Liberty's torch burns brightly again

NEW YORK — The Statue of Liberty, her newly lighted torch held high, resumed her reign as a shining beacon to the world Thursday night while millions of people, two presidents and an armada of sail and sea power hailed her first hundred years.

The statue was illuminated anew in New York Harbor in a gala, patriotic ceremony highlighted by the swearing-in of hundreds of new citizens, a show-business extravaganza and a rededication of friendship between France and the United States.

President Reagan presided as the torch was rekindled and fireworks exploded over the darkened harbor to the strains of "Stars and Stripes Forever."

Earlier, he pressed a button that sent a laser through the night and triggered a 1.4 million-watt light show illuminating the statue and marking the rebirth of the monu-

Reagan proclaims 'a light unto the nations'

NEW YORK — President Reagan, great-grandson of an Irish immigrant, reit the Statue of Liberty's torch Thursday night and proclaimed it "a beacon of hope, a light unto the nations."

"In remarks that climaxed with the lighting of the torch and a burst of fireworks, the president said the bond that ties Americans together is "an abiding love of liberty."

"For love of liberty, our forebears — colonists, few in number and with little themselves — fought a war for independence with what was then the world's most powerful empire," he said.

ment after a \$66 million facelift.

The laser beam bathed the base of the 151-foot statue in red light, then blue, and finally a brilliant white light from 156,000-watt lamps.

"For love of liberty, those who came before us tamed a vast wilderness and braved hardships which, at times, were beyond the limits of human endurance."

"For love of liberty, a bloody and heart-wrenching civil war was fought. And for love of liberty, Americans championed and still champion—even in times of peril — the cause of human freedom in far-off lands."

Reagan, whose policy of supporting anti-

communist rebels in Nicaragua and other countries has aroused controversy, mentioned no specifics.

"We are the keepers of the flame of liberty; We hold it high tonight for the world to see," he said.

Earlier, Reagan saluted the Statue of Liberty as "everybody's gal" and said she "is still giving life to the dream."

White House spokesman Mark Weinberg said the president and Mrs. Reagan pushed the switch together to turn on the lights.

He said Reagan called the moment "deeply symbolic for 'the tired, poor, unpropped people of the world.'"

Thousands of new citizens in 47 cities were being sworn in over the weekend, including 292 Thursday

night by Chief Justice Warren Burger on Ellis Island, where 12 million immigrants were processed in the statue's shadow over the years.

Among those taking the oath on Ellis Island were international ballet star Mikhail Baryshnikov; Hoang Phook, who walked for 10 days to escape his native Cambodia; and comedian Yakov Smirnov.

Immigrants in Miami, St. Louis and San Francisco simultaneously took the oath via television from Burger, who was performing one of his last official acts as chief justice.

The unveiling of the Statue of Liberty and relighting of her torch, after a restoration project aided by corporations — and school children alike, opened four days of pomp, ceremony and a kaleidoscope of entertainment in honor of the statue and Independence Day.

The Reagans arrived on windswept Governors Island and were greeted by a uniformed honor guard.

Idaho lottery goes on ballot for November

BOISE — Idahoans apparently will get a chance to vote on a state lottery in the November general election.

Sponsors of an initiative drive for a lottery Thursday afternoon turned in petitions bearing 49,308 signatures, far more than the 32,666 needed.

"Based on that number, I'd say it's almost certain that it will be on the ballot," said Secretary of State Pete Cenarrusa, although the names haven't been checked yet.

"But the fate of a second initiative measure seeking tougher penalties for drunken drivers was not as certain," Cenarrusa said — its sponsors submitted 25,862.

It also needed 32,666 valid signatures of registered voters, but Cenarrusa said he would accept petitions through Monday. The legal deadline is Friday, but the secretary of state's office will be closed on the Fourth of July and the weekend.

Signatures of all the petitions for both initiatives still must be validated, Cenarrusa said.

With lotteries in neighboring Washington and Oregon, pressure

has been building in Idaho for a lottery. But the Legislature has refused to allow the state constitution to be amended to remove a ban on lotteries.

Sen. James Risch, R-Boise, led a drive which produced more than 20,000 signatures the last four days. "There was a tremendous response the last week," said Risch, Senate president pro tem.

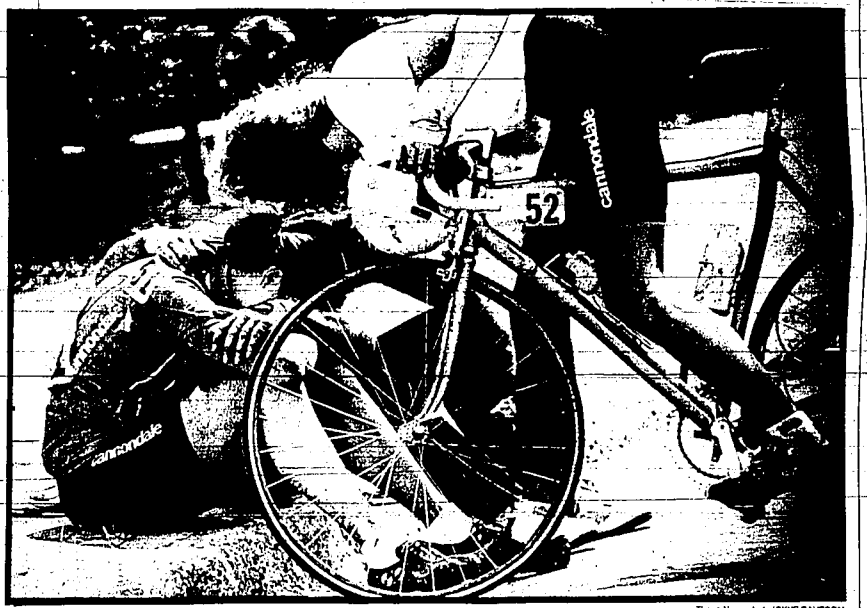
"But it also was an emotional moment. The widows of two leaders of the lottery movement — both men killed in separate accidents since April, turned in nearly 200,000 signatures of work by a lot of people but now it's done."

Judith Lannen, widow of Sen. Vernon Lannen, D-Pinehurst, said the lottery issue has very strong support in northern Idaho. "He (Lannen) worked on it for the last three years," she said.

Relly, a candidate for lieutenant governor, was killed in an airplane crash while campaigning April 10. Lannen, unopposed for another two-year term, was killed June 19 in a logging accident.

Risch said there was some fear that the deaths of two leaders in the initiative drive would kill en-

Chairmen close on wording for tax overhaul

WASHINGTON — The chairmen of the House and Senate tax-writing committees, previewing talks on revamping the nation's tax laws, say they'll try to combine the low rates of the Senate plan with the House's tax relief for the middle class.

But that will cost money. And while both chairmen point to tightening business tax breaks, exactly which industries will be asked to ante up — and who is to be the "middle class" that will benefit — are potential sticking points for the ap-

proaching House-Senate tax conference talks.

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the House Ways and Means Committee, and Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, have not been talking even privately during the Congress' Fourth of July recess, according to aides to both lawmakers.

But they've been publicly laying out their positions for the conference scheduled to begin July 16.

Rostenkowski, in a speech last Friday in Boston, said he was willing to accept the politically popular per-

sonal tax rates of 15 and 27 percent in the Senate bill. But he said the House bill, even with its top rate of 38 percent, is more beneficial to the middle class, and he'll maintain that position in the House-Senate conference scheduled to begin July 16.

"If the House conferees have one mission, it's to guarantee fairness for middle-income families," Rostenkowski said. "They're the real victims of an unfair tax system, and they ought to come away the real winners."

"I would be willing to shoot for the Senate's top rate as long as we approach the House's after-tax income

distribution," Rostenkowski said. "Once we agree on the rate structure and relative tax burdens, we are then faced with the sticky choices of how to pay the bills."

Packwood, in an interview with the editorial board of the Portland Oregonian, responded that he was willing to tighten some corporate breaks also to help middle class taxpayers — if he could keep the Senate bill's rates, according to an article published in the newspaper Thursday.

"It's — a good agreement," Packwood said.

Agreement near on summit planning

WASHINGTON — The United States and the Soviet Union are hearing agreement on a meeting to plan a Ronald Reagan-Mikhail S. Gorbachev summit, but Moscow is holding off until its latest proposal to reduce strategic nuclear weapons draws a response, U.S. officials said Thursday.

The planning would involve the Kremlin rescheduling a visit here — probably in September — by Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze to map an agenda with Secretary of

State George P. Shultz.

The meeting initially was scheduled for mid-May, but the Soviets canceled it to protest the U.S. bombing of Libya in mid-April. In the meantime, they tabled at negotiations in Geneva a proposal to reduce U.S. and Soviet long-range bombers, intercontinental ballistic missile and nuclear-boosting submarines.

President Reagan called it a serious proposal, worthy of U.S. consideration, but the talks recessed last month without a U.S. response.

U.S. officials, insisting on anonymity, said the Soviets wanted one before giving final approval for

Shevardnadze to see Shultz in September, when they both are due to attend the special session of the U.N. General Assembly.

Reagan may at least give a preliminary response when he answers the letter he received from Gorbachev last week. In it, U.S. officials said, the Soviet leader called for progress in all phases of arms control negotiations and an ending the testing of nuclear weapons.

State Department and other U.S. officials are drafting a reply for Reagan. However, Larry Spang, the White House spokesman, said "it will be a while" before the president

replies to Gorbachev.

Reagan told USA Today that Gorbachev's message made him "optimistic that we're not only going to have a summit, but that we're going to reach agreement on some of the goals that we share."

He also told the newspaper: "We have said from the very beginning that we would like a reduction of nuclear weapons leading to the ultimate elimination of such weapons. Well, now they have said the same thing. And if we both want the same thing, we ought to be able to find a way to reach that goal."

Glorious 4th show spreads across land

The Statue of Liberty is the star, but the show is spreading across America for the Fourth of July, despite higher insurance rates everywhere and wretched relief accumulating in the strike-bound streets of Philadelphia.

Festivities for the 211th edition of the glorious Fourth included a polka explosion in Chicago, the Farm Aid II concert in Texas, a 21-gun salute from "Old Ironsides" in Boston and a paddleswift race on the Mississippi.

Although the high cost of insurance doused fireworks shows in Madisonville, Ky., and Morton, Ill., most of the country could count on the traditional explosive illuminations in the night sky.

Insurance was a headache for country star Willie Nelson in organizing Farm Aid II, a musical benefit for farmers. Nelson couldn't get insurance to hold the fete at the University of Texas Stadium in Austin, and wound up at Manor Downs south of town.

The first Farm Aid concert, held last September at Cham-

paign, Ill., raised about \$9 million. Nelson hopes to attract a crowd of 40,000 to hear 10 hours of music ranging from Judy Collins to Doug Kershaw to the Beach Boys to Waylon Jennings.

Chief Justice Warren Burger, Chrysler president Lee Iacocca and Cardinal John O'Connor rang in Liberty Week-end in New York on Thursday, tolling a replica of the Liberty Bell, and Pope John Paul II conveyed his prayer "that the religious faith which brought so many to your shores and which continues to be the most precious heritage of its citizens."

America acquired hundreds of new citizens on Thursday, in naturalization ceremonies timed to coincide with a televised ceremony from Ellis Island.

A 6-foot-tall, 1,000-pound Statue of Liberty cake served 500 veterans, former prisoners of war and military dignitaries at the Veteran's Administration Medical center in West-Los Angeles Thursday.

Thursday afternoon, Michigan Gov. James Blanchard opened a "Roll-Call Of Freedom" celebration on Mackinac Island.

Slaying victim found in Idaho

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Authorities stumbled on a slaying after the driver of a pickup truck, pulled over on a traffic stop, said he stole the vehicle and killed its owner, police said.

Terry Lee Brown, 36, of Swetsville, N.C., was held at the El Paso County Jail in lieu of \$75,000 bond on police charges of being a fugitive from justice for auto-theft, said Jerry Tolbert, an investigator with the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The body of a woman found some 38 miles south of Coeur d'Alene, Idaho, was identified Thursday as that of Elizabeth Ann Canfield, 74, of Upton, Wyo., said Robert Burton, assistant district attorney in Kootenai County, Idaho.

Crews battle Idaho forest fire

RIGGINS (AP) — More than 500 U.S. Forest Service firefighters battled a lightning-caused blaze Thursday in the Goshute National Forest.

The Cherry Creek fire was detected Wednesday morning and covered more than 300 acres by Thursday afternoon, said fire officer Oliver Goldammer. The blaze is about 20 miles up the Salmon River from Riggins.

An airplane dropped retardant and helicopters dropped water on the blaze Wednesday, but the fire could not be slowed because of gusting winds.

Goldammer said fire crews from the Northwest were being brought in to help build the fire line. Crews were expected to man the hills all weekend.

Judge Sirica to retire Oct. 1

WASHINGTON (AP) — U.S. District Judge John J. Sirica, who presides over the Watergate trials of President Richard Nixon from the White House, said Thursday he will retire on Oct. 1.

"I'm 82 years old. I've been on the bench almost 30 years. I think I've paid my dues," he said in a telephone interview.

The judge went into semi-retirement as a senior judge in 1977, but has been going to the courthouse almost daily on an as-needed basis.

