Reagan says Soviets move on arms control

GLASSBORO, N.J. — President Reagan, in his first formal response to Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev's latest arms control offer, said Thursday "it appears that the Soviets have begun to make a serious effort" toward negotiating an agreement.

Reagan, in a speech delivered at a New Jersey high school near the site of a 1967 U.S.-Soviet summit, said the Soviet offer cannot be accepted without change, but could be the basis for serious negotiations.

"Until recently, the Soviet response has been disappointing in a number of ways," Reagan said. But citing what he called "fresh developments" in several areas, the

Stick to SALT, House resolution advises

WASHINGTON — The House voted approval Thursday of a resolution urging continued U.S. adherence to SALT II, the unratified nuclear arms control treaty that President Reagan says he will not use in the future to guide decisions on weapons deployment.

The Democratic-controlled House

approved the non-binding resolution on a 256-145 vote after five hours of debate and following 227-187 defeat of a Republican-backed proposal that would have basically endorsed Reagan's decision.

Before final passage, the House voted 406-9 approval of another Republican-sponsored proposal saying the chamber supports the efforts of U.S. arms control negotiators in Geneva to reduce superpower nu-

clear arsenals.

On the final vote, 219 Democrats and 37 Republicans voted for the resolution. It was opposed by 17 Democrats and 123 Republicans.

Idaho's congressmen, Democrat Richard Stallings and Republican Larry Craig, both cast "no" votes.

At about the same time, the Republican-controlled Senate Armed Services Committee voted 109-5 to support the resolution.

"I have come here today to say that the Glassboro Summit was not enough, that indeed the Geneva Summit was not enough — that talk alone, in short, is not enough. I have come here to invite Mr. Gorbachev to join me in taking action — action in the name of peace," Reagan said.

The president noted that he recently wrote Gorbachev to press for high-level talks on summit preparations. No response has been received. White House officials have said.

The school gymnasium was jammed to its capacity of 1,200 people and a crowd gathered outside listened to

the president's speech over a public address system.

After the president spoke, he shook each senior by the hand as the student came forward to receive his or her diploma. Some of the girls gave him a kiss on the cheek.

The president was presented with a varsity jacket in maroon and gold, the school colors, and an honorary diploma. He said he was grateful for the diploma, but quipped, "I have always nursed a sense of guilt that the first one I received was honorary."

Senate votes partial sales tax deduction

WASHINGTON — The Senate on Thursday approved a partial deduction for some state and local sales taxes and agreed to a final vote next week on a radical plan for overhauling the federal income tax.

To help pay for the sales tax amnesty, the Senate agreed to require that every person age 5 or older who is claimed as a dependent have a Social Security card, in an effort to slow tax cheating by falsely claiming exemptions.

"We're in the home stretch," Majority Leader Bob Dole, R-Kan., said near the end of the 10th day of debate on the bill. A few hours earlier, facing a stack of 209 or more amendments that had stalled final action on the bill, Dole had threatened a weekend session — even the pending holiday recess — unless senators got moving.

As the day wore on, amendments

prize amendments behind closed doors while the bill was being written but that other senators had to carry on their fight on the Senate floor and find a way to pay for provisions they proposed.

Cyanide-tainted painkiller linked to 2nd Seattle death

SEATTLE — A man who died earlier this month was killed by cyanide after he swallowed Extra-Strength Excedrin capsules from a tainted bottle, authorities said Thursday, in the second poisoning death linked to the painkiller.

Bruce Nickell died June 5 of acute cyanide poisoning, said Dr. Corinne Fligner of the King County medical examiner's office.

"We assume that he took Extra-Strength Excedrin that had cyanide in it, but I can't say that because I wasn't there and I didn't see what he swallowed," Fligner said. "We assume the two things are related."

She said there was no test to determine for sure whether Nickell had swallowed Excedrin.

Nickell lived in Auburn, Wash., five miles away from Katherine Sue Snow, whose June 11 death was linked to cyanide in a bottle of Extra-Strength Excedrin capsules.

The cyanide from a capsule in Nickell's bottle appeared to match a sample taken from Snow's bottle, said Jim Davis, director of the investigations branch of the Food and Drug Administration in Seattle.

—The FDA — on Wednesday — night issued a warning against use of the

medication, and manufacturer Bristol-Myers followed with a nationwide recall of Extra-Strength Excedrin capsules.

Potassium cyanide also was found in a capsule from a bottle used by Nickell, 52, said Sue Hatcherott, an FDA spokeswoman in Seattle.

Nickell, a state employee, had taken capsules from the bottle, his wife said.

He initially was pronounced dead

of natural causes at Harborview Medical Center in Seattle. He suffered lung problems.

The deaths now being investigated as a cyanide-related death," the King County medical examiner's office said.

Of the 56 capsules left inside the 60-capsule bottle in Snow's home, three contained significant amounts of cyanide, FDA officials said. One cyanide-laced capsule was found in the bottle from the Nickell home, said Kelly Fry, an FDA spokeswoman.

Steve Nickell had noticed that the lot number 5-H192 on the bottle matched the number on a bottle used by Snow, said FDA spokesman Bill Grigg in Washington, D.C.

Snow and the Nickells could have shipped at the same store, said Jim Detrick of the Auburn Police Department.

Paul Webking, Snow's husband, said he thought his wife had purchased her bottle a few days earlier at an Auburn Safeway of Albertsons store.

Doctors had performed an autopsy on Nickell, but Harborview spokeswoman Tina Mankowski said toxin screens are not part of a normal autopsy routine unless there's some reason for suspicion, in which case an autopsy is referred to the medical examiner.

Nicotine's hook as sharp as opium

BOSTON — Tobacco shows "stunning" parallels with opium in its power to addict its users and keep them hooked, according to a Harvard report.

Both substances create strong physical dependence, the report notes, and users of both suffer withdrawal symptoms when they try to kick the habit and often fall to give it up for good.

"In the larger scheme of things, in terms of the burden of ill health and premature diseases in this country, heroin use is dwarfed by the smoking problem. There's no comparison whatsoever," said Dr. Jay A.

Winsten of the Harvard School of Public Health.

Winsten is director of the school's Center for Health Communications, which issued the report Thursday.

The addictive substance in tobacco is nicotine, while opium is the source of heroin. Among the similarities cited between the two substances:

• Both produce strong withdrawal symptoms. Those of opium products include rapid heart beat, runny nose, sweating, fever, insomnia and diarrhea, while tobacco's include craving for tobacco, irritability, restlessness, drowsiness and intestinal upsets. Opium symptoms go away within seven to 10 days, while those

of tobacco may linger for several weeks.

• Users of both develop a tolerance and must use increasing amounts to satisfy their needs.

• Like heroin users, 70 percent of smokers who successfully give up the habit relapse in the first three months, and 75 percent do so by the end of the first year.

• Both drugs alter mood. After each puff of a cigarette, a burst of nicotine reaches the central nervous system that induces feelings of satisfaction.

• There are substitutes for both kinds of addiction — nicotine chewing gum for smokers and methadone for heroin users.

Tour airline suspends flights as canyon crash probe starts

GRAND CANYON VILLAGE, Ariz. — Grand Canyon Airlines suspended tour flights Thursday as crews working in rugged terrain recovered the bodies of all 25 people killed when a helicopter and airplane collided, then crashed in flames into the canyon.

Officials said there were indications the helicopter's main rotor had sheared off the plane's tail, and that one of the plane's tires had struck the helicopter's engine cover.

"I don't know at what altitude the collision

occurred, but my best guess is that it happened below the rim" of the canyon, said John Guthrie, deputy superintendent of Grand Canyon National Park.

The National Park Service and the Federal Aviation Administration have said aircraft are supposed to fly no lower than 2,000 feet

above the mile-high rim, but opponents of the advisory regulation is rarely enforced.

Flight manifests showed that 18 of the victims of Wednesday's crash were foreign tourists, authorities said.

Four Americans aboard the plane were identified Thursday, said Sheriff Joe Richards.

They were: Marcus Christian and Katrina Christian, both of Brentwood, Ala.; Sherry Goss of Jappa, Md.; and Jay Whittenburg of Mountain Home, Ark. No ages were available.

There was no indication when the names of other victims would be available. Earlier, Dr. William Thomas, Coconino County medical examiner, said it might take as long as 10 days to identify the badly charred bodies.

Grand Canyon Airlines of nearby Tusayan, which owned the 20-occupant DeHavilland Twin Otter airplane, said it was suspending air tour operations pending results of the crash investigation.

Coconino County detectives returned Thursday to the crash site at Tuna Creek, a tributary of the Colorado River, to

photograph, diagram and measure the impact points.

National Guard helicopters were used to remove the bodies, which were taken to Park Service maintenance building for storage in a refrigerated trailer pending transfer to Flagstaff, 130 miles to the south. Authorities announced a memorial service for the victims Sunday at the Grand Canyon lodge.

National Transportation Safety Board investigators from Washington arrived Thursday to begin sorting out the final seconds of the aircraft.

Baker cites importance of keeping Symms' seat for GOP

POCATELLO (AP) — Former Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker says when Republican Steve Symms was elected to the U.S. Senate six years ago, that was one of the things that helped him become a leader.

He said here Thursday night he considers Symms' re-election one of the most important races in the country. "Other than the presidency itself, nothing is more important to this country than the re-election of Steve Symms" and other Republican senators facing tough battles.

About 60 Republicans began gathering Thursday night for party meetings that are to continue through Saturday afternoon.

New state officers will be elected, but party Chairman Blake Hill is not expected to face serious opposition for another term.

Lyn Nofziger, a close associate of President Reagan, is to give the keynote speech this morning. New Hampshire Gov. John Sununu is featured speaker at Friday's dinner.

Baker told a news conference he isn't ready yet to decide whether he will make another bid for the Republican presidential nomination.

But he said as soon as the November general election is over, he will sit down and make that decision.

Baker said he plans to concentrate his efforts this year on the 21 contested Senate races. He said he's optimistic Republicans will keep their slim majority in the Senate.

"It won't be easy. We've got to hang on to this seat and the others

around the country," Baker said.

He said there are a handful of races where Republicans are in trouble. But he said Symms' campaign against Democratic Gov. John Evans is not one of them.

Baker predicted that Congress will have a new tax bill on the president's desk by Labor Day, but he declined to predict what it will contain.

Baker said he thought Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has at least a chance of winning the Senate leadership job if Republicans retain control of the Senate.

"He is held in extremely high regard by the other senators. But in a contested race with secret ballots, you never know. There's simply no way to tell how it would come out," Baker said.

Baker said Tennessee is a right-to-work state, and he flatly supports right to work.

He was asked that in his state, whether economic development came

first, or whether Tennessee's improved educational facilities helped land new industry. He said those decisions must be made by each state. "You just take the bull by the horns and do it," he said referring to his state's major commitment to improving education.

Symms said he wasn't ready to commit himself to any presidential contender yet.

"You are one of my candidates for president," he told Baker.

French hostages to go free

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — An anonymous telephone caller on Friday said two French television crewmembers kidnapped here in March would be released in 24 hours, the Independent Beirut newspaper al-Nahar reported.

It was not possible to confirm the caller's statement.

al-Nahar said an Arabic-speaking caller claimed he spoke for the Revolutionary Justice Organization that took responsibility for the abduction of four crew members of France's Antenne-2 station in Moslem West Beirut.

Gramm-Rudman will be fixed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The three main authors of the nation's budget-balancing law said Thursday they will team up again in an effort to fix the law if the Supreme Court strikes down its central enforcement mechanism as expected.

Sens. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, Warren Rudman, R-N.H., and Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., said that instead of relying on a backup provision in the law calling for a vote of Congress to carry out across-the-board spending cuts, they would rather try to amend the law to overcome the court's anticipated constitutional objections.

"We have a perfect vehicle to do that in that the current debt ceiling is going to expire on Aug. 1," Gramm told reporters. He noted that was just two weeks before the date when spending cuts would be ordered under the law.

House legislation condemned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The far-reaching House legislation that would require all U.S. firms to withdraw from South Africa drew angry condemnation Thursday from the Reagan administration as a misguided approach to dealing with racial separation and repression in the troubled country.

"We still believe that our business presence there gives us some limited influence over the course of events," the State Department declared. "We do not believe we should abandon the forces of moderation and compromise in that country."

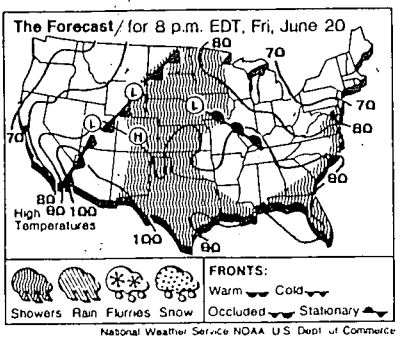

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American soldier shot, killed

TEGUCIGALPA, Honduras (AP) — A Honduran soldier shot and killed an American soldier during joint military maneuvers in this Central American country, U.S. military sources said Thursday.

The U.S. sources said military authorities from both countries were investigating whether the killing was accidental.

The name of the soldier was being withheld pending notification of next of kin, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The shooting occurred near Juticalpa, capital of Tegucigalpa, about 125 miles east of Tegucigalpa, the U.S. sources said.

Suit aims to break mob hold

NEW YORK (AP) — Prosecutors opened a new assault against organized crime Thursday with a civil lawsuit aimed at breaking the Mafia's alleged hold on New York City's cement industry.

The lawsuit, filed under federal racketeering laws, asks U.S. District Judge Vincent Broderick to appoint trustees to manage the affairs of the District Council of Cement and Concrete Workers and one of its member organizations, Local 6A, Cement and Concrete Workers of the Laborers International Union of North America.

The union has been "infiltrated, dominated and exploited" by the Colombo organized crime family, the lawsuit charges.

Guerrillas attack garrison

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — The military said leftist guerrillas on Thursday killed or wounded 50 government troops in a rifle and mortar attack on a San Miguel garrison that also houses American advisers.

The U.S. Embassy said three American military advisers and two U.S. military physicians were inside the walled garrison at the time of the four-hour, pre-dawn attack, but escaped injury.

The guerrillas, grouped as the Farabundo Marti National Liberation Front, claimed during a broadcast of their clandestine Radio Venceremos that the attack by four battalions resulted in 253 soldiers killed or wounded.

was chiefly sponsored by Rep. Dante Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the Foreign Affairs Committee, which voted 29-11 passage last week.

Rep. William Broomfield of Michigan, ranking Republican on the panel, offered the Republican alternative that was voted down shortly before the resolution passed. Broomfield's proposal would have Reagan adhere to the SALT II limits as long as the Soviets do likewise. Since Reagan says the Soviets don't adhere to the pact, that would mean Reagan's new policy could go ahead.

Boyle choice to take bench

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho Falls attorney Larry M. Boyle was appointed Thursday to fill a vacancy created by the April 1 retirement of 7th District Judge Boyd R. Thomas.

The appointment by Gov. John Evans takes effect Nov. 1, said Jean Terra, spokeswoman for the governor's office.

Boyle, 42, was elected without opposition in the May primary to a four-year term that begins Jan. 5.

He was the only applicant seeking serve the remainder of Thomas' term, which caused a delay in the appointment because state law requires the governor to have two or four names from which to choose.

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Stallings: Legal process worked at last

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Democrat who defeated former Idaho Rep. George Hansen in his bid for an eighth term in Congress said the legal process has finally caught up with the Republican convicted of violating the Ethics in Government Act.

"I hate to see a person be put in jail; it's a tragic thing for anybody," Rep. Richard Stallings said Thursday. "But there comes a point when you have to pay for your discretions or indiscretions."

U.S. District Judge Joyce Hens Green on Wednesday reversed a decision she made two days earlier and ordered Hansen to report to a minimum-security prison farm in

Virginia by 3 p.m. Friday.

Hansen was convicted in 1984 and sentenced to five to 15 months in prison and a \$40,000 fine for withholding personal financial information from Congress. Federal prosecutors charged Hansen omitted \$334,000 in profits, loans and other transactions from financial disclosure forms filed with the House of Representatives under the 1978 Ethics in Government Act.

Mrs. Green agreed with a Justice Department argument Wednesday that a recent decision from the U.S. Court of Appeals precluded Hansen remaining free on bond while his case is on appeal because it was doubtful he would succeed in an-

pollate court. Stallings, who defeated Hansen for re-election in 1984 by just 170 votes out of more than 200,000 cast in Idaho's 2nd District, said he has seen "absolutely no movement" on efforts Hansen has claimed were under way to clarify congressional intent for the law.

Hansen, 55, said Congress never intended for the law to carry criminal punishment, but Stallings said he agrees with the jail sentence Hansen received.

"What good is a law without some kind of punishment?" he said. Meanwhile, a former field representative for Hansen said he was shocked by Mrs. Green's decision to

order the former congressman to prison. Hansen is the only public official ever convicted under the Ethics in Government Act.

"It's incomprehensible that our system of justice would require somebody to go to prison over trumped-up charges," said John Scoreby of Idaho Falls. "This has been a set-up job from the first. . . . What's ridiculous is that if he never filed a report at all, the only thing which could have done is fine him \$5,000."

Scoreby also blamed the news media for not accurately informing the public about the issues surrounding the case.

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Falling tree kills Lannen, senator who pushed lottery

PINEHURST (AP) — State Sen. Vern T. Lannen, D-Pinehurst, was killed Thursday when he was hit by a falling tree on a logging project in the Powell Ranger District in Idaho County.

Officials said Lannen, 42, was crushed by the tree about 9 a.m. Others working on the project could not free him in time to save him.

He was transported by helicopter to a hospital in Missoula, Mont., where he was pronounced dead. The accident occurred near Lowell, which is located near the Idaho-Montana state line. Idaho County sheriff's officials said an officer was investigating at the accident scene Thursday night.

Idaho County officials said they were not notified of the accident until 11:30 a.m. Lannen was employed by North Idaho Timbers. He served his fourth term in the Senate this year from the state's legislative 4th District. Lannen sponsored a number of proposals in recent

legislative sessions to amend the Idaho constitution to allow establishment of a lottery. He also sponsored legislation this past session that would have authorized the sale of liquor on Sundays in Idaho. That measure did not pass, but counties now have a local option to sell liquor on Sundays.

Lannen, who worked as a lumberjack and miner, had been mentioned in the past as a possible challenger to U.S. Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho. Lannen declined to run against Craig in 1984, saying Craig's campaign was too strong with President Ronald Reagan's support.

