## Growth patterns could divide nation

WASHINGTON — Disparities in recent economic growth patterns threaten to split the United States into regions of haves and have-nots not unlike the poor South and the booming North of the early 1980s, according to a study released Thursday.

The Joint Economic Committee report said that since 1981, California and 15 East Coast states have experienced an average of 4 percent annual growth in personal income, com-

pared to 1.4 percent for the other 31 states. The Gross National Product grew at an average of 2.3 percent per year during that period, compared with a 3.4 percent average for all years since World War II.

"Most of this country is suffering a prolonged period of economic stagnation," said Rep. David R. Obey, D-Wis., chairman of the committee. "Workers and their families, unless they live on the coasts, are experiencing very limited economic opportunity."

## Split delaying U.S. decision on SALT meet

WASHINGTON — A split within the Reagan administration is delaying a decision on whether to accede to a Soviet request for a meeting this month in Geneva on scrapping the 1979 Strategic Arms Limitation Treaty.

The two sides have agreed in principle, however, to hold a separate session to discuss ways of verifying underground nuclear tests. U.S. officials said Thursday. This is one of the thorniest issues in the arms control field.

President Reagan has accused the Soviets of conducting tests above the 150-kiloton limit that was set in an unratified 1974 treaty. Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, meanwhile, has proposed a ban on all nuclear weapons tests. His self-imposed moratorium on Soviet blasts expires next month.

The Pentagon is flatly opposed to a July 22 meeting on the 1979 SALT II accord, which Reagan tentatively has decided to abandon. Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger is concerned that the Soviets might turn it into "a public relations circus," said an administration official who declined to be identified publicly.

White House chief of staff Donald T. Regan told reporters that administration officials would hold further discussions on whether to meet

with the Soviets concerning verification.

"We are trying to come to an agreement among ourselves on what we should do," Regan said.

But, another U.S. official, who spoke on the condition of anonymity, said both sides had "unambiguously" expressed a desire to meet concerning the testing issue, and were in the process of arranging a precise date and place. The United States has suggested it be held later this month, the official said.

The State Department and other U.S. agencies involved in U.S.-Soviet relations have recommended to Reagan that he accept the proposal for a special session of the Standing Consultative Commission, which was set up in 1972 to consider disputes over adherence to strategic arms agreements.

However, Kenneth L. Adelman, director of the U.S. Arms Control and Disarmament Agency, and Edward Rowley, a senior presidential adviser, want to make sure that besides Reagan's decision to abandon the SALT II treaty, the agenda also includes U.S. allegations the Soviets violated the accord with an illegal long-range nuclear missile and by withholding data on missile tests. The Soviets have denied the charges.

"The jury is still out on a meeting," the official said. Regan, in deciding in May to ex-

## Klinghoffer daughters voice anger at sentences handed ship hijackers

NEW YORK — Leon Klinghoffer's daughters and co-passengers reacted angrily Thursday to the sentences imposed on the Achille Lauro cruise ship hijackers who were convicted of killing the American hostage.

"They are all guilty of a horrible, heinous crime and they should all receive the maximum penalty," said Ilsa Klinghoffer, who appeared at a news conference with her sister, Lisa.

A court in Genoa, Italy, convicted six Palestinians of hijacking the Mediterranean cruise ship last October and killing Klinghoffer, a 60-year-old New Yorker who was confined to a wheelchair.

However, only three defendants received the maximum life imprisonment, and all three are fugitives — including the man alleged to have masterminded the hijacking, Mohammed Abbas.

The three who are in custody received sentences of 30 years, 24 years and 15 years. Five other defendants were convicted of lesser charges.

"We had every hope that the Italian judicial system would impose the maximum penalty possible," the Klinghoffer daughters said in a joint statement. "Sadly, we are greatly disillusioned and disappointed."

When she heard of the sentences, Ilsa Klinghoffer said, "I was sick to my stomach."

Lisa Klinghoffer called it "a mockery" that Abbas was sentenced in absentia after being freed by Italian authorities shortly after the hijacking.

"I don't understand the Italian judicial system. I don't understand the Italian government," she said. "They let him go and now they give him a life sentence."

"If they want to send a message, let them find him and have him serve his life sentence," she added. Some of the former hostages from

the cruise ship shared the Klinghoffer family's outrage.

"I think they deserve more because they've ruined so many families and interrupted so many lives," said Viola Meskin of Union, N.J.

Frank Hodges of Springfield, N.J., whose wife, Mildred, was on the ship during the hijacking, said, "I'd prefer that they all be hanged, but the Italian system doesn't have capital punishment."

The Klinghoffer daughters vowed to pursue the case with the same tenacity as their mother, Marilyn, who crusaded vigorously against terrorism before her death from cancer earlier this year. They said they had asked their Italian lawyers and the U.S. government to explore the possibility of extraditing the captured hijackers and trying them in the United States.

The jury also decided that Klinghoffer's daughters were entitled to seek damages from the defendants in a separate, civil trial that will follow.

## Hot debate on airborne smoke likely

WASHINGTON — Two new studies reach opposite conclusions on whether other people's cigarette smoke can damage the health of non-smokers, and this likely will touch off a dispute akin to the early debate over smoking and health.

A British study found that the risk of harm from smoke in the air is "at most quite small, if it exists at all." This work appeared just as one American researcher concluded that "passive smoking" could be killing 31,000 Americans a year, and possibly 46,000.

The British study, by a team

## President plans to launch his own campaign against drugs

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, picking up on an issue that has been championed by First Lady Nancy Reagan, will launch a personal campaign against drug abuse in the next several weeks, White House officials said Thursday.

Presidential spokesman Larry Speakes, traveling to Dothan, Ala., with the president, said the program is being discussed by White House officials but no decisions have

been made on scheduling a presidential speech or appearances.

"He offered to do something, and she certainly didn't say 'no,'" said Mrs. Reagan's press secretary, Elaine Crispin.

"This is an issue that needs everybody's attention, so why not the president's?" Mrs. Crispin quoted the first lady as saying. Speakes said aides are preparing ideas for

the president, and looking at some 300 pieces of drug-related legislation pending on Capitol Hill before they submit recommendations about the campaign to chief of staff Donald T. Regan.

The spokesman said Reagan is expected to decide what he wants to do — if anything — before he leaves for a three-week vacation in August at his California ranch and that the effort may not begin until the fall.

Speakes said the president may be expected to encourage private-sector involvement in "the battle against drugs," also

theme favored by Mrs. Reagan. Mrs. Crispin said the effort "won't be a joint venture," even though the issue has been Mrs. Reagan's primary public effort during her five years in the White House.

But one White House official, who spoke on condition he not be identified, said Thursday the president's effort might involve a series of speeches or personal appearances. It is possible the effort could include the first lady, he added.

"The president wants to heighten the awareness of the problem — he wants to

emphasize that there has to be a plan of action," said the official.

The official said the program is still in the planning stage.

It was unclear as yet whether the president's initiative would include any new policy initiatives by the administration, the official said.

The president has taken part in the past in several of Mrs. Reagan's anti-drug appearances at the White House, and Reagan will acknowledge her ongoing efforts, the official said.

## Piler-school case settled before trial

TWIN FALLS — The bitter two-year legal battle of Gary C. Piler versus the Twin Falls School District ended Thursday with a settlement, just four days before trial of the \$2.8 million suit was to begin in U.S. District Court in Boise.

Neither side would comment on the case other than to say a settlement was reached.

Not would either side divulge the terms of the settlement.

"Until all documents are signed and the case is formally finalized, we have no comment," said Piler's attorney, Jim Meservy. "All I can say is that it's settled."

Piler, Twin Falls School Superintendent from 1983 to 1984, was suing the district on grounds that his constitutional rights of due process were denied when the district fired him in October 1984. He also was suing for breach of contract.

Court officials in Boise and Federal District Judge Justin L. Quackenbush of Spokane, Wash., said they were notified by phone by attorneys that the case was settled. But Quackenbush said he was unaware of the details of the settlement.

Asked whether his client was asked or satisfied with the terms of the agreement, Meservy again declined to comment.

School Board Trustee Gary Fay said details would not be released until the board issues a press release on the case, but he had no idea when that would be.

Until 3:20 p.m. on Thursday, when the settlement was hammered out, both sides saw little hope of ending the lengthy fight without a trial.

Piler, who began the \$43,000-a-year job in August 1983, was dismissed after school officials accused him of intimidating his staff and being abusive.

Throughout the legal fight, Piler's lawyers contended that the board had no grounds for dismissal, and that board members made up their minds before holding two nights of hearings in October 1984.

"At one point in his suit against the district, Piler also had sought \$1.75 million in damages, alleging defamation of character. In an affidavit filed in federal District Court, Piler charged that former School Board chairman Robert Knighton had defamed him before other board members with allegations of promiscuity and insobriety, which Knighton denied.

Piler later dropped the defamation portion of the suit.

Piler, who holds a doctorate in educational administration from Brigham Young University, was an assistant superintendent for Twin Falls schools for four years before being chosen as superintendent. He replaced James Savin: He was a teacher for eight years in Kansas and an administrator in Washington before moving to Idaho.

Piler has been unemployed since his firing. He testified in bankruptcy court this year that he has sent between 600-700 job resumes out but has been unable to find a job.

Attempts to reach him at home on Thursday were unsuccessful.



# Neibaur tells business group to stop sending mixed signals

McCALL (AP) — An organization that lobbies for Idaho business has been urged to "quit sending mixed signals" to state lawmakers.

Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, addressed the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry's public affairs workshop here Wednesday. He is vice chairman of the Legislature's powerful Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

"We didn't get any help"

Neibaur told IACI delegates he's frustrated with IACI's push for more money for education on one hand and its resistance to corporate taxes to pay for it on the other.

IACI's highly publicized study on higher education, released in 1982, called for greater spending for education. After the release of the study, Neibaur told IACI members, legislators asked for "help" in raising revenues, but "the final analysis was that we didn't get any help."

Neibaur said he proposed two bills to help fund education, including one that placed a minimum tax on corporations. But "those folks who pleaded for more dollars for education" killed that bill, Neibaur said.

Another Neibaur proposal, one that would broaden the tax brackets for higher income taxpayers, was also "killed," probably by the same people who killed the corporate tax, he speculated.

Other bills placing taxes on business, including the "Economic Recovery Act," and a tax on corporations to fund research at Idaho universities also died at the hands of corporate lobbyists, Neibaur said.

"I guess what I'm trying to say is that IACI should quit sending mixed signals to the Legislature," said Neibaur. "I'm not telling you to stop to support, but I would hope that you would be unified on it. If you don't want to fund it, don't push for it."

"big three" industries of lumber, mining and agriculture.

"We've got to diversify our economy, but not walk away from our friends" in the traditional industries, he said.

Ms. Gilbert, meanwhile, said she was "burning" over criticism of the last session of the Legislature, and added, "We did the best we could with the resources we had."

She blamed irresponsible fiscal practices of the federal government for many of Idaho's economic problems, and said the huge increase in the money supply will eventually lead to renewed inflation.

The Boise Republican also assailed the proposed tax reform legislation that recently passed the Senate, calling it "a massive assault on America's middle class."

Ms. Gilbert said she recently spent five days in Washington, D.C. studying the bill, and she predicted a backlash from business once the bill becomes law.

"I think you will get far less from tax than you thought," she said.

The bill will shift \$120 billion to businesses over the next five years, and will remove many of the incentives Congress has built in over the years to encourage long-term investment.

"I predicted a large number of bank failures and foreclosures as a result of the bill."

Ms. Gilbert also criticized the fact the bill will remove 5 million low-income taxpayers from the rolls, saying that will "create a whole new class of freeloaders."

She called on business leaders to "lead the debate on tax reform," and other issues like education funding, local option taxation and state and federal spending.

# FBI's attempt to nab Claude Dallas leaves behind some bad feelings

EUREKA, Nev. (AP) — The FBI's sudden swoop down on a house in this quiet central Nevada town, searching for a killer who escaped from an Idaho prison, left one local family with a ransacked house, strained nerves and a little resentment.

"I would rather trust Claude Dallas than the FBI," said local magistrate Al Hammond on Wednesday. "Those guys were acting crazy."

Claude Dallas, who was convicted in the 1982 slayings of two Idaho Fish and Game officers, was serving a 30-year prison sentence when he escaped from the state prison at Boise on March 30.

Years earlier, he trapped on the ranch of Richard and Anna McKay, 48 miles south of Eureka, and became their friend, McKay family members said.

"Dave Spencer, a supervisory special agent at the FBI office at Reno, Nev., would not comment on the search for Dallas or the McKay incident when contacted by telephone Wednesday."

The FBI, acting on a tip, broke down the back door of the occupied home about 5 a.m. Tuesday and threw in a percussion grenade.

They didn't find Dallas, but they wrecked the McKays' living room and broke their china. Federal officers said the family could file a claim for the damages.

About four hours after breaking into the house, the FBI stopped the McKays and their son, Richard Jr., about 12 miles south of town. The McKays, who spend most of their time on the farm 40 miles south of the city, were on their way to look at the damage done to their home.

A daughter, Nancy Minorette, 36, was not involved but said she was told about it by other family members. The McKays themselves declined to talk to newsmen.

Ms. Minorette said the FBI agents took each of the McKays away separately and "harassed them into trying to admit something. They told my dad they were going to put Mom in jail if he didn't talk."

She said she met Dallas once in a grocery store during the 1970s. "Claude is not that desperate of a criminal. He's only wanted for manslaughter."

Dallas was tried for first-degree murder in Canyon County, but a jury convicted him of manslaughter and using a firearm in the commission of a felony.

Eureka County Sheriff Ken Jones said about 30 FBI agents came to town Monday night and watched the McKay house for several hours before raiding it.

Officers said they received tips that Dallas was in the area.

Frandsen has been chief of the

Idaho Falls BLM office since 1973. Ferguson, an Idaho State University graduate, started with the BLM as a temporary employee in the Idaho Falls office in 1958. He started full time as a range conservationist in 1962 in Idaho Falls. He's worked in BLM offices in Boise, and Miles City, Mont., before taking district director jobs in Fillmore, and Vernal, Utah. From Vernal he moved to the Utah BLM office in Salt Lake City.

# Congressional delegation lauds seasonal farm worker program

BOISE (AP) — Idaho's congressional delegation and the president of an Idaho farmers organization are applauding the U.S. Department of Labor's decision to reopen public comment on the "H-2" seasonal farm worker program, saying it will help save the state's farmers from more economic hardship.

Labor Secretary William Brock said Thursday that his department will begin a complete review of methods it uses to set wage rates for seasonal farm workers. It also will accept public comment for another 30 days, Brock said in a letter to Idaho legislators.

George Grant, president of the farmers association, said late Thursday his group has protested the procedures used to decide whether seasonal workers were affecting the job market at all.

### Idaho needs to act to encourage growth.

A new study of the nation's economic growth, and where it has occurred in the past few years, should cause considerable concern in Idaho and in other "heartland" states.

The study shows that 16 states — California and 15 states in the East — have experienced 70 percent of the nation's economic growth since 1980. The remaining 34 states which have 58 percent of the nation's population, have shown less than 30 percent of the total growth.

The gap is not hard to explain. Many of the inland states, including Idaho, are heavily dependent on manufacturing and natural resources. Huge sectors of their economies are dependent on timber, agriculture, petroleum, mining and heavy manufacturing.

East Coast states and California, by way of contrast, tend to have more diversified economies with larger components of services, finance, information exchange and computerization.

In short, Eastern states and California are leading the way into the 21st century in the new technologies and economics. States in the interior are lagging.

This latest study from the Congressional Joint Economic Committee won't surprise anyone who has been following the trends. It should spur us in Idaho to find ways to replace an aging, leaking resource economy with one which reflects tomorrow's markets, not yesterday's.

Some of the solutions are obvious. We think they include the following:

- Reduce the size of our university superstructure. Idaho does not need 3½ universities, each with programs duplicating others.
- Develop research potential. Agricultural research is critical for Idaho. It simply must be maintained.
- Promote tourism. This emerging economic force needs help. With some improvements like effective signage, Idaho can capture a far larger share of the tourism dollar.
- Fund education and economic development. Every serious observer says those states which will lead in the 21st century are those which will invest today. The "hunker down" mentality expressed by T.W. Stivers will leave Idaho in the economic dust, an Appalachian backwater of the country.
- Develop value-added industries. Use the natural resources—Idaho has, but refine them in the state wherever possible.
- Actions like those are needed for Idaho to join the "have" states of the coming years.

#### School crowding concerns

I am just one of several parents trying to reduce the number of students per fifth grade class for the 1988-1989 school year at Morningside Elementary School.

Mr. Dennis Sornius, principal of Morningside, told the July 8 school board meeting that the State Department of Education has set a maximum limit of 28 students per fourth grade class and last year there was an average of 34 to 35 students per class which is in direct violation of the standards act.

#### The burden of health care

We are in the new age of medicine! Doctors are being placed in a position of making medical decisions based not on the medical need of the patient, but rather on the patient's financial resources.

I have been personally waging a seven-year battle to obtain diagnostic tests and treatment. Today I decided to explore various avenues of assistance that is provided for medical indigent patients.

I talked with the Jerome County Commissioners regarding this medical dilemma. Mr. Bekker feels that the solution to the medical dilemma would be for us to have socialized medicine that every citizen purchase medical insurance.

