## Reagan to propose more space missile tests

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, trying to clear a way for his "Star Wars" program, is preparing to ask Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev to agree to expanded testing of anti-missile technology in space, administration officials said Thursday.

At the same time, Reagan has tentatively decided to assure Gorbachev that the United States would not deploy the controversial system for five to seven years, said the officials, who demanded anonymity.

The Soviet leader, who has condemned the

U.S. Strategic Defense Initiative as a potential expansion of the superpower arms race, proposed in a letter to Reagan on June 23 that deployment be delayed for 15 to 20 years.

In exchange, officials said, Gorbachev offered to negotiate cutbacks of more than 50 percent in U.S. and Soviet long-range bombers, submarines and missiles.

The president, after consulting with his advisers, decided to reject the overture and to counter with the five- to seven-year pledge. He also will urge Gorbachev to accelerate the pace of Geneva negotiations and be willing to accept cutbacks of less

than 50 percent as a first step to the larger reductions both leaders seek.

Three U.S. envoys sent to consult with allied governments in Western Europe and Asia were due back shortly. The officials stressed their reports would be weighed before a final decision was made.

Science magazine reported, meanwhile, that the Soviets had agreed to let the United States establish a broad seismic monitoring network inside its borders.

Washington agreed to join in a ban on further underground nuclear weapons tests.

Science said the agreement was generated by an informal, unpublished proposal last

May by the U.S. Geological Survey. Modern seismic equipment would be installed to measure the weapons tests.

U.S. and Soviet experts open talks in Geneva on Friday. On the agenda is Gorbachev's call for a ban on all tests and the U.S. drive to improve monitoring of the U.S. drive to improve monitoring of the unratified 1974 treaty.

The proposal for expanded testing is designed to go beyond the laboratory in determining if mobile sensors and chemical lasers capable of tracking and destroying attacking missiles could be effective in a space-based defense system.

This would require a major concession from Gorbachev, who has condemned Reagan's space initiative while conceding that at least some of the U.S. research can neither be detected nor stopped.

Reagan's "new approach" on testing is designed to advance an active and ambitious program while stopping short of deploying the exotic technology, an official said.

A U.S. pledge to put off deployment for five to seven years amounts to a guarantee the United States would observe the 1972 Anti-Ballistic Missile Treaty at least that long. Either side now can withdraw from the agreement with six months' notice.

## Non-punitive sanctions still are possible

COLUMBIA, S.C. — President Reagan, saying "we haven't closed any doors," signaled Thursday that the United States has not ruled out imposing any sanctions against South Africa and still is considering limited steps.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes said there is a distinction between "punitive, economic sanctions" — which Reagan opposes — and "other sanctions that are not punitive economic sanctions."

The lesser steps might include denial of landing rights in the United States for South African planes, he said. "I don't know, things like that," Speakes said.

Meanwhile, the State Department said late Thursday that Chester Crocker, assistant secretary for African affairs, would travel to London next week.

Bruce Ammerman, a department spokesman, declined to give specifics of the Crocker trip, including its date, but said it would be "to consult with South Africa's principal trading and investment partners." CBS News said Crocker would discuss the possibility of coordinated sanctions against South Africa.

Speakes suggested a shift in policy within the administration — after harsh criticism from Democrats and Republicans alike about the president's South Africa policy speech Tuesday.

In that address, Reagan urged Congress and Western Europe to "resist this emotional clamor for punitive sanctions" and said "we and our allies cannot dictate to the government of a sovereign nation, nor should we try."

Reagan, posing for pictures at a hospital for South Carolina's starving livestock, was asked whether the United States might consider steps against South Africa in concert with allies.

"We haven't closed any doors," he replied, without elaboration.

Speakes, talking with reporters on Air Force One as it carried the president to a political speech here, noted that limited sanctions imposed against South Africa by Reagan last year will expire in September.

As those steps are reviewed, "the decision would be made as to whether we want to add sanctions to that executive order," Speakes said.

"And whether we would seek to take any additional steps would be a product of a continuing review of the situation on the ground, any moves by the South African government toward change."

## Symms says magazine's silver story dredged up from '80

WASHINGTON — Idaho Republican Sen. Steven Symms profited by speculating on the silver market while sponsoring legislation that affected the commodity's prices. The Nation magazine charged in a story on Thursday.

The magazine cited information on Symms' trading in silver futures that was contained in the senator's own personal financial disclosure reports, required annually of members of Congress.

"It is ludicrous and baseless to charge

that I can influence commodity markets," Symms said in a statement issued after reports on The Nation story had circulated. The state's senior senator, Republican James McClure, added that the allegation "isn't only wrong, it's absurd."

Symms, who faces a tough re-election challenge from Democratic Gov. John Evans this November, called the story "old news" that had surfaced during his successful 1980 campaign, when he ousted veteran Democratic Sen. Frank Church.

"There is nothing in that article, which I have not previously and fully disclosed and is

on the public record," Symms said. "My opponents and their select supporters in the media try to resurrect this phony issue every election year."

McClure said the story "reeks of election-year politics," calling The Nation and ultraliberal magazine that takes "potshots" at conservatives like Symms.

"Idaho," Symms said, "produces about half of the nation's silver, and I have consistently worked since entering Congress in 1973 to promote the growth of silver mining and related Idaho jobs. ... I have bought and sold in the markets with profits and

losses, but if the media would bother to follow the trades through, they would see that I have lost money."

The magazine quoted Symms as saying his silver trading does not violate the Senate ethics code or any laws.

"You are pulling up the same red herring five out of seven occasions when legislation that was dredged up in my last campaign," Symms told the magazine. "It is interesting that it is being brought up now."

The magazine said: "Symms has frequently taken positions on silver futures in the commodity market, then introduced legislation designed to bolster silver prices, and

alter prices have duly risen, sold his futures for a handsome profit. At times, he has been a heavy, almost daily, trader in silver commodities, often controlling tens of thousands of ounces."

It said that beginning in 1975, on at least five out of seven occasions when legislation affecting the price of silver was before Congress, Symms was actively trading in silver futures. He co-sponsored all seven bills, the magazine said. Symms served in the House before winning a Senate seat in 1980.

## Some farmers reaping bumper subsidy crop

WASHINGTON — A single California farming operation will harvest \$20 million in federal subsidies this year, part of a bumper crop of multimillion-dollar payments that the government is laying out in America's struggle to regain its former dominance in farm exports.

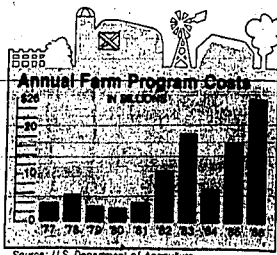
"Multimillion-dollar payments in rice and cotton will not be uncommon," Robert Thompson, the Agriculture Department's chief economist, said recently. "It will get obscene."

"They're going to be big, and very controversial," said Rep. Tony Coelho, D-Calif., a member of the House Agriculture Committee, which helped write the law. "We knew that when we did this. But the only way to turn it around is to get these big guys cooperating so we can help the family farmer as well."

The estimates are that the government will lay out upwards of \$30 billion for farm aid this year.

The apparent top recipient of subsidies under the new farm law is agribusiness giant J.G. Boswell Co., a farming operation growing more than 62,000 acres of irrigated cotton and 30,000 acres of wheat in the rich San Joaquin Valley near Fresno, Calif.

Figures computed by the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, the



Agriculture Department's subsidy arm, show that Boswell will collect nearly \$10.4 million in payments on those crops, based on current prices.

In addition, the operation may receive that much or more as the marketing handler for its own cotton, said Bob Crockett, crop program specialist for the state ASCS office in Sacramento, Calif. "It's going to hit \$20 million, that's what we figure," he said.

— Wes McAden, Boswell's Washington lobbyist,

said economic uncertainty forces the farm to accept payments.

"It's mandatory economically. You don't know where the market's going," said McAden. "The only uncertainty is how low it's going."

"This year's subsidy payments promise to dwarf those made under the \$10 billion "payment-in-kind" program in 1983, which caused a public outcry and damaged the credibility of farm programs. Boswell in recent years has refrained from participating in federal crop programs, including PIK.

Another Kings County, Calif., operation, Salyer American, will collect nearly \$3.4 million on its 28,000 acres of cotton, the ASCS said. Large payments are certain to go to other growers of cotton, rice, wheat, corn and milk in major producing areas because of new provisions in the 1985 farm law.

One large dairy producer, Gerrit Degraaf of Riverside County, Calif., will receive \$9.8 million under a federal subsidy to encourage dairy herd slaughter. Joe E. Gonsalves of Kings County will be paid \$8 million to get out of dairying, ASCS figures show.

As in 1983, the size of the payments is likely to trigger calls for changes in the farm law, which is designed as a long-term program to restore stumbling export sales by lowering prices.

"It's going to be a publicity disaster," said

## Panel cuts road money, increases fees on grazing

WASHINGTON — The House Appropriations Committee, taking aim at two heavily criticized federal subsidy programs, has voted to slash money for construction of timber-sale roads and to force Western ranchers to pay more to graze cattle on public lands.

The action came Thursday as the panel approved an \$8.2 billion fiscal 1987 spending plan for the Interior Department and related agencies such as the U.S. Forest Service in the "Agriculture" Department. The spending total is \$1.6 billion higher than requested by the Reagan administration.

With little debate, the Democratic-controlled committee endorsed a

subcommittee recommendation to cut \$30.4 million from the Forest Service's request for \$178.5 million to construct roads next year in national forests.

These roads are an integral part of the government's timber sales program, allowing commercial loggers to reach stands of trees offered for sale by the Forest Service.

Environmental groups, calling for a moratorium on forest road-building, say national forests already have more roads than necessary and that the roads frequently run to timber that produces little profit — and sometimes losses — on the sales.

Dave Altersworth of the National Wildlife Federation said there are 340,000 miles of roads in national

It said between 1978 and 1982, Symms gained more than \$50,000 from commodity trading, largely from silver futures. It said he also lost some money in commodities in 1980 and 1984, but did not reveal the amount.

The magazine described a Jan. 26, 1983, transaction in which Symms bought a March silver futures contract for 5,000 ounces at \$13.23 an ounce, one of seven contracts he

bought that month. The next day, the magazine said, Symms and McClure co-sponsored a bill placing a restriction on sales from federal silver stockpiles.

The magazine said the silver market responded with an increase in price, and that Symms sold five silver contracts on Feb. 2 and 3 for a profit of more than \$25,000.

In his 1980 campaign, Symms disputed allegations that he had

sought to influence silver prices through legislation while wealthy silver trader Nelson Bunker Hunt was a backer of his campaign.

Symms spokesman Rusty Butler said Hunt did not contribute money to that campaign.

"I am pro all things that are favorable to Idaho: silver, wheat and gold," the senator told the magazine, adding that he has "consistently lost" money in silver trading.

Rep. Pat Roberts, R-Kan., a member of the House Agriculture Committee. "We're in danger of trashing this program before it's had a chance to work."

The law producing the huge payments was drafted a year ago in a growing atmosphere of despair over the United States' loss of export markets.

From a high of \$43.8 billion in 1981, overseas sales have slumped to an expected \$27.5 billion this year. In May, the nation suffered its first one-month farm trade deficit in nearly 30 years, and there may be another deficit this month.

For wheat and corn growers, a portion of their income subsidy payment under the new law is exempt from the payment limit. And a growing number of subsidized farmers are splitting up their farms into smaller units, frequently parceling them out among family members or other partners, to collect multiple subsidy checks of \$50,000 each.

In return for the income guarantees, farmers must agree to cut the amount of acreage they plant — by 25 percent for cotton, 35 percent for rice — in an attempt to curtail production.

Exports, at least in the rice and cotton programs.

"Congress took a heck of a gamble. But the program's working. Clearly, if it turns this thing around and puts us back into the market, then I think you'd have to say it's worth it," he said.

But McAden conceded there will be pressure on Congress to rewrite the law when it becomes evident that farm programs are putting further pressure on the federal budget deficit. "The politics will be difficult. You wonder who's going to claim the baby when the time comes," he said.

**Robot prowls promenade deck**

WOODS HOLE, Mass. (AP) — Scientists maneuvered their remote-controlled robot into the promenade deck of the Titanic on Thursday, their last visit to the wreckage of the one-spined luxury liner before packing up and heading for home.

In a brief ship-to-shore conversation with officials at the Woods Hole Oceanographic Institution, chief scientist Robert Ballard said he sent the robot, Jason Jr., into the promenade deck and could clearly see a brass plaque that said: "Entrance to the bridge. For crew use only."

**Nuclear test set off in Nevada**

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — Scientists detonated a nuclear warhead buried deep beneath the desert Thursday in the second weapons test in eight days at the Nevada Test Site, the Department of Energy said.

The warhead was detonated at 9:05 a.m. MST, 1,300 feet beneath the surface of Yucca Flats, 85 miles northwest of Las Vegas. The test, code-named Cornucopia, had a yield of less than 20,000 kilotons, said DOE spokeswoman Barbara Yoerg.

**No more Sierra quakes likely**

BISHOP, Calif. (AP) — The U.S. Geological Survey on Thursday said it no longer expected another earthquake in the next few days in the eastern Sierra Nevada following a quake this week that caused as much as \$2.7 million in damage.

"The threat is clearly diminished. Unless something changes, we are no longer expecting another severe quake in the next couple of days," Tom Mullins, a spokesman for the California Office of Emergency Services.

USGS Director Dallas L. Peck on lifted the warning issued Tuesday which some residents said was irresponsible and could scare away travelers in the heart of the summer tourist season.

**Leader should have turned**

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — The leader of a high school climbing expedition on Mount Hood in which nine people died should have led the group back five hours into the climb because of fatigue and weather conditions, a group of experts said Thursday.

The climbers from Oregon Episcopal School were caught on the mountain when a storm struck May 12. Three were found frozen to death May 14, and eight other climbers were found inside a cave May 15, six of them dead.

The committee's report, released at a news conference, said that if the Rev. Thomas Goman had decided to turn back earlier, he, another of the school's teachers and seven students might still be alive.

**Appeals court stays execution**

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal appeals court has stayed next Tuesday's scheduled execution in Idaho of Thomas Eugene Creech for a 1981 murder of a fellow prisoner.

A three-judge panel of the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals on Thursday unanimously blocked Creech's execution by lethal injection, pending review of his appeal. No schedule was set for arguments in the case. The panel consisted of Judges Jerome Farris, Charles Wiggins and Harry Pregerson.

**Dole pulls back amendment**

WASHINGTON — An amendment restoring the automatic spending cuts of the Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction law hit a snag Thursday, amid concerns the proposal would give too much power to President Reagan's budget director.

Senate Majority Leader Bob Dole temporarily pulled the bill from the Senate floor while lawmakers from both parties met privately to rewrite the plan.

Forest Service and Bureau of Land Management property pay \$1.79 per month per animal, up from the current \$1.35.

The present fee has been attacked by both environmental groups and House subcommittees on grounds that cattlemen are not paying enough and that low fees encourage overgrazing that is harmful to public lands.

In its report to the full committee, Yates' panel calculated that a fair-market-value fee for grazing on federal land would be a minimum of \$4.50 a month. It recommended phasing in fees to this level over five years.

The report said grazing fees charged by private landowners average about \$5 a month and that when grazing rights on some public lands have been sold by competitive bidding, they have brought as much as \$18.04.

While cutting the roadbuilding budget, the committee recommended that the Forest Service try to sell up to 11.2 billion board feet of lumber next year, up from the 10 billion proposed by the administration.

Rep. Sidney Yates, D-Ill., chairman of the Appropriations Interior subcommittee, had originally talked of slashing \$78 million from the roadbuilding program.

Rep. Les AuCoin, D-Ore., whose state has a large timber industry, called this "truly excessive." He said \$30.4 million is "a reasonable compromise" that will give Yates negotiating room when House and Senate Appropriations committee members sit down to resolve differences in their spending bills.

Approved without discussion was the subcommittee's recommendation that ranchers grazing cattle on

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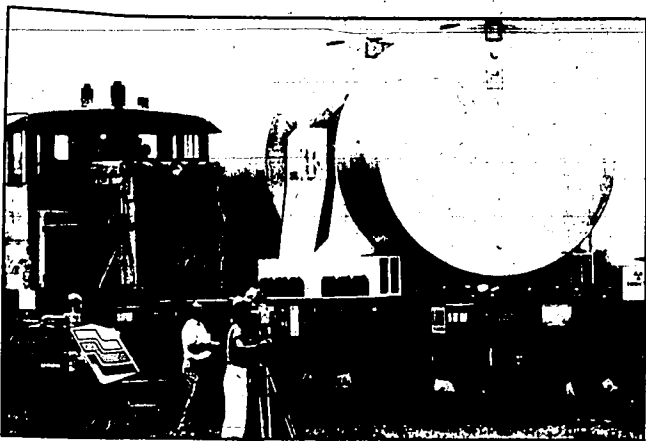
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Newsmen photograph shipping cask from TMI after it was delivered to Idaho Falls Thursday

## Initial load of TMI debris arrives for INEL processing

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Officials at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory on Thursday began processing the initial shipment of damaged radioactive fuel and debris from the Three Mile Island nuclear accident after the train carrying the cargo arrived without incident during the night.

The cask carrying seven canisters of the radioactive material was to be trucked 30 miles across the sprawling desert facility to the Test Area North, where six of the canisters would be mechanically unloaded and stored in underwater racks.

