Spirit of sharing guides Americans' hearts

After gathering under sparkling trees in what Santa brought Americans paused on Christmas Day to mark the birth of Christ and to share their bounty with the poor.

A San Francisco church got so many volunteers to help serve food to the poor it had to turn some away. Atlanta staged what it called the biggest dinner in the nation with up to 20,000 guests, and a memorial service was held at New York City's Grand Central Terminal for "Mama," a homeless woman who died there on Christmas a year ago.

"I've been here 12 years and this is one of the best Christmases I've seen in terms of help from volunteers and donations," said the Rev. Richard Kirtsch of the Nashville, Tenn. Union Rescue Mission, which prepared dinner for 1,200 of the hungry and homeless and gave out hundreds of gifts.

In Charleston, W.Va., Jewish teen-agers from the B'nai B'rith Youth Organization served dinner to the homeless at St. John's Episcopal Church. Some 15 to 20 youths, along with Rabbi Israel Koller of Temple Israel, served the dinner to allow the regular volunteers of the church's Manna Meal program the day off.

"It's just a plain day (for us), and we feel if we can have a couple of those folks stay home or go out of town, whatever they do, then that's nice," Koller said. The group also brought gifts for the homeless.

Kristy Glasser, local president of the youth organization, said she was proud of her friends' enthusiasm for the project, which came just one day before the eight-day Jewish holiday, Hanukkah begins Friday evening.

It was not a white Christmas in most areas. A storm system brought March-like rain and warmth to parts of the East. In parts of New England the rain froze on roads, making Christmas-time visits risky.

At the White House, the nation's first family spent a quiet holiday. President Reagan gave his wife, Nancy, a red robe and she gave him a blanket for one of the horses they keep on their ranch, a spokeswoman said.

In Atlanta's Civic Center, thousands enjoyed turkey, dressing and pumpkin pie at the 16th annual "Poor People's Christmas Dinner."

"We're going to have the largest Christmas Day dinner we've ever had in America," said City Councilman Hosea Williams shortly after the buffet line opened in the exhibit hall. Organizers expected to feed as many as 20,000 people, including elderly and ill Atlantans whose meals would be taken to them.

Instead of trading expensive Christmas gifts, Atlanta Mayor Andrew Young and his wife, Jean, decided to spend the money to help put members of a homeless family in an apartment of their own.

At the First Methodist Church in San Francisco expected to serve 6,000 Christmas Day dinners.

U.S., Iran to negotiate release of escrowed funds

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — U.S. and Iranian officials will meet Monday to negotiate on returning to Iran \$500 million in frozen assets that figure in an Iranian offer to intercede on behalf of American hostages in Lebanon.

The officials agreed to continue bilateral talks on the Iranian claim instead of turning it over to the Iran-U.S. Claims Tribunal for arbitration.

The tribunal — made up of three Americans, three Iranians and three people from other countries — had ruled that either nation could go to it for adjudication if no agreement

were reached by Dec. 20.

The United States has agreed in principle to return the funds, which are held in escrow in the New York Federal Reserve Bank. But several meetings in the last three months have failed to resolve outstanding details.

At least five times in recent weeks Iran's Parliament speaker, Hashem Rafsanjani, said his nation would intercede on behalf of American hostages in Lebanon if Washington unfroze and delivered Iranian assets in the United States.

Six Americans are missing in Lebanon, most of them believed held by Shiite Moslem extremists loyal to Iran.

But sources close to the arbitration panel noted that the \$500 million is only part of billions of dollars in frozen assets sought by Iran and cautioned against linking progress on the hostages to the meeting next week.

"From our point of view, we would assume that this is not going to solve Rafsanjani's problems, this is not going to meet his conditions," said a U.S. State Department source about the release of the \$500 million.

"As we've assumed, the Iranian speaker in his general statement about unblocking our assets means more than just this. He means all the properties that have been maintained in the United

States," said the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

The tribunal was established by the 1981 Algiers Accord that resulted in the freeing of 52 American hostages held for 444 days by Islamic revolutionaries in Tehran. Its function is to settle financial claims between the two nations resulting from the revolution, and it is the only public forum in which the two nations have had direct contact since breaking diplomatic relations after the 1979 hostage seizure.

The \$500 million have not yet been released because U.S. negotiators want Iran to provide a quitclaim releasing the bank from any further responsibility for the account.

Christians mark birth of savior

Hundreds of millions of Christians around the world marked the birth of Jesus with song and celebration, feasts and fireworks, protest and prayer.

In the predominantly Roman Catholic Philippines, rebels took advantage of a cease-fire in their nearly 18-year-old insurgency to come down from the hills and spend the holiday with loved ones.

Nobel Peace Prize winner Mother Teresa celebrated the holiday in the Philippines, attending midnight Mass in Dagupan City, where she plans to set up a home for lepers.

President Corazon Aquino, who took office in February after a 2 1/2 military-civilian revolt ended Ferdinand E. Marcos' 20-year rule, said in a Christmas message to her people: "I ask you, in this first Christmas in pride and freedom, to forgive and forget, to give democracy a chance to work and peace the chance to grow."

On the Israeli-occupied West Bank of the Jordan River, worshippers crowded the grotto in Bethlehem where tradition says Jesus was born nearly 2,000 years ago.

Chairs from around the world sang carols in Manger Square, jammed by pilgrims; and hundreds of armed Israeli soldiers. Security this year was unusually tight because of recent "unrest" throughout the territory, which Israel captured from Jordan during the 1967 Middle East war.

PUC drops probe of extra earnings; Mountain Bell will pursue upgrade

BOISE — State utility regulators on Wednesday dropped an investigation into Mountain Bell's excess earnings in a compromise that means customers will get a state-of-the-art telephone system at below-base-ment prices.

Public Utilities Commission President Perry Swisher said Mountain Bell was in a unique position to start a \$65 million dollar upgrade project because of unexpected excess revenues and work crews already in place that have just finished another project.

Coupled with financial concessions by the company that mean ratepayers won't be footing the bill for the new system, Swisher said Mountain Bell's proposal was too advantageous to customers for the commission to refuse.

Commissioner Conley Ward said an offer by a utility to absorb the initial cost of a project without seeking a return for ratepayers on that investment is unprecedented in Idaho.

Swisher said the project would give Idaho the most advanced tele-

customers," said Mountain Bell spokesman Steve Guerber.

The commission Wednesday approved Mountain Bell's motion to dismiss an investigation into what PUC staff members estimated to be more than \$19 million in excess earnings brought about by lower federal income tax, depreciation rates and lower cost of capital. Commissioners also authorized Mountain Bell to begin work on its upgrade project.

The investigation was prompted by complaints from the federal Department of Defense and General Services Administration, and Idaho Fair Share, which argued Monday that excess earnings should be returned to ratepayers in the form of a rate decrease. Those offices were closed Wednesday afternoon after the order was released, and officials could not be reached for comment.

Idaho Citizens Coalition spokesman Al Fothergill, who Monday accused the company of holding the community hostage, said the financial compromises make the project more palatable.

But he said the plan amounts to a public works project because the

Iraqi jet crashes after hijack try; 62 dead

RIYADH, Saudi Arabia — An Iraqi jet crashed in the Saudi Arabian desert and burst into flames Thursday after a grenade exploded in the cockpit during a hijack attempt. The Saudi Defense Ministry said 62 people were killed.

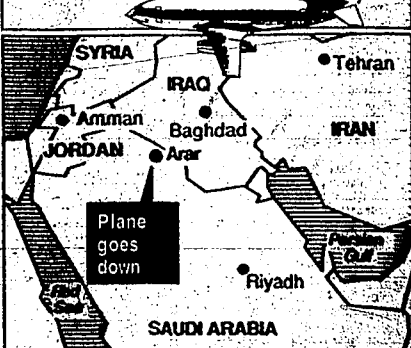
Saudi Arabian sources said the Iraqi Airways flight from Baghdad to Amman, Jordan, crashed in the desert during an emergency landing at Arar, a small domestic airstrip 66 miles south of the Saudi-Jordanian border and 230 miles southwest of Baghdad in northern Saudi Arabia.

The Saudi Defense Ministry said there were 107 people on board the Boeing 727 — 81 passengers, 15 crew members and security men. Saudi Arabia said there were 44 survivors. Jordan said in a statement there were 30 survivors.

An unidentified Iraqi official in Baghdad was quoted by the Bahrain-based Gulf News Agency as saying that one of the two hijackers was killed by a security officer and the other died in the crash.

Santa works out a deal with the Attorney General

BOISE (AP) — Santa Claus made a smooth journey over Idaho Wednesday night after some fast and fancy wheeling and dealing with Attorney General Jim Jones over the state's seat belt and speeding laws.

On Wednesday they initially were questions on whether Santa's sleigh was covered under Idaho's safety restraint law because it was manufactured prior to the cutoff point for vehicles covered under the law.

"We took the position he was covered by the seat belt law," Jones said. "He took the position that he may not be."

But Jones said after citing safety statistics, Santa agreed to don a specially made red velvet sash around his waist for the journey over Idaho a safe and legal one.

Jones said state police agreed to overlook traffic laws when Santa exceeded speed limits in rugged parts of Idaho where he was forced to use the roadway rather than risk a flight over mountains.

Hanford plants may remain closed longer than expected

SEATTLE (AP) — Plutonium production plants at the Hanford nuclear reservation probably will remain closed longer than had been expected, a U.S. Department of Energy spokesman said.

Rockwell Hanford Operations planned to restart the Plutonium-Uranium Extraction Plant on Jan. 17, but Energy Department spokesman Tom Bauman said Wednesday the plants probably won't reopen soon.

"That's Rockwell's date, not ours," he said. "We have not set any date (for reopening the plants), and we won't until Rockwell completes the requirements we have set for startup."

The Plutonium Finishing Plant will remain closed for at least two months, Bauman said.

Every major facility on the south-central Washington reservation is either temporarily closed or shut down for close early next year because of safety concerns.

The extraction and finishing

plants, which produce more than one-fourth of the nation's plutonium for nuclear weapons, were closed Oct. 8 because of safety violations detailed in internal audits. The audits revealed major problems with welds, design work and the safe guarding of plutonium at the plants.

Fuel rods from the reservation's N Reactor are chemically dissolved at the extraction plant, where plutonium and other materials are removed for use in nuclear weapons. The plutonium metal is then shaped into discs at the finishing plant for shipment to a Texas weapons assembly facility.

Rockwell had refused to shut down the extraction and finishing plants in August when a company auditor found safety problems and called for a closure. A subsequent Energy Department investigation concluded that the plants should have been shut down at that time.

Most of the requirements before the plants are restarted are an earthquake safety study, changes in

work procedures and regulations, and retraining of workers.

The N Reactor is itself set for an unprecedented six-month shutdown starting Jan. 7 because of safety flaws identified by the Energy Department last October.

The N Reactor, the only U.S. facility sharing design features with the Soviet Union's crippled Chernobyl plant, must undergo \$50 million in safety modifications and survive a possible suit by an environmental group seeking an environmental impact statement.

Also, the state Department of Ecology and the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency are asking for expensive renovations at all three plants to halt the dumping of chemical wastes into the ground.

Rockwell will be replaced at Hanford by Westinghouse Electric Corp., which won a five-year, \$4 billion contract to run the nuclear reservation beginning next October.

Horse commission studies request to alter racing dates

POCATELLO (AP) — The Idaho Horse Racing Commission is studying a request to reconsider the racing dates granted to a Pocatello track, but member Chuck Billmeyer says organizers of tracks at both Pocatello and Idaho Falls haven't met conditions for sponsoring annual races.

But Billmeyer says the assigned dates are "pretty well cut and dried" since the commission split spring racing dates between the two tracks. If the racing commission does reconsider, it will probably be in mutual races.

Bannock County officials last week urged the commission to reconsider, explaining that the early May dates are inadequate for a successful racing season. They said the frequent wet weather leaves poor track conditions and an early start would not

give horsemen sufficient time to train and qualify their horses.

State racing officials will be reluctant to review dates until the tracks prove they can meet racing conditions, Billmeyer said. To host a racing meet, track sponsors must provide liability insurance, performance bonds, a racing director, pari-mutuel equipment and operating funds.

If either track fails to meet the conditions by March 1, the assigned dates will be assigned to the complying track.

The commission lost money last year on Pocatello so we have to be pretty careful," Billmeyer said. "They have to prove to us they can turn things around."

The Idaho Falls City Council narrowly approved racing in that city as long as the racing season is concluded by June 14, allowing the Idaho spearheading racing there, was a

Billmeyer said the commission is leery about making any schedule changes because it isn't certain racing will materialize in Pocatello.

State racing authorities granted racing dates to the Pocatello and Idaho Falls tracks Dec. 10. The assignment permits Bannock County to open its track as soon as desired, but as long as the racing season is concluded by June 14, allowing the Idaho Falls track to open by June 20.

Santa phone calls lead to big bills

BOISE (AP) — Patty Wittell got a Christmas present this week she could have done without — a \$134 telephone bill to Santa Claus that she paid in January.


Ms. Wittell's 10-year-old daughter, Veronica, and a neighborhood friend racked up the bill by making long-distance calls to a 3½-minute tape recording in Salt Lake City. The recording featured dialogue between Santa Claus, his wife and a helper that she pulled with a neighbor.

The phone number for Santa does not have an out-of-state prefix, so the children didn't know that they were making a call to Utah, Ms. Wittell said. The children made the calls at Veronica's friend's home over a five-week period beginning Nov. 14, Ms. Wittell said. The mother of Veronica's friend did not want her family identified in The Statesman.

The number for Santa is advertised on the Time, Weather and Temperature recording listed in the telephone book. The call to Santa

costs 49 cents a minute, or about \$1.71 for the full recording.

"This isn't the best time of year to get that type of bill," Ms. Wittell said. "I think it's a real rip-off. My understand."



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Captured convicts waive extradition

KINGMAN, Ariz. (AP) — Two convicted murderers and a rapist, captured in the desert 23 days after escaping from a Delaware prison, agreed Wednesday to return to that state to face charges.

Waived extradition at an afternoon hearing before Superior Court Judge Steven Conn, who also revoked the \$750,000 bond set for each earlier in the day. They were returned to Mohave County Jail to wait for Delaware authorities to pick them up.

Mohave County Chief Deputy Attorney Jace Zack said he intended to

drop all Arizona counts against the three as long as Delaware authorities seek stiff enough charges to see that they are imprisoned for a long time.

Conn said a planned Jan. 2 preliminary hearing on the Arizona charges will not be conducted until the three are taken to Delaware to face charges of being fugitives from justice.

The three surrendered to law officers Tuesday night after they were found hiding in a dry creek bed near Littlefield in extreme northwestern Arizona.

They had fled to the area following a chase on Interstate 15 after a holdup in nearby Utah community.

They appeared earlier Tuesday before Mohave County Justice of the Peace Bill Gumaer, who set the bond schedule for a five-year, \$4 billion hearing to determine whether the three should be bound over for trial on the state's planned charges of attempted first-degree murder, felony flight and possession of a stolen vehicle. The attempted murder count stemmed from shots fired during an auto chase Monday night, Gumaer said earlier.

Trial dates set for five Ariz. Patriots

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — Feb. 10 trial dates have been set for five members of the Arizona Patriots charged with planning to rob an armored car and set up a whites-only survival training compound.

The five pleaded innocent to charges Wednesday before U.S. Magistrate Michael Mignella. Mignella said the conspiracy and solicitation to commit a crime of violence are Jack M. Oliphant, Patrick H. Schlecht, Daniel T. Arthur and Monte D. Ross. Charged with possession of a homemade mortar was Foster Hoover, 46.

Hoover refused to be represented by a lawyer who is a member of the state bar, saying it would violate his religious convictions.

Mignella set a Feb. 10 trial before U.S. District Judge Roger Strand for the first four, and set a trial on the same date before U.S. District Judge Paul Rosenblatt for Hoover.

The five are charged in an alleged plot to rob an armored car carrying cash from a casino in Laughlin, Nev. The group also was tied by FBI agents to planned bombings of Phoenix synagogues and an Internal Revenue Service building in Ogden, Utah.

FBI affidavits said the group planned to use the money from the heist to establish a survival training compound for whites only.

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Racism can flourish in any community

New York City is a long way from Idaho but the recent attack on three black men in a white neighborhood should remind Idahoans that racism is more than rhetoric.

Racism is violence and hate that strains and rips at the fabric of society. It is and always has been a threat to democracy and the ideals of the Constitution.

And in a sense, there really isn't much difference between a group of Idahoans burning a cross in a bean field and a white gang in New York City beating on three black men.

The gang in the Jerome bean field, or the gang at Hayden Lake, carry the same lynch-mob mentality as the gang in Queens. They all believe in superiority and separatism and the denial of others' civil rights based on race or religion.

Some may be quick to point out the differences between the bean field and the streets of New York. After all, the cross-burning didn't hurt or kill anyone. Nobody was verbally or physically abused, nobody's rights were violated.

But in New York, three blacks found themselves stranded in a white neighborhood after their car broke down. The men were beaten by teen-agers shouting racial epithets. One man was killed when he was struck by a car while fleeing the white gang.

What made those young whites think it was acceptable to attack blacks? Perhaps it was racist rhetoric from their parents and peers and the community's acceptance of racial hatred as proper, even admirable behavior.

