Shultz, Soviet leave talks, summit in doubt

VIENNA, Austria — U.S. Secretary of State George P. Shultz and Soviet Foreign Minister Eduard A. Shevardnadze failed Thursday to make headway toward curbing nuclear weapons and left the future of arms control and superpower summits in doubt. Shultz told reporters after his five hours of talks with Shevardnadze over two days: "I can't say that the meetings have moved on arms control matters along in any significant way, and I regret this."

Shevardnadze said he was returning to Moscow "with a bitter taste" after being confronted with "a mixed bag of old mobilized views and approaches." Summing up the meetings, which took place while Shevardnadze and Shultz were in Vienna for a conference on human rights and East-West relations, one senior U.S. official said: "It was a bust."

The pace cannot be forced by either party. U.S.-Soviet arms control talks in Geneva are to recess next week until January. Shultz offered to have U.S. and Soviet experts meet in the interim, but Shevardnadze apparently did not accept it. A package of U.S. proposals, reflecting the tentative arms reduction records reached in last month's Iceland summit, were presented last week to Soviet negotiators. U.S. officials said the Soviets have not responded. Shevardnadze, at an airport news conference, said "we will put forth our new proposals" Friday at Geneva. He said they would be "guided by the positions reached at Reykjavik."

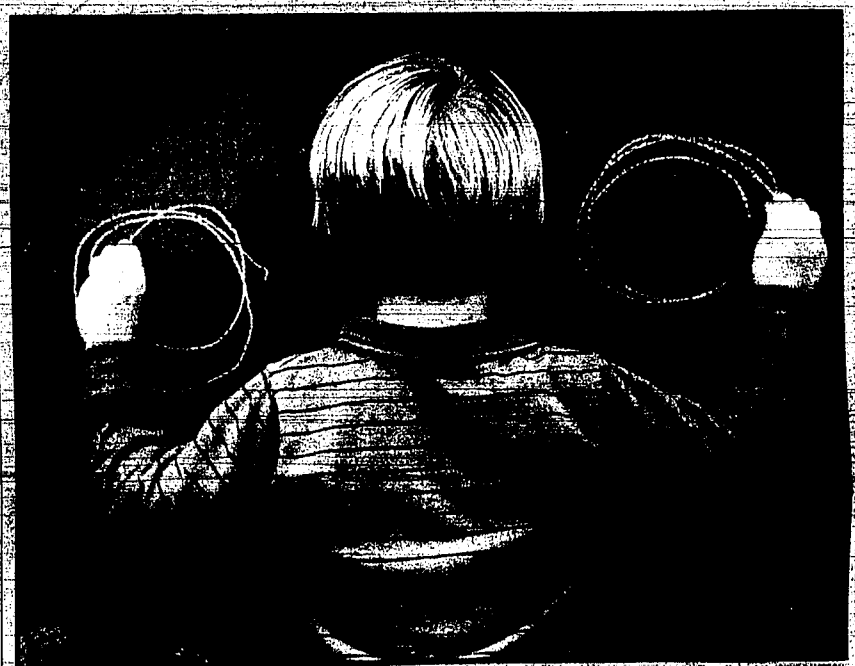
A senior U.S. official said he expected no change in basic Soviet positions. The official said the Soviets would again demand testing of "Star Wars" technology be limited to laboratories, abolishing all strategic weapons by 1996, and an end to U.S. development of short-range nuclear weapons to be used for Western Europe's defense.

Immigration bill now law

WASHINGTON — President Reagan, signing into law the most sweeping immigration reform in more than 30 years, expressed hope Thursday that the measure will preserve "one of the most sacred possessions of our people — American citizenship."

Millions of illegal aliens may become eligible to remain in the United States legally under the act, approved in the waning days of the 99th Congress after years of political wrangling. But sponsors of the measure have expressed fears the complex law may trigger an administrative nightmare. Reagan, before signing the measure, noted that "illegal" immigration "should not" be seen as a problem between the United States and its neighbors. "Our objective is only to establish a reasonable, fair and orderly and secure system of immigration into this country and not to discriminate in any way against particular nations or people," Reagan added. Some opponents of the measure had argued the bill would prompt wide-spread discrimination against such groups as Hispanics. With nearly two dozen lawmakers

Clean Water Act dies in presidential pocket

WASHINGTON — President Reagan on Thursday vetoed an \$18 billion extension of the Clean Water Act of 1972, saying the proposed spending "exceeds acceptable levels."

In a memorandum explaining the reasons for his pocket veto, the president said the bill did make some improvements in the act, including expansion of federal enforcement authority and easing the regulatory and financial burden on cities. "We will work diligently with the 100th Congress to address this concern," he added. "Unfortunately, this bill so far exceeds acceptable levels of intended budgetary commitments that I must withhold my approval," the president said. Reagan had proposed \$6 billion to keep the federal grant program for sewage and waste water treatment plant construction going for three years, then turn it over to state and local government. The bill passed by Congress would also have wound the program up, but would have kept it going until 1994 and set up a revolving fund to help states and communities bear the cost in the future. Off-duty airline pilot dies in fire after plane hits jetliner on taxiway

TAMPA, Fla. — An off-duty airline pilot trying to land his twin-engine plane in thick fog smashed into a Pan-Am jet on a taxiway Thursday and died as his aircraft burst into flames. The small aircraft was deflected underneath the big aircraft, obviously breaking up in the process. But it slid all the way under and clear of the big aircraft before it burst into flames. It was demolished," said Paul MacAlester, spokesman for the Hillsborough Aviation Authority at Tampa International Airport. Aviation officials said Pan American Airways Flight 301, bound for Miami with 17 passengers and a crew of six, was taxiing when the small Piper Apache apparently mistook the taxiway for the runway. The taxiway parallels the runway, 400 feet away. The pilot of the small plane, an Eastern Airlines captain who was on his way to work, screamed "Oh my

God! Oh my God!" as he spotted and then tried to avoid the jetliner, according to an airport worker. The small plane may have been making its second attempt at a landing when the crash occurred, said Joseph Nall, a member of the National Transportation Safety Board. "It is my understanding that a first approach was made, but it has not been verified," he said at a news conference Thursday night. Nall said the left engine of the Piper was imbedded in the nose of the jet. A team of investigators from the NTSB arrived in Tampa at 3 p.m. Thursday to look into the weather at the time of the accident, the airworthiness of the small plane and operations of both aircraft, Nall said. Visibility was one-sixteenth of a mile, or about 110 yards, when the collision occurred at 5:05 a.m. MST, said John Tubbs, a Federal Aviation

Administration area manager in the airport control tower. Pan Am spokesman Armand Arel said he knew of only three injuries among the passengers — evacuated from the 727 jet. Two people had bruised shoulders and the other said Pan Am spokesman Merle Richman. He took evasion action to the right. In so doing, he prevented a head-on. Rather, the Piper hit a glancing blow just below the captain's window," Richman said.

War-battered Iran warily puts out hand for help to world

Brused by war, strapped for cash, Iran's revolutionaries have put out a hand for international help, seven years after their showdown with a superpower left them stranded in defiant isolation from much of the world. The Iranian overtures come as U.S. officials seek Tehran's aid in freeing American hostages in Lebanon. But the new Iranian overtures range far beyond Washington — to Moscow, Peking and Tokyo. Iran needs arms for its war with Iraq. It needs stronger and steadier oil prices to lighten its treasury. It needs trade partners to

and other offenses. In a new report Thursday that could not otherwise be verified, an Iranian exile group, the Mujahadeen Khalq, claimed that hundreds of people were arrested in the purge. One analyst of Iranian political developments, Shaul Bakhash of Virginia's George Mason University, said the Global Islamic Movement apparently had become "lucrative." "In Lebanon, for example, they have pursued a policy independent of the Foreign Ministry," Bakhash said in an interview. Government officials, who have to deal with other governments, want control of foreign policy. Many Tehran revolutionaries still favor an

Storm sweeps toward Black Hills

A strong, winter-like storm dumped up to 10 inches of new snow across Wyoming and sent temperatures below freezing on Thursday, then headed for South Dakota's Black Hills and the northern Plains.

New snow also fell in New Hampshire and Maine, a mixture of rain and sleet damped Minnesota, and rain scattered across most of the South and in the Pacific Northwest.

Winds gusting up to 55 mph whipped over the Mojave area of Southern California, and high wind warnings were posted for the deserts and mountains of Southern California and for the central San Joaquin Valley, southern Nevada and northern Arizona.

The strengthening snowstorm hit southern Missouri.

Mail plane crashes near Butte

BUTTE (AP) — Ground search crews combed the hills and mountains south and west of Butte Thursday looking for a mail plane that crashed while making an instrument approach to the Butte airport.

The search is to continue today.

So far, the effort has been hampered by low clouds and poor visibility that kept search planes grounded for most of Thursday and by new-fallen snow that could hide the plane's wreckage.

Adding to the difficulty of searching in the snow storm, the missing twin-engine Cessna 421 is painted mostly white.

Tribunal extends trial 4 days

MANAGUA, Nicaragua (AP) — The Peoples' Tribunal trying American mercenary Eugene Hasenfus on Thursday extended the trial for four days to let court members visit the site where his aircraft was shot down.

Court president Reynaldo Montenegro also rejected a request by defense attorney Enrique Sotelo Borge to let Hasenfus' wife, Sally, testify on behalf of her husband. But he said the defense could enter Mrs. Hasenfus' prepared statement in the record as documentary evidence.

Reagan tries to quell reports

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan on Thursday tried to quell reports that his administration helped win release of three hostages held in Lebanon by adding the transfer of defense supplies by Israel to Iran.

Reagan, asked by reporters whether he had a deal in Iran, said: "No comment, but could I suggest an appeal to all of you with regard to this, that the speculation, the commenting and all-on-a-story that came out of the Middle East... one that to us has no foundation; that all of that is making it more difficult for us in our effort to get the other hostages free."

Falling rocket creates fireball

The measure authorizes the Women in Military Service for America Memorial Foundation to establish the memorial.

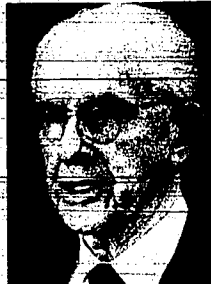
Audit criticizes system design

RICHLAND, Wash. (AP) — A facility handling plutonium at the Hanford nuclear reservation had an engineering design system that was "significantly out of control," according to documents released Thursday by the U.S. Department of Energy.

Rockwell Hanford Operations officials declined to comment on the audits.

In an internal safety and quality assurance audit report filed April 9, 1988, auditor Casey Ruud found deficiencies at three facilities where plutonium is handled at the Hanford nuclear reservation.

Benson listed as satisfactory following pacemaker implant

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mormon Church President Ezra Taft Benson was listed in satisfactory condition Thursday night after undergoing three hours of surgery to implant a heart pacemaker, a spokesman said.

The procedure was not the result of an emergency, but had been considered for some time to improve the function of the 87-year-old church leader's heart, said spokesman Jerry Cahill.

Benson was alert and conscious at LDS Hospital following the operation, said Dr. L. Stephen Richards Jr., who performed the surgery, and Dr. Allan H. Barker, Benson's cardiologist.

Benson had been experiencing some episodes during which his heart beat was slowing inappropriately, Barker said. The electronic pacemaker guarantees that heart rhythm is maintained at a normal rate and regular rhythm.

The two physicians described the surgery as minor, involving a small incision in the left upper chest area.

Benson was expected to remain hospitalized for two days and con-

Benson attended his regular weekly meeting with other members of the church's all-male hierarchy in the Salt Lake Temple Thursday morning — and was driven to the hospital after lunch, he said.

Cahill said Benson had no history of heart problems, but doctors felt the pacemaker would generally improve his health.

"You recall that he is 87 years old. His cardiologist keeps track of him and just felt it was a 'good time,' Cahill said. "They've been talking about it for some time."

Benson, who was U.S. agriculture secretary from 1953 to 1960, entered LDS Hospital four days before his 87th anniversary as the faith's "prophet, seer and revelator."

Last weekend, Benson abruptly canceled an appearance in Boise, Idaho. Elder March J. Ashton told there that "the excitement of contemplating being with you all week... has caused an anxious exhaustion that makes it impossible to be here today."

For Theresa Brisson, who bakes a dozen pies each day for a restaurant

Mrs. Rubio, who said she would like to start her own baking business, said she began cooking in 1972 when she got married. "I'd please my husband so he wouldn't miss his mom's cooking," she said.

She credits cornstarch for her stiff meringue, but said the key to baking is patience and research. "I study cooking books in the mornings while I have coffee before the kids get up. I have a hobby, but I work hard at it."

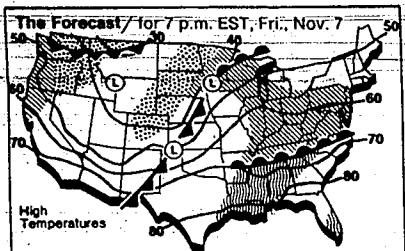

nian "pragmatist," met with Chinese officials in Peking last year.

On that same Far East trip, Rafsanjani reached agreement with Japanese officials on stepping up economic cooperation. Tehran officials have said they are shopping for Japanese technology for industrial projects in Iran.

The Iranians are improving relations with Saudi Arabia, whose Shiite minority has been a target of Iranian revolutionary agitation. The Saudis sent a delegation to Iran last year, and — in an unusual move — Iran's oil minister conferred with Saudi King Fahd to try to coordinate oil-pricing policies before last month's OPEC meeting.

Iranian-U.S. trade has expanded steadily in recent months, the U.S.

Commerce Department reports. The Iranians shipped \$330 million in oil and other exports to the United States in the first nine months of this year, compared with \$469 million in the same period last year.

The American connection is paying off in other ways as well.

At the United States' behest, Israel in the past year has shipped military supplies to Iran, including spare parts for warplanes, a well-placed source told The Associated Press in Washington Thursday. In return, Iran helped gain freedom for three American hostages in Lebanon.

A 7-year-old U.S. arms embargo has crippled Iran's armed forces in a war that is draining that nation of treasure and life.

But some analysts, including Gary

Slick, a former Iran specialist with the U.S. National Security Council, do not believe a true U.S.-Iranian rapprochement is in the works.

