## Hansen may refuse parole, serve time

**PETERSBURG, Va.** — Although gaining approval for his early release from a federal prison, former Idaho Congressman George Hansen says he may refuse parole on Dec. 20 if he objects to the terms and instead serve out his 15-month prison sentence for falsifying federal financial disclosure statements.

"We'll see whether we'll be able to accept it (parole) or not," Hansen said after the U.S. Parole Commission approved his parole from the Petersburg, Va., Federal Prison Camp, where he said he had been on a hunger strike to protest the unpalatability of the food.

"When we walk out of here, we want to walk out of here a free man," Hansen said. "I may be freer here than under the parole system."

The U.S. Parole Commission on Wednesday agreed to free Hansen on Dec. 20, after the Idaho Republican has served six months of his five-to-15-month prison term.

The commission noted that the House had given Hansen a reprimand, which is a relatively mild sanction compared to expulsion from Congress, the stiffest punishment it could have imposed.

The commission in effect cut about five months off Hansen's prison term that began June 20. With credit for good behavior while behind bars, Hansen would be released in mid-May after almost a year of his term.

## Twin Falls receives 2nd look

### Burley also among 5 sites still in running for new state prison

**BOISE** — The 25 have been narrowed to five, but the Idaho Board of Corrections will take another look before choosing one site for a 500-bed maximum-medium security state prison.

The three-member board voted unanimously Thursday to tour the top five sites recommended by the state Division of Public Works: Boise, Caldwell, Mountain Home, Burley and Twin Falls.

Public Works Director Brian Chase said an evaluation process begun last April showed the most cost-effective location for the proposed \$30 million facility would be immediately adjacent to the existing state penitentiary south of Boise.

But he also said the difference between the most expensive and least expensive of the 25 locations considered from throughout the state was four percentage points.

Given that, and the heated competition among prospective sites for an expected economic windfall, the board voted to review the top five choices and meet again to decide before the scheduled Dec. 15 meeting of the state Public Building Fund Advisory Council, which also must approve the selection.

Chase, in recommending that Boise be selected, cited millions of dollars in initial savings the state could realize from locating the prison near the existing Idaho State Correctional Institution.

Neither Twin Falls City Manager Tom Courtney nor Mayor Ken Frank of Burley were available for comment on their cities being chosen among the finalists.

Ken Vaughan, president of the Gooding Chamber of Commerce, said he was not surprised that his city was overlooked for the prison site, because the city would have supplied a state building already built.

"They didn't want a made-over prison; they wanted a brand, spanking new facility," Vaughan said. "It's a real shame the state doesn't want this facility."

Vaughan said the state-owned, 30-year-old former tuberculosis hospital in Gooding could have been used as the site of the new prison. But now that the state has overlooked Gooding, the city will pursue using the facility as a private prison, he said.

"We treated the state as any other developer," said Vaughan. The city has been trying, for three years, to start a 250-300 inmate private prison in the building.

A Plano, Tex., company named Community and Justice Systems Inc. is examining the possibility of beginning a prison in Gooding, Vaughan said. He said many of the inmates would be from out-of-state, but that Community and Justice Systems already had an agreement to house 30-40 Idaho prisoners.

But some city leaders immediately said the decision was shortsighted. Pocatello Mayor Dick Flintayson called it a "gloating example of everything going to Boise while the rest of the state is left holding the bag."

The 1986 Legislature appropriated \$8 million to begin design and engineering work on a facility to help ease overcrowding in the state prison system.

Officials have said the new prison could add more than 200 jobs and pump more than \$400 million into a local economy over its anticipated 30-year life.

But Chase emphasized that only factors affecting operation of the prison were considered in recommending a site. "No weight was given to economic impact on the communities since that is largely a judgmental factor and all communities are suffering varying degrees of economic stress."

## Select panels to investigate arms scandal

**WASHINGTON** — House and Senate leaders agreed Thursday to form separate Watergate-style select committees to investigate the secret sale of arms to Iran and subsequent diversion of profits to the Nicaraguan contras.

The two investigating committees are expected to be created as a first order of business when the 100th Congress convenes Jan. 6, congressional leaders said.

The announcement of the new committees came as the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence completed a fourth day of closed hearings on the Iran arms operation, and the chairman of the committee, Sen. David F. Durenberger, R-Minn., said the panel will expand the scope of its investigation.

Durenberger said the committee staff is issuing subpoenas around the country for documents on the Iran operation and that the committee's witness list "has expanded" and might soon include all senior officials on the National Security Council with the exception of President Reagan and Vice President Bush.

Potential witnesses could thus include White House chief of staff Donald T. Regan as well as top Cabinet officials.

Robert M. Gates, the deputy director of the Central Intelligence Agency, spent four hours before the intelligence committee Thursday.

Durenberger, expressing frustra-

tion at the refusal of two recently departed administration officials to testify before the committee this week, urged Reagan to give the intelligence panel the information it requires to fully understand the details of the Iranian-arms and contra-aid operations.

"I am just concerned about the fact that the country needs to put this behind it as soon as possible," said Durenberger. "The president is in the best position to do that at this point in time. Both on the Iran side and particularly on the side of the Central American connection, the president can find the answers to these questions far more readily than we can."

Vice Adm. John M. Poindexter, who resigned last week as Reagan's national security adviser, and Lt. Col. Oliver L. North, a key deputy to Poindexter, invoked their Fifth Amendment right against self-incrimination, refusing to answer questions from the committee.

Reagan Thursday defended the decisions by Poindexter and North to invoke the Fifth Amendment, saying, "It is not new or unusual. It happened many times before, but when there is going to be an independent counsel starting an investigation, that individuals that

## Newly isolated virus tied to lymph cancer

**NEW YORK** — Researchers have isolated a virus that bears some resemblance to a leukemia virus but appears to cause lymphoma, and they say the finding increases the likelihood that such viruses may play a role in many unexplained human diseases.

The new virus, which has been designated HTLV-V by its discoverer, belongs to a family of so-called retroviruses that includes two leukemia viruses and two varieties of the AIDS virus, one that causes disease and one that does not.

"There are more retroviruses that affect humans than we think, and they are likely to cause pathologies," said the discoverer of the new virus, Dr. Vittorio Manzari, in a telephone interview Thursday.

Manzari, of the University of Rome, said, "It is still preliminary, but we think we have a

strong association" between HTLV-V and lymphoma, a cancer of the lymph glands. "We think it can cause it," he said.

"What we are hoping to do is complete the characterization of the virus, and describe how it is spread and how it works," said Manzari, whose collaborators include Dr. Luigi Frati, chairman of the university's department of experimental medicine.

The finding could ultimately lead to better treatment and prevention of lymphoma, but it has no immediate importance for victims of the disease, researchers said.

Hodgkin's disease, a form of lymphoma, and other lymphomas strike an estimated 16,500 Americans each year, according to the American Cancer Society. Hodgkin's disease causes about 500 deaths per year, and other lymphomas cause some 7,100 deaths per year.

## House Republicans pick Boyd speaker

**BOISE** — For the first time in 28 years, the Idaho House of Representatives has elected a speaker from north Idaho.

And he's a moderate at that, signaling an abrupt end to a long era of southern Idaho conservatives running the House. Six-term veteran Tom Boyd of Genesee won an extremely tight election over conservative Robert Geddes of Preston.

Both Senate and House convened Thursday for a two-day organizing session to pick leaders and make committee assignments for the 1987 session opening Jan. 12.

Most of the excitement was in the House, because the 26 Senate Republicans decided to stay with Senate President Pro Tem James Risch of Boise and Majority Leader Mark Ricks of Rexburg. Those decisions were made Wednesday night at a private dinner.

Lake logger Robert Doolittle was elected speaker for the 1959 session that a northern Idaho representative was elected the House's chief administrative officer. Doolittle also was the last Democrat elected to that post.

It's also the first time in more than 20 years that a south-central legislator has not been elected to the job. Pete Cenarrusa from Carey, William Lanting from Twin Falls, Allan Arsen of Blackfoot and Ralph Olmstead of Twin Falls held the job before Silvers, also of Twin Falls.

"We've been working hard at this for a long time," said Boyd. "We had some good help from a solid corps of people."

Boyd said he started on his campaign for speaker in June with a new car, and it has nearly 16,000 miles on it now. He said his wife Beverly also helped his campaign immensely.

He immediately announced that committee assignments in the

House the next two years would be balanced. When asked if there would be a repeat of the "stacking" of committees ordered by Silvers the last two sessions, Boyd said, "Absolutely not."

Several legislators said they expected a completely different leadership style from the moderate Boyd than the conservative Silvers.

But Geddes, who served as assistant majority leader under Silvers, said he also would have had a different leadership style than Silvers.

"He's never been in leadership before, so we'll just have to wait and see what develops," said Geddes. "I'll be supporting him."

Geddes said that, like Boyd, he worked hard to win the job and felt it was close going into the caucus.

"Obviously, some of those who said they would support me didn't do so after the first ballot (when Sessions dropped out)," Geddes said.

Besides Risch and Ricks, Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, was elected assistant majority leader and Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, was named caucus chairman. The only contest for the GOP was for

# Glitches keeping welfare payments in 'utter chaos'

BOISE (AP) — Continuing computer glitches have Idaho's welfare payment system in "utter chaos," according to an official of the nation's largest most state benefit eligibility examiners.

But a spokeswoman for the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare said the problems, though real, are not as serious as the examiners believe and are being resolved as quickly as possible.

"As we're finding them we're correcting them," Lindy High said Thursday. "I know that people are frustrated out there. All we can say is we're doing the best we can. Nobody feels good about this. Nobody feels good about what's happened."

That also was the message Theo Murdock, head of the state Division of Welfare, gave U.S. District Judge Harold Ryan during a hearing late last month on a request from Idaho Legal Aid Services Inc. that Health and Welfare be forced to comply with state and federal time standards on payment of benefits.

Ryan rejected the request, agreeing with Murdock that such an order would do nothing to speed up the process of paying benefits to Idaho's poor.

But Warren Lundquist, business representative for Local 687 of the Service Employees International Union, said Thursday that eligibility examiners have told him there is no indication a backlog of benefit applications stretching back to October has been cleared up.

"It hasn't improved in the least," Lundquist said. "All they can tell us is it should improve as time

goes by. We've heard that stuff before."

The problems center on the department's shift beginning in mid-October to a new computerized system to calculate eligibility for the four major welfare programs administered by the state.

EPICS — the Eligibility Programs Integrated Computer System — is an \$8 million project, 80-percent federally funded, designed to streamline Idaho's handling of benefits under Aid to Families with Dependent Children, Medicaid, food stamps and Aid to the Aged, Blind and Disabled.

But problems with the system's operation and eligibility examiners' unfamiliarity with the system have slowed down the transition process, Ms. High said.

The result has been a run on local food banks and other charitable organizations throughout the state. Despite Ryan's initial ruling, Idaho Legal Aid Services is continuing to document a number of cases of people who applied for welfare or submitted changes in their status during October and November and have yet to receive benefits.

"What they (Health and Welfare officials) call their best isn't good enough," said Idaho Aid Services attorney Denise O'Donnell. "The cases are getting weirder and weirder with each passing day. But until we get it all documented, the judge isn't going to listen to us."

# Andrus spent \$950,000 in effort to regain office, reports disclose

BOISE (AP) — Democratic governor-elect Cecil Andrus spent just under \$950,000 in his successful bid to recapture the governor's job he won twice before.

Campaign finance reports filed with the secretary of state's office here showed Andrus, who edged Republican Lt. Gov. David Leroy by about 3,500 votes out of 383,000 cast, spent \$944,407 compared to about \$441,000 to Leroy.

Reports from Republican Steve Symms and Democrat John Evans show they also spent a record \$5.2 million between them in their battle for the U.S. Senate, won by Symms, the Republican incumbent.

Evans, Idaho's governor for the last 10 years, reported spending about \$2.1 million, including \$415,000 in the period between Oct. 16 and Nov. 24. But Evans reported his campaign received a \$40,000 refund from a Boise advertising agency on Oct. 31 because it was unable to purchase any more media space.

Symms reported receiving \$334,362 during the final period, pushing his

total to \$3.1 million. Symms reported he had \$168,833 cash on hand as of the latest reporting period.

Andrus reported a cash balance of \$28,749 on hand at the end of the campaign and no unpaid obligations.

Leroy reported receiving \$91,292 in the final reporting period and a cash balance of \$15,909 at the end of the campaign.

The reports also show that between them, Democrat Marjorie Ruth Moon and Republican C.L. "Butch" Otter spent more than \$300,000 in their battle for lieutenant governor.

Otter reported spending \$227,534, including \$46,803 in the final reporting period after Oct. 21.

Ms. Moon, who is winding up 24 years as state treasurer, reported spending \$83,000, with only \$156 left over at the end of the campaign.

Both candidates reported putting up a lot of their own money. Ms. Moon listed personal loans of \$59,858. Otter and his wife, Gay, listed loans of \$111,606.

Lydia Justice Edwards, former Republican state representative who won the treasurer's job vacated by Ms. Moon, listed spending of \$36,574 and a balance of \$1,285. A report hasn't been received yet from her Democrat opponent, Shawn de Loyola.

# State fund pays dividend

BOISE (AP) — The state insurance fund, Idaho's largest workers compensation insurance company, has declared a dividend of \$6.2 million, a return of about one-third of the premiums paid.

Fund Manager Merle Parsley said Wednesday the dividend goes to policyholders who were insured for at least six months between July, 1984, and June, 1985.

The dividends will be contained in 4,700 checks to be mailed on Jan. 5.

The state Insurance Fund serves 7,800 policyholders, collecting \$30 million per year in premiums. It insures about 35 percent of the employers in Idaho and has returned more than \$40 million in dividends in the last five years.

Parsley said there's been a sharp increase in the number of policyholders in the last two years.

In January, 1985, 4,610 companies were covered. By January of this year the number was 5,374 and Parsley said current enrollment is 7,806 companies.

# Texan says airline flights hint at tie between CIA, Castro

WASHINGTON (AP) — A Texas congressman claimed Thursday that a commercial air cargo company linked to the administration's covert Iran and Nicaragua arms shipments has flown hundreds of flights into Cuba and Angola.

The congressman said this suggested to him the possibility of a link between the CIA and Fidel Castro.

Democratic Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez said old records of the Civil Aeronautics Board show that since 1982, Miami-based Southern Air Transport has flown an average of two planeloads a month into Havana, carrying between 15 and 26 tons of cargo per trip. The CAB went out of existence at the end of 1984, but its records were turned over to the Transportation Department.

In June of this year, there were two flights from Miami to Havana carrying a total of 45 tons, Gonzalez said.

"The State Department said those planes were taking supplies in to the American interests Section, which is the Swiss Embassy

in Havana, which has two people in it," Gonzalez said. "Now, you don't bring in 45 tons of supplies a month to supply two people."

