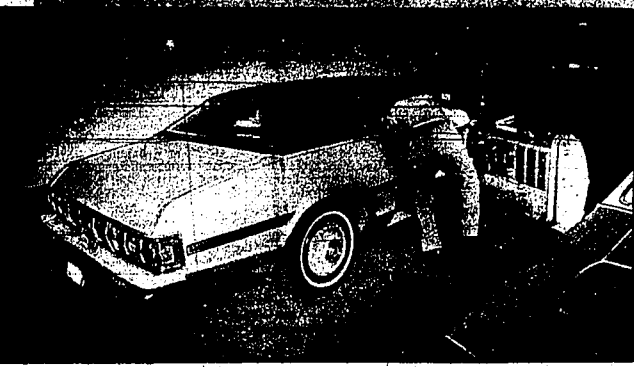

States make varied plans for windfalls

Idaho, 18 others will spend it

By WILLIAM M. WELCH The Associated Press

WASHINGTON — Officials in at least 14 states that are inadvertent beneficiaries of the new federal tax law are planning to return all or part of their windfall to taxpayers.

With state legislatures in most states preparing to meet early in the new year, an additional 18 states are planning to spend the increased revenues either on specific projects or to cover deficits.

A survey by The Associated Press of governors, legislative leaders and revenue officials in the 50 states found that the impact of the new federal tax overhaul law is an issue in many of the states. Estimates by officials in those states show federal tax changes could produce as much as \$6 billion in new revenue, barring tax changes of their own.

The increased state revenue is caused by the way most states make their income taxes conform to the federal tax structure. The new tax law, taking effect with the start of the new year, eliminates many deductions in exchange for lower rates, thus broadening the base on which the lower rates are applied. If states apply their current tax rates to that broadened base, the effect is to produce higher state tax bills and more state revenue.

What to do with the money is likely to become a campaign issue in at least one governor's race this year. In Kentucky, and dealing with the issue is causing political discomfort in some other states.

How state officials are responding to the impact is influenced by the tremendous regional differences in the economy. "Almost half the states are in serious fiscal problems,

and those states are not likely to give it all back," said Steven Gold, who watches state finances for the National Conference of State Legislatures.

Northern and Eastern states that are enjoying economic good times are making plans to turn back the money to taxpayers — states such as New York, Delaware, Maryland and Connecticut. Ohio already has cut its tax rates. Gov. Richard Celeste earlier this month signed a law heading off what would have been \$714 million in added state taxes.

Some states plan refunds; others savor budget relief

WASHINGTON — These states are considering lowering, or already have lowered, tax rates to compensate for the impact of federal tax changes. The dollar estimates are from official state sources:

PALM SPRINGS, Calif. — President Reagan, winding up his week-long vacation on New Year's day, asked to be kept informed about the tragic hotel fire in San Juan, Puerto Rico, and planned to watch football games on television, a White House statement said.

A brief statement issued by his staff in this desert resort community where Reagan has spent most of his holiday in seclusion, said, "The president and Mrs. Reagan were

deeply saddened by the loss of life in the hotel fire and extend their condolences to the friends and relatives of those who died."

"The president has asked to be kept informed, through staff channels, of information on the cause of the fire," the statement said.

Reagan was described as tending to paperwork in the privacy of the Sunnyslands estate of his old friend and publisher Walter Annenberg, and scheduled to return to the White House late Friday.

Hotel fire death tally reaches 60

SAN JUAN, Puerto Rico — Rescue workers on Thursday found 60 bodies, most of them charred beyond recognition, in their search for victims of the explosions and fire that raged through a luxury beachfront hotel.

As many as 100 people were feared killed in Wednesday's blaze at the 20-story Dupont Plaza Hotel, and Puerto Rican Governor Rafael Hernandez Colon said authorities were trying to determine if the fire was set intentionally.

Hernandez Colon said the bodies had been found in the burned-out hotel. He met with reporters as police and volunteers reported their search at 7 p.m. (8 p.m. EST). Workers planned to return to the site after daybreak Friday.

Officials previously had given a death toll of 57. Authorities said 28 bodies of the

60 corpses that had been found were taken to the Medical College, and that the majority of them would be difficult, if not impossible, to identify because they were so badly charred.

Hernandez Colon said the possibility of arson could be linked to a labor dispute between the hotel's management and a union representing about half its employees.

Other small fires had broken out at the hotel in recent days as the labor trouble dragged on. • See FIRE on Page A1

A draft milestone: First group of registrants becomes too old

WASHINGTON — Amid rising debate about the future of the all-volunteer military, the advent of 1987 has brought with it a milestone for one part of the current system — draft registration.

The Selective Service System, as of Jan. 1, cycled its first class of young men completely through the registration process. The 2.1 million men who had to register in 1980 have now turned 25 — completing their eligibility for a draft even if a call-up were ordered upon the outbreak of war.

"The window of vulnerability has passed for this group," says Lewis C. Brodsky, spokesman for the Selective Service System.

"The system has reached maturity and there are now roughly 15 million young men whose names are maintained in the registration data base."

The requirement that young men register with Selective Service upon reaching their 18th birthday was reimposed in 1980 after a hiatus that followed the shift to an all-volunteer force in 1973. Congress approved registration, even though there was no draft, in hopes of ensuring that if war ever did erupt, the drafting of

men into the service could proceed quickly.

The requirement was first imposed on men who turned 20 in 1960. And it is that group which has now surpassed the maximum legal age for any military draft.

The phase-in process was completed in 1981, so that every man who turns 18 must now register with the Selective Service within 30 days of that birthday.

While Pentagon officials, Defense Secretary Casper Weinberger and others themselves thoroughly no-draft, in hopes of ensuring that if war ever did erupt, the drafting of

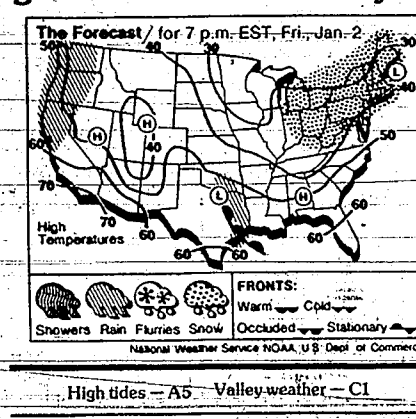

To British Columbia, export tax on wood is like losing poker game

VANCOUVER, British Columbia (AP) — To the British Columbia forest industry, Canada's agreement to impose a 25 percent export tax on softwood lumber exports to the United States is like losing a poker game.

Canada folded first without being able to see the United States' winning hand.

The agreement, reached late Tuesday, ended a bitter trade dispute that has cost the province over \$1 billion in lost lumber exports from Canada that totaled \$3 billion last year, representing about one-third of the total U.S. market.

U.S. lumber producers had claimed that fees charged by Canadian lumber mills for cutting lumber in a government-owned forest were too high to allow an unfair subsidy undercutting U.S. prices.

The Commerce Department agreed and was ready to impose a 25 percent tariff on Canadian lumber exports to the U.S. but the deal was not reached by midnight Tuesday.

However, under the 11th trade accord, Canada agreed to impose the 10 percent surcharge itself to offset the economic disadvantage to U.S. lumber producers caused by the pricing practices. The Canadian tax will be phased out as provincial governments raise their timber-cutting fees by an equivalent amount.

The tax will affect sales of lumber to the United States worth \$2.8 billion in 1988 and will increase in January.

Although the U.S. lumber industry has sought a higher offsetting tariff, it accepted the compromise.

The British Columbia Council of Forest Industries insists there is a good chance the final tariff would have been lower than the

tax which matches the preliminary tariff set by the United States in October.

Council spokesman David LaRue said the deal could range from 10 to 25 percent, but he said Canada would still have appealed to the U.S. International Trade Commission or international trade courts.

Industry executives were trying to assess the tax's detrimental effect on the province's share of the U.S. market and lower profits, higher lumber prices for Canadians and mill closures and layoffs.

Mike McCracken, president of Informetrica Ltd., an Ottawa-based forecasting firm, said he expected the decision could cost as many as 8,000 jobs in the forest industry and through economic spinoffs.

Canadian lumbermen said their industry could be paralyzed by the tax.

"In one step it creates an industrial paraplegic out of the lumber industry," complained Adam Zimmerman, president of lumber giant MacMillan Bloedel Ltd.

Mike Absay, of the Council of Forest Industries of British Columbia, estimated the compromise would cost \$432 million a year,

more than the total profit earned by Canadian lumber producers in 1986.

The Canadian federal government will collect the money and distribute it to the exporting provinces, but the expected \$500 million in tax revenue will likely be offset by higher unemployment insurance and welfare costs, said Jack Pussep, a senior forest industry analyst for Pemberton-Houston-Willoughby Bell Gouinlock in Vancouver.

"For every forestry job lost, three others would be affected," he said.

However, Canada's 30,000-member International Woodworkers of America supported the idea of the U.S.-Canada trade agreement and has said it did not expect the export tax to affect employment in the industry.

As for the agreement's effect on the Pacific Northwest, members of Washington's congressional delegation say lumber mills should get a limited financial boost.

Rep. Don Bonker, a Democrat from Olympia, said he disagreed with a claim by the National Association of Homebuilders that the export tax would increase the average price of a new U.S. home by \$1,000.

Also, he said, people have to be employed to purchase a home, and the states of Washington and Oregon have lost more than 36,000 lumber industry jobs since 1978.

Sen. Dan Evans, R-Wash., said he was worried that the initial export tax sets no schedule for changing stumpage rates, because it applies only to softwood shipments bound for the United States.

Judge concerned about news on possible Hofmann deal

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The judge who is to preside over Mark Hofmann's trial on murder and bomb-making charges says speculation about the possibility of a plea bargain has hurt Hofmann's chances of receiving a fair trial.

Third District Judge Kenneth Rigtrup, who met privately with prosecutors and defense attorneys Wednesday, said afterward that Hofmann had not changed his plea of innocent to the murder charges and 28 other felony counts.

Rigtrup said he was very concerned that speculation of a plea bargain had hindered Hofmann's chances of receiving a fair trial because of the difficulty in finding jurors with no opinions on the case.

Hofmann, 32, is charged with capital homicide in the Oct. 15, 1985, pipe-bomb deaths of Steven Christensen, 31, and Kathleen Sheets, 50. He also is charged with 28 felony counts of bomb-making, fraud and theft by deception.

Prosecutors contend Hofmann, a dealer in rare documents, killed to cover up transactions in which allegedly fraudulent historical documents, some of which challenged Mormon Church doctrine, were sold to the church and other collectors for hundreds of thousands of dollars.

Earlier this week, a Salt Lake City television station quoted Chief Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney Bud Elliott as saying that a deal could be struck by the end of the week.

Assessor quits after 31 years

MALAD CITY (AP) — Ralph Tovey retired New Year's Day as Oneida County assessor after 31 years on the job, the longest tenure of any county assessor in Idaho history.

Tovey, 68, was appointed assessor on March 8, 1956, after Clyde Brown resigned to take another job in Utah and has been re-elected to office ever since. He did not run for reelection in November and will be succeeded by Bob Crowther.

Tovey was born and reared in the Malad Valley and received most of his education there. He was graduated from the University of Idaho with a degree in agriculture and served in the Army during World War II.

Besides his work as assessor, he has operated a sheep and cattle ranch south of Malad City for most of his life along with his wife Mary Jane.

Idaho Falls Post Office asks for 3 new numbers

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — The Idaho Falls Post Office has applied for three new zip codes in an effort to speed up handling of mail and cover an 8-percent annual increase in postal volume to the city of 40,000.

If the application is accepted, the number of zip codes handled by the Idaho Falls Post Office would increase from three to six. A reply is expected within the next two months.

The application requests new codes for the eastern suburb of Ammon and the box numbers at the Downtown Eagle Rock Station. It also would split one of the existing zip code districts.

Postmaster Mel Kuykendall said the application must be approved by the Division Office of the U.S. Postal Service in Salt Lake City, the regional office in San Bruno, Calif., and national headquarters in Washington, D.C.

Bonneville County creates an ambulance taxing district

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Facing a New Year's Day deadline, the Bonneville County Commission beat the clock and created an ambulance taxing district authorized to assess property owners an annual fee for emergency transport services.

The commission approved the district Wednesday as an "insurance policy" in case what it considers the more favorable option of charging a household fee falls.

State law requires counties to form a tax district before the beginning of the year if they plan to levy the new tax during that year.

Commissioner Cliff Long said he hopes the board will not have to set a property tax levy for ambulance service. He favors a charge on each household in the county.

The reason we did it is to touch all the bases in case we have to use it," Long said.

County Clerk Ronald Longmore estimates that the household fee would be anywhere from \$3 to \$15, based on an annual average budget of \$21,000. However, the county has yet to determine how large a budget the program will require and whether businesses should be charged, Longmore said.

The maximum that could be assessed through property taxes would be \$591,000, he said.

The loss of \$150,000 in federal revenue sharing funds last year prompted the commission's search for alternative sources of funding for programs such as the ambulance

service. The service, which also covers and is supported by neighboring Bingham and Jefferson counties, has been provided through the Idaho Falls Fire Department with a \$800,000 annual budget.

Check the national computer printout of New Year's resolutions and I'll wager that more than half of the top ten have to do with our relationships with our bodies, ourselves. The second tier has to do with family and work. It is a rare list that includes the resolve to change our relationships with strangers. A rare list that mentions improvement in the public lives.

Blame it on the privatization of American life, blame it on the Manhattanization of ci-

ty living, but increasingly we operate within our own inner concentric circles. We pay our public lives as little attention as we pay the toll-taker on the highway.