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Lannen is survived by his wife, Judie, and two children.

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BOISE (AP) — A judge has dismissed a drunken-driving charge against William Roden, an attorney and prominent lobbyist in Idaho representing clients concerned with drinking laws.

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Roden was to have been tried Wednesday. Dobaran said the city planned to appeal the dismissal.

Baker cites importance of keeping Symms' seat for GOP

POCATELLO (AP) — Former Senate Majority Leader Howard Baker says when Republican Steve Symms was elected to the U.S. Senate six years ago, that was one of the things that helped him become majority leader.

He said here Thursday night he considers Symms' re-election one of the most important races in the country. "Other than the presidency itself, nothing is more important to this country than the re-election of Steve Symms," he said.

Baker told a news conference he isn't ready yet to decide whether he will make another bid for the Republican presidential nomination. But he said as soon as the November general election is over, he will sit down and make that decision.

Baker said he plans to concentrate his efforts this year on the 21 contested Senate races. He said he's optimistic Republicans will keep their slim majority in the Senate.

"It won't be easy. We've got to hang on to this seat and the others

around the country," Baker said.

He said there are a handful of races where Republicans are in trouble. But he said Symms' campaign against Democratic Gov. John Evans is not one of them.

Baker predicted that Congress will have a new tax bill on the president's desk by Labor Day, but he declined to predict what it will contain.

Baker said he thought Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, has at least a chance of winning the Senate leader-

ship job if Republicans retain control of the Senate.

"He is held in extremely high regard by the other senators. But in a contested race with secret ballots, you never know. There's simply no way to tell how it would come out," Baker said.

Baker said Tennessee is a right-to-work state, and he flatly supports right to work.

He was asked that in his state, whether economic development came

first, or whether Tennessee's improved educational facilities helped lead new industry. He said those decisions must be made by each state. "You just take the bill by the horns and do it," he said referring to his state's major commitment to improving education.

Symms said he wasn't ready to commit himself to any presidential contender yet.

"You are one of my candidates for president," he told Baker.

Gramm-Rudman will be fixed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The three main authors of the nation's budget-balancing law said Thursday they will team up in an effort to fix the law if the Supreme Court strikes down its central enforcement mechanism as expected.

Sens. Phil Gramm, R-Texas, Warren Rudman, R-N.H., and Ernest F. Hollings, D-S.C., said that instead of relying on a backup provision in the law calling for a vote of Congress to carry out across-the-board spending cuts, they would rather try to amend the law to overcome the court's anticipated constitutional objections.

"We have a perfect vehicle to do that in that the (current) debt ceiling is going to expire on Aug. 1," Gramm told reporters. He noted that was just two weeks before the date when spending cuts are to be ordered under the law.

House legislation condemned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The far-reaching House legislation that would require all U.S. firms to withdraw from South Africa drew stinging condemnation Thursday from the Reagan administration as a misguided approach to dealing with racial separation and repression in the troubled country.

"We still believe that our business presence there gives us some limited influence over the course of events," the State Department declared. "We do not believe we should abandon the forces of moderation and compromise in that country."

American soldier shot, killed

TEGUIGUALPA, Honduras (AP) — A Honduran soldier shot and killed an American soldier during joint military maneuvers in this Central American country, U.S. military sources said Thursday.

The U.S. sources said military authorities from both countries were investigating whether the killing was accidental.

The name of the soldier was being withheld pending notification of next of kin, said the sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The shooting occurred near Juticalpa, capital of Tegucigalpa, about 125 miles east of Tegucigalpa, the U.S. sources said.

Suit aims to break mob hold

NEW YORK (AP) — Prosecutors opened a new assault against organized crime Thursday with a civil lawsuit aimed at breaking the Mafia's alleged hold on New York City's cement industry.

The lawsuit, filed under federal racketeering laws, asks U.S. District Judge Vincent Broderick to appoint trustees to manage the affairs of the District Council of Cement and Concrete Workers and one of its member organizations, Local 64, Cement and Concrete Workers of the Laborers International Union of North America.

The union has been "infiltrated, dominated and exploited" by the Colombo organized crime family.

Guerrillas attack garrison

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador (AP) — The military said leftist guerrillas on Thursday killed or wounded 31 government troops in a rifle and mortar attack on a San Miguel garrison that also houses American advisers.

The U.S. Embassy said three American military advisers and two U.S. military physicians were inside the walled garrison at the time of the four-hour, pre-dawn attack, but escaped injury.

The guerrillas, grouped as the Farabundo Martí National Liberation Front, claimed during a broadcast by their clandestine Radio Venceremos that the attack by four battalions resulted in 253 soldiers killed or wounded.

Slade Gorton and Dan Evans, both R-Wash., a person whose state and local sales taxes were higher than state and local income taxes could deduct 60 percent of the excess. For example, a family that paid \$1,200 in sales taxes and \$800 in income taxes could deduct all the income tax plus \$240 — 60 percent of \$400.

A person who paid \$1,000 in sales tax and no income tax could deduct \$500.

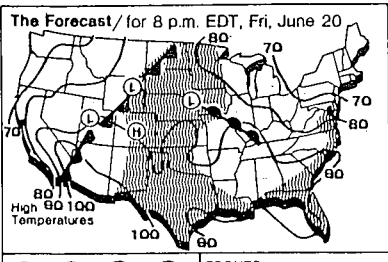
The amendment would benefit any taxpayer in any state who pays more sales tax than state and local income tax. It would have the largest impact in 14 states — Alaska, Connecticut, Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North Dakota, South Dakota, Tennessee, Texas, Washington and Wyoming — where sales taxes are a bigger source or revenue than income taxes.

Leroy hits switch on Pioneer decision

Republican gubernatorial candidate David Leroy has turned up the heat recently in his campaign against Cecil Andrus, claiming an Andrus-era decision not to build the coal-fired Pioneer generating plant on the Snake River was a "no growth decision" for Idaho.

But in our view, Leroy's example is a misplaced one. The decision not to build that plant has turned out to be the right one, in our view, from the perspective of Idaho electric consumers and environmentalists.

It would have resulted, we think, in higher electric rates than what we are paying today, for electric power which is not needed, and with probable extreme impact on Idaho's air quality.

Yes, the plant would have meant construction money and jobs. But to claim that failure to build it has shut off the "growth switch" is not, in our view, correct.

Look at the example of our neighboring state, Washington. The decision to build several electric plants there meant excessive capacity at exactly the point when the use curve for electricity flattened out.

The result was default on the bonds and havoc in the state's supply system.

Leroy should also know that Andrus was not alone in questioning the need for Pioneer's power.

The Times-News, among others, did extensive analyses on the impact and raised substantive questions about the proposal. But none of us are running for governor.

Idaho's economic conditions today wouldn't be solved by a Pioneer plant; indeed, they could well be worse.

The state and the region are subject to conditions from the outside, such as commodity prices, timber usage and foreign competition. None of these would have been solved by a Pioneer coal-fired generating plant.

Andrus, in our view, is vulnerable to other aspects of his record, both as governor and as secretary of Interior. But the Pioneer decision — in which he was only one player — isn't one of them.

Leroy should find another example.

Burger has fine record as chief justice

WASHINGTON — On the morning of May 22, 1969, President Nixon invited a handful of reporters into the Oval Office.

He wanted to talk about his nomination of Warren Earl Burger to become chief justice of the United States. Nothing quite like that conference had ever happened before, and nothing like it has happened since.

"I happen to believe that the Constitution should be strictly interpreted," Nixon said. "Judge Burger is a strict constructionist."

A reporter pressed Nixon for Burger's views on criminal law. Did these views figure in the nomination? Nixon responded candidly. He had read some of Burger's opinions and speeches as a circuit judge. These suggested that Burger would be on the minority side of such 5-4 decisions as *Miranda v. Arizona*. But "I would hope that would become the majority view."

In some ways Burger has disappointed the president who made him chief justice, but that is generally the way of nominees in the highest court in the land.

They won't stay tied. Burger has voted to narrow the *Miranda* decision, but not to overrule it. He has voted to relax the rules under which certain evidence may be admitted in criminal trials, but he has never gone along with repealing the exclusionary rule altogether.

He has indeed been a "strict constructionist," but not an extremely strict constructionist. He was "somewhat troubled" by the majority's opinion in *Roe v. Wade*, the famous abortion case, but he concurred in that bizarre decision.

Tuesday's announcement of Burger's retirement was one of Washington's best-kept secrets of recent years.

If I am not mistaken, Burger will be best remembered not for particular opinions, though, he wrote for the court in such memorable cases as the *Miller* obscenity decision of 1973, but rather for his dedicated labors in judicial administration.

No jurist in our history — not even Taft — has done more than Burger to focus public attention on the court and on the practice of law.

In most areas of his life, Burger is the consummate conservative. He is a man of dignity

that borders, but never reaches, pomposity. He is a stickler for punctilio, for civility and for courtesy.

"Fixed rules of etiquette and manners are the lubricants of courtroom contests," he once remarked. When his colleagues in 1977 approved lawyers' advertising, he strongly dissented. A firm traditionalist, he has steadfastly opposed television recording of oral argument before his court.

Yet when it came to the administration of justice, Burger was out in the vanguard of change. He regularly fumed at the stilted, medieval procedures of the law.

His annual reports on the state of the judiciary were chronicles of practices that ought to be reformed. He thought bail reform had gone too far. It was time to consider not only the rights of the accused but also the rights of society. He thought legal costs were entirely too high. He campaigned incessantly for new ways to resolve minor disputes without formal court proceedings.

At one point he was advocating small neighborhood tribunals that would be composed of two non-lawyers and a paralegal adviser. He urged the hiring of court administrators. "There

is nothing incompatible between efficiency and justice," he said.

He has pushed other ideas — for a new tribunal just below the Supreme Court, with authority to resolve intercourt conflicts; for the certification of trial lawyers, following the British practice of certifying barristers; for abolition of the jurisdictional rule by which citizens of different states may sue in federal courts. More than anyone else, Burger is responsible for enlargement of the federal judiciary to cope with the "litigation explosion." He has been a leader in forming a federal appellate judicial council in each state. Ten years ago, before it became fashionable, he was advocating tort reform. He once proposed that personal injury suits be settled in the fashion of workmen's compensation. He has fretted at lawyers' abuses of the process of discovery. "He wants higher pay for jurors and more efficient use of their time. He was an early advocate of the Legal Services Corp.

He may not go down in the books as a great or brilliant chief, but assuredly he has been a fine one.

Conservatives have hoped the Supreme Court would adhere to the Bonura Insight, sometimes known as judicial restraint. The Burger Court has not. Indeed, its judicial activism has been as marked as, and arguably more destructive than, the Warren Court's.

None of the Warren Court's most important rulings has been overturned or even significantly circumscribed in the 17 Burger years. The sweep of the *Miranda* ruling on the rights of suspects has been only slightly circumscribed. The Burger Court is responsible for the ruinous spread of forced busing as a "remedy" for segregation.

The Burger Court reinstated the 1964 Civil Rights Act to permit reverse racial discrimination on behalf of government-approved minorities.

Burger Court activism extended procedural due process guarantees to public-school students accused of behaving badly. The Burger Court has done nothing significant to reassess the interpretation of the ban on "establishment of religion" — nothing, that is, to re-establish the principle that government must be neutral between sects, not between religion and secularism.

And nothing the Warren Court did was as raw and radical an exercise of judicial power as the

1973 decision that swept away the laws regulating abortions in 50 states.

Supreme Court appointments are the premier spoils of presidential politics. Each appointee is a part of a majority at the apex of one of the three branches of government, the branch that has assumed custody of the issues (race, abortion, etc.) the political branches have been pleased to relinquish. The Court is where American public philosophy is published as an unending serial. The departure of Burger, the elevation of William Rehnquist and the nomination of Antonin Scalia are important episodes in the process of lengthening the shadow Theodosius' President will cast into tomorrow.

The Court is a small, face-to-face society where politics has subtle dynamics. The players are strong-willed professionals reasoning about hot issues in the cool climate of a written Constitution, changing statutes and a vast body of case law. The building of coalitions is influenced by intellectual nuance and the power of personality. On both counts, Scalia and Rehnquist will augment the power of conservative jurisprudence.

Scalia is an intellectual in a way that Burger is

not, by training and inclination. Scalia has taught at several of the finest law schools. He has the theoretical turn of mind that deepens analytic powers and does not dispose a judge to try to split all differences. That disposition can make intellectually ineffective politicians but, for a judge, it is an asset. The Burger Court may be less inclined to torture itself, and all who love logic, with ever-more-baroque criteria for distinguishing permissible from impermissible "race-conscious" state action.

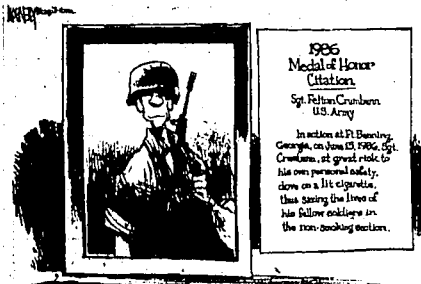
No one ever looked more like a chief justice than Burger, who he ever as an infant played in a sandbox must have done so in striped trousers and a swallowtail coat. Rehnquist's clothes come from the factory pre-rumpled. The New York Times locates Rehnquist on "the Court's extreme right wing." ("The Times style book probably says the phrase "the Court's extreme left wing" is an oxymoron.") Actually, Rehnquist has neither the abrasive philosophy nor, as important, the jagged temperament of an extremist.

What he is the keenest mind on the Court, which is why critics complain that he writes too well. When person A can not cope with person B's arguments, A says B is not wise, only articulate. In the administration of the Court, Rehnquist's affability and intellectual effervescence will enhance his effectiveness.

The rise of Rehnquist to the pinnacle of his profession, with the last ascent achieved from the hand of Ronald Reagan, illustrates the geology of our politics. Rehnquist, an Arizonan, was pulled toward public life by the conservative movement energized by another Arizonan, Barry Goldwater, whose 1964 campaign brought political prominence to Ronald Reagan.

Rehnquist serves row with another Arizonan, a law school classmate who was active in state politics, Sandra Day O'Connor. As Barry Goldwater takes his leave of Washington, he sees around him abundant evidence that the significance of 1964 is not that he lost 45 states, but that he won the Republican Party and, doing so, seeded the future.

Botha's declaration starts battle for survival of white elite

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa — South African President P. W. Botha declared more than a state of emergency last Thursday. He declared the start of the deciding battle for the survival of the ruling white elite in this country.

It is a battle that will not end tomorrow, nor even necessarily next year. But its course in the next two months will be etching the patterns of history long after the echoes of the emergency have died away.

The outcome of the battle — black-majority rule — seems most likely. The chilling questions that remain are: How many more lives will it cost? How much longer will it be?

And will a right-wing coup or military takeover lead it first through a bloody gauntlet of attrition?

Botha had five reasons for calling the state of emergency at this time — reasons that go beyond his concern about the Soweto Day anniversary and the threat of so-called communist subversion:

• The president and his government no longer care about foreign censure, believing sanctions to be an inevitability. They would rather be hanged for a wolf than a lamb. Besides, analysts believe that it will take two or three years for sanctions to begin to bite seriously.

• Botha knows that he needs to offer blacks political power as a way of stopping the violence. But he wants to do it with his own hand. He believes that he can negotiate power-sharing but cannot do it effectively from a position of weakness. At the same time, an one will negotiate with him in a climate of violence and fear.

• The president needs to act swiftly. Within the next six to 12 months he will have to hold an election or a referendum on the black-rights issue. In the meantime his dithering over the black uprising is losing votes to the right.

• The issue of black representation in central government will be the focus of an extraordinary congress of the ruling white National Party in mid-August. By that time Botha hopes to have crushed black agitation, or to have subdued it to the point where he can seek a mandate from his party to begin fighting for black moderates to fill his constitutional creed.

• The sudden rise in white-rightist belligerence has shocked Botha and his party rigid. The National Party, which strode

the political scene unchallenged for 38 years, now has to stalk behind police guards when it holds political meetings in conservative areas.

• He fifth reason, mentioned last because it is cardinal, is the nature of the black challenge itself. This time it will last for ever.

In 1969, after the Sharpeville massacre, the subsequent state of emergency and the suppression of black liberation groups, anti-apartheid protest was forced into obscurity.

It lasted 16 years — until black Soweto school children, unable to stomach the inhibitions drilled into their parents, rose in bloody protest against the injustices of inferior black education.

The uprising sent a ripple of blood across the country. It took the authorities roughly eight months and nearly 700 lives to suppress it. But the seeds of ferment remained.

Which brings us to the events of the last 21 months: 1,700 people killed in an orgy of unappealable horror, thousands detained and a 30-week partial state of emergency, which succeeded as much in politicizing the majority as it did in quelling the manifestation of their outrage.

Now we have a new state of emergency, nationwide, and the government spokesman

says, "We're not kidding, we're serious about this."

There is no doubting the president's assertion that the state has hardly begun to employ the might at its disposal. After all, this is no banana republic. It is, as it professes to be, a regional superpower and is even rumored to have the Bomb.

And it would be foolish to underestimate the devilish ingenuity of people who employ surrogate guerrillas to destabilize hostile governments or vigilantes to crush domestic uprisings of radicalized blacks.

But the black struggle in South Africa now has become a different game. Based on the concept of civil disobedience, it has matured, has wide support and will not easily be suppressed. The government has realized that to late, and has responded in panic with a state of emergency.

But even if the government succeeds in temporarily driving the black opposition underground and Botha steps forward with his carefully prepared plan for power-sharing under white control, black leaders have already rejected that option.

And even if they agreed to it, their supporters are no longer prepared to accept the rule of a government insensitive to black desires.

Violence would break out again, and the

result could be a perpetual state of emergency, with accompanying economic recession and social disintegration.

The white electorate would not tolerate that for long. For the first time the government would be threatened by its own power base.

The scenario has played itself out many times before: A powerful military elite becomes alarmed at the civilian government's inability to cope politically with civil disorder.

In South Africa's case the accumulation of international sanctions has already reduced the influence of foreign powers in the government's internal policy-making. Conservative pragmatists in the military hierarchy, once wary of provoking international isolation, make a deal with right-wing extremists and seize power.

Oppression of the population is magnified, and the country degenerates into civil war — a bloody conflict with time on the side of the majority.

