Woman agrees to bear child for sister, then delivers a set of triplets

DETROIT — A woman who agreed to bear a child for her infertile sister failed to conceive in three attempts at artificial insemination, but then she really delivered — triplets.

When the sisters saw each other for the first time Sunday after the three boys were born by Caesarian section, they broke into tears, said Martin Wilks, whose wife, Jeannette, was the surrogate mother.

Mrs. Wilks, 32, took no fertility drugs and there was no history of multiple births in the family, Wilks said Thursday.

The three boys, eight weeks premature, were born at Sinai Hospital of Detroit and

later transferred to Pontiac General Hospital, said Dr. Michael Berke. All were doing well.

"I'm positive they're the first reported surrogate triplet situation," said Noel Keane, a lawyer who has arranged more than 100 surrogate births.

Wilks said his wife agreed to be artificially inseminated with her brother-in-law's

sperm because her 34-year-old sister was unable to conceive.

"She loves her so much she just wanted her to have children," said Wilks, 34, of St. Clair Shores, who was with his wife during the delivery.

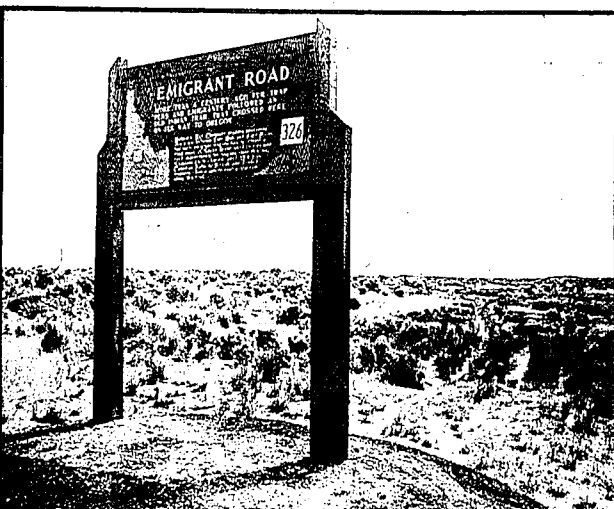
He said his sister-in-law did not want to be identified.

"This was supposed to be something be-

tween two sisters. Then the triplets came into this thing and that made it unusual," he said.

"My feeling is that it was great. I was for it all along," he said. "They're very giving people, very kindhearted."

Berke said he and Dr. Abraham Blumer assisted Dr. Ronald Zack in the delivery.

Judicial nomination dangling in limbo

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted 48-46 on Thursday to confirm Daniel Manion for a five-year term on the court judgeship but the appointment was left in parliamentary limbo until a second vote after Congress' two-week recess.

"Manion is not a judge today," opponent Sen. Joseph R. Biden Jr., D-Del., told reporters after the inconclusive vote on President Reagan's nominee to the 7th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

A vote to reconsider the appointment was forced by Manion's opponents but further action was put off until next month. The dramatic roll-call vote was apparently preceded by heavy, last-minute White House lobbying.

Sen. Slade Gorton, R-Wash., later confirmed in a statement that he voted for Manion after receiving assurances that the Justice Department would clear Manion's presidential nomination a judicial candidate he supports.

to cast a tie-breaking vote. Opponents, including Biden — dean of some 40 law schools, have contended that Manion is professionally unqualified for the federal bench. Some also argue that Manion has ultraconser-

vative views that make the Indiana lawyer temperamentally unsuited to be a judge.

With the vote 48-47 against Manion, Sen. Dan Quayle, R-Indiana, Manion's chief backer, persuaded Sen. Nancy Kassebaum, R-Kansas, to withdraw her "No" vote to forge a 47-47 tie.

Quayle, a longtime friend of Manion, appeared flushed and on the verge of tears as he pleaded with Mrs. Kassebaum to withdraw her vote.

Senate Minority Leader Robert Byrd, D-W.Va., then switched his "No" vote to "Yes," robbing Bush of the chance to cast a tie-breaking vote for Manion. By joining the 48-46 majority, Byrd also enabled himself under the Senate's rules to move to reconsider the vote. Only someone who voted with the majority can make a motion to reconsider.

But Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kansas, quickly moved to other business and Byrd's motion was put off until after Congress' two-week Fourth of July recess.

Mrs. Kassebaum agreed to withdraw her vote because Manion supporters could not find Sen. Barry

Goldwater, R-Ariz., who was expected to vote for the nomination.

"I felt that it was unfair at that moment ... to let it go sort of by default," she said after the vote.

But Goldwater had actually intended to abstain and was in the cloakroom of the Senate while the roll-call was taking place, according to a Republican leadership aide, speaking on condition of anonymity. There was no answer at Goldwater's Senate office.

Mrs. Kassebaum would not have withdrawn her "No" vote if she knew that Goldwater actually intended to abstain, said her spokesman, Larry Shalman. "I can say there is concern that his intended vote was misrepresented," Shalman said. "We were counting on him as a 'Yes,'" he said.

The roll-call vote followed highly unusual discussions on the floor between Dole, Biden and Byrd.

The Senate had expected to vote on a cloture petition to shut off debate on the nomination. But Byrd offered to proceed directly to a vote on the nominee after Dole complained that opponents were trying to block Manion's nomination with a filibuster.

Congress adopts fiscal '87 budget

WASHINGTON — The Senate gave final Congressional approval early today to a nearly \$1 trillion fiscal 1987 budget that would sharply curtail President Reagan's military spending plans — but it also would soften that cutback if Reagan found an acceptable way to raise more money.

Senate passage, by voice vote, quickly followed House approval Thursday night on a lopsided 333-43 vote. Less than an hour earlier, the final compromise was struck by a House-Senate conference committee.

The \$995 billion plan was designed to keep next year's deficit \$1.4 billion below the \$144 billion target of the Gramm-Rudman balanced-budget law. It would also bring Congress closer to meeting future year targets, which get gradually stricter with the goal of a balanced budget by fiscal 1991.

"As we adjourn tonight to take the break of the Fourth of July, we will be able to tell America that we have not only seen historic action in terms of tax reform ... but also that the budget for 1987 has passed, and we have met the deficit (target) of Gramm-Rudman," said Rep. William H. Gray III, chairman of the House Budget Committee.

The budget would limit military spending authority to \$292.15 billion next year unless the president and Congress agree to raise money for a contingency fund of "unmet critical needs." Even with the fund, the military budget would fall \$21 billion shy of Reagan's request for \$320 billion.

Up to \$3 billion of the \$1.8 billion contingency fund could be used to increase military outlays. That would allow Pentagon budget authority, which includes programs that are paid for over several years, to increase to \$299 billion.

The contingency plan was an in-

direct challenge to the president to soften his opposition to new taxes. The Senate had approved a \$10.7 billion tax boost, but House Democrats refused to go along, fearing the political fallout.

According to preliminary estimates, the plan would:

- Give military and civilian federal employees a 3 percent pay raise.
- Cover a cost-of-living increase for Social Security, retired civil servants and veterans, estimated at 2 percent.
- Cut foreign aid programs 10 percent below current levels.
- Freeze a wide range of domestic programs, including the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, with no money provided for replacing the space shuttle Challenger, pending further review by the administration and Congress.
- Raise various user fees for federal services, but reject proposed fees for agricultural inspections and related activities.

New Idaho law should help deal with alcoholic drivers

BOISE — More than 20 new state criminal laws go into effect on Tuesday, and Attorney General Jim Jones says one of them should prove to be a significant tool in dealing with drunken drivers.

It requires a drunken driver to go through mandatory evaluation whether he or she needs to go through a treatment program for a drinking problem. A judge then must act on that recommendation.

"Approximately 40 percent of first-time drunk driving offenders have serious alcohol problems, as do 80 percent of second-time offenders," Jones said Thursday.

"The only way to adequately address this part of the drunk driving problem is to require that these persons complete an alcohol treatment program," he said.

Anyone convicted of drunken driving must undergo evaluation, at a

cost of \$35 to \$100, to see if intensive treatment is indicated. The new law requires judges to follow the recommendations of licensed evaluators, although Jones said there are a number of "escape clauses" that allow a judge to order less-costly treatment, such as attending Alcoholics Anonymous meetings.

In a published report earlier this week, at least one Department of Health and Welfare worker called the new law unworkable.

Roberta Crockett, substance abuse program specialist with the Pocatello Health and Welfare office, said workers are not prepared to implement the new law by next Tuesday.

"To entrust some evaluators with that kind of responsibility is well-founded," said Ms. Crockett. "But for others, it's crazy."

She maintained that until recent years, standards for licensing an alcohol evaluator were fairly loose, and

some of the evaluators may not be qualified to make binding recommendations about alcohol treatment.

She said the way state Health and Welfare workers read the new law, evaluators now must include a list of where to get help, along with the estimated cost, and judges must follow the recommendations of the evaluators.

But Jones said judges retain some discretion, and Health and Welfare is working to lighten qualifications for the evaluators.

He said he sent a letter to Health and Welfare Director Rose Bowman on Wednesday, after seeing Ms. Crockett's remarks, urging her to direct Health and Welfare staffers to carry out the new law as it was intended.

"We don't intend to let petty bureaucrats stand in the way of implementing this program," said Jones. "It will not work. We will

House vote a blow to Contadora effort

WASHINGTON — The already slim prospects for a peaceful outcome to the conflict in Central America have been dealt a further blow by the House vote for military aid for Nicaragua's Contra guerrillas.

The Reagan administration says it remains committed to the peace negotiations sponsored by the so-called Contadora countries — but it has raised the stakes for what those negotiations should achieve.

And by voting \$70 million in military aid for the Contras Wednesday night, the House joined the Senate in giving the administration the muscle it wants to back up its demands.

"The United States will support any negotiated settlement or Contadora Treaty that will bring real democracy to Nicaragua,"

President Reagan said Tuesday in pressing for a favorable House vote. "What we will not support is a paper agreement that sells out the Nicaraguan people's right to be free."

But democracy in Nicaragua wasn't the chief goal of the four Contadora nations when they began their peace effort in 1983. They sought a Nicaraguan commitment to national reconciliation and elections, but their chief aim was peaceful borders and disarmament throughout Central America.

It also appeared to be the chief aim of Philip Henshaw, Reagan's Central American envoy, who in a bid to break the deadlocked negotiations wrote to members of

Board plans budget increase

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The state Board of Education's finance committee is recommending a 15 percent operating budget increase for the 1988 budget.

The committee met Thursday at Eastern Idaho Vocational-Technical School along with the board's academic affairs and programs, and personnel committees. All three will present their reports to the board when it meets again Friday in Idaho Falls.

Operating expenses and equipment will be among the criteria used to develop the recommendation for the 15 percent increase, board members said.

OSHA wants worker rehired

BOISE (AP) — The federal government has filed legal action against Bonner General Hospital at Sandpoint, asking reinstatement for a worker it says was fired because he complained about unsafe working conditions.

The lawsuit, filed in U.S. District Court here, was filed on behalf of Larry Zambrzycki. The complaint said Zambrzycki was fired last February, after complaining of unsafe working conditions.

That sort of activity is protected under the Occupational Safety and Health Act, OSHA, the lawsuit alleged.

It asked reinstatement, back pay and that the hospital be required to post a notice to employees that it will not commit similar acts in the future.

Leroy brings out color book

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Meet the Leroy family — Dave, Helen, Jordan and Adam. Oh, yes, and "Brutus," the dog, and "Popsicle Cupeake," the cat.

Dave collects old books and Helen volunteers as a teacher's helper. Adam, 2, likes to play with spaceships and jets, and Jordan, 6, helps around the house, feeds the pets and sings in the choir. The dog and cat are good friends.

The Leroy's enjoy going to church, and fishing and camping are so much fun — especially in Idaho.

All this and more are contained in a Leroy family coloring book distributed last week during the state Republican party convention in Pocatello. Leroy, who's lieutenant governor and is running for the state's highest office, said the books will be distributed throughout his campaign.

"Maybe we can give comic books a good name in Idaho politics," Leroy said.

Jones sees speedier appeals

BOISE (AP) — Idaho, which has three death penalty cases pending in U.S. District Court, should be able to speed the appeals process because of a ruling Thursday by the U.S. Supreme Court, Attorney General Jim Jones says.

In a 7-2 ruling written by Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, the Supreme Court limited federal court review of state criminal convictions. That was a position taken by Idaho and 43 other states in "friend of the court" legal arguments in a Virginia case.

"This decision will have direct impact on the death penalty cases we now have in federal court," said Jones. "It is clear now that a defendant cannot 'save up' constitutional issues and hope to delay the case by raising these issues for the first time in federal court."

"This clearly is one of the most important of the court's criminal law decisions, and we join the attorney general of Virginia in welcoming this result," Jones said.

Symms lauds trade panel timber ruling

WASHINGTON (AP) — The International Trade Commission has ruled unanimously that Canadian timber imports are hurting the U.S. lumber market, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, said Thursday.

Idaho lumber mill operators say they're being hit by the brunt of the dispute and shutdowns because they can't compete with subsidized Canadian imports.

"The tide is rising against unfair trade practices by Canada," said Symms, in a news release from his Boise office.

Symms said the 5-0 finding by the International Trade Commission will trigger an investigation by the U.S. Commerce Department to determine if the injury to the U.S. timber industry has been caused by subsidies on Canadian timber. Subsidies are found, it is likely that a tariff will be imposed on Canadian imports, Symms said.

The Department of Commerce probably will not announce a decision for six months, Symms said.

