technology to remove blemishes. "Instead of looking like the film came from 1901, we decided to clean it up and smooth it out. To create a window on the past, as it were," says Engle, who's also produced the film-tributes portions of several Academy Award presentations.

The approach used here is similar to that found in the classic documentaries of the 1930s, a style pioneered by Leni Riefenstahl and Pers Lorenz, filmmakers whom Engle admires. "This is two hours without a talking head, with no one speaking on camera — no Bill Moyers thoughtfully explaining it all."

'Cover Story' producer glad to be active in a wheelchair

LOS ANGELES — You could call Riff Fournier handicapped, but he's much too busy turning out the syndicated television series "Cover Story" to ask for special treatment. "I'll turn up at a location site, get out of my rented car, get into my wheelchair and go to work," he said. "I don't have an entourage. I don't want any fuss. No one is going to treat me like a minority."

"I've been in a wheelchair most of my life," said Fournier, who had polio at age 17. "Funny as it may seem, I've never perceived it as having anything to do with what I do. I'm in a wheelchair, that's it."

"I've never acted like there's any reason people should be put off by it, so people never were. I have a lot of fun doing what I do."

Fournier is the producer-writer-director of "Cover Story" which takes a weekly in-depth look at a top entertainer or celebrity. It's been on the USA Cable Network for three years. This fall, it will be syndicated to more than 30 stations.

Among its subjects, "Cover Story" has showcased Bob Hope, Hal Linden, Patti LaBelle, Kool and the Gang, and co-hosts Bryant Gumbel and Jane Pauley of NBC's "Today"

"Each show is like an old Life magazine cover story, except I use

On 'Capitol,' summer scripts feature people, not just politics

In real life, a UCLA bone marrow expert is called to Russia to aid Chernobyl radiation victims. On "Capitol," Leanne Forster receives bone marrow from her sister in a battle against leukemia. Leanne's love, Jordy Clegg, is ebullient, overjoyed, and the soap, by accident, looks current, gambling on a headlined disease.

With summer around the corner, "Capitol" bypasses politics for youthful storylines. Over in Morocco, Deborah Mallowney's Sloane Denning is dazzled by the oil-rich Prince Ali (Australia's Peter Lochran). In a Washington D.C. hospital, Leanne battles leukemia mainly because Jordy Clegg won't let her die, by turning up a Forster relation.

Written into the soap 10 months ago as Jordy Clegg's first true-love with an incurable disease, Leanne Forster silted about, gambling for high stakes, knocking playboy Jordy off his feet.

A talented hooper from New York's American Dance Machine, blonde, wholesome Christine Kellogg, at auditions realized somebody had goofed. Leanne was mysterious, dark and preferably British. Because she had auditioned for a "Flashdance" segment earlier, Christine somehow got—the call. Maybe it was her grand legs or her cule nose.

Step number two transpired in February. It was decided Leanne should live. With that decision writers invented a sister to make a bone marrow transplant possible.

Last October Leanne had no past, no family. Only Jordy. Now she has a future, yet is saddled with the horrors of memory. It seems Leanne killed both parents in an auto accident. Jordy's love has one whale of an opponent. If she isn't fading away without a dab of makeup on, Christine fences with her hideous memories.

Surviving the "Capitol" cut means dancer Christine can hack it as an actress. Currently, she's also playing an outspoken prostitute in an L.A. Theater version of "Scorchers" by David Beard.

"Performing in two shows is sweet," says Christine. "Because I was a dancer no one would hire me

as an actress. When I came out to do the 'Annie' movie, I decided not to mention my dancing credits. It finally paid off."

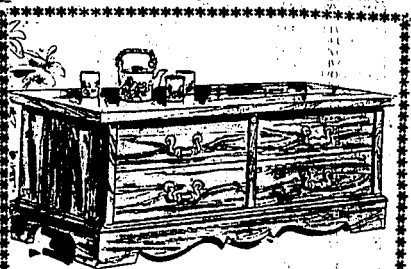
quest, firmly adding, "And please keep people away from me while I'm eating, or I'm walking out and never coming back."