The seventh canister will be sent directly to the area's hot cell for analysis, according to program manager Willis Young.

"It has very important components that scientists want to examine immediately," Young said.

The work at INEL will help in evaluating the 1979 accident, he said. Information from the destruc-

tive testing of the components will be used with that gathered in a core-drilling operation currently under way inside the TMI Unit 2 reactor.

INEL officials said the transporting cask will be placed on public view Aug. 3 at the Blackfoot depot to give people an opportunity to examine it.

The shipment was the first of as many as 40 scheduled over the next 2½ years from the Pennsylvania nuclear plant to the eastern Idaho test facility.

The special train — made up of two engines, a flat car, a caboose and the custom-built car carrying the waste casks — left Three Mile Island early this week, crossing seven other states before arriving in Idaho.

Although residents in a number of communities along the 2,500-mile route had expressed concern over the radioactive material moving through their areas, the trip was

marked by only one major incident. Nebraska Gov. Bob Kerry stopped the train at the Kansas border for over three hours late Tuesday in a flap over whether his state had been properly notified of the shipment.

But officials of EG&G Idaho Inc., the Department of Energy contractor that will handle the analysis of the damaged material poses no serious threat.

Spokesman Terry Smith said the shipment is one-tenth as radioactive as spent fuel rods shipped about 200 times a year around the country from operating nuclear power plants.

The cask used for the TMI fuel were specially designed and certified by the Nuclear Regulatory Commission and have three barriers to prevent any leakage. The 80-ton vessel with a 10-ton maximum payload left TMI emitting 1.5 millirems of radioactivity, just above background levels, officials said. On arrival in Idaho, U.S. Transportation Department tests measured a millirem level of 0.05, right at background levels.

## Murphy says 500 beds goal in future prison

BOISE (AP) — Corrections Director Al Murphy says the state should build a prison with at least 500 beds to avoid overcrowding problems in the future that now face the prison system.

"I'm going to strongly recommend the board consider nothing less than 500 beds," Murphy told board members Thursday in a telephone conference.

The legislature has authorized \$8 million for construction of a new prison, and board members are considering design plans and a location, which is expected to be announced at the end of August.

As of Thursday, the state prison system had 1,356 prisoners, two less than the cap of 1,370.

Murphy said the Corrections Department has been averaging 30 prisoners waiting to be transferred from county jails to state facilities. He said that figure would increase up to 70 next year, and as high as 120 the year after.

"Some of the people we're backing up are really maximum security prisoners," Murphy said.

Murphy said that projections show that the additional 500 beds would be needed to avoid overcrowding pro-

blems in the future. He said a new prison could be built in phases, but recommended against it.

"It's a three-year process if you build 500 beds up front," Murphy said. "If you phase it in, you're looking at five years, six years, seven years."

To deal with current overcrowding problems, Murphy said he and prison official Gene Larson were developing a proposal similar to the work-release program in which prisoners up for parole would be released to their homes under a house-arrest program 90 days before their parole discharge date.

"These people would not be on parole. They would still be doing time," Murphy said, adding that they could return to prison immediately at the discretion of their supervisors. Two people would oversee 20 prisoners.

Like the work-release program, Murphy said prisoners under the house-arrest program would forfeit 25 percent of their salaries to contribute to the cost of the program.

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## Evans backs scenic river designation

HENRY'S FORK (AP) — After spending two hours bouncing through rapids on the Henry's Fork of the Snake River, Gov. John Evans said he would support a proposal to designate part of the renowned fishing stream as a Wild and Scenic River.

Evans, a Democratic U.S. Senate candidate, toured some prime fishing spots and saw a half-dozen osprey nests and a moose calf during his time on the river Wednesday. The governor said the trip confirmed to him the aesthetic values of Henry's Fork.

"It was just as beautiful as it was described," Evans said. "All you have to do is go down the river to realize that we need to protect and preserve it for future generations."

The governor had been invited to float down the river by the Henry's Fork Foundation Inc., a non-profit organization devoted to protecting the river. He was joined on the trip by aides, security men and state Department of Fish and Game officials. The party rode in three drift boats and a raft.

Evans said he fully supported a proposal by U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, to study a major portion of Henry's Fork for potential inclusion in the national Wild and Scenic River System.

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## Crash kills crop-duster pilot

MELBA (AP) — A crop-duster pilot for Clark's Air Service Inc. in Nampa has died after his spray plane crashed into a steel electrical transmission line tower in southwestern Idaho.

Ada County Coroner Erwin Sonnenberg identified the victim as Steve Knoeller, 38, Caldwell. Sonnenberg said an autopsy would be conducted.

The accident occurred late Wednesday night about 4 miles southeast of the Canyon County town of Melba.

The plane, a single-engine Rockwell Commander, was spraying a chlorinated hydrocarbon insecticide called Thiodan in the area

when it struck the tower, officials said. A wing was lodged in the structure about 150 feet from the ground.

An unidentified man who attempted to pull the pilot from the wreckage apparently was overcome by fumes from the insecticide, Sonnenberg said. He was treated at Merely Medical Center in Nampa.

A technician with the State Communications and Poison Control Center in Boise said officials believed the plane was carrying about 100 gallons of the chemical. The crash site was cordoned off and state and federal environmental and health officials would evaluate the potential danger later today, he said.

Glenn Gillespie, a spokesman for Pacific Power & Light Co. in Portland, Ore., said the crash knocked the 500,000-volt electrical transmission line from southern Oregon to central Idaho out of service.

A crew from Bend, Ore., was dispatched to repair the line. But Gillespie said it was carrying a "light load" of electricity at the time and no customer service was interrupted.

Mike O'Connor, Federal Aviation Administration regional duty officer in Seattle, said an FAA official from the Boise Flight Standards Office would investigate the crash.

## FERC rejects power license appeal

BOISE (AP) — A federal regulatory agency has rejected an appeal filed by environmental groups aimed at halting a preliminary license for a hydroelectric project in the Salmon River Basin.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission also said it would further consider appeals seeking to deny preliminary licenses for three hydroelectric projects on the Henry's Fork of the Snake River.

The action follows the FERC's

long-standing policy of turning down appeals on preliminary licenses, which authorize developers to begin on-site studies and develop project designs. A preliminary license does not authorize construction.

The agency rejected a set of appeals to a preliminary permit issued for a 4.4 megawatt hydroproject on Upper State Creek in the Salmon River Basin.

The appeals were filed by the National Wildlife Federation, Idaho

Wildlife Federation and the National Marine Fisheries Service.

Bob Cecil, public information officer for the FERC, said the commission denied the appeals because the agency's policy is to grant the permits and allow a study.

But Neil Kagan, National Wildlife Federation attorney, said conservation groups said in their appeals that the preliminary permits were issued without any comprehensive study of the basin.

## Experts destroy Civil War-era shell

BOISE (AP) — A two-man team of U.S. Army demolition experts has destroyed a Civil War-era artillery shell found to be live after collecting it in a private collection and two Idaho museums for much of the 20th century.

The rusty, iron Parrott rifle projectile was packed with dangerous black gunpowder, Sgt. Greg Parsons to

said. The 1-foot long, 3-inch diameter shell weighing 10 pounds belonged to a Pocatello family, descendants of a Civil War veteran who kept the shell as a memento, until they gave it to the Idaho State University natural history museum in 1955.

ISU traded its historical collection back gunpowder, Sgt. Greg Parsons to

Museum in Boise last year for natural history materials, and the shell arrived at the Boise museum's warehouse in northwest Boise.

Inspecting the shell two weeks ago, Ken Swanson, the Boise museum's acting director, discovered it was live.

## Officers look into shooting death

SALMON (AP) — The apparently accidental shooting death of a 23-year-old Salmon man is under investigation by the Lemhi County Sheriff's Office.

Allen Shane Howard died instantly at about 6:30 p.m. Monday at the home of his brother, Shell Howard, about three miles south of here on U.S. 93, according to sheriff's of-

frices. He had suffered a single gunshot wound to the chest and was pronounced dead at the scene.

Investigating officer Brett Barsalou said although the shot was apparently fired accidentally, the circumstances were under investigation.

Shell Howard's wife and two friends of the family were at the scene.

Is it any wonder then that such foodie origins would lead the press to focus directly on her hips? The British tabloids — the comics as they call them — spent the wedding week speculating madly about Sarah.

Not about her wedding dress, mind you, but about the size of the bridal hips lurking under it. # Gap widens between American rich, poor

Since the inequalities in income are large in this country, it's not surprising that the inequalities in families' accumulated wealth are even larger. The results of the Census Bureau's recent survey make that point dramatically.

But people's wealth is extraordinarily difficult — perhaps even impossible — to measure accurately, and the Census figures need to be read with caution. It's a good guess that the poor are even less well-off in relation to the rest of the country than the Census report suggests, but that the broad middle class is better off.

To the extent that it's reliable, the survey confirms to a startling degree a pattern that's already familiar. The average family's wealth, meaning its net worth, is not much more than one year's income. But you already knew that the United States is a nation of spenders, not savers. The median white household's wealth, at a modest \$39,135, was 12 times that of the median black household. A much larger proportion of blacks than whites are poor, and poor people accumulate very little wealth.

It will be interesting to see what a comparable survey of wealth shows a few years into the future. For some time it has been clear that the disparities in income are widening in this country. The process has accelerated in the Reagan years, but it seems to have started much earlier, in the latter 1960s.

No one has yet come up with an entirely satisfactory explanation, but the trend is beyond question. The report on wealth is a snapshot, showing great distances among rich, middle class and poor. The income data, more reliable, show that those differences are growing. American society is changing, and, in this respect, the change is not for the better.

In the season of sticks, Andy chose curves. In the era of minimalism, he picked a Rubens. As Papa Ferguson said, "The point is

that Andrew fell in love with her the way she was." The point is that here is a prince worthy of the surname Charming.

With this marriage, the second son of the House of Windsor officially reverses the Cinderella myth. He is the first prince in modern memory who hasn't scooped the land for a woman with the smallest size slip.

Sarah is the first commoner who hasn't sneezed her way into royalty. There is a storybook marriage for every woman who ever hesitated before writing the word "full-figured" in her ad for the personals column.

Maybe Sarah will follow the lead of her sister-in-law. Maybe she'll turn skinny on us? But my wedding wish is a simple one. Maybe her happiness spread. May she broaden the image of women. Even, verily, unto a size 14.

So here's to the happy couple. Throw me an ice cream puff. Raise it to the ceiling. Let's give Sarah and Andrew a proper cheer: Hips, hips, hooray.

# Maintain pressure over Henry's Fork

Thanks to election year pressure, the upper Henry's Fork of the Snake River may finally get some protection this year against hydroelectric development. But it's not a sure thing yet, and what we do get will be just a first step.

There are six hydro proposals on Henry's Fork. Public opinion seems pretty clear: The five new dams shouldn't be built, period, and Island Park Dam should be retrofitted only if impact on downstream fishing and recreation is minimal. The Targhee National Forest is starting to study whether this upper reach should be in the National Wild and Scenic River system. In April, Rep. Richard Stallings got a bill through the House of Representatives authoring a study. Stallings' bill would prohibit any action on the five new dam proposals for six years, but does allow continued study of the Island Park retrofit.

Sen. McClure opposes Stallings' bill because he feels Wild and Scenic River designation would draw too much attention.

He and Sen. Symms want, instead, to simply prohibit hydro development, again exempting Island Park Dam, on the upper river. They have introduced a bill doing that. Stallings will support it.

McClure has also been involved in a national hydro relicensing bill. As it came out of committee, it gave state and federal fishery agencies authority to impose mandatory conditions protecting fishing on any small hydro project.

But on the Senate floor McClure passed an amendment exempting any projects already applied for (including the 100 in Idaho) from that provision. As a result, all the national sportmen's and conservation groups are opposing it.

Reid in Idaho, the Legislature refused last session, for the umpteenth time, to establish a state rivers system modeled on the National Wild and Scenic River system.

Among other benefits, a state system could

protect rivers like the Henry's Fork from unwanted hydro projects — rather than forcing us to oppose them before an unresponsive federal agency 2,300 miles away. (All dams, big or small, are licensed by the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission.)

So — what should happen now and what can people who love the Henry's Fork do?

1. Our Congressmen deserve thanks: Stallings for forcing the river onto the delegation's agenda, and McClure and Symms for responding with their hydro ban idea.

The McClure-Symms bill is not all the river needs, but it's a big step. With the delegation and national fishing groups behind it, it should pass Congress.

2. Even if the hydro ban passes, the Targhee Forest's Wild and Scenic River study is still needed. Dams are not the only threat to the Henry's Fork.

Indeed the river's friends — all of us who use it — are probably its biggest long-term threat. McClure's argument that Scenic River status will draw too much attention is weak. Henry's Fork is already heavily used (mostly by Idahoans) and that use will increase regardless.

The basic issue is how to protect the river's key values in the face of steadily increasing use. There is no stilet mechanism to do that, so it makes sense to study whether the federal mechanism can. If the Targhee can't proceed with its study for lack of funds, Sen. McClure should reconsider his position to Stallings' bill.

3. The Henry's Fork isn't the only fine fishing river in Idaho threatened by a small hydro. Sen. McClure should withdraw his amendment to the hydro relicensing bill. Idaho Fish and Game should be able to impose mandatory fish protec-

tion conditions on all small hydro projects in Idaho.

Fish and Game is a responsible agency and won't abuse the power. If needed conditions make it possible to build a hydro project, so be it. Our fisheries are more important to our economy and way of life than a few more surplus kilowatts.

4. Those criticizing Stallings and sportmen for wanting a "federal solution" on the Henry's Fork are off base. The simple fact is the state has no way to protect it. The Idaho Legislature should be given two more years to establish a state rivers system. If they don't, the people should create it by initiative in 1988.

The Legislature seems ashamed that Idaho still has some undammed rivers left. Many of them have their minds firmly in the 1940s, and do not realize the great economic value of rivers like the Henry's Fork. If you love the river, I hope you will ask your legislative candidates if they will vote to create a state rivers system.

5. We're sure to be very wary of the Island Park Dam retrofit. If it can be done without affecting downstream fishing and recreation, fine. If it can't, it's not worth it.

Another reason to worry is that one company involved in it — Bonneville-Pacific — has left a trail of stream damage at other hydro projects they have helped build.

It's no accident that Henry's Fork is getting all this attention in an election year. We should keep the pressure on. Write or talk to the statewide candidates and urge their support for any of these ideas you think make sense. Ask state legislative and gubernatorial candidates where they stand on a state rivers system. This is a year to get some commitments.

# Leadership will prove once again to be the key to success

RANCHO CIELO, Calif., Dec. 24, 1986 — It is television talk to the nation last night, President Reagan again proved that he must be reckoned with.

Liberals were stuck dumb, conservatives could not decide whether to be proud or angry, with the signing on live television of the integrated arms-control treaty of 1986.

With Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev at his side and their wives looking on, Reagan enjoyed the surprise sprung on an anxious world. "Nancy and I could think of no better present this holiday season than the one we share tonight with the American and Soviet peoples, with the entire world."

The president's boyish grin betrayed a feeling of pleasure. Just as he did at his first superpower summit in Geneva 13 months ago, Reagan had shown everyone, including his staff, that he could deal effectively with demanding foreign-policy questions.

Experts agree that the treaty signed by Reagan and Gorbachev represents major progress in U.S.-Soviet relations, and that it is a serious effort to reduce nuclear weapons rather than just limit them.

The details have been reported elsewhere: reductions in missile launchers that include major constraints on Soviet weapons able to strike U.S. land-based missiles, a conditional

extension of the anti-ballistic missile treaty until at least the year 2000, permission for extensive research on strategic defenses ("Star Wars"), and radical cuts, in stages, of Euro-missiles.

The latter fulfills the leaders' commitment at Geneva to work for an interim agreement on Soviet SS-20 and U.S. Pershing and cruise missiles.

To be sure, the basic framework of the treaty still must be developed. That creates a parallel with the meeting at Vladivostok in 1974 between Leonid I. Brezhnev and Gerald R. Ford.

The treaty will remain in force, but that is contingent on the superpowers' reaching further precise agreements, especially on the details of deep cuts in offensive nuclear weapons and the directions to be taken by strategic defenses. But enough has been agreed on to signal success and point the way forward.

Most remarkable, perhaps, was the way Reagan made this treaty possible, virtually under the noses of the naysayers who dominated the first part of his presidency. As late as July, administration hard-

liners, principally midlevel civilian officials at the Pentagon, were trying to box in the president by denouncing Soviet cheating on earlier treaties and a supposed lack of commitment on Star Wars. Reagan permitted them the style and the rhetoric while stealing the substance.

In retrospect, the first major step was Gorbachev's proposal in the late spring to trade deep cuts in offensive missiles for a 15-to-20-year extension of the ABM treaty. The reductions would be Reagan's most cherished goal; the extension would tramel Star Wars. As a further sweetener, Gorbachev reduced his demand for limits on the British and French forces.

For his part, Reagan agreed that the United States would attend a special meeting of the Standing Consultative Commission in Geneva, which would discuss the Soviets' complaint that the United States was abrogating the SALT II treaty.

Reagan also wrote a letter to Gorbachev suggesting "new ideas." Conducted virtually in public, the drafting process indicated that the president was finally taking charge of the U.S. arms-control effort.

Reagan's master stroke was like something from the book of Richard M. Nixon and Henry A. Kissinger. Beset by bureaucratic limits on his ability to act,

Reagan created a special means to develop positions and test them with the Soviets.

