Reagan hails fast progress in arms talks

WASHINGTON — President Reagan on Thursday hailed the progress in the intermediate-range arms talks with the Soviet Union as a "great breakthrough" toward an agreement to eliminate those missiles from Europe and limit each side to 100 warheads elsewhere.

Although verification still looms as the major obstacle to success, Reagan said the administration's policies of "preparedness, patience and firmness" had produced the change in the Soviet position last weekend that puts an agreement within reach.

"I've never felt more optimistic about the prospects for success in this area than I do today," he told a meeting of the National Newspaper Association here. However, he singled out shorter-range missiles and verification as key remaining difficulties.

"We need to agree on equitable constraints on shorter-range INF (intermediate nuclear force) missiles because the Soviets must not be able to circumvent an agreement on the longer-range missiles through a build-up on the shorter-range ones. And to be sure that the Soviets keep their word, we must continue to insist that all agreements will be effectively verifiable."

Verification measures designed to police the agreement promise to be the biggest problem by far, senior officials and non-government experts say, as the United States seeks what some specialists have ironically labeled "social verification" — meaning "cradle to grave" monitoring of missiles from their production through deployment and eventual dismantling and destruction.

Such demanding requirements in the proposed U.S. treaty have drawn objections from West Germany and Britain. "The Soviets, under the wording of the draft, could even go into Langley searching for missiles," one U.S. official said. Langley is the headquarters of the Central Intelligence Agency.

The U.S. verification provision would give Soviet officers inspection rights on U.S. territory and within the borders of Britain, West Germany, Italy and Belgium, where U.S. intermediate-range Pershing 2 and cruise missiles have been deployed.

As a result of allied complaints, the administration is willing to ease some of the stricter conditions in the package of verification measures before it is formally transmitted to the Soviets as an annex to the draft treaty that was presented to them this week, a senior official said.

For example, the draft sent to the allies proposed that the Soviet Union and the United States would allow on-site inspection at any facility suspected of producing, storing and assembling the weapons. Now, however, the wording may be revised to require that the suspect facility be shown to be related to INF production or storage.

A senior U.S. official acknowledged that even the White House had balked at some of the verification measures initially requested by the Pentagon. He said the U.S. package consists of three elements:

- An "initial base-line count," or inventory, of the existing missiles on both sides and a continuous exchange of data as the count changes.

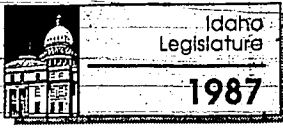
GOP leaders lower target for budget

BOISE — Republican legislative leaders directed their budget chairman Thursday to target drafting efforts toward an overall 1988 spending blueprint of around \$47 billion as House leaders began revamping a state school aid plan strongly objected to by the Senate.

The directive, issued during a closed-door session between House and Senate leaders and the committee chairmen, came as the House seemed reluctant to move on revenue-raising bills needed to finance an earlier leadership budgeting goal of \$50 million or slightly more.

"It doesn't mean we necessarily stop at that



number," Senate President Pro Tem James Risch, R-Boise, said. "We begin there, and writing a school budget is a matter of give and take."

But the new budget target is about \$15 million below the recommendation of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus, and House Appropriations Chair-

man Kathleen Gurnsey, R-Boise, said meeting it will require a state school aid proposal below even the \$33.3 million plan circulating among House Republicans this week and criticized by many of their counterparts in the Senate.

The move was likely to build the pressure for action on any of a number of tax-increase proposals pending in the House Revenue and Taxation Committee as a number of lawmakers predicted a school budget below the \$33.3 million option would have a difficult time passing even the House.

"You're missing the amount of money just about equal to the investment tax credit," Andrus said.

Alabama schools clearing bookshelves

MOBILE, Ala. — School workers began pulling books from shelves Thursday to comply with a federal judge's order banning 45 texts from Alabama classrooms on grounds they promote a godless humanist religion.

Gov. Guy Hunt gave no indication whether he wants to appeal Wednesday's ruling by U.S. District Judge W. Brevard Hand.

However, critics all but guaranteed they will seek to throw out the order, which they called a frightening form of judicial censorship aimed at giving religious fundamentalists a foot inside the schoolhouse door.

Attorney General Edwin Meese, testifying Thursday before the House Judiciary Committee in Washington, D.C., said he has serious concerns about Hand's order.

"I have a great reservation, quite frankly about banning, about judges interlocking with local decision-making, and particularly prescribing what should be taught in schools or not taught in schools," Meese said.

Hand, ruling that secular humanism is a religion, said Wednesday the use of the textbooks in public schools violates the Constitution's prohibition against the establishment of a religion by the state.

According to fundamentalists, secular humanism is the elevation of spiritual values over eternal spiritual values, and secular humanists believe that humans can handle their own affairs without divine intervention.

"With these books, the state of Alabama has overstepped its mark, and must withdraw to perform its proper non-religious functions," Hand said.

Some of the books appear to be used by tens of thousands of students, though textbook records showed that most would be replaced anyway by this fall. In Mobile, city school board spokeswoman Jo Peary said three home economics books and one history book covered by the court ban are in use by nearly 7,000 pupils.

School officials began removing the books Thursday, she said. "If these books are not removed right away, then the local board would be subject to contempt citation," said Robert Campbell, attorney for the schools.

Other school systems delayed removing books.

In Huntsville, where schools use two home economics books and one history text affected by the ruling, the books will not be withdrawn until the get direction from the state," said Don Tubbs, instruction and curriculum director. "There probably will be appeals and we'll have our lawyers review it."

Meanwhile, at a news conference, former U.S. Rep. John Buchanan, chairman of the Washington-based People for the American Way, said Hand "sadly erred" in ordering the books banished.

But Hufft, a Primitive Baptist minister who is chairman of the State Board of Education, the main defendant in the case, refused to give an opinion on the matter.

"We will continue to watch this very important litigation as it moves through the federal court system and, of course, the state of Alabama will comply with all final orders of the court," he said.

Press secretary Terry Abbott said Hunt would discuss the issue when the school board takes it up later. A date for such a session was not set.

Returning difficult for Salvadorans

SAN SALVADOR, El Salvador — Salvadorans who must leave the United States because of a new U.S. immigration law face shortages of jobs, land and housing in their homeland, devastated by years of civil war, business leaders say.

An estimated 75,000 Salvadorans live illegally in the United States. Business leaders said as many as 500,000 might return to El Salvador because of the new law. El Salvador now has a population of about 5 million.

The law, passed in November, granted amnesty to illegal aliens who arrived in the United States before 1982, but it also set up a system of fines for employers who knowingly hire illegal aliens.

Since then, some Central Americans in the United States have moved on to Canada, which used to admit anyone claiming to flee persecution. But Canada last month changed that policy, and now most refugees have to apply for entry permits at Canadian consulates abroad.

Alan C. Nelson, the commissioner of the U.S. Immigration and Naturalization Service, has said the law's effects will only be felt gradually and there won't be a flood of people returning from the United States to their homelands.

But Victor Steiner, president of the Chamber of Commerce and Industry, said the possibility of thousands of Salvadorans returning home is "really of great concern to us."

"We've all just started to think what this can mean," Steiner said in an interview this week. "Are these people going to join the guerrillas to stay alive?"

The economy has been shattered by seven years of civil war between the U.S.-backed government of President Jose Napoleon Duarte and leftist guerrillas. About 62,000 people have been killed, and thousands have fled their homes.

"According to some estimates, more than 50 percent of the work force have no steady employment or no job at all."

The economy was rocked further last October by a devastating earthquake that killed more than 1,500 people and left tens of thousands homeless.

"The social and economic impact of the massive return of Salvadorans with the women, could even wipe out the conservative newspaper-Diario de Hoy said in an editorial.

In addition, Salvadorans living in

Farm bank woes ease

WASHINGTON — Problems facing banks in the country's Farm Belt appear to be easing somewhat with the amount of farm debt down and the percentage of delinquent loans also down, according to a report prepared by an economist at the Federal Reserve Board.

The report said that total farm debt declined to \$180 billion last year, an 8 percent drop from the year before and down substantially from a peak of \$220 billion in the summer of 1983.

Farm debt, excluding loans made through the Commodity Credit Corp., fell even faster, dropping to

\$165 billion at the end of 1986, an improvement of \$19 billion over the total at the end of 1985.

The total of farm loans not secured by real estate which were delinquent fell to \$2.9 billion at the end of last year, down from \$3.5 billion a year ago.

The delinquency rate of these loans dropped to 9.4 percent on Dec. 31, 1986, putting it well below the peak of 13.9 percent on March 31 of last year, the report said. A loan was classified as delinquent if a payment was at least 30 days past due.

The report was prepared by Emanuel Melichar, the Fed's expert on agricultural banks. It was dated

Police seek man who wooed many women

SEATTLE — Police are seeking a former airline-flight engineer who they believe has been married to as many as six women, fathered as many as 16 children and maintained homes in at least four states.

The search for John Charles Lutter, a 45-year-old former flight engineer for United Airlines, began last summer after several of the women reported him missing.

King County prosecutors filed a bigamy charge against him in September.

Lutter's Seattle-area wife, who married him in 1980 and has filed for divorce, said she thought she was the only woman in his life.

"He was a religious man, and he also told me he was a one-woman man; the other women said he told them that, too," said the woman, who had a baby by Lutter.

The woman, who did not want her identity disclosed, has since learned that Lutter may also have been married to women in other places, including Florida, California and Colorado. Some of the marriages may have been by common law, police said.

Lutter's whereabouts are unknown, though his attorney, John Etienne, in San Mateo, Calif., said Thursday that Lutter has been in contact with him periodically.

"I don't think the man is fleeing," Etienne said in a telephone interview. "The last time in

this office ... he appeared willing to get the mess squared away."

The attorney, who said he also represents Lutter's wife in Sacramento, Calif., indicated he was dismayed the story had gotten out and declined to say when he had last spoken with Lutter.

The women still love Lutter, he said, and "I was hoping this whole thing could be settled with the women, but even hoping I can even salvage his job with United Airlines."

Lutter married a woman in Sacramento in 1968, Etienne said.

He explained Lutter's attraction to several women as a "psychological problem."

 "Repeat of that tax credit, generating \$14.5 million for the new budget year, was a keystone of the Andrus spending plan he said would meet the 1986 campaign promises he and nearly every other candidate want to significantly increase state support for schools.
 Republican leaders, however, rejected repeal outright, claiming it would hurt Idaho's efforts to draw business to the state and help current businesses expand. But with the governor tying the money generated by repeal directly to education improvements, those leaders have been intent on matching the governor's spending levels for public and higher education.
 To reach that goal, the Republicans have pared away at other areas of spending, shaving money from inflationary adjustments, state employee salaries and expansions of some programs. But budget analysts said that with the

revenue bills likely to be approved this year, greater efforts would accommodate only a school aid budget of less than \$40 million.
 And one of those needed revenue bills, a doubling of the state cigarette tax effective immediately, continued to run into delays in the House. A floor vote on that measure, which will generate about \$3.5 million for the 1988 budget, was put off again on Thursday.
 The \$339.3 million school aid bill under review by House Republicans was quickly criticized by enough Senate Republicans as inadequate to effectively kill its chances for passage, and House Republican Caucus Chairman Dean Sorenson of Boise said portions of it were already being revised as criticism started surfacing in that chamber as well.
 The proposal is \$3 million below the Andrus recommendation and over \$6.7 million below the recommendations from the Education Committees in both chambers.
 House Speaker Tom Boyd, R-Genesee, concurred that there was "quite a strong feeling in the Senate, but the Senate leadership, that

there is a strong effort to come up in the government" in school aid.
 "It could prolong things a little bit," Boyd said of the disagreement.
 But to raise the spending level for schools near to or even with the governor's \$342.2 million proposal without destroying other state services will require an additional tax increase, something GOP leaders have been trying to avoid.
House conferees offer speed hike
 WASHINGTON (AP) — House conferees, bargaining with Senate negotiators on a massive highway and mass transit assistance bill, offered for the first time Thursday to allow states to increase their speed limits above 55 mph.
 But after a day of private meetings and public bargaining sessions, the lawmakers adjourned for the evening without reaching an agreement.

