North controlled accounts, go-betweens say

Middlemen cashed in

WASHINGTON — Brokers and middlemen apparently amassed substantial profits from the Iranian arms sales, complicating congressional investigations into how much money ultimately went to support Nicaraguan Contra rebels, according to U.S. government sources.

The money trail became more complicated following closed-door testimony by CIA Director William J. Casey before the House Foreign Affairs Committee on Wednesday and the House Intelligence Committee on Thursday.

Foreign affairs committee members, insisting on anonymity, said Casey surprised the panel with his disclosure that Canadian mid-

dlemen were furious last October because they had expected to get as much as \$20 million for their role in the arms deal and were still owed \$10 million.

Casey said he received a call about the Canadian complaint in October from a former legal client, Roy M. Furmark, who also told him that some of the Iranian profits might have been diverted to Central America, members quoted Casey as saying.

Casey, however, insisted that the CIA had been "meticulous" in its bookkeeping on the original cost of the U.S. weapons — \$12.2 million — with repayment totaling that amount being received into a secret CIA bank account in Geneva, the members said.

Big figure in the middle

WASHINGTON — The key Iranian and Saudi Arabian middlemen in the sale of U.S. arms to Iran said in television interviews Thursday that ousted White House aide Lt. Col. Oliver North controlled the Swiss accounts into which as much as \$35 million was deposited to pay for U.S. weapons sent to Iran.

The Iranian, Manucher Ghorbanifar, and the Saudi, Adnan Khashoggi, said in an interview on the ABC-TV program "20/20" that Iran initiated the contacts and that then-White House national security adviser Robert McFarlane responded by asking for Iranian help in releasing hostages held in Lebanon. Ghorbanifar said that the Tehran government, in turn, said Washington should send arms to Iran to help it in its war with Iraq. Ghorbanifar is an Iranian

businessman who ABC described as head of European intelligence for the prime minister of Iran, Mir Hossein Mousavi.

Ghorbanifar and Khashoggi said that they did not know that up to \$30 million in proceeds from the sale had gone to help Nicaraguan Contra rebels. And they left unclear how much President Reagan and Iranian leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini knew about the deal and when they learned of it.

However, Khashoggi said he believed that Reagan approved the arrangement before the first shipment to Iran, which he said was in August, 1985. An American hostage, the Rev. Benjamin Weir was released on Sept. 14, 1985. Khashoggi said money for the weapons was deposited in a Swiss bank account in the name of "Lake Resources," but he did not know where it went after that. "We think it was controlled by

North (because) he is the coordinator," said Khashoggi, a Saudi arms dealer and businessman with ties to the royal family. Ghorbanifar said that North and retired Air Force Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord controlled the account.

Secord has been named by investigators as a key associate to North in the Iran arms sale and the diversion of funds to the Contras. CIA Director William J. Casey, in congressional testimony this week identified Lake Resources one of the firms involved in the complicated transactions.

The interviews were the first with Khashoggi and Ghorbanifar since Iran arms sales came to public attention at the beginning of November.

Ghorbanifar said the price for the weapons of \$30 million to \$35 million "was coming to us from the Americans," particularly North. • See NORTH on Page A2

Amnesty plan troubles loom

WASHINGTON — The United States, like several other countries before it, faces many formidable problems in implementing new immigration amnesty policy.

The problems include inadequate estimates of illegal aliens, deep-seated resentment of them and a public perception that immigrants and officials are the enemy, a panel of experts said Thursday.

To help overcome such negative perceptions, the Immigration and Naturalization Service should begin an "attitude adjustment" program for its employees, said the panel, which included officials from France and Canada, as well as INS representatives.

The session, which detailed similarities and differences between the experiences of the United States and other countries on the issue of immigration, was sponsored by the Carnegie Endowment for International Peace and followed an all-day meeting of U.S. and foreign experts. The two-day conference was designed to head off problems that could be anticipated on the basis of other nations' experiences.

The other countries "went through the same problems as the United States. Therefore, some things can be learned," said David S. North, director of the Washington-based Center for Labor and Migration Studies.

Compared with amnesty programs in 12 other nations, the panelists found, the U.S. plan generally is more restrictive, runs for a longer period and probably will legalize far more people. Most countries allowed people to become legal if they had lived there a year, but the United States requires five years of residency.

This restriction will create "a much more serious problem of illegality" because it is more difficult to prove a long residency than a short one, said Doris M. Meissner, a former INS official who is now a senior associate at the Carnegie Endowment.

Meanwhile, INS officials said this week that the agency's two legalization centers nationwide would be staffed with "a core" of retired INS officials, who would be brought back into service because of their years of experience.

Under the landmark immigration reform act signed into law by President Reagan Nov. 6, illegal immigrants can apply for legal status. • See AMNESTY on Page A2

Squabble over sewer brings murder charge

MOUNT PLEASANT, Iowa — Flags were lowered to half-staff Thursday as a man who fought City Hall over a sewer flooding his home faced charges he opened fire on a City Council meeting, killing the mayor and wounding two councilors.

Ralph Orin Davis, 69, was ordered held on \$700,000 bond Thursday on charges of murder and attempted murder.

Davis had complained twice previously to the council and sought reimbursement for water damage to his basement, city officials said. On Wednesday night he walked into the council chamber, muttered an imprecation and began shooting a pistol, authorities said.

Edward King, mayor of this southeastern Iowa city of 7,300 people for a decade, was shot once in the head. He was pronounced dead at a hospital in Iowa City, about 60 miles away.

Councilors JoAnn E. Sankey, 39, and Ronald Lee Dupree, 44, were flown by helicopter to the same hospital. Mrs. Sankey was in critical condition with a head wound and two chest wounds; Dupree was in serious but stable condition with wounds to the head, neck and arm, said hospital spokesman Dean Borg.

Davis, handcuffed and shackled at the waist, wore orange jail coveralls during his 10-minute court appearance Thursday.

His lower lip trembled, and he responded "Yes, sir" to questions asked by Magistrate David McCoid, who set bond at \$500,000 on the murder charge and \$100,000 on each of the attempted murder charges.

Asked if he could pay the bond, Davis laughed and shook his head. He made no plea and said he did not want a court-appointed lawyer immediately. McCoid scheduled another hearing for Dec. 19.

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Scientists find how some fight off aids

WASHINGTON — Scientists think they have discovered how some people fight off the virus that causes AIDS.

That finding, they say, could lead to a new approach to treatment as well as explain why some infected people don't get the fatal disease.

Researchers at the University of California, San Francisco, said Thursday that the discovery may point to a way of using the immune system that is attacked in AIDS — acquired immune deficiency syndrome — to counterattack the disease without using toxic antiviral drugs.

In a report to be published today in the Dec. 19 issue of the Journal Science, a team led by Dr. Jay A. Levy said a sub-group of white blood cells called suppressor T-cells appear able to control the virus in cell cultures by keeping it from reproducing.

The researchers said these cells appear to be at work in several patients who have been infected with the virus for up to four years who either have not gotten AIDS or whose disease seems to be in remission.

If the suppressor T-cells prove to control the virus in humans, the researchers said, it may be possible to boost the number of these cells to stop the virus from reproducing and arrest progress of AIDS.

"This is the first indication that individuals have in themselves a means of controlling the virus," Levy said in a telephone interview. "This discovery could be the first step toward an effective therapy for AIDS, using a person's own immune cells rather than drugs that are toxic to the body."

The AIDS virus attacks another group of T-cells, called helper T-cells, which govern the other components of the immune system. The virus penetrates the helper T-cells, reproduces

and destroys its host cells as it spreads to other cells.

In this way, the AIDS virus, variously known as HTLV-3, HIV or LAV, cripples the disease-fighting immune system, leaving sufferers vulnerable to numerous infections and cancers that lead to death.

Levy and others found that suppressor T-cells, whose normal job is controlling the production of antibodies by other cells, appear to emit an unknown substance that keeps the virus from reproducing after invading the helper cells.

When certain suppressor T-cells that have a protein on their surface called CD8 were removed from blood cultures, the virus started to grow in the remaining blood cells, the scientists reported.

But when the suppressor T-cells were put back into the cultures, reproduction of the virus was suppressed, they continued. The suppressor cells do not destroy the virus or kill the host cells.

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Proposed power projects generate negative public reaction

TWIN FALLS — Public reaction to four new hydropower projects proposed for the Snake River was overwhelmingly negative at a federal hearing here Wednesday.

"Star Falls is one of the prettiest spots I know in Southern Idaho," said Alan Reynolds, a Blaine County Commissioner. He said he didn't want to see it altered.

Impact on the tax rolls. Auger Falls alone would generate \$1.8 million annually and during construction the payroll would be \$12 million per year, said a spokesman for the project.

"Unfortunately, the federal government passed a law to make money off a resource without giving (anything) back. It's going to cause economic problems in the future.

The basis of this is that it was a bad law," he said.

Reynolds was referring to a law passed during a period of energy shortages in the mid-1970s. It was designed to encourage alternative sources of producing energy, such as small hydro plants.

Reynolds urged that licenses for the Milner and Star Falls projects be denied.

FERC officials were taking testimony to prepare an environmental impact statement on the projects, which would generate electricity to

One Twin Falls resident said he didn't want to see "this beautiful land go down to destruction."

Miller said, but instead of building new power-generating structures he suggested filling the dam itself with them.
In the past, Jack Eakin, manager of the Twin Falls Canal Co., said Canal Co. shareholders can't afford to pay for the repairs and the revenue from hydropower to cover the repairs.

Russo said, that because wetlands on the Snake River Plain have been degraded by overgrazing. "We have no image of what was here before."

Under the new law, amnesty applicants will use employer records as a way to prove that they have been in the country for five years. In other countries, several panelists said, employers were uncooperative because they wanted to continue exploiting the undocumented workers.

who the Iranian said seemed to be amount paid to the Americans was for the cost of the weapons and transportation. He said he was surprised to learn from news reports that the actual cost to the Americans was only \$12 million, he responded. "We think they will refund."
Khashoggi said that the difference between the actual cost and the amount, the Iranians paid "means they (the Americans) have overcharged the government" (of Iran).
Ghorbanifar said that Khashoggi put up the initial money to cover the payments for the weapons and that the Iranian government had yet to reimburse him for \$10 million because part of the final shipment was defective.
Asked whether Washington could ever have friendly relations with Tehran, Ghorbanifar replied, "I think the deal is not dead yet."
He referred to recent statements by Iran's parliamentary speaker Hojatoleslām Rahnizadeh, who Ghorbanifar said "very clearly referred to that."
"I see great hopes of seeing your hostages released and a better relation in the future," said Ghorbanifar, who asserted that he had provided information on the release of three American hostages since the arms sales began.

Casey testified before the House Foreign Affairs Committee on Wednesday that Canadian middlemen in the arms deal had complained of not receiving about \$10 million from the payment they expected, presumably the amount referred to by Ghorbanifar.
According to committee sources, Casey was contacted in Geneva by a New York businessman, Roy M. Furmark, an associate of Khashoggi, who told the CIA director "about the Canadian complaint and suggested that some of the money had been diverted to Central America."
Casey said the contact by Furmark was the first he learned of diversions of arms profits to the Nicaraguan rebels.
Casey spoke to reporters after he testified for more than three hours before a heavily guarded, closed-door session of the House Intelligence Committee. A few minutes later, Furmark went before the Senate Intelligence Committee to tell his version of the story.
Furmark, a heavy-set, bearded former legal agent of Casey's, refused to talk to reporters as he entered the closed Senate hearing. But Casey said it was Furmark who first raised questions in his mind about transfers of funds from then-secret arms sales to Iran.
While Furmark had been testifying in the House, Casey said he had received a report that "he is being as candid as he

can, he is answering all our questions." Another source said Furmark apparently was an intermediary between Casey and Middle East arms dealers.
Later, congressional sources said Furmark told the committee that he had been approached by Adnan Khashoggi, a Saudi Arabian arms dealer who had been central to the Iranian sales, and told to warn Casey that a group of Canadian investors were threatening to file a suit against Khashoggi that would have made the entire sale public.
Furmark had no involvement of his own except as a go-between to Casey," said one source, speaking on condition of anonymity. The Canadians were threatening to sue Khashoggi and Khashoggi went to Furmark "because Khashoggi knew Furmark could carry a message to Casey that something had to be done," the source said.
Government sources, who spoke only on condition that they remain anonymous, said Casey told the House Foreign Affairs Committee on Wednesday that Furmark telephoned him Oct. 7, 1987, that he had contacted Canadian businessmen who had put up the money for the Iranian arms were complaining that they had not been repaid adequately.
The Canadians were threatening a lawsuit because they had received only \$10 million when they had expected payment of \$20 million, the sources quoted Casey as saying.
Furmark told the Senate panel that the Canadians were claiming that Khashoggi owed them \$10 million, the sources said.

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Utility official plugs for rate changes

BOISE (AP) — A company official says Intermountain Gas Co. shareholders can't absorb the cost of rate changes designed to keep the company competitive with large industrial users.

Peñning, executive vice president of Intermountain, presented rebuttal testimony to the Public Utilities Commission here Thursday to a PUC staff suggestion that shareholders accept a lower rate of return, to help the company offer lower prices to large volume users.

"The shareholders of this company already have been and continue to be at risk," Peñning said. He also noted that shareholders have borne the loss in profits caused by a shift by

some customers to lower-priced oil.

"Consistent shortfalls in its authorized return establish that Intermountain's shareholders have been shouldering the burden for some time," he said.

Peñning also said the staff proposal shows "a lack of understanding of Intermountain's present position in relation to competitive fuels."

"We don't have a realistic opportunity to pick up any significant load at this time — this is a defensive rate allocation. Any suggestion that Intermountain can make up in volume what it loses in margin ignores reality," he said.

Intermountain has asked the PUC for permission to revise rates to all types of customers, reflecting

decreased wholesale gas prices. The utility, southern Idaho's largest supplier of natural gas, plans to cut rates by 5.9 percent overall, reducing operating revenue from \$103.4 million per year to \$97.4 million.

