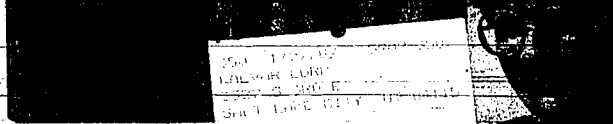
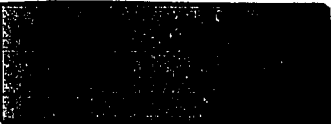

White House cautious about Soviet proposal

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. — The White House reacted with skepticism Thursday to a Soviet request that it participate in a new round of world trade talks, calling the Kremlin's economic system "a fundamental, practical and philosophical variance" with the principles embraced by the 91-member General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade.

"It is difficult to see how a state-supported and controlled economic system could comply with GATT rules," said White House spokesman Larry Speakes.

For the Soviets to join GATT, they would have to establish a trading system complete with tariff schedules, Speakes said.

Because the Soviets have not indicated any willingness to adapt to GATT rules, the administration does not regard their request to par-

ticipate as legitimate, some officials here said.

At the same time, Speakes suggested that the Soviets "get down to business" and respond to President Reagan's July 25 letter to Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev setting forth the administration's latest arms control proposals.

In addition, Speakes said, "if the Soviets are serious" about a nuclear test ban, they would take President Reagan up on his offer to have Soviet scientists visit the U.S. nuclear test site at Nevada.

While administration officials continue to say that they were optimistic about prospects for a superpower summit this year, they have found the Soviets elusive when it comes to seriously negotiating a date or an agenda.

A report in the Wall Street Journal Thursday said that Reagan had predicted in his letter to Gorbachev that all ballistic missiles be eliminated and that the superpowers share

research aimed at developing a missile-defense system popularly known as "Star Wars."

Chief of staff Donald T. Regan refused Thursday to discuss what Reagan had offered in his private communication. But Regan called the current system of mutual deterrence "a stupid policy," and pointed out that Reagan has said many times that he favors the eventual elimination of offensive missiles.

Regan said he hoped that the delay in Gorbachev's response indicated that the Soviets were preparing a thoughtful counterproposal. Regan took roughly a month to reply to a similar letter from Gorbachev, he noted.

In a speech to a local civic club here, Regan vowed that Star Wars "is not a bargaining chip."

He said that current arms control negotiations "offer more encouragement today than at any time during the past decade."

Showers little aid in Idaho

Rain brought some welcome relief Thursday to thousands of firefighters struggling against forest and range fires in the Northwest.

But for some in Idaho, it may have done as much harm as good.

"They didn't get enough even to turn the dirt into mud," said Ron Sanow, spokesman for the Boise National Forest, where the state's most intense fires continued to blacken valuable timber.

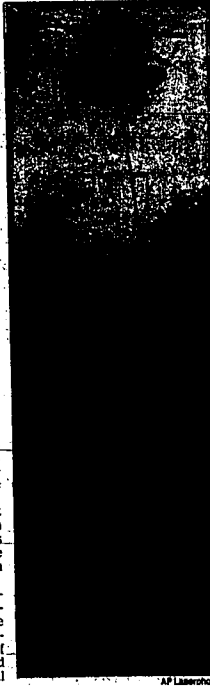
Sanow said while the .04 inch of precipitation that fell in west-central Idaho Thursday morning cooled temperatures and raised humidity, keeping fire activity low, it also dampened foliage just enough to stifle attempts to burn out areas to secure fire lines.

Forecasters called for continued scattered thundershowers until midnight, then a warming and drying trend with a diminishing chance of showers into the weekend.

But even before the storm that dumped up to a half-inch of rain on some areas of Oregon, Idaho crews finally managed to rein in the Boise National Forest's stubborn Garden Valley fire complex.

Containment Wednesday afternoon turned the tide on a 10-day battle that left 2,747 acres of dense timber charred about 40 miles northeast of Boise. Full control of flames still burning within cleared lines was not expected for several more days, Sanow said.

Post office resumes operations

EDMOND, Okla. — Shaken and tearful employees resumed work Thursday at the post office where a gunman killed 14 colleagues and himself, while police said they found magazines about mercenaries and life in the Soviet Union at his home.

Police speculated that Patrick Henry Sherrill's problems at work and the possibility he would be fired were contributing factors in the tragedy, but said he left no clues in his house when he left for work Wednesday morning.

Five people remained hospitalized Thursday, three in fair condition and two in serious but stable condition. One other wounded employee was treated and released.

Workers were not required to show up Thursday, but only one of an estimated 80 who fled the shooting stayed away. The Edmond Post Office opened for business at 8 a.m., and delivery service resumed, though a few hours late, said Postal Service spokeswoman Barbara Halsley.

The reunion of workers who escaped the carnage was tearful.

"People were hugging each other and crying," said mail carrier Joe Sturgill. "I can't describe what was felt here. It was the first time we'd seen each other since it happened."

"It's a pretty eerie feeling," said employee Ron Blackwell. It was "very, very quiet inside."

Chernobyl hurt USSR nuclear plan

MOSCOW — Energy officials said Thursday the Chernobyl accident dealt a serious blow to the Soviet nuclear power program and is forcing officials to consider redesigning reactors so that workers cannot override the safety systems.

The government blames the April 26 explosion and fire at the Ukrainian plant's No. 4 reactor on human error.

The ruling Politburo, meanwhile,

ordered the Ministry of Atomic Energy and other energy bodies to pay special attention to conserving fuel and energy so there will be enough this fall and winter.

In its report on the Politburo meeting, however, the official news agency Tass made no mention of any energy shortages because of the Chernobyl accident.

Officials said at a news conference Thursday that the four-reactor Chernobyl plant supplied 29 billion kilowatt hours of energy last year.

The officials also confirmed that

the April accident killed 31 people. The previous official death toll, released last month, was 28.

Andriank Petyosyants, chief of the atomic energy committee, said the disaster was forcing officials to consider locating reactors outside populated areas and redesigning them so workers cannot override safety systems. The Chernobyl plant is 80 miles north of Kiev, the Ukrainian capital with 2.4 million residents.

Petyosyants said Chernobyl "has hurt the Soviet nuclear power program."

Meese offers strong defense of judicial selections record

SUN VALLEY — U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese defended the Reagan administration's record in choosing federal judges in the judicial circuit and Supreme Court level in a Thursday speech in Sun Valley.

"We are the target of critics who want to control the courts," he told judges and attorneys at the 1986 9th Circuit Judicial Conference. It is the partisan politics or ideological features," he said.

Congressional representatives and senators nominate judges for district courts, and suggestions for the court of appeals are also accepted, although a search for those judges is often extended, he said.

After the Department of Justice receives three to five applicants, their legal writings and work is

reviewed, Meese said. The Federal Bureau of Investigation is asked for a report of any criminal offenses, and the American Bar Association is asked for confidential assessments of the candidate from peers.

The Department of Justice then interviews the candidates in which it is interested.

"This is not a litmus test," he reported in the press, he said. "We do not discuss politics, but what they think about the justice system."

The interviews often result in "consciousness raising. They may not have thought about the broader precepts of constitutional justice," he said.

Justice Department officials look for trial or judicial experience and men and women of intelligence and honesty who will be committed to the federal justice system, he said.

"We feel the present system is a good system. It provides good judges with good knowledge of the law and the Constitution," he said.

If there are few Democrats, it is because there are many qualified Republicans, Meese said. "Anyway,

factiously, there are many of them on the bench from an earlier administration."

"What kind of judges has the system produced? It appears to work very well," he said. The Los Angeles Times, a paper he characterized as often at odds with the Reagan administration, had applauded recent appointments, calling them "some of the most experienced and qualified ever selected," Meese said.

Meese also defended the president's record in appointing justices to the Supreme Court.

"Presidents don't make vacancies, they fill them," he said. The number of positions to be filled depends on the number of Justices Congress deems are needed and how long existing justices choose to serve.

By the end of Reagan's second term he will have appointed 45 to 50 percent of the justices of the U.S. Supreme Court, not an unusually great percentage, Meese said.

Woodrow Wilson appointed more than 50 percent of the justices serving at the end of his second term. Franklin Roosevelt appointed 77.3

Small businessmen seek defeat of liberal time-off policy

WASHINGTON — Entrepreneurs attending a White House conference vowed Thursday to fight legislation seeking extended time off for new parents and sick people, saying it would put many small businesses out of business.

"We could be surviving something like that," Aliza Brenner, owner of a Miami travel agency, said after 1,360 of the delegates to the White House Conference on

At the top of the list was a recommendation calling for a government crackdown on the soaring cost of liability insurance, an increasing concern in the business community.

Delegates called the insurance crisis a life-and-death sentence to many small businesses, and outlined specific actions it said should be taken by the president, Congress and state legislatures — including regulation of the insurance and re-insurance industries.

A call to preserve the Small Business Administration, long a target of Reagan ad-

ministration budget cutters, started out as a top priority but ended up in 13th on the list of 60.

Ralph Stanley, executive director of the conference, sought to minimize the importance of the SBA resolution, and said the top 10 recommendations were consistent with the policies of the Reagan administration.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole, R-Kan., told the delegates they would find bipartisan support in Congress for many of their recommendations, and pledged to work to enact them.

The House Education and Labor Committee in June passed and sent to the floor a family leave bill requiring businesses with 15 paid leave to workers with newborn or newly adopted children, serious medical problems or elderly dependents.

The conference delegates said in their resolution that Congress should reject the bill as well as proposals to require medical coverage and that it should bar states from imposing such requirements.

Mining facing extinction, leaders say

COBUR ALENE (AP) — The region's mining industry lacks consensus on a lot of issues, but its leaders agreed at a Senate subcommittee hearing that business couldn't be worse.

"Our industry is on a crash course with extinction," said Jack Kendrick, president of Bunker Limited Partnership.

Several executives appeared Wednesday before an election-year Senate Energy and Natural Resources subcommittee hearing chaired by Sen. John Warner, R-Va., to give a variety of interpretations of the reasons behind mining's malaise and to propose solutions.

Warner shared the platform with Sens. Jim McClure and Steve Symms, and Rep. Larry Craig, all Idaho Republicans. Symms and Craig face re-election this fall.

Remonetizing silver was endorsed by several industry spokesmen, including Sunshine Mining Co. Vice President Harry B. Ireland of Dallas.

President John Kennedy's demonetization of silver in 1961 dumped 2 billion ounces of the metal out of the U.S. treasury, Ireland said.

"The industry's depression has been brought about by feeding the market with 2 billion ounces of silver in the last 20 years and increased production from Mexico and Peru in a declining silver market," he said.

"If we can hold some 262 million ounces of gold in reserve, why not silver?" he asked.

Asarco Vice President Robert Kupsh said his firm has made capital improvements of \$1.5 billion in the past decade and argued for an extension of investment tax credits companies are unable to use because they're losing money.

Kendrick called for countervailing duties on subsidized foreign production and production payments or interest-free loans to mining companies to be repaid when prices recover.

Hecia Mining Co. Chairman William Griffith disagreed. "We don't need government interference in world free trade, and we don't need protectionist measures," he said.

The senators thanked each other for coming to the hearing, and each devoted much of his opening remarks to praising the others for their con-

cerns and accomplishments on behalf of the mining industry.

All attacked the White House. "The administration forgets the harm to its own people" caused by trying to sell the remainder of the government's silver stockpile in wholesale auctions, McClure said.

Symms announced he was working on a secret plan to restore silver to its former glory by putting it back into the world monetary system.

Delicate negotiations are under way with the Treasury Department, McClure, Craig, the Mexican and Peruvian governments, the World Bank and New York investment bankers to develop and sell silver-backed financial instruments and soak up surplus supply, he said.

"It sounded like a political ploy to me," said Steve Brown, a Sledworkers union representative of unemployed Silver Valley miners. "Everyone was just patting Symms and Craig on the back and telling them what good jobs they're doing."

Deputy charged in accident

BOISE (AP) — Charges of misdemeanor vehicular manslaughter and leaving the scene of an injury accident have been filed against an Ada County sheriff's deputy in the hit-and-run death of an Emmett woman early Thursday.

Michael E. Vajda, 30, was arraigned Thursday afternoon on the charges — and Magistrate Judge Richard Grant released Vajda on his own recognizance, said Under Sheriff Dee Pfeiffer.

Vajda initially was arrested on a felony charge of vehicular manslaughter, but Pfeiffer said the prob-

seutor's office chose the misdemeanor charge instead.

Sheriff Vaughn Killeen said the five-year veteran of the sheriff's department, who worked in the jail, was off-duty shortly after midnight Thursday when he allegedly struck the rear end of a car westbound on Fairview Avenue east of Meridian.

Linda Griffith, 32, was killed when her car exploded and left the roadway. Her husband Gary was thrown from the vehicle and was in stable condition Thursday at St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, officials said.

Killeen said Vajda had a breath-alcohol level of .07 percent when he was arrested near the scene of the accident a couple of hours later. That is below the legal intoxication level of .10 percent.

Vajda was arrested when officers at the scene of the crash spotted his light-colored Toyota Celica, which matched the description given by witnesses. He apparently had driven home — and was returning past the scene with his wife when he was stopped by sheriff's officers, Killeen said.