Reagan seeks final segment of aid package for Contras

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Reagan asked Congress on Thursday for the final installment in a \$100 million aid package for Nicaragua's Contra rebels, while House Democrats vowed to drive home the point that past aid money remains unaccounted for.
 The president, one day after saying in a major speech that the Iranian initiative was a mistake, declared it was time to move on to other matters.
 In a related development, The Washington Post, quoting informed sources, reported Friday that White House counsel Peter J. Wallison asked the "Tower" commission "not to disclose that Reagan gave two conflicting versions of when he approved Israel's 1985 shipments of U.S. arms to Iran."
 However, the board refused to delete details of the conflicting stories because they thought the change of mind was "a clear case of presidential manipulation" by his aides, the newspaper said.
 Wallison, contacted by telephone late Thursday night, denied the report.
 "It has always been my view that the president was trying to recall and had not definitely come to a decision," he said. "In talking to the Tower board staff — I never spoke to the Tower board — I told them that was my view."
 "The president was having a great

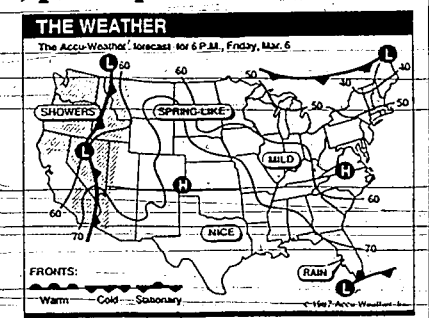
deal of difficulty recalling. Their opinion was that the president had made a definite recollection in the first meeting and changed it in that second meeting and chose to report it that way," Wallison said.
 The counsel said that when the Tower board's opinion on the conflicting reports became known, he and David Abshire, special counsel to the president on Iran-Contras, went to the White House to discuss what he approved the arms shipments.
 "We said then that this is the answer you have to give to the Tower board," Wallison said.
 On the subject of U.S. aid for the Contras, Reagan said Congress should certify that there is "no reasonable prospect" of peaceful settlement and a democratic Nicaragua unless the aid is continued.
 The certification automatically triggers \$40 million in additional aid unless Congress disapproves it within 15 days.
 The Democratic proposal, on the other hand, would shut off aid to the rebels — until previous aid is accounted for, including any money diverted from Iranian arms sales or solicited from private sources.
 "We as a party need to make a statement on this issue," said Rep. David Bonior, D-Mich. However, he said aid opponents probably do not have the votes to override an almost certain presidential veto of their action, which is expected to pass in the House but faces a less-certain future

in the Senate.
 In his certification to Congress, Reagan said that "continued intransigence by Nicaragua has prevented progress."
 Meanwhile, President Reagan's approval rating increased among Americans who watched his speech Wednesday night, polls by two television networks indicated.
 In other Iran-Contras developments on Thursday:
 • Robert C. McFarlane, Reagan's former national security adviser who was closely involved in the Iran initiative, said in an interview that Reagan's Wednesday night speech was courageous but that the president's admission that there was an effort toward an arms-for-hostages deal "makes us vulnerable to the recurrence of hostage-taking."
 • Articles of impeachment charging Reagan with misconduct in the Iran case were introduced in the House on Thursday by Rep. Henry B. Gonzalez, D-Texas. But they were given virtually no chance of being approved.
 • Secretary of State George Shultz, on a trip to China, and Defense Secretary Caspar Weinberger, commenting in Boston, took strong exception to the Tower report's contention that they merely distanced themselves from the Iran arms deal rather than fighting it "if don't operate that way," said Shultz.

 with the dismantling of weapons. Each side can inspect the other's facilities to ensure that the count is correct.
 "Disarmament and portal monitoring" of production-storage and final assembly facilities—each side could station men and equipment around these facilities and inspect crates above a certain size and weight that emerge from their "portals." The official said the Soviets have between six and eight facilities whose perimeters and portals would be monitored by about 200 Americans.
 "Designated deployment areas" for the 100 warheads each side could retain. Missiles would be permitted only there, but those within the designated areas would not be officially
 cancelled or inspected, though spy satellites might be able to accomplish that task. Any missiles found outside the areas would be considered violations.
 "Covert production" of the missiles at facilities not identified poses the most difficult problem. Production from such secret plants would be considered violations if detected outside the deployment areas.
 The United States wants all Soviet missiles in a region near Novosibirsk, about equally distant from Western Europe and the United States. The Soviets want the U.S. weapons within the 48 contiguous states, not in Alaska, where they would be within striking distance of Soviet targets.
 In addition, Mendelsohn said, the United States will call for on-site observation of the dismantling and destruction of those weapons over the permitted number. The Soviet would have to destroy about 410 SS-20 missiles, each of which now carries three warheads, leaving only 33 such weapons carrying 99 warheads. The United States would destroy 108 of the 206 currently deployed missiles, each of which has a single warhead.
 The Soviets, historically paranoid about foreigners on their territory, opposed the very principle of on-site inspection until last year. Although they now embrace it, they have yet to spell out what is acceptable and unacceptable degrees of intrusiveness.

 Foreign Minister Ricardo Acevedo Peralta said earlier this week that he would travel to the United States to seek "preferential treatment" for Salvadorans. He did not elaborate.
 "I'd be the last one to deny it will be a great problem," U.S. Embassy spokesman Jacob Gillespie said Wednesday.
 Many of the Salvadorans living in the United States say they fled persecution and political violence at home, but the U.S. Embassy says the bulk of the U.S. Embassy sought work in the United States, not refuge.
 "In the vast majority of cases, economic factors had a major or sole role in these persons electing to

enter the United States illegally rather than taking up residence in displaced persons' camps," the embassy said in a prepared statement.
 According to the Geneva-based Intergovernmental Committee for Migration, most Salvadorans returning home from the United States did not suffer harm.
 "The economy does not have the power to absorb these people," said Steiner, echoing the comments of about a half-dozen other business leaders.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Fire safety officials told Congress Thursday the tragedy at the Dupont Plaza Hotel might have been averted if the facility had possessed an automatic-sprinkler system, adequate fire detectors and a fire wall.

"This is a shame of the worst order," said Rep. Doug Walgren, D-Pa., chairman of a House science, space and technology subcommittee that reviewed the New Year's Eve fire in which 96 people were killed in San Juan, Puerto Rico.

Walgren, noting there is a large body of knowledge about fire prevention, said he called the hearing to discuss how Congress could play a role in ensuring that hotels across the country are safe.

Fire safety officials appearing before the panel said they believed the death toll at the Dupont Plaza would not have been as high had the hotel been properly equipped.

House passes homeless aid

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Democratic-controlled House, overcoming minor Republican opposition, passed legislation Thursday authorizing \$500 million in emergency aid to assist the nation's homeless this year.

The 254-112 vote came on a bill, introduced by the House Democratic Leadership, to provide emergency food and shelter, transitional housing, outpatient health services and conversion of surplus buildings.

The House approved the measure after killing an amendment by House Republican leader Robert Michel of Illinois which would have required that the funds come from already appropriated monies.

The emergency bill would authorize \$100 million for renovation of underused public buildings; \$70 million for charitable organizations and local governments that run food and shelter programs; \$30 million for transitional housing such as group homes; \$100 million for emergency shelters; \$100 million for rental subsidy "certificates" under federal low-income housing programs and \$100 million for emergency outpatient health care programs.

Emigres want trials in U.S.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Leaders of Ukrainian and Baltic emigre groups Thursday urged Attorney General Edwin Meese III not to deport alleged Nazi war criminals to the Soviet Union, but to hold war crimes trials here.

The groups met with Meese and argued against the deportation to the Soviet Union of Karl Linmas, 67, of Greentown, N.Y.; Linmas, a retired draftsman and land surveyor, was ordered deported to the Soviet Union for lying to immigration officials about his wartime activities when he entered the United States in 1951. The deportation order must be signed by Meese.

"With such a deportation, the United States would give a major propaganda victory to the Soviets, for it is a major goal of the Soviets to discredit the emigre communities, not only in the West, but also in Soviet-controlled territories," Anthony Mareika, president of the Coalition for Constitutional Justice and Security, said at a news conference before the meeting.

U.S. welcomes Soviet offer

WASHINGTON (AP) — The State Department on Thursday welcomed a Soviet offer to reduce chemical weapons as a step toward a verifiable, world-wide ban on them.

The Soviet offer is part of a long negotiation at the Conference on Disarmament at Geneva. A U.S. official in Geneva said the latest Soviet offer was the first direct acknowledgment by Moscow that it possesses such weapons.

In Washington, the State Department said the United States has known for years that the Soviets maintain the world's largest stockpile and that they continue to expand it.

The new proposals, made by Yuri Nasonkin, the chief Soviet delegate, reportedly call for a start on destruction of chemical weapons within six months after an agreement goes into force, with the destruction divided into nine one-year phases.

Bush looks to other issues

DAVENPORT, Iowa (AP) — Vice President George Bush said Thursday, "I wish I'd seen the signals" as President Reagan's Iran policy went awry, but told Republicans that the administration will be judged on arms control and other issues rather than "the agony of the Iran affair."

Bush, a former CIA director, said, "I'm catching the Dickens" for failing to see the Iran initiative. "Things are very clear, except fact; but I didn't see quite so clearly before," he added.

Resuming his unannounced campaign for the 1988 Republican presidential nomination, Bush also told about 300 GOP faithful it would be a mistake if the United States suddenly became less vigilant about political stability in the Persian Gulf.

Bush agreed that trading arms for hostages "wasn't so hot," but also insisted the United States would be reneging on its commitment if it lowered its vigilance in the Persian Gulf.

The vice president also said he takes no comfort in the fact that "I got very little ink" in the Tower commission report which was harshly critical of the arms-to-Iran deal.

Meese acts to preserve investigation

WASHINGTON (AP) — Attorney General Edwin Meese said Thursday he is appointing Lawrence Walsh to head a new office of independent counsel as "an insurance policy" against legal challenges by Lt. Col. Oliver L. North that threatened to torpedo Walsh's investigation into the Iran-Contra affair.

In doing so, Meese linked the independent counsel more closely to the executive branch of government, a result which Congress sought to avoid in enacting the 1978 Ethics in Government Act under which Walsh was appointed.

Walsh, however, endorsed the new arrangement.

In a statement, Meese said that a lawsuit filed by North, raising constitutional questions about the 1978 law, "places a question mark over Walsh's activities... By creating a parallel position securing to Judge Walsh the powers, authority and independence that the Ethics in Government Act provides, we remove that question mark."

The Justice Department, meanwhile, filed a motion to dismiss North's lawsuit on narrow procedural grounds. But the department refused to join Walsh in asserting that the independent counsel statute is constitutional.

Without referring to the constitutionality of the law, the department simply said North had no legal basis for challenging the legitimacy of Walsh's investigation. Department officials have long had doubts about the constitutionality of the law, which resulted in Walsh's appointment in December by a panel of three federal judges.

At a news conference, Meese also said he will meet with other independent counsels about the possibility of making similar arrangements, including the counsel investigating former White House aide Michael Deaver. Deaver has filed a suit similar to North's challenging the constitutionality of the 1978 law.

Meese was asked whether having an executive branch officer appoint

Walsh gives the appearance of a conflict of interest. The attorney general denied that was the case and said Walsh will have "essentially the same independence that the Ethics in Government statute provides."

Meese said he will have the same power to remove Walsh now that he would under the independent-counsel statute and that "obviously this would be a matter of public concern which such political risk that unless there was a clear case it would never be done."

Meese called the move "an insurance policy to absolutely make certain that whatever may happen in the future there is no question that Judge Walsh's activities are properly authorized by either one process or another."

Without protecting Walsh's position from constitutional challenges, witnesses might refuse to testify because they feared his ability to grant immunity, said Meese.

"Grand juries might be questionably constituted."

Walsh issued a statement saying that "we welcome the attorney general's willingness to eliminate any doubt which may have arisen as to the continuity of the independent counsel's investigation."

"By his action, the attorney general has conferred upon the independent-counsel the same powers and guarantees of independence which were conferred by the courts in its order of appointment," said Walsh.

"We believe the statute under which the court appointed an independent counsel is constitutional. But the attorney general's action will assure lack of interruption of the ongoing investigation."

North, a key figure in the Iran-Contra investigation, has filed suit arguing that the law which authorizes the appointment of independent counsels to investigate top administration officials is unconstitutional because it removes law enforcement powers from the executive branch.

Critics lash agency over slow lap-belt action

WASHINGTON (AP) — Seven months after a controversial federal study raised doubts about the protection afforded by lap-only automobile safety belts, critics charge that the Transportation Department has been slow in getting the belts replaced.

The study by the National Transportation Safety Board last August sparked controversy among highway safety experts because it for the first time suggested that rear-seat passengers might be better off in certain crashes not to wear the lap-only belts.

The findings continued to be hotly disputed by the government's top highway safety agency, the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, and some other safety organizations, which claim the study has wrongly persuaded some people not to use lap belts.

But critics say everyone agrees that shoulder belts provide better

protection than the lap-only belts, which are available on the rear seats of most cars.

