## Senate passes day-care compromise, 33-9

BOISE — The Idaho Senate has approved compromise day-care legislation that both sides concede is not totally satisfactory but which will end the state's distinction as the only one in the nation without mandatory statewide day-care standards.

The bill, passed by a 33-9 vote on Thursday, now goes to the House, where its prospects were bolstered earlier this month with the defeat of more sweeping legislation on a 42-42 tie vote.

Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus had backed the more comprehensive bill, which was pushed by the statewide Child Care Coalition, but his aides have indicated he would probably accept the compromise.

"We have been dealing with this problem since 1972," said Sen. Bruce Sweeney of Lewiston, the Democrats representative in the extensive negotiations that finally led to the bill.

"It's time to have some kind of compromise and deal with this in a responsible manner," Sweeney told his colleagues.

Some 40,000 Idaho children currently attend day-care centers of varying types around the state, but attempts to impose even basic standards on those centers have been stymied in a stalemate between one legislative faction wanting little or no regulation and another wanting comprehensive regulation similar to the coalition bill.

Sen. Michael Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, the compromise's floor sponsor, said it went further than he would have liked while Sen. Mary Lou Reed, D-Coeur d'Alene, said she "had hoped for something stronger."

"But this is an acceptable compromise," Mrs. Reed said.

The alternative, refashioned in the past week to heighten its chances of final passage, sets out limited standards for various day-care operations, totally exempting any with six or fewer children provided very limited regulation of those with seven to 12 children and imposing all its standards on centers with over 12 children.

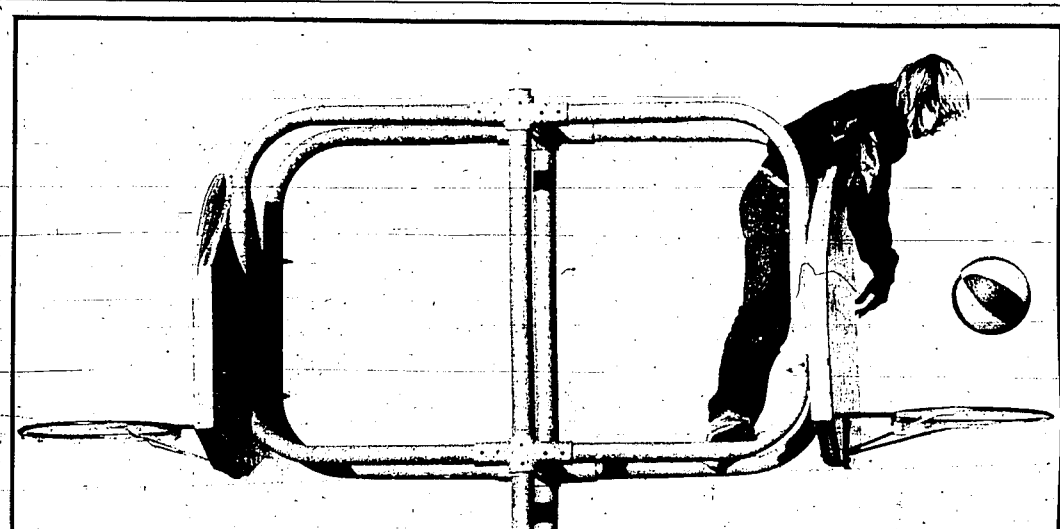
It diffuses the responsibility for licensing

and inspecting centers, giving the state Department of Health and Welfare authority to coordinate the regulatory scheme.

Health considerations and inspections would be left to the seven regional health districts and fire regulation would be handled by the state Fire Marshal. The more comprehensive bill gave the state department almost unrestrained authority to impose the standards it thought necessary to ensure health and safety.

But leaders of the Child Care Coalition have conceded that the Senate proposal represents about the best option possible in the current Legislature.

## Drinking age of 21 wins OK

BOISE — The long-running legislative debate over the legal drinking age in Idaho has finally ended and it is now up to Gov. Cecil Andrus to sign the bill that will restore millions of dollars in federal highway funds to the state.

The House-passed bill raising the legal drinking age from 19 to 21 won final legislative approval on Thursday, clearing the Senate on a 27-15 vote. It will take effect as soon as the Democratic chief executive signs it.

While critics rallied against denying 19- and 20-year-olds the right to drink when they have all the other rights and responsibilities of adults, supporters of the bill simply called it's passage a matter of "life and death" on the state's highways and the need to bow to a federal mandate to recover negated highway money.

But only moments before the House-passed measure gained final approval, the Senate voted 37-4 for another bill that also would raise the state's drinking age to 21 but require it to be reduced back to 19 if South Dakota wins a court challenge to the mandate directing the higher age.

Sen. Mike Blackbird, D-Kellogg, sponsor of the bill, said 25 other states and the District of Columbia have approved that provision.

All but two of the senators who voted against the House-passed measure supported the bill with the exception of its "life and death" provision. They were Republicans Lynn Tommings of Rupert and Darrell McRoberts of Twin Falls. Republicans Veal Crystal of Lewisville and Ann Rydahl of Idaho Falls also voted against Blackbird's version.

Both bills grandfather in persons who are 19 or 20 before the law's enactment, but "the proposal" with

## AIDS education should start early, officials say

SUN VALLEY — Idahoans are interested in learning about AIDS, as witnessed when 350 people of all ages turned out Wednesday night for a town meeting here on the subject.

And officials advocating further education on the deadly disease say that starting earlier, perhaps in 5th or 6th grade, is needed to help prevent AIDS from spreading.

For striving to learn about the

deadly syndrome that "destroys" its victim's immune systems, guest speaker Dr. Mort Cowen, from the University of California, commended Idaho's initiative.

"I have to really congratulate you for doing something that many other communities haven't," Cowen said.

It was the second large gathering for AIDS education in less than a month. A DHW conference Jan. 30 in Boise drew 200 educators, medical and business people from around the state.

The audience crowded into Our Lady of the Snows Catholic Church for the Department of Health and Welfare presentation of slides and educational film as cars lined the road out front.

The 2-hour presentation also featured Idaho State Epidemiologist Dr. Charles Brokopp and was moderated by Dr. Stephen Lubner, of the Mollie Scott Clinic.

Education is seen as the best front for "doctors" to battle the usually fatal syndrome, because the forms

of transmission are so limited and infection is incurable.

Cowen and Brokopp reiterated that AIDS is only transmitted through intimate sexual contact; the transfer of blood, usually by intravenous drug abusers sharing needles; and from an infected mother to a child before or during birth.

But AIDS also carries misconceptions the doctors tried to alleviate, because remedies to the epidemic, including a vaccine or cure, are not expected in the near future.

Brokopp and Cowen advocated teaching AIDS safety, including to 5th and 6th graders awakening to the dawn of their sexuality. A New York videotape called "Sex, Drugs and AIDS," which deals explicitly with AIDS prevention, was shown Wednesday as many children watched with their parents.

But Brokopp said deciding to educate students on AIDS prevention lies with the local health districts. And more money is needed.

## Economic growth remains sluggish

WASHINGTON — U.S. economic growth slumped to an annual rate of 1.3 percent in the final three months of 1986 as a long-awaited improvement in the trade deficit was offset by weakness in consumer spending, the government reported Thursday.

The Commerce Department said the gross national product, the broadest measure of economic health, slowed significantly from October through December as the United States finished its poorest year economically since the last recession.

For all of 1986, the GNP grew just 2.5 percent, showing even more sluggishness than 1985, when the economy expanded at a 2.7 percent rate.

The new GNP report represented a downward revision in fourth quarter growth, which originally had been put at a slightly faster 1.7 percent rate.

The weaker growth was accompanied by a slowdown in inflation as a price index tied to the GNP rose at an annual rate of just 0.7

percent from October through December, the best performance in almost two decades.

The Reagan administration played down the weaker GNP figure, choosing to emphasize instead the fact that the report finally showed an improvement in the country's trade performance, which has been holding back economic growth for more than two years.

Presidential spokesman Marlin Fitzwater said various changes suggested "the possibility of stronger growth in the first quarter of 1987."

But private economists said they saw little evidence for optimism in the economy's fourth quarter performance.

However, the latest forecast from a monthly survey of 50 top economists by Blue Chip Economic Indicators puts GNP growth at a much slower 2.3 percent rate for 1987. The 2.3 percent growth in 1986 was the weakest since the recession year of 1982 when the GNP declined by 2.5 percent.

The administration is pinning its hopes for faster growth on hopes that the trade deficit is finally beginning to turn around.

## Searchers recover 3 bodies from slide

BRECKENRIDGE, Colo. — More than 250 mountaineers using long poles to probe the deep snow across an avalanche recovered two more bodies Thursday before suspending their search for at least one more missing skier.

With blowing snow and the cold hampering efforts late in the day, Summit County Sheriff's spokesman Ron Milhorn said the search for the fourth skier would resume at 7 a.m. today.

All three victims of Wednesday's snow slide were men, and their bodies were found in one area of the steep slope.

The first body was found Wednesday, less than three hours after the avalanche. The other two were found in 4 to 6 feet of snow Thursday.

"We have developed information that a fourth victim is involved in the slide. We have shifted our emphasis to the other side of the slide," said Summit County Sheriff Delbert Ewald. He said the missing man was skiing with his stepbrother and was not with the other victims.

Sheriff's Sgt. Al Witt said searchers with long probes hit something hard at the 11,600-foot altitude on the mountain. Searchers then used shovels and found the second victim under about five feet of snow. He was wrapped in a blanket and taken to a medical tent atop the mountain in the central Colorado Rockies.

A helicopter dropped explosives to release loose snow that could cause more avalanches on Peak 7, a steep slope north of the Breckenridge

ski area, before the searchers, aided by dogs, headed out Thursday.

The snow slide that thundered down the mountain Wednesday cut a half-mile swath and left a 40-foot-long fissure where it broke loose.

Sixty certified mountaineers and 200 volunteers searched the snow Thursday. Each was equipped with a radio transmitter in case of another avalanche in the Arapahoe National Forest 65 miles west of Denver.

One of the volunteers was Mike Tyack, a 31-year-old South African who said he missed joining the doomed ski party when he was unexpectedly called to work as a bartender at one of the area resorts.

"It was meant to be with them at the top of the

## Rights report raps S. Africa, Soviets

WASHINGTON — The State Department on Thursday called the police crackdown in South Africa the most troubling human rights trend of 1986 and "dismissed some of the Soviet Union's newly proclaimed human rights moves as 'only talk.'"

The department's annual report to Congress on human freedoms in 167 countries also criticized South Korea, a close American ally, and claimed an inability to determine whether the Central American Contras were guilty of war crimes in their fight to overthrow the pro-Soviet Nicaraguan government.

In neither case, however, did the questions raised about the allies come close to matching

the department's condemnation of North Korea and Nicaragua.

On the positive side, the report said conditions in the Philippines, Haiti and Guatemala improved last year.

"Like its predecessors, the 1,356-page human rights survey is a detailed report card on the human condition in lands ranging from the democracies of Western Europe to North Korea — which Assistant Secretary of State Richard Schifter likened to the regime in George Orwell's classic novel of repression, "Nineteen Eighty-Four."

The chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Human Rights, meanwhile, accused the Reagan administration of disregarding the reports when devising foreign policy.

"It is unequivocally clear that the facts con-

tained in these reports have had no bearing on our policy initiatives toward certain nations," said Gus Yatron, D-Pa.

He cited as an example the administration's sale of weapons to Iran last year in an attempt to win the release of American hostages held by Iranian-backed groups and increase the influence of moderates in the Iranian government.

Representatives from four human rights monitoring groups, testifying before Yatron's subcommittee, said the reports glossed over abuses by countries friendly to the United States.

El Salvador, Pakistan, Turkey and Liberia were among the countries named by Michael Posner, executive director of the Lawyer's Committee for Human Rights, as allies treated with kid gloves in the report.

# Sahlberg withdraws as PUC pick, cites GOP opposition

BOISE (AP) — Because of continuing opposition from Senate Republicans, Pocatello businessman Tom Sahlberg has notified Gov. Cecil Andrus that he's withdrawing his nomination to the Public Utilities Commission.

Andrus nominated Sahlberg, 63, to the PUC to succeed Republican Richard High of Twin Falls. But Senate Republicans voiced immediate opposition, and Sen. Jerry Twigg, R-Blackfoot, said last week there were enough votes to block confirmation.

"It's regrettable that the majority party establishes a litmus test that prevents him from taking this position," said Andrus, who was in Idaho Falls for a speech Thursday. Sahlberg's letter to Andrus announcing the decision was released Thursday.

Andrus said he has no timetable for submitting a nominee to replace High on the commission. He said that brings to six the number of people who have been offered the position.

"It's not an easy position to fill," said Andrus.

Twigg said many senators questioned Sahlberg's Republican credentials, and also his qualifications to hold the job.

Sahlberg acknowledged that opposition in his letter to Andrus, which was released Thursday. He said, however, that he still considers himself a Republican, and will continue to support the party.

Many Senate Republicans were relieved at his withdrawal because they said they couldn't have confirmed him in the position, even though they considered him a friend.

"While the Republican majority in the Senate has determined not to support me, I will continue my support of the Idaho Republican Party which members of my family have actively supported since Idaho became a state," Sahlberg said.

"In the interest of party unity, however, I am asking you to withdraw my name from nomination," he said.

for DIW to provide and refine current educational resources.

Wednesday's program was part of DIW's \$200,000 effort to educate people on how to prevent AIDS from spreading. But Brokopp noted that all the money has come from the Centers for Disease Control in Atlanta, Ga.

The Idaho Legislature "has not seen fit" to fund DIW's education program against the disease, now being called a national epidemic, Brokopp said.

An associate professor of pediatrics, Cowen cited a study testing whether AIDS was transmitted between 39 people already infected and their surrounding 101 family members—two-thirds of whom were children.

After sharing eating utensils, toothbrushes, bathing and other close contact, Cowen said, only one person — a child became infected. Even that case was believed transferred from the mother to the child during birth, he said.

Another study of 15 children who each carried AIDS for an average of 16 months before being diagnosed found no transmission to their siblings, including some who were bitten, Cowen said.

"Not to harbor it, but none of them was infected," Cowen said.

In addition to detailing the specific ways in which AIDS is transmitted, humor was interspersed to describe what little is known about how to cure it.

Referring to a slide showing a child infected with the AIDS virus—Cowen said, "Now we know what it looks like — it's blue."

Questions spoken and submitted anonymously in writing ranged from the ordinary to more sophisticated during a 30-minute session after Brokopp and Cowen spoke.

The doctors said oral sex poses a threat of contracting AIDS, while blood transfusions now pose little risk because all donations are now tested.

Concerning a new bill in the state Legislature to require AIDS testing for a marriage certificate, Brokopp said he could find a better way to spend the estimated \$10,000 that would be generated from testing fees for each detected case.

Another person asked whether AIDS might change and become transmittable by new methods.

"Gowen—said—no change has been detected in the past 8 years, but 'God help us if it does.'"

Rep. Richard Gephardt, D-Mo., chairman of the House Democratic Caucus and another likely candidate, said Cuomo's decision will "focus more attention on those people in the race seeking the nomination, and deflect attention away from those who have thought about getting in the race."

# Cuomo says he won't seek Demo banner

NEW YORK (AP) — Gov. Mario Cuomo said Thursday that he would not seek the Democratic nomination for the presidency in 1988, a decision he said was best for his family, state and party.

"It will not be a candidate," he said at the end of a call-in show on WCBS radio in New York City.

The 54-year-old New York governor said he had "no desire to increase the speculation" about a possible run for the White House.

Recent nationwide polls had placed Cuomo as a strong contender to former Sen. Gary Hart of Colorado as the choice among Democrats for his party's nomination.

Hart called Cuomo "the leading candidate of the Democratic Party" and said in a statement, "Governor Cuomo will continue to contribute to the debate over this nation's future. All members of our party will benefit from his leadership and sense of humanity for a long time to come."

"In my opinion, the Democratic Party offers a number of candidates who can prove themselves capable of leading this nation toward a more sane, a more progressive and a more humane future," said Cuomo. "I will not add my name to that number."

"I will continue to work as hard as I can to deal with those problems here in New York and to support the selection of our party as vigorously as I can in my role as governor of the state of New York," he added.

In reaction, U.S. Sen. Daniel Patrick Moynihan, a New York Democrat, said, "I wish the governor would reconsider, but clearly it is his decision to make."

The major concession made by opponents of any uniform statewide regulatory plan was the establishment of a ratio of at least one adult for every 12 children. Ratios in other states range from one adult for every five children to one for every 20, with the bulk of the states requiring ratios of one adult for every 10 to 12 children.

While neither side in the long-running and often emotional debate was not happy with the plan, Sen. Gail

Bray, D-Boise, said it represented "a significant movement by those who would like to see no standards and those who would prefer comprehensive standards to a middle ground."

Only one Democrat, Jim Christensen of Aberdeen, voted against the bill along with Republicans Vearl Crystal of Lewisville, Dennis Hansen of Soda Springs, Jerry Hanson of Boise, Atwell Party of Melba, C.A. Smyser of Parma, Roger Fairchild of Fruitland, Jerry Thorne of Nampa, and Lynn Tominga of Rupert.

"We were sitting in the snow when one guy right away yelled, 'Avalanche!'"

"It looked like a huge cloud coming down," he told reporters in a hoarse whisper.

"All we could do is stand up and try to ski out of it. I'm the only one who did," Kirkland said.

He identified another member of the party as Paul Way, 23, of Auckland, New Zealand.

Summit County Under Sheriff Gary Lindstrom confirmed that Way was the second victim found and that Casey was the third, but would not identify the fourth missing skier.

Summit County Coroner Marty Flohrs said the body found Wednesday was that of Martin Donnellan, 21, of Peekskill, N.Y. The apparent cause of death was suffocation, the coroner said.

He was the fifth confirmed avalanche victim in Colorado this ski season.

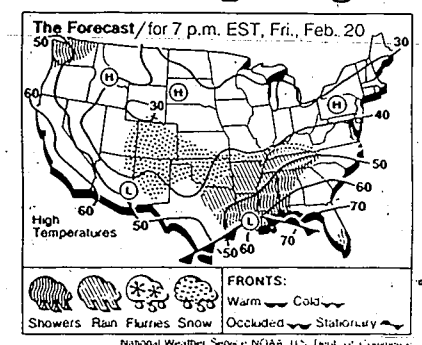
Clear northwest winds were reported in southwest Idaho Thursday afternoon.

# Coalition wins initial round in battle for Gem tort reform

BOISE (AP) — A coalition backing tort reform in Idaho has won the first battle in the Idaho Legislature.

After a 3 1/2-hour hearing in the House Judiciary and Rules Committee, the panel voted 10-4 to send a tort reform bill to the floor for a vote.



It was opposed by members of the Idaho Trial Lawyers Association and other groups. Leading the battle against the measure were two lawyer-legislators on the committee, Rep. Patricia McDermott, D-Pocatello, and Rep. Steve Herndon, D-Sandpoint.

Both attacked the bill as a measure that would do little to solve the liability insurance crisis in Idaho, but something which would seriously cripple jury decisions and undermine America's legal system.

The Idaho Liability Reform Coalition has 142 members, including such Idaho industry giants as the J.R. Simplot Co. and Boise Cascade Corp. It's backing a 7-point package of changes in personal injury lawsuits and awards, contending they will help make liability insurance more

available and cheaper by limiting unreasonable damage awards in personal injury cases.

The proposals:

- If an award for future damages is more than \$100,000 it would allow installment payments, not require all the money at once.
- Immunity for volunteers in non-profit enterprises such as the Boy Scouts.
- A cap on non-economic damages, such as pain and suffering. The cap would be based on the age of the victim, ranging from \$75,000 to \$370,000.
- To require a separate hearing on whether punitive damages should be involved, and require clear and convincing evidence that they are justified.

- Changing the "joint and several liability" clause that allows a claimant to collect all of the damages from any one defendant, even if that defendant was not completely at fault.
- Lowering the interest on unpaid judgments from the current 18 percent to a rate based on commercial rates of interest.
- Requiring a reduction for money from "collateral sources," such as insurance payments, from a damage award.

Voting against the measure in a series of motions were Herndon and Ms. McDermott, joined by Deborah Giovannelli, acting for her husband, Rep. Tom Giovannelli, D-Coeur d'Alene, and Rep. Mary Lloyd, D-Pocatello. All other members of the 14-member committee voted for the measure.

Sponsors said it was likely to win approval on the House floor. But they said it might have trouble winning its way out of the Senate Judiciary and Rules Committee, if it is assigned to that committee.

# Haagenson says his bill attempts to shift, not raise, property taxes

BOISE (AP) — Rep. Dean Haagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, says his proposal to repeal the property tax initiative enacted by voters in 1982 is an attempt to shift property taxes from business to homeowners, not to increase property taxes.

The House Revenue and Taxation Committee earlier in the week approved printing and introduction of Haagenson's proposal to end the "50-50" property tax exemption.

It exempts from property tax the first \$50,000 of value of an owner-occupied home, up to 50 percent of the property's value.

Haagenson told a news conference here Thursday reports on the proposal stressed that it would result in an increase of about \$27 million to Idaho homeowners, and did not make it clear that commercial property taxes would go down that amount.

"House Bill 187 does not raise \$1 of additional property tax and the press writes it to the people of Idaho to make that clear," he said.

Haagenson contended that the property tax initiative resulted in a shift of property taxes from homeowners to farms and businesses. However, Rep. Ken

Robison, D-Boise, testified that in the last 10 years, despite the initiative, homeowner property taxes have gone up more than any other classification.

Robison, who was one of the prime sponsors of the 1982 initiative, contends that the initiative stopped a major shift of property tax burdens from business to residential property and produced a more equal tax structure.

"People of good faith can disagree on the policy question of whether or not it is advisable to transfer the property tax burden to commercial property," Haagenson said.

"However, they should and must be aware that HB187 proposes a reversal of that shift, not a new property tax."

"To me, it is obvious that the shift to business property was ill-advised," Haagenson.

