

Contestants in swim with 'supersuits'

ATLANTIC-CITY, N.J. (AP) — Common sense says that swimmers have all flavors: Ada Duckett, swimmer for 16, three Miss Americas, knows better.

Mrs. Duckett created the so-called supersuit, which pagant supervisor says brightens a contestant's chances of winning swimsuit competitions.

This year, nine Miss America pagant contestants have purchased Mrs. Duckett's "supersuits" — "one-piece" suits. White is the overwhelming favorite color.

Of the 17 women in Wednesday night's preliminary swimsuit competition at the Miss America "Paganant," 10 wore suits in the distinctive supersuit style.

In the past year, Mrs. Duckett and her assistant, Ann Bogart, have made about 300 suits for pagant contestants in 25 states. Collectively, other contestants wear suits closely modeled after Mrs. Duckett's.

"There's not one girl I fit I can call perfect," Mrs. Duckett says, "but I like to see a girl who is from Italy — who got married in Arlington, Texas, said during an interview here this week.

But by altering a seam, tightening a strap, or changing the plump, Mrs. Duckett said she can compensate for

what months of dieting, hours of intensive workouts, and nature have in store.

Mrs. Duckett boasts, with amusement, that it took her seven hours, but she was able to make one woman's bust appear two sizes smaller in the suit.

"Sometimes you put it in, sometimes you take it out," said the seamstress, who also has inserted padding for contestants.

The supersuit is simple. It has a long back with a rounded V-shape low back. The original had a bar strap

across the back and attached to each of the shoulder straps. A variation without the bar strap is now available, too.

Underneath the bust is a band of material about two inches wide at the side seams, gradually narrowing toward the center.

The result is a shape in the Miss America mold.

Mrs. Duckett said she doesn't know who died in the supersuit. Contestants this year groped to explain why they chose a supersuit style.

"They say it's made out of special material," Mrs. Duckett said, "but I said, 'Miss West Virginia Shannon Renee Barill, 23, of Charleston.

"That strap that looks so funny in the back — it makes your bustline look nice," said Miss Kansas Heather Lynn Clark, 23, of Benton.

But it's not for everyone.

"I didn't even want to try one," said Miss Colorado Carol Jamon, 21, of Boulder. "It has certain connotations."

Mrs. Duckett said she has been involved in payments for 25 years, largely designing and sewing evening, semi-formal costumes.

Sometimes she isn't paid. In most cases, she sells the gowns for \$300 to \$1,500 — much less than they would cost in stores.

Mrs. Duckett said she is fond of the young women who pursue rhinestone-studded crowns and considers her work with them part of her efforts to give something back to the country that welcomed her.

"I don't say 'no' too often because people didn't say 'no' to me," she said.

Atomic test veto push repeal

WASHINGTON (AP) — "Veterans of military atomic weapons testing and civilian radiation victims" will attempt to lobby Congress for repeal of a federal law that they say denies them their day in court.

Cooper Brown, director of the National Committee for Radiation Victims, said his group is attempting to convince lawmakers to repeal the War Relocation Authority Act of 1942.

The law amended the 1945 Department of Defense Authorization Act to bar veterans and others who have been injured by their participation in the atomic weapons program from suing contractors.

Hurricane Earl swirls to life

MIAMI (AP) — Hurricane Earl swirled swiftly to life southeast of Bermuda on Thursday, packing winds of 75 mph in the open Atlantic Ocean but posing little threat to land.

"We don't expect it to hit land. If it out there where the winds are light, so I'll be out there for several days," said forecaster Gil Clark.

At 8:30 p.m. MDT, Earl's center was about 750 miles southeast of Bermuda. It was moving northeast at 10 mph toward the coast of the Atlantic Hurricane Center in Coral Gables.

People Express seeking buyer

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — People Express Inc., the cut-rate airline that has spent the year building up and then cutting back its operations, reportedly is considering putting itself up for sale, working with a partner or selling some assets.

The Wall Street Journal, quoting unidentified sources close to People Express, reported Thursday that Texas Air Corp. has been willing to negotiate with the carrier but has not moved to the change of ownership agreement with People Express, which last \$132.5 million in the first half of the year.

Scientists discuss accidents

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Soviet and American scientists used a satellite link Thursday to discuss accidents at the Three Mile Island and Chernobyl nuclear reactors, and said the exchange could lead to safer nuclear power.

"We hope it will not be simply a one-shot exchange, but will ensure the future exchange between these people and the organizations they represent," said spokesperson Dwight Goche.

UN head criticizes holdback

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — Secretary-general Javier Perez de Cuellar said Thursday that the United States is endangering the United Nations by withholding its assessed contributions.

In his annual report to the General Assembly, which opens next Tuesday, Perez de Cuellar said: "It is not yet clear whether the United Nations will remain solvent throughout the remainder of the year."

He was referring to cuts in U.S. support for the United Nations mandated by Congress that may reach nearly 10 percent of the U.N. budget.

EPA orders Chrysler recall

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Environmental Protection Agency on Thursday ordered Chrysler Corp. to recall 93,000 cars it said violated federal air pollution standards, but the company said the EPA's claim was unproven.

The cars are Dodge Omni, Dodge 024, Plymouth Horizon and Plymouth TC3 models from the 1981 model year, equipped with the 1.7-liter engine and manual transmissions.

EPA said tests at its Springfield, Va., lab showed the cars averaged 1.4 grams per mile of oxides of nitrogen, well above the permissible 1.0 gram per mile.

prisonment without parole for a second violation of anyone 21 years or older who sells dangerous drugs to a child or teen-ager, or sells the drug on or near school grounds.

The amendment was sponsored by Rep. Ken Kraybill, R-Utah.

The federal death penalty, while still on the books, has been unenforceable because Congress — unlike many states — has failed to approve constitutional procedures to carry it out.

"The amendment was carefully drafted. It will pass constitutional muster," Gekas said. "There can be no litigation with this drug."

But Kraybill said it was written in a flawed manner, and another opponent, Rep. John Conyers, D-Mich., said the amendment "try them" provision.

President Reagan has opposed adding the death penalty to the drug bill, but the legislation would not limit his "wide support" of Thursday's administration.

The administration also opposed the military amendment.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said the Defense Department was committed to assisting in the fight against drugs but could not support proposals to establish "a significant military role

in police activities such as interdiction, arrests and search-and-seizure."

Secretary (Casper) Weinberger's view is that it is a bad precedent to use the Army as a police force," Sims said, adding that any such legislation should at least make this a matter of discretion for the president instead of being mandatory.

The amendment says: "Within 30 days after the bill's enactment, the president shall deploy equipment and personnel of the armed forces sufficient to halt the unlawful penetration of U.S. borders by aircraft and vessels carrying narcotics." Arrests could only be made in cases of drug pursuit.

Within the same period, radar aircraft should be deployed so that during hours of darkness there is continuous aerial radar coverage of the southern border.

Helicopters and fixed-wing planes would be deployed for seizures.

The National Guard and Army Reserves would be used in the effort, and the president shall withhold federal funding from any National Guard unit whose state commander does not cooperate.

Within 45 days, "The president shall substantially halt the unlawful penetration of United States borders by aircraft and vessels."

The Congressional Budget Office estimates the measure could cost \$6 billion through 1991 if all new programs were fully financed and new enforcement personnel were retained.

However, the bill only sets spending ceilings, and there's no guarantee that all the funds will be appropriated.

Major provisions of the bill would increase penalties for violators and establish a 20-year-to-life sentence for trafficking and manufacturing which results in serious injury or death.

The legislation also would provide money for additional drug enforcement agents, prison construction and grants to local police and to increase the Coast Guard authorization for more personnel and equipment for seaborne interception of drugs.

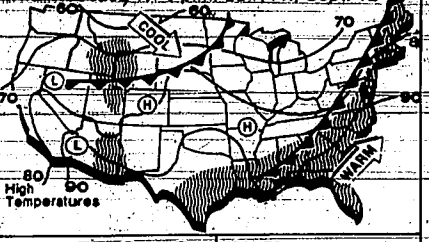

In his 14 years as a Supreme Court justice, Rehnquist has established himself as the high court's most politically conservative member. Civil rights activists reacted sharply to his proposed elevation, charging that he is insensitive to individual rights.

"He does not have an open mind with regard to gender and racial discrimination," Eiden said. "He has an agile mind, but not an open mind."

Dublin, and that the subject of Daniloff's imprisonment was discussed.

No details were offered, however.

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INEL power fight decision up to high court

POCATELLO (AP) — Utah Power & Light Co.'s fight to stop Idaho Power Co. from officially becoming the sole supplier of electricity to the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory is in the hands of the state Supreme Court.

Salt Lake City-based company is appealing an Idaho Public Utilities Commission decision allowing the U.S. Department of Energy to name Idaho Power as the sole supplier of electricity to the 800-square-mile nuclear research facility.

UP&L attorney Steven Dunn told the high court during oral arguments on the case on Wednesday that his company actually has the sole right to supply power to the INEL.

Dunn said the PUC granted UP&L a "certificate of convenience and necessity" in 1950, authorizing it to supply electricity in Butte County.

Idaho later received a similar certificate in 1969, but Dunn said that only allowed the utility to run transmission lines through the county, not to serve customers.

He said it would be "unconscionable" for the commission to give Idaho Power more authority than it applied for at the time.

Dunn tried to play down the argument that Idaho Power would save money for the DOE, due to its supply of inexpensive hydroelectricity. He told the court an economic decision would render PUC certificates "meaningless."

"You open the door to anyone who wants to give a lower rate," Dunn said.

But Idaho Power attorney Larry Ripley said UP&L turned down business in Butte County in 1950, since the INEL was the county's only electrical consumer.

As a result, Idaho Power sold electricity to the site, with UP&L's backing, and there was little reason for the company to ask the PUC's formal permission at the time, Ripley said.

"Why in the world would Idaho Power Co. apply for a certificate of convenience and necessity in 1950 to serve one customer?" he said.

But Idaho Power did seek a PUC certificate when it built a transmission line through Butte County, Ripley said, adding that it included a "provision" allowing the company to provide high-voltage electricity in the county. The wording was added expressly to cover Idaho Power's INEL business, he said.

Dunn later denied that UP&L turned down INEL business, saying instead that neither utility alone could supply the site's demands at the time.

He acknowledged that the INEL is within Idaho Power's primary service area, and that the utility has been the site's sole provider of electricity since 1978. But UP&L still provides "phantom" service in the form of backup generation, at an annual cost of \$1.3 million, Dunn said.

Department of Energy attorney Betty Holloway conceded that the government has contracted with UP&L since the 1950s, but said the agency has been concerned over the utility's service and rates for several years.

But Dunn said DOE officials signed a three-year extension of its three-party power-supply agreement 30 days before naming UP&L as the utility it is entitled to six months' termination notice.

PUC attorney Peter Richardson said the DOE, like any other power customer, has the right to know which utility is providing its electricity.

"Take that certainly out from under them, and you create economic chaos," he said.

Richardson also said the PUC order in favor of Idaho Power would not render UP&L certificates meaningless. Joint contracts are quite common in Idaho counties, with Idaho Power often receiving certificates after UP&L, he said.

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No guarantee Legislature will provide money

Pollution control plan requires funds

BOISE (AP) — A state plan aimed at controlling pollution from logging has cleared a major hurdle, but a legislator says there's no guarantee the Idaho Legislature will put up the money needed to make it work.

The state's working on new proposals to control nonpoint source pollution — mainly that created from activities such as logging, farming or mining.

After a hearing Thursday, the Health and Welfare Board directed its staff to move ahead with preparation and adoption of rules and regulations needed to put the new policy into effect.

Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, who was attending the hearing, was asked if he thought the Legislature would pay for the extra staff and budget needed for the new policy.

"Darrington wouldn't commit himself. He told board members there are many pressing health, welfare and education programs that need funding, and it's impossible to predict where the money will come from," he said.

Chairman Archie Service, Pocatello, told members he received a telegram from Joe Hin-

son, executive of the Idaho Forest Industry Council, withdrawing most of the council's objections. Hinson earlier in the week expressed opposition to major provisions in the plan. But Al Murray, chief of the Water Quality Bureau, said he met with Hinson this week. Some changes were made in the proposal which mitigated Hinson's complaints, he told the board.

One complaint voiced earlier by Hinson apparently not changed is his allegation that the timber industry is being singled out for enforcement, but it only one of several possible sources of water pollution. Hinson said recreation, agriculture and mining could be sources of pollution, but the new regulations are aimed only at forest management practices.

Board member David Mead of Twin Falls said it was obvious that the state eventually needs to look at the other sources of pollution, as well as logging.

"Some board members expressed concern that the process outlined Wednesday has no mechanism to stop logging or other activity if it is causing serious harm to the environment and water," he said.

Dan Jones, deputy director of the Department of Lands, said his agency has power under the Forest Practices Act to stop harmful activities or even repair the problem and charge the company involved.

But he and Murray acknowledged there's no retroactive application. If a logger follows the "best-management practices" required for that operation, and damage occurs to the environment after the operation is complete, there can be no retroactive assessment of damages under the proposed law, they said.

The proposals also went before the state Land Board for review on Tuesday. Member Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans objected to some of the provisions. Eventually a subcommittee was appointed to study the proposals and make recommendations to the full board.

It will take several months for the Health and Welfare agency to prepare rules to carry out the new policy and get them formally adopted.

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French nuclear agents welcomed

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Idaho lawmakers have laid out the welcome mat here for representatives of French nuclear companies considering building a prototype reactor at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory.

Yves Girard, vice president of Technicatome, and Charles Peterson, vice president of COGEMA Inc., were in the state to gather support for their proposal to build a 300-megawatt light water reactor at INEL.

"The French companies hope to use the scaled prototype to prove the advantages of their design. They will try to get Nuclear Regulatory Commission approval of the basic design, then market it in the United States."

"We are interested in promoting it," said Girard.

Legislative leaders, in Idaho Falls Wednesday for a tour of INEL, are just as interested in getting it. They had a meeting with Girard and Peterson, then expressed support for the project in a later news conference.

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Get license, bill collection agency told

BOISE (AP) — Idaho officials on Thursday ordered a New Jersey collection agency to stop trying to collect on overdue farm loans in the state until it gets a state license.

Gov. John Evans and Finance Director Thomas McDoldowney told a news conference they have ordered the Capital Credit Corp. of Fairfield, N.J., that it may not operate in the state unless it obtains an Idaho license or uses an Idaho licensed collection agency.