He asked one of his former national-security advisers to work quietly with a small bipartisan group of retired government specialists on Soviet relations and arms control, including some individuals purged early in the Reagan administration.

Meanwhile, a longtime presidential confidant with strong ties to the Republican right wing made several secret trips to Moscow during the fall, while all eyes were on the efforts by Pentagon civilians to sidetrack progress.

Notably, the State Department and the arms-control agency, with most of their experts gone, played little part in the autumn's intricate dealings. Nor did the Geneva arms talks figure significantly in U.S.-Soviet negotiations.

The agreement, reached just in time for Christmas, was less an inspiration of product than of process. It had long been clear that some trade-off was possible between deep cuts in offensive intercontinental nuclear weapons and limits on the deployment of Star Wars defenses. At issue were the terms and Reagan's ability to preserve his hole card until he saw Gorbachev.

The president gained success through

back-channel dealings that gave Gorbachev a significant cachet in Kremlin politics and through the series of thresholds embodied in the treaty.

Rather than open-ended American restraint in strategic defenses, preservation of the integrated arms-control treaty depends on the results of future negotiations.

Each side has an incentive to make them work. Indeed, it cannot be ruled out that both sides will in time agree to some limited form of strategic defenses, while Reagan can say that his ultimate vision, to make nuclear weapons "impotent and obsolete," is preserved.

Looking back, Reagan succeeded by the skin of his teeth. As late as July, skeptics feared that he would not take personal command, assemble advisers committed to his goals or understand that arms control now is worth more than unproved Star Wars later.

Nor was it clear that either he or Gorbachev would value agreement above propaganda directed at Western Europe. In the end, leadership was the key.

# Whitworth found guilty of espionage

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Retired Navy radioman Jerry Whitworth was found guilty Thursday of espionage for supplying communications secrets to convicted spy John Walker, who later sold them to the Soviet Union.

The secrets given to the Soviets by the four-member Walker spy ring severely damaged the Navy's internal communications network and will take years and millions of dollars to repair, government officials have said.

The seven espionage convictions each carry a potential sentence of life in prison. The jury said it was unable to reach a verdict on an eighth espionage charge that he took a contingency plan covering activities in the Middle East.

He also was convicted of four counts of income tax evasion on \$332,000 Walker paid him and on one count of conspiring with Walker to defraud the Internal Revenue Service. Those convictions are punishable by a total of 17 years in prison.

Whitworth, 46, remained solemn with his hands folded together as the verdicts were read.

An Aug. 28 hearing was set for sentencing, although U.S. District Court Judge John Vukasin said he was prepared to impose sentence immediately because virtually every aspect of Whitworth's life was documented during the trial and he felt well-acquainted with his career, his personality, his beliefs. "The jury received the case July 11

and announced the verdicts on its ninth day of deliberations. After the verdict, defense attorney James Larson refused to say whether he would appeal. He also said the wrong person had been on trial.

"Whatever Jerry Whitworth may have done, this trial should have been John Anthony Walker's," he said.

Whitworth, of Davis, is the last member of the so-called Walker family spy ring to be tried. John A. Walker Jr., 48, pleaded guilty to espionage in October; Arthur J. Walker, 51, John's brother, was convicted of stealing classified documents; and Michael L. Walker, 28, John's son, also pleaded guilty to espionage.

## Farmers get aid promise

President Reagan posed for pictures with farmers in drought-ravaged South Carolina on Thursday, praising their meagre and promising federal aid, while parts of Dixie got sprinklings of rain but no real relief from the weeks-old deadly dry spell.

There were more Air Force "baleouts" — hay donated from the Midwest and North — for famished Southern livestock. Georgia's governor planned a prayer service, an Alabama radio station had a "How Hot Is It?" contest and a shipment of ice was down from South Bend, Ind., to Piedmont, S.C.

State officials estimated the drought's price tag at more than \$1.6 billion. Georgia, South Carolina, Virginia and Delaware have asked for federal disaster aid, and Tennessee was preparing a request.

The triple-digit heat of early July has abated in the South this week, said Bill Barlow of the National Weather Service Severe Storms Forecast Center. And scattered rain hit Georgia and the Carolinas, with 3 inches falling on Augusta, Ga., on Thursday. More storms were developing from Virginia through the Southeast to Mississippi and eastern Tennessee.

Authorities in the South say 43 people have died of the heat this month.

The heat has also killed more than a half-million chickens and the drought has left fruits and vegetables drying on the vine, spawning higher wholesale prices for poultry in California and produce in New England, officials say.

Oklahoma farmer Bern Alberda had 1,000 bales of prairie hay he wanted to send to Dixie. Alberda said he'll donate the hay — which would be added to the 200 tons brought by Air Force "Starliner" C-141 cargo planes since last week — if he can find someone to get it to the drought areas. Other donations have come from Illinois, Kentucky, Missouri, New York and Wisconsin, with deliveries planned from as far as Oregon.

Reagan arrived in Columbia in time to watch a forklift truck transfer bales of hay from the rear of a cargo plane to a flatbed truck 50 feet away. He then posed with farmers Jack Burnside and Morris Hart, and later praised beleaguered farmers in a speech for the gubernatorial campaign of Rep. Carroll Campbell.

One South Carolina farmer who benefited from Thursday's haylift wanted to show his gratitude.

"I would love to see a tag on these bales of hay ... including the farmer's name that give this hay, 'cause I'd like to write him and thank him," said Calvin Koon, 57, one of 18 farmers who received hay from the load that Reagan witnessed.

## No fed haylift planned

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration will cut red tape and help smooth the way for federal aid to drought-stricken farmers in the Southeast but has no immediate plans for a massive haylift or the use of government-owned surplus grain to feed hungry livestock, Agriculture Secretary Richard E. Lyng said Thursday.

With losses already estimated as high as \$1.5 billion, much of the parched land of Alabama, Georgia and the Carolinas is producing shriveled crops and dusty pastures.

Although no huge new initiatives or financial aid were announced, Lyng said several existing Agriculture Department programs will be tailored to help farmers in the drought area.

Designations of specific counties eligible for other aid programs, including emergency loans by the Farmers Home Administration, will begin within days, he said.

The main responsibility will fall on a newly created USDA task force headed by James Bollitt, deputy assistant secretary for government and public affairs. Lyng said the team "will forge a strong federal-state partnership" to coordinate efforts bring drought relief to the area.

Beginning on today, Lyng said, USDA will operate a toll-free hotline so telephone callers can call officials for answers to their problems. The number will be 1-800-433-4703 and will be staffed between 8 a.m. and 6 p.m. EDT, Monday through Friday.

## Housing regulations for illegal aliens postponed

WASHINGTON (AP) — Housing Secretary Samuel R. Pierce announced a two-month postponement Thursday of regulations prohibiting illegal aliens from living in public housing projects and other federally subsidized units.

The regulations, published April 1 and originally set to take effect July 30, require residents of public housing projects to provide proof of citizenship or legal residency and allow for eviction of illegal aliens.

In the housing authorization bill it passed last month, the House included an amendment prohibiting the eviction of families of illegal aliens that include at least

one member, such as a child, who is a legal resident or a U.S. citizen.

The provision, sponsored by Reps. Edward Roybal, D-Calif., and Robert Dornan, R-Calif., would only require residents or applicants to affirm they were citizens or legal residents, instead of giving proof of their status.

Rep. Henry Gonzalez, D-Texas, chairman of the House Banking, Finance and Urban Affairs Housing subcommittee, and Rep. Stewart McKinney, R-Conn., requested the 60-day delay of the HUD regulations in a recent letter to Pierce.

## Ambassador dies

WASHINGTON (AP) — Tran Van Chung, a former ambassador from South Vietnam and father of Madam Ngo Dinh Nhu — known as the "dragon lady" of Vietnam during the early 1960s — was found dead with his wife Thursday in their northwest Washington home. Police would not release details about the deaths, but said causes had not been determined and homicide detectives were investigating.



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## Tax plan scrutinized

WASHINGTON (AP) — The tax-overhaul plan passed by the Senate would produce greater tax cuts than originally expected for people with incomes between \$20,000 and \$50,000, congressional experts estimated Thursday.

On the other hand, the Senate bill would bring in \$21 billion less revenue over the next five years than earlier projected. And there was no immediate indication how that shortage would be made up to meet demands that any bill be "revenue-neutral."

The chief reason for both changes: the assumption that inflation will be lower than had been forecast in February.

The new figures were presented at a closed briefing to conferees from the Senate and House who are attempting to negotiate a compromise

between the tax bills passed by the two chambers. In anticipation of the re-estimates, the lawmakers canceled a public negotiating session in order to discuss the figures in private.

"We're making marked progress," Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the conference, told reporters.

"We're headed toward a bill," said Sen. Bill Bradley, D-N.J.

The staff of the Joint Committee on Taxation, which advises the tax-writing panels, estimated that the Senate-passed bill would cut individual taxes by \$13 billion over the next five years and boost corporate taxes by \$93 billion.

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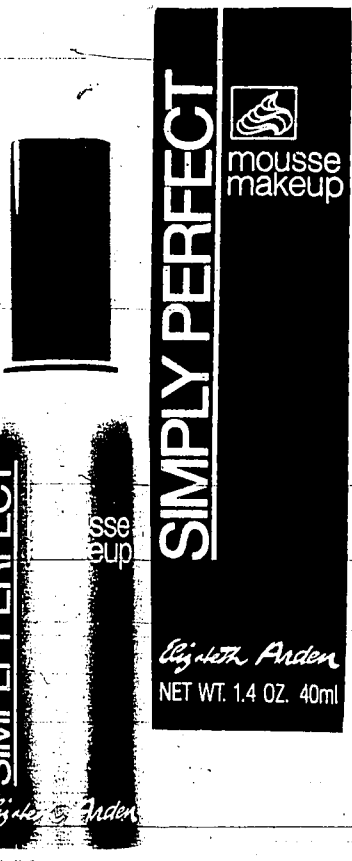

# Lockheed's chairman admits laxness in handling secrets

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of Lockheed Corp. admitted to Congress on Thursday that his company has been sloppy in its handling of secret documents, but said there is no evidence any of the papers fell into Soviet hands.

"Our internal laxness ... is inexcusable," Lawrence O. Kitchen told the House Energy and Commerce Investigations subcommittee. "I assure you that we take this matter seriously and that we are committed to full and timely corrective action."

Defense Department spokesman Robert Sims, questioned about the Lockheed case at the Pentagon before the hearing started, said, "Although we have no information to suggest that the information ... has been compromised in the sense of getting to some foreign government, or being lost to someone on the outside, obviously an inability to account for the documents internally makes it difficult and in fact impossible to know if such compromises have occurred."

Neither Kitchen nor any of the congressmen at the hearing would say in public session what the documents involve, but sources who have declined to be named say the papers concern the highly secret F-19 "stealth" fighter.

The Pentagon and Lockheed have never even acknowledged the existence of the fighter, which involves the use of exotic materials and new shapes to escape detection by enemy radars and sensors. The Pentagon does admit it is building a "stealth" bomber.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the subcommittee, said the problems with Lockheed's handling of classified papers at its Burbank, Calif., plant had been "covered" as part of the paper's investigation into how defense contractors treat secret material.

The investigation has turned up a number of problems and the Pentagon, conducting its own inquiries in the wake of a series of highly publicized espionage cases in the past year, has ordered contractors to tighten up their procedures.

In a 1983 instance, Dingell said, "One Lockheed employee, in order to impress his girlfriend, spirited some extremely sensitive blueprints of the aircraft out of the Lockheed plant concealed in a newspaper."

"When his girlfriend threatened to turn him in to Lockheed, he smuggled the blueprints back into the plant, again using the newspaper trick. The girlfriend, however, still notified Lockheed."

Kitchen said the unidentified employee was fired after he admitted taking the documents.

"None of this makes me feel good," he said, but "there is no way you can provide absolute security."

"It is outrageous they got out," said Kitchen, referring to the documents taken by the employee.

Officials of the General Accounting Office, the congressional watchdog agency, testified that their review of Lockheed showed 1,460 classified documents had been improperly handled. In some cases, the papers were destroyed, and in others they were lost, missing or couldn't be accounted for, the GAO said.

"We have not maintained proper administrative control over classified documents" in the Burbank plant, Kitchen admitted.

But he added that "preliminary indications are that there has been no actual compromise of classified material."

Kitchen's statement was the first time the aerospace contractor had admitted the problem. When Dingell first charged a month ago that classified documents had been mishandled, Lockheed officials said internal investigations had found no violations of any procedures.

The problem occurred because employees were not specifically warned enough about handling classified documents, Kitchen said, and because plant officials failed to check what was going on.

## Desert maneuvers start today in California

MARCH AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Thousands of Army paratroopers and Marines, along with Navy and Air Force units, gathered throughout the Southwest on Thursday for realistic practice in desert warfare.

"Gallant Eagle '86," which begins today and lasts for 10 days, is drawing 35,000 troops to the area.

Foot soldiers will hone their skills at fighting in hot, dry climate. Fighter and bomber pilots will buzz the desert floor in mock air-ground attacks.

Air Force transports will fly in troops and equipment from Fort Bragg, N.C., Fort Campbell, Ky. and Fort Stewart, Ga.

The troops involved in Gallant Eagle are attached to the U.S. Central Command, which is responsible for the readiness of troops that would be sent to the Middle East, eastern Africa, the Arabian Peninsula or Pakistan.

The maneuvers are held every other year in the Southwest under conditions so realistic that in 1982 a drop of 2,300 paratroopers left six dead and 150 injured.

"This is the biggest exercise the Central Command will be involved in," said Maj. John Meyer, a public affairs officer working at the maneuver headquarters at March Air Force Base, 60 miles east of Los Angeles.

## Crash kills officers

MOUNT IDA, Ark. (AP) — A helicopter crashed Thursday in the Ouachita Mountains, killing three law enforcement officers and injuring two others after they had found marijuana crops, state police said.

At John Chambers of the Arkansas State Police at Little Rock said the agents on the helicopter were from the state police, the federal Drug Enforcement Administration, and county officers. The mission was also being used for training.

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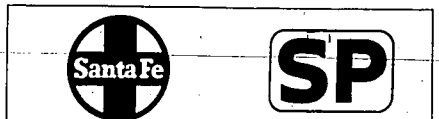


This Santa Fe locomotive carries the paint scheme to be used if the two rail lines combined

# ICC blocks proposed merger of Santa Fe, Southern Pacific

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Interstate Commerce Commission, rejecting its staff's recommendation, voted 4-1 Thursday to block the proposed merger of the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific railroads into what would have been the country's third largest rail system.

The decision stunned executives of Santa Fe Southern Pacific Corp., the holding company formed 2½ years ago as part of the merger plan. The company must now divest one of the railroads or possibly come up with a revised plan that could pass ICC muster.



"We're going to have to call something off," John J. Simmens, chairman of the holding company, told reporters after the ICC vote. But he said "this is not doomsday" for the railroads and insisted both rail lines can survive with cost-cutting efforts.

Last May, Schmidt and other Santa Fe Southern Pacific executives testified before the ICC that both railroads might be forced into bankruptcy if the merger was not approved.

While the commission said combining the two railroads might be in the public interest, the "substantial defense effect" the merger would have on competition in some parts of the country outweighed any overall public benefits. The ICC staff estimated the merger could save shippers \$200 million a year because of increased efficiencies.

Schmidt, who called the ICC decision "a horrible mistake," said no decision has been made on whether one of the railroads would be sold as a single entity or sold in pieces. Since December, 1983 — when Santa Fe Industries and the Southern Pacific Corp. merged — all Southern Pacific Railroad stock has been put in a separate voting trust, pending ICC action on the merger.

The ICC had no jurisdiction over the corporate merger, but by federal law must approve the combining of the two railroads.

Only one commission chairman, Heather Gradison supported merging the two railroads. The four dissenting commission members said concerns about a decline in competition caused them to reject the merger.

The Santa Fe and the Southern Pacific, whose tracks run along the West Coast and across the Southwest to the Mississippi River and into Chicago, have long stretches of parallel track, especially in central California and from the Los Angeles area to El Paso, Texas.

At a news conference, Donald Shaw, the ICC's acting director of the rail section, told reporters that a staff recommendation had taken the competition question into account and concluded any problems could be solved by requiring that other railroads be given trackage rights or other arrangements.

But the ICC members, with the exception of Gradison, did not agree.

"The anti-competitive effects outweigh the public interest," said commissioner J.J. Simmens before he cast his vote.

Commissioner Malcolm Sternett said he sympathized with the Santa Fe and Southern Pacific executives, who testified before the commission last spring that neither railroad might survive if left independent. But Sternett said the executives "have simply not made a case" for the merger.

The other commissioners — Paul Andre and Frederic Lamboley — cast their votes against the merger without comment in a hearing that lasted only 18 minutes.

The proposed merger has been before the commission for more than 2½ years and was widely expected within the railroad industry to be approved. The ICC has approved a string of large railroad mergers in recent years and last rejected a major rail merger in the late 1960s.

The Santa Fe-Southern Pacific merger had been opposed by the Justice Department which also raised competitive questions because the two rail systems overlap extensively. But the proposal had received the support of the Transportation Department which argued that any competition problems could be addressed by granting other railroads trackage rights.

The ICC decision caught Santa Fe Southern Pacific Corp. executives by surprise.

