## Poll: Life support freedom desired

CHICAGO — Nearly three out of four Americans favor withdrawing life support from hopelessly ill patients under certain conditions, a poll sponsored by the American Medical Association indicates.

Only 25 percent of the survey's 1,510 respondents opposed the option and 12 percent said they were unsure. Dr. James H. Sammons, the AMA's executive vice president, called the results a "reassuring endorsement" by the American public of a decision made last spring by the AMA's Council on Ethical and Judicial Affairs.

While 78 percent of those younger than 45 favored the proposal, 64 percent of those aged 45 and older did so. Twenty percent of the older group said they were unsure of their opinion, compared with 10 percent of the younger group.

## Mary Hemingway dead at age 78

NEW YORK (AP) — Mary Hemingway, the war correspondent, writer and widow of Ernest Hemingway, has died after a long illness. She was 78.

Mrs. Hemingway, who used the byline Mary Welsh until her marriage to Hemingway, died Wednesday at St. Luke's Hospital. Mary Welsh was a foreign correspondent for Time and Life magazines during World War II when she met Hemingway in 1941. They married later that year. He has her third marriage, and his fourth. After his death in 1961, she wrote for magazines and completed "How It Was," her autobiography, in 1976.

North declined to comment on the report Thursday, except to tell reporters that he would make "a full exposition" of the facts in the case, "in the appropriate forum," and with the advice of lawyers.

Asked about reports that North was turned away Thursday at the White House gates, presidential spokesman Donald Mathes said, "I'm not certain whether he was turned away, but I know he is on the do-not-admit list, which is standard procedure for someone who has been relieved of their duties."

Pressed on what happened at the gate, he said, "From what I gather, he was at the gate and was being hounded by the press and decided to leave."

Reagan announced Tuesday that Vice Adm. Poindexter had resigned and that North had been relieved of his duties after Justice Department investigators determined that North participated in the diversion of \$10 million to \$30 million, in profits from Iranian arms sales, to the Contras.

The disclosures prompted immediate questions from members of Congress about the degree of know-

edge that other senior administration officials may have had, including Regan and Vice President, George Bush. North is known to have reported directly to Regan, Bush and even to the president.

One administration official said Thursday that North used money raised through a variety of sources, including the Iranian arms deal, to pay for an American-managed air refueling operation out of El Salvador's Ilopango military airfield.

The refueling operation came to light on Oct. 5 when an arms-laden C-124K supply plane was shot down over southern Nicaragua killing two Americans and leaving Eugene Hagensus of Marinette, Wis., captured. The administration has denied any connection to the plane.

The Los Angeles Times quoted government sources as saying that last week North went into his office at the Old Executive Office Building next to the White House and shredded documents. The newspaper said the contents of the documents could not be determined, but could have helped determine how many people were involved.

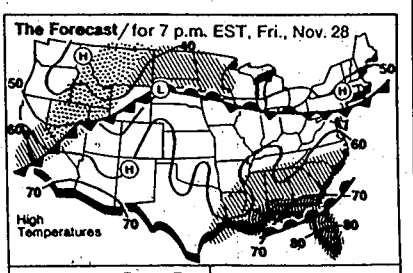

# Lines being drawn for bureaucratic battle over state water

POCATELLO — Lines for a bureaucratic turf-battle-over-water are being drawn around the State Water Plan.

A past effort to consolidate water quality and water quantity programs is getting a new, more flexible approach in the new State Water Plan draft. But the two agencies responsible for the two areas differ whether it's a good idea.

The existing State Water Plan is undergoing its five-year update for the Legislature's approval in the next session. Public comment on the revised plan is due by Monday.

The plan now says state programs of water quantity and water quality planning and administration should be consolidated in the Department

of Water Resources, which is responsible for drafting the plan. That consolidation can be done by amending state laws, it says.

The revised version of the policy states that responsibilities for water allocation and water quality will be consolidated in one agency but not necessarily the Department of Water Resources.

"It has become more apparent that you can't really manage water quality and quantity separately," says Frank Sherman, supervisor of water planning for the Department of Water Resources.

"One or both objectives may suffer" under consolidation, says Al Murray, Water Quality Bureau chief for the Department of Health and Welfare. "In separate agencies with separate responsibilities, each ob-

jective is optimized." If the policy of consolidation is adopted by the Legislature along with the State Water Plan, Sherman said, "It would only provide ammunition for either agency in seeking such a merger, or the governor."

Separate legislation accomplishing the reorganization would probably be required, he said, an effort that could mean either the consolidation of responsibilities or a new "superagency."

The latter approach was taken by Gov. John Evans in his fiscal year 1980 budget. He proposed the creation of a Department of Air and Water Resources, which would have handled not only water resources and air and water quality, but also solid and hazardous wastes. The idea died in the Legislature.

The subject of consolidation of water quantity and quality responsibilities was first broached in 1974. A constitutional amendment limited state government to 20 departments. Reorganization that followed separated the two efforts.

"I think there's merit in the current system," says Archie Service, a Pocatello attorney who is chairman of the Health and Welfare Board. "The two have different purposes, so I would be inclined to having the water quality separate from the actual resource."

"The thing that bothers me the most is that Water Resources is more concerned with the utilization of water, getting water in the ditch," he said. "The Division of Environment is concerned with water quality. In some respects, it's like

trying to mix oil and water. I think there has to be a reasonable balance between these two," Service said. Sherman admits there was some feeling that Water Resources was trying to absorb the Water Quality Bureau's responsibility, and said that was one reason the more flexible policy was drafted for the new State Water Plan.

# Boise pushes fight against air pollution

BOISE (AP) — Snow is piling up on the mountains near Boise. People are stoking their wood stoves. And a thick, brown haze has begun its annual visit.

Boise unofficially kicked off its air pollution season earlier this month, when carbon monoxide and particulates reached their highest levels since January.

The pollution measured slightly under the levels that would trigger an air quality alert.

But this season will differ from past ones. During the summer, the City Council enacted an ordinance that could reduce the amount of smoke. In addition, the federal Environmental Protection Agency has started a \$4 million study, running through March, on the health effects of the Boise Valley's smoke pollution.

The new city ordinance will prohibit most Boise residents from using their wood stoves or fireplaces when the state Division of Environment issues an air quality alert. Such alerts, issued when air pollution threatens to reach unhealthy levels, were a common occurrence last winter.

Residents who violate the ordi-

nance could be charged with a misdemeanor punishable by a \$100 fine or a day in jail.

However, the city hasn't decided yet how it is going to enforce the ordinance. City Building Director Tim Hogland said, "It's something we're going to look into soon, but I don't know when."

Hogland said city officials hope that if an air quality alert is issued before the city makes a decision on enforcement, people will comply anyway. "There is going to have to be a lot of voluntary compliance with this," he said.

Heidi Rigg, an air quality specialist with the state Air Quality Bureau, cautioned that the city's ordinance isn't a miracle cure.

"Once the pollution levels have already built up, people stopping burning will not decrease the levels," she said. "But it would prevent it from getting worse until we have dispersion."

It is important to prevent the high levels of pollution that occurred last winter because of the threat to health from smoke, she said.

"We're particularly concerned about the health impacts of residential wood burning because the source

is in residential neighborhoods, so people are breathing it all the time," she said. "We know that wood smoke causes respiratory problems, and we know that a lot of toxics and carcinogens are contained in wood smoke."

Smoke pollution in residential neighborhoods is particularly bad because chimneys release pollutants relatively close to the ground, she said.

One of the most harmful substances found in wood smoke is a class of chemicals called polycyclic organic matter. Some POMs are toxic, some are cancer-causing and some cause biological mutations.

In the future, the threat of severe pollution in Boise may be eradicated by another program adopted by the city, officials said. It requires all new wood stoves to meet certain emission standards, but it will take many years before old, dirty stoves are replaced with cleaner versions, they said.

In the meantime, residents need to be taught that their wood stoves can cause air pollution, Rigg said. "Many people believe there is not any pollution problem in Boise, or that it is due to something other than wood smoke," she said. "There are a number of people that remain to be convinced that the problem is wood burning."

Rigg said she hoped that the in-

formation provided by the EPA study will take care of that.

Boise was selected over 32 other cities as the site for a study focusing on air pollution from wood burning and motor vehicle emissions.

To gather information for the study, the EPA set up monitoring stations at seven sites in Boise.

Rigg said the study would detail where the smoke comes from, where it concentrates and what type of carcinogens it contains.

# Sex case to continue

CALDWELL (AP) — Arraignment is scheduled to continue Friday for a 68-year-old Caldwell man who faces eight charges of sexual misconduct involving minors.

Arraignment of John Oliver Morrison, rural Caldwell, began Wednesday in Canyon County Magistrate's Court, Canyon County Prosecuting Attorney Richard Harris said. Morrison, a self-employed watch repairman, was arrested Tuesday on five counts of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor and three counts of sexual abuse of a minor child, Nampa police detective Randy Kath said.

The arrest came after a six-week joint investigation by the Nampa and Caldwell police departments, Kath said.

tox said the investigation was prompted by complaints of a man buying expensive gifts for young girls. Complaints came anonymously and from the victims, he said.

The case is turning out to be one of the more involved sexual abuse cases in Canyon County because of the number of victims, Kath said. Police have interviewed about 15 girls, ranging in age from 10 to 14.

"I don't know how many (victims) there will be," Kath said. "The names continue to come out during the interviews. It's a long and tedious process."

## Foreign policy crisis shows a flaw in concept of morality

**BOSTON** — I have been waiting for a simple moral question to be raised about the President's deal with Iran. I'm not talking about the morality of dealing with terrorists.

Or the morality of lying to the American people and our allies. That's the easy stuff of ethics: Morality 1, fall semester.

What I've been waiting for is the media or the pollsters or the country to ask whether it is right for the President to swap American lives for Middle Eastern lives. And we now know, for Central American lives.

That is what happened. In the popular mind, the bleak policy, ordered by what Khomeini calls "The Black House," was an exchange of "arms for hostages." But that's much too sanitary a description. It conjures up an image of weapons stockpiled in a warehouse rather than the image of weapons used to kill people.

The arms themselves were classified by the administration as "defensive." They consist, we are told, of some 2,000 anti-tank weapons and enough parts to repair 200 Hawk anti-aircraft missiles. Anti-tank weapons. Anti-aircraft weapons. These are also clean words. They sound like weapons were pointed at empty machines.

But tanks and aircraft are not drones, run like a child's train set by remote control. There are people inside these tanks and aircraft. People who will die.

Even this could be a matter of bodies, not make up the whole of what an objective list. The President swears that one objective of this arms deal is to bring to "an end that

terrible war." . . . I shorn up those "moderates" who want peace by giving arms to an ayatollah who will accept only victory. Somewhere between 350,000 and a million people have been killed so far in the six-year war. How many more deaths will be attributed to the swap? How many more in Nicaragua?

In an angry moment, Donald Regan demanded of the press, "What's a human life worth?" This he said is "what the President was thinking about" when he ordered the shipment.

It was a ripe question, but one that needs to be rephrased. What's an American life worth? Are three American hostages worth 100 Iraqis and Iranians? 500? 10,000?

Does it make a difference if the dead are volunteers, drafted soldiers or civilians? Do we care if people are killing each other with our weapons?

The entire debate has been about credibility and damage control, about domestic management and international relations. Questions have been raised about a bumbling President and a rebellious staff. The few last week was no duplicity, this week on morality.

There is much being said about lame ducks

and sacrificial lambs. But what about life and death? There have been headlines announcing the removal of Oliver North and John Poindexter. But what about life and death?

Is that too corny, too soft a question? If it is left to the Iraq ambassador to mention that these arms, "will bring about more casualties," while America goes on measuring the political impact of this liaison on George Schultz or the Reagan presidency or the next election.

If members of my own family were held hostage, I suspect that I would be capable of great violence to save them. If I were given the option of sacrificing strangers for loved ones, I might trade them by the dozen. I would be morally untrustworthy to make this decision.

Is this what happened to Reagan: that he perceived the hostages as family and the warring parties in the Middle East as strangers — we can help kill each other without quarrel?

Was he on safe moral ground because he only supplied the weapons, didn't push the buttons? Did he think about it at all?

In wartime, he should have had one nation to kill the largest possible number of the enemy to save any individual life. But we are not at war.

My sense is that even in peacetime we have come to accept arms as a tool of America's foreign policy like any other form of "foreign aid."

We sell them here, withhold them there,

American life with foreign lives? How many will? "What is a human life worth?" I'm waiting, still waiting, for the subject to come up.

## White House should come clean on what's behind caper

**WASHINGTON** — A parable: The hunters make a snail's pace that lands them in wilderness where they stalk caribou. The pilot says, "I'll return in a week, but remember what I said last year: Planes like this can carry only three hunters and one caribou." When he returns he sees three hunters — and three caribou.

The hunters say: "Last year we slipped you \$100 and you let us load three caribou." The pilot says: "O.K., but this year it's \$200."

The hunters grumble but pay, jam the caribou aboard, the plane lurches a few feet aloft — and plows to a stop. The hunters are scattered through the branches and one shouts: "Where are we?" Another answers: "A hundred yards from where we crashed last year."

Speaking, as the parable does, of U.S. policy regarding Iran, one thing is clear: There are some who are not to be trusted.

Serious practitioners of covert operations know that such operations can crash. So they begin by asking themselves, "What happens if this enterprise crashes?" They begin with that question and often go no further.

This is not to say that anything that can

go wrong should not be attempted. However, anything that could go wrong as the approach to Iran has gone, and anything that so many extreme, hostile and unpredictable foreign actions could cause to go wrong, should never have been attempted.

The crowning fallacy was to take the approach to Iran, which was not nearly as baroque, and make it rocco by connecting it, through Swiss bank accounts, to the Nicaraguan Contras.

This lunatic parlay, this paradigm of pyrotechnic, entangles a speculative and chancy undertaking, one peripheral to Reagan's presidency, with something central to Reagan's presidency.

The peripheral thing is the approach to Iran. The peripheral did not mean frivolous; it only means unlikely to soon produce results,

and inessential to the main themes of the administration's foreign policy.

The central thing is support for the Contras. The Contras embody the Reagan Doctrine, the commitment to support forces of resistance on the expanding edges of the Soviet empire.

The connection between Iran and Nicaragua is apt to shatter the slender, shaky majority supporting aid for the Contras. That fact is evidence — not conclusive, but strong — that no one seriously concerned with the President's priorities (such as the President) could have countenanced it.

The question vexing most Americans is: Could a few high-ranking officials really have implemented the Iran-Iraq Central America weapons and money shuffler without the President or his chief of staff or Pentagon officials knowing about it? And, what emboldened Lt. Col. Oliver North to do it?

North is the kingpin of the officials, especially Presidents who feel uneasily hemmed in by Congress in foreign policy, come to love not wisely but too well. Put plainly, North is a fellow who does things.

In recent decades, the uses of diplomacy, military assets and other actions have become increasingly subject to public

scrutiny and legislative impediments.

