Nevada nuclear protest leads to 438 arrests

MERCURY, Nev. — Actors Martin Sheen, Kris Kristofferson and Robert Blake were among 438 anti-nuclear activists arrested Thursday at the Nevada Test Site after listening to six congressmen promise to fight for an end to nuclear testing.

Carl Sagan and peace activist Daniel Ellsberg were among the demonstrators. Energy Department spokesman Jim Boyer said 438 of those arrested would be charged with trespassing and five would be charged with resisting arrest.

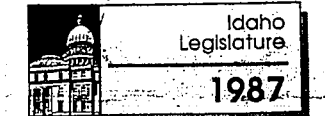
Sheen, who was previously arrested at the test site Jan. 27, asked protesters to join hands and pray for peace, then recited a prayer. He was arrested last month on a Nye County warrant and had to post a \$5,000 peace bond.

Most of the protesters came to the site in a caravan of 20 buses. Several, however, flew in on a hot air balloon that landed about 50 yards inside the boundary to the site. Boyer said those aboard the balloon were told to take off and were not arrested.

The Department of Energy said the demonstration was a factor in its decision to move the test up two days and detonate the weapon on Tuesday. More than 800 people gathered Wednesday night at a Las Vegas hotel to hear plans for today's protest and listen to anti-nuclear activists.

Coalition's reform plans on their way

BOISE — A coalition backing changes in Idaho's legal system in liability cases has won the first round in what promises to be a protracted battle. The House Judiciary and Rules Committee voted Thursday afternoon to print and introduce the coalition's seven-point package of changes in liability law.



But the Idaho Trial Lawyers Association has its own package. Five bills, proposing different changes, are scheduled to be introduced in the Senate. The only dissenting votes to introduction of the House legislation were from three Democrats on Judiciary and Rules. Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello; Rep. Steve Herndon, D-Sandpoint, and Rep. Tom Giovannelli, D-Coeur d'Alene.

Fire destroys historic restaurant in Albion

ALBION — Volunteer firefighters were snaking down smoldering rubble — all that remained of the historic Annie Laurie restaurant — late Thursday, after fire destroyed the building and its antique furnishings. For a time city officials feared the adjoining Albion village offices would be burned, but firefighters from the Albion-Volunteer, Department and Declo Fire Department were able to confine the blaze to the restaurant.

had started to collapse. Keith Amendo, secretary of the Albion Fire District, said the fire started in the center near the kitchen and burned in both directions. "It's an awfully old wooden building and because it has been a restaurant for so long there was some grease that helped feed the fire. It went awfully fast," Amendo said.

Amendo said there are 10 fire telephones that call the town (turned out in help. Albion has only one small fire truck, he said, so Declo was also asked for assistance. "We feel very lucky that we kept it from taking the whole town down," Amendo said.

Taxi drivers report seeing Waite in Beirut

BEIRUT — Two taxi drivers said they saw missing hostage negotiator Terry Waite walking in a southern Beirut suburb Thursday with an escort of about 40 gunmen and four turbanned Shiite Muslim sheiks. Waite, the 6-foot-7 Anglican Church envoy, was last seen by reporters Jan. 20 when he left the Riviera Hotel in west Beirut to meet the kidnapers of Americans Terry Anderson and Thomas Sutherland. Since then, Waite has not contacted the church or his family. The taxi drivers, who spoke on condition of anonymity, told The Associated Press they saw Waite walking with his escorts in a street close to the Lebanese capital's airport highway at about 3 p.m. Thursday. "I saw him smiling and waving his hand to onlookers as he walked. He wore a gray raincoat," said one witness. "I stopped my taxicab to watch, but the escorts waving me away shouting: 'Don't stop. Drive on, I did.'"

Iran says Seib on way to W. Germany

NICOSIA, Cyprus — Airport officials in Tehran said early today that American journalist Gerald F. Seib had left the Iranian capital en route to West Germany. Seib, a Cairo-based correspondent for the Wall Street Journal, was detained Saturday during a government-sponsored press tour and had been accused of spying. Officials at the Tehran airport told The Associated Press in a telephone interview from Nicosia that Seib was aboard Lufthansa airline Flight 601 that left the airport at about 6 a.m. (7:30 p.m. MST Thursday). "They said the plane would make a brief stop in the southern Iranian city of Bandar Abbas before continuing on to West Germany. Flight 601 was scheduled to arrive at Frankfurt at 7:30 a.m. local time (1:30 a.m. EST). In New York, Journal Foreign Editor Karen Elliott House said shortly after Seib's reported departure, "We've not had confirmation of anything yet." Pete Martinez, a State Department spokesman, said

late Thursday in Washington he also was unable to confirm Seib's departure. "I don't have anything on it. I don't expect to have anything at all, all night." Seib was in a group of 37 foreign journalists invited to visit the southern front in the 6½-year-old war with Iraq. An official of Iran's Information Ministry, reached by telephone in Tehran on Thursday, said of Seib, "He has still not left, but will leave within the next 24 hours." The official spoke on condition of anonymity and would not elaborate, except to say: "No one can give you more information, so don't show any more curiosity. When it happens (Seib's departure), you will definitely find out about it." The Swiss Embassy in Tehran, which handles U.S. interests, refused comment on Seib's whereabouts. Rajal-Khorassani, said in New York late Wednesday that Seib had been turned over to the embassy. An announcement Wednesday by the Information Ministry said authorities decided to expel Seib the next day after "a judicial probe into his case ended."

U.S. abandons meeting to counter tide of terror

WASHINGTON — The United States, rebuffed by France and two other close allies, was forced Thursday to abandon plans for a seven-nation meeting in Rome on counterterrorism. Although State Department officials said military steps were not on the agenda, the reluctant allies did not wish to participate in a conference held in the shadows of a U.S. military buildup in the eastern Mediterranean. With eight Americans held hostage in Lebanon, there was apprehension that the United States might strike in retaliation, as it did last April against Libya. France, which inflated the boycott, and Britain and West Germany, which also declined invitations to attend, all have hostages in Lebanon. The session was to have opened today and focused on the recent spate of abductions. Among those detained, although the United States does not list him as a hostage, is Anglican church emissary Terry Waite, who was working for the release of Americans Terry A. Anderson and Thomas M. Sutherland. "The question of military action was not on the agenda," spokesman Charles E. Hodman said in announcing the abrupt cancellation. He said Italy had agreed to a U.S. request to be host for the meeting of the seven largest industrialized democracies but that "some of the summit group did not feel it would be propitious at this time." Hodman said the United States had hoped for an exchange of information on the "recent spate of hostage-takings." The spokesman refused to say which countries objected to the Rome meeting or to give their reasons.

 rebuild the restaurant. Petersen said she watched the building burn and the fire was mostly in the roof area. She said after it burned for a while she heard what appeared to be an explosion.
 Cagle could not be reached for comment Thursday.
 The Annie Laurie, one of the oldest structures in Albion, was built in 1911 as a young man's dining place for residents of all parts of Magic Valley, and was the village's social center.

It was originally a saloon and later became the J.C. Restaurant before it was refurbished in an antique motif by Dahlla Clay and then purchased by Chris and Joy Cagle. About 3 years ago the ownership was turned over to Carmo Cagle, the younger daughter. It was a family business. Both Chris Cagle, former Albion mayor, and Christine Petersen, his older daughter, remained active in the business.

"This was the center of Albion's social activity from the late 1890s until now," Petersen said. "We had a banquet room for group meetings, but my sister had recently converted it to a game room for the young people of Albion. Everybody met there."
 "It was where everybody came for coffee or dinner and where they discussed everything from community business to the price of wheat."

"It was awfully sad to watch it burn, along with all of the townspeople this morning. I was thinking about all those people I am usually pouring coffee for early in the morning and wondering where they will be tomorrow," Petersen said.
 Everyone in the community turned out to help in any way they could, she said.

"Some of the first to arrive at the fire were some high school boys. They stayed there in the bitter cold until 3 o'clock this morning and helped handle the fire hoses. Their pants legs were frozen and I know they were cold and tired," she added.
 There was some insurance, Petersen said, but she was not sure how much of the loss is covered.
 Beate Christensen, Albion city councilman and local historian, said the building was one of the few remaining original structures of the townsite. He said it was extremely popular during the days of the now-defunct Albion State Normal College and was still the only restaurant in town.

 wages. In no event shall a person's life expectancy be considered less than 15 years.
 • Limiting punitive damages by requiring new court hearings before they could be considered.
 • Granting qualified immunity from liability for volunteers serving non-profit organizations.
 • Modifying the "joint and several liability," so that damage awards are based on degree of fault, not ability to pay.

"It's a big loss to Albion," Chaburn said. "People came from all over the Magic Valley to dine at Annie Laurie's. It was a popular place — especially in the winter time when the ski area (Pomerelle) is operating."
 City Clerk Galia Mahoney said that, at the peak of the fire, volunteers moved furnishings, file drawers and valuable papers from the city hall, which adjoins the restaurant on the north. Mahoney said that a man who checked the city building Thursday morning said the concrete wall on the Annie Laurie side was warm but did not appear to be damaged.
 City firefighters were able to keep the fire from spreading to the city hall and homes that are in that area," Mahoney said. "For awhile they were pretty concerned about our offices and the new bank building on the corner, but the fire didn't spread at all."
 There was no damage to city records or city hall, she said — not even smoke or water damage inside other than the water and mud that was "tracked by people coming in to see if we had any damage."

Removal of city records and furnishings from the threatened city building was hurried, but all important papers were returned to the building safely Thursday morning.
 Mahoney said the fire was reported about 11 p.m. but she didn't know until the next day.
 Chaburn said city officials will not reopen the offices to the public until it has passed a safety inspection.

Antiques included a piano, the counter, and back bar — which had been in the building when it was a saloon and pool hall. It had many initials of early day Albion residents carved in it, Mahoney said.
 Petersen said the loss of the antiques is hard to estimate because they can never be replaced. Only a small tea set, a recent gift to her late mother from her sister, failed to burn and was recovered, Petersen said.
 All of the dining tables and chairs were antique and many valuable antique glass items were on display in the restaurant, some of them having belonged to a great-great grandmother of the late Joy Cagle.

Petersen said the city fire department was soaking down the smoldering rubble Thursday evening to try to kill the fire. Winds were coming up, she said, and because there is a store with gasoline pumps about 100 feet away they wanted to be sure the last pumps were washed down.

UP engines collide, injure 3 trainmen

RUPERT — Five Union-Pacific Railroad employees were injured Thursday afternoon in a collision involving two engines in the railroad yards at 100 West in Rupert.

Minidoka Memorial Hospital officials identified two men who were admitted to the hospital as Kent Rowe, 35, and Michael Coleran, 39, both of Rupert. Rowe was later transferred to Bannock Memorial Regional Medical Center at Pocatello. Coleran was later transferred to an Idaho Falls hospital for further treatment.
 Released following treatment at the Rupert hospital were Kenneth Timm, 38; Daniel Rose, 60, and Robert Ames, 50. Those three are from Rupert.

Joe Thibodeau, assistant regional director of public relations for Union Pacific in Salt Lake City, Utah, said his reports indicated all injuries were minor.

Minidoka County and Rupert City police assisted at the scene and a team from Union Pacific regional headquarters in Salt Lake City was scheduled to arrive today for additional investigation.

Thibodeau said two engines and a caboose were involved in the accident about 4:05 p.m. One engine, he said, was pushing a caboose onto another yard track while the second engine was traveling down the same track in the opposite direction.

The engines were moving at about 15 miles per hour at the time of the collision, he said.

Both operators saw the other at about the same time and braked but could not stop and the caboose was crushed between the two, Thibodeau said.

He said the all of the men involved are from the Rupert area and work at the Rupert yards. He said he was to soon to tell how much damage resulted to the engines and caboose but more information will be available by today.

