Squad of armed men takes over Pan Am jet

KARACHI, Pakistan — Four men dressed as security guards and firing machine guns seized a Pan Am jet-boat jet-filled with nearly 400 people at Karachi airport early Friday, and at least four people were wounded, officials in Pakistan said.

Pan Am spokeswoman Pamela Hanlon in New York said a young Asian man was shot on the plane sometime after it was seized and was taken from the Boeing 747 in unknown condition. She said she could not confirm if the man was a passenger or who had shot him.

Pan Am's manager at Karachi, Viraf Durrani, was on the tarmac negotiating with the gunmen through a megaphone as heavily armed Pakistani soldiers and commandos surrounded the plane and cordoned off the area.

A Pakistani air force spokesman, who refused to be identified, said that they are speaking English. The gunmen were demanding to be flown to Cyprus.

The three-man cockpit crew managed to escape through an emergency hatch. The plane had just arrived from Bombay, India, en route to New York. The Pan Am office in Bombay said about 41 Americans were among the passengers.

The attackers fired machine-gun bursts into the air when seizing the plane. Two air-traffic ground crew members were injured in the assault, but it was not clear if they were shot.

Hours after the plane was seized, the gunmen opened fire from the plane at airport personnel and wounded at least one worker of Pakistan's Civil Aviation Administration, officials said.

Airport police also said they believed one person was wounded on the plane.

Pakistani army generals and top civilian officials were directing the security operation from the airport control tower.

Pan Am officials in Karachi and the U.S. Consulate estimated about 380 passengers on board Flight 73, which was to stop in Frankfurt, West Germany, after Karachi. An Airbus A300 Pan Am manager in Bombay said there were 387 passengers.

In New York, Pan Am spokeswoman Ann Whyte said 231 passengers were on board. It was not immediately clear why there was a discrepancy in the number of passengers.

Pan Am officials in New York said 11 flight attendants were also on the plane.

Daniloff opposes exchange for Soviet spying suspect

NEW YORK — Nicholas S. Daniloff, the U.S. News & World Report correspondent jailed in Moscow, said he does not want to be traded for a Soviet spy suspect, his editor said Thursday after returning from the United States.

A State Department official in Washington said the Soviet government has not responded to the U.S. proposal to exchange Daniloff, accused by the Soviets of spying, for a physicist accused of spying in the United States would be sent home after his trial.

Mortimer Zuckerman, the owner and editor-in-chief of U.S. News & World Report, said Daniloff was "duyued" by public support, but "didn't feel it was appropriate for him to be swapped for someone clearly involved in espionage."

"He is no more a spy than John Wayne, no more involved in espionage than Gidget or any other American," Zuckerman said. "I'm in prison. Daniloff is not a spy."

The deal to liberate Daniloff would involve temporarily releasing Gen. Vladimir Zasharov, a physicist who was assigned to the United Nations Secretariat in the Soviet ambassador, U.S. officials said Wednesday.

State Department spokesman Charles E. Redman said the United States is "taking every appropriate measure, taking every appropriate diplomatic contact and channel" in an effort to secure Daniloff's release.

U.S. proposal encourages reporter's wife

MOSCOW — The wife of an American reporter jailed on suspicion of spying said Thursday she was encouraged by reports of a U.S. proposal to free her husband, but a Soviet Foreign Ministry spokesman said he knew of no pending deal.

Ruth Daniloff, wife of jailed U.S. News & World Report correspondent Nicholas Daniloff, also said she decided not to respond to official threats to bring smuggling charges against her husband.

Daniloff, 32, was arrested Saturday after a Soviet acquaintance gave him a packet later found to contain maps marked "top secret."

He has been held since in Moscow's Lefortovo Prison.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Genady Gerasimov told a news briefing Thursday he was not aware of any U.S. proposal to free Daniloff. Asked about the statements by U.S. officials, Gerasimov said, "I am an official spokesman. I can't comment on things that are being done unofficially."

Mrs. Daniloff said she was "very hopeful."

"Any kind of movement or negotiation is encouraging to me and I understand there's a precedent for this in the Crawford case," she said. "I want very much to see Nick out of prison and I would welcome this."

She was referring to the 1970 arrest of American businessman Francis J. Crawford, who eventually was convicted of currency violations and given a 15-month suspended sentence.

Before his trial, Crawford was released in the custody of the American ambassador as part of a deal under which two Soviet citizens arrested in the United States on espionage charges were released in the Soviet ambassador's custody.

The two Soviets were convicted but were sent home in 1979 in a deal for the emigration of Soviet dissident Alexander Ginsburg and four others.

Sky View passes inspection; state will seek recertification

TWIN FALLS — Sky View Hospital passed a three-day inspection with nearly flying colors Thursday and will remain open, say state health officials, who will recommend to the federal government that the facility be recertified for Medicare and Medicaid payments.

"We feel very good about the delivery of care we've seen," said Jean Schoonover, manager of the Facility Standards Program with the state Department of Health and Welfare.

Schoonover was in Twin Falls on Thursday to meet with owner-manager Richard Drake and the three-member inspection team. Schoonover said some deficiencies still remain, but "not that many."

The positive report means the 143-patient facility will stay open, and the hearing to revoke its license will be canceled.

However, two issues are still up in the air: when the federal government will recertify Sky View for Medicare reimbursements and when the possible sale of the facility will be finalized.

Schoonover said the state report will be sent to the federal Department of Health and Human Services in Seattle with a "strong recommendation" that the facility be recertified for Medicare reimbursements so that patients do not have to move.

Because of earlier deficiencies in care at Sky View, the federal government stopped Medicare and Medicaid payments on Aug. 31 for new patients. About 80 patients receiving Medicaid support will have to move at the end of September, unless federal officials recertify the facility this month.

Schoonover said federal officials will probably not decide until next week on whether to delay recertification or issue it immediately. Often federal officials delay certification to make certain that standards are maintained, she said.

Thursday's inspection was the fourth in four months at the locally owned facility. In May, during a routine annual inspection, state workers cited Sky View with 28 pages of health and safety deficiencies, including inadequate staff.

One health official earlier characterized the deficiencies as "life-threatening," but Schoonover said patients were never in danger and the deficiencies were more a matter of quality of care and hiring enough qualified staff.

She said inspectors this week found most of the deficiencies corrected. "The delivery of care has improved and is at an acceptable standard. Patients look good and the staff has increased, which led to some of the original problems," she said.

Drake, who disagreed with many of the state's earlier findings, said he "felt a whole lot better about this survey."

"I think they did a good job," he said. He added that a staffer was allowed to answer questions during the inspection, which cleared up a lot of problems.

Both Drake and his wife Melody, a nurse at Sky View, said they are still working to correct some deficiencies.

Drake said he was uncertain about the status of the sale.

Schoonover said on Wednesday that her office has not received an application from Rethmar Corporation, of Northridge, Calif., to purchase the facility, even though the firm picked up forms a few weeks ago.

Dealing for Daniloff contradicts American hostage policy

WASHINGTON — The Reagan administration, in proposing a deal for the release of jailed newsman Nicholas Daniloff in Moscow, appears to be contradicting the stand it has taken in refusing to negotiate for four American hostages in Lebanon.

Terry Anderson, also a news reporter, has been held by kidnappers in Lebanon since March 16, 1985. He and the three other Americans have been held longer than the 52

American hostages were held in Iran during the Carter administration.

Reagan administration officials don't acknowledge any parallel between the Daniloff case and the Lebanon hostages, insisting they are sharply different, with one involving a government and the other involving terrorists. But some terrorism experts and relatives of hostages disagree.

"One is called terrorism — the other is called superpower politics," said Robert Kupperman, a specialist on terrorism at the Georgetown Center for Strategic and International Studies. "But in both cases there is hostage-taking of one form or another."

"In one case we negotiate and in the other one we don't," Kupperman said in an interview. "I think one can question whether there is consistency."

Robert M. Sayre, former chief of counterterrorism at the State Department, sided with the administration, however.

"I don't see a contradiction," he said. "This has been done before. It is one of the risks of the intelligence trade. I think this is a frame-up, but nevertheless that's the context in which it falls."

While he said some people might make a comparison, "When you start saying one thing is just the same as something else, then everything breaks down and we are unable to deal with anything."

Peggy Say, sister of Anderson, an Associated Press correspondent, said it is the notion that U.S. News & World Report correspondent

Daniloff has been framed, and is being held by Moscow to win the release of accused spy Genady Zasharov, which troubles her.

"That is basically where the parallel is," she said. "If he indeed is not a spy, and I have no reason to believe that he is, it is kind of like a hostage situation in that they can pick him up and hold him to get the man free."

The kidnappers of Anderson and the other Americans in Lebanon have demanded a trade for 17 convicted terrorists imprisoned in Kuwait for bombing the American

embassy and other buildings there. The administration's position from the outset has been that it will not negotiate with terrorists and it won't make a deal for hostages.

Mrs. Say said the administration has not even tested whether the kidnappers might have a fall-back position.

"Negotiations imply finding a common solution both sides can live with and save face," she said. "But if you don't do that, you hold them to their initial demands and leave it at that. They say their demands are it."

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Reagan administration, set to open another round of nuclear weapons talks with a high-level Soviet delegation, may ease its proposal for a 50 percent reduction in strategic nuclear missiles and submarines, a U.S. official said Thursday.

But it would still force the Soviets to make some hard choices about their arsenal of heavy land-based missiles and the destructive force, or throw-weight, of their nuclear armories.

Poisoned soup death probe broad

RUNNEMEDA, N.J. (AP) — A man who died from cyanide-laced Lipton Cup-A-Soup's mother bought to soothe his upset stomach could have been a random victim, but investigators also looked Thursday for someone out to get him or the store.

The death was the fourth from out product tampering this year, but the first related to a food product since the wave of tamperings began with cyanide-filled Tylenol capsules in 1982.

Government readies a bigger tax bite

Now that the shape of the federal tax overhaul — we did not say "reform" — is essentially set, we suggest an exercise:

Go back to your 1984 and 1985 taxes and write down how much you spent in each of those years in four categories: federal income taxes, social security taxes, state income taxes, and local property taxes.

Put the numbers in a drawer and in 1987, do the same for 1986. Then do the same again in 1988 for 1987.

We'll make you a prediction: over the next two or three years, the various "reforms," "overhauls" and "revenue enhancements" to government will cost you hundreds of dollars, perhaps more, in these combined categories.

And the costs will be even higher if you take into account the hidden tax increases we all will pay after companies pass them along to us as higher costs of doing business. Make no mistake, that estimated \$150 billion in corporate taxes which is built into the new tax proposal will come out of all of us, one way or another.

