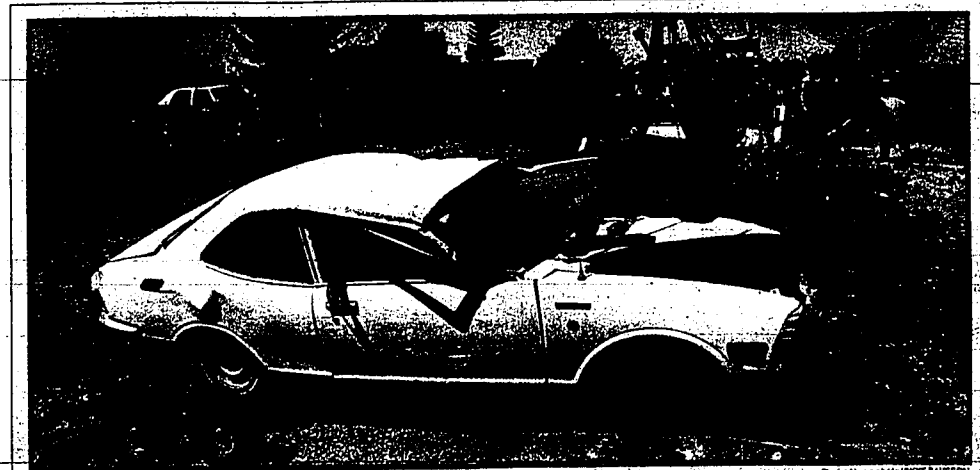

frustrated with its inability to bring the deficit under control — had hoped to avoid when it passed the landmark Gramm-Rudman law last year. "Congress is being forced back to earth," House Budget Committee Chairman William H. Gray III, D-Pa., said. "We must make the tough decisions. No... chief executive is going to make them for us."

Reagan administration and Congress, lawmakers devised a formula under which the cuts would be equally divided between defense and domestic programs, exempting some social programs. But the Supreme Court ruled that the "automatic trigger" provision of the law breached the Constitution's separation of powers doctrine because it gave the comptroller general, an unelected officer of Congress, the power to order cuts that would be carried out by the executive branch.

The first round of cuts last March was relatively mild and caused little disruption. They amounted to 4.9 percent in Pentagon program reductions and 4.3 percent in domestic cuts. Cost-of-living increases in federal pensions and some other programs were canceled.

Currents prevent look at iceberg gash

By ARLENE LEVINSON The Associated Press WOODS HOLE, Mass. — Strong ocean currents 2 1/2 miles below the surface forced researchers to suspend plans Thursday to survey an iceberg's fatal gash that sent the Titanic to the sea's bottom 74 years ago, researchers said. "Today was a hard dive," chief explorer Robert Ballard said in a ship-to-shore report after his fifth day of diving to the site in a tiny submarine. "The current was very strong, and there was a lot of ticklish matter in the water, so it was a hard working dive. The current seemed to be tidal."

with still imagery you don't know what you've got," said Ballard, comparing it to videotapes they have been recording since starting the post-mortem probe of the giant luxury liner. Damar Yoerger, an ocean engineer at Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, said the researchers planned to send photos and videotape from their mother ship Friday. From his miniature submarine Alvin, Ballard said he saw "the beautiful light on the mast... a big brass fixture, and we could see a lot of doorknobs, things like that. Very tempting, but we didn't do anything." The scientists have vowed to leave the giant ship untouched as a memorial to those who died.

"I am very relieved to not find any (human) remains," he said. But he told officials at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, co-sponsors of the dive, he spotted a sock in the debris scattered near the ship — the only sign of the 1,513 people who went to their deaths when the ship sank about two hours after it hit the iceberg. But despite a few setbacks, Ballard had nothing but praise for the experimental robot.

The three C-130 Hercules U.S. transport planes carrying the troops arrived at the airport in this tropical city 300 miles northeast of La Paz from Howard Air Force Base in Panama. Bolivian officials would not allow an Associated Press reporter to interview the U.S. servicemen.

They are armed with 30-caliber machine guns and can carry up to 11 passengers.

U.S. pilots have been instructed to shoot if fired upon during the planned raids on cocaine labs. About half of the U.S. soldiers milled around the helicopters and Hercules planes at Trinidad's airport while others assisted in loading crates and sacks of supplies under the hot tropical sun. From the air, aboard an airplane rented in La Paz, hundreds of airstrips could be seen along the Beni flatlands. Officials say some of the runways belong to legitimate ranchers, and others to a cocaine combine controlled by 30 Bolivian families. Neither U.S. nor Bolivian officials have revealed where the forces plan to strike. The arrival of the troops raised to 160 the total U.S. military presence in Bolivia. It is the first

Witnesses describe events surrounding Jerome shootings

Lempesis says report coming

"Butch" Otter in the primary election on Thursday that "the report covering the period May 13 through June 23 of this year was not intended to be complete. "We had all kinds of expenses incurred in the final days of the campaign, and the bills still are coming in," Lempesis said.

The secretary of state's office gave Lempesis 10 days to respond to the complaint filed under Idaho's Sunshine Law.

Girl falls from pickup, dies

LEWISVILLE (AP) — A young girl died when she fell out of a moving pickup truck near Lewisville, the Bonneville County Sheriff's Department reported.

Paul Wilde, department crime prevention officer, said in a report that Lindsay Jane Smith died Thursday when she fell from a pickup truck driven by her father, Mike Smith.

Smith, the girl, and another daughter, Kisha, were traveling east near Lewisville when the 17-month-old child of the truck, Wilde said. She was standing between her father and sister.

Smith tried to grab her, but she fell out the passenger's side, Wilde said.

Her father grabbed the girl and went to their residence about a mile away, and called for help.

The girl was pronounced dead at her residence by Coroner Vernal Rydahl.

Atomic vets honor Idaho man

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — An All-Atomic Veterans Post has been formed in honor of Paul Cooper, a veteran of a 1937 nuclear weapons test who died in 1978 of leukemia.

Cooper, 44, Emmett, Idaho, campaigned from his bed at the Veterans Administration Hospital here to win veterans' benefits for the illness he contended was due to exposure to radiation at the Aug. 31, 1937, "Smoky" test in Nevada. His battle drew nationwide attention to the possibility that other veterans may have contracted illnesses as a result of nuclear testing.

The post, named Paul Cooper AM-VEITS Post No. 2, is the second atomic veterans post, said Robert Carter, regional vice-president of the National Association of Radiation Survivors.

The post was formed Wednesday, July 16, was designated Atomic Veterans Day by President Reagan three years ago. It was the date of the first atomic test, held in 1945 in Alamogordo, N.M.

Kidnapping suspects sought

WEISER (AP) — Law enforcement officers in western Idaho and eastern Oregon searched Friday for two men wanted for questioning in the kidnapping of two young girls, a house fire and a string of car thefts.

Washington County Sheriff Jim Johnson said two girls, whose identities were not released, apparently surprised two men ransacking the rural Weiser home of 3rd District Judge Wayne Fuller.

The sheriff said "two men apparently set the house afire," and drove the two girls across the Snake River into Ontario, Ore. After driving around a couple of hours, the sheriff said, the girls were released unharmed.

The sheriff said the men are wanted for questioning about four vehicle thefts in Washington and Payette counties Wednesday night.

One was described as about age 18 and the other was 19, the sheriff said.

Fuller was in Coeur d'Alene at the Idaho Judicial Conference until returning home Wednesday night, the sheriff said. The girls were traveling to the Fuller home to take care of some animals.

Damage was estimated at \$10,000 to \$30,000 to the Fuller home, the sheriff said. A 1983 Blazer was destroyed in a second fire, he said. Officers said as of Thursday afternoon, no charges had been filed.

Widow sues in-laws over death

ST. ANTHONY (AP) — The widow of a St. Anthony man killed last year when he was thrown from a horse while working on his parents' ranch is suing her late husband's mother and father for more than \$5 million.

The suit was filed in 7th District Court in St. Anthony by JoDee Mortensen of Orem, Utah, on behalf of herself and her daughter, Jandee Jo.

Defendants named in the lawsuit are Grant and Moziene Mortensen and GMG Land Corp.

JoDee Mortensen alleges her husband, Cody, was thrown from the horse because of a defective bridle that fell from the animal's head and mouth. Mortensen died June 26, 1985, five days after he was injured.

In addition to the folk dance festival and the balloon races, the ITC plans to nominate the Riggins Jet boat races, Ketchikan's Wagon Days and the Birds of Prey festival in Boise, she said.

Stallings wants act approved

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. Richard Stallings has appealed to House-Senate conferees urging them to quickly reauthorize and approve funding for the Clean Water Act.

"Full funding for this vital program is being withheld from state and local governments because the Clean Water Act has not been reauthorized," Stallings, D-Idaho, said in a letter to conferees.

Stallings said in a news release that he has written each member of the conference committee to express Idaho's concern regarding funding for the Municipal Wastewater Construction Grants Program. He said municipal sewage treatment plants must achieve secondary treatment by July 1, 1988.

The congressman said he has been advised by Gov. John Evans that there are 37 Idaho communities in danger of missing the municipal compliance deadline unless adequate funding is provided.

Hearing may not come off

POCATELLO (AP) — A hearing on organized labor's attempt to block enforcement of the state's new right-to-work law has been set for 10 a.m. Wednesday in 6th District Court.

However, the state has filed a number of motions in an attempt to block the hearing. Complicating the issue is the fact that state judges are attending the Idaho Judicial Conference in Coeur d'Alene and unavailable to rule on motions.

The Idaho AFL-CIO is seeking a preliminary injunction blocking enforcement of the right-to-work law. It bans mandatory union membership or payment of union dues as a condition of employment.

Last week, 4th District Judge Robert Newhouse granted a labor request to move the case back to Bannock County. Sixth District Judge George Hargraves disqualified himself, and Judge William Woodland has been assigned to hear the case.

A hearing has been scheduled on the injunction for Wednesday, but Deputy Attorney General Mark Thompson has filed a motion to vacate that hearing.

The state has also filed a motion appealing the change in venue, and a hearing has been set in Boise before Judge Newhouse on July 29 on that matter. The state also has asked Newhouse for permission to appeal the change of venue directly to the Supreme Court.

State Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, whose firm is representing the AFL-CIO, said she has filed a motion objecting to a hearing before Newhouse on the venue question. The union argues that Newhouse has transferred the case and no longer has jurisdiction.

Judge Woodland is not expected back in Pocatello until Monday, while Newhouse will not be back on the bench until a week from Monday, said Thompson. That means it's unclear when the various motions in the case will be decided.

Watkins' campaign spending totals \$137,736, report says

BOISE (AP) — State Sen. Dane Watkins of Idaho Falls spent \$137,736 in his unsuccessful campaign for the Republican nomination in Idaho's primary election.

Reports filed here Wednesday with the secretary of state's office showed Watkins received contributions of about \$73,000, spent \$137,736 and as of the end of June had unpaid bills of about \$13,000 and outstanding loans of \$24,200.

Of the \$73,000 in contributions, about \$16,000 was received from individuals and organizations and \$56,704 from the candidate himself, the report showed. Watkins spent more than \$52,000 in the final three weeks of the campaign, the report showed.

Watkins, an eight-term veteran of the Idaho Legislature and chairman of the Senate Local Government and Taxation Committee, ran fourth in

the five-person field, receiving 9,289 votes and spending \$14.82 per vote received. Republican winner Mel Richardson, Idaho Falls, received 28,888 votes but his report hasn't been received at the secretary of state's office here, and fourth-place finisher Dan Adamson, Jerome, also hasn't reported yet.

Conic Hansen, who "finished second with 10,159 votes, spent \$35,381 and wound up with debts and unpaid obligations of \$18,842. She spent about \$3.50 in the campaign for each vote received.

Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, spent \$98,582 in the primary election, even though he was unopposed for the GOP nomination in Idaho's 1st Congressional District.

In contrast, Bill Currie of Bonners Ferry, who won the Democratic nomination in a contested race, spent \$520.

Watkins reported spending about \$16,000 on media advertising through the Pocatello company of Steele, Stoltz and Associates in the week before the May 27 primary election.

Mrs. Hansen reported contributions of \$35,774, including \$350 from political committees and \$19,500 the Hansen family put into the campaign. The Hansen report showed no unpaid loans at the end of the campaign.

The largest of the unpaid bills was \$8,000 to Ideal Consultants, Idaho Falls, for television ads.

Craig, who is running for his fourth term in the 1st District, reported he has raised \$113,276 so far this year, including \$43,500 from political committees.

Retired Morrison-Knudsen Co. executive James D. McClary and his wife donated \$1,000—for the largest individual contribution to Craig.

'Radicals' are target for Andrus

BOISE (AP) — Idaho governor candidate Cecil Andrus has criticized "radical, fringe groups on both ends of the spectrum" who refuse to contribute realistic proposals to natural resource questions.

He was particularly critical in a news release on Thursday of recent actions by the radical Earth First! environmental group, which included demonstrations in Yellowstone National Park.

Those sort of extremists, said Andrus, "give a black eye to responsible conservationists who understand that natural resource questions can only be settled by reasoned compromise among reasonable people."

The leader of Earth First! was arrested after chaining himself to a tree in Yellowstone National Park.

"It appears to me that the leader of that group is more interested in publicity and in selling books than in working in a realistic manner to promote common-sense use of our resource, while still protecting our great hunting and fishing and our scenic wonders," said Andrus.

He said that sort of negative attitude only serves to further polarize an already controversial issue.

Andrus said the Idaho wilderness issue "requires a willingness to deal with the issue realistically," he said.

"But, unfortunately the radicals at both extremes on that issue are more interested in keeping the debate going, for their own political gain, than they are in finding a solution," Andrus said.

He said the Earth First! stance that all a million acres under study for possible wilderness should be preserved as wilderness "is just as far out as those who say we should not have one more inch of wilderness in Idaho."

High says Idaho Power still strong

BOISE (AP) — Idaho Public Utilities Commissioner Richard High said Idaho Power Co.'s good financial health should not be adversely affected by the PUC's recent denial of most of the company's rate-increase request.

"Idaho Power remains one of the strongest utilities in the U.S. in the context of the order we just issued," High said.

The three-member commission unanimously decided July 11 to limit Idaho Power to \$981,567 in additional revenue. The company originally re-

quested a record \$84.2 million, but pared it back to \$66.2 million.

This week, Moody's and Standard & Poor's, the nation's two principal investment rating services, placed Idaho Power on "credit watch" status in response to the PUC action.

The two services plan to review ratings for some of Idaho Power's bond and stock issues. Company officials have said that any downgrading in the ratings could increase Idaho Power's cost of doing business and, thus, the cost of power for ratepayers.

A Moody's spokesman said Tuesday that "credit watch" status did not necessarily signal a rating change was in the offing, but was merely meant to serve as a caution

flag to investors.

High said Idaho Power has high cash flow and will have no problem paying the increased dividends it just authorized.

The commissioner said stock market action between July 10 and Tuesday's closing proves Idaho Power's health. In that period, he said, the Dow Jones average stock price fell approximately 3 percent while Idaho Power's price dropped about 1 percent.

"The commission is very interested in the financial viability of Idaho Power. We want a very strong company, and we have no intention of having anything but a strong utility to provide service to its customers."

Utahns released

REDDING, Calif. (AP) — A Salt Lake City couple were on the way home Thursday released from a hospital after their single-engine light plane crashed into the Trinity River in a wild area of Northern California.

Pilot Paul Lietz, 54, and his wife, Eva, 62, were shaken up but otherwise unharmed from the ditching of their Piper aircraft Monday night in a whitewater area popular for rafting. The report said the plane ran out of fuel.

The Lietzes were rescued by a Coast Guard helicopter and taken to Klamath-Trinity Community Hospital in Hoopa. They were released Wednesday night.