Work on mailing list produces sharp clash

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The head of a committee pushing for passage of a law banning union membership or payment of union dues as a condition of employment in Idaho says opponents have used cheap, out-of-state labor in their campaign to defeat right-to-work.

Gary Glenn, executive director of the Idaho Freedom to Work Committee, told the Greater Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce this week that organized labor had some key-punch work done at an Indian orphanage in South Dakota in an apparent effort to avoid paying high wages.

But Barbara Babic, spokeswoman for the Idaho AFL-CIO, said Glenn was "so off base he's not even in the ballpark."

"We checked around in Idaho for people to do key punching, but the only person we found was a pro-union worker," Babic said. "If you think we're going to turn over our mailing lists to a pro-right-to-work, you're crazy."

Glenn said the AFL-CIO's political action committee reported spending \$2,164 with the South Dakota school this year.

Ron Kjonggaard, with the St. Joseph's Indian School at Chamberlain, S.D., said workers at the school knew about 60,000 names and addresses for the campaign against the right-to-work law. He said the workers were not union members.

Tribe sets hearing on plant site bid

FORT HALL (AP) — The Shoshone-Bannock Tribe's land use policy commission will hold hearings today on Western Fabricating's request to build a plant on the Fort Hall Reservation, officials say.

The commission will hold public hearings at 1 p.m. and 6 p.m. in the Tribal Business Chambers to discuss a building permit application filed by Western and a zoning change application from the tribes themselves, said Commission Chairman Joyce Ballard.

The zoning change would allow a 66-acre industrial park on land that is currently zoned agricultural. The 66,000-square-foot plant would occupy 27 acres about a half mile south of the Tribal Business Center along the east side of Highway 91.

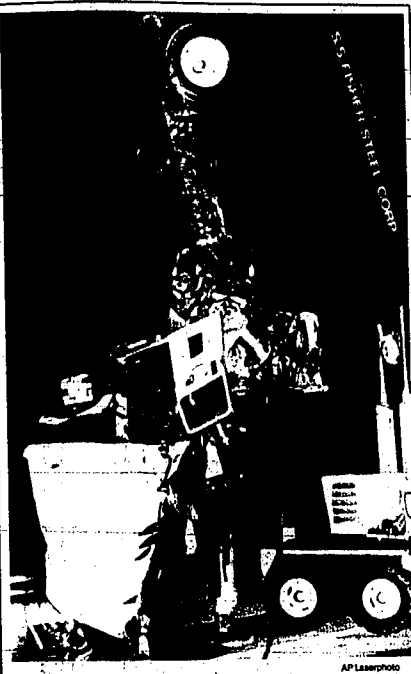

COLUMBIA, Pa. (AP) — The driver of a truck and semi-trailer died Wednesday after the vehicle narrowly missed a road repair sign, crashed through a guardrail and plunged 75 feet into the Susquehanna River, township police said.

West Hempfield Township Police identified the driver as Donald Sweltzer, 52, of Nampa, Idaho.

BLM head thinks fees for grazing are fair

BOISE (AP) — The director of the Bureau of Land Management says the fees charged ranchers to graze cattle on public lands are fair, and should be maintained.

DOE seeking cask designs

BOISE (AP) — The U.S. Department of Energy is seeking proposals for the design of casks to transport spent nuclear fuel from reactors to storage sites.

The DOE said it will consider up to 10 designs and accept proposals through Oct. 31.

The proposal should be of a cask suitable for transport by truck, rail or barge.

The federal Department of Transportation and Nuclear Regulatory Commission will set safety guidelines.

The DOE was authorized under the Nuclear Waste Policy Act of 1982 to establish a national system for the transport of spent nuclear fuel, either to a permanent or temporary storage site, officials said.

The casks will undergo testing before being put into use.

Drop in discount rate won't cure economy

A nervous Federal Reserve Board, concerned about an essentially-stagnant economy, has dropped the discount rate for the fourth time in a year, hoping to drive down the value of the dollar and improve America's foreign trade imbalance.

Nothing would please the Reagan administration more than for the latest drop in the discount rate to spark both agricultural sales and a lackluster stock market.

An election is coming, and in heartland America, times are not good. More than one Senate race — including Idaho's — could turn on how well or poorly the economy is doing by November.

A fall rally in agricultural exports and a fall rally in the stock market would sweep Republican candidates back into office.

If neither happens, the election could be a GOP bloodbath. Thus, the Fed's move this week is, in a sense, a political one.

It may be a desperate one as well. Three previous attempts to boost American exports by this route have not proved successful; a drop of 30 percent in the value of the dollar against foreign currencies in the past 18 months has had little effect.

The Fed is playing a risky game here. Reducing the interest rate again will raise the cost of financing the growing federal deficit. If the economy fails to respond to the move, we may be left with a worse situation: a higher, more-expensive deficit and still-lagging foreign trade.

But both results would be well past the now-to-November window in which the Fed seems to be operating.

A consensus seems to have developed in Washington to make adjustments which have short-term political benefits, not necessarily long-term ones.

We all know that stimulating the economy should come from reducing deficit spending and trimming both military- and domestic government spending. But that is clearly beyond the range of the politically possible.

Hence, we are left with moves like reducing the discount rate. The play may work. But it may not.

Tax bill economic threat

Those promoting a one-world government like the Trilateral Commission and the Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) are working vigorously for the new tax bill.

The tax bill, if passed, will likely destroy the remains of the U.S. industrial and agriculture economies. They are falsely promoting the bill as a decrease in individual taxes.

The May 12, 1986 Wall Street Journal said: "The elimination of the investment tax credit could prompt some companies to postpone, or even cancel, spending plans for new plant and equipment and would weaken the competitive position of U.S. companies in global markets."

Jerry Jasnowski, chief economist of the National Association of Manufacturers, described the new tax plan: "It's a major shift toward consumption of foreign-made goods especially."

Without a strong manufacturing and agriculture center, the nation will lose the core of its economy.

In addition we are financing our own self-destruction as hundreds of billions of U.S. taxpayer and savers dollars have been shifted overseas for investment in Third World and in Communist slave-labor nations.

This foreign aid through the World Bank, International Monetary Fund, etc. is used to produce goods with slaves or very low cost labor (10-20 cents per hour) that is in direct competition with American produced goods.

There is no such thing as free trade when competing with slave labor countries. Importation of slave made goods is against a law which obviously is not being enforced.

The state goal of the CFR and Trilateralist has been to lower the standard of living in the U.S. while using U.S. taxpayer money to develop the Communist nations, their satellites and Third World nations. Thus, all nations can merge into a one-world "utopia" run by them.

The new tax bill must be defeated to save taxes and more importantly our own jobs. Please write senators, congressmen and President Reagan and ask them to oppose the new tax bill.

S. Africa's blacks blame school system

CAPE TOWN, South Africa — Or all the fronts on which the battle for South Africa is being fought, black education currently is the most explosive.

While government has been greatly expanding black high-school education since the early 1970s, the economy has been unable to generate a sufficient number of jobs — only about half the number needed. A most volatile mix has been created in the schools. Studies show that the higher the educational standards, the more radical the black demands become.

Blacks understandably blame the segregated education system for their plight. Increasingly they also are objecting to the capitalist system. The students' proposed alternative is "a people's education," controlled by the blacks and geared to preparing them for a socialist, post-apartheid society.

Yet President Pieter W. Botha's government is falling further behind the demands of the situation. The government's most fundamental mistake is its assumption that once the African National Congress' influence is removed, the seething unrest will subside and black political leaders will come forward to participate in the new government structures being devised.

The main threat to government and the capitalist system in South Africa is in fact not an ANC takeover of the black townships, but a collapse of the general socialization process of blacks. Some of South Africa's most respected educators fear that the country already is faced with an irreversible breakdown in its black education system.

Last year the system was crippled by widespread school boycotts in most of the metropolitan centers. Recently the department responsible for black education announced that about 300 pupils — 10 percent of the total student population — have been barred from school for failing to re-register before the gov-

ernment recognition of many student councils and parent-teacher organizations. The message is clear: The government provides education — take it on our terms, or leave it.

This strategy will produce mixed results. Closing black schools means a serious loss of the students' organizational base. Even the ANC is thought to be opposed to school boycotts because they deflect blacks from the goals of a "people's education." What South Africa's actions cannot achieve is restoration of a learning environment in black schools — something that will steadily erode the social cohesion to impose its norms and of the economy to improve its dismal rate of labor productivity.

Thus some sectors of the business community find attractive the idea of the ANC as a coalition government partner, in part because of the group's position on education. BOSTON — Every year, in memory of my historic foremothers, I celebrate Aug. 26, anniversary of the passage of women's suffrage, by recognizing those who have done their utmost in the past 12 months to slow the progress of women.

This annual event, known as the Equal Rites Award ceremony, stirs butterflies in the stomachs of finalists, and competitive fever among those who push their favorite candidates. Once again our one-woman jury had the delicious task of sifting through dozens of entries to find the gems. Now, the envelopes please.

The highest prize, The Ms-Anthropomorphic Man of the Year Award, was won easily this year by a real gem of a gent, "Diamond Don" Regan. It was Diamond Don who said at the Geneva summit last fall that women are "not going to understand throw weights." He then divested himself of all good sense, explaining our South African policy this way: "Are the women of America prepared to give up all their jewelry?" To Diamond Don we send one charm — a Minuteman II missile whose throw weight has been calculated at 3,628,000 carats — attached to

neck chain to wear at the White House.

Ferdinand Marcos, another leading contender, will have to settle for The Chivalrous Chauvinist Award. It was Marcos who said in December that he was "embarrassed" to be running against a woman. "It's better if it's a man. If it's a woman it might lead to something bad." Like defeat, Marcos' award is not accompanied by a prize because he already has Imelda. Who could ask for anything more?

The Ms-Match Maker Award, an attractive panic button with shocking voltage, goes to Newsweek magazine for its doomsday cover story, noting that a single woman over 40 was more likely to get killed by a terrorist than to get married. Who could ask for anything more?

While we are on the subject, the Internal Understatement of the Year Award must go

to the mother of Anne Marie Murphy, the pregnant Dublin woman who was put on a plane with a special going-away gift — a bomb — her alleged terrorist beau, Nezar Hindawi. Said Mom, "I do not think very much of this boyfriend." To this fussy Mom we send the Newsweek cover suitable for framing.

The Raging Hormonal Imbalance Award, which has often gone to male members of the medical establishment, this year passes to Dr. Richard Restak. The neurologist has come up with a solution to the medical-care crisis: encourage more women to go into medicine because they are "cheaper" and "compliant." To Dr. Restak we send a copy of his own book, "The Brain," and humbly suggest that he use it.

The Fatherhood Is A Snap Award goes to an Escondido, Calif., man, Bob Edwards, who wasn't aware of his wife's most recent pregnancy or delivery. "We were in the living room playing with the toys." She was in the bathroom having a baby. I wonder, how did I miss that?" Said Poppa Bob:

The Reverse Discrimination Prize, a vehicle that only goes backwards, is awarded to

Gerard D'Amico, a candidate for lieutenant governor of Massachusetts. D'Amico is running against Evelyn Murphy in a state that has never elected a Democratic woman to statewide office. But, D'Amico says, he hopes people will vote for him despite his sex.

Even in this quiescent year, we found a group of protesters for the Dubious Equality Award. They are seven women who marched topless in Rochester, N.Y., to protest a state law that allows men but not women to take off their shirts. To the Rochester Seven we send a T-shirt commemorating the event. In fact we send seven T-shirts.

As another well-dressed special, we have awarded a Designer Cancer Prize to Yves St. Laurent, who put his name and image on Ritz cigarettes to woo women into taking their equal place in the cancer wars. To St. Laurent we send a nicely stitched copy of the statistics that show nearly twice as many college women as men smoke cigarettes daily.

Another award heading overseas is The International Backlash. Wrapped neatly in a chador, it goes to the president of Iran, who

refused to attend a Zimbabwe dinner in his honor because there were women, including cabinet ministers, at the table.

The Homelown Yaotallan Prize goes to Bishop Anthony Bevilacqua of Pittsburgh. He decreed that women couldn't have their feet washed on Holy Thursday because no women had their feet washed at the original last supper.

The G-String for Gratuitous Sex, fought after by so many rock stars over the years, goes to a L.A. group heavy on the metal and light on the mental: Mötley Crüe. According to the record company's bio, "When asked to name an incident that typifies the band, they point to the night in Dallas that a doctor limed them up and gave them double doses of penicillin."

Finally the Dancing in the Dark Ages Prize goes to Slate Sen. John DeCamp in Nebraska where, for the first time, the runner for governor is between two women. John DeCamp, who called it a "state prom contest," will be sent a dance card. Blank.

Judge, target of bomb, returns to work

FARGO, N.D. (AP) — A judge who was the intended target of a pipe bomb returned to work under guard Thursday, and authorities said his sensitive murder trials might have motivated someone to seek revenge.

U.S. District Judge Paul Benson, 68, continued until Monday a bank theft trial and turned the case over to another judge, U.S. Attorney Rodney Webb said at a news conference Thursday.

Thomas Vokes, chief deputy U.S. marshal for North Dakota, said his office was in charge of security for the judge and his family, but refused to describe the protection being provided.

The judge declined comment, according to a person who answered the telephone at his chambers.