Sister state signing today

BOISE (AP) — Gov. John Evans is scheduled to sign an agreement in his office here on Tuesday making the Chung Chong Buk-Do Province of the Republic of Korea a sister state to Idaho.

Representing the province will be Jo Kun Il, the provincial governor. He will be honored at a state dinner in Boise that night.

Evans said Thursday the agreement calls for Idaho and the Chung Chong Buk-Do Province to work together for good will and better understanding.

It provides for cultural exchanges and visits by young people of both nations, and efforts to work on trade, industrial relations and tourism.

"Through exchanges of theories and experiences, both parties will cultivate the knowledge in local administration," the agreement says.

Evans said Idaho has similar agreements with Far East nations, some of which have led to expanding markets for Idaho products.

Lottery initiative drive nears success

BOISE (AP) — The drive to allow Idaho voters to decide a state lottery has drawn within about 2,000 signatures of success.

"We're quite close now too raising the necessary signatures," said a chief sponsor, state Sen. James Ritsch, R-Boise.

"We're within about 2,000 signatures, but this weekend is extremely critical," he said.

After the Idaho Legislature failed to muster the necessary two-thirds approval to put the lottery question on the ballot in November, Ritsch and others launched a drive to get 32,666 signatures of registered voters. As of Thursday afternoon, Ritsch said the count stood at 30,500, including about 13,000 from Ada County, the state's population center.

He acknowledged the petition drive has been hurt by the accidental deaths of two of its prime backers.

Former state senator Terry Kelly, Nampa, helped launch the lottery petition drive, but he was killed in an airplane crash April 10 as he campaigned for the Democratic lieutenant governor nomination.

Sen. Vern Lannen, D-Pinehurst, spearheaded the lottery drive in northern Idaho, but he died last Thursday in a logging accident.

Ritsch attended Lannen's funeral, and he said Lannen's friends were in shock about the accident and weren't worrying about the lottery drive.

"They really didn't have it on their minds," he said.

Another 3,000 signatures have been collected in Canyon County, Kelly's home county, by a drive spearheaded by his widow, Rosie Kelly.

Monday, the remaining lottery petitions will be collected and they will be rushed to county clerks for verification. Only registered voters can sign initiative petitions, and Ritsch said so far, about 40 percent of the signatures that have been collected have been in-validated.

Ritsch said it appears that voters feel more strongly about the lottery

issue than any other. Not necessarily that everyone wants a lottery, he said, but people feel they should have a right to decide the lottery question.

If the question of a state lottery were put before the voters tomorrow, it probably would pass, Ritsch said.

"But there will be considerable debate before November, probably based a lot of the experience in other states," he said.

"The people have been crying out to vote on the lottery issue."

The deadline for submission of the lottery initiative petitions to the secretary of state's office is 5 p.m. next Thursday.

Crime compensation to start on July 1

BOISE (AP) — Starting Tuesday, criminals in Idaho will be assessed \$10 to \$20 for each violation to fund a new crime victims compensation program on the ballot in November.

On Tuesday, which is July 1, Idaho will become the 44th state to set up a fund to help victims of crimes or their survivors.

Two of the state's top legal officials praised the new law on Thursday, but said they were sad that its chief legislative sponsor won't be able to see it go into effect.

State Sen. Vernon Lannen, D-Pinehurst, who worked for several years to get the law through, was killed last week in a logging accident.

Lannen called the victims' compensation law "probably the best piece of legislation I've carried in my seven years here" after the Legislature completed action on the bill in the last session.

"Lannen personally led the charge for several sessions," said Bower. "It's unfortunate he can't see it go into effect."

To be eligible for assistance from the fund, a crime victim must have suffered physical or serious mental injuries. Families of murder victims also are eligible for payments from the fund.

The fund will pay medical ex-

penses, vocational rehabilitation, mental health counseling, lost wages and funeral expenses up to a maximum of \$25,000 per family.

Victims with insurance will be reimbursed only for deductibles and costs not covered by the policy. Victims of domestic violence are not covered.

Each non-traffic felony and misdemeanor conviction will cost more. Criminals convicted of felonies will be assessed \$20 for the fund. Misdemeanor offenders will pay an extra \$10. Drunken drivers also will be charged.

If the fund runs dry, the program will be suspended until more money pours in. In floor debate, Lannen estimated fines will generate about \$500,000 for the bills.

It is patterned on a Montana law in effect for nine years which last year paid \$94,000 to 312 victims.

Idaho already had a victims' compensation law, giving judges the ability to order criminals to repay victims. State officials said it wasn't practical because often the criminals had no money and couldn't earn any because they were in jail.

Bower said the new fund won't be a dividend for anyone. Because of budget limits, recipients will get only a small, weekly check, not a large sum of money.

"It's a fund of last resort," he said.

Rollie sees a change

BOISE (AP) — The outgoing executive director of the Idaho Education Association says the defeat of half a dozen political conservatives signals a change in the Idaho electorate.

"The winds of political change are blowing across the state," Don Rollie told the Idaho Press Club on Thursday. "I have to salute the electorate for saying on May 27th that enough is enough."

Six ultra-conservative lawmakers who were vocal critics of the IEA were defeated in the May 27th Republican primary.

Rollie is leaving the IEA Aug. 1 to become executive director of the North Dakota Education Association.

He said had the primary had a radically different outcome, he would have reconsidered leaving Idaho because he said it would look like he was running. "Those of you who know me know I'm not one to run."

Rollie said it is a credit to the IEA that about 50 pieces of legislation that could be considered far right or anti-education introduced in the last two years failed.

Supreme Court says states may not execute insane killers

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court, deprecating the "barbarity of mindless vengeance," ruled Thursday that the Constitution bars states from executing an insane killer.

By a 5-4 vote, the court said it is cruel and unusual punishment to execute convicted murderers who lack the mental competence to understand why they are being put to death.

The court granted a reprieve to convicted Florida killer Alvin Ford, saying state officials failed to determine fully whether he has lost his sanity while in death row.

All 33 states with death penalty laws, including Florida, have policies against executing mentally incompetent criminals

even if they were sane when committing their crimes. But until Thursday the high court never said that such a policy is constitutionally required.

"Whether its aim be to protect the condemned from fear and pain without comfort of understanding or to protect the dignity of society itself from the barbarity of exacting mindless vengeance, the restriction finds constitutional enforcement," Justice Thurgood Marshall wrote for the court.

He was joined by Justices William J. Brennan, Harry A. Blackmun, Lewis F. Powell and John Paul Stevens.

In other decisions Thursday, the court: Made it easier, by a 6-3 vote in a case from New York City, for police and prosecutors to use incriminating remarks defendants make to jailhouse informants.

Upheld, 5-4, a convicted Virginia killer's death sentence even though his constitutional rights may have been violated in the sentencing hearing he received.

Ruled unconstitutionally in a New Jersey case that a federal court may overturn a state court criminal conviction if the defendant's lawyer, through incompetence, failed to challenge the unlawful seizure by police of materials used as trial evidence.

By a separate 7-2 vote, the court said Florida must hold new hearings into Ford's mental competence.

The justices said Ford cannot be executed in the state's electric chair for the 1974 murder of Fort Lauderdale policeman Walter Ilyankoff if he is insane.

They said the procedure Florida used in determining he is sane violated his rights because Ford's lawyers were not given a

chance to participate in some kind of evidentiary hearing.

Under state law, a three-psychiatrist commission appointed by Gov. Bob Graham in 1983 found Ford to be competent for execution.

Two psychiatrists hired by Ford's public defenders found him to be a paranoid schizophrenic mentally incompetent to understand why he is to be executed.

The governor apparently did not consider the psychiatric evidence offered by Ford's lawyers before he signed a death warrant authorizing the execution.

Marshall said the state's procedure "provides inadequate assurances of accuracy," but the court largely left it up to state officials to come up with a constitutionally acceptable procedure.

In a concurring opinion, Justice Lewis F.

Powell said states could provide "an impartial officer or board that can receive evidence and argument from the prisoner's counsel, including expert psychiatric evidence that may differ from the state's own psychiatric examination."

Florida Attorney General Jim Smith said the court created "another hoop we have to jump through to make capital punishment in Florida and in this nation a reality."

Gov. Graham said he was not surprised by the ruling.

"These death cases have been fraught with this kind of continued raising of issues and delay," he said. "We have, each time that has occurred, taken action to come into compliance and continue forward to carry out the laws of Florida."

Committee votes to impeach jailed Nevada federal judge

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Judiciary Committee on Thursday voted for impeachment of imprisoned Nevada federal Judge Harry E. Claiborne in the first such proceeding since the panel's votes to impeach Richard Nixon 12 years ago.

The committee approved four articles of impeachment against Claiborne, who is collecting \$215 in daily salary while in prison for tax evasion.

The impeachment votes sent the Claiborne proceeding to the full House. If the House votes to impeach, a trial would be held in the Senate.

Three of the articles were approved 35-0, as was an overall resolution accusing the judge of "misbehavior and high crimes and misdemeanors." A fourth article was adopted 28-7.

No one rose to defend Claiborne during debate, and, one after another, members expressed outrage that he has refused to resign while still earning \$78,700 a year.

Claiborne's behavior, said Rep. Romano L. Mazzoli, D-Ky., "raises arrogance and contempt to an art form."

The articles adopted unanimously said Claiborne should be impeached because he under-reported his income on his 1979 and 1980 tax returns and was convicted by a jury.

The last article said the 68-year-old judge "betrayed the trust of the people of the United States" and "reduced confidence in the integrity and impartiality of the judiciary."

Those opposing the amendment argued it would afford Claiborne's attorney to present a sweeping defense in the Senate. The lawyer, Oscar Goodman, has said he wants to argue that Claiborne is the victim of a government vendetta, resulting

from his frequent criticism of federal agents and prosecutors.

Rep. Robert W. Kastenmeier, D-Wis., said the language is needed to help establish the precedent that unacceptable behavior of any sort by a judge — "not conviction alone" — can lead to his or her removal.

Rep. F. James Sensenbrenner, R-Wis., noted that in the last Senate impeachment trial, held in 1936, federal judge Halsted L. Ritter was acquitted of six specific offenses — but convicted on the 7th article that said his behavior brought the judiciary into disrepute.

The words "betrayed the trust" were added to the final article in an amendment by Rep. Michael DeWine, R-Ohio, which also removed language that the judge violated his oath of office. This would have made the case more difficult to prove, DeWine said.

Adopted unanimously were articles stating that Claiborne should be impeached — removed from office — because he allegedly:

- "Willfully and knowingly" filed a tax return for 1979 that he "did not believe to be true." Claiborne reported an income of \$80,227 when "he well knew and believed" his income was above that figure.
- Did the same with his 1980 tax return, in which the reported figure of \$54,251 was less than he earned.

Product liability law advances

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sweeping legislation to redress product liability law narrowly cleared a Senate committee Thursday amid sharp complaints about its limits on pain and suffering damages.

"I don't have a good feeling about voting for this bill and my judgement is that I will vote against it now," Sen. Ted Stevens, R-Alaska, said as the Senate and Transportation Committee approved the measure 10-7 and sent it to the Judiciary Committee for more work.

The bill would put a \$250,000 cap on pain and suffering damages, among other provisions.

The measure's future, however, was clouded by filibuster threats, a lack of support in the House and the dwindling number of days for more Senate action before Congress adjourns to hit the campaign trail.

Sen. Robert Kasten, R-Wis., a Senate pioneer in pushing for such legislation, however, assessed as good the measure's chances of reaching the president's desk this year.

Stevens was not alone in expressing second thoughts about the bill's \$250,000 damage limit.

Sen. Donald Riegle Jr., D-Mich., who voted against the cap in the first place, predicted "war on this issue" without the feature's removal. But he called off an effort to strike it from the bill, saying support was missing.

Critics of the cap portrayed it as unreasonable treatment of victims who as a result of accidents with defective products are unable to bear children, confined to a wheelchair or otherwise find their lives seriously impaired.

Guards open fire on rioting inmates

MOUNDSVILLE, W.Va. (AP) — Guards opened fire on a dozen knife-wielding inmates at the West Virginia Penitentiary on Thursday, wounding four prisoners, officials said.

Corrections Commissioner A.V. Dohrill said the disturbance began about 12:20 p.m. MST when a dozen inmates from the high-security North Hall section of the prison refused to follow guards' instructions.

Among the inmates in North Hall are more than 60 inmates officials say were ringleaders in a New Year's Day riot, in which three prisoners were killed and 16 workers taken hostage.

Lumber imports hurt U.S., ruling declares

WASHINGTON (AP) — The U.S. International Trade Commission, on a 5-0 vote, held in a preliminary decision Thursday that Canadian softwood imports are undercutting U.S. sales and injuring U.S. lumber producers.

The ruling could lead to stiff duties on future imports.

The actly on a ca referred the panel by the Reagan administration earlier this month, came at a time of growing frictions between the two nations.

The decision was a victory for a U.S. industry group, the Coalition for Fair Lumber Imports, which is seeking duties of up to 27 percent on Canadian lumber imports.

"Until the flood of subsidized Canadian lumber is halted, the U.S. lumber industry will continue to see sawmills close and sawmill workers forced out of their jobs," said Stanley J. Dennison, chairman of the commission.

U.S. lumber producers allege that the fees Canadian federal and local

authorities charge "their Canadian counterparts for cutting tim on government-owned lands are now that they're among too unfair subsidy."

The lumber controversy is the most bitter trade dispute between the United States and Canada, who are each other's most important trading partners, with two-way trade last year surpassing \$122 billion.

