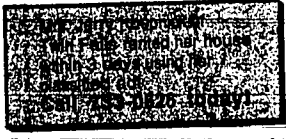

Reagan offers catastrophic health plan

WASHINGTON — President Reagan proposed Thursday that Congress protect 30 million elderly Americans "from the worst fear of old age" by enacting insurance covering the devastating costs of catastrophic illness.

Overruling conservative opposition, Reagan recommended that the government cover all hospital and doctor expenses under Medicare after a patient had paid \$2,000 out of his own pocket. The extra coverage would add \$492 a month — \$59 annually — to Medicare recipients' \$17.90 monthly "Part B" premium.

The program, the result of more than a year's debate within the administration, would not cover long-term nursing home care or expenses such as prescription drugs and eye or dental care.

Reagan's announcement provided momentum for an issue that already has widespread backing on Capitol Hill.

"I think there is a very good chance of legislation," said White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. "There will be a lively debate but I expect legislation to pass, and I think the Reagan plan will be the basis for that legislation."

Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., the chairman of the House Commerce health subcommittee, said the president's move was "an important

first step," but noted the plan leaves out some aspects of health care that are most troubling to elderly Americans, such as costly long-term nursing home care.

"Now we in the Congress will have to make the hard decisions about whether this limited proposal is an adequate response or whether we can do more to assist Americans who are severely ill," Waxman said in a statement.

Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., the ranking Republican on the Senate Finance Committee's health subcommittee, said, "This is by far a better way for people to protect themselves from catastrophic expenses... The most serious criticism that can be offered of this proposal is that it is far too little."

Led by Attorney General Edwin Meese and the budget director, James Miller, conservatives had been opposing the plan as it was being developed, arguing that it relied too much on the government and not enough on the health industry.

In the end, Reagan sided with Otis Bowen, the secretary of health and human services, and author of the plan. Bowen said Reagan had not altered his plan in any respect.

Rep. Claude Pepper, D-Fla., said the plan was not the giant step it was portrayed to be, but "the step of a dwarf, timid about going forward."

Rates high enough, farmers tell BPA

BURLEY — Irrigated agriculture has reached its limit and farmers will be "pushed over the edge of a cliff" if the Bonneville Power Administration goes ahead with its proposed 11.6 percent rate increase for rural electric cooperatives, said farmers attending a hearing on Thursday.

"BPA was created to serve rural America. Rural America wasn't created to serve BPA," said Mitchell D. Sorensen, a farmer from Mōdre.

Sorensen gave a low-key description of how higher power costs would affect his operation to a packed room of about 75 people attending the rate hearing at the Burley Inn.

But despite his speaking style, the audience applauded the content.

"I've been pushed over the edge of the cliff," Sorensen said. "I have a pro amount of dollars to spend to produce a crop. I will spend the same amount of money and buy less power. I will be a declining customer," he said.

Sorensen said the Lost River Electric Cooperative, which buys power from BPA, has experienced lower sales due to the problems in agriculture. This has resulted in higher electrical costs for the remaining members of the cooperative, he said.

His statement was similar to that of other speakers.

BPA officials have said that without a rate increase it is facing a \$70 to \$80 million net loss in fiscal 1987, and it could lose another \$350

million by the end of 1989, according to a BPA brochure.

BPA cost containment measures will reduce its budget growth by \$761 million over the next three years, said Robert N. Lafiel, BPA district manager in Idaho Falls.

BPA is being pinched by lower sales to aluminum plants in Northwest and a drop in income it gets for selling surplus power to California whose utilities are burning more oil because of lower fuel prices. In the last few years BPA revenue from the aluminum plants and California has dropped from 50 percent of the total to 33 percent, Lafiel said.

Despite these arguments for a rate increase to take effect Oct. 1, a number of speakers seemed unconvinced.

"Irrigated farming has about

reached its limit and we cannot continue to pay more and more for electricity and receive less and less for our production," said Joe Alkele of the Lost River Valley.

He said it costs him \$30 to \$50 per acre to run his irrigation pumps and his gross income per acre is \$200. "It greatly concerns me power costs are going up," he said.

Alkele suggested BPA eliminate costs to protect fish and wildlife. BPA plans a \$10.6 million increase in this budget.

Under the Northwest Power Planning Act BPA is required to take measures to make up for the damage to the environment caused by dam construction.

Alkele said conservation programs should be cut to the bone but not cut.

Canada eyes sale of oil, Hodel says

WASHINGTON — Interior Secretary Donald P. Hodel has accused the Canadian government of taking environmental concerns to mask an attempt to increase oil sales to the United States.

Canada called the accusation "colossally stupid."

"The general accusation is not new, but it is the first time someone of such high rank has made it in connection with oil — in this case, the proposed exploratory drilling for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge on the northern coast of Alaska near the Canadian border."

Earlier in the week, Canadian officials told their U.S. counterparts they believed the refuge should be turned into a wilderness area in which development would be barred forever to protect the migratory caribou herd that crosses the border twice a year. U.S. drilling would take place in an area used for calving.

Hodel, who must make a recommendation to Congress this spring on whether to permit drilling, was asked at a breakfast with some reporters on Wednesday what he thought of the Canadian position.

"I think that it's astonishing that the Canadians, after the drilling they've done onshore and offshore in the Arctic, would come along with this kind of a comment at this

time," said Hodel, according to a transcript made available by the department on Thursday.

Canada has drilled several wells in the Beaufort Sea not far from the area, and U.S. officials said Canada has drilled two in the caribou breeding grounds.

"In fact, it's hardly credible unless you put it in the context of the manner in which the Canadians have abused the past processes in the United States for what I think is the furtherance of their own economic activity," Hodel said.

"Canadian environment minister Tom McMillan said, 'I don't think we should be unduly concerned when one of them (a U.S. cabinet member) says something that's colossally stupid.' Hodel, he added, was 'way off base (and) terribly misinformed.'"

"No objective observer credits the conspiracy theory," McMillan said.

Hodel said Canada's position is "absolutely an easy pro-environmental position for them to take — to cost to them and if it's successful it means we'll be more dependent on imported oil and Canada is an oil and natural gas producer."

"To the extent they can persuade us to blindfold ourselves to our own resources, they put us in a position where we will be more dependent upon their resources at a higher price."

Paper says PLO aide saved hostages' lives

BEIRUT — A top aide to PLO chief Yasser Arafat talked Muslim kidnappers out of killing three captives, the Beirut newspaper Al-Anwar reported Thursday.

Salah Khalaf, also known as Abu Iyad, said by telephone from Palestinian Liberation Organization headquarters in Tunis that details of the account were inaccurate but the PLO was trying to free foreigners held in Lebanon.

Al-Anwar, a conservative Christian daily, said Khalaf told the kidnappers the United States would "definitely attack if any of the hostages was executed." Khalaf is chief of security for Arafat's Fatah guerrilla faction.

A U.S. Navy battle group was assembled in the eastern Mediterranean after a new outbreak of kidnappings last month and after Anglican Church hostage negotiator Terry Waite disappeared after leaving his hotel Jan. 20 to talk with kidnapers.

The battle group later was dispersed, and several ships sailed for Israel. On Thursday, the aircraft carrier USS Kennedy and the ammunition ship USS Savannah left Haifa for an undisclosed destination after a six-day visit, a port official said. Five other 6th Fleet ships remained.

Senators chop inflation factor in half

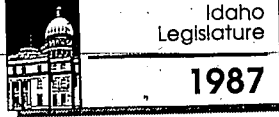

BOISE — In a move that could speed legislative agreement on a new 1988 budget, the Senate's Republican majority directed its budget writers on Thursday to curb the spending plan's inflationary adjustments to 2 percent — half the level economists and the Andrus administration say is needed.

"The general level people were willing to consider was 2 percent," Sen. Jerny Twigg, R-Blackfoot, said after the 26-member majority emerged from an hour-long, closed-door caucus.

Twigg supported for a 2 percent inflationary factor in the new budget was not unanimous. Twigg said there were 22 members of the caucus who supported it, enough to approve appropriations bills at that level on the floor.

"The support began falling off when we went below 2 percent and when we went above that," Twigg, the caucus chairman, said. He said the caucus support involved not only an inflationary



adjustment to basic operating expenses but also for major programs like Medicaid and education support.

It was the first formal decision on the new 1988 budget made by either the House or Senate GOP majorities, and it bolstered the drive by a number of lawmakers to craft a new budget blueprint in the range of \$650 million to \$653 million.

That level, \$10 million to \$12.5 million below the recommendation of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, would avert the need for the GOP to confront a major new tax increase to underwrite

significant spending increases for education and economic development.

Andrus has called for repeal of the investment tax credit to finance his \$662 million budget plan. Senate Republicans have unequivocally opposed repeal, and it appeared the House GOP was beginning to lean in the same direction despite the bandwagon of corporate and business repeal supporters the governor has lined up over the past few weeks.

"We all campaigned that we had to revitalize the state and have adequate funding of education," Andrus said. "That's what I'm trying to do... If there's an alternative I would like to see it."

Meanwhile, another one of the all-but-agreed-to tax hike proposals will be part of the budget package as introduced in the House. It would repeal the \$2.3 billion tax break on farm loan interest approved by lawmakers in an election year decision just 11 months ago.

AIDS-like virus turns up in cats

Researchers have discovered a disease virus in domestic cats that is remarkably similar to the one which causes AIDS in humans, a development they say could make cats an ideal animal model for AIDS research.

Scientists at the University of California at Davis say the new cat virus is genetically distinct from the human AIDS virus, but causes similar disease in the animals.

Although both disease agents belong to the same unusual subfamily of viruses, called retroviruses, there is no indication the cat virus can infect human beings, they said.

"There is no evidence for infection of human beings by cat infection," said Niels C. Pedersen, professor of veterinary medicine and the principal scientist involved in the study.

In a paper to be published today in the journal Science, researchers say the feline virus is a lentivirus that is distinct from other retroviruses that can infect cats, including feline leukemia virus.

Feline leukemia virus causes diverse cancers and other diseases, including an immune deficiency similar to human AIDS, and acquired immune deficiency syndrome. However, none of the cats infected with the new virus showed evidence of infection by the leukemia virus.

The researchers said the immune disease caused by the new virus closely parallels symptoms seen in the human disease, with infected cats having swollen

lymph nodes, severe weight loss, diarrhea, respiratory infections, anemia and numerous parasitic infections.

The new virus, named feline T-lymphotropic lentivirus or FTLV, targets the same T-lymphocyte white blood cells that are infected by the human AIDS virus, variously known as HTLV-3, LAV or HIV.

The scientists, including Janet Yamamoto, Esther Ho and Mario Brown, said a limited survey of blood samples seen at the university's veterinary medicine school has confirmed the existence of the virus in diseased cats from many different Northern California areas.

Although preliminary evidence suggests FTLV is widespread, they say, no one yet knows its disease-causing potential in the general domestic cat population.

The new virus was discovered in a Petaluma, Calif., colony of 42 homeless cats retrieved from veterinary hospitals, homes and pounds. The cats were housed in six open pens and suffered only normal mild illnesses during a 14-year period until a female kitten from San Francisco was introduced to one of the enclosures in 1982.

The cat had bouts of diarrhea and infections for two years and, in the third year, became thin and anemic before developing abnormal neurologic behavior and then dying.

In 1985, the researchers reported, other cats in the same pen developed similar symptoms and 10 died.

More trading charges filed

NEW YORK (AP) — Federal prosecutors filed insider trading charges against three Wall Street executives Thursday, alleging that they illegally traded stock to make millions of dollars for Kidder, Peabody & Co.

The U.S. attorney's office released complaints leveling the charges against Richard Wigton, a vice president at Kidder Peabody, Timothy L. Tabor, a former Kidder vice president, and Robert M. Freeman, a partner at Goldman, Sachs & Co.

An informant, identified only as a Kiplinger executive, told investigators that he had fed inside information they used to trade stock for Kidder, Peabody's own account, "resulting in millions of dollars in illegal profits to Kidder," the complaints said.

The complaints were the latest in a series of insider-trading cases that have jolted Wall Street over the past year.

No cyanide found in cheese

PRINCETON TOWNSHIP, N.J. (AP) — Authorities Thursday said they had found no cyanide in hundreds of packages of cheese tested after a caller who warned a market's cheese may have been poisoned directed officials to a tainted tea bag.

No injuries or illnesses were reported in the incident, and authorities said they had few leads in the tampering or the telephone call, which was made Tuesday.

Court upholds Texaco ruling

HOUSTON (AP) — A state appeals court Thursday upheld most of a landmark \$10.53 billion jury award against Texaco Inc. for wrongfully injecting oil in a planned merger between Pennzoil and Getty Oil Co.

The court set aside \$2 billion of a \$3 billion punitive damage award. "Otherwise, the judgment is affirmed," said Kathryn Cox, a spokeswoman for the 1st Texas Court of Appeals.

Texaco chief executive officer James W. Kinnear said in a statement that the company would appeal through state courts and if needed to the U.S. Supreme Court. The company need not pay any money while the appeals continue.

Network science editor dies

NEW YORK (AP) — Jules Bergman, the Emmy award-winning ABC News science editor who covered America's space program for the network, died of a heart attack Thursday, apparently of natural causes, police said. He was 57.

Bergman was found by a maid at his Manhattan apartment, said Sgt. Norris Hollomon, a police spokesman. He had suffered from "numerous brain tumors and seizures" and took medication for epilepsy, said Hollomon. An autopsy will be conducted.

Bergman, who joined ABC as a news writer in 1953, became science editor in 1961. He became a pilot in 1955 and wrote the book "90 Seconds to Space," published in 1962, and "Anyone Can Fly," published in 1965, as well as many magazine articles on scientific subjects.

Air Force launches satellite

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — The launch of a Titan rocket carrying a classified military payload into polar orbit restores America's ability to send heavy satellites into space, the military said Thursday.

Air Force Secretary Edward C. Aldridge hailed the launch as "the first major step in the recovery" of the Defense Department space program after the explosion of two Titans at Vandenberg.

The Air Force launched a Titan 3B booster carrying a classified payload from its Vandenberg launch center, 150 miles northwest of Los Angeles, late Wednesday.

The rocket placed the classified payload into an orbit taking it over the north and south poles.

Iranian tells of trade offer

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — The speaker of Israel's parliament says former national security adviser Robert McFarlane offered to trade himself for American hostages in Lebanon, Tehran's official news agency reported Thursday.

Hashemi Rafsanjani said McFarlane made the offer during a secret visit to the Iranian capital last year. The Islamic Republic News Agency reported. McFarlane made the trip in connection with the Iran-Contra arms deal.

In Washington, White House spokesman Marlin Fitzwater told reporters he knew nothing about Rafsanjani's assertions regarding McFarlane.

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — A federal jury Thursday awarded \$7 million in damages against the United Klans of America and its grand wizard and present grand dragon, the 1981 slaying of a black teen-ager whose body was left hanging in a tree.

The verdict by the all-white jury was awarded to the family of Michael Donald, 19, who was beaten and strangled in Mobile in April 1981. "The verdict is justice done," said Beulah Mae Donald, the victim's mother, said at a news conference.

"Money don't mean a thing to me. I'm glad they caught the guilty and brought them to court because I did everything I could to help," she said. U.S. District Judge Alex Howard said he would hold a hearing within 90 days to determine the Klan's assets and what action was needed to turn them over to Donald's family.

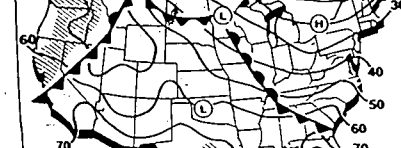

Senate delays day care vote

BOISE (AP) — Sponsors of a Senate alternative proposal for statewide day care regulation have delayed until next week a vote on the proposal as compromise negotiations on the divisive issue continue.

Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, told the Senate on Thursday that more time was needed to work out problems with the alternative. A final vote was scheduled for Monday in what many lawmakers hope may finally be the resolution to Idaho's distinction as the only state in the nation without mandatory day care regulation.

Senate Democratic Caucus Chairman John Peavey of Carey said he believed progress was being made toward an acceptable compromise.

"We have confidence in our negotiators," Peavey said, quipping, "We're wearing them down. They really don't like this issue."

Hansen won't attend dinner

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Comparing himself to a renowned Soviet dissident, former Idaho congressman George Hansen said his plans to attend Republican Party gatherings in Idaho this weekend have been stymied by U.S. Parole Commission restrictions on his travel outside Washington, D.C.

"I guess like Mr. Sakharov they want to restrict me to Gorky," Hansen said Thursday.

Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter will be the featured speaker when GOP leaders hold their annual Lincoln Day celebration tonight in Idaho Falls. Hansen was scheduled to attend a similar meeting Saturday night in Pocatello.

Hansen said he was to attend a political seminar at Palm Springs, Calif. on Thursday. But that trip was canceled because of a dispute over restrictions on his travel while on parole, he said.

He said he has told parole officials that they must either honor the unsupervised parole he insisted on prior to his release from prison or allow him to return to prison to finish his term. He said that if he returns to prison he may have to serve until May 17.