The new tax proposal will increase state income taxes as well. An estimated \$33 million annually will flow into state coffers if the state adjusts its current rates and forms to follow the new federal proposal.

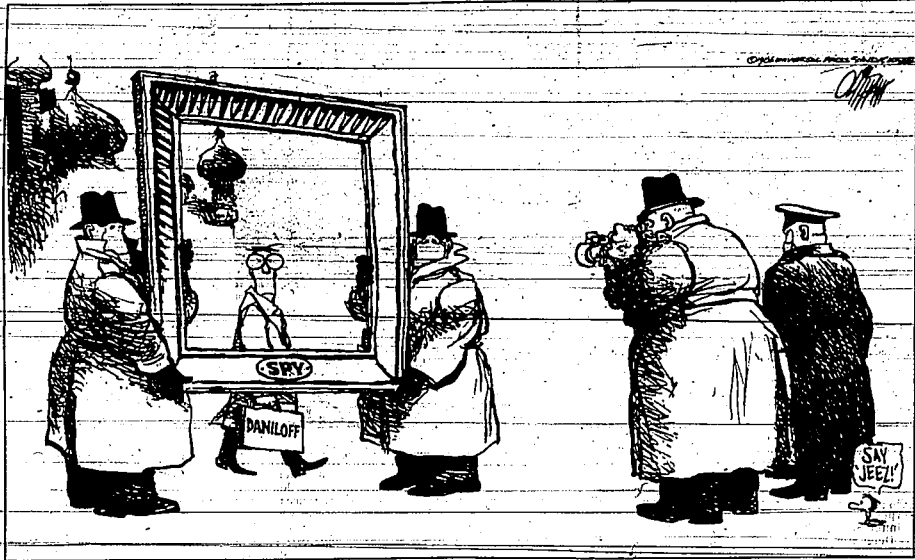
Some candidates, including Cecil Andrus, are hedging on how to state the obvious, but in effect, we will all get a state income tax increase out of this "reform."

And if you've been following local news reports, you know the county's indigent fund increases will mean a sharp jump in county real estate taxes this year — and that's even before we deal with a new jail proposal.

As for Social Security, it will go up inexorably in January, just as it has for years. No respite is in sight there.

The current approach of some of our political candidates is to downplay all of this, at least until November.

But the bottom line is that, at every level, government units are positioned to take a bigger bite of your hide.



Kremlin offers GATT vague carrot

The Soviet Union's request to participate in the forthcoming round of trade negotiations under the aegis of the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade has been given short shrift by the United States.

The Soviet system is incompatible with the free-market principles of the GATT. The U.S.R. seems to have little to offer in the way of reciprocal trade concessions; and Soviet intentions are suspect for political reasons.

Nonetheless, the request deserves a closer look. The Soviets' letter to the GATT suggests that participation in the GATT round would enable them to expand trade ties and strengthen cooperation with GATT members, as well as provide information so that they might apply for GATT membership in the future.

The Soviet overture to the GATT needs to be seen in the context of recent efforts by Mikhail Gorbachev to reorganize the economic machinery of the Soviet Union. Closer relations with Western markets have been sought through proposals for joint ventures, by participation in bond underwritings and by inclusion in the new trade round.

The purpose behind these moves is to make Soviet industry more efficient. This requires imports from the West. To pay for imports, the U.S.S.R. must export. Its export earnings have taken a beating because of the drop in energy prices — the Soviets hope GATT talks will help them sell more goods abroad.

Can the Soviet Union get what it wants from participation in GATT talks? Participation in the new GATT round will not

serve Soviet economic interests for several reasons:

First, observer status in the GATT is not important — the U.S.S.R. has been observing the GATT for several years and has had access to all GATT documents. But the work of GATT is done in discrete subgroups composed of the most part of the key trading countries; observers don't participate in the real negotiations unless they have some concrete concessions to offer. The motto of the carnival barker is apt: "You gotta pay to play." Without chips, the Russians won't be in on the bargaining whether they are observers or not.

Second, GATT procedures allow de facto discrimination against nonmarket economies. Many countries maintain discriminatory quotas on imports from Poland, Hungary, Romania and Czechoslovakia in conformity with GATT rules in order to prevent market disruption. Moreover, GATT provisions are likely to be reviewed to enable members to impose more easily-penalizable duties against imports from nonmarket economies that are dumped or benefit from state subsidies. Such reform will be accelerated due to the pending entry of China into the GATT.

Third, the GATT participation won't protect Soviet trade from sanctions imposed for national security reasons. Access to Western goods and

technology will not be improved, nor will Soviet exports find a warmer reception from Western traders.

If the Soviet Union has little to gain from participation in the new GATT round, what does the United States have to lose by allowing it in? In fact, the major risk is a political one. One cannot dismiss the threat that Soviet participation in GATT talks would inspire factional confrontations that would obstruct progress just as in the U.N.

The U.S.S.R. has not demonstrated that it is serious about engaging in trade negotiations; it has offered only the vague carrot of increased decentralization of its trade regime. Much more substantive changes will be needed to convince the West that the Soviet overture to GATT is more than a smoke screen to disrupt the trade talks on to keep pace of the Chinese.

However, if the U.S.S.R. is serious, then — like China — it should seek GATT membership and detail what changes it will make to adapt its trade regime to GATT norms. Such a step would require the Soviets to submit to negotiations in which they would have to make concrete concessions. GATT members could evaluate more objectively Soviet intentions. Accession does not necessarily require the total transformation of the Soviet economy. But it must convince GATT members that the opening to the West is durable and that it involves tangible benefits in economic and political terms.

Hunt family chose second best course for all of that money

To people who came to regard H.L. Hunt as a bit of a rattlebrain, the shipwreck of his fortune is a temptation to morbid satisfaction.

That a legacy once estimated at \$3 billion could, in less than a generation, find itself being litigated in the bankruptcy courts is remarkable testimony to that something special which old H.L. always claimed resided in the Hunt genes.

The Hunt boys have certainly enhanced the family legend. No family in American history has made a greater name for itself for losing money as spectacularly as it made it.

And what is the real lesson in all of this? Some people may say it reveals that the very rich can be as stupid and greedy as the

rest of us, as if this needed revealing. Certainly, it proves that for every imprudent speculator who dares to operate on a grand enough scale, there is a major bank ready waiting to expose itself to its foolishness.

Of course, H.L. had no way of guaranteeing that his sons would inherit sound business judgment. But major banks are free to pick their loan officers.

And it is more than a little irritating to think that at a time when credit was scarce and some people were having trouble financ-

ing a refrigerator, the Hunts were walking out the door of banks with broad and generous licenses to finance their speculative appetites.

But the shame of the Hunt finances teaches us more than anything what an astonishing degree of economic freedom license you might call it — still exists in this nation. How long have we been told that excessive government regulation and confiscatory levels of taxation are throttling the spirit of free enterprise?

That the Hunt brothers and their bankers could freely get themselves into such a mess certainly belies their father's conservative notions that government was an intolerable threat to the freedom of the risk-taking capitalist.

Job of course, at a time when encouraging job-creating capital investment is supposed to be a national imperative, it is difficult to imagine what social or patriotic purpose the Hunts were serving by amassing 59 million ounces of silver.

As a byway, there is splendid irony in the spectacle of the Hunt's hiding behind the skirts of a federal bankruptcy judge. Who'd ever have believed that the Hunt family would one day be seeking the federal government's protection from banks trying to recover money which they lent out so profulgately under the noses of federal regulators who supposedly are there to prevent banks from doing dumb things?

It is easy to get yourself up as the moral superior of the Hunts. Actually, though,

there is something rather touching about them. They never pretended to be what they weren't.

They're just, as H.L. used to say, "plain folks" who never seemed to imagine that their father's wealth gave them some great or noble mission in life. Nobody who missed and lost the way they did can be said to have developed that money-loving, complacent quest for respectability that typically characterizes second-generation American wealth. They might, like Carnegie, have built libraries with all their money, but lacking that vision, they did the next best thing. They got rid of it.

Whenever I pop in for a visit, whether planned or sporadic, to visit or share a meal with my grandmother, the calendar at the front of the lobby which announces the entertainment for each day, is continuously filled with church organizations wishing to perform and sing, or children's organizations wishing a turn to show their talents.

The birthday celebrations each month are always a special occasion along with the Christmas party, where each resident receives a silk red rose commemorating another year. Along with festive building decorations each holiday, the exercise classes, coffee times, right down to residents being included in staff meetings. It appears to me it would almost be difficult to find time to even play bingo, scrabble, pool, or cards with a friend on one of the permanent tables available in the recreation room. Break all ties with America, Gadhafi demands in tirade

HARARE, Zimbabwe (AP) — Libyan leader Moammar Gadhafi on Thursday denounced fellow members of the non-aligned movement as puppets and vowed to "undertake all types of terrorist acts" to defeat the United States.

Delegates to the non-aligned summit in Harare, Zimbabwe, Gadhafi described their organization as useless and an "international farce."

Gadhafi paused twice during his 75-minute speech to allow four Libyan women in battle fatigues to chant "Down, down U.S.A."

Zimbabwe's Prime Minister Robert Mugabe, who will head the movement for the next three years, delivered a careful response, saying "not all of us would agree" with Gadhafi.

"Delegations from the Ivory Coast, Cameroon and Zaïre leaved, protesting after Gadhafi called their countries 'puppets,' because they have ties with Libya's arch-enemy, Israel," Gadhafi said the movement did not do enough to support Libya after the United States bombed two Libyan cities, April 15. President Reagan has said the attack was in retaliation for Gadhafi's alleged support of international terrorism.

Gadhafi threatened to withdraw from the movement unless all of its members severed diplomatic ties with the United States and Britain which allowed U.S. warplanes to use its bases for the attack.

"I want to say goodbye — farewell — to this (funny) movement," Gadhafi said. "I shall undertake then all types of terrorist acts... I shall not leave any stone unturned in the way to defeat this (American) empire," said Gadhafi.

He claimed Libya was under siege by 50 U.S. warships off its coast and tens of thousands of U.S. troops.

"This will never make Libya stop from the continuation of the battle of freedom and liberation," Gadhafi said.

Gadhafi has overshadowed the non-aligned meeting since he arrived Monday with hundreds of bodyguards who were disguised by Zimabwean photographers and later took to staging anti-American demonstrations outside the conference center.

The Libyan leader was widely seen as having distracted delegates from the issue of South Africa, which Mugabe hopes will dominate the rest of the summit and its final declarations.

After his speech, Gadhafi followed by photographers, strode through corridors at the conference center to meet with President Ali Khamenei of Iran, President Fidel Castro of Cuba and President Daniel Ortega of Nicaragua.