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Gem reporting law all smoke, mirrors

Despite a growing public awareness of the importance of political action committees (PACs) and special interest lobbies in campaigns, campaign finance reporting in Idaho remains inadequate.

The theory that if "you take the king's money, you fight the king's war" has some validity. The purpose of campaign disclosure, in theory, is to let citizens know who their candidates and officeholders are being financed by.

To be effective, however, the disclosure has to be timely. It has to pick up late campaign finances, since most of the money pours in late.

But Idaho's law in this area is, to put it kindly, all smoke and mirrors.

Consider the finance reports which are now coming out—some six weeks after the May 27 primary. Losers in that primary must file now. Winners—get this—can wait until October to tell the voters who financed their successful primary elections.

Since winning a primary is tantamount to winning the election in many of Idaho non-competitive districts, the result is that voters don't learn until long afterward who put the money into campaigns.

The reports coming out this week show, not surprisingly, that many of the losers got infusions of cash donations just ahead of the primary.

Among legislative candidates, for example, Robin Kinsey got a \$4,000 contribution from the teachers' union, the Idaho Education Association. Wouldn't you like to have known that at the time?

And wouldn't you like to know who put money into winner Jerry Callen's campaign?

Or take several losing legislative candidates in Twin Falls County. Incumbent Donna Scott and challengers Jack Wasden and Gordon Hollifield all got contributions from Washington Water Power Company, which shares plenty of electric power interests with Idaho Power Company and has an interest in downstream water supplies.

Wouldn't you like to have known at the time that these candidates were taking money from an electric utility?

Scott and another losing incumbent, Noy Brackett, also got contributions from Sears Roebuck and Co., which supports candidates in ALEC, an ultra-conservative lobby with which Scott is associated.

The winners in those contests also presumably got contributions from special interests, but we'll have to wait until October to find out who gave what to whom. Not much of a law, is it?

Chapter 8 will tell the American way

WASHINGTON — The Attorney General's Commission on Pornography — and those of us in the news business — are caught in a catch-22.

The public cannot comprehend this filth without seeing it in print, and we can't print the stuff because it's too filthy.

The commission's decision was to print samples anyhow, and to put its two-volume report on sale for \$35. Purchasers will find alphabetical lists of 2,325 dirty magazines, 2,370 dirty films and 725 dirty books. The money buys complete shooting scripts of five dirty movies and an explicit summary of a dirty paperback called "Tying Up Rebecca."

But the trouble is that such adjectives as "dirty" and "filthy" cannot adequately describe the kind of pornography with which the commission was concerned. The commission gave the back of its hand to the girly magazines one used to find in barbershops. These are not the problem.

The problem lies in material, especially graphic material, as distinguished from written material, that drains the human sexual relationship of every element of love. In its place the pornographers provide lust. At the repulsive level of child pornography, the commission found an indescribable sickness. The makers of "kiddie porn" are in a class by themselves; their veins are not filled with blood, but with pus.

This stuff is rotten. In the oldest and ugliest meaning of the word. As Chief Justice Warren Burger has said, hard-core pornography rots the fabric of society. Does it contribute to crimes of sexual violence? A majority of the commission believes it does. Common sense supports that conclusion.

At the very least, hard-core pornography corrupts and degrades. The commission makes 92 recommendations for reducing the volume of sewage.

The report has provoked an hysterical cackling from the Henny-Pennies of the lunatic left. In that flock I mean to include the proprietors of Penthouse and Playboy, the leadership of the American Civil Liberties Union, and Norman Thomas.

of the American way. They fear the sky is falling on the First Amendment. If today a local proponent goes after a paperback book called "Anal Slaves," tomorrow the cops will be impounding "Catcher in the Rye." So they say.

This is nonsense, and fatuous nonsense at that. Their overblown fears give no account to the ability of juries and judges and appellate courts to make distinctions between serious art and worthless trash. Yes, in times past a few censors have made ludicrous judgments. We are reminded endlessly of efforts to ban the works of James Joyce, D.H. Lawrence, Edmund Wilson, Theodore Dreiser and James Branch Cabell. But this line of argument defeats itself. The censorship failed; the works survived.

Critics of the report have spread the impression that the commission has recommended vigilante committees in every community. The report contains no such recommendation. In Chapter 8, "The Role of Private Action," the commission says only that "citizens need not feel hesitant in condemning that which they feel is worthy of condemnation."

Moreover, they need feel no hesitation in taking advantage of the rights they have under the First Amendment to protest in more visible or organized form. They may, of course, form or

join organizations designed expressly for the purpose of articulating a particular point of view. They may protest or picket or march or demonstrate in places where they are likely to attract attention, and where they will have the opportunity to persuade others of their views.

To the extent that citizens have concerns about the kinds of sexually explicit material that are available in contemporary America, they should not only recognize that the First Amendment protects and encourages their right to express these concerns loudly and often; but should appreciate the fact that in many aspects of our lives to keep quiet is to approve. Moreover, communities are made by what people say and do, by what people approve and what people disapprove, and by what people tolerate and what people reject. For communities, and for the sense of community, community acceptance and community condemnation are central to what a community is.

If Norman Lear wants a pretty good exposition of what the American way truly embraces, the commission's Chapter 8 will provide it for him. And for only \$35 bucks.

'Hot dern!' may be Democrat rally cry

WASHINGTON — Have you recently been exclaiming "hot dern!"

No? Strange. In Dathan, Ala., President Reagan said "the American people are exclaiming 'hot dern,'" so blissful are they about tax reform.

But everything, especially bliss, is written on water. And the following could be written on newspaper 20 months from now.

"Nov. 10, 1988 — As President-elect (fill in the Democrat of your preference) begins Cabinet-making, pundits, with 20-20 hindsight, are seeing that the seeds of Democratic victory were sprouting in the summer of 1986, when Gramm-Rudman and tax reform intersected.

"From the aftershock of the capital earthquake that reduced Republican presidential hopes to rubble began in mid-August, 1986, when, as required by Gramm-Rudman, Congress was presented with a 'snapshot' estimate of the fiscal 1987. The picture was not pretty.

"In January, 1987, the Reagan administration had predicted that the economy for the year, by late July, 1986, growth was two percent and capital investment, even in the non-oil sector, was deteriorating.

"In the summer of 1986, House-Senate conferences on tax reform got into a pentecost bidding war to see who could do most for the 'middle' class. Soon that class was defined capriciously to include all families earning up to \$60,000. Only 15 percent of all families earn more than \$50,000. Two-thirds earn under \$35,000. The median income is about \$24,500.

"Tax treatment of IRAs was kept generous. Deductibility of sales taxes was retained after all. These concessions to the middle class were paid for by further burdening business with taxes.

"President Reagan approved, although three years earlier he had suggested eliminating business taxes because it is unclear how they are

raised — from what would otherwise be employee compensation, or from stockholder dividends, or passed along in the cost of the product.

"The Reagan administration was even willing to sacrifice preferential treatment of capital gains in order to preserve the 27 percent top rate for individuals — a rate that by July, 1986, had become a full-blown fiasco.

"By July, 1986, the stock market had risen 40 percent in nine months and had doubled in four years, adding \$1 trillion to investors' wealth. But one July Monday, the Dow Jones industrial average plunged 61 3/4 points, knocking \$74 billion off the value of stocks. This was followed, in August, by a big sell-off as investors took their capital gains before the higher tax rate hit. The sell-off fueled the bearish psychology of business.

"In July, 1986, the Federal Reserve Board cut interest rates, but the economy stayed flat. By July, 1986, consumer installment debt had risen 20 percent in two years. The tax bill that was signed into law by Labor Day, 1986, was suited to extend the expansion a few more months by pumping money into the pockets of middle-class consumers — by, that is, making the national savings rate even worse.

"By spring, 1987, oil prices were rising as was inflation. Because the new tax law ended tax breaks in January, 1987, but did not raise rates until July, 1987, it involved one-year tax increase of \$20 billion in 1987 — another drag on the sagging economy.

"In July, 1986, the Supreme Court declared un-

constitutional the Gramm-Rudman trigger mechanism. So in August, Congress used the fallback mechanism: It legislated the across-the-board deficit-reduction budget cuts and sent the order to the President for him to sign.

"But he vetoed it.

"He had always said his defense program took precedence over budget-balancing. By July, 1986, Congress had already slashed his original fiscal 1987 defense request. The August, 1986, 'snap-shot' showed that even with 'creative bookkeeping' and 'innovative accounting' (underestimating farm-support costs; counting the receipts from the sale of the unsold Conrail, etc.), the deficit estimate was going to trigger Gramm-Rudman's guillotine. That blade makes half of its cuts in the 20 percent of the budget that is defense.

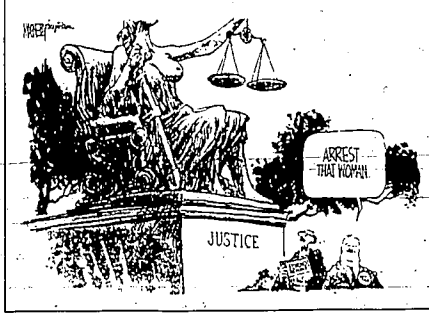
"By vetoing Congress' cut order, President Reagan blew up the Gramm-Rudman process. That convinced American investors and the watching world that the 1986 deficits did indeed stretch as far as the eye could see.

"In July, 1986, the 44th month of the slowing expansion, the Reagan administration had acknowledged that the deficit for fiscal 1986, ending Sept. 30, would top the 1985 record of \$212 billion, perhaps hitting \$240 billion. The fiscal 1987 deficit was \$260 billion.

"By August, 1987, when the 'snapshot' showed that the fiscal 1988 deficit would be \$125 billion over the \$100 billion Gramm-Rudman target, the reaction in Congress was, 'What a Gramm-Rudman!'

"The confusion of the autumn of 1986 produced a Democratic Senate and the recession of 1987-1988 produced the presidential landslide that today has blissful Democrats exclaiming, 'Hot dern!'

Kevin called the operator from a pay phone, and told her that he needed Burley, Idaho, and was interrupted by a male operator who asked him the same question.

Kevin again told her that it was an emergency situation, but he realized he had the change and dropped in the money. He gave the Burley Police Department specific directions and they told him that they would contact the Rupert Police Department and get the proper emergency units rolling.

As he was talking to the Burley police officer, he was disconnected because his minute had expired. He was dumbfounded. After a brief moment, Kevin said, "I'm reconnected me and I was able to finish my conversation with the officer. I hung up the phone only to have it ring right back in my face. I answered the phone and heard the operator inform me that I owed her 20 cents more. I put in the money and told her the situation and she replied, 'You should've used 911,' and hung up."

The two painfully obvious questions that come to mind are (1) why aren't operators trained to handle emergency situations? and (2) why aren't the ambulance personnel trained to know the areas that fall under their jurisdiction?

These questions are extremely important to us because we could have an accident in this area again. If so, what are we supposed to do? Unless we get some answers from these people, we plan to use Morse Code and telegraph the Pony Express. It would be faster.

Victim of hard times LTV starts reorganizing

DALLAS (AP) — LTV Corp., parent of the nation's second-largest steel maker, filed Thursday for reorganization under federal bankruptcy laws, a victim of hard times in both the steel and energy industries.

Raymond A. Hay, chairman and chief executive officer, said he was confident LTV would emerge from its Chapter 11 filing as a strong, viable company. But one analyst predicted the reorganization could be "very messy."

In a petition filed in U.S. Bankruptcy Court in New York, LTV asked for protection for the parent company and its 65 subsidiaries, including LTV Steel, LTV Aerospace and Defense and LTV Energy Products. It listed assets totaling \$2.06 billion and liabilities of \$1.5 billion.

Under Chapter 11, a company continues to operate but is protected from creditor lawsuits while it works out a plan to pay its bills.

Hay blamed LTV's action on a sudden, big drop in second-quarter steel shipments; lower-than-expected pricing levels in the third quarter; continued steel imports; a sharp decline in the number of active oil drilling rigs; and a reduced debt rating that hampered long-term financing efforts.

On cash demands, the company said that as of Dec. 31, 1985, its debt for money borrowed was \$2.6 billion. Debt service — long-term debt payments — was \$430 million in 1985 and was estimated at \$1.6 billion during 1986 through 1988.

Hay said the company also faces about \$375 million in annual pension and post-retirement benefit costs. He said those payments will now be dealt with under the reorganization plan.

R. Wayne Atwell, an analyst with Goldman Sachs in New York, predicted the company will seek price concessions from its suppliers and scale back its operations, though he declined to suggest what parts of the company would be most at risk.

"They will come out as a pretty tough competitor. They may come back 70 percent of the size they went into this," said Atwell.

"I have no doubt they'll come back."

He said LTV will protect its "crown jewel," the profitable LTV Aerospace and Defense unit which accounts for about \$2 billion of its estimated \$7 billion in annual sales.

Other analysts noted earlier that the company may have been shopping for a buyer for its money-making aerospace business.

LTV has reported losses of \$1.44 billion from 1982 through 1985.

In its biggest annual deficit ever, LTV reported losing \$723.9 million in 1985, over half of which resulted from a one-time special charge of \$380 million related to the idling of primary operations of its steel works in Aliquippa, Pa., north of Pittsburgh.

With far-flung operations employing 57,000 in steel, energy and aerospace, LTV has grown over the years to become the second largest producer of steel and a major defense contractor.

In 1984 it acquired Republic Steel Corp. in one of the industry's largest steel mergers. A year later, it announced a major restructuring that included the closing of its huge Aliquippa steel works.

Parched South looks for help

Officials of parched Southern states turned to the federal government, Midwestern farmers and neighbors Thursday for help in feeding livestock during a record drought that has turned pastureland to dust.

Atlanta residents faced the prospect of water restrictions for the first time in their history, and no relief was forecast for the heat wave blamed for 14 deaths as it spread into the Midwest.

Illighs in the mid to upper 90s were reported Thursday from Kentucky, Michigan and Ohio to North Carolina and northern Florida. The temperatures in downtown Columbia, S.C., reached 100 for the 12th straight day.

"There is a glimmer of hope that by early or middle of next week there may be a frontal system in the area," said meteorologist Jim Brackett in Raleigh, N.C. "That's grasping at straws, though. I don't want to encourage people too much about the prospects."

"Unbutton a couple of buttons and roll up your sleeves is about all you can do," said Ronald Armstead, an electrician working on telephone wires in Columbia. "Trying to keep the sweat out of your eyes is what is so bad."

In Cincinnati, officials declared a heat warning and planned to issue a heat alert if temperatures reached the mid-90s again Friday. Under a heat alert, the city opens 23 air-conditioned centers to the public.

The heat has been blamed for the deaths of seven people in Georgia, three in North Carolina and one each state in Virginia and Louisiana. In Vincennes, Ind., officials said a 16-year-old girl died of apparent heat stroke Wednesday while working in a tin-roofed building at a camp during temperatures in the mid-90s. An autopsy was planned.

The drought has withered crops across much of Dixie, and the dryness combined with heat has been a fatal double blow to livestock. Nearly a million chickens have been reported killed in Georgia, Delaware, Maryland and North Carolina.

The office of Georgia Gov. Joe Frank Harris asked the U.S. Agriculture Department on Wednesday to make livestock feed available to farmers. In North Carolina, officials said 50 counties had applied for federal disaster aid through Gov. Jim Martin because cash crops are drying up.

Virginia Gov. Gerald L. Baliles said he asked federal disaster declarations for 17 counties where crop losses are estimated at nearly \$61.5 million, and said a dozen counties have asked to be included.

South Carolina's top agriculture official on Thursday said the drought is likely to cause at least \$100 million in crop losses there.

in crop losses there. "There is no good news in any area of agriculture where the drought is concerned," said Agriculture Commissioner D. Leslie Tindal.

Offers of hay and free transportation to get it to South Carolina are coming in from as far away as Minnesota, Tindal said. There's a firm commitment of 30 tons of hay from Indiana and promises from Illinois and Iowa, he said.

