U.S., Japan conclude 5-year chip accord

WASHINGTON — Japan has agreed to stop selling computer chips at bargain basement prices in the United States and to grant U.S. semiconductor manufacturers a larger share of their own market, the Reagan administration said Thursday.

The five-year accord, in one of the strictest of all trade disputes between the two nations, could increase sales of import-besieged U.S. semiconductor manufacturers by \$2 billion, U.S. Trade Representative Clayton Yetter said at a news briefing.

"This may have been the most difficult bilateral trade agreement ever negotiated," Yetter said.

In exchange for the Japanese concessions, the United States agreed to dismiss a series of unfair trading complaints accusing Japan of "dumping" the electronic devices in this country at prices below what it costs to make them.

Officials said the agreement, following

months of negotiations and several missed U.S.-imposed deadlines, came one minute before midnight Wednesday, just as the Commerce Department was preparing to go ahead with hefty penalty duties on the Japanese products.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said the United States would resurrect those cases should it detect new evidence of Japanese dumping.

"We were getting our lunch eaten here by dumping," Baldrige said. "A lot of Americans have been put out of jobs by dumping practices initiated by the Japanese."

Semiconductors — or chips — are the tiny electrical circuits, usually made of silicon, that store information and perform a variety of other tasks in computers and a wide array of other electronic devices.

World semiconductor sales soared to \$25 billion last year, with Japan and the United States each accounting for roughly \$10 billion of that market.

U.S. semiconductor manufacturers hailed the agreement, which they helped frame. "With commitment, good faith and hard work on both sides, this agreement can be an opportunity to begin a new era in trade relations between our two electronics in-

dustries," said George Sauter, a spokesman for the Semiconductor Industry Association.

In a statement read by Yetter, President Reagan said the agreement "shows that vigorous enforcement of existing laws can open markets. It is a success in the temptation of protectionism will benefit no one."

The U.S. semiconductor industry claims that competition from low-cost Japanese computer chips has driven entire American companies out of business and resulted in the loss of some 50,000 jobs.

"It's going to put people back to work" in these areas, Yetter said.

Jenco gives archbishop his message

LONDON — The Rev. Lawrence Jenco, freed after nearly 19 months of captivity in Lebanon, conveyed a secret message Thursday from his Muslim kidnappers to the archbishop of Canterbury.

The Roman Catholic priest later had a surprise reunion with another former American hostage, Presbyterian minister Benjamin Weir.

Jenco, who was visibly ailing, told a news conference that his captors gave him a Bible, and that he prayed, "God, I'm no Job." The Old Testament tells the story of the tribulations Job faced as a test of his faith.

The 51-year-old Jenco delivered the kidnappers' message to Archbishop of Canterbury Robert Runcie, spiritual head of the Church of England, during a private meeting in the prelate's study at Lambeth Palace.

The contents of the message were not disclosed, but Jenco said it was the same one he gave Pope John Paul II on Wednesday at the Vatican.

Terry Waite, whom Runcie sent to Lebanon several times last year to try to win the hostages' freedom, said he would issue a joint response from both churches at a news conference today.

Jenco is to fly to Washington later today to deliver a message from the kidnappers to President Reagan.

The kidnappers, members of a Shiite underground group called Islamic Jihad, are known to be holding three other Americans hostage. They claimed to have killed a fourth American hostage, but his body has not been found.

Waite said the kidnappers' message to Reagan was "different in character — the message — to the religious leaders."

But Jenco said he had not told Waite or anyone else what the kidnappers wanted him to say to Reagan. "It's in my heart," he said. "It's only in my heart, and no one else knows it."

Jenco, of Joliet, Ill., was kidnapped in Moslem West Beirut on Jan. 8, 1985. He was freed last Saturday in eastern Lebanon's Bekaa Valley.

His captors cited his deteriorating health as a reason for letting him go. Doctors who examined him at a U.S. Air Force hospital in West Germany said he suffers from heart disease.

Waite said Jenco wanted to deliver the

messages personally to the pope, the archbishop and Reagan "to make sure, absolutely sure, that there was no doubt at all in the captors' mind that he had kept his promise."

Waite, a lay member of the Anglican Church, refused to say what role if any he had in gaining Jenco's freedom — he was in Amman, Jordan, at the time of Jenco's release, and would say only that his presence in the region "was not coincidental."

After seeing Runcie, Jenco was reunited with Weir, the 61-year-old Presbyterian minister who was held captive by Islamic Jihad for 16 months before being released last September. The two clerics last saw each other when they were hostages together.

They embraced warmly, and Jenco kissed Weir on both cheeks.

At a news conference, Jenco, pale, drawn and speaking in a low voice, said the reunion with

Weir was a "very deep emotional strain." Weir was not at the news conference.

Saying he felt "not that alert right now," Jenco asked reporters to direct questions to Waite. However, he did speak briefly about his captivity and managed some humorous comments.

He compared himself to the movie character E.T., an extra-terrestrial creature marooned on Earth who kept saying in deep, drawn-out tones, "Home, home."

"I want to go home," said Jenco, mimicking E.T.'s voice.

Before the news conference, Runcie and Jenco went into the small chapel at Lambeth Palace to give thanks for the priest's release and pray for the remaining hostages, the archbishop said.

Runcie said the Anglican and Roman Catholic churches have worked closely to secure the hostages' release and will continue their efforts.

Jail, insurance costs soar County facing big tax boost

TWIN FALLS — About \$1.3 million in property taxes will have to be raised to pay for anticipated increased costs for indigent medical bills, liability insurance and the Twin Falls County jail during the 1987 fiscal year.

This year the total tax levy for Twin Falls County raised about \$1.9 million.

The total levy for the 1987 fiscal year, however, will generate about \$3.2 million to pay the increased costs and to fund an austere county budget, providing no salary increases for employees, said County Commissioners Judy Felton and Marvin Hempleman.

Although the commissioners know the county's 1987 tax levy will be more than last year's, they couldn't predict the exact increase in the total tax bill to Twin Falls County property owners. The tax bills, arriving this fall, will include levies for schools districts, the city of Twin Falls, the College of Southern Idaho and other taxing districts.

Levies are used to determine how much taxes people will pay. The county, school districts and other government entities determine how much they need to operate for a year and set a budget. The budget amount is divided into the total assessed value of the property in their taxing area or district to arrive at a levy for that particular taxing district.

The amount of taxes an individual pays for a living unit is determined by multiplying his levy by the assessed value of his property.

The county commissioners say they will approve 1987 tax levies to raise \$1 million for the indigent fund, \$330,000 for the jail and \$220,000 for

liability insurance. The levies on these items, unlike levies for other county operations, aren't restricted in growth by the 1-Percent Initiative, Felton said.

Hempleman added that the increased costs for the jail, indigents and insurance were "forced" upon the county by uncontrollable factors.

The county levied only about \$300,000 in taxes this year for the poor fund. Although the poor fund budget was \$899,000, the county had a \$500,000 carryover from the previous year, Felton said.

The commissioners last week expanded this year's indigent fund by \$163,000 because there wasn't enough money left to pay for indigent claims through the remainder of the fiscal year, ending Sept. 30. The commissioners predicted that they might have to borrow up to \$200,000 to keep out of the red until the 1987 taxes are paid in December.

This week, however, the commissioners said they may not have to borrow at all or as much as they first thought; as much as \$73,000 in property taxes were allotted to the indigent fund from taxes paid last month. The allocations were released this week.

The commissioners didn't include the tax payments in their predictions because they didn't know how much money would be paid, Felton said.

Hempleman said the county will operate "day-by-day" and, hopefully, stretch the indigent fund to avoid borrowing. If the county does have to borrow money, taxes will be levied to repay the money, plus any interest.

House offers tax proposal

WASHINGTON — House Democratic tax-writers Thursday night approved a new tax-overhaul proposal — scorned in advance by senators — that would boost taxes on corporations to pay for sharply lower rates for individuals.

The agreement was reached in a closed-door session in Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., chairman of the conference, extracted a vow of secrecy about the plan until it is presented to senators and Republican House members on Friday.

Efforts to write the new proposal were delayed several hours, apparently because the seven Democrats, who make up the majority of the House tax-writing team, were having problems relating some tax deductions under present law without boosting rates above the levels approved by the Senate.

One of those problems was said to be in preserving fully deductible Individual Retirement Accounts for a larger number of workers than were covered by the Senate bill.

The House plan, the latest move in the name of back-and-forth played by negotiators from the House and Senate, apparently is basically a reaffirmation of support for the bill representatives ap-

Arizona home deed turns hearing into quarrel

WASHINGTON — The confirmation hearing for Chief Justice-designate William H. Rehnquist erupted into partisan quarrelling Thursday after Democrats disclosed that the deed for the nominee's former home in Phoenix, Ariz., included language to bar non-whites from owning the property.

It was the second disclosure in two days of a restrictive covenant in a Republican-owned property. Liberal Democratic senators continued to portray the conservative nominee as an extremist who is insensitive to civil rights.

Rehnquist was excused Thursday night after a grueling second day of testimony, and the committee heard from other witnesses "into the night." Senators told Rehnquist they may be asked to return on another day to answer criticism expected from civil rights and women's groups; witnesses are expected to contradict his denial of allegations he harassed voters in Phoenix in the 1960s.

President Reagan invoked executive privilege, in refusing to release internal Justice Department memoranda sought by committee Democrats. The memos, written by Rehnquist when he was assistant attorney general during the Nixon administration, purportedly dealt with domestic wiretapping and government plans for dealing with anti-Vietnam War demonstrators.

Assistant Attorney General John R. Bolton told the committee that Reagan had invoked executive privilege late Thursday after consulting with Attorney General Ed-

win Meese, Bolton and Deputy Attorney General Charles Cooper.

Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, accused Democrats of engaging in a "fishing expedition" in seeking release of the documents in an attempt to discredit Rehnquist.

On Tuesday, Democrats pointed out that Rehnquist's vacation home in Greensboro, Vt. contained a clause barring Jews from owning the property.

Both deeds were turned up in the FBI background investigation of Rehnquist prepared for the Senate Judiciary Committee, which is conducting the hearings. Rehnquist, an associate justice on the Supreme Court for nearly 15 years, would succeed the retiring Warren E. Burger as chief justice if confirmed by the Republican-run Senate.

Asked by Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., if he had read the Phoenix deed, Rehnquist said "I simply can't answer whether I read through the deed or not. One relies on a title company. While very offensive, it (the covenant) has no legal effect."

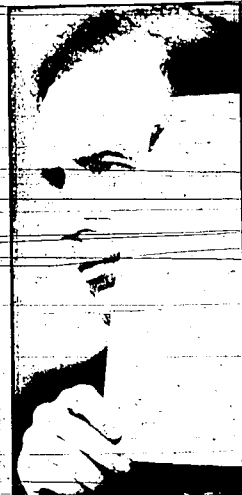
Rehnquist, who said he was not aware of the restrictions in either deed until several days ago.

Hatch, a staunch Rehnquist supporter, turned the deed over to the latest disclosure. Hatch voice-raising. Hatch said, "This is the biggest red herring in the whole hearing. It's ridiculous."

"I don't know that it's ridiculous at all," said Sen. Howard M. Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, a Rehnquist critic. Kennedy said it was important to the issue of Rehnquist's sensitivity to civil rights matters.

Rehnquist received support on the deed from Arizona's Democratic senator, Dennis DeConcini, who asked, "How many on this committee can say we never owned a piece of property" with such restrictions.