As more and more avenues of action have been blocked, the impulse to act has sought new outlets. It has become like underground water under increasing pressure: It finds outlets even in tiny crevices in beds of rock. One such crevice has been in the White House basement, in the National Security Council.

Perhaps the impulse to act so recklessly in connecting Iran and Nicaragua presupposed acting without presidential consent. The idea is not as bizarre as it seems at first blush. It accords with a cardinal rule of covert operations: The President must be protected from the flying debris if the operation crashes in the trees.

A President is not a prime minister, not merely the first among equals. He is constitutionally indispensable, irreplaceable by a rearrangement of personnel. So he must be protected, and at times that can mean protection even from significant knowledge.

That is why responsible, prudent persons have at times had problems, backstairs ways of semi-informed officials about a few operations that intervening executive-branch committees have not had responsibility for authorizing.

If the Iran-Contra connection was just the result of a twisted application of the principle of deniability, it was atrocious enough. It was even worse if it was part of a pattern produced by a White House ambience. The pattern may be free enterprise in foreign policy by people enjoying disconnection from presidential supervision.

The ambience may be a result of presidential delegation to the point of inattention. Reagan's desire to delegate responsibility is disproportionate to his insistence on wisdom in his subordinates.

It requires the willful suspension of disbelief to believe that the two banished officials are the only two culpable here.

Such suspension cannot sustain Reagan's authority, so the immediate future and ultimate reputation of his presidency may hinge on the energetic use he makes of his latest stroke of luck.

This might seem an odd moment to mention his famous luck, but he is lucky that Congress is away. He has a few weeks to act on Henry Kissinger's principle: Whatever must be revealed eventually should be revealed immediately.

## Arrogance mirrored in Washington, Wall Street scandals

**WASHINGTON** — The unravelling of the Reagan presidency, which had been accelerating rapidly in Tuesday, reached critical state with Washington's explosive White House revelations of possible criminal involvement over diversion of secret funds from Iranian arms deals to U.S.-backed contra fighting in Nicaragua. It also coincides with the greatest scandal to hit Wall Street in years, if not decades.

These twin events in the nation's capitals of government and finance represent something far more serious than unseemly spectacles in which backstabbing, betrayal, an every-man-for-himself mentality, excessive reliance on secrecy and violations of the law are common ingredients. They pose threats to the stability of the nation's political process and the integrity of its financial system.

They will not be resolved merely by the removal of intelligence aides to the President — or even the reshuffling of his Cabinet — or by the conviction of one or more illicit insider-trader wheeler-dealers on Wall Street.

What these episodes have exposed are traits that have long been at work in the Reagan years: a kind of free-booting, let-

ter-rap approach to government and business.

In this climate it has become fashionable, and profitable, for free-lance operatives to ignore existing conventions and structures and the rules and regulations that are supposed to govern their behavior.

Thus, in Washington, the covert cowboys operating either out of the White House basement or somewhere on the fringes of official authority have circumvented the spirit and quite probably the letter of the law.

In the end, these kinds of actions and the attitudes that produced them have created the worst scandal in Washington since Watergate and posed the greatest threat to a presidency since then. Once again, power has been badly abused, with all of its consequences to be determined.

The extraordinary White House briefing by Attorney General Edwin Meese III Tuesday disclosing the role of the National Security Council and its operative Lt. Col. Oliver L.

North in secretly diverting funds to the Nicaraguan Contras from the Iranian arms shipments guarantees that the Reagan administration's already severe problems over its conduct of foreign policy will intensify.

Many more questions remain unanswered. More officials are bound to be affected. So will be the kingpin of the officials, especially Presidents who feel uneasily hemmed in by Congress in foreign policy, come to love not wisely but too well. Put plainly, North is a fellow who does things.

In recent decades, the uses of diplomacy, military assets and other actions have become increasingly subject to public

with impunity and even with the sanctioning of official agencies that are supposed to regulate and enforce their activities.

The Ivan Bosky affair that has gripped Wall Street in recent days is the biggest but not the first big financial scandal there.

Last summer, the papers were filled with stories about insider-trading cases on Wall Street. Affected were some of the nation's most powerful brokerage and investment houses and law firms. Revealed was a widespread betrayal of trust in a system in which many people were involved and the

sharing of profit or secret information. There, too, as is now seen in Washington, the system was badly abused.

These concurrent crises are complex, fundamental and of paramount national concern. The leaders of Washington and Wall Street are in trial.

Their challenge is nothing less than to put back in proper working order the nation's economic and political houses.

## In court cases, the law is on the side of the right to read

According to some Wyoming statistics, 16 years of age is the age of coming in sexual matters and the age when a person may marry. However, if a few citizens in Wright, Wyo., have their way, no 16-year-olds will be able to check out Judy Blume's "Forever" from the Wright Junior-Senior High School library.

By reading Blume's book, "Young people would be encouraged to experiment with sexual encounters," claims Carl Buppell in his complaint to the Campbell County School District. His complaint is also signed by a number of "concerned parents."

Buppell wouldn't name the other parents who object to the book, nor would he estimate their number. But he stated his argument against Blume's book this way: "It doesn't need that kind of garbage in the schools. It's pornography. There are people who get their kicks out of pushing this garbage on kids. These people don't belong in our society. I don't know where they belong. . . . This book is full of dirty language. And the book condones pre-marital sex. It's got a good story line, if it left the dirty language out. It has language you wouldn't print in your newspaper, so why is it okay to have in a school library? . . . How did the book get in the library, anyway? It wasn't screened before it was put on the shelves."

It doesn't really matter that Buppell admitted that he had not read all of "Forever" when he first made his complaint, or that some of the "concerned parents" haven't read it yet. Whether or not the book was

screened according to school procedures also doesn't matter. The book is in the library and the questions raised by this challenge are larger than policy and procedure. They involve issues of morality and students' right to read.

Buppell's challenge to Judy Blume's book "Forever" raises two important questions: 1) Is the book obscene or pornographic? Obscenity is not protected by the First Amendment. If the book is obscene, it can be removed from the school library. 2) Is the book appropriate to the ages of the students served by the school library? If it is not appropriate, then it may be argued that the book should be restricted. 3) Do students have a right to read a book which other students' parents object to?

I finished reading "Forever" last night. The book honestly and compassionately portrays Katherine. Katherine, during her first real encounter with love and with her own sexuality. It shows how vulnerable Katherine becomes through her feelings and through her first sexual experiences.

The book reveals a teen-ager's expectation that her love relationship will last "forever"

and takes the reader through the eventual ending of that relationship.

Any parent of a teen-age girl can relate to the dialogue between Katherine and her father, between Katherine and her mother. I had some of the same conversations with my daughters when they were younger. If my daughters were still in junior high school or high school, I would want them to read "Forever." The book deals with questions and emotions which I know they experienced. And yes, the book describes scenes of lovemaking and the first fumbblings of love.

But do scenes of lovemaking, scenes of sex, make a book obscene? The U.S. Supreme Court in the U.S. v. United States, 1957, said that . . . use and obscenity are not synonymous. Obscene material is material which deals with sex in a manner appealing to prurient interests. "Prurient interest is not neutral here. Katherine's feelings are central; her new understandings of relationships are central. Sex is present because it belongs in the story. It isn't gratuitous; it reflects the realities of today. Ask any teen-ager.

Is the book without redeeming social value? Quite the opposite. I'd highly recommend it as reading for every teen-ager. Indeed, I find its message to be a highly moral one.

"Forever" fails to fulfill at least two of the three parts of the test for obscenity. We have not heard from the rest of the com-

munity on whether the book is considered "patently offensive under current community standards." Whether it is or not, it must fulfill all three tests. It does not.

Is the book appropriate to the students served by the school library? If Wyoming law allows 16-year-olds to marry, then the book is obviously appropriate. We don't even have to consider the high incidence of teenage pregnancy and obvious interest in sexual matters as arguments for having such sensitive books on school library shelves.

Family Circle, Nov. 11, reprinting excerpts from Judy Blume's letters to Judy Whaley says: "I wrote the book 'Forever' . . . the story of Katherine and Michael, seniors in high school, when my daughter, Randy, was 14. She asked if I could write about two nice kids who fall in love, do it, and nothing terrible happens to them. Randy had read a number of books that year that linked sex with punishment." Any argument against the appropriateness of this material seems totally without merit.

Central to the questions raised are student's right to read, a corollary to the First Amendment. Freedom of speech presumes a freedom to read; freedom of speech is empty without access to information.

Even if one were to accept the proposition that a parent has the right to guide his or her own child's reading, what right has that parent over another's child? The key issue is

whether Buppell or any parent can decide what another parent's child may read. Libraries do not force their books on anyone. The books are there for selection by the patrons. In a school library, the responsibility for selection is up to the student. Too often in cases of this kind, what is acted out in the public arena is really a family matter. A parent is offended by a book which a child brings home from the school library and instead of handling the problem in the home, the situation is generalized. What is truly a matter of family responsibility is thereby relegated to the school district. Those who consider themselves conservatives should not give up their responsibilities so easily.

The courts have shown that the weight of law is on the side of the right to read. Once a book is on a library shelf, the law favors that book remaining there. Those who seek to remove it must have extraordinary and compelling reasons for such censorship. There are no compelling reasons for removal in this case.

And those parents and students who want their right to read to be protected ought to make themselves heard now, so that the school district understands what is at stake here.

It is still against the American grain to allow others to decide what we can read. Isn't it?

# Grants speeding to states

WASHINGTON (AP) — Education Secretary William J. Bennett said Thursday his department will speed up distribution of \$200 million in new drug education funds by dispensing with writing new regulations.

Bennett said his department will rely on the new law itself, catchall regulations and some non-regulatory guidelines. He said it will award the grants, ranging from \$15.8 million for California to \$795,905 for the 13 least populous states, early in the new year.

Idaho will receive \$795,905 under the program.

"Given the emergency nature of the drug problem among our young people, I believe it is essential that the funds from this new law be made available for state and local programs as quickly as possible," Bennett said in a letter to the 50 governors and chief state school officers, made public Thursday.

Bennett said his department will also hold a conference in January to explain the new anti-drug program to the governors and state school superintendents. Further details will be announced later.

The Drug-Free Schools and Communities Act of 1986, which President Reagan signed Oct. 27, sets aside 8 percent of the \$200 million for colleges and universities, 4.5 percent for regional centers, 3.5 percent for federal activities, 1 percent for Indian youth programs, 1 percent for U.S. territories and 0.2 percent for Hawaiian natives.

The rest — \$159.1 million — will be allocated to the states based on their school-age population, with no state getting less than 0.5 percent, or \$795,905.

Governors will get 30 percent of each state's grant, with 70 percent distributed by the state school superintendents. The state chiefs, in turn, must pass on 90 percent of their share to local school districts and other educational agencies.

# Beach yields drug valued at \$60,000

MELBOURNE, Fla. (AP) — More than four pounds of cocaine, worth about \$60,000, was washed ashore along Brevard County beaches.

It was the second time this week cocaine has turned up on beaches in Brevard and Indian River counties, and the fifth time this month along Florida's middle Atlantic Coast.

Although the source of the finds Wednesday has not been identified, officials have speculated the cocaine is from a freighter that was stopped off Fort Pierce on Nov. 3.

"Some of it probably just got caught up in the currents," said Billy Yout, a special agent with the Drug Enforcement Administration in Miami.

Two individually wrapped packages of the drug, each weighing 1 kilo or 2.2 pounds, were found Wednesday morning by vacationers.

This month, more than 1,200 pounds of the drug have been found along beaches and waters between Fort Pierce in St. Lucie County and Playalinda Beach near Titusville, officials said.

# Probe links 'conspiracy' to LaRouche

LOS ANGELES (AP) — A state investigation of London LaRouche supporters' political activities in California has found a "complex organizational conspiracy" that acted illegally, according to an unsealed court document.

The investigation, headed by state Attorney General John Van de Kamp's office, has focused on 14 LaRouche supporters allegedly flown in from out of state to help get Proposition 64, an initiative that would have quarantined victims of AIDS, on the Nov. 4 ballot.

An affidavit from John Horton, a special agent with the state Department of Justice, claims that the out-of-state supporters committed election fraud, perjury and conspiracy.

Horton says in the affidavit, which was unsealed Wednesday, that LaRouche's out-of-state supporters not only acted illegally by circulating petitions for Proposition 64, which was defeated by the voters, but registered to vote illegally.

California law says only state residents may solicit petition signatures.

The document also asserts that petition circulators committed perjury by falsely attesting they were present when signatures were obtained.

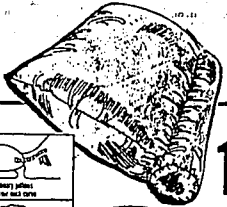

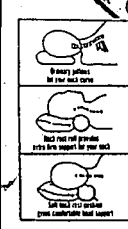

# President dodges spotlight, spends quiet holiday at ranch

SANTA BARBARA, Calif. (AP) — President Reagan spent a quiet Thanksgiving with his family, following his preference for private celebrations and taking refuge from the spotlight shining on his foreign policy crisis.

As always, reporters had no access to Reagan at the 688-acre ranch, which is about 20 miles north of Santa Barbara in the Santa Ynez Mountains.

But this time the president has not scheduled, as he often does, any trips outside the ranch gates to attend church, make speeches or visit friends in Los Angeles.

As he flew to California from Washington, Reagan avoided contact with reporters trailing aboard Air Force One, as he generally does.

In addition, however, he was screened from questioning both on takeoff from Andrews Air Force Base, Md., and on arrival at Point Mugu Naval Air Station south of Santa Barbara.

At Andrews, a Secret Service agent told reporters they had to board the plane before the president's motorcade arrived, instead of standing under the wing as usual.

White House spokesman Dan Howard said it was a mistake, resulting from incorrect instructions by an Air Force officer, but in any event, the effect was to prevent the news reporters from shouting questions.

At Point Mugu, the president was directed away from the small group of reporters and toward a group of school children. His conversation with the youngsters had the effect of eliminating any possibility of shouted questions.

In addition, fewer key aides accompanied Reagan than has been the case on most California trips, and those who did travel here were less accessible.

The president's principal spokesman, Larry Speakes, stayed in Washington. Howard, the deputy who came in Speakes' place, was not holding periodic briefings for

reporters, as Speakes usually does.

Howard was available to answer questions, but had no comment on major developments in the fur arising from Iranian arms deals and diversion of the proceeds to Nicaraguan rebels.

White House chief of staff Donald T. Regan, who originally was to be represented by deputy Dennis Thomas, decided at the last minute to make the trip himself. But aides say he was not meeting with reporters, as he often does on California trips.

Regan declined comment on most issues when approached by reporters at Point Mugu. Asked how Reagan was bearing up amid the fur, he replied, "All right. He's fine."

Meanwhile, a government official in Washington said Thursday the FBI is investigating whether Lt. Col. Oliver North, fired for his role in diverting Iranian arms sales profits to Nicaraguan Contras, destroyed personal documents after being

questioned about the plan.

North declined to comment on the report, saying Thursday that he would make "a full exposition" of the facts in the case later, "in the appropriate forum" and with the advice of his lawyers.