The state's cattle, however, consume 200 to 300 tons per day, Tindal said.

"As far as the firm commitment, it doesn't begin to meet the need," he said. "We don't see this as a complete fix for the situation we're in. But it's a help."

Sen. Mack Mattingly, R-Ga., announced Thursday that the USDA was putting together a task force to tour Georgia, Alabama and the Carolinas next week and develop recommendations for government assistance. Mattingly said he hopes a decision on aid can be made by the end of next week.

In the meantime, the City Council of Hickory, N.C., agreed to donate water from Lake Hickory to needy farmers designated by the state. While the water in Hickory, in the northwestern part of the state, was plentiful enough to give away, the list of cities and towns imposing restrictions on water use continued to grow. Starting Monday, Atlanta

residents won't be allowed to water their yards on weekdays between 7 a.m. and 11 a.m., when commercial and industrial use is at its peak. City Water Director Rob Rivers said he would seek fines for violators.

Dangers unknown to shuttle's crew

WASHINGTON (AP) — NASA said Thursday preliminary analyses of newly restored tape recordings from space shuttle Challenger show that its crew probably did not know of their impending danger.

It was the first time since the Jan. 28 explosion of the shuttle that NASA had addressed anything associated with the last moments of the seven-member crew. The space agency had been trying for months to decode onboard tapes, and finally succeeded, a NASA announcement said.

"NASA said 'preliminary analysis of the tape shows the crew was unaware of the events associated with the tragedy and the internal communications were being maintained as would be expected during a normal ascent,'" NASA said.

The tapes were recovered from the Atlantic about a month and a half after the accident and were severely damaged by seawater and chemical byproducts. An intensive effort began to clean the tapes and salvage any data they might contain.

"Engineers at IBM developed a process for neutralizing the caustic chemicals and restoring the tape to the point it can be analyzed," NASA said. Attempts by NASA engineers to play back the tapes have begun, the space agency added.

Challenger carried two operational recorders which contained both computer and voice data. The two

channels are intermixed in the system, NASA said, and the tape must still be decoded.

NASA did not release any information from the tape. Astronaut Daniel Brandenstein said the tape "had been listened to, but not enough to make a complete statement."

Ken Atchison, a NASA spokesman, said the recorder data stopped at the same as the last communication received on the ground, at the 73.63 second mark after liftoff.

NASA had previously salvaged information on another tape, which contained such data as onboard temperatures and stresses on the spacecraft. But officials said the recordings offered no information that had not been transmitted to the ground.

Meanwhile, at a congressional hearing, an Air Force general said the halt in launching heavy military satellites, caused by the Challenger explosion and the failure of two rockets, has not yet affected military tasks in space.

"All of the missions we are required to perform on orbit are being performed," Lt. Gen. Bernard P. Randolph, deputy chief of staff for research, development and acquisition, told the House space science subcommittee.

But, he said, "we are dependent upon those assets that are on orbit today and any failures from this point forward will cause us some problems."

Timber firm, strikers reach tentative terms

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Weyerhaeuser Co. and representatives of about 6,500 striking workers reached a tentative agreement on Thursday after four days of talks, said federal mediator Norman Lee.

Negotiations on local issues will be held Friday, and union members are expected to vote on a new contract next week.

Lee declined to comment on the progress of negotiations with the Lumber, Production and Industrial Workers, which represents another 1,000 strikers.

Negotiators for Weyerhaeuser, the IWA and the LPIW met Monday for the first time since the walkout began June 16 at mills in Washington and Oregon. The meetings Monday and Tuesday were held in the Portland offices of the Federal Mediation and Conciliation Service.

The company's latest contract

proposal, issued last week, included a threat to start hiring new employees if the unions don't respond to the offer by July 25. It also called for the closure of logging operations, which would result in the layoffs of 2,300 loggers.

Contracts between Weyerhaeuser and the unions expired June 1. A revised contract offer by the company called for wage and benefit cuts of about \$4.30 per hour in exchange for profit-sharing, but was overwhelmingly rejected by the unions.

Details of the latest contract offer weren't made public. The old contracts called for wages and benefits worth about \$21 per hour. Earlier Thursday, striking workers in Pe Ell, Wash., delayed a freight train for about 2½ hours Thursday.

Lewis County sheriff's deputies convinced about 150 pickets from the IWA to clear the tracks and let the train pass through the town. The empty freight train was en route from Chehalis to the Weyerhaeuser mill in Raymond.

"There's no way we want them bringing finished lumber out of that mill," said Raymond IWA Business Agent Bob Wilson.

Powerful nuclear weapon tested in Nevada

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A powerful nuclear weapon was detonated deep beneath the Nevada desert Thursday, the 14th announced nuclear test since the Soviet Union began its unilateral test ban last August.

The blast, which had an explosive yield of up to 150,000 tons of TNT, shook the ground at the Nevada Test Site for several minutes after being set off in a shaft 2,100 feet deep at Pahute Mesa, 102 miles northwest of Las Vegas.

The National Earthquake Information Center in Golden, Colo., said the blast, registered 5.6 on the Richter scale.

Department of Energy spokesman Jim Boyer said the test appeared to be successful.

The test, code-named Cybar, was postponed several times during the day due to unfavorable winds. It was finally detonated at 1 p.m. MDT.

Cybar was the seventh announced test conducted this year and the 653rd announced test at the sprawling desert site since January 1951. Not all tests are announced for security reasons.

Recent tests have drawn growing opposition among peace activists who have lobbied for the U.S. to join the Soviet Union in a test ban. Only five protesters were at the site boundary Thursday and left before the detonation.

Senate passes treaty, 87-10

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday ended a year-long debate and voted 87-10 approval of a treaty making it easier for Britain to expel extradition of suspected Irish terrorists from the United States.

The new treaty has been supported by the Reagan administration as part of the international war against terrorism, but it had been stalled by Democrats from Northeastern states with large populations of Irish descendants.

The treaty stands approved since only the Senate ratifies treaties. Sen. Christopher Dodd, D-Conn., told his colleagues he opposed the pact because "it equates all political violence with terrorism. . . . It's a bogus proposition."

But Sen. Thomas Eagleton, D-Mo., said, "We're worried about the same whether you have swarthy checks and speak Arabic or have pink checks and talk with a brogue."

"To affirm the strength of our friendship with Great Britain and the strength of our passions in the fight against terrorism."

The opposition votes were cast by Dodd; Alfonso D'Amato, R-N.Y.; Dennis DeConcini, D-Ariz.; David Durabenberger, R-Minn.; Orrin Hatch, R-Utah; Jesse Helms, R-N.C.; Gordon Humphrey, R-N.H.; Arlen Specter, R-Pa.; Lowell Weicker, R-Conn.; and Edward Zorinsky, D-Neb.

Not voting were Steve Symms, R-Idaho; Mark Hatfield, R-Ore.; and Robert Stafford, R-Vt.

Moments after approving the treaty, the Senate gave voice approval to a \$20 million aid package to support the Anglo-Irish accord signed last Nov. 15, which for the first time gives the Republic of Ireland a formal voice in governing Northern Ireland.

That accord has been strongly opposed by Protestants, who are in the majority in Northern Ireland. Catholics, who are in the majority in the Republic of Ireland, have supported the pact.

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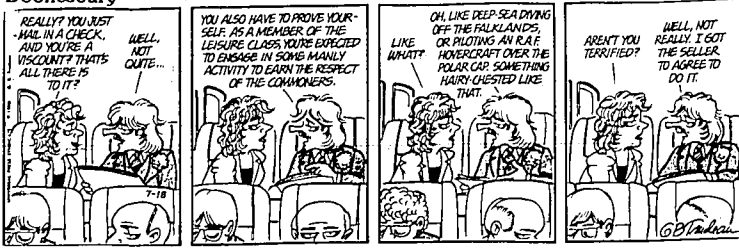
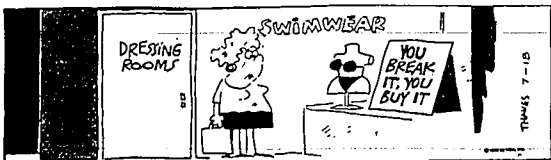
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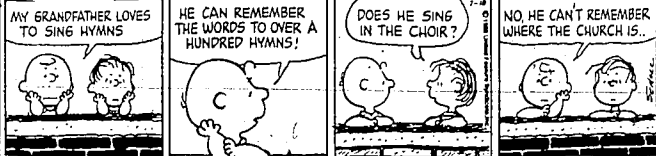

County gets permission to borrow money

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners received permission Thursday to borrow more than \$163,000 for the county's Poor Fund, because it was going broke.

Fifth District Judge Daniel Hurlbutt approved the commissioner's request to expand the depleted budgets of the Poor Fund and Sheriff's Department. The commissioners declared an emergency because there wasn't going to be enough money in the two budgets to cover the two months remaining in the fiscal year.

Under the law, the county commissioners couldn't enlarge the budgets without the permission of a district court judge.

About \$15,000 is all that remains in this

year's Poor Fund budget of \$669,000, said Commissioner Judy Felton. The fund was eaten away mostly by medical bills for the treatment of the county's indigents.

After the hearing, Felton said that the county owes \$22,000 in medical bills and another \$67,887 for its final payment to a state program that helps the county pay for large, indigent medical bills.

The sheriff's budget, meanwhile, was depleted each month by the cost of boarding Twin Falls County inmates in other facilities because of a court-ordered cap on the jail population.

Hurlbutt approved the commissioner's request to add \$163,000 to the Poor Fund budget for 1986. The county will obtain the money by selling registered warrants, which are notes sold to banks in anticipation of tax revenue.

But Felton told the judge that the county probably would end up borrowing \$200,000, not only to survive through until the end of the fiscal year but through part of the next fiscal year, when the taxes are paid in December.

County officials say this will be the first time that the county has had to borrow money to maintain services.

Hurlbutt also approved a \$125,000 addition to the sheriff's operating budget. The cost of transporting and boarding inmates has pared it down by \$12,000-\$14,000 a month.

The jail population was restricted by a Feb. 11 agreement reached over a lawsuit against the county over the aged jail.

The additional funds for the sheriff's office will come from the county's General Fund. But Felton said county taxpayers could end up repaying the \$125,000, as it's the policy of

the commissioners to keep up a reserve in the General Fund for such emergencies.

County residents probably will feel the impact of the Thursday hearing. Property taxes will be used to repay the borrowed money plus the interest, Felton said.

The interest rate and other details of the registered warrants remain unsettled. She added that she hopes the county may be able to borrow money as needed, instead of in one lump-sum to avoid the interest rates.

Before Hurlbutt ruled on the request to expand the Poor Fund, he asked if it would create a hardship if he could rule in 30 days, because of other pending cases needing his attention.

Commission Chairman Ann Cover replied, "I think it would hurt us."

Commissioner Marvin Hempleman added,

"The Poor Fund would be in the red with no means to pay it."

Hurlbutt said he had anticipated the case and already researched the law on the issue. While the other pending litigations also were important, he put the county issue on the top of his caseload because it was for the good of the community, he added.

For months, the commissioners had predicted the county might have to borrow money for the two budgets, constantly under strain by the medical and boarding bills.

To stretch resources, the commissioners imposed earlier this year a mandate that they wouldn't pay for non-emergency indigent claims. The Idaho Legal Aid office recently challenged the policy.

Felton said the commission will continue its policy unless forced to do otherwise.

Ore-Ida balks on renewal of contracts

POCATELLO (AP) — Potato growers who have been contracting with the Ore-Ida processing plant in Burley say their contracts aren't being picked up for next year.

Traditionally, the processor negotiates a contract with grower representatives ahead of time. Then its fieldmen take those contracts to individual growers, who may choose to sign them or not. The two-year contracts have been staggered over seasonal periods, with the second half negotiated in the first spring.

This year, however, the company sent out letters to many of its regular growers saying there would be no contracted potatoes for the second half of the contract term.

Other regular Ore-Ida growers say they have not heard from their fieldmen.

Growers say they expected to have contracts for the next year, planted potatoes on that expectation and now will be forced to sell them on the open market.

"I've always considered it the premier contract in the state," said grower Ralph Ingram, who has the added problem of not having any storage. Rather than holding them for a good price on the open market, he would take them directly from the field to the processor.

"This is the way it's been for a long time," at least for the 10 years he's had Ore-Ida contracts, he said.

"They didn't do anything to make us believe we wouldn't" have a guaranteed price and buyer for the

additional potatoes he and others planted, spuds he said he wouldn't have planted if he'd known they wouldn't be bought by Ore-Ida.

Wayne Thiessen, Ore-Ida general manager for agriculture, declined to answer questions directly but issued a statement through the company's public relations department saying "Ore-Ida does not wish to recap the four months of negotiations, a declining potato category and unfavorable business climate in the media. "We are sensitive to the agricultural economy as well as our own needs," the statement said.

"Our offices are open to growers to discuss their concerns about our contracting position."

McI Anderson, executive director of the Potato Growers of Idaho, which negotiates the contracts for farmers collectively with Ore-Ida, declined comment, as did a representative of the Independent Idaho Potato Growers of Idaho, another bargaining body.

"The base contract price for the first half of the contract was \$4.07 per hundredweight. The price for the second half was to have been \$3.70 per cwt. Potato farmers often quote \$4 per cwt. as a breakeven price, varying with financing and farming conditions.

Steve Antone Sr., who has had Ore-Ida contracts for the last seven years, said he "probably planted more than we would have if we didn't have an contract."

Main consultant for city's economic study quits firm

TWIN FALLS — The primary consultant working on an economic study for the city of Twin Falls has resigned from the Fantus Co. of Chicago, leaving the analysis unfinished.

Phillip D. Phillips left the consulting firm earlier this month to become director of corporate relations and community development for the University of Illinois, said Bob Ady, Fantus executive vice president in charge of the Chicago office.

Although Phillips has been replaced, Ady said he did not yet know when the Twin Falls study, which was due in February, will be finished. "I haven't been involved," he said.

The status of the \$8,000 study has been a sore point with officers of the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, which requested it, and with city officials who have been expecting it.

"We certainly are miffed by the fact that we have not received the report as yet," said Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney. The city has not received a good explanation about the delays, he said.

Phillips and another Fantus consultant researched the economic climate in Twin Falls during January and gave a preliminary, oral report at the chamber's annual meeting. It was to be followed in a few weeks by a written analysis.

But the report did not arrive by the end of February. Instead, it began appearing in pieces, said Mike Dolton,

chamber executive vice president and the main contact with Fantus. To date, the city and the chamber have received 10 of 18 important sections, said Dolton, who has been pressuring Phillips for several months.

But, despite the wait, the city has not paid Fantus any fees for the work. "We never did put any money up front," said Dolton. "They never billed us." As much as 30 percent was due before delivery of the final report, under the contract. The total cost of the audit is \$8,000 plus expenses.

"I don't think there's been a lot of damage done," Dolton said.

After looking at the first parts of the report, Courtney said he expects to gain new information from the study.

"There is some other information that presents a little different twist than we've been looking at ourselves, and that is valuable," he said.

But Fantus has given no timetable for completion. Ady said Thursday he expected to resolve that question today with Phillips.

The current study is the first phase of a four-part project proposed by Fantus. The other three stages would: target specific industries that might like to locate in Twin Falls; create a marketing program to attract those industries; and organize a general economic development strategy to upgrade the city's business climate.

The City Council has authorized only the first phase. Dolton said he still is interested in other phases.

However, "They're going to have to guarantee us a timetable from here on out . . . in writing," he said.

Jerome wants 100 tree planters

JEROME — Members of the Jerome Beautification Committee are asking for the help of 100 volunteers at 8 this evening to plant 132 red crimson maple trees in the downtown area.

The event will be a 24-hour effort, similar to the warning pool installation last summer. Volunteers will work through the night and hopefully finish by 8 p.m. Saturday. If necessary, work will continue on Sunday.

