## Report rebukes Reagan for lack of control



Chairman John Tower hands President Reagan report

WASHINGTON — The Tower commission Thursday rebuked President Reagan for failing to control his national security staff in a tough and detailed report that said the president's decision to sell arms to Iran "rewarded terrorism and hostage-taking."

The president's concept of his arms-to-Iran policy "was not accurately reflected in the reality" of the operation, the report said. Its principal author described Reagan as "a little too aloof from the implementation of policy."

The three-member panel, chosen by Reagan himself, provided sharp and sometimes detailed criticism of key aides, including chief of staff Donald Regan, former CIA Director William J. Casey, former National

Security Adviser John Poindexter and National Security Council staffer Oliver North, who was fired last November.

Regan, expected to resign within days, bears "primary responsibility for the chaos that descended upon the White House" after the affair was disclosed, and Poindexter "failed grievously" by not telling the president about the diversion of arms money to Nicaraguan rebels, the report said.

The board estimated that Iran overpaid \$3 million for arms in 1985 and nearly \$20 million in 1986, and said, "Sizeable sums of money generated by the arms sales to Iran remain unaccounted for."

The panel said Israel played a ma-

for role in keeping the Iranian initiative going because it wanted to promote its arms export industry, strengthen Iran against Israel's adversary, Iraq, and establish Israel as the on-site strategic partner of the United States in the Middle East.

"With such a complex, high-risk operation, and so much at stake" in the Iran dealings, "the president should have ensured that the NSC system did not fail him. He did not force his policy to undergo the most critical review of which the NSC participants and the process was capable. At no time did he insist on accountability or performance review."

"The president made mistakes," said former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, the chairman of the special review board that spent three months investigating the secret sale of

weapons to Iran and the diversion of profits to the Contra rebels.

On Capitol Hill, lawmakers said the report provided evidence of the weakness of Reagan's management style, and Tower, responding to a question at a news conference, said, "You can say this president holds himself a little too aloof from the implementation of policy."

Reagan was "poorly advised and poorly served" by many of his aides, Tower added.

There were new demands for a White House shakeup.

"The moving van should come in the White House; changes are needed in personnel," said Rep. Jim Courter, R-N.J.

Sen. Patrick Leahy, D-Vt., predicted Reagan would quit soon, but added, "I would hope nobody assumes that just clears the white

### Staff chief draws rap for chaos

WASHINGTON — President Reagan's Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan — reportedly on his way out — bears "primary responsibility for the chaos that descended upon the White House" following disclosure of the secret sale of arms to Iran, the Tower board reported Thursday.

Regan, once touted as so powerful that he was the president's "prime minister," was sharply criticized by the board for not using his power to question the activities of the National Security Council regarding the sale of arms to Iran.

The president, said to be planning a weekend White House conclave on a staff shake-up, refused Thursday to answer questions on whether he has asked his chief of staff to step down in light of the board's criticisms.

Nor would the board pass judgment on Regan's future as the president's top aide. "That's up to the president," board member Edmund Muskie said.

In its report, the board stated that Regan, along with other NSC officials, failed to bring the activities of the NSC to the president's attention and raised no questions about possible wrongdoing.

"Mr. Regan shares in this responsibility," the board stated in its inch-thick report. "More than almost any chief of staff of recent memory, he asserted personal control over

### Findings THE TOWER COMMISSION REPORT

**"The President made mistakes."**

**A "disengaged" President**  
President Reagan "did not seem to be aware" of how policy was implemented or what the consequences were and "made mistakes." Control was too informal and key advisers including Chief of Staff Donald Regan and former National Security Director John Poindexter were lax.

**Trading arms for hostages**  
The primary motivation for the arms sales was the trading of hostages, and not developing a rapport with moderates in Iran as the White House has maintained. Trading arms for hostages was counterproductive.

**Authorizing arms shipments to Iran**  
The president probably did approve the arms shipments prior to the first shipment on August 30, 1985; his recollection of not approving the shipments until later is probably faulty.

**Was there a White House cover-up?**  
No effort by President Reagan to cover up what happened was found, but Poindexter, Lt. Col. Oliver North and others concealed vital information from other Administration officials and Congress and were obsessed with secrecy.

**Diversion of arms-sales funds**  
Poindexter and, later, CIA Director William Casey knew about North's siphoning of arms profits to aid the Nicaraguan Contra rebels and did not tell the president; Regan probably didn't know until Attorney General Edwin Meese discovered the diversion in late November, 1986.

**Covert operations run from the White House**  
The NSC-run Iran arms operation was unprofessional and suffered from lack of supervision by knowledgeable officials; both Reagan and Regan failed to insist on proper procedures and orderly conduct of policy; proper records apparently were not kept.

### Setting policy first step in showing leadership

WASHINGTON — The Tower Commission had harsh words Thursday for all the key officials involved in the Iran-Contra affair, and the panel's report did not spare the individual who stood above them all, President Reagan.

A damning section, entitled "Failure of Responsibility," opened by focusing on the man who had the ultimate responsibility for the actions of the National Security Council.

"You can say this president holds himself a little too aloof from the implementation of policy," the commission's chairman, former Republican Sen. John Tower of Texas, told a news conference.

His description seemed to sum up much of what the commission fell was wrong with the council's operation. Repeatedly, the report returned to that theme.

"The NSC system will not work unless the president makes it work," it said.

"By his actions, by his leadership, the president bears the greatest responsibility of its performance," the report added.

When it came to recommending reforms in the system, the commission made it clear that the president, the nation's chief executive, is the key. His responsibility does not end with setting policy. He also must demand from his aides an accounting of how that policy is implemented.

"His task is to provide them leadership and direction," said the report. It was clear that leadership and direction in the matter of the Iran-Contra affair was left to others.

As expected, White House staff chief Donald Regan, who is expected to resign shortly, was singled out for particularly harsh criticism.

"He must bear primary responsibility for

the chaos that descended upon the White House" when the operation was disclosed.

Vice Adm. John Poindexter who served as Reagan's national security adviser during much of the period of secret arms sales to Iran and diversion of funds to the Contras forces in Central America was criticized for misleading Secretary of State George Shultz and for his failure to understand "the serious legal and political risks" presented by the Contra diversion.

Shultz and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger did not escape unscathed.

While both disapproved of the secret policy, the panel declared that rather than make their dissent clear to Reagan "they simply distanced themselves from the program

and on it went.

Former CIA Director William Casey failed to explain to the president the risks of the operation being conducted by Marine Lt. Col. Oliver L. North. The commission also found no evidence Casey was bothered by the fact a lieutenant colonel on the National Security Council staff was running an operation more properly handled by the CIA.

The president introduced the three members of the board — Tower, former Secretary of State Edmund Muskie and Gen. Brent Scowcroft, who served as national security adviser to President Gerald R. Ford. But he refused to answer any questions about the report.

The board praised Regan for his determination to have the whole story told, but criticized his aides for what Tower called "a deliberate effort to mislead."

### Twin Falls special ed teacher resigns

TWIN FALLS — Twin Falls High School special education teacher Robert Moreland, convicted last year of selling fake drugs, resigned Thursday following publicity of the conviction.

A joint press release issued by Moreland and the district said the 38-year-old teacher resigned "out of respect for the teaching profession and his Twin Falls special education students."

"We've agreed that when he resigned this would be his statement, and our statement, and we're not going to comment further," said Superintendent Carl Snow.

Moreland could not be reached for comment, but his wife Patsy said Wednesday he didn't want to comment about the case.

Sen. Larry Anderson, R-Twin Falls, who publicized the arrest and called for the district to fire Moreland, said he was satisfied with the result.

"I think the parties involved and the teacher have done the right thing by the School District and children," Anderson said.

Moreland was convicted of a misdemeanor — delivery of a simulated controlled substance. He sold a brown powder which simulated methamphetamine to an undercover Bureau of Narcotics officer in American Falls last February, according to court records.

After being arrested at the High School in June, Moreland was sentenced last September to a year's probation and ordered to pay \$1,015 in fine and costs.

He is also scheduled to serve 10 days in jail this June.

The state Board of Education's Professional Standards Commission issued Moreland a formal reprimand Dec. 29 after investigating the case. Certification Supervisor Darrell Loosie said Moreland's certificate was not revoked or suspended because it was only a misdemeanor conviction and the district didn't request decertification.

Snow said Wednesday that the School Board wasn't notified of Moreland's reprimand because, without decertification, "there was really nothing for them to do."

Anderson said he still plans to introduce legislation preventing people with misdemeanor or felony convictions to be issued teaching certificates. He said the incident shows the need for a "material violation" of change its policy so that districts can act decisively when a person is convicted of a felony or misdemeanor.

But Loosie said school boards are already empowered to fire teachers who are not decertified.

Sen. Laird Noe, R-Kimberly, said that if a district has rules and regulations, there should be no problem in moving to dismiss a teacher. The question then becomes whether a misdemeanor conviction constitutes a "material violation" of those rules and regulations, he added.

### Idaho staging ground for convention skirmish

BOISE — A minor civil war is being fought among conservatives over whether a constitutional convention is necessary, and Idaho is the staging ground.

Magie Valley lawmakers are receiving pleas to rescind a resolution calling on Congress to either submit a balanced budget amendment to the states for ratification, or call a constitutional convention.

To hold a constitutional convention, two-thirds — or 34 — states must pass a resolution. Idaho is one of 32 states seeking a convention, and Montana's legislature is considering a similar resolution this year.

Idaho's resolution has been on the books since 1970 when U.S. Rep. Larry Craig, then a state legislator, promoted it.

Now Craig, R-Idaho, is having to defend the fort against a conservative onslaught from the likes of Phyllis Schlafly and the John Birch Society.

Schlafly's Eagle Forum and the Birch Society are calling a constitutional convention a terrible, terrible mistake.

"I hope Idaho does rescind the resolution," said Schlafly from her home in Illinois on Thursday. "A constitutional convention would be a disaster."

Although conservatives originally promoted the idea, some people realized that if a convention

reently occurred, anyone could attend — even liberals.

The fear now is that a runaway convention could rewrite the entire Constitution, or add enough amendments to change its intent.

The issue has stirred enough heat to cause Craig and Idaho's two Republican senators, James McClure and Steve Symms, to try and douse the flames.

In a Feb. 19 letter to Idaho Republican lawmakers to calm fears and urge Idaho to keep the call for a convention, they admit they don't want it either.

"The chance of a convention taking place, even if the required two-thirds of the states call for it, is nil," said the letter signed by McClure, Symms

### Tort reform package clears Idaho House

BOISE — A big package of changes in the Idaho legal system, supported by the largest coalition ever put together in the state to back legislation, cleared the Idaho House on Thursday by a 65-19 vote.

But it faces an uncertain future in the Senate. During more than two hours of House debate, opponents argued that House sponsors were pushing flawed legislation, knowing it had no chance to clear the Senate.

House opposition came mainly from trial lawyers. The Senate's chief officer, President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, is a trial lawyer. Earlier in the day, Risch told an Idaho Falls group, "We are waiting for it with open jaws."

Although the vote for final passage was lopsided, the measure nearly died earlier. In a battle over an amendment, which sponsors said probably would kill the measure for the session, the key vote was 43-39 against amending.

The bill contains seven changes in court and damage procedures. Sponsors said they were designed to curb soaring personal injury damage awards and, thus make

liability insurance more available and cheaper.

A coalition of nearly 150 agencies, organizations and companies backed the bill. Its chief lobbyist, Boise lawyer Ken McClure, denied that the measure was destined to die in the Senate.

"I don't think that the Senate necessarily will kill it. I think they are open-minded enough to take a look at what gets there," he said.

"If we thought that bill could not be passed by the Senate, why bother going through all the time we have spent on this in the House?" he said.

"We didn't work just to get it through the House. We want to get it through the Senate, too," he said.

McClure said the legislation probably will be assigned to the Senate Judiciary Committee, headed by Sen. Roger Fairchild, R-Fruitland.

Rep. Pam Bengson, R-Boise, argued there are "demands by our citizens to take action on the crippling liability insurance crisis."

The White House staff and sought to extend this control to the national security adviser.

Regan, who became chief of staff in early 1985, was specially appointed by the president as a member of the NSC. He was "personally active" in national security matters and attended "almost all" of the relevant meetings regarding the Iran Initiative, he said. "He, as much as anyone, should have insisted that an orderly process be observed," said the board in a chapter entitled, "Failure of Responsibility."