The restrictive language for the Palmercroft subdivision in Phoenix was written in 1928. Rehnquist owned his home there, from 1961 to 1969.

In the area of insurance, the 1987 levy will generate \$320,000, compared to a levy this year that raised about \$110,000.

Locally, the predicted rise in insurance rates may be due to what Felton described as the jail's "terrible" exposure to potential claims. The facility already is the subject of several lawsuits, including one resulting in a court-ordered limit on the population. To comply with the 30-prisoner limit, the county pays \$11,000-\$16,000 a month to board and transport inmates out of the county.

The self-insurance pool in which the county participates, the Idaho County Risk Management Program, bases premium on exposure to risk; among other factors, said Felton, a member of the program's board.

While the exact insurance costs

for the upcoming year are not known, the commissioners anticipate at least a 15-percent or more rise in premiums.

Despite the cost hikes, "We've not seen any cheaper or better (insurance) program," Felton added.

The levy that will generate \$320,000 for the sheriff's office for the upcoming fiscal year will pay for anticipated transportation and housing costs of inmates and some jail improvements. Herpin said. It also will repay about \$125,000 to the General Fund, borrowed this year to pay boarding bills.

Property owners also will see a levy to raise \$15,000 for circuit breakers — tax reductions provided to handicapped and low-income families. Under the law, the state is supposed to pay to the county the amount the taxes are reduced. For several years, however, the state

has had a shortfall, leaving the county to levy taxes to pay the difference, Heipleman said.

The amount of money levied for regular county operations for the 1987 fiscal year probably will grow compared to this year, the commissioners added. The proposed 1986-87 budget still is in the pre-release stage, but the commissioners anticipate an additional \$78,000 from taxes, Felton said. That amount, however, is not sufficient for salary increases, given the escalating costs of operating.

Although this year's county budget is about \$5.3 million, that amount was not levied through taxes. The majority of the money funding the budget comes from federal payments in lieu of taxes, fees, revenue from sales and liquor taxes and other sources, County Clerk Auditor Dick Pence said.

Idahoans wary of chip agreement

BOISE (AP) — While anticipating a new agreement with Japan on semiconductor markets will bolster the fortunes of American computer chip makers, officials at Micron Technology Inc. are expressing some concern over whether the agreement will be carried out.

Joe Parkinson, chairman of the Boise-based computer chip manufacturer that launched a campaign against Japan's trade practices a year ago, says his concern is based on the long-standing Japanese strategy of securing a big share of the \$4 billion computer chip market as possible.

"I hate to infer bad faith, ... but I

think the Japanese will be slow in relinquishing its market share," Parkinson said Thursday after the Reagan administration announced Japan's agreement to end below-cost dumping of chips on the U.S. market and to expand access of American chip producers to its market.

"We might well anticipate some problems in enforcing the agreement," Parkinson said, but he added that those potential problems have probably already been considered by the negotiators and he expected the federal government to insure the agreement is complied with. The agreement came just before the U.S.

deadline for imposition of heavy penalty duties on Japanese chip imports.

In a joint statement issued from their Washington offices, Sens. James McClure and Steve Symms, both R-Idaho, called the agreement a "positive step," but advised caution in expecting too much.

"The Japanese have been resourceful in the past in finding ways to avoid restrictions that they have agreed up," the statement said. "So we will be watching very closely to see whether or not they are actually stopping the practices that we believe are predatory and unfair."

Gramm-Rudman repealer fails

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate on Thursday reaffirmed its support for the Gramm-Rudman budget-balancing plan, but lawmakers found that their attempts to meet its goals were falling short of the mark.

The Senate rejected, 69-30, a proposal by Sen. Gary Hart, D-Colo., to repeal the Gramm-Rudman law. The vote came just a day after the Senate voted 63-36 to strengthen the program by restoring its automatic spending cuts, which had been thrown out by Supreme Court.

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr. said Thursday he thought restoring automatic spending cuts would help push Congress toward its deficit-cutting goals.

The Senate Budget Committee sent to the full Senate on Thursday a package that would cut the deficit by about \$8.1 billion in fiscal 1987.

Superfund revival stirs doubt

WASHINGTON (AP) — House and Senate negotiators agreed Thursday night on an \$8.5 billion "Superfund" bill to revive, strengthen and expand the federal tax on chemical waste.

The compromise package, produced after five months of grueling talks, was hailed by environmental groups, but its adoption by the conferees still left the toxic cleanup effort far short of being able to return to full steam.

A separate set of negotiations by tax writers still must settle a final and difficult question: who will pay for a beefed-up Superfund — taxpayers, petrochemical interests, all large corporations or a combination of them.

Left unclear was just when a tax package for Superfund can be written, because members of the House Ways and Means and Senate Finance committees currently are negotiating on the big tax overhaul bill.

Strong quake jolts Sierras

BISHOP, Calif. (AP) — Another powerful earthquake rocked the Sierra Nevada early Thursday, jolting jitters residents out of bed and breaking windows but causing no major damage or injuries.

The tremor was one in a series of aftershocks of a 6.1 quake on July 21 that caused \$2.7 million damage. Seismologists at the University of California in Berkeley measured the 12:23 a.m. tremor at 5.5 on the Richter scale, said Eric Collins, a staff research scientist.

Since July 21, thousands of quakes have rattled through the Bishop region in the eastern Sierra, including 1.5 above 3.0, 20 above 4.0 and five above 5.0 on the Richter scale, Collins said.

Dispute idles steel workers

PITTSBURGH (AP) — The first work stoppage in 27 years by steelworkers at USX Corp. began as a contract expired at midnight Thursday, with the union calling the action a lockout and the company saying the 42,000 workers are on strike.

The labor dispute was prompted by the company's refusal to continue bargaining under the old contract. The United Steelworkers had offered to contract, but USX said it would continue only under the terms of the company's last offer.

Negotiators for both sides reportedly met late Thursday afternoon, but failed to reach agreement.

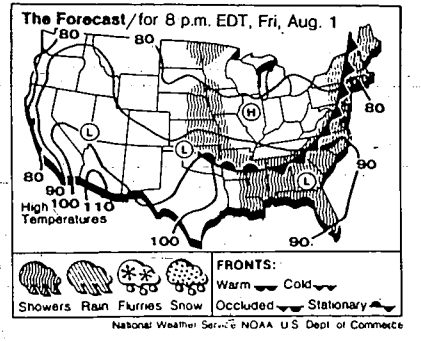

Idahoans' hay pledges making big bale



BOISE — Idahoans have pledged more than 700 tons of hay, most of it from one eastern Idaho company, to help drought-stricken Southeastern farmers.

The state's relief effort also may be aided by a federal decision Thursday allowing farmers in priority support programs to harvest hay from land now out of production.

At the request of U.S. Sen. Steve Symms, the U.S. Department of Agriculture gave Idaho farmers special permission to donate hay from their "setaside" acres to the beleaguered Southeast.

Idahoans who have no hay but want to help with dollars also will get a chance to pitch in. A private "Bucks for Bales" project initiated by Mountain Bell is expanding statewide. All branches of Idaho First National Bank now are accepting donations, said Mountain Bell ranches of Idaho First National Bank.

Carl Grinstead, assistant manager at Idaho First's downtown office in Twin Falls, confirmed Wednesday that the account has been opened.

Mountain Bell employee Ken Townsend said Wednesday he could not estimate how much money has been collected so far.

State officials today were to announce details of the hay relief effort. Dan Christian, a resource coordinator for the Idaho Department of Agriculture, said officials have decided to collect the bales at central locations in various areas of the state. At least one location will be in the Magic Valley, he said. Union Pacific Railroad has offered to transport the donated hay at no charge.

One drop point probably will be in Shelley, where the Pillsbury Co. plans to donate 500 tons of hay, Christian said.

Farmers who wish to donate hay from their setaside acres first must contact the office of the U.S. Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service in their county to obtain permission, said Jay Boss, ASCS production adjustment specialist.

The federal government requires farmers collecting price support payments to keep 25 per-

cent of their wheat ground and 20 percent of ground "irregular" feed grains out of production. But hay can be raised on the land as a cover crop or for grazing, Boss said.

The new permission allows the hay to be harvested and donated for the emergency. It still cannot be harvested for sale, Symms made the request Wednesday.

Idahoans can pledge hay by calling their county extension agents. "We're still getting calls all the time," Christian said. "Many of them (the pledges) are quite small, but they are coming in regularly."

Christian said he expected Idaho hay donations to rise dramatically once people know when and where to deliver the hay for shipment across the country.

Eunice Tyler of Leadore said area volunteers had gathered about eight tons. She said she was encouraging neighbors to donate, and that the response has been good.

"We had drought up here last year, so we know what it's like," she said. "A ton of hay isn't going to break us."

Big cats move to E. Idaho

ROBERTS (AP) — Nine wild cats brought to the Idaho Panhandle from Oregon where their owners were under court order to dispose of them are being moved to an exotic animal farm in eastern Idaho as state Fish and Game officials say they will be lenient with the owners.

Three of the cats were already under fire in Idaho since one of Roberts and the rest were being moved by owners Robert Fleber and Dotti Martin from a Clearwater, Idaho, farm where they had been kept.

Fleber and Martin have been under fire in Idaho since one of their lions escaped from a makeshift pen on July 20 and was shot by a local farmer after it killed one of his cows.

McClure slates 3 hearings

LEWISTON (AP) — Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, will conduct field hearings of the Senate Interior Appropriations subcommittee in three Idaho towns in August.

H.D. Palmer, a spokesman for McClure, said the senator will be gathering testimony on the impact forest plans have on timber-dependent communities.

The sessions are scheduled for Aug. 21 in Coeur d'Alene, and Aug. 22 in Emmett and Grangeville.

Court denies protest

BOISE (AP) — A three-judge federal appeals panel has ruled against a lawsuit filed by a former Boise man who sued after he was sent to jail for refusing to file a state income tax return.

Rick Mitchell, formerly of Boise and now of Isabella, Mo., went to the Ada County Jail in 1983 when he refused to file a state income tax return on constitutional grounds.

Later he was released and filed a lawsuit against 4th District Judge Deborah Bait, former Ada County Sheriff Chuck Palmer, Ada County, and William von Tegen, the deputy attorney general who handled the case for the state Tax Commission.

The 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals has upheld a decision by U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan granting judgment against Mitchell's lawsuit.

Mediation sought

BOISE (AP) — Boise Cascade Corp. seeking sharp wage and benefit reductions for its Northwest workers, has asked for federal mediation and scheduled a meeting with union officials over what the company considers an impasse in contract negotiations.

The company set a meeting for Tuesday in Portland, Ore., and asked a federal mediator to attend, Boise Cascade spokesman Doug Bartels said Thursday.

Western Regional Council of the Lumber Production and Industrial Workers for a meeting to meet what Boise Cascade officials last week said were deadlocked talks over a new contract for its 2,230 union employees in the Northwest.

"We requested it (the meeting), and we will go in there hoping that there will be some progress," LPIW spokesman Denny Scott said. "We will go in there with a complete open mind hoping to reach an accommodation that's acceptable."

State scores half victory in fish fight

BOISE (AP) — Idaho has emerged with half a victory in its battle to get a greater voice in the management of fish runs in the Pacific Northwest.

The state last week lost a federal court decision in its long-running battle to take a greater part in negotiations and decisions about commercial fishing.