Slick noted that the reported new U.S. contacts have touched off squabbling among Iran's revolutionary factions in recent days. In public at least, Iran's leaders are fast trying to distance themselves from the American "Great Satan."

"Some of Khomeini's enemies — meanwhile, sound sure that Iran's "opening" to the West will be short-lived.

"It's like a man drowning. They are grabbing at straws," said Ali Safavi, a U.S. spokesman for the anti-Khomeini Mujahadeen Khalq. "Khomeini has run into a deadlock in the war, and he is desperate for arms."

Mining firm to pay penalty

BOISE (AP) — A mining company has agreed to pay a \$20,000 penalty and work at cleaning up a central Idaho mining operation that has caused water pollution.

Al Murray, Water Quality Bureau chief for the Department of Health and Welfare, said Golden Reef Joint Venture will pay the penalty for water violations involving its Deep Mine and Mule Creek, a tributary of Monumental Creek in the Frank Church-River of No Return Wilderness Area.

The state has been negotiating with Golden Reef for two years about water violations and reached settlement last week just before a trial was scheduled to begin in 4th District Court, Murray said.

Under the agreement, Golden Reef will prepare a site rehabilitation plan which must be approved by the department. The settlement allows future mining at the site.

Critic files claim with city

POCATELLO (AP) — Al Brewer, persistent critic of Pocatello's city government, has filed a claim with the city seeking \$75,000 for alleged humiliation and embarrassment at how the city handles his requests for public records.

Brewer first sought \$20,000 and an apology after Mayor Dick Finlayson issued an order limiting Brewer's access to public records. The mayor said it was highly unlikely Brewer would get either.

"If the city wants to play hardball, they better bring their checkbook," Brewer said. "I'm not going to sit still for this kind of harassment."

Brewer and Finlayson are at odds over requests for public records. Finlayson last month directed city department heads to refer Brewer to the mayor's office for any requests for public records.

Couple sues PCA over money

POCATELLO (AP) — A Bingham County couple is suing the Southern Idaho Production Credit Association for more than \$3 million over crop proceeds claimed by the farm lender, according to a complaint filed in 6th District Court.

Kevin and Deena Seamons and their representative in a bankruptcy proceeding, Trustee, Ltd., are seeking relief from action taken by the PCA after the family's 1985 crop was sold.

The Seamons took out three loans in 1984 totaling some \$889,000. They claim to have repaid one of the loans, for \$283,885, by February 1985. But the lawsuit filed Tuesday contends the PCA claimed a \$100,000 check for 1985 crop proceeds for repayment of another of the loans.

Suspect in slaying identified

POCATELLO (AP) — A Wenatchee, Wash., woman has identified a man who killed himself during a foiled robbery attempt in Wenatchee last June as the murderer of a local man during the robbery of a Pocatello bowling alley in February, police said.

Pocatello Police Detective Bruce Wheatley said Thursday that the woman, who was not identified, was an accomplice of James "Jack" Holcomb in at least one robbery in Washington. She gave police a statement on Tuesday identifying Holcomb as the killer of Michael G. Thornley, 42.

Thornley died Feb. 16 at the Moonlight Gardens Lanes during a robbery in which \$2,000 in cash and checks was taken. He was shot twice in the chest.

Last drink could stall auto

BOISE, Idaho (AP) — Idahoans who repeatedly have one for the road and insist on driving soon may find their car keys taken away by a new device demonstrated for state judges and law-enforcement officials in Boise.

The device will not allow paroled drunken drivers to start their cars if blood-alcohol levels measured by the machine exceed state limits.

State Sen. Skip Smyser, R-Parma, organized Wednesday's demonstration after seeing the device at a legislators' conference.

The machine is manufactured by Guardian Interlock Systems Inc. of Denver. It measures blood-alcohol levels using electrical resistance sensors that analyze a motorist's breath in no more time than it takes to fasten a seat-belt, said Mary Hinton, a company spokeswoman.

Menan woman dies in mishap

POCATELLO (AP) — A 65-year-old Menan woman died when she was thrown from her car that overturned after her husband lost control on Interstate 15 in Pocatello Thursday.

Idaho State Police identified the woman as Julia R. Jackson, who died at the scene.

Injured were her husband, Wesley Jackson, and two of his daughters, Joyce Ann Ziegler, 29, Menan, and Cheryl Jackson, 35, Idaho Falls. Police said none of the occupants was wearing seat belts.

Jordan honored with symposium

NAMPA (AP) — Northwest Nazarene College here will use a gift from the estates of the late Len B. Jordan and his wife, Grace, to create a new Len B. Jordan Public Affairs Symposium.

The move was announced Thursday by NNC President Gordon Wetmore.

Wetmore said the symposium was established to recognize the close relationship between NNC President Emeritus John E. Riley, and Jordan, who served as Idaho governor and a U.S. senator.

Wetmore said the symposium will provide a forum to present significant public affairs issues.

Gooding school No. 1 on building list

BOISE (AP) — An advisory panel has decided to give top priority to funding for ongoing projects, when the Legislature is asked for money next year for state construction.

The Permanent Building Fund Council on Thursday decided priorities for construction projects. The list goes to the governor's office, then will be submitted to the Legislature's Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee.

But the requests total many times the money available. Without some extra source of revenue, such as new taxes, most of the requests won't be funded.

The committee decided earlier in the day to submit an approved list of projects, even though there isn't enough money for all of them.

Given top priority in the list of requests to the Legislature was \$3 million to continue paying for rebuilding of the State School for the Deaf and Blind at Gooding. The \$2-million project was started earlier.

Second priority was given to a new

maximum security state prison. The last Legislature put up \$8 million to start it, although a site hasn't been selected. The Permanent Building Fund Council will meet with the Department of Corrections next month to select a site for the prison. The prison will cost an estimated \$30 million.

Third priority was given to a request for \$620,000 to start an addition at the Idaho Veterans Home. It will cost \$2 million.

Fourth priority was voted to a \$400,000 request for a new Idaho National Guard armory at Homedale. It will cost \$1.6 million.

Board member Sen. Kermit Klebert, D-Hope, said he was concerned that the state might run into a big lawsuit for outdated and inadequate facilities.

At his suggestion, the board voted fifth priority to \$1.5 million for a new psychiatric facility at the state prison.

Bannock County race in limbo over ballots

POCATELLO (AP) — Election officials are trying to decide whether 910 absentee votes in Bannock County are valid as the county clerk's race remains in limbo because of the discovery.

Meanwhile, a printing error in Shoshone county was discovered and election officials there say some votes were incorrectly counted by the computer. But the mistake doesn't change any outcomes.

In Bannock County, the absentee votes in question have been turned over to the sheriff's office for safekeeping.

The fate of the ballots could change the outcome of the race between Clerk Larry Ghan and his independent opponent, Kathy Lacy Schless, and possibly other close contests. The incumbent Democrat unofficially won by 137 votes.

However, if the ballots are disqualified there is a chance Mrs. Schless may come out on top. Of the 1,936 absentee ballots, 1,127 were cast for Ghan and 809 were cast for Schless.

Deputy Secretary of State Ben Yursa, who initially approved the counting of the ballots, said Bannock County Prosecutor Larry Echolaw must decide their validity.

"It is in the county's hands right now, but it's nothing that needs to be rushed to with a judgment," Yursa said.

The county has 10 days after the election to certify the votes before they are turned over to the state. The Secretary of State has an additional five days to certify state totals.

The ballots came into question because they were not marked with the official election stamp. Ghan blamed a "clerical error" by poll workers for the invalidated ballots.

Yursa on Wednesday said he doesn't think a clerical error should invalidate the ballots.

Initially, Mrs. Schless had no plans to contest the ballots, but she said she wants to discuss the issue with Echolaw.

Tribes ready to fight road in game area

FORT HALL (AP) — Shoshone-Bannock tribal officials have vowed to sue if a proposed eight-mile farm-to-market road near Egln to Hamer west of St. Anthony is built, saying it would violate their treaty hunting rights.

Bureau of Land Management officials are developing a final environmental impact statement for the controversial road through private winter elk habitat asked for Wednesday's meeting in Fort Hall to clarify the tribes' official comment on the draft EIS.

The Tribal Business Council called the draft EIS "fatally inadequate" in a resolution promising litigation if the road is built. The tribes' written comments point to "seriously flawed" methodologies.

Charles Pace of the tribes' Economic Analysis Office said the BLM's "marginalist" approach ignored both the considerable investment in the threatened elk herd and the intangible benefits it provides tribal members.

"Your framework is based on the marginal costs of building the road," he told BLM officials Wednesday. "You should be looking at the total costs, including the money spent on building up the elk herd over the last 20 years, as well as the total benefits of not building the road."

Cut the acrimony, get on with process

As reflects the quality of the people involved, top Idaho candidates this week from both parties have been mostly magnanimous in victory and congratulatory in defeat.

Several have said they want to put aside the partisan conflicts and work with each other to build a better Idaho.

But that generosity has been marred by some people on both sides of the right-to-work issue, whose critics and proponents carried on Wednesday as if the decision had not been made on Tuesday.

Right-to-work proponent Gary Glenn couldn't resist taking one last gloating swipe at union leader Jim Kerns, by thanking him for "turning out the union vote" in North Idaho.

Not to be outdone in the continuing war of words, Paula Wissel, of the union's anti-right-to-work group, Idahoans Against Deception, countered that the voters "bought a phony bill of goods from Gary." The state of Idaho, she said, harbors Nazis and "people who hate unions."

Idaho voters are an independent, sometimes ornery lot. On right-to-work, they listened to both sides, then voted decisively to keep the law.

The issue is now behind us in Idaho, and we think much would be accomplished by both sides in this dispute by lowering both the volume and the acrimony of their rhetoric.

Wissel surely knows that the world won't end now that right-to-work has passed. And Glenn surely knows it won't bring on the business Nirvana he and his cohorts have claimed.

We were tempted to nominate Wissel for the Sour Grapes Award and Glenn for the Cross Crowning Awards of the 1986 election, but we have devised a far more fitting sentence:

They have to spend a day with each other, preferably out of the earshot of Idaho's voters and press.

Maybe if they did, they would get this childishness out of their systems.

The people of Idaho, we suspect, are ready to get on with the business of putting Idahoans to work, of building the economy, of improving our educational system.

Both sides in the right-to-work issue have a positive role to play in that process — if they want to.

Letters/ Speaker's statement on competency of teachers, testing clarified

Comment on plan solicited
Reference is made to the article in the Oct. 30, Times-News concerning teacher competency testing.

The quote attributed to me is only a paraphrase of what I said, and may give a wrong impression. I really don't think all teachers in Idaho are incompetent. The quote may infer that this is my feeling.

The competency testing would cover only new teachers to Idaho. I am more concerned with the poor teachers presently in the classroom than these new teachers.

We have many good, dedicated teachers in Idaho. However, we also have some poor teachers. These should be required to shape up or get out.

This requires help from students, parents, and administrators. They need to have their deficiencies (and good qualities) pointed out and give them help in making corrections. If they don't respond they should be dismissed.

The competency testing will only test areas that colleges should be testing. It will do nothing to show competency in the basic skills a teacher needs such as caring.

Approximately two teachers salaries would be used to validate the test. This would be appropriated by the Legislature and paid for by the taxpayers. Prospective teachers would have to travel to a test center — normally a college, to take the test. They would pay their own expenses — transportation, meals, lodging, etc., plus a \$48 per test fee. Results would go to Boise and be

entered in the applicant's file. This would be required prior to obtaining a teaching certificate or being offered a job. I feel this is an unnecessary expense for taxpayers and prospective teachers and does nothing to improve education.

Publicly on the meeting held in Twin Falls was not outstanding. Very few that didn't have a connection with education attended. This was probably in part due to lack of publicity and part due to complacency. More participation by parents, taxpayers, etc., is needed. These programs affect all of us. I was pleased to see students from the Plier school system in attendance.

Way to settle authenticity
With all the hoopla about the Aryan Nations group, I was imagining what it would be like to be searching for the meaning of life and its religions. How confusing it would be because the vast majority of religions in America cite the Bible as a reference for what they believe.

Several, such as the Aryan Nations, attract people into the comfort of justifying

black hair by calling their skin the "mark of Cain" (why not blond hair, since biblical origins are in the Middle East, where that would be the most desirable color).

Confusing, isn't it? In their own way, they all seem to have a credibility of sorts. The commonly acceptable thing to do is consider them all true in their own way; then you're safe from criticism. Or, to show that you have a sense of judgment, you may come out against the ones who brag about their prejudice.

Let's assume that you are certain of only two things — your belief in God and that he is the source of the Bible. You want to be sure that the church you involve yourself with has the soundness of doctrine that can be proven. Check these points:

1. Have you seen lives of people in that church dramatically change because of what the Bible says — without the teachings of other men? (Interestingly, no other faith but Christianity can be evidenced without indoctrination of some kind.)
2. Is the Bible the only source of authority? It should be. Even the apostles discouraged emphasis on themselves.
3. How is this church distinguished? By its activities? Wealth? Involvement in social reform? Cultural programs? Family emphasis? Music? Home made items? Work with the poor? If it claims to be Christian it should be known for its obedience to his final commandment — to tell others about his completion of our work.

A church in error has it backwards. Its main thrust is on a system of programs designed to provide the warm feeling that one is involved in a good thing, which builds his own self-concept.

This is reinforced by the leaders' promotion of pride in that particular church, which results in a mutual admiration society. If it is indeed a Christian church, its pride should be known and be known only as what Christ did. Now what its members or leaders do. Given this provision, the people will not require a list of do's and don'ts. Incredible, but true. It is ironic that there is much fascination

with people of man-oriented religions who suddenly do sensational things, good and bad; yet we see and hear so little about the truly miraculous changes which occur in authentic new Christians — the many ex-convicts, former addicts, child molesters and alcoholics who have a new life, eliminating our cost of upkeep for them.

The sensible way to discern the authenticity of a Christian organization, sect or denomination would be to look beyond its claims and analyze its current agreement with what was originally taught (uninterrupted to this day) by Christ's personally chosen men. It was, and is, distinguished by its very lack of self-importance.

Political progress by the drip method

BOSTON — On the morning after election night, you can find the political analysts starting eye-browed into their coffee cups. What do they see down there for the women in politics in 1987? "You can look at the cup as half-empty or you can look at it as half-full," says Ruth Mandel, who has been "looking" for 15 years from her post at the Center for American Woman and Politics. "But you sure can't say that the cup runneth over."