On Nov. 25, the State Department said Southern Air sometimes flies supplies to the American diplomatic mission in Cuba.

Department spokesman Charles Redman said carriers are selected for flights to Cuba on the basis of price and availability.

Redman said the State Department hires these carriers to move its diplomatic pouch to and from the mission, formally known as

the U.S. Interests Section.

The flights also carry official and personal correspondence, household effects, office supplies and occasionally construction materials not readily available in Cuba, he said.

State Department spokeswoman Laura Jehl said Southern Air has flown into Havana on many occasions, bringing in basic provisions and construction materials for the American interest section. She said some of the loads contained large items and that's why large aircraft were used.

Southern Air spokesman William Kress was not in the airline's office Thursday and an employee answering the telephone said he did not know when Kress would return.

Gonzalez said that in looking through the records he found Southern Air planes also flew cargo from Dobbins Air Force Base in Georgia to an airport in Luanda, Angola, controlled by the Marxist government there.

In December of last year alone, the airline made 120 flights ferrying a total of 2,700 tons of cargo into the Angolan capital, he said.

# Expert estimates shipments from Israel worth \$1 billion

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israel shipped \$500 million to \$1 billion worth of arms to Iran between May and November this year, "by conservative estimate," an expert in U.S.-Iran relations said Thursday.

"I looked at the tonnage, I looked at the kind of equipment that was sent and I made the estimate," said Gary Sick, who served on the National Security Council under three presidents and wrote the book "All Fall Down: America's Tragic Encounter with Iran."

Sick, who was a principal White House aide for Iranian affairs during the Iranian revolution and U.S. hostage crisis during the Carter administration, told an audience of journalists and scholars at the American Enterprise Institute that his information came only from the public domain and that his interpretation was a personal one.

In the six-month period, he said, Israel sent nine to 12 shiploads of arms to Iran and that the total received by the Iranians in that period was more than 5,000 tons.

The Reagan administration has never put a value on the armaments that were sent to Iran. Attorney General Edwin Meese III said last week that \$10 million to \$30 million in profits from the sales were funneled to rebels in Nicaragua by Lt. Col. Oliver North of the National Security Council.

"What a brilliant coup," Sick said of North's actions. "In effect, he was getting the ayatollah to finance Contra operations."

North had gun-running operations in place in Central America, but could operate anywhere in the world, Sick said. "Creative financing was in place; transportation to use it was there."

North was fired last week from his post as a National Security Council aide working under Vice Adm. John M. Poindexter, who resigned the same day.

In his lecture, Sick gave several reasons for Israel and the United States wanting to send arms to Tehran.

Israel, he said, wanted to protect the large Jewish population in Iran; keep Iraq pointed east because that's good for Israeli security; maintain the intelligence contacts it made after the Iranian revolution; have a market for its large military industry; and exploit a chance to increase its ties with the United States.

For the United States, Sick said, the advantages included the strong intelligence bond between the two countries. CIA Director William Casey, he said, "established especially close relations with Mossad," the Israeli intelligence service.

The U.S. also saw a way to extricate its hostages from Lebanon where they were held. Even though administration policy was to not negotiate with kidnapers, he said, "I think President Reagan was preoccupied with the hostages."

There was no pressure last year from news organizations, he said. "The American public didn't care about it, but the president cared about it." He said presidents stay up at night thinking about Americans being held hostage.

Sick said that, contrary to reports, the American dealings were not merely with factions removed from the power structure in Iran.

# Casey, 2 former security advisers will be called to speak under oath

WASHINGTON (AP) — CIA Director William J. Casey and former national security advisers John M. Poindexter and Robert C. McFarlane will be called to testify under oath by the House Foreign Affairs Committee next week, a congressional source said Thursday.

Poindexter already has refused to answer questions about the surreptitious shipments, citing his Fifth Amendment rights against self-incrimination Wednesday before the Senate Intelligence Committee.

The congressional source, insisting on anonymity, said Rep. Dante B. Fascell, D-Fla., chairman of the committee, would also look into the transfer of funds from the Iranian purchases to the Nicaraguan rebels.

The hearing will open Monday with sworn testimony from Secretary of State George P. Shultz. McFarlane will appear in the after-

noon, Poindexter on Tuesday and Casey on Wednesday.

Shultz opposed the arms shipments and has said his knowledge of what went on is limited. Charles E. Redman, the State Department spokesman, said "he's prepared to be totally cooperative."

Shultz will testify before flying to Europe to meet with Sir Geoffrey Howe, the British foreign secretary in London, and the NATO foreign ministers in Brussels. His main purpose is to inform them of developments in U.S.-Soviet arms control negotiations since President Reagan and Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev met in a summit in Iceland on Oct. 11-12.

But Shultz also expects to be quizzed about the impact of the spreading arms-sale furor on U.S. foreign policy operations.

Attorney General Edwin Meese III

has identified Poindexter and a deputy, Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North, as the only administration officials who were aware of the dispatch of money from the arms sales to the Contra rebels. McFarlane, who traveled to Tehran to help arrange the weapons purchases, had left the NSC by then.

The committee also is seeking the testimony of North, who invoked the Fifth Amendment Monday before the Senate Select Committee on Intelligence. Meese and Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger, but arrangements are not complete, said another congressional source who also insisted on not being identified.

Poindexter resigned from the NSC last month, and North was fired, after the Contra disclosure, and the two are being reassigned in the Navy and Marine Corps, respectively.

# Prosecution of arms conspiracy to proceed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The government plans to proceed with the prosecution of an Iranian arms conspiracy case in New York, despite disclosures of the American datans were in no way linked to the covert arms shipments to that country, Reagan administration's secret spokesman for the office of U.S. Attorney Rudolph Giuliani in New York said Thursday.

The New York case involving 13 defendants and plans to ship \$2 billion in arms to Iran. Other prosecution plans to proceed with the prosecutors feel the case is strong evidence involving private weapons shipments to Iran have been under review by the Justice Department.

# Nitze defends treaty move

WASHINGTON (AP) — A top White House nuclear arms control adviser on Thursday defended President Reagan's decision to breach the SALT II nuclear arms treaty because he said the Soviets are violating the pact.

Paul Nitze said the Soviets had violated the 1979 treaty and the limits "turned out to be unilateral limits" on the U.S. nuclear arsenal.

Nitze's defense of last week's action by the Reagan administration was met by sharp criticism Thursday from Democrats on the House Armed Services nuclear arms subcommittee, which has been holding a series of hearings into administration arms control policy.

Asked about chances the administration will mobilize enough nuclear weapons to put the United States back into compliance with the treaty, Nitze said, "I think it's small."

Last Friday, the Pentagon put in to service the 131st B-52 bomber which had been modified to carry nuclear-tipped cruise missiles.

# Central American dialogue required

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan halled Costa Rican President Oscar Arias on Thursday for promoting democracy "in the shadow of communist dictatorship in Nicaragua," but the Central American leader said true peace will not come to the troubled region without a dialogue.

"You have earned the respect of free people everywhere — for your courageous defense of the right of Nicaraguans to live in liberty," Reagan told Arias following a two-hour meeting.

Arias, who has in the past expressed opposition to Reagan's support for the Contra rebels battling the leftist Nicaraguan government, indicated in his departure remarks that while he opposes "oppression and violence" in Nicaragua, he prefers that methods other than violence be used to bring peace to the region.

### Sheriff's resignation sought

**METAIRIE, La. (AP)** — Protesters shouting "Harry Lee and the Klan go hand in hand!" demanded the resignation Thursday of a sheriff who told his deputies to question blacks in white neighborhoods, then revoked the order.

The five blacks and two whites outside the Jefferson Parish Sheriff's Office said Sheriff Harry Lee's apology Wednesday could not atone for issuing the order in the first place.

"Harry Lee out! Black and white unite!" shouted the picketers, who refused to give their names. Their signs said they were from the Liberation League, a small New Orleans anti-apartheid group.

In neighboring New Orleans, supporters of an ordinance to protect the civil rights of homosexuals, women and other groups cited Lee's order as proof that discrimination is far from a thing of the past.

### Chain fires managers of store

**SUPERIOR, Wis. (AP)** — The assistant manager of a 7-Eleven store has been fired for refusing to put Penthouse and Playboy magazines on store shelves, two days after the manager was dismissed for the same reason.

Densie Granstrom was fired following completion of her shift Wednesday. The manager, Dean Krych, had been fired at the end of his shift Monday.

"It's more important for me to have a clear conscience than a job," she said.

In a related move, Krych's wife resigned Wednesday as an auditor for 14 Superior-area 7-Eleven stores, which are owned by the Wymodak Corp. of Denver.

"All the bridges are burned now," Dean Krych said at a news conference.

### Paratroopers injured in jump

**FORT BRAGG, N.C. (AP)** — Twenty-seven 82nd Airborne Division paratroopers were injured in a night jump when they missed the drop zone and landed near an observation post in a danger area on Ft. Bragg, a post spokesman says.

The soldiers were among 379 paratroopers who jumped from four C-141B Starliner airplanes over Sicily Drop Zone in a routine night exercise, said Maj. Mike Nason of the division Public Affairs Office.

Of the 27, seven required hospitalization Tuesday night and were in stable condition Wednesday at Womack Army Community Hospital. Twenty others were treated for injuries and released, Nason said.

### 25 whales pushed into water

**EASTHAM, Mass. (AP)** — About 25 pilot whales beached themselves along Cape Cod were pushed back into the safety of deeper water, but scientists said Thursday they would have to kill 10 others to put the stranded mammals out of their misery.

Scores of the whales began beaching themselves Wednesday, and scientists and volunteers struggled through the night to try to save the mammals, some of which weighed up to two tons.

The volunteers, who had spent the night trying to calm the whales and keep them wet, were angered by the decision and pleaded they be spared.

Marilyn Schmidt, a volunteer from Centerville who spent the night with a whale nicknamed Blanca, said, "We got eye contact from her, we talked to her and she was doing OK. Let's give her a chance. This is ridiculous."

### Oil, gas exploration pushed

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Energy Secretary John S. Herrington told leaders of the natural gas industry Thursday they must find more domestic reserves in the face of the nation's increasing dependence on foreign oil and gas.

"This isn't just a problem for domestic energy producers or for Texas, Louisiana and Oklahoma — and it's not just a short-term problem. This is a national problem with potential long-term consequences," Herrington told the annual meeting of the Natural Gas Suppliers Association.

He compared the situation facing the country to that of the late 1970s, when manipulations by a single set of energy suppliers nearly tripled the price of oil, and promised the administration would press Congress for deregulation to help free the market.

### Yule card list hits 125,000

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — President Reagan and his wife, Nancy, are sending out 125,000 Christmas cards this year with a reproduction of a watercolor entitled, "The East Room at Christmas," it was announced Thursday.

The painting shows the interior of the huge white and gold room in the White House, with two blue spruce Christmas trees, decorated with tinsel and simulated snow, flanking the fireplace.

It was the second straight year that the White House has chosen a watercolor by Thomas William Jones of Bellevue, Wash. Last year's card was a reproduction of his "Blue Room at Christmas."

**WASHINGTON (AP)** — Presidential spokesman Larry Speakes, who faced the daily gridlock of White House briefings longer than any of his recent predecessors, announced Thursday he is resigning to take an executive post with Merrill Lynch & Co., the Wall Street investment firm.

Speakes, 47, had been negotiating for the senior vice presidency, which sources have said pays about \$250,000 a year in salary and benefits, for two months. He plans to begin his new job Feb. 1.

President Reagan, when asked how he felt about his chief spokesman leaving in the midst of the furor over his secret arms sales to Iran and the diversion of profits to Nicaraguan rebels, smiled and told reporters: "Congratulate him on getting a fine job."

Speakes, announcing his decision at his daily mid-day briefing, said the new job "comes as close to matching this as anything could."

"Nothing could ever match this," he said of the \$75,000-a-year job he has unashamedly adored, despite the constant grilling of the White House press corps, with which he has maintained a relationship marked both by rancor and rapport.

Administration sources, asking to remain anonymous, have said Interior Undersecretary Ann Dore McLaughlin is Speakes' most-likely successor if White House chief of staff Donald T. Regan keeps his job in the face of congressional pressure for his resignation over the handling of the secret weapons deal.

Mrs. McLaughlin worked for Regan when he was treasury secretary and sources say she has been advising him on how to deal with the present crisis. She would be the first woman to run the White House press office.

Marlin Fitzwater, Vice President George Bush's press secretary and another former Regan associate at Treasury, also has been mentioned as a prime candidate for Speakes' job.

Asked about his leaving in the midst of the current furor, Speakes said he considered that but decided staying on for two months "would be quite a fair time to let the president choose my successor" and "enough time to serve the president in the current situation."

He added he had been discussing the position with the brokerage house since early October, before the current crisis arose.

Speakes has been President Reagan's principal spokesman since press secretary James S. Brady was critically wounded in the assassination attempt against Reagan on March 30, 1981. He has held the job longer than anyone since President Eisenhower's press secretary, James Hagerty, who served Ike through two full terms.

Brady, who has never fully recovered from his injuries, continues to hold the title of press secretary to the president.

Speakes, who said he knew nothing about the secret weapons deals with Iran or attempts to use them to free American hostages in Lebanon, has largely escaped the spotlight focused on other senior officials in the burgeoning scandal.

Speakes often has boasted of the many ways in which he can tread the narrow course, refusing to advance a story without misreading those trying to pursue the facts.

"There are 10,000 ways to say 'no comment,' and I have used 9,999," he told a group of Gannett newspaper editors in July. But "you can't lie," he said. "If you lie standing here, you've lost everything. The only thing you have to offer is your honesty and your integrity."

In 1976, Speakes was assigned to Sen. Bob Dole's unsuccessful vice presidential campaign and joined a Washington public relations firm after the Democrats took over the White House in January 1977.

## Student kills teacher in shootings at school

**LEWISTOWN, Mont. (AP)** — A student shot and killed a substitute teacher in a classroom at his high school Thursday. Two wounded a vice principal and two classmates, authorities said.

The 14-year-old student, who was armed with a large-caliber revolver, was arrested at his home after his parents turned him in to police following the 1:22 p.m. shootings at Fergus High School, said Tom Killham, assistant police chief.

He was booked on a charge of deliberate homicide. He was not identified and no motive was disclosed.

The student entered the classroom about 1:20 p.m. and shot teacher Henrietta Smith, 40, in the face, said Fergus County Coroner Jerry Floyd. She was pronounced "dead at the scene."

He then ran out of the classroom and fired three more times before fleeing the building, Vice Principal

John Moffatt was hit in the abdomen and two students suffered minor injuries, Killham said.

The youth was pursued by officers to his home, where he was taken into custody and the weapon was recovered, Killham said.

Moffatt was taken to Central Montana Hospital, where he underwent surgery.

A girls' basketball tournament was taking place at the time, but the shooting spree occurred in a classroom and hallway away from the gym and the tournament was not disrupted, said Police Chief Russell Dunnington.