Evans said McDoldowney was to act after receiving complaints from farmers that they had received abusive and threatening telephone calls from bill collectors the last few days. Evans said the bill collectors were using "inappropriate tactics" in an effort to collect.

The Farmers Home Administration earlier turned over unpaid farm

loans to Capital Credit Corp. for collection.

Evans, a candidate for the U.S. Senate, blasted that approach, calling it a "breach of faith" by the Farmers Home Administration.

He said the federal agency should use regular channels to collect overdue loans, not a collection agency.

Evans said he's forbidden to disclose the names of Idaho farmers involved or the amounts of loans, but said 74 Idaho farm loans have been turned over to the New Jersey company.

McDoldowney said he telephoned the New Jersey company Thursday morning to inform them Idaho law requires any out-of-state collection agency to obtain a state license. The company also could turn the accounts over to a licensed state collection agency, he said.

"A person may not engage, either directly or indirectly, in collecting or receiving payment from others of any account, bill, claim or indebtedness, without having a license," McDoldowney said in a letter sent to the company later in the day.

McDoldowney said the law is designed to shield Idaho residents from paying bills, but is to protect them from unregistered and unsupervised collection agencies.

Sen. Steve Symms, R-Idaho, Evans' election opponent, said in a separate appearance Thursday he had no objection to the federal government going after legitimate debts owed by people who have left farms.

Symms told the Idaho Press Club if the government knew of a corrupt farmer, or someone with resources who has left the farm,

there should be no reason why the government should not try to collect the debt.

Other cases should be examined individually, he said.

But Evans said he didn't think collection agencies should be used on farm loans. "The breaking faith with people who have been struggling like this. That's a harsh method to use in our mind," the governor said.

He said if bill collectors press too hard, the only option for some Idaho farmers will be bankruptcy.

Evans acknowledged the federal government has been successful turning overdue student loans to collectors.

"There's a big difference between a student who doesn't pay a loan and a farmer who has lost everything he has," Evans said.

2 Idahoans win awards

BOISE (AP) — Two Idaho teachers are among 108 nationwide scheduled to receive Presidential Awards for Excellence in Science and Mathematics Teaching in Washington, D.C., in late October.

Chris Gentry, Boise High School, will receive the science award and Shirley Ringo, Moscow High School, will be lauded for mathematics teaching.

The awards have been given for the past three years to teachers in each of the 50 states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, Department of Defense Dependents Schools and the U.S. Territories — Guam, American Samoa, Commonwealth of Northern Mariana's and Virgin Islands.

The awards are administered by the National Science Foundation and based on classroom performance, student progress and other professional activities of each teacher.

Applicants can be nominated by students, parents, co-workers or administrators.

Heston endorsement reopens Actors Guild rift

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Charlton Heston's endorsement of a right-to-work referendum in Idaho, a former reopened ideological rift between the conservative actor and liberal Rep. of the Screen Actors Guild.

Angered by Heston's position, some members of SAG's board of directors recommended this week that Heston, former SAG president, be stripped of his life-time honorary membership.

SAG president Patty Duke herself called a news conference Wednesday, an hour before Heston met with the press himself, to term Heston's position anti-union.

The dissent among members of one of the nation's highest profile unions broke out as Heston, a former SAG president, prepared to attend a news conference in Idaho Thursday at the Idaho Plaza Hotel.

Heston, the President of Actors Working for an Actors' Guild, SAG's dissenting conservative faction, has frequently turned over the heads of the liberal SAG leaders to Ed Asner.

If approved by Idaho voters Nov. 4, the right-to-work referendum would make it illegal to require union membership as a condition of employment.

"I think in this country we are supposed to have the right to choose," Heston told reporters gathered on a sunny patio at his mountain-top home overlooking Gwenter Canyon. "The AFL-CIO says this makes me anti-union. I disagree."

The actors union has "long believed that such laws are detrimental to the best interests of working people," Miss Duke said during her news conference.

Heston said he was speaking out because the AFL-CIO violated the confidentiality of SAG's Monday

night board meeting by revealing there had been a move to strip him of his honorary membership.

"The AFL-CIO made it a matter of public record and I felt I should respond," Heston said. "The AFL-CIO has intersected itself... in an internal conflict within the Screen Actors Guild."

He said he was speaking out because the AFL-CIO violated the confidentiality of SAG's Monday

Stallings seeks lower rates

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House subcommittee plans hearings here next week on legislation Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, says could lower interest on farm operating loans.

Stallings said Wednesday he has cosponsored legislation allowing individual banks of the Farm Credit System to set their own interest rates before approval by government regulators.

The Farm Credit System holds \$3.8 billion in agricultural loans in the Spokane District, which includes Idaho, he said.

Stallings said recent field hearings in Idaho produced strong testimony that farmers feel they need to borrow money at rates lower than the existing rates of 12 percent and up.

The Farm Credit System lost \$288 million in the first six months of this year, Stallings said, with \$90.4 million of the loss in the Spokane District.

"Without this authority to lower interest rates and retain existing borrowers, the system will be on a collision course with bankruptcy," he said.

Private case load brings resignation

SALMON (AP) — Lemhi County Prosecutor Sherman F. Furey III has resigned his post effective Oct. 1, citing business conflicts.

Furey said the increasing case load in his private practice and a growing number of conflicts between those clients and his job as prosecutor makes it impossible for him to continue on the county payroll.

Lemhi County Commission Chairman Louie Demick said Salmon attorney Jordan P. Smith will replace Furey. Smith currently is city attorney in Salmon.

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Consider this site for new county jail

Given the nature of the structure and its use, there is probably no one site for a new Twin Falls County jail which will please everyone.

Nonetheless, the debate and voting history on this subject have been complete enough to eliminate some possibilities and enhance others.

Let's look at three locations, two of which we think should not be used for a jail, and one which might be just right:

•The Kellwood building. This facility is too large for a jail (only 30 percent would be used), and extensive remodeling would be required. The cost of remodeling would be almost as much as would be required in new construction.

•More importantly, the building is "ready-to-go" as an industrial location. The city, county, and Chamber of Commerce should intensify their efforts to find a business occupant for it. Using the Kellwood building for a jail would be only a short-term advantage, and not much of one at that. We oppose it as a site for the new jail.

•The old O'Leary School site. This site is attractive to some because it is immediately adjacent to the existing courthouse and judicial building. But we think it should be rejected for several reasons.

The site has much higher uses for commercial, business or residential development. As a prime downtown location, its use should be carefully tied to the existence of City Park across Shoshone Street, and with an eye to the kind of facilities already there, such as churches, homes, a library, and professional offices.

Using an attractive site like this for a jail strikes us as a lower use for the land than the community should allow.

Twin Falls will not always be in an economic slump. When we again see real growth and positive economic development, how will we feel about having a huge jail on a main-downtown street? Long-range thinking should prevail here. The site should be rejected.

County parking lot site. We think the best location would be behind the O'Leary site, on vacant, county-owned land now being used as overflow county parking.

This site has the merit of a close-by location, but does not front on Shoshone Street or face onto City Park.

It meets location and cost needs for the county while preserving the O'Leary site for planned, higher-use development.

It is bounded by 5th Ave. N., 6th Ave. N., 2nd St. N. and private property. The site might not be quite large enough, but we think the county should consider asking for permission to close off 2nd St. N. in that one block, or should ask for permission to move 2nd St. N. to allow for adequate construction room.

There are other potential sites for a new jail, but this one, in our view, is far superior to either of the other two.



Russian bear pulls down his new mask

BOSTON — I am following this story with something less than journalistic objectivity.

The setup, the arrest, and now the indictment of Nicholas Daniloff as a spy carries with it a special edge of concern.

Nick is a friend as well as a colleague. We were Nieman Fellows together at Harvard in 1974, mates on that year-long academic "cruise ship" for journalists. When I went to Moscow last year, Nick was more than generous. He freely shared his insights, his time, his Soviet experiences and friends.

One night I went with Nick to the home of a dissident couple he had known for years. We ate a magical smoked salmon and swapped stories, with Nick translating so fluently that it seemed to be talking directly to this couple. When I returned to the hotel that night I was awakened by two anonymous phone calls. They may have been wrong numbers, but staring at the ceiling at 4 a.m. I had a taste of paranoia in my mouth.

There are foreign posts more dangerous than Moscow. War correspondents suffer greater risks. But reporting for a free press in a monitored society is one of the trickiest tasks. It is one that Nick knows well and does well.

The reporters that in Western countries have to hurdle in the course of his or her daily work are imposing. The new batch of Soviet leaders may want to air a portion of their society's troubles — from alcoholism to corruption — with their own people. But there is no such desire to share weaknesses with the foreign press.

Gathering the news in a country that instinctively withholds information as benign as a telephone number (telephone books are a prized possession; "411" operators do not exist) pres-

ent exhausting challenges. Learning about the daily life of Soviet people, who only talk to foreign correspondents at personal risk, is touchy stuff.

For the most part, Western journalists are housed in foreign ghettos. They drive cars with yellow licenses that identify them as clearly as a bumper sticker or arm band. Working and living, often with a family or when your office and your home are probably bugged and when you must sort out sources from secret agents adds a strain that was, even on my two-week visa, palpable.

One of the paradoxes is that the Soviet hierarchy, longing for a good image abroad, nevertheless creates a hostile environment for foreign journalists. It is a tribute to the press corps that, for the most part, reporters do not let their own treatment permeate their view of Soviet society. Nick, who is as clear-eyed as any about the Soviets, said to me on a ride out to Pasternak's grave in the suburbs of Moscow, "Don't be mistaken; there is a kind of consent of the governed here."

Nick is not the first Daniloff to confront Russian authority. His great-grandfather took part in the failed rebellion of 1825, when a band of "Decembrists" tried to overthrow the Czar, and

spent decades in Siberia. Nick has been writing a book about this ancestor. I don't like to think of the irony.

The Soviets made a vast, bungling misjudgment this time. Some KGB instinct rooted in Stalinism or Czarism came out to grab Nick. It was the old technique: Frame a journalist, label him a spy and use the tactic for Gennadi Zakharov.

It went down easily enough in Moscow. In the Soviet Union, "journalists" (it must be used in quotation marks when applied to Soviets) are at best advocates, usually press agents, and always employees of the state. It is not hard for the Soviet people to believe that our journalists also work for the government.

But what a blunder in the world. They pulled down their groomed new image, like a mask that reveals the old bear's snarls. They slammed the jail door, not only on Nick but on the "open society." They have fed all the worst stereotypes of retired Cold Warriors.

Soviets often say that the Americans have no sense of history, that we suffer from amnesia. In our papers, stories go from breaking news to old news to trivial pursuit in a matter of months. I imagine that the Soviets expect Nick's name to fade from pages of newspapers to memory. They who set this trap into motion probably predict a face-saving trade when the heat is off.

They don't understand, may never have understood, the intensity of American feelings about a frame-up. The Soviets cannot get out of this with a mock-trial set for spring. Their one way out is to let Nick set the gates of Lefortovo Prison.

The two of them taught me a lot about the value of work, of not wasting your time or your money. They taught me about making do with what you have and about fixing something instead of buying new. They taught me about openness and honesty; they taught me about being conservative.

I've spent a lot of time traveling around this country. I've spent a good deal of time in the wilds and too much time in the cities. I've learned a lot about the values of nature, of air and water, of plant and animal life. I've learned about cycles and had the opportunity to test my abilities and values in the elements that make up the natural en-

vironment. I have learned things of spiritual, physical and mental value. I have learned the importance of "giving back" and not just "taking." I learned the meaning of conservation. I shared what I learned with my conservative mentors.

They are both gone now, and I find myself filled with a deeper sense of responsibility to preserve those values we shared and taught. For them it was the value of hard work and not wasting, of fair dealings; for me it is of protecting the environmental qualities of all life on this planet, of strengthening the individual and demanding some say in the decisions of our lives.

Twenty years as an environmental activist, three campaigns for public office and

endless meetings and hearings have left me cynical about the abilities of our political process, the religious and educational institutions or the so-called professionals to identify, discuss or act on the critical issues that face us.

There is just too much selfish interests; too much concern with power and money. It is money — what I call socio-economic amphetamines — that is at the heart of the problem. It is moving us too fast; got our values out of whack.

The money we now use, those Federal Reserve Notes, are really of little value. It is not a real measure of any worth, one item against another. It measures neither labor nor productivity. It is not based on silver or gold. It is just printed and pushed through the system. It is controlled and manipulated, given and taken based on no concrete criteria. It is destroying lives, cultures and

values. It is the chief argument for environmental degradation. It has gone beyond being a medium of exchange.

Money, the cultural addiction, is the focus of campaign '86. The politicians are all talking of spurring economic growth as the panacea for solving our problems. They'll push for armament plants, nuclear waste disposal sites, highways through wildlands and R.V. parks on mountain tops. There is no discussion of perhaps altering our lifestyles or working a little harder as a way of reducing our economic problems, protecting our environment, saving our farms or having an encounter with peace.

It is time to change, to shift our attitudes, to rethink and restructure our systems and institutions, to accept more responsibility for our lives. It is time to break with the focus on money as the cure-all for our insecurities and problems.

I see few strong candidates out there with either the guts or the vision to say it like it is. I know that the change faces the solutions will not be forthcoming coming from the Democrat's supplies or the Republican's rumples (rich urban money pushers). The rumples never had any values and the yuppies sold their souls.

It is time for a changing of the guard. It is not a time to merely change faces, the young for the old. It is not a time for new energy in a worn and worthless philosophy.

It is not a time for David Leroy or Butch Otter, neither of whom understand hard work nor know the Earth. We need a new breed that has the instincts of the true conservative and the heart of the conservationist.

Bin-busting corn crop should be second largest on record

WASHINGTON (AP) — This year's corn crop is producing record yields and should be the second largest on record, the Agriculture Department reported Thursday.

Based on Sept. 1 surveys, the department put the 1986 crop at 8.27 billion bushels, down less than 1 percent from last year's estimate and off 7 percent from last year's record of 8.7 billion-bushel harvest.

Rains in mid-August across much of the Southeast eased drought stress and improved corn crops in some areas. But the rain came too late to help yields in most areas, the department said.

Weather and crop conditions continued good to excellent in the major producing areas of the Midwest, the report said.

The average per-acre yield for corn was estimated at a record 119.7 bushels, up 1.7 bushels from last year's record and down less than 1 percent from the August estimate.