The source, who discussed the matter only on condition that he not be identified by name, did not claim to know whether documents were destroyed.

But he said North had unfettered access to his office files until Tuesday afternoon — after Reagan announced that he had been relieved of his duties as a top staff member for the National Security Council.

North's personal records were not placed under seal until Wednesday, the source said.

The Los Angeles Times, in Thursday's editions, quoted government sources as saying North shredded documents last weekend that could show involvement by other government officials in the Iranian-Contra destroyed personal documents after being

Even before his resignation was announced Tuesday, the president's national security adviser, John Poindexter, had planned to send deputy Alton Keel to Santa Barbara.

Keel, now acting national security adviser, canceled at least one planned interview, failed to return a reporter's telephone calls, and left a do-not-disturb message at his hotel-switchboard. The NSC's spokesman, Paul Hanley, was flying here from Washington Thursday.

The Reagans were having a traditional turkey and trimmings dinner with the president's brother, Neil; Neil's wife, Bees; the Reagans' son, Ron; Ron's wife, Doris; the president's daughter, Maureen, and her husband, Dennis Revell. The White House said the president's son, Michael, and daughter Patti, were spending the holiday with their in-laws.

The weather at the ranch was sunny and warm, the White House said.

## 11 lose lives when small planes crash

Eleven people were killed in small plane crashes in Indiana and North Carolina, authorities reported Thursday.

Near New Bath, Ind., two New Hampshire women and one man died when their Cessna 172 Skyhawk crashed early Thursday in a farm field. Their names were withheld pending notification of relatives.

Federal Aviation Administration officials were on the scene. State Police Sgt. Reginald Brewer said no flight plan had been filed.

Four people were killed when a twin-engine plane from Orlando, Fla., crashed Wednesday evening in dense woods about seven miles south of Clinton in Sampson County, N.C.

The plane, a Piper Aerostar PA-60, was on the way to Knoxville, Tenn., flying at about 1,400 feet, when it disappeared from radar screens, FAA officials said.

Killed were the pilot, K. Tyus, 49 or 50; his son, Steve Tyus, 19; his daughter, Carol Tyus, 24; and Robert Shumate, 24. The official said Shumate and Steve Tyus were Marines based at Cherry Point.

FAA spokesman Jack Barker in Atlanta said investigators from the National Transportation Safety Board were on their way to the site in Sampson County.

Another four people died when their single-engine plane crashed on approach to a Winston-Salem airport Wednesday night.

Witnesses near the Winston Lake Golf Course said they saw the single-engine Beechcraft's lights and heard its engine sputter before they heard it crash and saw a fireball.

G.E. "Buck" Johnson, the assistant director of the county emergency medical service, said the bodies of two adults and two children were removed from the wreckage. Their identities were not immediately released.

A supervisor at the control tower at the Greensboro Regional Airport said the plane was headed to Winston-Salem from Leroy Airport in Leroy, N.Y.

## World flight comes closer

MOJAVE, Calif. (AP) — The airplane Voyager flew another test flight Thursday and a spokesman said an attempt at a non-stop, non-refueled flight around the world might start next week, after more tests and modification.

Because of seasonal weather patterns along the planned route, the historic 12-day flight by the experimental piston-powered craft will have to begin by mid-December or risk postponement until spring, said project spokesman Peter Riva.

Thursday's one-hour test flight from the Mojave Civilian Flight Test Center followed a similar trial Wednesday, Riva said.

Pilots Dick Rutan and Jeana Yeager were pleased with their clear communications with ground crews on a satellite-assisted UHF or ultra-high frequency radio. The Voyager crew hopes the equipment will provide continuous communications between the plane and its home base during the record attempt, Riva said.

But, further modifications will be needed on the cooling system of one of Voyager's two engines.

# Fans remember Natalie Wood well

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Just beyond the reach of the spreading limbs of a laurel tree is the 5-year-old grave of actress Natalie Wood, where a steady procession of fans drops by daily to leave flowers and notes and to remember.

Two Hollywood actresses whose lives ended abruptly — Marilyn Monroe and Miss Wood — lure more than 100 visitors each day to Westwood Memorial Park, a tiny cemetery surrounded by high-rise buildings.

Actor Robert Wagner is often seen staring at the gardenia-covered grave of his late wife, the dark-eyed beauty of 60 movies who drowned five years ago Saturday in the chilly ocean water off Santa Catalina Island.

"He will just drive in and stand

there. He walks around then leaves. The girls come, too," said cemetery spokesman Bill Pierce.

"Tourists and fans come in every day, both to Marilyn's crypt and Natalie's grave," Pierce said. The celebrity final resting spots are also on a Japanese tourist agency limousine shuttle route.

"It's as close as we're ever going to get. I'm not a big fan of cemeteries, but I do want to pay my respects," said Adrienne Andersen, 32, a fan of the late actress who stood over her grave Saturday.

"This is very personal for me, though. I can't be here with a lot of people," said Miss Andersen, who recently moved to West Hollywood from Washington, D.C.

Actress Donna Reed is buried 10 feet from Miss Wood, Darryl F.

Zanuck is 40 feet to the west, actor Peter Lawford is 30 feet away to a crypt and Miss Monroe is 150 feet to the north.

Miss Wood was 43 when she accidentally slipped from Wagner's 60-foot yacht "Splendor" and drowned on Nov. 29, 1981.

Her sudden death stunned Hollywood, where she had grown from Natasha Gurdin, 4-year-old star of "Happy Land," to a dramatic adult actress and three-time Oscar nominee for performances in "Rebel Without a Cause," "Splendor in the Grass" and "Love with a Proper Stranger." She is probably best known for her role as Maria in the movie version of "West Side Story."

"That was my favorite picture with her," said Pam Mitchell, 26, of Washington, D.C., who visited Miss Wood's grave a week before the anniversary of her death. "I was very devastated when I heard she died. She was so young."

Again this Christmas season, millions of television viewers will see a 9-year-old Natalie Wood test the credibility of Santa Claus in the classic "Miracle on 34th Street."

"It's so mysterious to see her on film after she's gone," said Miss Andersen. "Life is so brief. It's still very sad."

The loss is still very traumatic for Wagner, who declined to comment on the unhappy anniversary through his publicist George Kirvey. There were no plans for a public memorial.

Wagner cares for Natasha Gregson, 16, Miss Wood's daughter from her marriage to English producer Richard Gregson, and Courtney Brooke, 12, whom she had with Wagner after they married a second time in 1972. Their first five-year marriage ended in 1965.

Wagner's daughter, Katherine, 22, who was born when he was married to dancer Maria Marshall, is working for her father's production com-

pany RJ Productions, Kirvey said. "All the kids are at home exactly like Natalie wanted them to be," Kirvey said.

Miss Wood left the bulk of an estate estimated in the millions of dollars to Wagner and her daughters.

After her death, Wagner gave the yacht "Splendor" to the Sea Scouts and he sold their rambling Beverly Hills home and moved to a Sunset Boulevard estate with the girls, Kirvey said.

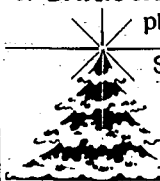
Wagner, who starred in the "Hart to Hart" television series and is now working on two TV movies, "The Samantha Smith Story" and an untitled film with Audrey Hepburn, has been linked romantically to actress Jill St. John.

"They don't live together, but they don't see other people," Kirvey said.

Wagner and the three girls are expected to attend ceremonies on Feb. 1 when the Hollywood Chamber of Commerce will honor Miss Wood with a star in the Walk of Fame.

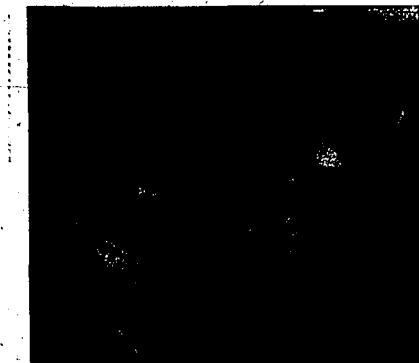

# Unemployed trucker ready to leave on trip to aid poor in Guatemala

UNIONTOWN, Ohio (AP) — Santa Claus isn't due for a month, but Elton Blair sets off today in his own version of a sleigh with reindeer.

It is a tractor-trailer rig that he will drive more than 3,000 miles to deliver food, medical supplies and toys to poor families in the hinterlands of Guatemala.

While other homes were being spruced up for Thanksgiving this week, the unemployed truck driver and his wife, Carmel, were happy with as much clutter as possible in theirs.

Boxes upon boxes of donated goods were stacked, especially in the garage, as Blair loaded his rig for what has become his annual pilgrimage to Central America.

Blair, 56, said the trip from this small northeastern Ohio community across Mexico to Guatemala City should take about two weeks.

There, he will again meet missionary Frank Waggoner, whose Guatemalan Evangelical Ministries works to help people at missions throughout the country.

A doctor who supports his venture recently paid the major amount of the cost of the truck and 40-foot trailer, and Blair is trying to pay off about a \$4,000 balance. He also has taken a \$3,000 loan from Waggoner to meet costs of the expedition.

which this year for the first time will be a caravan with two other trucks and a car.

Blair's first trip to Guatemala, in 1980, shortly after meeting Waggoner, was to assist in the construction of dormitories.

"That's when it all started. I really cried when I went into some of those homes," he said, referring to the poverty he witnessed. He said he learned that Waggoner needed a volunteer trucker to bring donated supplies, and the next year he made his first delivery.

His 20 years of service with a local trucking company allowed him enough time off to make trips. But the company folded in 1985.

This year, he went to work for a New Jersey-based trucking company, but he quit about two weeks ago because his four months on the job meant he hadn't accumulated enough vacation time for this year's trip.

"This is more important," said Blair, a devout Christian. "You do the Lord's work, and the Lord will bless you."

Now that he's not constrained by the time limits of a vacation, he plans to return home sometime in December, and then hopes to make a living as an independent trucker.

Each year the size of Blair's task

has increased, as word of his journey has spread through churches and more donations are received at his home.

Mrs. Blair, 55, said she considers it a blessing that she was laid off from her job as a production worker at a nearby factory.

"I thank God I have been laid off, because this is the biggest truckload we've had, and there's so much to do," she said.

Blair's most frustrating experience on his lengthy trek always comes when he attempts to enter Mexico on the southbound journey. He said last year he was forced to wait a week, then had to pay Mexican officials \$1,400 in order to continue.

"I don't think it's right. We shouldn't have to pay anything. None of this is for profit," he said.

# Gorbachev plugs 'Star Peace' in India

NEW DELHI, India (AP) — The world may be destroyed by a quirk of ego, ambition or "political thickheadedness" if the United States pursues its space-based defense program, Mikhail S. Gorbachev said Thursday.

"Star Peace, not Star Wars" is needed to avert nuclear apocalypse, he said.

He also urged the United States to negotiate with the Kremlin on demilitarizing the Indian Ocean and strategic sea routes.

Addressing a special joint session of Parliament, he declared himself ready for negotiations "at any time" to reduce naval forces in the Indian Ocean and provide warning of military exercises in the region.

In addition, Gorbachev suggested an international agreement guaranteeing the safety of the Persian Gulf and the Straits of Hormuz and Malacca.

All his speeches since arriving on Tuesday have projected his government as a peacemaker whose disarmament proposals have been blocked by American militarism.

His trip to India, a Soviet ally for decades, is the 55-year-old leader's first to a Third World nation since he took over in March 1985.

Addressing the disarmament issue in his remarks to Parliament, he appealed to Washington to give up the Strategic Defense Initiative space research program, commonly called

Star Wars, and agree to bilateral reductions in nuclear missiles and strategic arsenals.

At a banquet later, he said: "Whatever differences divide the East and the West, the North and the South, there is one common concern that is uppermost in the minds of all nations and peoples: In the nuclear and space age, they will either survive or perish together."

"We must not allow anyone's imperial ambitions, nationalistic egotism, political thickheadedness or adventurism to plunge our civilization into the black hole."

Lawmakers repeatedly cheered Gorbachev during the 30-minute address, the first ever broadcast live from Parliament.

The Soviet Union announced its largest credit package to India on Thursday, pledging 15 billion rubles (\$1.2 billion) to finance four giant hydroelectric, coal, steel and oil exploration projects. The money is repayable over 17 years at 2.5 percent interest.

In Parliament, Gorbachev proposed a "Star Peace" program for the exploration and use of outer space by developing nations. He suggested that India, which has sent satellites into orbit with its own rockets, sponsor a research and training center for the program.

"It is our profound conviction that space, this common property of mankind, should be exclusively peaceful and that what we need is Star Peace, not Star Wars," he said.

Gorbachev added a new factor to the Soviet argument Thursday by claiming the Star Wars program amounts to nuclear colonialism with which the Americans want to "dictate to other nations how they should live but also want to increase their (gross) national product by impoverishing others."

Pledging to work to save the world's people "from nuclear apocalypse," Gorbachev told the Indian lawmakers: "Only the elimination of nuclear arms, a ban on space weapons, the destruction of chemical weapons and the principle of sufficiency in defense needs would provide the necessary resources for improving the life of nations."

He and Prime Minister Rajiv Gandhi signed a joint declaration earlier Thursday endorsing the principle of complete nuclear disarmament by the end of the century.

# Injured man found on volcanic island

TOKYO (AP) — Police on Thursday found a feeble 66-year-old man with a broken hip on Oshima Island, six days after a volcanic eruption forced the rest of the island's inhabitants to flee, a Tokyo official said.

The Central Meteorological Agency said volcanic Mount Mibara has remained silent for four days. Only light smoke was seen coming from the mountain Thursday.

Agency officials said, however,

that underwater volcanic activity around the island was still expected.

The Tokyo municipal government official who spoke on condition of anonymity, said Bunjiro Tansaki, who lives alone in a house away from the island's main road, had been left behind in the evacuation of more than 11,000 people last Friday and Saturday. The official said Tansaki had broken his hip in an accident unrelated to the eruption.

# Role of mothers vital, pope tells Australians

MELBOURNE, Australia (AP) — Pope John Paul II said Thursday that a woman's role as mother is vital and called for more freedom for working women to pursue motherhood.

"Society can take credit when it enables mothers to devote time to their children," said the pope on the fourth day of his six-day visit to Australia.

Speaking on the island state of Tasmania before flying to this southeastern city, the pontiff said, "The mother's role needs to be socially re-evaluated" because raising children demands "much time and love."

In his speech at a church-run training center for unemployed youths in Hobart, the Tasmanian capital, John Paul said the "freedom of women as mothers must be clearly protected."

When, the pope said, "should be able to exercise their gifts and abilities in various forms of employment, but at the same time due respect must be given to their obligations and aspirations."

"Work should be so structured

that women do not have to bargain for their advancement at the expense of their own dignity or at the expense of their vital role inside the family," the pope said.

Vatican spokesman Joaquin Navarro said he believed the pope was referring to situations in which women might be discriminated against by their employer because they were pregnant and might have to bargain to keep their job or maintain their position.

This appeared to be a reference to a suggestion the pope has made in the past that mothers be compensated for staying at home.