John Heazler, spokesman for the committee, said the 24-hour goal was to help keep enthusiasm up for the project. "We wanted to make an interesting goal for the people," he said.

The trees will be located 30 feet apart along the first two blocks in each direction from the main intersection. Volunteers are asked to bring shovels and brooms to

help with the planting. A few sledgehammers will also be necessary to remove smaller pieces of concrete.

The tree planting will involve removing a 26-by-26 square of concrete from the sidewalk to allow room for the eight- to 10-foot trees. The cuts for the squares were made last weekend.

After the concrete is removed, holes will be bored for the trees. A mixture of earth-and fertilizer will be used to plant the trees. Heazler said. A frame will be placed around the tree for protection while concrete is poured in to fill up extra space.

Flower planters will also be installed around the trees. Holders will be installed during the session Friday night, and the planters will go in as soon as the cement has cured adequately.

Basque heritage Associations preserve traditions

GOODING — In the late 1800s, the ranges of Idaho were a new frontier for wool growers.

The Wool Growers Association, wanting the most expert and hardworking herdsmen in the world, contracted Basques from northern Spain to care for their sheep.

Over the years, the Basque population in the Northwest grew and, to preserve their heritage, the Basques formed associations and met regularly to dance, dine, play games and sing together as their ancestors did.

On Sunday, the Gooding Basque Association, which has about 100 members from throughout the Magic Valley, will sponsor its fifth annual picnic.

The all-day celebration is a way to keep Basque families together and preserve their heritage, said Mary Ybarguen-of-Gooding, the daughter of one of the area's first Basque sheepherders and the wife of another. She said it's getting more and more difficult to keep the Basque heritage alive.

"This picnic kind of unites the customs and food and dancing," she said. "It's just slowly dying out and this way we can keep a little of it alive."

Third generation Basque children don't readily learn the old ways and the old language, she said. They tend to be Americans first and Basque-second

and, through marriage or living away from the Basque culture of their American homes, they are losing touch with their heritage.

The Basque language, Spanish and English will all be spoken freely during Sunday's celebration, she said.

Very few immigrants come from Spain any more, Ybarguen said. They first must serve three or four years in the armed forces there, which tends to keep them in Spain permanently because the older men do not move away as readily as do the youth. Also, she said, there are more job opportunities there today than there were when Basques first migrated to this country. And in Idaho, the sheep business has been steadily decreasing over the last 10 years or so.

"It's gone down terribly," she said. "One year in 10 you can make it."

Another problem, she added, is the lower quota for immigrants from Spain—the few new sheepherders that still come to Idaho are usually from Peru, Ybarguen said.

Basques in Idaho today have many different professions, she said. They are now in agriculture, construction and business.

Ybarguen said she is glad to see the Basques gather keep their customs and folklore alive in America.

"I was raised with the old country traditions all my life," she said proudly.

Picnic offers old country culture

GOODING — Tradition from the old country will bring Basque cuisine, music, dancers and muscle men to Gooding Sunday.

The Fifth Annual Basque Picnic will be held at the West Park in Gooding Sunday, beginning at 11 a.m. with Mass, followed by a sheepherders bread judging contest.

Dinner will be served at 1 p.m., with a menu of barbecued lamb chops or beef steaks, tossed green salad, Spanish rice, red beans and bread. Cost is \$6 for adults and \$3 for children age 6 to 12.

"The food is excellent because we have some of the best cooks in the country," explained Mary Ybarguen, secretary of the Gooding Basque Association.

After dinner, the "Triskalarah Dancers" from Salt Lake City will perform traditional steps to the accordion music of Jean Fleisher. The Euskadi Dancers from Gooding also will perform. The members of both groups are youths ranging in age from 10 to early 20s.

Next is a lamb and bread auction, followed by kid's competitive sports and games, including sack races, three-legged races and relays.

In the adult wheel carrying competition, men will vie for prizes by running back and forth with a 28-pound cement weight in each hand.

"It's quiet a chore if you don't know how to do it," Ybarguen said, explaining how the cylinders can occasionally slip from sweaty hands and land on the competitors' feet.

There also will be a sheep-hooking contest, where men and women race to a large corral to hook stampeding sheep and tie their legs. Another event, the Tug-of-War, has a men's team pulling against a women's team in a feat of strength.

This will be followed by exhibition weight lifting, featuring Basque strong men.

"These two men are professionals," said Ybarguen. "They go from one Basque event to another."

14 attend water allocation hearing

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Power Company's objection to a recently adopted water allocation rule is an "attempt to convert an opportunity into an advantage," a Twin Falls resident said at a state Department of Water Resources hearing Wednesday.

John Courtney said Idaho Power had an opportunity to express its desires during hearings before the rule was adopted. He said Idaho Power was taking advantage by petitioning for repeal before the rule is put into effect.

There was no other testimony at the Twin Falls County Council hearing, although 14 people attended — including Idaho Power attorney Tom Nelson of Twin Falls.

Nelson said the company doesn't think the rule executes the law. On April 28 the company filed objections to the rulemaking process and the department decided to hold new hearings.

While the hearings occur, the rule has been stayed, said Norman Young of the department.

Because 65 percent of IPC's electricity comes

from water power, the company has a big stake in any water allocation changes.

The company says the rule could hamper its ability to produce hydropower and is contesting the size of the water allocations allowed by the state. The rule involves the means of determining which water applications and permits will be reviewed under a public-interest criteria.

Idaho code requires the director of the department to determine whether a proposed use of water by an applicant would significantly reduce the amount of trust water available to the holder of a water right used for power production. He has to determine if such a use is in the public interest.

IPC is also challenging the rule in a suit filed in 5th District Court in Twin Falls. Nelson, the company's attorney, said the issue could be resolved if the department rewrote the rule.

The rule exempts from the public interest criteria projects resulting in a flow reduction of no more than 2 acre feet per day. This flow would be enough to irrigate 320 acres of farmland.

Idaho Power wants the rule changed to read a maximum of 1 acre foot per day.

The last hearing on the matter will be on Monday in Boise. However, written comments will be received by the department up to 10 days after that. The department will try to adopt new rules on Aug. 12, with the rules taking effect 20 days later.

In the interim, all water-appropriation rules and regulations adopted April 8 are in effect, except the one which IPC objects to, said Young.

The state Legislature, Gov. John Evans and IPC resolved a long-simmering controversy last February over water users upstream from Swan Falls and whether they were impinging on Idaho Power's rights to a minimum stream flow for power generation.

In the agreement, minimum stream flows were set for summer and winter irrigation seasons. The state was also given the right to 600 cubic feet per second of water, as measured at Murphy gauge near Swan Falls. The agreement set a framework for the state's development against competing interests.

New plant hinges on finding markets

BURLEY (AP) — The J.R. Simplot Co. is continuing its search for markets for key byproducts of a new ethanol production process using waxy barley, leaving prospects for construction of a major production facility up in the air.

But a company spokesman said that if a decision is made to go ahead with the new processing plant, it will be located in Idaho, not Washington state as many barley growers and agricultural officials have urged.

"But the key words now are 'when and if,'" spokesman John Zerza said. "At this point we're still pursuing markets for soluble fibers and high-protein bran. Until those are secured we won't construct the plant."

Zerza said the company has committed itself to locating any new ethanol production facility in Idaho because of the state Legislature's decision to extend the 4-cent-a-gallon exemption from the fuel tax for ethanol. No specific site has been picked for the possible plant, he said, but it will be located somewhere in the barley-producing regions of southern Idaho or the Lewiston-Grangeville area.

Simplot officials continued to be optimistic about finding markets for both soluble fibers, which can be used to control blood cholesterol levels, and the high-protein bran, which is a candidate for cereals and other food products.

Although seed production of waxy barley is only in the fledgling stages, Zerza said supplies for a new production facility would be no problem, predicting that as much as 100,000 acres of the crop could be planted next year.

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Improvements to Hanford plant listed

WASHINGTON (AP) — A special team of experts said Thursday the nation's only nuclear reactor designed like the Chernobyl reactor is operated safely, but issued a warning against complacency, listing 57 recommendations for improvement.

Among other things, the team said it found that the backup control room at the N-reactor on the Hanford Nuclear Reservation near Richland, Wash., could not be used in a severe accident.

The team said the staff did not adequately understand the reactor's "graphite moderator could catch fire, and employees generally did not believe it is possible to reduce

radiation exposure any further.

It was a fire in the graphite of the Chernobyl reactor in the Soviet Union that threw radioactive materials high in the air and around the globe on the wind.

The Hanford N-reactor, which makes nuclear weapons material as well as electricity for the power grid of the Pacific Northwest, is the only large U.S. reactor that uses graphite to slow down neutrons and water to carry away heat.

Two important similarities with the Chernobyl design.

Like Chernobyl, the N-reactor does not have a pressure-tight containment structure designed to prevent radioactive substances from escaping in an accident. Unlike Chernobyl, the area for 5 1/2 miles around is empty.

After the April 28 disaster at Chernobyl, Energy Secretary John S. Herrington ordered a speed-up of an already scheduled "technical safety appraisal" by a 15-member team of experts, most from outside the government but some of them from other department facilities.

The team's report said, "No indications were found that a serious accident is likely to occur at N-reactor, or that contractor employees or the general public are being subjected to unacceptable risks."

The fire broke out in an uninhabited area near Little Smoky Creek 12 to 14 miles northeast of Fairfield in Camas County.

Sawtooth Forest Information officer Ed Waidapefel said the fire was expected to be contained by midnight, but crews would still have a lot of work before it is controlled.

The 28-member firefighting crew

was using hand tools to fight the blaze which was being fanned by an 8 to 12 mph wind from the southeast. A helicopter and two engines also responded.

Waidapefel said he had received no reports of injuries. He said the cause of the fire was of undetermined origin.

The flight service in Burley said the fire was spotted by a half dozen aircraft flying over the area Thursday afternoon. Firefighters were on their way by the time the flight service reported the fire to authorities.

Aftershocks hit California

There were no immediate reports of injury or damage from Thursday's quakes.

The 1:36 p.m. aftershock registered 4.5 on the Richter scale and was centered 12 miles northwest of Palm Springs, said Dennis Meredith of the California Institute of Technology in Pasadena. The second, measuring 4.4, struck at 2:55 p.m. in the same area, 110 miles east of Los Angeles, he said.

Few residents telephoned the newspaper to report the quakes.

Bear shot after Scout hurt

CIMARRON, N.M. (AP) — A state game officer on Thursday shot and killed a black bear believed to have wounded a 14-year-old Boy Scout in the third bear attack in four days at a Scout backpacking camp.

Officers of the state Game and Fish Department on Wednesday killed two other black bears, which were suspected in the first two attacks at the Philmont Scout Ranch in northern New Mexico.

None of the four Scouts hurt in the three incidents was seriously injured.

William C. Stout, of Burlington, N.C., who was attacked in his tent Wednesday night, was in good condition Thursday after receiving 22 stitches to close a 2-inch gash in the back of his head, said ranch spokesman Larry Walker.

On Wednesday morning, a 119-pound bear was trapped and killed shortly after she smashed a Scout's tent.

"She brushed up against a tent and a Scout confronted her eyeball to eyeball, and then the kid dove back in his tent," said Tim Barrough, a state game official. The bear scratched the boy before leaving.

Early Sunday morning, Shawn Leon, 15, and Matthew Spain, 16, were bitten by a bear when it entered their tent, camp officials said.

The boys were treated for lacerations and bites and both required stitches, camp officials said. The 165-pound bear believed responsible for that attack was shot Wednesday morning.

Officials were waiting for results of rabies tests on the three dead bears, but they said it was unlikely they would be positive.

Continued from Page B1 — "It was probably a good decision to make," Gillette said, adding "it left a lot of bad vibes for the farmers."

It may not have worked to the advantage of the company, said Twin Falls commodity broker Alex Sinclair. He said recently released government statistics point to a smaller crop this year, due to a 10-percent reduction in planted acreage of a large area reducing that most analysis had expected, meaning a possibly lower supply and higher prices.

"Ore-Ida spent time with their fieldmen exploring acreage and came up with an acreage figure they were comfortable with and felt 'Let's forget our contract.' They thought they could buy those potatoes cheaper than the contract price," Sinclair said. "But now they probably realize how they're going to have to pay more than the con-

tract price on the open market."

"I think it's pretty evident to me at this point they'd like to rescind that decision," Sinclair said.

"Ore-Ida is glad to see acreage is down for everybody's benefit," Thiessen said through a company spokesperson. "It needed to be cut in order to be more in line with demand for both fresh and frozen potato products." The latest acreage figures would not, however, change the company's decision on contracting for potatoes, she said Thiessen had indicated.

Royal razzmatazz on display

LONDON — A royal spectacle unfolds next week in Westminster Abbey, where British monarchs have been crowned, married and buried for 920 years.

Prince Andrew, Britain's playboy prince, and Sarah Ferguson, a bouncy redhead called "Fergie," will step to the abbey's magnificent high altar at 11:30 a.m. (4:30 a.m. MDT) Wednesday and exchange marriage vows before a potential television audience of 300 million people in 32 nations.

Not since the wedding five years ago of Prince Charles, the heir to the throne, and Lady Diana Spencer has the world seen such a display of pomp, circumstance and royal razzmatazz.

The nuptials of Andrew, second son of Queen Elizabeth II and Prince Phillip and fourth in line to the throne, has not generated anything like the feverish excitement that brought a million

people into the streets of London in 1981. An estimated 750 million people watched that ceremony on television, and London was awash in Union Jacks and red, white and blue bunting for weeks.

But few here doubt it will be a jolly good show just the same, a welcome diversion from concern over the nation's industrial decline and a chance to dispel fears of terrorism that have kept many Americans away from London.

Nothing, least of all security, is being left to chance.

Scotland Yard has said 2,000 police will be along the mile-long processional route from Buckingham Palace to Westminster Abbey.

According to Press Association, Britain's domestic news service, blue bereted marksmen from Scotland Yard's D11 Firearms Squad will take up rooftop positions and armed police disguised as footmen in ceremonial frocks and iron hats will ride on the horse-drawn carriages carrying the wedding party.

Westminster Abbey will be sealed off from

the public for four days before the wedding, while seating is arranged for the 1,800 guests and workers set up television lights and cameras, flowers and a royal blue processional carpet. Arranging the flowers alone is a two-day job.

And just in case the wedding cake gets spilt on the way to the capital from a Royal Navy supply school 250 miles away, navy chefs have baked an identical spare cake.

At dawn Thursday, 156 cavalrymen from the queen's Household Guard accompanied by eight empty horse-drawn carriages rumbled along newly deserted streets to time the wedding procession down to the last second.

Absent was the carriage that will carry Miss Ferguson and her father, Maj. Ronald Ferguson, to the church from Clarence House, home of the Queen Mother Elizabeth. The Glass Coach, built in 1910 and used by King George V for his coronation that year, is never used in rehearsals.

Marine troubled by drug-testing policy

DEAR ABBY: I totally agree with your objections to mandatory drug testing for everyone.

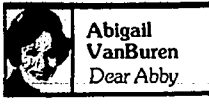
I am in the military, and we take urinalysis tests at least once a month. Since I have never used drugs and I never plan to, I was not afraid of these tests. That is until recently.

Abby, I am one of the unlucky 10 percent who have never used drugs but came up positive on the test for the use of marijuana, and you would not believe what I have been going through.

I had planned to make the military my career, but my chances are ruined. I have lost the respect of my seniors in command and lost some of my so-called friends. My family and fiancée have been harassed. And I have been branded a liar.

The military is very strict on drugs, and they should be. However, when innocent people are found "guilty" of something they never dreamed of doing, there is something wrong with the system.

I came up positive in March. It's now July, and I am still fighting the

dangerous myth: the unreliability of urine testing. While it is true that a single urine test can be wrong for many reasons, such errors are not common and they are, in any well-run program, irrelevant.