The size of the crop, coupled with large stocks remaining from last year, is causing severe storage problems. Emergency arrangements, including river barges and piles of corn, are being used in the tightest areas.

Corn is the largest and most valuable American farm crop, used as the basic feed for dairy cattle and livestock as well as adding substantially to U.S. farm exports.

Production of other major crops also is expected to be below last year's levels.

Soybean production, at a forecast 1.98 billion bushels, is virtually unchanged from last month but off 6 percent from last year's 2.1 billion bushels. The record was 2.26 billion bushels in 1979.

Wheat production, including winter and spring-planted varieties, is estimated at 2.12 billion bushels, the lowest level since 1978 and down 13 percent from 2.43 billion bushels in 1985. The record was 2.79 billion bushels in 1981.

The cotton crop was estimated at 10.5 million bales, a decrease of 3 percent from August and 22 percent below the 13.4 million bales produced in 1985. The record was 18.95 million bales in 1937.

According to USDA economists, net farm income is likely to decline this year to an average of \$26 billion from \$30 billion from an indicated \$29 billion to \$33 billion in 1985.

Retail food prices are expected to rise an average of 2 to 3 percent in 1986, compared with a 2.3 percent gain last year, the department says.

The report said that "all crops" production index as of Sept. 1 averaged 109 percent of the base year of 1977, down from the 110 percent forecast in October and off from last year's index of 116. The index reached a record high of 118 percent in 1982 before dropping to a 10-year low of 88 percent in 1983.

Soybean yields, at 33.1 bushels per harvested acre, were up from 32.9 bushels last month and down from last year's figure of 34.1 bushels.

Cotton yields were indicated at 565 pounds per acre, down from 571 last month and the 1985 record of 630 pounds.

Results please program director

'Star Wars' experiment opens way to missile killers

WASHINGTON (AP) — The secret "Star Wars" experiment, conducted last week, provided information that one day will make it possible for small interceptor rockets based in space to hunt down nuclear missiles, the program's director said Thursday.

Gen. James A. Abrahamson, lifting the veil of official secrecy, said the program is "a major experiment," said last Friday's trial was an unqualified success that proved America's technological acumen and demonstrated that President Reagan's dream of an anti-missile defense was closer to reality than most believe.

The experiment's success "will lead, just inexorably, to the kinds of capability that we are all trying to move to in this research program as quickly as possible," Abrahamson said.

He personally believed from the data I've seen that our job's going to be a lot easier than we thought," added Lt. Col. Mike Rendine, the Air Force officer who served as the project manager.

The three-star Air Force general said the main objective of the experiment had been to obtain data on what rocket plumes look like in space beyond the earth's atmosphere. That information is essential, he explained, for the development of sensors and guidance systems for small rockets that could be launched from "garages in space" to shoot down enemy missiles.

The broad outlines of the experiment, which began with the successful launch of a NASA Delta rocket from Cape Canaveral, Fla., had been disclosed previously by officials speaking anonymously.

For roughly 2 1/2 hours after launch, the second and third stages of the Delta danced and pirouetted around each other in orbits about 138 miles above the earth's surface. In the process, they collected data on what solid-fuel as well as liquid-fuel boosters looked like — silhouetted against the backgrounds of both space and the Earth. One of them detected and tracked from a distance of 200 miles another rocket launched from the White Sands Missile Range in New Mexico.

Among Thursday's disclosures, as outlined by Abrahamson and Rendine:

- From start to finish, the equipment needed for the experiment was designed and fabricated within 18 months — almost matching Abrahamson's goal of one year. The schedule was "hurried," Abrahamson said, because the research program could not proceed without the data on "rocket plume signatures."
- The second stage of the Delta was carrying the world's first space-based laser radar, the first of its kind. The device was described as a low-power laser that can be used as a weapon, but providing extremely accurate range data. The laser radar was used to point and steer the other sensors on the second stage.
- Many of the sensors employed during the experiment were derivatives of existing systems. The second stage carried an infrared TV tracking system from the Maverick air-to-ground missile, while the third stage carried the radar guidance system used aboard the Phoenix air-to-air missile.
- The third stage of the Delta was a brand new liquid-fueled vehicle, built from scratch. The sensors on each stage collected data on the rocket plumes, streaming from the other.
- More than 1 million lines of new computer software or programming instructions had to be written for the mission. The computer instructions worked flawlessly, Abrahamson said, offering a rebuttal to scientific critics who maintain it is impossible to develop a computerized control system for a large-scale Star Wars system that would function with confidence.
- The experiment was the most complex ever attempted by the United States from the standpoint of communications and coordination, Rendine said. It involved 38 radars on the earth's surface, six aircraft flying at high altitude in various parts of the world to receive information beamed down by the spacecraft, and 31 different satellite communication links tying the monitoring system together.

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House leadership on Thursday recommended acceptance of a Senate version of a bill imposing tough economic sanctions against South Africa.

A vote appears likely today and a finished bill could be sent early next week to President Reagan, who would then have to decide whether to sign or veto it.

House sources had cautioned there could be a last-minute deal over what is known as the "preemption issue."

This concerns whether the bill would preempt state and local actions in South Africa, such as California's divestiture bill. The California legislature has voted to divest \$1.1-billion in state funds from companies that do business with South Africa.

The procedures adopted by the House Rules Committee to deal with the legislation include a separate resolution declaring that in approving the bill, the House does not intend to "limit, preempt or affect in any fashion" laws passed by state or local governments restricting business with firms operating in South Africa.

Sen. Richard Lugar, R-Ind., chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, has contended the bill should overturn state and local laws dealing with apartheid because "we cannot have individual states and cities establishing their own foreign policies."

But Rep. Mickey Leland, D-Texas, chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus, said the Rules Committee resolution will put the House on record that "we do not agree with the idea that state and local governments should be preempted."

Lugar said that the sanctions bill should have that effect.

The Rules Committee action set the stage for an early House vote on the issue, probably today.

While Lugar's statements were interpreted by some House members as suggesting the Senate bill should preempt local legislation, a spokesman, Mark Helmeke, said Thursday that while Lugar doesn't think as a matter of principle that state and local governments should legislate on foreign policy issues, "nothing was said either way" by Lugar on whether the sanctions bill should have that effect.

250 flee area as dam breaks

PENTWATER, Mich. (AP) — An Ocena Under Sheriff Ken Prince, He said no more evacuations were expected as officials awaited the surge from the broken dam.

Officials had said 750 people were evacuated earlier in the day, but the rains had dumped up to 13 inches of rain across Michigan's Lower Peninsula since Tuesday, leaving two people dead, forcing hundreds to evacuate and flooding thousands of homes.

At Hart Dam, five miles up the Pentwater River from this community, "just gave way," said Ocena County Sheriff's Sgt. Mike Fry.

About 250 people were evacuated from their homes after the hydroelectric dam burst, said

Foul weather also struck Wisconsin, with nearly 7 inches of rain falling in the southeastern part of the state, flooding streets and basements, injuring two people and causing millions of dollars in damage.

In Michigan, 40 guardmen and nine 20-ton dump trucks had been sent to Hart to help stem the Pentwater River, said Guard Lt. Col. H.A. Stull.

"It could go any minute. It's at its highest stress point," state police Lt. Tom Alltand said Thursday afternoon as he helped direct crews along the groaning, vibrating dam. He said the water had risen 3 inches in nine hours.

"It's the highest it's ever been," said Alltand. "If this dam doesn't go now, it'll never go."

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Hanoi ready to send back MIA remains

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Vietnamese government has notified the United States it is prepared to repatriate the remains of an individual believed to be a soldier missing from the Vietnam War, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Arrangements are being made now for U.S. officials to receive the remains in Hanoi on Sept. 17 and then fly them to the Army's Central Identification Laboratory in Honolulu for identification, the Pentagon added.

"The U.S. government appreciates this repatriation of remains and hopes it represents just one of many continued steps in this longstanding humanitarian issue," the Defense Department said in a prepared statement.

The announcement that a single set of remains would soon be repatriated follows the conclusion of a three-day meeting of technical specialists from the two countries last month.

Sauter quits CBS after ally is ousted

NEW YORK (AP) — Confronted with a revolt from below and the ouster of his ally at the top, Van Gordon Sauter resigned Thursday after a tumultuous 10 months as president of CBS News.

The resignation came one day after network founder William S. Paley and Laurence A. Tisch, the company's major stockholder, forced the resignation of Thomas H. Wyman as chairman and chief executive officer.

Opposition to Wyman crystallized after he asked the CBS board to consider a friendly takeover by Coca-Cola Co., according to Merrill Brown of Channels, an industry magazine. Paley and Tisch particularly objected to any proposal which would sacrifice the network's independence, Brown said Thursday on the "Marketplace" news hour.

Sauter's resignation was announced minutes after CBS board member Walter Cronkite had said that a change in the news division's leadership appeared inevitable.

Sauter earlier this year laid off 70 news employees as part of a general reduction in the CBS workforce and was criticized openly by star employees such as Bill Moyers and Andy Rooney for not insulating the news division from the pressures of profits and ratings.

Although "60 Minutes" continued to be very profitable, "CBS Evening News" had fallen into a three-way fight with its competitors and "CBS Morning News" tumbled in third place.

"My 18 years at CBS were joyful and rewarding, and while the difficulties of the past 10 months constituted an irreversible end-game, I leave with pride in my work and respect and fondness for my former colleagues," Sauter said in a statement. He has also served as president of CBS Sports, chief censor and news bureau chief in Paris.

Gene Jankowski, president of CBS Broadcast Group, said he accepted Sauter's resignation with regret and that Howard Stringer, executive vice president of CBS News, would handle day-to-day operations for the time being.

There was no indication whether a new chief for the news division would be selected before a new CBS chief executive is named. Former Defense Secretary Harold Brown, also a CBS board member, is heading a search committee for Wyman's replacement.

CBS fell into second place in the prime-time ratings last season after six years as No. 1.

Mike Dann, a former CBS programming vice president under Paley, said the return of the 84-year-old founding father would boost CBS prime-time fortunes. "He has a passion for shows," Dann said. "One of his favorites now is 'Cagney & Lacey.' It's important and successful, a Paley trademark."

Judy Muller, a CBS reporter who did a radio commentary Thursday about the situation, said in an interview that CBS employees "are hoping Paley will protect the creative product. Tisch said he wants to bring back Paley's standards, so there's hope in that."

B. Donald "Bud" Grant, president of CBS Entertainment, said in Los Angeles that he expected no major changes in his division.

Shake-up no cure-all, stock analysts believe

NEW YORK (AP) — The dramatic management shake-up at CBS Inc. will help boost morale and settle some of the turmoil that has plagued the broadcasting company, but the move is hardly a cure-all, Wall Street analysts said Thursday. CBS still faces uncertainty over who will run the company, which will ultimately own it, the analysts said.

And CBS must still address the problem that the departing chairman tried to solve — how to increase profits despite the program ratings and the slowdown in the growth of advertising revenue, they said.

The company's employees have not necessarily escaped more of the cost-cutting measures that had caused such public dissension, the analysts said.

On Wall Street, CBS stock fell \$5.50 a share to \$34.50 in New York Stock Exchange composite trading, with 1,133,400 shares trading hands. The stock had dropped \$3.75 on Wednesday.

The stock declined sharply because the likelihood for a takeover battle for CBS had diminished, analysts said.

CBS' board of directors announced

late Wednesday after a daylong meeting that Thomas H. Wyman had resigned as chairman and chief executive officer, William S. Paley, the 84-year-old founder of CBS and a director, was named to serve temporarily as chairman, while Laurence A. Tisch, CBS' largest shareholder and a director, took on the job of acting chief executive.

Tisch is chairman of Loews Corp., which owns 24.9 percent of CBS' stock.

On Thursday, Van Gordon Sauter, president of CBS News, resigned.

The board said it would search for a permanent replacement for Wyman, examining candidates inside and outside the company. It said it hoped to find a new leader for CBS within a few months.

The shake-up was "a positive development for the company and settles things a little bit," said Barry Kaplan, an analyst with the investment firm Bear Stearns & Co.

John Reidy, an analyst with Drexler Burnham Lambert Inc., said, "With the return of William Paley as an active chairman, I think you have a major boost in morale and everybody is going to go back to doing their business."

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Pritam Singh stands at gate of his Key West property

HST's retreat included in Key West purchase

KEY WEST, Fla. (AP) — A 33-year-old Boston developer bid \$17.25 million Wednesday to buy the southernmost tip of the continental United States, including Harry S. Truman's "Little White House." The 102 acres of federally owned property includes Tank Island just off Key West and the 96-year-old annex on a Navy base that was used by Truman as a winter retreat.

The 40-minute bidding started at \$5 million and increased by \$500,000 a bid. About 500 people watched the public auction. Bidders had to put up \$200,000 cash or a check to participate.

Pritam Singh, who said he learned of the auction in Sunday's New York Times, outbid an Alaskan-Indian group, another Massachusetts man, a Maryland captain from Reno, Nev., and a team of Key Westers.

"The reason I wanted to buy the property was to try and retain what I feel is the quality of life in Key West," said Singh, wearing a blue turban, jeans and army boots.

He had voted to limit development of the land in an effort to save off-proposals to build hotels and condos on the property.

Singh said his historical renovation of the "Little White House" had renovated several properties in New England.

"A piece of property with that much waterfront and that many historical buildings, it's perfect for our company," Singh said.

The purchase gets 70 buildings, including a hospital built in 1844, plus Truman's highboy chair and his Reed and Barton silverware.

Treasure hunter Mel Fisher rents two buildings on the property, one of which, he said, houses "several million dollars' worth of treasure" brought up from the Spanish galleon Nuestra Señora de Atocha and his divers discovered last year.

Singh said he had no definite plans, except to renovate the existing buildings and work with city officials for any new development. "Even if we build new buildings, they would be in the same style and vernacular as the existing buildings," he said.

Wilhelmina Harvey, local officials of Key West, he said.

Tool company faces charge

FORT WORTH, Texas (AP) — A tool company and a General Dynamics Corp. engineer have been indicted on charges of conspiring to overcharge the U.S. government for tools such as a \$14.35 cutting device.

Greer Industries Inc. of Fort Worth, which sold F-16 fighter jet maintenance tools to General Dynamics, Greer President Robert J. Greer, manager Anson J. Walker, and General Dynamics engineer Harry B. Brand were named in the indictment returned by a federal jury Wednesday.

The indictment said Greer Industries is a distributor that sells tools made by other companies, but falsely claimed it manufactured the tools and parts. It sold to General Dynamics.