It isn't just the infrastructure of bridges and daily encounters with strangers who pass each other on the sidewalk, but from each other in the stores, deal with each other crossing streets and boarding buses have indeed become lean and mean.

At some banks, it is often easier to get a civil greeting from the automated teller than the human one. Indeed, the interchange between clerk and customer at fast-food counters or check-out lines has become increasingly automatic. We deal with each other anonymously and mechanically.

Most of us look away when we pass strangers. It is the exceptional person who stops to help the woman maneuvering her kids and groceries up the staircase. We rarely give up our place in line or on the Locked into our automobiles, we pre-

gridlock to giving way. Drivers who won't give each other an inch hardly give each other the finger. It is no accident that the symbol of the urban 80s is the Sony Walkman, a mobile musical isolation, a personal and anti-social environment.

These daily encounters, when they are angry or alien, diminish our lives enormously. When they are pleasant, we feel buoyant. Yet when we sit at home and make resolutions, we think about what we can accomplish in private spaces: home, work. Too many have given up the belief that they control the shared, the public, world.

I risk sounding like a greeting card or a bumper sticker — Have You Hugged Your Child Today? If Everyone Lit Just One Little Candle . . . But as individuals, we have enormous control over this human infrastructure. We can change the contour of a day, the mood of a moment, the way people feel.

The demolition and the reconstruction of public life is the result of personal decisions

made every day. The decision to give up a seat on the bus. The decision to be patient or pleasant against all odds. The decision to let that jerk take a left-hand turn from the right hand lane. Without rolling down the window and calling him a jerk.

It's the resolution to be a civil, social creature. Maybe even pick up a few pieces of someone else's litter.

This may be a peak period for the battle against the spread of a waistline and creeping cholesterol. But it is also within our willpower to fight the spread of urban rudeness and creeping hostility.

Civility doesn't stop a nuclear holocaust and doesn't make a head of the homeless. But it is a difference in the shape of a community, as surely as lifting weights can make a difference in the shape of a human torso.

Avarice wins out over all religions

There was a time when members of the Jewish community trembled before looking at the front page of the New York Times. The headline: difficult story about Israel or some act of terror against a venerable synagogue somewhere in the world.

Today it is the business section that arouses apprehension. Jews are uncomfortable reading about the life of a Boesky or the Dennis Levine. They are engaged in one financial dishonesty or another. Jews fear that perhaps these disclosures will arouse some dormant stereotype of Jews as money lenders or "sharp" business types.

The Jewish community needs to worry. As the financial pages look more and more like the pages of the National Enquirer, it is clear that avarice is an equal opportunity vice. Boesky's story is paralleled by tales of similar wrongdoing by men named Donovan, Brown or Wilkins. The avarice of the religious right is a diversion here. The common theme is not secular humanism (whatever that is). The great moral values of the human are not pornography or abortion. The false hope is the triumph of greed over the righteous. The religious right is the implicit ethic of our economic system: "hook up for No. 1."

None of the admonitions to charity, compassion and honesty have withstood the withering siccoco of

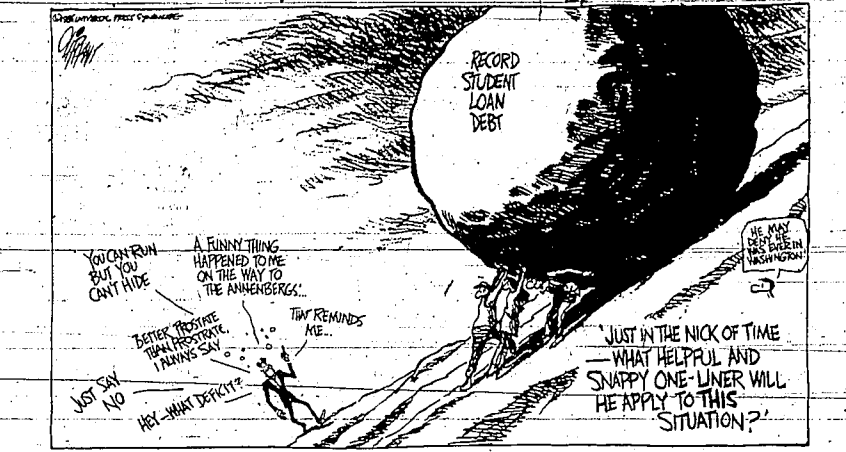
the ethic of self-advancement at any cost, which lies at the heart of the unbridled competition that is necessary to succeed in the terms of our socioeconomic system. As the game gets increasingly frantic and complex, is it any wonder that some players will want the field tilted in their favor? Perhaps we should be less concerned about the players and more worried about the rules of the game.

Of the religious bodies in the country in recent years, only the Roman Catholic bishops have had the courage to question the system by which our economy functions. In their forthright and incisive pastoral letter concerning the economy, the bishops raised to broad questions that touch on the very nature of the American character.

Boesky and Levine, Donovan, Brown and Wilkins are not aberrations. They are the product and the extreme expression of the secret ethic that fuels American life. The triumph of that value is a tragedy that bespeaks the real failure of American religion — even in the face of its supposed vigor and strength.

In their pastoral letter, the fathers of the Church are inspiring teachers. Their essays are a moral challenge to all Americans of every religion who care about the moral fiber of our society.

Celebrate a triumph of human spirit

WASHINGTON — The executive director of the Texas Civil Liberties Union, Gara LaMarche, denies the idea of making pocket copies of the "institutional" history available as part of the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the document.

LaMarche would have something of a point if there were no other plans under way, but there have already been scores of public discussions and scholarly conferences, and hundreds more are being scheduled.

Superb texts on the Constitution are being published, and television series are being produced. There will be bicentennial programs in schools, parks and libraries.

In this context, making copies of the Constitution available to the general public is a immensely worthwhile undertaking. It is also a fitting effort, since underlying what went on in Philadelphia in 1787 was the notion that this document would belong to the general populace. The Constitution's first words are "We the people"; and such a document could not properly take effect, the framers realized, until it had been submitted to the people for their approval.

"To give a new system its proper validity and energy," James Madison wrote to George Washington, "a ratification must be obtained from the people, and not merely from the ordinary authority of the Legislatures."

As the ratification process got under way, Madison, Alexander Hamilton and John Jay undertook a campaign to build popular support for the Constitution. Writing under the collective name of Publius, they — like those who opposed the Constitution — addressed their thoughts to the people.

When the document was ratified, it was the people who debated, thousands of them; in various cities, marching in the largest parades this country had ever seen. Working people showed off their crafts in these parades, with bakers carrying huge "federal loaves" and ship carpenters displaying off "ships of state."

One popular display particularly underscored how widely distributed it is that at the bicentennial we widely distribute the Constitution: a horse-drawn float featured printers overseeing a prin-

ting press that made copies of the Constitution.

The fact that our fundamental laws written down lets us all — farmer, merchant, housewife, teacher — know the outlines of our rights and the limits of political power. The printers' spinning of copies on the horse-drawn float realized this, and so did Justice Hugo Black, one of this country's great civil libertarians. He used to carry a copy of the Constitution with him in his jacket pocket.

Perhaps LaMarche's objection to distributing the Constitution has something to do with his Philadelphia. Cautioning against "a meaningless pageant of self-congratulation," he urges us to remember that no women, no freed slaves and no poor men drafted this document. He urges us to focus our celebration on individuals such as Dred Scott, who were excluded from "the constitutional vision."

While LaMarche is absolutely correct in his observation that our Constitution has grown stronger as human liberty has advanced in this country — as amendments have been added guaranteeing suffrage for blacks and women, for example — surely we should not let that blind us to the great achievement of Philadelphia.

Put simply, the convention there was the most creative political gathering ever to occur on this,

or perhaps any, continent.

Making this achievement all the more astonishing is that the nation created was a republic. The Constitution is not a document by which a reluctant government gives over limited power to a restive people; rather, it assumes that power rests with the people and is an arrangement by which they give over limited power to the government in order to protect their liberties.

Such a nation on such a scale had not been seen on the face of the Earth since the days of Republican Rome, and surely during the bicentennial year we ought to celebrate the man who made this idea so often longed for and so seldom achieved — in reality.

As we enter into 1987, let us remember that what happened in Philadelphia 200 years ago was one of those exceedingly rare instances in human history when, as Alfred North Whitehead put it, "the people in power did what needed to be done about as well as you can imagine its being possible."

Let us not use the bicentennial to beat our breasts about what was wrong with the Constitution created in 1787. Let us use it instead to celebrate a remarkable triumph of the human spirit.

Substitute an hour of talking each day for that hour of TV

Storytellers are born not made. We were all born storytellers. But we lose the ability. Children weave tales naturally and easily given the opportunity. And they delight in listening to stories of fantasy. Children are natural mythmakers.

I lived in a duplex in the tropics many years ago. The neighbors were a single parent and her six-year-old son. How they would often play on the front steps; with all the windows open to catch small cool breezes, his voice joined the invited air.

I remember hearing his explanation, spoken aloud to himself, of the birth of a chicken; how the hen swallowed a tiny egg which a cock pecked in her beak. How the egg grew until her stomach was full and "she went to the bathroom" to lay the egg. Here is the essence of mythology: A tale of origins, of birth. An explanation to make the world understandable.

When my brother and I were boys, my father often told stories after dinner when we sat in the living room together. There was no television to distract us from this human interaction. Stories evolved in the telling. He would begin with the most fantastic

premises, sometimes embellishing fairytales. His Goldilocks had a long nose with a wart on the end. Herubally we two boys into the tales. To: Thereby we became part of the myth; and the myth became part of us. My brother and I listened with rapt attention. When the story ended we begged for another.

These stories added a new dimension to the world. They imbued the world with a sense of wonder, of awe, even. The world was not flat and uninspired, but had marvelous possibilities.

We are all storytellers. It is the nature of humankind. From shaman to priest, from scientist to novelist; we endow the world with meaning beyond the ordinary and observable.

If a hunter was struck by lightning, a

shaman might look for the reason that hunter was struck. Not the scientific explanation of why lightning strikes high points, but the reason it struck that particular man. Obviously, someone cast a spell. The world takes on another dimension, the magical. The world is made multidimensional, invested with meaning beyond itself.

So, the theologian might explain a burning bush, or the parting of waters, pointing to Divine Influence. While, again the scientist might look to a different explanation, a different force. It is not a question of who's "right," it is a question of mythologies which answer some inner need. It is a question of depth and levels of meanings.

I don't watch television much anymore. Frankly, it was addictive until I discovered that I could figure out the endings and the details, much to the chagrin of my daughters. I was accused of having seen the show before. But most of these shows are one-dimensional and lack any sense of wonder or surprise. Most of them are inescapably watch once, without subjecting oneself a second time.

I have given television up. I consider it an

opiate, an electronic tranquilizer.

I am not speaking of those once or twice a season specials, but of most television programming. It is dull and formula and has lost the magic of the storyteller, the surprise that the storyteller and the listener have when the ending of a story evolves, from the telling of the beginning.

It is frightening to think that according to Peggy Charren and Martin Sandler's book, Changing Channels: Living (Sensibly) with Television; published this year, American children on the average, watch 26 hours of television a week. About the same number of hours they spend in the classroom. That of the results of spending that time learning, dancing, or perfecting a swim stroke, or practicing any musical instrument.

We alert citizens to the addiction to drugs and alcohol, but we forget this electronic opium: it kills us. It puts us to sleep. It suffocates the mythmaker in each of us. But even more devastating, it takes us into a one-to-one interaction with an electronic eye, and walls us off from family interaction.

Now, we must have workshops in how to communicate, how to speak to your child, how to speak to your spouse. No wonder the

storytelling sense begins to disappear.

In 1980, a child in an average family had three to four hours interaction each day with members of the immediate extended family; in 1981 a child on the average had only 14 1/2 minutes each day interacting with a parent, and 12 1/2 of those minutes were corrected and warned. The other two minutes might be given over to positive reinforcement.

When you juxtapose the statistics about hours of television watching and family interaction, a sad picture emerges. A sad picture of children and parents locked in their own separate, narrow closets; lit by the flashing glow of a television set. Silent. Passive. Losing natural ability to create personal mythologies.

Perhaps it is time to give up an hour of television each day, to spend it talking to one another and listening and, perhaps, when the day hasn't been too interesting, making up a story.

Income-based student loans proposed

WASHINGTON — The Education Department will ask Congress next week to earmark \$600 million of its new budget for an innovative loan program that would let students borrow up to \$50,000 and peg repayments to their incomes.

The "Income Contingent Loans" program, the loans would be called ICLs, will be included in the Reagan administration spending plan to be submitted Monday to Congress.

"We believe this is the single biggest advance in the financing of higher education for students in the last 15 years," deputy education undersecretary Bruce Carnes said this week at a briefing.

The \$600 million, combined with up to \$333 million in collections from other loans, would be available to students who meet the same eligibility standards as other aid programs. ICLs would be self-supporting since students eventually would repay the full loans with interest.

Carnes refused to say what cuts will be proposed in other areas in order to pay for the new ICL program.

'I don't see congressional inertia on this program. Quite the contrary — I see sympathy from Congress on this program. Congress is running out of money. Student aid programs are essentially out of control. They're going to look very hard at programs that provide wide access to funds and allow the most kids to participate.'

He said changes will be suggested in other loan aid grant programs, but that all students will be eligible for federal aid who still be eligible for essentially the same amount.

Carnes said the administration also will be requesting an increase in adult education funds distributed to states to fund literacy. The current level is \$106 million; the department will propose \$130 million for 1988.