Fuel tax increase wins committee nod

BOISE (AP) — Idaho is joining more than 40 states considering raising state motor fuel taxes to offset declining highway funding from the federal government.

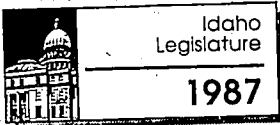
The House Transportation and Defense Committee on Thursday voted to print and introduce two bills raising fuel taxes. One boosts the current 14 1/2-cent tax by 4 cents per gallon; the second bill calls for a 3-cent increase. Diesel taxes also are increased.

But Republicans on the committee refused to consider introduction of a third option, a 5-cent per gallon increase, voting 9-4 against it.

Parke Girard, spokesman for the Idaho Motor Transport Association, said more than 40 other states are considering similar action.

Idaho Transportation Department officials said bordering states of Oregon, Washington and Nevada all are considering higher state fuel taxes.

Hugh F. Lydston, chief of transportation services for ITD, said a 3-cent increase in the Idaho-gasoline tax, which would make the tariff 17 1/2



cents per gallon, would generate \$15.3 million in additional revenue yearly.

According to the distribution formula now used, the Transportation Department would receive \$9.8 million extra; the Department of Law Enforcement would receive \$700,000 extra; Idaho's cities would divide \$1.6 million and counties and highway districts would divide \$3.7 million.

Lydston said a 4-cent increase would give \$13.1 million to the Transportation Department, \$700,000 to Law Enforcement, \$2.2 million to the cities and \$5.2 million to the counties and

highway districts.

The 5-cent increase would give \$16.4 million to Transportation; \$700,000 to Law Enforcement, \$2.8 million to the cities and \$6.7 million to the counties and highway districts.

Lydston said since 1979, Idaho has not had enough federal money to keep up with renovation and repaving of major roads.

At that time, he said, about half of the state's highways were less than 15 years old, the age at which they start to deteriorate quickly.

Now, Lydston said, roughly two-thirds of the state's major, noninterstate highways are at least 15 years old.

The department proposed a state highway rebuilding program, not relying on federal funds which have not kept up with needs.

Lydston said by not being required to meet federal regulations, designs and other rules, Idaho can save 32 percent on the cost of repaving or renovating highways.

Sahlberg's qualifications under scrutiny

GOP senators question PUC selection

BOISE (AP) — Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' nomination of Pocatello businessman Tom Sahlberg to the Public Utilities Commission is being heavily questioned by the Senate Republicans whose votes are needed to confirm the appointment.

"There's going to be a lot of questions asked about that particular nomination," Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, said Thursday after discussion of the Sahlberg appointment became a focal point of the party's hour-long, closed-door caucus.

"There's quite a few people uncomfortable with the man's qualifications to fill such a high profile job," the chairman of the GOP caucus said.

Andrus named Sahlberg, 63, owner

of a commercial potato seed marketing company and partner in a computer marketing business, to the three-member regulatory panel on Tuesday to fill a full six-year term. Sahlberg is the son of former state Sen. Richard High, who served as chairman of the Senate Finance Committee before being named to the commission. High's term expired last month, but he is staying on the commission until his successor is confirmed.

The governor suggested that the opposition might be politically motivated, but he stood solidly behind Sahlberg on the basis of background.

"If you look at the history over there at the PUC, it far exceeds those of some of the historical appointments," Andrus said without

being specific. "If I didn't have confidence in his ability to do the job, I would not have appointed him."

Twigg declined to say that opposition from Senate Republicans was significant enough to jeopardize Sahlberg's confirmation. But he said the feeling was running high that Sahlberg's background as a farmer and businessman did not necessarily

qualify him to make the kinds of

complex decisions that the PUC makes, affecting every Idahoan.

With the prospect of legislation deregulating the telephone industry in the state, Twigg said, "We would be remiss if we did not completely review his qualifications."

Court upholds logging ruling

BOISE (AP) — Idaho law, while seeking to guarantee that loggers are paid fairly, does not prohibit selling a "standard of merchantability" for the quality of logs delivered for scaling, the Idaho Supreme Court has ruled.

In a 4 to 1 opinion issued Thursday, the high court upheld 2nd District Judge George Reinhardt's summary judgment for Boise Cascade Corp. in its interpretation of the Idaho Scaling Act.

The question arose in a lawsuit filed against the Boise-based forest products company by Donvo Pottala Logging Inc.

Boise Cascade won the case in a jury trial and Reinhardt sided with the company's position that the Idaho Scaling Act did not prohibit a timber-harvesting contract including a merchantability standard.

The Supreme Court, with Justice Stephen Bistline dissenting, agreed with that interpretation.

School finance idea given OK

BOISE (AP) — A new way to finance school operations — relying on local income taxes instead of property taxes — has received polite but unenthusiastic preliminary approval from a House committee.

The Revenue and Taxation Committee voted Thursday to print and introduce the proposal from Rep. Ray Parks, R-Blackfoot, but indicated they might oppose it when it comes up for final committee action.

Parks urged the committee to shift school financing from its traditional property tax base to one allowing a combination of income and property taxes, depending on local circumstances.

His measure would allow a tax of up to 2 percent of taxable income to finance school operations. A family with taxable income of \$50,000 would pay \$1,000 under the proposal.

Fund deficit decision put off

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers have voted to delay until the new 1988 budget dealing with a multimillion-dollar deficit in the fund used to pay local school district Social Security taxes.

"The governor did not recommend this, and we don't have any money either... for the school districts to come to us and ask us to be Santa Claus," Rep. Mack Nelbaur, R-Paul, told the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee Thursday.

State Schools Superintendent Jerry Evans requested the emergency \$2.3 million appropriation because of a change in the federal government's payment requirements. That change eliminates a 15-day lag period and will force the school districts to pay their June Social Security taxes in June, instead of being able to push them over into July and the new budget year.

Nelbaur won 14-10 approval of his proposal to delay acting on the problem until the new budget. An attempt to finance \$1.5 million of the anticipated deficit failed on a 13-11 vote.

PCB incineration package advances

BOISE (AP) — With little debate, the Senate Health and Welfare Committee has agreed to introduce a package of legislation aimed at imposing strict regulation on the incineration of polychlorinated biphenyls, or cancer-linked PCBs.

By voice votes on Thursday, the panel cleared the way for formal committee action on the four-bill package sponsored by Democrats Marti Calebrella of Oshburn, John Peavey of Carey and Claire Wetherell of Mountain Home.

That package follows the committee's introduction of a statewide plan to regulate storage and disposal of PCBs.

Make only needed changes in system

Despite an unfortunate memo this week comes close to insulting the integrity of some legislators, the Idaho Liability Reform Coalition has raised some good points about reform of liability laws in Idaho.

But its proposals are, in general, too broad and should not be adopted wholesale.

We think some parts of the coalition's proposal make sense, particularly the idea of basing damage awards on the degree of negligence.

It has never made much sense to us that, if negligence is split 60-40 percent, the party with the lesser degree should wind up paying more.

But other parts of the coalition's plan raise serious questions.

For example, we do not agree with the idea of "cap" on non-economic damages in negligence actions. Sometimes, the wrong committed is so severe that a high punitive award is called for. In any case, the issue is best decided by a jury, not by an arbitrary limit.

We are also concerned that the coalition's silent partner, the insurance industry, has not given any promises as to how, if at all, liability reform will impact insurance rates.

The popular impression is that rates should go down, but that will not happen unless the Legislature writes "pass through" provisions into the law.

In other states, reform has been touted as a way to curb greedy attorneys, but the bottom line has been that the rate-paying public has seen few benefits.

That should not be allowed to happen in any "reform" measure in Idaho.

Trial attorneys are right when they say the American jury system, for all its faults, is generally an effective and fair one by which disputes are settled and liability established.

We do not think that system should be fundamentally overturned, which is what the coalition's program would do. If liability reform is needed, let's reform what needs to be changed, and only that.

AIDS epidemic potential is grim news

BOSTON — One of the attractions of vacationing in a foreign climate — besides raising the thermostat and lowering the stress level — is that it's so hard to get the newspapers. The American papers didn't arrive on our Caribbean island until late afternoon. They were immediately wrested by a line of certified news junkies, the sort of vacationers who leave telephone numbers with their secretaries and hope they'll be called.

Given a choice between catching the last rays of the latest news, our particular group of vacationers chose the daily sun over the daily news. So it wasn't until I returned (a dreadful move in itself) to the snowy reality of New England, that I saw my own cameo role in a New York Times editorial of Feb. 4.

The Surgeon General, the Los Angeles Times and I were featured as a trio of alarmists, playing a high-decibel tune about the spread of AIDS into the heterosexual population.

The audition that won my admittance into the trio was a recent column in which I noted the frighteningly sluggish response of heterosexuals to the growing medical menace.

The New York Times, in contrast, sounded a more mellow, one might even say comatose, note: "There is no clear evidence that AIDS in the United States has yet spread beyond the known risk groups, notably homosexuals and drug addicts."

The alarmists, they implied, were the unwitting dupes or co-conspirators (it's unclear which) of mercenary medical researchers, moralists or homosexuals looking for company in their misery. "AIDS," they concluded in the editorial voice, "is grim enough without exaggeration."

In general, I don't get into debates with editors. I subscribe to the philosophy long pinned to our editorial boardroom: "That's your opinion, we welcome ours." But I find the Times' attempt at statistical reassurance more unsettling than an entire symphony of alarms.

For openers, the notion really worry the Times, that AIDS should not really worry the heterosexual community, is widespread and wrong. The number of people in the "general

population" infected by the virus may still be small. But, says David Baltimore, biologist and head of a major AIDS study, "the level of heterosexual spread is just the beginning of a much more serious problem and only way to prevent that problem is to educate people to behave with caution."

The contrarian on the Times editorial board only used New York City statistics. But when the national figures are in, the Centers for Disease Control expects the number of deaths attributed to heterosexual transmission will have doubled in 1986.

At this moment, 3.8 percent of 30,000 AIDS cases in country are from heterosexual infections, a figure that's expected to rise to 5.3 percent by 1991. As the writer notes and then discounts, the disease in Africa goes from man to woman to man to woman.

A dated and insidious theme is sung in this editorial voice and in many private ones: the notion that there are certain "risk groups." It is reassuring to believe that only members of those "groups" must worry.

But today, it isn't demography that is destiny. As Dr. Marvin Silverman, president of the

American Foundation for AIDS Research, likes to say, there are no high-risk groups, there are only high-risk behaviors.

The riskiest behaviors are sharing needles and beds. But there is a degree of risk — small but fatal — to anyone other than long-term monogamous couples having sex, especially without condoms.

In the past year, many, like the Times editorial writer, have tried to squeeze all the newly infected members of society back into neatly contained "risk groups": homosexuals, IV drug users, Haitians, recipients of blood transfusions; their partners; their newborns.

It may be possible to trace every new AIDS case back to these "groups" — the partner of a partner of a drug addict. But the point is not the past; it's the future.

Not where AIDS came from, but where it's headed — straight into the mainstream of American life.

Is that too alarming? The Times writes that "AIDS is grim enough without exaggeration." The potential of the epidemic is grim enough that we can do without false reassurance.

Excess butter symbol of world problem

Back when much of mankind thought that the economics of nations was a question of choosing between guns and butter, who would have thought that one day the world would stagger under such excesses of both?

Nothing speaks more loudly, or perhaps more sadly, for the economic progress of the world since the 1930s than the enormous surpluses of arms and food, which have reached a height that would have comforted sustained the needs of the warring powers for the duration of World War II.

This week, the Common Market took steps to dispose of the 1.3 million-ton stockpile of butter resulting from agricultural policies that threaten to bankrupt the community.

The Common Market plans to export 400,000 tons of the butter at reduced prices, a move certain to infuriate other butter-producing powers. About 100,000 tons will be given away to consumers. But get this: 400,000 tons is to be fed to hogs, and 100,000 tons will be devoted to non-food uses.

Conceivably, we could soon be using motor oil adulterated with butter. Plans are afoot to burn some of the butter as fuel in industrial furnaces.

Imagine. In the same century that we have in-

vented the computer, the microwave oven and the trash compactor, we have accomplished the miracle of making the cow competitive with the oil well.

Of course, what we have really invented are creating them. And butter is just part of the worldwide glut of food commodities that is confounding domestic policy makers, bringing relations between trading partners and strain financial ruin to individual farmers.

In Bangkok Wednesday, a group of 13 medium-size food-exporting nations called on Europe, the U.S., and Japan to stop subsidizing their farmers so heavily.

Their complaint is that these domestic farm subsidies are a barrier to free trade as surely as any tariff. Clearly, farmers in the commodity-

exporting nations of Argentina, Australia, Brazil, Canada, Chile, Fiji, Hungary, Indonesia, Malaysia, New Zealand, the Philippines, Thailand and Uruguay are hurting, too.

It's a mess. And the solution is obvious enough: Subsidies must be reduced. But the larger, far more intractable problem is how to get politicians to tell this to their farm constituents.

This is one problem that money can't cure. If it were, American farmers would be doing fine. The government spent \$30 billion last year subsidizing farm incomes. That is about four times as much as it spent in 1980.

It is more than the federal government spent on higher education and medical research combined.

It is seven times what the federal government spent on law enforcement. It is more than was spent on veterans' benefits and services. And the result has often been to stimulate farm production even further.

If American farmers were rolling in prosperity, you could at least congratulate them for having put one over on the rest of us. But you can hardly blame farmers for a policy that has left so many of them bankrupt.

Beirut report jolts newsman who knew abducted Idahoan

You quickly become calloused in newspaper work.

Many of the stories you cover or which cross your desk are descriptions of death, accidents or unpleasant events. You learn to desensitize yourself to most of the job, or you get out of the business.

But sometimes the news is harder than usual to accept — such as when the target of the latest terrorist attack turns out to be an old friend.

Sunday's newscast brought the announcement that three more Americans had been kidnapped in Beirut. One was Jesse Jonathon Turner, 39, an associate professor of mathematics and computer science at Beirut University College.

Immediately following the shock, I called my mother. Jon once worked at the Idaho State Library in Boise where she was a librarian. She, too, had heard the announcement. She, too, was shaken.

It was hard to stay depressed around Jon. Even now photographs from Lebanon show him with a half smile, as if he knows some cryptic secret that will in the end make this terrible event only a joke somehow more humorous than horrible.

It was several years later that I came to appreciate Jon's more serious side. He was teaching mathematics at the University of Idaho when I was there studying journalism and history.

Jon was that unusual combination, a mathematics instructor who also majored in philosophy. He was equally at home in the logic of numbers and the much-less certain logic of men. I often sought out Jon and his wife for dinner or drinks, using the gatherings as an excuse to talk to someone whose intelligence I admired.

Despite a readiness to laugh and a willingness to see the pleasantly absurd side of life, Jon was profoundly distressed by much

of what he saw in the world. He was articulate about somehow wanting to do something different with his life.

Many share that concern in college, I suppose. Over pizza and beer most students resolve to change the world. But the willingness to risk doing something new with one's life often disappears when college is left behind. Passion is perhaps the shortest-lived emotion.

The depth of Jon's concern was reemphasized several years later. He had taken a step I considered unattractive. He had quit a teaching job in Hawaii and accepted a post in Lebanon.

At the time I was unhappy with my work. Teaching on a college campus seemed some distant heaven. To have such a job in Hawaii was beyond my wildest dreams. I couldn't think of any better combination, and yet Jon abandoned it for a part of the world in flames since at least the days of Caesar.

A year or so after he first went to Lebanon, Jon visited Idaho. Over lunch he explained his actions. Typically, he was both articulate and funny.

The college students in Hawaii were "both and happy," Jon said. They felt the world

owed them an easy life in paradise. A guaranteed college education with a minimum of effort was just part of what they felt entitled to. "I don't want to spend my time trying to convince a student that going to class is more important than going to the beach," he said. "The biggest risk some of these kids take is switching from number 10 to number 9 sunglasses."

Lebanon was different, he said. In Beirut students were hungry for education and realized the rare opportunity they had to attend school. Going to class in Beirut literally could be a life or death choice. But it was a choice many of Jon's students made daily.

Jon was aware of the dangers. He told us of nights spent in a bomb shelter, or being unable to sleep because of automatic weapons fire outside.

He was also aware of resentment against Americans in the region, and that it stemmed in part from decades of a one-sided foreign policy. Why are we surprised much of the Arab world hates us, Jon asked, when the United States has almost blindly taken the side of Israel in virtually every dispute between Israel and the Arab nations?

made a difference in the lives of some students: For the first time in his life he felt he was teaching, not just going through the motions.

He told us how his students had risked their lives to protect him, how they refused to let him go between buildings without a student escort. "They'll protect me," he said.

Apparently, until the last, his students did protect him. Unable to penetrate the students' security system, the kidnappers reached Jon only by disguising themselves as police.

I started to throw the letter away. There was little I knew in calling attention to his presence and his nationality; I felt: And in a part of the world where American journalists are routinely accused of being CIA agents, those who correspond with journalists can also be suspected.