But at the same time, U.S. District Court Judge Edward Leavy ruled that the Shoshone-Bannock tribes in eastern Idaho could become a party to a lawsuit on the same issues.

Idaho Attorney General Jim Jones said in the long-run, the more significant of the two decisions may be the one allowing an Idaho Indian tribe direct input in fish treaty negotiations.

"We're very pleased with that decision," said Jones on Thursday. "I think they (the Sho-Bans) add a dimension that will be very helpful to upstream fishing interests."

"Our interests are closely aligned, and this will give the state standing in the proceedings," Jones said.

The Indian tribe also is in a position to take some actions not available to the state, he said.

Idaho can't file lawsuits over fishing issues that have been decided in the past, he said, but the Indian tribe, with potential treaty rights to be considered, may be able to do so.

The Columbia River Inter-Tribal Fish Commission, which includes Idaho's Nez Perce Tribe and the Umatilla, Yakima and Warm Springs tribes, had opposed both motions.

Utah girl drowns

REXBURG (AP) — A 5-year-old Utah girl drowned Tuesday night in a canal near her grandmother's home in Salem.

Suzette Forbush, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Max Forbush, was throwing rocks in the canal from her grandmother's front yard. She apparently lost her balance and fell in to the canal after picking up a large rock, Madison County Coroner Rick Davis said.

2nd Amendment must be protected

If Guy Vander Jagt has his way, U.S. presidents will no longer be limited to two terms in office. The Republican congressman from Michigan has introduced legislation which would enable Ronald Reagan to run for a third term.

To do this, the 22nd Amendment to the Constitution would have to be repealed.

"The 22nd Amendment is an insult to American voters who are wise and well-informed," Vander Jagt said Tuesday.

That amendment was proposed by Congress in 1947 and ratified by the states in 1951. It was inspired by the four-term presidency of former president Franklin D. Roosevelt and was an attempt by some congressmen to prevent such things from ever happening again.

Time changes certain things, apparently. What was good in 1947 in order to prevent a Democratic dynasty is no longer desirable with a Republican president who has indicated he might not be opposed to another term in the White House.

Interestingly, Vander Jagt's proposal comes on the heels of congressional uproar over President Reagan's attempt to load the Supreme Court and federal judicial system with avowed conservatives. Roosevelt's attempt to do the same thing five decades ago, with someone other than conservatives, also resulted in much wailing and gnashing of teeth.

History is repeating itself, it seems, with a new cast of characters.

Opposition to both moves, we feel, is as justified now as it was then, regardless of which party is in control of the White House.

Despite its many flaws, the United States works fairly well with the two-party system. The minority party serves as a watchdog to prevent excesses by the majority. Periodically, when voters tire of one party or the other, the balance of power shifts. It has been this way for much of the nation's history. For the past few years, however, the Republican Party has steadily sought domination of the political arena.

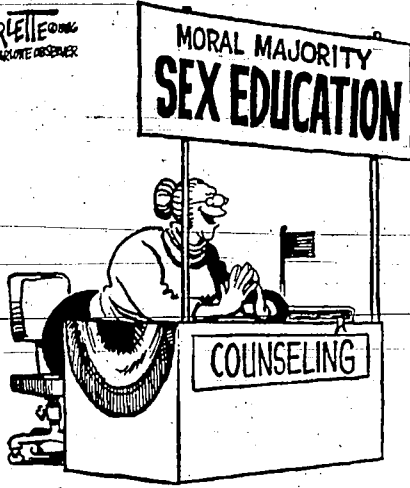
Because there were many things the framers of the Constitution could not envision 200 years ago, being merely mortal men, the Constitution has been revised from time to time in response to changing conditions. Not everyone is content with all of the amendments, but it seems to take compelling arguments to repeal an amendment.

Vander Jagt has not offered one. We believe the two-term limitation is wise. Although there are checks and balances built into our system of federal government, a president is able to do great mischief over an eight-year period. It's time enough.

One could argue that if voters decide to keep one party in control of the White House with another candidate from that party, why not allow that party to run the incumbent president? The answer is obvious. One president may succeed in doing something that is not in the best interests of the nation while another may not. Using the current president and vice president as an example, would Vice President George Bush, lacking President Reagan's mesmerizing charm, be as successful in having his way with Congress and the American public as Reagan?

The 22nd Amendment is fine, just the way it is.

Phone deregulation will hurt ratepayer

Telephone deregulation. That's what Mountain Bell will be pushing for in the next legislative session. We've had a taste of what that will mean. Partial deregulation at the federal agency level has already boosted local basic telephone service rates for residential and commercial customers in Idaho by more than 35 percent since 1983.

The most recent residential increase was another dollar a month for access to long distance. Idaho's Public Utilities Commission strongly opposed this action, but finally had to comply with the Federal Communication Commission requirement.

When the AT&T system was broken up it was said that the basic local rates would not go up. But the phone companies have continuously pressed the FCC for decisions that would result in higher local service rates. The imposition of access charges is an example.

In a recent decision, the U.S. Supreme Court held that the federal regulators had exceeded their authority by requiring accounting procedures in all states that resulted in increased basic service rates.

The regulation record of the FCC over the past several years is not one to justify confidence that the federal agency will protect consumer interests, nor do the actions of the phone companies that have been asking for these changes provide any assurance that they would hold down the rates charged for basic telephone service if they are not from under state regulation.

In addition to the sorry results of partial deregulation at the federal level, the Bell companies have been investing in other business ventures. This is being done through the regional

Bell operating companies.

In the case of Idaho the regional company is U.S. West. You can bet that the money for these new ventures is coming out of ratepayers' pockets. The operation of these newly formed holding companies is also being financed by local telephone customers.

The story the Bell companies are peddling is that ratepayers will get lower rates as these new businesses begin to pay off. It's an unlikely story. According to a report made to the Securities and Exchange Commission, U.S. West lost \$180 million in the first three quarters of 1985.

In a recent critique of the Bell companies' performance, Judge Harold Greene, who has advised the legal side of the breakup of AT&T, has said to say of the companies, "... ascent into the ranks of conglomerate America ranks far higher on the list of their priorities than the provision of the best and least-costly local service to the American public."

These are the same companies that are asking state legislators around the country to get the public's state utility commissions off their backs.

There is little doubt the results of Mountain Bell's deregulation would make a mockery of the telephone system that has been paid for by the ratepayers. It would be dominated by an unregulated monopoly that wouldn't give a hoot about the average customer. The competition

Mountain Bell says they will provide is a joke. There would be as much competition as the company wants — and no more.

The lobbyist for Mountain Bell has written all legislative candidates, seeking support for the deregulation legislation the company will propose. The material sent to candidates makes deregulation sound like motherhood and apple pie. It is replete with such language as: "rate stability," "free enterprise," "orderly transition" and "competitive market environment." We must not be fooled by the nice words the company uses. What they want is to make an unfettered assault on ratepayers' pocketbooks.

It's plain Mountain Bell is not in business for its health. They are out to make money, and at our expense. Deregulation would turn them loose. It would be like a cancer eating away at the communities' telephone network, which is so vital to the well-being of us all.

The rush to deregulation can be stopped, but it will require action. Our Public Utilities Commission should begin an investigation into the connection between Mountain Bell and U.S. West, to find out how our money is being spent; the commission should provide legislators an honest appraisal of the potential impact of deregulation and what legislative action would improve the operation of telephone communication generally; most important, we, as telephone service users, should contact our legislative candidates to let them know we are opposed to deregulation and to find out where they stand.

Remember, Ma Bell is not a mother.

A new government study shows the rich are getting richer and the poor are getting poorer.

The right-to-work law has done what it intended to do, it has broken the backs of unions in this state and the fun has just begun.

Where are the new jobs the right-to-work-for-less people promises? Studies show new growth in state is at an all-time low. Idaho voted Republican, so we got just what we voted for.

Advisers recommending ban on private shuttle payloads

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Cabinet group is recommending that the space agency be barred from accepting commercial and foreign payloads when shuttle launches are resumed, a presidential spokesman said Thursday.

If President Reagan accepts that option offered by the Economic Policy Council, it could lessen the need for construction of a fourth orbiter, estimated to cost around \$2.5 billion, to replace the shuttle Challenger that exploded Jan. 28.

At the White House, spokesman Larry Speakes said most members of the Cabinet council favored the idea of taking NASA out of the private satellite launching business.

"The issue was particularly timely in anticipation — in light of the shuttle situation and the backlog of scientific and military missions — that need to be flown," he said. "And the council was looking for ways to launch commercial satellites to take up the backlog."

In other developments Thursday involving the space program, the House Appropriations Committee adopted a resolution to a NASA financing bill that would require the space agency to get permission from Congress before taking any people or programs away from the Johnson Space Center in Houston.

The Air Force unveiled a five-year program to emphasize the use of

Safety checks skipped

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congressional investigators disclosed Thursday that Morton Thiokol Corp. skipped three of seven mandatory safety inspections of the solid rocket motor whose explosion destroyed the space shuttle Challenger.

Investigators from the General Accounting Office, Congress's auditing arm, told a House Government Operations subcommittee that these missed inspections at the company's Utah plant were among 2,075 possible quality control problems in the manufacture of the

faulty booster rocket. The investigators said the problems ranged from the serious to the trivial but that the space agency had concluded that none contributed to the accident that destroyed the shuttle and its seven-member crew on Jan. 28.

"We did make an error on the O-rings and we'll correct that," said Edward G. Doney Jr., vice president of Morton Thiokol's Space Division. "It was a human error — a mistake by the human being who prepared the paperwork."

Officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration refused to confirm or deny that the agency is vehemently resisting the idea of discontinuing use of the shuttle for private payloads and Speakes would not comment on that point.

Dave Garrett, a spokesman at NASA headquarters, refused to discuss the agency's position on the question of banning commercial and foreign satellites, which could cost \$30 million in lost contracts.

Chet Lee, an official of NASA's Customer Services Division, said the agency has more than 40 contracts for private satellite launches.

Rockets back as Air Force launch craft

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force outlined a program Thursday to overcome the loss of the space shuttle Challenger by emphasizing the use of uncrewed rockets to boost satellites into space.

"The expendable Launch Vehicles (rockets) are going to be the workhorse from now on" for the Defense Department, said Air Force Secretary Edward C. Aldridge. "We cannot afford to rely on a single launch system."

Placing sole reliance on the shuttle was "a major mistake for this country and we're paying the price now," he said.

As part of the five-year program, which Aldridge estimated would cost \$2.6 billion, the Air Force will buy at least 13 more giant Titan 4 rockets already under development, for a total of 23, and will begin a competition among defense contractors to design and build a new type of rocket with medium-lift capability.

It also will begin redesigning certain classified satellites so that they can be launched by rocket as well as by the shuttle.

The secretary also said:

"The Air Force will delay activating its \$3 billion shuttle spacecraft at Vandenberg Air Force Base in California until 1992, saving an estimated \$1 billion over five years. The United States eventually will need the facility to place shuttles in polar orbit, however, and thus Vandenberg's activation is merely a matter of time, he said.

Slight relief for sun-baked Southeast

Lower temperatures brought slight relief to the sun-baked Southeast and Plains on Thursday, but the drought is leaving a legacy of blighted produce and ruined farms.

The lethal heat and dry weather stretched from Pennsylvania to Florida and from the East Coast as far west as Texas and Wisconsin. Farmers have suffered more than an estimated \$2.3 billion in crop and livestock damage, and more than 66 people have died in the month-long hot spell.