"We have no information to confirm a report circulating this evening that Terry Waite has been seen in Beirut under armed guard."
 "Also, we certainly have heard nothing to suggest a report in a German newspaper that Mr. Waite has been involved in a shooting incident is true," she added.
 She was referring to a report by the West German mass-circulation newspaper Bild that quoted unidentified "Beirut security circles" as saying Waite was shot and critically wounded after he tried to escape from captivity in Lebanon. The newspaper, in a report prepared for its Friday editions, did not say when the alleged shooting occurred or provide other details.
 Shilte and Druse militia officials in Beirut scoffed at the newspaper report.
 "It's absolute fantasy," said one militia official, who also spoke on condition of anonymity. "My people know he is held by the group with which he had been talking about the hostages. But he is alive. He has not been shot or maltreated."
 Asked how he could be so certain, he said: "We have our own ways and contacts. We know he has not been shot."
 Also Thursday, police and military officials in Beirut renewed their denial of any U.S. military action anywhere in Lebanon following rumors that U.S. Marines were landing to attack Shiite guerrillas.

Guard officials halt rallies

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — The Tennessee National Guard on Thursday bowed to parent protests and canceled patriotism rallies led by camouflaged soldiers who fired blanks in high school auditoriums filled with unsuspecting students.

"People were complaining their kids were not made aware beforehand. They objected to the shock value," Maj. Hooper Penuel, a Guard spokesman, said of the displays at four area schools Wednesday.

Penuel said the program, which began with helicopters landing at four schoolyards and featured fiery speeches about communism, was aimed at inspiring patriotism and making students think about America's security.

Top officers of the guard reached the decision Thursday morning after dozens of angry calls from parents who, according to Penuel, complained about the shock their children were put through.

Arrests halt Denver attacks

DENVER (AP) — The arrests of five suspected gang members appear to have abruptly stopped a wave of street attacks by golf club-swinging youths that terrorized a Denver neighborhood and left one woman beaten to death, police said Thursday.

No attacks have been reported since the arrests Tuesday and Wednesday nights, said Detective John Wyckoff.

No more arrests were expected, but police nonetheless will continue increased patrols in the neighborhood until they are satisfied the attacks have ceased, said Wyckoff.

Drug kingpin ordered held

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A neo-Nazi who allegedly vowed to "kill a federal judge a week" if arrested was brought under heavy guard before a federal magistrate Thursday on charges of heading the world's largest cocaine smuggling ring.

Carlos Lehder Rivero, who was seized by Colombian troops in his jungle hideout Wednesday and flown here by U.S. Air Force jet, was ordered held for a formal hearing Monday in Jacksonville, where he is under a 6-year-old indictment on drug and conspiracy charges.

Federal authorities refused to say where they would hold Lehder, a self-proclaimed Nazi, until Monday. He was escorted into court by four U.S. marshals and several other federal agents.

Lehder, 37, called by prosecutors a violent, billionaire drug smuggler who heads a private army and helps lead the "Medellin Cartel" smuggling group, asked for court-appointed counsel because he had no funds with him.

U.S. Attorney Robert Merkle pressed for Lehder's immediate detention, saying there had been death threats against a judge.

"That's a lie!" Lehder shouted in court. Merkle did not elaborate.

Salary amendment given push

WASHINGTON (AP) — Consumer advocate Ralph Nader and legislators in 21 states on Thursday urged ratification of a constitutional amendment, first submitted to the states in 1789, to bar a Congress from increasing its own salary.

Capitol Hill contortions over a pay raise this week have breathed new life into the amendment, which was among the 12 original amendments offered to the states. Ten of those amendments were ratified, and became the Bill of Rights.

The pay amendment, authored by James Madison, states: "No law varying the compensation for the services of the senators and representatives shall take effect, until an election of representatives shall have intervened."

The pay amendment has no ratification deadline, Nader said, and, thus far, 18 states have approved it, leaving 30 more to reach the necessary 38 states for adoption.

Congress, agencies must restore trust

WASHINGTON (AP) — The chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee said Thursday the Iran-Contra uproar shows the need to restore trust between Congress and the spy agencies, while Reagan administration officials appealed to Congress to continue the flow of U.S. aid to the Nicaraguan rebels.

Sen. David Boren, D-Okla., predicted there will be some proposals to tighten procedures for informing Congress of undercover activities. He said that while he would endorse some changes in that respect, "I think the most important thing is attitude. You have to rebuild trust."

The senator said he expected relations between Congress and intelligence community to improve following the resignation of William J. Casey as CIA director. "Better chemistry" exists between Congress and Robert M. Gates, the man nominated by President Reagan to succeed Casey, said Boren.

Earlier, Assistant Secretary of State Elliott Abrams told the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that Nicaragua's Contra rebels can achieve a political victory against the leftist Sandinista government in Managua if military aid from the United States continues.

Abrams' testimony came as a committee began weighing legislation which would pull the plug on all U.S. aid to the Contras while also blocking \$40 million in assistance which still is in the pipeline. U.S. aid to the Contras and to block \$40 million still in the aid pipeline.

Lawmakers opposing administration policy in Central America postponed until later in the month action on legislation to block all further U.S. military and logistical assistance to the Contras. They said they did so out of tactical considerations, due in part to the fact Congress is leaving on a week-long recess.

At the White House, Reagan's chief spokesman, Marlin Fitzwater, told reporters the president's second meeting with the Tower commission reviewing National Security Council

operations will be next Wednesday afternoon.

Fitzwater said the panel, headed by former Texas Republican Sen. John Tower, would be provided excerpts of Reagan's notes on the Iran affair before that interview. Reagan first appeared before the panel on Jan. 26, and the commission's report is due Feb. 19.

He said the board could request material from particular dates, and then White House counselor David Abshire and White House counsel

Peter Wallison "will work out excerpts that meet their request," Fitzwater said he was not aware of any request by the special prosecutor to look at the president's notes.

Montana pilot, 78, plane crash victim

JACKSON, Wyo. (AP) — A 78-year-old Montana man apparently died on impact when his single-engine plane slammed into the side of Mount Hancock in southern Yellowstone National Park, authorities said Thursday.

Horace H. "Shorty" Koessler, of Missoula, was found in the cockpit when searchers located the wreckage Thursday morning, said Grand Teton National Park Ranger Dennis Ziemann, whose office coordinated the rescue operation.

The plane, which disappeared Sunday evening, was partially buried in the 7.8 feet of snow on the mountain-side, the ranger said. It appeared to be in one piece and there was no sign of fire, he said.

Times, minds have changed in Georgia's Forsyth County

Beyond the headlines and out of range of television cameras showing fools throwing bricks and bottles at Hosea Williams and his fellow marchers is perhaps the best piece of good news to sweep across these hills in many years: This is the Forsyth County, the hearts of most Georgians seem to be cleansed of racial hate and meanness that surfaced in earlier times of trouble.

The brand of racism practiced by the rabble gathered in Cumming is universally deplored. The public, shamed and embarrassed, is clearly on the side of fairness and decency.

This was not always so. Only on the surface does the Cumming affair bear resemblance to the earlier confrontations of the '50s and '60s. The rabble then would have enjoyed at least tacit approval from many elected officials, open encouragement from others. Many Georgians, a decade or so ago, would have felt some empathy for the rock and bottle throwers.

But not in 1987. The sight of the Forsyth

County sheriff bowing his neck and stepping to the front of marching protesters is not from the '60s. On a Sunday morning, preachers in Cumming go into their pulpits and speak in behalf of those opposing the county's reputation of excluding blacks from

its borders. Now only J. B. Stoner crawls out of his hole to spout epithets, and Lester Maddox shows up to kibitz. They only serve to dramatize how far we have come in what is really a very short time. Community leaders in Forsyth, the city north of Macon on I-75, call the newspaper in anguish, upset that their town is receiving a black eye through mistaken identity. They want no part of the Forsyth County affair. In fact, neither does Forsyth County. Times and minds have changed.

Is this much to brag about? Simply to disapprove rock throwing, to support rights to assemble, march and domicile; rights guaranteed by the Constitution and human decency? Yes it is. At least to those with memories going back to the '50s, '60s and even earlier '70s. Public expressions of distaste and revulsion over the behavior we have seen and read about over the last week represent significant change.

When we integrated our schools it was because we had to, forced by the courts and the might of the federal government. It was the same with our lunch counters and neighborhoods. We had to. Now we oppose a racist rabble because we want to. That is the difference, and it is a big difference. We were not converted so suddenly as Paul on the Damascus road, but slowly and surely we have made progress.

Only the utterly naive could have been surprised to learn that racism lingers, a disease not cured by acts of Lyndon Johnson's Congress and gains made in all the years that have followed. We are all racists to a degree. Some in

Forsyth County don't want blacks living there. That's wrong, we say, and it is. Some in Atlanta and other presumably enlightened communities, however, prefer to keep clubs, churches, neighborhood and executive offices exclusive. The manner in which we deal with racism may be a matter of sophistication, and wealth.

We have white racism and we have black racism. In some places they are not fond of Indians and Mexicans. Race is the toughest problem of our time. We grow weary of the burden, and if we are honest we will admit we have miles yet to go, individually and as a society.

Public reaction to the eruption in Forsyth County, however, is a visible sign of progress, and a milestone. It only we have the judgment to know when breathing on the hot coals of justice turns into fanning flames of discord.

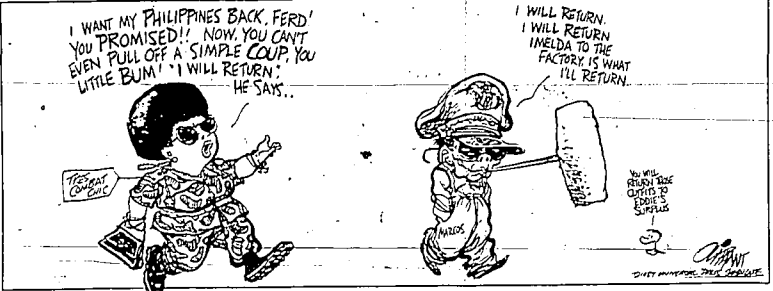

Soviets continue attacks

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Soviet tank columns with thousands of soldiers attacked Moslem guerrilla forces in eastern Afghanistan on Thursday as warplanes and artillery blasted the outnumbered insurgents, sources in Pakistan said.

Guerrilla officials and other sources reported a second day of fierce fighting in Paklia province with Soviet and Afghan government forces driving on key guerrilla bases close to the frontier.

An Afghan air force MIG-21 jet fighter-bomber was shot down by guerrilla anti-aircraft defenses Thursday and several other planes appeared to have been damaged, the officials said.

The attack was the first major action by Soviet forces since Afghanistan's government began a unilateral cease-fire Jan. 15. About 115,000 Soviet troops are in Afghanistan to back the Communist government.

Guerrilla officials said about 14,000 Soviet and Afghan troops, including several regiments of elite Soviet paratroopers and commandos, attacked the bases in the Zhawar area. Soviet tank columns spearheaded the ground assaults as waves of jets and helicopter gunships bombed the guerrilla positions, they said.

About 500 guerrilla fighters got through to the Zhawar area Thursday to reinforce the some 2,000 men already defending the bases, the officials said. The situation was confused because of the fighting and few reports were coming across the border, they said.

Both sides suffered casualties, but no precise figures were available, the officials said.

The Afghan Information Center, which monitors Afghanistan from the Pakistani border city of Peshawar, confirmed the reports of heavy fighting but said it was getting few details.

Sakharov, Kissinger exchange greetings in Moscow

MOSCOW (AP) — Andrei Sakharov, the Soviet Union's leading dissident, received a delegation of prominent Americans on Thursday led by fellow Nobel Peace Prize winner Henry J. Kissinger.

"This is very moving," Kissinger said as they shook hands on the cold sidewalk outside Sakharov's apartment building. "We are meeting for the first time."

As he waited with reporters, dressed in a gray parka and brown fur hat, he said he and his wife, fellow dissident Yelena Bonner, "must go to Gorky because we left our belongings there, and I also want to spend some time working there in peace."

