Reagan can sell missiles to Saudis

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted by the narrowest of margins Thursday to permit President Reagan to sell missiles to Saudi Arabia, refusing to overturn his veto of a measure that would have blocked the deal.

The Senate voted 66-34 to override Reagan's veto, one vote short of the 67 that would have provided the two-thirds margin needed to override the veto.

Forty-two Democrats and 24 Republicans voted to override, while 29 Republicans and 5 Democrats stood with the president.

The \$265 million package includes Sidewinder air-to-air missiles and Harpoon anti-ship missiles.

The administration dropped \$89 million worth of Stinger anti-aircraft missiles from the package after Capitol Hill opponents said the shoulder-fired weapons might fall into the hands of terrorists, who could use them to shoot down airliners.

It was the second time the Saudi arms package was reduced. The desert kingdom last year originally wanted \$1.1 billion worth of weapons, but the deal was trimmed to \$354 million worth of missiles after Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the

Foreign Relations Committee, and other legislators warned that the larger package faced strong opposition.

The Republican-controlled Senate had voted 73-22 last month to join the House in blocking the sale, but the president vetoed the disapproval resolution and lobbied hard to turn around enough votes to sustain his veto.

Hours before the vote, Reagan told 75 senators at the White House that "for the sake of our national interest and of peace in this vital region — indeed for the sake of world peace itself — I ask you to permit the arms sale to go forward."

"American influence in the region is absolutely vital to world peace and to exercise that influence we must retain the trust of the moderate Arab nations," he added in comments relayed by spokesman Larry Speakes.

After the vote, the president said in a brief written statement that the action "confirms America's commitment to a security relationship that has served both the United States and Saudi Arabia well over the past 20 years."

"We are determined to work with the Saudis and other friendly states to achieve

our shared goal of peace and stability in the region," the statement said.

In other post-vote comments, Lugar said, "We know going in we had 33 votes. We didn't know about the 34th."

That 34th vote was provided by Sen. William Armstrong, R-Colo., who voted against the sale last month. "He was the 34th vote," said Lugar. "We had great hopes for him but we didn't know until the last minute."

Armstrong said later that his vote "was a fairly close decision," but he decided to vote with Reagan because the Stinger missiles

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Lt. Gov. David Leroy emphasizes a point in addressing the Twin Falls Optimists

Leroy says his education plan includes teacher competency test

TWIN FALLS — Republican gubernatorial candidate Lt. Gov. David Leroy said Thursday he will push for a teacher competency testing program if he is elected.

Following a speech to the Twin Falls Optimist Club, Leroy said he is about to announce an education plan for the state that will include competency testing for new teachers — but not for teachers already working in the state.

The plan Leroy will push differs slightly from the controversial competency testing plan implemented in Texas this year, which tested all teachers.

He said he will consider supporting a permanent 5-percent sales tax and increased spending for education, but said more money is not the only way to improve schools.

"The tools are there for us to insist on quality... that includes teacher testing and certification," Leroy told the group that had hit his Democratic opponent Cecil Andrus with tough questions last week.

Idaho Education Association President Joyce Rauch said in a Thursday phone call that the IEA supports the idea Leroy is pushing and said the state's professional standards commission has been working on the proposal for a year.

"All the teachers want the best people in the classroom we can possibly get," she said. Rauch also said that it could be insulting to ask teachers to measure up to high standards while paying them half what engineers make.

Professional Standards Commission Administrator Darrell Looise said Thursday that the idea has been discussed by the commission, but no formal decision has been made.

Liability ruling threat to officials, court told

BOISE — The Idaho Supreme Court is being warned that it may have placed every police officer, judge and other government official at the mercy of injured citizens by its recent decision expanding the government liability for damages from its actions.

In that decision issued three weeks ago, attorney Brian Julian told the high court on Thursday, "We're asking your government to indemnify every criminal act... The Legislature didn't intend that liability be that widespread."

Julian made the statement in urging the Supreme Court to uphold the dismissal of an \$886,000 damage claim against the State Brand Board in connection with the 1982 illegal sale of cattle owned by Oppenheimer Industries Inc.

Third District Judge Dennis Goff dismissed Oppenheimer's claim last fall on grounds that the board as a state agency was immune from liability under the 1971 Tort Claims Act.

Oppenheimer contended the state

acted negligently when its brand inspector failed to require Bolen Cattle Co., which was caring for some 1,600 head of Oppenheimer cattle, to prove its ownership of the cattle as required by law before it sold them without Oppenheimer's consent.

Goff's ruling, however, was based on earlier high court decisions that were effectively voided with the court's May 16 decision involving the state Board of Corrections.

In that 4-1 ruling, the court majority held that state immunity from liability did not "cover negligence in every function for which no public function is performed by the private sector and it limited immunity in the case of negligence only to discretionary government actions in the formulation of policy."

The majority said a government agency could only be immune for its actions, in carrying out policy if it did so by exercising due care. The case involved a damage claim against the Board of Corrections by a woman who was injured when an intoxicated Corrections Department probationer hit her while driving a

car. She claimed the state was negligent in supervising the man on probation. The court held that under those circumstances, the state was not automatically immuned and returned the claim to the district court for adjudication.

Attorney Stephen Beer, representing Oppenheimer, said his case was substantially more clearcut than the Board of Corrections case since the policy as stated in the law offered the brand inspector no discretion. It required him to obtain proof of ownership since the cattle in question had two brands — Oppenheimer's and Bolen's and Bolen's was fresh.

That should be no question, he argued, that Oppenheimer is entitled to at least recover the economic loss it suffered because of the theft of its cattle.

But Julian called the case one where "we had a slick criminal get by," contending that the inspector had dealt with Bolen for years and had no reason to question the assurances of his friends that the

Challenger lawsuits possible

WASHINGTON — Attorneys claiming to represent families of some Challenger astronauts have made inquiries about suing NASA or contractors involved in the January space shuttle disaster, according to two law firms with aerospace expertise.

None of the relatives has sued as yet, according to Houston attorney Ronald D. Krist, who said that he has been contacted by "four or five" lawyers concerning the possibility of seeking damage payments on behalf of some surviving relatives of the three astronauts who died aboard Challenger.

Krist — who sued on behalf of Betty Grissom after her husband, Virgil L. Grissom, died in the 1967 Apollo spacecraft fire — said in early May three of the lawyers contacted him a second time, asking whether he would be available for a lawsuit. His answer: "You bet."

He told The Associated Press this week that he believes an out-of-court settlement would best serve all parties.

"If not, one or more of those dependents will seek relief through the court system," Krist predicted.

Some relatives told AP they will not decide on whether to sue until

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Legless veteran revives infant

WEST CHICAGO, Ill. — A legless Vietnam veteran who rolled his wheelchair 80 yards and then crawled 60 feet more to revive a baby who had nearly drowned in a swimming pool says "It was in God's hands — I'm just a man."

James Partridge, who lost his legs in a 1966 land mine explosion in Vietnam, said Thursday that when he reached 7-year-old Jennifer Kroll after she was pulled from the nearby pool, she appeared blue, had no pulse and was not breathing.

"All I was thinking, really, was 'Come on, little baby — you can live, you can make it,'" said Partridge, 38, who used cardiac resuscitation Wednesday to revive the baby.

On Thursday, Jennifer was in fair condition at Loyola Medical Center, said hospital spokeswoman Kay McKinley.

Michael Kroll said his daughter was pulled from the pool by his wife, who telephoned an operator for help but got a recording saying that assistance was not available because of a strike against American Telephone & Telegraph Co. Kroll said his wife then began screaming.

Partridge said he was working in his garage when he heard Jennifer's mother, Tammy, scream for help. He said he began rolling his wheelchair toward the Kroll house, but trees and shrubbery forced him to crawl the rest of the way.

"There wasn't any other thing I could do," he said. "The chair wasn't going to make it through the brush."

Partridge said he asked his wife, Sue, to call paramedics, then climbed the steps of the pool deck to the baby and began administering CPR. He said the baby then regained consciousness and started to cry.

When paramedics from the Winfield Fire Department arrived, they administered oxygen and cleared Jennifer's airway, said Capt. William Enders.

Partridge said that though the Krolls were neighbors, he had never met them. But since the incident, he said, Jennifer's father has called regularly to keep him informed of the baby's condition.

Partridge said that with each call, Kroll thanks him, but "it's not necessary to be thanked."

Enders commended Partridge's effort, saying, "I think it was the thing that saved her life. He knew exactly what he was doing, and he was cool in the crisis."

Partridge said he took a CPR course at a hospital, "on impulse, for my own knowledge."

"I would say it paid off," he said.

Senate leaders say tax overhaul to zip through

WASHINGTON — Senate leaders, saying a pending tax package is unstoppable, predicted Thursday that the sweeping plan to overhaul the federal tax code would pass the chamber unanimously.

"I don't believe there will be a single vote against the tax bill. That's how much momentum is behind it," Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said following an upbeat breakfast meeting at the White House.

President Reagan used the session, attended

by about 75 senators, to express his support for the radical plan.

"I'll be very much surprised if it isn't passed by the Senate by a vote of 100 to nothing," said Senate Democratic Leader Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia.

The Senate began debate Wednesday on the proposal that would sweep away an array of tax breaks — such as the deductibility of contributions to Individual Retirement Accounts — to make way for cutting the 50 percent top individual tax rate to 27 percent and the 46 percent

maximum corporate rate to 33 percent.

After using the rest of this week to clear away other matters, Dole said, the Senate will resume work on the bill on Monday.

He predicted the Senate would pass the measure in about two weeks and that the legislation would reach the president's desk by Labor Day.

Backers of the plan have said they will accept no major amendments and they have mounted a vocal campaign to fend off attempts to preserve various tax breaks.

Hard rain keeps Texas treading water

Heavy rains in north central Texas continued to cause flooding Thursday as showers and thunderstorms drenched a large part of the nation from the southern and central Plains to the Northeast.

Flash-flood watches were in effect for north central and northeast Texas, southern Oklahoma and southwestern New York.

A flash-flood warning was in effect for Brown County, Texas, southeast of Abilene. Lake Brownwood had risen 3 1/2 feet over the spillway and the inflow into the lake from creeks had not yet crested. Flooding in Abilene worsened as Lake Abilene was expected to release large amounts through the spillway into Elm Creek.

Torrential rains of 4 inches to 6 inches inundated northwest Mississippi, and 5 inches was reported near Macomb, Ill. Parts of northeast Indiana had received up to 3 inches of rain since Wednesday afternoon.

Heavy rains caused flooding in Bosque, Brown, Hamilton, Taylor and Johnson counties in Texas, with 3 to 4 inches reported in Hamilton. Some roads were still under water in Johnson County and the rains were expected to cause flooding along the Bosque River.

A severe thunderstorm watch was issued for southeast Idaho and western Montana, with large hail, lightning and high winds expected.

A cold front passing through Southern California brought high winds over desert sections of the state.

Nuclear weapon fired in test

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Scientists exploded a nuclear weapon deep beneath the Nevada desert Thursday, the 12th announced nuclear test since the Soviet Union initiated a unilateral test moratorium.

The test, code-named Tojo, was detonated in a shaft 1,700 feet beneath the surface of Yucca Flat at the Nevada Test Site, about 80 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

"Everything went fine," said Department of Energy spokesman Jim Boyer, who said there was no escape of radiation.

Telephone strike continues

WASHINGTON (AP) — With 3,000 temporary operators already on the payroll, AT&T considered also hiring non-permanent computer, service, sales and clerical help on Thursday as a strike by 155,000 phone workers dragged into its fifth day.

Meanwhile, negotiations slowed as bargainers decided Thursday they had nothing to say to each other face-to-face. It was the first time since the strike by the Communications Workers of America began Sunday that there were no direct talks.

American Telephone and Telegraph Co. distributed a bulletin to its working employees Thursday saying it is arranging for help from outside contractors and seeking temporary employees from among recent retirees and others "to meet critical customer requirements."

Chernobyl questions prepared

WASHINGTON (AP) — International nuclear experts will quiz Soviet officials on the Chernobyl nuclear accident at a meeting next month and hope to learn more details of the tragedy then, a U.S. safety official said Thursday.

"It's clear to me that they don't intend to say much until they conclude their own investigation," Harold Denton, director of reactor regulation at the Nuclear Regulatory Commission, told a House subcommittee.

But he said a Soviet official at last month's meeting of the International Atomic Energy Agency in Vienna said he would take questions from experts at an upcoming IAEA meeting the last week in July.

Soviet ambassador arrives

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union's new ambassador to the United States, Yuri Dubinin, arrived here Thursday — amid the smiling, silver-haired diplomat promptly assured reporters he has no intention of matching the 24-year tenure of his predecessor, Anatoly Dobrynin.

The Saudi Arabian Embassy in Washington said there would be no immediate comment on the Senate vote. "I felt that was enough of a concession to make it a close call on my part," he said, a Houston aerospace executive who said he had a clear-cut reason to vote against the president on a foreign policy issue. I tend to give him the benefit of the doubt."

Sen. Alan Cranston, D-Calif., leader of the opposition to the sale, claimed a victory because, he said, "the Saudis only got 12 percent of what they originally wanted." He acknowledged "it wasn't a total victory."

Ceremony marks day dam broke

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The House had been waiting on the Senate to act before considering the veto override attempt. Now that Reagan won in the Senate, the House won't even go ahead with its vote.

Congress has never before blocked an arms sale. But it has overridden five Reagan vetoes. The last successful attempt was Nov. 20, 1985, when Congress overrode Reagan's veto of a bill permitting biomedical research at the National Institutes of Health.

REXBURG (AP) — They gathered in the city of REXBURG, a public of officials, survivors and some who have only heard the stories — to remember one of the worst disasters in Idaho history.

"From over and over of this valley to the other, people were challenged by a disaster of enormous proportions," Cecil Andrus said Thursday in recalling the self-reliance and faith of the people who survived the collapse of the Teton Dam exactly a decade ago.

"Once hard hit communities have been rebuilt better than ever," Andrus, who was governor at the time of the disaster, told a crowd gathered at the REXBURG Tabernacle. "REXBURG and its citizens serve as a living memorial to how all of us can live and learn from great adversity."

The morning the dam broke in the late afternoon of June 5, 1976, a wall of water estimated at 50 billion gallons rushed through the Upper Snake River Valley, causing havoc as far south as Blackfoot. Eleven people died and the government earmarked more than \$200 million to aid in the recovery.

The earthen dam has never been rebuilt — the site barely changed from the way it looked after the water subsided.

But Attorney General Jim Jones, in Idaho Falls on Thursday, used the anniversary of the disaster to suggest rebuilding the dam should probably be explored.

He contended there could be many benefits to the region from water that could be stored by a better-engineered dam.

Andrus, the Democratic candidate for his old job as chief executive in this year's election, has said a number of questions must be answered before a decision can be made on rebuilding the dam — chief among them whether it can be done safely at an economically justifiable cost.

During Thursday's ceremonies, Andrus credited the Mormon Church and its large membership in the valley for keeping "the death" toll from the disaster so low.

The presidential investigating commission issues its report on the Jan. 28 catastrophe. Family members were briefed privately on the report Wednesday.

Thursday, a Houston aerospace lawyer and a law professor said Thursday he has learned that one of the shuttle contractors, whom he would not name, has been sent "a demand letter" which he said could be a precursor to a suit.