Brand declined to comment on the indictment.

Calls to Greer and Walker were referred today to Suzanne Doughton, Greer's assistant. A receptionist said Doughton was out of the office.

The indictment charged Greer, Walker and Greer Industries Inc. with conspiring since 1979 to defraud the Defense Department by overcharging for drills, cutting tools and other items.

'Symbols of courage, peace' meet, pray in South Africa



Winnie Mandela greets Coretta Scott King with salute

SOWETO, South Africa (AP) — Coretta Scott King and Winnie Mandela exchanged gifts and prayed Thursday during a private meeting and later praised each other as symbols of courage and peace.

Mrs. King, visibly moved, called the meeting "one of the greatest and most meaningful moments of my life."

At a news conference later in Johannesburg, she denied that she canceled a meeting with President P. V. Botha because of pressure from Mrs. Mandela and other anti-apartheid leaders. She said she hoped to return to South Africa to meet Botha.

Mrs. King also compared the civil disobedience practiced by her husband, slain American civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr., with the anti-apartheid activities of Mrs. Mandela's husband, Nelson Mandela.

Mandela, a leader of the African National Congress guerrilla group, is serving a life sentence after being convicted of plotting sabotage.

"Committing crimes, as we committed crimes, breaking the law that was unjust in the civil rights movement caused many of us to go to jail," Mrs. King told the news conference. "So I think it's a similar situation with Mr. Mandela."

She condemned violence as a way to achieve justice, but added, "There cannot be peace without justice. Our situation is that we operated in a framework of democracy in which we were represented in that framework. Here we don't have that."

Mrs. King, who was flying home Thursday via London after a 9-day visit, spent about 75 minutes at Mrs. Mandela's home in Soweto, the sprawling black township outside Johannesburg.

They exchanged gifts of books and

talked privately for 30 minutes while Mrs. King's entourage was served tea and cake in the kitchen. Then everyone held hands and prayed that Mandela would have strength during his imprisonment.

Mrs. King told reporters afterward, "I feel a great blessing to finally meet Winnie and touch her."

Fighting back tears, she said, Mrs. Mandela is a great symbol of strength, courage and dedication for women and children and people

everywhere."

Mrs. Mandela said she also was moved, and said of Mrs. King, "She has come here as a symbol of that peace which we have been prepared to give our lives for."

Both Mrs. Mandela and the Rev. Allan Boesak, a patron of the United Democratic Front anti-apartheid coalition, had been quoted as saying they would not meet with Mrs. King if she met with Botha and Zulu Chief Mangosuthu Buthelezi, a prominent advocate of non-violence.

Palestinian issue tops agenda for private Mubarak-Peres talks

ALEXANDRIA, Egypt (AP) — President Hosni Mubarak and Israeli Prime Minister Shimon Peres talked privately for three hours Thursday, and Mubarak said Israel's stand on the Palestinian issue is "improving a lot."

"We have concentrated heavily on the Palestinian issue, which is vital and important for the peace process," Mubarak said at a news conference after meeting with Peres in the first Israel-Egyptian summit in five years.

"I think the Israeli position is improving a lot," he said.

At a 90-minute working lunch also attended by other officials from both countries, Peres said Palestinians "have a right to participate in the determination of their own future" but he mentioned no changes in Israel's position on the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Peres has insisted that Israel will not negotiate with the PLO, which it considers a terrorist organization. Before his departure from Israel,

Peres promised his Cabinet he would make no concessions regarding the Palestinians. The summit began after the two leaders shook hands inside Ras el-Tin, a seaside presidential palace, and then posed for pictures. They then met alone and talked in English, dispensing with translators and other aides.

In all the two leaders met for 4 1/2 hours, including the working dinner on a balcony overlooking the Mediterranean.

Uzi Savir, Peres' spokesman, said "the spirit and atmosphere were extremely friendly and good on both sides."

"On the issue of improving relations and on the peace process, there was a wide degree of understanding between the two gentlemen," he said.

Mubarak said that with the signing by the two sides the day before of an agreement on a form of for resolving a border dispute, "I think it will be easy to move forward with the main issue, which is the Palestinian issue."

Pakistanis question hijack suspect

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Authorities questioned a man with a Libyan passport Thursday about last week's seizure of a Pan Am jetliner, and sought a companion who fled into a Palestinian mission.

Officials said a man identified as Salman Taraki was seized Wednesday at Islamabad airport in connection with the seizure of the Boeing 747 in Karachi last Friday.

They said his Libyan passport appeared to be a forgery, but that they

had no evidence against him yet. Twenty people were killed and more than 100 injured when the four hijackers of the Pan Am jet panicked and opened fired indiscriminately at the passengers and crew.

Inspector Javed Mirza, who arrested Taraki, told The Associated Press that police were watching the Palestine Liberation Organization mission in Islamabad, the capital, for a man who had been traveling with Taraki. The man eluded

authorities at the airport and went to the PLO mission, where police could not follow because of the diplomatic immunity.

The government, meanwhile, announced that the deputy commander of the air force had been appointed to investigate the takeover and the way officials handled it.

Pinochet lashes at church

SANTIAGO, Chile (AP) — President Augusto Pinochet angrily criticized Chile's Roman Catholic Church, the United States and his political opponents Thursday in a speech that marked the 13th anniversary of the coup that brought him to power.

As Pinochet was giving his nationally televised address, three French Catholic priests who had been detained and ordered expelled following an assassination attempt

on Sunday were placed by police on an airliner to Rio de Janeiro.

Pinochet also announced the government was suspending reconsideration of decrees banning 3,708 Chilean exiles from their homeland and said he had signed a law to open voter registries by early next year for a 1989 plebiscite for which he is expected to seek armed forces nomination as the lone presidential candidate.

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Indian bus, train collide; 25 lose lives

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — A bus and train collided at a railroad crossing in the northeastern state of Assam on Thursday, killing at least 25 people, the United News of India said.

The dead were all bus passengers, the news agency said. About 45 bus

and train passengers were injured, it added.




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
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Arrest raises questions on party, KGB

MOSCOW — The arrest of American reporter Nicholas Daniloff raises questions about Mikhail S. Gorbachev's relationship with the KGB and about how the Kremlin leadership balances the demands of its internal security forces with its foreign policy goals.

KGB agents grabbed Daniloff nearly two weeks ago after a Soviet acquaintance allegedly handed him a packet of secret documents.

Since then, there has been speculation but no conclusive evidence about who authorized the arrest and what it says about the Kremlin's effort to present a more open and modern face to the outside world.

The Soviets claim they can prove Daniloff was spying, but the U.S. State Department's spokesman says the KGB framed him in retaliation for the arrest of a Soviet citizen in New York.

Analysis

One school of thought is that Gorbachev would not have condoned the arrest since it runs counter to his efforts to improve the image of the Soviet Union and his campaign to end nuclear testing.

That theory said Daniloff was arrested without Gorbachev's knowledge in reflex action by the KGB after Soviet U.N. employee Gen. Zakharov was arrested in New York on spying charges.

If that is true, it suggests the Communist Party general secretary does not have full control of the secret police.

Some Western diplomats have suggested Daniloff's arrest might even be an overt move by conservatives within the Politburo opposed to Gorbachev.

The KGB is a powerful political force and at times has acted with virtual autonomy. Many Western experts believe no one can become party chief without KGB backing.

But many Western Kremlinologists believe Gorbachev has enjoyed good relations with the KGB and that its chief, Viktor Chebrikov, is one of his backers. Gorbachev's reputed mentor, the late President Yuri V. Andropov, was head of the KGB for 15 years.

If Gorbachev knew about the planned arrest but didn't approve of it, the notion of a power imbalance between the KGB and the party gains

credibility. However, even if Gorbachev had no advance word, he most likely was advised beforehand of the espionage charges filed against Daniloff more than a week after he was arrested.

If the Soviet leader did approve of the arrest, it is not clear why he was willing to risk possible diplomatic damage.

It is possible Gorbachev was presented with what appeared to be a good case against Daniloff or convinced that arrest of Daniloff was the best way to gain the release of Zakharov.

It also is possible the Kremlin may simply have underestimated the scope of the American response or assumed the Reagan administration would quietly negotiate a swap.

Gorbachev may have been under pressure to act swiftly and harshly after the Zakharov arrest. In the past, he has shown he can be very tough when pushed by foreign powers on security issues.

Earlier this year, the British government sparked a round of tit-for-tat expulsions by kicking out 25 Soviets identified by a KGB defector as intelligence agents.

Gorbachev matched every expulsion with an equal number of British to halt the actions after two rounds.

In the Daniloff case, Gorbachev could have felt he needed to show an iron hand to satisfy those who may fear his calls for modernizing Soviet society and opening it a bit more to the outside world could lead to a slackening of security and discipline.

Tehran starts its subway

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Excavation work has started on Tehran's long-planned subway, Iran's Islamic Republic News Agency reported Thursday.

The agency, monitored here, quoted the daily Etefakat as saying workers began digging tunnels at the site of the capital's first subway station. It said Mayor — Mohammed-nabi Habibi — inspected the work Wednesday. No other details were reported.

The subway was first planned about 10 years ago and a French company originally was scheduled to build the system for use by Tehran's estimated 3 million residents.

Work was delayed because of the 1979 revolution that toppled the late Shah Mohammed Reza Pahlavi and brought Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini to power. Iran's 6-year-old war with Iraq caused further delays.

Solidarity activists to go free

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — The government on Thursday ordered the release of all political prisoners in a sweeping amnesty that covers senior jailed activists and outcasts.

Solidarity free trade union movement.

The official news agency PAP said Interior Minister Gen. Czeslaw Kibicki ordered the prisoners freed by Monday in light of "the state of security in the country and strengthening stabilization."

Among those covered by the amnesty are Zbigniew Bukacinski, the Solidarity underground leader arrested in May, and Wladyslaw Frasyniuk, a Wroclaw Solidarity leader. Kibicki said in an interview broadcast on the evening television news.

Kibicki said the order applied to 228 people and, in addition to Bukacinski and Frasyniuk, he listed 10 prominent opposition figures.

Prime Minister Wojciech Jaruzelski, an army general, is believed to be behind the order, said Solidarity leaders Bogdan Borusewicz and Jacek Kuron.

Journalist Czeslaw Bielecki, Solidarity adviser Henryk Wujec, anti-Communist activist Leszek Moczulski and Piotr Niemczyk and Jacek Czaputowicz, founder of an unofficial peace organization.

Church and opposition sources have put the number of political prisoners at 350, saying the government classified some political detainees as common criminals.

The amnesty covered all prisoners sentenced and arrested for crimes against the state since the outbreak of Solidarity leader Lech Walesa said he received the news "with great pleasure" and called on authorities to allow greater personal freedoms.

The order was issued as police briefly detained and interrogated more than 3,000 suspected dissidents Thursday across the nation. PAP said the sweep was intended to dissolve "illegal" structures still trying to carry out activities aimed against the state and public order "without resorting to severe repressive measures."

The order was issued as those questioned were warned to cease their alleged anti-government activities.

The amnesty was approved by Parliament on July 17 and expires Monday.

The amnesty would not cover those accused or convicted of terrorism, spying or sabotage, PAP said.

Senators seek help for Soviets

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senators and cancer specialists pleaded Thursday for the lives of six cancer-stricken "refuseniks," pressing Soviet officials to let the victims rejoin their families and seek medical treatment in the West.

"The request is very simple: Give them a chance to live," Sen. Frank Lautenberg, D-N.J., who has written two letters asking Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev to let the patients leave.

The tragedy of their illness should not be compounded by political considerations. They should be allowed to leave while they are still alive," said Dr. Bruce Chabner, head of the National Cancer Institute.

The six patients, including a 7-year-old with leukemia, live in the states of California, Massachusetts, Colorado, New York, Canada and Israel. All have been denied visas to leave the Soviet Union, some of them repeatedly with authorities citing security reasons.

The victims' plights were described in a crowded press conference attended by one family member and interrupted by an emotional telephone call from several of those trying to leave.

"We're very happy and very grateful that you have found the time to be with us and that you are trying to do something for our rescue," Tatyana Khellets Bogomolny, a translator who has breast cancer, said over the phone from Moscow.

"The best cure for us will be to be reunited with our families." "How do you feel?" asked Mrs. Bogomolny's sister, Natasha Sverbilov of San Francisco, fighting back tears.

"I'm trying to be brave. I'm trying to be brave and looking forward," Mrs. Bogomolny replied. The sisters finished their conversation in Russian.

Dr. Steven Rosenberg, chief of surgery at the National Institutes of Health, and the surgeon who operated on President Reagan, said cancer patients have two needs: treatment options and emotional support best provided by families.

The Soviet victims "are simply asking to be with the families they love as they deal with and perhaps die with their disease," Rosenberg said. "I don't think that's an unreasonable request. Hopefully, we can help them achieve it."

The physicians and many of the eight senators present stressed that their request was made in a humanitarian spirit, outside the realm of politics.

John R. DuCharme of West Orange had parked the truck on a hilly road Tuesday, and when he walked behind it, the vehicle rolled backwards, striking him, knocking him to the ground and pinning him beneath the vehicle," said town police Chief Edward M. Palardy.

DuCharme was taken unconscious to St. Barnabas Medical Center in Livingston. He died Wednesday, the chief said.

Authorities inspected the vehicle and found the hand brake was not on but could not determine if it failed or had not been set, Palardy said. DuCharme, a letter carrier for nearly 20 years, was scheduled to retire in another 10 days, said Louis Ruggeri, a supervisor at the town post office.

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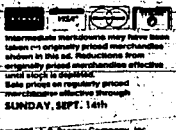
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Reagan decries 'culture of license,' works on drug curbs

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, preparing to unveil new measures to combat drug abuse, decried on Thursday a "culture of license that encourages drug use, promising to deliver only despair and destruction."

The president spoke to 150 business leaders a few hours before going into a lengthy Cabinet meeting to receive recommendations for legislation to curb drug abuse, both on the trafficking and consumption side.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes

said that Reagan would decide on the recommendations this week and disclose some of his decisions in a nationally broadcast speech that he and wife Nancy will make Sunday.

White House spokesman Albert R. Brashear said after the Cabinet meeting, "The president has spoken no decisions. He took it all under advisement."

Brashear declined to say what recommendations were made.

The first lady, joining in the buildup for

the Sunday speech, traveled to Harpers Ferry, W.Va., Thursday for an anti-drug picnic and rally with school children and adult corporations. Reagan said he and the first lady would be "addressing the nation with an urgent message: that now is the time to stand up and get involved and do something about drugs."