It doesn't take much for that rhetoric, for that belief system, to blossom into a disgusting act of violence.

Here in Idaho and the Magic Valley we have those who preach the doctrine of racial hatred — the kind of preaching that can so easily lead to violence.

Fortunately, Idahoans have not proved receptive to the Aryan Nations filthy philosophy. Their numbers remain small and their influence minimal.

But their presence is a disturbing one that cannot be ignored. Without diligence against racism, without constantly challenging the hatemongers, rhetoric by a simple few can grow into a belief system.

Things to be thankful for at Christmas

That your name isn't North or Poindexter, both of whom are getting coal in their stockings from Ron and Nancy.

That you don't work for NBC, which is requiring annual cash presents from its employees to be contributed to the political action committee of the network's choice. It's all voluntary, of course, unless you want to work elsewhere.

That subpoenas have not been issued against The Washington Post or any other news organization requiring them to reveal their sources on the Iran-contras story.

That we have not as yet invaded Nicaragua or Cuba.
That the press has not had to be banned from covering any invasions of Nicaragua or Cuba (only two armada years left until the next presidential election).

That ABC's Peter Jennings is coming on a half hour before his jumbotron at NBC and CBS, ensuring that news junkies can watch at least two network news shows without bouncing back and forth between channels.

That E. Howard Hunt's name has not yet surfaced in the Iran-contras deal.
That Hunt did not show up in a red wig at CIA director William Casey's hospital bedside.

That White House communications director Pat Buchanan may be thinking of running for president, thus inspiring a Democratic victory in 1988.

That Vice President George Bush is definitely running for president, with the same predictable results.
That Ted Kennedy apparently is not thinking of running for president in 1988.

That Sen. Fritz Hollings may be toying with the idea. At least the press will have some fun, for a change.
That I haven't received any phone calls or Christmas cards from my conservative friends since the Iran story broke. It spares me the hypocrisy of maintaining a knowing silence.

That Howard Baker may still be thinking of running for president in 1988. (Talk about your debacles.)
That we haven't seen Henry Kissinger on the

Supreme Court for a couple of months.
That the leak-pronging efforts of the Reagan administration, utilizing lie detectors, threats and fierce looks from higher-ups, seem to have failed a crucial test.

That there are other investigations under way to make up for the wishy-washy efforts of the Senate Intelligence Committee to get to the bottom of the Iran affair.

That Sen. David Durenberger of the Senate Intelligence Committee has fallen asleep yet while being interviewed on TV.
That Sam Donaldson is still covering the White House for ABC News.

That media persecution of those taking the Fifth Amendment probably never will be the same.
That the First Amendment still stands between us and the IRS.

That the White House still looks as good as it ever did at Christmas, despite everything.

Reagan doesn't want arms agreement

BOSTON — This being the holiday season and all that, we have been treated to the Washington Boys' Choir raising their voices in a joyous carol about the weakened state of the Presidency. In remarkable harmony, they are worrying that a lengthy Gippergate will lead to a presidential paralysis.

A typical soloist like New Hampshire's Sen. Warren Rudman has sung out in concern that "This whole city is focusing its collective kinetic energy on what did the President know and when did he know it." This, he and all the back-up singers say, may prevent the administration from making progress on international matters, especially arms control.

What a fine sentiment they offer, a real old chestnut roasting on an open fire. I can almost hum along with anxiety. How dreadful that the President would have his hands tied when they might better be embracing peace on earth. But there's a problem. Believe it or not, this choir depends on believing that somewhere deep in Ronald Reagan's heart, the one thing he REALLY wants is to leave a legacy of arms control.

We have heard repeatedly reports of the President's mystical inner longing for a nuclear pact with the Soviets. There is little proof of this longing beyond Reagan's Christmas-card cliches. For six years the President has rebuffed every Soviet peace initiative as "propaganda." Except for a brief moment of flakiness in Reykjavik (was he under sedation when they explained arms control to him?), his administration hasn't made any progress in this field. We've seen no zero, zip, arms-control agreement.

By now the public belief that deep down Reagan wants nuclear arms control is like the belief of a repeatedly battered wife that deep

down her husband is a good man. Maybe so, but there comes a point when it's safer to judge people on their behavior.

Now consider what has happened in the allegedly "paralyzed" post-Gippergate days. On the day after Thanksgiving, before the turkey's wishbone had dried out enough to break, the administration blatantly and unapologetically snapped the one arms-control treaty in effect: Salt II.

Then on Dec. 13, the government set off the 24th underground nuclear test since August, 1985, the 40th anniversary of Hiroshima, when the Soviets began their unilateral moratorium. The Soviets have extended the moratorium again and again and our only answer was another loud boom.

Days later, Sen. Gary Hart brought back a hopeful pre-Christmas report of his Dec. 15 meeting with Gorbachev. The Soviet leader, Hart told the administration, still wants a nuclear-arms pact. What did the State Department say? "Bah, Humba" or, to be specific: "Propaganda."

None of this sounds like a Reagan who is yearning to get his presidential will in order so as to leave the people peace. If only the legal beagles weren't weakening the presidency? Baloney! It seems to me the only hope for progress in nuclear-arms control in the next two years may

come if the "evil empiricists" ARE weakened and the Congress emboldened.
Go back to nuclear testing for a minute. The Soviets finally warn they will begin testing again in 1987 if we set off our next scheduled bomb in late January. Every President since Eisenhower has been in favor of a mutual test ban. Test bans are universally regarded as the first step to ending the nuclear-arms race. The American people overwhelmingly support them. We now have the capacity to verify underground testing and know if anyone cheats. Nevertheless the Reaganites continue to insist that we give away this chance.

Last summer, led by Les Aspin (hardly a dore in these matters), the House voted 234-155 to halt funding for tests as long as the Soviets kept to their moratorium. The bill was a victim of the pre-Reykjavik atmosphere. No one wanted to handcuff the President. Instead, he came home unweakened.

Ignore the yearning of the American people for reducing the nuclear-arms race? Pass up the chance for a test ban?

Now they tell me to worry about the evils, the pitfalls, the terrors, the pathos, of a paralyzed presidency. Have you noticed how often the Washington Boys' Choir is off tune?

Voyager flight demonstrates the strength of human spirit.

SHOSHONE — The whole history of human flight can be contained in one lifetime. In just over eighty years aviation has gone from balsa wood and canvas kite-like flyers to space exploration and the space shuttle.

The privately designed, privately funded air craft set a record for circling the earth, non-stop, without refueling, and demonstrated that American ingenuity, and free enterprise are alive and well.

Like the Wright Flyer at Kitty Hawk Dec. 17, 1903, the Voyager and the endurance record its pilots now hold, was the dream of a pair of brothers. The dream was brought to reality through hard work, private funds,

ladders Tuesday, following the nine-day odyssey.
Flying at less than 150 miles per hour at altitudes of less than 20,000 feet, with no trills or pressurized cabin is not too unusual. But going around the world, in a graphite and fiberglass, composite aircraft on one (fill-up) is spectacular.

The Rutan brothers hope their fuel efficient design and the construction material which is stronger than steel but lighter than aluminum, will revolutionize aircraft of the future.

There are several pilots in the Magic Valley area who are familiar with the work and aircraft building techniques of the Rutan brothers, among them my husband, Henry Buckway in Shoshone, Art and Bonnie Lazzarini in Halley and Bob Gillespie in Twin Falls, who are all building and flying experimental air craft designed by the Rutans.

We became interested in Rutan's 'Vari-EZ' and 'Long-EZ' designs, about the time the Voyager plan began to take shape.

Flying a plane of this design is described by some as "flying bars" because the prop is in the back with a small "canard" wing on the nose.

My husband liked the design because it is an effective flying machine, fuel efficient and inexpensive. For less than the cost of a new, full size, four-wheel drive truck, we will have a passenger sport aviation aircraft, that gets about 28 miles to the gallon.

The Air Force cooperated in this week's effort by letting the Rutan team use the Edwards AFB landing area and even allowed several thousand spectators to go on base

and witness the historic landing.
Americans should note with pride no \$200 hammers or cost over-run contracts were involved in the effort. Fuel efficiency and cost effectiveness is possible as demonstrated by the Voyager flight.

Fuel efficiency, design strengths, new building materials, endurance records are all touted as the reasons for the mission.

But when I watched Dick grab his cowboy hat and climb out of the funny little 'flying fuel tank' followed closely by the diminutive Eugene, who had just spent nine days strapped together in a phone-booth sized cabin, I was impressed with the strength of human spirit demonstrated by the flight.

East Coast storm kills two; makes holiday travel tough

A rain-laden storm that rolled up the East Coast on Christmas Eve drowned two people in Virginia and left a layer of ice that sent Christmas Day travelers sliding into ditches in New England.

Ski area operators in New Hampshire, where mountains are covered with as much as 60 inches of snow, said the season so far is their best ever, but several resorts at one California skiers' mecca didn't have enough snow to open for Christmas for the first time in a decade.

Snow fell over eastern Idaho, with snowshowers scattered over central Illinois, and an inch of snow fell in 6 hours atop Mount Washington's frigid Mount Service, said. But elsewhere Christmas was not white.

"Christmas without snow is devastating," said Ray Windsor, city manager of Mammoth Lakes, Calif., a resort town high in the Sierra Nevada 300 miles north of Los Angeles.

The Eastern storm, caused by two warm low-pressure systems moving along the East Coast and the Appalachian mountains, flooded numerous low-lying areas in Virginia.

Richmond got 2.65 inches of rain overnight and Michael Gillen of the weather service said that was the city's heaviest-rainfall since July 23.

In Clark County, two people were killed when high waters from a pickup truck 200 yards down Opequon Creek. In Fairfax County, a man was missing after his car went off a private bridge; the car was later found submerged.

Baltimore got 2.49 inches of rain and city fire officials got more than 100 calls from people asking for help in pumping water out of their basements, said Capt. Patrick Flynn.

If temperatures had been lower, the region would have had about 25 inches of snow, said Donald Marler, a weather service spokesman.

Farther north, the rain froze and cars spun off roads in central and southern Maine and northern New Hampshire.

A state police dispatcher in Augusta, Maine, said some members of state road-sanding crews were unable to get to work early Thursday because the roads were so slick.

Contras complete military training

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The first group of Nicaraguan rebel fighters graduated from a six-week U.S. military training course approved by Congress as part of a \$100 million aid package, a rebel leader says.

Adolfo Calero, civilian leader of the Nicaraguan Democratic Force, also said Tuesday that the rebels, known as Contras, have begun receiving military supplies and light weapons.

"The U.S. military aid opens a new stage of this war," said Calero, who compared the training to a "master's degree" in guerrilla warfare. Some of the combatants should be fighting in Nicaragua in early January, he said.

The weaponry provided includes mortars, grenade launchers and shoulder-fired SAM-7 ground-to-air missiles, Calero said in an interview published Wednesday by the Los Angeles Times.

Last Friday, 127 combatants graduated from three courses, Calero said. He refused to disclose

Rebel radio readies to hit the airwaves

LOS ANGELES (AP) — The war waged by Contras against Nicaragua's Sandinista government will take a new turn when rebel radio goes on the air next month, the Los Angeles Times said Thursday.

Radio Liberation, "the voice of those who have no voice," will broadcast anti-Sandinista songs, soap operas, editorials and commentary within Nicaragua from 6 p.m. to 6 a.m.

"I think the radio is as important as the (insurgent) army," rebel spokesman Leonardo Somarriva told

the Times. "It is the tool we use to get to the people's minds."

Radio is the most popular medium in low income countries such as Nicaragua and El Salvador, where television is expensive and illiteracy is high. With the station, Contra leaders hope to increase name recognition of their leaders who are little known inside the Central American country.

The Times reported, State Department and CIA officials have advised the rebels on use of the radio as an important propaganda tool.

the training location, but the Times said the Contras reportedly have been instructed by U.S. Special Forces, or Green Berets, at Eglin Air Force Base in Valparaiso, Fla.

The insurgents are fighting to oust the leftist Sandinistas, who came to power in 1979 after leading an insur-

rection that brought down President Anastasio Somoza.

"There's no excuse for us now not to show military advances," said Frank Arana, a rebel spokesman.

"We have never had the resources and supplies we will have now. The ball is in our court."

The fighters sent for instruction already had two to five years' experience in the field and included nine of his approximately 28 commanders, Calero said.

NRC: No safety problems at Seabrook nuclear plant

CONCORD, N.H. (AP) — Allegations of shoddy workmanship and drug and alcohol abuse jeopardizing no nuclear-safety significant issues safety at the Seabrook nuclear power plant either were remedied or unassisted, a federal report said Wednesday.

But a congressman condemned the Nuclear Regulatory Commission's report, saying its findings made the agency appear to swallow plant management's story "hook, line and sinker."

The report followed an NRC investigation into charges by the Massachusetts-based Employees Legal Project of drug or alcohol abuse among some construction workers at the \$5 billion plant, which is completed but not operating. The whistleblowers' group submitted a list of 61 possible safety problems.

"None of the allegations were determined to present a nuclear safety concern," the NRC said.

"Most of the substantiated issues were previously identified and do not

represent equipment deficiencies. Within the scope of this inspection, no nuclear-safety significant issues or violations were identified."

The chairman of the House subcommittee on energy conservation and power, which is conducting its own investigation into similar charges, responded angrily to the report, saying its findings made the NRC report.

"The NRC's release of this report on Christmas Eve, without informing the subcommittee, reflects either a complete breakdown of the NRC's managerial capability or a deliberate attempt to manipulate the news by limiting the possibility of comment," Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., said in a statement.

He added, "the NRC appears to have bought the management's side of the story hook, line and sinker. The ongoing subcommittee investigation shows a markedly different picture."

Phillip Greenberg, a subcommittee staffer who relayed Markey's statement, declined to give specifics of what the panel has found. He said its report should be ready within a month.

Santa volunteer accidentally shot

SANTA FE, N.M. (AP) — A volunteer playing Santa Claus was accidentally shot on Christmas Eve at the state penitentiary, where he was distributing gifts to inmates, the warden said.

James Stevenson, 53, of Santa Fe was shot by a deputy sheriff as he was leaving the maximum-security Penitentiary of New Mexico, said warden George Sullivan.

Stevenson was taken to St. Vincent Hospital, where he was treated for a gunshot wound in his left thigh and was listed in good condition.

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Health care needs for elderly to increase in 21st century

CHICAGO (AP) — Health-care needs for the nation's elderly will rise dramatically at the dawn of the 21st century as the millions of Americans born in the baby boom era enter their twilight years, a financial analyst says.

By the year 2000, U.S. society will be about 50 years into "digesting" the 78 million people born during the years after World War II, says Jeff C. Goldsmith, a senior adviser with Ernst & Whinney accountants in Chicago.

Consequently, society will face tremendous pressure to spend more money for both hospital and long-term care for a generation becoming "caught up in the coils of degenerative illness," Goldsmith wrote in Friday's Journal of the American Medical Association.

"The percentage of the U.S. population older than 65 years will climb moderately from 11.3 percent to 13.1 percent between 1980 and 2000, but by 2030 will exceed 21 percent,"

He said competition among physicians will sharpen and government and private insurers will try harder

to control costs. But rationing is not, said. "We've got two generations to inevitable nor is private medical practice doomed, he said."

"I think part of the solution is for those who provide health care services — physicians and care givers — to realize chronic illness is different than acute illness," Goldsmith said in a telephone interview Wednesday.

He said society is organized and financed to treat medical emergencies, even though chronic illnesses account for 80 percent of all deaths and 90 percent of all disabilities.

"If you have a heart attack, a helicopter will land in your yard and spirit you away," he said. "If you have Alzheimer's... you will gradually go broke." Alzheimer's disease is a gradual deterioration of the brain. The answer, he said, is for society to devise methods to insure for chronic illness, probably through private insurance companies rather than through Medicare because of the high costs involved.

"We're going to have a very serious problem (paying for health care for the elderly), and I hope we can fix it before we get to it," he

said. "We've got two generations to inevitable nor is private medical practice doomed, he said."

In his article, Goldsmith predicted treatment advances will probably halve the nation's hospital population by the early part of the next century. He said U.S. inpatient hospital use per person peaked in 1975 and since has declined about 25 percent.

Government and private insurers will exert increasing pressure to limit costs, Goldsmith said, noting that the government has already instituted a system of setting limits on the amount of hospital costs it will pay for Medicare patients, depending on their diagnoses.

Insurance companies will rely more heavily on their recent discovery of "a gold mine of information of health care use buried in the trail of claims that they pay," Goldsmith said.

He said their data will allow them to track an illness, its cost and the outcome of treatment, permitting insurance companies a more scientific way of influencing how health care is delivered.

Power failure hits AP news satellite

NEW YORK (AP) — A power failure at Western Union's satellite uplink interrupted distribution of The Associated Press' news and stock report for more than two hours Wednesday evening.

The satellite station at Glenwood, N.J., where the AP report is transmitted to the Westar III satellite, was hit by the failure shortly before 7 p.m. on Christmas Eve.

A main circuit breaker at the Western Union station opened, causing a loss of power inside the station, and a backup generator also failed.

Western Union engineers restored the uplink at about 9:20 p.m. Western Union said it was trying to determine the cause of the power problem.