Women are making progress in politics . . . by the drip method.

For all the ballyhoo about record numbers of women running for office, the 100th Congress will open next year with virtually the same number of women as the 99th: two in the Senate, and 23 or so in the House.

Barbara Mikulski's entry will offset Paula Hawkins' exit — a trade that women's groups are happy to make. And the four new congresswomen were all endorsed by feminists, but the numbers aren't exactly taking off. In the state legislatures, nine women ran for governor, but only Kay Orr won in Nebraska, and Gov. Madeleine Kunin got a plurality in Vermont. At best there will be only one more woman governor in the land, or a total of three. "We're disappointed," admits Celinda Lake of the Women's Campaign Fund. "There are still some real altitudinal barriers to voting for women as chief executives."

Out of 64 female candidates at the upper end of the statewide tickets, 25 won but they will only add a little to the totals. There are just two more women going to lieutenant governor posts and one more to the secretary of state's job.

The annual crop of "first women" filled a few remaining open slots, one by one. Nebraskans elected the first Republican woman to become governor in the country, and Marylanders elected the first Democratic woman to win a Senate seat in her own right. The other "firsts" are, blessedly, getting a bit more arduous in Iowa, for example, they elected the first lieutenant



nant governor-secretary of state combo.

Not all progress in "filling the cup" is measured by the immediate success of female candidates. Some is measured by the power of women voters. Even in this issue-phobic campaign, a gender gap showed up in 11 states. On this counting, it appears at least two Democratic senators won because women voters in Louisiana, North Carolina, Washington and Colorado provided them with the margin of victory.

Progress is also measured these days in fund-raising. Sen.-elect Barbara Mikulski likes to say, "The one thing that is absolutely gender neutral are the bills they send you." This year women candidates were still generally outperformed, but not by much. They raised record amounts of money. Drip by drip.

We even saw an (dare I say?) end to the geek whiz "it's a woman" coverage of candidates. There seemed to be much less consciousness on the part of the media, the candidates and even the voters about gender. If it's just a hangover from the orgy of the Ferraro campaign, it's still welcome.

What does this drip method mean for the future? Ruth Mandel, who resists the pressure to

find a new trend every two years, refers to a 15-year chart that tracks women at an entry level of politics, the state legislature. The number of women has gone up steadily by about one percent every election.

Out of this kind of pool, candidates for higher office emerge just as gradually. Evelyn Murphy, for example, the new lieutenant governor of Massachusetts, spent eight years working toward the office, and that's fairly typical. It may be popular to define the 1986 crop of candidates for higher office as "new," or even "post-would-be," they are by no means the same women who were in lower offices 10 years ago, grown older, more experienced and better known. Right behind them is another and slightly larger group of women entering political life.

There is nothing very sexy, or dramatic, about this incremental change. There is no promise that women will leap to equal status in the statehouse mansions or the Congress. But if 1986 made anything clear, it's that women are in politics for the long haul. I'll drink my half-a-cup to that.

Catfish has done all it can on its own

SCRABBLE, Va. — See by U.S. News & World Report that the catfish producers of Mississippi are going all out to sell their gastronomic delight.

Through the American Catfish Institute they have retained a high-powered advertising outfit in Dallas. A \$1.5 million campaign is under way. Well, I'm for that, but it's kind of sad that my catfish friends have had to resort to such measures. If you're a fisherman, hire ad men and p.r. types to promote the greatest of all domestic piscine delicacies. The catfish ought to be able to stand, or to be fried for that matter, on its own undeniable merits.

Alas, the food-buying public simply is not informed about the catfish as a delicacy. Most people, when they think about catfish at all, which is regrettably seldom, think of the critters that feed off the bottom of Southern rivers and bayous. As every schoolboy knows, these cats are cats of the order Osteorhynchus, suborder Siluridea, and while they make for good conversation and are excellent in their own humble way, they are not what the American Catfish Institute has in mind.

No, indeed. The catfish that are the object of the sales campaign are the elite of the breed. They are raised in the high-ripen districts of Mississippi. They swim in spring water; they dine on a balanced diet of grain, essential minerals and sirloin steak; they go to high-class prep schools and the females make their debuts. These are not ordinary catfish.

Webster's Third International Dictionary, in one of its rare lapses from accuracy, says that the flesh of the catfish "is not of the finest quality." If upon these witless lexicographers' The editors evidently never have met the pond-grown catfish. The flesh of a catfish that has been graduated from the Catfish Institute is flesh beyond compare. It is firm; it is tender; it is flaky; it mashes not. Of greater moment, the flesh is supremely tasty.

Much more must be said. The catfish has practically no bones, or at least it has no bones to speak of — a sturdy spine, a few ribs, and that is the size of it. The catfish has a large and brainy head, adorned by barbels in the fashion of Dalí's moustache; and while the catfish is commonly thought to be ugly, it is assuredly in no way to other catfish. In any event, today's catfish come skinned and filleted to the market.

The catfish has much in common with the black-eyed pea, the noblest legume of them all. That is to say, it is hard to cook a catfish badly. It is an accommodating fish, ever eager to please. The usual practice is to deep-fry the fillets after tumbling them in a bath of corn

meal and eggs, but connoisseurs tend to prefer a simple braising in butter.

The Junior League of Baton Rouge, in its "River Road Recipes," suggests a court-bouillon of catfish steaks with onions, garlic and tomato sauce. The venerable James Oakes offers a recipe for poached catfish with hollandaise, Bernelso or lobster sauce.

More such recipes are in prospect. Delta Catfish Processors of Indianola, Miss., identified as "the world's largest catfish processor," recently retained a fancy New Orleans chef. He created a catfish mousseline and a pan-sautéed catfish with sauce maitre. According to U.S. News, catfish now appears on the menus of haute restaurants in New York and other shrines of chic cuisine. If only the catfish were not called the catfish, its fortune would be great. Polson do what? This rose by any other name would smell as sweet.

These aspects of the catfish situation are not widely known. The industry now sells \$200 million worth of catfish fillets every year, but this is but a drop in the old bayou. Producers in Mississippi, Alabama, Arkansas and Louisiana see a potential market of twice that size, if their delicate product catches the attention of consumers across the land.

Everything now depends upon the ad men and the p.r. folks. The catfish has done all it can do on its own.

Admitted spy sentenced to life

BALTIMORE (AP) — Former Navy radioman John A. Walker Jr., admitted head of a family spy ring, was sentenced to life imprisonment Thursday and his son, Michael, was given a 25-year term by a judge who urged they be denied parole.

"Your task was to defend your country; you chose to betray it," U.S. District Judge Alexander Harvey II told the elder Walker, 49, who received nearly \$1 million from the Soviet Union for his spying.

"Your motive was pure greed and you were paid handsomely for your traitorous acts," Harvey said.

Evidence showed Walker used his high-level Navy security clearance to obtain classified information about Navy communications, ship locations and routes, weapons and sensor data and Navy facilities, and delivered it to the Soviets, pulling family members into the arrangement. His brother Arthur, 52, is serving a life term for espionage.

Court backs EPA for fiscal

WASHINGTON (AP) — High costs and doubtful technological feasibility may be a legitimate reason for the Environmental Protection Agency to refuse to tighten regulations on the emissions of toxic air pollutants, a federal appeals court says.

In a 2-1 decision, a three-judge panel of the U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia said the agency's 1985 decision not to clamp down on vinyl chloride could stand.

Vinyl chloride causes cancer of the liver and other organs.

The chemical industry uses about 7 billion pounds of vinyl chloride every year in making plastics. About 3.5 million workers are covered by exposure regulations of the Occupational Health and Safety Administration. Another 4.6 million people live within five miles of plants that emit the chemical into the air.

New flu strain appears in U.S.

ATLANTA (AP) — The new influenza strain that health officials warned about three months ago has arrived in the United States in the first reported case of the 1986-87 flu season, the national Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday.

The flu virus has been isolated this fall in six patients in the United States — three in Texas, two in Hawaii and one in New York state, the Atlanta-based agency said.

The CDC said an early analysis of the viruses found in New York and Hawaii shows that they appear similar to the Taiwan flu, a new strain the agency reported in August after it was detected in Southeast Asia.

With only a few flu cases reported, it's impossible to predict the seriousness of this winter's flu season or how widespread the new Taiwan flu might be, said Dr. Karl Kepikus, a CDC influenza specialist.

Two ordered to drug program

SANTA ANA, Calif. (AP) — A couple charged with drug possession after their 13-year-old daughter turned them in were ordered Thursday to enter a drug diversion program that could lead to dismissal of the case.

Orange County Municipal Court Judge C. Robert Jameson ordered Bobby Dale Young, 49, and wife Judith, 37, to return to court May 8, 1987, for a report on their progress, after which charges could be dropped.

County probation officials told the court that the couple, who continued to maintain their innocence Thursday, were qualified for the drug counseling program.

"The reports are quite favorable," the judge told the couple.

The charges were brought against the Youngs after their 13-year-old daughter, Roxann, showed up at a police station in Tustin on Aug. 13 with a bag that police said contained cocaine, marijuana, pills and assorted paraphernalia. She had just heard a lecture in church about the evils of drugs.

Retirement reform to get look

WASHINGTON (AP) — Conservative Rep. Newt Gingrich, tackling an issue that has proved politically explosive for Republicans, intends to propose next week a radical reform of the Social Security system in which government checks would gradually give way to private retirement accounts for most retirees.

Gingrich, who won re-election to his fifth House term on Tuesday with 60 percent of the vote, will recommend replacement of the current payroll tax with a national sales tax that would finance Social Security benefits and Medicare for today's older Americans. Younger workers would be required to establish Individual Retirement Accounts to provide for their own retirements, although the federal government would be responsible for maintaining all senior citizens above the poverty level.

In making his proposal, Gingrich also is hoping to help shape the terms of the nation's political debate as the end of the Reagan administration draws into light.

Site of aerial escape secured

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Embarrassed officials tightened security at a suburban prison Thursday, a day after an escaped convict in a stolen helicopter airlifted his inmate sweetheart to freedom.

The daring escape occurred at the 80-acre Federal Correctional Institution in Pleasanton, called "Club Fed" by neighbors because of its country-club setting about 30 miles southeast of San Francisco.

FBI agents, federal marshals and police were searching intensively for escapees Ronald J. Melnoosh and Samantha Dorinda Lopez.

A lockdown remained in effect at the campus-like prison, with the 700 prisoners locked in their unbarred dormitory rooms, said Warden Rob Roberts.

"It was the first aerial escape from a federal prison, said Jerry Williford, western regional director of federal prisons.

Airman linked to secret supply network

WASHINGTON (AP) — The C-123K cargo plane shot down a month ago while flying supplies to Nicaragua Contra rebels was part of a secret White House-initiated program that relied on intelligence operatives to circumvent "a ban" on U.S. military aid, according to sources involved in the effort.

The White House operation began in early 1984 when President Reagan approved a plan to replace CIA assistance to the rebels with help from Americans outside the government and from U.S. military allies, current and former administration officials say.

The operation has come in for renewed attention now that Eugene Hasenfus, the C-123K's cargo handler who parachuted from the plane and was captured, has been put on trial in Managua.

Although aspects of the White House program had been disclosed previously, the Oct. 5 crash of the arms-laden aircraft in southern Nicaragua revealed a previously secret supply network using American pilots and operating out of El Salvador's military airfield at Ilopango.

Sources both inside the supply network and the administration said U.S. officials played at least a supporting role in the operation — placing the ex-CIA operative who directed the flights at Ilopango and helping to coordinate the flow of supplies. The sources discussed the U.S. role only on condition they not be named.

Administration officials have denied responsibility for the flight and professed ignorance about who was behind it.

Elliott Abrams, assistant secretary of state for Latin America, told Congress last month that it would be "inappropriate" to investigate the supply operation, which he described as a "private initiative . . . not organized, directed or financed by the U.S. government."

House and Senate intelligence committees have begun examining the supply flights to see if the alleged White House ties constituted a violation of a two-year congressional ban on the U.S. government providing military assistance to the Contras fighting Nicaragua's leftist Sandinista government.

According to a report prepared by a private arms dealer in the supply network, Felix Rodriguez, a former CIA operative who uses the pseudonym Max Gomez, was placed at El Salvador's Ilopango military airfield by Donald Gregg, Vice President George Bush's national security adviser, and Nestor Sanchez, a senior Pentagon official in charge of Central American military aid programs.

The report said Rodriguez had regular contact with Bush's office. Bush, who was CIA director in 1976, and Gregg, who was a top executive at the spy agency, have acknowledged meeting with

Rodriguez but deny directing the supply operation.

Hasenfus has said he believed he was part of a covert operation mounted by the U.S. government and directed by two Cuban-Americans, whom he knew as Max Gomez and Ramon Medina and thought worked for the CIA.

Hasenfus said he was recruited for the operation by William Cooper, who was killed in the crash. Cooper and Hasenfus worked for the CIA-owned Air America during the Vietnam War. Wallace B. Sawyer Jr., the co-pilot who died in the plane, worked at least until April for Southern Air Transport of Miami, a former CIA-owned company.

"Flight logs kept by Sawyer showed him flying Southern Air planes into Central America as well as other cargo planes into the U.S.-built Contra airfield at Aguacate in Honduras. According to Pentagon records, Southern Air has emerged as a leading contractor flying logistical supplies for the Defense Department since 1983.

Salvadoran telephone bills also show repeated calls in September from a safe house used by the U.S. network to North House phones used by Lt. Col. Oliver L. Worth, a deputy director for political-military affairs on President Reagan's National Security Council.

Special prosecutor noted in probe of aide

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Justice Department said Thursday an independent counsel, rather than the U.S. attorney's office in Manhattan, may investigate Lyn Nofziger, a former Reagan political aide who allegedly lobbied the White House shortly after leaving the government.

The Justice Department's criminal division is reviewing Nofziger's former positions to see if they were high-ranking enough to be covered by the independent counsel law, said department spokesman Patrick Korten.

If the department finds that the law covers the government job once held by Nofziger, a preliminary inquiry could be launched that would last up to 90 days. Such an inquiry would determine whether the department would direct that a three-member U.S. Court of Appeals panel in Washington appoint an independent counsel.

