## Soviets grant asylum to former CIA agent

MOSCOW — The Soviet Union said Thursday it had given asylum to former CIA agent Edward Lee Howard, who has eluded an FBI dragnet since being charged last year with selling U.S. secrets to Moscow.

Reports published in the United States have said information Howard sold the Soviets for \$200 "wiped out" the CIA's Moscow operations and led the Soviets to arrest and execute a Soviet CIA contact.

Howard, 33, vanished from his Santa Fe, N.M., home last September, just days before

the FBI charged him with espionage. Reagan administration sources said in October he was thought to have fled to the Soviet Union.

His father, who lives in the Dallas suburb of Garland, was quoted by the Garland Daily News as saying "his son telephoned from Moscow on Tuesday morning."

It was believed to be the first defection by a CIA agent and the first American defection to Moscow since the 1960s.

The official Tass news agency distributed a statement in English saying Howard sought asylum because "he has to hide from

U.S. secret services, which unfoundedly persecute him."

The government newspaper Izvestia published a brief announcement of Howard's defection on its back page. It did not say Howard was accused of spying and described him only as "a U.S. citizen (and) a former CIA officer." The statement did not say when Howard entered the Soviet Union or where he is.

"Guided by humane considerations, the President of the U.S.S.R. Supreme Soviet complied with the request of Edward Lee Howard. He has been granted the right to

live in the U.S.S.R. for political reasons," the statement said.

In Washington, CIA spokeswoman Kathy Pherson said she could not confirm or deny Izvestia's report. Assistant FBI Director William Baker said, "We certainly give a lot of credence to the Soviets' public remarks. We have no reason to believe they are untrue."

Specific details about the damage Howard may have caused U.S. intelligence are hazy. But a former CIA official in Washington, speaking on condition of anonymity, said the damage "has to have been serious." Howard worked for the CIA from January

1981 to June 1983, when he was fired. U.S. officials said he flunked a polygraph test that indicated he had used illegal drugs while he was an agent and was guilty of petty thefts of money.

Howard had been in training for a Moscow Post. The FBI charged in court papers that he met with KGB officials in St. Anton, Austria, on Sept. 20, 1984. U.S. officials said \$6,000 appeared in his bank accounts after that date.

Howard did not come under suspicion until nearly a year later, after U.S. officials inter-

## Reagan to take drug test

Bush joins effort to fight drug use

WASHINGTON — President Reagan and Vice President George Bush will take drug tests next Monday "to lead the way" toward achieving a drug-free American workplace, the White House said Thursday.

Deputy Press Secretary Albert R. Brashear said the 78 members of Reagan's senior staff also have been asked to give urine samples Monday if they are not on vacation, but he stressed that the tests were voluntary: "We're not out to punish anyone," he said.

"The president has made it clear that he is seeking a drug-free workplace for all Americans," the spokesman said. "He believes that all federal employees deserve a drug-free environment, and that federal employees should set the example for state and local government and the private sector to follow in identifying users of illegal drugs."

The announcement sparked a flurry of questions about how voluntary the tests would be, what would happen to senior staff members refusing to take it and whether the results would be made public.

The White House staffers were notified up to five days in advance about the tests, thus raising questions about the effectiveness of the screening. For occasional drug users, most drugs would disappear from the body after one to four days. Under mandatory testing, there is no advance notice.

Brashear said "this is a voluntary program." Asked whether it might become mandatory, he said, "We're not at that point yet."

Reporters asked Brashear several times to spell out the consequences for any members of the senior staff who did not volunteer to take the test.

"If they don't take it, they just choose not to take it," he said at one

## Soviet performers thrilled to finally walk on U.S. soil

MIAMI — A husband-and-wife team of Soviet tightrope performers who defected to the United States said their first step on American soil Thursday was like Nell Armstrong's walk on the moon.

Nikolai Nikolski and Bertalina Kazakova, stars of the Moscow Circus, slipped away from their hotel Monday to the U.S. Embassy in Buenos Aires and flew to Miami where they were granted asylum.

"We like America," said Miss Kazakova, who learned to speak broken English by reading books and listening to radio broadcasts.

"It's our dream to live in America, dream all our life."

The 35-year-old high-wire artists kept their intentions secret from Miss Kazakova's brother and his

sister, who are part of the five-member troupe led by Nikolski.

Their only possessions in America are a black briefcase, two photo bags and two plastic shopping bags. Among their mementoes are a picture of a pet Pomeranian named Mickey, "like Mickey Mouse," left behind in Moscow and a Soviet magazine article featuring their act.

"Not a lot of our things, and a lot of hope," Nikolski said through an interpreter.

"They had a well-founded fear of persecution if they were returned to the Soviet Union," said Perry Rivkind, regional director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. "I granted asylum."

Esther Shatkhin, a Soviet emigre who acted as their interpreter, translated. "They said that when they stepped the first time on American earth, they

don't know what Armstrong felt when he walked on the moon, but they thought they felt the same."

They arrived in the United States on the same day the Soviet newspaper Izvestia reported that fugitive ex-CIA agent Edward Lee Howard received political asylum in the Soviet Union, Howard vanished last year just before being charged with selling U.S. secrets to Moscow.

The couple toured Cuba three years ago with the circus and "knew—Florida was across the water," said Mrs. Shatkhin, who was summoned by the INS. "They would dream about going to Florida some day, and their dream came true."

Their immediate plans were to find a hotel, await word from Washington and contact a circus to begin performing again. Miss

## Congress sees record deficit of \$224 billion

WASHINGTON — Congressional economists on Thursday projected a record \$224 billion budget deficit this year that is below the Reagan administration estimate, but said the 1987 shortfall will be worse than the White House predicts.

The Congressional Budget Office said Congress will miss its Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction targets in fiscal 1987 even if every promise in the budget is carried out.

The new CBO prediction is \$6 billion below the White House estimate, but \$12 billion above the record set last year and \$16 billion above what the agency's last projection in February. CBO director Rudolph G. Penner said part of the problem was the anticipated rebound in the economy was occurring later than expected.

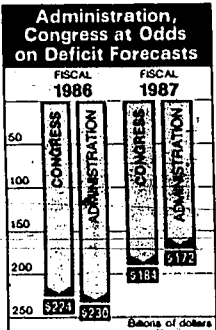
"We thought we saw the light at the end of the tunnel," he said. "Unfortunately, the tunnel moved on us."

The Reagan administration on Wednesday issued its prediction that the 1986 deficit would balloon to \$230 billion, up \$27 billion from its earlier projection. But its economic estimates and spending predictions for next year were more optimistic than CBO's.

The CBO predicts that economic growth in calendar 1986 will be 2.9 percent, as measured from the fourth quarter of 1985, compared to a 3.2 percent annual fourth quarter of this year to the end of 1987, the economy will grow 3.5 percent, the CBO said.

That compared to 4.2 percent predicted by Reagan's advisers for the same period.

The White House put Congress close to the \$14 billion Gramm-Rudman deficit target, perhaps even below the \$14 billion threshold for ordering across-the-board spending cuts, either by legislation or automatically if lawmakers follow through with pending legislation to revise a mandatory reduction mech-

anism overturned by the Supreme Court.

But the CBO said the budget Congress passed in June to meet the deficit target would now yield \$16 billion in red ink if followed to the letter.

Letting current spending and tax policies continue would push the deficit \$40 billion over target, to \$184 billion, the CBO said, compared to \$171.5 billion in the administration report. The \$184 billion figure gives "a real sense of how much pain is necessary" to reach the deficit goal, Penner said.

"Even under—Gramm-Rudman's unique and less severe deficit-prediction formula, because it assumes that many spending programs already are frozen, the CBO estimated the fiscal 1987 deficit at \$173 billion."

Under that scenario, very unlikely because OMB's estimate could be \$20 billion lower, domestic programs would be cut 11.5 percent and military spending cut 8.2 percent, Penner said.

## Study shows decline in farm population

WASHINGTON — More than one rural resident in 10 left the land in the first half of the 1980s, as the nation's farm population turned significantly smaller and older, the government said Thursday.

The nation's farm population dropped 11.5 percent to 5,355,000 between 1980 and 1985, according to a new study by the Census Bureau and the Agriculture Department.

That means about one American in 45 lives on a farm, down from one in seven in 1950 and one in four in 1930.

"It would be foolish not to think this decline," but many of them are among those who are in trouble now. They came in when it was both necessary and possible to borrow large sums of money for

"A consolidation of farms is going on as they lose out, or decide they are about to, and quit. So the farm population is still continuing to decline, and the end of the decline is certainly not visible," he said in an interview.

The study, "Farm Population of the United States, 1985," said "young family members may be more likely now than in the past to move off the farm ... in the face of current economic uncertainties," the report went on.

That trend has helped lead to a median age of 36.5 years for farm residents, significantly higher than the median of 31.4 for the nation as a whole.

## Anglers net largest great white shark

MONTAUK, N.Y. — Fishermen reeled in a 3,450-pound great white shark, with help from the legendary shark hunter whose exploits inspired parts of the movie "Jaws." Hundreds of spectators gathered Thursday at a dock on the eastern tip of Long Island to see the 16-foot, 8-inch creature.

"We crushed the record," said Donnie Braddock of Huntington, who completed the capture at about 8 p.m. Wednesday with help from shark fisherman Frank Mundus and four others.

The shark, caught on a 150-pound test tackle normally used to catch shark tuna, was said to be 800 pounds heavier than the previous record for a great white shark that was caught, as listed in the Guinness Book of Records.

"It was circling the boat and we coaxed him into eating our bait of whiting and butterfish," said Braddock, captain of the charter boat, Fish On.

He called the catch a "dramatic experience" and said the "entire

crew was overwhelmed."

Braddock, 30, said his charter boat was linked with the Cricket II, Mundus' boat, and the shark was actually caught with help from five other fishermen including Mundus.

The fishermen were in the Atlantic 30 miles south of Montauk when they spotted as many as eight great white sharks feeding on a dead whale on Monday.

"After a while, we nicknamed them," Braddock said. "There was 'Scarface' because he was all scarred up, and 'The Twins,' because they were just about the same size."

The fishermen had to get the shark to ignore the plentiful supply of whale meat long enough to take the bait.

"We were offering a 3,000-pound fish a lollipop when he had the whole candy store," Mundus said. "It took us all day to get him to take the bait. The real thrill was teasing him to take the bait."

Mundus said the shark might be the climax to his long career.

"There's no other place to go from here," he said. "Let somebody else try it. There's a lot more to it than

## Bush ends nerve gas impasse

WASHINGTON (AP) — With Vice President George Bush once more breaking an impasse over nerve gas, the Senate (voted Thursday) turned back challenges to the new U.S. chemical weapons and later called for new superpower talks aimed at a total ban on nuclear tests.

The votes came as the chamber tried to finish work on a Pentagon budget bill. But the Senate failed to give up late Thursday and legislators vowed to complete their work Friday.

By a 64-35 margin, the Senate called on President Reagan to resume U.S.-Soviet talks aimed at completely banning nuclear weapons tests. A 1963 treaty outlaws open-air testing.

## Reagan may OK fourth shuttle

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has made a decision in principle to order construction of fourth space shuttle but still is wrestling with questions about funding, administration officials said Thursday.

Reagan met with the Economic Policy Council Thursday and heard arguments that the orbiter

should stop carrying commercial and foreign payloads.

The session was the latest in the latest in a series of meetings on steps to rebuild America's space program after the Jan. 28 explosion that destroyed the shuttle Challenger and killed its seven crew members.