Because it is losing large, industrial customers to other fuels such as fuel, the utility wants to cut industrial prices by more than 18 percent, with a 4.9 percent decrease for customers who use gas both for space and water heating.

Commercial customers would pay 0.9 percent more and the company proposes a 3.6 percent increase to customers who use either gas water heaters or space heaters but not both.

Peñning said the rate increases

are designed to make sure Intermountain receives proper revenue for all classes of customers.

"These rates should not only be designed to recover the cost of serving these customers but also must be market-based to ensure the continuation of service to the existing customers," he said.

Staff witnesses presented testimony that since 1979, Intermountain has lost about 25 percent of its natural gas sales, mainly to large, industrial users, because the cost of other fuel such as oil has dropped sharply.

Peñning said there is a significant difference in price between gas and oil, and if oil prices drop again, the again will put natural gas in a non-competitive position.

He said a rate suggested by the PUC staff would mean a difference of 2.6 cents per therm. At a plant such as the Ore-Ida plant at Burley, which uses 6.5 million therms per year, the potential saving by switching to oil would be \$169,000 per year.

Stallings to present Swan Falls measure

BOISE — Saying the state of Idaho has waited long enough, U.S. Rep. Richard Stallings, D-Idaho, Thursday told the Idaho Water Resource Board that he has drafted legislation to implement the Swan Falls Water Rights Agreement.

Stallings, who met with board members during a Boise visit, said he plans to introduce the legislation next month when the 100th Congress convenes. Stallings said he has discussed the issue with U.S. Rep. Larry Craig, R-Idaho, who has agreed to co-sponsor the bill.

After President Reagan vetoed legislation which included a provision to ratify the Swan Falls agreement, Stallings said it would be his top legislative priority next year. "Now is the time to move ahead to resolve this long-standing dispute over Snake River water rights," he said in a news release Thursday.

The legislation will direct the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission to issue an order approving the Swan Falls agree-

ment, Stallings said. A petition has been pending at FERC since 1984 concerning several licensed hydropower projects in Idaho.

"I can think of no issue of greater importance to Idaho citizens than the future management of Snake River, which is truly the lifeblood of our economy and quality of life," Stallings said. The future of Idaho's agricultural-based economy will be shaped by the Swan Falls agreement, he said.

Stallings, who helped negotiate a legislative agreement on Swan Falls in the last Congress, said that the president's veto of the bill and FERC's inaction forces him to introduce separate legislation.

"The commission's failure to take action on this vital issue has left Idaho waterusers in a state of uncertainty," he said.

Thousands of permits and applications pending before the Idaho Department of Water Resources are tied up until the agreement gets federal approval, he said.

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Taverns seek longer hours

NEW MEADOWS (AP) — Local tavern owners are pressing New Meadows city officials for support in their bid for Sunday hours for the drink sales and extended operating hours despite a countywide vote opposing the proposal.

Dan Lisowsy of the Kahili Club, leading the group, has asked the city council for "his" support when the County Commission is petitioned to approve an ordinance that would give cities the option of allowing Sunday sales and closing at 2 a.m. daily instead of 1 a.m.

In the past, Jack Eakin, manager of the Twin Falls Canal Co., said Canal Commissioners can't afford to pay for the repairs and need the revenue from hydropower to cover the repairs.

Earlier, during an afternoon session Wednesday, a biologist with the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency said there are some 72 hydro projects proposed on the Snake or its tributaries, and the environmental impact statement has to take into account all of them — not just the ones discussed at Wednesday's session.

Michelle Stevens of the EPA urged FERC to develop a comprehensive plan for the Snake River Basin.

"Where do we stop? Should we go to the Columbia River?" asked Tony Russo, a section chief with FERC's river basin assessment division in Washington.

"We, as an agency, are having problems on where to draw the

line," Russo said. Stevens said that because wetlands on the Snake River Plain have been degraded by overgrazing. "We have no image of what was here before."

However, she said, there are some protected, high-quality wetlands in the project area. "In the few cases where high-quality wetlands exist, they should be taken into consideration," she said. The plant-life acts as a buffer to the detrimental effects of agricultural runoff, she said.

Representatives from the U.S. Bureau of Land Management and whitewater boating enthusiasts noted potential impacts on the area below the proposed Star Falls project.

An area near Milner is considered the crown jewel of whitewater on the Snake River," said Loesser, of Idaho Whitewater.

Randy Hesse, of White Otter Outfitters, said the Milner section of the Snake rivals whitewater runs in the Grand Canyon and other sections of the Colorado River.

This section has only recently been discovered by whitewater boaters

and has great tourism potential, Hesse said.

Pete Laudeman, of the BLM, said an area below Star Falls is on the National Register of Historic Places. The area, known Caudron Linn, is where a party of explorers in the early 1800s determined there was no way the Snake could be used for river traffic, due to the rapids.

"He said places on the register can be altered, but the process is difficult."

Jeff Jarvis, of the BLM in Shoshone, told FERC there would not be enough time to gather information on sensitive plants and wildlife in the project areas and meet FERC's deadlines for assessing environmental impacts. Portions of the projects involve public lands.

Susan Waller, of the Shoshone-Bannock Tribes, said the projects affect minimum stream-flows on the Snake. The tribes have water rights dating to 1867 and any decision on the projects would have to be held up until a determination of water rights is made, she said.

Also eligible for legal status are farm workers who can show that they have been here for at least 90 days during the year that ended last May. Because farm workers can benefit more easily in this amnesty provision, some panelists said non-farm workers felt discriminated against.

Gearing up to take amnesty applications beginning May 5, the INS will probably "front-load" its staffing with large numbers of additional personnel early in the legalization process. INS officials say that if too few are hired, the INS will be

criticized for poor preparation, the official complained, and if too many are hired, the agency will be denounced for wasting money.

Melissar agreed that the INS was in a "Catch-22 situation" but advised the agency to "err on the high side" as a precautionary measure. Duke Austin, an INS spokesman who attended the session Thursday, said later that U.S. legalization programs "will never phase out other countries but will be multiplied because we are dealing with much higher numbers."

According to committee sources, Casey said he was contacted in October by a New York businessman, Roy M. Furmark, an associate of Khashoggi, who told the CIA director about the Canadian complaint and suggested that some of the money had been diverted to Central America.

Casey said the contact by Furmark was the first he learned of diversions of arms profits to the Nicaraguan rebels. Casey spoke to reporters after he testified for more than three hours before a heavily guarded, closed-door session of the House Intelligence Committee.

Casey said that Furmark went before the Senate Intelligence Committee to tell his version of the story. Furmark, a heavy-set, bearded former legal client of Casey's, refused to talk to reporters as he entered the closed Senate hearing. But Casey said it was Furmark who first raised questions in his mind about transfers of funds from then-Seattle arms sales to Iran.

While Furmark has been testifying for three hours, Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, emerged to report that "he is being as candid as he can."

Government sources have said Secord assisted then-National Security Council aide, Lt. Col. Oliver L. North, in setting up the Iranian bank accounts as well as routing those profits into a resupply operation for Contra rebels fighting Nicaragua's leftist government.

After President Reagan fired North on Nov. 25, Attorney General Edwin Meese III estimated that \$10 million to \$30 million from the arms sales had been diverted to the Contras through Swiss accounts. But two weeks later, congressional investigators say they still don't know how much actually went to the Contras.

One member of Congress quoted Casey as saying two firms that deposited money into the CIA account handling the \$12.2 million for the arms sales were Lake Resources Inc. and Hyde Park Square Corp., but he added that Casey did not identify who was behind those firms.

Congressional sources said Furmark, who Casey says tipped him off to the possible diversion of funds to the Contras, is a business associate of Saudi billionaire Adnan Khashoggi, who is also believed connected to the Iran arms deal.

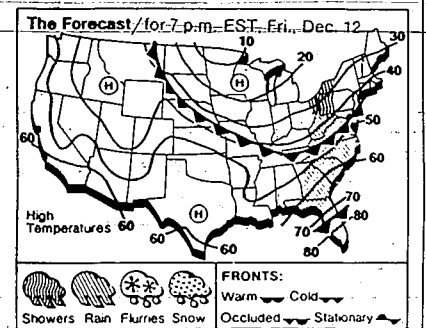

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Utility official plugs for rate changes

BOISE (AP) — A company official says Intermountain Gas Co. shareholders can't absorb the cost of rate changes designed to keep the company competitive with large industrial users.

Reed Penning, executive vice president of Intermountain, presented rebuttal testimony to the Public Utilities Commission here Thursday to a PUC staff suggestion that shareholders accept a lower offer of return, to help the company offer lower prices to large volume users.

"The shareholders of this company already have been and continue to be at risk," Penning said. He also noted that shareholders have borne the loss in profits caused by a shift by

some customers to lower-priced oil. "Consistent shortfalls in its authorized return establish that Intermountain's shareholders have been shouldering the burden for some time," he said.

Penning also said the staff proposal shows "a lack of understanding of Intermountain's present position in relation to competitive fuels."

"We don't have a realistic opportunity to pick up any significant load at this time — this is a defensive rate allocation. Any suggestion that Intermountain can make up in volume what it loses in margin ignores reality," he said.

Intermountain has asked the PUC for permission to revise rates to all types of customers, reflecting

decreased wholesale gas prices. The utility, southern Idaho's largest supplier of natural gas, plans to cut rates by 5.9 percent overall, reducing operating revenue from \$103.4 million per year to \$97.4 million.

Because it is losing large, industrial customers to other fuels such as fuel, the utility wants to cut industrial prices by more than 16 percent, with a 4.9 percent decrease for customers who use gas both for space and water heating.

Commercial customers would pay 0.9 percent more and the company proposes a 3.8 percent increase to customers who use either gas water heaters or space heaters but not both.

Penning said the rate increases

are designed to make sure Intermountain receives proper revenue for all classes of customers.

"These rates should not only be designed to recover the cost of serving these customers but also must be market-based to ensure the continuation of service to the existing customers," he said.

Staff witnesses presented testimony that since 1973, Intermountain has lost about 25 percent of its natural gas sales, mainly to large, industrial users, because the cost of other fuel such as oil has dropped sharply.

Penning said there is a significant difference in price between gas and oil, and oil prices drop again, that again will put natural gas in a non-competitive position.

He said a rate suggested by the PUC staff would mean a difference of 2.6 cents per therm. At a plant such as the Ore-Ida plant at Burley, which uses 6.5 million therms per year, the potential saving by switching to oil would be \$169,000 per year.

"This savings cannot be ignored," Penning said. "The threat of load loss is real and increasing. The result will be extremely detrimental to both the company and its remaining customers," he said.

All facts are needed to win voters' trust

It will be tempting for some to blame the defeat Tuesday of a hospital restructuring proposal on the suspicious nature of Twin Falls County residents. But before the finger pointing starts, we'll propose another reason: accuracy and completeness of information.

In the past three years, voters in Twin Falls County have repeatedly turned down proposals from various government entities. A jail bond proposal by the county failed by a 60-40 margin. Three pool proposals by the city of Twin Falls, including one combined with the school district, also failed, although by narrow margins.

It would be easy to blame these defeats on the penny-pinching, conservative — some might say tightfisted — nature of Magic Valley voters. It would also be easy — to say that — a minority in the county always votes to keep things as they are and that progress is made only by overcoming their opposition.

But in our view, all of the recent defeats can be laid to one primary cause: failure of those promoting the changes to explain fully why they were needed.

This failure has not been for lack of money; indeed, the advertising and public relations campaigns for all were extensive.

But public relations can't overcome incomplete facts. Area voters are plenty sophisticated when it comes to asking the tough questions. What they haven't always received is candid, complete answers. We'll cite a couple of examples:

On the jail proposal, the county proposed a \$6 million facility without showing people what it would look like or where it would be located. Then people learned that, in the proposal, was a substantial expansion of county office space and a nuclear-war civil defense center. Should we pass this? No way.

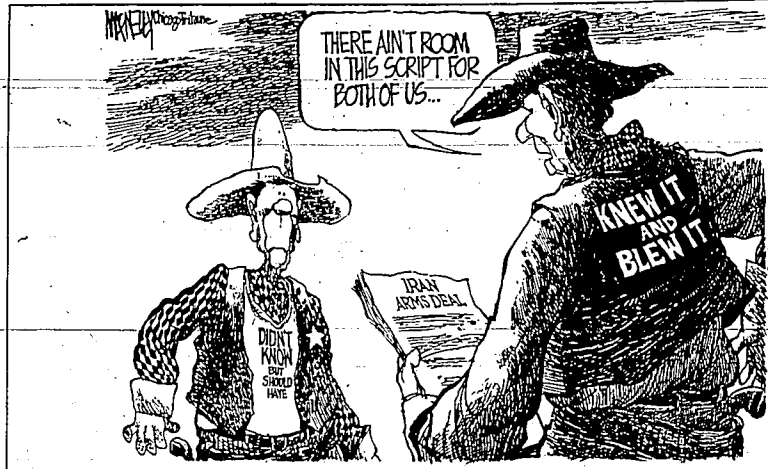
On the hospital restructuring, promoters used terms like "survival" and "crisis" to describe the hospital's condition. Then people learned that the facility made \$3 million in profit in the past two years.

A "crisis," we would guess, is when a foreclosure notice arrives at the ranch. A \$3 million profit in two years is not, to most people, a "crisis."

In the case of one pool vote, the school district and the city jointly proposed a "recreation classroom" adjacent to the high school. Then people discovered the proposed building was the size of Albertson's store and that the outlined revenue sources would not come anywhere near to paying for it.

Twin Falls people continue to want a pool. They also recognize the need for a new jail in the county. And they are not against improving the hospital's efficiency — if "survival" is really at stake.

If prudent, well-thought-out proposals are advanced, they will vote for them. To do this, they want only one thing from public officials and those who promote proposals: the complete facts.



Autocratic chief of staff costs Reagan

WASHINGTON — The Republican congressman from California surely thought that he was doing Lt. Col. Oliver L. North a favor by comparing him to Kipling's savior of a British Tommy when the much-decorated Marine hero finally appeared before the cameras Tuesday on Capitol Hill and asserted his Fifth Amendment privilege against self-incrimination.