I had hoped he would soon return for a visit and we could again talk. Now, more than ever, I still hope that.

Bush admits he had qualms about arms sales to Iranians

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush said Thursday he had expressed private reservations about U.S. arms sales to Iran, while the nation's top military official said continued aid to Nicaragua's Contra rebels will depend on their battlefield success.

Bush, during an appearance in Lansing, Mich., said he had "expressed certain reservations on certain aspects" of the Iran deal but declined to elaborate.

An aide said Bush had related his reservations to President Reagan's commission investigating operations of the National Security Council, whose staff carried out the arms sales, some of whose proceeds reportedly were diverted to the Contras.

At the same time, Adm. William Crowe, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, said bluntly that it was imperative that the Contras show military success if they are to continue getting U.S. support.

"You've got to have some kind of success or you're not going to get a continuing commitment," Crowe told reporters. "I don't think there's any question about that. And I don't know of anybody who would ask the American people to go on and on indefinitely without progress."

He also said a review by the Joint Chiefs, begun after the arms sales

Lehman to leave Navy job

WASHINGTON (AP) — John F. Lehman Jr., the energetic, high-profile secretary of the Navy who guided the service through a massive peacetime buildup, will resign later this year, the Pentagon said Thursday.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, said the 44-year-old Lehman informed Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger of his decision during a private meeting on Feb. 6.

Sims said he did not believe Lehman had set a departure date "because his interest is to have an orderly transition and that could be sometime in the future," he said. Lehman has decided to step down, however, even though Weinberger "tried to talk him out of leaving," Sims added.

"The secretary (Weinberger) will hate very much to see John Lehman go. He's made significant contributions to the Navy and the nation."

Lehman was out of town Thursday on personal leave and unavailable for comment.

The son of a wealthy Philadelphia family, Lehman has been widely rumored to have an interest in getting into politics by running for elective office in Pennsylvania.

He also has been mentioned as a possible campaign manager for Vice President George Bush's presidential bid in 1988, although he has denied any interest in that position. Lehman is one of President Reagan's original appointees to a ranking post at the Pentagon, having assumed control of the Navy as civilian secretary and when appointed, was the third youngest man to ever hold the job.

Over the past six years, he has become known for his outspoken, and at times feisty, defense of the president's military buildup and his hands-on approach to management.

Unlike many civilian service secretaries, Lehman refused to leave the policymaking initiatives or even many of the day-to-day management decisions to uniformed Navy officers, in the process tangling with the top brass, industry, Congress and even Weinberger.

He has also become embroiled in disputes over this strategy: the Navy would employ in the event of a war, a program to disperse Navy personnel around the United States; personnel policies and promotions; the need for new aircraft carriers, and even his desire to build a tall sailing ship for naval training.

Preamble holds key

WASHINGTON (AP) — Former Chief Justice Warren Burger memorized Lincoln's Gettysburg Address when he was in the 8th grade and he still can recite it. It wouldn't hurt a thing, he says, if every kid in school today learned it.

That's the part which begins "We the People." "If they memorize the preamble," he said Thursday, "they might ask what does it mean, where does it go from here, what does it mean to me?"

That thought pretty much sums up the effort Burger is joining in to

see that the 200th anniversary of the Constitution is observed properly not just this birthday year but in the three that follow.

The year 1987 "isn't necessarily the focus point, it's the kickoff," he told a small group of reporters. The array of activities under the umbrella of the Commission on the Bicentennial of the Constitution, which Burger heads, is impressive. It ranges from a nationwide high school essay contest to a 40-foot-long trailer traveling the East to display the Magna Carta, a replica of the Constitution and a facsimile of the Mayflower Compact.

Aspin claims costs to fix B-1 in billions

WASHINGTON (AP) — The \$802 million requested by the Air Force to fix the B-1 bomber is only part of what will be needed and the final cost may be more than \$3 billion, Rep. Les Aspin, chairman of the House Armed Services Committee, said in a statement released Thursday.

The Wisconsin Democrat advised other committee members that he has identified six major problems with the airplane, and that for some of them "a solution isn't yet in sight at any price."

The B-1 is the world's most expensive airplane, costing \$265 million apiece, and Congress has authorized 100 of them.

The first such bombers are operating out of Dyess Air Force Base in Texas and Ellsworth Air Force Base in South Dakota. In all, 52 have been completed, with another 10 in final production, Aspin said.

"The option to kill the program no longer exists," said Aspin, who voted with the Carter administration to block B-1 production in the 1970s and unsuccessfully fought President Reagan's plan to revive a later version of the plane, the B-1B.

Defense Secretary Caspar W. Weinberger, the Air Force chief of staff, Gen. Larry D. Welch, who defended the B-1, and are asking Congress for \$415 million for 1988 and \$387 million in 1989 to fix it. Welch, in an interview Jan. 15, said "there is no cause for great alarm about the airplane."

BEREA, Ky. (AP) — The Rev. Daniel Berrigan says his semester as a visiting lecturer at Berea College will not make him an Ivory tower professor.

"I didn't leave the activist part of me in New York City," Berrigan said Wednesday.

Berrigan and his brother, Philip, were the first Roman Catholic priests to receive federal prison sentences for anti-war activities in the United States.

"I was going to celebrate my 50th arrest in New York, but I put it off until I go back," said Berrigan, who could not count the number of times he had been arrested outside New York City. "I'm known as being

'unrehabilitable.' Berrigan, 65, will be teaching two classes as Ell-Lilly-Visiting Professor of Religion, "The Book of Acts: Then and Now" and "Images and Metaphors in the Book of Revelation."

Woman" are making a movie for Dollar Man" on ABC from 1974-78. Wagner, who won an Emmy for her role, was "The Bionic Woman" on returning in their roles, as is ABC from 1976-78. The name of the movie? "The Return of the Six Million Dollar Man boss. Majors played in "The Six Million Dollar Man" and "The Bionic Woman."

Court says catalog spoof within rights

BOSTON (AP) — The First Amendment rights of a sexually explicit spoof of L.L. Bean's famous catalog outweigh any damage to the reputation of the venerable clothing and sporting goods store, an appeals court has ruled.

"Denying parodists the opportunity to poke fun at symbols and names which have become woven into the fabric of our daily life would constitute a serious curtailment of a protected form of expression,"

Justice Hugh Bovnes wrote for the split 1st U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

"Although... parody is often offensive, it is nevertheless deserving of substantial freedom — both as entertainment and as a form of social and literary criticism."

In a 2-1 ruling Wednesday, the appeals court overturned a decision by U.S. District Judge Gene Carter in Portland, that ordered High Society magazine to stop distributing its

October 1984 issue that contained a two-page article titled "L.L. Bean's Back-to-School-Sex-Catalog."

Carter ruled that the parody had undermined the goodwill and reputation of the Freepoint company under a 1981 Maine "trademark dilution" statute.

The district judge had dismissed the First Amendment argument brought by magazine owner Drake Publishers Inc.

But Bovnes and Frank Coffin said in an opinion that the purpose of laws such as Maine's anti-dilution statute is to prohibit competitors from using another company's trademark to sell their own products.

High Society's parody, the justices said, "constitutes an editorial or ar-

istic, rather than a commercial use" of L.L. Bean's trademark and blocking the publication "offends the Constitution."

"Drake did not use Bean's mark to identify or promote goods or services to consumers," the appeals court wrote. "It never intended to market the 'products' displayed in the parody."

The spoof included Bean's trademark and nude models in sexually explicit poses using "products" the court said were described in a "crude but humorous fashion."

It was not known if L.L. Bean would appeal the case. Chief company spokesman Kilton Andrew said he knew nothing about the case and attorney George S. Isaacson did not return telephone calls Thursday.

'Amerika' ready to go but ending not set yet

Despised by the Kremlin, dumped by Chrysler and denounced by critics who sometimes didn't look before complaining, "Amerika" starts its 14½-hour run Sunday on ABC with the ending still in the cutting room.

The network's \$35 million-plus gamble on a fable about the communist-hungry, the most talked-about event of the 1986-87 television season — a distinction which makes ABC uncomfortable.

"We never set out to create all this," said Bob Wright, ABC's vice president for public relations on the West Coast. "The expectations are now too high. People will expect something hotly political and it's nothing like that. My 'Thought the series is set in an America in its 10th year of Soviet occupation, producer-director-writer Donald Wrye

has insisted that "Amerika" is not about U.S.-Soviet rivalry or the likelihood of a Soviet conquest. By imagining a life under a totalitarian system, Wrye said, he intended to explore the values which support democracy.

"It asks whether we, as Americans, have the capacity to sustain a democracy, to sustain our freedoms, and whether or not there is still any reason to have a country called America," he said in one of his many recent interviews.

"Amerika" stars Kris Kristofferson as a liberal former presidential candidate who becomes a dissident; Robert Ulrich as a local administrator who struggles to work within the new rules; Sam Neill as KGB colonel with a soft spot for the old America; and Wendy Hughes as Kristofferson's treacherous former wife.

Actress irks cattlemen

DES MOINES, Iowa (AP) — Actress Cybill Shepherd, spokeswoman for a multimillion-dollar effort to persuade people to eat beef — has angered some cattlemen with recent published comments that she tries to avoid red meat.

Asked to reveal her latest beauty tip, the "Moonlighting" television show star was quoted in Family Circle magazine as saying "I've cut down on fatty foods and am trying to stay away from red meat."

The remark was not well received by beef backers, since Ms. Shepherd is a national spokeswoman for the beef industry. She and actor James Garner star in a \$30 million "Beef, Real Food For Real People" ad campaign sponsored by the beef industry.

"I could just see Iowa producers everywhere revolting," said Dorothy Fairley, chairwoman of the Iowa

Beef Industry Council, where beef is a \$1.7 billion industry.

Ms. Shepherd says she was misquoted.

"The comments attributed to me were released by my publicity office, but they were not entirely correct," she wrote to the magazine in a letter released by the Beef Industry Council this week. "I do avoid 'fatty foods,' but I have retained red meat in my diet."

Council spokesman Craig Mitchell said the group doesn't think the campaign will be spoiled by the Family Circle editor Arthur Heltich said the magazine couldn't reach Ms. Shepherd, so it relied on quotes supplied by her publicist. He said he probably won't agree to the ad agency's demand for a retraction, but added that he may publish Ms. Shepherd's letter.

Palestinian camps hit by Israel, militia

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Israeli jets attacked a Palestinian camp near the southern port of Sidon on Thursday and Shiite Muslim militiamen battled Palestinian guerrillas at refugee camps in Beirut and in the south.

In Damascus, officials haggled over how to get food into refugee camps besieged for three months.

Police said two people were killed and nine wounded in Beirut at attacks on Palestinian camps in Beirut and in the south.

A dozen Israeli warplanes bombed two buildings used by the mainstream Fatah guerrilla faction near Sidon, police said. Fatah is led by Palestine Liberation Organization chairman Yasser Arafat.

Police said one civilian was killed and three people were wounded, including two guerrillas, in the Israeli attack on the outskirts of the Mich Mieh camp.

There is no known coordination between the Israelis and the Shiite militia, Amal, which is fighting the Palestinians on the ground, but they have the common aim of keeping the PLO from regaining Lebanese bases lost in Israel's 1982 invasion.

Secret deal tale baseless

JERUSALEM (AP) — The Israeli government said Thursday that reports of a secret deal to swap Arab hostages held in Israel for foreign hostages in Lebanon was completely baseless.

The statement was in an affidavit given the Supreme Court as sworn testimony by State Attorney Yona Blatman's office. It was the strongest Israeli denial thus far of secret contacts to swap prisoners for hostages.

But it left open the possibility of negotiating a prisoner exchange for Israeli soldiers, seven of whom are listed as captured or missing in Lebanon since 1982.

The affidavit was submitted to the

three-judge panel considering whether to hear a suit filed by families of terror victims to bar the government from releasing prisoners convicted of or on trial for terrorism.

"The reports published in the media and on which the families base their petition are completely baseless," the affidavit said.

It apparently responded to a report Wednesday in the Davar newspaper that cited Israeli and U.S. sources in Washington as saying Israel and the United States were negotiating a package deal, involving the International Committee of the Red Cross, to free all foreign hostages in Lebanon.

and north Lebanon. It supports Amal and anti-Arafat Palestinian factions.

The bombing raid near Sidon was the fifth Israeli air strike on Palestinian targets in Lebanon this year.

Four jets bombed the buildings in two passes at 6:15 a.m. while eight provided cover, police reported. They said guerrilla defenders repelled with anti-aircraft guns and shoulder-fired missiles but scored no hits.

At the Bourj el-Barajneh and Chatilla refugee camps in Beirut, two people were reported killed and nine wounded in Shiite-Palestinian fighting, raising the known toll since Nov. 24 to at least 550 killed and 1,479 wounded.

Shiite militiamen have surrounded the Beirut camps and the Rashidiyah camp at Tyre, cutting them off from food and medicine. For years the camps have maintained stores of arms and food, often in underground bunkers and tunnels, to see them through sieges.

A Syrian-brokered cease-fire failed to prevent the latest fighting. That accord called for the Palestinians to withdraw from Amal territory seized near Sidon in November, and Amal to lift its siege of the three refugee camps.

In west Beirut, a prominent Syrian Christian politician, Jean Obeld, 50, was abducted Thursday. Police said gunmen in a white BMW intercepted his chauffeur-driven limousine on the seafront Raouche boulevard, fired at the occupants

and dragged him out. Police would not speculate on reasons for the abduction of Obeld, a former adviser to President Amin Gemayel on Syrian affairs.

UN says Iran executions top 7,000

GENEVA (AP) — A U.N. report released Thursday says at least 7,000 people were executed in Iran between 1979 and 1985 and cites allegations that torture in the country continues to be widespread.

But the report, compiled by Reynaldo Galindo Pohl of El Salvador for the 43-nation U.N. Human Rights Commission notes a "certain (positive) evolution in the situation of human rights."

It said executions numbered in the thousands from 1979-81, the first three years after Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's Islamic revolution, but dropped to 500 in 1984 and 470 in 1985. No figure was provided for 1986, but the report said the trend appears to have leveled.

The report was based on information from opposition groups in Iran and from non-governmental organizations including the Bahai

International Community and Amnesty International.

It said the allegations contained in the report were submitted to the Iranian government but it has not replied.

The report, the third on Iran, listed for the first time allegations of human rights violations against doctors. It said the use in response to their opposition to new legislation in 1985 increasing government control over the Iranian Medical Association.

The report said the association's elected board of directors had been dissolved by the government and several of its officers detained and tortured. In addition, 450 physicians from two hospitals were reportedly arrested.

Although the Iranian constitution prohibits torture, the report said, "the information received by

(Galindo) contained numerous detailed allegations of widespread torture and ill-treatment."

The Bahai faith, which stresses the unity of all religions and was founded in 1844 in Persia, is the largest minority religion in Iran, with an estimated 400,000 adherents.

U.S. transfers 5 guards

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Marine Corps has recalled at least five of its U.S. Embassy guards in Moscow in the two months since another guard was charged with spying for the Soviets, Pentagon sources said Thursday.

The transfers do not involve allegations of espionage, but rather charges that certain military "good conduct" regulations were violated, officials said.

One source, who demanded anonymity, said the recalls had been prompted by allegations that some of the guards had allowed an unauthorized visitor into their barracks.

That report could not be immediately confirmed, however.

The sources were also unable to say precisely how many Marines had been transferred, putting the number at between five and eight.

Robert Sims, the Pentagon's chief spokesman, declined to discuss the transfers Thursday or say how many men had been moved. But he said none of the moves involved allegations of espionage.

Iraq claims 12 Iran cities raid targets

NICOSIA, Cyprus (AP) — Iraq said its warplanes bombed a command center in a Tehran suburb and other Iranian cities Thursday, the day after a missile exploded in Baghdad.

Iraq said it retaliated by firing another surface-to-surface missile into Basra, Iraq's embattled southern capital, and struck five other cities with air and artillery attacks.

A communique issued in Baghdad said Iraqi fighter-bombers scored "destructive hits" on what it described as an Iranian command center in the Tehran suburb of Karaj and "reduced their target to rubble."

The Iranians said Karaj was bombed, but gave no details.

Tehran communiques said scores of people were killed in the Iraqi air raids, but did not say whether the bombing of Karaj caused casualties.

Attacks on cities have increased sharply since Iran sent an invasion force across the southern border Jan. 9 in a drive on Basra, which has been a principal Iranian objective since the war began in September 1980.

Press censorship stays, Botha says

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — President P.W. Botha on Thursday canceled negotiations with South African newspaper-p publishers and said the government will maintain its tough press censorship.

In another development, the law and order minister told Parliament that 281 children under age 15 are among those who have been detained for more than 30 days under state of emergency regulations.

Botha, in his statement about censorship, said there was no point in proceeding with a planned negotiating session today because representatives of the country's four main newspaper companies had failed to accept a stricter self-imposed code of conduct that would satisfy the government.