## Tornado brings damage, flood

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — A tornado struck downtown during rush hour Thursday, heavily damaging buildings, flipping parked cars and flooding roads.

At least 20 people suffered minor injuries, hospital officials said.

The twister touched down around 5:30 p.m. and blew off much of the top floor of the five-story Fulford Manufacturing building, an old factory on a hill overlooking downtown.

"There were parked cars picked up and dropped down and turned over on their sides," police Lt. Lloyd Allen said.

The storm was accompanied by heavy rain and flooding was reported on Interstate 95 and on other roads.

land and equipment, and find the value of their collateral now having dwindled," Beale said.

"During the last two years, we show no further increase in the number of younger farmers. Young people can't get started, or have changed their minds about desirability of going into the business," he said.

In 1920, the farm population had a median age of 20.7 years, compared with 26.9 for non-farm residents. By 1960, the median ages of both groups were about equal, 32.5 years for farm residents and 29.5 for non-farmers.

Beale questioned some of the specifics of the new report, particularly an apparent one-year drop in the farm population and an increase in the farm population of the Midwest between 1984 and 1985.

The study showed a sharp drop of 399,000 in the farm population between 1984 and 1985 after having held steady for a few years.

The overall decline between 1980 and 1985 seems accurate, Beale said, but he believed it began earlier rather than dropping sharply last year.

"The study is based on a survey of 58,000 households, but at 23 percent of the population that would include only 1,276 farm households, a small

enough sample to result in some "bounces" from year to year, Beale explained.

The report said the largest declines in the South and West, with 16 percent drops in the farm populations of each area. On the other hand, it showed a 3 percent gain in the Midwest and a 3 percent drop in the Northeast.

"Those numbers put me in a quandary," said Beale of the Midwestern figures.

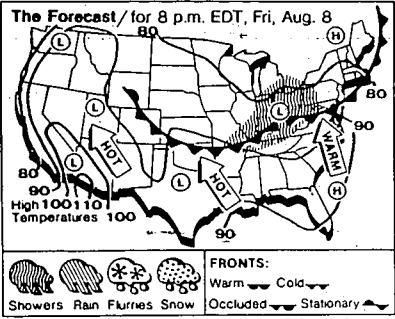

rogated Soviet defector Vitaly Yurchenko, described as a high-ranking KGB officer.  
Yurchenko, who later returned to the Soviet Union and denied he was with the KGB, reportedly knew only the code name "Robert." But he supplied enough information to trace "Robert" to Howard.  
The Los Angeles Times last month quoted unidentified sources as saying Howard sold the Soviets details of U.S. intelligence operations in

Moscow that led to the execution of one of the CIA's prime contacts, identified as A.G. Tokachev, an engineer.  
"Howard disclosed virtually every active operation we had," it quoted a source as saying. "He wiped out, Moscow station."  
The Times also quoted a highly classified report as saying Howard had drug problems and was mentally unstable.  
Two days before Howard disappeared, the KGB issued an announcement through Tass saying Tokachev was charged with espionage. It linked him to U.S. diplomat Paul Stombaugh, who was expelled from the Soviet Union on espionage charges in June 1985.  
At least two other American diplomats have been expelled on spy charges since then. KGB chief Viktor M. Chebrikov told the 27th Communist Party Congress this year that a "major" U.S. spy operation in Moscow had been broken up.

Kazakova said they had read about the Ringling Bros. and Barnum & Bailey Circus when the America circus toured Moscow about 12 years ago.  
Ringling Bros. is interested in interviewing the couple, and "a bunch of circuses have called — half a dozen," said Perry (TV), regional director of the Immigration and Naturalization Service. He added that the performers "are thrilled

beyond belief."  
"We want to be free, free people," said Miss Kazakova. "We don't like our Soviet life. I don't like the polluted Soviet Union."  
Asked at a news conference if she had a message for the American people, she said, "You are very lucky and very happy people because you live in America. You must like your democracy because we haven't this in the Soviet Union."  
"We don't have the right to decide in what cities we live. We can't negotiate our contracts, we can't even decide what acts we are going to perform," Miss Kazakova said in an interview before leaving Buenos Aires.  
"That's on the professional side," said Nikolski through the interpreter. "On the personal side, in the Soviet Union, the only way you can live is think one way, speak another way and act a third way."

throwing bait in the water."  
Mundus is Montauk's most famous shark killer. The book and movie "Jaws," about a massive shark terrorizing a Long Island town, were based in part on Mundus' experiences.  
Mundus harpooned a 4,500-pound shark in 1964, the largest ever on the East Coast, but sharks that are harpooned are not considered for world's records. They called that shark "Big Daddy."  
Montauk Marine Basin owner Carl Darenberg said the world-record status of the shark captured Wednesday is pending approval by the International Game Fish Association. The record was a 2,664-pound shark caught off South Australia in 1959.  
Basin spokesman Richard Berk said the fish might not qualify because of the weight of the line used to catch it and the number of fishermen involved in the catch.  
"One guy has to do it with no assistance," he said. "We think the fish is of tremendous outdoor importance anyway."

# Appeals court rejects part of Yarbrough's sentence

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — A federal appeals court on Thursday set aside 10 years of a 25-year sentence imposed in Idaho on a member of a neo-Nazi group for charges including possession of the machine gun that authorities said killed Denver talk show host Alan Berg.

The ruling by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in the case of Gary Lee Yarbrough does not affect the separate 6-year sentence Yarbrough received in Seattle for racketeering, conspiracy and armed robbery as a member of the white-supremacist group called The Order.

Yarbrough, 30, of Sandpoint, Idaho, was one of 10 members of the group convicted by a Seattle jury last December. The charges in that case encompassed activities of The Order that authorities said were aimed at fomenting and financing a racist revolution.

The indictments also charged that they included armed robberies in the Seattle area, a \$3.6 million holdup of a Brinks armored car

near Ukiah, Calif., in July 1984, and the June 1984 slaying of Berg, a critic of right-wing groups.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Ronald Howan said that although the gun linked to Berg's killing was found in Yarbrough's home, Yarbrough did not take part in the shooting. Howan described Yarbrough as "one of the original founding members ... one of the inner circle" of The Order, and said he took part in the Seattle and Ukiah robberies.

The Idaho charges stemmed from an October 1984 incident in which FBI agents said Yarbrough fired several shots at their U.S. Forest Service pickup truck as it drove by his rented home near Samuels, in rural northern Idaho.

After Yarbrough fled, Howan said, agents got a warrant, searched the home and found numerous weapons, including including the .45-caliber, silencer-equipped machine gun that killed Berg; dynamite, plastic explosives, detonators, and thou-

sands of rounds of ammunition. Yarbrough was arrested in November 1984 after he jumped from the second floor of a Portland, Ore., motel during an FBI stakeout. Robert Matthews, described as the leader of The Order, was wounded in the same incident and was killed in a fire the following month during an FBI siege of his hideout in Whidbey Island, Wash.

Yarbrough pleaded guilty to 11 weapons charges and was convicted of assaulting a federal officer. His 25-year sentence by U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan included 10 years for possessing three unregistered guns and 10 years for possessing the same guns with the serial numbers removed. Howan said they were all machine guns, and included the Berg weapon.

A three-judge appeals court panel ruled that only one of the two 10-year sentences was allowed.

# Gus Creek fire nearly controlled

Firefighters have finished fire lines around the Gus Creek fire that has been raging in the Nezperce National Forest, and hope to have it under control by Friday, said spokeswoman Mary Zabinski.

Meanwhile, with flames posing a threat to a remote ranger station, Nezperce National Forest fire bosses on Thursday airlifted 20 smoke-jumpers into the mountainous Selway-Bitterroot Wilderness to

counter a raging wildfire that has already blackened 1,550 acres of timberland.

Also, the Bureau of Land Management was battling 30,000 acres of numerous blazes caused by a lightning storm Thursday in which 600 strikes were recorded.

Spokesman Jack Sept said 17 separate fires were started, but many had merged by Thursday evening. The largest was 25,000 acres in the Willow Creek area near Fayetteville. Firefighters also were battling a

10,000-acre blaze near Padlock Valley and a 1,000-acre fire near West Gulch, all north of Boise.

To the south, a 4,000-acre fire east of Mayfield threatened critical winter feeding land for deer and came within yards of a lookout tower, he said.


A 15,000-acre fire near Grandview was contained about 10 p.m., he said. Two other smaller fires in the Boise foothills were contained by Thursday afternoon.

## Pair survives storm

SYRACUSE, Utah (AP) — Two men were pulled uninjured from the Great Salt Lake early Thursday after a violent thunderstorm overturned their 21-foot sailboat, authorities said.

The summer storm, which ripped through northern Utah Wednesday night and caused scattered power outages, upset the boat about 7:30 p.m.

## Give-away of Bibles challenged

BOISE (AP) — The issue of separation between church and state has flared in a federal lawsuit challenging the distribution of Bibles to a class of fifth graders in the southeastern Idaho town of Paris.

Paris resident Carolyn Hill contends her son Joshua's constitutional rights were violated when he and his 34 classmates were given Bibles at Paris Elementary School on March 7.

The American Civil Liberties Union filed the suit on Wednesday in U.S. District Court in Pocatello on behalf of the Hills — the second suit it has filed in the state involving Bible distribution at a public school, said Steven Pevar, the ACLU's regional counsel in Denver.

"We don't want our public schools to be conduits for religious indoctrination," said Pevar, who filed the suit along with Pocatello attorney Ronald J. Jarman. When parents sent their children to school, it's not with the idea that some teacher will indoctrinate their child with religious teachings of the church."

In the earlier lawsuit, the Jerome School District agreed in 1984 not to allow the distribution of Bibles on public school property.

School officials admitted to violating the constitutional rights of Magdalena Ripplinger, 11, by allowing distribution of Bibles by Gideon's International.

"We were hoping that would put an end to this stuff," Pevar said.

Defendants in the latest suit are the Bear Lake County School District, Superintendent Lyle J. Loose, Paris Elementary Principal Lewis J. Teuscher, and Hill's teacher, Jaren Pugmire.

The suit accuses school officials of allowing the Bibles to be distributed to the entire fifth grade. That constituted a violation of a clause in the First Amendment guaranteeing separation of church and state, the suit contends.

## French mull INEL project

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — A French nuclear energy company is considering construction of a prototype nuclear reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in eastern Idaho.

Officials of COGEMA have discussed the project with the state's top scientist. They indicated a consortium would finance construction of the reactor by Idaho workers and then test its safety features and take its standardized design to the Nuclear Regulatory Commission for approval.

"The reason they want to build it here is that they want to sell it here," said Marilyn Meigs, an aide to Sen. James McClure. "They want to show the United States the benefits of this design."


Officials said the proposition would provide both employment and a boost to the eastern Idaho economy.

The prototype would be a 300 megawatt, modular pressurized water reactor, similar to U.S. Navy propulsion reactors. It would eventually be intended for commercial use and would be equipped with both containment and confinement safety features.

### Workers' drug tests idea should be killed

In case you were worried about their on-the-job performance, President Reagan, Speaker Thomas "Tip" O'Neill and Secretary of State George Shultz all volunteered this week to submit to drug tests.

The president also said he's sure all the members of his Cabinet would be similarly cooperative. We'd guess that this list, plus a few other elected and appointed officials, would make up the total number of federal employees who are willing to put up with this intrusive and offensive procedure on a routine basis.

The idea of requiring all federal employees to provide urine samples at the office first surfaced last March when the President's Commission on Organized Crime made this crazy suggestion.

There were predictable — and deserved — howls from employee unions, congressional committees and a lot of citizens who quickly saw the civil liberties implications of this kind of testing.