As the first couple was stepping up the speech-making on drug abuse, members of the House of Representatives continued

debating legislation which would overhaul and steeply upgrade the government's war on drugs.

In his White House speech, Reagan said, "We must hold the sellers and users of illegal drugs accountable for their actions. We must seek ways to help users quit using and accept no excuses."

"None of us can rest while our children are still prey to pushers and a culture of license that encourages drug use, promising kicks

but delivering only despair and destruction," said Reagan, who last month took a test to lead the way in his administration's quest to encourage drug testing in workplaces.

Speakes said the recommendations being presented to the president, which were prepared by the White House Domestic Policy Council, were mostly unanimous, but that some of them gave him a choice among options.

Senator's AIDS drug claim hit

NEW YORK (AP) — Researchers on Thursday took issue with a claim by Sen. Lowell Weicker that an experimental drug could extend the lives of AIDS patients and ward off related disorders.

The claim was made by Weicker as he argued successfully Wednesday for passage of legislation that would augment AIDS research funding by \$20 million during the next year.

The legislation, if accepted by the House, will make experimental drugs available to as many as 100 severely ill patients with AIDS and AIDS-related diseases (in a different form of the disease). It will also allow the creation of five new AIDS research centers, in addition to 14 now operating at universities across the country, under the auspices of the National Institute of Allergy and Infectious Diseases.

The legislation was welcomed by gay organizations and private groups interested in AIDS research. But Weicker's assertion that a particular AIDS drug called azidothymidine, or AZT, could extend the lives of AIDS victims was challenged by researchers.

"We would hope it would prolong the life of people with the disease," said Dr. Anthony Fauci, coordinator of AIDS research for the National Institutes of Health. But, he said, "you can't say that, because we don't know."

"I think it's a very promising drug," said Dr. Martin Hirsch of the Massachusetts General Hospital, who is studying it. "We know that it inhibits the replication or growth of the virus in the laboratory," he said.

It has also accelerated immune improvement in immune system indicators in people on whom it has been tested, he said. "However, we don't today have any solid evidence that is beneficial only to patients who suffer the earliest course of AIDS," Hirsch said he wouldn't want to characterize it as the best of the AIDS drugs now under study. "There are a lot of other drugs in clinical trials that show promise in the laboratory," he said, among them ribavirin, phosphonoformate and HPA-23, a drug developed in France.

Anti-cancer cell found inside body

WASHINGTON (AP) — Scientists have discovered a powerful anti-cancer cell in the body that they say appears to be 100 times more potent than another used in a promising treatment of cancer-killing cells upon tumors.

Researchers at the National Cancer Institute said Thursday that the new treatment, which combines the cells with two drugs, only has been tested in mice. But it resulted in dramatic cures in a majority of animals with tough colon, lung and liver cancers, they reported.

Dr. Steven A. Rosenberg, the chief researcher, said in an interview that treatment with the new cells, called tumor-infiltrating lymphocytes or TIL, "looks quite promising."

"But I must caution, this has only been done in mice and not humans," Rosenberg said. "Lots of things work in mice that don't work in humans."

The researcher said he has received approval from the cancer institute to begin preliminary human trials and is awaiting an okay from the U.S. Food and Drug Administration.

Last December, Rosenberg received international attention when he published a paper revealing an experimental therapy that turns ordinary white blood cells into cancer killers called lymphokine-activated killer (LAK) cells.

The therapy, which involves using the cells with an immune system hormone called interferon-2, was so promising and in such demand that the cancer institute quickly designated six other medical centers to conduct human trials.

Rosenberg said he is hopeful about the new therapy using TIL cells because it was "effective in the same animal models that predicted LAK and IL-2."

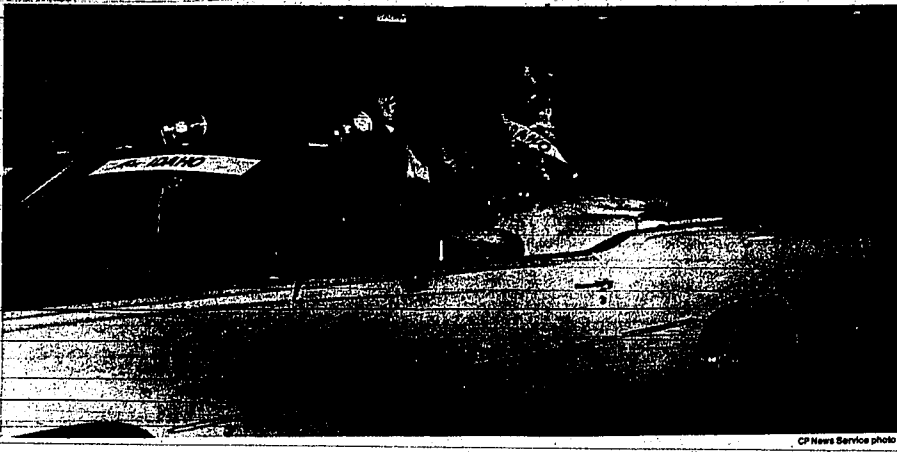

Mine secretary and bookkeeper Joyce Rowlett said Tuesday that although the company has stopped pumping the subsurface water had been reduced from \$25,000 a month to about \$10,000, it is not cost-effective to continue pumping out the mine until silver prices improve.

Clayton Silver discontinued mining operations May 24 when the price of silver dropped under \$5 an ounce.

shielded from national recessions," McDonald said. "We can't say now how true it is all."

Unemployment insurance claims in Cassia County have increased from levels traditionally below the national average to exceeding national levels in 1984, he said. Part of this can be attributed to layoffs in the local food processing companies and layoffs at local large farming operations, he said.

The 1982-83 national recession was "really bad," McDonald said, and local residents stayed in their own communities because there was nowhere better to go. The current recession is affecting only the heartland of America, McDonald said, giving the unemployed a place outside the area to go and find work.

In the last six years the labor force has declined, both county population and school district enrollments have increased, he said.

Midkoid County has surpassed Cassia County in population since 1980, and has exceeded its growth rate, but both counties have seen population increases that surpass most of the Magic Valley, he added.

Southern entrants win preliminaries

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Miss Tennessee Kellye Cash, the grandniece of country singer Johnny Cash, played piano and sang "I'll Be Home" to win a talent award in Miss America, Pageant preliminary competition Thursday.

Miss Virginia Julianne Smith captured the swimsuit trophy.

Miss Cash, 21, of Memphis, has studied voice and piano for 10 years while traveling around the country and abroad with her family and father, a Naval fighter pilot.

The Junior at Memphis State University said she selected her song with Tennessee's "Homecoming '88" celebration in mind.

Miss Smith, 21, of Yorktown, Va., has entertained audiences at Busch Gardens in Williamsburg, Va., and was once selected to tour

Europe and the Midwest with the USO.

In the swimsuit competition, Miss Smith wore a white "super-suit," a simple outfit that has become the most popular style in the Miss America Pageant because of the success enjoyed by previous contestants who used it.

Preliminary competitions in the swimsuit, evening gown and talent divisions are held on the three nights before Saturday's nationally televised pageant finals.

The 51 contestants representing every state and the District of Columbia are divided into three groups. Each group appears every night before the panel of eight judges for competition in one category.

Winners of preliminary talent awards receive

\$3,500 scholarships. Swimsuit winners are awarded \$2,500 scholarships.

Winning a preliminary competition is a sign that a contestant will probably be among the 10 finalists on Saturday.

The names of the women who win the preliminary evening gown competitions are kept secret to heighten the suspense for Saturday night's show, when a successor to Miss America 1986 Susan Akin of Meridian, Miss., will be crowned.

Judges also interview each contestant individually.

On Wednesday night, Miss Missouri Tamara Tungate, 21, of St. Peters, won the swimsuit award and Miss Texas Stephany Samone, 25, of Dallas was the talent winner.

ATLANTIC CITY, N.J. (AP) — Miss America 1987 will be judged more on her talents and her personality than her predecessors were, but there will be no less hoopla surrounding her selection this week in this seaside gambling resort.

Fifty-one contestants from every state and the District of Columbia are rehearsing for the 65-year-old Miss America Pageant, including Miss Idaho, Jennifer Hovey of Twin Falls. Preliminary competitions in talent, evening gown and swimsuit competitions began Wednesday.

The Saturday night finals, in which 10 women compete for the title, will be televised from Convention Hall here live on NBC-TV. Last year's television audience was estimated at 60 million viewers.

The contest's rules have been tightened to try to avoid the kind of embarrassment created by the publication in a men's magazine of nude photos of Miss America 1984, Vanessa Williams, and her subsequent resignation.

In New York, Miss-Ulster-County Jennifer DeLora wasn't permitted to compete for the state crown this year after it was discovered she had appeared nude in a magazine in a 1982 movie titled, "Bad Girls' Dormitory."

woman eligible for the Dr. David B. Allen Medical Scholarship, traditionally given to pre-medical students.

Last year's pageant featured some of the more unusual talents in its history, including performances of karate and clogging, but most of this year's contestants have opted for the traditional ballet dances, and vocal and piano performances.

The top money-making queen since 1980 was Miss America 1983, Debra Moffett, who earned \$180,000, according to scheduling coordinator Robert E. Berman.

Gary Collins, husband of Miss America-1959 Mary Anne-Mobley, will be the master of ceremonies for the fifth year. Kathy Lee Johnson and three former Miss Americas—Dorothy Benham, Susan Powell and Susan Perkins—will be featured performers in the show titled, "Tomorrow's Yours."

The new Miss America will be crowned as Collins crowns "There She Is," a pageant standard from 1955 to 1981, when it was dropped in a dispute with composer Bernie Wayne over money. The song was written last year.

In a new twist, Miss America 1954 Evelyn Jay, the last queen who wasn't crowned before a television audience, will do five, 30-second commentaries during the show.

"It's a tease, really, as to what's in store for the pageant," the spokesman said; he said, to sustain viewer interest and keep people tuned until Miss America is crowned.

The judges will be film and stage star Theodore Bikel, Miss America 1978 Shirley Cochran Barrett, actress Diahann Carroll, television choreographer Sam Haskell, and agent Sam Haskell, and choreographer Dee Dee Wood.

Also scheduled to judge are 1983 Tony Award winner Lillian Monstevitch, Bernard J. Dooloski, dean of the School of Music at the University of Oregon; and Bernadette A. Maguire, the federal government's associate director for national preparedness.

Clayton mine will not be abandoned

CLAYTON (AP) — The Clayton Silver Mine near here isn't being abandoned, and will be reopened when silver prices improve, a company official says.

Mel MacPhee, Wallace, secretary of the mine's board of directors, said Tuesday that although the company has stopped pumping water out of the mine, it won't be abandoned.

"Although flooding may be a death knell for a mine of, say, 6,000 feet in depth, the Clayton mine is not that deep, and we can pump it out when the price of silver improves," MacPhee said.

"To maintain the operation of those huge pumps without an income to offset the cost simply makes no sense at this point," he said.

Mine secretary and bookkeeper Joyce Rowlett said Tuesday that when the electricity bill for pumping the subsurface water had been reduced to \$25,000 a month to around \$10,000, it is not cost-effective to continue pumping out the mine until silver prices improve.

Clayton Silver discontinued mining operations May 21 when the price of silver dropped under \$5 an ounce. Company officials said direct production costs at the time were about \$6 per ounce.

shielded from national recessions," McDonald said. "We can't say now that's true at all."

Unemployment insurance claims in Cassia County have increased from levels traditionally below the national average to exceeding national levels in 1984, he said. Part of this can be attributed to layoffs in the local food processing companies and layoffs at local large farming operations, he said.

The 1982-83 national recession was "equally bad," McDonald said, and local residents stayed in their own communities because there was nowhere better to go. The current recession is affecting only the heartland of America, McDonald said, giving the unemployed a place outside the area to go and find work.

In the last six years the labor force has dropped 6 percent in Cassia County, he said. However, he added that quite a few other Idaho counties have also seen declines in the labor force.

While the Cassia County labor force has declined, both county population growth and school district enrollments have increased, he said. 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High levels of radon gas found in homes at Hanford

PORTLAND (AP) — A federal survey has found high levels of the radioactive gas radon in houses along the Columbia River below the Hanford nuclear reservation.

A federal geologist says the radon almost certainly stems from natural sources, however.

The Bonneville Power Administration has been measuring radon levels in private houses it has weatherized in Washington, Oregon, Montana and Idaho, and the U.S. Geological Survey in Golden, Colo., has been comparing their findings to known sources of radon gas.

The houses with high radon levels are high on the bank of the Columbia River, which virtually rules out the possibility that the gas comes from leakage at Hanford, said James K. Otton, a Geological Survey scientist.

"It has been in operation for only a few decades, and it's been several tens of thousands of years since the Columbia River was depositing sediments at that elevation several hundred feet above the level of the river," said Otton.

"There is really no physical way for the radon levels that are indeed in the groundwater system in various isolated places around the Hanford nuclear plant to be transported by water to the sites where the high radon levels are being found," Otton said.

He said the high radon levels probably were caused by uranium-laden sediment deposited high on the riverbanks by the ancient Columbia River.

But he added that this particular time there's really no way of distinguishing between naturally generated radionuclides that could be causing the elevated radon levels and the potential for having Hanford causing it.

Radon is an invisible gas that usually comes from the natural breakdown of uranium in soil or water, but some cases of radon contamination have been caused by uranium mining deposits and other wastes from nuclear industries.

Radon gas dissipates harmlessly in the air, but it can seep into houses through the foundations and accumulate to unhealthy concentrations.

Mike Piper, manager of the BPA radon monitoring program, said the federal power-marketing agency was surprised to find that 5 percent to 10 percent of the houses it checked along the Columbia Gorge and in Milton-Freewater contained more than a picocuries of radon per liter of air.

The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency says that breathing a picocurie of radon over a period of years poses about the same risk of lung cancer as smoking a half pack of cigarettes daily.

TWIN FALLS.—What I Did on My Summer Vacation. By Joey Johnson. The College of Southern Idaho basketball star didn't spend his summer playing pickup games at his home in San Pedro, Calif. In fact, he wasn't even close to California.

Johnson traveled and competed in the high jump at various track and field events throughout the United States and Europe, setting records along the way.