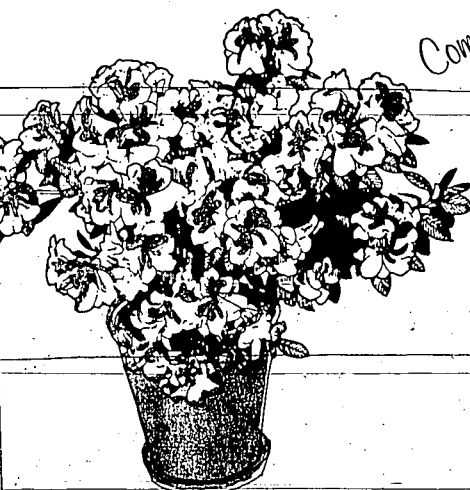
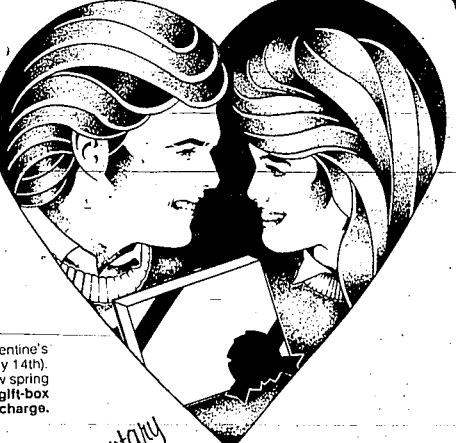

Street widening plan draws few objections

TWIN FALLS — More than 35 people came to listen to a presentation about a proposed \$1.1 million widening of Addison Avenue East from Blue Lakes Boulevard to Eastland Drive at a public hearing Thursday evening. But only a handful actually commented.

The project calls for expanding Addison Avenue East from an existing 44-foot, two- and three-lane section to a 64-foot, five-lane section. The first and most impending phase of the project, however, will cover only the section from Blue Lakes Boulevard to Juniper Street.

The total project, which would reach to Eastland Drive, will take about five years to complete, said Dale Riedesel, the city of Twin Falls' consulting engineer. A widened pavement, curb and gutter, sidewalk, handicapped ramps at intersections, pavement marking, signaling and improved drainage, lighting and signals are part of the project.

Addison Avenue East is extensively used and needs improvement. Riedesel told the gathering. The accident rate — 11 per 1 million vehicle miles — is more than double that of the state's.

"That's another reason why we want to proceed toward improvement," Riedesel said.

The widening project is part of the

city's 1964 master street plan, he said. The city will pay for 9 percent of the project, while the Federal Highway Administration will fund the remainder. The State Transportation Department will administer the federal funds.

About 10 to 15 feet of right-of-way will be purchased, Riedesel said.

If all goes well, the work on the first phase will begin in about a year, he added. But the actual construction date will depend on the availability of federal funds.

When the meeting was opened for comment, Bob Oslund, who resides next to the Checker Auto Center, said he was disturbed the project included retaining a 350-foot raised barrier on Addison Avenue East. Because of the barrier, he and the other property owners on the south side of the street can't benefit from the left-turn lane.

Roy Brown of Nampa, who owns the property which includes Payless ShoeSource and Kentucky Fried Chicken, agreed with Oslund.

Because of the divider, people are forced to use residential streets to gain access onto Addison Avenue East because they can't turn left from Blue Lakes Boulevard North.

Nolan Victor of Twin Falls said the bottleneck of traffic on Blue Lakes Boulevard would be lessened if access is allowed onto Addison Avenue East.

Brown was also concerned the pro-

ject would cut too much off the corner of Addison Avenue and Blue Lakes Boulevard and take three parking spots from the shoe store. As a result, the utility and value of the property would suffer from the moving of a signal pole.

He would go to court to prevent the further destruction of the corner, Brown said.

Some property owners had questions about the acquisition of the right-of-way to make way for the widened street.

But State Highway Division employees and a slide presentation answered many of the questions. Property would be appraised by a city-hired appraiser and an offer to the property owner would be made. Property owners would be reimbursed if signs or landscaping had to be moved or destroyed.

M. J. Green, a city engineer, no address available, asked if the road could end up right next to a house after the right-of-way was taken. State officials answered, "yes." Bruce White added the placement of the road would be taken into consideration on the property appraisal.

White's comment on the project will be taken until Feb. 23.

Riedesel said the public hearing process will be repeated when the city is ready to proceed on the second phase of the project, which will be the widening of Addison Avenue from Juniper Street to Eastland Drive.

Jerome board moves to add 2 classrooms to high school

JEROME — Crowded conditions at the Jerome High School may be alleviated by the addition of two more classrooms.

The Jerome School Board has voted to retain the services of architect Ivan Stone to draw plans for a new addition that would add a little under 2,500 square feet and would provide two more general classrooms that would hold 25-30 students each.

Now the high school has some "floating" teachers who have no regular classroom and must conduct their classes in different rooms throughout the day.

Levi Gifford, school maintenance supervisor, told the board that Stone was willing to work with the district and that costs for the addition could be held to a minimum if the project was done by workers already on the district payroll.

"If we use our own personnel for labor, we will save approximately \$13,000," Gifford said.

School Board members also voted

at their meeting this week to allow Gifford to remodel a portion of the high school so that older special education students can attend special classes in the high school along with students their own age.

Superintendent Richard Kugler said currently the special education program is housed in the junior high school in a self-contained annex adjacent to the main building.

"The project will cost \$7,194. The big item will be redoing the lockers," Kugler said. The lockers that will be removed from the space proposed for use by the special education program will be modified with slides and backs and will be relocated to another part of the high school.

Kugler said the students, both those participating in the general curriculum and in the special education classes, would benefit from the "interaction" the change would bring.

It would also benefit the junior high because that space would add an additional classroom unit that will be needed when the larger

elementary school classes reach junior high, he said.

In other business, Jane Houghland, school social worker, discussed the district's school counselor and child advocate program.

Citing statistics that indicated students' need for counseling as being generally increasing, Houghland said physical and sexual abuse; family and aggressive behavior; drug and alcoholism; school work difficulty; and aggressive behavior were some of the problems the school counselors dealt with daily.

Houghland listed the elementary school — personal safety program, the Department of Law-Enforcement, and staff education on dealing with the problems of abuse and neglect, drug and alcohol education, peer-counseling and parenting classes as some of the ongoing programs that addressed these issues within the community.

"These programs are valuable because they work as preventive measures that may prevent bigger problems from developing in a child's life as he or she gets older. It is well worth the money spent on it," Houghland said.

Schools support repeal of tax credit

BOISE — School superintendents jumped on board the Andrus train that's calling for repeal of the state's investment tax credit.

Twin Falls Superintendent Carl Snow was among eight superintendents from the state's largest school districts who met with Gov. Cecil Andrus on Thursday.

The group endorsed the repeal of the ITC and backed the governor's requested \$662 million budget. Legislators are asked to pass the final budget by the end of May.

"The most important thing is that we've got to repeal the investment tax credit," Snow said following the meeting. "And we've got to reach the governor's \$662 million budget. It's critical."

In the meeting with Andrus the group also presented a list of six concerns they called vital to the state and education.

Among the concerns was that salary issues should be resolved before new programs are mandated by the state.

"It seems financially impossible for school districts in Idaho to meet the mandates that have been placed upon them in a quest for excellence," a statement to the governor said.

The group also said the 22-percent statewide dropout rate was "a serious problem" that needed to be addressed.

The superintendents also called for more focus on per-pupil or classroom unit cost, rather than salary equity.

In Idaho the state spent an average of \$2,610 per student, while the national average was \$3,577 per student, they said.

To achieve those goals, the superintendents said school districts should be allowed to pass multi-year override levies. Currently, voters must approve override levies every year.

The superintendents also want to lower the number of votes needed to pass bond and plant facility election measures.

Tax study: Idaho singles pay piper

BOISE — It doesn't pay to be single in Idaho, a Minnesota study reveals.

A study by the Minnesota Department of Revenue comparing state income taxes shows that Idaho charges more in income taxes to single, middle-income wage earners than most states in the Union.

In fact, Idaho middle-income wage earners, including both single people and married couples, pay more income taxes than working people in New York, the study reveals.

"If you make \$30,000, you pay more income tax in Idaho than you do in New York, and everyone thinks that's a high tax state,"

John Ferguson, chief economist in the Division of Financial Management, said.

Ferguson briefly mentioned the

study during a House Revenue and Taxation subcommittee meeting on Thursday.

With the one exception, the study shows that Idaho's income tax rates fall among the top 15 in the nation.

The exception is a married couple with just one wage earner making between \$7,000 and \$10,000. That group pays some of the lowest income taxes in the nation.

The study shows that a single person who makes \$17,500 in Idaho will pay \$19, making Idaho the fourth-highest state in that bracket in the U.S.

Single people making between \$17,500 and \$35,000 rank consistently higher than people in the same bracket in New York.

But when single people begin making big bucks, the rank is reversed between Idaho and New York. Swinging singles making between \$50,000 and \$100,000 pay less than those in New York.

Twin Falls man sues county, sheriff, deputies

BOISE (AP) — A Twin Falls man is asking for at least \$800,000 in a federal civil rights lawsuit filed Thursday against the Twin Falls Police Commission, Sheriff James Munn and three of his deputies.

H. Donald Sinclair contends in the lawsuit and demand for a jury trial filed in U.S. District Court in Boise that deputies David

Whittaker and Dan Moré assaulted him after he was arrested Feb. 24, 1985, on suspicion of drunken driving.

The lawsuit says Sinclair, who was living in Jerome at the time of the incident, was taken to the Twin Falls County Jail after returning to Twin Falls City police his parents' telephone number.

At the jail, he was ordered by deputies to strip for a search. When he refused, the deputies began forcibly stripping off his clothes, according to the complaint.

Sinclair allegedly was kicked,

slammed against a wall and had his arms pulled behind his back by the deputies, while they shouted obscenities.

The lawsuit contends that even after Sinclair gave the officers his parents' phone number, Whittaker put him in a head lock and he was punched by Throneberry.

It also alleges Sinclair received no medical attention and was not allowed a regular insulin injection for his diabetes. Sinclair was released from jail about 9 a.m. the morning after his arrest, according to the complaint.

The suit asks \$200,000 in compensatory damages for Sinclair for what contends was an unlawful strip search and assault and battery, \$200,000 for emotional distress, and \$100,000 punitive damages from Throneberry, \$50,000 each from Munn, Whittaker and Moré and \$150,000 from the Twin Falls County Sheriff's Office.

Deputy attorney general gets input on public records proposal

TWIN FALLS — "The general rule of thumb for the Attorney General's Office is that there should be openness in government. . . . Good government dictates meetings and records be opened," Deputy Attorney General Dan Chadwick told a group of journalists on Thursday.

But some reporters replied that some public officials hadn't gotten the message. Chadwick, acting director of the Intergovernmental Affairs Division, addressed a meeting of the Sawtooth Press Club on a subject near and dear to reporters' hearts — open meetings and public records.

Chadwick said the Attorney General's Office is proposing a new law on public records to take the place of one ending this summer. The present code covers only records of

law-enforcement agencies, while the proposal by Attorney General Jim Jones will be more encompassing, he said.

The attorney general's proposal pointedly supports the opening of public records, Chadwick said. In his opening remarks, he said the office believes exceptions to open record and meeting laws "should be minimal."

But the attorney general's proposal offers a large and varied list of documents that should be exempted from public inspection. These include maps and locations of archeological sites, library and museum materials made or acquired for reference or exhibition purposes; real-estate appraisals, engineering or feasibility studies for state or local agencies interested in acquiring property; records pertaining to pending litigation in which the public agency is a party;

and records or complaints in investigations by the Attorney General's Office and the Department of Law-Enforcement, or investigative files of other law enforcement agencies except to provide essential details.

Chadwick said the Attorney General's Office is seeking comment on the proposal, which includes also an administrative and judicial procedure for challenging those who don't open records when they should.

Press Club member and attorney Bob Bartlett said he noted the proposal "loophole the use of a truck." The section he criticized would have shielded from public view "information submitted to a public body in confidence and not otherwise required by law to be submitted."

Bartlett, a former reporter, said the section could be abused easily. Another press club member saw the proposal as restrictive.

Following the meeting, Sawtooth Press Club President and Times-News reporter Bart Jensen said, "I think members of the working press view the proposed bill as doing more harm than good in defining what's open. It again leaves the public bodies to close the door on free information, rather than leaning toward opening all meetings and records."

The proposal, which wasn't the final version, won't be introduced until next year, Chadwick said. In the meantime, the state Legislature will probably extend the present law.

In his opening remarks, Chadwick said the attorney general's stance is one of keeping meetings and records open, unless there are statutory exceptions, such as juvenile records, or "a good reason for them not to

be open." Times-News Regional Editor Annette Cary said she found the opposite was true when she telephoned the Attorney General's Office about public meeting issues. She said she was told nothing could be done about people who may not be complying with the law.

Bartlett added that unless the attorney general "backs up" his office's policy, some news organizations won't have the money to fight closures of meetings or records.

Chadwick said the Attorney General's Office doesn't have any enforcement power. Noncompliance with laws over open meetings and records should be left to the local prosecutors, he said.

But, he added, the Attorney General's Office has "encouraged" public entities to keep meetings and records open.

Mercer initially said he did not know the name of the second man, but Thursday he said he had made identification and was advised to sign a complaint as soon as he had recovered from plastic surgery.

Officers said apparently the end of the nose was not found, so it could not be re-attached.

Man detained on lewd charges

TWIN FALLS — Donald Wayne Coak, 27, of Twin Falls, was in custody Thursday night in lieu of \$50,000 bond, after arraignment on charges of lewd and lascivious conduct with a minor child.

The complaint against Coak alleges he had sexual relations with a 12-year-old girl over a period from September 1986 to Feb. 7, 1987, according to the grand jury and is scheduled to appear in court after he has talked with the attorney.

Shed fire spreads to car, home

BURLEY — Fire believed to have started from electrical wiring spread through a storage shed and then to a car and home, causing about \$83,000 damage early Thursday morning in Burley.

The property is owned by Ramon Ochoa and is located at 600 Albion Ave., said Jeff Critchfield, a driver with the Burley Fire department. He said two engines and about 22 men responded to the alarm and remained at the scene for more than 3 hours, before the fire was declared out.

Fire destroyed the shed and contents valued at \$5,000 which involved a freezer, car parts, tools and other storage items. It then spread to a car, causing about \$300 damage, and to the Ochoa home causing another \$3,000.

Prosecutors question Hofmann

POINT OF THE MOUNTAIN, Utah (AP) — Three weeks after Mark W. Hofmann pleaded guilty to the pipe-bomb slayings of two people, prosecutors have begun questioning the former document dealer at the Utah State Prison.

The meeting Wednesday was the first of several planned as part of the plea-bargain arrangement in which Hofmann pleaded guilty to two counts of second-degree murder in the Oct. 15, 1985, deaths of Steven F. Christensen and Kathleen M. Hofmann, 32, also pleaded guilty to two counts of second-degree felony

theft by deception for his 1984 sale of the bogus "White Salamander" letter to Christensen and the sale of the non-existent Mormon McLeillin collection to coin dealer Alvin Rust.

Hofmann was sentenced to five years to life for the murder of Christensen and received lesser sentences for the other crimes.

As part of the plea bargain, in which 25 other felony counts were dismissed, Hofmann agreed to tell investigators about his dealings over the past nine years in selling counterfeited historical documents.

He is dealing with the early history of the Mormon Church.

A transcript of the meetings is to be released to the public following the interviews.

The meeting Wednesday included Deputy Salt Lake County Attorney Robert L. Stott and David Biggs and defense lawyer Ronald Yengich.

Stott said details of the meetings will not be released until transcripts of all are prepared. The transcripts will be released together in about two to three months, he said.

"We won't do it piecemeal," Stott said, noting that all parties have agreed to avoid commenting on the questioning until the transcripts are ready.

Four states want U.S. to pay costs for nuke dump suits

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Lawyers for four states studied as possible sites for the nation's nuclear waste dump asked a federal appeals court Thursday to make the federal government pay their costs of suing over the site selection.

"To expect the states to pick up a portion of that process is like asking somebody to ride to their execution and pick up the cab fare," Michael Later, a lawyer for the state of Utah, told the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals.

But Judge Wiggin, noting that the law provides funding for "consultation and cooperation" by states, said he saw no authorization for "fees to any lawyer for taking a non-cooperative attitude."

The lesson of the last 15 or 20 years, said Wiggin, a former Republican congressman, is that the market by literally endless litigation... by people whose objective is to stop the delivery of nuclear power."

Martzen, the government's lawyer, said federal funding of state legal costs is not only unauthorized but also unnecessary, since "the states will be here (in court) whether or not their litigation costs are paid."

But he was pressed by the panel about congressional language calling for federal funding of "arbitration and mediation and other appropriate dispute-resolving mechanisms" used by the states.