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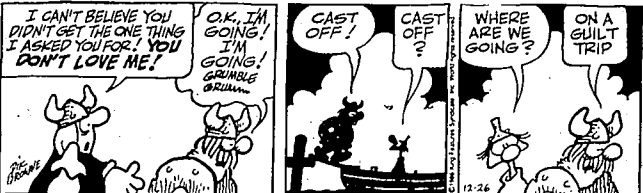

Consumer group rips agency's failure to enforce car recalls

WASHINGTON (AP) — A consumer group accused the Transportation Department on Thursday of failing to pursue auto recall cases, saying nearly half of all safety recalls requested during the last five years have been ignored by the automakers.

The Center for Auto Safety said an examination of government recall cases showed the department requested 55 recalls, excluding cases involving motorhomes, since 1981, but that the manufacturers complied fully to the request only 28 times.

The private consumer and auto safety group, founded by Ralph Nader in 1970, called the government's record in getting car manufacturers to repair alleged safety defects voluntarily "an abysmal failure," especially in cases that have involved large numbers of cars.

Dan Howell, who conducted the group's recent study, said the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration "has repeatedly backed down" when the manufacturers refuse to go along with agency recommendations that a recall is

warranted.

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration rarely has ordered a recall, although it is seeking the recall of 1.1 million 1980 General Motors X-body cars as well as \$4 million in penalties in a long court battle that is drawing toward a conclusion. The issue involves incidents in which brakes have locked on some 1980 GM "X-body" cars.

Earlier this week, NHTSA recommended a recall of nearly 230,000 Audi 5000 cars because of at least 400 accidents in which the cars suddenly accelerated. Audi officials are con-

sidering whether to comply with the non-mandatory request.

Because of the Christmas holidays, NHTSA officials involved in recall cases could not be reached for comment on the Center for Auto Safety's allegations or confirm the private group's figures.

The agency's managing director, Howard Smolkin, said no one was available to provide recall figures and that the agency would not comment on the subject until the consumer group's figures are examined. "We'd want to look at how they've boxed the numbers," he

said. The Center for Auto Safety often has been critical of the Transportation Department's enforcement of auto-safety regulations and its investigation of allegations of auto safety defects.

"One out of five cars sold in the past eight years have been subject to at least one (government) recall request that went unheeded by the manufacturer," Howell said in a news release.

Howell complained in an interview that NHTSA in the Reagan administration has relied almost ex-

clusively on voluntary action by the automakers on recall cases. "When the companies refuse, they back down by dropping or shelving its investigation," Howell said.

Of the 55 recall requests sent to manufacturers since 1981, 27 resulted in the manufacturer failing to fully comply, Howell said. He acknowledged that in seven of the cases the manufacturer responded with partial compliance, but he claimed those actions fell short of what NHTSA had sought in requesting a recall.

The allegedly ignored recall requests cited by the Center for Auto Safety included cases involving rear-brake locking complaints in 2.5 million General Motors "A-body" cars; loss of power brakes in 1980 GM "X-body" cars; loss of steering GM "X-body" cars; loss of steering major incoming flows from many and Pontiac T1000 cars; stalling in 1978-82 Chrysler "K-cars"

Experts puzzled by changing U.S. migration pattern

WASHINGTON (AP) — The flow of Americans to the Sun Belt has reached a turning point, with population experts puzzling over what the future will bring as patterns of movement to Florida, Texas and California undergo major changes.

The three big Sun Belt states continue to grow as they attract movers from the chilly Northeast and Midwest, but the longstanding patterns of movement among states in the South and West have disintegrated, report population experts Alvin J. Sanders and Larry Long.

"We are at a turning point in U.S. migration. But the migration patterns of the past have not yet been replaced by any clear new pattern," they report in the January issue of

American Demographics magazine.

"We cannot tell whether a long period of equilibrium between the states in the South and West has just begun, or whether historic migration patterns are about to reverse," say Long and Sanders.

Long is a population researcher at the Census Bureau, while Sanders is an economist at the Tennessee Valley Authority. American Demographics, published by Dow Jones & Co., specializes in population issues.

The researchers note that Texas, which gained heavily in population as the oil-based economy boomed in recent years, has begun losing people to other states.

Often when a state experiences a sharp gain there is a subsequent flow

to nearby states, they note, a phenomenon now occurring in Texas. The Northeast, Midwest and Southeast all contributed to Texas' growth.

"But times change," Long and Sanders observe, and "the Southeast has become a recipient of outmigration from Texas." Between 1984 and 1985 Texas lost people to Florida, Tennessee, Georgia, Alabama, North Carolina and Virginia, they found in a study of Census and Internal Revenue Service records.

"The widely publicized Michigan-to-Texas migration flow of recent years had diminished as economic problems befall the Lone Star State, they say, and "it's likely the number of people leaving Texas for Michigan now surpasses the number going the

other way."

Two other traditional patterns — flows of migrants from the Southwest to Florida and California, have also halted, the researchers said.

California has been steadily gaining migrants from the South, East and Midwest and exporting people to neighboring western states in recent years, the study showed.

But between 1984 and 1985 the pattern changed, with Oregon and Washington beginning to export to California while the state was sending people only to Nevada, Arizona, Florida and Virginia.

The losses to Florida were a first for California, the study noted.

"Florida is the migration sweepstakes winner," the study

said, importing both Texans and Californians, as well as receiving or major incoming flows from many and other states.

"In the later 1970s, Florida had lost people to both Texas and California, as well as spilling movers into a half-dozen neighboring southern states. Now that has changed, with Florida losing people only to Georgia and South Carolina.

This shift, reversing patterns that have existed for many years, may represent new retirement patterns or may be a temporary economic response by younger people, the researchers say.

At any rate they say the future of migration patterns poses a major question.

Camera Bug: High schooler enjoying life with a lense

TWIN FALLS — Give a kid a camera for Christmas and there's nothing what might happen.

Four years ago, Doug Chambers' parents put a camera under the Christmas tree. Since then, photography has played a major part in the Twin Falls High School senior's life.

"We just thought it would be a hobby. We were surprised that he has gotten involved as much as he has," says Denise Chambers, Doug's mother.

As a junior, Chambers was photography editor of the Bruin Yearbook. This year Chambers switched staffs to become photography editor of the Bruin News.

His interest in photography has paid off. At an Idaho Journalism Adviser's Association conference in Sun Valley this past fall, Chambers entered six pictures in the photography competition. Out of a field of 103 entries, he received one 1st, two 2nds and three 3rds, making him one of the top three high school photographers in the state.

Chambers added another highlight later that week. One of only two high school students to get press passes, he was able to take pictures during President Ronald Reagan's visit to Twin Falls.

"It was between a photographer from the Associated Press and the NBC-News crew," he says. "It was really interesting. Besides taking pictures of the president, I got to find out how the AP photography system works."

Chambers' involvement in photography has gone farther than even his parents expected.

Although his involvement has gained him some recognition, it wasn't until his sophomore year that he really became involved in the hobby. Faced with either having to take photography or German, Chambers picked photography.

He excelled in the subject and the students watching were expecting a student-teacher fight to break out. I joined the annual staff," said Chambers.

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He became yearbook photography editor his junior year. Early on, he realized just how frustrating that position could be.

Although he didn't know what the future held in store for him when he received that camera for Christmas 4 years ago, Chambers has only one regret.

Holiday motorists find gas prices cheaper than last year

BOISE — Idaho motorists can expect to find this weekend's gasoline prices relatively unchanged from the 2-year-low prices of Thanksgiving 1986. The American Automobile Association's latest gasoline report shows that prices are an average of 35 cents a gallon lower than last year at this time.

An ISAA telephone survey of 73 full-service and self-service gas stations in Southern Idaho reported the following per-gallon averages: for full-service stations, regular — 105.8 cents, unleaded — 107.3 cents, premium unleaded — 120.7 cents, and diesel — 89.5 cents.

For self-service pumps, the prices per gallon were: regular — 83.3 cents, unleaded — 84.7 cents, premium unleaded — 90.9 cents, and diesel — 85.8 cents.

For many Southern Idaho cities, the average price of gas depends on the amount of competition in that town. In areas such as Jerome and

Twin Falls, gas stations are involved in what is called a "gas war."

"Nobody's making any money. Tough competition has lowered the prices," said George Silver, president of Jerome Gas and Oil. The average price in Jerome for both regular and unleaded is 76.9 cents.

Gas prices in Twin Falls run anywhere from 73 cents to 99 cents, which makes an average of 82 cents, according to the local AAA.

Harry Clark, a dealer at the Burley Chevron Station, said that Burley went through a similar gas war recently. Burley's average price is 85 cents. "We (Burley) were in a gas war like Jerome and Twin Falls until about 2 weeks ago. Now, the prices are back up," he said.

Ketchum area prices are some of the highest and are averaging about 95 cents a gallon for regular and unleaded. "You have to assume that stations in Ketchum aren't selling at cost. We have to pay the bills," said one Ketchum area service station operator who did not wish to be identified.

The average price for a gallon of gasoline nationally is 90.4 cents per gallon. New Jersey reported the lowest in the nation at 78.5 cents and the District of Columbia reported the highest at 98.5 cents per gallon.

Idaho's average price per gallon is 93.3 cents. The neighboring states of Montana, Utah, Wyoming, Washington, Nevada and California, all had averages similar to Idaho's. Oregon had an average per-gallon price of 84.2 cents.

Nationally, one out of every 10 Americans, or 25 million, are expected to travel over the 4-day Christmas weekend. Westerners are the highest group in the nation planning a trip for the weekend, studies show.

Because this is the first 4-day Christmas weekend in recent years, the Idaho State Police Department says that travelers may try to take longer trips by car this weekend. The ISP and AAA caution motorists to drive according to weather conditions, while paying close attention to their personal fatigue levels.

Lab tests of biological agent for pest control promising

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TWIN FALLS — The first lab results on a biological agent used to kill grasshoppers are in — and they are favorable.

Based on last summer's results in the Bruneau and Little Wood River areas, the U.S. Bureau of Land Management plans to use more *Nosema locustae* on the range next summer. "We would much rather do that than rain chemicals on the open rangeland," says Steve Ellis, BLM grasshopper control coordinator.

The wider use of *Nosema* will be in addition to a \$3 million test of it and other substances used to control grasshoppers, which is planned for southwest Idaho next summer.

Laboratory analysis of grasshoppers showed 77 percent of those collected in the 7,000-acre Bruneau area either were infected or showed signs of infection with *Nosema*, a protozoa spread on bran, a favorite food of grasshoppers.

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eventually kills the grasshopper.

In the 10,000-acre Little Wood test area, 32 percent of the grasshoppers were either infected or showed signs of infection, test results showed. The Little Wood results include three control plots where *Nosema* wasn't used. If the controls are taken out, the average would go higher but the exact figures are not available yet, said Ellis on Tuesday.

"Though the Little Wood figures are lower, they are still promising," said Ellis. He isn't sure why the results were better in Bruneau. The figures are preliminary and require further analysis, he said.

Ellis said the BLM will monitor the test sites next summer for evidence of infected grasshopper larvae. Part of the advantage of *Nosema* is that, unlike pesticides, it is supposed to be a long-term control measure affecting parent and offspring.

Although *Nosema* has established a place for itself in federal land management in Idaho, the BLM

will still use pesticides in buffer strips adjacent to cropland. The grasshoppers hatch on federally-owned rangeland and migrate into nearby farms in search of food.

Pesticides are much quicker-acting than *Nosema* and this is why farmers concerned about protecting their crops like to use them. "He doesn't want to wait 6 weeks for a hopper to die. He wants them dead now," said Ellis.

Ellis said the BLM would prefer to minimize the use of pesticides. He said they are expensive and the BLM is looking for a natural, long-acting means of grasshopper control. The use of pesticides on federal lands is a sensitive issue, particularly with environmental groups. There are fears that pesticides could enter the groundwater. However, Ellis said this has not been documented on BLM lands in Idaho.

Last summer's grasshopper program in Idaho sprayed the pesticides malathion and carbaryl on more than 600,000 acres of federal, state and private land.

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Suit claims Navajo relocates abandoned by the government

PHOENIX, Ariz. (AP) — A legal aid group has filed a multi-million-dollar suit against the federal government, claiming hundreds of Navajo Indians located off their reservation have been billed of the homes the government gave them.

The government promised to protect the Indians when it moved them off land being turned over to the Hopi Indian tribe as settlement of a century-old land dispute, the civil suit claims. Citing Congressional acts and reports from the federal Navajo and Hopi Indian Relocation Commission.

But the promises rang hollow as unsophisticated Navajos, many of whom spoke broken English at best, left their homes and families and lost their new homes in as little as six months, according to the suit filed Tuesday with the U.S. Court of Claims in Washington, D.C.

Mark Sheehan, a spokesman for the Justice Department in Washington, declined comment on the suit, and David Shaw-Serdar, a Relocation Commission spokesman said in Flagstaff that his agency could not respond to the specific allegations because it had not been asked to do so.

Arthur Davich, the lawyer who filed the suit, estimated that at least 200 and perhaps more than 600 Indian households could benefit from the suit.

"The potential claims could easily total \$18 million, he said, noting that Navajos with homes valued at \$70,000 often ended up selling them for less than half the true value."

"These people essentially were defrauded by various people up the line," he said. "Frankly, money is not the answer. You give these people money, and in a year they're going to be screwed out of it as they have been with their homes."

The commission would "take a shepherd off the reservation and drop the stick in the middle of a cliff, and they'd have no way to support themselves," Davich said. "These people were totally unprepared to live in isolated society."

One family, from isolated Tolani Lake, was given a \$73,000 house in

Flagstaff in 1981. The family agreed to sell it for \$40,000 in cash and \$32,000 in monthly installments but never received any of the installments, Davich said.

A second family sold a \$69,490 house Phoenix for \$47,000 after using it as collateral for a \$15,000 loan and finding themselves unable to meet a balloon payment, he said.

A third family, finding it difficult to adjust to life in Winslow, agreed to sell a \$66,000 house for \$5,000 in cash, \$22,300 in installments and 25 cattle, Davich said. Many of the cattle were substandard, however, and the installments stopped coming so quickly the family actually lost \$10,000 or so from the sale, he said.

"These are typical stories," Davich said. "Most are homeless and back on the reservation."

Davich, who represents the three Navajo families, asked the Court of Claims to let him represent all Navajos with similar situations as well, saying most rural Navajos are mistrustful of non-Indian law and don't even realize they can sue.

The large majority of those Navajos people who actually have homes are highly unlikely to seek redress or compensation for their losses because they are extremely unsophisticated with regard to law and financial affairs," agreed Thayer Scudder, a California Institute of Technology anthropology professor who has worked with the Navajos on relocation issues.

"Many of the people affected and who have claims in this case do not speak English or do so in a very limited fashion," he added in an affidavit. "As a result, many of these people have been victimized in their contacts with the Anglo world. It is very doubtful that they could be even expected to inquire about the legal process."

The Urban Indian Law Project and other legal offices in Arizona already represent some Navajos in individual cases against lenders or realtors, but there are too many cases to pursue individually, Davich said.

Besides, he added, the Congress

and the commission were supposed to look after the Navajos under long-standing precedents affecting all Indians as well as under specific promises made when the government decided to move Navajos off the land they had farmed for generations.

The commission promised a wide range of counseling for Navajos before and after relocation, but congressional investigators reported in 1985 that the commission's "pre-move counseling is ineffective (and its) post-move counseling program is virtually non-existent."

The commission has done somewhat better since then because it arranged deeds so that homes could not be sold or used as collateral for the first two years, but it was too late in many cases, Davich added.

Shaw-Serdar, the commission's research director, disputed some of Davich's figures but said that homes listed figures 18 months old, showed the commission as having located 460 families off reservation, with 146 of those families no longer owning their own home when the survey was done.

"It's their property to dispose of as they wish," he said, adding that the commission had been installing since mid-1982 that relocates have a job and income of at least \$10,000 a year before moving off reservation.

If families have sold their homes below cost, it may be because the market was bearish, he added, saying he could not comment on specifics of the suit because the commission had not been served with a copy yet.

The commission began work on relocation in 1979, but the suit only covers events since Dec. 23, 1980, since the statute of limitations reaches back only six years.

"We worked as fast as we could," said Davich. "We are not disputing the action of Congress to do what it did in passage of the law and relocation of people. But it was ill-advised at best, and it was a double violation of what we call the government's duty of trust to Indians."

Man gets new heart for Christmas

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP) — Daniel V. Ackler of Hillsboro got a Christmas gift one year ago that should last his lifetime — a new heart.

The 26-year-old was dying in Oregon Health Sciences University Hospital, his liver and kidneys beginning to fail because of the weakness of his severely diseased heart.

But on Christmas morning last year, a team of doctors responded by giving him a heart transplant.

"This Christmas, I can honestly say that all I care about is to be here," Ackler said, noting that he planned to spend this Christmas with his wife and family — the people he has been helping him survive his heart disease.

Reminders of last year's heart transplant fill the Hillsboro apartment where Ackler lives with his wife, Kirs. Their Christmas tree, for example, is a noble fir that stands in one corner of their small living room, and some of the presents under the tree are wrapped in paper decorated with hearts. The Ackers also have dangled dozens of silver and red heart-shaped ornaments from the tree's blue-green branches.

Acker said the first present to go under the tree this year was a gift sent by the family of Loy Pleas, the nameless heart donor. For now, he is limited to doing only volunteer work, which he does now at Evergreen Christian Center in Hillsboro.