A few years ago, when some companies did use unconfirmed tests to discharge employees, there was a serious problem. Today virtually all companies using urine testing have improved their techniques to assure reliability.

First, positive tests are confirmed using a different method of analysis. The possibility of some non-drug substance causing a "false" positive under such circumstances is virtually zero. In addition, companies routinely keep samples which test positive for subsequent analysis so that if an employee protests that his test results were in error the company can retest the same sample.

Thus, when urine tests for drugs are done correctly, there is no problem with reliability.

Another problem has sometimes been used by opponents of testing to undermine public support for urine

testing at work: the fact that drug use of the job can show up as a positive test in urine samples taken on the job. The fact that a urine sample taken on the job contains a prohibited drug or its breakdown product shows conclusively that the employee brought the drug to work in his body. In other words, urinalysis does not test for "past use" — it tests for drugs present in the body at the time of the testing.

The vast majority of workers do not use illegal drugs. They have a stake in establishing a drug-free work environment. After working with hundreds of drug users who came to treatment when they were "caught" at work, I can say without exception that they came to appreciate those who said "no" to their drug use.

There is no alternative to urine testing to ensure that the workplace is drug-free. Testing deserves your understanding and support.

Companies 'adopt' public housing for elderly

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) — Ruth Mahoney and her neighbors may soon get free repairs on gas appliances, a grill for their public housing project and free transportation for group outings, thanks to a company that has agreed to "adopt a high-rise."

Because of a shortage of federal funds, there has been a decline in services provided in the city's public housing for senior citizens. To make up the difference, city officials are asking private corporations to step in, and so far, two companies have accepted the challenge.

"They've been kind of cutting corners with maintenance and nothing really is going on here," said Ms.

Mahoney, in her 60s, who lives in the 48-unit project that was the first to be adopted. "I think it's a wonderful idea. I think it will help more people here come out of their cubby holes."

Jan Gutzman, Minneapolis public housing director, said he hopes the plan will spread to all 43 of the city's high-rise buildings for seniors.

"It just struck me that there are a lot of programs that our foundations participate in that usually have to do with someone in trouble — a disadvantaged youth or alcoholism, for example," Gutzman told the Minneapolis Star and Tribune.

"Here are people who are not in trouble, but are just poor — earning maybe \$5,000 to \$6,000 — who could

perhaps benefit from some attention," he said.

Minnegasco, a Minneapolis-based utility, was the first corporation to enlist in the program. A Minneapolis bank also has committed itself and four other corporations are close to joining, Gutzman said.

Joyce-Ranger, another resident of the adopted high-rise, said she is looking forward to a meeting next week with Minnegasco officials to determine what services the company will provide.

Preliminary information from the company suggests that the services possibly will include free repairs on gas appliances, "one-on-one friendly" transportation for group

outings and a gas grill to be installed on the high-rise grounds, Mrs. Ranger said.

"I don't know about the one-on-one friendly visits, but I do like the idea of the program," Mrs. Ranger said.

Kimberly Roden, administrator of the community relations division for the utility, said Minnegasco employees and retirees signed on because the program meshed with their volunteer emphasis, which is to help the elderly.

Roberta Boller, manager of Minneapolis-area volunteer services for First Bank Inc., said the federal cutbacks in financial aid to the housing projects helped compel the company to enlist in the program.

BALTIMORE (AP) — The possibility of point-shaving is being examined as part of the investigation into the cocaine-induced death of Maryland basketball star Len Bias, the chief prosecutor says.

Also being looked into are reports that urine samples were switched to avoid drug detection, and accusations that some coaches may have known of player drug use, said Arthur Marshall Jr., the Prince George's County state's attorney.

A grand jury, which on Monday begins a two-week hearing in the Bias case, will investigate all of the allegations, Marshall said Wednesday night. Maryland State Police have uncovered new evidence in their investigation into the circumstances surrounding the cocaine-induced death of University of Maryland basketball star Len Bias, contained particles of cocaine and



PCP. The bottle was found in the same dumpster behind the dormitory in which police found a vial of cocaine, straw, a water pipe and other beer bottles, WUSA-TV reported.

The medical examiner, Dr. John Smialek, said there was no evidence of PCP in Bias' bloodstream. But the station said medical experts believe the drug might not have reached the player's bloodstream as Bias became sick to his stomach before lapsing into unconsciousness.

The point-shaving reports involve out-of-state games, Marshall said, adding that investigators have not yet obtained any evidence to substantiate "these stories and innuendos, and what people have been saying to us in the grand jury."

"Among some of the other rumors, (we have) specific allegations, in-

volving the fact that at least one person, Brian Tribble, may have traveled with the team or at least been at the scene of a couple of the out-of-state games, and as a result of that there have been some statements made that maybe point-shaving was involved," Marshall said.

Maryland Athletic Director Dick Dull said Thursday that allegations of point-shaving and gambling were new to him.

"I first heard about it when I read Marshall's comments in *The Washington Post* this morning," Dull said. "I put them in light, of what Marshall said, that the allegations were made but there is no evidence to substantiate them."

Point-shaving is when a team tries to win a game but by less than the number of points it was favored by in the betting line.

Tribble, who was believed to have been present with Bias when he collapsed in his dormitory June 19, was probably the person who supplied the cocaine Bias used before his death, Marshall said Wednesday.

"We believe the evidence will show that Tribble brought the drugs into the room," Marshall said.

Bias died two days after the NBA champion Boston Celtics made him their first selection and the No. 2 pick overall in the college draft.

The prosecutor has said he is no longer focusing on a possible manslaughter charge for the supplier of the drug, but instead is looking at possible charges for possession or distribution of drugs.

Tribble's attorney, William Cahill Jr., declined comment Thursday on the latest allegations.

Marshall told *The Washington*

Post that investigators are checking to see whether Tribble attended a Maryland game last year in Raleigh, N.C., against North Carolina State. He also told the newspaper that a Raleigh police officer has been subpoenaed in case the grand jury wants to look at records from the police department there.

Investigators have also been told that Maryland basketball coaches were aware some players were using drugs and that athletes at the school may have switched urine samples to avoid being detected as drug users during random drug tests.

"We have been advised that at least one or more of the coaches were aware or at least had reported to Prince George's County (investigators) that one or more of the players had used drugs," Marshall said.

Cardholder's interest keeps compounding

TWIN FALLS — The careers of baseball greats Joe DiMaggio and Hank Aaron but for baseball card collector Jason Denton, they mean big interest and big money.

Denton, a junior at Twin Falls High School, has amassed a collection of more than 20,000 cards, collected over 10 years.

"He really likes them, but I think they are a mess," said his mother, Joanne Denton. "I thought (the interest in cards) would disappear."

But Denton's interest is still going strong. He has traveled to California, Oregon, Utah, Wyoming and all over Idaho trading cards and looking for the best deals.

Ian who? Diminutive Welshman sets pace at British Open

TURNBERRY, Scotland — Just when the Ailsa course — the Turnbull Club was about to claim a complete victory in the first round of the British Open, a small Welshman with a big swing struck a blow for par. That's 70 blows, if you are counting, and everybody is.

And they may still be counting, for that matter, The Turf-berry Giant, a fresh wind from the west that speeds across the sea from Ireland and gives the Scottish coast its best shot, nailed the players Thursday with a Sunday punch three days early. It gusted to perhaps 30 miles per

hour in temperatures beginning in the 40s and ending in the 60s, causing the players' scores to soar into the high 70s and beyond.

It meant that Ian Woosnam, at 5 feet, 4 1/2 inches tall and 154 pounds, had left all the big boys behind. Greg Norman had a 74, seven ballstesters' 76, Tom Watson a 77, Masters champion Jack Nicklaus a 78 and U.S. Open champion Ray Floyd a 78. "A very strange day," Nicklaus decided.

The wind, the cold, the rough and the greens combined to confound the world's best and allow some of the world's least to have their day in the gloom. A whole bunch of Englishmen shot 71, the most notable of whom

was Nick Faldo. The low Americans, at 72, were Sam Rendon, who turned pro after playing in the U.S. Open as an amateur, and Ron Comans. PGA Tour commissioner Deane Beman outplayed virtually the entire American contingent, making birdies on the last three holes for a 75. Craig Stadler shot an 82, settling down to par the last five holes after hurting his wrist during a sad triple-bogey on the unplayable par 10th. It was that kind of day.

"You're talking about the best players in the world being humiliated," Norman said. "You feel like a non-entity out there, hacking around in the rough."

And hack they did. Player after

player recounted how they hit sand wedge followed by sand wedge, then first from the rough to the fairway, the second to the green, and with two putts they were lucky to make bogey. When it wasn't sand wedge-sand wedge, it was driver-driver to get home on the long par six, and even that wasn't always possible on the 448-yard 14th, which played dead into the wind to a stroke average greater than five.

"This is the kind of day you walk off with a headache," Norman said. "From all the concentration and fighting the wind."

Curtis Strange had a 79 as part of the morning group, which suffered the brunt of the Giant's wrath.

Strange went off wrapped in long underwear, a turtle-neck shirt, a sweater, a golf shirt and a wool ski cap. "I got as close as I ever have to walking off a golf course," he said. "I didn't because I never have. I got tired of hitting the ball out of the crap all day."

There is considerably more of the bad stuff waiting to swallow up golf balls than when the tournament was held here in 1977. The fairways have been narrowed to 20 yards at a minimum, about eight yards less than the USA would allow at a U.S. Open course. The conditions in 1977, little rough, no wind and warm temperatures, produced the immortal struggle between Nicklaus and

Watson, with Watson emerging the winner.

"Why, after having an exciting tournament in 1977, would they totally change the golf course?" Nicklaus asked. "It's going to be a survival tournament rather than someone going out and winning it. There's nothing wrong with that. The question is is it too tough, have they taken something out of the golf tournament? ... It's a lot more fun for the people watching the tournament if someone can shoot 67 or 68."

The day was meant for strength in body and soul. Both qualities were nurtured during Woosnam's upbringing on a Welsh farm.

TWIN FALLS — Notes from the Idaho State Men's Amateur Golf Championships. For the past few years — since the day-to-day operation of the Idaho Golf Association was turned over to Executive Secretary Wayne Berry — there has been a rule that does not allow contestants to wear shorts during competition.

Captors free Filipino nuns

MARAWI, Philippines (AP) — Ten nuns released Thursday after five days of captivity pleaded for leniency for their Moslem captors, and a U.S. missionary kidnaped by another Moslem group warned he would be killed if the military tried to free him.

The Filipino nuns, who were held by a disgruntled former government employee, said they were treated well and given a farewell party the night before their release.

"It was like a dream come true," said Madeleine Ledesma, 44, mother superior of the Carmelite convent in Marawi from which the nuns were taken Friday night.

"We are cloistered nuns, and we have no way to get close to them (Moslems)," she said. "We always wished that one day we could... mingle with them and touch their lives... Our lives have been enriched."

The army, meanwhile, moved 400 soldiers and armored vehicles to Marawi, 510 miles southeast of Manila, to put pressure on the kidnapers of American missionary Brian Lawrence, said Maj. Gen. Jose Magno, southern military commander.

The military released a letter from Lawrence to his wife, Carol Ann, in which he said he was treated well but warned the kidnapers would kill him if the military attacked. The 30-year-old Presbyterian missionary from Madison, Wis., was snatched from his home in Marawi on Saturday.

The nuns were taken on foot and by jeep early Thursday to the home of Lano del Sur's governor, Saidamen Pangarungan, where they were embraced by friends.

A news report quoted an influential local Moslem leader, Tarhata Alonto Lucman, as saying \$10,000 and several rifles were given in ransom. But government, military and church officials insisted no concessions were made.

Bishop Fernando Capalla, who helped negotiate the release, said the kidnapers kept two hand-held radios belonging to the nuns as "a souvenir."

The leader of the nuns' captors, Aragas Pasandolan, remained in the Lano del Sur mountains, with about 150 men, said the local military commander, Col. Raul Aquino. The military said Pasandolan had demanded he be reinstated as assistant manager of a

Marawi government food agency, where he was under investigation regarding missing funds.

An official said the issue of reinstatement was up to the food agency.

"These people did us no harm," Mother Ledesma said. "It's because they want to be heard and to be listened to. I feel the solution is not punishing them, but listening to them."

Aquino said the nuns' release increased the chances of soon gaining freedom for Lawrence. The military has said he is being held by about 100 members of an armed band called the Barracudas and linked to local Moslem politicians.

"Pressure from the people is becoming stronger. They can't hold him much longer because it will be to their disadvantage," Aquino said.

President Corason Aquino said his government "will continue to work for the early release" of Lawrence. She said the nuns' release "added credibility to the policy of non-violence" of her government.

However, military and church officials said they were having difficulty in convincing Lawrence's abductors because he apparently had been moved from place to place.

In a taped message released by the military Wednesday, Lawrence said his captors wanted an independent Moslem state on Mindanao Island, where most of the mainly Catholic country's Moslem minority live.

Both the taped message and the letter were conveyed via emissaries sent by the military.

Military officials have said they believe that Ismael Dimaporo, the nephew of former Lano del Sur provincial Gov. Ali Dimaporo, is the leader of Lawrence's kidnapers.

The elder Dimaporo, a staunch ally of deposed President Ferdinand E. Marcos, was ousted as governor and as president of Mindanao State University by Mrs. Aquino's government. Ismael Dimaporo also last job as the university's dormitory manager.

Marawi is the cultural center of the Philippines' Moslem minority, and was the scene of a bloody revolt by Moslem separatists that began in 1972.

Officials said Lawrence's kidnapers only claimed to be seeking Moslem autonomy to camouflage their " nefarious activities."

Hostages in militias' region

PARIS (AP) — French and American hostages in Lebanon are being held in an area controlled by Lebanese militias and an armed rescue mission could endanger the captives, Syrian Vice President Halim Khaddam said Thursday.

It was the first official confirmation that the hostages are not in Lebanon's Syrian-controlled Bekaa Valley, as has been widely reported. "I can assure you that the hostages are not in the Bekaa. They are being held in a region where there are no Syrian forces," Khaddam told a news conference at the end of a two-day official visit to Paris.

"They would run the risk of a great danger if we were to mount an assault," he said.

Khaddam said he does not know the exact site where the five Americans and seven Frenchmen are being held and had no precise information on their fate.

There have been unconfirmed reports in

Lebanon that the hostages were moved from the eastern Bekaa region some time ago and might be in Moslem west Beirut.

"We are only sure that they are not there where the Syrian forces are," Khaddam said. "Syria has been making a great effort on behalf of both the American and the French hostages and will continue to do so," Khaddam said.

Two French hostages, members of a four-man TV crew kidnaped in March by the Revolutionary Justice Organization, were set free June 20.

Islamic Jihad, a Shiite Moslem group believed loyal to Iran, claims to be holding four other Frenchmen and five Americans. No group has claimed responsibility for the kidnaping of an 84-year-old Frenchman.

Khaddam said he had no information on the fate of an American and a French hostage reported killed.

Islamic Jihad claimed last October it killed William Buckley, a U.S. diplomat seized in March 1984. The group claimed in March it killed Michel Seurat, a French researcher, kidnaped in May 1985. No body has been found in either case.

Khaddam, the architect of Syrian policy in Lebanon, was in France at the invitation of Premier Jacques Chirac, whose conservative government has actively sought the French hostages' release since it came to power in March, making an effort to improve ties with Syria and normalize relations with Iran.

Both countries are thought to have influence over the groups claiming to hold the hostages. Khaddam said, however, that there "is no direct link between the relations, whether they are good, less good, etc., and Syria's effort toward the hostages."

Chirac publicly praised Syria following the two Frenchmen's release last month.

Mississippi debts from 1841 may be next to be settled

LONDON (AP) — Old debts neither die nor fade away, a private bond-holders' group insists, and now that the Kremlin has agreed to a settlement on czarist bonds, Mississippi's bill for two 1841 bank failures may be next.