This suggestion was well taken. I rushed home and spent my last \$55.50 for some Blue Shield insurance. This insurance has a \$200 deductible. I get sick the next day after spending my last \$35.50 on this medical insurance. Now I have in-

surance but don't have any money because I gave it to the insurance company, so I still don't have money to pay the doctor.

Is the villain the citizen who fails to purchase medical insurance, who is attempting to live on \$300 or less per month? Is the villain the county commissioners who cannot justify paying every citizen's medical expenses who are living below the poverty level?

Is the villain the doctors who are expecting payment at a time of service because they can no longer afford to pay finance company or provide free medical services to all citizens living below poverty level? Is the villain St. Benedict's Family Medical Center who can't afford to provide free diagnostic testing to all citizens living below poverty level? Is the villain the pharmacist who cannot afford to provide free medicines to all citizens living below poverty level? Is the villain the insurance companies that have insurance premiums so far out of reach that people living below poverty level cannot afford to purchase it? Is the villain the many, many employers who cannot afford to provide fringe benefits to their employees such as medical coverage?

In my search for an answer, I found many, many problems but no solutions. We are in the midst of a medical crisis. The villain is probably none of the above. The villain is our economy. We live in the United States of America. Medical care should not be out of reach to anyone!

## Five billion people must learn to support the planet Earth

BOSTON — There was no official birth announcement. No television crew recorded the event. No one pinpointed the place of birth or whether the baby was a boy or girl.

But if the calculations of The Population Institute are right, sometime on Monday, a baby was born who brought the total number of human beings on Earth to a new record: 5 billion.

Such a record doesn't hold very long, not even for a minute. By the weekend, the five billionth baby was born.

By the end of the year there will be 65 million more people sharing a planet that will not have grown by a single inch.

We cannot add acres to the Earth's surface, the way we add rooms to a house, to accommodate new members of the human family.

It took all of recorded time to reach a population of 1 billion in 1830. It took 11 years to reproduce the latest billion. There may be 3

billion more of us by 2021. And we still don't know precisely how many people this planet can sustain.

The experts huddling around the cradle of the 5 billionth baby talk about "the carrying capacity" of Earth as if it were a plane instead of a planet hurtling through space.

How many people, they ask, do we have room for? How many meals are there abroad, how many seats, how much fuel? How many, they ask, are the limits of Earth's "resources"? They ask how humans can use them to sustain our species. We have learned, after all, how to turn a desert, acre by acre, into fields and an ocean ounce by

ounce, into drinking water.

We can harvest the cool inside of mountains and the oil inside the earth for our own purposes. What are the limits? How far can we push them?

But from my vantage point at this birthday party, I wonder about this whole point of view. I suspect that this press of population has influenced our attitudes toward the place that humans should occupy in the world.

When we talk about the "carrying capacity" of the planet, it is as if Earth were here strictly to support us. We talk about "resources" as if mountains and oceans and animals were ours to use. There are so many of us now, that we think about the world in terms of the private property of our own species.

Even in our country, where there is no longer a population explosion, it is remarkably hard to find some place that doesn't have a human stamp on it. Nature is

no longer our everyday habitat. We visit it, vacation in it. Even as tourists to nature, we queue up for a half trip down the Colorado, we drive into our National Parks.

If we did not pave Paradise, we put up a parking lot next door and pay admission. When we save nature, it's in carefully designated preserves and tree museums.

At one passed a stretch of land in North Dakota, untouched by the plow. It was so unique that it was protected and pointed out as virgin prairie.

In California last month, I visited a park of giant redwoods, saved decades ago from lumberyards. On a trail well-tended and well-trod in Muir Woods, I had to imagine what it was like to be alone in a thousand-year-old grove without a rented car and a refreshment stand.

It is rare to feel like one of many species on Earth. Rare when we experience a sense of belonging to the landscape. Rare when we come to nature not to own it or develop it

but to be in it. We are so many, so dominant that the other species are present in our everyday lives as pests and pets. . . or food.

We have also used the Third World, as our resource, our raw material. Now, with the relentless pressure of its own people, this world turns to its own development.

It's the "developing world" that hacks the Brazilian forest into farmland and subdivides African plains into suburbs. There is less sentiment for sharing space, more need to use space. As the numbers grow, people think less about living in concord with the Earth and more about working it.

A species that has controlled its death rate can still control its birth rate. The experts ask whether Earth can support 5 billion people. A much harder question for this birthday is whether 5 billion people can support Earth.

## House version of tax bill better deal for the middle class

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Rosty hasn't been very visible in recent weeks; the media spotlight has shone instead on Bob Packwood and his colleagues in the Senate as they fashioned a bill of their own.

But in mid-July, when the conference committee meets to iron out the differences between the House and Senate versions of tax reform, Rosty will once again take center stage.

Average taxpayers should cheer Rosty on, because the House bill is a better one for middle-income families.

The central difference between the two bills is that the House plan closes lots of big corporate loopholes. By 1990, the House bill raises about \$41 billion a year in added corporate income taxes, compared to only \$17 billion in the Senate bill.

As a result, the House bill's average tax cut for families earning between \$30,000 and \$40,000 a year is \$301, compared to only \$129 in the Senate bill.

Traditional opponents of tax reform like the U.S. Chamber of Commerce have lined up in support of the Senate bill. It's not that they especially like the Senate plan — after all, it raises \$100 billion more than current law over the next six years from the corporate sector.

But the corporate loophole lobbyists certainly prefer the Senate version to the bill that passed the House. The Senate bill actually enlarges one of the most egregious loopholes on the books today — accelerated depreciation for machinery and equipment.

It also does little to tighten up the special accounting rules that let defense contractors off the hook year after year and it keeps the notorious "bad-debt reserve" deduction for banks — a key reason why so many big banks pay little or nothing in taxes.

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That, in a nutshell, summarizes the key confrontation that will occur in conference. The House conferees will push for greater tax relief for middle-income taxpayers. To pay for it, they must persuade the Senate conferees to follow the House lead in limiting corporate loopholes.

To be sure, not all the money needed to pay for a fairer shake for average people has to come from higher corporate taxes. As it now stands, both the House and Senate bills actually cut the overall tax bills of families with incomes in excess of \$200,000, but that needs to be the case in the final product.

After all, why should tax reform lock in the huge tax reductions that the super-rich received back in 1981?

The conference could start with the reforms in the Senate bill that crack down on the tax shelters that benefit wealthy individuals and that end the special tax break for capital gains income.

As a result of these reforms, the Senate bill means significant tax hikes for rich people who have investments only in tax shelters and who now pay little or no tax.

But the Senate bill simply pours this money into a radical reduction of the top personal rate — all the way down to 27 percent. Just over half the members of the \$200,000-plus club — those who haven't used lots of shelters — will receive tax cuts that average \$50,000 each.

It's hard to figure why these well-off people deserve an extra, \$50,000 each in their pockets.

A bill that combined the Senate's crackdown on tax shelters with a top rate on rich people higher than 27 percent would represent a solid improvement in the progressivity of our tax system. Since the House bill offers a top rate of 38 percent, there ought to be room for compromise here.

But Rosty and his House colleagues appear to be headed in conference with the right goal in mind: to provide the greatest possible relief to hard-pressed working families.

This relief can be provided in a number of ways — by reducing tax rates through the

middle-income bracket, by raising the income level at which higher rates kick in, by expanding the personal exemption and standard deduction, or by some combination of approaches.

Clearly, the Senate bill needs some work in this area. Although it moves in the right direction, the Senate plan provides only half the amount of tax relief that middle-income families get under the House measure.

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So let's cheer Rosty on — and Bob Packwood, too. They seem to be ready to lead the charge. And if Congress follows their lead, the American middle-class will, for once, be the big winners when the final tax reform bill reaches the president's desk.

## Cocaine-related deaths on the rise, experts say

WASHINGTON (AP) — Cocaine use among Americans may have peaked five years ago, but deaths from cocaine-related heart attacks and emergency room visits have roughly tripled since then, federal drug abuse experts said Thursday.

"We're picking up the people who are falling off the cliff," said Dr. Donald Ian Macdonald, head of the Alcohol, Drug Abuse and Mental Health Administration. Macdonald said medical authorities have long been aware of the risk of sudden death from cocaine use, but that danger until recently was eclipsed in the debate over cocaine's addictiveness and its mind-altering characteristics.

That changed dramatically last month after University of Maryland basketball star Len Bias and Cleveland Browns defensive back Don Rogers died suddenly, both after using cocaine.

"Despite the scientific evidence and an increasing awareness of consequences of chronic use of cocaine, few have been aware that the drug can kill on the first dose," Macdonald told a news conference. But, he added, "cocaine can be, and not infrequently

is, a killer." There are four documented ways cocaine can kill suddenly, Macdonald said:

- Cocaine's sudden stimulation of the central nervous system can send a person into convulsions, followed by collapse of the respiratory system.

- The drug can affect the nerves that regulate the heart beat, leading to an irregular beat called arrhythmia. The most serious arrhythmia, ventricular fibrillation, can result in cardiac arrest and almost instantaneous death.

- Cocaine stimulates the heart to beat faster, requiring more oxygen, while at the same time narrowing the blood vessels that carry oxygen to the heart. A section of the heart muscle can be starved of oxygen and damaged, a situation known clinically as myocardial infarction, or more commonly as a heart attack.

- The same stimulated heart beat can rapidly increase blood pressure, and the rapid increase can burst a weak blood vessel in the brain that can handle the ordinary pressure. The result is intracranial hemorrhage, or a stroke.

## Pharmaceutical dealer describes diversion plan

WASHINGTON (AP) — A former pharmaceutical wholesaler on Thursday described his multimillion-dollar dealings on the shadowy drug diversion market, that congressional investigators call a dangerous source of ineffective, adulterated or counterfeit medicines.

Marvin Sandler, who was recently convicted of conspiracy to commit wire fraud, told a House subcommittee that selling illegally diverted drugs to drugstore chains each year accounted for \$2 million of his \$5 million to \$8 million business. Sandler, 53, said his suppliers obtained the drugs at discount prices from American pharmaceutical manufacturers on the "false representation" that they would be sold for charitable purposes overseas or to U.S.

organizations.

The reimportation of American-made drugs sent overseas by illegal drug diverters is under investigation by the House Energy and Commerce oversight and investigations subcommittee, which conducted the hearing.

Sandler, who said he dealt in diverted drugs from 1981 to 1984, recalled one shipment that had been sent to Somalia, then to Italy and back to New York.

Sandler, former vice president and still part-owner of his family's Interstate Drug Exchange Inc. in Plainview, N.Y., said his customers, did not know the source of his merchandise.

"In general, they didn't ask where and I didn't tell them," Sandler said under questioning by Rep. Fred J. Eckert, R-N.Y.

## Drug availability shown

NEW YORK (AP) — It was business as usual Thursday at 160th Street and Amsterdam Avenue: The U.S. senator was gone and I.C. Bruno was back peddling his homemade crack for \$10 a vial. He said he had made \$120 before lunch.

"I'm doing good, man. I'm making \$1,100 a week," said Bruno, a slim man with a light beard and a Liberty Weekend T-shirt, pulling a plastic bag full of drug-filled vials from his jeans. "Crack is big business now."

Sen. Alfonse D'Amato, R-N.Y., proved that Wednesday, donning a disguise and buying two vials of crack at Bruno's corner to demonstrate the availability of the

drug, a cheap, potent and addictive cocaine derivative.

At a news conference Thursday, Manhattan District Attorney Robert Morgenthau charged that the problem is not local enforcement but the federal government's inability to halt drug imports at the nation's borders.

Morgenthau, a Democrat, maintained that D'Amato, who is seeking a second term, was grandstanding with his undercover crack buy, on which the senator was accompanied by U.S. Parole Commission chairman Benjamin Baer and a van full of reporters.

## Fires set by inmates damage D.C. prison

LORTON, Va. (AP) — Inmates set fire to an overcrowded prison operated by the District of Columbia in suburban Virginia on Thursday in what the mayor termed an ill-conceived attempt at freedom.

After more than 12 hours of raging fires and fighting among inmates — and between inmates and guards — more than 10 people had been injured and 13 buildings set ablaze, including three dormitories officials said were damaged beyond repair.

Nine guards, 29 inmates and six firefighters suffered minor injuries. One inmate was hospitalized in critical condition after being shot and stabbed.

Authorities said all the facility's 4,100 prisoners had been accounted for. The prison, which has no air conditioning, was designed to house about 3,500 inmates. District Mayor Marion Barry Jr. said there were 1,255 prisoners housed in the area where the trouble broke — about 200 over-capacity.

Barry said there had been indications of unrest the night before, which he said may have been heightened by news accounts Wednesday of a prison consultant's report on overcrowding at the Lorton Reformatory.

"Our prison experts have said some things become self-fulfilling prophecies," said Barry. "It wasn't spontaneous. It was planned. We think the report and the way it was reported added to the prophecy of guys wanting to be free and burning their homes down."

City administrator Thomas Downs said some prisoners had put their belongings in garbage bags in anticipation of being let out of the dorms after the fires were set in a medium security section.

## Zimbabwe aid halted

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration is withholding \$13.5 million in aid to Zimbabwe until the government of that African country apologizes for a July 4 anti-American speech and takes other steps to soften its criticism of the United States, officials said Thursday.

The State Department announced that it had canceled plans to turn over \$9 million this week for family planning and agriculture development projects. An additional \$4.5 million scheduled for disbursement in the fiscal year ending Sept. 30 also will be withheld.

Robert Mueabe said the cabinet member's remarks were appropriate, and that the U.S. decision to halt aid until Zimbabwe apologizes is blackmail. He spoke at a news conference in Harare several hours after the State Department made its announcement.

Resumption of the aid would depend on "a return to civility" in Zimbabwe's dealings with the United States, said an administration official speaking on condition he not be identified. The first step, he said, would be an apology for an anti-American speech by David Karimanzira, the minister of youth, sport and culture.

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**Loans announced**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The World Bank on Thursday announced a \$100 million loan to Hungary's communist government, and \$81 million to Nigeria.

The loan to Hungary is designed to accumulate more foreign exchange by producing more farm goods for export and replacing some imports. Hungary must repay the loan in 15 years, including three years of grace during which only interest will be collected.

### Idaho needs to act to encourage growth

A new study of the nation's economic growth, and where it has occurred in the past few years, should cause considerable concern in Idaho and in other "heartland" states.

The study shows that 16 states — California and 15 states in the East — have experienced 70 percent of the nation's economic growth since 1980. The remaining 34 states which have 58 percent of the nation's population, have shown less than 30 percent of the total growth.

The gap is not hard to explain. Many of the inland states, including Idaho, are heavily dependent on manufacturing and natural resources. Huge sectors of their economies are dependent on timber, agriculture, petroleum, mining and heavy manufacturing.

East Coast states and California, by way of contrast, tend to have more diversified economies with larger components of services, finance, information exchange and computerization.

In short, Eastern states and California are leading the way into the 21st century in the new technologies and economics. States in the interior are lagging.

This latest study from the Congressional Joint Economic Committee won't surprise anyone who has been following the trends. It should spur us in Idaho to find ways to replace an aging, leaking resource economy with one which reflects tomorrow's markets, not yesterday's.

Some of the solutions are obvious. We think they include the following:

- Reduce the size of our university superstructure. Idaho does not need 3½ universities, each with programs duplicating others.
- Develop research potential. Agricultural research is critical for Idaho. It simply must be maintained.
- Promote tourism. This emerging economic force needs help. With some improvements like effective signing, Idaho can capture a far larger share of the tourism dollar.
- Fund education and economic development. Every serious observer says those states which will lead in the 21st century are those which will invest today. The "hunker down" mentality expressed by T.W. Stivers will leave Idaho in the economic dust, an Appalachian backwater of the country.
- Develop value added industries. Use the natural resources Idaho has, but refine them in the state wherever possible.
- Actions like those are needed for Idaho to join the "have" states of the coming years.

At a news conference Thursday, Manhattan District Attorney Robert Morgenthau charged that the problem is not local enforcement but the federal government's inability to halt drug imports at the nation's borders.

Morgenthau, a Democrat, maintained that D'Amato, who is seeking a second term, was grandstanding with his undercover crack buy, on which the senator was accompanied by U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani, U.S. Parole Commission chairman Benjamin Baer and a van full of reporters.

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## Loans announced

WASHINGTON (AP) — The World Bank on Thursday announced a \$100 million loan to Hungary's communist government and \$81 million to Nigeria.

The loan to Hungary is designed to accumulate more foreign exchange by producing more farm goods for export and replacing some imports.

Hungary must repay the loan in 15 years, including three years of grace during which only interest will be collected.

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# Kennedy Space Center director retires

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. (AP) — Richard G. Smith, director of the Kennedy Space Center and one of the officials who approved the ill-fated Challenger launch, announced his retirement Thursday, expanding the shakeup of NASA leaders in the wake of the tragedy.

Smith, 57, who has headed the center since 1973, said he will step down July 31 to become president and chief executive officer of General Space Corp., a Pittsburgh firm which is seeking government approval to provide private funding for a replacement for Challenger.

The chairman of General Space and its parent company, Astrotech International, is Willard F. Rockwell, who founded Rockwell International, builder of the space shuttle.