Canadian softwood lumber imports, which includes pine and other woods used primarily in home construction, totaled \$2.9 billion last year.

Softwood lumber imports from Canada took 31.6 percent of the U.S. market in 1985, compared with 27.3 percent in 1981, according to an ITC staff report.

Under U.S. trade laws, the case goes next to the Commerce Department. It has until Oct. 16 to make a finding on a dollar amount of damage to U.S. lumber producers from the imports.

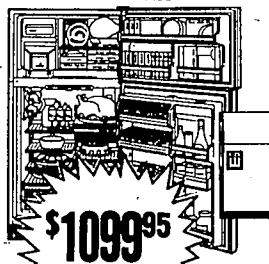

World Briefly

OPEC still in price deadlock

BRIONI, Yugoslavia (AP) — OPEC inched ahead in a second day of all talks Thursday but fell short of ending a deadlock over how to drive up prices, officials said.

Although no agreement was reported, officials said a majority of the ministers were set on an attempt to raise oil prices to a range of \$17 to \$20 a barrel by year's end from current levels of \$11 to \$14 for widely traded crudes.

"They are making some progress in the right direction," James Audo, the chief OPEC spokesman, said after Thursday's only session. He declined to answer any questions about the deliberations, which were recessed until Friday.

Geneva arms talks at odds

GENEVA (AP) — The fifth round of U.S.-Soviet arms talks ended Thursday with the two sides sharply at odds over whether they had made any progress but with another round scheduled for September.

"The responsibility for the lack of positive results at the negotiations on nuclear and space arms rests entirely with the U.S. side," said a statement by Viktor P. Karpov, the chief Soviet negotiator. It said the negotiations were stalemated.

The United States "has continued to block progress at the negotiations, holding on to its earlier unconstructive positions which cannot serve as a basis for agreement," said the statement, distributed to reporters.

Karpov's statement came in response to earlier remarks Thursday by the chief U.S. negotiator, Max M. Kampelman, who said there had been "some movement" during the round.

Peru orders cargo plane down

LIMA, Peru (AP) — An American Boeing 707 cargo plane was ordered to land at Lima's international airport for violating Peruvian airspace on Thursday, the official news agency Andina said.

It was the second time this month Peru forced an American aircraft to land for violating its airspace by not first requesting permission to fly over Peruvian territory.

Andina said the unloaded commercial plane was flying from Mexico to Santiago, Chile.

The news agency said the plane belongs to an American firm, the Race Company, but did not say where the company was based. U.S. Embassy officials said they did not know anything about the firm.

Ortega denounces Contra aid

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — President Daniel Ortega said President Reagan's \$100 million aid package for anti-government guerrillas in Nicaragua is part of a "terrorist and fascist policy" that eventually will lead to U.S. military intervention.

Foreign Minister Miguel D'Escoto said Thursday that his government will respond by expanding its military forces, even though "it will cost many more deaths."

In a nationally televised news conference Wednesday night, Ortega accused Reagan of "acting worse than Hitler with his terrorist and fascist policy against Nicaragua, imposing it on international opinion and that of the North American people."

Madrid airport bomb blast injures 13

MADRID, Spain (AP) — A bomb exploded Thursday in a suitcase at the El Al Israel Airlines check-in counter in Madrid's international airport, injuring 13 people, police said.

Seconds before the bomb exploded, El Al security official Nir Ran saw smoke coming out of the suitcase and stopped the conveyor belt that was carrying it to the cargo area, police said.

Then the bomb exploded, shattering glass doors and windows. Ran's face and hands were burned.

Police said the suitcase belonged to the passenger to check in for El Al's Flight 306 to Tel Aviv. A police spokesman said that passenger was arrested and was being questioned, but the spokesman refused to disclose the passenger's name or nationality.

The explosion occurred at 3:30 p.m. (7:30 a.m. MDT) as passengers were boarding the plane at Barajas Airport.

Officials said bomb experts later blew up a second suspicious suitcase but found it did not contain explosive material.



Police director Domingo Perez said the man who was arrested carried a Spanish passport, but a police source said the passport could be false. Perez said the man had "aroused suspicions" at the counter, prompting El Al security to watch his luggage.

Madrid's civil defense spokesman, Rafael Noja, initially said at least two people were arrested, but Perez said his information was wrong.

Eight of the injured, including Ran, a Spanish police officer and an El Al passenger, were taken to a local hospital. Hospital officials said two people remained in the hospital while the others were treated and released.

Five other people were treated at the airport for cuts and bruises.

Ran told The Associated Press from his hospital bed that he was "feeling all right," but he refused further comment.

One of those treated at the airport, Carlos Lozano, told The AP, "I was reading a paper when I saw the El Al guy with a fire extinguisher running towards a suitcase that had smoke coming out of it."

"Then I heard a big explosion, I saw glass all over and the ceiling started falling in," Lozano, an Argentine, said he was waiting for a flight to Buenos Aires.

S. Africa extends curfew for blacks

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — The government put 11 more black townships under curfew Thursday and said residents who were found with slingshots or similar devices would be arrested.

A curfew imposed June 19 on dozens of townships around Port Elizabeth in eastern Cape Province forbade the wearing of anti-apartheid T-shirts.

The latest 10 p.m.-4 a.m. curfew applies to townships in the north of Orange Free State province.

Union officials said the government, giving no reasons, had freed a dozen labor leaders detained without charge under the state of emergency proclaimed June 12. Dozens still are held.

Business executives, and labor leaders who went underground to escape arrest, have said industrial relations were being seriously damaged by the crackdown. Some workers have staged strikes to protest the arrests.

A land mine exploded in a black township near Pretoria, damaging a truck but not injuring the black driver.

Louis Nel, deputy information minister, called the explosion and two bombings that wounded 19 people in Johannesburg earlier this week a "cautious attempt by the ANC to commit terror."

He said the African National Congress, the main black guerrilla group fighting white domination, was becoming desperate because racial unrest had been curtailed under the emergency. The ANC has not said whether it was responsible for the bombings.

Five more blacks were slain in the 24 hours ending at dawn Thursday, two by police firing at rioters and three by other blacks, the government reported. That raised the number of people killed since the emergency declaration to 66.

Information officers said a white policeman was seriously wounded Thursday when he was shot in the chest while conducting an investigation in Guguletu, a black township where a black township and the Crossroads squatter camp. No arrests were reported.

Hearing precedes 3-2 vote for rate hike

Evans, Land Board tangle over leases

BOISE (AP) — Gov. John Evans said Thursday he's not happy with the "outrageous" lease rate increases voted by the state Land Board after a four-hour hearing Wednesday night.

The Land Board voted 3-2 to boost rent rates on prime waterfront lots owned by the state around Priest Lake and Payette Lake. The three Republicans on the board voted for the increases and Democrat Evans and Auditor Joe Williams opposed.

Revenue from the leases goes into school endowment funds, and educators and others have contended that lease rates on lots valued at an average of \$150,000 each haven't kept up with increasing land values.

During Wednesday's hearing, real estate spokesmen questioned the

Department of Lands estimate that the laketrout land is worth about \$52 million and individual lots are worth up to \$150,000. Leaseholders also called proposed 400 percent increases "confiscatory" and claimed they could force many leaseholders to get out.

Eventually the board voted to set the lease rates at 2.5 percent of market value. Market value is to be determined by selling 5 to 10 percent of the 605 lots over the next two years. The prices they bring, plus sale prices of comparable property, will be used to value the lots.

For fiscal 1987 and 1988, the lease rates will be raised about 37 percent at Priest Lake, about 33 percent at waterfront lots on Payette Lake and 9 percent for lots in the Payette

Lake area off the waterfront. Attorney General Jim Jones teamed with Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa and Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans for the 3-2 majority. Jones accused Evans and Williams of playing politics by suggesting a far lower interim increase while longer-term valuations are determined.

Evans recommended increasing lease rates for 1987 and 1988 the same as increases in the national Consumer Price Index, currently less than 4 percent.

"I think it was a fairly well-calculated act to garner favor with a few voters," said Jones, a Republican. "But unfortunately it was a real disservice to the public schools and the public school children and the public school endowment."

Thursday, he and Cenarrusa signed a statement again blasting the Evans vote. "... he is more interested in gaining votes from state land users than in carrying out his trust responsibility to the public school endowment in this election year," Jones and Cenarrusa said.

Evans, reached by telephone in Ketchum, said, "Obviously, that's not the case at all."

The governor said raising rates by nearly 40 percent the next two years isn't fair to the lease holders, and ignored testimony presented to the board Wednesday night.

"In the long term, it would do great harm to the lease program," the governor said. "I'm convinced that the direction the board took was wrong."

He said his suggestion, only minor increases while the board tried for a better estimate of the land value, was "a reasonable recommendation — and one that had nothing to do with politics. It would be a fair way to do it while we study the program."

"It is not in the long-term interest of the state to force people out of their cabins," he said. About 90 percent of the leaseholders at Priest Lake are not residents of Idaho, but most at Payette Lake are Idaho residents. Leaseholders disagreed strongly with values set for the cottage sites in a report submitted by a subcommittee of the Land Board.

First F-16 squadron going inactive

HILL AIR FORCE BASE, Utah (AP) — The squadron where many Air Force pilots first learned to fly the F-16 Fighting Falcon is being deactivated, in part because of civilian complaints about noisy training flights.

Phasing out the 25-aircraft 16th Tactical Fighter Squadron, one of

four units in the 388th Tactical Fighter Wing, will reduce to about 100 the number of F-16s based at Hill.

The deactivation was ordered last year to reduce the volume of fighter sorties flown from the base and to help realign F-16 deployments across the country, Air Force officials said.

Idaho senators support Jura as new BPA chief

WASHINGTON (AP) — Six U.S. senators from the Pacific Northwest have recommended to Energy Secretary James Jura that he appoint John H. Jura as administrator of the Bonneville Power Administration.

The recommendation of Jura, now executive assistant to the administrator of the BPA, was made by Oregon Republican Sens. Bob Packwood and Mark Hatfield, Idaho Republican Sens. James McClure and Steven Symms and Washington Sen. Slade Gordon, a Democrat, and Dan Evans, a Republican.

"Few positions are more critical to the Northwest," the senators wrote in a statement released Thursday. "Jim Jura's credentials convinced us of his abilities to handle the job. His administrative experience with the BPA has earned him an excellent reputation and earned our unanimous support."

Jura, 43, of Portland, has held his present post with the federal energy wholesaling agency for more than five years. BPA Administrator Peter T. Johnson has resigned effective July 18 to pursue other interests.

Butte draws the line against supremacists

BUTTE, Mont. (AP) — Butte, for years Montana's melting pot where people of all races, creeds and colors have been welcomed, has decided to draw the line against neo-Nazis and other white supremacy groups.

The Butte-Silver Bow Council of Commissioners agreed this week to support a resolution condemning the activities of such groups as the Aryan Nations and the Ku Klux Klan.

"These people are dangerous," Commissioner Bev Hayes said. "Some of the people in Idaho are afraid to open their mouths in some instances. We certainly don't need something like that happening here."

The resolution "supports the concept that all of its citizens be

treated equally and fairly without regard to race, color or religious convictions."

The city-county commissioners took their action at the request of a task force on human relations from Coeur d'Alene and Kootenai County, Idaho, home of several white supremacist groups, including the Aryan Nations, which is holding its annual convention near Hayden Lake July 12-13.

Great Peace March near halfway point

GRAND ISLAND, Neb. (AP) — About 600 hardy idealists, trudging eastward on sore feet, less shoeing budget, are nearing the halfway point of their coast-to-coast Great Peace March for disarmament.

Three months ago, the marchers were stranded in the California desert after the original sponsor went bankrupt. Under new leadership, however, the group is financially solvent and back on schedule.

"No one here seems to think we died back there in the desert," said spokesman Chris Ball. "We know there's been a lot of skepticism and doubt, but we want everyone to know that the Great Peace March is alive and well."

The 600 — half the number that started in Los Angeles on March 1 — are expected to arrive in Omaha on July 3. That will mark the midpoint of the 8½-month, 3,225-mile walk that is scheduled to end in Washington on Nov. 15.

The current march is a streamlined version of the one launched by People Reaching Out For Peace, the organization that folded March 14.

One of the latest ventures, public showers and other expensive equipment that led to PRO-Peace's demise. Equipment and supplies are now hauled in trailers and secondhand buses, and

marchers use public showers when they can. Spending has been cut to about \$4,000 a day, less than half the amount projected by PRO-Peace.

Marchers say the new sponsor, The Great Peace March for Global Nuclear Disarmament, is a non-nonsense, grass-roots organization. "When PRO-Peace was running the show, I was booked at the MGM Grand with a Jacuzzi (in my room)," said Katea Golub, an early organizer of the march. "After they folded, I took back my Jordan shoes and Hjalston dresses and bought some Nikes."

Finance director Carole Schmidt said the group has about \$80,000 in the bank, but is still "living on the edge."

"We're averaging about \$3,000 a day in donations, which is barely enough to keep us going," she said. "We're very, very careful about how we spend our money."

While some fret about finances, most marchers worry about their feet. Walking nearly 1,600 miles has taken its toll on even the sturdiest soles.

"I've got callouses on top of callouses," said J.J. Corber, a former Marine from Sacramento, Calif. "Back in Red Canyon (Colo.), some guy offered me a dollar for each blister I had. I had six

on each foot, so I won \$12."

The oldest marcher is 78-year-old Franklin Folsom, a writer from Boulder, Colo.