"The letter is 'a demand for compensation ... a demand for payment,'" he said. Asked if he was representing any astronaut relatives in the case, Dula replied, "I can't comment on that question."

"Until the presidential commission makes its report ... on the cause of the accident, I don't think anybody knows what the liability is," said NASA's general counsel, John O'Brien. "I think everybody is waiting to see what comes out of the investigation."

None of the astronauts signed waivers limiting their right to hold NASA responsible, and survivors are not barred from suing any contractor, O'Brien added. Survivors of the five astronauts who worked for the government could not sue NASA, he said, but any of seven families could file a claim for damages from the government.

Krist said the suit over the Apollo fire — the nation's only other fatal spacecraft accident — was settled with Betty Grissom receiving \$100,000 and each of her two sons,

\$125,000. The families of astronauts Edward H. White II and Roger B. Chaffee did not join the suit, but Rockwell settled with them at the same time for about \$150,000 each, he said.

For comparison, Krist said the Grissom award was worth about \$1 million in today's dollars and her claims were limited by filing suit after some statutes of limitation had expired. He estimated the suit if filed today and before limitations expired would net \$100 million to \$150 million.

Federal law bars government employees or their estates from suing the government, which would apply to five astronauts — shuttle commander Francis R. Scobee, pilot Michael J. Smith, and mission specialist Judith A. Resnik, Ronald E. McNair and Ellison S. Onizuka, according to NASA's O'Brien.

A suit against the government could be brought by relatives of Gregory B. Jarvis, a Hughes Aircraft Co. engineer, and New Hampshire teacher S. Christa McAuliffe under the Federal Tort Claims Act.

All seven estates, however, could file a claim at NASA under the Space Act of 1958. "And there doesn't have to be any showing of negligence for NASA to pay claims under that authority," O'Brien said.

Spokesmen for Rockwell International Corp., manufacturer of the orbiter, Morton Thiokol, builder of the booster rockets, and Martin Marietta, maker of the external fuel tank, declined to comment.

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Dying infant to receive heart

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The dying infant of unwed parents will be considered a candidate for a heart transplant, hospital officials said Thursday, reversing an earlier controversial decision to refuse to consider the child because of his family situation.

The decision by Loma Linda University Medical Center came after custody of the baby, named Jesse, was transferred to his paternal grandparents, hospital spokesman Anita Rockwell said in a prepared statement.

She said physicians had begun to search for a donor heart, but did not know when the infant would be transferred from Los Angeles to Loma Linda.

Co-op refinancing approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate voted Thursday to allow the refinancing by the nation's rural electric cooperatives of up to \$9 billion in high-interest government loans, over the objections of senators who said the provision tempts a presidential veto.

The provision was adopted on a 62-36 vote, underscoring the political clout of the rural cooperatives, as lawmakers began work on a \$3.9 billion "urgent" supplemental spending bill for 1986.

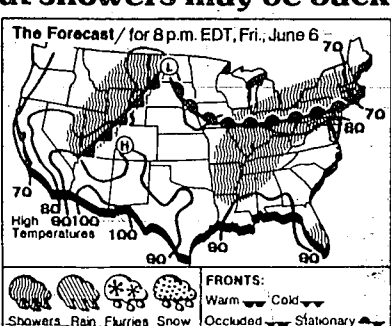

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USFS hold sought on forest plan

LEWISTON (AP) — The U.S. Forest Service reportedly has been told to delay releasing all national forest management plans nearing completion in Idaho.

The hold will allow a cumulative economic analysis of the 10 Idaho forest plans, according to an administration official quoted in Thursday's Lewiston Morning Tribune. The hold will also affect an unspecified number of other national forests in Washington, Oregon and northern California, where timber sale volumes also have dropped.

The hold was ordered by assistant secretary Peter C. Myers in a letter May 23 to Forest Service Chief R. Max Peterson.

Douglas W. MacCleery, a top USDA official in Washington, D.C., said Wednesday the Northwest states and California were specified only "as examples of situations where that might be the case." The Forest Service is preparing 123 management plans for national forests.

The order applies where ever it is appropriate to understand how the national forest timber harvest will affect the communities relate to that harvest, said MacCleery, who is second to Myers in charge of the Forest Service.

Appeals court disallows Bingham tax foreclosure sale

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Court of Appeals won't allow a tax foreclosure sale in Bingham County, saying a man who held a deed of trust in the property was not properly notified of the sale.

N.H. Patton on Thursday won a unanimous ruling from the court, reversing a 7th District Court order

against him.

Patton received a deed of trust to property which subsequently was sold because earlier property taxes hadn't been paid. He argued that he did not receive proper notice of the deficiency and sale, and the Court of Appeals agreed.

Teamster agent clarifies dues

BOISE (AP) — A Teamsters Union official says he's advising the secretary of state's office that his political action organization is properly registered, and is not collecting dues to finance the fight against Idaho's right-to-work law.

Jerry Shuffield, business agent for the 5,000-member Local 670, Caldwell, disputed statements in a complaint filed with the secretary of state's office by a former Teamsters Union member.

Lane alleged last week that Local 670, and a Boise Teamsters' Local, were violating state law by failing to register as a political organization because both were collecting \$2 per month from members for the fight against the right-to-work law.

SSC team wants \$10 million

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho needs to pump \$10 million into its university system to make it more competitive in the Superconducting Super Collider sweetstakes, says a university study team.

The SSC Inter-university Team recommended increases in faculty and spending for equipment at all three Idaho universities. The recommendations were reported to Gov. John Evans here Wednesday.

Evans praised the work of the team, which he appointed, saying it was critically important in the effort to attract a research facility that could cost \$4 billion to \$6 billion to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

The team recommended doubling the size of the physics-faculty from 22 to 44 at the universities. It urged increasing mathematics, computer science, supporting science, engineering and vocational-technical staff in the state.

It also recommended beefing up the faculty in liberal arts programs, offering more research positions and the purchase of \$1.7 million in new equipment.

GOP steps up Evans critiques

BOISE (AP) — Republicans are stepping up their party's criticism of Democrat Gov. John Evans for missing so many meetings of important state boards recently.

State Sen. Phil Balt, R-Idaho, who is GOP national committeeman for Idaho, on Thursday held a news conference here to repeat Republican complaints that Evans should devote more time to state business instead of spending so much time running for the U.S. Senate.

Evans aide Pat Costello later in the day said the governor during his nearly 10 years in office has missed few Land Board meetings, and always has been on hand when important decisions are to be made.

He said generally, Evans has missed meetings because he is attending to state business elsewhere.

Attorney sees Huntley conflict

MOSCOW (AP) — A Moscow attorney says Idaho Supreme Court Justice Robert Huntley has created at least the appearance of a conflict of interest with his statewide campaign for tax reform.

Dean Wullenwaber represented 22 downtown Moscow property owners who last week lost an Idaho Supreme Court decision. The battle is over assessments for a downtown local improvement district. Second District Judge Ron Schilling reduced the assessment from \$197,743 to \$27,834. The Supreme Court voted 4-1 to reverse Schilling's ruling, the second time it has decided the case.

Wullenwaber said he plans to meet with the property owners next week as they decide whether to carry the battle to the U.S. Supreme Court.

The attorney talked about conflict of interest when asked if Huntley's outspoken advocacy for local option taxing authority put the justice's objectivity in question.

Evans pens disposal site letter

BOISE (AP) — Gov. John Evans is urging President Reagan to reconsider his decision not to locate a nuclear waste repository in the eastern part of the United States.

"I am convinced that the construction of a second repository in the Eastern part of the United States, nearer to most of the nuclear power plants that generate spent fuel and high-level waste, is amply justified," Evans said in a letter to the President written Wednesday.

"The decision was made without informing or involving state, local and tribal governments, contrary to the letter and spirit of the Nuclear Waste Policy Act," Evans said.

Hanford, Washington, is one of three sites under consideration as a nuclear waste repository in the west, but the federal Department of Energy announced last week it was dropping plans for a second repository in the east. The other two western sites under consideration are in Nevada and Texas.

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Skateboarding pact affirmed the system

The system worked well in Twin Falls this week. It seemed like a minor issue, but often, those are the ones that turn ugly.
But in this case, the Twin Falls City Council and a group of young skateboarders worked out a compromise agreement that seems to have satisfied all parties.
The issue was whether the council should prohibit the use of skateboards on downtown sidewalks. The council decided to prohibit until July 20 skating in commercial districts during normal business hours and on Sundays. The council will decide then whether to prohibit skateboarding downtown completely or limit it to the prescribed hours.
The council also agreed to consider setting aside some land at Harmon Park for a skating ramp, financed privately.
Both ideas had been proposed by the group of teen-aged youths who twice appeared before the council.
Both sides acted responsibly and courteously in sincerely trying to find a solution to the problem. The skateboarders learned that the council was not a group of old fogies out to spoil their fun and that working through the system can be effective.
And the council learned that the youngsters were not irresponsible hoologans and that they had legitimate concerns.
What happens next seems to depend on the skateboarders. They must police themselves to prevent damage.
They should also remember that sidewalks are for the convenience of pedestrians. It is a privilege, not a right, to use them for skateboarding.
One final observation: Although this is a casual age, citizens having business before the council would be well-advised to dress properly on those occasions.
The skateboarders did nothing to help their cause by appearing before the council dressed for fun.

Hymns: sanitized for moral protection?

Is "soldier" a dirty word? Are soldiers barbarians?
Unfortunately, a group of Protestant church leaders may have a blasphemous idea.
A number of churches have created hymnal revision committees that intend to sanitize traditional lyrics of military images. Old favorites such as Charles Wesley's "Soldiers of Christ Arise," and "Put Your Armor On," and Isaac Watts' "Am I a Soldier of the Cross?" will probably be eliminated. In May a committee of the United Methodist Church on a 108 vote axed "Onward Christian Soldiers," a hymn that has been one of the top five of all Protestant denominations.
Stanzas similar to "Through dust of conflict and thro' battle flout" and "Lord of our farflung battle line" don't stand a chance of surviving. Congregations will no longer have the privilege of singing the beautiful Psalm 148:
"Praise God from the sky,
Praise God from the heights;
Praise God, all ye angels,
Praise God, heaven's armies."
I'm glad the sanitizers were not around when the Old Testament was compiled. The heroic lives of Samson, David and Gideon, Samson, David and many others might have been rendered so innocuous that we wouldn't have recognized them. The greatness of the Scripture is due, in part, to the fact that there wasn't a committee of cowards around. An endless line of saints and sinners' gratitude before us. Scripture is a candid camera that not a posed and perfumed portrait -- of humanity.
What is the origin of this passion for liturgical purity?
For many people, the Vietnam tragedy -- unlike World War II and the Korean War -- irrevocably sullied the honored status of the military defender. For them, sailor, soldier, airman and marine now belong to a realm of dark-

ness from which redemption is impossible and humane existence is excluded. Military holy worldliness is impossible in a post-Vietnam world, because a good/evil, light/darkness, civilian/military dualism prevents it. To enter the military is to be swallowed up in a heart of dark trauma graphically depicted in films like "Apocalypse Now" and "The Deer Hunter."
Hymnal sanitizers should realize, however, that the soldier as barbarian is an image, not a man. To regard the soldier as either below or above humanity violates the lessons of Scripture. Jesus most often exalted the professional clergy (Pharisees) and lawyers (Scribes), not the military. In healing the son of a Roman centurion, Jesus declared this soldier's faith unique in all of Israel. Another centurion at the cross affirmed Jesus as innocent and praised God.
Moreover, if the soldier's vocation were inherently corrupt, would the author of Ephesians have used the armor of the Roman legionnaire as a metaphor for the struggle for faith in the world? And what are we to do with Revelations, where Christ leads an angelic army arrayed in white linen against earthly wickedness at the end of history?
Moreover, the image of soldier as barbarian runs counter to the ideal of the vocation. In repudiating the Greek-medieval dichotomy between sacred and secular, "above" and "below the stars," Luther affirmed it was the spirit and not the nature of the work that made a vocation Christian. Like those in the police and judiciary who are underparts, many military persons I have known are motivated by altruistic ends -- the restraint of evil and the protection of the defenseless.

In addition, the image of the soldier as barbarian is at odds with the Western literary tradition. If the soldier is a vocational leper, how can I teach the heroism of Achilles and Hector in "The Illiad"? What is one to make of Plato's wisdom of giving the Guardians a central role in "The Republic"? How can one emphasize with the protagonist in hundreds of novels such as "The Red Badge of Courage" and "All Quiet on the Western Front" which dramatize the struggle for moral courage if the soldier's calling is intrinsically immoral?
And how are we to regard countless others, great and small, who were sensitive and humane military persons: John of Arc, Ignatius Loyola, George Washington, Lord Nelson, Andrew Jackson, George Marshall and Dwight Eisenhower? Even Pope John Paul II served for a time in the Polish army.
I am sorry that "soldier," "battle," "war" and other military terms are abusive to some religious feelings. Could it be that such persons are functioning from a fundamentalist or literalist mode of interpretation? Instead, the military terminology of our liturgy should be taken as a poetic symbol of the battle against evil. It is the battle of the good against flesh and blood but against principalities, against powers, against the rulers of darkness of this world, against spiritual wickedness in high places."
The danger of sanitizing our hymns of "words that hurt" (soldier may join many others, such as slaver, pilgrim, black blood, Lord, snow, man, slave, king, sword, army and navy) is that the end result might be liturgical pallid. If hymnal revisionists are primarily interested in not hurting anyone's sensitivities, they may end up impressing few worshippers.

I don't suppose they cost them \$125. And lately, I can't spend \$200,000 after \$2,000. Now I'd just get into a mall practice and I'd be very disappointed in the pockets of that new suit with \$200 or \$300 thousand, he would have jumped at the chance to help us.
Sure, I know most insurance companies have raised rates in the past of this world, but I can't blame it all on them. Doctors, hospitals and lawyers have been ripping off the insurance companies, Medicare, Medicaid and the public for years.
Twice I have had a doctor tell me "usually there is no charge unless you have good insurance." "Doesn't anyone care?" Don't get us wrong, we are grateful for the pacemaker and for the doctors and hospitals, but why should they be allowed to charge so much?

Summer supplement offered

I'll call this a supplemental to the the Summer Fun Guide of the Times-News for Hagerman Valley and Gooding County. I'll try to keep this short, but when your writer calls "1,000 Springs" (a part of "1000 Springs Scenic Route," U.S. 30), a few springs, then, he's never seen much if any of Hagerman Valley and the 20 1/2 miles where springs exit the aquifer.
In Hagerman Valley, there are over 40 rainbow trout farms and the world's largest trout ranch at Clear Springs, most in Gooding County. Idaho Power has seven parks located on spring outlets (ideal for picnicing, fishing, water skiing, boating, scuba diving, and some for swimming) along the Snake River.
Tours of trout farms are available at Niagara Springs Fish and Game and the Federal Steelhead Hatchery near Hagerman. Near this location is the State Fish and Game Trout Farm on Ryley Creek, where Oster Lakes and Anderson Ponds provide easy family fishing and great bird watching.