James C. Fletcher, the new NASA administrator, came from Astrotech. General Space has on its board of directors Gerald D. Griffin, former director of the Johnson Space Center, and former moon-walking astronaut Eugene Cernan.

Since the shuttle exploded Jan. 28, killing seven astronauts, the National Aeronautics and Space Administration has gained a new administrator, a new director of the

Flight Center in Huntsville, Ala. Marshall supervises the booster rockets that help power shuttles into space.

The presidential commission blames a leak in a booster rocket joint for the explosion of Challenger. And the commission was critical of management procedures and officials at both Kennedy and Marshall for allowing the launch to proceed after warnings from two major contractors.

Smith was one of the key officials in the launch control center who approved the launch after a night of freezing temperatures in central Florida. He and others said they were not informed of cold weather objections to the launch from some engineers at Morton Thiokol, which makes the boosters.

The Thiokol engineers were overruled by their own managers and by managers at Marshall.

Smith created a stir of controversy six weeks after the accident when he criticized the commission for finding fault with management before finding the source of the shuttle problem.

"I think there's a potential of long-term damage that cannot be repaired," he told an interviewer.

# Testing of MX missile motor termed a success

BRIGHAM CITY, Utah (AP) — The first test firing of a production-line motor for the first stage of the MX missile was declared a success Tuesday by Morton Thiokol officials.

The motor for the multi-warhead intercontinental ballistic missile, dubbed the Peacekeeper, was fired in a horizontal position at the company's Wasatch Operations site northeast of here.

"I'm elated," said Gary Broman,

Peacekeeper program director for the rocket manufacturer. "It looks good. It sounds good. We didn't have any reason to think the test would be anything but successful."

Other prototype motors for the missile's solid-fuel first stage had been fired successfully, but Thursday's test cleared the way for the Air Force to begin transporting the motors to Warren Air Force Base near Cheyenne, Wyo., where the missiles are being assembled.

The first 10 of 50 planned MX missiles are scheduled to be deployed by Jan. 1 in hardened underground silos in southeastern Wyoming.

Morton Thiokol, which manufactured the problem-plagued booster rocket for the space shuttle, has an \$85 million contract for research, development and production of 52 first-stage MX motors.

Current plans call for production of 193 missiles, 50 of which will be

# House warned on tax bill

DOTHAN, Ala. (AP) — President Reagan signaled House Democrats Thursday that "somebody's going to have to do a lot of explaining" if Congress adopts a top individual income tax rate higher than the 27 percent level approved by the Senate.

Portraying himself as siding with "the people's interest against the special interests," Reagan said a sweeping overhaul of the income tax system would demonstrate that lobbyists' "fancy briefing papers and expense-account lunches were no match for the will of the people."

In a two-hour visit to Dothan, a community of 52,000 in the southeastern corner of Alabama, Reagan outlined the approaching closing debate between House and Senate negotiators over the final shape of the tax overhaul he has sought for 3 1/2 years.

And in what aides called a populist approach to the tax issue, the president from California adopted the lingo of the rural South, telling his audience the American people say "that darn" to tax reform.

"You realize I'm only allowed to say 'darn,' but you know what I mean," Reagan said, as the crowd applauded.

Taking sides on the most fundamental of about 300 differences between the separate tax bills passed by the Senate and House, the president formally endorsed the new, lower tax rates contained in the Senate bill.

"Let there be any significant departure from the two low individual rates: of 15 and 27 percent, and the top corporate rate of 33 percent that the Senate has already approved, and somebody's going to have to do a lot of explaining," Reagan said in a speech to a luncheon sponsored by the local Chamber of Commerce.

In the hall, decorated in the fashion of a political rally with streamers of red, white and blue balloons and welcoming banners, Reagan spoke in front of a sign that said, "Bringing Tax Reform Down Home."

As he finished his speech, the president brandished an ax he said was given to him on a previous trip to Alabama by Sen. Jeremiah Denton, R-Ala. The tool was labeled "The Official Tax Ax," and Reagan promised to use it to cut down to size what he said are 57 feet of books incorporating the federal income tax code.

# Woman named new VISTA head

WASHINGTON (AP) — Jane A. Kenny has been named director of Volunteers in Service to America, where she will oversee the activities of nearly 2,500 VISTA volunteers in locally sponsored projects around the country, it was announced Thursday.

Kenny, a former special assistant to Vice President George Bush, has been serving as director of the executive secretariat at the General Services Administration.

**Powell gets clean bill of health**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — Supreme Court Justice Lewis F. Powell, given a new clean bill of health, said Thursday he has no intention of retiring.

"All their tests were negative, meaning there was no evidence of any recurrence of the cancer," he said of his June visit to the Mayo Clinic in Rochester, Minn.

Powell, 78, had a cancerous prostate removed in early 1985, an operation that caused him to miss participating in nearly one-third of the court's 1984-85 term. He also underwent a hernia operation last year.

But he missed none of the 1985-86 court term, and once again proved to be the leading "majority maker" on a court dominated by Centrist justices.

**Reagan committee cleared**  
WASHINGTON (AP) — The Federal Election Commission, overruling its staff, said Thursday that President Reagan's 1984 re-election campaign committee did not misspend \$2.1 million in pre-nomination expenses.

Had the commission upheld its audit staff, the Reagan-Bush '84 Committee would have been ordered to repay more than one-third that amount, or \$777,952, to the U.S. Treasury. That represented the portion of the contested amount that came from federal campaign funds.

**Call prompts Jell-O removal**  
By The Associated Press

General Foods Corp. on Thursday asked Jewel Food Stores in Chicago and Kroger stores in Detroit to remove certain Jell-O gelatin products from shelves after a caller claimed he had poisoned three boxes with cyanide.

The anonymous male caller, in a tape-recorded message, said he put sodium cyanide in three boxes of sugar-free Jell-O and placed them on shelves in a Kroger store in the Detroit area and a Jewel store in the Chicago area, the company said.

The message, which did not identify the particular stores, concluded: "Better take this seriously. This is no joke."

**Aftershocks jar desert resorts**  
PALM SPRINGS, Calif. (AP) — An earthquake aftershock jarred residents awake Thursday in desert resorts where workers continued to clear rockslides, replace shattered windows and scrutinize buildings for damage from a moderate tremor earlier this week.

The 6:02 a.m. MDT shock was centered about 12 miles northwest of Palm Springs — the same location as Tuesday's earthquake, said Dennis Meredith, a spokesman for the seismology labs at the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena.

# Navy man wrote espionage letters

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Former Navy radioman Jerry Whitworth wrote the "RUS" letters that were sent anonymously to the FBI and confessed involvement in spying for the Soviet Union, his attorney told the jury Thursday.

Attorney James Larson, in his closing argument in Whitworth's espionage trial, contended his client had been unaware of the Soviets' involvement in the spy ring run by his Navy buddy, John Walker, until shortly before writing the letters in 1981, and had cut off his supply of classified documents by then.

In the first letter, received in May 1981, the writer said he "didn't know that the info was being passed to the U.S.S.R. until after I had been involved a few years and since then I've been remorseful."

"I'm not going to quibble with you... The writer of the RUS letters was Jerry Whitworth," Larson said in his final argument to the jury. The letters were signed with the initials RUS.

Larson also said Walker had played on "Whitworth's gullibility and sympathy for Israel" in inducing him to disclose communications secrets that were actually destined for the Soviet Union.

"Walker knew that Mr. Whitworth was sympathetic to the state of Israel, and they had discussed it," Larson said. "He preyed upon the sympathy that Mr. Whitworth had expressed."

Walker also knew Whitworth was "a gullible person, a suggestible person," Larson said.

On Wednesday, Larson essentially admitted all of the prosecution's espionage case except the final, crucial point: that Whitworth intended or had reason to believe his disclosures would harm the United States or help the Soviet Union.

"There is no question that Mr. Whitworth received money, and a lot of it, for the classified information

which he provided over the years," he said. "The question is, what was his intent?"

Federal espionage laws prohibit disclosures intended to aid any foreign nation. But U.S. District Judge John Vukasin has ruled the prosecution is bound by the grand jury indictment against Whitworth, which refers only to the Soviet Union.

Walker, who pleaded guilty to espionage and was the chief prosecution witness against Whitworth, said he never told his friend about the Soviets' involvement. Instead suggesting the secrets were being given to Israel, the Mafia or a Soviet intelligence organization.

But Assistant U.S. Attorney Leida Schoggen said there was overwhelming evidence that Whitworth had knowingly provided vital cryptographic secrets to the Soviets "for the sake of the base of human motivations."

She cited Whitworth's training in security, which stressed the Soviets' interest in code secrets and this alleged "disclosures" of information prized by the Soviets.

"Jerry Whitworth knew that the information that he was communicating was going to the Soviet Union," Schoggen said in the prosecution's closing argument.

Whitworth, 46, of Davis, Calif., who retired from the Navy in 1983 after 18 years as a radioman, is charged with selling code and communications secrets for \$32,000 between 1974 and 1983 to Walker's Soviet-controlled spy ring.

Walker, of Norfolk, Va., pleaded guilty in October to spying for the Soviets for 17 years, and agreed to testify against Whitworth in exchange for a reduced sentence for Walker's son, Michael, who also pleaded guilty. Walker's brother Arthur was convicted of spying by a federal judge, a conviction that was upheld Wednesday by the 4th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

# Deputy awarded Carnegie medal

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — A 33-year-old Laramie County sheriff's deputy, who died in the Aug. 1, 1985 flood here attempting to save a 6-year-old from drowning, was posthumously awarded the Carnegie Medal.

The Carnegie Hero Fund Commission recently honored Robert Van Alyne Jr. with an award given to people who risk their lives to save or attempt to save the lives of others.

Van Alyne was among 21 other people from 12 states and three Canadian provinces to receive the award. Since the Medal was first awarded in 1904, about 7,000 have been given the Carnegie medal in the U.S. and Canada.

At the time of the flood, Kristy R. Hernandez was trapped by rising floodwaters on top of a car along with her mother and two others. Van Alyne waded through the swift current to the car, grasping a rope that had been extended from the car to a point out of the current.

He took Hernandez on his back and began to wade from the car, but he lost his grip on the rope and was swept away with the girl.

Their bodies were found the next day.

Before his last attempted act of heroism, Van Alyne had won the Humanitarian Service Medal during a 1979 tornado in northern Cheyenne. He won the same medal with an oakleaf cluster during the Mt. St. Helens volcanic eruption disaster.

He also received a certificate of recognition for saving a man who threatened to jump off the roof of the Plains Hotel in Cheyenne in 1976.

Van Alyne became a deputy with the Laramie County Sheriff's Department in 1981 and previously was a policeman in Cheyenne and Green River. A Cheyenne native, he graduated from Laramie County Community College here with an associate's degree in criminal justice.

# One dead from laced cocaine

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A multi-agency investigation has been launched by narcotics officers trying to find the source of cyanide which killed one cocaine user and may have hospitalized four others.

Local narcotics agencies have not found any cocaine containing cyanide, they are checking confiscated stocks of the drug for traces of the poison, Lt. Bernard Bailey of the Salt Lake County Sheriff's Narcotics Division said Thursday.

Both cocaine and cyanide were found in each of the five victims' bloodstreams, he said, but authorities were discounting the possibility that the victims were targets of an angry drug dealer.

"I would be hesitant to think that, because of the widespread difference in what we know of these people; we cannot connect them socially at all, so I'd have to discount that at this time," Bailey said.

Investigators have no leads apart from the presence of cyanide, and Bailey has appealed for information from the public, promising anonymity and conditional amnesty.

"We've got one fatality. We don't know if the rest of these are connected to that one, but we have to assume there could be a connection, even though the one thing we have that is in common

to all of them is that the blood screening shows traces of cyanide and cocaine," he said.

"We're really at a loss," Bailey said. "I probably shouldn't say this, but anyone who has information... I would give them amnesty for the period of time it takes to wrap this thing up."

Lt. Marty Vuok of the Metropolitan Narcotics Strike Force said testing for cyanide will commence on some cocaine purchased by undercover agents in the past few months, and on all cocaine purchased after Wednesday.

Meantime, the federal Drug Enforcement Agency — though not officially involved in the investigation — planned to ask offices in its national network about the problem has surfaced elsewhere, said Steve Lough, resident-agent-in-charge for DEA in Salt Lake City.

Further, Lough said he expected the DEA would formally enter the probe soon.

The first incident was May 30, when a 28-year-old man went into seizures in his West Valley City home, apparently after snorting cocaine, said West Valley City Police Detective Ron Edwards. The man, found unconscious by his wife, was dead on arrival at a nearby hospital.

Edwards said the death at first was attributed to heart failure. It wasn't until June 20, when the medical examiner completed his toxicology labo-

ratory work, that potassium cyanide was found, and blamed for the man's death, authorities said.

Potassium cyanide in its powdery form resembles cocaine, Edwards said.

The autopsy showed that the drug had been ingested through the gastrointestinal system, rather than smoked or injected intravenously. That is consistent with sniffing cocaine into the nasal passages, and then allowing it to drain into the throat, where it is swallowed, Edwards said.

Bailey said that in another case a woman had a seizure and went into a coma after apparently using cocaine at a University of Utah fraternity party in early June. He said a blood chemical screen revealed cocaine and cyanide in her system.

The woman, a nursing student, was sent back to North Carolina, where she remained unconscious, authorities said.

Three other cases have been reported. The most recent occurred Monday when a 21-year-old man was admitted to St. Mark's Hospital for cocaine overdose. He has recovered, but tests showed cyanide and cocaine in his system.

Bailey said the hospitals had declined to give investigators any other information about the four non-fatal incidents.

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**Hofmann lawyers seek delay**

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Attorneys for Mark Hofmann, the Mormon documents dealer charged with murder in the 1985 bombing deaths of two people, have asked for postponement of his trial on 11 counts of first-degree murder.

Hofmann, 31, is scheduled for trial in March, 1987, on two first-degree murder counts in the Oct. 15, 1985 slayings of Steven Christensen and Kathleen Sheets. He also is charged with 28 other counts, including allegations of fraud and theft by deception.

On Wednesday, defense attorney Ronald Yengich requested during a Wednesday hearing before 3rd District Court Judge Timothy Hansen that the theft trial be postponed until after Hofmann finishes his murder trial, which is expected to last two months.

"We can't prepare for this case and for the homicide case adequately. The homicide case is the focus of our attention," Yengich said.

In Utah, first-degree murder is punishable by either life in prison or execution by firing squad or lethal injection, depending on the jury's preference.

The theft by deception charges involve allegedly bogus historical documents that Hofmann is accused of having sold to the Mormon Church.

Hanson said he was inclined to schedule the theft case for some time in the summer of 1987, but he ordered Hofmann to appear Friday to say whether he was willing to waive his right to a speedy trial.

Meantime, prosecutor Gerry D'Elia discounted rumors that if Hofmann is convicted of murder the state will drop the 28 other charges against him.

"We won't take any chances. If Hofmann is convicted of capital homicide and sentenced to the death penalty, the case could be appealed for years to the Supreme Court," he said. "There is always the remote possibility that the Supreme Court could overturn a conviction."

"All cases deserve to be fully prosecuted. We believe a great number of frauds have been perpetrated against a number of victims and we intend to get to the bottom of the fraud," D'Elia said.

**Men climb bridge**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Three men climbed the cables of the Golden Gate Bridge on Thursday and stretched a banner protesting U.S. aid to the Nicaraguan rebels.

California Highway Patrol Officer Tom Stravers said all three were arrested 1 1/2 hours after they climbed the north anchorage of the bridge around 6 a.m.

The banner read "Contra Aid... \$100 Million For Murder," referring to the \$100 million in U.S. aid to the Contra rebels approved by Congress last month.

When the three refused to come down, maintenance workers climbed up and "skillfully persuaded them to get down off their bridge," Stravers said.



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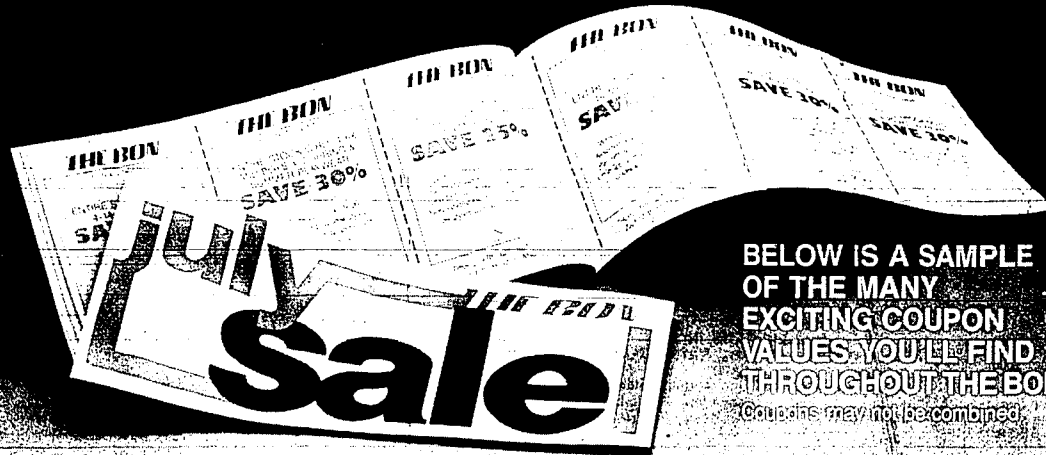

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# Vietnamese party chief dies at age 79 after serious illness

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Le Duan, who led the communists to victory in the bloody war for Vietnam after Ho Chi Minh's death in 1959, died Thursday in Hanoi. He was 79.