"I don't walk as fast as some of the younger fellows, but I get there eventually," he said during a rest stop. "I won't deny that I'm tired, but so is everyone else."

Marchers say they've been encouraged by public reaction.

While some motorists have shouted obscenities and once firecrackers were thrown at a tent, many city officials and local residents have offered a helping hand.

"In St. George (Utah), we had a hard time finding a campsite," Ball said. "But a man who owns a resort there saw us on the side of the road and invited us in. We've run into a lot of wonderful people like that."

As in any large group, there have been disagreements and disputes. Some marchers rode buses over dangerous mountain passages while others insisted on walking. Some committed acts of civil disobedience at the Nevada nuclear test site; others refrained. Earlier this week, about 20 male marchers donned dresses and skirts to protest a rumored dress code.

Wedding hot line opens up

LONDON (AP) — An exclusive tailor and the bible opened a hot line Thursday to answer an urgent question for a select group: What does one wear to a royal wedding?

Important points: Don't wear the brocade vest that looked so good at last week's Ascot races, and leave your sword at home.

"Imagine the clatter of swords in Westminster Abbey if everyone in uniform wore one," said Robert Gieve, vice chairman of 200-year-old Gieve and Hawkes of No. 1 Savile Row, the best address in British tailoring.

"With the nuptials of Prince Andrew and Sarah Ferguson only four weeks away, the tailors linked with the genealogical reference book, Debrett's Peerage, to offer a Dress and Protocol Advisory Service for the Royal Wedding.

If you aren't invited to the July 23 wedding, you can still call to find out what you should have worn: Dial London 731-1966, "in normal office hours."

"You can then dress up and sit down in front of the television to enjoy the day," said Ian McCorquodale, chairman of Debrett's.

You might imagine that those fortunate enough to be invited would know how to dress," said Gieve. "But I am sorry to say that is not so today when the maintenance of traditional values is being too readily diluted."

Gieve, 47, was something of an eye-opener himself.

On a warm summer day in the heart of London's West End, he was attired in black coat and vest, striped pants, striped shirt with stiff white collar, dark tie and a breast pocket's generous overflow of dark polka dot handkerchief.

"We know how to do it," he said in an interview. "We have been dressing royalty, the aristocracy and the armed forces for 200 years."

Essentials for the 1,500 guests at the abbey will be afternoon dresses with hats and gloves for women; and for men, ceremonial uniforms for those in the military and morning dress or business suit for everybody else.

Charles Kidd, Debrett's editor, said an afternoon dress is "not a long dress and not too glaring, clashing or showy, as that would take attention off the bride."

Because the groom's mother, Queen Elizabeth II, will be there, ladies must wear hats — narrow-brimmed so they don't block the views from the pews.

Morning dress for men means top hat, cutaway coat and vest in black or gray, with gloves. Bullantole flowers are worn only by the immediate family and gentlemen should polish the instep under their black, laced shoes.

Gieve shuddered slightly when asked if buckled shoes would be all right.

"There must be moderation," he said. "The wedding is the bride's day. It's not like Ascot where people are trying to catch the eye."

The June horse race at Ascot, near Windsor Castle, is the year's biggest social and sartorial event.

McCorquodale confirmed that Debrett's constantly answers queries on etiquette and protocol, such as: "Where do I seat the divorced in-laws at my son's wedding?" or "My old friend Joe has been knighted. Do I call him Joe or Sir?"

"But this time we've decided to go public," the publisher said.

"Isn't all this a bit stuffy and out-of-date?" a reporter asked.

"We have an established monarchy and the queen is our head of state," McCorquodale replied. "She approves of correct behavior and her subjects should behave properly."

Construction project tallies home energy

BOISE — Idaho is on schedule for the construction of 41 homes being built by various local construction companies under the guidelines of the Residential Construction Demonstration Project (RCDP), sponsored by the Bonneville Power Administration.

A combined total of 200 homes will be constructed in Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Montana. The homes are sold prior to construction.

They will be monitored for a full year to determine their level of energy efficiency.

RCDP got started earlier this year, following a series of Super Good Cents builder seminars and workshops conducted by the Idaho Department of Water Resources. The workshops were held around Idaho in areas where local utilities have joined the program.

Currently, approximately 200 builders have received training on how to construct a Super Good Cents home. In Idaho, 26 builders are taking part in the program and each of them were required to submit their architectural plans to state energy specialists, who determined if the homes would meet Super Good Cents standards and RCDP program requirements, which cover areas of construction such as wall insulation.

Qualified builders earned cash incentives to incorporate certain energy-efficient innovations into the design of the homes. These incentives ranged from \$4,000 to \$4,800, depending on which innovations were used.

Some of the conservation measures that builders could incorporate into the homes include ceiling and wall air/vapor barriers, energy-efficient doors, high R-value (heat resistance) floor insulation, insulated heating ducts, high R-value ceilings, energy-efficient windows, and a mechanical ventilation system with heat recovery.

Steve Benner, IDWR program manager, said these homes are

designed with the future in mind, adding that virtually everyone involved in building and marketing homes will benefit from the RCDP program.

"This project is designed to benefit builders, buyers, and professionals involved in selling or financing homes," Benner said. "The bottom line is the builder has a quality home, the buyer gets lower energy bills, and Realtors can market a better product," he said.

An important aspect of the RCDP program is the monitoring process. The occupants of the homes are offered cash incentives for helping to maintain accurate records of energy consumption.

Each of the project homes will be equipped with special meters designed to separately track space and water heating during the winter season. The meters will be read weekly.

Occupants will also be required to refrain from using fireplaces and wood stoves, because the heat from those sources would interfere with the measurement of how much electricity is actually used for heating.

All 41 homes will be occupied by the owners in early September. The 21 towns in Idaho with one or more RCDP homes include Bellevue, Twin Falls, Jerome, Ketchum, and Sun Valley.

The Twin Falls home is located on Candleridge Drive and was constructed by Whitehead Home and Energy. The owners of the home are currently in the process of moving in.

According to Dave Whitehead, the home that his company had constructed for last year's Super Good Cents program made it through the winter on only \$72 worth of heat. "The government is trying to find a way to conserve energy, and a lot of construction companies are starting to realize that the homes they build have to be a lot more efficient," Whitehead said. Some of his company's homes have been maintained throughout an entire winter on as little as \$50 worth of heat, without the help of wood stoves or fireplaces, he added.

Review of center zoning sought

JEROME — A group of neighbors opposing a proposed 39-bed juvenile detention center four miles west of Jerome this week asked the Jerome County Planning and Zoning Commission to review the project.

The commission didn't review the proposal for the Southern Idaho Youth Center, financed by a group of private investors, because it was an accepted use within the commercial classification of the area, Jerome County Zoning Administrator Al Hepworth had said.

But Gene Fredericksen, a Jerome attorney working with the neighbors and a resident of the area, said the center — as he interprets county zoning ordinances — requires a special permit because it falls into a day-care or shelter-home category, which requires such permits to operate. He wrote a letter to Hepworth this week on the subject.

The process of obtaining a special-use permit includes a public hearing held by the zoning commission, at which time petitions bearing the names of more than 200 people opposing the center might be presented, Fredericksen said.

Hepworth said he had sent the letter from Fredericksen to attorney James Meserey to review. Meserey, acting as a special counsel to the county, will provide an opinion on the applicable ordinances, Hepworth said.

The neighbors previously said they opposed the center because of the possibility it would devalue their property. They also said they feared dangerous juveniles and property damage by the youths.

Meanwhile, remodeling work is progressing at the site of the proposed center. Herb Bekker, a Jerome County commissioner who also will be the center's office manager, said the secure facility probably will be open by August.

The buildings at the site — formerly a bar, cafe and gas station at the intersection of U.S. 93 and State Highway 25 — are being transformed into a dormitory, kitchen and office for the housing of juvenile offenders. Bekker had reported that the facility will charge \$20 to hold a juvenile 24 hours, with its rates increasing being the counties of the Magic Valley.

Sun Valley construction crew gathers for reunion

SUN VALLEY — Fifty years after they first built it, six men returned to the now-famous ski resort they helped build to see what materialized from their labor.

It was June 1936 when a group of 16 young men from the University of Southern California journeyed to this remote mountain area to work as laborers in the construction of a three-story concrete lodge, situated in the middle of a cattle pasture.

When these men, now averaging 70 years old, returned to Sun Valley this week for a reunion to coincide with Sun Valley's 50th birthday, the landscape had changed dramatically.

At the time they worked here, the young men had no idea the area would become a well-known resort.

"How could we know it would become so famous? Ketchum was a wild and woolly town,

filled with sheepherders herding sheep down Main Street," says Ford Franklin Petty, who now lives in Jackson, Miss.

The young men jumped at the opportunity to earn money for their college tuition when a fraternity brother's father received the contract to build the lodge and recruited them.

The men spent 10-12 hours a day, six days a week, mixing concrete, pouring concrete, hauling concrete and whatever was necessary to build the three-story structure. They worked for 50 cents an hour, with no overtime pay.

The Union Pacific Railroad, which developed Sun Valley to become a destination ski resort, provided box cars near the Big Wood River for the crew to stay in. For \$1 a day, three all-you-can-eat family style meals were served.

After a hard day's work, each man said he ate his dollar's worth.

The construction crew had Sundays to themselves, and the only holiday they received

was the Fourth of July. They packed their bags and headed over Galena Summit to camp at Hedfish Lake, a time remembered by all.

Louis Hayward, a summer resident of the area, recalled that Ed Ball, a concrete specialist who worked on the San Francisco Bay Bridge, was brought to Sun Valley and was responsible for the "exceptional" concrete work in the building.

The forms used for the concrete walls were rough-sawn wood taken from a Halley sawmill. These wood forms left the rough texture, which is still visible on the lodge.

The crew had barely finished three floors of concrete work when they returned to school in mid-September. They found it "amazing" the lodge was completed and ready for opening day by Christmas of that year.

Of the 16 young men who worked on the construction job in 1936, eight are alive today, with only six able to join the reunion.

Of those six, two live "just around the corner" from one another. The rest are scattered across the country and have not seen one another since they left school.

Hayward lives most of the year in Glendale, Calif., but spends the summers in his home, 10 miles up Warm Springs, west of Ketchum. Two of his three children, Steve Hayward of Kimberly and Nancy Strand of Twin Falls, chose to make Idaho their home after spending much time in the state.

The others include Alton Elberg of Fall River Mills, Calif.; Harry Smith of Columbia, Mo.; Ford Franklin Petty of Jackson, Mich.; and Ed Martin and Jim Eldridge, both from Pasadena, Calif.

They enjoyed their Sun Valley reunion so much they plan to get together again in another five years. Getting together too much longer than that, and they all joked there may be none of them left to tell the tale.

Meeting on computers coughs out little data

TWIN FALLS — About a dozen parents and patrons grilled Twin Falls School officials on Thursday about the district's two-year-old, \$182,000 computer system, and both sides walked away scratching their heads.

"I'm not sure what this accomplished," said parent Margi Humphrey, who two weeks ago presented the school board with a pagel of questions on the district's Boroughs computer system.

At the time, Humphrey questioned whether the district was getting its money's worth of the computers located at the Administration Building. She also questioned whether the system could be used for student curriculum.

The most startling news about the district's computer system was in the amount the district spends per year in maintenance costs — \$17,000, which does include maintenance cost for terminals.

The upshot of Thursday's meeting was that for better or worse, the district has a \$182,000 system, and it's too late to scrap it now.

"We've got the thing, we've paid for it and we're going to have to live

with it," said Superintendent Carl Snow. "I think we got a good deal. We're certainly ahead of everybody in the state."

But Snow agreed the main priority for the district was to eventually set up computer labs at each school for students.

The district received a \$25,000 federal grant to buy 14 home terminals over a three-year period for clerical use at each school.

Currently, the district plans to install four terminals at the high school this fall. The computers will be tied into the district's main computer network and will be used for student registration, grades and all student records.

In addition, the district plans to add two computers at each junior high in 1987 and one computer for each of the district's six elementary schools the following year.

Snow said installing computers at each school will allow counselors to spend more time with students and will allow administrators to spend more time with teachers in the classroom.

The other major savings will be in cataloging the district's inventory, he said.

"Right now, we do all that by

Last November, Sandy Elementary School District shut its doors and sent all 450 students home for four weeks when voters turned down a fourth property tax levy to fund schools.

Sandy Elementary is one of five elementary school districts that act as feeder schools to Sandy Unified High School, Oregon officials said. Each elementary school district has its own superintendent and school board.

Heaton replaces Sandy Superintendent Roberta Hutton, who resigned at the end of her three-year contract. Officials there said she cited health reasons for her resignation, but she also was reportedly fed up with funding battles every year.

Top seeds hit tough battles in Wimbledon's second round

WIMBLEDON, England (AP) — Second-seeded Chris Evert Lloyd, along with Mats Wilander and Stefan Edberg of Sweden, were pushed to the limit Thursday before winning their second-round matches in the Wimbledon tennis championship.

The seeded player, No. 6 Zina Garrison of the United States, was ousted on the hot, humid day as Britain's Anne Hobbs posted a 6-4, 6-6, 6-4 victory.

Defending champion Boris Becker of West Germany had his second-round match against American Tom Gullickson halted by darkness. Becker was leading 6-4, 6-2, 2-2.

Lloyd, who has won the title at the All England Club three times, dined fellow American Pam Casale 6-5, 7-6, 6-1.