It might be a worst-case scenario, but does it seem less logical than a direct transition from Botha to black-majority rule?

NASA alters Centaur plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — A NASA rifting program to use the space shuttle for launching highly volatile Centaur rockets that propel scientific probes to Jupiter and the sun. A source said the craft will be launched on unmanned rockets instead.

In an announcement, NASA administrator James Fletcher said the agency would examine "other alternatives" for the planetary and scientific payloads scheduled to use the liquid-fueled Centaur upper stage. He said NASA would help the Defense Department examine other alternatives for national security missions designed for the Centaur.

Congressional sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the scientific missions would be launched aboard unmanned rockets instead of the shuttle.

Judge's impeachment closer

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House panel took its first formal step Thursday toward the impeachment of convicted federal judge Harry E. Claiborne of Nevada, in what his lawyer vows will be a "no-holds-barred" battle.

Harry E. Claiborne, who had a reputation of scrapping with prosecutors in Nevada, attended the day-long hearing but declined to testify before the Judiciary Committee's subcommittee on courts.

Lawmakers said his lawyer, Oscar Goodman, did the talking for him as the panel heard testimony on whether grounds for impeachment existed.

After the session, subcommittee Chairman Robert W. Kassemeyer, D-Wis., announced that articles of impeachment would be considered by the panel on Tuesday and "I would expect to support them. I would commend two articles" — which would be akin to a two-count indictment.

Claiborne was flown to the hearing from the minimum security federal prison camp at Maxwell Air Force Base in Montgomery, Ala., where he is serving a two-year sentence.

FHA exhausts credit again

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Housing Administration, its credit ceiling exhausted for the second time this year, stopped taking new mortgage applications Thursday while a dispute in Congress held up a bill to put it back in business.

The legislation to extend FHA's statutory authority that lapsed June 3 and raise its credit ceiling was held up by a dispute over this month's scheduled distribution of \$99 million worth of federal Urban Development Action Grants.

Sens. Strom Thurmond, S.C., and Charles Grassley, R-Iowa, had sought to delay the distribution of the grants until a new formula favoring cities in the South and West becomes law.

But late Thursday afternoon, Grassley and Thurmond dropped their efforts to amend the FHA bill when it became clear the House would not give way on the issue, spokesmen for the lawmakers said.

AMA drops alcohol ban drive

CHICAGO (AP) — The American Medical Association on Thursday stopped short of supporting a ban on broadcast advertising of alcohol and a mandate for health warning labels on alcoholic beverage containers.

Instead, the association resolved to work to stop alcohol ads directed at youth and to persuade manufacturers to put labels on containers telling alcohol's inherent dangers to certain groups, such as to pregnant women, and its dangers to all if abused.

"Our problem with alcohol is alcohol abuse," Kirk Johnson, general counsel of the AMA, said after the organization's policymaking House of Delegates voted on the issue during the final day of its annual meeting.

Comprehending the issue with smoking, a day after the AMA resolved to work for a ban on smoking on airlines and on tobacco sales to people younger than 21, Johnson said alcohol is "just a different ball game."

Smoking, cervical cancer tied

CHICAGO (AP) — Women who smoke heavily or who smoke non-filter cigarettes are much more likely to get cervical cancer than non-smokers, according to a study in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

Women who smoke unfiltered cigarettes, women who smoke at least two packs a day and those who have smoked for 40 years or more were twice as likely as non-smokers to get the deadliest form of the most common kind of cervical cancer, the study found.

Intermittent smokers and women who had quit smoking at least two years before the study were found to have the same risk as non-smokers, the study reported.

Louise A. Brinton, an epidemiologist at the National Cancer Institute in Bethesda, Md., and medical researchers conducted the study of 1,277 women between April 1982 and January 1984 in Chicago, Denver, Miami, Philadelphia and Birmingham, Ala. Of those, 489 had the cancer and 797 did not.

Scalia's rulings under attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — A liberal foundation said Thursday that the court decisions of Supreme Court nominee Antonin Scalia reflect "steadfast opposition to basic individual and press rights."

In the first of a likely barrage of attacks from liberal groups, Supreme Court Watch said Scalia's record since he joined the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 1982 "raises questions about whether his political agenda is in conflict with the traditional model of open-minded and disinterested decision-making required of members of the U.S. Supreme Court."

In four areas — libel, government secrecy, race discrimination and foreign policy — the group said Scalia "has often voted for the conservative (at times the extreme conservative) view."

"Judge Scalia has repeatedly ruled against journalists in libel cases," the analysis said.

Cokeville school given award

COKEVILLE, Wyo. (AP) — The state Board of Education has honored the children and faculty of Cokeville Elementary School with a Wyoming Award of Excellence.

State Superintendent of Public Instruction Lynn Simons on Thursday said the award will be given out annually to a school that shows exemplary service. She called the award the first of its kind and well-deserved by the students, teachers and staff of the rural public elementary school on the southwestern Wyoming border.

Last month, a couple held 150 people hostage in the first-grade classroom of the school. Doris Young and David Young asked for \$300 million for the safe return of the teachers and students.

Jury rejects claim

Ex-agent convicted of spying

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Richard W. Miller, the only FBI agent ever accused of spying, was convicted of espionage and bribery Thursday by a jury that rejected his claim that he was trying to infiltrate the Soviet KGB as a double agent to save his flagging career.

Miller, the pudgy agent who worked in the counterintelligence section of the FBI's Los Angeles office, sat motionless and stared at the jurors as the verdict was announced in the case that rocked the FBI when it broke nearly two years ago.

Miller, 43, could be sentenced to life in prison. Miller was arrested and charged with spying in October 1984 with his lover, Svetlana Ogorodnikov, and her husband, Nikolai. The Ogorodnikovs, both Soviet emigres, pleaded guilty in the espionage case and were serving prison sentences.

Miller was found guilty of conspiring to pass classified documents to the Soviet Union, of copying classified documents and of delivering them to a foreign government with knowledge they would be used to the advantage of a foreign power, the Soviet Union, and to the disadvantage of the United States.

He also was found guilty of communicating the documents to a known representative of the Soviets, and of soliciting \$50,000 in gold and \$15,000 in cash.

The panel had told the judge they were deadlocked on one count only, whether or not Miller had accepted an expensive trench coat from Mrs. Ogorodnikov as a bribe. The government moved to drop the seventh count, and U.S. District Judge David Kenyon granted the motion.

As Miller was being led out of the courtroom in handcuffs, he was asked for comment by reporters. He smiled and said: "Let's say thank God for the court of appeals."

Miller's attorneys, Joel Levine and Stanley Greenberg, said they were confident the verdict would be reversed on appeal.

Sexual harassment at work illegal, Supreme Court rules

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court ruled Thursday that on-the-job sexual harassment is illegal even if its victims are not hurt economically.

The court also said employers are not always liable when, unknown to them, supervisors sexually harass workers.

The decision immediately was hailed by feminist groups as an important, if qualified, victory for working women nationwide.

By a unanimous vote, the court said a federal law banning sex discrimination in employment applies to sexual harassment that creates a "hostile environment." The decision upheld a standard previously adopted by the federal Equal Employment Opportunity Commission.

Writing for the court, Justice William H. Rehnquist said nothing in the disputed law, known as Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, "suggests that a hostile environment based on discriminatory sexual harassment should not be ... prohibited."

It was the first opinion released under Rehnquist's name since Pres-

ident Reagan announced on Tuesday his intention to appoint him as chief justice to replace the retiring Warren E. Burger.

In other decisions, the court: Ruled unanimously that states and local governments may not withdraw their employees from the nation's Social Security system.

The decision in a California case is a victory for the Reagan administration, which told the justices that \$3 billion could have been drained from Social Security by 1990 if such withdrawals were allowed.

Ruled, 5-4, that people who carry guns while committing crimes may be punished with stiff minimum prison sentences even though there is minimal proof of possession. The ruling upheld a Pennsylvania law imposing a minimum five-year sentence for such offenses.

The sexual-harassment decision clears the way for new proceedings in a lawsuit filed against the District of Columbia-based Meritor Savings Bank, now known as PSPS Savings Bank, by Mechelle Vinson.

A former assistant branch manager, Vinson sued the bank and her ex-supervisor, Sidney L. Taylor.

Her suit contended that she had consented to having a sexual affair with Taylor over the course of several years "for fear of losing her job."

Vinson testified that she never told any of Taylor's superiors because she was afraid of him.

Taylor denied all of Vinson's allegations.

Vinson currently is studying for a nursing degree and hopes to continue her schooling toward a Ph.D. in psychology.

"I'm very excited," said Vinson, 31. "I was amazed, and very pleased."

Rosalie Gault Silberman, a member of the Equal Employment Opportunity Commission, said: "Today's decision unanimously affirmed the principle that the workplace must be free of sexual harassment, be it harassment in the form of economic harm or a poisoned work environment resulting in psychological harm."

"This is a tremendous victory for working women," she said. "We are particularly pleased that the court relied so heavily on the commission's guidelines and the government's brief."

Peruvian forces take control of prison; death toll tops 250

LIMA, Peru (AP) — Marines took control of El Fronton prison Thursday after a nearly 24-hour battle with guerrilla inmates, and at least 250 prisoners died there and in battles at two other prisons, a high-level government official said.

The inmates at El Fronton, a barren island five miles offshore from Callao port near Lima, had used guns, explosives and homemade bows and arrows in their battle with the marines.

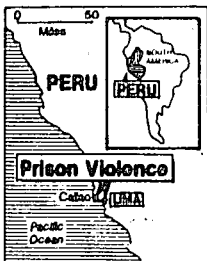
The military command said troops had regained control of Lima's Lurigancho prison and the Santa Barbara women's prison in Callao Thursday morning.

But the fighting raged at El Fronton until late afternoon. About 250 inmates were killed in the fighting at the three prisons, said the high-level government official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Questioned about news reports that more than 450 prisoners had been killed in the fighting, he said, "That is too much. It was about 250."

The official is close to President Alan Garcia.

He did not give a breakdown on the casualties for each prison.

Military communiques earlier reported "a great number of dead" at Lurigancho without being specific. An anti-riot captain said soldiers apparently stormed Lurigancho with "the intent to kill everyone" and he saw dozens of bodies stacked against a wall.

The official said earlier that three naval officers were killed at El Fronton, and two women prisoners were killed at Santa Barbara.

Riots at the three prisons began early Wednesday.

The captain of the anti-riot force, who spoke on condition of anonymity, told an Associated Press reporter outside Lurigancho: "They haven't left anyone alive."

He reported seeing the dozens of bodies piled up against a wall on the far side of the compound and said Antonio Diaz Martinez was among the dead, "half his face shot away by a machine-gun blast."

Diaz Martinez was considered third in command of Shining Path, a Maoist group founded by philosophy professor Abimael Guzman that has been fighting a guerrilla war for six years.

The government had established a virtual news blackout on the riots, issuing only four communiques after marines and army troops began moving Wednesday evening on the prisons, where more than 500 inmates accused of belonging to the Shining Path were held.

President Garcia met this week with newspaper publishers and television directors to get them to play down their coverage of leftist terrorism. Peru is playing host to hundreds of delegates arriving for a meeting of the Socialist International in Lima.

U.S. praises Panama's help

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration told Congress Thursday that Panama is providing useful cooperation against drug trafficking and money laundering and sought to disassociate itself from a published report alleging personal involvement by the chief of Panamanian armed forces in such activities.

James H. Michel, deputy assistant secretary of state for Inter-American Affairs, denied suggestions that the administration had deliberately leaked accusations against Panamanian General Manuel Antonio Noriega which appeared last week in The New York Times and were attributed to U.S. government sources.

"No one that we know of, no one with the authority of the U.S. government" provided the information

to the newspaper, Michel told the House of Select Committee on narcotics abuse and control.

Committee chairman Charles B. Rangel, D-N.Y., suggested that the accusations against Noriega, following public charges by the U.S. Commissioner of Customs William Von Raab of corruption in Mexico, represented a "not well thought out strategy" against countries opposing U.S. policy in Central America.

Talking to reporters after four hours of closed anti public testimony to his committee Thursday, Rangel said the Central Intelligence Agency, during the secret hearing, had "shed no light" on the allegations against Noriega.

Last week's New York Times story said the Panamanian general was involved in sales of secrets to Cuba, gun-running to Colombia, trafficking

in narcotics and laundering money for his personal gain.

On Wednesday, The New York Times published an interview with Noriega in which he denied all charges of involvement in criminal activities.

Rangel said he concluded from intelligence presented to the closed session of the committee that "there is no reason to believe that whatever problem they (the administration) see will be improved by replacing Noriega."

John Cusack, chief of the committee's staff, told reporters that the secret testimony "did not confirm or deny" the Times' report.

Michel and other administration witnesses told the House panel that the Panamanian government has eradicated through spraying about half of its domestic marijuana crop.

S. Africa orders new curfews

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Police used their emergency powers Thursday to impose curfews on dozens of black townships.

Strikes spread among black workers who demand that their union leaders be released from jail. Bishop Desmond Tutu took the archbishop of Canterbury's special envoy, Terry Waite, to the courtroom wedding of a black activist who is on trial for treason.

White voters in Port Elizabeth, an auto manufacturing center on the Indian Ocean, voted 6,104 to 4,957 against integrating their beaches.

Government spokesman Leon Mellet said in Pretoria that three more people were killed in unrest, including a white man missing since last weekend, bringing the total to

48 in the week-old state of emergency.

Two of the victims were blacks slain by other blacks in a tribal homeland, while the third, a badly burned body found in a black township near Uitenhage, was identified by Michel as that of Lodewyk Vlooh. No details on Vlooh's death were disclosed.

Foreign Minister R.F. Botha said a U.S. House of Representatives vote to impose a total trade embargo and order all American companies out of this country showed a disregard for the welfare of South Africa's blacks.

In London, the human rights organization Amnesty International issued a statement saying five whites were arrested last Saturday

in Port Elizabeth by security police while attending a briefing with a lawyer on the terms of the state of emergency. Those taken into custody included a mother of two, Amnesty said.

The new curfews in dozens of townships around Port Elizabeth, Uitenhage and other south-central industrial centers, ran from 9 p.m. to 4 a.m. Police also prohibit possession of T-shirts or other articles bearing the names of any of 47 anti-apartheid and civic organizations.

Authorities had said Port Elizabeth townships produced the worst violence in the country Monday, when blacks mounted a general strike to commemorate the 16 anniversary of bloody riots in Soweto.

Soviets sentence Fedorenko to death

MOSCOW (AP) — Fyodor Fedorenko, the first person deported to the Soviet Union from the United States on Nazi war crimes charges, was sentenced to death Thursday in a Crimea court after his conviction for treason and mass murder.

The official news agency Tass announced the Thursday conviction and sentencing of the 78-year-old Fedorenko, a former Red Army soldier captured soon after the Nazis invaded the Soviet Union in 1941.

He was tried by a court in the Crimean capital of Simferopol, about 115 miles south of his hometown of Dzhankoye. The news agency did not say when the sentence might be carried out, or whether Fedorenko will appeal.

It is common for those convicted of treason to be sentenced to death.

Tass said Fedorenko, who served as a guard at the Nazis' Treblinka death camp in German-occupied Poland from 1942 and 1943, was found guilty of treason, voluntary transfer to the Nazi side in World War II, and participation in mass murder of foreign citizens.

The indictment read at his trial when it opened June 10 also said he served as a guard at two other Nazi camps and fled to Hamburg, Germany, before the war ended.

According to Soviet estimates, at least 300,000 people were murdered at Treblinka alone in 1942 and 1943.

Italian office bomb target; pair injured

ATHENS, Greece (AP) — A powerful time bomb exploded Thursday outside an Italian business office, blowing out doors and windows and injuring two people.

A second explosive planted at the Italian consulate failed to go off. Police sources, speaking on condition of anonymity, said they believed the bombs were linked to the trial in Italy of 15 people in the Achille Lauro cruise ship hijacking.

An Italian employee was slightly injured by a falling bookcase in the 1:15 p.m. blast outside the Italian Chamber of Commerce fifth-floor office in Athens, police said. A Greek man passing outside the building, was cut by flying glass.

On Wednesday, in Beirut, an anonymous caller claiming to speak for the Palestinian guerrilla force headed by Abul Abbas told a Western news agency that the group would strike Italian targets because of the trial.

Abul Abbas, who heads the Palestine Liberation Front, is accused of masterminding the Oct. 7 hijacking off the coast of Egypt in which Leon Klinghoffer, a crippled 69-year-old American passenger, was killed.

Comedian killed

PARIS (AP) — Coluche, one of France's best-known comedians, died Thursday in a motorcycle accident in southern France, his agent said. He was 41.

The comedian, whose real name was Michel Colucci, was a motorcycle enthusiast who set a new world speed record in the 750 cubic centimeter class on an Italian track on March 19, 1985.

He was known for his impertinent, often vulgar humor, and staged a mock campaign for president in 1981.

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Recipient Haydon dies after 488 days on an artificial heart

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Murray P. Haydon, a retired auto worker who lived 488 days with a Jarvik-7 mechanical heart, died Thursday, leaving only one survivor among the five men who have received permanent artificial hearts. He was 59.

Haydon died at 3:45 a.m. MST, said Tom Noland, a Humana Hospital Audubon spokesman. He declined to say if Haydon's wife, Juanita, and their three children were with him.

Last week, Haydon's brain and lungs began deteriorating and there was little hope he would recover, said Dr. Allan Lansing, medical director of the hospital's Heart Institute.

Haydon's family decided against placing him on dialysis to help his failing kidneys because they did not feel it would improve his quality of life, Lansing said.

Noland said other details would be released later at a news conference attended by William DeVries, the surgeon who implanted all four per-

manent artificial hearts used in the United States.

Haydon's attitude remained very

good in his last days, "and he continued to enjoy life," DeVries said in a statement. "We came to know him not just as a patient but also as a good friend."

Haydon was the third recipient of a Jarvik-7 heart and second longest-living. He received his heart on Feb. 17, 1985, and had spent most of his time since the hospital's intensive care unit. He required a respirator to help him breathe much of the time.

William Schroeder's heart was implanted Nov. 25, 1984, and he is still a patient at Humana Audubon. Barney Clark died 112 days after he received the first Jarvik-7 implant, on Dec. 2, 1982.