The undersecretary declined to say what the department's overall budget request will be except that it will be closer to the administration's

\$15.2 billion request for 1987 than to the \$13.5 billion authorized by Congress. He said the agency had cut enough to meet the target set by the Gramm-Rudman deficit reduction act, but would not give a figure.

The Education Department in its last budget request asked Congress to approve \$90 million for the ICL initiative and ended up lashed with \$5 million for a pilot program to begin on 10 campuses next fall.

The ICL program proposed for the 1988 fiscal year, which starts next Oct. 1, would involve 7,500 institutions and up to 500,000 loans. Carnes described it this way:

• Students would have access to \$50,000, far more than the current \$17,500 cap on undergraduates in the Guaranteed Student Loan program, and thus would have more freedom in deciding where to attend school.

• Students would have flexible and easy repayment options as opposed to current fixed schedules which, for GSLS, require complete repayment within 10 years. Under the ICL program, repayments would never exceed 15 percent of a graduate's income, with a repayment period of 30 years or as long as it takes to pay off the money.

• Students planning to enter low-income fields would be able to take out loans and still meet their repayment obligations, even if they default by graduates who can not afford their payments would be expected to drop.

• Students would pay the full cost of the money without subsidies from the taxpayer as is currently the case under GSLS and the National Direct Student Loan program. The interest rate would be the 91-day Treasury bill rate plus 3 percent.

Nearly \$4 billion was authorized this year for Pell grants.

N.M., Michigan, N.Y. gov's begin their new terms

New Mexicans woke up New Year's morning with a new governor, while Govs. Mario Cuomo of New York and James Blanchard of Michigan began their second terms.

In Santa Fe, N.M., Garrey E. Carruthers was sworn in at 11:35 p.m. Wednesday — five minutes before the term of outgoing Gov. Tony Anaya officially expired.

Carruthers, who became the state's first Republican governor since 1970, repeated the swearing-in at a formal ceremony Thursday, calling on the state's residents to realize that "this will be our finest year together."

Cuomo, widely viewed as a potential '88 Democratic presidential

candidate, evoked images of the Statue of Liberty and the U.S. Constitution in his inaugural address Thursday to remind his audience of "this amazing place of miracles called America."

"My administration has been built on that belief, that the miracle is not over," Cuomo told his audience in a packed convention hall near the state Capitol in Albany, N.Y.

Like Carruthers, Cuomo, 54, took the official oath of office hours before, at a small ceremony New Year's Eve. During that, the governor told friends and relatives that he was "looking forward to four more years in this beautiful house."

Even so, just a bit earlier, Cuomo press secretary Martin Steadman said the governor would be traveling

in the next several months to Iowa and four other key states: Iowa is the site of the nation's first presidential party caucuses.

In Lansing, Mich., Blanchard was sworn in Thursday to his second term as Michigan's 45th governor, telling the state's residents they are at the crossroads — in a global economic war.

About 1,800 people braved 31-degree weather outside the state Capitol to see Blanchard take the oath of office. "Michigan must master the new realities of economic change or be 'undone by them,'" Blanchard, 44, said in his inaugural address.

Blanchard, the first Democratic governor to be re-elected in 23 years, praised Michigan residents for

"climbing an enormous mountain of challenge." In the four years since he took his first oath in 1983, when the state's unemployment rate stood at 17 percent and the state was millions of dollars in debt.

But Blanchard said Michigan has even more hills to climb in the face of a new challenge from foreign competitors.

"And I am not just talking about automobiles," the governor said. "Just about every profitable enterprise in Michigan is threatened by global competition, whether they know it or not."

Anaya, who was barred by law from seeking another term as New Mexico's governor, also addressed the audience.

High tides leave debris along East, West coasts

GARDEN CITY, S.C. (AP) — A storm of "mini-hurricane" force washed away decks and sidewalks at present high tide on the South Carolina coast and flooded North Carolina beaches Thursday, while the highest West Coast tides in nearly 20 years forced the partial closing of a highway.

The tides on both coasts have been unusually high because of an alignment of the sun, moon and the Earth known as syzygy.

It was the fourth consecutive day that officials closed one lane of the Pacific Coast Highway at Sunset Beach, Calif. — No damage was reported.

A 60-year-old barn on the Washington state coast, at a spot called Washaway Beach, slipped into the ocean Wednesday after high tides eroded its foundation.

South Carolina beaches were littered with planking from boardwalks and uprooted trees, but damage to buildings appeared to be less than that caused by a storm last

month that left \$3 million in damages, according to Patrick Dowling, public information officer for the city of Myrtle Beach.

"There has been substantial flooding, but no damage to condominiums or motels or hotels," Dowling said.

Civil Defense workers in South Carolina's coastal counties said it could take days to compile damage estimates.

South Carolina Highway Patrol troopers stopped all but emergency travel on Pawley's Island after 40 mph winds and tides 3 feet higher than normal pounded the beachfront. Power lines fell in the storm, and police ordered electrical service cut off to the community of 700 to prevent fires and electrocutions.

North Carolina officials reported extensive damage to waterfront homes at Long Beach, an island community near the state's southernmost tip.

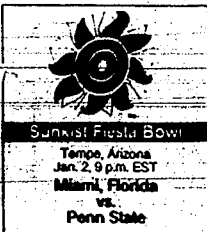
No. 1 faces No. 2 tonight for No. 1

TEMPE, Ariz. — The nearest thing to a college football playoff takes place tonight when No. 1 Miami and No. 2 Penn State battle for the national championship in the Fiesta Bowl.

This is only the seventh time in the 51-year history of The Associated Press poll that the top two teams at the end of the regular season meet in a bowl game and just the second time that both have perfect records. Top-ranked Nebraska, 13-0, trounced runnerup Alabama, 11-0, 38-6 in the Orange Bowl to win the 1971 national championship.

"This is probably the closest we've been to a national playoff game,"

said Penn State Coach Joe Paterno, one of those in favor of a playoff after the bowl games. "I've thought

about it and I'm kind of watching it. Maybe it is too much pressure, but two teams having a chance to play for a championship I'd think would be a fun situation, a once-in-a-lifetime situation, something they'll never forget, win or lose."

The 19th Fiesta Bowl has turned into something of a collegiate Super Bowl and Paterno, one of the deans of the coaching profession, is concerned about all the hype and hoopla.

"I have some misgivings at times whether any college game should be this important," he said. "Then I remember I've been shooting my mouth off all these years about a playoff. In the long run, it's a plus. But all this fanfare to go out and watch a bunch of kids knock each

other around for 60 minutes is almost ludicrous.

"In 1962 (when Penn State defeated Georgia in the Sugar Bowl to win the national championship) and last year (when the No. 1-ranked Nittany Lions lost to Oklahoma in the Orange Bowl), we were ready for the hoopla. Whether we're ready for this much (more than 900 media credentials have been issued, including 300 to NBC, which will televise the game at 8 p.m., EST) I don't know."

The game has been billed as: Miami's pro-style passing attack, fueled by quarterback Vinny Testaverde, the Heisman Trophy winner, against Penn State's bend-but-don't-break defense, led by All-American linebacker Shane Conlan,

perhaps the best ever at Linebacker U.

The sun, the beach and the bright lights of Miami, the guys in the gilly orange and green uniforms, the blue-collar work ethic of State College, Pa., where "generic" blue and white so-so uniforms are the order of the day.

The black hats from Country Club U. (Miami), a number of whose players arrived wearing combat fatigues, vs. the white hats from Penn State, where Paterno's constant harping on academics has given him a holler-than-thou image in some quarters.

"Saint Joe," Miami Coach Jimmy Johnson called him, adding — not sarcastically, he insisted — "Everyone respects Joe's image. No

one would dare say anything bad about it."

Even Paterno joked about his untarnished image. "I left my halo home," he quipped at the start of one news conference. "I've got a set of combat fatigues in my room — I was going to wear over here."

Turning serious, he added, "Most guys around me know I'm not that good, and I've never claimed to be that good. As far as my role of the good guy, I don't get caught up in all that nonsense."

Both teams have spent almost a week in the Valley of the Sun, a week enlivened by the Miami team's early exit from a Sunday night steak fry after what they interpreted as a

Arizona State hands Big 10 sixth straight loss in Pasadena

PASADENA, Calif. — The 73rd Rose Bowl provided a dream come true for Jeff Van Raaphorst and Arizona State, and a continuing nightmare for Bo Schembechler, Michigan and the Big Ten.

Van Raaphorst, whose father had been denied a chance to play in the Rose Bowl 25 years earlier, threw for 193 yards and two touchdowns to lead seventh-ranked Arizona State to a 22-15 victory over No. 4 Michigan in Thursday's Rose Bowl.

The victory continued the Pacific-10's domination over the Big Ten in the Rose Bowl, and handed Michigan Coach Schembechler his seventh loss in eight trips to Pasadena.

Pac-10 teams now have won the last six Rose Bowls and 12 of the last 13.

"It's a dream come true," said Van Raaphorst, who rallied the Sun Devils from a 15-3 second-quarter deficit. "My father never got a chance to do it, and I'm just glad I was able to. This is for him."

Dick Van Raaphorst was an All-Big Ten kicker for conference champion Ohio State in 1961. But the faculty, wanting to show that football was not overemphasized at the school, voted to prohibit the Buckeyes from participating in the Rose Bowl.

Dick was in the stands Thursday as Arizona State won its first appearance in the Rose Bowl, and also gave Coach John Cooper his first bowl victory.

"This is the biggest danged victory of my life," said Cooper, in his second year at ASU after spending



eight years at Tulsa. "I'm on cloud nine."

"We beat an excellent football team. We had to play our best ball game to win. You can't say enough about our defense, particularly in the second half."

After giving up 15 points early, the Sun Devil defense turned stingy and finished the game with three interceptions off Michigan quarterback Jim Harbaugh.

The Arizona State offense, meanwhile, did not turn the ball over a single time.

"I'm not making any excuses, we come out here every year and lose by seven points," Schembechler said. "You guys can give me fun talking about that."

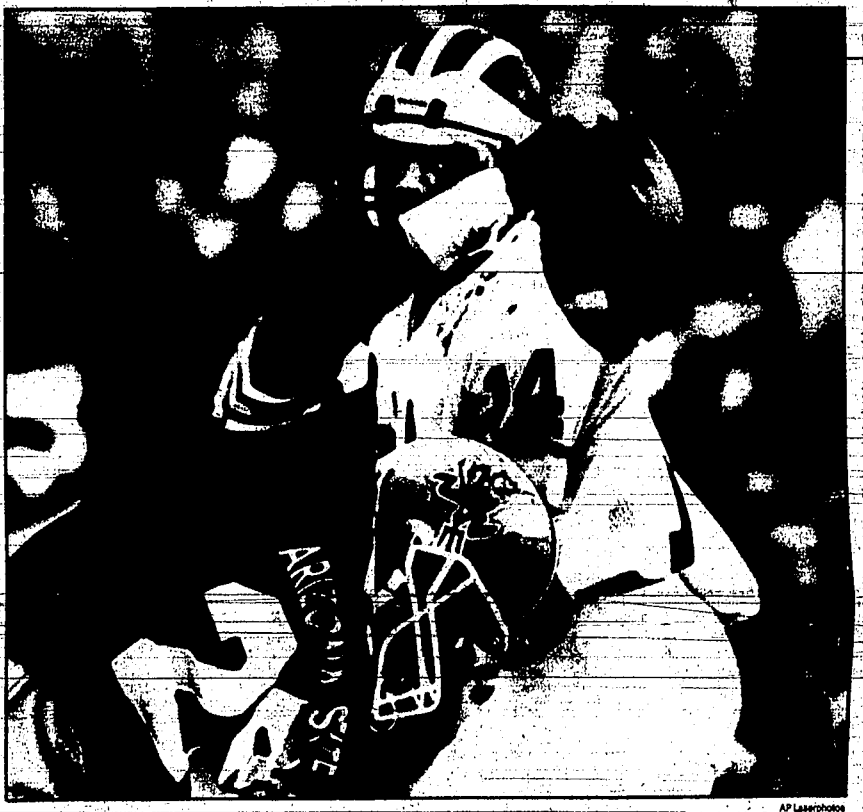
"We just didn't play a very good second half. We've been a second-half team, that's why it's disappointing."

Schembechler said one of the keys was the Sun Devils' defensive pressure on Harbaugh, commenting, "How can you play quarterback if you don't have any time?"

"If you want to be critical, be critical of the offensive line. Our offense didn't have a chance, and when it did, it didn't do anything."

Van Raaphorst threw a 4-yard touchdown pass to Bruce Hill to make it 15-13 just 29 seconds before halftime, then connected with

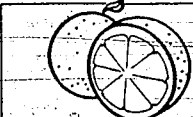
Sooners bury Arkansas 42-8; Big 8 dominates New Year's

MIAMI — Third-ranked Oklahoma provided Coach Butch Switzer with a special victory Thursday night, pounding No. 9 Arkansas 42-8 in the 53rd Orange Bowl to avenge the most embarrassing loss of Switzer's career.

Arkansas cost Oklahoma a probable national championship by beating the heavily favored Sooners 31-6 in the 1978 Orange Bowl. Switzer, a native of Arkansas and a former Razorback player and assistant coach, had asked his players to win Thursday night's game for him.

Publicly, Switzer tried to



downplay the importance of the game to him, personally — but afterwards, he admitted it meant a lot to beat his alma mater.

"I can go back home to Arkansas. I'm sure can. I needed that," said Switzer, who his improved his record to 6-2 in Orange Bowl games.