Billingsley Creek Management area has

two miles of winding, deep moving water, ideal for fly and bob fishing and other water recreation. Nearby private property on Billingsley Creek has fly fishing only.
The Hagerman Historical Society has a replica (created by the Smithsonian Institution) of the famous Hagerman Horse Fossil and bones of a real horse fossil, Malad River, Big and Little Wood Rivers and Gooding City of Rocks, along with Malad Gorge State Park are other fishing and sight-seeing areas of Gooding County.
Whitewater rafting below the Lower Salmon Dam is only 15 miles to the Bliss Ridge, passing the only Frank Lloyd Wright house in Idaho (not open to public).
Old Highway 30 from Bliss Ridge south is a scenic delight with ponds and streams and interesting settings. Maps of the Snake River Canyonlands and 1000 Springs Scenic Route, Bliss to Burley/Upstart, can be obtained free from many tourist stations, restaurants and the chamber of commerce.
With tourism being the only growth industry in Idaho of the top four, (agriculture, mining and lumber have all declined the past five years) and expected to grow by 10 percent this year, let's pull it up, using the wonderful free resources we have along the Snake River and nearby tourist spots.

Panel rejects Reagan selection

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Judiciary Committee, in its first rejection of one of President Reagan's nominees to the U.S. District Court bench, refused Thursday to approve Jefferson B. Sessions III for a south Alabama judgeship.

The committee first voted 10-8 to defeat a motion to report the nomination favorably to the full Senate, then voted 9-9 to defeat a separate motion to report the nomination to the Senate with no recommendation.

Sessions, 38, the U.S. attorney in Mobile, Ala., was opposed by civil rights groups who claimed he had made a series of racially insensitive statements and had engaged in politically motivated prosecutions of civil rights activists.

"The Senate has worked its will, and we certainly have to accept its will," presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said after the committee vote.

Chemical sales to Syria halted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States on Thursday banned sales of eight chemicals to Syria, citing fears that Syrian-bull chemical weapons will be given to Iran and escalate the long-running war in the Persian Gulf region.

The embargo — identical to one imposed two years ago on Iran and Iraq — was extended to Syria after U.S. intelligence picked up indications that country had the capability to manufacture chemical weapons.

Syria has been supporting Iran in the seven-year-old Iran-Iraq conflict.

The eight chemicals on the embargo list are potassium fluoride, dimethyl methylphosphonate, methyl phosphonyl difluoride, thiodiglycol, dimethylamine, phosphorus oxychloride, dimethylamine hydrochloride and ethylene dichlorohydrin.

Europe trade retaliation seen

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. trade officials predicted Thursday that Europeans will strike with upwards of \$500 million in retaliatory measures against American chemical, paper, machinery and tobacco industries this summer if Congress extends a copyright law.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige and U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yeutter vigorously opposed a bill sponsored by Rep. Barney Frank, D-Mass., that would make permanent a statute enacted 25 years ago to protect the U.S. printing industry.

The law, which is scheduled to expire June 30, denies copyright protection to U.S. authors unless their books are printed in the United States or Canada. Newspapers, magazines and newsletters also are covered. A similar proposed extension has been approved by the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Minister moves to fight porn

WASHINGTON (AP) — A minister who sparked a debate over adult magazine sales by convenience stores sought Thursday to intervene in court against Playboy, which is suing the Attorney General's Commission on Pornography.

The Rev. Donald Wildmon, executive director for the National Federation for Decency, said he would file a motion in U.S. District Court seeking to enter the case on the side of the attorney general's commission. Playboy, Penthouse and adult magazine distributors want the panel to withdraw a controversial letter they received from the commission, which was based on Wildmon's testimony before the panel.

The letter last February by commission executive director Alan Sears informed the convenience store chain owners that they had been characterized before the commission as distributors of pornography.

Challenger data to go public

WASHINGTON (AP) — The public will be able soon to look over all 15,000 pages of public and secret testimony presented to the Challenger investigating commission for the report it presents to President Reagan on Monday.

In addition to the hearing transcripts, more than 100,000 documents are being turned over to the National Archives within days after the commission report is made public Monday, said a member of the commission staff, who asked not to be identified.

"Every commission document now becomes public record," said the staff member.

He said the investigation by the 15-member commission, which was headed by former Secretary of State William P. Rogers, cost "in the \$2 million to \$4 million range, half of it

for computerization."

The report will be 250 pages and four appendices and will be followed in a few weeks by four other volumes. They will include the transcripts of all closed sessions held by the commission.

"The only commission that exceeds ours in magnitude was the Warren commission," said the staff member. That commission, headed by Chief Justice Earl Warren, investigated the assassination of President John F. Kennedy.

Since the Challenger exploded on Jan. 28, claiming the lives of its crew of seven, more than 6,000 people have taken part in the investigation of what went wrong. More than 1,500 of those work for NASA, 3,000 are contractor employees.

President Reagan gave the commission 120 days to complete its job

and the time pressure, said the staff member, was the most difficult thing. He said he had only one day off since the investigation began and that was Easter Sunday.

Meanwhile, members of Congress expressed fresh determination to tighten their control over NASA — once an agency that could do little wrong in the eyes of many lawmakers.

Sen. Al Gore Jr., D-Tenn., called a news conference Thursday to unveil three proposed bills that he said would "start setting things straight."

One measure would call on NASA to restore its quality assurance program to the strength it enjoyed several years ago. A second would protect the rights of "whistleblowers" at private companies who speak out against improper practices.

Two presidential jets to be bought

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon said Thursday it will buy two Boeing 747 jumbo jets, pending congressional approval, to replace the aging Boeing 707s used as Air Force One, the presidential aircraft.

Acting Air Force Secretary Edward C. Aldridge Jr. selected the four-engine 747 in competition between Boeing and McDonnell Douglas, which had hoped its three-engine DC-10 would become the new White House jetliner.

Model's face cut by razors of 2 attackers

NEW YORK (AP) — Two men approached a 25-year-old model on a street early Thursday and one slashed her face with a razor blade, inflicting cuts that needed more than 100 stitches, in an attack police say was arranged by her former landlord over \$50 he owed her.

Maria Hanson was in St. Vincent's Hospital in stable condition after a plastic surgeon stitched her wounds, said spokeswoman Caroline McEneaney.

Ms. Hanson, a 5-foot-4 brunette who had just finished her first television commercial, works for Petite Model Management in Manhattan and had done photo layouts for Mademoiselle and Glamour magazines; agency director Monty Agard said.

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Jury, out for 13 hours, returns guilty verdict in Pelton case

BALTIMORE (AP) — Ronald W. Pelton was convicted Thursday of spying for the Soviets by selling vital defense secrets he learned during his career as a communications specialist for the National Security Agency.

The federal jury, which deliberated 13 hours over two days, convicted Pelton of four counts of the indictment and acquitted him of a fifth count, apparently rejecting defense arguments that he was

duped by FBI agents into confessing. Pelton, 44, could be sentenced to three life terms plus 10 years.

The jury acquitted Pelton of a count which charged that around 1980 he transferred "information relating to the national defense of the United States or America" to the Soviet KGB intelligence service.

The jury did not explain why it found for acquittal on that charge, which carries a life sentence, while convicting him on one count of con-

spiracy, and three other espionage charges.

U.S. District Judge Herbert F. Murray set sentencing for July 28. He also admonished jurors not to disclose any of the classified information contained in government exhibits introduced in the trial.

Pelton was accused of selling information about signals intelligence to the Soviets between 1980 and 1985 for \$35,000 plus expenses. The government charges that a bankrupt

Pelton first contacted Soviet agents six months after he quit his \$23,500-a-year NSA job in 1979, after 14 years.

The government charged that in 1980 and again in 1983 Pelton traveled to Vienna, Austria, where for eight hours a day, three to four days,

per visit, he wrote answers to written questions posed by a KGB agent.

"He said that walking into the Soviet Embassy on Jan. 15, 1980, was the biggest mistake of his life, but that when you are broke, you do some crazy things." Special Agent David Faulkner testified.

Pelton told the jury he never made that remark.

Pelton said he went deeply into debt to buy land and materials to build a house for his family and was forced into bankruptcy after the supplies were stolen.

Former Order security chief gets 60 years

SEATTLE (AP) — Richard Joseph Scutari, who said he had no choice but to strike out against a "satanic government," was sentenced Thursday to 60 years in prison for his role in a plot to overthrow the U.S. government.

The former security chief for the white supremacist sect The Order was handed the maximum term by U.S. District Judge Walter McGovern, despite his attorney's pleas for a reduced sentence.

Scutari, 39, of Port Salerno, Fla., was among 23 members of The Order indicted in April 1985 on federal racketeering and other charges.

He pleaded guilty April 30 to racketeering, conspiracy to racketeer and to a \$18 million armored car robbery near Ukiah, Calif., in July 1981.

Rice receives guilty verdict

SEATTLE (AP) — David L. Rice, who fatally bludgeoned a family of four on Christmas Eve after bludgeoning his way into their home with a toy gun, was found guilty of aggravated first-degree murder Thursday.

Jurors reached the verdict after about six hours. They were given the case late Wednesday, but did not begin deliberations until Thursday.

There was no visible reaction from Rice, who had admitted the killings but pleaded innocent by reason of insanity.

The same jury will meet in a separate penalty phase to determine whether Rice should be sentenced to death or life in prison. Aggravated first-degree murder is the only crime punishable by death in the state.

Tate enters plea in weapon charges

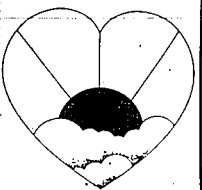
SPRINGFIELD, Mo. (AP) — David Tate, the reputed neo-Nazi convicted of killing a Missouri state trooper last year, pleaded innocent Thursday to 14 federal weapons charges.

There was heavy security as Tate, 23, of Allot, Idaho, handcuffed and wearing leg irons, was brought before U.S. Magistrate James England for an omnibus hearing on charges in a secret indictment handed up May 13 by a federal grand jury in Springfield.

The 14 charges relate to weapons allegedly found in Tate's van on April 15, 1985, after Trooper Jimmie Linegar was slain and Trooper Allen Hines wounded following a routine traffic check stop near Branson.

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

Tutu will defy ban on crowds

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Bishop Desmond Tutu said Thursday he will defy a government ban on public gatherings marking the 16th anniversary of the start of the 1976 black riots in Soweto.

The vow by the Nobel Peace Prize winner heightened fears the government's attempted clampdown will backfire in bloody clashes.

"I will instruct my clergy to organize church services on June 16 and I will certainly participate in such services," Tutu, Anglican bishop of Johannesburg, said in a statement. "We have not yet reached the stage where we must ask for permission from a secular authority to worship God."

The ban on public gatherings covers both outdoor and indoor meetings, including church services commemorating the 10th anniversary of the Soweto uprising.

Australia launches Nazi probe

SYDNEY, Australia (AP) — The government on Thursday launched a formal investigation into charges that Nazi war criminals settled in Australia after World War II.

Special Minister of State Mick Young appointed Andrew Menzies to head the investigation, which is expected to last three months. Menzies, 67, retired in 1984 as deputy secretary of the attorney general's department.

Young told Parliament that Menzies will have full access to government and immigration department files. Reliable sources said Menzies also will travel to the United States and Canada in his search for information.

Geneva topless plan scuttled

GENEVA (AP) — The city council has narrowly rejected a proposal to permit topless sunbathing at public swimming pools.

In a late-night meeting Wednesday, the council voted 26-24 against public pool toplessness, which is permitted in most Swiss cities.

The sponsor of the proposition, Roman Juon, said the measure would have passed, but four of its supporters were out of the room when the vote came.

Guru's Uruguay visa limited

MONTEVIDEO, Uruguay (AP) — The Associated Press reported erroneously on April 17 that Indian guru Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh was granted a one-year residency permit in Uruguay.

Rajneesh, 54, who was expelled from the United States and Greece and barred from Britain, arrived in Uruguay on March 19 on a 90-day tourist visa.

In April, he was issued a Uruguayan identity document valid for one year. The document facilitates bureaucratic and commercial transactions, but does not alter his status. The guru, who has been living in Punta del Este, has applied for residence in Uruguay, but has not yet received a response.

His tourist visa expires June 17, but can be renewed for 90 days.

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Oil bust might halt Mexican payments

MEXICO CITY (AP) — Mexico might suspend payments on its huge foreign debt if it does not receive special help to survive the devastating blow of collapsed oil prices, Treasury Secretary Jesus Silva Herzog said.

"We require a different treatment that is not 'business as usual' because things are not 'as usual,'" he said in an interview late Wednesday with The Associated Press.

"Never, never has there been a case of a country that received an external shock (of that magnitude)

in such a short period of time," Silva Herzog said in his offices at the National Palace.

"Mexico, I believe that I can say, has been the most responsible and serious country since the problem and crisis of the foreign debt arose (in 1982). We would like this to be recognized in a realistic way by the international financial community."

Crude oil sales supply about 70 percent of Mexico's foreign earnings, which help it stay current on a debt of nearly \$100 billion.

Government officials estimate earnings in 1986 will be half or less than the \$13.3 billion of last year, reflecting a dramatic drop in the world price of oil in the past six months.

Mexico seeks billions of dollars in financial aid from commercial bankers and such agencies as the International Monetary Fund. Progress in negotiations has been slow.

Silva Herzog said the government has enough reserves to meet its financial obligations for the entire

year, "but because it would not be reasonable, we are not going to permit our scarce resources to be used only to cover the payments of the foreign debt."

"We have other priorities, and the principal creditor of Mexico is the Mexican people."

Asked whether he expected to suspend debt payments this year, he replied, "It depends. It depends a lot on the outcome of these conversations and these negotiations" with the IMF and international bankers.

Aquino set to negotiate with communist leader

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — President Corason Aquino said Thursday that talks on ending a 17-year-old insurgency will begin soon with a fugitive former journalist believed to be a leader of the outlawed Communist Party.

She told a news conference mark-

ing 100 days in office that "within 48 hours" she would name government negotiators to meet with Satur Ocampo. The Communist guerrillas said earlier Thursday he would be their chief representative.

"Hopefully, we will soon have these talks going between the two camps," she said in announcing

plans for the first known high-level meeting of the Philippine government with leaders of the insurgency.

Mrs. Aquino said she has chosen her negotiators, "but right now I don't think I should reveal their names."

More than 1,000 soldiers, insurgents and civilians have been

killed since a military-civilian revolt drove Ferdinand E. Marcos out of the presidential palace Feb. 25 and Mrs. Aquino took over the presidency. Marcos fled the country the next day.

Ocampo, 47, was in jail for nine years under the Marcos regime on charges of subversion and rebellion.

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World

20,000 evacuated from disaster site

MOSCOW (AP) — Officials said Thursday that 20,000 people are being moved out of areas recently found to be contaminated by the Chernobyl nuclear disaster and one more person has died, bringing the death toll to 26.

A report Wednesday in the newspaper Pravda said "dirty spots" were found in southern Byelorussia, just north of the Ukrainian nuclear power plant, and people had been evacuated from them.

An explosion and fire in Chernobyl's No. 4 reactor April 26 spewed a huge cloud of radiation that spread to Byelorussia and Europe, and gradually worked its way around the world.

Soviet media Thursday said the ruling Politburo discussed the "intensive effort" to decontaminate

the surrounding area. It was the first report in a month of a Politburo discussion of Chernobyl.