He said a Coeur d'Alene woman who operates a beauty shop complained to him about the impact of the initiative a couple of weeks ago, which started him working on the legislation.

Rep. Michael Simpson, R-Blackfoot, also complained about news reports which quoted him as

saying people did not understand the initiative.

Simpson contended that the initiative was misrepresented as a property tax cut, not a shift from homeowners to farms and business, which led people to vote for it.

He said he was incorrectly quoted as saying people did not know what they were doing when they voted for the initiative.

"My biggest disappointment... is that I spent the majority of my time trying to correct misconceptions citizens have about what we are doing here from what they read in the news media," said Simpson.

In response to a question, both Haagenson and Simpson said they felt that something which is good for business is good for all Idahoans.

Haagenson contended that shifting property taxes to businesses and away from commercial property discriminates against business, and makes it harder to lure business to the state.

"It also puts Idaho at a serious disadvantage as we try to attract business and jobs to our state," said Haagenson.

He acknowledged it is not a popular idea with homeowners.



# Senators consider pay raises

BOISE (AP) — With the pieces of the 1988 state budget puzzle beginning to fall into place, Senate Republicans moved back behind closed doors Thursday to consider the GOP House backed plan for a 5 percent across-the-board pay raise for state workers.

"We're negotiating," Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, said of the House decision that could play a key role in crafting a budget that fulfills 1986 legislative campaign pledges and still totals only around \$650 million. It would represent the first pay increase for state workers in three years.

The pay raise proposal backed by House Republicans is essentially the one Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus recommended when he outlined his more ambitious \$662.6 million budget over a month

ago. Earlier private discussions among the 25-member Senate Republican majority indicated support for a pay hike of 4 percent or less, Caucus Chairman Jerry Twigg of Blackfoot said.

Meanwhile, one bill that would give legislative budget writers some financial breathing room in drafting a budget for the year that begins July 1 was introduced in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee. It curtails the impending increase in the personal state income tax exemption to generate another \$7.7 million in tax receipts each year.

But the maneuvering on the state employee pay raise was a key to generating the House-Senate consensus needed to put any budget in final, acceptable form.

# Sheriffs decline offer

# Andrus ties education funding, SSC

IDAHO FALLS (AP) — Unless the Legislature finds a way to improve funding for public schools and higher education, Idaho likely will fail in its effort to attract the multibillion-dollar Superconducting Super Collider project, Gov. Cecil Andrus said.

"I don't know how I can say it more directly. We simply must make the effort — this year, right now — to invest in our educational system or we are going to sink far into a swamp of mediocrity," Andrus said Thursday in a statement prepared for the Idaho Falls Chamber of Commerce.

The governor cited the Legislature's rejection of his proposal to bring in about \$14.5 million in additional tax revenue that could be used at least partially for education by repealing the state's investment tax credit.

He said he was eager for lawmakers to come up with other funding options. "But time is slipping away. And, frankly, I worry that there will be no alternative except to cut the budget for education."

"And if that is the alternative, it won't mean just cutting the budget, it will mean cutting the legs out from under our efforts to land the SSC," Andrus said.

The Superconducting Super Collider is a giant accelerator of subatomic particles scientists would use for research in the characteristics and perhaps the formation of matter. It would bring thousands of jobs and millions of dollars annually to whichever state is chosen to host the facility in a selection process set to begin in April and be completed in January 1989.

## Welfare reform script bringing in responsibility, security

**BOSTON** — What a long way we've come from the Cadillac-driving welfare mother. Even the President, who made her a star, seems content to assign her to a bit role in 1987. We are finally learning that the poor are a diverse set of characters with different needs.

Welfare reports and proposals are being produced almost weekly. No less than six scripts for reform have come off stages as diverse as the White House and governors' mansions, Capitol Hill and commission rooms. They bear the names of such independent impresarios as Reagan, Cuomo, Ball, Moynihan and Kennedy. Yet they reflect a consensus about the essential ingredients of change.

Not that long ago, welfare critics from the right believed that anything we did to provide security for the poor just encouraged irresponsible behavior. Critics from the left believed that anything we did to require responsibility by the poor was "blaming the victim."

Now, as David Ellwood of Harvard's Kennedy School of Government says, "I believe we are moving in a direction where people are protected but also encouraged and, to some degree, required to move ahead and behave in a responsible fashion. Maybe we can create a system where people **ACHIEVE** security."

Chief among these "people" are AFDC mothers. In the days when Aid For Dependent Children was a program for widows and orphans, days when far fewer mothers worked outside the home, there was support for a government program that just plain gave

them a modicum of security. That support has gradually eroded.

As more wives and children are divorced out of the middle class, we are increasingly judgmental about fathers who leave their family responsibilities to the government. As more mothers work outside the home to support their young children, we are less willing to pay for those who don't.

Virtually all the new welfare scenarios include some elements of responsibility and security. They stress the enforcement of child-support payments by absent parents. They offer props for those working mothers who are not earning a wage that will lift them out of poverty. And they tout a range of transitional programs that prepare and propel mothers into work.

The programs geared to young, single welfare mothers have received the most attention. Although these mothers are a minority, we know they may remain on welfare the longest. We know how important

it is to reach them before they get stuck. So the new scripts offer a range of plans to direct these mothers toward self-sufficiency. Some would make staying in school a condition of AFDC. Others would insist that mothers enroll in job training or part-time work. All of them recognize, at least nominally, the central role of child care. And yet here, over the issue of child care, is where the plot thins.

Most of those who write the dialogue about reforming or revamping or overhauling welfare downplay the role of money. At best they insist that getting women and children off the rolls will save dollars. The Reagan plan offers no additional funds for reform. Even the Kennedy proposal is described as "revenue-neutral." But in real life, child care — like health care — is expensive.

"The truth is that you not only need child-care support to help mothers join these programs and go to work, but you need it for quite a while," says Helen Blank, director of

child care for the Children's Defense Fund. Other experts in welfare will say — if only off the record — that the economics of welfare reform don't work if you factor in high-quality day care.

"Unless child care is recognized, unless the investment is made, you won't be able to make a difference in the lives of women and their children," warns Blank. "What you'll get is some tinkering." That is what's at stake.

We are in one of those unique moments when the audience is primed and receptive. There is a consensus about goals and values: the goal of independence; the value of work. We agree on the importance of balancing security and responsibility. But we haven't yet admitted the costs or agreed that the poor are worth the investment. We are still waiting for the spotlight to shift on to the smallest members of this cast: children.

Those who imagined that America's concerns coincide with those of Mrs. Alexis Carrington-Culby-Dexter, who doesn't know what is more important: to marry off her daughter to an Eastern European prince or to spin a diamond brooch to her bikini, designed by Pierre Cardin and made from hummingbird down, will be shocked at the sight of the homeless sleeping in Lafayette Park on newspaper "matresses."

## Americans can demand policy change

Two young parents huddled with their family in the ruins of a bombed house, listening to the sound of a circling aircraft.

They heard the plane attack a distant target, and felt the ground shake as rockets hit home. Suddenly the plane roared overhead. The young mother reached for her children and stared wide-eyed at her husband. It was their last shared glance. A screaming rocket blasted their lives into flaming fragments.

This tragedy took place in a country that has suffered 50,000 dead, another 5,000 "disappeared," and almost one-third of its population driven out of their homes. Afghanistan? No. We are talking about El Salvador.

For seven years, the El Salvadoran government has been warring on its own people. While Americans argue about Iran-gate or the Contra war in Nicaragua, the blood flows in a country our president has praised as an "emerging democracy."

As usual in Central American conflicts, a close look reveals the hidden hand of the United States. In our sad little story, the aircraft and the deadly rockets were gifts of the people of America. The attack was part of a plan created in the Pentagon, where nameless tacticians baptized it "draining the sea."

In order to flush out communist insurgents, the El Salvadoran military has been ordered to capture and remove all the civilians from certain areas. Nobody has bothered to guess the human cost.

Constant air attacks drive the people into the arms of soldiers who routinely torture their prisoners in the search for communist suspects. The survivors are herded into camps where they live on handouts from relief organizations. If they should try to return to the only homes they have ever known, the airplanes and the soldiers will be waiting.

Life in the cities is also grim. Young people are automatically suspect. Union members or those who belong to any opposition group are in deadly danger. Right wing death squads still prow the night. They say that in El Salvador, there is a valley full of unburied bodies. Some are only scattered bones gnawed by dogs... others are as recent as this morning.

Frightened families gather what pitiful belongings they can carry away to head for uncertain sanctuary in Honduras. Others join refugees from another deadly "draining the sea" program in Guatemala, and end up as the unwelcome guests in Mexico. Many fugitives continue north, into the United States itself.

But the Reagan administration is embarrassed by these living witnesses to a monstrous policy. And so even though American law offers sanctu-

ary to all victims of racial, religious, and political persecution, the Immigration and Naturalization Service has been instructed to send El Salvadoran and Guatemalan refugees back to possible torture and death.

Americans believe that there is a land of hope and compassion. They have learned in their churches that God's greatest law is the law of love. And so when they finally begin to understand the human impact of U.S. policy in Central America, and when they hear about the INS treatment of people already brutalized by horrors we can scarcely imagine, they demand a change.

Risking arrest and deportation, a caravan of El Salvadoran refugees will soon visit Idaho to offer first-hand information about the situation and conditions in Central America. Sponsored by the Fellowship of Reconciliation, they will arrive in Twin Falls on March 1, where they will attend a potluck dinner at 6 p.m. and address a worship service at 7 p.m. On the following morning they will speak in local schools and at the College of Southern Idaho.

President Reagan is right when he tells Russia to get out of Afghanistan. American citizens are right when they ask their own country to change its policies toward Central America, and to give refuge to the victims of brutal governments counseled and supported by the United States.

BOISE (AP) — The telephone industry in Idaho needs to be free from some regulation so it can seek innovative solutions to modern problems, says an Idaho State University professor.



"Deregulation would give companies such as Mountain Bell more freedom to innovate, which is important to the economic development of the area," said Ron Balsley, dean of the College of Business at Idaho State.

He was among witnesses testifying Thursday before the House State Affairs Committee. The session kicked off two days of testimony, and Chairman Pam Bengson, R-Boise, said she did plan a final vote on the 11-page telephone deregulation bill on Friday.

Mountain Bell has prepared legislation allowing partial deregulation of the telephone industry. If the Public Utilities Commission determines it will not eliminate competition and still pro-

vide for good service. The legislation may be the issue which has generated the most intense lobbying of the session. About 50 people attended the committee hearing.

Among those attending, or signed up to testify, were two former Idaho attorneys general, David Leroy and Wayne Kibwel, and a former U.S. attorney for Idaho, M. Karl Shurrliff.

Mrs. Bengson divided testimony between supporters of the legislation and opponents, and there was plenty of each.

Al Fothergill, representing the Idaho Citizens Coalition, called it a "slithery" piece of legislation bearing "enormous consequences" for Idahoans. He denied that the latest bill, revised from earlier versions, meets concerns of senior citizens and consumers.

"A strange anomaly of this bill is that all the prices will go up," he said, with no consideration whether there is justification for the increases.

