## Twin Falls ready for Reagan's visit

### Thousands to attend GOP rally

TWIN FALLS — Four Republican women grabbed their irons and hot-footed it over to the College of Southern Idaho Expo Center Wednesday evening to help with the preparations for President Ronald Reagan's visit today.

Jean Seelig, Ruby Schrank and others pressed the wrinkles out of the Stars and Stripes so that 144 American flags will look crisp and sharp for the president and an expected crowd of more than 5,000 people inside the building.

Reagan's two-hour stop in Twin Falls is part of a campaign swing through Western states for GOP candidates. Reagan is stumpng for Idaho's Sen. Steve Symms, who is in a tight race with Democratic Gov. John Evans.

Organizers are expecting 10,000-15,000 people, and campaign caravans are coming from Pocatello, Idaho Falls, Nampa-Caldwell and Boise.

Republican Congressional candidate Mel Richardson will be leading the campaign caravans from Idaho Falls.

The Symms campaign will be bringing down at least two buses along with cars from Boise, workers said. CSI is cartfeling all classes today and closing all business offices and other offices on campus. CSI officials said. The closure will not affect the Halley and Burley classes, officials said.

Reagan's plane is expected to land in Twin Falls at 2:35 p.m. His speech is scheduled for 2:55 p.m., followed by a private meeting with 20 donors in the Herrett Museum on the College of Southern Idaho campus.

The rally is free, but residents had to apply in advance for tickets. Doors will be open at 1 p.m., and workers said today they expect lines to start forming before 10 a.m. Doors will be closed at 2:30 p.m., and no one will be allowed inside after that — for security reasons.

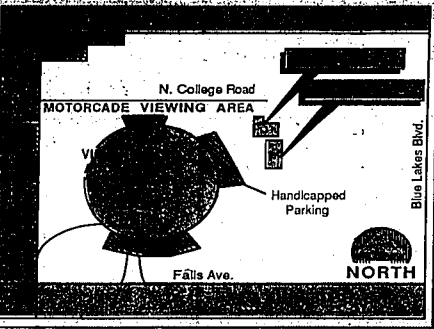
Large speakers are being set up outside for the overflow crowd, and the 20-minute speech will be televised by KMYR Channel 11 and King Video Cable Channel 10.

## Swing through West rolls on

RENO, Nev. — President Reagan, helping out Republican Senate hopefuls in the West, used the vernacular of this casino town on Thursday to pronounce "the economy is on a roll" and "about to hit another jackpot."

Reagan campaigned here for former Rep. Jim Santini, a one-time Democrat trailing in his bid to claim the Nevada Senate seat being vacated by longtime Reagan friend, Sen. Paul Laxalt, who reportedly was pressuring the White House for yet another presidential visit before Tuesday's election.

Noting a new Commerce Department report that showed the nation's trade deficit had decreased for

the second month in a row, Reagan said in remarks prepared for a rally: "I believe the economy is on a roll and I think it is a sure bet we're about to hit another jackpot. We pulled the handle and it came up Jobs, Jobs, Jobs."

Earlier, Reagan campaigned for Rep. Ken Kramer in conservation-conscious Colorado, portraying the Republican Senate candidate as a tireless worker to preserve the environment.

Reagan took advantage of the campaign stop to sign legislation expanding the nation's wild and scenic rivers system. Flanked by Kramer and the state's three other GOP congressmen, Reagan signed the bill in a private ceremony at a resort hotel on a high plateau in the shadow of the Rocky Mountains.

The measure that Reagan signed provides federal protection of Colorado's Cache la Poudre River, as well as the Saline Bayou in Louisiana and Black Cree in Mississippi. It also authorizes expansion of the New River Gorge National River in the East and provides private relief for some land owners in Idaho, where Reagan will be campaigning today.

The president later flew to Spokane, Wash., where he stayed overnight and will attend a rally this morning for Sen. Slade Gorton.

At a campaign rally for Kramer, Reagan said the GOP nominee "has been tireless in his efforts to preserve the environment. He believes, as I do, that a big part of being conservative is conserving

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## Questions about OPEC's future rising

BRUSSELS, Belgium — Saudi Arabia's surprise firing of its longtime oil minister, the charismatic Ahmed Zaki Yamani, comes a crucial juncture in OPEC's drive to rebuild a unified oil policy and regain control over prices.

It is too soon to know if the firing, announced Thursday in the Saudi capital of Riyadh, will hurt or help the oil cartel that Yamani led for 24 years. OPEC's success or failure is likely to determine the outlook for the global oil industry and influence economic growth worldwide.

The first clear signs may come Dec. 11, when the 13-nation Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries reconvenes in Geneva to renew its debate on a long-term approach to oil pricing and production.

"It throws OPEC into uncertainty for the indefinite future," Walter Levy, a New York-based

oil consultant to governments, said in a telephone interview.

"Yamani was the dominant figure for so long. His removal sent prices of crude oil and refined products soaring Thursday. That reaction was also strengthened by reports his successor had called for an emergency meeting of OPEC's pricing committee. Indicating a possible reversal of efforts by the cartel to boost prices.

At the New York Mercantile Exchange, contracts for December delivery of West Texas intermediate, the benchmark U.S. grade of crude oil, jumped \$1.31 a barrel to close at \$15.04.

Prices for November delivery of refined products also rose significantly. Heating oil closed at \$9.57 cents a gallon, up 2.9 cents, while unad-

ed gasoline rose to 40 cents a gallon, up 2.15 cents.

Yamani, 56, had served as Saudi oil chief since 1962, two years after the founding of OPEC, making him the longest-serving minister in the cartel. He had built a reputation as an intelligent and deft negotiator, overcoming bitter differences with Iran and other OPEC members.

As of Thursday afternoon, the OPEC secretariat in Vienna, Austria, had not received official notification of Yamani's departure, said James Audu, chief spokesman at the cartel's headquarters.

The Saudi government gave no reason for Yamani's removal, but Saudi Interior Minister Prince Naif bin Abdul Aziz said Thursday in Paris that the decision did not mean the kingdom was changing its oil policy.

Western observers said it was apparent, nonetheless, that King Fahd's decision signaled some dissatisfaction with Yamani's role as a

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## Gorbachev casts eye on Latin America

WASHINGTON — Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev is planning to visit Latin America, apparently in an attempt to penetrate peacefully an area where the United States has long been the dominant influence, administration officials say.

Gorbachev plans to visit Cuba, Moscow's closest ally in the hemisphere, and also is expected to become the first Soviet leader ever to travel to Mexico, Argentina and Brazil, the officials said. The trip, tentatively set for next spring, may include other South American countries as well.

Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard Shevardnadze visited Mexico City three weeks ago and laid the

groundwork for the Soviet-Mexican summit, according to the officials, who insisted on anonymity.

Some officials described the prospective visit to Mexico as a normal development in relations between the two countries. They said Mexico has long been interested in expanding its diplomatic horizons and that three previous Mexican presidents have visited Moscow.

The officials added that Shevardnadze and his Mexican hosts seemed intent on not saying anything that could be construed as hostile to the United States.

Other officials, however, said they were concerned that the Shevardnadze talks and the prospective visit by Gorbachev raises the possibility

of an expanded "Soviet foothold" in this hemisphere.

A long-term Soviet goal in Mexico is the opening of consular offices in northern Mexico, which would enable the Soviets to widen their intelligence-gathering capabilities in the southern United States, the officials said.

The uneasiness of some officials over the planned Mexican visit by Gorbachev has been heightened by the recent strains in U.S.-Mexican relations. The officials said a crisis of confidence exists which disrupts cooperation on combating drug smuggling and other issues.

Latin America is going through a period of political democratization, a trend which has received the enthusiastic support of the Reagan administration.

## Students shifting to middle of road

WASHINGTON — The real shift in political views among the nation's college students over the past two decades has been to the middle of the road, not from left to right, according to a study released Thursday.

The report, based on 20 years of polling data on 8 million freshmen as they began their college careers, also chronicles a sharp rise in students' interest in material success, and a steady decrease in their concern about developing a philosophy to live by.

The surveys document distinct changes in the makeup and lifestyle of college freshmen since 1966. Women, once outnumbered on campus by men, 57 percent to 43 percent, became a majority eight years ago and now fill 52 percent of all the seats.

Smoking is down, but beer drinking is up. High school grades are up sharply — but, so are the number of students who need remedial help.

The surveys of nearly 300,000 students at 550 colleges each fall, are conducted by the Higher Education Research Institute at the University of California, Los

Angeles, and sponsored by the Washington-based American Council on Education.

The authors, UCLA education professor and institute director Alexander W. Astin and Kenneth C. Green, the institute's associate director, released the 20-year trend report at a news conference.

Contrary to the conventional wisdom that college students are more conservative, "the real migration in student political attitudes has not been from left to right but from liberal to middle of the road," they said.

The proportion identifying themselves as political conservatives rose from 18 percent to 21 percent since 1970, while the proportion of liberals fell from 37 percent to 22 percent, and the middle-of-the-road group increased from 45 percent to 57 percent.

Eighty percent of freshmen noticed, 44 percent listed "being very well-off" as a top personal goal 20 years ago; last year 71 percent felt that way.

Eighty percent of freshmen cited "developing a meaningful philosophy of life" as a top value in 1967; last year, only 43 percent did.

## Hasenfus will testify today

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — A spokesman for the revolutionary tribunal trying Eugene Hasenfus said Thursday that the captured American would appear before the court to respond to the terrorism charges against him.

Spokeswoman Thelma Salinas said Hasenfus also would have a chance to examine the evidence against him when he appears in court today.

The decision was announced a few hours after Attorney General Domingo Reyes asked that Hasenfus be brought before the tribunal, "the sooner the better." Hasenfus previously appeared before the court on Oct. 20, when the charges against him were read.

Hasenfus, 45, of Marinette, Wis., was a crewman on a plane shot down Oct. 5 over southern Nicaragua.

## Challenger critic seeks probe

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard C. Cook, the former NASA budget analyst who has become a critic of both the space agency and the Challenger investigation commission, wrote Attorney General Edwin Meese on Thursday saying he believes "crimes may have been committed by high government officials."

"I have reached the conclusion that several officials of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration may be guilty of malfeasance and dereliction of duty with respect to the decision to launch Challenger," Cook wrote.

## Bennett criticizes book ruling

NEW YORK (AP) — It's a mistake to let children sex classes just because their parents find the textbooks objectionable, Education Secretary William J. Bennett said Thursday in criticizing a landmark federal court ruling.

"The effort to achieve a consensus in what should be taught, particularly in the area of values, should not be undercut by allowing people to opt out of discussions of these things if they have disagreements with this or that," Bennett said.

Bennett had not commented previously on the ruling last week by a Tennessee federal judge permitting seven fundamentalist Christian families to sue their youngsters' teachers if they were not forced to read textbooks that offended their religious sensibilities.

## Travelers warned of polio virus

ATLANTA (AP) — Federal health officials issued new warnings Thursday to travelers to get polio vaccinations, citing the case of a woman who developed the disease while visiting Asia.

Since 1979, when the last natural case of paralytic polio occurred in this country, at least 56 other cases have been reported. Fifty-one occurred in Iraq, although not unexpected, side effects from vaccine use.

But at least five cases occurred in Americans who came home with the disease after visiting countries where it is still circulating, according to the national Centers for Disease Control.

## Meese backs drug surveillance

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Edwin Meese on Thursday endorsed workplace surveillance of drug users, saying employers can help curtail narcotics abuse by keeping close watch on employees in parking lots and locker rooms and even in nearby taverns.

In a speech to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, Meese embraced an approach to on-the-job drug abuse prevention set forth by a former director of the Drug Enforcement Administration, Peter B. Bensinger.

## Murder charges filed in death

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — Authorities filed murder and abduction charges Thursday against the adoptive parents of a 13-year-old boy who prosecutors said was beaten to death while tied to the floor of a school bus where the family lived.

Michael and Karen Diehl, formerly of Post Falls, Idaho, remained free on bond after a closed hearing before the United States District Court Judge J. Davis Reed.

Their adopted son, Dominick Joseph "Andrew" Diehl died Wednesday of head injuries after five days in a coma. Paramedics found him unconscious Friday at a campground in a school bus where the Diehls lived with 17 children, ages 2 to 17.

## Argentina pledges use of force

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP) — Foreign Minister Dante Caputo said Thursday that Argentina would use force as "a final resort" if Britain tries to use expansion of its fishing rights around the Falkland Islands.

Meanwhile, the government canceled the discharges of about 3,500 conscripts and formed a special military committee in response to Britain's expansion of its fishing zone from three miles to 200 nautical miles.

Also, the Foreign Ministry asked other countries that fish the South Atlantic to ignore Britain's declaration Wednesday that it was expanding fishing controls over the windswept islands.

## Libya tries to secure its flank

ROME (AP) — Italy must guarantee that U.S. military bases on its soil will not be used to launch attacks against Libya, the African nation's deputy foreign minister said Thursday.

Ahmed Shahhat said Libya's people demand guarantees that "Libya will not be the target of hostile attacks started from Italian soil."

He told reporters the threat from U.S. bases in Italy is one of two main obstacles to better relations between Tripoli and Rome. The other hurdle is Italy's refusal to pay reparations to Libya for its colonial rule from 1912 to 1943, he said.

The day after U.S. warplanes raided the Libyan cities of Tripoli and Benghazi on April 5, Libya fired missiles at the Italian island of Lampedusa, apparently aimed at a U.S. Coast Guard radar station.

Reagan was heckled by a small band of demonstrators, some of whom got in a tug of war when Kramer supporters tried to tear down their banner that said, "Keep Star Wars in the movie theaters," the presence of his opponents, giving his definition of Star Wars "for those people who don't understand — I've seen a couple signs around here that indicate they don't." Reagan said he held Soviet leader Mikhail Gorbachev that he would share Star Wars technology but "I haven't quite been able to convince him I mean it."

Kramer is locked in a tussle battle with Wirth for the seat being vacated by Democrat Sen. Gary Hart, who is leaving to pursue a possible presidential bid in 1988. A poll released Wednesday by the Denver Post-News Center gave Kramer 45 percent, Wirth 44 percent and the rest undecided.