Even Attorney General Meese was cool to the plan, stating simply that the Justice Department "would review the proposal" at some unspecified time in the future.

But after all this battering, the idea does not yet appear to be dead and buried. We're not talking about tests for individuals whose conduct gives rise to reasonable suspicion that they are under the influence of drugs, or even for a few sharply limited groups of employees — e.g., airline pilots and controllers — whose alertness is essential to the physical safety of others, and who thus may be subject to stricter testing requirements than most.

What is outrageous is the notion of the compulsory testing of all employees, a reversal of the presumption of innocence that requires a group of workers regularly to prove that they have not broken the law.

When President Reagan announced a new administration effort to combat drug use this week, he indicated that it was not his intention to require drug testing of all federal employees.

His proposals have not yet been detailed, but their goal should be to limit testing to occasions where there is probable cause to believe an employee is an abuser, or when safety and national-security considerations are truly compelling.

Drug tests for all federal workers would be intrusive, humiliating and unfair. The idea should be buried once and for all.

### Family policy emerges as critical issue

Family policy is emerging as one of the most critical political issues of the mid-1980s. The reason is that the majority of Americans are experiencing tremendous strain as their work and family responsibilities increasingly come into conflict.

New tensions have been created by the massive structural changes that have swept through American society. Today, 45 percent of the labor force is female, and married women with young children comprise the majority of new entrants to the job market. Fifty percent of babies less than a year old now have mothers in the workplace, compared to 12 percent in 1950.

Despite these new realities, 60 percent of working women have no right to job-protected maternity leave, and the amount of public money spent on child care for low-income families has fallen by 25 percent since 1980.

Economic and social policy-making in the United States still assumes that the traditional family is the dominant family type. This despite the fact that in 1980, 19 percent of all American families fit the traditional Norman-Rockwell mold — breadwinning husband, homemaking wife and one or more dependent children. Not only do both parents in most married-couple families work, but the number of single-parent households headed by women has increased rapidly. Twenty-five percent of all children are being raised by single mothers. Most children in the United States today have working mothers, and most parents must balance the competing demands of work and family responsibilities.

It's time that government and business recognize these new realities and respond to them with supportive family policies.

In 1983, the Economic Policy Council of the United Nations Association set up a panel on family policy in America. It was to investigate the problems facing working parents and to recommend measures that would help resolve these problems. Among its members were former President Ford, Washington Post Chairman Katharine Graham and Atlantic Richfield Chairman Robert O. Anderson.

The EPC report was meant to produce realistic solutions, not pie in the sky. The panel members, while sympathetic to the problems in hand, were not professional dogooders but hard-headed members of the establishment who had a firm grip on economic and political reality. In addition, because many of them were men, the panel was not just another group of concerned women talking to the converted. The goal was to find out what could be done in America in the mid-1980s, an era of budget cutting and limited social conscience, not what might be done in utopia.

The EPC released its report at a Senate dinner in January. Signing it were 75 corporate and labor union executives. Among the policies they deemed feasible are:

- Maternity and parental leave. The panel endorsed these policies on the ground that they comprised low-cost benefits (less than 20 percent of the wage bill) that paid off in terms of productivity and morale. It recommended federal legislation mandating temporary disability insurance in the 45 states that currently do not require such coverage; an expansion of the definition of disability to give women the right to at least six to eight weeks leave at the time of birth, with some wage replacement during this time and a job guarantee at the end of the period; an unpaid, job-protected parenting leave for either parent for up to six months after birth.

- Maternity and child health. The panel recommended that the federal government provide health coverage for pregnant women and children. Not only are these two groups disproportionately impoverished and disproportionately uninsured, but there is extensive evidence that increases in preventative maternal and child health care reap substantial long-range savings in catastrophic care programs.

- Flexible work schedules and career ladders. The panel emphasized that working parents of small children need time more than anything else. It urged employers and government to encourage to make more work-sharing and part-time employment available at all occupational levels including management, without curtailing the promotional opportunities of employees. Flex-time should be implemented on a larger scale to allow employees to better integrate work and family responsibilities, and special leave time for parents to care for sick children should be established. Traditional career ladders should be assessed in relation to the family responsibilities of working parents, as more and more men and women in traditional career trajectories find that the most critical phases of their work and family lives coincide.

- Pre-school and early childhood education. The panel pointed out that in the United States there are 8.5 million children under 6 years of age with working parents and that schooling before age 5 can boost the quality of early childhood education and can help meet child-care needs. By making this pre-school available on a voluntary basis for 2-, 3- and 4-year-olds and by extending the school day, schools could serve important.

educational and child-care objectives. In addition, school facilities should be used for before- and after-school programs. Such policies would reduce the need for, and therefore the cost of, remedial-education programs.

- Child care. Funding for such programs such as the child-care portion of the Social Security Act should be restored and even expanded. In addition, the amount of the child-care tax credit should be given in cash to families whose taxable income is too low to benefit from it. Tax policy and other official incentives should encourage labor unions, community groups and corporations to develop child-care services.

The EPC report on family policy captured headlines across the nation. The report hit a nerve, because for the first time an influential group of business and labor leaders was taking these family issues seriously and recommending solutions that made sense to the private sector.

In recent years, most industrial countries have experienced dramatic changes in work force and family patterns similar to those in the United States. Other Western democracies have responded by implementing a coordinated set of public and private policies that support working parents and their children. The United States is conspicuous for its failure to respond to these massive shifts. It is time our policies caught up with the rest of the world. The competitive strength of our economy and the health and well-being of American family life is at stake.

One thing we need to change our attitudes about society's responsibility for children. We cannot continue to view children as purely private choices or consumption items akin to buying a second car or taking a winter vacation. Having a child is surely a private choice and a private joy, but those children are also the workers of the future, and we as a nation should be heavily involved in ensuring that these children get a decent start in life.

Back in the 1940s a conservative French president, Marshal Henri Petain, described motherhood as "a social function similar to military service for men, that had to be financially supported by the whole community." This attitude increased government maternity benefits, child allowances and excellent day care and pre-schools for French families. We in the United States pay a great deal of lip service to motherhood and family. It is time to put our money where our mouth is.

# Panel to consider probe of Deaver

WASHINGTON — A House panel will vote next week on whether to recommend that an independent counsel investigate charges that former White House deputy chief of staff Michael K. Deaver committed perjury, the subcommittee's chairman said Tuesday.

The panel will consider a report that alleges "possible perjury before the committee" when Deaver testified last May during a closed session, said Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the House Energy and Commerce oversight and investigations subcommittee.

The subcommittee will meet Tuesday to consider approving the report, which asks the independent counsel to "inquire into whether or not indictments for criminal misbehavior should be acted upon by special prosecutor."

Randall Turk, a Washington attorney representing Deaver, said "It is inappropriate to comment until such time as we have an opportunity to see any report prepared by Mr. Dingell's subcommittee."

"We have not had any contact from Mr. Dingell," Turk said. "We have not yet received a copy of a transcript of Mr. Deaver's testimony, despite repeated requests for it."

The report deals with "several items of serious conflict in Mr. Deaver's testimony before the committee under oath," said Dingell, who also chairs the full Energy and Commerce Committee. It also recommends that independent counsel Whitney North Seymour Jr. act on findings by the General Accounting Office that Deaver may have violated conflict-of-interest laws.

Dingell declined to specify what elements of Deaver's testimony were in conflict, saying he would prefer to wait until the report is considered by the subcommittee.

# Fusion reaction test sets heat record

PRINCETON, N.J. — Scientists have heated a rarified gas to a record 13 times as hot as the core of the sun, a big step toward harnessing the "fusion" nuclear reaction that powers the stars, researchers said Thursday.

The gas temperature inside a doughnut-shaped reactor in several mid-July experiments reached 200 million degrees centigrade, or 360 million degrees Fahrenheit, said Harold Furth, director of the Princeton University plasma physics laboratory.

"No previous laboratory experiment has ever achieved such high temperatures," said Furth, who said the previous record for a fusion experiment was 80 million degrees centigrade in 1980.

He said researchers hope next year to achieve the right combination of heating, insulation and gas density that will lead to a long-

sought goal: getting as much energy out of a fusion reaction as researchers have to put into it.

That "break-even" point should actually be achieved in 1989, he said. It is regarded as a crucial milestone because researchers hope to use fusion energy for commercial power generation early in the next century.

Fusion research is aimed at harnessing the tremendous energy released when the nucleus, or core, of a hydrogen atom fuses with another to form helium. In contrast, today's nuclear reactors use the energy released when atoms of uranium are split, in a process called fission.

Experts hope fusion will become a safe and environmentally attractive

nuclear power source that eventually could run on a virtually inexhaustible fuel: deuterium, a form of hydrogen abundant in sea water.

To trigger fusion, scientists heat hydrogen gas to incredibly high temperatures, which breaks hydrogen atoms into a mix of hydrogen nuclei and electrons, called a plasma. In such heat, the hydrogen nuclei collide and fuse, overcoming the repulsion of their identical electric charges.

The record temperature marks the first time researchers have achieved temperatures needed for a useful, power-generating reactor, said J.P. Clarke, head of the U.S. Department of Energy's office of fusion energy.

# Nation

Don Davidson, director of the plasma fusion center at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology, called the Princeton achievement "very significant, a major milestone for fusion."

JASPER, Ind. (AP) — The mayor asked residents to fly their flags at half-staff Thursday as William Schroeder's family returned home to plan the funeral of the world's longest-living artificial heart recipient.

"It's still trying to sink in," said a son, Rod Schroeder. Sitting on the porch of the small, white-frame family home with two of Schroeder's small grandchildren, he added, "We've got a lot to think about."

Margaret Schroeder, widow of the 51-year-old father of seven who died Wednesday, was having lunch inside the house, Ron Schroeder said, adding that he thought it best not to disturb her.

"We've got a lot to do," he said. The family faced a long weekend. Calling hours at the Beecher-Klusener Funeral Home were from 4 p.m. to 10 p.m. Thursday and all day Friday. The funeral at St. Joseph Church was scheduled for Saturday morning.

Jasper Mayor Jerome Alles asked residents to fly their flags at half-staff "on behalf of Bill Schroeder and what he did for mankind."

"People here followed Bill's experience closely," Alles said. Funeral director Arnie Klusener said crowds would wind around the block during calling hours, but not just because of Schroeder's fame, he said.

"It's a small community and everybody turns up anyway," Klusener said. "We may get a few more people, though, because I'm sure the Schroeders made a lot of friends down in Louisville."

The Rev. Joe Kirsch said the funeral Mass would be led by Schroeder's uncle, the Rev. Sylvester Schroeder of Ferdinand and the Rev. Othmar Schroeder of Schnellville.