Students had been excused from class because of the tournament, said a Fergus High School employee who refused to identify herself.

Lewistown, an agricultural center of about 7,000 people, is located about midway between Billings and Great Falls.

# Amazon island lures scientists

LONDON (AP) — British and Brazilian scientists will brave jaguars, wild boars, snakes and wasps and fever on an uninhabited Amazonian island in a year-long study of the steamy habitat, expedition members announced Thursday.

Dense rain forest shrouds the study site, 37-by-15 mile Maraca Island on the Urucoirena River, an Amazon tributary in Brazil's northernmost Roraima territory.

The Royal Geographical Society said more than 50 scientists — half of them British, about 20 Brazilians and a few from other nations — will catalog and collect flora and fauna and study soils, diseases and forest regeneration throughout 1987.

Maraca Island was declared a nature reserve several years ago, and a research station was built on the east of the island, from where scientists venture into the jungle depths.

"You've got to be adaptable," botanist Jim Ratter, an expedition member, said in an interview.

"The right sort of mental flexibility is essential for this sort of thing. It's not necessarily the Superman who's going to be the greatest success at it. You've got to get used to things going wrong ... and sort them out patiently."

Big cats, tapirs and savage

boars roam the island. Poisonous insects and snakes abound. And one can simply get lost in the forest.

"One of the greatest hazards are the bees and wasps. Working in the trees, you very often disturb their colonies," said Ratter, who has spent the last 20 years working in the Amazon basin.

The island "will never be open to tourism," said John Hemming, director of the Royal Geographical Society and the leader of the \$170,000 project.

Of the estimated 8 million to 10 million plant and animal species in the world, about 40 percent are found in rain forests, and Brazil has almost 60 percent of the world's rain forests, Hemming said.

"We share the planet with millions of other creatures and a great many are in the forests, so there's almost a moral need to preserve the great genetic diversity," Hemming said.

One research group will study the cycle of jungle regrowth by clearing small plots of forest. Scientists hope to discover better methods of regenerating hundreds of thousands of acres of rain forest felled each year by farmers, cattle ranchers, timber and mining companies.

# Honeywell latest to join exodus from S. Africa

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — Honeywell Inc. will sell its small operation here to a local firm and join the exodus of American companies from South Africa, a company executive said Thursday.

The sale to South African owners follows a pattern set by General Motors Corp., IBM and dozens of other U.S. companies which bowed to disinvestment pressure from the anti-apartheid movement and to poor economic conditions.

A major South African industrial group, Murray and Roberts, is to

purchase the Honeywell operation for an undisclosed amount and all 175 employees probably will keep their jobs, said Markos Tambakeras, Honeywell's local managing director.

At Honeywell's Minneapolis headquarters, spokeswoman Susan Eich said: "I think it's generally acknowledged that the business environment in South Africa is volatile."

"We took into account the total business environment in that country and came to the conclusion it's

in our best interest to sell the affiliate to Murray and Roberts."

The Honeywell affiliate, which sells and services electronic control systems for buildings and industries, accounts for less than 1 percent of Honeywell's revenues, which totaled \$6.6 billion last year, Ms. Eich said.

Such systems manage equipment, monitor industrial and other processes and collect data.

More than 60 American companies have left South Africa since January 1985, including at least 24 this year. Last month, Eastman Kodak Co.

# Rebel forces will keep cease-fire, leftist says

MANILA, Philippines (AP) — Communist negotiators said Thursday that rebel forces throughout the country have pledged to abide by the cease-fire with the government.

"They vowed 'to prove wrong' U.S. officials skeptical of the truce's prospects."

Guingona pledged the military would hold its fire during the 60-day truce, saying Mrs. Aquino has given the country's top generals "specific orders" to that effect.

The truce agreement, reached Nov. 27, takes effect Dec. 10.

Appearing on a television talk show with members of the government's negotiating panel, Satur Ocampo, chief spokesman of the leftist National Democratic Front, also indicated the rebels would not accept any amnesty offer from President Corason Aquino. He contended insurgents have not committed any crime.

Government negotiator Teofisto

Commenting on a published report that some unidentified U.S. officials doubt the cease-fire would lead to a lasting peace, Ocampo said: "That's expected. ... They're always skeptical about the cause of the NDF." Then he added: "We're determined to prove them wrong."

Guingona said the 17-year-old leftist insurgency was "an internal problem ... that should be solved by Filipinos alone."

# Pact pushes for agreement

VIENNA, Austria (AP) — The Warsaw Pact suggested to NATO Thursday that the two sides end 13 years of negotiations on reducing troop strengths in Central Europe by quickly adopting a compromise and moving on to broader talks.

Soviet Ambassador Valerian Mikhalov recommended that the deadlocked negotiations be replaced by conventional arms-reduction talks covering more territory and involving more nations.

Dutch Ambassador Jan Hein Van de Mortel, who spoke for the West, did not rule out new negotiations, but said the Vienna talks should be concluded with a substantive accord instead of taken agreement.

Ocampo and fellow Democratic Front negotiators — Antonio Zurel and Carolina Malby — spoke on the popular "Strategic Dialogue" program, the second time in a week that the underground leaders had appeared before Filipino TV audiences.

The rebels, along with government panel members, fielded questions from a group of Filipino and U.S. journalists. Listeners were also allowed to phone in their questions.

Ocampo said the rebel panel had been "assaulted" by all our forces, both at the regional and provincial levels, that they would keep the truce, "and we hope the same can be expected from the armed forces of the Philippines."

# Jewish captives part of arms deal

## Training, assistance got movement started Israeli researcher: Contras have received weapons, aid

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israel has aided the Contra rebels in Nicaragua since the leftist Sandinistas overthrew the Somoza dynasty seven years ago, an Israeli researcher said Thursday.

Israeli assistance, including training and weapons, was instrumental in getting the Contra movement started, Benjamin Bell-Hallahmi told The Associated Press in an interview. He said the help started immediately after President Anastasio Somoza was ousted in July 1979.

He said the government of Somoza's father was among the first to recognize Israel when it was created in 1948 and supplied Nicaraguan passports to Israeli secret agents the following year, beginning a relationship that lasted three decades.

Bell-Hallahmi is a professor at Haifa University and has written a book about Israel's covert foreign relationships.

The Israeli government officially denies supplying weapons or training to the Contras.

Emerging details of how payments from Israeli-brokered U.S. arms shipments to Iran reached the Contras, however, have prompted several Israelis to speak publicly or privately about direct links between the Jewish state and the rebels.

Bell-Hallahmi's information was confirmed by Israeli sources, who insisted on anonymity. An opposition legislator spoke in Parliament of Israeli links with Nicaraguan rebels, and Israeli newspapers Thursday quoted U.S. officials as confirming Israeli weapons sales to the Contras.

In 1984, Time magazine quoted Contra leader Edgar Chamorro as saying the rebels received 2,000 weapons from the Israelis in 1983.

Chamorro, who later abandoned the Contra cause, said most were Soviet-designed AK-47 assault rifles seized from the Palestine Liberation Organization in Lebanon.

In 1983 and 1985, The New York Times quoted Reagan administration officials it did not name as saying Israel was shipping captured PLO small arms and artillery pieces to the Contras.

Contra commander Enrique Bermudez said in an NBC interview in April 1984 that the rebels received arms from Israel, which he called "the weapons that the Israeli government took from the PLO in Lebanon."

According to Bell-Hallahmi, the Somoza dictatorship "helped the new state of Israel supply its agents with Nicaraguan passports." In 1949 and, in return, Israel paid \$250,000 and supplied weapons to Nicaragua over the years. His book, "Israel's World War," is to be published by Random House in 1987.

Immediately after the Sandinista revolution, he said, Israel sent a small number of military specialists to Central America to train the Contras.

"Israel has been involved with the Contras from day one," Bell-Hallahmi said. He added that his information came from U.S. and Israeli officials and public statements by the Sandinista government and the rebels.

The researcher confirmed that the weapons supplied were captured from PLO guerrillas before and after Israel's 1982 invasion of Lebanon. He said Israel sent only small amounts of arms to the Contras, most of them light weapons.

Israeli newspapers say they included shells, land mines, hand grenades and surface-to-air missiles.

The Contras wanted the Soviet-designed arms because they could capture matching equipment from the Soviet-supplied Sandinista army, Bell-Hallahmi said.

Israel believed the Soviet-made weapons could not be traced and "the Contras could always say they captured the weapons on the battlefield," he said.

Israel's alliance with the United States played an important role in its decision to help arm the Nicaraguan rebels, according to Bell-Hallahmi and other Israelis. Congressional restrictions have prohibited direct military aid to the Contras during much of the Reagan administration.

"Nicaragua is not the only place where Israel provides a service to the United States by selling weapons to anti-government forces," Bell-Hallahmi said. "Israel also provides Soviet-made weapons to rebels in Angola and Afghanistan."

A government official told the AP on Thursday that Israel is hedging its bets by trying to improve relations with Nicaragua, primarily through meetings at the United Nations in New York. He spoke on condition of anonymity.

The only official Israeli ties with the Sandinistas are through the socialist Mapam Party.

JERUSALEM (AP) — Israel shipped U.S. weapons to Iran on the understanding that two kidnapped Lebanese Jews would be freed as part of an arms-for-hostages deal being missig since the 1982 package, government officials said Thursday.

The Jewish captives were freed following the release of the Lebanese hostages held by pro-Iranian Lebanese militias, the government itself pressed on the condition of anonymity.

The United States has confirmed it secretly shipped arms to Iran but has denied that the main purpose was to win freedom for the "American hostages." But Israel's government has said the hostage release issue was decisive when it agreed to

send the weapons to Iran. The officials told the AP that Israel also hoped to receive information on the fate of three soldiers who were missig since the 1982 Israeli invasion of Lebanon.

Fourteen members of Lebanon's small Jewish community have been kidnapped, and at least three have been found killed. A group calling itself the Organization of the Oppressed on Earth has claimed responsibility for the killings and says it holds some of the others still missing.

The Israeli officials did not say which two Lebanese Jews were to be freed in the deal, or why only two were included. An underground Islamic Jihad, a group believed made up of pro-Iran Shiite Muslims, claims it is holding three American hostages in Lebanon and killed a third. Three other Americans are missing and other groups have claimed their abductions.

The Oppressed on Earth group, also believed to be composed of Shiites loyal to Iran, offered last year to trade four Jewish hostages for 300 Lebanese Shiites held in a detention camp in Israel-controlled south Lebanon. Israel never responded officially.

Officials said at the time that the French government and international groups were trying to find the missing Jews.

## Plot for Egyptian coup charged by prosecutor

CAIRO, Egypt (AP) — Egypt's top prosecutor charged four military officers and 29 civilians on Thursday with trying to organize a Western-style war to topple President Hosni Mubarak's government.

The indictment said the men had formed an extremist — Muslim organization financed at least partially by armed robberies and aimed to call for jihad (holy war) to overthrow the ruling system.

It said investigators had evidence that some of the defendants had links to the Jihad organization, a fundamentalist Muslim group implicated in the 1981 assassination of President Anwar Sadat.

The government-owned daily al-Ahram said in its early Friday edition that four of the civilian defendants were still at large.

If convicted of charges recommended by Prosecutor-General Mohammed el-Gundi, the 33 defendants could be sentenced to prison at hard labor for up to 25 years.

The government's Middle East News Agency said the arrests were made in April, and that the defendants were connected with other extremists who staged a series of firebombings in public places earlier this year.

A senior official at the Interior Ministry, which is responsible for domestic security, said the defendants were arrested in Cairo and elsewhere. Citing ministry policy, he refused to list their names.

The indictment, distributed by the government news agency, said the defendants "founded, participated in and directed a group advocating opposition to the fundamental principles underlying the system of government. It also urged hatred and contempt of this system and incited resistance to public authority."

**Israeli soldiers kill 2 demonstrators**

JERUSALEM, Occupied West Bank (AP) — Israeli soldiers killed two Palestinian students Thursday when they opened fire on a crowd of demonstrators at a West Bank university.

More than 20 protesters were wounded by Israeli gunfire in a day of violence that swept from the campus to a nearby hospital.

Outside the Ramallah Hospital, where dozens of Palestinians gathered to await word of injured relatives and to donate blood, Israeli troops fired rubber bullets and injured three people in an attempt to disperse the crowd.

## Kim, Soviet meet

MOSCOW (AP) — North Korean leader Kim Il Sung received Soviet army Gen. Alexei Lizichev and the two discussed strengthening ties between their nations' armed forces, the official Soviet news agency said Thursday.

Kim and Lizichev discussed increasing cooperation between representatives of their countries' armed forces, the agency said.

OXFORD, Miss. — Alex Haley, the author of "Roots," says he never lost his love for the South, despite the history of slavery and black suffering associated with it. "I can't overstate how proud I am

to be a Southern writer," said the Tennessee-born writer at a University of Mississippi lecture Wednesday. "There's more substance here, so much more to write about." Haley, 65, said he was inspired to write "Roots," which traced his family through six generations after sitting with his grandparents on a front porch in Henning, Tenn. Haley said his next book, which he expects to be complete in the next few months, will be an account of growing up in rural Tennessee in the 1920s.

### Former Beatle Harrison wins his fight for flicks

HENLEY-ON-THAMES, England — Ex-Beatle George Harrison has won a campaign to save his local moviehouse from being converted into a supermarket.

The pop artist, joined by other celebrities in the affluent town west of London, gathered 8,000 signatures on a petition to spare the Regal cinema.

The town council voted 11-0 Wednesday night to scrap the redevelopment plan and allow Harrison's group to present an alter-

native plan for renovating the street where the cinema stands. The Regal closed in May, but Harrison insists there is still an audience in Henley-on-Thames for the right kind of film.

### Mr. Muscles, Dr. Ruth join event for ski teams

CALGARY, Canada — Big film star Arnold Schwarzenegger and tiny sex therapist Dr. Ruth Westheimer will be among American celebrities attending a fund-raising event for the U.S. and Canadian Olympic ski teams.

## Moslem pays big sum for a presidential wine

LONDON (AP) — A teetotaler paid a record \$55,800 Thursday for a bottle of white wine that belonged to Thomas Jefferson, Christie's auction house said.

A Christie's wine expert said he hoped the wine was drinkable. The 1784 Chateau d'Yquem was bought by Iyad Shibliq, a Jordanian Moslem who said he placed the bid for a friend in New York whom he declined to identify. The bottle is one of only two bottles of this wine known to exist. A third was opened and drunk last year and won praise from critics who said it was in perfect condition.

The Chateau d'Yquem was found with a dozen other bottles in a bricked-up cache in Paris last year and bears Jefferson's initials, T.J. Jefferson, the United States' third president and one of the first wine authorities in the young nation, went on buying tours of French vineyards when he was American ambassador to Paris. He insisted on having his purchases initialed to distinguish them from wines he bought for George Washington. Christie's said Shibliq's purchase

price of 39,600 pounds was a record for white wine, but red wines have fetched even more in the past.