Fothergill argued it would allow tremendous increases in some rates and a lower rate of service.

Allan Harrison, director of an economic development and convention bureau for the Bear Lake area, said Idaho's telephone service must be upgraded statewide, or the state will lose chances at economic growth.

Companies inquiring about locating in Idaho ask about the availability of the latest telephone services, he said.

"At the present time, we cannot provide those services in our area," he said.

Joanne Smith, Campaign for Fair Telephone Rates, said Idaho has taken very good care of Mountain Bell, allowing the utility a 14 percent rate of return.

"We deserve to be protected," she said, because the only recourse peo-

ple have if they feel telephone rates are too high is to disconnect.

Ralph Woodmansee, operations director for the Idaho Falls-based Beauty for All Seasons color consultants, said his company depends on good telephone service including data transmission.

He said it appeared the deregulation bill would give Mountain Bell the flexibility it needs to remain competitive, and still give the Public Utilities Commission some regulatory power.

Jack Richmond, American Association of Retired People, said despite some negotiations with Mountain Bell, the latest bill "hasn't addressed our concerns."

Richmond said the legislation is not needed and could have enormous consequences which have not been determined. "It is better to go slow now than suffer later," he said.

Dick Welch, General Telephone Co., said his company was opposed to last year's telephone deregulation bill, which cleared the Senate but died in the House.

"This is a very important bill for rural areas of Idaho," he said. General Telephone has about 70,000 customers from Orofino north.

"It's not exactly what we wanted, or what the others want, but we can get along with it," he said.

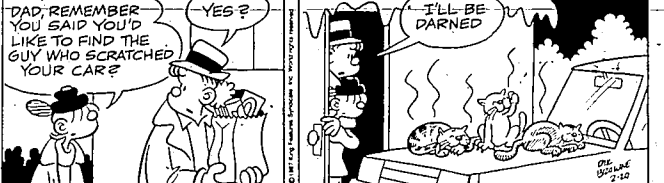

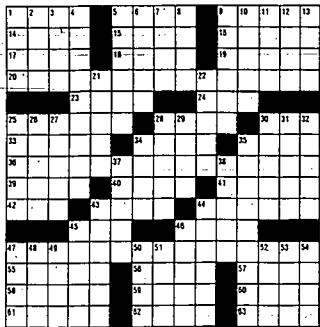

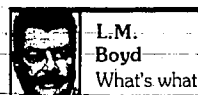

# Soviets free dissident; Begun out today

MOSCOW (AP) — Psychiatrist Anatoly Koryagin came home Thursday after five years in a labor camp, and officials said Jewish activist Josef Begun would be out of prison in 24 hours, nearly a week after his release was first announced.

Foreign Ministry spokesman Genady Gerasimov reported the releases at a news briefing. Koryagin, who had accused authorities of putting sane dissidents in psychiatric hospitals, and Begun were among the most prominent dissidents still held, but other well-known activists remain in prison or labor camps.

Begun, 35, was still at Chistopol Prison on Thursday.

An Interior Ministry official telephoned Begun's wife Inna on Thurs-

day night and told her to go to the prison, 500 miles east of Moscow, for her husband's release Friday.

"I was told my husband will be freed tomorrow, in the second half of the day," she told The Associated Press by telephone.

She said she and Boris, Begun's son by a previous marriage, would fly to the regional center of Kazan on Friday morning and expected to be at the prison in time for his release.

Begun, a teacher of Hebrew, was pardoned Tuesday by a decree of the Supreme Soviet, the nominal national parliament. He was sentenced in 1983 to seven years in prison for anti-Soviet agitation and propaganda.

A Soviet official had announced his release prematurely in a television

interview on CBS last Sunday.

Mrs. Begun and Boris said other dissidents freed from Chistopol recently told them Josef Begun is the last remaining prisoner held there for alleged anti-Soviet activity. At least 150 dissidents have been released in the past three weeks, and officials have said an equal number of cases are under review.

Chistopol has held many of the Soviet Union's best-known prisoners, including Anatoly Shcharansky, who was freed last year, and Anatoly Marchenko, whose death at the prison in December is widely believed to have prompted the wave of pardons.

Shcharansky, who was freed in an East-West exchange "new lives" in Israel and has changed his name to Natan Sharransky.

# Druse extend control over west Beirut

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — Druse militiamen drove Shiite fighters from the Hamra commercial district Thursday and controlled three-fourths of Moslem west Beirut after a five-day war that cost at least 100 lives, police reported.

A Shiite religious leader called the battle for supremacy "collective suicide."

Police said 375 people were wounded in the fight between the Shiite militia Amal and a leftist alliance the Druse formed with Lebanese Communist Party gunmen.

Yet another "final cease-fire" was called and a comparative lull settled over the blasted and burning Moslem sector after nightfall. Syria,

which supports all the factions involved, has tried to stop the killing and threatened to use its own soldiers to do so.

A police spokesman said privately that Walid Jumblatt's Druse militia "now controls about 75 percent of west Beirut. It was divided 60-40 in Amal's favor before the fighting broke out on Sunday."

Most leftist gangs were in Hamra and the predominantly Sunni Moslem residential districts of Zarif, Alsha Bakkar and Tallet Khayyat, according to police. They said three Amal pockets held out in Hamra.

Amal fighters also maintained strong defenses around the 40-story unfinished Murr Tower, their main sniping stronghold. One of the tallest

buildings in the city, it commands most of the no-man's land along the Green Line that divides west Beirut from the Christian eastern sector.

Some of the fiercest fighting took place around the seven-story Commodore Hotel, which the Druse captured from Amal in a seven-hour battle Wednesday.

Gunmen robbed the hotel's last two guests, American Moslems Mohammed Mehdli and Dale Shaheen, during the night. They were trapped in the Commodore while in Beirut seeking to negotiate for the release of foreign hostages.

Mehdli told The Associated Press the thieves took \$1,400.

# Bomb, attack take 14 lives

PESHAWAR, Pakistan (AP) — A bomb exploded Thursday outside the office of an Afghan guerrilla group, killing 10 people and wounding 62. Angry Pakistanis later attacked Afghan refugees and up to four people were reported killed.

There was no claim of responsibility for the blast, but Afghan guerrillas blamed Soviet and Afghan agents. Many Afghan guerrilla groups have offices in Peshawar, which has been hit by a wave of bombings in the past year.

The bomb, hidden in a truck, exploded outside the military office of Jamiat-Islami, one of the main Moslem guerrilla groups fighting Afghanistan's Soviet-backed communist government.

Police said the blast destroyed the office and a nearby school. Witnesses said it knocked down walls and destroyed vehicles, and several passers-by were torn to bits.

# President should stay with story on arms, senator says

WASHINGTON (AP) — The former chairman of the Senate Intelligence Committee said Thursday he believes President Reagan gave approval to an Israeli arms shipment to Iran in August 1985, and "ought to stick with" that story he reportedly once told investigators but later retracted.

Sen. David Durenberger, R-Minn., also said embattled White House Chief of Staff Donald Regan was "just making problems" with some of his actions in the unfolding Iran-Contra controversy.

Meanwhile, members of the presidential review board on the affair conducted a hospital-room interview with former National Security Adviser Robert C. McFarlane.

And inside the White House, spokesman Marlin Fitzwater announced that Reagan stands ready to veto any legislation halting aid to the Contra rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government. The Democratic-controlled Senate Foreign Relations Committee approved such a bill on Wednesday, and Reagan's spokesman said the intent of the legislation "is simply to abandon all Nicaraguans struggling to bring democracy to their country."

In Congress, meanwhile, Secretary of State

George Shultz offered no response when Rep. Robert Torricelli, D-N.J., told him during a hearing that U.S.-provided weapons were having a "dramatic impact in Iran's favor in its war with Iraq."

Torricelli, just back from a trip to Iraq, said, "The security of our country and of the entire western world is very much at issue today. There is a very real threat the Arab world could be united under this [Iranian] fundamentalist revolution," the congressman said.

In another development in the widening investigation into the Iran-Contra controversy, visiting Israeli Prime Minister Yitzhak Shamir said in an interview that Israel would provide "necessary information" to congressional committees conducting their own review.

But he said his government would resist any attempt to force Israeli officials to testify about the country's participation in arranging seven U.S. weapons shipments.

Reagan himself said nothing during the day to reporters on the continuing investigation into the secret sale of arms to Iran and apparent diversion of profits to the Contra rebels in Nicaragua.

# Tighter federal drug test rules out

WASHINGTON (AP) — Federal employees ordered to take drug tests will find it hard to doctor urine samples under rules issued Thursday, but also are guaranteed review by a medical officer before any positive result can be reported to a supervisor.

The technical rules, prepared by the Department of Health and Human Services, do not deal with the underlying controversy of whether it is proper to require tests.

But they still drew quick criticism from a union chief and from two members of Congress, one of whom

accused the Reagan administration of attacking fundamental privacy rights of federal workers.

Last September, President Reagan ordered drug testing of employees who have sensitive jobs and instructed the department to develop the scientific procedures to be followed.

The Office of Personnel Management issued regulations last November that could make as many as 1.1 million workers subject to testing, although only a fraction of them are likely to be required to submit.

Those government-wide rules were held in abeyance pending the Health and Human Services guidelines, but some agencies — including the FBI

and Drug Enforcement Administration — have been testing on their own. They will have 180 days to bring their clinical procedures in line with those set Thursday.

The detailed new rules, designed to ensure that the person being tested is submitting his own fresh urine sample, call for water in the toilet used to contain a blue dye and for the sample's temperature to be taken within four minutes.

## Bush step closer

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President George Bush, saying "I want to be a president for all Americans," announced Thursday he was forming a presidential campaign committee.

Bush, who is the leader in most surveys of potential candidates for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination, is expected to declare his candidacy next fall.

Formation of the committee makes Bush a candidate in the eyes of the Federal Election Committee, which now will count all expenditures against the overall limits set for presidential candidates.

# 'High-risk' AIDS tag may be meaningless

ATLANTA (AP) — Leading AIDS researchers said Thursday that the "high-risk" designation for homosexual men and drug abusers may have lost its meaning since millions of sexually active Americans, straight and gay, are now at risk.

"I think the risk groups should be abandoned," said Dr. Robert Redfield of the Walter Reed Institute of Research in Washington. "There's really only one risk group — that's someone who has sexual ... (or other) exposure to the virus" that causes the deadly disease.

United States, according to the CDC, and 17,728 have died. Two-thirds of the reported cases have been in homosexual or bisexual men, but heterosexual transmission is an increasingly serious problem, researchers said.

"There's no question that homosexual men have changed their behavior in many communities," Curran said. "Most of the heterosexual population have yet to get that message quite so clearly."

Most scientists now believe that sexual intercourse with a person infected with the virus that causes AIDS — regardless of the sex of the infected person or the partner — can transmit the virus.

Federal government estimates place the number of infected people in the United States at 1.5 million and climbing.

Redfield said the AIDS problem in the United States is much more serious than the government's case count would indicate, since it can take three years or more for an AIDS virus infection to develop into the deadly disease itself.