For it's Ollie (Tommy) this, an Ollie that, an "Chuck" 'im out the brute!

But it's "saviour of 'is country," when the gush begins to shoot.

Whether Robert K. Dornan's choice of Kipling, that balladeer of doomed, damned soldiers, apostle of imperialism and proclaimer of "the white man's burden," is the best poetic model for tribute to North is a matter of personal judgment. But amid all the political understanding of that sad spectacle at Capitol Hill, there's no doubt about the desire expressed by another congressional vote. It was Dornan's Republican colleague, Jim Leach of Iowa, who spoke of not wishing to prolong the agony and of wanting "to get this ordeal behind us" — a wish certainly shared by most Americans.

That will not be easily accomplished. The congressional and criminal justice proceedings, the presidentially appointed commission of inquiry and the workings of the independent counsel will continue for months. So will pursuit of this consuming story by the media. Given the dimensions of the political and policy disaster and the near-certainty of further damaging disclosures, all of these raise major questions about Ronald Reagan's ability to conduct the presidency in his remaining time in office.

The question perhaps is not so much what

devoid of serious embarrassment to the president? A plausible explanation was that the president's senior advisers and trusted friends always checked and balanced each other's behavior and philosophical zealousness in a way that conformed with the law and good political judgment. This always seemed to protect the president from the kind of damage that an autocratic manager of the president's staff — like Donald T. Regan and one of his predecessors, H.B. "Never have the president's relations on the Hill been so poor," this person remarked, watching the sharp erosion of the president's credibility and approval ratings in recent weeks. "No one would have thought that the most popular president in recent history could not have pulled enough Senate candidates through the keyhole to sustain his working majority. No one would have thought that the White House could be capable of so many major blunders. And few would have believed that there would have been so little dissent within the White House staff over proposed actions that could only drag the president's good name and reputation through the mud, if discovered."

Then came the critical question: "Why was the first term so productive and

Fidgeting: It's right for sportsorexic

BOSTON — Have you tried jogging only to learn falling? Have you started aerobics and ended up in orthopedics?

Do you own running shoes, tennis shoes, racquetball shoes and wear only slippers? Did you begin lifting weights only to return to lifting forks?

Now at last there is a sport for the sportsorexic, an activity that everyone can do, a magic way to lose weight without pulling your hamstrings or getting your hair wet. It's called Fidgeting.

You remember fidgeting. It's what your poor misguided grammar-school teacher told you to stop doing. Indeed it may be those teachers who are to blame for enlarging American hips in the attempt to enlarge American minds.

But in today's leaner, meaner America, a new crop of scientists has inadvertently begun a revival of this much maligned habit. A National Institutes of Health research team has discovered that the wiggles of an American who squirms, shake their legs, and tap their fingers actually wiggle away hundreds of calories every day. Hosanna!

In the study they designed, 177 volunteers spent 24 hours a piece in a room having their spontaneous physical activity measured. Their movements were limited to (a) straddling around within the chamber and (b) movements of the limbs with little displacement of the body's center of gravity. "In other words, fidgeting."

Some of the people burned up a mere 100 calories. But others burned up 800 in the persistence of their assorted nervous habits, without even donning a sweatshirt. What we're talking about here is a real scientific breakthrough. So what if

The researchers say that the level of "spontaneous physical activity" in any individual is inherited. There may be a fidgety gene. Indeed, the study was done to help explain why some people can naturally eat more and weigh less than others.

But anatomy has never yet stopped an American from the pursuit of a lean destiny. Anything can be learned for the sake of bodily self-improvement, even an overhead serve and a taste for bean curd. If only those people who were genetically fit took aerobics, where would the tights industry be today?

If fidgeting burns calories, then Americans will learn how to fidget. We may even open a new chapter in the history of the diet industry of the United States.

Welcome to the world of The Fidget Diet: By February, Woman's Day will feature a cover story: 25 Ways to Fidget to a New You! Glamour will follow that up with a real-life story, accompanied by before and after photos, of one editor who fidgeted 15 pounds in five weeks.

In the spring we will see a best-selling diet book entitled "Fat or Fidget." The book will set up a goal of three hours of seat-squirming a day.

Meanwhile, the health clubs who found their clientele drifting away to this solitary squirm will organize group lessons to take place in drained swimming pools and converted racquetball courts. In beginning Fidgeting, people will learn to twist their hair, wiggle in their chair and jiggle their feet. In intermediate, they will do all of the above at the same time, not to mention the crunch: 200 repetitions of crossing and uncrossing legs. There will be a special class of fered, "Fidgeting the Amnlotto Fluid," for pregnant women who want to be able to give their children the proper prenatal environment.

Needless to say, the most committed will demand a wardrobe to go with their activity. Color-coordinated hair shirts and Harris tweed underpants will be a useful aid to constant motion. They will be worn even at home to accompany the best-selling videotape of Jane Fonda urging, "Squirm, squirm, squirm."

But all this will be of little avail until we take our new-found knowledge of weight-control-through-perpetual-motion and reach children in their bodily formative years. Are there pre-schoolers in your house who sit quietly through the dinner hour? Do your children spend long hours in the car looking peacefully out the window? Don't wait another minute. For the sake of their future waistlines, look these creatures in the eye sternly and utter the cry of the times: "Start fidgeting!"

Americans trust too much in the air traffic control system

Imagine driving 55 mph down a rush-hour Los Angeles freeway in fog so heavy that only the white lines are visible 10 feet in front of your car.

Imagine further that you and all the other ones on drivers around you are being directed by a central traffic-control facility — a voice coming through a radio headset making all the decisions for you on how fast to go, which lane to occupy, which way to turn, when to hit the brake.

Finally, picture a high-speed freeway without a median strip. Opposite-direction traffic can whiz by on your left and your right, kept from harm's way only by the split-second errorless performance of the controllers, their radar equipment and computers, and by each driver's ability to flawlessly follow their terse instructions and the established rules.

If you add to this picture the third dimension of altitude, you get a rough idea of why the job of air-traffic control over the Los Angeles basin — or anywhere in the United States — is one of the most technically demanding and nerve-racking functions of American life.

And life, in fact, is exactly what is at stake. As the disaster at Cerritos Airport, showed only too clearly, a simple failure by the air-traffic-control system — a small aircraft not displayed (or not noticed) on the radar scope and not spotted by the flight crew of an oncoming jetliner — can kill scores of trusting people in an instant. As the National Transportation Safety Board continues its investigation of the Cerritos crash, we need to keep several realities in focus regarding our air-traffic-control system. Perhaps the most important is the simple truth that we trust it too much.

In reality, the Federal Aviation Ad-

ministration's system, which does perform flawlessly more than 99 percent of the time, does so only because of the dedication and talent of the human beings within it — diligent people who almost always manage to compensate for the system's inadequacies.

But "almost always" is not sufficient, which means that in some respects air traffic control is still a crap shoot.

The men and women who sit before relatively sophisticated computerized radar scopes driven by less-than-state-of-the-art FAA computer equipment try to be perfect, but, being human, they are subject to fatigue, inattention, interruptions, task saturation and a host of other well-documented frailties. They cannot guarantee that all conflicting air traffic will be seen in time to order other airliners around it. They cannot promise that they will never misinterpret a target or have their attention diverted at a critical moment by other traffic, a supervisor or a telephone call from another sector. Nevertheless, the system is built on the assumption that these intense, precise people will make no errors.

Since busy crews of high-performance jets cannot be expected to physically see conflicting traffic in time, pilots and passengers are as dependent on air-traffic-control perfection as are the drivers on our mythical "positively controlled freeway." But even with the best training (which the FAA has yet to achieve), a adequate manning (which is highly questionable) and sufficient equipment (scarcely the case), we can't expect any controller to be immune to mistakes in separating the aircraft dating ceaselessly through the thick aerial soup.

Centros, then, is symptomatic of a more profound, generic problem: We depend too much on a single element in the equation — the air-traffic controller — to know all, see all and protect all.

Instead, the pilots themselves must be included in the process — not to make or second-guess the controller's directives, but to monitor them. The future of the air-traffic-control system will never include a solution to the generic limitations of a ground-based control system if the air crews are not "brought into the loop."

What's more, the communications technology to do this already exists. One type of proposed system, for example, could transmit information to computer screens in airborne cockpits — possibly giving pilots the same radar display being monitored on the ground by the controller and enabling them to catch a mistake or "pop-up" traffic before it presents a hazard. The new collision-avoidance system in final testing by the FAA will warn pilots of traffic conflicts independent of the controllers.

New equipment in a system that depends on people is never a solution by itself. But, by providing new methods to back up the controllers, human mistakes and omissions can be caught at an early stage. Regrettably, without a change of philosophy and a strong commitment on the part of the FAA and the industry (and resolute funding by Congress), many of these improvements will be decades away.

Pentagon ties helped Secord

WASHINGTON (AP) — Richard V. Secord's last full-time Defense Department job was in a little-known division that supervises arms sales to many foreign countries and which employed several people whose names have surfaced in the Iran-Contra affair.

Secord, a retired Air Force major general who reportedly played a key role in the diversion of profits from the sale of U.S. arms to Iran to the Nicaraguan rebels, retired in May 1983 as a deputy assistant defense secretary at the department's International Security Affairs section.

Secord oversaw Near Eastern and South Asian affairs at ISA, according to the Congressional Directory. Between July 11, 1983 and Nov. 11, 1984, after his retirement, Secord was authorized to serve a consultant to ISA for a total of 220 days at \$242 a day. But Pentagon records show that he "did not serve any days in pay status," a spokesman said. Secord, however, was a member of a

special operations advisory group until his term expired last August. Federal investigators have said privately that Secord, 54, is under investigation in connection with the transfer of money — through Swiss bank accounts and international arms merchants — from Iran to the Contras, the guerrillas fighting against Managua's Sandinista government.

The ISA, where Secord worked, formulates policy on political-military activities for non-European countries, and also "provides supervision in the areas of security assistance (i.e., foreign military sales and military assistance programs)..." the official U.S. Government Manual states.

Within the division is the Defense Security Assistance Agency, which actually administers weapons shipments.

In his ISA job, Secord lobbied in 1981 for the controversial \$8.5 billion sale of the AWACS surveillance

planes to Saudi Arabia. He reportedly worked on the project with Lt. Col. Oliver L. North, the National Security Council staff deputy who was fired for his role in the Iran-Contra case.

At ISA, Secord worked with Noel C. Koch and Nestor D. Sanchez, both of whom held the title of deputy assistant secretary, the 1983-1984 Congressional Directory shows.

A month after Secord officially left ISA, James A. Kelly joined the staff as a deputy assistant secretary for East Asian and Pacific affairs, Pentagon records show.

Since March, Kelly, a former Navy officer, has been a special assistant to President Reagan on the National Security Council, handling Asian affairs. Kelly's brother, John, is the U.S. ambassador to Lebanon.

Sanchez, head of ISA's Latin America section, is a former CIA officer.

McFarlane calls Iran overtures 'sensible'

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former national security adviser Robert McFarlane said Thursday that U.S. overtures to moderate Iranian officials were "sensible, apparently feasible, and perhaps still a valuable course to pursue."

But, he said, the secretaries of state and defense and institutions of government charged with foreign policymaking responsibility, must be fully involved, and "you must rely on the support of Congress and the American people."

Moreover, McFarlane added in a speech to senior government executives, before considering such actions "you establish as a milestone, the point pro-

mply where you will consult with those institutions and the American people."

Without amplification, he said: "It seems to me our government has done that."

Asked how he justified the deceptions that are coming to light, McFarlane replied:

"I don't justify them. The deliberate planning for engaging the Congress was part of the (arms sales) concept from the first moments until I left government—I believe that is an important part of any policy proposal that you expect to sustain; you cannot do it overtime without congressional and popular support."

Take uniforms or Fifth, senator says

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Government officials involved in the Iranian arms deal should "take off their uniforms or take off their Fifth Amendments," the chairman of the U.S. Senate Intelligence Committee said Thursday.

Sen. Dave Durenberger, R-Minn., said President Reagan shouldn't allow "National Security staff members, advisers, admirals and generals" to avoid answering questions about the arms deal.

"All that does is make it look like Ronald Reagan has something to hide," Durenberger, attending a health care conference, said at a news conference here.

Durenberger called House Foreign Affairs Committee members "loudmouths" for revealing testimony given in a closed session Wednesday. Durenberger said it's bad for the country to allow politicians to use a presidential controversy for political gain.

'Nuclear winter' test may go

SAN DIMAS, Calif. (AP) — A replacement for a helicopter that crashed last week was ready to start a 600-acre brush fire Friday in a test of whether smoke from an atomic war could cause a "nuclear winter," officials said Thursday.

Winds were expected to diminish to a whisper by today, National Weather Service forecasters said, giving researchers their last chance at the test burn. The next opportunity would be late next spring.

"We have a new helltorch, and we're ready to go for Friday," said U.S. Forest Service spokesman Philip Riggan.

The test burn in Angeles National Forest was to be the first field study of how smoke from a nuclear war might block the sun and plunge Earth into months of near-darkness, causing continental land temperatures to drop below freezing, even in midsummer, triggering mass starvation.

Son held in actress' slaying

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Susan Cabot-Roman, a former actress once linked romantically to Jordan's King Hussein, was beaten to death and her 22-year-old son was arrested in the slaying, authorities said Thursday.

Police said the son originally blamed a man dressed in the robes of a Japanese Ninja warrior who stole \$70,000.

Her son, Timothy Scott Roman, a college student, was booked Thursday for investigation of murder, said police Detective Joe Diglio. He was being held without bail.

Miss Cabot-Roman, 59, was killed Wednesday night in the master bedroom of the plush Encino home she shared with her son, Diglio said.

Medicare compromise OK'd

WASHINGTON (AP) — Health Secretary Otis Bowen has agreed to a compromise budget proposal that would drastically alter the way hospital-based doctors are paid for treating Medicare patients, administration sources said Thursday.