In Nevada, Santini is in an uphill struggle against Democratic Rep. Harry Reid to hold Laxalt's seat in the GOP column. A White House official, speaking on condition he not be identified, said Laxalt has appealed for Reagan to make a last-minute return visit to Nevada on Monday to help Santini.

In the number of students planning to major in business — from 14 percent in 1966 to 25 percent in 1985 and in prospective majors in English (from 4.4 to 1 percent), education (10.6 to 7.1 percent), physical sciences (3.3 to 1.6 percent) and math or statistics (4.5 to 0.8 percent) said Thursday.

The percentage of freshmen who frequently smoke cigarettes has declined from 17 percent to 9 percent since 1966. The percentage of beer drinkers jumped from 54 percent in 1966 to 75 percent by 1984 and has since tapered off to 67 percent.

Use of tranquilizers and sleeping pills is down.

More than half the freshmen in 1969 favored abolishing the death penalty; last year only one-quarter did. Support for legalizing marijuana has dropped from 53 percent in 1977 to 22 percent in 1985.

The report said there has been a steady erosion in academic skills among college students.

Only 11 percent in 1985 said improving their reading and studying skills was a "very important" reason for going to college. In 1971, only 22 percent felt that need. And 11 percent of the women entering college intended to pursue careers as elementary or secondary teachers, compared to less than 12 percent of freshman men," they said.

"Twenty-five years ago there were more than 200 teachers' colleges in the United States; today there are practically none," they said.

The problem runs deeper than the decline in education majors, they said, because fewer students today opt for teaching after majoring in other fields.

"In the late 1960s, upwards of 40 percent of the women entering college intended to pursue careers as elementary or secondary teachers, compared to less than 12 percent of freshman men," they said.

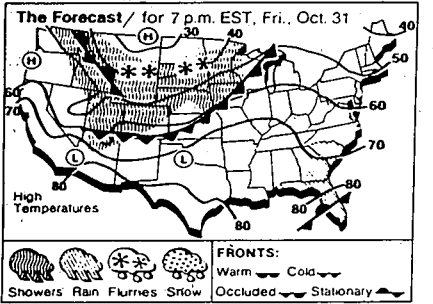

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chief executor of Saudi oil policy and its point man in OPEC negotiations.

Al OPEC's latest conference, which ended Oct. 22 and was the longest in OPEC history, Fahd interceded more frequently and openly in the talks than has his wont.

Yamani gave no outward sign that his job was on the line, but he was less visible in the proceedings. Saudi delegation sources, speaking privately, said Yamani was ill later in the conference and did not participate in the climactic final sessions.

The meeting's outcome did not significantly change OPEC's course. But it left the cartel at a juncture which in the past would have called for Yamani to assert his leadership and steer the organization to a clear policy decision.

The dilemma facing OPEC is how far to go in restraining its own production to prop up prices.

December, at Saudi Arabia's initiative, OPEC abandoned its production restraints and said it would let prices fall to gain a bigger share of the market.

But recently, as low oil prices punished virtually all of its members, OPEC reverted to production controls aimed at raising prices.

Some industry analysts believe this represented a change in King Fahd's approach, a change that undercut Yamani's efforts in OPEC.

Yamani is the Saudi planning minister, Hisham Nazer, who is known as a close associate of the king and a strong advocate of conserving Saudi Arabia's vast oil reserves.

Nazer, 54, was the first Saudi representative on OPEC's board of governors, which oversees the organization's production and budget. He was deputy Saudi oil minister in the 1960s and also served on the kingdom's Supreme Petroleum Council and with Petromin, the state oil company.

He is not expected to carry the clout, at least initially, that Yamani did in OPEC. For many people, inside and outside the oil industry, Yamani's synonymy with OPEC and the 1973 Arab oil embargo that led to stunning price rises and U.S. gasoline shortages.

"Yamani has been 'Mr. OPEC,'" himself said Ruth Sheldon Kowalski, an oil industry historian in New York and a Yamani acquaintance for more than 20 years.

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# Former INEL safety chief defends tests



IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The man who oversaw design of a radiation test administered on humans at the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory two decades ago says those tests were fully researched and evaluated before they were made and posed no serious threat to the participants.

John Horan, who has since retired as the National Reactor Testing Station health and safety division manager, said exposures in the radiation tests were below safety limits, even by today's standards. Horan emphasized that all participants were volunteers who were fully aware of the potential dangers of radiation and of the maximum exposure levels they faced.

"One of the requirements of this convention is there be full consent of the individual participating," Horan said. "The individual had to be totally free of coercion and had to have full knowledge of what was involved including the

maximum exposure." The INEL tests, involving consumption of radioactive milk and gas, were among a dozen human radiation experiments conducted for several decades through 1970 included in an investigation by the House Energy and Commerce Committee's Subcommittee on Energy Conservation and Power.

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., chairman of the subcommittee, has called for detailed follow-up tests to see if participants suffered long-term health effects from what he compared to experiments in Nazi Germany.

Horan and at least one participant in the INEL tests agreed with that characterization. "I had full knowledge of what I was doing," said Don Terwilliger, a senior research chemist at INEL who participated in the tests. "If I considered it a hazard I would not have done it. I think, probably, the use of radioactive isotopes in

medicine today for diagnostic and therapeutic reasons deliver much larger doses" of radiation. The eastern Idaho testing, which began in 1963, was designed to better understand the movement of iodine through the food chain to humans, said Horan, who lives in Idaho Falls. They were done so scientists would be able to better determine the health risks in the event of a release of a large amount of radioactive iodine at INEL or any other location.

"The tests were designed to make those determinations so that we would have a greater precision in knowing what the threat could be to the people on the site if something went wrong," said Horan.

He said an exhaustive review was conducted by the then Atomic Energy Commission before the tests were approved with an outside medical review conducted by an independent consultant.

The accident of a Union Pacific freight train site was about 150 yards from the derailed near this community on the Canadian border, spilling -- Other cars carrying chemicals some ammonium sulfate but were involved but there were no leaks, the spokesman said. No cause has been determined and crews didn't expect to have make fertilizer and is not hazardous, said John Bromley of the railroad's Omaha, Neb., office. The accident occurred at 8:30 p.m. Wednesday.

# State court upholds murder sentences

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Appeals Court has upheld the unrelated sentences of a chronic alcoholic who caused the deaths of two people and of a man who watched the vicious bludgeoning death of a purported drug addict.

In separate unanimous rulings handed down Thursday, the court said Angel Puga, 41, was sentenced to a sentence that would ensure him treatment for alcoholism. The court also affirmed a strict sentence that provided retribution for Kelly Vern Hemenway, 26, who the court said stood by and watched Mac Atwood beaten to death in Payette.

Puga was convicted of two counts of vehicular manslaughter and two counts of aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol in the February 1985 deaths of Tillie Fillmore, 44, and her daughter, Janet, 11. Clyde Fillmore and his two sons also

were injured. The court said that Puga, who crossed the center line and collided with the Fillmore vehicle, had a blood alcohol content of .20 and was free on bond on a previous charge of driving under the influence. In Idaho, a driver with a blood alcohol content of .10 is legally intoxicated.

Third District Judge Jim R. Doolittle sentenced Puga to a fixed sentence of seven years on a charge of vehicular manslaughter, and Puga argued that was unjust because he couldn't receive treatment for alcoholism.

Puga had asked for probation, but Doolittle said his background suggested he likely would cause an event similar to the accident that claimed two lives, according to the opinion. Doolittle concluded that he must

give Puga a maximum term to protect society, but was powerless to ensure treatment for alcoholism in the prison, the court said.

In the other case, Hemenway received a 25-year sentence for kidnapping and a 15-year riding and abetting of aggravated battery in the drug-related death of Atwood, who was bound and beaten to death with a hammer on Thanksgiving Day 1984. Jerry Campbell, 41, Payette, was convicted of first-degree murder in the case.

Hemenway argued that the sentence was excessive because he didn't actually kill Atwood, who the court identified as a purported drug addict.

Hemenway didn't initiate the crime, but went to police only after Atwood's body was found a month later in the Payette River, the court said.

"Hemenway was not a helpless, innocent bystander," the court said. "He was a physically strong young man who had once worked as a bouncer."

Hemenway helped Campbell, who the court said was a drug dealer, bind Atwood's hands with a coat hanger and watched Campbell beat Atwood with a hammer, the court said. Judge R. Doolittle also helped dispose of the body.

Doolittle, who also presided over Hemenway's case, rejected the state's recommendation of two 15-year fixed, concurrent sentences, and chose the indeterminate sentences.

"While a sympathetic reading of the transcript may lend itself to a more lenient interpretation of Hemenway's participation, the court's interpretation is not reasonable," the Appeals Court said.

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# Idahoans sue doctors over sale of son's gland

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — An Idaho couple who say their son's pituitary gland was sold after the Oregon medical examiner's office conducted his autopsy, sued for \$903,440 damages in a racketeering lawsuit against two doctors.

The lawsuit was filed recently in U.S. District Court against Dr. William J. Brady, who the court said was a medical examiner, and Dr. Larry V. Lewman, who has served as acting

medical examiner since Brady was fired last year. They're accused of racketeering and intentional mishandling of a corpse.

Joyce and James Evans of Lewiston, Idaho, whose 20-year-old son, James, died of a gunshot wound in Portland Sept. 18, 1974, filed the lawsuit.

They allege Lewman performed the autopsy and intentionally

removed his pituitary gland so it could be sold, pursuant to office policy. The couple learned of the policy in June 1985, when allegations of wrongdoing in the medical examiner's office were made public, the lawsuit says.

Brady, who had headed the office since 1969, was suspended in June 1985 and fired four months later by Kristine Gebbie, administrator of

the state Health Division.

His firing came after the state attorney general issued a report that concluded Brady had sold skin samples and pituitary glands and used the money to pay for office parties, office furniture and other supplies.

Brady denied the allegations and is suing Ms. Gebbie in federal court for reinstatement to his job and \$2.5 million in damages. A trial is scheduled to begin Nov. 18.

# Hunters discover more fragments of skull

MALAD (AP) — Hunters have found several more fragments of a human skull in Two Mile canyon 10 miles east of here which may belong to a teen-aged girl, says Onaida

County Sheriff Lee Pfeiffer. The partial human skull, found by hunters last weekend, was turned over to Pocatello police who thought it might be that of a Pocatello girl, Patricia Campbell, missing since 1978. She was 15 at the time.

Pfeiffer said that the new skull was found within 500 to 600 yards of the discovery five years ago. The skull is believed to have been at the site for five to six years.

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# Suspects arrested in beating death

POCATELLO (AP) — Two men have been arrested in connection with the beating death of a Pocatello businessman earlier this week, police reported.

The men, one a teenager, were being held pending the filing of formal charges in the death of Robert Larry Thomas, 43.

Police Captain Lynn Harris said Thomas died early Thursday morning after he had reportedly become involved in a fight on the street with two other men late Wednesday. No weapons were used during the fight.

# Woman faces trial

BOISE (AP) — A woman has been ordered to stand trial for vehicular manslaughter and aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol in connection with the July 9 death of a passenger in her car.

Robin Darrell, 26, was bound over to 4th District Court and will be arraigned Nov. 7. She was charged in connection with the death of 17-year-old Joe Olander, 37, of Boise, who died of a broken neck after her car spun out of control and crossed the center line on a street in east Boise.

However, examination of the original fragment by Idaho Museum of Natural History paleontologist David Fortsch and Pocatello pathologist Dr. Charles Garrison ruled out that possibility.

The skull piece did not match other partial remains, including a

skull fragment, of a body recovered in the canyon area in October, 1981. At that time, skeletal remains of Tina Anderson, 12, who disappeared along with the Campbell girl, of Alameda Park, on July 23, 1976, were recovered.

Additional skull fragments discovered on Tuesday were turned over to Fortsch for further examination.

## Leroy, Otter offer best team for Idaho

For the better part of two decades, Idaho government has been divided between a Democratic governor and a Republican Legislature. Sometimes — mostly when times have been good — they have agreed on programs and priorities.

But more commonly, they have battled each other, usually with animosity and sometimes with personal venom.

It is time for a change to this pattern. For governor and lieutenant governor, we endorse Republicans David Leroy and C.L. "Butch" Otter, who we believe can lead the state into a new era of partnership with the Legislature which will result in the common good for the entire state.

Leroy's Democratic opponent, Cecil Andrus, is sincere when he says he seeks no higher office. He has already held a high federal post as Secretary of the Interior, and he has already been governor of Idaho.

He has had his chance in the office, and he accomplished much, although it was during a more prosperous time when success was easier.

The mid-1980s are not the same as the mid-1970s. Financial problems abound. Population growth has flattened. Business growth stagnates.

If Andrus were elected, we think he would yield more readily to the pressure for increased taxation, taking a traditional, Democratic posture on this issue. He has already made a commitment to raise salaries for state employees; other groups will surely get in line.

The result will be another era of battling with the Legislature over both revenues and priorities.

Leroy would also face pressure to find revenue sources, but in our view, the process of compromise would be much easier.

Idaho desperately needs an economic and educational development plan which emphasizes our strengths, our natural resource industries, and our tourism potential.

Both candidates talk about these issues, but in our view, the Leroy-Otter team has a better sense of how to implement the ideas.

In this regard, Otter brings considerable strength to the ticket. His opponent, former treasurer Marjorie Ruth Moon, has not shown much depth on how economic growth can be achieved. She is no match to Otter, who has considerable experience in international commodities marketing as head of Simplot International.

The choice, in our view, comes down to which team would be more effective. Obviously, Andrus brings experience to the job. But we think Leroy offers the brighter future for the state.

As a long-range goal, we would like to see Idaho politics shift more to the center on ideological matters while retaining its conservative approach to

economic affairs.

In that process of maturing, we think Idaho politics should leave behind the strident pleas of both left and right and set a more moderate, centrist course based on realistic and pragmatic solutions to problems.

Andrus' return to the governor's office would delay that process. Leroy's and Otter's election would enhance it.

## Edwards treasurer choice

In the contest for state treasurer to replace Marjorie Ruth Moon, our nod is to former legislator Lydia Justice Edwards-R-Donnelly, over her Democratic opponent, Shawn DeLoyola.