Few details were given of the meeting, but the official news agency Tass said: "Measures were endorsed to ensure the employment, provision of housing, and improvement of social and everyday services to the population evacuated from the danger zones." It said all evacuees should have jobs by the end of June and "well-appointed housing" by October.

The new evacuations were announced at a news conference given by six government, health and environment officials who said 107 of the 229 people originally reported hospitalized with symptoms of radiation sickness still were under treatment.

Oleg Shepepin, first deputy health minister, said 24 people hospitalized with radiation sickness have died, one more than previously announced by Soviet officials. Two other people died in the explosion and fire.

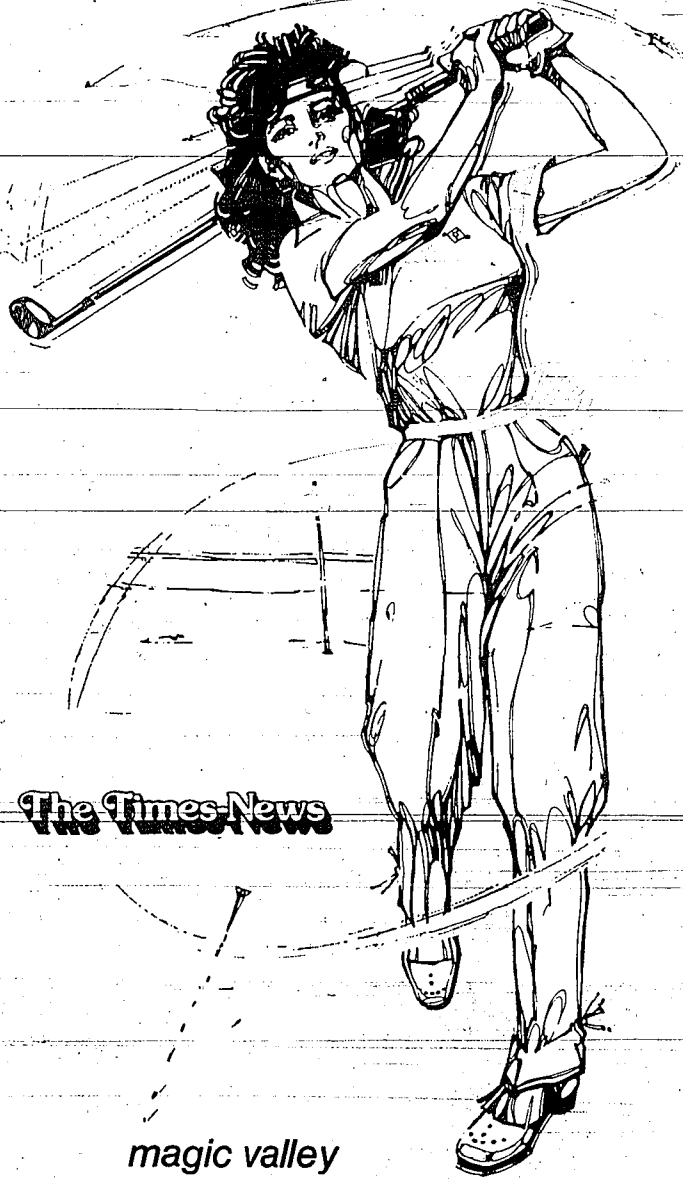
Mongol airline to resume Peking hop

PEKING (AP) — Mongolia's state airlines will resume direct flights between Peking and the Mongolian capital of Ulan Bator on Friday, ending a 19-year suspension of air service between the two cities.

The official Xinhua News Agency said Thursday that Mongolia and

China agreed last year to resume flights to meet the needs of growing tourism.

The report said air service between Peking and Ulan Bator, about 750 miles to the northwest, began in 1958 but was suspended in 1967.

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State peers into hospital's finance company

TWIN FALLS — A finance company doing business with Magic Valley Regional Medical Center is under investigation by the Idaho Department of Finance for allegedly violating Idaho codes governing licensing of collection agencies.

Headed by Financial Services Inc., based in Ogden, Utah, began collecting debts for MVRMC in April. At the time, MVRMC officials stressed that Healthcare Services was not a collection agency, but a "management company of accounts with HFS, patients who cannot pay the balance of their bills have the option of

The Department of Finance thinks otherwise, however.

"In our opinion, they should be licensed with us as a collection agency because they are handling third-party accounts," said Tom Abel, investigator with the Consumer Finance Bureau.

Abel said the major problem his office has with HFS is failure to obtain a state license.

"From what I can observe, were they licensed, they would be in complete compliance," he said. "It's not as if they were out hoodwinking people or using shoddy (collection) practices."

MVRMC officials said under the contract with HFS, patients who cannot pay the balance of their bills have the "option" of

settling up a monthly installment plan through HFS, at a finance charge of 12 percent.

Abel said his office began an investigation into the company after receiving several complaints. Abel said the department contacted HFS directly and is corresponding with their attorneys.

But on Thursday, MVRMC officials said they had not been notified by the state that anything was amiss.

Linda Thiel, business office manager at MVRMC, said the hospital had "gotten wind" of problems with HFS, but she said the Department of Finance had not notified the hospital that HFS was under investigation.

"We're still doing business with them," Thiel said. "We have not been asked to suspend operations."

MVRMC attorney Kent Taylor said he was unaware of the investigation by the Department of Finance until Thursday, but he would be reviewing the HFS contract with the hospital.

"We definitely want to make sure that the people we're dealing with are able to do legally what they say they can do," Taylor said. "If they're in violation of Title 26, we'll probably suspend operations with them until they're duly qualified."

HFS' President George Goodell was unavailable for comment on Thursday. The

company's attorney, Kathleen P. Allyn in Boise, said she could not comment on the assurance she had talked to Goodell.

HFS officials did confirm on Thursday, however, that they have contracts with other hospitals in Idaho, although they could not say how many.

Under Idaho code, any person or company that "engages or offers to engage in the business of receiving money from debtors for application to or payment of or providing" any debt is considered a collection agency and must be licensed with the state.

Failure to obtain a permit is subject to a fine of up to \$5,000 and five years imprisonment.

Senses spin beneath the big top

Action goes non-stop with five-ring circus

FILER — Overheating even the most severely television-shortened attention spans, Carson and Barnes' five-ring circuses kept a tent full of children and their parents in a state of olfactory, aural and visual overload for two hours Thursday afternoon.

With the exotic scents of camel, elephant, zebra, lion, llama and tiger dung wafting through the flaps of the 100-yard-long big top tent and the ringmaster's whistle strutting a new set of costumes, animals and performers in and out of the ring every two or three minutes, there were few slack faces in the crowd.

Tradition soaked the show, with nary a Jedi Knight or Star Wars motif in sight. Instead, the producers relied on the visual appeal of a brightly dressed troupe of professional show-offs who stuck their heads in the mouths of monster cats, balanced on their heads on swinging trapeze bars, or rode barbed-wire with only a pair of tighties and a leotard between themselves and the bone-jarring gait of a show horse.

Show-offs come in families. In this case, lively bands of Hispanic brothers, sisters and their parents tuned sibling rivalry to a fever pitch.

Their generations of derring-do standing three high on each other's shoulders, families of acrobats launched each other off a series of over-sized teeter-totters, catapulting the last and smallest of their number onto a teetering aerie atop a brother's or father's head from whence he would drop into the waiting arms of the clapping and dancing ground crew.

Anything can dance in a circus. Horses, high-wire artists, elephants, lions, tigers and clowns, even sad clowns. Dance they did.

Horses stepped lively in circling chorus lines, high-wire artists jitter-bugged in mid-air, elephants reared back and boogied over the tramping heads of showgirls, and the big cats danced a nervous ballet with their trainer. She didn't look like the nervous one.

After a rapid-fire showing of slip-knot, throw-away trapeze stunts, team juggling and a mountain range of 15 elephants standing with their front legs on the rumps of their fellows, the show climbed into the upper reaches of the tent for trapeze heroics.

Unlike television, things don't always work out in the end of a circus. That didn't seem to phase the crowd, who cheered Martin Morales as he bounced into the safety net after missing a triple somersault with a no-hands catch.

A final drum roll, some trumpet flourishes and a farewell from the announcer, and the show was over. In a couple of days all that will remain will be the trampled grass, some odd-looking cow-chips and the memories of children.

Political parties choose leaders

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Democratic Central Committee elected young party workhorse Joe Gulick of Twin Falls chairman, to lead the minority party through the next two years' struggle for the soul of the county.

Gulick, a 25-year-old barber, will be the new Democratic counterpart to returning Republican chairman Mark Stubbs, a 35-year-old lawyer with the Twin Falls firm of May and May.

Gulick beat out recent defector from the Republican Party Ken Pedersen, a local attorney who was also nominated for chairman Wednesday night. He replaces Dennis Maughan as chairman. Pedersen, who was not at the election, was elected vice chairman.

The Republican Party re-elected its officers from the last two-year term, with the only changes in officers coming in the five-member board of directors. Stubbs' vice chairman will be Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co. Vice President and Marketing Director Lance Clow.

In addition to heading up the party, Gulick is running his mother's campaign for the state Legislature, as well as the local campaign of lieutenant governor candidate state Treasurer Marjorie Ruth Moon. Gulick's mother, Sally Miller Gulick, faces Republican Ron Black in the race for House seat 22A.

Both Joe Gulick and Stubbs said they will emphasize grass-roots county races on up through statewide races. The difference for the Democrats this year is that they have a congressman who may offer some cautions to fellow Democratic candidates, said Gulick. "Any incumbent is an asset to the party. Stallings has proven himself as a true representative of the people, incumbent who always hard to beat," said Gulick.

"Our goal is to make ourselves visible and organized. I think organization is the key word this year," said Gulick, adding he was surprised to be elected over Pedersen.

With an eye toward visibility, he said, the party will open up a headquarters building sometime this summer. "We're going to make the Republicans work for the seats," he said.

"I think we're all going to work together. The local candidates will have to work with the state candidates and the state candidates will have to work with the local candidates," said Gulick.

Stubbs said the Republican Central Committee plans to focus its attention on county candidates because legislative and statewide candidates have an easier time generating popular support and workers.

Family protests humane officer's skunk removal in Burley

BURLEY — Police Chief Lerman Messley says his town has been "skunked" recently, but some citizens are objecting to the handling of the animal.

Brenda Poltena of Burley said she and her husband and brother attempted to capture and move a mother skunk and her seven kittens from under a house. But when she called the city's humane officer to get a carrier or crate in which to transport the animals, the call brought police to the scene.

"They told us if we tried to protect the animals we would be arrested, and then they

shot the mother," Poltena said.

She said the police and animal control officer, who works for the city, also killed the babies.

Police Chief Messley said a number of skunks seem to have moved into the north end of town recently and, on the serious side of the situation, they are creating problems.

A few weeks ago, he said, a skunk appeared at the Bonanza Motors car lot. It was sick and there was a possibility that it had rabies, he said.

"We have had quite a few calls. Some citizens are upset because there are skunks near their homes and some are upset because we want to do away with them," he said. "There

are not a lot of ways to deal with a skunk."

Messley said it is true officers have had to shoot some of them and that in the case reported by Poltena, the baby skunks were in a hole under a house and could not be reached, so the hole was flooded and the kittens probably drowned.

Poltena said the woman who lived in the house said the skunk had been there several years.

"We had already played with the babies and we know they did not have rabies. We just wanted to move them out in a humane manner and the police wouldn't let us," she said. "We are from Oregon and we are used to handling wild creatures and being in the woods. We just

wanted to take them, at our own expense, to the mountains and turn them loose."

Messley said a skunk that is cornered will spray and the strong spray will damage what it comes in contact with, especially if it gets into a building or other enclosure.

"We don't like to see wild animals in trouble, or to put people in danger, and we don't want to see children bitten or become ill," Messley said. "Certainly it isn't our business to be responsible for people's pets."

He pointed out that skunks, although cute when kittens, can create a serious nuisance as their population increases. He said of more concern than the nuisance is the danger to citizens if rabies is involved.

Leroy accuses Andrus of distorting history

TWIN FALLS — Lt. Gov. David Leroy Thursday blasted his Democratic gubernatorial opponent Cecil Andrus for telling the Twin Falls Optimists a week ago he was proud of his service as secretary of the Department of Interior in the Jimmy Carter administration.

"If my opponent is proud of his service in the Carter administration, I should be proud of it as it was, not as it is in his attempt to rewrite history," Leroy told the Optimists Thursday.

In his speech last week, Andrus said farmers should remember that American Falls wheat was selling for \$4.10 a bushel in Carter's tenure, while it is selling for \$2.70 now. "It

was the Carter administration and Jimmy Carter grain embargo that destroyed our markets," Leroy said.

Andrus aide Marc Johnson said Thursday that Andrus would have no response, as he made his point last week.

Leroy also said Andrus had pushed for enforcement of a 1902 Reclamation Act that limited farms using federal water project water to 168 acres, a move Leroy said would have broken up family farms. Andrus has said he was ordered to enforce the law by a federal court and that the law would not have affected a single Idaho farmer.

Leroy said he is in favor of the so-called Right-to-Work law. "I'm not anti-union, I'm pro freedom," said Leroy.

Jerome: Relief's spelled 'insurance'

JEROME — After four months without Jerome County now has a full package of liability insurance, and county officials are breathing a sigh of relief.

"Our first consideration was liability in everything we did," Commissioner Pam Smith said about the months without coverage. "It was an incredible state to be in."

Jerome County received word last week that it had general liability insurance retroactive to May 1 — through the Idaho Counties Risk Management Program or ICRIMP, a self-insurance pool established by the Idaho Association of Counties, Smith said.

Now, Smith added, "We're so relieved, so relieved. It's as much peace of mind as anything else."

ICRIMP had been organized by the association because counties throughout Idaho were

faced with escalating premiums, canceled policies or lack of insurance from private carriers. Currently, 38 out of the state's 44 counties participate in the program.

The county had been without liability insurance since Jan. 20, when a private company canceled its policy. In December, however, the county had sent the association an application and packet of material to join the program, and went about its business, Smith said.

"It was the worst week I've spent as a commissioner," Smith added.

The county quickly obtained "bare bones" temporary coverage through private insurance carriers for vehicles and "slip and fall" claims for injuries at the Courthouse, Smith said.

But the county continued to function without coverage on claims resulting from errors or

omissions by county employees.

County officials also reapplied to ICRIMP in March because they couldn't obtain the full package of insurance from private companies, Smith said.

County officials then waited, and waited, for coverage, frequently calling the program administrators, she added.

The holdup was caused by a delay in the processing of the county's policy by the London underwriters providing a layer of protection above the \$50,000 in the ICRIMP pool, said Twin Falls County Commissioner Judy Felton, a member of the ICRIMP board.

The pool from which claims are paid is generated by premiums counties pay to the program.

Smith estimated that a full year of coverage through ICRIMP will cost \$56,000, compared with \$49,970 the county previously paid for private insurance.

Boy dies in haystack blaze

GOODING — A 7-year-old boy died in Gooding County Wednesday night after he and two young companions tunneled into a straw stack and started a fire.

Fire Chief Pat Bishop of Gooding, said Theodore "Ted" Pulley was apparently trapped in the tunnel the children had built back into the stack.