Bowen had objected to a Reagan administration proposal in the draft budget for the 1988 fiscal year to change the reimbursement system for all doctors who treat hospitalized Medicare patients, including outside physicians such as surgeons.

But in negotiations with the Office of Management and Budget, Bowen accepted a scaled-back proposal that would affect only hospital-based radiologists, anesthesiologists and pathologists, according to administration sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Air Force officers identified

WASHINGTON (AP) — The remains of two Air Force officers killed during the Vietnam War and recovered earlier this year have been positively identified by an Army laboratory in Hawaii, the Pentagon said Thursday.

The remains will be accorded a full military honors ceremony and then flown from Hickam Air Force Base in Hawaii to Travis Air Force Base, Calif., today, the Pentagon added.

The men identified, including their rank and home-of-record at the time of their disappearance, were Lt. Col. Arthur L. Warren, born April 20, 1936, with a home of record of Toledo, Ohio, who was lost over North Vietnam on Dec. 5, 1966, and Maj. Richard L. Butt, born Feb. 23, 1943, with a home of record of Norfolk, Va., lost over North Vietnam on Nov. 11, 1966.

President helps light tree

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan helped an 8-year-old boy light the national Christmas tree Thursday, declaring, "I don't have any problems at Christmas" despite the furor over his administration's secret arms deals with Iran.

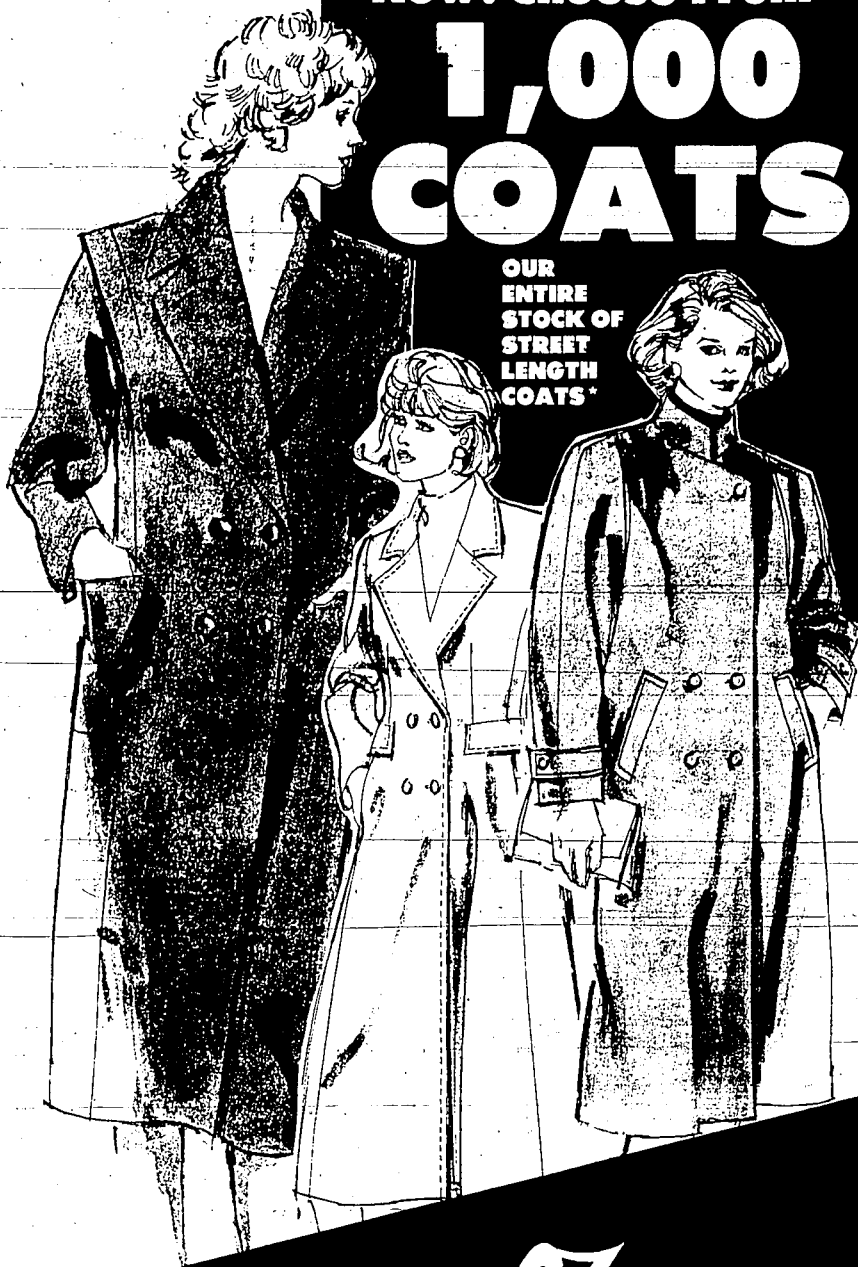
Byron White, 8, a member of the National Capital Area of Big Brothers and Big Sisters, guided by the president, flipped a switch that Reagan said has been used to light the tree ever since President Coolidge inaugurated the custom.

The doors of the White House's diplomatic reception room were thrown open and those gathered inside could see the lights flash on the tree several hundred yards away. The event had been planned for outdoors but was held inside because of rainy, sleety weather.

School district invests in teacher excellence

TWIN FALLS — Teachers in the Twin Falls School District who picture themselves studying in a foreign land or scrutinizing a facet of one of their courses will now be rewarded for illustrating their classes with that special information.

The school board unanimously approved Tuesday a program to award local teachers \$10,000 annually to pursue post-graduate study.

The "Investment in Excellence" program will begin in January, when teachers will compete for the grant by submitting their ideas for projects to pursue.

Miriam Reed, a second-grade teacher at Sawtooth Elementary School, participated in the committee advocating the fellowships. She hopes the fellowship will enable more teachers to possibly mirror a trip she has taken to educate herself.

Reed visited Australia for a month last summer to learn more about the country she had described to her social studies classes for 13 years and had learned about second-hand.

"Each year my interest would build and I said one day I'll have to go and see what I've been teaching," Reed said.

One of the trip's most vivid revelations occurred during an underwater journey past several miles of the Great Barrier Reef of

blue, yellow and orange coral that runs along Australia's coast.

"To travel through that city of coral... I couldn't believe this was the miles of reef I had been teaching about for so long," Reed said. "When you tell your students about 600-pound clams you don't understand it, but now I've seen them."

She paid for the trip herself and received no credit for it. But Reed said the costs were far outweighed by the learning and pleasure of the opportunity, which she hopes will be available to more teachers through the fellowships.

"What, hopefully, we want them to do is pursue a dream they could not do on their own," Reed said. Other committee members

echoed the notion of fellowships providing a vehicle for teachers to pursue their dreams.

Assistant Superintendent Keith Tolzin, Morningside Principal Dennis Sonlus, Patty Humphreys of Twin Falls High School, Times-News Managing Editor Stephen Hargen and community members Donna Stalley and Camden Meyer were also on the committee that recommended the program to the board.

Committee members said interest in the program was sparked by a Times-News editorial last August.

Sonlus presented the program idea to the board and summed up its intent.

"We want to recognize teachers for doing something above average," Sonlus said. "We

want to reward excellence."

Tolzin said the program would allow teachers interested in improving specific portions of their curriculum to study more.

"I think the intent is to help teachers with special ideas they want to try to implement," Tolzin said.

The \$10,000 will be taxable income, as the teacher will have to return to the district for at least one year after the fellowship is completed. The money may be awarded to one person or divided among many separate projects.

The committee which recommended the program will also judge applications for creativity, imagination and promise for success.

Study: Farmers would benefit in water leasing plan

BOISE (AP) — Farmers generally would benefit from leasing part of their irrigation water in the Snake River Basin for a marketing program aimed at increasing water availability for hydropower production, according to a study conducted for the governor's Snake River Studies Advisory Committee.

Farmers dedicating a portion of their irrigation water to the market under 25-year leases would see an average drop in net income of about \$2.50 per acre, the study said.

But if farmers participate to the extent that 600,000 acre-feet of water per year is left in the river, the minimum streamflow could be raised to about 8,000 cubic feet per second. The study said that would produce "firm" or guaranteed hydroelectric capacity worth from \$23 to \$32 for each of the estimated 1 million-plus acres from which participation would be needed to meet the goal.

Norman Whittlesey of Washington State University and Joel Hamilton of the University of Idaho presented those findings Thursday in Boise at a meeting of the six-member advisory committee, appointed last December by Gov. John Evans.

The panel was formed to study the economic and hydrologic impacts of the Swan Falls water rights agreement reached between the state and Idaho Power Co. in October 1984.

The settlement and subsequent implementing legislation effectively ended years of bickering over control of water in the Snake River and cleared the way for consideration of a system allowing individuals to market their water rights in the basin, theoretically to the most efficient use.

Hamilton told the advisory committee that increasing stream-flow

to create more firm hydropower capacity — at least in the mid-1990s and beyond, when power surpluses in the Northwest decline — would be making efficient use of the water. Guaranteed generating potential is worth more than "non-firm" capacity, or that above the historic minimum stream-flows, he said.

Whittlesey stressed that work was far from complete on developing a water marketing plan, but that the idea of leasing water currently used for irrigation seemed to be a realistic alternative.

The proposal outlined Thursday would reduce the water supply for farms only during "critical flow years" and only in about one year out of 50 would it force the idling of any irrigated land at all, he said.

Eighty percent of the time it would not require any interruption in farmers' use of irrigation water, and only about 2 percent of the time would it require farmers to cut their use in half.

In exchange, they would be paid for the amount of their water right dedicated to the marketing program. In at least some cases, farmers could be granted a break on electricity costs, particularly "high-lift" pump irrigators, Whittlesey said.

"The long-term water supply is kind of a crap shoot," he said. But in general, a market plan "should leave the farmer better off than he is now."

Still, Whittlesey acknowledged there were problems still to be worked out, including how to control consumptive use of water, both legally and technically.

There also must be a way found to avoid involving other water sources in the marketing program and of reconciling responsibilities of the various state and federal organizations that would need to be involved.

How fit?

City puts employees through YFCA physical test

TWIN FALLS — Firemen, policemen, secretaries, and anyone else on the city of Twin Falls' payroll went through a mildly strenuous fitness evaluation at the YFCA Thursday to encourage public awareness of the benefits of having healthy employees.

John Eschenburg, director of the YFCA, organized the first-time event this year and said he hopes more businesses will participate in the future.

"With increasing insurance costs, employees are more interested in having healthy employees. This means fewer sick days and greater enthusiasm," he said.

"The insurance market won't change and employers are going to want to maximize the resources they have," he added. Other local businesses have indicated they would also be interested in participating next year, he said.

A fitness evaluation also puts health problems on a more personal level. Reading about health problems doesn't usually encourage people to improve their physical condition, he said. "The more people know about their individual condi-

tion, the more it hits home," he said.

The evaluation included testing of blood samples on Wednesday and seven physical trials on Thursday. Eschenburg said the physical testing alone is adequate, but with blood testing, one can also receive information about cholesterol and blood-sugar levels, which are important health factors.

The seven physical tests included blood pressure, resting pulse rate, body composition, the step test, flexibility, muscular strength and muscular endurance.

Body composition is a measurement of body fat. Three areas on the women and four areas on the men were measured for body-fat percentages. They included the tricep, abdomen and hip areas for the women and the tricep, abdomen and the front and back of the shoulder area for men.

The step test measures cardiovascular efficiency and involves stepping up and down on a 16-inch step to a set rhythm for three minutes. The recovery heart rate is then measured.

Flexibility is tested by measuring how far the person can come to touching his or her toes after warming up. The exercise is done sitting down to prevent "cheating," Eschenburg said. An

employee with limited flexibility is a good candidate for lower-back problems in later years, he added.

Muscular strength involves lifting a barbell — 35 pounds for women, 80 lbs. for men — to a set rhythm for as long as possible. Tests such as muscular strength and the step test are done to a tape recording of a metronome to help keep the rhythm, Eschenburg said. The minute the person breaks the cadence, the test is over.

Muscular endurance is tested by doing as many sit-ups as possible in one minute. This test will indicate stomach-muscle strength, an important factor in the maintenance of good posture.

The employees are being tested in two groups — 100 were tested this week and the remaining 53 will be tested in January.

Eschenburg said he hopes the results from the tests, which will be known sometime in January, will encourage city employees to develop individual fitness programs of their own, to improve the areas that need work.

"I'm hoping that a series of fitness workshops like stress management, weight loss, aerobics, and diet will follow the announcement of the results. But, even if people don't take organized classes, they can still exercise at home," he said.

United Way campaign results down this year

TWIN FALLS — After some delay in collection of accounts, the final 1987 United Way allocations were announced Thursday at the group's board meeting. The allocations total \$190,645, a decrease from last year's allocations of \$219,814.

The total estimated available funds from this year's campaign were \$215,000. Subsequent allocations were figured as a one-time grant to the Murtagh Quick Response Unit of \$375, shrinkage of 5 percent, and donor designations.

Last year, donor designations were included in the allocations total, which makes the difference

between this year and last more dramatic than it actually is, said President Jeff Harris.

Not including the donor designations in the total allocations means that an agency specifically designated by a donor will receive that money in addition to the money it receives through allocation.

The total amount of funds being given to agencies this year is, in reality, about \$4,000 behind last year, instead of \$29,169. There are still some large accounts to be collected, which may yet even up the totals, Harris said.

As the delinquent accounts are collected, the money will be allocated accordingly, he added.

Oakley Canal Co. reaches settlement with insurer

BURLEY — United States Fidelity and Guaranty Co. must pay liability claims up to a \$500,000 limit for the Oakley Canal Co. for damages arising from the construction of an emergency canal to drain the Oakley dam in May 1984, a Cassia County jury ruled Wednesday.

However, before jurors could determine the amount currently owed by the insurers, canal company attorneys Kenneth Pederson and Curtis Webb of Twin Falls, reached a \$75,000 settlement agreement with insurance company lawyer John Doerr, Twin Falls, Thursday.