## Women business owners make less money

WASHINGTON (AP) — Women own nearly one-fourth of the nation's businesses, although their companies generate only one-tenth of all receipts, the Census Bureau said Wednesday.  
A new analysis of the 1982 U.S. Economic Census found that women owned 2,884,450 businesses — 23.9 percent of all individual proprietorships, partnerships and small business corporations operating at that time.  
But the \$98.3 billion in receipts their companies generated amounted to only 10.2 percent of all income from those types of companies, the study found.  
The report did not include large corporations — those with more than 25 shareholders — because researchers were not able to deter-

mine which of those were owned primarily by women.  
Of the companies owned by women, the vast majority — 2,661,210 — were individual proprietorships. There were 134,184 partnerships and 89,056 small corporations.  
Eleven percent of the women-owned companies had paid employees, including 668 with 100 or more employees.  
About half of the women-owned companies had gross receipts of less than \$5,000, the report said, while a minuscule 0.3 percent of them brought in \$1 million or more.  
Personal services, such as laundries and cleaning services, beauty shops, photographers and babysitting services, were the most common business for women to be

engaged in, with 419,113 women-owned businesses in that category.  
Real estate agencies were second with 225,557 women-owned businesses, followed by health services, such as nurses, doctors and dentists, with 128,389.  
Rounding out the 10 largest women-owned activities were eating and drinking places, 66,811; special trade contractors, such as plumbers, heating and masonry contractors, roofers and so forth, 47,219; food stores, 37,635; apparel and accessory stores, 29,130; wholesale trade, durable goods, 22,231; auto dealers and service stations, 14,353, and wholesale trade, durable goods, 12,021.  
California had the largest number of women-owned companies, 396,294, followed by Texas with 220,221, and New York, 189,675.  
Idaho had 15,247 women-owned companies. Oregon had 46,201; Washington had 67,612; Wyoming had 9,462; Utah had 21,921; and Montana had 14,497.

## Colombia president takes oath

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Virgilio Barco became the 101st president of Colombia on Thursday, promising to eliminate death squads, fight drug trafficking and combat terrorism.

Barco took his oath of office across Bolivar Plaza from the Palace of Justice where 95 people, including 11 Supreme Court justices, were killed last November during a takeover of the building by leftist guerrillas.

Several hours before being sworn in at the Congress building, Barco met with U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz, who later told reporters Barco shares the United States' determination to battle narcotics traffickers and terrorists.

"Drug trafficking and terrorism, serious crimes against mankind, are one of the main concerns of all nations," Barco said in his inaugural address. "We shall continue to join in all efforts made by the community of nations to save our civilization from their disastrous effects."

Barco, 65, received his doctorate in 1954 from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology and is married to an American, the former Carolina Isakson, of York, Pa. He speaks English fluently.

The new Colombian leader said he will continue a program started by his predecessor, Belisario Betancur, of offering amnesty to guerrillas.

But Barco warned that those who do not accept amnesty will have to face the army.

"The first requirement is to strengthen civil order," Barco said. "The president and the armed forces are charged to ensure the public peace."

There are about 20,000 leftist rebels in this country of 30 million people. About half the guerrillas belong to the Colombian Revolutionary Armed Forces, a pro-Soviet group starting the second year of a truce with the government.

## Aid sent to combat bug threat

ROME (AP) — The U.N. Food and Agriculture Organization said Thursday it has established an emergency program to airlift pesticides and spraying equipment to parts of Africa threatened by swarms of locusts.

The agency, which is based here, said plagues of locusts and grasshoppers could trigger another food crisis in Africa.

"A locust plague of frightening proportions will face Africa unless control teams with the necessary resources are put in place quickly to protect food crops," FAO Director-General Edouard Saouma said.

He said the emergency center will serve as a "crisis prevention team" to supplement current locust prevention efforts of the FAO, individual African governments and regional and international organizations.

The emergency program was established after FAO experts in the field reported expanding swarms in West Africa, where early rains have favored mass hatching and rapid multiplication. Reports of swarms have also been received from Chad, an FAO statement said.

FAO predicted locust problems in East Africa in late August and in southern Africa in September-October, when rain and warmer weather promote hatching and breeding. There have been unconfirmed reports of desert locust swarms in northern Ethiopia, the statement said.

## Baby arrives on jumbo jet

AMMAN, Jordan (AP) — A Jordanian woman gave birth to a baby girl aboard a jumbo jet flying from Chicago to Vienna, a spokesman for the Jordanian airline Alia said Thursday.

"The captain said that at 30,000 feet he had to amend his load sheet to read 217 passengers," said Alia Billaji, an Alia vice president for marketing and sales.

Billaji said mother and child were in good condition at a Vienna hospital.

The baby was born on Alia's Wednesday flight from Los Angeles to Amman, which stopped in Chicago and Vienna. A Pakistani gynecologist, who was one of three doctors on the flight, delivered the child.

The Jordan Times identified the mother as Mrs. Hafez Mahmoud and said she named the baby Wafa, after a stewardess who tended them.

Billaji said that since the child was born on an Alia plane, she could fly free on the airline for the rest of her life. But he added: "We don't like to encourage this."

## Chernobyl victims buried

MITINO, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Another person has been buried in the part of a village cemetery reserved for victims of the Chernobyl nuclear accident, apparently indicating the death toll has risen to 31.

A white card on the new grave of K.I. Luzganova said she died Monday.

Last Saturday Western reporters visited the cemetery and found two other new graves; those of A.V. Novik, who died July 29, and Y.A. Verzhinin, who died July 23.

The cards at the grave sites do not mention Chernobyl, but the graves are in a part of the cemetery that an official has said is reserved for victims of the Chernobyl accident.

There has been an official announcement of the deaths, and no indication from the Soviet Union that the death toll has risen above 28, the last officially announced figure.

One of four reactors at the Chernobyl nuclear power plant 80 miles north of the Ukrainian capital Kiev was destroyed by a chemical explosion

and fire April 26 that spewed radioactivity over much of the world.

Dr. Robert Gale, an American bone marrow specialist who helped treat victims of the accident, said last week that only 30 of the 300 initial victims remained hospitalized, and that nearly all were expected to survive.

There are now 26 Chernobyl victims buried in the cemetery outside Mitino, a 30-minute drive from the center of Moscow.

# Improvements set for Hwy. 93, 'blood alley'

TWIN FALLS — Sharp drops at the pavement's edge will be smoothed and rumble strips, no-passing lines and additional signs will be added to the "blood alley" of Highway 93 in an attempt to curb accidents there.

The improvements come in response to a safety campaign last winter led by Greater Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce, says State Highway Administrator Keith Transportation Department will consider Green. A dozen people died in 1985 — most in adding more strips along the edges of the stretch of Highway 93 between Jackpot, Nev., and the Highway 39 intersection near strips, but the work on all the Highway 93 safety projects will be done by state workers, making all the improvements fairly studied the accident rate on Idaho's portion low-cost, he says.

No-passing barrier lines will be extended

safety measures were needed, Green says.

Work on the rumble strips may begin as soon as today, Green says. The other work should be completed in the next two or three months, he says.

The rumble strips will be installed on the first 10 miles of the highway north of the Nevada border. State studies show that more of the accidents that occurred when cars ran off the road were in that stretch of highway than any other, Green says.

If the rumble strips prove successful, the state Highway Administrator Keith Transportation Department will consider Green. A dozen people died in 1985 — most in adding more strips along the edges of the stretch of Highway 93 between Jackpot, Nev., and the Highway 39 intersection near strips, but the work on all the Highway 93 safety projects will be done by state workers, making all the improvements fairly studied the accident rate on Idaho's portion low-cost, he says.

No-passing barrier lines will be extended

beyond the standard minimum requirements, according to a letter dated Aug. 6 from Highway District Engineer Howard Johnson. In addition, no-passing signs will be installed at all the no-passing zones, Green says.

Crews from the Shoshone Highway District office are still considering which areas of the highway should become no-passing zones, Green says.

This fall, when highway personnel have extra time, they will begin flattening slopes at the edge of the pavements, Green says. The work will be done "as resources permit," according to Johnson's letter.

"We find that if a car runs off the road and the slope is quite steep, it turns over," Green says. "Or when it runs off and the driver corrects, the edge throws him and the car rolls. If you flatten it so it's like a drive out in a farmer's field it doesn't roll either way."

Twin Falls business leaders had originally called for a four-lane highway between Twin Falls and the Nevada border, but state officials say that traffic is too light on the road to warrant two more lanes.

"We're not going to see a four-lane road there for a long, long time," says Mike Dolton, executive vice president for the chamber.

"I do not know if (the improvements) are enough," he says. "But I think it's a giant step in the right direction. . . I think we got a really good response. I'm pleased with it. You have to remember it's only 47 miles of road."

The safety campaign began when Dick Burwell, owner of Coors of Magic Valley, wrote the chamber to point out the economic benefits of improving Highway 93 with the Idaho Transportation Board in mid-March to discuss safety concerns.

## ID retail stores closing doors

### Seven-state chain to shut its 55 outlets within 'a few weeks'

TWIN FALLS — The president of Idaho Department Store Co. has confirmed that the Caldwell-based retail chain is taking its remaining 55 stores out of business.

"We sold a number of stores and what's not being sold, we're liquidating," Bernard Mayer told The Times-News Tuesday, commenting for the first time on the closures.

The Twin Falls outlet posted clearance-sale signs on Wednesday, joining stores in Jerome, Gooding, Rupert, Caldwell, Boise, Pocatello, Blackfoot, Idaho Falls, Lewiston and other locations in selling off inventories.

ID Store operations in Idaho, Washington, Oregon, California, Utah, Colorado and South Dakota will be closed "within the next few weeks," Mayer said.

The shutting of the chain will af-

fect about 1,000 workers, many of whom are long-time employees, the executive estimated. The C.R. Anthony Co. of Oklahoma City, Okla., relieved almost the entire work forces at the ID stores it purchased in Nampa and Ontario, Ore. In some communities, other retail firms are picking up the workers, Mayer said.

"It seems that other retail companies valued the experience of our employees over the years and have hired quite a few of them."

ID retail operations are closing after 81 years in business. Three years ago the chain had 80 stores. They included former stores in the Falk's chain at Boise and other western-Idaho cities, which became Falk's ID stores.

The Idaho Department Store in Twin Falls was the city's first department store, opening downtown in 1905. "That was a good store," said Mayer, "but obviously you can't close a number of stores

and operate one. The directive is to close them all."

That decision to shut the doors was made by Interco Inc. of St. Louis, Mo., which owns the Idaho Department Store Co., Mayer said.

"The parent company has the prerogative of doing what they want with any of their companies, and I think Interco has elected to go into the manufacturing end, rather than the retailing end of the consumer industry," he said.

Mayer referred questions on specific reasons for the closure to Interco officials Robert T. Hensley, Interco treasurer and corporation spokesman, would not elaborate.

"At this point, our posture is we have no comment," he said.

Interco acquired the Idaho Department Store Co. in 1968. The chain is part of Interco's general retailing operations, which include 263 junior department stores, discount stores, specialty apparel shops

and do-it-yourself outlets.

The general retailing divisions accounted for 21 percent of Interco sales in the year ending Feb. 28, according to corporate figures reported by Standard & Poor's Corp. However, it yielded only 8 percent of its profits.

Interco, which posted \$2.5 billion in revenues and \$92.3 million in net income during 1985, found its biggest profit producers in its apparel manufacturing companies. It also operates footwear companies, including the makers of Florsheim shoes, and furniture manufacturers, which produce the Ethan Allen and Bryhill brands. Interco is in the midst of a bid to buy Converse Inc., the nation's largest manufacturer of athletic shoes.

Some stores from Hirsch Value Center, another Interco retail chain operating in the Magic Valley, also have closed their doors during the past two years.

## Green Giant begins pack; corn 'good'

BUHL — Tons of fresh sweet corn and 800 workers will pour into the Green Giant Co.'s packing plant at Buhl today as its 1986 processing campaign begins.

"We're going to start harvesting at 6 o'clock in the morning and we're going to start the factory up at noon," says Darrel McElberts, plant manager.

The ears of corn are tumbling into the plant four days later than usual because of cool, but favorable, July growing conditions. But, by the time the campaign ends in October, workers will can and freeze the equivalent of 96 million 12-ounce cans of Green Giant corn on and off the cob.