The Corporation of Foreign Bond-Holders was founded in 1968 to protect the interests of Britons with bonds issued by foreigners, in whom Queen Victoria's subjects did not repose deep and abiding trust.

Spokesmen for the organization declared themselves delighted Tuesday when British and Soviet negotiators announced a deal on the division of bank accounts frozen since 1918, when the Soviets repudiated the czars' debts.

Heirs of Britons who lost property in the Bolshevik revolution, and those who hold bonds issued under the czars, could get a windfall of 45 million pounds (\$68 million).

"The lesson is that defaulted debts don't go away, and it would be a mistake for any debtor to think that we will forget," said Michael Gough, director of the Corporation of Foreign Bond-Holders. "We are still after Mississippi, 145 years later."

Bill Cole, Mississippi's treasurer, conferred with Gough last week about \$7 million worth of bonds the state had guaranteed as backing for two banks. They failed in 1841, Mississippi did not redeem the bonds and its credit rating in London has been dismal ever since.

"It had been about 90 years since anyone came from Mississippi," Gough said, adding that the

meeting was exploratory and he did not expect money to roll in soon from Jackson, the state's capital.

The Anglo-Soviet agreement covers bonds dating to the early 19th century, the oldest debts on Gough's records, though most are from the late 19th or early 20th century.

Agreement was possible, he said, because czarist bank accounts in London were frozen after the revolution and the two governments were finally able to agree on how to divide them. Moscow is getting 2.65 million pounds, and 45 million pounds will go toward 60,000 British claims.

"There is no parallel with other outstanding claims," Gough said. "I don't know of bank balances sitting around belonging to China or Mississippi or Bulgaria."

The Chinese and Bulgarian defaults date mostly from the World War II era.

Bankers and auctioneers believe many czarist bonds lie forgotten in attics. One banker saw such bonds when his late grandfather's effects were cleared away 20 years ago.

"We found them in a chest of old stuff, and they just went out, I think," the banker said. He was so chagrined that he did not want his name revealed.

Peter Johnson, spokesman for the Phillips auction house, said old bonds had sold recently for as little as 15 pence (22 cents).

"We know them in the trade as wallpaper, because that is what they have been bought for," he said.

U.S. envoy protests AIDS charge

MOSCOW (AP) — U.S. Ambassador Arthur A. Hartman on Thursday released the texts of letters he wrote to two Soviet newspaper editors protesting published allegations that AIDS is a result of

Pentagon chemical warfare experiments.

The letters, addressed to the chief editors of the literary weekly Literaturnaya Gazeta and the daily

Sovietskaya Rossiya, said the allegations were "as reprehensible as they are false."

On April 27, Sovetskaya Rossiya quoted from what it said was a book published in 1984 in Paris by an immunologist identified as Jack Leibovis.

The newspaper claimed Leiboivic wrote that the AIDS virus in the United States was different from

viruses found in Africa and in Haiti and "as J. Leiboivic concludes, could have been born in the course of experiments to form bacteriological weapons."

On June 8, the newspaper cited unidentified French and British virus specialists as not ruling out that the AIDS virus could have resulted from materials being released from laboratories conducting bacteriological experiments.

AIDS, or acquired immune deficiency syndrome, attacks the body's immune system, leaving it vulnerable to a host of usually fatal diseases.

2 Chernobyl reactors to start up in October

MOSCOW (AP) — Two Chernobyl reactors undamaged by the nuclear accident are scheduled to restart in October after repairs, but officials have not decided what to do about a third reactor, the Communist Party daily Pravda said Thursday.

The third reactor at the nuclear power plant is in a building adjacent to the No. 4 block, which exploded April 26. The disaster claimed 26 lives, according to the most recent official death toll, and released a cloud of radiation worldwide.

Officials have said reactors 1 and 2, at the other end of the Chernobyl complex, were not affected by the accident and should be back in operation by October.

Pravda quoted Chernobyl director

Erik N. Pozdyshev as saying the start up was still planned, "according to tentative estimates."

He was quoted as saying, however, some ordinary planned repairs were needed and "new requirements under nuclear safety standards" must be dealt with before reactors 1 and 2 can resume operation.

Pozdyshev did not elaborate on either point or say whether the repairs were connected with the accident.

Official accounts have said the No. 3 reactor was not damaged by the explosion at the plant in the northern Ukraine. But officials clearly have reservations about restarting it.

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Convictions reversed

BELFAST, Northern Ireland (AP) — The convictions of 18 Belfast men found guilty of IRA activity in 1983, based on the testimony of one informant, were overturned Thursday by the Court of Criminal Appeal.

Lord Chief Justice Lord Lowry said the trial judge, Lord Justice Kelly, should have examined the testimony of informant Christopher Black more carefully. He said he was not drawing the conclusion that Black lied, merely that the lower court had over-estimated the

credibility of the informant. Black, a self-confessed former Irish Republican Army gunman, implicated 38 people in the 1983 trial, which lasted 117 days. Black was granted immunity from prosecution, given a new identity and is now living outside Northern Ireland.

Authorities immediately released five of the seven men still jailed, including two sentenced to life terms for the murder of a sergeant in the mainly Protestant Ulster Defense Regiment. The other two were held to face unrelated charges.

Nixon visits noted composer's home

MOSCOW (AP) — Richard M. Nixon visited Tchaikovsky's home Thursday, then went to the country house that figured in trips he made to the Soviet Union as vice president in 1959 and president in 1972, his spokesman said.

John Taylor said Nixon, 73, spent most of the day at the government

guest house where he is staying in Moscow working on notes from Wednesday's two-hour meeting with Anatoly Dobrynin. A second meeting is scheduled for today.

Taylor and the official Soviet media have given only bare details of Nixon's meetings, which they say concern U.S.-Soviet relations.

'Music by the Pond' has local flavor

Wood River Valley musicians perform predominately jazz at Sun Valley Inn

SUN VALLEY "Music by the Pond" may be a new summer series in Sun Valley, but it will probably sound and feel very familiar for many listeners.

The series, which will run from 5:30 to 8 p.m. each Friday through the summer, shares some similarities with "Jazz on the Green," Elkhorn Resort's Thursday night summer jazz series.

"The music is predominately jazz, and admission is free; listeners sit on lawn chairs, blankets, or grass near the pond outside of the Sun Valley Inn, some enjoying snacks of wine and cheese. And "Alan Pennay and Friends," the quartet which provides most of the Friday night music, first played together during a "Jazz on the Green" performance two years ago, said Pennay.

But "Music on the Pond" will have a more local flavor than its Elkhorn counterpart with the quartet performing for each show, the pianist said. And two members of the group are familiar to area visitors because of their regular work: drummer Ted Dyer and guitarist John Northrup play at Sun Valley six nights per week with the Joe Foss Trio. Foss will play during "Music by the Pond" intermissions, said Pennay.

The fourth member of the quartet, bass player Jeff Hux, is also a well-known area resident, though most know him as "Brother Al Pine," KSKI disk jockey.

In fact, group leader Pennay is the only member whose regular job doesn't involve music. "Retired" after 20 years of traveling the globe as a professional musician, he built and now manages River Run Lodge condominiums.

His dedication to music is obvious, though; a baby grand piano occupies much of the living room in his second story unit. The legs had to be temporarily removed, and a balcony railing pulled down, to maneuver it in place.

"I think the love of music is a gift," said Pennay. "It's something you cannot give up." That feeling is shared and admired by all the members of the quartet, he said.

"This came through mutual respect for each others' playing," said Pennay. They play music that is "dominantly jazz influenced," because that is what each enjoys most, he said.

"It's dominantly a jazz quartet. I guess you would say," said Pennay, "with a lot of Brazilian influence," he said the musicians especially enjoyed "playing in our own back yard," sharing their music with both local residents and visitors.

"I would say the players have a vested interest in the goodwill of Sun Valley," said Pennay.

Muzzie Braun releases solo music project

Muzzie Braun, the Twin Falls native whose country-style swing music is being played on radios throughout the state, released his first solo recording project, entitled "Muzzie," last week.

The recording, available only on cassette, retails for \$8.81 and is available at the Music Center, Vickers Western Stores, Ann's Hallmark, Pennywise Drug and Payless Drug.

Muzzie Braun and the Idaho Swing Band will be appearing at the Turf Club in Twin Falls, tonight and Saturday, July 18 and 19, from 9 p.m. to 1 a.m. Brothers Gary and Billy will join them there. The Braun Brothers, alumni of St. Edward's Catholic School, will also be playing in the band shell at City Park during the St. Edward's School reunion on Saturday.

"I'm really excited about it," said Braun of his new cassette. "It's a better recording. We went into a 24 track studio as opposed to the 8 track ones where we had recorded before. It was a more professional studio and we took a lot more time recording it."

"Muzzie" was produced in March at Sun Valley Audio in Ketchum. Musical talent for the project was recruited from different areas of the state.

"We used some real good musicians. We got Teddy Ray Jones on fiddle, who's a pretty famous fiddle player in Idaho. We also used Norton Buffalo, who's a national recording artist who plays the harmonica," said Braun. Braun noted that he wrote, or co-wrote five of the 10 songs on the western swing cassette. Braun's brothers, Gary and Billy, are also featured.

"The original songs are all new, but there's an old Benny Goodman tune on there called 'Idaho.' I rewrote a verse and a chorus to it."

Braun said he used more bluegrass instruments in this recording than in his previous releases.

"On 'Muzzie,' we feature more banjo and mandolin and piano than my other music has," said the Twin Falls man. "Beyond the Wild, Wild West" is a swing tune that we're going to be pushing. It's a tune to a swing beat. A lot of the tunes on this cassette are swing tunes. It's a more up tempo tune than I've done in the past," he said.

After playing solo for several years, Braun recently formed a new group called Muzzie Braun and the Idaho Swing Band. Bruce Laven, a music instructor at Halley High School, plays bass and keyboards. Mike Boylston plays drums. Joel Caserman handles the electric guitar, mandolin and banjo. Braun plays guitar and everyone sings.

Festival workshop to explore Idaho folklore

HAILEY Among its several resources, Idaho's most self-defining resource is often overlooked — its folklore, a topic that includes almost everything from folk arts, song and history to food and customs.

At the Northern Rockies Folk Festival Workshop, July 29 to Aug. 3, in Hailey, Twilo Scofield, a folklore author and professor of Education and Music at Lewis and Clark College in Portland, and Dr. J. Barre Toelken, a professor of English and director of the Folklore Center at Utah State University, will be demonstrating how to identify this resource.

The workshop is part of the ninth annual Northern Rockies Folk Festival, an event which includes a folk concert held at Hailey City Park on Friday and Saturday, Aug. 1-2.

The festival is sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities with the workshop made possible by funds from the Artist-In-Education program of the Idaho Commission on the Arts and the National Endowment for the Arts.

Scofield, director of the workshop, said the workshop is primarily "aimed at teachers" who want to learn to integrate folk culture into an humanities curriculum. But the author noted the workshop is open to "anyone with either a casual or serious interest in folklore."

A \$35 fee will cover materials needed for the workshop, a textbook, "The American Sampler," written by Scofield, some meals and housing with local families. To register, send \$35 to the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities, P.O. Box 656, Sun Valley, Idaho 83353. A full schedule of events and further workshop information will be

received by return mail.

Teachers working toward a university degree have the option of registering for one hour of graduate or undergraduate credit from Idaho State University. The workshop fee for an undergraduate credit is \$50.25 and \$67.25 for a graduate credit unit.

Scofield said anyone wishing to take part in the workshop "for the fun of it" without paying the workshop fee is also invited to attend all or a portion of the festival workshop lectures and demonstrations. "I don't think we will turn anybody away," he said.

With the workshop's emphasis on folk learning in Idaho, participants will attend performances and be involved in demonstrations of Idaho folk life at the festival.

Toelken will be the keynote speaker at the Ellsworth Inn in Hailey, Tuesday night at 7:30 p.m. On Wednesday morning, Scofield and Toelken will continue the workshop, ex-

plaining "general background information." But if "a diversified group" attends the workshop, then the class will break into smaller groups to serve "the needs of the participants," said Scofield.

The Lewis and Clark College professor said the workshop will focus on how to identify folk artists. She said it could clear up some confusion on the definition of folklore, which she defines as "those things transmitted orally or by customary example. Anything that is transmitted by telling, singing or doing."

Folk artists, or "living history books" as Scofield called them, can be found in any community, she said. "It's just a matter of locating them."

On Aug. 1-2, the Hailey City Park will be crowded with folk artists. At the festival and concert, folk artists will be performing their particular folk art, whether it's music

or some other craft.

Guy Clark, Rosalie Sorrels, Lia's Western Swingers, The Boulder Brothers and Lost & Found will perform at the concert. Lost & Found will also perform at an outdoor concert at Elkhorn on the green, Thursday, July 31.

All concerts are free and open to the public. Other folk artists attending the festival include Ramona Barr, an artist who makes, among other things, baskets and beadwork; Frank Wertheimer, duck decoy maker; Bernice Evans, a wheat weaving specialist who is back "by popular demand," said Scofield; and Larry Hanks, a traditional musician who specializes in guitar.

There will also be several exhibits of ethnic cooking and a presentation of the Governor's Folk Art Award to Rose Frank, a Nez Perce Indian.

Seasoned reporters cut from CBS payroll

NEW YORK (AP) — Seventy staffers, including longtime correspondent George Herman whose assignments have included the White House beat and the "Face the Nation" broadcast, were told by CBS News Thursday that they had been cut from the payroll and most were given two weeks to clean up their affairs.

"The date that distresses all of us is here," said CBS News President Van Gordon Sauter in a memo to the news division. "The CBS News layoffs will be concluded by the end of the day."

CBS said the staff cuts were due to the CBS Broadcast Groups' declining advertising revenues and stagnant profits. CBS News will lose 20 other positions through attrition and job consolidation.

CBS News would not confirm or deny any of the cuts, respecting the wishes of the released staffers, CBS News spokeswoman Ann Morfogen said.

But it was learned, through sources who requested anonymity, that news reporters were dropped: Herman, 40-year veteran of CBS News, Washington-based reporters Gary Schuster and Sam Ford, Atlanta reporter Sandy Gilmore, Dallas reporter Carlos Aguilar and Los Angeles reporter Nadine Berger.

Herman, who was hired by CBS in 1944, was White House correspondent in the 1950s. He was moderator of CBS' "Face Sunday Morning," which lost executive producer E.S. Lamoreaux, as well as several segment producers.

well as radio reporting, including anchor work on presidential press conferences.

Herman, 66, has a contract until January and will be allowed to work until the end of the year, said Jack Smith, CBS' Washington bureau chief.

The cuts, Morfogen said, affected virtually every job level. The majority of cuts were in support services, not in direct on-air or editorial functions, she said.

No staffers were cut from "CBS Evening News," although the released reporters had sometimes contributed to that broadcast.

One program hit particularly hard was "Sunday Morning," which lost executive producer E.S. Lamoreaux, as well as several segment producers.

Bureaus in London and Paris lost pro-

ducers, but no bureaus were closed.

"Nightwatch," CBS' late-night news and interview show, was saved but forced to reorganize and streamline its operation. Morfogen said "Nightwatch" will face another round of cuts after the reorganization.

CBS News, which lost 125 positions last fall, will have about 1,150 employees by the end of 1986, down from 1,375 one year ago. NBC News said it had about 1,300 staffers. ABC News said it had more than 1,100 staffers.

On July 2, the CBS Broadcast Group announced the economic need to cut 700 positions to 8 percent of CBS' work force. Ick since 1971, after cigarette advances.

All broadcast divisions, including enter-

tainment, news, sports, radio and the owned-and-operated stations, were affected.

CBS News said Thursday that the released workers can stay at CBS until Aug. 1. They received a benefits package, including severance pay, vacation time and information about pension and insurance. A packet was provided that included places to look for jobs, ways to interview and prepare resumes, and tax information.