How high can Johnson jump? Take a tape measure, find a wall, get a step ladder and put a mark at the 7-foot, 5 3/4-inch mark. Now imagine a college sophomore with little training in the sport coming in and jumping over that mark. That's what Johnson did on his summer vacation. Johnson's first hop to the top came at the National Junior College Athletic Association Track and Field Championships in May at Odessa, Texas.

Competing for CSI, Johnson leaped 7-3 3/4 in winning that event in his first year of high jumping in college. Before he came to CSI, there was a time in high school that Johnson did do some high jumping.

"Exactly three times," he said. In June, Johnson was off to the national TAC meet in Baltimore where he set a TAC outdoor record of 7-5 in the high jump, just one-half inch shy of the American junior outdoor record. Johnson was on a roll, so he went for the record, setting the bar at 7-7.

"I clicked off my heels," he said. With three more meets to go, Johnson had the record within his grasp.

Over the Fourth of July weekend, he set his sights on the sunny beaches of Florida at the Junior Pan American meet. One thing went wrong: Florida isn't always sunny. Johnson couldn't reach the heights he did in Maryland, only clearing 7-7 and placing third in the final.

By Buchanan, Romania, Johnson finally broke the American junior outdoor record in a dual meet against Romania with a leap of 7-5 3/4. But just as things were looking good for Johnson, he came in for a rough landing in Athens.

Each country at the Junior World Games had at least one high jumper, and did so easily. But in the second day of competition, Johnson finished in sixth place in the final with a leap of 7-1.

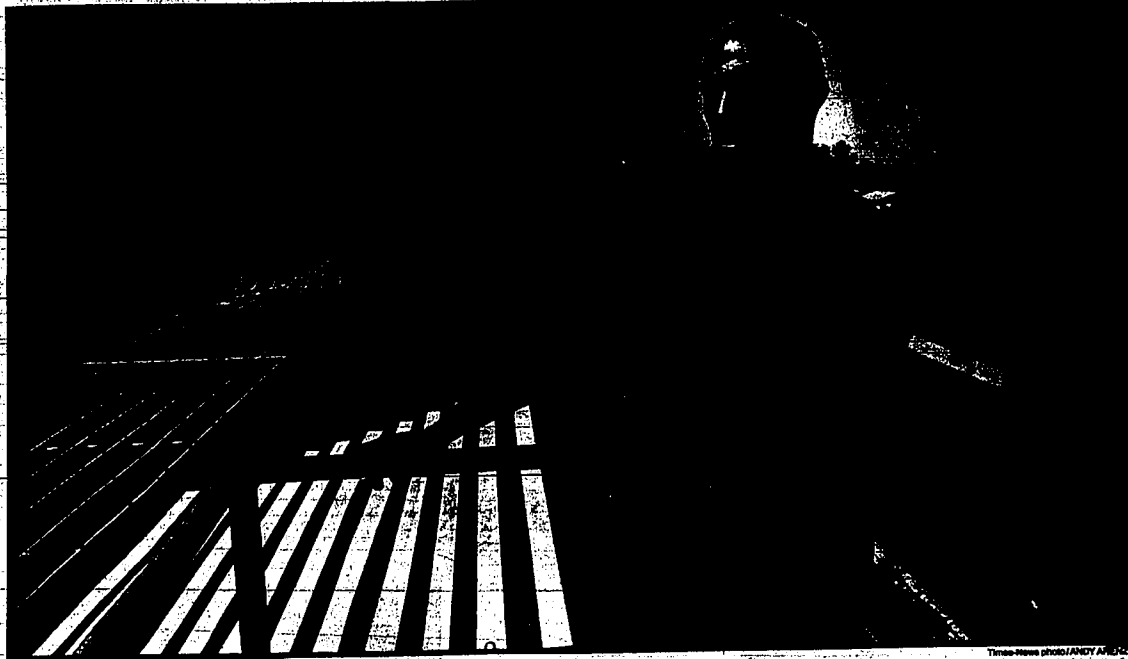
"I just wasn't there," said Johnson, who had a hard time concentrating on his jumps that day in the Greek capital.

"I would ask them (the coaches) to help," he said. "I wasn't asking them to change my style, I guess I was kind of depressed. That's why I said I wasn't there."

Every Magic Valley basketball fan who wasn't hibernating last winter knows of Johnson's leaping ability on the CSI basketball team that won the Region 18 junior college championship and finished fourth at the national tournament. Johnson became

widely known for getting his head above the rim, which left some people wondering how high he could go in clearing a horizontal bar.

"I like to see how a jumper like Dominique (Wilkins) or a (Michael) Jordan was born leaper. One person who watched Johnson's acrobatic stunts and jams last season was CSI track coach Rick Neill.

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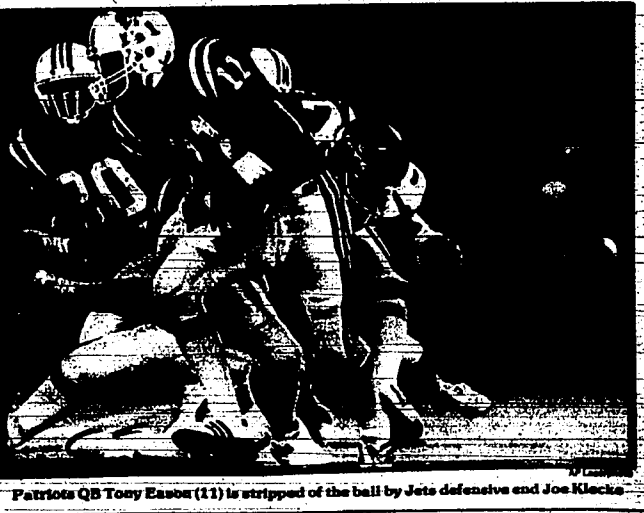

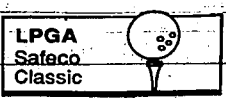

Credit card cap proposal falters

WASHINGTON (AP) — A House banking panel rejected a ceiling on credit-card interest rates Thursday, with critics warning that such a nationwide cap might not work—and could backfire against low-income cardholders.

The concept was likened by Rep. Doug Bernard Jr., D-Ga., to rent controls that he said dry up available housing and insurance premium limits that result in a shortage of coverage.

"This inevitably hurts many of the people it's supposed to help," Bernard said before the Banking, Finance and Consumer Affairs Committee's consumer subcommittee vote of 7-5 to reject the bill.

The measure, sponsored by the panel's chairman, Rep. Frank Annunzio, D-Ill., would cap credit-card interest rates at eight percentage points above the yield on one-year Treasury securities. If the ceiling were in effect now, the top rate that could be charged for unpaid balances would be 14.65.

With perhaps three weeks of legislative action left this year and the Senate yet to start work on such a plan, the subcommittee action may represent the finale of the 1986 drive to cap credit-card interest.

Annunzio said after the vote, however, that it represents "the first round of the battle to bring down the high credit-card interest rates" and that he would offer the bill as an amendment to any suitable banking bill in the full committee or, if that failed, on the House floor.

In a statement he read to the

vote, Annunzio said it was "sad that many Americans feel that Congress is ineffectual or even controlled by lobbyists."

"And a vote today to impose a ceiling on credit-card interest rates will prove that that is not the case," Annunzio said. "That is why we are fortunate today to be able to vote on this issue."

Following the vote, Edward L. Vingling, executive director for government relations of the American Bankers Association, said his group was "pleased Congress continues to reject the notion that price controls should be placed on a competitive industry such as credit cards."

"Price controls—only make sense when a monopolist controls the market," Vingling said, adding that Congress would not be truly helping 15,000 credit-card issuers in the marketplace, monopolistic conditions do not exist."

Rep. John Hiler, R-Ind., a critic of the concept, told the Virginia panel with 103 percent interest on credit-card balances often had been cited as proof that rates of 20 percent and higher are not needed. But he said that in such a plan, the subcommittee action might come to an end under the plan and that interest might be charged from the time of the purchase.

Under Annunzio's bill, Hiler said, cards might be issued only with an interest rate of 10 percent. "He said the current custom, under which buyers do not start paying interest until the end of the billing period, might come to an end under the plan and that interest might be charged from the time of the purchase."

Sudden upsurge in interest rates sends stock prices plunging

NEW YORK (AP) — Waves of selling rocked the stock market Thursday, sending prices into a record-breaking decline in the busiest day ever at the New York Stock Exchange.

The slide was attributed largely to the recent sudden upsurge in interest rates and to computer-program selling by professional investors that one analyst said reached "unprecedented proportions."

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks plunged 86.61 points to 1,792.89, eclipsing the previous record point loss of 61.67 points on July 7 of this year.

The 461-percent drop in the average came nowhere near the 12.9 percent decline that occurred Oct. 28, 1929 in the worst day of the Great Crash of 1929, but it was the largest point loss of 61.67 points on July 7 of this year.

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Overall stock-market losses for the day amounted to \$110.82 billion, as measured by an index maintained by the investment firm of Wilshire Associates.

Volume on the NYSE, at \$7.57 billion, surpassed the previous high of \$26.57 billion set on Aug. 3, 1984.

Analysts said investors were selling stocks across the board as the rise of interest rates—that began more than a week ago—continued.

In the credit markets, prices of long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, dropped more than \$200 for every \$1,000 price.

The drop came only one week after the Dow Jones industrials closed at a new high of 1,919.71. Analysts said selling picked up momentum as investors saw their profits from recent months rapidly eroding.

The rise in interest rates has been ascribed to waning hopes that the Federal Reserve might take any fur-

ther steps in the near future to relax its credit policy.

The selloff spread into almost every corner of the market. All 30 of the stocks in the Dow Jones industrial average declined. And in the overall tally of NYSE-listed issues, losers outnumbered gainers by more than 10 to 1.

UTILITY, financial and other issues that are especially sensitive to changing interest-rate expectations were hit hard. But so were a wide range of other stocks, including many whose names that made the most-active list.

International Business Machines fell 4% to 139 1/2; Exxon 3% to 66 1/2; Coca-Cola 2 1/2 to 34 1/2; General Electric 2 1/2 to 24 1/2; Ford Motor 2 1/2 to 35; and Philip Morris 2 1/2 to 65 1/2.

USX, the day's volume leader, traded higher for a time as traders discussed the company as a serious potential takeover target. Financier Robert Holmes a Court of Australia

has expressed his intention to buy a stake in the USX stock. But late in the session USX stood at 20 1/2, down from Wednesday's close.

CBS fell 6 to 134 in the wake of long-term management changes that appeared to end speculation on Wall Street that the company might be a takeover candidate.

The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks dropped 6.37 to 135.25.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 271.92 million shares.

Standard & Poor's Index of 400 Industrial Stocks fell 19.94 to 2,268.48, and the S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 11.88 at 235.18.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market lost 13.45 to 353.34. At the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 260.32, down 10.01.

Judge fines turkey producer \$871,000

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A judge Thursday slapped Norbest Inc. with an \$871,000 fine, called the largest ever against a U.S. poultry industry, for selling waterlogged turkey meat to the federal school lunch program.

The Utah-based producer pleaded guilty in U.S. District Court to one count each of mixing water with shipments of meat destined for school lunches and defrauding the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

"This is the largest criminal fine ever assessed in the U.S. poultry industry," said U.S. Attorney Brent Ward. "The penalties imposed should be an example to the food processing industry."

The 55-year-old company, which was charged Wednesday, entered the guilty plea as part of an agreement with the U.S. attorney's office.

Judge David Windsor sentenced the company to 18 months probation and a \$871,000 fine—\$600,000 counts and \$275,000 on the first count.

The larger figure represented the amount USDA officials estimated the government was owed for the national meat label with water. The \$250,000 included \$160,000 to cover the cost of the investigation and \$90,000 in punitive sanctions.

The USDA estimated that from September to December of 1985, nearly 22,000 pounds of turkey meat had been diverted by plant employees from shipments destined for schools and nearly the same amount of water had been substituted, said Assistant U.S. Attorney Richard Lambert.

While acknowledging that Norbest officials were unaware of the scheme, which was blamed on a plant supervisor, Ward chastised them for what he called a "lack of hands-on leadership and management."

Norbest President Owen W. Summison said the company had accepted the terms of the agreement because "it must take final responsibility."

"It was a great shock to all of us that a small group of employees was able to devise a system of concealing the diversion of products from company management," USDA inspectors and Norbest's own quality control people, he said.

Agents of the FBI and USDA raided the Norbest Turkey Growers plant in the central Utah town of Salina last December after being tipped by an unnamed female employee, Lambert said.

She told authorities thousands of pounds of processed turkey products had been adulterated with water and made into burgers for schools in Iowa, Nevada, Washington and California, he said.

In one case, turkey meat intended for school lunches was allowed to sit too long at the plant and water inspectors caught the meat before it was shipped.

Ward said in some cases quality control stickers directing that meat not be processed were removed, and in other cases a chlorine solution was added to such meat to "freshen it up."

The meat was then processed and prepared for shipment before it was caught by USDA inspectors, he said.

"Although the condition of this meat and the presence of the chlorine solution could have jeopardized the health of consumers, there is no evidence that anyone contaminated product," he said.

In addition, water was added to some products, intended for supermarkets, Ward said.

Lambert said the investigation

revealed similar circumstances had occurred in other turkey processing plants around the country. "But how widespread it is we do not know," he said.

Jack Olinger Harpine, former plant supervisor, was responsible for instructing employees to replace turkey meat with water, Lambert said.

Harpine, indicted last March, pleaded guilty in August to one count of food adulteration and one count of fraud. He was sentenced to six months in jail and ordered to pay a \$5,000 fine.

"Two other employees pleaded guilty to misdemeanor charges," Lambert said.

The Norpro plant, a joint venture between Norbest and the Utah Turkey Growers, was closed by Norbest the day after the raid, causing the company to lose some \$1 million, said Norbest attorney Rand W. Wilson.

The section of the plant which handles whole turkeys was reopened in June, but the processing section has remained closed. Agents found no evidence of wrongdoing in the whole-bird section.

Norbest since has dissolved the joint venture.

Business reduces investment plans

WASHINGTON (AP) — US businesses, beset by a sluggish economy and tax-law uncertainty, have reduced their investment spending by 2.5 percent in this year, the biggest cut since the last recession, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said a survey completed in August showed that businesses, after adjusting for inflation, plan to spend \$376.47 billion this year on capital improvement projects, down from \$386.32 billion in 1985.

It would be the first decline in business investment since 1983 and the biggest drop since a 7.9 percent plunge in 1982. Business spending on expansion and replacement rose 8.3 percent in 1985 after surging 13.8 percent in 1984.