Before the former secretary of state and his companions arrived, Sakharov said he will pay a visit next month to Gorky, where he was forced to spend seven years of exile for advocating human rights.

USSR launches new space capsule

MOSCOW (AP) — Two cosmonauts rocketed toward a rendezvous with the Mir orbiting laboratory early today aboard a new type of space capsule, embarking on mission commander Yuri Romanenko said six minutes before blast-off from the Baikonur cosmodrome on the steppes of Soviet Central Asia occurred at 12:35 a.m. Moscow time (12:35 p.m. MST Thursday) and was broadcast on nationwide television.

"All systems are working normally and the crew is ready for launch," the Soviet Union's first manned space mission since last July. The Mir, whose name means "peace" in Russian, has been unmanned since last July 16.

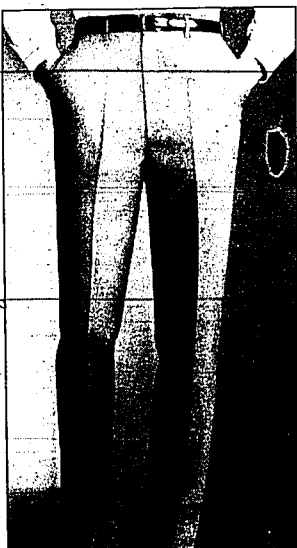

No radiation leak as train derails

GLOUCESTER, England (AP) — A train car carrying a 30-ton container of spent nuclear fuel jumped the tracks at a rail yard Thursday, but the car remained upright and there was no radiation leak, officials said.

The British Rail freight train was carrying a steel cube containing 138 spent nuclear fuel rods from the Oldbury power station in southwest England to the Sellafield nuclear plant on the northwest Cumbria coast for reprocessing, the Central Electricity Generation Board reported.

The train car and the nuclear container, which has 14-inch thick walls, remained upright after two wheels left the tracks near Gloucester, about 20 miles north of Oldbury, the electricity board reported.

Times, minds have changed in Georgia's Forsyth County

Beyond the headlines and out of range of the cameras showing flogs throwing bricks and bottles at Hosea Williams and his fellow marchers is perhaps the best piece of good news to sweep across these red hills and piney woods in more than a century. The good news is this: Despite the ugliness of the bolt that burst in Forsyth County, the hearts of most Georgians seem to be cleansed of racial hate and meanness that surfaced in earlier times of trouble.

The brand of racism practiced by the rabble gathered in Cumming is universally deplored. The public, shamed and embarrassed, is clearly on the side of fairness and decency.

This was not always so. Only on the surface does the Cumming affair bear resemblance to bitter confrontations of the '50s and '60s. The trouble there would have enjoyed a different approval from many elected officials, open encouragement from others. Many Georgians, a decade or so ago, would have felt some empathy for the rock and bottle throwers.

But not in 1967. The sight of the Forsyth

County sheriff bowing his neck and stepping to the front of marching protesters is not from the '60s. On a Sunday morning, preachers in Cumming go into their pulpits and speak in behalf of those opposing the county's reputation of excluding blacks from

its borders. Now only J.B. Stoner crawls out of his hole to spout epithets, and Lester Maddox shows up to kibitz. They come in what to dramatize how far we have come in what is really a very short time. Community leaders in Forsyth, the city north of Macon on I-75, call the newspaper in anguish, upset that their town is receiving a black eye through mistaken identity. They want no part of the Forsyth County affair. In fact, neither does Forsyth County. Times and minds have changed.

Is this much to brag about? To simply to disapprove rock throwing, to support rights to assemble, march and domicile, rights guaranteed by the Constitution and human decency? Yes! At least to those with memories going back to the '50s, '60s and even early '70s. Public expressions of distaste and revulsion over the behavior we have seen and read about over the last week represent significant change.

When we integrated our schools it was because we had to, forced by the courts and the might of the federal government. It was the same with our lunch counters and a racist rathole because we want to. That is the difference, and it is a big difference. We were not converted so suddenly as Paul on the Damascus road, but slowly and surely we have made progress.

Only the utterly naive could have been surprised to learn that racism lingers, a disease not cured by acts of Lyndon Johnson's Congress and gains made in all the years that have followed. We are all racists to a degree. Some in

Forsyth County don't want blacks living there. That is wrong, we say, and it is. Some in Atlanta and other presumably enlightened communities, however, prefer to keep clubs, churches, neighborhood and executive offices exclusive. The manner in which we deal with racism may be a matter of sophistication, and wealth.

We have white racism and we have black racism. In some places they are not fond of Indians and Mexicans. Race is the toughest problem of our time. We grow weary of the burden, and if we are honest we will admit we have miles yet to go, individually and as a public.

Public reaction to the eruption in Forsyth County, however, is a visible sign of progress, and a milestone, if only we have the judgment to know when breathing on the hot coals of justice turns into fanning flames of discord.

Soviets continue attacks

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Soviet tank columns with thousands of soldiers attacked Moslem guerrilla forts in eastern Afghanistan on Thursday as warplanes and artillery blasted the outnumbered insurgents, sources in Pakistan said.

Guerrilla officials and other sources reported a second day of fierce fighting in Paktia province with Soviet and Afghan government forces driving on key guerrilla bases close to the frontier.

An Afghan air force MIG-21 jet fighter-bomber was shot down by guerrilla anti-aircraft defenses Thursday and several other planes appeared to have been damaged, the officials said.

The attack was the first major action by Soviet forces since Afghanistan's government began a unilateral cease-fire Jan. 15. About 115,000 Soviet troops are in Afghanistan to back the Communist government.

Guerrilla officials said about 14,000 Soviet and Afghan troops, including several regiments of elite Soviet paratroopers and commandos, attacked the bases in the Zhawar area. Soviet tank columns spearheaded the ground assaults as waves of jets and helicopter gunships bombarded the guerrilla positions, they said.

About 500 guerrilla fighters got through to the Zhawar area Thursday to reinforce the some 2,000 men already defending the bases, the officials said. The situation was confused because of the fighting and few reports were coming across the border, they said.

Both sides suffered casualties, but no precise figures were available, the officials said.

The Afghan Information Center, which monitors Afghanistan from the Pakistani border city of Peshawar, confirmed the reports of heavy fighting but said it was getting few details.

Missile, air raids keep up in Iran, Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq (AP) — An Iranian missile crashed into a palm grove in the Iraqi capital Thursday and destroyed at least one house, residents said.

State television reported several people were killed or wounded. Iraq said its warplanes bombed four Iranian cities, and Iran said scores of civilians were killed. Iran reported its ground forces were awaiting orders for "further advances" against Iraq on the war's southern front.

CiFan Radio, monitored in London, said the missile's target in Baghdad was a "military-economic center."

The missile attack Thursday was the third in six days and the fifth since Iran began firing missiles at Baghdad in March 1985. The previous missiles killed some civilians.

State-run television said an unspecified number of people were killed Thursday, all members of one family, and that many other people were wounded.

The state-run Iraqi News Agency reported "destructive" air raids on Shushtar, Bushehr, Dezful and the holy city of Qom in the continuing blitz on Iranian cities.

Iraq's official Islamic Republic News Agency, monitored in Cyprus, confirmed the raids on all these towns except Bushehr and said scores of civilians were killed.

Both sides reported artillery exchanges and skirmishes between their ground forces east of Basra on Thursday.

As he walked with reporters, dressed in a gray parka and brown fur hat, he said he and his wife, fellow dissident Yelena Bonner, "must go to Gorky because we left our belongings there, and I also want to spend some time working there in peace."

Juvenile jail plan set up

ST. ANTHONY (AP) - Fremont County will open its jail to male juvenile offenders from a six-county area as its adult prisoners are shuffled to other jails under an arrangement to make sure youths who break the law aren't automatically released.

Juveniles arrested for crimes short of murder, robbery and rape haven't been jailed recently in eastern Idaho because officials feared lawsuits charging them with providing unsafe conditions for youths.

Officials from the participating counties met Wednesday in Arco to work out the agreement. "I feel good about it," said Fremont County Sheriff Terry Thompson. "We had to do something, and I honestly feel my facility here in St. Anthony is best."

Property tax bills emerge

BOISE (AP) - A spokesman for Idaho's cities says taxing decisions made by local government nine years ago are determining those communities' economic health now.

Property tax levels set by city fathers in 1978, the year voters passed the One-Percent Initiative, dictate how much property tax they can levy now, says Jim Weatherby, executive director of the Association of Idaho Cities.

At Weatherby's request, the House Revenue and Taxation Committee on Thursday voted introduction of two bills, both easing restrictions on property taxes. But there was considerable opposition to even introducing the measures, which indicates they may have a hard time clearing the committee later.

Rumsfeld says it's too early

BOISE (AP) - Former White House Chief of Staff Donald Rumsfeld says it is too early to say whether he wants to make his old workplace his home.

But he points out that of 214 speeches given last year, "I tended to find myself frequently in early primary states."

Rumsfeld, who was chief of staff and defense secretary under President Ford, was to speak Thursday night at the annual Idaho Lincoln Day dinner in Boise.

If he should seek the Republican nomination for president, Rumsfeld said his 10-year absence from Washington would be an advantage.

"I do think the people may be interested in someone who can tackle that fresh," he said at a press conference Thursday afternoon.

Rumsfeld said being out of mainstream politics for so long could be overcome. "If you go back and look at presidential elections, they're marathons, not sprints."

Truman doctrine policy basis

POCATELLO (AP) - Ronald Reagan's emphasis on battling communism is an extension of the Truman doctrine initiated 40 years ago, political columnist Tom Wicker told participants in the Frank Church Symposium on International Affairs.

Wicker, whose columns run twice weekly in the New York Times, delivered the keynote address Wednesday for the symposium at Idaho State University.

He said the attitude of the Reagan administration in formulating foreign policy is a continuation of the Truman doctrine that began with aid to Greece and Turkey in 1947. Through the years, Wicker said, American has held on to the conviction to intervene in situations where communism threatened.

Reagan's foreign policy was doomed to failure, he said, because it was too narrowly based on anti-communism, too reliant on secret and covert acts and too dedicated to military strength.

License policy survey slated

SALMON (AP) - Idaho Legal Aid Services is preparing a survey to find out how sheriff's offices in each of Idaho's counties deal with Hispanics who apply for drivers' licenses.

Many Idaho sheriffs continue to go beyond state law and require driver's license applicants to prove they are in the United States legally. Those who work with legal and illegal aliens say the practice continues only because it hasn't been effectively challenged.

"We've just started to take a look into it," Legal Aid attorney Frank Moreno said Wednesday. He works with migrant farm workers.

He said that Legal Aid Services, which gives legal assistance to low-income people, is planning to conduct a survey to determine which sheriff's departments require proof of U.S. citizenship or legal alien status. The survey also will look at which counties use Spanish language tests and which use interpreters.

Darrington challenges 'credibility gap'

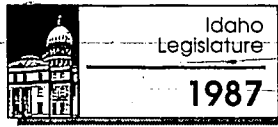
BOISE (AP) - The chairman of the Senate Health and Welfare Committee is looking for an explanation from members of a special citizens committee on hazardous waste facility siting on why they have endorsed proposed PCB regulations that contradict their formal policy.

"We've got a credibility gap," Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Idaho, said Thursday. "There's something going on here, and we're going to get to the bottom of it."

At issue is the long-standing legislative policy against any state environmental regulations that are stricter than those imposed by the federal government. Attempts to repeal that so-called stringency requirement, generally led by Democrats in the Legislature, have repeatedly failed in past sessions.

But the bill, proposed by the Division of Environment earlier this week, would impose state restrictions on disposal of PCBs by incineration 10 times stricter than federal law. It matches, however, a bill passed by lawmakers last year that attempted to restrict proposals for commercial PCB incinerators in several areas of the state. PCBs, polychlorinated biphenyls, have been linked to cancer in laboratory animals.