"I talked prior to the game about going out on the field nine years ago and coming back embarrassed," he added. "I was one of the worst losers of my career."

Spencer Tillman ran for 109 yards and two touchdowns and quarterback Jamelle Holloway also scored twice as the Sooners, 176-point favorites, finished the season with an 11-1 record for the second straight year.

Tillman scored on runs of 77 and 21 yards in the second quarter and Holloway broke the game open with TD runs of 2 and 4 yards that gave the Sooners a 22-0 lead midway through the third quarter.

Oklahoma completed the rout.

Cornhuskers call Tigers' bluff, thump Louisiana St., 30-15

NEW ORLEANS — Sixth-ranked Nebraska ran its mouth for more than a week, and backed it up on the field Thursday.

The Cornhuskers smashed No. 5 Louisiana State 30-15 in the 53rd Sugar Bowl football game behind an offense led by Steve Taylor and a swarming defense that shut down LSU's offense most of the game.

After arriving in New Orleans two days before Christmas, Nebraska players continually cast aspersions about the Tiger attack — and their redshirt freshman quarterback, Tom Hodson.

"Pressure on the passer was the difference in the game," Nebraska



Cosch Tom Osborne said. "The turning point came on those two big sacks."

The key sacks came from Broderick Thomas and All-American Danny Noonan on the last two plays of the third quarter after LSU, trailing 17-7, had taken over on the Nebraska 17 following a blocked field goal.

Defensive tackle Nell Smith, a

New Orleans native, said the turning point came on the first night Nebraska was in town, when nine players and two graduate assistants were arrested in the French Quarter for disturbing the peace, charges which were later dropped.

"A lot of guys say they were mistreated and didn't want to come back," Smith said. "I felt like we needed to give them a bonus to get them to want to come back."

Noonan, one of those arrested, said it was very influential in the Huskers' performance.

"I think that only helped us," Noonan said. "We got fired up. The people treated us like dirt."

Noonan said Nebraska's pregame remarks about LSU was

Texas Aggies give up five interceptions as Ohio State brings Big 10 to Dallas with a vengeance

DALLAS — The Big Ten Conference's debut in the Cotton Bowl will long be bracketed in the memory of Texas A&M quarterback Kevin Murray, who set a 51-year record for futility in the New Year's Day game.

The 11th-ranked Ohio State Buckeyes intercepted five of Murray's passes and returned two of them to touchdowns in a 26-12 victory over the No. 8 Aggies before 74,189 fans.

All-American linebacker Chris Spielman intercepted two passes,



returning one of them 24 yards for a touchdown, his first as a collegian; Murray's five interceptions were a Cotton Bowl record.

Spielman said, "We played three defenses we hadn't used this year.

We noticed from films that Murray didn't like to run. So we just dropped back and waited on him."

Ohio State Coach Earl Bruce was ecstatic over Spielman's big day, which included 11 tackles and earned him the most valuable defensive player award.

"I've always said Chris Spielman is the most outstanding linebacker against both the pass and run in America and I believe he proved it," Bruce said.

"The defense, facing adversity at times, fought back and put points on the board. That was the difference," Spielman said, "We felt we had to

prove something after losing to Michigan."

Ohio State's 26-12 loss to Michigan in the final regular-season game cost the Buckeyes a trip to the Rose Bowl.

Linebacker Michael Key joined the record-smashing defensive day by the Buckeyes with a 49-yard interception return for a touchdown in the fourth period. Colorado's Byron "Whizzer" White had the old record for length at 42 yards in 1938.

Murray took full blame for the disaster. "It wasn't anything they did — it was

misreading from my part. A couple of times I threw the ball down there and just didn't see the white jerseys."

Murray added, "Five interceptions in a game to kill any team. Spielman was used as a spy out there. They used the safety differently and Spielman was everywhere."

Texas A&M Coach Jackie Sherrill said "Ohio State made the big plays and you have to give them credit for it."

He said the Buckeyes confused Murray. "They used a lot of different defenses," Sherrill said, "On one in-

terception they had eight people dropped into the coverage areas."

Bruce also won the psychological battle, bringing the Buckeyes out in red shoes. He was dapper himself in a suit and a hat with a scarlet feather.

"We just wanted to be a little flashy," Bruce said.

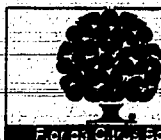

Sports 1986: A year of age, youth and drugs

1986 was a year of age, ego and the anguish of drugs.

Bill Shoemaker, Jack Nicklaus, Raymond Floyd and Bobby Allison pushed back the limitations of age, while the New York Mets and Chicago Bears expanded the limits of arrogance. They all came out winners.

Two young-and-coming athletes, Len Bias and Don Rogers, died from cocaine, and sports was a loser.

At the same time, each of the country's three major professional sports — football, basketball and baseball — were scandalized by drugs.

It was a year of both delight and despair. And, even in the deaths of Bias and Rogers, people sought hope.

"Tragically, in death, Don Rogers may have made more of a contribution to society than he could have on the playing field," said owner Art Modell of the Cleveland Browns, for whom Rogers played. "Let's hope his passing serves as a warning to those who want to try, or have used, drugs."

Rogers, a free safety, died of a massive cocaine overdose on June 27, the day before he was to have been married. He was 23. Bias, an All-American forward at Maryland, died of cocaine intoxication on June 19, two days after the Boston Celtics made him their top pick in the NBA draft. He was 22.

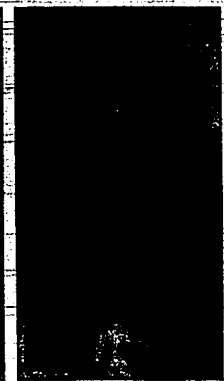
"There's so much hurt in it," Maryland vice chancellor Drury Bagwell said. "It's as if you were in the process of burying your brother and people start asking about his use of drugs and his sex life and that about your great uncle Horace who stole that horse."

Shoemaker was 54 when he became the oldest man to win a Kentucky Derby, on May 3 riding a colt named Ferdinand for 73-year-old trainer Charlie Whittingham. One month later, trainer Wally Stables won his fifth straight Belmont Stakes, at 72.

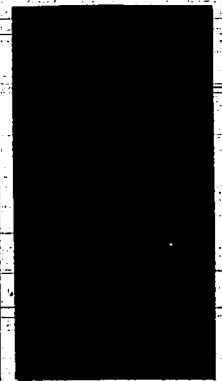

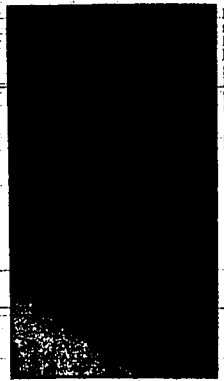

my career" when he won the Masters at 46. The victory was Nicklaus' 19th in a major golf tournament and a record-setting sixth in the Masters.

"I'm not the player I was 10 or 15 years ago," Nicklaus said, "but I can still play a little bit at times."

Floyd was 43 on June 16 when he became the oldest golfer to win the U.S. Open, and Allison, at 48, became the oldest man to win a NASCAR top division race when he captured the Winston 500 on May 4.

The National League champion Mets defeated the Boston Red Sox in a seven-game World Series after being one strike away from elimination in the 10th inning of Game 6. The Mets, who battled and bullied their way to 108 regular-season victories, came back after losing the first two games of the Series at home. Ray Knight was the Most Valuable Player.

"We deserve it," Manager Davey Johnson said. "We had the best record in baseball. We should be

During the season, Roger Clemens of the Red Sox set a major league record by striking out 20 Seattle Mariners on April 29, and Mike Scott pitched a no-hitter against the San Francisco Giants on Sept. 25 to clinch the NL West for the Houston Astros.

The Bears, with their innovative "46" defense, won the Super Bowl on Jan. 26, beating New England 46-10. In so doing, they didn't even bother to hide their insolence.

"We're the best of all time, no question," safety Dave Duerson said. Defensive end Richard Dent, Super Bowl MVP, said: "I think we have the makings of a dynasty."

The day after the Super Bowl, the Patriots' best season fell in shambles when Coach Raymond Berry admitted that at least five of his players had serious drug problems.

"We have a situation here that we think is intolerable," he said.

The league, as whole, won big in

February that he had meted out the most extensive drug penalties in major league history. The penalties affected 21 players, including stars such as Dave Parker, Keith Hernandez and Joaquin Andujar, who now must undergo drug testing the rest of their careers.

And after two separate heavyweight title fights, traces of marijuana were found in the bloodstream of former champion Tim Witherspoon as drugs also touched boxing.

The sport, however, also had its bright moments. On Nov. 22, Mike Tyson at 20 became the youngest heavyweight champion by knocking out Trevor Berbick in the first round of their World Boxing Council fight at Las Vegas.

Larry Holmes lost a bid to regain the heavyweight title from Michael Spinks on April 15 when Spinks won a split decision. Afterward, Holmes retired with only two losses in 50 fights, both to Spinks.

Sugar Ray Leonard and Marvelous

Marvin Hagler, meanwhile, announced he will fight next April in Las Vegas in what is being billed by promoter Bob Arum as "the greatest boxing event of our time."

Leonard will have been inactive for nearly 20 months when the fight takes place.

On the college front, several universities were in trouble with the NCAA, most notably Southern Methodist. SMU stood accused of paying football players huge sums of money under the table while it already was on NCAA probation. The team program could be the first to face the "death penalty," which allows the NCAA to ban a sport at a school after a second offense.

Top-ranked Miami and No. 2 Penn State were headed for a Jan. 2 Fiesta Bowl showdown that would determine the year's college football champion. Texas' dreams of repeating died in a Sept. 27 loss to the Hurricanes, led by Heisman Trophy winning quarterback Vinny Testaverde.

Women dominated the news in track and field, particularly distance runner Ingrid Kristiansen of Norway, sprinter-long jumper Helke Drechsler of East Germany, heptathlete Jackie Joyner of the United States and hurdler Yordanka Donkova of Bulgaria. Their male counterparts also made some notable contributions.

Hurdler Renato Belemiah made a successful return after three years as a wide receiver for the San Francisco 49ers, and Soviet Sergei Bubka emerged from a three-way battle

Battered, bruised polo horses go to New York spa for R&R

HARPERSFIELD, N.Y. (AP) — Polo, the sport of kings and princes, is a posh pastime for those who sip champagne on the sidelines. For ponies, it's a punishing pursuit.

After spending the summer and fall galloping over a course the size of 7½ football fields, carrying 180-pound, mallet-wielding riders, these equine athletes are bruised, weary and yearning for a little rest and recreation.

"They get it at Harper Hill Farm, a 350-acre spread on a wooded hillside in Delaware County. Sharon Pick, the diminutive proprietor, provides tender-loving care to battle-worn, polo-ponies during the winter, nursing the animals back to peak condition for another season.

"They come here with bruises, cuts, bowed tendons," Pick said during a recent interview, speaking as she wrapped legs and examined

hooves. "They're underweight and weak, both physically and mentally. They need to rest, turn out with other horses. A little R and R."

Most of the horses come from Long Island, where Pick grew up. As her reputation grew, so has Pick's business since she and her husband bought a farm and built their house and stables nine years ago.

"The first year, a few friends who play polo asked us to board their horses for the winter," she said. "It's just snowballed since then."

This year, Pick is caring for 64 horses, including about 40 polo ponies, an injured racehorse and assorted show animals.

"People would leave their horses here for the winter and find that when they got them back, they were strong as iron," she said. Pick, who has found a high quality diet and rest for her 3-year-old son. "My credibility would be down the tubes if a horse broke down two weeks after he started playing again."

Reconditioning a horse is mostly a matter of tending to wounds, providing a high quality diet and rest and gradually increasing exercise. But it's the special touches, the attention to each animal's individual needs, that really make a difference, Pick said.

"Horses that are used to being in a stall and having their food brought to them every day get depressed if you just turn them out to pasture and leave them alone," she said. "They need human interaction, haying you come in every morning and say 'good morning, fella.'"

Many of the horses at Harper Hill come from members of Meadowbrook Polo Club on Long Island, which claims to be America's oldest polo club, founded in 1881.

Within the past decade, polo has had a kind of renaissance in the United States, said Meadowbrook's president, Albert Bianco. Although the sport is primarily an obsession of Florida's Boca Raton and Palm Beach are the hub of high-class polo in the United States, but rough-and-ready weekend matches are played across the country in places like Grand Rapids, Mich., and Skaneateles, N.Y.

Wide World hasn't had a regular host or anchor for several years. Jim McKay, the program's original host, recently left his hectic globetrotting schedule. However, he will continue to cover his favorite sports for Wide World — horse racing, golf and figure skating.

NCAA may decide to open its investigations

SAN DIEGO — Boosters would be banned entirely from recruiting and the NCAA would conduct its investigations of such a meeting under a new set of 151 proposals to be submitted to the NCAA's annual convention next week.

More than 1,800 delegates representing most of the NCAA's 792 member schools were expected for the six-day meeting, starting Tuesday. Other measures would cut the recruiting seasons of basketball and football coaches almost in half and set limits on playing seasons in several sports, including football and basketball.

The NCAA Presidents Commission, meeting in conjunction with the annual convention, is expected to announce whether it will call a special meeting of NCAA schools next summer to consider the possibility of cost-cutting measures.

The Commission's specific proposals for the summer meeting may not be known until April. But several potentially explosive items on the January agenda, including reducing the size of coaching staffs in football and basketball, are expected to be withdrawn and resubmitted at the

special convention. An Atlantic Coast Conference proposal to define playing seasons in most sports will be withdrawn for the same reason, sources say.