They complain that the highway safety agency, part of the Transportation Department, has been too timid in getting automakers to make available kits that would allow car owners to replace the lap belts they now have. Also, they charge that the agency has done little to publicize the kits when they are available, and refused to initiate new regulations requiring shoulder belts on all new cars.

The highway agency's response to the NTSB study "has been lethargic at best," complains Clarence Dittow, director of the Center for Auto Safety. "Basically NHTSA has put its head in the sand... about this safety problem."

Diane Steed, head of the highway safety agency, has indicated several times since the NTSB report last

August that she intends to examine whether additional regulations are needed on the rear-seat belt issue.

"We haven't seen anything yet," says a staffer on the Senate Commerce Committee.



White House says tax hike unneeded

WASHINGTON (AP) — Deficit reduction does not require a tax increase, such as is being advocated by House Speaker Jim Wright, a White House spokesman said Thursday.

"We think it's unnecessary," said spokesman Marlin Fitzwater. "We are opposed to tax increases and a little surprised that the Democrats would choose to make tax increases their favorite issue again."

Wright, who has openly advocated a deficit-reducing tax increase for several months, met Thursday with Democrats on the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee and then with chairman from other House committees to make his pitch.



Focus investment or see it wasted

It may not come as a surprise, but nearly half of all patent applications filed in the United States in the year ending Sept. 30, 1986, did not go to Americans, but to foreigners.

Again, no surprise, but of that total, 40 percent were filed by Japanese inventors, the largest group outside of the United States.

The meaning of the numbers is apparent. Japanese industry has long been considered a threat to America in the production arena, but many Americans smugly think that the Japanese are somehow lagging in invention.

Not so. An article on this subject in a recent issue of *Insight* magazine makes the additional point that the patent threat should be seen as another call for investment in American education, particularly in the sciences and mathematics.

In a place like Idaho, that need suggests effective streamlining of programs at the higher education level. Not every school in the state can be all things to all people.

But instead of an intelligent discussion of how to create excellence, the office of Gov. Cecil Andrus is focused mostly on making sure narrow constituencies are protected.

There is a lot of hoopla on how Idaho's economy and education need "investment." But unless Idaho focuses that investment on specific programs, we predict that it will be mostly wasted.

All of America is paying a price for years of under-productivity, waste and bureaucracy, but the impact is particularly acute in places like Idaho which have less of an economic and educational base from which to build.



Lawsuit crisis poses threat to everyone

There are those who claim that the insurance pricing and/or availability problem is rooted more in the insurance company boardroom than in the U.S. courtroom.

There is some truth to the fact that the increased prices you are seeing are partially caused by the pressures of a competitive, free-market system. It is that system, incidentally, that kept insurance at rock bottom prices for five years prior to 1984.

Price increases, however, are perhaps more important, the lack of availability of certain lines of liability coverage are being severely exacerbated by a very specific factor: The increasingly serious crisis that is unfolding in our courtrooms... better known as the American Lawsuit Crisis, "Ligation Lottery" if you will, or "Deep Pocket Justice."

Let's examine some insurance industry facts compiled by independent sources and compare that with the fiction being disseminated by the ATLA and the TILA.

Over the past decade, the number of tort cases filed in federal court has increased 62 percent. But, more important, product liability cases in which products were blamed for injuries, increased 370 percent over this same time.

Data from a study by the International City Management Association show that the percentage of public officials being sued increased more than 70 percent in the first half of the 1980s.

From June 3 to June 21, 1986, 4 suits were filed in Magie Valley alone totalling \$4,550,000 against Twin Falls County and school district.

The insurance industries return on equity for the last 10 years is 10.8 percent, which is rather dismal by any set of standards. Whereas, the average return on equity for other industries, depending on the nature of the industry is from 17 to 20 percent.

During the last 4 years, all insurance industry earnings were the result of investment income. Not one dime came from underwriting, which is after all, supposed to be their primary business pursuit.

During 1985 the insurance industry had a negative return on their income. Investment income did not offset underwriting losses.

No, the lawsuit crisis is not just an insurance industry problem. It threatens us all. It involves everyone of us. Our courts have devised new theories to justify considerably expanded payments, as well as reinterpreting insurance contracts.

Simply put, the courts are adding coverage the insured did not buy, the insurance company did not sell and on which premiums were never paid. Perhaps it is time to re-examine its impact

against broader social implications. — The societal loss-to-benefit ratio, if you will.

Certainly not all of the legal profession is opposed to Tort Reform. It is only that rather small percentage (of the total) who might be considered "Insurance Plaintiffs Attorneys" for lack of a more descriptive term.

Eugene Thomas, Boise attorney and current president of the ABA, says, "the hard facts are that over the last 10 years insurance has been a lousy business for people who have been involved in a vast over simplification to try to dispose of the debate by pointing an accusing finger at them. Insurance companies are not good credit risks today. But Thomas says, the theory that the companies are taking the money and running just doesn't stand the test of logic, because some companies are going out of business or into receivership. That doesn't sound like someone exploiting the system."

Seventy-nine percent of the voting constituency in the state of Idaho are in favor of Tort Reform as proposed in HB 136. This overwhelming majority represents the world against a few "special interest" trial attorneys. It will be interesting to see if we truly have the "representative" form of government we so boastfully talk about.

Andrus move weakens National Guard

Governor Andrus has done it again. He has fired yet another second level manager in state government.

This time it is Brig. Gen. Ben Campbell, the assistant adjutant general for the Idaho Army National Guard. It was done quietly, without fanfare, without public announcement or stated cause.

Nobody challenges the "right" of a governor to do whatever is legal. We reserve the right to pass judgment on what he does however, as we elected him and he serves us all. In this case he has not served us well.

For the past 40 years my two predecessors and I worked hard and long to keep the National Guard out of politics. Now all of that has changed. The governor has moved beyond the top position and has dictated who will not serve in the working ranks of the guard. In addition, he is dictating who will be promoted all of which has overtones of the old spoils system. To a professional military organization, which the Idaho Guard is, this entire matter is at the very least a disgusting insult.

Contrary to some beliefs the Guard does not "belong" to the governor, the adjutant general or any other single individual, but rather to the communities of our state and to the members themselves.

Though maybe not perfect in every way, the military standards of qualification, merit and performance are understood and accepted by Guard members as "the way to go." Interfereing political considerations into the people processes of the Guard will only confuse the members and prostitute the system.

In short, the thinking process will shift from: "How well am I qualified and how well do I perform?" to "Who do I know and what was my track record during the last campaign." There is not room for both in any military organization worth having.

Whoever takes Campbell's place cannot help

but wonder who his boss really is, what yardstick will be used to measure performance and whether his job will last beyond four years. Other Guard leaders are wondering the same.

The National Guard is a strong organization because of the people who are in it and because its roots are deep in the communities of Idaho. It will survive Campbell's dismissal because of its strength but not with quite the degree of pride it has had and not with the degree of respect it has always had for the commander-in-chief.

If the governor senses a rather cool reception in Guard circles, it is explainable. Those in business and education that are familiar with Campbell's performance are already questioning the governor's decision quietly if not publicly. Unfortunately, those in the Guard may now be fearful of expressing their feelings because now, they are unsure of who really has the governor's ear. It shouldn't be that way.

SIS project will offer Idaho some positive scientific aspects

The comments made by Liz Paul in your opinion page of Feb. 22 "Idahoans should reject the SIS facility" demand a response.

I don't intend to engage in a point-by-point rebuttal of her many inaccurate statements, but there are two incorrect assertions she makes that need to be corrected.

First is her claim that spent fuel from commercial nuclear plants will be sent to the SIS facility for processing into defense nuclear materials. The SIS will not use spent commercial fuel. It is designed to remove impurities from the products of reprocessed fuel from defense program reactors operated by the Department of Energy.

There is an ample supply of this material for use at the SIS facility, so there is no need for any use of spent commercial fuel.

Ms. Paul does note, correctly, that the use of spent commercial fuel for weapons purposes is expressly forbidden by an act of Congress.

That is still the law of the land, and I know of no one in Congress who has any thoughts of changing or amending that law. Furthermore, her charge that there is some kind of sinister plot at the Pentagon to strip plutonium from spent commercial fuel is absurd.

Claiming, as she does, that every nuclear

power plant would become a nuclear weapons production plant is false and an irresponsible statement to scare the public.

The second major assertion Ms. Paul makes is that all DOE's defense production facilities — and therefore the SIS — will be operated in a way that has no regard for public safety and environmental protection.

I don't think there is any argument that the technology to safely handle, store, and transport nuclear materials is far better today than it was back in the 1940s, when facilities like Savannah River and Hanford were built. The SIS will use state-of-the-art technology to ensure safety and will meet the stringent safety standards required of such a facility.

Time and again, the engineers and craftsmen at INEL have shown they can build intricate and complex facilities that safely contain nuclear materials. To suggest that the SIS will inevitably pose a grave threat to the environment is not only incorrect, it is an indirect accusation that the people who

have built existing facilities at INEL can't build a safe SIS. I don't buy that for a minute.

Ms. Paul's entire article emphasizes all of the alleged negative aspects she claims the SIS would bring to Idaho. I suggest that there will be positive aspects to the SIS that won't be related solely to increased jobs.

I am convinced that the laser technology used at the SIS facility will lead to technological spinoffs that could benefit us in a variety of ways. We already have the precedent for that at INEL right now, where researchers are evaluating the possibility of converting the old Power Burst Facility into a medical facility where cancerous brain tumors can be treated without surgery. Five years ago, no one realized that the technology originally designed for that reactor could be converted to such uses. I'm confident that in the future, the same kinds of beneficial spinoffs can come from the SIS facility.

As the public hearings on the SIS continue, and as we go through the environmental impact statement process, there certainly will be discussion of the role that nuclear weapons play today in our national defense.

Like everyone, I hope and pray that we will never face a situation where we would use nuclear weapons in a time of conflict.

That's why I hope we can negotiate an effective, verifiable arms control agreement with the Soviet Union, and that's why our negotiators are spending so much time and effort in Geneva.

But we must keep in mind that over 40 years ago, the United States decided that instead of trying to match the Soviet Union's superiority in conventional weapons, we would meet them with our technological advantage. That meant nuclear weapons, and that technological capability to deter Soviet aggression has kept the peace for more than 41 years.

If we were able to sit down with the Soviets and negotiate a total elimination of nuclear weapons by the end of next week, peace and security would not be certain to follow. To uphold our obligations to our allies, we would be forced to spend astronomical sums to try and match them tank for tank, platoon for platoon. If you think the defense budget is large now, imagine what it would be if we were forced into that situation.

That is why I am a strong supporter of research into a defense of the United States that does not rely on nuclear weapons — the Strategic Defense Initiative. I believe that a non-nuclear defense of our country is a far more moral stand for us to take than relying

on the threat of the massive destruction that would be wrought by a nuclear exchange between the United States and the Soviet Union.

The day-for-a-policy of Mutual Assured Destruction — which has the appropriate acronym of MAD — has come and gone. I would hope that Ms. Paul and however many other members there are of the Snake River Alliance would share in that view.

Senate closes 'inadvertent' campaign finance loophole

BOISE (AP) — Legislation supporters say will close "inadvertent loopholes" in the state's campaign finance reporting law has won approval in the Idaho Senate.

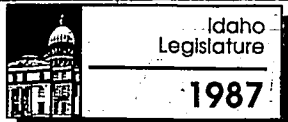
On a 27-15 vote Thursday, the Senate sent the measure to the House for final consideration. It requires primary election winners to file disclosure reports within 15 days after the May balloting as the losers must and it mandates public disclosure of the contributors to out-of-state political action committees becoming involved in Idaho campaigns.

Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly, the bill's sponsor, said it would "give the people of the state of Idaho a little more confidence that people running for public office aren't trying to pull the wool over their eyes."

The bill reached a final floor vote after surviving an attempt last week to strip it of the requirement for post-primary disclosure by nomination winners.

Critics claimed the requirement for the post-primary report only added to the paperwork in political campaigns, arguing that the spending information is still made available to voters in a report required just before the general election.

But Noh and other supporters said the financial information should be made known to voters before



the campaign is almost over so it could be used in reaching a decision in the voting booth.

Possibly more important, however, is the provision that requires disclosure of the contributors to out-of-state political action committees. That has been an issue for the past several years since allegations that right-to-work advocates funneled money into legislative campaigns in 1982 by laundering it through Utah, which has no requirement for disclosure.

Under the current Idaho law, political action committees operating in states without disclosure laws are required to maintain a record of their contributors if they take part in state campaigns but are not forced to make that record public.

Scaled-back version of proposal to increase tax collections passes

BOISE (AP) — Legislative budget writers, trying to balance spending against limited available revenues, have approved a scaled-back version of Democratic Gov. Cecil Andrus' proposal to intensify state tax collection efforts.