In presenting that proposal, the division said it



had been endorsed by the 37-member citizens committee even though that panel, in developing a lengthy policy on siting of hazardous waste storage and disposal facilities, included as the last of 20 recommendations that state PCB regulation should be "consistent" with federal law.

To an extent, however, that final goal runs counter to the position the citizens committee took overall in recommending that the state develop laws and regulations that would probably be more stringent than those of the federal government to ensure Idaho does not become a "dumping ground" for hazardous waste and can keep up with rapidly changing technological and other advances in environmental management.

Both the PCB regulatory bill and the citizens

committee's hazardous waste policy are before the committee for approval.

Jack Peterson, the president of the Idaho Mining Association who served as chairman of the citizens committee, said the final recommendation on PCB regulation was actually beyond the scope of the committee's responsibility. But he said it was added at the last-minute in response to a high level of public concern over the issue.

Peterson conceded that the overall policy outlined for handling hazardous waste storage and disposal facilities called for abandoning the severe restriction on the stringency of state laws, and he defended that position before the Senate panel.

Darrington, predicting that philosophy will be the major battle ground in debate over adoption of the policy, pointed out that lawmakers are constantly bombarded by constituents demanding less government regulation and involvement in their lives.

But Peterson said that during the hearings the citizens committee held last year throughout the state it became clear that "the mainstream of Idaho has a great deal of concern about the potential of hazardous waste materials intruding in their lives."

Swisher's signals on measure mixed

BOISE - A Public Utilities Commissioner sent mixed signals to lawmakers on the effects of Mountain Bell's proposed phone re-regulation bill.

PUC Commissioner Perry Swisher said most of the opposition to the bill is "based on fear." Swisher, appearing before a House State Affairs subcommittee on Thursday, said some of the fear is well-founded, some is not.

In other words, the bill may not be as bad as consumer groups, cable television companies and a few independent phone companies fear. But it may not be as great as Mountain Bell says, either, Swisher in-

dicated. The fear that prices may skyrocket, forcing low-income people and senior citizens to throw their phones out, "probably is not legitimate," Swisher said.

But phone service to the elderly may become subsidized the way Medicare is, he said. Seniors would become "trading stock" and left to the whim of lawmakers, he said.

Swisher said the bill would not automatically allow deregulation. Phone companies would still have to apply to the PUC.

But the bill would require the PUC to act on deregulation plans. Currently, the PUC can pick and choose which plans it is in the public interest. Bill Roden, lobbyist for Mountain

Bell, said Mountain Bell wants to even the playing field. Currently, Mountain Bell is regulated, but independent long-distance companies such as MCI and Sprint are not.

Cable television companies are not regulated, either, he said. Swisher supported Mountain Bell's argument. He said companies such as MCI are like someone with a rifle, picking off the most lucrative services.

Still, Swisher indicated that the crux of Mountain Bell's argument - that competition will keep prices reasonable - is not a solid rock. "I don't think competition is a force in Idaho," Swisher said. "I haven't seen a great rush to provide service in Idaho."

He sidestepped questions from legislators on whether he thought it was a good or bad bill.

Swisher said legislators should set policy, not appointed regulators.

But Swisher did "implore" lawmakers to consider the universal service fund included in the Mountain Bell bill. The fund, abandoned with the breakup of AT&T, is a subsidy to small, independent phone companies to insure phone service at reasonable rates in remote areas.

Under the bill, all phone companies would have to pay into the fund.

Swisher saved his juiciest comments for reporters after the subcommittee meeting.

The battle over phone deregulation is being fought in Idaho, not because Idaho is a lucrative market. It isn't, Swisher said.

It's a testing ground for bigger, and better battles in other parts of the nation, he said.

"If the U.S. and U.S.R. wage war, where do they fight? In places like Nicaragua where it's cheap," Swisher said following the State Affairs Committee meeting. "This is Nicaragua."

State official says water available this year despite rights controversy

BOISE (AP) - Water will be available this year for new irrigation or other uses stopped by the Swan Falls water rights controversy, a water official says.

Kenneth Dunn, director of the Idaho Department of Water Resources, said implementation of the Swan Falls agreement is awaiting approval by the Federal Energy Commission. Because that approval may not come before irrigation season starts, the department will provide interim approvals.

Those approvals will not affect water rights already in place prior to Swan Falls, said Gary Spackman, the department's water allocation supervisor. The impact will be felt by people with permits or pending water-use applications.

A permit is an interim stage between when a water license is applied for and when it is granted.

Spackman said approximately 2,000 water license applicants and a few permit holders that have not

begun their projects are being held up by the Swan Falls delay and will need interim approval.

The approvals will be divided into two groups: applicants for rights to use groundwater that flows into the Snake River between Milner Dam near Burley and the Swan Falls Dam, and those outside that area.

Those in the first group use water that belongs to Idaho Power. They will have to rent water in reservoirs as a backup to ensure Idaho Power an adequate water supply for hydroelectric power.

The rented water will be controlled by the department and released as Idaho Power needs it, Spackman said.

Applicants outside the Milner-to-Swan Falls area will not have to rent water, but still will have to obtain an interim permit, he said.

A court decision on the use of Snake River water rights above Swan Falls Dam led to a conflict between groups seeking water rights. In 1984, then-Gov. John Evans, At-

torney General Jim Jones and then-Idaho Power Chairman James Bruce reached an agreement on stream flows and how to handle the water rights.

The Legislature and other state agencies adopted the agreement, but the Federal Energy Commission hasn't approved it.

Dunn said the interim approvals will have significant restrictions to protect prior rights.

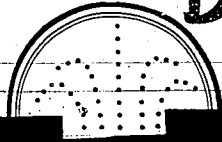

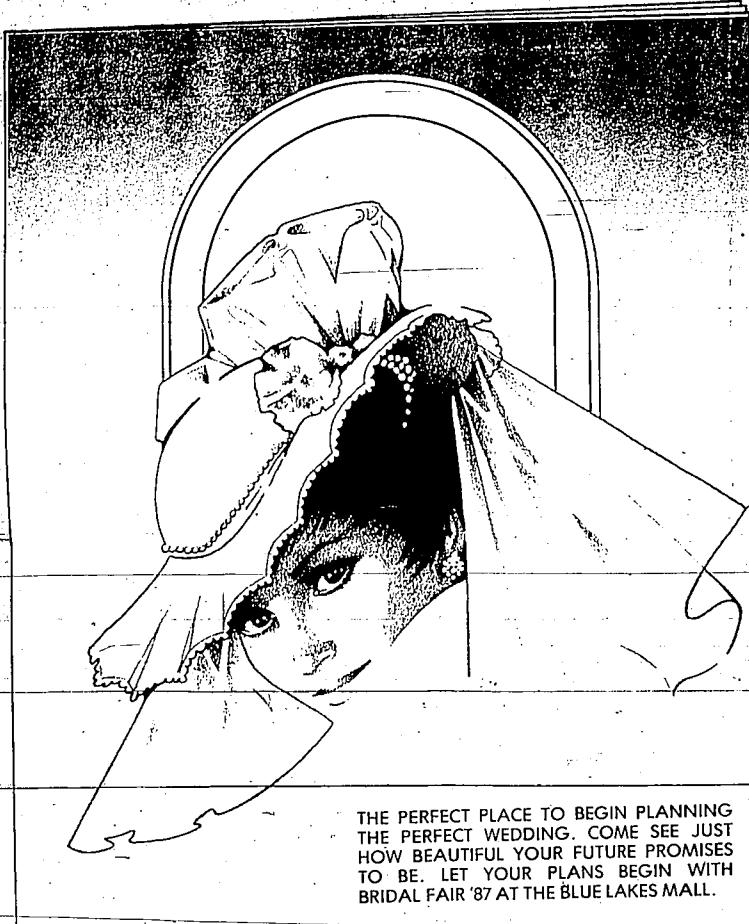

Twin Falls hires Fantus for marketing tools

TWIN FALLS — Despite delay and disagreements connected with the first Fantus study, the Twin Falls City Council will spend \$32,000 more with the Chicago-based consulting firm for plans on how to market the city.

One reason for the action: Fantus knows the kind of people the city should know.

"We are hiring Fantus because of the contacts they have with the kind of people who are buying 'Twin Falls,'" Councilman Andersen said. "Fantus is in the business of doing relocation studies for companies who are planning to relocate or expand."

City Manager Tom Courtney said, "Fan-

tus has an excellent reputation in their field."

The final three phases in Fantus' economic-development package will cost \$33,000, plus expenses. The city will pay \$32,000 of the amount from fees on city industrial revenue bonds, Courtney said. Twin Falls County will contribute \$1,000 for the studies, scheduled for completion in 2-3 months, he said.

In Phase II, Fantus will provide a list of five-10 primary and 10-15 secondary business opportunities in Twin Falls that might approach, however, will not represent the city in promoting the city to the companies, Courtney said. Phase III will be a marketing plan.

"It's basically providing us with a method

of convincing businesses that Twin Falls is a good place to do business," he said.

The study will look not only at attracting out-of-state businesses, but to local companies and the ways they might be helped to grow and expand, Courtney said.

The last phase will be a plan in which local agencies would be organized into an effective selling tool for the community, he said.

The city and county, the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce, the College of Southern Idaho and Region IV Development are involved, in one way or another, with the economic development of the area, Courtney said. Fantus will propose a plan to point the different entities in the same direction.

The first phase was an in-depth study of

the city's strengths and weaknesses as a place for businesses or industries to relocate or expand. It was completed last fall.

The report, which cost more than \$9,500, was months late because of a change in consultants while it was being prepared.

The report was also revised after officials disagreed with what Fantus considered the city's liabilities.

Councilman Jack Miller said the money spent with Fantus was an investment in the city's economic future.

Miller said he was displeased about the delays and some items in the first study.

But, he considered the next phases as what he calls, "R&D, research and development," necessary to keep the city economically progressive and aggressive.

"The city is going to have to be innovative," Miller said.

He was also impressed by Fantus' list of business clients, Miller said. One of which was Stouffer's, which eyed Twin Falls as a site for one of its plants.

Andersen said he considered the revisions in the first Fantus report as fine tuning.

Fantus listed the area's educational system as substandard because its funding was below average. The city argued that the money spent bought good results and quality education, Andersen said. As a result, the company upgraded the city on that point in the final report.

Andersen said he views Fantus as a large real estate broker for the city, helping to

Environmentalists charge Jarbidge plan hurts wildlife

TWIN FALLS — Wildlife is being shortchanged at the expense of livestock in the latest plan for managing the Jarbidge Resource Area, an environmental group has charged.

Randy Morris, a spokesman for Idaho's Committee for the High Desert, said the group is protesting the plan and wants a hearing on its objections.

"We will pursue this to the bitter end — until the bodies are laid out," he said.

The Jarbidge Resource Area is home to mule deer, elk, antelope and bighorn sheep. It is also the location of scenic Jarbidge Canyon, the Hagerman Fossil Beds and the Bruneau Dunes.

The committee's protest is one of nine that the U.S. Bureau of Land Management has received since it announced revisions last December, said Gary Carson, BLM area manager. Among them are objections filed by the Idaho Wildlife Federation.

The plan provides 22 times the vegetation for livestock as it does for wildlife, Morris said. This is a violation of the Federal Land Management Policy Act requirement that wildlife and livestock be on an equal footing, he said.

Morris said there is a 70-percent increase in the amount of forage for livestock, while 90 percent of the wildlife habitat will be left in unsatisfactory condition. BLM officials say habitat for wildlife will increase under the plan.

Carson said the 20,000 animal unit months for forage referred to in the plan is competitive, meaning cattle and wildlife are both included. An animal unit month refers to a horse and a calf or a cow and calf on an acre of land for 1 month. There is

also a designation for sheep and lambs.

"Wildlife may have more forage where there is no competition; it doesn't show up (in the plan). The numbers you see for wildlife agree with what the state Fish and Game Department says is reasonable to manage for," Carson said.