The most expensive wine ever auctioned was a 1787 Chateau Lafite claret, found alongside the Chateau d'Yquem and also initialed T.J. It was sold for \$17,500 a year ago at Christie's to Christopher Forbes. The Forbes family of New York, which publishes Forbes magazine, collects U.S. presidential relics.

Forbes paid four times more than the previous record for a red wine, but the Lafite is now useless because its cork slipped into the bottle when it was on exhibition in the United States.

Shibliq said he was a teetotaler because of his religion. After declining to identify his friend, he said: "I have no idea what he is going to do with it."

John Doodie, a Christie's wine expert, said: "Wine is meant for drinking. It is not a thing of beauty. You can hang it on the wall." Christie's said the wine was put on auction by a seller in Paris who wanted to remain anonymous.

# New House speaker signals change in GOP

TWIN FALLS — The surprise election of northern Idaho Republican Tom Boyd as the new House speaker of the Idaho Legislature signals a change in leadership as a positive step.

"It's going to be good for Idaho and good for Republicans," said Rep. Gary Robbins. B-Dietrich, who helped lead the fight for a change. "I feel very good about this coming year."

The 58-year-old Boyd, who was born in Filer and graduated from Twin Falls High School, was viewed as an underdog going in

to Thursday's election for speaker. The Genesee farmer was running against Robert Geddes from Preston and John Sessions of Driggs.

Until Thursday, Geddes was the frontrunner — and almost assured of the job, observers and area lawmakers said.

Robbins said the change signals a more moderate leadership. He believes Boyd will be more willing to "sit down and negotiate with more reasonable" than former speaker Tom Stivers of Twin Falls.

In his arguments to win Boyd supporters, Robbins said he told lawmakers that Idaho voters wanted new blood.

"Everywhere I go, people are telling us they want change; and that's what I've tried to tell these people," Robbins said. "Don't be afraid to go for it."

In addition to Robbins, Magic Valley lawmakers openly backing Boyd were Rep. Doug Jones, Rep. Steve Antone and newly elected Rep. Ron Black.

Supporting Geddes was newly elected Rep. Cella Folkings and Rep. Mack Nelbaaur.

Nelbaaur expressed disappointment on Thursday that Geddes lost, although he added that Boyd was "a quality person. I was just on the other side."

Nelbaaur said he thought Geddes lost because of overconfidence.

"I think there was some sureness on the part of Geddes that he had the votes to take care of it, but he didn't finish the work," Nelbaaur said.

Boyd and his backers "worked to the fall end, they even worked when we took a recess after the vote," Nelbaaur said.

The most telling sign on how the change may affect Idaho will be when nine new members are appointed to the Revenue and Tax Committee and the Joint Finance and Appropriations Committee, Nelbaaur said.

"It will be interesting to watch those two and Boyd were good, qualified men. But Stivers was in Boise on Thursday and could not be reached for comment."

Twin Falls County Republican Chairman Mark Stubbs said Boyd's election also represents some backlash to the way Stivers controlled the Legislature. Geddes was closely tied to Stivers.

"I think it reflects the fact that there are a lot of new people in the Legislature, and there's a little bit of backlash to the former leadership," he said.

Stubbs stressed that he thought both Geddes and Boyd were good, qualified men. But he said he thought Boyd would be "more attentive to everyone's point of view."

## Hansen: Political prisoner of the 'American Gulag'

Writes article for Church of Scientology

TWIN FALLS — Mincing no words, former congressman George Hansen calls himself a political prisoner inside an "American Gulag" in a recent article he wrote for "Freedom," a publication of the Church of Scientology.

"My wife has said that I should write a book called Petersburg Camp: An American Gulag," Hansen wrote in the October issue. "The Soviet Gulag system is here now in America. The longer Americans refuse to recognize it, the bigger it will grow."

Gulag is an English acronym derived from the Soviet title, "Chief Administration of Camps." In the West, the term has come to mean a concentration camp for political prisoners in repressive countries.

"There are political prisoners in America today," Hansen wrote. "Under sweeping new theories of entrapment, conspiracy and various forms of government-created crime, a man or woman can be put away and kept silent."

The seven-term representative has served six months of a 5-to-15-month prison term in a federal prison camp in Petersburg, Va. An early parole was granted Wednesday by the U.S. Commission, and Hansen will be home for Christmas, unless he declines to accept the Dec. 20 parole.

Hansen told reporters Wednesday that he may not accept the parole, if conditions are placed on it.

Hansen, the first member of Congress prosecuted under the 1978 Ethics in Government Act, was convicted of violating the law by failing to disclose \$334,000 in loans, plus profits from the sale of silver contracts and other transactions.

In the October article, Hansen contended he was pursued by the "American Gulag system" because he frequently spoke out on issues. He said "arbitrary" law-enforcement

practices are selectively applied for political purposes.

Ferraro," he wrote.

Hansen said Americans may believe they live in a democracy, and that the FBI and IRS go after crooks and tax cheats, until "one day he finds out that he, or a relative or close friend or neighbor, is on the wrong side of one or more of those agencies."

Although Hansen wrote that people who found him too dangerous wanted to put him in prison to silence him, the scheme apparently has not worked.

In addition to the article for the Church of Scientology, Hansen wrote a letter that was published by columnist Jack Anderson on poor prison food and unsanitary conditions.

On Thursday, Hansen had ended his third day of a fast to protest prison food and how it was prepared, said an Idaho friend and writer John Scoreby.

Scoreby said the protest was not a hunger strike. But he said Hansen was "refraining from eating foods they prepare until they change, and it's safe to eat."

Hansen said he had lost two pounds each day of the fast, and has lost 71 pounds since he entered the prison camp.

## Not much snow, rain in forecast

TWIN FALLS — You can't please all of the people, the saying goes, and the National Weather Service is in that position with its 1986-87 winter forecast just issued for the entire country.

Idaho residents whose jobs require much highway travel or outdoor work may be happy, but ski resort operators, skiers and irrigators will not be if the forecasted precipitation and temperatures come to pass.

Reports from the NWS say that areas west of the Rocky Mountains, which include Southern Idaho, can look for milder-than-normal weather. The report also shows that there is more than a 55-percent chance that above-normal temperatures will be experienced west of the Rockies, except for the northern Great Basin lands in Idaho and Oregon. The same area is expected to see below-normal amounts of precipitation.

The 30-day outlook for Idaho, however, indicates there will be near-normal temperatures and precipitation over the state during December.

A summary of November terms the conditions generally cold, with about-normal precipitation in Southern Idaho.

The coldest temperatures occurred Nov. 7-11, when the readings were 5 to 15 degrees below normal. In the last half of the month the situation reversed itself, with temperatures ranging from 5 to 10 degrees above normal. High temperatures in Magic Valley were in the mid 30s to low 40s, with lows in the upper teens to low 20s.

Precipitation in the Magic Valley ranged from nine-tenths of an inch to three-fourths of an inch.

In the Twin Falls area the average monthly temperature was 37.2 degrees, which is 1.7 degrees below normal for the month. The average daytime maximum temperature was 47.4, and the average low was

## UI range scientist says study looks promising

TWIN FALLS (AP) — A University of Idaho research scientist says a six-year study shows grazing cattle weekly from one pasture to another has yielded average daily gains per head equal to those of traditional systems, while offering greater management flexibility.

Dr. Kenneth Sanders said the study indicates the system also enhances forage vigor.

Sanders conducted his research on 960 acres of crested wheatgrass pastures at UI's experimental area in Cassia County, located at 4,800 feet and receiving an annual rainfall of 12 inches.

Sanders had predicted the system when optimally stocked would yield

greater gains per acre than continuous use or two-pasture deferred rotation.

But the success of the project seemed to lie in uniform utilization of grass, he said.

Cattle that graze a pasture for longer periods of time tend to return to plants on which they have previously fed in search of regrowth, which they find more palatable.

As a result, grazing often is spotty, with never-grazed plants growing old and unpalatable, he said.

The system also allows more forage for fall grazing, he said.

"I think that, for the operators who are ready to go for intensive grazing, this is the way to go," he said.

## Bean commission proposes 50% tax increase

TWIN FALLS — The Idaho Bean Commission is asking the state's farmers and bean processors to support a 50-percent increase in its tax for promotion and research.

In meetings next week in the Magic and Treasure valleys, the main bean growing areas, the state board will propose an increase of 3 cents for each 100 pounds of beans marketed.

The current "bean tax" is 6 cents a hundredweight, of which 4 cents is paid by growers and 2 cents by processors. It last was changed in 1978.

"We feel it (an increase) is necessary," says Leslie R. Jones, commission member from Twin Falls. With the new money, the commission would boost its budget for advertising and promoting the state's beans.

"We're seeing all other commodities are willing to spend more dollars in promotion and here, beans, we're just limited by what we can do. We're at the same level we were 10 years ago," said Harold West, commission consultant and former administrator.

The commission has the power itself to ask the Idaho Legislature for a hike. However, the eight-member board wants to sound out the industry first, before taking official action, West

said.

It has scheduled sessions next week at three Magic Valley locations:

- Burley — 1:30 p.m., basement, Cassia County Law Enforcement Building, one-half block east of the county Courthouse.

- Twin Falls — 2 p.m., Room 116, Shields Building, College of Southern Idaho.
- Jerome — 1:30 p.m., lounge, Wood Cafe, 120 W. Main.

Each meeting most likely will include an informal vote on the proposal, Jones said. If ordered by the Legislature, the additional fee would bring the Idaho bean tax to 9 cents per pound. • See BEANS on Page B2

## City's self-insurance record 'pretty good' — Bengoechea

TWIN FALLS — The city of Twin Falls paid a total of \$273 for four tort claims filed during the first 11 months of its new self-insurance program.

City officials think that's not bad, because the people who blame the city for various damages and injuries had sought a total of \$3 million. Most of that total amount, however, is due to a \$2.5 million tort claim filed Nov. 17 by Aryan Nations member Wayne Jones of Twin Falls.

Jones alleges that his constitutional rights were violated when he was arrested for concealing a semi-automatic handgun June 17. A misdemeanor charge later was dropped.

But Jones claimed the arrest was a "direct deprivation of my 1st, 2nd, 4th, 5th and 9th Amendment rights," and he pre-

sented a "bill" to the city for \$2.5 million.

The city has not yet responded to the tort claim and has 90 days to do so, said City Attorney Shane Bengoechea.

Twin Falls began insuring itself the first of the year because its policy with a private company ended, with no quotes on hand from other companies. With a carryover of \$146,215, the city leveled \$211,000 this year to support the insurance program.

Of the 17 claims filed during this year, a majority were under \$500 and alleged vehicle property damage, such as a toilet overflowing from a sewer problem. The remainder involved personal injury.

The claims paid by the city were all for property damage. Two women received \$50, which is what they requested, for oil-stained vehicles caused by the street department.

The city met the request of Mountain States Telephone and Telegraph for \$134 for

a broken cable. The amount, however, was paid from the water fund and not the insurance fund.

The city also paid \$38 for damage from a chimney backing up. The remainder of the plumber's request for \$689 was paid by a separate contractor.

Three of the claims are pending. One is a \$25,000 request from a man who claims he suffered injuries when his car hit a street divider.

Eight of the claims were denied by the city, but that doesn't mean the city has seen the last of the allegations or of those making them.

According to law, a person is required first to file notice of a tort claim with the city. If the city denies the claim, the person may turn to a court to seek satisfaction.

A case in point involves a couple who filed a \$500,000 tort claim against the city and Twin Falls School District. The couple, Kenneth and Debra Sterrett, claimed their son was injured April 19 when a soccer net allegedly fell on the boy at Fernside Elementary School. The net was used in a youth soccer program co-sponsored by the city.

The claim was denied by the city. The couple subsequently filed in court a lawsuit requesting \$10,000 in damages, attorney fees, and other damages that may be proved at a trial, said City Department Director LaMar Orton, who manages the self-insurance program.

The city is involved with more lawsuits over incidents which took place while the city was still insured. The litigation is being handled through and defended by the companies that formerly insured the city, said Bengoechea.

He didn't know how many lawsuits were pending.

Bengoechea said the track record of the new program was "pretty good."

City Manager Tom Courtney agreed. If the city had bought private insurance, it would have had a large deductible clause, in addition to the premiums. By using the self-insurance program, the city is saving money, he said.

Bengoechea admitted that the city someday may be faced with a large, valid claim.

Ironically, the smaller claims have more potential for costing the city money than those in which people are alleging "horrendous damages" and seeking millions of dollars, he said.

Courtney said the city staff is more aware of potential liability because of the self-insurance program.

City crews are currently placing about 3 to 4 inches of bark under park playground equipment to soften not only any falls, but potential liability.

# Envirosafe president says tests prove groundwater not polluted

**BOISE (AP)** — Exhaustive testing over the past two years has proven conclusively that hazardous waste disposal operations at the Envirosafe Services of Idaho Inc. facility in Owyhee County have not contaminated groundwater supplies in the area, company President Larry Haack says.

On Thursday, Haack released the report on the testing conducted by an independent team of engineers, saying it showed that trace levels of contaminants previously found in groundwater samples at the site can be traced to the underground supplies when the initial monitoring wells were drilled.

"This report concludes that the previously suspected groundwater contamination was caused by the groundwater monitoring-well drilling and construction activities, and not caused by any leakage from on-site activities," Haack said.

The company has come under intense criticism from local officials and citizens for operation of the dump. Critics have warned that the soil makeup in the area would allow for other hazardous waste to be disposed at the dump to seep into the groundwater supplies used by the nearby Snake River.

A major target of the attacks have been abandoned missile silos used by a previous operator of the dump for storing hazardous wastes.

"It cost us hundreds of thousands of dollars and countless manhours, but it's now certain that the waste placed in the old missile silos during the Wescon ownership of the site is not leaking into the groundwater," Haack said.

He conceded the testing did not preclude the possibility that waste is leaching from those silos but only that if it is it is not contaminating groundwater supplies.

The testing, begun in 1983, has cost the company about \$500,000 so far, Haack said, and it will be continued indefinitely. The company has already paid hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines for various violations of federal hazardous waste disposal regulations, but it has made a number of changes to upgrade operations in recent years.

The testing, according to Haack, was done by Morrison Knudsen Co., Hiddiston Drilling and Pumping Co., CH2M Hill Inc. and Dynamac Corp.

His report has already been turned over to the Environmental Protection Agency and the state Department of Health and Welfare.

# Panel calls for reduction of cattle grazing in SNRA

**STANLEY (AP)** — A range management panel that includes cattlemen, as well as environmentalists, has endorsed a 66-percent reduction in cattle grazing on federal land in the Sawtooth National Recreation Area as the best alternative in the drive to protect grazing and fisheries habitat there.