Khamenei, posing with Gadhafi on a sofa, said: "It is exactly what our movement needs, this kind of courage."

The leaders of Zaïre, Cameroon and Ivory Coast issued a joint statement, expressing "profound indignation" and "disdain" at "this senseless declaration of Col. Gadhafi."

The three countries, along with Liberia, have recently reestablished ties with Israel.

Iraq-Iran war rumbles into 6th year

MANAMA, Bahrain (AP) — Iraq marked the disputed sixth anniversary of its war with Iran on Thursday by saying it could fight for another six decades, while Iranian troops attacked Iraqi positions and mobilized for a major offensive.

Bahrain's prime minister urged Arab powers of the Persian Gulf region to seek means of "forcing Iran" to end the war.

Iraq and Iran disagree on when the war actually started and who was to blame, with the Tehran regime of Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini contending Iraq began it on Sept. 20, 1980.

But Iraq insists Iran started the war on Sept. 4, that year, after Tehran abrogated the 1975 Algiers Treaty that governed shared navigation rights in the Strait of Arab waterway.

On Thursday, Iraq's Defense Ministry reiterated its position that Sept. 20, 1980, attack by Iraqi forces on western Iran was an "act of self-defense" because of the broken treaty.

The Iraqi statement, published in the government-owned newspaper al-Qadisiyah, warned that the "Iraqi-armed forces possess combat capabilities and weaponry with destructive power vast enough to carry on fighting for 60 years, if need be."

Iraq also has vowed to continue the war until the Iraqi government of President Saddam Hussein is toppled.

Both sides said they fought "fierce battles" in recent days, with Iran claiming victories in the northern and southern Iraqi regions.

But Baghdad said it "routed" the Iranians in the north and "wiped out" an amphibious force that tried to seize an offshore radar station off its southern coast.

Chilean Marxists' strike call goes unheeded

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — A Marxist coalition called for a nationwide general strike against military rule Thursday, but it had little effect because Chile's main political opposition refused to support it.

Extremists set 13 bombs and fires in the capital before dawn Thursday, and police reported damage to commuter buses, electric power lines, schools and an empty subway car.

Gen. Augusto Pinochet, nearing 13 years as president with his foes newly divided, used sparing force against small street demonstra-

tions. Police reported 60 arrests in Santiago.

A riot policeman was wounded when he was dismantling a street barricade of burning tires in a Santiago slum and a grenade inside it exploded, the government news agency Otrac said.

Funeral sets off clashes

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Security forces filled a stadium with tear gas to stop a mass funeral for riot victims Thursday, then swept through Soweto breaking up other services and battling gangs of youths, witnesses said.

A Soweto clergyman said "The fact that people managed to get through the dragnet to bury their dead is laudable." He asked not to be identified.

Young men with whips roved the streets, lashing people who tried to go to their jobs in Johannesburg.

The funeral organized by anti-apartheid leaders in defiance of police orders was to have been held for 20 people killed by police gunfire during riots Aug. 26-27 in the huge black township outside Johannesburg.

Fifteen of the victims were buried at a nearby cemetery after police drove mourners from Javavu soccer stadium near White City, the Soweto neighborhood hit hardest by the violence, clergyman and Soweto residents said.

Clergymen said they formed a human barrier in the stadium, at one point to in-assert what appeared to be an imminent confrontation between police and mourners.

According to the government's latest information, which provides official accounts of unrest under the nationwide state of emergency imposed June 12, "several smaller funerals did take place, although details are sketchy."

Youths angered by the ban on the mass funeral set up street barricades in neighborhoods throughout Soweto, which is home to about two million people, the government reported. Fire-bombing, stone-throwing and attacks by militants on residents who disregarded a call to stay away from work.

Security men sped through the township in armored vehicles, firing tear-gas canisters and sometimes birdshot. Surveillance helicopters clattered overhead.

There were unconfirmed reports of casualties, but the Bureau for Information said police had filed no reports of deaths or injuries.

Witnesses said a woman was killed when she fell in front of a train while trying to cross the tracks.

Tens of thousands of Sowetans skipped work in hopes of attending the funeral, to protest police actions or in fear of the whips.

Jenco thinks Shiites may free trio soon

NEW YORK (AP) — The Rev. Lawrence Martin Jenco said Thursday he believes that Lebanese Shiites who held him worked jigsaw puzzles, argued, prayed and cried.

The remaining hostages are American hostages, but "first they would like to get some benefits from this whole thing," Terry A. Anderson, 38, chief of the Associated Press, said.

Jenco, in his first news interview since being freed July 26, also said he fears that tough rhetoric from U.S. officials might block progress toward the trio's release.

"When we get into rhetoric that closes doors, that's not beneficial," the Roman Catholic priest said.

Reagan administration officials have frequently denounced the kidnappers as "terrorists" and insisted the U.S. government will not accede to terrorist demands.

In the 90-minute interview with The Associated Press, the 51-year-old Jenco — weary, quiet, but quick to smile and laugh — said he was heartened by a recent communication, not authenticated, purporting that the kidnappers had scaled back their demands. And he told of long months in tight quarters with the fellow captives, during which they worked poetry, jigsaw puzzles, argued, prayed and cried.

The remaining hostages are Terry A. Anderson, 38, chief of the Associated Press; David Jacobsen, 35, administrator of Beirut's American University Hospital; and Thomas Sutter, 55, the university's acting dean of agriculture.

The Moslem kidnappers, who call themselves Islamic Jihad, claimed last October to have killed another kidnapped American, U.S. Embassy political officer William Buckley, 58. But no body was ever found.

The kidnappers said they freed Jenco because he was in ill health. The Joliet, Ill., priest, who has worked as a missionary since 1974, has a heart ailment, but he said Thursday his health has improved since returning home.

Asked whether he thought they regretted the hostage-holding, he replied, "Very much so."

Symms. Cut some financial disclosure rules

TWIN FALLS — Idaho Sen. Steve Symms Thursday said he supports eliminating some financial disclosure rules for congressmen because they deter qualified people from running for Congress.

Responding to audience questions after his luncheon speech in Blaine, Symms said he would like to see a study conducted to eliminate current provisions that require congressmen to reveal their investments as well as their income sources. "You should disclose the source of your income and that's all I think the public has a right to know," he said.

Symms, whose investments in the legislative non-sensitive silver futures market have

been questioned by Barron's business magazine and The Nation magazine, said successful businessmen who would make good congressmen are deterred by the prospect of such scrutiny.

Other congressional reforms Symms said would be important to send him back to Washington to help maintain a Republican majority in the Senate to support President Reagan.

"Overall, one of the reasons the election is important is because of the direction President Reagan has taken the country," said Symms.

Reagan's push for lower interest rates and emphasis on a stronger military have been backed by the Republican-controlled Senate, he said.

"If the Republicans should lose control of the Senate, it would be a real blow," said Symms, who is challenged by Democratic Gov. John Evans. If the Democrats took control of the Senate, the Western states would lose six of seven committee chairmen from this region, he said.

In an interview after his speech, Symms said he concentrated on Republican politics rather than his own qualifications for the job because time was limited on the Kiwanis Program.

Symms reserved comment on the tax and anyone wants to be able to talk to, senior bill currently before Congress. He said the compromise version is different

from the House and senate bills and he needs to look closely at it.

Balancing the budget should be a top priority, but recent efforts have proven unsuccessful, he said. He expects to be critical of his votes in favor of freezing cost-of-living increases in Social Security and other entitlement programs.

He said the Senate has taken that step twice in an effort to slow the growth of the federal budget deficit, but the president and the House of Representatives have stalled the move both times. Symms said Reagan gregarious Irishmen who want to be loved by everyone." He said he told the president, "if anyone wants to be able to talk to, senior citizens, you should."

Symms told the Kiwanis Club that when

Secretary of Education William Bennett was in Idaho he told Bennett he thought teachers should be treated like coaches, who are fired if their charges do not win games. "At least half my education came off the football field," from a college coach whose philosophy he adopted, said Symms.

He would like to see the U.S. stop loaning money to countries whose farmers compete with U.S. farmers, and said aid under the U.S. should be in the form of commodities, instead of cash.

Symms criticized Congress for "idiotic" debate over proposed sanctions against the South African government, which stalled debate of federal highway law changes he is proposing. "It's not a big issue in the hearts and minds of Idaho farmers," Symms said of the sanctions debate.

Good weather smiles on county fairgoers

FILER — Twin Falls Day was a sunburner on the grounds of the Twin Falls County Fair.

The clouds and bright sun continued to bring the fair to life, as they have since opening day. In short, it was strolling weather. The type fair officials pray for.

Between strolls, clusters of people rested in the shade of trees near the entertainment stage — to watch quick-draw artist Bob Munden and the Sawtooth Country Cloggers demonstrate their skills at mid-afternoon.

Then the diners drew out their wallets to down burgers, hot dogs and ice cream under the covered food booths.

The visitors were sparse early Thursday when most livestock events took place. The fairgrounds started filling in mid-afternoon.

Festivities featured Sen. Steve Symms and Rep. Richard Stallings, stopped by to pump hands.

Sightseers and bargain hunters coursed through the aisles of the merchant buildings.

Carnival rides started twisting, turning, upending and rotating into action, their seats filled with youthful riders.

The rodeo in the evening should also promise to bring brooder-riders and a crowd to the grounds.

Today's fair schedule will include major events, shows featuring the Hereford breed, some 4-H and FFA activities.

Wendell Holstein cow at age 11 is top milker

FILER — Riggs Charmer Paulinda is branding in a stall at the Twin Falls County Fair what she does best — delivering milk. The white fluid — squirting into the mechanical pump attached to her underside is adding a few more gallons to her career total of 168,000 pounds.

At age 11, the Holstein cow from Voltray Dairy's herd is still milking three times a day, and is winning ribbons to boot. The well-known nickname "Grandma" by owners Terry and Sue Voltroubek of Wendell won the blue ribbon for the best cow in the lifetime production of 100,000 pounds or more the Idaho Internumtinal Dairy Show on Thursday.

The competition wasn't plentiful. Few Holstein cows remain healthy and productive at that age.

But Grandma's average yearly production still is 21,495 pounds, a year-an-4-percent-butler — better even for a milker in the prime of its career.

Dairy judge John Fullington has respect for these elders. "To me, these 100,000-pound cows are

somewhat of an elite group," he says.

Sure, their udders aren't as firm or formed as the younger animals. They may not carry their weight as well as the younger animals. But business, Fullington reminded the scattering of people in the bleachers Thursday.

This contest marked Grandma's second year at Idaho Internumtinal Dairy. Near Wendell, also brought other cows from his 60-head herd to the contest, partly as a way to move and partly to support a local dairy show, says Terry Voltray.