Acker has applied for a service-connected disability from the U.S. Veterans Administration, and the claim is based on his belief that he contracted cardiomyopathy, an Arizona

Acker's heart transplant is healthy himself: He now looks like a healthy young man. His eyes are bright, his laugh is quick and his body reflects his goal of weightlifting.

"My goal is that, if I please see me on the street, they think I look normal," Acker said. "I don't feel normal yet, but I think the way I feel is my 'normal.' I think this is the way I'll feel from now on."

He explained that there are physical and emotional reasons why he sometimes doesn't feel as normal as he looks.

For one, he noted that his clothes hide physical marks such as the foot-and-a-half-long scar on his chest. Secondly, he must take 370 pills every day for each month, and those drugs cause side effects such as stomach pain, shakiness and water retention.

The drugs Acker takes to prevent his immune system from rejecting his new heart tissue also lower his resistance to infection, so he must be careful to avoid catching diseases. Despite those drugs, he has had seven rejection "episodes" in the past year.

Perhaps the strongest emotional frustration for Acker comes from his employment situation. To receive Medicaid payments, the Ackers are required to keep their income below certain limits. For now, he said he is limited to doing only volunteer work, which he does now at Evergreen Christian Center in Hillsboro.

Acker has applied for a service-connected disability from the U.S. Veterans Administration, and the claim is based on his belief that he contracted cardiomyopathy, an Arizona

flamewall of the heart muscle, while he was in the U.S. Navy boot camp in December 1982 and January 1983.

Acker was diagnosed as having cardiomyopathy in September 1983, and he said that doctors have since told him that they believe he contracted the illness through a virus. He still is waiting to hear the final decision on his disability case.

American words. But all this doesn't seem to be much of an obstacle.

"I didn't come here to be rich, I just came here to live," he said looking off to the distance.

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Freighter sinks in Atlantic; 6 crewmen killed, 5 rescued

REYKJAVIK, Iceland (AP) — A helicopter hoisted five "very lucky people" to safety but six other crewmen died after an Icelandic freighter sank Thursday in rough seas in the north Atlantic, Britain's Royal Air Force said.

Three crewmen went down with the 3,500-ton Sudurland between Iceland and Norway and three others were dead in the life raft when a Danish coast guard helicopter arrived at the scene, Royal Air Force's Kinloss base in Scotland.

The five survivors of the 11-member crew were flown to the Danish coast guard frigate Vaedderen, where the ship's doctor treated them for shock and ex-haustion. Burnett said the frigate was heading to the site of the sinking to pick up the bodies in the raft. He said it would then go to Thorsaven in the Faroe Islands.

Burnett said it wasn't known whether the three men in the raft drowned or died from hypothermia. He said the water temperature was 37 degrees Fahrenheit. "The sea conditions were very rough following four days of gale-force winds and the position that the ship sank in was as far from the land as it's possible to be in this part of the world," he said.

"So I think there are five very lucky people."

The five men were hoisted up by a winch-equipped Lynx helicopter more than 12 hours after the

Sudurland sank. Gudmundur Asgerisson, president of the Nesskip Shipping Line, which owned the freighter, said the vessel was en route from Iceland to Murmansk in the Soviet Union with 19,000 barrels of herr-when it sank 290 nautical miles northeast of Iceland.

The ship had been hammered by heavy seas, hit by a big wave, and was listing badly when Capt. Sigurdur Sigurjonsson issued a Mayday call at 11:30 p.m. Wednesday. The ship sank shortly after midnight. Icelandic authorities picked up the S-O-S and rescue planes and ships were dispatched from Scotland, Denmark, Norway and the Faroe Islands.

Burnett said the first plane to reach the scene spotted flashing lights in the pre-dawn darkness. He said eight people had made it into one of the freighter's life rafts and the vessel's other raft went down with the ship.

At daybreak, a Royal Air Force Nimrod reconnaissance plane dropped another raft, rations, water, flares and radios to the men.

"The five people who were subsequently rescued transferred to the life raft which had been dropped because the one in which they abandoned the ship had a large hole," Burnett said. "It was from the life raft dropped by the Nimrod that they were picked up by the helicopter."

The Nimrod, which remained over the scene most of the day and guided the Danish helicopter to the life raft, was replaced in late afternoon by a U.S. P-3 patrol plane from the U.S. Air Force Base at Keflavik in Iceland.

The Sudurland, built in 1972 and purchased three years ago from a West German company, left the small town of Reykjavik on the east coast of Iceland on Monday. Asgerisson said he bought the freighter to replace another ship that sank.

Freed French hostage enjoys peaceful Christmas in Paris

PARIS (AP) — Aurel Cornea, the fifth French hostage freed in Lebanon in six months, returned Thursday to Paris, Christmas gifts from his captors to the French nation and a victory for Premier Jacques Chirac.

"It's true that I'm in Paris, but I don't really believe it," Cornea said after stepping from the government Mystere 20 aircraft that flew him to freedom after 9½ months in captivity.

Clean shaven, appearing tired but smiling and clearly filled with emotion, he said he felt "enormous joy" at being home.

Chirac greeted Cornea, a soundman for the Antenne-2 television station, on the tarmac at Orly airport. Philippe Rochot, who was kidnapped with Cornea and released in June, gave his Antenne-2 colleague an emotional embrace.

Cornea and Rochot were part of a four-man television crew abducted March 8 by the Revolutionary Justice Organization. Georges Hansen was freed with Rochot June 20. Lighting engineer Jean-Louis Normandin remains captive.

"We hoped to leave together,"

Cornea told reporters in the VIP lounge, where his wife, Aurora, waited in silence. Revolutionary Justice announced Tuesday that a hostage would be freed "on the occasion of Christmas."

At least four other French citizens are still held hostage in Lebanon, three of them held by the Islamic Jihad group. Like Revolutionary Justice, it is believed to be made up of Shiite Moslem zealots loyal to Iranian ruler Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini.

Six Americans are still missing in Lebanon after being kidnapped. French hostages Marcel Carton and Marcel Fontaine, both diplomats, and journalist Jean-Paul Kauffmann sent Christmas letters to their families, the Agence France-Presse news agency reported. The agency said the letters were left on a cable counter in Moslem west Beirut.

Kauffmann's wife, Joelle, spent her second Christmas in Beirut "to be close to my husband." Kauffmann was kidnapped May 22, 1985. Carton and Fontaine were kidnapped March 22, 1985. They are held by Islamic

Jihad. Camille Sontag and Marcel Coudari, kidnapped by Revolutionary Justice, were freed Nov. 11. Moments before Cornea's arrival, Chirac publicly thanked Algerian and Syrian authorities, unidentified Palestinian officials and the Lebanese government for their help in gaining Cornea's freedom. He did not mention Iran.

But Revolutionary Justice, in its statement announcing a release, said the decision was its response to Iranian, Syrian and Algerian mediation.

The premier's office said Thursday that Chirac spoke by telephone with Syrian President Hafez Assad following Cornea's release. It provided no details of their conversation.

Cornea, 55, was released Wednesday at the Beirutage Hotel in West Beirut. "Yesterday at 5:30 p.m., someone took me out of the house. A half-hour later, I was free," he said.

He spent Wednesday night at the French ambassador's residence in East Beirut, was taken by helicopter to Cyprus Thursday morning and from there flown to Paris.

Party to students: Political variation impossible

PEKING (AP) — Pro-democracy posters were reported up at Peking's Qinghua University on Thursday, and the Communist Party warned student demonstrators there can be no deviation from the course it has set.

"Where else, but in China can you only have demonstrations in the desert and wild areas?" one of the Qinghua University posters asked. It

alluded to the ban on protests in Shanghai after tens of thousands of students stunned authorities in five days of marches for more personal freedom.

Students reported "heated discussions" with school officials Wednesday night on whether students should demonstrate. Qinghua students were among the leaders in a

rally of some 4,000 students Tuesday night as demonstrations in a half-dozen cities spread to the capital.

Up to 3,000 students in the northeastern port city of Tianjin marched to the municipal government building Wednesday night to show solidarity for their Shanghai and Peking comrades, according to reports. Details were not available.

Lawyer: Vanunu deprived of books

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Mordchai Vanunu, the nuclear technician accused of exposing Israel's atomic secrets, has been deprived of most reading material as punishment for telling reporters he was abducted in Rome, his lawyer said Thursday.

Attorney Amnon Zichrony told The Associated Press that prison authorities had ordered all books withheld from Vanunu for one month except for "the Old and New Testa-

ments, but are allowing him newspapers and his tape recorder.

He said Vanunu had instructed him to appeal to Israel's Supreme Court for return of these privileges.

Zichrony also said without elaborating that prison authorities had revoked permission for Vanunu's girlfriend to visit him from the United States.

Zichrony said Vanunu's trial will begin Sunday.

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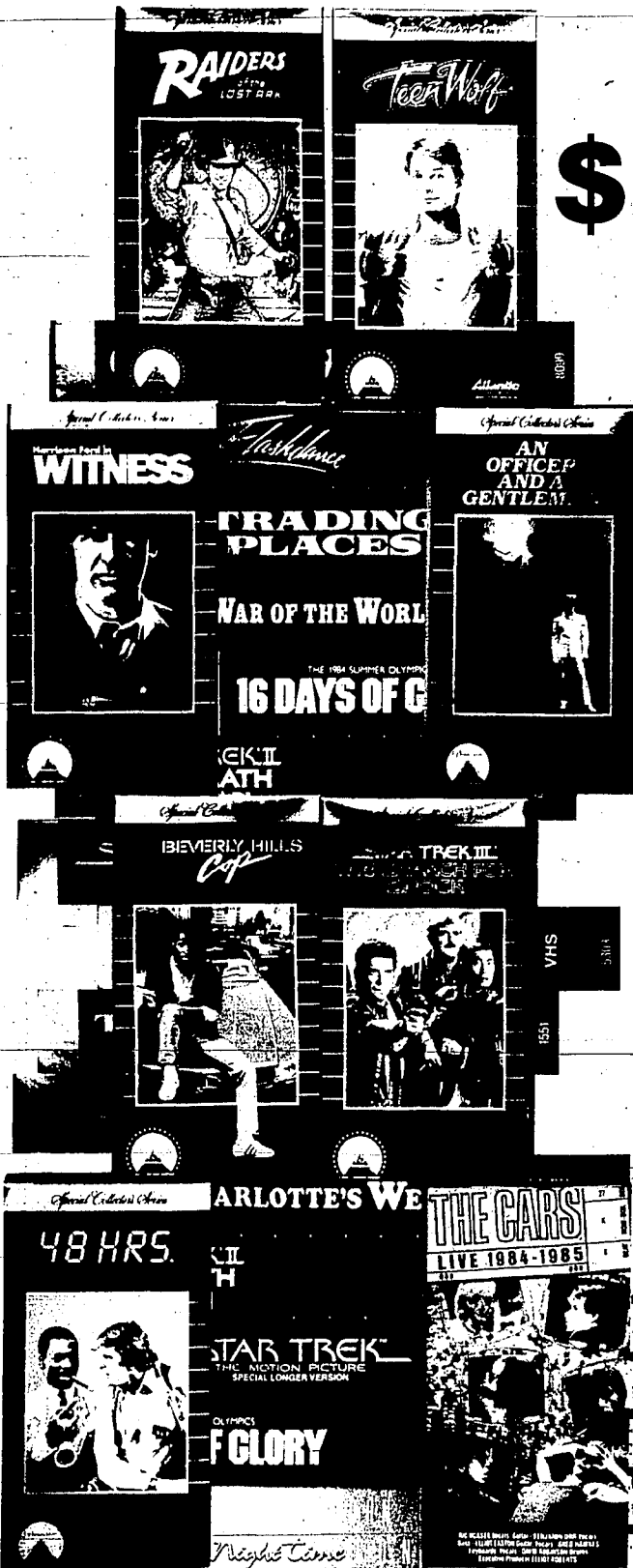
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Rescuers search for bodies

RINCON, Puerto Rico (AP) — Search teams Thursday found the bodies of six illegal aliens who drowned when their boat capsized in turbulent seas within sight of the Puerto Rican shore, raising to 13 the number of passengers known to have died.

All of the passengers on the sailboat, which sank Monday, were from the Dominican Republic, which shares the neighboring Caribbean island of Hispaniola with Haiti.

"We found six bodies today (Wednesday)," said Wilber Ayala, a government Civil Defense coordinator. Three bodies were found floating at sea near Rincon, a fishing and surfing village on this island's west coast where the accident occurred Monday night.

Ayala said three other bodies washed up on shore. "One of the three was caught in a current, taken north and found on a beach" near Aguadilla, five miles away, he said.

Officials said four bodies were found Monday night, and three Tuesday. Earlier, they had said six bodies were found Monday and Tuesday. They also had announced earlier that five bodies had washed ashore Wednesday instead of the three they later reported.

Ayala said officials assumed more bodies would be found, but that a strong current may have carried them toward Descecho Island, 25 miles west of Rincon.

A police helicopter, two police patrol boats and two private launch-

es stopped an all-day search at 5 p.m. EST Wednesday.

Another 20 to 30 civil defense volunteers searched beaches or watched from mountain ridges with binoculars, Ayala said. He said the search would continue early on Christmas Day.

Marisel Ruiz of Puerto Rico's police department said one more of the boat's passengers was also arrested at Aguadilla, to bring to nine the number of passengers who had been detained by authorities.

Police said three survivors were hospitalized and six would be returned to the Dominican Republic late Wednesday, leaving between 18 and 28 unaccounted for. They were either lost at sea or safe on U.S. soil.

Libyan diplomat killed in Lebanon

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Am-bassadors raked a Libyan Embassy car in the Bekaa Valley with sub-machine gun fire Thursday, killing a Libyan diplomat based in Syria, Lebanese police reported.

Police identified the slain envoy as Mosbah Mohammed Gharibi, financial attache of the Libyan Embassy in Damascus.

Another Libyan diplomat traveling in the car escaped injury in the ambush at the town of Taaanayel, police said. They identified the survivor as Mohammed Abu Bakr Dahmani and said they did not know his position at the embassy.

Taaanayel is about 25 miles east of

Beirut, the Lebanese capital, and 12 miles from the Syrian border. The town is controlled by the Syrian army, which has an estimated 25,000 troops stationed in northern and eastern Lebanon under 1976 peacekeeping mandate from the Arab League.

Police said the identity of the assassins could not be established.

They fired from a car that chased the Libyan Embassy limousine and raced away after the attack, police added.

Taaanayel's population is predominantly Christian. But the Bekaa region has a majority of Shiite Muslims who are at odds with Libyan leader Col. Moammar Gadhafi.

Poles watch Pope's midnight Mass

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Millions of Poles enjoyed what one described as "a great Christmas gift" watching Pope John Paul II's midnight Mass broadcast on Polish television for the first time.

Many people in this devoutly Roman Catholic country chose to stay at home to watch the Polish-born pontiff celebrate Mass at St. Peter's Basilica instead of attending midnight Masses at their own churches.

"It was great, just great," said Maria Kraszewska, interviewed Thursday outside St. John's Cathedral in Warsaw. "I nearly cried. We were all surprised that the (the authorities) decided to do it."

The decision to broadcast the Mass live fulfilled a long-standing request of the Polish church, which has demanded that the officially atheist Communist authorities allow religious observances to be shown on government-controlled television. It was seen as a sign of improving relations between the communist government and Catholic church.

"It was a great Christmas gift for Polish TV viewers," said a young

woman who identified herself only as Malgorzata, commenting outside the cathedral. "It was broadcast to 40 countries, so why not Poland? After all, the pope is Polish."

Cardinal Jozef Glemp, the primate of Poland, and Gen. Wojciech Jaruzelski, the head of state, met on Monday and issued a joint invitation for the pope to visit Poland next June. John Paul visited his homeland in 1979 and 1983.

At a Christmas morning Mass at St. John's Cathedral, Glemp avoided any criticism of the government. He

said the country was awaiting the pope's visit "with hope and impatience."

Glemp said Poles were "especially sensitive" to the pope's desire for peace and, in an apparent criticism of President Reagan's Strategic Defense Initiative, added: "We understand the need for disarmament in outer space."

However, Glemp said that Poles, though "afraid" of the threat of nuclear war, are more concerned with the country's environmental problems, including dirty water and air.

Iran says its forces overrun 4 islands

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iran said Thursday its forces attacked four islands in the disputed Strait of Arab waterway, overrunning Iraqi positions and killing more than 1,500 Iraqi soldiers. Iraq said it drove off the assault.

Iran's official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Nicosia, said Iranian forces infiltrated the islands of Umm Rasas, Umm Babi, Qate and Soheil in the waterway separating the two Middle East neighbors.

Iranian amphibious forces "took control of sensitive enemy positions and achieved pre-determined objectives," it said.

Drought threatens to produce shortages

MAPUTO, Mozambique (AP) — Drought in the southern province of Gaza has threatened 260,000 people with serious food shortages and some hunger-related deaths have occurred, the daily newspaper Noticias reported Thursday.

The paper said the situation was worsened in the northern districts of the province because sporadic actions by the Mozambique National Resistance guerrillas have kept peasants moving, unable to plant crops that has fallen.