Edwards would bring solid legislative experience to the position. She demonstrated an ability to work with colleagues of both parties and she has the courage of her convictions, as when she bucked the Republican leadership and voted "No" on the Right to Work issue.

DeLoyola is a sincere public servant who served as deputy treasurer for Moon, and who has some good ideas for changes he would make in the office.

Nonetheless, we think Edwards has the poise and experience to handle the post well. The treasurer's post is a sensitive one. She has our endorsement.

## Peters preferred for seat

In the contest for House Seat 25B, representing the eight-county Magic Valley, our endorsement is to Jerome mayor Ralph Peters over his Independent challenger, Arlo Kent of Twin Falls.

Peters has a long and dedicated career in public service on the Jerome city council and in the mayor's chair. He is a fiscal conservative, but not an ideologue on political or social issues.

Kent was a last-minute candidate who's notoriety is based on the fact that he likes to file frivolous suits against government agencies. He barely rates mention as a serious candidate.

Our vote is for Peters.

## Reject lottery proposal

On the proposed lottery, we think the right vote is "No." A lottery looks like an attractive fund-raising device on the surface, but there are many serious flaws to it. Here are a few:

Lottery funds are unreliable; lotteries are regressive, taking money from those who can least afford to pay; the law is badly drafted, and might allow other forms of gambling; the potential for corruption is higher than many suppose.

We like the idea that the lottery question is on the ballot. Now, let's turn this sham down.

# State lottery initiative a bad gamble, should be defeated

The state lottery initiative is a bad gamble. It's a bad gamble for Idaho's schools. No assured money for schools. The initiative contains no assurance that even one dollar will ever go to the schools. Lower sales tax and income tax revenues. The money that would be spent to buy lottery tickets would be spent anyway — for food, clothes, cars, furniture, entertainment, etc. To the extent that money would instead be used to buy lottery tickets, sales tax and income tax collections would be lower. That certainly wouldn't help the schools. Small amount of lottery revenue. An economist's independent study concluded that the amount a state lottery in Idaho would add to government revenue would be "insignificant" — only about \$2.24 to \$2.78 per person per year, after taking into account the reduction in sales tax and income tax collections. Unreliability of lottery revenue. Because of continuing operating costs and teachers' contracts, schools must have dependable income. A new study in public Administration

Stanley D. Crow

Review concludes that a state "cannot rely on its lottery to be a stable, reliable source of net revenue." Loss of support for school funding. Because the lottery has been promoted as a way to raise money for the schools but would actually raise so little, it would be more difficult to fund public education — because the taxpayers would believe the lottery has "taken care of" the schools. Increased transfer of money out of state. Lightly populated states with lotteries send about 20 percent of the gross revenue of the lottery out of state for computer services and lottery promotion services. Fewer jobs and reduced income of Idahoans. Every dollar sent out of Idaho results in about a \$3 reduction in income for Idahoans, because the money would have been spent several times in Idaho if it hadn't been sent out.

Continued purchase of out-of-state lottery tickets. Because the more populous surrounding states inevitably will have larger prizes than our state has available in Idaho, and because other factors (such as no sales tax in Oregon) draw Idahoans there anyway, we think most Idahoans who buy lottery tickets there now would continue to do so, whether or not Idaho gets a lottery. Depressing effect on the economy. Tax increases almost always depress economic activity, because they reduce the amount of money left for people and businesses. Buying lottery tickets would be voluntary but would have the same effect — only worse. It's a bad gamble for Idaho's state government. Invitation to Undue Influence. Because the Idaho Constitution (Article III, Section 20) prohibits the legislature from authorizing any lottery "for any purpose whatever," the legislature could not provide the lottery commission with any money to begin operations (such as, printing tickets, obtaining computer services, employing staff, negotiating agreements with lottery ticket

dealers, advertising, etc.). Where will that money come from? From what will the first prizes come? Will the money be obtained from a company that seeks the operational contract? If that's where the money is obtained, just how free of influence will the lottery commission be? Legitimacy to control the lottery commission. This badly written initiative would establish a lottery commission that would literally run wild. Lack of political checks and balances. The initiative authorizes the governor to appoint the lottery commissioners, without having to obtain the advice or consent of the state senate. Decriminalization of private lotteries. When other states adopted their state lotteries, they didn't legalize private lotteries, as well. This initiative, however, would repeal Idaho's anti-lottery statutes and allow anyone to conduct a lottery, without any government regulation, any license, or any supervision by the lottery commission. No other state allows that. Authorization for slot machines and other gambling devices. The initiative states that

its provisions prevail over prior laws, such as those related to gambling devices. The initiative would establish the lottery commission to determine the "method" of conducting the lottery in the manner of selling lottery tickets. So, the state lottery commission could choose to operate the state lottery with slot machines and other Nevada-style gambling devices. Not merely an advisory election. Whatever you might have heard to the contrary, the initiative is not merely advisory. It would actually establish the lottery. There will be no opportunity for second thoughts. The initiative is deceptive in its promises, dangerous in its scope, deficient in its lack of checks and balances, and defective in its structure. We in Help Idaho Thrive urge the voters to consider these facts carefully. We urge a "no" vote on the lottery initiative, to help Idaho thrive.

**Soviet pullout called 'a sham'**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Soviet Union's withdrawal of troops from Afghanistan was a "sham" involving, for the most part, the removal of troops sent into the occupied country just two months ago, a Pentagon official said Thursday.

"The United States has clear and convincing evidence that Soviet claims of having withdrawn six regiments from Afghanistan are a sham and deception," said Lt. Gen. Leonard H. Perrots, the director of the Defense Intelligence Agency.

The report, appearing at a special Pentagon briefing, also said the Afghan Mujahideen resistance continued to battle Soviet troops into a stalemate; that the Soviets had suffered 25,000 dead or wounded soldiers and lost more than 500 aircraft in the course of the seven-year war, and that the Afghan army, supposedly fighting alongside the Soviets had been decimated by "casualties, defections, desertions."

**Posse Comitatus leader held**

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (AP) — A former Army colonel who says he's one of the founders of the extremist Posse Comitatus is being held without bond on charges of threatening to kill Internal Revenue Service agents and a judge, authorities said Thursday.

Three other people associated with a California branch of the organization are also being held without bond, while four others arrested in the alleged threats are free pending trial, said Richard Pocker, an assistant U.S. attorney.

William P. Gale, 63, was arrested last week at his home in rural Maricopa County along with Fortunato Parrino. The others were arrested in Las Vegas and in Flagstaff, Ariz. A tentative Dec. 15 trial date was set on charges of conspiracy, mailing a threatening communication, aiding and abetting and attempting to interfere with administration of IRS laws.

**Pilot's last words recorded**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The captain of Aeromexico Flight 498, thinking he was making a routine approach into Los Angeles International Airport, suddenly exclaimed, "Oh... this can't be!"

His DC-9 jetliner had just collided with a single-engine private plane and began careening toward the residential neighborhood 6,568 feet below.

A glimpse inside the cockpit during the final seconds of Flight 498 last August was provided Thursday by the National Transportation Safety Board released the gap-filled transcript of the cockpit voice recorder tape.

Investigators said most of the tape could not be understood because of poor tape quality and excessive background noise.

**Jet barely misses helicopter**

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A United Airlines jetliner carrying 94 people came within 100 feet of colliding with a police helicopter as the plane headed for a landing at Los Angeles International Airport, officials said Thursday.

United Flight 282, a Boeing 727, was en route to Los Angeles from Monterey with 87 passengers and a crew of seven Wednesday, United spokesman Joe Hopkins said in Chicago.

The captain "pulled up and moved over the helicopter and then continued on and made a normal landing," said Hopkins. There were no injuries.

**Search chopper fuels in Cuba**

MIAMI (AP) — A Coast Guard helicopter on a rescue mission Thursday was allowed to refuel in Cuba in what officials said may have been the first landing of a U.S. military aircraft there since the early years of the Castro government.

Cuban authorities sent a bill for the fuel back with the crew of the H-3 helicopter, which had been called out to look or one of seven people who had been aboard the sunken 100-foot coastal freighter New Year.

**101st Airborne back to Sinai**

WASHINGTON (AP) — For the first time since 248 of their colleagues died in an airplane crash, soldiers from the 101st Airborne Division at Fort Campbell, Ky., will depart next week for peace-keeping duties in the Sinai Desert.

Approximately 800 soldiers with the 101st will begin departing Fort Campbell on Nov. 4 to replace soldiers from the 82nd Airborne for six months of peace-keeping duties with the Multinational Force and Observers, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The MFO is an international organization established in 1981 to guarantee the security provisions of the 1979 peace treaty between Egypt and Israel.

**Trade deficit shrinks during September**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The nation's merchandise trade deficit registered a slight improvement in September, shrinking to \$12.6 billion from \$13.3 billion in the previous month, the government reported Thursday.

Commerce Secretary Malcolm Baldrige said the report was evidence "that we have turned the corner on the trade deficit."

Private analysts agreed that the improvement — due largely to lower imports of manufactured goods, including automobiles from Japan — was welcome news. But some cautioned that it was not necessarily a sign of the long-awaited turnaround in trade accounts.

The Commerce Department said imports fell by 2.7 percent to \$30.1 billion in September, while exports dipped by 0.5 percent to \$17.5 billion. It was the second month in a row the trade deficit has decreased.

In a separate but related report, the Labor Department said prices of goods imported into the United States rose 0.7 percent from June to September, following declines in the previous two quarters.

In all, the report said, prices of non-petroleum imports have advanced 10.2 percent since

September 1985, a period during which the value of the U.S. dollar against other major currencies has declined by more than 30 percent.

Economists claim a weaker dollar will eventually help ease this nation's trade balance by making imported goods more expensive at home and U.S. goods less costly abroad.

In yet another economic report, the Commerce Department said sales of new homes rose 10.5 percent in September to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 690,000 units. The increase was the first improvement in sales since March.

**ACLU wants hate group order lifted**

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American Civil Liberties Union, in a bluntly worded protest, has called on Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger to rescind a new directive aimed at discouraging members of the service from joining hate groups like the Ku Klux Klan.

The ACLU's protest, spelled out in a letter dated Oct. 23 and released this week, calls Weinberger's directive over-broad and a violation of the constitutional rights of freedom of expression and assembly for military personnel.

"We appreciate the concerns that led to your hate-group order," wrote Ira Glasser, the ACLU's executive director, and Jack D. Novik, the group's acting legal director. "However, we believe the means chosen to address those concerns are excessive and illegal and create an unfortunate precedent for other similar orders directed at other groups espousing unpopular views."

Novik, in a telephone interview Thursday, said the ACLU had not received a response from the Pentagon as yet "and until they do respond to us, I can't really anticipate what further steps might be taken."

The directive that prompted the ACLU's objections was signed by Weinberger on Sept. 8.

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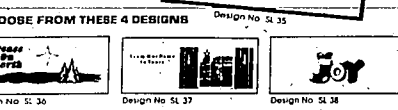

The city has rebuilt the homes destroyed in the siege, which ended in fire after police dropped a bomb on the fortified rowhouse occupied by MOVE members during an unsuccessful eviction attempt. Eleven occupants of the MOVE house died in the fire.

The 13-year-old grandson of Cowboys offensive coach Jim Myers follows Landry around the sidelines on NFL Sundays at Texas Stadium, carrying the phone the head coach uses to talk to an assistant in the press box.

Daly, who used to be a Cowboys' water boy, said his job is to "make sure he doesn't trip over the cord or none of the players stand on it... I also test it before the game to make sure it works."

He said he once had a close call during the excitement after a Dallas touchdown as Landry and the players ran toward the end zone.

"Some of the players were standing on the cord, and it pulled him back and he almost tripped. It loosened just in time and he regained his balance before he fell on his face," Daly said.

"My granddad looked at me like 'What are you doing?' and there was nothing I could do."

## Widow of astronaut returns memorabilia

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — The widow of space shuttle Challenger commander Dick Scobee presented his alma mater Thursday with a University of Arizona medallion and banner recovered from the wreckage.

Friends at the university, from which Scobee graduated in 1965 with a degree in aerospace engineering, had asked him to take the memorabilia from the university's centennial in his flight kit, June Scobee said.

University officials said the items would be added to an exhibit on manned-space flight at the Flandrau Planetarium.

Mrs. Scobee said the medallion was the only one recovered of hundreds taken on the shuttle, which exploded shortly after launch Jan. 28, killing all seven crew members.

"All of the items that were lightweight, like flags, survived," she said. "Most people had heavy medallions and they weren't found."

## Mimie Marceau offers comments on laughter

TOKYO (AP) — Things that make people laugh have not changed much in 2,000 years, says French mime Marcel Marceau.

"I'm sure Romans laughed when someone slipped on a banana peel," Marceau, known for his white-faced, hapless character Bip, said in a luncheon speech Thursday.

On stage he is a man of no words, but Marceau showed off his love of language for the Foreign Correspondents Club of Japan, aping foreign languages without in fact saying anything.

He rattled off imitation Chinese, Japanese, Russian and British and American English, and did a World Cup soccer broadcast in make-believe Spanish.

Marceau, who is in his late 60s and has been performing for 35 years, underwent an operation for a stomach ulcer earlier this year but recovered and is touring Japan. He said he performs 300 nights a year.

# Waldheim denies fighting Yugoslavs

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — President Kurt Waldheim said Thursday he did not fight Yugoslav partisans during a Nazi operation and denied he was approached after the war to work for Soviet intelligence.

Gervold Christian, the spokesman, made the comments after new allegations appeared in the U.S. media about Waldheim's activity in World War II.

The Washington-Post reported Thursday that Waldheim had acknowledged after months of denial that he played a role in a brutal Nazi "pacification" operation that cost thousands of lives in Yugoslavia.

It said that in a 13-page memo sent to the Post in April, the former U.N. secretary-general denied he was involved in the 1942 operation to remove all 80,000 residents, including 2,500 armed partisans, from Kozara, a mountainous region in Yugoslavia.

The newspaper Thursday quoted Christian as saying "additional research" revealed the president's earlier statement was incorrect.

The Post quoted Waldheim's spokesman as saying the president was a supply officer not engaged in the fighting in the Kozara area, and similar statements came from Waldheim's office Thursday.

Christian told The Associated Press on Thursday that earlier statements by Waldheim that he was not involved in the Kozara operation "were not incorrect."