"I think I played great for the first set and a half," Lloyd said. "Then ... her game lifted to another level and she played very well. It took me by surprise a little bit and I played a few sloppy games there for me."

"In the third set I settled down and I was never really threatened."

Second-seeded Wilander struggled before outlasting Britain's Andrew Castle 4-6, 7-6, 6-4, 6-0; and fifth-seeded Edberg eventually defeated American Paul Anagnostis 6-4, 6-7, 4-6, 7-5, 6-0.

"I didn't expect the match to be so tough," Wilander said after his 3½-hour struggle against Castle, who was playing in only his third Nabisco Grand Prix tournament. "But I don't count on anything here. I just play them."

Winning multiplies fun San Francisco's Giants are having

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — The San Francisco Giants are having fun right now, just as Manager Roger Craig promised in spring training.

"I never get down, myself, and the players know that. Of course, I'm half crazy," Craig said after the upbeat team, a last-place finisher in 1985, took over the National League West lead early this week.

Craig, a North Carolina country boy who went on to a big league pitching career, has the look of a country preacher at age 55. But what he preaches is split-finger fastballs, a pitch which he has taught to many proteges, and the importance of a positive attitude. He also tells his players that baseball should be fun.

"Roger has been the main reason for our turnaround, no doubt about

it," says Al Rosen, the Giants' president and general manager who hired Craig.

Rosen and Craig decided to dump several veterans (Manny Trillo, Dan Drissens, David Green) and go with youth in 1986. Ten rookies have played so far this year.

The most startling turnaround has been in hitting, with the team average over .280 compared to last year's .233.

"Jose Morales is an outstanding batting coach and is going to be a great one," says Craig, whose own area of instruction is mostly with pitchers.

Craig was named manager in an organizational shakeup last September, with the Giants closing in on a 62-100 finish.

"I don't promise miracles," he said then. "But you're going to see some difference next year. I can win. I am a winner."

In spring training, Craig said, "If a team is having fun, it's going to win for you. I want to make my players look forward to coming to the ballpark."

That's the case now, and 730,000 fun-loving fans have come out to chilly Candlestick Park so far this season. The Giants' total attendance last year was 818,697.

"We haven't had a letdown all year," says Craig, proud of his team's ability to recover quickly from the few bad games and bad streaks it has experienced.

"Those players in that clubhouse are for real. There are a lot of hum-

bles in there."

A "hum-baby" is what Craig, using an old infield chatter term, calls a player who goes all-out, all the time.

"He's the hum-baby," outfielder Jeffrey Leonard said after being designated by Craig. "He's the one that turned our attitude around and made the game fun for us every day."

The Giants, who finished 33 games out of first place in 1985, went 5-2 on a homestand which ended with a 3-1 loss to San Diego Wednesday, giving them a record of 29-33.

"Roger Craig is making the Giants do things — hit-and-run plays with three straight batters, stealing bases," Cincinnati Manager Pete

Rose said after his first look at the revived club.

The 1986 Giants have stolen 82 bases, compared to 99 all of last season, and have bunted home runs on 11 of 14 suicide squeeze attempts.

"We know Roger likes the squeeze and has been successful a lot," Houston Manager Hal Lanier said last weekend after the Giants beat the Astros to the help of a 2-2 squeeze. "The only way to stop the squeeze is to pitch out."

"You have to guess with him, and if you're lucky you'll guess right. This time, we didn't think he'd squeeze."

Only one team, the San Diego Padres last week, has outguessed Craig so far and felled the squeeze with a pitchout.

San Francisco is Craig's second big league managerial stop. He guided San Diego to its first winning season (84-78) in 1978 but was fired after the club went 69-92 the next year.

"I'm better prepared for this job than I was then," says Craig, who spent five seasons on Sparky Anderson's coaching staff at Detroit and says, "I've got a lot of Sparky in me."

He coached a pitching staff led by Jack Morris, a prize split-finger fastball pupil, which was brilliant in the Tigers' championship season of 1984.

"I enjoy managing more than coaching. I formed my own staff here and we do things just the way I want to do them," Craig said.

"Managers make a little more than coaches, too," he added.

Breaking a long slump Irwin leads Canadian Open

OAKVILLE, Ontario (AP) — Hale Irwin, mired in the worst slump of his long career, shot a 4-under-par 68 Thursday and took a one stroke lead after the first round of the Canadian Open Golf Championship.

"It was time for me to relax and play the kind of golf I'm capable of," said Irwin, who ranks a distant 12th on the PGA Tour's money-winning list this season.

A single stroke off the pace at 69 were Andy Bean, a two-time winner already this season, Brad Fabel, Clarence Rose, Mike Donald, Denny Hepler and Dan Halldorson, seeking to become the first Canadian to win this title since 1955.

"I'm trying to make golf fun again. It has not been a lot of fun all this year," said Irwin, who once went almost four seasons without missing a cut. This year, he has missed in seven of 15 starts.

"It's been a long dry spell. I haven't been playing that bad-

ly, I really haven't — but the results have been terrible," said the two-time U.S. Open champion. "It's just a little thing here, a little thing there, and I've turned a 68 into a 72 or 73 and all of a sudden I'm struggling."

But it was no struggle at all for Irwin on a sunny and breezy day in the Toronto suburbs. He missed only two fairways and three greens on the Glen Abbey Golf Club.

"I did everything pretty well. It wasn't perfect, but in comparison with what I've been posting, I played very well," he said.

Bob Tway, who leads the Tour with three victories this season, had a 70 that left him only two back.

Australian Greg Norman, who has been on such a rampage in recent months, could do no better than match par 72.

Defending champion Curtis Strange was one stroke higher at 73. Masters champion Jack Nicklaus,

seven times a runner-up in this event, and Lee Trevino, a three-time Canadian Open winner, each took a 74.

"I just didn't play very well," Nicklaus said.

Irwin, 41, winner of 17 titles in a 19-year career, got away to a birdie-lead, hitting a 5-iron to three feet on his first hole and dropping a 25-foot putt on the next.

He got up and down from a green-side bunker for birdie-4 on his seventh hole, then hit a 3-iron to eight feet on the next.

That put him four under for the day, and he matched two more birdies with a couple of bogeys coming home.

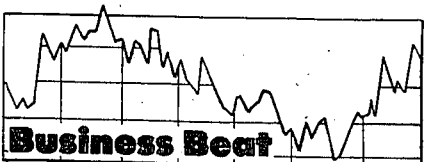
Big Idaho spud planting seen

BLACKFOOT (AP) — Although the initial estimate on Idaho acreage to be planted this season will not be released for two more weeks, there are indications that plantings may not fall as much as some industry officials had hoped. "We have a history of a few growers who are cutting down," said Val Schwendman, a certified seed grower in the spud heartland of eastern Idaho.

But while Schwendman has cut his acreage by 10 percent, "in this area there are not many who are cutting a significant amount," he said. Last year's record harvest of over 10 billion pounds coupled with slump-

ing demand pushed prices to half or less of what they were a year earlier, and financial problems were suggested by an early frost that damaged much of the crop. Because of that, many producers and others in the industry believed that a reduction of at least 10 percent or more from last year's 345,000 acres was needed to help bring supplies back in line with demand.

The government will issue its first estimate of the 1986 Idaho crop on July 11, but an informal and unscientific survey of producers and others in the industry conducted recently by the National Potato Promotion Board indicated growers in Idaho and elsewhere planned to keep their acreage about the same as last year. "I would think, or hope, acreage would be less than last year," said Brian Finnigan, the extension agent for Blingham County, Idaho's largest potato producing county. "I have heard many growers are having problems obtaining financing, but ... some growers are planting without financing."

Market pulls back; some stocks gain

By CHET CURRIER The Associated Press NEW YORK — The stock market pulled back a bit Thursday, running into some resistance after its recent gains. But activity remained brisk in several issues involved in news or rumors of takeovers and other major business transactions.

Hasbro, traded on the American Stock Exchange, slumped 2 1/4 to 57 1/2. The company said it would report lower first earnings for the second quarter. Disappointment over that news apparently fueled off selling in the stocks of other toy companies, traded on the Big Board. Tonka dropped 1 1/2 to 29 1/2, and Mattel 3/4 to 12 1/2.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrials lost 18 to 2771, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 18 at 2474.

Cascade trustee explores legal action

SPOKANE, Wash. (AP) — The trustee in the bankruptcy case of Cascade Airways is exploring possible legal action against Horizon Airlines, parent of Horizon Airlines, court papers show.

Horizon backed out of the deal at the last minute in January, and the Spokane-based Cascade ceased operations about a month later. After its aircraft were seized for non-payment of leases.

With two members not voting and third absent, the majority on the diminished council said the \$30 million project of Broadview Development Co. could help revitalize the city's ailing downtown area even though it would be built outside the eight blocks specifically targeted for redevelopment. The Planning and Zoning Commission had rejected the project on a 4-3 vote amid concerns over the impact of the structure on the Capitol and its effect on downtown redevelopment efforts.

Rexburg firm offering stock REXBURG (AP) — American Health Companies Inc., the Rexburg-based parent company of Diet Center Inc., has announced the first public offering of its common stock.

The offering of 3 million shares, expected to raise about \$42 million, thrusts one of Idaho's most successful but least known companies into the public arena. Privately held since being founded by Roger and Sybil Ferguson of Rexburg in 1972, Diet Center has become one of the leading franchised businesses in diet and nutrition counseling in the nation. It has more than 2,000 franchises in all 50 states and Canada.

The company reported \$54.57 million in annual revenues, including \$18.6 million in revenues by American Health Products, at the close of its fiscal year March 31. Assets were \$11.07 million. Earnings per share for the year were \$1.02.

Treasury note yields decline

WASHINGTON (AP) — Yields on seven-year Treasury notes fell to 7.33 percent in Wednesday's auction, the lowest level in nine years. The yield was down from 7.48 percent at the last auction on March 26 and was the lowest since 7.26 percent on Aug. 3, 1977. The sale attracted bids totaling \$16.66 billion with \$6.76 billion sold. The note's coupon rate of 7 1/4 percent was a \$10.00 million offering for \$9.956 billion.

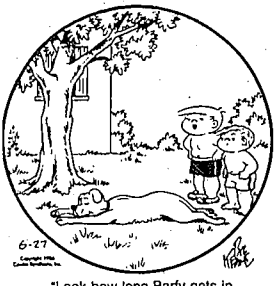

Soviet grip on arts may be relaxing

MOSCOW — Intellectuals who have detected a relaxation of controls on the arts under Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev say this week's National Writers' Congress and the selection of a new culture minister will be important indicators of how far the relaxation will go.

Since Gorbachev came to power in March 1985, theaters have been allowed to stage more challenging plays and a few long-censored films have been released.

Public and private debate over the arts has revived to a degree not seen since the early 1960s under Nikita Khrushchev. However, nobody has called for abolition of censorship or challenged the supremacy of the Communist Party.

On the contrary, Gorbachev told 19 Soviet writers last Friday, any changes must serve the party's cause.

"There is an acute need today for high-level works of art that would present today's conflicts and real collisions... for works of art which would inspire confidence in the victory of the

ideas and plans of the 27th Communist Party Congress," the official Tass news agency quoted him as saying.

Gorbachev has yet to name a successor to former Culture Minister Pyotr N. Demichov, 68, who was dismissed June 10 after 12 years in the post and given the ceremonial job of first deputy president.

A forceful, younger man may be able to pare down the cumbersome bureaucracy running the arts, giving artists more breathing space.

Gorbachev's unusual meeting Friday with the writers may have served to set parameters for debate and personnel changes during the National Writers' Congress.

The congress, which opened Tuesday, follows a meeting of the Union of Cinematographers last month during which younger filmmakers threw out most of the old leaders.

The new union chief, director Elem Klimov, said Friday that the new leadership has found a commission to review feature, documentary and television films kept off Soviet screens over the past 20 years.

Klimov, who has one film on the censor's shelf

and another that was barred from Soviet screens for 10 years, said he was nominated by Alexander N. Yakovlev, the Central Committee secretary in charge of party propaganda.

Despite this, the reportedly stormy scenes at the filmmakers' congress probably caught the party by surprise.

Georgy M. Markov, 75, has led the writers' union since 1971. A change of leadership would be in line with Gorbachev's policy of replacing aging bureaucrats with younger officials. However, not all old guard leaders have been replaced. The Congress of Composers met in April and retained Tikhon Khrennikov, 73, who has led the union since 1957.

The writers' congress is closed to outsiders, as is usual. But state-run media publish many of the speeches and word usually filters out about any sensational unreported speeches or events.

At a congress of writers from the Russian Republic last December, poet Yevgeny Yevtushenko indirectly attacked censorship and criticized officials and writers who distort history, indulge in self-promotion and write mediocre books.

Gaylord Flip inventor tries acting

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Olympic champion gymnast Mitch Gaylord, inventor of the thrilling Gaylord Flip and the Gaylord II, takes another daring leap this summer, starring in his first movie.

The Lenoran film released by Columbia Pictures is called "American Anthem." The director is Albert Magnoli, who guided Prince through "Purple Rain." Gaylord appears opposite Janet Jones, late of "The Flamingo Kid" and "A Chorus Line."

He plays a gymnast, of course, an athlete whose promising career is threatened by personal problems. Michelle Phillips, formerly of the Mamas and the Papas, portrays his mother.

Mitch Gaylord brought to his acting debut the same dedication and control that he applies to gymnastics.