A Voice of Vietnam broadcast monitored in Bangkok said Le Duan, the Vietnamese Communist Party secretary-general, passed away after a serious illness. Kyodo, the Japanese news agency, reported from Hanoi that he died of a kidney ailment.

Ho's long-time comrade, a pro-Soviet hardliner who spent six decades as a revolutionary, fought the Japanese, French and Americans and was one of the communist world's most durable figures. Diplomats said his death may open the way for more liberal-minded leaders in Vietnam.

The broadcast made no mention of a successor. One informed diplomat in Bangkok, speaking on condition of anonymity, predicted that Le Duan's death would shift the balance of power in favor of younger, reform-minded party members who want to end Vietnam's isolation from the West and improve the troubled economy with capitalist-style incentives.

He said "the liberals will win over for sure," but change probably will be slow. The official Hanoi radio said five days of national mourning would be observed beginning Friday, and Le Duan's funeral will be held Tuesday.

Some Western diplomats in Hanoi, the capital of Vietnam, said Le Duan already had been effectively removed from the top leadership because of his age and falling health. They

Le Duan was born in 1907 in Quang Tri province in central Vietnam, according to the official radio, but most Western sources give the year of his birth as 1908.

He moved to Hanoi as a young man and worked as a secretary for the railways, but quickly became known as a strident leftist and agitator against French colonial rule. The radio said he was jailed from 1930-36 and 1940-45 for Communist Party activities.

Some of his prison time was spent in the punishing "tiger cages" of Con Son Island in the south. After North Vietnam won the war in April 1975, he returned to Con Son and was reported to have stood motionless for more than an hour in front of his former cell.

Le Duan became a member of the Communist Party Central Committee in 1939, the official radio said, and six years later was chosen to head the party committee dealing with southern Vietnam. He was made a member of the ruling Politburo in 1951, party first secretary in 1960 and became the top leader after Ho died in 1969.

Since 1976, he has been party secretary-general. The chairman's death, either to prevent a single leader from becoming too powerful or to honor his memory. One of Le Duan's deepest involvements was in charting Vietnam's economic course. At the 1976 party congress, he delivered a six-hour speech calling for construction of an industrial state and "large-scale socialist production" by the end of the century.

## Israelis halt raid, retaliate

ROSH HANIQA, Israel (AP) — Israeli units intercepted seaborne guerrillas Thursday, killing four in a battle that ended on the rocky coast, and Israeli aircraft raided a Lebanese refugee camp in south Lebanon 17 hours later.

The Israeli command and military sources said two Israelis were killed and nine wounded in the pre-dawn fight that began when a patrol boat spotted the Arab raiders in a rubber dinghy and ended in a shootout among the boats on the south Lebanon shore just north of this border post.

Command spokesmen said Israeli warplanes later scored hits on several buildings at the Ein el-Helweh refugee camp in Sidon. Lebanese police said four helicopter gunships and two Israeli missile boats attacked the camp with sustained barrages just before sundown. They said an ammunition dump was hit several times, exploding in a series of blasts that shook the port city and sent a huge ball of flame into the sky.

Ambulances raced into and out of the stricken camp. Police said at least one man was killed and nine other civilians were wounded, including five women and two children.

A Palestinian spokesman said various guerrilla factions expected a retaliatory raid and vacated all key bases and offices in the camp on Sidon's fringe.

The foiled coastal operation was the most serious attempt to infiltrate Israel's northern border since Israel withdrew most of its troops from Lebanon last June after a three-year occupation.

In Beirut, Lebanon, a joint statement said a "seaborne suicide operation" was carried out by four Palestinians and three Lebanese belonging to two Syrian-backed guerrilla groups — the Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine and the Syrian-Social Nationalist Party.

The announcement said the attack was aimed at the border town of Nahariya, where 30,000 Israelis live. A Syrian Social Nationalist Party officer in Lebanon said three guerrillas escaped to Sidon.

Israeli authorities did not say how many men were in the raiding party.

## Spain seeks troop cutback

MADRID, Spain (AP) — Spain and the United States opened talks Thursday in which Spain is seeking a sharp reduction in the number of U.S. soldiers in the country. Foreign Ministry spokesman Inocencio Arias told Spanish television the government wants to negotiate a substantial reduction in the U.S. presence without affecting the security of Spain, its other North Atlantic Treaty Organization partners, or the United States.

There are 12,500 U.S. military personnel and 1,670 civilians posted at two air bases, a naval station, a firing range, six communication stations and a weather station. Foreign Minister Francisco Fernandez Ordonez told Spanish National Radio Thursday he expected the negotiations to be long and difficult.

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Within an hour of Andreotti's appointment as premier-designate, the Socialist Party issued a statement expressing deep concern at the development and saying it marked a worsening of the crisis.

Sen. Pablo Fabri, leader of the socialist senators, called the selection of Andreotti "an expression of an irrational and unjust initiative of direct conflict with the Socialists."

AT&T Communications of the Mountain States, Inc. has filed an application with the Idaho Public Utilities Commission for a \$1.662 million increase in revenues within Idaho.

The company contends in its filing that the rate increase is "necessary to bring the prices for AT&T Communications' services more in line with costs. The most significant of these costs are the fees — called access charges — AT&T Communications pays to local telephone companies for connection to their network.

During 1985, AT&T Communications lost money on its intrastate operations in Idaho. To counter these losses and to meet its revenue needs, AT&T Communications is proposing the following changes:

- Increase rates 50 percent for intrastate long distance calls 55 miles or less. The company also is proposing "Idaho Community Calling", an optional calling plan that would offer AT&T Communications' customers who call short distances on specific routes an opportunity for significant price discounts.
- Reduce the discount for evening long distance calling (5-11 p.m., Sunday through Friday) from 40 percent to 35 percent and reduce the discount for calls made nights and weekends (11 p.m. to 8 a.m., nights, 8 a.m. to 11 p.m. Saturdays, and 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Sundays) from 60 percent to 48 percent.
- Increase WATS and 800 Service rates by an average of 8 percent and modify the structure to conform to the interstate structure.
- Increase private line rates for these dedicated circuits used by business customers. This average increase of approximately 48 percent would cover the cost of the special access charges being billed to AT&T Communications by the local telephone companies.

The proposal would not affect interstate calls, nor would it affect all long distance calling within Idaho. The proposal would apply only to AT&T Communications' long distance service between northern and southern Idaho, and between General Telephone's northern Idaho service area and other Idaho telephone companies. For example, the proposal would affect calls that cross the Salmon River, such as calls between Boise and Coeur d'Alene, as well as calls between Lewiston and Moscow.

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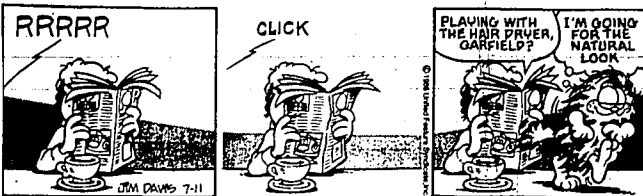

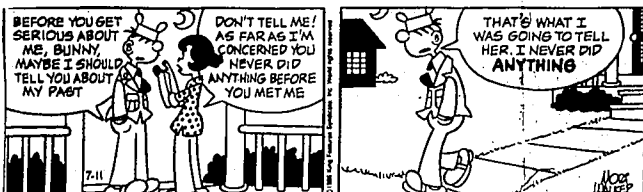

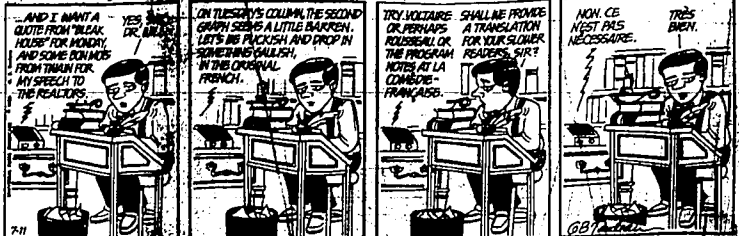

## Mountain men still defiant of system that jailed them

DEER LODGE, Mont. (AP) — Eighteen months behind bars has not dulled Don Nichols' defiance of the system that placed him in prison, the end of the line for a man whose dream was to live free in the mountain wilderness.

Nichols, now 55, spends all but four hours a day indoors, either in his high-security cell at Deer Lodge or at the prison library visiting with his son.

Deadly concertina wire and high fencing obscure his view of the nearby pine-covered slopes, reminders of where he once roamed in the Spanish Peaks south of Bozeman.

"Prison is just exactly like civilization," he said, shaking his head. "It's the same everywhere. If I had to stay in civilization, it wouldn't be so much different from living in Bozeman."

"They're not going to let me out of here."

Although they've turned down most requests for interviews since the kidnapping of Karl Swenson and the murder of Alan Goldstein two years ago this month, the Nicholoses recently requested an interview with *The Bozeman Chronicle*.

Nichols and his 21-year-old son appeared in a public hearing long from the high-altitude sun of the Madison Range.

The senior Nichols comes across in person as a lucid, articulate man whose gestures are reminiscent of a professor's. Don Nichols, the murderer and Don Nichols the conversationalist seem to be two different men.

Dar, who listed his occupation on his arrest form as "mountain man," has let his hair grow long since his trial 14 months ago. He takes high school classes, unlike his father, who stays in a medium-security dormitory, where he dabbles in pen-and-ink drawings of unicorns and "fairy tale characters."

Don Nichols said he realizes his only chance to get out of his 8-by-10 maximum-security cell for good is his forthcoming appeal to the Montana Supreme Court. He is doubtful about being paroled when he becomes eligible in 17 years, and he has refused to take a job in the prison kitchen, according to prison officials.

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The Nicholoses blame Goldstein for setting off the events that led to the 36-year-old Big Sky man's death.

## Rosa Parks backs Bond for Congress

ATLANTA (AP) — Rosa Parks, whose refusal to give up her seat on a Montgomery, Ala., bus sparked the civil rights boycotts of 1955, is backing Julian Bond over another movement veteran for Congress.

Bond, a state senator, and John Lewis, Atlanta congressman, are seeking the Democratic nomination to the seat being vacated by Rep. Wyche Fowler.

At a fund-raiser for Bond on Wednesday, Mrs. Park, 73, said she would choose him over Lewis.

"I have more knowledge of Bond as a political official than John," she said.

"I have known her much longer and probably have a much closer relationship," said Lewis. "I didn't ask her to come because I am not trying to bring in big names. I think it is an insult to be voters of the district to try and bring someone in to tell people how to vote."

## Rock star Boy George undergoes treatment to fight drug addiction

LONDON (AP) — Rock singer Boy George is under treatment for heroin addiction, his recording boss said Thursday, confirming reports that the flamboyant British star had a drug problem.

Richard Branson, founder and chairman of Virgin Records, said Boy George started a two-week treatment Monday to overcome his addiction and was "over the worst of it."

"He's doing very well," Branson said in an interview with *The Associated Press*. "He's fighting to get back and regain his old personality."

Branson refused to say where Boy George was being treated.

Press Association, Britain's domestic news service, said Boy George was thought to be in St. Andrew's Hospital in the center of England.

The singer, noted for his outrageous flowing gowns, pancake makeup and lipstick, has been the subject of intense media speculation over whether he had become a drug addict.

On Wednesday, four people — including one of his brothers, Kevin O'Dowd, 26 — were arraigned in London on charges of conspiring to supply heroin to Boy George, whose real name is George O'Dowd.

The arrests followed raids Tuesday by Scotland Yard narcotics officers on six London locations, including Boy George's home.

Although police said no drugs were found at his home, Scotland Yard issued an appeal Tuesday for Boy George to come forward to be interviewed about allegations of drug use.

A day later, Scotland Yard said it would be inappropriate to interview the singer until treatment was completed.

Branson, 35, a millionaire entrepreneur who owns Virgin Atlantic Airways in addition to the record company, said that on Sunday night, before the police raid, Boy George telephoned him seeking help in kicking heroin addiction.

Branson confirmed the singer was being treated by Dr. Meg Patterson, a British therapist who has helped several rock stars break drug habits.

Ms. Patterson helped pioneer the use of neuroelectric therapy to treat

drug addiction. It involves the use of mild electric shocks to stimulate the production of body chemicals that reduce both the craving for drugs and the usual withdrawal symptoms.

Only last week Boy George denied in a television interview that he had a drug problem. He laughed off suggestions made by a brother, David O'Dowd, 21, that he was addicted to heroin for eight months and lost about 40 pounds.

Asked why Boy George denied being an addict, Branson said: "What you have to realize is that when you have a drug problem, you don't want to admit it — you're embarrassed about it."

"It can take some time to live up to the fact and accept that you have a problem," he said, "and this was the case with Boy George."

The singer gained fame as lead singer of Culture Club, whose first single, "Do You Really Want to Hurt Me," shot to the top of the charts in 1982.

The group appeared to peak in 1983 with the release of the album "Color by Numbers," which included the No. 1 hit "Karma Chameleon."

Early in his career Boy George caused a sensation by appearing in women's clothes and makeup and openly admitting his bisexuality.

The Nicholoses have been portrayed as "psychopaths" in the book "Incident at Big Sky" written by Madison County Sheriff Johnny France, who arrested them after a five-month manhunt.

Don Nichols said France's book was "like the most cheap detective magazine I've ever read. El Cheapo. It was just so ridiculous."

He remains convinced that civilization is a sham, but will be at least 72 years old before he gets another look at it, except on the television he recently received as a present from his daughter.

But Dan, who could conceivably be released when he is 29, already has strong ideas about what he will do when he gets out, and those ideas don't include working 9 to 5. He rejects the middle-class dream of owning a home, new car and the other trappings of "town."

"You can see big business moving into town, but the same thing as in the Industrial Revolution — working for slave wages. It's the same thing today."

"For somebody my age to buy a house, we're going to spend the rest of our life paying for a house. It shouldn't be that way."

"If we're not slaves, I don't know what we are," Dan said.

He recalled an incident that strongly resembled the Swenson kidnapping. When he was 14, he decided to run away from home and threatened a Three Forks girl with a knife to get her to accompany him.

"It was basically the same thing," he recalled. "I wanted to get this girl and take her down the river. I had run away."

"I figured, I'll just take this girl," he said. "Of course, she ain't going to like it for a while, but maybe she will later. That's what I thought."

For his part, Don Nichols still holds out some hope of resuming his life outside of the confines of the state prison. He still looks hopefully to the mountains.

Where would he be 10 years from now if it had been different?

"The same place — the Madison Range, having kids, just living, exploring," Don said. "I know that this is going to seem like this is all a great idea and we're going to do it again. That's not the case. But I can't think about ever taking civilization seriously."

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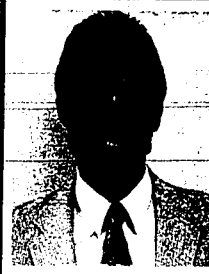

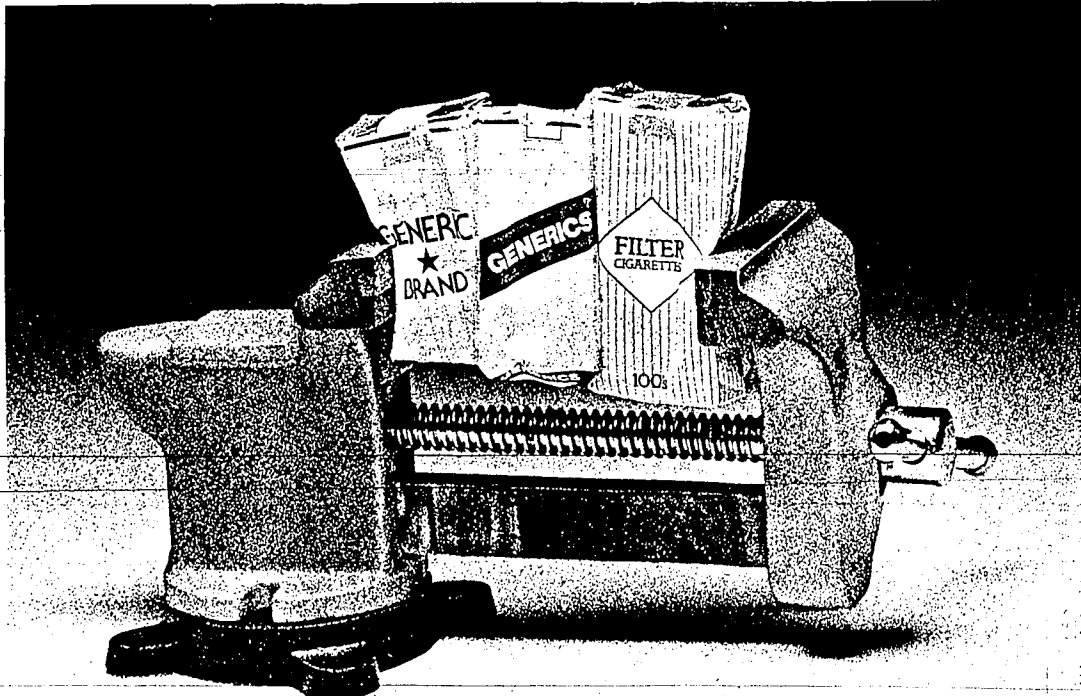
Carr paints from a palette of hues as subtle as his silhouettes. The tones — black, charcoal, silver, palomino and clay — accented with softer hues of peach and rose.