"The war record was, however, supplemented after files and documents were found" and the information was made available to U.S. authorities in August, Christian said.

In Washington, Justice Department spokesman Patrick Korten said it had known earlier about Waldheim's presence in the Kozara region, and that Waldheim had confirmed it.

Christian, who said Waldheim was in the Kozara area for a short period, quoted the president as saying he was not directly involved in fighting and did not witness mass killings.

Waldheim "never was present during combat action," Christian said. "He was unfit for the front and never had a rifle to shoot with."

"Waldheim never took part in any way in actions against partisans or Jews," Christian said. The spokesman said Waldheim "never got into physical contact with partisans, because he performed a subordinated activity" as a supply officer.

A secretary in Waldheim's office later telephoned the AP with an English-language statement, saying, "With regard to the Kozara area, Dr. Waldheim's service was limited to the normal duties of a junior supply officer and did not involve any combat activity."

# Austrian embassy doors closed to Czechs in '68

WASHINGTON (AP) — As the country. Austria's foreign minister in 1968 at the time the Russians invaded Czechoslovakia, Kurt Waldheim ordered his country's embassy in Prague to turn away Czech citizens seeking asylum, the World Jewish Congress said Thursday.

The New York-based Jewish Congress, which has been investigating Waldheim's activities since the beginning of the year, released copies of a diplomatic cable it said bore Waldheim's initials directing the embassy to close its doors to Czechs seeking refuge.

The ambassador in Prague, according to the Jewish group, ignored the directive and ended up issuing more than 5,000 visas a day to enable Czechs to get out of the country.

The ambassador was Rudolf Kirchschlager, who later became president of Austria. He was succeeded as president by Waldheim last summer after Waldheim, former secretary-general of the United Nations, won election to that office despite accusations that he had sought to conceal his Nazi past.

"Please have legation building closed and allow admittance only to Austrian passport holders," said the cable, which was dated Aug. 21, 1968, the night the Russians sent half a million troops into Czechoslovakia.

In 1956, the Austrian embassy in Budapest remained open while a revolt was being crushed by the Soviets.

# Arms accord possible, if U.S. agrees

MOSCOW (AP) — A "quick and profound breakthrough" is possible at the U.S.-Soviet arms talks in Geneva if Washington agrees to scrap all strategic nuclear weapons by 1996, the Kremlin's chief negotiator said Thursday.

Viktor Karpov also made clear in an interview with the government newspaper Izvestia that the Soviet Union still wants strict limits on testing for the projected U.S. space-based defense system commonly called "Star Wars."

Foreign Ministry spokesman Gennady Gerasimov said Moscow hopes arms control will be the focus next week when Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze hold the first high-level meeting between the two governments since the Iceland summit.

They will be in Vienna on Tuesday and Wednesday for a follow-up conference on the 1975 Helsinki accords on European security and cooperation. Gerasimov told a news briefing no specific time had been set for their meeting.

# Mount Etna erupts

CATANIA, Sicily (AP) — Mount Etna, shaken by earth tremors, erupted early Thursday, lighting up the night sky and sending two streams of molten lava down its sides, officials said.

The eruption shortly after midnight posed no immediate danger to villages on the slopes, officials said after inspecting the mountain.

# Man detained in Spokane on charge of death threat

SPOKANE, Wash. — A second person has been arrested for threatening the life of President Reagan, who was scheduled to arrive in Spokane Thursday afternoon for a campaign rally Friday. Robert Warren Nelson, 23, of Tacoma, was being held without bond in the Spokane County-City Jail on a charge of threatening the president, said Tim Trombly, head agent in the Secret Service's Spokane office.

Nelson made an initial appearance this morning before U.S. Magistrate Smith P. Myers. An affidavit detailing the threat was sealed by the court. However, Trombly confirmed that a clerk at the Best Western Tradewinds Motel found a note in an elevator and called the Secret Service. "We were concerned enough with what he read" on the note, Trombly said.

# Leroy plans 11th-hour campaign tour in south

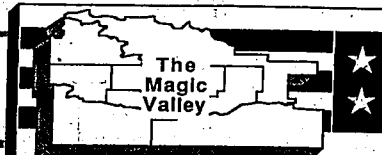
BOISE — Republican governor candidate David Leroy announced Thursday he plans a last-minute campaign tour through critical southern Idaho as Republicans across the state look toward today's visit by President Reagan for the boost needed going into Tuesday's general election. Some polls indicate Leroy is trailing Democrat Cecil Andrus, although Leroy said his own polls show the race almost dead even. He said Tuesday he plans a motorcade of 20-plus vehicles and 100 volunteers passing out 25,000 flyers in a trip that is scheduled to hit 46

southern Idaho cities Saturday and Sunday. But the big news in Idaho, and perhaps the highlight of the Republican campaign this year, will be the president's visit to Twin Falls this afternoon. Republican Sen. Steve Symms, whose race with Democratic Gov. John Evans is virtually even, and other GOP leaders said they hope the president's appearance will put their campaigns over the top. "You can tell what kind of a governor the candidate will be by the election campaign he runs," said Leroy. "We are going to reach out to every voter in southern Idaho this weekend and give them the best

we've got." His Democratic opponent, Andrus, issued a statement saying he is absolutely against the diversion of Idaho water to other areas. "It is not for sale. It is not for rent. And it shouldn't be used by anyone to manufacture mud," Andrus said. In a letter to the Idaho Water Users Association, Andrus said his position on water has not changed over the years, and he helped bring about the State Water Plan, which has legally shown the world that there simply is no surplus water in Idaho. Campaigning in Boise, Symms repeated his contention that Evans

is supported by eastern liberals, mainly unions. He quoted a Washington Post story describing activity of a union center on behalf of Evans. "We need to get all of our supporters to the polls on election day," said Symms. "The eastern liberals can be beaten if we get our vote out." "Polls also show the battle-over right-to-work almost dead even, and both sides announced plans to step up activity. Idahoans Against Deception, the organization trying to repeal the law, said commercials have started showing Joseph Parkinson, president

# Reagan election juggernaut steams ahead

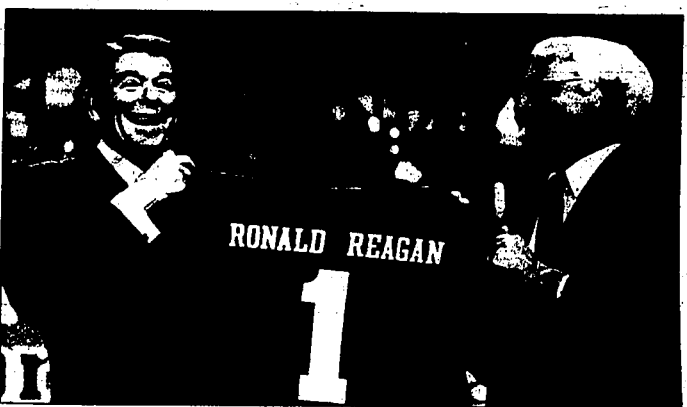

House Speaker Thomas P. O'Neill Jr., making his own last hurrah before retiring, on Thursday counter-punched President Reagan's attacks on him, saying "the truth is a frequent casualty in the heat of an election campaign."  
Reagan, meanwhile, headed west through Colorado and Nevada to Washington as part of his week-long drive to boost Republicans in tight Senate races.  
In Alabama, the chaotic three-way race for governor calmed a bit with Attorney General Charlie Graddick's decision to give up his faltering write-in campaign, leaving the field to fellow Democrat Bill Baxley and Republican Guy Hunt.  
O'Neill, D-Mass., used an appearance before the Wisconsin Board of Education in Milwaukee to respond to Reagan's campaign pitch of recent weeks: attacking congressional Democrats, O'Neill in particular.  
"I must say that I get a kick out of the president campaigning across the country one day attacking Democrats — warning against electing a hostile Congress, and then returning to Washington to sign the bipartisan drug bill, the bipartisan tax bill and the bipartisan immigration bill," O'Neill said.  
"He made up quotes from me alleging that I wanted to raise taxes."  
Well, that is about as accurate as the president's assertion that trees are the leading polluter in America," O'Neill said. He referred to 1980 campaign remarks in which

Reagan suggested that trees and other vegetation were serious sources of air pollution.  
For the last two years I said there would be no new taxes unless the president asked for them. He did not ask, so we did not act," O'Neill said.  
"But as we all know, the truth is a

frequent casualty in the heat of an election campaign," the speaker added.  
Meanwhile, a CBS News-Northern Times poll showed that Reagan has an overwhelming personal approval rating, but does not transfer much of that to the Senate candidates he is campaigning for.  
The telephone survey of 1,409 registered voters this week showed Reagan's approval rating at 67 percent, nine points higher than it was just before he carried 49 of the 50 states in his own re-election two years ago.  
However, 55 percent of those interviewed said their feelings about Reagan would not be much of a factor in how they vote next Tuesday.  
Reagan, though, was still telling voters that Democrats are itching to raise taxes.  
In Colorado Springs, Colo., Reagan said the choice in the Senate race there is between a supporter of a strong defense or "a man who would vote to weaken America and raise your taxes."  
Republican Rep. Ken Kramer is in a dead heat with Democratic Rep. Tim Wirth to succeed Sen. Gary Hart, who is retiring to concentrate on gaining the 1988 Democratic presidential nomination.  
Reagan repeated his resolve to pursue the Strategic Defense Initiative to produce a shield against attack by nuclear missiles. The issue has become a job issue in Colorado, with companies in the state vying for contracts to help develop the massive military program.  
Tailoring his message to Colorado, Reagan said the program "could

open new fields of technology and industry, providing jobs for thousands right here in Colorado and improving the quality of life in America and around the world."  
Later in the day, Reagan stopped in Reno, Nev., on behalf of former Rep. Jim Santini, who has been lagging in his effort to overcome Democratic Rep. Harry Reid and claim the Senate seat being given up by

retiring Republican Paul Laxalt.  
There, he touted news that the nation's deficit had declined for the third month in a row, listing "a veritable parade of victories for its casinos," the president said. "I believe the economy is on a roll and I think it is a sure bet we're about to hit another jackpot. We pulled the handle and it came up jobs, jobs, jobs."

Colorado and Nevada have been key targets for each party in the fight for control of the Senate where Republicans have a 53-47 majority.  
Alabama has another key Senate contest, but Democratic Rep. Richard Shelby's attempt to unseat Republican Sen. Jeremiah Denton almost has been submerged by the battle for governor.

# Folklinga, Stivers' pick, battles for House seat with salesman Nielsen

TWIN FALLS — When House Speaker Tom Stivers announced his retirement from the Idaho Legislature last spring, he bequeathed his seat to a young Republican Party worker named Cella Folklinga and helped finance her campaign.  
Democrat Garry Nielsen wants to take that inheritance away.  
Nielsen, who is parts sales manager at United Engine and Machine, has campaigned by writing letters to Anheuser Busch to lure a brewery to the Magic Valley and by traveling to the Envirostate toxic waste dump at Grand View to assess the dangers the dump presents to Twin Falls area voters.  
Both say they believe the level of funding for education needs to be increased. And both agree that how

that will be accomplished is crucial. Nielsen said that if lawmakers vote too much too soon, "it will break the back of the taxpayer."  
Instead of an all-or-nothing catch-up bill next year, he wants to increase funding steadily over a four-year period.  
Folklinga said education and the economy go together, and until the economy is improved, it will be hard to dramatically increase the money for public schools and higher education.  
Although she said she is opposed to more taxes, Folklinga said "realistically, we must maintain the 5-cent sales tax."  
Both agree a statewide day-care licensing bill is a must. And both have switched their positions from earlier campaign statements, moving to the middle in both cases.

# Pence/Robinson race for county clerk heated

TWIN FALLS — The race between Twin Falls County Clerk Dick Pence and a former county employee, Cleo Robinson, has been quiet on the surface. But, underneath, it is as heated as some of the fiercest congressional races this year.  
Democrat Robinson, who worked at the Courthouse for 33 years in several capacities, has been running a low-key campaign that highlights her qualifications, rather than criticizing Pence.  
To date, the 53-year-old Robinson has not directly accused Pence, a Republican, of being ineffective. But in a letter this week to The Times-News, Robinson said, "I would like to see these offices run once again with efficiency and the dignity as they were under Tom Stivers and Harold Lancaster."  
The 57-year-old Pence, a Republican, has kept quiet during his campaign for a third four-year term. He said he didn't want to become involved in politics and didn't want "to get in a shooting match."  
Pence has been a target of criticism from some quarters. A recent critic was Pam Shropshire of the Idaho Neighbors Network, a community activist organization. Shropshire accused Pence of being "far from courteous" to, and unduly interrogating, last week with an Hispanic-American who wanted to vote absentee.

Just Trejo of Twin Falls wanted to vote absentee because he worked long hours and slept during the day, said Shropshire, who was participating in a program to help register Hispanics. Shropshire said Pence refused to give Trejo an absentee ballot, saying he could vote before he went to work.  
What bothered her, Shropshire said, was Pence's attitude, and the fact she told Trejo the election process was a simple one. But Trejo left feeling intimidated and "sheepish," Shropshire said.  
Pence said he had to enforce the law, and Trejo didn't fit under the rules for absentee voting.  
"Impoliteness has nothing to do with it. How polite can you be?" he

# Uncontested Republicans won't fret election returns

TWIN FALLS — Five Republican incumbents and two Republican newcomers will not be staying up late on Tuesday worrying about results. All seven are running unopposed.  
Newcomer Russel Newcomb, a Twin Falls surgeon, upended six-term District 23C incumbent Rep. Noy Brackett, R-Twin Falls, in the May primary to be assured a seat in the state House of Representatives in January. The 51-year-old Newcomb ran as a moderate-Republican. In his successful challenge against Brackett, whom Newcomb said "leaned toward the ultra-conservative."  
Newcomb's brother, Burley rancher Bruce Newcomb, is also running unopposed for the

District 24B House seat in his first election. Bruce Newcomb will replace Rep. Vard Chabrum, R-Albion, who retired this spring after serving 30 years in the Legislature.  
For House seat 23D, one-term Republican incumbent Doug Jones has no opposition. Jones was appointed by Gov. John Evans to fill a vacant seat left by Rep. Lawrence Kiggle in 1985. Jones is a Filer farmer.  
Sen. Darrel McRoberts, R-Twin Falls, is running unopposed as he seeks his second term in the House from District 23B. The 48-year-old McRoberts is general manager of Green Blant.  
In District 24, Rep. Ernest Hale, R-Burley; Rep. Steve Anone, R-Rupert; and Rep. Waldo Martens, R-Jerome, face no opposition.



