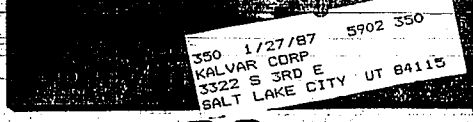

Budget drafters patch compromise together

WASHINGTON — Congressional budget writers and the chief White House budget officer reached tentative agreement Thursday night on the major points of a pathwork plan to keep the deficit below the limits of the Gramm-Rudman law.

House Budget Committee. He said the first budget plan would be presented Friday to his committee and the House leadership.

Chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, said he was also optimistic although he estimated more savings were needed to gain the more than \$14 billion in cutbacks needed to keep the deficit under the limits set by the Gramm-Rudman balanced budget law.

Summit date seen unlikely

WASHINGTON — Secretary of State George P. Shultz will confront Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze head-on today with a demand for free American reporter Nicholas Daniloff and is unlikely to reach an agreement on a date for a superpower summit meeting, U.S. officials said.

But Bernard Kalb, the State Department spokesman, said Soviet "holding" visas were "over the level of 218." He declined to give a precise count, and he accused the Soviets of disobeying the order, issued initially last March, by not providing the names of any departing diplomats.

The U.S. spokesman, responding to Gorbachev's statement on Daniloff, said the reporter was the victim of "contrived charges, a frame-up, and there is no retreat from that."

Kalb said the Daniloff case was Shultz's "priority" in the impending session with Shevardnadze.

Another U.S. official, who demanded anonymity, said Shultz was prepared to end the discussion "after five minutes." If Shevardnadze did not provide an acceptable reply, "that's one of the options," the official said. "We're hoping we can proceed on the rest of the agenda, but that's not clear."

The senior official who briefed reporters took a somewhat different view, however.

"I honestly do not expect dates to come out of these sessions," a senior official said at a State Department briefing for reporters in which the official described the case of the U.S. News & World Report correspondent as "agenda item No. 1."

In Moscow, meanwhile, Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev denounced Daniloff as a spy and suggested the United States had exploited the case to try to spoil superpower relations.

As tensions rose, the Soviets exchanged barbs with the Reagan administration over a U.S. order that 25 Soviet diplomats assigned to the United Nations leave the country by Oct. 1.

Shevardnadze, arriving at Andrews Air Force Base on the eve of the two-day meeting with Shultz, called the expulsion illegal and also "a bad decision."

In New York, the chief Soviet U.N. delegate, Alexander Belonogov, said the Soviets already had cut their mission to 208, which is 10 below the mandated level.

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Researcher raps hidden public subsidies, wasteful practices Profit-making hospital chains more efficient

BOSTON — Money-making hospital chains are more efficient than their non-profit counterparts, which are propped up by hidden public subsidies and driven by "a physicians' cartel" to waste money, a researcher concluded.

The non-profits are much more shortsighted than the for-profits," she said Wednesday at a seminar for journalists. The reason they support them is that they make their lives easier."

They do this, she said, by supplying more empty beds and providing larger support staffs.

Her analysis was based on a comparison of about 500 acute-care community hospitals, all of them in profit-making or non-profit chains. About 96 percent of for-profit hospitals in the United States are in chains, compared with about a third of non-profit hospitals. The study, which cost an estimated \$125,000, was paid for by Harvard Business School.

Dr. Arnold S. Relman, a frequent critic of the profit motive in medicine, criticized the study for ignoring the majority of the nation's non-profit hospitals, especially those that operate in poor city neighborhoods.

Her report, to be published early next year in the Harvard Business Review, is the latest in an often-emotional debate over which kind of hospitals best serve the public interest. Investor-owned chains have grown rapidly in the last two decades, along with other kinds

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Bombings bring threat of retribution

PARIS — Premier Jacques Chirac faced with an increasingly bloody bombing campaign, has threatened to crush the terrorists mercilessly. But so far he does not appear to have any targets.

Five bombings in the French capital in 10 days have killed eight people and injured more than 150. More bloodshed seems likely unless police get a break.

"If we can obtain proof of the origin of the bombs, the response will be crushing and without weakness," Chirac told reporters Thursday, just hours after five people and 33 were hurt in a bombing at a crowded clothing and textiles store.

But at least for the immediate future, the threat appeared an empty one. So did President Francois Mitterrand's call from Jakarta, Indonesia, where he is on a state visit, for a "battle without mercy" against terrorism.

The most promising lead being followed by police seemed to involve a witness at Friday's bombing of a cafeteria in suburban La Defense led police to declare that a suspect in the bombing is Robert Ibrahim Abdallah, whose brother, reputed terrorist leader Georges Ibrahim Abdallah, is jailed in France.

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France drops opposition to discussing subsidies

PUNTA DEL ESTE, Uruguay (AP) — France, one of the European Community's longest-standing opponents to dealing with agricultural subsidies in a new round of trade talks, paying the way for a possible breakthrough on the divisive issue.

Cyanide discovered in pills

BOSTON (AP) — The nation's third-largest drug chain cleared one lot of its house brand of aspirin tablets from its stores Thursday after a woman found three pills authorities say were tainted with deadly cyanide.

Rite-Aid customers in the Boston area have begun turning in aspirin bottles bearing the same lot number of the tainted aspirin, said Detective Lt. Walter Lynch of the Quincy police.

"We've pulled all Rite-Aid brand aspirin from the shelves in New England, and all of the same lot number chains nationwide," Lynch said.

Rite-Aid spokesman Jerry Singer said from company headquarters in Harrisburg, Pa.

Many areas near the Ohio and Wabash rivers of southeast Indiana received 2 to 4 inches of rain overnight.

Thunderstorms were widely scattered from southeastern South Dakota across eastern Nebraska, where many streams were at capacity, and into northeastern Kansas, where flood warnings issued for Stranger Creek and the Delaware River basin.

People in Wyoming's eastern Laramie County were warned to be on alert for three-fourths-of-an-inch in diameter in Carpenter, about 30 miles southeast of Cheyenne.

Streams were near bankfull in southeastern South Dakota and locally heavy rains were possible again Thursday night.

Travelers advisories for snow were in effect for the higher elevations of the Shasta, Siaskiyu and the northern Sierra Nevada mountains.

Snow was also reported along the eastern slopes of the northern Rockies above 8,000 feet, and up to 1 foot of snow fell on the upper reaches of the Teton Range in Wyoming overnight.

Elsewhere, showers fell on the Northern Pacific coast and across parts of the northern and central Rockies and the northern High Plains, and thunderstorms were scattered from southeast Texas across the lower Mississippi Valley, and over Florida and Georgia.

Women waiting for decision

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) — Seven women who went topless in public to protest a state law said after their indecent exposure trial ended Thursday that they can only wait — for the judge's decision and for a change in American culture.

"It's too hard to do anything else anyway," said Lynn Clark, one of the women, as they were taken away from the trial June 21 in a city park.

Rochester City Court Judge Herman Walk gave attorneys until Nov. 3 to file additional legal briefs and arguments, and won't reach a decision until then.

Meese to discuss drug fight

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Edwin Meese said Thursday he will meet next month with Mexican officials to discuss the staying of one Drug Enforcement Administration agent and the detention of another by Mexican police.

Meese disclosed his plans for the Oct. 8-10 meeting at a news conference where he unveiled a legislative program to attack drug traffickers on the international front.

The attorney general also announced an agreement that will help investigators search for drug money in the Turks and Caicos Islands in the Caribbean.

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Baukner novel off ban list

MAYFIELD, Ky. (AP) — The Graves County School Board on Thursday reversed its decision to ban the William Faulkner novel "As I Lay Dying," saying it failed to observe proper procedures in banning the book two weeks earlier.

The board said it feared it might not be able to defend itself against a possible lawsuit challenging the ban, which it instituted after a parent complained about profanity and references to an abortion in the novel.

The parent, Ladone Fields Hill, was not at Thursday's 10-minute meeting, where the board voted 4-1 to rescind the ban.

The Sept. 4 vote to ban the book was unanimous.

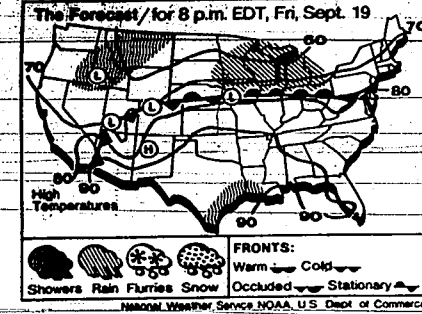

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Reagan OKs new proposal to reduce missiles in Europe

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan has approved a new U.S. proposal to reduce U.S. and Soviet nuclear missiles in Europe to current levels, an administration official said Thursday.

He instructed chief U.S. negotiator Max M. Kampelman to present the proposal to the Soviets in the new round of talks in Geneva.

NATO now has 108 Pershing 2 missiles deployed in West Germany and 32 cruise launchers with 128 warheads in Britain, Italy and Belgium.

They were put there to offset the 270 triple-warhead SS20 rockets the Soviets have targeted on Western Europe. Another 141 SS20s are aimed at China, Japan and other Asian points.

The last U.S. proposal was to set a ceiling of 140 launchers on each side. It would have frozen the NATO total and required a sharp Soviet reduction.

But in an effort to forge an agreement, the official said, Reagan had

instructed Kampelman to present a proposal for a lower total of launchers based on a lower warhead ceiling. He included to provide the precise figures.

Even so, the proposal could have a dramatic effect on the Geneva negotiations, the two sides in disagreement over space-based defense systems, the Reagan administration considers medium-range missiles the most likely basis for a U.S.-Soviet treaty.

U.S. negotiator Mikhail Gorbachev indicated in his summit meeting with Reagan last November in Geneva that he was willing to reach an early agreement on medium-range missile by dropping the previous Soviet insistence on linking progress to space-based defenses, according to U.S. officials.

Meanwhile, the spur movement in the strategic weapons field, the third area of negotiations, Reagan instructed Kampelman earlier this week to scale back his initial demand for a 50-percent cutback to

about 30 percent through lower projected savings.

The new U.S. medium-range proposal makes no distinction between the single-warhead Pershings, which can strike Soviet territory in about 14 minutes, and the slower-moving cruise missiles, which Moscow considers much less of a threat.

Presumably, this means at least some of the Pershings would remain. The U.S. Army completed the Pershing deployment in West Germany last December. West German officials have let it be known they expect to see a significant reduction in Pershing II missiles as part of any U.S.-Soviet agreement.

While demonstrations against the missiles remain a sensitive political issue in West Germany.

The deployment of cruise missiles, meanwhile, is not complete. Under a 1979 NATO decision, West Germany is to get 96 British-made, Italy 112 and Belgium and the Netherlands 48 each.

Drug tests called 'hysteria'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union and three unions that represent federal employees criticized as "election year hysteria" President Reagan's call for mandatory drug testing.

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Allan Adler of the ACLU said the overwhelming majority of state and federal courts have banned mandatory drug tests for public employees as violations of constitutionally protected privacy rights.

Although Americans who work for private, rather than governmental, employers cannot rely on the Constitution when challenging mandatory testing, Adler said other legal grounds are available.

He said such testing may violate collective bargaining agreements or express terms of employment, violate state or local law or represent a violation of common law privacy.

Bob Tobias, president of the treasury-employees union, predicted that the nation's courts "are going to overturn (Reagan's) executive order immediately."

John Morgan, a professor of pharmacology at the City College of New York Medical School, told a news conference that using the standard analyses of urine and blood to test for drug use is "to a degree inherently flawed."

As examples, Morgan said some of the same components of heroin or other drugs can be found in over-the-counter cough syrups or perhaps even in poppy seeds, potato bags and hamburger buns.

Most tests that turn up positive

for drug use will be false results, he said. "The (testing) error rate is greater than the rate of drug use in the workforce."

Drug case before new judge

REXBURG (AP) — A new trial date with a different judge has been scheduled for three men charged with selling cocaine and heroin to a federal undercover agent.

District Judge Grant Young was unable to schedule a trial sooner than March, 1987, for the three defendants, and the case was reassigned to Judge William Black in Idaho Falls.

Black has set a trial date of Nov. 18 in Rexburg for Julio Terrazas, 18, and Gorgonia Carrasco, 29, both of Mexico, and Moses Rodriguez, 32, of Rigby. Each man faces four felony drug charges stemming from the Aug. 17 arrests at the Rexburg airport.

A district judge said that the trial be moved elsewhere because of publicity about the case.

A U.S. Customs agent testified at an earlier hearing that the men agreed to trade \$1.6 million worth of drugs for \$152,000 and 16 automatic rifles. The defendants are being held in the Madison County jail in lieu of \$750,000 bond each.

Ex-prosecutor wins civil suit

POCATELLO (AP) — Former Bannock County Prosecutor Shawn Anderson has won a civil suit filed against him by two former employees.

Anderson will receive attorney fees and other costs incurred by him in the defense of the civil suit filed against him by two former employees.

Anderson resigned in May after a federal investigation into allegations of illegal wiretapping. Anderson was not charged with any violations after federal officials said he agreed to resign.

Tanna Fenwick and Kathy Freckleton filed a lawsuit against Anderson in January, 1984, claiming they were wrongfully discharged from clerical jobs.

Woman enters plea of guilty

LEWISTON (AP) — A 20-year-old woman scheduled to go on trial Monday pleaded guilty to second-degree murder charges Thursday, but got no assurances about sentencing, the county prosecutor said.

Ruby Comer was arrested after Lori Godwin, 16, drowned in the Snake River last April 14. The body was found two days after Godwin apparently fell from a levee where she and Comer had been fighting over a mutual boyfriend, investigators said.

Nez Perce County Prosecutor Steve Toblason said the plea agreement is not binding on 2nd District Judge John Maynard, who has scheduled a sentencing hearing Oct. 23, Toblason said.

No promises about pay freeze

BOISE (AP) — Republican gubernatorial candidate David Leroy, defending his tie-breaking vote to effectively freeze state worker pay two years ago, is making no promise the freeze will end if he is elected.

Choosing his words carefully before the General Council of the Idaho Public Employees Association on Thursday, the lieutenant governor said no substantial pay increase could be expected next year, and later he refused to rule out the possibility that pay levels would remain unchanged for a third straight year.

"Given the economic climate of these times, I think it is highly unlikely that government employees will see any substantial pay raises in January 1987," Leroy said.