But the report also said Regan was cut out of the initiative to gain private funding for arms for the rebels in Nicaragua. It quoted one message sent by former NSC advisor John Poindexter to Oliver North on the private funding. "Don Regan knows a little about the operation and that is just as well," North was fired and Poindexter resigned when it was made public that profits from the Iran arms sales were diverted to the Contras.

Regan's office said he had no plans to comment on the report, which also said he criticized Regan for failing to prepare for the possibility that the secret scheme might come to light.

"He should have ensured that

plans were made for handling any public disclosure of the initiative," the report said. "He must bear primary responsibility for the chaos that descended upon the White House when such disclosure did occur."

The board's report includes testimony from Regan that he was present when former NSC advisor Robert McFarlane first discussed opening a dialogue with Iran at Bethesda Naval Medical Center on July 13, 1985, a few days after colon surgery.

"Mr. Regan told the board that the matter was discussed for 20 to 25 minutes, with the president asking quite a few questions. He recalled the president say, 'Yes, go ahead. Open it up,'" the report said. But the three-member panel said the president had "no recollection" of such a meeting.

The report also noted Regan's role in the president's conflicting testimony to the board about his decision to approve Israel's sale of arms to Iran in August 1985, a crucial point in determining whether the U.S. government sanctioned the policy.

The board noted that McFarlane had testified before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee that the president had approved the arms sale in advance and that "his por-

tion of Mr. McFarlane's testimony was highlighted on the copy given by the president to the board."

But the report said that in his second meeting with the board, "the president said that he and Mr. Regan had gone over the matter a number of times and that Mr. Regan had a firm recollection that the president had not authorized the August shipment in advance."

But Regan sent a letter to the committee on Feb. 20, saying, "I'm afraid I let myself be influenced in others' recollections, not my own," Regan wrote.

and Craig. "Congress simply won't let it happen."

But the three congressmen ask Idaho lawmakers to "reject the attempt to take away our most effective tool — your call for a limited convention."

Craig and others say the only way to force Congress to act on the balanced budget amendment is to hold the threat of a worse alternative over their heads — a constitutional convention.

"Congress would avert a convention by presenting the amendment to the states itself," the letter said. "It will do this, if the required 34 states call on it to do so."

Schaffly called that argument absurd.

"I think people were misled in calling for a con-con when others knew it wouldn't happen," she said. "I do not believe a convention could be limited to one purpose. There's no guarantee either way, and it's not worth the risk."

John Barclay, a spokesman for Craig, said that, in theory, a convention could be a risk; but in reality, "There's no way it will ever happen."

Barclay said an attempt is being made to make it look like a Mormon issue and that Mormons want to change the Constitution.

The National Center for Constitutional Studies, founded by Utah

State Rep. Jerry Callen, R-Regina, disagrees.

"I'm against rescinding the resolution," he said on Thursday. "I think we've got to take that chance."

Callen said he believes Congress will act before a convention is ever called.

"I disagree with Phyllis (Schaffly) on this one, even though she's one of my heroes," he said. "I think Skousen is a constitutional expert, and he's said it could be limited."

Callen, who introduced a House memorial supporting the Strategic Defense Initiative, believes state legislatures are effective voices in forcing Congress to act. And when Callen introduced the SDI memorial, he handed out a report from Schaffly backing the Reagan administration's space-based defense plan.

But Schaffly on Thursday pooh-poohed any notion that state legislatures have an impact on Congress.

"That somebody in a state legislature, voting in Boise, can make Congress do what it doesn't want to do is absolutely ridiculous," Schaffly said. "People in Congress don't give a darn what they're doing in Boise."

But somebody must care what state legislators are doing in Boise, because Callen admitted he was feeling a little heat on the issue. Everytime Idaho Birch Society coordinator Don Follenheim speaks around the state, Callen said, he receives 25 more letters asking him to vote to rescind the SDI.

A resolution to rescind has been drawn up and is waiting in the wings for its debut.

But its sponsor, state Rep. Ed Brown, R-Pocatello, who happens to be Mormon, said he is not sure he will introduce it.

"There's no need to drum it out if we don't have the support," he said. "People are divided on it."

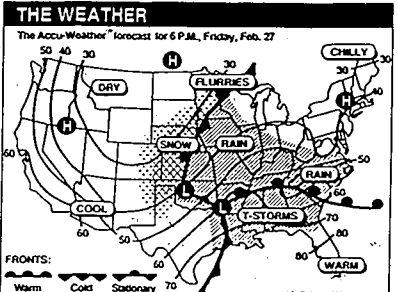

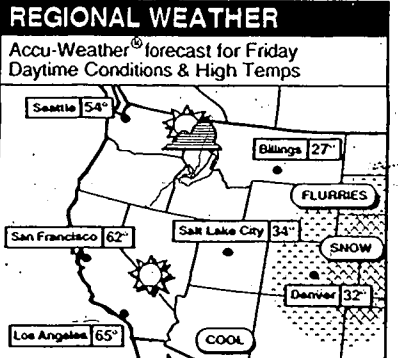

Col. Robert Dutton, an employee of Stanford Technology, a company run by former Air Force Gen. Richard V. Secord, who has been reported to have aided North in the arms sales efforts, and Edward De Garay, the chief executive officer of Corporate Air Services.

# Lewis, Laxalt out of running for Regan job

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan, searching for a successor for embattled White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan, was unable to get two of his closest associates, Drew Lewis and Paul Laxalt, to take the post, it was revealed Thursday night.

Both Lewis and Laxalt took themselves out of the running for the job late Thursday as speculation grew that Regan's departure was imminent.

An administration source, who declined to be identified, told The Associated Press that in recent days Lewis and Laxalt had been contacted by Regan's transportation secretary, who drew his name from consideration when the job was proffered.

A Lewis spokesman, Harvey Turner, said in a telephone interview from New York that he would have no comment on the report.

A Laxalt aide, Tom Loranger, confirmed to the AP that the former Nevada senator had also ruled out a White House post. He released a statement in which Laxalt acknowledged he spoke with the president Thursday about the job.

"I met with the president today to tell him that I did not feel it would be appropriate to accept a position in the White House," Laxalt said.

Meanwhile, some senior Republicans in Congress were summoned to a meeting with Regan at the White House on Friday morning. They were given no indication of the topic of the meeting, congressional sources said.

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan said he agreed last Oct. 3 to inscribe a Bible for an Iranian interested in weapons to show the man he was getting through, "The Tower commission report said Thursday.

The Bible was presented to the man, described as a relative of a powerful Iranian official, at a meeting he had in Frankfurt, Germany with Lt. Col. Oliver L. North, retired Maj. Gen. Richard V. Secord and Gen. Cavé, a former CIA official, between Oct. 27, 1986, the report said.

North, Secord and Cavé met with the unnamed Iranian to discuss the sale of military equipment to Tehran, along with a secret U.S.-Iranian agreement to work on future relations between the two countries.

# Senators coalesce on school spending



BOISE (AP) — The Senate Education Committee on Thursday coalesced around a public school spending recommendation substantially higher than Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus proposed as legislative budget writers began acting on 1988 agency spending financed mainly by general tax receipts.



Although not formally adopted, the recommendation the committee moved toward totaled nearly \$346 million with an additional \$21 million to handle a one-time increase in school district Social Security obligations.

"That's the first time I've seen this committee come together so well on one figure," Sen. Lynn Tominga, R-Rupert, said. "In years past, we've either been way too low or way too high."

The only disagreement among Democratic and Republican members on the panel is how the recommended spending level should be allocated among programs and priorities. The committee's position has in some past years helped squeeze additional pennies into education budgets.

Andrus called for a \$342.2 million state allocation for public schools, up 13 percent from this year, and

\$39.5 million allotment to higher education, some 10 percent over the year. No consensus has been reached in the Senate committee, but Chairman Terry Sverdrup, R-Cataldo, suggested the higher education recommendation could exceed \$100 million.

"The tendency of this committee is to be responsible, and the Senate tends to average down, not average up," Sverdrup said.

But while Sverdrup said the panel is committed to those spending levels, they will not fit into the overall legislative GOP leadership budget strategy of keeping overall spending about \$10 million to \$12 million below the governor's \$662.2 million plan to avoid a major tax hike while still matching him on education allocations.

If no other accommodation can be arranged, Sverdrup said he and

other GOP senators stood ready to reassess their opposition to some proposed tax increases, including the governor's repeal of the investment tax credit.

That repealer was rejected overwhelmingly by a House committee earlier this month, and Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, who has played a major role in engineering the Republican budget scheme, has said it would never pass the Senate this session.

Without the \$14.5 million that bill would raise, the GOP leadership's budget plan requires tight controls on all spending to meet the \$650 million goal and still stay close to Andrus on public and higher education spending.

Two key bills in underwriting that plan could come to a final legislative vote today, Senate Republican Floor Leader Dick Riels of Rexburg said attempts would be made to complete action on the 4 percent pay raise plan for state workers and the permanent 5 percent sales tax. Both measures easily cleared the House earlier this month.

The two bills cleared Senate committee on Wednesday. The pay raise plan, criticized by Democrats and state workers because it runs

substantially below the 5 percent plan Andrus proposed, was scaled back by the GOP to free up \$4 million in precious general tax receipts that can be diverted to other programs like education.

But the proposed pay hike, still too high by some Senate Republican standards, would not take effect until late September, almost three months after Andrus recommended it take effect, and it will be distributed so that an estimated 1,500 state workers would continue to see their pay frozen.

The permanent increase in the penny sales tax has been counted on by both the governor and lawmakers to make any budget plan work. It will pump nearly \$48 million into the treasury for allocation in the new budget.

Approved a year ago as an emergency measure to bail the state out of a sea of red ink, the extra penny was scheduled to expire at the end of June.

Passage of those two measures will open the way for stepped up action by the Joint Finance-Appropriations Committee, which has been spending the past several days tinkering only with state agency budgets financed with federal or specially earmarked state money.

On Thursday, the budget committee began working on general revenue budgets but only those of the elected state officials which command only a minute fraction of the general revenue account.

## Neibaur blocks effort to scuttle bill

BOISE (AP) — The House leadership tried to use a shortcut on Thursday to get rid of a tax bill. But a member scolded the effort so sharply that it was reversed a few minutes later.

The House is considering a bill that would remove property tax limits imposed because of the 1978 One Percent Initiative. It cleared the Revenue and Taxation Committee by a single vote earlier in the week, and could be up for a final House vote on Friday.

A lobbyist warned the measure could allow local property taxes to go up \$95 million statewide.

During routine business, Rep. Jerry Deckard, R-Eagle, stood up and made a sudden request that House Bill 139 be held indefinitely.

That could prevent a final vote.

After allowing only a second or two for members to voice objections to the request, House Speaker Tom Boyd granted it. Rep. Robert Fry, R-Horseshoe Bend, tried to object, but Boyd wouldn't allow it.

"That's a railroad job," objected Rep. Mack Neibaur, R-Paul, and walked off the floor.

A few minutes later, Neibaur warned House members again it was a bad idea.

"Although it's allowed by the rules, we should guard against this," said Neibaur. "It was inappropriate because of the improper length of time here."

Neibaur said he might not support the tax bill, but "it should not be shot down that fast."

He suggested to fellow Republicans "Let's discuss it in caucus," and not on the floor.

Deckard met Neibaur in the hallway outside the chambers a few minutes later, and then later asked the House to reverse the action.

There was no objection and the bill was restored to the House agenda.

## Concerns remain over Moreland case

Although we agree with the outcome, we still have some concerns over the handling by the Twin Falls School District administration this week of the case of a Twin Falls High School teacher convicted of selling an imitation drug.

The teacher, Robert Moreland, was arrested at Twin Falls High School last June 11 and charged with selling to an undercover state Bureau of Narcotics officer on Feb. 24 in American Falls a powdery substance resembling an illegal drug. After plea-bargaining, Moreland pleaded guilty to a misdemeanor charge of "delivery of a simulated controlled substance." He was fined and sentenced on Sept. 22 to a year's probation.

Moreland's wife had been arrested on an unrelated drug charge in Idaho Falls last March and pleaded guilty to a charge of "delivery of methamphetamine." She was fined on June 10 — the day before Moreland was arrested — and sentenced to 5 years probation. The illegal drug she sold resembles the bogus drug Moreland was arrested for selling.

The matter did not become public until late last week, when state Sen. Larry Anderson sent to the news media a column he had written in which vague details of the episode were mentioned. Some of the details were actually wrong, but The Times-News began checking out Anderson's allegations.

Finally, by Monday, our story was ready. It was published Tuesday.