A bomb authorities described as being 1 1/2 inches long and 1/2 inches in diameter was defused at the Federal Building on Wednesday. It appeared similar to a bomb that exploded Monday at the Fargo Post Office and injured four workers and damaged some mail, Webb said.

"It certainly would have killed somebody or certainly severely injured someone if they had been holding the thing," said Police Chief Douglas Franks.

Franks said it was not known to whom the package containing the pipe bomb was addressed.

Benson, who was appointed to the bench by President Nixon in 1971, went into semiretirement this year.

In 1977 he presided over the trial of Indian activist Leonard Peltier, who was convicted of slaying two FBI

agents on a South Dakota reservation. The trial was moved to Fargo because of excessive media coverage in South Dakota.

The second trial involved the 1983 shooting deaths of two U.S. marshals by tax protesters. The marshals were killed in a gunbattle with Gordon Kahl and three other men, including Kahl's son.

Kahl, a member of Posse Comitatus, died in his second gunfight with authorities in Arkansas, but the three other men were convicted for their roles in the North Dakota shooting and sent to prison by Benson.

After the trial, federal investigators learned of a death threat against Benson.

Dad, mom delight in touching child

(CINCINNATI AP) — The parents of a 5-month-old son touched their child Thursday for the first time since he was born, thanks to a bone marrow transplant from his father that helps him fight viral infections.

Christopher Chase-Cobb, who suffers from severe combined immune deficiency, left his sterile hospital room where he has lived since his birth March 25.

"I'm delighted now," said Lori Cobb of Hinton, W.Va., who held her son to her cheek at the Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center. "It's been hard. I've been here for five months. I've never been allowed to touch my baby without protective clothing on... and he's been on the same floor where my first baby died," she said.

Chase, as his parents call him, was the second child of Mrs. Cobb, 22, and her husband, Thomas, to be born

with the congenital disease, which is similar to AIDS but much worse, said Dr. Richard Harris, director of the hospital's bone marrow transplant unit.

The disease leaves victims without T-cells, or thymus cells, which fight viral infections.

The couple's first child, Brandon, died of a viral infection two years ago at the age of 7 months.

Harris said the disease is rare and appears only when it is present in the genes of both parents. "While it can be fatal, he said 70 percent to 80 percent of its victims survive with bone marrow transplants, a treatment that has helped about 100 babies worldwide.

Chase's chances for survival are excellent because the ailment was detected at birth and because he received a bone marrow transplant from his father, Harris said.

Probe into economic data leaks leads to firing

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Commerce Department said Thursday that an investigation into leaks of sensitive economic data has resulted in the firing of one employee, the resignation of another and letters of reprimand against three other workers.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige had originally announced in July that three employees would be fired for improperly releasing the financial data.

However, officials said Thursday that after further investigation, it was decided that one of those accused should receive only a written reprimand.

The actions that were proposed were carefully considered in the light of "employee responses," department spokesman Malcolm Baldrige said.

In July, Baldrige said two of the employees he was ordering fired had made financial gains from the government data, while the third individual had passed inside information to another person who had profited from it.

The disciplinary action followed an investigation by the department's inspector general into allegations of premature release last September of

the gross national product, the GNP and a variety of other closely watched measures of the economy's performance.

Baldrige said two of the employees the department's Bureau of Economic Analysis which prepares or indirectly to buy bond futures.

Federal deficit soars to \$22 billion in July

WASHINGTON (AP) — The federal budget deficit soared to \$22.2 billion in July, putting the country well on the way to a record deficit for the entire year, the Treasury Department reported Thursday.

The department said that for the first 10 months of fiscal 1986, the government suffered an imbalance between tax revenues and spending of \$18.9 billion, 3 percent ahead of the same period a year ago.

For the entire fiscal year, which ends Sept. 30, the Reagan administration is forecasting the deficit will hit \$23.2 billion, 8.9 percent higher than last year's record deficit. That would mean the administration is expecting the deficit will average \$20.5 billion in the last two months of the fiscal year.

In June, the deficit shrank to \$1 billion as government tax revenues rose sharply. However, revenues dipped in July to \$63 billion, 18 percent below the June level. For the

year, revenues total \$634.5 billion, 5 percent ahead of the same period last year.

Government spending totaled \$85.2 billion last month, up 9.2 percent from the June level. For the year, spending totals \$823.6 billion, 4.5 percent ahead of last year.

As usual, the big spending categories were defense, Social Security payments and interest on the national debt.

Defense spending totaled \$23 billion last month and \$230.5 billion for the 10 months, up 9.4 percent from the same period in 1985.

Social Security payments totaled \$15.9 billion last month and \$157.7 billion for the 10 months, up 1.3 percent from a year ago.

Interest payments on the \$2 trillion national debt totaled \$13.4 billion last month and \$160.1 billion for the fiscal year thus far, up 5.3 percent from the same period last year.

Dingell says Deaver report may have error

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee report that concluded lobbyist Michael K. Deaver lied to the panel may have an inaccuracy, the chairman of the subcommittee said Thursday.

Rep. John D. Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the House Energy and Commerce investigations subcommittee, wrote a letter to the independent counsel investigating Deaver, informing him of the possible mistake.

The letter was written Aug. 14, but never released by the subcommittee. Randall J. Turk, an attorney for Deaver, made it public Thursday and a subcommittee source, speaking only on condition he not be named, confirmed it was sent.

The subcommittee voted 17-0 Aug. 12 to accept its staff's findings that Deaver, a former top aide to President Reagan, "knowingly and willfully" lied to the committee. The panel members formally asked the court-appointed counsel, Whitney North Seymour Jr., to investigate whether Deaver violated perjury and other laws.

The subcommittee source said the panel stands by the findings of the other portions of the report.

The possible inaccuracy was in a section on Deaver's representation of Rockwell, maker of the B-1 bomber.

Deaver, in a closed-door appearance before the committee earlier this year, testified he told company officials he planned to talk with James C. Miller III, director of the Office of Management and Budget, about the need for more of the bombers.

The subcommittee report said Deaver's testimony was inaccurate, because company officials said the firm was not told in advance of the Deaver-Miller meeting. Now, Dingell says, Deaver may have been correct in testifying that he did inform the Rockwell officials that he planned to meet with Miller.

Justice has no recollection of Army surveillance memo

WASHINGTON (AP) — Chief Justice designate William H. Rehnquist says he has "no recollection" of writing a draft Justice Department memo in 1969, in which he proposed Army surveillance of civilian anti-war protesters.

Rehnquist also said he could not recall "any participation" in formulating policy on use of the Army to conduct surveillance or collect intelligence on civilians.

Rehnquist's comments, obtained by The Associated Press, were given in writing recently to Sen. Charles McC. Mathias, a member of the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Mathias, R-Md., was in the majority in the panel's 13-5 vote Aug. 14 to recommend the nominee's confirmation by the full Senate.

The memo, which also includes a detailed plan for use of the military in quelling a civil disturbance, could have a bearing on the continuing battle by Senate liberals to derail the nomination.

One of their major issues is Rehnquist's failure to disqualify himself as a Supreme Court associate justice in 1972 from a legal challenge to the surveillance program by its civilian targets.

Rehnquist told senators during his confirmation hearings that he stayed on the case — casting a crucial vote in the 5-4 decision against the protesters — because he had little knowledge beforehand of the facts in dispute.

The draft memo was among internal Justice Department documents written by Rehnquist, and given the Judiciary Committee by Rehnquist's Democratic sponsors. By coincidence, Democratic Judiciary Committee staffers learned that the memo had been disclosed in 1974 Senate testimony by Robert Jordan, former general counsel of the Army.

Jordan had testified, "I find in the files a March 25, 1969 memorandum from Bill Rehnquist, assistant attorney general (Office of Legal Counsel) to the attorney general and the deputy attorney general."

"This represents the first formal Justice draft of the civil disturbance plan intended for the president's approval."

Mathias asked Rehnquist, "What was your personal role in the preparation of this document?"

Rehnquist answered, "I have no recollection of my personal role in the preparation of this document. From the text of the transmittal memorandum I assume that the plan was primarily drafted by staff members in my office and in the Office of the General Counsel of the Army, and reviewed by me."

Jordan, however, cast doubt during his 1974 testimony on any notion the Army helped prepare the memo.

Referring to the same document, Jordan told senators, "In early 1969, the Department of Defense made a strong effort to disengage military intelligence organizations from the collection of information dealing with civil disturbance matters."

"This effort occurred in the context of preparing a document known as the 'interdepartmental Action Plan for Civil Disturbances' — although which was the title of Rehnquist's draft memo."

According to a Senate Judiciary Committee report of 1976, use of the Army in the surveillance program at a time of large anti-Vietnam War protests was approved over the military's objections by the Nixon administration.

Although the language from Rehnquist's draft was changed to remove specific reference to the Army.

The plan was rescinded in June 1970, a year after its authorization, after public exposure and congressional criticism.

"I have no recollection of how the (surveillance) language appeared in the draft," Rehnquist told Mathias.

Mathias then asked about Laird vs. Tatum, the controversial case in which Rehnquist refused to bow out.

The 5-4 decision held that civilians who were targets of the military surveillance could not take the government to court.

Had Rehnquist not participated and the vote ended in a tie, the court would have upheld an appellate court decision that the case should be tried on its merits.

"At the time that you considered the motion to recuse yourself ... what consideration, if any did you give to your participation in the preparation of the document, and in discussions leading up to it, or in development of policy on domestic use of military intelligence?"

Mathias asked.

Although his knowledge of the surveillance program was a major issue in whether he should vote in the Tatum case, Rehnquist's answer indicated the memo never entered his decision-making.

Rehnquist told Mathias that his memo explaining his refusal to remove himself "describes my reasoning at that time regarding all considerations that in my judgment bear on the issue of recusal." The memo never mentioned the 1969 draft memo.

When Mathias asked Rehnquist about his knowledge of, and par-

ticipation in formulation of policy on military surveillance of civilians, the justice replied:

"I have no recollection of any participation in the formulation of policy on use of the military to conduct surveillance or collect intelligence concerning domestic civilian activities."

"I do not think I had any first-hand knowledge as to the use of the military to conduct such surveillance or collect intelligence, though I may have been briefed with such information, as was necessary to enable me to testify (on behalf of the Justice Department) before congressional committees or publicly discuss legal questions."

U.S. calls on Iran to join in negotiating peace with Iraq

WASHINGTON (AP) — The United States on Thursday voiced new concern over Iran's threats of an offensive in its war with Iraq and urged Iran to negotiate peace in the six-year conflict in Southwest Asia.

Unfortunately, Iran has chosen to ignore the many international calls for a negotiated resolution to the fighting, State Department deputy spokesman Charles Redman told reporters. "Once again we call on the Iranians to join the Iraqis in

working toward a negotiated settlement of the war."

Redman recalled earlier U.S. statements of concern about possible expansion of the fighting. He added that "recent developments, in-

cluding the growing number of shipping incidents and Iran's threats to launch a massive new offensive, reinforce our concerns."

"This conflict need not continue," Redman asserted.

Book has all details on the government

WASHINGTON (AP) — While the specter of Big Government gets lots of attention in election season, it isn't always easy to appreciate the full measure of the federal government's size.

For those who want to try, though, the latest edition of the official guidebook to government is at hand.

It's the 1986-87 edition of The United States Government Manual, a 947-page tome that is one of the best sellers, according to Denise Normandin of the National Archives and Records Service, which compiles the book.

Sales of last year's volume totaled 28,530 copies as of the end of July, she said, and more than 30,000 copies were sold this year before.

The new edition sells for \$19 a copy in paperback and can be purchased at government bookstores or by

writing to the Superintendent of Documents, U.S. Government Printing Office, Washington, D.C. 20540.

The manual opens with copies of the Declaration of Independence and Constitution, followed by a listing of virtually every agency of government — telling what it does, or at least what it is supposed to do.

Not only does the volume detail the activities of the legislative, executive and judicial branches of government, but it looks at independent agencies, boards, committees and commissions as well as quasi-official agencies and international organizations.

For the history and trivia but there is even a section on "abolished and transferred" agencies.

The volume ends with a section of organizational charts and maps of the standard federal regions.

Couple flees notoriety

TUSTIN, Calif. (AP) — A couple accused of drug abuse by their 13-year-old daughter have been forced to leave their home and jobs because of the notoriety stemming from the case, their lawyer said Thursday.

"The most important thing for them now is to get their daughter back," attorney Gary Proctor said of Bobby and Judith Young.

The Youngs' only daughter, Deanna, walked into the police station here Aug. 13 with a plastic bag full of drugs and drug paraphernalia.

Deanna told officers she had gathered the items from the family's home on a quiet cul-de-sac in a middle-class Orange County community.

Young, 49, a bartender, and Mrs. Young, 37, a court clerk, have been released on their own recognizance and could end up in a rehabilitation program for first offenders if convicted.

Meanwhile, Proctor said, they want to get Deanna out of a children's shelter where she was taken after their arrest. And they want the reporters, television crews and Hollywood types to stop stalking out their home and calling their bosses.

Proctor said his office had taken more than 100 calls from Hollywood. Susan O'Brien, the lawyer appointed to represent the daughter, said she has had about 25 calls.