"The two other youngsters, whom Bishop could not identify, were able to get out, may have gotten out before the fire spread.

Stack." Bishop said that Les White, the child's grandfather, met firemen and equipment at the gate and waded out to the burning straw stack, about 100 yards from his home.

"We cooled it down and began digging through the straw from the point where they told us the tunnel had been started. We recovered the victim's body about 8:40 p.m., the fire chief said.

He estimated the tunnel ran about 10 feet back into the stack. The wind-puffed white smoke and flames into a barbeque eaten by the child from crawling out, Bishop said.

"It appears the children were playing with matches at the end of their tunnel. I'm sure he died of suffocation," Bishop added.

and he was dead before the fire reached him.

The grandfather told officers he saw smoke coming from the stack and ran down to check. He located two of the three children but was told that the other was still "in there." Bishop said the stack was engulfed in flames and it was impossible for anyone to attempt a search for the child.

The victim is the son of Rosalie Dawn Pulley of Gooding and Randall Keith Pulley of Macomb, Okla.

Bishop said it was a tragic situation and recalled it was the 10th year since there had been a fatal fire in Gooding County. The other fire, which occurred when Bishop was on the department but not fire chief, involved a child that died in a house fire in 1978.

School budget hearing slated

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls School Board will hold a public hearing on Tuesday to adopt the district's proposed \$14 million budget.

The proposed total budget is down \$1.3 million from the 1985-86 budget because of a drop in state funds, officials said. However, the proposed budget does show a \$240,000 increase in salaries and benefits for all district employees.

The proposed budget includes \$9.2 million for salaries and benefits, \$1.1 million for bond indebtedness, and \$363,970 for maintenance and equipment acquisition, officials said.

The proposed budget also includes \$138,250 from projected revenue in property taxes, but school officials said they are more than certain they will not receive that much.

While state revenues will be up \$100,000, federal revenues will be down by \$153,000. The proposed budget shows a drop in revenues from \$15.6 million in last year's budget to \$14.3 million this year.

A copy of the School District's budget is available for public inspection at the district's Administration Building on Main Street.

Idaho to get forest fees share

WASHINGTON — Idaho will receive about \$7.5 million as its share of national forest fees for 1988 fiscal year, the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates.

Sen. Steve Symms said Tuesday that \$245 million will be divided among 41 states and Puerto Rico. It comes from Federal Service revenue generated from grazing, timber, minerals and recreation.

By law, the Forest Service returns 25 percent of the revenue to the states in which forests are located, said Ed Waldapfel, spokesman for the Sawtooth National Forest.

The states must use the money for public schools and roads, Symms said. Idaho uses 70 percent of its share for county roads and bridges. The rest is used for primary and secondary education.

Although precise figures for the 1985 fiscal year, which ended Sept. 30, are not yet available, Sawtooth National Forest reported \$181,207 to the local governments in 1984, Waldapfel said.

The USDA will send out 75 percent of the money in October and the rest in December.

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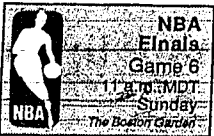
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Rockets hot after fight; maul Celtics 111-96

HOUSTON — The Houston Rockets rode an emotional high caused by the second-period ejection of star forward Ralph Sampson, and got 31 points, 14 rebounds and eight blocked shots from Akem/Olajuwon for a 111-96 victory over the Boston Celtics Thursday night that kept the Rockets alive in the NBA finals.

The Celtics still leading the best-of-seven series 3-2, can win their 16th NBA title with a victory in Boston Garden on Sunday in Game 6 or Wednesday night in Game 7. The Celtics have won 40 consecutive home games.



No team has ever come back from a 3-2 deficit in the finals to win the championship.

Mitchell Wiggins, again subbing for struggling starter Lewis Lloyd, scored 10 points and Robert Reid, who had 16 assists, and Rodney McCray 15 each for the Rockets. Kevin

McHale scored 33 and Larry Bird 17 for the Celtics.

Olajuwon's eight blocked shots tied the finals record set by Bill Walton nine years ago with Portland.

The Rockets, played with a vengeance after Sampson was ejected, outscoring the Celtics 20-8 on a run to taking an 11-point halftime lead.

Sampson had scored 10 points in the first quarter and added a dunk less than a minute into the second period, but a few minutes later, with 9:35 to go, he and Boston's Jerry Sichting, who is 15 inches shorter than the 7-foot-4 Sampson, started

fighting away from the basket.

Sampson was the only player ejected, although several players from both sides, including Boston's Dennis Johnson and Walton and Olajuwon and Wiggins of the Rockets, got involved in the brawl.

The sellout crowd of 16,016, angered by the decision of referees Jack Madden and Hugh Evans, spurred the Rockets to a big lead after order was restored: Just before the brawl, Olajuwon had hit two straight baskets to give the Rockets their first lead since early in the game, 34-33.

Seconds after Sampson was ejected, Johnson and Sampson's

replacement, Jim Petersen, almost got into another fight, and Robert Reid hit a technical free throw to start the 20-8 streak that put Houston ahead 54-41 with 2:44 left.

When the half ended with Houston ahead 58-47, Madden and Evans were escorted off the court by about a dozen policemen as the capacity crowd boomed.

Halftime did not slow down the Rockets' momentum. Led by Olajuwon's nine points, Houston outscored Boston 28-18 in the third period, the first time in the series that the Celtics had been outscored in that quarter.

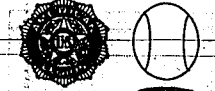
Three teams looking better

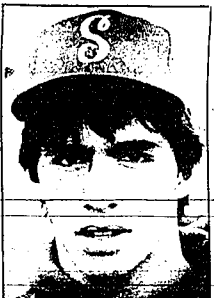

Bartholomew was the Gem State Conference's leading rusher last fall, earning first-team all-CSC honors and honorable mention all-state honors from the Idaho Statesman. As a catcher for the Bruins this spring he was second-team all-Gem State with a .374 batting average; he has caught for Twin Falls High for two seasons and will start his second summer as starting catcher for the American Legion Twin Falls Cowboys next week.

But being a two-sport athlete has its drawbacks when it comes to deciding on what sports field in which to continue your career.

Bartholomew has played football since he was in seventh grade, but like most youngsters, he's been playing baseball even longer.

"I don't know — it's kind of a tossup — but football's fun," he said.

Like many who have played for Twin Falls High football coach Bud Jones, Bartholomew paid his dues as a junior and earned the playing time as a senior. But his big break came in his junior year.

"Last year (Bartholomew's junior season), I did not go to play ball and the seniors got to carry it until one of them got hurt," said Bartholomew.

Bartholomew was called upon to fill in for him, ending the season with 324 yards rushing — and a

more-than-respectable average of 7.3 yards per carry.

Still, he spent most of that year blocking for the Bruins' Jeff Lambert from the other running back position in Twin Falls' veer offense. His senior year he spent with the ball — totting it 168 times for 678 yards.

"I carried the ball a lot," he said. "I think I carried the ball 45 times against Madison.

Madison football Coach Kelly Thompson remembers that game well. It was a contest that the Bobcats won in overtime and a "Yeah, he did he did carry it that many. We couldn't stop him," said Thompson. "He's a heckuva kid. After the game I put my arm around him told him what a great job he did. He was dead tired but

when he had the ball he was giving it 100 percent."

"It was one of those games. I didn't plan on winning it, because I thought they'd give the ball to him and it would be over," Thompson continued.

Bartholomew was responsible for more than half of the total rushes by Twin Falls players in 1985, averaging 5.2 yards per carry. He won the Gem State Conference rushing title by more than 100 yards.

He also was the leading scorer for Twin Falls with his 12 total touchdowns along with a two-point conversion, totaling 76 points. In addition, he caught three passes for 47 yards.

"He was our mainstay when we wanted to establish a running

game," said Jones. "He had several 100-yard games. He's a good tough kid and a good hard worker."

Bartholomew, who is 6-foot and weighs 176 pounds, attributes Twin Falls' offensive line for his mileage.

"That's the key right there," he said. "That line is great. They do their job well. If they didn't, you can't do your job."

Bartholomew said his parents have played a key part in his sports programs ever since he was a youngster.

"They've always been supportive and they're always backing me," he said. "They were always there to say, 'Hey, you've got football practice today and you've got to get there.'"

Or baseball practice; whichever the case may be.

Witnesses vent opposition to bird farm closure

TWIN FALLS — A succession of witnesses spoke in favor of maintaining the state game bird farm near Jerome at an Idaho Fish and Game Commission public hearing here Thursday night.

Most of the individuals tended to question or overlook the arguments that the Idaho Fish and Game Department's five-year plan had extended for possible closure of the game farm, largely on biological and economic grounds.

Only one person spoke for closure of the farm and he admitted it was in retaliation for a continued attack on wild turkeys, 35 of which North Dakota provided in return for the 800-plus pheasant brood stock.

The audience was most appreciative of Bill Nemi, longtime

bird farm manager, who questioned every argument presented in the five-year plan. Under the plan Idaho's upland game birds will be managed through 1990.

State Bird Manager Gary Will opened the meeting with a slide show that contained the propositions and statistics the department was espousing. Will noted that through private interests, Idaho would basically double the number of birds planted on state-owned wildlife management areas and maintain the day-old chick program. The economics of that, he said, would be \$2,000 for planting 4,000 adult roosters this fall. The bird farm's annual budget has averaged \$86,100 for the past five years with a high of \$99,000.

On the bottom economic line, Will said a cost-benefit analysis indicated that it cost \$8.50 to plant an adult

rooster "under the gun," or just before hunting season. The one bird Idaho received for adult planters from Coulee, Wash., — was for \$8 per bird delivered at the five wildlife management areas across the southern part of the state.

He noted field checks indicated that perhaps as many as 80 percent of the planted roosters were reduced to possession by hunters, making the cost to the state \$14.17 per rooster. If the day-old chick survival reached 2 percent in the bag and is figured at a 60 percent harvest level, the cost becomes \$15.60 per bird, 15 percent "lost."

By the day-old chick program wound up in the bag, it would reduce cost to \$14.75.

Will said the other consideration was the genetic realigning of 45 years of inbreeding, which had developed a larger tetter bird on one hand but reduced adaptability to

wild living on the other. "Through selected breeding, the game farm was producing show birds," Will said.

But he added the laming of the wild instinct left the birds more vulnerable to predation and less able to cope with the stress and weather factors in the wild.

But various witnesses took exception to those arguments.

Nick Rokich joked that "45 years of breeding turned them into turkeys."

Rokich said tourism (attracting hunters to Idaho) was "all we have left" because potatoes and beef don't bring farmers anywhere. He said the U.S. poultry industry was the world's most advanced and the department could take pheasant-raising lessons from it.

He said biologists should know • See FARM on Page B5

 He said the pheasant situation demanded "innovation, get up and go" from the department.
 Neml and several others said mismanagement should be investigated if it is costing \$0 to raise wild chicken pheasants and get for \$1.60. Neml said his selected breeding had provided a Chinese pheasant strain that was being sought by many states and some foreign countries. He said the farm should be used as insurance against a major kill off, adding restocking would return population levels in half the time as natural reproduction.
 Don Kiser of Jerome asked if the farm is closed "what's next? Big game feeding, fish hatcheries?"
 Marshall Everheart of Jerome suggested the deterioration of the farm was "by design," noting "we used to rebuild five pens a year. None has been rebuilt for many years now."
 "If the costs figures shown are true, they indicate mismanagement and should be studied," he declared.
 The commission is scheduled to meet this morning at the regional office in Jerome to discuss several matters. The Jerome bird farm's status probably will be reviewed, but no action is expected at this meeting.

N.C. State runner jumps off bridge

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) — North Carolina State distance runner Kathy Ormsby, who set the collegiate record in the women's 10,000 meters this year, was hospitalized Thursday with a serious spinal injury after jumping off a bridge, police said.

The incident occurred Wednesday night after she dropped out of the 10,000 final during the NCAA Outdoor Track and Field Championships at the Indiana University Track Stadium.

"What we know is she dropped out of the race at the 6,500-meter point," said Lt. Doug Cox of the Indianapolis Division of the Indiana University Police Department.

"Apparently, she left the track stadium and people believed she had just continued to jog after dropping out," Cox said. "She jogged toward

the New York street bridge (about two blocks away) and then did jump off the 60-foot bridge.

"She was discovered by her coach, Ralfe Geiger, and she did say to him at that time 'that she did jump off the bridge.'"

Asked about a possible motive, Cox said, "The speculation is that she is a perfectionist and she didn't think she had done very well. She felt despondent because of the way she was running."

Cox said, "There is no physical evidence to indicate that anything else happened."

Ormsby is a pre-med major and a member of the Dean's List at North Carolina State.

Ormsby was listed in serious condition in the surgery intensive care unit at Wishard Memorial Hospital, according to hospital spokeswoman Karen Wilczewski.

In the competition on Thursday, Oregon's Ken Flax, contending he had three technically bad losses, broke the meet record in the hammer throw three times and equalled the collegiate mark during qualifying.

Flax's best throw of 255 feet, 1 inch, came on the last of his three attempts and matched — the collegiate record set this year by Washington State's Tore Gustafsson of Sweden.

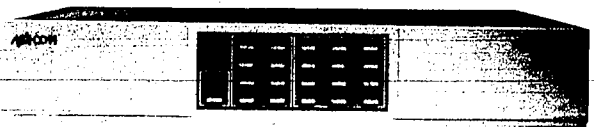

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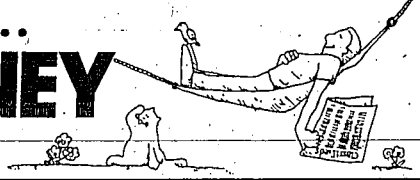

Galleries unwrap summer shows

SUN VALLEY — Member galleries of the Sun Valley/Ketchum Gallery Association are welcoming summer's eve with fresh exhibitions to be unveiled tonight from 5 p.m., then continuing throughout June.

Images Gallery, 620 Sun Valley Road, will exhibit works of Idaho artists Maureen Boyle, Divit Carzo and Nancy Ward, Boise, along with those of Ketchum's Jack Williams.

Boyle's watercolors include several large paintings depicting the brilliant colors of spring flowers, while Divit will feature watercolors of Idaho landscapes. Ward will exhibit handmade paper pieces with both a sculptural and painterly feeling, and Williams' work entails a number of 8-by-10-inch black-and-white prints which show what an individual can do with an instant camera and a home dark room.

Many of Images' fine craft artists, including Jim and E. Holcomb, will have works on display. The Holcombs are known for their functional ceramics painted with flowers and trout.

Images will also show turned wood vessels by Melvin Lindquist who has work displayed in the permanent collection of the Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York City — and, to add glitter to the exhibit, artistic jewelers Leslie Correll, Shellie Bender and Cleve Gardner will have a number of pieces on display.

Next door to Images, the Hissing Goose Gallery will show three-dimensional art, including kinetic

sculptures by Charles Ringer and bronze sculptures by Santa Fe, N.M., artist Philip Birchoff.

Also on display will be wearable art by Tim Harding, Deborah Cross, Elizabeth Garver and Judith Bird. New to the gallery are the mono prints of Stuart Ashman of Santa Fe, N.M. His work features Southwestern colors and imagery.