After rejecting a Democratic attempt to increase the governor's plan on a 13-9 vote, the Joint Finance Appropriations Committee on Thursday endorsed a \$600,000 program that will add 14 auditors and

support personal and additional computer capacity to the Revenue and Taxation Department.

The expansion is expected to generate another \$4 million in tax collections during the budget year that begins in July.

"And there's still \$90 million in uncollected taxes out there," said Rep. James Lucas, R-Moscow, a member of the committee that put the spending plan together.

The enhanced-auditing effort would add five agents to field services for collection of delinquent tax accounts, two additional income tax auditors, two extra sales tax auditors, and one more fuel tax auditor, and new three-man tax fraud investigating unit.

The governor had asked for a \$750,000 program adding 22 people to the tax auditing and collection division to generate just over \$5 million in new revenue next year.

"The bulk of the extra revenue in

either plan comes from the auditing and collection efforts," but Tax Commission Chairman Larry Looney told the committee that the tax fraud division, while generating less than \$2 for ever \$1 it costs, could be among the most effective in the long run.

"When you convict somebody and you get the publicity and get into court, other people see that isn't the kind of behavior that is going to be tolerated and voluntary payments increase," he said.

Increased tax collection efforts in past years have paid off significantly. This year alone, the field services unit is expected to recover \$23 million in delinquent taxes and identify another \$2 million to be collected in the future.

Income tax auditors will recover over \$8 million for the state and identify another \$5 million from people who have failed to even file tax returns.

Drinking age bill in motion

BOISE (AP) — House Speaker Tom Boyd says the Transportation and Defense Committee must act again on a new bill raising Idaho's legal drinking age from 19 to 21.

The committee on Wednesday voted to print and introduce a new bill raising the legal drinking age, shortly after voting down a Senate-passed measure.

The committee directed Chairman Rep. John Sessions, R-Driggs, to seek special permission from Boyd to introduce the bill. Only a few House committees, not including Transportation, are allowed to introduce new bills after the 45th day of a session, and Thursday was the 53rd day of the session.

Sessions asked Boyd for permission, but the speaker said he took no immediate action while he researched whether the new drinking-age bill was proper.

The Idaho Constitution forbids presenting the same bill in a session after it has been voted down. But Boyd said research indicated the restriction does not apply to a bill that has passed both chambers but has been vetoed by the governor.

The bill approved Wednesday makes only minor changes in the bill which both chambers approved but which was vetoed by Acting Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter.

Boyd said he granted Transportation and Defense permission to introduce the new bill, but the action would have to be taken at a meeting on Thursday, since at that time he acted, the committee did not have permission to introduce new legislation.

Stint at home fulfills law

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus says he met the legal requirement for governors to live in the governor's house by moving in — by himself.

Until last month, state law requires governors to live in the 73-year-old house purchased by the state in 1946 in Boise's North End. Lt. Gov. C.L. "Butch" Otter, who was acting governor, signed into law legislation removing the requirement.

Andrus expressed a desire to live in his own Boise residence.

State law now says only that the governor must live in Ada County.

At an Idaho Press Club luncheon on Thursday, after his speech, Andrus was questioned by a woman who he identified as living near the governor's home. He said neighbors were not happy with his decision not to live in the official residence.

Andrus said he met the legal requirement by moving in after he was inaugurated in January — although his wife, Carol Andrus, remained at their Boise home.

Andrus has Democratic nominee for PUC but seeks GOP selection

BOISE (AP) — Gov. Cecil Andrus Although he wouldn't disclose who says he's picked a Democratic nominee for the Public Utilities Commission — but he doesn't plan to submit the nomination to the Idaho Legislature until he has found a Republican to fill another vacancy.

"I'm not going to send them up one at a time any more," Andrus told the Idaho Press Club on Thursday.

There are two openings on the three-member commission, with President Perry Swisher the only holder.

Andrus earlier nominated Republican Tom Stahberg of Pocatello, but Stahberg later withdrew from consideration after Andrus said he learned from that experience and won't send a single nomination again to the Senate, which must confirm major appointments by the governor.

He also defended his decision to terminate Gen. Ben Campbell after a 39-year career in the Idaho National Guard. Effective March 1, Andrus said he terminated Campbell to give other Guard officers a chance for advancement.

"All of those people who serve at the pleasure of the governor in an exempt position should not be surprised when there is a change," Andrus said.

The governor said he made no public announcement of his decision to change the second in command in the Guard, out of respect for Campbell's feelings.

State election days will remain dry

BOISE (AP) — The House has refused to go along with legislation allowing state liquor stores to remain open on election days.

The vote was 41-39 on Thursday against a bill sponsored by Rep. Jerry Deckard, R-Eagle. It would have allowed the sale of packaged liquor on national, state, municipal and primary election dates. The

legislation also would have allowed state liquor stores to open at 7 a.m. instead of 10 a.m.

Opponents argued against expanding the availability of liquor. But Rep. Dean Haagenson, R-Coeur d'Alene, suggested that once people saw who was on the ballot, they might have more need to drink.

Demjanjuk contends he was following orders as a POW

JERUSALEM (AP) — An investigator testified Thursday that John Demjanjuk insisted he would not be held fault even if he had been "Ivan the Terrible" because the Nazi death camp guard was just a POW following instructions.

Survivors of the Treblinka camp in Nazi-occupied Poland have testified that Ivan beat and stabbed inmates, sliced off pieces of their flesh and banged out eyes before shoving them into the death chambers and turning on the gas.

Demjanjuk, a 68-year-old retired Ohio autoworker, claims he was never at Treblinka and is a victim of mistaken identity. He is a native of the Soviet Ukraine and was extradited from the United States last year for trial on war crimes charges.

Israel trying to ease tensions over Pollard

TEL AVIV, Israel (AP) — Israeli leaders sought to advise tension with the United States over the Pollard spy affair and acknowledged Thursday that Israel had made serious errors in handling the case.

But Foreign Minister Shimon Peres insisted that the episode was an isolated incident and that Israeli leaders bore no collective responsibility for it.

"Israel was not on trial, an individual was on trial," Peres told The Associated Press. "I don't think it was a collective verdict, or collective punishment. Israel has admitted that she made a mistake, a regretful mistake. And I hope she will not face a repeated situation of this nature in the future."

Jonathan J. Pollard, 32, a former U.S. Navy intelligence analyst, on Wednesday received a life sentence in Washington after pleading guilty to spying for Israel. His wife, Anne Henderson-Pollard, was given five years for helping him.

Pollard, who said he spied for ideological reasons, said high government officials in Israel knew of his spying. But Israeli officials have said Pollard's activities were not known to Israeli leaders.

The latest round of tension between the United States and Israel began Sunday when Israel appointed Aviem Sella, a senior air force officer, as the new commander of the Tel No' air base in the Negev desert.

The appointment came two days before Sella, 41, was indicted in Washington on charges he recruited Pollard. He is unlikely to stand trial because he cannot be extradited.

Peace plan examined

DAMASCUS, Syria (AP) — Aides to Lebanese President Amin Gemayel met with Syrian officials Thursday on a Muslim plan for ending Lebanon's long civil war.

Gemayel, a Christian, scuttled a peace agreement Syria arranged a year ago.

The new proposals would give more power to Muslims, who have become a majority in Lebanon, reducing the dominant political position Christians have had since independence from France in 1943. They are similar to those Gemayel rejected in the previous pact.

Representing Lebanon were Foreign Minister Elie Salem, military intelligence chief Col. Simon Kassis and Gemayel's legal advisers, Nicolas Nasr and Elie Ghannam. They held two sessions with the Syrian foreign minister, Farouk al-Sharara.

Neither side would comment officially, but Lebanese sources close to the talks said they were conducted "in a very positive atmosphere."

"There's agreement on several points," one said. "The viewpoints on others are close and there still are a few on which the two sides differ."

Syria is the main power broker in Lebanon. It keeps 25,000 soldiers in the northern and eastern parts of the country and sent 7,500 into west Beirut on Feb. 22 to stop a week-long factional war.

NATO hears upbeat report

BRUSSELS, Belgium (AP) — The chief U.S. arms negotiator gave the NATO allies an upbeat assessment Thursday of prospects for a superpower agreement to scrap medium-range nuclear missiles in Europe, sources said.

Max M. Kampelman and the two other delegates to the U.S.-Soviet arms talks in Geneva, Maynard W. Gilman and Ron Lehman, briefed the 16 NATO ambassadors at a closed-door, two-hour meeting before flying to consultations in Washington.

The Geneva negotiations received new life last weekend when Soviet leader Mikhail S. Gorbachev announced willingness to sign a treaty on medium-range missiles separately from a package accord covering long-range missiles and "Star Wars," the U.S. plan for a space-based defense system.

The United States agreed in principle and submitted a proposed treaty to Soviet negotiators on Wednesday that would eliminate U.S. cruise and Pershing 2 and Soviet SS-20 nuclear forces from Europe.

European countries have generally welcomed the progress but have urged that the deal include big cuts in shorter-range Soviet missiles capable of striking Western Europe.

In Moscow, a Foreign Ministry spokesman said that the government's initial reaction to the U.S. treaty proposal was "very positive" and that the Kremlin wanted a final agreement "as soon as possible."

In his address to the North Atlantic Council, NATO's highest political body, Kampelman stressed that im-

portant obstacles to a formal accord remained, said the NATO sources, who spoke on condition of anonymity.

Kampelman said much bargaining remained on the questions of verifying compliance with an agreement and linking the withdrawal of mid-range missiles to reductions in shorter-range Soviet nuclear rockets.

Yet he expressed optimism about reaching full agreement, the sources said. "Of all the consultations we've had with Kampelman this was probably one of the most positive," one source said.

An official NATO statement issued after the meeting said the three American negotiators had presented a detailed report on the Geneva talks. It did not elaborate.

Shultz to quiz Chun on plans

SHANGHAI, China (AP) — Secretary of State George P. Shultz said he plans to ask South Korean President Chun Doo-hwan about plans to step down early next year when he stops in Seoul today.

Chun goes through with his plans, "it will be the first time such a peaceful change of power will have occurred in Korea. So that would be a real milestone," Shultz told Western reporters in Shanghai on Thursday as he wound up a six-day visit to China.

Before Chun's replacement can be elected, South Koreans plan a referendum on a new constitution, the substance of which is under debate.

Chun and his fellow generals are leaning toward a parliamentary system with the cabinet selecting the prime minister. Some U.S. analysts say such a system could help preserve the military oligarchy.

Members of the Korean opposition, prominently Kim Dae-jung, are advocating a government headed by a popularly elected president, modeled after the constitutions of the United States and the Philippines.

Shultz expressed mild concern over unrest that followed the torture death of student activist Park Chong-chul in mid-January. The secretary said he "was quite impressed" with official steps following Park's death, including the removal of the interior minister and a police chief and the arrest of two police officers pending an investigation.

As for the suppression of demonstrations, Shultz said, "You can't prevent freedom of assembly, and expect to see the kind of openness that is called for. On the other hand, a government has to maintain law and order."

China limits video access

BEIJING (AP) — The Beijing city government has issued stiff restrictions on the use of closed-circuit television in an effort to limit access to videotapes the government deems "unhealthy."

The new regulations, which went into effect Sunday, stipulate that work units can show only programs that have appeared on the state-run Beijing television or national television, or those produced by state-sanctioned studios.

The rules were reported Wednesday in the weekly newspaper Beijing Broadcast and Television News.

"Showing reactionary, obscene or unhealthy videos is prohibited," the rules state.

The new rules are part of the Chinese government's effort to rein in the media and art-and-literary circles in the current crackdown on political dissent.

Worker who picked up AIDS in Africa to get compensation

NORWALK, Calif. (AP) — A Californian who contracted AIDS from native women while working for an Idaho construction company in Zaire will receive workers' compensation because the company allegedly condoned recreational sex there, a judge said Wednesday.

Workers' compensation Judge Maurice Carey said Paul Trejo, 46, should receive benefits because Boise-based Morrison-Knudsen Corp. allegedly condoned the practice of procuring native women, often by bribing tribal leaders with kerosene

or aviation fuel which the company wrote off as public-relations expenses.

"They would bring in women by the carloads," Carey said of the approximately 30 Americans assigned to Morrison-Knudsen construction projects in the Congo from 1980 to 1984.

The disability award was for \$19,12 a week, retroactive to Dec. 26, 1985, which will continue for the rest of his life. Upon his death, his spouse will receive a \$95,000 death benefit.

Trejo is being treated in an experimental AIDS program at the University of Southern California.