The two other American defendants, Franklin D.R. Corcoran of Pismo Beach, Calif., and Carl D. Lilly of Visalia, Calif., were arrested in other states as expected to enter pleas in Atlanta next week.

Federal authorities are seeking the extradition of the two Libyans indicted, Abdulheem M. Badir and Abdurrahman M. Badi, who are believed to be in Europe, said U.S. Attorney Stephen Cowan.

## Innocent pleas filed in plane case

ATLANTA (AP) — Three men pleaded innocent Thursday to charges they illegally sold two civilian transport planes to Libya for military use.

U.S. Magistrate Joel Feldman then set bail at \$2 million in property or \$1 million cash for Edward J. Elkins, and \$250,000 in property each for David E. Baskett, 43, and Thomas J. Burnham, 40.

Defense attorney Steven Frankel said Elkins, 42, of Santa Maria, Calif., and Bend, Ore., would post bond for Baskett and Burnham, both of Santa Maria.

The three men, two other Americans, two Libyans and five companies were indicted Tuesday in the alleged sale of two L-100-30 planes to Libya, which prosecutors said planned to convert to KC-130s, military tanker planes used for the refueling of fighter jets in the air.

Authorities said the defendants told the federal government the L-100-30s would be used for oil exploration in the west African nation of Benin, but instead sent them to Libya, where they remain.

All sales of American goods to Libya were embargoed by President Reagan in February. Sales of aircraft or military equipment have been forbidden for several years.

The defendants allegedly paid Lockheed-Georgia Co. \$50 million for the two planes.

Elkins made a \$7 million profit on the alleged deal, Assistant U.S. Attorney Jerry Morefield told the magistrate.

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## Second cocaine laboratory raided by Bolivian police

LA PAZ, Bolivia (AP) — The second jungle drug laboratory raided by Bolivian police aboard U.S.-piloted helicopters contained dormitories and could produce 4,400 pounds of cocaine a week, official Bolivian sources said Thursday.

The lab was raided Wednesday, and more missions were launched Thursday by police ferried in U.S. Black Hawk helicopters, officials said. There was no immediate information on whether more cocaine processing centers were uncovered.

Last Friday the U.S.-Bolivian anti-narcotics teams, operating in the vast Beni region of grasslands and jungle surrounding the northern city of Trinidad, uncovered their first drug lab at a clandestine camp called "El Zorro."

The complex raided Wednesday apparently had been in operation for four years and was "twice the size of El Zorro," said a source who spoke on condition of anonymity.

He said the complex was on the frontier between La Paz and Beni provinces, about 170 miles northwest of Trinidad city, the base of the joint anti-drug operation. There were no arrests and no drugs were found.

The source said peasants reported two large twin-engine aircraft landing and taking off Sunday in an apparent evacuation of the laboratory's personnel and any valuable processed cocaine on hand.

He said the complex comprised 18 log-framed,

canvas-topped buildings with three laboratories. Three gas-powered electric generators, several barrels of fuel and processing chemicals, cartridges for machine guns, weighing scales and other material were seized, including a new Japanese-made pickup truck.

The complex had dormitories containing mattresses and bed linen and apparently employed about 100 people, the source said.

A 4,800-foot runway had been hacked out of the jungle about a mile from the complex, he added.

In the joint operation, about 170 members of the U.S. 193rd Infantry, based in Panama, are providing logistical and communications support to about 300 Bolivian "Leopards" narcotics police, who are trained and financed by the United States.

U.S. and Bolivian officials have characterized the campaign as an overwhelming success even though frustrated missions, mainly because of faulty information or bad weather, outnumbered successful ones five-to-two as of early Thursday.

They contend the mere presence of the U.S. and Bolivian forces has prompted dozens of traffickers to evacuate their laboratories, halting production of the drug.

Illegal drug operations in Bolivia are thought to be the source of nearly half the cocaine that reaches the United States, and is estimated to take in \$2 billion a year.

## Zambian leader denounces U.S., British position on South Africa

LUSAKA, Zambia (AP) — President Kenneth Kaunda put aside pleasantries when the British foreign secretary arrived Thursday and declared that Britain and the United States are "blessing" apartheid in South Africa.

Kaunda, whose capital is the exile headquarters for the African National Congress guerrilla group, spoke Tuesday night opposing economic sanctions and Sir Geoffrey Howe's arrival in Johannesburg the next day to visit President P.W. Botha.

The Zambian leader called the sequence of events "a deplorable, completely unacceptable conspiracy" between the American and British governments and "a clear

signal to the racists to carry on with that system ... that they have nothing to fear by way of sanctions."

Howe, sent to the region by the European Common Market to seek negotiations on ending South Africa's apartheid policy of race discrimination, was visibly shocked by Kaunda's welcome at the State House.

He told the president there was "no foundation whatsoever for your suggestion ... I'm not engaged in any unacceptable process, any charade or conspiracy to promote anything other than that which you and all the other Commonwealth heads of state want ... a process of change in South Africa by peaceful dialogue."

Kaunda informed him: "I am

receiving you for two reasons: out of respect for Queen Elizabeth, and out of my respect for those governments of the EEC (European Economic Community) which have taken action against South Africa.

"If you had come in your capacity as British foreign secretary ... I would not have received you. You and President Reagan, by rejecting sanctions, are kissing apartheid ... blessing the system. I can't accept that."

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## U.S.-USSR relations termed bad

MOSCOW (AP) — President Andrei A. Gromyko was quoted Thursday as saying Soviet relations with the United States under the Reagan administration "have deteriorated 'practically to zero' in some areas."

Gromyko's stern assessment of superpower relations was delivered during a meeting Wednesday with foreign representatives of women's peace movements visiting Moscow; the Communist Party daily Pravda said.

"In comparison with the level that was reached at the time of previous administrations, the present level of political, trade and cultural relations has significantly deteriorated and, in some spheres, it has decreased practically to zero," Gromyko was quoted as saying.

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## Soviets admit nuke disaster result of poorly planned tests

MOSCOW (AP) — The experiment that caused the Chernobyl nuclear disaster was a poorly planned attempt to test whether a turbine generator could keep operating after a reactor shutdown, a Soviet official said Thursday.

In a statement Saturday, the Communist Party's ruling Politburo said the accident at the Ukrainian power plant occurred while improperly supervised experiments were being conducted and blamed gross negligence for the disaster.

The comments at a news conference Thursday by Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady Gerasimov were the first explanation of why workers were experimenting on the Chernobyl plant's No. 4 reactor in the early hours of April 26. Press reports have said it was shut down for maintenance.

An explosion and fire in the reactor spewed a huge cloud of radiation that spread over Europe and gradually worked its way around the world.

Gerasimov said he could not give

details of the experiment, but a description would be included in a report covering "hundreds of pages" to be presented by September to the International Atomic Energy Agency, a U.N. organization with headquarters in Vienna.

He said the report also would be made available in Moscow, but did not say how this would be done or whether it would be revealed to the general public.

An English translation of Gerasimov's remarks provided by the ministry quoted him as saying: "When you shut the station, the generator is still working ... The experiment (was) ... if there is an accident, could the generator provide energy for the station for 40 to 45 minutes?"

When The Associated Press telephoned with another query about the accident, however, Gerasimov insisted he had said 40 to 45 seconds.

He told the AP the turbine generators that produce electricity at Chernobyl apparently continue to function for a few seconds after a reactor stops working.

Gerasimov said the purpose of the experiment was to test how long the electricity-generating turbine could keep going after a reactor shutdown before a backup power supply at the plant went into operation automatically.

Asked whether poor preparation of the experiment caused the accident at Chernobyl, he said: "Yes."

"The point is not that the experiment was conducted," he said at the news conference. "The point is that it was conducted without the necessary precautions."

The official news agency Tass reported Thursday that Hans Blix, director general of the agency, met with Deputy Foreign Minister Vladimir Petrovsky in Moscow on Tuesday.

It said they discussed ways to develop international cooperation on nuclear safety and a forthcoming IAEA conference on the subject. Tass gave no further details, and did not explain the delay in announcing the meeting.

## U.N. head receives coronary bypass

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Secretary-General Javier Perez de Cuellar successfully underwent a quadruple coronary bypass operation Thursday and is expected to be back at work in a few weeks, a U.N. spokesman announced.

"The doctors are very happy with the way the operation went and they said the prognosis was excellent, that his heart is in excellent shape

and therefore there is no problem," spokesman Francois Giuliani told reporters after returning from New York's Mount Sinai Medical Center.

Giuliani said the 66-year-old U.N. chief would spend 10 to 14 days at the hospital. Afterwards, the spokesman said, "the secretary-general should lead a completely normal life."

## Winter hits Austrian mountain areas

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — Winter came early to Austria this year. Meteorologists reported snow squalls Thursday in some alpine passes, and the Austrian Automobile Club ARBOE advised members using the passes to put snow chains on their tires.

Wet snow was reported as low as one mile above sea level in some alpine regions, and that was unusual for this time of the year, said weathermen.

The unseasonably cool weather was accompanied by showers and brisk winds in lower areas.

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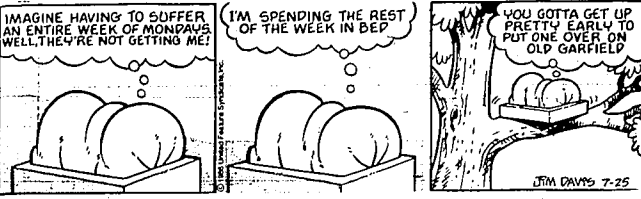

# Fearing harm, Boy George's brother told about addiction

NEW YORK (AP) — Boy George's brother said he told the world the singer was addicted to heroin because his family was suffering and he was afraid a tragedy would occur.

David O'Dowd, in an interview Thursday on the CBS Morning News, said he feared his action would hurt his family further, but it was "either do it right now or wait, I don't know, six-eight months, until some tragedy happened, like he died."

O'Dowd told a London television station that Boy George had been addicted to heroin for about eight months and had lost 40 pounds.

Boy George faces a court appearance Tuesday in connection with his arrest earlier this month on a charge of heroin possession. Four people, including his brother Kevin, have been charged with conspiring to supply Boy George with heroin.

Boy George, 25, whose real name is George O'Dowd, and his band Culture Club topped the charts in the early 1980s with "Karma Chameleon" and "Do You Really Want to Hurt Me?"

He told the News of the World newspaper recently, "I've made no admission about receiving heroin treatment."

Grazer — who were responsible for the hit movies "Cocoon" and "Splash" — will own 60 percent of the common stock in the new company.

Imagine Films was formed by Howard, whose best-known acting role was that of Opie Taylor in "The Andy Griffith Show," and Grazer to produce motion picture and television programs to be licensed to others for international distribution.

## 'Captain' will return to public TV stations

NEW YORK (AP) — "Captain Kangaroo" returns this fall when more than 175 public television stations broadcast 65 newly edited programs from the 1982-84 seasons of the popular children's show.

"I'm delighted that public television has made a home for the Captain, where he will be able to serve contemporary American young people in the same way that he served their older siblings and parents," said Bob Keeshan, who has played the captain for the CBS network since the 1950s.

After an 18-month absence from the airwaves, the once hour-long show will be 30 minutes.

## Bomber's title belts net thieves jail time

TORRANCE, Calif. (AP) — Two men who stole a pair of 14-karat gold championship belts worn by boxer Joe Louis and valued at \$500,000 have been sentenced to three years in jail.

William K. Kreitz, 29, and Mark A. Estes, 25, were sentenced Wednesday to the maximum terms. Both had pleaded guilty to one count each of second-degree burglary.

The belts and a Congressional gold coin bearing Louis' image were stolen in June from the office of Rolling Hills Estates management consultant Ronald T. Schaefer, who is trying to create a boxing hall of fame in Las Vegas, Nev.

The belts were on loan from Louis' widow.

# After 40 years, Marine messengers mounting motorcycles for security

CAMP PENDLETON, Calif. (AP) — After a 40-year absence, motorcycles are back in vogue with the Marines because the two-wheelers can safely carry secret messages among battlefield commanders, a Camp Pendleton spokesman said Wednesday.

"With today's sophisticated equipment, foreign military can have the ability to intercept (radio) messages and decode them," Gunnery Sgt. J.R. Farrell said. "The messengers they came back to the limelight is that it's kind of hard to cavedrop on a motorcycle."

"The motorcycles will be operating on our side of the line. We wouldn't be sending them through enemy ter-

ritory with classified information," he said.

The Kawasaki 250 dirt bikes selected for the job are designed to handle the mud, sand and hilly terrain where many battles occur, and the liquid-cooled engines can withstand wilting temperatures. In addition to transporting couriers, the motorcycles can carry up to 50 pounds of equipment.

Motorcycle training sessions are under way at Camp Pendleton, marking the first regular use of motorcycles by the Marine Corps since World War II.

Sgt. Virgil Stephens, the program's chief instructor, said 188 motorcycles have been purchased

for \$2,800 each. They include several features not found on civilian vehicles, including a special dull green paint job designed to confuse the enemy's infrared scope.

Nine Marine volunteers and seven instructors recently finished the first training session. The plan is to eventually send 88 volunteers through the 18-day course, after which they'll return to their units.

Getting volunteers has been easy, according to Gunnery Sgt. Duot Gray, who is in charge of the program. Controlling new participants' zeal is a chore.

"We stress safety," Stephens said. "The first couple of days we really have to slow them down a bit. They want to jump and ride too fast."

## Howard's first showing on Wall Street scores

NEW YORK (AP) — Actor-director Ron Howard's premiere showing on Wall Street has gotten rave reviews from investors.

Newly issued stock in his month-old company, Imagine Films Entertainment Inc., soared more than 120 percent on its first day of trading Wednesday in the national over-the-counter market.

VAIL, Colo. (AP) — Town officials have dropped plans for a \$50,000 artificial rock to mark a new entryway to the ski resort because of concerns that it would add to the community's image as a "plastic Bavaria."

The fake rock was to have been the centerpiece of a monument that would greet visitors and describe the resort's role as host of the 1989 World Alpine Skiing Championships.

The town had approved making a rock for the entryway of fiberglass-reinforced concrete after architects said a natural rock would be too hard to find and too difficult to move from its setting.

The Vail Town Council gave up on the idea Tuesday after receiving numerous calls, letters and a petition opposing the plan for a man-made rock in the Rocky Mountain resort.

"Image has a lot to do with what we're all about," said Vail Councilman Kent Rose. "We've been fighting plastic-image comments for years, and then we do the thing with the rock."

"The rock has gotten totally out of hand," said Councilman Gordon Pierce. "It's come to be a nightmare. Maybe we should go back to the drawing board."

## Meeting with Moroccan 'first rate achievement'

# Peres says Middle East nearer peace

JERUSALEM (AP) — Prime Minister Shimon Peres said Thursday his two-day summit with King Hassan II of Morocco moved the Middle East a step closer to peace despite disagreement on key issues.

He called the meeting a "first rate" achievement because it brought contacts between Israelis and Arabs into the open, and predicted that it would encourage future dialogue.

The Moroccan monarch, in contrast, made no optimistic comments during a nationally televised speech to his people Wednesday night. He said no progress was made toward peace, adding: "We did not meet to negotiate or to find a solution, but to explore the possibilities."

Hassan, a pro-Western moderate, is only the second Arab head of state to meet publicly with an Israeli prime minister. President Anwar Sadat of Egypt signed a peace treaty with Israel in March 1979 and was assassinated in October 1981.

Secretary of State George P. Shultz sent Peres a telegram praising the prime minister for "unwavering determination to pursue the search for peace." He added: "Today, you and King Hassan made history."

State Department spokesman Bernard Kalb said: "The United States believes that this was a valuable and historic effort. No one ever suggested that making peace in the Middle East would be easy, nor did the United States expect any dramatic breakthrough at this session or that all problems could be resolved in two days of meetings."

Syria broke relations with Morocco because of the meeting. The premier of Iran, which is Moslem but not Arab, and the official Syrian press made threats of assassination against Hassan. Radical Palestinian groups also threatened the king's life.

A joint communique issued in Jerusalem and Rabat said Hassan, tried to persuade Peres to endorse the Fez peace plan of 1982, an Arab proposal that would exchange implicit recognition of Israel for establishment of an independent Palestinian state and Israeli withdrawal from all Arab territories.

"During the talks, marked by frankness and devoted essentially to study of the Fez plan, the Moroccan sovereign and the Israeli prime minister analyzed in depth the situation in the Middle East," the communique said. "The meeting was of a purely exploratory nature, aiming at no moment at engaging in negotiations."

Peres told reporters after his return Wednesday: "It is impossible to settle all the problems that have been there for 20 to 30 years... We both left with the feeling that there is a lot more ground to cover and there are differences of opinion." He nonetheless called the talks,

"a small step which was very important," noting that the two leaders "tried to find opportunities for peace instead of looking for the problems."

"The most important message is probably that it (contacts) will be continued in the future, by more meetings and by many other ways," he said.

Uri Savir, an adviser who traveled with the prime minister, said the Israelis initially thought the sides were too far apart for a joint communique, and the fact that one emerged "is more important as a matter of principle than in terms of the content of the statement."

Moshe Arens, a legislator from the right-wing Likud bloc, said: "There's no doubt this was an important visit, but I haven't heard of any bilateral gains." The Likud is in a government coalition with the prime minister's Labor Party. Some members of Parliament noted that Peres had not budged from rejection of any contact with the Palestine Liberation Organization.

"The core of the problem is the Palestinian problem and if we continue giving traditional answers there will be no further progress," said Mordechai Virshubski of the centrist Shinui Party.