But in bidding for the support of the state's 12,000 workers in his campaign against former Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, he added, "It is necessary our public employees be adequately compensated, and they not lose ground to inflation."

Collision kills 2, injures 2

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Two people were killed and two injured in a three-car collision in a rural area of Idaho Falls Wednesday night.

Paul Wilde, spokesman for the Bonneville County sheriff's office, said Bonnie Marie Olson, 32, was pronounced dead at the scene. Ted Grant Melish, 23, died at an Idaho Falls hospital shortly after the accident.

Wilde said investigating officers reported that a vehicle driven by Terry O'Brien, 28, Idaho Falls, crossed the center line of First Street between Hill and the Lincoln-Armour road and struck the Olson vehicle.

Heather Olson, 15, had to be extricated from the wreckage. She was listed in critical condition Thursday at an Idaho Falls hospital. Michelle Olson, 10, was treated and released.

High court rules for Gem use taxes

BOISE (AP) — K mart Corp. must pay use taxes on newspaper inserts sent to Idaho publishers and distributed by them, the Idaho Supreme Court ruled Thursday in a 3-2 decision.

The court overturned a ruling by 4th District Judge Deborah Ball that K mart did not have to pay taxes on advertising inserts that are printed elsewhere, sent to newspapers, publishers and distributed with the newspaper.

In an opinion written by Justice Robert C. Huntley and joined by Justice Stephen Blaine, the majority ruled that K mart "owns" the inserts from the time they are printed until they are given away to newspaper purchasers, even though the company never takes possession of them.

"K mart argues that only the consumers receiving the inserts 'use them and that K mart does not," wrote Huntley.

"K mart apparently argues the purpose of the inserts is to provide potential purchasers with news of goods available and on sale. But all advertising is used by advertisers, such as K mart, for the purpose of making sales and profits.

"In light of this and the exercise of K mart's contractual rights and powers over the inserts, K mart uses the inserts within the meaning of the use tax statute," Huntley said.

Justice Robert Bakes dissented, joined by Justice Allan Shepard.

Bakes upheld Judge Ball's ruling that the inserts were a "component" part of a newspaper, and non-taxable with a production exemp-

The television evangelist Pat Robertson apparently thinks he is qualified to be President of the United States. But if his inane remarks of the past week are any indication, we think he would be better off to stay on the Sunday morning airwaves.

Robertson has again suggested that Christian people are more patriotic and family-loving than others. He has also said that he will run for president if "three million" people sign his petitions in the coming year.

The first comment has already drawn a sharp rebuke from Education Secretary William Bennett, who said Robertson's view reflects a "narrowness" (which) would have disappointed the Founding Fathers. Its intolerance clashes with the best traditions of our democracy.

There has always been a close relationship between public life and righteousness America. In a land in which material wealth and practical solutions have been supreme goals, there have always been those who believed they had a public policy pipeline to God.

Robertson is only the latest in a long line of such self-appointed keepers of the national moral flame. But he is more of an egomaniac, an individual who claims to be in contact with God and doing his will on Earth.

Is he dangerous? Certainly, if he ever got into office. As one who believes that America's problems lie in "casual sex, infidelity, easy divorce, the recreational use of drugs, and radical lifestyles," he would be unlikely to rest until he had us all singing in the choir.

For some people, tolerance is a filthy word. They cannot stand the thought that — horrors — there are people in the nation and world who actually don't follow the same script.

Robertson says he's waiting for a "sign" from the American people as to his candidacy. Well, let's send him one.



Privacy the first casualty of Jar Wars

BOSTON — This is what the crusade against drugs has come down to — Jar Wars. All summer long, politicians have been overdosing on polls and political anxiety about the drug issue. By September the climate in Washington was still humid with hysteria. And now it appears that the one analysis of the drug problem that will really count is urinalysis.

On Monday, the President ordered mandatory drug testing for federal employees. "This," he said with a flourish, "is the federal government's way of just saying no to drugs." The order applies to all law-enforcement officers, to anyone with access to classified information, indeed to anyone who has what is loosely described as "public health or safety or other functions requiring a high degree of trust and confidence." It is estimated that more than a million federal employees may now find their job security rests in a jar.

I am not entirely surprised by this political pursuit of bodily fluids. Ever since drugs replaced pornography on the front pages, there has been a growing obsession with filling little laboratory vials.

First, the President of the United States volunteered himself as Chief Donor of the nation. Then in the congressional session in Atlanta, John Lewis challenged his opponent, Julian Bond, to dueling samples and matching test scores.

Any day now I expect to see a political ad boasting about a candidate's specimen instead of experience.

All this is the stuff of satire, but there is also something menacing about widespread mandatory testing for drugs. The initial response of Americans to the idea of drug-testing may be favorable, but I don't think we'll respond the same way to the reality.

Under this order, employees would receive a general warning two months before the drug-testing program begins. Agency heads would decide who is to be tested. To be at all reliable, the drug testing has to be random and has to be supervised. As an expert in the field said, a "trusted worker" must watch each person urinate into a bottle.

If a pop quiz at the official specimen-collection center doesn't seem like an invasion of your privacy, consider this: A lot of other information goes into the jar. By analyzing urine, a superior can also find out whether you are pregnant, whether you are taking medication for your heart or for your mental health.

Americans have always been sensitive. Indeed Reagan has always been sensitive, about government intrusion. The Fourth Amendment to the Constitution protects us against unreasonable searches and seizures.

The Supreme Court has ruled that the government can't "search" and "seize" our bodily fluids without cause any more than they can our homes and possessions. A federal employee union is trying to block the order on these grounds.

I have no argument with drug testing when there is a genuine, compelling safety concern. As far as I am concerned, the military can test the people who work in nuclear-missile silos every time they heed the call of nature.

If there is probable cause to suspect workers of drug use, test them, but the majority of workers who have "nothing to hide" do have something to protect: privacy.

Setting up a \$56 million federal program to collect and analyze urine from as many as a million federal workers is not only assembly, not only unconstitutional, it's a wasteful diversion. Urinalysis doesn't affect the crop of coca leaves. Nor does it catch the bigtime drug pushers. It doesn't keep crack out of schoolyards.

The administration knows that. What they want is an easy showcase, something to prove that the government is cleaning up its own house. What they are funding is a line-up for workers who must prove their innocence at the washroom door. That is not the stuff of a great war against drugs. It's the comic-tragedy of a little, bitty battle of the bottles.

Americans' trust in government remaining low as mid-'70s

WASHINGTON — Whenever we ask a particular question in the Washington Post-ABC News Poll, I am on the lookout for a drastic change in the results. We have asked it four times in the past two years, but so far there has been virtually no change.

The question has to do with confidence in government. It is worded this way: "How much of the time do you trust the government in Washington to do what is right; just about always, most of the time, or only some of the time?"

If you follow polls you may recognize this question. Beginning in the late 1950s, it was asked regularly as part of the University of Michigan's national election studies.

Since then, opinion analysts have considered Americans' responses to it to be revealing somewhat to the national mood.

For the past few years we have been told that it is "morning in America," that there is a new, abounding pride, that we are standing tall, and on and on. That is why I keep expecting the responses to this question to change. Even water dripping on a stone has an effect if it doesn't stop.

The fact is, that instead of changing, the numbers show people's trust in government

to be almost as low as the worst of the Michigan measurements about a decade ago. Here are the figures:

In the most recent Post-ABC News poll, ending Sept. 8, 6 percent said they trusted the government just about always, 34 percent said most of the time, 58 percent only some of the time, and 2 percent volunteered that they never trust the government.

Over the past two years, no response varied by more than four percentage points, and when all four polls are averaged, the result matches the new findings exactly. That's what I'd call consistency.

It is also a far cry from the way people used to look at government. In 1958, the University of Michigan survey found that 73 percent of the people said they trusted the government most of the time or always, while only 23 percent said they trusted it some of the time. Four percent had no opinion, but there was no hint of anyone volun-

teering, "I never trust the government."

When the United States was digging its hole in Vietnam, the result was almost the same: 76 percent trusted the government most of the time or always. (This finding and others from the period show that the way we now regard the 1960s — as an era of political dissidence and social revolution — did not begin to show up in the public consciousness until 1965.)

Then began the decline in trust. In 1966, the Michigan study showed 65 percent trusting the government most of the time or always; in 1968 the figure was 61 percent; in 1970, 54 percent; in 1972, 53 percent; in 1974 (with Watergate compounding the Vietnam-inspired distrust), 37 percent. In 1976 the figure was 33 percent, and in 1978, 30 percent, the lowest in the Michigan series.

So distrust of government today is as keen as the water-gate track. Also, and obviously of extreme importance, people are suddenly becoming quite edgy about the economy. The September Post-ABC News survey shows more pessimism about the economy than at any time in the past year.

Unemployment, the federal budget deficit and the trade deficit are listed as serious

problems. One might think they have gone away, though, with leaders of both parties focusing on this month's hot issue, drugs.

Drugs are no doubt a cause of great grief to the people who use them and to their families. But most studies show that marijuana use is down and that cocaine use has leveled off in recent years. That seems to make little difference to the White House and to Democrats and Republicans in Washington, all of whom have come up with anti-drug abuse plans.

Senate Majority Leader Robert Dole of Kansas has recently suggested a checkoff on tax returns that would let people contribute a dollar of their tax refund to the war on drugs. That would let people feel good about what they personally are doing to fight drugs.

This is a diversion from more serious national problems. The public will catch on quickly enough and probably feel cheated. One result, my best guess is, will be that the next time we include the question in a poll, there still won't be any increase in trust in government.

As a step to eliminate the criminal element from this issue, I propose the legislation of the cultivation and consumption of marijuana. This right, as with all other rights, the societal and personal responsibility not to misuse or abuse.

I propose strengthening the laws and punishments for those that deal drugs of any kind to minors and an emphasis in educating people as to the responsibilities and consequences of their actions.

A little common sense will go a lot further, to solving this problem than an ocean full of urine samples ever will.

More dogs left run loose

I've been on a high horse, and I have no immediate intention of dismounting. But, I will come down long enough to thank my kind neighbors who assisted our son and family in a scary and stressful situation on Sept. 12. We also thank the Kimberly police department and the staff at the Twin Falls Clinic.

A special thanks goes to one neighbor who witnessed the incident and helped our injured 12-year-old son home. This neighbor, my older son, and I, had an immediate first hand experience in controlling serious bleeding.

Our son had been riding his bicycle near home when a dog began chasing and nipping at his feet. In his efforts to kick the dog away, he ran into a mail box. This resulted in a deep laceration to his arm. The wound required approximately forty stitches.

This is the second injury suffered by so-

meone on this street in recent months from dogs that were not properly controlled.

Unconfined dogs seem to be on the increase in some areas. A dog incident could happen on almost any street in any town. It is a violation of most city ordinances to allow a dog to run free. In addition, the Idaho Code states conditions under which it is a misdemeanor to allow a dog to run large. A police officer explained to me that if a dog is a problem, to call, if an officer can observe that the dog is off the owner's property, it can be impounded and the owner issued a citation. Our officers are willing to help, but they may not be aware of a problem unless it is reported.

I urge all citizens plagued by nuisance dogs to be shy and intimidated, but to use every lawful means at their disposal to remedy the situation. If someone's dog is in violation, don't be afraid to tell them to correct it, or you will report it. You may save someone from a bite or injury.

I also make a plea to the cities and counties to continue with renewed efforts to enforce dog control ordinances.

Finally, I urge all dog owners to know the laws and ordinances that pertain to their dogs and to voluntarily comply with them. You are responsible for your dogs conduct and must be prepared for the consequences.

Andrus rejects debate

BOISE (AP) — Democratic gubernatorial candidate Cecil Andrus has turned down an invitation from a group of University of Idaho law students to debate his opponent, Republican Gov. David Leroy, at the university next month.

The Federalist Society for Law and Public Policy Studies, which advocates conservative judicial rulings, offered to stage a debate either Oct. 15 or Oct. 22.

Andrus and Leroy will appear Oct. 13 in a debate to be televised by Boise television station KTVB.

That debate was arranged in July after Andrus declined to appear in a debate Oct. 30 organized by the Idaho Press Club and League of Women Voters, saying it was too near the Nov. 4 election.

"I think the public is going to have adequate opportunity to see both candidates in action," Andrus said in an interview earlier this week. "I see no need for a situation such as the one being proposed in that letter. Besides that, as I've said before, I'm not going to create forums around the state of Idaho for my opponent to get publicity."

Leroy said he would be willing to participate in any or all debates and his campaign manager, Chuck Tompkins, indicated the Republican candidate would be willing to appear alone at the UI forum.

Federalist Society member John Keenan said the group will ask Andrus to reconsider. The organization wants a debate to focus on northern Idaho and university issues, Keenan said.

"Part of the questions (during the Oct. 1 debate) are going to be coming from the Boise-based media," Keenan said. "We'd like to see the northern Idaho media and University of Idaho students talk to Andrus and Leroy. I don't see any problem with them all coming up here."

Vogt quits as student body chief

BOISE (AP) — Karl Vogt has resigned as student body president at Boise State University, saying he's tired of conflicts with other student officers.

The senior political science major submitted his resignation to other student officers last Friday, and Tom Heberington, vice president, was named as student president on Wednesday.

Vogt, 27, said there was no one reason for his decision to leave the presidency. "It's just an accumulation of a lot of things," he said. "There's been a lot of controversy (among the student officers), and I've grown tired of controversy." He said most of the problems stemmed from last spring's student body election. "It was real tight," he said.

Vogt said he and Heberington, who last year team-defeated their opponents by 7 votes out of a total of 1,400.

Some of the other officers favored their opponents. "With the executive and legislative branches constantly at odds, no program ever was going to come out," he said.

In his letter of resignation, Vogt said BSU students faced a major problem because of inter-branch problems with student radio station KBSU, and funding proposals by the Idaho Legislature.

In an order for ASBSU (Associated Students of BSU) to effectively deal with these issues, there needs to be cohesiveness in ASBSU itself," he said. "It has become evident to me that this cohesiveness cannot exist while I am in office."

Great Basin park reaches full Senate

WASHINGTON (AP) — A bill creating a 44,000-acre Great Basin National Park near Wheeler Peak in eastern Nevada has cleared the Senate's Energy and Natural Resources Committee and been sent to the full Senate.