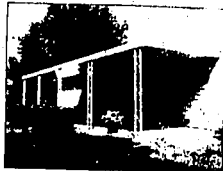

film clips," he said. "I let the subject tell it in the first person. You never hear the questions."

The show got its start about 10 years ago when Fournier tried to come up with a People magazine type of show.

"The show was around for about five years after we did the pilot," he said. "Then a friend of mine saw it and said, 'This show should be on the air.' Well, I'd heard that before. He walks out with my tape. I don't see him for two years, and I can't find him to get my tape back. Then he called me one April day in 1983. He said, 'I think we have a deal.'"

The show went on USA Cable in 1984. "My view was that we'd treat cable as Off Broadway," Fournier said. "You take a show to cable and try it out. We were involved from the start with a sponsor, Procter & Gamble, and they have a part ownership. They're the reason we're on the air. They also wanted to learn about cable."

Fournier said his show "represents the new fractionalization of televi-

slon."
 "The day of the networks assuming the advertising dollar is theirs is over," Fournier said. "People know how to turn the dial now. I think it's going to make televisio better."

Fournier, who grew up in the Midwest, has been in television for more than 25 years. One of his first jobs was co-producer of "The Mike Douglas Show." He directed commercials and wrote scripts for "Charlie's Angels," "Kojak," "The Incredible Hulk," "Baretta," "Helltown" and "Highway to Heaven." He wrote the movie "Nowhere to Hide," which was the highest rated television movie for the 1977-78 season.

He won a Peabody and an Emmy award for the NBC children's series "The Go Show." Fournier, who is recently re-married, has four children.

He does 20 "Cover Story" shows a year. He has a staff of eight but hires crews whenever he goes on location. "I get the top crews, those with lighting directors," he said. "We light well so that people look

Romantic intellectual brings his long hunt for Troy to public TV

NEW YORK (AP) — Men have expended lives and fortunes on the little hill of Hisarlik, their imaginations inflamed by tales of fair Helen, sulking Achilles and a treacherous horse.

Michael Wood, whose six-part series "In Search of the Trojan War" begins at 8 p.m. Monday on KAID, Boise, is among these brainy romantics, fairly bursting with un-British enthusiasm as he explores whether Homer's Illad is true or false.

He may have bitten off more than a viewer can easily chew.

Dashing from Berlin to Troy to Mycenae to London and back to Troy again, often with hardly a moment to button his shirt, Wood still doesn't have enough to fill six hours. Four hours, better organized, would have been more informative.

There are rewards, however. If you have patience and pay close attention.

The tale is complicated because so little is known for certain. Hisarlik is where Troy was long believed to be, and there are ruins within the hill. Beyond that lies the realm of what is plausible, not what is proven, and every expert has a theory.

Hisarlik contains the ruins of several cities, and scholars disagree on which may have been Homer's Troy. The city may have been sacked by Hittites instead of Greeks, or it may have been leveled by an earthquake.

The Illad may be fiction after all. Homer's story of a war that began with the abduction of Helen by

Paris, dragged on while Achilles nursed his offended pride and ended with Greek soldiers sneaking into the besieged city inside a wooden horse sounds improbable enough to have been invented.

Wood doesn't think so. He concludes that there was a city called Troy at Hisarlik, and that some disaster struck in the middle of the 13th century B.C., about the time of Homer's tale.

The literal search for Troy is only one strand in Wood's narrative. He is as much concerned with the history of the people who dug for Troy, and how their imaginations interpreted and sometimes distorted what they found.

That part of the story begins in the 1860s with the flamboyant Heinrich Schliemann, a German who made a bundle by cornering the saltpeter market in the Crimean War and dealing in cotton in the American Civil War.

Schliemann, who was smitten with the splendor of classical Greece, dug into Hisarlik with energetic abandon, learning archaeology as he went. He not only claimed to have found the ruins of Troy, but also a necklace that he called the "Jewels of Helen."