One possible "sleeper" proposal sponsored by the Big-Six Conference would grant college athletes five years of eligibility instead of the current four. Delegates also will vote on a resolution to commission a study of freshmen eligibility and bring the issue to a vote in 1988.

There is nothing on the program to create a Division IA football playoff. The Council, with the blessing of coaches' groups, has brought forward the proposal to ban boosters from recruiting. Boosters already are prohibited from off-campus recruiting. The council proposal also would make it illegal for them to make telephone or mail contact with prospects.

If the schools give their OK, part

of the secrecy also will be removed from enforcement proceedings. One proposal would make the final report of the Infractions Committee available to the news media as soon as it is given to the school. Another would allow the NCAA to correct erroneous media reports about an investigation.

The Council is sponsoring the measures at the request of the Infractions Committee and the enforcement staff.

"With so many states having open records and public disclosure laws, many institutions have had to release the final report as soon as they got it anyway," said Steve MacLennan, assistant executive director for enforcement.

"Now we'll be in a position where all institutions are handled similarly," Morgan said. "It will also keep things from coming out in a piecemeal fashion. As soon as the

Names will be deleted from the reports distributed to the media, Morgan said.

Football coaches and basketball coaches may end up with more free time if delegates vote to slash their recruiting seasons. In football, contacts with high school stars would be limited to between Dec. 1 and the Saturday after the first national letter-of-intent signing day, usually the second Wednesday in February. The evaluation, or scouting period would be limited in football to the month of November and May 21.

Basketball coaches could contact high school prospects from Sept. 17 to Oct. 7 and between March 1 and the first letter-of-intent signing day, usually in mid-April. Evaluation visits from coming out in a piecemeal fashion. As soon as the

The 184 Division II schools will vote on whether to adopt the Proposition 48 freshmen eligibility requirements which went into effect last August in Division I.

- Make it legal for a coach to watch his or her offspring play in a game outside the official evaluation period.
- Allow players to give their complimentary game passes to anyone they wish, not just relatives or other students.
- Allow high school prospects to receive medals at track meets such as the Penn Relays.

Rifle team out at WSU; more cutbacks expected

PULLMAN, Wash. (AP) — Decades of tradition will end if Washington State University discontinues its rifle program, a move Coach Les Vances says is likely under an athletic department push to equalize the number of men's and women's sports.

The WSU program has a long and storied history, having won the national championship in 1933 when it was run by the ROTC.

It has been under the auspices of athletics since 1961.

Yance said Cougar Athletic Director Dick Young spoke with him

about eliminating the squad shortly after an Athletic Council meeting Dec. 19.

"There has been no final decision or announcement on anything, but Dick was probably 99.9 percent sure it would go and we wanted to be known as soon as possible," Yance said Tuesday.

However, Young, reached Tuesday in Pasadena, Calif., said no decision has been made.

"We are still in the process of administering the program," he said. "There will be a decision made on a curtailment of a couple sports after

the first of the year."

Young would not comment on reports about "any sports targeted for elimination."

Other sports reportedly being considered for elimination are women's gymnastics, women's swimming, men's and women's tennis, and men's and women's golf.

WSU dropped wrestling following the 1985-86 season.

Stanton Schmidt, WSU's vice president for university relations and Young's supervisor, said Wednesday that some sports will be eliminated, but declined to say which ones or

how many. He said a decision would be announced late next week.

Vance said his program, which counts only as a men's sport in the eyes of the National Collegiate Athletic Association even though about half the team members are women, was being cut to keep the number of men's and women's sports at WSU equal.

Dropping rifle would leave the school with eight men's sports and nine women's sports, and it would appear a women's program would

be cut on the way out.

Tennis Coach Rex Davis said he was told by Young that tennis was still alive.

Davis said he was under the impression he and Vance were the only two coaches Young had talked with after the Athletic Council meeting.

Council members debated several proposals to remedy the athletic department's fiscal 1986-87 budget deficit of \$250,000, but reached no conclusion.

Vance said Young told him the ri-



fle squad was not being cut for financial reasons. Rifle's budget was about \$24,000 for 1986-87.

Sore-armed veteran Ryan must contend with hometown hero in Kosar

In Chicago, the Redskins will have

to battle the ferocious Bears' defense with a banged up offensive line. Tackle Joe Jacoby has a broken bone in his right hand while guard Russ Grimm has a bruised rib cage and an assortment of nagging injuries.

Jacoby jokes about his injury, which will force him to wear a cast on his hand.

"On the positive side," he said, "this cuts down my chances of holding by 50 percent."

Grimm, who will battle William "The Refrigerator" Perry, said he isn't worried about playing with a bruised rib cage.

"They pay you to play football," he said. "It comes with the game."

Grimm said the Redskins don't plan to alter their offense against the Bears, who set an NFL record for fewest points allowed in a 16-game season.

"We don't vary our offense to who we're playing," he said. "It got us to the playoffs, so we're not going to make any drastic changes."

On Sunday, the 49ers and Patriots will try to avenge regular-season losses.

San Francisco led 17-0 at halftime before the Giants rallied for a 21-17 victory. Denver also rallied in the second half to beat New England 27-20.

USA down to its last chance in America's Cup semifinals

FREMANTLE, Australia (AP) — Dennis Conner and Chris Dickson were to set sail Friday, each looking for a victory that would set up a Stars & Stripes-New Zealand meeting in the America's Cup challenger finals.

Both boats have 3-0 leads in the best-of-seven semifinals to pick a challenger for the 133-year-old trophy.

Conner, a man with a mission to capture the cup he lost in 1983, meets San Francisco's Tom Blackaller, who captains USA, in what could be their last meeting. Conner's Stars & Stripes, based in San Diego, profited from a mistake by Blackaller in the first race and kindly wind shifts in the second but won the third simply because by being faster.

Dickson, a 25-year-old who has only been sailing 12-meter yachts for two years, has the dominant lead over French Kiss. New Zealand has been a superbatt throughout the competition having won 36 of 37 races since eliminations began in October.

France's Marc Pajot has an above average 12-meter but the boat has died when the wind has. When winds are above 20 knots, French Kiss has been competitive with New Zealand,

Both Conner and Dickson have won genuine thrillers, something rare for Cup racing which usually has more spectacle than excitement. Dickson ended the old year practicing and began the new one doing more of the same.

Conner, who began preparing for this showdown almost from the moment he lost the cup to Australia in Newport, R.I. in 1983, says New Zealand is the "favorite."

He concedes, however, his boat is "a little faster" than it was in October.

New year arrives on tiptoe

Even 1987's first babies wait for afternoon births on quiet day

TWIN FALLS — Dreams of a white Christmas materialized instead on New Year's Day as rain and snow fell across Idaho on Thursday.

The Idaho State Police issued a storm warning for New Year's Day for southern Idaho. Fluffy flakes began falling about noon in Twin Falls, and as temperatures warmed, the snow turned to rain.

Two to four inches of snow were forecast for the Twin Falls area with 6-10 inches predicted for the mountains, according to the ISP.

Injured were 44-year-old Grace Ellen Davis, 87-year-old Ben Davis and 34-year-old Dale Davis, all of Eden. The three were taken to Magic Valley Regional Medical Center. Grace Davis and her husband, Ben Davis, were admitted and listed in satisfactory condition, MVRMC officials said.

Hopkins said both men were planned in the 1980 Chevrolet pickup truck for 15 minutes while emergency crews from the Eden-Hazelton Quick Response Unit worked to free them.

The accident was the only one reported in the area.

Although streets were slushy and wet, the Twin Falls Police said there were no accidents and no problems on New Year's Day.

Twin Falls residents also observed New Year's Eve with restraint, at least enough to keep out of trouble, police said. Police received

several complaints of wild parties and fights, but police said no arrests were made and no accidents were reported.

The storm systems from the Pacific finally spelled some relief for skiers. The storm brought a good chance of snow to the north and a chance of snow to the south through Thursday night, the National Weather Service said.

Although a slight chance of snow showers was forecast for early this morning, the storm was expected to clear out by today. However, another Pacific storm is on the way for Saturday.

The Idaho State Police cautioned drivers to be careful. In addition to slick streets, patches of fog were expected in the early morning in the valleys.

The only excitement of the day came in the form of the year's first babies to be born in the valley.

Gooding County last to convert to computer system

GOODING — Gooding County became the last of Idaho's 44 counties to begin using a computer for county business with the installation of an IBM system this week.

County Clerk John Myers said last week money from revenue sharing had been budgeted for this purpose and "had to be used before October" or the money would return to the federal government.

"We are the very last county (in Idaho) to get a computer system," he said. "The new computer, with terminals at each county office, will be used for budgeting payroll, voter registration and jury pools as well as property tax rolls, tax levy schedules and motor vehicle registrations, Myers said. Some court records, such as traffic tickets, and all clerk's office bookkeeping will also be done on the new system, he said.

IBM of Twin Falls was the only bidder on the project, which will include the main computer, several terminals and a printer. The county notified all clients the computer system will be done in the Magic Valley, but received only IBM's bid, Myers said.

County Assessor Doyle Pugmire will begin transferring his records and the clerk's office will begin transferring payroll records to the

computer immediately, Myers said. All other departments will then follow, he said.

In other business at the Board of Commissioners December meeting, the commission signed an agreement with Gooding city and Camas County to work together in applying for Economic Development Administration grants.

The agreement, coordinated by the Region IV Development Association, will help qualify both counties for federal grants, though Herring, executive director of the association, told the commission. Gooding County has too low an unemployment rate — 6 percent — to qualify. Camas County has a 17 percent unemployment rate, which does qualify for the federal aid, but the county's approximately 700 person census is too low to participate in the grants, he said. Combining the two counties will qualify both, Herring explained.

Gooding city has been pursuing an EDA grant for several months, hoping to establish an industrial park on the northeast edge of town and install a much-needed water storage tank.

City Mayor Gene Heller calls the storage tank "a critical need" for improving water service throughout the city and making sure sufficient water and pressure would be available to fight fires in the city.

Murderer refuses Fuller for attorney

JEROME — Convicted murderer Jimmie Charboneau doesn't want Greg Fuller, his new court-appointed attorney, to represent him in his death-sentence appeal, according to a statement filed by Fuller late Tuesday afternoon in 5th District Court.

Charboneau, a 25-year-old former rodeo performer, told Fuller he wanted Jim May of Twin Falls to continue to represent him, or he wanted no one at all. May, who was hired by Charboneau's relatives, altered the murder conviction, was recently sworn in as a new 5th District Court judge.

As a result of Charboneau's statements, Fuller, a Jerome lawyer, is requesting an order from the court confirming his appointment, or one releasing him from the case. A hearing will be held Tuesday on the request.

Charboneau is appealing the death sentence he received for the death of his ex-wife, Marilyn Arbaugh, whose bullet-ridden body was found on July 1, 1984, at her Jerome County ranch. Charboneau couldn't be reached for comment Wednesday. An unidentified State Penitentiary official said it was against policy to put telephone calls through to inmates.

In his affidavit, Fuller stated he and associate Dan Mink talked with Charboneau Dec. 19 at the prison.

Three days earlier Fuller had been appointed by 5th District Judge Phillip Becker to represent Charboneau.

During the interview, Charboneau told Fuller he didn't want him as his attorney. Charboneau said he felt Fuller was involved in a "conspiracy with Jerome County against him because Chief Deputy Sheriff Larry Webb was aware of Fuller's appointment before Fuller was actually appointed," stated the affidavit.

Webb couldn't be reached for comment Wednesday.

Charboneau also told Fuller, "that he felt that Jim May should still be

required by the court to represent him and that if Jim May was not going to represent him, that he wished to represent himself."

May, who will begin his new judicial duties the first of the year in Halley, couldn't be reached for comment Wednesday afternoon.

Charboneau said he felt Fuller was involved in a 'conspiracy with Jerome County against him ...'

Fuller said he filed the affidavit to "keep everything above board." He wanted to apprise the court of Charboneau's feelings, "partially because the case is a capital offense with a 'man's life' at stake."

Charboneau has already had a line of attorneys who have represented him at various stages in his case.

Twin Falls attorney Randy Stoker, who is Jerome County's public defender, was appointed originally by the court to represent Charboneau.

Stoker was replaced by private attorney Golden Bennett of Twin Falls, who was hired by Charboneau's mother.

Stoker returned to the case after Charboneau fired Bennett, and saw the case through the May 1985 trial in Boise. May, a former private Twin Falls attorney, took over after the trial.

Most recently, Fuller was appointed by the District Court because Charboneau was indigent.

Charboneau was convicted of first-degree murder May 2, 1985. He was sentenced to death in January 1986 and a Dec. 10 execution date was set later in the year. Under Idaho law, however, an appeal to the Idaho Supreme Court is automatic and delayed the execution.

TWIN FALLS — Jack Knutson rang in the New Year with a new job and the hope for a new life.

His dream of becoming a dishwasher was realized last week when the owners of the Prime Cut Restaurant in Twin Falls called and offered him a job.

"I still want to be a janitor, but this is nice," he said.

Before Christmas, the 20-year-old Knutson was found sleeping in a cave near the Singing Bridge by Twin Falls police. Since then, area residents have rallied to his aid.

"If anyone needs a pat on the back, it's Edith Schmidt," said Prime Cut owner Bob Henry on New Year's Eve. "She really helped."

Schmidt, owner of the Dunes Motel, befriended Knutson and others like him who have drifted into her motel when they were down on

their luck. Since Christmas, she has given Knutson a free room.