But in unananimously adopting the proposal, one of five alternatives offered by a study team headed by Stanley Basin cattlemen Mark Stark, the Salmon River Coordinating Committee said the ranchers should be compensated for their loss of grazing from the reduction.

Although that compensation could run into the millions of dollars, Stark's team recommended the grazing reduction as the most cost-effective of five alternatives considered.

The committee is part of the Challis Experimental Range Stewardship Program, a federal initiative under way only in Idaho and one other state to build cooperation, rather than confrontation, among all the parties with interests in federal land.

The proposal is intended to ease the impact of grazing on critical steelhead and salmon spawning grounds in the region's streams.

It calls for prohibiting grazing on the west side of State Highway 21 in the Stanley Lake Creek drainage, as well as Valley Creek and Marsh Creek. The Salmon River drainage would be closed from Nip and Tuck Creek canyon downstream, except for trailing cattle to pasture in the spring and fall.

The net effect would be to reduce the grazing units in the area from over 9,100 to less than 3,100. At the same time, the proposal placed a value of \$443 on each deleted grazing unit. That valuation would mean compensation to ranchers currently holding those permits could total \$2.6 million.

SNRA Superintendent Al Ashton said neither his agency nor the Sawtooth National Forest would be a source of the money. The committee, however, is considering seeking the funds from either the Bonneville Power Administration through its fisheries mitigation program or a special congressional appropriation.

The coordinating committee will meet again next month on the compensation issue.

# Court: Detective overstepped line

**BOISE (AP)** — A Bonner County sheriff's detective overstepped his bounds when he walked on a man's property in the middle of the night looking for signs of marijuana cultivation so he could obtain a search warrant, the Idaho Court of Appeals ruled.

In a decision handed down Thursday, the appeal is based on the conviction of Jon Dale Mason on cultivation of marijuana. The court said the evidence obtained was illegal because the probable cause for the search warrant hinged on Officer Paul Morton's illicit nighttime walk on Mason's property.

The court also refused to apply the exclusionary rule, which allows evidence seized with an improper

search warrant to be admitted if the officer acted in good faith. Because the search warrant was invalid because of an officer's improper conduct, the rule did not apply, the court said.

Mason lived with his family about 15 miles from Sandpoint on 16 acres of land, with a two-story home, a greenhouse, a shop and a garagehouse located in the center of the property, court records state.

Morton entered the property on Jan. 25, 1984, and later obtained a search warrant based on Morton's contentions that he saw plants that resembled marijuana in the greenhouse and grow lights in the upper story of a building, the court said.

The only marijuana found during the search was on the ground floor of the greenhouse in an enclosed room surrounded by hay with a concealed entrance, the court said.

The search warrant was granted because of Morton's observations, a prior conviction Mason had for marijuana cultivation in 1975, a tip several months old from an informant and a tip from an anonymous caller who claimed to have seen marijuana growing at the Mason home.

The court ruled that Morton's observations were the only justifiable reason for granting the search warrant, and said the search warrant was invalid because the sighting was made improperly.

# Autopsy shows Gooding woman strangled

**REDLANDS, Calif. (AP)** — A 20-year-old former Gooding woman, described by friends as peppy and outgoing, was strangled and suffocated with a soft material such as a necktie or shirt, authorities say.

An autopsy on the body of Corinna Novis, who moved to Redlands last spring from Gooding, also showed she had been sexually assaulted, said Bernadine County Coroner Brian McCormick.

Novis was believed to have been kidnaped Nov. 7 from outside a

Redlands shopping center and she probably was killed later that night, according to Deputy District Attorney Raymond Haight. Her partly decomposed body was found in a shallow, sandy grave in a Fontana vineyard on Nov. 15.

The friendly woman had worked as a clerk at a local insurance office and taught routines to University of Redlands cheerleaders.

Authorities have charged James Gregory Marlow, a 30-year-old ex-

convict and martial arts expert, and Cynthia Lynn Coffman, his 24-year-old Barstow girlfriend, with kidnapping, robbery and murder in connection with the death.

Marlow's sister, Veronica Kay Koppers, 27, of Fontana, and Richard Drinkhouse, 28, of Colton, face other charges in connection with the case.

"The apparent motives in the Novis kidnapping were robbery and sexual gratification," Police Chief Robert E. Brickley said Wednesday.

# Beans Crash victims' bodies found

**PENDLETON, Ore. (AP)** — A federal investigator examined the wreckage of a helicopter ambulance on Thursday, trying to pinpoint the cause of a crash that left three dead.

Wally Stripling of the National Transportation Safety Board in Seattle arrived in northeast Oregon to investigate the cause of Wednesday's accident.

Searchers found the bodies in the helicopter shortly after midnight Thursday, several hours after the pilot radioed that he was flying in fog.

The victims were identified as the pilot, Freddy Marshall Davis, 37 of Pendleton; registered nurse Jim

Borgman, 50, of Walla Walla, Wash.; and paramedic Nancy Neerenberg, 37, of Hermiston.

The wreckage was discovered in a wheat field about seven miles west of Pendleton and just north of Interstate 84, said Oregon State Police trooper David Fry.

Last radio contact with the Lifeguard Medical Transport helicopter was made at 5:31 p.m. Wednesday when its pilot told air-traffic controllers in Seattle that he was flying in fog but was "unable and not qualified to fly in fog," said state police trooper Gary Miller.

A short time later, a person monitoring a citizens band radio heard Davis say he was running out of fuel, police said.

Fry said the helicopter did not burn on impact.

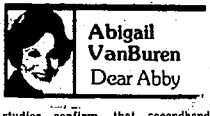

Beware of companies selling hazardous toys

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Consumer Product Safety Commission, calling on adults to exercise care in selecting toys as Christmas gifts, reports that there have been 27 toy recalls or repair campaigns in the first nine months of this year.

Under the various programs, manufacturers or importers agreed to accept the return of the toys and provide refunds or replacements and most of these toys should be gone from store shelves.

## Lumber producers want tariff raised

WASHINGTON (AP) — Lumber producers, claiming they suffer unfair competition from Canada, Thursday asked the Commerce Department to increase a preliminary 15 percent penalty duty against Canadian softwood lumber.

The dispute, which has soured U.S.-Canada trade relations for months, revolves around the U.S. industry's allegation that provincial timber-cutting fees in Canada are so much lower than U.S. rates that they constitute an unfair subsidy.

The Commerce Department, under pressure from U.S. lumber interests, imposed a preliminary duty of 15 percent on Canadian softwood Oct. 16. That ruling is subject to a final decision by Commerce officials by Dec. 30.

During a public hearing today, attorney Alan Wolff, representing a coalition of U.S. lumber companies, told government officials a duty of at least 25 percent is needed.

Meanwhile, Canadian lumber producers scheduled to testify later told reporters they are still angry with the Canadian government for making an offer to settle the dispute without consulting them.

Adam Zimmerman of Noranda, Canada, charged that Ottawa's offer to settle the dispute by imposing a 15 percent export tax on Canadian lumber was made on the basis of "a comprehensive background of ig-

norance."

Canada, in an effort to head off a potentially more severe penalty by the Commerce Department, has offered to impose the 15 percent export tax on its softwood lumber shipments, if the U.S. industry agrees to withdraw its petition asking Commerce officials to set a duty of up to 36 percent.

U.S. lumber representatives are expected to issue a statement Friday responding to the Canadian offer.

Barring a negotiated settlement, the Commerce Department will make a final ruling by Dec. 30 on whether the lumber imports are subsidized and whether a penalty duty should be made permanent.

The duty would not become final unless the U.S. International Trade Commission ruled the imports are injuring the domestic industry. That ruling is due Feb. 17.

U.S. industry sources have suggested the offer indicates the Canadian government is open to further negotiations and a negotiated settlement has not been ruled out.

Meanwhile, the Canadian forest industry, backed by a coalition of U.S. homebuilders and other users of Canadian lumber, continues to press its case that the Commerce Department was wrong and must reverse its preliminary finding that a subsidy situation does exist.

## Guard faces drug charge

OROFINO (AP) — A guard at Idaho Correctional Institution-Orofino has been suspended without pay following his arrest on a felony charge of possessing amphetamines.

Frank Leroy Ramey, 42, of Kamiah, was freed on \$500 bond Wednesday after being arraigned before Magistrate Judge Michael J. Griffin in Second District Court at Grangeville.

Ramey was charged with possession of amphetamines, commonly known as "cross-tops." He was also charged with possession of marijuana, a misdemeanor.

Idaho County Sheriff's Lt. Richard T. Ziegler said the drugs were found in Ramey's home.

## Official advises shots for whooping cough

BOISE (AP) — A dramatic increase in the number of cases of pertussis, or whooping cough, in Idaho has led a health official to encourage proper immunization for the sometimes fatal disease.

Dr. Charles Brokopp, state epidemiologist, said pertussis is the most common preventable childhood disease in Idaho. To control the highly communicable disease, parents must have their children inoculated, he said.

## Another look at lottery plan

RAPID CITY, S.D. (AP) — Officials from South Dakota, Montana and Idaho have decided the idea of a tri-state lottery merits further discussion at meetings in January and May.

Idaho Department of Law Enforcement Director John Rooney along with officials from Montana met in Rapid City on Wednesday with some South Dakota legislators to discuss the regional lottery. Voters in each state approved the concept of a state lottery in the November election.

"There was a real strong feeling of

the necessity on cooperation, not only in the area of purchasing equipment and drafting legislation, but in the actual cooperation of the lottery itself," said state Sen. Dave Laustsen, D-Aberdeen, who organized the meeting.

Although the lottery initiative Idaho voters overwhelmingly approved last month is clouded by serious legal questions, Rooney, representing the administration of Gov.-elect Cecil Andrus, said the new governor wants to gather as much information about the issue as possible.

rise in pertussis reported this year as compared to 1985," Brokopp said. About 50 cases have been reported. Although the disease is found primarily in children, adults can contract it, too, he said. Three shots of DTP — diphtheria, tetanus and pertussis — vaccine should be administered before a child is 6 to 8 months old. A fourth dose should be given at 15 to 16 months. Sometimes, a fifth vaccination is needed just before the child enters kindergarten, he said.

Pertussis has a significantly higher incidence than other childhood diseases such as measles and rubella, with one case each reported this year, and mumps with eight cases. No cases of diphtheria, polio or tetanus were recorded.

## Evans freezes wages for state employees

BOISE (AP) — A day after being advised of the situation, Gov. John Evans has ordered Health and Welfare Director Rose Bowman to rescind merit pay increases given six exempt employees last week.

Evans also ordered salaries frozen for workers in all state agencies, who are exempt from civil service protection, at least until he leaves office on Jan. 5.

Budget Director Martin Peterson said Evans took the action on Thursday to avoid any claims that attempts to provide unwarranted economic benefits to workers who could be considered lame-ducks with the advent of the new administration of Gov.-elect Cecil Andrus just a month from now.

"It was more a question of ethics, the appearance of boosting salaries before leaving office," Peterson said.

Andrus spokesman Marc Johnson said the governor-elect would likely keep the pay freeze for exempt workers, those who are employed at the pleasure of the governor, until he finalizes the personnel roster for his administration.

Peterson said Evans' directive will not affect merit raises granted last week to Health and Welfare workers covered by Civil Service or similar pay hikes granted in recent weeks and months to civil service workers in other agencies.

## Boisean hoping doll will be a heartthrob

BOISE (AP) — Boise's Lavonia Copeland is hoping Baby Sweet Beats will become the heartthrob of Idaho girls and boys.

A grandmother of 14, Mrs. Copeland is test-marketing her own soft-bodied doll in the Treasure Valley and other parts of the Northwest this Christmas. A tiny battery-pack that gives Baby Sweet Beats a subtle "heartbeat" sets the doll aside from others.

The heartbeats are hand-stitched into each doll and surrounded by soft padding to keep the battery pack safe from tiny hands, said Betty Lou Donnelley, marketing representative.

The battery packs keep the doll's heart beating continuously for a year, and batteries can easily be replaced, Ms. Donnelley said.

Baby Sweet Beats is a cloth doll made from four pattern pieces to provide a chubby, rather than flat, appearance. Joints and arms and legs allow the dolls to sit and hold out their arms, and Mrs. Copeland said the yarn hair is safer than synthetic wigs.

The dolls will sell for about \$40, and Mrs. Donnelley said a collector's edition will be priced slightly higher.

A special edition of 5,000 dolls will carry a "born in Idaho" stamp with a birth date.

# Montana agencies request new plates

HELENA (AP) — The 1987 Montana Legislature will be asked to spend \$1.8 million for the issuance of new vehicle license plates, Daryl "Bud" Schoen, chief of the state Registrar's Bureau at Deer Lodge, said Thursday.

Meanwhile, the state Centennial Office announced the new centennial plates will go on sale at county treasurers' offices sometime next month, depending on availability of production materials.

Given the tight budget facing lawmakers, Schoen admitted he is not optimistic about legislative approval of new plates to replace the present design, which was issued in conjunction with the national bicentennial in 1976.

He said the state needs new plates because it could bring in additional registration revenue. Many motorists are driving with expired plates and changing the design would make their violations obvious to law enforcement officials and would force them to register their vehicles to obtain the new plates, he explained.

Production of the centennial plates will implement a new identification system that will be used on all plates should the Legislature approve money for a general plate issue, Schoen said.

Letters will be added to plate numbers and the total digits will be limited to six, he said. The change is

needed because, in some counties identified by double digits, there is too little room for all the numbers on the specially designed centennial plates.

Also, law enforcement officials say a plate with only six digits is easier to remember, according to Tim Donahue, assistant to Schoen.

If the Legislature were to approve a new general plate issue, its design would be similar to the centennial version, he said. The design features a gold outline of the state, topped by a copper silhouette of mountains. The lower left corner contains the legend, "100 years" in copper letters and the bottom of the plate has a copper "Montana," with the official centennial logo replacing the letter "o."

People can buy the special plates for \$19.89 when registering their vehicles next year. If motorists want to retain their present number or personalized plate, the cost will be \$21.89. Those wishing a new personalized imprint must pay \$39.89.

Special edition plates that incorporate the numbers 1989, 1889, 100 or 89 also will be available in each county for \$29.

Gift certificates for centennial plates, valued at \$19.89, are available from the Centennial Office in Helena for \$25.

Proceeds from the plate sales will be used to finance centennial activities in the state.

# Utah studies helmets for young ATV riders

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A special legislative committee has completed work on proposed legislation that would require young all-terrain vehicle riders to wear helmets and ban the transportation of unregistered ATVs, officials say.

The Off-Road Vehicle Task Force will present four related bills on Dec. 10 to the Legislature's Natural Resources Interim Committee for its approval.

The bills would put on the statute books for the first time effective regulation of Utah's 100,000-plus all-terrain, off-road vehicles, committee members said.