Leif Stenberg, 53, of Sweden received an artificial heart April 7, 1985, and died Nov. 21. Jack Burcham became the fifth recipient April 14; he died 10 days later.

"The contributions of these individuals, like Haydon, have been enormously beneficial in leading us to a better mechanical device and

improved patient treatment post-operatively," DeVries said in his statement.

"There's no doubt in my mind their participation in this research will help save thousands of lives in the future," DeVries said.

Haydon left the hospital only three times, visiting neighbors in January, taking a van ride the next month and stopping briefly at his suburban Louisville home in March.

DeVries' implant program has come to a standstill because of fewer patient referrals, stricter federal regulations and virtual abolishment of age limits for patients to qualify for heart transplants.

On Jan. 8, the U.S. Food and Drug Administration adopted new restrictions on the Jarvik7, including case-by-case approval of further implants, new procedures for treating patients and periodic reports to the government on patient status.

Haydon, a retired auto assembly line worker known to friends as "M.P.," had battled car-

diomyopathy, a progressive deterioration and swelling of the heart, since 1981. In January 1985 his children asked family physician Jerome Lacy about the possibility of an artificial heart.

"They had seen Haydon wasting away and becoming exhausted from such simple tasks as brushing his teeth," Lacy said, who contacted Humana Heart Institute - International.

Haydon was approved as a candidate Feb. 14, after doctors agreed he could live only a few days longer without the Jarvik-7.

The family was aware of the risks, such as the strokes that had struck Schroeder, the world's second recipient of a mechanical heart.

Surgeons speculated the strokes may have been caused by blood clots forming around the plastic-and-metal heart.

"A lot of people have strokes. A lot of people have fever and colds and that's the way we feel about it," Juanita Haydon, Haydon's wife of 32

years, said before the implant.

Haydon made satisfactory progress until blood began accumulating in his chest. On March 2, 1985, surgeons closed a tiny opening inside Haydon's chest and returned him to a respirator.

Most of the time Haydon was tethered to the 323-pound Utahdrive that supplied the compressed air to power the Jarvik-7. He also used the portable Heimes drive.

Haydon spent seven years in the Army and Air Force. He operated a barber shop with an uncle, then worked at the Ford Motor Co. Kentucky truck plant for 14 years before retiring in June 1983 for health reasons.

He was described by friends and relatives as a quiet man, always willing to lend a helping hand. He had a passion for history and geography, and enjoyed working puzzles.

In addition to his wife, Haydon is survived by a son, two daughters and five grandsons, including one born two days before his implant surgery.

Utah doctors see benefits from artificial organs

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Longer and more comfortable lives will become possible for recipients of artificial hearts, two University of Utah physicians long involved in artificial organ experimentation said Thursday.

Despite the death of artificial heart patient Murray Haydon Thursday morning, pioneering

researcher Dr. Willem Kolff said the fact that the retired auto worker survived more than a year was an important sign of progress for the implant.

"I don't think any of the critics would have believed that anyone could live on an artificial heart this long," said Kolff, who retired this year as chief of the university's div-

ision of artificial organs but is still active in research.

Kolff said he is working on a possible solution to the problem of blood clotting, which is suspected in strokes suffered by the first artificial heart patient, Barney Clark, and the longest-living recipient of the device, William J. Schroeder.

However, Kolff said the perfor-

mance of the artificial heart, first implanted in Utah in December 1982, was better than that of human heart implants after the same amount of time.

"If you compare the results of the artificial hearts in the early days to the early heart transplants, the artificial heart has done much better," he said.

"I'm sorry (Haydon) died, but I don't think he was very happy," Kolff said. "Give it a little time and the quality of life will be much better. In the meantime, the heart can be used as a bridge to transplantation."

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Priest recalls clear quality of Kate Smith's voice at mass

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — About 200 people mourned singer Kate Smith at a funeral mass on Thursday, and a priest recalled the "almost perfect, bell-like quality of her voice" that was a gift from God.

"No one ever had any difficulty in understanding every word that she had to sing," Monsignor James McSweeney told those gathered at Our Lady of Lourdes church.

"Miss Smith, who popularized the patriotic song 'God Bless America,' died Tuesday at 79 of respiratory failure.

Her singing career lasted 50 years, until she was stricken with a diabetic coma in 1976 that made it difficult for her to walk or talk. Diabetes forced the amputation of her right leg above the knee in January, and she underwent a mastectomy May 9.

"What heaven has gained, we have individually lost. . . . I remember thrilling to her voice," McSweeney said.

"Everything was plain, in that almost perfect,

bell-like quality of her voice that has been so much a part of our lives," he said. "The beauty of her voice, the phrasing of the words — her talent was a gift from God."

Among the mourners were her sister, Helena Steene, and Miss Smith's two nieces.

Six pallbearers brought the casket into the high-ceilinged, modern sanctuary as an honor guard of 10 Knights of Columbus stood by in black capes trimmed in red, yellow, green and white and hats with colored plumes.

"God Bless America" was not played at the mass, but several American flags were displayed outside the church.

Her body was to be flown to Washington for a Saturday funeral mass, with burial in Lake Placid, N.Y.

Gov. Jim Martin, who ordered flags on state buildings to fly at half-staff until Saturday, called her "a treasure to this country and this state."

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
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Windy weather hampers 'hopper spraying

TWIN FALLS — Winds and cool temperatures all but stopped grasshopper spraying in Idaho Thursday, with only 216 acres covered in Owyhee County, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service officer in charge of the estate.

Officials had planned to cover 1,500 acres near Malta and additional land in Jerome County on Thursday, but were delayed by uncooperative weather, Roger Pollard said. Wind also cut short spraying in Owyhee County, where planes dropped only 13 1/2 gallons of pesticide, he added.

A pilot for Reeder Flying Service in Twin Falls said winds were the major problem. With gusts over seven mph, "You can't do a

good job, and it's rough flying," he said. Today's efforts were expected to be minimal due to continued poor conditions. "The weatherman still says cool and windy," Pollard said. "It isn't very good Malathion weather."

Contractors employed by APHIS in the

'hopper attacks have been alternating between Malathion and Sevin-4 Oil — the only two chemicals approved by the Environmental Protection Agency for the grasshopper spraying program.

Although Malathion costs less than Sevin-4 Oil, it lasts for a shorter period. In addition, it doesn't work as well in cold and rainy weather and doesn't have the "wash-off resistance" of Sevin-4 Oil, Pollard said. APHIS tries to change chemicals if the weather calls for it, "but it's not that easy," Pollard said. "Some contractors don't have the chemicals to switch."

Concern over the use of both Malathion and Sevin-4 Oil has sparked protests from environmental groups in Oregon, said Mike McMasters, source control field officer with the state Department of Health and Welfare's Division of Environment in Twin Falls.

But officials here, he added, are not alarmed by the use of the chemicals because spraying is mainly in "one-time shots."

"Our concern would be if there were no controls on spraying on surface waters," he said, pointing out that APHIS has said it will try to avoid doing so.

Although a "reasonably large dose ... could create some problems as far as toxicity for aquatic insects," McMasters said, "We would have much more concern — for both water quality and public health — if they were (spraying) every two or three weeks."

"If sprayers themselves use a buffer strip" between rangeland and water sources, "there shouldn't be much problem," he said.

Locustae to fight grasshoppers where chemicals cannot be used, said Jon Idso, Shoshone district manager of the U.S. Bureau of Land Management.

"It's a new approach, and it's somewhat experimental," Idso said. "But it will be closely monitored" by officials from the University of Idaho.

Planes are set to begin spraying the substance Saturday morning along the Little Wood River, tentatively from Richfield to the Lincoln-Blaine County line.

One of the purported advantages of Nosema Locustae is its selectivity; it supposedly kills only a couple strains of grasshoppers, Idso said.

In additional chemical spraying plans, large tracts in the Picebo Hills area of Blaine County are scheduled to be covered next week, he said, but the effort is primarily to protect wildlife and not cropland.

The Magic Valley Pioneers, a service organization comprised of Mountain Bell employees and retired employees, already had donated a color television monitor valued at \$300. Mel Quile's Electronics in Twin Falls provided a discount on the set, said Sandy Kiser, co-president of the group.

The organization also donated another \$200 worth of art supplies, books and more than a dozen stuffed animals.

Mountain Bell employee organizations in the Western states last year had decided to support child-abuse prevention projects, Kiser said.

Other individuals also have played Santa Claus by donating toys to the project.

Carolee and Reed Walker of Twin Falls donated two doll houses and furniture for the houses, Chilese said. One of the houses was assembled by residents at the Port of Hope substance abuse treatment center.

The Walkers also donated some dolls.

Volunteers Against Violence, a Twin Falls group aiding victims of domestic violence, contributed three dolls, several doll outfits and two handmade toy trucks.

Unexpected funds help senior center

TWIN FALLS — A surprise receipt of \$38,534 in Community Development Block Grant funds is easing the remodeling budget at the new Twin Falls Senior Citizens Center.

The city of Twin Falls had applied for a \$100,000 block grant in 1985 to remodel the old KMYV-TV studios on Eastland Drive into a senior center, after parts of the center on 4th Avenue West were condemned.

The state approved the project, but had used most of its funds by the time money for the Twin Falls center was appropriated. Only \$41,412 remained to pass on to Twin Falls.

Now, a year later, the state has added nearly \$40,000 to Twin Falls' original grant award. The money comes from what remained of the 1985 block grant fund the federal government required the state to keep on hand for emergency projects.

It gives the seniors a total of

about \$135,000 to spend on remodeling. That includes \$79,949 in block grant awards, \$25,000 from the sale of the 4th Avenue West property and \$30,000 saved by the seniors for a building fund.

The senior center is still looking for civic groups willing to volunteer work, in order to keep the cost of construction down, says Director Thelma Ross. But with the additional grant money more remodeling may be possible than originally estimated in the first phase of construction, she says.

Only the newest part of the building will be used initially. Plans call for converting the two studios into dining areas. A 110-foot ramp will be built from the rear entrance to the basement for access to a recreation hall and lounge.

Initial remodeling plans also call for an office, a restroom, a kitchen and a new roof.

The first phase of construction is well under way, and seniors are pressing for a July 17 opening, Ross says.

Grant denial places Gooding park on hold

GOODING — A proposed industrial park in northeast Gooding is on hold following failure of the city to receive a community block grant for its development, city officials said this week.

The city had applied for a \$253,000 grant to develop a 66-acre park just north of the Gooding city limits along the Union Pacific Railroad mainline, but was not among the successful Magic Valley applicants announced last week.

A companion \$435,000 federal Economic Development Administration grant is still being considered but is "in limbo," Gooding Mayor Gene Heller said Monday.

The EDA grant requires matching funds, so the city would have to come up with funds similar to the amount of the block grant before it could become effective.

"We just don't know how things will go right now," Heller said. He said the industrial park will remain on the drawing board unless the

state decides to locate its new maximum-security prison at the site of the old state tuberculosis hospital or someone reopens the long idle Blincoe's Magic Valley meat packing plant.

"Something else has got to happen before much will happen with the park," he said.

The park plans had called for installation of a 1 million gallon water storage tank at a site within the city limits and extension of water and sewer service to the park as well as development of an access road and railroad siding.

Arkosh Brothers Inc. of Gooding had indicated an interest in developing a potato processing plant in the park, and Universal Smog Eater Muffler Company, another Gooding firm, was expected to be a park tenant.

Heller said the city still needs the 1 million gallon water tank for improved water service and adequate fire protection.

He said the city council feels the grants that were awarded last week

Hospital transfer entails legal maze

GOODING — The problems facing Gooding County in transferring over transfer to a taxing district are not insurmountable, say officials who have gone through the experience. At a meeting this week, Gooding County Prosecutor Lynn Nelson told the Gooding County Board of Commissioners that state law does not provide for the transfer of county-owned property to another political subdivision.

However, hospital officials and lawyers for hospitals throughout Idaho said on Thursday that such a law does exist and four hospitals in the state have formed hospital districts with no problems.

The four are Valley County Hospital in Cascade, McCall Memorial Hospital in McCall, Kootenai Medical Center in Coeur D'Alene and Council Community Hospital in Council.

Nelson on Thursday refused to comment on the progress or lack of progress in ironing out the transfer of the county-owned hospital to a newly created hospital district.

"Some of the problems are too complicated, and we're negotiating with other attorneys," he said. Hospital officials cited Idaho Code

67-2322, which does allow for the transfer of a government entity to another government entity, with or without payment. Nelson did say that he was familiar with that section of the code.

Gooding County voters approved the hospital district on May 27 by a 750-vote margin.

In April, a month prior to the vote, commissioners in Fowers County who held a similar election in April cautioned Gooding County officials to go slowly. Power County Commissioner Lois Bauer said technicalities and timing problems between the fiscal year and the taxing year were causing unexpected problems in getting money to the new hospital taxing district.

Gooding County Commissioner Robert Thackeray said commissioners were aware of possible problems, but they felt they needed to hold the election May 27 anyway, to coincide with the primary election and save the county money.

When asked why the county did not wait and hold an election in November, along with the general election, Thackeray said, "We didn't think we could wait four more months. We needed to know now whether voters would approve this."

But Gooding officials are finding

Cattlemen, forest officials face off over roaming cattle

STANLEY (AP) — A recent confrontation between four Stanley Basin Cattle Association grazing permit holders and officials of the Sawtooth National Recreation Area has left the cattlemen feeling "harmed" and U.S. Forest Service officials feeling "misunderstood."
 The confrontation came from a long-standing problem with permit holders' cattle wandering onto private land in the Stanley area, particularly in the towns of Upper and Lower Stanley.
 Also in dispute is the future of a log fence along State Highway 21, west of Stanley, which the Forest Service would like to remove because of the cost to repair and maintain.
 However, forest officials are reluctant to remove the fence unless some other way is found to keep cattle off the highway. The cattlemen say they will not accept responsibility for maintaining or replacing the fence because they don't want to incur liability for it.
 The standoff boiled into a confrontation May 16 when permit holder Mark Stark, Challis, went to the ranger district office in Stanley to sign his permit so he could turn his cattle out the following week. At that time Stark said he discovered new clauses had been written into the permit agreement.
 One clause to which he objected stated that permit holders were responsible for "improvement, maintenance, and replacement" of a 4-mile of fence along Valley Creek between the forest boundary and adjacent private land. Two others requested the permit holders to be "good neighbors and assist as deemed necessary" along another 25 miles of private fence between the national forest and privately owned land.
 Because Idaho open-range law places the burden of fencing out livestock on land owners, rather than livestock owners, Stark said he and the other permit holders regarded the clauses as an unwarranted and dangerous precedent in range management, as well as a potential financial burden.
 "If something like that goes through, we'll all be out of business," Stark said. "We can't afford to fence all the pasture land in the Stanley Basin."
 Stark refused to sign the permit as written and said he was told at first that if he did not, he wouldn't be able to turn out his cattle. However, an official relented when Stark said he would call in a lawyer, he said.
 Al Ashton, superintendent of the SNRA, says the whole incident was an "unfortunate misunderstanding."
 "The permit was not the proper place to deal with this issue at this time, because there is a great deal of discussion that needs to take place first," Ashton said.
 "The clause was offered simply to see if something couldn't be worked out between the cattlemen and the private land owners, but was received as if all the effort was to be on the part of the permittee," he said.
 Ashton said the clauses were inserted into the term permit agreements by the range conservationist, but that he authorized their removal as soon as he heard about them, because there had not been enough discussion on the subject.
 "I am deeply concerned about this misunderstanding," Ashton said. "It's a real unfortunate situation and it was never intended to be entirely their responsibility."
 Despite the fact that the clauses were stricken from the agreements, the cattlemen — Stark, Tom Chivers, Ron Wilson and Calvin Helm — say they are upset by the way the Forest Service handled the matter.
 They said they wonder whether or not the Forest Service was trying to pressure them into signing the permits without close inspection.
 "They waited until one week before we were supposed to turn our cattle out, and we hadn't even gotten our allotment billing yet," said Wilson.
 Typically, permit holders receive their billing a month in advance of their turnout date, so it can be signed and the money sent in before they are mailed their permit for signing, Wilson said.
 "I feel like the delay was pre-arranged," Wilson said. "They were harassing the troops is what it was."

Grandma works job, moves on

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — A retired medical records transcriptionist and grandmother of five is traveling across the country, staying on a job just one day in every state.

Barbara Morgan of Walnut Creek, Calif., plans to write down her experiences in a book she wants to call, "Grandma Phone Home."

During her six month tour, her experiences will include work: as a ranch hand doing some cattle roping in Wyoming; a sulky driver in Kentucky, plucking chickens in Maryland; lobster trapping in Maine; on the Miss America pageant in Illinois; as a policewoman in Michigan; a disc jockey in New Jersey; a coal miner in Virginia; a riverboat captain in Mississippi and a peanut inspector at a peanut butter factory in Washington.

The 59-year-old was in Wyoming recently and addressed a number of senior citizens at the state capital, telling them she wanted to add some adventure to her life. She urged them to do the same.

"When you live in one little corner of the United States, you have a convoluted view of the world," Morgan said.

She said she began planning her trip four years ago but no one took her seriously. Morgan wanted to travel by motor home but decided to travel by public transportation.

She said she "prepared" cities for her arrival by writing the chambers of commerce. Morgan will only work in small cities because larger cities are "too sophisticated" and not what she had in mind for her book.

"I ask them if they would select a job for me, a one-day unpaid internship that would best describe the grace, style and lifestyle of their city," Morgan said.

Her visit to Cheyenne was her fifth stop and she added that she's already had more adventure in three weeks than she's had in her entire life.

A memorable experience was in Riggins, Idaho at Squaw Creek Retreat, she said. She spent her workday as a "teepee motel maid."

While asleep during an hour-long thunderstorm, she described as the worst she's ever been through, Morgan rolled off a waterbed onto the floor.

According to her schedule, Morgan will work on weekdays and take the weekends off. In the cities where she can stay with friends, she said she plans to stay a little longer than a day.

Fatal crash fuels fight over flights above Grand Canyon

LAS VEGAS, Nev. — The crash of a plane and helicopter carrying tourists for a close-up view of the Grand Canyon has added new fuel to a fight between environmentalists and airline companies over the safety of the popular flights.

Hikers, river rafters and backpackers have conducted a 2½-year war against the lucrative aerial tour business, saying the noise of planes and helicopters disturbed the sanctity of the canyon.