Now, he will be a paying customer. In addition to giving him a job as a dishwasher, the Henrys also will be paying for part of his rent at the Dunes.

The Henrys also gave Knutson a 10-speed bike, and Gem Linen Supply donated two uniforms so he could go to work, Henry said.

"Everyone in town's kind of pulled together on this," Henry said, "and not just because it's Christmas."

Knutson began work last Friday. Already, he has beaten the average time for dishwashing by 15 minutes in his first week, Henry said.

"I don't want to push him too hard, but maybe in 6 months to a year, he can work up to being a cook," Henry said.

Henry said the idea of hiring Knutson was his wife's idea.

"Fog told me, 'Let's put this boy to work,'" Henry said. "I think it's what God wanted us to do."

Democrat decries partisanship in Iran fallout

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Some Democrats in Congress, after seeing President Reagan's popularity soar for the past six years despite administration programs they oppose, may feel he is getting his just deserts with the Iran-Contragate scandal.

Rep. Richard Stallings, the second-term Democrat from Idaho's 2nd Congressional District, said he lost one of them.

"That's a partisan point of view, but that's not a productive point of view," Stallings said. "We cannot afford another drawn-out Watergate."

Stallings told the Idaho Falls Rotary Club on Wednesday that it's time for former National Security Council director John Poindexter and NSO aide Lt. Col. Oliver North to quit taking the 5th Amendment. He said they should let the American people and Congress know the real story surrounding the arms agreement with Iran in exchange for hostages, as well as the diversion of funds to help the Contras in

Nicaragua.

"What we've seen is information by press leaks," Stallings said. "It's kind of like an ongoing soap opera; you open the paper each day to find the latest on the Iran scandal. That's a lousy way of doing business."

But the former Ricks College history professor said events so far have cast the president in a no-win situation.

"If the president was aware of what was going on, he could find himself with some of the same problems of (former President) Nixon. He didn't know what was going on and a lieutenant colonel is making major foreign policy decisions, then he's got some problems with competence."

Stallings described Reagan as one of the "least active" presidents in modern times.

"And that's not meant to be a criticism," Stallings said. "He got away with it in his first term, because he had some good people."

But Stallings said the president began to have problems when he replaced the likes of Jim Baker with Donald Regan, who has little perception of leadership or power.

"He was given the authority and he abused it," Stallings said.

Up until recently, the White House has not acknowledged there was a serious problem, Stallings said. But he added that the success of the Reagan administration in the next two years may hinge on whether he is candid with the American people.

He said it also will be up to the president to set the tone for the 100th Congress, which convenes next week.

"We can spend next year arguing and fighting over the Iran-Contragate mess, or we can get on with some legislative business and do what has to be done with agriculture and some of the other issues," Stallings said. "The direction we go really is in the hands of the president."

Salt Lake City mayor urges Khashoggi to pay Triad debts

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — Mayor Palmer DePaulis is urging Saudi Arabian businessman Adnan Khashoggi, who has emerged as a figure in the U.S.-Iran arms scandal, to repay creditors left stranded by the unfinished Triad project.

Khashoggi's development company, Triad America Corp., has been sued by several creditors who are owed some \$300 million. Company officials have said only that Triad is experiencing cash-flow problems.

Khashoggi and two of his Triad partners have been linked to the controversial deal in which the U.S. sold arms to Iran. Testimony before a congressional investigating com-

mittee tied Khashoggi, Donald Fraser and Ernest Miller together in financing part of the arms deal during 1983 and early 1986.

In 1982, Triad announced it was launching a \$400 million, three-block project in downtown Salt Lake City. However, only a portion of the project has been completed.

DePaulis said he had no authority to force Khashoggi to repay Triad's creditors or to honor his promised donations to various organizations, including LDS Hospital.

However, the mayor said: "Mr. Khashoggi, you have made commitments to our city. We have some creditors out there who have not

been paid. This community is looking to you to pay those creditors.

"The only way to take care of it is to stand up and pay these people," DePaulis said.

The mayor said Salt Lake City has been harmed by the stalled development.

"I get calls from people all the time wondering what's going on (with Triad)," he said. "It could stifle development in the future if we don't get this behind us."

Khashoggi has said he lent Iran about \$15 million to pay for the U.S. arms shipments early last year, but was only repaid about \$5 million of that.

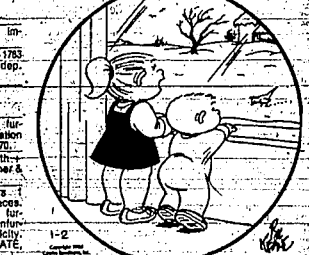

 South lost to a very unlucky combination in today's trump suit. Nevertheless, his loss was not all due to bad luck. A no-cost insurance policy was available-but he became more careful in his play.

East took his heart ace and returned a heart to South's king. With an obvious diamond loser still to come, South rushed to dummy to try the trump finesse. West took his singleton king gratefully, and now South had to lose one more trump trick to go with his losing diamond. It was one down on a hand that should have been made.

It's true that the trump distribution was a foul one, but a safety play in trumps would have solved the problem.
 Since South can afford one trump loser, he must concentrate on avoiding the loss of two. If the trumps prove to be 3-2, any reasonable play will win. But if trumps are 4-1, South should first cash his ace of trumps.

In today's layout, West's singleton king drops and the defenders get only three tricks. Had West held a small singleton instead of the king, the result would be the same. South could cross to dummy twice to lead trumps past East's K-10-x, and the defenders would get the same three tricks.

Dr. Ruth: Sex is 'very interesting'

Ruth Westheimer, or Dr. Ruth as she prefers to be called, has become the guru of sex and a household phenomenon, the subject of jokes and impersonations of her rolling "r" and contagious giggle.

"It is hard to believe what has taken place in the past few years," she says. "I never dreamed it would be like this."

Westheimer was in Sun Valley to address the Sun Valley Ski School, of which she is an honorary member, and deliver a lecture as part of a series sponsored by Sun Valley Company.

The diminutive doctor of psychology said she hasn't always been this frank about sex. In fact, she said it was all by chance.

"When I had finished my master's degree in psychology I volunteered to work at Planned Parenthood. After six days I said 'Aha! now here is something that is very interesting.'"

Her interest led to a doctorate and a radio program, "Good Sex," that aired at midnight once a week. The program is now nationally syndicated and Dr. Ruth has made the move to television. But she insists her program is much more than light entertainment or just a forum for people to talk about sex.

"I believe people need to take responsibility for their own sexual actions," she says.

At 4 feet, 7 inches tall, the sandy-haired mother, grandmother and wife of 23 years is probably the only person who could shake her finger at America and say, "Take responsibility for your actions." But with that unflinching approach she has hooked her audience and they are listening.

Westheimer says what she has to say does not always make everyone happy but she feels she needs to tell it straight.

"Like my views on abortion," she says. "I think abortion should be legal or only the rich will have abortions and abortionists will be back in business. And I would say that in Salt Lake City or at a Jesuit convention."

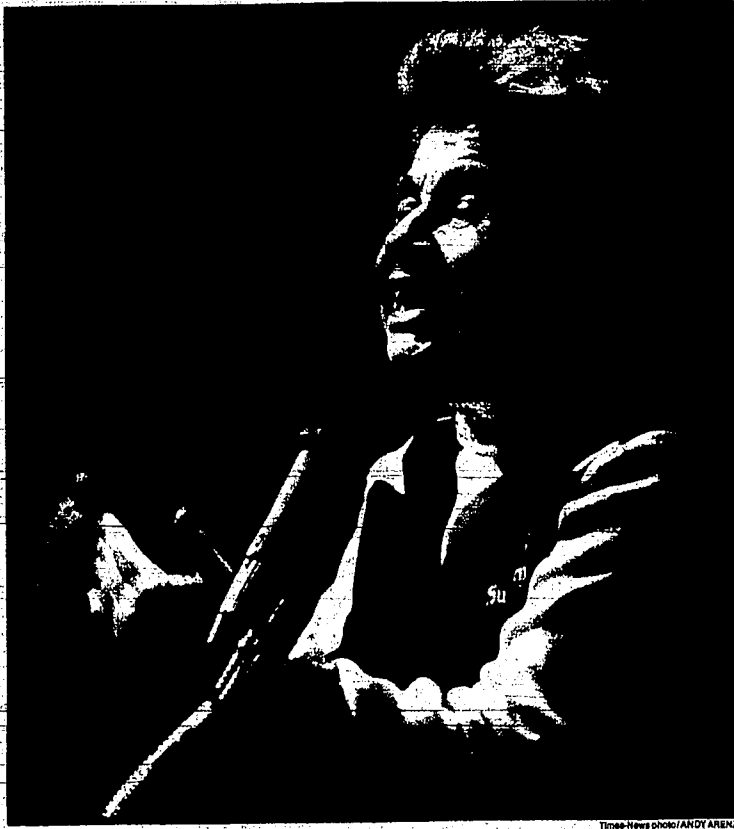
Another subject close to Westheimer is the use of contraceptives. She said if a caller to her program confesses a sexual problem and is not using contraceptives she will advise him or her to do so tomorrow and go on to the next caller.

Westheimer says it all goes much further than just physical sex. She says it has bearing on the family, compatibility and the "whole picture."

"Most of the problems that people encounter are because of sexual ignorance and preconceptions about sex," she says. "It is a matter of education."

But there is still a light side to the person and the job that makes it all come together. A blend of nervous laughter that turns genuine and a respect for

Cable TV picks up A&E

Video cable shuffles programs, channels

TWIN FALLS — King Videocable is bringing back the Arts and Entertainment network and is shuffling programming among five stations after surveying Magic Valley viewers.

Arts and Entertainment, which specializes in performing arts and movie classics, will appear on cable channel 20 on area systems.

Several hundred customers petitioned us to return A&E, so we responded," King Videocable manager Chris Talkington said. Arts and Entertainment had shared channel 3 with Nickelodeon until 1985, when Nickelodeon extended its broadcasting hours.

Nickelodeon and five other channels also were to move on Jan. 1, Talkington announced earlier this week. The cable system is making the changes to gain more variety on the basic channels 2 through 13, which all subscribers can receive with standard television sets.

Stations from 13 through 26 — with the exception of three pay television services — are available to subscribers owning "cable-ready" sets. Others must obtain a converter.

Many of the programming changes resulted from a November survey of customers' viewing preferences, Talkington said.

Stations being switched and channel assignments, in numerical order, are:

1. Nashville Network — to channel 2 from 15. Nashville Network airs country music and related programs.

2. USA Network — to channel 9 from 1. One of the "big four" satellite services, USA offers general programs and movies. "Customer surveys convinced us Nashville and USA deserved better placement on the TV dial," Talkington said.

3. KBCI — to channel 15 from 2. KBCI, the CBS affiliate in Boise, was being preempted to protect the local CBS affiliate, KMVT. For those hours, Cable News Network was shown instead of KBCI. Talkington said moving KBCI added variety.

4. Nickelodeon — to channel 16 from 3. Although popular enough to keep, the recent survey showed Nickelodeon to have a smaller following than expected.

5. C-SPAN — to channel 28 from 20. C-SPAN will become available on 28 in Twin Falls. Kimbrell said it was some time in January, but will not be available in other towns for some time.

'Song of the South' hits sour racial notes

By the latest account, Walt Disney's "Song of the South" has grossed about \$16 million in its 40th-anniversary release this year, playing to millions of children across the United States.

But who could take an accurate account of the social and psychological damage done by the racial stereotypes and sentimental inaccuracies contained in this cinematic relic? The portrayal of happy-go-lucky blacks, well-nurtured on Southern plantations by benevolent whites, was already outdated when the film was first released five years ago. Four decades of racial progress have seemingly gone unrecognized.

"Song of the South" was the fulfillment of Walt Disney's childhood dream to bring the Uncle Remus tales, written by Joel Chandler Harris, to the screen, a Disney press release says.

Like Harris' original tales, "Song of the South" suffers from a split between the original black material and the Old South myths tattooed onto it by his later white interpreters.

The Uncle Remus tales, which focus on the exploits of a trickster called Brer Rabbit, are among the earliest examples of black oral narrative in American literature. As the framing device for the tales, Harris invented the sympathetic bard Uncle Remus, whose tales help a young boy solve his problems. The Disney film continues Harris' method of interpreting and rewriting a black narrative.

When first released, "Song of the South" refined Disney's technique of mixing live action with animation. During most of the film, however, the animated Brer Rabbit material, to which few have objected, accounts for only 30 percent of the film. "Song of the South's" damage comes in the remaining 70 percent, a highly seductive yet ultimately troubling conversational portrait of the South in which Uncle Remus tells his tales.

Commentary

In 1946, filmgoers were outraged; having mistakenly assumed that Hollywood had outgrown the demeaning prewar stereotypes and had finally repudiated the idyllic version of Southern master-servant relations. At the film's New York premiere in Times Square, dozens of black and white pickets chanted, "We fought for Uncle Sam, not Uncle Tom." The National Association for the Advancement of Colored People called for a total boycott of the film, the National Negro Congress called on blacks to "run the picture out of the area." Even such Disney partisans as Bosley Crowther of The New York Times chastised it as a "sublimely unreconstructed fancy of the Old South... with the Negroes bowing and scraping and singing spirituals in the night."

Disney Studios had moments of indecision about reissuing the film. The trade paper Variety said that the studio announced in 1970 that "Song of the South" had been "permanently" withdrawn from circulation. But two years later, it was re-released. It was reissued again in 1980. A Disney official said "Song of the South" is now part of the studio's classic reissue program, along with such films as "Sleeping Beauty," "101 Dalmatians" and "Fantasia," each of which is re-released for new generations of children about every seven years.