Part of that intended cost, lawyers for the states argued, is litigation by states to make sure the department interprets the law properly and follows its own rules.

"Oversight (by states) is essential to the success of this program," said Washington Assistant Attorney General Narda Pierce.

AG vows to uphold spud's dignity

BOISE (AP) — Declaring that "one of Idaho's institutions is under attack," Attorney General Jim Jones has vowed to defend the "honor and dignity" of the Idaho potato.

Jones held a news conference Thursday along with his "client" — a cowboy-hatted, bandanaed Mr. Potato, courtesy of the Idaho Potato Commission — to discuss a lawsuit filed in 4th District Court seeking to have the "Famous Potatoes" slogan removed from Idaho license plates.

Andrew Freese of Boise argues in the complaint filed in early January that Idaho has been the subject of ridicule for the slogan, which he contends discriminates against other state products such as gems, minerals, lumber, tourism and live stock.

Freese also argues that the slogan violates Idaho motorists' constitutional rights by forcing them to advertise a product without compensation.

A hearing is scheduled Tuesday on the state's motion to dismiss the suit, and Jones said he was optimistic the judge would "barb the case as a 'hot potato'."

The state's position is that the Idaho Legislature may promote the state in any way it sees fit, through license-plate slogans or other means," Jones said. "The Legislature has spoken on this issue and its decision on a slogan should stand until modified through the legislative process."

Deputy Attorney General Daniel Chadwick is handling the state's

case, and Jones said he's told Chadwick the eyes of Idaho potatohood are upon him.

He said the only similar case involved a challenge to New Hampshire's license-plate slogan "Live Free or Die." But he said unlike that case, the "Famous Potatoes" challenge involves no violation of First Amendment rights to free speech.

"Our famous potato has become a legend throughout the world. My office is committed to vigorously defending this fine tuber and we certainly intend to do our best to uphold the honor and dignity of the Idaho spud," Jones said. "This potato has established deep roots in the state of

Idaho and has done much to publicize our fair state... It's not only honorable, but tasty and nutritious."

"I think the girls had some tournament jitters," the second-year Bulldog coach concluded.

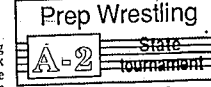

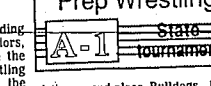

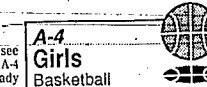

BLACKFOOT — As far as Genesee is concerned, the Idaho Class A-4 girls' basketball tournament already is a huge success.

For the first time in four tournament openers in the last two years, Genesee turned back Shoshone 61-45 in the opening round here Thursday.

That left the Bliss Bears as the only Magic Valley entry-to-win here in either division.

Bliss, using its traditional pressing zone defense, topped the North Gem Cowboys 39-30 to win in the first round. The Bears will take on Greenleaf Friends Academy, a 52-35 winner over Clark Fork Thursday, in a semifinal game tonight at 8:05 at Blackfoot High School.

For some reason, the bracketing for the basketball and volleyball state tournaments has not been changed in two years, and Genesee and Shoshone have split red in the opening round each time.

Until Thursday, Shoshone had always come out on top — including an overtime victory over the Bulldogs in last year's state A-4 basketball opener in Nampa.

"We lost to them by one point with four seconds to go in overtime," said Genesee Coach Terry Asbjornsen. "You bet I remember and our ladies did too. You have to remember they beat us both times in volleyball, so our girls had a lot of remember."

The reason Genesee had such good success against Shoshone was 5-foot junior Dent Herman, who hit eight points in the first four minutes of the game and wound up with 21 despite sitting out most of the first half with three fouls.

"We just couldn't handle her," said Shoshone Coach Ed Sandy. "She was just too tall."

Although Genesee moved out to a 10-point lead in the first half, the Indians stayed in the ballgame on a fine display of ballhandling, shooting and hustle by Pat O'Malley, who scored the basket that beat Genesee at state a year ago. 30-1 Eagles wary of U-Tech, Ricks

TWIN FALLS — Maintaining attention to the projects at hand will be the order of the next three weeks, now that the third-ranked College of Southern Idaho's men's basketball team has skipped the 1986-87 basketball season down to two home games in early March at the postseason Region 10 tournament.

But Coach Fred Trenkle promises he'll be centering the attention of his players on the season 30-1 and we don't want anyone saying we didn't play hard against teams that still have a chance to get into regionals.

The Eagles will visit Utah Tech-Provo tonight, and move on to Rexburg Saturday for the rematch with Ricks College.

This "marking time" period of the season finds Dixie and CSI in the regional finals, which will send its champion to the national playoffs in Hutchinson, Kan., in March.

Four teams are in contention for the other spots, with Ricks helping itself last week by downing Snow at Snow after losing in overtime to undefeated and second-ranked Dixie on Friday.

Ricks currently is at 6-5 in regional play while North Idaho is 6-6 and Snow and Utah Tech both are 5-6.

"There are still so many games left among the top six teams plus trips to Eastern Utah and Rangley that it's impossible to pick," Trenkle said. "Right now I'm not sure that going to Eastern Utah and Colorado Northwestern on consecutive nights isn't the toughest trip in the region. Those teams, after real tough starts, have the athletes and are playing as well at home as anyone."

"This has to be a tough weekend for us," Trenkle continued. "They have all the incentive. They like to beat CSI and they just about have to get into the regionals."

"Utah Tech was only down one at halftime last week against Dixie and wound up losing 72-61. That score tells you they're holding the ball and they use that 1-4 offense that makes you work on defense or give up layins," Trenkle said.

TWIN FALLS — Looking at their last home appearances of the regular season, the Twin Falls High School boys' basketball team will entertain the highly regarded Rigby Trojans and Idaho Falls Tigers tonight and Saturday in a pair of Gem State Conference games.

The Bruins, holding a 5-1 record (3-1 in conference), will wind up their season on the road next week, but should hold on to their third-place seed in the postseason Region 11 playoffs and open that tournament at home the following week.

Building some momentum toward the playoffs is Coach John Astorquia's major aim for these final four games.

"The whole season has been a lack of consistency. If we had gone out

and played hard every night we could have been in nearly every game," the coach said.

This weekend's assignments give the Bruins little rest, the coach said.

"Although Rigby lost to Pocatello last weekend in overtime in Pocatello, I still feel they have the best team physically in the conference," he said. "Saturday night Idaho Falls is quite a bit like us. I think they have the same record we do and they got it the same way — playing well some nights and not so well on too many others."

Astorquia said he felt the small size of the gym and the enthusiasm of a large crowd "definitely intimidated us up there (in Rigby) and I

think we can play them better this time around. We started in the zone there and their two guards just shot lights out, giving them a 49-29 halftime lead. The second half was fairly even but I realize they didn't have a lot of pressure on them either."

The Trojans, 14-3 for the season, 11-3 in conference and ranked fourth in the latest Associated Press Class A-1 poll, start two veteran guards and have four players in the 6-foot, 2-inch to 6-5 range to work the inside.

"Dale Munson is a banger, a big physical, good player. Junior Bill Biliman is playing very well right now. He's a quick rebounder who can score. Rigby had six or seven players who can play. They rely mostly on zone defenses and we expect a press," Astorquia said.

"They scored 83 on us last time we

played and they got 83 on Minico last weekend so they still must be playing well."

"Idaho Falls is not real big — in fact we match up with them fairly well" — but they are pretty quick," said Astorquia of the Tigers, 5-12 for the season and 4-11 in conference. "If they are allowed to get it rolling, they'll really shoot and score a lot of points. They had Rigby down by 12 after three quarters two weeks ago but couldn't hold them. Still, it shows they have the ability to play very well at times," the coach said.

Astorquia said the Bruins must pay close attention to Darin Mink, "a great shooter," and two-year starter Bryan Hart.

But the two that perhaps are the major keys are Todd Pederson and Keegan Kane.

"I think Kane has the best potential on the team and is perhaps as good a junior as there is in the conference," Astorquia said. "Both of them have 20 to 24 points one night then six or eight the next. So it is a matter of having to hold them. If they have been scoring nights and the other two have average scoring nights, Idaho Falls will probably have too many points. The other man playing well for them right now is Jeff Larcom."

"The keys against Idaho Falls are controlling the tempo and hitting both the offensive and defensive boards. If you don't block them out, they'll use their quickness (on breaks) and put backs."

"They will press and run," he promised.

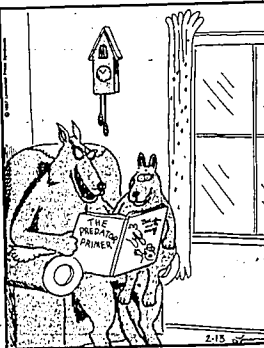

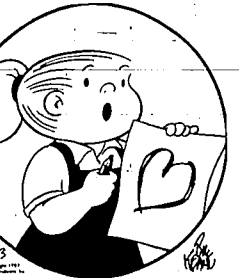

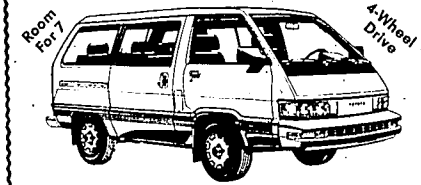

For an artist named Green, color is primary

TWIN FALLS — Michael Green, painter and associate professor of art at the College of Southern Idaho, isn't sure if his paintings will ever be considered art.

"I always call myself a painter when I talk about what I do. I don't call myself an artist," says the 43-year-old Idaho Falls native. He says history is the ultimate and only judge of what is art.

Thirteen of Green's paintings are on exhibit at Herrett Museum on the CSI campus through Thursday. The paintings are done in watercolor, oil, pastel and acrylic mediums.

Green is an abstract painter, but not in the sense of taking an object and changing it, which is what Picasso did. Green paints non-objectively, dealing strictly with such elements as color, surface, shape and line.

He is also a colorist. "It's (color) the thing I've always been working with, even back in high school I think I had a feeling for color," he says.

"I'm also interested in surface... some of these paintings, the paint has been troweled like cement. This affects the color differently, depending on how heavy the paint is on the canvas."

Tension is another important element in Green's work. "If I were to start out on a canvas, and if you put a border inside, then it would be somewhat static. People look at that and say, 'Well, it's just a square within a square.'"

"So what I've got is a thing that fits in there just slightly off. Now to me, that creates a kind of a tension. When you look at that painting, it never really looks like it's hanging totally straight."

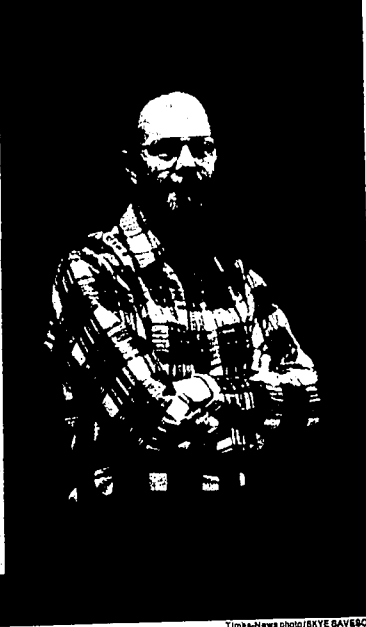
"And I like that idea with the colors. So when you have two colors like red and blue-green, they vibrate against each other and it sets up a tension."

Green received a bachelor of arts degree from the College of Idaho in 1965 and a master's degree in painting at the University of Denver in 1968. On the CSI staff since 1988, he has taught classes on painting, drawing, design, lettering, papermaking and art history.

Green has exhibited extensively

and won several awards. His work has been included in shows at the Boise Gallery of Art, the Seattle Art Museum, The Salt Lake City Art Center, the Joslyn Art Museum in Omaha, Neb., and the Smithsonian Institute.

Most of the paintings in the Herrett show have been painted within the last six months. The colors are brilliant and vivid.

"Some artists paint war and

destruction and subjects we don't want to talk about. My stuff is a little more upbeat, I think."

"I would hope that people will get beyond the subject matter in the work. If they get beyond that... if the people can get some enjoyment out of it and feel good about the paintings... those positive things are what I'm interested in."

"And you keep painting. One thing is 'why do you do it?' I think you do

it because you have to do it. I mean nobody is going to do that kind of time in something if they don't like it or you don't have a compelling desire to do it."

"Creating a challenge in the work... not doing something that's real easy, not doing something that you know you can do. Always leaving room for the unknown, the accidental."

"Being an abstract painter living

in a more rural area where people are more representational. That, to me, is part of my philosophy — saying that I want to be different, that's my individuality. To say 'I'm going to do this,' regardless of whatever."

Green says he can't understand why some people get "so bummed out" about abstract art, since it's been around for over a 100 years and is "pretty traditional, really not

that different. "It's like looking at a sunset. That's an abstract thing. You look at it, and it's colors and shapes and you're not asking it to be something else. You say, 'Oh, that's a beautiful sunset. And look at those colors and look what they do.' You're not asking it to represent something else. You are accepting it for what it is, and that's what abstract art should be."

Scott revels in the 'ridiculous'

KETCHUM — To many, Friday the 13th is a day of foreboding, a day to be treaded over lightly like ice during the spring thaw.

The Sun Valley Center for Arts and Humanities opens its doors today, Friday the 13th, fittingly, on a new show: an exhibit by Ketchum artist Julie Scott. At first glance the startling exhibit, entitled "New Paintings on Paper," looks like a Friday the 13th scene of desert landscapes complete with tornados and weird, mutilated animals.

But Scott laughs at the deformity of character in her paintings. "No doubt about it," she says. "I like the ridiculous. I paint what pleases me.

"You have to laugh at this stuff," she says, pointing to a cat-like

animal dancing with a woman in one of her paintings.

Karen McCall, director of the community arts program for the center, says that this is Scott's first major exhibit since she completed art school at the Museum of Fine Arts in Boston. Although Scott has exhibited art in the Ketchum area since 1980, McCall says that Scott's work is "much more developed now."

McCall calls the exhibit of acrylic paintings on black paper "delightful." But she says, the barren landscapes make a statement about man's oblivion to an environmental-disaster of his own making.

Although Scott says her images make her laugh, she listens intently to other interpretations of her work. "That process is almost more im-

portant than what I have to say about a painting," she explains. "It really says a lot about the other person."

The gallery show is a change of pace for Scott, who is best known as an illustrator. Her illustrations have been published in such national magazines as Playboy, Saturday Review and Powder Magazine.

In just two months she painted all the works for the current show. "I get on a roll and paint 12 hours a day."

"Hopefully," she says, "this will loosen up my style, so I can take a chance and really paint what's me. I've always had a bad complexion about opening."

An opening reception will be held today from 5-8 p.m. at the center, located in the Walnut Ave. Mall in Ketchum. The show runs through March 4.

Short, plain Rick Moranis holds his own in Hollywood

CULVER CITY, Calif. — Rick Moranis is short, plain and nearsighted, but he has managed to hold his own with malignant ghosts and man-eating plants, not to mention some of the hottest comedies in show business.

He's the guy who threw wild parties in Sigourney Weaver's apartment building in "Ghostbusters." He nourishes the voracious Audrey II with his own blood in "Little Shop of Horrors." And he was one of the prime movers of Canada's neoclassic television series, "SCV Network."

Moranis is currently appearing in Mel Brooks' space take-off, "Spaceballs," as Dark Helmet, infamous commander of the evil forces. Any resemblance to Darth Vader and the voice of James Earl Jones is pretty far-fetched.

The comedian, his wife and their 3-month-old baby are being put up in style during his stint in the movie. It's quite unlike his first visit here.

"I came here in 1976, without an immigration card or a work permit," he recalled in his dressing room-trailer during a lunch break. "I was playing the Comedy Store for a while. The two guys who were running the Comedy Store for (owner) Mitz Shore told me that she couldn't see me for weeks and weeks. I learned later they were would-be standups who were probably trying to protect their own turf."

"I said, 'This is crazy. I do stand-up comedy in Toronto for a living. I'm good at it. Why can't she see me? I waited for her in the parking lot, and I went up to her car and she thought I was some mad rapist. She said, 'Excuse me, I'm from Toronto. I'm a stand-up comedian. I make a living from it. I'd like you to see me.'"

She said, 'OK, tonight.' Mitz Shore liked his oddball comedy and hired him to appear at the Comedy Store for no pay. When she invited him to emcee at the Sunset Strip club, he asked for taxi fare. No way.

"That's when we parted company," Moranis said. "I went back to Toronto, and I haven't stopped working since."

Rockefeller's Mexican folk art collection finds a home in San Francisco

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — When Nelson Rockefeller's daughter went searching for a permanent home for her late father's extensive Mexican folk art collection, major museums across the country lined up and beckoned sweetly.

The wealthy museums understood that the former vice president and governor of New York would be an excellent draw because of his name and his collection of Mexican folk art dating back 1933.

However, Ann Rockefeller Roberts remembered her father's lifelong battle to have those same museums be more serious about Mexican folk art and appreciate its enormous creativity.

Roberts decided to do what she thought would have pleased her father: She gave a significant portion of the collection to one of the youngest and smallest of the finalists — The Mexican Museum in San Francisco.