Contemporary wood and glass furniture and lodge polo pine log pieces by various artists will also be on display at The Hissing Goose.

The River Run Gallery, 231 W. will be exhibiting work by their regular stable of artists. In the crafts area, the gallery will show new work by ceramists Tom and Paris Gotman. Their work features whimsical vases and plates decorated with animals, fish and feathers.

Jeff Zigulis and Nicholas Bernard will exhibit raku pieces, while Idaho artist Craig Zweifel will be represented with his deco-style of glassblowing. In addition, Donald Carlson's red glass will be shown along with goblets by Steve Smyers and glass sculpture by Stephen Dee Edwards and Henry Summa.

Idaho artist Ken Carlson will display leather works, while Ketchum's Dee Ford Falter will show weavings of a sculptural nature.

Among the two-dimensional artists represented will be Southwest artists Sari Stuges, Fran and Hal Larsen and Jean Richardson. Stuges, longtime featured artist at River Run, paints watercolors of Pueblos and other American Indians.

The Larsens' work is again in watercolor. Fran's work is decorative and playful. She extends the paintings onto the frames to make

Richardson, new to the gallery, also describes the Southwest, but utilizes the technique of the abstract expressionist period of painting. Her subject matter deals with the Western American Indian. Stonington Gallery, Main Street & Sun Valley Road, will feature the works of Nancy Taylor Stonington, and other local artists. Stonington is known nationally for her watercolors, many of which depict the landscapes and flowers of the Sun Valley area.

Her newly released edition of lithographs, "Seasons of Sun Valley," is from the original watercolor series commissioned by the Sun Valley Company for its 50th anniversary remodeling. "Seasons" is Stonington's interpretation of spring, summer, fall and winter in the Sun Valley area.

Other local artists displaying works will be sculptor Rod Kagan, batik and serigraph artist Jennifer Bellinger and porcelain artist Barbara Alderman.

The Sun Valley Gallery, 4th & Main Street, is currently exhibiting a show entitled "A Look Back: The Past Four Years." All the work included in this exhibition was produced at the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities between 1982 and 1986.

Exhibiting artists were invited to the center to work with students, present lectures and slides

Amnesty International finds friends among music fans

SAN FRANCISCO — For the nearly 14,000 rock fans who attended Wednesday night's five-hour opening concert in the Amnesty International tour, the excitement was what was happening onstage.

After all, this six-city series of shows shapes up as the most celebrated rock tour of the year; a dramatic extension of the social consciousness of the Live Aid concerts of 1985. Among the tour headliners: Sting, U2, Bryan Adams and Peter Gabriel.

But Jack Healey, executive director of Amnesty International in the United States, was equally concerned with what was happening in the Cow Palace lobby here. Healey wanted to know if the fans' enthusiasm for the bands, an enthusiasm that resulted in an estimated 800,000 orders for the 150,000 available seats nationwide, would translate into interest in Amnesty International itself.

When he saw dozens of fans stopping at the Amnesty International tables to pick up informational pamphlets, he clasped his hands together in celebration.

"Look, they are picking up the pamphlets even before they go over to buy the T-shirts," he said. "And they are actually filling out the post cards."

The post cards are part of a campaign to recruit 25,000 "freedom" writers to new Amnesty International members who will write a post card a month on behalf of six "prisoners of conscience": Hugo de Leon Palacios in Guatemala, Thozomile Gwetla in South Africa, Lin Kwangung in South Korea, Riad al-Turk in Syria, Tatyana Samoylova Osiyova in the Soviet Union and Nguyen Chi Thien in Vietnam. These six have been adopted as symbols of the more than 4,500 prisoners AI feels have been unjustly imprisoned around the world.

"The whole purpose of the tour is to raise awareness in this country of what Amnesty International does around the world for people . . . our campaign to help those who have been arrested and tortured because of their beliefs," Healey said.

"The media coverage also sends a message of hope to the tens of thousands of political prisoners around the world that they haven't been abandoned. It also helps put pressure on governments to stop all the ugly torture that goes on every day."

To that end, Healey, concert promoter Bill Graham and several of the artists are holding press conferences in each city to outline the goals of Amnesty International, which marks its 25th anniversary this year.

Bono Hession, lead singer of the Irish rock band U2, was especially passionate about Amnesty International and the significance of this tour.

"I like to think of the tour and the press conferences as sort of performance art in the area of communications," he said after Tuesday's press conference. "We're using the medium itself rather than just the music as the stage. After all, this is the age of politicians as pop stars. So why can't pop stars be a new type of politician?"

Healey, who left the priesthood in 1968 after years in a Franciscan monastery, becomes visibly moved when he talks about the treatment of political prisoners around the world.

At the press conference, his body almost seemed to shake with emotion as he outlined some atrocities: "They take a chainsaw and cut the head off people . . . they take a stick and beat your feet so that all the bones are broken . . . For women, it's always sexual abuse; not for a minute, not for a day, but for weeks and mon-

ths and years. . . . Sitting in his hotel room later in the day, he added, "I could have gone into even worse incidents, but I held myself back — and it goes on in a third of the countries in the world."

After the Forum concert in Los Angeles tonight, the "A Conspiracy of Hope" tour continues with arena shows in Denver Sunday, Atlanta on Wednesday, Chicago on June 13 and a stadium show in East Rutherford, N.J., on June 15. The final concert will be broadcast live on MTV and on the Westwood One radio network.

U2, Sting, Bryan Adams, Joan Baez, Peter Gabriel, the Neville Brothers and Lou Reed will be on all six shows. Jackson Browne is on the California dates only. Ruben Blades, Miles Davis, Third World, Carlos Santana and Pete Townshend will be added to the final show — as will Fela, the disgraced Nigerian singer whose 1984 arrest on a currency smuggling conviction was the subject of an Amnesty International campaign.

At the Cow Palace, artists did individual sets of between 20 and 45 minutes, with everyone returning to the stage for a version of Bob Dylan's "I Shall Be Released."

Soviet rockers help out evacuees

MOSCOW — Leading Soviet rock musicians, performing amid green light beams, swirls of machine-generated smoke and batteries of speakers, gave a benefit concert Friday for the victims of the Chernobyl nuclear plant disaster.

"Money is money," Alla Pugacheva, probably the most popular singer in the country, told the audience of 30,000. "Tonight, we want to give our hearts to the people who were affected."

The 2½-hour event was called "Account 904" — the number of the bank account where the public has been asked to send contributions for Chernobyl relief of the 92,000 people evacuated from the disaster area.

Pugacheva said that the box office receipts will provide about \$140,000 for the relief fund. Records and tapes will be made of the performances, she said, and could raise millions more for the people who had to leave their homes in the danger zone, some with little more than the clothes on their back.

Pugacheva said that the concert was conceived by musicians who saw television reports of the accident and wanted to make a contribution to the relief effort.

Addressing the audience in the indoor stadium built for the 1980 Olympics, she urged them to send donations to the Account 904 at the Kiev State Bank, Kiev, 60 miles south of Chernobyl, is the closest large city to the disaster site.

The government television network showed none of the benefit concert. It offered as its feature program after the evening news a European singing contest in Norway. Nor was there any mention of the concert on the main news program. And the concert was given virtually no advance publicity in the controlled

Abbie Hoffman brings back '60s

NEW YORK — One big issue was what to wear: An Indian bedspread, perhaps? Fringe? Bell-bottom blue jeans? Embroidered work shirt? Love beads? Eight-inch-wide psychedelic necktie? Tie-dye? Or maybe the ultimate relic of the Pleistocene 1960s, the Nehru jacket? All week long, right up until hours before Abbie Hoffman's "Make Love Not War Great '60s Ball" here Thursday night, "that was the biggest question," Hoffman said. Biding slightly as he edges into his second half-century, Hoffman, the former Yippee leader and one of the Chicago Seven, opted for his trademark flag cape. But as he advised everyone else: "Dress is optional."

Many of the several thousand people who crowded into the old Fillmore East — now high-tech, and renamed the Saint — seem to have studied some kind of '60s dress manual. Mesmerized in front of huge screens flashing film clips of Woodstock, the Vietnam War, J.F.K.'s White House and Dean Rusk's State Department, they wore headbands (not the kind from Jane Fonda's "Workout"), miniskirts, T-shirts, non-designer jeans and Give Peace a Chance buttons. Many wore tie-dyed shirts or pants, a phenomenon remarkable mainly because they had purchased these garments, not whipped them up in the bathtub. On the other hand, many of these nouveau tie-dyed creatures were barely out of diapers when their 1960s ancestors were ruining sinks with packages of non-hard coloring agents.

Kathy Dobkin, a true survivor of the 1960s, took a long look at the crowd around her. To her friend, fringed-vested John Simon, the 51-

year-old general manager of WBAI-FM here, she confided, "I guess we're all antiquies."

The '60s are robotic, mechanical, said David Peel, a former associate of John Lennon. "The '60s are a stop light. The '70s were like a caution light. The '60s were a go light."

In the '60s, many people vowed never to trust anyone over 30. Perhaps that is why so many of those '60s veterans waffle about their ages now. Peering out from behind John Lennon-style wire-rims, Peel, for instance, would say only that he is in his "late 30s."

By contrast, real estate broker Dennis Gralla of Bergen County, N.J., was only too eager to reveal that he was 26. Why would he come to a party dedicated to a decade he barely remembers? "Because I love the whole feeling, the atmosphere, the music, what it stands for." What it stands for, said "Club Dead" T-shirted Gralla, is "peace, togetherness and one happy family."

Indeed, a "family reunion" was what the Rev. Jesse Jackson likened the evening to. Arriving with all the fanfare and crowd adulation of a celebrated rock star, the former presidential candidate greeted old pal Hoffman with warm embraces and a salute to the virtues of "friendship born out of struggle." Looking back on that era, "it was a mixture of sweat and blood that made things happen," Jackson said. Now, he said, "our challenge is to put on this generation an agenda of substance."

Hoffman, an activist in the anti-war movement of the '60s, had an issue of substance he was eager to talk about.

"Hands Across America," he said. "I'm really angry about it. I've been steaming, steaming, just furious."

press. However, the concert was filmed by television and may be shown at a later date, said Art Troitsky, the concert organizer and manager of Bravo, one of the rock groups participating.

Also, there was a TV hookup via satellite to Kiev where a Soviet Journalist, Vladimir Svetlov, presented a parade of people who had done cleanup work around the stricken nuclear power plant.

"Come on, let's applaud every time we hear the name of that town!" Pugacheva urged as miners, firemen and others sent greetings to the Moscow audience and performers.

A Chernobyl worker later expressed "our heartfelt thanks" to balladeer Alexander Gradsky, whose set won a long ovation from the Moscow audience.

In the most moving segment, the audience stood in silence to honor those who died in the world's worst nuclear accident and its aftermath. The toll now stands at more than 20.

Rock music, in the opinion of some Communist Party ideologues, is suspect because of its Western origins and association with a hedonistic life style. Nonetheless, rock groups are tolerated, and some of the most popular were on the stage to promote Chernobyl relief.

According to Troitsky, musicians got the idea for the concert and ob-

lained support from Communist Party and Moscow city authorities. "Things are getting a little bit better for us in music," said a musician who would identify himself only as Sasha.

Time was too short to line up Western rock stars for the show, he said, but Pugacheva said that another concert might be organized in August with international participation.

Troitsky said that he would like to have an international concert including Bruce Springsteen, Julian Lennon, Stevie Wonder, Paul McCartney and the rock group Dire Straits. None has performed in the Soviet Union.

Pugacheva led the first song called "Twentieth Century." A group known as Autograph, which took part in last July's Live Aid concert to benefit African famine relief, was the lead-off group for the Chernobyl program.

The audience was subdued by comparison to rock concert crowds in the West, and applauded almost dutifully as the Autograph group and another known as Recital performed.

The biggest applause was for Alexander Gradsky, a tenor with a powerful voice who accompanied himself on the guitar and dedicated a song to the memory of the late Vladimir Vysotsky, a composer and ballad singer.

A heavy metal group, called Krulz,

was so loud that many in the audience put their hands over their ears. Its members came as close as

Soviet musicians do to the punk style, with the lead guitarist wearing a black sleeveless shirt, red vest

and shoes and black satin pants with glimmering trim. In contrast, members of a New Wave group known as Bravo showed up in suits and ties. Their female singer wore a frilly evening gown.

Concert ordinance stirs flap

SAN ANTONIO, Texas (AP) — A first-of-its-kind city ordinance aimed at sheltering children from obscene lyrics at rock concerts is drawing either cheers or jeers, depending on who's doing the talking.

Conservative groups who pressured the City Council to pass the ordinance in November — with support from Mayor Henry Cisneros — say the new restrictions have forced rock groups to clean up their acts.

But opponents say the new ordinance has only cut attendance and rock-group bookings.

The law restricts unescorted children under age 14 from attending rock concerts with obscene language at city-owned facilities. The ordinance sparked debate on parental responsibility, the constitutionality of such a law and how it would be enforced.

Its proponents are pleased. "We have seen a cleanup," said Bobbie Mueller, whose Community Families in Action spearheaded the drive for the city to crack down on lurid rock concerts.

"They (rock groups) are taking their own steps in cleaning up their mouths. The ordinance is working," she said after attending a concert by the heavy metal group Black Sabbath. "They are aware that there are a bunch of monitors in the audience — parents."

But promoter Jack Orbin, who books the most shows in San Antonio, dismotes the law.

"The only thing they've accomplished besides the legislators showing their ignorance by passing a worthless piece of legislation is they hurt our attendance," he said.

LONDON (AP) — Vanessa Redgrave says being tall is an occupational hazard, especially at the 6-foot-tall actress' pace. She has just portrayed transsexual Renee Richards in the CBS TV-movie "Second Serve," and now she's back to Shakespeare, acting in two of his plays over the next eight weeks.

"I don't know," singer Buffy Sainte-Marie said. "It made me feel good. I did an anti-apartheid concert, Sport Aid and Hands Across America, all in one day. I felt terrific."

Moments earlier, a thousand or so people had been grating while Sainte-Marie sang in a laser-lit, planetarium-rooted dance area. Country Joe McDonald was preparing to perform, and after that, the Grateful Dead's Bob Weir played "Blowin' in the Wind" with Peter Yarrow of Peter, Paul and Mary. The Chambers Brothers had appeared, and Stokely Carmichael — now known as Kwame Ture — was in the audience. Sometime after 1:30 in the morning, Yoko Ono floated in and mingled with the crowd. Did it feel like the '60s? Sainte-Marie smiled.

"Better," she said.

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Wildlife painter maintains his models in frozen poses

ASHLAND, Ore. (AP) — Unlike John James Audubon, the great 19th century naturalist and wildlife painter, who hunted for his models and posed them with wire, Gerald Pettit relies on a 35mm camera for realistic form.

He also keeps models in his freezer.

"They're not much good for shape, but the color's good," said Pettit, as he pulled out plastic bags, held them up to the light, and identified the lifelike forms inside as a pheasant, a towhee, a mountain quail and a sapsucker.

"Look at the iridescence on the neck," he said, taking a band-tailed pigeon out of a bag and gently stroking the golden feathers.

"You really can't appreciate the color unless you hold them in your hand," he said as he gently took a wood duck from the freezer and turned it so the light reflected off the deep blue on the wing. "It's never going to quack and fly away. It's always going to be an abstract, an imitation."