"We go around the clock, 24 hours per day seven days per week," unless bad weather intervenes, McElberts said.

The Green Giant Co., a subsidiary of The Pillsbury Co., produces sweet corn for the West and for the East at the large factory in Buhl. About 60 percent fills up cans of several sizes, while the remainder is frozen in kernel or cob form.

One of the best crops in past years is waiting in 11,000 acres of Magic Valley fields for the mechanical harvesters, McElberts says. Ideal growing conditions during spring and

early summer combined with a new, mid-season variety of corn to fill out the crop.

"It really looks good with this July being our second coldest July on record. That's what you really want for corn," he says. "A warm spring and cool July. It allows the tips of the ears to fill out."

The company also has changed slightly its mix of corn hybrids by planting more acreage in the mid-season variety than an early maturing strain.

The corn is planted in stages timed so that certain fields ripen on a processing schedule. But fickle weather makes it an inexact science, the plant manager says. "A below-normal cold spell might stretch it out, and if it gets real hot, you can run your ears and try to stay up with it," he says. The corn ripens faster in hot weather.

This year's crop could rival 1982's company-wide record yield of 9.1 tons per acre, a record set at Buhl, he says. Total production will be about the same as last year because the plant is growing about 400 fewer acres, McElberts says.

Starting today, in fields at King Hill, harvesting crews will haul close to 200 million pounds of sweet corn to the plant. The mountain of corn will yield about 72 million pounds of corn for market, once the cobs and

## Bankruptcy rate up 23% in 1985

BOISE — The number of bankruptcies filed in Idaho increased 23 percent in 1985 compared to 1984, according to federal court statistics.

Bankruptcy lawyer Dick Greenwood of Twin Falls wasn't surprised by the figures, but says the economy may not be as depressed as it seems.

"Farmers are still making money," he says. In addition, agricultural lenders are becoming more agreeable to resolving financial disputes, rather than being tied up in bankruptcy court.

During the year ending Dec. 31, 1985, 2,753 bankruptcies were filed in Idaho, compared to the 2,233 bankruptcies filed during 1984,

reported the Administrative Office of the U.S. Courts.

In 1983 2,669 bankruptcies were filed in the state, reported Leodora Butler, with the U.S. Bankruptcy Court in Boise. But that number was substantially lower than 1982, when 2,482 bankruptcies were filed.

During 1981, 2,209 bankruptcies were filed.

It is unclear from the statistics how many filings were for bankruptcy because, after 1979, the federal court discontinued the practice of separating bankruptcies into specific categories, Butler said. Under the present statistics system, for instance, there's no way to find out which ones are agricultural-related, she added.

The federal statistics report only

## Candidate sticks by promise, returns \$75 committee donation

TWIN FALLS — In keeping with an early campaign promise, Idaho House of Representatives candidate Garry Nielsen has returned a check for \$75 to the House Democrat Campaign Committee.

"I took a vow not to accept any money from any business, corporation, group, organization or political action committee," Nielsen wrote in a letter to House Democratic Campaign Committee Chairman Rep. Jeanne Givens, D-Coeur d'Alene. "The people will support me because I work for only the people."

Nielsen said Thursday that he would make many candidates mad because he is advertising the fact he is running without PAC money. He said he will accept endorsements from PACs, but has been sending back their questionnaires with his campaign leaflet displaying his promise not to take PAC money and to run his campaign on individual con-

tributions alone.

"When I am seated in the Legislature I will owe no allegiance or favors to anyone but the people of Twin Falls County. Any candidate in any local race who accepts special interest money is selling themselves away from the people," he said.

Nielsen's campaign opponent Celia Folklinga of Buhl collected \$950 in PAC money, according to her mid-May finance report. United for Idaho, a business PAC, gave her \$500 and the Idaho Resources Campaign Committee, a business PAC, gave her \$200, while Taxpayers for Responsible Government, a business and taxpayer's group, gave her \$250.

She also collected \$340 in individual donations, including \$100 from House Speaker Tom Stivers, R-Twin Falls, who is giving up the seat she and Nielsen are running for. Folklinga could not be reached for comment Thursday evening.

Folklinga had two opponents in the primary election.

Nielsen's campaign finance report, filed before the May 27 primary elec-

tion, showed he had donated \$243 of his own money to his campaign and had \$25 in contributions. He was unchallenged in the primary.

Independent candidate Arlo Kent of Twin Falls did not announce his candidacy until after the primary election. Kent could not be reached for comment Thursday evening.

Nielsen said he has so far spent about \$1,000 of his own money and hopes to raise another \$1,000-\$2,000 with a mail campaign. He will not attempt to raise more money than Folklinga because she will always be able to raise more, he said. "I might come up short on advertising money, but I'll feel a lot better about it," he said.

He would not comment on her PAC contributions specifically and said he will criticize all legislative candidates who take special interest money. "They're selling the position; they're not representing the people. I don't think you need sell the position just to get the ticket to Boise," he said.

## Hay Day pitched a success

State Agriculture Department officials Thursday were still tallying the results from "Idaho Hay Day," in which farmers from Rexburg to Cambridge donated hay to the drought-plagued Southeast.

"We're pretty well pleased with it," department spokesman Dan Christian said. A final count on the total amount of hay donated in Wednesday's relief effort was not yet available Thursday, but Christian said it would approach the 1,400 tons originally estimated.

All across the state, donors said they wanted to help ailing farmers whose livelihood is threatened by scorching heat that has left their cattle in danger of starving.

At a pick-up point at Hansen, 83-year-old Harvey Vann of Twin Falls brought in 38 bales of hay "to give those cattle a little bit of eat."

The donations ranged from the pasture grass Vann contributed to high-protein alfalfa hay, valued by

dairy farmers for their milking herds. Much of the hay being sent from the Magic Valley locations is this year's crop. Some was fresh out of the fields.

It's not as if Idaho farmers don't have their own financial troubles. At \$55-\$60 a ton, many could have used or sold the hay they tossed into United Pacific Railroad boxes. But as Meridian dairy farmer Gus Hackler explained: "It's because we love people and want to do a good turn for our brothers."

"They're hurting. Cows don't eat air," Kevin Rekow of Emmett said.

Kevin's father, Chuck Rekow, said, "I've always donated and I guess I always will. If I was in the same fix I wouldn't mind some help myself."

At least two farmers wanted to forge some ties with fellow growers in Georgia, where the hay will be distributed. John and Jerry Spanbauer sowed letters among the five tons of hay they donated

Wednesday at the Sugar Loaf shipping point, about seven miles southeast of Jerome.

"We buried six letters in the bales," John said. "I'm kind of curious to see where it (hay) goes." The letters ask about the farmer's operations, how he or she obtained the hay, and "if they're rich or broke like us."

Wednesday's Hay Day was the first of two that will funnel donations to the Southeast. The effort was coordinated through the state Agriculture Department. The second Hay Day will be Tuesday, sponsored by the Idaho Farm Bureau Federation.

The Union Pacific rolled 40 boxcars into place for loading and offered free transportation to Memphis, Tenn. From there the Norfolk Southern Railroad will pull the Idaho train to Atlanta, Ga., again at no charge. Officials, heartened by the volunteer turnout, hoped the unit train from Idaho will be rolling by this weekend.



# Norman's off to quick start at PGA

TOLEDO, Ohio — Greg Norman was standing in the 11th fairway, waiting to hit his approach, when Hubert Green holed out his second shot for an eagle-2.

"Norman flashed a mischievous grin. 'I told Hubert to get the ball out of the hole so there'd be room for mine,' he said.

It was bravado, of course, more hope than expectation, but it was an example of the confidence born of success.

And Norman continued his summer-long golfing success story Thursday, taking advantage of a rain-softened course for a spectacular, 6-under-par 65 that staked him to a two-shot lead in the first round of the 68th PGA.

It's the last of the year's four major tests of golfing greatness. And Norman has been a factor in all of them. He won one, was second in another and led through three rounds of the other.

This time, the lead came with something approaching ease.

"The golf course played about four shots easier" than in practice rounds when the tiny greens were extremely firm and hard to hold, Normansaid.

"The course was set up to play tough, but with the rain you could hit it at the flag instead of playing it short and trying to run it on the green.

"In the fairways, your drive would plug, or even back up on you. It just made it that much easier," said Norman, who led through three rounds of both the Masters and U.S. Opens before scoring his first major triumph last month in the British Open.

Others found it not quite so easy, however.

There was Jack Nicklaus, for example. The 46-year-old Masters champion had it three under par at one point and was striding confidently toward a position among the leaders until he went bogey-bogey on the 16th and 17th, angrily slapping the enlarged head of his putter at one point.

Nicklaus, gunning for a record sixth PGA championship, finished with a 70.

"Sure, I'm disappointed," he said. "I'm disappointed at making those two bogeys. If I weren't disappointed, I shouldn't be playing."

Still, he was two strokes better than Tom Watson, who so anxiously, eagerly seeks this, the one title he needs to complete a career sweep of the recognized—major—championships, a quarter which also includes the U.S. and British Opens and the Masters.

Then, too, there was 56-year-old Arnold Palmer, still seeking the one major title that eluded him. He struggled through the clinging rough and "wer sand 'n' a '73' that was one stroke better than the score of Hale Irwin, who won his second U.S. Open title on this course in 1979.

U.S. Open champion Ray Floyd also had a fat 76 in the mild, occasionally drizzly weather and defending champion Hubert Green shot 75.

None, however, exhibited the ire of Wayne Levi. Levi, one shot out of the lead, watched a bogey putt duck the hole on the 14th and mouthed an obscenity while the national television cameras were in a close-up on his face.

Seve Ballesteros of Spain, winner

of five of his last six starts on the European tour, was 3-over-par at 74. Craig Stadler, a non-winner for more than two full seasons, birdied the 18th hole to complete a 67 that put him in a tie for second with 6-foot-7 Phil Blackmar, whose erratic effort included six birdies, an eagle and four bogeys.

Joining Levi at 3-under-par 68 were Peter Jacobsen, Australian Wayne Grady, Ronnie Black and Gary Koch, the leading American in the British Open.

While the scoring was exceptionally low — more than a dozen players breaking 70 — it was Norman who was the chief formulator.

And his bogey-free round simply represented a continuation of the rampage that began in April at Augusta, Ga., when he led through three rounds of the Masters and eventually lost by a single stroke to Nicklaus' thundering finish.

Since then, he's finished out of the top 10 in only one start — when he led through 54 holes then "came out flat" in the final round of the U.S. Open.

He's won twice in the United States, had a total of three runner-

up finishes, last week missed a little playoff by a single stroke and, along the way, picked up a record \$564,729.

"Maturity," the 31-year-old Australian replied when asked for an explanation of his sudden dominance of the game.

"I play about the same as I have for the last 10 years."

"But now I'm a lot more mature. My head is on a straighter. I'm not so impetuous."

As an example, he pointed to his play on the par-5, 528-yard dogleg, left eighth hole, where he was in jeopardy of making his only bogey of the day.

And that, he said, was his own fault.