He wants other dairy producers to see them. "They're registered cows and you can't see the value of the milk increased by the individual sale of the offspring," he says. Voltray has ribbons to show for his efforts.

But the big winners in the Holstein contest are the Idaho Internumtinal mountain show went to Will-O-Dell Farms of Filer, which showed the grand and reserve champion cows, as well as the grand performer Delia Ann Williams.

Their grand champion, K B Hope Supreme, won her second champion-

Tews' 'Mick' proves who has the beef

FILER — He's one handsome steer. This jet-black Angus, long, lean and glossy when primed for the parade into the show ring.

More important, "Mick" is a meat machine.

That's why the 1,245-pound animal — and 14-year-old owner Jerry Tews of Filer — rated grand championships in the 4-H and FFA Market Steer Show and the "Open to the World" Steer Show on Thursday at the Twin Falls County Fair.

For Tews and his 4-H project, "Thursday's" championships completed a 4-Fair sweep. The team also had won Wednesday's 4-H and FFA fitting and showing competition, which stresses the style of the exhibitors.

But on Thursday beef judge Ferial Meeks of Taylor, Neb., was looking beneath the hide. He was interested in the meat the steer was packing.

"A steer should be ready to slaughter today,"

he said. "So we look at the leanest steer out there that will grade choice." For instance, a steer has to have some marbling — small pockets of fat in the muscle — for tenderness. But it can't carry a thick layer of waste fat along its backbone.

Meeks, a Hereford breeder, eyed the build of the steers to figure what meat they were carrying. "We don't need any visual waste; we've got enough we can't see," he told the crowd.

In Mick, he saw a meat-laden animal. Its frame is big and strong to carry the weight; the muscle that becomes meat was developed correctly in all quarters; its backbone was long and straight to yield maximum amount of cuts.

Tews, a senior from Filer High School, is in his second year as a member of 4-H. "I was happy to win even one contest," he said after claiming his second championship.

Another Filer boy, Jason Draney, took home ribbons for reserve grand champion from both shows. His steer also had Angus bloodlines.

In the market quality show Thursday, 4-H and FFA members showed steers ranging from 938 pounds to 1,389. The top 36 steers and eight pig dependent entries competed in the Open to the World show for the Harry Eaton Memorial Trophy, awarded yearly by Twin Falls Bank and Trust Co.

Meeks clearly was impressed with the quality of this year's competition, saying he saw the steers the meat industry wants. "They would look good at any show," he told the young beef raisers. He also encouraged them, just before he took his final trip into the ring to pick the 4-H and FFA champions.

"You can't all be winners; but you are a winner, I believe. If you come out here to participate," Meeks told the boys and girls showing their steers.

Mick and the other 131 steers shown Thursday will be marketed to the public for slaughter or resale at the 4-H-FFA Fat Stock Sale on Saturday at the fair.

Region IV development plan has county eligible for funds

TWIN FALLS — The Region IV Development Association Inc. is designating its overall economic development program for the fiscal year 1986-87 at a meeting last Thursday.

The OEDP is a document published annually that describes the economic climate of the Magic Valley and lists the planned projects for the coming year.

This year, Twin Falls County has been designated a redevelopment area in accordance with Title 4 of the Public Works and Economic Development Act of 1965. As a redevelopment area, the county will be eligible for certain types of federal assistance.

The total budget for this fiscal year has not been finalized, said Executive Director Joseph Herring, but is expected to be in the neighborhood of \$250,000.

The OEDP includes about 50 different projects in Blaine, Camas,

Cassia, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Minidoka, and Twin Falls, and includes, as well as projects that cover the entire region.

Local projects include work on the Soldiers Falls, Hester Park, which would mean finishing off the water lines and access roads, Herring said Thursday.

A Main Avenue revitalization program also will be initiated, which would attempt to change negative attitudes about shopping in downtown Twin Falls. Herring said that if shoppers lose interest in the downtown area, other cities will suffer as well.

The OEDP also includes expansions, and improvements at the Soldier Mountain and Magic Mountain ski areas.

Blaine County projects include a Friedman Memorial Airport, Bellevue water system improvements, a Ketchum water improvements, and a bike path between Sun Valley and Halley, Minidoka County projects including

power system improvements in Blaine, Rupert, and Paul.

The main regional project is a study into the feasibility of an Idaho international agricultural trade development center. Recommendations on Idaho's needs concerning agricultural trade on an international level will be made, Herring said.

The Region IV group and the College of Southern Idaho will be working together to develop a small-business assistance center, which will provide help for struggling new businesses.

In other business, the Development Association received a \$2,000 increase from the Idaho Department of Commerce for its procurement research program. The program will attempt to increase Idaho's role in federal procurement, Herring said.

Forty new jobs will be available in Burley at Farmland Manufacturing Company due to a Region IV project. The project was originally started in May of 1985, but fell apart," Herring said.

Vaccine maker's attorneys say juries shouldn't set health policy

BOISE — Attorneys for the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association and the maker of a whooping cough vaccine that paralyzed a 5-month-old Berkeley boy say juries should not consider negligence claims against federally approved prescription medicines.

"Lay-juries should not be allowed to set public health policy," Robert Koontz, Boise attorney for Lederle Laboratories, told the Idaho Supreme Court Thursday.

The high court was hearing oral arguments in the case of David and Susan Toner, a Cassia County couple who filed a \$5 million negligence suit against Lederle Laboratories in 1980.

The Toners argued that Lederle's vaccine for diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus, Tri-Immunol, was responsible for the permanent paralysis from the waist down of their son Kevin in 1979.

The so-called DPT vaccine has been in use since the 1940s. An estimated 90 percent of American children born each year are administered the vaccine. Lederle's parent company, American Cyanamid Co. of New Jersey, is the only licensed manufacturer.

A federal court jury in Boise awarded the Toners \$1.13 million in 1984. But Lederle appealed, arguing that since no alternative to its vaccine could be found, Tri-Immunol was "unavoidably unsafe."

The 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in San Francisco turned the case back to the Idaho Supreme Court. It asked Idaho justices to decide whether the legal principle protecting pharmaceutical manufacturers from liability when their vaccines are the only ones certified by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration for a particular disease, despite their side-effects, was applicable in Idaho law.

Koontz urged the high court on Thursday to rule that the principle does apply. He argued that all previous jury decisions in negligence lawsuits against pharmaceutical manufacturers were "in regard to companies' failure to provide adequate warnings of side-effects to 'learned intermediaries,' such as doctors."

That was not the case with the suit against the DPT vaccine administered to Kevin Toner, with the safety of the product itself being questioned, Koontz said.

But Kenneth Pedersen, the Twin Falls attorney representing the Toners, protested that Koontz was attempting to retry the case before the Court of Appeals.

Salary woes don't crimp university morale

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — Morale at Idaho's major higher education institutions is high, despite severe salary inequities, according to institution presidents.

Higher education employees believe the Legislature will make salary adjustments at the next session, the presidents said; adding that salary equity is their own priority.

The chief executive officers representing the University of Idaho, Idaho State University, Boise State University and the State College of Idaho met in Coeur d'Alene Thursday attending a meeting of the state Board of Education.

"Faculty and personnel morale is much better than expected," said BSU President John Keiser. "I believe the Legislature will recognize the priority and make adjustments to face the severe problem."

Full professors at BSU are paid an average of \$33,175, which ranks 13th among salaries at 14 peer institutions.

UI President Richard Gibb said every fact of state government involving the Board of Education, must work together to improve salaries.

"It's possible to alleviate the problem with board members working hard with the Legislature and executive branch, and everyone getting out and talking with the public. That's the only way the magnitude of the problem can be acknowledged and addressed."

"I can't predict the opportunity for improvement, but we shouldn't miss that opportunity," Gibb said. "Morale remains high and faculty turnover is normal at the Moscow university, even with the loss of a few superstars the last few years. There's no barometer, but morale is higher than we have any right to expect."

Education board approves layoff policy

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A new layoff policy that will allow the Idaho Board of Education to terminate university employees in a state of financial crisis has been approved by Board members.

The policy, authorized 6-1 at a meeting here Thursday, will allow the board to terminate employees, including tenured professors, if members declare that financial exigency exists at an institution.

Board member Roberta Fields of New Meadows voted against the measure, while member Cheryl Hyman of Jerome was absent.

The policy defines financial exigency as "a demonstrably bona fide, financial crisis which adversely affects an institution, and a condition that cannot be adequately alleviated by means other than a reduction in the employment force."

"In order to get a salary, you change jobs," Alvarez said. "We have to do something about this."

But the presidents said requests for administrative raises often are viewed with skepticism by taxpayers who view university administrative salaries as adequate.

"Administrative salaries can be a politically tough issue," Vickers said.

On Wednesday, the number had risen to six. At 5 p.m. Thursday, only two children had been lost during the heavy "East End Day" traffic. But by 10 p.m. Thursday, Munn said, the number had risen back up to 20 lost and found children during the day and night fair activities.

On opening day, the sheriff said, the lost and missing children reports involved youngsters from ages 2 to 12. He said one mother reported an 8-year-old daughter missing, who also was pushing a stroller with a 1-year-old in it. Thursday night, the sheriff said one young man who was lost didn't want help from the police. "I'd rather find some for him and help him find Mom," he declined. He said his mother told him not to go with the police.

pedans and rates on vaccines. An immunological study was unavoidable, unsafe, and without the benefit of testimony included at the original trial.

"Can you see how this thing got away from the court?" Pedersen said he already had provided to a jury that Lederle was negligent in failing to develop a safe vaccine, whether or not Tri-Immuno was unavoidably unsafe.

"The question is whether juries are going to be able to monitor the conduct of large corporations," he said. "The jury must say Tri-Immuno was unreasonably dangerous, but said through ordinary care a safer vaccine could have been produced years before."

But Malcolm Wheeler, a Los Angeles attorney for the Pharmaceutical Manufacturers Association, told the court that companies should not be held legally responsible for making a better product once a vaccine has been certified by the FDA and never withdrawn from its use.

If they are, products essential to public health will be withdrawn from the market.

"That's not blackmail, that's empirical," Wheeler said.

Justice Robert Hentley said it seemed to him the idea of removing negligence claims against federally approved pharmaceuticals from the jury system was "astounding."

Wheeler called it "unusual, but not astonishing."

He said the FDA might make mistakes about the safety or effectiveness of vaccines. But so might juries, and at least the federal agency has the expertise and data necessary to make informed decisions, Wheeler said.

Kontz said scientists had been working for 30 years to develop a safe DPT vaccine, with no success. The FDA refused in 1972 to license a product manufactured by Eli Lilly Co., called the Golden Chain, on the basis of proof that it was effective, he said.