The measures would require that all ATV drivers under 18 wear helmets when riding on public lands. Children under 8 would be barred from driving ATVs and drivers between 8 and 16 years would be required to take an ATV safety course.

Only after such instruction would they be allowed to ride, and then only while under supervision of an adult.

Transporting unregistered ATVs would be prohibited, except for dealers.

The bills also would provide for local jurisdictions and the federal government to post roads and lands as open to ATV travel. For economic reasons, the posting could be done by publication of maps.

Members of the task force included legislators, public safety officials and ATV users and dealers.

The legislative package would entirely revamp the registration process that now functions more or less on the honor system, luring only some 30,000 owners a year to register. The requirement that vehicles couldn't even be transported on trailers on public highways without registrations would ensure participation of most owners, proponents say.

Vehicles of the 1988 model year and onward would be required to be state titled, as well as registered.

Fern King, 82, of Lewiston, died Wednesday at St. Joseph's Regional Medical Center.

Her sister, Grace Hobson, 84, of

Giffard, died at the scene of the two-car accident Monday. Police said Hobson ran a stop sign and her car was struck by another car. King was a passenger in Hobson's car.

Two people in the other car were treated in the hospital's emergency room and released.

# Donations could keep game bird farm open past its prime

**BOISE** — Public support in the form of donated start-up money, management and volunteer labor from the community may well keep the Jerome Game Bird Farm in operation beyond its considered usefulness by the Idaho Department of Fish and Game.

That was the word at public hearing conducted by the Idaho Fish and Game Commission here Thursday night. Robb Kinsey, president of the Jerome Rod and Gun Club, and Dick Jordan, a biology teacher in the Jerome school system, presented a program which evidently will lead a loose-knit organization to bid for a

lease on the 40-acre site a mile east and a mile south of the Jerome city limits.

The commission is scheduled to vote whether to accept the proposal this morning.

Jordan said he had been assured of start-up money from the Jerome City Council, the Prairie Falcon Chapter of the National Audubon Society and what he termed a large number of private individuals. He said his group plans to reduce costs by asking farmers for contributions of grain and also by working various area seed companies for their sweepings and culls, among other donations.

"You can see very little taxpayer money will be spent," Jordan said,

adding that he also was excited by the prospect of establishing an education center at the site. That would include perpetuating the showbird raceways, establishing ideal pheasant winter and nesting cover and possibly adding an

agricultural museum, which, Jordan said, has been proposed by various senior citizens' groups.

"I think part of the problem is the farm has been unmanaged," he said. "We've heard of years when 15,000 birds were raised there and that is

the level we would like to see," he said.

Kinsey said that in one day of "walking around" in the city of Jerome, he generated 200 signatures on a petition from individuals who said they would support the farm.

"What we're basically saying," Kinsey said, "is give us an opportunity as a community to really raise lots and lots of pheasants at the farm."

Fish and Game Department Director Jerry Conley anticipated little problem with his department's accepting the group's plan if it is indeed willing to take over the facility. Conley noted that the commission had asked for a feasibility study on the farm, which had resulted in its

decision to try for a leasing and continued operation situation rather than closing the facility and selling off the land.

But Conley and others at the public hearing raised the question of whether game farm-bred birds can substantially contribute to wild population enhancement. State game bird manager Gary Will of the IDFG said the lease probably would stipulate that any roosters be released during the hunting season to maximize sportsman recovery and that all hens, which would come from a day-old chick program, would be carried over the winter and released in the spring as possible contributors during the reproduction season.

"We had five starters and three were ready to play," he said.

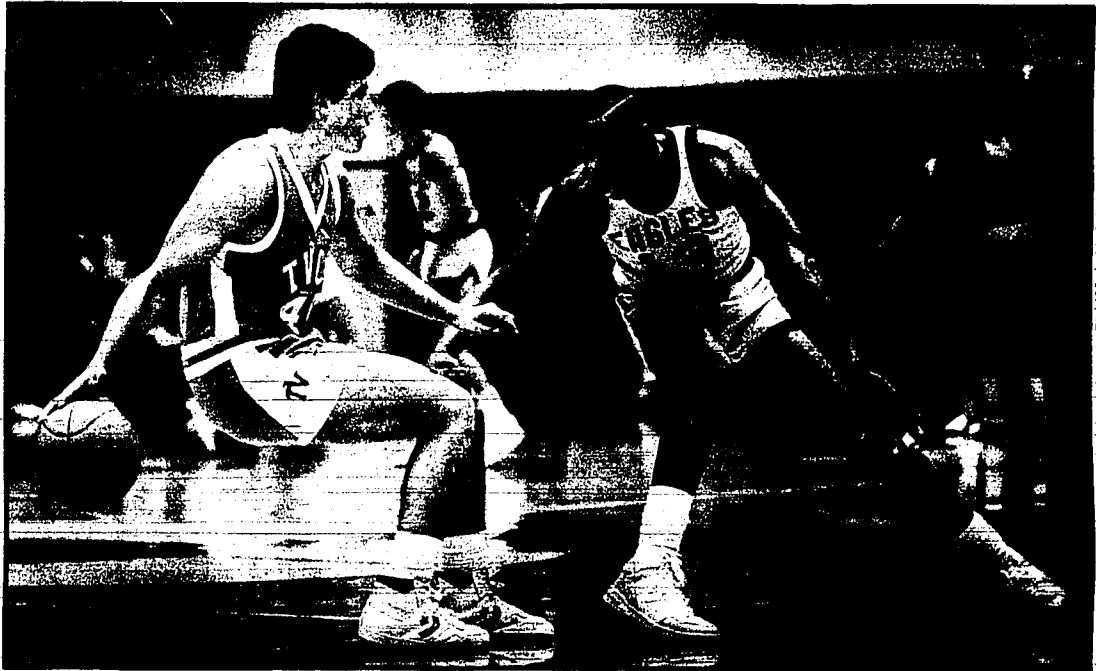
TVCC looked as if it would give the Golden Eagles all they could handle by knocking the game 13-13 six minutes into the contest.

# Head coach, athletic director hand in resignations to SMU

**DALLAS** — Southern Methodist Athletic Director Bob Hitch and head football coach Bobby Collins have submitted their resignations to the university's board of governors, board chairman and Gov.-elect Bill Clements said Thursday.

But acting university President William B. Stallcup Jr. said he had not received resignations from the two, who have been under fire during a football recruiting scandal that has included the sudden retirement of President L. Donald Shields.

"Both Mr. Hitch's and Mr. Collins' resignations were discussed," Clements said. "I did not say it was accepted or rejected. Who brought it up first, I'm not prepared to say."

Clements addressed reports of the resignations at a news conference Thursday afternoon which focused on his economic plans for the state when he takes office as governor.

He refused to say whether the resignations were offered voluntarily or were requested and would not discuss further details.

In a late afternoon edition, the Dallas Times Herald quoted Cle-

ments as saying after the SMU board meeting earlier in the day that the resignations were offered within the last two to three days.

He said the board tabled them, but a decision could be made as early as Friday, according to the newspaper.

The resignations come amid pressure from university faculty members to take action to stem the tide of allegations of recruiting violations in the football program.

"They haven't submitted them (resignations) to me. I assume they would come to me," Stallcup said.

"I do know there have been con-

versations going on with respect to this," said Stallcup, who took over after Shields retired last month. A university spokesman said then that the recruiting scandal had aggravated Shields' diabetes condition.

Lonnie Kilever, faculty athletic representative to the NCAA and SWC, said it would be unusual for the board to have the resignations and Stallcup not to know about it.

"The usual line of authority on matters dealing with personnel decisions throughout the university, not just the athletic department, is to the board through the president,"

Kilever said.

There has been pressure from university faculty members for SMU to take action to stem the tide of allegations of recruiting violations in the football program.

SMU, which was put on a three-year probation last year, could lose its football program for two years if the latest allegations prove true.

Sports Information spokesman Kent Johnson said, "We have nothing at all (on the resignation report)." He said Hitch was out of the office Thursday attending a meeting and he didn't know where

Collins was. Collins' wife, reached at home, declined any comment.

The Times Herald quoted an unidentified source in the SMU athletic department who said Hitch and Collins had been trying to work a settlement of their contracts with the board of governors.

Hitch has three years remaining on his contract and Collins has five years left on his.

The source said Hitch and Collins wanted the settlements in exchange for their resignations.

## Huskies coach named Setenich's successor

The 42-year-old Hall has been head assistant to Washington Coach Don James for the past three years and has worked in the Huskies' program for 12 years.

Hall and James have worked together since they were assistant

coaches at the University of Colorado. Hall also has worked for James at Kent State.

Although the Bleymaier and the search committee that helped him hire a new coach never announced finalists to the job, Hall emerged as a favorite earlier in the week when the Statesman reported he was registered at the Boise motel.

Former Idaho State University assistant Coach Mike Sheppard, now the head Coach at Cal State-Long Beach, had also been mentioned by the Statesman as the possible candidate.

The Boise newspaper also mentioned former Montana State Coach Doug Graber, now an assistant with the Kansas City Chiefs of the NFL, and San Francisco 49ers quarterback Coach Mike Holmgren, a former Brigham Young University assistant, as possible candidates.

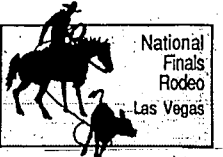
## Cooper, Young, Juker ready for rodeo action

# Daugherty's 29 pace Cavs to 113-105 defeat of Detroit

RICHFIELD, Ohio - Brad Daugherty is trying to send a message to his critics every time he steps on the basketball court.

"I had the rap in college that I wasn't competitive, that I was soft. That's crazy," Daugherty said Thursday night after he matched his season high with 29 points to lead the Cleveland Cavaliers to a 113-105 victory over the Detroit Pistons.

The former North Carolina center, who was the first player taken in the 1986 NBA draft, also came out ahead in his personal match with veteran Detroit center Bill Laimbeer, outrebounding Laimbeer 10-7 and outscoring him 29-25.

Each of them finished with five personal fouls, one away from disqualification.

The victory was the Cavaliers' fourth straight, their longest winning streak since they won six in a row in March and April of 1985. The loss snapped Detroit's four-game winning streak.

Cleveland trailed 78-73 with two minutes to go in the third period but then ran off 12 straight points to end the quarter with an 85-78 lead.

The Pistons tied it at 100-100 when Joe Dumars made a fast-break layup with 3:20 to play. A pair of free throws by Keith Lee put the Cavaliers ahead for good 107 seconds later.

John Bagley scored a season-high 24 points for Cleveland, and John "Hot Rod" Williams collected 22 points and a season-high 18 rebounds.

Adrian Dantley led Detroit with 26 points and Laimbeer had 25. Laimbeer, however, was shut-out during the pivotal third quarter.

### Atlanta 109 Houston 93

HOUSTON - Atlanta's Dominique Wilkins grabbed 10 rebounds and had 14 of his 25 points in the first half as the Hawks won their fourth straight game, 109-93, over the slumping Houston Rockets Thursday night.

Reserve guard Mike McGee scored 12 of his 18 points in the fourth quarter as the Hawks received 53 points off the bench, including 16 from Cliff Levingston. Houston, 7-9, lost its third straight game and failed to reach 100 points for the sixth time in seven games.

Wilkins scored 10 points in the first quarter as Atlanta charged to a 14-8 start. But Robert Reid and Rodney McCray, who scored 17 each, brought Houston back to an 18-18 tie.

The Hawks, 14-3, went ahead 29-22 behind the floor leadership of Glenn Rivers who had five assists and seven points.

Atlanta's balance scoring, headed by reserve center Jon Koncak's eight points, helped the Hawks to a 52-40 halftime lead.

Only McCray salvaged Houston's

first half with 13 points as the Rockets hit just six of 26 shots in the second quarter.

### Seattle 109 San Antonio 102

SAN ANTONIO, Texas - Tom Chambers scored 36 points to lead the Seattle SuperSonics to 109-102 NBA victory over the San Antonio Spurs Thursday night.

Seattle rallied from a 96-90 deficit at the 3:55 mark as Chambers and Dale Ellis teamed for the last 19 points by the Sonics. Chambers had 11, including one free-thrower. Ellis had the other eight, including two three-pointers.

The Spurs lost their fourth straight game despite the efforts of David Greenwood, who pulled down a career-high 10 rebounds and scored a season-best 16 points. Alvin Robertson added 23 points for San Antonio.

The Spurs were led in the first half by the play of Greenwood. The seven-year veteran forward picked up 15 rebounds and 13 points as the Spurs gained a 56-53 halftime lead.

## Bruin cagers have their hands full tonight against Indians

TWIN FALLS - Twin Falls High School boys' basketball Coach John Astorquia knows his Bruins will have to hit the court running when they face hot Pocatello here tonight in their season opener.

"Four of our first five games are Region III (tournament) seedings game, and the other one is only a conference game," says the Bruin mentor, whose ballclub will take on the Indians at 8 p.m. in the TFHS gym. "Between (Dec. 5 and the 18th, we play all four of the other teams in Region III - Poky, Burley, Highland and Minico."

The scheduling crunch rose from the expansion of the Gem State Conference from nine teams to 10 with the inclusion of Rigby this season. All teams under Idaho High School Activities Association rules can only

play 20 regular-season games, and each GSC member school now has 18 conference games.

"You know in past years we've had a couple of games with Nampa and a game with Jerome to get untracked," Astorquia says. "This year we can't be messing around. The lineup we start with is pretty much the lineup we'll be playing with, so we'd better be ready."

Getting ready for Pocatello has been a nightmare for the Bruins for the past three years, during which Jerry Koester's program was consistently coming for the league championship. But both Koester and the biggest factor in the Indians' success during that period, Wade Wyatt, are gone, leaving Poky something of a mystery team.

"What won't be a mystery to Astorquia is the style of Koester's replacement, Rex Kress. Astorquia coached against Kress' teams for

first four seasons at TFHS when Kress was at Highland.

"I saw them play Burley (a 61-61 victory in Burley Wednesday night), and there really haven't been a lot of changes," says Astorquia. "They play pretty good defense, man-to-man to start and zone later in the game. They work hard on defense and the offensive styles are similar. Jerry basically ran a passing game, and so does Coach Kress."

If Wyatt, who led the Indians to two straight GSC championships and a second-place finish in last year's state A-1 tournament, is gone, Poky still has some offensive weapons. The most notable is 6-foot-4 John Murrillo - the sixth man on last year team, who can score inside and out.

"Their big advantages are height and bulk," says Astorquia. "The Allison kid (senior Todd) is 6-8 and weighs 195, 200 pounds. Murrillo is 6-4

and weighs 195, so they're physical players - especially when you consider that our 'big' guy (6-4 senior center Ken Fuchs) is 6-4. Another advantage is that they've played a game - and they won it. I'm sure they're feeling confident."

If the Bruins have an advantage, Astorquia believes it's ruthness - an edge he's happy to take at this point in the season.