Magnoli called him "extremely disciplined with an incredible attention span." The director chose Gaylord over the other U.S. Olympic gymnasts, "because he was taller, more physically mature and dark. He also seemed the most desirous of going on to another career."

Indeed, Gaylord would like to do more acting but he is realistic enough to know that it all depends on how the public and the industry react to "American Anthem."

Before the movie, his only acting had been as commentator on videotapes of practices by the University of California at Los Angeles gymnastics team. After he had passed Magnoli's extensive screen test, the athlete studied with drama coach Eric Morris.

"I tried to learn how to act in three months," said Gaylord in an interview. "I studied with Eric four hours a day, two days a week. In the second and third months, I also worked with Janet. It was the first time I had worked with an actress."

"I found it difficult to adjust at first. Athletes are trained to control their emotions; actors are taught to let them surface. Gradually, I was able to do it, and in the process I found out a lot about myself."

At first, he thought the love scenes would be difficult. Then he discovered they were just like all the others. "You just do them with your clothes off," he said, adding that they are not erotic enough to threaten the PG-13 rating.

Mitch Gaylord, 25, was a San Fernando Valley boy who didn't take his athletic gifts seriously until high school, and then his goal was to get a college scholarship. He succeeded with UCLA, and there he began serious training under coaches Art Shurlock and Makoto Sakamoto. His career culminated with the 1984

Olympics, where he won a gold, silver and two bronze medals.

After the Olympics, he was offered a few movie scripts but they didn't interest him.

"The whole men's gymnastic team went on tour, sometimes joined by the full women's team or some of its members," he said. "We appeared in 25-30 cities, and because of the great popularity of the Games, the crowds were 15,000 and 17,000, whereas gymnastics had attracted only 5,000 before."

"I had met with an agent, Sid Craig, before the Games but I didn't really focus on much afterward because we didn't expect to win the Olympics. When we did, I had a number of offers for endorsements. Most of them were lower-class that I turned down. I accepted Nike and Vidal Sassoon because both were connected with the Olympic Games — Sassoon had sponsored gymnastic events. Also Solofex ads, because their training doesn't include weights — gymnasts don't use weights."

Gaylord still trains, but not his former regimen of four to six hours in three separate workouts a day except Sunday.

"After the Olympics I decided my career was over," he said. "To train another four years would have meant giving up everything else, and I wasn't willing to do that. I felt fulfilled."

'Labyrinth' makes for a tiresome venture, despite Henson's details

HOLLYWOOD — Toward the end of the seemingly everlasting credits for "Labyrinth," its director and story co-author Jim Henson, "acknowledges his debt to the works of Maurice Sendak." Quite rightly too.

The movie's plot, a baby who is stolen from his goblins and who must be rescued by his heroic sister is, in outline, Sendak's "Outside Over There." (And that had his antecedent in one of the stories of the Brothers Grimm.) Ludo, the movie's hulking furry beast with the under-shot jaw, might be one of Sendak's Wild Things, and so might scattered members of the goblin city.

"Labyrinth" worked at the level of Sendak whose goblins and other stories speak directly to the inner (under?) world of children. It would be a classic. From all the detail and attention that Henson and his collaborators lavished on "Labyrinth," it is not hard to assume that is what they had in mind.

And it contains memorable individual sequences: a fantasy ball; an Escherlike room full of stairs on which the characters defy gravity.

But, by rights, they should not have started from this scene at all. Monty Python-like Terry Jones has written a classic quest story: Can the dauntless Sarah Jennifer

Connelly pierce the labyrinth and get back her little brother Toby from the realm of Jareth (David Bowie), king of the goblins? And at the same time, can Sarah go beyond a 14-year-old's selfishness and self-centeredness to a more mature place in the real world around her?

Yes. Unfortunately, it is a pretty trying trip, with less humor, less wit and fewer flashes of great imagery than you might imagine from this crowd. This in spite of miracles of puppetry and, in one case, computer graphics (the white owl who flies so majestically under the credits).

We must care about Sarah, for starters, or at least have some stake in her perilous journey. But as we meet her, rehearsing her role in a play and quite forgetting her promise to be home an hour earlier to babysit her baby brother for her father and stepmother, she is a selfish pill.

Her room at home is still a little girls', stuffed with toys, classic children's books and fairy-tale trap-pings until it looks like an explosion at F.A.O. Schwartz.

This is where she flings herself around melodramatically, praying to be rescued "from this awful fate." Fourteen is not a great age to live through, either as the sufferer or the sufferer's parents, but because the un-divine Sarah is not

our languishing problem, it is a great temptation to write her off right there. And that is even before, in a fit of play-acting — longing for her Daddy's attention and querulous at her brother's crying — she utters the enchanted words which do send little Toby (Toby Froud) straight off to Jareth. Quest indeed; getting him back would seem to be the least she can do.

Her adversary will be the goblin-king, Jareth, although why he wants a little baby, to diaper and watch out for and keep from falling into things like the Bog of Eternal Stench, is not terribly clear. But Bowie's Jareth is one of "Labyrinth's" strong points; he has a nice, mocking sense of irony, and he looks suitably magical with his Kabuki lion-mane hair. (He might, in fact, make a fine Shakespearean Oberon, and he would hardly have to change costume.)

Henson et al. are by now so amazingly adept that they run the risk of having their magic taken for granted. "Labyrinth" seems cons ahead of "The Dark Crystal," which was both staid and so dark you could almost never see the painstaking detail of the characters' designs and costuming. Those qualities afflict "Labyrinth" a little less, but it is almost never filled with surprise.

American to rebuild the Globe

LONDON (AP) — American actor-director Sam Wanamaker on Wednesday won a 17-year struggle to rebuild William Shakespeare's Globe theater at its original London site along the Thames River.

Following five days of arguments in the High Court, Wanamaker and the London borough of Southwark reached an out-of-court settlement under which the borough will provide the land for the theater, attorneys in the case announced.

The one-acre site on the south bank of the Thames opposite St. Paul's Cathedral is now a streetsweepers depot. It looks like a derelict lot, with crumbling concrete sheds.

"I feel delighted, jubilant and, in a sense, vindicated," Wanamaker told reporters outside the court. He launched his project in 1969 and said he's confident that an international appeal will raise the \$18 million needed to build the replica.

"I never doubted in 17 years that this was going to happen. What surprised me was the length of time it took," said Wanamaker, 67, of Chicago.

Wanamaker said he plans to have his own company doing old and modern plays in the new Globe, starting with "Henry V."

The Shakespeare play that opened the original theater in 1599.

It was built in 1599, burned down in 1613 and rebuilt.

WASHINGTON — Sheilah Graham was a gossip columnist in the golden days — hers and Hollywood's. Talking to her is like watching clips of Hollywood's greatest hits, only the dialogue is better.

But the chip almost choking Ronald Reagan with his own tie. Cut. F. Scott Fitzgerald going from the toast of Paris to the crumbs of Hollywood. Cut. Leslie Howard and Ronald Colman vying Graham the social woman in Hollywood. Cut. Fitzgerald immortalizing Graham as Katherine in "The Last Tycoon." Cut. Marilyn Monroe singing "Happy Birthday" to John F. Kennedy in Madison Square Garden. Cut. Joan Crawford undressing her shoulders before she stepped into the Pickfair mansion so husband Douglas Fairbanks Jr. would be at her feet — re-tying the knot — in front of Fairbanks Sr. and Mary Pickford. Cut.

In those days, Graham was the hub of the movie industry's champagne one of the three witch columnists ("Louella Parsons was not as bad as Hedda Hopper") who stirred the gossip cauldron. Ronald Reagan? "Alas, poor Ronnie, I knew him well, but I never hit a man when he's up." Bob Hope? "The kindest man." Rosalind Russell? "My favorite actress." Marilyn Monroe? "Very vulnerable; I knew her at the beginning, the middle and the end."

Graham is a self-invented woman who parlayed a Dickensian London orphanage education, a pretty face, a supple body and a nimble mind into life among the noble, the rich and the lecherous. She wanted an education, money and a gentleman who would make her a lady. She was supremely successful in all three quests.

Author of 11 books, three about her life with Fitzgerald, Graham was in Washington this week to speak to the Smithsonian Associates and do what she does best — talk about herself. "Do you want statistics or do you want gossip?"

Fifty-three years ago in June 1933, she came to America from her native England, carrying as her credentials a silver cup won as London's most beautiful chorine girl, clippings of outrageous articles she'd written for London newspapers about her life as a high kicker, and a fearless approach to life.

When she arrived, "New York had no air conditioning in residences then, so all the wives were at the beaches. I had a wonderful time."



A thumb in the mouth tops off a day's shooting for actress, 5

OAKLEY, Utah (AP) — The cameras stop rolling, the film crew relaxes and Lisa MacFarlane pops her thumb in her mouth and falls asleep.

The 5-year-old, who had spent eight hours on the set, has a key role in the television movie, "Down the Long Hills," a Disney Channel Western adventure being filmed entirely in Utah.

In her first venture before the cameras, the doll-faced youngster is earning \$1,250 a week and praise from director Burt Kennedy. She's also having a good time before starting kindergarten in the fall.

Kennedy said Lisa, who immediately took to acting, looks like a smaller version of Brooke Shields and walks like E.T.

"She's tremendous," he said. "She understands. Sometimes she's a little girl who doesn't want to concentrate. But other times you can actually see she's thinking, which is a lot more than a lot of the actors in Hollywood — grown-up actors."

The film, starring Bruce Boxleitner, Jack Elam and Bo Hopkins, centers on two children's struggle to survive in the wilderness following an Indian massacre of their wagon train.

Lisa portrays Betty Sue Powell, a pioneer girl orphaned in the attack, who sets out with friend Hardy Collins, played by 13-year-old Thomas Wilson Brown, to find the boy's long-lost father (Boxleitner). She has to fight their wits and a trusty sorrel stallion called Big Red.

During an interview between takes one recent day, Lisa was by turns mischievous, talkative and exhausted. She loves riding Big Red, even though she was once dumped from his back, and said she enjoys being in a movie.

"It's hard work, huh, mom," she said, looking knowingly to her mother, Shue Condie.

There is humor in many of her other pronouncements, some of it intended: Her 10-year-old brother is jealous of her; her friends at home in North Ogden, Utah, don't believe she's really making a movie.

And then there's her pet peeve. "They said I look like Brooke Shields. I hate them saying that," Lisa said with theatrical exasperation, rolling her big brown eyes.

Then the thumb darts back in the mouth and Lisa shuts her eyes.

But not for long.

"Let me ask the questions," she says, grabbing a reporter's pen. "How do you like the movie?"

Brown, who made his film debut last year in "Silverado," assumes the air of a veteran, saying it takes a lot of work to do a scene with his young costar.

Still, they get along and working with her is, well, "OK."

Condie didn't think her daughter would get the part. She decided at the last minute to allow Lisa to audition along with 500 other children in April.

"They narrowed it down to 175 kids, and she just kept making every cut," Condie said.

The film crew has lavished attention on her daughter. "Everyone is spoiling her a lot," she said. "She's going to miss this when we get home."

Lisa has been known to demand a chair on the set, and once, after a little advance coaching, innocently asked the assistant director: "Where's my limo?"

It's that unabashed openness that helped her win the role. "If I was Disney, I would hire her," Kennedy said.

Working with child actors is usually time consuming, and Lisa's memorization of her lines is more painstaking, said Kennedy, because she can't read.

A dialogue director coaches Lisa on three or four lines at a time, usually the night before a scene.

"She does very well," said Kennedy, who directed such Westerns as "The War Wagon," "Mail Order Bride," "Support Your Local Sheriff!" and "The Train Robbers."

The movie will air late this fall on the Disney Channel and also will be a feature film on the ABC Disney Hour later this year.

'Ferris Bueller's Day Off': Fantasy for adults, children

FERRIS BUELLER'S DAY OFF (PG-13). Teen chronicler John Hughes has constructed the mythic teenager, Ferris Bueller (Matthew Broderick), a giddy scamp who is too savvy for his parents, too cool for school and an absolute terror when it comes to restaurant maitre d's. The film's look is a tantalizing fantasy, for adults as well as kids — what if you could fool your parents and teachers (or for that matter, your boss) into thinking you were sick, earning yourself a 24-hour free ride from the boredom and responsibilities of real life? But Hughes miscalculates badly, making his hero so smug and invincible that he does not give us any chance to root for him.

BACK TO SCHOOL (PG-13). A big belly laugh of a comedy, expertly tailored to the talents of Rodney Dangerfield, cast as a boisterous self-made clothing tycoon who enters college to set a good example to his wallflower son (Keith Gordon). A sleek, witty Sally Kellerman is Dangerfield's English prof and a hilarious Adrienne Barbeau is Dangerfield's social-climbing, two-timing wife. With Robert Downey Jr., Burt Young, Ned Beatty, Terry Farrel.

INVADERS FROM MARS (PG). Tobe Hooper's faithful remake of William Cameron Menzies' 1953 sci-fi thriller — which, back then, fused standard Cold War thrills with a Gothic, Expressionist twist — has a waxy budget, a modern perspective and a lot of reflexive inside humor. The story is paradigmatic — a little boy protagonist lost in a town full of Martian-dominated zombie adults — but Leslie Dilley's production designs are lush, the actors are led by the Martians (which resemble leering globs of molting ice

cream) are an extraterrestrial gas. When Hooper gets the languorously empty, paranoid '50s feel he wants, this movie verges on being hysterically funny.