Given the "social utility value" of Lederle's DPT vaccine, not only in this country but throughout the world, Kontz said, it obviously should be protected from liability claims.

McCALL (AP) — After a year of total involvement in the nation's space program, Barbara Morgan is glad to be back in her elementary classroom in McCall but still hopeful she will someday fly aboard the space shuttle.

"I understand this future is more," Mrs. Morgan said during a break in the routine of her third-grade class this week. "I'm glad to be able to share what I've learned with my students."

After a year that tested both her emotional and physical stamina first as the back-up Teacher in Space and then as the primary candidate after the space shuttle disaster last January, Mrs. Morgan admitted, "I'm very happy to be back."

But while she has again turned her attention to the 21-third graders she is teaching this fall, Mrs. Morgan remains committed to the space program and confident she will be aboard a shuttle after resumes flying, possibly in 1989.

Cabanilla to face charges

BOISE (AP) — A Star man must face charges in district court of first degree murder and kidnapping, Ada County Magistrate Richard Graff ruled Wednesday.

Enrique Cabanilla, 35, also was bound over on a charge of use of a firearm in commission of a felony, Ada County Deputy Prosecutor Priscilla Nelson said.

He is accused of killing Samuel Salazar of Sr. Salazar, whose body was found July 5 at Sandy Point Road near Lucky Peak, died of multiple gunshot wounds to the head and chest, authorities said earlier. Cabanilla is accused of kidnapping Pablo Gonzalez, 18, Star.

The preliminary hearing Wednesday was continued from Aug. 13. The hearings were closed, with the public excluded.

Panel denies zoning change

FORT HALL (AP) — The Fort Hall Land Use Policy Commission has denied a rezoning application that would have allowed development of an industrial park on the reservation, including a planned \$2.75 million Western Fabricating plant.

Chairman Joyce Ballard said the unanimous decision denying an application to rezone a stretch of agricultural land to industrial use was based on its potential "adverse impacts."

The application was filed by the Fort Hall Business Council on behalf of Western Fabricating, according to a news release issued by the Land Use panel.

College sues ousted dean

CALDWELL (AP) — Ousted Business School Dean Gary Benson, who accused administrators of force grade changes to maintain athletic eligibility, has been sued by the College of Idaho for student grades he has withheld in a pay dispute.

The suit, filed in 3rd District Court, claims both the school and the 16 students in question will suffer irreparable harm if the grades, originally due on June 4, were not submitted to college officials.

But Benson, notified last April that his year-old contract would not be renewed, said he was holding on to the 16 grades until he was paid for the final two weeks of his tenure.

College Provost Gunnar Wikstrom said Benson was not entitled to the additional two weeks' pay because he took two weeks of vacation before his contract expired.

UP's Lewis says layoffs over

BOISE (AP) — Union-Pacific Railroad Chief Exec. Lewis said Thursday night he's determined to operate the railroad on a competitive basis.

And if that means further cuts, because revenue won't support the work force, that might happen, he told a political campaign rally.

"The layoffs are basically over," Lewis said, at a rally for Republican Sen. Steve Symms. "What we did was shrink the railroad to match the revenue we had coming in."

Union-Pacific layoffs have been a touchy issue in the state. As elsewhere in the UPRR system, there have been substantial cuts in personnel in recent months, mainly at the Idaho rail centers of Pocatello and Nampa.

Gov. John Evans went to Omaha in July and met with Lewis, UPRR's board chairman and chief executive officer. Evans returned to the state to say Lewis had promised no more major layoffs although another 15 positions were let go.

Evans, who is running against Symms for the U.S. Senate, issued a statement on Thursday saying he felt doublecrossed by Lewis, because the railroad executive said he was "too busy" to meet with Evans again to discuss the layoffs, yet traveled to Idaho to campaign for Symms.

Maternity ward may close

BOISE (AP) — St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center has decided to temporarily suspend admissions to its maternity unit while it evaluates ways to continue the services.

The board of trustees and hospital President Patricia Vandenberg made the decision at a meeting Wednesday because the 3-year-old Family-Maternity Center had never lived up to its projected usage, Vandenberg said.

Vandenberg said she will evaluate the utilization more thoroughly before she and the board made a final decision. She said she did not know when a final decision would be made.

A hospital official said in 1983 the unit was projected to handle about one-fourth of the 4,600 to 4,800 births expected in Ada County by 1988.

Court reinstates mine claim

BOISE (AP) — A divided Idaho Supreme Court has reinstated a claim that the United Steelworkers Union was negligent in carrying out safety functions prior to the 1972 Sunshine Mine fire that claimed the lives of 91 Panhandle miners.

In a 3-2 decision issued Thursday, the high court reversed its ruling of last February that 1st District Judge Walt Prather acted properly in dismissing the damage claim filed against the union by families of four of those miners. The court remanded the case to the district court for trial.

While Prather was correct in voiding the families' contention that the union had acted fraudulently, Justice Robert Huntley, writing for the newly-constituted majority, said Prather erred when he summarily dismissed the negligent claim as well.

Joining Huntley were Justice Stephen Blalaine, who sided with Huntley in the minority in the February ruling, and Chief Justice Charles Donaldson, who swung over after reconsidering the case. Justices Robert Bakes and Allan Shepard, who with Donaldson formed the February majority, dissented.

The families of John Rawson, Wayne Johnson, Glenn Rosler and Don Wood claimed the union misrepresented the mine's safety conditions when it knew it could not and had negligently carried out its responsibility to inspect maintenance and safety procedures and equipment at the mine.

Huntley, in the 22-page majority opinion, reiterated the court majority's original position on the fraud claim, writing that the record before Prather was completely void any evidence to prove the union had guaranteed its members safe conditions in the mine. He noted that members were aware the union acted only in an advisory capacity to mine operators on safety.

But Huntley disagreed with the earlier conclusion that the negligent claim was barred as well. He said there was evidence that the union leaders did embark upon safety inspections, and the issue is whether they negligently performed that undertaking or whether the Union's negligent performance resulted in the men being

subjected to increased hazards or potential for death.

Noting the laundry list of safety deficiencies that the families of the miners claimed could have been observed had union inspections been adequate, the majority said there was the factual issue of whether the inspections were performed negligently that must be determined to dispose of the claim.

Bakes and Shepard in dissenting again relied on a two-year-old state Supreme Court decision that upheld the dismissal of an almost-identical case on the same grounds cited by Prather.

Huntley said the difference between the two was that in the earlier case, the union did not conduct safety inspections at all and under various legal doctrines could not be held liable for problems inspections while in the Sunshine Mine case, once the union under took inspections for safety it had a responsibility to members who financed them with their dues to conduct them responsibly.

"If such be a distinction," Shepard wrote, "it is merely one without a difference."

C-average rule may cut out graduates

BOISE (AP) — One in four of Boise's high school juniors will not graduate next year if their grades in core courses fail to improve.

The students will be in the first graduating class to be affected by Idaho's C-average rule, which requires a grade of at least C in math, English, reading and speech for all high school graduates. Statewide, 28 percent of juniors and 28 percent of sophomores are falling short of the mark, according to a Department of Education survey.

Those students will be caught in the middle of what state Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans calls a "game of chicken" between the state and local school districts over the C-average rule.

Thursday, Evans was to ask the state Board of Education to endorse the results of the rule.

The rule was imposed in 1984 to ensure that graduates have learned the basics before graduating from high school. It was designed to encourage school districts to develop special core classes for lower-achieving students and to coach them until they succeeded.

"Everyone knows we are not going to deprive one-third of our seniors of diplomas in 1988," Evans said.

On the one hand, he said, there is the view that the state board "will have to repeal or soften the rule" because of the high number of students falling short. "On the other hand, if we hang our heads and do nothing, schools will have to do some curriculum revision."

Past efforts to revise or repeal the rule have ended with 4-4 votes by the state board, Evans said. The earliest the board could act to change the rule would be at its next scheduled meeting in November.

Jack Craven, director of curriculum for the Boise schools, is a supporter of the rule. He said his district had started a remedial summer-education program and plans to add courses for lower-achieving students. With those measures, he expects to help students bring their grades up so they can graduate with C's or better.

"We can deal with the same material in different ways to make it possible for all children to learn the same concepts," he said.

But virtually all the state's educators groups, including organizations of teachers, administrators and school-board members, have lined up against the rule, saying it will lead to either higher dropout rates or artificially inflated grades.

Marilee Gross, chairman of the Boise School Board, said she opposes the rule because she thinks it will force poor students to give up on high school. "I would hate to see worthwhile students who have a good future in the world of work have to struggle along without a high school diploma."

Evans said he still supports the rule and its underlying idea of raising expectations for "proficiency or competency." But he said other ways of determining competency, such as testing, could be in place and school-board members have Blossom Turk, principal of Boise High School, said the C-average rule had worked smoothly at her school so far. "People do rise to expectations," she said. "Once they understand that the standards, they're just going to work that much harder."

Dates, sites for debates are arranged

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Press Club and League of Women Voters have set the dates and locations for three hour-long candidate debates to be broadcast statewide on the Idaho Educational Public Broadcasting System.

On Tuesday, Oct. 14, 1st District Rep. Craig R. Idaho, will debate Democratic challenger Bill Currie. The debate will be conducted in Moscow at 8 p.m. MDT.

On Thursday, Oct. 16, 2nd District Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, and Republican challenger Mel Richardson will debate in Pocatello at 8:30 p.m. MDT.

On Thursday, Oct. 23, Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, and his Democratic challenger Cecil Andrus, will debate in Boise at 8:30 p.m. MDT.

Organizers tried to schedule a gubernatorial debate between Republican Lt. Gov. David Leroy and Democrat Cecil Andrus, but Andrus rejected a proposed date for Oct. 30 or any date after Oct. 9.

The candidates will debate on Oct. 1 in a format set by Boise television station KTVB, which has offered to provide the broadcast to any other station that requests it.

Another TMI shipment arrives

ARCO (AP) — Officials began processing the second shipment of damaged radioactive material from the Three Mile Island nuclear accident Thursday after the train carrying the two 15,000-pound protective casks made the cross-country trip without incident.

The train arrived at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory in eastern Idaho late Wednesday without the public attention given the first shipment of the material, which was halted for 36 hours at the Kansas-Nebraska border by Nebraska Gov. Bob Kerrey.

"Everything went smoothly," said Terry Smith, the Pennsylvania spokesman for EOR&G, which is handling the analysis and temporary storage of the material from the 1979 accident at the nuclear reactor for the world's U.S. history.

"We talked to the state of Nebraska several times before this shipment to make sure there were no

problems," Smith said. "The last time was basically a communications problem and we took steps to make sure it didn't happen again."