The northern districts are the most sparsely populated and arid parts of the province. The newspaper quoted Jamalidine Issuto, provincial director of the Natural Disasters Office, as saying he had reliable information of hunger-related deaths in one of those districts, Chicalualacuala.

Floods cover five provinces in Vietnam; 165 are killed

BANGKOK, Thailand (AP) — Floods inundated five provinces of central and southern Vietnam earlier this month, killing at least 165 people and injuring scores of others, the official Vietnam News Agency reported Friday.

The agency, monitored in Bangkok, said the Dec. 3-4 floods washed away hundreds of houses, schools and storeshouses and tens of thousands of acres of paddy lands and other food crops.

Substantial damage to roads, dikes and irrigation works also was reported.

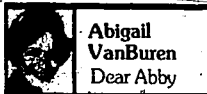

DEAR ABBY: I've read with interest your recent columns dealing with hidden dangers to children. I have another one to add to the list: escalators.

We are all aware of the danger of a dangling shoelace catching in the teeth at the base of the steps, but another hazard exists as well. It occurs when the slick sides of the escalator meet with the rubber on the sides of tennis shoes. The friction can cause a backward pull on the foot, which drags both shoe and foot into the machine. There's even a grimly accurate term for the situation: ingestion.

I learned about this hidden danger the hard way when my 4-year-old son's foot was "ingested" on a department store escalator. By the grace of God, someone on the escalator knew that there are emergency stop buttons located at the top and bottom of the escalator.

If you've never seen them, it's because they are positioned to be easily visible only if you're standing on your head.

My son was fortunate that when the fire department arrived and freed his foot, it was still intact, though bruised and blistered. There

are many other children who have not been as fortunate, losing toes and feet.

Abby, alert parents to instruct children to stand in the middle of the step while riding on escalators, and to familiarize themselves with the locations of the emergency buttons at the top and bottom of the stairs.

It could mean the difference between a terrifying experience that just ruins your day and a pair of shoes, and having a crippled child.

Seminarian making history

PHILADELPHIA (AP) — Edmund John Maher — Uncle Ed for short — is steeped in history. He made it, taught it, is living it.

He made it by being the first baby born in Brooklyn many New Years' mornings ago.

He taught it in the Philadelphia school system for almost 30 years.

He's living it by being the oldest seminarian — "in living memory" — to study for the priesthood in the 115-year history of St. Charles Borromeo Seminary in Lower Merion.

Let him give you an idea.

"A few years ago, on the 20th anniversary of President Kennedy's assassination, I was sitting around the table with seven classmates having lunch. I asked if any of them could remember exactly where they were the moment they heard the president was shot.

"They just looked at me. Six said they weren't even born, and the seventh was only 2 years old. That's when it bit home."

Maher was born in the wee hours of Jan. 1, 1929. But the age gap doesn't bother him a bit. In fact, he calls his current activity a "unique experience."

"Few men get the opportunity to live their young adult life over

again," said Maher. "But here I am, acting, living, studying like someone 25, 26 years old. I see all these young faces all day. I forget who I am. It's a rude awakening, though, when I look in the mirror in the morning to shave."

"It's really quite an experience."

It's an experience for which Maher waited 30 years.

Maher was 12 when his parents and three younger sisters moved from New York to the Lawndale section of Philadelphia. After graduating from Northeast Catholic High School in 1947, he entered the priesthood for the first time. He stayed only four years.

"I didn't think I had the vocation," said Maher. "I didn't think I had a calling to the priesthood. I was out for a year or so when I realized I did."

But it was "humanly impossible" for him to return to his priestly studies.

"Family necessities, finances, necessitated I be the breadwinner," said Maher. "But I never had any doubt that someday I would return. I didn't know how God would work it out, but I knew he would. I always had the call."

Unable to answer that call immediately, Maher turned to

teaching history in junior high schools, a job that lasted almost 30 years.

He also became a volunteer director at city summer camps, a position that also lasted 30 years. In addition, he became deeply involved with various Catholic groups and organizations. "I was serving people," said Maher. "That's all I wanted to do."

Finally, in September 1983, following the deaths of his parents years earlier and after his retirement as a teacher, Maher switched from teaching history to learning theology.

"With God's help," he'll be ordained in May 1988.

But Maher's age, combined with his slight paunch and white crewcut, have led people to think he's already ordained. Some have mistaken him for a priest, a Monsignor, even a bishop. And a few times visitors thought he was the seminary's rector.

But "the guys" in the classroom know better. They know Uncle Ed when they see him.

"I have 31-nieces-and-nephews," said Maher. "When they call me at the seminary, they ask for Uncle Ed. My classmates hear that, and they call me Uncle Ed, too."

10-year-old private eye helps crime busting

KETCHIKAN, Alaska (AP) — The ad was intriguing, and so was the price.

"P.I. Private Eye Detective Agency," it said. The price: two bits.

But wild car chases will have to wait. It will be six years before the head detective's old enough to drive.

"We've had a couple of cases," says 10-year-old Jurgen Johannsen. "A friend of mine asked me to find out who dented the car. Then there's the dog that always gets lost, a little black poodle-type dog."

Customers don't have to pay until the case is solved.

Over the past four years, Johannsen and several friends have formed clubs loosely based on being detectives, he said recently.

They proved their mettle last summer when they helped police nab a neighborhood child setting fires in the woods — "That was our first big case" — but he said his agency won't compete with the police.

"We ask first. If the case is something they're into already we

won't get in their way." Johannsen said there are kids associated with his agency in Craig and in Spokane, Wash., and that, with an eye toward using computers, "We're trying to save up enough for a private phone line."

Inflation down

WASHINGTON (AP) — Americans spent \$425 billion on health care in 1985, the highest total ever, but inflation in the health care industry was at the lowest rate in 20 years, according to Internal Medicine News.

The rate of inflation in health care costs last year was 9 percent, marking the second year in a row of single-digit inflation in the industry.

The 1984 figure was 9.2 percent. Medical inflation had run at 10 percent of more every year since 1965 and had reached a peak of 15.7 percent in 1981.

The medical journal says the total spent on personal health care — excluding money spent on research and construction — in 1985 was \$371.4 billion. Spending for hospital care accounted for nearly half of the personal health care dollar.

1 in 5 Americans have disabilities

WASHINGTON (AP) — One in five American adults suffers from some type of disability, with trouble walking and lifting things the most common problems reported, a Census Bureau study disclosed Monday.

The rate of disabilities increases with age, affecting more than half of people age 65 and over, the report said. But physical limitations also hinder many younger people, limiting the work that can be performed by 12 percent of people age 16 to 64.

The findings were published in the report, "Disability, Functional Limitation and Health Insurance Coverage: 1985-86," compiled from information gathered from 26,000 households as part of the Census Bureau's examination of Americans' income and participation in government programs.

The report found that 37,304,000 Americans age 15 and over have difficulty performing one or more basic physical activities. That is 20.6 percent of all people in that age group.

And 13.5 million people, 7.5 percent, were rated as having a severe disability. The study considered difficulty in performing some activity

such as walking, lifting, hearing or reading a disability. The disability was rated as severe if the individual could not do the activity at all, or only with the help of another person.

The percentages are based on the number of people with at least one disability, although many have multiple problems.

Overall the share of people with disabilities is 20.6 percent for people over age 15, including 14.1 percent between ages 16 and 64 and 38.5 percent of those 65 and over.

The report found that women had a higher overall rate of 23.2 percent with disabilities, compared with 17.7 percent for males. That occurs largely because women outnumber men in the elderly age groups.

The overall disability rate is 20.2 percent for whites, while 24.9 percent of blacks have some disability and 19.2 percent of people of Hispanic origin are affected.

Of people age 16 to 64, about 18.2 million (12 percent) have a disability that affects their work and 8 million were prevented from working by this disability, the study found.

Difficulty in walking was the most common disability encountered.

Bosworth flunks steroid test

NORMAN, Okla. (AP) — All-America linebacker Brian Bosworth of Oklahoma, whose punk haircut, earring and outrageous comments made him a national celebrity, was barred from playing in the Orange Bowl because traces of anabolic steroids were found in his system. Two of his Oklahoma teammates, offensive guard Gary Bennett and defensive tackle David Shoemaker, both non-starters, also were declared ineligible by the National Collegiate Athletic Association for the same reason at a university spokesman said Thursday.

The three tested positive in urinalysis the NCAA ordered this year for the first time for players participating in bowl games, spokesman Mike Treps said. The findings brought to at least six the number of players barred this week from bowls because of the drug test results. Word of Oklahoma's involvement came as the third-ranked Sooners arrived in Miami where they will play Arkansas on New Year's night. The three players named by the NCAA did not accompany the team. Oklahoma Coach Barry Switzer said he knew Bosworth had taken steroids and had warned him about the new NCAA rule barring their use. "Of course I warned him," Switzer said at a Miami airport news conference. "I talked to him in January about the new rule. I knew they took

steroids to be bigger and stronger. They knew they would be tested at the bowl site. They knew what the repercussions would be. They knew that they would be ineligible," Switzer said. Bosworth's father, through a family spokesman, said his son told him he had not taken steroids since last March. "What happened was that Brian was in the university hospital earlier this month with a stomach disorder. He was dehydrated and the medication he took must have brought out the fact he had taken steroids months ago," Foster Bosworth was quoted as saying. "Brian was told that steroids can show up a year after it's taken."

The elder Bosworth said his son would go to Miami and give his side of the story. Brian was with his family in the Dallas area for Christmas. Switzer said the three players had two urine tests and turned up positive for steroids both times. The tests were made by the UCLA Medical Center. The coach said he had known two days ago that Bosworth and the others would not be allowed to play. "It's a shame for a player of that caliber to miss out on the game," Switzer said. "But the rule is the rule, and Oklahoma intends to abide by it." Switzer said his players told him it had been several months since they

took steroids, adding, "I believe the athletes." The coach said he suspected some players might have used steroids, but he was unaware of any specific use and "certainly not during the football season." "I certainly rather it be steroids than cocaine or marijuana," said Switzer. Earlier in the week, the NCAA declared Arkansas outside linebacker David Dudley ineligible for the Orange Bowl after he tested positive for steroid use. Jeff Bergel, Southern Cal's two-time All America offensive guard, will not play in the Florida Citrus Bowl on New Year's Day for the

Nobody told Jerome's Welch that 5-foot-6 is too short

JEROME — The story doesn't sound too extraordinary, despite his height, or lack thereof, short athlete uses determination to earn spot on team. But Mike Welch is not your ordinary competitor, and he's done more than simply earn a position on Jerome's boys basketball squad, which jumped to the No. 2 spot in this week's Class A-2 prep poll.

At 5-feet, 6-inches and 135 pounds Welch is leading the undefeated Tigers in scoring, with a 17-point average, and assists, with about seven per game. As a senior and second-year starter he's shooting 80 percent from the freethrow line.

One major reason for Jerome's 6-0 record is its ability to maintain pressure with fast breaks and foul court presses, striking when opponents are vulnerable. Pressure seems to be Welch's specialty. In the team's 79-59 drubbing of Mountain Home a week ago, he scored Jerome's first seven points in the night, and forced several turnovers with his intense defensive play. When he wasn't scoring, he was rebounding or making deft passes inside to Jerome's bigger men.

"He has so much basketball savvy," says Wood River Coach Dick Turner, who also watched Welch play last summer on Idaho's Basketball Congress International team which went to the national tournament in Phoenix. Welch was the squad's assistant coach. "I think his greatest asset is probably his ability to get the most out of himself and the most out of his teammates," Richey says. "Anytime you're preparing for Jerome, you're preparing for Mike Welch."

The same axiom applied during the 1986 football season. After Jerome's starting quarterback, Lon Rutherford, suffered an injury, Welch took over for a Tiger squad that was sitting at 1-2 — and led it to victory in the Class A-2 state championship game.

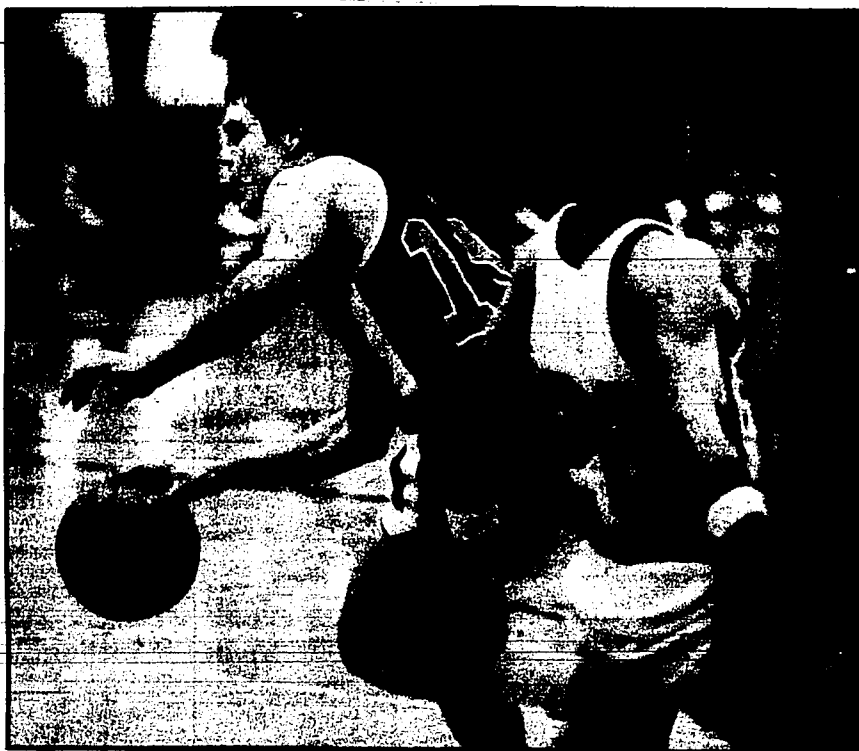
For his efforts, Welch won second team Idaho Statesman all-state honors at quarterback and an all-state honorable mention selection at linebacker. And don't look for the dumb jock stereotype; he is taking college preparatory classes and is a National Honor Society member with a 3.67 grade point average.

"To sum it up, in the 12 years I've been coaching, no player I've ever seen," says Jerome football Coach Joe Mattie. "You definitely want to have every one of your kids fit the mold of Mike Welch."

Jerome basketball Coach Ben Allen says, "He amazes me all of the time... I think he's the best ballhandler in the state — especially at full speed."

Such talk from Welch's own coaches might be a bit of over-the-top praise, but it's difficult to find any dissenting opinions. "I think he was easily one of our five best kids," says Meridian's Don Haynes of Welch's performance at the national BCI tournament, at which Haynes was the head coach of Idaho's team. "He is never intimidated by people."

Haynes says he was most impressed by Welch's competitiveness, and he adds, "The thing about Mike Welch is that he's such a good kid, a real nice kid." Flu-stricken Alabama plagues Washington, 28-6

EL PASO, Texas (AP) — Linebacker Cornelius Bennett and quarterback Mike Shula have completed their careers at Alabama. Bobby Humphrey and Coach Ray Perkins have not. All four played integral parts as flu-stricken Alabama trounced Washington 28-6 in Thursday's Sun Bowl, a record 2nd postseason triumph for the Crimson Tide.

"I was concerned before the game because seven guys were sick," Perkins said. "I'm not hoarse from yelling. I'm hoarse because I got flu-bitch. I wondered about what kind of stamina we would have."

The Taiwan flu has been prevalent in Texas recently. Among those it got was Humphrey, Alabama's sophomore tailback, who scored on runs of 64 and 3 yards and caught one of Shula's two third-period touchdown passes. His three

touchdowns tied the Sun Bowl record. Shula — whose father, Miami Dolphins Coach Don Shula, saw his son play in person for the first time as a collegian — fired a 32-yard scoring pass to Greg Richardson midway

through the third quarter and threw a 17-yarder to Humphrey with 13 seconds left in the period as the Crimson Tide pulled away from a 7-6 halftime lead.

In the first half, it was the Taiwan flu. In the second half, Alabama just flew. Shula completed 15 of 26 passes for 188 yards, while Bennett, who led Alabama with 11 tackles and pressured quarterback Chris Chandler at least as many times, was named the game's most valuable player as Washington was held without a touchdown for the first time since early last season.

"We have done a lot of things this year that no other team has done," Bennett said. "It's great to end my college career by being named MVP." "I couldn't have gotten a nicer Christmas gift," said Perkins, who

again denied rumors that he was leaving Alabama to take over the NFL's Tampa Bay Buccaneers. "I fully expect to be at Alabama for a long, long time," he said. "I haven't spoken to anybody and nobody has contacted me about another job. I don't know how I can put it plainer than that."

Washington Coach Don James, whose team committed three turnovers, two of which led to Alabama touchdowns, said: "It would have been hard enough to beat them without any mistakes. Our defense played good the first half, but our offense played poorly the whole game. I think overall it was the best defense we faced this year. Alabama had a lot to do with our poor execution."

Humphrey, who set seven Alabama records this season, including 1,471 rushing yards, and was

named a second-team All-American by The Associated Press, finished with 159 yards on 28 carries after a slow start. He was held to 18 yards on his first eight carries.

But on third-and-two from his 36 on the third play of the second quarter, Humphrey took Shula's pitchout, spun away from weak safety Tim Peoples at the 42 with a nifty move and sped the rest of the way unloathed to give Alabama a 7-0 lead.