Dialysis cutback under fire

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., on Thursday criticized the Reagan administration for reducing Medicare reimbursement rates for kidney dialysis treatments, saying it is out of step with a crucial program.

Dingell chairs the House Energy and Commerce Committee, which oversees the Health Care Financing Administration that announced the reduction last week.

In a statement, Dingell said the reduction "slammed the budgetary door in the faces of the more than 90 percent of all outpatient maintenance dialysis patients who are Medicare beneficiaries."

The administration said the reductions will save \$60 million next year, and better reflect the true cost of treatment without compromising the quality of care offered.

Minister says Tutu statements treason

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Bishop Desmond Tutu returned from a trip abroad Thursday during which he called for economic sanctions against South Africa that a government minister said bordered on high treason.

Just after Tutu's plane landed, the same minister told an industrial group that the government has been stockpiling strategic goods for 10 years in case of sanctions.

"The government is not unaware of what our enemies are planning," Manpower Minister Pietle du Plessis said. "We shall not be found wanting."

Last week, du Plessis issued what he called a "friendly warning" to Bishop Tutu, the black

cleric who won the 1984 Nobel Peace Prize for his work against apartheid. He said Tutu's calls for sanctions "are not just economic sabotage but border on high treason."

The leader of South Africa's largest far-right political party said Thursday that Tutu "should be dealt with immediately." A pro-government newspaper called the bishop "a religious pop star."

After leaving the plane that brought him home from the trip to Japan, China and Jamaica, Tutu responded by saying to reporters: "They are always on that particular ploy of theirs. But what have I said abroad which I haven't said

here?"

He confirmed that he had asked the government to expedite visa applications for guests invited to his Sept. 7 installation as archbishop of Cape Town, which will make him the Anglican primate of southern Africa.

"If they don't let them come, they know the adverse publicity they're going to get," Tutu said.

The bishop's reaction to criticism of his invitations to American anti-apartheid politicians, entertainers and pop stars was "That's stupid."

"These are my friends," he said, adding that no one could tell him who to invite.

Warning for Curran

VATICAN CITY (AP) — The Rev. Charles E. Curran, the U.S. theologian censured for his liberal views on sexual issues, could face further punishment if he continues to defy the church, a Vatican spokesman said Thursday.

Another Vatican official said further "housecleaning" might be ordered when two Vatican-appointed panels complete a review of Roman Catholic clergy and religious institutions in the United States.

Curran, who has been stripped of his right to teach Roman Catholic theology, could also lose the right to perform his duties as a priest, Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro said.

"The best thing for him to do now is to reflect and, hopefully, change his mind," Navarro told The Associated Press in an interview.

In making the announcement on Tuesday, the Vatican said the censure was personally approved by Pope John Paul II.

Curran, who has taught moral theology for 20 years at the Catholic University in Washington, told a news conference Wednesday that he would not change his positions and would fight to remain a professor.

American suspected of slaying

NAIROBI, Kenya (AP) — An official Rwandan government publication said Thursday an American wildlife researcher was a prime suspect in the murder of naturalist Dian Fossey.

Fossey, 53, a gorilla expert from California, was found hacked to death, her face mangled by machete slashes, last Dec. 27 in her remote research camp in the mountains of the central African nation of Rwanda.

Actualites Nationales, a daily newsletter published in French by Rwanda's Information Ministry, said Wayne Richard McGuire, Fossey's research assistant at the time of her death, "is suspected of being implicated in the murder."

The publication added that four Rwandans, whom it did not name, also were suspects in the 7-month-old murder mystery.

McGuire, 34, is a doctoral candidate in anthropology at the University of Oklahoma at Norman, where he listed his hometown as Hazlett, N.J. Efforts to reach him in Oklahoma, Hazlett, and through his mother believed living in Hoboken, N.J., were unsuccessful on Thursday.

McGuire was the only foreigner at Karisoke Research Center, founded by Ms. Fossey 18 years ago, when her cook found her body beside the bed in her two-room cabin.

Karl Hoffman, consular officer at the U.S. Embassy in the Rwandan capital, Kigali, said he expected a response Friday from the Rwandan government to an embassy request for confirmation of the newsletter's report. The newsletter also said the government had issued an international warrant for McGuire's arrest.

Efforts by The Associated Press to telephone Rwanda's Justice Ministry were not successful. Telephone operators said the ministry's telephones were out of order.

Actualites Nationales said McGuire left Rwanda on July 27. Hoffman said the embassy believed he was on leave and was going to return to the country.

Opposition's ouster drive losing steam

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Opposition parties struggled Thursday to keep their drive to oust President Gen. Mohammad zia ul-Haq alive, but people stayed away from protest rallies.

The government said the opposition's effort had failed.

Scattered clashes between police and protesters continued in some parts of the country. The largest protest was reported in Lahore, an eastern city of about 3 million, where about 10,000 people rallied. No incidents were reported during the rally, the fourth in four days.

Political violence has claimed at least 27 lives since Aug. 14, Pakistan's independence day. The government launched its crackdown a day earlier when it arrested more than 500 opposition leaders and activists, including Benazir Bhutto.

The Movement for the Restoration of Democracy, an alliance of opposition parties, vowed to continue the drive to oust Zia and force elections in this Moslem country. It said protests would continue until those goals were achieved.

But the government said the country has returned to normal.

Korea puts police force on full alert

SEOUL, South Korea (AP) — The 100,000-member national police force was put on special alert for 60 days beginning Thursday to guard against any terrorism and sabotage attempts by North Korea, a police announcement said.

The alert, part of security preparations for the Asian Games in Seoul, will end Oct. 18, according to the announcement. The games are from Sept. 20 to Oct. 5.

Orders from Police Director Kang Min-chang called for crackdowns on criminal suspects and vigilance against possible attempts by North Korean saboteurs to mar the Asian Games, the announcement said.

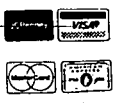

Commission reviews youth detention center

JEROME — Members of the Region V Council of the Idaho Youth Commission toured the now-complete Southern Idaho Youth Detention Center at Jerome Thursday and questioned the owner and administrator for nearly three hours in preparation for a recommendation from the Youth Commission on the new facility.

Administrator Hank Bekker said the center is not federally funded and there are no state licensing requirements for its operation. However, he and the facility's owner, Cloyce Edwards, asked the regional group to review it and make a recommendation to the governor's Youth Commission.

"We are not required to have a license, and approval or lack of it by this group

would not affect our ability to operate the center," Bekker said. "We asked the regional group to set up a committee to review our facility for our own benefit."

At a noon luncheon meeting Thursday, members of the committee questioned Bekker and Edwards about the lack of a written policy and facility rules, saying they would like copies of such documents before reaching a decision regarding endorsement of the facility.

Such an endorsement would mean youngsters under the jurisdiction of the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare could be accommodated at the center. Bekker said this could be a big step toward full utilization of the facility. The requested procedure manuals are in the making, but have not yet been printed, he said.

With a capacity for 36 boys and girls, Bek-

ker said, the center will serve all of Magic Valley and other areas of Southern Idaho as needed.

He said the cost to counties utilizing it is \$40 per day per youth, with free transportation to and from the center. He said the judges who may sentence the youths will determine what restrictions will be placed on each, but generally the center serves as a short-term facility. It will house youngsters arrested and waiting for court appearances or those sentenced to detention by the courts, usually for no more than 30-90 days.

Bekker made a trip to St. Anthony Wednesday to inspect a new addition to the state detention facility there and said the two buildings are nearly identical. He said the local delegation was told that the cost of housing a juvenile in St. Anthony is just over \$38 per day. All Magic Valley county com-

missioners have been asked to utilize the Jerome center, as it will fully meet youth detention standards.

A state law adopted a year ago prohibits housing juveniles in county jails within eight miles of sound of adult prisoners. Bekker said this leaves most jails in the state inadequate in meeting juvenile detention standards.

He said his facility is now complete and city services will accept residents at any time. Several members of the regional committee questioned the preparedness of the facility, the absence of written policy and procedure manuals, Edwards pointed out the center will follow closely the standards of the Association's standards for juvenile detention facilities. He said this document is being adopted with some alteration to make it fit the Jerome center's needs. The documents are in the computer, he said, and need

only to be printed.

Anne McNevin of Twin Falls, who heads the Region V committee, conducted the questioning session that covered 38 specific areas of the operation, from security and administration to telephone calls and mail for the inmates.

Bekker and Edwards explained that security will be continued through Tom Majors' security firm in Twin Falls.

"We will pay on a contract basis for the services," and this will save us our full-time employee," Bekker said. "The security firm will handle the insurance, payroll and federal five-day conference in Washington."

Edwards, a graduate of the Federal Bureau of Investigation Academy in juvenile law enforcement and a former police officer, said the ambulance business owner, said all see.

Conference votes to end ag subsidies

WASHINGTON — The nation's farm policy didn't rank among the top 10 issues at the White House Conference on Small Business.

But pushed by delegations from Idaho and other Western states, a phase-out of agricultural price supports did make the conference's list of priorities for the first time, Presidential delegate Tom W. Silvers of Twin Falls says.

In its final voting, the conference of 1,823 delegates supported a farm government timetable for ending farm subsidies and a return to "market orientation." At the same time, it urged the federal government to lower the international trade rules "to ensure that other importing and exporting nations adhere to policies that promote free and fair trade in agricultural commodities."

Speaking by phone Thursday, Silvers said a phase-out of supports and government production controls is gaining support nationally. "Most of the farmers are coming around to that right now," he said.

The statement on government farm policy placed 40th among the conference's 60 priorities. Delegations from Idaho, Utah, Colorado and Nevada pushed the proposal to the floor of the meeting.

Silvers said it was thought the recommendation marked the first time the small business conference had backed an agricultural issue. The delegates considered 371 recommendations.

Silvers, chairman of the board of TitleFact Inc. of Twin Falls and outgoing speaker of the Idaho House of Representatives, was named by President Ronald Reagan to the national conference in Washington, D.C. Idaho's small businesses sent 10 delegates, and each of the state's congressional representatives appointed one member.

Silvers, who has fought expansion of government in the Idaho Legislature, extended his battle to the national conference this week. During floor debate, he was the lone delegate to take the microphone in opposition to a cabinet-level department of international trade. That proposal became the conference's fifth-highest priority.

However, two other Silvers' proposals appeared on the conference's list. One would loosen the Foreign Corrupt Practices Act by legalizing "finders fees" and some other types of payments in international trade. Federal law now considers them bribes.

The second recommendation calls for a small business export incentive program to help small businesses gain more exporting information. The recommendations were ranked 30 and 35 respectively.

The conference's 60 recommendations will go to the president and Congress. They also may spark ideas for Idaho legislators. Silvers said the Idaho delegation plans to call a meeting of small business leaders from the state to present the recommendations. Silvers also said he plans to brief legislative leaders.

Richardson reports PAC contributions

TWIN FALLS — The Exxon and Amoco political-action committees among the contributors to 2nd Congressional District congressional candidate Mel Richardson's campaign, according to the Federal Election Commission.

Richardson said during a fund-raiser in Twin Falls Monday that he wants to raise \$300,000 in his campaign against incumbent Democrat Richard Stallings. He said he has raised about \$100,000 so far.

Richardson said that despite recent criticism of PACs, he doesn't have any problem with them, so long as their political philosophies match his.

According to election commission

records through June 30, the Idaho Falls Republican received \$23,088 in party contributions and \$15,179 from PACs, including \$1,000 from Exxon and \$500 from Amoco.

Other contributions include \$5,600 from Citizens for the Republic, a Reagan-oriented organization, \$2,900 from the Fund for America's Future, and \$1,000 from the Free Society Foundation.

Richardson said a benchmark poll showed him 5 percentage points behind Stallings coming out of the primary. He said he was encouraged by the response and called the race exciting because "We haven't turned loose the homes whose occupants Richardson said he was referring to research being conducted on Stallings' votes."

Fake disaster tests city's responses

TWIN FALLS — At approximately 11:40 a.m. Thursday, the fire station on the corner of Washington Street South and Orchard exploded into flames, with 24 young children trapped inside.

This scenario was set for Twin Falls firefighters, police and ambulance personnel to test their response skills in an actual disaster. The flames were only imagined and the 24 children were local Cub Scouts and their sisters, posing as burn victims.

The mock disaster is an annual event required by state law to test the time, efficiency and quality of rescue services in a disaster. This year, three fire engines, four police cars and four ambulances took care of the emergency in about an hour, with only two imagined casualties.

The fire victims were taken to the Magic Valley Regional Medical Center and The Twin Falls Clinic and Hospital. In the past, only the clinic participated in the event.

MVRMC usually does its practice drill in connection with the Skyview-Hazeldel Nursing Homes, said program coordinator Jeanie

Smith. They joined the clinic's drill this year because the disaster was more realistic, she said.

This year's disaster was less elaborate than in past years, said fireman Jeff Hafer, the battalion chief on duty Thursday. In previous mock fires the children were made up with fake blood to appear injured.

This year, the children wore signs around their necks containing printed information about their injuries and vital signs. Most of the children were diagnosed by paramedics as having serious burns or abdominal trouble.

The idea of making the injuries realistic with make-up and fake blood was discarded this year, Smith said, because the wounds were too smudged when the children arrived at the hospital.