It appeared for a time this week that the School District was going to take no action beyond what had been done at the state level.

The district had notified the state Board of Education's Professional Standards Commission, which investigates complaints against teachers, principals and administrators.

The PSC has the authority to either issue a complaint or request a hearing and move to revoke or suspend a teacher's license. That action would be taken by the state Board of Education.

On Dec. 29 the PSC decided Moreland's case did not warrant a formal hearing, but a formal reprimand was issued, which goes into Moreland's personnel file.

A PSC official explained that because no one from the Twin Falls School District pressed for any stronger action and because the conviction was a misdemeanor, it was felt that the reprimand was adequate.

Until Thursday, there was no indication that the Twin Falls School District contemplated any further disciplinary action. Moreland was allowed to continue teaching for nearly 2 months after the PSC reprimand. A number of persons, including Sen. Anderson, were justifiably disturbed by the apparent lack of action locally.

Then, yesterday, the School District issued a brief announcement that Moreland had resigned. The decision, we were told, was entirely Moreland's.

That's as it should be. Teachers must be held to extremely high standards. When parents entrust their children to the care and influence of another adult 5 days a week, they must feel confident that the teacher is of the highest character.

An attempt to deceive someone into buying what appears to be an illegal drug, we feel, should disqualify someone — temporarily, at the very least — from teaching young people.

Our concern lies in whether Moreland would have resigned had the details of this matter not been brought into the open. Up until the announcement of Moreland's resignation, we had been told by school officials that nothing more was anticipated in the way of disciplinary action.

We hope that the School District's handling was prompted by a concern for Moreland's civil rights and for proper legal procedures, but we will apparently never know for sure.

## Brazil's record default stirs little fuss

The Federative Republic of Brazil has just pulled off the biggest default in history, and for all the fuss it has provoked you would think some oldies in Bensonhurst missed a house payment.

When the world's sixth-most populous nation, the leading power in the Hispanic world, the world's most prodigious debtor, unilaterally suspends payment on \$67 billion in loans owed largely to the world's leading Anglo-Saxon banks, you've got a situation that invites hyperbole. In contrast, the City of New York's famous 1975 debt moratorium, which the state Court of Appeals later declared an impermissible exercise of the state's emergency powers, involved only \$4.6 billion in debt, a lot of it owed to the same banks whose stability is now threatened by the Yankee insolventy of Brazil.

Certainly, the experience of the last 10 years has led us to believe that the banking system is far more resistant to collapse than we once suspected. But as certainly it has advanced much closer to the precipice of disaster — wherever it lies — than it was before the big Manhattan banks branched out so aggressively into the business of making bad loans.

The principals in this crisis are not, of course, calling it a default. Everybody's going on like it's

just another banking day. But the definition of a default is unilateral suspension of debt payments. Try it some time. Just unilaterally suspend your car payments for a few months — see if the banks don't threaten to do all sort of nasty things. Eventually they'll send some husky guys to repossess the vehicle.

But they can't repossess Brazil, and Brazil knows this. For one thing, it won't fit on a flatbed truck. If Brazil was a widow behind on her mortgage, Citibank would know how to have her out in the street in no time. But when a country owes Citibank \$4.6 billion, the debtor can exercise enormous leverage on the terms of repayment, which is exactly what Brazil is doing.

The banks are not without leverage, of course. Brazil still needs short-term credit, which the banks can turn off anytime.

Meanwhile, both sides exercise even more enormous leverage over the United States government. All Brazil has to do is threaten to col-

lapse into anarchy and revolution, and the State Department will have it's because it knows the problems that would flow from having a Marxist nation sitting astride the South American continent.

And all the banks have to do is threaten to collapse into insolvency, and the Treasury Department will have fits because it knows the chaos that would result from the six largest U.S. banks going belly up.

This game is the last bastion of freedom. And the only outcome we can be sure of is that Brazilian politicians, who mortgaged their nation so extravagantly, and the New York bankers, who helped them do it with other people's money, will never know the grief that comes to ordinary people who lend money improvidently or who get hopelessly behind on their installment payments. Certainly, anybody who has ever sal through a real-estate closing with lawyers for some of these New York banks, who has paid excessive points and dealt with insufferable loan officers, will wonder at the genius of these Brazilians who collateralized their jungles and walked off with our banking system in their back pockets.

## Defense spending is not the sole cause of the federal deficit

In 1986 the federal budget deficit reached \$220.7 billion, an amount equal to 5.2 percent of the Gross National Product (GNP). The American public is justified in finding this unacceptable and is asking what went wrong and where the fault lies.

A great many people, however, seem to have decided that the main reason for the deficit is increased spending on defense. Wherever they got this idea, it is wrong. Opinion pollsters say that the average citizen overestimates the defense share of the federal budget by 15 percent. From there it is only a short step to the conclusion that defense spending must be responsible for the nation's economic difficulties.

We believe that it is important for the American public to understand where the deficit didn't come from. Furthermore, it is time to lay to rest two other myths — that defense has not done its "fair share" toward reducing federal expenditures and that the proposed defense program is unaffordable. These are misconceptions spread by people who either don't know what they're talking about or who fiddle with the facts to promote their own set of budget priorities.

Rise of the deficit. The index for studying the development of the deficit is federal outlays — the amount of money the

government has actually spent year by year — since the deficit is the gap between revenues and outlays. This review should begin in 1969, the last year when the budget was balanced. It was from that point that the deficit level grew, following an erratic but generally upward course in the 1970s and hitting awesome numbers in the 1980s.

When defense spending and the deficit are compared with each other as percentages of federal outlays from 1969 to the present, though, the correlation is more negative than positive. The defense share of federal outlays dropped steadily through the 1970s. Even the Reagan administration's defense recovery program has not compensated completely for that decline. Defense expenditures today are still a smaller percentage of federal outlays than they were from 1951 to 1972. The hard evidence of two decades is clear: Defense spending did not cause the deficit.

Unfortunately, it is not possible to say with equal directness and simplicity what did cause the deficit. The deficit is a product

not only of government spending and tax policies but also of the nation's general economic health and of such factors as inflation, employment and interest rates.

An example is the category of outlays that the Office of Management and Budget calls the "Human Resources Superfunction." It consists of spending for education, training, employment, social services, Social Security, health, Medicare, income security, and veterans' benefits. In 1969 the cost of this Superfunction was \$17 billion less than defense outlays. By 1985, it had increased by 617 percent and was still climbing and by then amounted to nearly twice the total of defense outlays.

The "Fairness" issue. There has been a recurring complaint that as the government struggles to get the budget within Gramm-Rudman-Hollings deficit reduction ceilings, defense has not borne its "fair share" of the cuts. This argument makes sense only to those with short memories. It forgets that defense was taken down by 17 percent as a share of federal outlays in the 1970s while nondefense programs gained by a corresponding percentage.

Not was that the end of it. Between FY '82 and FY '87, the administration's budget request for defense was cut by \$17.5 billion.

Not a dime of this went to relieve the deficit, though. Congress reallocated all of it to fund nondefense programs more generously than the administration had requested.

When deficit levels trigger the automatic Gramm-Rudman-Hollings reduction mechanism, half of the cuts must come from defense — even if though defense accounts for less than 30 percent of budget outlays. This is because most of the Human Resources Superfunction programs have been declared exempt or partially exempt from reductions.

Deciding on "affordability." No budgetary exercise alone can establish the level of affordability for national defense. That depends on how much security the nation wants, what risks it is willing to take, and the threat perceived to its interests in the world. In 1945, at the climax of World War II, the United States put 89.4 percent of its federal spending into defense. That was deemed "affordable." In view of the circumstances at the time. As a practical matter, we can assume that the limit of affordability today is somewhere well below that level.

Our best guides to making useful judgments about affordability may be GNP — which measures the nation's economic means — and the precedent of government

spending in the postwar era. The biennial budget request for FY '88-89 would set defense expenditures at just over 28 percent of federal outlays and slightly above six percent of GNP. In a postwar historical perspective that is relatively modest. In 1955, defense spending was 8.1 percent of GNP; in 1950 it was 8.2 percent; and in 1970, 7.8 percent. A defense budget that requires six percent of GNP cannot be regarded as "unaffordable."

Those who want to attack the proposed defense program on economic grounds should be aware that the present program is hide from people who have looked into the truth of the matter. Defense takes less of the tax dollar than the average citizen thinks it does. It did not cause the federal deficit. Defense has been subjected to its share — and then some — of budget reductions.

In terms of GNP and distribution of government revenues, the present program is one of the most "affordable" in the past 40 years. The figures are from the public record, open to all who want the facts instead of fiction.

# Where money for arms went goes unanswered by report

WASHINGTON (AP) — For all its disclosures about the secret sale of arms to Iran, the Tower Commission report issued on Thursday left unanswered the central question of where millions of dollars went after leaving Iranian hands and how much of it wound up with Contra rebels fighting the Nicaraguan government.

"Sizable sums of money generated by the arms sale to Iran remain unaccounted for," the report said in discussing an issue that congressional investigators are expected to probe further. "Determining whether these funds were diverted to support the Contras proved extremely difficult," the board said, although it added there was considerable evidence that a diversion took place.

The report notes that the price charged to Iranians was nearly \$20 million above the amount the Defense Department received for four deliveries of weapons.

"Most of these monies remain unaccounted for," the report said, adding that middleman Adnan Khashoggi and his investors "claim they are still owed \$10 million from these transactions."

The report also said that the manner in which the transactions were handled, "invited kickbacks and payoffs" to some of the private individuals involved.

It listed a series of obstacles that congressional investigators must overcome before it can learn the final resting place of the funds, including securing testimony from several key officials and obtaining access to bank records in Switzerland and elsewhere.

Other questions remain unanswered in the inch-thick report, which criticized President Reagan for a failure to exercise stronger control over the National Security Council, and assailed senior presidential aides for their own roles in the Iran-Contra scandal.

• Was National Security Council aide Oliver North authorized by a senior official to divert funds to the Contras, assuming there was a diversion. "It is unclear whether Lt. Col. North ever sought or received prior approval," the board said in its report.

Investigators found a April 1986 memorandum in which North wrote that \$12 million in arms sales funds would be used to purchase supplies for the Contras.

But the board also said "no evidence has emerged" to suggest that the memorandum was shown to former national security adviser John Poindexter, the president or any other government official.

• Who knew of the apparent diversion, and when? Former national security adviser Robert C. McFarlane said that North told him shortly after their secret trip to Tehran in May of 1986 that the United States

## Other investigations continuing

WASHINGTON (AP) — With the release of the report of the Tower Commission on Thursday, three major investigations are still looking into the secret arms sales to Iran and the reported diversion of profits to the Nicaraguan rebels.

The current investigations include:  
 • The Senate select committee headed by Sen. Daniel K. Inouye, D-Hawaii, and co-chaired by Sen. Warren Rudman, R-N.H. The Senate panel has until August to compile a report.  
 • The House select committee headed

by Rep. Lee Hamilton, D-Ind., which has until October to file its report.

• Independent counsel Lawrence E. Walsh, a retired federal judge who is running a wide-ranging investigation authorized by a special panel of federal judges. Walsh is expected to take several months to complete his work.

## President gives pledge to speed NSC reforms

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan grimly accepted a report Thursday that blamed him in large part for the Iran-Contra fiasco and promised to do "whatever is necessary" to reform the National Security Council operations.

"I intend to read and digest it first, think carefully about its findings and promptly act on its recommendations," Reagan said during a brief appearance with members of the board he named last Nov. 25 to investigate the arms-and-money scheme.

Although the board concluded there was no evidence that Reagan knew of the possible diversion of Iranian arms sales profits to Nicaraguan rebels, it harshly criticized his management of the White House foreign policy-making apparatus.

Reagan embraced an arms-for-hostages program — even while denying that publicly — and "did not seem aware of the way in which the operation was implemented and the full consequences of U.S. participation," said the board, headed by former Sen. John Tower, R-Texas, a longtime Reagan political ally.

"The board believes" that a strategic opening to Iran may have been in the Reagan and his wife, Nancy, canceled plans to travel to their mountaintop retreat at Camp David, Md., this weekend. Fitzwater said the president wanted to remain in Washington to study the report and discuss it with aides.

Reagan was presented with the board's report, an inch-thick document with a glossy blue cover and presidential seal, during a private meeting with Tower and the two other board members, former Secretary of State Edmund S. Muskie and Brent Scowcroft, national security adviser during the Ford administration.