The issue of safety was seldom raised in recent public hearings aimed at limiting the canyon flights. But it quickly became a major topic Wednesday when a plane and helicopter collided in mid-air 10 miles from scenic Grand Canyon airport, killing all 25 on board.

Meanwhile, an owner of Grand Canyon Airlines, which owned the plane involved, said sightseeing helicopters had changed their flight paths over the canyon in recent weeks in an effort to appease those complaining of aircraft noise.

"I'm not saying that caused the accident," said John Sebald, owner of Las Vegas-based Scenic Airlines and one of the owners of Grand Canyon Airlines. "But there are things going on out there in the interest of sound that may not be in the best interest of safety."

"We've been flying the canyon since 1948 and there has never been a mid-air with the exception of the TWA and United (commercial airlines) 20 years ago. Not until the Wilderness Society and the Sierra Club got involved in a search for solitude did the operators start

altering their routes."

Rob Smith, a spokesman for the Sierra Club in Phoenix, admitted safety is not the main area of concern for environmentalists.

"But the tragedy of the crash underscores that there are too many aircraft in the Grand Canyon with too few regulations."

Some 40 companies in five states operate an estimated 50,000 flights a year into the canyon, with three-fourths of the flights originating in Las Vegas. Some 400,000 people saw the canyon by air last year, pumping an estimated \$70 million into the tour flight industry.

The number of flights is expected to more than double by the year 2003 and some officials fear the park overflight problem is not limited to the Grand Canyon.

"I can't see how Interior Department officials can say that there is not a problem with tourist flights over our national parks," Rep. Richard Lehman, D-Calif., said after learning of Wednesday's crash.

Lehman, a member of the House Interior and Insular Affairs Committee, said the days of self-regulation by the air carriers is over.

"This is going to play right into their hands," Donald Donohue Jr., director of the National Park Service, said of the controversy between the air carriers and the environmentalists. Donohue is managing director for Las Vegas Airlines in Las Vegas.

The National Park Service has submitted six alternatives for consideration in dealing with the growing number of flights and the concerns of environmentalists.

One would call for no action at all. Another would limit flights to 2,000

feet above the rim and a third would restrict flights in the inner gorge and some other flight-free areas. A fourth would limit flights within 1,500 feet of landforms and a fifth would restrict flights below the rim and in some flight-free areas. A sixth alternative would limit flights to 2,000 feet above the rim and set flight-free areas.

Richard Marks, superintendent of the Grand Canyon National Park, said Thursday the area where Wednesday's crash occurred would have been off limits under one of the six alternatives.

Marks said military aircraft are also a problem because they fly faster "and have less response time."

Environmental groups want all flights restricted to 18,000 feet above the canyon rim — an altitude most tour planes cannot reach.

The flight operators have an understanding with the Federal Aviation Administration they will not fly less than 2,000 feet above the rim. But there is no legal rule and the limit is widely ignored. Most flights dip below the canyon rim at many points along the tour.

Charles Farrabe, management assistant for the park, said the FAA is the agency responsible for aircraft operations in and over the canyon.

"Our concern basically is environmental and noise," Farrabe said Thursday.

"This kind of accident was almost waiting to happen," said Bob Heston, the Sierra Club's Southern California representative. "When Congress created the National Park Service, it wanted to protect the natural quiet and protect visitor safety. Those airplane flights violate

both of those things." James Kahana, executive vice president of the Grand Canyon Helicopters, said flying over the canyon is "remarkably safe" despite the crashes.

"There is less air traffic over the canyon than in holding patterns over major airports such as those in Los Angeles, New York or Chicago," Kahana said.

"I hope the powers that be will realize that this is a fluke accident and not let all the studies and hearings go down the drain," Kahana added.

Tour aircraft fly through the canyon on a "see and be seen" basis and are not controlled by radar.

Sightseers' safety has long been major question

GRAND CANYON VILLAGE, Ariz. (AP) — Hearings that dealt with noise reduction issues already had raised questions as to air safety over Grand Canyon National Park before Wednesday's collision that claimed 25 lives.

Some opponents of flight in and over the canyon were raising those questions again after the collision of a helicopter and a twin-engine plane.

Others argued the flying space over the canyon was safer than airspace over some of the nation's major airports.

Superintendent Dick Marks said Wednesday that "there isn't anything that happened that

happened today that affects what we've already heard on the subject."

The National Park Service has been conducting hearings as to the future of scenic canyon flights. The six alternatives under consideration range from unrestricted flight to barring flight less than 2,000 feet above the canyon rim — the same restriction embodied in the Federal Aviation Agency's current advisory. That advisory carries no enforcement provision.

Authorities said the crash site is about 4,000 feet below the rim but that the altitude at which the aircraft were flying wasn't known.

The site — a stark, barren hillside

three miles north of the Colorado River and about 10 miles west of the park's visitor center — is within the portion of the canyon known as the Inner Gorge.

The Inner Gorge has been identified by the federal Office of Aircraft Safety as a "hazardous flying environment" according to an environmental assessment issued by the park this year in connection with noise reduction proposals.

The assessment also said the aircraft safety office described the upper airspace of the canyon as an area of concern with the potential for collisions.

Wednesday's collision occurred only 12 days short of the 30th anniversary of the worst crash in the canyon's history, the June 29, 1956, collision of two commercial aircraft in which all 128 people aboard were killed.

In the past five years, according to the park assessment, there have been 10 aircraft crashes within the park resulting in 17 deaths. Fifteen deaths resulted from three crashes within 10 miles of the park's boundary, it said.

The aircraft safety agency suggested better controls in the unique Grand Canyon flying environment. It proposed better use of advisory radio messages to pilots in the area, designation of "special-use airspace" in the Inner Gorge and an "Alert Area" for the remainder

of the park's airspace.

There is no FAA flight control center for the canyon, and aircraft are not tracked by radar, operating instead under visual "see and be seen" rules.

Park officials have estimated that as many as 40 companies conduct 250,000 to 400,000 flights annually over the Grand Canyon. The Arizona Department of Transportation has predicted that under current regulations, Grand Canyon flights will double between now and the year 2,000, a Sierra Club spokesman said.

Environmentalists say safety would be an auxiliary benefit from their proposals that flights within the canyon be barred and that

flights over the canyon be restricted to 2,000 feet above the rim.

There have been other crashes, some of them with fatalities.

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Official thinks lake due for cleanup too

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — The Bunker Hill Superfund cleanup site should be expanded to include the Coeur d'Alene River and at least part of Lake Coeur d'Alene, according to an Interior Department official.

"We believe the (Superfund) site impacts extend far downstream and into the lake," said Chuck Polyska.

Resources under the Interior Department's trusteeship outside the study boundaries, currently at 21 square miles, have been damaged by mining and smelting, Polyska said.

However, the Environmental Protection Agency probably will not agree to that suggestion, a state official said.

"I don't see EPA jumping out and expanding the Superfund site," replied Idaho hazardous materials specialist Brad Harr, one of the Bunker Hill Superfund study team members.

Harr said EPA's chief concern is for known human health problems, such as those existing in Kellogg area children exposed to heavy metal dust from decades of smelter pollution.

The comments came as state and federal officials met for two

days late to follow developments pertaining to accumulation of heavy metals downstream from the now-closed Bunker Hill smelter.

The Consortium for Human and Animal Health received a briefing Tuesday and Wednesday on the heavy metals problem in the river and the lake.

Academic studies of the effects of mining and smelter tailings on the lake and the river go back to 1932. Public concern has risen lately over planned cleanup and over elevated levels of lead and cadmium in lake fish.

The river's South Park, which runs past the smelter, carried from 300 to 400 pounds of lead and 200 pounds of cadmium per day during the early 1970s, according to Evan Horning, an EPA water quality specialist.

Since the smelter's closing in 1981, the river load has dropped to 20 pounds of lead and 13 pounds of cadmium daily, he said.

Lead levels in perch caught from Lake Coeur d'Alene last year were up to 35 times those found in perch caught in Spirit Lake, which is fed from a different watershed, biologists said.

INEL may get SDI research

WASHINGTON (AP) — Members of a House-Senate conference committee have approved the transfer of \$30 million from the Pentagon to the Department of Energy that could be used in "Star Wars" research projects at Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, member of the Defense Appropriations Subcommittee and a Senate conferee, said the proposal is included in the supplemental appropriation bill for 1986.

Members of the House and Senate met Tuesday to work out differences in the proposal.

McClure said INEL was host to a conference last week on the Strategic Defense Initiative, known as Star Wars.

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Sklavos gets first world title match

The sixth-ranked Sklavos was set to meet U.S. champ Everett Berry in a U.S. title fight on March 1 at Cactus Pete's Convention Center in Houston, but that match never materialized.

Claiming an eye injury in a sparring session, Berry withdrew much to the dismay of the challenger and his Denver based manager, Karen Turner.

The card went on with Rudy Lovato of Albuquerque, N.M. subbing for the injured Berry. Sklavos kept his record perfect in registering a six-round unanimous decision over his more experienced adversary.

Turner, through Superbouts, Inc., will again act as promoter as well as manager.

NFL attacks system for compiling USFL's anticipated loss

NEW YORK (AP) — A National Football League attorney Thursday mocked the method an expert witness for the USFL had used to calculate the damages the fledgling league is asking in its \$1.69 billion antitrust suit against the establishment.

Dr. Nina Cornell's projections, attorney Robert Fiske said, could mean the New Jersey Generals of the USFL would be playing to a crowd of 232,000 by 1992.

Cornell, an economist, had prepared two studies to buttress the USFL's damage claims.

Study A projects \$65 million in damages and is based on the old American Football League experience before the 1970 merger. It uses the AFL teams' single network TV revenue, gate receipts and players' salaries as a comparison of what might have happened had the USFL played in the fall instead of the spring for its first three years.

Study B, which asks for \$301 million, is taken from an in-house CBS study which was designed to learn if it was feasible to televise USFL games in the fall and projects three-network coverage.

Both studies ranged from 1983 through 1992 and had no increased cost factors. Ticket prices, revenues and player salaries all were all frozen for '83 and kept constant, with no network contract assumed and only a \$10 million yearly cable commitment.

Cornell said that any outrageous crowds as Fiske had insinuated might be possible, could not happen because she had built in a restraint — the actual sizes or size of the stadiums. But Fiske attacked the methodology.

Drug tests ordered in death of Bias

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Len Bias, who said he was living a "dream within a dream" after being drafted by the National Basketball Association champion Boston Celtics on Tuesday, died unaccountably of an apparent heart attack Thursday.

CBS News and Washington, D.C. television station WJVM quoted unidentified police and hospital

sources as saying that traces of cocaine had been found in the University of Maryland star's urine, but it was undetermined if that was a factor in his death.

Bob Law, a spokesman for the Prince George's County police, said authorities were awaiting results of an autopsy to determine both the exact cause of death "and whether drugs are involved."

The 22-year-old Bias, described as in perfect health, collapsed in his dormitory room just hours after returning from meetings in Boston with Celtics officials who had made him the No. 2 in the NBA draft.

Dr. Edward Wilson, chief of emergency services at Leland Memorial Hospital, where Bias was pronounced dead at 6:50 a.m. EDT, said there was "major damage" to the heart but "we don't know what caused the damage."

Dr. John Smialek, the chief state medical examiner, said his office would not release preliminary findings and estimated a complete report would take several days.

Maryland Athletic Director Dick Dull said the school had performed routine drug tests on Bias and other members of the team and "we've never had absolutely any kind of indication that there was excess of alcohol or any kind of drug involvement by Lenny Bias."

"The tragic end of what appeared to be a career of unlimited promise came just days after Bias passed a physical given by the Celtics."

Boston superstar Larry Bird, who urged the team to select Bias and was to work with Bias at rookie camp, said:

"It's horrible. It's the cruelest thing I ever heard."

Bias, who was attending summer school after playing his final college season, was stricken about 6:30 a.m. EDT.

Hospital spokesman Frank Berry said Bias was brought in about 6:50 a.m. and died two hours later following unsuccessful attempts to save the athlete.

Wilson said he understood a friend tried to revive Bias with cardio-pulmonary resuscitation and the procedure was continued on the 1 1/2-mile ambulance trip to the hospital.

"The heart was stimulated by

chemical and pacemaker means," said Wilson, the attending emergency room physician. "There was no response. The heart was not pumping and the lungs were not working."

"So far as I know, it was a sudden collapse," Wilson said. "There was no chest pain so far as we know. Nothing would indicate something was wrong."

Asked if such a sudden death for someone in apparently robust good health weren't unusual, he replied, "It's unusual, but it does happen."

WJVM said detectives were trying to question two players who were with Bias in the early morning hours. The station said investigators became suspicious because the room where Bias collapsed was spotless and appeared to have been recently cleaned.

Initially, WJVM reported, the two players with Bias told police that he had two or three beers in the 3 1/2 hours before he collapsed but unidentified sources said there was no trace of alcohol in the urine.

Maryland Coach Lefty Driesell, who recruited the extremely agile 6-foot-8 Bias from Northwestern High in nearby Adelphi, Md., and several of Bias' teammates rushed to the emergency room upon hearing the news.

Driesell, who frequently called Bias "All-World" during a senior year when he averaged 23.2 points and 6.8 rebounds a game, said at a late afternoon news conference he thought Bias was "the greatest basketball player that ever played in the Atlantic Coast Conference."

"I've known Leonard since he was in the fifth grade," Driesell said. "He was like a son to me."

"He was a born-again Christian," Driesell said. "He turned his life over to the Lord. He's in a better position now than we are. He is at home with the Lord. I love you Leonard, and I miss you."

Bias' death marks third for Terrapins

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) — Len Bias, who died Thursday of a cardiac arrest, became the third University of Maryland basketball player in just over a decade to die of heart failure, either during or shortly after his collegiate career.

Bias, 22, was pronounced dead at 8:50 a.m., some two hours after he suffered a seizure in his dormitory room on the Maryland campus. A draft pick of the Celtics, he had returned from Boston about eight hours earlier.

Owen Brown was also 22 when, a year after leaving the College Park school, he collapsed and died during a pickup game in suburban Virginia on Feb. 4, 1976.

Less than a month later, on April 1, sophomore center Chris Patton died of heart failure during a two-

on-two pickup game on the campus outdoor courts.

Unlike Bias, who was believed to be in perfect health, Brown and Patton both had heart problems. In fact, a doctor had warned Brown, who was detected to have an irregularity in his heart beat, that he could die while playing basketball.

Brown played for the Terrapins anyway, with a doctor and the necessary equipment always nearby. One year after he graduated, slightly out of shape, the La Grange, Ill., native died in a pickup game.

Brown, an honor student who had an enlarged heart and a test had disclosed that he suffered out-of-beat heart rhythms.

Patton, 21, died of a rupture of the aorta, the large vessel that carries blood from the heart. "It had nothing to do with athletics," said Dr. James Frost at the time.

Bias was simply a cardiovascular disease.

The heart problem, currently called Marfan's Syndrome was not yet defined at the time, but it is possible that is what ultimately led to Patton's untimely death.

Common to the three deaths that have devastated the Maryland basketball program in a period of just over 10 years, UM Athletic Director Dick Dull said:

"These are three tragedies that end for the 10-year program. It's tragic that those three young men could not live to realize their goals."

Maryland Sports Information Director Jack Zane called the deaths "a coincidence," adding, "I don't know how Maryland can get a bad reputation from this. An Olympic volleyball player died of heart problems and we take every precaution possible."

Before each season, the Terrapins put their basketball players through a rigorous physical that includes an EKG.

While Bias passed the exam easily last September, 7-foot-2 freshman Christoph Weisheit of Cologne, West Germany, was detected to be suffering from Marfan's Syndrome after he was ruled out from playing for the team or even participating in intramural basketball.

Fehr, Sutton lead at Atlanta

ATLANTA (AP) — Hal Sutton and Rick Fehr each put together bogey-free rounds and gained a share of the first-round lead with 6-under-par 66s in the \$500,000 Georgia-Pacific Atlanta Golf Classic Thursday.

Fehr, a second-year player still looking for his first victory, was in contention to take the lead alone when he went to the 499-yard, par 5 18th, but ended up with a par while most of the other leading scorers had birdies.

The field of 156 attacked the 7,097-yard, par 72 Atlanta Country Club course in ideal weather as over half the field shot par or better. The temperature was in the low 90s and there was no wind.

"I'm surprised somebody didn't shoot lower than 66," said Sutton, a two-time winner this year who is fourth on the money list.

South African Denis Watson was 7-under-par after 12 holes, but lost his bid to lead when he took a double bogey 6 on the 15th and three-putted for bogey on the 17 before getting back a stroke with a birdie on the finishing hole.

Watson was tied at 67 with six other players — Larry Ziegler D.A. Welbring, Andrew Magee, Mark O'Meara, Willie Wood and Scott Hoch.

Australian Greg Norman, this year's leading money winner, had a 71 along with defending Atlanta champion Wayne Lister and Dan Pohl.

Calvin Peete, bothered by a bad knee, had a 76 and immediately withdrew.

"I've gotten into my thinking winning a lot more," he said. "Second and third place doesn't mean much to me."

Sutton played each nine in 33, getting front side birdies from 2 feet at No. 1, 20 feet at No. 6 and 8 feet at No. 9. He two-putted for a birdie on the 11, scored from 5 feet on the 15th and finished with a two-put birdie from 50 feet on the final hole.

"The course is open to some low scores," Fehr said after going 32-34.

Fehr started with a 15-foot birdie putt on the first hole, got two others from 2 feet or less on Nos. 2 and 4 and had from 6-8 feet on the eighth. He got back side birdies on 16 and 17 from 30 feet and 18 feet respectively.

After playing the demanding Open course last week, Fehr said, "Guys come here and see this course and say 'let's get after it.'"

Lewis on track for three-medal try

EUGENE, Ore. (AP) — Carl Lewis, seeking to duplicate the triple he accomplished in 1983, eased through the qualifying in three events Thursday in the USA-Mobil Outdoor Track and Field Championships.

The versatile, 1984 quadruple Olympic gold medalist, won his 100-meter heat in 10.16 seconds, long-jumped 27 feet, 4 1/2 inches in qualifying, and finished second in his 200-meter heat in 20.41. This is the first day of the four-day championships at the University of Oregon's Hayward Field.