The law calls for the court appointment of independent counsels, or special prosecutors, to probe alleged federal crimes by current or former high government and campaign officials. Currently two independent counsels are at work. One is investigating possible ethics law violations by former White House aide Michael Deaver. The other is probing allegations that former assistant attorney general Theodore Olson gave false testimony to Congress in 1984 about the administration's withholding of Environmental Protection Agency documents.

The law on independent counsels doesn't apply to former White House officials who has been away from the government for more than two years, Korten said.

Attorney reacts to remark

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Virginia prosecutor said Thursday he is seeking a court order revoking permits for concealed weapons carried by Lyndon LaRouche's bodyguards as a result of criminal investigations and a statement by the political extremist that "I will not submit passively" to arrest.

William Burch, commonwealth's attorney in Loudoun County, Va., where LaRouche lives and makes his headquarters, said he would file a motion in Circuit Court asking that LaRouche bodyguards be required to appear

and state why their permits should not be revoked.

No hearing date has been scheduled, he said.

Burch cited a telegram LaRouche said he sent to President Reagan vowing to defend himself rather than submit to arrest in the aftermath of the seizure of records at his headquarters and indictment of his followers.

"One thing I'll raise is the telegram," Burch said. "I'm going to bring it before the court and let the court decide."

Census solicits aid from local governments for 1990 count

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Census Bureau is launching an effort to enlist the help of the nation's cities and towns in conducting the next national head count.

The census is scheduled for April 1, 1990, but preparations have been under way for several years, with some test counts already having been conducted.

The latest step is a letter from Census Director John G. Keane to officials of the nation's 39,000 cities, counties and towns seeking their participation in a local review program.

Some 12,400 local governments took part in the program in 1980 and Keane wants to expand it in the next count.

As part of the program, the Census Bureau will send each local government a set of block maps and housing unit counts for those blocks in 1989.

Local officials will be asked to confirm or correct the counts using local tax records, utility hookups and occupancy and demolition permits.

In that way the Census Bureau will be able to account for every housing unit when it mails out census forms in 1990. It will also help local officials double check the census count.

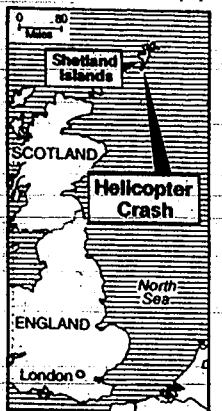

Copter crashes at sea; 45 feared dead

ABERDEEN, Scotland (AP) — A helicopter carrying 47 people from an offshore oil rig crashed into the North Sea and sank Thursday. Two people were rescued, but authorities said 45 either were killed or missing and feared dead. Two survivors, the pilot and an oil worker, were plucked from 12-foot high seas moments after the Chinook crashed two miles off the southern tip of the Shetland Islands, the Royal Air Force said. Nineteen bodies were recovered and 26 people

were missing, it said. The apparent "was the worst civilian helicopter accident ever," Ian Henderson, director of operations for Shell U.K. Exploration and Production, which operates the rigs, said late Thursday that it was "extremely unlikely" anyone remained alive in the 48-degree water. The Coast Guard said the outside temperature at the time of the crash was 43 degrees. Six ships and six helicopters scanned the area, and the RAF said the ships would continue searching through the night.



"However slim it is, there's always hope there may be more survivors," said an RAF spokesman at Dunfermline, Scotland, coordination center for the rescue operation. Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher sent letters of condolence to Shell and newspaper publisher Robert Maxwell, whose British International Helicopters Co. owned the two rotor Boeing Vertol helicopter. "All my sympathies are with the families of those who died," the British leader said. The International Civil Aviation Organization, based in Montreal, said a death toll of 45 would be the highest ever recorded in the crash of a civilian helicopter. The world's worst helicopter disaster was in May 1977 when an Israeli military helicopter crashed, killing all 54 soldiers on board, according to the Guinness Book of Records. The helicopter was ferrying Shell oil workers from the Brent offshore field 135 miles northeast of the Shetland Islands to Sumburgh Airport on the southern end of the ar-

chipelago when it went down two miles from the runway. The Coast Guard said visibility was 12 miles, with waves 12 feet high and winds ranging from 25 to 38 knots. The pilot, Capt. Pusht Vald, 45, and 20-year-old Shell technician Eric Morris were rescued by a Coast Guard helicopter that had taken off from Sumburgh Airport on a training flight minutes before the crash. The nationalities of the survivors was not immediately known. Capt. Gordon Mitchell, the

helicopter's pilot, spotted what he thought was a fishing boat or an oil slick. Seconds later, he said, he heard Sumburgh air traffic control calling the Chinook, telling its crew they were too low for radar. "I went in the direction of what I thought was the oil slick and when I got there I discovered it was the wreck," he said. The helicopter had vanished, Mitchell said, "and as we watched, bits of the debris started coming to the surface, and a couple of survivors appeared."

Afghan envoys, rebels scuffle in U.N. halls

UNITED NATIONS (AP) — The Afghan war spilled into the corridors of the United Nations on Thursday as Afghan diplomats assaulted two visiting anti-government rebels in an effort to keep them from holding a news conference. The scuffle came a day after the General Assembly approved 122-20 resolution calling for immediate withdrawal of more than 100,000 Soviet troops who are helping the Afghan regime fight the Moslem rebels. Mansoor Suhail, press attache of Pakistan's U.N. mission, said three members of the Afghan U.N. delegation attacked two Afghan rebels when the visitors stepped off an escalator on the third floor of the U.N. headquarters building. "They just pounced on them and

began punching and shoving," said Suhail, who was accompanying the two representatives of the Islamic Union of Afghanistan Mujahadeen. The rebels, stunned by what they first thought was an assault by security guards, retreated up the escalator to the fourth floor. But when they returned and tried to reach the U.N. Correspondents' Association clubroom, they again were met by the attackers from the Marxist government in Kabul. The two visitors, now aware of the identity of their attackers, yelled, "They are the KGB" — the Soviet secret police. "Get out, bandits," one of the diplomats shouted back. A new scuffle broke out, and security guards arrived and separated the combatants.

Machel linked to plot

PRETORIA, South Africa (AP) — President Samora Machel of Mozambique was plotting to overthrow Malawi's government and papers found at the scene of his death prove it, South Africa's foreign minister said Thursday. Foreign Minister R.F. Botha said Machel, who was killed in a plane crash Oct. 19 just inside South Africa, had plotted with Zimbabwe to oust President H. Kamuzu Banda of Malawi. Banda's government is the only one on the continent that has full diplomatic relations with South Africa. At a news conference, Botha displayed a mud-stained package of papers he said was found at site of the crash, in which 33 other people also died. Machel had been returning

home from meetings in Zambia. Botha said the papers were minutes of a meeting held Oct. 16 in Maputo capital of Mozambique, by Machel and a delegation of Zimbabwe Cabinet ministers and military officers. "I am dismayed, disappointed, shocked and I did not expect this," said Botha, who had visited the scene soon after the crash and paid tribute to Machel as a "man who sought peace." Botha said Banda, target of the alleged plot, was informed of the package's contents Thursday and official messages were sent to the governments of Mozambique, led by new President Joaquim Chissano, and Zimbabwe.

Freed dissident, wife have first child

JERUSALEM (AP) — Anatoly Shcharansky, the Soviet dissident who was freed in a prisoner exchange nine months ago, announced that his wife Avital gave birth to their first child Thursday. He refused requests from journalists to photograph the baby and said: "It's too hard to be a star of the mass media on the first day. I hope she won't suffer the fate of her parents."

Mrs. Shebaransky, who campaigned for 12 years for her husband's release, asked that the baby's name not be revealed until Saturday, the Jewish Sabbath. Their daughter was delivered at Jerusalem's Misgav Ledach hospital early Thursday morning by Caesarean section because Mrs. Shcharansky suffers from high blood pressure. Shcharansky is 38 and his wife will be 35 on Friday.

U.S., China sign big defense deal

QINGDAO, China (AP) — The United States and China have reached an agreement under which American technicians will develop avionics equipment for China's F-8 fighters, a U.S. defense official said Thursday.

The report came on the second day of the first U.S. Navy port call in China since the communist takeover of 1949.

A letter of intent was signed Oct. 30 in Washington and bids will be submitted early next year, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

He said the deal, valued at about \$500 million, would cover a period of up to six years and involve installing fire-control systems in 50 of the Chinese fighters.

The systems will be developed in the United States and installed in the northeast China city of Shenyang, the official said.

Adm. James A. Lyons, commander of the U.S. Pacific Fleet, said Thursday that U.S.-Chinese naval cooperation is not aimed at strategic coordination against the Soviet Union.

"That is not the intent," he told reporters. He brought three American warships into Qingdao on Wednesday night.

Lyons and U.S. Ambassador Winston Lord spoke to journalists over breakfast on the guided missile cruiser Reeves, which will be here for a week along with the guided missile frigate Rentz and the destroyer Oldendorf.

Qingdao, on the Shandong

Peninsula on the Yellow Sea, is home to China's North Sea Fleet.

A U.S. port call had been scheduled for June 1985. It was canceled after China said the United States had agreed to honor China's policy of not allowing nuclear-armed ships into its ports and Washington denied it had violated the Pentagon rule of not disclosing whether warships carry nuclear weapons.

Neither side has revealed how the issue was resolved, but Lyons said discussions were held "off and on during the last several months" before Defense Secretary Charles Weinberger's visit last month.

"Weinberger was a key player in that," Lyons said, but he did not elaborate.

The admiral met with Chinese North Sea Fleet commander Ma Xinchun on Wednesday and was to meet with him again.

Lyons said Qingdao, a U.S. Navy port before 1949, was chosen for the visit for navigational reasons, not its strategic location opposite the Korean Peninsula.

Asked about a recent Soviet navy visit to North Korea, Lyons said, "I'm not sure" what the Soviet objectives are. "I would just as soon not see the Soviets in North Korea."

He said the Navy plans visits by hospital ships to the Philippines and South Seas island nations, "where incidentally the Soviets have been very active as well."

Jacobsen spends quiet day with family

WIESBADEN, West Germany — and his family would meet Friday (AP) American David Jacobsen, the president Reagan and his wife, held hostage for 17 months in Lebanon, spent Thursday quietly with his family in preparation for returning to the United States, air force officials said.

Grenade explodes, 16 are hurt

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — A hand grenade thrown at the screen exploded in a crowded movie theater Thursday, wounding 16 people. It was the sixth attack in a month, but police say the political opposition may be responsible.

Gen. Fidel Ramos, chief of the armed forces, ordered his commanders to put down any military plots against the government of President Corason Aquino.

The respected newspaper Business Day quoted "high level" military sources as saying disaffected military men planned to take over the government and dismiss "inept and left-leaning elements" but keep Mrs. Aquino as president. It said the operation's code name was "God Save the Queen."

Police said someone threw the grenade toward the theater screen at about 7:30 p.m., near the end of the movie "Band of the Hand." Most of the 16 people wounded were treated at hospitals and released, police and hospital sources said.

No police said the attacker escaped. No group claimed responsibility.

Authorities say the five previous bombings in Manila, in which only two people were injured, may have been part of a campaign by either communist rebels or supporters of former President Ferdinand E. Marcos to shake public confidence in the Aquino government.

Mr. Marcos was driven into exile Feb. 25 by a military-civilian uprising after 20 years in office.

Gen. Ramos, who helped lead the revolt against Marcos, issued a warning to "any military adventurers" and ordered his subordinate commanders to "take immediate action to neutralize such plots."

A statement from the armed forces press office said Ramos gave the instructions in response to the Business Day report that certain elements "in the army planned a 'surgical operation' before the Feb. 2 referendum on a proposed new constitution.

Defense Minister Juan Ponce Enrile, an outspoken critic of government policies, has called for removal of some Cabinet members but the newspaper did not say he was behind the alleged plot.

Soviet misses key ceremony

MOSCOW (AP) — Defense Minister Sergei L. Sokolov missed the Revolution Day ceremony Thursday when a senior Politburo member accused the United States of trying to "blackmail all of mankind" with space weapons.

The meeting in the Kremlin Palace of Congresses, attended by 5,000 Communist Party members and foreign dignitaries, was the third major function this week at which Sokolov was not present. There are rumors that the 75-year-old minister is ill.

Vigor K. Ligachev, the party's ideological guardian and second No. 2 man in the Kremlin, speech to domestic issues and charged party chief Mikhail S. Gorbachev's demand for a "reconstruction" of Soviet society.

Research finds likability linked to expectations

We've all wondered why some people like us and others don't. New studies are indicating that the answer to this question may be as simple as the fact that we expect to have some people like us while expecting to be rejected by other people.

Researchers at Adelphi University have found that those people who we believe will like us generally will, those whose rejection we fear will

reject us.

This new theory of how relationships develop provides one explanation of why one person is instantly liked or disliked by another, even though the person making the snap judgment has no information on which to base that feeling.

Rebecca Curtis, professor of psychology at Adelphi, has designed a series of experiments in which she attempts to study how this process

occurs.

First, she introduced two people, leaving them alone for five minutes. They were told that the experiment was being conducted to study how people get to know one another.

Following their chat, they were separated and given a questionnaire on relationships to fill out. Once finished, one of the subjects was told to wait in the hall. Then, the person overheard that he or she was either liked or not liked by the other person.

The acquaintances were brought back together this time to talk about potentially controversial topics — politics, abortion and capital punishment. They were given 10 minutes to talk.

Following the discussion, the participants were asked to fill out another questionnaire. This time they were asked how they felt about the other person.

People who believed they were lik-

ed were far more likable than those who thought they were not liked, according to Curtis.

There were marked differences between the two groups: People who thought they were liked were more disclosing, less disagreeable, expressed dissimilarity less and had a more positive tone of voice. Overall, their general attitude was better than those who thought they were disliked.

Curtis says these could be the key behaviors people rely on to evoke certain "warm feelings" from others.

"We found that if the subject expected to be liked, he was more likable," she said.

Interestingly, Curtis said the rumor was more predictive of the outcome than people's generalized expectations about getting along with others.

Some people believe people will like them. Others feel that people won't. According to Curtis, people

who expected not to be liked expressed different opinions and got into more arguments. Voice tone was rated as more unpleasant.