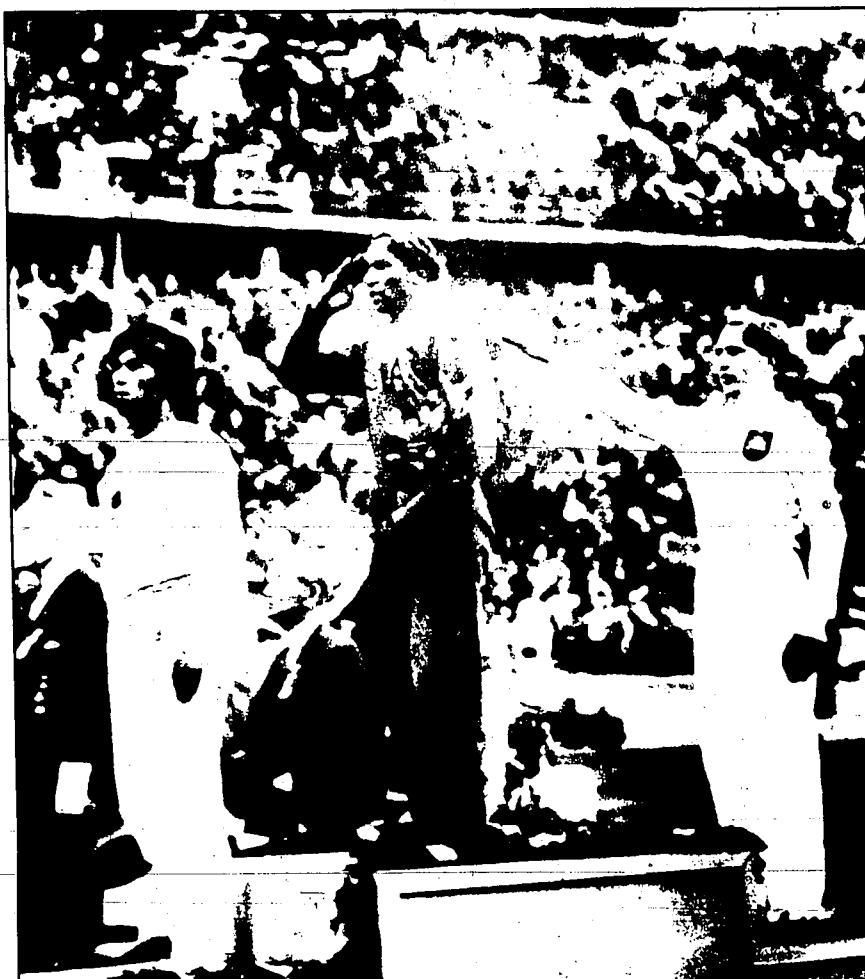
"A stupid mental mistake," Norman said. "That's the first time in months I've tried to overpower a hole," he said. "Attempting to carry a bunker 280 yards out in order to reach the green in two, he pushed his drive through the fairway on the right."

Tangled up in deep, wet rough, he had to chip out sideways, hit a 5-iron short and then chipped on, the ball stopping some 45 feet from the flag.

### Tarnished gold

Berlin commemorates the 1936 Nazi Olympics — discreetly

BERLIN — While Nazi dictator Adolf Hitler used the 1936 Olympics to glorify his Third Reich, another, best-remembered scene from the Games is the Fuhrer's failure to shake hands with black American hero Jesse Owens.

This year, U.S. officials and the city of Berlin are paying tribute to the late sprinter, and the medal-winners from the 1936 team are holding a reunion on the 50th anniversary of the controversial Berlin Games.

The focal point is Olympic Stadium, which survived World War II to become West Berlin's main sports arena as well as a lasting reminder of Hitler's Olympics.

From Aug. 1-16, 1936, the Third Reich won a propaganda victory by hosting the 11th Olympiad,

convincing many people from the 52 participating nations that the Nazis wanted peace and friendship. Three years later, the Hitler regime plunged the world into war.

Owens' sweep of four gold medals in track and field stunned Hitler, already well known for his racist theories that labeled blacks "untermenschens" (subhumans).

Balduz von Schirach, the Reich youth leader, wrote in his memoirs that Hitler deliberately

snubbed Owens after his first victory—by refusing to shake his hand.

"Do you really think that I will allow myself to be photographed shaking hands with a Negro?" Hitler said, according to Schirach.

Some historians say, however, that the story has been exaggerated.

Hajo Bernett, a sports historian at the University of Bonn, said the International Olympic Committee had asked Hitler to stop

his ostentatious receptions of Olympic winners shortly before Owens started his winning streak.

After the request from the IOC's president, Count Henri de Baillet-Latour, Hitler also failed to publicly congratulate Karl Heina, a German who won the men's hammer throw, according to Hart Davis, author of the 1986 book *Hitler's Games*.

The NFL had ordered its teams not to talk to USFL players unless they have a clean release from their teams and USFL teams have been getting calls from agents seeking that release in order to get them into NFL training camps as quickly as possible. Some players — the majority have only marginal shots at the NFL — have been seeking to have their 1986 salaries paid by the USFL.

In addition to this minimum roster, USFL players with guaranteed contracts will have the option to elect to remain with their current clubs. It is expected that all player resignings will be completed by Sept. 15, 1986.

## Agency orders AT&T to lower profit margins

WASHINGTON — Consumers should save \$1.2 billion in long-distance telephone charges in 1987 and 1988 as a result of lower profit margins ordered Thursday by the Federal Communications Commission, the agency chairman said.

A spokesman for American Telephone & Telegraph Co., Herb Linnen, estimated the order will mean a \$50 million reduction in AT&T earnings each year. FCC official Steve Goodman placed the figure at \$100 million a year, or \$200 million over the period covered by the order.

The other \$1 billion in the FCC estimate for total consumer savings would come from cuts in the rates of return for the long-distance hookups operated by nation's local telephone companies.

Telephone companies said the ruling lowers their ability to attract investors and to raise money to improve the phone system.

The commission sets earnings standards for AT&T's long-distance unit and the money made by local companies for handling the local portion of long-distance calls.

## Markdowns stimulate July retail sales

The nation's major retailers reported Thursday that sales improved during July, but analysts said the companies resorted to larger-than-usual markdowns to stimulate buying.

In addition, some retailers were comparing their sales with a weaker period a year ago and that made the gains look better than they actually were, the analysts said.

Sears, Roebuck and Co., the largest retailer, said its sales for the four weeks ended Aug. 2 rose 5.5 percent over the same period last year.

No. 2 K mart Corp. said its sales jumped 15.9 percent.

Sales increased 3.4 percent at J.C. Penney Co., ranked third, and 11.8 percent at fourth-largest Dayton Hudson Corp. Fast-growing Wal-Mart Stores Inc. ranked fifth, said sales up 4.1 percent.

Most of the sales gains were larger than the ones the retailers posted for June. However, their month is a big one for the companies, which get most of their sales and profits in the fourth quarter of their fiscal year. Their year begins in February.

The sales numbers look pretty strong in the number of cases, and in a number of cases the sales increases were better than that of June.

Said Jeffrey Edelman, a retail analyst with the investment firm Dean Witter Reynolds Inc.

"However, the tone of business was extremely promotional," Edelman said. "As a result, the quality of the sales was not as good and it's going to have a negative impact on profits."

The Northeast and the Midwest were particularly promotional, Edelman said.

The price cuts were across the board, the analyst said. The retailers also aggressively advertised their merchandise, he said.

Walter Loeb, an analyst with Morgan Stanley & Co. said: "For some retailers, July was a weak month a year ago, so this also makes for an easier comparison."

This year, sales fared poorly in the old states and were sluggish in California, Loeb said.

## Stock market makes advance in quiet trading

NEW YORK — The stock market staged a moderate advance in quiet trading Thursday, extending its on-again-off-again bid to rally from its July sell-off.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 6.75 to 1,766.28, bringing its gain since the start of the week to 22.64 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 122.44 million shares, against 127.51 million Wednesday.

Analysts said hopes were apparently increasing among traders that the market could gather strength after the completion of the Treasury's quarterly financing.

The \$28 billion sale concluded Thursday with the auction of \$9 billion in 30-year bonds, at an average yield of 7.64 percent. Prices of existing government bonds rose in afternoon trading pending the results of that offering.

However, brokers also said the market's initial upbeat response had faded to the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries' agreement on temporary production cutbacks.

Many analysts said it remained to be seen whether OPEC had made any significant progress in its efforts to shore up world oil prices.

The big-name energy issues generally recorded small losses. Exxon dropped 1/4 to 62 1/2 to 62, and Amoco 1/4 to 62.

Securities industry stocks attracted buyers, apparently on hopes that the worst of the recent market setback was past and that the firms' bond-trading results might improve.

Salomon Inc. gained 1 1/2 to 42; First Boston 1 1/2 to 41 1/2; Merrill Lynch 1 1/2 to 35 1/2; E.F. Hutton 1 1/2 to 37 1/2; and Morgan Stanley 1/2 to 66.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, about four issues rose in price for every three that had ground.

The exchange's composite index of all listed common stocks rose 23 to 136.42.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges, totaled 145.54 million shares.

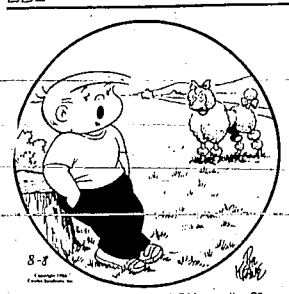

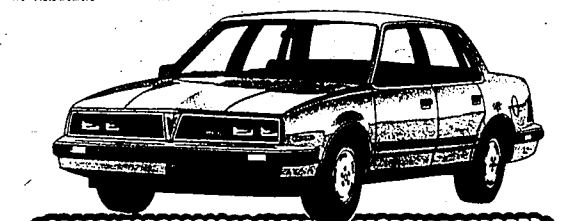

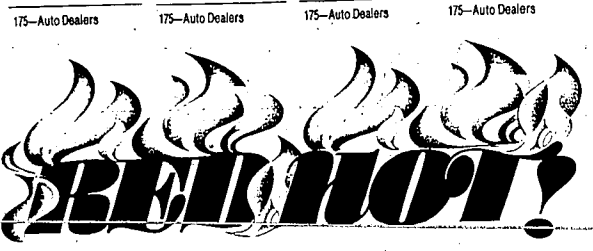

## Meaningful films draw actor

Independent Armand Assante avoids big-buck productions

LOS ANGELES — Actor Armand Assante thinks there's "a glut of movies that don't like people," and for that reason he becomes involved in small, meaningful films instead of the big-buck spectacles.

Assante has been an anomaly in the acting trade. With his brooding eyes and classic profile — he's half-Italian, half-Irish — he has made strong impressions in such films as "Private Benjamin" (as Goldie Hawn's French lover), "Unfaithfully Yours" (as a romantic violinist) and "The Jury" (as tough guy Mike Hammer).

Instead of aiming for a career as a leading man, Assante has chosen to return to the stage or appear in specialized films such as the current "Belzaire the Cajun."

The new release from Skouras Pictures, written and directed by Glen Pitre, concerns the persecution of the Cajun population of Louisiana more than a century ago. Assante plays an itinerant faith healer who becomes involved in the cross fire

between the French settlers and their Anglo-Saxon neighbors.

Next, Assante stars with Raul Julia in "The Penitent," to be filmed in Mexico about the outlawed, self-securging Penitente religious sect. The director-writer is film character actor Cliff Osmond.

"It's hard for an actor to find scripts that deal with human relations," said Assante. "Sure, it would be easy to pick up the heavy money from big-studio productions. But if you want to hold onto your values and achieve some kind of growth, you've got to go looking."

Assante, 36, found "Belzaire the Cajun" at the Sundance Institute, Robert Redford's annual gathering in Colorado of film veterans and hopefuls. Glen Pitre came there with his script and the hope of shooting his first feature.

"Glen had made documentaries about the Cajuns for Louisiana audiences," said Assante, "but none of them had cost more than \$50,000. 'Belzaire' was scheduled for an \$850,000 budget, but it finally cost \$200,000."