Lewis has won a total of seven national titles, including the 100 and long jump from 1981-83, and the 200 in 1983.

No sprinter has won the 100 four times since the national championships began in 1876. But Lewis, the world's top-ranked sprinter for each of the past five years, who surprisingly has lost twice this season, looked sharp in posting the fastest time in the four heats of the 100.

"The race felt easy and relaxed,"

Lewis said. "I've been working on my start and concentrating a bit more. I feel ready to start running well again in this meet."

In the long jump, Lewis qualified on his first try, and in the 200, he was a runner-up behind NCAA champion Floyd Heard of Texas A&M in his heat. Heard was timed in 20.37, with Calvin Smith just behind Lewis in 20.42.

In the 100 qualifying, the heat in which Lewis ran, may have had more Olympic medalists than any heat in history. In addition to Lewis, there were gold medalists Kirk Bristle and Smith, silver medalist Dwayne Evans and bronze medalist Thomas Jefferson.

Baptiste, the defending champion in the 100 and 200, finished just behind Lewis in 10.17, with Smith, the world record holder, third in 10.24.

The other heat winners were Heard in 10.20, and two-time Olympian Harvey Glance and Michael Morris in 10.21 apiece.

Lee McEae, the NCAA 100 champion, also qualified, finishing second behind Heard in 10.26.

In the 200, Baptiste registered the fastest time in the four qualifying heats with a 20:35 clocking, while Evans ran his heat in 20:36 and Wallace Spearman took the other

heat in 20:40.

In the women's 100 qualifying, world record holder Evelyn Ashford, seeking her sixth national title in this event, raced to victory in her heat in a time of 12.52.

"Everything's going good, it's going great," said Ashford, who skipped the 1985 outdoor season after giving birth to a girl. "It felt very easy. I feel like I have a lot more in me -- I want to get it out tomorrow (Friday), in the semifinals and finally. I feel I have more endurance this year, but I'm not sure of my speed. I don't think the layoff helped my speed. I'm a speed runner."

"The other heat winners in the women's 100 were Alice Brown (11.11) and Pam Marshall (11.21). Meanwhile, Diane Dixon set a stadium record in winning her heat in the women's 400 in 51.04. The old mark was 51.05 by Marita Payne."

Brenda Cliette (52.22) and Alice Jackson (52.70) were the other heat winners.

Hoddie Haley of Arkansas, the 1985 NCAA champion, posted the fastest time (45.50) in the five qualifying heats of the men's 400.

Sunder Nix, the 1983 champion, also won his heat, in 45.91, but Mark Rowe, the two-time defending champion, failed to advance to Friday's semifinals.

Pitcher's homer lets Phils sink Cards

After bad year, buyout came at right time for this farmer

MEQUON, Wis. — Curtis Hall's dairy farm with its big red barn has been in his family since 1888.

"It's always been a dairy farm, there's always been cattle here," said Hall.

But now Hall, 29, and his wife Suzanne, who have made their living by producing milk in America's Dairyland, have joined the government's whole-herd dairy buyout program and are getting rid of their cows.

"It's kind of sad to see all your cows go," Hall said, walking among the face-branded cattle in the barnyard. "It's like watching your pet dog get killed on the road. They have their own personalities, dumb as they may be."

"The Halls are joining the 1,621 other Wisconsin farmers and 13,968 nationwide whose bids to sell off their dairy herds were accepted by the federal government. They'll be paid to dispose of their cattle and stay out of the business for five years to reduce government purchases of surplus dairy products.

The change won't be pleasant for this farmer in Ozaukee County, just north of Milwaukee.

"I'm a small farmer, but I always intended to grow, to develop a big

herd," he said. "There was always the thought of a big barn with 100 cattle that you can pass along to your kids. That's how a farmer gets satisfaction, watching his herd develop."

But now Hall feels the herd buyout program came along at just the right time.

Last year, his 3-year-old son Adam suffocated when a feed box he was playing on in the barn collapsed. In that dark period, the corn and the hay they feed their cattle got planted late.

Then, a bull managed to breed nearly three-quarters of their Holsteins, reducing milk production.

"I didn't pay much attention to what the bull was doing," Hall said. "So I had the barn full of cows that weren't producing milk. I was feeding 80-90 head of cattle and milking 16," he said.

"Farming doesn't leave any leeway for personal tragedy," said Mrs. Hall, 26. "Friends can only do so much."

And like other farmers, the Halls were caught up by higher operating costs.

They rent the farm buildings, including a 45-to 50-acre dairy frame house, and his two parents for \$1,000 a month. Up to \$5,000 more a year goes

for renting more land that brings their farm to a total 150 acres.

They've been paying \$3,000 a month since December to buy feed for their cows, while the monthly check for their milk was as low as \$700 in January and February.

In addition, they were borrowing from banks to pay for farm equipment.

So the estimated \$100,000 that will come from the buyout looks good to the Halls. They are looking forward not only to their first vacation in years but to the education of their three children, Cate, G, Dionne, 3, and Nicholas, 1.

Hall figures that within a year he'll be looking for an off-farm job.

Hall said he had 29 milking cows and 37 young stock when he was accepted into the buyout program. He has gotten rid of 14 of the cows and all the younger animals and must sell the remainder by Aug. 31. He could be fed \$5,000 a head if he keeps any beyond that date.

So that the cattle can't be hidden sold to another farm for milk production, the U.S. Department of Agriculture requires they be branded on their faces with a 4-inch by 4-inch mark.

"We put it off as long as possible," Hall said. "If we didn't have to do it we didn't want it done."

Personal income dips but spending climbs

WASHINGTON — Americans' personal incomes, held back by weak growth in wages and salaries, fell 0.1 percent in May for the first decline in a year, the government reported Thursday.

The income decline was accompanied, however, by a strong 0.9 percent increase in consumer spending, the best advance in five months, led by gains in car sales.

Still, many analysts worried that consumer spending will slow in the months ahead because of continued weakness in income growth.

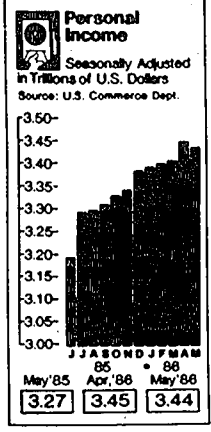
"If we don't get some improvement in the job market and in wage growth, I don't see how much longer the consumer can keep carrying the economy," said Sandra Shaber, director of consumer economics at Chase Econometrics, a forecasting concern.

The 0.1 percent income decline, which followed a 1.2 percent jump in April, was the first downturn since a 0.5 percent drop in May 1985.

The April rise and the May decline were both exaggerated by a big swing in government subsidy payments to farmers, which soared in April only to plunge back to normal levels last month.

Excluding the subsidy payments, personal income would have risen 0.3 percent in April and 0.4 percent in May.

Still, analysts expressed concern that wage and salary growth has



patterns better than other income components.

The 0.9 percent jump in personal consumption spending last month was the strongest increase since a 1.8 percent advance in December. It followed a 0.5 percent April gain.

The rise was fueled by strong increases in purchases of both durable and non-durable goods. Purchases of durable goods, items expected to last three or more years, rose at an annual rate of \$13 billion in May after advancing at a \$15.2 billion rate in April, reflecting strength in car sales in both months.

Purchases of non-durable goods climbed \$5 billion in May after falling \$9.7 billion in April. Analysts attributed the gain to an upturn in clothing sales.

Michael Evans, head of a Washington consulting firm, was unimpressed by the increases, saying the strength in auto sales was coming from dealer incentives aimed at reducing record levels of unsold cars and would not spur increased vehicle production.

Americans had to dip into savings to finance their May spending spree, pushing the savings rate down a full percentage point to 4.3 percent in May.

Personal income fell \$11.5 billion in May after soaring by \$33.3 billion in April. The wide swing came from government subsidy payments that surged in April because they included advance payments for 1986 and final payments for 1985.

Blue chips sag, Dow closes lower

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market finished lower Thursday as the blue chips sagged amid some late selling.

The Dow Jones average of 30 Industrials changed direction a number of times. It stayed close to Wednesday's closing level for most of the final few minutes.

Excluding the stock index, the blue chip indicator to its lowest level of the day and left it with a 13.08-point loss at 1,655.86.

Losing issues outnumbered gainers by about 4:3 on the New York Stock Exchange. Volume on the Big Board came to 129.9 million shares, up from 117.0 million shares on Wednesday.

The market's erratic behavior was partly caused by apprehension on the eve of a "triple witching hour" which occurs on the last trading day for a set of futures contracts on stock indexes, options on stock indexes, and options on individual stocks.

The computer-driven buying and selling maneuvers used by professionals on such days has occasionally caused wide price swings.

Stock traders, therefore, shied away from the market, remembering that on the last triple-expiration date, March 21, the Dow Jones industrial average slid 35.68 points, with most of the slide coming in the final few minutes.

Analysts said the market's recent meandering movements and lackluster trading volume also reflects investors' concern that economic growth is not more robust.

Dart & Kraft was one of the most heavily traded stocks, gaining 3/4 to 69 3/4, a 52-week high. The

diversified food firm announced plans to split into two independent companies.

Chromalloy American, another active issue, moved ahead by 2 1/2 to 23 1/2, also a 52-week high. Sun Chemical said it seeking to acquire the 64 percent of Chromalloy it does not already own.

Safety Stores, which faces a takeover threat from Dart Group, fell 1/4 to 48 1/2.

International Business Machines, which sported a modest gain in the early afternoon, closed down 1 1/2 to 145. Some other technology issues fared better: Chromalloy fell 1/4 to 48 1/2, already owned by Digital Equipment was up 3/4 to 84 1/2, and Motorola rose 1/2 to 130.

R.H. Macy closed unchanged at 67 1/2. Shareholders voted on Thursday to accept an offer from Macy's top managers to buy the retailer for \$3.7 billion and turn it into a private company.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks declined 0.43 to 140.29. Losing issues on the Big Board totaled 447, gainers came to 664 while 444 issues were unchanged.

At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index rose 0.58 to 261.19.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 147.73 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrial stocks fell 1.21 to 272.92, and S&P's 500-stock composite index finished down 0.93 at 244.06.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market moved up by 1.16 to 396.40.

Hemingway: very Idahoan

Outdoorsman basks in state's fishing, hunting resources

KETCHUM — Idahoans are quick to bag both Ernest Hemingway and Ezra Pound in their literary creed, ignoring that Hemingway used Idaho as a sanctuary from work and as a retirement home, while Pound never saw the Gem state after he was 18 months old.

Fortunately for our collective egos, entrenched myths stay entrenched. Pound's birchplace in Halley still stands to remind us he was ours, and Ketchum's Jack Hemingway is busy scoring his own writing success, which keeps that august surname in the literary forefront.

But, unlike his father and Pound, Jack Hemingway really is an Idaho creature; his addiction to this state's trout and game birds assures that, not to mention that in 1949 he married one of the state's own — Puck Whittlesey, daughter of a Twin Falls beer distributor. Quick with a smile, the good-natured son of a legend now thrives in the Wood River Valley where he works as well as plays.

A self-proclaimed fishing and hunting nut, Hemingway not only uses the area's resources for his own delight, but in true public spirit served on the Idaho Fish and Game Commission from 1970 to 1976 where he was involved in policy setting — some of which was controversial.

"I think the public views the Fish and Game's job as one of promoting hunting and fishing. But that's not correct," he says. "I think the Fish and Game commissioners are literally responsible for the situation that makes hunting and fishing possible. Members have an obligation to the resource."

Regardless, population pressures have brought a vast change in the outdoor sports scene he first touched a dry fly down on Idaho's streams. "One of the reasons I'm not fishing

my favorite spots on Silver Creek or Henry's Fork is that you can't find a place to be by yourself anymore," he says, adding that guides are taking people to most of the places that used to go almost unnoticed except by the most avid fishermen.

Laughing, he adds, "Guides are even guiding behind my house. There's a point of diminishing returns when so many people are involved. But, I have a solution. I've given up the search for giant fish. It's where you go that counts — the back country, small streams. You can still hike to private places. I'm seeing the state from a new perspective. Always before I've seen it from stream bottoms."

Currently promoting his autobiography, "Misadventures of A Fly Fisherman: My Life With And Without Papa," Hemingway just completed three weeks of touring the media circuit in Boston, New York City, Chicago, Los Angeles, San Francisco and Seattle. Last Saturday, he was busy autographing copies at Jud's Bookstore in Twin Falls and last night he appeared in Boston on the popular regional radio show, Merrill at Midnight.

Fortunately for the wiry wit, his sense of self is clear, and when those inevitable questions come regarding his more famous father, and his daughters, Margaux and Mariel, he shows no sign of irritation. "But then, high profile names are nothing new to a guy who grew up in a world that, to the rest of us, seems like a moving picture of the lost generation."

To Hemingway, Ernest was Papa, and Gertrude Stein, Ezra Pound, Ford Maddox Ford

and Gary Cooper were "the other people passing through."

But, if he isn't overwhelmed, neither is he falsely humble about his background. "Having the Hemingway name is obviously more of a plus than a minus," he says.

"Growing up for me was sort of the opposite of what others experience. My parents divorced when I was three and I would spend the summers with my father. I was always on a train or a ship traveling back and forth to Europe. I thought that kids who didn't have two sets of parents were disadvantaged."

Yet, he doesn't pretend that his entire life has been a booming success. College never seemed to be his forte, having dropped out of both Dartmouth and the University of Montana. His World War II days with the elite Office of Strategic Services behind enemy lines ended with his serving six months in a German prisoner of war camp.

As a stockbroker in San Francisco he was able to make a living but had no inclination to get rich at the task. Now, with inheritance money and his own book royalties, he's content to live with his outdoor sporting obsessions and his plans to write thriller novels even though "there will be odious comparisons" made to his father's works.

Jack Hemingway, however, has no intention of trying to emulate Papa. LeCarre and Ludlum spy thrillers provide his favorite reading and will heavily influence any future works he may create.

Yet, even those plans may take awhile — they certainly will take second place to his recreation along stream banks and fields flush with birds. He describes himself best through a dash of smile: "I've probably done more of the things I've wanted to do than anybody around. I may be a dismal failure at working hard, but I'm a great success at doing what I want."

Papa's novel, son's memoirs hit shelves

KETCHUM — Though nearly 25 years have passed since the death of Ernest Hemingway, the legendary name continues to appear on not only reprints but new books as well.

The latest Ernest Hemingway novel, "The Garden of Eden," published by Scribners, recently appeared in bookstores simultaneously with Taylor Publishing's release of Jack Hemingway's "Misadventures of A Fly Fisherman: My Life With And Without Papa."

"Misadventures," while not meant to be a literary masterpiece, is a personal accounting by Jack Hemingway of his own life as the eldest son of Papa Hemingway. Jack says he began working four years ago on a book, which was meant to concern only his fishing adventures. "But I tired of that," he says. "Besides, there are already too many fishing books out."

Like most adventures of the mind, while searching his memory for fishing trips, other parts of his life began to come out. Consequently, "Misadventures" begins with young Jack's

birth in Toronto, Canada, then follows him through his early days in Paris, his parents' divorce and other major events in his life.

"Yet, the art of fishing never leaves the story, whether it is Captain Hemingway of the famed GSS parachuting into occupied territory armed with a fly rod, or civilian Hemingway landing three steelhead with three casts on a Pacific Northwest stream."

A serious undercurrent lurks in the memoirs, one which tows the reader into Papa's life. Readers get to share a son's view of that 20th century literary giant from his macho days in Cuba to his complete deterioration in Ketchum.

"The Garden of Eden," on the other hand, is an attempt by Scribner's to raise from the dead a Papa Hemingway novel. Jack Hemingway says the publisher carved the book out of some 1,500 pages of raw manuscript written by Papa.

"None of the things published posthumously were ready for publication in his (Papa's) point of view or they would have been published,"

says Jack. "However, this is the best edited of them. It's immensely readable and definitely Hemingway. I talked to other people who had access to the manuscript and they thought it was gobbley gook. But this story was right there, well filled out," he says, explaining that "Garden" had been pared out of a much larger, encompassing story.

"The other (encompassing story) had no rhyme or reason to it and could not be brought to the conclusion, I guess. My father had a loss of faculties in his later years," says Jack, commenting on the rambling nature of the manuscript.

Concerning "Garden," one reviewer says, "The story is, superficially at least, a heavily mythologized version of the breakup of his first marriage."

Whether that is accurate, or whether the novel is really "Hemingway" or not, will have to be decided upon by the reader.

Both books are currently available in area bookstores. "Misadventures," 223 pp., sells for \$17.95. "Garden," 247 pp., is \$18.95.

New books expose Idaho literature

BOISE — "What Thou Lovest Well Remains: 100 Years of Ezra Pound" and "The Literature of Idaho" are books rooted in Idaho.

"What Thou Lovest," published by Limberlost Press less than a year after the Ezra Pound Centennial Conference last October in Halley, the poet's birthplace, features 23 writers commenting on Pound, his influence on world literature and his controversial stand on fascism. Included is an essay on poetry by William Studebaker, College of Southern Idaho associate professor of English.

Other commentators are by Allen Ginsberg, who knew Pound personally, and John Clellon Holmes, author of "Gone in October: Last Reflections on Jack Kerouac," who held Pound in reverence.

Editor Richard Ardinger says, "Robert Creeley once wrote that of the poets he studied at Harvard, Pound was more than any other poet demonstrated through his poetry how to write poetry. I believe that all of the contributors to this anthology would agree with this. Nearly all the contributors are poets.

"It is my hope that this eclectic mixture of essays and poems will offer experienced and uninitiated readers a glimpse of the great power

and vast range of Pound's vision and influence. It also is my hope that the reader will learn as much about the writers of 100 essays as they will about Pound."

"The Literature of Idaho," published by Boise State University as part of its Hemingway Western Studies, is an anthology with selections from the ancient oral narratives of Idaho's Indian peoples to the most recent essays, poems, novels and stories about the state.

In it, one can read a variety of works that extend from Studebaker's poem, "Standing On The Yankee Fork Gold Dredge Out Of The Rain," to Vardis Fisher's short story, "Odyssey Of A Hero," or Ernest Hemingway's "The Shot."

Editor James H. Maguire says, "This anthology is intended to be a gathering and sampling of literature, not a literary chronicle. Not all the selections are belles-lettres, but almost all of them are literature in the sense of writing that lasts and generally receives more praise than other writing."