Dr. James Curran of the AIDS Program Office at the Atlanta-based national Centers for Disease Control added that while it is important for people to know about the risk of AIDS and how it is spread, "we're kidding people — [we use] over-categorize."

Redfield and Curran were among about 600 participants in a three-day conference on AIDS in children, young people and heterosexual adults, which began Thursday here.

# Conversion of reactor draws blast

WASHINGTON (AP) — Energy Department officials told members of Congress on Thursday it would be feasible for the government to convert a nuclear commercial power reactor on the Hanford, Wash., nuclear reservation into a producer of tritium and plutonium, materials used in hydrogen bombs.

Rep. Ron Wyden, D-Ore., promptly assailed the concept and drafted legislation that would bar any move to convert commercial power reactors into weapons plants.

At a private briefing members of Congress, officials from DOE's Office of Nuclear Materials said it would be technically possible to convert the Washington Public Power Supply System's No. 1 reactor at Hanford to a tritium plant, and that the facility might also be used to produce plutonium as well, according to Wyden and other sources.

Wyden said the DOE officials stressed that they were "talking only technical issues, not institutional or policy questions." But the congressman said he was convinced that "they're setting the stage for turning a civilian reactor into a bomb factory."

"This is a major mistake," the congressman said. "A fundamental precept of the nuclear program since it began was 'keep the peaceful atom peaceful.' This would be a major precedent that would reverse that."

The WPPSS unit 1 reactor was molten in May 1982 after \$1.9 billion had been spent on construction since December, 1975. It is 63 percent complete.

# White House post goes to Koehler

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan Thursday picked a former correspondent and executive for The Associated Press to see that Reagan's "goals for the coming two years are clearly and effectively articulated to the American people."

John O. Koehler was named White House communications director to succeed Patrick J. Buchanan, who has resigned effective March 1 and has not announced his future plans.

Koehler, who retired from the AP in 1985, is currently an adviser to Charles Z. Wick, director of the U.S. Information Agency and a long-time friend of the president.

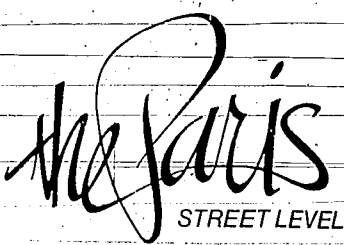

### But neither side happy with final Senate compromise

BOISE — Senators applauded the efforts of three colleagues who crafted a compromise day-care bill on Thursday that passed the Senate by a 33-9 vote.

Sen. Denton Darrington, R-Declo, who until this year opposed day-care legislation, was given a white teddy bear and dubbed "The Day-care Daddy," for helping draft a compromise bill.

Sen. Mike Crapo, R-Idaho Falls, and Sen. Bruce Sweeney, D-Lewiston, who also worked on the bill, were also given bears from Boise Democrat Sen. Gall Bray.

During debate, Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, commended the three for their "statesmanship and craftsmanship." In finally reaching a compromise solution.

"It's been a laborious exercise, and I'd like to see it pass unanimously," Noh said.

Opponents feared the legislation went too far, while people such as Bray — who support statewide, mandatory licensing — said the bill did not go far enough in protecting working parents and children.

criminal background check and a fire safety check, but they would not be required to be licensed, either.

Day-care centers with 12 children and more would have to pay \$75 for a license, and undergo a criminal background check and a fire and safety check.

The most controversial portion of the bill mandates a child-staff ratio, of one teacher to 12 children, for safety purposes. Conservatives had wanted no child-staff ratios.

Sweeney said the state would have to pay about \$41,000 to implement the licensing.

Child Care Coalition President Gordon Storrs said he was "very pleased" it passed the Senate.

The Child Care Coalition, an organization of day-care providers, had lobbied for a stronger bill that failed in the House. The coalition did not oppose the Senate bill, although they were not enthusiastic.

Storrs said he thought SB1127 will pass in the House, even though it will face "a tough debate."

## Low-power TV station earns ratings, industry notice

TWIN FALLS — Eight months after first appearing on Magic Valley screens, station K49AZ in Twin Falls has broken into the local television ratings and won industry-wide notice.

The fledgling station is hardly a rival for full-power station KMYT, but it is one of only two low-power outlets in the country to capture enough viewers to be rated by A.C. Nielsen Co. and Arbitron, K49AZ Managing Partner Kris Harvey said Thursday. The other is in Anchorage, Alaska.

Both national rating services listed K49AZ as a minor force in the local market, with just over 10 percent of area viewers watching the station at least one-half hour a day, Harvey told Magic Valley Leadership 1987, a training program for future community leaders.

The achievement has brought attention from other low-power operators and thrust Harvey into the limelight at press conferences on industry topics, she said.

K49AZ and similar stations have much weaker signals than full-power stations, which limits their reach over the air. Close to 65 percent of the station's newly won viewers are in rural areas where cable service is not available.

However, the station also has been gaining an audience in cable-equipped homes with programs such as nightly TV Bingo classic movies, series reruns and a weekly local interview show. Its camera crews also cover community events such as local theater productions, which have limited interest or are too time-demanding for full-power broadcast stations, she said.

K49AZ is on King Videocable Channel 25 and Buhl Cable Channel 18.

Seven federal licenses for low-power stations are available for the Twin Falls area, but only two — K49AZ and NBC affiliate K39AS — are being used, Harvey said.

The Federal Communications Commission apparently has also opened up a license for a second full-power station — on VHF Channel 35, she said.

In the competitive atmosphere argues against more than one more low-power station in the area, Harvey said. She said a survey is under way to better measure K49AZ's audience.

Depending on its results, King Videocable General Manager Chris Talkington said, he may consider placing the station among the 13 most-watched in his local cable system.

## Workshop explores impact of news media

TWIN FALLS — Depending on which panelist was talking, the news media was described Thursday as being both pompous and public servant, influential and impotent, during a workshop sponsored by the Greater Twin Falls Area Chamber of Commerce.

The media served the public by exposing "mental lightweights and scoundrels" in the state Legislature, said radio KLiX Radio talk-show host L. James Koutnik.

But former House speaker Tom Silvers said the media was at times selective and

irresponsible.

Both were panelists in a workshop on the influence of the news media. The session was part of the chamber's monthly Magic Valley Leadership program, which this month focused on television, radio and print news media.

Other sessions during the day covered news judgment and the growth of cable television.

The most intense examination of the media came during a session on its influence.

Panelist Dave Capps, who operates KEEF-KEJZ radio stations in Twin Falls, said the news media influences perceptions.

The rise to power of Corazon Aquino in the Philippines was similar to events in Vietnam, Capps said. Yet, the media accepted Aquino and was critical of U.S. involvement in Vietnam.

"We perceive it was OK because the media said it was OK," Capps said. "But we fought a war over a similar turn of events in Vietnam."

Capps criticized both local and national reporters, saying they tended to be "self-important, pompous and report what they want people to know."

Silvers, a veteran of many run-ins with the news media, said he expected media attacks on him as a politician. But what didn't

sit well were attacks on a politician's character, instead of his actions. He has collected a file "a foot thick of overt attitudes of the press that go beyond good reporting," he said.

The Times-News, for example, "harassed" former Sierra Life Insurance Co. president Fred Frazier until the stress "finally killed him," Silvers said, adding that the paper lost a \$4 million lawsuit in connection with its coverage of the firm's problems. The newspaper won an appeal.

Silvers said he considers the local and national media to be in "low standing" with the community.

## Rupert audit finds problems

RUPERT — The Rupert City Council received some good news and some bad news from its accountant, Eldon Condie, at its meeting this week.

At a work session to review the city's budget, Condie pointed out departments which were in financial trouble and those which were paying their way.

Condie said the library spent some of its reserve resources and had overspent its budget by \$20,000.

Mayor Bill Whitton said that the library had reduced its paid hours by using community volunteers and was realigning fee structures to help balance the budget.

Councilman Clark Cameron said he

had checked into the situation.

"They have a handle on it," he said. "They've got it under control now and will keep it that way."

Condie explained in detail the sanitation funds, the electric, sanitation, sewage and water departments.

Condie said the electric department showed a profit this year for the first time, although consumption was down and the costs were going up because of capitalization of the system.

The city has been absorbing the cost increases from Bonneville Power Administration, Whitton said, so that all customers shared in the reserves. He said an express feeder had been built to cut down on power loss, with a 20-year life expectancy on the equipment purchas-

ed.

"These initial costs will actually be amortized over a 20-year period," he said.

The sanitation department showed a \$22,000 profit for the year, but the electric, sewage and water department is again in a deficit position. Condie recommended that rates be readjusted and commended the council for the new rate structures, which he said will show a \$100,000 positive amount for next year.

"This will not be a surprise," he cautioned. "It is needed to eliminate debt from past years' deficits and for future capitalization."

The water department showed \$13,000 of retained earnings. Whitton said the department has two employees less than it did 24 months ago.

## Filer Elementary overcrowding lowers accreditation to 'advised'

FILER — All schools within the Filer School District were accredited by the Idaho State Accreditation Association, but the Filer Elementary School slipped a notch to "advised" status, said Superintendent Sheldon Kovarsky at the Filer School Board meeting Tuesday.

Kovarsky said the elementary school was put on the advised status until the number of children in two overcrowded classrooms is reduced and the library in the school is enlarged.

Currently, under the state's accreditation guidelines, elementary classes must have no more than 27 students. The Filer Elementary School has one class with 28 students and one with 29, said

Kovarsky.

In the case of the library in the elementary school, "we always get nicked on that one," said the Filer superintendent. "It's just not big enough."

If an Idaho school district chooses to ignore the association's comments, it can be put on warned status and then may lose its accreditation entirely if action is still not taken. The state can withhold funds from unaccredited schools.

Kovarsky said he hopes that by next year both problems will be corrected.

In other board news, math and physics teacher Ted Glasinger will retire after the current school year. Glasinger has been with the Filer school system for 31 years.

Larry Barker, chief custodian for the Filer School

# Rural home, rockshop burglarized

TWIN FALLS — Two burglaries in the rural Twin Falls area this week resulted in more than \$12,000 in losses to the two property owners, Twin Falls County sheriff's officers said Thursday.

Officers said that someone entered the Victor Fischer residence, 7 miles southeast of Twin Falls, Tuesday evening while the family was at church and succeeded in opening a small safe in the home.

Officers said cash, checks, valuable coins and jewelry — valued at more than \$6,000 — was reported missing.

Another \$6,200 loss was recovered when officers arrested a suspect and found jewelry and jewelry-making machinery and equipment stolen from the Moon Rock Shop, south of Twin Falls.

Edwin Jay Shaw, 23, of Twin Falls

was arrested as he left the area after officers were called to check on the rock shop, which is part of the Moon home. Recovered were gem stones, Jasper, other stones and jewelry-making and polishing equipment. The burglary was broken into at about 4 a.m. Wednesday, officers said.

Because the county patrol car was some distance from Twin Falls when the incident was reported, a Twin Falls City police officer, Joe Kistler, responded. He saw a pickup truck leaving the area and overtook it about one-quarter mile down the road, where he arrested Shaw and recovered the gems and other items from the vehicle.