"Although it is of little consolation that other companies are going through similar periods of anguish, it does remind us of the wrenching changes in the economy that supports our work," Sauter said. "There is no real alternative to the steps the Broadcast Group is asking this month."

Daytime Emmy awards announced

NEW YORK (AP) — "The Young and the Restless" won three awards, including best daytime drama for the second consecutive year, in helping CBS dominate the 13th annual Daytime Emmy Awards on Thursday.

CBS took home half the 14 performance awards during the ceremony, broadcast live by NBC from New York's Waldorf-Astoria. ABC won three awards, two for "All My Children," while NBC won two.

Besides best series, "The Young and the Restless," which is about

the residents of the fictitious Midwestern city of Genoa City, also was honored for best direction and best writing. "Young and the Restless" was the second-ranked daytime series this past season. The No. 1 show, ABC's "General Hospital," was shut out of the awards Thursday.

The "All My Children" awards were for best actor, David Canary, who plays twins Adam and Stuart Chandler, and for outstanding younger leading man, Michael E. Knight, who plays Tad Martin. Erik

Slezak, who plays Victoria Lord Buchanan of ABC's "One Life to Live," won for best actress.

In other drama awards, John Wesley Shipp, who plays Douglas Cummings in CBS' "As the World Turns," won for best supporting actor; Leann Hunley, who plays Anna Di Mera in NBC's "Days of Our Lives," was best supporting actress; and Ellen Wheeler, who stars as Marley and Victoria Love of NBC's "Another World," won for best feature.

Phil Donahue won again as outstanding talk show host, his eighth such honor and the fourth in the last five years. His syndicated "Donahue" show won best talk show in non-performance awards announced Sunday.

Public television's "Sesame Street" won for best children's program for the seventh time. In 17 years, the education-minded series for pre-schoolers has won 28 Emmys, including three non-performance awards on Sunday.

CBS' "The \$5,000 Pyramid" dominated the game-show category for the second consecutive year, winning for best game show and for best host, Dick Clark.

The outstanding children's special was CBS' "Babies Having Babies," which had won four Emmys on Sunday.

CBS dominated the non-performance awards, winning 13, to ABC's seven and NBC's four.

NBC's fast-paced awards broadcast included clips of the presenters, all daytime performers, and a steamy opening of passionate bedroom and shower sex scenes, to the accompaniment of Jennifer Lewis singing "Addicted to Love."

NBC, No. 3 in daytime, used the program to promote some of its daytime serials, particularly "Santa Barbara." In the past season, ABC was the top-ranked network in daytime with an average rating of 6.3 to CBS' 6.2 and NBC's 5.1.

A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

ABOUT LAST NIGHT (R). Playwright David Mamet's taut, vitriolic, dazlingly funny valentine to the one-night stand is turned into a hilarious, insightful, bawdy Baedeker to The Relationship today, post-sexual revolution and pre-AIDS. Sensational performances by Demi Moore, Jim Belushi, newcomer Elizabeth Perkins and honors to Rob Lowe for a manful try. Consumer's warning: Although the love story will set off a reaction from anyone who has been near the emotion, the movie's language is dem-matrasion-strong; the nudity is tasteful but present.

BACK TO SCHOOL (PG-13). A big belly laugh of a comedy, expertly tailored to the talents of Rodney Dangerfield, cast as a boisterous self-made clothing tycoon who enters college to set a good example to his wallflower son (Keith Gordon). A sleek, witty Sally Kellerman is Dangerfield's English prof and a hilarious Adrienne Barbeau is Dangerfield's social-climbing, two-timing wife. With Robert Downey Jr., Burt Young, Ned Beatty, Terry

FERRIS BUELLER'S DAY OFF (PG-13). Teen chronicler John Hughes has constructed the mythic teen-ager, Ferris Bueller (Matthew Broderick), a giddy scamp who is too savvy for his parents, too cool for school and an absolute terror when it comes to restaurant maltré 'de's. The film's hook is a tantalizing fantasy, for adults as well as kids — what if you could fool your parents and teachers (or for that matter, your boss) into thinking you were sick, earning yourself a 24-hour free-schedule of real life? But Hughes miscalculates badly, making his hero so smug and invincible that he does not give us any chance to root for him.

THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG). This sequel to 1984's teen choppy-socky hit is another mass-audience action fairy tale — but without the obsession with virility, cheap cynicism and endless kill count of the "Cobra" and "Raw Deals." Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's Kid and Pat Morita's implicitly sage martial arts

mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there, they stumble into a "Chinese Connection" story line, escalating kung fu, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected cross-cultural romance and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous; and you can even cheer for the heroes at the end without feeling sorry.

LEGAL EAGLES (PG-13). Badly miscalculated romantic comedy-thriller involving art fraud and murder. Never have Robert Redford, Debra Winger or Daryl Hannah been caught in worse circumstances. An inept, incoherent and charmless attempt at sophistication by producer-director Ivan Reitman, much more at home in the rambunctious humor of "Animal House," "Meatballs," "Stripes" and "Ghostbusters."

RUNNING SCARED (R). There is some much pure, generous joy radiating from the great team of Billy Crystal and Gregory Hines as a pair of undercover Chicago cops that you do not want to notice that the story is going to rack and ruin around them but, after a hilarious start, it is. Or that the writers' notion of an interesting woman-char-acter is one whose only action is standing (or in one case lying) by her man. Director Peter Hyams has created a nifty new chase sequence,

and uses a quick enough hand with the considerable violence to keep it comedic, but the story winds down before our heroes do.

TOP GUN (PG). The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, Jouhar male-bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, massed clouds, streaking jets, and so much techno-pop pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: The trappings are flabbergasting — and the camerawork and editing a knockout — but the story is a sleazy rehash of "Celling Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman," drowned in beefcake and macho bathos.

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Theater owners want blockbusters

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Karate Kid, Part II" held off the competition for the fourth weekend in a row, but there was midseason grumbling from theater owners over the summer's lack of box-office punch.

The top four films of the weekend were unchanged from the week before.

"The Karate Kid" sequel, featuring the martial-arts duo of Ralph Macchio and Pat Morita, grossed \$6.7 million to take the top spot.

"Ruthless People," the Danny DeVito and Bette Midler comedy, was second with \$5.4 million, while another comedy, Rodney Dangerfield's "Back to School," was third with \$5.3 million.

The summer's biggest hit so far is "Top Gun," which was still flying high with weekend receipts of \$4.7 million for fourth place. The airborne action-adventure featuring Tom Cruise as a hot Navy pilot has made \$94.4 million in eight weeks.

"Club Paradise," a comedy that revolves around Robin Williams' taking over a run-down Caribbean resort, opened over the weekend to \$4.15 million in receipts, enough to make fifth place.

Billy Crystal and Gregory Hines in "Running Scared" took sixth place, as the police action-comedy earned \$4.1 million, and "Legal Eagles" slipped from fifth to seventh this week, with \$3.9 million in ticket sales.

Rounding out the top 10 were Paramount's "Ferris Bueller's Day Off," with \$3.5 million; Tri-Star's "About Last Night" with \$3.49 million, and Buena Vista's "The Great Mouse Detective," with \$3.44 million.

Gross theater revenues in June ran 4 percent below last year, and 10 million fewer people went to the movies than in June 1985, said Art

Murphy of Variety, an industry publication.

One industry insider said the disappointing showing is due in part to lack of a blockbuster the likes of last summer's "Back to the Future."

"Everything's a 7 1/2 this year. Nothing's a 10," said Morton Lippe, head booker for Metropolitan theaters.

Last week's box office cumulative gross was \$165 million, compared to \$113 million for the same period last year. For the year, box office gross has been \$1.8 billion this year, compared to \$1.92 billion for the same period in 1985.

PG-13 Rating Introduced

A new rating category is in place as of July 17. This new category is inserted between the current PG and R ratings. It is designated as PG-13. Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for attendance of children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children.

The revised five-category system of the voluntary film industry rating program is now as follows:

- General Audiences, all ages admitted.
- PG: Parental guidance suggested. Some material may not be suitable for children.
- PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to give special guidance for children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children.
- R: Restricted, under-17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian.
- X: No one under 17 admitted.

All films rated after July 1 will be given ratings under the new five-category system.

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Singer's heritage reveals black history

Gail Lumet Buckley's embarkation on the story of "The Hornes: An American Family" began when her grandfather died and her mother, singer Lena Horne, asked her to put his trunk in storage in a basement. Opening it, she found an astonishing trove of photographs, letters, clippings. An 1894 letter from Benjamin Harrison, a 1910 Tammany election ballot.

"I started putting everything in chronological order," Buckley said the other day. "It all unfolded like a detective story — here is what was happening in 1875, there's where she went on in 1885. And then to read black American history, as I did extensively, and put that in on top of it; this was an exciting experience."

In telling the "Roots"-like story of "The Hornes" (Alfred A. Knopf) Buckley makes it clear "they read all stars to me. My mother just happens to be the star that everybody knows."

Although Lena and the author are the focal points throughout two-thirds of the story, Buckley has much more to relate than a dual biography. This profusely illustrated family history tells us more about Lena Horne — by examining her heritage — than was revealed in

either of Lena's autobiographies, which were too cautious and were published too early in her career (in 1950 and 1965).

What might have happened if Horne, who had already "disgraced her family" by going into show business, had just been mildly successful, not very famous, and just an average show business person? Would she have been accepted by her family?

"I think," Buckley replied, "that

she would have been the black sheep of the family, and would have given it up and retired back to the bosom of the black bourgeoisie. If she hadn't sensed her own ability as strongly as she did, she might have remained longer with my father and become another bored, unhappy housewife. She was too fastidious to remain just another chorus girl."

A somewhat startling response, yet typical of the frankness shown by Buckley as she talked about the members of her family that form the basis for her literary voyage of self-discovery.

Because Lena broke up with her first husband, Louis Jones, when Gail was a baby, and because Gail was raised with her Lena — while her brother, Ted, lived with Jones (he died of a kidney disease at age 30), she was able to see at first hand some of the traumas in Horne's life: specifically, a domineering mother who steered Lena at age 16 into the chorus line at the Cotton

Club.

"Suppose her mother hadn't taken her, and she'd been raised in Brooklyn by her grandmother, who would never have allowed her to go on the stage? By now my mother would be a retired school teacher," Buckley said.

"I don't understand these 'Mommie Dearest' books, although I think Christina Crawford probably had an ax to grind. My grandmother was a very neurotic woman, yet Lena didn't want to see her that way. Being one step removed, I felt much more loyal to my mother, who was loyal to her mother in turn."

Other aspects of Lena's life and career that were underplayed or ignored in the Lena Horne books are dealt with frankly by Buckley. Heavily criticized for her role on the Kennedy campaign, took a job with Life magazine, and for 14 years was married to the film director Sidney Lumet. point, Buckley recounts. "She flew into a semicoherent diatribe that began with attacks on Lena and wound up with a vilification of 'Hollywood Jews'... Lena and Ethel never spoke again. And Ethel — because of her vocal anti-Semitism — was a very long time between pictures."

Buckley also reveals that for a while in 1941 Lena had a secret boyfriend, the then-married Joe Louis. "I fell enough time had gone by to talk about these things besides; both of those characters are no longer with us. When I gave mother the manuscript I told her I'd cut anything she wanted me to, and she said she wouldn't cut a word."

Like her mother, Buckley has spent her adult life among rich, glamorous, privileged people, most of them white. She grew up to consider her stepfather, Lennie Hayton. "As much of a parent as my real father, Louis Lennie was indulgent, devoted, fatherly and fun." She was with Lena and Lennie in Hollywood and Europe; she went to Radcliffe, worked as a volunteer on the Kennedy campaign, took a job with Life magazine, and for 14 years was married to the film director Sidney Lumet. Either of her daughters (Amy, 21 and Jenny, 19) could make Lena Horne a great-grandmother in the next few

years.

Again, like her mother, Buckley had to stop and look hard at her life and values. Lena's self-redemption followed the social turbulence of the 1960s. Her remarriage, as well as her post-war politics, caused her to reexamine the bourgeois life style. She found it shallow and frivolous... black Babbitty."

Buckley's turning point was dealt with only glancingly in the book. "The editors cut it out, saying rightly that it was not part of this story; it belonged in a different book. The fact that I had a religious conversion. I became a sort of born-again Catholic. For some bizarre reason the Catholic church is ahead of everyone else in terms of social justice, though not on the subject of women, nor on sexuality."

"Sidney and I were not on the same wave length, religiously or politically. I became a different person, and we had nothing in common. At 40, when I got a divorce, I had become committed to a different sort of value system than that of the movies. Then I met Kevin Buckley, who has exactly the same ideas as mine. He had lost his faith, as all good Catholics do. When he found it again he went to do a story at Lourdes — he was an editor and journalist — and after he came back we talked and found an incredible community of ideas."

Book cassettes, novelty to art

HOLLYWOOD — Audiocassettes continue to be released in volume and in an ever-widening range of contents, from the Bible to Howard Cosell. Start with a novelty and you get an art form.

The novelty was not so much the technology of tape recording itself, which has been around for decades, but the further developments that have made it so portable.

The miniaturized playback machine, hardly larger than a wallet and designed to be heard through small, light earphones, is central to the new audio phenomenon. The fidelity, the presence, is spectacular.

The Sony Walkman made the device generic, and the device, along with cassette players in cars, has created a small revolution.

The fact is we are looking more Martin every day, vied for sound, earphones in place, jogging to a different drum with a featherweight philharmonic at our shoulder or on our belt. But at that, it is the post-musical uses of the audiocassette that have become so numerous and intriguing. Not always good, but almost always intriguing.

The book publishers, Bantam in particular, have now gone into the audiocassette line as a source of ancillary revenue but also, it is clear, as a way of cross-plugging the books themselves.

I have lately listened to Louis L'Amour's "A Trail to the West," one of a series of L'Amour short stories featuring Texas Ranger Chick Bowdre.

The best of the tape is a rambling discourse by L'Amour himself on gunfighters, sorting out the facts from the myths but not hurting the myths too severely. L'Amour has done his research, and it shows in the work.

But, the dramatization, complete with narrator, several voices, clomp sound effects and musical stings or bridges, is simply bad radio revisited. The mind here conjures up not the old West but the old studio, with actors clustered around a microphone, dropping script pages as they go.

The moral is probably that there is no substitute for the authoritative single source, including the author's self.

he is up to it. I would as soon have had L'Amour tell his own tale. Test pilot Chuck Yeager does, on another Bantam cassette that cross-plugs the enormously popular book "Yeager" that he did with Leo Janos.

Erich Segal reads his novel "The Class" on Newman-Dove cassettes, almost three hours' worth. He is very good, even bringing off a reasonably accurate facsimile of Henry Kissinger's German accent. (Real figures weave through the lives of Segal's fictional classmates from what was in fact his own class, Harvard '58.) The events are familiar to the point of banality, but the earnest and unadorned voice of the author is undoubtedly the best way to hear them.

Voice casting is everything, and the first and last lesson of the new audiocassette art form is that great voices, which is to say great actors, produce the best of the form.

I am not sure, for example, that I have yet heard anything to equal Paul Scofield's reading of an expert abridgement of "David Copperfield," also on Newman-Dove. Without verging near parody or the grotesque, Scofield creates distinctive vocal sketches of the youthful and idealistic Copperfield, the dreadful Uriah Heep, Mr. Micawber and the whole Dickensian roster.

The stern question is, of course, whether listening to abridgements is a sort of double-dip form of intellectual cheating.

Three-part 'Unknown Chaplin' series explores film figure's life

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

He was a tyrant who demanded total control of his films; a perfectionist who spent months working to get one single scene correct. He fired — and rehired — performers at will.

This mean-spirited Hollywood figure wasn't Otto Preminger or Cecil B. deMille. He was a man with a toothbrush mustache, bowler hat and ducklike walk who was affectionately called "The Little Tramp." To the public, he was one of the most popular figures in America. But the other side of legendary silent-screen star Charlie Chaplin is explored in the three-part "Unknown Chaplin," airing as part of PBS's "American Masters" series.