"It could rain every day from now until it starts snowing and it won't mean a hill of beans," said Bill Anderson, an agricultural agent in Florence County, Wis. "It's like open heart surgery on a dead man."

Anderson said the 40 farmers in Florence County might need 120,000 to 240,000 bales of hay to make up for their loss. Ironically, last week, other Wisconsin farmers were donating hay for starving livestock in the South.

Hay "balcoats" continued Thursday, with shipments heading from as far as Maine to southern states. Tyson inmates helped unload Indiana hay at Columbia, S.C., and National Guard trucks loaded with hay left for outlying areas of Georgia where temperatures remained above 100 degrees.

Temperatures will stay above normal in most of the drought area, though the mercury may decline somewhat from the record-breaking levels of the last week, said Pete Reynolds of the National Weather Service. Severe storms center in Kansas City, Mo. In parts of Tennessee, Friday's highs were forecast to be "only" in the 90s, some of the coolest high temperatures there in a month.

The pavement was so hot in McAlester, Okla., that a baby suffered second-degree burns crawling on it, said John Johnson, nursing supervisor at Regional Hospital, where the child was in good condition.

"It was just like crawling on a frying pan," Johnson said. A survey by the Maryland Department of Agriculture's Market Research Division showed that retail shopping receipts for produce in the Baltimore area are up 10 percent to 33 percent in the last year, and quality has declined.

Markets that normally rely on produce from the Southeast are having to go elsewhere for their stocks, the survey said. Stores normally relying on potatoes and peaches from Virginia and the Carolinas were turning to California and Washington state products. The consumer is forced to bear the price effect of higher transportation costs, she said.

Damage estimates for drought-blighted states include: \$533.6 million in Georgia; \$750 million in Alabama; \$400 million in North Carolina; \$200 million in South Carolina; \$118 million in Maryland; \$61.5 million in Virginia; \$47 million in Pennsylvania; \$40 million in Delaware; and \$15 million in West Virginia.

FTC blocks takeover

WASHINGTON (AP) — A federal judge Thursday issued a preliminary injunction blocking Coca-Cola's planned \$470 million takeover of Dr Pepper, a Federal Trade Commission spokeswoman said.

The injunction issued by U.S. District Judge Gerhard A. Gesell came at the request of the FTC, which is examining the antitrust implications of the takeover, said Commission spokeswoman Barbara Rosenfeld. She said the injunction would remain in effect pending the outcome of FTC hearings.

The commission had acted against both Coca-Cola, the No. 1 soft-drink maker, and PepsiCo, Inc. the No. 2 soft drink maker, when Coca-Cola said it wanted to buy the No. 4 Dr Pepper. Coca-Cola's announcement on Feb. 20, followed PepsiCo's announcement that it wanted to take over No. 3 Seven-Up. The FTC contends the deals would reduce competition.

After the FTC action, PepsiCo then dropped its plan to purchase Seven-Up's United States operations, although it did buy the international operations of that company.

President plugs away for defense spending

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan told members of Congress on Thursday they could undercut U.S. arms control negotiators at "a critical and hopeful moment" if they cut his defense spending request.

Presidential spokesman Larry Speakes said Reagan told 31 House Democrats and Republicans invited to an unannounced White House breakfast that they could "run the risk of reducing prospects for securing an arms control agreement (and) lessen the chance for a successful summit" later this year. The administration sought

authorization for \$20.3 billion in defense spending for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1, but the House is considering a measure that would cut that to \$22.2 billion.

Reagan has been increasingly upbeat in recent comments about the prospects for an agreement to reduce nuclear weapons arsenals. Speakes on Thursday sought to play down the significance of what he acknowledged was a lack of progress in a special round of U.S.-Soviet talks that broke off Wednesday after the two sides lectured each other for a week about limiting strategic weapons.

College cost to top \$10,000 per year

NEW YORK (AP) — The average cost of a year at private college will top \$10,000 this fall for the first time, according to an annual survey released Thursday by The College Board.

Average college expenses will go up 6 percent in the 1986-87 academic year, the sixth straight year such costs at both private and public institutions will rise faster than the overall inflation rate, according to the board's annual survey of more than 3,400 colleges and universities.

The estimates include tuition and fees, room and board, and estimated costs for books, supplies, transportation and personal expenses. At private colleges, average costs will rise 6 percent to \$10,199 for resident students, and \$8,809 for commuters. Two-year private colleges will also see an average 6 percent to \$8,056 for residents, \$6,757 for commuters.

The nation's most expensive school will be tiny, arts-oriented Bennington College in Vermont, where total costs will reach an estimated \$18,350.

"Bennington is a school that charges substantial amounts for the program it offers, and no apologies for that," said interim President John Williams II, who said the high cost is the result of an extraordinary student-faculty ratio of 8-to-1.

After Bennington, the colleges with the highest estimated total costs this fall will be Barnard College, \$18,030; Brandeis University, \$17,815; Princeton University, \$17,805; Yale University, \$17,750; Massachusetts Institute of Technology, \$17,700; Harvard and Radcliffe Colleges, \$17,695; Sarah Lawrence College, \$17,265; Dartmouth College, \$17,265; and Columbia University, Columbia College, \$17,175.

The College Board is a private, nonprofit, educational association whose members include more than 2,500 colleges and other institutions of learning.

Complete results of the board's annual college cost survey will appear in the 1986-87 edition of The College Cost Book to be published Sept. 1.

At four-year public colleges, costs will rise an average 5 percent this fall — to \$5,604 for resident students, and \$4,467 for commuting students. At two-year public colleges, costs will go up an average 5 percent to \$3,708 for commuters. The sample was too small to provide a meaningful average for resident-student costs at two-year public institutions.

This fall's 6 percent average increase exceeds the overall inflation rate that has averaged 1.7 percent in the last 12 months, as measured by the Consumer Price Index.

Contra aid package over initial hurdle

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Senate subcommittee voted approval Thursday of President Reagan's package of military aid to Contra rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist government.

The vote decision by the Appropriations subcommittee on military construction is the first step in the latest fight over Reagan's plan to provide \$100 million, including \$70 million in military aid and weapons.

The full Appropriations Committee is scheduled to vote next Tuesday on the issue and is expected to approve the plan, which would send it to the floor of the Republican-controlled Senate.

A month ago, the Democratic-run House approved the package and sent it to the Senate as part of a bill appropriating \$1.8 billion for military construction projects and housing in the fiscal year starting Oct. 1.

Last spring, the Senate approved the \$100 million package on a 53-47 vote, but the House stripped the money out of the bill, meaning the entire procedure had to be repeated.

In addition to the rebel aid, the bill includes \$157 million for construction projects in Staten Island, N.Y., and Everett, Wash., as part of the Navy's "strategic homeport" program.

The House voted to knock that money out of the bill and if the Senate restores it, as expected, the issue would be settled by a House-Senate conference committee.

When the current bill reaches the floor, Democrats opposed to contra aid have threatened to filibuster it, which would block the Senate from voting on the package before its scheduled Aug. 15 recess.

OPEC pledges to cut oil flow

GENEVA (AP) — OPEC's president said Thursday he was satisfied with a promised oil production cutback of nearly 10 percent of the cartel's daily output, while a new committee sought fixed lower national output quotas.

Such a binding agreement is widely believed to be the only long-term means of shoring up oil prices, which have dropped from about \$22 a 42-gallon barrel last November to levels between \$7.25 to \$12 — and even less for certain grades, according to some reports.

Nigeria's Oil Minister Rilwanu Lukman, president of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries, said "nine or 10" of the cartel's 13 member states had given pledges of voluntary production cuts totaling 1.925 million barrels a day.

Bush meets Jordan officials

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — Vice President George Bush talked with Jordanian officials Thursday, the day before he meets King Hussein, to seek a formula that would bring the monarch to the conference table with Israel.

"We don't overstimulate the problem that Jordan faces in contemplating direct talks, and instead formulation can be developed for those talks acceptable to both sides who certainly would support," a U.S. official said, speaking on condition of anonymity.

He would not describe the formulas being considered but said that, in Bush's meetings Thursday with Prime Minister Zaid al-Rifai, "we were struck by the strength of the prime minister's feeling of the need for Jordan to demonstrate its support for the Palestinians of the West Bank and Gaza."

EPA may delay water pollution regulations

TWIN FALLS — The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency will likely delay new regulations controlling runoff from animal-raising operations, the agency's Idaho administrator said Thursday.

The water pollution regulations were supposed to take effect this fall, but Lynn McKee of the EPA said there would be a 30- to 50-day delay in putting the regulations in effect. The delay would be subject to approval by the regional EPA office in Seattle, he said.

In the interim, the agency will hold workshops around the state with dairy and cattle association representatives to exchange

views on the shape of the proposed regulations, McKee said.

Earlier this month, dairymen and cattlemen blasted the agency at hearings in Twin Falls and Boise for failing to adequately consult affected parties. They also said proposed changes would cause financial strain in hard times.

U.S. Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, recently proposed a delay but McKee said Wednesday he was not aware of Symms' proposal.

McKee said the reason for the delay was that a number of people at the hearings said they would like to work with the EPA on this program.

Asked if the process could have been handled differently, McKee said, "Using hindsight, it would have been better to hold

workshops prior to public hearings. But there were logistical problems in this."

Karen Harder, an EPA environmental scientist who moderated the hearing in Twin Falls, denied a lack of consultation with affected parties. She said the EPA was addressing the runoff issue because of numerous complaints about runoff polluting waters and the need to meet provisions of the Clean Water Act.

The EPA has extensive consultations with Idaho cattle and dairy associations, she said, but added: "We don't have the manpower to go door-to-door."

Tom Hovenden, of the Idaho Cattle Association, said he welcomed the delay and offered to work with the EPA. He said his organization wasn't pushing for the delay

and it knew for some time the regulations were coming.

Don Papenberg, of the United Dairymen of Idaho, greeted the news of the proposed delay favorably. "That's what we wanted them to do in the first place. Had they come to the dairymen and cattlemen in the first place and reviewed what they wanted it would be a better procedure," he said.

The proposed regulations would affect new and existing operations which discharge wastewater into navigable waters and which stables, come or feed more than 300 slaughter and/or feeder cattle, 200 mature dairy cattle, or 750 swine weighing more than 55 pounds. The rules would also affect horse, sheep, turkey, hen and broiler opera-

tions. State officials said there is significant water pollution from dairy and feedlot runoff. Before a permit would be issued, operators would be required to have runoff containment facilities such as lagoons. Some dairymen already have these facilities.

The permits would specify that no discharge into navigable waters be allowed unless rainfall or catastrophic events cause an outflow of water from a containment facility, according to the proposed regulations. If an operation doesn't discharge, except during a storm which occurs once every 25 years, no permit would be needed, Mrs. Harder of EPA said. There is no fee for the permits.

Joint appeal of hospital district likely

Ketchum, Sun Valley share common goals in county fight

SUN VALLEY — Sun Valley city officials have asked the city of Ketchum to join its appeal of a hospital district election set by Blaine County Board of Commissioners two weeks ago.

In a joint meeting of the two councils Thursday, Ketchum agreed to consider joining the appeal when it holds a special meeting at noon today in the Ketchum City Hall.