"By the time they arrived at the clinic, the doctors were unable to tell definite wounds," she said.

In medical terminology, injuries are coded on a color system, based on their severity. A "Code Red" is a serious injury that demands immediate attention. "Code Yellow" is less serious, while "Code Green" would indicate a fairly minor injury.

Most of the 22 children who were taken for

treatment were designated "Code Red," Smith said.

The victims were taken from the scene of the disaster to the two hospitals and examined, if necessary.

Organizers of the drill went by actual burn victims they had seen in the past to decide what injuries the children would have, Smith said.

"From our standpoint, the drill went very well," Hafer said Thursday. In an actual emergency in that area, the third fire engine probably would have been left in the city, he added.

The emergency services agencies that participated in Thursday's drill will gather for a critique of their performance sometime next week, Smith said. They will discuss how the disaster was handled and possible future changes in procedure.

One aspect of the disaster that Smith said should be changed was the length of time between when the Fire Department was notified and when the ambulances were notified. The ambulances arrived at the scene 10 minutes after the fire trucks, which Smith felt was too long.

No purchase offers on city water shares

TWIN FALLS — The Twin Falls City Council has come up empty-handed in a fishing expedition to establish the value of its water shares and possibly sell them.

At a Thursday bid opening, no offers were received to purchase the water. And only one person, current leaseholder Ed Uhlig, submitted an offer to lease any of the shares for the next irrigation season.

Uhlig, of the C&B Cattle Co., Hansen, now leases about 1,700 shares, but made an offer for only 500 shares next season. He proposed paying \$24 a share plus Twin Falls Canal Co. assessments, a net of \$8 more than the city now receives per share.

The council decided in June that it would not consider lease offers of water, but want more to grow. Less than \$24 a share with the \$13

assessment per share paid by the lessee. Now the city receives \$30 a share, from which it must pay canal company charges.

The council set its minimum purchase price per share at \$400.

"I think the price was higher than the economy dictated," said Twin Falls Canal Co. Manager Jack Eskin Thursday. "At this time I think it would be pretty hard to purchase."

The city is also limited in who can buy the water, he said. The shares can only be sold in the Twin Falls tract and must remain upstream of Buhl because water is running to the causality of canal now, he said.

The canal company does not allow the water to go to out-of-state investors who buy to speculate, he said. That left as potential customers for the city mostly people within the tract who already have water, but want more to grow. See WATER on Page B2

PUC orders Atlanta Power Co. to upgrade faulty safety system

ATLANTA — Atlanta Power Co. has been ordered by utility regulators to hire an electrical engineering firm to study its system's safety.

The small utility, which has served the Elmore County mountain community of Atlanta since last October, also was told by the Idaho Public Utilities Commission it must comply with the National Electric Safety Code.

The order, issued Friday, came after an IPUC engineer said he found numerous safety problems while inspecting Atlanta Power's system.

In a report to the commission, the engineer said sagging lines throughout the distribution system, rotting poles, possible haphazard electrical connections and service drops with ragged insulation all pose safety threats to the public.

Among other hazards he noted was the lack of a locked gate at the top

of a steep stairway leading to Atlanta Power's Boise River power plant. In addition, the channel feeding the company's penstocks — intake tubes where water flows into the hydroelectric plant — had become clogged with IPUC engineer said.

Commissioners said in their order they did not expect when granting Atlanta Power authority to operate as a utility last year that it would be "a showcase electric utility." They did expect, however, that its personnel and distribution system would comply with the National Electric Safety Code.

"Anything less will not be permitted," the order said.

Atlanta Power was ordered to hire an engineering firm to review its transmission and distribution system. The commission said the firm should make specific safety recommendations no later than Oct. 15.

Commissioners also ordered changes in Atlanta Power's fees to connect and reconnect customers.

The community has numerous unconnected homes whose occupants disconnected for the winter, but the company said it had to continue paying fixed operating and plant costs during those months. The fees will allow Atlanta Power to recover those costs.

The commission said customers who disconnect service voluntarily but want to reconnect at a later date must pay \$30 for each month of disconnection, up to a maximum of \$210.

New customers or those disconnected involuntarily must pay a \$60 reconnection charge.

The commission also ordered Atlanta Power to develop a line extension policy as soon as possible.

Atlanta Power has approximately 50 customers.

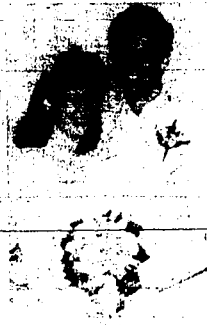

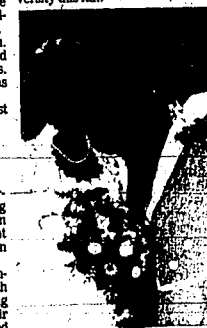

Older women opting for younger men

Older women are finding a simple solution to their manpower shortage — younger men. Women over 50 outnumber men their own age, according to an article in the August issue of Harper's Bazaar. But some very famous older women have opted for men 5, 10 or even 20 years their junior. A decade ago it was news when Dinah Shore had a four-year romance with Earl Reynolds, 18 years younger. Now, the famous women who have pulled a role reversal on the old May-December combination include Mary Tyler Moore, Joan Collins, Audrey Hepburn, Grace Slick, Goldie Hawn, Ruggie Welch, Ursula Andress, Miriam Makeba, Juliet Mills and Estelle Parsons. The statistical reasons are there. For women over 30 there are not enough men of suitable age — two or three years older — to go around. In addition, most men over 30 are already married, gay or pursuing younger women. Add to that the fact that women who marry meet their own age are likely to outlive their husbands and you have the case for younger men. What was once taboo — when poet Elizabeth Barrett, at age 40, ran off to Italy with 30-year-old Robert Browning — is today's trend, when two California psychologists set out to write a book on the age taboo, they easily found far more older woman-younger man couples than they could interview. The stereotype of these couples is that of a calculating older woman who wants to control and dominate a younger man searching for Mommy, dragging his unresolved oedipal dilemmas behind him like a tattered teddy bear. Not true in most cases, said Joyce Sunlla, author of "The New Lovers: Younger Men-Older Women." She said usually the man has real appreciation of a sophisticated, challenging

woman. For the woman, it may be the first time she has been treated as an equal. These relationships often are much more than a sexual fling. Raymond Chandler was married to a woman 18 years his senior for 30 years; Agatha Christie to a man 12 years her junior for 45 years. The "wealthy and accomplished" widow Khadija was married for 25 years to a man 15 years younger — the prophet Muhammad. Women in these involvements may be escaping from traditional marriage to a dominating man of appropriate age whose ego needed coddling by the self-effacement of a doing wife. As for younger men, some psychologists say they are rebelling against machismo and their parents' male-dominated marriage. Others say many of them are sons of "wimps." Psychologist Thomas Greening, of Westwood, Calif., speculates they are looking for Dad, not Mommy, and turn to older women for the stability and guidance they failed to get from their fathers.

Some teens not ready to baby sit, says expert

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — Baby-sitting is a job monopolized by teen-agers in search of a little spending money, but a psychologist warns that many adolescents are emotionally unprepared for the task. While day care centers, family members and friends have received the most attention as potential child abusers, he says, little has been said about the most common — and least trained — of all child-minders. Adolescence can be one of life's most vulnerable, confusing periods — a time of emotional uncertainty and sexual experimentation while making the transition from childhood to adulthood, says Dr. Ronald F.C. Kourany, a child and adolescent psychologist at Vanderbilt University Medical Center.

Kourany, who has researched teenage baby-sitting for the past decade, says the unprepared adolescent with emotional limitations can easily be provoked into panic or rage while caring for children, particularly for those who present management or behavioral problems. "I don't want to be an alarmist," said Kourany, who points out that baby-sitting teaches teen-agers responsibility and child-care skills. "But there is the potential for emotional or behavioral problems. Just name it, and you'll find it." More than 1 million U.S. teen-agers baby-sit, said Kourany. His surveys show that 90 percent or more of all high school students have baby-sat on one or more occasions.

Handicapped student asks for understanding

DEAR ABBY: I am a 21-year-old deaf student at the Rochester Institute of Technology. I was born with German measles, which left me deaf, blind in one eye and 50 percent brain damaged, but I feel fortunate to be alive. All my life I have tried to get people to be a little more patient with handicapped people because I have been discriminated against because of my disabilities, and I hate discrimination. I wrote a piece for my 12th grade high school public-speaking class presentation. It was "The Handicapped Plea." Many people who have visited the National Technical Institute for the Deaf, and I typed up my "plea," framed it and gave it to a few special people I thought deserved it. They are Annie Glenn, Peter Jennings and Jeff Poad. Tim Sly, who never treated me any different. I am sending you a copy, hoping you will print it and wake up some people to realize that handicapped people are normal. Thank you for your time and good luck with your readers, and here it is: — HARRISON F. PARSONS, JR., ROCHESTER, N.Y. DEAR HARRISON: I think your "plea" should be shared with my readers, and here it is: THE HANDICAP PLEA We the handicapped may look strange. But look around carefully, we all have the same needs. As nature goes, we all have the same form of body. But some part of our body may be missing or deformed.

Some parts of us may not function the same way as yours do. We may lose it at birth, or get hurt in an accident or have disease. But we are able to be alive and are willing to sacrifice for that. Normal people can become handicapped from old age, accident, war or disease. If you look around carefully, you will understand that people who are handicapped are just like people who are not. We are still people, who want the chance to walk the golden road to success. We don't ask you to give us success, just the chance to succeed without put-downs or ridicule. You can give us the courage to succeed. You look at nature as a thing of beauty, yet no two snowflakes are alike. We would be honored to be treated the same, because we know your needs are the same as ours. The needs we all have are physical (natural), emotional and spiritual. So after all is said and done, please give us the chance and encouragement to prove to all that people who are handicapped are normal people! DEAR ABBY: In a recent column

concerning nursing homes, you said it was not necessary to tolerate whatever wasn't locked up. They're thievery. Obviously you have never had much experience with nursing homes. I have. When a relative of mine was admitted to a very fine nursing home, he was advised to keep nothing of value in his room. Also, he was told that all medication, hair oil, shaving cream, hand lotion, etc. were to be left at the nurses station, and when he wanted to use any of these items, he should ask for them. Some senile patients who were ambulatory would walk into the rooms of fellow residents and pick-up what ever wasn't locked up. They'd drink after-shave, hair oil, etc., and take medication without realizing that they are doing anything wrong. There is not enough personnel to watch each patient 24 hours a day to see that they don't get into trouble. It takes a lot of patience to work in a nursing home. Salt Lake player fires 2-under 70, leads by one

JACKPOT — Jeff Green of Salt Lake City proved the steadiest of the field — for no apparent reason — is within a couple of good holes of the Cactus Pele's \$50,000 Open championship.

Green, who carded a two-under par 70 to open the final two-day phase of the four-day tournament, will carry a one-stroke lead over last year's runner-up Lynn Langston, Utah, and professionals Rocky Hunter, Twin Falls, and Tracy Frank, Burley, into today's finals. Senior Marlow Quick, Salt Lake City, and professionals Roy Christensen and Ted Holloway, Caldwell, were at even par 72.

Meanwhile, Burley amateur Glenn Blakeley, who hasn't played in the event over the past couple of years, moved into the championship flight lead with a 73, one ahead of Jackpot's Byron Mason who had a career round of 74.

The four-day tournament will hit its conclusion today. While Green's 70 was a good round, it became more so by the fact that competitors seemed to fall away. For instance, Twin Falls assistant Mike Hamblin found himself three under after chipping in on the 13th hole but then inexplicably hit his second shot out over bounds and wound up with a triple-bogey eight on the 15th. From there it was downhill to a day-ending 75.

Defending champion Kim Thompson, Salt Lake City, never found his rhythm but still stayed in contention with a 73.

Thompson, who won the Treasure Valley Open by 10 strokes 10 days ago, noted with a green "I was better than most of the golfers in the tournament then. But as of today I wasn't better than anyone. In fact, I was the pits."

Frank's bid for the lead was stymied with a double bogey on the 13th while Hunter missed a number of putts that kept him away from the lead.

"That putting was going to be the difference was announced by former professional Jim Packard, Twin Falls, who tied off in the first group Thursday morning and announced at the end "I think that par is going to be a good score today because of the pin placements. To problems of BYU Cougars

PROVO, Utah — It was 1985. Brigham Young was coming off a national championship season and quarterback Steve Lindsley said, the players were complacent. The Cougars suffered an early loss to UCLA, struggled against Temple and lost an embarrassing Western Athletic conference game to lowly Texas-El Paso. "My guess is, after the national championship year, there was so much of a lull, it got to the point where the people felt they were going to a 9-to-5 job," said Lindsley, who is one of the most visible positions in college football. "This year, we've got something to prove again," he said. "We'll be a lot more hungry — just ready to show people that we're for real."

By most standards, BYU had an excellent year in 1985. The Cougars finished 11-3, tied for their 10th consecutive WAC title, and made a Citrus Bowl appearance against Ohio State, a game they lost 10-7.

But fans in Provo have come to expect that much — and more. In addition to the 1984 national championship, the team is 129-41 since Coach LaVell Edwards took over in 1972, making him the fifth winningest coach in college football.