Moments later, Reagan entered a packed auditorium at the Executive Office Building next door to the White House, introduced the board members and thanked them.  
 "I want to make it clear that I consider their work far too important for instant analysis," he said and then disclosed plans for a speech on an as-yet unspecified day next week.

"But I pledge to the American people today that I will do whatever is necessary to enact the proper reforms and to meet the challenges ahead."

Reagan then left, brushing aside reporters' questions about whether White House Chief of Staff Donald T. Regan, who came in for some criticism in the report, will be dismissed.

## Gates' statement may threaten post

WASHINGTON (AP) — Robert Gates, President Reagan's nominee to head the CIA, says he can't remember what he told White House aides last year at the time they were compiling a phony chronology of the Iran-Contra affair, the Senate Intelligence Committee said Thursday.

The statement by Gates may put his already troubled nomination in further jeopardy, said Sen. William Cohen, R-Maine, vice-chairman of the panel.

Meantime, Sen. Arlen Specter, R-Pa., also a member of the Intelligence Committee, said Reagan should withdraw Gates' nomination to replace William Casey.

# NRC eases emergency planning rules

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Nuclear Regulatory Commission tentatively approved 4-1 Thursday an easing of the emergency planning requirements for nuclear power plants, a step designed to circumvent state and local opposition to two multibillion-dollar reactors awaiting startup on the East Coast.

The decision, if ratified after a 60-day period for public comment, would clear the way for licensing the Shoreham plant on Long Island, 55 miles east of New York City, and the Seabrook plant in New Hampshire, near the Massachusetts border.

Those facilities, each costing more

than \$4 billion, are strongly opposed by Govs. Mario Cuomo of New York and Michael Dukakis of Massachusetts, who were among a score of elected public officials who appeared before the commission on Tuesday to protest the proposed rules change.

So far, Cuomo and Dukakis have managed to block the startup of Shoreham and Seabrook because NRC rules adopted in the wake of the 1979 accident at Three Mile Island, Pa., virtually require state and local cooperation in planning for the evacuation of residents within 10 miles of a reactor in the event of a

major accident.

The two governors have refused, saying there is no way to guarantee the safe exodus of residents in the cases of Shoreham and Seabrook.

Federal regulatory agencies publish proposed rules in the Federal Register, opening the proposed change to a period of public comment after which the agency may adopt, reject or modify the proposed rule.

Joe Fouchard, an NRC spokesman, said Thursday's action simply meant the commission was opening the proposal to public comment and did not mean the commission had given

any approval to the rule.

"All the commission has done here is to seek public comment on a proposal," Fouchard. "I have no idea whether the commission will go forward with the proposal or not."

The proposed rules change would entitle the NRC to go ahead and license a plant in the absence of state and local cooperation on emergency plant. In such cases, the utilities themselves would be required to develop evacuation plans on their own, ones which could be reasonably expected to work if local authorities did in fact respond to an emergency.

## Missile misses drone target in test

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Air Force suffered a setback last week in testing its new AMRAAM air-to-air missile when one of two missiles fired at drones missed its target, a Pentagon spokesman said Thursday.

The experiment with the two missiles was conducted Friday over the Gulf of Mexico and involved targets, a Pentagon statement said.

what the service described as one of the most difficult tests yet devised for the new weapon.

An F-15 jet fighter fired two missiles from a "head-on profile" at two drones flying so closely together that the F-15's own radar couldn't distinguish them as separate targets, a Pentagon statement said.

## Snow falls from Southwest to northern Plains

Snow stretched from the Southwest to the northern Plains on Thursday as a major storm worked its way eastward after dumping up to four feet of snow in Arizona and Colorado.

Rain prevailed south of the snow, stretching from Oklahoma, western Kansas and much of Texas to parts of Nebraska and the Dakotas and across the lower Mississippi Valley to Georgia and South Carolina.

Rain showers also were scattered over Southern California and

southern Arizona, and freezing rain was scattered over north-central Nebraska.

The powerful storm left 26 inches of snow on the ground at Flagstaff, Ariz., by dawn Thursday. Gila County sheriff's Lt. Harry Cain said up to 60 inches of snow had fallen near Payson, Ariz.

The heavy snow extended into Colorado, where Purgatory had received 48 inches since Tuesday morning, and 28 inches fell at Wolf Creek Pass over the same period.

The heavy snowfall in the southern and central Rockies was stirred by

strong winds that caused deep bulldups in avalanche-starting zones, and 30 slides were reported Wednesday and Thursday in the Red Mountain Pass area, the Colorado Avalanche Information Center said.

Seven slides also were observed around Aspen, but poor visibility was hampering an accurate count of avalanches in backcountry areas, the avalanche experts said.

Alliance and Sidney, Neb., received at least 4 inches of snow Thursday.

By early afternoon Thursday, snow extended over central and western North Dakota, western South Dakota, the Nebraska Panhandle, Wyoming, Colorado, northern New Mexico, and northeastern Arizona.

Snowfall during the 6 hours ending at 11 a.m. MST included 7 inches at Colorado Springs, Colo., and 2 inches at Casper and Cheyenne, Wyo.

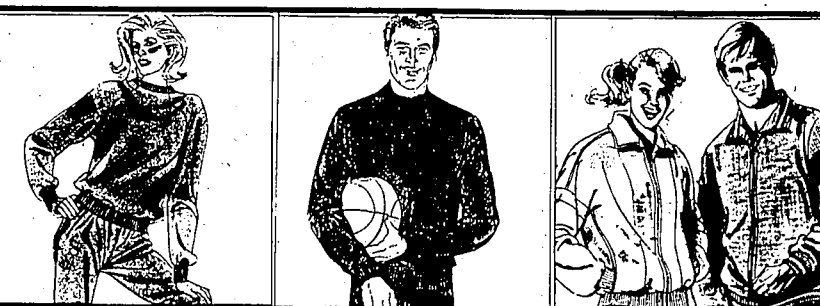
"The incident occurred as the Cessna was crossing the same run-

# Soviets end nuclear test moratorium

MOSCOW (AP) — The Soviet Union detonated its first nuclear explosion in 19 months Thursday, saying it was forced to resume testing because the United States refused to go along with a Kremlin moratorium on weapons tests.

The explosion under the steppe in remote Kazakhstan was announced by the Soviet news agency Tass. The rapid announcement was highly unusual and appeared intended to underscore the Kremlin's contention that continued American testing required a resumption of Soviet tests.

"I want to stress once more that the termination of the moratorium was a forced measure dictated by security interests only," said Maj. Gen. Gely Batenin, a Defense Ministry spokesman.

But at a special news conference on the test, he said, "The resumption of nuclear explosions by the Soviet Union does not mean that it has abandoned its struggle for the complete cessation of such tests.

"A historic chance for ending nuclear tests once and for all has been missed," Batenin added.

In Washington, the State Department said the Soviets' decision to resume nuclear testing was their own affair.

"As we have said before, when the Soviets choose to resume nuclear testing is their decision," department spokeswoman Phyllis Oakley said.

"The U.S. position on nuclear testing is clear," Mrs. Oakley said. "As long as we depend on nuclear weapons for our security, we must insure that those weapons are safe, secure, reliable and effective. This demands some level of underground

nuclear testing as permitted by existing treaties."

Soviet officials stressed that the Kremlin was leaving the door open for a superpower test ban.

Tass said the blast, the Soviets' first since July 25, 1985, had a yield of less than 20 kilotons, the force of the U.S. atomic bomb dropped on Hiroshima, Japan in 1945.

Later, the Tass dispatch was read midway through the national nightly news program Vremya, the most-watched broadcast in the country.

## No rescue missions

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP) — The Syrian commander in west Beirut on Thursday ruled out a military mission to free Americans and other foreigners held hostage by Moslem extremists.

Brig. Gen. Ghazi Kenaan, also chief of Syrian military intelligence in Lebanon, told a news conference he did not believe any of the 26 foreign captives were in Beirut's Moslem sector or other territory under Syrian control.

He said Anglican Church envoy Terry Waite was "excessively humanitarian" in visiting grounds.

Lebanon in an attempt to free the hostages, eight of whom are Americans.

Waite dropped from sight Jan. 20 after leaving his hotel in Moslem west Beirut to meet with Shille. Moslems holding Americans.

Asked whether the 7,400 Syrian soldiers would mount a military operation to free foreign hostages, Kenaan said: "The issue of the hostages is not a military as much as it is a political one. We condemn kidnapping on humanitarian grounds."

## Church votes to let women in priesthood

LONDON (AP) — The Church of England gave the go-ahead Thursday for legislation to admit women to the priesthood after a report by its 44 bishops advised the controversial step would not necessarily split the state church.

The General Synod of bishops, clergy and laity voted 317-145 with two abstentions, after a 5½-hour debate. Broken down, the bishops voted 32-8, clergy 135-70 and laity 150-67.

The Most Rev. Robert Runcie, Archbishop of Canterbury and the church's spiritual head, said the necessary legal and parliamentary processes made it unlikely there would be a woman priest in the church until July 1992 at the earliest.

Addressing the synod in Church House, Westminster, before the vote, Runcie urged the synod to "take this courageous step" toward women's ordination.

Pleading for a positive vote on an argument that has lasted 20 years, Sister Carol, an Anglican nun, asked: "Am I to walk tall in society and small in the church?"

The 4,000-member Movement for the Ordination of Women said afterward it was "absolutely delighted" with the vote.

But Peter Bruinvels, a legislator and synod member, called it a "disaster" and said he would form a Church of England-in-exile if women became priests.

## Air raids kill 25 in border villages

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan (AP) — Afghan warplanes Thursday bombed two Pakistani border villages, killing 25 people and injuring 200 others, Pakistani officials said.

Afghanistan did not immediately comment on the report.

About 3 million Afghan refugees live in Pakistan, which aids Afghan Moslem guerrillas seeking to overthrow Afghanistan's Soviet-backed communist government. Many guerrillas and refugees live along the Pakistani border.

The Pakistani officials said the dead and wounded included both Afghans and Pakistanis, but they gave no breakdown.

The raids came on the second day of a new round of U.N.-sponsored indirect peace talks in Geneva between Afghanistan and Pakistan.

# Environmental, economic concerns conflict in SIS debate

**BOISE** — Opinions at a Department of Energy hearing here Thursday were sharply divided on whether a facility to process plutonium for weapons use should be built near Idaho Falls.

LI. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter urged speedy action on building the \$504 million Special Isotope Separation project.

Otter said the Idaho National Engineering Laboratory, the government's preferred site for the project, has a good safety record and he

offered to help shore up any weaknesses in the INEL proposal to attract the facility.

He said Idaho has matured with the nuclear industry and has mutual respect and trust for it. Idaho is in a region punctuated with support of our national defense, he said, referring to defense work done in Washington and Utah.

Tom Cochran, staff scientist of the Natural Resources Defense Council in Washington, D.C., said people need to focus on the real reasons DOE is building this technology.

DOE admits it doesn't have adequate security for plutonium. "You

don't have adequate physical security. Every time you clean up your mess you find a new one popping up," Cochran said.

"You don't have a very good track record regarding safety operation of your plants. Look at the Rocky Flats (Colorado) plant," Cochran said. Rocky Flats is where the material from SIS would be shipped after processing in Idaho.

By 1995 (when SIS is supposed to be operating), DOE will only have 6 tons of fuel grade plutonium available, Cochran said.

"You won't get much surge capacity in DOE's plan to match a spurt in

Soviet weapons production). DOE is putting in place all the technology it needs to access commercially spent fuel," he said. All that needs to be done then is change the federal law banning this, he added.

DOE says at SIS it will mainly use plutonium from spent fuel produced by government-owned facilities at the Hanford site. This material is currently not usable for weapons production, but the advanced lasers employed in the SIS process will make it possible, DOE says.

"The no-action alternative is the best alternative," to building SIS, Cochran said to an audience of about

100 at the Red Lion Inn Riverside. The audience applauded his remarks.

More than twice the number of people who attended the hearing in Boise turned out for a hearing in Idaho Falls on Tuesday. In Idaho Falls, speakers against the project outnumbered supporters.

The same was true during the first 45 minutes of testimony at the Boise hearing. There were 35 speakers scheduled to testify in Boise.

Peter Johnson of McCall, former administrator of Bonneville Power Administration, said he has had experience in evaluating SIS

technology. He said it is safe, and the on-site environmental impacts are minimal.