Following the action of the Board of Commissioners on July 15 to set the election, Sun Valley first filed a "notice of appeal" that automatically stays the election set for Aug. 12.

The city is filing the appeal because the Board of Commissioners had earlier postponed the election to await a consultant's report on consolidating the county's two hospitals: the Blaine County Medical Center in Healey and Moritz Community Hospital, a city-owned hospital in Sun Valley.

The proposed county-wide hospital taxing district, however, would support only the Healey hospital.

Sun Valley also is basing its appeal on the prospects of the double taxation its residents will face if the formation of the district is successful.

The Board of Commissioners set the election without public notice, to meet the statutory deadline for the election that must come within 90 days after the county held public hearings on its formation in May.

Ketchum officials said they would consider joining the appeal after consulting with their city attorney. The cities must file the appeal by Aug. 4, 20 days after the action by the Board of Commissioners.

In return for joining the appeal, Ketchum officials asked Sun Valley

to consider protesting an inequity in the county's allocation of funds for ambulance service throughout the county.

Earlier this summer the Board of Commissioners voted to establish a county-wide taxing district to support ambulance services based in Ketchum and Healey.

Ketchum and Sun Valley now operate an ambulance service in the northern part of the county, and half the money raised from the taxing district would have gone to support that service through the city of Ketchum, beginning in the 1986-87 fiscal year.

It has been learned, however, that the new district cannot collect taxes until the next fiscal year and the county has decided to help pay for the ambulance service through its general property tax levy, with \$50,000 going to the northern service and \$130,000 to the southern service.

But Ketchum Councilwoman Suzanne Orb said that the northern part of the county pays 70 percent of the county's taxes, and the inequitable distribution of money forces north-county residents to pay for the south-county service. That is unfair, she said.

"We are being asked to support their inefficiency," Orb said about the county's handling of its tax revenues. "That — I find really distasteful."

Ketchum Councilman Tom Held said that north-county taxpayers are more and more being asked to support south-county services, without receiving any benefit for their property tax payments. He asked the Sun Valley City Council to join Ketchum in stopping that trend.

"I think we have joint interests in staving against the county, not only with the hospital district," Held said.

City fights Dutch elm disease

TWIN FALLS — Although the city of Twin Falls is making efforts to contain Dutch elm disease, several trees have died from it.

The disease became evident in 1980, but it wasn't until 4 1/2 years ago that it became a problem. Bill Seleyo, Twin Falls county weed superintendent, brought it to the attention of the City Council a year later.

"You don't have to go very far before you'll see signs of it," says Seleyo.

The city is taking measures to protect the elms by having them injected with Phyton 27, the only product that fights Dutch elm disease, that is certified by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.

measure, although it can be used as a cure if only 15 percent of the tree is infected. Because it is almost impossible to tell how much of the tree is infected, he prefers it as a vaccine, rather than a cure.

The trees will be protected for two to three years if the city continues with preventive maintenance, says Seleyo.

By trying to save the elms, the City Council is keeping the city green, he says. "There are 21 trees left in the City Park. If they are cut down, it would look like the Shoshone desert," he says.

In order to keep the amount of diseased elms down, Seleyo says, the city should cut down dead trees immediately and destroy the wood so that the disease doesn't infect other trees.

The elm bark beetle is most responsible for spreading Dutch elm disease, says Seleyo. The beetle finds a healthy tree and burrows into it, thus infecting it. A tree rarely recovers once it has been infected.

Unless tools can also spread the disease, if a tool is used on a diseased tree and then used on a healthy tree, the healthy tree will be infected.

The disease starts in the crown of a tree and moves down into the roots. Once it gets to the roots, the disease can jump to another tree of the same species, if the roots overlap each other.

There are 30 different species of elms. Of the different species, the Siberian or the Chinese elm is least susceptible to the disease, while the American elm is the most susceptible.

Seleyo said that the best way to keep elms healthy is to keep them sound. Trimming dead branches, fertilizing, and taking care to not scrape the trees while moving are the best ways to keep them healthy.

TWIN FALLS — Port of Hope is taking its case to U.S. District Court in Boise to try and win back a state contract to treat alcoholics and drug abusers at its Twin Falls facility.

"We want to make sure the thing was done fairly," said Greg Fuller, a Jerome lawyer and member of Port of Hope's board. "We feel the original committee report wasn't done objectively."

Fuller was referring to an Alcohol and Intoxication Treatment Act Committee report in April that reviewed the Port of Hope and Walker ACT Center and recommended that Walker ACT be given the money for a residential program.

Despite that recommendation, Dr. Fritz Dixon, chief of the state Department of Health and Welfare's Bureau of Preventive Medicine, decided to split the monies, giving Port of Hope 75 percent of the money and Walker ACT 25 percent.

Last week, the Department of Administration overturned Dixon's move, saying he had acted improperly in making the decision.

When Walker ACT appealed H&W's decision in May, Director Gail Ater hinted that the state decision was purely political. Port of

Hope received state money for its residential program for 15 years, until this year.

Now, a week after losing, Port of Hope is making the same accusations.

"The whole damn thing smacks of politics," said Fuller on Thursday.

"In the interest of both programs, we're appealing because we want to make sure the committee report was done objectively and fairly and with no politics involved."

The chairman of the AITA Committee, Cheryl Juntunen, Thursday stood by the committee's original recommendation.

"I'm very proud of our work. I think we did it very objectively and very professionally. We certainly were not anti-Port of Hope or anti-anybody," said Juntunen, who is physical health director with the South Central District Health Department.

The six-member AITA Committee volunteered time to review bids, and Juntunen said the committee's recommendation was based strictly on H&W guidelines for rating both programs.

Under that rating system, Port of Hope scored poorly because it had only a 42-percent success rate among its clients, 7 percent under the state average of 49 percent.

Noisy watch dog blows whistle on marijuana grower's garden

BURLEY — Some watch dogs just can't be trusted — at least not when they are working under protest.

Cassia County Deputy Sheriff Dennis Dexter said an off-duty Minidoka County reserve deputy, Theron Andersen, was in the south part of Cassia County Sunday and stayed to assist a stranded motorist.

While rendering the assistance, Andersen heard the persistent barking of a dog coming from a mountainside above the roadway. Climbing up to see if there was some trouble, he found the friendly dog, alone and chained beside a healthy crop of mari-

juana, about 100 yards from the road.

Dexter said Cassia County officers accompanied Andersen to the site Tuesday night and harvested 450 plants — and the lonely watch dog. The plants appeared to have been growing for several months, Dexter said.

Dexter said the dog was tied where it could drink from a stream and also had food. It had been reported missing by its owner two months earlier.

Dexter said the plants had about 8 to 12 more weeks of growth to them before maturity. At that time, value would have brought a price of \$600-\$800 per pound — a total value of \$270,000-\$450,000.

The dog may not get a reward, but he was reunited with his true owner.

Changing the route could put the fuel shipments onto lower quality track and increase the four-to-five-day travel time, Smith said.

U.S. Sen. John Heinz, R-Pa., said Wednesday afternoon routes through densely populated areas should be avoided for the 35 to 45

carloads planned over the next two years.

The fuel was damaged during the March 1979 accident, worst ever at a U.S. commercial nuclear power plant. DOE agreed to take the damaged fuel for research and it is being shipped via Conrail and Union Pacific railroads.

Smith said officials studied a number of routes and the ones with

Utah officials take over loan companies

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Deposits of nearly \$109 million in state thrift and loan companies were frozen Thursday as state officials moved to prevent the collapse of the troubled institutions.

The state also took over the Industrial Loan Guaranty Corp., which guaranteed the deposits, because it did not have enough capital to keep the thrifts in business.

"We have taken this action to protect depositors," said Gov. Norm Bangert in an evening news conference. "It is a preventive measure to deter runs on the seven affected, non-federally insured thrifts."

Under the state-imposed restrictions, depositors will be allowed to withdraw no more than \$300 per month for the next two months. Bangert said the state hoped by then to have found buyers for the thrifts or obtain backing by the Federal Depositors Insurance Corp.

But he said a state bailout might become necessary.

"We will include every option available to prevent loss to depositors, including state assistance," Bangert said.

The institutions, the only thrift and loan institutions in Utah not backed by the FDIC were identified as Charter Thrift & Loan, Commerce Financial, Copper State Thrift & Loan, Horizon Thrift & Loan, Interlake Thrift, St. George Thrift & Loan and Western Heritage.

State Banking Commissioner Elaine Weiss said the state had to step in because five of the institutions, all but St. George Thrift and Western Heritage, had become insolvent and could not depend on the ILGC to guarantee their deposits.

St. George Thrift and Western were included in the order in an effort to protect them from a run on deposits by frightened customers.

Together, the thrifts had some 20,000 deposits, all over \$15,000, which averaged \$4,400, said Ed Leary, state supervisor of thrift institutions.

Weiss said 40 FDIC examiners arrived in Utah Thursday to begin evaluating the seven thrifts for federal insurance.

Bangert said that if some fall to qualify, the state may be forced to offer assistance, probably in the form of guaranteeing loans for mergers or acquisition of the troubled thrifts by other institutions.

Ms. Weiss blamed the problems of the five insolvent institutions on poor management of previous owners. Each thrift, she said, had acquired a smaller failing thrift or was owned by a failing institution. She said the current owners of each had been unable to overcome the problems.

"These are not the bad guys," Ms. Weiss said.

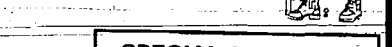

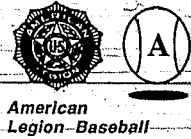

less than a week later as a first baseman, but then broke his nose. Injuries to right-hander Danny Hite, the Cowboys' No. 1 reliever, and to right-hander Kelly Chatterton, Twin Falls' No. 4 starter, haven't helped either.

As they defeat Nampa 10-6, to keep their tourney hopes alive

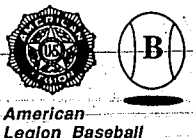

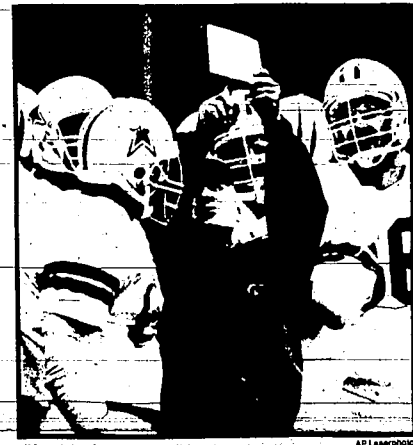
and Turner helped his own cause, with a single that scored Ostler.

Bears' big safety Fencik scores hit with Britons

LONDON — Safety Gary Fencik of the Chicago Bears made a big hit with the British sports media Thursday with an account of his 10 years with the National Football League club.

"In my second-year we made the playoffs, but the coach didn't seem too confident in the team. He had his house up for sale," said Fencik.

He tried to sell his audience on the idea that former Bears coach Neill Armstrong was the astronaut of the same name. "He went to the moon — and many of our fans wondered why he never went a second or third time."

Fencik and the Bears are in London this week for an exhibition game against the Dallas Cowboys at Wembley stadium Sunday. Interest in the game is such that Harrods, Britain's best known department

store, has begun to sell football merchandise.

But the British admit they have a lot to learn. One reporter asked Fencik how a fan this side of the Atlantic could get more involved in the science of the game. "I suggest they get a rule book, it's the best thing to do," he said.