Some 240,000 acres of the 1.6 million-acre Jarbidge Resource Area is a defacto wilderness, said Morris.

The resource area is bounded by U.S. Highway 20 on the north, Salmon Falls Creek on the east, the Bruneau River on the west and the tip of the Humboldt National Forest in Nevada.

Morris also said the group was concerned about a plan allowing a corridor for utility lines near the confluence of the Bruneau and Jarbidge rivers, a spot he called one of the "most stunning" in Idaho.

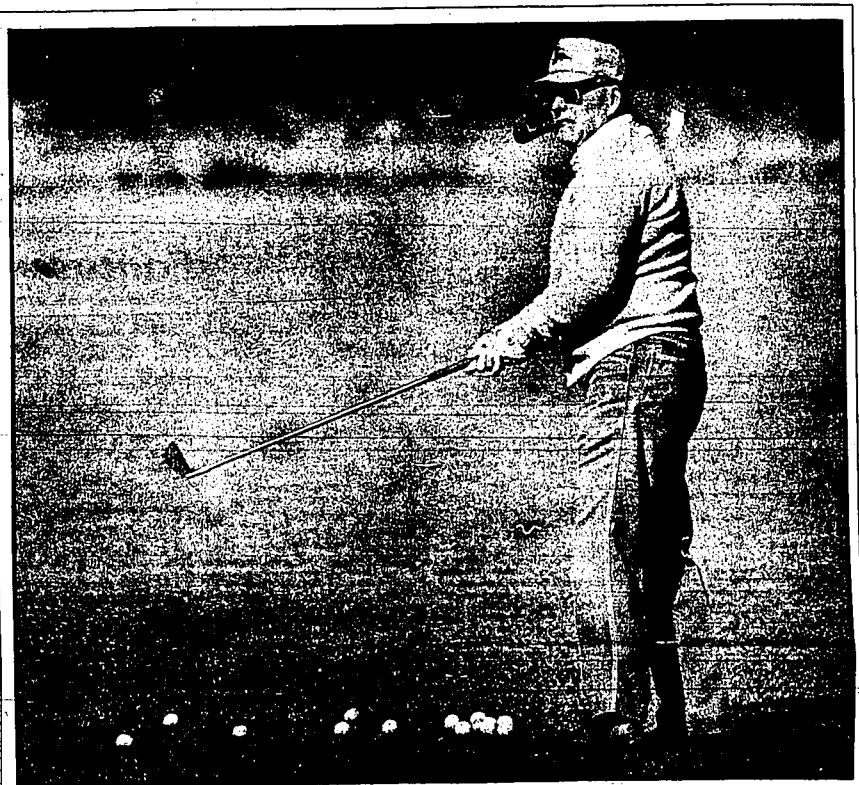
But Dolores Blom, a BLM really specialist, said there is a utility line going through there now. "If there hadn't been a line there, we wouldn't have left it in. The power companies wanted more lines through there. We said no," she said.

Morris said the group was concerned about whether the public had an adequate opportunity to comment on the elements in the revised plan.

Some of the other revisions in the latest version involve the amount of land in poor ecological condition to be improved by various measures such as brush control and seeding.

Areas under consideration for wilderness are the Bruneau-Sheep Creek and the Jarbidge River. The BLM is proposing dropping the King Hill area from wilderness consideration. These decisions are up to Congress.

The BLM has extended the period for public comment on the plan until next Wednesday.

Police end role as vehicle (un)locksmiths

TWIN FALLS — People will need to be a little more careful about leaving keys in their vehicles parked in Twin Falls in the future.

The public service of unlocking vehicles with keys inside has been performed free by the Twin Falls Public Safety Department for years, but is about to come to an end.

Effective Feb. 8, persons in these situations who call police for assistance will be told they need a locksmith, unless there is a serious emergency.

Public Safety Director Tim Qualls announced Wednesday that it has become necessary to discontinue the service.

Because of the now complicated locking systems on vehicles, officers are no longer able

to provide the assistance, Qualls said.

"These systems have become so complex," Qualls said, "that we are unable to unlock many of them and, in some cases, we are breaking them."

Some people have asked the city to pay for the broken locks and others have complained because of the length of time it requires to open the locks on some of the vehicles, Qualls said.

Officers have found such requests to be very time-consuming and not really a police matter, Qualls said. It has reached the point where the time required and the possibility of damage is too much to ask of the police officers, he said.

The police blotter Wednesday showed five reports of keys locked in cars during the first few morning hours.

"In the case of a genuine emergency, of course,

we will offer assistance," Qualls said. "But it has to be a real emergency situation, such as a child locked inside the vehicle."

In such a case, or in the event of a life-and-death situation, the problem will be explained to the police division shift supervisor, who will make a decision as to what action will be taken. Qualls said a report will then be filed immediately for review by Commander Pat Birmingham, who heads the uniform division.

Being in a hurry to get home to check on dinner or to keep an appointment is not a sufficient emergency, Qualls said.

Officers will ask the person who is locked out of his or her car to call a key shop, but will not recommend any one specific locksmith or key shop.

"We will suggest instead, that they look in the yellow pages and call an expert," Qualls said.

Cassia students show lack of belief in C-rule in low grades — board

BURLEY — With approximately one-third of Burley High School sophomores and juniors failing to make a C average in core classes, the Cassia County School District should do more to emphasize the importance of meeting the standard, Curriculum Director Gena Coltrin told trustees Tuesday night.

Some 48 sophomores and 15 juniors attending Burley High School do not meet the state mandated requirement of a C average in core courses for graduation beginning in 1988, he said. Approximately the same percentage of students fail to meet the C average at the district's other three high schools in Declo, Malley and Raft River, he said.

"I think students haven't accepted the fact that they're going to have this problem," he said. "They don't believe this (C average requirement) is really happening."

When the requirement was first proposed, teachers and administrators estimated that about 8 percent of the student body would have difficulty meeting the C average. With approximately 30 percent of Cassia students failing to meet the standard, this means 30 to 35 percent of these students "haven't gotten the message," Board Chairman Mike Judd said. "A lot of those kids could get C's," he said.

Coltrin said he thinks one of the reasons students haven't been achieving the C average is that both parents and students do not

currently believe that the C average requirement will remain in effect.

However, there are no indications that the rule will be abolished, and students who are capable of meeting the average, but who fail to do so, will be unable to graduate, he said.

"We have not been successful in convincing them (parents and students) of the importance of the C average," Coltrin said. While some adjustments to the requirement may be worked out, the district should urge students to meet the standard, he said.

Superintendent Norman Hurst called the classes of 1988 and 1989 "victims of circumstance." He predicted that adjustments would have to be made. "The kids in two years are going to really suffer," he said. "Then adjustments will be made."

The State Board of Education is considering adjusting the C average rule, including allowing students to graduate if their basic composite score on the statewide assessment test is within one standard deviation of the mean for Idaho students. Students would also need to receive a score of 3 out of 5 on the direct writing assessment, if they were to graduate under this option.

Coltrin said that if this adjustment is passed by the state board, it is important for juniors to do well on the assessment tests, the first part of which will be given next week.

Another option would permit local districts to develop their own core competency plan. A

Court: Law protects 'unsafe' vaccine makers

BOISE (AP) — The Idaho Supreme Court has ruled that state law generally accepts the principle of protection from liability for makers of vaccines that are "unavoidably unsafe."

Justice Robert Hinkle wrote in a specialty concurring opinion in the 42-page decision issued Wednesday.

The ruling was in response to questions posed by the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in a lawsuit challenging the safety of a DPT vaccine produced by Lederle Laboratories.

The questions focused on the case of David and Susan Toner of Cassia County, who won \$1.13 million in a \$5

million negligence suit filed against Lederle in 1980.

The Toners alleged that their 3-month-old son Kevin was permanently paralyzed from the waist down when he was given a vaccination for diphtheria, pertussis and tetanus in 1979.

The Toners argued that Lederle, a division of American Cyanamid Co., was negligent in not producing a safer "fractionated cell" vaccine, rather than its "whole cell" vaccine Tri-Immuno. The family said frac-

tionated cell DPT vaccines, such as the Tri-Solgen product produced by Eli Lilly Co. in the 1950s, resulted in five times fewer catastrophic reactions.

A federal court jury in Boise found for the Toners in 1984, deciding that Lederle failed "to exercise ordinary and reasonable care not to expose the potential consumer to an unreasonable risk of harm from the use of its products," according to court records.

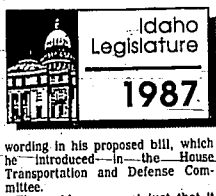
House panel snuffs anti-smoking bill

BOISE — A freshman Magic Valley lawmaker got taken to the woodshed for his smoking bill on Thursday.

Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls, lost his bid to ban smoking on buses by a 39-44 vote. But Black said he'll be back to fight another day. He plans to reintroduce the bill.

Conservative Republicans, moderate Republicans and Democrats all took Black to task over



banned smoking, but that it included an element of danger in enforcement, lawmakers argued.

The bill gave a bus driver the power to throw an offensive smoker off the bus. It also allowed the bus driver to call on other passengers to help him restrain the smoker. And it made smoking on a bus a misdemeanor, punishable by 6 months in jail and a \$300 fine.

Black said the bill was modeled after similar legislation in Oregon and Utah. But Black later admitted he had not carefully read the en-

forcement language before he submitted the bill.

Arguing against intrusion into private business was Pocatello Democrat Patty McDermott, whose cigarette often dangles in the breeze.

McDermott said she had to ride the bus from Twin Falls to Boise, and no one smoked on the bus.

McDermott said her biggest fear was that an 80-year-old lady, unfamiliar with the law, might be thrown off in a howling blizzard in

Bremmers was a member of the local emergency response team which assisted at the scene of tanker truck spill involving the potato-vine killer dinitrophenol. The incident sent a dozen people to the hospital.

Lederie appealed, arguing that no alternative to the vaccine was available and that its Tri-Inmunol vaccine was "unavoidably unsafe."

A review panel of the FDA refused to certify the fractionated-cell vaccine-Tri-Solgen as "safe and effective" in 1972. Because the FDA continues to refuse to license it or any other fractionated-cell product, Lederie said there was no choice on the market but its whole-cell vaccine.

The federal appeals court turned the case back to the Idaho Supreme Court, asking whether the federal tort law principle, "Comment K," protecting pharmaceutical manufacturers from negligence claims for unavoidably unsafe vaccines, applies under Idaho law.

"Unavoidably unsafe vaccines are those which are the only ones available for a given disease, cannot be designed more safely and which, when properly prepared, and accompanied by proper direction and warning, are not defective, nor unreasonably dangerous."

The high court, in an opinion written by Justice Stephen Bistline, ruled that Comment K shields from liability vaccines "that cannot be designed to be more safe at the time of distribution, but bestow benefits which clearly appear at the time of distribution to outweigh their concomitant risks. This seems to us to be a sensible system."

However, the court said the applicability of Comment K, or whether the benefits of a particular vaccine, such as Tri-Inmunol outweigh the risks, must be decided case by case.

"I think we sometimes go a bit overboard in our zeal to protect the health and welfare of individuals," McDermott argued.

McDermott with Sorenson was Rep. Liz Allan-Hodge, R-Caldwell, who also opposed the stiff fine and jail sentence.

Rep. Robert E. Schaefer, R-Nampa, said the bill did everything but provide the rope to hang the smoker.

"I just think this bill encourages vigilante justice, and that's not appropriate," Schaefer said.

Rep. Dean Haagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, said he had a hard time with trying to enforce common courtesy.

"I wouldn't want to sit by a man wearing a dirty wool coat on a rainy day, but we're not trying to stop that," Haagenson said.

Black did pick up support from Boise physician and Majority Caucus Chairman Dean Sorenson.

Sorenson said smoking in confinement poses a serious health hazard. He said, "Either way, it's not a problem for us," Stewart said. During his 12 years in Oregon, he had never heard of anyone being "heaved off the bus" for violating the no-smoking law, he said.

said 5,000 non-smokers die a year of exposure to smoke.