# Swan Falls legislation may float away if not signed soon

**TWIN FALLS** — Legislation that includes the Swan Falls water rights agreement may go down the river if President Ronald Reagan fails to sign the bill by midnight Saturday, and Reagan is being urged by Idaho's bipartisan congressional delegation to act on the bill today, during his campaign trip to Twin Falls.

If Reagan does not sign the bill today or Saturday, the legislation, part of the National Appliance Energy Conservation Act, would be needed to resolve a long-standing dispute over Snake River water rights. It was tacked onto the National Appliance Energy Conserva-

tion bill, which passed the House unanimously before Congress adjourned two weeks ago.

The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, which licenses hydroelectric projects, was moving slowly to ratify a 1984 agreement between the state and Idaho Power Company more than 1 1/2 years ago, in a dispute over water rights at Swan Falls Dam on the Snake River. The state Supreme Court allowed IPC an increased amount of water from the Snake, but the state argued it would cripple upstream water users, including hundreds of Magic Valley irrigators.

Without FEREC's approval, both sides questioned whether the negotiated settlement could someday come unraveled.

Although Republican senators Jim McClure and Steve Symms and Democratic Rep. Richard Stallings all helped pass the bill in Congress, the two sides are at odds over the impact on Idaho if Reagan vetoes the bill.

Republicans are now minimizing the impact of the bill if it dies. Stallings, who is running for re-election against Republican Mel Richardson, is calling the bill "landmark legislation" and said Thursday it would be "very disappointing" if the pres-

ident does not sign it.

Also getting into the act was Maine Democratic Rep. Edward Markey, who wrote the appliance bill. Markey's chief counsel, Larry Sidman, said on Thursday that if Reagan vetoes the bill, "it will be a tragedy for the nation's electric consumers and a double tragedy for the people of Idaho."

Sidman said McClure, Stallings and Democratic Gov. John Evans, who is locked in a tight election race with Symms, all lobbied hard for the Swan Falls agreement to be included in the appliance bill.

"They all persuaded Markey that the provision was so important to the people of Idaho that it had to be included, and it would be shocking for the president to think other-

wise," Sidman said.

The president is threatening to veto the bill because of a dispute within the Office of Management and Budget that the national appliance bill, which mandates federal energy efficiency standards for 11 major appliances, interferes with states' rights. Sidman said the measure is expected to save consumers \$28 billion in energy costs.

McClure aides said both McClure and Symms urged Reagan to sign the appliance bill "on the basis of the Swan Falls" agreement.

But Jim Gower, a McClure aide in Boise, said that if the bill dies, it will not be a setback for Idaho.

"Whether he signs it or not, it will not kill the Swan Falls agreement,"

### Economist attacks utility's operations at PUC hearing

**TWIN FALLS** — Idaho Power Company failed to operate in a business-like fashion by negotiating an electricity sales contract with a Nevada utility which made no provision for a profit, an economist testified Thursday at an Idaho Public Utilities Commission hearing.

The testimony of PUC staff witness Thomas M. Power was promptly pronounced "entirely wrong" by economist Abraham Gerber, a witness for IPC.

The testimony was offered during the second day of a rehearing, at the Canyon Springs Inn, on IPC's request for a \$66.2 million rate hike.

IPC and Sierra Pacific of Nevada have joint ownership in the Valley II power plant in northern Nevada. The contract between IPC and Sierra Pacific is central to the case.

A major factor in the PUC's decision last July to turn down all but a fraction of IPC's rate request was based on Valmy issues, said PUC Chairman Perry Swisher.

The question is why it (IPC) didn't negotiate to get something above operating costs when Sierra Pacific used "the plant, said Power,

a University of Montana economics instructor.

The contract between IPC and Sierra Pacific requires that when IPC doesn't need power from Valmy, Sierra should be offered the power first.

Power said his calculations show IPC should be getting an additional \$2.4 million to \$3 million per year from Sierra's use of IPC's share of power at Valmy. He recommended that the PUC consider this in the rate case.

Power also said IPC's decision to invest \$155 million to build Valmy has aggravated its problem of excess generating capacity.

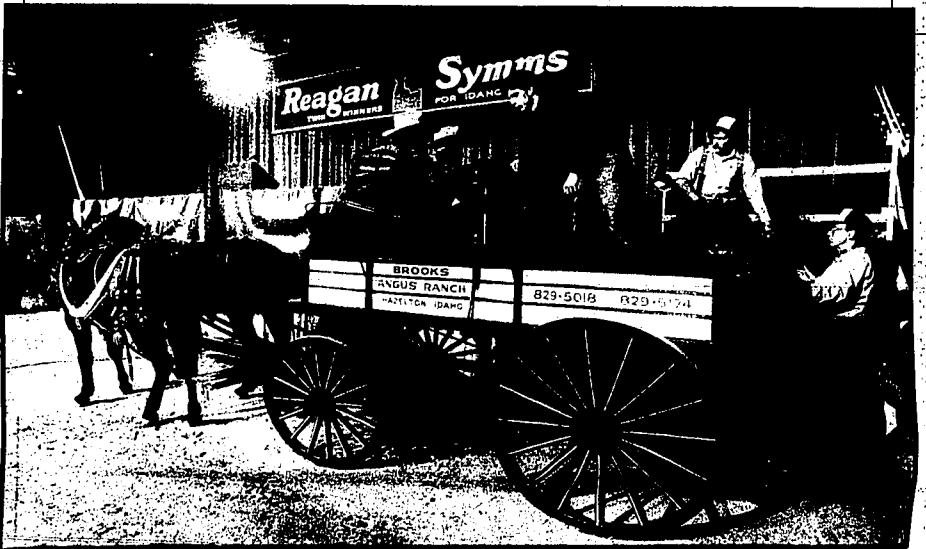
IPC was imprudent in negotiating a contract with Sierra when, in early 1982, the Nevada utility was seeking to postpone construction on the plant because of poor cash flow, Power said.

"My assertion is IPC didn't keep costs of electricity to customers in its system as low as possible," he said. "It is never business-like to sell a product in a manner yielding no return to the business involved.

"When you get nothing on your sale, it is equivalent of not having a market. Idaho Power doesn't do that."

**TWIN FALLS** — Today has been officially proclaimed "Ronald Reagan Day" by Twin Falls Mayor Doug Vollmer. The city will "shut down" for the afternoon in order to welcome the president, he said Thursday.

"This is the same thing we do for Twin Falls Day at the County Fair and we feel this is just as important as the fair," Vollmer said.

The proclamation was made Thursday afternoon and honors a

man who has "led our nation in promoting peace and strength throughout the world, and encouraging freedom and democracy to all nations."

Vollmer said the proclamation was dictated to him over the phone by a member of the White House advance committee and was published with the concurrence of the City Council.

Vollmer is also asking Twin Falls residents to display their American flags wherever possible today in order to show Reagan the patriotism of the city. The council is placing 250 flags at

select locations around the area, he said.

"This is the first time, and maybe even the last time, a president has visited Twin Falls. It's a great honor for us. This will really put Twin Falls on the map," he said.

Also in honor of the president's visit, the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce and the Public Library Foundation will be sending a gift with Reagan as he leaves Twin Falls.

The two groups are making a joint gift to Reagan of a print of a drawing of a painting of Shoshone Falls done

by Thomas Moran in the early 1890s. The print includes a plaque and framing.

Because there is no time to present the print to the president in person, the Chamber of Commerce will package the gift, including a letter of appreciation to the president, and give it to the members of the White House advance committee. It will be presented to Reagan on Air Force One as he files his next destination.

"We want to show our support and appreciation for the president," said Chamber President James May.

### Annexation comment goes to City Council

**TWIN FALLS** — Several property owners who came to a Twin Falls City Planning and Zoning Commission meeting this week to protest the proposed annexation of their property discovered they had to save their comments for the City Council.

Under the law, the commission could only accept public comments at the meeting Tuesday. Any proposed changes to the comprehensive plan and zoning map of the property that might be annexed.

### Policy change could reverse rural depression

**TWIN FALLS** — The rural American depression that has recently been hurting so many farmers can be turned around with a change in attitude and policy, said Cy Carpenter, president of the National Farmers Union, at a Thursday

press conference.

Carpenter, representing the NFU, is traveling around rural communities that face important congressional elections on Nov. 4 to encourage farmers to vote for the candidate who they think will best represent the farmers.

The NFU has distributed among its members voting records of their

incumbent congressional candidates up for election. With this knowledge, Carpenter said, farmers can vote accordingly.

The legislation that will probably come before Congress for the 1986-87 session is the Harkin-Gephardt proposal, which calls for production controls such as a maximum acreage set-aside of 35 percent.

Carpenter said that the NFU does not endorse the Harkin-Gephardt legislation, but does believe in similar measures to help solve problems caused by current policy.

"For a change in policy, we need a change in attitude. A change in attitude will come about with the right people in Congress," he said.

Carpenter calls the current farm policy "absolute foolishness" and must be changed soon. "Looking ahead, we see no indication of improvement if we stay with current policy," he said.

The farm policy now is falling in every aspect and wherever applied, he said. "We have to ask ourselves if we want another six years of an administration that provides no regulation and no direction," he added.

### Youth facility attorney says time for requiring special-use permit past

**JEROME** — An attorney for the Southern Idaho Youth Facility in Jerome County said Wednesday during a special hearing before the county Planning and Zoning Commission, that it was too late to require a special-use permit for the juvenile detention center that was approved and built last May.

Joseph Stanak told the P&Z that the owners of the facility feel they acted in good faith and met all requirements asked of them when they obtained a permit to remodel buildings east of Jerome into the detention center.

But Gene Fredericksen, attorney for some residents of the surrounding area, said he and other neighbors feel the zoning office acted incorrectly in issuing the permit for the facility under a business-associate classification.

This gives residential neighbors no protection against possible changes in the center's use, he said, and as the possible conversion into a facility for housing adult offenders.

A special-use permit now, even though the facility is already in use, would give youths held there and adjoining property owners greater protection and security, Fredericksen said.

He also argued that "We don't

even know who we are dealing with" because the facility calls itself the American National Detention Center Inc., at one point and the Sorensen Idaho Youth Facility at another.

Fredericksen and other area residents testified, at the hearing that the information about the center is vague and conflicting.

The hearing was held to determine whether the building permit for the center should be upheld, whether the facility is properly designated as business-associate use in the commercial general zone, and if the P&Z should make a new recommendation to the County Board of Commissioners.

In a post-hearing meeting, the board discussed the possibility of recommending that the county commissioners issue a special-use permit to govern uses on the property. But a quorum of the P&Z Commission was lacking and no action could be taken.

In addition to Fredericksen and Stanak, four citizens sponsored support of the facility use in the case, and two spoke against it.

Kay Jerke, whose property was originally considered as a detention center site, but abandoned in the face of neighborhood opposition said, "The faces are different, but the arguments are the same."

## Economic news aids stock gain

NEW YORK (AP) — The stock market chalked up a solid gain in heavy trading Thursday, propelled by hopes for lower interest rates and some favorable economic news.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials climbed 26.57 to 1,878.37, stretching its gain since the start of the week to 46.11 points.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange reached 144.22 million shares, the seventh largest total ever, against 164.43 million in the previous session. The record for a single session of 240.49 million shares was set on Sept. 12.

Analysts said one catalyst for the advance was provided by reports that Japan might soon cut its discount rate. The Japanese stock market posted a record-breaking gain, and interest rates fell in the U.S. credit markets.

Should Japanese rates decline, they would logically exert a downward influence on rates in this country as well.

Still another factor setting the tone for the markets, with an indelicate impact that was less clear, was the surprise news of the ouster of Ahmed Zaki Yamani as Saudi Arabia's oil minister.

Energy issues were broadly higher as word came that Yamani's successor, Hisham Nazer, called for an emergency meeting of the pricing committee of the Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries.

Amoco gained 2% to 65; Atlantic Richfield 2 1/2 to 55; Chevron 2 1/2 to 43 1/2; Occidental Petroleum 1 1/2 to 29 1/2; and Exxon 1 1/2 to 67 1/2.

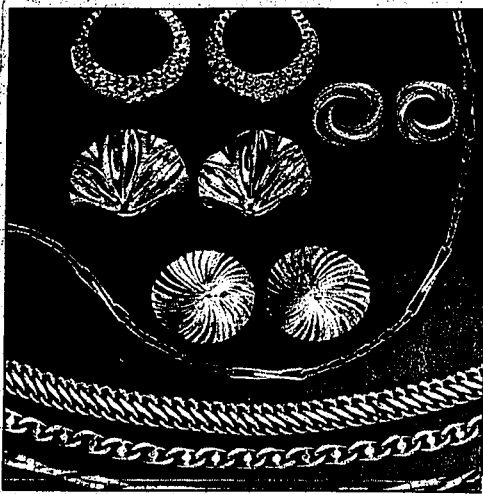
Among other blue chips, International Business Machines rose 1 1/2 to 122; American Telephone & Telegraph 1/4 to 25; Eastman Kodak 1/2 to 60; International Paper 2 1/2 to 71 1/2; and R.R. Nabisco 3/4 to 33 1/2.

Securities industry stocks also did well. Morgan Stanley climbed 6 1/2 to 76 1/2; First Boston 3/4 to 50; and Salomon Inc. 1 1/2 to 42 1/2. But E.P. Hutton Group, which had risen sharply of late on takeover speculation, dropped back 1 1/2 to 50 1/2.