# Royal wedding dress wins rave reviews

LONDON (AP) — Britain's fashion critics, who spent months carping about Sarah Ferguson's weight and clothes, on Thursday gave rave reviews to the beaded ivory stiletto gown she wore to marry Prince Andrew.

"The girl who had come in for so much stick over her fashion sense ended up beating everyone in the fashion stakes," wrote Daily Mirror fashion writer Marcia Brackett. "Fergie's dress was way ahead of Diana's... and any other royal wedding dress in living memory."

Jean Debson, fashion editor of the tabloid Daily Mail, said there was only one word for the gown: "ravishing." And the Daily Telegraph's Kathryn Samuel said the bride "looked every inch a true princess."

The tabloid Star's front-page headline said: "Wow! That's what Andy said when he saw Fergie at the abbey... and so said all of us."

London designer Linda Clerach, who made two wedding dresses — one for the bride to wear to her Westminster Abbey wedding on Wednesday and the other for Madame Tussaud's wax museum — said Thursday that the gown almost had a few other touches.

It was beaded with bees and thistles from the bride's coat of arms and anchors and waves for Andrew, a Royal Navy helicopter pilot. Miss Clerach said she and the bride also wanted to include a helicopter and a teddy bear in the design "but it didn't quite fit somehow."

As the 26-year-old newlyweds Andrew and Sarah, the Duke and Duchess of York, were honeymooning on the royal yacht Britannia, Britain savored the afterglow of its latest royal wedding. "This country is in a league of its own when it

comes to trumps and radiant brides sitting in golden coaches. So let there be no carrying about the latest expat figures," wrote Daily Express columnist Jon Akass.

"The gorgeous spectacle could not be matched anywhere in the world," echoed the 4 million-circulation Sun, Britain's best-selling newspaper.

The Times of London said the wedding was "an act of pure theater... which gave immense satisfaction."

The upbeat mood was reflected in a Gallup Poll published Thursday in which 80 percent of those surveyed said they were proud to be British.

For those still trying to capture some of the romance of the wedding, there was a chance to walk the blue-carpeted aisle of Westminster Abbey, admire the floral decorations and view the marriage register.

# DC-3 trip reaches Denmark

COPENHAGEN, Denmark (AP) — A vintage DC-3 on a round-the-world flight to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the U.S.-built aircraft's production landed Thursday at Copenhagen's Kastrop airport, police said.

The plane, dubbed Odyssey 86 and built 42 years ago, logged about 40,000 air hours since leaving Kelowna, British Columbia, Canada, on June 10 with a crew of 11 Canadians.

Its stops included Hawaii, the Fiji Islands, the Philippines, Australia, Singapore, Nepal, India, Saudi Arabia, Greece, Italy, Poland and Norway. Soviet authorities denied it permission to land in Moscow and Leningrad.

The pilot, Capt. Ken Olson, was carrying a letter from Canadian Prime Minister Brian Mulroney promoting the Expo 1986 transportation exhibition being held in Vancouver, a Canadian Embassy spokesman said.

## Population increases in 6 counties

### Blaine County has 31.2 percent gain

TWIN FALLS — The number of people living in six Magic Valley counties increased between 1980 and 1985, while Camas County saw a drop in population and Lincoln County remained about the same, according to new U.S. Bureau of Census estimates.

Blaine County's population increased by the greatest percentage in the Magic Valley. Census officials believe that population there has increased by about 3,100 — to 12,900 in the first five years of the '80s. That's a gain of 31.2 percent.

Only one county in the state — Custer County, where mining activity has increased — had a greater percentage of population increase. Census officials estimate that population increased there by 53.2 percent, bringing the county population to an estimated 5,200.

"I think the rest of the world is such a lousy

place, people are coming here," said Blaine County Commissioner Alan Reynolds Thursday. Blaine County officials have been using a population figure close to the federal estimate, he said.

"I believe them. I'm just not sure where they (the increased population) are," he said. "We've had a mean recession. I'm surprised population is up that much."

Part of the population increase in Blaine County, as in other Magic Valley counties showing an increase, can be attributed to new births. The Idaho Department of Health and Welfare reports that the number of deaths annually in the county has ranged from 38 to 63 between 1980 and 1984, while the number of births has ranged during the same period from 175 to 218 a year.

Camas County's population dropped by a larger percentage than any other county in the state between 1980 and 1985, according to federal estimates. Population declined by about 100,700 people, say U.S. Census officials.

"I don't think it has dropped that much," said Inamas County Commissioner Allen Bauscher.

The county has had a decline in employment positions in recent years, however, he said. The Wendell Mill and Lumber Company closed

about three years ago, and the county no longer has any railroad employees, he said.

Twin Falls County had an increase of about 3,100 people — to an estimated population of 56,100, according to the federal government. That's an increase of 5.9 percent.

Cassia County and Minidoka County both had slightly larger percentages of population increases over the five-year period.

Cassia's population is up 6.7 percent, according to estimates that show 4,200 more people to put the count at 20,790. Minidoka's increase was 7.7 percent with about 1,500 people bringing the estimated census there to 21,200.

Both Cassia and Minidoka have relatively high birth rates. Each had a birth rate of 20 percent in 1984, slightly higher than the state average of 18 percent, according to state Health and Welfare statistics.

Jerome and Gooding counties both had modest increases in population between 1980 and 1985, according to Census Bureau estimates. Jerome County's population is estimated to have jumped 4.8 percent, an increase of 700 people, to 15,600.

Gooding's population is estimated to have been 12,300 in 1985. That's up 500 people, for an increase of 3.8 percent, according to census data.

## 3 murderers denied parole Called threat to society

BOISE — Three convicted murderers from Twin Falls were denied parole this week by the state Department of Corrections.

As a result, Jerry Pennell, Jon Sjogren and Charles Patrick Tisdale will continue serving their terms in the Idaho State Penitentiary, said Olivia Craven, executive director of the department's parole commission.

Twin Falls County Prosecutor K. Ellen Baxter said that she and former prosecutor Larry Dellaan and the Twin Falls County law enforcement officers had written to the commission to oppose the parole of the men because they considered them a threat to society.

The four members of the commission gave no reason at the hearings about why they denied the parole of Pennell and Sjogren Thursday and Tisdale on Wednesday, Craven said. But that wasn't unusual procedure, she added.

Pennell was 21 years old when he was sentenced on Dec. 28, 1983, to 10 years imprisonment for the beating death of his deaf-mute girlfriend, 27-year-old Carlene Gillespie of Twin Falls, in March 1982.

A jury found Pennell guilty of voluntary manslaughter, although he had been charged with first-degree murder. During the trial, Pennell admitted hitting Gillespie during an argument. The defense argued that the woman received the fatal injuries when she fell and hit her head on concrete.

The prosecution, headed by Dellaan, claimed that Gillespie was tortured and died as a result of a beating.

At sentencing, Dellaan said Pennell was a danger to society. Sjogren was convicted of strangling 61-year-old Donna Hartley Smith to death with a telephone cord in May 1981. Smith's body was found in her Twin Falls home.

Sjogren said he had taken drugs and had "wiggled out." Originally charged with first-degree murder, Sjogren was sentenced to 25 years imprisonment after pleading guilty in April 1983 to second-degree murder. He was 30 at the time.

At the sentencing hearing, 5th District Judge Daniel Meehl said he found a "substantial probability" that Sjogren would continue to be a threat to society if freed.

The sentencing wrapped up a case that had included a succession of five defense lawyers.

Tisdale, a former Salt Lake City

resident, was sentenced to 10 years in prison in March 1983 for the 1979 shooting death of a Boise man who had given Tisdale's former wife a ride to her Twin Falls residence.

Former 5th District Judge Theron Ward reimposed the sentence he had levied on Tisdale in April 1980. The earlier sentence had been struck down by the Idaho Court of Appeals. Tisdale originally had been charged with first-degree murder for shooting David William Nylander on Jan. 18, 1978. Nylander was shot in the neck and died at the scene.

Under a plea agreement, Tisdale pleaded guilty to voluntary manslaughter. He had claimed the shooting was accidental.

During the second sentencing hearing, however, Ward called the shooting "cold-blooded." He also cited a psychological evaluation that likened Tisdale to a truck "loaded with nitroglycerine."

Twin Falls attorney Hank Stoker, who represented Sjogren and Pennell, said he wasn't surprised about the denial for Tisdale because of the nature of the crime and Sjogren's past criminal history. He didn't know how to react about Pennell because he hadn't been in contact with him for a long time, Stoker said.

The attorney who represented Tisdale at earlier hearings, James May of Twin Falls, couldn't be reached for comment late Thursday afternoon.

No witnesses appeared at the informal, open hearings of the commission, Craven said. There were, however, letters both opposing and supporting parole.

The commission interviewed the men as part of the hearings, usually not attended by lawyers. The commission considered the men's criminal records and behavior at prison, a report from a prison social worker and the inmates' goals and proposed parole plan, she reported.

Although an inmate may be doing well at prison, he may not be paroled because of the crime he committed, she added.

The parole board does not consider inmates eligible for parole until the men have served about one-third of their sentence. Several of the parole requests are rejected because the inmates have not yet served that amount of time.

Pennell will be eligible for another parole hearing in January 1987, Sjogren in July 1988 and Tisdale in January 1987, she reported.

Craven had few other details about the hearings of the three men, as they were among 50-60 such hearings the parole board had heard over the past three days.

## Statistics reveal a lot about a town

### Official shows value of census

TWIN FALLS — Demographics are destiny for most neighborhoods, a U.S. Census Bureau official told the Sawtooth Press Club Thursday.

A high-income area of any given town will usually remain so, and a low-income area will change little, barring disaster or major redevelopment, Larry Hartke said at a Twin Falls luncheon meeting.

"Relationships from one part of town to another don't change all that much," he said.

Demographics is the statistical study of human populations and their density, age, and other characteristics.

Hartke said that while specific Census Bureau demographic statistics such as median-income levels in a particular neighborhood may soon be out of date, the ranking of neighborhoods by income level, average age, or average number of children will change very little from decade to decade.

Hartke, a public information officer from the Seattle office of the Census Bureau, said he was in town to explain to journalists, business people, and other groups how they can use census data to better understand the makeup of the local population.

In a morning session at the College of Southern Idaho, he said that while the Census Bureau keeps no individual names on file in its computers, as many as 160 characteristics for a given section of a town or

## Republicans court the 'Big Chill' crowd

JEROME — Republican gubernatorial candidate David Leroy preached to the choir Wednesday night, but it was not the usual choir.

At a fund-raising barbecue south of Jerome, he addressed about 160 supporters, most of whom were not the party regulars who turn out for nearly every rally, picnic, and speech by GOP candidates.

Twin Falls County Republican Party chairman Mark Stubbs said Wednesday night's crowd was what organizers wanted to attract: a younger and less politically active group.

While party regulars were on hand, they appeared to be the minority, said a number of party officials at the dinner. Stubbs said the goal of

the picnic was to encourage involvement by people who can't afford the \$100-\$500 events sponsored by candidates when nationally known Republicans come to Idaho.

Featuring a \$10 entrance fee, upbeat rock 'n' roll music from the 1960s, and entertainment by radio personality "Straight Arrow," the event was billed as a picnic for the "Big Chill" crowd. The Big Chill was a 1983 film about the reunion of a group of friends who went to college together in the 1960s and the differing degrees to which they had joined the establishment they criticized in college.

Mel Richardson, the Republicans' 2nd Congressional District nominee, was on hand and plugged Leroy's candidacy as well as his own. Richardson asked supporters of the four candidates he van-

quished in the May primary to back him in his challenge of Democrat U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings.

Following Richardson's introduction, Leroy spoke and got his biggest round of applause for the night when he told the crowd that if he is elected, he will be the first governor in the state's 96-year history educated in Idaho schools.

Leroy also said the election of a Republican governor will allow the Republican party to "replace people who are relatively incompetent" in the state bureaucracy and to appoint district judges whose views more closely agree with Republicans. He said one-third of the state's district judges will come up for appointment or replacement in the four years following the 1986 election.

## Officials seek grant to battle teen pregnancies

TWIN FALLS — To combat and prevent teenage pregnancies, the South Central District Health Department is going after a major private foundation grant.

The local Health Department joined a select few agencies in the nation vying for the grant from the Kaiser Foundation. Out of 675 applications, 60 agencies were selected, and only two from Idaho — the South Central Health District and the Central District Health Department in

Boise. As a finalist, the Kaiser Foundation, a philanthropic branch of Kaiser Aluminum, flew two health department officials to a three-day conference last week on health promotion and how to write grant proposals.

The Health Department has until Sept. 5 to complete the application, said Cheryl Juntunen, physical health director, who attended the conference at Stanford University in California.

"The focus will be on forming community coalitions to deal with teen pregnancies and try to prevent them," she said. "We'll start with

that, and expand it to help teens make good decisions."

If approved, the Health Department could receive up to \$150,000 a year for the project.

One of the stipulations of the program is that it must be self-supporting after the Kaiser Foundation grant ends, she said. Even with cuts in state funding, Juntunen said they're still going after the grant.

"Our attitude is that we're going to develop the program; even if we have to find other funding," she said. "We have an ability to do something positive in our community."

## Treatment center gets state contract Seesaw fight for funding ends

TWIN FALLS — Walker ACT Center on Thursday won its seesaw fight for state funding, after the director of the Department of Administration sided with it and against the state Department of Health and Welfare.

Glenn Nichols, director of the Department of Administration, said he signed an order Thursday awarding Walker ACT, a Gooding-based, substance-abuse treatment center, 100 percent of a state contract to treat drug and alcohol patients on an in-patient basis.

"I think the system works," said Walker ACT Director Gail Ater. "I think it's justified that they followed Beer's report."

Nichols' decision was based on a 17-page report issued Monday by an independent hearing officer, Steve Beer, who recommended that H&W reverse its decision and award Walker ACT the full \$137,845 contract.

Walker ACT challenged H&W in June, after officials there decided to split the money for alcohol and drug in-patient treatment between Walker ACT and Port of Hope, based in Twin Falls. Port of Hope was scheduled to receive 75 percent of the money, and Walker ACT the rest.

Beer's recommendation and Nichols' action appeared to be a vindication of the independent AITA committee, which originally recommended both programs and recommended the contract be pulled from Port of Hope and given to Walker Center.

Nichols' decision could still be challenged by Port of Hope in federal District Court in Boise.

Port of Hope officials said no Wednesday. They would have no statement on the case until Nichols rendered a final decision. Port of Hope Director Barry Meyers was unavailable for comment on Thursday, after Nichols signed the order.

In an earlier interview with The Times-News, Beer said his ruling could only be based on two findings — that H&W acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner, or that the decision was an abuse of discretionary power — with no reasonable basis for the decision.

Nichols said the hearing officer found that Dr. Fritz Dixon (bureau chief of preventive medicine for H&W) did not follow H&W's bid specifications when he overrode the AITA Committee report.

"I think Fritz (Dixon) was just trying to be a good guy, and not put Port of Hope out of business," said Nichols. "H&W is the sole basis of support for Port of Hope, but that was not a legitimate consideration for the evaluation."

But in May, Meyers told The Times-News that Port of Hope now operates with a \$2 million annual budget, drawn from government funds, insurance payments, client fees and United Way contributions.

Founded as Magic Valley Alcohol Recovery Center Inc. in 1971 in Twin Falls, the association now runs residential centers in Twin Falls, Boise, Nampa and Coeur d'Alene.

Nichols said he did not agree with suggestions that there was undue political pressure put on Dixon to award the contract to Port of Hope.

# Sun Valley, Ketchum get bus garage grant

TWIN FALLS -- Following close on the heels of Pocatello's failure to meet the requirements of a U.S. Department of Transportation grant program, Ketchum and Sun Valley have cooperated to build a bus garage for the Ketchum Area Rapid Transit (KART) system.

Unlike Pocatello, the two cities were able to drum up the necessary matching funds required under the program. Matching funds are a downpayment of sorts, required under many grant programs to ensure local support for federally funded projects.

KART manager Charley French said the city's portion of the project will be covered by the purchase of the land the garage will be built on in Ketchum, next to the city Street Department building two blocks west of Warm Springs Road, between 8th and 9th avenues. Sun Valley City Administrator James Brown said the funds became available when Pocatello was unable to

come up with its share of public transit project funds available under the grant. He said the rules of the federal program require that if one city in a state wins a grant and then cannot come up with matching funds, the grant must then fall to another city in the same state.

The new garage will be large enough to house 10 buses, though the KART system currently runs only five buses and a van in the winter-peak season. French said buses are now housed in a rented building behind Sun Valley Motors, which leaves little room to work on the buses when they are all parked there.

He said he has been trying to get a bus garage for the KART system since 1981 and leaped at the opportunity to pick up the federal funds in January, when Pocatello's project failed.

The KART system is a joint Sun Valley-Ketchum enterprise.

# Utah court to hear appeals from 2 convicted murderers

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Utah Supreme Court will hear separate appeals in September from convicted murderers Ronald Watson Lafferty and Wesley Allen Tuttle.

Lafferty's attorney will argue Sept. 9 and Tuttle's counsel will present his case a day later, court officials said Wednesday. Sandra L. Sjogren, assistant Utah attorney general, will argue both cases for the state.

Lafferty was sentenced to die for the slaying of his sister-in-law Brenda Lafferty, formerly of Kimberly, Idaho, and her daughter Erica. His brother Dan also was convicted of first-degree murder, but was sentenced to life in prison after the jury could not unanimously agree on the death penalty.