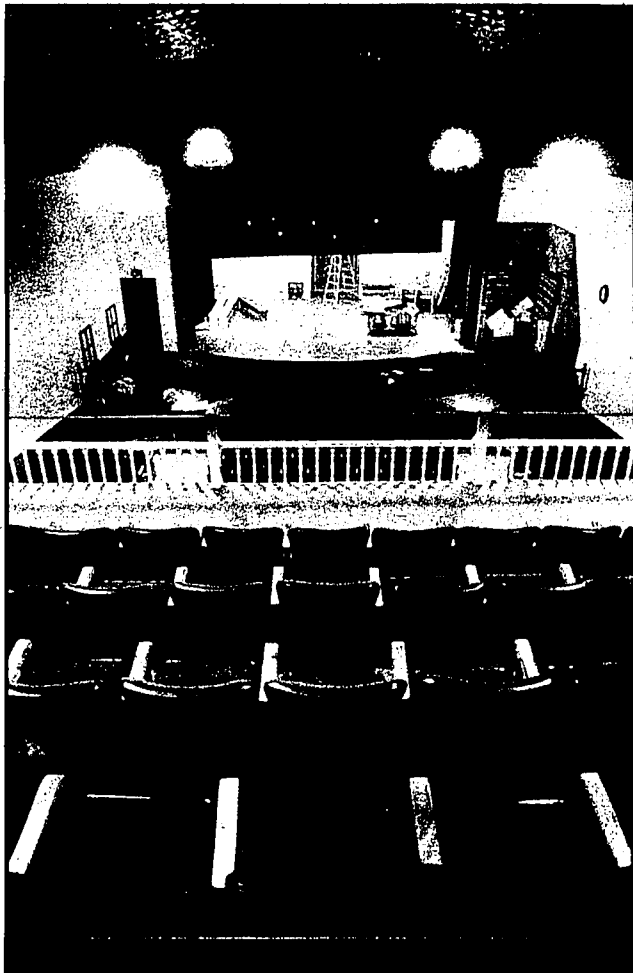
INEL "has a history of safe and responsible activities," Johnson said. He wanted to see speedy development without jeopardizing environmental considerations. SIS technology is welcome in itself and for the businesses it will encourage. The technology will limit nuclear exposures to workers, Johnson said.

James Warf, professor of chemistry at the University of Southern California in Los Angeles, opposed

## All paid off! After a 7-year effort, historic opera house is free of mortgage

**OAKLEY** — The Oakley Valley Arts Council has paid off the mortgage on its historic Howells Opera House after seven years of collecting money in "dabs and bits and pieces," says Ann Woodhouse, a member of the OVAC board of directors.

OVAC paid \$3,000 for the building and \$2,500 for the parking lot to purchase the Opera House from its former owner, the LDS Church, she says. The church owned the property from the late 1920s until 1980, she says.

Woodhouse is also the granddaughter of Judge B.P. Howells, who had the Opera House built in Oakley sometime between 1904-07, she says. The Howells were a musical family and the Opera House was built across the street from Judge Howells' family residence, which Woodhouse says is called "the castle" by locals.

She believes her grandfather had the Opera House constructed because he wanted to bring some culture into the area.

The building's acoustics are "outstanding," she says. Artists say they enjoy performing there not only because of the building's acoustical qualities, but also because of the small theater's intimate atmosphere, she says.

"They can relate to the audience and the audience can relate to them," she says.

The stage is sloped toward the audience, while the audience's seats slope toward the stage. There are less than 300 seats in the building, and all have a good view of the stage.

However, the size of the theater has presented some problems with raising money for OVAC. "We sell out on our shows, but with less than 300 seats we usually don't

make much of a profit," she says. Boisse has sold \$10 memberships, basically a contribution to the cause, and held fund-raisers from banquets to bake sales to help pay for the building. Money raised to pay off the mortgage has come from "pure hard work and a dollar here and a dollar there," Woodhouse says.

Since OVAC took control of the property much time, money and effort has gone into restoring the old building to its original purpose. New restrooms have been built, along with remodeled dressing rooms and foyer. OVAC also expanded the basement, re-insulated and rewired the building, installed a new furnace, and redecorated the seating area.

"A terrific amount of work," has gone into the project, she says. Among the supporters is a group called Friends of OVAC, former Oakley resident, who has raised enough money about three years ago to help purchase new curtains for the stage.

Since OVAC began the restoration project, the Opera House has held performances by local and regional groups, including the Denver Theater Company, and the Magic Valley Philharmonic, she says.

OVAC will continue to raise funds for an expansion of the Opera House's balconies, which will add audience seating, she says. This will be a long-term project, she says, since expanding the building will be expensive.

A mortgage burning open house has been scheduled for Saturday from 6 to 9 p.m. at the Opera House. Tours of the building will be given and light refreshments will be served. At 8 p.m. selections from the upcoming musical "Annie" will be performed. A plaque honoring sponsors will be revealed and a facsimile mortgage will be burned.

## Program targets abuse of children

Trust fund supports prevention efforts

**TWIN FALLS** — The Rev. Fred Elwood of Twin Falls took to the podium at a Rotary Club gathering with a grim message about child abuse in Idaho.

But his presentation Wednesday carried also the message of hope. In the form of the Children's Trust Fund, which supports child-abuse prevention programs with money generated from an optional check-off on income-tax forms.

But a state legislature created the fund in 1985, but failed to create funding for it. Said Elwood, a Trust Fund board member and pastor of the Episcopal Church of the Ascension. The fund relies on the tax check-off and donations.

Last year, however, only \$40,000 was raised, mostly through the tax check-off. He considered the amount disappointing.

"You might check what Idaho Fish and Game (check-off) got," he told the group.

He chalked up the poor response to the newness of the fund.

"That's why I'm here today, and you don't have an excuse," Elwood said.

About \$18,000 will be awarded this year from the fund to abuse-prevention programs. Applications are now being accepted for the money, he said.

The remaining money raised by the check-off will be used to build up the fund.

Before urging support for the Children's Trust Fund, Elwood discussed why it was needed.

"Child abuse is a serious problem and it's getting worse. It's worse here. It's worse everywhere. Children are being abused physically, sexually and emotionally at a rate and to a degree that is stunning," he said.

## Senate panel links farm mediation to credit plans

**BOISE** — A state Senate subcommittee has delayed introduction of a bill to create a farm mediation service in Idaho in order to package it with several agricultural credit proposals.

Sen. Lynn Tomninga, R-Rupert, said Thursday that members of the Subcommittee on Idaho Farm Financing will refine the credit measures in talks with bankers, state officials and the University of Idaho Cooperative Extension Service.

Lawmakers still are considering the form of a financial counseling service, the funding of a mediation program and other details, he said.

A draft measure proposes mandatory mediation between farmers and lenders in cases where foreclosure is imminent and debts exceed \$20,000. In order to proceed with foreclosure, a lender would need a release showing that mediation was attempted.

However, the mediator would not have the power to impose a settlement and, after all parties have met, lenders could proceed with foreclosure.

Tomninga, who gave a report Thursday to the full Agricultural Affairs Committee, said the subcommittee anticipates bringing a bill before the Agricultural Affairs Committee as soon as Tuesday.

## Attorney, citing 'spirit' strategy, seeks relief in Charboneau case

**JEROME** — Whether or not the "spirit" moved the defense of convicted murderer Jaime Charboneau was debated Thursday afternoon in a Jerome courtroom.

Charboneau's new lawyer, Greg Fuller of Jerome, filed several requests with 5th District Court seeking either sentencing relief for his client or a new trial.

The case warrants a second look, he requests, claim, on the grounds that former defense attorney Golden Bennett, of Twin Falls, based his defense strategy on clairvoyance and other "supernatural phenomena," including contact with the "spirit" of Charboneau's victim and former wife, Marilyn Arbough. As a result, the defense was inadequate.

Arbough's bullet-ridden body was found July 1, 1984, at her Jerome County ranch. Convicted of first-degree murder, Charboneau received the death sentence.

At the hearing, Judge Philip Becker threw out most of Fuller's motions at the request of special prosecutor and Deputy Attorney General Peter Erbland. Erbland said Fuller attempted to use several vehicles for the same purpose.

What remained was an application for post-conviction relief for Charboneau, who attended the hearing. The hearing continues

today.

A question raised Thursday was whether Charboneau changed his version of the murder to fit a clairvoyant vision allegedly seen by Bennett's niece, Linda Black. Black had allegedly said during a séance in California that one of Arbough's daughters, Tiffany, fired the fatal shot at her mother, according to a letter to Bennett's office.

Fuller called to the stand Jerome Public Defender Rancy Stoker, who had defended Charboneau at his trial, and former Jerome prosecutor Dan Adamson,

who said they believed Bennett had relied on clairvoyance.

Stoker said he believed Charboneau had adopted Bennett's niece's version of the murder. But there was "zero" evidence to support the claim that a second gun was the cause of death, Stoker said.

Erbland asked, "Are you saying he (Charboneau) patterned his story after the clairvoyant, latched onto that and lied to you?"

Stoker replied, "That's exactly what I am saying."

When he took over from Bennett, Stoker said.

## Hospitality association forms ranks to combat loss of tourists' dollars

**TWIN FALLS** — These travel-oriented businesses are tired of watching autos drive by on Interstate 84, eyes fixed solely on a destination hundreds of miles away.

They've also bristled at watching tens of thousands of state tax dollars flow to Sun Valley for tourism promotions and far fewer thousands dribble into the small towns of the Magic Valley.

The watching has ended now, the charter members of the Magic Valley Hospitality Association say.

Instead, they are mobilizing their money and some entrepreneurial brainwork to put Hagerman, Burley, Gooding, Shoshone, Twin Falls and other area towns on visitors' travel schedules.

The new, non-profit group entered the competition for tourism dollars Thursday in Twin Falls by putting itself into business. It organized, elected officers, approved a state of money-making ideas and considered projects aimed at attracting tourists.

"Valley businesses and chambers of commerce may be competing for entertainment dollars on Saturday night, but with a little cooperation," they also could be drawing dollars that now are whizzing by on the I-84, said President Steve Soran, of Twin Falls.

The association, which now has signed up 50 members, will raise money and then use the cash to promote tourism in the area, he and Executive Director Wes Gates, of Twin Falls, said.

The first fund-raiser was fresh off the presses and on display for the members at Thursday's organizational session. The first monthly edition of the Magic Valley Entertainment Guide, a 16-page booklet with articles, lists of attractions and advertising also will be on display on March 1.

Ahead may be picture postcards, coupon books for travelers, restaurant menu guides, posters, motorcoach packages, calendars and other products with a Magic Valley pitch designed to make money for the organization.

Gates, who also heads Moore Publishing Co., estimates the association will generate \$20,000 yearly with the projects.

It then will pump the money into the competition for tourism dollars Thursday in Twin Falls by putting itself into business. It organized, elected officers, approved a state of money-making ideas and considered projects aimed at attracting tourists.

The association also would like to team up their money with others to field projects, Soran has said.

But the association will keep a tight geographic focus in its spending, Soran said. It is concentrating on Magic Valley communities.

Association leaders also view the Sun Valley area as a competitor that has prevented state tourism grants from being used south of the mountains.

 More than 8,000 complaints of child abuse were reported in Idaho last year, compared to 7,679 the previous year and 6,391 during 1984, Elwood reported. Of the complaints made during 1986, 1,412 involved sexual abuse.

The figures represent probably "only a fraction of what's going on," he said.

The number of deaths nationwide related to child abuse increased 29 percent between 1985 and 1986, compared with a 2-percent decline between 1984 and 1985, he said.

Elwood characterized child abuse as a family disease, where the sins of the parents are handed down to the children.

He knew of a case where a man sexually abused "every last one" of his several daughters. The man's attitude was that the girls were his

possessions to do with what he pleased.

"I guess his granddaughters are next," Elwood said.

The main reason behind child abuse is that the majority of abusers learned from their parents, he said. As a result, a cycle of abuse is established in families.

Studies show abuse and neglect problems at home don't stay home, Elwood said. They are manifested in children who may become delinquents or hurt themselves or others.

There are many programs for treating victims of child abuse, but not many are focused on prevention, he said. And, that's where the Trust Fund comes in.

Programs could be funded to help break the cycle of violence and neglect, such as the establishment of a residential center where "parents at the breaking point may leave children,

instead of beating them," he said.

While there is a license for almost everything from cars to fishing, there is no licensing, qualifications, classes or permits for the most important, demanding, delicate and risky activity of them all — parenting, Elwood said.

In our "over-busy" lives, there is "increased stress, isolation and loneliness," he said. "Add to that a child who won't stop crying or a child who wants your attention and time . . . and you have a situation ripe for abuse."