"She saw the potential there and that's to her credit," said the museum's executive director, David de la Torre. "She was willing to take a risk."

The risk is evident on a visit to the museum, where more than 500 objects from Rockefeller's personal collection are on exhibit inside the cramped, plain building at Fort Mason.

The exhibition includes textiles, masks, lacquerware, toys, ceramics and glassware that Rockefeller collected on his visits to Mexico from 1933 to 1978, shortly before he died. The bulk of his collection of about 2,500 folk art objects was awarded to the San Antonio Museum of Art in Texas.

Rockefeller collected much of the art from anonymous craftsmen who recorded ordinary daily life in Mexico in their works. Some of the works are by recognized artisans such as Candelario Medrano Lopez, Heron Martinez and Teodoro Blanco.

"Annie O'Neill, former curator of the Mexican folk art collection, remembers when an enthused Rockefeller met ceramic artist Blanco at her home in the Zapotec village of Santa Maria Atzompa, near Oaxaca, on his final trip to Mexico in 1978.

"He was really excited to meet her," O'Neill said, recalling they embraced warmly. "The general spirit was just a lot of 'simpatico' (congeniality)."

O'Neill said Blanco and Rockefeller ate tortillas she cooked, talked for a while in Spanish and then walked about, looking at and discussing her works.

"He bought everything she had there," O'Neill said. Blanco died in 1981.

The Mexican Museum was founded in 1975 by painter Peter Rodriguez and housed in the city's heavily Hispanic Mission District. Rodriguez operated the museum specifically to exhibit and collect Mexican art.

Torre, head of the museum since 1984, said his goal has remained the soul of the museum, something he believes eventually attracted Roberts.

The Rockefeller collection, he said, has doubled the museum's attendance and brought it prestige. Still, Torre believes the mission is not yet done, the museum's goal not yet reached.

"We want to be a nationally recognized fine arts museum," he said. "We want it to be a piece

where Latinos feel it's their museum, and that they use it."

But the museum's new Rockefeller art has stretched its physical resources, forcing it to store most of its other collections, including prequest, colonial, Mexican fine art and Chicano fine art.

Along with the space shortage, a probable need for a permanent home and a small staff, a policy issue has developed — the direction — the museum should take. Torre said the non-profit museum's board of directors is now grappling with these issues.

The Rockefeller collection will be on exhibit at the Mexican Museum through March. It will then travel to museums in California cities with large Hispanic populations.

Walker, Freddie Prinz or Gabe Kaplan, who were popular at the time. His was more like Steve Martin in his fragmented, wild-and-crazy manner.

"I wasn't scared by stand-up comedy. Just bored," Moranis said. "I didn't like repeating things, even though the audience was different."

The turning point in Moranis' career came when "SCTV Network" was looking for cast replacements in the third season. Dave Thomas chose Moranis, who fitted neatly into the manic crew that included John Candy, Eugene Levy, Andrea Martin and Martin Short. The series had been a huge hit in Canada, scored on NBC from 1981-83 and has been appearing in syndication ever since.

"Why the outburst of inspired comedy from above the border?" "Growing up in the shadow of the States politically and intellectually gave us this feeling of inferiority which may have caused a lot of us to develop certain senses of irony and

"Canada is master of the cause of inferiority. They almost sell it to the

people; they keep telling them they are inferior to the States by trying to overcome it so desperately."

Moranis and Dave Thomas capitalized on that aspect of Canadian life with the Mackenzie Brothers, the beer-sucking, backwoodsman, who were so popular they led to "Strange Brew," which became Canada's biggest grosser of 1983.

"When we did the publicity tour in the United States — a milk run because there wasn't any money for a junket — the questions were always: 'What are you doing next?' 'How did you come up with this?' etc. We got to Canada, all we're asked is: 'What are you going to do if this falls?'"

"Moranis' first Hollywood film "Streets of Fire," was a "painful experience," he said, and promised to allow him to improvise were ignored. His luck improved with "Ghostbusters," which turned out even better than his expectations. "Little Shop of Horrors," which grossed \$27 million in the first four

weeks, added another hit. He was asked if his American success might cause him to lose his Canadian identity.

"I married a New Yorker, so lately I have been dividing my time between here, New York and Toronto," Moranis remarked. "But my family is still in Canada, and so are my roots. I'll always be a Canadian."

Vangelis plays music during plagiarism trial

LONDON (AP) — Greek composer Vangelis, accused of plagiarizing the theme of the 1981 Oscar-winning movie "Chariots of Fire," gave a rare public performance Wednesday — in the High Court.

Vangelis, whose real name is Evangelos Papathanasiou, played two of his compositions, "My Face in the Rain" and "Wake Up," on an electronic synthesizer specially installed in the courtroom.

He explained that he can neither read nor write music and composed all his tunes on a keyboard. "I just think of a tune and it comes immediately," he said. "I don't try hard, it just comes. It's quite boring, actually."

Vangelis, 43, is being sued for alleged copyright infringement by fellow Greek composer Stavros Giannides, 33, in a trial that began Jan. 3.

Logarides claims the theme for "Chariots of Fire," a British film about the 1924 Paris Olympics, was copied from "City of Violets," a song Logarides wrote for a 1975 Greek television series.

Pryor plays doctor to hilt in hazy 'Critical Condition'

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.



CRITICAL CONDITION (R). Richard Pryor has a near-perfect role here: a hapless convict, trying to fake insanity, who — during a power-blackout — is mistaken for a visiting doctor at a hospital plunged into crisis. Pryor makes the most of his possibilities, but the film does not, though writers Denis and John Hamill make a commendable stab at resurrecting the old comic denisty of a Preston Sturges or Hecht-McArthur screenplay. Everything gets a bit too loose and frantic, and the jokes are not concentrated or pungent enough. Michael Apter, however, is on his toes — he supplies enough background movement for a whole season of "Hill Street Blues."

ALLAN QUATERMAIN AND THE LOST CITY OF GOLD (PG). Quatermain, the rugged but vain adventurer, secures the African tangle for his lost brother in this agonizingly dull sequel to 1955's "King Solomon's Mines." If you were hoping for excitement from the presence of Richard Chamberlain as Quatermain, forget it. In his hands, the African tangle turns into a bulletproof undershirt, he exudes the dashing spirit of a game-show host.

CRIMES OF THE HEART (PG-13). Excruciating: a combination of Beth Henley's instantly recognizable screenplay (based on her Pulitzer Prize-winning play), Bruce Beresford's frenzied direction and the sight of three singular talents (Diane Keaton, Jessica Lange and Sissy Spacek, playing three ditzy

the 1960 Roger Corman Z-horror classic (about Audrey, the man-eating plant), taken from the infectious Alan Menken-Howard Ashman stage musical, connects with its audience in a big way; it is a loony, loopy, explosively funny movie. Director Frank Oz handles his cast — especially bruised romantic Ellen Greene, brawling dentist Steve Martin and masochistic patient Bill Murray — with a Muppeteer's skill. And, as the insatiably voracious Audrey II, voice mixer Levi Stubbs (of the Four Tops) and 40 animatronics handlers all but belt the house down. The evil little fable has a tacked-on happy ending, but there is a dark wink at the end, anyway. It is a rousing show.

THE MISSION (PG). The film is haunting spectacle, serious and passionate and — in many ways — successful; it provides Jeremy Irons with a chance for his purest and most searing film performance, and it gives Robert De Niro another of those nearly impossible physical challenges he thrives on. But the picture teeters with its idealized views of the Guarani Indians, its general lack of surprise and occasional deadly lines of dialogue that would defeat Olivier (he rout De Niro).

THE MOSQUITO COAST (PG). Allie Fox is a neurotic inventor who moves his family to Belize in an attempt to remove them from the pernicious influence of modern Western society. Even though his bedrock obnoxiousness makes you want to hit him with a board, he is an irresistible force on the screen and, as Allie, Harrison Ford's power — even with his back to the camera, even when we cannot read his face — is terrifying. Director Peter Weir is fascinated, as he has been in his prior films, by the displacement that occurs when an outsider bursts into a completely foreign culture.

Musician the first to be Oscar nominee

NEW YORK (AP) — Tenor saxophonist Dexter Gordon was watching the "Today" show on television with his wife and stepson in the mountains of Cuernavaca, Mexico, when the Academy Award nominations were announced. Gordon, who had the starring role in Bertrand Tavernier's critically acclaimed "Round Midnight," received a nod for best actor — the first time in Oscar history that a musician has been nominated for the

top acting prize. "My wife started screaming and hollering and jumping up and down," he said — in a telephone interview Wednesday from Cuernavaca. "The film was, I think, very, very truthful. Our director, Bertrand Tavernier, was some kind of genius," Gordon said in that raspy voice that hints of whiskey-laced nights in smoky clubs. The decision to accept the starring role in "Round Midnight" was not an

easy one for Gordon, whose life parallels in many respects the bitter-sweet and tragic life of the jazz musician he portrays. The story of Duke Turner, an expatriate sax player in Paris, is a personal one. Though based loosely on the late jazz musician Bud Powell, it is a universal story of jazz artists who fled bigotry and rough times in America for the allure of Paris and Amsterdam during the 1950s and '60s.

Newman says award quest like courtship

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Veteran actor Paul Newman likens his quest for the coveted Oscar to the courtship of a beautiful woman. The 62-year-old actor said his failure to capture movie's top prize despite six nominations has been "like chasing a beautiful woman for 60 years." "Finally, she reverts and you say, 'I am terribly sorry. I am tired,'" he said in London last week. Newman's return as a middle-aged Fast Eddie in "The Color of Money," a sequel to 1961's "The Hustler," garnered him his seventh Academy Award nomination Wednesday. He could not be reached for comment about his latest nomination. Telephone messages left with public relations spokesmen were not returned.

Newman also was nominated for his roles in "Cool Hand Luke," "Cat on a Hot Tin Roof," "Hud," "The Hustler," "Absence of Malice" and "The Verdict."

Newman first portrayed pool shark Fast Eddie Felson as a revved-up punk in "The Hustler." Twenty-five years later, he brought him back as a middle-aged liquor salesman reliving his past through a prologue.

His competition this year includes longtime jazz great Dexter Gordon who made his acting debut in "Round Midnight"; last year's winner, William Hurt, who portrayed a teacher in "Children of a Lesser God"; James Woods for "Salvador"; and Bob Hoskins for "Mona Lisa."

First-time show by artist, 78, spans years in Sun Valley

KETCHUM — The history of the Sun Valley area comes alive with a first-ever gallery exhibit by local artist Florian Haemmerle, 78, displayed at Scott's Mat & Frame on Vargold Lane in Ketchum.

Haemmerle is a notable figure in Sun Valley history. Beginning in 1939, he worked as a ski instructor and a back country guide. Later he worked as a gold-leaver and an anti-queer. Haemmerle may be best known for his detail painting on houses. He painted elaborate house trim in "the southern German Bauern style," said his wife, B.B. Haemmerle.

Haemmerle was also a great outdoorsman. He climbed most of the peaks in the area and named several ridges in the Pioneers. He is also responsible for naming many of the bowls on Bald Mountain, including Lefty, Mayday, Lookout and Easter.

But Haemmerle was also an avid artist, packing his watercolors in a rucksack every time he went hiking. Although he painted for over 40 years, he had never exhibited his work in a gallery. Haemmerle painted in his spare time, almost always while hiking in the mountains.

"Painting a picture is magic, it's great fun," said gallery owner Scott Harder. "That's what Haemmerle did. He worked like a little kid who's using finger paints for the first time."

About a year ago, Harder framed 10 of Haemmerle's pieces. "Nobody really took him seriously as a painter," Harder says. "But when I saw those 10 pictures together, I

thought, 'this guy's really good.' That's when I got the idea for this show."

The show consists of 49 watercolors, many of mountains around the Sun Valley area and one of Markt-Oberdorf, Germany, the town where Haemmerle was born in 1909. The exhibit will run through February. Gallery hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays.

Soviet literary monthly to print 'Doctor Zhivago' in full next year

MOSCOW (AP) — Boris Pasternak's epic novel "Doctor Zhivago" will be printed for the first time in the Soviet Union next year, the Tass news agency reported Thursday.

Sergei Zalygin, editor-in-chief of the Novy Mir literary review, briefed members of a commission set up by the Soviet Writers' Union to honor the Soviet novelist and poet, who died in 1960.

"My monthly intends to publish Pasternak's novel 'Doctor Zhivago' in three or four issues next year," Zalygin was quoted as saying.

The novel, which earned Pasternak the Nobel Prize for Literature in 1958, has been banned in the Soviet Union since it was written.

In recent years, Pasternak's poetry has been

published with increasing frequency in his native country, and a two-volume collection of his verse was issued in 1985.

Pasternak's son Yevgeny had reported that plans were in the works to publish the novel, but the Tass dispatch was the first mention of the project in the official Soviet media.

Under Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev, the Kremlin has recognized some writers, including Pasternak and Vladimir Nabokov, who had fallen from favor for political reasons.

The effort seems inspired at least in part by Gorbachev's effort to divorce himself from his predecessors.

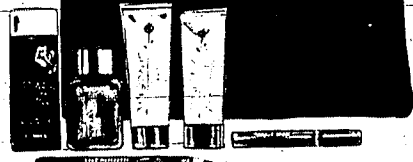

Go through your closets and get rid of all those clothes you've been saving until you lose 10 pounds. Your favorite charity can turn those good-as-new garments into money.

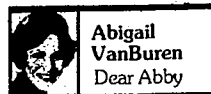

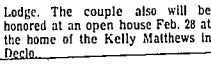

Generation gap denied

WASHINGTON (AP) — Reports of potential conflict between generations of Americans are greatly exaggerated, the American Association of Retired Persons said Tuesday.

The association released results of a survey it said puts to rest recent reports of intergenerational conflict stemming from younger Americans' resentment of older people.

Concern about such conflict has been expressed in Congress and by population analysts in view of the rapidly growing number of elderly in America and their potential need for costly medical and social programs.

But instead of such confrontations, the study found "mutual respect and concern from generation to generation," said Madelyn Hochstein of the Daniel Yankelovich Group, which conducted the survey of 2,000 Americans by telephone and in small interview groups. The margin of error was given as plus or minus three percentage points.

"Most Americans are convinced that a blend of the energy of youth and the experience of older people is required to solve the country's problems," Hochstein told a news conference.

There is widespread rejection of

anti-elderly sentiment, she said, with two-thirds of Americans feeling that the older generation can continue to make a contribution to society.

Only 13 percent of those polled felt that older workers should retire to make room for younger replacements, she said.

A small amount of anti-elderly sentiment was found, but this was linked to low income and low educational status, Hochstein said, and was not associated with age groups.

Door prizes will be given hourly and all proceeds to the Idaho chapter of the arthritis foundation for local projects and programs.

Firm's employees assist the elderly

BELLEVUE, Wash. (AP) — Elderly people in the United States may face the problem of getting proper care if they live alone and suddenly become ill or are injured.

In 1983, Puget Sound Power & Light Co. began a program that would locate workers in these people in trouble. Some 450 of the firm's customer contact employees, such as meter readers and telephone representatives, were trained by the state to identify vulnerable customers and make referrals to local social service agencies.

The company says customer contact employees at firms throughout the country are experts at locating the elderly who cannot provide for themselves.

With a federal grant and its own money, Puget Sound has produced a training package for each state's leading agency on aging.

Miss Achoo and Miss Itch called sexist

HELENA, Mont. (AP) — A method of teaching kindergartners the alphabet by assigning male names to consonants and female names to vowels has been criticized as sexist.

The curriculum, called "Alpha Time," could unintentionally reinforce stereotypes that boys are active and agile, while girls are clumsy, inactive and highly emotional, says Pat Christie, an education equity specialist with the state Office of Public Instruction.

"Kids learn from everything," she says. "The good, the bad and the ugly."

"In all the years I've been teaching, close to 16 years, I've

never had a complaint from a parent about this program," said Karl Wolf, a kindergarten teacher at Central School in Helena who uses "Alpha Time."

"There has been a real effort to revise texts and publications to remove sexual stereotyping," he said.

Christie said she spoke to kindergarten teachers after she got a call from a parent who objected to the predominance of male characters and the segregation of males and females in the alphabet-teaching method.

Sexual stereotypes, however subtle, may give children expectations

about their future that can limit them in later life, she says.

In addition to being assigned to a name, such as Mr. W or Miss A, each letter is assigned a characteristic or activity designed to help the child learn the sound of that letter. In some cases, the activity may be creating a stereotype in the child's mind, Christie said.

Mr. K, for example, is a kicking football player, reinforcing the perception that boys like to play football and by contrast, girls don't like football, Christie said.

She said teachers should level with the students about the issues involv-

ed, help them analyze stereotypes and try to balance a curriculum or textbook with outside materials that dispel the stereotypes.

Teachers say "Alpha Time" is effective and using the sexes to differentiate letters is "probably part of the effectiveness," Christie said. "But it's also part of the negative effect."