Ron Lafferty's attorney contends that his client was not competent to stand trial because he suffered brain damage from a Dec. 29, 1984, suicide attempt.

In March 1985, 4th District Judge J. Robert Bullock ruled that Lafferty had the capacity to understand court proceedings and was competent to stand trial.

Brenda Lafferty and her daughter were found dead on July 23, 1984, in their American Fork home.

The killings were linked to a purported revelation to Ron Lafferty calling for the "removal" of the victims and two other American Fork residents, Richard Stowe, a Mormon Church stake president, and Chloe Low, former president of the local Mormon relief society.

The hand-written document said the four people had become obstacles in the path of God, Ron and Dan Lafferty were excommunicated from the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints and were associated with a fundamentalist group known as the "School of the Prophets," which advocated polygamy.

Tuttle was convicted in the Sept. 26, 1983, stabbing death of Sidney Ann Merrick, whose body was found near Interstate 80 at Parley's Summit. He was convicted by a 3rd District Court jury on April 25, 1984, and sentenced to life in prison by Judge Philip R. Fishler.

He appealed to the Utah Supreme Court on July 9, 1984, but escaped from custody less than six weeks later.

# Downpour prompts minor power outages

HAILEY — A heavy downpour of rain following lightning damped Blaine County Thursday afternoon and caused a few minor outages.

The Blaine County Sheriff's Office in Hailey reported telephone service was out for short time in the courthouse during the peak of the late

afternoon storm. Rain was also heavy in Ketchum and Sun Valley, but no damage was reported by police stations.

The Idaho Power Co. maintenance division in Twin Falls said one fuse was blown in the Hailey area and only three people were without power

briefly. Cassia County, part of a heavy Idaho area under storm and flash flood warning Thursday had escaped weather problems as of 6 p.m.

Sheriff's officers said there had been nothing unusual but the warning was still in effect.

# Rainstorm helps crews put out range fire

BURLEY — U.S. Bureau of Land Management crews got some help from Mother Nature Wednesday in putting out a range fire on Cottonwood Creek, a mile above the foothill road, south of Twin Falls.

# Lady Liberty leads parade marking Utah's settlement

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Tens of thousands of people on Thursday lined a parade route in the heart of the city founded by Mormon pioneer Brigham Young, kicking off an annual celebration honoring Utah's hardy settlers.

Led by a float featuring a 40-foot-tall replica of the Statue of Liberty that folded down to avoid overhead obstacles, the Days of '47 Parade moved past cheering spectators, some of whom camped out two nights in a row to reserve the best seats.

The event caps Utah's most celebrated holiday, commemorating the arrival of Young and a band of followers on July 24, 1847. Young, upon beholding the Salt Lake Valley, is said to have chosen it by proclaiming, "This is the place."

The man whom Mormons today revere as Young's successor, 75-year-old church President Ezra Taft Benson, waved and smiled as he rode in a car next to the head of the parade with his wife, Flora.

Both Benson and Utah Gov. Norm Bangerter donned cowboy hats for the parade in keeping with the pioneer theme.

The 178 entries included antique automobiles, families in pioneer costumes, horse-drawn buggies and covered wagons. At least a dozen floats honored Lady Liberty's centennial with red, white and blue decor and patriotic motifs.

The air was filled with music provided by 23 marching bands. Among them were squads of bagpipers, reflecting the large proportion of Scottish and English ancestors among the state's population.

One marching band brought no instruments, but carried portable radios tuned to public radio station KUER. Band members were clad in hiking shorts and K&R-shirts.

The two-mile, three-hour procession on Pioneer Day, a state holiday, is billed as the nation's third largest parade.

Despite thunderstorms and some high winds, families had set up tents, lawn chairs and sleeping bags on sidewalks along the route as early as Tuesday evening. Parade day was partly cloudy but dry.

One woman and her infant daughter arrived late Thursday morning, but managed to get a good view of the parade by sitting atop a ladder behind the crowd.

Some who camped out Wednesday night witnessed

a traffic dispute that ended with a Salt Lake man, Jerry Sainz, 29, critically injured by a gunshot wound to the face.

Police Lt. Bill Gray said the shooting occurred after an argument between a motorcyclist and the driver of a pickup truck. The motorcycle rider, identified as Jeffrey Johnson, 28, was booked for investigation of attempted criminal homicide, Gray said.

Every able-bodied officer in the Salt Lake Police Department was on duty, although enforcement of local ordinances violated by many downtown campers was mild.

Police received a report that one group was charging \$8 per person to sit in a roped-off area. "We haven't been able to confirm that," but it's something I wouldn't doubt at all. It sounds like the typical film-film that goes on at this time of year," said Lt. Ken Thirk.

A dispatcher said the department was unable to estimate the size of the crowd.

Three road races before the parade drew 2,500 runners.

The invitational, Main Street Mile was won by American record holder Steve Scott. He was followed across the finish line by Doug Padilla, who holds the U.S. record for 3,000 meters and is ranked second in the world in the 5,000 meters.

The Desert News-KSL Radio Marathon was won for the second year straight by Alvaro Palacios. He was followed by 1983 camp Creighton King, former national champion miler Ed Eyestone won the 10,000-meter road race.

The races offered \$24,000 in prize money, the first time cash awards have been made.

Displays of pioneer crafts, dramatic readings and music continued throughout the day at Pioneer Trails State Park northwest of Salt Lake City near the mountain pass that brought settlers into the valley.

The KLCY Neighborhood Fair was planned at Liberty Park, ending with a fireworks show. At Sugarhouse Park, fireworks were to highlight a performance by the Utah Symphony at 10 p.m.

Rodeos were held in Salt Lake City, Ogden and other cities throughout the state. Most communities also sponsored parades, picnics, fireworks demonstrations and other activities.

# Court rules on fired professor

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has ruled that no financial emergency existed when a tenured professor was fired by the University of Idaho in 1981 on the grounds of monetary hardship.

In affirming a lower court decision handed down in November 1984 by 2nd District Judge Ron Schilling, the state's high court said Thursday that the University of Idaho and state Board of Education had the burden of proving a financial emergency, and failed.

The case stemmed from the 1981 firing of Lois Pace from the university's College of Agriculture. Ms. Pace was 51 at the time, a year away from being eligible to retire with full benefits.

The firing led to a censure of the university in 1983 by the American Association of University Professors, which said in December the

Court noted the lower court's finding that the board considered no other alternatives except layoffs when it declared the financial emergency.

"That contradicted the definition of 'financial exigency' contained in the school's handbook. The school defined financial exigency as a situation that 'cannot be adequately alleviated by means other than a reduction in the employment force.'"

The lower court ruled that the board did not consider freezing or reducing expenses, including salaries.

The Idaho Supreme Court also rejected the board's claims that it did not have the burden of proving a financial emergency existed.

Because the handbook also defined financial exigency as a "demonstrably bona fide imminent financial crisis," the court said it was up to the board to demonstrate why an emergency existed.

# Burley, county sign police pact

BURLEY, Idaho (AP) — The city of Burley and Cassia County have reached agreement on a plan for the county sheriff's department to assume police duties in the city.

A contract signed this week calls for the city to pay Cassia County \$636,570 for police protection for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1. However, city and county officials also signed a memorandum agreeing that the figure could change when budgets are set in September.

Public hearings are scheduled next month by both the city and county to collect comments on the agree-

ment, which also calls for Burley to turn its police vehicles and equipment over to the county.

If the city ever revives its police department, Cassia County would return equipment of equal value, according to the contract which still must be ratified by the Burley City Council and Cassia County Commission after public hearings.

Officials plan to form a joint law enforcement advisory panel including one council member, one county commissioner, one city resident appointed by the city and one county resident appointed by the

## Where's the big money? A sports franchise

NEW YORK (AP) — When Walter O'Malley realized that the cramped confines of Brooklyn were no financial match for the Hollywood hills, he moved his Dodgers to Los Angeles 28 years ago.

And that move, according to a survey by Fortune Magazine, transformed a team known as the Bums into the most valuable franchise in the history of professional sports. Today, the Dodgers are worth close to \$100 million, a figure approached only by the New York Yankees.

Citing estimates by "knowledgeable industry sources," the August edition of the magazine listed the approximate value of 98 American sports franchises. The Dodgers and the Yankees were rated 1-2, valued at between \$91 million and \$100 million.

So valuable are both teams, the magazine said, that the proceeds from the sale of either would be enough to buy eight to 10 NFL franchises.

Not surprisingly, the survey showed that the most valuable teams are



those in the largest markets. Third through sixth on the list are NFL franchises in New York, Los Angeles and Chicago.

Carrying a worth of \$76 million to \$90 million are the New York Giants, New York Jets, Los Angeles Rams, Los Angeles Raiders and Chicago Bears. Also in that bracket are the San Francisco 49ers and Dallas Cowboys.

The next-13 also are NFL franchises, headed by the Miami Dolphins, whose value is placed at

between \$71 million and \$75 million. Worth from \$66 million to \$70 million are the Washington Redskins, Philadelphia Eagles, Detroit Lions, Denver Broncos and Houston Oilers. A \$1 million to \$65 million price tag is placed on the Atlanta Falcons, Tampa Bay Buccaneers, New England Patriots, Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers.

The Green Bay Packers and Minnesota Vikings are next on the list, valued at \$56 million to \$59 million as are four baseball teams; the California Angels, Boston Red Sox, Detroit Tigers and New York Mets; The St. Louis Cardinals, Kansas City Chiefs, Seattle Seahawks, Cincinnati Bengals, San Diego Chargers, New

Orleans Saints, Indianapolis Colts and Buffalo Bills of the NFL and baseball's Philadelphia Phillies are worth \$51 million to \$55 million.

The first NBA franchise listed in the survey is the Boston Celtics, valued at between \$41 million and \$50 million. The Los Angeles Lakers, New York Knicks and Philadelphia 76ers of the NBA are next at \$36 million to \$40 million as are baseball's Kansas City Royals, Baltimore Orioles, Chicago Cubs, Chicago White Sox, Toronto Blue Jays, St. Louis Cardinals, Atlanta Braves and Montreal Expos.

Baseball's Cincinnati Reds, San Diego Padres and Minnesota Twins are grouped at \$31 to \$35 million



along with four hockey teams; the Montreal Canadiens, Edmonton Oilers, Toronto Maple Leafs and Calgary Flames. NBA teams in that bracket are the Houston Rockets, Chicago Bulls, Dallas Mavericks and New Jersey Nets.

Carrying a price tag of \$26 million to \$30 million are baseball's Milwaukee Brewers, Houston Astros, Oakland A's, Pittsburgh Pirates, San Francisco Giants, Texas Rangers, Cleveland Indians and Seattle Mariners. Also in that

category are the Quebec Nordiques and New York Rangers of the NHL.

The next 15 franchises are from the NBA. Listed at between \$21 million and \$25 million are the Detroit Pistons, Washington Bullets, Atlanta Hawks, Milwaukee Bucks and Phoenix Suns. Worth from \$16 million to \$20 million are the Denver Nuggets, Seattle SuperSonics, Utah Jazz, San Antonio Spurs, Indiana Pacers, Portland Trail Blazers, Golden State Warriors, Cleveland Cavaliers, Sacramento Kings and Los Angeles Clippers. Also in that group are the Detroit Red Wings; Philadelphia Flyers... Vancouver Canucks, Chicago Blackhawks and New York Islanders of the NHL.

The bottom 10, worth between \$10 million and \$15 million, are the Boston Bruins, St. Louis Blues, Winnipeg Jets, Washington Capitals, Hartford Whalers, Minnesota North Stars, Buffalo Sabres, Los Angeles Kings, New Jersey Devils and Pittsburgh Penguins of the NHL.

The survey did not include the value of stadium deals or real estate, the magazine said.

## Unknown Norwegian pledges to take IBF title from Spinks

NEW YORK — Steffen Tangstad showed up Thursday to talk about becoming a champion in a world not even recognized by his native Norway — the world of professional boxing.

The affable 27-year-old Tangstad will challenge unbeaten Michael Spinks for the International Boxing Federation heavyweight title on Sept.

6 at Las Vegas, Nev. Spinks, meanwhile, will arrive in Sun Valley, Idaho, today to open his training camp.

"He's unknown here, I know that," Danish promoter Mogens Palte said of the first Norwegian and only the second Scandinavian to challenge for at least a piece of the heavyweight title.

"But when he leaves here he'll be just as famous as Ingemar Johansson was when he knocked out

Floyd Patterson in 1959," Palte told a news conference.

Johansson, of Sweden, won the undisputed heavyweight title with a third-round knockout of Floyd Patterson in 1959. Patterson regained the championship in a rematch.

While Tangstad is generally unknown in this country, he should be familiar to boxing fans in Chicago.

After turning pro with a six-round draw at Oslo on Oct. 2, 1980,

Tangstad recalled, Norway banned professional boxing. He fought 15 of his next 17 bouts in Chicago.

"Then I got homesick," Tangstad said. So since late 1983, he has fought eight times in Denmark and once in London.

Of his return here for a chance at a world title, Tangstad said, "I would like to say as they say in America, 'fan-tas-tic.'"

Tangstad has a 24-2 record, with 15 knockouts. He is the European

champion, winning the title for a second time with a 12-round decision over John Westgard on April 18 at Randers, Denmark.

"I saw a short film clip of him, and he looks worthy of fighting for the championship," said the 29-year-old Spinks, who is the only light-heavyweight champion to win a heavyweight title.

Spinks, who is 29-0 with 19 knockouts, won the IBF title with a 15-round unanimous decision over

Larry Holmes on Sept. 21, 1985, at Las Vegas. In his only defense, he scored a 15-round split decision over Holmes at Las Vegas last April 19.

The scheduled 15-round bout at the Las Vegas Hilton will be televised live by HBO.

Also on the card, but not on the television show, will be a scheduled 15-round IBF light-heavyweight title by Stobodan Kacar of Yugoslavia against Bobby Czyz of Waukegan, Ill.

## 'Niners part company with Dean

Some, like Billy Sims, leave voluntarily. Others, like Fred Dean, suffer the indignity of being waived.

Dean, a four-time Pro Bowl selection, was released by the San Francisco 49ers Thursday after refusing the club's request to retire. Sims, the Detroit Lions' all-time rushing leader, retired Wednesday after not playing in a game since 1984 because of a knee injury.

Dean, a 34-year-old defensive end, had been the subject of trade

talks with Los Angeles Raiders owner Al Davis, who watched Dean work out Wednesday at the Raiders' camp in Oxnard. Davis had expressed concern about Dean's condition, particularly since Dean underwent arthroscopic surgery on his left knee a year ago.

Trade talks reportedly were hindered by Dean's hefty pay — \$125,000 for reporting and a \$290,000 salary.

Dean, who attended Louisiana Tech University, played with the San Diego Chargers from 1975

through 1980 before being traded to San Francisco early in the 1981 season. He was named Defensive Player of the Year in the American Football Conference in 1980 and won the same honor in the National Football Conference in 1981, when he helped the 49ers to a Super Bowl championship by recording 12 sacks in 14 games.

He set team records in 1983 with 17½ sacks, then had contract problems in 1984 and sat out the first 11 games, recording only four sacks that season. Last year, Dean had only three sacks following his pre-season surgery.

## UV football players arrested for conspiracy to sell cocaine

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) — Former University of Virginia tailback Barry Word, a New Orleans Saints' third-round draft pick, and Cavalier running back Howard Petty have been charged in an extensive cocaine investigation, federal prosecutors said Thursday.

Word and Petty, along with former placekicker Kenny Stadlin, were charged with conspiring to distribute less than one kilogram of cocaine.

If convicted, they could be fined \$250,000 and sentenced to up to 16 years in prison, said U.S. Attorney John Perry Alderman.

University President Robert M. O'Neil said athletes facing charges such as that against Petty must be suspended from the team until the case is resolved. A conviction would result in permanent removal from the athletic program.

O'Neil said the drug abuse program for athletes would be tightened this fall to include random testing.

Petty, a senior from Annapolis, Md., was the only person charged who is still a student at the university. Stadlin graduated this spring. Word left school last year after he

South resorted to some low cunning in trying to land today's slam. Unfortunately for him, East was in no position to be fooled.

South won dummy's spade king and immediately led dummy's club jack, looking like a man ready to take a finesse. However, the situation was clear for East. Since East held both missing honors, he flew right up with his ace and South's singleton king was snared. Back came a spade to South's ace and after drawing trumps, South tried another ruse. He led his diamond queen for a "China finesse," but this lost also. West had an easy cover and the slam went one down.

The slam makes if South chooses a legitimate line instead of opting for filam. He wins the first spade with his ace and after drawing trumps, he leads dummy's low club to his king, East's ace winning. East leads a diamond through South's vulnerable Q-10-9 and dummy's ace wins. Next, a ruffing finesse is taken against East's club queen and when this succeeds, South has two diamond discards on dummy's solid clubs.

## She puts years of birdwatching to good use

### Ketchum artist gives wildlife a silk habitat

KETCHUM — To most of us, birds represent little more than part of life's natural process. Many of us are not aware of the abundance of bird life around us, and when we venture from our city homes to the bird's country habitat, we seldom experience the beauty of their unique qualities.

Not so for a local Ketchum artist who has made her living from observing birds and eavesdropping on their surroundings.