The pope is on a two-week tour of Asian and Pacific countries that has included stops in Bangladesh, Singapore, Fiji, and New Zealand. He is scheduled to stop in the Seychelles before returning to Rome on Dec. 1.

He spent seven hours in Tasmania, also celebrating an open-air Mass at a race track for about 20,000 people.

In Melbourne, he took part in an ecumenical prayer service attended by 120,000 people at a cricket stadium.

# West Germany expels Syrians, freezes aid

BONN, West Germany (AP) — The West German government said Thursday it would expel five Syrian diplomats and freeze nearly \$28 million in aid to punish Syria for its alleged involvement in a terrorist attack in West Berlin.

In West Berlin, the Allied Command said it ordered the expulsion of some Syrians from the Soviet sector of the divided city. The command did not identify those ordered expelled.

The actions came one day after a West Berlin court convicted two Palestinians in the March 29 bombing of the German-Arab Friendship Society in West Berlin. The blast injured nine people. The court found that Syria helped plot the attack.

Syria has denied involvement in this or other terrorist attacks.

The West German government held Syria responsible and condemned "the participation of Syrian

authorities in attacks against installations on German soil," government spokesman Friedhelm Ost said in a statement issued in Bonn.

In Washington, State Department spokesman Michael Kraft said the United States considered the messages taken by West Germany appropriate.

"We will be consulting with our allies on additional steps to make clear that Syria's support for international terrorism is unacceptable," he said.

Britain last month severed diplomatic relations with Syria after saying it had proof the Arab nation was involved in the attempted bombing of an Israeli airliner in London in April.

Ost said West Germany would give the Syrian Embassy in Bonn the names of three diplomats to be expelled. He did not name them but said they must leave within a week.

# Ketchum supports alternative to riprapping

**KETCHUM** — The Ketchum City Council is discussing the possibility of a new ordinance to protect the Big Wood River after proponents of a plan to manage the river presented some alternatives to what they termed "damaging" effects of current river management techniques.

At a work session earlier this week, County Planning Director Ed Nigbor presented a preliminary study done by hydrologist Donald Reichmuth of Bozeman, Mont. The study outlines placement of small "drop structures" to slow the flow of the river and control the movement of gravel, the two

factors in erosion of the river bank. Nigbor said the most alterations to the river are done by "riprapping," where rock and other materials are piled at the river's edge to slow erosion of the banks.

"We are finding that riprap does do damage downstream, increasing the velocity and destroying fish and bank habitat," Nigbor said.

Nigbor said the riprapping was a "band-aid solution," and he supports Reichmuth's plan to build 14-foot-high rock dams at strategic points to promote a slower flow and help catch some of the gravel that is scouring the river bottom and banks.

Nigbor said acceptance of the plan would involve educating property owners and

developers about the damaging effects of riprapping and revamping the city ordinance to provide specific guidelines and penalties. The current penalty for illegal riprapping is a misdemeanor with a maximum fine of \$300 per day.

Bruce Linn, president of Friends of the Big Wood River, said the plan would have a positive effect on the river.

"This is the best chance we have ever had. There would be a great deal of improvement to the ecology of the river," he said.

Nigbor said funding for the \$1.5 million project that would manage the river from north of Ketchum to Bellevue would be the next step toward a comprehensive master plan. He added that the cost would be less

than that of current river management techniques.

The only controversy among council members and those in attendance came as a result of who they thought should pay for the project, some feeling the property owners who have built in the flood plain should bear the brunt of the cost.

"The river is a community resource and we would like to avoid an adversary relationship," said Councilwoman Susan Orb.

Councilman Larry Young added that city involvement would be a good idea in the light of long-range planning and management of the river.

"The dollars are minimal when you look 10

years down the road," he said.

City Administrator Jim Jaquet said options for funding included private funding by property owners, a limited improvement district or a possible bond election.

The council unanimously supported the preliminary plan and, though no official action was taken, names were taken from interested citizens to form a subcommittee to discuss the writing of a new ordinance to protect the river.

Mayor Jerry Selfritt said persons interested in participating in any number of the meetings should contact any member of the council or City Hall. No meeting date has been set.

## 'Christmas in City Park' starts Sunday

**TWIN FALLS** — City Park will glow Sunday with the traditional lights of Christmas, as the first in a series of four "Christmas in City Park" ceremonies is staged.

A choir of about 100 children, representing various Twin Falls churches, will perform the first Advent candle will be lit; and lights that have already been hung in the park's trees will be turned on.

Dr. John Parish of the First Christian Church will light the first Advent candle and provide a scripture reading. Burt Huih, accompanied by Teddy Snow on the piano, will give a solo performance.

The Friends of Hospice have placed a memorial tree in the City Park, which will have at its base a listing of the deceased loved ones of various contributors to the group. A memorial meditation for the tree will be given by Jerome Episcopalian Dick Goetsch as part of this Sunday's service.

At the end of the service, four children will leave the choir and perform the tree-lighting. Holding flashlights, the children will carry the "flame" from the Advent candle to each tree in the park, which will be lit when touched by the children's flashlights.

This Sunday's ceremony will be the first, followed by ceremonies on the next three Sundays. Each ceremony will begin at 5 p.m. at the bandshell and should last no longer than a half-hour, said spokeswoman Joan Brawley.

An Advent candle will be lit each Sunday, with one pastor from each of the four churches on the corners of the park speaking each time. Father Gould of St. Edward's Catholic Church will speak on Dec. 7, Donald Nienhuis of the Reformed Church will speak on the 14th, and Rev. Tom Tucker of the Methodist Church will speak on the 21st.

Entertainment for the four ceremonies will be provided by groups such as the Bell Choir of the First Baptist Church, the Golden Moments, the Twin Falls High School Chamber Singers, the Magic Valley Chorale and the Maglehorns.

The last ceremony will conclude with a visit from Santa, who will distribute candy among the crowd.

This is the second year for Christmas in City Park. Approximately 200 people attended each ceremony last year, Brawley said. She added that more may attend this year due to warmer weather.

A Nativity scene will be lit on the third Sunday, Dec. 14. Three 4-foot-by-8-foot plywood Christmas cards have been designed and decorated by various women's groups to further enhance the decor of the park, Brawley said.

Expansion for next year's event may include a Santa Claus scene, she said.

There have been few problems with vandalism, she said. "There seems to be a real respect for our effort. The only problem we've had is the squirrels chewing on the electrical cords," she said.

Christmas in City Park is funded by the city, with the help of many volunteers, she said. The committee in charge of organizing the event is a branch of the Parks and Recreation Department.

## Educators present Andrus with tax 'floor' for districts

**TWIN FALLS** — Boise school children should not be getting more money for their schools than Twin Falls simply because they live in Boise, a group of educators and school board members told the new governor-elect on Monday.

Twin Falls School Superintendent Carl Snow and School Trustee Steve Tolman, along with four other superintendents, met with Governor Cecil Andrus to lobby for a change in the way school districts are funded through the state.

And Tolman said on Wednesday that the meeting went well.

"We were very encouraged," Tolman said. "I think the new governor is legitimately concerned about the state of education in Idaho, and I think he's going to try and fund as much as he can."

Twin Falls School District, among others, have been arguing for a year about the inequities in the state funding formula for education. Because property values are higher in Boise than in Twin Falls, Boise School District is able to tax at a lower rate and receive more money.

As a result, Tolman said, Boise schools receive \$13,000 more for a classroom funding unit than does Twin Falls. The Twin Falls school district received \$43 million in total just asking the question, "Why should a student's funding for education be determined by where he lives?"

"When you've got that kind of disparity between Twin Falls and Boise, something is not right,"

Tolman said.

To correct the situation and bring more than half the 116 school districts up to a minimum level of funding, the superintendents of Twin Falls, Pocatello, Meridian, Orofino and Kuna are proposing a floor.

"You've got to have a floor, a minimum amount for all districts," Tolman said.

To bring poorer school districts in line, the proposal is to require the state to fund them at a level equaling 82.5 percent of Boise School District's amount, Tolman said. The change could mean an additional \$1.4 million for Twin Falls schools, he said.

"What we're proposing is that out of the new money available for education, use that to reach the floor," Tolman said. He estimated the state would need between \$14 million to \$16 million to bring about 50 school districts up to a minimum level. An amount he said was "realistic."

Tolman said they expect a fight in the Legislature with Boise, Blaine County, Lewiston and Coeur d'Alene school officials.

"We've tried to go through the rest of the state and form a coalition, and then rally our own lawmakers," Tolman said. "It's going to be a tough fight, but we're just asking the question, 'Why should a student's funding for education be determined by where he lives?'"

The answer, said Tolman, "is that it's not equitable."

## State gets tough on cattle disease

### Takes vaccination law violators to court

**BOISE** — After three years of gentle persuasion, the Idaho Department of Agriculture is toughening its enforcement of new brucellosis laws, in an effort to eradicate the livestock disease.

Two Idaho cattle dealers have been sentenced in the past week to fines and probation, after the state agency charged them in court with keeping unvaccinated cattle, allegedly in defiance of a 1983 law.

"The first ones we've taken to court on the vaccination laws," said Dr. W. Greg Nelson, Idaho state veterinarian and head of the department's Division of Animal Industries. "We felt they really ran over the top of the law."

Idaho author John Spokane was fined \$9,000 last Friday in federal court for purchasing nine head of untagged cattle, tagging them to appear vaccinated against brucellosis and selling them at an auction yard in southwestern Idaho.

"Idaho author John Spokane developed the case, but passed it over to the U.S. Department of Agriculture for prosecution, Nelson said.

Mike Bott, a Rupert-area dealer, also was fined \$1,000, with \$450 suspended, and was placed on 24-month probation in Idaho's 25th District Court. Bott said he delayed taking a heifer to slaughter for about two months, until it delivered a calf. The heifer had showed no evidence of vaccination, he said.

Nelson said Bott had purchased an untagged heifer under the cover of a slaughter, as it goes immediately to slaughter, as required by law. When the animal did not show up at the packinghouse, the state investigated.

Brucellosis is an infectious disease that can cause undulant fever in humans and abortions in cattle. Undulant fever can be contracted from unpasteurized milk produced by diseased cows, but pasteurization kills the brucellosis bacteria.

The disease can be prevented by vaccinating cattle within a year of birth, Nelson said. Once treated,

each animal is given an identifying ear tag and an ear tattoo as proof of vaccination.

Until July 1, 1983, unvaccinated cattle could be shipped to feedlots but could not be used for breeding. However, the new law now demands that all untreated cattle be slaughtered.

The state has not taken any cases to court until recently. "We feel that you have to give the industry a certain amount of time to educate them (livestock producers)," Nelson said.

The agency now is taking a tougher stance with ranchers, dairy producers or cattle traders who resist. "When it gets to be a blatant violation of the law, yeah, we're going after them," he warned.

The state is homing in on many apparent violations now. "We've got a number of tracers on animals that appear to be diverted (from slaughter) and we're looking for them," he said. The cases normally are turned over to county prosecutors for action.

But the agency hopes to eliminate brucellosis in Idaho within 18 months. The numbers of herds known to be infected with the disease has dropped to three, two of which are in the Magic Valley. The last outbreak was in 1976, and the state has been clean since then. Herds that show the disease are quarantined and tested frequently. All animals must be free of brucellosis for 120 days before considered healthy again, Nelson said.

The disease sometimes can be cleared up by testing steadily over a milking herd owned by Hugo and Mary Goedhart of Jerome was about to be declared healthy by state officials recently when one cow showed a positive test, said Mary Goedhart.

"This would have been our last test," she said. Now, the entire herd must undergo another 120 days of quarantine.

Neither the Goedharts nor the state know where the herd picked up the disease, although "it could have been picked up through the sale yard," she suggested.

## More motions filed pending Birmingham trial Dec. 15

**BOISE** — Several motions have been filed in the U.S. federal court in Boise in the grand jury indictment of Twin Falls police commander Pat Birmingham.

The motions will require a ruling from the court prior to the trial now set for Dec. 15.

Birmingham is charged with a felony of making false statements on expense vouchers while appearing as a witness in a federal court trial last May in Boise.

A defense motion for dismissal of the indictment was denied late last month by U.S. District Judge Harold L. Ryan. At the same time, the judge also denied the officer's request for evidentiary hearing covering an agreement between Twin Falls officials and U.S. Attorney Maurice Ellsworth to handle the matter without prosecution.

Another motion, filed by a U.S. attorney in Boise, asks for exclusion of details of that agreement during arguments before the jury during the upcoming trial. The agreement was made shortly after another Twin Falls officer, Howard Elliott, alerted the U.S. attorney's office to

the alleged irregularities in the expense voucher. The agreement stipulates that if certain reimbursements were invoked by the city of Twin Falls, there would not be a prosecution in the matter.

The defense attorneys responded to the motion for exclusion by saying that the basis of the indictment is an alleged violation of the agreement. Defense attorneys James May of Twin Falls and Thomas A. McCabe of Boise want the details of the agreement argued before the jury. They have said that Birmingham and detective Don Walden, who were suspended as a result of the agreement, were called back to work by Public Safety Director Tim Qualls with approval of the city manager before the full 30 days suspension had been completed. Because the prosecution says terms of the agreement were not met, a grand jury investigation was called and an indictment was filed against Birmingham, the defense has said.

The defense's opposition to the motion says that because the court refused to give the defendant a requested evidentiary hearing, Birmingham was prohibited from developing the evidentiary record on the major issue.

Birmingham allegedly listed \$130 in expenses for overnight expenses although he drove from Boise back to Twin Falls each night of the trial in which he was a witness. Under terms of the agreement, he is paying about \$3,000 through suspension without pay and reduction of salary.

Records in the case filed in the U.S. District Court clerk's office show that the defense contends that during the grand jury testimony, which is closed even to other witnesses, Qualls was asked by the jury foreman if he had suspended Birmingham and another officer from May 28 to June 4. The defense argues that the question was asked prior to any mention of suspension or agreement by the witness, although Qualls was the only witness to mention such issues.

The dismissal request by the defense was based largely on the basis of agreement between Qualls and Ellsworth. Terms of the agreement called for a 30-day suspension without pay; reduction of two salary steps; a guarantee of no retaliation against Elliott, who reported the alleged irregularities to the U.S. attorney's office, and that a letter of

# Judge says lawsuit should be dropped

**PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)** — A federal magistrate says a \$50 million lawsuit filed against the Rajneeshes by street people recruited to the sect's commune in 1984 should be dismissed.

U.S. Magistrate George E. Juba has ruled that plaintiffs in the suit failed to meet court deadlines and did not respond to defendants' motions to dismiss the suit.

In fact, Juba said, "There has been no activity initiated by the plaintiffs in over a year."

The plaintiffs should be required to pay the attorney fees for Rajneesh Humankind Trust, lead defendant in the suit, the magistrate said. He gave the trust's lawyer, Henry Kantor of Portland, 10 days to submit a fees request.

Juba's recommendation, which was made Tuesday, is subject to final approval by a U.S. District Court judge.

The lawsuit is believed to be the last remaining federal court lawsuit involving the Rajneeshes.

reprimand be placed in Bermingham's work file.