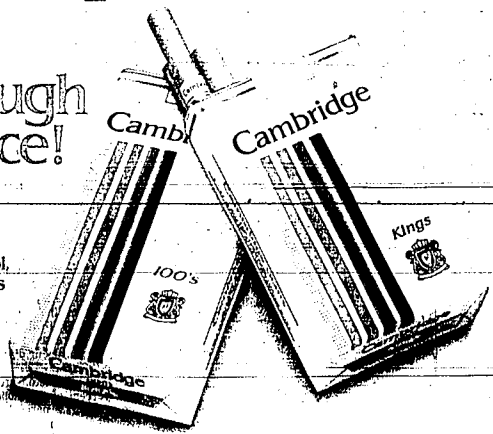

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# Bank scam warning issued

TWIN FALLS — The search is continuing for the person or persons involved in what Twin Falls police say was a bank fraud scam that defrauded a local woman of a large amount of money Tuesday.

Public Safety Director Tim Qualls said that although the individuals working the scam probably left the area, anyone asked to disclose information about their bank accounts or to draw out cash should contact police immediately. Even if it appears to be a legitimate request, Qualls said, the person should not turn over any money without having police check it out or without contacting their bank themselves for confirmation.

He urged residents to always obtain identification when approached by anyone who says they are a police

officer or an investigator of any kind and suggested not to deal in such matters on the telephone.

Any police officer or bank official will gladly provide identification and answer questions asked by the person they contact, he said, whereas an impostor will not.

Qualls said unfortunately those attempting to obtain money through scams and frauds will select victims that are good citizens who want to help those posing as investigators or banking officials.

In addition, Qualls and Police Cmdr. James Kissler explain that in a true investigation situation the bank official would probably ask the customer to meet at the bank with their staff, and would never ask anyone to take money out of their account.

The 82-year-old woman who was the victim of the bank scam in Twin Falls Tuesday was asked to withdraw money to help catch a dishonest bank employee. This is the same story that was used to extort money from other local elderly residents about two years ago, police records show. Qualls said two instances of similar fraud were reported in Boise just prior to Tuesday.

Officers warn that if the individual approached with such requests has any doubts, he can delay all action until checking with police and his own bank.

"There is no harm done in asking us to check out a suspicious situation, and it could save a loss of money," Qualls said.

half in the last couple years. I think it's going to help us out a lot," said Williams, who lobbied for the grant.

Many of his members are losing their jobs when dairy owners sell herds to the government.

To date, about 30 have contacted Job Service in the Magic Valley for retraining or job searches, said Jim Ingalls, Twin Falls manager.

Of those, only about three have started to retrain. "The reason is they were able to find employment,"

he said. "It is the farming season, so they could step into farming activities."

The retraining programs do not offer any income support, and some of the workers are not covered by unemployment insurance, which would provide income for living expenses.

However, Ingalls and Williams anticipate more interest from displaced dairy workers this fall, as more leave farm jobs and more dairy owners sell out.

"I've talked to about 40 dairies involved in the buyout for the (Aug. 31st), and they're still functioning," Williams said.

Idaho was among eight states receiving \$5.8 million in grants from the Department of Labor in the latest round. Each state receives a regular allocation each year, and they then compete for further money.

The dislocated worker program aids workers who have been laid off due to technological change, foreign competition or permanent closing of a plant or facility.

# Club gives \$500 to library for disk

# U.S. women cagers shock Soviets

MOSCOW — With Cheryl Miller again leading the way, and cheered on by a boisterous flag-waving contingent, the U.S. women's basketball team handed the Soviet Union its first major tournament defeat in 28 years, 84-60, Thursday night and won a gold medal at the Goodwill Games.

Miller scored a team-high 18 points as the United States surged from a two-point deficit to a 14-point halftime lead. And — supported by large group of Americans doing a stadium-style "wave" at halftime and chanting "U.S.A., U.S.A." Miller



and her teammates pulled away in the second half to win the biggest East-West matchup of the games.

The last time the Soviet women's national team had lost in major international competition was 1958, against Bulgaria. Other than that, the only loss for the USSR women in 154 games was to the United States in 1957.

"I can't believe we beat the Russians," said Miller, an All American at Southern California and a star of the U.S. gold medal team in the 1984 Olympics. "We were committed to defense and that was the way we did it."

The basketball style was the only

one for the Americans on the seventh day of the international sports festival. Athletes from Eastern bloc countries dominated.

Soviet athletes won eight gold medals Thursday to raise their total to 43. The United States has 31, and East Germany has six. The Soviets have 122 medals in all, and the U.S. has 87.

A team of Soviet cyclists set a world record in the 4,600-meter pursuit for the second day in a row — their time of four minutes, 12.31 seconds also was good for a gold medal.

A Swiss cyclist, Barbara Janz, edged American Melinda Mayfield

for the gold medal in the women's sprint.

Mark Gorski, the American gold medalist in the men's sprint at the '84 Olympics, advanced to the semifinals when his Soviet opponent, Otar Mchedlishvili, defaulted with an injury. But the U.S. silver medalist in Los Angeles, Nelson Valls, was eliminated by East Germany's Mikhael Hubner.

In diving, the women's springboard gold medal went to another East German, Brita Baldus, with 493.02 points. Tristan Baker of the United States was fourth at 476.64, while U.S. national champion Michele Mitchell finished seventh at 461.40.

Soviet athletes took gold medals in all four individual events of rhythmic gymnastics, with East German sharing the gold with two Soviets in the rope event. The best U.S. finish an eighth place for Diane Simpson in the ribbon.

But for the Navy Seabees who are stationed at the U.S. embassy and the other Americans in the basketball crowd, the United States won the only game that counted.

The Soviets moved in front early and led 21-19 with 9:20 remaining in the first half. That is when the Americans went to work.

The American League, which has lost 13 of the last 14 All-Star Games, selected eight pitchers, while the National League chose 10.

Gooden, 19, who won the 1985 Cy Young Award in the National League with a 24-4 record, has split his last four decisions, losing his most recent outing Wednesday, 11-1, to the Cincinnati Reds.

Both managers, Dick Howser of Kansas City for the Americans and Whitey Herzog of St. Louis for the Nationals, have indicated these two pitchers would start for their respective squads. Both are in their third seasons.

Smith, Cincinnati's John Gwynn, was the leading vote-getter for the National League.

"Winning the award will give me added incentive for the second half of the year to really put some numbers on the board," Strawberry said.

Strawberry attracted 1,619,511 votes, most in the majors and more than 135,000 ahead of the next most popular player in the fan balloting — Carter.

Also selected to the starting team for west second baseman Ryne Sandberg of Chicago, shortstop Ozzie Smith of St. Louis and third baseman Mike Schmidt of Philadelphia.

# Stocks rebound from slide

**NEW YORK** — The stock market bounced back from some early selling to post its second straight gain Thursday, recouping a bit more of the large losses it suffered early in the week.

International Business Machines shares and several stocks involved in takeover news and speculation paced the late upswing.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, down about 20 points at its lowest levels of the day, closed with a 5.76 gain at 1,831.83.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange reached 146.16 million shares, against 142.88 million Wednesday.

In the last two sessions, the Dow Jones industrial average has recovered a little more than 11 points after tumbling 80.14 Monday and Tuesday.

There was much speculation all day about an impending reduction in the Federal Reserve's discount rate. After the close, the Fed announced that it was lowering the charge on loans to private financial institutions from 6.5 percent to 6 percent, effective Friday.

Sanders Associates climbed 5 1/2 to 6 1/2 and Lockheed fell 3 1/2 to 32 1/2, both in active trading. Sanders agreed to be acquired by Lockheed for \$50 a share, rejecting a \$50 bid by Lorai Corp.

Associated Dry Goods rose 3/4 to 6 1/2. The company said it had held merger talks with May Department Stores, but hadn't reached an agreement, and was still considering buying back some of its stock.

General Electric, which reported a modest gain in second-quarter earnings per share, slipped 1/2 to 70 1/2.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, about eight issues rose in price for every seven that lost ground. The exchange's composite index added 13 to 139.68.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 173.23 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrials rose 0.2 to 270.29, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was up 19.43 at 243.01.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market dropped 1.36 to 392.03. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 273.13, down 58.

## ShopKo opening 4 new stores

**BOISE (AP)** — ShopKo stores are scheduled to open next Wednesday in Boise, Idaho Falls and Great Falls, Mont.

ShopKo, a general-merchandise discount department store, began in 1962 in Green Bay, Wis. Until last year, the company concentrated on small and medium-sized communities in the Midwest.

With the opening of stores in Chubbuck and Twin Falls in the fall, ShopKo will have 65 outlets in operation in eight states.

In 1985, the company announced plans to expand to the West. The Idaho and Montana stores are the first ShopKo stores in the Northwest; the company plans to open two stores in northern Idaho and four in Washington in 1987.

ShopKo Stores Inc. is a wholly-owned subsidiary of Super Wal-Mart Stores Inc. of Minneapolis, the largest food wholesaler in the United States. Since May, the company has operated a warehouse in Boise to supply new stores opening in the Pacific Northwest.

The company had sales of \$748 million in 59 stores in fiscal 1985.

## M-K reopening repair shop

**BOISE (AP)** — Morrison-Knudsen Co. Inc. was set to reopen its locomotive repair shop in Boise Thursday after negotiators for the company and workers reached a tentative contract settlement.

In a short session at M-K's headquarters in Boise on Wednesday, negotiators for Operating Engineers Local 570 agreed to recommend to its members an agreement that a company spokesman said was virtually identical to one rejected by workers last week.

On June 30, members voted overwhelmingly to reject a three-year contract that included wage reductions of 50 cents to \$2 an hour and changes in job duties and work classifications.

The settlement, hammered out in front of federal mediator Tom Curdick, will affect 25 workers who found themselves without jobs when M-K closed the shop on July 1.

"The decision was made to reopen the shop generally under the terms the company offered June 30, with minor modifications," M-K spokesman Vern Nelson said. "We are generally satisfied with what transpired."

Ed Kobe, president and negotiator for the union's local, could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

Morrison-Knudsen Co. Inc. is a subsidiary of Morrison Knudsen Corp., also based in Boise.

## Circle K posts record net

**PHOENIX, Ariz.** — The Circle K Corp. surpassed \$2 billion in sales and posted record net income of close to \$39.8 million during fiscal 1985, the convenience store chain announced.

The earnings topped the previous record despite a \$6.7 million deduction due to a lawsuit judgment and other legal expenses.

Sales for the 12 months ended April 30 were \$2.1 billion, 25.5 percent higher than the previous year, Board Chairman Karl Eller said. The results were boosted by income from acquisitions of one convenience store chain, Shop & Co. Inc., and of 187 stores formerly owned by National Convenience Stores Inc.

Earnings came to \$1.50 per share of common stock. "Earnings before the deduction for litigation costs were what we expected them to be," Eller said.

Circle K operates 3,435 convenience stores, including several in Twin Falls and other Magic Valley towns.

## All Bridger units running now

**ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo.** (AP) — All four units at the Jim Bridger coal-fired generating plant in western Wyoming are back in operation.

Idaho Power Co. said the plant was shut down for maintenance and installation of pollution-control equipment on one unit.

Idaho Power owns one-third of the 2,000-megawatt plant near Rock Springs. Officials said the unit's three fired units, major expense to operate hydroelectric facilities, often are idled for maintenance and to save money during periods of high water and low energy demand.

# Retailers post modest June sales gains

Retail sales rose modestly in June, helped by increased purchases of big-ticket items and by comparison with a low performance one year ago, analysts and the nation's major retailers reported Thursday.

Americans were more interested in the Fourth of July and Statue of Liberty celebrations than in shopping, and that hindered sales at the end of the period, the analysts said. But June is not a particularly significant month for retailers, they added.

Sears, Roebuck and Co., the largest retailer, said its sales for the five weeks ended July 5 rose 2.8 percent from the same period last year. Sales rose 8.7 percent at K Mart

Corp. No. 2, and 4.3 percent at J.C. Penney Co. Inc. No. 3.

Sales jumped 9.5 percent at No. 4 Dayton Hudson Corp. and 43 percent at fast-growing Wal-Mart Stores Inc., the fifth-largest retailer.

Jeffrey Edelman, an analyst with Dean Witter Reynolds Inc., noting that sales were being compared with a disappointing performance a year ago, said: "If we were to compare the numbers relative to May, there was very little change."

"The great deal of buoyancy in the sales, despite the easier comparison," said Walter Loeb, a retail analyst with the investment firm Morgan Stanley & Co. "I think it was a mixed bag. I think the consumer continues to be very cautious."

## Fed trims half percent off discount rate

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — The Federal Reserve Board on Thursday announced a reduction in the discount rate from 6.5 percent to 6 percent, effective today.

The cut had been widely anticipated by market analysts, with many expecting it to be even larger.

The last cut, from 7 percent to 6.5 percent, had come April 18 — a move made in concert with the central banks of Japan and West Germany, which also lowered their rates. That move drove the U.S. discount rate to its lowest level in eight years.

The rate was last as low as 6 percent in late 1977 and rose to a high of 14 percent in 1981.

The discount rate is the interest the Fed charges for loans to private banks and is the U.S. bank's most direct way to affect other interest rates in the economy.

Reductions in the rate usually pave the way toward drops in other rates throughout the economy, including the prime rate — the rate commercial banks charge their most credit-worthy corporate lenders.

It was the third time this year that the Fed has reduced the rate in an attempt to stimulate lagging economic growth.

On March 7, the central bank dropped the rate from 7.5 percent to 7 percent.

# People Express accepts United bid for Frontier

**NEWARK, N.J. (AP)** — People Express, the discount airline struggling for survival, rejected a \$220 million takeover offer from Texas Air Corp. Thursday and agreed to sell its Frontier Airlines subsidiary to United Airlines for \$146 million.

The Newark-based no-frills carrier, which has suffered because of rapid expansion, management problems and increased competition, bought Denver-based Frontier just eight months ago for \$305 million — and it has been a money-losing operation since, contributing \$28 million to People Express' \$58 million first-quarter loss.

People Express said in a statement that the Frontier sale was the "best available course of action to take and was in the best interests of the People Express shareholders."

The deal, with United followed wide speculation about the fate of People Express, which revolu-

tionized the air travel business with low fares when it started operations five years ago. People Express announced in late June it was considering a sale of all or part of itself.

After two days of protracted meetings, the People Express board of directors announced that it would sell Frontier to United for \$146 million, of which \$50 million will be paid next week.

Earlier in the day, Houston-based Texas Air said People Express had rejected its proposal to buy the entire company for \$9 a share in cash and securities.

Texas Air also said it had ended negotiations with People Express.

United, the biggest U.S. airline, said in a statement that the acquisition would "support our long-range strategic plans and enable us to continue the company's strong growth."

F.W. Woolworth Co. said June sales rose 9.1 percent to \$581 million from \$532 million. Year-to-date sales for the New York-based retailer increased 9.4 percent to \$2.475 billion from \$2.264 billion.

Montgomery Ward & Co., based in Chicago, said its five-week sales inched up 1.8 percent to \$389 million from \$382 million. For the five weeks, the sales decreased 1.3 percent to \$1.564 billion from \$1.584 billion.

Sagging oil prices net mixed benefits

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Should petroleum prices stabilize at less than \$20 a barrel, the resulting lower inflation and falling interest rates will reap benefits for Utah's economy, say state officials. In its June report, the Natural Resources Department's Utah Energy office said the most obvious economic effect of continued low oil prices would be felt by the state's motorists, who have seen pump prices for gasoline drop from roughly \$1.30 a gallon to the 95-cent range. However, the report said dropping petroleum prices, which slid from a \$36 per barrel peak some five years ago toward \$11 recently, also would hold promise for nearly all sectors of Utah's economy.

Sunshine extends plan for silver-index bonds

BOISE (AP) — Sunshine Mining Co. has extended until July 29 its offer to exchange \$115 million in debt for silver-index bonds. The proposal, which the company hopes will reduce the cost of long-term borrowing, was to expire Monday, but when two-thirds of the bonds in each of four issues had been tendered for exchange. Sunshine said in June the exchange hinged on getting agreements from holders of two-thirds of each bond issue. Sunshine said Tuesday it has received tenders from between 49 percent to 55 percent of the bondholders, depending on the issue. Sunshine, based in Dallas, is a major producer of precious metals, oil and natural gas. It owns Sunshine Mine in northern Idaho and has its operational headquarters in Boise. Silver-indexed bonds are tied to the price of silver. Sunshine's bonds are payable at maturity or can be redeemed earlier at \$1,000 or the market value of the bond's face amount of silver, whichever is greater. The company, hurt by depressed prices for silver, oil and natural gas, began the exchange in an effort to reduce interest costs and increase financial flexibility. Sunshine said it hoped to save \$5 million this year and \$12 million next year through the exchanges, by shortening the term of borrowing. Sunshine is offering to exchange four types of bonds. In May, the company reported it lost \$18 million in the first quarter of the year and expects losses for the fiscal year to be about the same as last year, \$57 million.