Sorenson also took a light-hearted jab at House Speaker Tom Boyd, a heavy smoker.

"The only place that's more dangerous than a bus or an airplane is your office," he said, referring to Boyd.

Despite Sorenson's second opinion, the bill failed.

Black said he will reintroduce the bill, minus the misdemeanor penalty and the citizen's arrest language.

Boise Greyhound manager Dick Stewart said bus companies now follow federal regulations regarding smoking. Smoking is limited to the last three rows on the bus, he said.

Stewart, who worked 12 years with Greyhound in Oregon, said Oregon and Utah both prohibit any smoking on buses.

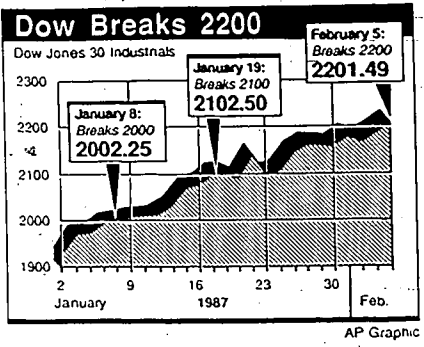

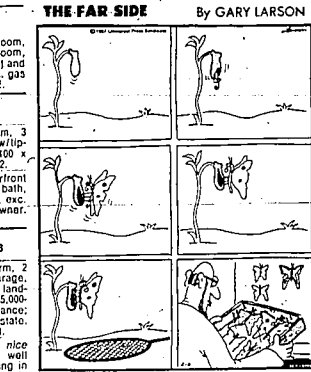

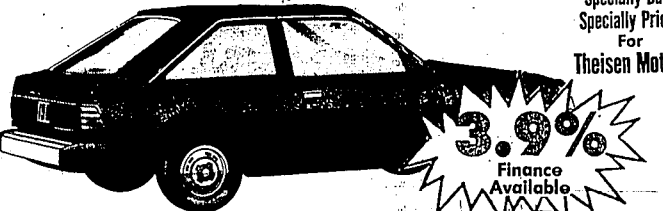

ELKO, Nev. — Guitars, mandolins, fiddles and even an occasional harmonica rang out Western tunes sung by real cowboys at the third annual Cowboy Poetry Gathering held in Elko, Nev., last week.

"It's kinda hard to go to something like this and be a spectator. It is for me anyway," said Ernie Sites, a musician from Wendell, Idaho, at the Gathering.

"Last year when I came down it was the first time and I really went just to watch. But I ended up getting so involved in it — I did everything, I read and sang. . . just couldn't stop. It was so much fun."

Sites, who works as a carpenter in warm weather and in winter travels the state playing mandolin and guitar and singing with several different groups, said he wouldn't miss the Gathering for anything.

"Everybody's real kicked back," said Sites. "People accept people how they are around here. It gives you a chance to meet some of these people like Riders in the Sky and Baxter Black, who are really revered by their fellow cowboys and friends. They aren't making a lot of money to come here. They come because they want to be here and that makes the difference."

This year more people than ever chose to be there. Hal Cannon, director of the Western Folklife Center, which organizes the Gathering, estimated that 8,000 people attended, up from 5,000 last year.

He also noted that music was a growing attraction and will continue to be included in the schedule at future Gatherings. "We have lots of people who are interested in both (poetry and music) and lots of songs start out as popular poems."

He was raised on a farm outside of Wendell and spent his youth caring for the family's livestock and working in the summer on ranches in the area. He also has worked as a rodeo clown and competed in rodeos, roping, bareback riding and an experience he wrote about in his poem, "Winning Buckle."

This year he played and sang his own original tunes, "Survival" and "Saddle Bags and Wishes," at the Cowboy Music Jamboe, an adjunct to the Gathering. He also recited two of his poems in an open session on Thursday afternoon.

Poets and musicians participating in the Gathering all come from a ranching background. More than 150 men and women, representing 17 states and British Columbia, performed and recited during the three-day event.

The vast majority of spectators were people who know first-hand the trials and the joys of ranch life. Poems and songs about stubborn cows and stubborn wire gates, calving season and good cow dogs brought quick tears and laughter.

Though the crowds were large, a down-home family atmosphere prevailed. It was a time to renew old friendships and forge new ones.

"This is real inspirational," said Sites during a break in the festivities. "You come down here and meet the top-notchers."

Hailey artist to design Gem centennial stamp

HAILEY — Idaho's centennial is still two years away and already plans are in the making for the state to receive national attention for this milestone.

Local resident and natural history artist John D. Dawson received notification two weeks ago from the United States Postal Service to design a postage stamp commemorating Idaho's 100th anniversary. At the same time Dawson also received a commission to do a series of four stamps depicting cats.

A committee of art directors and designers working with the postal service awarded the two contracts to Dawson, who had tried for seven years to snare a contract to design a postage stamp. Some stamps are committed to artists six or seven years in advance, Dawson said.

Although his name will not appear on the stamps, the honor of being selected for the work is very "prestigious" and of great benefit, Dawson said.

"I wanted to do a series of trout, but they haven't bought that idea yet," Dawson said.

He is in the process of developing ideas for the centennial stamp, with plans to finish the design by next year for distribution in 1989.

Kathleen Eder, postmaster of the Hailey Post Office, said it is

quite an honor to receive a commission for a postage stamp. She said the commemorative stamp for Idaho's statehood will most likely be received with fanfare, including a big celebration in either Boise or possibly Hailey on the first day of issue.

Eder did not have exact figures, but estimates both the centennial and cat stamps will be produced in the millions, reaching people across the country and abroad.

Over the years, Dawson has received major commissions from Time-Life Books, Reader's Digest, the National Wildlife Federation, Science 86, Page Museum of La Brea Discoveries, the National Park Service and the San Diego, Bronx and Pittsburgh zoos, all of which have brought him international recognition and awards from not only art connoisseurs but also from the science, outdoor and nature-loving community.

The February issue of National Geographic magazine includes an illustration by Dawson for an article on the Appalachian Trail. Next month's National Geographic will feature his illustration of the peat bogs of Minnesota.

Dawson is becoming a regular contributor to National Geographic, having chucked up historical illustrations of San Houston and the Battle of San Jacinto in the March 1986 issue,

as well as a major piece on ants in the June 1984 issue.

"National Geographic is just fantastic to work for," Dawson said. The publication spends a lot of time and money to research each article to insure its accuracy, down to the most minute details, he said.

Dawson works out of his home, where studio picture windows overlooking the Big Wood River at East Fork create a feeling of sitting in the wilderness he loves so well.

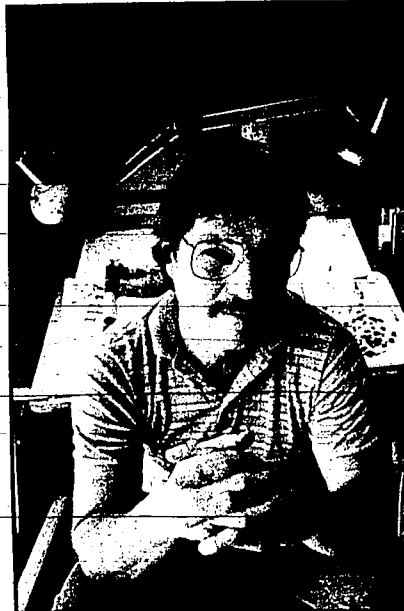
But, working seven days a week to keep up with his assignments leaves him with less time than he'd like to spend in the outdoors.

Dawson, along with his wife Kathleen and their two children, moved to Idaho 10 years ago from San Diego. His reputation as an artist followed him here, giving him certain advantages in relocating to a remote area in terms of the commercial art world.

"There's a certain mystique from being out West," Dawson said. "To New Yorkers, if it's west of the Hudson River, it's wilderness," explained Dawson.

His work in Idaho has been 90 percent paintings, with the remainder being sketches and line drawings.

Dawson pays attention to detail. His illustrations show every crinkle in a dried leaf, the exacting shadows from a cast of light and the bristly wisps of fine

hairs on a flower. Recently Dawson has been finishing a tropical forest poster for the Audubon Society and is working on over 200 illustrations

of birds, flowers, trees and vegetation for an updated issue of the World Book Encyclopedia.

Long-opposed 'GWTW' sequel OKd

ATLANTA (AP) — Will Scarlett O'Hara find a new love? Will Rhett Butler learn to give a damn? Some of the greatest unanswered questions in American literature may soon be answered. The estate of Margaret Mitchell, author of "Gone With the Wind," adamantly opposed a sequel to her work with a New York literary agent on an authorized novel continuing the story of Scarlett and Rhett. The book could be published as soon as next year—and a sequel to the blockbuster 1939 movie is likely to follow, said T. Hal Clarke, an Atlanta attorney who sits on a committee that represents the Mitchell estate in decisions concerning "Gone With the Wind." Clarke said Thursday that Stephens Mitchell, the author's

brother, reluctantly agreed before his death in 1983 that the Mitchell family must proceed with a sequel, even though it would go against his sister's wishes. Mitchell, a real estate attorney, knew that if the family did not act, word of unauthorized sequels would be released when the "Gone With the Wind" copyright expires in 2011, Clarke said. Miss Mitchell, who died in 1949 at age 48, probably would support the decision, in light of the present-day circumstances, have changed her mind. —Clarke—and the two other attorneys on the committee, all named by Stephens Mitchell in his will, have engaged the William Morris Agency to search for a novelist to write the sequel.

They hope to reach a decision on a writer within a few weeks, he said. Selection of a publisher would follow, and Clarke said it may take a year to get the book in print. Miss Mitchell, a former reporter for the Atlanta Journal-Sunday Magazine, took 10 years to complete the book, the only one she published. "Gone With the Wind" fans will have to wait awhile to learn whether Scarlett and Rhett, whose rocky marriage ended in separation at the conclusion of Miss Mitchell's novel, are reunited in the sequel. Clarke said he had not discussed the plot with the agency, although the committee and the surviving members of the Mitchell family—Stephens Mitchell's two sons, will review proposed plots before publication. He said no title has been

chosen. More than 25 million copies of "Gone With the Wind" have been published in 27 languages, making it one of the best-known works in American fiction. The Civil War saga won a Pulitzer Prize for Miss Mitchell in 1937. Miss Mitchell rejected suggestions that she write a sequel. "Many others have attempted to do so, but they were unauthorized and were not allowed," Clarke said. Shortly before Stephens Mitchell's death, he began a legal battle with MGM, distributor of the 1939 David O. Selznick film, over rights to a film case was decided, a federal court ruled in 1984 that the family-held sequel rights to any sequel, and the ruling was upheld on appeal.

Lack of control is criminal offense of 'Crimes of the Heart'

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

CRIMES OF THE HEART (PG-13) — Exciting — a combination of Beth Henne's incisive and eccentric screenplay based on her Pulitzer Prize-winning play, Bruce Beresford's frenzied direction and the sight of three singular talents (Diane Keaton, Jessica Lange and Sissy Spacek, playing three ditzy Southern sisters who reunite after years apart) on an acting roller-coaster with no one riding the brakes. The resulting pure is one of the great crimes of the art.

THE BEDROOM WINDOW (R) — Based on Anne Halden's British novel "The Witnesses," and reset in

Baltimore by writer-director Curtis Hanson, this movie has an intriguing premise and a lively performance by Isabelle Huppert, Elizabeth McGovern and (for the first half) Steve Guttenberg. The premise: An adulterous wife, during an assignment, witnesses an assault by a probably serial sex murderer; her lover, to protect her, tells her he was the witness — fanning up the investigation. The movie is stronger on character than thrills, and there are major plot holes, though less than usual, for this kind of Hitchcock pastiche. It is a middling, unobjectionable job.