Wednesday's trial before 3rd District Judge Ronald Bruce determined two major issues: United States Fidelity and Guar-

anty Co. was responsible for insurance coverage to the canal because it was the "insuring party" under the \$500,000 of insurance, jurors unanimously said.

The insurance company had claimed that construction of the diversion canal was not the result of an accident. However, if the side, could not be reached for comment.

The canal company said it had carry a \$25,000 policy limit as insurance coverage had been raised to \$500,000 less than two weeks before the canal was built, it said.

But jurors rejected those arguments. Full disclosure of the dam's situation had been made by Stephen Bywater, the canal company's attorney, when he asked that the policy be raised on May 7, 1984, Pederson argued. When construction of the diversion canal was started on May 19, the \$500,000 coverage was in effect, he said.

Pederson said Thursday that he was gratified by what the jury had said — and that the canal company felt "vindicated" in its actions.

"The Oakley Canal Co. never felt it did anything wrong," he added. Doerr, the attorney for the other side, could not be reached for comment.

The canal company said it had \$83,000 of collectibles due from damage claims, and was asking for \$100,000 before the \$75,000 settlement was reached Thursday.

Pederson said that 34 claims over a \$500 deductible level had been paid by the canal company and that the vast majority of small claims from the incident had already been settled.

One "major lawsuit," claiming over \$2 million for damages to Union Pacific Railroad property, has yet to be settled, he said.

Glenns Ferry electronics company makes Inc.'s top 500 growth list

GLENN'S FERRY — Producing in a renovated schoolhouse, Heath Electronics — Manufacturing — Corp. is the newest among factories or largest work forces.

But "growthiest" is another matter, according to Inc. magazine.

For the first time, the Glenns Ferry electronics business has jumped into the Inc. 500, a ranking of the American's small, private companies on the move. The listing was published in Inc.'s December issue.

Heath broke in at 365 — about two-thirds into the list — for racking up a growth rate of 621 percent in the past five years. Inc. calculates growth on total sales.

Accompanying Heath were three other Idaho companies, all from Boise: magazine publisher Com-Tek Inc., ranked at 80 for five-year growth of 2,445 percent; Zero Defects Inc., an electronics manufacturer, ranked at 186 for growth of 1,161 percent; and Eterna-Line

Corp., a specialty contractor, ranked at 417 for growth of 542 percent.

Inc. covers the country by mail to search out prospects for its annual listing. To be considered, a business had to book between \$100,000 and \$25 million in sales during base-year 1987. They also had to be in business the full five years and show a sales increase during fiscal 1988.

At the same time, lack of profitability does not knock a company off the list, said Inc. spokeswoman Verna Caruso. For example, Com-Tek, which moved from Hailey to Boise last year, showed a loss in 1985 — yet ranked tops among the Idaho companies.

Heath was solidly — although not highly — profitable in 1985. It fell into a profit range from 6 to 10 percent on sales of barely over \$1 million, said President Janice Heath, confirming the magazine's figure.

The 10-year-old company assembled \$1,099-million worth of electronic components in fiscal 1985, more than seven times its 1981 sales of \$140,000 to merit the list. Sales for fiscal 1988

will be slightly lower, at about \$1,002 million, she said.

The results might have been even higher, had not Heath spent the effort to give birth to a sister company, Idaho Circuit Technology Corp., in 1984. A fire at ICT, two years ago, also took its toll on the family-owned companies, she said.

Heath and her husband Lerry, who operate the business, also have limited growth to avoid spending beyond its cash flow, she said. Higher sales volumes exact a price, because it takes more money to keep up the pace between the time an item is produced and when the payment arrives.

Lately, with its commercial subcontracting business hearty and its first big retail product out on store shelves, the Heaths are talking with investment bankers about raising \$250,000 in venture capital.

"What it will do for us is allow us to afford our own growth," Janice Heath said. Negotiations are continuing.

Mary Hemingway's will leaves home for wildlife preserve use

NEW YORK (AP) — Mary Hemingway, the fourth wife of author Ernest Hemingway, will leave her Ketchum home, its contents, her land there and \$100,000 to the Nature Conservancy in Ketchum to be made into a wildlife preserve.

A spokeswoman at the conservancy said Thursday that the group had not been notified yet of the will's contents and could not comment yet.

Most of Mary Hemingway's \$3 million estate was left to educational institutions, although she did leave an antique necklace to model Margaux Hemingway.

Mrs. Hemingway, a journalist and author, died Nov. 27 in New York City at age 78, after a long illness.

Hemingway, her third husband when she wed in 1946, shot himself to death in 1961 at their home in Ketchum, upon learning he had cancer.

The will, filed for probate Wednesday, provides that the American Museum of Natural History in New York, the United Negro College Fund, and the Medical College, a predominantly black school in Nashville, Tenn., share equally in whatever was not specifically bequeathed to others.

Mrs. Hemingway left \$100,000 each to World Wildlife Inc., the Audubon Society, the NAACP Legal Defense Fund, and the Hospital for Joint Diseases in New York City.

The Kennedy Library in Boston will receive a portrait of her late husband by Waldo Pierce; physical possession of his original manuscripts; a sculpture of running cheetahs; a 14th-century painting of a madonna and child, and all books and art works in her New York apartment.

Mrs. Hemingway left to her survivors — however, to Margaux Hemingway, her husband's granddaughter after her marriage, Mrs. Hemingway left a 19th-century tea and coffee service, as well as the antique Venetian necklace and other jewelry and silverware.

Marjolein Hemingway, Margaux's sister in New York, in Woody Allen's film "Manhattan," was not mentioned in the will.

Contadora chiefs earn peace award

Ketchum to serve as satellite downlink in broadcast of Beyond War's ceremony

KETCHUM — Ketchum residents and people throughout North, Central and South America will be linked by television satellite as the presidents of Mexico, Panama, Venezuela and Colombia, the Contadora nations, receive Beyond War Foundation's annual award on Sunday.

The satellite, "a space bridge of the Americas," will connect five U.S. cities — San Francisco, Boston, Denver, Des Moines and Los Angeles — with the capital cities of the four Contadora nations. All nine "uplink" cities will broadcast part of the award ceremony to more than 150 "downlinks" throughout the Western Hemisphere.

At each "downlink" location people will watch as the award is presented to President Vargas of Colombia, President Madrid of Mexico, President Delvalle of Panama, and President Lusinchi of Venezuela.

Beyond War supporters from the Magic Valley can gather to watch the ceremony in Ketchum at the Wood River downlink at Hemingway Elementary School Sunday from 7:30 to 8:55 p.m. The public is invited. There is a \$8 charge, with children under 12 admitted free and kids 12 to 18 admitted for \$2.

Ann Christensen, a Sun Valley resident coordinating the Ketchum downlink, believes 50 to 100 people will attend the award presentation. Other downlinks are planned at

the United Nations for U.N. ambassadors in Washington, D.C., for Western Hemisphere ambassadors to the United States and in several cities in Germany.

The award will honor the Contadora groups' efforts to reach a negotiated rather than a violent settlement to the conflicts in Central America. The foreign minister from each Contadora country will, from five uplink cities in the United States, introduce his respective president who will then accept the award.

Previous recipients of the Beyond War award have been the leaders of the Five Contingent Peace Initiative in 1985, the International Physicians for the Prevention of Nuclear War in

1984, and the National Conference of Catholic Bishops in 1983.

The Beyond War Foundation is a non-partisan, over 10,000 people throughout the United States and other countries. Its goal is to end war through education.

"Beyond War is an educational movement, not a membership organization," says Anna Christensen. "We want to educate people to the crisis that we (the world) face and to the solution."

She believes that if 5 percent of the world's population accept the concept of a world beyond war, the idea will become "embedded," and war may become a thing of the past.

Cassia group urges ethanol consumption

RUPERT (AP) — A group of Cassia County farm and community leaders is urging farmers to increase their ethanol consumption as it tries to lure a processing plant that would utilize waxy barley, which would provide an alternate crop for area growers.

"We want that plant here so bad our teeth hurt," Jay Young, chairman of the Hopper Committee said of a proposal by the J.R. Simplot Co. — Simplot has not yet made a final decision on whether such a plant will be built, but the Hopper Committee is trying to make the proposal more appealing.

The company holds rights to processing technology that also converts waxy barley into several by-products in addition to ethanol.

Simplot officials said the decision hinges on finding suitable buyers for products made from waxy barley, which the committee said would stimulate the local farm economy by giving farmers an alternative to the area's staple crops, which often bring poor prices.

Rupert Mayor Bill Whitton said Cassia County would be an excellent location for an ethanol plant because it is located in a high-production area that is easy to reach by major and interstate highway transportation.

In addition to landing the proposed plant, the committee is urging local farmers to use more ethanol.

"Every farmer in this community needs to burn ethanol on his farm," Young said. "How can we go back to Washington and tell them we need to burn this renewable resource if we're not doing it ourselves?"

A total of \$4,189.89 was allocated to non-member agencies, including \$2,920.44 to the Hospital Foundation (for Hospice use only), \$120 to the O'Leary Junior High PISO, \$167.28 to Planned Parenthood, \$146.02 to the Cancer Society, \$234.18 to Neighbors-In-Pain, \$236.76 to Veterans Against Violence.

Designations to member agencies totaled \$5,593.59. These allocations included \$93.71 to Camp Fire Inc., \$1,113.07 to Boy Scouts, \$335.71 to Girl Scouts, \$245 to the YFCA, \$262.02 to the Artthritis Foundation, \$292.04 to the United Mental Health Association, \$664 to MVARC (Port of Hope), \$228.52 to United Cerebral Palsy, \$331.60 to the American Red Cross, \$2,926.58 to the Salvation Army, \$316.98 to Early Childhood Learning, \$694 to Foster Grandparents, \$241.7 to Agassiz Seniors, \$20.38 to Hagerman Seniors, \$40.38 to Jerome Seniors, \$35.38 to Silver and Gold Seniors, \$182.67 to Twin Falls Seniors, and \$94.38 to West End Seniors.

Administrative costs, included in the total allocations, came to \$36,416 this year — a decrease of \$1,933.27 from the 1986 allocations.

Significant decreases in allocations for 1987 were the American Red Cross, which went from \$30,489.24 to \$25,977; the Boy Scouts, which went from \$26,881.55 to \$20,535; the Salvation Army, which went from \$34,739.55 to \$29,405; and the YFCA, which went from \$27,058.12 to \$23,759.

Multiple Community Service agencies, such as the Red Cross and the Salvation Army, took up the largest percentages of the 1987 allocations — at \$2.27 percent. Youth groups were second, at 27.12 percent.

Also at Thursday's meeting, a proposal to restructure the United Way Board of Directors was discussed. Under the proposal, the 57-member board would be cut to 21 members.

This proposal still needs some research, Harris said. According to the United Way's by-laws, each member agency must be represented in the board, which would not happen with the proposed reduction.

The board voted unanimously

Thursday to allow further research into what needs to be done legally to make the proposal effective, Harris said.

The proposed board would include an agency representative, a north side representative, an attorney, and representatives from the medical, banking, insurance, accounting, communications, education, and general business professions. There would also be an agricultural representative and two members at large.

Harris said the board has become too cumbersome to operate effectively, and the proposal would enable the United Way to become "more businesslike."

New executive officers will be elected at the January board meeting, he said.

Informants, not computers, lead to insiders

Prosecution assured now

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sophisticated computer surveillance cannot match a well-placed informant for uncoasting illegal stock trading such as Ivan Boesky's, the Securities and Exchange Commission said Thursday.

SEC officials, testifying before a House investigations subcommittee, said computer surveillance of the millions of shares traded each day on the nation's exchanges each day has "dramatically enhanced" the commission's ability to detect illegal trading.

But under skeptical questioning, the SEC officials conceded that computers by themselves are not enough to solve criminal cases.

"Computers are very important," said SEC enforcement chief Gary Lynch. "But there's nothing more important than getting a phone call from someone who has helpful information."

The SEC officials, widely complimented in recent weeks for crack-

ing major insider trading cases, met unexpectedly sharp questioning Thursday in the first congressional inquiry into the Boesky case.

Boesky, perhaps the most famous and most successful of the high-risk speculators known as arbitrageurs, agreed last month to pay a \$100 million fine and plead guilty to one felony count to settle an SEC complaint of insider trading.

And SEC Chairman John Shad told the subcommittee that such cases "show that inside traders, even those who are large and successful... can no longer escape detection or prosecution."

The General Accounting Office and the head of the New York Stock Exchange—the subcommittee's much-lauded computer surveillance program—is incapable of actually catching the crooks, noting that Boesky and fellow insider trader Dennis Levine were caught only because of informants.

"Even the most sophisticated computer surveillance systems will not produce the evidence necessary to link questionable trades with one or more individuals using inside information," said William J. Anderson, assistant comptroller general of the GAO.

"They do not produce irrefutable evidence showing who passed inside information to whom," Anderson said. "Nor is it conceivable that, no matter how well designed, they could ever accomplish that task."

"To show that that person is trading on inside information... involves the work of a great many people, perhaps even the cooperation of an informant," added NYSE Chairman John P. Phelan Jr.

Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich., chairman of the subcommittee, said market computers flagged dozens of trades by Boesky and Levine over a period of years, as suspicious, but none resulted in a case.

"Despite all the wonders of modern technology, hundreds of in-

vestigators at the firms, the exchanges and the SEC could not make a case," Dingell said. "It took a one-year-old white kid to crack the code."

The "white kid" was a broker who noticed Levine's string of astounding successes and began "piggybacking" his own trades on Levine's buys. He made the mistake of sharing his "tips" with friends, however. An anonymous informant led the SEC to the broker, who informed on Levine, who informed on Boesky, who is talking.

"In fact, we stumbled across them," said Rep. Dennis Eckart, D-Ohio, a member of the subcommittee.

Shad and Lynch agreed that market computers are not the final solution. But they disputed contentions that the SEC is viewed as a toothless tiger on Wall Street.