SHORT CIRCUIT (PG). Derivative, heavy-handed comedy, involving some broadsides against the military-industrial complex, about an endearing runaway robot who comes alive when struck by lightning. With Ally Sheedy, Steve Guttenberg, Fisher Stevens, Austin Pendleton.

TOP GUN (PG). The biggest, glibest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Fortran dogfights, focalur male-bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, massed clouds, streaking jets, and so much techno-pop pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: the trappings are flabbergasting — and the camerawork and editing a knockout — but the story is a sleazy slash of "Celling Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman," drowned in beefcake and macho ballistics.

'Karate Kid' sequel debuts at top

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Karate Kid, Part II" handily defeated all comers for the weekend box office crown, with the resuscitated tale of a young martial-arts student and his mentor earning \$12.7 million for the best debut of the year.

"Legal Eagles," a new comedy starring Robert Redford, Debra Winger and Daryl Hannah, placed second with \$8.1 million.

The movie, with Redford as an assistant district attorney trying to clear his name and get his job back, opened stronger than either of the actor's most recent hits: "Out of Africa," which eventually grossed \$13 million, and "The Natural," which sold \$50 million in tickets.

Although the total figures for "The Karate Kid, Part II" are comparable to the opening of Sylvester Stallone's current hit, "Cobra," the sequel to the 1984 hit "The Karate Kid" opened in 800 fewer theaters than "Cobra."

"The Karate Kid, Part II" earned its \$12.7 million on 1,323 screens, for an impressive average of \$9,590 per screen.

The latest film stretches the story about a boy, played by Ralph Macchio, and his instructor, portrayed by Pat Morita, to Okinawa, where a grudge match unfolds for both of the martial arts heroes.

"Karate Kid" and "Legal Eagles" breathed new life into what had been a sagging summer box office.

Their entrance pushed down last week's No. 1 attraction, "Back to School," to third. However, the comedy starring Rodney Dangerfield still showed strength by garnering another \$7.8 million in its second week on the screens for a \$22.6 million total.

"Top Gun," the adventure film about the U.S. Navy's fighter pilot training program, dropped from third to fourth place. The comedy "Ferris Bueller's Day Off," which opened in second place last week, dropped to fifth in its second week.

"Cobra," fell from fourth to sixth, showing earnings of \$1.95 million in its fifth week and a total gross to date of \$42.5 million.

Bringing it all back home — again

For pop music fans raised on Van Halen or on U2, all this fuss about Bob Dylan must seem pretty incredible sometimes. Explaining it can be difficult, too. While some would argue that Dylan's music sounds as fresh today as it did 10, 15, even 20 years ago (much of Dylan's early work is head, shoulders and waist above almost anything that has hit the Top 40 during the past couple of years) to explain Dylan is often to explain the era in which he emerged. And that can be a tough job.

By some insensitive quirk of fate, Dylan has become a kind of quasi-mythical figure whose name is often evoked but who sometimes appears to cast only a shadowy presence on the current scene, a remote-seeming star from another period in pop music. It is understandable if you had only heard Dylan's singles from the past several years, or only seen his rather awkward videos, then he could be a little anticlimactic.

Like a legend in pop music is de-mystifying, anyway: it often represents some widely accepted but rather vague notion that a performer has managed to outlast his contemporaries, after which everybody finally agrees that he has contributed something to the flot-sium of pop music.

In Dylan's case, it has been especially de-mystifying. As significant as his 1960s recordings are, Dylan created some of his most beautiful and engaging songwriting during the late 1970s, at a time when practically nobody seemed to be paying attention to him.

Dylan's ballads during that period were often extraordinary. He is also one of the few major performers of the 1960s who has refused to remain static, and who has struggled to mature and express the lessons of age and experience in his music. And that is what I mean by a cruel quirk of fate: This is an aspect of his work which remains widely unacknowledged.

Dylan is currently touring the United States with Tom Petty's band playing behind him. This is his first extended tour since 1981. All this stuff about Dylan sounds very weighty, but Dylan has always been one of those performers that people take seriously. He can be very amusing and exceedingly witty, but he has rarely been a real fun performer; at least not since his earliest days as a solo folkie.

I would agree that Dylan's roadshows during the past decade have been mixed. The bands and the performances have varied greatly;

even "Band Of The Hand," the first single with the Petty band, does not sound particularly remarkable. But Dylan has a way of revising and re-creating familiar songs in the most disconcerting ways. I remember seeing him in Madison Square Garden in the late 1970s, with the big band that appeared on the "Live At Budokan" album, a superb performance that was booted in places by disgruntled fans.

I remember, too, his 1981 tour and its stop in Philadelphia, when Dylan led a more utilitarian group and sang his most well-known songs in a gruff, monochromatic fashion that seemed to deny and denigrate their place in modern pop culture. The new material he did that night — from "Shot of Love" and "Slow Train Coming" — was extremely musical, and as close to sublime as you can get in an arena. That night, Dylan returned to stage alone for his first encore, and, accompanying himself on acoustic guitar, sang "Blowin' in the Wind." There were a good many people in the audience who stood and went openly. And to explain that is to explain the role that Dylan played in popular music during the 1960s and during that particular era in American history, and what he represented to many of his older fans.

At the moment, Dylan is reemerging into the world of modern pop music. Does he sense that the times could be right for him again?

Comics work from political platform

BALTIMORE — After controversial actress-cowboy Francis Rame discovered that the Maryland state motto was "Manly deeds, womanly words," she turned to her Peabody Concert Hall audience, cast an amused glance around the hall and said, "Woman, you have to do something about that!"

It was one of the mildest political rebukes heard last week in an afternoon performance full of strong language and strong opinion coated sometimes — though not always — with the tempering effects of satire.

Like her husband, Darfo Fo, who performed the previous evening (both were in town for the Theatre of Nations), Rame is an artist for whom the theater is political platform first and entertainment second, though the two impulses have been merged for so long that they have become inseparable.

In Italy, this political emphasis has brought them enormous popularity with audiences and notorious enmity from a government that cannot quite take the constant heat. It also caused the U.S. State Department (at the Italian government's request) twice to refuse Fo and Rame entrance into this country, provoking storms of indignation. In 1981 it threatened not allowing Fo to visit New York before the Broadway opening of "Accidental Death of an Anarchist." But the recent stop in Baltimore was the final one on Fo and Rame's first, long and varied performance mini-tour of the East Coast.

On stage, Rame and Fo follow a similar pattern. Both intersperse the patter of stand-up comics with actual performance pieces. Patter and pieces have been long and carefully rehearsed, but remain flexible enough for topical insertions. This provides a forum and the opportunity to befriend and assail the audience at once, invite the public into the comic conspiracy, yet remind it, at carefully chosen moments, that the fun wells up from dark, unfunny places.

Rame's pieces are direct, structured, lucid, even formal; Fo's pieces ramble all over the map with such deftness and amiability that the seriousness of their impulse is all the more dazzling when it leaps from the honeyed or bawdy or scatological words to squirt an audience with the acid truth.

It is a remarkable technique, applied quite differently by two strikingly individual artists who have been married for 22 years and, as witnessed when they perform together) are symbiotic in their ability to spar on stage without surrendering an ounce of individuality.

Rame is a tall, sleek, handsome woman, with the wily, sly Grable's, a mind like Mort Sahl's and a mouth that could compete with Richard Pryor's. Fo — a large, laughing man of the people — has sweetness and good humor with an irresistible overbite and a body made of collapsible joints. You can always feel Rame's anger boiling just under the serene surface; it takes infra-red light to spot Fo's.

With Rame the politics are clear and strongly sexual, sometimes running over into a forced (and weaker) logic of their own. Her main preoccupation is with the enduring subjugation of women.

Her carefully crafted monologues in a program called "Tutta Casa, Letto e Chiesa" ("It's All Bed, Board and Church") ran the gamut from slapstick to serious drama, the high point being "Strupo" ("Rape"), a woman's stream-of-consciousness responses — blow by blow — as she is being violated and otherwise abused by three men at once. The low point came with a "Medea" in which Rame interprets the assassination of Medea's children as the ultimate blow to be struck for feminism.

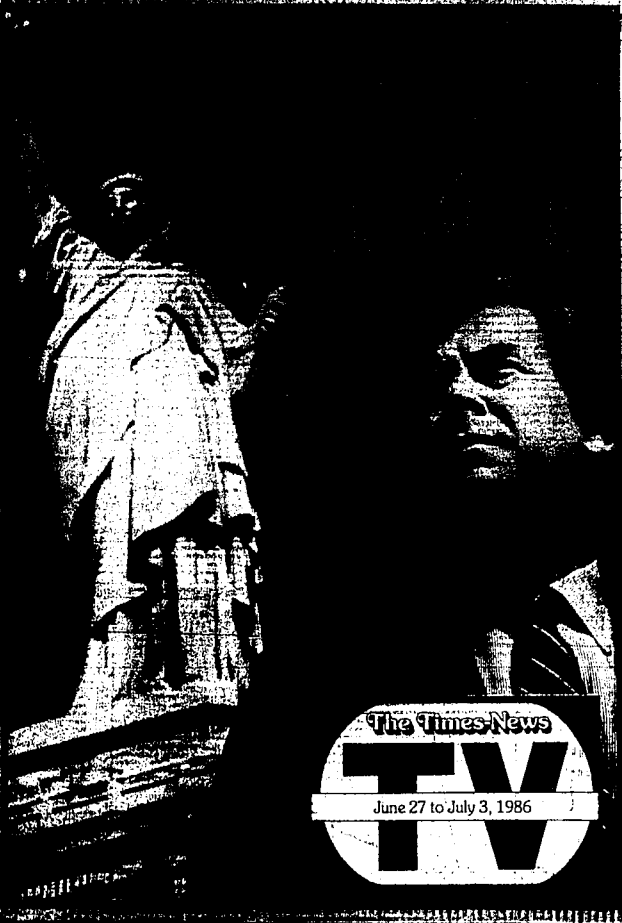

ABC maintains exclusive rights to musical celebration on July 4

David Wolper is planning quite a spectacle for this year's July Fourth celebration in honor of the Statue of Liberty. It will include opening and closing ceremonies, star-studded events, the simultaneous induction of more than 20,000 new American citizens and the lighting of the statue's new torch by President Reagan, who will be backed by a 100-piece orchestra and a 300-voice choir.

Some Liberty Weekend events will be covered by all three networks, and some will be shown exclusively on ABC. There has been considerable bickering over whether ABC's exclusivity extends to certain events, such as the lighting of the torch and the induction of the new citizens, but ABC has an ironclad exclusive on the July Fourth "American Music Celebration," a salute to American music featuring stars such as Whitney Houston, John Denver, Barry Manilow, Johnny Cash and Joel Grey, who will be doing a tribute to a composer with whom he may be more familiar than anyone else — George M. Cohan.

"I've done a lot of 'George M.' things over the years," says Grey, who played the composer of such classic tunes as "Give My Regards to Broadway," "I'm A Yankee Doodle Dandy" and "Over There" in the 1969 Broadway musical "George M." "But this will be something fashioned for the Boston Pops Orchestra and for myself. And it'll be right before the fireworks on that night of July 4. That's the kind of historic association that makes you really want to do the best for Cohan, for your grandparents who came to this country and for the Statue of Liberty."

Will salute American music

"We're not just here on our own," says Grey. "There's a lot of good baggage that comes into play."

Grey, 54, made his stage debut while he was still a child and has been an actor ever since. "That's what I always wanted to be," he says. "In the moments of despair — and you know the life of an actor is not a smooth road — I thought of doing other things: But I never really wanted to do those other things."

Grey always knew he could act, but his development as a singer has

come as a genuine surprise. "Everyone told me I couldn't sing at all," he says, and he assumed that they were right.

"I thought I would like to sing," he recalls, "but I didn't think I could. I started to study when I was 18, but to sing well takes great discipline and a lot of study and a kind of ease. I'm still much more comfortable as an actor than as a singer or dancer. I have a little stage fright when I act, but when I sing or dance, it gets — whoa!

"It's very precarious performing live," adds Grey. "Any number of things could happen or not happen, and that's also what makes it so wonderfully exciting. It's not a sure thing. That's why audiences go, too. To be a part of that. It's an adventure."

The "adventure" should be as good as it gets on Friday evening, July 4.

For a while, it was rumored that Barbra Streisand wanted it, but she denied that. Then the director, Ken Russell, quit in a fury because his choice, Liza Minnelli, was vetoed.

Q. I understand that Richard Simmons can be quite candid, even acid tongued, away from his pussycat public image. Will the real Richard Simmons please stand up?

A. He does — and frequently. Recently, Simmons, author of the popular new book, "Reach for Fitness," guested on a local New York TV talk show, at which another guest was a pretty, much publicized debutante. In the green room while waiting to go on, Simmons asked her exactly what a debutante does. A. Three hundred and fifty hands were needed. One hundred and fifty were supplied by 75 actors perched on raised platforms out of camera range, pushing gloved hands through small openings in the shaft walls. The remaining 200 hands were fashioned of foam rubber, designed by

special effects supervisor George Gibbs. Gibbs and his team conceived and built the scary 30-foot shaft, as well as a special 40-foot vertical camera track which followed Sarah's descent with clockwork precision.

Q. Some time back in an interview with the late, great French actress Simone Signoret, she said she was at work on a novel. Was that book completed or did she die before it was finished? — T.E.

A. Close friends suspect that the actress knew she was dying and worked feverishly on the book to finish it. Although it's a novel, publishing insiders feel it's quite autobiographical. It is the saga of two families, one from the Ukraine and one from Poland, who flee the anti-Semitic pogroms in their homelands, settling in Paris.