These people were probably more insecure and defensive than the others who felt liked, Curtis said. In turn, this may have caused the person to reciprocate with an equally negative feeling. ("I know you don't like me, but I don't like you either.") Many of these feelings are enacted on a non-verbal level.

There were no differences in the number of conversations, initiated eye contact, placement of the chair or the body angle of the communicators, she added.

Stereotyping is another factor that is intimately involved with how people treat people. In another experiment, University of Minnesota researchers issued bogus photographs of women to male subjects who were then asked to telephone the person in the picture.

Studies: Mothers pass defect more

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Evidence is growing that the genetic defect in Down's syndrome is four times more likely to be passed to children from their mothers than from their fathers, a researcher said this week.

Recent studies are also confirming that the abnormalities in Down's syndrome are all caused by a small piece of genetic material at the end of human chromosome number 21, containing perhaps 100 to 1,000 genes, said Dr. Charles Epstein of the University of California in San Francisco.

Down's syndrome, which strikes some 5,000 American children each year, is caused when a child is born not with the normal complement of 23 pairs of genes but with 23 pairs plus one extra copy of chromosome 21.

The disease is characterized by abnormal facial features, some degree of mental retardation, and premature senility, somewhat resembling Alzheimer's disease.

Epstein said recent studies have made clear what researchers have suspected for some time: that the extra chromosome comes from the mother approximately 80 percent of the time, and from the father the remaining 20 percent of the time.

That may offer some clue to why the disorder occurs, Epstein said, although it also suggests another mystery.

The risk of Down's syndrome rises with mothers' ages, becoming somewhat greater when the mother is in her mid-30s and quite high in mothers who give birth after age 40.

It might seem, then, that older mothers would be even more likely than younger mothers to contribute the extra, damaging chromosome, but that is not the case, Epstein said.

Husbands of older mothers, no matter what the husbands' ages, still contribute the extra chromosome 20 percent of the time, he said.

Epstein noted that the growing application of genetic engineering techniques to the problem of Down's syndrome is beginning to greatly extend knowledge of the disorder.

He noted, for example, that the extra chromosome is passed to children when a pair of chromosomes fails to segregate during one of the two stages of cell division that lead to sperm and eggs, Epstein said.

Genetic engineering techniques should allow a close enough examination of the genetic material in the chromosomes to identify in which

stage the problem occurred, he said.

Such knowledge might be useful in ultimately identifying people who are more likely than others to have Down's syndrome children.

"The questions people are trying to get at are why two chromosomes that should separate at meiosis (cell division) don't," Epstein said.

Genetic engineering techniques will also help extend the observation that only a portion of chromosome 21 is linked to Down's syndrome — the tail end of the chromosome, a region comprising about 25 percent of it, Epstein said.

Geneticists have begun "mapping" genes to that portion of the chromosome — using the new technology, with the hope of identifying the genes that are most directly responsible for Down's syndrome.

The best estimates so far suggest that the segment contains between 100 and 1,000 genes, Epstein said, but it could turn out that only a few of those play important roles in Down's syndrome, Epstein said.

If those genes could be identified, some treatment for Down's syndrome might ultimately be developed, but there is little prospect of that in the near future, Epstein said.

Laws on indigency come under fire

TWIN FALLS — Idaho laws governing indigent medical costs came in for criticism from the Idaho Supreme Court Thursday, as attorneys argued several appeals concerning court decisions for and against counties.

Arguments on three appeals were heard before court, sitting in session in Twin Falls, involving indigency claims in Twin Falls and Minidoka counties.

The first case, heard while a television news camera was in operation in the courtroom and some 40 high school students listened, involved a case in which the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners were billed for costs for an attempted suicide victim.

Attorney Lloyd Webb, representing Twin Falls County, argued that Idaho's medical indigency law was designed to require counties to provide care for those who cannot afford to pay high costs brought on by emergencies that are no fault of their own. An attempted suicide, he said, is an intentional act and one that the victim could have avoided and one that county taxpayers should not have to take on.

The question being argued Thursday, he said, is the intent of the Legislature in the somewhat vague law.

Webb and Glenna Christensen, attorney for St. Alphonsus Regional Medical Center in Boise, agreed that because the law is vague and contradicting, the high court must be guided by rulings in previous similar cases.

Justice Alvin Shepard asked Webb if he had considered the state of mind of the person who reaches the point of suicide as rendering the act beyond the person's control.

Russell Barth, 32, of Twin Falls shot himself but recovered after being taken to St. Alphonsus, where the resulting bill was just over \$12,630. Webb argued that at the time of the shooting, Barth was not indigent; he was employed and able to care for himself.

"I can't believe the Legislature intended for counties to provide coverage for those who create their own situations or where any self-inflicted injury is involved," Webb said. "Certainly, this is not the catastrophic situation where the needy person is facing an insurmountable medical bill through no fault of his or her own."

Fifth District Judge Daniel Meehl reversed the county denial of the claim on the grounds that the law does not provide exemptions for such cases.

Christensen argued that Meehl was correct in ruling that there was no evidence in the law to show that self-inflicted injuries are exempt from county responsibility to indigents, and there is no implied exemption.

"The hospital is required to treat the individual, regardless of how the injury occurred," she said. "The Legislature has taken this into consideration by passing the cost to the counties, distributing it over the large number of other citizens of the county."

While the practice of having a television camera in the courtroom is not a frequent one, both Webb and Christensen said they had no problem with it.

Government high school classes from Valley, Filer and Raft River at Malta listened orderly and intently through 35 minutes of arguments.

A teacher from the Raft River school said he would like to see the youngsters attend a district court trial and a magistrate court session to round out their understanding of the judicial system. The opportunity to see the Supreme Court in action required four hours of bus travel time.

Two Minidoka County indigency cases also were argued. Dean Williams, a Blackfoot attorney, represented the University of Utah Hospital, the appellant in one case and the respondent in another.

He told the court that the medical indigency problem belongs to the state, not the counties.

"The Legislature," he said, "made it the requirement of the counties on one hand; but, on the other, they left the counties without a means of paying the bills."

He suggested that Idaho revise its indigent medical care system by getting counties, state and hospitals to work together. He suggested that hospitals should make some donations, but the state should fund the program, allowing counties to help coordinate it.

Charles Creason Jr., attorney for Minidoka County in the case of an infant child of Marshall and Theresa Henderson, said the University of Utah Hospital and the parents waited too long to let the county know that they would be asked to assist the couple with medical costs.

Creason said Minidoka County was not contacted until several months after the child was admitted for care and the bill was created. He said testimony in the case showed that the parents offered to pay \$100 per month on the \$6,000 portion of their costs that was not covered by insurance.

MVRMC Administrator John Bingham argues his case for transfer

MVRMC: Transfer necessary

TWIN FALLS — Representatives of Magic Valley Regional Medical Center met with area news media Thursday to argue their case for transferring ownership of the hospital.

"We feel the need to change in order to survive," said MVRMC Administrator John Bingham.

At issue is whether the Hospital Board should be governed directly by the Twin Falls County Board of Commissioners, as it is now, or by a nonprofit organization of 50-100 community representatives.

Twin Falls County residents will judge the necessity of a transfer in a special election Dec. 9.

"The issue is in the public's hands," Bingham said. Bingham and Community Relations Director Sue Summers are making presentations to area service clubs and church groups to educate people about the possible transfer. Pamphlets, a slide presentation and a 15-minute videotape have been produced to argue favorably for the transfer as the only means available to ensure the hospital continues operating in the 1990s.

Bingham painted the transfer plan with a broad stroke during the noon meeting for about a dozen newspaper, radio and television representatives. His overview described how the hospital's management would change and what advantages the change would bring through new money-making enterprises.

The 50-100 members would be initially appointed by the county commissioners. Those people would in turn elect nine Hospital Board members, fewer than the current board of 11. Hospital Corporation of America, the company that currently manages MVRMC's overall operation, could remain in that capacity, or a new company could be hired by the new board.

Profitable joint ventures between MVRMC and other hospitals for lab work and other cooperative treatment are prohibited under county ownership, but would be allowed after the change in ownership.

"Hospitals are being forced economically to work together," Bingham said. He illustrated that point with a comparison to insurance companies, which he said grew more competitive during the past five years as the health-care industry struggled to remain profitable.

Hospitals fought for health-care dollars as government charges lowered the number of days patients spent in the hospital, Bingham said. Because of those economic trends, MVRMC's occupancy hit a low of 45 percent this year and forced the hospital to consider alternative sources of income, including the transfer.

But in an effort to become more profitable, Bingham said, MVRMC's management company recently began a joint venture with Equitable Life Assurance Society of the U.S. to merge health care with insurance coverage.

HICA and ELASUS began in August a new company, Equicor, which will provide benefit programs to employers, including both health care and insurance to keep costs down, according to an Equicor press release.

Tort reform

Bill drafted; support push to begin

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Liability Reform Coalition has drafted its tort-reform bill and is ready to spread the word to win some supporters.

Donna Scott of Twin Falls, a former state representative and now coalition field coordinator, told The Times-News Thursday that a group of local coalition members will meet Monday to begin determining how to educate people on tort reform. The people will hopefully "rattle the chains" of legislators to support the bill, she said.

The draft bill was completed Oct. 29 by a committee representing coalition members. The group was formed last summer by business, governmental entities and medical organizations to pursue a more "reasonable" tort system, Scott said. Its 67 members include Boise Cascade, day-care centers and the Idaho Hospital Association.

The tort system is where people seek compensation for injuries or wrongs to them.

Tort-reform changes which have been adopted in other states are wrapped up in the coalition's draft bill. Scott said she disagreed with the catch-all bill, which might hinder its passage. She favored placing the changes in separate bills. As it is, the one bill may come out of the legislature "bruised and battered."

The proposals in the draft bill include elimination of joint-and-several liability, which allows an injured person to collect from one or more of the responsible defendants, even though they may not have been wholly responsible.

Another change would place a cap on non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering, through a formula based on the average Idaho wage and life expectancy.

Using the formula, the maximum would be \$400,000 although it allows for diversity among individuals, Scott said. The formula also is more fair than the \$250,000 proposed limit in a previous tort reform bill, she said.

The proposal wouldn't eliminate punitive damages — or those meant to punish a defendant for gross negligence — as other tort reform groups have proposed. Instead, the coalition seeks to broaden the information a jury may receive when deciding on punitive damages, which are rarely awarded, Scott said.

The bill also contains a clause to keep the bill in effect if one part is ruled unconstitutional.

The coalition's "community action teams" will now spread the word about the proposed bill, probably by meeting with service clubs and other groups, she said.

Lobbyists employed by the individual coalition members will attempt to push the bill during the session, Scott said.

Might hurt victims, Hepworth says

TWIN FALLS — Attorney John Hepworth presented a case against tort reform Thursday, saying changes proposed by a new coalition might victimize the victims.

Speaking to the Twin Falls Kiwanis Club, Hepworth also said he and members of his Twin Falls firm were drafting legislative proposals they considered more sensible to answer issues raised about the tort system, in which people seek compensation for wrongs or injuries.

After his speech, Hepworth — who's made a reputation in the state as one of the best personal-injury plaintiff's attorneys — didn't want to elaborate on the proposals being readied by the firm. But he said they probably would be completed before the end of the month.

The proposal Hepworth did discuss in detail at the meeting is expected to be presented to the Idaho Legislature in January by a 67-member coalition of businesses, governmental entities and medical organizations.

"The Idaho Liability Reform Coalition, formed earlier this year, says the reform is needed for a more 'reasonable' tort system. Field Coordinator Donna Scott told The Times-News.

But, Hepworth said, the proposals may potentially hurt people who already have been hurt.

"Each of you is a potential plaintiff," he told the group of men gathered at the Tort Club.

One change calls for a cap on non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering, Hepworth said this presupposes there will be no outlandish laws in the state, and "that you can treat all injuries alike."

But, in the history of the state there have been only five awards amounting to \$1 million or more, he said. One was reduced to below \$1 million and two are being appealed. A majority of the cases involved severe brain or other physical damage, deafness or amputation.

"You just don't see the kind of verdicts you read about," he said, criticizing the news media for sensationalism.

A proposed bill defeated during the last legislative session carried a \$250,000 limit on non-economic damages. The coalition proposes "a formula-based" on the average Idaho wage and life expectancy.

Non-economic damages cover not only pain and suffering, but also disfigurement, mental anguish, loss of companionship and emotional stress, among others, Hepworth said. Limiting damages for those who really deserve them is "contrary to our judicial system."

The proposal also implies that juries are "composed of people like you — can't make such decisions," he said.

Another proposal is to abolish joint-and-several liability. The law now allows an injured person to collect an award from several defendants. If one of the defendants

No safety violations found in spill

TWIN FALLS — There were no safety violations discovered in a truck accident which spilled radioactive materials into the Snake River east of Burley Oct. 12.

The radioactive cargo on the truck, owned by the E.C.K. Miller Co., was in approved containers within permissible radiation levels and the truck's shipping papers and the co-driver's log were in order, said Frank York, a U.S. Department of Transportation highway safety officer. The driver's log was lost in the river.

with oil, according to DOT records. The cargo of 24,670 pounds of low-level radioactive wastes that spilled near Burley was bound for the Hanford Nuclear Reservation in Washington from Ohio when the truck hit a slow-moving combine and plunged off a bridge over the Snake River on Interstate 84.

The radioactive material and empty containers stayed in the truck and there was no contamination of the river — or river-bottom, said Robert Funderbuck, state radiation control head.

In fiscal 1986, an average of 18-19 tons per week of radioactive material is shipped by RMI, of Ashlaba, Ohio; through Idaho, said Rick Brewer, manager of the U.S. Department of Energy's contract administration at RMI. Much of the material is hauled by E.C.K. Miller, although RMI tries to have three companies available at all times to haul its cargo, he said.

RMI is a private company involved in an ongoing legal step between the initial casting of uranium metal and the final fuel fabrication, Brewer said. "We don't make the uranium here. We process and deform it from one shape to another," he said.

A few flakes of snow spotted in Twin Falls

TWIN FALLS — A few flakes of snow were seen by winter watch specialists in Twin Falls Thursday evening, but in higher elevations to the south, there was a good winter snow storm under way.

The Pomerelle ski resort reported six to eight inches of snow at 9 p.m. from a storm that began about 10 a.m. and continued through the day. Resort Manager John Burrows said the area is ready for the winter season except for snow.