The 59-year-old artist has been painting watercolors for the past 25 years and sells them at the Cascade Wildlife Gallery, which he owns with his wife, Kay.

Pettit's studio is in a bedroom of his house in a hilly neighborhood of Ashland. Through a small window he looks southeast over the valley to the foothills of the Cascades, which stand between the artist and the marshes of the Klamath Basin, a major stop for birds on the Pacific Flyway.

"Birds do a lot of awkward things, and once in a while I get a nice pose and work directly from it," he said.

At other times he will combine birds and

backgrounds from a number of photographs he has on file to create a dense and realistic image of an idea that springs from his imagination.

Mounted on a gunstock with the plastic top from a coffee can for a cap on the 1,000mm lens, Pettit's camera is about as close as he comes to hunting any more. "I never hunted enough to be a really good shot," he said. "I had a loss rate (wounded birds) that bothered me."

Friends who still hunt, cats and cars provide him with enough specimens for his freezer files. He has cataloged them and has a collection of 18 birds.

A photograph of a black tern sitting on a post was clipped to his easel. A clear plastic grid of squares mounted over it helped him make a pencil drawing he would transfer with carbon paper to watercolor paper for the painting.

"For the first five years I painted, I drew directly on the paper," Pettit said. "I knew about this technique, but I stayed away from it because it seemed like cheating."

But frequent erasures marred the delicate surface of the watercolor paper, so he gave in to cheating to get a better painting.

An admirer of 19th century English landscape artist J.M.W. Turner, Pettit values color the most.

Pettit had little training in art and actually stumbled into his profession.

It happened 25 years ago when he worked as a welder at Oak Street Tank & Steel. He was walking to work one day and happened to stop at the studio of wildlife artist Dave Hogerbaumer. He was struck by what he saw.

"I took six whole lessons from him," said Pettit.

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Video tape format war rages

CHICAGO — The new format battling VHS and Beta for a share of the home video market — 8mm — has a new rival. The VHS-C, a version of VHS, officially declared war on 8mm during the just concluded Consumer Electronics Show here.

So far 8mm, mainly a factor in the home-movie market, has been attracting buyers because its camcorder (camera-recorder) is small. That is possible because the 8mm cassette is about the size of an audio cassette. In Chicago JVC introduced an improved VHS camcorder — the GR-C7, which weighs only three pounds and is as small as an 8mm camcorder. At the JVC exhibit, which was constantly crowded, people were trying out demonstration units. An informal survey indicated that most were very impressed with the GR-C7.

The VHS-C cassette is the standard 1/2-inch VHS width but its shell is about the size of an 8mm cassette. The VHS-C cassette now offers one hour playback time, an improve-

ment over the 20-minute playback time of previous VHS-C machines. An adapter is used to playback the VHS-C cassette on a standard VHS machine.

The news from Japan is that some manufacturers that were ready to jump into the 8mm market reportedly have decided to make VHS-C units instead. Sony, the leading 8mm company, began its counterattack in Chicago with a eight-page pamphlet explaining why its camcorder is superior to the JVC unit.

At the Disney exhibit at the Consumer Electronics Show, two young women dressed like Alice were passing out brochures on "Alice in Wonderland," the feature-length cartoon that was recently reduced to \$29.95. One of the Disney representatives said that in August, probably at the Video Software Dealers Association convention, the company would announce the cassette debut of another feature-length car-

toon. The release date, most likely, would be just before the Christmas shopping season.

VCR owners who are dedicated to the Beta format had better stock up on Beta machines while they can. Video Marketing's Home Video Marketplace says that a study featuring projections about software and hardware, Beta will be dead by the end of the decade. This year, the study reports, only 8 percent of VCRs shipped to U.S. dealers will be Beta, down from last year's 14 percent. The prediction is that the percentage will plummet to 3 percent next year and to zero in 1988.

'Top Gun' sounds like a disco war

Movie reviews

TOP GUN (PG). The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you'll ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, jocular male-bonding, streaming jets and so much techno-pop pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: the trappings are flabbergasting — and the camera work is so edifying a knockout — but the story is a slezzy rehash of "Celling Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman" — drowned in beefcake and macho bathos.

SHORT CIRCUIT (PG). Derivative, heavy-handed comedy, involving some broadsides against the military-industrial complex, about an endearing runaway robot who comes alive when struck by lightning. With Billy Steedy, Steven Guttenberg, Fisher Stevens, Austin Pendleton.

THE MONEY PIT (PG). Overly elaborate special effects and a less than inspired plot trip up what might have been a funnier comedy about a couple coping with the hazards of trying to remodel a Long Island mansion. With Tom Hanks, Shelley Long, Alexander Godunov, Maureen Stapleton.

OUT OF AFRICA (PG). Because we are in a well-defined, faintly magical, perfectly appointed past where a level of intelligence is prized in this film, what is its problem? Casting, mostly, and a sense of place: Meryl Streep, as Isak

Dinesen, may convince us utterly that she is in love with Africa, but our views of it are a little too stately to really feel the place. — And Robert Redford's Denis Finch Hutton is a real cipher. Streep can pretty nearly do anything in the film — except that she cannot provide all the heat in a love affair when Redford is not giving much to his role.

POLTERGEIST II (PG-13) Despite the fact that they've moved into a new home with no TV, the family from "Poltergeist" is bedeviled once again by a parade of spooks, beasts and eclipstic pranksters (though the two most important — Steven Spielberg and Tobe Hooper — are absent). The new crew tries for a certain self-aware humor, but unfortunately, they can't top the built-in joke of sequels: No matter where these people go, the same movie keeps happening to them! Except this time it doesn't work.

SWEET LIBERTY (PG-13) Writer-director-star... Alan — Alda's strained, flabby and unfunny view of a movie troupe's invasion of a college town, as historian Alda's prize-winning book on the American Revolution gets turned into teen fare. Why? Why? What then would want it? Why would we believe that movies get made this way, by omnipotent writers, (Alda, Bob Hopkins), working behind the back of baby-bully directors? Dumb, dumb, dumb. As the visiting movie stars, Mitchell Pfeiffer and Michael Caine still emerge unmauled, but Lillian Gish's role as Alda's dotty mother is cruel and irrelevant.

Sly Stallone's 'Cobra' winds up top opener

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Sylvester Stallone's latest foray into violence, "Cobra," shot into first place in box office receipts by grossing \$15,652,147 over the Memorial Day weekend.

The Warner Bros. film opened nationwide in 2,113 theaters Friday, the largest opening so far for a major 1986 release.

MGM's "Poltergeist II: The Other Side," finished second by returning \$12.4 million in four days of release. The story of a novel alienating set to a disco beat, "Top Gun," starring Tom Cruise, commanded \$9,449,432 in its first eleven days. It made its debut two weekends ago in the No. 1 spot but has fallen to third.

"Short Circuit," a Tri-Star comedy about a robot, dropped to fourth place with a weekend gross of \$5,463,333.

Alan Alda's behind-the-scenes comedy "Sweet Liberty," rang up

\$11,045 in its second week and came in fifth.

At number six, Richard Pryor's reflective "Jo Jo Dancer, Your Life is Calling" took in \$1,773,343.

Oregon makes a play for filmmakers

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — The movie camera focused on a nervous gaggle of wide-eyed boys, huddled around a campfire deep in a dark, damp Oregon forest.

The scene from "The Body," an adventure movie scheduled for release this summer, was being shot in Oregon partly because of the state's lush scenery. But the eerie forest was created by Hollywood in a dark, damp Eugene warehouse. Summer rain had forced filming inside.

"A real weak link is nobody can predict weather in this state," production manager Steve Nicolaides joked.

Despite Oregon's frequently inclement weather, Hollywood spent more than \$13 million on location in the state during 1984 and 1985, according to the state treasurer's office.

Meanwhile, Oregon's own film industry has grown and prospered. An estimated 75 companies are producing movies, commercials, videos and educational and industrial films for national and international distribution.

The state invested \$10 million from its employee pension fund in Embassy Pictures with the understanding that the Hollywood production company would make at least one movie in Oregon.

"We were lobbied very hard to come and film here," Nicolaides said. "One of the reasons we came here was the cooperation from government."

Even without "The Body," the pension fund would have benefited from the investment. When Columbia Pictures bought Embassy last year, the state realized a 15 percent

return on its investment, said Julie Boeder, an aide to the state treasurer.

"There is a lot to offer in this state — varied beauty," Nicolaides said. "You can go from stunning forests to mountains to heart-of-the-country farmlands. It's unique because it hasn't been shot a lot."

Oregon also is attractive because of its proximity to California and the absence of a sales tax, which lowers production costs, according to Patricia Matzdorf, manager of the state film and video recruitment office.

Hollywood productions have brought temporary prosperity to several small towns in Oregon, but it usually has come with a price. After filming of "The Body" shut down Main Street in Brownsville, several merchants complained that they were denied customers because they were denied access.

Nicolaides estimated Embassy spent more than \$1 million shooting the film in Oregon, but most of it was spent in Eugene, where Embassy set up its production offices and where most of the equipment was rented and set materials were bought.

Embassy donated about \$4,000 worth of picnic tables, about \$2,000 worth of lumber and \$2,500 for use of a public park to Brownsville. About 100 locals were hired as extras, and crew members spent cash in town during their two-week stay.

Still, the benefits were largely temporary. When the crew left, so did its money, and the movie's profits, if any, will go to Hollywood.

Thus, some say the state should place more emphasis on developing its own film industry, and that the

state could do more to encourage investment in the state's film industry, such as encouraging tax incentives for movie investment.

Matzdorf estimates there are 75 production companies in the state, and many related service companies, which annually contribute from between \$25 to \$75 million to the state's economy.

"Hollywood is starting to realize more and more that there are professional people up here," said Dianne Siles, president of Allan Sandler Films. "There's a lot going on . . . and there's a lot of opportunity for growth."

Sandler is pushing for a comprehensive film program in Oregon's public college and university system to provide the technical talent — the film editors, lighting specialists,

sound people — that the industry needs.

"There's no problem getting the talent here," Allan Sandler said, noting that his company has a steady supply of actors who flock to the Ashland Shakespearean Festival. "The problem is getting the technical people."

Others say the industry suffers from a lack of recognition. When large Oregon companies need a commercial or in-house film, usually they think of California first.

"I think we need to go out and inform the big companies within the state to buy Oregon," Matzdorf said. "They can buy their commercials, their in-house industrial films, they can buy everything right here in the state."

File clerk-writer puts his life into comics

CLEVELAND (AP) — When Harvey Pekar talks about himself he likes to pull out comic books to illustrate precisely what happened to him at any given point in life.

"It's all autobiographical," said Pekar, who has been publishing his own avant-garde comic books for 10 years. "In very many cases, they're literally true."

His annual publication has brought the 46-year-old file clerk critical acclaim in New York's Village Voice, and he has a sort of cult following in a few large cities where the book is distributed in specialty shops, the occasional bookstore or record store and comic book shops.

He hopes an anthology of his work published this spring by Doubleday & Co. will widen his exposure. The first run of 11,000 copies quickly sold out.

"I've lost money each year until last year, when you add in my Doubleday advance," said Pekar, who still supports himself with the Civil Service job at a Veterans Administration hospital.

There have been 10 yearly issues of Pekar's book, each entitled, "From Off the Streets of Cleveland Comes . . . American Splendor." He has left-over copies of all but two issues stashed throughout his cluttered apartment.

Although the format is that of a comic book, with newspaper pages, square panels and characters' words and thoughts printed in balloons above their heads, the similarity ends there. The market for these comics is far different than the market for Batman or Superman.

Most parents wouldn't want their children reading Pekar's book. The

language is often graphic, and the situations embarrassingly adult.

The often-depressing subject matter is drawn directly, as Pekar writes, "from Harvey Pekar's humdrum life."

He has taken readers through two failed marriages and countless rejections and dashed hopes — a string of failures that has left him with a jaundiced view of human nature.

"I guess she's about average," says a character on the cover of American Splendor No. 2.

"Average?" Pekar's character responds. "Hey, man, average is dumb."

An episode included in the Doubleday anthology is entitled "Standing Behind Old Jewish Ladies in Supermarket Lines," in which Pekar discusses the art of picking the right checkout line at the market. He writes:

"That day, I headed for the shortest line . . . only one person in it and she wasn't buying much. But I was takin' a chance because she was an old Jewish lady. Pretty soon, I could see I made a mistake. She started this complicated hassle with the cashier."

Pekar said his blunt writing about ethnic groups — he treats them all harshly — has never come back to haunt him.

"I suppose if I had a universal audience, it could be a problem," he said. "But I treat just about all ethnic groups the same. I can find plenty that's laughable in the whole human race. All you have to do is look at the state of the world. It says a lot about our intelligence."

Tango composer includes vibraphonist at jazz festival

NEW YORK (AP) — Astor Piazzolla, Argentina's best-known tango innovator and composer, will join avant-garde jazz vibraphonist Gary Burton in a tour of Western Europe and Japan in June and July that will include their first live recording in an international jazz festival.

Burton will join Piazzolla's quintet as its "guest soloist," playing two tango suites especially composed for him by the Argentine musician.

Burton first became acquainted with Piazzolla's work two decades ago, when he visited Buenos Aires with saxophonist Stan Getz.

"Three years ago, we met again in Paris," Burton recalled in a telephone interview from Boston. "I told him I'd like to do something together some day. Not long ago, he called me from Paris to say he had composed something and wanted me

to see that music. I loved it. Piazzolla is one of the few musicians I'd love to play with."

At 65, Piazzolla, whose career started blank in 1936, is still considered "the father of modern tango," a form of contemporary urban music designed more for listening than dancing. He had revolutionized tango arrangements and composing in 1960 with his "Octeto Buenos Aires," which shortly after became the "Quinteto Nuevo Tango," a group which incorporated avant-garde structural, harmonic and melodic intricacies to the fabric of traditional tango and created the new genre.

A "live" record will be made of their presentation at the renowned Montreux Jazz Festival in Switzerland.

NBC takes time to toughen up debuting news magazine, '1986'

Three months after it was scheduled to debut, NBC's much-traveled news magazine show, now called "1986," will premiere on Tuesday.

When we last left the show, it was called "American Almanac." The series, co-hosted by Roger Mudd and Connie Chung, debuted in August 1985. After six monthly airings, it was scheduled to debut in a regular time slot in March 1986. Three weeks before airtime, however, the series was postponed.

"We did not have a backlog to sustain a quality program," says executive producer Ed Fouhy. "It was my recommendation to kill the show. To say that there was pressure from the entertainment division is to put a bum rap on people who have been supportive of the show."

"We didn't have enough time, there were only four weeks from the time the last 'American Almanac' aired in January to the time we were supposed to debut in March," continues Fouhy. "By then, we had decided to change the orientation of the show away from softer, 'celebrate America' type of pieces, and a lot of the earlier pieces we had worked on were no longer valid."

The past three months have been used to build a backlog of 35 to 40 pieces. A new managing editor, former CBS news executive and producer Robert Chandler, was brought in. And a new name was created (among those considered and rejected were "Profiles," "NBC Newsweekly," "Focus," "Prime News" and "NBC News Journal"). The show, which NBC Chairman Grant Tinker once said he "would stick with forever," has also been given a permanent slot on NBC's fall schedule, airing Tuesday nights at 10 (ET).