Under Edwards, BYU's passing attack has developed into one of the most sophisticated anywhere. It requires that the quarterback, receivers and even linemen read defensive coverages and adapt, often in mid-play.

Novel in bloom for budding romance writer

Twin Falls author enjoying the flush of first publication

TWIN FALLS — Seven years of perseverance have paid off for local author Myrna Temte. Her first published romance novel, "Rebel Heart," written under her pen name Molly Thomas, has just been released in the Second Chance Love series published by Berkley Publishing Group.

To celebrate the event, B. Dalton Booksellers will hold an autograph party tomorrow from 1 to 4 p.m. at their Blue Lakes Mall store. Magic Valley romance fans will be able to meet the author, who will sign copies of her book.

Slow and steady has won the race for Temte. She estimated that she has revised this manuscript so much that she has typed it at least fifty times. Temte described her birth as an author in a recent interview.

"I think basically it came about because of my personal family situation. We had moved to a little town in eastern Montana that had about 300 people. I had one child. I was used to working as a social studies teacher but in this little town there were no job openings as far as teaching went. I just plain needed something to do.

"I enjoyed the romances. I had never read them before and I just sort of picked one up by accident. What intrigued me was the feeling. Maybe I could do it. I look about eight months for it to decide. OK, I'm going to try it."

She wrote her first manuscript and submitted it to two publishers. She rejected it. "I was absolutely in the dark," Temte recalls. "I didn't even know that publishers had guidelines. Harlequin rejected it with no explanation but Silhouette sent a two-page letter. They were very encouraging. They said if the heroine was too young. But it was that enough encouragement to keep me going."

Would she have quit at that point

without that inspiring "rejection?"

"No. By then the bug had bitten and I was hooked," she said. "I just had a ball. I have never worked harder or enjoyed anything any more than I have with writing. These people that I create become dear friends to me."

That first book was never published but Temte considers "Rebel Heart" a learning experience. It was in 1982, then living in Minnesota, that she began work on "Rebel Heart." She explained that her inspiration came from feelings she had about the West.

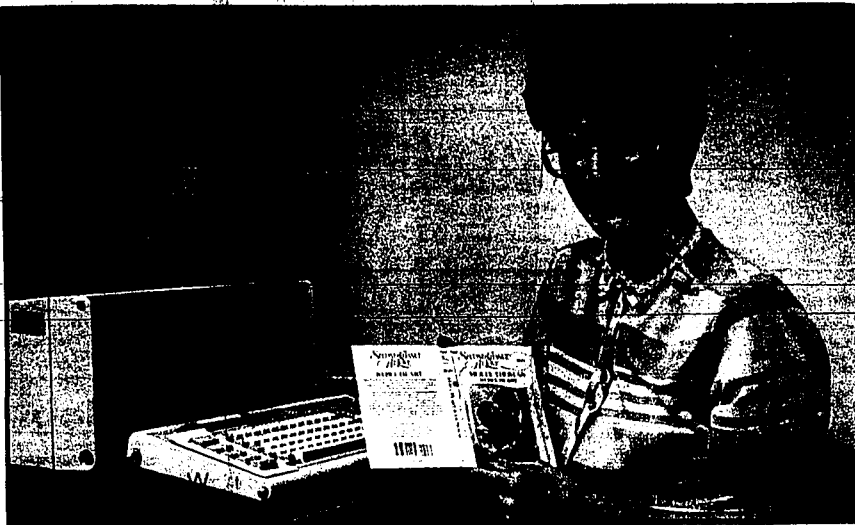
"I grew up in Montana and a lot of the romances that I had read, especially ones with cowboys in them or that were Western, didn't really strike me as being all that authentic."

While she was living in St. Paul, Minn., she learned about Romance Writers of America, an organization that helps writers get started in the genre and keeps established writers abreast of quickly changing requirements of the various publishers. Through this group she met an experienced romance writer who agreed to critique her first chapter.

"We spent 2½ hours on the phone. She went through that sucker paragraph by paragraph. And when she was finished I had to start all over again but I knew what I was doing wrong."

Temte finished work on "Rebel Heart." In the meantime moving twice with her family and her husband and two children, she was able to laugh that off as she made last-minute revisions and she sent the manuscript back to Second Chance on her own. That was in June 1985.

In September 1985 the Temtes moved to Twin Falls, where they now reside. She continued to work on her next novel while waiting for

word from Second Chance on "Rebel Heart."

Temte, surprised to find that there are many romance writers in central Idaho, organized the first Idaho chapter of Romance Writers of America. She says that the support she has gotten from that organization has kept her from giving up and she feels a responsibility to help others as she herself has been helped.

Finally, last Dec. 6, she got a phone call from the publisher telling her that they had accepted her book. After jumping up and down a few times she had the operators track her husband down at work. She

described his reactions.

"He said, 'That's nice dear.' It was no big deal. But the day my advance check came... then he got excited. He took me and the girls out to the Sandpiper and we had a bottle of wine and the whole celebration. Then when a copy of the cover came he got a little more excited and then we got an advance copy of the book and that was the best."

Temte talked about the frustration of juggling the family's needs with her writing. She often felt guilty about paying babysitters when she had no guarantee that what she was doing would pay off. Her husband was supportive to the point of using his vacation time to stay with

the kids while she went to writers conferences.

Their youngest daughter will be in kindergarten this year so she will have five mornings a week to work. "Now it's becoming more of a family project. There's nothing that gets cooperation from your family-like success."

It isn't always easy to hold onto a dream that other people can't see. Temte says, "The hardest part of it is getting people to take you seriously. I can't wait to mail all of these people that have said 'Sure, you're going to publish a book,' a copy — AUTOGRAPHED."

Don Johnson: 'Vice' with voice

MIAMI-BEACH, Fla. — Don Johnson is leaning forward on the couch in his fifth floor office at the luxurious, beach-front Alexander Hotel. He has been talking easily for more than an hour about his restless childhood, failed marriages, drug abuse, alcoholism... enough partying and casual sex to fuel the most hedonistic episode of "Miami Vice."

But that is the past, he says. He is a changed man, he says, trying to use his TV success as a springboard to all the things he has been wanting to do ever since leaving his Missouri farm roots, like make a record album.

The surprise is, Johnson is a credible, mainstream pop-rock singer whose borderline tenor-baritone voice combines some of the appealing, if melancholy romanticism of Jackson Browne with the Everyman anxiousness of Glenn Frey. Johnson has sold pitch and acceptable control.

We are not talking Ray Charles, Elvis Presley or Stevie Wonder here. Johnson needs to do more vocal character, but he is a

legitimate pop entry who would have deserved a record contract even if he were not America's reigning male sex symbol.

At 35, Johnson has an aura of invincibility. His golden brown hair is cut in a summer, spiky style that makes him seem younger than in the old "Vice" episodes.

It is 11 p.m. and Johnson already had spent a dozen hours on the "Vice" set, but there is no sign of fatigue as he sits in his office at the hotel. Johnson is relaxed, talking about tabloid topics like divorces and drugs because he has talked about them before.

"I learned long ago that, if you tell the truth, you can't get into trouble, no matter how outlandish it is," he says. "It's when people think you are lying to them that the trouble begins... and it is the same with the media."

He laughs heartily, something he does frequently. By punctuating the darkest story or most disarming joke with laughter, he seems to suggest that the secret to dealing with pressure and fame is to not take anything too seriously.

Other finalists for single of the year are "Bop" by Dan Seals; "On the Other Hand" by Travis and "Nobody in His Right Mind" by Wynonna Judd.

Remaining finalists for top album are "Nursery" by Strait; "Lost in the Fifties Tonight" by Ronnie Milsap and "Storms of Life" by Travis.

Lobbyist figures arts lose with tax bill

HOLLYWOOD — At the end of last week, when it appeared likely that tax reform would be stuck in congressional conference through the summer, Anne C. Murphy, executive director of the American Arts Alliance and chief lobbyist for the arts in Washington, said with a measure of humor: "I hope it breaks up. I hope it (tax reform) goes down the sewer. They're trading two lollipops for a piece of mayonnaise."

Later, after negotiations between the two chairmen — Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., and Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., were concluded, and the varying House and Senate versions were merged into one bill, Murphy figured that arts

organizations came away losers.

On two key issues, gifts of appreciated property and charitable contributions for non-members, the arts, as institutions, lost. Such donations involve the very largest of donors, and the arts are the poorest of the poor.

"There are habits of giving, heritages of giving that will be absolutely affected by this bill," Murphy said. "What we also seem to be doing is encouraging wealth to remain in the hands of the wealthy."

Others agreed. "The administration has taken the arts," asserted Ernest Fleischmann, executive director of the Los Angeles Philharmonic, "and, on the other hand, it (tax reform) has made it more difficult, provided less incen-

tive for those who might be inclined to contribute."

Gifts of appreciated property — stocks, improved property, paintings or a piece of land — play a key role in the fund-raising efforts of non-profit performing and exhibiting arts institutions, Murphy says. Such items are often the lead gifts, setting the pace for capital and endowment campaigns. The Metropolitan Opera, for example, received a \$200,000 gift of appreciated property last year for the production of "The Barber of Seville."

And Earl A. Powell III, director of the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, explains, gifts of art "form a substantial portion of our (museum) collections." The American museum is created on

Arts commission sets state hearings

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Commission on the Arts will conduct a series of public hearings around the state during August and September to inform the public on what the arts commission is about, what the group does and why they do it.

"Perhaps more importantly, the hearings will give us some time to talk with people about what they feel about the commission's plans and activities," John Chapman, commission chairman, said in a news release.

Chapman said the hearings are intended to solicit comments to aid in the planning and development of programs and services. "Who is still last in the nation in funding for the arts," said Chapman. "Is this where we want to be? Are there enough opportunities for enjoyment of the arts in our communities and schools?"

Chapman said the commission has tried to increase cultural program-

ing for rural towns while still maintaining support for individual artists and the major performing organizations in the state. "We need to know if people feel this direction is right for Idaho."

To keep hearing costs at a minimum, each hearing will be conducted by commissioners residing in the area. Gaetha Pace, acting director of the Idaho Commission on the Arts, will be attending each session.

Hearings have been scheduled in locations throughout the state. The Ketchum area hearing will be hosted by Commissioner Wendy Jaquet at 7 p.m. Sept. 25 in the Old City Hall. The Boise area hearing will be held in the Hall of Mirrors Building at the Capitol Mall Complex Sept. 10 at 7 p.m.

Pace said she would be happy to meet with persons interested in the arts in any of the smaller towns in Idaho if requested. For more information, call Pace at 334-2119.

City cancels rap concert

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) — The city's licensing board has revoked the license for next week's scheduled concert by the rap music group Run-D.M.C. because several of the group's recent performances have been marred by violence.

"The risk is too great," board chairman Raymond Dettore Jr. said Wednesday night.

The move came less than 24 hours after Providence Civic Centers officials said they would increase se-

curity for the Aug. 28 concert, but had no plans to cancel it.

Civic center officials said they would not appeal the revocation, although promoter Frank J. Russo left open the possibility he might challenge the licensing board.

Russo said 4,372 tickets have already been sold. The money will be refunded.

Board members said they believed it was the first time the board has revoked a concert license.

gifts of works of art."

Current law permits full deductibility for gifts of appreciated property. That also had been in the Senate's version. The only deduction limit on such contributions has been up to 30 percent of adjusted gross income.

However, when the full bill was written by Rostenkowski and Packwood, Rostenkowski's House version prevailed. That version said that those who donate gifts of appreciated property become subject to the more stringent requirements of the alternative minimum tax.

Murphy and the alliance believe that including gifts of appreciated property may encourage taxpayers to keep their assets or pass them on their heirs, because they have lost their tax advantage.

However, Murphy cautioned Monday that it was "too early" to pass final judgment on the bill, because there are a lot of changes, all of which have interlocking relationships.

At the same time, she was pleased that performing artists are being allowed, under certain conditions, to take deductions for business expenses. If they itemize, they can deduct in excess of 2 percent of adjusted gross income. If they are non-itemizers, they can deduct if they have two or more employers, if 10 percent of their earnings comes from their profession, and if their total taxable income is \$16,000 or less.

On two other issues, Murphy said the arts fared "a little worse" than current law, but "came out better" than they might have. These issues involve tax-exempt municipal bonds, which could be used for building performing arts institutions, and 403b pension plans for artists and arts organizations.

On the issue of non-itemizers losing their charitable deductions, Murphy worries that tax reform will boost the numbers of non-itemizers. About 70 percent of taxpayers do not itemize, but some economists predict that tax reform could send that figure up to 87 percent.

Powell is concerned about the "potential impact on the important smaller-giver. (This non-deductibility) certainly might dampen the enthusiasm of the \$50 and \$100 giver."

Meanwhile, Fletschmann scoffed at the prediction that having more disposable income, through lowered tax rates, would in turn spur people to give. "That's highly naive," he said.

National Museum of Dance debuts

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N.Y. (AP) — It's a museum dedicated to the cha-cha, the pinouette and the old soft-shoe and it honors the best in dance from Astaire to Pavlova.

The National Museum of Dance opened last month in this haven for summer dance and thoroughbred horse racing.

"It's going to be a living museum," said Marylou Whitney, a founder and a major benefactor of the museum, which has already cost close to \$1-million-for-initial development.