"If I were here in April, it would be difficult for me to face down that statement," said Lynch. "I have to confess, one of the frustrations we had was that in spite of all the cases we were bringing, people weren't taking our insider trading program seriously enough, people were still engaging in insider trading."

"I would submit to you that the Dennis Levine case went a long way toward changing that," he said. "And if you talk to people on Wall Street today, the Ivan Boesky case had a real effect."

"People are paranoid on Wall Street over this," added Shad. "The inhibitory effect of these recent cases has been extraordinary."

But Dingell said he believed more was needed. He directed Shad to prepare a budget request independent of the White House budget office that would be adequate to police the stock markets.

And he said Congress may consider substantial increases in the penalties for insider trading.

Broad loss for erratic stock market

NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market posted a broad loss Thursday, continuing its erratic behavior since it set new highs early this month.

The Dow Jones average of 30 industrial stocks on Wednesday fell back 9.28 points to 1,923.85.

Volume on the New York Stock Exchange came to 135.89 million shares, against 139.67 million Thursday.

Interest rates rose in the credit markets following the Commerce Department's report of a larger-than-expected 0.5 percent rise in retail sales last month.

Excluding figures for automobiles, the department said, sales showed a 0.9 percent increase.

But while questions about the interest rate outlook might have disturbed some investors, analysts said, the main concern confronting the market was the approach of the quarterly triple witching hour on Dec. 19.

"That date will mark the last trading in a set of stock index futures, stock index options and options on individual stocks.

On some, but not all, such occasions in the past, computer program trading involving the index and futures has contributed to wide swings in stock prices. Wall Streeters have found it difficult to predict whether any given triple witching hour will be stormy or not.

The Dow Jones Industrial average would have shown an even bigger loss had it not been for a 6 1/2-point jump to 51 in the stock of Owens-Illinois, which led the active list on turnover of more than 3.6 million shares. The company said the firm's Kohlborg Kravis Roberts & Co. approached it with a takeover proposal at \$55 a share.

Losers among the blue chips included Exxon, down 1/2% at 69 3/4; Eastman Kodak, down 3/4% at 68 3/4; American Telephone & Telegraph, down 3/4% at 29 1/2; and Minnesota Mining & Manufacturing, 1 1/2% lower.

Exxon it reached an agreement to sell its Reliance Electric subsidiary, acquired in 1979, to a group of investors.

Retailing issues were broadly lower, showing no benefit from the government's sales report. Sears Roebuck fell 1/4% to 4 1/4%; Penney 1 1/4% to 78 3/4; and Kmart 1/4% to 46 1/4.

There has been much discussion lately among analysts over the possibility that consumers faced with high debt burdens, and curtailed deductions for interest expenses, might cut back their spending in early 1987.

In the overall tally on the Big Board, declining issues outnumbered advances by more than 5 to 2, with 437 up, 1,164 down and 424 unchanged. The exchange's composite index of all its listed common stocks fell 1.44 to 142.02.

Nationwide turnover in NYSE-listed issues, including trades in those stocks on regional exchanges and in the over-the-counter market, totaled 161.02 million shares.

Standard & Poor's index of 400 industrials fell 1.09 to 276.10, and S&P's 500-stock composite index was down 2.79 at 248.17.

The NASDAQ composite index for the over-the-counter market lost 1.32 to 357.73. All the American Stock Exchange, the market value index closed at 204.73, down 1.82.

Air bags in works at Ford, Chrysler

WASHINGTON (AP)—Two of the top U.S. automakers say they plan to equip at least half of their 1990 model cars with air bags, prompting predictions that more than 2 million new cars sold that year will have the safety devices.

Ford Motor Co. and the Chrysler Corp. plan to equip at least half of their 1990 model cars with air bags, prompting predictions that more than 2 million new cars sold that year will have the safety devices.

Ford's plan was announced in a letter to Congress last week. Chrysler's plan was announced in a letter to Congress last week.

The Transportation Department already has said it plans to grant the extension so that automakers will be induced to equip cars with air bags at least on the driver side, while continuing the development of bags or belts to protect the passenger.

The bags, which automatically inflate to protect a car occupant in a crash, are favored by many auto safety advocates over passive belts that automatically wrap around the car occupant because the belts can be detached if considered cumbersome.

With the commitments indicated by Ford and Chrysler there likely will be a minimum of 2 million new cars sold during the 1990 model year that provide air bag protection for the driver, said Brian O'Neil, president of the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety.

U.S. auto sales, including imports, average 9 million to 10 million cars a year.

O'Neil said in an interview Japanese automakers "have been silent" on their air bag plans, but that most of the European manufacturers are expected to equip their cars with driver-side air bags by 1990.

Mercedes-Benz already makes the devices standard equipment in all its cars.

O'Neil and other air bag advocates, meanwhile, predicted that General Motors Corp., the largest manufacturer producing about 4.5 million cars a year, is likely to feel compelled to develop and equip its line of cars with air bags.

Millford R. Bennett, GM's assistant director for automotive safety, told the Senate Commerce Committee that his company has no "firm plans" on whether to provide air bags in a wide range of cars, although he said the bags would be offered as an option in 1988 Oldsmobile Delta 88s and that "in the future, air bags are coming."

Helen O. Petrusauskas, a Ford vice president, testified that Ford is committed to providing drivers with air bags "on a very large volume of our vehicles" beginning with the 1990 cars that go on sale in late 1989.

Sen. John Danforth, R-Mo., a strong air bag advocate, replied that he was "cynical" about auto manufacturers' promises and wanted figures to ease his concerns that the carmakers were pulling "just another gambit" to delay the government deadline for passive protection of engineering and development costs.

A Chrysler representative said the No. 3 U.S. automaker, which has a production line of about 1.2 million cars, also is planning to sharply expand its use of air bags, instead of passive seat belt, to protect drivers.

Retail sales up sharply in November

WASHINGTON (AP)—Retailers' sales rebounded a strongly last month from October's record drop, the government said Thursday, bringing cheers from the White House but only restrained holiday optimism from private analysts.

Total sales rose 0.5 percent in November to \$120.2 billion, from a record \$122.25 billion, even though there was a new decline for car sales, which had dragged October's overall sales down a huge 5.2 percent, the Commerce Department said.

Leaving aside auto sales, which have been very erratic in recent months, the net gain was 0.9 percent, the biggest one-month increase excluding cars since July 1985, officials said.

Sandra Shaber, director of consumer economics for Chase

Econometrics of Bala Cynwyd, Pa., praised the figures, too, but in subdued terms.

"Overall, this is good news — not in the sense that consumer spending will drive the economy as it did earlier in the year, but at least it's not likely to drag the economy into a recession," she said.

"It's not going to be a bad Christmas," she said. But she added that "if Wall Street thinks this means a surge in consumer spending, they'd better look at department stores sales which recorded a 0.1 percent decline in November."

Jerry J. Jasinowski, chief economist for the National Association of Manufacturers, said indications of a rebounding economy are misleading and the nation may well be headed for a major downturn.

"There will be sharp swings in the economy between the end of 1986 and the first half of 1987, with substantial risks of recession," Jasinowski said.

Because of the new tax law, both of which takes effect Jan. 1, much of the good news for consumers and businesses are "shifted" in spending that would normally occur in 1987 into 1986," he told a group of reporters.

The government report said auto sales were down 0.7 percent last month, but that wasn't nearly as bad as the 19.9 percent October decline that caused the record plunge in overall sales that month.

November sales were up over October in every category except auto dealers and department stores.

Sales by furniture, home furnishings and equipment stores rose a

strong 2.8 percent in November.

Hardware stores and building materials outlets recorded a 0.4 percent gain.

In all, sales of big-ticket durable goods rose 0.3 percent for the month, recording a seasonally adjusted total of \$47.7 billion.

Sales of non-durable goods, which are those expected to be consumed in three years or less, rose 0.7 percent to an adjusted total of \$74.5 billion.

Included were gains of 1.3 percent for grocery stores, 0.7 percent for eating and drinking places, 0.6 for gasoline stations, 0.3 percent for clothing stores and 0.2 percent for drug stores.

Auto sales were clearly less of a factor in the national figures in November.

Mortgage rates drop again, hit 8-year low

WASHINGTON (AP) - Interest rates on fixed-rate home loans fell for a fifth straight month in November.

The Federal Home Loan Board said commitments on such mortgages handed by U.S. lenders averaged 10.34 percent in early October.

The new level is the lowest shown in bank board reports going back to the 10.15 percent of November 1978.

The average rate is the average for effective interest rates, including fees or "points" added by lenders.

The bank board's fixed-rate average stood at 12.39 percent in November 1985, declined to 10.47 percent by last May.

Meanwhile, rates for the most common type of adjustable-rate mortgages, which have caps on how much rates can increase, declined to an average of 8.93 percent in early November.

The change also applies to the Federal National Mortgage Association, known as Fannie Mae.

Mortgage rates drop again, hit 8-year low

WASHINGTON (AP) — Interest rates on fixed-rate home loans fell for a fifth straight month in November, reaching the lowest level in eight years, the government said Thursday.

The Federal Home Loan Board said commitments on such mortgages handled by U.S. lenders averaged 10.34 percent in early November, down from 10.43 percent in early October.

The new level is the lowest shown in bank board reports going back to the 10.15 percent of November 1978. The rate quoted is the average for effective interest rates, including fees or "points" added by lenders.

Other agencies have shown home loan rates declining a bit below 10 percent this year, not including such extra fees.

The bank board's fixed-rate average stood at 12.39 percent in November 1985, declined to 10.47 percent by last May, and has been edging downward ever since.

Meanwhile, rates for the most common type of adjustable-rate mortgages, which have caps on how much rates can increase, declined to an average of 8.93 percent in early November, down from 8.65 percent in October, the bank board said.

The new calling, which will become effective Jan. 1, will be \$153,100, up from \$133,250, the board said in a news release, adding that the change was "reflecting an increase in the FHILB survey of national home prices."

The change also applies to the Federal National Mortgage Association, known as Fannie Mae.

HOLLYWOOD, Fla. — New York and San Diego completed an eight-player trade Thursday night involving power-hitting outfielder Kevin McReynolds for several of the Mets' young talents in the final hours of baseball's slowest-ever winter meetings. The Mets and Padres had spent several days discussing the trade before finalizing the swap after several meetings Thursday. To get McReynolds, along with relief pitcher Gene Walter and minor-league infielder Adam Cing, the Mets had to surrender five players.

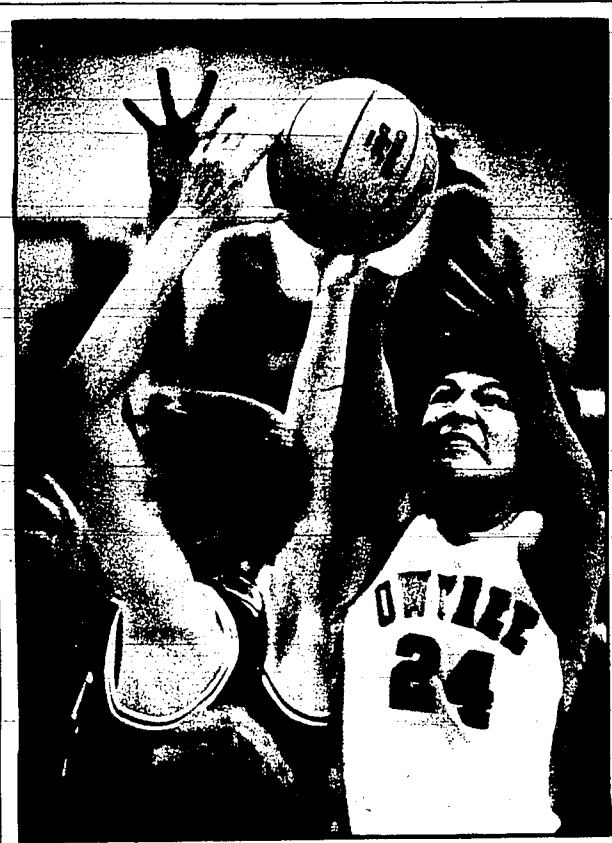


Going to San Diego are two of New York's best out-field prospects, Stanley Jefferson and Shawn Abner, multi-purpose Kevin Mitchell and two minor-league pitchers, Kevin Armstrong and Kevin Brown. McReynolds, 27, batted .288 with 28 home runs and 96 runs batted in last season. He would play left field for the Mets and join Darryl Strawberry and Len Dykstra in the outfield. Mitchell, 24, batted .277 with 12 home runs and 43 RBI in his rookie season. He was the only pitcher, catcher and second base — and batted in every spot in the lineup except ninth. Mitchell, born and raised in San Diego, was the Mets' starting left fielder for the second half of the season.

Most teams checked out of the Diplomat Hotel by evening, and most left the 85th annual event empty-handed. The Philadelphia Phillies acquired veteran Mike Essler from the New York Yankees in the morning and Oakland and Chicago made a lesser swap later, bringing the total to seven trades involving 21 major-league players. At last year's meetings, there were 13 trades for 28 players. "He's thrilled to death to be going to the world champions," Tom Selakovich, McReynolds' agent said. "McReynolds reached at his home in North Little Rock, Ark., said he wanted to wait until Friday "to let it sink in" before commenting on the trade.

"From our perspective, we set out with these meetings trying to find a right-handed hitter with power to hit in the middle of our lineup with Gary Carter and Darryl Strawberry — without disturbing our pitching staff," said Joe McIlvaine, Mets vice president. "We think we've done this with Kevin McReynolds." McReynolds had been one of the most coveted players at baseball's winter meetings. Selakovich said the St. Louis Cardinals had offered 1985 National League MVP Willie McGee and pitcher Ricky Horton for McReynolds, but had been turned down by the Padres. The Mets and Padres seemed determined not to leave without finishing their business. During the day San Diego General Manager Jack McKeon relaxed and waited for an answer, the business-sulted Mets management spent the day caucusing. The New York delegation huddled in their hotel rooms, strolled along the Atlantic Ocean beach and met next to the multi-colored parlors near the poolside cabanas. And finally, the Mets answer came: Let's make a deal.