Shaw appeared on first-degree burglary charges Wednesday afternoon and requested a preliminary hearing. The hearing has been set for

3:30 p.m. March 6. He was released on personal recognizance bond pending the hearing.

Entry at the Fischer home was gained through a broken window, police believe, while the rockshop was entered by breaking through a door.

Investigation into the Fischer burglary is continuing, as it is in a number of other rural home and business burglaries of the past few months near Twin Falls.

Chief Deputy Sheriff Harold Jensen said there have been several costly burglaries in the past few months. A number of businesses on Kimberly Road have been hit, he said, and many farm homes are being entered.

At least five of these have been happening while people are away from home for a few days, or even for only a few

hours," Jensen said. "In many of these, the burglars seem to have knowledge of the family activities pattern and enter the homes while they are expected to be away."

Jensen said families should be careful about leaving valuables in their homes, even if they are going away for a short time.

News organizations are selective in reporting, missing the most important stories, he charged. Some reporters will report on an action someone took, but not contact that person to interview him or her.

"That's gross misrepresentation," he said.

Koutnik, however, said the media exposed people such as Lyndon Larouche and the "deathwatch" of evangelist Oral Roberts on a national scale and "scoundrels and asinine" people at the state level.

"Crazies took over control of the (Idaho) Statehouse," Koutnik said. "They took up 'weighty' issues, such as teaching creationism in schools, he said."

By exposing them, many of the "crazies" were voted out of office. Those who remained were ineffective, Koutnik said.

"The newspaper can be damaging to you as a politician, if you deserve to be damaged," Koutnik said. He added that his program and the newspaper reflected the public's view.

Throughout Koutnik's presentation, Stevens sat stonefaced, while others laughed. Afterward Stevens said, "It was good to have this kind of news."

Koutnik suggested that KMTV-TV begin taking a stand on issues through editorials. The station "bends over backward" to report stories in such a way that nothing

controversial "sticks to them," he charged.

"They are just like Reagan — 'Teflon as hell,'" Koutnik said.

Stephen Hartgen, Times-News managing editor, said the media's influence has declined in the political arena. Years ago, newspapers were more influential and partisan. But, the media is part of the local power structure.

The news media can sway people on local issues, where they depend on it as their sole source of information, he said. Times-News' editorials and Koutnik's opposition to a bond proposal for financing construction of a new Twin Falls County Jail probably had a hand in the defeat of the bond issue, he thought.

If the Times-News had not written about Twin Falls County Clerk Dick Pence's travel expenses and hundreds of absentee ballots, Pence would have won re-election "more handsily than he did," Hartgen said.

The critical eye of the media is directly proportionate to the caliber of state and local leadership, Hartgen added. The better the leadership, the less critical the media.

# CSI, Rebels square off

**TWIN FALLS** — Ken Wagner, the coach of Dixie College's second-ranked men's basketball team, was very much the eye of the storm on the eve of the rematch between his Rebels and third-ranked College of Southern Idaho.

"This is not particularly an emotional game for us," Wagner said Wednesday night of tonight's Region 18 showdown in the CSI gym. "The first was a real contest and I think everyone expects this to be another. But we prepare to play our game and stick with our game plan."

Discipline is one of the reasons the Rebels are 26-1, including a 101-99 double-overtime victory over the Eagles in St. George, Utah, on Jan. 14 — CSI's only loss of the season.

"I think the main ingredient to my success is that we have really unselfish kids, real talent on the team," said Wagner, who inherited a National College Athletic Association championship from former Burley High School coach Neil Roberts two years ago at Dixie. "Combine that with the tradition that Dixie has. The tremendous community support for the basket-

ball program has made recruiting top players easy."

There aren't as many high-profile players at Dixie as there were during the Roberts era, during which Nevada-Las Vegas Coach Jerry Tarkanian sent his son up Interstate 15 to play for two seasons. Most successful coaches say they win with seven or eight players; Wagner actually does it.

"Probably the reason nobody from Dixie showed up in the (latest Region 18) scoring stats is that we don't have anybody scoring enough to make it," he said. "(Six-foot, 3-inch sophomore guard Clint) Rossom is averaging 16 or 17 points and (6-8 sophomore forward Roger)

McDonald is or 16. We have four or five players at around 10 points per game. We've been pretty much a balanced team all year. We usually have one or two high scorers, but it varies from game to game who they are."

Dixie averages 93.3 points a game, well behind CSI but still among the best in country, as rated by the NJCAA. The latest numbers show its defense is allowing just 77.4 points a game, again behind CSI but still in the top 15 nationally.

"Our strength is probably our quickness," Wagner said. "We have such good depth and quickness — a great combination."

The area that concerns Wagner

about tonight's 7:30 rematch is rebounding.

"If there is a main key, it's that we have to rebound real well," he said. "CSI is tough on the offensive boards. We'll have to keep them off — play really well there."

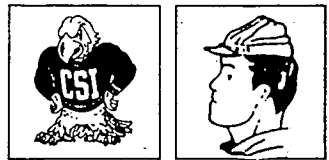
There's no secret as to whom the Rebels will be out to stop tonight.

"We're both such balanced clubs that I'm not sure there really are any key matchups," he said. "I think one of the main keys is (CSI sophomore forward Erick) Newman. He had a really great game down here. (Freshman forward Mauro) Gomes shoots well from the outside and (sophomore forward Joey) Johnson does everything well inside. Those are the critical people for us to defend."

Wagner is aware that win or lose tonight, he and his Rebels will be back in Twin Falls in two weeks for the postseason Region 18 tournament — and quite probably the third meeting of the season between Dixie and CSI.

"It's always tough to play a team on their home court, but at the same time it's a good time to prepare ourselves for regionals," he said. "The really crucial games will come in the tournament."

**WENDLELL** — Only the Filer Wildcats were able to upset the seedings on the first night of play in the District 4 Class A-3 boys' basketball tournament here Thursday.

The Wildcats, sixth-seeded going in, held off a fourth-quarter rally by number-three pick Wendell to edge the host Trojans 59-55. Thursday and move into a winner's bracket contest tonight against Kimberly.

The Bulldogs experienced no trouble downing Valley 94-42 in the evening finale.

Earlier, Glenns Ferry pulled steadily away to drop Declo into the loser's bracket. The 80-65 victory earns the Pilots the first crack at Canyon Conference championship and top-seeded Gooding in tonight's second round.

But Coon, Filer's 6-foot, 1-inch high post, canned 12 of his 18 points in the first half as the Wildcats took eight-point leads six times and several times threatened to blow the game wide open.

But Wendell, aided by a two-of-eight Filer performance at the foul line over the first half, pulled within two just under three minutes remaining in the half before allowing Filer to move the margin back to six at intermission.

Andy Swanson scored six straight Trojan points over the next two and one-half minutes, but Filer held sway 43-41 at the end of three periods on Coon's turnaround jumper.

The score was knotted twice more at 45 and 49. The final tie was fashioned by the second of Prince's three fourth-quarter three

## No 'death penalty' for SMU, says official

**NEW YORK (AP)** — Penalties proposed against Southern Methodist University's football program by the NCAA enforcement staff stop short of the first use of the maximum, two-year "death penalty" shutdown, the school's faculty representative said Thursday.

While the NCAA's infractions committee is not bound by the recommendation and still could impose the maximum penalty on its own, SMU professor Lonnale Kilever said the staff's proposal at a hearing last weekend was the same as the school's.

"We cooperated and were not adversarial," Kilever said. "We discussed and disclosed the infractions that put us at risk with the enforcement people. And we went into the hearing with the staff and the institution agreeing on conditions — and proposed penalties."

# BSU buries Griz 86-51 to set up Montana State showdown

**BOISE** — The University of Montana, whose basketball fans ride visiting teams with derision and rubber chickens onto midcourt, experienced the pants-and-rattled intruder Thursday at the Pavilion.

Boise State revved it up with a crusading denial defense and the hair-raising celebrations of 8,241 fans made the tedium of the Grizzlies, 86-51, in a Big Sky Conference game.

Boise State, winning its seventh-straight game, kept alive its hope of winning the Big Sky's regular season championship and the top seed in the conference's post-season tournament two weeks hence in Flagstaff, Arizona. The Broncos are 19-5 this season — their highest win total as a Division I team — and 8-3 in league play.

## Big Sky basketball

Montana, which came into the game as the Big Sky's second-place team, suffered one of its worst conference losses ever and fell to 18-8 overall and 8-4 in the Big Sky.

"I think we're building up a reputation as a place where you come in and the fans take you off of what you want to do," said Boise State center Jeff Kelley, who's four-years worth of road trips to Montana give him a measure of perspective in such matters. "The fans keep you going and they're a real detriment to the other team."

Defense is what won it for Boise State. What turned the game into a runaway was a combination of the crowd's undeniable influence and a persistent offense built around passes from the wings. Into the low post to set up quick spins and point blank shots.

"I think that's the best our club has played this year," said Boise State Coach Bobby Dye. "Very impressive."

Vince Devlin, sports editor of the Missoulan newspaper put it another way in a halftime aside.

"Boise looks awesome," said Devlin, who watched Montana cut

Boise State down 75-63 last month in Missoula.

The Broncos' defense yielded 23 Montana turnovers and thirty-four percent field goal shooting out of the Big Sky's most accurate team. The Grizzlies, among the Division I leaders with their 140 three-point baskets this season, were 0-11 against the Broncos.

Montana's leading scorer, flashing guard Scott Zanon, was barely effective. He scored only five points, 12 below his average.

Meanwhile, Boise State executed an offense-whose-patience-and-def-passing inside to forward Vernel Jones and reserve center Jeff Foster defeated Montana's match up zone defense. The Broncos hit sixty-five percent of their shots from the floor — 32-49.

Jones, at 6-6 almost half a head shorter than Montana's 6-9 Steve Banek and Wayne Tinkle, hit eight of 11 field goal attempts and scored 19 points. Foster, a 6-10 sophomore transfer, broke loose for a career-high 14 points on 6-9 shooting.


Forward Rodney Harris pulled down 15 rebounds as the Bengals im-

## Gilmore's uncle is writing own book

PROVO, Utah (AP) — A decade after his nephew, Gary Gilmore, faced death by a Utah firing squad, Vern Damico is writing a book that he says will reveal personal remembrances at odds with the public image of a condemned killer.

When shot to death by a five-member firing squad inside an old cannery building at Utah State Prison Jan. 17, 1977, Gilmore was the first man executed in the United States in 10 years. Since then, nearly 70 death row inmates have died.