A. Are you kidding? One guest I spoke with had "a fantastic time," and so did the celebrities who attended. You could tell who Arnold's friends were by the way their muscles bulged out of their jackets. And one of the highlights of the reception was Senator Edward Kennedy doing a circle dance with none other than Grace Jones! ...

HOLLYWOOD — The setting was the rotunda inside Los Angeles City Hall, doubling as the Capitol in Washington, circa 1956. Director Peter Werner and his film crew were quietly going about their business, setting up the next shot with about three dozen extras made up to look like U.S. Senators and their aides.

"What the hell are you all standing around looking at?" a voice suddenly boomed.

Heads whipped around. The big hallway immediately grew quiet.

On the outskirts of the crowd was a tall, imposing figure who looked astonishingly like the late Lyndon B. Johnson. He smiled sheepishly. "Just rehearsing," Randy Quaid said.

Everyone murmured and went back to work. It really was his next line.

"From the moment he put on the makeup for his screen test, he was Lyndon Johnson," said John Brice, co-producer of "LBJ," the three-hour movie for NBC in which Quaid is starring. "The moment we saw the first frame, we knew he was our man."

Indeed, production of the film was delayed for four months to wait for Quaid to finish his season's work on "Saturday Night Live," the late-night comedy show on which he often appeared in satirical sketches as the current chief executive.

Quaid was thrilled to get the role. "This was one of the parts I'd always wanted to play," he said during a break in filming.

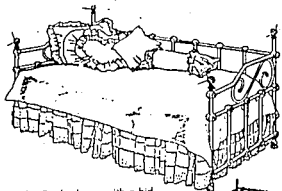

CBS special to tell of mistaken arrest

IRVING, Texas (AP) — Dabney Coleman, garbed in cowboy boots and pinstriped suit, paces the floor of the studio courtroom. He pauses for a meaningful look at the jury.

"The look doesn't work. Coleman tilts his head back and sighs.

"Nothi-i-ing," he yells, setting off a wave of laughter on the soundstage 15 miles northwest of downtown Dallas where "Justice Delayed: The Lenell Geter Story" is being filmed.

It's expected to be a CBS special in the fall.

After a few takes, Coleman, who plays one of Geter's attorneys, develops a look that works on the 12 people sitting as jurors, who like most of the extras are residents of the Dallas area.

Like the attorneys, the filming moves at a slow, measured pace, with director Richard Heffron giving the orders for action, cut and print.

"Justice Delayed" is the story of Lenell Geter, a young black engineer who lived in Greenville, 50 miles northeast of Dallas. He was convicted of armed robbery of a suburban Dallas fast food store in 1982.

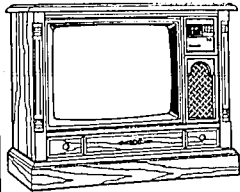
Geter served 15 months of a life sentence.

With help from family, friends, the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, and fellow workers at E-Systems, a defense contractor, Geter eventually won exoneration.

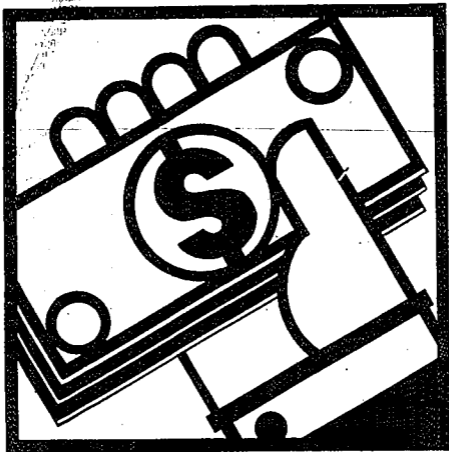

CBS slides 'I'll Take Manhattan' in record time to small screen

HOLLYWOOD — Even in the fast-paced world of television, which can turn real-life events into movies-of-the-week in a matter of months, CBS' handling of the Judith Krantz novel "I'll Take Manhattan" is something of a land-speed record.

The miniseries begins shooting in London on June 30, only six weeks after its official publication date of May 15. It will air nine months after its publication, during the February, 1987, "sweeps," a key period for audience measurement when the networks typically unveil their biggest guns.

Unlike motion pictures, which usually firm up top cast members as the first step in establishing box-office potential, TV is more likely to shoot from the hip. In the case of "I'll Take Manhattan," the main character of publishing heiress Maxi Amberville was only cast last week. She will be played by Valerie Ber-

(nell).

"It's always that way — these things come together in a blinding flash," said Steve Krantz, the miniseries' executive producer and the author's husband of 32 years. "It worries me, but on the other hand it would drive me to an early grave if I let it get me down."

Krantz disclosed in an interview here, however, that one key cast member has been set: author Krantz herself, in a minor role.

The producer said that "two arms and a leg" had been twisted to agree to this particular casting.

"It's been a bone of contention," he said. "I've kept her out of all of her shows that I've produced until now. She's too attractive on the set. She loves to talk and people love to talk to her, and somehow or other some work gets dropped in the process."

Judith Krantz said that acting is the only part she wants to play in the translation of her work from page to screen. "I've never set my

finger to a teleplay," she said.

She prefers instead to pound out books on her old Smith-Corona 2200, the same typewriter she used to write her first novel, "Scruples."

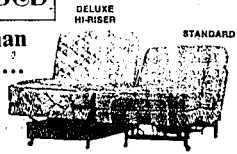

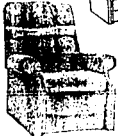

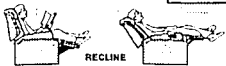

NBC wins a laughter in ratings, but '1986' dives in second week

NEW YORK — It was another laughier last week for NBC as the top-rated network placed six comedies among the top 10 in the Nielsen ratings, but its "1986" news magazine dived on its second outing.

With 14 of the top 20 shows, NBC won the week with a 12.7 rating, the A.C. Nielsen Co. reported Tuesday, followed by ABC at 11.1 and CBS at 10.6. It was the second week in a row, but only the sixth time in the current season, that CBS finished last.

Despite the controversy surrounding an interview with Palestinian terrorist commander Abul Abbas, "1986" fell to 53rd place last week after ranking 28th on its premier outing.

The special edition, anchored by Tom Brokaw and devoted entirely to the hijacking of the cruise liner Achille Lauro, had a rating of 8.5 and a 15 percent share of the audience in the time period, compared to a 12.3 rating and 23 share the previous week.

Each rating point represents 859,000 homes with television. The share is the portion of television sets in use at any given time.

A flurry of controversy preceded the show. NBC had used a bit of the Abbas interview on the "Nightly News" on May 5, prompting Robert Oakley, head of the state department's counterterrorism section to accuse the network of complicity with the terrorist. NBC provided a tape and transcript of its interview to the Justice Department, which is investigating Abbas. He is currently on trial in absentia in Italy.

"1986" will return to its normal format this week, with co-anchors Roger Mudd and Connie Chung.

"You go through a period of fluctuation in the summer," said Sharon Metcalf, Washington press director for NBC News. "I don't think two shows a rating makes."

"West 57th Street," NBC's flashy new prime-time news show, moved up from 48th to 42nd last week, with a rating of 10.1 and a 19 share.

"It certainly has shown an increase over the past few weeks, which is encouraging," said Mikki

Milone, the show's press representative. "The next five weeks will tell."

"West 57th Street" had a rating of 8.5 and a 16 share when it moved into the 10 p.m. Wednesday time slot two weeks ago, but that was against NBC and ABC shows normally seen at an earlier hour. They had been delayed by a presidential news conference.

"The Cosby Show" was again No. 1 last week, with a 23.9 rating and a 45 share, and its Thursday night companions — "Family Ties," "Cheers" and "Night Court" — held the next three places.

"Me and Mrs. C," a summer replacement on NBC's Saturday schedule, was fifth for the week, followed by "Golden Girls" and "Miami Vice." Both on NBC, ABC's "Growing Pains," NBC's "Remington Steele" and two ABC programs tied for 10th, "Who's the Boss?" and "Moonlighting."

German-born actor plays an American

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Eric Braeden's experience is typically American: working cowboy on a Montana ranch, sawmill worker, college athlete and river rafter.

Yet, Braeden, 51, is widely remembered for a role he did 20 years ago as a Nazi officer. He was Capt. Hauptman Hans Dietrich, commander of an armored unit in the Afrika Korps and nemesis of the four members of "The Rat Patrol" television series.

At that time Braeden was known as Hans Gudegast, the name he was born with in Kiel, Germany. He didn't set foot in this country until after he'd graduated from high school in Germany.

"I wasn't the usual kind of immigrant because it wasn't for political or religious reasons," said Braeden, who stars in the CBS soap opera "The Young and the Restless" as an American.

"To me, America meant a vision of adventure and freedom. Freedom from the constraints of bourgeois life. In Europe, your life is very restricted and that's boring. When I landed in New York it made an incredible impression on a boy coming from Germany."

Braeden went first to Galveston, Texas, then to Montana: "I worked on a ranch in Montana, which was a great experience," he said. "But the romance of being a cowboy vanished after the first day of hard riding. The ache goes right through your backside."

He attended Montana State University on a partial track scholarship, throwing the discus, shotput and javelin, and, he worked at a lumber mill to help pay expenses.

'Cosby,' 'Cagney' win Humanitas Prizes

LOS ANGELES — Love, understanding, compassion — those were the unifying elements among the six programs honored with the 12th annual Humanitas Prizes for television shows that best communicate enriching human values.

The prime-time awards went to the writers of episodes of "The Cosby Show" and "Cagney & Lacey," and of a TV movie about Alzheimer's disease that previously had won an Emmy, "Do You Remember Love."

Other winners announced in ceremonies June 19 at the Century Plaza hotel here were "No Greater Gift," an "ABC Afterschool Special"; "Main Street," NBC's news magazine for young people, and the CBS News documentary "The Vanishing Family — Crisis in Black America."

The purpose of the Humanitas Prizes, presented by the Human Family Educational and Cultural Institute, was summed up by writer-director David Seltzer, who won one

in 1975 for "Larry" and another in 1977 for "Green Eyes" and who is now on the institute's board of trustees.

The award, he told the audience of several hundred, is a way of saying, "Will all those (television writers) who have contributed something good to mankind please step forward?" I think this is no less than a Nobel Prize, this award.

The top prize of \$25,000, for prime-time programs 90 minutes or longer, went to Vickie Patik for "Do You Remember Love," a CBS movie that starred Joanne Woodward as a woman suffering from Alzheimer's disease.

In the category for hourlong programs, the \$15,000 prize was given to Robert Elsele for his "Cagney & Lacey" episode called "Ordinary

Hero," about an illegal alien from Chile who rescues a mugging victim in the United States only to be picked up later and nearly deported.

That episode of "Cagney & Lacey" was a double winner Thursday. It also won an Imagen Award by the Hispanic Media-Image Task Force of the National Conference of Christians & Jews for its positive portrayal of Latinos.

'Statue' filmmaker not going Hollywood

NEW YORK (AP) — Reluctantly, documentary filmmaker Ken Burns had to miss this year's Walpole, N.H., town meeting. He had gone Hollywood, in a manner of speaking. But it's a matter of public record that his fellow New Englanders understood.

"The local handyman, the guy who will come to your house and fix an emergency any hour of the night, apparently stood up at the annual meeting and said that Ken and Amy Burns are at the Academy Awards, and we just want to say that we're right proud of them," said Burns.

In telling the story, Burns' boyish face lit up. "That kind of thing has great meaning," he said.

Last March, Burns was 3,000 miles and a culture away from Walpole because his film, "The Statue of Liberty," had been nominated for an Oscar in the documentary film category — a major accomplishment for an independently produced film that was made for public television.

"Statue of Liberty" chronicled the history of France's gift and examined what liberty means today. The film, which recently was released on cassette by Vestron Video, will be rerun on public TV July 2.

His 1981 PBS film, "Brooklyn Bridge," also was nominated for an Academy Award. It also didn't win. Two other recent films, one about the Shakers, a religious group, the other profiling politician Huey Long, also received enthusiastic critical praise.

His next endeavor is a projected

five-part series on the Civil War for PBS.

This all could be a bit heady for a 32-year-old filmmaker who produces, directs and serves as cameraman on his projects. But Burns, who lives in Walpole with his wife, Amy, and their 3-year-old daughter, has a firm perspective on his life and career.

"The ego stuff is empty calories. There's no nutritional value in fame," Burns said. "I love good strokes and awards, too, but what's ultimately satisfying is the work. You can derail yourself by believing your own P.R."

But, surely, with his track record, Hollywood and the networks must have come courting, trying to lure him from Walpole and the self-described "Ma and Pa film company," he heads with his wife.

"There's been no full offer, but interest," Burns said, before explaining the personal and philosophical reasons why he'd prefer to make shoestring-budget films rather than expense-account productions.

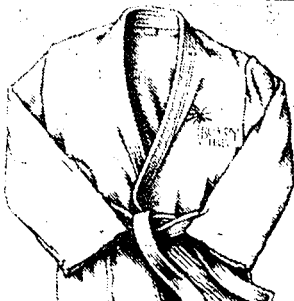
"PBS right now is the place for documentaries. You don't always get the budgets, but you get freedom and can develop your style. At the (commercial) networks, your style would be subservient to the network needs.

"At PBS, the word is underwriting, not investing. Investing means control. Liberty Mutual (the insurance company) funded the 'Statue of Liberty.' I showed them what I was doing, but they had no say in the content."