The bill, sponsored by Nevada Republican Sens. Paul Laxalt and Chip Hecht, is a scaled-down version of a national park bill already approved by the House of Representatives.

That bill, supported by Rep. Harry Reid, D-Nev., calls for a 129,000-acre park and a 45,000-acre national preserve.

If the Senate approves the Laxalt-Hecht measure, it would be sent to the House for settlement of differences between the two bills.

The park would be the first in Nevada. Located some 60 miles southeast of Ely, the park would encompass the 15,000-foot Wheeler Peak, Lehman Caves National Monument and the ancient bristlecone pines.

Both bills are designed to protect existing mining and grazing claims issued before July 1, 1985.

Lobby calls unit a 'sham'

BOISE (AP) — The National Alliance of Senior Citizens, which gave Sen. Steve Symms a 100 percent voting record on issues affecting the elderly, is nothing more than a "sham," says an Idaho citizens lobby group.

The votes used by the alliance in awarding Symms their 100 percent rating are a mockery of the serious issues facing the elderly today, said Steve Hamilton, representing Idaho Fair Share. "They have stretched the definition of senior issues to the point of absurdity."

Hamilton told a news conference here Thursday.

Senior citizens earlier in the week attacked Symms' voting record on issues affecting the elderly. Symms, a Republican, is running for a second term in the U.S. Senate against Democrat Gov. John Evans.

Later, Tom Lowery, press aide to Symms, called the group a liberal organization and said a conservative senior citizen organization, the

National Alliance of Senior Citizens, rated Symms 100 percent on key issues.

The Idaho Fair Share Citizen Action Program said the National Alliance of Senior Citizens does little for senior citizens but is set up only to confuse the public at election time.

Hamilton said the 10 votes that won Symms a 100 percent rating have little to do with senior issues, and some of them run directly counter to the needs of the elderly.

Aquino scores a hit, wins economic funds

WASHINGTON (AP) — Philippine President Corazon Aquino, in a speech that brought a shower of affection from a joint session of Congress, pledged Thursday to take up the sword of war if peace-making with communist rebels fails.

Mrs. Aquino, in the seventh month of her leadership of a major U.S. ally which was led for more than 20 years by Ferdinand Marcos, offered thanks for the role Congress played in changing U.S. policy toward her country.

At the same time, Mrs. Aquino, widow of assassinated president, who was killed during the last years of Marcos' rule, appealed for help to build "a new home for democracy, another haven for the oppressed."

"House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill," Mrs. Aquino said afterwards, "That's the finest speech I've heard in my 34 years in Congress."

Members of the House and Senate, many wearing yellow roses symbolizing the color Mrs. Aquino chose for her presidential campaign, crowded the chamber. Scores of Filipino-Americans were in the gallery crowd.

Within hours of her speech, the House passed 203-197 a bill giving the Philippines a \$200 million cash infusion to help deal with economic distress. The measure was sent to the Senate, where prospects for approval were uncertain.

Some opponents suggested the money be spent instead on improving U.S. military facilities at Subic Bay Naval Station and Clark Air Base.

But supporters said the money was urgently needed to support Mrs. Aquino, who came to power in February by defeating Marcos' authoritarian government.

Rep. David Obey, D-Wis., chairman of the House Appropriations foreign aid subcommittee, said the measure was brought to the floor spontaneously in the immediate aftermath of the Aquino speech.

"I think she laid out the moral foundations for her position in attacking the economic and military problems of the country," Obey said. "I drew on the best traditions of American history. I know of no recent, equal world-wide that has been more thrilling and a more important advance for democracy than to see the abusive regime of the last president replaced by this one."

And at the Pentagon, officials said President Reagan has ordered the U.S. military to airlift medical supplies to the Philippines and dispatch a Navy hospital ship to help provide health care in the island nation.

In addition, the president directed that Filipino companies be allowed to sell additional supplies and services to U.S. naval and air bases in the Philippines, and he ordered a 30 percent pay increase for some 45,000 Filipinos who work at Subic Bay and Clark Air Base, said Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman.

Mrs. Aquino underscored her policy of negotiating with the Communist New People's Army guerrilla movement but said, "I will not stand by and allow an insurgent leadership to spurn our offer of peace and kill our young soldiers and threaten our new freedom."

"We face a communist insurgency that feeds on economic deterioration, even as we carry a great share of the free world's defense in the Pacific," she said in her only reference to U.S. military bases in the Philippines.

Mrs. Aquino said the aim of the negotiations, under way in Manila, was to bring the insurgents "down from the hills and, by economic progress and justice, show them that for which the best intentioned among them fight."

Mrs. Aquino, who wore a suit in the yellow color used in her campaign for the Philippine presidency, was greeted with applause, cheers and chants of "Cory, Cory" from the galleries and from members of House and Senate.

She left amid applause, which lasted until the head of state slowly made her way through well-wishers out of the crowded House chambers.

Woman who handled judge's taxes warned boss 'entire return wrong'

WASHINGTON (AP) — The woman who handled the 1980 income taxes for Judge Harry E. Claiborne told his Senate impeachment trial Thursday that she warned her boss, "the entire return is wrong."

Charlotte Travaglia, who worked on the return for Creative Tax and Business Planning of Las Vegas, also said the firm had many disgruntled clients, including one who "was waiting at the door with a gun one day."

Claiborne, the chief U.S. district judge for Nevada, was convicted in federal court of evading income taxes on \$106,651 in legal fees, earned while he practiced law, but paid after he became a judge in 1978. He is serving a prison term for that conviction, but still draws his salary as a judge.

The House has unanimously approved an impeachment resolution paralleling the criminal conviction — which accused Claiborne of failing to report and pay taxes on \$97,911 in fee income on his 1980 return, and for under-reporting and not paying taxes on \$18,740 in fees received in 1979.

Conviction in the first Senate impeachment trial in 69 years would remove Claiborne, 59, from his lifetime job.

On Thursday evening, the impeachment trial reached a potential crucial point as the defense called an Internal Revenue Service agent in an attempt to show the government attempted to intimidate witnesses.

Donald Skelton, the witness, is a 24-year veteran of the IRS criminal investigation division and was one of the chief agents involved in Claiborne's prosecution.

Skelton, in response to defense questions, said he spent about 40 hours in interviews, beginning in 1983, with Joseph Wright, the accountant who prepared Claiborne's 1979 tax return. Most of the discussions concerned testimony Wright provided at Claiborne's two criminal trials in 1984.

The IRS agent still was on the stand when the trial adjourned for the day.

In the fourth day of the case, Mrs. Travaglia gave a sharply different version of the preparation of the 1980 return than that provided by her boss, company owner Jerry Watson.

Mrs. Travaglia for any errors in preparation of the return, for which Claiborne paid \$2,000.

But Mrs. Travaglia, who said she would not "write and bookkeeper, insisted she did only preliminary worksheet estimates and turned them over to Watson — while warning over and over that there were problems.

Grabbing 'Minnie' lands man in jail

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — A man was arrested at Disneyland for allegedly grabbing a woman in a Minnie-Mouse costume, while she greeted park visitors, police said Thursday.

Jack Eric Jacques, 21, of Redondo Beach, was arrested on Main Street U.S.A. following the incident Wednesday.

He remained in custody in lieu of bond Thursday, charged with misdemeanor assault and battery after Orange County prosecutors rejected the sexual battery charge, a felony.

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Idaho mine fire led to tight safety rules, cut in fatalities

WASHINGTON (AP) — Drastic tightening of U.S. mine regulations in the wake of a 1972 Idaho mine fire that killed 92 people has pushed industry fatalities to a record low, officials said Thursday.

Several steps that have been taken in the last 14 years helped lower the number of deaths to 123 in 1985, according to government figures.

Federal regulations now ban open flame welding underground without a fire extinguisher near, and limit the size of welding jobs that can be done underground, the Mine Safety and Health Administration said Thursday.

U.S. mine operators stopped using polyurethane foam underground because fumes when it burned caused many of the 92 deaths at the Sunshine gold and silver mine in Idaho in 1972, said Sam Stafford, spokesman for the administration.

A spark from a welder working without an extinguisher at hand is blamed for the blaze that killed 177 men at South Africa's Kinnross mine near the town of Evansburg Tuesday. Many of the deaths were caused by deadly fumes from polyurethane foam used to coat shaft walls to prevent seepage, according to union officials.

Polyurethane — when burned, liberates phosgene gas, one of the chemicals used in the gas warfare on the Western Front in World War I. The Kinnross mine manager said the company had not known polyurethane can burn.

Instead of polyurethane, U.S. mines now use polystyrene, whose fumes are less toxic than wood, Stafford said.

Wood itself can produce deadly carbon monoxide in great quantities underground because oxygen is quickly depleted and combustion is

incomplete. U.S. Regulations require that wooden props used near sparking machinery be covered with flame shields.

According to Henry Chajel, health and safety specialist at the American Mining Congress, U.S. underground mine regulations require two independent escape shafts, and combustible materials may not be kept in them.

Another result of the Sunshine disaster is a requirement that boiler operators have an air supply completely independent from the mine's ventilation system. That independent supply is supposed to last at least two hours.

The hoist operator was one of the first victims at Sunshine, and could not bring his fellow miners to safety.

Five hundred sixty miners lost their lives in U.S. mines in the three years 1983, 1984 and 1985, 27 of them in a coal mine fire in Utah. The figure includes surface mines.

Tax overhaul measure on file

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress' tax-writers on Thursday filed with the House and Senate the final version of a bill to overhaul the federal income tax.

The filing set the stage for the two houses to complete action on the measure within the next two weeks. The House is likely to vote on Wednesday and the Senate will follow suit before Congress adjourns sometime around Oct. 3.

Rep. Dan Rostenkowski, D-Ill., and Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., who headed the Senate-House conference committee that wrote the final compromise, worked until 3 a.m. Thursday to settle the last issue, taxation of income from long-term

contracts by builders and defense contractors.

Congress has made several efforts to shut off what lawmakers consider abuse of the completed-contract method of accounting, under which contractors avoid paying tax until a project is finished. In essence, the compromise would deny preferential tax treatment under that method to 40 percent of a contract, effective retroactively to March 1, 1985.

The compromise would cost contractors an additional \$10.4 billion in taxes over five years. About 63 percent of that would come from manufacturers, including defense contractors, and the remainder from

the tax bill would shift about \$1.2 billion in taxes from individuals to corporations over the next five years. Individual taxes would be reduced by an average of 6.1 percent, although about 20 million people and individuals would face tax increases.

The measure, a priority item of President Reagan, would eliminate or reduce several deductions and exclusions to pay for steep reductions in tax rates. The present top individual rate of 50 percent would drop to 33 percent; the maximum corporate rate of 46 percent would cut to 34 percent.

Overthrow possible

WASHINGTON (AP) — CIA Director William Casey raised the possibility Thursday that Nicaragua's Communist government could overthrow the present military government.

Casey said that, just as there is a class of hard-core leftists who are committed to overthrowing the present government, there is also a group of hard-core rightists who are committed to overthrowing the present government.

In a speech prepared for delivery to the University Club, a private group, Casey said the \$100 million in U.S. aid that the House and Senate have approved for the Nicaraguan rebels will help "turn up the heat on the Sandinistas."

He said the assistance will enable the Contras to expand their bases and open new areas of operations.

He added there is no need to match the Sandinistas' weapons-for-peace or to achieve a classic military victory.

"History shows that a combination of nagging insurgent military pressure and progressive withdrawal of domestic and international support is what brings down or alters an unpopular government," Casey said.

That process, he said, is already under way in Nicaragua. The insurgents have made gains among rural peasants unhappy with the government's collectivization and resettlement programs as well as its mandatory military draft and "high-tech policies," he said.

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Scalia joins in dismissing acid rain suit

WASHINGTON (AP) — In one of his last opinions from the appellate bench, Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia joined two other judges Thursday in ordering dismissal of a lawsuit by seven Northeastern states seeking to cut air pollution in the Midwest.

The opinion of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals panel, written by Scalia, ruled that the Environmental Protection Agency does not have to tell midwestern states to reduce air-pollution to cut acid-rain damage in Canada.

The opinion was in the mainstream of several other Scalia cases in that it upheld the discretion of a governmental agency. On the facts presented, action "is within the agency's discretion and not subject to judicial compulsion," he wrote.

The facts amount to "an unusual statute executed in an unexpected manner," Scalia wrote.

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Former president even with tormentor

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich. (AP) — How does a former president who was mimicked mercilessly for slipping and tripping get back at the comedian who made the most of the pitfalls?

Strip him back.

That's just what Gerald Ford did Thursday, stretching a leg out in front of Chevy Chase, who made a name for himself imitating Ford on television's "Saturday Night Live."

The pair staged the gag before the start of the second day of events during a three-day Humor and the Presidency Symposium at the Gerald R. Ford Museum.

Later in the day, comedian Pat Paulsen, moderated a panel that looked at the history of presidential humor.

"Ford was president for two years, and he left us with eight years of laughs," Paulsen said.

"But it's not all fun. Life in the White House can get dull, though there may be a way out, Paulsen suggested.

"If you're a dull president, is it necessary to have a funny vice president? If neither one of them are funny, would the problem be resolved by having Alexander Haig stand in?"

Paulsen also asked:

"The president had the funniest family? I'll give you a hint: They were known for coming out with a

-MX missile decoy fails to work

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — An unarmed MX missile was tested over the Pacific Ocean Thursday, but an experimental radar decoy device carried failed to operate, the Air Force announced.

The missile blasted off from Vandenberg Air Force Base at 6:30 a.m. MDT and its six dummy warheads splashed into the sea in the Pacific Missile Test range about 30 minutes later, said Maj. Barry Glickman. The dummy warheads landed in the Pacific near Kwajalein Atoll, about 4,100 miles away from Vandenberg.

"It went right where it was supposed to go. It was a very successful launch," said Glickman.

Quake hits Alaska

WASHINGTON (AP) — A small earthquake rattled the area around Anchorage, Alaska on Thursday, the U.S. Geological Survey said. There were no immediate reports of damage or injury.

The quake, which registered 4.7 on the open-ended Richter scale, was centered about 50 miles north of Anchorage, said Ben Finley, spokesman for the USGS center in suburban Reston, Va.