"I was a third-and-short and everybody just blocked their man," Humphrey said. "When I got to the corner, I made him miss and I was off to the races."

Washington's Jeff Jaeger, the NCAA record-holder with 80 career field goals, connected from 31 and 34 yards later in the period for the Huskies' scoring.

After only 15 years, Fiesta Bowl upstages New Year's Day

TEMPE, Ariz. (AP) — The Fiesta Bowl began 15 years ago as a football game to showcase Arizona State University. Now, the bowl seems ready to showcase itself. Through corporate sponsorship and some shrewd business moves, the Fiesta will host and boast the national championship game Jan. 2 between top-ranked Miami and No. 2 Penn State, both 11-1.

NBC will televise the night game in prime time and speculates that 70 million people may tune in and make it the most-watched college football game in history. "We'll be College Football Town USA," said Bruce Skinner, the Fiesta's executive director. "We're the only game in town and the only game in the country on that day."

"And it's the first time in history that a national championship game will be played between the number 1

and number 2 teams in a bowl game other than the Rose, Orange, Sugar or Cotton. It's a great thing for the community and a great thing for the Fiesta Bowl."

"We've worked long and hard to get ourselves into this kind of position," said Don Meyers, chairman of the Fiesta's selection committee. "We always wanted a national championship game and now we have one."

Meyers, a 55-year-old Phoenix attorney, was one of nine community leaders who helped found the bowl on Jan. 3, 1969.

Arizona State had an 8-2 record in 1968 yet was not extended a bid to any existing bowl, sparking the ire of Sun Devils fans. The NCAA approved the Fiesta

Bowl on April 25, 1971, and Arizona State played in the inaugural game on Dec. 27 of that year, beating Florida State 45-38.

Both teams received \$167,227 — at that time, the best payoff ever for a first-year bowl. But few knew that Meyers and then-Fiesta president Jack Stewart signed personal bank notes of \$100,000 each to ensure the playoffs and keep the game alive.

Arizona State appeared in five of the first seven Fiesta games, winning four of them, including a 17-14 victory over Nebraska in 1975 to complete a 12-0 season.

Many feel that game put both Arizona State and the Fiesta into football's mainstream. It was carried on CBS, the bowl's second appearance on national television after

starting off in syndication. The Fiesta, which was played around Christmastime from 1971-75 and on Christmas Day from 1976-79, landed its first Penn State, Ohio State, in 1980. A record standing-room-only crowd of 66,738 at Sun Devil Stadium watched Penn State beat the Buckeyes 31-19 on Dec. 26.

Fiesta officials then decided to switch to a New Year's Day format in 1982, and Penn State beat Southern Cal 26-10 in the schools' first meeting since the 1923 Rose Bowl.

"Moving to January first was a big step. We became one of the 'Big Five' bowls," Skinner said. "But one of our biggest steps was our partnership with Sunkist. We always felt

Notre Dame QB Beuerlein leads Blue over Gray

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Notre Dame quarterback Steve Beuerlein came to the 49th annual Blue-Gray All-Star football game to show the pro scouts what he can do, and he believes he accomplished his goal.

Beuerlein led the Blue on four touchdown drives and threw two scores as the North downed the South 31-7 on Thursday.

"I came here to prove I can play and to increase my chances in professional football, and I think I did that," Beuerlein said. "I'm very pleased with my performance, and I think the scouts were, too."

The Blue-Gray is the first of the all-star games for college seniors. Last year, 43 of its participants were drafted by either the National Football League or the United States Football League.

"What I've done on the field is far more important than any publicity I get," he said. "The people who know

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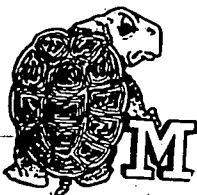

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Scaled-down Terrapin season gets late start

COLLEGE PARK, Md. — On some days Maryland's red squab beats the white one; on others, it's hard to tell the starters from the bench-warmers, despite the color of

their jerseys. Nevertheless, Maryland's basketball team has settled on something approaching a starting lineup, if only for the purpose of keeping score.

After beginning practice almost three weeks after the rest of the country did, the Terrapins have just now established a lineup that prob-

ably will take the floor when they open the season Saturday against Winthrop. It's okay if you haven't heard of Winthrop, because you probably haven't heard of many of the Terrapins, either.

They are two pure freshmen; two tense sophomores and one slightly bewildered junior, center Derrick Lewis, Maryland's only bona fide returning starter.

At guard, 6-foot-1 freshman Teyon McCoy will play point, opposite sophomore John Johnson, the second-most experienced Terrapin after starting eight games last year. At forward, 6-6 sophomore David Dickerson has promise and will be helped by 6-6 freshman swing man

Steve Hood. None of them is as inexperienced as Coach Bob Wade, who is beginning his third month on the job out of Baltimore's Dunbar High School. His swings between being liberally critical and cautiously optimistic over his shorthanded — and short — team. And he makes no promises about his starters.

"It's yes and no," Wade said of the current lineup. "Yes, because they seem to play pretty well together. No, because I don't want a set group that gets lackadaisical. But we're progressing. They're able to take my abuse, and that means progress."

In going with the current lineup, Wade is choosing speed over some

larger but still awkward reserves. The Terrapins are going to run incessantly and rely heavily on the three-point shot, which is the only way they can hope to compete with the more conventional teams they will face.

"We're just trying to get used to each other and the system," Lewis said. "The system is just getting up and down the court as fast as you possibly can."

Wade plans to use all of his players, and he said there are some characters who could enter the current lineup at any time. They include Tom Worstell, a 6-2 junior guard on sabbatical as an all-America midfielder for the lacrosse

team. There's also junior-college transfer Ivan Powell, who is built like a truck driver yet has an uncanny hand with the three-pointer, and sophomore point guard Greg Nard, whose strength is aggression.

The front-court reserves are thinner. Mark Karver, a 6-7 freshman, will be forced into use but is more of a perimeter player. The 6-11 center, freshman Andre Heyes and sophomore Phil Nevin, are underdeveloped and likely will be used sparingly.

The front court is the obvious weakness, having been decimated by the scandal that resulted from the cocaine-induced death of forward Len Bias last summer.

Yanks finally dip into free agent market for Texas Rangers' Ward

NEW YORK (AP) — Outfielder Gary Ward, a free agent who played with the Texas Rangers the past three seasons, couldn't wait to don his New York Yankees uniform after the club announced Wednesday that he had signed a multiyear contract.

At the end of a conference call with the New York media from Perris, Calif., Ward asked Harvey Greene, the Yankees' media rela-



tions director, "Is there any way I can get a uniform to work out?" Greene immediately switched him to equipment manager Nick Priore.

The exact details of Ward's contract were not disclosed, but published reports said he received a two-year deal with a base salary of at least \$500,000 and incentives that could bring his salary to \$865,000, the amount he received playing his first five years in the last season with the Rangers. His major leagues, from 1979-1983, contract also reportedly contains reportedly expressed an interest, as did Milwaukee, Detroit, Kansas City, the Chicago White Sox and Oakland. But none was willing to offer more than \$500,000 or more

fered only \$500,000 for one year to sign this fall with the Rangers, who are committed to a youth movement.

Ward filed for free agency instead, and when the Rangers refused to agree to salary arbitration, they became ineligible to sign him before May 1, presumably opening the way for other teams to make offers.

Ward has played six full seasons in the major leagues, three each with Minnesota and Texas.

This year, he hit a career-high .316 with five homers and 51 RBI for the Rangers, but he played in only 105 games. He missed time because of a serious ear operation on his daughter, the delivery of a stillborn child by his wife, the death of his father, and the final month of the season because of intestinal surgery.

"I'm looking forward to joining the Yankees," Ward said. "They have one of the strongest lineups in baseball and always seem to be one of the best teams in the American League."

The Yankees finished the 1986 season in second place in the American League East, 5½ games behind the Boston Red Sox.

Ewing heroics beat Chicago

NEW YORK (AP) — Michael Jordan of the Chicago Bulls kept the crowd in a festive mood with his holiday moves, while the New York Knicks walked away with the biggest Christmas present — a game-winning basket by Patrick Ewing.

Ewing rebounded a missed shot and hit a 10-foot jumper at the buzzer Thursday to give the Knicks an 88-85 NBA victory over the Bulls. "Patrick is a great competitor and I knew he would have a good game," Jordan said of Ewing, who had 28 points and a season-high 17 rebounds. "He had motivation to do well on national TV."

Jordan hit only 10 of 28 field-goal attempts and scored 30 points, eight under his NBA-leading average. But he kept a Madison Square Garden

crowd of 15,811 cheering with some spectacular plays, including a dunk over Ewing in the fourth quarter, when the game had 10 ties and nine lead changes.

"He dunked on me, but we won the game," Ewing said. "I'd like my teammates to think they can count on me down the stretch. If they go to me, I'll help them."

The Knicks trailed by one after Chicago's Dave Corzine completed a three-point play with six seconds left. After a timeout, Trent Tucker missed a long jump shot that bounc-

ed high off the rim to Ewing, whose shot hit the front of the rim, bounced to the back and fell through the basket as the buzzer sounded.

"I set a pick for Trent and Corzine went to Trent, leaving the lane open for me," Ewing said. "He carried us," Tucker said of Ewing. "He got us to the point where we had the opportunity to win, then he won it himself."

"When my shot came off, the big guy was right there. It was a beautiful thing to watch." The Bulls hit only 31 of 79 field-goal attempts in the game, or 39.2 percent, as they scored their fewest points this season. "It was a heartbreaker, but we didn't play well enough to win," Jordan said.

Webb gone for season

ATLANTA (AP) — The Atlanta Hawks learned Wednesday that guard Anthony "Spud" Webb will be lost to the NBA club for at least three months due to a knee injury that is worse than originally believed.

Dr. Jack Hughtson, who examined the knee at his clinic in Columbus, Ga., told team president Stan Kasten that he had found further damage.

He said Webb will be on crutches for six weeks, and another six weeks

of extensive rehabilitation will be necessary before the 5-foot-7 point guard will be ready to play.

"Jack said if it had just been the cartilage he would have been back in three weeks, but he also had damage at the connection of the femur (thigh bone) and the meniscus (cartilage) and so it is going to take longer and be more difficult for him," Kasten said.

Webb has not played since he suffered the injury Dec. 5.

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Vermeil offered Atlanta job; says he might return to NFL

ATLANTA (AP) — Former Philadelphia Eagles coach Dick Vermeil says he is "truly tempted" by the Atlanta Falcons' coaching job, and hopes to give team owners an answer by the week's end.

"In the past four years (since resigning in Philadelphia) I've turned down all kinds of chances to coach

again," Vermeil said. "This is the first one that has really made me think... the first one that's truly tempting."

The Falcons' head coaching job has been open since Monday, when Dan Henning was fired after a 7-8-1 NFL season. In a story in Thursday's editions of *The Atlanta Journal* and *The Atlanta Constitution*, Vermeil said he was contacted Monday shortly after Henning's firing.

The Rankin Smith family, he said, has made him "a fantastic offer" and asked to meet with him right away.

"They made a hell of a proposition," Vermeil said. The papers have reported that Vermeil might acquire partial ownership of the franchise if he agrees to coach the Falcons.

Vermeil said he might be tempted to jump at the chance. Falcons defensive coach Marion Campbell and several of his assistants are former allies to Vermeil. "I'm afraid that if I went to Atlanta, I could be talked into it

without a blink because I know how good that job can be, what a fantastic offer they've made.

"And as soon as I saw Marlon, Fred Bruney and Chuck Clausen, then that would be it. I'd take that job without thinking."

Vermeil, who said he was "burned out" when he resigned in 1982, has spent the years since as a commentator for football games on CBS television.

"The big thing I have to ask myself is, 'Do I want this challenge?' I've always said a coach has to be able to say that you can't live without it," he said.

New York benches O'Brien; Ryan to start at QB Sunday

HEMPSTAD, N.Y. (AP) — Mired in a five-game slump that has seen their offense produce only 61 points, the New York Jets have benched quarterback Ken O'Brien for Sunday's AFC wild-card playoff game with the Kansas City Chiefs.

Pat Ryan, who led the Jets to a victory at New England and into a 13-0 lead in another win against Denver during New York's nine-game winning streak earlier this season, will replace O'Brien.

"I felt that we needed a lift and that Pat might give us a lift this week," Coach Joe Walton said Wednesday in announcing the switch. "The biggest thing is we, as a team, need as much excitement and lift as we can get getting ready for the playoffs. We'll let Pat go in and see what he can do."

O'Brien was the NFL's leading passer through 11 games with a 107.9 rating and the Jets were 10-1, the best record in the league. He also led the NFL in passing last year.

But, in the team's five straight defeats to conclude this season, he slumped badly, throwing 12 interceptions and only two touchdowns

passes. Prior to that, O'Brien had 23 scoring passes, and only eight interceptions.

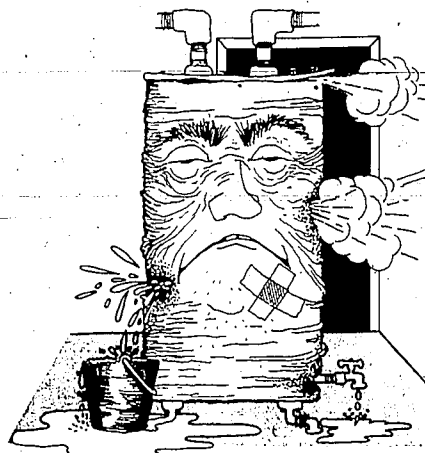

Janss exhibit highlights art center's move

KETCHUM — The Sun Valley Center for the Arts and Humanities will begin showing off its new working space and art gallery to the public Dec. 31.

The center, which recently became a member of the Sun Valley-Ketchum Gallery Association, opens with an exhibit entitled "Facing Reality," a selection of 20th century drawings and watercolors from the collection of Mr. and Mrs. William C. Janss.

The Janss exhibit, part of a private, nationally renowned art collection, will be on display at the center through Feb. 9. Center hours are Mondays through Fridays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Karen McCall, director of the community arts programs at the center, called the Janss collection "the most substantial collection of American Realism in the country." At present, the Boise Art Museum is building a new wing especially for this collection. A book about the Janss collection, "American Realism," by Harry Abrams, was published last year.

McCall explained that the show is an exhibition of realism. But "realism isn't always photorealism," she said. "It's not always sharp, like a camera takes a picture. There are other types of realism, even realism that drifts into abstraction."

She pointed to a large watercolor by Joseph Raffael, depicting several fish swimming. "The images of the

fish are juxtaposed onto the background and are not easily identifiable, but when you stand back there are definitely real images of several fish," she said.

Other works in the show will be watercolors by Charles Burchfield and Milton Avery, a charcoal drawing by Helen Torr, figure drawings by Wayne Thiebaud and Richard Diebenkorn, and a watercolor by Billy Al Bengston, a former visiting artist at the center.

Both McCall and Julie Gorton, the center's director since last April, are excited about the show, which will be the first at their new location in the Walnut Avenue Mall in Ketchum.

"This show represents a unique opportunity for us," Gorton said. "The Jansses have collected art for many years. And Mrs. Janss started the center 15 years ago, so this show is really in gratitude to them."

The Jansses, who live in Ketchum, formerly owned the Sun Valley Company.

Mrs. Janss will give a lecture, "Perceptions of Realism," Jan. 13 at 7:30 p.m. at the center.

Gorton is also excited about completing the move into the Walnut Mall.

"We're definitely going to be more visible here," she said. "The center is changing focus."

One big change, Gorton said, "is changing from a retail gallery to an exhibition gallery. Not only will we have shows to sell works of art, but we will also be able to exhibit from private collections like the Janss exhibit."

Other changes will focus on community needs. "We want to focus on things the community, as well as the tourists and surrounding communities, will support," she said.

"We have a fine national reputation but we can't waste energy on projects that command little support."

Last spring the center sold its land in Sun Valley to the Sun Valley Community School. Gorton explained that "it wasn't a desperation move, but we're in a better financial position now than we were a year ago."

"I guess you could call it (the center's new focus) a tightening of strings," she said. "But it's definitely not a step backward. We've wanted to move to a more visible

Homeless group asks for funds release

LOS ANGELES — A national coalition of homeless and hunger agencies demanded Tuesday that \$15 million in federal funds be released immediately for the poor last spring be spent immediately.

"We have no particular interest in getting the money released to us," said Robert Hayes, counsel for the National Coalition for the Homeless, a non-profit network representing the interests of more than 4,000 shelters, soup kitchens and food banks. "We just want the money released to where it can do some

good immediately. It's just not a difficult process, contrary to what the Hands Across America people seem to think."

USA for Africa executive director Martin Rogol said that most of the \$15 million would be distributed over the next two to three months. About \$600,000 in grants to relief agencies was announced last month.

Rogol said that immediate disbursement of the remaining funds would not be responsible or particularly helpful. By parceling the money out to worthy projects, the foundation could make effective use of the money, he said.

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'No Mercy:' Gere sizzles with Basinger in a vacuum

Movie reviews

NO MERCY (R). It is beautiful, it is fitfully exciting, it is empty. Sound familiar? This flashy, fish-out-of-water, love-on-the-run chase thriller is gorgeously shot by Michel Brault, and director Richard Pearce gives it flavor and pace, but it is the speed of a brakeless sports car heading into a wall. The derivative story — about a reckless Chicago cop, a fiery New Orleans hooker, and her psychotic crime car lover — has as much depth and character of two hours of Dungeons and Dragons. The dialogue plays like a camped-up parody of Oliver Stone, and Richard Gere and Kim Basinger, though they undeniably sizzle, are burning in a vacuum.