"When he was asked" what he thought about soccer, Fencik replied: "I find it boring." He was told to get a soccer rule book.

Fencik countered: "I find it hard to watch a game where you cannot use your hands, although Diego Maradona uses his." That won applause because it was a reference to the Argentinian star's controversial goal against England in a recent World Cup quarterfinal match in Mexico.

Fencik said when Mike Ditka took over as head coach, the players thought it would be the same old story and took it in stride.

England's Steve Cram leaves a Coe-less field in the dust

EDINBURGH, Scotland — Steve Cram destroyed a field weakened by the absence of his great rival, Sebastian Coe, and surged to the 800-meter title Thursday at the Commonwealth Games.

Cram, world record holder over one mile and 2,000 meters, won his second Commonwealth Games gold medal — the other was in the 1,500 meters in 1982 — by setting the fastest time in the world this year in the event, he considers his weakest.



Steve Ovelt, the former 800-meter Olympic champion who was plagued by injury and illness, stormed back with a vengeance — only his second 5,000-meter race in his career.

Ovelt won his first Commonwealth Games title as he led

England to a 1-2-3 sweep.

The performances of Cram and Ovelt helped England overtake Australia in the overall medal table.

England had 83 medals to Australia's 91, with Canada in third place on 64.

But Australia won the most gold medals Thursday and took the lead in that category with 36, compared with 35 for Canada and 31 for England.

Coe, who picked up a virus late last week, was forced to withdraw from both his eagerly awaited

showdowns with Cram in the 800- and 1,500-meter races.

Double Olympic champion over 1,500 meters, Coe still wants to win his first major title over the shorter distance. His best chance is at the European Championships in Stuttgart, West Germany, in late August.

Cram was in seventh and last place with 300 meters to go; then put in a tremendous burst of speed and surged into the lead.

"Once I decided to pick up the pace, I just went off," he said.

Scotland's Tom McKean took the

silver medal and Peter Elliott the bronze for England.

Ovelt ran a relatively slow time of 1:32.11 to win the 5,000 meters but was fresh at the end of a race in which New Zealand's John Walker, the 1976 Olympic 1,500-meter champion, came home a surprising fifth.

Athea Mahorn of Canada won the 200-meter dash, beating countyman, Bert Johnson, the fastest man in the world this year at 100 meters. Johnson, who rarely runs the longer distance, finished third. Three track and field Com-

monwealth Games titles were retained. Gary Honey of Australia held on to his long jump title and Canada's Mill Otway won the high jump.

On the women's side, Kristy Wade, formerly Kristy McDermott, retained her 800-meter title for Wales.

Angella Issajenko, who was Angella Taylor when she struck gold in the 100 meters four years ago, added the 200-meter title this year. Simon Baker won the 30-kilometer walk.

Louganis reasserts power off the boards

HOUSTON (AP) — Though he wasn't at his faultless best, Greg Louganis had more than enough Thursday to earn three perfect 10s on his way to victory in the 3-meter platform-diving competition at the U.S. Olympic Festival.

The double gold medalist at the 1984 Olympics earned his 39th national title and a trip to the World Championships in Spain next month, where he is the defending champion. He'll be joined there by men's runner-up Mark Bradshaw, women's springboard winner Michele Mitchell and runner-up Kelly McCormick.

Louganis, 26, of Boca Raton, Fla., had 1,431,000 points and now has nine Festival gold medals. Bradshaw, of Springfield, Ore., finished with 1,385,840 points.

Louganis got his 10s on a forward 3 1/2-somersault pike. But he also received some very atypical marks for him of 6s and 5s for a poorly timed reverse 2 1/2-somersault pike.

Mitchell, 24, of Scottsdale, Ariz., had to go to the last dive to clinch the title, beating Kelly McCormick of Long Beach, Calif. Mitchell was a silver medalist on the platform at the 1984 Olympics and McCormick won the silver in springboard.

On Thursday, the Fish and Game Department closed Panther Creek, effective Sunday at 9:31 p.m., after a 44-day season.

"Our creel census crews heard much favorable reaction both from the Little Salmon River and along Panther Creek," said ocean-going fish manager Dexter Pittman.

About 3,300 adult spring chinook were transported from the Fahsimer Hatchery to Panther Creek, said Pittman. The hatchery-produced fish were surplus to egg-taking needs and a majority of them were caught, he said.

"The closure will protect the remaining fish about ready to spawn, and the resulting natural production could lead to the future return of adult spring chinook to Panther Creek," said Pittman.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks dropped 4.08 to 1,775.31, finishing July with a loss of 117.41 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange slowed to 112.66 million shares from 146.69 million Wednesday.

The Dow's point decline in July was its biggest for a month since November 1973, when it plunged 131.33 points as the country confronted the onset of the energy crisis and a recession that lasted into early 1975.

In Thursday's session, analysts said investors felt some relief over the government's quarterly borrowing plans announced after the close on Wednesday. The Treasury said it would auction \$25 billion in bonds and notes next week.

Precious-metals stocks were strong, responding to a recent rise in the price of gold.

Against a casual defense, South is likely to escape with today's beatable game. Study how an experienced pair will defend, noting how the signals are exchanged through accurate carding.

West leads the spade ace and East plays his lowest spade to discourage a continuation. Is East's spade ruff a suit-preference signal asking for a shift to clubs?

No, it's not. The first priority is to show attitude (continue the suit or discontinue) and one card cannot fulfill both missions.

West shifts to the club deuce in search of a ruff, and dummy's jack wins. West refuses dummy's trump queen but wins the second trump with his ace while East signals with the diamond eight. West leads the diamond deuce to East's jack and East is at the crossroads. Should he try to cash the diamond ace for the setting trick or should he lead a club, hoping for a ruff by West?

East gets his answer from reading West's plays. Obviously West's club deuce cannot be fourth best, so it must be a singleton. Just as obvious, West has a third trump; otherwise he would have won the first trick. West's lead of the diamond deuce is a fourth-best lead, marking South with a singleton diamond.

Confidently East returns a club for West to ruff, and the accurate play nets the defenders their plus score.

NBC sweeps nominations for Emmys

ABC's 'Moonlighting' gets 16

HOLLYWOOD — NBC has once again dominated the nighttime Emmy Award nominations, collecting more than ABC and CBS combined, but ABC's sassy "Moonlighting," which often pokes fun at television, walked off with the most citations Thursday, collecting 16.

Two NBC comedies, the top-rated "The Cosby Show" and the popular first-year entry "The Golden Girls," received 15 nominations each, while "St. Elsewhere," an NBC medical drama, and "An Early Frost," an NBC movie about AIDS, got 14 each.

"Moonlighting," a romantic detective series that debuted in March 1985, and drew praise from critics for its rapid-fire dialogue and tongue-in-cheek humor, won nominations as best dramatic series, for writing and directing and for its stars, Cybill Shepherd and Bruce Willis.

Its competition for best series will come from CBS' "Cagney & Lacey," last year's winner; NBC's "Hill Street Blues," which won the four years before that; CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" and NBC's "St. Elsewhere."

Winners of the 38th annual nighttime Emmy Awards will be announced Sept. 21 in ceremonies that will be broadcast nationally by NBC.

David Letterman — host — There also will be a non-televised event Sept. 6 to disclose winners in the craft categories.

NBC, as it has for the last few years, captured the bulk of the 324 nominations announced by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, garnering 148, including four of the five nominations for best comedy series, four of the five

nominations for best miniseries and three of the five nominations for best variety or music special.

CBS, unscathed by NBC last season as the prime-time ratings champion, also finished second in the Emmy nominations, collecting 90. ABC got 51, PBS received 31 and syndicated programs got 4.

Nominated as best comedy series were "The Cosby Show," which won last year, "Cheers," which won in 1983 and 1984, "Family Ties" and "The Golden Girls," all on NBC, and CBS' "Kate & Allie."

"An Early Frost," which dealt with a family's reaction to the news that a son had contracted the fatal AIDS disease, was nominated as best drama or comedy special and also collected nominations for Ben Gazzara and Gena Rowlands as the parents, Aidan Quinn as the son, Sylvia Sidney as the grandmother and John Glover as another AIDS victim.

Also nominated as best drama or comedy special were two CBS movies, "Amos" and "Mrs. Delafield Wants to Marry," CBS' adaptation of the Broadway play "Death of a Salesman," and a "Hallmark Hall of Fame" presentation on NBC, "Love Is Never Silent."

The biggest network undertaking of the season, ABC's 24-hour Civil War saga, "North and South," did not get nominated as best miniseries. Nominated instead were CBS' "Lord Mountbatten: The Last Victory" and NBC's "Peter the Great," "On Wings of Eagles," "Dress Gray" and "The Long Hot Summer."

All three stars of "The Golden Girls," Beatrice Arthur, Rue McClanahan and Betty White, were nominated as best actress in a comedy, and Estelle Getty, who plays

Jeweler likes to horse around

For Ardis Allen, equestrian art is not pedestrian

HAGERMAN — Horse jewelry is the specialty of artist and equestrian Ardis Allen of Hagerman.

From a tiny colt wrapping his legs around a ring band to a pendant of a running stallion, Allen casts well-proportioned steeds in a variety of settings.

"I just do a little bit of everything," Allen said, leaning over one of her display cases of horse earrings, necklaces, belt buckles, pins and rings. One delicate bracelet is a chain of snaffle bits.

The secret of getting a horse sculpture just right, she said, is studying the anatomy of the animal.

"When you start taking care of horses, you learn about their anatomy," Allen said. "It's being around horses and getting into the veterinary aspect of it. You memorize the horse's body and how the legs work."

To start a new piece of jewelry, Allen makes a wax sculpture using a

small soldering iron and tiny wax wires. This is the most difficult step, she said, since it can take 10 to 16 hours or more to perfect one tiny figure.

"Sculpture in 3-D is really hard," Allen added. "There's an awful lot of precision involved in it to get it right. . . . Maybe I'm just slow or too exacting."

"I put jewelry in the category of brain surgery. You don't hurry it." The finished wax figure is invested in a plaster-like material and put in a kiln that burns the wax away. Next, on a centrifuge, melted gold, sterling silver or jewelers' bronze is spun into the shape left by the wax.

To make a duplicate, Allen makes a rubber mold from the completed metal piece and injects the rubber mold with wax to make another casting in the lost wax process.

Still, the artist spends several hours on each cast wax figure, once again perfecting the tiny details with the help of magnifying glasses.

"My stuff is pretty hard to copy on a mass production basis," Allen said.

"Jewelry is a fairly complicated craft because it's so small."

Allen does a full range of jewelry work, including repairs, restoration of antiques and stone cutting and setting.

Allen developed an avid interest in horses as a child in Chicago, where she lived near a show stable and trotting track with a 100-mile bridle path system.

"I drew my first horse when I was six years old," she said. "I've always loved them."

Allen got a job walking hot horses to cool them and soon was riding, training and showing her own.

"I was lucky to be in the right place because, usually, you don't have that kind of opportunity living in the city," she said.

Allen studied art at Northwestern University in Illinois, but, with a longing for rural life, she moved to "Sun Valley" in 1963 where she had plenty of room to ride her American Saddlebred horses. She worked as a jeweler in the Sun Valley Lodge and designed the now famous Sun Valley sun logo for the Janss Corporation.

For several years she also worked for Ben Goldberg, a jewelry manufacturer and wholesaler in Sun Valley.