Morrison Knudsen, a worldwide engineering, shipbuilding and construction company, issued a terse statement Wednesday saying: "We feel the decision (by Carey) is wrong and we will appeal."

"We are very sorry that he (Trejo) contracted AIDS while working in Zaire. In no way or at any time has the company supplied prostitutes or condoned prostitution."

Carey said that Trejo testified he

was told by the company he couldn't take his wife because of danger from rebels from Angola.

"He asked what there was to do and was told, 'Except for sex, there's not much you can do. The river is full of crocodiles, and the mosquitoes have malaria,'" Carey said.

Trejo's case points up the problem of workers in underdeveloped countries and the possibilities for the spread of AIDS, or acquired immune deficiency syndrome.

In industrial countries, most AIDS

cases have been reported in homosexual males and bisexuals, intravenous drug abusers who share contaminated needles, and the sex partners of affected persons.

In Africa, the incurable and largely untreatable disease equally affects men and women and appears to be spread primarily heterosexually as a venereal disease, scientists say.

Trejo's attorney, Alfred Moratta, said it was routine for all Morrison Knudsen workers to frequently have native women as sexual partners, sometimes for one night, sometimes

for several days or several weeks.

The only company restriction placed on workers having the women was that they couldn't be in the bunkhouses before 6 p.m. and had to leave by 6 a.m., Moratta said.

"The international implication of this case is how the disease can be spread," Moratta said, noting that Morrison-Knudsen workers were allowed to take brief vacations in Europe every two months and that Trejo was subsequently sent by the company to South America.

Utah man receives heart from grandson

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — A 63-year-old Logan man was conscious and "doing well" Thursday after receiving the heart of his 15-year-old grandson, who died with three other teen-agers of injuries suffered in a car-train accident.

Thomas A. Nielson was in critical but stable condition in the cardiac intensive care unit at LDS Hospital following the Wednesday afternoon operation, during which his own failing heart was replaced by that of Jonathan Simper, his maternal grandson, said spokeswoman Kathy Fraughton.

Greg Nielson, the recipient's son, said Nielson's family was encouraged by signs of early recovery.

"Jonathan's heart is beating very strongly in dad's chest, and although he has not been able to talk, he wanted to me and doctors have assured us that so far he is doing very well," he said.

The elder Nielson was placed on a heart-transplant list in mid-February after physicians determined his condition was inoperable, said his wife, Donna Nielson.

Simper died of head and internal injuries sustained when the car in which he was riding collided with a train on a dirt road Tuesday night near Brigham City. Unable to breathe on his own, he had been on life support systems at McKay-Dee Hospital in Ogden until he died at about 2:30 p.m.

Killed instantly in the northern Utah crash were sisters Carrie Christensen, 15, and Sarah Christensen, 15, and Melissa Hamby, 15. All were students at Brigham City High School.

Jonathan's father, Craig Simper, an attorney, and his mother, Teri, told the Deseret News Thursday that they knew his son "was saving his heart for his granddad."

"You'd had to have known this young man. It was a sacrifice he would have consciously made before all this happened," Craig Simper said.

Mrs. Nielson told The Associated Press in a telephone interview from LDS Hospital that the boy's parents wanted her husband to receive his grandson's heart.

She said Nielson began having heart pains when he heard of his grandson's accident and was rushed to LDS Hospital.

"When he learned Jonathan had died and that his parents wanted Tom to have their son's heart, he was reluctant at first, but he was eventually persuaded that that was what Jonathan would want," she said.

"The boy had worked for his grandfather last summer at his son's masonry construction business."

Mrs. Nielson said her husband and grandson were the same height and about the same weight. Doctors told us the heart was such a good match that there should be less chance of rejection problems," she said.

Staff members at the hospital told Mrs. Nielson that they had never heard of such a close relationship between donor and recipient in any previous heart transplant.

She said that from the beginning, the Simpers felt that Nielson should accept the boy's heart.

Ucon, Iona adopt codes

BOISE (AP) — The southeastern Idaho towns of Ucon and Iona have adopted more efficient energy codes for new buildings.

The codes meet the Northwest Power Planning Council's model conservation standards, which are energy-efficient standards for new electrically heated homes and commercial buildings in the Northwest.

Because the cities adopted the codes before 1989, they will receive financial assistance from the Bonneville Power Administration for administrative costs, technical training, code enforcement and builder incentives.

Iona and Ucon join Bonneville County, Idaho and Blighman County, which have adopted the new energy codes.

Union refuses Independent Meat wage cut

TWIN FALLS — Unionized workers at Independent Meat Co. in Twin Falls have rejected a 15-percent rollback in wages, but are remaining on the job for the time being at the lowered pay rate.

The turnout came in an all-but-unanimous ballot of members on Sunday, the day on which the meat-packer's labor contract with United Food and Commercial Workers Local 568A expired.

"They've told us 'no way,'" said union President Sam Miller on Thursday. Only one dissenting vote was cast.

The UFCW's 135 members have

stayed in the Twin Falls packing plant this week in the absence of both a wage agreement and further negotiations. "We're still hopeful of a settlement," Miller said. "We're waiting for them to make another move at this point."

As they wait, the workers also are earning less. Independent Meat put its "last and final proposal" into effect immediately after the rejection, General Manager and President Pat Florence said.

The company cut wage levels to stay competitive with other meat processors in the industry, many of whom have lowered wage and benefits costs in recent years, he said. "What we're doing is following their lead."

Under the expired wage clauses, base wages for non-management employees at Independent Meat were between \$4.59 and \$9 an hour for a full-time work week of 32 hours. Local 568A represents meatcutters and others on production lines, truck drivers, maintenance workers and some white collar employees such as sales representatives.

Union and company negotiators had re-opened talks on wages in late January or early February at about the mid-point of their 3-year labor pact. The talks affect only pay issues. Benefits, insurance and working conditions are not scheduled for bargaining again until the contract ends in 1983.

Independent Meat placed its final pay offer on the table at a bargaining session Feb. 25. Inside the plant, employees are upset at losing 15 percent from their paychecks, said George Fleetwood, a 33-year employee in the processed meats kitchen and a union steward. At the same time, they have been taking cutbacks in hours worked because of more modern and efficient equipment. "We feel we've already lost 15 percent... or one day (at work)," he said.

Fleetwood, a member of the bargaining team, said company officials promised employees a "good, substantial raise" when the current contract was negotiated. Independent Meat needed relief then to pay

for new machinery and other expenses, he said. In the meantime, productivity has risen, but employees have received only small increases.

In the current situation, "I would say most of them would prefer a freeze to a cut," Fleetwood said. For the time being, union chief Miller says he is playing down the possibility of a strike, which he called a "last resort." He declined for strategic reasons to say whether members had authorized a job action on Sunday.

In the meantime, Independent Meat has recruited a replacement work force in case of a work stoppage. Several hundred workers have been qualified and some are sched-

ed for pre-employment physicals, Florence said.

"We will continue to operate our facility and serve our customers and we've made all the necessary preparations to do so in any case," he said.

Top union and company officials say they have kept bargaining channels open. But, so far, each is waiting for the other side to make a move.

"Basically, the next move is theirs," Miller said. "We are open to negotiation whenever there is any substantial movement on the company's part."

"Certainly, if and when they counter, our mind remains open," Florence said.

Subscriber count may end conflict over notices

KETCHUM — A look at subscriber lists might end the battle between two Blaine County newspapers for the right to publish legal notices, says a Rupert attorney hired by the Ketchum City Council to advise them on the case.

Currently, the city publishes legal notices in the Wood River Journal based in Halley. After officials cited conflicts of interest with the Express, the Idaho Mountain Express contends that as the only paper published in Ketchum, it should fund the legal notices and has said conflicts of interest are not a problem.

"However, attorney Larry Duff of Rupert says the case may not have to deal with that issue."

"I am first concerned with the statute regarding the requirements for publication. Looking through court records, I have not seen the paid subscription edition of the Express or the postal addit for paid subscribers," he said.

By law the paper must have at least 200 paid subscribers to be eligible to publish legal notices. Many of the issues of the Express are distributed in public places, often at no charge.

Duff said if the Express can show it has the required subscribers, then the conflict question would be the next step to resolve.

"It is a very sensitive area and hard to avoid in small communities," he said.

Mayor Gerald Selfert is married to the managing editor of the Express, and City Attorney Jim Phillips' wife is a stockholder in the newspaper.

Attorneys for the Express—Barry Luboviski and attorney Ed Lawson, representing the Journal, agreed to cooperate with Duff and provide information.

"I think what is good for the goose is good for the gander, and I have no problem supplying subscriber information to Mr. Duff," Lawson said.

Luboviski read a letter to the council at a meeting this week that called for members to answer specific questions about conflicts of interest, and the council voted to include them in the discussion.

Council member Larry Young said he is concerned only with solving the problem.

"I will go with what our attorney recommends. If it turns out that the Express has the legal rights to the notices then they are all yours," he said.

Young also urged Duff to keep any discussion of the case out of closed sessions.

"I really have a disdain for executive sessions. I would rather keep everyone involved," he said. "Duff said he would like to be able to give an opinion on the case in approximately one week."

Panel backs split in education board

BOISE — A move is afoot to divide the state Board of Education into two boards, in order to give higher education a higher profile.

The Senate Education Committee on Thursday unanimously supported a joint resolution calling for a constitutional amendment making the change.

"Higher education has never been a high-profile issue in Idaho, and it's got to become one," said Rep. Janet Hay, R-Boise, a co-sponsor of the bill with state Sen. Terry Sverdsen, R-Caladale.

Hay said public schools "have a constituency," but higher education does not have the same constituency and public support.

"The future of higher education is very important to the future of the state," she said.

The proposal would split the state Board of Education and create a five-member Board of Regents to supervise Idaho's four higher education institutions and the two community colleges.

The eight-member Board of Education now sets policy for both public schools and higher education.

Under the proposal, state Superintendent of Public Instruction Jerry Evans would still be a voting member of the Board of Education but would not be a part of the Board of Regents.

Hay said a similar idea, backed by the Idaho Association of Commerce and Industry, surfaced in 1984. But



the proposal received no support from the Board of Education.

When asked whether two boards would mean less coordination and more friction over state money for public and higher education, Hay said she thought that was a legitimate concern.

However, Hay said that enabling legislation to create the two boards could force the two to meet together twice a year to work on problems.

"As a former member of the state board, she said, she was once opposed to the idea of creating two boards."

However, Hay said, she has changed her position after seeing how much work the Board of Education does.

Hay said she was told that the state Board of Education now supports the plan.

If approved by the Legislature, the proposal to create two boards of education would go on the ballot in 1988.

But the measure must first pass both the Senate and the House, and officials said after Thursday's Senate Education Committee meeting that it faces stiff opposition in the House.

'Bullheads' hold out for education funding

BOISE — A coalition of legislators, including the Magic Valley delegation loosely termed "The Bullhead Caucus," is holding out for more money for education and succeeding inch by inch.

The bullheads may be giving House leadership fits.

For 2 days in a row, the House has postponed voting on a cigarette tax increase because of threats from the bullheads to kill the measure.

"We're demanding to see the entire education budget to make sure we get enough for higher education and the two junior colleges," said Rep. Ron Black, R-Twin Falls.

The bullheads fought a House proposal setting state spending for public education at \$333.3 million, or about \$3 million below Gov. Cecil Andrus' proposed budget.

But the \$339 million would include \$8.5 million for a career ladder plan.

The bullheads won a skirmish on Thursday in the GOP Caucus. Only 19 Republicans voted for the career ladder and the plan was dropped from the budget.

The bullheads want salary equity for all teachers first, before the

state begins funding the career ladder plan.

The bullheads also are balking at a proposal to take a \$2.7 million shortfall in the Social Security and retirement expenses for teachers out of the cigarette tax.

But the group's main concern is seeing enough money in this year's budget to begin correcting funding inequities among school districts statewide.

"The \$339 million just widens the inequities that now exist," said Rep. Russ Newcomb, R-Twin Falls. "We were told all along that if we'd just sit quietly, we'd get the bill to correct school inequity; and we haven't seen anything."

The measure, in fact, moved out of the Senate Education Committee on Thursday.

Senate Bill 1184, a compromise bill, would move the state's equalization calculation from 0025 to .0030 in the first year. The equalization calculation is a percentage of the market value.

Proponents say the raising the rate would mean fewer school districts would be forced to have annual override levies.

Although the Senate bill does not

Blaine water levels still low

HAILEY — Although Blaine County Soil Conservation District reports show improvement during February-1987 precipitation collection, watersheds for the district are still averaging below half of normal snow depths and water content.

Gale Roberts, conservationist in the Hailey SCS office, said the snow and water measurements for March 1 are running near an all-time low for the month.