Economists blamed the weak

economy, outlook in oil and gas drilling, and uncertainty over changes in the tax law for the steep decline in capital investment plans.

"Many analysts said they believed the investment decline will be even worse than the survey plans indicate, throwing further doubt on the Reagan administration's forecast of a downward revision of economic growth in the second half of the year."

The new estimate of spending represents a second round of revision from the previous survey taker in April and May. At that time, businesses were planning a somewhat smaller 1.3 percent cut in investment this year.

The downward revision from an already dismal figure certainly isn't encouraging for economic growth.

Look into HMOs for possible savings

The next time you see a bill and wonder why you are paying so much, think of this:

According to the Health Care Financing Administration, in 1985 the national health care expenditure was \$235 billion.

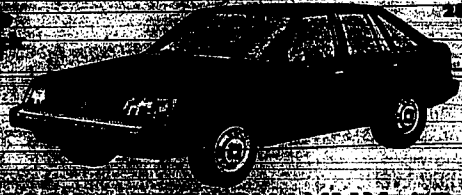
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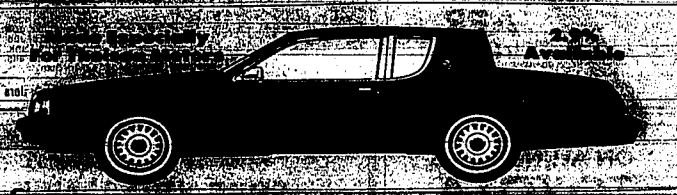
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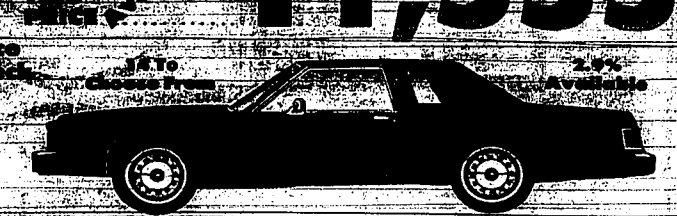

Sun Valley's not-so-famous target of authors' Gold Book

Guyot, Van Pelt poke fun at quirky characters lifestyles

SUN VALLEY — "My premise is that when anyone goes on vacation they're not there to be the same. They're going there to let loose; let out the secret side. What we're saying to them is that we live it in Sun Valley," says Lani Guyot, co-author of "The Sun Valley Gold Book." Written in an "outrageously tongue-in-cheek style, the book profiles Sun Valley characters whom a visitor would be likely to meet and places where the tourist would feel free to let out the "secret side."

Allison Van Pelt, Guyot's partner in the venture, adds, "We really love Sun Valley. We want people who come here to really love it, too. We want them to have the opportunity to really experience it."

"If you spend all of your time in the Duchin Room or sitting in your hotel room at the lodge you're missing Sun Valley and it's too neat to miss."

Tourists curious to find out the authors' view of the Duchin Room will find this Gold Book definition: "A sophisticated bar and nightclub featuring the talented Joe Foss Trio 'teasy, danceable jazz,' this is where the grand elite of Sun Valley gather. Affectionately called the 'Wrinkle Room,' the Duchin Room is located in the Sun Valley Lodge."

The two authors became friends two years ago, in spite of their obvious differences in temperament and background. Guyot is a perky Polynesian, born in Samoa and educated in convents all over Europe. Perhaps to counterbalance the austerity of this regime, her father-supervised her summers, introducing her to the seamer side of European culture. One result of this schizoid upbringing is a well-developed sense of the absurd, which sparkles in her dark eyes and bubbles frequently

into her conversation. Van Pelt was raised in Florida in the most proper Southern belle style. A debutante, she went to all the right schools. Tall and energetic, she's a natural, outdoorsy girl who enjoys hiking, biking and riding.

Van Pelt has a master's degree in communications research, has taught at the college level and done consulting work for corporations. She works now as a junior high English teacher in Halley.

Guyot says her career as a writer and performer began at age 10 when she wrote the song, "Wild," recorded by the Shirazies. She has written and performed in commercials, including writing and singing the Chiquita Banana jingle in TV commercials, and writing for CBS specials and programs, such as "Room 222" and numerous specials for CBS.

Van Pelt says writing the book was a lark which started one dull, fall day in 1985. "Their goal was to have fun and give tourists an alternative view of their favorite place on Earth. They both agree that the people in Sun Valley make it special."

"If you go to a resort do you want to meet the most boring people or the most exciting?" asks Guyot.

"I think we have a nice collection of people who have one thing in their life, who are still doing things, who are exciting and enjoy life. They represent the kind of people who would leave a career or a big city and come to the mountains."

Actually, doing the book turned out to be a frenzied, exciting experience. Van Pelt said that it was exactly one month from the night they came up with the idea to the day they delivered it to the printer. They were determined to have the book on the shelves for the Christmas season, the peak of the tourist season in Sun Valley. The book made it to local bookstores by Dec. 20.

Their book makes wry and often ribald digs at locals: "Glorious Glenda, the sleazy lady from Gilroy's cafe, probably—Ketchikan—been loved character. There is no bound to her humor, her compassion or her bustline."

In spite of such comments, the authors say they've received no complaints, except from those who were left out. The book has made hometown celebrities of local bartenders, bus boys, entertainers, policemen, innkeepers and ski instructors, who now are sometimes asked for autographs.

Guyot and Van Pelt take this as evidence that people are having fun with their book, as they had hoped would happen.

Both women are now working on projects of their own. Van Pelt has completed a romance for those who can still wait for the kiss on the last page. 31A2

When she isn't busy singing jazz locally or writing ad jingles, Guyot works on two novels: "Algo," a spy thriller, and "Exiles on the Last," a story of a man doing everything he can to fight tradition and still remain within the law.

But the collaboration will continue. They aren't saying what their next project will be, Guyot says. "I have a fantasy of writing a novel with Allison. She has the craziest responses in foreign situations. If you tell Allison, 'We're going to Nicaragua to deal with some terrorists,' she picks extra 'hail poison and hoodlums' whether to bring her white heels or her green heels."

Radio ready for quantum hi-tech leap

NAB study predicts increase in use of satellites, computers

NEW ORLEANS — During the next decade, U.S. radio audiences can look forward to satellite receivers in their cars, voice synthesizers as morning deejays and newscasters, and at least 2,000 more AM and FM stations.

A major new study of high-tech radio use among the nation's radio stations, released here Thursday at a broadcasters convention, says that the granddaddy of the electronic mass media is in the throes of a great leap forward.

The next 10 years may see a 20 percent increase in the number of radio stations, a continued proliferation of satellite-delivered radio networks, radio subscriptions for cable-TV systems and the widespread use of computers and compact discs, a study by the National Association of Broadcasters said.

Increased use of computers in the recent past has had a dramatic impact on radio stations, including an increasing use of digital technology that is leading to more and more creative programming and production.

Among the results of the study, which included a survey this summer of 500 radio stations across the country, were:

• Stations use of satellite will continue through the 1980s, but by 1995 newer fiber-optic transmission systems may be in wide use. Advances in technology are leading toward the development of flat home rooftop satellite-receiving antennas and, even, satellite receivers for automobiles.

• Growth among AM radio stations will be especially strong. Current efforts, including plans to expand the number of frequencies allocated to AM broadcasters, could result in more than 500 new AM stations by 1995. The association estimates that the country will have nearly 12,000 radio stations by the mid-1990s.

• By the end of the decade, most music stations will be using compact discs, played on machines capable of handling as many as 100 discs at a time. Computers will allow station programmers to select playlists and lead to highly automated station operations. Nearly 20 percent of the radio stations in America already use compact discs, the association said, and one Washington station has a 3,000-disc library.

LOS ANGELES — "These are monumental works and they need to be kept alive," says filmmaker Franco Zeffirelli. "It would like to be able to pass them along to the next generation, which, I hope, will not be as materialistic as this one."

"I showed it to a young audience, and I was amazed by the reaction," the director reported. "They were absolutely shattered by the story; one kid was even sobbing. It was one of the last plays for Shakespeare. It was one of the last operas for Verdi. I hope it is not the last for me, but I feel that it is an art work of my maturity."

NEA honors 13 folk artists with fellowships, tributes

WASHINGTON (AP) — Thirteen folk artists from a Czech-American lacemaker from Kansas to a Pueblo potter from New Mexico, were honored by the government Thursday as "men and women who have made our nation richer by their steadfast pursuit of excellence."

At a Capitol Hill reception, the 1986 winners of National Heritage Fellowships, received certificates from the National Endowment for the Arts, \$5,000 cash awards, a letter of congratulations from President Reagan and tributes from members of Congress.

Frank Hodsoll, the endowment chairman, said each artist had "labored to keep the particular stream-of-beauty-which-identifies the art form alive and growing."

Rep. Cathy Long, D-La., praised the endowment, an independent federal agency, whose \$155 million budget finances grants to a wide variety of artists and cultural projects. "This small expenditure does more for peace than all our stockpiles of weapons," she said.

Each of the winners was present except for Jennie Thunaut, a Tiigil blanket weaver from Haines, Alaska, who died recently at age 94. Her award was accepted by her daughter, Agnes Bellingier of Juneau.

Many of the folk artists performed their music and displayed their crafts at the reception. They will appear at a public concert celebrating their awards, with author Studs Terkel as hosts.

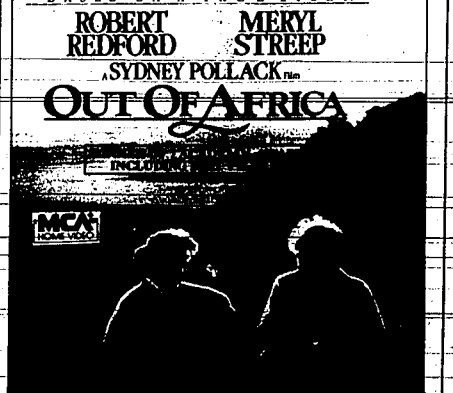

HEARTBURN (R). This is a rattlingly simply and superficial film that is so good it does not have any individually delicious moments. How could it not, with Meryl Streep, Jack Nicholson, Stockard Channing, Richard Masury and Maureen Stapleton on the premises? Just recalling some of its high points can bring a daily glow of pleasure hours later. But strung-together moments aren't a movie's bread and butter. It is stuck in rich talents.

THE KARATE KID, PART II (PG). This sequel to 1984's teen-chippy-sucky hit is another mass-audience action fairy tale (but without the obsession with virility, cheap cynicism and endless kick count of the "Cobra" and "Raw Deal"). Director John Avildsen and writer Robert Mark Kamen send Ralph Macchio's kid and Pat Morita's implisly sage martial arts mentor, Miyagi, to Okinawa; there they stumble into a Chinese Communist war movie, a weekend of action-adventure, and a ludicrously contrived climax — but also into some unexpected moral, cultural and sentiment. Morita, once again, is marvelous, and you can even cheer for the heroes at the end without feeling sorry.

NOTHING IN COMMON (PG). What starts out like a typical Tom Hanks yuppie comedy ends up being a surprisingly affecting account of a son coming to terms with a sour, burnt-

'Summer': a rueful comedy

HOLLYWOOD — Every once in a while, when the atmosphere is very, very clear, it is possible to see the "green ray" at sunset, a rare moment, one's perception of both and others is greatly heightened. At least that is what Jules Verne apparently believed, for this is what happens at the end of his romantic novel "The Green Ray."

A group of people are discussing Verne and this phenomenon in Eric Rohmer's exquisite new film "Summer" when the lovely but lonely Delphine (Marie Riviere) overhears them as she strolls aimlessly along the beach at Biarritz. It ever there was someone in need of a green ray, it is Delphine.

This latest installment in Rohmer's wise and delightful "Comedies and Provects" series pulls one immediately into that inviting world of contemporary French films in which there are sunny gatherings of family and friends. Everyone is "tres, tres charmant," the children beautiful, the adults elegant in a relaxed, unstudied way. Nobody is old, nobody is so much as a pound overweight. Every detail of decor, every item of dress, every meal and drink is the epitome of simple, sophisticated good taste.

It is all so wonderfully "natural" you could choke or suffocate.

Delphine does not do either but she does cry a lot. Shattered from the breakup of a romance, she is having a devil of a time figuring out what to do with her vacation, something lots of single people struggle with year in and year out. But how to make sense of her feelings and decide where to go and why? All these effortlessly pulled-together types offer sympathy, advice, sometimes even criticism, but they confront only superficially the pain their friend is experiencing.

Rohmer ticks off the days, calendar style, as Delphine thrashes about, using up her vacation in misery. She goes off to Cherbourg with her pretty friend Francoise (Rosette) and her family but cannot get into their spirit of fun. A return to the mountains where she spent so much time with her former lover turns into a far worse experience. As a last resort she accepts a friend's offer of a Biarritz apartment.

'Voice' eyes Washington paper

If alternative paper succeeds in D.C., it will be against all odds

WASHINGTON — Against all odds, Washington may finally get a Voice of its own.
After months of mulberry rumors and fevered speculation, the cat is now out of the corporate bag: "It's actually very simple," says David Schneiderman, publisher and editor in chief of The Village Voice. "We want to put out a terrific alternative paper in Washington."

Little has been decided beyond the name — The Washington Voice — and a rough recipe for the editorial mix. But Schneiderman and his boss, Village Voice owner Leonard Stern, are determined to launch it by mid-1987. They hope for sales of 20,000 to 25,000 a week within the first year at a cover price of 30 cents.

A modest enough goal. Yet if it succeeds, it will be in spite of a 10-year local tradition that has taken on the force of natural law: namely, that it's far easier to breed pandas than to sustain an alternative paper here in River City.

Washington is like the Vietnam of publishing, says Jeff Stein, a former editor of both the City Paper and The Washington Weekly and a 20-year veteran of the mainstream press. "People get sucked in by troop and weapon by weapon. Pretty soon while armies disappear down some circulation rat hole, The City Paper is like the Vietnam, and The Post is like China."

Chuck Freund, former editor of The Washington Tribune and a free-lance writer whose popular City Paper column, Pulse, has just been snapped up by The New Republic, agrees. "People have always marched in saying, 'We're going to be the next Village Voice.' But it's very difficult to convince advertisers that you're going to be around." And for excellent reason: "Almost every next Village Voice has become the last in a long roster of tabloid turkeys."