"I've done the best I've known how to do, but I don't believe I've been doing justice to my family. Now my wife and I will have the opportunity to take longer vacations and travel," he said.

Bomb hurts 2 police officers

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A bomb apparently planted in a flower box exploded at a Cape Town police station Thursday, wounding two officers and blowing glass and rubble across a main street.

The sound of the explosion thundered through the suburb Monday during the morning rush hour. It was the 11th urban bombing since a nationwide state of emergency was imposed June 12 and the first that targeted security forces.

Three blacks were burned to death in separate incidents, the Bureau for Information said, raising to 97 the number of people killed during the emergency. Fourteen other deaths have been reported by black authorities in two tribal homelands.

Reject violence, pope pleads

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Pope John Paul II stood in a park on the edge of a squalid sea of slums Thursday and urged throngs of Colombia's poor to reject violence and class struggle despite their crushing poverty.

"I speak of those who suffer the pain of seeing their children without enough to eat, to dress and to be educated," the pontiff said.

"The solution to this problem is not easy," John Paul said in declaring that the Roman Catholic Church — while seeking justice for all — does not endorse "programmed class struggle, which leads to new forms of slavery."

Brazilian hotel fire claims 6

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil (AP) — A small hotel caught fire in the southern city of Foz do Iguaçu, killing six people as they slept, officials said Thursday.

About 50 other guests fled to safety from the two-story wooden building, according to police in Foz do Iguaçu, 940 miles southwest of Rio.

Fire Department Sgt. Jose Pereira da Silva said the fire broke out just before midnight Wednesday and was brought under control at 5:29 a.m. Thursday.

The hotel was frequented mainly by poor people and did not keep a guest register, Silva said.

Chile cracks down on strikers

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — Chile's military government charged two news magazines with state security violations Thursday in its widening crackdown against an opposition-led strike that crippled commuter traffic for a second day.

Protests Wednesday and Thursday against the military government left three people dead, 36 wounded by gunfire and more than 600 demonstrators arrested, the government news agency ORBE reported.

The agency said 75 bombs went off in 12 cities during the two-day protest, including three that shut off electricity Wednesday night to more than half the country's 12 million people.

The televised spectacular began with the national anthem of the United States and France, followed by remarks from Mitterrand, who wished the statue and America a happy birthday.

The audience for the ceremonies includes millions of people in the United States and 33 other countries, while 6 million to 15 million were expected to witness the festivities like street fairs, the world's biggest fireworks display, biggest marching band, open-air concerts and superstar-studded extravaganzas in New Jersey and New York.

Uplifting bells rang for 2 1/2 minutes at the cathedral to commemorate the state's century-old vigil at the harbor's "golden door," where generations of immigrants entered the country to begin new lives.

Thousands of ships jammed the harbor, from the graceful tall vessels that have sailed the seven seas to the grand gray dreadnoughts that fought in this city's wars to the elegant Queen Elizabeth II and sleek yachts and pleasure craft that darted through the waters between New York and New Jersey. Billions were expected to witness the event. Police were called Thursday evening to remove hundreds of riders who refused to leave the Staten Island ferry, which offers a grand view of the statue for an un-grand fare of 25 cents. The unusual sea traffic earlier delayed scheduled runs of the ferry, and nearly 20,000 people were crammed into the ferry's terminal at the tip of Manhattan for more than an hour.

Although the waters were congested with traffic, the automobile gridlock feared by city officials failed to materialize Thursday as more cars escaped from New York than ventured into it.

The culmination of three years of work to restore the statue began Thursday as foggers greeted the arrival of the New Jersey coast of the magnificent tall ships, 22 vessels from all over the world that will parade up the Hudson River on Friday in a pageant of sail.

Winds of more than 25 mph whipped up 6-foot waves and stranded the captains of all but one of the tall ships aboard their vessels, preventing launches from taking them to unveiling ceremonies on Governors Island.

On the New Jersey side of the river, about 1,000 people camped out with sleeping bags and blankets in parks in Weehawken to get the best view of the statue.

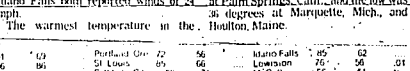
Synopsis: A storm system dropping down from the Gulf of Alaska continued to make its way toward Idaho on Thursday, the National Weather Service said.



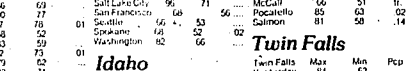

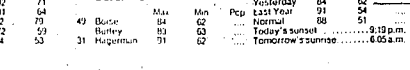

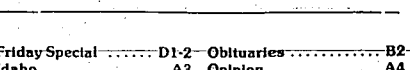
The warmest temperature in the state Thursday was 91 degrees in Hagerman, while Elk City had the low of 37 degrees.

Echohawk must choose job

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Larry Echohawk, D-Pocatello, will have to make a choice between serving in the Idaho Legislature and as Bannock County prosecutor, the attorney general's office says, because he can't hold both jobs at the same time.

Echohawk has been appointed by the Bannock County Commission as county prosecutor, effective July 21. The two-term legislator also has no Republican opposition in the fall election.

But in a letter to Echohawk on Thursday, an opinion said it is clear that state laws prohibit any prosecutor from holding a state or county office at the same time.

Before he can be sworn in as county prosecutor, the opinion said, Echohawk will have to resign his legislative position.

First money to state schools

BOISE (AP) — State Treasurer Marjorie Ruth Moon said the first bills that will be paid from \$140 million borrowed this week to help meet the state's short-term cash flows will go to state schools and teacher retirement.

Moon, the Democratic candidate for lieutenant governor, said Thursday about \$3 million was withheld from the state's May school payment and \$7 million was withheld from the teachers' retirement program to help with the state's budget crunch.

Moon went to national money markets for the fourth time in the state's history in June. She said she signed 5,600 individual tax notes and turned them over to the underwriter, Bankers Trust, for sale.

The state received the \$140 million on Tuesday and the funds have been invested and will earn interest in the meantime.

Boise mayor outlines budget

BOISE (AP) — Boise would maintain services without federal revenue-sharing and without dipping into the city's \$2.3 million surplus under a \$32.5 million budget proposed by Mayor Dirk Kempthorne for fiscal 1987.

Kempthorne's budget, submitted to the Boise City Council on Wednesday, would cut the current jobs and increase fees for garbage collection, planning and zoning applications, athletics and some fire services.

The budget, even without \$2 million in revenue contingent on legislative approval of additional city taxing authority, projects a surplus of \$4,685. But it does not include any funds for may be that we have to adjust the budget somewhat (to accommodate possible salary and benefit increases), Kempthorne said.

The budget recommendations will be considered by the city council in daylong hearings from Tuesday through Friday next week.

Railroad line deal 'travesty'

MISSOULA, Mont. (AP) — A \$3.7 million payment by the U.S. Forest Service for portions of the abandoned Milwaukee Road line in western Montana and northern Idaho was a "travesty," according to Sen. John Melcher, D-Mont.

The payment, made Wednesday, went to Idaho sawmill operator John Edwards and his associates for 1,340 acres of former railroad right-of-way appraised by the Forest Service at \$321,000.

"I think the price was inflated," Melcher said. "I think it's not really good, sound policy at all."

But Melcher said he was powerless to stop the payment after Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, slipped a last-minute rider onto Congress' end-of-the-year appropriations bill in December.

Water firm gains rate boost

BOISE (AP) — Barber Water Corporation will be allowed to raise its rates by 11.86 percent after showing it has improved the operation of one of its two wells, the Idaho Public Utilities Commission ruled.

In an order issued Tuesday, commissioners said a new flat rate of \$0.90 a month, up from the current \$0.85, will go into effect after the company certifies installation of a new pump at its No. 1 well.

The company is expected to have repairs made by Aug. 1, the PUC said.

The rate will remain in effect through April 30, 1987, when seasonal rates of \$10.90 for summer, which includes May through October, and \$0.90 for winter, which includes November through April, will begin.

No damages to Montanan, court rules

BOISE (AP) — A Montana man who claimed a fundamentalist splinter group of the Roman Catholic Church alienated his wife and family from him is not entitled to \$750,000 in damages, the Idaho Supreme Court ruled.

The high court on Thursday ruled 4-1 that Jerry O'Neil failed to prove that the Kootenai County-based Tridentine Latin Rite Church, also known as the Fatima Crusade, intruded on the seclusion of the O'Neil family.

Justice Stephen Bistline wrote a dissenting opinion.

The majority opinion concluded that the church didn't invade O'Neil's privacy in attempts to destroy his marriage.

The Fatima Crusade adheres to the beliefs of the Roman Catholic Church as "taught" prior to the Vatican Council II, which concluded in 1967. The splinter group believes that marriages between Catholics and non-Catholics are not valid unless the non-Catholic has taken instruction in the faith and has agreed that any children in the marriage be raised as Catholics.

O'Neil and his former wife, Pauline, were married in 1965 and had five children in a span of eight years, according to the ruling. Mrs. O'Neil's mother and sister were involved in the church when Mrs. O'Neil decided to learn more about it in 1974, justices said.

Church leaders told Mrs. O'Neil that she could not live with her husband as his wife, but could live with him as though he were her brother, according to the ruling.

The O'Neils later became divorced in Montana, and O'Neil was given custody of the children. However, some of the children eventually moved in with their mother.

A jury in 1983 awarded O'Neil \$250,000 for alienating the affections of his wife and \$500,000 in punitive damages. The five children each were awarded \$50,000 for invasion of their privacy.

However, that decision was overturned by 1st District Judge Walt Prather and the state's high court affirmed that decision.

Autopsy confirms shot

SANDPOINT (AP) — An autopsy on the body of a man who attacked a Hope, Idaho, couple with a hammer early Sunday morning.

The Pacific, Calif., man, a longtime friend of the couple, was a guest in their home. He also resided in Missoula.

For unknown reasons, police said, Scherar began attacking the couple while they slept. They suffered severe cuts and bruises, investigators said.

Mrs. Reynolds' arm was broken in the attack, deputies reported.

After the couple escaped, Scherar shot himself.

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Our precious liberty could be endangered

The gift of a bronze Lady of Liberty, a century ago this year, was a symbol of French appreciation for the American experiment. It came, fittingly, from the French people, not its government.

The statue was accepted in New York harbor only after New York World publisher Joseph Pulitzer mobilized his one million readers to contribute pennies and nickels to build its base.

In his newspaper, he published the names of every contributor, from child to industrialist; the stunt was an early form of instant visibility which has now become such a common feature of our instant-celebrity age.

Looking ahead, Pulitzer and many others wondered what the nation would be like a century later. They could see, for example, the outlines of mass immigration and the dawn of an electric era. Today, although they would surely be struck by the changes, there would be much that would be familiar.

The statue is still there, now as then, a symbol. Refurbished and glorious, it is being honored by a thunderous appreciation of tall ships, ocean liners, military craft and hundreds of thousands of American citizens of every race, color, creed and party.

So what if there is lots of hype? America in the waning years of the 20th Century has become, if nothing else, a media society. That is also something Pulitzer would understand very well.

We are tied together by a common language, common advertising, common publications and common broadcast shows. We shop at the same mall chain stores, buy the same cars, wash our clothes in the same detergents, read and watch much of the same national news.

For better or worse, the "McDonaldization" of American culture has already advanced as far as it is likely to.

A perceptive French observer, Alexis deTocqueville, understood clearly more than 150 years ago that great test of the American experiment was in how we could forge room for individualism within majority rule. Today, that remains a great challenge.

Pluralism and diversity have always been the natural enemy of order. It was an issue in Roman times for Cicero. It is an issue today for Edwin Meese and William Casey.

In another century, America may well be recognizable. But there will be changes. We are likely to be, for example, a collection of disparate nations. Consider this fact: by the year 2000, if present demographic trends hold, three states in the country will have a majority in Congress: Florida, Texas and California.

All three today show evidence of the coming changes. They have huge populations. They are extremely heterogeneous, with multi-racial, multi-ethnic, multi-linguistic, multi-religious communities. Their government and corporate structures are mammoth. There are enormous gaps between wealth and poverty, ownership and wage slavery.

Today, we celebrate how our precious liberty has been protected. We ought also to look ahead at how it might be curtailed.

Porn may follow down Bunny club trail

BOSTON — Forgive me if I do not mourn the passing of the Playboy clubs.

I wasn't at the closing ceremonies in Chicago or New York or Los Angeles. I had no key to turn in, you see, no souvenir cars to take home for memento. I had no nostalgia for illusions past. If there is an afterlife, I only hope that the comedian in the Chicago club is right: "I envision a bunny heaven where bunnies are served drinks by middle-aged businessmen in funny little costumes." For eternity.

Over a life span of 26 years, 1 million men were members of Playboy clubs and 25,000 women encased themselves in the costumed push-up costumes. They learned to do the bunny dips and get the bunny tips. But the only thing that remained unchanged on closing night was the age of the woman on Hugh Hefner's arm. She was 22.

I don't know exactly who killed this golden bunny. The last big-city hutch closed because they were no longer "hip." Only those franchises keep the logo alive in more middle America.

But I have a list of suspects, three of them from different backgrounds with different values.

First on my list, certainly Hefner's list, is his favorite all-time "hip" — "the authoritarians and true-believers," the fundamentalists on a conchuck trail.