He was wrong about the ruins and was accused of faking his claim about the jewels.

Schliemann's worst offense was in carelessly ripping through walls he thought were not Homer's Troy. His

successors concluded that Schliemann had ruined precisely what he had come to find.

He didn't wreck it all, though, and later digs found two candidates most likely to be Troy. Wood looks at the case for each, and what they might imply about the truth of Homer's version.

"In Search of the Trojan War" wastes time with too many scenes of Michael Wood driving, Michael Wood walking, Michael Wood pondering. It is annoying. In a documentary series, to find the narrator feigning to walk lonely as a cloud through the fields of Anatolia when he obviously has a camera crew following him around.

On the BBC, Wood was a hit with teen-age girls and a target of some critical jibes about his tight jeans.

"If it contributes to getting a wider audience, it's worth it," he said on a visit to New York.

The Oxford-educated Wood said he has been fascinated by Troy since childhood and disagrees with those who attach no importance to the literal truth of the Illad.

"It may be that if we discover there is a historical context, it may reflect a crucial phase in the end of the Bronze Age, a crucial event in Western civilization," he said.

KMVT will cut more NBC ties; move 'Newscene' time to 6 p.m.

TWIN FALLS — KMVT-TV will take the final step in an all-CBS network line-up on June 1 in what General Manager Lee Wagner describes as "probably the most radical change we've ever made." The Twin Falls television station also will move its local evening newscast to a slightly later time to capture a wider audience, Wagner said this week.

KMVT will stop carrying early morning and midday NBC programs, such as the Today show, and replace them with CBS broadcasts, Wagner said this week. The move marks the final drift away from NBC, begun last August when KMVT switched to CBS for prime-time shows.

While severing ties with NBC, the local television station still can tap ABC for special programs, such as the Olympics, World Series and others, Wagner said.

The changes will arrange KMVT's schedule much like a typical CBS affiliate. In the past, KMVT often has offered a hybrid schedule featuring programs from two or three networks. Now, the network line-up is almost entirely CBS.

The change in the air time of "Newscene," the local newscast, is likely to affect the most viewers. The evening version will be broadcast at 6 p.m. instead of 5:30 p.m., beginning June 2.

The CBS Evening News with Dan Rather also will move back a half-hour to 5:30 p.m. to precede Newscene as in the past, Wagner said.

The station also will replace the "Today" show with the "CBS Morning News" because of the break with NBC, he said. The station also will come on the one hour earlier on weekdays, beginning with its five-minute interview show, "A Special Place," at 5:25 a.m. and the "CBS Early Morning News" at 5:30 a.m. "The Donahue Show" will air at 8 a.m. instead of the current 9 a.m.

Other programming changes will include:

Wagner said the changes had been in development for more than a year.

Until June 1, KMVT has maintained a secondary affiliation with NBC, carrying some of its programs during the day hours.

However, the network wanted to end the agreement primarily because Boise affiliate KTVB plans to add a translator station in the Magic Valley, Wagner said. It would allow viewers to pick up KTVB over the air on the UHF band.

The station chose CBS as its primary network last year because station executives decided it offered the the strongest programming overall among the networks, Wagner said.

The jury's in: Viewers still love to watch Mason solve whodunits

NEW YORK—Perry Mason cracked another ratings ease, making NBC a big winner in last week's A.C. Nielsen Co. competition and moving the top-rated network to what likely will be its largest sweeps victory in modern times.

Nielsen figures released Wednesday showed that NBC's movie, "Perry Mason: The Case of the Notorious Nun," easily won the battle of the whodunits over a repeat of CBS' "Murder, She Wrote." Mason's latest solution ranked third for the week, behind NBC's top-rated comedy tandem of "The Cosby Show" and "Family Ties."

With seven of the Top 10 shows, NBC won the week of May 19-25 by averaging a 15.5 rating to ABC's 12.2 and CBS' 11.5. The only weeks in 1985-86 with a wider margin of victory were ABC's win during the World Series and NBC's win the week of the Super Bowl. (A rating measures the percentage of the nation's 85.9 million homes with television.)