The defense argues that the agreement has not been met since Bermingham has been suspended 30 days, had a salary cut and a letter placed in his file. However, he was initially suspended for two weeks, the agreement was completed the remaining two weeks.

The prosecution contends there has been almost "total non-compliance" in the matter on the part of Qualls, and therefore the charge was filed following the grand jury indictment.

Ryan's order denying dismissal said even if the court accepted that Bermingham was a "third party" to the agreement, dismissal of the charge is not in order since Qualls negotiated, then breached, the agreement.

Ryan said testimony before the grand jury indicated that Bermingham was not suspended for the full 30 days immediately following the agreement and that the pay cuts were not made as of the end of the 30-day suspension period.

Ryan further said that while the officers were called back to work before the 30 days were completed because of a manpower shortage at the department, Bermingham was immediately allowed to attend a one- to two-week seminar in Chicago.

At the time the officers were called back to work, Qualls pointed out there were no specific dates for the suspension listed in the agreement and said that the remaining two weeks suspension would be completed as soon as all injured officers were back at work and the manpower shortage eased.

Ted Sturgill, a Kimberly rancher whose beef herd was victimized by brucellosis recently, said Wednesday that his cows apparently mixed with diseased animals on the range. His cows apparently mixed with diseased animals on the range, Sturgill said. State officials have quarantined the herd and checked the animals since the disease was discovered.

"They keep coming up with cattle that's infected," Sturgill said. It has affected the size of his herd significantly, depriving him of both the slaughtered animals and the offspring he and his wife produced.

"They're (the state agency) working very well with me, but I do think they are overlooking some other areas somewhere, where cattle get mixed out there," he said.

A meatpacker this week paid Sturgill \$250 each for two heifers from the diseased herd. If they had come from an undiseased herd, they would have brought \$550-\$600.

The price difference is one reason why producers evade the law, Nelson said. They can make at least \$200 a head and possibly get a calf from an unvaccinated heifer, as well.

Idaho is trying to join Montana, Wyoming and Utah as a brucellosis-free state, Nelson said. Other Northwest states that still are battling the disease are Washington, Oregon and Nevada, he said.

# Heroic rescue brings help for homeless couple in Portland

PORTLAND (AP) — A heroic act has generated help for an unemployed and homeless man who was living with his pregnant girlfriend under a city bridge.

David L. Ross helped pull an unconscious woman from a burning car on the downtown Hawthorne Bridge over the Willamette River last week.

"It was just an instantaneous thing," Ross said. "The car was burning. She was incapacitated. There was no confrontation of what was

right and what was wrong." Timothy L. Gallagher, director of the city's Bureau of Community Development, witnessed the accident that injured the woman. Gallagher and his wife were driving across the bridge in heavy rain Nov. 20 behind the woman's car.

She was not driving fast, but suddenly her car swerved sharply, hit the side of the bridge, then bounced from one side of the bridge to the other as many as five times before it slammed head-on into a bridge sup-

port. It burst into flames immediately, Gallagher said.

Gallagher jumped out of his car and ran to help. At the same time, Ross appeared, dodging traffic, from the other side of the bridge.

Flames were coming from underneath the car on the driver's side, and when the two men went to the passenger door, they found it locked. They returned to the driver's door, which was jammed, but Ross pulled it open. The two men carefully

She was home after three days in the hospital, grateful to Gallagher and Ross and pleased to be in relatively good shape.

The quick response by Ross impressed Gallagher, whose job involves city programs for the homeless.

"In my job, I'm faced all the time with the stereotypes that get associated with homeless people," he said. "But there are thousands of people in this town who are only a paycheck or two away from that."

"David is a paycheck or two on the other side. And he risked his life to pull someone out of a car like that — someone of another socioeconomic group — just as anyone would do."

After the accident, Gallagher wanted to help Ross but couldn't locate him immediately. Gallagher

finally found him through Burnsade Projects Inc., an agency for the homeless which Ross used as a mail drop.

Ross had been out of work for six weeks when Gallagher called him. He most recently worked on the carnival circuit with his girlfriend and before that he butchered fish.

When the last carnival job ended, the couple lived in cheap motels. Then the money ran out. Their last home was under the Sellwood Bridge south of downtown.

## Hatch says president acted right

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — President Reagan acted forthrightly in appointing an unbiased panel to review "rogue-National Security Council members" who allegedly funneled money from the Iranian arms deals to the Nicaraguan Contras, said Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah.

At a news conference Wednesday night, before spending Thanksgiving with relatives in Newton, Hatch said, "It appears Oliver North circumvented focal point procedures set up to prevent a misuse of power by any agency of government."

Hatch said he hopes the president will continue to pursue the foreign policy objectives involved in the controversy.

"The objective of creating a more moderate faction to succeed Khomeini in Iran is certainly legitimate, getting our hostages back also is a legitimate concern, as is helping our freedom fighters in Nicaragua."

"We do have to make sure, though, that no one goes around the law to achieve these objectives," he said.

Hatch said diverting the money to the Contras was an error of judgment.

He said North is "a fine person, a patriotic man who worked 16 hours a day and really believes in what he's been doing. I know this man had good intentions, but that does not justify going against procedures."

Asked about U.S. policy against dealing with terrorist states, Hatch said transferring military equipment solely to Iran to get American hostages released would be a bad foreign policy decision.

"The real goal here, however, was establishing a friendlier relationship with Iran, because if we let the Russians exploit the Persian Gulf, we could have World War III," he said.

Asked about the switch to a Democratic-controlled Senate, Hatch said, "It will hurt because western committee chairmen have been much more fair to the eastern states than vice versa, and Utah is very dependent upon government work."

## 300 families receive help for holiday

LOGAN, Utah (AP) — Nearly 300 needy Cache Valley families received Thanksgiving food baskets through a Share With The Hungry program.

Gail Yost, coordinator of the community food bank for the Bear River Association of Governments, said Wednesday the program was spearheaded by the Utah State University Volunteers Office with help from BRAG and the Voluntary Action Center.

"We had about 60 families come in unexpectedly for help on Wednesday, so we had to scramble to get turkeys and a lot of the other needed foods," she said.

"Donations from individuals, churches and businesses far exceeded our expectations this year," she said.

Mrs. Yost said more than 50 cases of canned goods were contributed to the program and "that will leave us some to help replenish the food bank, which was down to five cans of fruit and two cans of soup."

The community food bank provides families with food in emergency cases only, and Mrs. Yost said, "We have been feeding the equivalent of a family of 20 on a year-round basis."

She said BRAG expects to see more people needing food this year, because the number of families getting Thanksgiving baskets was up more than 30 percent.

## Crash kills Utahn

CHEYENNE, Wyo. (AP) — A Utah man died and three Utah residents were injured Wednesday after they were thrown from the car they were riding in as it rolled over on Interstate 80 about 40 miles east of Evanston, according to the Wyoming Highway Patrol.

A patrol spokesman said Vernon Hymer, 49, of Tootie, Utah, died at the scene of the afternoon accident.

Injured in the accident were passengers Michelle Hymer, 14, Betty Price, 37, and William Price, 9, all of Tootie.

## New board runs United First

**BOISE (AP)** — The Federal Savings and Loan Insurance Corp. and the Federal Home Loan Bank of Seattle have dissolved the board of directors of United First Federal Savings and Loan Association and replaced it with a new board.

The reorganization announced Tuesday came as part of a planned transfer of management responsibilities that began earlier this year when federal regulators stepped in to help financially troubled United First Federal, Federal Home Loan Bank spokeswoman Linda Pomerantz said. The top-level change will not affect depositors or borrowers of the association, Pomerantz and bank officials assured.

"The changes at United First will not cause any disruption of business," Pomerantz read from a prepared statement. "All deposits continue to be insured by the FDIC to the full amount of \$100,000, and United continues to have ample liquidity to meet all its obligations."

United First, the state's largest savings and loan association, operates 15 branches, including three at Twin Falls, Jerome and Burley.

Jeff Harris, assistant vice president and manager of the Twin Falls branch, said Wednesday morning the office was conducting business as usual and had no unusual activity from depositors. "Everything is perfectly normal and I don't expect any difference," he said late in the day.

Regulators moved to help United First in March after its net worth fell below the government's standard of 3 percent of assets. Pomerantz and others said Tuesday that they did not know what United First Federal's net worth is now, but Sheehyoff Rating Services Inc., a Texas firm, said the figure was a negative 6.4 percent at the end of June.

The new board consists of Chairman Robert Hansberger, president of Futura Corp. and a founder of Boise Cascade Corp.; Winston Moore, a Boise developer; John Clute, a senior vice president and general counsel of Boise Cascade; Steve Swanson, owner of Swanson Investments, Boise; and Elliot Knutson, chairman and chief executive officer of Seattle-based Washington Federal Savings and Loan Association.

Peter O'Neill, a Boise businessman and member of the original board, will remain as an advisory member, Pomerantz said.

The old board had consisted of: O'Neill; Joseph

Glaesyer, managing officer of United First and president of United First Security Co., a subsidiary; and Richard Forney, Boise.

Pomerantz said the new board named Robert Link as president and chief executive officer. Link moves up from vice president and chief lending officer to replace Glaesyer, who resigned all of his positions.

Washington Federal brought in to act as a management consultant in March, will continue in its role, Pomerantz said. Washington Federal's Knutson in October confirmed rumors that it was interested in acquiring United First Federal.

Pomerantz said United First still is "experiencing some losses," but its financial situation "generally has been stabilized." It still has unresolved problems, she said, but would not elaborate.

Like other financial institutions in Idaho, United First has been plagued by large numbers of problem loans. In a move that received widespread attention two months ago, United First and Fruiland-based Treasure Valley Bank put 27 McCall-area properties up for public auction.

## Leader of insider case enters plea of guilty

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Michael N. David, the ringleader in the "Yuppie Five" insider trading case, pleaded guilty to securities fraud and conspiracy Wednesday.

Meanwhile, the man whose cooperation with investigators led to David's indictment was sentenced to a year's probation and fined \$10,000.

David, a former associate at the prominent law firm of Paul, Weiss, Rifkin, Wharton & Garrison, pleaded guilty to one count each of conspiracy to commit securities fraud, mail fraud, securities fraud and obstruction of justice.

David, 28, faces a maximum penalty of five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine on each count when he is sentenced by U.S. District Judge John P. Keenan in March.

David, who is free on \$25,000 bond, would not comment to reporters about entering his guilty plea, but his attorney, Darrell Fennell, issued a statement that said David "deeply regrets his misconduct and the damage he has done to others, especially his family."

David was the central figure in a

ring of four young Wall Street professionals and a client of one of them who used non-public information that David stole from his former employers to trade on securities involved in six proposed or anticipated corporate takeovers.

The case has nothing to do with investigations of insider trading by Ivan F. Boesky and Dennis B. Levine, officials said.

In return for his guilty plea, federal prosecutors agreed to drop the remaining charges in an 18-count indictment returned against David.

David had agreed to cooperate fully in the government's continuing investigation, his lawyer's statement said.

Indicted with David, were Wall Street securities analysts, Andrew Solomon, 27, and Robert Salburg, 27; stockbroker Marton Shapiro, 24; and Daniel J. Silverman, 23, a client of Shapiro's. They pleaded guilty to various charges in June.

Shortly after David pleaded guilty, Solomon was sentenced to one year on probation, 250 hours of community service and fined \$10,000. The

former arbitrage analyst at Marcus Schloss & Co. had faced up to five years in prison and a \$250,000 fine for one count of securities fraud.

"You honor I was wrong. I should not have done what I did," a tearful Solomon told U.S. District Judge Gerald L. Goettel before sentencing.

His lawyer, John Siffert, asked Goettel not to sentence Solomon to prison because he cooperated with investigators and because he made no money from the insider deals, which he hoped would make him "a star at Marcus Schloss."

The lawyer claimed Solomon informed his superiors about the insider trading with David, a claim the securities firm has denied.

Assistant U.S. Attorney Steven M. Kaplan asked Goettel to consider Solomon's cooperation, saying Solomon agreed to wear a tape recorder and meet with the others "so that a discussion of their criminal enterprise could be recorded."

Kaplan said the tape of David urging Solomon to file to the SEC about the insider trading scheme was "invaluable in the government's case."

## Montana rail route has 'for sale' tag

**MISSOULA, Mont. (AP)** — Burlington Northern Inc. is trying to sell its main line across much of southern Montana, railroad officials say.

The railroad wants to sell the line, which runs from Laurel through Livingston, Bozeman, Helena and Missoula to Sandpoint, Idaho, as a "short line" so that rail service would continue.

The railroad makes a profit on the 450-mile stretch of track, but BN says it is of marginal value because of competition from trucks and high labor costs, according to BN spokesman Howard Kallio in Seattle.

"In 1985, if we had taken all our income and bought Treasury bills, we would have done better," Kallio said.

"When you're required to have five people when you only need two, it's a matter of survival," Kallio said.

"When you can sell a line and still maintain part of the traffic, it just makes economic sense."

"It's a bitter pill, but it's no different than what's happening in other industries," he added.

The southern line, once the route of Northern Pacific Railroad's passenger train before BN was created in a merger, has been carrying only local traffic this week because of a derailment Sunday that severely damaged a railroad bridge near Columbus, Kallio said.

BN Railroad is one of five sub-

sidaries of BN Inc. operating in Montana. It has about 4,600 employees in the state and a total payroll of about \$200 million.

If the Laurel-to-Sandpoint line were sold, about 500 union workers would be affected, according to Karl Knutsen, general chairman of the Brotherhood of Maintenance-of-Way Employees in Minneapolis, which represents many of the workers.

Knutsen said the union workers would have to choose between exercising their seniority to move to other jobs elsewhere on the BN system or work for the new short line, probably at reduced pay.

BN, one of the nation's largest railroads, has 27,500 miles of track, mainly in the West and Midwest. Kallio said the railroad recently sold 1,000 miles of its 9,000 miles of short lines, including four sales this year.

The Brotherhood of Maintenance-of-Way Employees last week asked Montana Attorney General Mike Greely to stop one of those sales, the 50-mile stretch between Butte and Garrison. Greely said he has not yet talked to anyone about the request.

BMWE attorney Charles Collins of Minneapolis said until federal regulations were changed in 1980, major railroads could not sell off short lines unless the buyer could show sufficient expertise and financial backing to be able to operate the line.

"Now they can sell off the railroad to a 10-year-old if they want to," he said.

## Chesbrough-Pond evaluating offer

**WESTPORT, Conn. (AP)** — Chesbrough-Pond's Inc. says it has received an unsolicited offer from American Brands Inc. to buy the Westport-based consumer products manufacturer for \$66 a share, or about \$2.82 billion.

In a two-sentence statement Tuesday, Chesbrough-Pond's said it

had retained legal advisors to evaluate the offer.

Chesbrough-Pond's has a consumer products group and a chemical products group, which manufacture and market a wide range of agricultural and food products. American Brands, based in Green-which, is a packaged consumer goods and financial services company.

**BankAmerica**, in an escalation of its struggle to resist "First-Interstate's \$3.4 billion acquisition offer, has mailed to securities analysts a detailed internal study that raises "very serious doubts" about the offer of First Interstate's bid and its prospects for regulatory approval.