As many as 37 more casks of radioactive material will be shipped through 1988 to INEL. The Department of Energy facility where scientists for prime contractor Babcock & Wilcox analyze their contents and store the material until a permanent national depository for nuclear waste is created.

Initial work on the contents of the first cask, which arrived in late July, showed that temperatures in the reactor were 23 times higher than normal at the peak of the accident. But officials at INEL said there were preliminary indications that removal of damaged fuel rods and other material from the reactor core should not be as difficult as originally believed.

Scientists hope to use the results from their investigation to predict future potential problems at reactors.

BLM won't file charges in grading

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Bureau of Land Management has decided not to file charges against Fremont County for grading a portion of an eastern Idaho trail being considered for development into a farm-to-market road.

The BLM Director Delmar Vail will write a letter warning the county not to do it again, said Trudy Olson, a BLM spokeswoman in Boise.

"What we're going to do at this time is to send the county commissioner a letter saying the action the county has taken is highly inappropriate given the sensitive nature of

the situation," Ms. Olson said. "If the county persists in this kind of activity we will have to take stronger action in the future."

The lawsuit was filed in 4th District Court in Boise against Dunn, his wife, Diane, and the American Drag Racing Association, which co-sponsored the race. Eight other lawsuits that arose out of the accident and were filed against the race-track owners have been settled and dismissed.

Dunn's car went out of control and crashed into a concession stand, leaving a Caldwell woman dead and 24 people injured.

Punkin' Holler folks a rare breed

Buhl couple celebrates 20th year of living with their rag-tag creations

FILER. The Punkin' Holler People are familiar residents of Buhl.

About 100 of them live in Harvey and Gladys Bickelhaupt's barn and basement. They aren't much trouble to keep. They don't eat anything and each only needs one set of clothing.

Many of them don't even have heads until the pumpkins are ripe in the Bickelhaupt's field, in an area known locally as 'Punkin' Holler,' one mile south of the Texaco station on Burley Avenue, the truck rolls in.

A contingent of Punkin' Holler People is on display in the Produce and Flower Building at the Twin Falls County Fair and Rodeo this week. The Queen of Punkin' Holler sports a ripe pumpkin head under her wavy brown hair. The other characters have heads made by a

secret process known only to their creators: Blanche Larington, Jane Simmons, Muriel Christofferson, Donna Mumroe and the Bickelhaupt family.

Gladys explained how the whole business began about 20 years ago. "I dreamed it up in my sleep and then I carried out the dream. It started with a purple cow. We covered her with chicken feathers that we dyed purple."

Lucille Huston, a Buhl teacher who has since died, helped her friend with the early creations. The purple cow occupied a stall in the cow barn at the fair that first year. "But they said the bulls went wild so the next year we moved her and her calf to the produce building," Gladys said.

She said they never imagined in the beginning how the population of Punkin' Holler would grow. Gladys has books full of newspaper clippings about the Punkin' Holler creations. Six of them, chosen by the Idaho Commission on the Arts to tour the Western states for

two years, have just returned home. Currently three figures are part of another folk art show touring European countries.

The fantasy people are frequently on loan around the Magic Valley for parade floats and displays at local functions. The Bickelhaupt's fall display in their pumpkin patch includes many of their people with pumpkin heads. It is a popular destination for school field trips from around the Magic Valley.

The Bickelhaupt's have an extensive collection of unusual and antique clothing for their creations. They discontinued the chicken feather coverings after the first few years because they were too fragile. But the purple cow's plumage has recently been restored to its original splendor.

This year's display in Punkin' Holler will be completed by mid-September and stay up until the day after Halloween.

Ancient vases get videodisc viewing

MALIBU, Calif. — With the touch of a fingertip, an ancient Greek vase painted with the face of a bull-headed Minotaur flashes upon a video screen. Another touch brings the mythical creature, Antiquity, meet high tech.

The encounter occurred two weeks ago when the J. Paul Getty Museum in Malibu began an interactive videodisc program for its Greek vases collection. Now visitors can learn about the centuries-old artworks through state-of-the-art technology.

The educational media tool emphasizes active viewer participation. Instead of passively reading exhibit labels or attending lectures or films, videodisc users can pick and choose what they will learn about the painted clay vessels.

By simply touching one of two 1/3-inch video screens, museum visitors can find out about a character as depicted on a glossy black amphora or the way it was shaped by kiln, wire, or mud. And though the entire videodisc program lasts about 2 1/2 hours, visitors may spend five minutes or as much time as they like exploring topics from form and function to artistic quality.

"Some people are intimidated by a room full of Greek vases covered with unfamiliar mythological iconography," said Marlon True, Getty curator of antiquities who masterminded the project. "It breaks my heart because people look in and say, 'Oh, there's nothing to hear about this.' This was a pleasurable way to make sense of it all."

The videodisc also instructs how to distinguish an aesthetically worthy vase from an inferior one.

Although museums around the United States have similar interactive videodisc programs, Bret Waller, Getty associate director for education and public affairs, said the Getty's "is the most interactive, in any museum anywhere."

One function of the program allows viewers to look at a particular detail of a vase or design — as if they were turning the vessel around by hand — by touching the video screen and thus freeing a rotating vase image.

True thought up the videodisc idea in June 1984, when originally planning to produce the program about a large vase exhibit the Getty was to sponsor with the Los Angeles County Museum of Art.

"But I quickly realized the subject matter had a broader scope than a single show," True said.

The Getty has about 10 complete vases and thousands of vase fragments, all from about 600 B.C. to 400 B.C. Experts agree that the collection is the third most important in America.

Waller said the entire undertaking cost about \$150,000.

TWIN FALLS — What began as an experiment this summer at the Renaissance Academy of the Arts, the Youth Performing Arts Workshop has found a secure niche in the academy's slate of arts classes, exhibits and performances.

The classes are scheduled each Saturday from 10 a.m. to noon.

Willetta Warberg, the academy's artistic director, began the workshops to give her piano students a special environment in which to

"work out" in the company of their peers.

A concert pianist and Twin Falls native, Warberg showed musical talent at an early age and began traveling to give concerts when she was seven years old.

"The community was very small then," Warberg said. "There was just no place to go, no place to meet, my peers that were interested in the same thing. There was no place for me to go where I felt comfortable working out."

Warberg said that many talented youngsters never develop their abilities because they hide their special gifts in order to feel accepted by their friends. The workshops provide a place where children who are just learning to use their talent can experiment and practice in a safe atmosphere, where being good at something doesn't mean being weird.

The workshop is not only for young musicians, but also for writers, artists, sculptors, singers and actors.

Each week children will perform and share their work with each

other. Informal discussions will help them assess their progress and give them new insights. Occasionally, professional artists will be invited to participate in the workshops.

Warberg was surprised at the way the kids interacted in the summer workshops.

"The little ones are proud to be there. The big ones feel very protective of the little ones. It's not competitive, but they feel stimulated to do their best."

"I just wish I could be 10 years old again and have something like this."



Henry Moore championed humanity, Earth

WASHINGTON — It is no wonder that the sculptor Henry Moore found the art of sculpture so reassuring. He was the most palatable of modernists. He spoke and hand-worked, he was not a dandy but a yeoman. Art was all his life a patriot. Though he lived through years of carnage — he was gassed in France in World War I and lost his London studio in the German blitz — he never lost his faith in the permanence of England. He distrusted revolution. He championed old traditions. In one way he resembled those 19th-century poets who honored daffodils and mountains, and those druids of the olden days who worshipped sacred springs and oaks. His sculptures hymn the land.

"Sculpture — all sculpture — is based on the human figure," Henry Moore insisted. But his figures are not quite human. We never meet them eye to eye.

When asked about his influences, he spoke of moors, "stone outcrops" and the "slag heaps of Yorkshire mining villages" that, when he was still a boy, looked to him like mountains. He spoke, too, of his mother's back, which, because she suffered from rheumatism, he massaged when still a child. "That's why I'm very good at backs," he said. "I can do a back in my sleep, nearly."

Most of England's greatest writers, from Shakespeare through Dickens, too, Francis Bacon, David Hockney show us in individuals. But Moore's figures don't

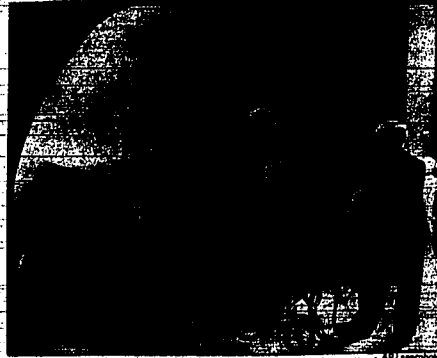

have faces. His kings and queens have pin heads, his warriors wear thick masks, his thick reclining figures conjure rolling hills or rain-washed standing stones wrapped in stone-gray mist. His humped and rounded figures suggest perseverance, or angst confronted bravely, or suffering held in check. Their life is landscape life.

Like America's Alexander Calder, whose mobiles delight Moore, whose works instead suggest monumental power, became late in his busy life a special, well-paid favorite of architectural committees. Where held reclining lions — those emblems of security and of fortuity in reposed used to guard the doors of imposing public buildings, today one is more likely to find a bronze by Moore.

His stone reclining figures (1957-59) guards the UNESCO building in Paris; his "Three Piece Reclining Figure No. 1" (1961-62) in Montreal guards the National Bank of Canada; his 16-foot-high, 30-foot-long "Reclining Figure" (1963-64) bathes in the reflecting pool at New York's Lincoln Center; other Moors surround the Hirshhorn Museum on the Mall in Washington, D.C.; and his "Knife Edge Mirror Two Piece" (installed in 1978) stands before the entrance of the East Building of the National Gallery of Art.

Though born poor, Moore died rich. In May 1982, one of his reclining figures, "Three Piece Reclining Figure No. 1," was sold for \$1,150,000 at Sotheby's in Manhattan, then a record price for a work by a living artist.

It says something — for Moore's modesty that, despite his fame and wealth, he was frequently described as "the son of a poor miner" (as if he were some rough-hewn upstart) and as a "once-neglected master" (as if the art establishment had not championed him from the start).

Henry Spencer Moore was born in Castleford, a coal mining town in Yorkshire. He was the youngest of eight children, and his father, Raydner, had been a miner once (most miners in Castleford took work in the pits), he was not a miner long. By the time Henry was born, he was employed as an engineer. "My father really was a remarkable man," the sculptor remembered. "He seemed to know the whole of his life as an engineer. He knew his Bible thoroughly, and he taught trigonometry, himself — enough

to do war pictures. Now Kenneth Clark was here and at once got the War Artists Committee to commission it."