For 12 years Jennifer Bellinger has been a birdwatcher. She does not take a camera or sketch pad with her, but instead records the images she sees in her mind's eye — the birds themselves, their habitat and surroundings. Then she returns to her Ketchum studio and recreates this image on another medium silk.

Bellinger, who is widely known for her one-of-a-kind batik paintings of birds, has been making serigraphs (commercially known as silkscreens) for the past three years with outstanding success.

Over the past 18 years, Bellinger has worked with fabric, wax and dyes in an artistic process known as batik. Serigraphy is similar in its conception to the batik process.

To create a painting, stencils are used to confine areas of col-

ored ink and a squeegee is then pulled across the stencil, or screen, to deposit the ink onto the paper. This becomes a lengthy process as Bellinger typically uses 14 or more colors in which a painting, and each color requires a separate stencil.

In batik, wax is used to reserve a color and resist subsequent colors. "The batik process and using birds compliment each other," Bellinger says, explaining that the texture of the fabric and the way the wax cracks brings out the feathers in her birds and adds a texture which does not come from the dyes alone.

Bellinger's medium is "very unusual" for wildlife subject matter, she says. Striving to stay away from the traditional craft aspects of silkscreening — scarves, pillows, shirts — Bellinger has created a name for herself.

She has had numerous one-woman shows throughout the Northwest and was commissioned to create several art pieces for public buildings for the state of Alaska. Her batiks were exhibited at the Cincinnati Museum of Natural History, and she also has various originals in both corporate and private collections across the country.

Her batik, "Pintails," was selected for display on a poster promoting the Anchorage Audubon Society's 1984 Alaska

The first musical entertainment of the 6-day event begins July 31 at Elkhorn Resort at Sun Valley, hosts Lost & Found, a Virginia bluegrass band that has toured the major festivals in the United States and Europe. The music strikes up again at 4:30 p.m. when Twilo Scofield takes the stage along with folk legend Barre Toelken & Friends. At 5:45 p.m. Belinda Bowler from Hope, Idaho will perform.

At 6:30 p.m. the festival's 'host' band from Hailey, The Boulder Brothers String Band, will hit the stage. The tempo picks up at 7:45 p.m. when Muzzle Braun and The Idaho Swing Band rolls through their set.

At 9 p.m. the musician everyone will be waiting for, but whom very few have heard of, will perform. The headline musician for the festival, Guy Clark, is a singer/songwriter from Texas whose 5-album career includes some of the finest country music ever written, says festival organizer Kil Neraas.

Most can identify Clark's work by songs recorded by other folk-country artists. "Hearbroke" recorded by Ricky Skaggs and songs for Johnny Cash, Bobby Bare and Jerry Jeff Walker are among Clark's accomplishments.

Major funding for the festival is provided by private donations from the people of the Wood River Valley. The concerts are free to the public, but donations are gladly accepted. The festival is sponsored by the Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities and workshops are funded in part by the Idaho Commission on the Arts.

The final fundraiser prior to the festival will feature Rosewood County Band at the Muleshoe in Hailey, on Sunday, July 27.

## Valley guild offers City Park art show

TWIN FALLS — The Magic Valley Art Guild will sponsor its 27th annual Arts and Crafts Festival in the City Park on Saturday and Sunday from 10 a.m. to 9 p.m. An array of hand made wares ranging from Indian beadwork and tooled leather to dian watercolors and bronze sculpture will be displayed for sale. Admission is free.

Charlote Kilfoyle will be chairman of the show for eight years. She explains the show's appeal. "It gives the public the opportunity to meet fine artists and craftspeople on an individual basis. They'll have time to stroll through the park with a little nostalgia and be able to actually speak with these creative people."

The Art Guild rules require that the artist be present to show his or her own work. This precludes commercialization of the show because a dealer or agent may not show other people's work. All designs must be original.

"This park show was started and will continue to be something that supports fine art and fine crafts," Kilfoyle said. "Anything that is a commercial pattern or mass produced is not allowed. There's a difference, I think, between a person who does ceramics and a person who does pottery."

The show draws exhibitors from around the intermountain region with about 80% from the Magic Valley.

"Last year we had 105 exhibitors. We're anticipating 110-115 this year. It's been growing every year. In 1984 we had 120 entries. Last year was good but we had interference from the Sawtooth Mountain Mama's show on the same weekend."

Kilfoyle said. "A lot of people spent one day with us and one day with them. That is something that we'll never do again. The way it works out now there is a circuit that they can actually run. They can go to this one and Sawtooth Mountain in Idaho."

Many artists also exhibit in galleries around national. Art buyers patronize shows like this one looking for quality work at prices lower than the galleries command.

In addition, the show is a reunion for many exhibitors who look forward to catching up on what their colleagues have been doing since last year.

There will be many watercolorists present, including Cliff Clegg from Pocatello who usually sets up a teepee and dresses in authentic leather garb. Other painters include Joan Sargent of Murtaugh, Carol Barton who has a studio in Twin Falls; Diane Van Dine who travels the West and is noted for her 'oceanscapes'; and Lee Meyers, an oil painter. Gary Stone of Kimberly is nationally known for his historical wood carvings and paintings which reflect Idaho themes.

Danny Edwards, who has Silverthip Studios in Twin Falls, and Jerry Black of Buhl will exhibit bronze sculpture.

Bill West of Jerome and Brent Loman of Pocatello will show their pottery. Mr. Loman is an art teacher at the University of Idaho and will also exhibit paintings.

There will be a number of weavers including Peg Sasser and Beverly Ziegler. Hugh Taylor is a Magic Valley resident who creates bowls, dollies and other items of wood. Artis Allen of Hagerman will be back with leatherwork as will Gus Flowers with metal sculpture.

Wildlife art show, juried by world-famous bird artist and naturalist Roger Tory Peterson.

Locally, many will recognize another of her batik's, "Mallards," which beautifies a poster advertising the 1985 Silver Creek Nature Conservancy dinner-auction.

Bellinger has discovered being a successful artist depends on how well you can market yourself. She says 30 percent of her work has been sold through galleries and shows, but 70 percent has come directly through her own efforts.

"I do everything—I'm a jack of all trades," she says as she explains how the business-side of her profession and travel take away from the creative time she has to devote to her paintings.

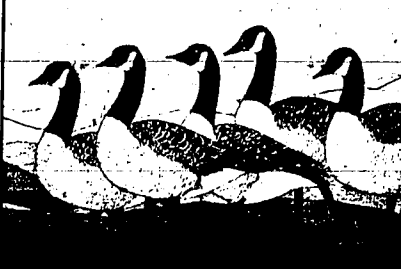
Birdwatching is her 'free' time and she relishes the chance to go to Silver Creek or spots in Arizona and California to observe the subjects she will one day put on silk.

"People always comment about the feeling that comes through the picture, but often I'm not aware of that," says Bellinger.

She concentrates more on the design elements of the piece. Whereas an oil artist can 'scrape off' her mistakes, Bellinger must live with or throw away any less than perfect results.

"There's no backtracking or overlapping in this work and you have to know what your end result will be," Bellinger says. For this reason, a great amount of time is spent designing her creation, far greater than the time spent laying down the dyes and waxes.

Once the design is completed, it may take three weeks to finish one print. But for Bellinger it is a labor of love. "One of the most satisfying things to being an artist is seeing someone buy your work and part with their hard-earned dollars," she notes. For this Ketchum artist, it is the finest measure of compliment and success.

# 'Heartburn' is a poor movie rich with big-name talent

former to be shunted off to the sidelines a little more than halfway through the film. Particularly when he has been banished for infidelity and we have no more idea just why he strayed than his wife does.

It is at that half-way-plus mark that the film begins to unravel. Nichols has been able to divert us buoyantly enough until this point, with elements like Nestor Almendros' rich and infinitely civilized camerawork.

**HOLLYWOOD** — Watching director Mike Nichols' "Heartburn" is like having your pocket picked by Raffles himself: You can admire the audacity and the professionalism all you want, but you have still been robbed.

This is a rattlingly empty and surface film — which is not to say it does not have individually delicious moments. How could it not, with Meryl Streep, Jack Nicholson, Stockard Channing, Richard Masur and Alan Rickman on the premises? Just recalling some of the high points can bring a daffy glow of pleasure hours later. But strung-together moments are not a movie; "Heartburn" is thin stuff from rich talents.

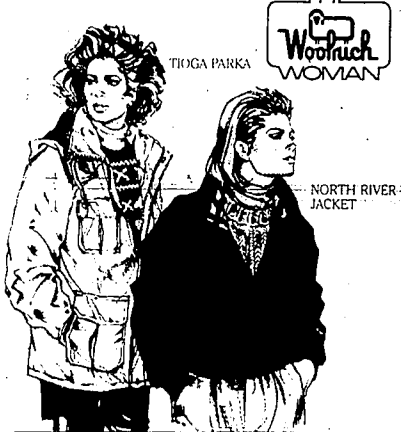
It is missing even a point of view. As we watch Streep and Nicholson, a pair of snugly established writers, propel themselves into love (targetly on the basis of her ability to whip up Spaghetti Carbonara at 4 a.m. at his place their first night together), then marriage, then parenthood, then infidelity, we do not know what emotion director Mike Nichols is courting. A sense of loss? A twinge of identity? A sense of the futility of marriage today? A suspicion that journalists make lousy husbands?

(You might have trouble with the last because, word processor aside, Jack Nicholson never seems connected by so much as an editor or a phone call to any profession at all — much less that of a Washington columnist.)

Presumably Nora Ephron, "Heartburn's" screenwriter, wrote the extremely slim book on which it was based in white heat — it was, after marriage to Washington Journalist Carl Bernstein (in the thinnest of disguises). Brittle, exhaustingly gay and relentlessly in-groupy, the best thing about the book, actually, was Ephron's recipes — soothing food for the very, very, very thin or wretched, featuring cream, potatoes, rice, butter or a felicitous arrangement of all four.

The movie's tone is gentled, but not deepened, and seen exclusively from the wife's view point. Presumably director Nichols felt that Ephron's on-the-nose vignettes about upscale Washington life told us enough. If so, he misjudged. Her screenplay needs more ballast; it is insubstantial as smoke. And the casting throws things out of whack. Nicholson is far too strong a per-

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# Science fiction sequel tops the charts

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Aliens," the sequel to 1979's stylish science-fiction hit "Alien," topped the box office chart during its premiere weekend, knocking "The Karate Kid, Part II" out of first place for the first time in four weeks.

"Aliens," a 20th Century Fox release starring Sigourney Weaver, earned \$10 million in one of the strongest opening weekends of the summer.

The "Karate Kid" sequel, which stars Ralph Macchio and Pat Morita, still grossed \$3.6 million for a five-week total of \$61.1 million.

Two other new releases, "Vamp" and "Pirates" opened poorly in nationwide release, earning a little more than \$2.1 million and \$1 million, respectively. Both failed to place in the weekend's 10 most profitable films, although New World's "Vamp," starring Grace Jones, placed 11th.

In third place was "Ruthless People," a comedy from Disney's Touchstone unit, with a weekend take of \$4.5 million after three weeks in release.

Another comedy, Rodney Dangerfield's "Back to School," also was pushed down a notch, from the fourth, earning \$4.25 million in weekend ticket sales after five weeks in release.

The story of the best fighter pilots in the U.S. Navy, "Top Gun," continued to prove itself as the summer's top-grossing film. The movie, which also has a rock soundtrack flying high on Billboard magazine's record chart, added \$4 million to bring its 10-week total gross of \$35.3 million and place fifth.

Tri-Star's romantic comedy "About Last Year" moved up from ninth to sixth place, earning \$3.4 million.

In seventh place was Paramount's "Ferris Bueller's Day Off." Universal's "Legal Eagles" followed so closely, earning only about \$6,000 less out of weekend receipts of more than \$2.7 million, that the two were essentially tied.

Rounding out the field in ninth place was "Running Scared," the action-comedy starring Billy Crystal and Gregory Hines, and in 10th, "Club Paradise," a comedy built around comedian Robin Williams in a rundown Caribbean resort.

# Runaway hit 'Aliens' almost crashed

HOLLYWOOD — The box-office numbers are in, and for once the advance word — "the buzz" — was on the money.

In its first five days, "Aliens" took in a healthy \$13.4 million at 1,437 theaters. Seven years after Ridley Scott's space-movie classic "Alien" first arrived, "Aliens" looks like the runaway hit of the summer and may even surpass "Top Gun" when all the counting is done.

But "Aliens" almost did not make it to the screen.

In an era when it seems as if half the current releases are sequels feeding off yesterday's fare, "Aliens" almost crashed and burned.

At one point, 20th Century Fox, the studio releasing the film, nearly sold the rights to the sequel to the producers of "Rambo." During production of "Aliens," director James Cameron and producer Gale Anne Hurd (Cameron's wife) quit over a long-running budget feud and her insistence on keeping Sigourney Weaver as the star.

Today the line is "Aliens" snake around the block at most screenings. The line to take credit for making "Aliens" is only slightly shorter. If movie-making is a collaborative art, the story behind the making of "Aliens" offers classic evidence that the number of contributors increases exponentially with the success of a film.

What follows is a kind of captain's log of the birth, near-death and ultimate triumph of a film that in hindsight looks like a project that could not fail.

Originally, there were those who thought just the opposite — that "Alien" (which has taken more than \$100 million in worldwide ticket sales to date) was some kind of cinematic freak and that audiences had seen enough of the slimy parasite. After these naysayers are suddenly hard to find.

Spring 1983: Fox put the sequel in development after settling a protracted lawsuit brought by "Alien" producers David Giler, Gordon Carroll and Walter Hill over the disbursement of profits. The deal did not require the studio to release the film, just to put the project into development (paying a creative team to come up with a concept for the movie). While then-studio President Joe Wizan now says he endorsed the idea, several insiders say others were cool to it. "Norman Levy (then

vice chairman at the studio) wouldn't even hear about it," Giler said. "He thought it would be a disaster."

Levy, now a marketing consultant, doubted the sequel. "Legal Eagles" "Aliens." "I don't recall ever saying that. It was a movie I wanted to make," he said. "I was concerned about the cost and whether or not we were in a posture to take on a big-budget film like that. It was a question of economics." "Aliens" was eventually made for about \$18.5 million, before expenses for prints and advertising.)

But Giler insisted that Levy was strongly opposed. "I was introduced to John Davis at a bar one night," and I was making Fox's year-end (Marvin Davis, owner of the studio at the time) going to make the sequel? He said: 'Never. Norman Levy is going to save my father millions by not making that movie.'"

John Davis, now an independent producer at Fox, remembered meeting Giler but said he did not remember any conversation about "Aliens." "It's simply not a true story," he said.

Summer 1983: Larry Wilson, a development executive working for the Phoenix Co. (Giler's production company), was searching for writers for "Aliens." He came across a script called "The Terminator" by James Cameron and could not put it

down. "It was electrifying," Wilson said. "I put the script on David's (Giler) desk and said, 'This is the "Rambro" but the lawyers could not close the deal. Prospects for a sequel looked dim."

July 1984: Independent producer Larry Gordon was hired to replace former studio production head Joe Wizan. Finding few projects in the production pipeline, he looked for possible sequels and came across the "Aliens" file. "I couldn't believe it hadn't already been done," Gordon told me he didn't like the treatment because it was wall-to-wall horror and it needed more character development. "At one point a deal

was almost closed to sell the rights to the sequel to producers Mario Kassar and Andrew Vanja ("Rambo") but the lawyers could not close the deal. Prospects for a sequel looked dim."

# Sailor salutes those who sent letters

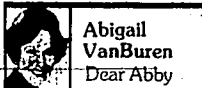

# Women discover their freedom can contribute to new problems

The women's movement that began in the early '60s reshaped our world, from sexual attitudes to a greater presence in the boardroom. Women now comprise almost half of the nation's work force. More than half of American professionals are women. But women have found that their newfound personal and economic freedom has exacted a heavy toll.

On Wednesday, July 30, ABC presents "After the Sexual Revolution," a three-hour "Closeup" documentary that explores the negative side effects of the women's movement on women's careers; relationships and families. From construction workers to homemakers to CEOs, there's been a price to pay. All over the country, women are coping with scanty support payments, unequal pay for jobs of comparable worth, "serial relationships," non-existent child-care facilities and the ominous tick of biological clocks. And women are still looking for answers.

"The documentary says, 'This is where we are in 1986 — think about it,'" says Betsy Aaron, the ABC News correspondent who reported the program along with Richard Threlkeld and anchor Peter Jenn-

ings. "Everyone in this documentary is an expert — that's the problem with drawing conclusions. We're all groping. The hard times of the women's revolution in the home and workplace still are ahead of us.

"It's three hours of a lot of unhappy people. We have work ahead of us; men and women need to work it out together. And if we don't do it, and do it fast, there will be a lot of unhappy men and women, and a lot of unhappy children. We're throwing out the old rules and not replacing them with anything else."

Aaron is particularly suited to reporting "After the Sexual Revolution": She has been married to fellow ABC News correspondent Threlkeld for three years. And has succeeded in both her marriage and career.

"We work hard at it," she says. "Life is a compromise. People tell me it must be glamorous to be a reporter. It's not. It's glamorous to be in love."

That conjugal bliss comes from continual give-and-take, insists Aaron, — the same dialogue and awareness that the documentary tries to provoke.

"The one thing about this documentary is that everybody has a different experience. Elements in

it that my husband found new and fascinating I've been living for 48 years," Aaron says.