Last year Pomerelle opened for the season on the second weekend in November.

Snow flurries were reported in both Halley and Ketchum Thursday evening, but Blaine County sheriff's officers said the snow melted as it fell due to the warm ground.

Several other higher elevations were reporting snow and the weather forecast for the local area indicated snow showers would continue through most of the weekend. Idaho State Police dispatcher Lorle Oliver in Twin Falls said there was snow on Sweetzer pass, southeast of Burley, that required snow plows, and there were several slide-offs reported.

Reports from eastern Idaho showed the area was under winter conditions with the first snowstorm of the fall leaving nearly three inches of snow in some areas and slick roads making travel hazardous.

Idaho State Police in Pocatello and Idaho Falls said highways were covered with black ice Thursday night. Dispatchers reported a number of vehicle slide-offs but no serious accidents.

Jack Sams, a specialist with the National Weather Service office in Boise, said the storm dropped from one-half to seven inches of snow in the Idaho backcountry and central mountains Wednesday night and early Thursday.

The snowfall continued intermittently through most of the day in southeastern Idaho and the Upper Snake River Valley, Sams said.

He said two inches of snow were reported on the ground at Rexburg and Pocatello, and Preston had 2½ inches. State Police said two to three inches had fallen in the Rigby area.

Challis mine work force faces January layoffs

CHALLIS (AP) — Nearly one-third of the work force at Cyprus-Thompson Creek molybdenum mine southwest of Challis will be laid off the first part of January.

Alex Jacobs, mine manager, announced the layoffs to employees on Wednesday.

The layoffs will be made according to seniority, Jacobs said, with the exception of about 15 employees who "possess skills we absolutely had to retain."

A total of 110 of the mine's 399 employees will be laid off.

The reduction in force is the result of a drastically modified mine plan, Jacobs said, which extends the mine's operating life indefinitely.

The plan replaces the two and a half year mining plan adopted by the company last January, which pegged the mine for shutdown by the spring of 1988, barring a drastic change in the molybdenum market.

That plan called for laying off 150 employees in 1987.

Jacobs said in addition to reducing the number of layoffs called for in the original plan, the new plan means the jobs of those remaining more secure due to the extension of the mine's operating life.

Employees affected by the layoffs will have an opportunity next Monday and Tuesday to interview with personnel representatives from Cyprus Minerals, Dagand and Sieritza, Ariz., copper mines for roughly 80 to 100 available positions.

"Our people will have the first crack at those jobs," Jacobs said. "We intend to fill those positions as nearly as we can with the people affected here."

Laid-off employees who own homes in one of the two Cyprus subdivisions will be allowed to exercise a company buy-back option. Jacobs said he was unsure how many homes will end up on an already glutted real estate market.

"It's clear there will be more empty houses available for sale," Jacobs said. "But the spectre of having all those houses available due to a complete shutdown in 1988 is no longer there. I would think that would have a positive effect on the market in the long run."

A supplemental unemployment benefits package of up to \$1,000 will be offered to laid-off employees who are not hired by the Arizona mines, Jacobs said, as well as payment of some job hunting-related expenses.

In addition, CTC will cover up to \$1,500 of each employee's out-of-state moving costs.

"The thought of Idahoans taking off to accept jobs in Arizona is an unhappy one," Jacobs said. "It's a net loss to the state of 110 jobs, but there's no arguing that point."

Jacobs said the new mining plan calls for operating the mine's six shafts only five and a half months a year when electrical rates are cheapest.

"When the mill is not operating, all but 15 of the mine's employees will be transferred to mining positions. In addition, during the winter months when the mill is shut down, about 22 seasonal employees will be hired to assist in mining the ore body."

Another crucial point in the new plan, Jacobs said, will be a month-long shutdown of the entire operation, "probably in October or November, when all employees will take their vacation."

Some older miners said they're absolutely out of luck. Jacobs said, "but we think we can make it work based on assumptions we've made on productivity and costs."

doesn't have money, the victim may collect from those who do have resources, although they may be only partly responsible.

It's a philosophical question of whether one person should pay more than his proportionate share, he said.

But Hepworth also asked: "Who should bear the losses? One of the wrongdoers or the innocent victim?"

It seems rather straightforward to me.

The defendant who has to pay, he said, can sue and collect from the other defendants to recover what was paid for their part of the award.

Another tort-reform proposal would prohibit an injured person who already has been compensated from a collateral source, such as insurance, to seek compensation through lawsuits.

Hepworth said the collateral-source proposal allows the person who caused the injury to

benefit from the coverage the injured person purchased.

He said he was ambivalent about a proposed change to reduce the amount of interest that begins running when a court judgment is made.

The advantage to keeping the interest at 18 percent is to deter insurance companies — which usually hire lawyers to defend the insured — from delaying the appeal process.

"What the law is protecting is the companies' wouldn't mind if an appeal took months, because they made money from investments at a higher interest," Hepworth said.

The appeal process now takes about 18 months on the average, but it used to be three years, he said.

He admitted it would benefit lawyers to keep the interest high because the higher the award, the more they receive through contingency fees, or a part of the award based on its amount.

"The hospital would never turn down \$100 a month, or even \$10 a month," he said. "They offered, but they never paid; so we turned in the claim."

Williams said District Judge Ronald Bruce acted properly when he reversed the county's denial of the claim.

Don't expect another 41-0 blowout tonight

JEROME — The score of 41-0 will be heavy on a lot of people's minds tonight when the Jerome Tigers square off against the Shelley Russells for the right to advance to next week's Idaho State Class A-2 High School Football Championship.

That was the score the Tigers posted when the teams collided Oct. 3. But first-year Jerome head Coach Joe Mattie discounts it and maintains that he'll be more than happy for a repeat of when these two played in the semifinals a year ago. Jerome won that one 29-28 in overtime here after losing to Shelley 14-14 in the regular season.

That in itself should indicate few surprises when these teams tie it up at 7 p.m. today at Murray O'Rourke Stadium. The

seniors on these two teams will be playing each other for the fourth time in two years — or about 20 percent of their total varsity playing time.

"We know each other fairly well," Mattie admits with a smile.

Mattie says that 41-0 game could be a major psychological point for this one — Jerome fighting overconfidence and Shelley embarrassment.

"We sat the team down last Monday and talked exactly about that," Mattie said. "We caught Shelley out of school — during its potato harvest vacation — when they were practicing at 9 or 10 at night when they could get together. Then on game night we got to them right away. In the second quarter we knocked their best running back out of the game."

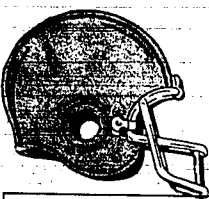
That back, senior tailback Bryan Austin, will return for tonight's game, although Shelley's leading

rusher — senior fullback Brian Shirley — has been out of school with a virus all week and won't play tonight.

"I think the big factor was catching them out of school and out of their routine," said Mattie. "They simply lost their timing, offensively and defensively. On our first four plays, we had three touchdowns. You won't see that this time."

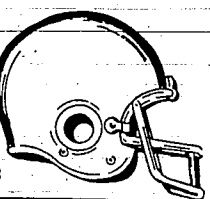

Locking on

Soon, most gridders may be required to wear knee braces

LOS ANGELES — Defensive lineman Bob Golic of the Cleveland Browns felt the jolt and heard the "Right away we knew: this could be it for the knee."

The game stopped, and in a hushed scene, players stood around as Golic was examined by the Browns' trainer. Asked where it hurt, Golic said nowhere, but what about the pop?

"It was nothing. The noise Golic heard was simply a rivet popping on his knee brace."

"Twice last year, I had the rivets sheared off," he said by telephone from Cleveland. "You can imagine what would have happened if I hadn't had that brace on."

"As many shots as I've taken on my legs, I can't imagine being out there without protection."

First developed for Joe Namath 17 years ago, knee braces have become almost commonplace around the NFL, worn by, among others, Dan Marino, Jim McMahon, Ken O'Brien, Jim Kelly, Phil Simms and Bob Crable.

On many NFL teams braces are mandatory at some positions, like the interior line and linebackers.

"They're being worn at the high school and college levels, too."

Several kinds are available. The Lenox-Hill Derotation Brace, which is custom-made and costs about \$425, appears to be the one used most by players — like Golic, who has suffered serious knee injuries.

It was invented for Namath in 1969.

"This man could not even walk, much less play football," Dr. Rene Cailliet, director of Rehabilitation Medicine at Santa Monica Hospital Medical Center, said of Namath. "The brace allowed him to play."

George Ganzekauer, vice president of Lenox Hill Brace, Inc., estimates that about 10 percent of all NFL players — 100 to 150 athletes — wear the brace.

The Anderson Knee Stabilizer, invented in 1977 by George Anderson, head trainer of the Los Angeles

Raiders, for former quarterback Ken Stabler, also is popular.

Anderson believes between 280 and 300 NFL players wear his brace, more as a preventive measure or for less serious knee injuries.

Golic wears a Lenox-Hill on one knee and an Anderson on the other.

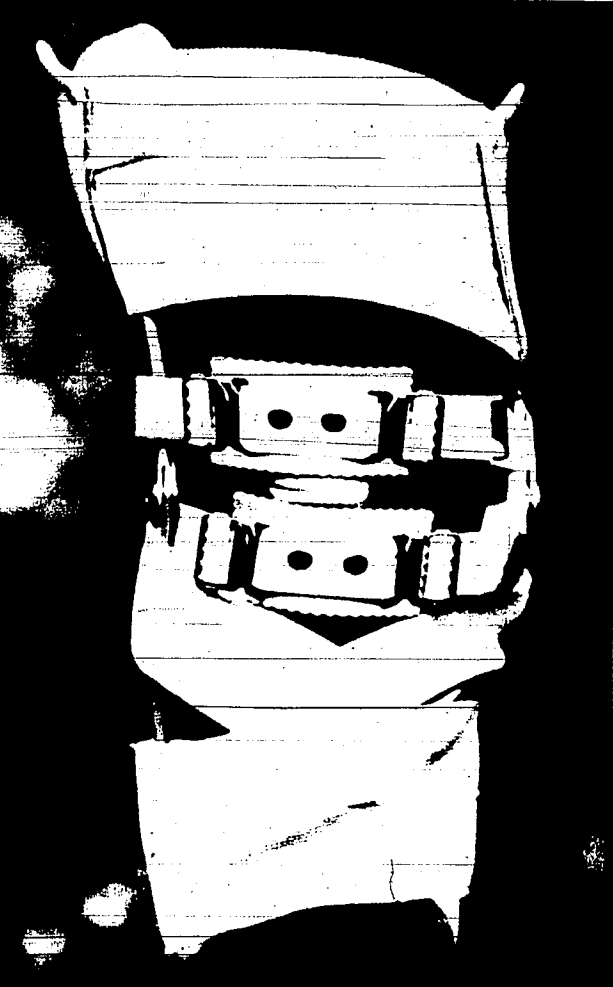
Anderson said his brace doesn't need to be custom made; he has four models, the most expensive of which costs \$56. The Lenox-Hill initially feels more restrictive. I had to wear it out of necessity. But after about a week, you start getting used to it.

"I've been wearing it for four years. I wouldn't go out there without it. I've tried wearing the Lenox-Hill on both knees, but it doesn't work for me. I have a tendency to catch the inside hinges. There's nobody around me and I fall down. That's kind of embarrassing on film."

Speedy wide receiver Dokie Williams of the Los Angeles Raiders recalls wearing an Anderson brace for the first three games of the 1985 season because a knee was bothering him.

Did it hamper his mobility?
"Not much at all, if any," Williams said. "As a matter of fact, I was playing better when I was wearing it. I stopped because my

Pack tracks Boise Title in offing

Nevada-Reno can clinch its first Big Sky Conference football championship this weekend, but it will take an assist from two Idaho teams.

The undefeated and No. 1-ranked Wolf Pack, with a nine-game winning streak, invades Bronco Stadium in Boise with a game against Boise State. The only team close to Reno, Northern Arizona, tries to keep its title hopes alive with a Big Sky game against Idaho State.

In other Big Sky games, Montana is at Weber State in a contest marking the two best passing attacks in the conference, and Montana State is at Idaho.

Nevada-Reno has never won in Boise in six tries, due to a combination of what Coach Chris Ault calls "poor coaching and poor playing every time we go up there."

But if UNR wins Saturday, and Idaho State upsets Northern Arizona, the Wolf Pack will claim the league championship. If NAU wins or Reno loses to Boise, the Big Sky crown and the accompanying NCAA Division I-AA playoff slot will be decided the following weekend when Northern Arizona plays at Reno.

The Boise-Reno game will match Division I-AA's best offense against Boise State's league-leading defense.

Reno has been averaging 518 yards per game, and quarterback Eric Beavers has 21 touchdown passes. But Boise State has allowed only 243 yards per game en route to a 4-4 season, and has surrendered just two TD passes all season.

Ault acknowledges that his teams haven't played well at Boise, but says Saturday could be the turning point.

"One of these days, it's going to turn around, and this may be the time," he said.

About Boise State's swarming pass defense, which has produced numerous quarterback sacks against other teams, Ault said Beavers will

Larry Holmes calls it a career — again

NEW YORK — Larry Holmes announced his retirement from boxing Thursday three days after he turned 37.

It was the second time the former heavyweight champion has announced his retirement, but this time he said it would stick.

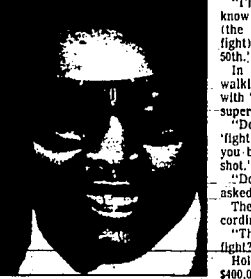
Following a news conference at Larry Holmes' Commonwealth Inn outside Phillipsburg, N.J., Holmes told The Associated Press in a telephone interview:

"I'm tired of people using me. I'm tired of fighting and I'm tired of not getting the decisions I earned."

"I've told you."

Holmes said he would retire after fighting David Bey on March 15, 1985. He stopped Bey in the 10th round to make his record 47-0. If he had stuck to his decision he would have joined Rocky Marciano, 49-0, as the only heavyweight champions to retire unbeaten.

But Holmes fought and outpointed Carl Williams, then on Sept. 15, 1985, in a bid to equal Marciano's record, he defended the International Boxing Federation title against light

heavyweight champion Michael Spinks.