"I think we're a little bit quicker throughout the lineup than we have been, and we may have more depth," he says. "We're playing good defense, working hard. We're getting the team defense concept down, and I'm happy with that, and we're shooting the ball pretty well. We're moving the ball up and down the floor, and we haven't turned the ball over a whole lot in the scrimmages we've had with our JV's. Those are all good signs at this point."

"Running the floor well."

The guys up front are Fuchs, who averaged five points and five rebounds as a starter last year, and 6-3 Alex LeBeau. They're not very big by GSC standards - and that's the problem, according to Astorquia.

"That's the question mark - can we rebound with Pocatello?", he says. "But that's going to be a question in every game."

Astorquia has told his ballclub that a bad December could assure Twin Falls will be away from home for the Region III playoffs, and he thinks it's ready to play.

"One thing we have in our favor is that we're starting a little bit later this year," he says. "We've had four or five more practices than we did last year and we've gotten in a couple more two-a-days. It's a tough schedule, but everybody's in the same boat."

## Tide's Bennett awarded Lombardi Trophy

HOUSTON (AP) - Linebacker Cornelius Bennett of Alabama was awarded the 17th annual Lombardi Trophy - honoring the nation's outstanding college football lineman Thursday night.

The award was presented at a benefit dinner sponsored by the Downtown Rotary Club of Houston with proceeds going to cancer research.

Bennett, a 6-foot-4, 235-pound, outside linebacker, led the Crimson Tide in quarterback sacks even though he missed two games because of a pulled hamstring. He has been timed over 40 yards in 4.4 seconds. He will close out his college career when Alabama faces Washington in the

Sun Bowl on Christmas Day.

"I really don't know what to say," Bennett said before the 1,200 guests. "I guess it's like being out on the field. My heart is all into it right now."

"This is such an honor and privilege. I'd just like to thank God," said Bennett, the first player from Alabama to win the award and the second linebacker to win the award since it was first given in 1970. Tim Shillwag of Ohio State, the first recipient, was a linebacker.

Other finalists for the award voted on by 208 sportswriters and broadcasters were University of Miami tackle Jerome Brown, Brian Bosworth of Oklahoma, and Ohio

State's Chris Spielman. All four finalists were All-Americans this season.

The trophy - a 40-pound-black granite, is presented in honor of the late Vince Lombardi, former coach of the Green Bay Packers and Washington Redskins.

## Making faces a holiday gift innovation

Buhl artist will cast  
masks, present work

**BUHL** — Searching for the perfect Christmas gift for Uncle Harry who has everything?

Look no further. Maru Jolar, a multi-media artist who is currently specializing in plaster sculpture, and Jennifer Ayers, a teen-age artist, will make plaster casts of your loved ones' faces on Saturdays, Dec. 6 and 13, from 1 to 6 p.m. at the Renaissance Academy of Arts in Twin Falls.

In addition, plaster sculptures by Jolar and other artists in the community will be displayed at the Academy today and Saturday from 1-6 p.m.

"The show is everything I could find... anybody who's doing plaster," said Jolar.

Jolar, who was raised in Buhl as Mary McNealy, describes mask making as a simple process.

"This is plaster put on your face," she explained. "It dries right there and you take it off and you have a mask so it looks like you. Usually, sometimes it doesn't, but usually it looks like you."

Jolar noted that the process of making negative molds is easier than it was years ago. Plaster, which was hard and heavy, was put on a person's face until it dried and was taken off as a "negative" mold. New plaster was poured into the negative mold and the result was a "positive" mold which bore the likeness of the subject.

Today, artists use plaster gauze in thin layers. The result is a light, though fragile, mold, which dries in less time.

"Wood is good, but plaster is faster," said Jolar, smiling. "This is the quickest little sculpture show you'll ever see."

"The masks will make good Christmas presents," she added. "It's like a three-dimensional portrait."

The Buhl artist left Idaho at the age of 18 to attend school in Washington state. She received a degree in psychology and sociology from Seattle University, and worked as a probation officer in Seattle for four years.

She earned a degree in interior design from the New York School of Design.

Jolar later moved to New Orleans, got married and returned to Seattle, where she worked as a go-go dancer "for 15 minutes."

After a job conducting psychological tests for a Seattle organization, Jolar headed to British Columbia. There she lived on a small island off the coast, doing experimental psychological work at various growth centers.

"Lots of encounter groups, movement forms of meditation and Gestalt therapy," she said. At the same time, Jolar worked as a music agent on weekends, coordinating a music circuit for folk and classical musicians, traveling with them from island to island.

Jolar, whose twin brother, Robert McNealy, is a sculptor whose work has been shown internationally, said that expressing herself through various artistic mediums is an important part of her life.

"I've always done lots. I used to weave a lot. I was a dancer before I ever left Idaho. I danced in the first two Diletante productions in Twin Falls. They were 'Carousel' and 'Annie Get Your Gun,'" she laughed.

Jolar returned to Buhl in order to take care of her parents, who have since died. Plaster as an art form began to interest her somewhere between British Columbia and Idaho.

"I hadn't done any before I got here. What I wanted to do was cast a hand — the positive mold, the actual hand. In order to do that I had to learn how to cast the negative."

Jolar said she wasn't sure what prompted her interest in casting a hand. "It was just someone's hand I wanted to take with me."

Jolar was working at Venon's Jewelers store in Buhl when she discovered that some of the high school students who worked there part time were also interested in plaster sculpture. "So we all got together and made this and that on each other," she said.

One thing led to another. Jolar and fellow workers proceeded to dream up projects as they went along. Soon teen-agers at Buhl High School, Kimberly High School, Clear Lakes Christian Academy, and clients

"Charles Lemmon (KNVY reporter) said to me the other day, 'Well, it's a death mask, you know.' And I know that that is true, but I also know that it is simply an artist's medium today," she said.

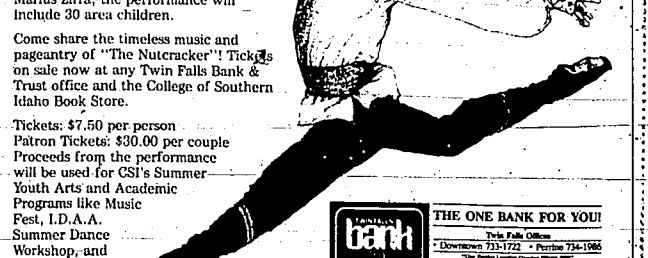

# Getty trust buys largest private 20th-Century art library

LOS ANGELES — The J. Paul Getty Trust has purchased the late Wilhelm F. Arntz's art library and archive for about \$1.8 million, it was learned.

Considered by experts to be the largest and most comprehensive 20th-century art library in private hands, the cache contains about 60,000 pieces including books and catalogs, manuscripts, illustrations, sketches and ephemera collected in Germany by an eminent scholar.

"It is one of the finest collections in existence, one we can build on for decades," said Anne-Mieke Halbrook, librarian of the said Getty Center for the History of Art and the Humanities.

Halbrook characterized Arntz's objective

as "to compile as complete a documentation as possible of 20th-century art, particularly German." She said the library and archive encompass "all aspects of 20th-century art" but are "most complete" in materials on the seminal German Expressionist schools of Der Blaue Reiter, Die Brücke and on second-generation followers of the movement.

Although the J. Paul Getty Museum does not collect modern art, the library covers "the entire range of art history," Halbrook said. Its aim is, "to become a comprehensive library for the study of art history within the context of the humanities," she noted. In a little over 3 years the Getty library's holdings have grown from 30,000 to 500,000 volumes, including several other collections on modern art.

The Getty has a firm policy of not disclos-

ing purchase prices, but the German press has reported the sale at about 4 million Deutsche marks (about \$1.8 million at the time of purchase).

Though the transaction took place last spring, the trust made no public announcement of the acquisition. When the news came to light here recently, it had the ring of a typical Getty story: Super-rich American institution buys national treasure and spirits it off to California while natives mourn the exodus of their cultural heritage.

But this time the familiar elements have a different twist. For one thing, the purchase took place in Germany and not England where resistance to the Getty's buying power has been most vociferous. For another, the German press did not blame the Getty for whisking away the German-based archive.

Editorials by Reinhard Muller-Mehlis, in Dusseldorf and Munich newspapers chided the Munich Ministry of Culture for being "slow-witted" and the German government for being "too weak" to keep the Arntz material in Germany. A reader, Gerhard Sohn, wrote a letter to the editor of the Dusseldorf Handelsblatt charging that the loss of the art library and archive was only one piece of evidence of Germany's "inexcusable negligence" in preserving its heritage.

Noting the presence of the Robert Gore Rifkind collection of German Expressionist graphics and books at the Los Angeles County Museum of Art, Sohn wrote that "the absolute greatest documentation of German Expressionism" is already in California and that now it would be joined by the Arntz collection, "surely the most significant ar-

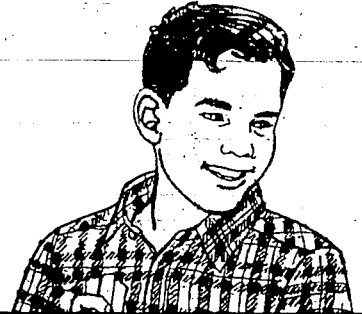
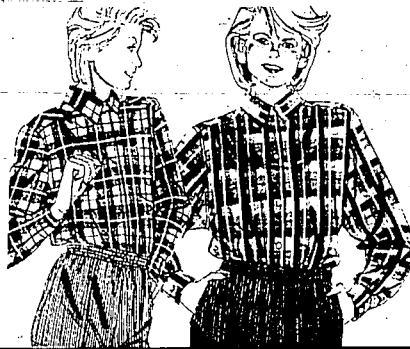
chival material" of the same early 20th-century period. "For scientific work in this area of specialization a visit to the United States will be almost inevitable," he concluded.

Peira Kippoff, an art critic for Die Zeit in Hamburg, currently visiting Los Angeles to report on local museum openings, said that the sale attracted little public notice in Germany. "I heard rumors, but the news never really got around," she said, noting the Getty's preference for avoiding publicity.

The Getty—made the purchase through Elmar Seibel, a Boston antique book dealer, after the death of Arntz on Sept. 24, 1985, and of his wife, Gertrud Arntz-Winter, about two months later.

The Arntzes' estate was left to their daughter, Brigitte Strube, a lawyer.

# Museum openings

## Los Angeles museum's exhibit goes for Baroque

LOS ANGELES — Really it is kind of magnificent. The Los Angeles Museum of Contemporary Art flung its doors open to the world on Wednesday and the world is going to find it difficult to come away unimpressed.

Arata Isozaki's witty architectural baedeker of a building is a triumph of cosmopolitan intelligence, toying with the myth of Los Angeles like a Noel Coward hero swizzling his martini olive on a toothpick. The chunk of the inaugural show, "Individuals," inspired grumbles about an unclear theme that doesn't gel in catalogue essays, which are as murky as they are intelligent as they are unstrung. Nonetheless, the catalogue is physically imposing and the Expressionist and Minimalist art on the walls, in some accents of the modern classical.

A dead-end hunk of street that provides a

funky ceremonial approach to the museum finds a crew of art workers burrowing away to finish a kind of instant rain forest Robert Irwin hopes to have ready for the opening.

Inside Chris Burden excavated a yawning crypt in the museum floor exposing pillars that hold up the building, igniting a creepy feeling that the whole temple might crumble upon us, Samson style. Nearby stands a Brooding sculpture by Richard Serra — two vast walls of steel curve away from one another but tilt together. To stand between them is to know the fear of being crushed by implacable authority.

Equally awesome machines by the likes of Janier Kounellis and Joseph Beuys punctuate galleries like elephantine exclamations. Works of more normal proportions are less likely to sing in their own voices than to be dragged into a mosaic chorus that makes "Individuals" belt-out-an-entire-it-seems-not-to-have-intended.

One has heard echoes of it before in inaugu-

ral exhibitions at Paris' Beaubourg Center or at International art circles like Germany's Documenta or the Venice Biennale but never before has a contemporary show quite equaled this level of operatic grandeur.

We tend to look at contemporary art one movement at a time and to formulate an impression of a whole based on a piece. Crystallize on Pollock and Abstract Expressionism and the epoch since the end of the last great war is a peean to frenzied individualism. Fasten on Pop and it is social satire. Fixate on Minimalism and it is either intellectually rigorous or arid as the Sahara.

But "Individuals" is a Noah's Ark that herds every body's not, and at some point it might be useful to wonder why no delegate of the Photorealist school is aboard the vessel that is to save all important poo-bahs of the art jungle from the deluge. Never mind. Right now we have our hands full dealing with what the show is doing without worrying about what it is not.

The real theme of the experience of "Individuals" is that contemporary art is the Baroque phase of modern art. Look around. Nobody has seen this much artistic fanfare since the Catholic Counter-Reformation.

The hero in this marvelously sentimental Gallic romance is Des Greux. He is boyish, impetuous, an aristocrat and potential poet who seeks refuge in the primary to banish carnal memories. The female parishioners all but swoon after hearing his sermon. They find him fiery, they say, yet tender.

The crucial adjectives fit the hero on this occasion too. ### Musee d'Orsay showcases Impressionist, 19th-Century art

PARIS — Fifteen years after its escape from demolition, the transformed Gare d'Orsay railroad station was inaugurated Monday by President Francois Mitterrand as the new Musee d'Orsay, a lavish and enormous museum dedicated to the 19th Century and displaying, among many other works, the largest collection of Impressionist art in France.

President Mitterrand, flanked by former President Valery Giscard d'Estaing and Premier Jacques Chirac, flicked aside a white cloth that covered the inaugural stone and led a large group of politicians on a tour of the museum, which houses 2,300 paintings, 250 sculptures, 1,100 pieces of furniture, jewelry and other art objects, and

15,000 photographs.

The president made no speech, but in an earlier television interview from the museum he described the project as the product of three successive presidential administrations and as "a beautiful example of aesthetic continuity."

The late President Georges Pompidou stopped the impending demolition of the railroad station, Giscard started the transformation into a museum, and Mitterrand increased the budget and settled on the focal period, from the republican uprisings of 1848 to the beginning of World War I in 1914.

The station and an adjoining hotel, which were designed by architect Victor Laloux and completed in 1900, were regarded as outstanding examples of the architecture of the period.

When the station was almost finished,

painter Edouard Detaille said, as a kind of joking compliment, "The station is superb and has the air of a palace of fine arts. I propose that Laloux make the change if there is still time."

The transformation of the station into a palace of fine arts eight decades later took eight years of work at a cost of \$200 million.

The museum keeps much of the open atmosphere of a great train station, and a visitor enters a tremendous hall that is 450 feet long, 130 feet wide and 105 feet high. To fill these spaces, French curators have displayed a large number of monumental 19th-Century statues that are often disdained these days by art critics.