The museum will include all types of dance and will allow visitors and students to see, study and perform.

It is housed in an abandoned white stucco and wood bathhouse, a national historic landmark whose interior was restored to a lavish foyer with darkened galleries.

Three temporary exhibits, including a costume collection created with the help of ballet companies around the country, were included in the museum's premiere.

"Dressing the Ballet: Costumes From America's Most Celebrated Ballet Companies" includes slender beaded bodices, flowing skirts and brilliant leotards as well as a hand-painted silk Shinnai wig prior costume from the San Francisco Ballet.

The exhibits in the opposite wing are a photographic essay of the history and development of modern dance, and an exhibit on the dance notation of contemporary choreographers and artists.

A museum shop has such objects as the autographed be shoes of Patricia McBride of the New York City Ballet; books on the "Jazz" choreographer and ballet master George Balanchine; T-shirts and teddy bears dressed as ballerinas.

Mrs. Whitney and her husband, Cornelius Vanderbilt Whitney, initially contributed \$650,000.

Further development of the museum will require \$2.5 million to \$4 million.

Chinese art on exhibit in Montreal

MONTREAL — This city seems to be vying for the title of art center of the Western Hemisphere with two spectacular, exclusive shows on view into October.

At the Museum of Fine Arts through Oct. 5 is an entrancing tour through Joan Miro's fantasy world of sculptures. The other show, at the Palais de la Civilisation, is "China: Treasures and Splendors," a striking overview of Chinese artistic development from the neolithic period to the Qing Dynasty (1644-1911).

Unlike the Miro exhibit, which focuses on one man's quirky imagination, the Chinese show stars the genius of a people. In what was the Expo 67 French Pavilion on the Ile Notre Dame in the St. Lawrence River, the viewer is led through 7,000 years of Chinese artistry.

While the exhibit in its entirety can be seen only in Montreal, parts will be shown elsewhere in North America after the show closes Oct. 31. Half of the 200 objects lent by more than 20 institutions in China never before had left the country. Chinese Ambassador Yu Zhan calls

it the greatest exhibition of Chinese treasures ever presented outside his homeland.

The scope of the exhibit on the Palais' three levels (one more than Rameses got) is so awesome that the breathers one gets gifting from floor to floor on an escalator are necessary. Adding excitement is the fact that many of the bronze, ceramic, bone, gold, silver and lacquerware objects and paintings are from archaeological excavations within the past 10 years.

The show, which opened May 18, moves chronologically, but each level has a theme. The first level concentrates on instruments of

power. The second looks at beliefs of life after death, while the third deals with work and festivities.

The exhibition peeks into the lives of some fascinating personalities in Chinese history. Some of the graceful bronze tetrapod vases and other receptacles, along with jade objects, came from the tomb of Princess Fu Hao, who probably lived in the 14th century B.C. Either concubine or wife of a king, this shaman-priestess led an army of 13,000 men.

'Touch and Go': Love wins in Chicago

HOLLYWOOD — "Touch and Go" is an instance of lightning striking twice. First, "About Last Night" and now another nifty contemporary love story set in Chicago and dealing with the challenge of commitment. Although "Touch and Go" has been inexplicably sitting on the shelf for more than a year, it represents a real advance for all concerned, especially its star Michael Keaton, who is terrific in his first major dramatic role. (Never fear, he gets some very funny moments.)

"Bobby, don't do it." That is what Keaton, as hockey star Bobby Barato, tells himself as he leans against his Jaguar, parked late at night in front of a picturesque Victorian block in a bad neighborhood. He has just finished a game, fought off a pack of armed teenagers intent on stealing his car, grabbed the little kid acting as the gang's front man and taken him home. Barato has tried to ignore

the kid, Luis (Avery Nuttin), when he insists he is hungry, but now he finds himself taking Luis for a hamburger and a shake.

Bobby, once a street kid himself, is hooked, but he does not know it. Here is Luis, a bright, boy-bull-of-bravado and headed for big trouble for the lack of a father and a poor environment. And here is his mother Denise (Maria Conchita Alonso), beautiful, proud, struggling hard to make ends meet but in real need of help, and of being loved by someone worthy of her.

And here is Bobby, as aware that he cannot go on playing hockey forever as he is evasive about the truth: He gets pretty lonely in his sleek high-tech, high-rise apartment. But what the heck, why should he get involved with anybody when a steady parade of women are still throwing themselves at him?

We know very well that Bobby and Denise, both so attractive and attracted to each other, both so fast on the uptake, are headed for some kind of reckoning.

Director Robert Mandel, whose last was the splashy "F-X," takes an amused pleasure in unweaving how circumstances, abetted by Bobby and Denise's own half-acknowledged half-denied desires, keep them tangled in each other's lives. And long writers Alan Ormsby, Bob Sand and Harry Coleman keep stringing them — and us — along with considerable wit, humor and ingenuity. We are just as surprised to discover how much we have come to care for Bobby and Denise as they have for each other.

The film makers know what they are doing, setting off the serious stuff with some inspired comic sequences. There is a truly hilarious moment in a subplot involving Denise's cousin (Janice Pennington) who is married well but tediously, to a pompous fool (Richard Venture). However, having established Denise's fierce independence, the writers load the dice to wind their story, undercutting that sense of freedom of choice vital to both Bobby and Denise.

All that expressiveness, all that precise timing that Keaton, in rugged shape for the convincing hockey sequences, has displayed ever since his scene-stealing debut in "Night Shift" serve him beautifully in bringing to life the essentially serious Bobby, as a man as swift in his thinking as he is on the ice, but a man who has learned to use his head at the expense of his heart.

The gorgeous Maria Conchita Alonso, so winning as Robin Williams' love in "Moscow on the Hudson," makes Denise just the opposite of Bobby; a woman guided more by emotion than thought, albeit a real woman determined to beat the odds.

Maybe it is because the Windy City has more of an atmosphere of normalcy than exotic Los Angeles or hard-driving New York, but "Touch and Go" (rated R), so apt a title for so skillful a romance, is but another of the various good recent films, starting with "Risky Business," that has found Chicago such a congenial setting.

Kurt Russell is in deep in 'Big Trouble'

Catrail, James Hong and Victor Wong. Directed by John Carpenter. HOWARD THE DUCK (PG). Howard should sue. The irascible cigar-chomping hero of a relatively minor 70s comic book is at the center of this effects-heavy, clumsy "comedy." Produced-directed and written by Gloria Katz and Willard Huyck, in which an other-planed duck finds himself transported to Cleveland, Ohio. Although it has a

PG rating, the film's car crashes and Exorcist-voiced scientist make it far too violent for youngsters and far too boring for older audiences; Howard, with a far less mobile face than Yoda, still looks more like a frog in a duck suit and the whole enterprise is a pretty base canard. Amazing—for a film with George Lucas' imprimatur as executive producer.

THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG). This sequel to 1984's lean, choppy-swoosh hit is another mass-audience action fairy tale — but without the obsession with jujitsu, cheap cynicism and endless kill, cheat of the "Cobras" and "Raw Deals." Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's kid, Daniel, and Pat Morita's implicitly sage martial arts mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there, they stumble into a "Chinese Connection" story line, escalating kung

fu, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected cross-cultural romance and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous; and you can even cheer for the heroes at the end without feeling bored.

RUTHLESS PEOPLE (R). A Disney release that might have sent all seven dwarfs into cardiac arrest, full of sex, violence, nudity, scatological, bottomless corruption and misanthropic, defiantly tasteless humor that leaves almost nothing unscathed. The good news is that the team of Abrahams, Zucker and Zucker ("Airplane!") have directed it with panache and high comic energy, and the cast — Betty Midler as a yowling kidnap victim, Danny DeVito as her demantically uninterested husband and Judge Reinhold and Helen Slater as her hapless kidnapers — acts it up to the hilt and beyond.

"Don't Look Back." Paramount, \$39.95. More than simply the most prominent documentary ever on a pop star, D.A. Pennebaker's look at Bob Dylan's celebrated 1965 solo tour of England also stands as a fascinating examination of a major creative force dealing with fame. Why an original "Hard Day's Night" entertained us by recreating the lightness of the public Beatles experience, Pennebaker slips us into a more private and intriguing scene as he focuses on the tension that grows out of the arrogance of celebrityhood and the struggle for artistic independence and growth. "Jan Stephenson's How-to-Golf." Karl-Lorimar, \$29.95. "Fitness is the key," advises golf instructor Jan Stephenson, lining up her tee shot and executing a seamless drive that any white-knuckled amateur would admire. Stephenson is cool, in 60-90 minutes of non-stop, non-nonsense instruction, she covers the game from club selection to the finishing spot; plus some help on mental attitude. Utilizing split-screen, slow-motion and freeze-frame visuals, the seven color-coded segments offer a handy home guide for checking the fundamentals of this frustrating sport. Bamboo jazz makes meditation swing

TOKYO — For more than 400 years, Zen mendicant priests have played bamboo flutes as they begged on the road. But they didn't start to swing until John Neptune came along.

The California jazz musician is a master of the shakuhachi, a flute carved from the trunk of a bamboo tree. And in the nine years since earning the master's title of Katsun, or Sea Mountain, Neptune has produced nine albums and won a government award for playing an instrument that exemplifies Japan's distinct atonal music and love of slouchy art.

Imported from China with other imperial court instruments in the 7th century, the vertical flute is used in music ranging from ancient to avant-garde. But it is best known as an instrument for meditation, one that emphasizes the stilling of a note from nothingness to fullness and the sound of a breath or of rushing air.

The 34-year-old Neptune has dazzled aficionados by mastering the difficult fingering and breathing of the fluted flute. He then shunned traditions by playing jazz melodies and rhythms.

Under the Tokugawa Shogunate (1600-1868), only priests of the Buddhist Fuke sect were allowed by law to play the flute. Some of the fuke monks, called "komuso" or straw-mat priests, spled for the Shogun-and, according to some accounts, used the shakuhachi as a club when unmasked.

Most monks, however, have used it as a tool for meditation, concentrating intensely and regulating their breathing in what Neptune calls a "way of blowing Zen."

The beggars also played for very earthly reasons: securing a place for the flute in folk culture by tooting such pieces as "One, Two, Three, Pass the Rice Bowl."

The footloose populism of some shakuhachi traditions, however, has not sparked improvisation. Rather, the music of most modern masters differs little from that of their predecessors centuries ago.

Consequently, says Neptune, "most Japanese see the shakuhachi as an instrument of an old geezer, an old Buddhist priest, wheezing away up some temple mountain. They

don't realize what a tremendously exciting and dynamic instrument it is."

Some Japanese critics and flutists acknowledge the potential of the instrument and applaud Neptune's eagerness to break away from strict convention and create a patchwork of new music from disparate cultures.

One shakuhachi master told him that "your destiny is not to go back to America but to stay in Japan and dream crazy techniques and teach them to us," Neptune said in an interview.

Neptune discovered the instrument in a University of Hawaii ethnomusicology course. He started studying the flute under a Buddhist

priest in 1971 and 10 years later won the Japan Education Ministry's "Album of the Year" award for "Bamboo," the first time the prize was given to a jazz musician.

Neptune said the open-poled fingering demanded by the shakuhachi's simple design gives it

classical Japanese five-tone scale, with improvisation accompanied by a piano, bass and percussion.

In "The Circle," his most recent album released last January, Neptune brought together the Indian violin; tabla (small drums played with the hands), the koto (a Japanese stringed instrument)—and instruments used in Western jazz to demonstrate how musical traditions pass full-circle from one culture to another.

Neptune has handled seemingly irreconcilable musical traditions in his attempt to round out the circle between Japanese music and Western jazz.

Rather than emphasize the progression of chords, as in the West, Japanese music builds a sense of tension and resolution by moving from a seemingly static pitch to a familiar tone. The end of a note or the silence immediately following a piece may be the point of highest tension.

"Rather than talk about the 'Zen Experience' I play music, and hope that people can share in the simple quietness and joy of being alive," Neptune said.

The suit was filed in U.S. District Court in Las Vegas this week against Marino, a 22-year-old New Yorker who does three shows a night imitating the 53-year-old Rivers.

Marino's rendition of Rivers has become a popular act on the Las Vegas Strip since "La Cage" opened in September of 1985.

But Rivers, in the lawsuit, claims Marino is using material she has copyrighted, and that the hotel's advertising of the show is

misleading.

The suit also asks that Marino's act be closed, that all its profits be turned over to Rivers and that advertisements depicting Marino dressed as Rivers be stopped.