More programs are needed also to teach children, "at a very early age," where they can be touched and by whom, and to say, "no," Elwood said.

"Child abuse is a serious problem and there is something you can do about it," he said.

 The project as an escalation of the arms race.

Wurf worked on the first nuclear weapons in the 1940s. Some of his work involved extraction of nuclear materials using solvents.

"I consider the present nuclear arms race to be the most perilous and unsafe the nation has ever undertaken," Warf said.

The nuclear age should have stopped in 1945, but regrettably it did not, he said. "Each side has about 20,000 nuclear warheads. Each side has all the deterrence necessary. It seems to me," he said.

He said DOE should avoid the mindset that more weapons grade plutonium would lead to greater se-

curity. Similar projects were done already, he said. The SIS is merely another notch in the arms race endangering the precarious balance, Warf said.

SIS is not to be confused with the Superconducting Super Collider project, a huge atom smasher for physics research, for which Idaho and many other states are competing.

The hearings this week on SIS are to determine whether the scope of the environmental impact statement required on the project is correct.

A draft environmental impact statement is supposed to be available for public review by September, according to DOE.

So far, there are a number of known environmental impacts from the proposed SIS plant:

- It will release radioactive vapors at levels about one-billionth of the annual permissible limit, said Carl Gertz, SIS project officer at INEL.
- It will produce about 1,000 drums per year of low-level radioactive waste, which will be shipped to a DOE facility in New Mexico.
- Some 250 drums per year of a different type of low-level radioactive waste will be stored at INEL.

The public will have until the close of business next Monday to present written comments to DOE regarding the plant.

## 17 calves, barn claimed by fire

**Jerome** — Seventeen calves were killed and a barn was destroyed in an early morning fire in Jerome County.

Darrell Smith of the Jerome County Volunteer Fire Department said the fire was reported about 4:25 a.m. by a trucker who contacted the Idaho State Police by citizen band radio when he saw smoke and flames.

The 40-by-40-foot cinderblock building, four miles northwest of Jerome, had a wooden roof. Smith said the fire apparently started from a heat lamp that overheated straw bedding put down for the calves. Smith said the young animals probably died from smoke inhalation before they were burned.

The fire had been burning for some time before it was discovered, Smith said, and the building was fully engulfed when firemen arrived.

The owner, Jim Carpenter, and his family were unaware of the fire until a deputy sheriff drove into their yard to notify them.

Smith said damage estimates were not fully determined but would probably reach \$20,000-\$30,000. In addition to the calves, valued at \$85 each, the building contained power tools and machinery.

## Man gets 2nd burglary charge

**Twin Falls** — A second first-degree burglary charge was filed Wednesday against Larry Hranac, 25, of Twin Falls, as police investigations into recent church burglaries continued.

Hranac and Stacey W. Daniel, 18, also of Twin Falls, were charged earlier this week in the burglary of the LDS Church on Elizabeth Boulevard. The two were arrested after a city police officer noticed a broken window and discovered the two inside the building last weekend.

Hranac was charged with the Bethel Temple burglary on Feb. 14. Furnishings and office equipment taken in the burglary have been recovered.

Arraigned on the second charge Wednesday, Hranac was granted the services of the public defender and a preliminary hearing date will be set. He is in custody under \$2,000 bond.

Police say a number of other churches have been burglarized in Twin Falls and other counties in Magic Valley during the past several months. These are still under investigation by city and county officers.

## Apartment, shed burglarized

**Twin Falls** — An apartment and a storage shed at the Applewood Apartments, 1710 Heyburn Ave. E., were entered sometime during the past few days, resulting in damage of about \$2,000 and thefts of \$3,589, Twin Falls police reports showed Thursday.

John Leczanski, 1744 Heyburn Ave. E., owner of the property, said a storage building behind the apartments was apparently left unlocked sometime between Feb. 18 and Sunday. He said someone entered the building and used a vehicle crank shaft to break doors. Paint was splattered over the walls, and other articles stored in the building were broken.

Rick Stokes, a resident of the apartment building, reported to police that sometime over the weekend someone entered his apartment through a glass door that he could not lock and took \$3,589 worth of his personal possessions, including a briefcase containing \$500 in cash.

## ISRC: Drivers ignore seat belts

**Twin Falls** — The Idaho Safety Restraint Coalition administrator says he is disappointed in residents of Magic Valley who are becoming increasingly complacent about the use of seat belts.

In January residents of Region IV decreased their use of safety belts by 1.6 percent, compared to a state-wide decrease of 1.3 percent in use of the safety devices.

Rae Tway, administrator of the safety coalition, said a poll of Idaho residents show that 68 percent agree safety belts are a good idea, but only 21.5 percent actually used them in January.

He said a campaign begins in the coming week to encourage drivers and their passengers to "buckle up" while on Idaho's streets and highways. The campaign centers around the idea that seat belts save lives and serious injury in traffic accidents.

# Supreme Court to hear 3 appeals

**Twin Falls** — The Idaho Supreme Court meets in Twin Falls Monday and Tuesday to hear three appeals from Magic Valley residents.

At 10 a.m. Monday an appeal from the J.R. Simplot Co. regarding a collision of a Simplot-owned vehicle with a band of sheep owned by the Etcheverry Sheep Co.

The accident occurred in Minidoka County and 5th District Judge Ronald Bruce upheld a trial court's decision that Simplot was 95-percent

negligent in the collision. Attorneys for Simplot Co. argued that the court erred in excluding evidence of the herd district laws they said were in effect at the scene of the accident. The trial court ruled that the sheep were being driven, not herded, and therefore the herd district laws did not apply.

In another case, Dorothy Mae Pressnell is appealing a ruling by the Idaho Industrial Commission over money granted to her as a result of

injuries she sustained while working at Lynwood Norge, a laundromat in Twin Falls. Arguments on this case are set for 1:30 p.m. Monday.

Another injury liability case will be argued at 10 a.m. Tuesday. Mary E. and Jesus Luna are appealing a jury verdict in 5th District Court in Minidoka County. The case involves a damage suit the couple filed against Shockey Sheet Metal and Welding Co., in which the jury found Shockey was not liable for injuries suffered by Mary Luna while she was working at Ore-Ida Foods Inc., and awarded Shockey costs of the court case.

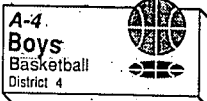
# No. 1 Indians dump No. 2 Dietrich

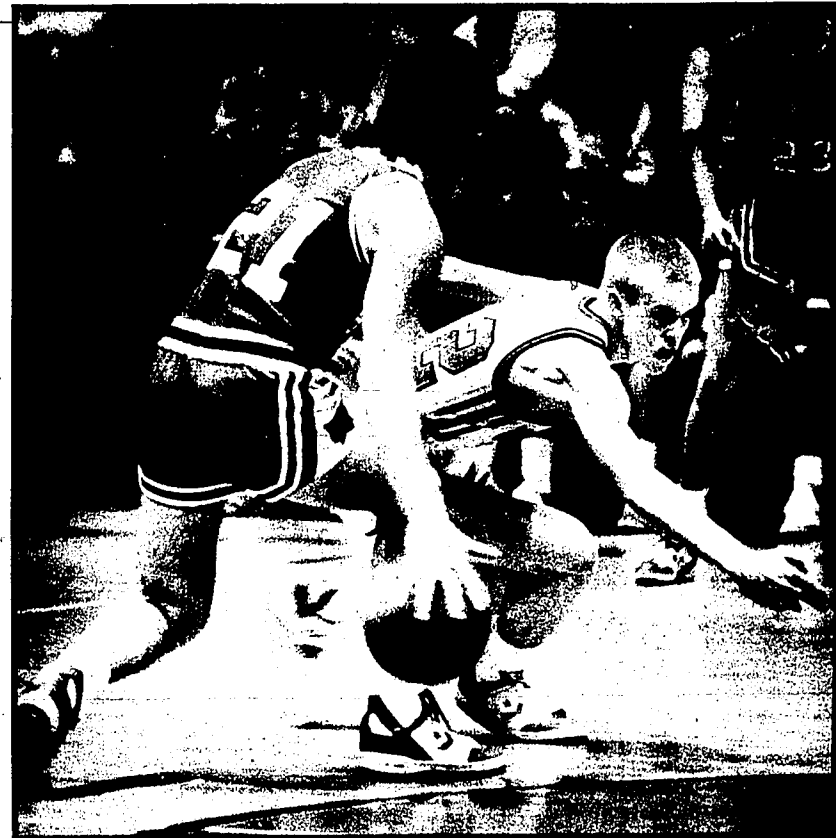


Region III Class A-1 boys' basketball tournament.

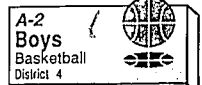

"Isn't he something!" exclaimed the smitten kibitzer. "How could he know to make such a risky play?"

The answer to this question is in the bidding. South had passed as dealer and was known to hold the excellent spade suit and the ace of hearts. Had he also held the ace of clubs, he surely would have opened the bidding. Ergo, the switch to clubs was not bold but logical. A good defensive play to be sure, but it would have been a blunder for West to miss it.

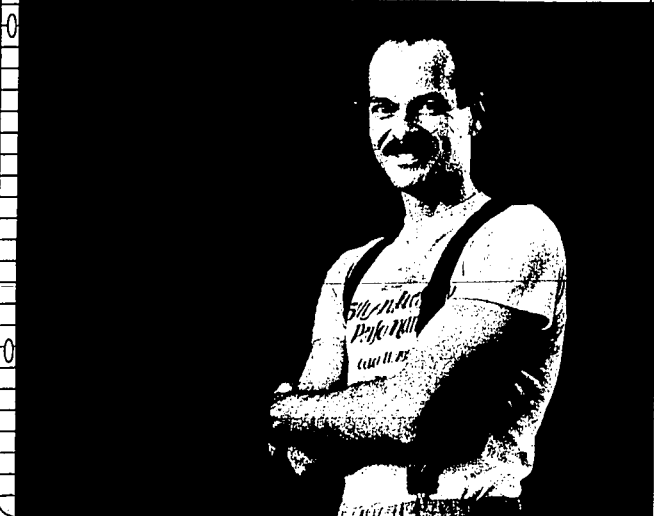

## Artists go to School



### Portland dancer teaches kids 'discovery movement exploration'

TWIN FALLS — Rosina Eldredge, a teacher at Lincoln Elementary School, lies prone on the polished hardwood floor of Room 18. Twenty-seven kindergarten-sized bodies roll slowly toward her.

"Okay! Roll, don't stand up. Slow, so you don't kick people with your feet," says a tall, slim man with close-cropped dark hair. He wears a mustache which looks as stiff as his body seems fluid. Spectators hold his bluegreen sweat pants at bellybutton level.

"Move s-l-o-w-l-y," he says. F. Charles Hubbard, a 39-year-old contemporary dancer from Portland, wound up his four-week "Artists in the Schools" residency at Lincoln this week.

The "Artists in the Schools" program, co-sponsored in Idaho by local PTAs and the Idaho Commission on the Arts, brings professional artists with an art, music or theater background into public schools to conduct one- to four-week workshops.

Hubbard, who has been working with the program for six years, has completed over 50 residencies in 10 states. He introduces students of all ages to the world of contemporary dance.

"I set up movement problems that they have to solve," said Hubbard. "It's a very creative process for them; there are any number of correct solutions and I encourage them not to be like anybody else."

"They really have to work on finding something that is unique to them. And then, as the time goes on, we begin to take the movement that they've discovered, and organize it into choreography."

Hubbard began dancing when he was 19 years old.

"I started old," he said. "Most

people would have started when they were kids. When I was in high school, however, I was involved in gymnastics and basketball, which sort of led me into dance."

Hubbard enrolled in the architecture program at Oregon State University and took a part-time job as piano accompanist for dance classes at the school.

"The more I played for the classes, the more that seemed more interesting than what I was doing in architecture," he said.

He was eventually given a \$10,000 a year scholarship to study dance at Stephens College in Columbia, Mo. There he was one of 12 men, all on scholarship, studying dance or theater at the predominantly female school.

After graduation Hubbard studied modern dance in New York, then London. He returned to the United States, auditioned for the Portland Dance Theater and a Goeur d'Alene Summer stock theater, and was accepted by both. He spent the summer in Coeur d'Alene and the following eight years with the Portland Dance Theater.