Nor, when Moore first turned to sculpture, was his work neglected by the men in power in the small and close-knit world of British modern art.

In 1921, two years after being demobilized — he had enlisted in the 1st London Regiment (Civil Service Rifles) and been gassed, though not severely, at the battle of Camrail — he won a Royal Exhibition Scholarship to the Royal College of Art. After three years, there he was awarded the college's traveling scholarship and appointed instructor in the sculpture school. The catalogue accompanying his first museum exhibition at the Leicester Galleries, London, included a preface by Jacob Epstein. ("I first met Jacob Epstein in the mid-1920s, a time when I was unknown, and he was the most famous sculptor in Britain," Moore wrote. "He bought one of my little figures before I ever had an exhibition.") Other men of power, among them Herbert Read and Kenneth Clark, were also early on extremely strong supporters of Moore's modern art.

It was Moore's "sculpture Drawings" of Londoners huddled by underground in the tube stations during the Blitz — that first brought him great fame. "I saw hundreds of copies of those drawings," Moore recalled when I was unknown, and he checked when the platform," he recalled later. "Naturally I could not draw in the shelter itself. I drew from memory on my return home. . . . I had previously refused a commission one, I could explore with pleasure."

Canadian film industry on rebound

LOS ANGELES — The Canadian film industry, which has gone through boom-and-bust periods in recent years, seems to be making a comeback, and filmmaker Sandy Wilson thinks she knows why.

"We're starting to make films on Canadian subjects now. Before, we were aiming at the U.S. market, and that's something we do badly," she said.

As evidence of the partial renaissance, Wilson points out that 20 films, including such prestigious items as "One Magic Christmas" and "Mojana, Then and Now," were in competition for the Genie awards, Canada's equivalent of the Oscar. What she didn't add was that her film, "My American Cousin," took top prize.

The Academy of Canadian Cinema held its awards last March 20, just four days before the Academy Awards. "My American Cousin" surprised everyone, including Sandy Wilson, by winning six Genies, including those for best picture, Miss Wilson's direction and script, and stars John Williams and Margaret MacLennan.

"My American Cousin" was a critical and popular success in Canada, playing eight months in Vancouver and Toronto. Now Special Films is beginning the United States release in Los Angeles and New York, and Wilson was here from her Vancouver base to help the launching.

The fragile story centers on a sensitive 12-year-old girl living on a ranch in western Canada. Her humdrum life is suddenly brightened with the arrival of her Califor-

nia cousin, a James Dean-type on the lam with the family convertible. He dazzles her and the other teenage girls and alarms their parents. The cousin's parents come to claim him, and life returns to normal. But the girl doesn't forget.

Nor did Sandy Wilson.

"The movie is between 73 and 78 percent autobiographical," the writer-director said. "I did grow up on a ranch 250 miles east of Vancouver. I did have a cousin who came driving up one day in a '33 Bel-Air convertible."

"Most of the things in the movie actually happened. I actually shot it in the same house and on the same ranch. My parents don't live there anymore, but they live close by."

Wilson worked in television news and documentaries, then in 1971 made her first non-fiction film, the 20-minute "Bridal Shower." She followed with other shorts, then decided to transform her childhood memories into a feature script. Then began the tedious process of trying to raise the \$1.2 million needed to film it.

"I tried everything, all the government agencies, every producer in Vancouver, Montreal and Toronto," she said. "I talked to American Playhouses and HBO, I even went to the Cayman Islands in search of tax-shelter money. I talked to people on airlines. I couldn't find any financing but I did learn a great deal about the movie business."

She finally won a partial commitment from the Canadian Broadcasting Co. but she was warned that she'd ruin it if she directed. The turning point came

when Peter O'Brien agreed to come aboard. He had produced "The Grey Fox," the 1980 Genie winner starring Richard Farnsworth.

Filming began on Aug. 20, 1984, and Wilson recalled, "The first day was like a picnic. I was having such a good time I forgot to say 'Cut.' The assistant had to remind me."

'Mouse Detective' great Disney fare

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE GREAT MOUSE DETECTIVE (G). This unpretentious film is an animated feature since "The Jungle Book." The adventures of the title character, Basil of Baker Street, play off Sir Armeo Conroy, a detective, deftly. "Young Sherlock Holmes" did. While the story is straightforward enough for children to follow, there is plenty of action and humor to keep adults entertained. The polished, subtle animation will come as revelation to audiences numbed by the formulaic actions of Saturday morning kiddie.

THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG). This sequel to 1984's teen choppy-soaky hit is another mass-appeal action fairytale, but without the obsession with virility, cheap cynicism, and endless "kill count" of the "Cobra" and "Raw Deal." Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's kid and Pat Morita's impishly sage martial arts mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there, they stumble into a "Chinese Connection" story line, escalating kung fu, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected cross-cultural romance and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous; and you can even cheer for the hero at the end without feeling sorry.

ONE CRAZY SUMMER (PG).

Movie reviews

Savage Steve Holland, animator-turned-writer-director, has followed up his nifty debut film "Better Off Dead" with another winner, leaning again with actor John Cusack, who this time is a youth trying to find himself in the summer after high school graduation and becoming involved with stunning Demi Moore and her fight against a greedy Nantucket developer. There is much inspiration and detailing here; Cusack comes across as a Harold Lloyd for the '80s.

RUTHLESS PEOPLE (R). A Disney legend that might have bent all seven dwarfs into cardiac arrest: full of sex, violence, mudly, scatology, bottomless corruption and misanthropic, defiantly tasteless humor that leaves almost nothing unscathed. The good news is that the team of Abrahams, Zucker and Zucker ("Airplane") have directed it with panache and high comic energy, and the cast — Betty Midler as a yowling kidnap victim, Danny DeVito as her demonically universalist husband and Judge Reinhold and Helen Slater as her hapless kidnappers — acts it up to the hilt and beyond.

STAND BY ME (R). "Stand by Me" is the summer's great gift: a compassionate perfectly performed look at the real heart of youth. Its atmosphere is full of the great, crude, endy, ripe banter of four 12-year-old boys, and these four young actors (River Phoenix, Will Wheaton, Corey Feldman and Jerry O'Connell) have a depth and

understanding that makes each character soar and live for days after the film. And what a director Rob Reiner has become. He has seen that this cast stays honest and his movie marvelously restrained.

THE TEXAS CHAINSAW MASSACRE II (Times-rated: Adult). Tobe Hooper's follow-up to his black-and-shriek low-budget shocker of 1974 is wilder and scarier than the first one — if you can believe it. It is also a better movie in other ways: writer Kit Carson ("Paris, Texas") gives it some scorching literary and satirical modern-day manners and morals. The butchering, chain saw-wielding maniacs of the first film are now successful entrepreneurs operating in a kind of "Kampong" amusement park, and the "hero" (Dennis Hopper) is as crazy as they are. A warning: Anyone under 17 is not to be admitted to this unratified film. And it should definitely be avoided by people offended by graphic violence or gore. This is a thriller where the victims are not only killed, but served up in bowls of prize-winning chili.

TOUCH AND GO (R). Another nifty contemporary "love story" set in Chicago and dealing with the challenge of comedian Michael Keaton is terrific in his first essentially serious role as a professional ice hockey star who becomes involved, albeit reluctantly, with gorgeous but arrogant model Conchita Alonso and her feisty kid (Ajay Naidu), bright but headed for trouble — Robert Mandel (of "F-X") directed.

TOP GUN (PG). The biggest, glitziest, flashiest, loudest Navy

recruiting ad you will ever see, full of MIG-Tomcat dogfights, jocular male-bonding at the Miramar Naval Air Station, blood-red sunsets, massed clouds, straking jets, and so much techno-pop pounding in your ears the whole thing begins to seem like disco war. The movie is an empty-headed technological marvel. The trappings are flabbergasting — and the camerawork — and editing — a knockout — but the story is a sleazy rehash of "Casting Zero" and "An Officer and a Gentleman": drowned-in-bedcake and macho bathos.

PG-13 Rating Introduced

A new rating category is in place as of July 1. This new category is inserted between the current PG and R ratings: It is designated as "PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to whom parental guidance is suggested for children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children."

The related five-category system of the voluntary film industry rating program is now as follows:

- PG: General Audiences, all ages admitted.
- PG-13: Parental guidance suggested. Some material may not be suitable for children.
- PG-13: Parents are strongly cautioned to whom parental guidance is suggested for children under 13. Some material may be inappropriate for young children.
- R: Restricted, under-17 requires accompanying parent or adult guardian.
- NC-17: No one under 17 admitted.
- All films rated after July 1 will be placed in the new five-category system.

'Stand by Me' outguns 'Top Gun' at box office

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — A cast of familiar characters jostled for moviegoers' attention as summer waned, and "Stand by Me" emerged the favorite film of the weekend, followed by the long-running "Top Gun."

Film crowds overall were larger over the Labor Day weekend than they had been during a lull in August, but ticket sales for the top seven films lagged 6 percent behind the take for the same weekend last year.

"Stand by Me," director Rob Reiner's rendition of an early Stephen King short story about four boys on an adventure, was first with

\$5 million in weekend receipts. The durable "Top Gun," continuing a summer-long flight, climbed to No. 2. The romance-action film set at the Navy's fighter pilot school earned \$5 million.

The graly fascination of "The Fly" faded, and the self-reliant Jeff Goldblum from man-to-insect, dropped to third place with \$4.2 million in receipts.

"The Karate Kid, Part II" still lured crowds after 11 weeks with Ralph Macchio and Pat Morita in a second round of martial-arts-and-love matches, was fourth, earning \$3.8 million.

DJ stumps against drugs

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Radio personality Rick Dees has sent a letter to 300 radio station programmers across the country urging their support in the "fight against the glorification of drugs on radio."

The letters are part of an anti-drug effort by Dees of KLIIS-FM, Gary Owens of KFI-AM and 11 other broadcasters from southernized stations in Los Angeles, New York, Chicago, San Francisco and elsewhere who have formed a group called Broadcasters Against Drugs.

"Only you can decide what course of action is appropriate for your community," Dees wrote, "but as a minimum, I would encourage you to discuss with your on-air staff how their casual pro-drug remarks might be perpetuating the glamorization of drug culture as a natural part of the rock music scene."

Dees is also host of the "Internationally syndicated 'Top 40 Countdown,' which reaches a weekly audience of 30 million.

NBC banks on comedies to keep its edge as a new season arrives

This week, the 1987 TV season gets underway with "preview" episodes of three new shows — "The Wizard" (airing Sept. 9 on CBS), "Our House" (airing Sept. 11 on NBC) and "Easy Street" (airing Sept. 13 on NBC). Here's an overview of the new season.