In part one, viewers saw Chaplin toiling for the Mutual Film Company, producing two-reel films and developing his improvisational technique in front of the camera.

Part two of the documentary (airing Monday, July 21) covers a period many critics consider Chaplin's most productive decade: During this time, he built his own studio and became free to create his own quality films, such as "The Kid" (1921) and "City Lights" (1931).

It is here we learn that Chaplin was a perfectionist who demanded total control on his shoots. For "The Gold Rush," he took a huge cast and crew into the California mountains, built a complete mining-town set, worked in a deep snow for weeks — and then only used a few shots in the end.

In the famous sequence from his film "City Lights" which depicts a love affair between a blind girl and the "little tramp," Chaplin spent 13 days on the set, 62 of which were devoted to thinking the scene over. Meanwhile, his company idled, waiting for his creative juices to flow.

Among those interviewed for this documentary are some of the actors who worked with Chaplin during this fertile period. The late Jackie Coogan, co-star of "The Kid," talks about how Chaplin taught him how to do the shimmy.

"Unknown Chaplin" is narrated by James Mason and was produced for Thames TV by the film historians Kevin Brownlow and David Gill. The team was given access to hundreds of hours of never-before-seen footage

from Chaplin's vaults in Switzerland, and to a vast collection of out-takes from the films he made between 1916 and 1917 for the Mutual Film Company. The documentary has won a Grand Award at the International Film and TV festival of New York (1983) and the first prize in the documentary category at the Barcelona Film Festival (1984).

Bruce 'Moonlighting' Willis and Madonna to team up for movie

Q. I see that Bruce Willis and Madonna are going to do a film together. Is this the first time they'll work together? — G.E.

A. Yes — but it might have been the second. Exploring every conceivable angle of the Hollywood mystery of the decade, "Heart to Heart With Robert Wagner" is said to be explosive in a quiet, measured, subtle way, and St. Martin's Press is going to give it a big printing.

Q. Can it be true that Don Johnson's first record album was shelved because the actor sings in such an innocuous, almost effeminate voice? — H.V.

A. I haven't heard an advance cut of Don's new album, which is due out in August. However, Johnson recently vacationed in Italy, and stayed at a country home owned by a high-fashion designer of men's clothes who provided some costumes for "Miami Vice." During the visit, Don surprised his host by whipping out a cassette of rough cuts from his upcoming album. The reaction of designer and friends after hearing the cassette: The songs and Don's vocal style are "hot and sexy."

Q. I loved that British group Wham! Do you know why they broke up? — K.B.

A. Although it's being called "the most amicable split in rock music history," the breakup of Wham! is

No one is talking yet, but the whisper is that Nancy and Ronald Reagan have bought a mansion off Strada Vecchia Road in Bel Air, the ultra-posh section of Los Angeles. The price? Q. Is Claudette Colbert really trying to launch a movie comeback at her age? — D.P.

A. I learned a long time ago that when they made Claudette — born Lily Chauchain in Paris in 1903 — they broke the mold in terms of what one is expected to do and when. Maybe that's why his three-year affair with actress Nancy McKeon fell apart. Fox likes being unattached. All the better, he assures me with a

'Days of Our Lives' actress Hall prepares to do double NBC duty

With Deidre (Marlena) Hall about to moonlight, playing daughter-in-law to Wilford Brimley in the NBC fall Sunday show "Our House," "Days of Our Lives" shoots on Saturdays now. Should the prime-time show be a success, "Days" has no intention of losing star Deidre, so she must work ahead, and be prepared for double duty. Marlena will not be written out at least until the October ratings are in.

Thus, Marlena pours her energies into nourishing Roman in his battle against amnesia. Roman's buddy, Abe, the Salem cop, takes the puzzled fellow down to city jail, and stirs up memories. Little by little, Roman remembers. By the fall, he and Abe ought to be sleuthing again, determined to nail the light-footed Victor.

Changes are due in the relationship between Abe and Roman. With his fifth year on "Days" beginning in October, Abe (James Reynolds), Salem's sole black, a stable and dead honest fellow, may get into trouble. Instead of always helping others, Abe becomes a victim, and it's about time.

"For a while, Abe had a different girl every week," notes James Reynolds. "But the womanizing business got boring—Abe is due for a solid relationship."

When Reynolds joined "Days" with Roman's Wayne Northup, the soap languished at the bottom. Now it's number four, a 12-point move. Reynolds takes the credit. (He's just kidding.)

"It's gotten faster. We track more people," Reynolds explains. "Youth has helped, but not much, and I don't consider Bo and Hope kids. A few years back we had more kids, and not much happened."

One of the few blacks in daytime who works steadily, Reynolds knows he is very lucky to have found a niche and an audience. To stay out of the comfortable rut, and hone his craft, the actor still runs the L.A. Repertory Theatre (seven years) and won't give up. Local theatre crowds are composed of ex-New Yorkers who keep the equity theatres barely alive. Even Reynolds admits L.A. remains a lousy theatre town, with audiences only turning out for celebrity casts. "But I'm a dumb actor, so you hang in there."

For flavor and an audience, Reynolds visits schools, and civic groups with his one-man show, "I, Too, Am America," quoting from slaves and black writers. "Most of the material came from the Depression when writers went on the Federal payroll and began digging into the South," says Reynolds. "I stumbled on slave versions in libraries, found lovely things salted away."

—A Vietnam veteran who never expected to come out alive, Reynolds views the Central American situation with distress. "Why is it man tends to equate might with right?" he asks. "We lost a good deal of talent in Vietnam, people we desperately need today."

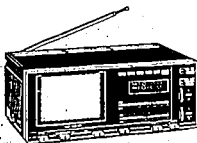

IEPBS officials announce reception of a federal grant

Officials of the Idaho Educational Public Broadcasting Systems (KAID-TV, Boise; KISU-TV, Pocatello; and KUID-TV, Moscow) announced recently they have received a \$436,000 grant from the U.S. Department of Commerce's Public Telecommunications Facilities Program. The money will be used to replace worn-out broadcasting equipment at the three stations.

The grant must be matched with money raised by the stations. IE/PBS officials indicated that the system needs to replace more than \$3,000,000 worth of equipment much of which is beyond repair.

"This will be a real help in our goal to replace \$3,000,000 worth of equipment," noted IE/PBS General Manager Gerold Garber. "But it will by no means take care of the problem."

Much of the equipment at the three PBS affiliated stations in Idaho is the original broadcast and production equipment which the stations began with 20 years ago. This grant will be used to replace studio cameras (with a retail price

of nearly \$100,000 each) as well as some transmission equipment.

"The standard industry life expectancy for much of our equipment, such as studio cameras, is less than ten years and yet we have had to keep our equipment going with ever-more-frequent breakdowns much longer than that," Garber explained. "Also the vast majority of our original equipment was manufactured by RCA Corporation which is no longer making broadcasting gear and replacement parts are becoming non-existent."

IE/PBS officials admitted that the engineering staff now spends more than 85 percent of its time on emergency repair of equipment, rather than on preventive or routine maintenance due to the severe age and condition of its equipment.

Idaho Public Television plans on using a \$100,000 challenge appropriation from the Idaho State Legislature as part of its match for the federal grant. It also plans to seek private funds to match the rest of the grant.

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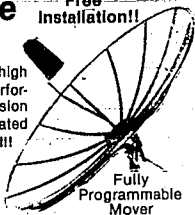

Ellerbe's ABC negotiations successful

NEW YORK — Linda Ellerbe, the popular but non-conformist TV journalist and anchor, has turned down CBS' more lucrative offer and is set to join ABC News next week, a source close to the negotiations said Monday.

Ellerbe's main assignment will be to write and anchor "Our World," ABC's new historical news program that will compete with NBC's "The Cosby Show" on Thursday nights beginning this fall, the source said. She also will do her former "Today" feature, "T.G.I.F.," on ABC's "Good Morning America" on Fridays.

In addition, she will be host of an hour news program two nights a week following "Nightline." That show is targeted to begin this winter, said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

ABC is expected to announce that Ellerbe would come to ABC the middle of next week. The agreement can't be announced until then, according to an industry source, because NBC has the right to match any offers for a 30-day period. That period expires July 22.

Calls to Ellerbe's home were not returned Monday. Sources at CBS said CBS executives had not been able to reach Ellerbe.

But CBS insiders said they believed Ellerbe was set to turn down CBS' offer, which was for her to an-

chor a revamped "CBS Morning News" program that would be called "Across America." A source at ABC familiar with both offers said the CBS deal was worth significantly more than ABC is offering.

Ellerbe, 41, who left NBC News when her contract expired last month, was reportedly getting \$225,000 a year.

As anchor of the new CBS program she would have been based in New York, but would have had to travel to different regions occasionally. Her co-anchor would have been CBS'

viewer radio correspondent, Charles Osgood, sources said.

Since CBS started getting indications that Ellerbe would reject its offer, CBS has been considering Jane Wallace, correspondent on CBS' news magazine, "West 57th," as a strong candidate to work with Osgood.

Wallace was substitute anchor on the "Morning News" two years ago before Phyllis George was hired as regular co-anchor, and some CBS executives believed then that Wallace was the right choice for the job.

Ellerbe's friends at NBC News, where she anchored the critically acclaimed but canceled "NBC News Overnight," advised her not to go to CBS because the third-rated morning show's ratings would likely not improve for some time. According to her former NBC colleagues, Ellerbe was not thrilled with the early hours required on "Across America."

Ellerbe, known for her irreverent on-air style and good writing, is author of the best-selling book about her journalistic experiences, "And So It Goes," a slogan that also was her signature signoff on "Overnight."

In a recent interview with the Associated Press, Ellerbe said her professional heart lies more in writing, producing and editing than the bright lights of on-camera work. "I do what I do for a living," she said, "and before you go home you have to read it in front of the class."

McGrady will leave 'America' to produce Walters interviews

HOLLYWOOD — Phyllis McGrady, executive producer of ABC's "Good Morning America" since January 1985, said Friday that she would leave the show after Labor Day to produce the prime-time interview specials that Barbara Walters does for the network.

That NBC News' revived "Today" show has taken the morning-show ratings lead from "Good Morning America" in recent months played no part in her decision, she said in a brief phone interview from her office in New York.

"No, I really wanted the opportunity to produce these (Walters) specials in prime time," she said.

She said she took the job after Walters told her that she was going to move her production company — which McGrady said makes the specials in association with ABC News — from its current home in Hollywood to New York.

McGrady, who has worked in various producer jobs at "Good Morning America" since February 1982, conceded that more than four years of 3 a.m. wake-ups for work also was a factor in her decision to change jobs. "It's been very tough," she said.

Ironically, "Good Morning America," boosted by ABC's heavy publicity for the network's coverage of Liberty Weekend in New York, won last week's morning-show ratings race, edging NBC's "Today" by three-tenths of a ratings point.

ABC's show had an average rating of 4.6, "Today" a 4.3, and the perennially struggling "CBS Morning News," due to get another face-lift and possibly a new anchor team by September, was third again with a rating of 3.2.

Each ratings point represents 859,000 homes.

"It wasn't an easy decision for me to make," McGrady said of her plans to leave ABC's morning show. "We won last week, and there is a side of me that really wanted to stay and fight. On the other hand, the race is close, and I think it will stay close."

No successor was immediately announced for McGrady, who told her staff of her decision late Thursday afternoon.



ABC wins ratings in mornings, late nights

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC, reaping still more benefits from its Liberty Weekend coverage, scored a clean sweep in ratings last week with victories for "Good Morning America" for the first time in 15 weeks and "Nightline" for the first time in two months, A.C. Nielsen Co. figures showed Thursday.

Earlier this week, Nielsen revealed that ABC's "World News Tonight" won the evening news ratings for the first time since May 1982 and the network's prime-time schedule gained its first victory in nearly two months.

Network researchers said ABC's extensive and often exclusive coverage of Liberty Weekend last week directly helped the network's prime time performance and indirectly helped the other time periods: early morning, dinnertime and late night.

"Good Morning America" had a 4.6 rating, ending the streak of NBC's "Today" at 14 straight weeks. "Today" averaged a 4.3 rating for the week of June 30-July 4, while "CBS Morning News" had a 3.2.

At the other end of the day, "Nightline," which had three broadcasts with Statue of Liberty themes, averaged a 6.7 rating. The last time "Nightline" finished first was the week ending May 4 when news interest was heightened by the Chernobyl nuclear accident. NBC had a 6.6 rating with its combined Wimbledon highlights and "Tonight Show." CBS' entertainment programs registered a 5.6 rating.

One ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Since Jan. 1, "Nightline" has increased its rating by 13 percent over the similar period in 1985, a larger percentage increase than any other news broadcast.

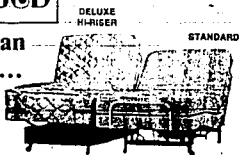

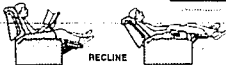

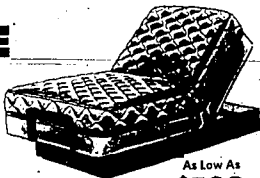

CBS, NBC news, prime time tie

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC and CBS tied for first last week in evening news-ratings, —prime-time— results and, in an oddity, in the performances of each network's reprised series: "Cagney & Lacey" and "Remington Steele," figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

"CBS Evening News" — with Dan Rather and "NBC Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw had 10.0 ratings and 22 shares, while ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings was a close third with a 9.8 rating and the same 22 share. The two-tenths of a point gap from first to third was the narrowest since one-tenth of a point separated the three newscasts the week of Nov. 9, 1981.

In prime time, nine of the Top 10 series were comedies and five of them were NBC sitcoms, led by top-ranked "The Cosby Show." CBS had Top 10 sitcoms, "Newhart" and "Kate & Allie," and the only non-comedy, "Murder, She Wrote." CBS and NBC each had 12.1 ratings to ABC's 10.1.

A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television. A share measures the percentage of sets in use that are tuned to a program.

One coincidence last week was that NBC's "Remington Steele" and CBS' "Cagney & Lacey," the only two modern shows to have been canceled and then given network reprieves, were tied for 22nd place, along with ABC's "MacGyver." On Monday, NBC announced that "Remington Steele," which was canceled last May, would go back into production as a midseason

replacement series. NBC cited viewer mail requesting the show's return and the program's improved summer ratings as reasons for the comeback.

Since its cancellation in May, the Saturday night series has averaged a respectable 25 share, with its past four episodes posting stronger shares of 33, 26, 28 and last week's 26.

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, said last month that "Remington Steele" was the last hourlong show canceled. "It was a tough decision," he said.

After four years and about 90 episodes, "creatively, (the show) had probably peaked," Tartikoff said. "With shows like that I think you're looking at diminishing returns."

"Now is our chance to prove him wrong," Larry Bloustein, vice president at MTM Enterprises, which produces the series, said Tuesday. "The show is rating well. Every network needs back-up series." Bloustein said MTM didn't try to sell "Remington Steele" anywhere but

NBC.

A potential complication is that MTM has first rights on series star Pierce Brosnan, who reportedly is in line for the starring role in the next James Bond film, "The Living Daylights." The standard seven-year TV contract gives MTM first call on Brosnan during the TV filming season.

United Artists, which distributes the 007 films, has not announced its choice — for — the new Bond, a spokeswoman said Tuesday. "The Living Daylights" was scheduled to begin filming in August. "Remington Steele" is supposed to begin production in mid-September.

"MTM has said that if United Artists can be flexible and if there's any way to accommodate them, we will," said Bloustein.

For the week of July 7-13, "The Cosby Show," which fell from its accustomed first place ranking two weeks ago because of Liberty Weekend coverage on ABC, was back on top with a 22.8 rating, followed by NBC's "Family Ties."