AN AMERICAN TAIL (G). The long-awaited collaboration between Steven Spielberg and Don Bluth is a major disappointment. The opulent visuals and fluid animation cannot disguise the film's lack of story. The film makers attempt to link the story of the Eastern European immigrants who came to America at the turn of the century, but reducing the pogroms of 19th-Century Russia to cats chasing mice trivializes the subject. As the voice of a rich, pushy social reformer, Madeline Kahn steals the show from the rest of the vocal cast.

CRUCIBLE DUNDEE (PG-13). The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian tourist ads) is at the heart of this movie — which he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kostelowski's inquisitive Newsway reporter in the Aussie bush, and then in the hands of Manhattan lily "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser, but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

THE GOLDEN CHILD (PG-13). High in the wind-lashed mountains of Tibet sits the Golden Child — whom many believe is the true, perfect soul humanity has long awaited, surrounded by Evil Forces: heinous killers, slaving brutes, vile demons surging up from the bowels of Hell. Will he survive? Oh, sure. And deep in your own local movie house lies "The Golden Child," which many believed would be the great new Eddie Murphy comedy we have long awaited. It is bested by even more Evil Forces: heinous scripting; slaving special effects, vile

clashes surging up from the bowels of Hollywood. Can it survive? Nope.

HEARTBREAK RIDGE (R). The material here is thin, thin, thin — has the notion of a not-ready-for-prime-time-directives combat platoon unfolding, before the Big Battle lasted this long already? — but director-producer Clint Eastwood, his trademark growl reduced to a near-inaudible purring rumble, turns in a vintage performance that occasionally tranfuses the film's anemia.

SONG OF THE SOUTH (1946) (G). Walt Disney's first attempt to combine dramatic live-action footage with animation. The antics of Br'er Rabbit, Br'er Fox and Br'er Bear, adapted from Joel Chandler Harris' "Uncle Remus" stories, are wonderfully vivid. The rather melodramatic live-action story that surrounds them shows its age. James Baskett's wonderfully sympathetic performance as Uncle Remus, almost redemptive nostalgic, '40s Hollywood valentine to the Old South.

STAR TREK IV: THE VOYAGE HOME (PG). Breathes there a non-Trekkie with hide so tough they will not find something to enjoy in this rollicking, humanistic space-opera? Perhaps, but they will be outnumbered. The reunited Enterprise — under the guidance of director Leonard Nimoy and Captain Kirk (excuse us, Admiral) James Kirk crew travel backward in time to a primitive era (our own) to rescue two humpbacked whales and thereby save Earth. There has been a conscious effort to lighten things up after the "sturm und drang" of the first three movie "Star Treks" and the result will almost certainly be the best loved of the four: full of the old crackling Enterprise crew badinage and a lot more besides. Even audience members with a terminal Spock block should be amused.

THREE AMIGOS (PG). There is hardly a moment here that is not silly — make that incredibly, outrageously and breathtakingly silly. Maybe that is why this tale of a trio of inept silent-movie stars (Chevy Chase, Steve Martin, Martin Short) turned real-life heroes is such a goofy delight. It is like a cross between a big-budget Three Stooges movie and a Hope-Crosby road picture, with dozens of old cowpoke gags thrown in to spice up the brew. Nothing is real, not even the poster-board sunsets. And it is this giddy artifice that gives this wacky Western charade a delightfully fresh spin.

'The Golden Child' top box office draw; 'Trek' climbs over 'Amigos'

HOLLYWOOD (AP) — "The Golden Child" starring Eddie Murphy kept its glow at the box office, pulling in \$7.9 million last weekend and proving it doesn't have lead feet despite unfavorable reviews.

Second place went to "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home," which moved up one spot with \$5.8 million in ticket sales. The movie, flying at warp speed, has grossed \$54.4 million in four weeks of release.

The top seven films grossed more than \$30 million last weekend, about 3 percent better than last year's leading movies.

The Enterprise crew bumped "Three Amigos!" from second to third place. The comedy, starring Chevy Chase, Steve Martin and Martin Short as silent film stars doubling as saviors of a Mexican town threatened by a bandit, earned \$3.3 million.

Debuting in fourth place was "Little Shop of Horrors," a musical remake of the Roger Corman comedy about the relationship between a mousy shopkeeper (Rick Moranis) and a man-eating plant. The film earned \$3.65 million last weekend.

Clint Eastwood's "Heartbreak Ridge" fell one spot to fifth place with earnings of \$3.5 million in its third weekend. It has grossed \$20.9 million so far.

In sixth place was the reissue of Disney's animated "Lady and the Tramp," the love story of two dogs from different sides of the tracks. The film earned \$2.8 million its first weekend, n.a.

Australian import "Crocodile Dundee" has turned a "g'day" at the box office into 13 weeks of success. The movie, which dropped one spot to seventh place with \$2.3 million in tickets last weekend, has grossed a total of \$16 million.

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Nimoy: Pointed ears were 'dangerous'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Leonard Nimoy, the world's greatest authority on Mr. Spock, likes to analyze his character.

"In a way, Spock is an extraordinarily human character," he said. "He is considered a character that is extremely human. He is born of a Vulcan father and an Earth mother, which gives him an internal complex of his rational side versus his emotional side. We all experience that."

"All the time in our lives, we all think, 'Gee, I wish I could control my emotions.' Spock is fighting that battle constantly. So in a way he is a very, very human character."

Nimoy and Spock are back for another go-round on the television series that could not die. When "Star Trek" faded from NBC on Sept. 2, 1969, everyone thought the series would soon be forgotten.

"When we were canceled at the end of the third season, I thought that was the end of that," recalled the 50-year-old actor. "I thought that after a year or two of reruns, 'Star Trek' would be history."

"But when it went into syndication in the early '70s, suddenly it

started coming back in a gigantic way. It was really remarkable. It is still remarkable to me."

"Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home" stars Nimoy, William Shatner, DeForest Kelley, James Doohan, George Takei, Walter Koenig and Nichelle Nichols, the seemingly ageless space travelers, along with a guest star, Catherine Hicks. For the second time in a row, Nimoy served as director, a role he admitted was not easy at all.

"I was surprised when I came to direct 'Star Trek III' — I found out eventually in a nice kind of way — that the cast had been a little concerned about how this was going to work," he said. "I think they were nervous that somehow I wouldn't appreciate their performances or I wouldn't appreciate their contributions. They weren't sure how I would be as a director."

"We discovered that we all had mutual interests. It was to all our best interests to enjoy the work and appreciate it and get a good film made, which we did. When it came time for me to direct 'Star Trek IV,' they were all welcoming the idea. They liked the script, and we all had a good time together."

Nimoy has been an actor—most of his life. Born to Russian-Jewish immigrants in Boston, he began appearing in community theaters as a teen-ager. He left a Boston College scholarship in drama to try his luck in California, enrolling at the famed Pasadena Playhouse. His first film role was in 1951 in "Queen for a Day."

"In 1966, when I started 'Star Trek,' I had been in films 15 years," he said. "I had been in a trimmed, salt-and-pepper beard in his non-Spock life. 'I had been teaching acting classes successfully for several years, and had plans to become a director. I was making a substantial, secure living."

"But I was the kind of actor who if you saw me on the street, you'd think, 'Didn't I meet him at a party some time?' You wouldn't necessarily associate me with any particular performance."

"I was a little nervous about going into 'Star Trek,'" Nimoy said. "I was pretty serious about the work I was doing, trying to maintain a dignified career. To put on pointed ears was a pretty dangerous thing to do." He laughed heartily.

Has the identity as Spock held

back his career as a serious actor?

"No, I don't think so. I can only judge one side of the coin, because the negative side is something I have no way of knowing. I never got a call from a producer saying, 'We have this wonderful role but we can't give it to you because you play Mr. Spock in 'Star Trek.' You don't get those phone calls, so you don't hear the downside."

"But I can say that I have never been out of work since 1966, and there are very few actors who are lucky enough to make that statement," he said. "I've had great opportunities. I've been on Broadway in plays I was excited about. I've worked on stages throughout the United States in my play about Van Gogh. I've worked in China, Europe, Canada, Australia."

"I have great fondness for the last 20 years. I'm very grateful."

... can make; a shimmering, fairy-tale vision of small-town life and the intertwined responsibilities of families and neighbors; plus a spirited jab at the soft underbelly of capitalism and the dangers of self-centered individualism.

In recent years I have met more people, here in the Pacific Northwest, who say they relate to the conflict experienced by James Stewart's character, George Bailey. Every time George is fixing to leave town, he has to rescue someone or handle some new chore or obligation. They get all dewy-eyed at the sequence in which the suicidal George is led, like an Aeneas in a wool suit, into a sulfurous underworld vision of Bedford Falls. There he gets a horrifying vision of everyone he once knew and loved as dead, impoverished or corrupted, all because his wish — that he had never been born — is conferred.

"It just sucks you in," Jeanine Basinger says of the movie's disarming qualities. Basinger, director of the Frank Capra Archives at Wesley University in Middletown, Conn., is the author of the newly published "The 'It's a Wonderful Life' Book" (Knopf; \$30; \$18.95 paperback).

Life has not always been so wonderful for "It's a Wonderful Life." After its premiere 40 Christmases ago, the film achieved a modest box-office success but then went to celluloid limbo, making recurring visits to TV this time of year.

When the film's copyright expired in 1974, no one thought to renew it. Today no one is earning royalties on it — at least on the black-and-white version.

In recent years "It's a Wonderful Life" seems to have gathered a discipleship of younger moviegoers weaned on a more emotionally detached and cerebral cinema.

More telling, perhaps, is the contrast between the film's picture of self-sacrifice and the 1980s wide-open embrace of the fast track and self-aggrandizement.

I know people in New York whose lifestyles are as different from those of the people of Bedford Falls as Reykjavik is unlike Pago Pago. In fact, the excitement and prosperity of the New York lives resembles the kind of adventure George Bailey ached to escape to. Yet they watch this movie every year out of a longing for values that they would prefer still mattered.

(In touch with further tales from the past, they also tune in each week to public radio's "A Prairie Home Companion" to hear the latest in Garrison Kellor's flights of imagination into the hearts and minds of "above average" people in a "pretty good" town.)

"I find it peculiar... that the enormous popularity of 'It's a Wonderful Life' goes against the You-Can-Have-It-All strain so strong in American culture," says William Paul, associate professor of literature and film at Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, Mass.

"This movie says quite clearly you can't have it all, that what you can have is of a limited nature, that life is a matter of compromises, and you've got to decide what you want."

Not everyone likes "It's a Wonderful Life" or applauds its popularity. New Yorker film critic Pauline Kael calls it a "humorous... lump-in-the-throat" movie and "doggerel trying to pass as art."

At a mean-spirited assessment in the December Vanity Fair, James Wolcott describes it as "bitch and overstated... the perfect film for the Reagan era, celebrating the old-fashioned values of hard work and hearth that everyone knows deep down have faded." (He also refers to the Basinger book as "the kind of film history I'd get would write once she had hung up her surfboard.")

But to charge that "It's a Wonderful Life" is reactionary and sentimental is to miss the point and to take the fabled Bedford Falls a bit too literally. No one really expects to go back to that era, to find a gingerbread village around the bend or

to pass up, as George did, the opportunity to make something different of one's life.

Perhaps the tepid reception "It's a Wonderful Life" got when it was released in 1946 had a lot to do with the way its small-town focus and cautionary attitude did not square with the heady, expansionist feeling everybody had after the war.

But two generations later, the message seems more apt. The film serves as a reminder — a Christmas-time mid-course correction — not to lose sight of what can get lost when we are tantalized by the promise of plenty. It is an allegory about the importance of

holding onto a high ideal while rapid changes occur all about us.

"In this odd way the film is a valentine to this American town that never was," Paul says. When Bedford Falls is transformed in the nightmare from a genial collection of homes and shops to a honky-tonk strip of gin and sin, it is in fact a picture of what postwar urban society would soon be, he says.

"In all of Capra's works, there's this sense of the need to keep ideals at a mythic level," Paul says. What Capra knows — and it's as pertinent for us in the 1980s — is "that you can judge a society as much by the ideals it holds as by its realities."



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Iran investigation key test of Reagan's handling of stress

WASHINGTON — "How do you think I feel when I told the American people that I didn't know about the diversion of funds from the Iranian arms-sale to the Contras and they don't believe me?" President Reagan asked Sen. Alan K. Simpson, R-Wyo., recently. "It disappoints me. It hurts."

The president's expression of distress, doubly poignant coming from one of the most buoyant chief executives in American history, illustrates a critical fact about the Iran-contra scandal: It is not only the most serious political crisis of his long career but also a severe test of the 75-year-old president's ability to handle an unusually frustrating, stressful and relentless problem.

With a barrage of congressional investigations, FBI agents swarming over his national security apparatus, an independent counsel gearing up, trusted aides taking the Fifth Amendment, public trust eroding and his ability to control the terms of national debate impaired, Reagan is beset by strains that would tax the capacities of any leader.

And, as he struggles with the Iran-contra affair, the burden is compounded by an accumulation of other factors not directly related to the crisis itself.

CIA Director William J. Casey, a longtime friend who has also been under fire in the scandal, has had to undergo surgery to remove a cancerous tumor from the brain and is at least temporarily unavailable to help.

Two other trusted confidants, former deputy chief of staff Michael K. Deaver and former political aide Lyn Nofziger, are being investigated by independent counsels on unrelated matters, a development that substantially impairs their ability to come to Reagan's aid.

Reagan himself will enter the hospital Jan. 5 for a surgical procedure the White House says is designed to relieve "discomfort" caused by an enlarged prostate.

The president's associates differ on how well he is standing up under all of this. Some profess to see evidence that the stress has taken a toll on Reagan and doubt that he understands the full import of a scandal many Republicans say has left his foreign policy advisers and threatens permanent damage to his presidency. Others close to the president say he shows little sign of strain and has begun to rebound; they predict his inherent optimism and sure political instincts will carry him through relatively unscathed.

Among the associates who express concern, some say Reagan has not faced the reality of his situation, has turned inward and has become defensive, putting much of the blame for his problems with the crisis on the press and others.

Nothing in Reagan's political life has come close to matching his current crisis, but when he was California's governor he went through two major flaps in which he exhibited behavioral patterns similar to what he is showing now.

During the first year of Reagan's governorship, 1967, he followed the advice of other staffers and fired several top aides suspected of being homosexuals. He had worked closely with those aides for some time without suspecting they were homosexual. Shocked at that revelation and dismayed over feeling compelled to fire the aides, he turned inward, cut back sharply on his public appearances and, as one observer described it, "the governorship went into recess."

Four years later, after his reelection to a second term, it was revealed that the millionaire governor, who had argued for years against payroll tax withholding on grounds that "taxes should hurt" had managed through various shelters and loopholes to escape paying any state income taxes himself for the previous year. A lot was written about the seeming hypocrisy of a governor's preaching that "taxes should hurt" while not paying any himself. Reagan became bitter at the news media and accused them of blowing the story all out of proportion.

Now, Reagan's wife, Nancy, apparently believes his attacks on the press for coverage of the Iranian arms crisis have been counterproductive. She is reported by insiders to have lectured the president, saying in effect: "Forget the press, they're just doing their job. That's a given. Think about what you're going to do now, and get on with it."

Among those who say they see no problems, Sen. Paul Laxalt, R-Nev.,

and Simpson, the Senate majority whip, say the president is irritated and frustrated over polls showing most Americans believe he is lying, but otherwise in strong form.

"He thinks this thing will turn around after the full story's out and doesn't appear to be under strain, physically or mentally," said Laxalt, who had a lengthy one-on-one lunch with the president last Tuesday shortly after reading news reports that Reagan was not doing well coping with the scandal and appeared to lack some of his usual vitality.

"He was right on top of the conversation, very spirited, and showed no signs of being lethargic or turned off or detached," said Laxalt, a friend of many years who chaired Reagan's campaigns in 1980 and 1984. "You can't stop talk or speculation, but I don't see any cause for alarm whatsoever. He's just disappointed about people not believing him."

Even some associates who were initially troubled about Reagan's

reaction to the scandal generally agree that he has recently begun to regain his equilibrium after being thrown off balance when it first surfaced.

One close adviser says the President's failure at first to "fully recognize how truly damaging" the scandal was led to some bad decisions in the first week, but that he now is more aware of the dimensions of the problem "even though he's more optimistic than I would be."

Simpson, who has been critical of the Iranian arms sale and the way the president has handled the controversy, believes the Reagan presidency has been damaged "and will never be the same." Nevertheless, he says the president "has listened with great grace to all the criticism from the Republican leadership and others" and has convinced Simpson that "when all the facts come out, he'll be OK."

Indeed, Reagan's own public opinion surveys showed him to be re-

bounding in public esteem during the last week, pollster Richard B. Wirthlin said last week. Reagan's job approval rating was at 67 percent before the scandal broke, tumbled to 50 percent as of Dec. 11 and was back on the upswing to 57 percent as of Thursday, Wirthlin said.