The film's most recent run, which started in October, was met with no organized opposition and the studio apparently received little criticism for its decision. In continuing to reissue "Song of the South," however, Disney perpetuates myths of plantation life (kind master, contented servant, pastoral harmony) that had been convincingly exposed and rejected well before 1946.

The implicit and explicit untruths of "Song of

the South" are made to seem both comforting and entertaining. In this respect, the film resembles "The Birth of a Nation" and "Gone With the Wind," in which movie magic blinds the audience to historic facts. (In 1915, the Atlanta Journal's film critic rated the film alongside "Gone With the Wind" in its depiction of the South.)

In perhaps "Song of the South's" strangest and most memorable moment, Uncle Remus sings "Zip-a-Dee-Do-Deah," the song that won the film's only Academy Award. The rest of the story of the song are the ventriloquism of a white songwriter. We almost forget that the true songs of the South were defenses against beleaguering oppression.

The final irony of "Song of the South" is that Disney has misused or, at best, exploited the main points of Uncle Remus' parables. The African-derived tales that Harris transcribed on his Georgia plantation in the 1880s allowed the real plantation blacks to escape the humiliation inflicted on them by the plantation system. Brer Rabbit may seem gliblike — like Disney's plantation blacks — but this glib helps him survive. While Uncle Remus may seem like the "heart-warming, wise and benevolent plantation philosopher" that Disney publicity calls him, he at least has learned cunning from the tales that he tells.

During his lifetime, Walt Disney took pride in his films chronicling Americans who achieve prowess through a painful, inescapable obstacles. It would be gratifying to see Disney studios release a remake "Song of the South" featuring a black character fighting for heroic goals.

"The 'Song of the South II' that my children must one day see will depict a far more accurate 'Song' in a far less fictitious 'South.'"

THREE AMIGOS (PG). There is hardly a moment here that is not silly — make that incredibly, outrageously and breathtakingly silly. Maybe that is why the tale of a trio of alien-movie stars (Chevy Chase, Steve Martin, Martin Short) turned real-life heroes is such a goofy delight. It is like a cross be-

This flashy, fish-out-of-water, love-on-the-run chase-thriller is gorgeously shot by Michel Brault, and director Richard Preyer gives it flavor and pace, but it is the speed of a broken-down supercar heading into a wall. The derivative story — about a reckless Chicago cop, a fiery New Orleans hooker, and her psychotic crime car lover — has as much depth and character of two hours of Dungeons and Dragons. The dialogue plays like a canned-out Oliver Stone, and Richard Gere and Kim Basinger, though they undeniably sizzle, are burning in a

The reunited Enterprise — under the guidance of director Leonard Nimoy and Captain (excuse us, Admiral) James Kirk crew travel backward in time to a primitive era (our own) to rescue two humpback whales and thereby save Earth. There has been a conscious effort to lighten things up, after the "sturm und drang" of the first three movie "Star Treks" and the result will almost certainly be the best loved of the four: full of old-fashioned crackling Enterprise crew badinage and a lot more besides. Even audience members with a terminally small popcorn block should be amused.

U.S. citizen, began in 1983 and covered the period from 1981 to 1986. However, he said Sial was charged only with the 1982 violation and has agreed to pay all taxes, penalties and interest on all the years in question as part of the agreement.

Sial failed to report more than \$100,000 in 1982 income from both theaters, Ward said. "The skimmed money represents about 25 percent of the box-office total of the theaters, showing it is a very lucrative business indeed," he said.

Ward said that as part of the agreement, Sial agreed to permanently shut down his theaters and surrender his business license to the Salt Lake County attorney. Sial also agreed to remove the theater seats, screens and projectors from the Capitol West theaters, which closed for the holidays last

Monday, and to restrict any showings of sexually explicit material in either theater henceforth, Ward said.

Federal prosecutors agreed not to charge Sial for tax violations in 1981, 1983 and 1984 and will not recommend denaturalization, Ward said. He said U.S. District Judge David Sam, a corporation owned by Iqbal which operated the theaters, would enter pleas on state obscenity violations at an undetermined later date.

Sentencing on the felony tax evasion charge is scheduled for Feb. 5. U.S. District Judge David Sam. The offense carries a maximum penalty of five years imprisonment and a \$100,000 fine.

Ward said some people had suggested that shutting down the X-rated theaters will cause an influx of adult video cassettes. "However, we will prosecute them when we find them," he said. "The city, county, state and federal attorneys in Utah are aggressively prosecuting obscenity."

"I will be writing to each county and city executive in the Salt Lake Valley in the near future to recommend and encourage an immediate and thorough review of existing planning and zoning regulations," Ward said. "Now is a perfect time to make these regulations as strong as legally possible in order to discourage, if not bar, the purveyors of obscenity from seeking to locate here in the future."

'MVT Town' winners don't plan move to Texas; residents relax

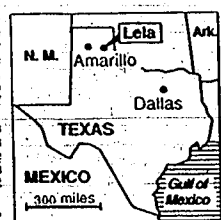

Pop-music writers pick old guard as setting the album pace in '86

The win, place and show positions in the Los Angeles Times pop-music writers' 1986 album poll clearly a sweep for the old guard. The male they are making these days might be fresh and adventurous, but one would need a calculator to total the years of experience under the belts of Peter Gabriel, Paul Simon and — a relative newcomer — Elvis Costello.

That is a sharp contrast to the '85 voting, which crowned "Tim" by the young Minnesota upstarts the Replacements (who did not release an album in '86).

Even fourth-place R.E.M., a spearhead of the American independent rock movement, is getting a bit long in the tooth now. "Peter Case," at No. 5, is the highest-ranking debut album, but he put in a lot of time performing and recording with the Pilsnauers, so the real rookie-of-the-year honors go to the Bodans, followed closely by the Jesus and Mary Chain, Steve Earle and the Pogues.

The balloting (which scores 10 points for a No. 1 vote, 9 for No. 2, etc.) bypasses the big commercial



albums of '86, including Lionel Richie, Bon Jovi, Madonna, Billy Ocean and Van Halen. And some veterans who can usually count on a nod or two — Bob Dylan, the Rolling Stones, Aretha Franklin, Neil Young, Lou Reed, Bob Seger — were entirely shut out.

But there were other conspicuous absences among artists whose past work invariably figured in the Top 15, like Talking Heads — Eurythmics and Prince. John Fogerty's follow-up to his big '85 comeback LP (No. 9 last year) did not register at all, and several one-time acts-to-watch (Big Country, Katrina and the Waves, Cyndi Lauper) dropped from sight.

Bruce Springsteen's "Born in the U.S.A.," in 1984 was the last album to enjoy critical and commercial unanimity as No. 1, and the fact that the Boss' live album made only seven of the 18 ballots is the most surprising result of this year's poll.

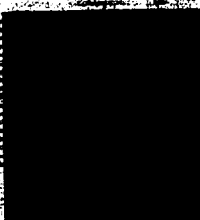
That kind of identification of the man with the role is a credit to Forsythe's ability to make his character totally believable. But it can also cause problems when you're trying to play somebody else.

Herzfeld admits to have had complications about casting Blake Carrington as Joe Leary. "I don't watch 'Dynasty,' but I caught John on 'Lifestyles of the Rich and Famous.' He was wearing jeans and a t-shirt, but when I met him, I thought, 'This is not the man I saw on TV.'"

For the role, Forsythe says he studied himself up, and drew on very old memories of a blue-collar uncle who mispronounced words.

The actor hopes "On Fire" is much more than a tour de force showing how versatile he is. "On Fire" has a message, says Forsythe, follows in his personal life.

"If I've learned one thing, and I hope the audience gets it too, it is that a man must have a wide variety of interests. He must not put all his eggs in his work basket. My life is made up of a lot more than playing Blake Carrington."

Vowing not to quit, NBC jolted by judgment for Wayne Newton

NEW YORK — The record \$19.3 million libel judgment that found NBC guilty of defaming entertainer Wayne Newton "jolted" NBC News, but the division's investigative reporting will not stop, the president of NBC News said Thursday.

Larry Grossman made his comment in an interview a day after a federal jury in Las Vegas concluded that NBC News defamed Newton in three broadcasts in 1980 and 1981 by linking him to organized crime figures.

After the verdict, NBC's chief lawyer in the case, Floyd Abrams, told reporters in Las Vegas that NBC would file an appeal, and added: "If this verdict were to be upheld, it would chill investigative reporting throughout the country."

Asked Thursday about that, Grossman said that "obviously you can't get hit with a \$19 million verdict and have people say that your investigative reporters went out of their way to defame somebody and

not be jolted by it."
However, he also said that "it's certainly not the result of all this we're not going to do any (more) investigative reporting. But I can't help but believe that it has some effect... in both print and broadcast journalism."

"There's got to be some concern (about the verdict)," Grossman added. "I mean, you don't operate in a vacuum." The Newton award against NBC was the highest ever made in a case involving news coverage, said Henry Kaufman, general counsel of the Libel Defense Resource Center, an information center that Kaufman said is supported by various news organizations, including the three networks.

There have been higher judgments against publications — \$25 million against Penthouse magazine and two totaling \$40 million against Hustler magazine — but those awards did not involve news and later were overturned, he said.

Kaufman said that a study of libel judgments against news organizations in recent years shows "that

"every judgment in excess of \$1 million has been overturned."

He said that about 75 percent of the libel cases his center studied either were thrown out on appeal or the damage awards were reduced.

Kaufman said that he agreed with Abrams about the impact of the Newton award, should it be upheld: "I'm sure that if an award of this size were to be affirmed, it would certainly chill — if not freeze, as some people put it — investigative reporting."

"The greatest impact," he added, would be on smaller news organizations "that lacked the financial resources of major publications and the networks."

There was one notable dissenter to Abrams' warning: Don Hewitt, executive producer of CBS News' high-rated "60 Minutes."

"I've been hearing about chilling things for the last 10 years," Hewitt said. "I never caught cold from any of them."

His program has been sued about 30 times, he said, and has not lost a case yet. He said that he did not know what the NBC News broadcasts had said about Newton that prompted the singer to file suit.

"I don't know what they said or on what authority they said it," he said. However, he added regarding the potential chill on investigative reporting that Abrams referred to, "I don't have the shivers... We're not doing anything different from what we always do. I haven't seen anything change here."

And, he said, "I don't automatically have one of those Pavlov's dogs reactions where I automatically side with journalists. I don't happen to believe that journalists are God's chosen people."

ABC flips Friday prime time shows

WASHINGTON — ABC Entertainment on Dec. 22 announced one very small step to bolster its flagging Friday schedule: Starting Jan. 9, it will flip-flop "Gung Ho" from 9:30 p.m. Friday to 9 p.m., while "Dads" moves from 9 p.m. Friday to 9:30 p.m. Friday.

In their first two outings against "Dallas" and "Miami Vice" in the 9-to-10 p.m. time slot, "Gung Ho" (which may be soon forgotten) has averaged a 7.8 national Nielsen rating and a 15 percent audience share, "Dads," a 9.0-15 (each rating point represents 874,000 TV homes).

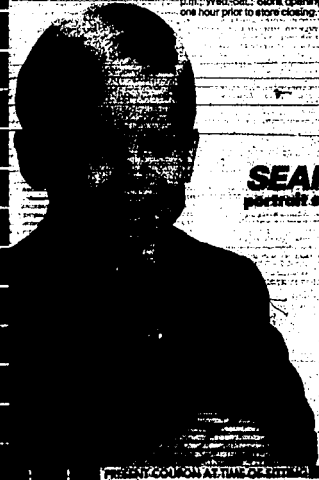

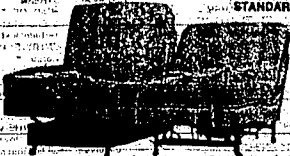

Hugh Downs recalls his 10,000 hours on camera in new book

LOS ANGELES — Hugh Downs estimates he's spent 10,000 hours on television. That figures out to more than a year — nearly 60 weeks of nonstop talking, 24 hours a day.

"I've worked on so many different shows and done so many shows at the same time," Downs said in an interview. "I once said I'd done everything on radio and television except play-by-play sports. Then I remembered I'd covered a boxing match in Lima, Ohio, in 1939."

He was host of NBC's "Home Show" in the 1950s. He was Jack Paar's sidekick on NBC's "The Tonight Show" for five years. He was host of the daytime game show "Concentration" for 11 years. He was host of NBC's "Today Show" for nine years.

He is currently co-host of ABC's "20/20."

"This is the first time in my whole TV career I've only done one program at a time," he said. "Maybe I was insecure in the past and didn't want all my eggs in one basket. That's how I racked up 10,000 hours."

Johnny Carson, host of "The Tonight Show" for nearly 25 years, has logged only 7,100 hours, according to Downs. "But Carson never did 10 hours a week on one show and another show at the same time."

Downs tells about his many hours on the air in "On Camera: My 10,000 Hours on Television," published by Putnam. The book, like Downs, is low-key, charming, amiable and non-controversial.

It's not the first book from Downs, who recalls that, "rather arrogantly in my '30s" in 1957, he wrote an

autobiography. He told of a 1963 sailing voyage across the Pacific in "A Shoal of Stars" in addition to other books.

Downs was asked if any of his 10,000 hours on the air stands out in his mind.