BRIGHTON BEACH MEMOIRS (PG-13) — Buried inside this movie of Neil Simon's semi-autobiographical play is a tender, sharp-eyed reminiscence of a Brooklyn adolescence: of family squabbles, brotherly bonds and the crisis of raging puberty. It mostly stays buried. The story's heart seems to be beating in a plastic wrapper, and under director Gene Saks' biz, there is a sugary show biz glaze over everything. The '60s settings are meticulously re-created, but the breath of life never passes through them; though Simon's dialogue is among his best, and Judith Ivey and Steven Hill are excellent in support.

CRITICAL CONDITION (R) — Richard Pryor has a near-perfect role here: a hapless convict, trying to fake insanity, who — during a power blackout — is mistaken for a visiting doctor at a hospital plunged into crisis. Pryor makes the most of his possibilities, but the film does not, though writers Denis and John Hamill make a commendable stab at resurrecting the old comic density of a Preston Sturges or Hecht-MacArthur screenplay. Everything gets a bit too loose and frantic, and the jokes are not concentrated or

pungent enough. Director Michael Apted, however, is on his toes; he supplies enough background movement for a whole season of "Hill Street Blues."

CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13) — The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian tourism ads) is at the heart of this movie — which he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kozlowski's inquisitive Newsway reporter in the Aussie outback, and then in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser, but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

THE GOLDEN CHILD (PG-13) — High in the wind-tashed mountains of Tibet sits the Golden Child — whom many believe is the true, perfect soul humanity has long awaited, surrounded by Evil Forces: heinous killers, slaving brutes, vile demons surging up from the bowels of Hell. Will he survive? Oh, sure. And deep in your own local movie house lies "The Golden Child," which many die Murphy comedy we have long awaited. It is beset by even more Evil Forces: heinous scripting, slaving special effects, vile clichés surging up from the bowels of Hollywood: Can it survive? Nope.

THE LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS (PG-13) — This remake of the 1960 Roger Corman Z-horror classic (about Audrey, the man-eating plant), taken from the infectious

views of the Guarani Indians, its general lack of surprise and occasional deadly lines of dialogue that would defeat Olivier (they rout De Niro).

THE MOSQUITO COAST (PG) — Allie Fox is a neurotic inventor who moves his family to Belize in an attempt to remove them from the pernicious influence of modern Western society. Even though his bedrock obstinateness makes you want to hit him with a board, he is an irresistible force on the screen and, as Allie, Harrison Ford's power — even with his back to the camera, even when we cannot read his face — is terrifying. Director Peter Weir is

terrifying. Director Peter Weir is

hauntingly serious and pastiche — in many ways — successful; it provides Jeremy Irons with a chance for his purest and most searing film performance, and it gives Robert De Niro another of those nearly impossible physical challenges he thrives on. But the picture teeters with its idealized

fascinated, as he has been in his prior films, by the displacement that occurs when an outsider bursts into a completely foreign culture. He has orchestrated "The Mosquito Coast's" action to match Fox's progressive mental state, from rage to explosion to squalls and finally to hurricane velocity. However, the film — leaves us — not — with an apotheosis, but in exhaustion.

'Platoon' in top box office slot

LOS ANGELES (AP) — "Platoon," Oliver Stone's personal account of the Vietnam War and its first two weeks of the top Golden Globe awards, moved into the No. 1 box office slot, even though only 550 theaters are showing it.

"Platoon," in its seventh week in limited release, took in \$8.35 million for a \$1,157 per-screen average.

As holiday movies receded in ticket sales, studios began making new releases. Making debuts in the Top 10 this week were "Outrageous Fortune" from Disney, Cannon's "Allan Quatermain And The Lost City of Gold," and Woody Allen's "Radio Days." "Outrageous Fortune," starring Bette Midler and Shelley Long as competing actresses who become buddies, earned second place in its debut weekend with a robust \$5.84 million take at the turnstiles in 1,091 theaters nationwide. "Platoon" director Stone won a Golden Globe and the picture was voted best movie drama by the Hollywood Foreign Press Association. It is widely mentioned as an Oscar contender for best picture. Nominations will be announced Feb. 11.

"Crocodile" Dundee" was third with \$2.8 million in receipts, bringing its gross in 19 weeks of release to about \$140 million. Richard Pryor's hospital comedy "Critical Condition" took in \$2.6 million by office while Eddie Murphy's "The Golden Child" was No. 5 and "Star Trek IV: The Voyage Home" was sixth, taking in about \$2.3 million each.

In seventh place was the Richard Chamberlain-Sharon Stone jungle-adventure movie "Allan Quatermain and the Lost City of Gold," which lured enough moviegoers to register \$2 million in its first week of release.

At No. 8 was the De Laurentiis thriller "Bedroom Window," with \$1.8 million. In ninth place was Warner Bros.' "Little Shop of Horrors" with \$1.7 million. "Radio Days" began in 10th place in limited release at only 128 theaters. The movie, set in the Golden Age of radio, examines how the medium affects a Brooklyn family. Cast members include Mia Farrow, Diane Keaton, Danny Aiello, Tito Puente and Tony Roberts. The movie earned \$1.5 million in ticket sales, for a per-screen average of \$11,893.

Several years ago you cautioned readers who stored their old refrigerators in their garages or basements to either turn the refrigerator with the door facing the wall, or to remove the refrigerator door so that small children could not crawl into them and have the door close behind them and suffocate to death.

Recently, three young children were found dead in a refrigerator stored in a barn. Please repeat that

warning. It could save lives.

Readers, if you see a temporarily stored or discarded refrigerator or freezer in your neighborhood—or anywhere else—you could prevent a possible tragedy by calling the potential safety hazard to the attention of the owner, or telephoning the police department for prompt attention in eliminating the danger.

DEAR ABBY: Will you please settle a long-standing argument my husband and I have been having with my sister, Clara? Clara is single and the three of us have been taking our vacations together. We always take one motel room with double beds in it.

Wyeth 'Helga' show to tour

WASHINGTON (AP) — The American public will get its first look at Andrew Wyeth's long-secret pictures of his mystery model, Helga, when the National Gallery of Art opens a four-month exhibition of 140 of the artist's watercolors and drawings on May 24.

Gallery director J. Carter Brown told reporters Tuesday that public interest in the show, which will travel to five other cities in the next two years, was "unprecedented in my experience," partly because of curiosity about Wyeth's relationship with Helga Testori, his blonde, blue-eyed neighbor in Chadds Ford, Pa.

The Book-of-the-Month Club has chosen the full-color exhibition catalog, to be published by Harry N. Abrams Inc., as its main selection for July. It will be the first time in the club's 60-year history that it has extended that recognition to an art book.

Abrams publisher Paul Gottlieb said the first printing of the book will be 250,000 copies, which he said compares "extremely well" to other art books which usually have a first run of about 10,000 copies.

Editions also will be sold in England, France, Germany, Holland and Japan, making it the first time that a Wyeth book has been published outside the United States.

The Helga pictures were done by Wyeth over a 15-year period but were kept a closely-guarded secret until a collection of 240 of the paintings, drawings and watercolors were bought last year by Leonard E.B. Andrews of Newtown Square, Pa., a millionaire publisher and art collector.

Gallery, wrote in an essay for the catalog. Huge crowds are expected to see the Helga pictures, which so far have been seen only by the Wyeth family, Andrews, Wilmerding and a few other people. The show may well eclipse the National Gallery's record-breaking "Treasure Houses of Britain"—last winter, which drew nearly 1 million visitors.

Miniseries reminds actor Collins of darkly romantic period piece

LOS ANGELES — Stephen Collins says it only occurred to him later that the NBC miniseries "The Two Mrs. Grenvilles" resembles a 1940s romantic film.

"As an actor, I have to look at the script to see if something comes alive for me," he says. "Later, I did realize it was like some of the period films. But it didn't strike me at first."

"I hope Billy Wilder will forgive me, but there's something about 'The Two Mrs. Grenvilles' that is like 'Sunset Boulevard.' It has that dark story told by a narrator."

The four-hour, two-part miniseries tells of the clash between two women: a beautiful young social climber who marries a feckless playboy, and her aristocratic mother-in-law, and the tragic incident that makes them antagonistic partners in a cover-up. *K38AS* and *KUTV* will telecast it 8 p.m. Sunday and Monday.

"The Two Mrs. Grenvilles" is adapted from the best-selling novel by Dominick Dunne, which is loosely based on a true story. It is set in the period from World War II to the mid-1950s.

Collins stars as Billy Grenville Jr., who falls in love with an ambitious showgirl and foolishly marries her despite the frosty reaction of his family. But, as his mother feared, the marriage falls apart as a result of his wife's grasping ambition and lack of social grace. Billy drinks and chases other women.

Ann-Margret is Ann Arden, who shoots her husband to death in their Long Island estate after they brawl at a party for the Duchess of Windsor. It's questionable whether she killed him in cold blood or, as she claims, she thought she was defending herself against a burglar.

Claudette Colbert, in her first screen role in 26 years, stars as Alice Grenville. The wealthy Mrs. Grenville exerts all her financial and social power to avoid a scandal and

Soap Opera Scene

Pioneering soap 'Guiding Light' never tame in its topical approach

On Jan. 25, 1937, a 15-minute radio show hit the airwaves titled "The Guiding Light." It told the story of Reverend Ruthledge, the kindly clergyman of Five Points, a suburb of Chicago (also the location of the station where the soap was done). He acted as the "beacon or "guiding light" which brought the citizens with problems to a safe harbor. Actually, the Reverend Ruthledge had a reading lamp in the window which inspired the title. Incidentally, the word "the" was dropped years later and the soap became "Guiding Light."

Fifty years have passed since the soap began gathering faithful listeners (and subsequently viewers). There is no other broadcast drama which boasts such a record. In June, 1952, "Guiding Light" made its debut on TV, while continuing on radio (another first). In fact, the TV and radio versions ran simultaneously for four years (the radio soap stopped airing in 1956).

Another interesting aspect of "Guiding Light" is the departure from the normal soap plots. When the show was conceived by the high priestess of soaps, Irna Phillips, she insisted that the characters deal with real-life situations and not just the pat formulas usually followed by soaps in early broadcasting days. The plots dealt with racial prejudice, liberated women, unwed mothers, sadomasochistic relationships and other topics long before they became the fashion of the day on soaps.

It has been reported that Irna would actually dictate the dialogue for her soaps, sitting in a chair and acting every role. She was an original and she invested the soaps on which she worked with an energy that translated to huge audience acceptance. It's no wonder that Irna Phillips became the most powerful woman in the world of soaps, a position she kept until her death in 1973.

Many stars have had their start on "Guiding Light," including Kevin Bacon, Christopher Walken, Billy Dee Williams, Cleely-Tyson, Sandy Dennis, Barnard Hughes, Blythe Danner, JoBeth Williams — just to name a few. There have been guest star appearances by many

NBC wins one, loses one for week

NEW YORK — There was no secret in NBC's win in the prime-time ratings last week, with its Thursday comedies at the top of the rankings, but network analysts were baffled by NBC's loss to CBS in the news ratings.

For the week ending Jan. 30, the "CBS Evening News" had an average rating of 13.9 to a 12.4 for the "NBC Nightly News." "World News Tonight" on ABC had a 10.8. NBC and CBS have been neck-and-neck in the news ratings for weeks.

"They went out and just beat us," said Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects. "Hopefully this is just a one-week thing."

Confounding the analysts was the fact that the "CBS Evening News" scored highest on Thursday night, NBC's biggest night of prime-time programming.

"It just shows when people say news gets a benefit from prime

time, it clearly doesn't," Jaffe said. NBC's Thursday night comedies — "The Cosby Show," "Family Ties," "Cheers" and "Night Court" — were the four top-ranked shows in prime time last week. "Cosby," even though a repeat, got a rating of 36.1 and drew 52 percent of the viewing audience.

NBC won the week with a prime-time average rating of 17.4. CBS was second with 15.7, and ABC was third with 15.1.

The rating represents the total number of homes tuned in. Each rating point represents 874,000 households.