"Any suggestion that the president is sitting around with his head in his hands staring off into the sunset with a melancholy etched view across his brows, that's bosh," said Simpson. "He knows damn well what he did do and didn't do. His whole persona is trust and it'll come to pass that we'll know everything and he'll be all right."

However, one major problem for Reagan, associates acknowledge, is that he genuinely does not see any although some note, as one said, contradiction between his publicly that "we all slow down as we get very rapidly — but temporarily — in time with terrorists, while at the same time a regime that supports terrorism. "He's always been that way," said one veteran Reagan adviser. "He's always had a much more optimistic view than other people, even in the recession, picking out positive data and ignoring negative data. That's how he did it and didn't do. His whole persona is trust and it'll come to pass that we'll know everything and he'll be all right."

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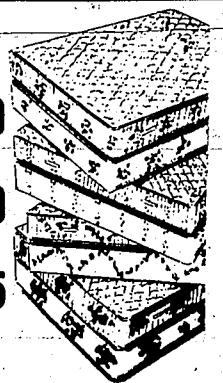
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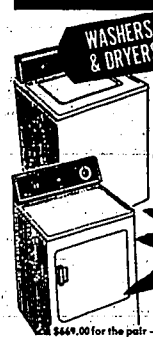
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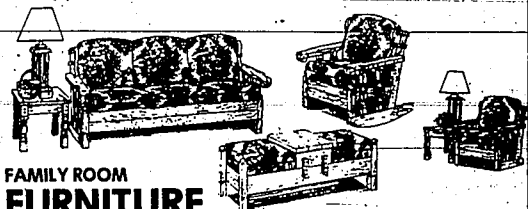


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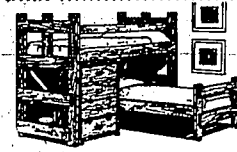
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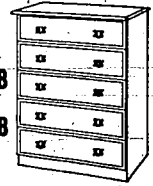
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Contra mines target civilians

WASHINGTON — Although all sides of the conflicts in El Salvador and Nicaragua have planted land mines that have killed civilians, it appears that only the U.S.-backed Nicaraguan rebels use them deliberately against non-combatants, the human-rights group Americas Watch said in a report issued earlier this week.

The group analyzed information on the use of mines by the U.S.-supported military and the antigovernment rebels in El Salvador, and the Sandinista Army and U.S.-backed antigovernment rebels in Nicaragua.

The report criticized all four groups for what it called "indiscriminate" use of mines in areas frequented by civilians. But it said that evidence gathered by its investigators indicated that only the Nicaraguan rebels, known as counter-revolutionaries or contras, "probably" used mines "deliberately against civilians."

An official of the Nicaraguan Democratic Force, the largest contra group, said that it had run out of mines two years ago. He said that documents "demonstrating that the Sandinistas carried out this (mining) campaign." He added that the contras "would be committing political suicide" if they used mines against civilians, since "they are our principal supporters."

The human-rights group quoted interviews with the survivors of several mine explosions that killed and wounded passengers in civilian vehicles in northern Nicaragua. The survivors said they believed the mines were planted by contras. The report said that in many cases, anti-tank mines were placed in the only roads leading to northern towns.

The report said the Nicaraguan army has placed mines at bridges and along the Honduran border, where the contras are based, but that the mine fields are clearly marked and fenced off or guarded by soldiers who warn civilians.

The report said there was evidence that the Nicaraguan government had placed mines in roads inside Honduras, causing deaths and injuries to civilians, including two American journalists who died when their car was blown up in 1983.

In El Salvador, the report said, most mine explosion casualties were Salvadoran soldiers killed or injured by mines placed by guerrillas on roads where the military is known to send foot patrols.

The report added, however, that many civilians have been killed or wounded by guerrilla mines, either because the mine fields were not marked or because peasants, desperate for food or firewood, took the risk of going into a mined area.

The report said that although the Salvadoran military has guidelines on the use of mines, it has also been responsible for civilian casualties.

Slashed model discusses future

NEW YORK (AP) — Marla Hanson, smiling through scars left by a razor attack that threatened her modeling career, said Sunday she is glad her former landlord was convicted of commissioning the slashing but worries about trials to come.

"It's been a really tough thing for me to go through," the 25-year-old Miss Hanson said in a news conference the day after a jury convicted Steven Roth of assault in the June 5 attack on her.

"And I have a lot of things to work out within myself, a lot of personal things," she said.

"I have a lot of deep... spiritual beliefs," Miss Hanson said, "and things that's what's pulled me through all this."

Miss Hanson said she is "relieved" Roth's trial is over, "but yet I have two more trials to go through and I'm not looking forward to it."

Steven Bowman, 27, described by Roth as his lover, and Darren Norman, 20, have been charged as the men Roth hired to carve up Miss Hanson's face. Their trials are to begin next month.

Miss Hanson received 15 facial cuts that required up to 150 stitches. She described Roth, a 28-year-old makeup artist, as "vicious."

"I think he's a dangerous person," she said. "It's scary for me and I think it should be scary for other people to have him walking around."

Roth, who has been jailed in lieu of \$250,000 bond, faces up to 15 years in prison. Sentencing is scheduled Jan. 27.

Miss Hanson testified at Roth's trial that she angered him when she told him she wanted her \$500 deposit back from an apartment she had rented from him. She said he also resented her refusal to go out with him.

"I thought it would be hard" testifying in court, she said, "but it was kind of nice to be able to look him in the eye."

Reagan distances himself further from the press

WASHINGTON — When the pilot gunned the engines of Marine One, President Reagan's helicopter, reporters got the message as they watched the president stroll out of the White House on his way to Camp David Friday.

The engine roar meant Reagan did not want to talk, for it is customary for aides to signal the pilot to still the engines when Reagan wishes to make a statement or answer questions.

Thus the president smilingly cupped his ear, as if to tell reporters that he could not hear their shouted questions. Thus, for the eighth consecutive business day, Reagan avoided an opportunity for reporters to question him about investigations into the Iran contra arms scandal.

The reason, according to administration sources, is that Reagan has been advised by White House aides to take no questions and

to remain silent on the issue except for official, prepared statements.

The president was given that advice, said administration sources, after White House counsel Peter Wallison began an internal investigation of the affair. Reagan, in his first speech on the Iran arms issue Nov. 15, and in a press conference Nov. 19, raised as many questions as he had attempted to answer.

Wallison has sought to review White House records carefully to supply the president with a chronology and report and to prepare him to answer questions in an organized way.

Nevertheless, Reagan often has found it difficult to remain silent in the face of provocative questions. On Dec. 9, when he met with a visiting head of state and was asked if he had watched a televised hearing, he replied, "Now and then, when I can't find a ballgame." Then, as reporters were leaving, the president said: "If I were taking questions, I would remind you that I am the one that told you all that we know about what happened."

Not since then have reporters been able to get close enough to Reagan to ask him a question. And he is not scheduled to be available to the press until Jan. 8 at the earliest, when he is to leave Bethesda Naval Hospital following prostate surgery.

Throughout his presidency, Reagan has been less accessible than his recent predecessors, holding an average of only six news conferences a year. But two or three times each week reporters have been able to question him briefly during what the White House calls "photo opportunities." The president often has used such events to make statements or give planned answers to questions.

But Thursday, when reporters noted at a press briefing that they had not seen Reagan at close range in several days and that so such events or photo opportunities were scheduled for the next week, deputy press secretary Albert Brashear said, "We have decided there's nothing on the schedule that we think is suitable for coverage."

On that day, in addition to meetings on

proposals to change welfare laws and to increase competitiveness of American businesses, Reagan's schedule included two events seemingly made for television. He thanked a group of Marines for a "toys for tots" project, and he received an honorary degree from Yeshiva University of Manhattan, two events that normally would be covered by several pool reporters.

Although White House has not answered questions on the Iran-contra controversy, he issued a statement Tuesday asking that congressional investigators grant limited immunity to two former aides, Vice Adm. John Poindexter, who is a former national security adviser, and Lt. Col. Oliver North, who was fired from the National Security Council staff. And others have spoken for him. First lady Nancy Reagan gave wire service interviews Wednesday in which she expressed her husband's disappointment with Poindexter and North. And on Friday, Vice President George Bush said that North and Poindexter, who have refused to testify, "should now step forward and tell us the truth."

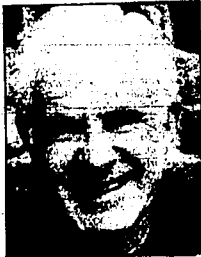
LOS ANGELES — Joe Wapner is a TV star who shuns show business, ignores ratings, works with amateurs, wings it without a script or rehearsal — yet his show is a hit.

In fact, "The People's Court" (weekdays 4:30 p. m. KMTV, 5 p. m. KIVI, 4 p. m. KUTV) is the fifth highest-rated show in syndication, thanks to Judge Joseph A. Wapner's no-nonsense approach.

Wapner says he doesn't pay attention to the ratings. "I know that when they tell me they're high, I'll be back for another year," he said. He has come back for six seasons.

No small part of the show's appeal is the real-life drama played out before the bench every day on 184 stations across the country. Every case is a real one, taken from those filed in Small Claims Courts throughout Southern California. The decisions are legally binding, and although the show pays all settlements, emotions run high.

One woman, after losing a dispute over location of a property-line wall, was still aching for vengeance. She looked at her neighbor and declared on television: "If that S.O.B. comes

near me, I'll kill him!"
Not only do millions of ordinary people watch "The Judge," but so do

such luminaries as Reggie Jackson, Dom DeLuise and U.S. Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall. Dustin Hoffman missed the ending of one show and asked for a tape. Rosemary Clooney asked for an autograph.

Johnny Carson invited him to come on "The Tonight Show" and settle a dispute between himself and David Letterman. Carson wanted to do it as a skit, but Wapner said no and conducted it like a trial. The dispute was over an old truck that Letterman kept parked by his property in Malibu. Carson said it was an eyesore and had it hauled away. When Letterman got it back, the headlights had been broken.

"I awarded Letterman \$24.95," said Wapner.

Wapner is the son of a lawyer, and his two sons are lawyers. A daughter works in child care. Mickey, his wife of 40 years, is a former dean's assistant at UCLA.

K49AZ adopts 24-hour days

Wapner spent more than 20 years on the bench in Los Angeles, first in Municipal Court and then in Superior Court. At one time he was Presiding Judge of the Los Angeles Superior Court, the largest court in the United States. He retired on Nov. 16, 1979, the day after his 60th birthday. He became judge of "The People's Court" in 1981 after auditioning for the role.

His bailiff on the show is Rusty Burrell, who retired after 33 years as a bailiff. Burrell worked on the Charles Manson case.

Every case on "The People's Court" is tried without lawyers by the rules of Small Claims Court, which has a damage limit of \$1,500. Researchers for Ralph Edwards Productions check claims filed in six Southern California counties for interesting cases.

Both the plaintiff and defendant must agree to have the case settled on the show and sign a binding arbitration agreement. People who volunteer to come on the show are turned down, however. Once a week Wapner puts on his black robe and decides 10 cases, which will probably make five to six shows.

"Everything on the show is real," said Wapner. "There's no script, no rehearsal, no retakes. Everything from beginning to end is like a real courtroom, and I personally consider each case as a trial. We tape them as we try them, although some cases may be edited for time. But the only thing cut out are repetitions.

"Sometimes I don't even deliberate. I just decide from the bench. It's so obvious. The beautiful part is that I have carte blanche."

Wapner is often amazed at the

lengths people will go to to prove a point. "I had a case of a man who brown-bagged it for lunch," he said. "He bought a beer for 75 cents, but said the beer was flat. The store owner wouldn't give him another beer or his money back. He spent \$20 to bring it to court.

"A woman bought a birthday cake for her daughter for \$9. She said it was moldy, and the baker offered to refund only \$4.50. She picketed the bakery for six hours, then filed the claim. I found against the baker for \$9."

Sometimes Judge Wapner will award more money than is sought for an injury or may add punitive damages.

Since its debut, other court shows have come on the air, including "Divorce Court" and "Superior Court," both of which re-create cases.

Wapner thinks one of the reasons for the return of "Perry Mason" is the success of "The People's Court." Raymond Burr has returned as Mason in a series of made-for-television movies that have gotten top ratings.

Wapner has become such a well-known television personality, he is frequently asked to be a guest on various shows. He turns them down. "I'm not an actor, I'm a judge," he said.

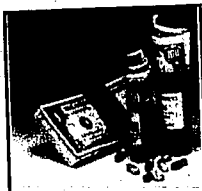

She won her Emmy for best actress in a comedy series in 1983 for her portrayal of highbrow waitress Diane Chambers, who over the years has had an off and on relationship with Sam Malone, a womanizing barkeeper and ex-jock portrayed by Ted Danson.

The role also garnered Miss Long a pair of Golden Globe awards.

There was no word on how producers would end Miss Long's five-year stint on the show.

Miss Long, a native of Fort Wayne, Ind., who lives in Los Angeles, has appeared in several films, including "The Money Pit," "Night Shift," "Irreconcilable Differences" and the soon-to-be-released "Outrageous Fortune," starring Bette Midler.

She has made guest appearances on "Family," and "The Love Boat" and appeared in several television movies, including "The Cracker Factory," "A Promise of Love" and "The Princess and the Cabbie."

'Viewpoint' skewed to the right

HOLLYWOOD — Time to separate niftly from griftly.

What did the media know? When did they know it? And when they knew it, did they know they knew, and if they did know, did they know what to do about it?

As ABC's late-night "Viewpoint" program showed Dec. 17, questions about media performance are now officially part of the Iran arms-contra story that has dominated newscasts and front pages for weeks. That is because attacking coverage of the news is a facile defense against the news.

President Reagan set the media-socking tone in a recent Newsweek interview and later passed the baton to White House Communications Director Patrick Buchanan, the administration's designated snarler.

Does the "liberal media" label stick?

It seemed to, in a sense, during "Viewpoint," one of those periodic Ted Koppel-moderated programs designed to examine the media's role.

In setting the battle lines as Media vs. Conservatives, the 90-minute program encouraged the very "liberal media" argument that its panel of reporters sought to reject.

And by giving identifiable conservative critics like muddled Reed Irvine the most latitude, "Viewpoint":

- Showed a deep insecurity.
- Seemed to endorse conservative charges that maybe some of the media have been too tough on Reagan — despite others insisting that coverage has not been tough enough — and that this program would make things right.

It was the kind of program where ABC's battling and embattled Sam Donaldson felt compelled to announce that he voted for conservative Barry Goldwater in 1964 and admired Richard Nixon's Red China initiative. Words, words. If he were a true American, why didn't he produce his passport?

The program's title was "Bashing: The Press and the Presidency."

The bashers on this night were those wild radicals Donaldson, Helen Thomas of UPI, Chris Wallace of NBC and Bill Plante of CBS; all White House press corps members and highly visible during rare televised press conferences involving Reagan or his staff.

The bashers were seated in an audience at George Washington University in Washington consisting mostly of students, some of whom got to ask questions.

Prospective questioners invited by ABC included such critics from the right as Irvine, the head of Accuracy in the Media, and such critics from the left as Jeff Cohen, the head of Fairness & Accuracy in Reporting. Somehow, though, the right had the might.

Among the non-students allowed to ask questions were Irvine, conservative columnists Lester Kinsolving and James Lofton, and the media consultant responsible for a pro-Reagan commercial combating the president's negative publicity over the Iran arms-contra scandal.

Cohen was the only identifiable representative from the left.

This might have been one the adroit Koppel's finer nights had not a double standard intervened. He kept an appropriately tight rein on most of the questioners, ordering them to "get to the point." Kinsolving and especially Irvine, though, were allowed to take as long as they wanted to get to the point.

It looked like a cave-in to the right.

One period in the middle of the program consisted of Irvine making rambling charges without asking a question. Koppel saying something wifty to get him on track, Irvine continuing to ramble, then Koppel coming back with something wifty, and so on and so on. Finally, "Viewpoint" went to a commercial, after which Irvine was allowed to complete his sermon.

"I don't want you to feel that you haven't been given adequate time or that the panel hasn't answered your question," Koppel told Irvine, whose media watchdog group publishes an outspoken newsletter accusing most of the major media of left-wing bias.

This was not Irvine's first starring appearance at a "Viewpoint." Koppel skillfully rebuts his arguments, but is otherwise deferential. Why does Irvine merit such deference?

One interpretation could be that Koppel, in being relatively sharp with Fairness & Accuracy's Cohen and yet appearing reluctant to cut off Irvine, was trying to rectify past media sins against conservatives. At least it could have been viewed that way.

Perhaps those "liberal-bias" charges are having an effect, even though in truth the right has always had greater media access than the left.

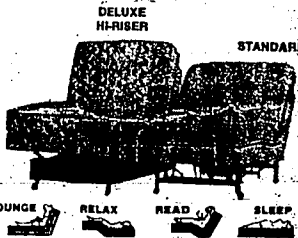

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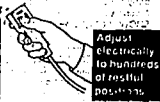


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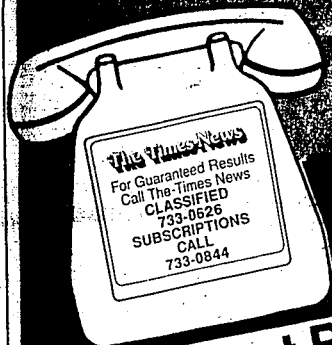
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