The format of "1986" will feature three or four pieces per show: one investigative, one a personality profile, another on a current trend, another on a lighter subject. There will be a segment called "Open Letter" which gives viewers a chance to comment.

At press time, the stories airing on June 10 had not been decided. Some of the segments the staff has finished include:

- A profile of convicted murderer

Ted Bundy (subject of a recent NBC miniseries), featuring audiotapes of interviews done over the years with him. Bundy is scheduled to die in the

electric chair in June.

- An investigation of young door-to-door salesmen who are victimized.

- A profile of Charlie Plumb, a former Vietnam POW who gives inspirational speeches to young people.

- A look at ballet teacher Jacques D'Amboise's trip to China to recruit dancers.

A successful prime-time news magazine show has eluded NBC. Thirteen such programs have come and gone since the early 70s. Few may remember such noble attempts as "Monitor," "First Camera," "Summer Sunday," "Prime Time Sunday," "Prime Time Saturday," "Weekend" and "NBC Magazine."

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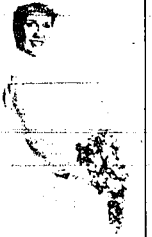

'St. Elsewhere' actor started out delivering pizzas in Hollywood

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Stephen Furst, who got his start in Hollywood delivering pizza, says never turn down a small part because you never know where it may lead.

Indeed, Furst started at the bottom on NBC's "St. Elsewhere" and worked his way into a regular role in the hospital drama.

Furst, who was promoted to waiter at the pizza restaurant after he starred in the short-lived series "Delta House," says he tried out for a bit part — only five lines — in "St. Elsewhere" because it was such a prestigious program.

When his agent told him he would have to audition for the part, he says, "I swallowed my pride and agreed to do it. I never let pride come between me and a paycheck."

Furst got the job and made a brief appearance as a young intern.

"It was just a one-day job," he says. "I did the role, said goodbye to everyone and went home. My agent said they wanted me back. They'd written another scene for my character."

Six weeks later he was called back to play the same character in another scene. "Then they called me back again," he says. "This time my character was one of the leads in the story. About the third day of

shooting, Bruce Paltrow, the executive producer, came down to the set and said he'd like me to come back next year.

"I thought he meant for another show. I didn't learn until later he meant as a regular member of the cast."

Furst made four appearances in the second season of the show. He became a regular in the 1984-85 season.

In his first appearance he was Dr. Elliot Berger. Then he was Elliot Wagner. Finally, and permanently, he became Elliot Axelrod.

Furst is sensitive to occasional descriptions of Axelrod as a bumbler.

"I think he's a great doctor because he's sensitive to people's pain," he says. "I think his only problem is that he's trying to better himself. Everyone identifies with that. He's an underdog and people cheer for him. He's trying to be accepted socially. He doesn't have enough self-confidence. He puts his foot in his mouth, but never in a stupid way."

Furst grew up in Norfolk, Va., and studied acting at Virginia Commonwealth University in Richmond. He married a fellow student and they now have two sons.

After graduation, Furst and Lor-

raine moved to Los Angeles. He got a job as a pizza delivery boy and she got a job as a waitress.

"I delivered pizza for nine months before I got my first acting job," he says. "I could write a movie about the things that happened to me. I used to deliver until 2 a.m. in Hollywood. I had no idea how dangerous that was. One night I delivered two pizzas to house and a naked man answered the door."

CBS News' official explanation: the loss of seven West Coast markets and changes in time slots at 14 other affiliates for last Thursday's broadcast, when CBS aired a live NBA game between Boston and Houston in primetime. . . .

Still, NBC, riding on the tide of the network's primetime popularity, had been threatening CBS for several months, tying the once and future king in shares five times recently,

Writer specializes in words soap opera actors spout

LOS ANGELES — As a soap opera writer, Frank Salisbury earns his living putting words in other people's mouths.

Salisbury, who writes the dialogue for two episodes a week of the NBC daytime serial "Santa Barbara," has been writing soap opera dialogue for the past 15 years. His credits include "The Guiding Light," which brought him an Emmy award; "General Hospital," which won him an Emmy nomination; "As the World Turns" and ABC's prime-time serial "Dynasty."

In his spare time, Salisbury turns out yet more dialogue in the form of marathon story conference. He writes comedies rather than the angst and suffering of the soaps. His play "The Seagulls of 1933" won the Los Angeles Drama Critics Award. He has another play, "Shooting in Scotland," which he hopes to have produced on Broadway.

Soap operas consume so much material — most are now an hour long — that they require a platoon of specialized writers. "Santa Barbara" has three headwriters, a script editor, three breakdown writers and four dialogue writers. ABC's "General Hospital" has 15 writers, making the credits look like those of "Star Wars."

"The head writers do the bible, the long-term story projections," Salisbury said. "The breakdown writers take that and break it down into episodes and scenes and write very detailed outlines. The dialogue writers write the scripts, and the script editor keeps everything straight."

Salisbury said he's always pleased

when an actor follows his dialogue precisely, but he's also resigned to the fact that most actors merely use the script as a blueprint and change the words.

In the years he's worked on the soaps, Salisbury said he has seen the form change considerably. "They've changed both in content and in the way they're done," he said. "They're much franker now, more explicit. And they're done more by committee. There are no more writers shaping the shows alone. They're doing more location work, too. The shows today are geared to younger audiences than they were when I started."

Salisbury spends one day a week at the "Santa Barbara" office for a marathon story conference. He writes the scripts at home on his word processor in three to four days. Often, he finds himself working over a weekend and taking a few days off in the middle of the week.

"It gives me plenty of time to pursue my other projects," he said. "It's like having a grant to work on your own things. We don't make as much as prime-time writers, but it's steady and \$2 weeks a year."

Salisbury had written for prime-time anthologies in the 1950s, but gave it up to join a contracting company. He was a vice president when the company was bought out by an Eastern conglomerate.

"I suddenly found myself out of work," he said. "One day I ran into my old agent and he said he handled the head writer of 'The Edge of Night' and he was looking for a writer. I wrote a couple of sample scripts and I was hired. I've been at it for the last 15 years. The longest time I was out of work was six months."

He also has two unproduced screenplays.

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Pavarotti parades winning singers in 'Requiem' taping

In a crucial scene in "The Wizard of Oz," Dorothy and her friends see the giant face of the wizard, whose voice is frighteningly loud. Thanks to an inquisitive Toto, they discover that the wizard is a mere man talking on a microphone behind a curtain. The scene comes to mind on a rainy day in Philadelphia.

The front of the stage of the Spectrum is banked by thousands of white flowers. The rear is filled with a chorus of 350. Center stage is the Opera Company of Philadelphia Orchestra, conducted by Lorin Maazel. And in their midst are 31-year-old American soprano Susan Dunn, 27-year-old Hungarian mezzo soprano Idlko Komlosi, 31-year-old Russian bass Paata Burchuladze and 30-year-old Italian tenor Luciano Pavarotti. They are performing the Verdi "Requiem" for a live audience of 17,000 and a TV audience that will see "A Pavarotti Salute to Youth" Wednesday on PBS stations.

This performance had its origins in 1980, "the 20th anniversary of my debut," says Pavarotti. He had been talking to representatives of the Philadelphia Opera about appearances and, according to the assistant director, Jane Nemeth, "He said, 'I'd be happy to come to Philadelphia. I love the city. How about if you do an international voice competition with me?'" From that meeting was developed the "Opera Company of Philadelphia-Luciana Pavarotti International Voice Competition." The three young singers in this show are among 51 winners of the second competition, selected from over 1,000 entrants.

From the start of preliminary auditions to the final selection is a two-year process, usually worked around Pavarotti's performing schedule, says Nemeth, who is also director of the competition. For this one, singers were heard in Paris, London, New York, Vienna, San Francisco, Milan, Buenos Aires and Caracas. Final European auditions were held in Modena, Italy, Pavarotti's home town. Of the 51 winners, 24 will appear in the "Requiem" and the Philadelphia Opera's next two productions of "La Boheme" and "Ballo in Maschera." The balance will be cast in future presentations.

opera with something that he has been given in his career. He wants to give that back to the next generation." Although the tenor's expenses are paid, he receives no salary for this performance (his usual fee, according to Nemeth, would be \$30,000 to \$100,000). Financing for the concert is a joint effort of the Philadelphia Opera and Business Leadership Organized for Catholic Schools, with funding for the TV show from a General Motors grant.

This selfless public-spirited effort will provide audiences with Verdi's glorious music played by an orchestra in absolute harmony, backing up the silken voices of three competition winners and the tones of Pavarotti, which are like free-flowing honey.

Backstage, the honey is in short supply on the afternoon of the performance. Along a brick-walled corridor are dressing rooms belonging to the Philadelphia 76ers, now being used for this production. On a door labeled "Visiting Team" is a small sign reading "Mr. Pavarotti." Somebody was being droll. Inside, in formal dress, Pavarotti looks as though he had King Kong for lunch. Surrounded by sycophants who appear to be waiting for a role in Fellini's next movie, he grows impatient as a woman applies pancake makeup to his fingers. His only moment of amusement comes when somebody tries to take a picture of him and her flash doesn't work.

Now he hops across the corridor to a lounge, which has been temporarily converted into a photo studio. The tenor, who is making large sacrifices to encourage artists, seems reluctant to suffer gladly the subsidiary crafts of journalism and photography. From the moment he

enters the room, he wants to leave it. The photographer says that she wants to take a Polaroid shot to check the light, and he says, "Be ready and go! Not so much talking!"

"Take the picture!" Every time she tries to explain something, he shouts, "Tell me when you are ready! Don't talk too much! Come on, we are boiling!" (We are also furiously mopping our face with a handkerchief.) He turns this way and that, doing toothy grins. Then he says, "Finito!" When the photographer says she needs "more expressions," he exclaims, "What are you telling me? Be careful what you say!" Much of this is framed in humor, not unlike that of the leader of a high school gang who is being funny at the expense of the class nerd — in front of the whole schoolyard. One wonders whether, anywhere in his career, Pavarotti was victimized by somebody shouting, "Sing, damn it! Don't waste my time with gestures and talk. Sing! It's hot in here!"

He is joined by Maazel, a genial man, who reminds a journalist that his name contains two "a's." Maazel wants to pose behind Pavarotti, but the tenor cries, "No, I'm going to stay behind you. I am already five times bigger than you. If I stand in front, I look 10 times bigger." For once he has made an understatement.

As she shoots each pose, the photographer speaks "celebrity photosee," meaning that every shutter click is accompanied by "Terrific... beautiful... wonderful." Pavarotti parrots her, adding, "Fantastic, fantastic!" He poses with fists thrust out, like a boxer and with teeth thrust out, like a canine boxer. He vamps, he does what he thinks are sexy poses. It

seems not so much posing as showing off.

Finally, he is joined by the three competition winners, every one of whom is over 6 feet tall. Paata Burchuladze, the Russian bass, has a speaking voice that could start landslides. The photographer asks Pavarotti to sit for this shot. He shakes his head and tells Burchuladze to do so. Burchuladze says if Luciano doesn't sit, he won't. He clearly sees himself as Pavarotti's Jilly Rizzo (he has hopped into and out of the star's dressing room with the relentlessness of a one-man entourage). Pavarotti now offers a running commentary on this photo session in Italian — (the word "Pavarotta" comes up often). It sounds derisive, though only the singers understand, and they break into giggles.

When the four get into a close pose together, Pavarotti says, "Welcome to the United States" and hums the first six bars of "The Star-Spangled Banner." They all break up again. After several more shots, he announces, "Finito!" and leaves the room. The photo session is over.

Out in the corridor, the tenor slips behind the wheel of a golf cart, bidding his competition winners to come on board. A reporter asks Pavarotti, "Have you heard any voice that reminds you of yours when you were starting out?"

"Please, I cannot talk any more!" he says.

Burchuladze sings "Goodbye, my love," from a song nobody can identify, and Pavarotti whistles "The Man I Love" as he turns on the ignition. Laughing uproariously, the regal operatic quartet whizzes off toward the stage for the dress rehearsal, leaving the peasants behind.

Betty White wants a closet pet

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Betty White, animal lover extraordinaire, has been wondering how she can get a pet into the house she shares with "The Golden Girls" on NBC.

"I've always had visions of Rose having a closet animal the others don't know about," she says. "A lop-eared rabbit or something. So I think plans are in the works."

The hit comedy about four women who share a retirement home in Miami also stars Bea Arthur, Rue McClanahan and Estelle Getty. It was created by Susan Harris, who was behind "Soap" and "Benson."

As Miss White speaks, two dogs are at her feet. One is Timothy, also

known as Timmy, a black miniature poodle, and Cricket, a white Bichon Frise, a rare breed found in many early oil paintings.

At home is a cat, T.K., for Timmy's Kitty. "She never lets Timmy out of sight, so that's where the name comes from," she says.

"I've had animals all my life," says Miss White, who is president emerita of the Morris Animal Fund (named for animal nutritionist Dr. Mark L. Morris, not Morris the cat) and a member of the board of directors of the Los Angeles Zoo. She is the author of "Betty White's Pet Love," now in its third printing and available in paperback. The book is

about the use of animals in therapy.

"We've come very far in realizing how much these little furry creatures keep our stress factors down," she says. "The reason pets help the elderly is that they force them to think of something else. It forces them to get up in the morning and care for the pet."

Miss White recently lost Sooner, a mixed Labrador-golden retriever she rescued from Sunset Boulevard 15 years ago. "He was six months old when we found him on the street with a broken leg," she says. "We brought him home for one night to look for a home. We just never found the right home."

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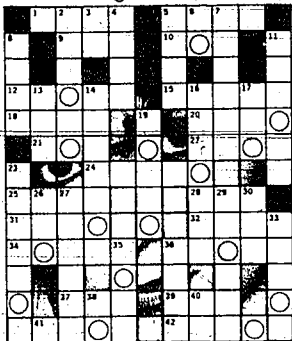
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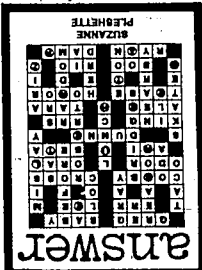
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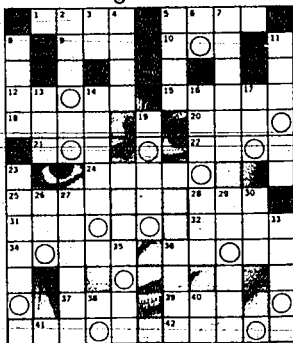
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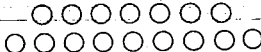


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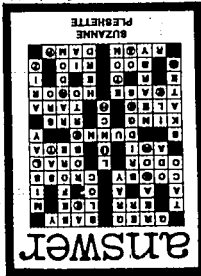
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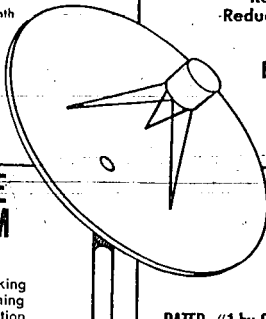
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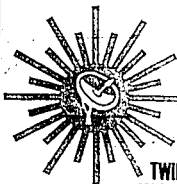
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