Second are men who finally outgrew the adolescent image of women as cottontails. Third are the consumers who left the Playboy market behind, "graduating" from the risqué to the raunchy.

They make an odd threesome — these suspects — and yet, it seems that they often form the triangular team that debates sexual politics today.

They are behind the closing ceremonies of the Playboy clubs. They are arguing over the removal of magazines at convenience stores. They are rebutting and re-rebutting the report of the Attorney General's Commission on Pornography.

What labels, however simplistic, can we apply to such a trio? Puritans-Humanists, X-rated Sexual Consumers.

In the last 30 years, American attitudes toward sexual values have gravitated toward these three distant corners.

In one corner, people rally around an external standard, the biblical arbiter of sexual do and don'ts.

In another, people seek some internal standard of love, both erotic and caring, as their guideline for sexual intimacy.

In a third and darkest corner are those who have no standard at all beyond exploitation. It is too much of an exaggeration to say that one group would dress those former bunnies in purdah, another in independence, while a third would strip them down to genitals?

The most unsettled corner of this triangle is one that holds those Humanists (for want of a better word) who see caring, at least mutual consent, as the basic standard by which to judge sexual behavior.

We arr, for the most part, people trying to

avoid both exploitation and repression. For the most part, we are successful in private life. But in public life we find ourselves pushed into uncomfortable affinity with both Puritans and X-rated Sexual Consumers.

When 4,500 7-Eleven stores removed Playboy and Penthouse, I for one could not work up any outrage at their disappearance.

If I no longer passed a man idly scanning naked pictures of women on my way to the toothpaste shelf, I couldn't rue that as a loss of liberty.

Yet I know that I do not share the same goals or values as the boycotters. I surely do not approve the tactics of the pornography commission, whose letter intimidated these stores.

As for the commission report itself, those of us who abhor pornography because it exploits any standard of caring are uncomfortable with the absolutist First Amendment defense of Sexual Consumers. But we are also uncomfortable in alliance with Puritans who find dangerous smut in "Ulysses."

Many of us had hoped the commission would draw an acceptable line between the erotic and the pornographic, between license and banning. We hoped they would blaze some path between free speech and violent smut. Instead, we are left standing uneasily in a corner.

The Playboy clubs opened in an era when television still showed married couples in twin beds. Few of us want to return to the control of Puritans. Nor do we regard X-rated Sexual Consumers as progressives.

From our beleaguered corner, we can still hope that pornography will end the way the Playboy Clubs ended: There just weren't enough customers anymore.

Results from election must be accurate

I am running for the office of Twin Falls County clerk, auditor, and recorder, and the confusion over the voting machines and ballot counting in the primary election has me very concerned.

I worked in that office for 33 years and am quite familiar with the procedures involved in the use of the voting machines, loading them with the paper for the print out and the counting procedures following.

The newspaper articles that I have read concerning Mr. Pence's conduct do not make any sense.

I am particularly concerned about the report that the county commission approved the voting by using altered figures according to the curves in the numbers that they could see. Certainly, this is no way to count votes.

It is impossible to determine whether the machines, because of their age, cannot be used and are completely useless because of the inability to get proper supplies for them, or whether Mr. Pence just doesn't know how to order supplies, fill the machines, or count the votes.

It has to be one of those items. I am thoroughly

disappointed that if the machines cannot function, the county commissioners and Mr. Pence should not notify the public that the machines should be scrapped.

If we cannot afford new machines, we should go back to hand counted ballots.

Election results must be accurate, and there can be no question as to their results, whether it comes from deliberate miscounting or just incompetence in handling the equipment.

It would seem that there should be no cover-ups, and everything should be placed in front of the public for their use.

There is not only a single sheet printed by the machine, but five copies. Although the original sheet should be kept protected during the period of time a protest can be filed, there is no reason whatsoever why the other duplicate sheets cannot be made available to the press and the public for their consideration. Mr. Lancaster, the

former clerk, always posted these duplicate sheets for everyone to see.

We all know that there was some kind of mess in the counting of the primary ballots, but none of us have been allowed to see the printout sheets so that it can be determined what caused the mess.

It doesn't seem that Mr. Pence and Mr. Hempleman, both being candidates, should have checked totals without both parties being present when they opened the voting machines. Mr. Pence and Mr. Hempleman should be just as cautious to protect my totals as any other candidate.

As a voter and a candidate, I ask only that the county commissioners and Mr. Pence be open and forthright with the voters of Twin Falls County so that we can be assured of an honest and accurate count in the general election. If we cannot use the machines, they should be disposed of.

Letters sent now count

The cuts in federal funding, with no corresponding raise in state funding, have hit hard at the cooperative extension programs in Idaho. Some of the changes being considered by campus and state groups at the University of Idaho, if implemented, will be devastating to the extension home economics and 4-H programs.

From the beginning of cooperative extension, the programs in support of homemakers and youth have been considered essential for the support of farm families, because farming is a family affair.

Do you need information concerning the safety and/or nutrition of the food you are about to freeze, can or dry? Information about the wearability of the fabric you are considering for your family's clothes? Information about how to cut corners to make your money and the end of the month come out even? Information about how to manage your family's stress in order to cope with reduced income, loss of job, or family farm?

Information because someone ripped you off and you don't know where to go for help? We have, at present, a dedicated staff of people who are underpaid but loyal to Idaho and focus on these areas of food, nutrition

and health, family economic stability and security, family strengths and social environment. Most of this information is free and is provided through radio, newspapers, newsletters, workshops, telephone and computers.

The loss of extension home economics will certainly reduce the 4-H program across the state. It will short change our young people who look to these educational projects to learn by doing and acquire knowledge in agricultural sciences and family living, develop practical living skills, and form attitudes that enable them to become self-directing and contributing members of society.

They learn to respect and get along with people. There are only so many hours in a day and the urgent problems in any extension office will take priority. Will it be considered that urgent? And who will train the volunteers of tomorrow?

Do you consider these programs worth keeping? What can you do about it? Now is the time to write to Dr. Larry Brann, acting dean, University of Idaho, College of Agriculture, Moscow, Idaho 83843. You might also send a copy to your state

legislators. Any suggestions you might have to make home economics and 4-H programs more efficient and cost effective would be welcomed. There is strength in numbers, and your letter does count.

Court keeps records shut

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special three-judge federal court ruled Thursday that two newspapers cannot have access to federal grand jury testimony considered crucial to the prosecution of former Labor Secretary Raymond J. Donovan.

The panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Washington held in abeyance, however, a request by Bronx, N.Y., District Attorney Mario Merola to use the grand jury testimony and documents from a special prosecutor's investigation as evidence in the scheduled Sept. 2 trial of Donovan on fraud and larceny charges.

In the meantime, the court lifted its Monday "gag rule" prohibitory order had also prohibited the papers from reporting on their own efforts to gain access to the grand jury testimony and to the court proceedings on Merola's request.

Trains collide, 2 men die

FLEMING, Mo. (AP) — A freight train rammed head-on into another freight and burst into flames Thursday, killing two crew members and leaving a third missing, authorities said.

Smoke pouring from the damaged Santa Fe Railway engines was visible 15 miles from the scene of the accident, about 25 miles east of Kansas City.

Two bodies were found in the twisted, hot metal, and officers searched for the third crew member, said Ray County Sheriff Thomas Harmon.

The fire was extinguished about five hours after the 9:30 a.m. accident, but the engines were too hot for the bodies to be recovered.

Broyhill fills Senate seat

RALEIGH, N.C. (AP) — Republican Rep. Jim Broyhill became the newest member of the U.S. Senate on Thursday, appointed by the governor to complete the term of the late John East.

The appointment by North Carolina's Republican Gov. Jim Martin had been widely expected since East, who had declined to seek re-election because of poor health, committed suicide Sunday.

Broyhill, 58, is expected to assume his new post July 14, when Congress reconvenes after its Independence Day recess.

FBI issues terror report

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jewish extremists committed four of the seven domestic terrorist acts that killed two people in 1985, but the number of incidents was less than half that of the previous year, the FBI reported Thursday.

Puerto Rican terrorists were responsible for two incidents in 1985, while a radical group known as the Red Guerrilla Resistance carried out a bombing on Feb. 22, 1985, the FBI said. All told 10 people were injured in terrorism in the United States.

A 41-page report, prepared by the FBI's Terrorist Research and Analytical Center, said five of the seven incidents last year were bombings, one was a rocket attack and another a shooting.

Judge bars naming retailers

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge ruled Thursday that the Reagan administration cannot publish the names of retailers who sell sexually explicit magazines as Playboy, Penthouse and Pitygirl.

U.S. District Judge John Garrett Penn also ordered the Attorney General's Commission on Pornography to repudiate a letter sent to bookstores and major drug and convenience store chains which the publishers said was intended to intimidate them into taking the magazines off their stands.

Dee Kuhn, a commission spokeswoman, said the issue "is basically moot" because the commission will go out of business next Tuesday in conjunction with the issuance of its final report.

Weekend road toll placed at over 500

CHICAGO (AP) — Five hundred to 600 people may die in traffic accidents during the three-day Fourth of July weekend, the National Safety Council estimates.

During a non-holiday July weekend, 530 deaths might occur, spokeswoman Carole Unterberg said Thursday.

The holiday period used in compiling the highway death toll begins at 6 p.m. Thursday and ends at midnight Sunday, local time, the council said.

During the weekend, 34 million Americans will travel by car or other personal vehicle, the council estimates.

PG-13 Rating Introduced

A new rating category is in place as of July 1. This new category is inserted between the current PG and R ratings. It is designated as "PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for attendance of children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children."

The revised five-category system of the voluntary film industry rating program is now as follows:

- 1. General Audiences, all ages admitted.
- 2. Parental guidance suggested. Some material may not be suitable for children.
- 3. PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for attendance of children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children.
- 4. Restricted, under-17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian.
- 5. R: No one under 17 admitted. All films rated after July 1 will be given ratings under the new five-category system.

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Leaders of unions push certification

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — Leaders of the nation's two teacher unions, gathering here and in Chicago, on Thursday sought rank-and-file support for a national board to set higher certification standards for teachers and boost the profession's status.

In her keynote address to more than 7,000 National Education Association delegates gathered here, union President Mary Hatwood Futrell said, "I believe a national board could offer much to our profession," but added that states should retain the power to license teachers.

In Chicago, where 3,000 American Federation of Teachers delegates were gathering for Friday's start of their biennial convention, AFT president Albert Shanker released a report calling for a revolution in the way schools are run.

The report by an AFT task force echoed the call for a national standards board, along with other changes aimed at increasing teachers' power and prestige.

The idea of creating a national standards board was advanced in May by the Carnegie Task Force on Education and the Economy in a highly publicized reform proposal.

Futrell, who along with Shanker served on the Carnegie panel, emphasized the importance of state boards.

"An integrated model, indeed a model patterned after our federal government, is what is needed and desired," she said.

Her position has drawn fire as too timid from her Shanker, her ardent supporter. He insisted that state certification boards are part of the reason teachers lack the prestige of other professions, such as law and medicine.

SUII, interviews with several teachers after Futrell's speech suggested that NEA members considered her position sufficiently bold, with several predicting sharp debate on the matter during the convention, which ends Sunday.

"I've always been in favor of national standards. But I think this will be a hotly debated item," said William T. Koe, an 11th-grade history teacher from Glendale, Ariz. "There are many teachers here who believe that teachers should not get in the position of being managers."

Becky Melhus, a music teacher from the Mayville-Portland consolidated school district in North Dakota, said she thought a national standards board might help in a state like hers where certification standards have occasionally been relaxed to fill teaching jobs.

SEC office preferred romance to regulation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Supervisors and employees at the Washington regional office of the Securities and Exchange Commission participated in romantic liaisons, frequent parties and drank together during long "lunch hours," according to an internal investigation prompted by a sex discrimination complaint.

The SEC's own Equal Employment Opportunity office made that finding in denying the complaint filed by Catherine A. Broderick, a 35-year-old lawyer who alleged that she suffered as a result of widespread sexual misconduct and favoritism practiced by top management at the regional office.

"All in all, an atmosphere exists at the Washington regional office where drinking and sexual involvements among staff are not unusual, and where most of it is engaged in by members of upper management," the SEC's decision said.

"That finding notwithstanding, the Equal Employment Opportunity office rejected Broderick's claim that she was retaliated against for filing the complaint."

Ironically the Washington regional office was closed and merged into the Philadelphia branch on May 16, the same day the SEC — which oversees stock trading and a broad range of other business activity — quietly handed down its decision that denied Broderick's complaint.

One administrator at the old office — located in suburban Arlington, Va. — retired and the other employees were transferred, most either to SEC headquarters in Washington or to Philadelphia.

Broderick filed suit in U.S. District Court against the SEC this week, alleging that from 1979 to 1984 she had to deal with an environment of sexual harassment at the regional office.

BLM halts herbicide use on weeds

TWIN FALLS — The Bureau of Land Management said Thursday it is temporarily suspending the use of herbicides to control noxious weeds on public lands in Idaho, Oregon, Montana, Washington and Wyoming.