Wolf said he didn't see much difference between the sexes in the program. "A is Miss Achoo, E is Miss Exercise, I is Miss Itch, O is Miss Obstinate, U is Miss Umbrella."

Contrast that with Mr. Funny Feet or Mr. Cotton Candy. It's hard to take that real seriously."

Traveling 'Porgy' has Gershwin approval

LOS ANGELES — At 86, Ira Gershwin's widow scans the operatic landscape: She says she loved the production the Houston Grand Opera gave "Porgy and Bess," but was not happy that in a British version the crippled Porgy was made to stand up — of all things.

She blames a "small heart attack" she suffered in 1985 to the production that year at the Metropolitan Opera in New York. Her face still reddens at the memory: "The singers were wrong! Everything was wrong!"

But Ira and his composer brother, George, are long gone, and this survivor sees it as her duty to try and make sure their intentions for "Porgy" are well-served. From her home here, she plays a key role in granting performance rights. When demand increased after the Met production, she worried that low standards might prevail.

She and New York producer Sherwin M. Goldmann urged 13 American opera companies to invest in one "Porgy" rather than go it on their own. That many companies had never worked together before, but it helped that the production was based on the 1976 Tony-award-winning effort by Houston Grand Opera, which Goldmann co-produced.

"I wanted to maintain control," Leonore Gershwin said. "I'm crazy about Sherman. We had

alot of conversations and he agreed that this was a good way to do it."

From Miami to Seattle, each company is playing host to this production of the opera, for which DuBoise Heyward wrote the libretto and some lyrics.

It seems as if 13 opera companies would be a classic case of too many chefs, the joint venture apparently has worked well, largely because the overall artistic control rested with the Houston Grand Opera.

"It went very smoothly because we realized this was the only way we could all have 'Porgy,'" said Speight Jenkins, general director of Costa Mesa, Calif., viewed this Pacific company in Seattle Opera, one of the 13 partners.

"There have been collaborations of two or

more companies before, but nothing on this scale," Jenkins said.

"It stems in part from the unique requirements of 'Porgy' and the demand for it. . . . I'm not sure it could have been done for any other opera or could happen again. Everybody wanted it. . . . Everybody agreed on what they wanted."

"Porgy and Bess" is a work that has suffered from interpretive ambivalence — is it a musical or an opera? — since its first opening in Boston Sept. 30, 1935. Gershwin diluted the score to conform to various conditions that accompanied the Broadway opening in October — including certain singers' limitations and the size of the available orchestra.

Critical reaction was mixed but other productions followed, mostly on the theatrical stage in America, but in opera houses abroad.

George Gershwin, a bachelor, died in Los Angeles in 1937 at the age of 38. "George wrote it as an opera," said his sister-in-law. "That's what he wanted."

Despite Leonore Gershwin's discontent with the Met production, Goldmann and others believe that it helped to limbed the work in the operatic tradition of the United States. The backers of the current tour believe that it is further bolstering the work's operatic identity through the association with opera companies around the country.

Stamp to honor Faulkner, fired postmaster

JACKSON, Miss. (AP) — Novelist William Faulkner, who once was fired as a small-town postmaster because of his bad work habits, will be honored with a commemorative issue, the U.S. Postal Service says. Fifty million 22-cent portraits of the late Nobel Prize-winning author will be distributed. The issue, one of 20 commemorative stamps — 10 released this year, follows several years of lobbying by the University of Mississippi and Oxford residents. The stamp will be issued in a ceremony in Oxford on Sept. 25, on what would have been Faulkner's 90th birthday — said Harold Fortner, director of marketing and communications for the postal service division in Memphis, Tenn. Faulkner died in 1962.

Faulkner, famous for complex, rambling novels such as "The Sound and the Fury," "As I Lay Dying" and "Sanctuary," also worked as a blue-collar man of letters.

Pressed for money in the 1921, Faulkner applied for a fourth-class postmaster's job. He served at the

Polish police hold 300 rock concert fans

WARSAW, Poland (AP) — Police detained 300 young rock fans who created "trains of horror" while traveling to a concert by the U.S. heavy metal group Metallica. Official media said Wednesday.

State television said police took the teenagers off trains during the the Tuesday night concert in the southern city of Katowice from four cities in northern and western Poland.

"The trains from Szczecin, Kolobrzeg, Poznan and Wroclaw became trains of horror," the television news report said.

It said most of the young people were sent home, but 32 "hooligans" were ordered to appear before misdemeanor courts.

The Warsaw newspaper Express Wieczorny said about 200 rowdy youngsters "terrorized" the train from Szczecin to Katowice by throwing bottles, disturbing passengers and beating up the train crew's chief when he tried to intervene.

He never regretted leaving the postal service, he told friends. He even inscribed a copy of his first book, "The Marble Faun," to the postal inspector who fired him, thanking him "for extracting me from an unpleasant situation."

"It's poetic justice," said Oxford author Willie Morris.

Local postmaster James Hammons said he is proud of Faulkner and of his honor, despite his checkered postal past.

"I think that he probably had his mind on other things," Hammons said. "I think he ended up in the right profession."

Dean Faulkner Wells, a niece of the author and co-owner of Oxford's Yuktapawpha Press, said she wants to first in line for a stamp.

"It's just terrific, and I think he (Faulkner) would be just tickled at the irony of it all," she said.

Hermit finds ally in judge on bench

BOSTON (AP) — The state has the right to evict a hermit living in a makeshift wigwam on public land, but it must find him a home where he can be close to nature and preserve his independence, a judge ruled Wednesday.

Housing Court Judge E. George Daher gave the state attorney general's office until March 18 to find a new home for Bill Britt, who says he may look 90, but he's only 50. "I know it's putting an onus on the attorney general's office, but jail is not the answer," Daher told Assistant Attorney General Cynthia Canavan. "A shelter is not the answer. He'd probably expire in a jail or shelter."

Britt was in court fighting the state's 17-month effort to evict him from the mattress and plastic-sheet wigwam in the woods he calls home.

"I'm not a homeless person. I'm in the 19th year in my wigwam at the Chestnut Hill Reservoir," said Britt, hitching up his pants, which were held up by a bicycle tire inner tube.

The state says the wigwam is on Metropolitan District Commission property, over which it has jurisdiction, on the outskirts of Boston near the affluent suburbs of Brookline and Newton.

The state says Britt broke an agreement made in September 1985

to leave the land. Britt counters that the state and its housing specialists ignored him until the City of Boston decided to expand a cemetery and encroach on his home.

The tall, white-haired man came prepared for court with a plastic bag containing a bagel and an orange slung over one shoulder, his pockets filled with playing cards, vitamins and assorted bottles.

Throughout the 40-minute proceeding, Daher allowed Britt to interrupt.

Over and over Britt asserted he was being victimized. He accused the state of waiting until the cold weather to attempt to evict him. "There's about 18 inches of snow where I live," Britt said.

Daher said the state can order him off but must relocate him to "someplace where he can plant trees, where he can be close to nature, where he can have his independence."

Once an alternative is found, Britt must leave the wigwam by July 1, Daher ordered. But he also cautioned Britt that he must cooperate with the state in explaining his needs and his fears.

"Your needs can't be absolutely abstract and unreasonable," Daher said.

Intruder injures police in palace garden

LONDON (AP) — A man attacked two officers with a knife and hammer in the Kensington Palace garden early Wednesday, but did not get inside where Prince Charles, Princess Diana and other members of the royal family slept, police said.

The masked intruder was tackled and handcuffed before he could breach a wall around the 17th-century red-brick palace near embassy row in southwest London's fashionable Kensington district, Scotland Yard reported. The two policemen suffered minor injuries.

Scotland Yard said Bela Mark Siltzer, a 27-year-old unemployed man from Reading in Berkshire, west of London, was charged with being equipped for theft and causing bodily harm to the two policemen from the Royal and Diplomatic Protection Group.

Kensington Palace, on the western edge of Kensington Gardens near Hyde Park, has been the London

home for princes, princesses and royal dukes and duchesses since the mid-18th century.

Buckingham Palace said the Prince and Princess of Wales and their two sons, Prince and Princess Michael of Kent and the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester were in their apartments when the incident occurred at about 1 a.m.

"We can only point out that the intruder did not manage to get into the secure area of Kensington Palace," said Buckingham Palace press spokesman John Haslam.

Princess Margaret, who is the sister of Queen Elizabeth II and also lives at Kensington Palace, is vacationing on the Caribbean island of Mustique. Charles and Diana flew to Portugal later Wednesday on an official visit.

Scotland Yard said patrolman Mark Moraviec spotted a man wearing a ski mask in the gloom close to

a garden wall and challenged him. The man threatened Moraviec with a hammer and started walking away quickly, but the policeman chased him and called for help, Scotland Yard said.

Within seconds, Moraviec and policeman Christopher Durward-Akhurst, who had rushed to the scene, tackled the man.

"A violent struggle took place in which both officers were hit on the head with a hammer," Scotland Yard said. "Having disarmed him of the hammer, the man produced a Bowie knife and another fierce struggle ensued in which both officers were further injured."

The masked man eventually was overpowered, handcuffed and taken to Kensington police station for questioning.

Moraviec, 25, suffered a hammer blow to the chin and Durward-Akhurst, a dog handler, had minor injuries. Scotland Yard said his dog, Tribune, was with him at the time but was not required.

Royal security got a thorough overhaul, including \$3 million pound (\$4.5 million) in new equipment, after unemployed drifter Michael Fagin climbed a drainpipe and got into Queen Elizabeth's bedroom at Buckingham Palace in 1982.

Despite tighter security, there have been several incidents at royal residences, the latest earlier this month when a man scaled 15-foot gates to enter the queen's estate at Sandringham in eastern England while she was there.

There have been previous successful and unsuccessful attempts to enter Kensington Palace, which was built as a private house and remodelled by Sir Christopher Wren for King William II in 1691. King George II, the last monarch to live in it, died there in 1760.

Kensington Palace then became home to members of the royal family, including Princess Victoria, who was roused from her bed there in 1837 to be told King William IV had died and she was queen. She moved to Buckingham Palace three weeks later.

Prince Andrew takes seat in House of Lords

LONDON (AP) — Prince Andrew, son of Queen Elizabeth II, took his seat in the House of Lords Wednesday, bringing a dash of youthful verve to what many regard as a legislative dinosaur.

The 36-year-old ritual of bowing and hat-doffing demonstrated how two ancient institutions — monarchy and House of Lords — have survived and even grown in popularity in tradition-loving Britain.

As millions watched a live telecast, the 28-year-old prince marched into the ornate chamber erect and looking self-assured, dressed in red and ermine robes.

He had already rehearsed his accession to the seat, to which he became entitled when his mother made him Duke of York in honor of

his marriage last July to Sarah Ferguson. He also was confirmed as Earl of Inverness and Baron Killyleagh.

Holding a copy of the New Testament, he recited the oath from memory in a firm voice: "I, Andrew Duke of York, do swear by almighty God that I will be faithful and bear true allegiance to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth, her heirs and successors, according to law, so help me God."

Then he bowed and tipped his hat three times to Lord Hallsham, the Lord Chancellor sitting opposite.

Hallsham, 79 and resplendent in a shoulder-length wig, reciprocated with three doffs of his three-corner hat.

Judge allows cameras at trial of teen-ager

BOULDER, Mont. (AP) — Cameras will be allowed at the trial of a Helena teen-ager accused of murdering the parents of television actor Patrick Duffy, but there will be certain exceptions, a judge says.

District Judge Frank Davis said Wednesday he has denied a prosecution motion that would have banned cameras from the trial of Kenneth Miller, 19, one of two youths accused of killing Terrence and Marie Duffy.

However, Davis said he would allow only one television camera in the Jefferson County District Courthouse in Boulder, and would not allow cameras during the jury selection process.

He also said he would forbid television coverage of witnesses who asked not to be on camera, and he said there would be a series of guidelines for the news media similar to those he imposed in Virginia City during the trials of "mountain men" Don and Dan Nichols.

Jefferson County Attorney John Connor Jr. had asked the judge to "exclude cameras from the trial, saying that the public interest in the trial did not require television- or photographic coverage."

Miller is accused of two counts of deliberate homicide in the Nov. 18 slayings of the Duffys during what authorities said was a robbery at their tavern in Boulder.

Their shootings drew international attention to the small ranching community 20 miles south of Helena because of the fame of their son, who plays Bobby Ewing on the CBS television show "Dallas."

Patrick Duffy has indicated he will not attend the trial, Davis said. When Duffy returned to Boulder the day after his parents' deaths, he remained virtually in seclusion because of attention by the news media and finally issued a statement pleading for privacy.

Miller's trial is scheduled to start March 9 in Boulder, and Davis said he expects it to last a week.

"If we can get a jury in one day, I think we'd be able to do it in a week," he said.

The judge ruled earlier that co-defendant Sean Wentz, 19, of Helena, would have a separate trial on similar charges.

Group delays Afghan youth's return from U.S. treatment

KALAMAZOO, Mich. (AP) — A non-profit children's group, defying the U.S. State Department, has delayed the return of a 6-year-old boy to an Afghan refugee camp because it fears for his health.

Zia Ullah, who was brought to Michigan in June for treatment of lingering injuries from an Afghan bomb blast, was to have left for an Afghan refugee camp in Pakistan on Monday.

But his sponsors in this country, the "nationwide" group Heal the Children, decided to postpone the return trip.

"We're not trying to keep this child," said Debbie Block, a Kalamazoo member of Heal the Children. "But we are getting conflicting stories about what it will be like when Zia returns to Pakistan."

The youngster, who has been attending kindergarten classes in Kalamazoo, suffered spinal injuries in a bomb blast last spring in Afghanistan during fighting between rebels and Soviet-backed forces. Since July, he has been living with Donald and Jenny DeWolf.

Block said the boy's sponsors fear that he won't receive adequate medical care if he is returned home and could develop urinary tract infections or kidney failure from his injuries.

"This was purely a medical decision," Block said. "The State

Department sent him to us for medical care. We didn't ask for him. His medical care is not complete." She said the group will keep the child until it receives assurances about his medical care. She also said conflicting reports about the child's parents indicate the boy's father has been killed and that his mother's

whereabouts are unknown. Because of the group's concerns, State Department officials are obtaining information on what sort of medical treatment the boy would receive overseas in the event of an emergency, said a spokesman in Washington who spoke on the condition he not be identified.

But the spokesman said the boy's doctors say the child is well enough to return home.

"The doctors propose to send him back home with medicine and with the instructions on how to administer the medicine," he said.

The spokesman also said the boy has a parent in Pakistan, although he said it wasn't known whether the parent was the mother or father.

Mrs. DeWolf said Heal the Children has asked physicians in Ann Arbor to examine the boy on Monday and determine whether he can safely be returned home. She also wants assurances that the boy's mother can be located, she said.

Zia has learned fluent English quickly and is considered a bright child, said his teacher, Lois Hoekstra.

The boy has gradually adjusted to life in the United States, Mrs. DeWolf said, and Zia says he likes "TV and books and hamburgers with ketchup and mustard."

Poison gas, flooding still threats near tragedy-stricken African lake

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deadly gas and flooding continue to pose a threat at Lake Nios in the African nation of Cameroon, where more than 1,700 people were killed by a gas cloud last summer, American scientists said Wednesday in proposing actions to ease the danger.

A series of steps, including lowering the level of Lake Nios and removing dissolved gas from the lake, were recommended in the final report of the American scientific team.

An unstable spillway on the lake poses a threat of major flooding in the area, Dr. Edward J. Koehnberg, of the U.S. Office of Foreign Disaster Assistance, warned at a State Department briefing. And the water in the lake still contains high concentrations of dissolved carbon dioxide, raising the possibility of another sudden gas cloud

similar to the one that claimed 1,746 lives last August 21, he added. Those victims were smothered by a cloud of carbon dioxide that bubbled out of the lake, the study concluded.

The U.S. team will return to Cameroon next month to meet with local officials and scientists from several other nations to compare findings and proposals for preventing further tragedies, Koehnberg reported.

While investigators have concluded that the carbon dioxide cloud killed the victims of the disaster, the mechanism that caused it to burst forth from the lake remains in some dispute, Koehnberg said.

American scientists believe the gas, which originated in molten rock deep in the earth, was dissolved in the bottom layers of the lake and

suddenly bubbled forth, the way carbon dioxide bubbles out of a soft drink when the cap is removed.

The trigger could have been a storm above the lake, a small landslide, runoff from heavy rains at the time or even seasonal cooling, Koehnberg said.

Normally, water in lakes like Nios remains very stable, allowing gas concentrations to build up. By contrast lakes in cooler climates such as the United States have a regular circulation because of seasonal warming and cooling, and that prevents such a buildup.

French scientists have a different theory of the cause of the disaster, contending that a huge bubble of gas from deep in the earth suddenly burst through the lake.