Train car fire spurs evacuation

FLORA, Miss. (AP) — A train carrying chemicals derailed Thursday and one car caught fire, prompting authorities worried about the possibility of chemical explosions to evacuate an estimated 1,500 people.

The evacuation could last two or three days, said Jim Maher, director of the Mississippi Emergency Management Agency. He said authorities were concerned about chemicals in some of the cars, ethylene oxide and butadiene.

"Those gases have very low flash points and if they go we could have an explosion of a significant magnitude," Maher said. "If the ethylene oxide explodes, it will take the air a rocket."

Maher said workers near the scene heard a hissing sound, indicating a leak.

About 20 of the 68 cars on the northern Illinois Central Gulf freight derailed when the train was broad-gauged by a recreational vehicle shortly before 2 a.m. MDT, Maher said.

K.E. Stockton, superintendent of transportation with the Illinois Central Gulf Railroad in Chicago, said crews at the scene determined the fire was limited to a tank car that had previously held liquified petroleum gas.

"We see no impending danger of an massive fire or other major problems, but because of the other chemical cars involved, people are staying out of the area," Stockton said.

The railroad said cleanup crews were being sent to help clear the wreckage.

The driver of the vehicle which struck the train, identified as James Charles Hampton of Detroit, was listed in stable condition at University Medical Center in Jackson after surgery for multiple injuries.

Leaking fuel tanks on B-1s under repair

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force, pushing toward the activation of its first squadron of B-1 bombers in less than two weeks, has been forced to launch a repair program for the new planes because of tiny fuel leaks, officials said Thursday.

The leaks are described as minor and the problem almost expected because of the way the planes are designed and the need to "break them in" following delivery.

Nonetheless, the problem has forced the planes delivered to the air force grounded in times while repairs are made, limiting training missions, said Brig. Gen. James W. Ewalt, one of the officers involved in overseeing the program.

The problem has also attracted the personal attention of Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger, who expects the Air Force to fix the problem as soon as possible, Ewalt said.

Ewalt dismissed a report in the magazine "Business Week" attributing the problem to bad workmanship and poor quality control on the production line.

"This stems from a normal breakdown process that one would have anticipated," Ewalt said in an interview. "It's like breaking in a new car."

The B-1 is the first long-range strategic bomber to be developed by the United States in more than 20 years. The swing-wing, four-engine jet can fly supersonically and is also equipped with sophisticated navigation and radar systems that allow it to hug the ground and evade radar.

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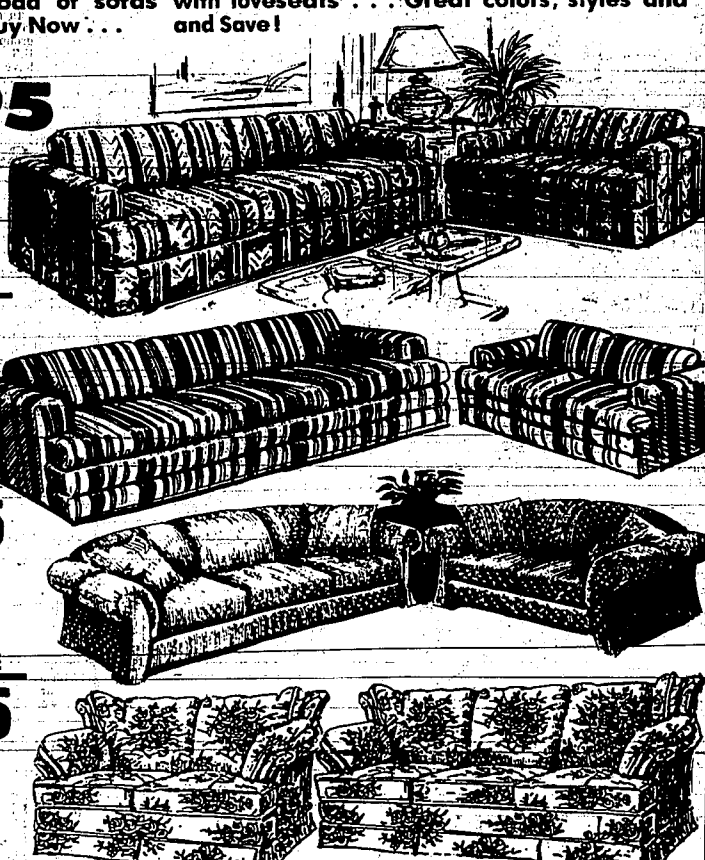
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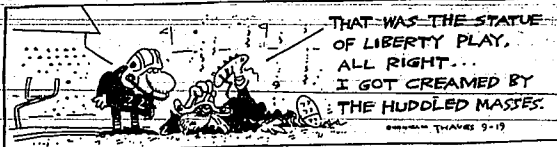
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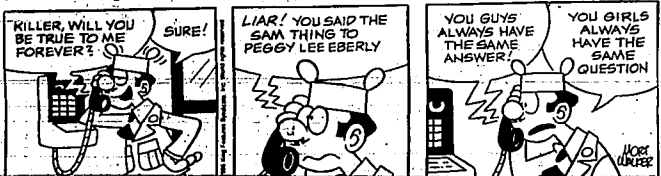

Hunters fill Swedish quarry with contaminated elk meat

Radiation affects reindeer grazing

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP) — The government on Thursday ordered inspection of all reindeer meat for sale because deer grazing areas have been contaminated with radioactivity from the Chernobyl nuclear disaster.

State Inspector Margareta Widell of the government Food Board said up to 70 percent of the 70,000 reindeer targeted for slaughter in Sweden this year were expected to be unacceptably contaminated.

Contamination checks already were required on deer from southern grazing areas but had not been required nationwide.

The decision to expand the checks followed a negative report earlier this week from a test-slaughter in the Norbotten province in the northern reindeer grazing area, the last area to be tested for radiation from the April 26 explosion and fire at the Chernobyl nuclear plant in the Soviet Union.

The government move just as the winter slaughter was scheduled to begin triggered alarm among Lapps, an ethnic minority with a centuries-old tradition of reindeer-herding.

"Before Chernobyl, lynx and wolverine were our worst enemies. Now it is radioactivity," Lapp elder Ole Blind, 70, was quoted as telling a local newspaper.

"Something invisible and frighten-

ing new which we cannot see or touch is threatening the whole reindeer industry," he said.

Reindeer are particularly vulnerable to contamination with cesium, one of the longer-lasting elements of the Chernobyl fallout. They graze over large areas on lichen and other plants, and the cesium in the plants is concentrated in reindeer meat through the metabolic process.

Health officials said some reindeer had been found with cesium readings more than 10 times the safety limit for humans.

"The problem is expected to remain for another five to 10 years because cesium breaks down extremely slowly in reindeer lichen," Widell told "The Associated Press."

The government has promised full compensation for every deer whose meat is declared unsellable. Some of the contaminated meat will be used as animal food.

Only 2,500 of Sweden's 20,000 Lapps, descendants of northern nomads, still herd reindeer for their livelihood. But community leaders nevertheless say they stand to lose much because of the disaster.

In addition, Chernobyl fallout has contaminated much of the wild game, fish and berries that are mainstays of the Lapp diet.

"Sweden's reindeer stock" is estimated at 275,000 animals.

Future base leases could require a vote

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — The panel drafting a new constitution approved on Thursday a provision that could make new leases for U.S. military bases in the Philippines subject to legislative approval or even a public referendum.

The panel voted 26-15 to approve the provision, a compromise between those who want the bases closed when the current lease expires in 1991 and those who think the issue does not belong in the constitution.

The compromise provision would require that the lease be a formal treaty between the two countries and that both the Philippine legislature and the U.S. Senate approve it. Under the provision, the Philippine legislature could vote to submit the treaty to a public referendum.

Currently the lease for Clark Air Base and Subic Naval Base — the largest overseas American bases — as well as three smaller facilities, can be extended by presidential edict.

"The Philippine government cannot enter in a mere executive agreement ...," said the Rev. Joaquin Bernas, a critic of the bases and

co-author of the compromise agreement.

"Certainly the provision allows for renewal of the U.S. military bases under certain conditions. ... But it will be more difficult now," he said.

The commission is scheduled to finish the draft constitution and submit it to the voters later this year.

The continued American military presence is one of the thorniest issues facing President Corason Aquino.

The U.S. military has maintained installations in the Philippines since taking the country from Spain in the 1898 Spanish-American War.

Under a March 1947 agreement, concluded after Philippine independence, the United States was allowed the use of 23 bases for 99 years.

The lease was reduced to 25 years starting in 1966, and the United States has gradually relinquished control of all but five installations, including three small communications and recreation facilities.

Under a 1979 amendment to the lease agreement, the two countries agreed to review the status of the bases every five years.

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Delegates blame each other for strains

JURMALA, U.S.S.R. (AP) — Soviet and American delegates wading up a private conference blamed each other Thursday for the new strains they have developed in U.S.-Soviet relations.

Soviet delegates denounced a U.S. order to expel 25 of Moscow's diplomats at the United Nations, while American speakers charged that the KGB is holding American journalist Nicholas Daniloff hostage.

The five-day conference at this Baltic resort in the republic of Latvia will end today after closing speeches.

Vladimir B. Lomeiko, a Soviet ambassador-at-large and former Foreign Ministry spokesman, called the expulsions "a specific and concrete blow to relations."

He said the expulsions were "all the more so calculating" because they came on the eve of talks in Washington on Friday between Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze and U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz.

The U.S. State Department has ordered the 25 Soviets to leave by Oct. 1 under an order that the Soviet staffing at its U.N. Mission be

reduced over a two-year period.

Edward Djerejian, spokesman for the U.S. National Security Council and a former White House deputy press secretary, gave the American address in Thursday's debate on the role of mass media in superpower relations.

He explained the philosophy of American journalism and described U.S. reporters as aggressive news gatherers who are naturally skeptical of official statements.

Referring to the arrest of U.S. News & World magazine correspondent Daniloff, charged by the

Soviets with spying, Djerejian said: "The arrest of Nicholas Daniloff undoubtedly is a deprivation of the rights of journalists."

"The Soviet Union must take into account this situation and cover the provisions of the Helsinki Final Act's accords on journalism, which clearly state that journalists cannot in any way be punished as a result of lawful pursuit of their professional duties," he referred to the agreement, signed in Finland by East and West bloc countries, European security and cooperation

Soviet leader says Daniloff caught in act

MOSCOW (AP) — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev on Thursday said U.S. reporter Nicholas Daniloff was a spy caught in the act of espionage and that Washington was exploiting the case to spoil superpower relations.

Russian-language newscasts and the official news agency Tass said Gorbachev made the remarks during a meeting with residents of the southern Russian city of Krasnodar.

Gorbachev went to Krasnodar on Wednesday for his first public appearance since he went on vacation Aug. 16.

During the meeting, the Soviet leader said Daniloff was "a spy who was caught red-handed."

Daniloff, a 51-year-old U.S. News & World Report correspondent, was detained in Moscow on Aug. 30 by eight KGB secret police agents after he met a Soviet acquaintance who handed him a package.

Gorbachev said that the United States should use that espionage matter in order to spoil Soviet-American relations and to sow doubts about the Soviet Union's policy, to damage its image, the image which people, especially in America, were beginning to put together.

The U.S. response to the Daniloff case was designed "to reap a harvest of hatred toward us" and "spoil relations," Gorbachev said.

But, he added, "we will not become nervous, comrades, and we will not be provoked."

He also said that "compared with the whole of international policy and relations ... this is of course a routine event," apparently reiterating previous comments by Soviet officials that the case should not disrupt superpower relations.

Building burns

SHANGHAI (AP) — The worst fire in Peking in a decade destroyed a five-story building Thursday but caused no casualties, the official Xinhua News Agency said.

The blaze burned the top four stories of the Commodities Exhibition Center for the city's Commerce Bureau in downtown Shanghai, Xinhua said.

Xu Qingyu, director of the firefighting division of the city's Public Security Bureau, estimated damages at \$540,000, Xinhua said.

Murphy to seek funds for inmate boardings

TWIN FALLS — State Corrections Director Murphy said Thursday he plans to seek \$1.25 million from the 1988 state Legislature to pay counties for holding state inmates because of a limit on the prison population.

Murphy also said he has not seen political approach on the site selection of a new 500-bed maximum-security prison, being sought by more than 25 communities around the state. Among those cities are Twin Falls, Gooding, Burley, Wendell and Glenns Ferry.

Murphy was in Twin Falls Thursday to address the Kiwanis Club.

The limit on the prison population was imposed in December because of overcrowded conditions. The prison system now holds 1,600, but was designed for much fewer.

Murphy said following the meeting, "As a result of the limitations, counties have to hold state inmates until space becomes available in the prison. Some counties have complained they are holding the state's prisoners with no compensation from the state."

Murphy said he plans to seek funds to pay the counties for boarding state prisoners. "But that's a very small problem," he added. "The problem is a continued backlog of state-bound inmates in county jails, particularly acute because a new prison pro-

ject wouldn't be completed by 1990.

State prison officials originally predicted that the limit would affect about 15 inmates for a few days. At last count, however, there were about 50 inmates on hold, some for weeks, he said. By next spring more than 130 inmates could be backed up in county jails.

"And, that's the problem," he said.

A 100-bed addition at a prison facility in Orofino has been proposed as a quick solution to the overcrowding. An Orofino expansion should keep the backlog near present levels, Murphy said. But the proposed \$3.5 million project is still a "long way" down the road.

Murphy said some good candidates for the new 500-bed facility have emerged from the

study. But he wouldn't say which cities were in the lead.

The site selection process has been delayed because of the number of sites under consideration, he said. There initially were six or seven sites, but now more than 25 cities have shown an interest and "it just took a lot longer."

State officials are studying the potential construction costs of building a new prison in the various sites, Murphy said. The study should be completed in November.

The state Attorney General's Office was asked by state Sen. Walter Yarborough, R-Grand View, to investigate the delay in the site selection process to determine if im-

proper political influences were holding it up.

Murphy said he hasn't seen any political pressure, and he's not going to worry about it.

"No one's contacted me," he said. "We'll do whatever we have to and hopefully, be able to defend it (the choice)."

The decision on the site will be made by the Board of Corrections and Permanent Building Fund Council.