The suspension means about 1,500 acres of public land scheduled for treatment later this year won't be sprayed, according to BLM. Infestation of the weeds is particularly heavy in the Shoshone and Burley area, according to BLM documents.

BLM had completed about 60 percent of its noxious weed program in Idaho this year. Delmar Val, BLM director in Idaho, said

"recent litigation in Oregon has raised unanswered questions about the herbicides' impacts on human health." Until these questions can be answered in a supplementary environmental impact statement, he said, "BLM will forego using herbicides: dicamba, glyphosate, picloram and 2,4-D."

He said, after considering the concerns raised by the Northwest Coalition Against Pesticides, the Department of the Interior decided to supplement the impact statement.

Magic Valley ranchers were concerned and upset over the decision.

"I am darned upset about the whole stink-up," said Gerald Teves. "You can't take care of your resources. I don't want to do anything to damage the environment."

When they get down to being flat picky, I'd comment regarding the environmental impact statement, said Norma Grier, director of the coalition based in Eugene, Ore.

She said there were technical problems with the way the study of the toxic effects of the spraying was handled. Grier said the group, which has an Idaho chapter, is not opposed to noxious weed control if the government is responsive to the public.

The group won a federal court decision in Portland on March 1, 1984, which stopped spraying on forest vegetation in Oregon and Washington.

Jim Lanting, a Hollister rancher who uses BLM land for grazing, called the suspension a mistake.

"I sure hate to see them stop. Weeds growing above farmland will eventually find their way onto farmland," said Lanting.

He said he doesn't have a problem with noxious weeds but he does have one with sagebrush. Lanting said the BLM won't let him use herbicides on sagebrush, and he has to burn it instead.

Bill Swan, a rancher in Three Creek, called the suspension "an awful thing to have to do."

"The BLM doesn't have the option to continue," he said. "They're bound by the court decision. I can't understand the attitude of the environmentalists toward noxious weeds. As far as I can see there is no harm done" from the spraying.

Swan said he has no noxious weed on his BLM permit land, but his neighbor by the Salmon Dam does. Swan said nothing eats the weed, it spreads rapidly and nothing grows around it.

Jobless rate on slide in valley

TWIN FALLS — Unemployment in the Magic Valley improved during June, with the official jobless rate falling 3 of a percentage point. At the same time, the statewide rate hovered near 6.5 percent, a 0.5 percentage point drop from the Idaho Department of Employment reported Thursday.

The seasonally adjusted rate for Twin Falls, Jerome and Gooding counties dropped off to 5.6 percent during June, as more workers found jobs, said Lon McDonald, state job force analyst based in Twin Falls.

The job report was brighter than that of a year ago: In the three-county area last month, 2,000 workers lacked jobs. That was 110 fewer than a year ago. Meanwhile, 280 more workers were employed than in June 1985, McDonald said.

"Government employment on five trends and in 1985: Forest Service jobs increased for seasonal reasons," he said. Hirlings also have been vigorous in retailing, various types of service businesses, such as motels, and in "endurable goods manufacturing," he said.

The June unemployment rate may mark the low of this employment year, partially for statistical reasons. McDonald estimated the rate during the summer and into the fall would remain between 5.8 percent and 6.1 percent.

Throughout the entire state, retail and service industries also were growing. "But the

Three face extortion charges

JEROME — Three Jerome men face extortion charges as a result of arrests Thursday, following a cooperative investigation by officers from five law enforcement agencies.

The three — Mike Suter, 33, Doug Suter, 28, and Mark Goodenow, 21, all of Jerome — were arrested shortly after noon Thursday after they allegedly held a 1980 truck and semi-trailer for ransom.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Larry Webb of Jerome County said two of the men were arrested in the county and two in the city of Jerome.

The name of the victim and the amount of money involved were not released by officers, pending court action, although Webb said the cash involved was "a large amount."

Webb said one of the suspects works for the victim and allegedly had possession of the truck.

The victim contacted the Jerome sheriff's office, Webb said, and advised that he had been told to come up with a certain amount of money or he would never see his truck again.

Webb said officers checked into the allegations and at about 2 a.m. made arrangements for the victim to make the payment. The payment was made and the owner took possession of the vehicle. Officers then arrested the three suspects.

Webb said the money involved has all been recovered.

The three were arraigned late Thursday before Jerome County Judge.

Immigrants recall first taste of U.S.

Sighting the Statue of Liberty signaled a new way of living

TWIN FALLS — They came to find a better life. Freedom, a chance to own a piece of ground, a living wage, opportunity for their children.

They found what they were looking for. But fulfilling their dreams was not easy, say those who passed through Ellis Island 60 and 70 years ago to eventually settle in the Magic Valley.

They talk of leaving behind those they loved, nighttime border crossings, lost belongings, the bewilderment of life in a country where few spoke their language and work that was every bit as hard as in the old country.

For most, there is also the memory of their first sight of America — the Statue of Liberty — as passengers crowded onto already jammed decks after days at sea for a better view.

On the anniversary of the monument's 100th year, four Magic Valley residents remember what it was like to be young and a newcomer to America.

Karl and Marie Bohr

When Karl Bohr was three months old, his father said goodbye to his mother and four sons and left Poland for America. Bohr was not to see his father again until he was a young man of 14.

"Wages were very low, very low in Poland," Bohr said Wednesday, sitting in his country house just outside the Twin Falls city limits.

His father and his mother were both hired laborers in the fields of Poland. There was little chance that they would ever be able to buy or rent land or even make more than subsistence level wages if they stayed in Poland.

When immigrants to America from their Polish town of Anowka wrote that life was better in the States, Bohr's father decided to follow. His mother remained behind, working in the fields and caring for four sons.

When Bohr was 7, she decided it was time to take her growing boys and follow her husband to America. But the Polish government refused to let them leave. The four boys would someday be soldiers in the Polish Army, government officials told his mother.

She arranged to sneak her family across the border to Germany, Bohr said.

"It wasn't fun. The first night there were robbers." The thieves accosted Bohr's mother and took the package she was carrying with birth certificates and other documents. The second night, with the help of a guide who knew the habits of guards who patrolled along the path that ran the length of the border, they tried again and made it into Germany.

Their stay there was longer than they planned.

Neither Poland nor Germany was willing to issue the five Bohr boys the passports they needed to come to America. His mother and oldest brother made frequent rounds to county officials and the American consulate to plead their case, Bohr said. And his father worked from

America to persuade government officials to issue his family passports.

"My mother was so mad at the Polish government, she never spoke another word of Polish to us kids," Bohr said.

He enrolled in a German school and supplemented the family income by tending beets from the time he was 8. The women would hoe the beets while the smaller children turned a single row of beets by hand and the older children thinned two.

It was seven years more before the family had passports. "We were feeling desperate. We had to keep trying," Bohr said. But by then his oldest brother had turned 21 and the Polish government wanted him to return to his homeland and join the army. He was refused a passport.

"He felt very, very bad. We left him with relations," Bohr said. But the rest of the family was elated, and Bohr was anxious to meet his father.

They booked passage on the S.S. Republic and spent eight days crossing the Atlantic.

"I was sick from the second day to the second to the last day," he said. But the day the Republic reached America, he was on deck.

"I still remember we saw the statue. People said, 'We're getting close, we're getting close.' By then we were in quiet water, the sickness was over and there were a lot of people up there. It was pretty crowded."

The day was April 26, 1926.

Ellis Island, a torment for many, was a relief for a 14-year-old boy cooped up below deck for most of a week.

"It was one big room," he said. "There was a lot of space. I just ran back and forth. It was a lot of fun."

The first day, American officials did not even get to the Bohrs. They slept on the wooden benches. The family spent two more days there while they had medical examinations and immigration officials went through all their packages. Finally, immigration officials pinned tags with their names and destinations on their shirts — they couldn't speak a word of English — and sent them on to North Dakota by train. They were still wearing their tags when his father picked them up in an old Model T Ford at the New Rockford depot.

The family worked for a German family with a young boy, who persuaded Bohr to attend a country school and learn English. Although Bohr had graduated from seven months in Germany, in America he was placed in the fourth grade.

"Five months at the school" and he had a good start toward reading, writing and speaking the English language, he said.

By that time one of his brothers was working for a German farmer in Eden, Idaho. He wrote that he liked the people and the working conditions. It was "more German" than North Dakota, he reported.

The family followed and after years of picking potatoes at the rate of 2 cents a sack, while sweat streamed down their faces on hot fall days, Bohr's parents had enough money to buy land in Clover.

Bohr left Clover in 1944 to join the Army and fought in World War II.

Bohr eventually bought his own land. He purchased 80 acres southwest of Buhl in 1948 and became his own boss, later farming other sites near Twin Falls.

"If we had stayed in Poland, I would have worked for farmers," he said. "We would have been cheap labor all along. Here we bought land."

His wife, Marie, said that his family and her family — like most immigrant families — worked very, very hard to make their start in the United States.

Her father also had a dream of owning land. But he was one of many sons, and in Germany then the oldest son inherited the land. Her father rented land near the small village of Zahrenhoir, but knew he would never have a chance to buy land in Germany.

In 1924, when she was 9, a distant relative already in America agreed to sponsor her family. They sailed on the Columbus, a new boat on its first or second voyage. A postcard she still has describes it as "ein neuer Resendamer" or the giant ship.

She, too, was seasick and spent most of the journey lying below deck in a berth. She was too young to remember much. But she does recall being allowed to tour the first class compartments on the last day of the journey and seeing luxurious velvets and rugs.

When the ship reached the United States, the water calmed. Many of those who had been ill were so weak

Although he requested to be sent to Europe, he was instead sent to the Pacific so he would not be fighting against relatives still in Germany.

Even in the Pacific he encountered discrimination because of his German background. When an officer caught him writing a letter to his mother in German — she spoke only a little English — he was accused of being a Nazi and a promotion was blocked.

from a lack of food, that they had to be carried onto the deck as the ship approached land.

On Ellis Island, they entered the Great Hall, filled with "boxes and people and everything else." She remembers a hurried immigration clerk yanking the family's belongings from its boxes and breaking the few pieces of china her mother had kept for sentimental reasons.

In New York City a man who spoke German helped them find a place to stay until the ship they were to take to Galveston, Texas, left. In Texas, they settled in Orange Grove and her father found a farm to rent.

There were so many German immigrants — in the area — that the children and even the new teacher at her school spoke German on the

June was abnormally hot but didn't set any records

TWIN FALLS — The hot weather of the past month didn't set any records in the Twin Falls area, but it did average full 4 degrees above normal.

William Galkin of the National Weather Service in Kimberly said statistics for the month show that the average daily maximum temperature was 83.2 degrees. The average of both maximum and minimum temperatures for the month was 67.9 degrees, or 4 degrees above the longtime averages.

"During much of the month, high temperatures reached up to 15 or 20 degrees above normal.

"Basically, June was a warm month with periods of moisture in Magic Valley and was hot and dry across most of Idaho," Galkin said.

He explained a ridge of high pressure entrenched over the Intermountain West was responsible for the consistently hot weather.

Nights also were warm. The average minimum temperature for the month was 52.6 degrees, and the coldest reading was 43 degrees on June 20. High for the month was 94 degrees on June 26. There were seven days of 90 degrees or more and only eight days in which the high temperature fell below 80 degrees.

On 10 days, the low temperatures fell below 50 degrees.

Galkin said total precipitation for the month was 1.40 inches which was .35 of an inch more than June's normal. The major storm of the month was June 8 when .64 inch of rain fell.

The total precipitation from Jan.-1 through June 30 stands at 9.07 inches, which is 3.67 inches above normal. For the water year that began in October, the present total stands at 12.70 inches or 4.52 inches above normal.

The only cold periods during the month came June 5-10, and again June 18-20 when low pressure systems off the west coast moved in to weaken the high pressure stronghold.

Galkin said the outlook for July is about the same. It calls for above normal temperatures and precipitation of about normal.

The weather service records show July's normal temperatures over Magic Valley range from the upper 80s to mid 90s with lows in the 50s. Precipitation for July in Magic Valley is usually between one-tenth and one-third of an inch.

High temperatures in Camas County and the Big Wood River Valley normally average 85 to 90 in July and lows average from the mid 40s to mid 50s.

Last BLM fire petering out

BURLEY — All five fires that occurred in the Burley Bureau of Land Management District Wednesday were either out or under control Thursday night.

Fire dispatchers in Burley said the Slater fire, near Holbrook, was the only one that hadn't been declared out and was expected to reach that status sometime today.

The fire, 10 miles west of Holbrook, began Wednesday night and was burning in Juniper and brush. At 10

p.m. Thursday only one crew was still watching the fire after it was controlled at 1:25 p.m. It burned an estimated 300 acres.

In Twin Falls County, the Filer Rural Fire Department, assisted by the Hollister rural fire and equipment, put out a fire southwest of the Twin Falls-Sun Valley Regional airport about 2 p.m. It was reported shortly after noon and at one time threatened an adjoining farm. Garrett Peltis of the Hollister department said it

blackened about 40 acres of private land.

A firecracker was reported as the cause of a small fire at the top of Shoshone Falls grade Thursday afternoon. It was put out by the Kimberly Rural Fire Department before it could cause extensive damage.

BLM and Forest Service fire control personnel reminded residents Thursday night that fireworks are illegal on publiclands.

playground and English in the schoolhouse.