In the 18-page document, BankAmerica claims that the First Interstate offer falls \$1.1 billion to \$2 billion short of the equity capital needed to make the merger work and win approval by federal banking authorities.

The document further states that First Interstate could not raise the additional "capital" without seriously undermining its own stock value and destroying any potential benefit to shareholders of the combined companies.

A First Interstate spokesman responded Tuesday by saying that the combination would strengthen BankAmerica's capital position and

push its capital levels well above those required by federal regulators.

The First Interstate official reported that the bank's claims that BankAmerica shareholders would benefit immediately by the restoration of their common stock dividend, which was eliminated in January after BankAmerica reported a \$337 million loss for 1985. The bank has lost \$600 million so far this year.

The BankAmerica study also says that "First-Interstate's analysis of cost savings and synergies from the combination" appear to be highly exaggerated. "First Interstate has said that an outside consulting firm, which conducted a study, reported that the merger could create cost savings ranging from \$45 million to \$65 million a year within a few years after the deal is closed.

Two banking analysts said Tuesday that they received the BankAmerica document in response to questions about the proposed merger. They both said that they found the BankAmerica analysis "persuasive," agreeing that First

Interstate would likely have to strengthen its offer with cash or a new common stock issue if it is to be successful in its pursuit of BankAmerica.

BankAmerica has not formally rejected the First Interstate proposal, which was delivered last month, but has given clear signals that it does not want to merge with anyone. It plans to sell assets and streamline operations in an effort to regain profitability and remain independent.

Earlier this month, BankAmerica asked First Interstate to withdraw its proposal, but the aggressive Los Angeles banking firm refused. The offer is still pending, but BankAmerica has set no timetable for either accepting or rejecting it.

The BankAmerica board meets Monday in a regularly scheduled session, at which it may vote to reject the First Interstate bid outright. The document mailed to analysts may be part of its justification for such a decisive rejection. But BankAmerica has given no sign that it plans any action on the bid next week.

vs. independent contractor befuddling you, you're not alone. A major source of the confusion: On the federal level, there is no single definition of what an independent contractor is. Instead, problems are handled on a case-by-case basis, says Linda Deacon, a partner of the Los Angeles-based law firm Sheppard, Mullin, Richter, Hampton.

worker — to determine a worker's status.

If, for instance, you set your own work hours, rate of pay and pacing, provide your own materials and take on your own clients, chances are that you're an independent contractor. Another indicator of independent contractor: If your job entails an opportunity for profit or loss based on your performance.

"The more control an employer has over what a worker is doing, the more likely the worker is an employee," adds Deacon.

Some workers at first do not even realize that they are not considered staff employees. Even if a worker who performs the same services as an employee realizes that he is fraudulently labeled an independent contractor, he may refuse to complain for fear of losing the job.

"A company takes a big risk when it labels a worker an independent contractor when the worker is really an employee," warns Deacon. However, since there is no clear-cut definition, it depends on the aggressiveness of the state agency and the courts.

Across the nation as companies seek to cut costs, they try to create a more "flexible" labor pool. Hiring workers on a part-time, temporary or independent contracting basis is very attractive for employers. For instance, it is estimated that benefits would cost an employer about 30 percent of an employee's income. For this reason, an employer can save a lot of money by not having to add another staff employee.

Some businesses need independent contractors to handle certain jobs.

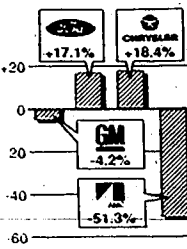
It's not unusual for a company to hire a contractor who is an independent contractor, often referred to as a free-lancer. In certain industries there's a tradition of hiring independent contractors. However, the key point is clear: Workers who are expected to perform as employees should be paid and given employee wages and benefits.

On the other hand, true independent contractors are not employees and therefore not covered by provisions of the labor laws. If your paycheck was four weeks late, or you weren't receiving overtime, you would not have the rights of a staff employee.

Independent contractors are not covered by the company insurance plan, nor entitled to profit-sharing or pension benefits. Also, you would not be covered by unemployment in-

## Domestic car sales improving

**DETROIT** — Domestic car sales rose 6.4 percent in mid-November despite declining sales by industry leader General Motors, the eight U.S. auto manufacturers reported Tuesday.

The domestic automakers said that they sold 196,159 cars in the November 11-20 period, up from 184,327 in the comparable 1985 period.

Ford and Chrysler posted healthy gains, up 17.1 percent and 18.4 percent, respectively, while GM's sales were off 4.2 percent.

Industry analysts said Ford and Chrysler sales were boosted by the introduction of new lines. They cited sales of Ford's Taurus and Sable models as well as Chrysler's Shadow and Sundance models.

GM's share of the domestic market slipped to 50.1 percent in mid-November from 55.7 percent a year earlier. Ford's domestic market share rose to 28.2 percent up from 25.6 percent, while Chrysler's share climbed to 14.1 percent, up from 12.7 percent.

On a seasonally adjusted basis, new cars sold at an annual rate of 6.2 million units in mid-November, up from 5.9 million a year earlier. The rate reflects the number of cars that would be sold if a period's sales pace continued for a full year.

Analysts said that they did not expect GM to introduce across-the-board incentives for buyers despite its recent sales decline. Ted Sullivan, an analyst with Chase Econometrics, said that GM's production cutback in the fourth quarter should reduce the need for incentives.

# Aeromexico jet far off course at time of mid-air collision

LONG BEACH, Calif. (AP) — The Aeromexico jetliner that crashed after it was hit by a small plane, killing 82 people, was off its assigned course by about three miles, according to federal investigators.

Flight 498 was flying east of and parallel to its assigned route, but that path actually put the DC-9 deeper into the protective airspace known as the Los Angeles Terminal Control Area, investigators told the Long Beach Press-Telegram, which published its report Thursday.

Small planes are forbidden from entering TCA airspace without the explicit permission of air traffic controllers.

Private pilot William Kramer was flying the TCA airspace when his Piper Archer hit the DC-9's tail section on Aug. 31, investigators have said.

All 64 people aboard the jet, three in the Piper and 15 people on the ground in the community of Cerritos were killed.

Although investigators' maps indicate the airliner would have avoided the collision had it followed precisely the route it was given by an air traffic controller, its flight path deviation was not viewed as a serious error, the newspaper said.

"Three miles is a little bit more than normal, but it is not unusual," said air traffic controller Karl Grundmann, who often handles the route.

"I wouldn't argue with anyone who says the plane was off course," said Richard Cox, manager of the Los Angeles Terminal Radar Approach Control.

Cox told the Press-Telegram that controllers are not ordinarily concerned if a commercial carrier is a mile or two off course, or even a mile or so, as long as it remains within the TCA, and poses no threat to other aircraft.

While it is clear that Kramer's plane flew into restricted airspace, the National Transportation Safety

Board has not released any conclusions about how the collision occurred.

Maps prepared by the NTSB show that while Flight 498 was scheduled to fly directly over a navigational point at the Armed Forces Reserve Center in Los Alamitos, it actually passed about three miles east of that point, the newspaper said.

The jet was hit by Kramer's plane about 90 seconds later, the newspaper added.

If the jet had been a couple miles further west, Kramer's plane would have crossed several miles in front of the DC-9, investigators said.

NTSB spokesman Ira Boardman said he did not know if the board would investigate Flight 498's errant path when it begins a hearing on the crash Tuesday.

Assuming the airliner was off course, the question becomes: Does it have any significance in terms of this accident and aviation procedures? Furman said.

# Glowing lava from Hawaii volcano burns 8 homes, threatens 5 more

KALAPANA, Hawaii (AP) — Eight homes were destroyed and at least five others threatened Thursday by a seven-mile river of glowing hot lava from Kilauea Volcano that seared a highway and inched toward the ocean near this coastal community.

Hawaiian elders in the area have said the eruption would not end until the lava reaches the sea. Police in Hilo, the county seat on the east coast of Hawaii Island, said the southernmost lobe of the lava flow was 450 feet from the water.

The last time lava from Kilauea

reached the sea was in 1974, several miles west of the current flow. The current eruption began in 1983.

"The eruption is still going strong," said Tom Wright, scientist in charge of the U.S. Geological Survey's Hawaiian Volcano Observatory. "There is no change in our instrument readings."

The forward edge of the flowing molten rock split into four lobes, Wright said, with the most active moving west along the coastal Kalapana Highway.

The glowing flow, covered with a thin black crust of cooled lava, reached the highway Wednesday and its more than 2,000-degree temperature set the asphalt on fire.

The area sounded like a war zone with methane gas explosions caused by overheated organic material being destroyed by the lava, said county Civil Defense officials.

The lava was pouring from a vent on the volcano's eastern flank at a rate of about 650,000 cubic yards a day, Wright said.

About 60 people were evacuated Wednesday from 17 homes in the Kapaahu Homestead area east of here before the lava reached the homes, police said.

The only injury reported was to a fireman who lost part of a finger while coupling hoses to spray water to cool the creeping molten rock, police said.

# Appeal plans bring official plenty of calls

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A barrage of critical telephone calls has rained down on Utah Attorney General David R. Wilkinson's office since he announced plans to appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court the striking down of the state's controversial cable television law.

The 1983 Cable TV Decency Act, which seeks to restrict the showing of so-called "obscene" programming on subscriber stations, has twice been rebuffed by the courts.

Most recently, the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals in Denver upheld the decision of a U.S. District Court judge who struck down the law as unconstitutional.

On Monday, however, Wilkinson said he would launch a \$75,000 battle to argue the law before the nation's highest court.

In the wake of that decision, dozens of telephone calls, overwhelmingly against his planned appeal, were logged by Wilkinson's receptionists, said Associate Deputy Attorney General Paul Warner.

Nonetheless, Warner said Wilkinson felt compelled to defend the law, just as any other statute passed by the Legislature.

Further, while the majority of those calling Wilkinson's office opposed the appeal, Warner said the office has received several petitions containing the names of hundreds of Utahns who support Wilkinson's efforts.

# Phone record clears youth

SUNNYVALE, Calif. (AP) — A telephone bill established the innocence of a physically handicapped teenager who spent more than a month in custody on charges he beat his mother to death with a lamp.

Charges against Patrick Sparks, 17, were dismissed after his brother Brad, 30, found the bill which indicated their mother was still alive when Patrick left the house for school the morning of the slaying, police said Wednesday.

Telephone records show that Patrick Sparks, 24, phoned two out-of-state relatives at 7:05 a.m. and 7:06 a.m. on Oct. 2, about a half-hour after Patrick boarded a school bus.

School officials and other witnesses said he rode the bus and did not miss reported classes that day, said Department of Public Safety Commander Alex Michaels.

"What we now believe is that Patrick Sparks is not responsible," Michaels said. "Our investigation is branching out to other areas."

The other Sparks said he found the telephone bill in a stack of his mother's mail that had been piling up at the post office.

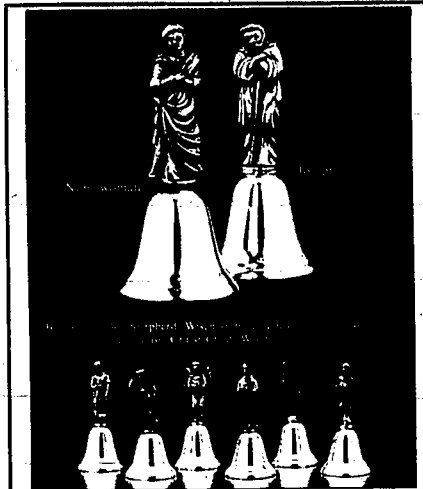

# Judge wants drug case specifics

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A federal judge has ruled that government prosecutors must provide more specific information on key charges against two defendants in a massive cocaine conspiracy case.

U.S. District Judge Bruce Jenkins' ruling came after a 2 1/2-hour hearing to consider more than 100 motions filed by defense attorneys on behalf of 25 defendants named in a 125-count federal grand jury indictment.

The indictment, handed up last month, alleges the defendants participated in a cocaine ring responsible for bringing 280 pounds of the illegal drug to Utah from South America.

Jenkins ruled on Wednesday that attorneys for David Palomiso, 24, a Peruvian accused of supplying the cocaine, and Scott L. Nichols, 30, a Salt Lake City man alleged to have organized the illicit operation, must be supplied with more specific information on the charges that the men ran a continuing criminal enterprise.

That charge carries a maximum penalty of life in prison without parole.

Fred Melos, Nichols' attorney, argued that the information was needed to determine who the government alleges conspired with the men and what criminal acts they are thought to have committed.

### Urgent Rx at BSU: Offense, and quick

BOISE — If there was a metaphor for Boise State University's hard-scrabble 1985-86 season, it was undoubtedly the 39 points the Broncos scored in a loss to Weber State last Jan. 11.

Never mind that they only allowed the Wildcats 45 points in that game. It cemented Boise State's three-year reputation as the gang that couldn't shoot straight.

That, according to Coach Bobby Dye, will change this year. "We're going to get the ball up and down the floor more than we have in the past," promises Dye, whose Broncos fell to 12-16 last year after posting winning records in Dye's first two years here. "The last two seasons, we have been a poor rebounding team. If there is any one area we have tried to beef up, it is the ability to rebound."

In truth, it was an awful rebounding team last season, averaging just 30.6 boards per game — lowest in the Big Sky Conference. That combined with a 46 percent field goal shooting average and a 68 percent free throw shooting average meant that Boise State gave up 78 more points last season than it scored, a fatal flaw in a team that specializes in defense.

So Chris Childs, the 6-3 sophomore point guard who was last year's Big Sky freshman of the year, has moved to off guard, with instructions to shoot.

"Chris thinks the coach is a great guy now," quips Dye. "Last year I told him 'look for the open man, Chris.' This year I'm saying 'shoot the ball, Chris, shoot!'"

That doesn't mean Dye has abandoned his emphasis on pressure defense: Boise State has over the last three years been the best defensive team in the league. But with an average of only 3,694 people filling the 12,000-seat Pavilion last season, BSU's three-year record against Big Sky teams dropping to 19-28 and the Broncos being picked by both the Big Sky coaches and the media to finish in the league basement, Dye is clearly looking for more horsepower.

Much of it, of course, is going to have to come from Childs, the Broncos' leading scorer last year. "He has a chance to have a real good season," says Dye, who lost last year's starting off guard Billy Perkins to an LDS mission. "Chris has beefed up a little bit, he's bigger, stronger, and he has a year of experience under his belt. ## ISU has Holston, questions

POCATELLO — How much is Donn Holston worth?

By himself, about third place in the Big Sky Conference, according to the league's other coaches in their preseason poll. There certainly aren't many other names on Idaho State University's basketball roster this season that would send opposing coaches back to their chalkboards.

But second-year Idaho State Coach Jim Boutin, who led the Bengals to their first winning season in five years last winter, says it's not quite that simple. ISU's basketball team last season owed its 15-12 finish as much to the perspiration of the unknown players as it did to the inspiration of Holston's 23-foot jump shots.