Pitre spent 15 months raising the

money from dentists, doctors, lawyers, fellow filmmakers, farmers, fishermen, plus a \$50,000 grant from the National Endowment for the Arts.

The actor spent a month learning how to speak Cajun, which he describes as a combination of "French, southern American, with some Santo Domingo; there is a heavy Caribbean influence." He and the other actors proved to be too authentic. The entire soundtrack had to be redubbed to make it more intelligible for the general American audience.

Armand Assante isn't totally altruistic as an actor. He has starred in such-revelation-potholders as "Rage of Angels" and the upcoming "Stranger in My Bed."

"I also started out in soap operas, 'How to Survive a Marriage' and 'The Doctors,' he confessed. "But during the two-year period, I also was able to appear in seven plays, three on Broadway and four showcase productions. Soap operas are valuable for learning how to relax in front of the camera. As a

# Perkins directs and stars in 'Psycho III'

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

**PSYCHO III (R).** A third stopover at the Bates Motel (with its gingerbread mansion, its secrets and its slaughter), this time directed by Anthony Perkins — who also stars with a knife. Hitchcock is a tough act to follow, and the subsequent "Psychos" fail the test, though "III" is superior to "II." The first half is cleverly written, and very well-directed and acted: It juxtaposes a runaway nun's repressions and guilts with Norman's

psychological hell, and makes them fall in love. Then, unfortunately, it succumbs to sequellitis and "Friday the 13th" syndrome: obligatory slasher-murders and overly bloody tongue-in-cheek.

**ALIENS (R).** The image of Sigourney Weaver, like some Superman in excelsis, battling for scrappy, skinny 9-foot Carrie Henn, is what really powers James Cameron's sequel. It does not have the pure "print-in-terror" of "Friday Scott's" original; hordes of aliens are less powerful than one, and the Marines who invade the planet with Weaver are almost faceless, there

simply to be picked off. But Weaver — fine, furious, giving biting dialogue for that patrician-looking mouth — may be quite enough.

**BIG TROUBLE IN LITTLE CHINA (PG-13).** Trucker Jack Burton (Kurt Russell) gets into more trouble than he bargained for when he helps his friend Wang Chi (Dennis Dun) rescue the latter's kidnapped fiancée — especially when the ghosts start showing up. Also stars Kim Cattrall, James Hong and Victor Wong. Directed by John Carpenter.

**CLUB PARADISE (PG-13).** A frenetically unfunny and charmless movie. "Club Paradise" adds to star Robin Williams' true sweetness the components of the worst vacation imaginable: stent, intrusive companions; mind-numbing boredom, and a feeling of time utterly wasted. The only thing that is lacking is chiggers.

**THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG).** This sequel to 1984's teen choppy-socky hit is another mass-audience action fairy tale — but without the obsession with virility, cheap cynicism and endless kill count of the "Cobra" and "Raw Deals." Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's Kid and Pat Morita's impishly sage martial arts mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there, they stumble into a "Chinese Connection" story line, escalating kung fu, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected cross-cultural romance and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous; and you can even cheer for the heroes at the end without feeling sorry.

**LEGAL EAGLES (PG-13).** Badly

miscalculated — romantic comedy-thriller involving art fraud and murder. Never have Robert Redford, Debra Winger or Daryl Hannah been caught in worse circumstances. An inept, incoherent and charmless attempt at sophistication by producer-director Ivan Reitman, much more at home in the rambounctious humor of "Animal House," "Meatballs," "Stripes" and "Ghostbusters."

**RUTHLESS PEOPLE (R).** A Disney release that might have sent all seven dwarfs into cardiac arrest: full of sex, violence, nudity, sociology, bottomless corruption and — misanthropic — definitely tasteless humor that leaves almost nothing unscathed. The good news is that the team of Abrahams, Zucker and Zucker ("Airplane!") have directed it with panache and a high sense of tech-pop pandering in your ears as a yowling kidnap victim, Danny DeVito as her demantically uninterested husband and Judge Reinhold and Helen Slater as her hapless kidnapers — acts it up to the hilt and beyond.

**TOP GUN (PG).** The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, jocular male-bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, massed clouds, streaking jets, and so much tech-pop pandering in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel: The trappings are flabbergasting — and the camerawork and editing a knockout — but the story is a sleazy retouch of "Coolin' Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman," drowned in beecake and macho bathos.

## 'A Fine Mess' echoes Laurel, Hardy hardly

HOLLYWOOD — Everyone has an off day and, unfortunately, "A Fine Mess" is one of Blake Edwards'.

It is not really a bad movie. In some ways, it is a better directed farce than the current hits "Back to School," "Legal Eagles" or "Ruthless People." But it is erratic, and often weightless or uncentered; the pieces keep flying apart.

This extended slapstick chase movie — about a horse-roping scandal, two hapless Hollywood hangers-on and the two bumbling torpedoes pursuing them — does not have the flair of Edwards at his best. It often lacks real character, comic tension and inevitability.

The movie takes place in modern Hollywood, but its soul lies in the pre-mong, sunny, palm-latticed wonderland of the '20s and '30s. In that tinseltown limbo, womanizing studio extra Spence Holden (Dennis Powell) and his canny buddy Dennis Powell (Howie Mandel) keep fleeing the inept onslaughts of Wayne "Turnip" Farragala (Richard Mulligan) and Maurice "Binky" Dandza (Stuart Margolin); two monumentally accident-prone hoodlums, whom Spence has surprised in the act of horse-race fixing.

When these two pairs are not stumbling all over each other, Dennis and Spence romance some women on the fly; respectively, a budding art auctioneer (Jennifer Edwards) and a Mafia mistress (Maria Conchita Alonso), whose sugar daddy (Paul Sorvino) is Turnip and Binky's employer.

Edwards' model here, as in "The Great Chase," is the comedy of

Laurel and Hardy. The title, "A Fine Mess," echoes Hardy's frequent lament about the destiny to which Laurel's ineptitude dooms them both. And the movie was originally based on "The Music Box," the 1932 Laurel and Hardy short about two furniture movers' Sisyphian attempt to carry a huge piano up a hilly staircase.

Dennis and Spence move a piano too, but Edwards does not work up the classic routine you expect, and this homage goes awry in other ways too.

"A Fine Mess" has a design problem: Its Laurel and Hardy prototypes are not really its heroes. Instead, it is the prattling gungels, Turnip and Binky, who ape Stan's comic tension and inevitability, and slow burns.

Spence and Dennis resemble another comic pair: smoothie Dean Martin and stonche-hysteria Jerry Lewis or Tony Curtis and Jack Lemmon in "Some Like It Hot," who Danson and Powell are reminiscent of Martin and Lewis).

The movie is no success, but it still has some of Edwards' cinematic savoir-faire and lambent comic flights. Edwards, a master of the accumulating mechanical gag and a virtuoso of misdirection and delayed reactions, is also often a fine satirist-romantic, who can both puncture and exalt the poetry and clichés of courtship. But not, often enough, in "A Fine Mess."

Perhaps he needed a script-collaborator. "A Fine Mess" (MPAA-rated; PG) has structure and good sight gags, and often expert funny work from Mandel, Margolin and Mulligan, but it is weak on personality-and-dialogue—it seems too airy and free-floating.

## Dunaway to return to American work

LONDON (AP) — London has given Faye Dunaway both theatrical success and a greater sense of balance, but now the Oscar-winning star of "Network" says it's time to go home.

"I'm an American, I'm an American actress and that's where my work really is. That's my home," she says.

But before she heads for the United States, she has a 10-week engagement on the West End, London's Broadway, starting in "Grease and Bravo," a two-character play by American writer Donald Freed.

The play was a six-week sell-out at the 173-seat Hampstead Theater on the North London "fringe," and won Miss Dunaway acclaim in her British stage debut.

Cast as a neurotic first lady codenamed Circe, who is being kept under house arrest at Camp David, the actress was called "electrifying" in the Daily Mail.

# Getty announces Greek statue buy

LOS ANGELES — The J. Paul Getty Museum here has unveiled the acquisition of an ancient Greek marble sculpture that is arguably among the most important art purchases made in the United States in the past half-century. It is an over-life-size standing male nude figure called a Kouros, a type made in Greece from the 7th

through the 5th centuries B.C. during the formative epoch known as the Archaic. So rare are these figures that scarcely a dozen complete examples are known to exist among some 250 fragmentary works. Only one other resides in the United States, in Manhattan's Metropolitan Museum of Art, which purchased it in 1932, the last time one came on the market. Getty curator of antiquities

Marion True said Wednesday that its Kouros has actually been in the museum for nearly three years undergoing conservation and rigorous examination for authenticity. Following Getty policy, she declined to disclose either the source or the price of the work, saying only that it was offered to the museum by a private family represented by a dealer, both based in Switzerland. In Greek, "kouros" simply

means "young man." Some scholars believe he represents the god Apollo, others think the figure stands for the donors of votive tombs and temples. In many ways, the Getty Kouros is typical. He stands straight to the front, his arms stiffly to the side and one foot advanced. Characteristically, the Getty Kouros smiles the sweet "archaic smile" full of innocence and energy.

# 'It's the scenery': Genesee Brewery picks Idaho for commercials filming

SUN VALLEY (AP) — Idaho, continuing its campaign to lure movie producers and others to its majestic scenery, has captured another film project. The Genesee Brewery of Rochester, N.Y., has decided to use seven locations in central Idaho's Stanley Basin and Trail Creek areas as the backdrop for a new series of commercials featuring sports commentator Curt Gowdy, according to George Bishop and Co., a Sun Valley media services firm. Genesee spokesman Kenneth Paule said the Idaho film focusing on

the great American outdoor experience will make up a large portion of the brewery's second-year advertising campaign.

# A five-part NBC series explores nature's complex Homo sapiens

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

"The Human Animal," an ambitious five-part project hosted by Phil Donahue, seeks to shed light on that most enigmatic of all creatures — Homo sapiens. NBC airs the show over five consecutive nights during the week of August 11-15.

The project comes to TV three years after the silver-haired talk-show host conceived the idea. The original producer shot a lot of material, but the feeling was that it wasn't interesting enough for a commercial network. Originally, "The Human Animal" was going to air last summer in conjunction with the publication of Donahue's book of the same name, but had to be postponed because the production was too dry.

Executive producer Jack Willis was brought in when Donahue moved to New York in 1985. He came up with the concept of basing the special around people as a way of making it accessible, to hold viewer attention, says Jack Willis. "Even though we used some of the footage that had already been shot, we had to literally begin all over again."

The segments include "Love and Sex" (Monday, Aug. 11), "Nature and Nurture" (Tuesday, Aug. 12), "War and Violence" (Wednesday, Aug. 13), "Woman and Man" (Thursday, Aug. 14), and "Family and Survival" (Friday, Aug. 15).

NBC is treating "The Human Animal" as a "miniseries." But if viewers are not paying attention to dramatic miniseries that stretch out over five nights, why would they devote five summer evenings to this?

"Viewers are hungry for information," says Willis. "We are living in a time when people are confused. Our idea is to offer people information about their own lives — love and sex, women and men, violence, the family in crisis — in a way that we hope will be entertaining and accessible."

The first segment, on "Love and Sex" — the only one available for screening at press time — is sure to raise hackles, since it seems to advocate sex education and birth control for teen-agers. One of the most graphic segments concerns a 16-year-old unwed mother giving birth. The prediction is offered that she and her child will end up on welfare. Donahue and his staff spent three

years conducting research and spoke with more than 50 experts in anthropology, psychiatry, education, sexual therapy, primate research, biology and linguistics.