Through mail orders, Allen produced an exclusive line of horse jewelry for Ryan's of Fort Worth, a Western wear and saddlery shop with a national catalog. Additional business came from national advertisements in The Western Horseman magazine.

Away from the jewelry bench, she is also a skilled artist in oil painting, pen and pencil drawings, stained glass, leather braiding and larger sculptures of a variety of animals. Her horses also appear on hand-painted ceramic tiles, porcelain plates and copper enameled trays.

Three of her oil paintings are on display at the post office in Hagerman.

Allen's pets include a horse, a 7.5-foot boa constrictor, two small South American alligators, an aquarium of rats and a cat.

Alligators, snakes, turtles, frogs and insects appear in some of her other jewelry and drawings.

Several years ago, Allen made solid gold horseflies, using the actual flies instead of wax sculptures. They were fun and sold well, but bugs are out of style now, she noted.

On July 4, Allen competed in an endurance horse race in Bliss and was injured when her horse broke through the ground into a rockchuck tunnel. The horse was not hurt and Allen rode the last eight miles with broken ribs and torn knee ligaments.

Still, with a leg cast and breathing carefully, Allen continued producing her jewelry and displaying it in shows, including the Piler Gem Show, Streets for People in Boise and Art in the Park in Twin Falls.

Allen plans to show her work at the Gem Dandy Days in Jerome Aug. 9-10 and, later in the month, at the Hagerman Flea Market and Craft Show, her favorite, Allen said, because it is close to home and it draws a good crowd.

Allen has been working on the wax figure of a trotting horse, and her next piece will be a running colt.

Making a living as an artist is not easy, she admitted, because equipment and supplies are so expensive and the work is tedious and slow.

"But I enjoy making stuff," Allen said. "People get all excited about having a custom piece of jewelry. . . . I probably could do well if I moved to a big city, but I can't stand it. I would go absolutely bonkers. I love the wide open spaces."

Live Aid ineligible for Emmy Award

HOLLYWOOD — when the Emmy nominations were announced Thursday by the Academy of Television Arts & Sciences, the biggest and most ambitious international television spectacle of the past year did not get a single nomination.

The global telecast of the Live Aid concert is ineligible because it was a television special, according to the academy's awards director John Leverage.

"I've been doing this for seven years and it's always been that way in my time," he said.

Because the televised versions of Irish rock star Bob Geldof's July 13, 1985, famine-relief rock benefits in London and Philadelphia flashed a toll-free telephone number for pledge donations at the bottom of the screen, they were designated as

telethons under academy rules, Leverage said.

There is no precedent for a telethon, or any portion of one, qualifying for an Emmy nomination, he said. So, when the names of Live Aid directors, producers, writers and camera operators were submitted last month, they were politely refused.

"It's crazy," said Howard Zuckerman, one of the producers of the telecast. "Let this be the precedent if there has to be one. Live Aid was the world together."

But Leverage said telethons have never qualified in the academy's governing eyes as pure prime-time entertainment because they solicit funds.

"Probably the most familiar such type of programming is the Jerry Lewis Muscular Dystrophy telethon."

Daniels was nominated as best lead actor in a drama series, along with one of his "St. Elsewhere" costars, Ed Flanders, and Tom Selleck of "Magnum, P.I.," Edward Woodward of "The Equalizer" and Willis "Moonlighting."

Sharon Gless, Daly's co-star on "Cagney & Lacey," also was nominated as best actress in a drama series, along with Angela Lansbury of "Murder, She Wrote," Alfre Woodard of "St. Elsewhere" and Shepherd of "Moonlighting."

Three Academy Award winners were nominated for Emmys: Dustin Hoffman for "Death of a Salesman," Katharine Hepburn for "Mrs. Deland Wants to Marry" and Vanessa Redgrave, who was nominated in separate categories for both "Second Serve" and "Peter the Great."

Besides Redgrave, other double nominees included John Lithgow, as best actor in a miniseries or a

special for his performance in "The Pill," and as guest performer in a drama series for an episode of "Amazing Stories" called "The Doll," and Stevie Wonder, as guest performer in an episode of "The Cosby Show" and for individual performance in a variety of music programs for "An All-Star Celebration Honoring Martin Luther King Jr."

Even with its leading 16 nominations, "Moonlighting" is not necessarily a favorite to win a substantial number of Emmy Awards.

Winners are chosen by peer-group panels of TV Academy members — writers, judging writers, directors, judging directors — so that block voting for a particular show is impossible.

Last year, for example, NBC's "Miami Vice" led all programs with 15 nominations but wound up winning only four Emmys. This year it received only four nominations.

'Aliens' top film draw

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The outer-space horror show "Aliens" held tight to first place after its second weekend in release, and the Jack Nicholson-Meryl Streep comedy "Heartburn" premiered in second place.

"Aliens," the 20th Century Fox sequel to "Alien," again starring Sigourney Weaver as a savvy space survivor, brought in \$8.94 million during the weekend, a percentage average of \$5,942 in 1,454 theaters. Its box-office total in its second week was \$25.07 million.

"Heartburn" earned \$3.8 million its first weekend, with a whopping per-screen average of \$6,860 on just 843 screens, smallest number of theaters of any of the top-ten finishers. Women fill more jobs, but get less pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — The economy is rapidly creating service jobs, but they're being filled by women who do not get paid enough to support a middle class standard of living, says a report released Wednesday.

"The typical job the U.S. economy is creating can be characterized as non-union service sector jobs occupied by women with low pay. ... How can America preserve and expand the middle class standard of living if the jobs and associated wages it is creating are typically low paid?" asks the study.

"Women's Wages—Essential To Preserving Middle Income Jobs," written by Oberlin professor Karen Brodtkin Sacks, was released by the National Organization for Women and the Communications Workers of America.

Rep. Pat Schroeder, D-Colo., co-chairwoman of the Congressional Caucus on Women's Issues, said the study exposed a distressing trend that raises major policy questions.

"Such a finding has consequences that affect men, women and most importantly, the American family," she said in a speech on the House floor. "Service sector jobs are jobs for the future. They account for 86 percent of all new private industry jobs. Yet the pay for these jobs doesn't support a middle income living standard."

Fern collection improved by donation

NEW YORK (AP) — Thanks to a recent donation, the New York Botanical Garden now has one of the world's most comprehensive living collections of ferns, says John Michel, senior curator.

The collection is a gift of F. Gordon Foster of Sparta, N.J., a retired Bell Telephone Laboratories scientist. He became interested in ferns nearly 40 years ago when he studied them through his work in fern spore microscopy. He photographed ferns at first and then began growing them at his home in northeastern New Jersey, where his garden became the site for his extensive collection.

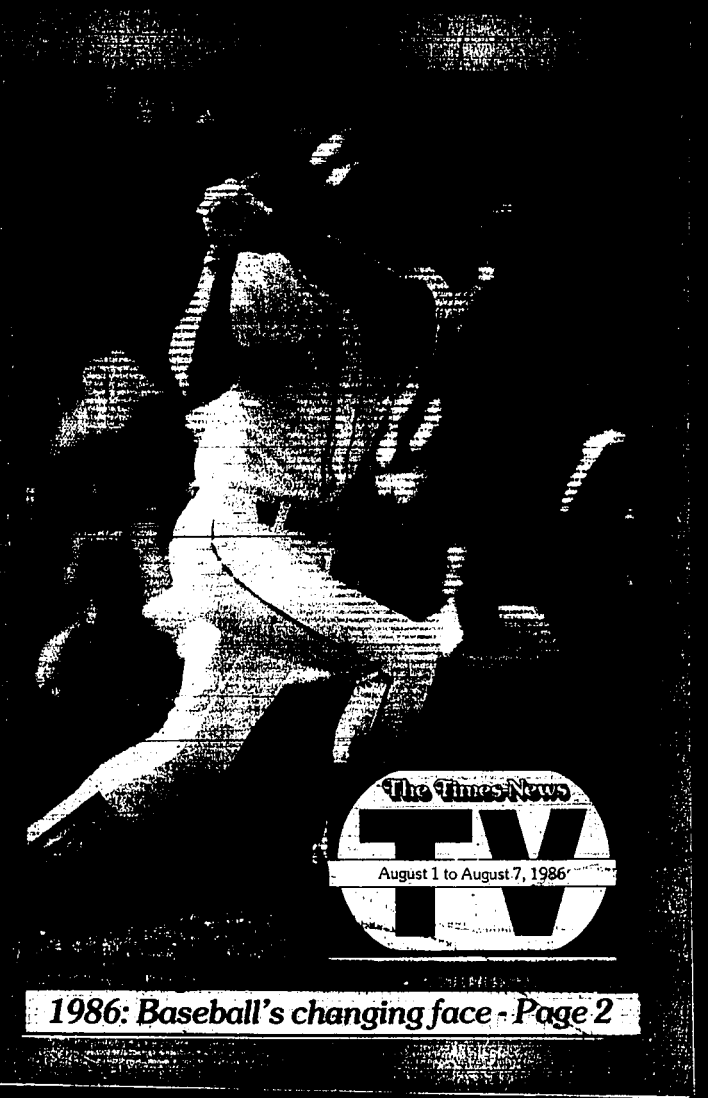

In the future, the 1986 baseball season will be seen as the year of the changing of the guard, the year in which one set of superstars faded and another took their place. Everybody has already told us that the '86 rookie crop is the finest since Cap Anson laced on his spikes more than a century ago. In fact, not since the late '50s has there been such an influx of talent in the majors. The Baseball Writers Association of America is surely going to have its hands full in the fall when they vote the two Rookie of the Year awards. Jose Canseco, Wally Joyner, Pete Incaviglia, Mark Elchhorn, Ed Correa, Charlie Kerfeld, Juan Nieves, Reggie Williams, Paul Assenmacher, Bob Tewksbury, Kevin Mitchell, Scott ("Hay") Bales, Barry Bonds, Andres Galarraga, Gene Walter, Andres Thomas and Danny Tartabull will all be names to reckon with in the future.

Just as striking is that the league leaders in most categories are guys with less than a decade in the majors. Consider these youngsters:

Wade Boggs. The Chicken Man is making a run at .400. This line-drive machine is only 28 years old, in his fifth season in the majors, all of them with the Red Sox. Boggs carried a lifetime .351 average into the '85 season; he may take a higher one out of it.

Tony Gwynn. Boggs' opposite number in the National League is two years younger and began the year with 124 fewer games in the majors. The fleet Padre outfielder has even begun to manifest some power, already topping his previous career high of six home runs in 1985.

Don Mattingly. How is it possible for someone only 25 years old to seem so poised and collected? With only 410 games in the majors before this year, mattingly has already begun to emerge as a team leader on the Yankee squad.

Kirby Puckett. Another 25-year-old, the pudgy Puckett is only in his third year of major league ball and

has begun to demonstrate prodigious power to accompany his speed and underrated arm.

Dwight Gooden, Ron Darling, Sid Fernandez and Bob Ojeda. It's scary to think that the oldest guy in the Mets rotation is Ojeda, who is only 28. If these players stay healthy, they could give the Mets a nearly bulletproof staff for another seven or

eight years.