Her father eventually bought a cotton farm. But once again, the family had to start over. Hall and the Depression wiped the family out. They rented for more years. By the time she was 17 they had enough money to buy land again.

She met Karl when she responded to an advertisement in a German-language paper printed in the United States. At 36, he had decided that it was time to get married, he said, and picked Martha from among the 11 respondents to his advertisements. Romance flourished through the U.S. Postal Service.

In a picture album is the photo she sent him, showing herself standing beside hollyhocks. They were married in December 1947.

"I think I had a better life for coming to America," she said. "My parents thought they had a better life, even though it took hard work."

Martha Koops

When Martha Koops, 92, became an American citizen, she was so happy she kissed the ground, she said. She is proud to be an American.

But even today, the memories of leaving her family behind in Hamburg, Germany, as a young bride in 1921 bring tears to her eyes. She has never returned to her homeland, she said.

"When I left, everyone cried. My family did not want me to go," she said. "I did not want to go through all that again."

There were also bad memories. She lost her first and only baby the year they came to America. And her father had recently died.

Her young husband, Ernst, wanted to make a fresh start in America. Koops reluctantly set sail for America with him on the Equitonia. They spent five days on the water, she recalls.

Water splashed against the round portholes, but she was not afraid, she said, just tired of seeing nothing but water and sky.

"That was the best part, when I saw the statue," she said. "I thought it was beautiful. It was the proudest thing."

But her memories of the time were still not happy.

"I was young and it was all strange. I had my folks on my mind then," she said. Her sea sack, containing her private belongings, was lost on the ship. She still can't find much of the contents — a green

velvet tablecloth, bedroom slippers made by her cousin, a tea set received as a wedding gift.

They stayed overnight at Ellis Island while they were waiting to be processed by immigration officials. They were routinely checking newcomers for lice. "I was insulted," she said.

Her husband had relatives in Bloomsfield, Neb., a three-day train ride from New York City. The tiny depot on the horizon was a shock, she said.

"This was America? Hamburg was a big city. . . . I didn't want to stay here. I told my husband I wanted to go back to Germany."

But the farmers in Nebraska were "so nice," that she was persuaded to stay. And they knew how to have fun. They held frequent house dances at which farmers would clear the furniture from their homes to leave plenty of space for a crowd to dance into the morning.

Koops and her husband worked all over the West before their arrival in Twin Falls in 1923. He did not care for farming, but held a variety of other jobs and she usually cooked, she said.

Finding a good job was difficult because they were not citizens. The citizenship test baffled them both, she said. She used to check history books out of the library and then try to memorize everything because she did not know what she would be asked, she said.

In 1945, 24 years after reaching the shores of the United States, she and her husband were both finally

granted citizenship. She still carries, wrapped in plastic in her purse, three-by-five-inch photos that were taken then of each.

If her father had lived, she probably would never have come to the United States, she said. But since her life took the turns it did, "I'm glad I'm here," she said.

Martin Resa

Martin Resa was something of an adventurer. At 33, he does not remember exactly why he came to America as a young man of 21.

"I had relations here. I thought it would be different," he said. "Well, probably I thought there would be better opportunities, better than digging ditches."

But he was also aware that he would probably be a laborer in America since he knew no English, although the work might be easier than digging ditches and canals with the strength of his back and a metal shovel.

His brother was working at Twin Falls Feed and Ice Co. in 1924 and sending him letters about life here until Resa wanted to come, too.

He spent 12 days on the ship, the Aurania, then took a train to Twin Falls.

"It was kind of lonesome coming across Wyoming in that old train, all I saw was those clay hills. But I was too anxious to see what it (Idaho) would be like to worry."

He arrived at Twin Falls on Dec. 24. His brother took him to a company Christmas party where one of the supervisors offered him a job. He started work Dec. 26. Some 42 years later he was still there.

"I've made a lot of ice," he said, now retired. His wife, Edith, she also sold ice, even before he became familiar with American currency.

Unlike many immigrants, he married a native American. He ate his meals at the Varney Restaurant and Ice Cream Parlor where she worked, a courtship blossoming even though he only spoke a little English.

He has been back to Norway once, in 1947. On the way, he and Edith stopped at New York City and both climbed to the top of the Statue of Liberty. "We did not really know much about it, we were just sight-seeing. It was just a piece of metal," he said.

Now he follows news accounts of the restoration of the statue. "I thought I did the right thing," he said of his decision to come to America. "I've had a good life."

composite Idaho unemployment rate remained unchanged — and lagged behind the same time last year.

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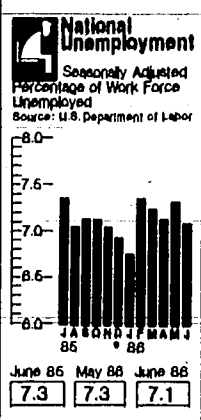

Jobless drop covers job loss

WASHINGTON (AP) — The civilian unemployment rate dropped to 7.1 percent in June, but the improvement masked a loss of almost 90,000 jobs in the hard-hit manufacturing and oil and gas industries, the government reported Thursday.

While the Reagan administration hailed the drop in the jobless rate, private economists were not impressed, arguing that the report showed a sluggish economy with widespread weakness.

The Labor Department said the number of Americans out of work fell to 8.44 million last month, an improvement of 111,000 over May, when the unemployment rate had jumped to 7.3 percent.



Oil and gas employment fell by 15,000, bringing to 113,000 the number of jobs lost in the petroleum industry. Drilling activities have been cut sharply because of the plunge in oil prices.

Even the construction industry

fall in the jobless rate represented "more good news for an economy that is still growing, now for the 43rd consecutive month."

But private analysts disagreed, arguing that unemployment has been basically stagnant for the past two years as the manufacturing sector continues to be pummeled by huge foreign trade deficits.

"The decline in the unemployment rate is meaningless," said Lawrence Chimerine, president of Chase Econometrics in Bala Cynwyd, Pa. "This is another weak economic report which raises further doubts about whether we will get any pickup in growth in the second half of the year."

Rudy Oswald, chief economist for the AFL-CIO, said, "The Index of Leading Economic Indicators is weak, manufacturing orders are weak and our trade deficit is going through the ceiling. In that climate, today's jobless report is not enough improvement to be encouraging."

The report showed that manufacturing jobs fell by 56,000 in June. Since the beginning of the year, 159,000 manufacturing jobs have been lost.

one of the bright spots in the economy this year, sustained a seasonally adjusted decline of 30,000 jobs in June. This still was a substantial improvement from a year ago, however.

The service sector of the economy, which has been growing as manufacturing has been shrinking, added another 145,000 jobs in June.

An alternate unemployment rate, combining the civilian labor force and the 1.7 million members of the armed services stationed in the United States, stood at 7.0 percent last month, down from 7.2 percent in May.

Among various groups, Hispanics enjoyed a substantial improvement in employment last month, as their jobless rate fell by 0.4 percentage point to 10.6 percent.

Unemployment among whites dipped to 6.1 percent from 6.2 percent the month before; joblessness among blacks rose to 15.1 percent from 14.8 percent in May.

"Teen-age unemployment rose slightly to 19.1 percent, while employment among black teenagers remained the highest of all groups at 40.2 percent."

The Labor Department's second-quarter survey of "discouraged workers" showed that 1.1 million people gave up the search for a job out of the belief they could not find work, a total essentially unchanged from the first quarter.

U.S. extends deadline for chip accord

CULIACAN, Mexico (AP) — The Institutional Revolutionary Party, which has never lost a gubernatorial race in any of Mexico's 31 states, is facing a tough electoral challenge here from an opposition emphasizing the incumbent's failure to combat crime and drugs.

Murders are common, drug trafficking a fact and official corruption a widely held presumption here in Sinaloa, a long, narrow agricultural state of 2.8 million people bordering on the Gulf of California.

The Antonio Toledo Corzo, who will be succeeded by the winner of the Oct. 26 election, has been accused in the U.S. Congress of personal involvement in his state's lucrative drug trade.

The opposition National Action Party (PAN) is running 52-year-old businessman Manuel Clouthier against Francisco Labastida Ochoa, gubernatorial candidate for the hitherto unbeatable Institutional Revolutionary Party (PRI).

PAN is also running a strong race for governor in Chihuahua, Mexico's largest state on the border with Texas and New Mexico, where the vote will take place Sunday.

Czech mates in final At Wimbledon

WIMBLEDON, England — Hana Mandlikova, duplicating her U.S. Open feat, upset Chris Evert, Lloyd 7-6, 7-5 Thursday to move into the women's championship match at Wimbledon against top-seeded Martina Navratilova.

Navratilova, who is seeking a record fifth consecutive title and her seventh overall at the All England Club, crushed Argentina's Gabriela Sabatini 6-2, 6-2 in the day's first semifinal.

Both women were born in Czechoslovakia, although Navratilova is a naturalized American citizen.

"It's my seventh final and I'm really excited," Navratilova said. "I'm excited because I think I'm playing well, I'm moving better than I have in a long time and I'm serving better than I have in a very long time."

Where Navratilova took just 53 minutes to beat her 16-year-old rival, Mandlikova needed one hour, 38 minutes to post her first grass-court victory over the 31-year-old Lloyd, who was playing in her 14th Wimbledon semifinal.

"I've never beaten Chris on grass, not even on wet," Mandlikova said. "I've always felt this is my surface, although I didn't grow up on it. But everytime against Chris, she beat me easily."

The men's semifinals will be played Friday with top-seeded Ivan Lendl of Czechoslovakia facing Slobodan Zivojinovic of Yugoslavia and defending champion Boris Becker of West Germany taking on Henri Leconte of France.

Mandlikova is seeded No. 3 and that is where she always seems to be mentioned when top women's tennis players are discussed — always behind Navratilova and Lloyd.

But on Thursday, the Czechoslovak displayed all of her talent, serving seven aces, working her way deliberately to the net for point-ending volleys, and accentuating the end of some rallies with explosive smashes.

"She served unbelievable," Lloyd said of Mandlikova, who went on to defeat Navratilova last September for the U.S. Open crown. "When I thought she was going to serve down the T, it was wide. And when I thought it would be wide, it was down the T. She overpowered me."

If there was a hint of doubt about the outcome of the Mandlikova-Lloyd contest, the only question about the Navratilova-Sabatini match was how long it would take. The world's No. 1 player kept it under an hour by completely dominating every facet of the game.

Matthes At tender age of 20, Ketchum cyclist's out ahead of the pack

KETCHUM — Competing in a sport which receives little recognition and less monetary reward, Ketchum's Ruthie Matthes keeps the wheels turning this week as she competes in the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge stage race.

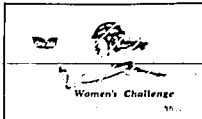
At the age of 20, young for a cyclist who is competitive at this level, this is her third year in this world-class event. She is part of the four-woman team sponsored by Weight Watchers Frozen Foods who finished second in the team standings behind the 7-Eleven team in last year's race.

Born and raised in Ketchum, Matthes grew up skiing alongside her father, a ski instructor.

During her junior and senior years in high school, she raced competitively in skiing, part of her training including cycling. Her enjoyment of cycling overtook her love of skiing when she obtained a cycle racing license in 1983 which qualified her to compete in United States Cycling Federation-sanctioned races throughout the country.

"I like the endurance sport better than skiing and I was pretty successful at it," explains Matthes. So, two years later, she put her skis in the closet to pursue her cycling career on a full-time basis.

Since that time she has spent little time in her hometown. Instead, she is on the racing circuit from March to October, spending most of her time in California where the sport is more widely accepted and finding races in which to compete is an easy process. Last week she competed in the Rocky Mountain News Classic in Denver and earlier this year she traveled to Japan for two international races in Osaka and Tokyo.



Matthes placed 14th overall in last year's Ore-Idaho Challenge and hopes to be among the top 10 this year. After six events in the eight-event Challenge, she is in eighth place overall.

She sees the Centurian Texas Metros and 7-Eleven as strong contenders for the first place spot and said Weight Watchers' chance for first will be "really difficult" in light of the competition.

Matthes says her goal in each race is simple — she "tries to do the best" she can. Her eye is set on a chance to compete for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team in the 1988 Summer Games in South Korea, as well as a chance to go to the World Championships next year.

The training regimen Matthes follows would astound the recreational cyclist. She averages between 180 to 250 miles per week, sometimes 300, depending on how much she has traveled that week.

Stage races, such as the Ore-Ida, require cyclists to have speed, power and endurance. Her training is geared toward this goal, keeping in mind the importance of recovery and heart-training after each race.

Matthes says during a typical road race, the pack of cyclists may travel between speeds of 15 to 27 miles per hour. However, going down Galena Summit, as the riders did Thursday, racers achieve speeds between 45 to 50 miles per hour.

Twigg beats Berglund by a few feet in 62-mile Galena leg of Ore-Ida race

KETCHUM — Thursday's crown went to a queen from outside the Gem State in the fifth stage of the Ore-Ida Women's Challenge bicycling race. Goodwill Games

Weinberger refuses to permit 10 American military boxers into Soviet Union

MOSCOW — U.S. military personnel, including 10 boxers and a civilian defense department employee, were barred by the Defense Department from the Goodwill Games on Thursday, the day before they were to begin. A Pentagon official said there were "serious concerns and uncertainties" about the event, co-promoted by Ted Turner and the Soviet Union as a way of easing East-West tensions.