"We are anticipating running into trouble with some groups," Willis concedes. "After speaking with the experts, we arrived at a kind of consensus of opinion and then went with it," says Willis.

# Frenchman, true survivor Clary is back with 'Days of Our Lives'

That perky little Frenchman, Robert Clary, a true survivor, is back on "Days of Our Lives."

You remember Robert LeClare, the club manager, Doug Williams' best friend. Three years ago he simply vanished into thin air. Without a word, LeClare, father of little Dougie, half-brother to Hope, caused a sensation when his sperm was artificially inseminated into Addie Williams.

Although there's sand in the hair, Robert Clary at 60 still has that boyish, bouncy spirit. Producer Al Rabin called Clary last November with an offer: come back and test the waters. Rabin wanted Salem to have a Jewish family storyline, and let Clary, who lectures on the Holocaust, educate unknowing kids about the horrors of the Nazi concentration camps.

Seven months have gone by, yet the Jewish family storyline lacks momentum. Reunited with young brother, his heart belongs to niece Robin.

Thus Robin becomes the pipeline to the Holocaust, referring to Dad and Uncle for the true story. Meanwhile, producer Rabin bides his time, slowly weaving the Jewish family into summer plotting. Serious stories are dangerous. They may startle the daydreamers.

So Clary works a few days each week, spending time with Bill Hayes' Doug Williams, returning to action in late spring, a man at loose ends without his wife Julie (wife Susan Seaforth Hayes of "The Young and the Restless"), or his nightclub.

These two veterans, gentle men, stick together waiting for something to do. They're pleased just to be included. Clary, the bantam Chevalier who came to America in 1948 and made a hit in Broadway's "New Faces of 1953," oozed Gallic charm with his singing.

Clary was the leading name when Ed Feldman cast "Hogan's Heroes," the Nazi prisoner-of-war comedy in 1965, and as Corporal LeBeau he almost left the hit after being overshadowed by lead Bob Crane. John Banner's Sgt. Schultz and Werner Klemperer's bumbling Col. Klink. Fortunate to be in a smash, Clary buttoned his ego, coasting to a six-year run, and fame.

"I'm lucky to be around," Clary

admits. "Crane was murdered mysteriously in Las Vegas. John Banner died 14 years ago in Switzerland and Werner Klemperer makes a living in the theatre, and as a guest symphony conductor."

"I may be French, but I'm pro-America," Clary says. "This is my home. I don't want to go back to Paris. I look for jobs, and do my best when hired. That's all I can do. Oh, one more thing. To round out the Jewish family storyline, I hope Al Rabin brings back my son Dougie. He should be 15. We could have a wonderful time, Bill and I and Dougie."

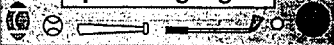

NEW YORK (AP) — CBS had its lowest-rated night in history with the third run of "The Hunchback of Notre Dame" and the ill-fated "Melba," according to figures released Wednesday by the A.C. Nielsen Co.

NBC won the weekly ratings for July 28-Aug. 3 with its Thursday comedies taking the first four spots, although no other NBC series finished in the Top 10. NBC averaged a 12.2 rating to CBS' 10.9 and ABC's 9.5. A single ratings point equals 859,000 homes with television.

Prime-time ratings, normally available on Tuesday, had been delayed by one day because of a phone company computer glitch, Nielsen said.

CBS' record-low Saturday lineup began with the return of "Melba," the comedy series that was essentially canceled after one episode. Until last week, it was broadcast only on Jan. 28, the day of the shuttle Challenger tragedy, when it attracted a 9.2 rating.

Last week's "Melba" episode had a 5.7 rating. Following "Melba" was the failed pilot "Family Martinez," which had a 5.1 rating, and then the 1982 "Hunchback of Notre Dame." The tragic story of Quasimodo, the deformed bellringer with the heart of gold, had a 20.5 rating in its first showing, then a 9 rating when it was repeated in 1983.

On Saturday, "Hunchback" was last among 61 shows with a 4.6 rating. CBS' Saturday schedule attracted a 4.9 rating, meaning only an average of 4.2 million TV households were tuned in. In contrast, the top-rated "Cosby Show" had a 22.4

rating and 19.2 million homes last week.

The week before, a repeat of CBS' "Death of a Salesman" was the lowest-rated show with a 5.3 rating.

CBS' Saturday performance did not supplant ABC's record commercial-network low night of Jan. 4, 1975, a Saturday, when its play "Anthony & Cleopatra" averaged a 3.5 rating over three hours.

NBC's worst night was Jan. 16, 1982, also a Saturday, when its classical concert, "Live from Studio 8H," had a 3.3 rating and the whole evening averaged a 4.3.

NBC was the third-rated network at the time, but has become No. 1 with a lineup loaded with comedies. Last week, "The Cosby Show" ranked first, followed by "Family Ties," "Cheers" and "Night Court." CBS' Monday sitcoms, "Newhart" and "Kate & Allie," finished fifth and sixth, respectively. CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" tied for sixth, then came ABC's "Growing Pains," CBS' "60 Minutes" and ABC's "Who's the Boss?"

CBS also was hurt by the poor performance of its miniseries repeat, "Mistral's Daughter," which averaged a 9.1 rating, 18 share for three nights. The installments ranked 40, 44th and 46th. When originally broadcast in 1984, it averaged a 17.6 rating, 28 share.

The share measures the percentage of sets on that are tuned to a program.

Mike Eisenberg, CBS' research director, said the network expected a more respectable 23 or 24 share from the "Mistral's Daughter" repeat.

## Cable shopping networks arrive

NEW YORK — Shopping shows are cable television's newest sensation, and they're stirring up excitement on Wall Street as well as in American living rooms.

No fewer than five cable networks already are carrying home shopping programs nationwide, peddling everything from air fresheners and home pest repellents to zirconia rings and electronics systems at bargain prices. More are planned.

Network executives describe their programs as televised shopping malls or video catalogues, with companionable hosts serving as guides.

Impulse clearly is the chief motivator as the hosts mix live phone calls from customers, prizes and games with their descriptions of the merchandise.

"I don't think anyone wakes up in the morning, decides to buy such-and-such today and turns us on," said Bob Circo, who is the early afternoon host at the Home Shopping Network. "It's all impulse buy-

ing."

Viewers act on those impulses by ordering via toll-free telephone lines.

Analysts say the home shopping market could reach \$1 billion in annual sales, but they're raising questions about whether the public fascination with them is only a passing fad.

"How many ice sets or can openers or record cleaners are customers going to buy before their enthusiasm

runs out?" asked Jeffrey Russell, who follows the media business for the investment firm Drexel Burnham Lambert.

Some analysts speculate that it is mostly housewives and affluent retired folks who buy from the shopping services.

But Roger Blackwell, professor of marketing at Ohio State University, said home shopping suits working

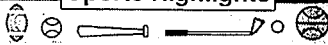

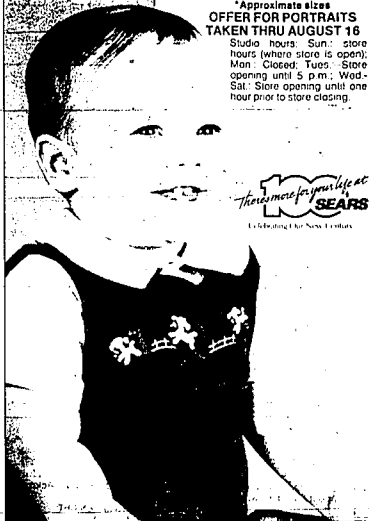

people as well, giving them the flexibility to fit shopping into their schedules.

"They get some of the excitement of going to the mall without having to go there," he said.

The Home Shopping Network has been on the air nationally for more than a year, reaching 7.2 million of the estimated 40-million homes which get television programs by cable or satellite. It operates two networks, 24 hours a day.

Cable Value Network, which went on the air May 1, is carried on cable systems reaching about 13 million viewers, according to Peter Barton, co-chairman of the network. Cable Value Network programs about 110 hours a week and plans to expand to continuous service starting Aug. 23.

The Video Shopping Mall Inc., based in Jenkintown, Pa., runs a shopping network 12 hours a day, seven days a week. It made its debut June 10 and is available to about 7.1 million households, according to spokesman Jeffrey Friedland.

To entice cable systems to carry the programs, the networks generally offer them up to 5 percent of the revenue produced by sales generated in their areas.

Shopping programs also are being carried on a fifth network, Tempo Television of Tulsa, Okla., which reaches about 13.1 million homes, according to Ray Klinge, Tempo's vice president for sales and programming. Unlike the others, Tempo simply distributes programs produced elsewhere and carries non-shopping shows, such as movies, as well.

The Home Shopping Network,

presently offering the most ambitious programming schedule, is rooted in radio.

Lowell Paxson, one of the network's co-founders, began selling merchandise over the AM radio station he owned in 1977 in Clearwater, Fla. He put his shopping service on a local cable television station in 1982 and expanded it nationally in July 1985.

The company gets merchandise by buying in bulk, often acquiring close-out and liquidation items that are then sold at substantial discounts.

Home Shopping's 20 hosts display and describe products at a pace of eight to 12 items an hour.

"Wake up your jeweler, whatever you have to do," early morning host Larry Muzzy recently advised as he offered for \$1,111 diamond rings that he valued at \$4,200.

Time is a sales tool because viewers can't order an item from Home Shopping Network once the product is off the screen (other networks permit purchases at any time).

The hosts take calls on the air from people who have just placed an order, and usually are eager to volunteer a testimonial.

"I can't get away from the set," Gwen from Iowa told Muzzy. "This is the only way to shop."

Prizes help build excitement. Without warning, a host may give a caller chosen at random a chance to pick one of three envelopes and win vouchers good for future purchases.

If you don't like the merchandise, you have 30 days to send it back for a refund. Delivery charges are extra.

The Home Shopping Network said 349,000 people made a purchase in the first 10 months it was on the air, spending an average of \$563 to get an average of 17.6 items apiece during the period.

The company initially offered stock to the public on May 13 at \$18 a share. The stock opened at \$42 a share on the American Stock Exchange, rose as high as \$108 and was trading in the mid-\$80 range this past week.

Based in Clearwater, Fla., the shopping company reported a profit of \$11.4 million on revenue of \$106.8 million in the nine months ended May 31.

New shopping networks are being assembled.

The Tel-Shop network is scheduled to offer 64 hours of programming a week beginning Monday, according to spokesman Kirk Shelton. He said the network already had commitments from cable operators covering 11 million homes.

Horn & Hardart Co., the New York-based parent of the mail-order merchandiser Hanover House Industries Inc., plans to start a shopping network in September, according to marketing director Norman Sylvester.

Joseph M. Segal, former chairman of Franklin Mint Corp., a direct mail company based in Philadelphia, plans to launch a 24-hour-a-day home shopping program called the QVC Network Inc. in November.

And Crazy Eddie Inc., a discount home electronics chain based in Brooklyn, said this past week it plans to start a home shopping network nationwide later this year.

KBCI announced Johnson's hiring the next day.

KTVB News Director Phil Wenstrand said on Friday that Nikoleski's move to Channel 7 benefits both the station and the sportscaster.

"We were left without a weekend sports guy, and we had a sports director going on vacation," he said. "We thought it would be good for him, but it's also good for us. . . You can't reach out of the market and find someone who knows the market the next day."

Nikoleski said his arrangement with Channel 7 does not expire until Oct. 1, but he would leave earlier if he gets the sports director's job he wants or Channel 7 hires another weekend sports anchor. Wenstrand said KTVB has a candidate in mind for the job.