## Celebration to raise funds for arts center

SUN VALLEY — Celebration '86, a gala fund-raiser for the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, is scheduled for July 17-19.

Highlights will include a wine auction, Dixieland jazz concert, a kite flying festival and art gallery receptions.

On Thursday from 4 to 6 p.m., there will be a walking tour of Ketchum art galleries, each presenting a new show. In conjunction with this, vintners from throughout the West will offer their favorite wines.

Patron dinners will begin at 7 p.m. in restaurants and private homes. Multi-course gourmet meals will be designed around vintner's wine selections. Tickets are 75 cents.

Friday's events start at 10 a.m. with a wine symposium of eight food and wine experts, moderated by Bob Gensch, owner of J.W. Thornton Wine Imports. It is free to the public.

The Dixieland concert and gourmet picnic will be held outside at Trail Creek Cabin and will feature the High Sierra Jazz Band. This final

concert of the Wood River Music Festival starts at 6 p.m. and costs \$40 including the picnic, or \$8 for the concert only.

The finale is scheduled for Saturday. The Kite Flying Festival will begin in the afternoon at Dollar Mountain. Highlights include the flying of traditional o-dako kites made during prior workshops and the launching of a 350 square foot parafoil kite with a mile-long tail, designed by kite expert Tal Streeter.

A wine tasting will be held simultaneously from 2 to 5 p.m., also at Dollar Mountain. Participants can taste 150 wines at the base of the mountain and ride a chairlift to the top to sample several champagnes. Cost is \$10.

People can then attend a theme dinner and bid on imported donated wines at the dinner and wine auction. It will be held on the Opera House lawn in Sun Valley from 6 to 8:30 p.m. Tickets are \$40.

## Kite flying's raised to creative heights

SUN VALLEY — The next time you tell somebody to "go fly a kite," make sure you him the number of the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, 622-9371.

From Tuesday through Saturday, the Reach for the Sky Kite Festival, sponsored by the Sun Valley Center, will include free workshops for adults and children in the fabrication, decoration and flying of kites, and the construction and decoration of one or more large Japanese o-dako (traditional diamond-shaped) kites.

The workshops, conducted by kite master Tal Streeter, are scheduled for Tuesday through Friday from 10 a.m. to noon.

On Saturday, if the winds are right on Dollar Mountain, the sky will be a

montage of bobbing colors and shapes. Kites constructed in the workshops and brought in by the general public will take to the air.

Streeter will unveil his 350 square foot parafoil for the occasion. This monster sometimes requires a mile of tail for stability. All of this coincides with the Celebration '86 wine tasting festivities also on Dollar Mountain.

Streeter is the author of the book "The Art of the Japanese Kite." One of his works, a kite entitled "Flying Red Line," is in New York's Museum of Modern Art. He is currently chairman of the sculpture department at the State University of New York at Purchase and is an original member of the sky-artists group at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology's Center for Advanced Visual Studies.

## Annual arts, crafts festival moves to Ketchum mall

KETCHUM — Artists from throughout the Magic Valley will be among the 35 participating in the Wood River Invitational Arts and Crafts Festival Saturday and Sunday.

Formerly called the Elkhorn Arts and Crafts Festival, the 10-year-old event has been moved to the new Walnut Avenue Mall in downtown Ketchum. Artists from as far away as Minnesota and Florida will show and sell their work.

Paintings, ceramics, textiles, stained glass, woodwork, jewelry, metal sculpture and photography will all be available at the outdoor show and sale. Admission will be free; hours will be from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m., Saturday and 10 a.m. to 5 p.m., Sunday.

Gail Severn, who has organized the annual July show since it began, said those who attend will see some regular participants, and a few new ones. "Some of the artists change every year," said Severn. "But most come back." The 35 participants have been selected by a local jury, she said, "in an effort to assure a high quality of work. But the show is intended to 'provide an arena' for new artists as well, she said.

"I originally started it because the Sun Valley show (sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the

Arts and Humanities each August) had become quite selective," Severn said. "What the Center does is really good, but there was plenty of room for an additional show." She said neither has suffered because of the other, particularly because of the high number of local tourists.

"It gives two groups of people an opportunity to enjoy the arts," said Severn, adding that local residents also enjoy having "an additional cultural opportunity." The festival operates on a non-profit basis, she said, with proceeds from this year's show to be used to fund next year's version.

Other activities, besides the exhibition and sale of art, are scheduled for the festival. Two florists will display and sell flowers, and food booths are planned. But the art is the main attraction, and the works of many local artists and craftsmen will be prominent among the exhibits.

Magic Valley artists participating will include Twin Falls jeweler Dan and Pegan Venzon, Kimberly painter and woodcutter Gary Stone and Jerome metal sculptor Gus Flowers.

Other art will include watercolors by Lynn Toneri and windsweeps by Pam Rutherford, both of Hailley; black-and-white photography by Barbara Kline of Ketchum and ceramics by E.J. Holcomb and Jim Holcomb, working under the name "Idaho Mud-works," of Ketchum.

## 'Perversity' takes on tamer title

DALLAS — "Sexual perversity." The controversy started with that phrase.

There was no problem with the title's other two words — "in Chicago."

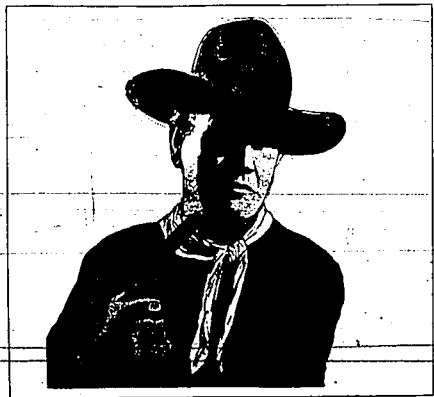
Still, television networks and newspapers refused to promote a movie with the title "Sexual Perversity in Chicago," based on David Mamet's one-act play of the same name.

When NBC announced it would run the film's ads only after 11:30 p.m., the movie's distributor, Tri-Star, and the film makers, producers Jason Brett and Stuart Oken and director Edward Zwick, quickly, if reluctantly, decided to change the title. The alternative they chose for the biting comedy-drama about dating singles is "About Last Night."

The movie features Rob Lowe, Demi Moore, Jim Belushi and Elizabeth Perkins as Chicago professionals embroiled in a romantic roundelay. The story deals with the lack of commitment in modern relationships and asks the question: Can a lasting relationship be built from a one-night stand?

"Right away, we had two choices," Oken said, addressing the title change during a recent interview here. "We could use the controversy to exploit the film and get mileage out of it. Or we could simply not allow the film to become second banana to a title controversy. In the end, we believed very strongly in the movie and felt that we should not allow it to become mired in a controversy."

At the same time, Oken lambasted the media for forcing the title change. \* See NIGHT on Page D2

swish. "It's too bad the media can exercise this kind of outrageous censorship," said Oken who, with his partner Brett, produced the popular stage version of "Sexual Perversity in Chicago."

"The word 'perversity' means 'contrariness' or 'confusion,' and the sad part was that the media didn't give their audience enough credit (to know that)."

Director Edward Zwick with a bit more passive.

"The title is one of the great titles of the American theater; everything else pales in comparison. But the studio allowed us to make the movie the way we wanted to, so we had to give them the opportunity to sell it. Still, I can't believe people don't know the difference between 'perversity' and 'perversion.' 'Perversity' doesn't mean dogs and sheep."

Co-star Elizabeth Perkins summed up the feelings of her colleagues when she called the name change "a major bummer."

"Everybody involved with the project hated changing the title because it was a great title and it said, 'In Chicago,' which is what it's all about," she said.

The title "About Last Night" was selected through a process of elimination involving 300 to 400 titles "ranging from the sublime to the ridiculous," Brett said.

The original title of "About Last Night" was not the film's only controversy. The caustically funny script is rife with four-letter words, and the love scenes between Demi Moore and Rob Lowe contain some of the most explicit nude sexuality in recent Hollywood history.

"Undoubtedly, some viewers will be offended by the nudity. But director Zwick defended his decision to include them in the film. "I felt if I was going to be true to the story's sensuality, then I had to be true to the love scenes," he said.

"The sex remains in the context of the story; it's one of the currencies of their relationship. It would be disingenuous not to do it. The sex also leads to love."

Actress Moore agreed with Zwick, but said it was extremely difficult to perform the nude scenes. "It was very emotional for me," Moore said. "I mean, you don't do this in front of people! When I did it, there were just four or five people in the room, just the people that had to be there. No video monitors were allowed. There was someone there to give me a robe as soon as each take was over. And everybody was really professional."

Moore built a lot of faith in Zwick and the director and the star held an open dialogue about the nude scenes from the first audition. The cast rehearsed the script for 1-2 weeks. "I think there is a lot of gratuitous nudity in films today," Moore added, "but in this film the love scenes really tell part of the story, and not all films do that. Sometimes they have nothing to do with the story. In this


one, it was important. It talked in terms of the characters' communication, their immediate attraction... I particularly loved how he (Zwick) dealt with it in terms of cutting (the film), because he made it part of the whole concept of living together, and what's really beautiful about it, what can be great about it. The sweetness of it."

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# Morita masterful in 'Karate Kid' sequel

**THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG).** This sequel to 1984's teen choppy-socky hit is another mass-audience action fairy tale — but without the obsession with virility, cheap cynicism and endless kick count of the "Cobra" and "Raw Deals." Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's Kid and Pat Morita's lamplish sage martial arts mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there, they stumble into a "Chinese Connection" story line, escalating kung fu, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected cross-cultural romance and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous; and you can even cheer for the heroes at the end without feeling sorry.

**ABOUT LAST NIGHT (R).** Playwright David Mamet's taut, vitriolic, dazzlingly funny valentine to the one-night stand is turned into a hilarious, insightful, bawdy Baedeker to the relationship today, post-sexual revolution and pre-ADS. Sensational performances by Demi Moore, Jim Belushi, newcomer

**AMERICAN ANTHEM (PG-13).** If you have seen "Flashdance" and "Purple Rain," if you have seen ravishing, loose-limbed bodies pulsing to a thunderous rock beat, then you have got a pretty good idea of the main ingredients in "American Anthem," a dimwitted film that makes a feeble attempt to breathe some life into the story of a young gymnast's bumpy quest for success. Directed by Albert Magnoli, who was at the helm of "Purple Rain," this film only reminds us how much these rock-drenched teen dreams need the presence of an incandescent performer like Prince to add a shower of sparks to an otherwise dreary, predictable celebration of teen angst.

**BACK-TO-SCHOOL (PG-13).** A big belly laugh of a comedy, expertly tailored to the talents of Rodney Dangerfield, cast as a boisterous self-made clothing tycoon who

enters college to set a good example to his wallflower son (Keith Gordon). A sleek, witty Sally Kellerman is Dangerfield's English prof and a hilarious Adrienne Barbeau is Dangerfield's social-climbing, two-timing wife. With Robert Downey Jr., Eriq La Salle, Ned Beatty, Terry Farrell.

**FERRIS BUELLER'S DAY OFF (PG-13).** Teen chronicler John Hughes has constructed the mythic heroism of Ferris Bueller (Matthew Broderick), a gliding scamp who is too savvy for his parents, too cool for school and an absolute terror when it comes to restaurant maitre 'de's. The film's hook is a tantalizing fantasy, for adults as well as kids — what if you could fool your parents and teachers (or for that matter, your boss) into thinking you were sick, earning yourself a 24-hour free ride from the boredom and responsibilities of real life? But Hughes miscalculates badly, making his hero so smug and invincible that he does not give us any chance to root for him.

**LABYRINTH (PG).** There are individual themes of imagination and wonder here — an Escher mirror that defies gravity — and a fantastic ballroom sequence — and Jim Henson & Co.'s puppetry is at an advanced state. But the story does not spark the way it should. It is a quest

movie in which a young girl must rescue her baby brother from the hands of the Goblin King, played by David Bowie. And it owes a lot to Maurice Sendak; but only his creatures and the story of "Outside Over There," not his wild, dark, imaginative side.

**LEGAL EAGLES (PG-13).** Badly miscalculated romantic comedy-thriller involving art fraud and murder. Never have Robert Redford, Debra Winger or Daryl Hannah been caught in worse circumstances. An inept, incoherent and charmless attempt at sophistication by producer-director Ivan Reitman, much more at home in the rambunctious humor of "Animal House," "Meatballs," "Stripes" and "Ghostbusters."

**TOP GUN (PG).** The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, jocular male-bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, massed clouds, streaking jets, and so much techno-pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: The trappings are flabbergasting — and the camerawork and editing — a knockout — but the story is a sleazy rehash of "Celling Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman," drowned in beefcake and macho bathos.

# 'Karate Kid, Part II' tops slow holiday weekend

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — "Karate Kid, Part II" remained the box office champion over a holiday weekend in which movie audiences apparently preferred barbecues, fireworks and Lady Liberty to kiddy, kidnapping and college at the movies.

This year's fourth of July weekend movie business fell 23 percent short of last year's \$43 million holiday weekend gross, and was down about 29 percent from the weekend before.

"Karate Kid" celebrated Independence Day with some free screenings, but still pounded all competitors on its way to a \$6.3 million weekend take.

"Ruthless People," the comedy in which Danny DeVito Jr. takes his overbearing wife, Bette Midler, get kidnapped, totaled \$5.3 million to take second place.

"Back to School," in which Rodney Dangerfield gives his son a lesson on how to succeed in college, finished

third, amassing \$5.1 million for Orion Pictures.

Flying in fourth place was "Top Gun." Paramount's adventure lost little altitude, recording the lowest decline in business over the previous week, an 8 percent drop to \$4.6 million.

Universal's "Legal Eagles," starring Robert Redford, charmed \$4.4 million from moviegoers this weekend. The comedy drama, which also stars Debra Winger and Daryl Hannah, finished in fifth place.

Billy Crystal and Gregory Hines play two cops who manage to squeeze some laughter in between the gun battles in "Running Scared." The team earned \$4.2 million for United Artists-MGM to grab the No. 6 spot.

"Ferris Bueller's Day Off" made off with \$3.4 million and seventh place.

The remainder of the top 10 was made up of newcomers.

Audiences checked into the Bates

Motel for another visit with Anthony Perkins in "Psycho '81." The Universal slasher-sequel grossed \$3.2 million for eighth place.

Disney's animated feature "The Great Mouse Detective" gave children something see over the weekend. The yarn collected the 19th spot by earning \$3.22 million.

"About Last Night" had an impressive \$4,910-per-screen average — better than any other film wide release — to go with its generally good reviews. The Rob Lowe-Demi

Moore romantic comedy finished in 10th place with \$3.1 million.

Two newcomers failed to make the top 10 — Prince's directorial debut "Under the Cherry Moon" and John Carpenter's "Big Trouble in Little China."

"Cobra," which had been predicted to rule the summer box office business, dropped to 16th place after six weeks in release. Also, after one week in the top 40, "Labyrinth" and "American Anthem," fell to 13th and 15th, respectively.

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## Pavarotti scores hit on China tour

**PEKING (AP)** — Luciano Pavarotti said when he arrived June 22 that he was here to "discover a new world." By the time the renowned tenor left on Tuesday, Chinese opera fans agreed that he also had brought one with him.

"There has never been a single singer whose performances were so enthusiastically received by Peking audiences," Li Xingchang, chief of the opera department of the Central Conservatory of Music, told the Peking Daily.

Chinese audiences usually are sedate. For Pavarotti as the young poet Rodolfo in Puccini's "Boheme," they stomped their feet and repeatedly shouted "Bravo!"

Scalpers outside Peking's Tianqiao Theater charged as much as 80 yuan (nearly \$22), a month's pay to most Chinese, for a ticket to see Pavarotti and the Genoa Opera Company.

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## Jazzing it up grandly in Montreal

MONTREAL — Call it what you will: A carnival, a festival, a party; by any name the seventh annual Festival International de Jazz de Montreal adds up to the largest and most diversified assemblage of jazz or jazz-related talent ever distributed around one city.

The statistics for the festival, which opened the weekend of June 30-31, are a press agent's dream: 1,000 musicians over the 10-day span, offering at least 25 concerts daily, half of which are indoors at various theaters and clubs; the remainder are free concerts held on sidewalk stages. The \$1.5 million (U.S.) budget is provided partly by commercial sponsors, partly by the Quebec Ministry of Cultural Affairs.

This year the number of areas blocked off to vehicular traffic has been increased, but this seems to have done little to alleviate the congestion. Along the Rue St. Denis by mid-evening the street is so crammed with revelers —

not to mention jugglers, clowns, fire-eaters, Canadian Dixieland street bands — that movement from one concert hall to another becomes a near impossibility.

Midway through the festival, on Canada Day (July 1), the national holiday, the action normally slows down, but this year an exception was made for Chuck Mangione. Playing at an outdoor setting on St. Catherine Street, he drew a crowd estimated by police at 22,000; most of them ranged a full block down the street, while others watched from the windows or rooftops of nearby buildings.

If Mangione was the most spectacular crowd collector among the free events, the honors to date for the most remarkable indoor concert must go to Milton Nascimento. The emotionally captivating Brazilian singer and showman packed the handsome Salle Wilfred Pelletier in the Place des Arts.