The mixture of successful TV movies and series, particularly comedies, also paced NBC to its fifth consecutive sweeps victory. With the May sweeps ending this week, NBC has an insurmountable edge of 15.6 to ABC's 13.3 and CBS' 13.2.

Network researchers expect when the final tally is in on Thursday, NBC will have its widest sweeps victory (NBC's records go back to 1969) and the widest May sweeps margin for any network since CBS' triumph in 1973. The researchers also expect CBS to tumble to third for the first time in a sweeps since 1978.

Ratings for local stations are measured only during the sweeps months of February, May, July and November, determining future

advertising rates. In those months, the networks help their local affiliates with special programming to hype ratings.

Last week, a repeat of "The Cosby Show" finished with a 28.4 rating. "Family Ties" had a 26.4 and "Perry Mason" had a 23.3. Next came the much-hyped conclusion of ABC's "Dynasty," which had a 21.9 rating — a tenth of a point over its season average.

In fifth place was the second part of NBC's miniseries, "On Wings of Eagles," followed by NBC's "Cheers," NBC's "Night Court," ABC's "Hotel" finale, NBC's "The Golden Girls," and CBS' "Falcon Crest" cliffhanger, in which an earthquake hit the vineyards. The "Falcon Crest" finale had a 17.9 rating, down from its 18.1 season average.

Except for Patrick Duffy's return to "Dallas," no prime-time serial cliffhanger showed significantly increased ratings.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, said that indicates the form is in a decline that will worsen next season. But David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, said the cliffhangers came later this year when viewing levels are normally down because of warmer weather.

NBC's strong performance this month, which Jaffe said will end up as the highest-rated May sweeps since CBS' performance in 1981, increased the three-network viewing level by nearly 1 million households over last May.

The most-watched miniseries was ABC's 12-hour "North & South" and the most-watched movie was "Perry Mason: The Case of the Notorious Nun." The other Mason movie, "Perry Mason Returns," was the No. 2-rated film behind "Return to Mayberry" in 1985-86.

Jaffe said the May sweeps performance bodes well for NBC this summer. NBC started its sweeps winning streak last May, then went on to win every summer week but one with its comedy-dominated schedule that does well in reruns.

On Wednesday, NBC announced one new short-run series this summer: "Me and Mrs. C," a comedy about a 62-year-old white widow who takes in a 22-year-old black boarder.

Jaffe said the May results also indicated that CBS might finish third this summer, a suggestion that Poltrack dismissed, contending that programming in May and the summer is vastly different. "It's not in any way, shape or form an indicator of any time other than the May sweeps," he said.

Also on Wednesday, CBS announced that, starting June 11, CBS' new magazine, "West 57th," will move from 7 p.m. MDT to 9 p.m. on Wednesday in the hopes of gaining more adult viewers.

Last week, in the earlier time slot, "West 57th" ranked 59th out of 62 shows. The other bottom-five shows included CBS' "Alewolf" and ABC's "Long Time Gone," in a tie for 57th, NBC's "Silver Spoons," in 60th, ABC's "Benson" and ABC's "Mr. Sunshine."

Fox Broadcasting holds breath; Joan Rivers fans media flames

NEW YORK — Five months before Joan Rivers even opens her big mouth on her own talk show, she's already a big success for her new employer, the embryonic Fox Broadcasting Network.

So says Fred Silverman, former president of NBC, who knows something about late-night television. When he had NBC and Johnny Carson, his late-night schedule worked wonders. When he then became an independent producer and created "Thicke of the Night," his late-night program went nowhere.

Silverman says Miss Rivers has stirred public awareness and station attention, which is one reason Fox Inc. reportedly is paying her \$10 million over three years. Rupert Murdoch's dream of turning his six TV stations and his Fox movie studio into a fourth network depends on the Fox Broadcasting Network signing enough quality independent stations to attract widespread national audiences and widescale advertiser support.