"We graduated our hardest workers in (second-team all-Big Sky point guard) Mike Graefe, (guard) Phil Rohr and (forward) Bruce Gellor," says Boutin. "Then we lost the only two people on our team who have played center (Dave Danforth and Greg Van Grouw) in a collegiate game. That hurts."

Danforth, a 6-foot-7 senior who averaged 9.8 points and 5.7 rebounds last year, blew out his knee in a pickup game last summer, effectively ending his collegiate career. Van Grouw, a 6-9 sophomore, was forced to transfer to Fresno (Calif.) City College to get his grades up.

"We have to develop a center who can make the decisions — when to step out, when to protect, when to screen out — that Dave Danforth made," says Boutin. "Defensively, we're not nearly as strong as we were a year ago because of it. The guys we got at center now (6-6 JC transfer George Davis) is a guy who would be playing forward if Danforth were still there."

Then there's the point guard position, from which Graefe dealt 149 assists last season.

"Our key is getting point guard defense equal to 80 percent of last year's commitment and determination we got from Graefe last year," Boutin says. "We need that defensive tenacity Graefe had — that kind of performance or coming close to it with pressure on the point guard would make us a good defensive team again. Our best point guard at the moment is (5-10 freshman) Mike Chatterton. He's not quick enough to play the position, but he makes all the right decisions."

Defense looms large in Boutin's assessment for good reason. The Bengals finished first in the Big Sky in team defense last season, an astonishing turnaround for a ballclub that ended up dead last under Wayne Ballard the year before. ISU also led the league in steals and picked up almost 100 more turnovers than it gave away, by far the best giveaway-to-takeaway ratio in the Big Sky.

"Our defensive rebounding scares me to death," Boutin says. "Our first three forwards are not very physical and when you don't have physical players you have to screen out our you'll be hurt drastically by teams with an aggressive rebounding philosophy."

For that reason, one of those forwards — Holston — will be moved to off guard this season, which is as close as to a license for 25 points a night as you can get in college basketball.

"We anticipate a really good season from Donn," says Boutin of his 6-5 senior, who averaged 18.7 points last year and, barring injury, will end his career among the top five scorers in Big Sky history. "He was elected team captain and is showing leadership. He's not a very verbal person, but he has taken charge. He's doing so much more than he did last fall. Now he knows what's expected of him, and he's doing it."

Boutin thinks his Bengals will improve on their 65-point scoring average of last season, which was the worst in the league.

"We jump better, we're better shooters and I think we're going to be better offensively," says Boutin, whose ballclub finished 8-6 in the Big Sky.

Curtis Webster, a 6-5 senior guard who was last year's sixth man, averaged 10.7 points in that role.

Northern Arizona — The Lumberjacks vaunted everyone flat-footed last year, lying with Montana for the regular-season Big Sky title and finishing the season at 19-10, which included a postseason invitation to the NIT tournament — something unheard of in NAU's heretofore un-

distinguished basketball program.

But fourth-year Coach Jay Arnoke lost his smooth forward, Andre Spencer, and his shooting guard, Andy Hurd — both first-team all-Big Sky selections — to graduation. Together they accounted for more than half the points last fall on the best-shooting team in the Big Sky.

"Our squad may take on a blue-collar tag with work ethic, character and hustle becoming a trademark," says Arnoke, whose ballclub earned the right to next year's Big Sky postseason tournament with their first-place finish in 1986. "There is enough athletic ability and basketball skill to remain competitive."

That would consist primarily of last year's power forward, David Duane, a 6-7 senior, and the incumbent

point guard, senior Harry Payne. Duane averaged 11 points and seven boards, the latter figure which ranked him fourth in the Big Sky. Payne led the conference in assists with an average of almost seven a game.

In addition, NAU has 6-10 junior center Tony Betton returning. Betton averaged four rebounds a game in very limited action last year.

"The major areas of our recruiting emphasis were obtaining a shooting and lead guard and overall depth," says Arnoke. "The feeling at the start of the season is that these areas will be improved over last year."

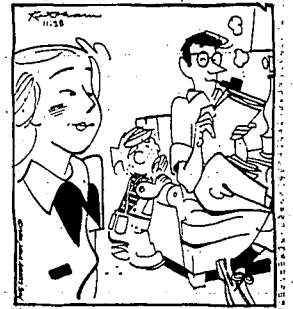

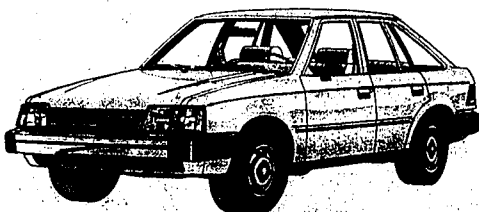

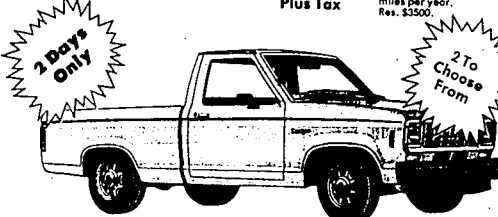

## 'Dining Room': mannerisms at play

TWIN FALLS — "The Dining Room," a series of vignettes depicting the changes in American family life over the past 50 years, will be performed at the College of Southern Idaho on two consecutive weekends, Dec. 4-5 and 11-12.

The play by A.R. Gurney will be directed by Dr. Fran Tanner, head of the CSI drama department. The play is currently a popular choice for production at colleges around the country, said Tony Mammen, a drama instructor at CSI and a member of the cast. He said, "Fran and I both like the show a lot. When we came in the first week of school we said, 'What show do you want to do?' and we both answered almost in the same breath, 'The Dining Room.'"

All of the scenes take place in a dining room. "It's a different kind of show," Mammen said. "There are 18 scenes and everybody plays at least six different characters. The changes are fast. We are literally getting dressed right behind the curtain. Some people have to age 50 years with only small costume changes and acting."

Tanner, who has been a member of the CSI faculty since the college was founded in 1965, said, "We haven't run a play on two consecutive weekends for several years. We're putting this in our intimate theater which only seats about 30, and it's such a fine show we thought we'd schedule it for two weekends. We know that there are basketball tournaments running those two weekends. We thought if we run it six nights then people who really want to see it can somehow come on one of them."

Directing a conventionally staged play is unusual for Tanner, who usually directs readers theater at CSI. But she likes both forms.

"Readers theater is presentational theater where you're sharing material with your audience; you are not acting as if you were the character," she said. "Whereas in conventional theater you are generally working with presentational theater where the actor asks the audience to believe, for the time being, that he really is the character. So you have a different focus there."

"But as far as rehearsal and objective, discipline and talent, it's all very similar. Good theater is good theater."

Other members of the cast are CSI alumni Mary Ann Anderson Stanger, Clifford Hall and Penny Motherhead and students Marcy McDowell and Gary Winterholler.

Tanner said, "It's a wonderful opportunity for our present students to be able to work with those who have

had a little more training. It's fun for them to work with Mr. Mammen who has directed them, and it's fun for me to put them all together."

"So often at a two-year school we find talented students. We work with them and get them all trained and then off they go to a four-year university. So it's always a pleasure to be able to work with them again. We can start our rehearsals at a higher level than we would

normally because they've had the background and they are able to shift into high gear."

## Musicals amiss on Broadway

NEW YORK (AP) — Where are the new hit American musicals?

Not on Broadway, where "Smile," which opened Monday, became the fifth home-grown musical comedy this season to get blasted by the critics. The four others — "Rags," "Hot Chick Nights," "Raggy Ann" and "Into The Light" — closed quickly, and "Smile" will have to struggle to survive.

"We're going to take a deep breath, collect our thoughts and see what happens at the box office," said Richard Kagan, one of the three producers. "We've got to see whether or not people are going to come to the theater. The problem is — at \$47.50 a ticket — they like to be told whether they should go."

The problems facing "Smile," a show about a small-time beauty pageant, are symptomatic of how difficult it has become for a new American musical to get to Broadway today — and run.

The show, written by Marvin Hamlisch, who wrote the music for "A Chorus Line" and Howard Ashman, co-author of the off-Broadway smash "Little Shop of Horrors," took four years and \$4 million to produce.

It went through two workshop productions and had to scramble for backers after the powerful Shubert Organization, which owns 17 New York theaters, decided not to invest in the show last year. Hamlisch and several of the women in the cast went out on the road to help raise money.

"To tell you the truth, I'm certainly going to look and think twice before I go into another Broadway show," Hamlisch said in an interview shortly before "Smile" opened. "I think that's what's bad about the theater in America right now. Writers are going to think it twice before coming to Broadway."

Kagan said if the show closes "138 jobs will be lost and a theater will be dark. . . . But it's a question of what's going to be practical. The show must gross some \$250,000 a week to break even."

Not many producers are willing to take that risk. The result has been an alarming drop in the number of new musicals on Broadway.

## Lauren Bacall fits princess role royally

NEW YORK — "She is all the things the Princess needs to be," said director Michael Blakemore, discussing his leading lady in the new production of "Sweet Bird of Youth."

"She is a great mythological figure of show business. She has enormous natural authority in the role. When she talks about herself having this fabulous past, no more need be said. It's there."

"She" is Lauren Bacall, and the role Blakemore believes she was destined to play is Princess generation and stature might balk at playing the princess, an aging

goddess with strong appetites for drugs, drink and sex.

The actress has already won kudos for playing the part in London and Australia. But this new production, which is previewing at the Andrius Theater in Denver — including a tour that will take it to Los Angeles and Broadway — is, thinks the star, the ultimate test of Tennessee Williams' lurid 1959 drama.

"This is the first time I'm playing with an all-American company," Bacall said. "And that's really as it ought to be."

Many actresses of Bacall's generation and stature might balk at playing the princess, an aging

star who, following a disastrous comeback attempt, flees to a wicked Southern town on the arm of a star-crossed gigolo named Chance Wayne. But Bacall has no patience for vanity. She is the mistress of her glamorous life.

But even without "the look" — that sultry, seductive gaze that marked her film debut in 1944's "To Have and Have Not" — Bacall's career is no higher gear than ever before. And for actresses who can get past the "washed-up" look, the role of the princess is extraordinarily rich.

"I've never had an opportunity to be in a play written by a poet before," she said. "And I've never had

a part where I've had so much support from the author. Tennessee certainly had a feeling about women that very few playwrights have ever had."

Although the actress loathes long runs, she is playing the princess for the third time because "there are values I keep discovering in her. She is a larger than life, many-faceted, complicated creature. There's a lot of comedic stuff, too; it's not all downer and depression."

"Unfortunately," Bacall said, "there are a lot of depressing things to identify with; all that over-the-hill stuff, that terror actors have. Are we going to be a success? Is it

Fifteen years ago, Broadway audiences could see 20 new musicals. Last year there were only 7. This season has already produced seven musicals. Besides "Smile," only two are still running — a revival of the Noel Coward revue "Oh Coward!" and the season's one smash, "He and My Girl," a 1930s British musical.

The two upcoming musicals that have created the highest expectations are British — Andrew Lloyd Webber's "Starlight Express," an \$8 million extravaganza which arrives in February and "Les Miserables," which opens in March.

If musicals are in trouble on Broadway, the situation for new American plays is even worse. A simple four-character drama can cost \$300,000 and up and the diminishing number of new works tells the story.

The first new American play of the season doesn't open until Dec. 4, nearly six months into the season. The play is "Broadway Bound," an autobiographical comedy by Neil Simon, perhaps the only American playwright whose name can guarantee a Broadway production.

A.R. Gurney's "Sweet Sue" arrives in January. Gurney, who has never had a Broadway success, is best known as the author of the long-running off-Broadway hit "The Dining Room," but the drawing card for "Sweet Sue" will be its two stars, Mary Tyler Moore and Lynn Redgrave.

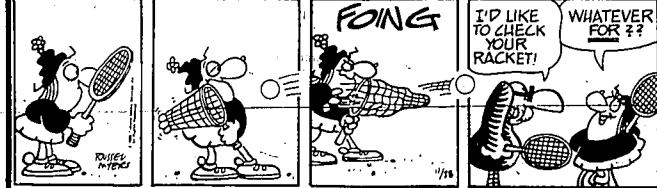

## Norris, Gossett, Aztec treasure spell adventure in 'Firewalker'

HOLLYWOOD — "Firewalker" is a breezy, big-scale comedy-adventure that takes scruffy soldiers-of-fortune Chuck Norris and Lou Gossett on a lively pursuit for Aztec treasure.

It also takes Norris out of his usual ultraviolent martial-arts fare and into "Raiders of the Lost Ark" territory. While "Firewalker" is not as elaborate or sophisticated as the Spielberg-Lucas hit, it is fun, and Norris is loosed up and laid back as never before. Just like Garbo, he really can laugh. But never fear, he is still the man to have on your side in a bar-room brawl.

Norris and Gossett are knocking back a couple of drinks in a bar in the midst of the Arizona desert when pert, spunky legal secretary Melody Anderson snarles them with a map to that treasure, which she believes is somewhere in a nearby mountain range.

Local Indian Will Sampson, however, conjuring up the spirit of the ancient Firewalker, directs them considerably south of the border, all the way to a banana republic (Be assured that current and serious unrest in Central America does not intrude in this make-believe).

"Firewalker" represents a happy teaming of brisk

old pro-director J. Lee Thompson, who knows his way around in the jungle (as well as practically any other locale one could think of) and writers Robert Gossnell, Jeffrey M. Rosenbaum and Norman Alajjem, making their feature debut.

"We have seen all the Saturday matinee serial paraphernalia and shenanigans — e.g., our trio disguising themselves as priests and a nun — countless times before, but Norris' and company really get into the high-hearted spirit of the occasion.

"Firewalker" succeeds in its modest and disarming aims finally because its people, who include Sonny Latham's lethal Neo-Aztec warrior and John Rhy-Davies' megalomaniacal adventurer, seem real even when they're caught up in the most shameless hokum.

Handsomely filmed in Mexico by Alex Phillips, "Firewalker" seems to have brought out the best in everyone on either side of the camera, and Gary Chang's seductive, Latin-tinged score is especially helpful in getting you in the escapism mood.

"Firewalker" (rated PG but suitable for entire family) has a framework that leaves Norris and Gossett stranded in the Sahara, presumably just in case the film is successful enough to warrant a sequel.

## 'Crocodile' dominates Spielberg's mouse

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "Crocodile Dundee's" down-under appeal kept it atop the box office, despite a growing list of holiday movies that included Steven Spielberg's "American Tail" and the re-release of a Disney chestnut, "Song of the South."

"Dundee" featuring the exploits of Outback adventurer Paul Hogan in New York, has held on to the No. 1 spot longer than any other 1986 movie. It has taken in \$83 million to date, eclipsing the previous fall record holder "Private Benjamin," which marched away with \$70 million in 1980.

"Dundee" is the fourth-largest grossing film of the year, but its lock on the No. 1 spot is expected to erode in the coming week's sweepstakes with the Thanksgiving holiday release of "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home."

Second in the weekend box office derby was the cartoon feature "An American Tail," which brought in \$5.2 million at the turnstiles.