Measurements for March 1 on the Big Wood drainage courses range from a low of 32 percent of normal at the Mascot Mine snow course to 56 percent of normal on Mt. Baldy. Overall measurements for the Big Wood watershed are 44 percent of normal, Roberts said.

Measurements on the Little Wood River snow courses average 40 percent of normal, while Fish Creek has 45 percent and the Lost River and Copper Basin courses are at 40 percent.

Roberts said only once since 1949 has the Galena Summit snow course contained as little or less than

38 inches of snow at this time of year and that was in 1977, when the measurement was 45 inches. This year the March 1 measurement at Galena Summit is 38 inches of snow and 9.3 inches of water. This compares to 67 inches of snow and 25.3 inches of water at the same time last year.

Over the years, Galena Summit has averaged 65 inches of snow and 20.4 inches of water on March 1.

Dollarhide summit, which had 105 inches of snow and 29.7 inches of water last year, has only 39 inches of snow containing 9.3 inches of water this year.

Roberts said that normally the watersheds in mountain areas are at 75-85 percent of their season's total water content by March.

"Therefore, there is no question that our streamflows will be less than half of normal this coming spring and summer," Roberts said.

The Vienna Mine snow course, with the highest elevation on the Big Wood watershed, has the most snow and water with 58 inches of snow and 15 inches of water content. This is 48 percent of average (86 inches of snow and 31.2 inches of water.) Last year the course had 135 inches of snow and 45 inches of water on March 1.

Committee approves barley bill requiring mandatory participation

BOISE — Despite 2 hours of testimony Thursday, the Senate Agriculture Committee found it was easy to vote on setting up a barley commission.

"This is an easy question," said state Sen. Laird Noh, R-Kimberly. "Do we sink or do we swim?"

The committee voted, 64, to send House Bill 122 to the Senate with a do-pass recommendation. The measure passed the House last week by a 63-16 margin.

Noh agreed with Sen. Lynn Tomlinaga, R-Paul, that if participation were not mandatory, it would weaken "the integrity of the bill."

Noh said without mandatory participation, the commission would start out "with one foot in cement

and one arm tied behind its back. It would cripple the program; and who would vote for it?"

The bill, which has been the focus of heated debate among wheat and barley growers, would establish a joint wheat-barley commission with a mandatory 2-cent per hundredweight contribution for the career ladder plan.

It is estimated \$475,000 would be raised to go for research and marketing for barley.

Barley growers opposing the commission did so on philosophical grounds. They equated the mandatory tax with events causing the Revolutionary War.

Many farmers said they did not oppose the idea of a barley commission, just mandatory participation without the option to vote.

Under the bill, barley growers could call for a referendum in 5

years.

Some barley growers also wanted the option of a refund.

But backers of the bill, including sponsors Rep. Doug Jones, R-Filer, and Rep. Tim Tucker, D-Forthill, said a refund would hamper efforts to get the commission going.

"This is good business and a good investment in the future," said Jerry Kress, a supporter. "The tax is neither excessive nor burdensome."

Steven Alkele, a Moore farmer, provided the cleverest testimony of the day.

Alkele, who opposed the measure, said his tax would be \$385, equaling one month's house payment, 10 tons of hay or 48½ gallons of Pepsi.

"If you know how good Pepsi tastes on a hot summer day," Alkele said.

Trade experts label Symms' views on trade deficit 'simple-minded'

LEWISTON (AP) — Sen. Steve Symms' views on the nation's trade deficit are simple-minded and dangerous to agriculture, Pacific Northwest trade experts said Thursday.

Addressing the sixth annual International Exchange Conference at Lewis-CLARK State College via satellite from Washington D.C., Symms, R-Idaho, said business deregulation would make America competitive abroad.

He said legislation promoting international free trade for "level playing field" worldwide would help reduce the trade deficit.

"With the trade deficit, we're dealing with probably one of the

most complex and important issues facing the world today," said James Manning, director of the International Trade Institute at Portland State University.

"What bothers me is that we're trying to solve the issue with really simplistic solutions."

Robert Henry, transportation consultant for the Idaho Wheat Commission, said he feared that legislation being prepared in Congress could include some form of protectionism.

"The foreign response will be to attack our most vulnerable product — agriculture," said Henry.

Henry said Americans need to realize they cannot control the world economy.

"It's not a global economy... it takes global understanding," said Henry.

Symms contended that the United States should reduce regulatory restrictions for manufacturers who justify the "need" for tariffs against nations such as Canada or Japan where industry is subsidized.

Manning pushed for greater understanding of the problem.

Andrus sets floor for school budget

COEUR D'ALENE (AP) — A substandard "status quo" budget for public schools, such as the one currently under discussion by Republicans in the Idaho Legislature, will not be acceptable, Gov. Cecil Andrus says.

"The \$342 million I have proposed for public schools is the absolute minimum we must allow to take even a modest step forward," Andrus said Thursday night, in a speech prepared for a Kootenai County Democratic gathering here.

"Anything less is not going to get the job done," he said.

House Republicans have been testing sentiment for a public school budget of \$339.8 million, although the Senate GOP has expressed strong opposition to it.

Andrus said Republicans are talking about cutting his school budget proposal.

"They are floating proposals to trim a little here and take a big cut there. But the bottom line is simple: they are, at this point, talking about a status quo budget for our public schools. And ladies and gentlemen, that is just not acceptable," the governor said.

Groundwater study slated

BOISE — The U.S. Geological Survey is starting a 3-year study of groundwater in parts of Elmore, Gooding, Jerome, Lincoln, Owyhee, and Twin Falls counties.

The purpose of the study is to gain a better understanding of how the groundwater system operates in the vicinity of the springs that discharge to the Snake River between Milner and King Hill.

"Improved understanding will help avoid the adverse impacts on groundwater levels and spring discharges that might result from further development or changes in management of the water resource," said USGS spokesman G.F. Lindholm, in a news release.

Data on groundwater levels, pumping, land use, spring discharges, and irrigation diversions and return flows will be collected during the study. Subsurface information will be obtained from hydrologic reports by drillers—test-drilling, and electrical resistivity surveys. Water samples from wells and springs will be collected and analyzed to determine the types and concentrations of dissolved chemicals.

This weekend, 5 guards duke it out

Chicago connection yields CSI a golden pair of hot shooters

TWIN FALLS — It is not by chance, by luck or by acquaintance that point guards Gerald Collins and Keith Jackson — the College of Southern Idaho's latest in the Chicago-connection sequence — are Golden Eagles.

It was a studied decision, based on how CSI's schedule, playing philosophy, national standing and academics would serve their purposes.

And those same things currently are in vogue now that a number of Division I NCAA schools are trying to acquire their skills for the next two years.

And they do attract attention from recruiters. Northwestern University's Bill Foster ambled into Dixie gymnasium when the Eagles visited down there to take a look at a couple of Rebel guards. Within the next 48 hours he had letters in Twin Falls addressed to the Chicago duo.

Both feel their decision to come to CSI plays a paramount part in phase two of their collegiate education and participation.

"We have the statistics here at CSI," said Jackson. "We're ranked No. 2 in the nation and that says we know how to win and what it takes to win. We're the No. 1 offensive team in the nation and that shows we can handle the ball and score. But proving we're more than just a run-and-gun team, we're in the top 10 in defense. You put all that together and the recruiters want to see you play."

Collins noted that also helps to be in a conference that boasts some big men — and Region 18 has its share again this year.

"The recruiters come to see the big guys," said Collins, a 6-2 sophomore. "So they have that height advantage. But when they (scouts) are in looking at them, it gives us smaller guys — a chance to show off our quickness, ability to get out on the break, play a little defense and maybe attract some attention to ourselves."

While the recruiters may be coming to them with some doubts and questions, they will be greeted by responses equally important on the other side.

"Before I sign with any school I want to know exactly what my role is going to be. If I'm playing point guard, will I have some freedom to be a little creative on offense? Things like that. I want to go with a coach who will have total confidence in my playing," Jackson said.

Collins feels it is important to emphasize to would-be recruiters that he is an off-guard.

"I was always an off-guard. I never played the point until I came here. I believe the experience has been good and that I've developed somewhat as a point guard. But at the same time, I feel some of my other skills have diminished. Playing the point so much has put me back a little bit," he said, and then added with a smile "but that's what summers are for — to work on the parts of your game that need it."

Currently the pace of recruiting has dipped a little, but both are appreciative of the respite because they realize regionals and a possible trip to nationals will be very good for the school, the community and themselves.

"If we do the job, win regional and go to nationals, it will help everybody on the team as far as recruiting goes," Collins pointed out.

"With Dixie being ranked No. 3 and us No. 2 and North Idaho and Ricks coming here, I expect to see a lot of NCAA scouts this week," Jackson said of regionals.

"Then if we go to nationals . . . Both believe last year's experience — finishing 2-2 in the national tournament after winning regionals at Dixie — will be a help they and the team can show us how much dedication and hard work it requires to be there," says Collins.

Then turning a little philosophical, the Chicago sophomore said "it's just a matter of routine. You have to go out night after night and do it until it becomes a habit. We're on our own floor with our own crowd and our own self-esteem. We feel with the advantages we should win. But we also realize that we have to play them one game at a time and not overlook anybody."

Heading into this weekend's Region 18 junior college basketball tournament here, Shippen — a 6-foot sophomore from the eastern Idaho

gymnasium tonight, Rossum is also the kind of player other teams will be looking for — looking not to win a ballgame with a three-pointer or a clutch jumper.

"He's a strong shooter who can win some ballgames," said CSI Coach Fred Trenkle. "Dixie has a few other players who might give us more trouble, but Rossum's shooting can be a very big factor."

Says another opposing head coach, Utah Tech's Duke Ried, "Rossum is the type of player who you forget about for awhile, then bang, he's on a roll and Dixie becomes tough to beat."

"I think I can handle just about anything that comes my way," said Rossum. "It's just a matter of adjusting and thinking out the situation. Some players, I admit, are tougher than others."

One of those tougher ones is CSI's Eric Newman who "doesn't give you anything," said the Dixie sophomore. "He's strong, quick, and most of all, smart."

TWIN FALLS — North Idaho College, which opens the 1987 Region 18 National Junior College Basketball Tournament tonight against the second-ranked and homesteading College of Southern Idaho Golden Eagles, is a force to be reckoned with, according to Cardinal point guard Ken Goodlow.

"It's been a good year for us," says the North Idaho playmaker. "Especially going toward the end of the season, because we're playing real well at this point. Earlier, we had some games that we lost where we shouldn't have and I think that kind of helped us anyway — made us learn."

How the role that Goodlow will play in the fulfilling his own prediction was emphasized by CSI Coach Fred Trenkle.

"Ken's Goodlow is a real competitive 5-foot-7 player," said Trenkle. "He possesses excellent quickness, great floor savvy and tremendous range."

He does a good job for Coach Williams. He's proved he can play with anybody.

"He had a lot of problems in our first game," Trenkle continued. "He hurt his hand before Christmas and then ran into some foul trouble in that game, but he certainly played a lot better in the second game against us."

Ken fit right in from downtown. And he really handles pressure. I'm not sure that he's not better with his left

although he's right-handed."

Williams, whose team finished third in regular season play at 16-8 and stands 21-10 overall, seconds his counterpart's assessment and adds a few points of his own.

"He's a very good range shooter, but I think Ken's quickness and also his ballhandling ability rank right up there with his shooting," Williams said. "And he's pretty consistent — he's averaging 21.3 points-per-game and I think his season-high is 35."

Goodlow's average is second-best in Region 18, and he also ranks second in assists with an average of 5.9 per game, third in free throws (86-for-105 through 29 games), eighth in three-point goals (113-for-282) and ninth in steals (58 in 29 games).

Goodlow is definitely the man that Williams would want to have in his hands when his club needs quick scoring boost.

"The other kids look to him and I think they feel more comfortable with him shooting than they would having somebody else just firing up shots out there."

Recruited by NIC out of Henry Foss High School in Tacoma, Wash., Goodlow, a three-year starter and a first team all-state Washington Class AAA selection as a senior, was one the Cards nearly let get away.

"We were attempting to recruit Ken and one of his teammates, a kid named Brian Wright, who eventually wound up at Washington State," explained Williams. "Kenny originally went to Spokane Falls Community College and dropped out of there within a short period of time. He then went to Tacoma Community College in the summertime to meet eligibility requirements for us and then came in last year."

"It's gone real well since," says Goodlow. "I like it (in Coeur d'Alene). In high school I wasn't known as a defensive player. Coach Williams has changed that some. Since I've been up here my defense has improved a lot. It was like a new role for me."