"When you're trying to launch a network, you really need to signal to potential affiliates and advertisers that you're committed," Silverman said. "This signing shows the world that this is a big-time operation. Joan certainly has familiarity and experience with the late-night audience. Whether the show succeeds or fails, it's already a resounding success."

Fox hopes to gain promotional value out of Miss Rivers' program, "The Late Show Starring Joan Rivers," which is scheduled to start in September. If you think NBC plugs its series and miniseries on "The Tonight Show," wait until FBN's stars start parading across Miss Rivers' couch.

The fledgling FBN, which hopes to introduce at least one night of regularly scheduled prime-time programming next year, has announced its first series: "Down and Out in Beverly Hills." FBN mentioned no cast members, except for Mike, the neurotic dog from the "Down and

Out in Beverly Hills" movie, so you can imagine he'll quickly become the mascot of Miss Rivers' show.

So far, FBN only has Murdoch's six stations in New York, Chicago, Los Angeles, Washington, Dallas and Houston, reaching 21 percent of America's homes with television. No affiliates have been announced yet, and industry observers say attracting independent stations — the 250 not already affiliated with ABC, CBS or NBC — will be a difficult task.

Independent stations program their entire schedules. They pay for the shows, usually a hodgepodge of sports, movies, network reruns and first-run syndicated series, and keep almost all the advertising revenue. The gamble is finding and financing programming to fill the schedule and entice viewers.

Or the other hand, the 200-plus stations each affiliated with ABC, CBS or NBC get programming from the big-daddy network. The networks, in turn, pay the stations for taking the shows and keep most of the commercial time. In a normal prime-time hour, NBC gets six minutes of advertising, the affiliate gets three.

"The affiliate is willing to take that position," said Tony Cervini, NBC's vice president for affiliate relations, "because of the totality of service a network provides: news, sports, entertainment, advertising and promotion. That's a nice, big package."

And don't underestimate the value of promoting "The Tonight Show" on an earlier NBC series, such as the top-rated "Cosby Show." With fewer stations and a much smaller reach, FBN's on-air plugs for guests on Miss Rivers' show will be whispers in the wind.

It must be noted that in her two seasons as sole substitute host on "The Tonight Show," Miss Rivers was successful on Carson's show, in Carson's time slot on Carson's network, with Carson's habit viewers.

Can we talk, she asked. But talk is cheap. This fall, Miss Rivers essentially will have to attract late-night audiences on her own.

"I wouldn't bet against it, but it depends on how deep Mr. Murdoch's

pockets are," Cervini said. "Right now, there aren't enough advertising dollars to go around for the three existing networks."

John Sisk, senior vice president at the J. Walter Thompson advertising agency, said "If there's one place TV needs good programming, it's in late night. Advertisers are looking to reach more women in that time period."

Sisk noted that Miss Rivers' competition isn't only "The Tonight Show," CBS' late-night movie and ABC's "Nightline," it's syndicated shows, including "Night Life," starring David Brenner, another "Tonight Show" alumnus. Brenner's program has a head start on Miss Rivers' show with 100 stations signed for the fall, according to the distributor, King World Productions.

Silverman said Miss Rivers would need to reach 2.5 million to 3 million homes to make money for Fox. On "Tonight," she averaged three times that many viewers. "She's got a real shot," Silverman said. "Success doesn't mean beating Johnny Carson."

It might mean that Miss Rivers merely establishes an audience toehold next season, waits for Carson to retire, possibly in 1987 after his 25th season, and then assumes the vacant throne as the Queen of Late-Night Television.

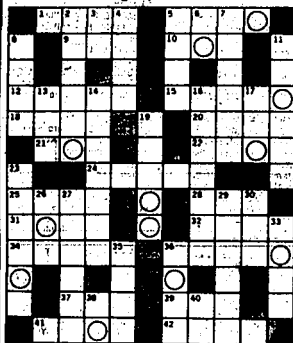