15-round decision, then kept the title on a disputed 15-round split decision last April 19.

Holmes appealed to the IBF to overturn the decision, but the appeal was rejected.

"I'm 30-0," Holmes said. "People know it. They can question the 49th (the outcome of the first Spinks fight), but they can't question the 50th."

In retiring, Holmes said he was walking away from a proposed fight with Tyrell Biggs, the 1984 Olympic super heavyweight champion.

"Don King (the promoter) said 'fight Biggs,'" Holmes said. "If you beat Biggs, I'll get you a title shot."

"Do you love me?" Holmes said he asked King.

"The promoter replied he did, according to Holmes.

"Then why do you want me to fight?"

Holmes also said he asked King for \$400,000. He contends the promoter still owes him from the two Spinks fights.

Holmes turned pro in 1973 "to make money." He took home \$63 from a \$100 purse, but made millions of dollars in his career.

On June 9, 1978, Holmes won the World Boxing Council title, which he defended 17 times before he relinquished it in December, 1983, rather than fight Greg Page for the purse King was offering. Recognized as champion by the IBF, Holmes defended that title four times before losing to Spinks.

In a fine career, which was overshadowed by Muhammad Ali, who preceded him as the world's premier heavyweight, Holmes considers the highlights "winning the title, then fighting Gerry Cooney."

In an atmosphere of rancor, with charges of racism on both sides, Holmes stopped Cooney in the 13th round June 11, 1982. The previously unbeaten Cooney was given an excellent chance of becoming the first white heavyweight champion since Ingemar Johansson in 1959-60.

As for regrets, Holmes said, "I didn't want to fight Muhammad Ali because he was my brother."

On Oct. 2, 1980, Holmes beat Ali when a badly faded "The Greatest" failed to answer the bell for the 11th round.

Holmes also said he regrets "The things I said about Rocky Marciano. People wanted to punish me."

ANNAPOLIS, Md. (AP) — Democrat Tom McMillen, a former NBA forward, survived an absentee ballot count Thursday and emerged the apparent winner in a tight race with Republican Robert Neall in Maryland's 4th Congressional District.

Sellers apply brake on Dow

NEW YORK (AP) — Stock prices sagged Thursday as the market ran into resistance from sellers after reaching a two-month high the day before.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrials, down more than 20 points at its midday low, closed with a 7.45 loss at 1,891.59.

The average had risen 21.23 points in the week's first three sessions.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 165.29 million shares, against 183.17 million Wednesday.

Analysts said the market's recent advance began to bog down Wednesday when the Dow Jones Industrial average reached the 1,900 level. Some traders apparently concluded that 1,900 would prove to be a difficult hurdle for the market to clear.

Stocks also got no help from the bond market, where interest rates moved up as traders awaited the completion of a Treasury's quarterly sale of bonds and notes.

Prices of existing long-term government bonds, which move in the opposite direction from interest rates, dropped about \$10 for every \$1,000 in face value.

Another drag on the market was International Business Machines shares, which dropped 1 1/2 to 121 1/2 as Goldman Sachs & Co. removed the stock from its recommended list.

Goodyear Tire & Rubber fell 1 1/2 to 48 and led the active list on turnover of about 5.5 million shares. The company, which has become a takeover target of an investor group led by Sir James Goldsmith, said it may buy back as many as 20 million of its shares.

The Goldsmith group said Thursday it had offered to buy Goodyear for \$49 a share.

General Motors, which reported plans to close 11 assembly and metal fabricating facilities in this country, bucked the market's downturn with a gain to 74 1/4.

American Motors, meanwhile, rose 3/4 to 3 1/4 in active trading, and Chrysler dropped 1/4 to 38 1/2. Responding to rumors, AMC said it had held no talks with Chrysler concerning the sale of any of its assets.

CPC International gained 1 1/2 to 79 1/2, bouncing back from a 6 1/2-point decline Wednesday, when it bought a block of its stock that apparently marked the end of moves by an investor group toward a possible takeover.

Alexander & Alexander, which reported lower third-quarter earnings from continuing operations, slumped 5 1/2 to 10 1/2.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, declining issues outnumbered advances by about 7 to 5, with 903 down, 638 up and 452 unchanged. The NYSE's composite index of all its listed common stocks slipped .36 to 141.55.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 199.71 million shares.

GM plant closing will affect 29,000

DETROIT (AP) — General Motors Corp. will close 11 plants employing more than 29,000 workers over the next three years to reduce overcapacity and cut losses at the No. 1 U.S. automaker, the company said Thursday.

Closing the three stamping, one body and seven final assembly plants in Michigan, Illinois, Ohio and Missouri will reduce GM's fixed costs by \$500 million a year, Chairman Roger Smith said in a long-awaited announcement.

GM and United Auto Workers officials had no estimate of how many workers will lose their jobs, saying it will be months before they know how many workers will be able to transfer to other plants and how many will be retrained for new jobs at GM.

"There's no way many unknowns here," said Frank Joyce, a UAW spokesman in Detroit.

The closings were part of the first phase of a reorganization and modernization at GM. Other assembly, stamping, engine and component plants are being closed, said GM President James McDevitt.

"These actions are absolutely necessary to maintain our marketplace leadership and enhance the job security of the greater bulk of our workforce," McDevitt said.

GM suffered third-quarter operating losses of about \$338 million.

Wall Street reacted positively to the announcement. GM stock closed at \$74.25 on the New York Stock Exchange, up \$1.

The 11 plants are older facilities. Most had been scheduled for shutdown for years as GM invested in newer, more efficient plants and renovated others.

Assembly lines at the affected plants were shut down for about an hour Thursday morning so the closings could be explained to workers, most of whom were disappointed but not surprised.

Most workers will be eligible for some benefits, which range from training for new jobs and supplemental unemployment payments to guaranteed income payments for those with more than 10 years' seniority.

About 3,000 of the total affected are salaried employees, McDevitt said.

GM has spent about \$10 billion building new plants and renovating some old ones to increase efficiency and reduce costs, creating an overlap of capacity and personnel, Smith said.

Keyboard maker closes Idaho plant

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A keyboard-manufacturing plant located between Coeur d'Alene and Hayden will close, resulting in the loss of about 10 jobs, plant officials said.

Advanced Input Devices will consolidate its Coeur d'Alene operation with its larger manufacturing plant in Priest River. The consolidation will result in transfers of 30 to 40 employees from Coeur d'Alene to Priest River, said Tom Rogers, director of operations for the company.

Slowing demand for Advanced Input's keyboards prompted the closure and consolidation, Rogers said.

The closure is effective Nov. 21.

Bon's president says chain ripe for expansion but not up for sale

SEATTLE (AP) — The president of the Bon says the department store is ripe for expansion, but isn't up for sale.

"We're 40 stores now and I'm looking forward to being 50 stores, or even more," said Wilbur Fix.

Developer Robert Campeau, the new owner of Allied Stores Corp., said Thursday he didn't intend to sell the Seattle-based Bon in order to fix his \$3.47 billion takeover of Allied.

Fix also is a vice president of Allied.

Speculation about the future of The Bon and other Allied holdings has been rampant since Campeau bought the department store chain last weekend to culminate a two-month takeover battle.

Fix said the Bon department store chain may be expanded throughout the Western U.S. and even into Canada. Campeau's real estate holdings, valued at \$2.3 billion, include a number of shopping centers in Canada.

Fix said Campeau is "very expansion-oriented" and "very people-oriented" and will infuse energy and capital into Allied.

"The Allied-Campeau group is now an international organization" he said. "The Bon could be too."

Dick Ottavali, a Seattle retail consultant, said new owners in leveraged buyouts often sell some assets to reduce the debt, while expanding top performers.

He said The Bon is a natural for expansion because it's a star performer in the Allied chain.

Gorilla wars Sourdough Supper Theater

Film-makers scurry to shoot Fossey saga

HOLLYWOOD — In December 1985, gorilla expert Dian Fossey was discovered hunched at a desk at a remote camp on the slopes of Mount Visoke in Rwanda. For 18 years Fossey had devoted her life to observing, researching, taming and eventually protecting a dwindling long-haired gorilla population in Africa that poachers had reduced from 10,000 to only 4,000.

Less than a year after her slaying, Fossey is the centerpiece of a frenzied kind of gorilla warfare among two major studios — Warner Bros. and Universal Pictures — and an equally determined third party, independent producer Skip Steloff and his Heritage Entertainment Co., all of whom insist they are making movies about Fossey's life and times.

The Fossey wars provide an intriguing look into the sometimes ruthless tactics of big-time movie makers. When dealing with a public figure like Fossey, the competition can become a complex free-for-all. In the end, the winner is determined not by how much you know, but by who you know, and by who gets the cameras rolling first.

Ironically, Fossey's death catapulted this project from a backburner idea pitched at most of the major studios to a high-priority story with a lot of heat.

(Her death was shrouded with controversy. At first, angry poachers were thought to be responsible for the killing, later Rwandan government officials named U.S. researcher Wayne Richard McGuire as a suspect. McGuire, an assistant to Fossey, denied having anything to do with the slaying. He was allowed to return to the United States and was never charged.)

Major actresses like Diane Keaton, Jane Fonda and Vanessa Redgrave have expressed an interest in starring in a movie about Fossey.

This story seems to have it all: The slaying of a courageous and hard-driving independent woman who was able to befriend a pack of wild animals. Then there is her death; who killed Fossey and why? And finally there is the African landscape as cinematic backdrop.

But who will wind up with the movie? It is a safe bet that there will be just one Fossey feature made. Insiders say the market can only support one and because a movie like this will undoubtedly feature a star and a big budget, the two leading ladies will get involved.

Boise writer finds Idaho beauty a good setting

TWIN FALLS — Robin Lee Hatcher is a Boise author whose career is taking off. With five books in print and three more under contract at Leisure Books, she has scheduled a publicity tour of the West which will bring her to Waldenbooks in the Magic Valley Mall Nov. 7 from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Hatcher's latest release, "Passion's Gamble," is her third historic romance using Idaho as a setting. This one, set in and around the boomtown of Boise City during the gold rush of the 1860s, tells the story of Alexis, the beautiful daughter of an itinerant gambler. As debits the heroine of a historic romance, Alexis has led an exciting life since she and her father ran away from their Southern plantation when Alexis was a young girl. The story begins as her sister Althea, now a young Southern lady, shows up in Idaho to marry a handsome and wealthy rancher.

"We expect a lot of local interest in the book because of the Idaho setting," says Pamela French, manager of Waldenbooks in Twin Falls. Waldenbooks will try to have copies of all of Hatcher's books on hand for the autograph party, she says, including "Heart's Landing" and "Heart Storm," which are also set partially in Idaho.

"I think every bit of Idaho is beautiful, from the desert and Snake River Valley going north to the tip," says Hatcher. "Each part has its own unique beauty."

Hatcher is married, the mother of two teen-age children and the step-mother of two more. And because her success as a

writer has been fairly recent — and royalty checks traditionally lag far behind book sales — she also continues to work full time as an office manager and bookkeeper.

A schedule is a must to allow time for writing. She comes home and cooks dinner for her family on week nights. Then they do the dishes while she writes until midnight.

She has taken three Fridays off from work for her publicity trips on weekends, flying to San Francisco, Spokane, Denver, Portland, Seattle and Boise. This weekend she will swing through Pocatello and Idaho Falls after her visit in Twin Falls.

"The tour has been tiring but I wouldn't have missed it for the world," Hatcher says. She has gained first-hand knowledge of the publishing and promotion business, she says, through contacts she has made in her travels.

Taking time for publicity has cut into her writing schedule. Her next novel, "Pirate's Lady," set in England and Constantinople in the mid-1800s, will be published in August of 1987, when the publicity tour is over. I will have plenty to do to meet the January deadline," she says.

Hatcher has already had published "Stormy Surrender," set in the South during the Civil War. It is the first of a trilogy that spans three generations and includes "Heart Storm" and "Stormy Surrender," both set partially in Idaho.

She says that creating likeable characters is one secret to writing fiction that will keep readers coming back for more. Even her villains have some good qualities. She thinks the reader must be able to identify with the characters and understand why they do the things they do.

Colorizing condemned

HOLLYWOOD — The brushfire over computer colorizing of black-and-white films made a cultural leap from the film community to the arts community at large over the weekend when the National Council on the Arts unanimously passed a resolution condemning the process.

The 26-member council, representing dance, theater, literature, visual arts, music and other art forms, said that it is opposed to representing colored versions of black-and-white films as original works and expressed its concern for the preservation, without alternation, of

works conceived in black and white.

"The art of the moving image, like other arts, should not be altered and then presented as an original work," said Frank Hodsohl, chairman of the arts council, the presidentially appointed advisory body to the National Endowment for the Arts.

"The makers of the great black-and-white films and television dramas... made them in black and white. That was their intention, and that was their art, and that intention and that art should be respected," Hodsohl said.

The colorizers deny that they are misrepresenting these films.

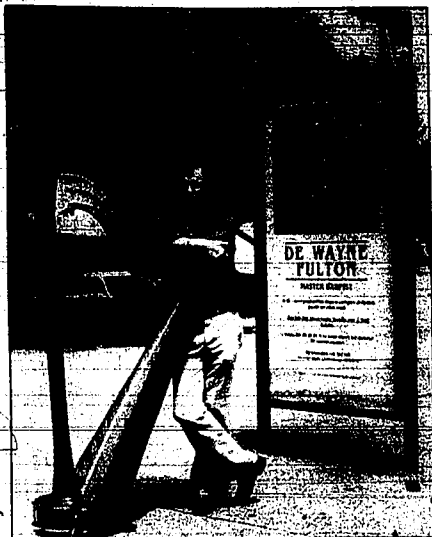
Harpist performs classical, ethnic music in CSI concert

Last candidate scores Belushi role

HOLLYWOOD — Schwab's Pharmacy has been closed for more than three years now, and starlets are not often discovered at restaurant counters. But fame still can come fast in Hollywood.

Two weeks ago, Michael Marx was working for a computer company. Last week, the 25-year-old Northwestern University graduate gave notice. After a nine-month search that involved more than 500 actors — Marx was literally the last can-

didate to come through the door — producers Ed Feldman and Charles Markey and director Robert Markowitz tapped Marx to portray actor John Belushi in the movie version of Bob Woodward's 1984 book "Wired."