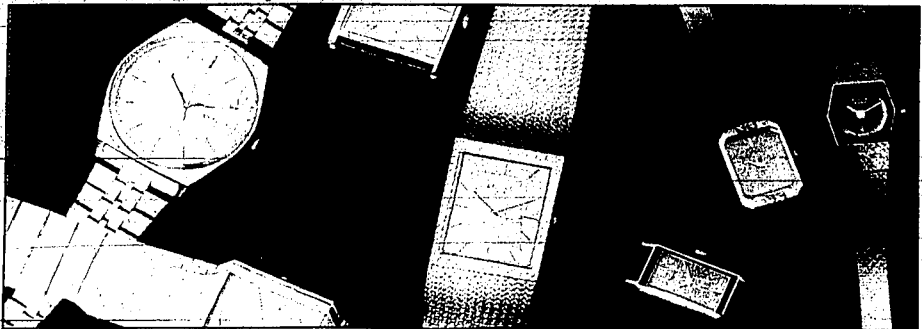

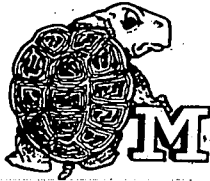




# High school coach hired to replace Driesell

BALTIMORE — Bob Wade, coach and athletic director at Baltimore's Dunbar High School, was named basketball coach at the University of Maryland on Thursday, replacing Charles "Lefty" Driesell, who resigned a day earlier.



## College basketball

Maryland Chancellor John B. Slaughter told reporters that "the University of Maryland has had a dearth of happy events over the last several months. Today represents a major change in our fortunes."  
Driesell, under pressure to give up his coaching post following the June 19 cocaine-induced death of All-American Len Bias, accepted a job as assistant athletic director at the

university after resigning his post of 17 years. In the months since Bias' death, Driesell's program was criticized over its poor academic record as well as the drug problems that surfaced.  
Wade, accompanied by his wife and one of his two sons, said his elevation to the college level as a coach represents "something we looked forward to all of our lives."  
"I hope this will be a tremendous

marriage between Bob Wade and the University of Maryland," Wade said before leaving the news conference to return to Dunbar where his football team is preparing for a postseason championship game.

Wade will attend the Terrapins' first basketball practice Saturday and also will work at Dunbar until Nov. 14. Wade said he will hold a news conference in two weeks to discuss his planned changes for the Maryland program.  
Slaughter said Wade has an "ideally balanced" philosophy about academics and drug-use. "His character, coaching abilities and emphasis on school academic achievement were the three factors that convinced us."

A graduate of Morgan State University in Baltimore, Wade has posted a 341-25 record during his career Dunbar, with the Poets being voted the top high school team in the country in 1982, 1983 and 1985 by

USA Today.

Thirty-six Dunbar graduates have gone on to play varsity basketball after playing under Wade. More than 90 percent of his players have graduated and gone on to college.

"It couldn't have happened to a better guy," Lake Clifton High School Coach Woody Williams, a long-time friend of Wade's, said. "Knowing Bob and the type of person he is, the way he works and things he stands for, he can do a job that they'll be proud of and he'll be proud of."

Wade, 41, has had a running feud with Driesell, stemming from an incident in 1977 when Terrapin player and former Dunbar standout Ernie Graham, said Driesell was lax on his players. Driesell shot back that Graham had been trouble since coming from Dunbar. That started a rift between the two coaches.

Graham was the last Maryland player from Dunbar, a school that

has since produced players such as Georgetown's David Wingate, chosen in the second round draft by the Philadelphia 76ers.

Wade claimed Driesell would not recruit in Baltimore, while Driesell complained that Wade directed his best players to Georgetown.

Pete Pompey, coach at Edmondson High School, said Wade never prevented Driesell from recruiting at Dunbar. He said Wade also has a strict philosophy about his players' academic performance and use of drugs.

"He made a commitment a long time ago that his kids were going to get an education," Pompey said. And although Wade "feels Len Bias was an adult and he made a decision to (take cocaine)," Pompey said Wade is committed to being tough on drug use.

The state prosecutor investigating Bias' death charged that Driesell did too little to discourage drug use and

gave "insufficient attention to the academic needs of his players."

Wade has agreed to a five-year contract with a salary "comparable to other first year ACC Division I coaches," Maryland officials said. A first-year salary in the Atlantic Coast Conference can be as high as \$50,000, but endorsements, television contracts, summer camps and other perks often boost a coach's salary to more than \$200,000.

Wade was drafted by the Baltimore Colts of the NFL, but was released. He later played for Pittsburgh, Washington and Denver.

Driesell, who compiled an overall 524-224 career record, told reporters Wednesday that he didn't want to coach at Maryland anymore if the university didn't want him. Slaughter said the Driesell's new contract, which covers eight years, can be broken with no remaining obligations if Driesell accepts a coaching position elsewhere.

## O's ship right-hander to Padres for catcher

BALTIMORE (AP) — The Baltimore Orioles, in desperate need of a catcher, obtained Terry Kennedy from San Diego Thursday and sent pitcher Storm Davis to the Padres.

As part of the deal, the Orioles also received right-hander Mark Williamson, the top relief pitcher in the Pacific Coast League last season.

After the Orioles finished last in 1986, for the first time in history, it was obvious they needed strengthening at catcher, third

base and second base.

During the World Series, they negotiated with several clubs for a catcher after failing to pick up the option on the contract of 37-year-old Rick Dempsey, who batted .208 in 1986.

The other Baltimore catchers had just as much trouble at bat, with John Stefro hitting .233 and Floyd Rayford slumping to .176 after leading the club in 1985 with a .306 mark.

Kennedy, 30, has a lifetime ma-

## Jury files additional charges against Bias case defendant

UPPER MARLBORO, Md. (AP) — A Prince George's County grand jury returned an indictment Thursday that contained additional charges against Brian Lee Tribble, the man accused of providing the cocaine that killed basketball star Len Bias.

The grand jury also returned a sealed indictment in connection with the probe. According to law, the contents of that indictment cannot be revealed until the defendant has been arrested and served with the papers.

Tribble, 24, is already scheduled to stand trial Nov. 17 on charges of possession of cocaine, possession with intent to distribute cocaine, distribution of cocaine and possession of PCP.

That trial could be delayed to allow time for the new charges to be

included. Following a closed session Thursday, the grand jury issued an unsealed indictment charging Tribble with one count of conspiracy to obstruct justice and two counts of obstruction of justice.

The grand jury, meanwhile, has been granted an extension and is scheduled to reconvene Nov. 6.

## Watson upset in first round of match play

TUCSON, Ariz. (AP) — Bob Tway advanced easily, but Tom Watson was an upset victim Thursday in the first round of the Seiko Tucson Match Play Championship.

Tway, already assured of PGA Player of the Year honors, moved closer to the money-winning title with his 68-75 victory over Brett Lipper in the final official event on the 10-month PGA Tour.

Watson, who disqualified himself for an inadvertent breach of the rules last week in San Antonio, Texas, was ousted by David Edwards 66-72.

Tway now needs only a win over Steve Pate in Friday's second round to clinch the money-winning title.

Tway, who won the PGA national championship and three other titles this season, needs 65.75 to surpass Greg Norman's leading \$635,296. A second-round victory will assure Tway of a minimum \$12,500. Norman is not competing in this event.

"It would mean a lot to me to go past Greg," Tway said. "But if I don't, it won't be the end of the world. I'll get over it."

"The system is kind of strange, and it makes you feel kind of strange out there playing. You know you can play a good round, a 66, and still lose by five shots," Tway said of the medal-match format in which each player must complete each hole and the winner of a match is determined by an 18-hole medal score.

Pate, Tway's second-round opponent, was 7-under par through the first 14 holes and eventually beat Craig Stadler 65-69.

A five-time British Open champion but a frustrated non-winner for more than two full seasons, Watson did not make a birdie in the warm desert sunshine. He did not lead at any time and was four strokes back at the turn.

## Bobby Pickett lives in shadow of his famous 'Monster Mash'

LOS ANGELES — It was 1962 and teenage America still did the Twist when Bobby Pickett emerged with the Boris Karloff spoof that has since become the rock 'n' roll anthem of Halloween.

"He did the Mash.  
('He did the Monster Mash!')  
He did the Mash.  
('It was a graveyard smash!')  
He did the Mash.  
('It came on in a flash!')  
Whop-wah-ooo..."

and for 24 years since, Pickett's ghoulish glee club has risen annually from the crypt of Golden Oldies with a fleeting bit of airplay for the ghosts, goblins and spirits of Allhallow's Eve.

Over the years, "Monster Mash" has sold about 4 million copies, easily one of the most popular novelty records of all time and the only hit, so far, in Pickett's career.

"Halloween didn't have any special significance for me before," said Pickett, 48. "But since 1962, my father says I'm the Guy Lombardo of Halloween."

Pickett's plans for this Halloween are only slightly bloody-minded. "No appearances, no pumpkins," he said



In a telephone interview from West Peabody, Mass., where he was visiting relatives, "I'll just have a Bloody Mary and that's it."  
His Karloffian imitation for "Monster Mash" was born when Pickett was 9 years old and spent time at the movie theater his father

managed in Somerville, Mass. "I always did Boris," he said.  
He used Karloff in his nightclub act in Hollywood in 1959 and 1960. And when he was part of the group, the Cordials, he'd often slip in a few impersonations between songs. Boris

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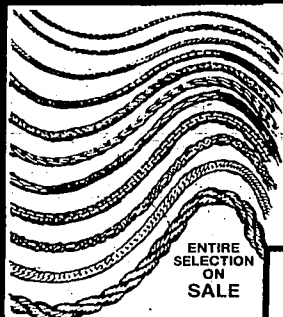
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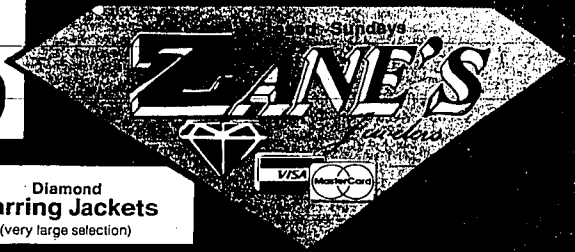

### 'Racist' charges levied against film comedy

LOS ANGELES — "Soul Man," a movie comedy about a white who poses as a black man to win a scholarship to Harvard Law School, is charged Thursday with racism, the local NAACP chapter charged Thursday.

The Black American Law Students Association of the University of California at Los Angeles also attacked the "shallow and futile portrayal of black law students at Harvard Law School. We find the Al Jolson-like portrayal of the main character offensive and trivializing."

"We certainly believe it is possible to use humor to reveal the ridiculousness of racism," chapter president Willis Edwards said in a statement.

The director of "Soul Man," Steve Miner, said the film makes the point that it was unfair for the Howell character to take a scholarship from a minority student.

"However, the unhumorous and quite seriously mad plot point of 'Soul Man' is that NO black student could be found in all of Los Angeles who was academically qualified for a scholarship geared to blacks," he said.

The New World release, which stars C. Thomas Howell, Artye Gross, Rae Dawn Chong and James Earl Jones, sold \$4.4 million worth of tickets over the weekend in 1,282 theaters, ranking it third at the box office in its first weekend of release.

Howell plays a young man who uses tanning pills and curls his hair in order to pose as a black and get a minority scholarship after his wealthy parents refuse to pay his law school tuition.

Minority protests are nothing new in Hollywood. Asian actors picketed the set of "Charlie Chan and the Curse of the Dragon Queen" in 1980 to protest the casting of Peter Ustinov as the Chinese detective.

Producer Steve Tisch, who also produced "Risky Business," said he had expected criticism, but he defended the film.

Steven Spielberg's "The Color Purple" also was criticized as being racist in its treatment of blacks, particularly black men.

"People don't like to be lectured to, but if they can be entertained maybe they'll go away with something," he said.

"Look at 'Freaky'," he said, referring to the Dustin Hoffman hit about a man who poses as a woman to get an acting job. "It used comedy as a device to expose sexual stereotyping. I think 'Soul Man' uses it to explode racial stereotyping."

The national office of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People had asked its Beverly Hills-Hollywood chapter to report on the film, Edwards said.

At the NAACP headquarters in Baltimore, executive director Benjamin Hooks said: "We are not mounting a boycott. We are writing a letter to our branches advising them of our opinion about the movie and suggesting to them that they advise their members not to support it."

Hooks termed "Soul Man" a "cheaply-made cynical viewpoint of black involvement in American life."

In his statement, Edwards said that while the film "purported to be revelatory about racism through the use of humor, in actuality (it) reveals the racism and sexism of its creators."

"We are amazed that such a film could be made in America in 1986. There are ... many experienced writers and other sensitive comedic blacks, directors and producers who might have guided it to the right side of humorous satire. Unfortunately, the producers did not feel that this potentially explosive, obviously sensitive subject matter was

Actor-turned-director Charles Martin Smith has pulled a genuine performance from young Price, who starts the film by writing to Curr: "the song remains the same — total conflict — them against us." Of course, Price, surrounded by his heavy-metal posters, records, tapes

and an elaborate sound system, seems to be the only "us" in his high school, which is otherwise populated by "airheads and braindeads." Still, he does a good job of delineating the isolation and lack of self-esteem that can breed fanaticism, and his T-shirt and army fatigues and flaccid demeanor are uncomfortably familiar.

Curr, portrayed by Tony Fields, certainly looks the steroids-to-the-stars part, though, as a longtime dancer on "Solid Gold," his hip-synching songs by Fastway is more believable than his lip-synching.

Unlike most heavy metal, "Trick or Treat" is more than a trick. (Trick or Treat is rated R and contains sexual themes and profanity.)

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### Grim times on 45s front; releases down

Whether vinyl dies a quick or a lingering death, its first casualty will probably be the 45-year-old 7-inch 45 rpm single, already battling it out with the 10-year-old 12-inch, 33 rpm maxi-single.

In recent years, 45s have lost their popularity with large music retailers, and even the record companies see them mostly as a promotional and marketing tool. According to Recording Industry Association of America figures, 7-inch singles were down a third last year (from 3,400 to 2,200 releases) while the 12-inch format tripled its numbers (300 to 900).

Though they account for 4 to 6 percent of the market, singles don't really make money, and they are a dying product line in terms of commercial acceptance, though they're the key to America's 250,000 jukeboxes (which take up to 35 percent of all singles made). But the compact-disc revolution has reached there as well.

# Britain's beloved bumbler

Comic genius John Cleese plays a punctual headmaster

LOS ANGELES — The trouble with being a comic, says Britain's John Cleese, is that people expect you to be funny at all times.