TALKIN' 'BOUT MY MULTI-GENERATION — If the "Cosby Show," "Family Ties" and "Growing Pains" proved that the nuclear family is again a viable subject for a hit sitcom, why not expand the notion and have three, even four, generations living together. That's the premise of three new sitcoms, all starring well-known representatives of the over-50 set: ABC's "Life With Lucy" (which marks the return of Lucille Ball) and "The Ellen Barkin Show" and NBC's "Our House" (with curmudgeonly Wilford Brimley).

Howard Hesseman straightens out his Dr. Johnny Fever persona from WKRP in Cincinnati to become a high school teacher who must motivate a bunch of overachieving nerds. Meanwhile, Hesseman's colleague from WKRP, Lou Anderson, stars in NBC's "Easy Street" as a wealthy woman who takes in two boarders.

JUST THE FACTS — What would a new TV season be without its complement of new cop shows? "Heart of the City" (ABC) features a widowed cop trying to "false" two teens; "Crime Story" (NBC) is Michael Mann's cops-and-crooks saga set to the best of 1980s rock & roll; "Sledge Hammer!" (ABC) is a winning parody of the Eastwood-style macho cop; "Downtown" (CBS) features Michael Nouri as a parole officer.

FREAK SHOWS — Three shows feature off-the-wall characters: an alien (ABC's "Starman"); a midjet inventor (CBS's "The Wizard"); and a furry outer-space visitor who is a cross between "E.T." and Don Rickles (NBC's "ALF").

WOMEN OF THE '80s — CBS, the home of "Cagney & Lacey" and "Kate & Allie," bring us three more

CBS News wins week with a 12.0 average

NEW YORK (AP) — Dan Rather has been in a ratings dogfight with his competition all summer long, but his substitute Bob Schieffer cruised to a first place finish last week.

CBS also overtook NBC with a strong Sunday night performance to win the weekly prime-time chase with an average rating of 12.0. NBC finished second at 11.7, despite winning top four spots with its Thursday night comedy block, and ABC trailed with 10.9.

Each rating point represents 550,000 homes with television.

"The CBS Evening News," with Schieffer sitting in while Rather was on vacation, had an average rating of 11.1 for the week, well ahead of ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings at 10.3 and "NBC Nightly News" with Garrick Utley substituting for Tom Brokaw at 10.0, according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Wednesday.

"In a summer that saw all three networks take a turn in winning the news race, was that was the largest lead CBS had posted," said David Pollack, the network's vice president for research.

CBS' rating was up more than a full point from average of 10.0 since July 1, in the same period. "NBC Nightly News" average 9.3 and "ABC World News Tonight" average 8.5.



"There were more people watching the news last week than the week before, and the new viewers were going to CBS," Pollack said.

Early in the summer, he had predicted that "CBS Evening News" would pull away from the competition once the new season started. He said that NBC's news audience contains a larger proportion of heavy, year-round television viewers, while CBS attracts more light viewers who drift away in the summer.

A couple of turkeys — a Friday night football game and a Sunday night movie — combined to trip the NBC peacock in prime time. The pre-season game between the Los Angeles Rams and the Denver Broncos managed an 8.5 rating and 55th place out of 63 shows for the week of Aug. 25-31, while CBS placed 36th with an 11.4 rating for its Houston Oilers-Dallas Cowboys game on Saturday night.

LOS ANGELES — Oprah Winfrey is taking her brand of hands-on, emotionally involved talk show to a national audience in September.

Viewers in 130 cities will have the opportunity to see why her Chicago show zoomed from third place to first in the ratings and moved ahead of Phil Donahue's highly regarded, nationally syndicated "Donahue."

Miss Winfrey, nominated earlier this year for an Academy Award for her supporting performance as Sofia in "The Color Purple," hugs and cries and laughs and relates on a personal level with the people on her show.

Her show, like "Donahue," tackles such provocative subjects as sex, divorce, rape, battered women and incest.

"People have the power to make a difference in their lives," she said. "We want to let people know that. That's the beauty of good television. Good television should inform and inspire as well as entertain. So much of television is simply mindless."

Miss Winfrey, 33, appears to be challenging Donahue's position on top of the syndicated talk shows. According to King World, which is distributing her show, Miss Winfrey and Donahue will be head-to-head in 25 percent of the cities.

"That's a challenging thing," Donahue told an interviewer in New York. "We're on a more competitive street now than we've been on. We're up. We're fascinated by the attention that's been generated. We think it's good for the daytime schedule."

Miss Winfrey, interviewed shortly after she arrived on a flight from Chicago, said she has nothing but respect for Donahue.

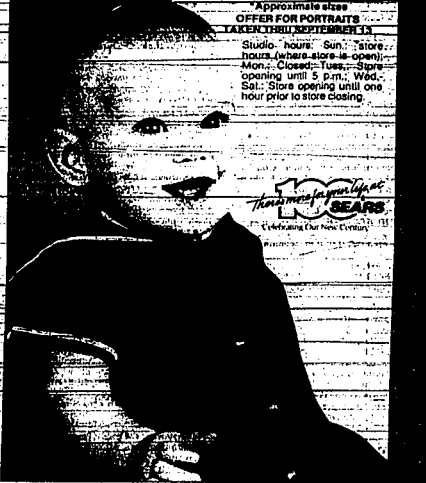

Christian TV talk show 'Hatch!' focuses on sex, other hot topics

WALL, Pa. — When it comes to on-the-air chitchat, confessions and counsel; nothing is sacred for Christian television talk show host Dick Hatch.

His late night program, "Hatch!," which focuses on sex and other provocative issues, is a hit among believers and non-believers alike. It's also a source of consternation for conservative Christians and clergy.

Hatch doesn't mind. In fact, he rather enjoys the controversy. "I've always liked doing things that other people are not doing," he said, shrugging. "There are plenty of preachers and teachers."

The 34-year-old former coal miner shouts at some callers, throwing up his hands and rolling his eyes, while shedding tears for others. Their queries range from philandering husbands and abusive fathers to homosexuality, alcoholism and oral sex.

Where else are they supposed to talk about this stuff in an open, informed, intelligent setting? he asked. "They're not going to get it in their church, there are too many little old ladies who are going to fall over if they do. They may be embarrassed to talk about it or may feel their pastor has a particular bias in one direction."

Besides, I'm not sexually frustrated and I'm not prudish. So I don't mind talking about it. And I don't mind trying to put it back into some intelligent, Bible sense.

"Hatch!" has been scorching the airwaves since its debut Sept. 5, 1983, on Cornerstone Television's WPCB in Wall, a little town outside

Pittsburgh. WPCB is a local station that shows only Christian-oriented programming.

It's part of a slight but noticeable shift in Christian broadcasting from "academic talking heads" to "gut-level issues," according to Ben Armstrong, executive director of the National Religious Broadcasters.

The hottest shows in religious radio and television are those dealing with royalty, sex and delly. Armstrong said. "If you deal with these kinds of subjects, you're able to reach more people. That's really the bottom line."

All the things they hear are the things they're thinking anyway," said Oleen Eagle, corporate vice president for CTV.

CTV was hoping to attract a young audience when it asked Hatch to serve as host of a live, one-hour talk show last year.

The son of an Ohio coal company executive who dropped out of college to work in the mines, Hatch started his broadcasting career in 1979 at WPIT, a Christian radio station in Pittsburgh.

He turned his efforts toward counseling after receiving a call from a woman who had been raped. Appalled by the lack of services for such victims, he opened the Christian Resource Center in downtown Pittsburgh in 1984 to help victims of sexual abuse.

He accepted CTV's offer after being assured that half of any profits would go to the center. His show was an instant success, largely because of his refusal to adhere to old-style religious broadcasting.

Although a Bible is always present, Hatch seldom refers to it. He peppers his conversation with such words as "leazeball" and

"slimeball." "I tell religious jobs and occasionally rides his motorcycle out to the set. Questions include politicians, sex therapists and atheists.

"My father's generation of evangelists" irritated themselves from the public "to be told what we do is mix it up."

His loud, abrupt style has gotten him into trouble.

A Presbyterian minister chastised him after he told a teen-age boy seeking advice about his pregnant girlfriend, "You've done a pretty good job of making your life a mess."

Hatch won't argue. In April, however, after persuading a 31-year-old woman caller who tried to commit suicide with pills to give him her telephone number, police rushed to the woman's home and took her to a hospital. She survived.

Despite his on-air success, the Christian Resource Center remains his primary concern. He spends every afternoon there before heading to WPIT for his radio talk show broadcast weekdays from 5 p.m. to 6 p.m.

Repairs progressing; 'Silent' cable show to be aired again

"Silent Network" is expected to resume local broadcasting programs for the hearing impaired beginning this Saturday on Channel 10 for King Videocable subscribers.

Chris Talkington of King Videocable explained that the programs had been aired from January through April of this year on an experimental basis as a public service using stocky equipment.

Equipment breakdowns halted the programs. If repairs are completed on time, the broadcasts will resume in their 7:30-9:30 a.m. time slot this week.

That the programs are available in the Magley Valley is due to the effort of Mark Fugitt, a student at CSI who first heard about Silent Network at a meeting of the Flying Hands Club.

Fugitt, who is studying to become an audiologist, wrote to Silent Net-

work for information and approached King Videocable about airing the programs.

According to Fugitt, the programs are both captioned and signed and include elements of both American Sign Language (ASL) and signed English.

He says they are appropriate not only for hearing-impaired people but also for anyone who wants to learn more about helping and communicating with them.

An exact programming schedule has not been available, although both Talkington and Fugitt have attempted to obtain them.

Present programming includes a children's show, "Festival"; "Hear Dog" about training canines; the "Off-Hand" talkshow; and "Say It With Sign" on learning to sign. Future programming may include a news format and a soap opera.

Talkington said that continuation of the programs in this area will depend on viewer response, which has been moderate so far.

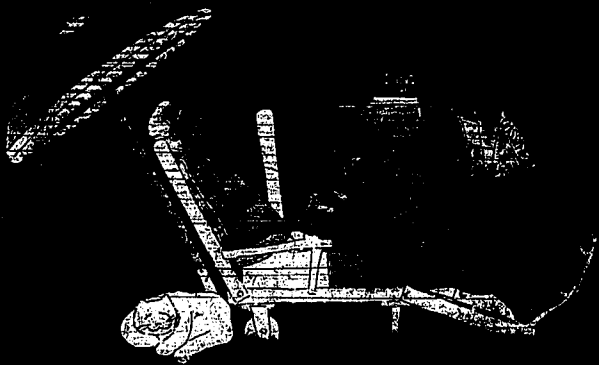