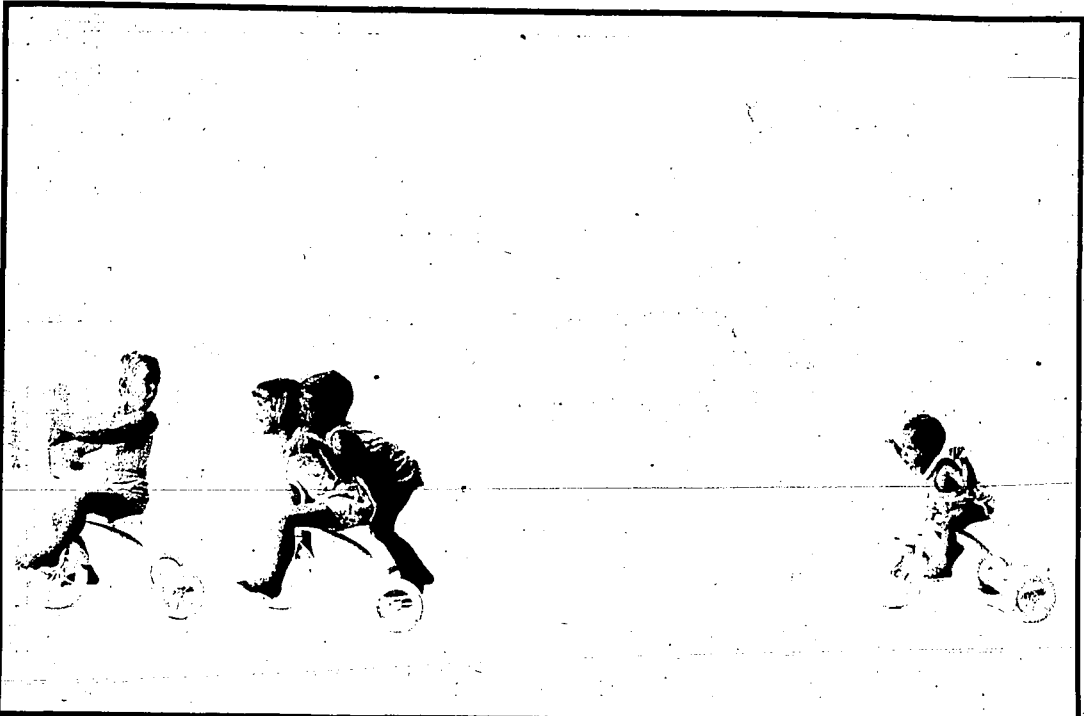
Damico said it's his goal to write "about Gary's home life. Gary got what he deserved but he was still a human being and deep down inside was a good man."

"He didn't have the advantages as a young man that many others did. He appreciated what I did for him," he said.

Gilmore's mother and Damico's sister, Bessie Gilmore, lived in Millwaukie, Ore. Poor health prevented her from coming to Utah, so Damico, along with Gary's two cousins, Brenda Nicol of Orem, and Tom Gurney of Lehi, were

## Randy Collier snaps up prize 4 years in row

BURLEY — Professional photographer Randy Collier says instinct plays a big role in how he shoots and composes pictures.

Since the 31-year-old Burley photographer just received the Idaho Professional Photographer of the Year Award for the fourth year in a row, he must be playing the right hunches.

"Take for example 'The Race,' a picture of his four children riding their tricycles, which won first place in the unclassified division and 'Best of Show,' the highest scoring print in the competition at the Professional Photographers of Idaho convention held recently in Twin Falls. Collier says he began with the idea of taking pictures of his five-year-old twins, Jennifer and David, riding the bike together.

The idea evolved, and he wound up taking shots of Michael, 3, and Emily, 2. Then he took three separate pictures, blended them together with just the right composition, and knew he had a good photo.

Most of the time he says he uses his instinct to decide upon the lighting, composition or whether or not to use color film. "You usually know it when you see it," he says.

Collier also won top honors with "Prima Donna," a portrait of Kristen Mal of Burley, in the women's portrait division; "School Daze," a portrait of Twin Falls students Marnie Watson and Rick Harder, in the group portrait division; and "Wednesday's Child," a

portrait of his daughter Jennifer, in the children's portrait division.

He was also won "Gallery" awards from the professional division of Eastman Kodak Company for "The Race" and "Wednesday's Child."

Collier will compete in the Rocky Mountain Professional Photography Contest, scheduled for next month in Denver, and the Intermountain Professional Photography Contest, to be held in Salt Lake City next May.

Collier, a 1974 graduate of Wood River High School, started his career during his senior year taking photos for the high school yearbook with his late grandfather's camera. The son of Lin and Dolly Collier of Bellevue, he took photographs for both the College of Southern Idaho and Boise State University school newspapers while he was attending college on a track scholarship.

He left BSU in his senior year to sell real estate in Boise for eight months. One day Dan Johnson, a

Twin Falls photographer, asked him "out of the blue" to go with him to a Professional Photographers of Idaho convention. The two had become acquainted when Collier, while attending CSI, had done some black and white film processing for Johnson during the evenings.

He says the invitation came at "just the right time" because he was tired of selling real estate and ready to go into professional photography.

He moved to Burley and apprenticed under Johnson for a year. While living there, he met and married Kathryn Slaughter, a concert violinist and daughter of Twin Falls music teacher Del Slaughter.

The Colliers moved to Burley and took over a studio they bought from Alan Wood. Collier says his wife has been an important part of the business, helping him with everything from re-touching film to supplying both ideas and names for his entries.

He says he loves all aspects of the photography business, from taking the pictures to doing promotions and sales. "The only time it ever feels like a real job is when I sit down to pay out the bills," he says.

Collier takes all types of pictures, but if he had to specialize he'd choose to photograph children from two to 10 years old. "I just love little kids, they're such a crack-up," he says. He says he also enjoys doing portraits of senior citizens and taking wedding photographs.

Both the photography business and the technology used in photography is changing, he says. Most professionals no longer use proofs to have customers examine their pictures, but instead project transparencies that enable customers to see exactly the potential size of each picture.

"Film today — it's phenomenal," he says. • See COLLIER on Page D2

## Polish pianist to give concert

TWIN FALLS — Sir Wladimir Jan Kochanski, a graduate of Juilliard School of Music in New York City, will appear in concert Monday at 7:30 p.m. at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium.

Kochanski has been featured as a guest on radio and television programs such as "Voice of America," "Good Morning America," "Hour Magazine," and "The 700 Club." He has released recordings on the Artists International label.

Kochanski has been described as critics as "one of the rarest phenomena in the world of classical

music," as well as "a pianist with a big technique, a warm emotion and a high-speed facility."

A press release notes that he often invites children in the audience to join him on stage and that he makes himself available to listeners after his concerts.

"Youths who usually beg their parents to go home at concert intermissions insisted on staying for the entire performance," writes a supporter in Daily Facts, a Redlands, Calif., publication.

A highlight of Kochanski's career

was his performance for Pope John Paul II at the dedication of the Polish Pilgrim's Home in Rome in 1981. In 1982, he was honored with the bestowal of Knighthood in the Order of Polonia Restituta by the president of the Polish Government in Exile, London, England. It is the highest honor which can be bestowed upon a Polish civilian.

# 'Love' movie romp finds Hepburn retaining enchanting character

"Love Among Thieves," airing 8 p.m. Monday on KIVI, can only be described as a piece of delightful tailoring to the highly individual charm of Audrey Hepburn. As in her films "Roman Holiday" (1953), "Charade" (1963) and even "Two for the Road" (1967), Hepburn plays a seemingly sophisticated, seemingly fragile European aristocrat who captivantly reveals that she is really a stylishly independent spirit — the girl you have to love, because she has pluck. Even in a TV movie, Hepburn proves she's still the character audiences know and love — even after all these years. And she's still pencil thin and as elegant as ever at age 57.

Hepburn herself describes "Love Among Thieves" as "a lark and a romp." Indeed, the TV movie is a surprisingly entertaining romantic thriller: Hepburn plays Caroline DuLac, a widowed baroness and a San Francisco concert pianist who heists three priceless Faberge eggs and sets out for a Mexican desert fortress to barter for the life of her kidnapped fiancé, Alan (played by Patrick Bauchau). The baroness finds her bete noire, a slovenly, cigar-chomping stranger named Mike Chambers (played by Robert Wagner), aboard a rickety Mexican prop plane. During takeoff, the Baroness asks the flight attendant when breakfast will be served. The bearded, paunchy Chambers pops open a can of Schlitz.

Chambers doesn't even have a chance to belch before it's evident that he and the baroness will tussle, chase and be chased by the bad guys — including a comical Jerry-Orbach and a band of absurdly stereotyped native thieves, somewhat akin to The Frito Banditos. And somewhere on the dusty and dangerous road to Mexico they will, of course, fall in love.

But what counts here aren't the plot twists (which are well scripted) but the chemistry and charm of the romantic leads.

Although Wagner does everything to demonstrate that Chambers is not the suave Jonathan Hart, and Hepburn's gamin charm takes a bit too long to emerge, the two eventually make a fine pair. That the characters' romance is marked by only one extremely chaste kiss, is not only sweet but believable, a

tribute to the considerable personalities of both actors.

Proving the producers of "Love Among Thieves" know the character (and age) of the Hepburn audience well, the movie is not over until we are given a glimpse of the star in a high fashion mode.

Throughout the '50s, Hepburn's name was synonymous with the designer Givenchy, and her haute couture costumes were highlights of all her movies. Poor Caroline might have traipsed all over Mexico in two shirtwaists, but it's the Baroness DuLac who appears at the climactic concert scene in a tulle and gown, returning Hepburn to her rightful elegance.

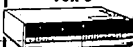

# 'Amerika' carries ABC to rare 2nd

NEW YORK — A strong opening-night performance by the miniseries "Amerika" gave ABC an unusual second place in the Nielsen ratings behind NBC last week.

NBC has won 18 of the 21 weeks in the season to date, averaging a prime-time rating of 17.9, according to A.C. Nielsen Co. figures. CBS, which has been first three weeks, has an average 16.0 and ABC, after only its second week out of third place, trails with 14.2.

"Amerika" appeared to be on its way to a strong performance when overnight, local ratings from the nation's 13 biggest cities gave it a 43 share of the audience after Sunday night. But when smaller cities and rural areas were figured into the numbers, the share dropped to 38.

In overnight locals from 11 cities after Monday's installment of the seven-night miniseries, "Amerika"

had dropped to a 32 share. "If it falls into under a 30 share, I think we would be disappointed," said Marvin Mord, ABC vice president for marketing—and-research services.

The rating for part one of "Amerika" was 24.7. It ranked seventh out of the 72 prime-time shows rated last week. But it was not ABC's highest-ranked show. "Moonlighting" had a rating of 25.9 and was ranked 5th.

The share is the percentage of the available audience that a program drew. The rating measures total households tuned in, with one rating point representing 1 percent of the nation's estimated 87.4 million households that have televisions.

NBC won the week ending Feb. 15 with an average prime-time rating of 18.3. ABC was second with 15.6 and CBS was third with 15.0.

NBC's regular lineup dominated the upper end of the rankings, as usual. "The Cosby Show" was first

with a rating of 38.2 and a 57 share, followed by "Family Ties" and "Cheers."

The top 10 shows last week were: "Cosby," "Family Ties," "Cheers," "Murder, She Wrote," "Moonlighting," "Night Court," "Amerika," "Growing Pains," "Two Mrs. Grenvilles" and "Golden Girls."

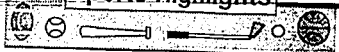

# Letterman muses on 'Late Night'

NEW YORK — David Letterman, on the verge of signing a new multi-million-dollar contract with NBC, is saying he's "lucky to have a job."

Oh, come on, Dave. Vanna White is lucky to have a job.