"I simply can't do that," said the star of the Monty Python films and the "Fawlty Towers" series.

"If you give me a piece of material and let me go off in a coma for a while, I can come back with something laughable. But on most occasions I'm about as funny as the average bank clerk. I'm not at all like Robin Williams. I was in a hotel room with him when he was doing his improvisations, and he was astounding, absolutely astounding. That is something I could never do."

Despite his disclaimer, there are many people who firmly believe that John Cleese is the funniest man in the English-speaking world, perhaps on all continents including Antarctica.

With his vacant stare, his tall ungainly frame and his capacity for turning routine matters into major disasters, he is a slumped-down, later-day Oliver Hardy.

Even his official biography can't be taken seriously. Amid the chronology of his life happenings are such entries as:

"April 1976 — Monty Python stage show at City Center, New York; kissed by Leonard Bernstein."

"Sept. 1980 — Monty Python stage show at Hollywood Bowl. Attended yoga class with Raquel Welch."

"Oct. 1981 — Got George Burns' autograph."

Cleese breezed into town to help celebrate the opening of his new Universal comedy, "Clockwise." His first film as solo star, it is well tailored to his antic style. He plays the self-made headmaster of a English school with a mania for punctuality. The biggest day in his life comes when he is invited to address a convention of headmasters. A few dozen funny things happen along the way.

"At my age — I'll be 47 next month — it's not quite so easy to do all that running around," he

remarked. On the first day I handed right knee running around in confined space. For the rest of the week I was getting out of a small car and putting all the weight on the other knee. On the first day off, I had ... fluid on the right knee. So I spent the entire day off in my hotel room putting packets of frozen peas on it to reduce the swelling.

"I found it up, and the next morning I was supposed to be running around in the train station. At a half past 3 I tore my left hamstring. With seven weeks of shooting to go, I had the body of a 79-year-old man, with still a lot of creaking around to do."

"Clockwise" marks playwright Michael Frayne's film debut. It was directed by Michael Cordon, famed for the TV triumph, "Jewel in the Crown."

"If I liked acting at all — which I don't — I would like to do something that doesn't involve a lot of running around," Cleese said.

"I like sitting in the garden reading books. I like having lunch with friends. I like going to the movies — much more than I like making them. I like going to the theater. I like traveling. I like almost anything that isn't work."

Born in Weston-Super-Mare a month after World War II started, John Cleese was a small-town boy who managed to go to Cambridge. An A student in math, physics and chemistry, he turned to law.

"I was going to be a lawyer, but then I appeared in a show, the Cambridge Footlights, which is like the Hasty Pudding at Harvard," he said. "The next year I knew there were two very nice people from the BBC who said, 'Would you like to come and have a job with us?'"

They were offering me 2½ times as much as I would get as a lawyer, and I never wanted to be a lawyer anyway.

"I was able to tell my parents it was the BBC and I would get a pension, so it was all right with them. If I had announced I was going to be an actor, I'm sure they would have stopped me. I would hope so, because it would certainly have been a dumb thing to do."

During his early years, Cleese wrote and performed for the BBC and in reviews in 1965 and '67 he worked for David Frost TV shows with other writers who shared his

peculiar madness. They banded together for the debut of "Monty Python's Flying Circus" in September 1969.

"I can still remember saying to Michael Palin 10 minutes before the first show started: 'You do realize that we may be about to perform before the only totally silent audience at a comedy show?' One of the best moments of my life came as Terry Jones and Graham Chapman were playing a sketch about flying sheep and suppressed giggling was breaking out. It was a great moment in my life — we're actually going to be funny!"

## Dancer Rivera on the rebound from broken leg

NEW YORK — Chita Rivera hikes her pants leg and proudly shows the small scar on her left leg, shattered in an auto accident nearly seven months ago.

"It's remarkable where I am today," says one of Broadway's most remarkable dancers, a terrific musical-comedy performer who's getting ready to perform "Fame."

Miss Rivera won't dance but she'll sing one song — special material written by good friend Fred Ebb — on Oct. 30 at "Celebrate Chita!," a benefit for New York's Lenox Hill

Hospital. That's where she was taken in the early morning hours of April 7 after her car collided with a van near Central Park.

A police officer at the scene of the accident asked the 53-year-old Miss Rivera where she wanted to go. Automatically she blurted out, "Lenox Hill, Dr. Carmody."

It was John Carmody, an orthopedic surgeon who had operated on her right knee the year before. Three weeks later she was dancing again.

"This time she wasn't as lucky. 'I had no idea my leg was broken. I was too busy keeping my mind on not panicking,'" Miss Rivera recalled. She didn't learn until after the

X-rays were taken that she had suffered a broken tibia and fibula. It would take two operations and 12 tiny screws, that are still in place, to patch up things.

"I've always thought of my body as a machine. You take care of your engine," she said. "It's your life."

That life has taken Miss Rivera through some of Broadway's best musicals. She started in the chorus of such shows as "Call Me Madam," "Gypsy and Dolly" and "Can-Can," before graduating to starring roles in "West Side Story," "Bye Bye Birdie," "Chicago," "The Ink" and "Jerry's Girls."

"Thank God, I was in top shape at

the time of the accident. It was easier for me to recuperate," she said. The recuperation has included a daily regimen of physical therapy as well as twice-weekly visits to muscle therapist Armando Zetina.

In between, Miss Rivera did a lot of reading, a lot of needlepoint and watching more television than she's ever done in her life.

"The extensive routine didn't allow her to dwell on the accident. I didn't really realize my leg was broken until four weeks ago. I was too busy with my therapy even to think about it," she said. Finally in early September, she hit bottom. Zetina helped her out of it.

## New verses found of medieval poem said to be a key to German language

—MUNICH, West Germany (AP) — Bavarian officials on Wednesday announced the discovery of several new verses of the Nibelungenlied, the medieval heroic poem that embodies German mythology and inspired composer Richard Wagner's most famous operas.

The Nibelungenlied, a series of more than 2,400 verses about an evil family possessing a magic hoard of gold, is said to have been written by an unknown Austrian poet about the year 1200.

Language experts say the Nibelungenlied's rhythmic verses were important in development of the German language.

Gerhard Schwerdt, an employee of the Bavarian state library, found additional verses while cataloging

old papers and books that were stacked in the library's storage area.

"We found at least four complete pages of the verses and several fragments that had been used to wrap up old state documents, apparently by a book binder about 1650," Schwerdt told The Associated Press in a telephone interview.

Schwerdt said a preliminary study showed that the new verses contain less violence than the previously known material.

The Nibelungenlied is written in Middle High German. It recounts the myth of the warrior Siegfried who wins the Nibelungen hoard and marries a princess named Kriemhild. Siegfried captures the Icelandic

Queen Brunhild for his brother-in-law, King Gunter. Brunhild then contrives Siegfried's death, prompting Kriemhild to take revenge against her brother.

The verses are considered an important part of medieval culture and still are taught in many German schools today.

Various German dialects spoken in West Germany's southern Bavaria state closely resemble the pronunciations of the Nibelungenlied verses.

The poem inspired Richard Wagner's opera cycle, "The Ring of the Nibelungen, with its individual operas "Das Rheingold," "Die Walkure," "Siegfried," and "Goetterdaemmerung."

## Nationality debate sparks anniversary of composer's death

RAIDING, Austria — Franz Liszt a Hungarian? Not for the residents of the sleepy village where the famed composer was born.

For most of the world, the revolutionary figure of romantic music is as Hungarian as goulash. But villagers here doggedly insist he was Austrian or German, and many other Austrians share their viewpoint.

While not few, the dispute has gained particular significance for villagers this year, the 100th anniversary of Liszt's death.

Part of the Raidings' argument rests on the history of this village of 800 inhabitants just south of Vienna, which boasts the house where Liszt was born and a street and a square named after his favorite son.

Raiding was called Doborjan and was part of Hungary when Liszt was born on Oct. 20, 1811. However, it was made up mostly of ethnic Germans even then. It became Austrian in 1921 during the reorganization of what used to be the Austro-Hungarian Empire.

Liszt's parents were of Austrian and German origin. While the maestro sometimes mentioned that he felt himself to be Hungarian, he spoke German and later French at home, making up a smattering of Hungarian

only late in life.

Several villagers recently made much of Liszt's ethnic and linguistic roots in conversations with a visitor.

Part-time mayor Alois Noehrer became positively feisty when discussing Liszt over schnitzel and a glass of local Lisztperlen (Liszt Pearl) red wine at the Franz Liszt Inn.


"I'd like to say once and for all that as far as Raiding is concerned ... as far as the Austrian people are concerned, Liszt was German," said Noehrer, 51. "Liszt cannot have been Hungarian."

The dispute is touched on in many of the more than 10,000 books and articles in print about the haggard and intense piano virtuoso and pianist who wrote more than 1,300 compositions before his death on July 31, 1886.

It is a serious issue in a country whose history reads like a musical Who's Who, including Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, Josef Haydn, Franz Schubert, Johann Strauss, Anton Bruckner, Hugo Wolf, Gustav Mahler and Alban Berg.

"Many famous Germans also had close musical ties to this country," including Beethoven, who conducted his first major concert in Vienna, and Johannes Brahms, who died in the Austrian capital.

But Hungary also takes Liszt seriously.



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## Montana cowboy poet to broaden market

MILES CITY, Mont. (AP) — Wally McRae, a cowboy poet from southern Montana, said he hopes to expand his audience in the future—thanks to a new publishing agreement.

McRae's book of poetry, "It's Just Grass and Water," first published privately in 1979, has been published in its first trade edition by the Oxalis Group of Spokane, Wash., and will be available in stores and direct order.

The Rosebud County rancher, said the new edition is larger and has a new cover. It also includes a dedication of the poem "The Lease Hound" to his neighbors, Harold and Virginia Sprague, who have electricity.

The poem is about a "sharpie in a leisure suit" who tries in vain to fast-talk a self-sufficient ranch couple into leasing their land for coal mining. McRae says he took "a little poetic license, but for all intents and purposes, the story is true."

McRae's work has found its way to the Johnny Carson television show,

public radio's "Prairie Home Companion" and numerous cowboy poet and folklore conferences.

A second book of poetry, "Up North Is Down the Creek," was published in 1985, and McRae has written and directed a melodrama staged in Colstrip, where McRae's family has ranched for nearly 100 years.



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# Spacek, Bancroft explore suicide in movie adaptation

NEW YORK — Sissy Spacek spent 11 weeks last winter meticulously planning suicide.

It was for the movie, "Night, Mother," Marsha Norman's adaptation of her Pulitzer Prize-winning Broadway play. Except for very brief appearances by a few other actors, it is a two-character vehicle for Miss Spacek and Anne Bancroft.

"It wasn't easy selling suicide to movie studios, the Academy Award-winning actress said.

"We shopped it around and nobody wanted to do it," Miss Spacek said in a recent interview.



"If you read a synopsis of it, you know, you'd go, 'gosh.' But I laughed a lot when I saw it. It was a very emotional experience. It was just the oddest thing that I'd ever seen. So we just kinda all hung in there."

Aaron Spelling, who also had

seen and liked the play, agreed to produce the movie, an extreme departure from his silly, glitzy television shows such as "Dynasty" and "Love Boat."

When she saw the play, Miss Spacek knew if she did not portray the suicidal daughter, Jessie Cates, she would live to regret it.

"It's rare that a part like that comes along," she said. "I was so excited after I saw the play. I laughed and cried at the same time. I wasn't depressed. I was incredibly moved, and I think more than anything, I just couldn't not do it."

The cast and crew were confined to a soundstage during rehearsals and shooting.

# 'Foundation and Earth' fits successful Asimov formula

## Book review

Isaac Asimov is arguably the most successful science fiction writer of all time. Of science fiction's senior statesmen (Asimov, Arthur C. Clarke and Robert A. Heinlein), Asimov at 66 is the youngest and remains the most prolific of the three. His last two science-fiction novels, "The Foundation's Edge" and "Robots of Dawn," both enjoyed extended stays on The New York Times best-seller list and large advances for paperback rights. The novel reviewed here, "Foundation and Earth," seems destined for the same fate.

This novel may (or may not) be the conclusion of the famous Foundation Series, the sweeping account of the fall and rise of galactic empires that now includes five volumes and has received a unique Hugo

award as the best all-time science-fiction series. We follow the protagonists of "The Foundation's Edge," Councilman Golan Trevize of the First Foundation, historian Janov Peltzer and his beautiful (female companion, Bliss, who is a "component" of the planet-scale superorganism Gaia, as they search for a fabled lost planet called Earth, which galactic legend holds is original home of mankind. Trevize's search is complicated by the discovery that all records about Earth, its location and its history have been mysteriously deleted from the libraries of the Foundation and from all other sources.

The hallmark of Asimov's science-fiction has always been the intricate

logical structure of his plots, the convoluted twists, the flawless logic, the tricky false resolutions, the surprising — yet inevitable — conclusions. "Foundation and Earth" is no exception to this pattern. Here the twin mysteries are the location of Earth and the reason its location has been so carefully concealed.

Ultimately, Trevize and his companions find the unexpected resolution of the mysteries.

Isaac Asimov is an amazingly prolific writer, and he has been well rewarded for his recent efforts. I would not want to bet that "Foundation and Earth" is really the conclusion of the Foundation series.

TWIN FALLS — The work of Robert Service, best remembered for his poems of life in the Yukon, will be celebrated by the Sourdough Dinner Theater, thanks to a group of Twin Falls thespians who call themselves, Friends of the Renaissance Academy.

Service was a Scotsman who emigrated to Canada in 1856 at the age of 21. He traveled extensively in Western Canada and down the coast of California. Fortunately for lovers of his work, he was employed by the Canadian Bank of Commerce, which moved him around to various posts in the far Northern Yukon region between 1894 and 1912.

During this period, he observed the decline of the Klondike gold rush, which had reached its peak in 1898. He hit his own jackpot when he wrote "The Shooting of Dan McGrew" and "The Cremation of Sam McGee."

These and many other works were published in 1907 in Toronto as "Songs of a Sourdough" and in New York as "The Spoil of the Yukon." A sequel, "Ballads of a Cheechako," appeared in 1909.