Hubbard resigned from the company after deciding he wanted to spend more time working with children. Currently he divides his time between six to seven "Artists in the Schools" residencies a year and giving his own solo performances. He also conducts dance workshops for a juvenile felon program in Oregon.

Hubbard said he enjoys working with children of all ages.

"The younger kids are less inhibited, but not as physically able to move," he noted. "The older kids are more inhibited, so kind of, to my way of thinking, a little less creative, less willing to take a chance. But their bodies have developed to the point where they can do some things that little kids can't really do."

Hubbard said he doesn't call it "dance" at first, but "discovery movement exploration." After students have turned movements, he talks about "naming" those movements into dance.

"We talk about the design principles, the space principles, line, energy — all those things that deal with movement and how using those and varying those can change movement. We talk about changing it from just kind of ordinary or athletic or pedestrian movement into dance," he said.

"Everybody always thinks that dance movements come from such a weird place. The truth is, it all came from things that people were doing already. You know, in ballet, all the foot positions are right out of fencing. The arm positions, likewise, are all from out of fencing. A lot of the steps for ballet came from folk dance, ethnic dance. So I try to impress upon them (students) that they aren't something bizarre that came in from outer space and a bunch of weirdos developed it. It's actually evolved from things that people were already doing."

Hubbard said that, similarly, breakdancing is a new arrangement of old movements.

"Head spins and back spins; those are all out of Brazilian martial arts," he said. "The moon walk is basically a pantomime walk. Mime has been around for hundreds of years. It's a rearrangement, or new way of thinking, of those old movements."

"It's like what I tell the kids. I have a lot of energy and dance is a constructive channel for my energy. We probably all know somebody when they were in school who was in trouble because they were poking, shoving, talking, not listening, never in their seat when they were supposed to be. I was one of those people."

## Family mourns pop artist Warhol; will leaves millions to foundation

PITTSBURGH — Family members mourned pop artist Andy Warhol at a private open casket viewing Wednesday with no hint of the glamour that surrounded the man whose colorful images of the ordinary lighted up the art world.

Meanwhile, in New York, Warhol's will was filed, revealing an estate valued at \$10 million to \$15 million and leaving millions of dollars to establish a visual arts foundation.

Warhol's holdings included extensive Manhattan real estate, stocks and securities and a massive art collection, according to the nine-page typewritten will filed in Manhattan Surrogate's Court.

All but several hundred thousand

dollars left to two brothers and a friend are to go to the foundation.

At the service here, about a dozen family members, some wearing blue jeans, brushed by reporters gathered outside a funeral home in a quiet residential area.

None of the celebrities with whom Warhol surrounded himself attended the afternoon viewing, although rock artist Mick Jagger and his girlfriend, model Jerry Hall, sent lilies from New York.

Plans for the funeral were not released. Warhol, born Andrew Warhola, died Sunday at age 58 at New York Hospital following gall bladder surgery. Autopsy results were pending.

"My uncle kept to himself pretty much," said Martin Warhola, who

operates a scrap metal business with his father, Paul. "My uncle Andy, he's an unusual guy... We'll really miss him, you know."

Warhol rarely returned to his native Pittsburgh after he graduated from Carnegie Institute of Technology in 1949.

Warhola said his uncle's life in the glitz of New York was a long way from his working class roots.

"There was no real reason for him to come back," Warhola said.

The artist tried to shroud his past in mystery, rarely even referring to his years growing up in Pittsburgh's Soho district and other parts of town.

Joseph Fitzpatrick, who taught Warhol art here, remembered him as "very talented academically as well as experimentally."

# 'Crosscurrents' photography to open at Herrett

**TWIN FALLS** — "Crosscurrents: Experimental Visions in Photography" opens Tuesday at the Herrett Museum Art Gallery on the campus of the College of Southern Idaho.

The invitational show features works by regional photographers Cal Sparks, Peter Vincent, Dianne Kornberg and Craig Law, and by CSI photography professor Wesley Wada.

The public is invited to attend the opening reception from 7 to 9:30 p.m. at the museum. Craig Law and Wesley Wada will give a gallery talk at 7 p.m.

The 125 photographs assembled into 25 works explore unusual approaches to the photographic medium.

The exhibit ranges from conceptual art, arranged imagery, hand-coloring, three-dimensional work and non-silver printing processes.

Cal Sparks, director of the University of Denver School of Art, is a conceptual photographer and performance artist. His work explores the diverse connections between objects and their photographic likenesses. Each work illustrates how a viewer's perception of meaning is altered by language, comparison and sequence. In his work "Package Piece," 52 rubber stamps are heat-sealed in plastic bags, each containing a photograph that relates in some way to the word on the stamp.

Dianne Kornberg, professor of photography at Lindfield College in Oregon, photographs arrangements of objects found along coastal beaches, estuaries and inland waters. For her, these environments represent areas of transition where objects of a mystical nature can be found. In Kornberg's color work, objects such as crab shells are combined with plums, strings and hand-colored backgrounds.

Peter Vincent, formerly of Pocatello and now living in Colorado, works with complex still-life collages of advertising and mass media images. The satirical work is a reaction to the abundance of pictures assaulting the public. Vincent playfully contrasts the reality and the myths of mass media.

Craig Law, photography professor at Utah State University, is noted for his work in non-silver processes,

some of which were popular in the early stages of photography history. He uses negatives as large as the final prints to produce classic impressions of the human figure and the landscape.

The College of Southern Idaho is represented by Wada, who is showing a new series of photographic views that change appearance as the viewer moves. The works are part of a continuing exploration of ways to create multiple imagery.

Wada uses organic forms to produce objects with the look and feel of natural history artifacts.

The exhibit is on view to the public through April 2 on Tuesdays 9:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., Wednesdays-Fridays 9:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Saturdays, 1 to 4:30 p.m.

Dance gave me a channel for that energy that was constructive, rather than destructive."

The children scuff, hop, run, walk and slide back to their original places on the floor.

"Go straight to your spot," he says. "Okay! Now! Listen!

Music fills the room.

On signal, 27 five-year-olds rise slowly from their places on the floor. They lift both hands over their heads and sway gently back and forth like trees in a wind.

On cue again, 27 bodies cheerfully collapse, arms and legs littering the floor. They begin their familiar

journey, rolling across the room.

"Make the balloon now," he calls over the music. "Stay down on your knees. Are those your knees? Those are your feet! Let people in!"

Fifty-four knees light for a home. "Let people in!"

The balloon is made. It lifts and begins to float slowly away.

"I like dancing," said Nic Wilson, a member of Diana Nelson's second-grade class and a participant in Hubbard's program. "It encourages me about the movement of my body."

"It's fun to dance," agreed classmate Sonia Rodriguez. "It reminds me of a song."

# 'Hoosiers' is engaging Americana; 'Platoon' destroys war conceptions

**CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13).** The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian-tourism ads) is at the heart of this movie, which he designed and co-wrote for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Koslowski's inquisitive newsday reporter in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser, but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

**HOOSIERS (PG).** This film is as engaging as modest, as utterly American and as thrilling as the real-life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals. It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper (Oscar nominee for Best Supporting Actor) as the alcoholic ex-hoops-star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can't hate basketball and yet still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

**THE MISSION (PG).** The film is haunting spectacle, serious and passionate and — in many ways — successful; it provides Jeremy Irons with a chance for his purest and most searing film performance, and it gives Robert De Niro another of those nearly impossible physical challenges he thrives on. But the picture lingers with its idealized views of the Guarani Indians, its general lack of surprise and occasional deadly lines of dialogue that would defeat Olivier (they rout De Niro).

**LIGHT OF DAY (PG-13).** Paul Schrader tries to catch the sociocultural clashes of rock 'n' roll in this family drama (the music dancing a knife-edge between evil and freedom) and though it is a sympathetic, intelligent film, he misses them. But Michael J. Fox stretches himself. Joan Jett is a

**PLATOON (R).** This is movie making with a zealot's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War-movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison; "Platoon" is at ground zero. And, not incidentally, Stone may have put a stake through the heart of all the slick Rambo heroes ever to slide onto a screen.

**MANNEQUIN (PG).** A dreamy, warm-hearted jerk falls in love with a beautiful mannequin (a reincarnated Egyptian princess) who through courage and faith, helps him become a stellar window-dresser and the failing department store's savior. It is sort of a cute idea but, in the shallow, follow-the-numbers screenplay, by first-time director Michael Gottlieb, that's what it stays: sort of cute. Gottlieb has a fairly lively, TV commercial style and a smart, bright cast (Andrew McCarthy, Kim Cattrall, Estelle Getty, Mesach Taylor) who mug at the camera. They keep things sort of diverting — but only for undemanding audiences.

**Emmy-winner James Coco dead at 56**

NEW YORK (AP) — James Coco, the versatile, Emmy award-winning actor, died late Wednesday after suffering a heart attack. He was 56.

Coco was admitted to St. Vincent's Hospital at 8:30 p.m., but efforts to revive him were unsuccessful and Coco died at 11:10 p.m. said hospital spokesman Paul Simonetti.

Capt. Thomas M. Ryan of the Emergency Medical Service said an ambulance was summoned at 7:45 p.m. to Coco's Greenwich Village home and arrived three minutes later. Simonetti said Coco had suffered a heart attack.

The balding, rotund Coco was a veteran of Broadway, television and motion pictures.

His big break came in the Broadway production of Neil Simon's "The Last of the Red Hot Lovers" in 1969. Only the year before, he was best known as Willie, the chubby plumber on Drano commercials.

In the Broadway show, which ran for more than 700 performances, Coco portrayed a middle-aged, overweight married restaurant owner trying to join the sexual revolution and falling in three assignments with women. Coco was nominated for Tony, but didn't win.

He won his Emmy in 1983 for outstanding supporting actor in a drama series for his appearance in an episode on NBC-TV's "St.

Elsewhere." He also won two Obie awards for off-Broadway appearances.

Other Broadway appearances included "Man of La Mancha" in 1967 and "You Can't Take It With You" in 1983. His film credits included "The Muppets Take Manhattan" in 1984.

"When I was around 8, my mother began taking me to the movies and I got hooked by Hollywood and the glamour of the stars. I begged to see everything. The Hardy Hardy movies. All of Garland, Priscilla Lane, Belle Davis and Paul Muni were my idols," he told an interviewer when "Red Hot Lovers" made him a star.

"In a sense, I was formed by the movies. I got most of my ideas and fantasies from them and I think I must have started imagining what it could like to be an actor when I was sitting in the darkness of some Loew's movie palace."

Born in the New York City on March 21, 1930, Coco led an unglamorous life before hitting the big time, working as a toy salesman, night clerk, waiter and dishwasher.

He became a stage manager of a touring children's theater while still in his teens, and appeared in his first role as Old King Cole. He went on to become a character actor in summer stock and Off-Broadway before appearing on Broadway in "Man of La Mancha" and "Red Hot Lovers." His other films include "A New

Leaf," "The Strawberry Statement," "Tell Me That You Love Me, Julie Moon," "Such Good Friends," "Man of La Mancha," "The Wild Party" and "Murder by Death." His last film was the "The Muppets Take Manhattan."

Coco also made numerous guest appearances on various television series. Among were the "Marcus Welby, M.D.," show, "The Flip Wilson Show" and "Who's The Boss." He was also a regular on the Johnny Carson Show.

Coco also made the interview show circuit to promote his book, "The James Coco Diet."

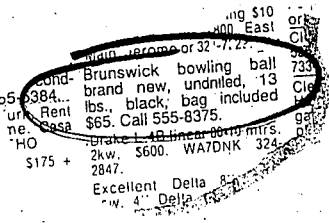

# Alcoholic wife, workaholic spouse portrayed in atypical home setting

This week, viewers will see a TV movie about an alcoholic wife and a workaholic husband. This certainly sounds like just another overdone melodrama. Haven't we seen this in dozens of other "relevant" TV movies?

But this was no ordinary couple: It was the first lady and president of the United States.

"Admittedly, 'The Betty Ford Story' is not the most dramatic alcohol-abuse story ever shown on TV," says director David Greene ("Roots," "Fatal Vision"). "But the whole point is that she was the first lady. Nobody really knew she was under the influence. That's what makes the story so strong."

In the movie (airing 8 p.m. Monday on KIVI), Gena Rowlands plays Betty Ford, and Josef Sommer ("Witness") plays Gerald Ford. The movie chronicles the first lady's battles with alcohol and prescription-drug dependency as well as her much-publicized bout with breast cancer.