And the list of young talent goes on. There's Kent Hrbek, George ("Liberty") Bell, Jesse Barfield, Tony Fernandez, Mel Hall, Joe Carter, Pete O'Brien, Marty Barrett, Roger Clemens, Mike Witt, Bruce Hurst, Dennis Rasmussen and Larry Sheets in the American League. And Tim ("Purple") Lincecum, Steve ("Alto") Sax, Lenry Dykstra, Kevin ("Sea") Bass, Von Hayes, Darryl Strawberry, Chili Davis, Johnny Ray, Todd Worrell, Ken Howell, Roger McDowell, Kevin McReynolds, Sid Bream, Shawn Dunston, Dan Gladden and Ryne Sandberg in the National League.

There is an old Chinese saying: "May you live in interesting times." Baseball fans have been splendidly cursed this year.

Seven-time Emmy hopeful Lucci is beginning to think she's jinxed

The Emmy Awards are now a part of recent history but the ramifications are still being felt in the soap opera world. Seven (that's how many times Susan Lucci has been nominated for Best Actress) proved to be an unlucky number for the popular soap star who once again failed to cop the coveted prize. Susan's Erica Kane lost out to her character's namesake, Erika Slezak, who plays Vicki Buchanan (and at times her alter ego Nikki) in "One Life to Live." The audience audibly gasped when Susan Lucci was passed over for the seventh time and the expression on Ms. Lucci's face couldn't mask the disappointment (she later was very gracious in interviews and stated that the loss was not as important as some people make it).

Why can't Susan Lucci win the Emmy? That's the burning question in soap opera circles. Is she just too popular with the fans? Has the fact that she has been singled out as being one of the highest paid stars in soap hindered her chances of winning? It certainly has nothing to do with her acting talents. Susan is as good as many others who have taken the Emmy home in the past.

Two of Susan's male co-stars in the ABC soap "All My Children" — Michael E. Knight (Best Younger Leading Man) and David Canary (Best Lead Actor) — picked up Emmys in their categories. David Canary, who plays Adam/Stuart Chandler, got so excited when his name was announced that he picked up Susan Lucci and started to take

her with him to the stage. Susan made him put her down, which was a very wise decision Canary praised his co-star in his acceptance speech and once again the camera shot to Susan's smiling face.

On the next night's installment of "Entertainment Tonight" there was a piece on Susan Lucci in which she was seen arriving at the Daytime Emmy Awards with "ET" correspondent Scott Osborne. Evidently "ET" also thought Susan was finally going to pick up her first Emmy. Naturally, there was a postscript to the "ET" segment in which Susan once again smilingly said that winning wasn't everything.

Some of the drama of the Emmys was played offstage — way offstage. It turns out that the wrong writers came on stage to accept the Emmys they didn't win. Here's how it all came about. When the card in the envelope was printed, the names of the right winners (the writing team of "Guiding Light") were typed in

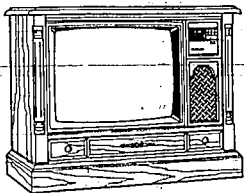

'CBS Morning News' taken from hands of the news staff

NEW YORK (AP)—The low-rated "CBS Morning News," which began with Walter Cronkite three decades ago and has since been anchored by Mike Wallace, Charles Kuralt and Phyllis George among others, has been removed from the control of CBS' news division.

The official word came Friday in a memo from CBS News President Van Gordon Sauter to the division.

The move means that, among the networks' morning shows, only NBC's "Today" remains a product of its news division. "Good Morning America" is an entertainment show, with ABC News producing periodic news segments.

"Morning News" co-anchors Forrest Sawyer and Maria Shriver are not expected to continue on the show after next week.

The announcement about the show came one day after CBS renewed the low-rated news magazine "West 57th" as a midseason replacement series, giving the network, which already has the successful "60 Minutes," two prime-time news shows.

Sauter said in his announcement that said the "Morning News" will be produced by a unit to be formed within the CBS Broadcast Group.

"We have not become fully competitive in the time period," Sauter said. "It is imperative to the news division, the company and the affiliates that we do so."

Sauter said many CBS News employees will play a part in the new broadcast, although a source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, said the news division, already

hit hard by recent cutbacks, could lose at least 25 jobs.

"There is no morning news anymore at the three networks," said Fred Friendly, former president of CBS News. "If you put a stop-watch on them, news would be a minimum part of those programs."

Friendly blamed the recent ratings frenzy on the affiliates' greed for profits. "All they want from the networks today is numbers," he said.

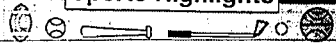

Willie Loman dies on prime time as CBS' 'Salesman' flops hugely

NEW YORK — Willie Loman died again. "Death of a Salesman" finished last in the ratings.

In the head-to-head competition between the happy Huxtables on NBC and the bickering Lomans on CBS last week, five times more viewers opted for the top-ranked "The Cosby Show," figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co showed Tuesday.

NBC's Thursday comedies ruled the first four Nielsen spots again and NBC's original William Friedkin film, "C.A.T. Squad," ranked sixth to pace the network's clear-cut victory for the week of July 21-27.

NBC also was first in dinnertime news, as the three network newscasts continued their red-hot summer competition. "NBC Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw averaged a 10.1 rating, "CBS Evening News" with Dan Rather had a 10.0 and ABC's "World News Tonight" had a 9.5.

Just one week earlier, "CBS Evening News" beat "Nightly News" by half a ratings point. "Nightly News" has won or tied for first place five times in the last nine weeks. A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

In prime time, NBC had a 12.9 rating, ABC a 10.5 and CBS a 10.2. NBC didn't dip below a 10 rating on any night, while CBS exceeded a 10 on only two nights and ABC on three.

"Our regular schedule is stronger, particularly in the summer (when comedies repeat well)," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "We'll win all the time unless there's something unusual scheduled."

"The Cosby Show" had a 25.2 rating and 50 share, meaning half

the homes watching TV were tuned to the Huxtables. In contrast, "Death of a Salesman," the critically acclaimed drama starring Dustin Hoffman as the self-deluding drummer, averaged a 5.3 rating, 10 share for the three-hour broadcast.

"It was a small audience, but a quality audience," said Greg Kasparian, CBS' director of audience measurement. "We didn't expect it to do a big rating, but we didn't expect it to do that little either. Programs that emotional, depressing and intense don't repeat too well."

When originally broadcast in September, "Death of a Salesman" averaged a 14.5 rating, 23 share.

Comedy repeats and original programming dominated the Top 10. After "Cosby," "Family Ties" had a 25.1 rating, followed by fellow Thursday sitcoms, "Cheers" and "Night Court." CBS' "Miss Universe Pageant" was fifth and "C.A.T. Squad" sixth. ABC's Tuesday comedies, "Who's the Boss?" and "Growing Pains," tied for seventh, followed by NBC's "Golden Girls" and ABC's news magazine, "20/20."

All the prime-time news magazines did well last week. CBS' "60 Minutes" was 12th, NBC's "1986" 27th, and CBS' "West 57th" 34th.

On Thursday, the day after concluding its 13th and final episode this summer, the precarious "West 57th" was renewed as a midseason

replacement series. Its final 10.9, 21 share was its season high. NBC's "1986," which is on the network's fall schedule, had 11.7, 22 share, its best performance since its premiere two months ago.

"There's definitely an appetite for news in the summer in prime time," Kasparian said.

There's also an appetite for original programming, if its special and given proper attention. Failed pilots, burned off in the summer, don't normally perform well. But the heavily promoted film "C.A.T. Squad," from Friedkin, Oscar-winning director of "The French Connection," was a ratings winner.

Brandon Tartikoff, president of NBC Entertainment, has said that if "C.A.T. Squad" proved popular, it could be the precursor to the first original summer miniseries next year.

Tartikoff eventually would like to see a 52-week TV season, rather than the traditional 30-week campaign that runs from September to April.

Preceding "C.A.T. Squad" was the debut of a new summer series called "Dalton's Code: Code of Vengeance," which will have three more episodes. It didn't fare well, ranking 51st. Another NBC summer series, "Me and Mrs. C," concluded its limited run Saturday and ranked 13th for the week.

Some series can find new life in the summer. NBC's "Remington Steele," canceled last May, given a reprieve this month as a future midseason replacement series, had its second best performance this summer and ranked 14th.

The bottom five series included ABC's "The Colbys" in 61st, followed by CBS' "Foley Square," NBC's "Silver Spoons," CBS' "Charlie & Co.," and "Death of a Salesman."

Q. Is Sylvester Stallone doing a liquor commercial on TV? Isn't that somewhat of a comedown for him? — M.R.

A. Not necessarily. In a funny way, it's a sign he's firmly arrived on the international scene. Big stars in America often make TV spots for big bucks, but strictly for consumption outside this country. Roger Moore, Paul Newman, John Travolta and Woody Allen all have starred in TV commercials in Japan, pushing everything from liquor and cars to department stores and soda pop. Stallone, sly fellow that he is, appears in a Japanese beer commercial. He didn't need to speak Japanese; all he had to do was drink the product.

Q. I recently saw Ann-Margret and her husband-manager looking thinner than they've been in years. Is it true they dropped so much weight that they wound up in a hospital? — Y.P.

A. Hold on a minute. Ann-Margret's husband, Roger Smith, has been battling the nerve disease myasthenia gravis for many years. The good news is that Roger is licking his ailment. Ann-Margret is also in excellent health. But, like many women of some maturity (she's 45), she found herself putting on unwanted pounds. Both Ann-Margret and Smith sought the advice of a private nutritionist, and both took off some weight. Ann-Margret says she dropped some 17 pounds in the last year and "I've never felt better."

Q. We were shocked to see how scruffy Robert De Niro looked on TV during the July 4 celebration at the Statue of Liberty. Why doesn't he clean up his act? — K.L.

A. You're being unfair. Yes, De Niro with his ill-kempt beard and pony-tail hair style looks a bit strange these days. That's because he portrays a street character with a troubled son in "Cuba and His Teddy Bear" on the Broadway stage. De Niro himself was worried about how his appearance would come across on the tube during the July 4 celebration, but he was assured by the producers that even such an august figure as former Chief Justice Warren Burger wouldn't mind being introduced by a long-haired De Niro.

Q. I understand Arlene Francis had a bad accident while performing in an off-Broadway show. What hap-

pened to her? — C.O.

A. Arlene was not performing, she was a member of the audience. During intermission, she missed a step while coming into the theater, fell and broke both her wrist and ankle. But she is recuperating nicely from the accident.

Q. Many contemporary Midases have been referred to as the world's richest man. Who holds this title in your opinion? — P.K.

A. According to Ronald Kessler, a respected investigative journalist, it's Adnan Khashoggi, the Saudi Arabian middleman who started with nothing and went on to become a billionaire. In his unauthorized biography, "The Richest Man in the World," Kessler, once a close personal friend of Khashoggi, reports that his daily spending averages \$300,000 a day. Further indulgences: American Express bills often exceeding one million dollars; a flight to Venice for spaghetti dinner on one of Khashoggi's three commercial-sized airplanes; a Paris duplex housing a \$30 million art collection; a \$25 million apartment with huge swimming pool in New York's swank Olympic Towers; and a \$70 million yacht, the most lavish afloat. Khashoggi's personal expenditures are estimated at \$120 million a year.

Q. I remember the wonderful Eva Maria Saint in "On the Waterfront." What's she doing these days? — J.G.

A. Eva Marie, who launched her cinema career in 1954 by winning a Best Supporting Actress Oscar for "On the Waterfront," turns in another prize-winning performance in the soon-due "Nothing in Common" portraying Tom Hanks' troubled mother. Insiders predict Hanks will make a breakthrough to more serious dramatic roles after this one.