"What Thou Lovest Well Remains," 135 pp., sells for \$9.95. "The Literature of Idaho," 330 pp., is priced at \$17.95. It can be ordered through area bookstores or from the Boise State University Bookstore, 1910 University Drive, Boise 83725; for experienced and uninitiated readers a glimpse of the great power of \$1 must accompany the order.

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'Invaders from Mars' lands with an oddly funny '50s feel

INVADERS FROM MARS (PG). Tobe Hooper's faithful remake of William Cameron Menzies' 1953 sci-fi thriller — which, back then, fused standard Cold War thrills with a Gothic, Expressionist twist — has a vaster budget, a modern perspective and a lot of reflexive inside humor. The story is paradigmatic — a little boy protagonist lost in a town full of Martian-dominated zombie adults — but Leslie Dilley's production designs are lush, the actors are better and the Martians (which resemble leering

globs of melting ice cream) are an extraterrestrial gas. When Hooper gets the languorously empty, paranoid '50s feel he wants, this movie — verges on being hysterically funny.

BACK TO SCHOOL (PG-13). A big belly laugh of a comedy, expertly tailored to the talents of Rodney Dangerfield, cast as a boisterous self-made clothing tycoon who enters college to set a good example to his wallflower son (Keith Gordon). A sleek, witty Sally Kellerman is Dangerfield's English

prof. and a hilarious Adrienne Barbeau is Dangerfield's social-climbing, two-timing wife. With Robert Downey Jr., Burt Young, Ned Beatty, Terry Farrel.

FERRIS BUELLER'S DAY OFF (PG-13). Teen chronicler John Hughes has condensed the mythic teen-ager, Ferris Bueller (Matthew Broderick), a giddy scamp who is too savvy for his parents, too cool for school and an absolute terror when it comes to restaurant maître 'd'es. The film's hook is a tantalizing fantasy, for adults as well as kids — what if you could fool your parents and teachers (for that matter, your boss) into thinking you were sick, earning yourself a 24-hour free ride from the boredom and responsibilities of real life? But Hughes miscalculates badly, mak-

ing his hero so smug and invincible that he doesn't give us any chance to root for him.

THE MANHATTAN PROJECT (PG-13). A teenage scientific whiz (Christopher Collet) takes advantage of the kindnesses of his mother's atom-scientist suitor (John Lithgow) to build some high-grade plutonium and steal a nuclear bomb. Also stars Cynthia Nixon and Jill Eikenberry. Directed by Marshall Brickman.

TOP GUN (PG). The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you'll ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, jocular male-bonding, screaming jets and so much techno-pop pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: the trappings are flabbergasting —

and the camerawork and editing a knockout — but the story is a clever rehash of "Coolin' Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman" drowned in beecake and macho bathos.

COBRA (R). Sylvester Stallone, having pared his "screenplays" down so that he has done away with characterization, logic, coherency, motivation, background and more than six speaking parts, now goes after dialogue. What emerges is a lurid, ludicrous, exhausting, enervating bloody mess of a slasher movie, thundering at you in vast close-up. The villains are not the raggledoggle scum who clank hatchets and consider themselves a master race but the news media, wimps who believe in due process of law and judges who undo the work of one-man arsenals like Stallone. Gaseous vigilantism, this.

And away we go into an exercise in pure, hilarious, uncorruptly corrupt rudeness.

Besides, criticizing "Back to School" because you don't like the parts without Rodney is like criticizing the circus because you're bored by the fellow who sweeps up behind the elephant. You're there, simply and exclusively, to see Dangerfield, with his bulging eyes and brassy-sniffer hulk, moving through the collegiate crowd with his greasy aplomb, whipping out a checkbook at the bookstore and bellowing, "Hey folks, it's on me — Shakespeare for everyone!"

If "Back to School" is nothing more than a jury-rigged showcase for Dangerfield's stand-up routine, the result is nevertheless as funny as any movie this year. Awkward and twitchy, Dangerfield is something of a bully in behalf of his values — cheap sex and expensive surroundings — but he's also constantly, touchingly desperate to ingratiate himself. When he commences all that jiggling, it's almost as if he's trying to wrangle his way under your skin. And he does.

Hollywood films bait for production

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Here's another bulletin from the war front: The Hollywood Chamber of Commerce is fighting movie runaways with a new documentary film.

The Chamber, alarmed by the increasingly successful efforts of other states in luring movie production away from Hollywood, has come up with a 22-minute film called "Runaway: A California Crisis."

"We've got to do something to stop a very disturbing trend," said Bill Welsh, chamber president. "California is losing \$1.5 billion yearly in film production to other states. "The human cost in terms of crime, unemployment is enormous. We hope

that the film will alert everyone in the state to the danger to our economy represented by runaway film production."

The documentary, narrated by Dennis Weaver, focuses on the aggressive efforts of five states — New York, Florida, Massachusetts, Texas and Tennessee — to lure producers away from California. These states go all out to accommodate the production companies.

By contrast, says Charlotte Clay, the film's executive producer, filmmakers in California meet nothing but resistance from local government, businessmen and residents.

'Back to School' wins ticket respect

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — Moviegoers went "Back to School" to learn some respect for comedian Rodney Dangerfield and made his new film the weekend's No. 1 box office attraction.

Laughs won out over action as Dangerfield's new film displaced last week's top draw, "Top Gun," and another new comedy, "Ferris Bueller's Day Off," pushed ahead of "Raw Deal" and "Cobra."

"Back to School," which stars the "I don't get no respect" comedian as a boorish businessman who returns to college, grossed \$3.9 million.

"Ferris Bueller," the chronicle of a teen-age's day away from school, sold \$6.3 million in tickets.

"Top Gun," the Navy flyboys adventure film in its fifth week of release, took third place with a gross of \$6.25 million.

Sylvester Stallone's "Cobra," which was in third place last week, dropped 45 percent in its fourth weekend and fell back one notch with a take of \$2.8 million. That was the same amount grossed by musician Arnold Schwarzenegger's "Raw Deal," which dropped almost 50 percent in its second weekend and fell from second place.

"Poltergeist II," in its fourth week, took in \$2.2 million to make it the weekend's sixth highest-grossing film, while "Short Circuit," in its sixth week, was close behind with \$2.1 million.

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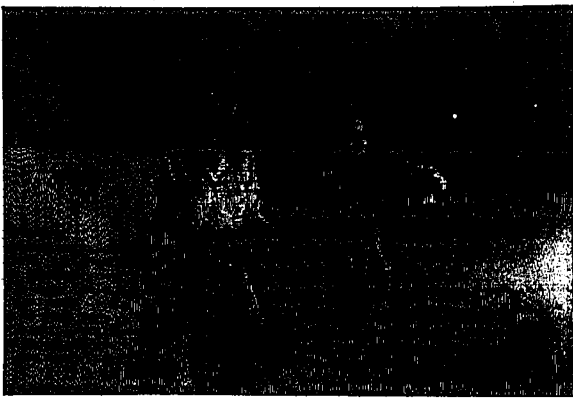

'Invaders from Mars' gets a much improved remake

HOLLYWOOD — To be Hooper's remake of "Invaders From Mars" is set in a small Midwestern-looking town: Anywhere, U.S.A. There, Mom, Dad and little David Gardner — as homey a trio who will ever meet — gaze up into the night. But the sky shakes oddly.

Some weird, inexplicable something is about to descend into the sand pit out back. Mom and Dad will disappear past the hill and picket fence, then come back with strange, vacant expressions — and screws in the back of their necks.

Investigating police are going to prow around, get sucked into the pits and turn up later with the same scared necks and vacant stares. Soon, no matter where David runs, he is going to find people with screws in their necks, gazing at him oddly; his classmates, his teacher, strangers on the street.

It is a nightmare, obviously; and a peculiarly 1950s sort of that. When director-designer William Cameron Menzies made the 1953 "Invaders From Mars," he and screenwriter Richard Blake were serving up standard Cold War-era chills with a Gothic twist.

Hooper makes the movie faithfully. He does not really try to update or refashion it, like Philip Kaufman with "Invasion of the Body Snatchers" or John Carpenter with "The Thing." He simply does the movie over again — with a vaster budget, a modern perspective and a lot of reflexive inside humor. (Examples: The Gardners live in the same house they did in 1953, but it is now called Santa Mira, site of Don Siegel's similarly themed "Body Snatchers"; a "Body Snatchers" pod lies with some junk in a basement; David goes to Menzies Public School, and Hooper's police chief is played by Jimmy Hunt, who was David in the 1953 original.) Hooper is trying to make a more self-referential, self-conscious version of "Invaders" — his ideal version.

But his treatment is lush. He can realize everything the 1953 movie makers had to leave out — letting John Dykstra create a trickier spaceship,

and the designers provide tastier aliens. Menzies' Martians looked like two wrestlers in green, velvet jump suits, ordered around by a silver-painted, tentacle head in a fishbowl. (That same head turns up here in the school basement, along with the pod.) Hooper's E.T.-types look like four-legged, leering globs of melting ice cream, and they truck around funkiely, as if cartoonist R. Crumb were animating them.

In the original, the acting was incredibly bad: When the characters turned into zombies, you could barely tell the difference, except for their blank scowls. Here, the actors are trying deliberately to overplay. Karen Black is sitcom-momish as the nurse-heroine; Timothy Bottoms and Laraine Newman give the elder Gardners a cult-victim vacuity. In 1953, at the height of the Red scare, the possessed parents were surlier, more like terrorists.

James Karen has a field day as a macho Marine general, and Louise Fletcher amusingly parodies here Nurse Ratched as an evil schoolteacher. In "Life Force," Hooper was accused of having no sense of humor, and here he seems to be designing the movie to contain the audience reactions beforehand; kidding himself before anyone else has a chance.

The humor is there. Co-senarist Dan O'Bannon uses the deadpan grotesquerie he had in "Return of the Living Dead." How can any one think a movie with lines like "Martians have no qualms about killing Martians!" is not intended to be funny?

You can sympathize with the people who think "Invaders From Mars" is a botch; there is something so anachronistic and out-of-scale about it. But they are missing something. If you can tap into Hooper's oddball rhythms and cold sendups, you can enjoy yourself.

And, though the 1953 "Invaders" was an effective movie, it is not really the classic that people remember. Except for Menzies' superb production designs, everything in the remake is better: the acting, the camera work, definitely the Martians. It may not grip audiences in the same way, but that is because Hooper is trying something harder, a conscious campiness that is tough to bring off.

Salute to Ford's Theatre shines with stars in a 'really big show'

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

"The Kraft All-Star Salute to Ford's Theatre" (airing Wednesday, June 25 on CBS) seems to offer something for every artistic taste — except for those who enjoy heavy-metal or early madrigal music. The special, hosted by Richard Chamberlain and Jaclyn Smith, features pop singers, jazz singers, dancers, magicians, comedians and pianists.

It's the type of really big show that used to dominate prime-time TV — but has virtually vanished from the airwaves.

"Variety shows really don't work anymore," concedes Joe Cates, producer of the salute, who has produced more than 200 network specials. "But this kind of show is more than a variety show. It's an event. Events work."

And this is an event. The gala was taped June 8 in front of a black-tie audience at Ford's Theatre, the restored Washington, D.C., theater where President Lincoln was assassinated in 1865. The money from the gala (tickets cost \$5,000) funds future presentations at the theater. President and Mrs. Reagan as well as several members of Congress were in attendance. Guests also met President Reagan at a White House reception.

The performers were paid scale, but costs escalated. For instance, Tommy Tune and Sandy Duncan did not want to perform material from their Broadway smash "My One and

Only," because they had performed a similar routine on another recent network special. So Cates hired choreographer Tad Tadlock, who created an original routine.

Among the other highlights: Co-host Richard Chamberlain will read a soliloquy from Lincoln; Joel Grey performs George M. Cohan songs as well as a tune from "Cabaret"; Paul Anka sings a specially written (by Sammy Cahn) version of "My Way" that Cates said "reflects the even-

ing's circumstances."

(Other acts include comedians Louis Anderson and Freddy Roman, pianist Victor Borge, country singer Sylvia, magician Lance Burton, ballet dancer Cynthia Harvey (and her partner Ross Stretton), dancer Fernando Bujones and members of the cast of "The Hot Mikado," the current stage production at Ford's.

Despite these disparate performers, Cates runs the taping without interruptions.

"I run it like a live show," explains Cates, who is producing his third Ford's Theatre gala. "Of course, you can't use certain lighting or certain scenery. But I do not do takes. The audience is treated well. I'm very big on that. We shoot the actual performance."

If Peggy McCay of "Days of Our Lives" wins a Daytime Emmy next month as Lead Actress she will thank Joan Collins.

Peggy would even name a street after Joan Collins if Beverly Hills officials agreed. Because of Joan's "Dynasty" reign, middle-aged actresses acutally get phone calls these days, and auditions.

"Joan proved women over 40 can be sexy and exciting," Peggy declares. "Writers are catching on."

Last fall Peggy caught on as Caroline Brady for "Days," mother of Roman and of Bo. Used to playing sweet moms, especially understanding moms, Peggy hooked a tiger in Caroline. Fans soon learned that Caroline had been married to nasty Victor Kiriakos. She was his lover, then his wife, then after a split, a lover again. Just lately Caroline tells Bo his real Poppa is Victor. Bo has a fit, and never wants to see Mom again.

Things were quite different for Peggy as editor Mason Adams' wife Marlon Hume during a six-year run of "Lou Grant." Dutiful Marlon knew her place. In one episode Marlon goes to work and thoroughly enjoys the outside life. But she quits when work infringes upon domestic bliss.

For a final line, Marlon tells her husband she is giving up the job because she loves him. Peggy inserted a note of regret in her reading, a waspish tone that brought down the bosses. Housewives would be indignant over the hint that perhaps a job was a pleasure. Peggy did the line over. Joan Collins would have booted.

Brought out from New York for Warner Brothers back when Jim Garner rode through studio streets looking for his "Maverick" posse, Peggy McCay is a stayer, a 30-year survivor.

The McCay span stretches from "Marcus Welby" to this spring's Jim Garner-Sally Field movie, "Murphy's Romance." From the pilot "Night Court" to "Streets of San Francisco."

Miss Mccay has matured gracefully is another way to put it, managing to hang in the 1.8 percent of actresses who earn a good income.

"I've lived off residuals," Peggy says with a laugh. She also fought

Still on the beat, riding high with an Emmy nomination, McCay is one of Hollywood's lucky elite. Yet she must audition for the rest of her life, lining up with everybody else since her jam-packed list of credits means nothing to the younger generation of producers.

So Peggy bites her tongue, and reads with the new kid in town. It's part of the deal, and it led to juicy Caroline, and a possible Emmy.

From the voice-box, Peggy is called to work on "Days." "If you'll excuse me," Peggy says sweetly, "I'm going out to shoot Victor."

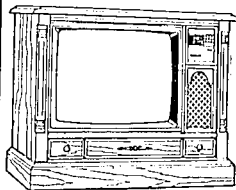

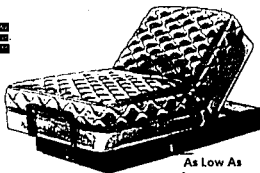

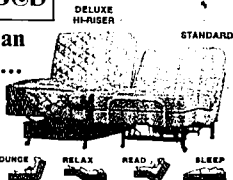

Joyce teams with 'Dating Game'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Elaine Joyce says she got interested in game shows when her acting career was a drift.

"It was after the birth of my first child and I wanted to stay in town," she said. "So around 1978 I started doing shows like 'The Match Game,' 'Hollywood Squares' and 'Password.' The game shows were all over the place, I got into it originally because of 'Pyramid' in New York. That was the first game show I did.

"I loved going on the game shows as a guest. You get a mental workout and it's fun. You can be yourself. People just kept calling me for them. At that time I was kind of directionless in my career. Whoever called I'd work for."

Miss Joyce is now moving up from guest to host of "The All New Dating Game." She starts taping Wednesday for syndication on 130 stations in the fall.

She did a pilot for a talk show for Chuck Barris about a month ago, then Barris asked her if she would be host when he revived "The Dating Game."

"We did a run-through," she said. "I was very excited. This is going to be fun. It was like putting on a comfortable pair of shoes."

Traditionally, men have been game-show hosts. One exception was Betty White, who won an Emmy in 1983 as host of NBC's daytime show "Just Men!"

"This is rare. I think women have a lot to say, it's just that we need a vehicle," Miss Joyce said. "I remember being asked a few years ago to be co-host of a show. I said I'll be the host, but I'm not going to stand there like a model. They said, 'No, no, women don't want to see a woman as a host.'"

"So much has changed in this country, but dating was one of the last things to change," she said. "A guy asks a girl out, then he takes her home. Now there's computer dating, you go Dutch. I thought I knew all about male-female relationships, but when I got out there and had to start dating again I didn't know what to say. It had changed. Men are scared. They don't know how to approach women any more because

of all the stuff about women's liberation."

Miss Joyce's second child, Michael Francis Levoff, was born three months ago. Her first child, a daughter, Taylor Joyce Van, is now 9. She was married for 12 years to the late actor-singer Bobby Van. She now is married to John D. Levoff, a film executive.

Miss Joyce recently completed a role in the horror film "Trick or Treat," which was filmed at the Dino De Laurentiis studio near Wilmington, N.C.

"There were eight films going when I was there," she said. "When I arrived at the airport there was King Kong's arm, for the sequel. I saw the forklift used in the heart transplant. It was hysterical."

She described "Trick or Treat" as a funny rock 'n' roll horror film. It also stars rock stars Gene Simmons from Kiss and Ozzy Osbourne.

She will also be seen this summer in "Up Hill All the Way," a comedy starring Mel Tillis, Roy Clark, Burt Reynolds and Glen Campbell.

Most of her work has been on television, where she starred in "Mr. Merlin," "City of Angels," "The Carol Burnett Show," "The Don Knotts' Variety Show," and "Here Come the Brides."

"The first thing I ever did was 'Here Come the Brides.' I was one of the brides," she said. "It was set in Seattle and they took us out in the harbor on a tug, which started sinking. The boat was sinking and we were in these heavy dresses from the 1800s."

Carlin turns to acting

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Comedian George Carlin waited a long time to become an actor, but he quickly nailed down roles in a special for Home Box Office and in a movie now in production.