"A friend of mine was on the show tonight (Feb. 13), (comedian) Jeff Altman, and he brought a booking sheet from a club that I used to work at in Newport Beach, Calif., and it was my contract," Letterman says. "The deal was 12 shows for 300 bucks. I just started to howl. I just doubled over with laughter. Three hundred dollars for twelve shows!"

That's \$25 a show. Letterman won't say how much he makes now, but it's a safe bet it's something like 600 times as much.

"I am lucky to have a job," Letterman muses, mouthing his ubiquitous cigar. "Real lucky to have a job."

Letterman, who will turn 40 in April, has had this particular job for five years, and there has been no waning of audience interest in the only show-on-television that's been photographed by a camera atop an animal's head.

Thanks to the off-the-wall young writing staff and Letterman's own "I'll-get-to-the-bottom-of-this" style, the show has remained fresh and funny while turning Stupid Pet Tricks into a TV institution.

NBC notes that the ratings for "Late Night" are higher than ever. (The fifth anniversary "Late Night with David Letterman" show Feb. 7 set a ratings record for late-night specials with an 11.1. Each rating point stands for 874,000 homes equipped with television. Letterman's percentage of the viewing audience was 32. The previous record-holder was a January "Main Event" wrestling show in the "SNL" time period. It got a 10.9 rating.) But the show still comes on after most Americans have gone to bed, and on a good night it draws about two-thirds as many viewers as the worst-rated prime-time program.

That seems just fine with Letterman, sitting in his comfy office at NBC exuding normalcy despite a couple dozen ballpoint pens sticking into the ceiling above his desk.

"What you find out after working five years in this little outpost of television, the fringes, it's OK as long as you and your friends and people you trust can control everything," he says.

"It's like a mom and pop store. But you get into prime time, boy. I think the budget for the Emmys

show (of which he was host last year) was \$3½ million. You gotta have lasers and smoke and big turntables and golden set pieces.

"We can do anything we want here, pretty much anything we want to do."

Letterman considers "Late Night" a talk show and speaks of it in the context of "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson." But "Late Night" is totally committed to getting laughs. Carson has his occasional but-seriously-folks moments. The most serious thing Letterman has ever said is to not try this at home.

Besides, Carson without guests? What's left? Ed McMahon and the Mighty Carson Art Players?

Letterman, on the other hand, without celebrities would be like Joan Rivers without a megaphone.

Celebrity guests are something of

an "irritation" to Letterman, who can't necessarily count on the usual interlopers to fit into the show.

"I just don't understand why someone would come on television, given an opportunity of eight for 10 minutes on a network, and not be prepared and as energetic and as enthusiastic and as funny as he or she could humanly be," he says. "We're trying to do a show here. It's not a job interview. It's not a psychological profile; we're not trying to hire a research assistant; we're looking for somebody to make somebody laugh."

"People always accuse me of being mean to people. But the truth of the matter is, I'm just trying to get a laugh where there may be a laugh to be gotten. Sometimes people think that it's at the expense of the guest. And I guess, actually, sometimes it is. But that's not the way it's planned. We're not shootin' ducks in a barrel here."

Letterman says he is basically happy with the show as it embarks on its sixth year, but would like to take it on the road more often, maybe to Chicago, Houston, Indianapolis or San Francisco.

He took "Late Night" to Los Angeles for a week once, but says he doesn't want to move it there even though that's where he would prefer to live. "Late Night" is taped at the NBC studio in Manhattan. Letterman lives in Connecticut.

"Everyone likes living in California," he says. "You can't like living in California. My problem with working in Los Angeles, whenever I get back there on vacation — I still own a home there — it's like a 24-hour edition of 'Entertainment Tonight.' You just can't escape show business."

"I like that when you leave the building here, you don't run into actors and producers, you run into people who are plumbers and who work in the diamond district. I get out as soon as I can in my bullet-proof car."

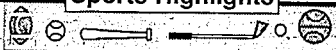

## FCC set to lift call letters curbs

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Mississippi River could dry up as the boundary line used to assign call letters to television and radio stations. The Federal Communications Commission is proposing to erase the geographical restriction that, since the early days of radio, has assigned stations east of the river a series of letters, or call signs, that start with a "W." West of the river, call signs start with a "K."

"It's going to be dramatic," because it will expand the options available to broadcasters in choosing call signs, James C. McKinney, chief of the FCC's mass media bureau, said in a recent interview. But the National Association of Broadcasters said there's nothing wrong with the current system and a change will only confuse the listening public.

Station call signs still would have to start with a "W" or "K," the letters assigned to the United States by international treaty, and the rule barring more than one station in the same broadcast service from having the same call letters would remain.

"It opens up a whole new line of promotions — like saying you're station is the first 'W' in Utah," McKinney said. "It offers more possibilities. If they want to use it for marketing purposes, and we can accommodate that, there's no reason we should turn it down."

About a dozen stations don't conform to the Mississippi River rule, most of which were assigned call signs before the regulation was established or are located close to the river.

Jeff Baumann, general counsel of the National Association of Broadcasters, said the FCC is wasting its time trying to fix a system that's not broken.

"I think the whole thing is ill-conceived. As far as broadcasters are concerned, we've never seen a problem with it," Baumann said.

"It looks like more deregulation for deregulation's sake," he said.

The change was initiated by the FCC along with a proposal to allow the same call sign to be used by stations in different broadcast services — AM, FM and television — where the stations are not commonly owned.

Under current rules, an AM station, an FM station and a TV station can have the same basic call letters only if they are under the same ownership.



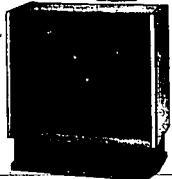

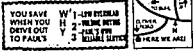

# Upstart MTV faces growing pains

The image is brief, hit and run. A hot beat, part reggae, part electronic hip-hop, part Rolling Stones, drives home a simple, promotional message that says: "MTV - we'd rather be sorry than safe."

That's quite a turnaround from the last few years, when success appeared to have lulled the 24-hour music video cable channel into complacent, premature middle age. Now 5 years old, MTV is going through a period of transition.

The three top executives who made MTV one of the most powerful forces for the promotion of rock music - including MTV's founder, former president and CEO Bob Pittman - have left the company.

Some of the first wave of video jocks have left, including J.J. Jackson, Nina Blackwood and the perky Martha Quinn, whose contract - MTV says by mutual consent - was not renewed at the end of 1986.

The new executive team, led by Tom Freston, president of MTV Net, has cut back on the number of videos it airs, from about 110 to a little more than 70. In an attempt to get back to the rock 'n' roll cutting edge that defined its earliest years, it's gotten rid of the mainstream pop acts such as Lionel Richie and Whitney Houston that made MTV seem like a top 40 radio station with pictures.

By re-establishing its rock 'n' roll focus, playing more new acts in more frequent rotation, MTV, seen in 40 percent of the country, hopes to regain the influence that once made it the most potent force in rock-music marketing.

That despite some signs that are not encouraging, including faltering ratings, and a belief among some Wall Street analysts that MTV has reached a non-growth period; that is, every teen-ager and young adult who is interested in the medium has already tuned in and additional audience growth is unlikely.

"There is nowhere else for them to go in terms of attracting a new viable audience," said Hal Vogel, a media analyst at Merrill Lynch & Co. Inc. "Either you like rock videos, or you don't."

MTV succeeds in attracting 12 to 34 year olds, usually an elusive group for advertisers. It is this ability that Madison Avenue embraces, according to John Sisk, senior vice president at J. Walter Thompson.

"MTV was a phenomenon," said Paul Isaacson, executive vice president at Young & Rubicam. "Now it's a mature media choice for advertisers."

When MTV went on the air in 1981,

it immediately proved it could create new stars. Artists such as Duran Duran, Culture Club, Cyndi Lauper and Madonna all benefitted from their ability to project their images and music directly into millions of households. Established artists from ZZ Top to Van Halen to Michael Jackson also used MTV to geometrically expand their audiences.

The result: a virtual obsession with videos as a marketing device and MTV as the vehicle. "It was wonderful for a filmmaker for a while," said Ken Walz, whose Manhattan company Ken Walz Productions has produced more than 100 music videos. "Then the record companies finally awakened to the fact that while music videos were beneficial, it wasn't financially feasible to give every album two or three videos. They were churning out videos with careless abandon."

Just how overboard did record companies get? "Some companies

perceived as not living up to its creative potential over the last year or so. "What happened is everybody started doing it," said MTV's Tom McGrath. Other cable channels and even the networks began to run music-video programs such as USA cable's "Night Flight," WABC-TV's "Hot Tracks," and NBC's "Friday Night Videos."

"Every commercial, every movie every soundtrack, even magazine layouts changed as a reflection of video music," McGrath said. "I think if anything, it diluted what we did. But that said a lot about our influence. The fact that you saw it everywhere probably made it less special."

MTV is fighting that dilution in two ways. They are attempting more original programs, such as "Andy Warhol's Fifteen Minutes," which features monthly profiles of celebrities; "The Young Ones," a BBC comedy series; and "Rock Influences," which offers historical perspective.

The other, which is McGrath's balliwick, is in the area of incidental material between videos, which are intended to give the channel a more hip, more original look. There are "art breaks," brief mini-features - sort of like commercials for products that don't exist - created by people such as "She's Gotta Have It" film director Spike Lee, sculptor Jonathan Borofsky, and artist Jean-Michel Basquiat.

McGrath has also created spots featuring young comics such as Gilbert Gottfried as a demoted MTV executive. There's a series of house ads that use elderly people - some actors, some actual residents of old-age homes - who remember their early years spent watching MTV in the 20th century. (One recalled how Madonna's talent for videos helped her considerably when she became president of the United States.)

The self-deprecating tidbits are a welcome relief from the self-aggrandizing MTV style of the last few years, which reached its pinnacle of pomposity during the station's coverage of the "Live-Aid" African famine benefits in 1985 in Philadelphia and London. The marathon coverage was marred by the relentless egomania of the video jocks that gave one the sense that the millions of starving people in Africa were the focus of just one more ubiquitous MTV promotional contest.

"I'm gonna die for that sin for 25 years," Tom Freston said, laughing. "Yeah, that was a mistake. It didn't mean to happen like it did. We got killed by the press."

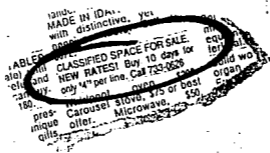
were doing things that were astonishingly stupid, with budgets going to a quarter million dollars for a video or more, and you look at the results and they were not any good," said Len Epan, senior vice president for music video at Polygram Records. "There was a period of time of video craziness. In 1986, the pendulum swung the other way, and said we're not gonna do a video with 50 and so until radio proves it to us. It's swung to a middle ground that's more sensible."

Record companies cut back on both the number of videos they made and on the budgets.

To make music videos work more efficiently as promotion, record companies have been emphasizing performance videos. "There's growing conservatism not just in the business end, but also this pulling back creatively," said Ken Walz, whose company has largely moved out of the music-video business and into other forms of TV and film. "I kept hearing this word 'performance' over and over."

The recent plethora of performance videos is only one of the reasons music video has been