Adding better than six assists per outing to his 20-point plus scoring, the sophomore is a prospect to fill the floor leader spot at a four-year school next season.

"We'll definitely go to it," Williams said. "We haven't sat down and discussed exactly what his option are there yet, but he'll move up."

Basketball enthusiast since the second grade, Goodlow sets an even loft goal for himself.

"I want to make it to the pros," he said. "That's like anybody's dream who plays basketball if they've played as long as I've been playing."

For the next two days his attention will focus on the task at hand, starting tonight against the Golden Eagles.

"I guess turnovers," Goodlow replied when asked what his team must do to win against CSI. "In every game we've played, even last year, we gave them too many easy buckets. We've got to protect the ball better."

"You know Trent has gotten better and better each time he's played against us," says College of Southern Idaho Coach Fred Trenkle.

"He's a little older than most of the kids, so he's a little more mature. And he's got some heavy experience having been back to the national (junior college) tournament and all."

Heading into this weekend's Region 18 junior college basketball tournament here, Shippen — a 6-foot sophomore from the eastern Idaho

hamlet of Menan — leads the region in assists (6.9 per game), ranks second in three-point goals (59-for-111 through 29 games), ninth in free throw shooting (89-for-119 for 75 percent and 10th in steals (54 through the first 29 games). He's also averaging 15.2 points.

"He's comparable to Kenny Goodlow (from North Idaho College) in that both have that tremendous shooting range," says Trenkle. "Of course he's a little bigger at 6-0 or 6-1 and he jumps very well. (He's) the kind of kid I'd like to recruit."

"He doesn't just shoot, he's a very good team leader," observes Paul Conrad, coach of Colorado Northwestern Community College. "He looks for the open man."

Conrad says CNCC's strategy for stopping Shippen this season "is simple."

"He shaded him and made it tough to get the ball. If he couldn't get the ball, we figured we could beat."

TWIN FALLS — For Dixie College sophomore guard Clint Rossum, the game can be summed up in one word — outside shooting.

"If I can get my rhythm going, then my shooting can sometimes take over," said Rossum. "My strength is definitely my outside shooting. It's my role and so that's my game."

The 6-foot, 3-inch guard, who has been a significant part of the third-ranked Rebels team this year while averaging 15 points a game, is the man who impresses most people

with his knack at shooting the ball as well as any junior college guard in the nation.

Rossum, who played his high school ball in Las Vegas, Nev., came to Dixie with the knowledge that his shooting ability would be a major part of Coach Ken Wagner's game plan. Ever since he showed up in St. George, Utah, Rossum has been an impact player and "the kind of player we were looking for," said Wagner.

"I wanted to come here (Dixie College) because it would give me the chance to do some of the things I do well," said Rossum. "And help a team that needed what I could do."

And as the Region 18 National Junior College Athletic Association men's basketball tournament starts at the College of Southern Idaho

gymnasium tonight, Rossum is also the kind of player other teams will be looking for — looking not to win a ballgame with a three-pointer or a clutch jumper.

"He's a strong shooter who can win some ballgames," said CSI Coach Fred Trenkle. "Dixie has a few other players who might give us more trouble, but Rossum's shooting can be a very big factor."

Says another opposing head coach, Utah Tech's Duke Ried, "Rossum is the type of player who you forget about for awhile, then bang, he's on a roll and Dixie becomes tough to beat."

Rossum's outside shooting ability is possibly as fine as CSI's Mauro Gomes, and just as the Brazilian has opened up defenses for Trenkle,

the strength he passes allows him to post up smaller, weaker guards. Consequently, most defenders either play Rossum deep, daring him to shoot rather than take it down low or, as CSI does, play a big guard on the Dixie guard.

"I think I can handle just about anything that comes my way," said Rossum. "It's just a matter of adjusting and thinking out the situation. Some players, I admit, are tougher than others."

One of those tougher ones is CSI's Eric Newman who "doesn't give you anything," said the Dixie sophomore. "He's strong, quick, and most of all, smart."

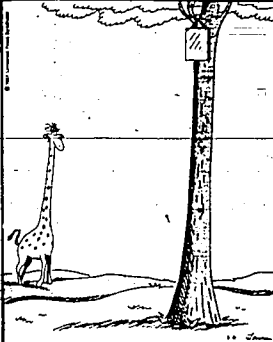

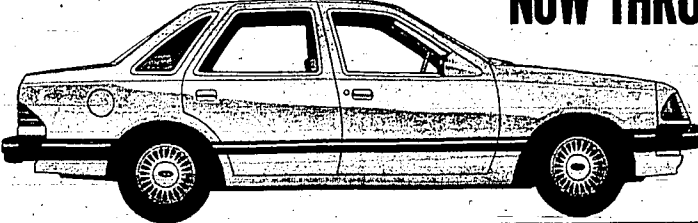

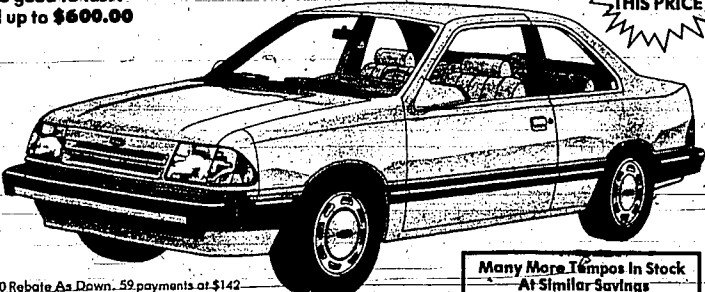

A routine defense against today's game has no chance for success. To beat the game, East must usually make a deceptive play.

South wins the first spade and leads a diamond to dummy's 10 and East's queen. East shifts to hearts but South wins the race. South wins his heart ace, knocks out West's diamond ace and takes an easy 10 tricks. Where did East miss his chance?

There would have probably been a different ending had East played a casual deuce on dummy's diamond 10. Chances are excellent that South would return to his hand to repeat the diamond finesse, and that's when the hand would collapse. East could now win his queen and South would be held to only one diamond trick. He would not have enough dummy's entries both to establish dummy's diamonds and to run them.

How does East know to refuse his queen? It's no sure bet, of course, but there are clues. South's first-round finesse suggests that West has the diamond ace, and there's little promise in any other suit.

Change East's diamonds to A-Q-2 and it would be easy for East to make the crucial play. With Q-9-2, the first-round duck, employs the same principle, only West has the ace instead of East.

'Sugar' spoofs traps in crossing gender lines

TWIN FALLS — Josephine has a face only a mother could love. Daphne's got a body only a football coach would appreciate.

With broad shoulders, thick trunks and five o'clock shadow down to their feet, these characters are two of the "female leads" in the Dilettantes of Magic Valley's production of "Sugar."

Ron Cook and Greg English, both of Twin Falls, play the macho-looking women in the Broadway musical version of the movie "Some Like It Hot," which starred Jack Lemmon, Tony Curtis and Marilyn Monroe.

The play will be presented March 13, 14, 19, 20 and 21 at 8:15 p.m. at the College of Southern Idaho Fine Arts Auditorium.

A matinee will be performed March 15 at 2:15 p.m.

"Sugar" tells the story of two unemployed male musicians who are looking for work in Chicago during the 1920s. By being in the wrong place at the wrong time, they accidentally witness the historic St. Valentine's Day massacre. As a consequence, they are hunted by mob members who want to eliminate anybody able to testify against them.

The musicians disguise themselves by dressing as women and find employment in an all-girl band. The plot thickens when one of the guys falls in love with Sugar, the female lead singer in the band, who, like everyone else, thinks the two men are women. Sugar is played by Diane Shutter of Jerome.

"That's what the play's about," said Howard Miller, director of what he termed an "action-packed" production. "It's their trials and tribulations as women."

Jim LaGrone, business manager for the theater troupe, said that the 16-member board of directors chose the musical "Sugar" because of its light-hearted content.

"It's entertaining, that's what it is," he said. "There's no deep plot to this. It's just a lot of fun."

"One of the prime concerns this year was to pick a show where the lead didn't die at the end. We needed a little froth this time. That's what it is — froth — but it's fun froth and everybody likes it."

LaGrone said that the Dilettantes are working with a \$16,675 budget for "Sugar," the bulk of which goes for renting a rehearsal hall and the auditorium and paying royalties on the play.

Royalties will run around \$2,500 this year, he said. The publishing company charges a fee based on the seating capacity of the auditorium, the number of performances and the price charged per ticket.

"And always the first performance is the most expensive," said LaGrone. "We are under contract — we can't do an extra show if we wanted to without getting their permission."

LaGrone noted that the group's basic philosophy is to do a show each year which can involve 150 or more people. "Between those that are on stage, those that are backstage and those that are in the crew."

LaGrone noted that the group's basic philosophy is to do a show each year which can involve 150 or more people. "Between those that are on stage, those that are backstage and those that are in the crew."

The second goal is to hold the price of tickets down so that the public will be able to come see the production, he said.

"But the community supports us very well. The average life of community theater is seven years, and here we are on our 29th. So we're breaking some kind of records," he said.

LaGrone noted that on their 29th anniversary nine years ago, the Dilettantes did a count-of-how-many-people had been involved with the group since its first production in 1958.

They figured there had been 2,400 people involved. "That's part of what makes it go," said LaGrone. "There's always new people coming in and doing things."

The purpose and the goal, right from the start, has been to promote cultural events in the Magic Valley. We try to support other events in whatever way we can. We feel that the original civic symphony that is now in the Magic Valley came from the original orchestra members of the Dilettante group that was formed. You

Burley band to represent state at Constitution celebration

BURLEY — The Burley Bobcat Band has accepted an invitation to represent Idaho at the Celebration of the Bicentennial of the U.S. Constitution in Philadelphia this June.

The Burley band was selected to

play at a GOP rally last October attended by President Ronald Reagan. Band director Steve Floyd said he thinks this may have brought the band to the attention of Journey Associates. Burt Burda, superintendent of music for the state Department of Education, was contacted specifically about the Burley band by Journey Associates prior to the invitation, Floyd said.

One reason the band stands out, he

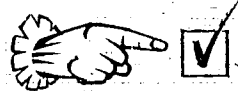

Sun Valley Center features Chihuly glass art

KETCHUM — Tonight the Sun Valley Center for Arts and Humanities opens its third show of 1987 with a selection of 20 prints produced by the prestigious Harvey Littleton, Company of North Carolina, along with three glass sculptures by Dale Chihuly.

The show, entitled "Prints from Glass and Dale Chihuly: Objets de Verre," opens today with a public reception from 5 to 8 p.m. The show runs through April 21. The gallery, located in the Walnut Ave. Mall in Ketchum, is open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Mondays through Fridays.

The emphasis of the exhibit, according to the Center's community

arts director Karen McCall, is Chihuly's work. Chihuly has been called the best-known glass worker in the world today.

Represented in the exhibit are six of Chihuly's prints and three of his "Sea Form" glass sculptures.

The prints are made from thick glass plates in an intaglio process. The plates are engraved, etched with acid and sandblasted to produce a textured surface suitable for printing the image onto paper.

You can hate basketball and still find 'Hoosiers' thrilling

TWIN FALLS — Following are capsule reviews of movies currently playing in the Magic Valley. Ratings are by the Motion Picture Association of America and the Los Angeles Times. Opinions are by Los Angeles Times reviewers.

HOOSIERS (PG) This film is as engaging as modest as "utterly American" and as thrilling as the real-life story it is based on: the rise of a tiny town's high school basketball team to the Indiana state finals. It also features some of the finest acting you could hope to see, by Gene Hackman as the coach with a dark past, Dennis Hopper (Oscar nominee for Best Supporting Actor) as the alcoholic ex-hoops star, and Barbara Hershey as Hackman's initial adversary. The film has a few burrs (some plot elements feel grafted on, and the editing rhythms are not always right) but you can hate basketball and yet still have a sensational time at "Hoosiers."

CHILDREN OF A LESSER GOD (R) A passionate and involving love story between a teacher (William Hurt, Oscar nominee for Best Actor) and a beautiful deaf woman (Marlee Matlin, Oscar nominee for Best Actress) who refuses to try to speak. An exceptionally adroit stage-to-screen adaptation of the acclaimed Mark Medoff play. With Piper Laurie, Philip Bosco. Nominated for five Oscars, including best picture.

CRITICAL CONDITION (R) Richard Pryor has a near-perfect role here: a hapless convict, trying to take insanity who — during a power blackout — is mistaken for a visiting doctor at a hospital. Everything goes a little off-kilter, and the jokes are not concentrated or pungent enough. Director Michael Apted, however, is on his toes; he supplies enough background movement for a whole season of "Hill Street Blues."