However, a spokesman for the multisport event said the matter was one of "confusion and misunderstanding" and hoped the problem would be resolved in 24 to 36 hours.

One of the fighters said the



soldiers are "taking it in stride" and "had heard through the grapevine" that we're trying to get the

decision changed.

A news conference by officials of the event was scheduled for 1 p.m. MDT today.

Don Hull, a retired Army colonel who heads the U.S. and international amateur boxing federations, deplored the action as "morally and constitutionally wrong" and said, "Obviously, it's going to bring repercussions" from the Soviets.

The games represent the first multisport competition between the United States and the Soviets in Summer Olympic events since 1976. Boxing is scheduled to begin a week later.

In Washington, a Pentagon official who asked not to be identified said Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger made the decision Wednesday to bar to active-duty ser-

vicemen and one Defense Department civilian employee from making the trip. One other U.S. serviceman scheduled to participate — pentathlete Capt. Mike Burley of the Army, has yet to request permission to go, and also will be barred, the Pentagon said.

"The secretary believed he couldn't approve participation in the games because of serious questions and uncertainties that he had," the official said.

"Among those concerns were the manner in which the event was organized, who was going to participate, events surrounding the games and the way they would be presented. There was also a concern that Department of Defense personnel as participants might be subject to exploitation for political purposes."

Bob Paul, special assistant to the executive director of U.S. Olympic Committee said Thursday, "We have nothing to do with Goodwill Games. These are all independent groups."

Robert Wussler, executive vice president of WTBS, the SuperStation owned by Turner, said Thursday in Moscow: "We're certain that it's confusion and misunderstanding. We have contacted all appropriate officials and hope to have everything back on track in the next 24 to 36 hours."

Games are Ted Turner's alternative to star-crossed Olympics

MOSCOW (AP) — American and Soviet athletes will compete in a Summer Olympics-style event for the first time in a decade when cable television magnate Ted Turner's \$115 million Goodwill Games begin today.

About 3,500 competitors from 53 nations are expected to participate in the games, which begin Saturday and continue through July 20 — the first major "East-West" summer sports event since the 1978 Montreal Olympics.

"Politics have prevented such meets for the past decade. The United States, protesting the 1979 Soviet intervention in Afghanistan, boycotted the Moscow Olympics in 1980. Four years later, the Soviet Union

stayed away from the Los Angeles Olympics, citing security concerns for its athletes.

The Goodwill Games will be the culmination of a plan the Atlanta-based Turner hatched two years ago, while watching the 1984 Summer Olympics.

"Turner said it was a shame about the '84 Olympics because it was not real without everyone there," said Ted Goldberg, a spokesman for the Goodwill Games in Atlanta. "He said it was time to get people back together."

Among the 400 U.S. athletes being fielded are Olympic track and field gold medalists Carl Lewis and Evelyn Ashford and Olympic women's basketball standout Cheryl Miller.

Turner Broadcasting System executives have insisted their company is not sponsoring the games for profit and glory, and suggested the event could help reduce East-West tensions.

"If we can get people talking on different levels, the chances of reducing tensions are very good," Robert J. Wussler, TBS executive vice president, said in a recent interview.

But even Goodwill Games officials haven't been able to keep politics out of the event. Organizers said the Soviet Union overruled Turner's invitation to South Korean and Israeli athletes to come to Moscow, saying it does not recognize their governments. Turner also faced criticism from

some members of the U.S. Olympic Committee who complained that only their organization should sponsor U.S. athletes abroad.

The games have no connection to the Olympics. They were originally conceived as a U.S.-Soviet event, but expanded at Moscow's suggestion, Goldberg said.

But organizers have had trouble wooing international stars, mostly due to scheduling problems. British runner Sebastian Coe, Steve Cram and decathlete Daley Thompson still haven't decided whether to participate or continue training for the July 24 Commonwealth Games.

The world champion Chinese women's volleyball team was already booked, while the world

championships for men's basketball was also scheduled for July in Spain.

Turner, nevertheless, plans to sponsor the games every four years at alternate sites in the United States and the Soviet Union. Seattle has been designated for the 1990 games.

Turner's cable operation owns exclusive U.S. TV rights to the games and plans to broadcast 129 hours of programming. He has also syndicated the games to some 60 independent stations.

According to Goldberg, Turner expects to lose about \$10 million on the games, but he hopes to recoup in 1989 when they will be in Seattle and U.S. interest might be greater. See GOODWILL on Page C2

TBS is presenting the Games in conjunction with the Soviet outfalls — the Kremlin's state-run radio and television company, Gosteleradio, and the state sports committee.

Each of the three partners is putting up \$33 million, according to organizers. Turner will also pay an estimated \$10 million for promotion and travel and lodging costs for U.S. athletes, they said.

The two superpowers did not compete against each other in the 1980 Moscow Games because of a U.S. boycott and the Soviets then boycotted the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics. Their last multi-sport meeting was at the 1976 Montreal Olympics.

"For world peace, it's going to take a whole lot of people, not just one," Turner said Thursday in his \$7 million television studio equipped by the Soviets especially for the Games.

"To measure the impact of the Games, we're going to have to wait and see," said Turner, who also owns baseball's Atlanta Braves and the NBA's Atlanta Hawks. "It may take a month or two, before we get its perspective in history.

"This is something different. U.S. and Soviet athletes haven't been together on such a large scale in a long time.

"Only television (TBS will televise 120 hours) but journalists will determine the impact."

The 47-year-old Turner expects to lose about \$10 million on the Games. But he hopes to recoup in 1990, when the competition will be held in Seoul.

Turner has said he is not sponsoring the Games for profit and glory.

Weather and wind conditions are both important factors in speed.

"The elements really play a major part in the sport," she says. "All storms and rain-slickened roads are no detriment to these trained athletes who see the race to the finish."

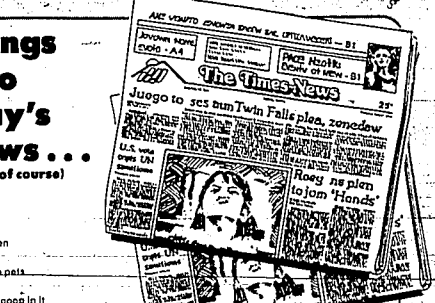

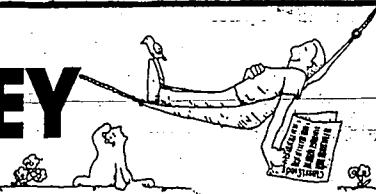

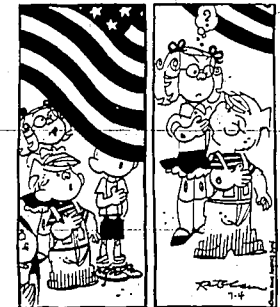

Farm Aid II rolls in Austin

High temperatures, insurance
woes plague Nelson's sequel

AUSTIN, Texas — With \$2.7 million from Farm Aid I still collecting interest in an Illinois bank, Willie Nelson's Farm Aid organization plans to host the first major sequel to a pop charity mega event at a horse race track 11 miles east here today.

The humid 90-degree weather appears to be the only obstacle still facing Farm Aid II: The picnic, the 1986 version of last September's all-star benefit for the nation's farmers.

"It could wind up being a mud bath the way it has been before," said spokesman Barbara Pepe. In the past, she said, Nelson has played host to a traditional Fourth of July picnic and shows in Texas and both audiences and performers have been soaked by hot summer cloudbursts.

A spokesman for the National Weather Service said Thursday that chances of rain in Austin today are less than 20 percent, though there is a high expected of 90 degrees.

Farm Aid II very nearly did not happen because of another problem that has plagued mega events recently: liability insurance. Like Hands Across America, which cost its organizers \$2.5 million in premiums, Farm Aid II faced far stiffer insurance costs this year than its organizers ever anticipated.

Premiums for Farm Aid I, which was held on the University of Illinois campus in Champaign, cost about \$30,000 of the \$9 million in contributions, ticket sales and ad revenue that the concert and simultaneous telethon eventually earned. All told, Farm Aid I cost about \$2 million to stage, leaving \$7 million to distribute to farm assistance organizations.

In Austin, where organizers expect to take in considerably less than \$9 million, the insurance cost alone is more than \$200,000. At one point, Nelson feared he would not be able to secure insurance at any cost to cover the expected audience of 40,000 who are paying \$20 apiece to see the all-day concert.

Partially because of the insurance

woes, the concert site was moved three times in the past two weeks. Organizers were confident this week that the Fourth of July concert featuring Nelson, John Cougar Mellencamp, the Beach Boys, Neil Young, Rick James and more than 70 other rock, country and soul performers would go on as scheduled.

The show is to be staged on behalf of the nation's farmers who were also the indirect beneficiaries of Farm Aid I. Farm Aid executive director Carolyn Mugar, one of two full-time paid staff members for Farm Aid, said more than \$4 million of the revenue from Farm Aid I has been paid out to food banks, legal aid groups, farm crisis hot lines and other projects in 37 states. The chief criterion is that Farm Aid grant recipients use the money to help debt-burdened family farmers survive.

The single largest recipient to date is the National Council of Churches, which has received and distributed \$935,000, chiefly in the form of \$10,000-\$20,000 grants that the council has made to state and local farm assistance groups.

By the time the money actually gets to a farm family who will use it for household fuel, medical bills or emergency groceries, the Farm Aid breaks down to \$50, \$100 or \$200 one-time grants, said Carol Fouke, spokesman for the National Council of Churches.

"It's very ironic that those people who produce food for a living need emergency grants to buy a sack of groceries," she said. "They have a freezer full of peal and no eggs."

Farm Aid's administrative overhead has cost \$25,000 thus far, said Farm Aid's Mugar, who works out of the organization's administrative offices in Cambridge, Mass.

"The National Council of Churches is kind of suspicious of groups that spend all their money on overhead, create a whole new layer of bureaucracy and ignore existing organizations," Fouke said. "The Farm Aid folks get high marks for getting the money to those who know where the need is."

BSU library receives grant to preserve Church's papers

BOISE — The Association for the Humanities in Idaho has awarded a \$16,000 grant to the Boise State University Library to preserve, index and publicize the papers of the late Idaho Sen. Frank Church.

The grant is one of AHI's largest in recent years and will be used to match a gift of \$32,285 from the Boise State Foundation.

Included in the Church papers are nearly 1,000 boxes of letters, speeches, photographs, films, audio cassettes, video tapes and other materials collected over the senator's long career. The grant will lead to preservation of these fragile materials.

Because the collection is so vast, a computer indexing system has been

devised and four indexers will be hired to describe and categorize all the items in the collection. This will permit researchers, writers and the public to gain easy access.

Directed by associate librarian Ralph Hansen, other project activities will include the publication of three issues of a four-page newsletter, exhibits of materials from the collection and public lectures.

Exhibits to be developed include a fall, 1988, exhibit which will examine Church's election campaigns for the senate, and for the presidency in 1976. A second exhibit will look at the relationship between Church and his boyhood idol, former Senator William E. Borah.

The stuff of legends, Diamondfield Jack Davis was hired in 1895 by a wealthy cattle company to intimidate sheepmen who might bring their flocks into the company's ranges in Cassia County. When two young Mormon shepherders were found murdered, Davis became the prime suspect in the case.

He was tried in Albion, some distance from the cattle ranges, before a jury that contained no cattlemen.

In spite of high-powered legal help provided by the cattle company and a lack of evidence placing him at the scene of the murders, Diamondfield Jack was quickly convicted by the jury and sentenced to hang.

Appeals kept him alive until the true murderers confessed, but the appeals and confessions did not speed the course of justice in Idaho.

Davis was not pardoned until 1902. He then moved to Nevada, where he became a rags-to-riches mining man before sinking into obscurity.

Dennis Sandrock will play the role of Diamondfield Jack, while Diamond Tooth Lull is played by Linda Leach. Others in the community take roles that include the famous William Borah, Gov. John Sparks and other, more commonplace, Idahoans.

LEGAL EAGLES (PG-13) Badly miscast, over-the-top comedy thriller involving art fraud and murder. Never have Robert Redford, Debra Winger or Daryl Hannah been caught in worse circumstances. An inept, incoherent and charmless attempt at sophistication by producer-director Ivan Reitman, must more at home in the rambunctious humor of "Animal House," "Meatballs," "Stripes" and "Ghostbusters."

BACK TO SCHOOL (PG-13) A big belly laugh of a comedy, expertly tailored to the talents of Rodney Dangerfield, cast as a boisterous self-made clothing tycoon who enters college to set a good example to his wallflower son (Keith Gordon). A sleek, witty Sally Kellerman is Dangerfield's English prof and a hilarious Adrienne Barberg is Dangerfield's social-climbing, two-timing wife. With Robert Downey Jr., Burt Young, Ned Beatty, Terry Farrell.