Murphy previously reported that a new prison would have a \$7 million to \$8 million annual payroll that could generate \$25 million to \$30 million for a community housing the facility.

EPA officials try to allay feedlot fears

TWIN FALLS — Top officials from the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency Thursday tried to calm fears of local dairymen about proposed rules regulating animal waste runoff in rivers and streams.

Some of the 50 dairymen and cattlemen said they felt better after the session at the Canyon Springs Inn. But there were a number who criticized the federal government for trying to drive them out of business with regulation.

There was a sharp exchange between an EPA scientist from Seattle and a Paul dairy farmer.

"In five years, the way it's going, we won't have dairymen," said Boyd Woodward of Paul.

"I don't believe that," said EPA's Karen Harder softly.

She said EPA was dropping a requirement that small operators get discharge permits.

Woodward said the EPA will put the regulations through and add teeth to them later. "They're trying to squeeze the farmer out. I don't like it," he said.

"Asked if he thought it was a good idea to control runoff, he said: 'I don't think it's a bad idea to control runoff. I don't like to see the bureaucrats running everything.'"

Adrian Boer of Jerome said he was glad he attended the hearing. He found out his 600-cow dairy operation is already in compliance with the proposed rules. Boer said he will have to file a notice of intention to comply.

The proposed rules are intended to end runoff from dairies and feedlot operations in all but the wettest years. They would require operators to build confinement structures, lagoons or ponds.

"They affect dairies with more than 200 head and feedlot operations with more than 500 head. In some cases, smaller operations which hurt water quality may also be required to have

a permit, according to the EPA.

"Most of the larger dairies in Jerome County have containment. Some will have to enlarge," said Boer.

There is widespread and high-level contamination from animal waste in Magic Valley creeks and streams, according to state tests.

The workshops in Twin Falls Thursday and in Boise on Friday came at the request of Sens. Steve Symms, James McClure and Cong. Larry Craig. They asked "that the comment period on the proposed regulations be extended until Sept. 30, said Robbie Russell, the recently appointed EPA regional administrator.

Russell, a former Idaho assistant attorney general, told the workshop participants his approach to running the regional EPA office in Seattle is not to drive the regulated parties out of business.

In July, dairymen and cattlemen blasted the EPA at hearings in Twin Falls and Boise for failing to consult affected parties. Some said the proposed changes would cause financial hardship in lean times. But other Magic Valley residents said they were bothered by runoff during the wet-season and applauded EPA's efforts to do something about it.

The target date to have the proposed permit system in place is Jan. 1, 1987, said Lynn McKee, head of the EPA's Idaho operations office. McKee, Russell and other top EPA officials attended Thursday's workshop.

Since July, EPA has softened or is considering softening a number of requirements. In the proposed regulations:

Instead of setting an amount of winter precipitation an operator is required to retain, the proposed regulations will let the operator design a facility specific to local conditions.

The EPA is also considering dropping a requirement that operators develop a detailed operating plan.

TWIN FALLS — The Idahoan who heads the regional office of the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said Thursday he doesn't want to carry out environmental laws in a way which drives people out of business.

Robbie Russell added he "doesn't want to make things so complicated you need a Boise lawyer to figure them out."

The former Boise lawyer spoke to 80 dairy and feedlot operators attending a workshop at the Canyon Springs Inn. The topic was the proposed EPA regulations controlling animal waste runoff into state waters.

"We're not here to make you lives

miserable," Russell said. The former Idaho assistant attorney general said he believes in negotiating the rules with the people affected by them. "I would rather go to court after we have exhausted all the opportunities," Russell said.

Russell's office in Seattle oversees environmental issues in Idaho, Alaska, Oregon and Washington.

Contract OK'd for water plant

TWIN FALLS — A new contract with the company operating the Twin Falls Wastewater Treatment Plant will cost the city about 4 percent less than last year.

The City Council on Tuesday authorized Mayor Doug Volmer to sign a contract with OMI of Kingwood, Texas, for the operation of the plant during fiscal year 1988-87, beginning Oct. 1.

The base fee for the new fiscal year is \$1.2 million, which is about 4 percent less than last year.

"Improved efficiency" at operating the plant was the biggest reason for the decrease, City Manager Don Courtney said.

The amount budgeted for the last contract was \$1.27 million, because it was OMI's first year operating the facility for the city.

"The (OMI) were able to operate it this past year for less than they had expected," Courtney said.

The fee is based on direct costs to OMI for operating the plant, such as repairs and other expenses, and indirect costs, such as expenses for bringing people to Twin Falls to make repairs, Courtney said.

Despite the decrease in the contract fee, sewer rates will increase about 2.5 percent Oct. 1.

The decrease in the contract wasn't enough to offset the debt service on a new Grand View sewer collector line, Courtney said.

The contract also contained a clearer picture of the city's and OMI's liability on any claims resulting from the presence of contaminants.

Compared to last year's contract language, there was little change, said City Attorney Shane Bengoechea.

Safety officers 'yes' to drug testing

TWIN FALLS — An official with the Twin Falls Police Division said Thursday that public safety officers from the fire division have volunteered for the mandatory tests for drug use detection.

Public Safety Director Qualia said that because of all the reports that officers of the department have been using drugs, he asked all personnel if they would volunteer for the tests on a basis of once or twice a week on request.

"Of the 50 employees asked, all but two agreed to the tests. Two others are presently in town. I don't believe they will take the tests," he said.

Qualia said the tests will be illegal drug only and will not involve prescription drug use. Employees may be required to take it. It will be the responsibility of each employee to inform the supervisor when the results are received.

Qualia said the tests will be required for all employees.

"Discover the undiscovered America... Idaho." Using this theme, the five-year-old Idaho Travel Council is attempting to establish tourism as a major industry in Idaho, says Chuck Webb, Region 4 representative for the ITC.

Webb spoke Thursday morning at a kickoff breakfast for the Leadership Twin Falls program, a leadership training program operated annually by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

Tourism is the third-largest industry in the state, Webb said. But Idaho ranked 39th out of 50 states in state funding for tourism promotion a few years ago and has since gone down to 41st.

A 2-percent lodging tax generated \$1.6 million last state fiscal year, he said. Forty-five percent of that is spent on the state level for promotion by the ITC. 45 percent is divided up among the state's six regional growth areas such as Magicland and 10 percent is spent on ITC salaries and administration costs, Webb said.

House Bill 100, which created the ITC, separated the state into six regions. The Magic Valley is within the Magicland area.

"We had \$3 million at a state level, we'd have just enough to do everything we wanted to do," he said. The money currently available on the state level is about \$750,000.

More tourism promotion, urges Webb

The main goals of the ITC are to develop better marketing programs, increase the number of visitors to Idaho, promote longer stays by visitors to Idaho, inform Idaho citizens of the benefits of tourism, and represent the interests of Idaho industry.

His main concern with the promotion of tourism as a major industry is a problem with service into Idaho by the major commercial airlines.

"This airlines thing has gone crazy. We can't promote tourism if we can't get the people here," he said.

Webb has been trying to convince Western airlines to schedule weekend flights into Twin Falls from Salt Lake City, but has not received any encouraging responses, he said.

"Gateways" such as Twin Falls should be taken advantage of for tourism, he said. "We've got to make them work. The runway at the Twin Falls airport is big enough for a 747," he said.

Because of the high cost to the airlines of scheduling flights into places such as Twin Falls, many people with the airlines are "cautious," Webb said.

Webb said he would like to see a more broad-based tax for increased funding, but added, "Nobody likes more taxes."

The ITC receives approximately 100,000 requests each year for information about visiting Idaho. About 67,000 of those requests are a result of the ITC's advertising, Webb said.

ing local businesses involved in the promotion of tourism is the "threat" to an increased number of visitors, he said.

"There is also an occasional negative attitude toward people from out-of-state, he said. "People (Idahoans) need to realize that tourism isn't going to ruin the state. It's good, clean business. It's the best one-on-one business a state can have," he said.

Webb also said that Idaho is "missing the boat" as far as the movie business is concerned. Referring to the recent cancellation of the filming of a movie at the Craters of the Moon National Monument, Webb said, "If costs from people wishing to see where the Oregon Trail passed could have been on top of problems like that, Idaho was 'stumbled on' as a good state for making movies, he said. "Usually, it's a matter of solicitation, a matter of selling yourselves to the movie industry. Idaho just tends itself to movie-making," he said.

Another "segment of the tourist industry" is the historical significance of the state, Webb said. Virginia Ricketts, local historian, said she has received a great number of requests from people wishing to see where the Oregon Trail passed through Idaho.

A historical museum in Jerome, which does little advertising, received 1,500 visitors last year, representing 15 states and two foreign countries, Ricketts said.

Symms, McClure urge BPA to drop plans for surcharge

WASHINGTON (AP) — Idaho's two U.S. senators have urged the Bonneville Power Administration to drop plans to impose a 10-percent surcharge on electricity, in an effort to reduce the cost of energy conservation.

Senators Symms and McClure said the BPA's plan to raise rates to 10 percent to power trains, it could force many Idaho farmers out of business, said senators Steve Symms and James McClure in a letter Thursday to BPA administrator Tom Ivers.

Because many Southern Idaho farmers irrigate, heavily, the 10-percent surcharge will add to the production costs, the senators said.

"Farming in Idaho is the toughest business in any of our farm states for the lack of farms or ranches that have been in their families' hands for generations," they said.

Threatening them with a 10-percent increase in their electricity bills... could mean the difference whether they can make it or not," they said.

Besides rural cooperatives, the communities of Idaho Falls, Burley, Soda Springs, Minidoka, Rupert, Heyburn, Declo, Albion and Bonanza Ferry could all or part of their power through BPA.

The senators said that for customers of the Ball River Rural Electric Cooperative in south-central Idaho, the surcharge could cost customers an average of \$47 per year each. For an irrigator in the Ball River system using a 125-horsepower pump, the average cost of the surcharge would be \$1,689 per year for each pump.

The Northwest Power Planning Council has been trying to establish model conservation standards. They save electricity through better insulation in buildings and other practices.

Idaho must rate by Jan. 1 whether to implement the surcharge on communities and its areas, which have not adopted the model conservation standards.

Symms and McClure said that due to the current surplus of power in the Pacific Northwest, the surcharge is not cost-effective.

The proposal also has stirred much controversy in the last two sessions of the Idaho Legislature, with legislators objecting to the proposal.

Burley seeks proof on PCB charge

Burley wants proof it contributed to PCB contamination in the Washington basin, while Soda Springs has been fined \$10,000 by the federal government for PCB disposal violations.

Burley City Attorney Bill Parnas has written council members that any involvement in the preliminary stages of the cleanup effort must be "clearly documented" with the support of the city.

Burley is among 10 Northwest utilities being asked to share the cost of a study estimating the extent of PCBs on property throughout the Washington Basin. Soda Springs, Idaho, was fined \$10,000 for PCB disposal violations.

The utilities at various times had power transformers to Russ Electric, a company that disposes of PCBs. The company has the equipment, which resulted in the spill of PCBs.

PCBs were used as a flame retardant in power transformers, but were never used in other studies linked to the substance to cancer.

Although Russ Electric is directly responsible for the spill, federal law spreads the liability to those who own the transformers.

Meanwhile, the federal Environmental Protection Agency has fined Soda Springs \$10,000 for allegedly violating disposal storage rules for PCBs.

The penalty was levied in June after inspectors found three electrical transformers leaking.

"Since the PCB content in these transformers was not known, they were assumed to be PCB-contaminated transformers," the EPA said.

Russell grew up on a ranch in the Moscow-Grangeville area and told the dairy and cattlemen he knew the history of a cow and how to hale hay.

Russell talked about the need for maintaining the state's water quality but also referred to tradeoffs necessary to maintain a modern way of life and retain industry.

He was wary of commenting on a dispute between environmentalists and the forest industry regarding how to control stream and river pollution from non-specific sources related to farming, logging and development.

But eventually, he will have to accept a state-federal task force for many months.

Russell said he was a friend of GOP gubernatorial candidate David Leroy but he wouldn't say whether he supported Leroy's position on the controversial Elmer-Hammer road improvement plan in eastern Idaho.

Leroy has sided with farmers and ranchers in supporting improved roads which run through the winter range of an Idaho elk herd. Environmental groups such as the Idaho Conservation League oppose the road improvement, saying it will interfere with the animals' winter feeding.

Russell, a former Ada County Republican chairman, is still new on the job but since assuming office in July he has determined Idaho is in "pretty good shape environmentally."

He said this is because the Gem State has less population and density than neighboring Oregon and Washington. "Pollution follows people," Russell said.