The fully animated movie produced by Steven Spielberg's Amblin Entertainment is about a late 19th century Russian mouse family, the Mousekewitzes, who emigrate to America, where "there are no cats."

The movie is directed by Don Bluth and includes the voices of Dom DeLuise, Madeline Kahn, Nehemiah Persoff and Christopher Plummer.

Disney's re-release of "Song of the South" zipped to No. 3 with a \$4.2 million take. The movie, which mixes animation and live action was originally released in 1947. It recounts the Uncle Remus folk tales of Br'er Rabbit.

The Chuck Norris-Lou Gossett adventure "Firewalker" held the No. 4 spot with \$4.1 million and "The Color of Money" hustled up \$2.5 million to take fifth. "Firewalker"

features the adventures of the two macho men as they track down ancient treasure in a treacherous jungle.

"Peggy Sue Got Married" was sixth with \$2.3 million, and "Soul Man" was seventh with \$1.6 million.

Rounding out the Top 10 were "Stand By Me" from Columbia at No. 9 with \$1.1 million; "Children of a Lesser God" in ninth place with \$1.12 million; and the year's top-grossing movie, "Top Gun," with \$1 million.

## 'Children': a listen to love

**Movie reviews**

ADJ is at the heart of this movie — which is designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventure-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kowlowski's inquisitive Newsway reporter in the "Aussie outback" and "then in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser, but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

**THE COLOR OF MONEY (R).** In this film, Martin Scorsese brings all a major disappointment. The pulpit visuals and fluid animation cannot disguise the filmstiness of the story. The film makers attempt to tell the story of the Eastern European immigrants who came to America at the turn of the century, but reducing the programs of 19th Century Russia to cats chasing mice trivializes the subject. As the voice of a rich, pushy social reformer, Madeline Kahn steals the show from the rest of the vocal cast.

**CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13).** The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "Crocodile" in the Australian tourism

supple may sound like a road too well-traveled these days, but with director Jonathan Demme's eye for the dark cloud behind every American silver lining — and with music that provides both texture and subtext for his story — he finds haunting overtones in the somewhat old-hat situations of E. Max Frye's screenplay. The technical stuff of the film is gorgeous, and the lead actors Jeff Daniels, Melanie Griffith and newcomer Rhea 'Lata — give first-class performances.

**TAI-PAN (R).** Dismal film version of James Clavel's hugely entertaining epic novel of the early China traders. Hamilton, tasteful and incoherent a waste of splendid locales and a cast headed by Bryan Brown. With John Stanton, Joan Chen.

going to last? Will we ever get another job? I've had it all my life, and every actor I've known has had it. It goes with the territory."

Williams' play is suffused with a morbid nostalgia for youth — with the tragedy of living past one's prime. But the obsession with age, Bacall said, is not something that only actors have to deal with. "I think the United States of America has to come to terms with it," she said. "We've decided that the number next to your name makes you what you are. We've become so youth-conscious that everything short of mail-order face lifts is in order. It's insanity!"

"Listen," she continued, "the process of living is getting older. What the hell are you going to do about it? But instead of stressing what a person is about — values — we're stressing cosmetic, false superficiality. So many people in this country are not happy to live with what they are and deal with that. Everyone's trying to be something else. It's wrong, and the character of a nation suffers as a result of that."

"I don't know," she continued. "Maybe I'm stupid. I probably would have done better had I had my face lifted. But I just decided the hell with it. Anna Magnani said years ago, 'I've worked like hell to get this face!' Well, I've lived my life, and that's what you see in a face. The minute you start nipping and tucking, that disappears and you're a mask. It's not very interesting."

# Barbara Walters asks celebrities the questions we wish we could

Contrary to popular belief, Barbara Walters' favorite question doesn't start with the words, "If you were a tree."

"I've always been teased about asking Katharine Hepburn what kind of tree she wanted to be," says Walters, 55. "But nobody heard the question before that, which was, 'How do you go on?' She said, 'Well, I'm like an old tree.' And I said, 'What kind of a tree?' You would think that I had asked this every interview we did. But that's the only time I ever asked it."

By now, of course, the fact that Walters occasionally throws in an unusual question isn't exactly news. Walters has been interviewing celebrities for more than 25 years, and she has never been afraid to ask a tough question — or an obvious one. And the results often show up in unusual on-screen interviews.

Her "Barbara Walters Special" are entering their 11th year, and her latest, in which she interviews Lionel Richie, Betty White and Richard Pryor, airs Tuesday, Dec. 2, on ABC.

"I don't go for the 'juggler,'" she says firmly. "If I did that very often in the specials, nobody would want to come on. Why should they? But I will ask a tough question. You don't sit down with Richard Pryor without discussing whether or not he has AIDS. But my way is to sit down, kind of currupt and say, 'Let's talk.'"

Her secret? "We do a lot of homework," says Walters. "By the time I sit down, I know almost as much about them as they know about themselves, and a lot of things they forgot. Then I try to find something that will go 'ring,' that moment when you say, 'Ah, this is what makes it a little different.' You don't always get it, but if you do, it's very special. And I think that's why people watch. At the same time,

that's why some people don't want to do interviews with us. They say, 'She's going to ask me a lot of questions, and it may get too personal.' Everybody doesn't say yes." She's particularly proud of the Dec. 2 special. "This special is very

well balanced," she says, "with Lionel Richie, we went back to Tuskegee, Ala., where he grew up. His 93-year-old grandmother is still there. She plays classical music, and she played for us. And he sings 'Three Times a Lady,' which was written for her. It's very touching. With Betty White, I knew I couldn't go wrong. She's not the good two-shoes that you see on camera. This is a thoughtful woman who is more of a loner than one would imagine. And then Pryor chose that moment to introduce his new wife, Flynn, and a 2-year-old son, Steven, whose existence had been unknown until that moment."

"Nobody knew anything about his wife," says Walters. "And suddenly there was also a 2-year-old child. I said, 'Why did you decide to do this?' And he said, oh, he decided to get it all over with. That's sort of like him: 'Here it is, that's it, and now I don't have to do anymore.'"

# 'Pee Wee' is not a small success

Relax, Pee-Wee Herman fans. CBS may shuffle the time slot without telling anybody, but the network would not dare dump "Pee-Wee's Playhouse," now airing Saturday mornings.

Network executives realize they have a peculiar success in Pee-Wee. They know the show could become a hit of the magnitude of "Late Night With David Letterman." In fact, they are considering twice weekly broadcasts of "Pee-Wee," in a late-night time period as well as in the current slot.

In the meantime, each show will be repeated in 13-week cycles for those building a Pee-Wee videotape library.

Until a decision on late-night is reached, (not likely before January), CBS is content to note what we have known all along: Saturday morning kidvid, is not just for children anymore.

Pee-Wee is a standout on television's Saturday morning huggy-bear landscape. Among his distinctions is the fact that he is a human being, not animated, although he often pops into stock footage key to swim underwater with fish or cycle endless highways on his trusty bike.

The animators say the production quality in such instances is purposely cheesy in order to make a statement about the artifice of the medium. Viewers simply find it funny.

Pee-Wee's other distinctions are more difficult to categorize. He is part performance artist, part comed-

dian, a pretender to the kidvid throne of Captain Kangaroo. The throne, in his case, is named Chair-ey, an overstuffed chair that hugs him with cuddly arms and bats her lashes at the camera.

Our host, the skinny man-child in slicked-back hair and white pancake makeup, seems perennially on the verge of wetting his too-small pants. Almost handsome until he breaks in-

to a conspiratorial mug, the real-life, 33-year-old Paul Reubens frustrates interviewers by refusing to break out of character. Like Mr. T and Hulk Hogan, he never quits the shtick.

"Pee-Wee offers wonderful, innocent escapism. He is very much a classic character, like Captain Kangaroo, Soupy Sales, Pinky Lee, even Howdy Doody," said Judy Price, CBS vice president of children's programming. "We've been a generation without someone like that. I think it's time again."

The playhouse set is an art piece that embodies the latest in chic artistic sensibilities: Like Pee-Wee himself, it incorporates both retro and futuristic designs. A saw-toothed leatherette swinging door and Fabulous '50s wallpaper are offset by a talking electronic, computer-age gizmo. The hodgepodge may overwhelm children, but it wows the Eisenhower generation.

In Pee-Wee, Soupy Sales is reborn with a touch of early Jerry Lewis.

Soupy bad White Fang, Black Tooth and pies in the kisser. Jerry had a rubber face, bow-tie and manic screams. Pee-Wee has similar yelps, plus the gossipy Mrs. Steve, the glamorous Miss Yvonne, the macho sailor Captain Carl, a moody genie in a box and talkative Mr. Window. Not to mention the beatnik puppets Dirty Dog, Cool Cat and Chickie Baby. And Pierry the pet pterodactyl.

The offbeat format is simple enough for kids, peppered with double entendres for older folks. When Pee-Wee fights "Playhouse Fever" by throwing paper airplanes, his two-tone giggle makes the bit fly. He demonstrates how to make a salad (assuming you have a salad bar in your kitchen), gives a magic show, saves screaming flowers from a weed, self-consciously removes a streamer of toilet paper from his shoe and instructs the audience to yell when he says the word of the day.

"Aaarrrgh!"  
With a mock cringe, he skips to the fridge. Inside a party of vegetables dance a soft-shoe, skating Popsicles do pirouettes. This is animation at its pricey best.

He is outrageous in a sweet way, and would never suggest, like Soupy, that kids open Mom's purse and send him the green stuff.

To CBS, Pee-Wee is the key to wrestling Saturday morning dominance from NBC. "Right now, it's a three-network race in terms of kid delivery," CBS' Price said. She sees the Smurf block as particularly

vulnerable: It is 90 minutes long, so kids can watch a bit and tune out. Additionally, "the Smurfs" are in syndication Monday through Friday now," she noted.

Historically, Saturday ratings performance goes down when a show is available to viewers throughout the week.

Once Pee-Wee zooms off-screen on his bicycle, it is back to dinky animation as usual with the likes of "Teen Wolf" and "Galaxy High School."

Cheap animation buys peace of mind for ABC and NBC. Animation costs an average \$250,000 per half hour, while Pee-Wee's mix of live action and animation runs \$325,000 or more, making it the most expensive show in the history of children's television.

Besides, animation is considered safe programming whereas live action has a history of failure Saturday morning. This is the fourth try in four years for CBS. Most recently, the network bombed with "Pryor's Place" (starring Richard Pryor), Jim Henson's "Muppet Monsters" and "Benji."

What works in both of these terms are cuddly bears and Smurfs. Bears

proliferate: "Berenstain Bears" on CBS, Disney's "Gummi Bears" on NBC, "Care Bears" on ABC and George Lucas' bear-like "Ewoks" on ABC.

So while Pee-Wee gets this season's hip vote, the future of children's television remains murky. There is talk of alternative program types for the difficult Saturday morning block. The concern is largely due to the fact that all three networks were left with unsold Saturday morning advertising time at the end of last season.

Apparently, advertising is so slow that ABC is even contemplating turning over some of Saturday morning to the un-hip adults. A half-hour news program or women's programs are being considered for late morning, according to ABC's children's programming vice president.

The chances of more offbeat, artistic additions to the network schedules are slim to none. Pee-Wee may be it for this generation. News and talk are cheaper, animation is safer.

Ultimately, given the realities of network TV, Pee-Wee's Playhouse is not the start of an imaginative new trend. It is a fortunate fluke.

# Young, restless Patty Weaver pursues a robust singing career

There she is from "The Young and the Restless." Gina Roman's Patty Weaver singing in the Toronto rain. The wind blows Patty's dress up, her hair is splattered, but Patty has a ball because 2,500 soaked fans hang in there, crazy enough to endure the wet in an outdoor amphitheatre.

A week later Patty plays to outdoor Vancouver crowds, competing with a cow giving birth and oinking pigs. Weaver always works the crowd, so she's in the aisles. However, security guards are strangely missing. Strays stick noses in her face. A noisy Wallman, one row off, attempts to compete.

Does Weaver throw a tantrum? Not a chance. Give Patty an audience of five and she will knock herself out. It's her life, ever since the age of 4.

After a decade on "Days of Our Lives," and four years on "The Young and the Restless," Weaver goes back to one-night stands. She's earned her freedom. If Patty wants time off to sing, boss Bill Bell will make it possible.

"I'd like to do a one-woman show in New York and parody soap opera. Stick cutouts of all my leading men. Sing and have a little fun," says Weaver.

"I can do both. I don't intend to give up soap opera. I gave up performing on the road for a while because I didn't really know how to hustle," Weaver explains. "I've learned to ask, and to set a time date. I don't push, or have screaming fits."

### CHANNEL CHATTER:

New York area fans of "Another World" gave an overwhelming response to the offer becoming a prospective juror in an attempted murder trial from the show. Fifty prospective jurors from 7,500 applicants were screened in a real New York courtroom presided over by former State Supreme Court Judge Leonard Finz. The trial will be on the air in December and will feature most of the stars of "Another World," including Stephen Schmetzer, who plays Cass Withthrop. "As the World Turns" viewers will

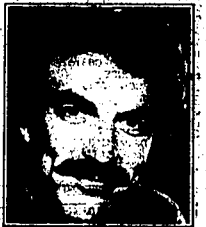

# NBC wins its 9th straight week

NEW YORK — NBC won its ninth straight ratings week, the first time a network has had such a long winning streak since ABC did nine years ago.

Before that, the biggest winner had been CBS, which took every week of the season in 1963.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, also projected that the network would win its seventh "sweeps" in a row.

The four-times-a-year ratings battle determines advertising revenues for local stations and provides prestige for the winning network. The November sweeps period ends this week.

NBC won last week's A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings with a prime-time average of 18. CBS was second with a rating of 16.8 and ABC was third

with a 14.2

A rating point is a percentage of the 67.4 million homes equipped with television and provides an estimate of how many viewers are tuned in to a show. The ratings released Tuesday are for the week ending Sunday.

"The Cosby Show" was again the highest-rated show, with a 34.7 rating — 50 percent of the available viewing audience.

"Family Ties," the sitcom that follows "Cosby" on Thursday night, had the distinction of placing twice in the top 10 in the Niensens, at No. 2 in its regular time period and at No. 8 for its special showing on Monday as a lead-in for "ALF," a sitcom about a puppet space alien.

"ALF" was assisted to a 21.5 rating, but Jaffe said the show was expected to drop again this week

without "Family Ties."

The rest of the top 10 shows, in descending order, were "Murder, She Wrote," "60 Minutes," "Cheers," "Golden Girls," "Moonlighting" and "Night Court."

"Kate's Secret," NBC's movie about the binge-and-purge syndrome bulimia, placed 10th with a rating of 24.1, the best for a special movie so far during the November sweeps.

As expected, the CBS miniseries satire "Fresno" crashed as it went on through five nights, dropping from a 19.7 rating for its opening two-hour segment the previous Sunday, to 15.2 for the Monday segment, in 35th place.

The Tuesday installment dropped to a 12.8, Wednesday drew a 12.5 and the wrap-up Thursday rated a 12.7.