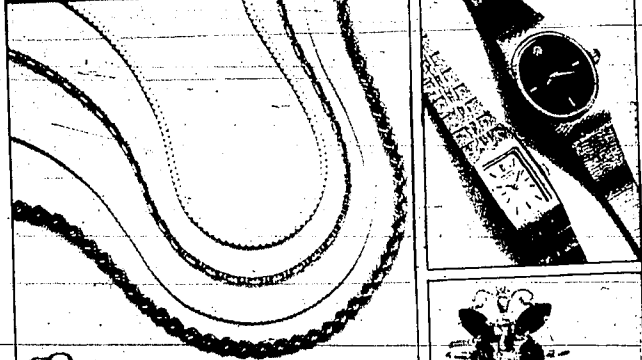

ABC takes gamble on 'Amerika'-Page 2

Oft-debated 'Amerika' bogs down in attempt to fill gap of 14½ hours

NEW YORK — The millions of Americans who tune in Sunday to the opening episode of ABC's hotly debated miniseries "Amerika" are bound to be surprised when confronted with an often leaden, occasionally thought-providing film oddity.

The scarcity of violence and action may puzzle viewers who have heard for months of a miniseries about a Soviet takeover of the United States. They may expect to see a revolution, but there isn't one.

"Amerika" is ponderous and

'Amerika' vies with Soviet TV

NEW YORK — "Amerika," ABC's vision of a Russian occupation of the United States, will vie in many American homes with the Soviets' self-image when a national cable channel airs Soviet TV the same week.

The Discovery Channel, which recently agreed to show 62 hours of Soviet TV from Sunday to Feb. 22, said it was offering the Russian programs to its 14 million subscribers "to complement, not compete, with the ABC show."

Discovery subscribers in the Magic Valley will have a chance to tune into what was described as typical Soviet TV fare that includes game shows, cartoons, rhythmic aerobics and in-depth documentaries on farm implements.

"Our mission is totally apolitical; it's simply to bring the world into the living rooms of our subscribers," said Discovery chairman John S. Hendricks. The pictures will come through Orbita Technologies, a New York-based satellite transmission company.

"You'll see tremendous differences and homogenous similarities," said Orbita chairman Ken Schaffer, who has been watching Soviet TV for five years in his Manhattan penthouse. "It may be terrible television but it's always

bleak, alternately subtle and zealously caustic. It is at times moving. There are moments of awkward amateurism mixed with scenes of cinematic sophistication.

Because of last-minute editing, only the first six hours of the 14½-hour miniseries were available for review, but they revealed a rare artistic gamble for television.

Publicity about its provocative political premise is not enough to sustain 14½ hours. The cast struggles bravely to carry the story, but there just isn't enough plot and characterization for an entire week of two-hour episodes.

That's too bad, because it includes some nice work, like the no-dialogue sequence in the third night when

downtrodden political exiles trudge into fictional Millford, Neb., and are taken in by previously apathetic townspeople, an apparent metaphor for immigration.

The miniseries opens with an extreme closeup of Kris Kristofferson's gaunt face as he grunts hesitantly in voiceover: "It's winter. It's hard to keep track. I need to write this somehow, to try to hold on. When I had my freedom — free... free... If you say it over enough, it begins to sound, mean... nothing."

Cut to scenes of a performance in a church of an outlawed play, "The Fantasticks." The American actress (Mariel Hemingway) meets later with her lover, a worldly KGB colonel (Sam Neill) under whose protective auspices the play went on, uninterrupted by violence.

Supposedly a hot issue, teen-age pregnancy, scored fall ratings points for "The Young and the Restless." Teen-age triangle plots are next in line starring Cricket, Danny and Phillip. That shows that "Y and R" is serious about kids, realizing youngsters count even if their fans may be in school.

The old, reliable triangle plot merely drops an age notch. To stay abreast of the times, "Young and Restless" keeps getting younger. The recent teen-age pregnancy plot becomes a turning point on the soap. "Daddy was so afraid we preached too much," says blonde, 18-year-old Lauralee Bell (who plays Cricket). She's the daughter of "Y and R" boss William J. Bell.

But the message was overdue in Lauralee Bell's view. "I see all these kids jumping in bed on other soaps, and nobody pays any penalty. Somebody had to speak out."

While her father and mother Lee put the finishing touches on the new CBS soap "The Bold and the Beautiful," premiering in March, daughter Lauralee, playing Cricket, settles in as Nina's roommate.

"Not a wise move on Cricket's part," notes daughter Bell. "But things are looking up. I've wanted a boyfriend for three years. Now I'm going to have Danny and Phillip."

Five years ago, 13-year-old Lauralee made her show debut as Cricket, a two-day job provided by her father. Too young to be nervous, she felt only regret when the lights went out. From that moment on, acting was her interest.

About to graduate from high school in June, she studies from 9 to 11 a.m. daily, works on the TV sound stage in the afternoon, joins the family at night in their new California home, complete with tennis court. On weekends, it's open house at the Bells for tennis and show-biz talk.

"I love it when people drop by for tennis," says Lauralee Bell. "You don't do that in Chicago."

Finally leaving Chicago where her father ran the soap from home, and her mother Lee hosted her own show, the Bell family lives and breathes Hollywood soaps. Her brother Billy works in the financial end of "Y and R," another brother Bradley writes, and he even ordered his sister to punch up the lines

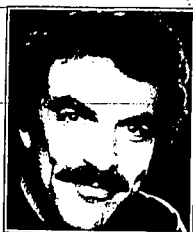

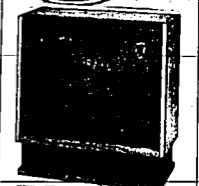

NBC off to fast start in 'sweeps'

NEW YORK — NBC is off to a fast start in the February sweeps, winning the first week of the month with top 10 performances by its comedies and the first part of the miniseries "The Two Mrs. Grenvilles."

NBC also resumed first place in the week's news ratings after losing to CBS the previous week. CBS was second and ABC third.

February is one of four months a year called "sweeps," when ratings determine local stations' advertising rates, so the networks battle to draw audiences to their affiliates.

Gerald Jaffe, NBC's vice president for research projects, predicts NBC will win the month by about 1½ rating points, with CBS coming in second.

For the week ending Sunday, "The Cosby Show" was the top-rated prime-time show, with a rating of 37.6 and a 54 share.

The rating measures total households tuned in — one rating point equals 874,000 households equipped with television — and the share is the percentage of the available audience that the show attracted.

NBC has won 17 of the 20 weeks in the season to date, coming in second to CBS three times.

NBC won last week with an average rating of 17.9, CBS had 15.6 and ABC 14.1. NBC's season-to-date average is 17.9, CBS' is 16.1 and ABC's is 14.2.

"NBC Nightly News" had the highest news ratings for the week ending Feb. 6. The previous week,

the "CBS Evening News" had won by 1½ rating points, a decided departure from the usual neck-and-neck competition. NBC later speculated that a publicized commercial revealing the winners of a sweepstakes that ran during CBS' news broadcast was responsible for the glitch.

Last week, NBC's news rated 12.9 with a 23 share of the audience, CBS had a 12.3 rating and a 22 share and ABC had a rating of 11.3 and a 20 share.

The top 10 prime-time shows out of the 74 rated last week were: "Cosby," "Family Ties," "Cheers," "Murder, She Wrote," "Night Court," "60 Minutes," "Golden Girls," "Moonlighting," "The Two Mrs. Grenvilles" and "Growing Pains."

The lowest-rated shows, from the bottom, were: "Our World," "Dads," "Gung Ho," "Shell Game," "Spenser: For Hire," "Hard Copy," "Wizard," "Ohara," "Sledge Hammer!" and "Outlaws."

Report: CBS News faces added cuts

NEW YORK (AP) — The chief executive of CBS Inc. has asked CBS News to pare its budget by up to \$50 million in a move that could force a major reworking of the network's news-gathering process, according to a published report.

People at the network say the request came from Lawrence A. Tisch,

the chief executive officer and the largest shareholder in CBS Inc., according to an article published in Feb. 5 editions of The New York Times.

The sources told the Times the changes could mean a radical restructuring of CBS News. One network official said it could bring

dismissals and cutbacks at the news division that would make the major cutbacks of last year — in which more than 100 CBS News employees were dismissed — look like "chicken feed," the Times reported.

When he was asked about the \$50 million figure, Tisch told the Times, "That's a wonderful number."

However, an unidentified network executive said the amount was a "big number" that might ultimately be higher than \$50 million, the newspaper said.



great viewing."

Hendricks said the Discovery contract was contingent on an agreement with the Soviet Union that no "made-for-America" programs will be slipped in amidst the regular shows and that subtitles explaining the general content of the shows will be allowed.

"Soviet TV has much to offer American friends," said Boris Malakhov, a spokesman for the Soviet Embassy in Washington. "We have ballets, cultural shows and friendly, humane cartoons for children." The Discovery broadcast will be the first in what was hoped would be seven experiments nationwide with Soviet TV.

Only the news programs will be translated.

Hendricks said Discovery plans to poll its viewers after the week to gauge reaction. Moscow will get the results.

'Glasnost' benefits 'Donahue'

HOLLYWOOD — The Soviet Union's new policy of "glasnost" or openness is continuing, and apparently Phil Donahue is one of the benefactors.

Most of a batch of "Donahue" U.S.S.R. segments are the result of 10 days of production in the Soviet Union last month, making New York-based "Donahue" the first American talk show to tape inside that country, according to the show's publicists.

The "Donahue" programs appear to be an extension of a Kremlin policy of tolerance for at least some free expression and greater openness with the West, a policy that has manifested itself in many areas. Donahue already has taken part in two televised spacebridges linking

private Soviet and American citizens.

A spokeswoman for the show denied that the week of Soviet programs was part of an anti-"Oprah" strategy during the critical February ratings sweeps month.

Starring Oprah Winfrey, the "Oprah" talk show is the season's new syndication blockbuster and is outdrawing "Donahue" in a number of markets where they air opposite each other.

The Soviet trip was in the works before the start of this season and thus could not have been aimed at hyping "Donahue" ratings against "Oprah," the spokeswoman said. But it couldn't hurt.

Principal leaving 'Dallas'

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Victoria Principal, who for nine years played Pam Ewing, the glamorous, reconciled wife of oilman Bobby Ewing on the hit TV series "Dallas," will leave the show after the current season, her publicist said recently.

Principal's contract with Lorimar Telepictures ends after the 1986-1987 season and the actress has chosen not to renew it, said spokesman Alan Nierob.

Principal is negotiating with other companies for major television commitments, "one of which includes a projected series of her own," Nierob said.

On "Dallas," the Pam Ewing character divorced her husband, played by Patrick Duffy. As they prepared to re-marry, Bobby was struck by a car and killed at the end of the 1984-1985 season.

But in the final episode last season, Pam found Bobby taking a

Director in midst of monumental task

LOS ANGELES — "War and Remembrance," with a budget of \$100 million and set to run 30 hours on ABC, may well be the most monumental project ever undertaken by one man in the history of motion pictures or television.

The one man is director Dan Curtis.

In addition to directing, Curtis is the executive producer and co-wrote the 2,119-page script with Earl Wallace and author Herman Wouk. "War and Remembrance" is the sequel to Wouk's "The Winds of War," which Curtis also directed.

Curtis has been filming "War and Remembrance" since January 1986 and will not complete principal photography until September. He

spent most of last year in Europe. This year he will film in California, Hawaii, Florida, Washington and Philadelphia. The sea battles will be filmed in miniature in the Bahamas in 1988. Then he faces a year of editing.

The miniseries continues the story of Pug Henry (Robert Mitchum), Rhoda (Polly Bergen) and their family. It tells the story of World War II on the battlefields, at home and in the Nazi death camps.

"This is my third year on 'War and Remembrance,' counting the pre-production work," Curtis said in his motor home during a half-hour lunch break from shooting. He spent four years on "The Winds of War" and expects "War and Remembrance" will take five years.

"I couldn't do it if I didn't enjoy

In Millford, we meet the Millfords, a formerly prominent family reduced to squabbling in their rundown farmhouse on their remaining 50 acres of land. Kristofferson plays their imprisoned son and brother, a one-time presidential candidate.

The locals complain about "squatters," political exiles forced to eke out a living in rural shanty towns, and the lack of consumer goods, while spreading rumors about resistance movements out West.

Robert Ulrich, as the local county administrator, struggles to maintain the community under communism.

Occasionally, occupation forces stage frightening military maneuvers designed to keep the citizenry in line, but there is only sporadic, ineffectual rebellion, mostly by disenfranchised teen-agers.

In the district capital of Chicago, Wendy Hughes, as Kristofferson's ex-wife, has become an important official in the new regime.

There are some jokes — Alaska cannot be subdued and California persists in decadence, despite re-education efforts.

The miniseries picks up 10 years after a bloodless coup, and this is the basic structural problem that cripples the pace. Writer and director Donald Wrye dislikes flashbacks, so his characters have to explain in dialogue who they are, how they're related to each other and what they were like before the Soviet occupation. The result is a lot of work for viewers more accustomed to being rewarded with diversionary action sequences every 10 minutes.

Kristofferson seems a little hard to swallow as charismatic leader, though he is perfectly credible as prison-camp zombie.

But most of the cast is superb, especially Christine Lahti, whose character serves as the metaphor for the country — she was a spunky rebel before being raped by the occupation forces, but she continues an affair with the commandant. Likewise Neill, who gets to play perhaps the best-developed character — his KGB colonel is ironically sentimental about typical American virtues like rugged independence and self-reliance.

Groups on both the right and the left, as well as the United Nations, having seen no more than portions of "Amerika," have complained noisily — that it paints a simplistic, Nazi-like portrait of the Soviets or, on the other hand, that it shouldn't even suggest the Soviet Union could take over the United States. The United Nations protested being cast as the brutal occupation force. Chrysler, citing the downcast mood of the miniseries, withdrew its sponsorship.

ABC has agreed, because of complaints, to broadcast disclaimers before episodes of "Amerika" and follow the miniseries with a panel discussion, a source close to the U.N. administration said Feb. 5.

According to the source, who spoke on condition of anonymity, disclaimers before each installment will say organizations portrayed in the 1½-hour series are fictional.

In "Amerika," the occupation begins with a bloodless takeover engineered by Soviet-backed troops

posing as U.N. peacekeepers.

After objecting to use of the U.N. emblem and the portrayal of peacekeeping troops, the world organization hired lawyer Theodore C. Sorenson to negotiate with the network.

ABC plans to broadcast a news program dealing with the controversy over "Amerika" on Feb. 23, the day after the last installment, as part of a series called "Viewpoint," the source said, and a U.N. representative will be included.

The source said ABC also agreed not to show the U.N. emblem in advertising and "made a good-faith effort to take into account concerns of the United Nations" in editing the program.

The United Nations says viewers would get a negative impression of its peacekeeping forces from the portrayal of the fictional contingent raping, murdering and looting.

It also wants free time on ABC to broadcast public service announcements about itself. The source said that issue remains unresolved.

Certainly, "Amerika" does not portray life under Soviet control as a lovely bunch of coconuts, but it does try to give some depth to the Soviet characters. And the premise, preposterous as it is, provides an interesting vantage point from which to explore just what are those elusive qualities that make Americans American.

In the end, all the public protests of "Amerika-with-a-K," and the fact that it is going on the air at all, should tell more about Amerika-with-a-C than any miniseries ever will.

it," he said. "I've been shooting a year and I'm not even tired. Compared to working in Europe, this is a vacation."

After the 18-hour "The Winds of War," which ABC broadcast in February 1983, Curtis swore he would not do the sequel. Why did he change his mind?

"I guess it helped to have a year off," he said. "I couldn't find anything I wanted to do. Nothing seemed to be a challenge. It was all pale by comparison to what I had done."

In the meantime, ABC moved ahead with its plans for "War and Remembrance" and negotiated with Curtis.

Curtis at first felt the sequel was "undo-able." Not only were there the big naval battles and submarine warfare in the Pacific, but there was the Holocaust.

"How could I do the Holocaust without it being a pale imitation?" he asked. "The thing that bothered me the most was dealing with the Holocaust material. I didn't know how to begin. Where do you go to re-create it? How do you do it? If you do it, it has to be done in such a way that it won't be an insult to 11 million people who died. I felt I had to be told right because so many people don't believe it ever happened."

As it turned out, Curtis was able to film the death camp scenes at Auschwitz and Birkenau in Poland. He got permission after some very delicate negotiations.

Curtis felt the scenes had to be filmed there. "Words can't describe how frightening it still looks," he said. "It just goes on forever. There's no way you could duplicate the scope of it. They killed millions of people there. It is the most frightening place imaginable."

"I wanted to do it on the spot where it happened. It would add an incredible element. The place became an enormous star. It's overpowering and frightening. It had an effect on us, on everyone. I'll tell you who it really affected — the German crew."

Curtis said he expects the Holocaust scenes to have a "brutalizing effect" on the viewer. But, he said, "This is not a Holocaust story. Thank God we have other elements."

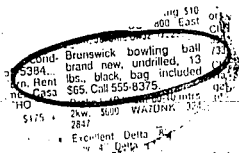