INVADERS FROM MARS (PG) — **TOBE HOOPER'S** faithful remake of William Cameron Menzies' 1953 sci-fi thriller — which, back then, fudged standard Cold War trill with a cosmic, Expressionist twist — has a vaster budget, a modern perspective and a lot of reflexive inside humor. The story is paradigmatic — a little boy protagonist lost in a town full of Marlian-dominated zombie adults — but Leslie Dilley's production designs are lush, the actors are better and the Martians (which resemble leering globs of melting ice cream) are an extraterrestrial gas. When Hooper gets the languorously empty, paranoid '50s feel he wants, this movie verges on being hysterically funny.

SHORT CIRCUIT (PG) Derivative, heavy-handed comedy, involving some broadsides against the military-industrial complex, about an endearing runaway robot who comes alive when struck by lightning. With Ally Sheedy, Steve Guttenberg, Fisher Stevens, Austin Pendleton.

TOP GUN (PG) The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, local-made bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, blasted clouds, streaking jets, and so much techno-pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: The wrappings are fiberoptic — and the camerawork and editing a knockout — but the story is a sleazy rehash of "Ceiling Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman," drowned in beelcake and macho pathos.

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Pendergrass critically hurt

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Soul singer, Teddy Pendergrass, paralyzed in a 1982 auto crash, was critically injured Thursday when the specially equipped van he was driving slammed into a utility pole, authorities said.

Doctors closed a four-inch gash in the singer's liver during a 12-hour operation at Ochsleuth Medical Center of Philadelphia, a hospital spokeswoman said.

The 36-year-old Philadelphia native, who was one of the top black singers in the country at the time of his first accident, was listed in critical but stable condition after surgery.

"It'll be 24 hours before he's completely out of danger, but the prognosis is good" for a full recovery, said hospital spokeswoman Carole Famletti.

The smoky-voiced singer was paralyzed from the shoulder down when he drove his \$189,000 Rolls-Royce off the road into two trees in the city's Germantown section. Through intense rehabilitation, he regained partial use of his arms and hands but his legs remain paralyzed.

U.S., Soviet athletes compete in Ted Turner's Goodwill Games

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

The Goodwill Games survived Tripoli, Chernobyl and "Rocky IV," but Ted Turner's Goodwill Games (airing July 5-20 on cable Superstation WTBS (Channel 8) and on 62 independent stations, covering 80 percent of the country) may face more severe dangers: viewer apathy and lack of advertising support.

Will sports-saturated viewers watch all or part of the 129 hours of the Moscow-based Games, even if they feature such Olympic athletes as sprinter Carl Lewis and hurdler Edwin Moses? Primed by the pugilistic xenophobia of the box-office smash "Rocky IV," will viewers be enthralled by the first U.S.-Soviet competition in a decade? One thing is sure: the advertising community remains skeptical. The games may turn into a mammoth money-loser. Advertisers have not flocked to the games as Turner had predicted. In fact, WTBS may lose \$10 million-\$15

million on this year's games.

Cable magnate Turner created the idea for the Goodwill Games in August 1985 as a way of fostering "cooperation and mutual understanding" between the United States and the Soviet Union. He assured the cooperation of the Soviet organizers by guaranteeing them, in cash, \$7.5 million to defray costs and \$3.5 million for U.S. television rights and the use of TV equipment.

The games mark the first time American and Soviet athletes have competed against each other since the 1976 Olympics. The U.S. boycotted the 1980 Moscow Olympics because of the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan and the Soviets stayed away from the 1984 games in Los Angeles because of what they termed "inadequate security."

But recent events in the international arena threatened to cast a pall over the games, the latest being the Soviet nuclear reactor disaster at Chernobyl. TBS executive vice president Robert Wussler says contingency plans are in place for TBS to ship dairy products, vegetables and other food material to the sites of the games if radiation posed a problem.

The Games feature 3,500 athletes from more than 50 nations competing for 175 gold medals in 19 sports. (Among the sports this July will be that stalwart of the winter Olympics, figure skating.) There will be a full delegation of about 600 athletes from the U.S. and USSR, and smaller delegations from other nations.

Among the most notable American athletes expected to participate (at press time, the qualifying events had not been held) are sprinter Carl Lewis, pole vaulter Joe Dial, sprinter Valerie Brisco-Hooks, hurdler Edwin Moses, figure skater Tiffany Chin and gymnast Tim Daggett.

But whatever happens this year, Wussler says TBS is in it for the long run. If this year's games are successful, it will set the climate for the future games. Seattle has already been selected as the site of the 1990 games.

"We're not another Olympic Games — just another event on a four-year sports calendar providing a venue for athletes," says Wussler. "If we do well, athletes and fans can benefit. If we don't do well, people will forget about the Goodwill Games."

Winners in other categories were KNME, Albuquerque, and KCTS for cultural documentaries; KCTS for informational: KUED, Salt Lake City, KCET, Spokane, and KUAC, Fairbanks, for public affairs.

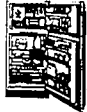

Aw shucks ... Thaler discovers a pearl in 'Santa Barbara' role

"Santa Barbara" has been moving steadily up the ladder of the difficult daytime ratings roster. For at least the last couple of years, the show lacked the pizzazz and those secret ingredients which allow one soap to top another in this competitive arena. Then producers, trying different ways to improve the show, started to cast new, fresh faces, a technique that seems to be working well. One of these new additions, Robert Thaler, formerly of the short-lived series "The Renegades," was chosen in a typically roundabout fashion.

At least "Santa Barbara" is trying to be different from other soaps. Thaler's offbeat role, that of Pearl, the oyster shucker from a wealthy Boston family, reeks with potential.

"Pearl is a Renaissance man," said Thaler. "I'm never quite sure what he's capable of doing. He's always coming up with new talents which no one knew he had. One thing's sure, though — this isn't your standard oyster shucker."

Thaler has many other interests besides acting, among them are fixing up his remote Laurel Canyon (California) house. Thaler does his own remodeling, and recently completed a hot tub with views of Los Angeles. However, that's only temporary, as he enjoys a more country lifestyle, and would like to move out

of the city in the not too distant future.

"I'm a super private person," said Thaler. "When I'm home I don't want to be able to see my neighbors. I don't like crowds. When I visited Kauai this year, it was so infested with people that I backpacked way back to Waimea Canyon. It was worth it, because I'd be hard pressed to find another more beautiful place anywhere. It was so lush and green."

Robert Thaler appears to have a practical head on his shoulders. His storyline on "Santa Barbara" has been expanding, so we'll be seeing more of him in the future.

Another handsome hunk is part of the cast of "Another World." He's Hank Cheyne, a law student turned model who is now an actor. In other casting news, newcomer Peter Love joins the cast of "Ryan's Hope" this week. Love plays Marc D'Angelo, a college newspaper editor who hires the pretty Ryan Hyde to work at his publication. Look for love to blossom between the two as Rick also tries to win back Ryan's heart.

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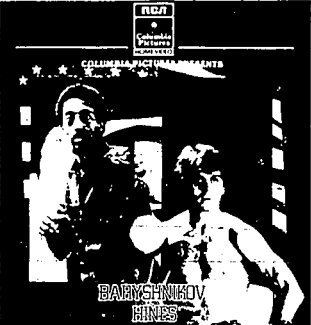

Computer graphics in demand

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Some of television's best visual moments are the slam-bang station identifications or the brilliant program opening sequences which make some shows look like a limp afterthought.

The three-dimensional network logos that dance across the screen are the product of graphic computers. While the expense limits such graphics to just a few seconds, the demand for such imagery has increased.

It also has sparked a new growth industry for powerful computers that once were only purchased for high-tech defense companies to design aircraft or train the pilots that fly them.

"We wanted to turn it into a

general product," said Ken Dozier, president and chief executive officer of Interactive Machines Inc. His company makes the IM1500, an increasingly popular image-making machine.

"In both computers and graphics, there's an emerging market that is above the general computer market and below the supercomputer market. That's the area we're headed for," said Dozier, a former rock musician.

The \$40,000 IM1500 computer that creates three dimensional line images was designed for architects, but so far, not one architectural firm has bought the machine.

Instead, IM1500s are used to project realistic images of enemy and friendly aircraft on a dome at the pilot training center at the Lemoor

(Calif.) Naval Air Station. The computers also are at several graphic imaging firms, and two of them are at work for Universal Studios.

The computers and their visual image programmers can make a three-dimensional network logo loop across the screen, or rise triumphantly over a moving pattern of smaller logos.

Universal, the first studio to start its own computer graphics department, discovered it would be cheaper to produce the images in-house than contract to the growing number of independent firms.

"The studio is starting to use more video technology," said Ron Saks, head of the department. "Any time people are exposed to the computer graphics, it pushes up their expectations."

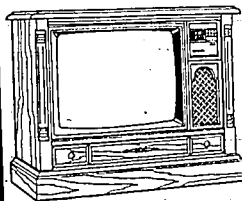

Fall lineup won't lift ABC from 3rd place

HOLLYWOOD — Despite ABC's effort to offer more quality prime-time series, the network's new fall schedule will not get ABC out of third place next season, says its Entertainment President Brandon Stoddard.

But that "isn't what we're trying to do," he said. He said that the idea is to be realistic in setting goals and then trying to achieve them each year.

He also said that it is not a certainty that David Hartman, the folksy host of ABC's "Good Morning America" since November 1975, will stay with the program, which earlier this year was overtaken as No. 1 in ratings by NBC's resurgent "Today Show."

His comment on Hartman came Sunday when he disclosed to visiting TV writers here that research consultant Frank Magid — who two years ago recommended to NBC ways to boost ratings of its "Today" show — will soon do that for "Good Morning America."

Stoddard said that he will look at a "major study" by Magid due by July 3, but "I don't think we're going to make overwhelming or revolutionary changes" on the program, which for a number of years was first in the network morning-show ratings race.

Stoddard reportedly has been pressed by Capital Cities Communications, the cost-conscious new owners of ABC, to change terms of the contract under which Hartman has been working. The change might conceivably involve a salary cut. The former actor currently is paid more than \$1 million annually.

When asked if one could assume that Hartman will continue to host the two-hour show, Stoddard replied that "you can't assume anything because we are in negotiations (on a new contract) with David, and who knows where that's going to go?"

In discussing the possibility of ABC avoiding another third-place season in prime time, Stoddard sounded somewhat like NBC Board Chairman — Grant — Tinker — several years ago when NBC, now first in prime-time ratings, was trying to escape the Nielsen cellar.

Back then, Tinker urged patience, patience, patience.

Stoddard said patience would be ABC's approach, although ABC, third in prime-time ratings for two successive seasons, would try to come closer to second-place CBS and be, as he jokingly put it, "the No. 1 third-place network."

A respected ABC movie and miniseries executive prior to his appointment last November as the network's programming chief, Stoddard said the plan is to try to make ratings gains and improve the quality of programs at the same time.

ABC has nine new series on tap for next fall.

Some progress already has been made, he told the visiting scribes, but "we have a long, long haul in front of us, and the way I think to go about that is to establish some realistic goals that you can reach, and try to go after that year by year."

On other matters, Stoddard said: "That he does not know if miniseries are on the wane, but I'd like them to be more special... I think there have been too many of them, and I think that's wrong."

CBS braces for staff reductions

NEW YORK (AP) — With profits declining and advertising revenues not growing as in previous years, CBS is bracing for a "painful" series of job reductions that could total 600 positions, industry sources said Tuesday.

Sources said the job cuts would be accomplished mainly through layoffs and that these changes could happen as early as this week. But knowledgeable industry officials, speaking on the condition they not be identified, said the changes would not affect programming but be mainly in the areas of research, public relations, advertising and finance.

A source at CBS News said that division's contributions to the layoffs probably would be at least 60 positions, but that no final decision has been reached on whether "Nightwatch," CBS' money-losing late-night news show, would be canceled.

Despite the cuts, CBS is going ahead with plans to revamp the "CBS Morning News" this fall. Ac-

ording to news division sources, one plan being given strong consideration is for regionalized anchors from cities other than New York where all three network morning news shows now emanate.

Cities being considered include New York, Chicago and Los Angeles.

Current co-anchor Forrest Sawyer is seeking another position within CBS News, sources said. The other co-anchor, Maria Shriver, has been asked to be a host from Los Angeles, but hasn't made a decision yet.

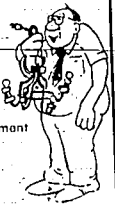
Sources also said two leading candidates for anchor positions include Charles Osgood, CBS' most popular radio correspondent and anchor of CBS' "Sunday Night News," and Linda Ellerbee, the NBC correspondent who left the network following the expiration of her contract last week.

CBS' cutbacks, which will occur in conjunction with other moves to streamline CBS' broadcast operations, are the result of a 10-week financial and efficiency analysis by

four executives of the CBS Broadcast Group. The Broadcast Group oversees CBS' news, sports, entertainment and radio divisions.

New wave commercials go up against cable stations and MTV

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The television commercial's biggest competition was once the kitchen or the bathroom, but electronic advances of the 1980s have raised the battle for attention to new creative heights.

"It's gotta be entertaining, it's gotta grab the viewer," said Josef Lubinsky, writer of music for the compelling, mood-soaked Levi's 501 jeans commercials. "You can't say, 'Look here, this is the widget,' anymore. You have to make the widget fly into space and come back down."

Lubinsky, 32, is part of a crew devoted to finding ways of putting the widget in orbit with viewers; and the blast from their ideas may singe the stragglers.