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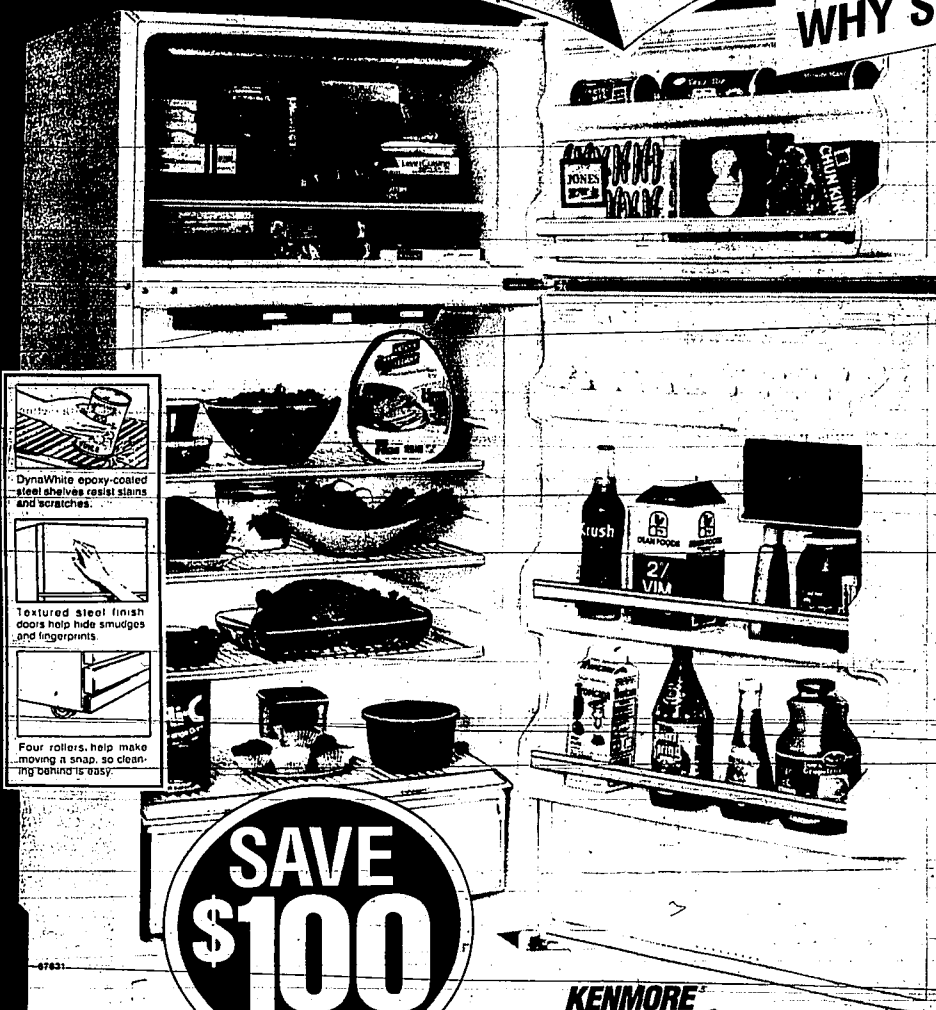

Grizzlies dominate 2-2 Bruins, 21-0

IDAHO FALLS — Skyline defensive back Todd Halverson picked off two Twin Falls passes and returned them for touchdowns to lead the Grizzlies to a 21-0 Gem State Conference victory over the Bruins Thursday night.

Halverson sprinted 35 and 46 yards for his touchdowns after piffing passes from Rick Horner and Joel Jund in the first and fourth quarters, respectively.

With the Grizzlies improved their record to 3-1 and 3-0 in the Gem State Conference while the Bruins dropped to 2-2 and 1-1.

"After getting beat 49-3 last week by Meridian, I don't feel that bad about what we did here tonight," Twin Falls Coach Bill Jones said. "We did a lot of things well. Still, when I look back I see so many places where we could have beaten Skyline."

The first half particularly was frustrating for the Bruins. They were unable to find many holes in the opposing defense through the opening quarter, but the Grizzlies got a break when Halverson stepped in front of a Horner pass with 49 seconds left.

Suddenly, the Grizzlies were ahead 7-0 even though their offense had picked up just one first down.

After the kickoff, the Bruins made an impressive comeback taking the ball from their own 27-yard line to 62 yards in 20 plays to the Skyline 11. On three occasions, Twin Falls coach Rick Harder, who emerged as the game's leading rusher with 79 yards.

"During that series in the first half, Twin Falls was really firing off (the line)," Skyline Coach Dale Guilford said. "They were hitting us harder than an anchor team. We played the game including Meridian. They had us on the ropes."

Even so, the Bruins couldn't find pay dirt. With a fourth and three from the Skyline 11, they tried a field goal attempt. But Fred Hill, substiting for injured David Glenn, saw his 27-yard attempt drift wide.

Trailing 7-0, Twin Falls made another attempt to start the third quarter. The Bruins took the opening kickoff from their own 28-yard line and called on junior quarterback Jund, who was injured in the first game of the season and handed three passes, including an 18-yarder to Alex Lebeau. The Bruins were aided in the drive by two personal foul penalties that came up short.

"Twin Falls got to a first-and-10 on the Skyline 14 but again, the drive bogged down and Hill's 38-yard field goal attempt came up short."

After that things went Skyline's way.

Early in the fourth period, the Grizzlies completed a 55-yard drive that began when they recovered one of the Bruins four fumbles as Jeff Leavitt plunged in from the one.

Big man scores 3 to spark Bengals

Browns lose their 7th home opener

CLEVELAND — Fullback Larry Kinnebrew used his 258-pound frame to power his three touchdowns Thursday night, giving the Cincinnati Bengals a 30-13 victory over the Cleveland Browns in a nationally televised NFL game.

The Browns, 1-2, have now lost seven straight home openers. The Bengals, 2-1, have won five of the last six meetings with Cleveland.

The Browns trailed 13-7 late in the second quarter before rallying to tie the game 13-13 midway through the third quarter.

But Kinnebrew, who had gone two yards for a touchdown in the first half, scored on bursts of two and four yards to cap consecutive long scoring drives in the second half that put the Bengals up 27-13 with 10:31 to play.

Jim Breach added his third field goal of the game, a 25-yarder, with 2:02 to play.

James Brooks rushed for 118 yards on 14 carries for the Bengals, who totaled 257 yards on the ground. Brooks' late included a 53-yard run that set up Breach's final field goal.

Kinnebrew added 94 yards in 25 carries.

Kinnebrew ran seven times for 47 yards on the 12-play drive that put the Bengals ahead for good at 20:13 late in the third quarter, and Bill Johnson ran 34 yards to set up Kinnebrew's clinching touchdown early in the fourth period.

Breach opened the scoring in the first quarter with a 48-yard field goal that narrowly cleared the crossbar, but Cleveland answered with a touchdown when cornerback Frank Minnifield covered a blocked punt in the end zone for a 7-3 lead late in the first quarter.

The block of Jeff Hayes' punt by Felix Wright was the Browns' first since 1975.

Kinnebrew slipped inside the right flap for a 2-yard touchdown to cap a 70-yard drive to give the

Bengals a 10-7 advantage early in the second quarter. Breach added a 33-yard field goal after Jeff Gosselt's second-punt-of-the-night.

Bahr hit field goals of 19 and 34 yards to tie the game 13-13.

The Bengals' powerful running game defused an anticipated battle between their third-year quarterback, Boomer Esiason, and Cleveland's second-year passer, Bernie Kosar.

Kosar, 22, completed an impressive 28 of 40 passes for 293 yards, including a string of 10 straight completions at one point in the fourth quarter after the game had essentially been decided.

The left-handed Esiason, 25,

completed 12 of 21 passes for 152 yards and one interception.

The Browns' running game was hurt by the absence of Kevin Mack, who had rushed for 205 yards in two games against the Bengals last year. Mack has been out since bruising his shoulder in Cleveland's season-opening loss at Chicago.

Mack's backfield mate, Earnest Byner, caught 10 passes for 77 yards but was held to 16 yards rushing on nine carries.

Ohio Newsome caught two passes to extend his streak of catching at least one in a game to 101 games.

The game was the 500th in the professional football career of

Bengals General Manager Paul Brown, who founded both the Cincinnati and Cleveland franchises.

Brown coached Cleveland for 225 games in the old All-American Football Conference and the NFL from 1946 to 1962. He has been coach or general manager of the Bengals since he formed them as part of the old American Football League in 1968.

Caldwell football/baseball coach Alvaro, 48, dies

CALDWELL — Charlie Alvaro, a coach at Caldwell Junior and Senior High schools for 26 years, died of a Wednesday morning of an apparent heart attack. He was 48.

Alvaro was pronounced dead at 8 a.m. Wednesday at Caldwell's West Valley Medical Center. He was in his 20th year as head football coach; he had been the head baseball coach for 23 years. He was also a physical education instructor at Caldwell.

Bill Cooper, an assistant under Alvaro, was named head coach on Wednesday. Plans are for the team to play its scheduled game against

Lewisston on Friday night at Stimplot Stadium in Caldwell.

After school officials were notified of his death they took the football players aside and told them. The announcement of his death was made to the student body afterward.

"I don't think we've gotten over the shock," said Doug Alvaro, Alvaro's oldest son. "It happened so quick."

"He hadn't been sick," Principal Warren "Moke" Strong said of Alvaro, a heavy smoker. "Tuesday, Charlie said that he was a little tired and tapped his chest and said he was feeling kind of funny."

"It was just a total shock. Nobody

had any clue. Things had just been going well for him."

"I couldn't believe it," said running back and co-captain Dan Wegner. "It's just terrible, it hit the team really hard. He was just a great guy."

Caldwell Athletic Director Bob Dele fought back tears as he talked about Alvaro and the reaction of the students. "School went as well as could be expected," he said. "There was shock, disbelief. We muddled through the school day as best we could. It was a day when everybody pulled together, made a day out of a day that was a tragedy."

Alvaro was born on April 22, 1938,

in Honolulu. He attended the College of Idaho in Caldwell, where he played football from 1957 to 1959. He was All-Northwest Conference of the quarterback and was a Little All-American in 1959.

After he graduated, he taught at Jefferson Junior High before being named the head baseball coach at Caldwell High School in 1964. He was named head football coach in 1968, succeeding George Nakano.

Alvaro had a record of 33-90 (40.5 percent) with his football teams and his baseball teams were 450-185 (.709).

He is survived by six children, his mother, three sisters and a brother.

Gossage restored in Padres bullpen

Settlement stops arbitration process

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Padres have lifted their suspension of relief pitcher Rick Gossage, a team spokesman said Thursday.

Gossage was reinstated to the active roster effective immediately and traveled with the team to Houston, where he will appear in a regular series against the Astros Friday night.

In a settlement agreed to by Gossage, his agent, his attorney, the Major League Baseball Association and the Padres, the pitcher agreed to accept a 30-day suspension and a loss of \$25,000 in salary that will be donated to charity. The players' association agreed to drop its grievance, which was to be the subject of an arbitration hearing Friday in Houston.

Gossage also apologized to team President Ballard Smith and team owner Joan Kroc for derogatory statements he made about them to reporters twice this season. He had called them "spineless and gutless" and "incompetent" in making social statements that winning baseball games.

Smith suspended Gossage under Major League rules, which allows a team to discipline players for continued insubordination.

"Effective today, Ballard Smith has lifted the suspension of Rick Gossage and reinstated him to the active roster of San Diego Padres," team spokesman Bill Beck said, reading from a prepared statement.

Smith said Gossage has accepted the 30-day suspension and a \$25,000 loss of pay while the players' association and Gossage agreed to withdraw the grievance filed against the club.

"We are pleased that he is back and that this matter has been resolved to the satisfaction of everyone concerned," Smith said. "We have all agreed to put the past behind us and to devote our full attention to winning baseball for the fans of San Diego."

Beck said Kroc directed that the forfeited salary be placed in a fund for the benefit of the Ronald McDonald House, a facility for parents who cannot afford to pay for hotel accommodations while their child is hospitalized.

Gossage said he was eager to return to playing baseball.

"I apologize to Joan Kroc and Ballard Smith for my comments about them, Gossage said in a prepared statement read by Beck. "I was wrong to make personal remarks about them, and I regret having done so."

"As a result of my meeting with them, I hope that they understand my primary concern has been the success of the club," Gossage said. "I believe we all have a better understanding of each other, and I am convinced that this all shows a strong commitment to winning baseball in San Diego."

Among his comments during his outrage over Smith's decision in June to ban him from the Padres clubhouse, Gossage accused Kroc of "poisoning the world" with food served at McDonald's restaurants; Kroc is chairman of the board of the giant fast-food chain.

"I also apologize to McDonald's. My family and I have been and will continue to be regular customers of McDonald's," Gossage said.

The suspension began Aug. 29, two days after Gossage's comments to a New York newspaper, in which he said Smith didn't know anything about winning baseball and didn't care.

Bosox southpaw Hurst hurls 5-hit, 7-1, win at Brew Crew

BOSTON — Because of a long layoff, southpaw Bruce Hurst feels in midseason form as the Boston Red Sox completed the American League East championship.

"I really haven't pitched that many innings (160) this year, and now I feel like it's July," Hurst said Friday night. He allowed only five hits in breezing to a 7-1 victory over the Milwaukee Brewers.

"I feel very fresh, real comfortable, and this may have been the best I've been since I came back," Hurst said after the Red Sox completed a four-game series sweep of the Brewers.

Hurst suffered a pulled groin muscle on May 31 and did not pitch until July 18. He is 7-4 since his return, but has won his last four starts and five of his last six.

"I probably have the best fastball velocity and location-wise since early in the season," he said. "I throw much better tonight. I also had a good hook and a fork (fork ball). I kept the corners, got some inside and outside the corners."

Hurst's 10th victory in 10 starts came in a six-run third inning that made things easier for Hurst.

With their 10th victory in their last 19 starts, the Red Sox moved to 10-7, behind the Milwaukee Brewers at home, the Red Sox hit their record to 90-57, going 33 games over .500 for the first time since Oct. 2, 1979.

The Red Sox also increased their AL East lead to 10 1/2 games over idle New York and Toronto, reducing Boston's magic number for clinching the title to 5.

Rich Gossage's complete game of seven victories and New York and Toronto losses will give Boston its first division flag since 1975.

Staked to a 7-0 lead, Hurst, 127 1/2, struck out 10 in the complete game of the season, scattering red five hits, striking out 11 and walking two. It was the fifth time this season and the 19th in his career that Hurst has struck out 10 or more in a game.

Milwaukee starter Pete Vuckovich, 1-3, retired the first five batters he faced before Dwight Evans was hit by a pitch and Tony Armas followed with a RBI double with two out in the second.

Boston's Wade Boggs had an infield single and a double, extending his hitting streak to 20 games, and also drew his 100th walk of the season, tops in the league.

Houston 5 Cincinnati 3

CINCINNATI — The Houston Astros completed a decisive three-game sweep of the Cincinnati Reds Thursday afternoon in a fashion typical of their whole season.

The Astros squeezed the most out of rather meager scoring opportunities, getting a pair of sacrifice flies from Alan Ashby and another from Davey Lopes to beat the Reds 5-3 and put the National League West little at their fingertips.

The Astros chipped away for their runs, scoring one on a wild pitch and three others on fly outs to smother the Reds' platoons.

The Astros completed a season-long domination of the Reds by taking their 14th victory in the 18-game Riverfront Stadium series.

Cincinnati into third place, leaving Houston with a 9 1/2-game lead over San Francisco in the NL West and reducing its magic number to eight.

Pittsburgh 3 Montreal 1

MONTREAL — U.L. Washington hit a ninth-inning sacrifice fly that capped a 3-1 victory over the Pittsburgh Pirates to a 3-1 victory over the Montreal Expos Thursday.