Like several of the presentations since the festival opened last weekend, this was a unique recital. Nowhere else has Nascimento offered a

comparable series of surprises. Four numbers into the show he brought on Wayne Shorter. No stranger to Nascimento, who made a guest appearance on Shorter's "Native Dancer" album more than a decade ago, the saxophonist redoubled the energy of the soul-rock-bossa groove during his three tunes.

After intermission Nascimento introduced the guitarist Pat Metheny, who, as one observer told me, "is like a God in this city." Metheny, who has yet to miss a Montreal festival, added his vivid, exciting presence to a samba and a ballad. Not long afterward, Herbie Hancock, hot and ready after a concert with his own quartet a mile away, merged with spellbinding control into this unconventional context, with a pair of electric keyboard solos that blended all the elements: Brazilian, jazz, West Indian, African and rock. The audience exploded into an ovation so uproarious that both Hancock and Metheny returned for an encore during which the entire jubilant crowd remained standing and swaying.

## Texan pianist will perform free Brahms concert at 'Y'

TWIN FALLS — Geargo Thomas, a graduate of the Abilene Christian University in Texas, will be presenting a piano recital at the YFCA tonight at 8 p.m. The recital will be free of charge and open to the public.

Thomas, 40, has played the piano since he was eight years old. He is currently touring the Western states for the second time in order to "develop my career as an individual artist."

The 20-day tour covers 10 cities in the Western states. The concerts have been entirely Brahms music on this tour.

Thomas is originally from Texas, where he received an undergraduate degree in theatre from the Abilene Christian University. When not touring, he has been studying for a master's degree in music from the Texas Christian University in Fort Worth.

Shortly after receiving his

undergraduate degree, he studied piano in Seattle, Wash., with Rossy Frantz.

His tours of the U.S. have involved dividing the country into three sections, and covering one section at a time. He has toured the entire country playing Bach pieces and is now going around for the second time with Brahms.

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## Reagan's son quite visible in all media

WASHINGTON (AP) — Ronald Prescott Reagan seems to be everywhere these days — hawking credit cards on TV, reporting on the July 4 extravaganza in New York, and dancing across a national magazine spread clad in the skimpiest of briefs.

The president's younger son has become the most visible of the four first-family offspring, thanks to his jack-of-all-media career.

The former professional ballet dancer, who has written articles for several magazines in recent years, is raising eyebrows not for his writing but for a risqué, full-page photo of him in the current issue of Vanity Fair.

"It is bold. There's no question," said Reagan's agent, Michael Carlisle of the William Morris agency in New York. "One should remember that he was a dancer and that to some extent the pose is a dancing pose."

The revealing photo, accompanying a story on Reagan's evolving career as a TV journalist, movie actor, magazine contributor and entertainer, shows Reagan posed in red bikini briefs, an unbuttoned white shirt and socks.

Carlisle said the idea for the photo, accompanying others of Reagan in an outfit of white slacks and red-and-white striped jacket, came from photographer Annie Leibovitz.

"I think his feeling was it was no big deal," Carlisle said of the underwear shot. "He's a dancer and he's not ashamed of his body."

But Carlisle then added that during the photo session, "It was something that evolved, but with reluctance," on the part of Reagan, whose wife Doria is a college student studying psychology in California.

At the White House, assistant press secretary Mark Weinberg said the president and first lady Nancy Reagan had seen the magazine and, "They thought it was very cute and Fourth of July-ish."

The president's 28-year-old son whose affable grin is familiar to viewers of ABC-TV's "Good Morning America," has been maintaining an increasingly high profile in his television career as well.

He was unavailable for an interview because he was too busy working, Carlisle said.

Two commercials Reagan did for American Express cards began airing last week.

## Liberty show pushes ABC to ratings top

NEW YORK (AP) — Liberty Weekend helped ABC pull itself up by its own bootstraps, as the third-rated network won both the prime-time and evening news ratings last week thanks to its extensive coverage of the Statue of Liberty's coming-out party.

Figures released Tuesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed that ABC's nightly Liberty Weekend specials finished first, second, 10th and 48th in the rankings, leading ABC to its first prime-time triumph in nearly two months with an average rating of 13.9 to NBC's 11.9 and CBS' 9.5.

In the volatile news competition, ABC's "World News Tonight," apparently benefiting from an early tune-in for Liberty Weekend events, scored its first victory since May 1982, when the late Frank Reynolds was anchor.

Since early June, when the "CBS Evening News" streak of 213 consecutive first-place finishes was stopped by NBC, each nightly newscast has been in first, second and third. Last week, Peter Jennings' "World News Tonight" averaged a 9.9 rating, Dan Rather's "CBS Evening News" a 9.4 and Tom Brokaw's "NBC Nightly News" a 9.2.

The news race is so close that on

livening up what has become an annual case of the summertime blues. Perhaps this year's contest will be different. ABC airs the 57th All-Star Game from the Astrodome in Houston on Tuesday. But the All-Star contest has had its share of memorable games, two of which mark significant anniversaries this year. Here's a look:

Ten years ago: In honor of the nation's bicentennial (and baseball's centennial), the 1976 All-Star Game was held in Philadelphia. Among the 63,000-plus at Veterans Stadium was President Gerald Ford. But the real attraction was the American League's starting pitcher — Mark Fidrych, the bizarre "Bird" of the Detroit Tigers, the 21-year-old mookie who galvanized the sports world with his habits, which included talking to baseballs. Fidrych would go on to win 19 games in '76, but he was rocked by the NL hitters, yield-

ing two runs and four hits in two innings. By 1980, Fidrych would be out of the big leagues. Today he's a farmer living in Massachusetts. The NL went on to notch a 7-1 victory, with George Foster of the Cincinnati Reds winning the game's MVP. Foster, now ending his career as an overpaid New York Mets outfielder, was one of five Reds picked by fans in the starting lineup: 3B Peter Rose, 2B Joe Morgan, C Johnny Bench and SS Dave Concepcion.

Twenty years ago: the heat was on at the 1966 game at the brand-new Busch Memorial Stadium in St. Louis — and it wasn't just generated by Sandy Koufax's fastball. The temperature reached 106 degrees, and was close to 120 degrees on the playing field. More than 150 people had to be treated for heat-induced ailments.

The 50,000 fans watched a tightly played game that the NL finally won, 2-1, in the bottom of the 10th. Cardinal C Tim McCarver, who opened the frame with a single, eventually scored on a one-bagger to right by Dodger SS Maury Wills. McCarver, now a well-regarded sportscaster, will mark the 20th anniversary of his game-winning run as a member of the ABC broadcast team.

# Rough Latin lover role prompts proposals from fans, actor says

Women on TV soaps take some abuse from out-and-out villains; but, as a rule, they are treated fairly well by the men in the afternoon dramas. An exception is the character of Tonio Reyes, the Latin lover on "As the World Turns" who places sexual demands on his wife and has been known to smack her around a bit from time to time.

Peter Boynton, the dark and handsome actor who plays Tonio, doesn't see his character as a completely black-hearted villain. He justifies Tonio's rather heavy-handed treatment of his wife as frustration, knowing that the woman he married is still in love with another man.

Before Peter took the role of Tonio, he played mostly nice guys in soaps (Brent Cameron in "One Life to Live" and Beau in "The Catlins"). Peter says it's more fun to play a man like Tonio because there are more shadings to his character and more room for changes.

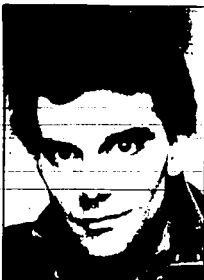
Peter didn't set out to work in soaps. All his previous acting was in the theater, mostly in musicals. He also is a musician/composer and has been playing in rock bands ever since he was in the sixth grade.

"I love music and it is always a big part of my life," said Peter. "I built a small studio in my apartment and there are times when I can shut out the world and work on my music."

In addition to composing and playing keyboards, Peter also sings and has appeared in a number of singing roles off-Broadway and in stock.

"My first professional job was in a touring company of 'The Sound of Music' with Ann Blyth and Jean Pierre Aumont," said Peter. "However, by the time I came to New York, there were only a handful of jobs in musicals, so I decided to branch out and pursue other acting jobs as well."

A: Burt's career has been languishing in the pits lately. His recent flicks have bombed at the box office. "Heat," his latest movie, was shot in Las Vegas, and was a nightmare for him. Three directors were called in to control the chaos and get the picture made. Even worse, one of them filed a \$25 million lawsuit against Reynolds, claiming that the actor punched him in the face and knocked him unconscious. But Reynolds, ever the optimist, isn't quitting. Burt's next outing, he tells me, is something called "Malone." He'll play an ex-government agent who saves a town being terrorized by a radical right group. Let's hope the movie is a pleasure to make, is as exciting as it sounds and that the public likes it.

Q: Heather Thomas, that cute actress who was a mainstay with Lee Majors on TV's "The Fall Guy," is a real stunner. Is she married? — K.B.

A: Heather Thomas married Hollywood psychotherapist Allan Rosenthal in August 1985. Now Heather tells me she and Allan have decided to call the whole thing off. She won't say why. I have a hunch it might be those long separations. Seems she just returned from Sri Lanka, near India, where she was making a film called "Jungle Heat." The heat has obviously gone out of Heather's marriage.

Q: We hear that former "Hollywood Squares" TV host Peter Marshall is now playing a flaming homosexual on the stage. What's going on? — M.R.

A: For the last year and a half, Marshall has played the lead in the touring version of the Broadway hit musical, "La Cage-Aux-Folles." tion was benign. As you can imagine, the immensely relieved actor returned home and resumed work with unusual zest. Sounds like an episode from Jack's "Quincy, M.E." show.

Q: Tell me truthfully, isn't the movie career of Jerry Lewis, whom I admire tremendously, just about finished? — T.B.

A: Had you asked me that several months ago, I would have responded very definitely in the positive. Jerry's most recent flicks, "Hardly Working" and its sequel, drew minimal public notice in the U.S. But, the good news for Jerry's fans is that producer Dino De Laurentiis is laying out \$6 million so that Jerry can star, direct and produce "The Nutty Professor II." It'll be released early next year as a sequel to the 1963 comedy in which Jerry played a wildly schizophrenic college professor — nerd one minute, Mr. Cool the next. Lewis devotees consider "The Nutty Professor" Jerry's best flick. I wish Lewis well this time out.

Q: As a fan of "Singin' in the Rain," I was delighted to see Debbie Reynolds and Donald O'Connor reunited on the Academy Awards TV show. Any chance they'll form a regular dance team? — W.V.

A: Your enthusiasm is apparently shared by a lot of people. Soon after the Oscar telecast, Debbie and Donald staged their dancing show at an Atlantic City nightclub to standing ovations. Now they've decided to take their act on the road starting in August. The show will be "a good way to keep our weights down," says 54-year-old Debbie. During their last stint, for example, Donald, 60, dropped 40 pounds while Debbie got herself in shape for a video offering beauty tips.

Q: I haven't read anything lately about Erik Estrada, that hunk of an actor who starred in "CHIPS" on TV. What's happened to him? — G.S.

any given week, a little advantage can swing one broadcast into first place," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

"You'd have to say that (Liberty Weekend) helped," said Carol Olwert, ABC's director of news information.

"World News Tonight" won Monday and Wednesday nights, before Liberty Weekend began, then on Thursday and Friday. Jennings was anchor for much of Liberty Weekend's coverage.

ABC paid \$10 million for exclusive rights to the entertainment portions of the four-day spectacle of fireworks, music and, of course, the refurbished statue. ABC devoted 12 hours in prime time to its coverage, compared to two hours on CBS and one on NBC.

ABC sold all its commercial time, at \$165,000 for 30 seconds in prime time and \$30,000 in daytime, totaling \$30 million. With the \$10 million rights fee, \$4.5 million for production costs, another \$4.5 million in ad agency fees and \$1 million for the standard compensation to affiliates for taking network programs, ABC made about \$10 million on Liberty Weekend.

"That's several million more than we would have made on summer

rerun programming," said Richard C. Connelly, ABC's vice president of public relations.

During ABC's 17½ hours of daytime and prime-time coverage, ABC ran 29 promotional messages for Jennings and "World News Tonight." "You can't measure that ruboff effect," said Connelly.

ABC's coverage even knocked down NBC's top-ranked "Cosby Show." Although a "Cosby" rerun beat the first half hour of ABC's Opening Ceremonies Thursday, the hit comedy had only a 17.4 rating, 34 share and ranked fourth for the week. One week earlier, "Cosby" was first with a 23.4 rating, 48 share.

A single ratings point equals 859,000 households. A share measures the percentage of homes with their sets on that are tuned to a broadcast.

After "Cosby" concluded, ABC's Opening Ceremonies gained viewers and finished with a 19.9 rating, 37 share, ranking first for the week of June 30-July 6. Meanwhile, also on Thursday, CBS' two-hour Liberty special averaged a 7.7 rating, ranking 46th, while NBC's one-hour Liberty broadcast had a 9.3, ranking 39th.

In the rest of the Top 10, Friday

night's International Fireworks and American Music Celebration on ABC ranked second with an 18.4 rating. NBC's movie "Rearview Mirror" was third, followed by "The Cosby Show" NBC's "Golden Girls," ABC's "Growing Pains," ABC's "Who's the Boss?," NBC's "Me & Mrs. C.," NBC's "Family Ties" and, in a tie for 10th, ABC's Sports Salute and Closing Ceremonies and CBS' "Murder, She Wrote."

When NBC was considering bidding for Liberty Weekend, its research department projected ratings that nearly matched ABC's eventual four-night average of a 15.2 rating. Recently, NBC lowered its forecast and predicted it would win last week's ratings.

"We made a mistake," Jaffe said. "We thought our comedies would hold up better. Liberty Weekend was a juggernaut that hurt everybody. But the good thing is that Liberty Weekend is now canceled."

The only weak Liberty link was Saturday's Classical Music Salute, which averaged a 7.3 rating and ranked 48th out of 56 prime-time programs.

"If I had any regret," Arledge said, "it's that more people didn't watch Saturday night."

# Joanna Kerns says June Cleaver influenced her TV mother role

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Joanna Kerns says she sees her role as a working mother in ABC's "Growing Pains" as a 1960s version of June Cleaver of "Leave It to Beaver."

"Although," Miss Kerns hastily added, "I don't think June ever walked in a protest march in Washington, as did Maggie Seaver on our show."

Miss Kerns said she grew up very much influenced by characters like Beaver's mom on television in the 1950s and early 1960s.

"I think the influence of '50s television is that it made us all want to be 'Supermom,'" she said. "I was working here and there on commercials when I had my daughter. Then I was on the series 'The Four Seasons'—it was a very difficult schedule; being mother, wife and actress. I think those programs made you feel that you had to do it all."

"I think our program shows that you don't have to be all things. One of the things we're going to deal with is the guilt a mother feels when she goes to work. Every mother feels if she's not home cooking the pot roast she's not doing enough. That's not true. For years men's work took them away from home and they missed things in their children's lives and guilt was never mentioned."

Miss Kerns stars in the popular domestic-comedy with Alan Thicke. The show made its debut last fall and promptly became one of the few reliable audience pleasers on the third-place network.

She grew up in Northern California in a sports-minded family — she was a gymnast — but says there was a lot of tension involved.

Her father was an all-conference football player at the University of California at Berkeley. Her older sister is Donna de Varona, who won

two gold medals in swimming at the 1964 Olympics and is an ABC sportscaster. Her younger brother, Kurt, is a professional golfer.

"Donna was getting a lot of attention at that time," she said. "I was such a rebel. You can have siblings who at the core are very similar, but are different in their trappings. Donna didn't wear makeup. I looked like Twiggy with all the makeup. Whatever Donna did, I didn't do. Whatever she didn't do, I did."

"Dad was very supportive of us both, but whenever he came to the gym to watch me work out we got into arguments. I told Donna she was lucky, she was under water. I wrote a screenplay about my relationship with my father. My friends called it 'I-Never-Swam-for-My-Father.'"

"Donna got so much attention, outside the family as well. She would fly to Japan to swim for the emperor. What it made me do was strive very hard to be successful. It gave me the kick I needed. I don't think I would have moved to New York and endured the cattle calls for roles. I think the sports background helped me survive. It taught me that you can fail."

She participated in the Olympic trials for 1968 but did not make the

top 10 who went to the gymnasts' training camp.

A tall, willowy blonde, Miss Kerns enrolled as a dance major at UCLA, but left in 1970 when she auditioned for Gene Kelly's West Coast production of "Clown Around." In 1971 she joined Joseph Papp's national road company of "Two Gentlemen of Verona."

She made the transition to acting when she moved to New York and studied with Lee Strasberg. Burgess Meredith gave her her first break as an actress when he cast her in a production of "Ulysses in Nighttown" with Zero Mostel and Tommy Lee Jones.

"I was doing a lot of commercials then, too," she said. "I was into irregularity, indigestion and static ciling. When I did 'The Four Seasons' I had about 20 commercials on the air and no one was aware of it. I guess I was also the June Cleaver of commercials. I did a commercial for cough syrup that was right out of the 1950s."

She met her husband, Richard Kerns, a commercials producer, while doing a spot for "My Fair Lady." They are now divorcing.

"It was much easier auditioning after I became a Kerns," she said.

# Producer David Wolper scores success with 'his' Liberty event

NEW YORK — On his left hand, impresario David Wolper wears a gold pinky ring, emblazoned with the insignia of the 1984 Olympics. But as Liberty Weekend draws to a close, it is not clear if he will want to replace his Olympics ring with one bearing the Statue of Liberty.