For a brief time, it seemed as though the final official day of meetings might produce a greater flurry of activity. The Phillies began the morning by acquiring Essler and a minor-league pitcher from the Yankees for pitcher Charles Hudson and a minor-leaguer. Essler, a 294 career hitter who batted .302 with 14 home runs and 78 RBI last season, had demanded a trade from the Yankees.

In boxing: Witherspoon's trainer says fight with Smith is on

NEW YORK — Slim Robinson, the trainer of Tim Witherspoon, said Thursday night the World Boxing Association champion will defend his title against James "Bonecrusher" Smith Friday night at Madison Square Garden. "The attorney (Dennis Richard) that Timmy has agreed to let the fight go on," Robinson said while attending a fight card at the Garden's Felt Forum. "He (Witherspoon) has been wanting to fight anyway." The fight has been in an uncertain state all week because of Richard's questions about contracts and promoter Don King's charges that Witherspoon was trying to get more money for the fight. Earlier Thursday, Witherspoon weighed in, tried on and initialed his gloves while Richard and King's son, Carl, haggled about contracts.

"Whether there is a fight or not Friday night is clearly in the hands of Don King," Richard said at the weigh-in. He said the contracts are not valid and there's not a court in the land who would uphold them," Carl King said. "I don't buy that." Jesse Torres, chairman of the New York State Athletic Commission, said the fight contract is legal and that Witherspoon faces punitive action, including withdrawal of title recognition by the WBA, if he doesn't fight. Don King was not at the weigh-in. "Tim has to make a decision whether he wants to put his fate in Mr. Richard's hands," Carl King said. "It could lead to a court battle, which is good for nobody."

"I have never discussed present or future money with Don King. He discusses it constantly. My subjects have been past contracts, past compensation. None of those things has been discussed. He (Don King) keeps pretending the issue is money. CINCINNATI — The front pages of Cincinnati newspapers this week have dubbed it "The Showdown," in big, bold letters. Players are conjuring images of war.

For the first time in the 17-year rivalry between the state's two professional football teams — the Cleveland Browns and the Cincinnati Bengals — their fans are looking forward to a confrontation with more than just bragging rights of Ohio at stake. The game Sunday at Riverfront Stadium probably will decide the champion of the American Football Conference

Central Division, where the Browns and Bengals have wrestled for the lead all season. A Cleveland victory would clinch a division title; a Cincinnati victory would make the Bengals the front-runners with one game to play. The 32 previous games between the intrastate rivals have been mostly low-key. The game Sunday is the first time that the two teams fashioned by Paul Brown are squaring off in a late-season game to decide which of them will win the division. It's still a guarded interest on the part of the fans, however. Both teams have played erratically this season, leaving fans somewhat reluctant to start dreaming of gridiron glory until this week. Clevelanders seem to be taking a wait-and-see attitude. Unlike 1980, when quarterback Brian Sipe led the "Kardiac Kids" to the playoffs with dramatic finishes, there's no proliferation of Browns songs or T-shirts in the city on Lake Erie. "I don't know why it is, but the fans just haven't responded," linebacker Clay Mathews told columnist Bob Dolgan of The (Cleveland) Plain Dealer. "I think they want us to show we're for real and win a game in the playoffs."

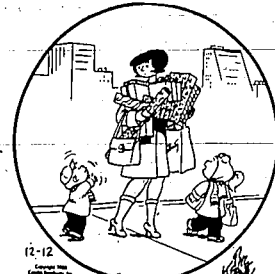

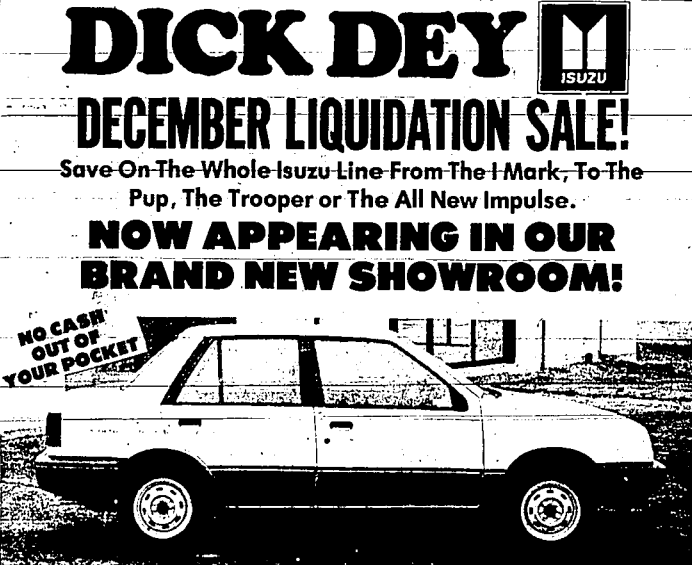

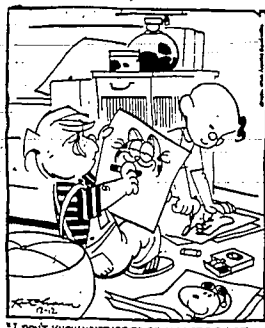

Pereira charges into Arabian horse world

International politics no hurdle for horse breeders, says author

KETCHUM — Bill Pereira, a Ketchum author and entrepreneur, recently notified a copy of his book, "The Majestic World of Arabian Horses," is on display in the window of Hunter's, a prestigious bookstore in Beverly Hills, Calif.

The book, a photographic and literary work on the international Arabian horse breeding industry, is also being displayed in the window of Doubleday's bookstore on Fifth Avenue in New York City.

But not to worry. If you're not part of the Beverly Hills or Fifth Avenue set, "The Majestic World of Arabian Horses," written by William L. Pereira Jr. and photo-illustrated by Martin Schreiber, is also being carried by Jud's Bookstore on Main Avenue in downtown Twin Falls. Pereira will be at the store Saturday from 1 to 3 p.m. to autograph copies of his volume.

Pereira's book, which covers the Arabian horse industry in the United States, Europe, South America and the Soviet Union, retails for \$50 and was originally slated by its publisher, Abrams, for a market comprised of some 50,000 Arabian horse owners in the United States. The book was published for a specialized audience, but apparently has a broader appeal.

"The retailers have thought it was more general," said Pereira, a former Newsweek correspondent. "You know, it's a horse book. People who like horse books are likely to be interested in it. It's had amazing distribution."

The 216-page, coffee table-sized edition covers the people and horses involved in the international Arabian horse breeding community. "The book really deals with the people, as much or more than the horses," said Pereira. "The different breeders, the different cultures, and different political systems that they represent and how they seem to get along extremely well without their differences being a problem."

Pereira, who received a political science degree from Stanford University, began his literary career writing television scripts and ad copy in Southern California.

In 1960, he started "stringing" for Newsweek magazine and was hired as a full-time correspondent within a month.

"Then what they did was send me to Harvard Business School," said Pereira. "I think I'm the last one they sent there because, when I got out, I left and went out to California and started an airline."

Pereira and "some other fellows" founded AirCal, an airline based on marketing strategies, which pioneered air service between Orange County and San Francisco in the mid-1960s. Simultaneously, he owned and operated the largest advertising agency in Orange County.

"Then I dropped out," said Pereira.

He sold his interest in AirCal and the ad agency in 1974 and moved to a 55-acre ranch in Santa Ynez, a farm and ranching community located 25 miles north of Santa Barbara. It was there that his interest in breeding Arabian horses began to develop.

"Most men get involved through some part of their family that is feminine," said Pereira. "My wife was raised in Nevada and is an accomplished horsewoman."

In 1952, I fell in love with one of the Arabians that they had bred. There was a little mare named Antonette and she became the Canadian Reserve National Champion Mare and the U.S. National Top Ten Mare. She kind of hooked me," said Pereira.

In 1972, he convinced the owners of Antonette to sell him the horse. "I bought the mare for my wife for Christmas and I told her about it as she was putting decorations on the Christmas tree," said Pereira. "She nearly fell off the ladder. That was the beginning, really, of our own herd."

The Perairas built up their herd until at one point they bred over 300

mares to their stallions in a year's time.

"It was quite hectic," he said, and they began to back off from their involvement in the business.

Two years ago, Bob Morton, a senior editor at Abrams, approached Pereira about the possibility of writing a book on Arabians.

"I had wanted to get back into writing. Once a writer, always a writer, I guess. They approached me. I think, because I was about the

only one they could find that had experience with Arabians and also had

Pereira and his wife had visited Ketchum periodically for ski vacations. "I thought, 'Gee, it'd be nice if I could do the book up here rather than doing it down in Santa Ynez with everyone coming in and out and bringing their horses in.' So I wrote the book up here," he said.

The Perelras enjoy living in the area so much that they sold their ranch, sent their horses off to a friend in Dripping Springs, Texas, and became permanent members of the ski community.

Pereira traveled throughout the United States, Brazil, Morocco, Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Jordan, Poland, Russia, Sweden, Germany, England, Spain and Switzerland during his travels for his book.

Photographer Martin Schreiber accompanied Pereira on all but a few of the trips. "He did most of the photographs," said Pereira. "But we had a budget on the book and there were a couple cases where it wasn't really cost-effective for both of us to go — to South America, for example. So I went with my trusty Nikon."

Pereira took pictures in South America, Southern California and Kentucky.

"It was very much like my Newsweek days where I'd go out and cover a story. But there was one difference — I really knew my stuff," he said.

In Poland, one of the national stud farms which Pereira and Schreiber visited was located on the Russian border a short distance from a MIG base.

"They were a little shaky about us walking around there with cameras. We ran into a few problems with the local police over that one," he said.

In Poland they also met Alla Al Hussein, daughter of King Hussein of Jordan, who was on hand to award trophies to the winners of the Polish

National Horse show. "She has her own string of horses that she shows throughout Europe," said Pereira. "She just drives around in a truck with the horses. She rides with them in the trailer and everything. There was no royal prerogative as far as she was concerned. She was delighted."

If we ever changed the subject from horses to something else, we might be at each other's throats. But the subject never changes, so everybody's good friends."

"It's fascinating to me how people who are pretty conservative politically, here in the United States can go over and have wonderful

discussions and do business with the Russians and the Poles and not really concern themselves too much about it and vice versa. The book deals with a lot with that and I think there's some lessons to be learned by it," he said.

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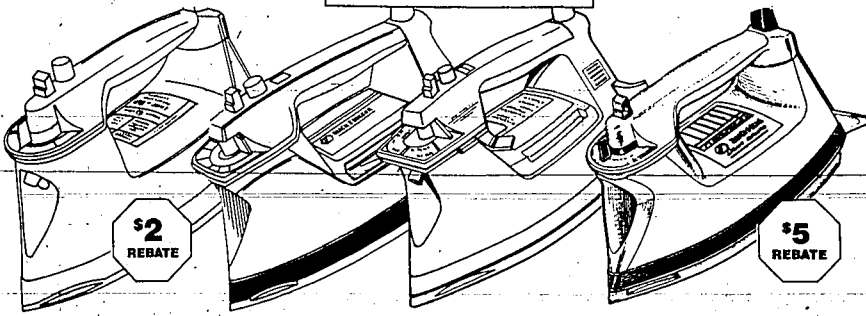
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Woody Allen to premier movie at Utah film festival

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — For the third year in a row, actor-director Woody Allen is sending a new film to the United States Film Festival in Utah for its world premiere, organizers say.

"Radio Days," starring Allen and Mia Farrow, is to premiere at an undetermined date during the festival, which runs Jan. 16-25 in the ski resort town of Park City, program director Tony Safford said Wednesday.

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — The crew of "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home" remained victorious in the weekend box office battle, while Clint Eastwood's military drama "Heartbreak Ridge" conquered the No. 2 spot in its debut.

The fourth film in the science fiction saga grossed \$8.8 million over the weekend for a total gross of nearly \$39 million in two weeks of distribution.

"Heartbreak Ridge," starring Eastwood as a tough Marine veteran of Korea and Vietnam who restores discipline to his old outfit, sold \$8.1 million worth of tickets.

\$5.51 million per-screen opening was similar to the \$5,333 per-screen earnings for Eastwood's 1985 Western, "Pale Rider," but lagged behind

previous Eastwood efforts "Tightrope," "Sudden Impact" and "Firefox."

Overall, the top seven films ran about 11 percent behind the gross for last year's box office leaders.

In third place last weekend was "An American Tail," Stephen Spielberg's animated story about a family of Russian mice that emigrate to America, which grossed \$4 million over the weekend for a three-week total of \$20.2 million.

An Australian crocodile was close behind: The romance-adventure "Crocodile Dundee" brought in \$3.8 million for a whopping 11-week total of \$9.5 million.

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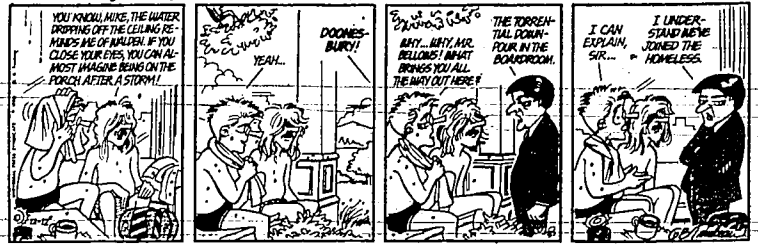
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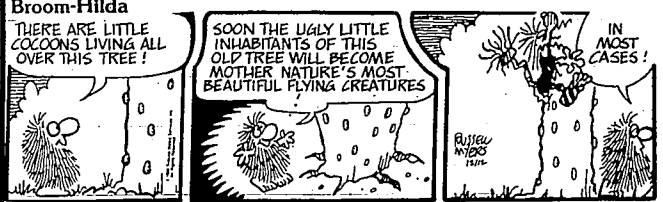

Ballet company, direction fail to move 'The Nutcracker'

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

THE NUTCRACKER (G). The sets and costumes are glorious, but as a dance film or as a coherent story, "The Nutcracker" is not only bad, it is boring. Part of the problem is the company: The Pacific Northwest Ballet, in all its pollination, is not one of the legendary companies of the world. But the other half of the problem is in director Carroll Ballard's hands: We see faces when we want to see whole figures; our attention is directed to a shoulder or a head when it is a prouette that is being danced.