Pittsburgh was trailing by a run heading into the ninth against left-handed bullpen ace Jeff Reardon, 7-9.

Mike Diaz started the rally with an infield hit and then Tony Pena singled.

Economy at standstill during spring quarter

WASHINGTON — The U.S. economy was at a near-standstill this spring with growth at a slight 0.6 percent annual rate, the weakest performance since the end of the recession in 1982, the government reported Thursday.

The Reagan administration cited recent economic reports to support a belief that better days are ahead, but private analysts were not so optimistic.

The new report on growth in the gross national product from April through June represented no change in the overall figure from an earlier estimate a month ago even though the country's trade performance was even weaker than originally believed.

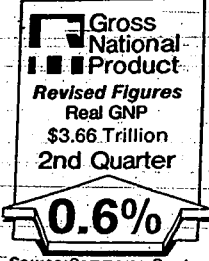
Inflation continued at extremely low levels, with a price index tied to the GNP rising at an annual rate of just 1.8 percent. This increase in the GNP deflator, which measures a changing selection of goods, was the lowest since the spring of 1967 and reflected the dramatic plunge in energy prices this year.

Administration officials, who have been forecasting a substantially higher growth in the second half of the year, said they were not disappointed that the GNP figure for the second quarter was not revised upward.

White House spokesman Larry Speakes, traveling with President Reagan on a campaign trip to Louisiana and Alabama, noted there have been "indications of a stronger economic activity in the current quarter, including declines in unemployment and increases in industrial production."

"In short, we expect a solid performance in the second half of the year and see no signs of an end to the Reagan economic expansion," Speakes said.

The administration is calling for the GNP to expand this year by 2.2 percent, which would mean the economy would have to grow in the second half of the year at a robust 4.2 percent annual rate to reach that target.



While economists are looking for some pickup in activity in the second half, most believe the increase will be far below the administration's expectations. A few are expressing the minority view that the country is skating dangerously close to a recession because of the deteriorating trade problems.

The GNP report said the trade deficit subtracted \$28 billion from GNP growth in the April-June quarter, \$3.4 billion worse than the earlier estimate. Exports declined at an annual rate of 9.8 percent, in part because of a slump in U.S. farm sales overseas, while imports were rising at a rate of 18.5 percent.

Concern over the deteriorating trade situation prompted new tough talk from Treasury Secretary James Baker, who warned that the administration is prepared to drive the value of the dollar lower against other currencies unless Japan and West Germany do more to stimulate economic growth.

"We would prefer not to have to rely on an exchange rate adjustment to remedy trade imbalances," he said in a statement released by his office. "But clearly, the current U.S. trade deficit cannot be allowed to continue indefinitely."

Baker's comments caused the

dollar to fall in trading Thursday.

"The deterioration in trade remains the principal problem facing the economy," said Allen Sinal, chief economist for Shearson Lehman Brothers of New York. He predicted "growth" in the July-September quarter would likely be between 2 percent and 3 percent.

"We should have a significantly higher growth rate, but it will be sub-par because trade will still be worsening," Sinal said.

Cynthia Letta, economist with Data Resources Inc. of Lexington, Mass., forecast growth in the current quarter will average 2 percent, "better than the second quarter but not great."

The Commerce Department two months ago estimated growth in the second quarter at 1.1 percent, revising that to 0.6 percent last month and in the current report.

While the new report did increase the trade deficit by \$3.4 billion, this was canceled by a revision in business inventories. Inventory growth still plummeted during the quarter at an annual rate of \$2.8 billion, but this decline was \$3.5 billion less than estimated last month.

Personal consumption spending continued to carry the economy in the April-June quarter, rising at an annual rate of \$5.7 billion, a 3.4 percent advance. Also providing strength was a 14.5 percent rise in housing construction, which has benefited from falling mortgage rates this year.

Business investment fell again in the second quarter, reflecting continued big cutbacks in oil and gas exploration because of falling prices. The various changes left the GNP at \$3.66 trillion, after adjusting for inflation. Before adjustments, the GNP was rising at an annual rate of 2.9 percent.

In a separate report, the government said "after-tax" profits of U.S. corporations rose 2.1 percent in the second quarter following a 3.1 percent increase in the first three months of 1988. This was a revision from a report last month that put the gain in profits at a stronger 4.1 percent.

WALLA WALLA, Wash. (AP) — Bargain-hunters in business suits and overalls crowded together Wednesday in an airport hangar, open to a chill wind as a two-day foreclosure auction began for Cascade Airways Inc.

Dave Bodner of Pepsi-Cola of Denver wanted some shop tools and a tug for his company's corporate jet. George McCoy of Fire District 4 in Walla Walla County wanted some items for the district's new machine shop. Someone from Naples, Fla., was shopping for Aero Virgin Islands.

Doug Macon, chief auctioneer, estimated earlier that the two-day sale would bring in \$500,000 to \$1 million.

There were nearly 400 buyers registered to bid when Macon began his rapid-fire auction spiel.

Cascade's last breath came in March, when Beech Acceptance Corp. repossessed the airline's fleet of six 18-passenger planes because of delinquent lease payments.

Earlier, the Spokane-based Cascade and Seattle-based Horizon Air Inc. struck a purchase deal. Horizon pledged \$1 million to keep Cascade aloft while waiting for federal approval of the merger when Cascade sought Chapter 11 reorganization protection.

But Washington Attorney General Kenneth Elkenberg argued the merger would reduce market competition and the federal decision on the merger stalled.

Everything was up for sale Wednesday, from tiny

sugar packets meant for passengers to tugs — the wheeled vehicles that move planes about on flight lines.

Opening prices were as high as 50 cents on the dollar of the items' retail prices.

"It's just what I expected; they're going pretty low," said McCoy.

"If the price is right, the equipment is well worth getting," said Bodner.

Tim Komberc, former director of operations at Cascade, was on hand representing Big Sky Airline of Billings, Mont., where he said he started work three weeks ago.

Cascade president Mark Chestnut was also on hand, mostly standing quietly in an office overlooking the sale and watching the proceedings.

Cascade's maintenance operations were centered at Walla Walla. After a Chapter 7 bankruptcy filing, equipment was shipped here from other Cascade points including Seattle, Portland, Ore., and Kallispell, Mont.

Few of Cascade's 1,100 creditors expect to see any money, according to Shaun Cross, a Cascade attorney.

The bulk of the auction's proceeds will be forwarded to the Internal Revenue Service, which is owed \$3 million. The Federal Aviation Administration and Seattle's First National Bank have a \$200,000 lien on the airline's ground equipment.

Cascade owes Walla Walla County Airport \$28,212 in rent and landing fees, but manager Gail Reed said the money probably would not be paid.

Aircraft auction slated Saturday

BOISE (AP) — One of the world's largest private collections of antique aircraft will be auctioned Saturday in Boise.

More than 40 planes, plus parts, accessories and flying memorabilia will be for sale at Glider Field Northwest of Boise.

The aircraft and parts are owned by Boise businessman J.L. Terteling, who collected them over a 20-year period.

The antiques, which Terteling once hoped to feature in an aviation museum in Boise, are "a fabulous private collection," said Bob Taylor, president of the national Antique Aircraft Association.

Terteling formerly owned "Eagle

Aircraft Co., which built 96 agricultural spray planes before it quit business in 1984 after four years of operation.

A spokesman for the Boise industrialist has said Terteling wants to sell the collection, remove three storage hangars at Glider Field and make — the land — available for development.

All items — including a World War I lighter plane and a car that converts into an airplane — will go to the highest bidder.

The value of the collection has not been disclosed.

The aircraft to be auctioned include:

- A 1916 British Avro World War I fighter in mint condition. In 1972, this plane flew across America to win top Antique Aircraft Association honors at the Antique-Air-Show in Blacksburg, Iowa. It comes complete with bombs, a machine gun and a long history, including the story of its creator, British pioneer A.V. Roe.

UP plans to purchase trucking firm

NEW YORK (AP) — Union Pacific Corp., parent of the nation's third-largest railroad, announced Thursday it will buy Overnite Transportation Co., a rapidly expanding non-union trucking company, for \$1.2 billion in cash.

The acquisition would significantly expand Union Pacific's ability to move freight and coincides with a company restructuring aimed at eliminating unprofitable operations and expensive labor costs.

William S. Cook, chairman, president and chief executive of Union Pacific, said in a statement from its New York headquarters that the acquisition would likely be completed sometime next year.

A.W. Duke Jr., president of Overnite, was not available to comment on Union Pacific's announcement, his secretary said.

Cook said Union Pacific would pay \$43.25 for each of Overnite's 27.7 million common shares outstanding.

Union Pacific's rail system spans 26,300 miles from the Midwest to the Pacific Coast, ranking it third behind Burlington Northern Inc. and CSX Corp. The company also has major interests in the oil, mining and real estate businesses.

Overnite has rapidly expanded from its Richmond, Va., base in recent years and now operates in 33 states and Washington, D.C. It is considered one of the most efficient trucking companies, partly because of its non-union labor force.

Cut-rate new cars will mean bargains for used car buyers

DETROIT — Bargain-basement financing for new cars will prompt a dramatic drop in used-car prices, and that will cut into sales by the nation's major automakers, industry analysts predict.

Used-car dealers agree prices are dropping, but caution customers not to expect a sea.

"Whenever new-car prices come down, carry car in the fleet, all the way down to the one going to the junkyard tomorrow, reflects in value," said David Jouppl, Detroit automotive analyst. "Used-car prices will go down because of the surplus created by the new-car sales."

General Motors Corp. and Ford Motor Co. in late August began offering 2.9 percent interest rates in an effort to clear the showrooms of 1988 cars.

Chrysler Corp. quickly followed with 2.4 percent financing, and then American Motors Corp., whose sales this year have been running about half those of a year before, weighed in with interest-free loans on most models.

The low rates will end Oct. 8, the automakers said.

Jouppl estimated 1.5 million used cars will tumble into the market as owners trade their cars in for new-car bargains.

'Triple witching hour' near; mixed market shows caution

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market showed no trend Thursday in its fourth consecutive mixed session as Wall Street cautiously approached another "triple witching hour."

Takeover news and speculation produced wide swings in several individual issues, while the rest of the market generally marked time.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks rose 78 to 1,774.18.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange slowed to 132.24 million shares from 141.04 million Wednesday.

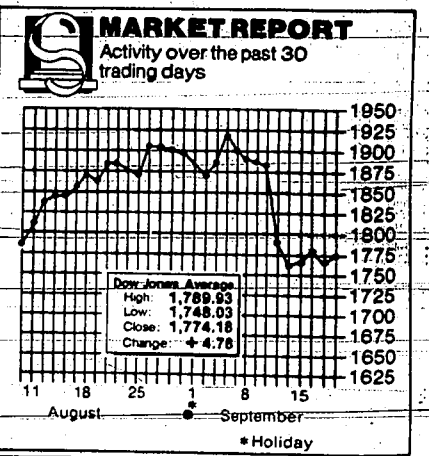
Analysts said traders were likely to proceed cautiously until today's close, which marks the last trading in a set of stock index futures, stock index options, and options on individual stocks.

On many similar occasions in the past, the stock market has experienced wide swings as professional traders complete computer-program strategies involving the expiring options and futures and individual stocks.

This time around, experimental rules have been adopted calling for advance disclosure of last-minute buy and sell orders in some big-name stocks, in an effort to decrease the markets' potential volatility.

Some analysts say this month's triple witching hour is likely to be less eventful than usual, partly because of those rules and partly because program traders may have completed much of their activity involving the September contracts during last week's record market decline.

But that view was by no means



unanimous, and brokers said many investors were inclined to wait until next week at least before making any big commitments, except in cases where takeover news and rumors called the tune.

The domestic automakers sold 8.2 million cars last year.

Bill Powell Jr., used-car manager of Can-

tor Chevrolet in Nashville, Tenn., said he has lowered his prices as a result of the incentives.

"If somebody were to trade in an '86 model car or an '85, I believe you could buy that car at a fairly decent price 'cause of the 2.9 percent," Powell said. "It is only natural that if you can buy a new car for cheaper than you have before, it is going to affect the used-car market."

He declined to estimate how much he had lowered prices as a result of the new-car financing rates.

Rick Cantalini, used-car manager of King-Charles Hillard Ford-Mazda in Fort Worth, Texas, said the extent prices go down will depend on the car.

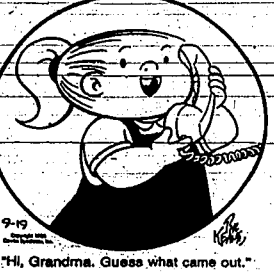

Nipp to lead workshop on Wee Sing series

Songbooks, tapes aim at 3- to 10-year-olds

TWIN FALLS — Susan Hagen Nipp, Coeur d'Alene co-author of the Wee Sing series of songbooks and tapes for children ages 3 through 10, will present music workshops for parents and teachers Sept. 27 at the Holiday Inn.

The idea of the Wee Sing books and tapes began about 10 years ago when two Portland music teachers, Pamela Conn Beall and Susan Hagen Nipp, two Portland music teachers, became friends while they had young children at home. Realizing that books containing the words to songs like "It's a Little Teapot" were available but were lavishly produced and expensive, they began collecting the words to old standbys and published their first book, "Wee Sing," themselves.

They sold 20,000 copies by knocking on doors of bookstores and making presentations at schools. In 1978, they signed a contract with Price/Stern/Sloan in Los Angeles, publishers of the popular Serendipity books. The publishing company has not deserted the authors' goal of affordability and the formula's worked: Wee Sing outsells all other all other Price/Stern/Sloan titles.

Judi Baxter, owner of Judi's Bookstore, which is sponsoring the workshops, said, "We've watched them (Wee Sing) ever since they began. Eight years ago we prepared the first book and it was literally mimed and stapled together so it's really exciting to see the tremendous growth in their market. Now they've come out with the Wee Sing Color books and the video."

The books are in wide use in homes and classrooms around the Magic Valley. Diana Westerman, who uses "Wee Sing Around the Campfire" and "Wee Sing Silly Songs" in her class of first-, second- and third-graders at the Acorn School in Twin Falls, said, "I use it for singing instruction since I don't play an instrument. We also use it at times like art when the kids are sitting in their seat and can sing along."