He's a burned-out hippie who tuned out in the 1960s in the Disney comedy spy thriller "Outrageous Fortune," now filming in Los Angeles.

"This is important for me because I held my acting ambitions in check because I'd had some bad experiences with trying to do some acting in the 1960s and '70s," he said. "Acting is something I've always wanted to do since childhood."

"I didn't feel confident before. Now I've worked past most of those internal blocks. I'm free now to pursue this deferred goal. The main kickoff to show people, the public and people in this business that I'm ready is 'Outrageous Fortune.' But my special is another step in that direction."

Justice Department provided NBC interview with terrorist

LOS ANGELES — NBC News has allowed the Justice Department to view the interview the network held with terrorist Abul Abbas, including portions of the interview that are not being aired, NBC News president Lawrence K. Grossman said Monday.

Grossman said the network is planning to give the department a copy of the videotape of the interview with Abbas, the Palestinian accused of plotting the Achille Lauro hijacking in which American Leon Klinghoffer was slain.

Portions of the interview were broadcast May 5 on "NBC Nightly News."

The Justice Department, which is conducting a criminal investigation of Abbas, reportedly engaged in negotiations with NBC last month in an attempt to persuade the network to turn over unused videotape from the Abbas interview.

Justice was especially interested in the fact that on the May 5 broadcast, NBC News correspondent Henry Champ said Abbas "freely admits responsibility for the hijacking of the Italian cruise ship, the Achille Lauro." However, no videotape was shown of any such remark by Abbas and federal criminal lawyers would like to know whether it exists.

Champ agreed not to disclose Abbas' whereabouts as a condition for the meeting.

In the negotiations, Justice Department officials hoped to persuade NBC to provide the material

without having to issue a subpoena, thus avoiding a furor over the case, sources in Washington told The Associated Press.

Grossman on Monday said the network "recently" allowed Justice officials to review videotapes and transcripts of the interview with Abbas. He declined to be more specific about when the review took place.

He said the review took place on NBC premises, but no transcripts or tapes had yet been turned over to the department.

"We are planning to turn over at the request of the Justice Department the videotape of the interview," Grossman said in an interview. "They have already seen the transcripts and have screened the interview."

The day after the portions of the interview was broadcast, the State Department accused NBC of encouraging terrorism.

Robert Oakley, head of the department's counterterrorism section, suggested that when news

media make deals to interview terrorist fugitives the news organizations become "accomplices." He called the interview "reprehensible."

In an earlier interview with television reporters, Grossman defended the interview. "We're not in the job of capturing fugitives; we're in the job of reporting the news."

Grossman was asked several times whether NBC News had an obligation to bring Abbas to justice.

"We're not an intelligence service or law enforcement agency," Grossman said. "Our role is to report the news."

Grossman said the British news agency Reuters and the Irish Times newspaper also interviewed Abbas without disclosing his location. Neither story had a dateline.

The news executive said the value of the Abbas broadcasts was for "the American people to see for themselves what kinds of threats there are, and to see for themselves who the people making (the threats) are..."

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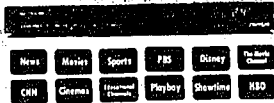
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NBC's 'Liberty' recounts story of making of Statue of Liberty

LOS ANGELES — As America prepares to celebrate the Statue of Liberty's 100th birthday following her two-year facelift, NBC takes a look at how the statue came to stand in New York Harbor.

The three-hour movie "Liberty," will be broadcast Monday at 7 p.m. on KBCI-Boise, KID-Idaho Falls, KMVT-Twin Falls and KSL-Salt Lake City.

"Liberty" tells the story behind Liberty Enlightening the World, the statue's proper name, and how it was the culmination of a dream of French sculptor Frederic Auguste Bartholdi.

Frank Langella stars as Bartholdi, Carrie Fisher as poetess Emma Lazarus, Claire Bloom as Bartholdi's mother, Corinne Touzet as his mistress, and George Kennedy, Chris Sarandon and LeVar Burton as fictional workmen who helped erect the statue. Richard Sarafian directed on location in Paris and Baltimore from a screenplay by Pete Hamill.

French historian Edouard de Laboulaye suggested the monument as a gift from the French people to America. "He encouraged Bartholdi and after that it became very much his life," said Langella. "It took him 17 years to accomplish."

Langella describes Bartholdi, who designed the statue and oversaw its construction, as "obsessive, extremely

loyal, determined, from a rather well-to-do background, and somewhat controlled by his mother until he met the woman who became the statue's inspiration." That was Jeanne Baheau, who became first his mistress, then his wife. Still, it was his mother's face that eventually ended up on the statue.

"I like period pieces, but I don't prefer them," said Langella. "I like them because they open you up to certain kinds of language, certain kinds of attitudes and certain characterizations. There are dozens of modern men you can play, but if you do an 18th century character it offers you a crack at something different. And I was trained in the classical theater.

"If I'm going to play a husband of a woman being terrorized by a burglar, I can pretty much tell you what to expect. But if I play a sculptor in the 19th century dominated by his mother, and there are wars and horses, there are so many shadings. The Franco-Prussian War was going during this time he was inspired to create the statue."

He added, "There are few restrictions to playing a historical character. If you play a character the way research tells you, it limits you. But no amount of research can tell you what his mother said to him or what he said to his mistress. So, you do have some liberty."

Langella said Bartholdi visited the United States and personally suggested Bedloe's Island, then overrun by goats, as the site for the statue.

The movie tells both a historic story of Bartholdi and a fictional story involving the coppersmiths who put the statue together from the parts shipped from France. Emma Lazarus, who wrote the poem "The New Colossus," which is inscribed on the base of the statue, is also involved in a fictional relationship with one of the workers.

Prior to "Liberty," Langella completed work on the theatrical film "The Men's Club." It will be released in September.

"That was the first film I ever did in Los Angeles," he said. "I can't believe I've never done a film here before. We shot a week in San Francisco and did the rest here. The picture tells the story of seven men, 35 to 50, all of whom are going through some crisis. Roy Scheider is an ex-athlete who's going through a mid-life crisis. He asks his friends to form a men's club. We talk about our lives until it descends into a drunken brawl.

"There are vignettes of each man's life. It's unique. I don't know of a film that tries to tell seven individual stories. It also stars Richard Jordan, Treat Williams, David Dukes, Craig Wasson, Harvey Keitel, Stockard Channing and Ann Wedgeworth."

Langella, who won a Tony award for "Seascape," is probably best known for his role in "Dracula," which he played both on Broadway and in the movies.

"I remember for the film my first scenes were with Laurence Olivier in Cornwall in England," he said. "They got his closeups, but mine turned out too dark. Three months later, in London, Sir Laurence is off the picture. And I get on a horse in the back of the studio, where they're burning some trash. They put an 8x10 picture of Sir Laurence on a stick and I sat on the horse on the road and talked to the picture."

CBS reclaims top slot for news, but network rating slides to 3rd

NEW YORK — "CBS Evening News" and Dan Rather climbed back into first place in the network news race last week without basketball to bounce the schedule around, but the network finished in third place overall.

CBS won the evening news race last week with a 10.3 rating and a 22 share, ahead of NBC with a 9.7 rating and 22 share and ABC with a 9.4 rating and 21 share, according to figures released Tuesday by A.C. Nielsen Co.

"NBC Nightly News" won the race the previous week with a 10.4 rating, edging CBS at 10.1 and ABC at 10.0.

CBS, which had won the news race for 213 consecutive weeks, had preempted Rather in 20 West Coast markets twice during the first week of June to broadcast the National Basketball Association playoffs.

NBC's news division was cheered, however, by a strong showing for the premiere of "1986," the magazine show anchored by Roger Mudd and Connie Chung. It placed 23rd for the week with a rating of 12.3 and a 23 share, which Jaffe said was the best

debut for a show of its type since "Prime Time Saturday" in 1979.

In the last seven weeks, CBS News has a rating of 11.0 and a 23 share, compared with 10.5 for NBC and 9.8 for ABC. Compared with the same period a year ago, NBC's "Nightly News" is up 8 percent in the ratings, ABC is up 5 percent and CBS is off 1 percent, according to Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Each ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television. The share is the percentage of sets in use during the time period.

David Poltrack, CBS' vice president for research, characterized the network's .6 of a point edge in the news ratings as "fairly healthy," and predicted that the lead would grow in the fall when more sets are in use.

Top-rated NBC won the overall race for the week by sweeping the top five positions on the way to a 12.8 rating and a 25 share, followed by ABC with a 10.4 rating and 20 share and CBS with a 9.9 rating and a 19 share.

"The Cosby Show" finished No. 1 with a 25.4 rating and 48 percent of the audience in its time period,

followed by "Family Ties," "Cheers," a special "All Is Forgiven" segment and "Golden Girls," all on NBC.

However, "All Is Forgiven" is looking for a new home. NBC decided not to pick it up despite a successful nine-week run.

Rounding out the top 10 were "Growing Pains," "2020" and "Who's the Boss?" all on ABC, and three shows tied for ninth: "227" on NBC, "Murder, She Wrote" on CBS and "Hardcastle & McCormick" on ABC.

CBS, without its highly rated "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest" serials during the summer, suffered through Friday night with the film "Brotherly Love" starring Judd Hirsch and Karen Carlson, which got a 9.1 rating and 18 percent of the audience.

Poltrack added that CBS was also hurt by juggling its schedule on Tuesday and Wednesday nights, and said it usually takes a week or two for viewers to adjust.

"We would expect the numbers to go up in the next couple of weeks," Poltrack said, "but we recognize that NBC should be able to hold first through the summer."

What's in a name? PBS better find out

LOS ANGELES — A public TV show by any other name would have a better chance of getting someone to watch it.

The Public Broadcasting Service could take a cue from commercial programmers when it comes to the series name game. A glance at the PBS' premiere titles for fall tells you nothing less—or worse, scares you away from potentially fascinating shows with boring titles.

Quick, what is "Out of the Fiery Furnace"? Is it a documentary about coal and railroads or a hellish allusion to Mount St. Helens? A how-to show about wood stoves or a short-course in ceramics?

Actually, it's a seven-part series about metallurgy, beginning in the fall. If this show were on ABC, the title would be "Hot and Hard" or, at least, "Heavy Metal."

What do you suppose they mean by "The Day the Universe Changed"? Sounds like a bad black-and-white self-movie insinuations might find on an independent station at 1:30

a.m. But no, it's James Burke's new 10-part exploration of, well, everything. The Renaissance, the Industrial Revolution, the rise of modern medicine, theories of evolution — he covers it all rather smugly while walking around the globe. The commercial networks wouldn't consider airing such a thing, let alone naming it.

What about "The Story of English"? Is it about British manners and tea, or a sleep-inducing English 101 course in grammar?

Neither. In fact, this nine-part history of the English language, also scheduled for next fall, may be the most riveting new series on the public TV schedule. If only the name were catchier.

Robert MacNeil brings his Nova Scotia accent to the task of narrating the series, tracking the world's most universal language from an obscure Germanic tribe to current controversies over black English, "Franglais" and "Japlish." Everyone from Moon Zappa (valleyspeak consultant, fer sure) to

New York Times language nit-picker William Safire appears in the introductory hour. A BBC co-production co-written by MacNeil and Robert McCrum, the show will air simultaneously here and in Britain with essentially the same English in each version, minus a few "bell-ringer" pronunciations that would irritate one nation or the other (like the American "clerk" vs. the British "clark").



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Synergy between NBC, affiliates (and Tartikoff) boosts ratings

KAANAPALI, Hawaii — Even as NBC developed "The Cosby Show" and dreamed of its climb out of the ratings cellar a few years ago, KYTV-TV, the network's Springfield, Mo., affiliate, was beefing up its "Action News" and widening its ratings lead over that city's ABC and CBS affiliates.

The two events were coincidental, but mutually beneficial. Many viewers of "KY3," as locals call it, kept their dials tuned to NBC's prime-time series, boosting their ratings a bit. In turn, the success of the network's shows added a new layer of muscle to the station's 30-year lock on its No. 1 local position.

A similar story can be told all over the country. Local stations build their reputations and profits one way, the networks another. The common ground provides the basis for a longstanding relationship.

"We need each other," said Bill Moll, co-owner of KYTV. "You provide a lead-in for their prime time; they provide a lead-in for your late news, so the synergy is important."

The president of broadcasting for Harte-Hanks Communications, Moll is among the 30-odd owners of a station group that includes affiliates of each of the three major networks. That is why he is among a few broadcasters who can — and do — attend all three networks' annual affiliate station meetings, such as the one that NBC held here on Maui last week.

Moll offers a keen perspective on the role of the local station: a role that in nearly every community gives it an identity distinct from the network.

The distinction is sufficient to make local winners out of network second-best. Harte-Hanks' two CBS stations — in San Antonio, Texas, where the company is based, and in Greensboro, N.C. — are No. 1 in their local markets, thanks largely to strong news operations.

"There are two things that distinguish you in a market," Moll said. "One is your network; the other is your local news. Go into any market — go into Springfield, Mo. — and say 'Tell me about "KY3," and they'd say 'Action News.'"

While the network provides about 75 percent of an affiliate station's programming (the remaining 25 percent defines the station's identity

and generates most of its revenue. Moll said that almost half the station revenues at his company's NBC and CBS stations are generated by news shows.

But Moll's ABC station, WTLV-TV in Jacksonville, Fla., would be earning \$1.5 million to \$2 million a year more, Moll estimated, if it were affiliated with NBC, as it once was. That represents about 12 percent of annual revenues.

Thus, "The Cosby Show" is worth more to any NBC affiliate than the couple thousand dollars a week the network pays local stations to air the show.

Such is the power of a strong network lineup.

That is why the NBC affiliates came in off the golf courses and beaches in droves to the final business session last week to hear programming chief Brandon Tartikoff give a night-by-night analysis of the fall prime-time schedule.

(It's also why the affiliates were so delighted to hear that Tartikoff signed a new contract with the network to remain as president of the entertainment division. "Brandon, right now, is the best programmer in television," James Lynch, chairman of the NBC affiliates board of directors, said.)

Too, it caused NBC affiliates to sound a note of concern about what they perceive as weak programming from 10 p.m. to 11 p.m. in the fall. NBC's move to pit "Miami Vice" against CBS' "Dallas" Fridays at 9 may give the network another night in its victory column, but if the number of viewers drops when the unproven "L.A. Law" comes on at 10 p.m., the affiliates can get hurt.

The word that frightens the network is pre-emption.

"If a show is doing poorly in prime time, perhaps I can do better by replacing it with an off-network show (a rerun of a former series), a movie or a local event," Moll explained. Why carry "Sports World," the theory goes, if airing Kansas City Royals baseball in the Springfield market will bring higher ratings?

"ABC is going through that right now" in prime time, Moll noted.

Moll participated in a worst-case scenario for a third-place network: defection. In 1980, Harte-Hanks switched WTLV's affiliation from NBC, then in third place, to ABC, which was coming off a prime-time winning streak in the late '70s.

"It was a short-term help," Moll

said, "and it's not helping us now."

The delicate balance of power between network and affiliate has since tipped to NBC's favor; the network now must decide whether to stick with the NBC affiliate that saw it through its rise to the top — or to bestow its affiliation upon a possibly stronger operation, such as Moll's.

"We've had ongoing dialogues with the network for five years, since we left," Moll said. The return of WTLV to the NBC fold, he said, "is an open question."

If the network-affiliate relationship is one of equal partners, the local broadcaster still has a master: the local community.

"I don't want to get maudlin about it, but part of the culture we operate in as broadcasters is community service," Moll said. "Most of the people in that room were attracted to this business because they had some other kind of need or motivation. ... You can actually do something for the community."

Local news shows initially were mandated by the Federal Communications Commission. Moll said that the recent easing of federal standards has had little or no effect on station owners' self-imposed standards.

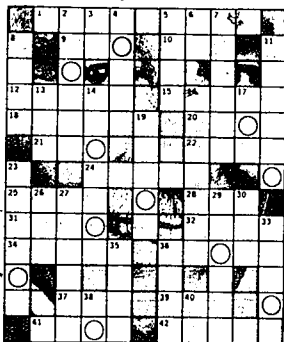
"The better community servant you are, the better your business is," he said.

Business happens to be "outstanding" now for network-affiliated commercial broadcasters, Moll said. "But it's softer than it's been. Part of that has to do with the competitive environment. There are a great many more players out there."

That situation, combined with the current squeeze on profit margins, has made ABC's frugal new executives from Capital Cities Communications (the broadcast group that this year merged with ABC Inc.) as successful at fiscal management as NBC is at programming.

"I've always admired Cap Cities' frugality," Moll said. "Everyone's containing costs, and it's just program costs. We've always tried to balance that with giving it back to the community."

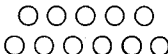

NBC study: VCRs spur network viewing

LOS ANGELES — Videocassette recorders, the culprits accused of luring customers away from movie theaters and pay-cable services, actually benefit network television, an NBC researcher said Monday.

"VCRs provide us with viewers who would have otherwise been unavailable to commercial television," Bill Rubens, NBC vice president for research, told a gathering of the nation's TV critics at the Century Plaza hotel here.

Rapid growth in VCR ownership could affect everything from the quality of commercial spots to future prime-time battles like the one coming next season between CBS' "Dallas" and NBC's "Miami Vice."

Though VCR use currently makes little more than a blip on the Nielsen ratings charts, recorders now are in one third of all American homes with TV.

Some highlights of NBC's research:

— The most-recorded TV show is the "CBS Sunday Movie," which on average is videotaped by about 530,000 of the 85.9 million TV homes. NBC's and ABC's weekly movie offerings also are among the 10 most-recorded prime-time shows.

— The entire NBC Thursday night lineup, from "The Cosby Show" through "Hill Street Blues," is recorded in about 350,000 homes. The only other weekly series on the top-10 list is CBS' "Dallas."

— Network TV shows account for nearly three-fourths of all home recording use. Video recording increases the audience of a prime-time network show by two-tenths of a ratings point, on average. (One ratings point is 1 percent of all television homes, or about 859,000.)

— The typical VCR owner plays back two to three hours of home recordings per week, compared with one to two hours of rented movie cassettes.

— Daytime game shows are not recorded in any measurable amount, "as you might expect," Rubens said.

But soap operas on average attract two-tenths of a ratings point.

— News, sports and late-night shows are practically never recorded, surveys by the Nielsen ratings service show.

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