Thanks to a top 10 performance by the "American Music Awards" on Monday, ABC had its closest third to CBS this season, except for the first week of the season when CBS came in third.

NBC's prime-time average rating for the season to date is 17.9. CBS' is 16.1 and ABC's is 14.2.

The rest of the top 10 shows last week were "Growing Pains,"

"Murder, She Wrote," "Who's the Boss," "60 Minutes," "American Music Awards" and "Golden Girls."

The return of "Designing Women" on CBS in a special one-hour episode on Sunday was in the top 20, ranked 15th with a rating of 19.2. Starting this week, it will be back in its 30-minute form in its new time period on Sunday.

NBC's made-for-TV movie about Lyndon Johnson, "LBJ: The Early Years," made the top 20, at 19th.

CBS' new drama about crime reporters, "Hard Copy," was not faring so well on Sunday night in its first outing without a lead-in from the Super Bowl. It had a rating of 12.9 and was ranked 49th.

The bottom 10 shows of the 66 ranked were, from the bottom: "Our World," "Dads," CBS' State of the Union analysis, "Gung Ho," NBC's State of the Union analysis, "Slidekicks," "Shell Game," "Wizard," "Sledge Hammer!" and "Starman."

China broadcasts in the works

WASHINGTON — NBC News has reached an unprecedented agreement with the Peoples Republic of China to air the major NBC News programs — including "Nightly News" and "Today" — live from the mainland over a period of five days, starting Sept. 28.

NBC News President Lawrence Grossman announced the "exclusive agreements" Monday at a regional meeting of NBC affiliates.

In addition, NBC plans to air a live

one-hour prime time special from throughout China on Oct. 1, on the occasion of the 38th anniversary of the founding of the PRC in 1949.

The Sept. 27 editions of "Sunday Today," the 90-minute morning program that will debut on the network earlier that month, as well as its Sunday follow-on program, "Meet the Press," will also include live and taped material from China.

Taped segments on business news from China will also be satellite to "Before Hours," the joint NBC News-Wall Street Journal program that debuts early March 2.

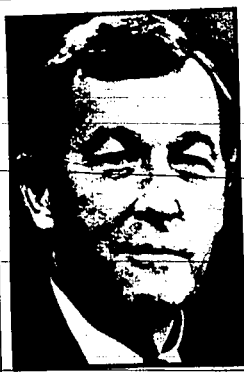



Storm of controversy continues to

Songwriter-actor Kris Kristofferson, who describes himself as a liberal, says he took the starring role in ABC's controversial 14 1/2-hour miniseries "Amerika" because he hoped it would stir up "healthy debate."

Healthy or not, there is plenty of debate about the ABC miniseries, scheduled to run the week of Feb. 15.

Just over two weeks before "Amerika"'s debut, Chrysler Motors Corp. announced Jan. 27 it wanted to extricate itself as a major sponsor of the program — at \$175,000 per 30-second commercial — because, "The subject matter and its portrayal are so intense and emotional that our upbeat commercials would be both inappropriate and of diminished ef-



fectiveness in that environment."

"That environment" is a picture of "an American future under Soviet domination that is bleak, desolate and all but hopeless.

The company's product commercials have carried the theme line, "The Pride is Back" and have featured glimpses of Americana.

The Chrysler reaction was mild, compared to the rest of the debate. The Soviet Union has protested to ABC. The United Nations has reacted vociferously to the use of its emblem by the troops occupying this country. A number of national leaders, including three former secretaries of state, have expressed their concern to ABC in a letter and urged the network to give air time to the United Nations' peacekeeping role.

The program also has been criticized for reviving the specter of the "Red scare" and the image of the Soviet Union as "the evil empire." In addition, since the Soviets took over without a war, it suggests that America let its guard down.

"Amerika" starts with the premise that it's now 10 years since the United States fell to the Soviet Union after a bloodless but unex-

Let television viewers decide merits

HOLLYWOOD — Seldom have Americans been lectured so much about a TV production they have not seen.

The result may be that viewers are already bored with the controversial "Amerika," even though the miniseries is not scheduled to premiere until Feb. 15. That is their right.

They also have the right to see "Amerika" and decide for themselves whether it is fascinating, or dull, honest or shifty, or if the oft-made charge is true:

That its depiction of a 1997 America ruled by the Kremlin through its puppet United Nations troops is an arch-conservative pblemic on widening the gap between the United States and the Soviet Union and also heating up the nuclear arms race.

Maybe "Amerika" is all of that, some of that or none of that. And just maybe Americans should find out for themselves.

"Amerika" has been heavily criticized by the United Nations and a host of special-interest groups of various sizes and charters. All have demanded script changes. Some, like the leftist Fairness & Accuracy in Reporting and Committee for National Security, want ABC to provide air time to discuss "Amerika." A few have called for boycotting "Amerika" sponsors.

It is against this background that the Chrysler Corp. an-

nounced that it was yanking its \$5 million worth of advertising from "Amerika." Chrysler's defection reportedly leaves General Foods as the largest single sponsor of "Amerika."

ABC has vowed not to drop "Amerika."

How could it? It has too much money (a reported \$35 million), time, promotion and prestige wrapped up in this miniseries projected as the heart of its February ratings sweeps programming. A hit "Amerika" would lift ABC's sagging fortunes.

And if ABC did drop "Amerika," the result would be catastrophic for TV, signaling pressure groups of all political and philosophical shades that ABC can be had.

Many of the network's critics believe that "Amerika" proves ABC already has been had — by conservatives. And ABC and "Amerika" writer-director-producer Donald Wrye have undercut their own credibility by not being forthright and by making conflicting statements about the production.

Meanwhile, ABC is now accusing unnamed "certain organizations" of trying to hound "Amerika" off the air.

The line between censorship of programs and advocating change is so thin that it is sometimes barely visible.

"The censorship issue is clearly lurking," said Jonathan Halperin, program director for the Committee for National Security, reacting Thursday to the Chrysler decision. "But we didn't get into this to get the show off the air," said Halperin from Washington.

The fight against "Amerika" has been led by New York-based Fairness & Accuracy in Reporting, whose executive director, Jeff Cohen, said Thursday that he also was a bit edgy about the Chrysler withdrawal.

"We're real concerned about any sponsor pullout because of what it portends for the future of controversial programming on networks," he said from New York. Fairness & Accuracy in Reporting wants ABC to air some "Viewpoint" programs to hash over the issues raised by "Amerika."

"For every word that we've uttered about 'Amerika,'" Cohen said, "we've pointed out that we don't support prior-restraint boycotts or anything like that."

Chrysler maintains that its decision to split from "Amerika" was linked only to the program's downbeat theme and not growing controversy over its alleged politics and depiction of a Kremlin-controlled U.N.

Skeptics, start your snickers. TV networks are in the business of airing only programs that appeal to sponsors, who thus have always had a direct or indirect say in TV content. Moreover, there are ongoing

plained encounter. During that time the changes in this country have been insidious and massive.

ABC, although losing Chrysler Corp. as a major sponsor, said Jan. 28 that the show would still air as scheduled and that it was "appalled" at the condemnation it has gotten before its broadcast.

"We are concerned that certain organizations for their own special interests have criticized 'Amerika' sight-unseen, and would threaten advertisers for supporting the program," ABC said in a strongly worded, if somewhat ambiguous, statement.

ABC spokesman Dick Connelly added that his network received more than 4,000 letters critical of "Amerika," even though no outsiders or outside groups had yet seen more than 4½ hours of it.

To blunt the controversy, the network is offering its affiliates a half-hour special about the making of "Amerika," called "The Storm Over Amerika."

"The Storm Over Amerika" includes interviews with "Amerika" producer, writer and director Donald Wrye and stars Kristoffer-son, Robert Ulrich, Christine Lahti, Cindy Pickett and Reiner Schoene, an East German, and scholars will examine the theme of the miniseries.

The lawyer representing the United Nations in the dispute with Capital Cities-ABC, Inc. over the program said Jan. 29 he had ruled out seeking any injunction to prevent the show from airing.

But Theodore Sorenson, the former aide to President Kennedy, said he was still negotiating with network officials on some form of counter-programming to bolster the U.N.'s image.

Sorenson briefed an ad hoc coalition of nongovernmental organizations that has banded together on behalf of the U.N. to apply pressure on ABC. Sorenson said that the U.N. was still keeping open its option to

seek legal redress for any misuse of its logo — the globe surrounded by an olive branch — or other defamation, but that nothing would be done until the miniseries airs.

He expressed the hope that ABC executives, at a meeting scheduled for next week, would agree to provide air time to present a more factual image of the U.N., or offer a disclaimer at the start of the show, which depicts an America in which U.N. peacekeeping forces police the U.S. at the behest of the Soviet occupiers, using vivid brutality.

Sorenson conceded that he had abandoned hope of altering the show that is to be aired and is emphasizing the idea of counter-programming instead. The attorney, whose wife Gillian is the New York commissioner in charge of the U.N., is representing the institution in a pro bono capacity.

ABC's \$35 million project began with a suggestion by Brandon Stoddard, who is now president of ABC Entertainment.

Soviet Union among potential buyers

NEW YORK — Archie Purvis went to the National Association of Television Program Executives convention in New Orleans last week to sell ABC programs. Among his wares: the controversial 14½-hour miniseries "Amerika."

He returned, he said, with orders for the show from TV executives in Ecuador, Columbia, Costa Rica, Panama and the Philippines. The show had been sold in Italy and Argentina before the convention.

In addition, "serious negotiations" are under way with television officials in the United Kingdom, Scandinavia, Holland and Japan for the broadcast rights to "Amerika," he said.

And even the Soviet Union —

which previously had assailed the program, sight unseen — earlier this month expressed interest in seeing it and possibly buying it when its final version is ready, said Purvis, senior vice president of ABC Distribution Co., the sales arm of ABC Video Enterprises.

There are those who might call all the uproar over the controversial miniseries bad publicity. But controversy has been known to help a show. And the turmoil now attending "Amerika" has not hurt the effort to sell it in foreign markets, Purvis said.

"There's only one reason," he said about the Soviets' interest. "They're curious about the program."

The query could signal a second small ray of TV light in the Cold War. A few days earlier, the Soviets purchased broadcast rights for

ABC's once-controversial "The Day After," the 1983 TV movie that depicts the aftermath of a nuclear war between their country and the United States.

David Poltrak, CBS' vice president for audience research, said that he expects the advance hype and controversy about "Amerika" probably will start it off with good ratings, then — as happens with most miniseries — they will drop off.

Joel Segal, executive vice president of broadcasting at Ted Bates Co., a major advertising agency, offered a similar assessment.

"I think it's going to start out high, then move lower," he said. He expects that "Amerika" will average a 34 percent share of the national audience week-long run.

sponsor defections that are never publicized because they do not involve controversial programs.

The "Amerika" sponsor episode, though, recalls the 1977 controversy over "Jesus of Nazareth" on NBC, when General Motors withdrew its support of that brilliant production following loud protests by fundamentalist religious groups that had not even seen the program.

Procter & Gamble then purchased the GM spots at bargain rates, which turned out to be a bonanza buy when "Jesus of Nazareth" became an enormous hit.

At least many "Amerika" critics have seen up to four hours of the miniseries — which is all ABC has made available — and read a version of the script.

And now the rest of America deserves a crack at the miniseries.

"Noticiero Univision," produced at KMEX's studios here by ECO Inc.

replaced "24 Hours," a nightly news program produced in Mexico City.

The new 60-minute program — anchored by Maria Elena Salinas — was broadcast to the more than 400 affiliates of Univision, formerly the Spanish-International Network, which subscribes to ECO's newscast.

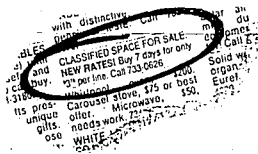
"There will be a difference because ('Noticiero Univision') will be produced with a greater selection of news items about U.S. Hispanics," ECO president Luis Nogales said.