The songs on the tapes are all old and familiar, including "It Ain't Gonna Rain," "Down by the Station" and "Clementine." Many of the selections are not what one might expect to find in the school curriculum. Certainly the lyrics, "Nobody likes me. Everybody hates me. Guess I'll go eat worms," might make a proper school-teacher cringe. But fans of the series feel differently.

Westerman said, "There's a time to have fun. These songs are fun. They use hand motions and they learn sequencing and coordination. But the best thing about them is their parents learned them when they were children and they can sing them to their children. Fifteen of the 38 Head Start teachers in the Magic Valley have signed up for the workshops. Hanes said, "I can't carry a tune but my kids love singing the songs. She snaked up the lingo; ate in little cafes frequented by the loggers and business to their own.

One day she found a logging truck driver headed up the ridge after logs, caught a ride, and learned just how hair-raising it can be hurtling down a dirt road with tons of logs just inches from the back of your seat.

"Does she think romantic thoughts?" "No," she said. "I think characters. My books have a love relationship, but you have to dump enough problems on them to make the characters real."

"I want the problems to be believable. I want someone who lives in 1986 to read them and say, 'Oh yeah, I know what she's thinking.'"

Ms. Garrett spent two rambling weeks on a Dillon ranch before writing her sixth book, "Weaver of Dreams."

"If I'm going to set it someplace, I

want to make sure it's right," she said.

The characters are very real to her. Ms. Garrett said. She knows they're good ones when they take over. "If they don't take control and tell their own story, they aren't real," she said. "The last third of the book doesn't follow the outline she set up."

The characters told a better story than I did," she said.

The books are full of love scenes. "These aren't sweet romances," Ms. Garrett explains. "These are consummated relationships." And they're pretty modern ones, at that. In "Northern Fire," her third book, the hero and heroine have a baby before they marry.

Still, the love scenes aren't explicit. "It was told more I write hot, but tasteful love scenes," she said.

Ms. Garrett gets ideas everywhere, she said. "I could live to be 20 years old, and not run out of stories. I've always had a wild imag-

ination."

Ms. Garrett started writing more than six years ago. She lived in Phoenix, Ariz., had been divorced for 14 years, raised four children, had a good job as a corporate accountant. She hated the pressure of her job and dreamed of the mountains, but was

New children's books range from hippies to drunken dad

"Woodstock: Magic," written by Fran Leary and Ellen Goudge (AVON Press, \$2.50 paper back; ages 11-17). Aging hippies might well feel like calling for a canoe and a stout stool after taking a shower at this paperback original: a novel about a modern teenager's time-travel back to the '60s, that period of ancient history in which universal love, peace and bell-bottom hip-huggers reigned supreme.

Woodstock would be flowerchild Lou Greenspan uses her best friend's specially programmed computer to transport her back-in-time to the '60s, music and hallucinations ended madness of Woodstock Nation.

Then, after sending off a fascist crew of skinny-dippers and helping a baby named Jelly Bean be born in the back of a groovy hot-milk schoolbus, Lou decides to go to see what her suburban Connecticut hometown looked like some 20 years back. And...outright! she recognizes her mother delivering a baby rap at an anti-war rally! Being as her mom is currently a BMW-driving corporate lawyer, this is really far out.

And so on, in that vein. This is not all a well-written story — but it is, well, a trip, the second in a new series entitled "Swept Away" (swept away by time — swept away by love — You dig?).

"The Moonlight Man" by Paula Fox (Bradbury Press, \$12.95; ages 12 and up). This is another beautiful novel by veteran author Paula Fox, who gets better each time out.

Her most sophisticated book for young readers thus far, "The Moonlight Man" is about a teenager's emotion-laden summer with her estranged father — a brilliant, maddeningly attractive personality who is also, on bad days, a sloppy drunk given to throwing up and getting down on his hands and knees barking like a dog.

"Living with her father was like living with a crowd of people. One of that crowd was a drunken man, a snuffed-out outline of a person with a voice as soggy as a wet sponge," says Catherine Ames, Fox's main character. By the end of the story Catherine — and the reader — are left with an embittered delivery of love's ways and means, not all of them awfully pleasant.

It's rather a shame, in a way, that "The Moonlight Man" is classified as "young adult" — only because discerning post-10-year readers (who might already be fans of Fox's many adult novels) will miss an excellent story told in her superb prose.

"Turmp-O-Moto" by James Clavel, illustrated by George Sharp (Dell, \$3.95; ages 5-10). At the price, this book, by the author of "The Red Pony" and "Hatchet," is a severe disappointment.

Though the story itself is touching enough (young crippled Aussie girl meets a tiny jet plane which ends up walking), the book is vastly overproduced considering the unimpressive quality of the writing.

At times the prose does get peppy, as in this description of an evil spirit called Nurku: "Nurku stood as high as the heavens and he was dressed all in fire with five eyes and blue hair and ten fingers on each hand, his nails like long knives. Green poison dropped from the tips."

Now, for two sawbucks, don't we have a full-length portrait of the monster coming to us? But no, on the next page, the illustrator merely shows the beast's yucky, lime-green arm, looking something like a giant, alien-looking peapod with garden hoses trailing from it.

Sorry, but, you'll have to look elsewhere for the "classic tale to warm — and chill — the blood" promised by the dust jacket.

"Jack and the Bean Tree" retold and illustrated by Gail E. Haley (Crown, \$12.95). Caldecott winner Haley teaches at Appalachian State University, the notion of writing called the Gail Haley Collection: the Culture of Childhood (sounds worth a detour, doesn't it?). She

combines what can only be called psychedelico-rococo artwork with a musical, folkly prose in rewriting this classic fairy tale:

"Now the truth is, Jack never meant to take nothing from the giant's house this time, but when he heard that golden harp, it was like her music was playing on his own heart strings. And he needed her more than he'd ever needed food or money to buy things."

The truly scary part comes when that fee-fi-fo-lum giant enters the picture and he is really gross, a big, nasty, yellow-haired curmudgeon with mandarin-style fingernails, hairy ears and a set of jumbo-sized fangs.

But the story does turn out as well-

in the end, as it always does. The formerly poor Jack — now rich and happy — lives happily ever after with his maw and faithful hound dog.

"Who's That Knocking at My Door?" by Katharine Mich. illustrated by Tilde Michels (Baron's, \$7.95; ages 2-7). Really splendid full-page pictures do full justice to this adorable story-in-rhyme about what happens when animal enemies take refuge with a warm-hearted human being on a Children today will no doubt receive Hughes' work with equal zest.

"The Dream Keeper and Other Poems" by Langston Hughes (Knopf, \$8.95; ages 4 and up). A reissue of a volume first published in 1932, this book includes several dozen "Langston-Hughes" poems for

young readers, along with some lovely woodcut illustrations by Helen Sewell.

Barry Bostwick returns to play George Washington as president

George Washington has always been the nation's hero: first in the war for peace and first in the hearts of his countrymen. But he has a more remote hero—more distant than flesh-and-blood human.

"The difficult part of playing Washington is that his public image is one of aloofness," says Barry Bostwick, who plays Washington in "George Washington: The Forging of a Nation," a four-hour CBS miniseries that will be broadcast Sunday and Monday, Sept. 21 and 22. It is sequenced to the eight-hour 1984 miniseries that covered Washington's life from age 11 through to the conclusion of the American Revolution.

"If there was a coolness, there was a calculated precision; there was a controlled self-mastery aspect to his personality," says Bostwick. "And all that sort of led into that father thing."

Washington's image is due, in part, to his formidable accomplishments. He led a military collection of colonial troops to victory against the powerful British Empire during the long and bloody American Revolution. And he served as the first president of the United States during an extremely trying eight-year period of the nation's history, when there were no precedents to follow. And throughout it all, he retained enough judgment to reject the fancy titles and spurious honors that some would have liked to heap on him.

Washington wasn't completely perfect, of course. "There was a sort of a pomposity about him," says Bostwick. "He was self-righteous at times, and because of that a lot of people didn't like him. He was basically a shy man—sensitive and really diffident about his talents. He didn't smile a lot because he didn't have any teeth. He didn't have a quick mind. He always had to think things through. He had a fierce anger, but I think he'd go through great guilt whenever he expressed it."

Amazingly, this is about all the damaging information there is on Washington. Even when debunking national heroes was in vogue some 10 or so years ago, none of the would-be debunkers were ever able to lay a glove on Washington. "We didn't know

lot of bad things," Bostwick explains. "And if he did, we don't know about it."

The one factor in Washington's life that makes modern admirers uncomfortable is that he was able to do all he did and still remain a slaveholder. That factor made Washington extremely uncomfortable as well.

"Washington went through an awful lot of inner conflict about how he should deal with his slaves," says Bostwick. "In his will he freed all of them. He would have freed them in his lifetime if he hadn't been afraid it would have created what would eventually have become a civil war. There's a great scene that we shot between George and Martha (Washington's wife) trying to figure

out how they would do it, and they finally realized that they couldn't. They had to do it a ways away when they were out of the public eye. Otherwise the repercussions would be too great."

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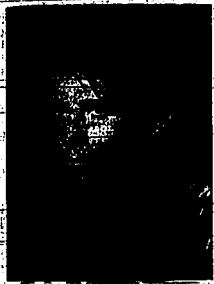

I was told to use the confessional as my dressing room. When the priest, who wasn't informed of our arrangement, found me in my underpants, changing for the next scene, he was horrified. Even though I hastily tried explaining to the well-meaning priest, he chased me clear out into the street, running all the way!"

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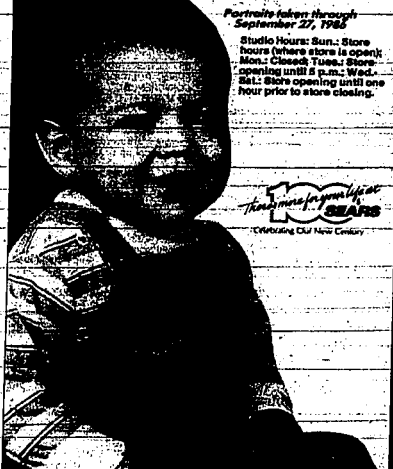

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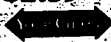

Our House and Easy Street send NBC to the top of the heap



NEW YORK (AP)—Using "The Cosby Show" and "The Golden Girls" as spirited spearheads, NBC won Top Five status for two new series, "Our House" and "Easy Street," and easily won the ratings last week figures from the A.C. Nielsen Co. showed Tuesday.

NBC averaged a 15.4 rating for the week of Sept. 7-13, while CBS had a 11.7 and ABC an 11.4. The three networks were as close as they've ever been, CBS' "Evening News" with Dan Rather had a 10.5 rating, 11 share, while ABC's "World News Tonight" with Peter Jennings and "NBC Nightly News" with Tom Brokaw each averaged a 10.4 rating.

"We're going to be a dominant all fall," said Gerald R. Barr, NBC's vice president for programming. A single Nielsen point equals 774,000 households, or 1.4 percent of the share measurement percentage of sets in the average household. NBC's 15.4 rating is a critically praised 20th anniversary offering. Wilford Brimley's "Our House" and Dan Rather's "Evening News" opened behind top-ranked "Cosby" last Thursday and took second place Sunday week with a 10.4 rating, 45 share. "We want the highest-rated fall premiere since 'The Godfather' opened on CBS in 1961," Barr said. "Our House" debuts as season 10, while "Cosby" comes into its regular 7 p.m. Sunday slot and ranked a respectable 11th with a 9.6 rating, 26 share. It was NBC's best regular series last week for the time period in the Nielsen survey.

"NBC has a history with that," said Mike Eisenberg, CBS research director.

NBC is ecstatic: "Even though the regular season hasn't started, if we keep up Sunday numbers like that, the season has just ended," Jaffe said.

Improvement on Sunday, against CBS' "60 Minutes" and ABC's "Disney Sunday Movie," was considered important in NBC's bid to repeat as prime-time champion. The 30-week 1986-87 season officially begins Sept. 22.

"60 Minutes," opening smartly its 19th season on Sunday, ranked eighth, but "Our House" apparently benefited from the "Disney Sunday Movie" being a repeat that finished 45th out of 50 shows. "Our House" seems likely to better NBC's Sunday shows last season, "Funky Brewster" and "Silver Spoons," which averaged a 16 share. Jaffe expects "Our House" to fall from a 26 share when "Disney" offers a fresh product. His forecast is a 20 share average.

CBS again showed Sunday strength with "60 Minutes" and its movie, "The Last Days of Patton," starring George C. Scott, which ranked ninth.

NBC also sought improvement this season at 8 p.m. on Sunday with "Easy Street," a sitcom starring Lonnie Anderson. The first episode received a big sampling behind "Golden Girls" and before the "Miss America Pageant" last Saturday. It ranked third with a 17.5 rating, 49

share, edging its lead in the follow-up shows. "Easy Street" has another Saturday exposure before moving to Sunday.

Jaffe noted that "Easy Street" did a better than last season's premiere of "Golden Girls," which also shared the fall with "Miss America." "It was a protected time period, but people obviously wanted to see it," Jaffe said.

"Easy Street had a very good number, but it was deceptive," Eisenberg said. "When you're No. 1, you have a lot of strong programming, a lot of promotions and a lot of places to support new programming."

The weak competition on Saturday helped NBC. The three programs on ABC and CBS were the week's lowest-rated shows: the first part of ABC's "Wings of War," which fared worse than the minimum, tonight ratings average of 9.4, ranked 47th; CBS' film, "Raging Bull," was last with a 4.8 rating, 8 share—the worst performance ever for a CBS movie.

CBS also introduced a new show, "The Wizard," an action-adventure series about a mild-mannered man. The series, which beats repeat programming on ABC and NBC, hits regular Tuesday this month, ranked 17th with a 16.0 rating.

"It had good sampling," said Marvin Mord, ABC's vice president for marketing and research services. "But the test is when it has to face normal competition."

"The Wizard," panned by Madison Avenue, needs to perform well in its second and third outings to be deemed successful, Eisenberg said.

ABC's "Monday Night Football" following last season's ratings success, opened with a strong performance, Dallas' victory over the New York Giants ranked seventh with a 21.3 rating. The Thursday game, New England vs. the New York Jets, was 20th with a 14.3 rating.

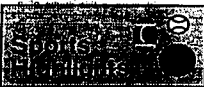