Commercials are now aimed at grabbing emotions rather than feeding information. Some are mini-epics that evoke patriotism, romance or a particular lifestyle in just 30 seconds.

These new-wave commercials typ-

ically are aimed at affluent baby boomers and feature either a catchy new jingle or a hit song from the 1960s, platinum production qualities and little or no announcing.

Lubinsky and others attribute the new creative approaches to the influence of MTV, which also is counted as one of the competing interests for today's advertisements. Viewers sometimes switch to the cable-delivered music video channel as an escape from ads.

There's a lot riding on keeping commercials interesting. Advertisers spent more than \$20.7 billion last year for all types of television, according to Advertising Age magazine.

In the Levi commercials, moods and ideas come across in music and visual settings. In half a minute, the viewer has identified the jeans with living in New York City lofts, strutting down streets and falling in love.

Ford's Lincoln-Mercury cars chase down Big Chillers with rerecorded versions of such 1960s hit tunes as

Steppenwolf's "Born to be Wild," Creedence Clearwater's "Proud Mary," and the Beatles' "Help" and "Good Day, Sunshine."

Lubinsky works with partner Ron Hicklin in their HLC Jingle agency, home of such hummers as "What the Big Boys Eat," for Wheaties and "You Are The Dreamer" for the Wall Street Journal. The Los Angeles agency produces about 20 songs a week for various clients.

"What we have done is change the way people look at commercials," said Lubinsky. "Now they're not so much a story being told as an emotion being conveyed."

Viewers always had the option of ignoring commercials, usually by leaving the room. Programmers retaliated by cranking up the volume, so that the ad spiel followed viewers around the house like a pesky salesman.

NBC wins evening news race; CBS 3rd for 1st time in 5 years

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC "Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw was the top-rated evening news program last week, while Dan Rather and the CBS "Evening News" fell to third place for the first time in nearly five years.

NBC's news program had a 9.9 rating and 22 share, ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings had a 9.7 rating and a 21 share, and CBS had a 9.4 rating and a 21 share in the weekly ratings compiled by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

"This may be a true changing of the guard," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. He said it was the first time CBS had run third in the news competition since October, 1981.

"It firmly indicates that the news race is neck and neck and there no longer is a dominant network," said Carol Olverf, ABC's director of news information.

"The race now is very close. No one is going to be winning every week," Jaffe said, predicting that each network would also spend time in third place in the summer race.

"The only trend that is apparent," said George Keramidis, ABC's vice president for research, "is that the network news race is too tight to predict."

NBC also won the weekly ratings, with the Thursday night lineup of "The Cosby Show," "Family Ties," "Cheers" and "Night Court" taking the top four places.

"Growing Pains" on ABC was fifth, CBS' "Newhart" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?" tied for sixth, followed by "Kate & Allie" on CBS, "Miami Vice" on NBC and "Moonlighting" on ABC. The first eight programs were comedies which traditionally repeat better than other TV forms, particularly serials.

NBC had 16 of the top 30 shows, while ABC and CBS had seven each. NBC won the prime-time competition with a 13.0 rating, followed by ABC at 10.7 and CBS at 10.0.

Each rating point represents 859,000 homes with television. The share is the portion of sets in use during the time period.

While pleased with ABC's third consecutive week as runner-up, Keramidis wasn't predicting that the fight for second place would last beyond the summer. CBS is without its highly rated Friday series, "Dallas" and "Falcon Crest," while its "Knots Landing" is limping along

in 55th place with repeat episodes.

With summer prime time reduced to a rerun race, the news competition is being closely watched.

"If you track the numbers over the last couple of weeks, and the next couple of weeks, you'll find that it's very close," said Ann Morfogen, director of information for CBS News. "I expect that it will be this close through the summer, and we'll see what happens in the fall."

Last week, it was a question whether NBC won or CBS lost. NBC's rating was exactly the same as a week earlier, while CBS fell from a 10.1 two weeks ago to a 9.4 last week.

Here is how the race has gone since the last week of May, when CBS ran its string of consecutive No. 1 finishes to 213:

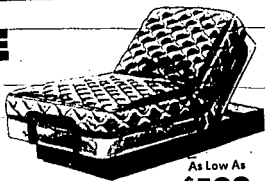

Network executives cited no special programming or schedule interruption which might account for the bouncing numbers in the past three weeks. In the weeks of May 25 and June 1, however, CBS News had been hurt by the pro basketball playoffs, which pre-empted the news in some West Coast markets.

Cable, PBS programs perk up thuddehngly dull fare of summer

Technology gives us television of any size that can be controlled from anyplace. Watchmans are available for the beach, and TV wrist watches for when we're jogging. There is hardly a height or depth, a location or activity, that can't accommodate the medium.

But all the wizardry is useless if there's nothing viewers want to watch. Which is by way of saying that, while the networks spend October through April giving us their plums, in the summer they leave us the pits: old "Dynasty" reruns, new "Dynasty" reruns and middle-year "The Love Boat." Game show winners and losers are frozen on videotape forever and ever and ever. And sitcoms and halfwitcoms that should never have been shown in the first place are repeated.

The answer, then, is to put the networks on hiatus for the summer—except for an occasional foray—and focus on cable and PBS, where the offerings are fresh, new and bountiful. Look:

COMEDY: HBO's successful "On Location" comic showcase presents two new shows: July gives us Robert Klein (his one-man Broadway show). In August we get Billy Crystal (with guest stars Rob Reiner, Eugene Levy, Christopher Guest and Brother Theodore).

"Don Rickles on the Loose," taped in such places as a Las Vegas wedding chapel and the boardwalk in Venice, Calif., offers Mr. Warmth trying to annihilate everyone verbally, including the Hell's Angels (Showtime, August).

July gives us "Cinemax Comedy Experiment: Charlie Barnett - Terms of Enrollment," in which the comic will be seen promoting a video cassette that tells how to get into an ivy-league college. Cameo guests include Zsa Zsa Gabor, basketball player Marques Johnson and Cheech and Chong. The combination boggles the mind.

Showtime's new six-show comedy series, "The Frantics: 4 on the Floor," debuts in July, offering sketches, music, video spoofs (a contradiction in terms) and running gags, with four talented young Canadian comics.

In August we get HBO's "Training Camp," a six-episode continuation of their "First and Ten," starring Delta Burke and Rod Shelton as manager of a fictional football team. O.J. Simpson joins the cast.

HBO's "Not Necessarily the News" will continue to present new 30-minute sendups of current events.

Early in September, Garry Shandling, whose life is a one-person Murphy's Law, stars in a new sitcom series on Showtime. Since he is one of the writers, it bodes well.

The summer's funniest show airs July 21: "The Miss Universe" pageant on CBS, originating in Panama and hosted by Bob Barker. This might also fit into the categories of documentary, drama, music or sports. Or science fiction.

For some people, Bob Barker could become a summer festival. Beginning in August, he hosts six new episodes of "The Price Is Right," which CBS, with a sense of high adventure, is slotting opposite reruns of "The Cosby Show."

DOCUMENTARIES: "The Amish," a glimpse into this intensely private sect, based on a visit to an Ohio community, will be presented four times in July on Arts & Entertainment. A&E also offers two hours on the 18th-century French artistic renegade, Jacques Louis David.

HBO's "America Undercover" presents "And the Pursuit of Happiness," an exploration of America's new wave of immigrants, directed and narrated by filmmaker Louis Malle.

PBS, the documentary mavens, will have a busy summer with: "Condor," a study of the California condor, now on the threshold of extinction, narrated by Robert Redford. "Comrades" will be 12 60-minute programs on various phases of life in Russia, including studies of a teacher, a rock musician, a doctor, a farmer and a thief. "Diggers" studies the political, social and technological aspects of the Panama Canal and includes interviews with some of the surviving diggers and labor leaders. And "Newsleaders" presents informal discussions with the country's leading editors and publishers, including Katharine Graham (Washington Post) and Malcolm Forbes (Forbes). "American Masters," which PBS premiered last month, continues its 15-part series of portraits of such American creators as Katherine Ann Porter, Charlie Chaplin, Billie Holiday, James Levine, Aaron Copland, Thomas Eakins, Georgia O'Keeffe and Eugene O'Neill.

"International TV," an anthology of TV productions from around the

world, hosted by Leslie Caron, will include the marketing of Margaret Thatcher and the experiences of political prisoners in Uruguay. The series runs on PBS during July.

Another look at different cultures via their TV programming, "Uncensored Channels: TV Around the World," hosted by George Plimpton, will be presented by HBO in August.

DRAMA AND MOVIES: "HBO Showcase" presents an original 60-minute drama, "Half a Lifetime," the story of four friends from high school who face an early mid-life crisis together. It stars Keith Caradine, Gary Busey, Nick Mancuso and Saul Rubinek (July). HBO Pictures also presents an original suspense thriller, "Apology," set in New York's Soho and starring Lesley Ann Warren as an artist and Peter Weller as a cop.

In August, "The Paper Chase," which has had more lives than Rocky, airs its final episode, "The Graduation," on Showtime. John Goodman is still the crusty professor and Laine Kazan is a law student.

Movies galore will be all over HBO, Cinemax, Showtime and the Movie Channel. They include "Prizzi's Honor," the wonderful comedy about hitman lovers (Jack Nicholson, Kathleen Turner); "Mask," in which Cher is the mother of a congenitally disfigured boy; "Pale Rider," with Clint Eastwood; "The Sure Thing," Rob Reiner's brilliant college-sex comedy; "Teen Wolf," starring Michael J. Fox; "Commando," with Arnold Schwarzenegger; "National Lampoon's European Vacation"; and Berry Gordy's "The Last Dragon."

Movie comedy classics include Mel Brooks' hysterical "Blazing Saddles" and Woody Allen's story of a wacko Latin American republic, "Bananas." Also, the Movie Channel presents Charlie Chaplin's masterpiece, "The Great Dictator."

"Moscow Does Not Believe in Tears" (A&E), set in Russia in 1960, gives us the interwoven stories of three women who come to Moscow to find happiness. Also on A&E, the greatest Russian filmmaker, Sergel Eisenstein, is represented with "Ivan the Terrible," the story of the 17th-century czar, filmed in color and black and white.

Tough times for public television in depressed oil and farm states

When the oil industry hurts, public television yells "ouch!"

It's not so much the national programming that has suffered, however, but the stations in states where oil once was king.

The rapid drop in world oil prices has cut into state revenues in Alaska, Texas, Oklahoma and Louisiana, and many public TV stations will be living with tighter budgets in the new fiscal year which began Tuesday.

Farm problems have hurt stations in Idaho, Iowa, Nebraska and Kansas.

"We're in the oil and gas business and we just didn't know it," said Terrell L. Cass, president and general manager of KEDT in Corpus Christi, Texas, where more than half the staff has been laid off since January.

Donations to KUHT in Houston fell \$500,000 during the past fiscal year, or nearly 30 percent, and its budget is being cut 11 percent for the new year.

"We are reflecting what is happening in the oil industry, and it looks like it is going to be trouble," said general manager James L. Bauer.

In Dallas, however, KERA will spend \$12.5 million in the new fiscal year, compared with \$9.9 million last year. More than half the increase is for production of national programming, including the fall series "The West of the Imagination," and the new productions are fully underwritten by corporate and foundation grants, said Richard Meyer, the station's president.

Nationally, Mobil is continuing to support "Masterpiece Theater" and Chevron is not cutting its support for the National Geographic specials, but Exxon will phase out its support for "Great Performances."

Exxon will contribute \$3.6 million for "Great Performances" again this fiscal year, but that will fall to \$1.2 million in the next year and nothing the year after. However, Exxon is committed to \$1.2 million per year for "Live from Lincoln Center" through the 1989-90 fiscal year, said communications manager Ken Kansas.

"From all indications, it looks as though corporate funding has remained steady," said Peggy Hubble, director of public relations for the Public Broadcasting Service. "Some

of the stations are in very good shape, others are having problems."

Among the major producers, WNET in New York has cut its budget and staff for the new year, but WGBH in Boston, KERA in Dallas, WTTW in Chicago, WQED in Pittsburgh and KCET in Los Angeles will be spending more than last year.

"I don't think there is a general cutback in public broadcasting,"


said Henry Becton, WGBH president and general manager. Being a major producer, he said, "brings with it swings in producing activity as projects come and go, and that happens here, too. Two years ago, our budget was \$82 million. This year, it will be \$90.5 million; last year it was \$97 million."

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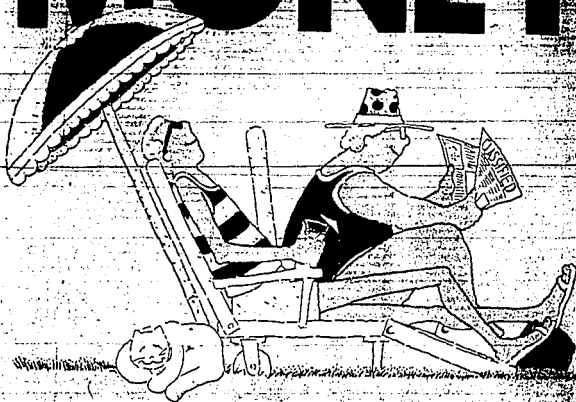


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