"After the Sexual Revolution" posits no answers; instead, it highlights the unique problems in the lives of diverse women. We meet Judy Kramer, an unmarried woman who has decided to have a baby through artificial insemination. Naomi Allen is a subway-car welder who battles her co-workers' attitudes daily. Her boss Sal DeRosa says, "You know, she does a good job," but adds, "Myself, I can't picture her doin' this job. A couple of times I tried getting her a job in the office." There are women (and some men) in these three hours that you just want to bear-hug for their courage and pain; there are others you'd prefer to throttle for their close-mindedness.

"The best way to watch this documentary," suggests Aaron, "is with a member of the opposite sex or someone from another generation."

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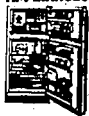

# 'Loving' star hides spiritual self to play role of evil blackmailer

You can't accuse the producers of "Loving" of casting by type when they gave Jeff Trachta the role of Hunter Belden, that completely evil guy who has dabbled in drugs, blackmail, prostitution and many other nefarious deeds. Jeff spent eight years in a seminary and almost became a Catholic priest. This real-life scenario rivals even the most far-fetched plots on soaps.

Jeff's road from the seminary to TV soaps is a very interesting one. The young man decided at age 20 that he didn't need to wear a collar to be a priest and set out in the world to be as good a Christian as he knew how. This entailed earning a bachelor's degree in psychology from St. John's University and taking a job as a recreational coordinator at Angelus Plaza in Los Angeles.

Jeff looks upon this 18-month period as really fulfilling and rewarding. There were 1,500 old people at the center and Jeff learned a great deal about living in the real world after his somewhat sheltered existence in the seminary. Many of the old women at the center thought Jeff was as handsome as the actors they saw on the soap operas and encouraged him to "go and be a movie star."

At first Jeff just laughed it off, but after a while he thought about it and decided to give it a try. He knew a girl who was studying at the American Academy of Dramatic Arts and decided to enroll. During this period of study Jeff found his powers of concentration (a carryover from his theological student days) served him well. He also had a natural quality, according to his teachers. Jeff knew that he had found his life's work and immersed himself totally in his new craft.

Jeff worked many odd jobs between acting assignments. In fact, six months before he was cast as Hunter Belden he was working part-time in a New York hair salon, sweeping up the cuttings of such famous clients as Robert Redford.

Jeff never doubted that he would make it. "Despite the many menial jobs I had, I knew I would get better things. I just kept the faith."

# NBC wins prime-time; CBS takes news crown

NEW YORK — NBC placed its four Thursday comedies in the Top Five and scored a narrow victory in the prime-time ratings last week, while "CBS Evening News" was an outright winner in dinnertime news for the first time in a month, figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

In prime time, NBC averaged a 12.5 rating to ABC's 12.2 and CBS' 12.0. ABC benefited from baseball's All-Star Game, a close contest, won by the American League 3-2, that increased audience throughout the night and ranked fourth with a 20.3 rating, on par with last year's 20.5.

The half a ratings point separating NBC from CBS marked the closest three-network race in prime time since the week ending Sept. 1, 1985, said Greg Kasparian, CBS' director of audience measurement.

Despite finishing third in prime time, CBS was buoyed by increased ratings from its "Magnum, P.I." - "Equalizer" summertime switch and the best performance this season from its precarious news magazine, "West 57th."

"West 57th" ranked 40th out of 65 shows with a 10.5 rating, 20 share, an improvement over its 12-week average of 8.6-16. The 13th and last installment of its current run is Wednesday. CBS Broadcast Group President Gene Jankowski has said he would gauge the program's ratings potential, then make the decision on renewal after the final episode.

CBS' other good news came with the first-place finish of "CBS Evening News" with Dan Rather, which had a 10.3 rating, 23 share. "NBC Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw averaged a 9.8-22. ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings had a 9.1-20.

As evidence of the hotly contested news race, "CBS Evening News," in the previous three weeks, had tied for first and also finished second and third. The last time Rather's newscast was alone on top was the week ending June 20.

A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television. A share measures the percentage of homes with their sets on that are tuned to a broadcast.

NBC's "The Cosby Show" ranked first in prime time for the week of July 14-20 with a 25.6 rating, 50 share. NBC's "Family Ties" was se-

cond, followed by NBC's "Cheers," ABC's All-Star Game, NBC's "Night Court," NBC's "The Golden Girls," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," NBC's "Me & Mrs. C.," CBS' movie, "One Cooks, the Other Doesn't," and ABC's All-Star pre-game show.

The next 10 programs included CBS' comedies "Kate & Allie" and "Newhart," which tied for 11th, CBS' "60 Minutes," CBS' "Magnum, P.I.," ABC's movie, "Jaws," ABC's "20-20," NBC's "Miami Vice" and ABC's movie, "The Dollmaker," which tied for 17th, NBC's "You Again?" and NBC's "Crazy Dan."

The 14th-place ranking for "Magnum, P.I." indicated that Tom Selleck has flourished away from Bill Cosby's shadow. Ranked 46th last season when it competed against the No. 1 "Cosby Show" on Thursdays, "Magnum" has found life on Tuesdays at 9 p.m. EDT this summer.

Last week, a "Magnum" repeat, up against the All-Star Game, scored a 13.4 rating, its best performance since February. "It was better than some of its original broadcasts," Kasparian said.

"The Equalizer" also has shown ratings growth this summer, ranking 22nd last week. One of only two new shows renewed by CBS, "The Equalizer" is running in tandem with "Magnum" this summer, with both shows moving to Wednesdays in the fall.

In on-air promotions, CBS is touting "Magnum" and "Equalizer" as the action-adventure alternative. In the fall, the two Universal productions will have a cross-over plot that will link the shows' two stars, Selleck and Edward Woodward.

# FCC chief Quello: Cable firms have too much market control

WASHINGTON — The cable television industry has too much control over what TV stations a viewer can watch, a Federal Communications Commissioner said Monday.

Commissioner James H. Quello, a former broadcaster, said he will urge his fellow commissioners to reinstate rules that require cable TV companies to carry all local TV stations on their systems.

The issue is set for an FCC vote by Aug. 7.

Quello said he did not know how his four colleagues would react because he sent his memorandum after the FCC offices were closed for the day. He read the letter to The Associated Press.

He said he feared that giving cable systems the power to pick and choose which stations a viewer could see would frustrate years of commission work in awarding channels to cities and towns where it had determined an additional TV station would best serve the public interest.

He said the court has created a "serious imbalance by giving the cable industry inordinate control over the broadcast services."

A federal appeals court here overturned the commission's long-standing "must carry" rules in July 1985, saying the free-speech clause of the Constitution forbid the government to tell a cable company what programs it must transmit.

The commission, with Quello in the minority, voted not to appeal the

decision to the Supreme Court.

However, the court invited the commission to recast the rule in a way that satisfies the requirements of the Constitution, suggesting that the commission has not demonstrated a compelling federal interest.

He said he is opposed to an agreement hammered out by broadcast and cable interests which would establish some "must carry" requirements, but allow less popular stations to be dropped.

The National Association of Public Television Stations said separately on Monday that, since the "must carry" rule was invalidated, at least 30 public stations have been dropped from a cable system in their local coverage area.

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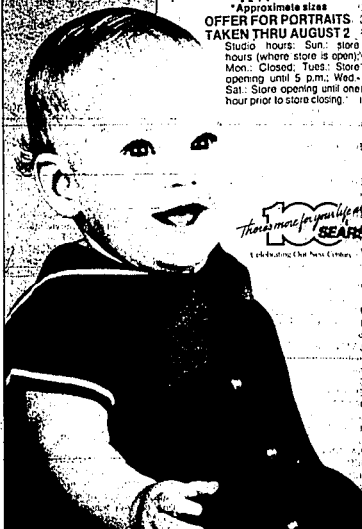

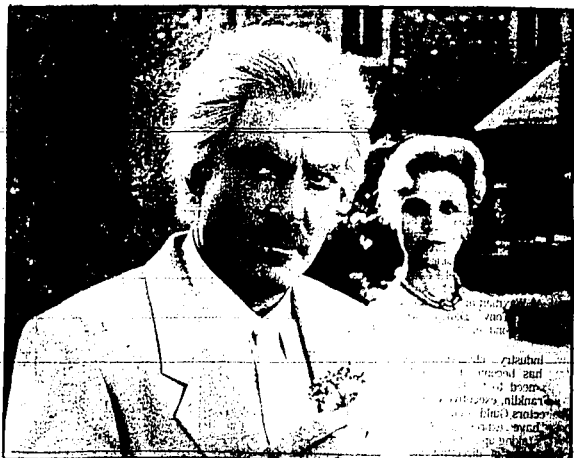

# Actors discover they like the view when seated in the director's chair

HOLLYWOOD — James Brolin, star of ABC's "Hotel," pulled his co-star, Connie Sellecca, toward him as she whispered seductively about the fine points of Puccini's "La Boheme," playing in the background.

She leaned over and blew out one candle and then another. The lighting on the sound stage dimmed. They drew closer.

But as their lips started to touch, Brolin shifted Sellecca's head to catch a reflection and shouted into her face, "How's the lighting now?"

Those words were not in the script, and they were aimed not at Sellecca but at the camera crew 10 feet behind her. Brolin was not only acting in the episode being rehearsed, but directing it. It is the eighth episode he has directed since making his directorial debut two seasons ago.

He has joined a club that the Directors Guild of America reports is becoming less exclusive: TV directors who direct episodes of their own series.

Don Johnson made his directorial debut on "Miami Vice" last season. So did Edward James Olmos on the same series. Kate Jackson on "Scarecrow and Mrs. King," Linda Gray on "Dallas" and John Larroquette on "Night Court."

Other actor-directors on current series are Robert Foxworth of "Falcon Crest," Larry Hagman and Patrick Duffy of "Dallas," Roger Mosley of "Magnum, P.I.," Gerald McRaney of "Simon & Simon," William Daniels and Eric Laneville of "St. Elsewhere," Michael Landon and Victor French of "Highway to Heaven," Al Waxman of "Cagney & Lacey" and Tony Danza and Katherine Helmond of "Who's the Boss?"

Many industry observers say directing has become a plum for stars who need to be kept happy. Michael Franklin, executive director of the Directors Guild, said some TV directors have expressed concern about stars taking up so many of the limited number of directing slots. "We have not taken a position," Franklin said.

And executive producers do not necessarily like tossing this particular plum to their stars.

"It takes up a great deal of their

time and energy," said "Dallas" executive producer Leonard Katzman. "I would be just as happy if shows were written by writers and directed by directors and acted by actors."

There is also the fear that permitting one actor to direct can open a floodgate: Steve Kanaly and Ken Kercheval of "Dallas" will each direct their first episode this season, bringing to five the number of series regulars whose contracts guarantee them directorial assignments.

"Any of the actors that get a certain amount of clout want to direct," Katzman said, referring to the industry at large. "I cannot tell you why."

The answer is more for love than for money. The going rate for directors on hourlong episodic TV is \$17,935 per episode, a pittance in contrast to the \$1 million to \$2 million a year that most top series stars are paid.

But mostly, actors who consider themselves creative souls go behind the cameras out of sheer boredom.

"I felt I had to do it as — if you'll excuse me — an artist," Kate Jackson said last week, shortly after directing a "Scarecrow" episode. "Every day I'm this character Amanda King, and I can get a little

tired of her. She can bore me stiff after a while."

The tradition of TV stars directing suggests that there is life after the cover of TV Guide for actors with the requisite talent and drive.

Alan Alda, who first directed episodes of "MASH," parlayed that skill into his current feature-film career, having written and directed two films, "The Four Seasons" and "Sweet Liberty." William Shatner cut his teeth behind the cameras on "T.J. Hooker" and is now said to be the front-runner to direct the next "Star Trek" feature following the release of "Star Trek IV," in which he stars.

Directing experience is part of Michael Landon's clout. He is the exceedingly rare quadruple-threat: executive producer, writer, star and director on the hit show "Highway to Heaven."

Landon wrangled his first directorial assignment from producer David Dortort 23 years ago when he was starring as Little Joe on "Bonanza." Now that he is the boss, he has given himself 17 "Highway" episodes to direct out of the 24 to air this season.

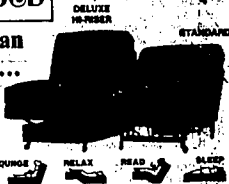

## PBS special 'The Eye of Birds' tells story of political prisoners

NEW YORK — The debate between advocates of quiet diplomacy and those who would make as much noise as possible about the abuses of police states is taken up Sunday in the final installment of PBS' "International Television" series.

"The Eyes of Birds," a 90-minute drama set in Libertad prison in Uruguay, was filmed in France because, obviously, no government is apt to cooperate in an expose of its war on its own citizens. Director Gabriel Auer said 18 months of research was invested in making the film as realistic as possible.

It's not presented as a documentary, but Auer shows the authorities plotting to bamboozle the Red Cross and discussing psychological and drug treatments to break prisoners.

Produced in 1983 and seen in a score of countries, the film is very late in reaching an American audience. It's been more than a year since all of Uruguay's political prisoners were released by a new civilian government.

The return of civilian rule in Uruguay — and in Argentina and Brazil, — is really only a footnote to appreciating "The Eyes of Birds," however, because vicious governments of the right or the left are not very imaginative. They tend to

treat their opponents in the same stupid, sadistic way.

Those who oppose the regime are suspected of trying to overthrow it, often at the behest of outside forces such as the CIA or the Kremlin. Prisoners are tortured, run through kangaroo courts and locked up for indefinite periods.

"The Eyes of Birds" tells of a visit to Libertad prison by three representatives of the International Red Cross. The inspectors find a clean, well-lighted prison directed by officers who say their aim is to be "firm but tolerant."

"But they're using us," the younger man argues. "They'll say they have the Red Cross' blessing."

# Camille Cosby pointed out need for father figure in Bill's hit show

NEW YORK — It was Bill Cosby's real wife who suggested that his TV wife need a father.

Camille Cosby also picked the dad for Clair Huxtable on "The Cosby Show." He's Bill Williams, who's known mainly as a singer.

So, in early 1985 when Cosby was performing with Sammy Davis at Caesar's Palace in Las Vegas where Williams lives, Cosby invited the singer to the hotel and greeted him with: "You're Bill Williams, aren't you?"

"I'm what?"

Cosby explained that he wanted Williams to be part of the family on "The Cosby Show."

Grandpa Al and Grandma Ethel (Ethel Ayers) were on one episode of the show last season and Williams thinks they'll appear about one each season.

For Grandpa Al's reminiscences on the show, the writers used episodes from Williams' own childhood in Chicago.

"I sold fruits and vegetables when I was a kid," Williams says. "I'd get a wagon and go to the market early and buy a bushel of peaches. I'd sell peaches in the neighborhood to make some money."

Cosby and Williams have been friends since the early 1960s.

"When I met Bill he was still a student at Temple University in Philadelphia," Williams says. "He had a cousin who was a disc jockey there. He interviewed me and Bill came to listen. Gradually, we sort of pulled Bill into the conversation."

Williams, who made his professional debut in 1937 with the late Jimmy Noone, sang with the Basie Band from 1954 to 1961.

At 63, he talks as if he'd like to slow down, but he's still busy.

On New Year's Eve, he appeared on a live PBS-TV show at a jazz club in Baltimore.

"Now, two guys who saw that program have come to my agent with a stage play they want me to do next summer," he says. "It's about a singer who goes through all these things singers go through. They probably said to themselves, 'We can get him to work. Anybody who works New Year's Eve is a glutton for punishment.'"

Williams sings on Caribbean jazz cruises; at festivals, in hotels and clubs, working about 40 weeks a year. This summer he appeared

three weeks in June in Atlantic City and two weeks in July in Las Vegas. Then he hits the golf course.

"The first week I'll play 27 holes a day," he says. "The second week I'll find myself humping snatches of things. I'll start writing them down and hanging out with a couple of arrangers. The next thing you know, I'm planning something."

Count Basie hired him, Williams says, on the advice of his musicians.

"I went by the Trianon Ballroom to hear the band. The guys asked me to sing 'Roll 'em Pete' with them. I was told later the fellows told Basie, 'That's it. Get him.'"

"Basie called me to his hotel room. He said, 'Why don't you come with me and see people all over? You're top dog in the Midwest but tomorrow they'll talk about young so and so.' I knew that; I remembered when I was the young so and so they were talking about."

"Basie said, 'I can't give you what you're worth. But, things get better for me, they get better for you.' I had the good sense to go with him."

Williams hoots when people discuss what Basie "forced" him to sing. "He taught me to fight for what I wanted, even if I had to fight somebody I loved — him. I got the lesson. Everything, except one song, I chose."

"Somebody played 'All Right, Okay, You Win' on a jukebox. Basie said, 'You ought to sing that. But you'll never sing it as well as Ella Johnson with the Buddy Johnson Orchestra.' He knew what he was doing. I got together with arranger Frank Foster and we did it. Peggy Lee had a big record on it, too. Dinah Shore recorded it and Marlene Dietrich included it in her show."

Williams says he's having no trouble with his voice even at his age.

"I'm most pleasantly surprised at what still comes out of my throat," he says. "I'm thrilled and thankful. I remember Edward (Duke Ellington) saying, 'I'm just a messenger boy for God.' Much of what we do comes through us. I thank God for what comes through me."

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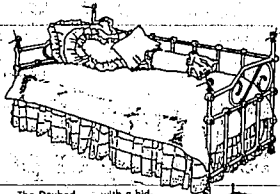