Even as futuristic fireworks lit up the sky and as historic vessels sailed up the New York Harbor, Wolper, Liberty Weekend's executive producer, was still viewed in Manhattan circles as that most awful of apparitions—a man from "the Coast."

He took his compliments where he could get them. "The president was really moved at the lighting of the statue," Wolper said over and over. "The look on his face — and then he gave me a wink."

Wolper was sure reviews would be good, turning around critics who attacked Liberty Weekend before it started. And such criticism obviously cut through his cool exterior — like the constant reference to him by New York media as a "Hollywood producer."

"I'm a Burbank producer," the Warner Bros. executive stoutly insisted. "Nevertheless, Wolper pocketed the bejeweled American-flag lapel pin Elizabeth Taylor gave

him minutes before he appeared on network TV as part of opening ceremonies, explaining that it might look "too flashy."

"I think I disappoint them because I don't wear chains and a shirt cut down to here," he said, pointing to his belt.

What the 58-year-old Wolper has worn comfortably is the power placed in his hands to create the celebration around the restoration of Lady Liberty — or, as a movie buddy of his said, shaking his head in amazement, "getting people excited about cleaning up a statue."

Getting into his limo, hopping into a donated corporate helicopter or switching from cellular phone to walkie-talkie, Wolper was the center, the main event of this main event. Were this a political campaign, he would be the sole candidate.

"This is Mis-ter Wolper," he intoned repeatedly into his ubiquitous walkie-talkie. Wolper rarely raises his voice, yet makes clear what he wants done.

"My mind is set on making it happen. What it all means will come after... I can't think of anything esoteric... My mind is just on the details."

Very little happened Liberty Weekend that Wolper did not touch, or manipulate, or pull or push. He spent hours the afternoon of the opening ceremonies helping Elizabeth Taylor select just the right dress for the show — and then remembered to tell her during the 1 a.m. helicopter ride home that the dress looked "perfect."

Minutes before thousands of VIPs headed into the Governors Island stadium, "Wolper was personally clearing out a parking lot.

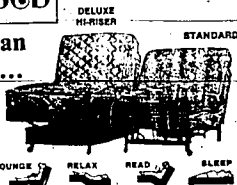

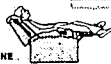

## Miniseries re-creates Auschwitz camp

OSWIECIM, Poland (AP) — With its whistle shrieking, a steam locomotive pulling a train of cattle cars stops by the ramp just inside the ominous main gate of the Auschwitz-Birkenau death camp. Searchlights and the fiery, yellow glow from the crematoria light up the night sky.

As in a nightmare relived, shouting Nazi SS men with snarling, German shepherd dogs beat on the boxcars with clubs as they pull bedraggled men, women and children from the train and order them to form a long line. They will select who will live and who will go to the gas chamber.

However, this time it is only a movie. An American TV miniseries was being filmed on location at the infamous Nazi death camp where 4 million people, most of them Jews, died during World War II.

The horrors of Auschwitz have been painstakingly re-created for the 30-hour ABC-TV version of Herman Wouk's novel, "War and Remembrance." It is the sequel to the earlier book and TV series,

"Winds of War," about an American naval officer and his family caught up in the events of World War II.

The train was the first to ride through the main gate of Auschwitz-Birkenau since the camp was liberated by Soviet troops in January 1945. The crematorium is a false-front set belching special effect flames, and the hundreds of SS guards and train passengers wearing yellow Stars of David are mostly Polish extras.

ABC's production supervisor, Michael Gallant, said the budget for

"War and Remembrance," which is being shot in nine European countries, the United States and the Caribbean through mid-1987, is expected to top \$60 million, making it the most expensive American TV production ever.

The film, whose script includes 2,070 separate scenes and 362 speaking roles, is expected to be broadcast in 1988.

Gallant said it took 1½ years to obtain permission from Poland's communist government to film at Auschwitz.

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# Heere's Johnny! Carson talks about biz, life, but not Rivers

HOLLYWOOD — On the face of it — and the closer you get to him — Johnny Carson seems not very different from other people. He has one best friend he trusts implicitly. He has a beautiful girlfriend he met on the beach. He drives himself to work, to the same job he's had for 24 years. He has three sons and three divorces. He works out regularly, yet smokes excessively. He's dabbled with alcohol, but not on the job. He can be mischievous. When his next-door neighbors threw a wedding last year, he reportedly took a broomstick and wrote an epithet on the sand to shock the helicopter pilots and the press. (Not printable here, thank you very much.)

The bride and groom happened to be Madonna and Sean Penn — and Johnny Carson is obviously different from other people.

He opened the front door himself. The glass-walled Malibu house sits on a 200-foot cliff overlooking the world, and it's a little overwhelming, even for Johnny Carson. He related that director Billy Wilder had asked: "Where's the desk?" There is no question that Johnny Carson could do "The Tonight Show" here, and that may be the unconscious intent: to create a living area that's an idealized, glamorized version of the work area. Mirrored tables on white area rugs, swivel chairs and simple glass ashtrays. This has to be the ultimate \$9 million show-business house.

Carson, wearing a Battaglia sweater, white slacks and Reeboks, poured black coffee into simple white mugs — and began a tour of the greenery and grounds and grotto. He likes the setting to Carmel, Calif., or Acapulco, and he likes to remind a visitor that his tennis building now in construction across the road won't be anywhere near as splashy. Which is apt. Because Carson — at a distance and right up close — is the opposite of splash. He's a master of energy, of using and saving it — and there's a conservatism about him that has nothing to do with politics. As he settled into a leather swivel chair for what was to be a two-hour interview, his posture was midshipparently cannot slouch.

Carson hasn't been interviewed in seven years, since he discussed comedy in a Q&A piece for Rolling Stone.

(His last intensive print interview was with the late Kenneth Tynan for the New Yorker in 1977.)

In the last two months Carson has refused to do covers of Vanity Fair, Esquire and People. Primarily because he did not want to discuss The Mouth, a.k.a. Joan Rivers, the corsetienne he installed as the first permanent guest host of "The Tonight Show." In mid-May, just after the first of Carson's two interviews with the Los Angeles Times, Rivers announced that she'd begin her own syndicated show in October. While The Mouth never closed, Carson, while obviously not amused, said only, "I felt if I answered one question, then one question would lead to another."

Sitting in his living room with a pack of unfiltered Pall Malls, Carson might just as well have been in a dressing room in Burbank. At home, as at NBC, he fiddles with pencils or cigarettes (smoking a full pack during the first interview. His only stipulation: That he not be photographed smoking). It's not surprising to discover that Carson in college wanted to be either a psychiatrist or a journalist. On and off camera he probes and questions and listens and then answers. An extrovert when working, Carson is, however, an introvert when he isn't. The Barbra Streisand's definition of "not being left alone" — "doesn't apply here. There is no body-guard, no entourage, no driver. Oh! God no!" said Carson, outraged at the notion. "That's like having license plates that say BIG STAR. I drive myself to work. If somebody is going to get you, they are going to get you. I remember once in Vegas, sitting at Caesars Palace, hearing a hushed voice whisper, 'Frank's here!' Well, of course you knew he was there. Sinatra likes that. He likes being surrounded by people. I don't."

If four people were asked to pin an adjective on Carson, at least three of them would pick "private." "Isn't it really a Catch-22 situation?" he asked rhetorically. "If

it's called 'an entourage,' and they say you're making a big play. If you keep to yourself, they say, 'He doesn't like people.' The truth is that I never was a social animal."

If Carson is more social lately — turning up at the Comedy Store to see friend Buddy Rich on drums, or at the eight-hour premiere of "Nicholas Nickleby" — the outings are occasional. (And almost always with his constant companion Alex Maas, the beautiful blonde he met by chance on Carbon Beach, after his separation from third wife Joanna Ulrich Holland.) "Ninety-eight percent of the time I come home after the show," he said. "Even in the '50s I never went to premieres out here. I never did understand anybody who puts on a tie and tuxedo to go to a restaurant opening. It's jive to me. The continual thing to concentrate on is the energy level for the show."

During his show recently, during a commercial break, Carson took questions from his studio audience and, inevitably, he was asked if he would marry again. His answer bespoke of somebody not only pressy but gun-shy. He said something to the effect of "I'm in no hurry." It's a touchy subject, if not the touchiest, and on-the-air humor has been Carson's way of handling it.

Clearly, Carson has an old-fashioned propriety about marriage; after all, he's been married for much of his adult life, close to 30 years altogether. "If I had given as much to marriage as I gave to 'The Tonight Show,'" he confessed, "I'd probably have a hell of a marriage. But the fact is, I haven't given that, and there you have the simple reason for the failure of my marriages: I put the energy into the show."

"I've said before that what's most important to a man, in general, is his work. What's most important to a woman, in general, is her relationship. And for me, what I do comes first. But look at the failure rate of marriages in Detroit, something near 50 percent. Why should a guy who's doing a TV show be different from a dentist? I'll tell you why. Because of the press. But I now look at it this way: You're in the paper and you're out of the paper."

Out of the paper lately has been Joanne Copeland Carson, his second wife.

Joanne Copeland met Johnny Carson in 1960 when she was co-hosting "Video Village" on CBS and he was hosting "Who Do You Trust?" on ABC. They shared the years before and during his catapult to major

stardom. It is she who has perhaps the best perspective on Carson's need to be alone. Their New York years were much less social than the '70s, the Hollywood years he spent with his third wife, Joanna.

"Johnny isn't complicated," said Joanne carefully. "Complicated implies difficult. Johnny isn't difficult really; he's multifaceted. The difference is everything. Multifaceted means you have good sides, but many of them. Ambition was only one of his facets, which separates him right away from a Joan Rivers. With Joan it's all career. Johnny's different. Which is why he said no to 'The Tonight Show' when it was first offered."

And yet he's single-minded about the show, almost to the exclusion of the other facets. "Yes, but that was a choice. What Johnny put into the show has cost him, because he put 100 percent of himself into it. Johnny put his focus on the career because instinctively he knew the career would never let him down. He felt it would never betray him, and it never has betrayed him. What's also unknown about Johnny is that he hasn't used anybody."

"If a star needs 10 people to prop him up," said attorney Henry Bushkin, "he's in trouble. Because sooner or later those 10 people are not going to be there." If everyone in Hollywood has a brother, Johnny Carson has Henry Bushkin. The lawyer (renowned to regular Carson watchers as "Bombastic Bushkin") is, by all accounts, the best friend.

"I oversee what goes on," is the understatement Bushkin used to explain his involvement with Carson and Carson's companies. In fact, no truly important decision is made at Carson Productions without Bushkin's knowledge.

How canny is Carson about business? Bushkin does a flinch. "I think you have to appreciate the fact that he's a performer. If he devoted too much time to business, he feels it would take away from his energies for performing." Carson, when asked the same question, responded much the same way: "I'm involved a bit in the companies. But I don't really like the business end of it." "The show," as Bushkin put it, "is the base of his pyramid."

The show has long been acknowledged as the network's largest single money-maker.

Whether Carson earns \$5 million or \$7 million or \$99 million a year, nobody will say exactly. "More than \$5 million" is a figure nobody disputes.

After initially saying no to NBC about the Tonight Show, ("I was making a couple of grand a week on the quiz show, and following Paar, well..."), Carson said yes. His starting salary in October 1962 was \$100,000 a year. By the summer of 1964, the sum was boosted by his headlining at the Sahara in Las Vegas.

Money is still a subject Carson has real problems talking about — at first. "I never knew what my father made," he said matter-of-factly. "And it never would have occurred to me to ask him, 'Dad, how much did you make last year?' Maybe it's my Midwestern upbringing. It's like when people come into this house and say, 'What did you pay for it?' I say, 'Why do you ask?' What I paid is the government's business and my business. I'm not sure it's anybody else's business."

Yet money is not a subject one can duck, and once started, Carson didn't stop. Several times in conversations he would return the subject to the public's fascination with big finance. "Humphrey Bogart said it all years ago," said Carson. "He was asked, 'Isn't \$25,000 a lot of money for a picture? Why you? And Bogey said, 'Because I can get it... So, am I worth what I make? Yes — because I can get it.'"

Carson delivered the line with the slightest hint of defensiveness, like a Midwestern multimillionaire who reveres privacy, and expects it. Where Carson comes from, discretion rules.

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# Two from PBS: The mysteries of nature, marketing of politics

NEW YORK (AP) — In a world increasingly isolated from nature, public television has become our Walden Pond, where the frazzled denizens of cities and shopping malls come to gape at the mysteries and the beauty of life.

"Water, Birth, the Planet Earth," appearing July 15 on the Public Broadcasting Service, is a visually enchanting climb on the evolutionary ladder, so satisfying to watch that the sound can be ignored.

Even mosquitoes become at least interesting, if not beautiful, under Jim Dutcher's lens, and there is a thrilling underwater chase after an ink-squirting octopus.

Dutcher has produced an hour of pure visual pleasure, a succession of stunning scenes which amateur photographers would kill to duplicate. There is no evidence of human life in this program, which settles for a beaver as its most advanced animal, and it doesn't tell you whether the animals it studies are endangered or their water poisoned.

The documentary assumes what the naturalist Barry Lopez has called an attitude of regard, of simply paying close attention to what animals are doing.

That can be as amusing as the peaceful coexistence of tadpoles and mosquito larvae, which lasts only until the tadpoles' mouths attain a certain size, and as dramatic as a newly hatched sea turtle's urgent, instinctive struggle to reach the sea.

The thin thread of the documentary is that life began in the water, and depends on water no matter how highly it evolved. It notes that water sometimes falls as rain, and sometimes as snow. Maybe you knew that.

That serves well enough for a peg, however, and it takes Dutcher into an octopus' garden off Grand Cayman Island, where he spent hours coaxing the eight-armed critter out of its cave with a crab.

When Dutcher let go of the crab, it scurried away, pursued by the octopus with the photographer swimming furiously behind and ducking the ink clouds.

"I wasn't able to dodge it all. It was three yards square," Dutcher said in an interview from his home in Sun Valley, Idaho. Once, he had to surface to get out of the murk, but that's edited out.

The sequence was filmed with a hand-wound, 30-pound camera which

Dutcher bought 26 years ago. "If it had been bigger," he said, "I probably wouldn't have been able to keep up with the octopus."

It's ever so much easier to get a politician to cooperate with a camera, but "The Marketing of Margaret" shows that it isn't so simple to figure out what they're doing.

The documentary, produced by the British Broadcasting Co. following Mrs. Thatcher's landslide election victory in 1983, appears Sunday as part of PBS' "International TV" series.

Margaret Thatcher's admiration for Ronald-Reagan extends even to borrowing his campaign techniques, and the documentary takes a posture of being slightly agast that commercial pitchmen have invaded politics.

The prime minister's media adviser, Christopher Lawson, admits that promoting a candidate is not unlike marketing Mars bars, which is what he used to do. "It's getting the message across," he says, making it all sound much less sinister.

It appears that the Conservatives' best weapon was not their com-

puters and their polls and their two shades of blue curtains for television backdrops, but the opposition Labor Party. Lawson says the Conservatives bought hundreds of copies of the Labor manifesto, or platform, and spent money making sure that voters were familiar with it.

Labor dropped 5 percent in the polls after it published its manifesto, Lawson said, and never recovered in the sensibly brief, 23-day campaign.

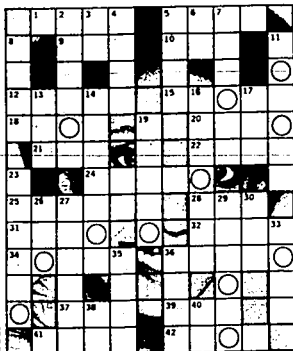
The BBC doesn't dig very hard on this assignment. It never explains what changes, if any, Mrs. Thatcher made in her positions or her style in the cause of media manipulation.

South Carolina Educational Television, the producer for "International TV," cheats. American viewers by providing no background on the campaign, or on the differences between American and British politics. However, some of the silliness of the campaign is familiar.

There is Mrs. Thatcher, prowling the hinterlands in a bus caravan seeking suitable photo opportunities, which the cameras obligingly record while the reporters beg about lack of access.

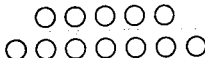

## CBS will add 2 action shows in the fall

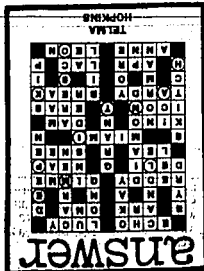

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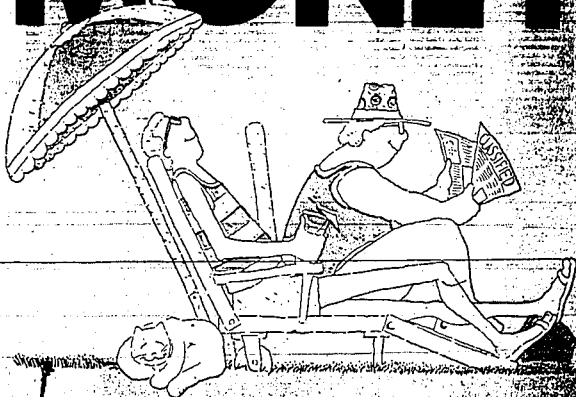
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