AN AMERICAN TAIL (G). The long-awaited collaboration between Steven Spielberg and Don Bluth is a major disappointment. The opulent visuals and fluid animation cannot disguise the flimsiness of the plot. The film makers attempt to tell the story of the European immigrants who came to America at the turn of the century, but reducing the pogroms of 19th-century Russia to cats chasing mice trivializes the subject. As the voice of a rich, bushy social reformer, Madeline Kahn steals the show from the rest of the vocal cast.

CHILDREN OF A LESSER GOD (R). A passionate and involving love story between a teacher (William Hurt) and a beautiful deaf woman (Marlee Matlin) who refuses to try to speak. An exceptionally well-adapted stage-to-screen adaptation of the acclaimed Mark Medoff play. With Piper Laurie, Phillip Bosco.

CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13). The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day") in the Australian four-mads) is at the heart of this movie — which he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kostowski's inquisitive New York tourist (Linda) Aussie outback, and then in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser. But it is hard to think of many crowds; it could not somehow please.

FIREWALKER (PG). Lively, lighthearted adventure that deftly moves Chuck Norris away from the ultra-violent "Rambo" mold and into the tongue-in-cheekery of "Raiders of the Lost Ark" and

"Romancing the Stone." While not as sophisticated as those two films, "Romancing the Stone" (R), Lee Thompson's astute direction, is lots of fun. Norris and Louis Gossett Jr. play soldiers of fortune in pursuit of Mayan gold. With Melody Anderson.

STAND BY ME (R). "Stand By Me" is the summer's great gift, a compassionate perfectly performed look at the real heart of youth. Its atmosphere is full of the great, crude, cruddy, ripe banter of four 12-year-old boys, and these four young actors (River Phoenix, Wil Wheaton, Corey Feldman and Jerry O'Connell) have a depth and understanding that makes each character soar and live for days after the film. And what a director Rob Reiner has become: He has seen that this cast stays honest and his movie marvellously restrained.

STREETS OF GOLD (R). First-time director Joe Roth and his col-

laborators get so much life and visual energy into his movie — a boxing saga about a Russian Jewish emigre training two Brighton Beach area kids for a crack at his old team — that you tend to forget how formula-bound it is. (Then the cliché-clogged, inspirational, laissez-faire climax comes on and reminds you.) Roth, Klaus Maria Brandauer (as the emigre), the rest of the cast, cinematographer Arthur Albert, composer Jack Nitzsche, all seem to be working at the top of their form.

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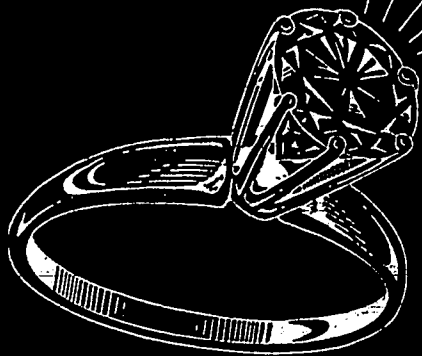

Parton, Winkler produce movie where 'star' finds holiday home

LOS ANGELES — Dolly Parton said she thought about the story of a movie star going back to her home in Tennessee for Christmas for several years before turning it into her first television movie.

She wrote six original songs for the movie, "A Smokey Mountain Christmas," which KIVI will telecast Sunday at 8 p.m. Henry Winkler, known for his role as "the Fonx" on "Happy Days," makes his movie directing debut.

Parton plays a star who is not looking forward to the Christmas holidays and decides to spend them in seclusion at a friend's cabin in the Smokey Mountains. But she finds the cabin occupied by seven orphans, who quickly put her into the holiday spirit.

"Henry's especially good with the kids, and it's not easy working with children," said Parton. "I'd never met Henry, but it was my partner, Sandy Gallin's idea, to use him. I kept saying the director had to be somebody with a feel for family and children. We talked to several directors, but they weren't right. Henry has a childlike spirit. He got caught up in the excitement."

The movie also stars Lee Majors as a mysterious mountain man, Bo Hopkins as the sheriff and Anita Morris as a mountain witch, plus Dan Hedaya and Rene Auberjonois. John Ritter makes an appearance as a judge.

The film was produced by Parton's own company, Sandollar, which gets its name from Sandy Dolly.

"I wouldn't have done this if it hadn't been such a personal project," she said. "I'd always wanted to do a Christmas movie. That's one thing that will last for years and years after you're dead and gone."

The sets for the movie, which was filmed in Los Angeles, were dismantled and shipped to Dollywood, her theme park in Tennessee, 200 miles east of Nashville. The park opened last May and will undergo a \$8 million expansion this winter.

"It's my home and I wanted to build something there," she said.

Parton grew up in Tennessee as one of 12 children and plans to spend this Christmas with her parents.

"I've never missed a Christmas at home," she said. "It's a big family when we get together."

Parton made her professional debut 30 years ago when she traveled by bus to Lake Charles, La., to cut her first record at the age of 10. "That's where I launched my career," she said. "I had an uncle living there. The record I made is still being sold."

Her newest album, called "Trio," also features Linda Ronstadt and Emmy Lou Harris. "That was a project we started eight years ago," she said. "It wasn't turning out the way we wanted, so we put it on the

shelf and went back and started over. It has some good, simple country tunes."

This winter she'll work on another album for CBS Records, which she has joined after 20 years with RCA. She also has a video, "To Know Him Is to Love Him."

stopped drinking for medical reasons four years ago — on Aug. 11, 1982, "at precisely 20 past 11," he says. He also put himself on a special diet to counter the effects of hypoglycemia, a sugar deficiency in the blood. Harris's friends describe him as careful rather than fussy.

Q. What happened to Pia Zadora's concert career? Did she quit because she's such a terrible singer and couldn't stand the audience and critic reaction? — F.T.

A. Had you asked about Pia's acting career, I might have agreed. Fact is, Zadora isn't a bad singer, and audiences and critics have accepted her as a vocal performer to be reckoned with. Having said that, I should add that Pia will be slowing up the pace a bit next year. The reason: She's expecting her second child in the spring.

Q. There are reports that Loretta Young's TV return is going nowhere because, at her age, she just doesn't have the energy for the job. Yes or no? — Y.E.

A. Don't believe it. Loretta returns to the tube Dec. 22 — after an absence of 23 years — starring in the NBC-TV movie "Christmas Eve." Loretta, 73, concedes the production schedule — 12-hour days most of the time — was demanding. "I like to sleep eight or nine hours a night," she told me. "Now, I'm getting five." Nonetheless, Young turns in a solid performance as a wealthy woman in failing health, but of un-failing good will.

Q. Didn't playwright Neil Simon suffer a heart attack after breaking up with his latest girlfriend? — M.M.

A. Simon thought he'd had a heart attack. Turns out it was only what the doctors called "exhaustion." Simon was in the nation's capital at the time, supervising road trials of his latest — and most personal — stage play, "B'way Bound." And, it's true, Simon recently broke up with his latest steady, Diane Lander. In all, things haven't gone swimmingly of late for the world's richest playwright. "It's time to rest," he tells me.

Q. Did Goldie Hawn walk out on her longtime boyfriend, Kurt Russell, leaving him with their new baby? — K.N.

A. Despite some catty rumors, it isn't so. Goldie recently flew to Israel to attend a benefit tribute to her late agent, Stan Kamen. She left

actor Kurt Russell back in Hollywood to care for their three-month old son, Wyatt. Kurt also used the time to work on a new comedy film he hopes to make with Goldie, to be directed by Mike Nichols.

Q. I was interested to read in your column about a book titled "The Big Love," concerning Errol Flynn's spicy romance with Beverly Aadland, a teenage Hollywood starlet. Wasn't Flynn himself the author of several novels? — L.R.

A. Yes; Errol Flynn wrote some books during the 1930s and '40s with titles like "Bear Ends" and "Show Down." Though literary merit wasn't his strong suit, the author's notoriety as a heartthrob, both on and off the screen, helped sales a lot. The grand ballroom of the new Sheraton Premiere Hotel atop Universal Studio hill was packed for "A Salute to Gloria Monty." "Salutes" in Hollywood usually mean looking back, saying good-bye to someone past their prime. The final pat on the back.

"Salutes" never go to working stiffs, Bob Hope ignoring the years. So the so-called "Salute to Gloria Monty" doesn't jibe.

"General Hospital's" majordomo, with her fingerprints on every scene, leaves the show Jan. 1 to make prime-time movies and dramas.

Gloria's exit, a move announced months ago, still has the soap company in a state of uneasiness. The actors should be wearing black because that's the way most feel. For Gloria is, was, Big Mommy. Demanding yes, but reassuring. Whatever she did turned out to be right, or so it seemed.

Soon the competition copied just to keep up. Monty became, and is, soap opera's style queen. A boss lady in total control. When she goes, what happens?

Ask Tracy Brock's Robin Bernard. "Nothing's going to change for a while," says Robin. "Gloria's style is set." Lucy's Lynn Herring agrees. Monty's imprint is too strong to disappear overnight.

But setting new trends, spotting hot talent, taking a change and feeling secure about it is another story.

Says Lynn, "Check the show next May. We can't predict anything at this stage. All we know is we'll miss Gloria terribly."

Monty laughs at the prospect of "General Hospital" falling to pieces without Big Mommy. "Sheer nonsense," says Monty. "The show will survive handsomely. 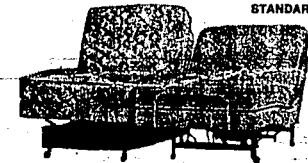

Networks' viewing order intact despite recent programs shuffle

NEW YORK — The midseason prime-time shuffle has left all three networks standing in place, according to last week's ratings from the

A.C. Nielsen Co.

ABC did a little worse on Thursday, with low-rated premieres of "Dads" and "Gung-Ho." They replaced "Sledge-Hammer!" and "Sidekicks," which have moved to Saturday to replace the disastrous "Life with Lucy" and "The Ellen Burstyn Show."

CBS had a strong debut Monday for "The Cavanaughs," which ranked No. 15 for the week with a rating of 19.9. But the show it replaced, "Designing Women," dropped to 58th place in its new Thursday night slot.

NBC's midseason moves, which shifted "Crime Story" to Friday, "L.A. Law" to Thursday and "Hill

Street Blues" to Tuesday, netted ratings only slightly better than the season average in those time slots. "Hill Street," in its final season, dropped from a 14.6 season average to a 13.3 rating on its first Tuesday showing, offsetting gains by the other two programs.

"What happened with all three networks was that none of the changes really made much of a difference overall," said Larry Hyams, ABC's director of audience analysis.

NBC won the week, running its streak to 14, with an average rating of 16.7, well down from its season average of 18.4; CBS was second with an average rating of 15.5 and ABC averaged 14.8.

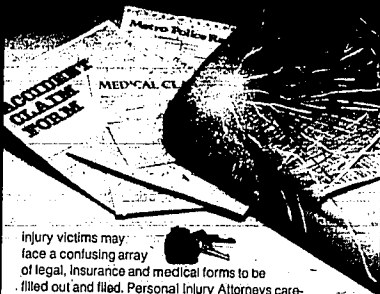

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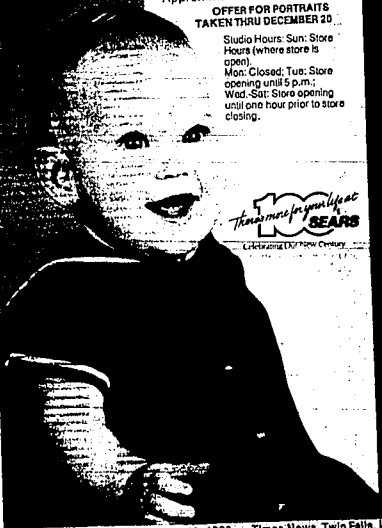

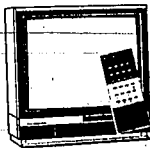

ABC cans 'Heart' for new police series

NEW YORK (AP) — ABC is canceling its 3-month-old "Heart of the City" series and replacing it with a new police program starring Pat Morita, who co-starred in the "Karate Kid" movies, the network announced Wednesday.

The network, ranked third in prime-time ratings, also is producing two programs as midseason

Both shows run one hour, Ghdalla said, and it has not been decided which programs they will replace.

Men charged with bootlegging videotapes

NEW YORK (AP) — Two men were arrested and charged with bootlegging tapes after the producers of "Great Performances: Dance in America" received a catalog from "Mr. Tape" offering their own programs for sale, according to public television station WNET.

The station said two New York men were arrested earlier this month and charged with copyright infringement and mail fraud for allegedly bootlegging tapes of performance programs from public television, including "Live from the Met," "Gala of Stars 1986" and "Great Performances: Dance in

America."

"We took this action to protect our property and to alert others who are contemplating the piracy of dance and music programming that it will not be tolerated," said Gary Knell, general counsel for WNET. "We will seek criminal prosecution throughout the United States."

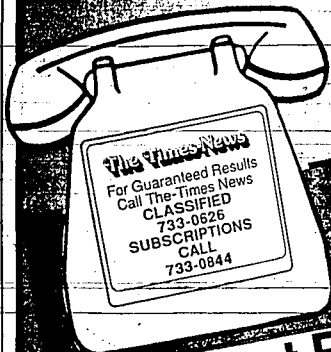

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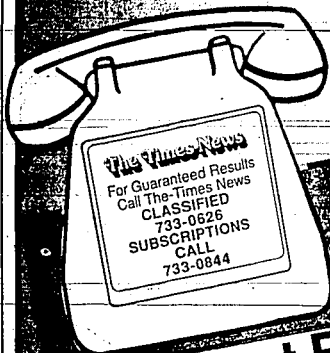

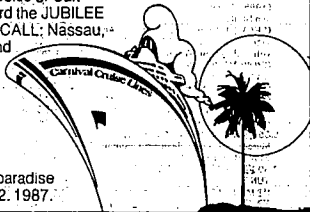