The dossier: Marx is single, an unknown (minimal film work) and not a Belushi-lookalike — he was chosen, according to one insider, primarily for his ability to blend a ferocious sense of comedy with a disarming vulnerability, the same unique qualities that made Belushi

so endearing. The scandal surrounding Belushi's drug-related death makes "Wired" a controversial movie in Hollywood. Now, with the mood of both the country and Hollywood hardening against drug use and its depiction, the timing makes the movie even more of a long shot. The subject of drugs is probably avoided now not so much because the studios want to send out an anti-drug message, but because the genre is fairly played

Continued from Page D1 in any head-to-head competition. Here are the three major players and the status of their movies:

Universal Pictures: In 1984 the studio bought the rights to Fossey's book, "Gorillas in the Mist," with the hope of developing a screenplay from it. The project languished, but Fossey's death gave the story a dramatic finish. Several weeks ago, screenwriter Anna Hamilton Phelan ("Mask") turned in her well-received screenplay titled "Gorillas in the Mist." Neither Phelan, producer Arnold Glimcher nor a number of Universal production executives would comment on the project.

Heritage Entertainment: About eight months ago, Steloff read about Fossey's death in the New York Times and saw an opportunity to develop a book and a movie. Within a few weeks, Farley Mowat, author of "Never Cry Wolf," was on his way to Africa to do research and Steloff had closed a deal with Warner Books to publish "The Strange Life and Death of Dian Fossey." In April, a full-page ad in weekly Variety announced the forthcoming book and motion picture. This week Steloff received an

offer from Warner Bros. Last week a full-page four-color ad in Variety said the studio, in association with the Guber-Peters Co., was proud to announce "the start of production" in January 1987, of "Heaven and Earth."

Joan Collins, George Hamilton stake careers on 'Monte Carlo'

She was the daughter of a London theatrical agent. He was the son of a well-known band leader. She arrived in Hollywood in 1954 and quickly acquired a reputation as a party girl. He arrived some five years later, and his slick good looks quickly won him a matching reputation as a playboy. Both were touted as big future movie stars, but neither quite made it. She, of course, is Joan Collins, 53. He is George Hamilton, 47.

But old movie stars never die. They simply fade into television. And in some cases, television brings them back stronger than ever. On Sunday and Monday, Nov. 9 and 10, Collins and Hamilton will be starting together in the Collins-produced CBS miniseries "Monte Carlo," a World War II period piece, in which she plays a chanteuse doubling as a British agent, and he plays an expatriate American writer.

Back in the late 1950s and early 1960s, neither seemed to take the profession of acting as seriously. "I date every night," Collins told the New York World Telegram in 1957. "To sit at home is the kiss of death." And Hamilton's reputation as an actor was far exceeded by his reputation as a dresser. "I find starch comfortable," he said.

In the mid-60s, both careers began to fade. Collins married composer/performer Anthony Newley (her second marriage) and had two children. "I want to be both a wife and a mother without slighting either area," she announced to the New York Daily News. But after her divorce from Newley, it was back to work, and she churned out a number of low-budget horror flicks in London. Hamilton probably would have been forgotten completely if it weren't for his dates with first daughter Lynda Byrd Johnson and his questionable draft deferment on the grounds that he was the sole supporter of his mother, whom he supported in style in his 39-room Beverly Hills mansion. In 1969, Hamilton turned to TV in ill-named series "The Survivors." He tried again in 1970, in "Paris 7000," which also flopped.

In the late 1970s, Collins pulled herself out of the career doldrums by producing feature films based on her sister, Jackie Collins' best-selling novels "The Stud" (1978) and "The Bitch" (1979). She then parlayed her

regained recognition into the role of Alexis on "Dynasty." And finally, at an age when most glamour girls consider themselves past their last prayers, Collins grasped the superstardom that had always eluded her.

Hamilton hasn't fared quite so well. He produced the 1979 hit "Love at First Blip" as a starring vehicle for himself, but the follow-up, "Zorro, the Gay Blade," flopped, and Hamilton found himself back at square one.

He, too, tried the "Dynasty" cure, but his story line, involving the kidnapping of the real Krystle (Linda Evans) and the substitution of a phony look-alike, drew such ire from "Dynasty" fans that it was quickly scrapped.

But Collins, who obviously recognizes a kindred spirit, offered him a role in "Monte Carlo," so Hamilton didn't exactly come up empty. And his time may yet come. After all, Collins has six years on him, and her last six years have been something else.

Q. While I enjoy watching William Buckley's interesting TV appearances, I sometimes find his brilliantly opinionated political views a bit emphatic. Is he just as intense in public as well? — P.N.

A. Bill Buckley relishes lively political discussions just about everywhere, and this extends even when dining out. Buckley, a great admirer of the composer, becomes serene, forestalling a verbal volley with any opponent while both listen to the beautiful music.

Q. As a fan of the original Monkees, the zany young musical group so popular 20 years ago, I've been interested in the talent search for the new group bearing the same name. To what extent will these kids try to emulate the styles of their namesakes? — R.S.

A. Dino Kovas, the 20-year-old Ohio-born drummer of the newly-formed Monkees (also comprising Larry Sallis, Marty Ross and Jared Chandler) tells me the guys will have nothing in common with the other group than the name. "Sure, we've watched the old Monkees shows and listened to their tapes," he admits, "but we're not out to take their place. We do what we do what we do," he grinned, "and we've developed our own individual style. For one thing, we're far more rock video-oriented than they were. Wild 'Guiding Light' lady Rita adopts new 'Santa Barbara' role

Remember "Guiding Light's" wanton Rita, a lady who carved up men so neatly? After a long sabbatical — six years — Rita has returned under a new name, but is clearly up to the same old tricks.

Rita's Lenore Kasdorf now becomes Caroline Wilson on "Santa Barbara," vying with daughter Jane for Lionel Lockridge. As daughter Jane says, "Mother has used men well."

That's the tipoff for "Guiding Light" fans. Rita is back, working for the opposition. Although the name has changed, and the accent is softly Southern, Rita's goals and methods are so familiar. You don't drop winning ways.

"Santa Barbara" producers Bridget and Jerome Dobson created Rita back in the '70s with Lenore Kasdorf, feeling their way a day at a time. When bad Rita became wonderfully rotten, the Dobsons turned Lenore Kasdorf into a workhorse without seeing the sun, getting up in the dark, coming home in the dark.

Friends since those glory days on "Guiding Light," the Dobsons kept in touch with Lenore, calling with job offers. On a flight to San Francisco with daughter Vanessa, 6, Lenore found Bridget and Jerome rewriting "Santa Barbara" on the plane. Thus, Caroline Wilson came into being.

If Caroline packs Rita's old punch, "Santa Barbara" could give even more trouble to "Guiding Light" and "General Hospital." The Dobsons can't lose with a proven winner.

Lenore Kasdorf feels optimistic about Caroline and her own attitude. The "Guiding Light" burnout would not be repeated. The routine could be handled this time.

"It's good to have a continuing storyline and strong emotions again," she says. "I've done a lot of episodic television lately and frankly it's not satisfying. I've had three good shows in two years, a poor average. I can get my teeth into Caroline and I'm told there's a big mystery around the corner."

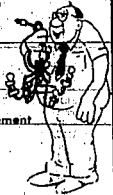

However, this image was leavened by versatile stints in comedies like "My Dear Secretary," "A Letter to Three Wives," and "For Love or Money," plus some memorable Westerns along his celluloid trail.

NBC's baseball thrill continues

NEW YORK (AP) — The ticker-tape had long since been cleaned up after the New York Mets' victory parade, but NBC was still celebrating the World Series on Tuesday.

The seventh game of the series, which attracted the biggest television audience ever for a baseball game according to the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings, helped NBC continue a perfect winning season into its sixth week.

The network had a prime-time average of 19.5 for the week ending Nov. 1. CBS was second with an average 15.8; ABC had an average 12.6 for the week.

Each rating-point equals 874,000 homes with television sets.

NBC leads so far this season with an average 19.3 rating, compared to 16 for CBS and 14.5 for ABC.

The World Series game rated a 38.9, replacing "The Cosby Show" in the No. 1 spot.

The family-style situation comedy starring Bill Cosby as the world's

greatest dad was No. 2, with a rating of 34.9.

ABC's "Monday Night Football" between the Washington Redskins and the New York Giants went up against the rain-delayed seventh series game and dropped way down to 6th place with a rating of 8.8.

"Cosby," anchor of NBC's solid Thursday night lineup, hasn't been out of first place since losing last summer to that other American icon, the Statue of Liberty, when ABC's "Liberty Weekend" won top

ratings the week of July 4th.

NBC had seven of the top 10 shows last week: "Family Ties," another family sit-com that follows "Cosby," was No. 3. CBS' highest-rated show was "Murder She Wrote" at No. 4.

ABC's only top-10 entry was "Moonlighting," the screwball-comedy detective series, at ninth.

"Except for baseball giving it some spark, otherwise the week was pretty much true to form," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects.

Viewers' fears about Dallas film allayed

BOISE (AP) — For those closest to the manhunt for escaped killer Claude Dallas, their worst expectations didn't prove true in the television movie depicting the trapper's run from the law.

"It wasn't as bad as I thought it was going to be," Lodi Rupe, daughter of one of the two Idaho Fish and Game officers who died in the 1981 confrontation with Dallas on the high desert in southern Idaho, said Wednesday.

But while Jawmen and Ms. Rupe said the manhunt: Search for Claude Dallas "didn't portray him as a hero, they cited numerous instances where history lost to Hollywood.

The helicopter didn't hover, there's not a tree anywhere near Bull Camp, and Owyhee County Sheriff Tim Nettleton says he lost six inches and gained 100 pounds.

"But any publicity helps," Nettleton said of Tuesday's television movie depicting Dallas, who clipped his way out of the Idaho State Penitentiary on Easter Sunday.

Dallas was serving a 30-year sentence for gunning down Idaho Fish and Game Officers Bill Pogue and Conley Elms. The killings on the high desert of southern Idaho in 1981, the subsequent 16-month search for Dallas and his escape from prison were the subject of the film, which aired on CBS.

"It was a supposed to be a story of history, and it just wasn't accurate," Nettleton said following the broadcast, in a telephone interview from his home in Owyhee County.

Veteran actor Claude Akins played Pogue and Ms. Rupe says the Hollywood version of her father didn't capture his personality.

"He played an awfully gruff person," she said. "He couldn't be like that and work with the public. He'd get fired."

"It was hard to watch," she said. "You never get used to it."

However, one part that showed Mrs. Pogue showing her husband's scenic sketches to Nettleton was somewhat realistic; Ms. Rupe said the drawings were actually done by her father. Copies of one of Pogue's prints, "Mountain Man," has been sold to raise money for the reward fund for Dallas.



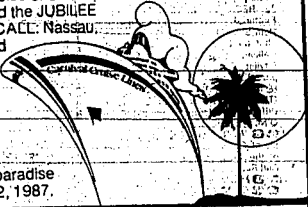

PBS president responds to NEH withdrawal of cash for 'Africans'

HOLLYWOOD — As the controversial series "The Africans" nears midpoint, the battle between the National Endowment for the Humanities and public television is heating up. On a visit to local affiliates here last week, Bruce L. Christensen, president of the Washington-based Public Broadcasting Service, in effect threw down the gauntlet to endowment chairman Lynne Cheney.

In a wide-ranging interview, Christensen asserted that the endowment, which removed its credits from the nine-part series, was "not the Ministry of Truth" and warned that if the endowment insisted upon being in the editing room when a film is cut, "then there will be no NEH funding in public television.

"We don't allow anyone in the editing room who is a funder of a public television," he said. "We don't allow Exxon, we don't allow Mobil, we don't allow anybody, IBM, or whoever it is."

The PBS president added: "I think NEH and NEA (National Endowment for the Arts) and the whole educational system of our country have an obligation to see that different points of view are made available... They aren't responsible for deciding what is or is not propaganda."

Christensen's remarks were prompted by recent comments by Cheney, in which she said that the endowment would not fund "propaganda." The chairman also disclosed that to prevent a recur-

rence of a dispute like "The Africans," "we will be making many more site visits to wherever the film is being produced... In this case ('The Africans'), I think the trip would probably have been to England where it was being edited. In any case (we would) go out, make a little friendly visit" and "see if things are going according to the plan laid out in the grant application."

The \$3.5 million series, to which the endowment had awarded \$600,000, was co-produced by WETA-TV in Washington, a PBS affiliate, and the British Broadcasting Corp. After viewing the nine-hour series, Cheney labeled it "an anti-Western diatribe" and demanded removal of the endowment's logo.

Asked if he believed the endowment was stepping on free speech rights, either in spirit or by implication, Christensen replied:

"The most troubling thing that I read (regarding Cheney's comments) was the idea that they would now begin to make visits to the editing room — 'little friendly visits,' with her clever humor. If that doesn't have a chilling effect... Let me say it another way: I believe it will have a chilling effect, and may lead to direct interference in the editorial process."

When it was noted that Cheney also said she did not wish the endowment to "make suggestions about productions" and that "the NEH isn't a producer of films," Christensen answered that "the production business is editing. And do they plan to go sit next to the editors of books as they go through

the editing of scripts and manuscripts that come in that are funded by NEH? ... Are they going to sit next to the editor at his elbow, and say, 'This must go in, this stays out?'"

On the matter of free speech, Christensen also posed some hypothetical questions: "If she (Cheney) could have pulled the program, rather than the credits, would she have done that? ... If the legislation were written, if NEH did not agree with what was produced with the money funded, rather than being able to pull their credits, they were able to pull the program — would she have chosen to pull the program? Or, would the political pressure have been so great to pull the program, she would have had no other choice?"

Christensen, 48, who took charge of the 314-station PBS system in April 1984, also talked about the decision last week to do an in-house investigation into its own program policies and practices.

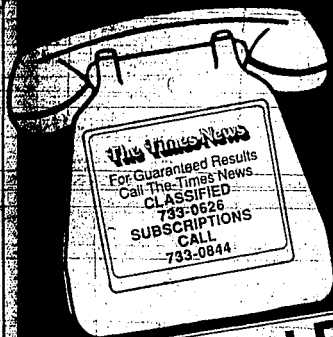