A dozen hopeful journals have come and gone since the mid-'60s, when a second counterculture spawned the Washington Free Press, which begat Quicksilver Times, which begat Woodwind, an all-arts weekly. In the '70s there were Unicorn Times, the Washington Times (not to be confused with the current daily of the same name) and Newsworks, followed by The Washington Tribune, City Paper and most recently, The Washington Weekly. They published hundreds of thousands of earnest, impassioned pages but only the free City Paper still survives.

So why is The Voice nose-diving into this proven quagmire? "Two reasons," says Schneiderman. "First, [Voice owner Leonard] Stern was down there. When he goes to places, he looks at all the publications. And what he saw a few months ago was a journalistic niche about a tabloid wide. He told me we should start a paper there. By a happy coincidence, The Voice is about to close a deal with the Journal Newspapers to print The Village Voice in Virginia."

Second, Schneiderman, who had lived here in the '60s while a graduate student at Johns Hopkins School of Advanced International Studies, liked the town and its possibilities. Chief among them: a restless, affluent young populace, and advertisers desperate for a left-pricing alternative to big-paper ad space. So a few years ago he approached representatives of Rupert Murdoch, then owner of The Voice, about starting a Washington paper. "They said, 'No way — we're having enough trouble handling you people up here.'"

Previous weeklies have flopped. Schneiderman avers, either because they never quite got their focus clearly ("the elites of The Washington Weekly"), or because "they tried to be a Village Voice of sorts — a left-wing, scruffy counterculture paper" in an eight-county demographic middle of the Beltway suburbs. To-fro-ling suburbanites and chary pin-stripe lawyers. By contrast, the new Voice will follow "two basic rules. Don't spend a lot of money starting it up. And know who your audience is. We learned that from Rupert's people — they have very simple notions of publishing."

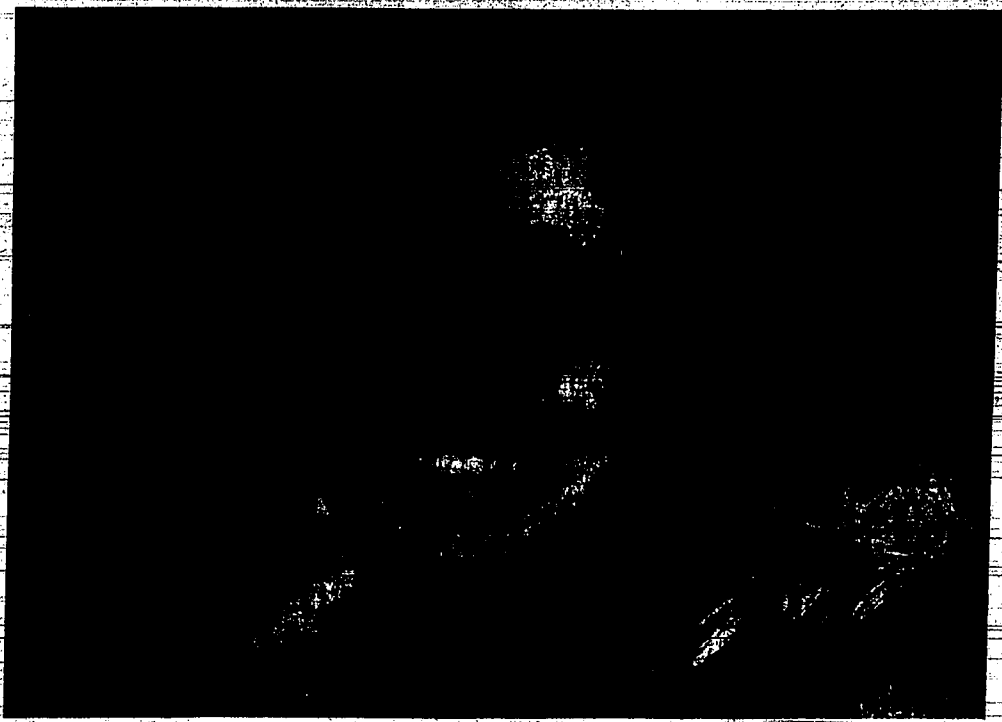
Ascertaining who those readers are, however, may be anything but simple. Historically, the Washington alternative audience has been harder to find than Warren Burger's hairline.

identifiable alternative culture," Freund believes. It lacks the kind of well-defined and cohesive subcultures — campus or other iconoclastic cultures, ethnic communities — that traditionally support alternative weeklies. "That kind of common identity that says, 'We're Washington's outsiders together.' People who live both a mainstream and an outside life."

James Glassman agrees. Formerly publisher of The New Republic, an executive at U.S. News & World Report and president of the late Washington Weekly, he founded a weekly tab called Figaro in New Orleans in 1972. "One of the things that led to our success" was the shared background of the readers. We developed a tone that fed on that," Figaro printed reviews of good necking areas and outrageous ratings of Mardi gras floats; generally playing on the shared experiences and perceptions of its readers.

"But Washington has none of that." "It's a fractured community," says Richard Harrington, founding editor of Woodwind and later editor of Unicorn Times. "Capitol Hill and Georgetown are very different from Dupont Circle, which is different from Adams Morgan. Whereas in New York you have borough-size interest in issues. That kind of community involvement can't be transported here." Worse yet, says Harrington, now a reporter at The Washington Post, "this is an extraordinarily conservative town. It rolls up its carpets early" — anathema to a periodical that trades heavily on night life.

Gen. Patton's troubled last days become subject of a CBS drama

If the 1970 film classic: "Patton" was the study of an American hero at his peak, "The Last Days of Patton" is a study of what happens when that hero is put out to pasture.

"The country desperately needed Patton's leadership at the Battle of the Bulge," says director Delbert Mann, in a telephone interview from London where he was filming "The Ted Kennedy Jr. Story" for NBC. "But when the war was over, there was no place for a hard-driving military man. In effect, Patton had no reason for living. He had become an anachronism."

Mann insists that "The Last Days" is not a sequel. "It's a different look at Gen. George Patton's character. He was multidimensional. Although he was probably dyslexic and couldn't spell, he was quite well-read and a poet. He was also a man who inspired tremendous loyalty from his friends and family and tremendous animosity from his enemies."

George C. Scott — sandpaper-voiced and curmudgeonly — reprises his Oscar-winning role from the 1970 film. "George had a lot to say about the development of the script in the early stages," says Mann. "He did not want to represent anything that was utilized in the original film."

Indeed, "The Last Days" uses many flashbacks, but no footage from the 1970 film. Mann says he made a point of not seeing the original film until after shooting was completed.

"The Last Days" details the final six months of Patton's stormy life. The film begins in June 1945 after the Allied victory over the Germans. Patton has been installed as military governor of Bavaria, but he was still itching for action. His transfer to the Pacific — where the war was still raging — was denied. Suspicious of the Russians, Patton wanted to organize a combined American and Germany army to pursue the war into the Soviet Union.

This outspoken, minority view distressed his superiors, as did Patton's insistence on staffing the Bavarian government with former Nazis. Ultimately, Gen. Dwight Eisenhower, the Supreme Allied Commander in Europe, forced a showdown. In October, Patton was

transferred to a meaningless post as commander of a unit of clerks. On Dec. 9 he was paralyzed in an automobile accident and he died 12 days later. The film spends an inordinate amount of time focusing on the general as he lay helpless on his hospital bed.

"The love of a military background came easily to Patton," says Mann, a veteran director whose credits include the TV classic "Marty" and the Doris Day-Rock Hudson romp "Love Come Back." "His

grandfather was a colonel in the Confederate Army who died in battle. I think Patton had a desire deep down to die gloriously in battle as his grandfather had done. So his ignominious end — having his neck broken in a car accident and then dying slowly by inches must have been heartbreaking to him."

Eva Marie Saint plays Patton's wife, Beatrice. Richard Dysart plays Gen. Dwight Eisenhower and Murray Hamilton plays Patton's loyal aide, Gen. Hap Gay. The film is based on a book by Ladislas Farago, who also wrote the material on which the 1970 film was based.

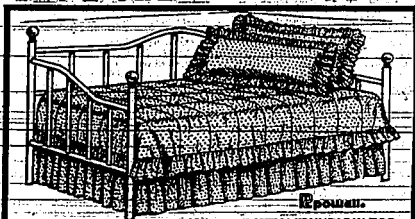

ABC's 'Winds of War' sputters; NBC wins a crucial promo week

NEW YORK — "The Winds of War" whipped up a ratings storm in 1983, but lost its gusto in its first rerun last week, dropping ABC to third place in prime time during a crucial promotional period for the new TV season.

A.C. Nielsen Co. figures released Tuesday showed that NBC used its high-rated comedies to win the week of Sept. 1-7, the last week before new series start trickling into the schedule.

NBC averaged a 13.6 rating to CBS' 11.9 and ABC's 11.2. A single ratings point equals 674,000 homes with television.

The 18-hour "Winds of War" stands as the No. 3 miniseries of all time, averaging a 38.6 rating and 53 percent share of the audience watching TV at the time in its first broadcast. The rebroadcast of the first three hours Sunday produced a mere Nielsen blip, an 8.6 rating, 14 share and a ranking of 51st out of 62 shows.

Network researchers consider a 40 percent dropoff normal for miniseries repeats, but Herman Wouk's "Winds of War" fell 74 percent.

"The longer ones drop off the most," said Dave Poltrach, CBS vice president for research. "This was not one of the weeks you want to have lower than average ratings."

ABC had hoped the epic would attract larger audiences to see promotional messages for the network's new series. The miniseries, five remaining — three-hour installments were set for this week, culminating in the Sunday finale.

"The closeness to the season makes it bad," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "Promos in August don't have much impact, but awareness closer to the season determines whether or not people will watch."

Many new shows will be introduced before the 1986-87 prime-time season officially begins Sept. 22.

"We're somewhat disappointed," said Marvin Mord, ABC's vice president for marketing and research services. "We were forecasting shares in the low 20s."

Mord said ABC took a gamble,

particularly because of the 18-hour viewer commitment. "If this were a three-hour movie, it would have done much better," he said.

But Mord said low ratings would have no impact on Wouk's sequel, "War and Remembrance," scheduled for 30 hours in 1988-89.

"The ratings will be strong," he said. "This was just like repeats of 'Dallas' and 'Dynasty.' The serialized-form repeats poorly. People say they've already seen it, so why watch it again?"

Comedy is a proven exception to the viewers' rerun resistance. Once again, "The Cosby Show" led NBC's Thursday comedies into four of Nielsen's first five slots.

"The Cosby Show" had a 26.4 rating, followed by "Family Ties," "Cheers," CBS' "Murder, She Wrote," and "Night Court." Then came NBC's "The Golden Girls," CBS' movie "Secrets-Mother, & Daughter," and ABC's "Growing Pains," which tied for seventh,

ABC's "Who's the Boss?" and CBS' "60 Minutes."

CBS, hit by recent reports of a possible corporate takeover and dissension in the news division, was cheered by a 12th place finish for its critically acclaimed two-hour documentary, "48 Hours on Crack Street."

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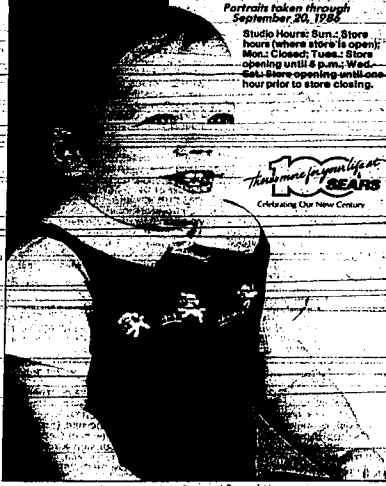

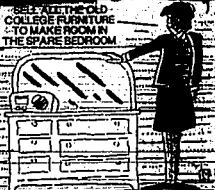

'Star Trek' sees 20th anniversary: An idea that lives long, prospers

LOS ANGELES — "Star Trek" is 20 years old and shows every indication of surviving an additional 100 years to the time the Starship Enterprise leaves Earth to seek out new worlds and boldly go where no man has gone before.

Paramount Pictures threw a huge 20th birthday party Monday on the sound stages where the fourth "Star Trek" movie was filmed, testimony to the belief that the Enterprise is still exploring the universe with Capt. James T. Kirk, Mr. Spock and the rest of the crew.

About 1,500 people packed the set, and as waiters in Star Trek costumes served the gathering, many guests seized the opportunity to sit for a moment in the captain's chair on the bridge.

As the show's creator, Gene Roddenberry, watched the guests mingle, he said, "I'm surprised and pleased. I really planned to have a show only a few people would remember. I never thought there would be this attention and adulation."

The party was for the original cast, every guest star who has ever appeared on the TV series or the movies, all the writers, directors, producers and people who've worked on the shows during the past 20 years.



"It's our way of offering a big thank you for the success," said Eddie Egan, a spokesman for Paramount.

The original 79 episodes from the 1966-69 series still attract huge audiences around the world and the new movie, "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," is set for Christmas release.

Paramount is considering a new TV series with a younger cast playing the Enterprise crew as space academy cadets. Fox Broadcasting had wanted the show for its new fourth network but was unable to reach a deal, said Egan.

A fifth movie is already in development. Leonard Nimoy, who plays the logical half-human, half-Vulcan Mr. Spock, directed the third and fourth movies. William Shatner, who plays Kirk, will direct the fifth.

Nimoy, who was at the party and sported a light growth of beard instead of his trademark elfin ears, has said in the past that he regretted such a long association with the same role, but now he's having a

good time.

"The character has evolved a lot," he said. "In the fourth movie, we're seeing a fresh character, who is unlike anything we have seen before."

The series, which ran on NBC, also starred DeForrest Kelley as Dr. Leonard McCoy, George Takei as Sulu, Nichelle Nichols as Uhura, James Doohan as chief engineer Montgomery Scott, Majel Barrett as Nurse Christine Chapel, Walter Koenig as Ensign Pavel Chekov and Grace Lee Whitney as Yeoman Janice Rand.

Roddenberry created the show for Desilu Studios, which later was purchased by Paramount.

NBC didn't quite know what to do with "Star Trek." It kept shifting it around on the schedule and canceled it after the second year. It revived it for a third and final year only after protests and picketing by loyal fans.

By 1978 Paramount knew it had a box office bonanza in its hands. And after the success of "Star Wars" and "Close Encounters of the Third Kind" the studio decided on a feature motion picture.

Shatner said he is working on the script and expects to begin his directing assignment early next year. "I wished I knew then what I know now," he said, recalling the start of the show 20 years ago.

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