Betty Ford had script approval and OK'd all changes and cuts. Most of the film's dialogue was taken from interview sessions that writer Karen Hall (who's also a writer and story editor for "Moonlighting") held in Palm Springs with the former first lady. Greene promises the movie will feature lots of private, behind-the-scenes White House material.

"For example, you've never seen people go to bed in the White House together," says Greene, who says the Fords were the first White House couple to actually share the same bedroom. "You will here."

The movie opens in 1973 against the backdrop of the Watergate hearings and Gerald Ford's appointment as Richard Nixon's vice president to replace Spiro Agnew, who had resigned.

"They were looking forward to retiring when Ford accepted Nixon's offer," says Greene. "I don't think Ford ever thought he would become president. They had a strong marriage. But the White House put a lot of strain on it."

Betty Ford had blamed political campaigning pressures and her husband's absence and work habits for her drinking. "She did her drinking with secrecy, but she was open about it," says Greene. "She never

drank alone. She would do little bits of gentle subterfuge like making her drink stronger or say things like 'Let's have a drink before we go out because it will be too crowded to get to the bar when we get there.' It wasn't like 'The Lost Weekend,' where the alcoholic hid the bottle in the chandelier."

She began pulling herself out of the nightmare when her children confronted her after hearing stories about her falling asleep at dinner or falling down.

"It ends with Betty facing the truth about herself," says Greene.

"She realizes that she can't be perfect and recognizes that Gerry isn't going to work any less harder."

One final scene shows her turning the first shovelful of dirt at the future site of the Betty Ford Center, a Rancho Mirage, Calif. alcohol-and drug-abuse clinic that has attracted numerous celebrities.

# 'Y&R' vet McCook coaxed by Bell for role in new 'Bold and Beautiful'

John McCook, Susan Flannery, Judith Baldwin and company began shooting Bill Bell's "The Bold and the Beautiful" this week for the CBS soap's premiere March 23.

Following gallery photo sessions a few days ago, Bell assembled the cast for a getting-to-know-you meeting, providing each actor with a background story on his character — his family, school, disposition. Not a script was in sight. Bell intends to keep the opening a surprise, and hopes to outsmart snooping soap reporters.

John McCook, once known as pretty boy Lance Prentiss on "The Young and the Restless" until he skipped just before the soap went to an hour, returned to soaps under Bell's coaxing. He plays a "Ralph Lauren type," Eric Forrester (the name may change), head of a flourishing Los Angeles fashion house. Susan Flannery, once known as Dr. Laura Horton on "Days of Our Lives," plays Eric's wife, the mother of kids in their early 20s.

That would put McCook and Flannery in their late 40s, yet McCook lacks the wrinkles to play middle age. The discrepancy doesn't bother Bell. He recalls a mother-daughter combination where the actresses' age difference was only a few years. Bell told McCook, "Viewers may be startled at first, but they get used to it very quickly. You don't have to look 49."

"I'm playing a father, not a patriarch off in a corner, explaining the action," says McCook. "I run the business. My other lady is played by Judy Baldwin.

"This is about two L.A. families, the rich and the poor. We will shoot on locations at times, covering Beverly Hills, Venice and the downtown area. Bill Bell knows story, and we can add the glamour stuff."

Last December, Bell called McCook with the new soap idea. Able to survive in the "real" world with jobs in prime time and theater, McCook was ambivalent. Bell tried again. "I'm thinking of a glamour character," he said. "We can use your theatricality and lightness. Let me think of you in the role for a while."

In early January, the two met again; and McCook accepted the role. It meant giving up summer theater, at least for one season. But

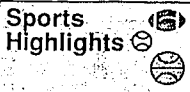

## Hartman completes final show

NEW YORK — After his last "Good Morning America" Feb. 20, David Hartman signed his name on a wall of the set, then hugged a burly cameraman as the assembled crew applauded.

The cameraman hurried away. "If I stay around here, I'm gonna start crying," he said.

The small studio from which GMA originates was crowded with staff members and well-wishers who wanted to be there when Hartman bid adieu after 11 years as host of the morning show.

His first day was GMA's first day, Nov. 3, 1975.

Several boxes of tissues were scattered around the set just in case things got mushy, but the atmosphere was more party than waka.

Studio guests included astronaut Joe Engle, comedian Joe Piscopo and Dr. Norman Vincent Peale.

There were videotaped highlights

of Hartman's tenure at GMA and satellite-beamed farewells from first lady Nancy Reagan, former Presidents Gerald Ford and Jimmy Carter, and many other dignitaries and celebrities interviewed by Hartman over the years.

Hartman's popular, gosh-darn manner is largely credited with turning GMA into a solid ratings champ for several years and keeping it a consistent competitor with NBC's "Today," now rated No. 1 among the morning shows.

Over at "Today," hosts Bryant Gumbel and Jane Pauley applauded Hartman and suggested he might even turn up on their show in the future.

"Do you think he's going to run for the Senate one day, as has been rumored?" wondered Gumbel.

"If he does, maybe he'll come announce here on 'Today,'" replied Pauley.

# Hype job on 'Amerika' does little to improve ABC's ratings stature

NEW YORK — Despite its super-rated miniseries "Amerika," ABC was third in last week's prime-time average Nielsen ratings.

NBC was the decisive winner, while CBS barely edged ABC for second place.

Marvin Mord, ABC vice president for marketing and research services, said the network was happy with the miniseries' ratings even though it did not do as well as ABC had predicted.

"Amerika" ended up with an average rating of 19.0 and a 29 share, a few share points lower than ABC had hoped.

The rating is a percentage of all homes that have televisions. The share is a percentage of homes with televisions in use.

"It was a strong performance for us," Mord said. "The fact that we were within about a 10 percent range of where we hoped to be is still a good indicator of its performance and strength."

ABC estimated that 100 million viewers saw all or part of "Amerika." The miniseries had drawn considerable attention because of its provocative premise. It was set in a United States that had been under Soviet rule for 10 years.

The 14½-hour miniseries was on for seven nights, beginning Feb. 14 and concluding Sunday. Only one installment made it into the top 10 last week.

The opening episode got the highest ratings of the seven, but was on the tail-end of the previous week when its 38 share pulled ABC into second place.

Strong performances by all three networks last week put them back in their usual one-two-three slots, although ABC was up by about 2 ratings points, as were total network viewers.

February is a "sweeps" month, one of four periods a year when local ratings determine affiliated stations' advertising rates. The networks typically load their schedules

with special programming to help draw bigger audiences.

Mord said "Amerika" helped improve ABC's ratings by about 25 percent, boosted regular programming and gave the network a much-needed promotional platform.

According to the A.C. Nielsen Co., NBC won the week with an average rating of 18.2. CBS had a 16.6 and ABC 16.4. The season-to-date averages are: NBC 18.0; CBS 16.1; ABC 14.3.

In prime time, NBC has won 19 of the 22 weeks in the season thus far and was on its way to a three-year winning streak of "sweeps" periods.

The top 10 shows last week were: "The Cosby Show," "Family Ties," "Night Court," "Murder, She Wrote," "Golden Girls," "60 Minutes," "The Miss USA Beauty Pageant," "Who's the Boss," "Amerika, Part II" and "L.A. Law." NBC's "L.A. Law" was in the top 10 for the first time with its highest

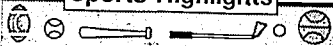

# Death knell for long miniseries possible result of 'Amerika' bust

NEW YORK — If criticism of "Amerika" from the left, the right, the Soviet Union, the United Nations and TV reviewers could be exchanged for ratings, ABC might have had a mega-winner of a miniseries. However, despite all the fuss and attendant publicity over the nearly 15-hour program, it didn't even average the minimum 35 percent share of audience that ABC expected when "Amerika" began its seven-night run Feb. 15. It averaged a 29 percent share.

The disappointing ratings are like-

ly to make it even tougher for writers and producers to persuade the cost-conscious networks to undertake such drawn-out miniseries in the future. Officials at ABC, CBS and NBC say they are primarily looking for projects of not more than six or eight hours, rather than the 10-plus hours that have marked such miniseries hits as "Roots," "Shogun," "Rich Man, Poor Man," "The Thorn Birds" and "Winds of War."

CBS Entertainment President Bud Grant declined to call the long miniseries dead, but "I would say it's an endangered species because of the high risk. Everything in television is risk, and that (the long-form show) is extraordinarily high risk."

ABC's has a miniseries of record-breaking length in the works for next season — the 30-hour "War and Remembrance," Herman Wouk's sequel to "Winds of War." But ABC-TV President John B. Sias already has said that, because of high costs and flat advertising revenues in today's television marketplace, it is "highly unlikely" that future ABC miniseries will exceed six hours.

A Monday-morning postmortem,

offered by an advertising executive who asked not to be identified, was that the show seemed padded with lingering gazes by the major characters, and in general was "boring, boring, boring."

There was no immediate comment on the ratings from ABC Entertainment President Brandon Stoddard, who was reported en route to Minneapolis to participate Monday night in an ABC News "Viewpoint" panel on "Amerika."

At NBC, meanwhile, Susan Baerwald, vice president for miniseries, said she would not rule out altogether the possibility of undertaking a maxi-length miniseries. "I think the only rules you can make are to find a good story and suit the length of it to what the story is telling," she said.

But she also suggested that it was not likely: "I have rarely read a piece of material that I think couldn't be done in eight hours or less."

Baerwald has six miniseries lined up for next season. She said that while there are no hard-and-fast rules, doing even an eight-hour mini nowadays "is very, very difficult, and beyond that, almost impossible, because of the financial implications going in."

"Designing Women," a half-hour sitcom starring Dixie Carter, Delta Burke, Annie Potts and Jean Smart as wisecracking Southern belles,

started out with respectable ratings on Monday night, but was replaced with "The Cavanaughs," which has also done well in the time period.

"Designing Women" was moved to Thursdays where it languished opposite NBC's sitcom lineup. Fans of the show complained, and it was pulled again and put on Sundays as part of CBS' experiment with replacing the Sunday movie.

"Hard Copy," a midseason replacement about a hard-bitten crime reporter, played by Michael Murphy, debuted after the "Super Bowl" last month, but has not prospered in the ratings.

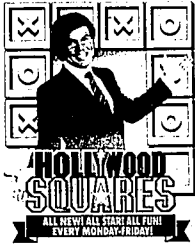

# NBC News president Grossman quietly agrees to remain on board

WASHINGTON — NBC News president Larry Grossman, whose contract was up this month, has quietly made a deal with the network to remain at the helm of what

is currently the number one network news organization.

The word on the agreement was to be circulated in an internal newsletter at NBC Tuesday, a deliberate effort to keep the announcement low key.

Grossman said Tuesday he would

not discuss details of his new arrangement but confirmed that "I'm pleased, (NBC president) Bob Wright is pleased and all is well."

Since leaving the presidency of PBS in early 1974 to become president of NBC News, Grossman has survived some early disasters named "Summer Sunday," "Almanac" and "1986."

Meanwhile, by assembling an enterprising new staff and the judicious on-air promotion of his products, Grossman has made a success out of "Main Street," returned "Today" to money-making pre-eminence in the morning and boosted "NBC Nightly News With Tom Brokaw" to the point that it's beating once-unbeatable "CBS Evening News With Dan Rather" on a fairly regular basis (seven out of the last 10 weeks, for instance). He's also raised morale in the division, which had seen a parade of presidents in recent years.

Since General Electric bought parent RCA and installed Robert C. Wright as president of NBC last summer, Grossman has also prevailed in a couple of very public in-house battles with Wright — most notably on budget matters and Wright's ill-conceived idea of forming a political action committee at the network, which could have included News division employees.

Late last year there was even talk Grossman might move on, after reports leaked of shouting matches between the two (one of which was resolved only after GE chairman Jack Welch dispatched a helicopter to bring Grossman and Wright to GE's Connecticut headquarters for a reconciliation). Wright and Grossman reportedly get along just fine now, as the reportedly generous new pact suggests.

CNN (and Mutual Radio) talk show host Larry King was reported resting comfortably at George Washington University Hospital here Tuesday after what was described as a "mild heart attack."

He was driven to the hospital in the morning after suffering chest pains.

King had been scheduled to interview Ferdinand and Imelda Marcos Thursday night on his "Larry King Live" CNN show. Bernard Shaw was to sub for him.

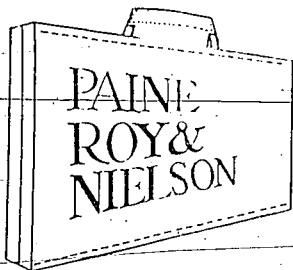