"One high point of my broadcasting career was being in the antarctic and moving the South Pole because it was in the wrong place," he recalled. "I'd know about the measurements and followed the expeditions during the International Geophysical Year in 1957. They got it to within an area of 75 feet. Roald Amundsen, using a sextant, pinpointed it within three miles in 1911."

"When I got there, they knew where the South Pole was within 20 inches. I asked if I could be the man to move it. It was half a joke, but they went for it. So, on Dec. 10, 1982, I picked up the bamboo pole and moved it to the correct location. I walked around the pole. I went around it in 24 steps, each step in a different time zone."

He said the location has been moved, since then because of the drift of the polar ice cap.

Downs began his broadcasting career at the age of 18 as a \$12-a-week announcer on a small Ohio radio station. He worked in radio un-

til television came along. He was an announcer in Chicago for "Kukla, Fran & Ollie" and "Hawkins Falls," which he said was television's first soap opera. In 1954, he went to New York for "The Home Show."

Downs has a passion for sailing. "My kids gave me a Plath sextant for my birthday," he said. "I used it to navigate across the Pacific. Almost 20 years to the month after that, I used that same sextant to run the Marlon-Bermuda race. I was a little rusty and a shade nervous. The potential for missing Bermuda and winding up in Spain was tremendous."

Downs divides his time between homes in Arizona and New York. "I travel a lot," he said. "My wife travels with me. We hope to be in Spain at the end of this year for a piece on Segovia for '20/20'."

He is co-host of "20/20" with Barbara Walters, who was also his partner during part of his time on "The Today Show." About once a month he will do one of the features.

"I'm interested in science, the environment, medicine and certain personalities," he said. "I just do the stories I want to do. I don't want to be just the anchor. If I didn't do any I would look deadwood, but if I did too many, it would like I was trying to be Mike Wallace."

Television in 1986: Year ranged from good, to bad, to outright ugly

HOLLYWOOD — What kind of TV year was 1986? Rather typical, a year of the Good, the Bad and the Ugly.

• Good: "It's Gary Shandling's Show," the inventive, gloriously whimsical and outright hilarious Showtime series that was the best comedy to premiere — anywhere — last fall.

• Bad: Grant Tinker resigning his job as NBC chairman. Who would have thought that one man could make such a difference and be able to flip-flop a network's fortunes? But Tinker did just that, turning a ton of into a prince, enriching stockholders as well as viewers.

• Ugly: New NBC President Robert C. Wright's goofy memo suggesting that the network may form a political action committee to which all NBC employees — including those in the news division — would contribute money, lest "their dedication to the company" be ques-

tioned. NBC News President Larry Grossman was correct in telling Wright that the news division would not participate.

• Good: TV coverage of last February's Philippines elections that led to the ouster of Ferdinand E. Marcos and emergence of Corason Aquino as the nation's leader. TV cameras at polling places at once provided a living record of election fraud by Marcos forces and enabled Americans to watch the death of a corrupt regime.

• Bad: Liberty Week-Weekend. This was real Statue of Liberty nuttiness on TV, everything you didn't want to know about Lady Liberty and her 100th birthday — and then some — swollen by commercialism and hyperbole.

• Ugly: Two doses of Geraldo Rivera, America's video commando, first searching for non-existent booty in Al Capone's vaults and then playing Junior G. Man by beaming an orgy of live TV drug busts into our homes. What luck! Some of those arrested even turned out to be guilty.

• Good: "The Vanishing Family Crisis in Black America," the Bill Moyers' brilliant, sensitive, provocative CBS documentary that was as controversial as it was illuminating.

• Bad: Pamela's dream, that "Dallas" concocted to account for the return of Bobby Ewing (Patrick Duffy) to Ewington. The dream device allowed "Dallas" to erase the previous season's story lines, including Bobby's death. Forget about who shot R. In the fall of 1986, who wanted to shoot the producers?

• Ugly: The attempt of Los Angeles-based Harmony Gold to hide the participation of state-run South African TV in the production of "Shaka Zulu," a syndicated miniseries whose blacks-against-blacks historical focus may have given a distorted impression of today's South Africa. Of course, "Shaka Zulu" did take place in the 19th Century, when it was the white-minority government would like to keep the na-

tion's black majority.

• Good: The broadcast work of Al Michaels and Tim McCarver during ABC's coverage of the American League Championship Series.

• Bad: College basketball's new three-point shot, a 19-9 cheapie that alters the game and thereby detracts from basketball telecasts. Move it out to 23 feet. That's an order!

• Ugly: The fiscally motivated media hype of Chicago Bear William "The Refrigerator" Perry and overexposure of CBS Sports commentator-commercial spokesman you name it on TV and he does it. John Madden. As a TV personality, the 300-pound-plus "Refrigerator" is finally in deep freeze, but Madden lives on... and on... and on.

• Good: "Promise," a scintillating CBS production, with magnificent performances by James Woods and James Garner, as two flawed brothers, one a pitiful schizophrenic and the other trying to honor his vow to look after his afflicted brother.

• Bad: "Harem," an ABC movie memorable for its rewriting of Turkish history and casting of big-burly Yaphet Kotto as a eunuch.

• Ugly: Lynne Cheney, head of the National Endowment for the Humanities, withholding the last installment of grant money for a controversial PBS series titled "The Africans" because she didn't like some of the things it said.

• Good: "A Year in the Life," NBC's simply grand, irresistible miniseries about a family's eclectic, tumultuous year in Seattle. A possible future series — superbly written, directed and performed. Wow!

• Bad: The deployment of a studio audience as a sort of living laugh-booster-and-howl track in "NFL 86," NBC's Sunday pregame show hosted by Bob Costas.

• Ugly: PBS announcing plans for an internal review of its programming after 53 members of Congress demanded a "content analysis" of PBS programming, charging it with liberal-bias. PBS should have bowed to the pressure. And the Congressional 50 should not have exerted pressure. Charge them with a bias toward censorship.

• Good: Risk-taking commercial TV: The elite includes ABC's "Moonlighting," NBC's "St. Elsewhere" and the late "Joe Bash." Danny Arnold's unique comedy... uh, dram... uh (well, whatever it was) that lasted about

as long as "It Takes Two" read the sentence. ABC took a quick exit then canceled this outrageous different series about a soul cop wandering New York City.

• Bad: Vanna White, ma'am. The United States has many heroes and heroines. Yet Americans have chosen to worship a woman whose biggest achievement has been to raise irrelevance to art while slipping letter cards on "Wheel of Fortune." What a PR creation! Her coming autobiography should be a blockbuster.

• Ugly: The brown lips of everyone who turns up in those old black-and-white movies colorized by Ted Turner.

• Good: Cable News Network and NBC's pictures of the explosion of Challenger at Cape Canaveral and TV coverage of the morning service for the astronauts who died in the fiery tragedy. A stirring video memorial.

• Bad: The continued suspension of post-season college football telecasts, featuring immediate teams with as many as five losses.

• Ugly: Political commercials that were unfair or dirty. That covered about 75 percent of them in some of the grubbier national election campaigns within memory.

• Good: Marlo Thomas' performance in CBS' "Nobody's Child" as Marie-Baller, who went on to get a master's degree from Harvard and spending nearly 20 years in a mental institution.

• Bad: "Sword of Gideon," a fictional HBO movie about Israel's vengeance for the 1972 Munich Olympics. The movie had a terrible message, that Israeli terrorists are noble and Arab terrorists are not.

• Ugly: Those sweeps creep whose unholy use of new programs as puffy test-ins with network commitment programs was aimed at ratings, not at imparting information.

• Good: "The Cavewoman," a refreshing new CBS sitcom that is good even when it's not all that good, which is seldom.

• Bad: "Mr. Bill's Real Life Adventures" on Showtime. The pitiful clay figure you'd love to squash a sitcom character as Dagwood. Bumstead! Oh, yessssssss.

• Ugly: Doug Clark of the fundamentalist Trinity Broadcasting Network for funding "salacious" anti-Christian seeds in media coverage of the Iran arms contract scandal that has caused problems for President Reagan.

CBN picks up tony 'Paper Chase'

NEW YORK (AP) — "Paper Chase," the high-toned serial about the pursuit of a law degree, has been picked up by the CBN Cable Network in hopes of producing some "upscale demographics."

CBN Cable, a for-profit subsidiary of the non-profit Christian Broadcasting Network, has acquired all 38 episodes of the program: 16 produced for CBS, six for PBS and 16 by Showtime.

John Houseman, who made his film acting debut in the movie and created what appears to be a life-

long persona as the intimidating Professor Charles Kingsfield Jr., also starred in the series. James Stephens, Tom Filizaimmons and James Keane were the struggling students in the TV version.

"This is part of a move by CBN to enhance its upscale demographics," said Earl Weirich, public relations director for the network.

Weirich said the series will begin running in September. CBN has exclusive rights for the first two years of a three-year agreement, he said.

VCRs come of age in '86, proof of viewers' increased selectivity

LOS ANGELES — Early in December two sixth-grade classes from an elementary school in East Los Angeles came downtown to tour the Los Angeles Times and meet a live editor.

On an impulse I asked the youngsters how many of their families had videocassette players. A bunch of hands went up. I looked at it at least three-quarters of the students were saying they had VCRs at home.

Their parents did the movie renting, they said, but frequently following orders, or requests, from the kids. "Ghostbusters" seemed to have been at the top of the year's hit parade, although one young man said that "Nightmare on Elm Street" had been seen at his house, and he shuddered pleasantly at the recollection.

Two classes as a sampling don't necessarily prove a point, and there may simply be a wizard salesman of VCRs in that immediate neighborhood. Yet it is a fair guess that on the long curve of history, 1986 will be identified as the year that the videocassette recorder ceased to be a novelty, or a luxury, and became a fact of American home life, right there with the television (or the televisions) and the handheld radios and fast-outdistancing the ghetto-blasters, which have begun to look archaic.

The penetration of the society by the VCR may well stand as the unique cultural aspect of 1986. It was, if you care to think of it that way, an assertion of free enterprise economics, in which volume, competition and manufacturing efficiency brought the retail price

significantly below \$360, hardly a third of what you expected to pay only a year or two ago.

(It is also significant, of course, that whatever the brand names, VCRs are virtually all made abroad, contributing to the balance of trade deficit and suggesting that the U.S. has exported the lessons of marketplace hustle all too well.) The rise of the VCR has to be interpreted in part as a rising impatience with commercial television, and an increasing selectivity toward what it offers — this is despite what the viewing statistics say.

It is clear from office and social conversations — and from shows of hands — that the television set may be in use a good deal, as always, but that it is more and more often showing videocassettes, including carefully picked and taped tv shows, to be sure, which are fast-forwarded past the dull bits.

The implications for television appear clear already. As with movies in their post-television years, the gulf between the big hits and the big flops is ever more pronounced. Television's new shows are more fragile than ever, subject to ruthless euthanasia. This is not entirely cheering news, since it always seems that the good die first, an impression that is strengthened because you don't miss the dross, which also dies fast if not first.

Commercial television, which has always been rigorously competitive within itself, has been competing with cable and must now compete with the VCR, a more elusive target.

The VCR is central to the central aesthetic knob-out of the year, over the colorizing of old movies and old television. While laying color on black and white tapes is intended to increase viewerships on commercial

channels, it is seen as well as a boon to the cassette "sale" and rental markets. And while the noisy fuss has been about the desecration of a few black and white film classics, the hard commercial eye is of color as a kind of plasma to bring long-dead product back to life.

The surprise is that, despite the logical assumption that the VCR must cut into moviegoing, it does not appear to. Movie attendance has been essentially flat in recent years at around 20 million tickets a week, give or take. There has been no significant fall-off. In fact hundreds of new screens are being added and there is a brisk trade in theater chains at very flat prices.

What is evidently happening is that VCR is functioning not as an alternative to moviegoing but as a leaser for moviegoing, as a reminder that things look even better on the big screen.

It is not just screen size, of course, it is the neutrality of the common darkness, the "dream room" comfort (if you are lucky) of the cinema, detached from homefront worries and distractions.

Cassettes have become an immense revenue source, not only for the major studios but for smaller distributors and independent producers. The major studios still seem locked into their crushing overheads and swollen budgets, gambling on a maxhit each time.

It does not preclude the possibility of daring and originality, even at these prices. Yet more often the real vitality in the medium turns out to originate off-Hollywood, so to speak, with projects that arise independently, even if they sometimes end up with a major distributor.

There are signs that the message of cost (or of over-cost) are getting through. The arrival at Columbia Pictures of David Puttnam, a firm and proven believer in cost efficiency, may turn out to have been a very important film milestone in 1986.

What is indisputably true is that the VCR has stirred up the cultural mix of the society as nothing since the television set itself, with ramifications yet to be fully experienced. The disseminating of information — information in the largest sense, embracing everything from porn to colorized Abbott & Costello reruns — looks to have no end.

For syndication: 'Hennessey' in color

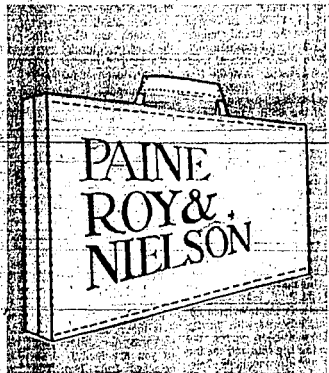
NEW YORK (AP) — There are only so many "M-A-S-H" episodes, so Hal Roach Studios Inc. hopes to cash in on that show's popularity by offering the vintage Jackie Cooper military comedy "Hennessey" for syndication next season.

The 1955-1967 series will be "colorized" via computer, a process that has generated no small controversy when used on classic black-and-white motion pictures. But Hal Roach