Italian architect Gio Aulenti, who designed the interior of the museum, has set off from the great hall, by means of huge slabs, a large number of exhibition rooms. Many paintings

from the mid-19th Century, especially the works of Edouard Manet, are displayed in these rooms.

The best-known Impressionist and Post-Impressionist paintings, most of which came from the old and overcrowded Jeu de Paume Museum that was closed at the end of last summer, are displayed in rooms on the upper level of the museum that are shut off from the old station and lead into the old luxury hotel.

The rooms, which include the works of Pierre-Auguste Renoir, Claude Monet, Edgar Degas, Paul Cezanne and Vincent Van Gogh, look out on a terrace with a magnificent view of the Louvre just across the Seine River and of Montmartre in the distance.

Although the museum was inaugurated Monday, it will not be open to the public until next Tuesday.

### 'Manon' too fragile for house

# Boxing saga 'Streets of Gold' dazzles far beyond formula plot

**TWIN FALLS** — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

### Movie reviews

**STREETS OF GOLD (R).** First-time director Joe Roth and his collaborators get so much life and visual energy into this movie — a boxing saga about a Russian Jewish emigre training two Brighton Beach area kids for a crack at his old team — that you tend to forget how formula-bound it is. (Then the cliché-clogged inspirational freeze-frame climax comes on and reminds you.) Roth, Klaus Maria Brandauer (as the trainer), and the rest of the cast, cinematographer Arthur Albert, composer Jack Nitzsche, all seem to be working at the top of their form.

**AN AMERICAN TAIL (G).** The long-awaited collaboration between Steven Spielberg and Don Bluth is a major disappointment. The opulent visuals and fluid animation cannot disguise the flimsiness of the storyline. The film makers attempt to tell the story of the Eastern European immigrants who came to America at the turn of the century, but reducing the pogroms of 19th-Century Russia to cats chasing mice trivializes the subject. As a voice of a rich, pushy social reformer, Madeline Kahn steals the show from the rest of the vocal cast.

**CHILDREN OF A LESSER GOD (R).** A passionate and involving love story between a teacher (William Hurt) of speech to the hard of hearing and a beautiful deaf woman (Marlee Matlin) who refuses to try to speak. An exceptionally adroit stage-to-screen

adaptation of the acclaimed Mark Medoff play. With Piper Laurie, Philip Bosco.

**CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13).** The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian tourism ads) is at the heart of this movie — which he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurous hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Faye Parker's inquisitive Newsway reporter in the Aussie outback. Brandauer (as the trainer), and the rest of the cast, cinematographer Arthur Albert, composer Jack Nitzsche, all seem to be working at the top of their form.

**THE COLOR OF MONEY (R).** In this film, Martin Scorsese bids adieu to Paul Newman's excellence back home with a crack and as-rebounding as a nine-ball thunder break. Putting Newman, in his old "Hustler" Fast Eddie Felson role, against Tom Cruise as a strutting, unbeatable young natural, Scorsese goes beyond pool tables and generation gaps into questions of character and redemption. The result — a bold, exhilarating, nearly perfect dramatic comedy — belongs in the six-pack of great Paul Newman performances (and it will disappoint Tom Cruise fans either).

**SOMETHING WILD (R):** Sixties-style free spirit transforming '60s yuppie may sound like a road too well-traveled these days, but with director Jonathan Demme's eye for the dark cloud behind

every American silver lining — and with music that provides both texture and subtext for his story — he finds humor overtones in the somewhat old-but-situations-of-E-Max Fry's screenplay. The technical stuff of the film is gorgeous, and the lead actors — Jeff Daniels, Melanie Griffith and newcomer Ray Liotta — give first-class performances.

**SOUL MAN (PG-13).** Though it may have had honest intentions, this film — in which a white student masquerades as a black in order to qualify for a Harvard scholarship — is a mess at almost every level. Steve Miner's direction stabs at farce and misses; much of Carol Black's script is mortifyingly callow, and much of what it attempts has neither wit nor compassion.

**STAND BY ME (R).** "Stand By Me" is the summer's great gift, a compassionate perfectly performed look at the real heart of youth. Its atmosphere is full of the great, crude, cruddy, ripe banter of four 12-year-old boys, and these four young actors (River Phoenix, Wil Wheaton, Corey Feldman, and Jerry O'Connell) have a depth and understanding that makes each character soar and live for days after the film. And what a director Rob Reiner has become: He has seen that this cast stays honest and his movie marvelously restrained.

**TOUGH GUYS (PG).** Burt Lancaster and Kirk Douglas reunite, almost four decades after their first joint effort, for a pretty obvious, starry-eyed tale of two aging train-robbers released into the indignities of the modern world, from fast food yogurt to Dr. Ruth and The Red Hot Chili Peppers.

# 'Star Trek IV' on target

**HOLLYWOOD (AP)** — The crew of the Enterprise is living long and prospering at the box office, earning \$16.9 million in the debut of "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," and under its belt. Another first place and third place on the box office. It was the biggest box-office animated movie story, "An American Tail," which was just a squeak away from \$15 million after two weeks in distribution.

"Star Trek IV" takes James T. Kirk, Mr. Spock and the other central characters from the 23rd century to present-day San Francisco. Their mission is to save some whales — and planet Earth.

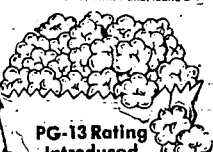
Paramount Pictures, which produced "Star Trek IV," also has

## Moro murder film touches raw nerve

**ROME (AP)** — The haunting image of a gaunt Aldo Moro held by Red Brigade terrorists stares out from posters and newspapers, compelling Italians to re-examine the former premier's murder eight years ago.

The pictures are publicity for the film "The Moro Case" — and the controversy sparked by its recent release has made it clear the wounds from the sensational kidnapping have not yet healed.

Director Giuseppe Ferrara's version of one of the ugliest episodes in Italy's postwar history has brought an outcry from the conservative Christian Democrat Party, which appears in the film to have done little to end the life of its most prominent representative.

It also has been attacked by the Communist Party, which during the 55 long days of Moro's abduction shared the Christian Democratic stance of refusal to negotiate with the leftist urban guerrillas.

Based on American writer Robert Katz' book "Days of Wrath," the movie takes the view that Moro's death could have been prevented.

# Engaging mini-series examines woman's claim to royal family

A bright blue palace fills the screen. Inside, a teen-age girl races up a long staircase and into a lavishly appointed bedroom, where her nanny is getting her brother ready for a ball in the imperial court of St. Petersburg.

The nanny looks at the girl's crown, which is askew, and adjusts it. "It does that when I run," says the Grand Duchess Anastasia.

That's the opening of "Anastasia: The Mystery of Anna," an NBC mini-series airing on Sunday and Monday, Dec. 7 and 8. Right away, the audience knows it's in good hands.

The series is not adapted from the 1956 movie (which starred Ingrid Bergman) nor from the 1954 Broadway play (which starred Vivica Lindfors) on which it was based.

Like its predecessors, this version is a mixture of fact and fiction, real people and composites. It concerns the assassination, in July, 1918, of the Russian royal family. And the appearance, several years later, of a woman named Anna Anderson, claiming to be Anastasia, who has miraculously survived.

She spends the rest of the mini-series trying to prove her claim. (In real life she never did prove it.)

As an adult, Anastasia is first seen in an insane asylum in Berlin, where she has been taken after a suicide attempt. She has no memory of who she is, but another inmate insists she's Anastasia, showing her an old magazine with a picture of the Russian royal family.

From then on, Anna insists that that's who she is, with details of her past trickling slowly back to her consciousness. Her doctor (Edward Fox) tells a colleague that there have been six false Anastasias in the past year: "They keep cropping up like daisies, all over Europe. What is it about Anastasia?"

# Byrne, 16, takes her character from tomboy to young woman

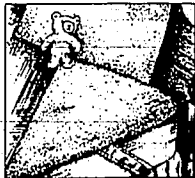

# NBC streak longest since 1963

NEW YORK (AP) — It was definitely a time for Thanksgiving last week for NBC, which pulled out a squeaker over CBS to extend its win streak to 10 weeks, the longest for any network in 23 years.

The biggest network win was in 1963 when CBS won the entire season.

According to A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings for last week, NBC had an average prime-time rating of 15.9, CBS had a 15.6 and ABC had 13.1. NBC's season-to-date average rating is 18.5, CBS' 15.9 and ABC's 14.3.

A rating point is a percentage of the nation's estimated 87.4 million homes equipped with television.

NBC won the news ratings with a 2.9 to CBS' 11.2. ABC trailed with a 0.4. NBC said it was the first time it had won the news ratings by such a large margin since March of 1967.

But both CBS and NBC quickly pointed out that NBC's news was

pre-empted by football on Thanksgiving.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC vice president for research projects said during the same holiday week last year, when NBC's new was up against football on CBS, NBC lost to CBS for the week by 1.9 rating points.

Households tuned in were down during the holidays, reducing ratings overall.

"We survived a couple of major problems," said Jaffe, noting that Thanksgiving was on Thursday, NBC's strongest night. "It was close, but we won the week."

Even though it was broadcast on Thanksgiving and recorded a rating of 25.7 compared to 34.7 last week, NBC's "The Cosby Show" was No. 1 yet again.

NBC had half of the top 10. CBS had four top-10 shows and ABC two. Two shows tied for 10th place.

The rest of the top 10: "Golden

Girls," "60 Minutes," "Family Ties," "Who's the Boss?" "Cheers," "Dallas," "All-Star Party for Clint Eastwood," "Growing Pains," "Night Court" and "Newhart."

ABC's frequently top 10 "Moonlighting" was 16th, but still won its time period with an 18.9 rating.

"Designing Women" made it into the bottom slot of the top 20 during its last week on Mondays. This week it moves to Thursdays preceding "Knots Landing." It was replaced on Monday by the new show "The Cavanaughs."

Actor Clint Eastwood—outdid himself on Sunday. CBS' "All-Star Party for Clint Eastwood" rated higher than ABC's showing of Eastwood's flick "Escape from Alcatraz," but viewers may have tuned in to the special to see Cary Grant's last television appearance. The actor died Saturday.

It was a forfeit in the "Dallas" versus "Miami Vice" tournament of ratings. "Vice" was a repeat, falling to 15.7 from 18.6 the previous week. "Dallas" remained strong with a 21.1 rating, only slightly down from 21.4.

Without the lead-in of the "Family Ties" special NBC broadcast to help it—the previous Monday, the often puppet sitcom "ALF" came back down to Earth, to wit, 45th place, with a rating of 13.8. After "Family Ties," it had a 21.5.

Made-for-television movies fared well last week. "The High Price of Passion" with Richard Crenna on NBC rated an 18.9 and was 15th.

magic day.

"When I got home, my husband (Steven Spielberg) had arrived to celebrate my birthday with two very close friends, Steve and Courtney Ross. We went out to dinner, and they gave me my present. In an antique shop in London, they'd found a Faberge egg with the date on the bottom, March 22, 1915, which was Easter of that year.

"On the egg is a musical staff and a musical note. 'A.' And on the back there's a paste sapphire, because Anastasia was only 14 that Easter, and when she was given this present, they didn't want her to have too valuable a gift. And this is it."

She opens her hand to reveal a beautiful, egg-shaped gold charm, approximately 1 inch long and exactly as she'd described it. "I wept," she says. "I guess this proves that I was the real Anastasia, doesn't it?"

Irving (who calls herself "Anastasia," while everybody else in the cast calls her "Anast-ay-sia," as in the gangster who was rubbed out in a New York barber shop) almost didn't play the role.

Nastassja Kinski was announced and backed out about 10 minutes later. Rumors of other actresses, including Isabella Rossellini, were heard. Then Irving was signed, amid suggestions that she was the original first choice but had turned it

down. She is asked whether this is, indeed, correct.

"That's what the producers say," she answers, in a tone that borders on the satiric.

"What do you say?" she is asked.

"I prefer not to comment," she says. "What you said is what happened, but I don't think, coming from me, it sounds very good. When it was first presented to me, no one was signed, and I didn't trust television to get the kind of cast they got together.

"But then, when they came back to me, and they had Rex and Claire, Bloom and Olivia de Havilland and Edward Fox and Susan Lucci...!"

This is the longest role she has ever had in a film, Irving says, "And the best. I had a big chip on my shoulder after 'The Far Pavillions.' I said, 'I will never do another mini-series.'"

"There wasn't the time taken. There was no direction. It was directing traffic — and barely that — and wasn't my idea of an experience as an actor.

"But Marvin Chomsky is so experienced at what he does and takes the time with the actors, and he didn't always accept what I had to give. Together we found something that neither of us had planned — and that's exciting."

She laughs. "I haven't seen it yet, so I hope it carried over into the filming."

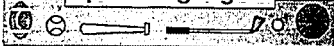

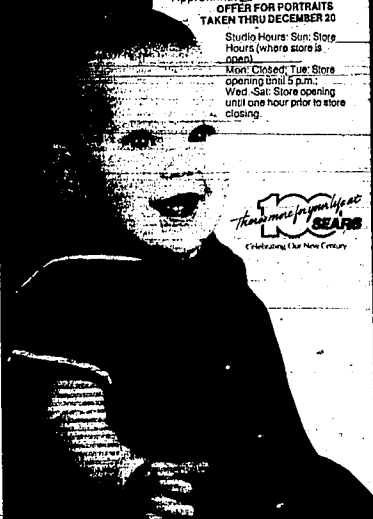

# Pulitzer Prize-winning playwright composes a touch of the 'Blues'

David Mamet will not admit it, but the TV-watching public will find hope for the medium in the fact that the Pulitzer Prize-winning author has written an episode of NBC's "Hill Street Blues."

His script, "Wasted Weekend," is in production, scheduled to air in late December or early January.

"My wife (actress Lindsay Crouse) did a bunch of episodes for them last year," Mamet said by telephone from an editing room in New York, where he is working on a feature film to be released next year called "House of Games."

The story, he says, is "what used to be described as a psychological thriller" in which Crouse's character gets involved with a criminal played by Joe Mantegna.

"I was out on the set all the time, hanging around. I told them how much I like the show; I've watched it all these years. We all said we'd have to do something." Executive producers Jeff Lewis and David Milch contacted him and he agreed to write an episode.

His theater credits include the Pulitzer-winning "Glengarry Glen Ross" as well as "American Buffalo," "Sexual Perversity in Chicago" and the Obie-winning "Edmond." His recent screenplays include a remake of "The Postman

Always Rings Twice" and "The Verdict." (He had nothing to do with, and has no desire to see, "About Last Night...," the movie based on "Sexual Perversity.")

His collection of essays, "Writing in Restaurants," is to be published Dec. 12. Next he plans to direct a film called "Things Change," to be shot in Chicago.

But first, the small screen.

Mamet's works are known for their rather bleak, misanthropic view of life in addition to sexually adventurous language. The dialogue in most of his plays would stretch

the borders of any network Standards and Practices department. But he has no complaints about adapting his style for television.