Performance of Service's work, some of it put to music, will be done in a dinner theater setting. The decor will suggest the interior of the Malamute Saloon where "The Shooting of Dan McGrew" and other works were penned by Service.

The Twin Falls performance will be directed by Nick Nicholson, and Esther Nicholson is producing the show. Proceeds will go to the Renaissance Academy, a non-profit organization to promote the arts.

This is paralleled by the often-futile efforts of Chicago's elite Major Crime Unit, led by the hard-boiled Lt. Mike Torello (Dennis Farina), to get him. The show is presented serial-fashion: It began in early '60s Chicago and will end this season in the late '60s in Las Vegas.

"No one has told the story about the legitimization of organized crime before," claims producer Gus Reininger, who co-created "Crime Story" with former Chicago cop Chuck Adamson. "It was 1961 when organized crime first started becoming really sophisticated. In the '60s, crime became big business. Elsewhere in the '50s there were a lot of small turf wars between families, but in Chicago in the '60s, crime became more streamlined. Guys were employing management strategies."

Reininger says, "Crime Story" will be the first production to "realistically" show how organized crime operates almost like corporate America. "Except when a

guy who works for a corporation gets fired for making a mistake, he goes home to his wife or girlfriend who comforts him," says Reininger, who co-wrote all 22 episodes of "Crime Story." "In organized crime, a guy doesn't go home, he gets terminated permanently."

The rise of organized crime is shown through the eyes of Luca, a pompadoured punk, whom Reininger describes as "a man of vision."

"Luca represents another strand of the American success story," he says. "The guy who says anyone who stands in his way, he won't be there for long."

Pitted against him is Lt. Torello, a complex, moody man whose violent methods on behalf of the law often equal those used by Luca, and company to thwart it. In fact, the 55,000 member American Federation of Police recently criticized "Crime Story" because of the way it seemingly blurs the distinction between the good guys and the bad guys.

Reininger says there's little substance to that claim. "We are dealing here with a special police division," says Reininger. "The job of the MCU is not the job of a beat cop in New York or someone working for the L.A. sheriff. A guy like Torello has the impossible task of working with the worst elements of society. Torello also operates in a pre-Miranda (decision) environment and you'll see how that changes as the season progresses."

 A. I shared your surprise until I spoke with Jackie, Fear not, he advises. The cigarette smoking you saw on the tube was only for appearance's sake or, as Jackie puts it, "for my persona." Gleason, who underwent open-heart surgery last year, continues to smoke — but only "three or four cigarettes" per day. Before his illness, Gleason used to put away three or four packs every day.

Q. I read that Kim Novak looks every bit as good today as she did 20 years ago when she was making movies for Alfred Hitchcock. Can that be true? — C.W.

A. When Kim made the classic "Vertigo" for Hitchcock, she was in her mid-20s. She's now 53. Since she hasn't discovered the fountain of youth, let's just say that Kim has aged very gracefully. You'll get to see for yourself when Kim joins Jane Wyman in a number of installments on TV's "Falcon Crest," and when she's grilled by Barbara Walters on the latter's upcoming TV special "Through My Eyes," which happens to be the title of Kim's upcoming book, she looks terrific — period.

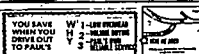

# World Series scores big points for NBC in five-for-five season

NEW YORK — America's pastime was all over prime time last week, with four World Series games in the top 10 Nielsen's, giving NBC a five-for-five season so far in the network ratings battle.

The ubiquitous No. 1 "Cosby" stayed in place — it was a lead-in to Game 5 on Thursday night — with a 35.4 rating and a 54 share, down from its record-setting 57 share of the previous week.

Games 6, 5, 4, 3, in order, were Nos. 2, 3, 5 and 6, interrupted only by CBS's "60 Minutes" at No. 4, with a 26.3 rating and a 40 share.

"It's hard to do well against the World Series," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president of research projects.

The Series will continue to help NBC next week, when the ratings for Game 7 on Monday night are included.

Game 7 garnered the biggest audience for a baseball game ever, according to NBC, which estimated it was viewed in 34 million homes, compared to about 32 million homes estimated to have watched the sixth and deciding game of the 1980 World Series between Philadelphia and Kansas City.

Game 7, which the Mets won, 8-5, got a 38.9 rating and a 55 share, compared to a 40 rating and 60 share for the 1980 game.

Ratings points now represent more households with television than they did in 1980, which made Game 7 most-watched if not highest rated.

NBC won its fifth week in a row, the fifth week of the season, with a 21.7 rating and a 34 share. CBS was second with a 15.7 rating and 24 share. ABC had an average 14.1 rating and a 22 share.

A rating point equals 874,000 homes equipped with television. The share is the portion of sets in use.

"We thought we held up pretty well, given the World Series competition. On the three nights when there was no World Series, we did very well and won all three of those nights," which are our key nights anyway," said CBS vice president for research Dave Poltrack.

Season-to-date figures gave NBC an average 19.4 rating and 31 share;



CBS a 15.9 rating and 25 share and ABC a 14.8 rating and a 24 share.

Jaffe said NBC would "win" the season, unless CBS can average a 0.67 rating over NBC for the rest of the season.

Game 6 of the World Series was the top-rated game of the week at No. 2, had a 30.3 rating and 52 share.

The six games for which national ratings were available averaged a 26.9 rating and a 44 share, up from last year's average for the seven-game series between St. Louis and Kansas City — a 24.1 rating and a 38 share.

With the World Series pre-empting the rest of NBC's Thursday shows, ABC sneaked its strong Tuesday lineup of "Who's the Boss?", "Growing Pains" and "Moonlighting" into the bottom three slots of the top 10.

CBS' "Murder, She Wrote" was seventh.

The World Series blew any meaningful analysis for the week as far as series were concerned, but some trends continued.

"Dallas" won again over "Miami Vice" in the CBS-versus-NBC matchup on Friday night when baseball did not come into play.

"Vice" ranked 20th, garnering a 17.9 rating and 29 share to 12th-place "Dallas's" 20.3 rating and 33 share.

Jaffe noted a "significant" gain for "L.A. Law," which follows "Vice" on Friday. "Law," the critically successful "Hill Street Blues" format in a three-piece suit, moved up to 27th from 36th last week.

Jaffe said "All," which has been borderline, has "held up remarkably well." The Monday night sit-com about a furry puppet alien living with an average American family made some gains on rival "Kate and Allie," a CBS sit-com about an unfunny, un-average American family.

"All" tied with CBS's night-time soap "Knots Landing" for 29th, moving up from 38th the previous week. "Kate and Allie" was in a four-way tie for 15th. It had been 17th the previous week.

Monday's "Amazing Stories," meanwhile, "has not held up its fair share," Jaffe said.

The Steven Spielberg-produced anthology was at 48th, down from 42nd the previous week.

CBS's news special, "AIDS Hits Home," was a respectable 42nd.

ABC had seven of the bottom 10 shows. NBC's lowest-rated show was "Our House," which fell to 40th.

Jaffe was unconcerned about the drop, blaming it on audience expectations that Game 7, which was rained out, would be played Sunday night.

Occupying the ratings dungeon were, from the bottom, or 63rd: "Our World," "Ellen Burstyn Show," "Life with Lucy," "Heart of the City," "Sidekicks," "Starman," "Downtown," (movie) "Psycho II," "Colbys" and "Sledge Hammer!"

# Public TV rethinks program structure

WASHINGTON — The Public Broadcasting Service, which provides programs for 316 non-commercial television stations, has started to review the standards it uses to decide which programs it uses.

"This step is necessary at this time because there are some who seek to discredit the programming on PBS," said Bruce L. Christensen, PBS president.

A series now being aired, called "The Africans," has come under fire from the National Endowment for the Humanities, which helped pay for it, because it tells the story of the development of Africa from an African's point of view, with no balancing opinion.

"PBS is not an ideological tool of any political faction. We are devoted to the principle of diversity of expression, consistent with responsible broadcasting," Christensen said.

He said it is occasionally useful to review the "carefully designed checks and balances in the structure of public television to prevent the program selection process from serving anyone's political agenda."

The Corporation for Public Broadcasting board of directors has considered ordering a program analysis of PBS shows to see if any particular political point of view predominates. Because of controversy among CPB board members, that project has been shelved for the moment.

Christensen noted in his announcement that the PBS board is the properly constituted authority to examine any questions regarding the integrity of PBS's programming judgments.

A PBS spokesman emphasized that the PBS policy review was not a program analysis.

Christensen said those who seek to limit the range and diversity of PBS programming through political intimidation not only threaten to undermine PBS's program independence but also jeopardize democracy's larger values as stated in the Constitution.

"Nothing is more important to public television than its program and editorial independence," the PBS chief said.

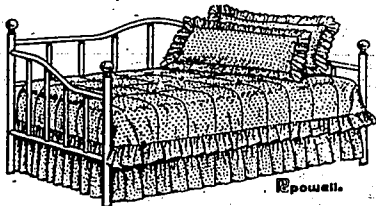

## NBC censors SNL comic's routine

LOS ANGELES (AP) — NBC censored a West Coast broadcast of "Saturday Night Live" because a routine by a comedian violated network policy that references to drugs must be negative, a producer said.

Network censors cut off both audio and pictures for about 13 seconds during two segments of the five-minute stand-up routine by Sam Kinison on Saturday's West Coast broadcast, but it went out unedited in all other markets, said "Saturday Night Live" producer Lorne Michaels.

"They... (the censors) didn't con-

sider his drug references negative enough," Michaels said. "The policy at NBC now is that the only references to drugs must be negative."

Kinison was talking about the government's war on drugs when the first of two edits took place. A slide showing last year's cast was put on the screen.

"They've taken the pot, there is no more pot," Kinison said. "You can't get any more pot. If you give us back the pot, we'll forget the crack."

Michaels said he disagreed with the censors.

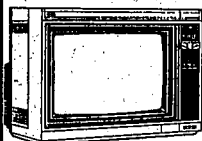

## Letterman prop crew can speedily concoct velcro suits to order

NEW YORK — David Letterman's writers thought it would be funny to have a shaving brush that looks like a celebrity. Kathleen Ankers had to figure out how to comb the bristles.

"This one will become Gene Shalit, once I figure out how to make a shaving brush's hair like Gene Shalit's head," she said, demonstrating one of several jobs in development in her cluttered, closet-sized office at NBC headquarters.

There's also a backup shaving brush, a Don King model, if the Shalit brush resists styling. "It's not

very flexible," she complained.

Flexibility is the thing if you're doing props for NBC's "Late Night with David Letterman," a job which Ms. Ankers shares with Jeremy Conway.

They make the giant chicken drumsticks, the maps made of meat, the gushing oil derrick on Jerry Lewis' head, and the harness for Zippy the Late-Night Monkeycam.

Sometimes they have just a couple of hours' notice before taping begins at 5:30 p.m., and they're often still at work at 9 p.m. or later.

They set up the "super slo-mo" bits such as throwing eggs into a fan, and they test some of the stuff

## Wright's Sunday news idea stifled at NBC

NEW YORK — Robert C. Wright would like to put a news program on NBC's Sunday morning schedule. Since he's the president of the network, it would seem easy enough to have his wish.

"There is a lot of enthusiasm for it," Wright says, "but that doesn't mean it will suddenly materialize."

That caution reflects Wright's view of the realities of running a network. It all boils down to getting people to watch, he said last week at one of a series of "meet the press" luncheons with reporters who cover the industry.

The realities are simple. Network affiliates don't have to show what the network provides, and viewers don't have to watch whatever the stations run.

That's a problem right now with "1986," Wright said, speaking of NBC's weekly news magazine show which was the lowest-rated prime-time network program in the week of Sept. 30-Oct. 5.

None of NBC's affiliates preempts the program regularly. "1986" spokesman Jim Boyle said, but it oc-

asionally gave way to baseball this summer in some cities and 14 stations dropped out the first week in September to carry a Billy Graham crusade.

"There's an awful lot of effort that goes on to keep affiliates with '86," Wright said.

"If Larry Grossman (the president of NBC News) appeared at an affiliate board meeting and said, 'Hey, we're going to do three more (programs) and they'll be great,' they would say, 'Get out of here. Not in our time.'"

That's a particular problem in developing a Sunday show to compete with "CBS News Sunday Morning," a 90-minute program that is now in its eighth year. Last season, it averaged a respectable 5.2 rating, or 20 percent of the Sunday morning audience.

NBC's affiliates are accustomed to having Sunday mornings for themselves, Wright said, and lots of them have filled the schedule with paid religious broadcasts.

Doing more news programming "is a great idea if we can figure out how to get it in a way that it will be used — if we can get the affiliate support," Wright said. "And the af-

filates will argue that it isn't their personal support that is the issue, it's viewer support.

"We have these two constituencies that we cannot ignore."

Wright would hold news programs to the same tests as "The Cosby Show" or "Hill Street Blues." The best example, he said, is "60 Minutes," the CBS Sunday news program that's in the A.C. Nielsen top 10 nearly every week.

"It is one of the best scripted, best produced and best acted shows in television," Wright said.

"People don't seem to be willing to have different standards for their viewership. I think if they have a different standard, then they can just flip off and watch CNN," the all-news Cable Network News operation.

General Electric acquired NBC last year when it merged with RCA, and the 43-year-old Wright took over as NBC's president and chief executive officer Sept. 1. His previous broadcasting experience was as president of Cox Cable Communications Inc. in Atlanta from 1980 to 1983, at a time when GE hoped to merge with Cox. Wright also headed

GE's Plastics Sales Organization, its Housewares and Audio Division and its financial services affiliate.

Within a month, Wright said, the network expects to conclude an internal review of its operations and efficiency initiated by his predecessor, Grant Tinker. He predicted that NBC will be trimming its payroll somewhat.

"I'm a believer in fewer people with more responsibility," he said, but indicated that no widespread layoffs are anticipated.

"What is going on is not real complicated," Wright said. "Advertising revenues have flattened off, and viewership has declined. If programming is increasing in cost, something has to work, otherwise we'll all be steaming into Chapter 11."

Chapter 11 is the provision of the Federal Bankruptcy Act for reorganizing a distressed corporation.

"My dream for the next five years, which is probably unachievable, would be to be able to operate at a cost level where we could do very well without having to increase advertising revenues," Wright said.

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