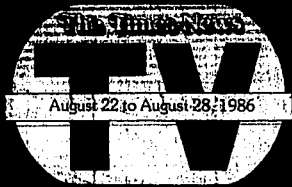
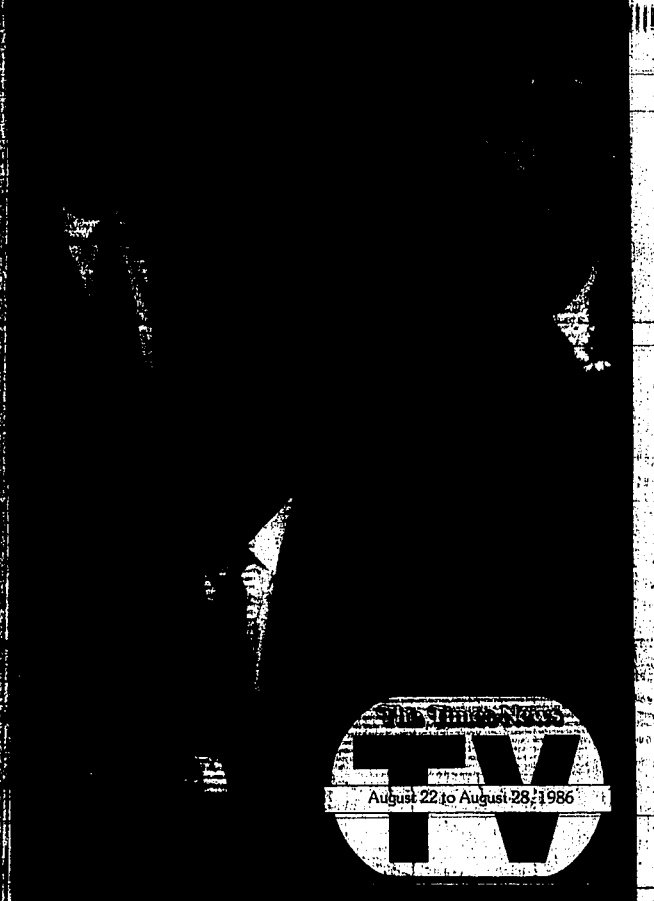

Trips to Rio and royal weddings: It's all in a day's work for 'Today'

By ANDREW J. EDELSTEIN

Buttressed by its endearing combo of Bryant Gumbel and Jane Pauley, plus its successful trips to Rio, Rome and royal weddings, NBC's "Today," the granddaddy of the AM chatfests, has again become the show of choice among early-morning viewers. Its recent ratings success followed a period of decline in which "Today" saw its lead taken by the ABC's happy-talk upstart "Good Morning America."

Part of the show's success may also be attributed to Steve Friedman, the outspoken, inventive executive producer who has helmed "Today" for six years — an eternity in the cut-throat morning-news arena. Under Friedman's guidance, "Today" has become more focused, less frilly, with a blend of hard and soft news that seems right for the increasing numbers of viewers who are watching morning television.

"Today" has turned into a money-maker for NBC — grossing approximately \$70 million a year. But even with its current flush, only a few tenths of a ratings point still separate "Today" from "GMA." (The third-place "CBS Morning News" — or what's left of it — is completely stranded.) The competition is enough to keep Friedman working 14 hours a day.

"TV is like sports and politics, you can't sit on your lead," says Friedman, 39. "If we lose it, it's gonna be because we blew it, not because we let it slip away, like 'Good Morning America' did. But I don't think we'll blow it. We're too smart for that."

Friedman insists "Today" can improve even further. "We can become more active, more analytical, and I

think we can take advantage of technology even more than we've been doing," says Friedman, who developed the concept of taking "Today" on the road several times a season. "We're also talking about doing a show devoted to one single theme."

But can this concept work when the average morning show viewer watches the program for a mere 20 minutes? "It wouldn't work," Friedman concedes, but adds with

characteristic cockiness, "unless we did a good job and ensured that there's something for the audience to watch."

Also in the planning stage is a weekend edition of "Today." The idea was originally conceived in 1981, but Friedman says it has "recently been given a new infusion of enthusiasm by (NBC News president Lawrence) Grossman, and (NBC News vice president Tim) Russert."

Meanwhile, on Sept. 11, "Today" will air its second prime-time special — a look at the past, present and future of TV that will originate from the set of "Back to the Future" at Universal Studios. Included will be a segment on how a script becomes a show as well as Willard Scott's look at the biggest flops in TV history.

MARKING TIME: A legendary comedian has embarked upon a strange phase in his life: He spends most of his day, morning till night, watching TV; frequently having his meals served on a table tray so that he doesn't miss a program. The star is affluent, bright and articulate, yet seems to have disassociated himself from friends and relatives to spend his time in front of the small screen. Though he still enjoys performing on the road, he can hardly wait to get back to his hotel room to — you guessed it — turn on the television.

Q: As longtime fans of "Star Trek," we were interested to learn that Leonard Nimoy has become as cold and unemotional as the Captain Spock character he's played for so long. Can you tell us why? — H.V.

A: It's true that Nimoy has been playing the super-rational, non-human Spock for two decades. It's also true that he'll do so again in the latest installment, "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," due this Christmas. I recently chatted with Nimoy about the \$24 million flick, which he is also directing. Contrary to the image projected by his Spock portrayals, Nimoy is a fast, voluble talker who laughs quite a bit. The reality is refreshingly at odds with the image.

Q: Stephen King has been getting a lot of media attention over his new movie "Maximum Overdrive," which he wrote and directed. How does he feel about that other type of horror movie — you know, the blood-and-gore ones like "Friday the 13th"? — S.J.

A: I hear King isn't too crazy about that type of movie. He confided off camera to a TV talk show host that he finds such plots far too graphic and detailed in their ap-

proach to eradicated the entire cast. Apparently, he feels that such flicks provide a veritable primer for kids in methods of violence towards each other and their elders (and as such, they're of dubious entertainment value).

FLOURISHING FEUD: Adding more fuel to the Joan Rivers-Johnny Carson feud was Joan's alleged attempt to hire away Carson's talent coordinator, Jim McCawley. When Fred de Cordova, Johnny's number one man, heard that, he offered McCawley more than the Rivers money plus an executive title. Rivers was willing to match the money, but could not offer any of the NBC perks — so in this case McCawley really came out a winner.

Q: Is Brooke Shields having fights with her mother? I thought they were supposed to be so close. — E.H.

A: Stories about supposedly souring relations between Brooke and her mother-manager Teri were flying like mad not long ago. It happened after Brooke broke down in tears at a Bob Hope benefit, claiming she was going through tough times personally. However, both Shields remain physically close at least. The two were spotted spooling pasta at a Chicago restaurant not long ago, appearing to be the ideal mom-and-daughter combination.

BALLOONING BUDGETS: Here's a real example of inflation. When Lucille Ball was filming her "I Love Lucy" series during the '50s and early '60s, each segment cost about \$18,000. Well, Lucille, now a spry and vigorous 75, is launching a new TV season with a series called "Life With Lucy" this fall. Price for each segment in 1986? \$780,000.

NBC's 'Human Animal' series scores five of week's top twenty

NEW YORK (AP) — Phil Donahue couldn't beat a Bill Cosby rerun but daytime's favorite talk-show host was a big hit in prime time, putting all five segments of his series "The Human Animal" in the top 20.

The first episode, "Love and Sex," pulled the biggest numbers with a rating of 20.8 and a 37 percent share of the audience in its 10 p.m. time slot. Although the audience shrank in succeeding days, according to figures released Tuesday, "The Human Animal" averaged a 16.1 rating and 30 share while winning its slot every night.

It was the first time NBC had swept the 10 p.m. slot since "Shogun" six years ago.

"Family Ties," the NBC show which usually trails "The Cosby Show" at the top of the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, won the week with a 23.0 rating and 42 share, while "Cosby" was rated 22.9 with a 45 share.

Each rating point equals 859,000 homes with television. The share is the proportion of sets in use during the time period.

NBC easily won the week's competition with an average rating of 13.5, while CBS averaged 10.6 and ABC 10.2. NBC also won the evening news race with a rating of 9.7, followed by CBS with 9.4 and ABC with 8.6.

"I think we're going to surprise people," Donahue had predicted before "The Human Animal" ran.

Among those he surprised were NBC's analysts, who had predicted only a 24 share for the five-hour series. The daytime "Donahue,"



although one of the top-rated shows, averaged just a 7.7 rating in May, according to Preston Beckman, NBC's manager for daytime research.

"This shows that there is an audience for first-run programming in the summer," said Curt Block, NBC's East Coast vice president for press. Donahue's success moved the

network a step closer to the 52-week season which programming chief

Brandon Tartikoff has said is his goal, Block said.

"It was a risk for NBC, and for everybody involved, because the material is the kind of thing that is normally seen on PBS," said Penny Rothel, Donahue's spokeswoman. "This made it commercial."

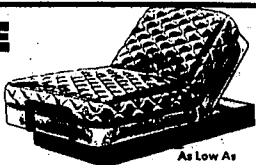
Donahue was on vacation and not available for comment Tuesday.

"Family Ties," which owes its high ratings in large part to following "Cosby" on Thursday night on NBC, had a rating of 23.0 and a 42 share last week, while "Cosby" had a rating of 22.9 and a 45 share.

The week's top 10 also included NBC's "Cheers" at No. 4, NBC's Monday movie "Family Secrets" fifth, CBS's "Circus of the Stars" sixth and "Murder She Wrote" seventh, and ABC's "Moonlighting" finished eighth and "Who's the Boss?" 10th.

'CBS Evening News' occupies a new set; space may create better camera angles

NEW YORK — Dan Rather gets more elbow room, but viewers will be hard-pressed to notice much else different when "CBS Evening News" occupies its new working newsroom starting Monday.

Rather still will deliver news stories from a desk, the map of the world behind him. Some viewers may spot a deeper blue background and several new camera angles utilizing the studio's greater spaciousness, but no major changes are planned in the program.

"The main consideration is continuity," said Tom Bettag, executive producer of "Evening News." "With more room, it will be easier to conduct interviews and do news specials."

ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings also will relocate to a new, larger studio newsroom on Sept. 8.

"It's the difference between a cubbyhole and a reasonably orga-

nized office," said William E. Lord, executive producer of "World News Tonight." "We'll have some different camera angles for greater variety."

Jennings' new home is nicknamed "the bubble" because it is enclosed in glass to reduce outside noise, Lord said. It remains a newsroom set, with staffers working in the background.

"NBC Nightly News" made cosmetic changes with a new set, new theme music from composer John Williams and new Statue of Liberty logo last fall. No more changes are planned, said Bill Wheatley, "Nightly News" executive producer.

News officials at ABC and CBS say the moves have nothing to do with the lightening ratings race. This summer, all three newscasts spent time in first, second and third place.

"Nobody is trying to sell the set. The set is a working newsroom," said Howard Stringer, CBS News executive vice president. "We made a decision not to make a grand an-

nouncement. We don't want to put the cart before the horse. The horse is journalism; the cart is the set."

High above Rather's desk will be a balcony of glass-walled offices housing CBS News President Van Gordon Sauter and "Evening News" producers. Stringer said CBS tested some new balcony-based camera shots that could be used during cutaways to commercials and during news specials.

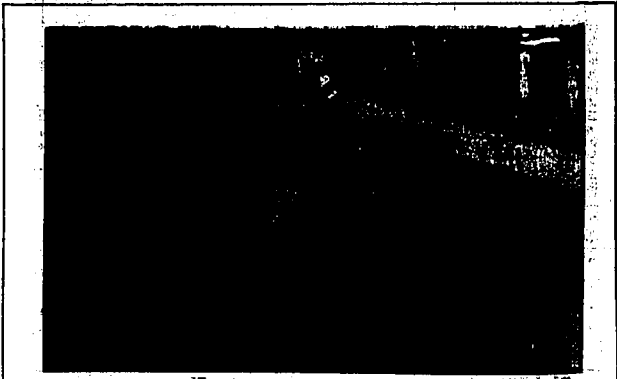

Soaps columnist not feeling guilty about watching so much television

CLEVELAND — Lynda Hirsch feels no guilt when she spends endless hours watching television soap operas. It's her job.

She has to know who did what to whom on the popular TV dramas for the syndicated newspaper column she writes for some 200 newspapers across the nation. And she has to keep up with what's going on behind the scenes as well.

For Ms. Hirsch, becoming a syndicated soap opera columnist matched her passion for the soaps with her chosen vocation, journalism.

"I had watched from the time I was 5," said Ms. Hirsch, who will only say she is in her 30s.

"I learned a good sense of morals from soap operas because goodness really does win out in the end, and evil doesn't," she said.

A couple of years after Ms. Hirsch graduated from Kent State University, she responded to an ad seeking people to watch soap operas for a new magazine in Cleveland. She talked her way into a job as the magazine's editor instead.

Just as she and the magazine were about to part ways a year later, the News America Syndicate tried to peddle a column to the magazine, she said.

Instead, she pitched a soap opera column to them, and they liked the idea.

Ms. Hirsch has been writing for the syndicate since 1976. She does four columns a week: separate summaries of daytime soap operas and prime time soaps such as CBS' "Dallas" and ABC's "Dynasty," a question-and-answer column, and a collection of interviews and tidbits from the soap opera world.

She appears twice a week on a local TV talk show, answering questions from the audience, and makes speeches frequently. She also appears on radio programs and has been on national talk shows, in-

cluding "Donahue."

Keeping up with 13 daytime soaps and five prime-time dramas is no easy task. Each show has 30 to 35 characters. Ms. Hirsch said she watches whenever she can, tapes some, and also has others watch the soaps for her.

"My job is not only to keep track of (the current characters), I really have to keep track of every charac-

ter that's been on the show," she said.

She relies on memory, insisting that she doesn't keep files.


"I probably have very close to a photographic memory," she said.

She draws from that memory bank at public appearances, rattling off the characters, actors and plots in answer to questions from the audience.