CROCODILE DUNDEE (PG-13) The sunny, reassuring personality of Paul Hogan (the fellow who says "G'day" in the Australian tourism ads) is at the heart of this movie which he designs and creates for himself. It is more than enough to carry it: a "fish out of water" story, with Hogan as adventurer-hunter Dundee, wooing Linda Kozlowski's inquisitive Newsworld reporter in the Aussie outback, and then in the wilds of Manhattan itself. "Dundee" is really nothing more than a pleasant, amiable, good-natured crowd-pleaser; but it is hard to think of many crowds it could not somehow please.

MANNEQUIN (PG) A dreamy, warm-hearted jerk falls in love with a beautiful mannequin (a reincarnated — Egyptian — princess) who, through courage and faith, helps him become a stellar window-dresser and the falling department store's savior. It is sort of a "fish out of water" in the shallow, follow-the-numbers screenplay by first-time director Michael Gottlieb, that is what it stays: sort of cute. Gottlieb has a fairly lively, TV commercial style and a smart, bright cast (Andrew McCarthy, Kim Cattrall, Estelle Getty, Mesch Taylor) who mug a lot. They keep things sort of diverting — but only for undemanding audiences.

THE MISSION (PG) The film is hauntingly spectacular, serious and passionate and — in many ways — successful; it provides Jeremy Irons with a chance for his purest and most searing film performance, and it gives Robert De Niro another of those nearly "impossible" physical challenges. But there are a few picture-testers with its idealized views of the Guarani Indians, its

general lack of surprise and occasional deadly lines of dialogue that would defeat Olivier (they rout De Niro).

OVER THE TOP (PG) There is not an honest moment or a true performance in all of this Rocky-meets-arm-wrestling film's 91 minutes. As scripted by Stirling Silliphant and star Sylvester Stallone, and directed by Cannon chief Menahem Golan, it's utterly bogus. The only diversion here is to keep track of the shameless advertising plugs that dot the film, popping up like loadstools after a rain. It is not quite reason enough to go out to a movie, however.

PLATOON (R) This is movie making with a zealot's fervor. Director-writer Oliver Stone, decorated Vietnam infantryman himself, clearly wants us to understand what fighting in that war was like. He succeeds with an immediacy that is frightening. War movies of the past, even the greatest ones, seem like crane shots by comparison: "Platoon" is at ground zero. And, not incidentally, Stone may have put a stake through the heart of all the slick Rambo heroics ever to slide onto a screen.

STAR TREK IV: THE VOYAGE HOME (PG) Breathes there a God-Trekkie with hide so tough they will not find something to enjoy in this rollicking, humanistic-space opera? Perhaps, but they will be

outnumbered. The reunited Enterprise — under the guidance of director Leonard Nimoy and Captain (excuse us, Admiral) James Kirk crew travel backward in time to a primitive era (our own) to rescue two humpbacked whales and thereby save Earth. There has been a conscious effort to lighten things up after the "sturm und drang" of the first three movie "Star Treks" and the result will almost certainly be the best loved of the four: full of the old crackling Enterprise crew badinage and a lot more besides. Even audience members with a terminal Spock block should be amused.





Escape-proof federal prison poses no hitches to talented magician

He made a jet vanish. He made the Statue of Liberty disappear — and then reappear at his command. He walked through the Great Wall of China.

David Copperfield is one of the best magicians in the world. On March 13, he'll dazzle millions of viewers again with one of his fantastic presentations: an escape from Alcatraz. The special, "Kraft Salutes the Magic of David Copperfield IX: The Escape From Alcatraz," airs on CBS.

For 29 years, from 1934 to 1963, Alcatraz, located in the San Francisco Bay, was known as the escape-proof home of some of the country's most notorious criminals, including Al Capone and "Machine Gun" Kelly. Thirty-four men have tried to escape from the maximum-security prison, but none of them made it from the island to San Francisco. Until now... (The Clint

Eastwood film, "Escape from Alcatraz," was based on a true story, but the escapee was caught.)

Copperfield, 29, who hails from Metuchen, N.J., says it took a year to plan his feat. "It's actually an escape, not an illusion," he says. "And some magical techniques are also used. I rehearsed by incorporating some of the challenges involved in the escape into my regular show. For example, in my act I used the jail-cell door from the cell I used on Alcatraz. I practiced getting it open. I also practiced getting out of a straitjacket."

Copperfield says the escape went off without a hitch, but he laughs

'Furillo' says he's leaving 'HSB'

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC has not said if it will renew "Hill Street Blues" for another season, but series star Daniel J. Travanti said Tuesday he will not be back.

"I have no doubt in my heart that I want to go. Seven years are enough," Travanti said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles. "They were enough for Mary Tyler Moore, too, and they were riding high."

"I'm sure I'll have some more complex emotions as we get down to the last actual minute. But I have no doubt I must go. I have to go act, be free, I don't know how that feels."

Travanti, who was a little known stage actor when he landed the part of Capt. Frank Furillo, said he will make a feature film this summer with Faye Dunaway in Florida, then appear on stage for the first time in 10 years at Massachusetts theater festival.

"Hill Street" attracted critical attention when it debuted mid-season in January 1981 but got low

ratings. NBC kept it on the air and gained a reputation for sticking with "quality" programs. Eventually NBC rose to No. 1 in the ratings, and Grant Tinker, head of MTM Productions which produces "Hill Street," became the network's president.

Travanti said the cast and crew are midway through the last episode of the season, with no word from NBC on whether the show will be picked up for another year. There has been speculation that "Hill Street" is over, however, because its original stars' contracts are up.

Travanti wouldn't divulge the plot of the last episode, but hinted, "Old 'Hill Streets' never die, they just fade away. Maybe to come again."

Furillo says he's leaving 'HSB'

NEW YORK (AP) — NBC has not said if it will renew "Hill Street Blues" for another season, but series star Daniel J. Travanti said Tuesday he will not be back.

"I have no doubt in my heart that I want to go. Seven years are enough," Travanti said in a telephone interview from Los Angeles. "They were enough for Mary Tyler Moore, too, and they were riding high."

"I'm sure I'll have some more complex emotions as we get down to the last actual minute. But I have no doubt I must go. I have to go act, be free. I don't know how that feels."

Travanti, who was a little known stage actor when he landed the part of Capt. Frank Furillo, said he will make a feature film this summer with Faye Dunaway in Florida, then appear on stage for the first time in 10 years at Massachusetts theater festival.

"Hill Street" attracted critical attention when it debuted mid-season in January 1981 but got low

ratings. NBC kept it on the air and gained a reputation for sticking with "quality" programs. Eventually NBC rose to No. 1 in the ratings, and Grant Tinker, head of MTM Productions which produces "Hill Street," became the network's president.

Travanti said the cast and crew are midway through the last episode of the season, with no word from NBC on whether the show will be picked up for another year. There has been speculation that "Hill Street" is over, however, because its original stars' contracts are up.

Travanti wouldn't divulge the plot of the last episode, but hinted, "Old 'Hill Streets' never die, they just fade away. Maybe to come again."

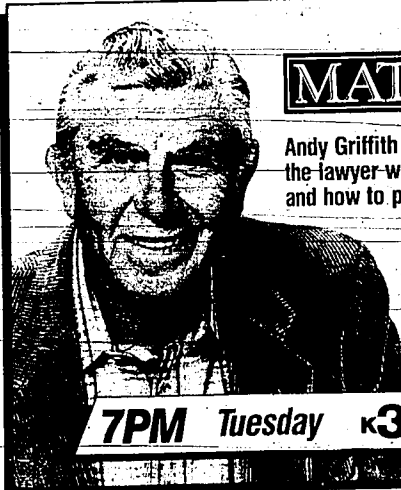

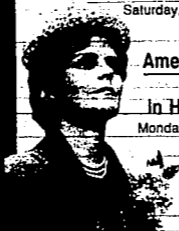

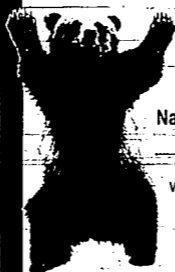

Nielsen ratings

Novel, awards no help

NEW YORK — The CBS miniseries "I'll Take Manhattan" took with audiences on its opening night, but didn't help CBS win over NBC in the A.C. Nielsen Co. ratings last week.

CBS was not awarded with great ratings by the usually boffo Grammy music awards show, which lost to the movie "Places in the Heart" on NBC. The Grammys had a rating of 18.3 and a 27 share. The movie got a 19.9 and 30.

David Poltrack, CBS vice president for research, attributed the poor showing for this year's Grammys to a lack of big stars, such as Michael Jackson and Bruce Springsteen.

The fourth Judith Krantz novel to be made into a miniseries, "Manhattan" started off with a 25.4 rating and 40 share, but dropped off Monday night to 19.9 and 29, according to Nielsen overnight ratings from the 13 largest cities.

The ABC miniseries "Amerika" only dropped from a 38 share to a 31 in national ratings its second night.

The rating point is a percentage of homes equipped with television. Each rating point represents 874,000 households. The share is a percentage of households where the television is on.

With ratings almost complete for the February sweeps — one of four periods each year when local ratings determine advertising rates — the three networks were in the positions they've been in almost all season.

NBC predicted it would have its best sweeps since 1980 while CBS and ABC appeared headed for their lowest since 1969.

NBC won the week with an 18.9, CBS had 17.1 and ABC 12.9. The season-to-date averages for the networks stand at 18.0 for NBC, CBS with 16.1 and ABC with 14.3. NBC has won 20 of the 23 weeks in the season. CBS won the other three.

NBC was back on top in news ratings. For the week ending Feb. 27, "NBC Nightly News" had an average rating of 13.0 and a 22 share, the "CBS Evening News" had a 12.7 and 22, and ABC's "World News Tonight" had 11.0 and 19.

NBC's "The Cosby Show" was the highest-rated prime-time program, with a rating of 36.9 and a 54 share.

The rest of the top 10: "Family Ties," "Murder, She Wrote," "Cheers," "I'll Take Manhattan," "60 Minutes," "Golden Girls," "Matlock," "L.A. Law" and the movie "Perry Mason: The Case of the Lost Love" and "Growing Pains" tied for 10th.

It was the first time in the top 10 for NBC's "Matlock." Because of a special news show on the Tower commission report of the Iranian arms deal, the network's "L.A. Law" pre-empted "Night Court" and got its highest-ever rating, 22.0.

CBS' "Magnum, P.I." was 13th with its highest rating since January 1985, 20.6. "The Equalizer," at 22nd, had an all-time high 18.5.

The bottom 10 shows out of 65 ranked, from the bottom, were: "Our World," CBS special on the Tower commission report, the movie "Supergirl," "Jack & Mike," "Sledge Hammer!," "Nell Diamond, Hello Again," "Disney Goes to the Academy Awards," "Outlaws," "Casanova" and "Sidekicks."

Newswriters strike at 2 networks

WASHINGTON — Some 525 writers, editors, graphic artists, researchers and production and desk assistants at ABC News and CBS News went on strike early Monday.

The Writers Guild of America was unable to reach an agreement with the two networks after a weekend of protracted bargaining. Negotiations continued past the original midnight strike deadline — set for the end of the current three-year contract — but broke off at 5 a.m. Monday with the strike call.

At both ABC and CBS, management personnel Monday were filling the key jobs, with most on-air personnel handling their own writing chores. Generally, the public will probably not notice any changes on the air, although over the long run, the quality of the news shows could suffer.

NBC News, whose writers are affiliated with the National Association of Broadcast Employees and Technicians, was not affected by the walkout. NABET's contract with the network expires at the end of this

 when asked to divulge the techniques he employed. No trade secrets will come from him.

Magic has become a way of life for this young man. "I grew up a very shy, introverted child. I was an only child and magic helped me to break out of my shell. It became a vehicle I used to express myself. It intrigued me."

The craft had not been passed from generation to generation in his family. "I taught myself. My family wasn't involved with magic. I learned about it mostly from books in the library. The closest magic shop to my home was an hour or so away in New York City. I'd take the bus to get there. The store, Pannen's Magic Shop, is still there, and they come to see me when I perform at Atlantic City."

By age 12, Copperfield was performing professionally. He became

the youngest person to be admitted to the Society of American Magicians, and by 1972, at age 16, he was teaching a magic course at New York University.

When he was 20, Copperfield's special brand of magic was introduced to the world through a TV show: "The Magic of ABC Starring David Copperfield." The show's high ratings led to a contract with CBS for a series of specials, the first of which aired in 1977.

"I never imagined that magic would be a career, but I wanted to be an entertainer," says the magician. "I keep working hard to get where I want to be. I love challenges. I enjoy taking on the task of doing something that is considered impossible. And I love performing. Working in front of an audience gives me the opportunity to be very prolific."
